THE COMMON MARKET OF MUSIC

Was it only 12 short months ago? Can 365 days—simply once around the clock in the span of the four seasons—produce a new, dominating factor on the U.S. recording scene?

These questions arise when one contemplates the enormous influence here of the British Sound. The remarkable answer to both queries is a seemingly implausible "Yes!"

The Beatles began this true-to-life fairy-tale at the start of 1964. Within a few months-just about this time of year-what might have been an exciting exception to the rule became the general run of things: British teenmarkets acts, fusing a basic U.S.-made rock sound with an all-important touch all their own became the darlings of the teen set-and, remarkably, were good-naturedly received by a generous portion of the adult population.

Twelve months later and the sound of British sessions is firmly entrenched on the charts and in the thinking of every American music man who makes it his craft and business to keep up with the teenage market.

Statistically, the British showing here is nothing short of incredible. A count of the standing of British-originated product on the Top 100 of this week gives it a total of 24 recordings; over in the LP area, British acts account for 15 albums on the listing. Further investigation uncovers another notable fact: there are at least 17 labels enjoying this feast of acceptance of the British Sound!


All good fairy-tales have a happy ending. What about "The English Sound in America?" The chances are that there will be no ending at all. There may be variations on a theme, but from what we read of it, the British influence on our charts is here to stay. We are all aware that the world has shrunk in terms of that familiar triumvirate—political-social economic.

The English Sound is really a startling manifestation (for the music business, at least) of this development in world history.

U.S. tradesters can now consider London a major break-out city in the same light as Cleveland, Detroit, Los Angeles, Baltimore-Washington, etc. The fantastic truth is that the day is dawning when most of the world will become a Common Market of Music.

Victor's 'Sound Of Music' LP Is Fastest RIAA Gold Disk Ever

NEW YORK — RCA Victor's "The Sound of Music" soundtrack achieved gold-disk status faster than any other

Sound of Music" soundtrack achieved gold-disk status faster than any other soundtrack in record history when it was certified last week by the RIAA as a million-seller on sales during the first two weeks of its release.

The Victor LP was released Mar. 2 coincidental with the premiere of the 20th Century-Fox flick based on the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical and qualified as a million-seller on sales through Mar. 16.

The label had an initial pressing of 250,000 units of the disk, that pressing quickly exhausted by dealer orders and re-orders.

"Its sales have been phenomenal, and it is obvious that they are only beginning," said George R. Marek, the label's vice-president and general manager. "Since the film has opened only in a limited number of hard-ticket engagements around the nation we are certain that the soundtrack we are certain that the soundtrack

album will maintain impetus and that its sales will grow in direct relationship to the enormous success of the motion picture. It looks now as if 'The Sound of Music' could easily become the largest selling soundtrack in history."

"Based on business in the first two weeks, 'Sound of Music' is far ahead of RCA Victor's all-time champion soundtrack album, another Rodgers

His first single, "The Mouse," released a short time ago has sold 68,000 copies in one week in the New York City-Newark area, with sales booming in Hartford and Miami, and other key areas around the nation. The deck made its initial appearance on the Top 100 this week in the number 88 slot. Soupy introduced "The Mouse" on his own show and kicked it off nationally via an NBC-TV "Hullabaloo" segment the same week. From the sales response thus far, label mahatmas expect the single to develop into astronomical proportions. A "Mouse" LP will be rush-released within the astronomical proportions. An interesting derivative of the mouse craze is fact that three other labels have released take-offs of the Sales deck. The other records are: "The Ole Mouse" by Chuck Bené and the Mice on Columbia, "Soupy's Mouse" by the Salesmen on N.Y. Skyline, and "The Mouse" (not a cover version of the ABC-Paramount platter) by the Crestmen on Sylvia.

Soupy Sales' television rise began a dozen years ago in Detroit where he became the motor city's top-rated

the became the motor city's top-rated TV personality for seven years, doing eleven hours of television time each week, including his Saturday noon-

time "Lunch With Soupy Sales" ABC-TV web show. In one year's time, the entertainer, who had moved to the coast, built his program into Los Angeles' number one television show, pulling more mail than all of ABC-TV's network shows combined.

After refusing several offers to move east, last year Soupy was prompted to make the move because of WNEW-TV's offer for him to do live shows. This arrangement has proven tremendously successful as it enables the comedian to accept the many opportunities for guest shots in the east that he previously had to turn down.

In line with his moonlighting activities, Soupy will soon be widening his horizons on a grand scale. He'll be the host-emcee of an Easter rock 'n' roll show (April 16-26) at the newly reactivated Paramount Theater in New York. Roulette Records president Morris Levy will produce the five-shows-daily marathon which will initiate the theatre's new live entertainment policy. ment policy.

The NAB Convention:

THE OVERALL SCENE

WASHINGTON—Vice President Hubert Humphrey launched the 43rd Annual NAB Convention with a ringing challenge to radio-TV executives to "lift your voices" on behalf of a petter America. This address highlighted the opening session and preceded the presentation of broadcasting's most coveted award—the NAB Distinguished Service Award—to Leonard Goldenson, president of American Broadcasting - Paramount Theatres, Inc., parent corporation of ABC-Paramount Records.

Other events of particular significance to the record industry included the announcement by the Federal Communications Commission that single ownership AM-FM stations in cities of over 100,000 population would be required to begin offering separate programing 50 per cent of the time. This change was originally to have taken place in August of this year. It is now slated to take effect in October, 1965.
With growing FM receiver sales and set penetration, plus the advent of stereo-FM broadcasting, this has become a vital new exposure medium for records. The non-simulcasting by

for records. The non-simulcasting by single AM-FM owners in compliance with this new ruling will further enhance the musical variety and formats offered in the cities fallang under the population criteria.

A program papel of broadcasters

offered in the cities falling under the population criteria.

A program panel of broadcasters discussing the new ruling were split as to the audience appeal factor of this non-duplication ruling. Everett Dillard, president, WASH-FM in Washington said, "FM now is in the mass-class' stage." In this advanced stage of development, he said, "the worst mistake that can be made is to slough off FM's program potential by imiting it to only 'longhair' music."

A divergent opinion was taken by David Pollinger, vice president and general manager, WTFM, New York. Pollinger stated "FM is a class medium." He pointed out, however, that 'class' does not mean only demographic superiority. "The FM audience," he said, "is an adult audience as opposed to a teenage audience."

The principal theme of Leonard Geldenson's address in accepting the NAB award dealt with the challenge of creativity and broadcasters finding for themselves the solutions to the in-

NAB award dealt with the challenge of creativity and broadcasters finding for themselves the solutions to the industry's creative problems. First among six points stressing creativity was the development of new talent in every area vital to the communications industry.

Large turnouts for meetings and functions made the Shoreham Hotel, needquarters for the convention, a meeting ground for broadcasters from all points of the United States.

THE DISK ARTIST PANEL

WASHINGTON—A panel of recording stars including Morton Gould, Stan Kenton, and Leroy Van Dyke, participated in a discussion of talent, participated in a discussion of talent, radio, programing and identity in a feature presentation of a morning session last week (23) at the National Association of Broadcasters convention in Washington. Moderated by Henry Brief, executive secretary of RIAA, the panel presented radio executives an opportunity to hear expressions of the relationship between records and radio by noted recording artists.

sions of the relationship between records and radio by noted recording artists.

Brief began the discussion by asking what, if any, effect categorization had made on the careers of the panel members. Kenton, Gould and Van Dyke all agreed that the musical category they are identified with does in some ways limit their radio exposure. A vital element was also expressed by the trio; being well identified with a particular musical expression is also the key to success for an artist.

Throughout the discussion the panel made mention of the close interplay between various musical forms. A very literate Leroy Van Dyke pointed out "an artist usually becomes categorized in terms of his first big commercial record success." Van Dyke stressed that most modern musical forms, C&W, rock, jazz and rhythm and blues have begun to blend until it is very hard to make hard and fast rules for programing.

