DAYTONA USA 2001

Rolling Start! The arcade classic Daytona is back, now looking better than ever thanks to a console that's able to do the original justice. Daytona USA 2001 (ODM #19, 7/10) is a fast and frantic racer with colourful cars and perfectly designed courses.

In the demo you'll get to take the Hornet car out for a spin on the famous Three Seven Speedway circuit. Opt for a race against 39 other cars, or head to the Time Attack to try and record the fastest time.

There's a choice of manual or automatic gears, with manual giving you a slightly higher top speed. The stick-shift gears of the arcade are recreated on the Dreamcast pad with the A, B, X and Y buttons. If you find the handling too twitchy, simply hit the options menu and adjust the steering sensitivity. Ladies and gentlemen, start your engines!







18 WHEELER AMERICAN PRO TRUCKER

In case you missed this great demo last issue, here's another chance to sample Sega's big rig racer.

In this demo you have to haul cargo from New York to Key West before the timer reaches zero. Checkpoints along the way will put more seconds on the clock, plus you can smash into specially marked vehicles to bump up the time remaining.

Keep an eye out for a huge black truck that's trying to reach Key West before you. This speeding demon works for a rival haulage firm – if you reach the goal second your bosses will be angry, so do whatever it takes, including smashing through traffic and buildings to get to the destination before him.

It can take time to get these huge trucks up to speed — so try and position yourself behind another truck and use some clever slipstreaming to get your rig to motor along a bit faster. 18 Wheeler American Pro Trucker is reviewed on page 52.

If you've still got a light-gun from time spent with House of the Dead 2 (ODM #1, 9/10), here's the game you've been waiting for. Confidential Mission is a shooter set in the hitech world of international espionage. Terrorists have seized control of a top-secret spy satellite. The CMF (Confidential Mission Force) have traced the satellite to an archaeological museum, where the terrorists are believed to be hiding. Agents John Gibson and Jean Clifford have been dispatched to the museum to discover who has stolen the satellite.

Get your trigger finger ready if you're using a light-gun, or use a joypad or even a Dreamcast Mouse, and explore the museum disposing of the terrorists. For extra style, display justice by shooting the gun hand of any assailant.

The demo allows you to experience the opening half of the first mission. Enemies are marked with a lock-on timer that changes from blue to red as they prepare to shoot you. Make sure you shoot them before the timer runs out or you'll be hit. Also keep an eye out for extra objects that can be shot in the museum for bonus points. 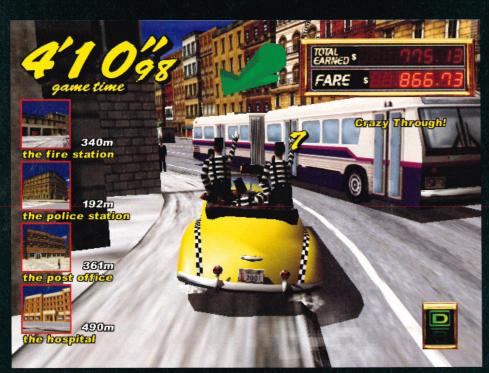


DUE OUT: JULY PUBLISHER: SEGA DEVELOPER: HITMAKER OU LOVE CRAZY TAXI. We know you do because it sold more copies last year in the UK than anything else released for Dreamcast. So we're guessing that you're chomping through joypad cables in anticipation for the sequel. Hold fast, because in a few short weeks it'll be all yours. In the meantime, sate your hunger with our exclusive first-play insight into the wacky yellow world of Crazy Taxi 2.

The original *Crazy Taxi* (*ODM* #5, 9/10) was the result of classic Sega game design thinking: look at the technology in hand, figure out what it can do that couldn't be done before, and then do that with it. *Outrun* and *Virtua Fighter* were both

born this way. Compared to Saturn and PlayStation, Dreamcast could move a lot more polygons, and paint vastly more texture maps on to them. So *Crazy Taxi* features a packed game world for you to play in – an open-plan street system with dozens of individual locations, roads crammed with traffic, and pedestrians leaping out of the way. It feels like you're driving through a living city.

Before starting on the sequel, Sega's Hitmaker development team opted for an 'if it ain't broken, don't fix it' approach for *Crazy Taxi 2*. So the handling and gameplay are basically the same as before, which means the game is still going to be one of the wildest rides in town. Monster power slides (Crazy



riangle A car full of passengers, and they all want to go to different places. You'd better step on it – after all, mime is money!



▶ Drifts), and frantic, turbo-charged races across town using Crazy Dashes, remain as hilarious and, well, crazy as ever. You still collect passengers and get them to their destinations as rapidly as possible, judging how big a job each is according to the coloured circles around their feet (green for long, red for short rides).

But while you love *Crazy Taxi*, more of *exactly* the same in its sequel would probably be a little disappointing. So what's changed? Well, the most obvious shift is that the action is moving from 'crazy' San Francisco to 'crazy' New York. As before, there are to be two distinct maps to crash about in, but whereas the second city in the original game was an 'Anywheresville', this time the approach is more considered.

START SPREADING THE NEWS

For the second *Taxi* game, New York has been split into Around Apple and Small Apple to create two different maps. The former is on a larger scale than the latter, basically, with outlying suburbs of the city to visit, and even a bridge over the Hudson river. The latter is a more concentrated take on the middle of town, with the world-famous Central Park and the Ferry Port both to be discovered. Neatly, though, there's an overlap between the two maps, so the same landmarks are featured on both. Also, look out for big real-life stores like HMV, the Hard Rock Café, Gap and Burger King, among others.

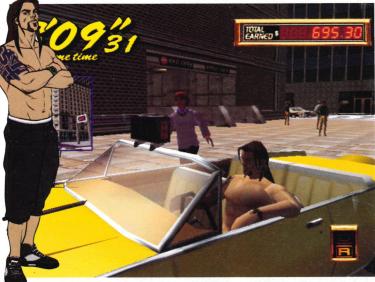
Curious to know more about the move to New York – and all the game's other features, naturally – we hooked up with *Crazy Taxi 2* producer, Kenji Kanno. With *Crazy Taxi* having such a rockin' American feel to it, whichever city the game was set in had to be in the USA. Being one of the most famous cities on the planet, the Big Apple was an obvious choice,

but it did present a few problems.
"San Francisco has naturally
interesting ups and downs," Kenji
explains. "But in New York –

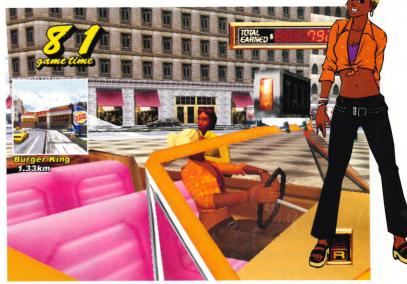
CRAZY FOOLS!

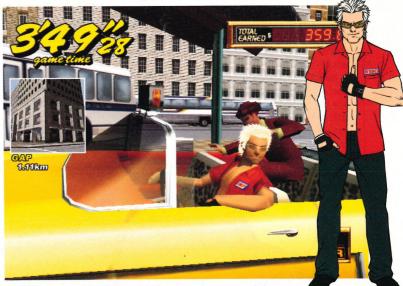

Of course, if you're going to encourage folks to drive around on the tops of buildings, you're going to have to give them a way of getting up

> there in the first place. Which is where one of Crazy Taxi 2's two big new additions comes into play - welcome to the wonderful world of the Crazy Hop. Simply tap the Y button and the cabs spring into the air like large, yellow mountain goats. Made of metal. Er...

"We added the Crazy Hop to let the player hop around the roofs of buildings to create short cuts," says Kenji. "But of course, if you don't time it right you could also lose a lot of time by smashing into the sides of buildings. And to do it right you have to learn the courses really well." While it sounds very odd, in play it feels totally natural as you bounce on to overhead freeways or sail on to rooftops. Every now and then there's a handily placed stack of boxes to smash through up there, as you do and hey, it all adds to the craziness of the action.

There's an obvious second use for the Crazy Hop. In the cross-town rush to get a passenger to their drop-off point in time, weaving in and out of the traffic isn't the only option. Now you can jump over it too, performing bonkers leaps over oncoming trucks and buses (you can bound over regular cars, too, but it's not quite so satisfying). The Crazy Hop is also another way of earning valuable extra tips from your enthusiastic passengers.

"When performing a Crazy Hop like this, you get extra tips from the passengers," Kenji explains, grinning from ear to ear. "But once the jump is started, you can't control the car in the air, so you'd better watch out where you're landing!" In other words, if you're not careful, you'll crash down on top of a lorry. Which is bad, as you might guess.



With Crazy Taxi 2's setting being the sprawling, skyscraperfilled metropolis that is New York, rather than the hilly, sunny San Francisco of the first game, something had to be done to allow the cabs a bit of air time. So... Hitmaker have decided to allow the sequel's cars to take off at will.

You might think that cars jumping as they do in Crazy Taxi 2 is a tad unrealistic. Aside from the fact that this is a videogame and can, therefore, be as goddamn unrealistic as Hitmaker want it to be, goddammit (angry pause for breath), you might be surprised to know that some cars actually can jump.

Invented in California, USA (hey, where else?), the lo-rider was born out of the popular custom car scene. Dreamed up by a group of customisers who wanted something just a little more out of the ordinary, lo-riders use a system of hydraulic rams to literally jump the cars off the ground. Flashy, cool, utterly useless, and

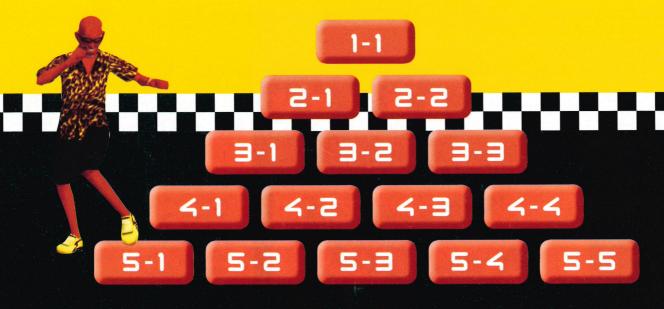

DRIVE LIKE AN EGYPTIAN

The Crazy Box mode added depth to the arcade antics of the first *Crazy Taxi*. This collection of mini-games (events which use the game in alternative ways, such as doing long jumps or bursting balloons with the cab), was a welcome diversion from collecting fares, and brought a new dimension to the game.

The mini-games have survived into *Crazy Taxi 2*, renamed and restructured as the Crazy Pyramid option. Whereas in the original game you had a grid of 16 challenges to work through, this time around that's been slightly refined to 15 which are arranged in the shape of – you guessed it – a pyramid. Once two next to each other on the grid have been completed, the one above is unlocked for play.

Another alteration to the mini-games is that, as each tier of the Crazy Pyramid is completed, a bonus item will be unlocked. The first two are pretty quick to get, and we've used them here — the Around Apple and Small Apple maps. Further up, unlocking a tier brings other rewards. We're not going to give the game away too much, but suffice to say there's more than one way to drive around New York in Crazy Taxi 2. And the top tier? Now that'd be telling... So, in the meantime, here are some examples the other four tiers.



△ 5-2: CRAZY GOLF This is one of the first you tackle and is bloody brilliant. Back up to allow for a decent run-up, knock into reverse then whack into forward and slam on the gas at the same time to perform a Crazy Dash. At the right moment, hit the Crazy Hop and belt the giant golf ball off into the blue yonder. Over to the right there's a hole with a flag, and we can't help but wonder if it's possible to get a hole-in-one.



△ 5-3: CRAZY HURDLE A time limit to beat, a straight section of road, and a number of giant hurdles spaced equally along its length. You've just got to make it to the end as quickly as possible by performing Crazy Dashes between each hurdle and timing your Crazy Hops to perfection. Push it a bit too hard and you'll miss a jump, meaning you smash through a hurdle and lose time. This one's very painful on the fingers.



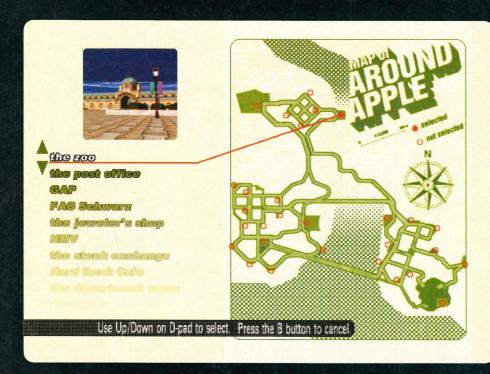
△ 4-1: CRAZY RAMPS With a lady in the back seat pointing which way to head, it might seem this challenge of hitting ramps to clear successive brick walls is a little on the simple side. Except that the ramps become narrower as you race nearer to the finishing point, and if you're on a mission to set a record time it becomes all too easy to overshoot and slam into the wall – especially if you've tried to fit in an extra Crazy Dash.



△ 3-2: CRAZY DROP Beating this baby is a real test of your Crazy Drift skills, as you spin the car down from one platform to another, over and over. Build up a decent speed and begin to turn and then flick the gears from forward to reverse and back again, and the taxi will begin to drift. Overdo it, though, and the car spins out and off the edge into that merciless gaming void marked 'Retry'. And you will. A lot.



△ 2-2: CRAZY ARCHES A set of giant curved platforms which have to be raced along and then jumped, ever so carefully, between. The further you reach along the route, the wider the gaps and the trickier the timing becomes. And the last one is cunningly sliced in half – the first time we made it, we shot straight over the edge. Aggravated? Let's just say our floorboards have new and interesting joypad-shaped marks in them...



AROUND APPLE

This is the large-scale version of New York featured in the game. Spanning a huge area (you can cross the Hudson river), Around Apple has everything from a downtown area to industrial sections to suburbs to parks for you to explore. Hopping up on to the freeways can take you across town in double-quick time, and there's plenty of rooftop short cuts to discover – some requiring a couple of well-timed Crazy Hops to clear.

Roam a little further and you'll find a Burger King, the University and the Botanical Gardens.

With final polishing of the game still taking place, it's a little early to pass judgements on some aspects, but the version of Around Apple we played was a little hard to navigate. Maybe we just need more time to really learn it properly — after all, we did drive round the original cities a zillion times.

▶ While the Hitmaker team making *Crazy Taxi 2* have tried to keep the frantic arcade gameplay of the first game alive and well in its sequel, Kenji admits that: "I suppose by adding the new jump function for the cars – the Crazy Hop – the maps might be a little more complex than in the first game." But hey, we have no objection to that as it should mean there's even more gameplay value to be had from the added depth.

Certainly, the way the Crazy Hop has affected the map design is fairly profound, with the short cuts changing how you think about playing the game. It's set to become more tactical. Rather than simply belting from A to B, you're aware that there's often an alternative – and quicker – way to find B. The only problem with this, as things stand, is that the big direction arrow seems to become confused by the free-roaming nature of *Crazy Taxi 2*, often flipping between opposite directions as you race around. Kenji promises that this glitch will be ironed out in time for the release of the final game, though.

Although New York is naturally less funky than San Francisco (it's not as sunny for starters), the development team have tried to keep *Crazy Taxi 2* looking as fresh as ever. "The graphic style is the same," reckons Kenji. "But we had to think a lot about being efficient with the graphics because the maps are more complicated." Overall, it's surprising how well the impression of being in a high-rise, grey-toned city has survived the *Crazy Taxi* treatment.

Also familiar to fans of the game (i.e. everyone), will be the crunchy pop-punk guitar noises provided once again by The Offspring, with Methods of Mayhem providing musical support. With tunes this raucous to drive to, it's no wonder the game is crazy – it already sounds like a car crash waiting to happen. So it fits

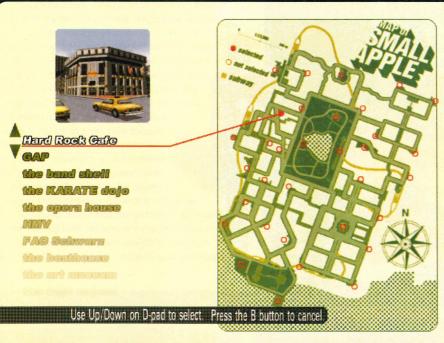

pretty well, as you can imagine. Retrying the bonus games over and over (as you will do) is likely to lead to some of the music starting to grate, but even the Carpenters would have that effect after 60 resets.

CAN YOU TAKE FIVE, MATE?

Another important gameplay change being implemented in *Crazy Taxi 2*, is the ability to pick up groups of up to four passengers and take them to four different destinations (see 'Room for a couple more?' for, uh, more). As with the Crazy

Driving around Small Apple could have been taking a trip into a marketing department's dream videogame world, as the in-game shops have been licensed with actual brands. Oddly, while there's an HMV and Hard Rock Café, it's not quite the whirlwind of logos it could have been – c'mon Sega, get those marketing bucks flowing in! But there's plenty more to see.

