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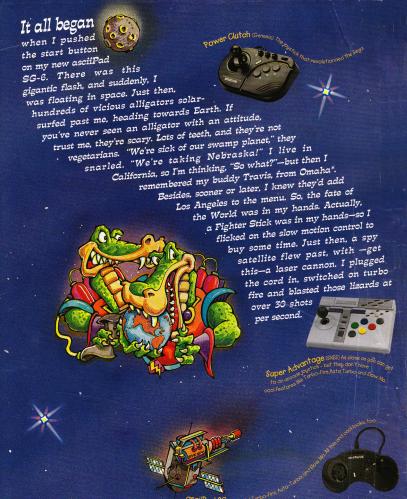
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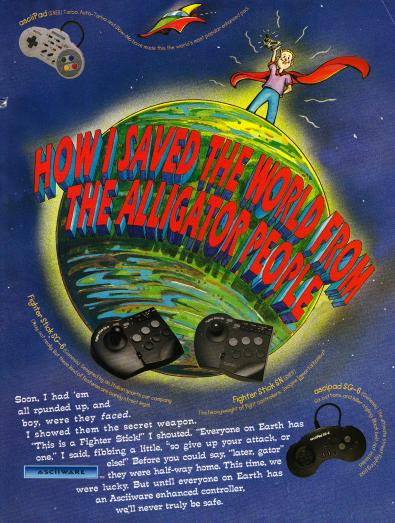

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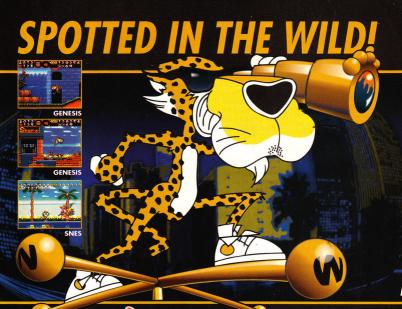

(The Genesis system has been internally reconfigured several times. Unfortunately, this means that some of the earlier software is incompatible with later versions of the Genesis. If Sonic The Hedgehog was packed in with the Genesis you bought, you know you have one of the later revs of the Genesis. Consequently, call software, such as Populous, isn't going to work on your system.)

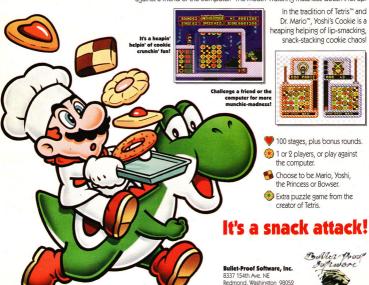
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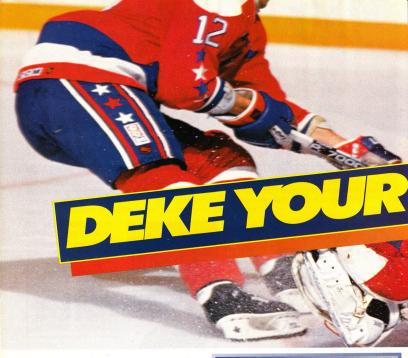

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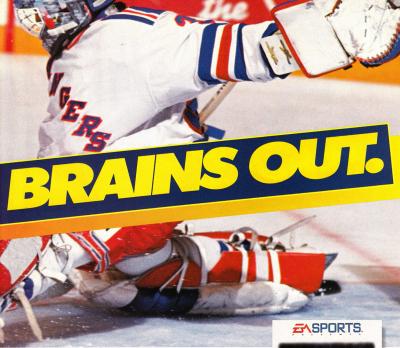

Commodore Comes Back! The Amiga CD32!

While 3DO, Atari, and Nintendo/Silicon Graphics were busy capturing

Graphics were busy capturing headlines with new high-powered video game/multimedia systems, no one noticed that Commodore was already there. Yes, CDTV is still slowly sailing into the sunset. However, Commodore is retossing its hat into the multimedia entertainment ring with a new compact disc-based game system called the Amiga CD32.

The CD32 is a 32-bit console which houses a double-speed CD-ROM drive with 2 megabytes (MB) of internal RAM. The unit's brain power is based on the 32-bit Motorola 68EC020 chip coupled with the Commodore Advanced Graphics Architecture chip set. All this for a list price under \$400. Amida buffs will recognize

this as basically a condensed version of the Amiga 1200 computer. The 14 Mbz 68EC020 system coritains 2Mb of 32-bit chip RAM and the Amiga AA chip set. According to Commodore, the unit is capable of displaying 256,000 colors on-screen with a total palette of 16.8 million colors.

The top-loading box houses ports for the regular stereo, SV-Video, composite video, good ol' RF output, two joy-sticks/controllers and a head-phone jack. The standard controller, a streamlined version of the CDTV unit, sports the familiar directional pad with 11 fire buttons.

In addition to the 32-bit silicon muscle, the CD32 promises to put the "video" in "video games" - full-motion video. that is. The unit's expansion bus is directly accessible to the main functions on the motherboard, making it perfect for an optional MPEG module. MPEG (Motion Picture Expert Platform) is an international standards committee that strives to develop a single standard for audio and video compression, MPEG capability will enable multimedia sysare among the developers already on board. According to Commodore, 50 games are already in the works, including existing video and computer games such as Mortal Kombat, Jurassic Park, Microcosm, Dune CD, Liberation, and Defender of the Crown.

Tournament Fighters for the Genesis puts up a good, fun fight, but it's not as complex as either Street Fighter II Special Champion Edition or Tournament Fighters for the SNES. Street Fighter stalwarts will like the fact that you can string together some moves for Combox, but they'll miss the absent SF-style Two-in-Ones.

Just the same, you get a workable arsenal, even though fighting only uses two buttons

on the standard controller. There are six punches, six kicks, a hold or a choke, and a block. Additionally, every character has three or four Special Attacks. Button C is only used to taunt your foes. That's a kick when you're beating up a buddy, but using C for added firepower would have been preferable.

