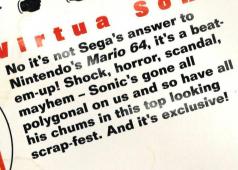

can! Many of the background elements can be 'interacted with'. Walls can be demolished by flinging your opponent through them, expanding the available play area, and chandeliers, candelabra and other household accoutrements can be wobbled about a bit. But KI2's got more than just lovely backgrounds, it's got some new and very lovely characters too who replace Chief Thunder, Riptor and Cinder who, Simon reckons, were the least popular characters and ones which we didn't particularly like.' The four new characters who ioin old faithfuls TJ Combo. Spinal, Glacius, Fulgore, Sabrewolf, Orchid and Jago are: Kim Wu, a feisty martial arts bird who wields nunchakas and wears fishnet stockings, Maya,

another lovely lady, who's a dab hand at the old knife throwing and wears a Raquel Welch-style furry bikini and Tusk, who, due to being a brutish, sword flinging barbarian, isn't very lovely at all. Last but not least there's Gargus, who is a gargoyle, amazingly enough.

'We have someone in-house who creates all the story lines and characters for the games.'

Simon explained. Any hidden blokes in there we wondered? 'Yes, and they're very well hidden!' Not for long.

KI2's re-jigglings aren't only confined to the graphics and character departments either. Some smashing new gameplay features

are introduced which make *KI2* an altogether more complex proposition than its predecessor. 'The main improvements over *KI1* are firstly the combo system, which

is a lot simpler to operate and understand, consequently opening up a lot more varied attacks.

Although this is a follow up it's been more difficult

to create than the original due to the more advanced combo system, super moves and general computer intelligence.'

In what is fast becoming the norm, KI2 now features a power-up bar. As with the latest incarnations of Street Fighter and Toshinden, the performance of special moves and vicious attacks is rewarded with an increase to your power meter. Once this meter is maxed-out you can let off a super special attack which is guaranteed to have your opponent flat on their backs with a kind of 'what the Dickens is going on?' look on their faces. Rare's co-chairman Joel Hochberg told Ultimate 'We wanted to make this the most challenging fighting game yet in terms of moves and endings. In Killer Instinct 2

players will really be challenged with the possibility of mastering up to one million combo moves.' Lumme! Only another 9,999,990 to go then. There are now multiple endings available too, depending on how, and if, you used finish moves on certain opponents. Zoiks.

New throws and counter-throws are available and an interesting addition are the new fake moves, in which the characters look as though they're about to launch into one of their familiar combos, but change their mind suddenly, returning control to the player. An opponent will think he knows what's coming and will begin a counter-attack only to find that you can catch them offguard with an unexpected

attack. It takes some getting into, but in the hands of experienced players this new feature can be used to massive and, in our efforts against Rare's experts, distinctly annoying effect.

Another new

feature are the dashes, in which your player can move past an opponent in front of or behind them.

Once on the other side of an opponent you can attack unexpectedly, taking advantage of the fact that it's much quicker to dash past than jump over them. **New character Tusk** can perform a move in

Even before the Mk 1 prototype of the vastly expensive Fulgore cybersoldier project was completed, the scientists at Ultratech were working on an updated version. When the original – set to test its powers at the KI tournament before mass production – met its match at the hands of Jago. Ultratech was enraged and deployed their barely completed new model to avenge its predecessor. And not even 2,000 years will deter the cyborg.

The arcade machine also keeps track of the highest damage combos, so you can see how you measure up against those 40-plus hit combo masters down the local arcade.

'Yes, yes. KI2 in the arcades is



going to be

brilliant but what's this about it being an Ultra 64 game too?' you're thinking. Well, we can reveal that it's going to be a slightly different version of the game that will hit Ninty's new machine. Simon told us 'The Ultra 64 will get it's own unique version of Killer Instinct which will take in aspects of both the first two games and will then add some other new features besides. This is because we've already done a conversion of the original KI for the SNES, incidentally there's a possibility of KI2 for the SNES, and we feel that the Ultra 64 has a lot more to offer than the arcade

Saturn abroad...

There have been several notable developments for the Saturn this month in Japan.

The first concerns both a hardware and software release. *The NaviSoft Drive Map* accompanies a small colour screen which slots tidily into the back of the Saturn (and currently is only being displayed with the slim-line Hitachi model). From this you can plot your route around Japan, and even take it with you in the car. Very practical, don't you think?

The next, and pretty interesting piece of news for Saturn owners is the release of the first link-up game at the end of this month. Geebockers is essentially a 3D, into-the-screen shoot-em-up/combat game which has a lot of very cutesome characters up for selection. Clearly, this is the ideal game to test out the idea of two Saturns being linked up, but we're a bit unsure how good it'll really be. Sega however, are still concentrating their efforts on producing quality splitscreen games (they do have a good reputation in this area). Undoubtedly, the link-up cable will be released in the UK this year.

M2 Goes RPG

One of the hottest gaming stories from Japan this month, is that Matsushita, with all their M2 producing power, are ordering the development of up to 40 RPGs for release in the machine's first year. Are they mad?

This is certainly an unusual step for a new machine, and if the games are of a tight enough quality, this could make a significant difference to the console's success in Japan where RPGs are traditionally The Best Thing Ever, hence the success of the SNES.

And with all the rumours flying around concerning Sega's interest in M2 technology (see page 14), this could certainly make the Saturn an even more appealing buy.

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Sega 64-bit Wonder-box?

The M2 saga has taken another bizarre turn with Sega now linked with this Next Generation technology.

According to at least one Japanese source.

Sega and Matsushita are plotting to launch an M2 based 64-bit machine in 1996. Sega are refusing to comment on the rumour, but it's not the first time the company has been linked with 3DO's M2 technology. Sega had been talking to 3DO, right up until Matsushita stepped in and brought the technology outright for \$100 million.

The Japanese newspapers are stating that, allegedly, a prototype of a 64-bit M2 machine has been delivered to

Sega's headquarters for what is tentatively being described as 'feasibility studies'.