Taking a cruise through Central Park, down to the shoreline, reveals a heliport and ferry port. Uptown there are the police and fire stations, plus a tighter section that's lit differently to give a sense of moving into a different district. Stick in the middle of town and there's a pile of fun fares to wade through, especially if you collect one of the four-passenger groups and ping between drop-off points.

Right now, of the two maps, Small Apple is our favourite, mostly because it has more distinct features to help you keep a sense of direction. And, if you fancy something a little different, there are the subway stations to keep you entertained – turn down the steps and race along the tracks to the next stop. Just watch out for passing trains...

Importantly, our first impression is that having multiple passengers will definitely increase the lifespan of *Crazy Taxi 2*, due to the way it makes you really think about which person to drop off first.

Also heavily revamped is the selection of additional mini-games, called Crazy Box in the first game and now titled Crazy Pyramid (see 'Drive like an Egyptian'). The cabbies and cabs are all new too (see 'Crazy fools!'), and there's a few hidden extras to be discovered. But we're not going to give them away at this point, because we don't like spoiling surprises. Nice people.

So, on first impressions, it's very clear that if *Crazy Taxi* was the biggest Dreamcast game of 2000, then *Crazy Taxi 2* is set to make a pretty massive impact in 2001. Because while in some respects it's going to be more of the same (which isn't a bad thing to be considering how cool the first game was), in lots of others it's a bright and shiny new star in its own right. The Crazy Hop

and the multiple passenger additions, coupled with two packed brand-new maps to explore and learn, mean that there's set to be lots more entertainment in the package. To put it simply: you loved the first one, and we reckon that you're going to love this one

too. We'll be finding out how well it all comes together when we review the final game in the next issue of *Official Dreamcast Magazine*, on sale Thursday 21 June.

ROOM FOR A COUPLE MORE?

The ability to pick up more than one passenger is one of the biggest gameplay changes in *Crazy Taxi 2*. When you're driving around looking for normal fares to pick up, the people are surrounded by either red, orange, yellow or green markers, denoting how far you'll have to drive them. You can now also look for the multi-passenger rides, which are highlighted with blue markers.

Once collected, the usual tip that's rewarded for every Crazy Through (narrowly avoiding other traffic), Crazy Drift or Crazy Hop is multiplied by the number of passengers. Play well and the cash will rack up, but the time to deliver the passengers is pretty damn short. So get weaving!

You can drop them off in any order, although you 'll have to get to know the cities like the back of your hand. And, as producer Kenji Kanno explains, "When you drop one person off, you only get three times the money. Thinking about which one you drop off first can make a big difference to your earnings."

ALL THE ANGLES

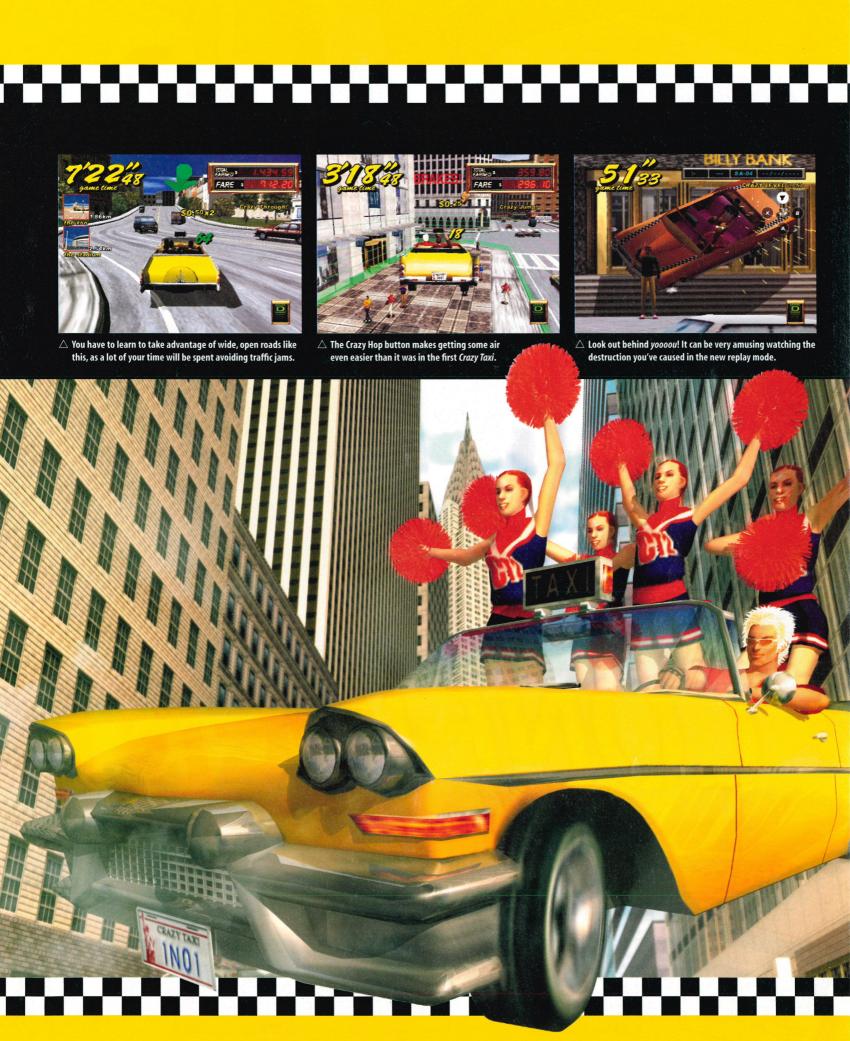
Another new feature in *Crazy Taxi 2* is the ability to save replays of top performances in the Crazy Pyramid, or even record yourself racing around one of the two main city levels and watch it back later. In the version we played some of the camera settings seemed a little screwy — one appeared to be set up 50 feet underground — but once this is sorted it should make a neat addition for all the show-offs out there.

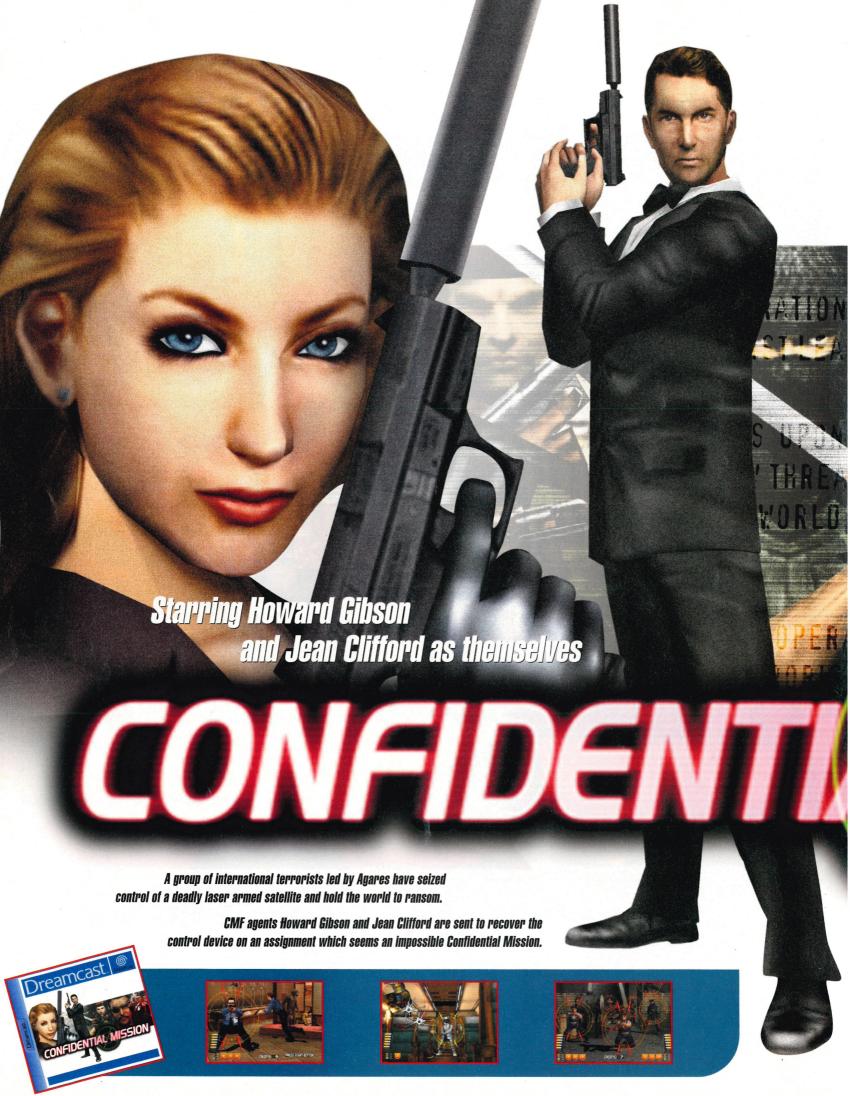
Another of the camera views is one of the old cheat cameras from the first *Taxi* game, from in-car, through the windscreen. Whether you'll be able to use this extra camera setting, and others, while actually playing *Crazy Taxi* 2 isn't clear right now. But they weren't a lot of use anyway – we could never see where we were headed!

WE DON'T BE-LEEM IT!

Hit PlayStation racer Gran Turismo 2 is now playable on Dreamcast

BLEEM!, THE EMULATION SOFTWARE that enables games designed for PlayStation to run on Dreamcast consoles has finally been released. The first title to be made Dreamcast compatible is *Gran Turismo 2*.

As reported in our July issue (ODM #9), Bleem! was originally designed to offer wider PlayStation compatibility, with each of the four proposed 'Bleempaks' able to support up to 100 titles, effectively making nearly the entire PlayStation software library Dreamcast compatible. The new strategy concentrates on releasing lower cost discs that will each run a single game.

Due to some unexpected technical difficulties in getting 100 titles at a time running smoothly on the Dreamcast, the decision was made to concentrate bleem's efforts at offering perfect emulation of the PlayStation's biggest titles. "We decided 'so what if we can't get 100 games working?;" said David Herpolsheimer, president and CEO of Bleem! "If we can

give Dreamcast gamers a blockbuster title that's never been available for anything but the PlayStation, and make it look better than anyone's ever seen it before – why shouldn't we go for it?"

"By approaching each game individually, we're able to tweak and tune each Bleem! to offer visual enhancements that just wouldn't be possible with a more generic solution," said Randy Linden, chief technical officer and the creator of Bleem! "Gran Turismo 2 running with Bleem! feels and plays like it was custom-written for Dreamcast – you'd never guess that the game software is speaking a totally different language, indeed for a totally different machine."

Besides graphic enhancements, including increased resolution, filtering and anti-aliasing (see the screenshots for proof), *Bleem!* also offers compatibility with analogue controllers and steering wheels, VGA, vibration and VM support for game saves. They've

even been so good as to add full-screen PAL support for us European gamers.

Bleem! should already be on European shelves by the time you read this. The company have sorted a European distribution deal that sees the Bleem! disc released in the UK for only £5.95. But remember – you need to have a copy of Gran Turismo 2 (available for under £20 in most places now) in addition to the Bleem! disc if you want to play it.

So what titles can we expect to see get the *Bleem!* treatment next? "We've narrowed our list down to a handful of very popular titles," said Will Kempe, vice president of Bleem! "We're unsure right now, but possibly *Metal Gear Solid, Spyro the Dragon, Tekken 3* and the *Final Fantasy* games."

We'll keep you updated as soon as any further *Bleem!* discs are announced and will test the finished *Gran Turismo* 2 disc in full in the next issue of *Offical Dreamcast Magazine*, on sale Thursday 21 June.

XICAT'LL DO NICELY

European releases confirmed for Coaster Works and co.

PUBLISHERS XICAT Interactive have secured a distribution deal with THQ that will see the company's four Dreamcast titles released over the coming months.

As previously reported in our February issue (*ODM* #16), Xicat have four titles ready for release: *Coaster Works, Iron Aces, Carrier* and *Charge 'N' Blast*. The only factor holding up their release was finding a European distributor.

Step forward THQ, publishers of WWF Royal Rumble (ODM #12, 7/10) and the forthcoming Evil Dead: Hail to the King. The US company have agreed to distribute Xicat's titles throughout Europe. We'll bring you full reviews of these titles in future issues of ODM.

PHANTASTIC FURORE

As America is promised the Phantasy Star Online add-on disc, Europe must still wait

DESPITE CLAIMS FROM SEGA that the add-on disc for *Phantasy Star Online (ODM #17, 9/10)*, would only be released in Japan, movement is being made on making the title a worldwide release, with Sega of America announcing that they'll release the add-on too.

A European release however is still an uncertainty. "Since we announced that *Phantasy Star Online Ver. 2* would not be coming to Europe we have been inundated with fans of the series asking us to bring it out," said Stuart Turner, PR Manager for Sega Europe. "While it is not guaranteed a release, we will be sitting down with Sonic Team to discuss plans."

What we can gather from various sources is that Sega Europe are unsure whether *Phantasy Star's* fans would be willing to pay full-price for, effectively, the same game again with added levels and features. However, from Sega's above statement, it's pretty clear that some fans would certainly pay anything to spend more time with *Phantasy Star Online*.

There is also a question mark over when a European version of the add-on disc would be available for release. The fact that localisation could push a possible release date to the latter half of the year, means the add-on would be released only months before the true sequel to Phantasy Star Online is scheduled to arrive. The current thinking within Sega is that this would deter potential purchasers from buying the add-on, as fans would be inclined to save their money for the sequel instead.

In addition to fixing some minor bugs, *Phantasy Star Online Ver. 2* also offers two new levels: Shrine and Spaceship, along with new modes including player battles, capture the flag and 12-player football. The addon also introduces new beasts, weapons, costumes, Mags and allows characters to grow beyond the current level 100 limit all the way up to level 200.

BLEEMIN' HECK!

So Bleem! has finally arrived, allowing Dreamcast owners to experience Gran Turismo 2 in a whole new light. Not before time, too. When the product was originally announced early last year there was the promise of being able to run nearly every game available on PlayStation on your Dreamcast.

The trouble with such an audacious claim is that there's only a handful of PlayStation titles that most people are interested in anyway. Bleem! figured this out after numerous requests from the public indicating the in-demand titles.

Bleem! visited our offices last summer with an early version of their more universal emulator. Although impressive that so many PlayStation titles would eventually be playable on Dreamcast using it, the system was not without its faults. Yes, the PlayStation titles that were demonstrated to us did look better than when running on PlayStation, but they also sported the original flaws.

If a title was coded poorly in the first place, with a large number of texture glitches that are so commonplace in the majority of PlayStation releases, those same texture glitches were present in the emulated Dreamcast version, albeit with a slightly anti-aliased edge and higher resolution. The bottom line is bad games still looked bad.

Trying to emulate 'perfectly' 100 titles at a time means the end result will be a mixture of some titles that run well and some that don't. Anybody who's tried to get old Spectrum or arcade emulators working on a PC can tell you this.

The universal approach, although possible, just doesn't give you good results. It's a triumph of programming, although what Bleem! have realised is that people don't want to marvel at programming skills, but to marvel at the actual games.

The new idea for *Bleem!* is simple: concentrate on the titles that people really want to play. The end result is like playing direct ports of PlayStation's biggest hits as if they were designed specifically for Dreamcast. The new strategy really is a better deal — not only is the emulated game running at optimum levels, it retails for a lot less too.

Gran Turismo 2 running on the DC is just the first of a series of planned releases from Bleem!. With Dreamcast's days numbered by Sega themselves, it's somewhat ironic that PlayStation titles could play such a big part in the console's future.

Now if only Bleem! could work on getting ISS Pro Evolution 2 running on the Dreamcast, they'd make a lot of people very happy – myself included.

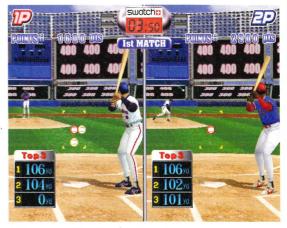

EGA'S PLATFORM ADVENTURES

Development for Xbox and Gamecube confirmed as Sega continue to spread it about

AFTER ALREADY REVEALING SOFTWARE support for Sony's PlayStation 2 (ODM #18), Sega used the spring Tokyo Game Show to confirm development plans for Microsoft's forthcoming Xbox console and Nintendo's Gamecube.

Sega announced that they currently have 11 titles scheduled to appear on Xbox. Four of these were confirmed at the show, including the Sega Saturn heavyweight Panzer Dragoon!

Other titles announced include a sequel to Sega GT (ODM #15, 5/10), an Xbox version of Jet Set Radio (ODM #14, 8/10) and Gun Valkyrie. This futuristic shooter was originally announced for Dreamcast last year at Sega's Première event (ODM #13). Unfortunately the Dreamcast version could now be doomed, although Sega have since commented that "the possibility of a [Dreamcast] port has not been ruled out."