Kenton pointed out his efforts to bring lush string sounds to the modern jazz scene. In spite of what he felt was great musical validity these records did not meet with the commercial success enjoyed by the more Kenton identified brass and swinging rhythm albums. Kenton also described his five year drive to make an album with either Tex Ritter or Red Foley. The Kenton-Ritter album became a reality and was in Kenton's words, "an expression of Ritter's great vocal sincerity and the sincerity associated with the jazz form."

Morton Gould spoke of the 'live' radio days when many of today's greatest musical names were made. This building of artists is still a responsibility of radio but now has the advantage of record company investment rather than the broadcaster supported sustaining program. Through the recorded product available today, a radio station can appeal to every

ported sustaining program. Through the recorded product available today, a radio station can appeal to every type of listener. Gould urged a greater amount of experimentation in music

programing.

Asked by Brief if the event of auto tape cartridge posed any special threat to radio and recording artists, Kenton felt there was room for all.

Eurovision Contest: France Gall Sings Winning Song For Luxembourg

The Eurovision Song Contest of 1965 which took place in Naples on March 20th brought victory to Luxembourg and 18 year old Philips recording star France Gall with "Poupee De Cire, Poupee De Son."

This was the 10th Eurovision Contest and the second to be won by Luxembourg—the victors in 1961 with "Nous, les Amoureux" performed by Jean Claude Pascal. Italy as winners of last year's contest "Non ho L'eta" played host to the 18 participating countries, two more than ever before, with Eire and Portugal being represented for the first time.

The Italians, who thrive on Song Festivals from Castracara to San Remo and whose Neopolitan songs are as famous the world over as Mount Vesuvius, chose to stage the contest in Naples, without a doubt Italy's capital city of song. The sweeping blue bay with Vesuvius as a backcloth made a magnificent setting for this international event.

The contest was organized by RAI Radiotelevisione Italia) and staged in the auditorium of the Television Centre before a specially invited audience of 1000 guests. Under the auspices of the European Broadcasting Union the programme was transmitted live to an estimated 100 million viewers in the 18 participating countries plus Czecho-Slovakia, Poland, Hungary, Rumania and the U.S.S.R. This fully exploiting the purpose of the contest which is to stimulate the output of exploiting the purpose of the contest which is to stimulate the output of

which is to stimulate the output of original songs by encouraging competition between authors and composers through the International comparison of their works. The voting was by national juries made up of 10 ordinary members of the public in each of the countries represented.

Each National jury being able to settle for one song (nine points), for two (six points for the first choice and three for the runner up), or else spread the voting over three songs awarding five points for the first choice and three points and one point for the runners up. Thus each National jury has nine points making a total of 162. The juries are not allowed to vote for their own country's entry.

lowed to vote for their own country's entry.

Luxembourg's victory was a popular one. Their song had been heavily tipped for the top three, along with the entries of the U.K and France.

Thus, in the light of the final reckoning, justice would seem to have been done, despite a tendency on the part of some juries to err on the nationalistic side. During the interval, while the juries were deliberating, the organizers had engaged top Italian tenor Mario del Monaco to soothe the nerves and please the ear with a selection of Neopolitan songs.

All eyes were switched to the giant

All eyes were switched to the giant score board on the opposite side of the stage as the results started to

come in.

Holland cast the first vote and put Luxembourg straight in the lead with 5 points. It was not long before the U.K. and Monaco came into the picture but by the time seven countries had registered their votes, Luxembourg were firmly in the lead with 22 points.

At this stage their nearest rivals

At this stage their nearest rivals France and Austria were way behind with eight points each. Suddenly with six points from the Belgium jury the U.K. shot up to second place with a total of twelve points.

By half time it was Luxembourg, France, U.K. and Italy in the top four slots. Later with five points from the Danish jury the U.K. forged ahead and were only three points behind Luxembourg, who were still in the lead with 24 points. Things began to get hot as France collected five more points from the Yugoslavian jury to pip the U.K. into second place by one point!

Luxembourg's victory was already in the bag, but it was left to the Swiss jury, the last to vote, to decide the runners up. Five points to the U.K. did the trick and the score board proclaimed Luxembourg the winners with 32 points, the U.K. second with Austria fourth with 16. The winning song "Poupee De Cire, Poupee De Son," produced and published by Bagatelle and released by Philips is a foot-tapping Twist tempo, chart topping number. It is the third song penned hits for top artists including written and composed for Frence Call written and composed for France Gall by Serge Gainsbourg, who has also Briget Bardot, Petula Clark and the Luxembourg winner in 1961, Jean Claude Pascal. He is also a prolific writer of film scores. The conductor and arranger of the number, Alain Goraguer also played an important part in its success.

The artist, France Gall (Philips) comes from a musical family. Her father Robert Gall has written many hits including "La Mamma" with Charles Aznavour. Since she signed a recording contract, just over a year ago, with Denis Bourgeois (of Bagatelle, which publishes the number), France Gall has had several big hits and sold over 1 million records.

She has recorded "Poupee De Cire, Poupee De Son" for release in Italy and in Scandinavia and her waxing of "Sacre Charlemagne" is released in the U.S. The publishing rights of "Poupee De Cire . . ." have already been acquired for Italy (Les Copains), Scandinavia (Multitone), Germany (Montana), Spain (Canzione del Mundo) and Belgium (Moderny).

Like the winning song the immediate runners up were lively, zippy compositions. Britain's entry "I Belong," by Phil Peters and Peter Lee Sterling and impeccably performed by Kathy Kirby, despite being drawn No. 2 made a tremendous impression and took the U.K. to second place for the 6th time! The French entry "N'avoue Jamais," a romantic ballad composed and performed by Guy Mardel in the best tradition of French chanson had the celebrated conductor Franck Pourcel to bring out the fabulous beat and arrangement.

Austria's entry "Sag Ihr, Ich Lass Sie Grussen," was also performed by the composer, this time Udo Jurgens.

Response To Initial Jazz Sets Spotlights Promo At Limelight

CHICAGO—Limelight Records, Mercury's stellar cast and lavishly packaged jazz line, has set in motion a thorough merchandising program.

Limelight is obviously impressed by the response to both the performances and package get-up that came with its first release in Jan. and is going to effective promo lengths to firmly establish its growing jazz catalog.

A regular release schedule up to Sept. of this year has been established. The diskery bowed last Jan. with six albums, and six additional LP's will be added to the line every six weeks to two months. An April 10 release is already on its way. They include: "The Oscar Peterson Trio—Canadiana Suite;" "Jambo Caribe," Dizzy Gillespie; "I Talk With The Spirits," Roland Kirk; "Last Date," Eric Dolphy; "Milt Jackson—In A New Setting;" "Cannonball & Coltrane." Starring in the label's first half-dozen sets were Art Blakey & the Jazz Messengers, Gerry Mulligan, Terry Gibbs, Chet Baker, Clifford Brown.

Limelight also has a new addition to its royal jazz family. He's pianist Les McCann, who comes to the label

via a deal with Shaw Artists. McCann was a steady seller for the Pacific label before his new association.

Continuing its policy of drawing all jazz names from the Mercury, Philips, Smash and Fontana labels, Limelight will also have the artistry of the Double Six of Paris, which has come up with a number of Grammy nominations this year.

Under consideration at the label are further teamings of its various artists. This pairing was begun with the first LP line-up, a collection called "I/We Had A Ball," a round-up of songs from "I Had A Ball," featuring Art Blakey, Oscar Peterson, Milt Jackson and Chet Baker. One such new teaming may involve Sarah Vaughn and a group of musicians.