Details, as you can see, are desperately thin on the ground. If the rumour is true it could open the way for a new 64-bit Sega machine which presumably would be configured to run Saturn games as well. And it could mean that Sega are looking to manufacture an add-on for the Saturn which would bring that machine in line with processing speeds of Nintendo's Ultra 64. And the mind starts to tip even further into bogglement when you

consider that 3DO owners have been guaranteed an M2 upgrade at some stage this year...

Sony, Philips, Matsushita and not-very-well-known-overhere US giants, Thomson, have formed what has become known as the DVD alliance. They plan to introduce a home player later this year and US sales of four to five million units are predicted for its first three years. Don't fret, a European launch is planned for early '97. We hope, anyway.

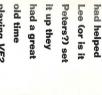

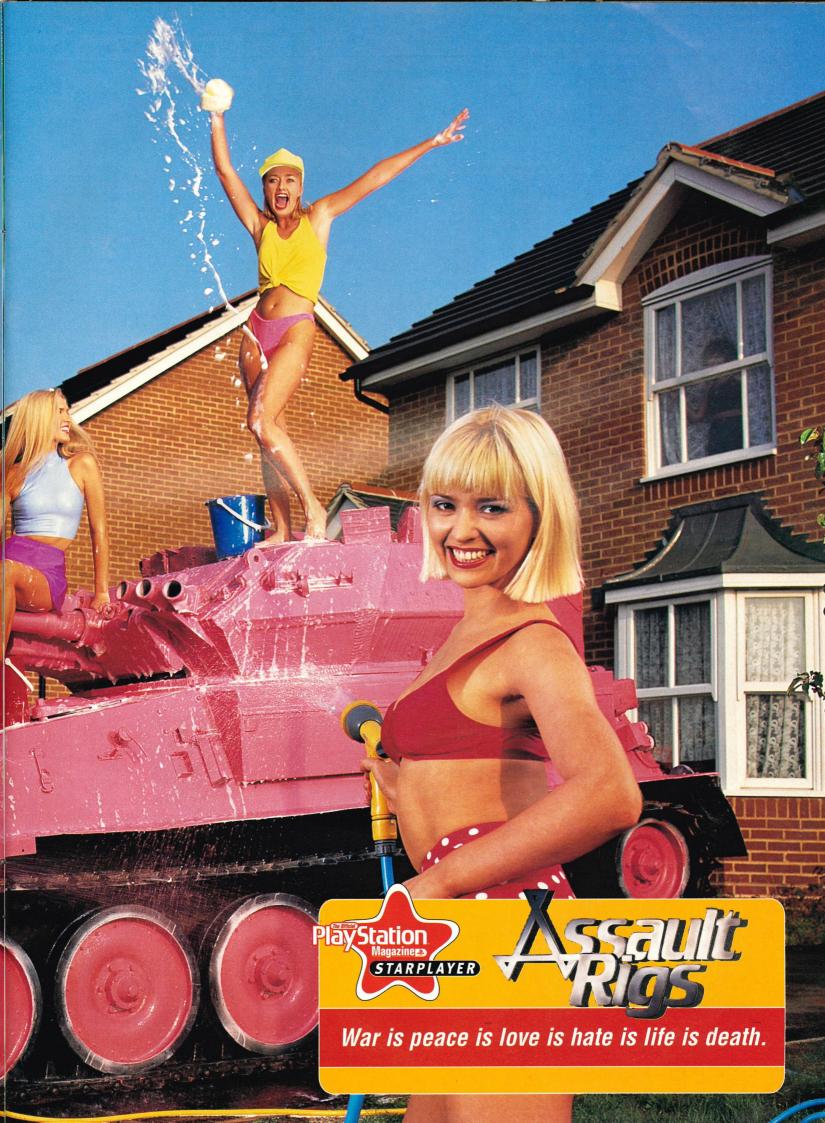

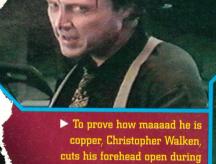

Goldstar To Give Up On 3DO?



News has just broken in the US concerning Goldstar apparently pulling out of the 3DO market. Due to rival Matsushita's monopoly on future M2 technology, Goldstar may be left out in the cold when the new machine goes into production at the end of the year.

As a result of this Goldstar are thought to be abandoning any involvement with 3DO. However, Goldstar's Bob Monk told us: 'Goldstar will definitely be sticking with the 3DO in the UK. 3DO offers one thing that no other console offers: expandability. 3DO can be expanded to M2 so we see it as a machine with a future and shall continue to produce it.'

Whether Goldstar will be joining Matsushita, who own Panasonic and JVC, in the production of the M2 has not been finalised. 'The Goldstar board in Seoul are discussing our involvement in M2 with Matsushita, as are Sega, who are as interested in the new system (see page 14). The results of these discussions will be announced in due time.' Fair enough.

Originally 3DO technology was licensed to hardware manufacturers by the 3DO company, who could then make their own 3DO machines. Panasonic, Sanyo and Goldstar signed on. However, Matsys 22 bought the rights to the M2 t Innology from 3DO, making it unlikely that any company other than its Panasonic or JVC brands will be manufacturing the 64-bit machine. Or, if they are, they'll be charged a fair old wodge for the privilege we would imagine.

However, Bob was keen to point out that, 'at present you can buy a 3DO and FIFA for £199 which is a great bargain and there are plenty more offers to come.' And stressed the company's movement into the software market. 'We've just released our first games for 3DO: Primal Rage, BC Racers and Defcon 5. Other titles are planned and we shall be publishing software for M2. We see the software market as more dynamic than the hardware market.'

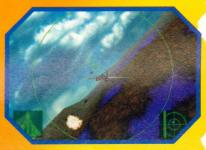

Jaguar attacks 16-bits

Many retailers have already been selling the system at a cheaper price anyway, but this official move has been designed to make the Jag: 'take headon the rival Nintendo (SNES) and Sega (Mega Drive) systems available at this price, or less'.