SYSTEM SHOPPER

The most intense video game wars this season aren't being fought on a screen, but at your local toy store. With eight home game systems on the shelves by Christmas, the task of selecting new hardware is daunting. Our shopper's guide suggests what to try, what to buy, and what to skip.

I6-BIT SYSTEMS

SEGA GENESIS

Models Available

Sonic 2 System (\$129.99, includes Sonic The Hedgehog 2 and one 3-button controller): Sonic 2 is a great cart well worth the extra \$30 this system costs.

Core System (\$99.99, includes one controller): The stripped-down model is unfortunately not packed with the six-button controller.

Controller: The standard three-button job is limited by today's standards. The new six-shooter provides gamers with more game play options, but costs \$19.95.

Technology

The Genesis is fast, but the graphics show its age.

Graphics: A limit of 64 onscreen colors hurts the system, but artists can sometimes skirt this problem, as in Disney's Aladdin

Sound: In comparison to the SNES, the Genesis sound chip is mediocre. It can produce good music, but digitized voices sound garbled.

Speed: This is the fastest 16bit system and rarely has slowdown or flicker.

Software

It will have more than 500 games by the end of '93, the largest 16-bit software library. Great games are in almost every category for this system!

Direct support: Sega of

America has the best software

track record of any hardware manufacturer. Shinobi III, Toe-Jam and Earl 2, Disney's Aladdin, and more made this Sega's best year ever.

Third-party support: The Genesis is almost dead-even with the SNES. Sega will need to continue to sign on key missing companies, like Square Soft and Enix, but the addition of big players like Capcom and Konami has been a big boost.

Recommendation: While the SNES is in many ways a better piece of hardware, more and better Genesis games made '93 Sega's year.

SUPER NINTENDO ENTERTAINMENT SYSTEM

Models Available

Super Set (\$149.95, includes Super Mario World and two controllers): SMW is still a classic. Plus, once the extra \$20 controller is factored in, you're getting Mario for only \$30 – a bargain.

Control Set (\$99.95, includes no game and one controller): Don't buy this model unless you hate Mario and play one-player carts exclusively.

Controller: The pad has four standard fire buttons, two top fire buttons, and two option buttons. It's an awkward configuration for six-button fighting games, but the pad is smooth and responsive.

Technology

Overall, the SNES is the more advanced 16-bit system available.

Graphics: 256 on-screen colors paint the best visuals in a 16-bit system.

Sound: The SNES sound chip has more channels and pumps much better sound effects and voices than the Genesis.

Speed: Too slow! Even today, many games have slowdown

Software

The SNES support will be approximately 305 games by end of '93. Although its fighting games and RPGs are better, the SNES lags behind the





Genesis in sports. The systems are virtually tied in the action/ adventure genre, though.

Direct support: Nintendo of America puts out reliable hits. but not enough of them. Look for only two or three big games from the company per year. Where are all the Super FX games?

Third-party support: The SNES is the best-supported

system in history. Virtually every company which makes electronic games develops for this system.

Recommendation: The SNES has a slight edge over the Genesis in terms of graphics and sounds, but the Genesis has more speed and a better software library.

SNES vs. Genesis: Which is better?

All other factors being equal, the SNES version of a game is usually superior to the Genesis version because of better graphics and sounds. However, the Genesis's speed can put SNES versions of games out to pasture. Your call.

Duo (\$299.95, includes 1controller and 1 disc with 5 games: Bonk's Adventure, Bonk's Revenge, Gate of Thunder, Ys Book I & II, and Ninia Spirit. Enter Up. Right, Down, Left, II at the Title Screen to play Bomberman, too): It's lots of value for the buck, since these are some of the system's best games!

Controller: An outdated twobutton contraption identical to the NES controller. Although the five-player capability features some of the best multiplayer games to date.

Sound: The CD music and voices are generally superb, as with the voice actors in Ys. Book Land II. Unfortunately the TurboChip music is not as good as the SNES.

Speed: The CD access time is annoving, but many of the games can move at lightning speed (e.g. Gate of Thunder).

Software

It will have approximately 57 games by late '93. Bonk, Bomberman, and the RPGs are the strongest. The rest of the Duo software line is not as strong as the Genesis and SNES libraries.

Direct support: The majority of TTI's titles are imported and are more suited to the Japanese market.



Technology

The Duo runs both CD-ROM and cartridge games. This system's 8-bit CPU lacks the power to be a top contender over the next few years. Although the 2 Super CD technology has muscle, it needs more games to prove it.

Graphics: The 16-bit processor is good and can pump colors on the screen.

Third-party support: TTI's support is almost nonexistent.

Games from companies like Electronic Arts and Working Designs are rare.

Recommendation: For a gamer who has it all, the Duo has some entertaining games. especially it s multi-player carts. Make this the third 16-hitter on your shopping list, though.

8-BIT SYSTEMS

NINTENDO ENTERTAINMENT SYSTEM

Models Available

NES Challenge Set (\$39.95, includes two controllers and Super Mario Bros. 3): This set is the best NES buy, as SMB 3 is one of the best NES games ever. Get this set while you can – it's about to be discontinued.

New NES (\$49.95, includes one controller and no game): It's a decent deal, but the money's better spent on a new SNES game.

Controller: The classic two fire-button configuration can be mastered by beginners, but it's very limiting when you're playing complex carts.

Technology

The seven-year-old NES has seen better days....and probably won't see them again.

SEGA CD

Models Available

Sega CD (\$229.99, includes Sewer Shark): The new, sleeker, remodeled system fits sideby-side with the Genesis. Shark's one of the system's better games, but the package is still pricey.

Technology

The Sega CD could have been an upgrade, but it's essentially a big memory device with CD sound.

Graphics: The lack of a graphic upgrade chip impairs the SCD's ability to have high-quality full-motion video. More importantly, it doesn't even match the quality of graphics found on the SNES.