Limelight's lavish packaging is also the subject of a new idea. Like interior decorator dealers who possess large-sized sample books of wall-paper, the label will offer to key jazz dealers a similar set-up that will group its first 12 albums together. Jazz buyers will be able to inspect both the outer cover and the inner (Continued on page 43)




ALBUM REVIEWS

POP PICKS

GIRL HAPPY—Elvis Presley—RCA Victor LPM/LSP-3338

Elvis Presley, who has been tremendously successful with his previous soundtrack efforts, has come up with another winning collection of driving rock tunes from his upcoming flick "Girl Happy." The score is packed with tunes capturing the zest of the teen and collegiate crowds, the groups which should turn out in large numbers for this package. Highlight tracks feature the title tune, "Girl Happy," and "Fort Lauerdale Chamber of Commerce" along with the songster's latest smash single "Do The Clam."



THE EARLY BEATLES—Capitol T/ST 2309

Before establishing their reputation or ties to Capitol, the Beatles came out with an LP on Vee-Jay, the selections from which have been repackaged in the new album, "The Early Beatles." The fabulous foursome should find plenty of replays packed into this package, though, since it contains such smashes as their "Love Me Do," "Please Please Me," and "Do You Want To Know A Secret." The sound still has the old Beatle drawing power, and loads of teens who missed the tunes on the first go round will turn out for it now.

A SONG WILL RISE—Peter, Paul & Mary—Warner Bros. W/WS 1589
Following a steady stream of chart-riding singles and gold disk earning albums, the group of Peter, Paul and Mary has launched another delightful package of folk music in the same exciting vein that has brought them so much success. The three balladeers have a pure and sincere style, which can caress a tender ballad or belt out a lusty foot-tapper with all the emotion it deserves. Some top grooves include "San Francisco Blues" and "When The Ship Comes In." This one is a natural.

FREDDIE AND THE DREAMERS—Mercury MG 21017/SR 61017

Freddie and the Dreamers, who are currently pulling in the coin with their Tower rocket, "I'm Telling You Now," as well as their Mercury noisemaker, "I Understand," use the latter to kick off an exciting collection of vintage oldies. The wild Mercury lads, who are drawing fans in droves with their comedy-rock antics, promise to draw a lot more with their initial album outing for the label. Hot items in the set are interesting revivals of "Johnny B. Goode" and "It Doesn't Matter Anymore." Watch this one zoom.

FREDDIE AND THE DREAMERS—Tower T5003

With their sizzling chart climbing single, "I'm Telling You Now," currently rocketing up the charts, Freddie and The Dreamers seem destined to garner a lot of attention in the album field, also, with this Tower package. Besides their current hit, the group offers "What Have I Done To You" in their inimitable zany style. The album also features several other British groups with some interesting new rock 'n roll danceables. This set should get some very good reaction. set should get some very good reaction.

MEXICAN PEARLS—Billy Vaughn—Dot DLP 3628/DLP 25628

Billy Vaughn, whose easy-listening dance music is responsible for a long string of hit singles and albums, follows up his chart-climbing success, "Pearly Shells," with another package of pearls. The orkster has taken a batch of hand-picked evergreens, combined them with his pleasantly moody style, and waxed a delightful, matched set of baubles. Gems include "Willow Weep For Me" and "Just One More Chance" in addition to the title track. A sure shot for the midnight romancers.

MARY WELLS-20th Century Fox TFM 3171/TFS 4171



POP GOES THE BASIE—Count Basie and his Orchestra—Reprise R/RS—6153
Count Basie and the band ply their jazz talents on a dozen pop hits in this package loaded with the old swing sound. Appeal is built-in for the adult audience, and the selections are likely to catch some of the teen loot as well. The brass section is in fine fettle on tracks like "Do Wah Diddy Diddy" and "He's Got The Whole World In His Hands;" and the entire ork moves on "Walk Right In." This package should see plenty of spinner action, and deservedly so.

MORE SOLID AND RAUNCHY—Bill Black's Combo-Hi HL 12023/SHL 32023
Geared to the tastes of young and old alike, Bill Black and his Combo have another edition of the solid and raunchy sound, which is almost a trademark of the group. In this outing they swing out with a collection of recent vintage rockers, spiced with a handful of evergreens, that should delight a large segment of the record buying public. Some top grooves include "Kansas City" and "A Hard Day's Night" plus a raunchy fingersnapping session of "Sunrise Serenade." Keep your eye on this one.

WOODY'S BIG BAND GOODIES—Woody Herman—Philips PHM 200-171/PHS 600-171

Woody Herman and his Herman Herd tears up one of his best packages on Philips to date with this live session, waxed mostly at Basin Street West in Hollywood. The orkster goes wild with the woodwind and also features fine soloing by Sal Nastico on the skins, Billy Hunt on the horn, and Nat Pierce skimming over the ivories. The herd moves out especially strong with its versions of "Apple Honey" and the moody "Poor House Blues." Strong potential for this one.

THE RETURN OF ROCK JERRY LEE LEWIS

THE RETURN OF ROCK—Jerry Lee Lewis—Smash MGS 27063/SRS 67063

Jerry Lee Lewis' comeback drive should see considerable gain from this effort, "The Return of Rock," which showcases his driving styling on a dozen moving numbers including his latest single, and a series of while back and new tunes with a solid beat. "I Believe In You" and "Baby, Hold Me Close," Lewis' newest sides, are shuffled in with songs like "Roll Over Beethoven" in this dance package done up with the familiar piano and band rhythms that have produced hot hits for this star before and might well click once again. A swinging set.



JOHN BARRY PLAYS GOLDFINGER—United Artists UAL 3424/UAS 6424
Composer-conductor-arranger John Barry, who struck paydirt with his string of musical scores for the James Bond movie series, has waxed his own package of the well-established film themes. The British composer drives his ork with reckless abandon through the powerful, racing tempos of his self-penned hits, "Gondfinger" and "From Russia With Love" as well as the super-charged "James Bond Theme" in an album that should attract a lot of 007's musically-minded fans.



I PUT A SPELL ON YOU—Nina Simone—Philips PHM 200-172/PHS 600-172
Casting a spell has been the special magical quality that has permeated Nina Simone's musical work since her debut. This new collection from Philips has captured the special essence that is Simone's in a sampling of magnificently orchestrated performances by the songstress. One of the finest efforts from this artist, the set includes a ballad version of "I Put A Spell On You" which gives a completely new sound to the old rock hit. Among the other fine items worthy of special attention are "Marriage Is For Old Folks" and "Gimme Some." A blue-ribbon set.





ROCK'N JOUL THE EVERLY BROTHERS

ROCK 'N SOUL—The Everly Brothers—Warner Bros. W/WS 1578

The Everly Brothers, who have a vast personal collection of solid gold singles and albums, turn the tables by waxing a batch of tunes that have already entered musicdom's golden domain. In their usual distinctive vocal-instrumental style, the boys pay a wailin' tribute to the smash hits of several other rock artists including Chuck Berry, Elvis Presley and Ray Charles. Fine renditions here of "Hound Dog," "Maybelline" and "I Got A Woman." Should rake in a lot of coin.




SERENADE FOR ELISABETH—Gunter Kallman German Chorus—Four Corners FCL/FCS-4209

This wonderful package of soft "old world" sounds should provide many a spinner with some pleasant change-of-pace programming material. The sparkling orchestration features an unusual bell-ringing glitter behind a beautifully harmonizing choir. Selections are all interesting examples of the axiom that music is the "international language," since they are all enjoyable despite the language barrier, each being performed in German. Among the songs are: "O, Mein Papa" and "Serenade For Elisabeth."



COME SHARE MY LIFE—Glenn Yarbrough—RCA Victor LPM/LSP-3301
Since leaving the Limelighters, Glenn Yarbrough has caused quite a stir with his solo performances; and this album wonderfully spotlights his beautiful tenor voice in a collection of tunes bordering on both pop and folk sounds. Ballads abound, all caressed by the singer's sensitive sound, and lightly lively orking. Included in the set are Yarbrough's follow-up to his "Baby, The Rain Must Fall" noisemaker, "The Warm And Gentle Girls" and "Come Share My Life" with "A Young Girl." Lovely listening here.