Some would argue that this turnaround signals a lack of confidence from Atari, seeing as the older 16-bit systems are being considered 'rivals' to their 64-bit console, but Atari are hoping to gain a whole new audience of gamesplayers who can't afford the higher-priced 32bit systems. Wahey!

The price of £99.99 will get you the hardware and one joypad, although the current system + Cybermorph pack will also be available for £99.99 while stocks last. Atari are backing up this move by releasing Fever Pitch, Atari Karts, SuperCross 3D, Missile Command 3D, I-War, Flip Out and Myst, as well as a version of NBA Jam Tournament Edition.

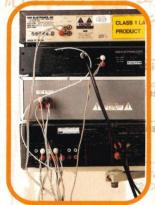

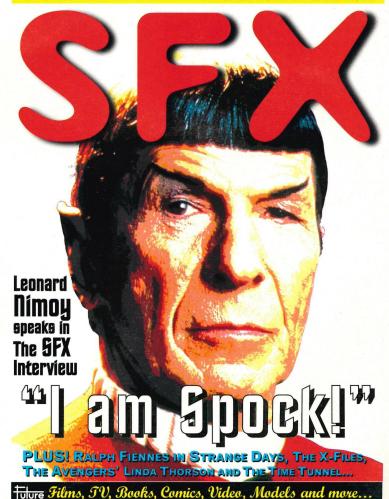

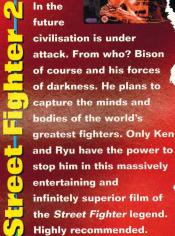

The Incredible Bulk

News is slowly seeping from Nintendo HQ in Japan about the much anticipated bulky-drive add-on for the Ultra 64. In a report from Kyodo News International much of recent month's' speculation was confirmed.

The device is now labelled '64DD' which sounds like a very large bra, but is in fact a 64 megabyte optical read/write disk drive. Nintendo are currently liaising with Netscape **Communications (top Internet** geezers) to allow users to download new levels and characters directly from a special internet site (probably subscription based).

It is claimed that the device runs at three times the speed of the PlayStation CD drive and as well as playing original games (Zelda 64 and Final Fantasy 7) will be backwards compatible with existing Ultra 64 titles. 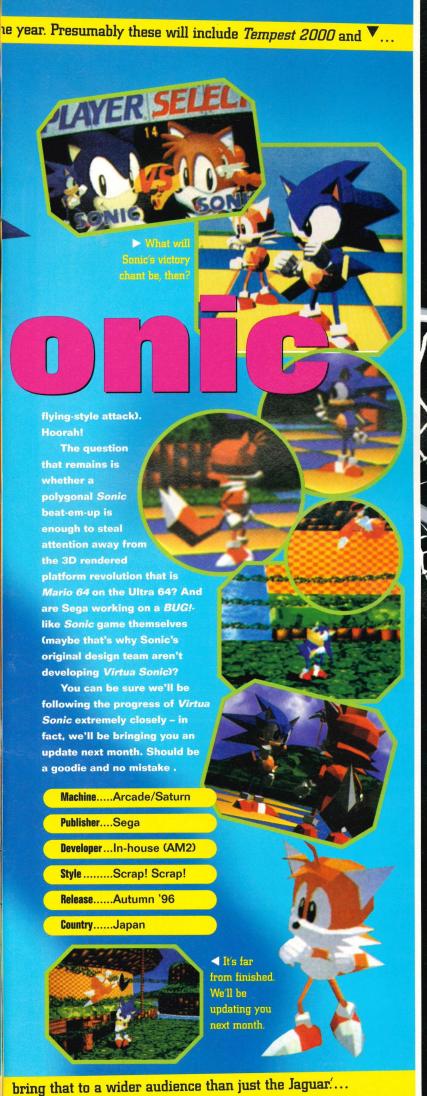

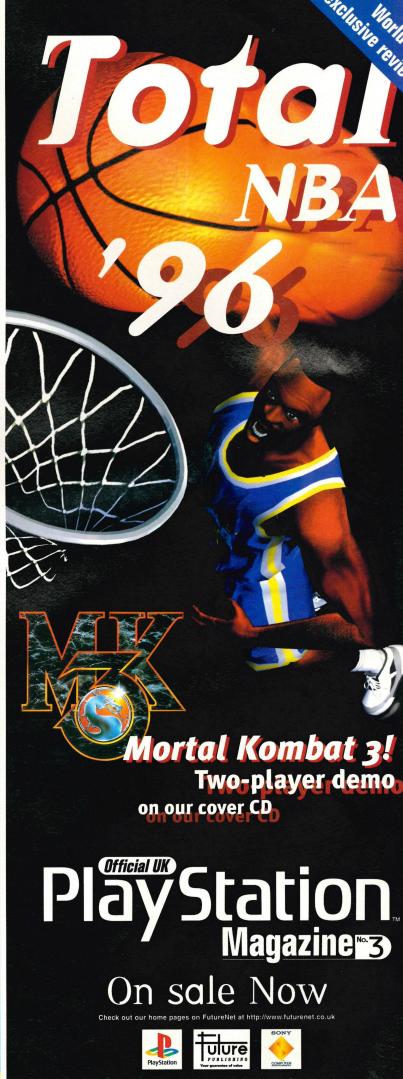

To get you started on the road to victory here's a guide to the first mission in each of Firestorm's eight campaigns. Should any of them prove too troublesome, a code to skip to mission two is included.

General Advice

Firestorm missiles are by far the best weapon (much better than the tricky-to-aim rockets) so carry as many as you can. Stay low to avoid attention from enemy helicopters, but when faced with concentrated ground targets, flying high over them minimises your damage. Avoid flying directly over an enemy - it'll fire at you. Remember, to complete a mission, you must destroy your primary objectives so don't waste time on superfluous targets.