Sound: CD-quality music, such as Batman Returns' crankin' tunes and the Q-Sound in Ecco the Dolphin, is one big reason to buy the system.

Speed: Game play speed is comparable to the Genesis, but did you ever think you could go grab a Gatorade between levels without having to pause? With certain Sega CD slow-loaders, like Willy Bearnish, you can.

Software

More than 75 games by late '93. Hopefully games will start coming out faster.

Direct support Sega of America started off on the wrong foot last year by converting some carts to CD with few enhancements. Timely releases of more innovative products (like Jurassic Park and Sonic CD) would have gone a long way toward correcting this problem.

Third-party support: Many companies have signed on, but few have actually released games. Hopefully we'll see more discs in '94. Some great discs are spinning out of Japan, though, such as Silpheed and Sonic CD.

Recommendation: Since CDs are cheap to make, you'd think game prices would be lower, right? Guess again. Sega CDs are just as expensive as carts, and the system's more expensive. If you own only a Genessis, buy a SNES – then think about a Sega CD.

Graphics: The 24-bit graphics have tons of on-screen colors, and SNK's artists have gotten better at shading characters. Compare Art of Fighting to Burning Fight – what a difference!

Sound: The horsepower of arrade-qualify tunes is hard to match. The music and digitized voice in Samurai Shodown rule!

Speed: One might think a 24-bit processor is immortal. One would be wrong. Why does Last Resort have slowdown?

Software

Look for approximately 38 games by the end of '93. You've gotta be a fighting fan to play on this system!

Direct support: SNK has shown surprising dedication, releasing approximately one game a month. Granted, the company is fighting-happy, but you'll be, too, when you play Shodown and FF 2 Special. Some nonfighters, such as Viewpoint, are also impressive.

Third-party support: The few third-party companies (ADK, American Sammy) don't publish under their own name,



but they do come up with hits like World Heroes 2

Recommendation: Fight fans with mind-blowing budgets should consider this killer system. If you don't have \$650 to burn, however, play it in the arcades - it's iust as

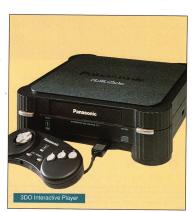

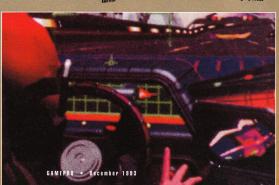

As expected, Crash 'N Burn's 3DO graphics will make your eyes bug out. The car designs are killers. Also, the expansive outdoor horizons are knockouts, with brilliant colors and beautiful cloud patterns! Hey, nuclear fallout looks good in the atmosphere anyway.

The creative character selection screen puts on a mini-show of its own. Actors in bizzare costumes (and off-Broadway makeup) play the digitized competitors with over-the-top performances. Radiation levels must really play havoc with the hormones because these ego-maniacal nuts are in a foaming-at-the-mouth frenzy to drive you into the dirt. At least their rantings are crystal CD clear, and you can plan your strategy by what they say.

PROTIP: Shoot your opponents every chance you get. Even If you don't destroy them, the damage can send them to the pits so that you can pass them by.

The sounds are curiously subdued for a high-powered CD game. C & B doesn't push the effects, outside of some cool weapons fire. Moreover, the disc's music doesn't rock beyond the ordinary.

Rough Riding

Once you make it onto the track, the ride gets a little bumpy. Mastering the controls and the car's heads-up displays (HUDS) is a breeze for anyone who's ever run a video racer, thanks to the game's simple, intuitive design. However, hard-core drivers will crave more sophisticated road racing action.

Basically, you just stomp on the accelerator button and go. There are no brakes (any decent race driver shouldn't need them anyway), but you can't drive off the road, so there's no danger of crashing to spice up the challenge. The car-versus-car fighting's all right, but maneuvering your racer and jamming the trigger button is definitely a thumbspraining experience.

Let the Buyer Beware

Placing in the top three earns you cash and the right to race on another track. Ending up in the money is critical, so you can fortify your racer with exotic weapons and shields.

PROTIP: Take a chance and par on a Pit Stop when you're in the final two laps of a race. However, you'd better not get hit!

The 3DO graphics shine at Floyd's Auto Shop, where you purchase new gear. You can score Guns, Energy Weapons, Missiles, Hazards (mines), and Shields, 35 individual pieces in all. Check out the Hellfire Rotogun, the Plasma Sun Gun, and the self-repairing body armor. Of course, prices vary according to individual firepower. To help you make your buying decisions, the Auto Shop screen displays a beautiful graphic of your potential purchase, which automatically rotates for a 360-degree view and shows the weapon in action.

Your starship is armed with several kinds of weaponry. In most shooters you earn weapons via a power-up system, but in Silpheed you earn them as you successfully fight through the game. The Main Weapons include a Forward Beam, a Wide Beam, a Phalanx Beam, and Auto-Aiming, You earn an additional Main Weapon every time you score 40,000 points, Optional Weapons include Graviton Bombs, an E.M. Defense System, Photon Torpedoes, and Anti-Matter Bombs. Optional Weapons are randomly awarded every time you score 50,000 points. The weapons

vary in appearance, but they aren't as dramatically different from each other as they are in other shooters, where wildly varied weapons add style and excitement.



PROTIP: In Stage 6, as soon as the Squadron Leader warns you to take evasive maneuvers, watch out for laser shots from behind. You'll have to dodge quickly to avoid serious damage.

PROTIP: Watch out for the chopper blocks that'll try to squash the Silpheed in Stage 7.

Power-ups are fairly standard. You get Bonus items that score you points, Shield Repair, Option Energy-Ups, Destroy (a smart bomb that takes out everything on the screen) and limited Invincibility.