The biggest shock for long-time Sega fans is the announcement of Panzer Dragoon for Xbox. Although never confirmed for Dreamcast, rumours of a seguel have been around since the Dreamcast was originally revealed. However, a statement from Sega and Microsoft at the show claiming "Xbox owners will be the first to return to the stunning world of Panzer Dragoon," indicates that Xbox won't be the only console to receive the title.

"We believe that Microsoft will be very successful with Xbox," said Peter Moore, president and COO of Sega America. "Our world-renowned development studios have been very impressed with the Xbox hardware and they are excited to bring new gaming experiences to

consumers by utilising the

platform's power."



As multi-platform developers, Sega have been equally impressed with another platform this month, confirming the company's interest in Nintendo's Gamecube.

Sega revealed that Sonic Team, AM2 and Amusement Vision have been working on software for Nintendo's forthcoming console since last autumn. The three teams have been responsible for some of Dreamcast's biggest hits, with Sonic Adventure (ODM #0, 9/10), Phantasy Star Online (ODM #17, 9/10) and Shenmue (ODM #14, 10/10) listed among

their accomplishments.

"Sega really understands what Nintendo is about and where we're headed," said Hiroshi Yamauchi, president of Nintendo. "We've made progress in our relationship and Sega plans to aggressively support Gamecube and Game Boy Advance."

A statement from Sega Europe re-emphasises the decision to develop on these new platforms. "No other publisher comes close to Sega's software heritage across home and arcade platforms. The recent Xbox and Gamecube announcements show our true intentions of becoming the world's number one games publisher across all platforms.

"While we understand that some Dreamcast owners may be upset that we have decided to stop making hardware, we hope they understand that it was a very difficult decision. Sega had to pull out of the hardware business to concentrate on making great games. It is a necessary restructuring which will retain Sega's position as the major innovator within the interactive entertainment industry."

According to Tetsu Kayama, Sega Of Japan's COO, the company currently has 118 games in development for release in the next 12 months - 65 of these on

> Dreamcast. The remaining 63 are divided over PlayStation 2, Gamecube and Xbox.

According to Kayama, more titles will be announced very shortly.

All eyes will be on the E3 trade show in Los Angeles for the latest software announcements. We'll bring you full details in next month's Official Dreamcast Magazine, on sale Thursday 21 June.

"Due to circumstances beyond our control. circumstances that I am not at liberty to divulge, Unreal Tournament will no longer have online multiplayer capabilities," a spokesperson for Infogrames informed us. 'The only remaining multiplayer aspect of the game will be two-to-four player split-screen." We'll have a full review of the finished product next month.

ERT, DRINK, SEGA

Sega have joined forces with Wacky Warehouse play areas nation-wide, allowing visitors to sample the latest Sega games weeks before they're available in the shops. All 96 branches of Wacky Warehouse will be home to Dreamcast pods playing the latest software. Sega have also entered into a partnership with Sports Café at their London, Birmingham and Cardiff sites. Sega's biggest titles will be launched at the cafes over the coming months and free gifts and merchandise will be given to customers.

MORE SUPER BOUTS

Capcom have revealed they're working on an update and sequel to Capcom Vs SNK (ODM #15, 8/10). The arcade update Capcom Vs SNK: Millennium Fight 2000 Pro introduces two more characters: SNK's Joe Higashi and Capcom's Dan Hibiki. Meanwhile, Capcom Vs SNK 2 is expected to add both Joe and Dan, plus Yun from Street Fighter III, Haohmaru from Samurai Showdown, Kyosuke from Rival Schools and Athena from King of Fighters. There's no confirmed UK release date for either title yet.



LARA'S BOTTLED UP

Lucozade, the energy drink promoted by Tomb Raider's Lara Croft, will receive a name change this summer to tie in with the release of the Tomb Raider movie. Bottles of 'Larazade' will feature a competition to win a visit to Lara's home, 'Croft Manor', and the chance to win one of five special edition Land Rovers, as featured in the movie.

AM2's online aerial combat title Propeller Head has undergone a name change. We had hoped to bring you more info on the browser disc this month, but unfortunately Sega Europe have yet to finalise their plans for the update.

SHENMUE 11 UPDATE

Another look at the eagerly anticipated Shenmue II. This month, Yu Suzuki shows off to the public

FOLLOWING LAST ISSUE'S report (ODM #19) on the gambling that will be present in Shenmue II, this month we've received proof with some mouth-watering screenshots of Ryo involved in an arm-wrestling contest and trying to make money by predicting what number dice will land on when thrown.

Yu Suzuki, head of AM2, was at Sega's April GameJam festival in Japan, to demonstrate some of the new features of the sequel to an attentive crowd. Suzuki confirmed that the small toys that can be collected in the original Shenmue could generate money by being sold to collectors. You can view the toys Ryo already has in a handy menu, with information also present of what figures are missing to complete a collection and how much it's worth.

The dart skills that you may have perfected in Shenmue can also be put to use in the sequel. Suzuki demonstrated this by

guiding Ryo to a bar and challenging an Italian character to a quick round of darts.

Indeed, the sequel appears to be far more interactive than before. When talking to another character, you will be presented with choices of what to say and different topics of conversation. Sega claim that Shenmue II is four times the size of the original and contains over 1,000 individual characters that Ryo can meet.

It also seems that Ryo can die in the sequel. In a Quick Timer Event (QTE) that Yu Suzuki demonstrated, Ryo has to cross a series of narrow bridges. If you slip, you're given a chance to redeem yourself in another QTE. However, if you fail here, Ryo falls to his death. QTE's appear to be more complicated in Shenmue II and also much less forgiving.

If rumours are to be believed, Shenmue II is currently around 80 per cent complete. We asked Sega if they could confirm the figure. "It's there or thereabouts," said Stuart Turner, PR manager for Sega Europe. "There is however still a long way to go yet, but we're hopeful it will appear around Christmas time." Fingers crossed they keep to the plan.

It's Virtua Tennis in space! Arcade oddity heads to Dreamcast

DEVELOPERS SEGA ROSSO (formerly AM5) have confirmed that the experimental arcade title Cosmic Smash will be released on Dreamcast in the summer.

Playing like a cross between Tetris and squash, Cosmic Smash is a futuristic sports title where you must remove blocks from a cubed environment within the allotted time.

Blocks are removed when hit by a ball that is thrown at them from the base of the cube. The cubed arena allows you to bounce the ball off walls to reach the target, an element that is vital in later levels where you must negotiate moving barriers that protect the blocks.

A trick smash increases the destructive power of the ball, enabling you to complete the levels faster – removing blocks that usually require multiple hits to be removed - although using this method makes the remaining time decrease at a quicker rate.

Originally thought too obscure for release

on console, the makers of Sega Rally 2 (ODM #1,8/10) and EA Sports' NASCAR Arcade (ODM #14) have since decided otherwise. Hopefully Cosmic Smash will receive a warmer welcome in homes than in the arcade.

Currently only scheduled for a Japanese release, we asked Sega Europe if there are any plans to release Cosmic Smash in Europe. "It's certainly a possibility," a Sega spokesperson told us. Watch this space.

He fought the law and... he won. Now ALEX HUHTALA makes like Evel Knievel

TEAR THROUGH A CITY on a motorbike in an illegal street race while being chased by the cops. It's not the most original idea for a game ever, or the most cerebrally challenging, but who cares if it's fun?

Wild Riders is arcade crack, giving you a riotously good time, but making you thirsty for more. It looks and sounds fantastic, so it'll give your sensory skills a tease, too.

But surprisingly, it's initially quite disappointing. Wild Riders is one of the first titles to take advantage of Sega's new Naomi 2 arcade board, but your first impression will probably be 'so what?' You tell yourself, "This is Naomi 2, it should look better than this".

But take a closer look – dare we say it, the original Naomi board (effectively a Dreamcast) would have a hard time keeping up with this level of action.



On first impressions, Wild Riders is an anticlimax. But persevere – it's worth it!

Wild Riders looks like Crazy Taxi (ODM #5, 9/10) crossed with Jet Set Radio (ODM #14, 8/10), two titles that Dreamcast threw at you with seemingly relative ease. Like Jet Set, Wild Riders has a cartoon style, but it's a comic-book look as opposed to Jet Set's animé/graffiti inspiration. Then there's the city you hurtle through – similar to Crazy Taxi's small yet varied recreation of San Francisco. Wild Riders' city is fictitious, but made up of distinct areas, including a brief homage to 8-bit classic 3D Deathchase – you are on a bike after all.

The attract sequence indicates the comic book theme – an illustrator pencils the main characters, who are then brought magically to life. The unique look allows the Naomi 2 board to really show off its muscle - at key moments in the action, you're made to jump bridges or slide under police barricades. Comic book panels pop up in the corners of the screen, showing you multiple viewpoints of the set piece. It's a bit like a Jackie Chan movie, where his death-defying antics are shown multiple times from different angles - not for the sake of story but purely for spectacle. Wild Riders achieves the same feat. These popup panels don't stop your momentum they're peripheral to the main action that is still in progress, plus it looks good.

But before you play, you must choose your character: Keith 'Blue Storm' Raven or Trish 'Speed Angel' Moon. One's a guy, the other's a girl, but there doesn't seem to be any real difference in their abilities. Maybe one can jump a bit further or go a little faster, but it's difficult to tell once

you're caught up in the action.

At regular intervals you're asked to perform daring stunts. Push forward on the handlebars to make the bike slide along the floor, enabling you to duck under parked trucks, barricades, fallen trees and whatever else is thrown at you. Or pull back on the handlebars to jump over bridges, trains, or use a swimming pool springboard to launch yourself into the air.

These stunts increase the gap between you and the police. If the distance between you and the cops falls to zero, the game ends. There are no checkpoints or time extensions or even seconds remaining to reach the end of a level. There aren't levels either – just one large city with a goal to reach and nothing else. Keep a safe distance from the cops and you'll reach the end, no sweat.

However, miss a stunt, hit traffic or take a corner badly and the police will utilise your mistakes and hover about your tail. If the distance between you and the pack falls below ten metres it makes for some nail-biting moments, except you won't be able to bite your nails, as your hands will be firmly planted on the handlebars.

Wild Riders is a real arcade treat. It may not be initially appealing, or indeed difficult to complete, but play it – we think you'll like what's on offer.

DESPITE REPORTS ON THE Internet to the contrary, we can reveal that Mat Hoffman's Pro BMX is still headed our way.

Excited? Mat Hoffman's Pro BMX should have fans of Tony Hawk's Pro Skater 2 (ODM #15, 9/10) salivating. Designed using the same game engine as Tony Hawk's, Mat Hoffman's features one major change – BMX bikes instead of skateboards. Nearly everything else promises to be just as good as what made both Tony Hawk titles such fun.

Like Tony, Mat Hoffman is a legend in his field, the current and ten-time BMX World Champion and inventor of the majority of vert tricks seen today. He is the greatest vert-ramp rider in the history of the sport - a fact that is uncontested among his peers.

Joining him in his game are seven of the sport's hottest riders: Cory Nastazio, Simon Tabron, Dennis McCoy, Kevin Robinson, Rick Thorne, Mike 'Rooftop' Escamilla and Joe 'Butcher' Kowalski. Each of the riders

chosen completed the 2000 season in the top ten in their fields, dirt stunt riding, vert and street respectively.

Mat Hoffman's Pro BMX is structured almost identically to Tony Hawk's, with a similar career mode where you must perfect tricks and complete challenges to unlock new courses and upgrade your bike and riders' abilities. There are also two-player H-O-R-S-E, Demolition Derby and Graffiti modes.

Activision, publishers of Mat Hoffman's Pro BMX have revealed that development is continuing on the title by announcing the soundtrack that will accompany the action. Outkast, Pennywise, Jurassic 5, Bad Brains, Fluke, B-52's and Stone Roses Vs Grooverider are among the bands featured.

"The team is still planning on releasing the game," said a spokesperson for Activision. "Our priority is currently the PlayStation version and to get that out first. The Dreamcast version is due in September."

Although we still haven't seen screenshots of a Dreamcast version, we've been told to expect them soon. Having sampled the PlayStation version, we certainly hope they materialise sooner rather than later.

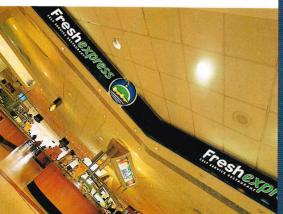

THE GIGANTIC STEERING WHEEL and satisfyingly loud airhorn have ensured 18 Wheeler American Pro Trucker's popularity in the arcades and, as you no doubt are aware, the Dreamcast version is out this month (see page 52 for a full review). While the racing element is obviously a big part of the game - and real-life trucking if our journey up the M6 was anything to go by - there are also the parking challenges and other tests of articulated driving skill."Wouldn't it be great to get some real truckers having a go?" we thought. So we packed up our demo unit and headed for a gen-u-ine greasy-spoon transport caff where we thought we would be sure to find some real-world experts.

But fate was against us; as we quickly discovered, trucker's caffs are strange places with extremely moody owners (or at least the ones we visited were) and we were firmly told that we weren't setting our pod up for love nor money. It was real "You ain't from round here, boy" stuff, but undeterred we headed for a more mainstream service station where we found a warmer welcome and plenty of takers ready to demonstrate their rig driving skills for us,

The long-abandoned online mode was missed by a few but people were soon piloting the giant rigs around with considerable aplomb and a few respondents claimed a new found respect for the skills of the real-world truckers out there, especially when it came to the reversing challenges.

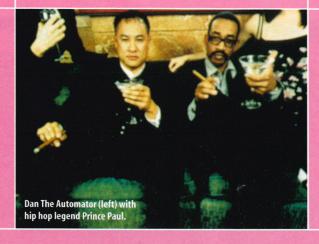

AS A PRODUCER AND remixer, Dan 'The Automator' Nakamura's CV is nothing if not diverse. Best known currently for his work with Blur's Damon Albarn on the 'fictional' band Gorillaz, he's worked alongside hip hop legend Prince Paul and trashy punk bluesmen The Jon Spencer Blues Explosion among others. Currently in the studio with Rage Against The Machine's ex-frontman Zack De La Rocha, he took time out to talk to us about his passion for all things Dreamcast-related and another of his projects – remixing Ulala's Space Channel 5 theme tune.

So why *Space Channel 5?* "Tommy Boy [the hip hop label] had acquired the project," says Dan. "So they offered it to me because I'm a big Dreamcast fan – this is my big pitch for anyone to send me free stuff by the way – and I liked the idea." With so many projects and side projects on the go, choosing can be a difficult process. For Dan, it's all a question of priority. "I work on projects that interest me," he says. "I want to work with people who I enjoy being around and have good creative ideas and imaginations."

Hence Gorillaz and working alongside Damon Albarn, Dan's highest profile work since the Handsome Boy Modelling School album he recorded with Prince Paul and a record which has opened

many doors. "I hope to be able to take my sound into new avenues as the Gorillaz have exposed it to new people," explains Dan. "The band is unique and because of this, we – that is Damon and myself – can try new things and take new chances." To that end the game plan seems to be to keep it varied, something which has served him well up to this point. "I've been around the world," he says, "and my various adventures have given me different views on music and life. My future projects will hopefully reflect what I've learned."

Worryingly, considering his chosen profession, Dan claims his lack of rhythm has hampered his efforts at actually playing *Space*. *Channel 5*, although not his enthusiasm. "It's really good fun, except for the fact that I lack the proper timing and/or co-ordination to be any good at it!" he claims. "I think *Crazy Taxi* is the best videogame I've played in years, though. I used to go to the arcade to play it and I bought my Dreamcast for that." *Shenmue* also gets the Automator seal of approval. "It is just incredible in the technological sense. I don't have the opportunity to play all the time, so I'm not getting any better at it, but that's all part of the fun."

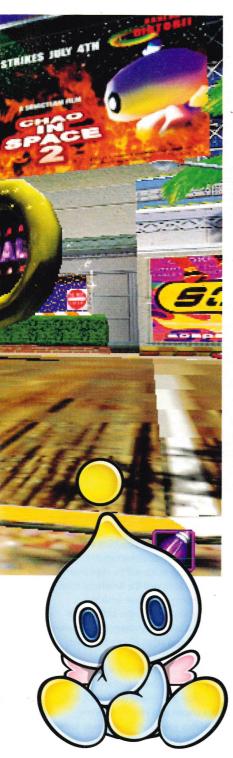
IT'S BEEN ALMOST TEN years since Sonic the Hedgehog first rolled on to the scene. In that time he's starred in some of the most popular videogames of all time, and become the world-famous mascot for his parent company, Sega. And, with his first Dreamcast title, Sonic Adventure (ODM #0, 9/10), being the best-selling game yet released on the console, anticipation of the top-secret sequel is reaching fever pitch.

Part of the reason so little has been revealed of Sonic Adventure 2 yet is that it's set for release all across the world on the same day - Saturday 23 June, Sonic's tenth birthday. Gamers in Japan, so often treated to information on big games long before we are in the UK, are in exactly the same boat as us - they've seen practically nothing. Until now, that is, as Official Dreamcast Magazine were recently treated to a world-exclusive playtest of the near-finished game.