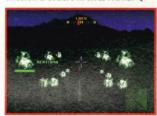

Here's a guide to one of the 15 mission-long paths to supreme GDI victory:

Mission 1

Dead simple this one. Just kill everybody and whilst your in the process, learn how everything works. Easy peasy.

Mission 2

This mission introduces engineers to the player. These little chaps may appear a bit crap at first, but they can be crucial to winning later missions. Level 2 is really just a 'practice using engineers level'. Always make sure your engineer is well protected, he's a bit rubbish at fighting himself you see. When your Hum-Vee vehicle arrives load him onto it. Take him (and the rest of your attacking force) north where you'll find the enemy base. Fight your way in and, when the coast is reasonably clear, unload your engineer out of the Hum-Vee. click on him, then click on the building. He'll enter it and make it one of yours. You can then either keep it, troops or hardware produced by it will appear in your colours, or you can sell it if you'd prefer the cash. Don't we all?

Mission 3 - Destroy The SAM Sites

Bit of an all out destruction mission this one. Just kill everything and everyone. When you locate a SAM bunker you can set a group of five or so grenade chaps to work blowing it up and leave them to it. This is the first mission that offers air



strikes too. These are a bit rubbish against the bunkers and enemy buildings, but are brilliant for frying groups of troops.

Mission 4 - Get The Crate

You'll find this mission a bit tricky if you try and completely destroy the enemy. They can be a bit stubborn if they want to. The quick way to complete this mission (and some of the later ones) is to carry out the task you have been given - no more, no less. All you have to do to get a 'mission accomplished' here is retrieve the crate in the enemy's possession. The enemy base is towards the north west corner of the map. Just order in lots of troops and whilst mayhem ensues all around them just order one of your chaps to touch the crate.

Mission 5 - Germany

Here you've got to repair your base, first and foremost. Get clicking with that spanner as soon as you can and arrange your troops to block any attacks whilst the repairs are taking place. Once everything is up and running you can go for the enemy base up in the north east (Newcastle?).

If your fortunate enough to encounter the enemy's Tiberium harvester, destroy it to prevent further enemy construction. The base is well defended, but gradual destruction of the heavier armaments will leave its soft underbelly exposed, kind of thing, type arrangement. Look, just destroy it gradually, okay? Trust us, we're professionals.





Mission 6 - Czechoslovakia 1 Another 'pulp everything' mission. Set up camp in the south west corner of the map. **Build the usual stuff and arrange** your forces to thwart the succession of small early attacks by the enemy. When you've a good size force and everything is running smoothly take your troops up the west side then head east to reach the enemy camp. You'll need your biggest tanks to destroy that troublesome big gun at the base so keep them well protected with plenty of ground troops. Tanks are crap at destroying ground troops. It's far better just to drive over them, crushing them 'neath your tracks rather than trying to blast them. Clever use of an engineer can put a stop to the enemy's rapid troop production and give you some much needed reinforcements.

Mission 7 - Czechoslovakia 2

Your helicopter can be used to expose undiscovered land here Click it on the edge of the visible area then just before it lands click on the newly exposed bit. This way you can quickly 'clear' large areas and locate enemies lying in wait. Send your massed forces up the east side of the map and when you reach the northern most point turn west to find the enemy base.

Mission 8 - Austria

Be sure to keep your hardware repaired here. When their energy is more than half depleted you should return them to the repair facility for a top up. Don't be afraid of sending in and losing lots of troops here, they can be replaced. Repair your base while thwarting attacks from the north and south west. Set up defensive positions there.

Take the road over the bridge and go north. There should be a rock outcrop between yourself and the enemy camp to the west. Your troops can open fire on the base from







this impregnable position while the rest of your forces dash up the west side of the map, 'round past the guns and, with the help of some engineers, take control of whatever buildings are left.

Mission 9 - Hungary

You may as well stop trying to get your troops over the river right now - you can't do it, you nana. Take them west and destroy the two gun emplacement by the river instead. Spread them out a bit to make them more difficult to hit. Once your helicopter arrives you can use it to take your troops over the river and join the rest of your forces in the north east on a slow and steady assault of the heavily armed enemy base to the west. True story.

Mission 10 - Slovenia

Fast ground vehicles can be used to scout around your base and find enemy encampments. Once located, your new Orca attack helicopters can be sent in to waste them. It's dead easy really. Enemy troops can be thwarted with walls of sandbags which'll hold them at bay long enough for you to dispose of them. Top fun.

Mission 11 - Greece

Upon landing on the beach watch for that tank to the east. Next head north for a while before turning east and finding a nice clear area by the Tiberium fields in which to set up your base. Gun turrets are useful here and a good idea is to have one ready built for dropping in at the optimum position when an attack occurs. There's nothing so frustrating as going to the trouble of building such defences only to find that the approaching enemy are out of its range. Use your Orcas to full effect, or else.

Take out the enemy SAM sites when you find them and locate the spy you have to rescue. He's in the north east





corner of the map. Click on him and, providing you've got rid of all those SAM sites, a chopper will appear to take him to safety.

Mission 12 - Albania

Keep your base well defended and let the enemy come to you. Again, destroy the SAM sites to enable a helicopter to come in. This time to rescue Dr. Mobius who's in your base. Money can be a problem here, but you can always sell stuff and there's a secret cash 'power-up' hidden in the village in the north east, if you can find it.

Mission 13 - Yugoslavia 1

Ooh lovely. Build yourself an advanced communications facility as soon as you can to gain access to the awesome lon cannon. Incidentally, set up your base as far north as you can, repeated playing will show you the furthest point you can build on safely. Build a vehicle repair facility. The further north your base is the shorter the distance your vehicles will have to travel to get repairs 'cos they're gonna need 'em!

There're hundreds of enemies here and killing them all is a slow and laborious affair. but it can be done. Alternatively if you're sneaky you can use a fast vehicle to locate the enemy lab (your objective in this mission) and use your lon cannon to destroy it. Mission accomplished with barely a scratch. Marvelous.