Star Fox

The game's highpoints, especially in the cinematic Demo Mode, are its polygon graphics. The graphics are only partly successful. Although they're impressive in spots, the backgrounds and enemies in the various levels are somewhat uneven. Additionally, some of the levels are repetitive, and the same bosses repeat at the end of several stages. Star Fox's overall usage of polygons was more consistent, and this CD can't pull off Mode 7 effects. like true rotation or scaling.

Unfortunately, Silpheed's tunes are also disappointing. They're unexceptional and repetitive, and the sound quality isn't up to par with current CD standards. The digitized voice of the Squadron Leader, however, is fun and adds a cool ambiance to the game.

Enter Aladdin, a young thief who becomes entangled in Jafar's plans and ensnared by Jasmine's beauty.

Aladdin's armed in this quest with...Apples? Well, actually, Aladdin uses the Apples to stun the guards, then he jumps on their heads to get rid of them. Similar to the movie, there's no daring swordplay or chair-tossing heroics. Still, Aladdin does get

to swing from any object that he can latch himself onto, like chains, lamps, and stalagmites. He also hangs (à la Prince of Persia) from the edges of most objects, such as cliffs and flying platforms. If you find White Rugs, you can jump off death-defying ledges and float to safety.



PROTIP: In the first cave of the second stage, just after the chest with the Scarab in it, you'll see a bat. Jump on the bat to reach a ledge, then head right for a 1-up.



PROTIP: Jump off bats to snag Red Gems.

There are also 1-ups. Blue and Red Gems (Blues are worth one Gem, Reds are worth three), and Treasure Chests strewn throughout each stage. If you collect 100 Gems, you get an extra heart for your life bar. The Treasure Chests contain hearts, food to replenish your hearts, and gold Scarabs which whisk you to a bonus round at the end of the stage. In the bonus rounds, you spin the Genie of fortune to try and obtain more hearts. 1-ups, or continue credits.

It's in the Genies

The graphics in Aladdin are diminutive but clean. Although a larger main character sprite would have been nice, the lush, detailed backgrounds make up.for it. The swinging, running and jumping are

smooth, despite some slowdown against the final bos-Although the animation isn't as spectacular as those found in the Genesis version, there are some really humorous animations, like Abu almost losing it at a cliff's edge, or the Genie hamming it up in his lamp.

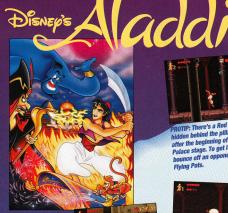

Last year, Id Software updated the Nazinuking legend as a PC game with a first-person, over-the-barrel perspective called Wolfenstein 3D. It too became a huge hit.

Now Id has teamed with Imagineer to bring Wolfenstein 3D to the SNES. Prediction: though it's changed somewhat from its predecessors, it will be a huge hit, too.

Guns, But No Roses

It's World War II, and you're the world-famous soldier, B. J. Blazkowicz. Your accomplishments are legendary, so much so that President Roosevelt has your phone number in his Rolodex – and he uses it. The vile Staatmeister and his Master State are up to their dirty tricks again. It's your job to break into their fortresses and take them down.

You set off on 30 missions as a one-man wrecking crew. You're initially armed only

with a pistol and a handful of bullets. Luckily, machine guns, flamethrowers, rocket launchers, and a ton of ammunition are spread in abundance throughout the game.

Wolfenstein's challenge will make you howl. Of course, the Master State is expecting you, so there are Guards, Elite Guards, Officers, and Mutant Attack Rats lurking everywhere. In later levels, you meet up with Frankenstein-like mutant soldiers that have guns mounted in their chests, chain guns for arms, and knives for hands.

It's obvious what comes necest You blast your way through the ranks to find the level exit as quickly as you can. If you take out all the enemies and snatch all the treasures in each level, you earn bonus points toward extra lives. You also earn bonus points for beating the level within a certain time limit and more points for finding secret rooms.

All Shot Up and Nowhere to Go

The controls in Wolfenstein are as simple to use as A-B-Start, but they take time to master. B shoots and A opens doors. Start displays a map of what you've seen so far. Even with this simplicity, the controls are a bit skittish, especially during intense firefights. Until you nail the directionals down, it's tough to swing your gun around quickly or stop on a dime to take a precise shot.

You can constantly monitor your health with a percentage display on-screen. Anything less than 100 percent means you've been hit. If you aren't into percentages, you can



PROTIP: It's easy to get spun around and find yourself covering ground you've already conquered. Use the map frequently to analyze your progress.



PROTUP: Some levels have more than one exit, which can give you a speed hours if you get to one quickly. However, it's usually worth the time to find all secret rooms and treasures, and get rid of all enemies.

PROTIP: When you run into uniform types, take out the dudes in white first, the ones in blue second, and the ones in khaki last.

For example, Guards shout "Stop" and "Halt," Depending on how far the enemies are from you, the volume of their shouts vary. Similarly, if something's happening to the left of your character, you'll hear it more in your left speaker. The game's filled with other effects as well. like the snarls of the rats and the reverberating door slams. It all builds intense realism.

the doubts hiters's cleans. Overall, there's great attention to graphic detail. You get a big window on the action, and the screen updates are fast. Also, if you pick up a weapon, Blazkowicz's face puts on this greedy, "look what I found" sneer. Cool. If you get killed, the screen freezes, then spins to show you who did the final deed.

The dramatic graphic drawbacks are the overly pixelated surroundings and character sprites – it looks like you're fighting giant Lego people in a Lego castle. Even though the graphics are generally very blocky, the scalling of objects is good.

Wolfenstein 3D is a major blast! It's one of those rare games that's simple in design, easy to control, and a heck of a lot of fun to play. You get all that and world war, too.