The first thing to know about Sonic Adventure 2 is that it's all about light and dark, good and evil, yin and yang.

"The initial, and most striking positive change," Mat Quaeck, European Product Manager at Sega told us, "is the two game modes, Hero and Dark, which lend themselves to a more intriguing storyline and a longer, more exciting game-playing experience."

When you start a single-player game you'll be given this choice - do you go for Hero, and be the good guy, or Dark, and be baaaad? Each choice will follow the antics of three main characters, showing how all their paths cross, and



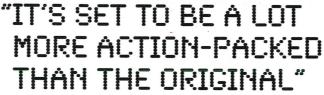
how they all have corresponding opposites on the other side. Knuckles, for example, has a rival in the form of Rouge, a female bat (the flying kind...) who has a passion for stealing gems – particularly the Master Emerald, of which Knuckles is the guardian. Miles 'Tails' Prower, with his home-made transforming biplane, is the sworn enemy of Dr Eggman who, in one of his own robotic contraptions, is out to track down and capture one of his grandfather's top secret experimentsgone-walkabout. This genetic creation

is a hedgehog which calls itself 'The Ultimate Lifeform', known to us as Shadow, who is out to avenge the death of his creator's beloved niece.

Story-wise it's a big departure from Sonic games' usual 'save the bunnies and collect rings' theme, but the action is just as fast-paced and thrilling as ever. In fact, it's set to be a whole lot more action-packed than the original Sonic Adventure, as all of the slowmoving exploration stages have been dropped for the sequel.

"It's nice to see that this game's done away with the adventure parts of the first Sonic Adventure," Mat explained, "with all levels now divided up into action stages for a more thrilling adventure." Depending on whether you play the Hero or Dark game, you'll work through a series of all-out action stages, automatically taking control of a different character depending on the next level.

One minute you might be racing along rollercoaster-like roadways, the next searching for buried treasure in the desert, then invading a heavily guarded prison in a gun-toting robot suit. This means more variety as you play through the game, plus it leads to a more engaging storyline. There are going to be a lot more action stages to play through than in the original *Sonic Adventure* as well, immediately making the game far bigger. But, on top of providing more levels than before, developers Sonic Team are also adding lots to keep you coming back again and again.

BACK ONCE AGAIN

As with the first Sonic Adventure, you'll be able to re-play any of the action stages you've already completed in the main story mode. Each one of these action stages will have five different missions to complete in order, each one

as you complete the one before it. For example, the first time you play on Sonic's first level, Highway Escape, your mission will simply be to make it to the end in one piece. But then choose to play the second mission and you'll be told to get a hundred rings. Collect those in a quick enough time to get a good ranking, and you'll be able to try a third mission where you have to search for a cute little Chao hidden somewhere in the level. And so on. With five of these missions on each action stage for all of the characters, as well as a number of different rankings available depending on how well you do, there's definitely going to be a lot of scope for replaying every part of the game.

The fun 'virtual pet' aspect of *Sonic Adventure* is also returning, with a lot more substance than it had before.

If you can manage to collect the Chao Key hidden in a level, you'll be able to visit the all-new Chao Garden when you finish the stage. Here's where you'll get to raise and look after Chao, feeding them fruit from the trees, playing with them, and changing their appearance by cross-breeding them with little animals found hidden around the action stages. By also improving their abilities with glowing coloured rods found in defeated enemies, and their personalities with the amount of love and attention you give them, they'll evolve into completely different types of Chao. Fitting in with the light and dark theme of the game, you'll be able to raise both good and evil Chao depending on the type of care you give them. And as before, Chao can be

saved into Visual Memory units and looked after outside of the Dreamcast in

their own little portable game, unsurprisingly called *Chao Adventure 2*.

BAD IS GOOD

But, exciting as these improvements are to the thousands of *Sonic Adventure* fans around the world, they're not what's going to have normal people most interested. "If there are people who didn't like the first game, then they'll be encouraged to learn that there are plenty of improvements in both depth and variety of gameplay to keep them thrilled for hours," Mat Quaeck told us. "And the fact that you can play an evil Sonic – Shadow – is intriguing enough for even the most casual of gamer."

Although Sonic has faced a few pretenders to his Hedgehog throne before, there's never been anyone quite so powerful as Shadow. With red and black spines, cool running animation where he seems to effortlessly skate across the ground, and a brilliant evil voice, there's a pretty good chance he'll end up being even more popular than Sonic himself. As well as using the Chaos' Emeralds as his source of power,

he has all of Sonic's abilities and an equally smart (if not smarter) pair of shoes. Both rivals will be seen wearing trainers from real-life American shoe brand Soap, complete with the trademark solid plastic arch on the underside to allow them to grind along railings and other pieces of scenery with ease.

As you'll have seen if you've played the one-level demo included with *Phantasy Star Online (ODM #17, 9/10)*, this comes into play quite often, allowing you to grind your way to new areas, pick up extra rings and bonuses, and also look extremely darned cool. Developed by Japanese Sonic Team members based in San Francisco, there's a very funky skate-style feel to all of *Sonic Adventure 2*, something that Mat feels has come from the different working environment.

"I'm sure being based in California has influenced certain aspects of the game, like the choice of music and voice-over artists, for example," he said. "But the team have endeavoured to create a game that, naturally, has worldwide appeal."

You're not likely to see huge chunks of scenery suddenly popping into view as they often do in the first *Sonic*Adventure either – the levels now stretch as far as the eye can see into the distance. Smaller touches such as the characters casting realistic shadows only add to the solid feel of the graphics,

something you'll really notice when you come to play the game.

SPLIT PERSONALITY

The graphics even manage to look good in the all-new split-screen multiplayer mode, where you and a friend can go head-to-head on a number of stages. One will play as the Hero side, one as the Dark side, with three main game styles from which to choose - Sonic vs Shadow in a flat-out race to the finish. Knuckles and Rouge trying to find hidden Emeralds first, or Tails vs Eggman in an arena-based robot shoot-out. Each one has a number of special power-ups available to each player, such as the ability to freeze your opponent, jumble up their controls, or have the enemy attacked by their own personal bad guy. There will even be a two-player kart racing bonus game to earn, but we're not going away to give too much about that right now...

As well as being able to compete against friends directly in these head-to-head games, *Sonic Adventure 2* is also going to have a number of online functions. "The plan is to have a

worldwide ranking board," Mat told us, "where you'll be able to challenge certain aspects of all stages - time attack, score attack, and so on."The version of the game we played also had a 'download' option, but it's not yet clear exactly what this will involve. You can expect special seasonal updates and extra challenges to be put on the Net at regular intervals though, much like the Halloween and Christmas add-ons, and Reebok DMX speed challenge were for the first game. There's not long to wait now before Sonic Adventure 2 hits the world's videogame stores - and don't forget that it'll be arriving in the UK at Sega's new recommended retail price of £29.99. We'll be going through the final game in a massive review in the next issue of

ODM, on sale Thursday 21 June.

concepts of horror and beauty for a moment. Any comparison to be made? Any synergy between the

two? On the surface, the notion of a symbiotic relationship existing between such separated elements of the emotional spectrum is ridiculous. One summons images of supermodels, the other of Jason Vorhees. And never the twain shall meet, to quote a famous Scottish drunkard.

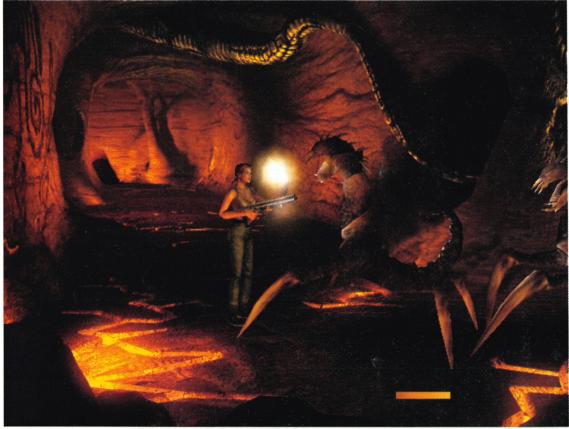
The trouble with life is that it's rarely black and white. We're members of a race that, on numerous occasions, has advocated war, has claimed it is 'good'.

War's a fairly horrific practice, and the same goes for entertainment. Although it's utterly illogical, many of us are able to appreciate the aesthetic qualities, maybe even the beauty, of such film noirs as Tetsuo, Man Bites Dog, or Cannibal Holocaust. You know who you are. You're the people that sit alone in the dark in the small hours of the morning scanning scratchy videos of serious horror flicks thinking, "Why am I watching this?" You're the same people that will do exactly the same thing night after night after night. You like challenging your sense of fear. You enjoy it.

Which brings us to the fourth instalment of Darkworks' Alone In The

Dark series – The New Nightmare.
'Survival horror' games – as proven by the incredible success of the Resident Evil games – are perennially popular, usually for the reasons outlined above, but this one has the potential to be the darkest, most visually incredible ever created. Take a look at these screenshots. Graphically, Dreamcast is unlikely to have ever seen anything like the final version of the game.

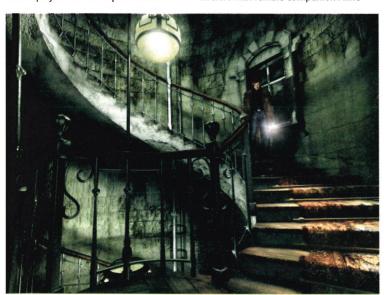
Guilaume Gouraud, co-founder of French developers Darkworks, is under no illusion that the look of the title was paramount during the construction process. "The visual quality has always been a main concern at Darkworks," he told us. "So we decided, with Infogrames [the publisher], to have a heavy preproduction process for backgrounds. Each location has been designed on paper before any computer art proceeded. For *The New Nightmare*, we have a huge amount of drawings – around 600 in total."

It may have the potential to look beautiful, but as with any example of the horror genre, story is king. Cut story with hardcore graphical skill and you have a very exciting prospect indeed. "For the cut-scenes, we tried to have high quality storyboards for at least the most important of them," adds Guilaume. "The full-motion video sequences are vital from a narrative point of view and they're a kind of reward for the player. The rest is pure talent."

Backing up some potentially amazingly good-looking environments is the continuing tale of Edward Carnby, the supernatural investigator. Things are never easy for Mr Carnby. He has the dubious honour of being the protagonist of the entire Alone In The Dark series, a set of games Darkworks is proud to call 'The Original Survival Horror'. The New Nightmare sees him travelling by ill-fated aircraft with female companion Aline

Cedrac to the ominously named Shadow Island after a distress call from a friend. As the pair near their destination, events take a predictable turn for the worse and the two find themselves separated, giving the gamer the chance to play as either the male or female lead. From here on in it's going to be mutant monsters, fear, paranoia and more darkness than

you can shake a stick at.

After wowing you with graphics and laying out what promises to be an atmospheric plot, *The New Nightmare* will throw one very important sweetie into the mix. It may not sound like much, but this is likely to change the way survival horror games are made forever: it's a... (drumroll please) torch. With, according to Darkworks, never-ending batteries.

"When we started pre-production, it was obvious that we needed a very special feature to make the gameplay extremely

attractive," explained Guilaume. "And as we needed to focus on the *ambiance*, the concept of 'light and darkness opposition' fitted very well with the title. We decided to experiment with some technologies that allow us to have real-time lighting with fixed backgrounds. It's useful for exploration, special effects and fights."

From the early version of Alone In The Dark that we've seen, the way the torch lights the pre-rendered backgrounds is astonishingly realistic. Gameplay elements provided by the feature will include only being able to see certain collectable objects when you pass the beam over them, and there are likely to be sections, according to Darkworks, where the light quite simply goes out. And that means it's change your pants time."It's imperative for making the player jump and feel a deep sense of anguish, that we have some violent events," says Guilaume." Alone In The Dark was not designed for kids."

▶ The use of light and dark is sure to pervade every element of the game, including the use of weapons. It's yet to be determined just how many shooters and blades will make it into the final version, but your torch will be an essential element to using all of them. "We tried to have very special weapons – all of them working with light, and the result is impressive, not only for the special effects, but also for tactics during fights. They've all been designed to look very retro sci-fi."

We got to try out the use of the guns with the torch, and while the control of the character him/herself is fairly traditional for a survival horror game, the addition of the torch is intriguing and promises to work brilliantly with the Dreamcast controller. The joystick is used to swing the light around along with the gun. To paraphrase that crazy Irish bloke Roy Walker from everyone's ex-favourite quiz show, Catchphrase, shoot what you see. Preferably right between the eyes. Darkworks also haven't been shy when designing some proper nasties to use as target practice.

MONSTER MASH

"For the creatures in *The New Nightmare*, we started with this question: What kind of death do you particularly not want to have?' We then tried to design monsters able to give you those horrible deaths. We worked with a very gifted girl, Claire Wendeling, and the result fitted perfectly with the action gameplay we wanted," Guilaume told us.

You might think that ladies would have a problem sticking hot lead into mutants, but not in The New Nightmare. Shooting stuff comes naturally for feisty female Aline. And the inclusion of her as a playable character is likely to give you plenty of bang for your buck."In fact, we have two games in one," claims Guilaume. "Two parallel adventures showing two different points of view of the dark stories of Shadow Island. Only 50 backgrounds are common to the two adventures, and the walkthrough is really totally different. And we have a real interaction between the two characters, such as meetings, radio calls and the like. Plus, it allows us to develop a deep relationship between the two characters. I advise future players to play the game with both characters."

NEW PANTS, PLEASE

Playing the game with both Edward and Aline is likely to keep you on your toes for a healthy period of time. Darkworks have yet to confirm exactly how many hours you can expect from the final version, but it's clear that this is going to be no picnic. You can see from the screenshots that oversized creepy-crawlies are going to be found everywhere. Fear around every corner, in fact.

Heaps of innovation and tons of gameplay are promised by *The New Nightmare*. All these features have been boosted by Dreamcast's power, and Darkworks are likely to be able to create the most accomplished title in the series to date. "We are in high-resolution," says Guilaume. "The characters are about 2,500 polygons and the creatures about 1,000 each. But mainly it's the real-time shadow that will impress. I've seen some early players shooting at their own shadow."

As you've probably guessed by now, the developers are planning to make darkness more than essential to the way the game plays and the experience you'll have when you whack it into your Dreamcast. From the early screens you see here, it's obvious that the intention is to evoke a sense of pure suspense. That pool of light is going to be your only lifeline if Darkworks' development goes to plan. And some of those monsters are looking nasty enough to keep even the hardest night-owl in the audience happy. We'll know for sure next month.

Alone in the Dark: The New Nightmare is looking to release in June for Dreamcast, and if you're the sort of person that enjoys the edgier side of life, this is definitely one to look out for. Horror and beauty have finally found a gaming home – we'll have a full review soon.

FIRST OUAKE III ARENA (ODM #15, 9/10). And soon Half-Life, Soldier Of Fortune and Unreal Tournament. Dreamcast has first-person shooters falling out of its arse. Do we need another? Quite possibly, when it's from the makers of Shenmue (ODM #14, 10/10).

Outtrigger started life in the arcades. Aimed at bringing Quake-style deathmatches to the masses, it threw out the arduous PC fiddliness and simplified the controls to just a joystick, trackball and three buttons. Unless you have the dream set-up of a keyboard and mouse, playing on Dreamcast is going to be somewhat harder.

Outtrigger's arcade roots are its most noticeable characteristic. The combatants are all cool-looking SWAT-types. The levels, all close-proximity arenas with distinct themes - libraries, train stations - are reminiscent of a fighting game. All the on-screen pointers and speech are very arcadey, luminous circles highlight your opponents, and there are low health and ammo prompts. The Game Over tune even sounds like Virtua Fighter 3tb (ODM #1,7/10).

The one-player mode will put you through short, almost tutorial-style missions, unlocking harder stages as you progress. But with any first-person shooter, it's the multiplayer set-up that matters. We won't see any online play for Dreamcast in the UK, instead there's a four-player split-screen mode disappointing, of course, but Outtrigger's arcadestyling makes it more of a social experience than the shadowy online world of Quake. Wait and see - it may yet be a cracking group blaster.

WITH MOST GAMERS MISSING out on the Second World War by about 50 years, and George 'Dubya' Bush not yet having started a third one, the only way we can currently (legally) satisfy our natural desire to kill is by playing virtual simulations of war. While consoles have had their fair share of these kind of games, it's on the PC that the vast majority are released – one of the very best being Madrid-based Pyro Studios' Commandos back in 1998.

Having proved itself with impressive sales and widespread critical acclaim, as well as a successful mission add-on pack, a sequel is now in development for PC, as well as – thankfully – Dreamcast.

Official Dreamcast Magazine travelled to Madrid to see how development was progressing, and chat to Gonzo Suárez, the game's project leader.