Mission 14 - Yugoslavia 2

Invisible stealth tanks is it now? A fast vehicle can find them for



you. Once located, send in a good sized force and surround the area where it was last spotted. Concentrated fire will soon rip 'em to shreds.

Mission 15 - Final Assault

Head across the bridge and turn east where you'll find a gorge protected by a big gun. Take out the gun then use sandbags to block the mouth of their gorge, trapping the enemy. Sandbags are essential in this mission. Long lines of them can be used to seal in the enemy preventing attacks. Use two engineers to capture the enemy buildings near the Tiberium field to the west of the gorge. An advanced guard tower here will take care of the gun turrets for you.

You now have the entire south of the map all to yourself and plenty of Tiberium too. Build lots of top weapons (especially Orcas) and get yourself an Ion cannon. You can use this to soften up the enemy base before sending in engineers (protected by plenty of troops of course) to capture the airport and surrounding buildings.

At some stage of the proceedings the Nod forces will rather unfairly let fly with an atomic blast. You will be hit at least once so be prepared for it. A single blast can decimate your base so investment in a mobile construction yard will help with the rebuilding should you need to. It's the same in real life. if truth be known. Where would we all be without our mobile construction yards, eh? Lost that's where! So don't go taking them for granted!

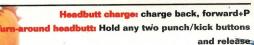

Keep the opposition's shooting opportunities to an absolute minimum. Remember that classic footballing adage 'If in doubt, boot it out'. Always watch for rebounds from the keeper. The key to successful passing is creating space. Hang onto the ball when challenged, don't pass prematurely just because you're being challenged. You can often twist and turn a marking player off your tail. Aim for the gaps and players in space. Remember you don't always have to be facing the player you want to pass to. If your player has good vision he'll pass to the man in the best position automatically.

Tackling

Try not to pull one of your players out of position just to

Driving With The Pro Car:

Although it's a lot harder to use at first, the Pro car is well worth persevering with. It allows some impressive, tail-out slides and 180° spins with the handbrake. When cornering bear in mind...

1) BRAKING: throws some of the car's weight forward onto the front wheels causing them to bite (at high speeds this will swing the tail out). 2) ACCELERATING: reduces friction on the rear wheels with the same effect as above (though less exaggerated).

3) RELEASING ACCELERATION: brings the back end back into line.

Optimum cornering is achieved by 'left foot braking', i.e. as you turn into the hend, iah the brake for a fraction of a second (while still holding accelerate down) to swing the back end round and put the car into a sideways slide. Maintain the power slide by holding the accelerator down and releasing the steering. Not easy.

title alone will sell squillions of copies because, even after all these vears. everybody's still mad for it!

First question

has to be what's all this Zero/Alpha business about? Well the game goes by two names depending upon which side of the globe you inhabit. In its Japanese

> homeland the game is called Street **Fighter**

> > which

sounds rather dark, moody and cool. In the US and Europe, however, it's called Street Fighter Alpha, probably because 'zero' can be interpreted to mean 'loser' and they mistakenly thought that Alpha was a suitable replacement. Anyway, name discrepancies aside, wherever you are in the world the game is identical, this review being done with a Japanese Zero version incidentally.

Street Fighter Zero has a very strong Japanese anime-style look. This may seem a bit of a backwards step but with everybody else going 3D texturemapped polygon bonkers Capcom's decision to make Zero's characters less real is, in our opinion, a bit of a masterstroke. Zero looks the biz.

Just look at the quality of those graphics? Lovely, eh? It's very obvious that some chap's put an awful lot of time and effort into getting them just so. The clever bit is that despite the backgrounds being so lavishly detailed and riddled with neat animated touches, such as cats strolling by or an old dear mopping the doorway of the local Happy Shopper, they never encroach upon the bright, colourful and flawlessly animated fighters. Zero comes up to Capcom's usual 'nigh on arcade perfect' standards with customary gusto and is truly a treat to behold.

Just in case you're wondering why this latest episode in the Street Fighter legend isn't called Street Fighter, 3 allow us to explain.

Ahem. The events in Street Fighter Zero take place in between the original Street Fighter and the much better known and universally loved Street Fighter 2. As a result the game features characters from Street Fighter, Street Fighter 2, old Capcom classic Final Fight and a couple of completely new types as well.

Top of the familiar list has to be Ken and Ryu who appear in slightly altered anime form and, due to the game taking place before you knew and loved them in SF2, looking somewhat youthful and boyish. Ken's hair is much longer and he has it tied about halfway along its length with a sissy girl's ribbon and Ryu, for some reason, sports a mop of lovely red hair for his Zero outing. Very odd. Also, both boys are yet to pump up their physiques to the tree-trunk biceped bulkiness they exhibit in their SF2 appearance. And Chunners was obviously a bit shy back in the old days as in Zero she is disappointingly sporting trousers.

So, is that it then? Some new characters, a 'new look' to the graphics and a tenuous 'It takes place before SF2' story line? Well, despite this being a fairly large slice of what Zero has to offer there are a few unique features to justify the game's existence. And here they are...

Remember the power meters of SSF2X? Well Zero has them too - only more so! The meters are charged up during play. Whenever you perform a special move it pushes it up a bit. Whenever you hit an opponent it pushes it up a bit. Whenever an opponent hits you it pushes it up a (very little) bit. In fact, do



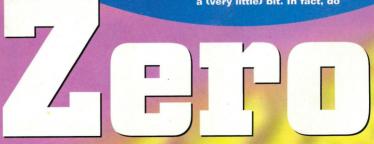

anything and it'll push your meter up a bit, the result being that towards the end of a fight both players' bars are filled to bursting. Once a bar is at maximum, it's owner can perform a Shadow Move. These awesome kicks, punches or projectile attacks (also known as Super Combos) not only knock the crap out of your opponent, but produce a highly satisfying on-screen graphics overload into the bargain. The screen dims, your character gathers some magical 'Chi' energy and then performs the move with such blistering speed that they leave little shadow-like images of themselves behind. It's shimply shpectacklear!