James plans to become a big fish in a small Pond in January '94

Lotus II (Genesis)



Slide in behind the wheel of the best cars ever made: The Lotus Elan, Lotus Esprit, and Concept M200. Enjoy more options as



you race over infinite tracks that you construct yourself, adjusting the sharpness of the curves and the steepness of the hills, placing numerous obstacles, and more. 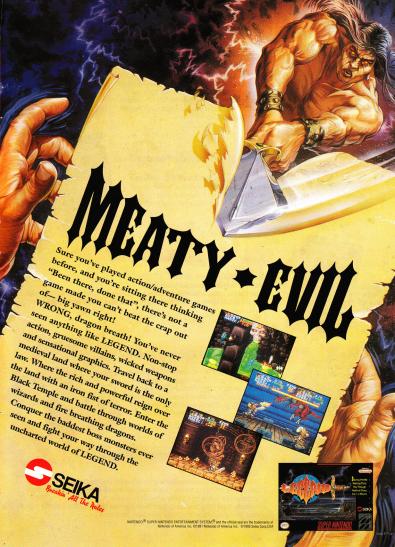

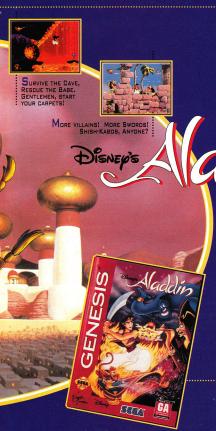

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Brett Hull Skates Hard, But Trails Competition

One of the NHL's premiere superstars, St. Louis Blues rightwinger Brett Hull, is lacing 'em up for a new team - Accolade. Brett Hull Hockey for the SNES plays with as much flash and style as its famous namesake, but this cart doesn't quite qualify for the Stanley Cup.

Stats Now!

There's good news right away -Hull's brought all the NHLPA players with him, making these some of the most complete rosters you'll ever see. The stats, compiled after last year's season had ended, are accurate and up to date. In



fact, both expansion teams for '93-'94 (Anaheim and Florida) are included. The only things missing are real NHL team names, but you get real cities and accurate jersey colors.



Play a full season or just shoot it out.

In-Your-Face Hockey

Hull offers a great variety of options and modes. You can practice your skills in an Exhibition, compete in Tournament Mode, or go all-out in adjustable-length Season Play. Unfortunately, you can't play in just a Trophy Tournament, you have to play the

whole season and try to qualify. Thankfully, the game has some nifty customizing options, though, such as team roster editing and line changes. However, it would've been better if you could set the computer to automatically make line changes for you.

Hull introduces a superb new visual Mode 7 perspective that bears a strong resemblance to Ninténdo's acclaimed NCAA Basketball. The floating camera looks down on the 3D rink. enabling you to see superb depth and detail. The animation is very slick, and the screen movement is surprisingly fast and fluid. There are no problems with the screen moving too quickly or too slowly and obstructing your view of the action

One minor flaw is in the shading of the on-screen icons. so that it's hard to tell when your player takes the puck. You occa-

sionally find yourself breaking down the ice with nothing but a stick coated with ice shavings. This really is minor, though, compared to the biggest graphic annoyance - the generic blue field that attempts to pass for a crowd. It doesn't

Doin' the Hockey Pokey

Your skater's moves are pretty good. You get Wrist Shots and Slapshots (in two degrees of strength), plus Body Checks and Poke Checks, Your goalie's got lots of fancy moves, too, and he can be controlled by the CPU or by you. You'll find, though, that there aren't as many moves and dekes in this game as in NHL Hockey '94. What's worse, the cumbersome controls aren't as responsive as they should be. The skating is natural, but manipulating the selected player can be problematic. For instance, the Pass button on offense is different

from the Change Players button on defense, which really throws you off kilter.

In Hull, you can only play with up to two players - you can't go five via the Multitap, which is NHL's strongest feature. While Hull gives you true-to-life fights. strategies, penalties, and shootouts. you don't quite get the thrills of NHL '94's One-Timers, its awesome crowd details, its constant network updates, and its generally more exciting game play.

That Rallying Cheer

One area where Hull rules is in sound. Hull's audio is absolutely superb and presents some of the best effects heard in a sports cart! Al Michaels is the banner attraction, and he pours forth a fairly

diverse running commentary with phrases such as "He just levelled him!" You'll hear an occasional garble and lag, but overall the voices sound clean. The deephorn music is impressive, and there are plenty of sound effects and crowd chants.

Sudden Death?

Hull is a top-notch hockey game that all fans should place in their starting lineup. However, while Hull moves fast and has innovative graphics and sound, this cart is not as polished as NHL Hockey '94 for the SNES, and it's nowhere close to the all-around 16-bit Stanley Cup winner, NHL '94 for the Genesis. Unlike its real-life counterpart. Brett Hull Hockey will be on center ice most of the time, but it may be spending a few minutes in the box. G

The game is moderately playable and the controls are reasonably easy to use, but the inconsistent, jumpy action is an ice pick in the coffin. The only saving grace is the CPU, which is hard to beat and makes the tournament a good challenge, but even this is not worth the effort and frustration.

If you're really desperate for a fun 8-bit hockey product, Konami's Blades of Steel is the only way to skate. Pro Sport Hockey is a good buy - only if you're looking to use an NES cartridge as a hockey puck.

Play Ball

Realism is the key to World Series Baseball. You get real teams, real players, and real stats to play with. Unfortunately, the transitory



nature of the sport means that some of the data is already outdated – a Dodger outfield with Davis in left and Strawberry in right is more nostalgic than realistic. At least you can make substitutions during the course of a long season. Good controls, such as the ability to pitch vicious screwgies, and strong details (pitchers who tire and start to get wild) intensify the realistic strategy.

A clear behind-the-catchers view and strikes, even though those opposing pitchers can really throw some heat! Once the ball is hit, you switch to the standard overhead view to make your defenders throw to a base. Onscreen prompters provide a wealth of pitcher and batter data, pitch speeds, and other game info. Good news for stat freaks.

The sounds are decent by hand-held standards. Continuous music energizes the proceedings, while the crack of the bat and an announcer's enthusiastic playcalling add flair.