"The original *Commandos* was a game designed for a small specialist market of not more than 200,000 copies," Gonzo

explained. "From there it became a phenomenon and sold more than 1,500,000 – not just to specialist gamers but also to a wider general market."

This came as quite a surprise to a lot of people – not because of the game's quality, but because it was so darned tough and in-depth that nobody ever expected so many to get into it. Gonzo promises that the sequel will be a "simpler" game, but from what we've played of it so far, it's still a whole lot tougher and more complex than anything yet seen on Dreamcast.

The idea is that you're in charge of a group of expertly trained commandos during World War II, each with their own unique special skills. You'll have to use their abilities to get through a series of difficult missions behind enemy lines, without being spotted by the evil Germans. If you happen to lose a team

member whose skills are essential to the completion of a mission, you'll have to start again from the last save point.
Tricky stuff, as you can no doubt guess.

COMMAND AND CONQUER

In the PC version of Commandos 2, players will control their individual troops by clicking on them with their mouse, then pointing where they want them to go, or who they want them to shoot/stab. For the Dreamcast version, however, Pyro Studios have chosen to create an entirely new control system. "We're doing a console game for the console player," Gonzo explained. "This requires us to adapt to the control methods of this type of player."

So, instead of slowly moving a pointer around the screen with the joypad in order to tell your characters where to go, you'll instead take full control of each at a time, making them run around with the analogue stick much like in any other Dreamcast game. "We chose this option because 'point and click' isn't very satisfying with an analogue pad," Gonzo told us. Having spent ages using a joypad to put together complex mission strategies in games like *Hidden and Dangerous* (*ODM* #13, 7/10) and *Rainbow Six* (*ODM* #17, 4/10), we have to say we agree wholeheartedly.

The majority of Commandos 2 will be played from an aerial 2D view, with the option to rotate the scenery to one of four different angles, each of which is rendered in remarkable detail ("each one represents the work of five graphic artists for four months," according to Gonzo). But things will change if you decide to go inside one of the many buildings. The interiors are all being created in true 3D, giving you the option to spin the view around and zoom in and out at will. The coolest feature of the lot though, is the ability to look through windows and doors of buildings before choosing to enter them. A small 3D window will pop up in the corner of the main game screen showing what your character can see, letting you wait until any bad guys are safely in another room before going in yourself."Commandos 2 is a game where all impulsive action is dangerous," said Gonzo on the subject. "So it's recommended to always look behind doors and through windows before entering a building."

POT SHOTS

This feature is already working very effectively in the early version of the game we've played. You can even use your sniper to shoot from the window of one building into the interior of another,

lining up your shots perfectly in a little 3D sniping view. Very nice indeed.

TROOP PLAYAZ

There will be nine characters available to you in Commandos 2, six of whom will be familiar to players of the original PC game. The experts in close combat, communications, explosives, naval operations, mechanics, and sniping are back, along with some new recruits. Natasha Nikochevski, the seductress "has the ability to spy, as well as snipe," says Gonzo. Paul Toledo, the thief "will be indispensable for opening all types of doors and locks, to gain entrance to difficult places like top floors of buildings, or to steal weapons, equipment and documents from the Germans". Last but not least, Whiskey the dog "will be a valuable tool for transport and distraction," Gonzo told us, explaining that characters will be able to pass items between one another by giving them to the innocentlooking terrier and letting him trot past the unsuspecting German troops.

With missions in varied locations, ranging from Paris to Iceland to China

to India to Thailand, all packed with highly intelligent virtual Germans, you'll need to learn all of your characters' abilities perfectly if you're going to get through in one piece. Don't go expecting it to be easy – Gonzo estimates that each of the ten missions will take an average player between three hours on the easy setting, and seven hours on the more difficult settings to complete.

The PC version of Commandos 2 is, unsurprisingly, more complete than the Dreamcast version at this stage, but development seems to be coming along very nicely. "We're particularly satisfied with the results we've achieved with the enemies' behaviour," Gonzo told us. "Dreamcast is a nice

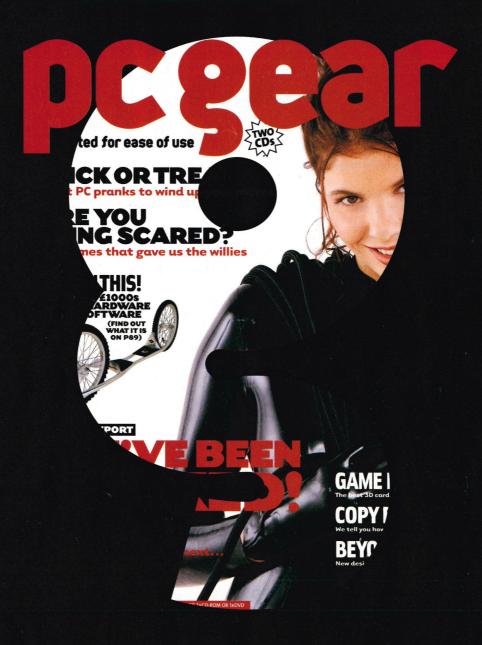
console to program for, as it really takes into account the tasks of the development teams." With a summer release on the cards, we're expecting to see a more complete version of *Commandos 2* in the next few months. With it already looking as smart as it

IT'S A GREAT SHAME to see some gamers deciding that because Sega aren't manufacturing any more Dreamcasts, they should sell theirs – and their collection of games – as quickly as possible. Not only do they miss out on playing the games they'd already bought for the console,

but they also miss out on the many high-quality titles still to be released on Dreamcast.

It's not just great games we've got to look forward to any more, though – it's *cheap* great games. As of last month, Sega started selling all their new Dreamcast titles at the reduced retail price of £29.99, and that's going to apply to all the big titles still in the pipeline: *Sonic Adventure 2, Crazy Taxi 2, Headhunter, Jet Set Radio 2, Virtua Tennis 2,* the lot. Many of Sega's previous Dreamcast releases have been bargains at £39.99, let alone at the new price, so expect to be doing even more shopping than you have been so far.

There's even more good news, as well – other games publishers are following Sega's lead and reducing the recommended price of their games too. This month, the three non-Sega titles we've reviewed are all going on sale for just £19.99, including *Stupid Invaders* (see page 56) which comes on two GD-ROMs. Expect to see even more games being released at bargain prices like this throughout the rest of the year. After all, who's going to pay 40 quid for a game when they can get Sega's very best for a tenner less?

But it isn't only new titles that are having their prices reduced – if you shop around, you can find classic Dreamcast games at some incredibly low prices. It seems as though a lot of stores have taken Sega stopping production of Dreamcast as a cue to desperately try to clear out all their existing stock, which is great news for all of us with the console. Being able to pick up underrated gems like Ubi Soft's excellent *Rayman 2: The Great Escape (ODM #6, 8/10)* or Midway's *4 Wheel Thunder (ODM #8, 8/10)* for under £15 is fantastic. If anything, a bargain price like that is

going to make you enjoy a game even more than you would had you bought it for the full price.

This Dreamcast price slashing is going on all over the country, and some is quite severe. You can quite easily pick up something like Mortal Kombat Gold (ODM #1, 5/10), or Aerowings (ODM #1, 6/10) for around £5 – okay, they're not particularly great games, but at such a low price you might as well give them a try. A game has to be really bad to give you less than a fiver's worth of entertainment. Again, shop around on the Internet and in the backs of game stores and you'll be able to pick up some spectacular bargains to keep you going until summer truly does arrive. Keep an eye on hardware as well – some places are selling off joypads at radically reduced rates. Don't be ashamed that Dreamcast's going cheap – take full advantage of it!

So get out there now and give your Dreamcast game collection a boost. There's never been a better time to do it, and you might not have another chance if you leave it too long.

CONFIDENTIAL MISSION

"Ahh, Confidential Mission, we've been expecting you." STEVE OWEN strokes his pussy galore and shoots the bad guys



FOR ALL OF BROSNAN'S brilliance as a contemporary James Bond, there's something we just don't like about him. He's so settled into his role as 007 that he now reckons he's got the weight to tell the

producers to make Bond films every three years rather than the customary 24 months. The result? While filming would normally be finished by the summer with a release this November, we're now only halfway between *The World is Not Enough* and the forthcoming Bond 20.

Such Secret Service vacuums, then, will have to be filled with this latest (and indeed, only *second*) Dreamcast lightgun game. That it doesn't so much borrow from Ian Fleming as steal Bond wholesale just makes it all the more exciting.

Despite a seeming lack of good old-fashioned police work, *Confidential Mission* is practically *Virtua Cop 3*, and little has changed in the construction of gameplay. For instance, like the classic *Virtua Cop* games, you have to point your gun at the screen, aim at some baddies and shoot them. Like *Virtua Cop*, there's some apparently innocent people screaming and running into your line of fire, and punishment for their accidental slaughter is the loss of your life in return. Still, it's quicker than real-life paperwork and the planting of 'pieces'.

Like Virtua Cop, Confidential Mission gives you the occasional bonus item, which should also be shot to reap its reward. Most of the time this equates to little more than some bonus points, but there's extra lives and weapons to be found there too. Grenades are used there and then. Time your shot well and in all likelihood you'll take out an entire wave of attackers before they've even finished turning the corner. Other deliberately placed props are machine-guns, which tend to turn up just when you've got a whole line of sitting ducks. If you didn't have your rather limited, one-magazine automatic rifle in such a situation you'd have to pick the line off perfectly with just your six-shooter.

ONE-SHOTS

But, unlike *Virtua Cop, Confidential Mission*'s most obvious addition is the (very) occasional bonus sequence. The first is that you find yourself trapped within a room

rapidly filling with gas. Like any good secret agent, the Confidential Mission Force's equivalent of the Q branch has equipped you with a sticky gun that fires green gloop, perfect for covering up the vents from which the gas is escaping. Another occasion demands that you use a one-shot grappling hook to get from one building to another. Another has you firing repeatedly at a coupling to disengage yourself from a train.

The consequence of success or failure on these occasions isn't quite as extreme as you would hope. House of the Dead 2 (ODM #1, 9/10) – the Dreamcast's only other light-gun game – brilliantly branches throughout the game, taking you through genuinely different areas, some of which are clearly or less obviously trickier than the alternative. Confidential Mission, however, doesn't really branch at all. Rather, succeeding in these one-shot missions simply pushes you forward in the game by a minute or two, predominantly meaning that you just

orange and red. When the marks get to the vertical you've been shot and you lose one of your lives. Depending on the skill of the marksmen, the target markers close up to the top at different speeds. Thus, your well-trained spy-eye has to concentrate on the major threats first, even if they've only just appeared onscreen. You can worry about the cowards running away when there's no one more lethal in the vicinity (although these non-targeted characters are often the ones hiding the bonus items, or are moving into a harder-to-hit position – clear the screen whenever you can).

SIZE IS IMPORTANT

The raison d'être of such a light-gun game is gloriously superficial and wonderfully refreshing for it. The genre has hardly changed since the Intellivision in the late '70s, and there really isn't a demand for it to move on either. But you do feel a little short-changed with Confidential Mission. There isn't guite enough over and above the arcade game here. Sure, there's the training missions (see the 'Hard Knocks' section), which are shockingly and astoundingly difficult, and when you complete all of these you unlock a new mission and some more training missions, but even the arcade game is too short. It's probably half the length of House of the Dead 2, and that's ignoring all the different paths you can take in the latter. The options screen allows you to award yourself nine lives per credit and up to nine credits, giving you 81 chances to get through the game. We managed to do this on the first go (although, admittedly, we only got two-thirds of the way through with the default lives and credits). Unlike the

superlative ongoing bonuses in *Virtua Tennis, Confidential Mission* is rather ungenerous with its gifts. It would be so much better if the training missions unlocked elements of the game – such as increasing the number of credits you could have – so that you didn't finish it and then try to take on the training mode. There's certainly something perverse in coming back to *Confidential Mission*, not to finish the game but to finish the training system.

Also, the scoring system isn't as innovative as, say, the first *Virtua Cop* game, which saw you avoid being shot for as long as possible so as to build up a score multiplier, eventually meaning that everything you shot scored you nine times as many points. *Confidential Mission* gives out extra points for shooting enemies in certain parts of their body (including a special 'Justice Shot' bonus for shooting guns out of their hands), but there's not really anything to keep you practising and constantly striving for that new record high score.

If you splashed out on a second light-gun for twoplayer *House of the Dead 2*, then you can certainly make use of it in *Confidential Mission*, although it doesn't drastically alter the game. There are a few more baddies, and they do target you slightly sooner, but other than a specially designed extra mode where only the left or right player can shoot certain characters and you can decide how to dish out the lives and credits, the game is just as similar and, naturally, even easier with two. *House of the Dead 2* was so difficult and frantic that it almost demanded a second player, but *Confidential Mission* is perfectly manageable on your own. It's certainly not the reason to get a second light-gun.

But, of course, it's conceivable that you don't have a light-gun at all, and *Confidential Mission* isn't going to force you to get one. There's very reasonable support for the standard controller – it's easier to use than you might think – but it's really not the point, is it? Light-gun games are so fabulously enjoyable because you're pointing and shooting a gun, not because you can move a gun sight around a screen using a little joystick. The game also supports the Dreamcast Mouse, but it makes things a little too easy, and makes you feel even more detached from the shooting action than a joypad does.

Confidential Mission looks great – there's so many different death animations that they usually respond to where they've been hit, and a Silent Scope-style body map lets you know for sure. And it's quite un-put-downably enjoyable, certainly until your arms are throbbing and your eyes have developed permanent squints. But after the first weekend it's for occasional late night fun rather than week-long conquering. There are few surprises, but it's brilliantly paced and – with the correct number of lives – a real challenge.

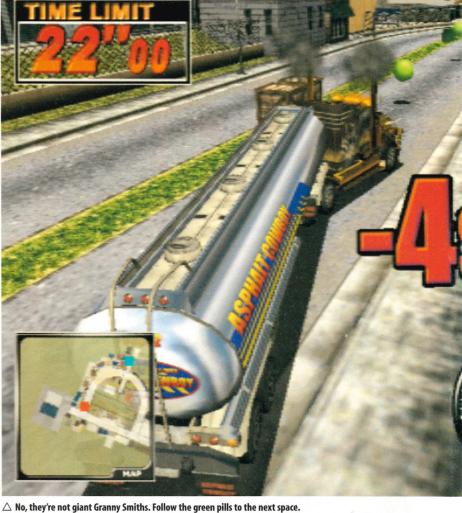

18 WHEELER AMERICAN PRO TRUCKER

Sega's enormous trucking arcade game has arrived on Dreamcast. DYLAN DAVIES picks up some Swedish hitchers and smells the diesel



18 WHEELER AMERICAN PRO TRUCKER is something of a contemporary arcade legend. Its notoriety is sometimes more to do with the dimensions of the cabinet ON THE CD than the actual game itself – an IMAX-

sized screen, a bench seat (presumably for arcade hitchers), a steering wheel with a diameter that rivals the world's largest pizza, and a reassuringly large button that activates the reassuringly large horn. Though many grumble at its £2 price tag, many more love its behemoth take on the world of driving games, ensuring it a place in the hearts of wannabe Rubber Ducks everywhere.

So the big game has finally come to the little Dreamcast. Does it come with an oversized wheel? No, of course not. Does it come with a bench? No, players must provide their own seating. Does it come with a horn button? Yes, it's the yellow one on your existing Dreamcast controller! Thanks Sega. This isn't a peripheral-based game like Samba De Amigo (ODM #15, 8/10), it's just an arcade conversion on a little silver disc. So what do we get for our wonga? Well, for a kick off there's the original Arcade mode...

Before you can go anywhere near racing you must first choose your driver. The five characters come equipped with distinct personas and truck design. There's Asphalt

Cowboy (whose name sounds like 'Asshole Cowboy' when shouted in an American accent), and Nippon Maru in his gaudy over-customised rig. Streamline is the Blaxploitation character that every game must have, Highway Cat is the foxy chick, and finally there's Long Horn - a fat cowboy in a truck that looks like a bad sci-fi monster. It seems truckers have changed since the film Convoy back in 1978, as now, with their bad disco outfits, Sega truckers look like members of the Village People. Each character has their own cab with differing amounts of torque, speed and strength. For those of you who don't read car magazines, torque is the low-end power that provides acceleration,

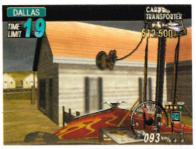

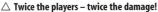

speed is the fastest a body of matter can travel through space, and strength is how much you can abuse your truck before it ceases to work as a truck. Let's race!