THE BIG HITS OF DETROIT—H. B. Barnum—Capitol S/ST 2289

The Detroit sound that has created a terriffic trend in popular music in the last year is garnished with a swinging part jazz-part big band touch by H. B. Barnum in his new instrumental album from Capitol. Ork versions of some of the biggest hits in recent months are featured, such as "Come See About Me," "You've Really Got a Hold on Me," and "Dancing in the Street." The set should see plenty of air play, and an excellent response from the teens and groovy adults.

Rodgers and Hammerstein's magnificent score for "The Sound Of Music" is given the big band swing treatment by Ted Heath, and the tunes not only stand up well under this handling, but many of the songs stand out as gorgeous new sounds, shimmering in their new garb. The disk features fine rhythmic arrangements well handled by the top-notch dance band. Another beautiful addition to the London Phase 4 series. Should be well received by deejays who will enjoy "My Favorite Things" and "Do-Re-Mi" among others.



MAJOR DUNDEE—Original Soundtrack—Columbia OL 6380/OS 2780

The brilliant musical score by Daniele Amfitheatrof, who has done the background for several memorable films including "Another Part of the Forest," provides lovely fare for the upcoming Charlton Heston vehicle "Major Dundee." Vigorous and soft sounds alternate in this melodic painting of cavalry fighting and expanses of desert, done with a beautiful touch. Sales impetus is provided by the "Major Dundee March" offered up by Mitch Miller and the Gang.



KEYBOARD KALEIDOSCOPE—Dick Hyman—Command R/RS 875SD

The always imaginative Dick Hyman pulls out all stops on this Command package as he teams up, once again, with the stereophonic sound of the Lowery organ, for an ear-pleasing excursion into music. The artist spans the keyboard and comes up with a collection of discotheque-styled danceables, including the aptly-named kickoff item, "Discotheque Doll." Other excellent grooves on the double-jacket package include some interesting versions of recent vintage sounds "Fiddler On The Roof" and "Goldfinger."


JOYA SHERRILL SINGS DUKE—20th Century Fox TFM 3170/TFS 4170

The album, arranged and conducted by Benny Carter, features the artist moaning low with some top grooves, including "Whispering Grass" and "Blues For The Weepers." Good sales potential here.



Backed by a swinging ork, the r & b artist wails the package of grooves in the style of the rockin' bluesers of the last decade, bringing back the original r & b sound. Watch this one for good reaction.

A sparkling new comedy duo is making its debut as a team on this Roulette package, produced by Nicholas Darvas and written-directed by Heywood Kling. Patricia Bright (Liz) and Billy Baxter (Dick), both of whom have been doing extensive comedy and impersonation performances, have paired up for a refreshingly witty interpretation of the personal lives of Hollywood's "most talked about" couple. The humor in their material is lively and bright, making the package a natural for the comic buffs.



JUG BAND MUSIC—Jim Kweskin & The Jug Band—Vanguard VRS-9163/VSD-79163

The unusual and very intriguing combination of instruments in a "jug band" makes for a highly interesting and delightful blues sound in this offering from Vanguard. The Jim Kweskin crew puts down some down home blues tunes that smack of the simplicity and deep understanding which has made this music such a part of the folk-jazz-pop scenes, and the selections come off with a newness that seems to belie their tradition. Included in the set are: "Memphis," "Somebody Stole My Gal," and "I'm A Woman."



LOST IN A DREAM-The Ink Spots-Vocalion

The Ink Spots, who have been crooning romantic ballads for many years, keep up with their traditionally tender vocalizing in another fine package of vintage love tunes. The silken sound of the Spots is enhanced with a velvet ork background as the veteran group glides through a collection of memories including "Say Something Sweet To Your Sweetheart" and "I'd Climb The Highest Mountain." This package will make a nice addition to the collector's library.

The unusual Portuguese song form, the fado, is beautifully rendered in this package from Request. Magnificent vocal displays by Americo Lima turns each song into a fine listening experience despite the language barrier. One of the memorable points of the album is the striking fusion of the best qualities of Spanish and Italian song in sound of tracks like: "Coimbra Menina e Moca" and "A Barca de Minha Vida." An excellent sampling of Portuguese songs.



SUZANNA—Singing Sisters of Our Lady of Africa—Aardvark 1347

An interesting sampling of African folk music has been collected and performed in this package from the Sisters of the Order of Missionaries of Our Lady of Africa. The unusual fare in this set combines the bare, basic tribal rhythms and a lovely polished vocal job by the Sisters to develop a delightfully different sound. 


THE MAX ROACH TRIO—Atlantic 1435

Incredible chromatic and rhythmic rapport is displayed throughout, creating an exquisite tension on cuts like: "Hope So Elmo" and "Pay Not Play Not." Top grooves are on "Three-Four Vs. BOSS SHOUTIN'—Willis Jackson—Prestige 7329
Basic jazz, sounds that will appeal to the average listener as well as the connoisseur, are featured in this groovy package from Willis Jackson. The wailin' saxist has included a life and beat beautifully tailored to dancing as well. Soulful music comes to the fore on "Que Sera, Sweetie;" and a brilliant combination of the "Watermelon Man" sound with a blues classic makes for great listening on "Boss St. Louis Blues." One of the easiest sets to swing along with that has come out for a long while.

This Sue LP features some truly great saxophone wailing from vet hornman Flip Philips, who stands squarely in the spotlight, and blows up a storm. Although eclipsed by the saxist, the remainder of the personnel come up with a few fine solos and do a tremendous supporting job. Listening to the superb melodic treatments of Philips, however, it is clear why he is featured. Standout cuts include "In a Mellow Tone," "I Remember Lester" and "Sweet Georgia Brown."



GROUP THERAPY—New York Jazz Sextet—Scepter 526

A combination of six great jazzmen, united as the New York Jazz Sextet, comes up with a wild set of grooves in this Scepter LP. The outing marks the first time that the crew has been recorded live, and with the tracks sounding the way they do, it certainly won't be the last. Swinging from start to finish, with no let up in the quality, aces like Art Farmer (flugelhorn), James Moody (tenor sax and flute) and Tommy Flanagan on piano riffle through some wonderful sessions, i.e. "Signature" and "Dim After Day."

EVERYBODY LOVES A LOVER—Shirley Scott—Impulse! A/AS-73

The growing popularity of the electric organ in jazz combos should receive a boost from this excellent set featuring the sound of Shirley Scott with a well coordinated and swinging group of collaborators. Stanley Turrentine puts down a great number on the self-penned track "Shirley;" and several of the other bands show great jobs by Bob Cranshaw at bass and Otis Finch on drums. Everybody swings with Shirley on "Everybody Loves a Lover." A wonderful effort, making for some great listening.

NARAS Panel Debates Session Stumper

NEW YORK—The record-age-old question of "Who's In Charge Here" (in the studio, that is) was never solved but a good deal of interesting light on the relationships between record producers and engineers was shed last week when the New York Chapter of NARAS presented a fascinating symposium in the Bryant Park Studio of National Recording.

Members of a diversified nanel mod-

Studio of National Recording.

Members of a diversified panel moderated by Father Norman O'Connor, a NARAS Governor, emoted in various ways. While agreeing that the best records are made when producers and engineers work as a team, not all gave the same basic aims. Columbia's veteran engineer, Fred Plaut, noted that familiarity with the music and its artists was vital to an efficient recording session, while Mike Stoller, noted writer-producer in the singles field, felt that spontaneity of a session often resulted in hit recordings.

RCA Victor's A. & R. chief, Steve Sholes, leaning more toward Plaut's theories, intimated that he has maintained high regard for engineers and their functions ever since one of them "bailed me out of my very first record

tained high regard for engineers and their functions ever since one of them "bailed me out of my very first record date." Sholes noted that whatever friction may occur on dates seldom stems from producer-engineer relationships but rather from artists' relatives, managers and friends. Mercury Records' classical chief, Harold Lawrence, agreed and submitted some amusing anecdotes as evidence.