Among the many options are a choice of stadiums, variations in season length, and the chance for two players to face-off (using a Gear-to-Gear Cable). If you like options, follow box scores carefully, and can't waif or spring, step to the plate with World Series Baseball. Though not a homer, it's as satisfying as a clean double into the gap.



Great Looks Not Enough for Madden Duo CD

Already an MVP for the Genesis and the Super NES, John Madden sets his sights on conquering the Duo CD gridiron. The combination of Madden's award-winning game engine with the graphic and audio horsepower of a CD was potentially a sure bet for the best Madden game ever. Unfortunately, while John Madden Duo CD Football looks and sounds like a winner, the game play just doesn't match up to its 16-bit predecessors. Check out this scouting report, and you make the call.





A-V MVP

John Madden Duo CD Football starts off well, with a hard-rockin' soundtrack and a quick-zooming 360-degree view of the stadium. From such an impressive opening, expectations are understandably high for the game to come.

The good news: The topnotch graphics take full advantage of the CD's capabilities. All characters are cleanly rendered and are razor-sharp, making this the best-looking Madden ever. The easy-to-read playbooks are just as clear. Game play animation is silky smooth, with no trace of flicker, slowdown, or blurring. All the key animation spots of referees and showboating players are presented as digitized video snippets featuring live actors. There's a limited variety of these scenes, though, and they eventually become repetitive. A Bypass Mode would've been a good option.

Madden Duo CD's sound is equally as impressive as its graphics. Where the background crowd noise was a constant, buzz-like drone in the 16-bit Maddens, the cheers and boos are now crystal clear. Additional digitized sound bites from the OB, the refs, and the bone-crunching collisions create a totally realistic playing environment.



PROTIP: On defense, your best player is the Free Safety when he's lined up behind the Center. He has the mobility to blitz in on runs and drop back to cover passes.



PROTTP: On extremely long pass plays, your QB must avoid being sacked long enough to allow your receivers to get downfield.

Madden Lite

Now for the bad news. The game's major shortcoming is the glaring omission of Madden's trademark passing windows, which track receivers as they run their routes. This omission forces the QB to throw blindly and hope that the receiver's open, thus rendering all the audio and visual bells and whistles ineffective. Ultimately, as with any good sports game, the most important element is always solid game play, and this is where Madden Duo gets sacked for a huge loss.

In other ways, however, the game play is similar to all previous Madden games. You can choose from among 28 teams (not real teams and real players, unfortunately), plus two Madden All-Star squads, and 10 All-Star teams. such as Dallas '93 and San Francisco '84. Play solo against the computer, knock heads with a friend, or team up with your buddy against the CPU, Single Exhibitions, Practice Drills, Sudden Death, and three-round Play-offs are further options. As always, detailed stats are peppered throughout the game and at halftime to update your performance.

FIFA Soccer Gives EA Sports Another Win

Chalk up another victory for EA Sports. What it did for football with the John Madden series, EA Sports has done for soccer with FIFA International Soccer for the Genesis. FIFA has excellent graphics, the coolest crowd noises this side of the Atlantic, and some of the most exciting game play of any soccer cart on the market. Simply put, this is already the World Cun champion.

FIFA features 48 of the world's top soccer countries competing in three different modes: one-on-one Exhibitions, one-to eight-team Tournaments, or 25-game League seasons. The Tournament and League modes even have passwords so you can kick around anytime you want.

FIFA also utilizes the new 4 Way Play adapter, enabling you to share the fun among four

players simultaneously. You can play three against one, two on two, or four against the computer. The only drawback with four players is that the high speed of the game sometimes makes it hard to determine who's who on-screen. This is especially true when playing four-vs.-the-computer games.



PROTIP: When taking a shot, aim high and for the far post. The goalie will have a difficult time coming up with the save.



PROTIP: On corner kicks, aim for the back post. When the ball is in the air, move one of your players into position for a shot. Quickly press C to catch the keeper off-guard with a one-touch shot.

Sights and Sounds Deliver a Kick

The sound effects for FIFA have a definite European flavor. Close your eyes and you'll think you're watching a match in London. EA Sports doesn't miss a trick! You get great crowd reactions to diving saves and near misses. There's also rhythmic chanting, just like at real soccer matches.

FIFA's graphics are topnotch. Check out the lifelike movements of the players as they execute diving Head Shots and Bicycle Kicks. The playing fields, stadiums, and sideline ads provide even more realism. The only minor problem is encountered with the perspective. Some might find the

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angled side view a refreshing change, but the behind-the-player view of most soccer carts is still the most natural for plotting strategy. Consequently, FIFA's viewing perspective may take some getting used to.

One other flaw is with the control of players when you're on defense. Defenders are sometimes difficult to maneuver and slow to respond. They'll start out fast. However, once they get going a few yards, they'll slow to a turtle's pace.

The designers of Pro Moves Soccer for the Genesis had a good idea for this game. They wanted to give you what you haven't had: Total control of the ball. While they succeeded in meeting this goal, the designers unfortunately forgot the other aspects of the game that make a good sports cart. The graphics, sounds, and smooth game play that most of us want just aren't here. Compared to superior soccer carts like EA Sports' FIFA International Soccer. Pro Moves Soccer looks. sounds, and plays like an amateur soccer game.

Pro Moves features 32 individually designed international teams that you play in one-match



PROTIP: In the Team Edit Mode, make sure you get a balanced team. Don't load up on good offensive players and leave your defense weak.

Exhibitions or in a 32-team Tournament. One of the coolest features is the Team Edit Mode, which lets you build and manage your own team. You start with below-average players and \$100,000 that's to be spent buying new players in the Player Market. The money is like a salary cap, limiting who you can acquire. Victories and ties earn you cash, which enables you to afford better players. These transactions do add a good strategic element to the game.