Sounds like X yes? Well, new to Zero is a three-stage meter which can be maxed out, yes, you guessed it, three times. This means that players now have the option to produce three shadow moves or a double sized version and a normal one or one almighty triple strength killer. Simply press one, two or all three punch or kick buttons while performing the D-pad manoeuvre to set the required power. This introduces a very welcome element of strategy to the proceedings. Shall you hurt him a bit now, or kill him outright later? Decisions decisions. Hmm.

Another Zero addition is the auto-blocking facility. In previous SF games, to block an in-coming attack you just had to move away from your opponent. Fair enough, but this meant that you couldn't move away from attacks that were about to hit you, which was a bit daft really. The new Zero system enables

characters to
move away from
impending impacts, but the
instant before the fireball or
whatever lands on your bonce,
providing you're still holding the
'away' button, your movement
changes into a block. It's the
best of both worlds mate! This
feature, along with the now
familiar Turbo mode speed
enhancement, can be switched
on or off by each player before
a fight. Thank goodness.

Gripe time. That PlayStation joypad isn't ideally suited to Street Fighter you know. You'll have a sore thumb in next to no time, but it isn't too bad and it's a damn sight better to use than the murderous 3DO pad we were forced to play X with. Zero has only two flaws. One concerns the CD access speed, which keeps players chomping at the bit a little too long between fights. And the other is that this is essentially Street Fighter again. Mind you, this is the best Street Fighter to date. You must grab a copy. And we mean must.

The official UK version will be available through Virgin in April and considering it's



identical yet considerably cheaper, we suggest that you hang on a couple of months. Believe the hype.

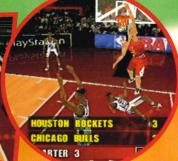

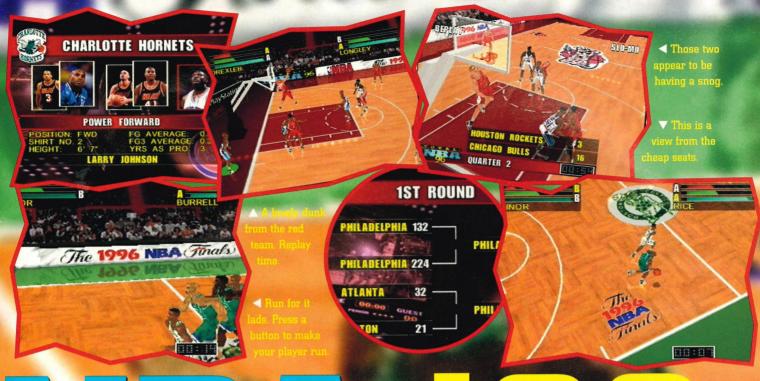

There's a useful rematch option in exhibition mode so you don't have to go through all the intro crap if you simply want another game with the same teams. 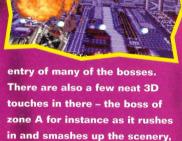

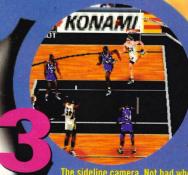

upshot is that you are limited t playing either one-off exhibition matches or small playoff rounds without ever having the opportunity to take a team right through a year of its career. This fits the more arcadey nature of the game, but it's not an arcade game - it's on a home console and there should be a bit more depth to it.

The gameplay can also be criticised. Don't get us wrong, it's great fun to play... for a while. But again there's not enough for you to do. Apart from getting the hang of straightforward shooting, blocking and stealing there's little else to master. Plenty more

happens of course and all sorts of clever little manoeuvers are executed, but they're chosen by the computer depending on the position of your player. It leads to a very smooth playing game, which looks very nice, but it doesn't really lead to longlasting fun. 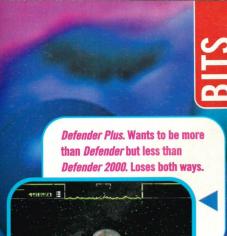

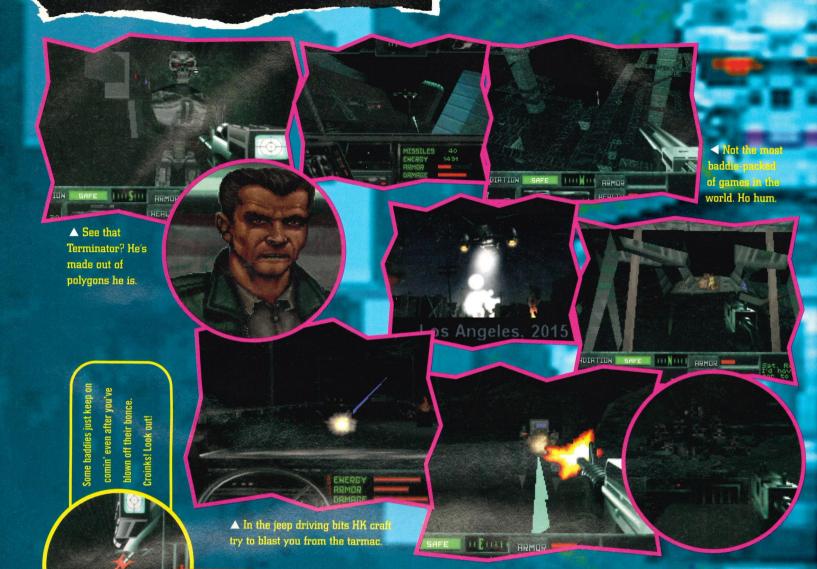

You see, *TFS* features the very latest zippy-zappy, slippy-slappy 3D techno-gumph lurking beneath its throbbing exterior which constructs everything from polygons. You, me, them, us, everybody, everybody! *Doom* wasn't really 3D you see, it was all a cunning facade. Look at the baddies in *Doom* – they're flat 2D sprites that are scaled to the

correct size depending on how far away from them you are. They're rrrrubbish! Even the brand new Duke Nukem 3D, with all its lah-de-dah looking up and downyness fails to stop the baddies looking like a gingham tablecloth when you get close up. TFS's polygons mean that if you get close up, stuff looks the same - only bigger, exactly like stuff does in real life. Lumme! Add to this the fact that the game is both whippet-fast and piglet-smooth in SVGA mode and it's all a bit of a top treat for the optic nerve.