Tom Dowd, head of Atlantic's engineering department, dropped a minor bomb with his observation that engineers are so often overworked that they can't match the enthusiasm of producers. He also noted that keeping up with the times, both from an engineering as well as an A. & R. standpoint, was vital to being a good engineer. Phil Ramone, vice-president of A and R Recording, emphasized the need for rapport between everyone concerned with the creating of a record, indicating that the producer and engineer, working as a team, often find it necessary to establish good working relationships, both before and during sessions, with the artists, themselves.

themselves.
Following these and similar expressions, the panelists answered a flock of questions from a particularly enthusiastic crowd of NARAS members and guests, who remained in the studio for a half hour to corner the panelists after the meeting had closed.

Brady's voice is not actually new, though, since he has been a regular on Don MacNeil's Breakfast Club, and played the nitery circuit from Chicago to Miami.

According to the promotion plan, which was proposed by Brady, he reports to the Capitol Tower every other day by telephone. The label's promotion men are thus kept working several days ahead of the crooner and set up various interviews and appearances prior to his arrival in each town.

EIA Reports Jan. Radio-Phono Sales

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Electronics Industry Association reports for radio and phonograph sales for Jan. 1965 show increases over the same month of the previous year and decreases from sales in Dec. 1964.

Production of radios totaled 1,702,-125 units in Jan. 1965, a rise of 20.4 per cent over the 1,413,293 total for the previous Jan., but 13.2 per cent lower than the 1,961,565 units for Dec. 1964. Radio sales, (excluding auto) for Jan. 1965 totaled 693,005 as opposed to 544,815 sales for the first month of the previous year and 1,482,883 sales in Dec. 1964.

Meanwhile, production of phonographs in Jan. 1965 reached a figure of 206,348 for portable/table models in Jan. 1965 as opposed to 180,076 for the same month in 1964 and 251,339 in Dec. 1964. Sales for the same product totaled 191,318 units, compared to 158,888 for Jan. 1964 and 684,234 units for Dec. 1964.

Console phono production totaled 126,716 units in Jan., up from the previous year's 118,764 figure but down from the Dec. 1964 total of



sity, Scopp became a C.P.A. in 1926. As an independent C.P.A., Maurice Scopp & Co., he represented outstanding entertainers and show business firms. Later, he organized and was president of the well-known pioneer of package shows Air Features which produced a roster of major musical and dramatic radio programs during the golden era of broadcasting: "Manhattan Merry-Go-Round," "Stella Dallas," "David Harum," "American Album of Familiar Music," "Just Plain Bill" and "American Melody Hour." In 1951, CBS purchased Air Features, and Scopp continued as consultant to the network until 1953 when he joined The Big 3.

A resident of Forest Hills, New York, Maurice Scopp is survived by his widow, Mrs. Pearl Scopp; a daughter, Ruth Ann Scopp, and a sister, Mrs. Tillie Fuchs.

Montana Gov. Vetoes Performance Fee Bill



Harry Tierney Dies, Wrote "Alice Blue Gown"

NEW YORK—Harry A. Tierney, composer of "Alice Blue Gown," "Rio Rita," "Rangers' Song" and "Irene," died here last week at his home.

Born in Perth Amboy, New Jersey, May 21, 1890, Tierney studied at the Virgil School of Music in New York, after graduation from High School. While still a student at the conservatory, Tierney toured the United States as a concert pianist.

He first became active as a composer during a trip to London where he wrote the music for Andre Charlot's musical, "Keep Smiling," in 1914. Upon his return to America, Tierney became a staff composer at Jerome H. Remick Music Company.

Among the first American musicals which he wrote were "Irene" in 1919, "Up She Goes" in 1922, "Kid Boots" in 1923 and the operetta "Rio Rita" in 1927. His songs include "Alice Blue Gown," "M-i-s-s-i-s-s-i-p-p-i, "Irene", "Castle of Dreams" and "Journey's End." From 1916 to 1920 he composed scores for the Ziegfeld Follies, and in 1917 he joined ASCAP. In addition he was a member of the Dramatists Guild and the Authors' League of America.

Tierney is survived by his widow, Ava Maria Lowry and a son, Harry Austin Tierney, Jr. of London. The body is reposing at Frank E. Campbell's, 81st Street and Madison Avenue. Services will be announced later.



His publishing companies have enjoyed tremendous success with the polka-bunny-hop fad in Europe, where it surged across national borders; and is now working on a publicity drive to popularize the dance in the States.

The need for a radio station to have an identity through a particular music format was mutually expressed by all members of the panel. Van Dyke cited an experience with WSM's Grand Ole Opry to illustrate the need for new and experimental ideas to stay abreast of the public's tastes. He said, "the Grand Ole Opry did not even allow a drum on stage until the early 1950's." Now, Van Dyke stated, "the drum is on stage and has become a vital factor in the Nashville sound as country stars have taken advantage of the best innovations of rock and roll. This is the essence of the blending of popular musical forms that once were placed in easily identifiable categories."

All three panel members admitted it is virtually impossible for any station to audition every record that comes in. This sometimes leads to the loss of valuable experimental recordings such as a country name doing pop material, a classical artist doing modern, popular things and a jazz artist trying to blend two musical idioms as in the Kenton-Ritter collaboration. These factors made it difficult for an artist to broaden his audience. This same set of circumstances makes it increasingly difficult to develop new artists and new markets for existing stars. Put in a radio sense,

op new artists and new markets for existing stars. Put in a radio sense, the panel members felt this same category system may possibly be detrimental to the development of radio audience audience.

Gould got a rising chuckle from the audience with his response to Henry Brief's question, "Why do you make records?" Gould immediately answered, "to make money." Stan Kenton received a sound of applause when he likened his reason for making records to the fact that radio "must find its place to reach and motivate an audience to buy products. This contribution to the national economy is a vital element to the prosperity of the United States."

HOLLYWOOD—Vee-Jay has acquired exclusive U.S. rights to the recordings of Catherine Spaak, the Belgian-born star of Italian films.

Randy Wood, Vee-Jay president, flew to Europe last week to finalize a far-reaching deal with the Italian recording and publishing company, Ricordi, of which the performer's Vee-Jay tie-up is the first development.

The 19-year-old actress, who is the niece of Belgium's foreign minister, has become one of Europe's top film stars since her recent debut in "The Easy Life." Her most recent films, soon to be released in the U.S. by Joseph P. Levine, are "La Calda Vita" and "Tre Amori Di Notte."

According to the new tie-up with Ricordi, Vee-Jay will have exclusive rights to release all of her foreign records in the U.S. and Canada, as well as to record her in America.

Now in Tokyo and South America for a series of film festivals at which she is guest of honor, she will fly to Hollywood early in April for meetings with Wood and other company executives to schedule her first recording sessions here.

The Vee-Jay-Ricordi deal also grants the American company exclusive rights to the recordings of Ornella Vanoni, described as "the Italian Piaf," and other artists to be confirmed later. Expected is Vee-Jay's association with a major European

reial," and other artists to be confirmed later. Expected is Vee-Jay's association with a major European publishing organization which will figure prominently in Vee-Jay's plan to launch its own classical line in the near future.

Other expansion moves for the company include the formation of a new subsidiary, Discos CBS, S.A., of Columbia. The new subsidiary, headed by Stefan Riess, will be a fully integrated record company with recording, manufacturing and distribution facilities.

CHICAGO — Two more sets of invaders from the British scene, both within the Mercury entity, will be storming the U.S. shores on Apr. 20.

Freddie and the Dreamers, currently probing deep into the American charts with their single "I Understand," will launch an offensive in Chicago and follow up with hit-andrun skirmishes in Wilmington on Apr. 23, Allentown, Apr. 24, The Ed Sullivan CBS-TVer Apr. 25, and ABC's The Go Go Show Apr. 26. From there the group will withdraw to its homeland on Apr. 27.