PROTIP: For those long-distance shots or passes, press Button B for a few seconds to increase your power.



PROTIP: On defense, keep a player from getting the ball by pressing Button C to hold him. Don't be too obvious, or the zebras will call a foul.

Put on the Moves

The control is pretty strong in this game. Pro Moves Soccer utilizes the six-button controller to execute 10 professional soccer moves, such as Head Shots, bump-n-run High Kicks, Rainbow Kicks, Slide Tackles, and Illegal Holds. The game can also be played with the standard three-button controller, but the moves require a little more timing and finesse. For instance,

to perform a Head Shot, you've got to hold one button while pressing another. On the six-button pad, you simply press X.

The best control feature is the single factor that makes this game stand out. In Pro Moves Soccer, you have the ability to steer the flight of the ball once it's shot. You can even curve the ball away from the goalkeeper!

Regrettably, the graphics and sounds are pretty average. You get an overhead view of the players, but you're so far away from them you don't get much detail. The sounds don't inspire you, either.

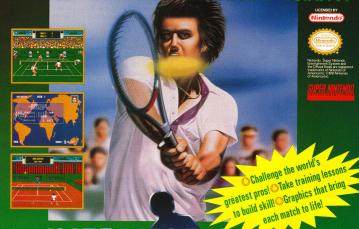

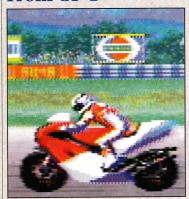

One question comes to mind after playing Mecarobot Golf: What's the deal with Mecarobot Eagle, the golfing robot you compete against? Eagle's a pretty cool guy and all, but his metallic presence is not necessary, and he doesn't have any special powers that an ordinary PGA Tour pro doesn't have. Mecarobot Golf stands on its own as a realistic, entertaining golf cart even without the robot einminick.



PROTIP: Eagle is a great putter, but not a great driver. To beat him, be aggressive off the tee.

Mecarobot gives you a variety of playing options. There are three modes to choose from— Competition, Lesson, and Driving Range. Although there's no Tournament Mode, you can create your own golfers and watch them progress from duffers to semipros.

PROTIP: During the fall and winter months, the greens are a little slower, so adjust your putts accordingly.

Despite the robot golfer, Mecarobot is realistic. For instance, the all-season course changes texture when the winter rains come. While the graphics for Mecarobot are not the sharpest and most realistic you'll ever see, the designers compensate with smooth-scrolling action. After you hit a shot from a behind-the-robot perspective, you get a forward-scrolling closeup as your ball whizzes past trees, sand traps, and water hazards. The scrolling adds a good-looking touch of realism and helps involve you in the game.

Mecarobot Golf might not be the prettiest cart on the market, and its sounds are only average, but its strong control and fascinating scrolling effects are worth the price of its green fees.

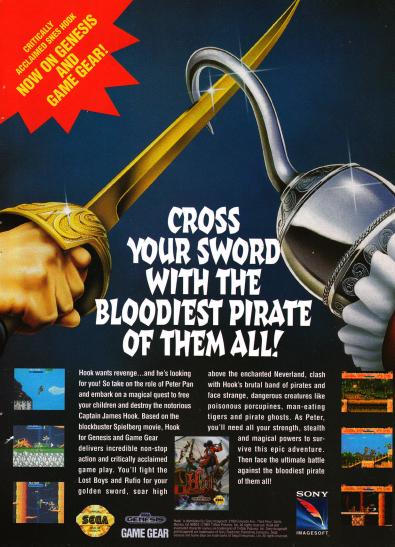

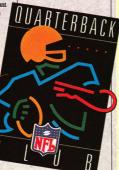

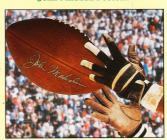

New Winter Sports Games Talk Up a Storm

Creating an optimum sports-game experience requires as much attention to the details as creating real-life sporting events. One major high-tech innovation that brings the game closer to home is commentary during the action, which can transform a sports cart's audio from a "dink" into a "Bam!" (Apologies to John Madden.)



Sega Sports: The Pioneer Returns

Until 1991, video games had no actual running commentary, just individual quips and phrases. Sega debuted full-blown commentary with MLBPA Baseball. The concept was innovative and stirring, but technical problems, such as a long lag in the announcer's quips, kept the idea from starting a revolution.

You can't keep a good team down, however, and Sega is now determined to improve its commentary. The new Sports Talk engine (sans the Sports Talk name) debuts in three about-to-be-released Genesis carts: World Series Baseball (available January), NBA Action '94 Starring David Robinson and hosted by Mary Albert (available December), and

NFL Football '94 Starring Joe Montana and (available December). There will even be a smattering of phrases, though not a full running commentary, in the Game Gear versions of these titles, too.

EA Sports Enters the Voice Arena

The most famous voice-overs, of course, are heard on the 16-bit football field. EA Sports corralled football's biggest mouth, John Madden, for its acclaimed series of NFL games. The new versions, Madden NFL '94 on the SNES and the Genesis, feature even more of the exuberant commentary made popular by the bluecollar ex-coach. So identifiable are his "Pows!" and "Bams!" they've come to be known as Maddenisms, Exclamations like "He'll remember that number!" are a big reason why the games have been so successful.

Al Michaels Calls Accolade's Shots

Al Michaels, the Emmy Awardwinning voice of ABC Monday Night Football fame, is color commentator for many of Accolade's sports games. He premiered in Hardball III and followed with Brett Hull Hockey (see page 182). Michaels will expand his play-byplay commentary to the gridiron with the NFLPA-licensed Unnecessary Roughness, due out in late '93 for the Genesis and the SNES. To show how important speech is becoming, Roughness dedicates four of its 16 megs to speech, which is the result of 12 full pages of script

By the way, another Monday Night veteran, the venerable Frank Gifford, will serve as commentator for Data East's version of Monday Night Football, due out in December.