Let's not forget *TFS*'s downright revolutionary control

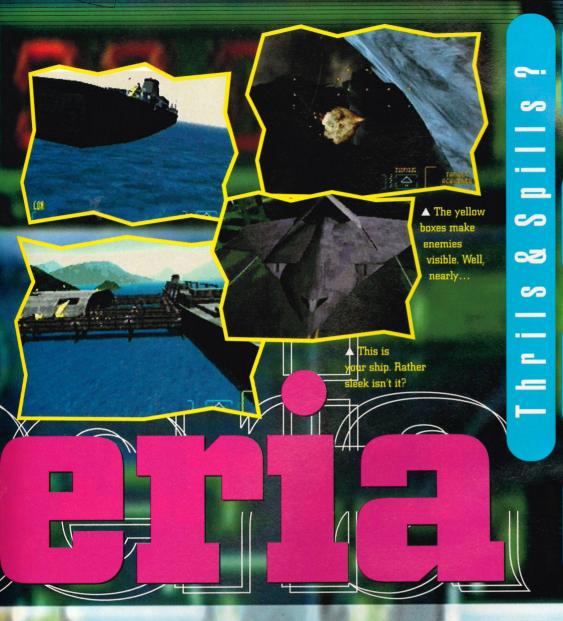

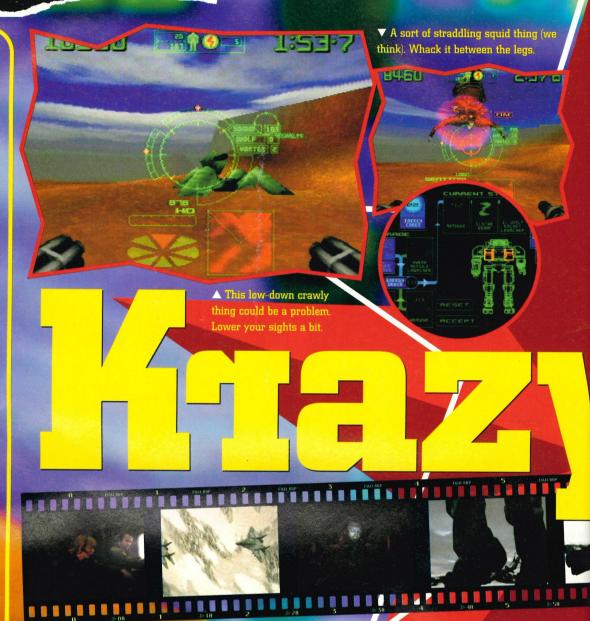

most outlandish things and wander hither and thither at will (thither?), but there isn't. There's a lot, but not enough. And some moves result in a nice smooth transition between points, others sudden leaps. Curious indeed.

One good thing is that everything is pulled off the disc very quickly and there's little of that 'press a button and then wait for something to happen' that plagues games like D. ast year saw the release of Core's Scottish Open: Virtual Golf on PC CD ROM. This year, almost exactly the same game, minus the real Scottish courses' replica-holes license, is available to Saturn and **PlayStation owners. Let's** see how the Saturn's version shapes up. Firstly, as you can see from the screenshots, the 3D environment is intact and looking as pretty and green as ever. And yes, there are four real courses, one being Glenlochrie, one time

host of the Scottish Open.
Including real courses isn't
just to keep true golfers
happy, it offers a boon in
gameplay terms in as
much as the time
and knowledge
invested in

lovely Saturn.

As you progress from amateur to pro to access more courses, *Virtual Golf* employs a simple arcadey approach to play rather than an

attempt at simulation, something that Core themselves freely admit. You can see how good it all looks, so if you're considering buying a golf game

what you really need to know is how it plays, so here goes with a brief beginner's guide.

Keep an eye on the wind meter indicator (bottom right) while holding down Y to show

an indication of your ball's path, both on the main screen and on the hole map (top right). That indicated path will be followed exactly by the ball if you manage to time your buttonpresses to the swing meter's 'ideal shot', as indicated by the two golf ball icons at either end of the huge arced meter.

Once you've chosen your club (by default it selects the most suitable one, so this is usually just an optional tinker if you think you know more about golf than the game), and either waited for a lull in the wind, or altered your direction to take into account the wind's strength and direction, then it's time to play the shot. And this is where your planning either pays off



with a beautiful progression towards the hole (to be celebrated by whoops and hollers and punching of the air) or an embarrassing skew into the rough, bunkers, trees or water (to be celebrated by your opponent in much the same manner). Press B to set the swing in motion. Press it again when the ball icon is in the red zone - hitting the circle means that you'll follow the shot indicated by the white lines, but going further will give it extra power and is advisable when driving from the tee. The more oomph you give a shot, the

faster it'll swing back, thus making your job of stopping near the circle in the green zone, to determine accuracy, that bit harder. This trade-off is the single biggest gameplay element to master and beginners are best-advised to err on the side of caution though your shots won't carry as far, it's easier to make up ground later than to risk incurring two-shot penalties by skewing into troublesome bunkers or losing a ball out of bounds or in ponds.

When you've managed to get onto the green, the helpful 'ideal

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ball' guideline is replaced by a dotted circle whose changing outline indicates the green's undulations. Showing you the right line to the hole would make putting too easy, but it's only good sport and fair play to have all the information at your fingertips. Don't you think?

Okay, so it's not a simulation, but the tag 'Virtual' is qualified by the 3D world and the roving camera within it. Like Actua Soccer or Virtual Pool you can control the camera view of your player and the course with options to alter the position and angle of the course. Rather

than being a mere gimmick, this feature is useful for getting out of sticky situations like when you're stuck behind trees, or if you're worried about breaching sloping banks that lead to water or sand hazards. Plus it's fun!