Arcade mode is exactly what you might have played in, er, the arcade. You must navigate your way across the USA in Jack-Kerouac-with-a-purpose fashion from New York to San Francisco within a time limit. At the start of each stage you must choose a trailer. The heavier the trailer, the more cash you'll receive. However, the extra weight means you'll accelerate slower and it'll take longer to slow down into corners. Also, should you clatter your trailer against, or be clattered by, traffic you'll lose final marks due to 'damaged goods'. This doesn't radically alter your game strategy as the trailer can take loads of damage and the game seems to be more about crossing the line as quickly as possible, rather than points. Along your journey you'll be hounded by a roque 'Rival' truck driven by a man called Lizard Tail. He'll do his best to cut you up, barge into the side of your truck and shout "Outta my way, green horn!" in an attempt to demean your pride. As your nemesis he'll lose you your reward if he finishes the stage before you, so keep your head up and your foot down.

COMING TO AMERICA

The voyage across America is kindly split up into four bitesized levels – New York to St Petersburg, St Petersburg to Dallas, Dallas to Las Vegas and finally Las Vegas to San Francisco. When we say bite-sized, we really mean they're tiny succulent morsels. Along each stage there is a fork in the road, which splits the level into two routes that meet up again for the final dash to the line. It's a way of instilling more variety into the level and a way of avoiding the evil Mr Lizard Tail. Perilous obstacles such as rock falls and tornadoes litter the routes, the latter raining falling trucks upon the road ahead. Tragically the levels are short very short - and there's only four of them. With a bit of persistence you'll have this part of the game finished in under an hour, and repeat visits will only take ten minutes. All there's left to do is try to beat your time/score and adjust the difficulty level. Sadly there are no extra levels for Dreamcast – what you saw in the arcade is exactly what you get here. At this point the player is likely to be wondering where their money went.

In addition to the brief arcade mode, there is a Parking mode. This is a nice new additional challenge based on the sub-games in the Arcade mode. You must navigate your truck into parking bays only slightly larger than the rig itself. This is like trying to thread a needle, only fun. On each of the four stages there are four bays to park in before the clock runs out. To assist the clock in running out there are time penalties for hitting any object. So, if you're reversing 60 tons into a small garage with only a few seconds left and you so much as touch a streetlight, it's Game Over and you have to take your test again.

We're halfway through the review and head-to-head online play hasn't been mentioned. This is because it's not implemented and never will be. Sadly there will never be a UK-based online community honking horns, reading pornography and eating bacon sandwiches, forming a virtual convoy. Don't blame the messenger. The best you're gonna get is a two-player option. This provides nice smooth-running split-screen antics, but the game style really isn't radically improved by racing against a mate.

In addition to this trucking buffet there's the Time Attack mode. This is three laps of diesel-cruising around

looped versions of the Arcade tracks. Violent people rejoice, for you are encouraged to hit bonus cars for extra points. Hit the same wreckage again and the points double, and again, and again until the wreckage is a vaporous memory of its former self. Your rival, Lizard Tail, (oh why won't he leave me alone?) makes an appearance again – feel free to swerve into him until he too falls apart like a broken heart in the fragile shell of adolescence.

Them's the courses and them's the challenges. As for the game itself, it's a joy to play. Contrary to popular belief, driving at no faster than 80mph can be tricky, hairy and complex. The cab's suspension appears to be constructed from bed springs, consequently any sudden movement on the controller causes the rig to roll and pitch like a tiny, tiny boat on a big, big wave. Following other trucks will cause you to enter a slipstream, accelerating you past the front vehicle – just like the best car racing games do. The hilarious bouncy movement is also accentuated by the in-cab graphics. Each driver has his/her own cab interior, with items such as dangling air fresheners, sunglasses, porn mags and lucky charms. These items slide around the dashboard so realistically you'll be forgiven for trying to catch them as they slither off the screen. Incidentally, the winner of the best interior is Nippon Maru - an interior so laced with tassels it's hard to see out of the window. Respect, Mr Maru! As 60 tons of truck will never accelerate like a Nissan Skyline, the basic trick is to never brake and maintain speed by not hitting houses - which is easier said than done.

GETTING THE HORN

The graphics move along smoother than cashmere. There is so much detail whooshing past you, and so many objects to hit, it's easy to forget you're only doing about 80mph. The skies of America have rarely looked so

The story of how one man is living the 18 Wheeler dream for real

Formed in the 1970s in Carlisle by Eddie Stobart Jr., Eddie Stobart Ltd has turned from a small agricultural business into an international trucking empire and traffic jam legend. Travel any motorway in the country and if you don't pass at least three an hour, you're not looking to your left enough. This multi-million pound empire employs 2,000 people and has inspired a fan club of over 25,000 members. Each truck is given a girl's name (look on the front for a script moniker like 'Beverly Sue' or 'Veronica', for example). Die-cast models are available in shops and people spot the named trucks much like trains.

In the spirit of 18 Wheeler American Pro Trucker, Eddie also has a rival. His name is Norbert Dentresangle. No

doubt frustratingly for Eddie, Norbert's European company owned the first truck to use the Channel Tunnel in 1994. And now these too are a common sight on our British roads. But Eddie is strong, and his company has grown 25 per cent a year despite this European invasion. Even though it's a purely a business rivalry and both companies don't intentionally ram each other shouting "green horn!", it's heart-warming to know that 18 Wheeler American Pro Trucker's inspiration can be seen on the highways and byways of our great country.

majestic. However, there is more noticeable scenery popup than in the arcade version with moderate fog on the horizon. Not quite a pea-souper but it's still noticeable. Audio is standard arcade rawk music with your nemesis shouting moderately intimidating remarks about your driving over the CB. The most beautiful part of the sound, though, is the mighty horn! This is the most pleasurable use of the X button ever. Hit the key and the horn lets out a dead-wakingly rude "Baaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaap?!" Further into the arcade mode you'll acquire a new horn that not only wakes the dead but makes them come to your house and ask you to keep the noise down as they are trying to get some sleep eternal. It serves a practical function too, as prolonged use causes a few polite motorists to move out of your way. Sometimes.

Without trying to sound like Swiss Tony from *The Fast Show, 18 Wheeler American Pro Trucker* is a lot like making

love to a beautiful woman. It's exciting, sometimes perilous, bouncy with a well-made chassis, but sadly over far too soon. The Dreamcast version just doesn't have enough meat in its sandwich (again, a lot like a beautiful woman). Its extra modes and absence of online play limits its time-span considerably. A good gamer will have all levels nailed within an hour of firing up their Dreamcast. An inferior gamer may have to wait another 20 minutes until they are looking in the instructions trying to find the rest of the game. For that hour you'll think you've gone to game nirvana, but after that hour you'll be in "I'm 30 guid down with nothing to do" hell. I'm weeping into my keyboard thinking of the game this could have been - an online Convoy with loads of extra levels. If you want what you saw at the arcade and no more, buy this game. If you want a racing game worth the expense - do not touch the truck!

So, extraterrestrials share our love of toilet humour! **PHILIPPA NORMAN** gets to the bottom (tee hee!) of things

ALIENS – THINK SMALL, stupid-looking creatures that do weird things and don't like humans. Ubi Soft know that this description is accurate and have chronicled it all in their new point-and-click adventure, *Stupid Invaders*.

A gaggle of five particularly stupid-looking aliens crash-land on Earth on their return from an intergalactic picnic. While their spaceship is under repair, the motley crew inhabit a house that looks like it's been in the evil clutches of Laurence Llewelyn-Bowen. It seems that the gang are being pursued by a ruthless bounty hunter who goes by the name of Bolok (cue canned laughter), who looks a bit like Judge Doom from *Who Framed Roger*

Rabbit? Mr Bolok is employed by the evil Dr Sakarin, a crazy scientist who's heard of the group's whereabouts and wants to dissect them in his underground lair. Well, what else would you do with visitors from outer space?

The game has three 'wacky' worlds to work through: The House To Rent, The Dung Factory and Area 52 (note the crafty allusion to the notorious Area 51). Gameplay is shared among each of the five characters, with a mission to complete on each level in classic 'point-and-click' fashion: you 'point' at things, then 'click' a button to use them. It's all about solving puzzles and working out how to use everything you come across in the

correct way. You can use a Dreamcast Mouse to do all the pointing and clicking of things, but to be honest your run-of-the-mill controller is just as efficient, as the game moves along at a pretty leisurely pace.

It's very important to save frequently, however, as sudden death is always waiting around the corner – unlike the best PC point-and-click titles, like LucasArts' *Monkey Island* series, in which it's impossible to die. *Stupid Invaders* is also pretty short, but will still take a while to get through, unless you're a total smart arse. Many of the puzzles are fiddly to the point of infuriating, and involve a lot of to-ing and fro-ing if they're not done

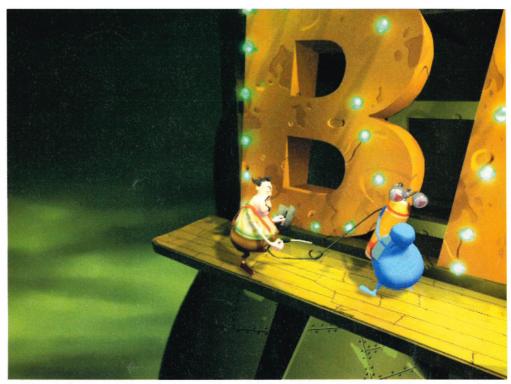
in a certain order. That said, some of them are actually quite interesting, and challenging enough to stimulate those mouldy old brain cells for a change.

There's lots of exploring to be done too - it can be easy to miss vital objects, which you'll inevitably have to go back for at some point. The cursor (a pointing hand) will indicate when an object can be grabbed, opened, spoken to, or simply looked at. Some of these actions are there just for fun, but it's worth checking absolutely everything and picking up anything you can. Many of the puzzles involve combining one object in your inventory with another, often requiring a bit of trial and error before a lucky combination is discovered. Making sure you've got every available item is essential.

The story-building rendered cut-scenes are nicely done - there are loads of them and they are often very long. They're occasionally funny, but this humour soon wears thin once you've watched a few hours' worth.

TOONTASTIC

Probably the most interesting thing about Stupid Invaders though, is the set of influences behind it. The list of voice actors alone is pretty impressive. Apart from

the obvious Space Goofs (the French cartoon on which Stupid Invaders is based), they've all been involved in loads of hugely popular cartoons. Maurice Lamarche (who plays Etno) was Chief Quimby in Inspector Gadget and has also contributed to Futurama. Charlie Adler (Candy) has featured in all-time favourites like Cow & Chicken and Rocko's Modern Life, and the rest of the crew have also - apparently - played parts in Ren & Stimpy, The Simpsons, Power Puff Girls, Buzz Lightyear Of Star Command and a whole load of other crazy toons. It obviously pays to have a silly voice.

This massive cartoon connection helps you relate to the characters, making them relatively cool, although not on a par with the genius creations in the aforementioned proper toons. Bud - the one with the bad teeth - sounds like Barney from The Simpsons. His dialogue, however, isn't really that funny and will definitely get on your nerves before long. He's the token goofy character - stupid but loveable. Sinister Etno sounds like something from a dodgy '50s Bmovie, or Vincent Price in those terrible '60s vampire flicks. Gorgeous is just fat and Stereo has two heads. Candy's probably the most interesting of the bunch due to his ambiguous sexual tendencies. Think John Inman in Are You Being Served? and you'll have a pretty good idea. He gets into a couple of frightening sexual encounters through the course of the game - scenarios that are actually quite twisted and may not be suitable for younger eyes and ears.

Stupid Invaders' creators claim they were inspired by Monty Python, although the link isn't obvious. Classic LucasArts games also clearly had a bit to do with things, but while there's nothing like a good old humorous point-and-click adventure, this is no Monkey Island.

In a nutshell, Stupid Invaders looks good, with polished graphics, a healthy serving of vibrant colours, well-developed characters, ridiculous elevator music and jokes that would make your dad laugh his paisley socks off. Sadly, the action has a tendency to become tedious and boring and, although your dad might think it's funny, most of us hip and happenin' young 'uns would get more laughs from a Christmas cracker.

STUNT GP

Remote-controlled racing with stunts. ALEX HUHTALA checks his batteries

WANT TO RELEASE A racer on the Dreamcast? Join the club. With *Metropolis Street Racer (ODM* #12, 9/10), *F355 Challenge (ODM* #13, 8/10), *Daytona USA 2001 (ODM* #19, 7/10) and a million other racing titles already clogging the shelves, if you're going to release your own racer now it'd better be pretty special, or have a twist. Or even better – both.

Stunt GP certainly has a twist – lots of them. It's not called Stunt GP for nothing, you know. But is it special? Well, we'll come to that later.

Like the ageing Re-Volt (ODM #3, 7/10), Stunt GP is a racer featuring remote-controlled cars. Whereas Re-Volt cleverly recreated the cars, twitchy handling and environments associated with R/C racing, Stunt GP shies

away from realism. You get loads of well-designed tracks that – for the most part – *could* be raced on by R/C cars, plus upgrades for the vehicles such as longer-lasting batteries and improved shock absorbers. But aside from these two elements the majority of the game doesn't really fit the R/C design brief at all.

The cars themselves, apart from the small aerial attachments, don't really resemble R/C cars. We have dune buggies, jeeps, and all the other Tamiya model hybrids, but they're given a

super-deformed design, making them look like cute racers from some kind of *Mario Kart* variant.

Apart from this relative failing, *Stunt GP* has a lot of merits. To start with, it has Arcade, Championship, Time Trial and Stunt Challenge modes, plus a strong fourplayer mode, meaning there's plenty to do. There's also a very noticeable difference between the Arcade and Championship modes, something that isn't always so strongly defined in racing games.

RADIO WAVES

In Arcade mode you choose a vehicle, which in turn determines what course you begin on. From here, finish high up in the field and you're allowed to progress to the circuit of your choice. Using a branching system, you must pick and choose between the circuits – place first in the final race and you unlock new cars and courses that can be used in the other available modes.

The Championship mode takes place over the same courses, but instead of selecting just four circuits from the field, you must race all of them in sequence. Instead of picking a car to start, here you choose a team

sponsor. This sponsor provides you with an initial outlay of cash to spend on a vehicle and to modify it as your budget will allow. Then

you race, with a Grand Prix scoring system of ten points for a win, six for second and so on.

As the season unfolds, you'll obtain money to improve your vehicle, enabling it to go faster, last on the track longer and making the array of stunts easier to perform.

Yes, stunts. It makes up part of the game's

WHAT'S THE BEST THING ABOUT THE GAME?

I think it really has to be the way the cars react and handle - we put a hell of a lot of effort in trying to get the 'feel' just right by tinkering with the physics for ages.

WHAT DREAMCAST GAMES ARE YOU PLAYING AT THE MOMENT? I've been playing Wetrix+ (hugely underrated), Crazy Taxi (my four-year-old loves it) and have just about finished Resident Evil Code: Veronica (wonderful). People here keep telling me to play Phantasy Star Online, but I haven't had much chance lately.

WHAT'S THE MOST EXPENSIVE TAXI JOURNEY YOU'VE EVER HAD? Probably one from Wakefield to my home, which usually costs about £3-£4 but I was so drunk that I couldn't remember where I lived. Allegedly we spent ages driving up and down the M1 from Wakefield to Sheffield and back before I sort of came to my senses. In the end it was over £40 or so, but then I found out that I didn't have any money, so I had to wake my wife up at 3.30am, and then she had to go in the taxi to a cash machine. She got back to find me sound asleep in the kitchen.

LOOK INTO YOUR CRYSTAL BALL, WHAT DOFS SEGA'S FUTURE HOLD? Some great games, unfortunately for other platforms.

title, so they must be pretty important, right? Well yes, they are fairly integral to race strategy and earning points to improve your vehicle in Championship mode. In theory, they're fine - but in practice, the actual stunts leave a lot to be desired. Perhaps we've been spoilt by the likes of Tony Hawk's Pro Skater 2 (ODM #15, 9/10) but the tricks in Stunt GP feel far too basic and erratic.

There's a long list of tricks that you can perform, ranging from flips to barrel rolls, but the success rate of

performing most of them is minimal. Instead of trying to do a 720 Right - whatever that is you're more inclined to stick with back flips that are much easier to

perform. As the scoring system for tricks is also guite basic, performing the same trick over and over doesn't seem to affect the points awarded. The biggest failing of the trick system, though, is that it fails to recognise certain tricks. Most of these happen by chance, but if you put a car into a whirling spin, launching from one ramp and landing on another, maybe with a wheelie to finish, you'll want to be rewarded. Instead you'll get nothing.

Only when landing the vehicle on all four wheels is it counted as a successful stunt. Even then, Stunt GP only registers the tricks it's been familiarised with. Anything outside of the acknowledged trick list available is immediately dismissed. A shame.

TRICKSTYLE

You'll want to master the tricks that are available, however, as they can give you a distinct advantage in races. As cars scoot around the circuits, the energy in their batteries diminishes. To recharge this energy, you'll need to make use of a charging bay - a pit lane - where the vehicles pass slowly until their batteries are fully replenished. This is where the stunts play their part. Perform tricks during the race and you'll receive speed boosts and energy rewards - perform enough tricks and you won't even need to visit the pits. Clever, huh? The choice of staying out on the track or pitting-in gives races a surprising strategic element. As you get further into the game, you'll soon start changing race strategies on the fly, depending on how things are going.