Barkley Lends Voice, Attitude to Accolade

Following in the footsteps of Michael Jordan and Shaquille O'Neal, Sir Charles Barkley of the Phoenix Suns is the latest NBA superstar to sign onto a video game. Due out this spring for the Genesis and the SNES, Barkley's still-untitled cart will contain more than just a big-name signature. At a recent design session, Barkley fred off some of his favorite patented expressions into a mike, which will then be digitized into the game to complement thunderous dunks and other rau-

cous action. Phrases, such as "Go get the damn ball," "I'm not your role model," and "I hate to see a grown man cry," will add adrenaline to a game that'll probably play more like untamed street ball than pro basketball.

Here's an interesting trend: At least twice as many RPGs are being developed for the SNES than they are for the Genesis. Why is this? To our understanding, Nintendo originally designed the Super Famicom (Japan's SNES) as an RPG-heavy system, which might explain the higher color palette, better sound chip, and slower processor (who needs speed in an RPG?). This month we get two imports from Japan, Secret of Mana and Lufia, and two PC-translations, Might & Magic III and Obitus.

What is the Secret of Mana? While that question may not be answered until the end of the game, without question Secret of Mana is one of the finest action/RPGs you'll ever play on the Super NES.

The Secret of

Already established as the most innovative producer of cartridge RPGs in the gaming industry. Square Soft breaks new ground by combining some of the best role-playing elements of Final Fantasy with an action genre, including an allnew three-player option. The result, while rough around the edges in the combat system and multi-player mode, is a completely satisfying trek though a layish and expansive new 16-meg world.

Mana has a serious-sounding plot, but don't think that you're in for an overly heavy game. Like Final Fantasy II, Mana

takes a lighthearted approach, with Japanese-style big-headed characters and lots of humor. (Can you think of another game where getting shot out of a cannon is one of your primary modes of transportation?) The game has a sinister edge when it needs one, though. The bad guys are truly diabolical! There are plenty of little minions, but the endless big, slavering boss monsters are the show-stoppers.

You start the game as the hero and play by yourself, but soon you'll meet two companions who'll join your party. The multi-player action is interesting.

However, since you can't split up, it's not a big thrill except in boss conflicts. In fact, if you can't agree on which direction to go, you're going to be bumping elbows as the screen herks and jerks.

This game still seems best suited for one player. Plus, since the Al of your comrades is pretty sharp, you rarely have problems with the characters going in

Mana's first-rate game play resembles Zelda, but it has its own unique feel. You hack and slash with a variety of Weapons and Magic, but each time you swing you must wait for a power bar to recharge before swinging again. This adds a more realistic feel to the stat-driven fighting, but it also slows things down. The game handles real-time combat very well by calculating Spells, super blows, and reqular hits. However, there are no shields. and all defensive maneuvers are handled automatically. You can run, but you can't jump or interact with objects. The visual interface features rings of items in a lavered system that's very easy to use, but it's more time-consuming than a straightup menu lavout.

Mana's story is intricately crafted and, while not as complex as FF IIs', it features some great plot twists and characters. Little details, such as the extra players being unwilling to follow you unless they know it can help them personally, add higher-than-usual richness to the plot. Mana doesn't skimp on the role-playing at all, and it's as heavy on dialogue and clue-gathering as a straight RPC.

The world is positively massive, dwarfing even Zelda. The game's not too challenging, but the size guarantees over 50 hours for even ace players. You'll explore towns, caves, castles, and

dungeons. You'll even fly around the world on a dragon's back in a breathtaking Mode 7 sequence.

The Lay of the Land

Mana bears the mark of an FF descendant, meaning the visual style is cartoony and cute, but well illustrated. The overhead-view landscaping is impressive, and there's a good amount of eye candy, such as the Mode 7 world view. Short animated sequences advance the story, too.

As cutesy as the graphics are, the music scores are even more so! If it weren't for the repetition of tracks, this might not be too bad. However, many of

the songs are used a few too many times. They have an orchestral quality, so they're guaranteed to stick to your brain one way or another!

Secret of Mana is a unique product that needed a tad more fine-tuning, but not much. This game will provide a superb return on your RPG dollar and is one of the year's best SNES bets.

Your characters move through the game in an overhead view, and battle scenes are fought with the enemies appearing above you. You can save up to four games. Also, if you die during an adventure, you'll restart at the last-town you visited, with Experience Points and Weapons intact. The one drawback of this cart may be

its ridiculously long intro, which lasts a good 15 minutes and doesn't tell you anything you don't already know.

Lufia's sounds are good but somewhat stiff. The music is tame, RPG stuff. There's some rousing fanfare in the intro, but nothing to get your armor all rusty over.

Nintendo Addresses Violence

To help answer concerns about violence in video games, Nintendo plans to produce a parent's brochure called "Parent's Guide to Video Game Play" It will offer advice for parents on how to supervise their children's game play habits.

In related news, Nintendo has made available to the press its Game Content Guidelines. the internal standards the company uses when approving games for use on its systems. Among the factors that will cause a game to be rejected: bare-breasted women and other sexually suggestive content, language that is sexist, racist, or nationalistic, "graphic illustrations of death," "excessive violence" such as "body dismemberment," or games that show drugs, cigarettes, or alcohol. Though Nintendo admits that some of these areas are subjective and hard to define, they insist that they will continue to monitor games to ensure they reflect "the acceptable norms of society."

Playing the Cards Right

What do pro ball players do between games? If they're members of the St. Louis Cardinals. there's a good chance they play video games. In fact, when they're in San Francisco to play the Giants some of the Cards usually call up Electronic Arts in nearby San Mateo and ask to visit and check out their latest titles. According to slugger Mark Whiten, who was part of the Cards' second visit to EA this summer. "Playing video games is a great way to pass the time when vou're on the road. At least seven or eight guys per team are frequent players. We play before games, after, whenever we can." Whiten's favorite, by the way is Street Fighter II.