The texture-mapping of the road and buildings is a little more detailed, a little more realistic looking and the whole thing moves a bit faster, but that's about it. The specially filmed intro and between level biker antics are identical apart from benefiting from the PlayStation's improved ability to play them and the ass-kicking American 'rawk' soundtrack by the likes of Therapy? and Soundgarden remains unupdated. Hurumph.

Road Rash's major bugbear has to be the in-game sprites. Your character, your fellow rest of the traffic move rather jerkily, which, when compared with the smoothness of the background animation makes them seem very much 'drawn-on'. We can't help thinking that PlayStation Road Rash is a bit of a missed opportunity. While this is the best version yet it's still a bit tired. Oh well.

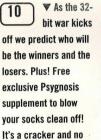

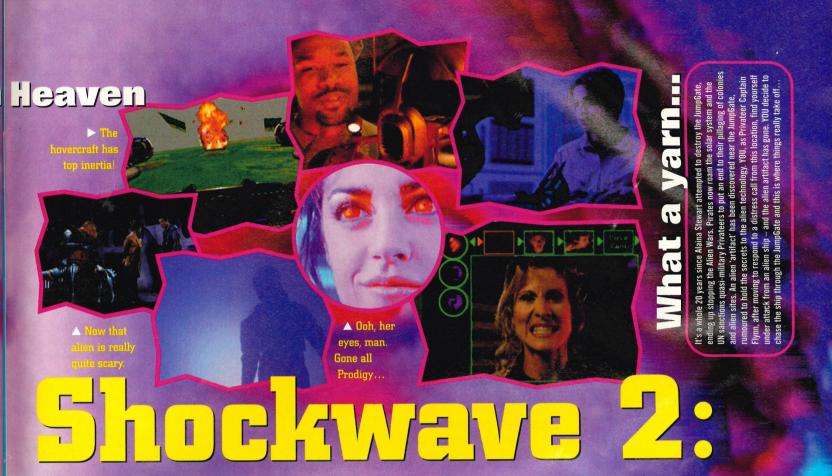

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t's strange how sequels get spawned from games that were, underneath all the FMV-soaked jazz, pretty average in the gameplay department. The original Shockwave, first time 'round on the 3DO, slipped straight into this 'Ho-Hum' category. Then Electronic Arts, despite the cool reviews, insisted on churning out a mission data disc - Operation Jumpgate which clearly couldn't improve on the original. **Even the PlayStation now** has a version which

combines both -**Shockwave Assault. But** what of Shockwave 2: **Beyond The Gate? Is it a** suitable sequel to the original 3D shoot-em-up?

Good Gawd yes. EA seem to have listened to the critics and improved on the flaws of the former two entries in the Shockwave saga. Gone is the linear nature of the entire game, up the difficulty has shot and in comes a whole host of characters for you to interact with from the shabby-panted form of Avery Flynn, captain of the Cortez, who's only gone and lost himself and his crew in space (see story box for more information).

The plot has been developed a lot more, and gets fed to you in tightly-acted FMV chunks which really do the game

justice, fleshing out the quirky individualities of your crew members. There's a new interface to get used to while back on board the Cortez as well. This click-and-point set of screens allows you to gain all the information you need: train for the missions in a nice, safe computer-rendered

> environment, access visual records, examine the planets you'll be setting down on and configuring your attack craft (A-110 Barracuda fighter, H-3

Hovercraft and the 'Big Ben' Gun Turret). It's all rather slick and rather helpful.

The actual levels and missions themselves also demand more from the player. That's you, that is. A much more tactical approach is required you really have to search

around the terrain for mission objectives, and the enemies come thicker and a lot faster than before. Certainly, graphically you couldn't separate the levels with a shovel, but there's enough variety in there in terms of vehicles, tactics and firepower to drag your attention away from this most of the time. And the sound effects are still the weakest element of the game. Shame that. Still, with 2CDs worth of shooting power you're going to have a lot to keep you occupied. Oh yes.

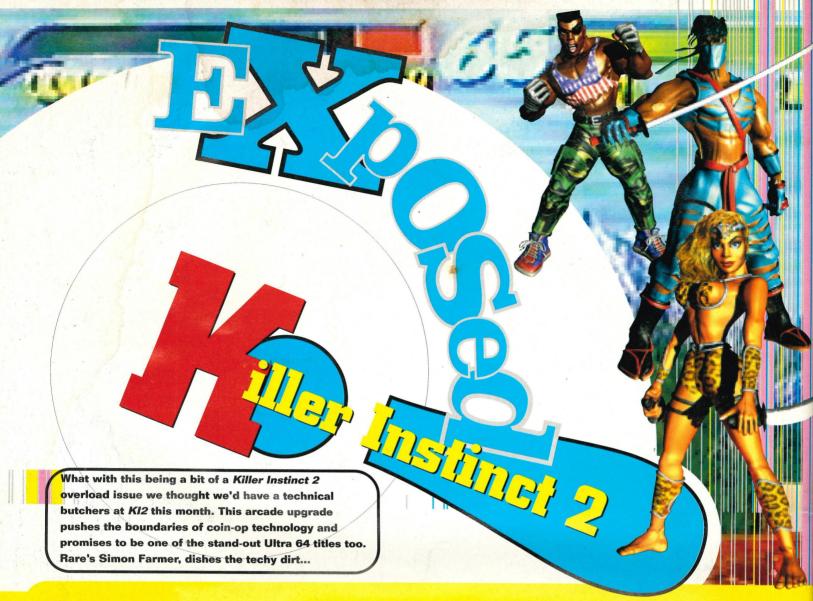

'The biggest technical feat to overcome has probably been the fact that all of the visuals displayed are done so using the one processor on the arcade hardware, which is also handling all the other calculations involved in the game as well. This has made life a lot harder than using a custom processor to handle the graphics which most consoles have nowadays.' Roll on Ultra 64 then, eh?