There's one final failing that Stunt GP has left up its sleeve, though - s-l-o-w-d-o-w-n. In a racer that only ever has a maximum of six vehicles on a track - and small ones at that - it's surprising to see so much slowdown and drops in frame-rate occurring. It only really happens on corners, and when lots of cars are on screen at once. Strangely, it also only seems to happen on the earlier, simpler courses. The courses themselves look basic, but can be very big and with lots of trackside objects. The

slowdown doesn't necessarily affect the outcome of the races, but it can certainly be off-putting and annoying.

So what we have here is a fairly generic racer, borrowing bits and pieces from previous hits to create a not-quite satisfying whole. What have we got that we've seen before? Wild tracks - almost rollercoaster-like in their design – that remind us of Sega's late '80s arcade hit Power Drift. Stunts to increase your speed, reminiscent of San Francisco Rush 2049 (ODM #12, 7/10) or to buy you new components for the vehicle, à la Gran Turismo. A charging lane where you recharge your vehicles depleted energy - as seen in classics F-Zero and WipEout. The list goes on.

There's nothing wrong with borrowing what's already popular, but Stunt GP fails to create its own identity. It's a formulaic racer that's fun for a while, with races that can be very gripping, but ultimately,

there are far better racers on Dreamcast. Just take your pick.

THE NEXT TEIRS

It made the Game Boy but it could well break the Dreamcast. **ALEX HUHTALA** gets into the block-dropping beat

AN UPDATE OF THE classic puzzler *Tetris* may not be what most Dreamcast owners have been dreaming about since seeing what their all-singing, all-dancing console is capable of, but somebody obviously thought there was a market for it, hence the arrival of *The Next Tetris*.

You all remember *Tetris*, don't you? For those who arrived late, we'd better give you a quick breakdown of what it's all about. The basic idea of the game is to arrange falling blocks that are dropped one at a time into a well. As a block is falling, you can rotate it clockwise or anti-

clockwise and guide it to its resting place. Create a complete horizontal line of blocks and the line is removed. If you place blocks poorly, the screen will begin to fill with them leaving less room to manoeuvre. If it all gets so full that a block can't fit into the playing field, it's game over.

The idea, of course, is to survive for as long as possible – it's a test of endurance and skill. There are seven different shapes of block in total, all made up of four squares. *Tetris* gets its name from removing four lines of blocks in one move, this is known as a 'Tetris'.

The above explanation describes the classic *Tetris*, designed by the Russian Alexey Pajitnov back in 1985. The game achieved cult status when it started to appear on home computers a year later and really went into overdrive when bundled with Nintendo's Game Boy in 1989.

THE NEXT LEVEL

So what is *The Next Tetris?* After all, there have been a multitude of variants on the original game since it first appeared, including a number of high-profile imitators, such as Sega's *Columns. The Next Tetris* is just the latest in a long line of variants that tweaks with the classic gameplay to produce something that looks like the original but includes a number of new innovations.

The biggest of these innovations in *The Next Tetris* is a 'cascading' feature. This is due to the traditional *Tetris* pieces being revamped – they still have the same shape, but they're now multicoloured and renamed 'multiminoes' instead of 'tetraminoes'. The addition of colour isn't just a cosmetic enhancement though. If a block is multicoloured, and placed with a gap below the piece, then the coloured squares will separate and drop into the space below. This is, of course, the new cascading feature. It's certainly innovative, but it'll split *Tetris* fans down the middle. Some will love it, others will hate it. We're in the latter camp.

Unfortunately, that's not the only problem. *The Next Tetris* features plenty of other adjustments that tinker with the mechanics of the original and spoil what was one of the purest and most addictive games in existence.

Appearing on Dreamcast it's understandable that the blocks should look more than just 2D sprites. However, the 3D blocks that are used in *The Next Tetris* are very messy. When they're placed into tight areas, they appear to be squeezed to fit, expanding towards the camera and then settling into place. Clearly it's an effort to make the action look more dynamic, but it fails. You shouldn't need to make *Tetris* look dynamic – it already is, you just have to play the Game Boy version to understand this.

One of the programmers must have realised that the 3D effect, and the unnecessary block explosions when you remove a line, were pretty redundant, as you can turn the 'block wobble' off in the options menu. You can also turn off 'idle animations' – these are irritating animated backgrounds that consist of rotating mechanical structures. Whoever thought that spinning hexagons was a good idea for a background animation while you're trying to place falling blocks should be forced to watch their 'masterpiece' for longer than... say, about ten minutes.

PROBLEMATIC

A few other problems that have an obvious effect on the gameplay include the bizarre choice of showing you the next *five* blocks that are going to fall into play. It allows you to plan too far ahead, making the game incredibly easy. Most versions of *Tetris* only display the next block to be dropped – five is an unnecessary luxury.

Manipulation of the blocks is also problematic. Rotating the shapes as they drop is fine, but moving a block towards the left or right of the screen is incredibly slow. This flaw is evident straight away on the easiest levels, even when you're placing the first block. When the blocks begin to drop faster as the action progresses you'll

start to become very frustrated. Timing is incredibly important in *Tetris* – not being able to physically move a block into the chosen space can only be described as a bug. As the action hots up it should become more difficult to place blocks where you want them, but in *The Next Tetris* it becomes near-impossible.

In single-player mode the 'enhancements' that make up *The Next Tetris* are pretty much a waste of time. However, in a two-player game they do add a tactical edge over the original formula. A two-player game is played in the same fashion as a single-player one, with each player having their own area to drop the blocks into. It's when you clear more than two lines of bricks in a single move that the fireworks begin. Clearing two or more lines will spin your rival's screen, making it difficult for them to see what they're doing. The more lines you clear, the more severe the spins and confusion. If you create a chain of cleared lines, caused by the cascading blocks dropping into vacant spaces, then you better have a mop and bucket at hand just in case the spinning and rotating screen of your rival becomes too much for them.

IZ NO GOOD!

As you can tell, we're not very taken with *The Next Tetris*. It's a small consolation that a version of the classic *Tetris* is also included on the disc. You're given a choice of which version to play straight after the main title screen.

The thing is, the 'classic' Tetris that's included isn't without its own faults. The same sluggish controls mar the experience and the game is also hampered by a poor scoring system that doesn't take into account the score multipliers that are used in normal versions of Tetris. Clearing four lines at once is the secret to a big score, but here you receive a maximum of 20 points regardless of the level that you're playing at. When you clear ten lines in Tetris, the game should get faster as it steps up a level. This happens, but scoring should also increase, with the

reward being the normal scoring rate multiplied by the level you're playing at. Needless to say, it doesn't happen here. Also, as when playing in *The Next Tetris* mode, the next five blocks are displayed instead of the 'classic' one.

It is kind of nice to be able to differentiate between the original *Tetris* and this makeover, but calling it *The Next Tetris* is about as lazy as the actual game you're presented with. A few tweaks with the classic structure has led someone to believe that this is the evolution of *Tetris*. It isn't – it's a backward step.

The final insult for UK players is that *The Next Tetris* has been available in America for several months, with the enhancement of online versus play. Although on the evidence of the version we're left with, maybe that's not a bad thing. After all, why would you want to play something online that's seriously flawed to begin with?

Take it from us – *Tetris* is a fun game, but *The Next Tetris* isn't. It's a poorly conceived and executed version of a classic that's an insult to Dreamcast. It's that simple.

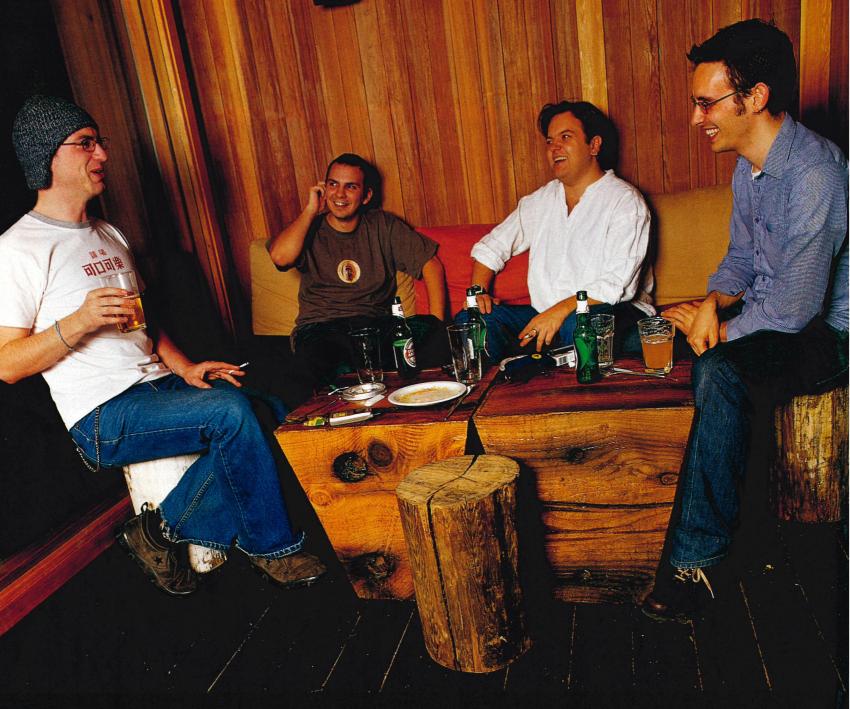

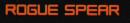

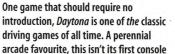

DAN: The game itself is great, but it's fatal that there's no online racing in it.

ALEX: Er, you don't want to peak too early here. WARREN: Quite! End of conversation... But anyway, as we've started on that — if you're really upset about

there being no online mode then don't buy it! **DAN:** Alright then, I won't! But I think it's...

WARREN: It's a shame, because it did need that because it's not a new game and it's just a conversion of an arcade game that came out on Saturn...

DAN: But it's still a good game, it's good fun to play. WARREN: It's a very odd game. If you didn't like Daytona before, you're not going to like this one, that's for sure. It's very, er, unique. The handling is very odd.

DYLAN: It's as twitchy as a caffeine addict. ALEX: You can adjust that.

WARREN: It's much better with the wheel.

ALEX: When you've got Toy Racer [ODM #17, 6/10] and Speed Devils Online Racing [ODM #17, 6/10] offering online racing and Daytona can't, it's ludicrous.

DAN: That would have made it exceptional, too. **ALEX:** That was the appeal – *Daytona* was getting the machine it deserved and it was going to be online.

DYLAN: And I think that it being online in every other territory other than Europe is a bit of a bummer.

WARREN: We can't bang on about the online thing because it isn't there. End of story.

DYLAN: It's a good two-player game.

WARREN: It is and it's really solid. And that's the thing about the game — it's got really solid graphics and is slightly tarted up compared to other versions.

DAN: And the multiplayer thing has always been what Daytona is about.

DYLAN: Exactly, all of you sat there in the arcades on one of the massive link-up machines... Do you think they've done it justice then?

DAN: I reckon.

ALEX: Some people will like it *just* because it's finally a decent conversion of Daytona with a few extras.

WARREN: It's basically a retro game.

ALEX: There's probably not enough there and that's why they didn't proceed with the online racing.

WARREN: It just would have been too expensive for them and it's not a game that will appeal to new users, only to people who remember the original. If you don't remember the original then you'll be wondering what all the fuss is about.

DYLAN: It's not exactly Metropolis Street Racer [ODM] #12, 9/10], is it?

WARREN: No, and in the arcade at the time, with Ridge Racer, it was the best driving game of its day. But if you look at it now, it's a bit . . .

DYLAN: It does look dated, but it's still highly







played in the arcades. It's not going to stand up to the current generation of driving games but it does the game justice and the fans will love it. WARREN: Yeah, if you're really into your driving games then it is worth getting.

DAN: And it's really distinctive, it has a unique look and handling style compared to all the 'realistic' games. WARREN: But if you've just bought a Dreamcast and you've never seen it before, I couldn't recommend it.

DYLAN: Cutting edge nostalgia! WARREN: Exactly!



(ODM #19, 8/10)

RPG fans could be forgiven for not knowing which way to turn of late. Hot on the heels of Grandia II [ODM #18, 8/10] and Phantasy Star Online [ODM #17, 9/10], Skies Of Arcadia is beautifully realised vintage RPG fare. The pirate-based world is entertaining and you could never accuse the developers of shortchanging you on the longevity front. Epic!

DYLAN: I hate RPGs but I really like this one. It's loads of fun being a pirate. It rips off Star Wars like so many games do, and it does have loads and loads of cut-scenes which drive you a bit mad.

WARREN: Yeah...

DYLAN: But I'm still up there with the plot and, like I

say, being a pirate is ace! WARREN: And Alfonso rules.

DYLAN: Alfonso?

WARREN: 'I would fight you but I am busy!' Like

something you'd say at school!

DYLAN: It's good, it's got simple turn-based combat but there's enough flying about to keep it interesting.

DAN: It's hardly 'pick-up-and-play'.

DYLAN: I don't know, I think it's very simple and

that's my normal qualm with RPGs.

WARREN: I think the best thing is that it doesn't have any dwarves or elves in it. They're always in RPGs, but at least this is original.

ALEX: It's a bit hit and miss in the fighting because you don't know who's going to attack next, unlike Grandia II which tells you straight away who's attacking when and all that. Because of that it gets a bit confusing and the coloured gems are all a little baffling at times. **DAN:** I like the VM feature with Cupil...

WARREN: Game developer uses VM shocker! **ALEX:** It is almost a shock to see someone using the VM as it was originally intended like that.

DAN: There's only really been Virtua Tennis [ODM #12, 9/10] where you can see the game on the VM screen.

ROGUE SPEAR

(ODM #19, 6/10)

If the thought of playing a mouse 'n' keyboard PC game on a console brings you out in a cold sweat, then relax. Unlike Tom Clancy's Rainbow Six [ODM #17, 4/10], you can ditch the joypad to play Roque Spear, but opinion among our reviewers was divided about just how suited this out and out PC game is to a console like the Dreamcast.

WARREN: It just looks like a PC game, like Hidden & Dangerous [ODM #13, 7/10] and all the others.

DYLAN: It is!

WARREN: I know, but I don't think that kind of

game suits consoles.

DAN: Is that just a personal view or fact?

WARREN: Well a personal view obviously, but... **DYLAN:** But you only have to go through the menu to see that it's a pure keyboard game from the start.

WARREN: First of all, I don't think these games work on a console and secondly, if they do port them over they should at least go to the effort of making them look like a console game. You get really barren landscapes with cruddy textures and it looks rubbish.

DAN: I think the single-player game is fine, though.

WARREN: But there's no detail.

DAN: I don't know, I played a lot of Rainbow Six and compared to that this is sooo much better, mainly thanks to the mouse and keyboard. Rainbow Six was kind of well-constructed, but looked a bit crap and was impossible to control through the joypad.

ALEX: When you compare it to other games on the Dreamcast though, it just seems so soulless — there's just no atmosphere at all. It's all really empty and dull. **DAN:** I think you're being a bit harsh on it actually.

DYLAN: I really, really love this game!

WARREN: I think the DC is powerful enough to run a game where, if you throw a grenade into a room, the walls take damage and there are decent textures, as opposed the same ones over and over again.

DAN: But it is a good conversion, it comes across well. **ALEX:** But it's a couple of years old now and it wasn't even thought of as that good when it came out on PC. **DYLAN:** The point of the game is the single-player game - the deathmatch thing is just tagged on really - and when you start getting into all the mission briefings and stuff, then creeping about and not wading in Quake-style, it is intriguing.

DAN: I actually quite like that whole planning aspect. Seeing the team carry out some plan that you've just concocted to the last detail can be really cool.

DYLAN: It's good because the main part of it is all the strategy rather than the gameplay. The gameplay is just the implementation of the strategy, and if you're into all that then the combination of planning and then being able to do it in the first-person is great. **DAN:** It answers the major criticisms of *Rainbow Six*

that I made when I reviewed it – namely the ropy graphics and pain of being forced to use the joypad. **DYLAN:** It is good but I'm looking at it as a PC game.

I wouldn't dare play a game like this on a joypad.

DAN: But I think if you're the sort of person who's already gone out and bought a mouse and keyboard then you're likely to be the sort of person who would enjoy this and make the most of it.

DYLAN: I prefer it to *Quake III Arena* [ODM #15, 9/10].

WARREN: Noooo!

DYLAN: Really! I've had enough of all that...

WARREN: Outside, now!

DYLAN: No, the strategy of it is more interesting. ALEX: I like strategies but this one is totally devoid of anything that appeals to me. There's so many different types of strategy games, but this one is just like: if you plan well enough, you'll succeed — and that's it.

DYLAN: Not necessarily, you still have to actually implement the first-person skill to see it through. ALEX: But it seems that, once you've made your plan, so much is taken out of your hands.