Fully armed with guitar picks, Wayne Fontana and the Mindbenders, who have softened up American resistance with their Fontana Records blockbuster, "The Game Of Love," will make a thrust at Rochester, New York on Apr. 22 and burst onto the Hullabaloo scene on Apr. 23. HOLLYWOOD — Angel Records will become the first major label in the pre-recorded-tape field to offer a complete opera on 4-track, 3-&-¾ inches-

plete opera on 4-track, 3-&-¾ inchesper-second stereo tape with its release Monday (3/29) of a brand-new "Tosca" starring Maria Callas.

The history-making tape will be released simultaneously with Angel's deluxe two-LP disk recording of the opera. Both tape and disk are being issued to celebrate the famed prima donna's return to the Metropolitan Opera House, where she is giving two performances of "Tosca" after an absence of over seven years. sence of over seven years.

According to Oris Beucler, special

roducts manager for Angel and Capitol, the new, slower-speed playback has two major advantages over the usual 7½ ips tapes, while maintaining high level sonic quality.

First, the new "Tosca" will be available at a price equivalent to that of the stereo disk version. The advan-

tages of tape over disks (fidelity, permanence, compactness) are thereby gained at no greater expense.

Secondly, by means of the slower speed, the entire three-act opera, lasting almost two hours, can be fitted on one tape reel. Thus only one break interrupts Puccini's score, while tape players with "automatic reverse" require absolutely no interruptions for

Beucler said that Capitol's successful experience with 334 pop tapes has proven the engineering and marketing feasibility of the more economical tape speed.

He predicted that the 3% tape release of the Callas "Tosca" will prove to be a major step toward the mass market acceptability of tape product.

GREAT BRITAIN

"Ace of Diamonds" is the name given to the new low-priced classical series launched by Decca Records this month. This series, designed to sell stereo to the masses, is being backed by an intensive promotional campaign and the initial release includes all nine Beethoven Symphonies conducted by Ernest Ansermet. "Ace of Diamonds" to be issued on mono as well as stereo, has a vast catalogue of names to call upon, i.e. Joan Sutherland, Birgit Nilsson, Kirsten Flagstad, Alfredo Campoli, Sir Adrian Boult, Sir Malcolm Sargeant etc., and all recordings have previously been issued on the higher priced Decca label. A further release is to be made in June, followed by another 'block' release in the autumn, thereafter monthly issues are envisaged. The albums retail at the bargain price of 25/—(\$3.50) with full colour sleeves designed with an eye-catching logo, making them easily identifiable. This is the third "Ace" series put out by Decca, the other two being "Ace of Clubs" and "Ace of Hearts."

A deal signed in New York between Jeffrey Kruger, managing director of Ember Records and Geoffrey Racine, executive vice president of Capitol Records of Canada Ltd., gives Capitol of Canada the immediate rights to Chad and Jeremy's "If I Loved You" single, which is fast climbing the American Top Twenty. Also involved are 15 other titles waxed by the British duo. A secondary deal gives Capitol of Canada the rights to an LP, "That James Bond Man John Barry Meets Chad and Jeremy," featuring six tracks by Barry and six by the duo.

A statement issued by Robert Stigwood Associates reads "The Board of Directors of this company have recently been advised that through adverse trading conditions in certain of our activities we are unable to meet all our commitments as they fall due. The company has taken certain drastic steps to reduce and curtail its overheads and other expenses, but believe that the proper course is to place before its creditors a Statement of Affairs, with a view to securing a moratorium subject to appropriate safeguards for all, so that ultimately all creditors may be paid in full and the company may resuscitate its affairs." Stigwood, whose activities include promotion, artiste management and independent recording, is reported to have lost a considerable amount of money on the recent Chuck Berry tour as well as the P. J. Proby tour which had to be cancelled because of Proby's failure to appear.

Transatlantic Records entered the Top 50 this week with the Bob Dylan composition "The Times They Are A-Changing" by the Ian Campbell Folk Group has just recorded their third LP for the label, "Coal Dust Ballads," a collection of mining colliery songs.

After a run on Broadway, the James Baldwin play, "Blues For Mr. Charlie," opens here in May, and Sparta Music has the rights to the Bobby Sharpe score. Title song waxed by Sammy Davis Jr. and Count Basie will be issued here in April on Verve. A new company, Nobel-Arts Fil

launched by Sparta to publish the output of Nobel Arts Films. The first work is expected to be the score from a science fiction movie. On the management side, Sparta has signed their first artiste, Bobby Vincent, who will record a Hal Shaper composition, "Let The Day Never Come," for release on the Ember label.

Chappelle published the soundtrack of the latest Bill Fury film, "I've Gotta Horse," with the score by John Taylor and David Henneker. The latter penned the score for the hit British musical, "Half A Sixpence," which recently opened in Boston, U.S.A. with the original star, Tommy Steele, in the lead.

Les Paul of Apollo Music delighted with the success of "Concrete and Clay" by Unit Four Plus Two. The group got its unusual name because they started off as a four-man vocal group (Unit Four) then added a drummer and bass player (Plus Two). Their manager, John Barker, also independently produced their first disk for Decca, which by pop standards has been somewhat of a 'sleeper' having been issued on Jan. 29. The group hopes to emulate its debut success with its follow up, "You've Never Been In Love Like This Before", again penned by group members Tom Moeller and Brian Parker and again published by Apollo and issued on Decca.

The Nashville Teens latest Decca single, "Find My Way Back Home", is published by Filmusic. After playing a Christmas season at New York's Brooklyn Fox Theatre, the Teens literally had to find their way back home when their American tour had to be cancelled owing to work permit difficulties. However, all is now well and the boys fly back early in April for three weeks of TV and one-nighters. Their "Tobacco Road" single climbed as high as No. 14 in the Cash Box American Top 100 chart.

American actor/singer Kenny Miller, now living in Britain, has cut his first single under the direction of independent producer Shel Talmy, for release in Britain on Stateside and in America by World Artistes. The number, "Rest-less", is a British composition published by Belinda Music. During his stay M

Hard winds are blowing around Finnish TV authorities these days. Lars Lindau, A & R man at the company, told Cash Box that judging from the present successes at Philips and Pye labels, 1965 has every chance to be another top selling year for the company in Sweden.

Evert Taube, something of a Swedish national poet and probably the most played composer in Swedish radio and TV, celebrated his 75th birthday the other day. He preferred to celebrate the day with the family at the French Riviera.

In the very near future CBS Gramofoonplaten is going to release two brand-new single recordings by the famous Dutch accordion duo, The Pico's. Since the Pico's joined the local CBS label, they have gained tremendous popularity, not only through performances for the Dutch forces but also those at local parties. CBS artists The Kilima Hawaiians, very happy with the U.S. release of their album, entitled "Farewell Hawaii," continue to score a huge success during performances for the Dutch soldiers as well as other engagements.

New additions to the local Tamla-Motown catalog, the strongest r & b line in Benelux, include "Ask The Lonely" by The Four Tops and "Shotgun" by Jr. Walker & The All Stars, released by Artone's subsid Funckler Records. In the meantime, "Stop In The Name Of Love," the fourth hit in a row by The Supremes is gaining each week, according to Pete Felleman, the label's Benelux manager. Benelux manager.

Anagon Music Publishers obtained Benelux copyrights for CNR's new recording of "Paradies Der Bunten Träume." This title, which is now high on the charts in Germany, will be sung by Rita Hovink, well known charming member of Holland's festival-winning Knokke-team.

Anagon's president, van Schalkwijk, told us that his firm now also reserved rights for Rocco Granata's version of "Melancholie," recently released by C. N. Rood. This item had an almost immediate, favourable reception in this market according to the prexy.

After the success of Tonny Eyk's "Pretka Jenka," Anagon also laid a hand upon the world copyrights of two other Jenka-recordings. Titles are "Festival Jenka" (Tonny Eyk) and "Doggy's Jenka" (composed by Tonny Eyk and René Pedde). The pubbery in the meantime effected direct sales of these titles (recorded by the composer and his Jenka Boys) to Germany, Austria, Switzerland, USA and Canada.

The pubbery's chief also has high expectations for Adamo's two English hits, "Another Love Affair" and "She Was An Angel," now entering Holland's Top-50 list. And Adamo's new single "La Nuit"/"Le Barbu Sans Barbe," released by HMV very soon, will surely become a big seller, according to van Schalkwijk.

Leeds Holland (Basart N.V.) is very happy to have the rights of the hitparader, "It's Not Unusual." Dutch pop singer Edwin Rutten recorded on the M.M.P. label the Dutch version, with the title "Ik Voel Me Nummer Een." Leeds Muziek (Basart N.V.) acquired the rights of the new Petula Clark hit, "I Know A Place." Basart also signed up the rights for Benelux of the new Connie Francis outing, "Whose Heart Are You Breaking Tonight." The popular teenage star, Willeke Alberti, recorded a Dutch version, on the Philips label. The new Gene Pitney hit, "I Must Be Seeing Things," the rights to which are with Schroeder-Basart, is very much in demand over here. Rudy Carrell had a tremendous success on his very popular TV show with his own version of the English song, "A Windmill In Old Amsterdam," with the Dutch title "Een Huis In Een Molen In Mooi Amsterdam." Phonogram will release a recording of this song shortly.

Basart Productions Department released on Decca a single by the well known duo, De Limbra Zusjes, with the songs "Gondolier' D'Amore" (Basart-Novaton) and "Als De Mandolinen Klinken," the Dutch version of the title song from the picture "Topkapi" (Artistiques-Basart). Basart Productions also recorded the songs "Piano (Oh! No) Yenka" and "Dinah (China) Yenka" by the Jenka Yanks.

Germany's biggest teenage fan magazine, "Bravo", with over a million readers has had its readers poll for the most popular record and film artists. Over 1,428,000 votes were sent in for favorite artists and many new artists found their way to the top of the polls. England's Cliff Richard won the poll as Germany's most popular singer, for the second time in a row beating out his English colleagues, the Beatles, who took second place. Third place went to Freddy Quinn, who has been in the top 3 for many many years. The first two artists record for Electrola here and Quinn is on Polydor.

On the female side of the picture, Electrola's Gitte, from Denmark, picked her first "Golden" award with Teldec's Manuela, from Berlin, moving from 4th to 2nd place and Connie Francis moving from first place to third. She is on MGM, released here by Polydor.

In a later column, we'll give the list of other foreign artists placing in the poll.

Someone should decide the real reason for the "Song for Europe" Contest and set up standard rules and regulations for entries in the festival. It seems that in every country, different rules and ways are used to decide the entry. Here in Germany, more and more people in the trade seem to think that this is a festival of the "better" class of music and only high class entries which have the chance to become "standards" or "evergreens" should be sent. Therefore the composers of the 12 songs which entered the finals of the German Pop Music festival last year were commissioned to write tunes and a so called trade jury was chosen to pick the entries. In Italy, the winner of the San Remo Festival was sent and in England, 6 writers wrote tunes for Kathy Kirby to sing. San Remo Fes Kirby to sing.

We do not personally know how other entries were picked. It seems that Austria just tells Udo Jurgens to write something for him to sing, which is not half bad as Udo is an absolute top talent. (See last week's story.) But shouldn't there be some standard way to pick the entries and shouldn't someone decide if this so called Chanson Festival is really there to find a standard, or a real hit to rack up plenty of coin? This writer personally doubts if any of the winners of past festivals have had songs which will last and last over the years, and would be very happy to see a song become number 1 all over Europe, with a chance to be a worldwide hit, even if it is a (nasty word) big beat number. Nevertheless, the festival continually comes up with one or two top notch tunes which do make the grade and sell plenty of records. Improvements through standardization could, however, help to make this European-wide festival a real treat to the public and a threat to the world market.

A&R man, publisher, songwriter Lotar Olias, who does production for Germany's number 1 seller, Freddy Quinn, has taken over production, for Polydor, of Lolita, who is best known for her international hit, "Sailor," a few seasons ago. It appears the Canadian action on the side, when it is released in this country on Gaiety by London, will equal the fantastic results Stateside. On the strength of the early reaction so far in the U.S., Jerry has had his record played on the Dick Clark coast to coaster, and is set to appear in person on such top rated T.V.'ers as "9th Street West," "Shivaree" and the new Dick Clark production, "Shebang." The song made its Cash Box Top 100 debut (3/27) with performer credit going to the Everly Bros. Jerry's sales action will shortly reach the degree that his outing on the song will soon be listed too.

Bryan Olney, top rated spinner on Kingston's CKWS, flashes the word that he's the co-writer of a tune that seems to be happening on the U.S. west coast. It's "While I'm Away" by the Four 'Em and is available in the U.S. on the Rollo label. A Canadian release is expected shortly. The deejay is enthusiastic in his support of Bobby Curtola's latest, "Mean Woman Blues." The Curtola side was a battle winner for five nights in a row, and according to Olney, will be the artist's biggest hit in that area since "Fortune Teller." He goes on to say that the Station's hockey team, the "No Stars" were recently honored by the City Council when that body passed a motion of appreciation and commendation for the team's activities in raising money for civic and district charities by playing to full house crowds in exhibition hockey matches.

Good action showing right across the country on the new Quality outing, "Me And You" by The Regents. Judges were top English instrumentalists, Sounds Incorporated, and the standard was so high that 3 UZ made a special award of £25 cash plus TV and recording contracts to another Melbourne instrumental group the Crickets. An hour and a half of the show was broadcast direct on 3 UZ from Festival Hall and was sponsored by Hoadley's Chocolates. Station deejays Don Lunn, Allan Lappan and Ken Sparkes co-compered the program. Police commended the behaviour of the enormous crowd saying that not one incident marred the night's show.

It looks as though the Righteous Brothers could have another big hit on their hands with "Bring Your Love To Me" which is from the newly released package on the Festival label titled "Shindig." The tune is in the true Righteous Bros. tradition and airplay on it is strong enough to warrant its release on a single.

A Nation Without Coins

The coin shortage problem which affects the country at large, and the coin machine and vending industry specifically, while in the news almost daily, has received little more than cursory discussion, which for the most part, has centered around the general causes of the shortage. It is difficult to discuss this issue in depth because there is a prior need for much background material on the subject. The coin shortage cannot be alleviated by minting large volumes of coins because the coins contain silver. And at the present rate of drain on the US Treasury's supply of silver, Government stock will be exhausted, not lessened to a great degree but completely exhausted, in less than ten years.

Furthermore, the world's silver supply cannot fulfill all of the demand for silver. It is possible that unless the present dilemma is met with decisive and final Congressional action in Washington, where study has been underway for almost one year, US coinage will become the world's cheapest source of supply for silver—literally worth more as a commodity than as a circulating coin.

The next step of course would be the melting pots. This then, is the "crisis" referred to in US Treasury circles. Add to this the solutions being offered by vested interests, the producers of silver (mining interests) and the users (photography, silverware, electrical circuits, industrials), and one begins to understand the billion-dollar reason why the "silver problem" is as old as pork barrel legislation itself.

Perhaps the only impartial report on the silver-coinage problem is available in a book entitled "A Nation Without Coins" published by Vantage Press in New York City. The authors, Charles R. Robinson and Charles B. Young, two young international economics and finance post-grads, present considerable research information on the subject. The 137-page book discusses the nature of the shortage in its first four chapters, with solutions (including their own) occupying the two remaining chapters.

The report makes for fascinating reading and should be a "must" for every industry figure who has represented the coin machine and vending industry, or who intends to speak for the industry in order to insure that Congressional action on this issue takes into consideration the impact certain decisions will have on more than six million machines equipped with coin mechanisms.

A history of silver's role as a monetary metal and its availability, reads like a tense drama. Certain proposed solutions highlight unbelievable statements made by high government officials and vested interests as well. Figures are presented which indicate that vast silver quantities have already been exported—forever. The authors call for action which must be final, politically feasible, devoid of individual profit at the expense of the public, and of course, leading to a guaranteed volume of coins to meet all future demands. The authors rate outside opinions in terms of "acceptable" to "absurd."

Silver producers stress the continued use of silver in coins but suggest lowering content thereby upholding tradition and prestige of the nation and also upholding the rising market price. Users call for removal of silver from coinage to strengthen supply.

The resultant coin which will be decided upon by the US Mint and Treasury, subject to Congressional approval, must meet certain coin machine and vending industry requirements before the 6 million machines can continue to function without costly and possibly disastrous repercussions.

Industry spokesmen are not necessarily campaigning for or against silver, as such. Retention of some silver, or, a coin made of a compatible alloy or laminate, will serve the industry's need.

To discuss the problem without having read "A Nation Without Coins," or an equally impartial report on the silver-coinage shortage, is to risk the creation of even greater problems.

Each row of "Flash-O-Matic" lights, according to Secore, is independent of the other rows. After completing (stopping) all five rows of lights the player then shoots for the Chicago Coin "Bonus Score." Actually, the player gets five shots at the lights in each frame. "Top Brass" has two frames (10 shots) to a game.

After the player finishes the shooting action in the first frame he starts all over again with similar shooting possibilities and action in the second frame.

all over again with similar shooting possibilities and action in the second frame.

"Top Brass," a single player amusement game, has been tested in numerous random locations around the country prior to its release to the international coin machine trade.

"We can certainly, and happily, report that 'Top Brass' will most assuredly be one of the biggest profit makers during this year," Secore asserted. "Our basis for this statement is shown here in these test collection reports on my desk.

"We can only attribute this unprecedented popularity among amusement game players in locations to the fact that it is a terrific skill shooting game, that offers the players many challenges to 'beat-the-game' in scoring," Secore added. "It actually challenges the skillful shooter's coordination."

There are no free plays or extended play features in "Top Brass." It has a two-speed motor in the back box which makes three to four revolutions

per minute.

Music Ops Set 6-Point Defense For Sub-Committee Hearings Apr. 28

WASHINGTON, DC—With hearings on Copyright Bills scheduled for April 28 by the House Subcommittee On Patents, Copyrights and Trademarks, the Music Operators of America took steps last week to support its defense against removal of the juke box operator exemption.

ator exemption.

The bill (HR 4347) will go before Chairman Edwin Willis (D-La) and his sub-committee for hearings, at which time it is expected that the secwhich time it is expected that the section pertaining to juke box exemption be singled out as it is in the form of Congressman Emanuel Celler's (D-NY) bill HR 18, and presented to the full Judiciary Committee. HR 18's proposed ruling is identical to Section 114 in HR 4347 which pertains to the juke box exemption. Music machine manufacturers were expected to hold meetings next week with attorneys to discuss strategy to be used at the hearings.

MOA asked members to write to Congressmen serving on the committee to stress these 6 points in their defense—license fees under the pres-

defense—license fees under the present ruling would be unlimited and penalties could be exorbitant; economic impact on the industry and the disruption of the industry's legal foundation; special interest factors as opposed to small businessmen making a living; performance of music on juke boxes as a "private" not a pub-

lic performance; the two-cents per side mechanical royalty now paid by ops; and proposal for increased mechanical royalties rather than a license fee—are the six points in brief.

The procedure for this legislation, if passed at each level of hearing, will move it from the Sub-Committee to the Full Judiciary, then to the Rules Committee (where the 1964 bill expired) then to the floor of Congress. Bill S. 1006, also introduced February 4, would follow similar steps in the Senate, but with closer study being devoted at hearings in the Congress. This year, the Rules Committee has a 21-day maximum time period in which to decide on proposed legislation which hinders "bottlenecks" from taking place while bills are in Rules.

SANTA MONICA, CALIF.—Harry Williams, the man who founded the Williams Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of pinball and novelty amusement machines, and a coin machine industry pioneer who has since sold his interests in the firm which today is owned by The Seeburg Corporation, is still very much in business.

Continuing to manufacture amusement machine equipment under the corporate name of Southland Engineering Inc.—where Williams turned out such successful coin-operated machines as the Southland "Little Pro," "Time Trials," and "Speedway" amusements—the veteran-inventor and sales exec has another "first" for the industry.

"For the first time in history, kids will be able to ride an authentic replica of a Santa Fe Diesel Engine, actually operating the ride by using a throttle which moves the ride back and forth along an eighteen foot strip of track. Signal lights flash, a bell starts ringing, and the child is transformed into playing the part of a Santa Fe engineer," stated Williams who is noted for his painstaking efforts to reproduce the complex of detail which makes for authenticity.

Williams told Cash Box that the

Williams told Cash Box that the Williams told Cash Box that the ride has been engineered and tested for over two years with patent protection on many of the key features. More than fifty "Kiddie Railroad" rides now draw high income on as many locations in Southern California. "The collections remind me of the good old days of the pinball machines," adds Williams.

Typical of a "Williams" produc-

tion, the "Kiddie Railroad" has a unique coin box which he claims is pilfer-proof with no visible lock. The multiple-coin mechanism accepts nickels, dimes and quarters and eliminates refunds since coins are returned when the circuit is off. Prices, incidentally, are also revolutionary. Kids get three round trips—back and forth along the aluminum platform—for ten cents. Nine round trips are offered for one quarter.

Williams attributes much of the early success of "Kiddie Railroad" to the fact that similar "rides" are available only in an amusement park where train rides are not coin-operated. "This is the very first time a child has had the opportunity to become an engineer," exclaimed Williams. Evidently the kids have taken to the oportunity.

"Even in the amusement parks, the kids have to sit behind the engine. I've put them in the cab—the driver's seat and they love it!" He said that many chain stores and other top-flight retail outlets who insist that rides meet rigid requirements and offer good potential, have accepted the ride for location. Promotional material advises locations to "meet your new cashier" with reference to the coin box. "Never gets sick, never takes vacations, coffee breaks, lunch hours.... or makes a mistake!"

"Kiddie Railroad" fits into any two-foot wide, eighteen-foot long strip of idle space and rests on an aluminum platform. After depositing coin, signals flash, bells ring and the child activates ride by pushing the throttle forward. The sound effects are not tape recordings, stated Williams. "Even NBC has asked me for permission to feature 'Kiddie Railroad' on one of their future color television programs," concluded Wil-







Reynolds Chief States Tobacco Industry's Case On Proposed Cig Labeling

WASHINGTON — Bowman Gray, chairman of the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. stated the position of the tobacco industry before the Senate Commerce Committee last Wed., concerning the proposed requirement to label cigarette packs as harmful to health. The essence of the industry's case, as Gray detailed it, would amount to losses which could be counted in lost income to farmers, lost billions in taxes and lost revenues to such dependent industries as cigarette advertising agencies. Gray further advised the committee of the industry's belief that cigarette smoking is not a cause of cancer and produced medical testimony which attacked the Surgeon General's Smoking and Health Report.

NYS Cig Ops To Vend At 40¢

NEW YORK—Cigaret operators in New York State were in a quandary last week following meetings in Long Island City (March 18) and Albany (March 23). Cigaret Merchandising Association leaders conducted the meets to discuss the increased nickel state sales tax per pack, effective April 1. With vended cigs selling at 35¢ and 40¢ per pack, the nickel tax rise actually should bring about a vended price of 42¢-43¢ per pack, to cover the increased cost of cigarets from the jobber. But the word from ops in the area last week was that the prices will not go to more than 40¢ in the 35¢ locations.

Prime reason for this move was viewed as lack of unanimous agreement by ops to vend at the 43¢ price and use pennying as the means. In addition, to pose further problems, ops are faced with a possible increase in City Sales Tax, and a State Sales Tax, plus \$25, \$15, and \$10 taxes on all music, amusement and vending machines. (CB March 27.)

Operators of about 50,000 machines were notified on March 22 of the procedure they must follow to comply with the 5-cent per pack tax increase. The announcement was made by State Tax Commissioner Joseph H. Murphy. All retailers, wholesalers and subjobbers handling tax-paid cigarettes