DYLAN: No, it's a game of two halves!

DAN: I was thinking more from the storyline rather than the controls necessarily.

WARREN: I thought it was pretty intuitive really. DYLAN: You get to use the A button a lot. And there are differently coloured gems. There're always some differently coloured gems in these games.

WARREN: It's come at an odd time, just after two other RPGs — Grandia II and Phantasy Star Online.

DYLAN: It won't stand up against *Phantasy Star Online*. ALEX: It won't, but it does look stunning.

DYLAN: I don't usually get that suspension of disbelief that you need but I'm a good pirate!

ALEX: The fact that you can upgrade your ship and everything is cool.

DAN: I prefer the fighting system in *Grandia II*. **ALEX:** Yeah, but that's something unique to that game and what makes it really stand out from the crowd, because Grandia II's a basic game which is kind of saved by its ideas.

DAN: I think that kind of inventiveness makes *Grandia II* more interesting than Skies of Arcadia at one level, although Skies' sheer size is impressive. It is massive.

ALEX: And there's plenty of variety, too.

DYLAN: Yeah, you've got your fighting and your level exploration and flying about in your big boaty thing, which is loads of fun!

NBA HOOPZ

(ODM #19, 4/10)

Going up against the masterful NBA 2K [ODM #5, 8/10] was never going to be easy, so Midway have opted for the simplified, over-the-top approach of their earlier NBA Showtime: NBA On NBC [ODM #2, 6/10] and American football game NFL Blitz [ODM #1, 7/10]. The move from two-on-two play to three-on-three confuses the issue though, and the balance between realism and comedy never seems to gel...

WARREN: Ah...

DYLAN: Can I bring up the blinking thing? They don't blink! They didn't blink in *Showtime* either. You've got these amazing facial graphics and it bothers me because they look like zombies and they don't blink! **WARREN:** I think it's fun, but I wouldn't want to pay 30 quid for it. If it was a cheap game that you played every now or then with your mates, then it would be

30 quid for it. If it was a cheap game that you played every now or then with your mates, then it would be highly rated. Obviously it's not *NBA 2K*, but those old games like *NBA Jam* were very popular because proper sports sims at the time weren't that great and they added a nice twist. Now I think I'd rather play *NBA 2K*. **DAN:** Exactly.

ALEX: Basketball is such a flowing game anyway, it doesn't really need turning into some arcade-style game. It's already full of action and awesome moves and all that so why exaggerate it?

DYLAN: And don't you think it was better in the last game [NBA Showtime: NBA On NBC] when it was two players on each team rather than three?

DAN: It's like they've diluted the whole concept. If you're going to have a fun game then you should concentrate on that side, whereas if you're going to make a sim then make it like *NBA 2K*. It seems like they've kind of lost confidence in the original concept

and made half a step over in the other direction... **ALEX:** Yeah, and there's nothing wrong with the original concept, though. Two-on-two is pure basketball and five-on-five is pure basketball, but three-on-three is just clumsy.

WARREN: Exactly. If you're having a four-player game there's one of your team controlled by the computer, and it's like 'Why?'

DAN: And the control seems to switch at random from person to person.

DYLAN: It is random and it gets very confusing. **DAN:** Yeah, you pass to someone and then all of a sudden you realise you've switched control and you've effectively passed it to yourself.

DYLAN: And it takes the control out of your hands for a lot of the game too, having that third player. **WARREN:** Those Midway comedy games are fun but I just don't think this has enough to justify buying it.

DYLAN: I don't think it has enough comedy in it. Compared to *Ready 2 Rumble* [*ODM* #1, 9/10], it's not really that funny...

WARREN: I was referring to stuff like *NFL Blitz*, I think they're quite fun.

ALEX: *Blitz* works by taking American football and making it much more simple and faster paced, but you can't really apply that. And *NBA Jam* did it back when they couldn't do full simulation but now it's been surpassed by other things.

WARREN: I think you get more from pulling off a great move in a serious game than in a comedy one like this because it just wears thin.

DAN: Unless it's just totally over the top.

DYLAN: More like a cartoon! It's not sure what it wants to be.

DAN: I don't think anything really comes close to *NBA 2K* for sheer enjoyment. You're going to have to come up with something pretty special if you're wanting to try and steal its crown.

WARREN: One to look out for in the budget rack...

PRO PINBALL TRILOGY

Originally on PC as separate games, this finely honed pinball game is packed with geeky detail but never ignores the straightforward appeal of the game. Three games for the price of one has to be a good thing and the tables are all lovingly represented — but will it be enough to tempt people away from more established favourites?

WARREN: Ah, another PC conversion...

ALEX: Three PC conversions really, because there are three tables in there.

WARREN: Pinball's a really good game for a console, because it's perfect for kicking back on the sofa and bashing about for a bit. As it were.

DYLAN: It's implemented with passion as well, it's really hardcore!

WARREN: Well, they've done nothing to this conversion really which is a bit disappointing, other than include three separate tables, of course.

DYLAN: What could they have done?

WARREN: They could have made the graphics clearer because it can be really hard to see what's going on if you're using a small TV.

ALEX: Yeah, because of the perspective the top half of the table is just a jumble of bumpers and ramps and stuff and because of the ramps going over and around other areas you can't see what's going on.

DYLAN: And it would have originally been designed for VGA monitors wouldn't it?

ALEX: Unless you go through the slide show, which explains which bit does what, it can be a bit confusing. **WARREN:** It makes a big difference. A lot of the game is kind of mission-based and you need to complete a specific task. Unless you've got a really big TV or you're running it through a VGA monitor, I'd actually advise that you stay away from this. It's also disappointing that they've chosen the weakest three tables from the

PC versions for this. The other table they did was called The Web, which was much better.

DYLAN: Do you like the levels? Do you think they have enough character?

WARREN: I think they're a little bit naff.

DYLAN: The Time Shot thing is brilliant with all the submarines and stuff. The high-score table is fantastic. I mean, I don't really play pinball so I don't know how realistic it is, I'm looking at this purely as a videogame.

DAN: You've been into it for real haven't you?

WARREN: I used to play a bit, but I know these games better from the PC and they were so far ahead of everything else. A company called 21st Century used to do pinball games and they were brilliant.

ALEX: They were.

WARREN: Yeah, but they used to scroll around the table and I always preferred the view on these.

Maybe it's because I used to play them so much back in the day that I'm not that impressed with it on Dreamcast but I think it's a good game for Dreamcast, something different. And you can play four-player too. **ALEX:** And tinker with the tables, set them up how you want to

WARREN: And adjust the wear on the table. **DYLAN:** It's definitely a work of passion.

ALEX: But it is quite lazy because, if you're including three tables and you're a fan of pinball, would you include three modern tables or would you put in ones with a bit more variety. Because they're all basically similar with similar set-ups of ramps and stuff.

DAN: I think people would perhaps expect more than three tables

WARREN: But on PC you'd pay £30 for one! **DAN:** Granted, but that was a few years ago now.

DYLAN: And it's meant to be a 'best of' and everything. You kind of expect extra.

ALEX: But, as pinball games go, what is there is very good and the movement of the ball is very realistic and everything. And the analogue stick is really good — you can be really subtle with the movements.

DAN: Nudging the table is cool!

ALEX: But your fingers kill after a while of playing!

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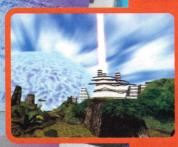




PART THREE: *PSO*'S TRANSLATION SYSTEM

AS PHANTASY STAR ONLINE CONTINUES TO AMAZE US, **ADAM PHILLIPS** TAKES A CLOSE LOOK AT ITS REVOLUTIONARY TRANSLATION SYSTEM THAT LETS PLAYERS ALL OVER THE WORLD COMMUNICATE WITH ONE ANOTHER









It's no walk in the park. When games developers create a game, they have a lot more to worry about than mere gameplay. The point of any software ultimately is to generate stacks of cash for the publisher so they can keep their shareholders happy and continue to crank out games. To achieve this, it's an absolute necessity to make the game accessible to as many different territories across the world as possible.

Releasing a Japanese game over here with no language changes would seriously affect the game's sales, which means the process of localisation is vital, no matter how complex. Mark Fisher, *Phantasy Star Online's* European product manager, explains. "When localising a game for the European market place, the biggest hurdle is to incorporate several European languages in the game – it's not just English that needs to be incorporated, but also French, German, Spanish and sometimes Italian."

This in turn can increase the time it takes to localise a game for Europe over, say, America or Japan. "This makes European localisation more costly and time consuming," explains Mark. "It also affects the time each game spends in testing as the game needs to be played and tested in each language."

Translating *Shenmue* was a real test for Sega – and well worth the effort – but they well and truly bit the bullet with *Phantasy Star Online* by pushing the boundaries and creating a system where a gamer in Bolton can communicate effectively with a player in Tokyo... without the need for a degree in Japanese.

THE AMBITION

So what was Sega's ultimate goal for *Phantasy Star Online*?

IT ALL COMES DOWN to collaboration at the end of the day. When Phantasy Star Online was being dreamt up. Sonic Team, the developers, knew that to create a truly community-driven online experience, different languages could not stand in the way. Kuniyo Matsomoto, the game's European producer, explains the tough brief: "Phantasy Star Online is all about collaborative gaming - joining together to help each other on your guest. In order to collaborate, you need to communicate and that is the problem that Sonic Team faced with Phantasy Star Online. You must be able to communicate with other players from around the world but there is little time to consult your 'phrase book' mid-battle - when

confronting a gigantic fire-breathing dragon, the communication solution needed to be quick and easy to use!" So Sonic Team set about creating the answer to this thorny issue...

THE EXECUTION

So exactly how did Sega go about creating the unique and innovative translation system that has united gamers from all over the planet?

FOR THOSE OF YOU perhaps unfamiliar with Phantasy Star Online's 'word select' system, the game's interface allows the player to communicate using set words and phrases in the player's native tongue. Once the sentence has been completed, it is then automatically translated into the native language of the other players in their Phantasy Star Online team. "If you want to send a message to your team-mate who doesn't speak your language," explains Kuniyo,"Then go to 'word select' and construct the sentence. On your screen, the message will be displayed in your language but in the team-mate's screen, the message will be displayed in their language."

The actual amount of sentences and phrases available to players are

far too numerous to count according to Sega. They believe that there is a sentence to cover every single element of the game that players need to talk about and if there isn't, the option to make one is also available.

There were numerous hurdles to overcome though during the creation of the system. "We have had so much difficulty implementing the system for the five languages featured in the game — Japanese, French, German, Spanish and English," explains Kuniyo. "If the system worked fine for the German language, then it wouldn't necessarily work in Japanese or French. Just to give you an example, there are no articles or genders in Japanese." Basic issues such as language length also have to be taken into account — a sentence in German typically taking up about a third more space than in English.

The end result is a practical and workable system which is further enhanced by the ability to chat using simple symbols. There are only six 'stock' symbols available to use but, as seasoned

Phantasy Star Online players will know by now, the ability to create your own has thrown up some intriguing new ones.

Localising the game to work across five different languages also threw up technical issues as well. To bring such an online title to the global masses required specific servers to be set up for each territory in Europe so we Brits could play against our Spanish chums. *PSO* also had to be configured for differences in television formats such as 50 or 60Hz options. Sega also needed to consider how Dreamcast users connected to play online via their local telephone company.

With such technical issues dealt with, there was one more major issue to deal with — namely making sure there was no swearing in *Phantasy Star Online*'s world. To make sure that swearing didn't become common place in the game, a filtering system was put in place. After a player has typed in a message to other gamers online, it is sent to Sega's servers which have software filters in place to check the words. Any fruity language is removed automatically. As Stuart Turner, Sega PR Manager and *PSO* fanatic, has discovered though, the system isn't without its shortcomings. "Typing in 'shoes' throws up some intriguing censoring — because the word contains 'hoes', the end result comes out as 's#@!?'," explains Stuart. "Also, the original censorship was based on American spellings, so words such as 'ass' were banned, but not 'arse'. The system has since been updated, though!"

But Sega see the censorship system as a necessity. "It can be refined if people let us know about any problems," says Kuniyo. "But for some words, we can't do anything about it because some people will do anything to send filthy words in the game so we have to worry about that first!"

All in all, creating the multilingual *Phantasy Star Online* was ambitious stuff, a fact reflected in the amount of time it took to bring Sega's vision to the home. The language system took upwards of 10,000 man hours to create, including a massive testing schedule over Sega's worldwide network incorporating three continents, four countries and five languages. For the European language translator alone, the system was being tested more than eight months prior to *Phantasy Star Online's* February 2001 launch. The testing procedure was carried out by over 300 testers to make sure that gremlins didn't creep in and spoil the *Phantasy Star Online* experience.

COMMUNICATION OPTIONS

BALLOON CHAT is the first of the three key ways to communicate with other people in the game. Players can simply type in their words and they are displayed in a balloon above their character's head. If you've got a keyboard this is often the quickest way but you're limited to the language you type in – there's no translation.

WORD SELECT is where the really clever stuff happens – players construct sentences using a menu of words. These sentences are then automatically translated into the specified language – Japanese, German, English, Spanish or French.

SYMBOL CHAT flashes up a simple picture that allows punters to 'emote' a mood or a feeling. Quirky sounds and the ability to hotkey your favourite symbols makes this a popular way of communicating online and a simple means of getting across your message. You'll see a lot of these popping up.

CUSTOMISABLE SYMBOLS have proved a massive hit among online *PSO* players with ever more elaborate creations being used. The six stock options covered the basics but players have quickly adapted the system to incorporate call-signs, insults and even, through clever hotkey set-up, animated symbols.

So how has the system gone down with gamers worldwide?

Online has created something of a global phenomenon. From first-time online gamers through to jaded old-skool players, the game has been embraced across the planet. Forums and magazines are filled with stories about their experiences in the game and their online adventures with players from all over the world. The overall response has been excellent.

THE ARRIVAL OF PHANTASY Star

"There are so many people who cannot speak English in Japan as well," explains Mark Fisher. "So, it's been useful for them, understandably." Indeed, in keeping with the true

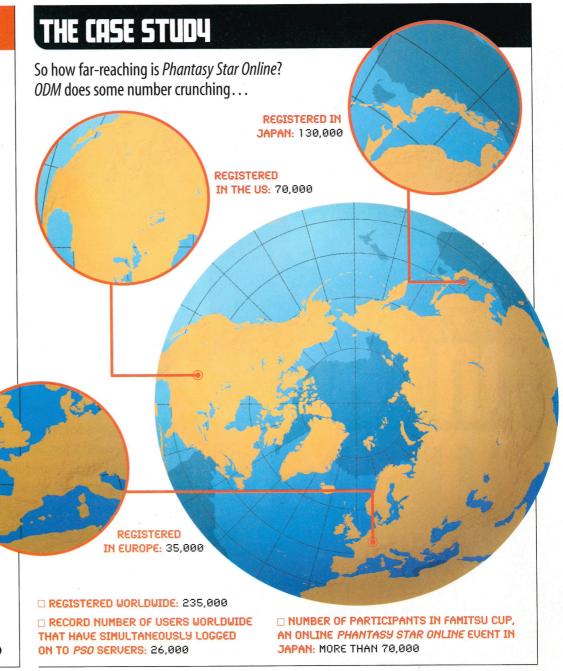
say Sega. And it's not just us English-

speaking gamers who are happy.

system, Japanese players have been incredibly generous to us westerners by donating Meseta, weaponry, armour and advice for free. We westerners, on the other hand, have been flogging our *Phantasy Star Online* wares online at auction sites such as eBay!

There have been criticisms though about some of the grammatical routines used in the system, but Sega have promised it will be improved upon in *Phantasy Star Online 2.* "We do need to have a much more complex system to accommodate all languages," says Mark. Also, don't be surprised to see the language system springing up elsewhere — Sega believe that the system can not only be used for online gaming, but even in Internet chat and other applications.

But are Sega planning to license the language system technology to other developers? "We can't comment on that at the moment, however we do see it as a valuable commodity that has made online gaming a lot more interesting than ever before," says Stuart Turner, Sega's top PR bod. And we won't argue with that.

PROFILE

Team 17 were originally created in 1990 to produce games for the Amiga, and were known as 17Bit Software. They've had success with

titles like Full Contact, Alien Breed, Assassin, Project X, Superfrog and Body Blows. In 1995, Worms was released. Starting life as an entry to an Amiga magazine's 'make a game' competition, Worms has gone on to become a massive worldwide hit, with numerous follow-ups and upgrades since. With the second Dreamcast version, Worms World Party (ODM #15, 8/10), recently released, the game's producer and three designers sat down to answer your questions.

WORM SPEAK

Who does the squeaky noises for the worms? JULIAN PIETRZYK, BECKENHAM

KEVIN CARTHEW: Various people from the company have helped out in creating sound banks for the game. Team 17 employs a broad range of people from all walks of life, so it wasn't with much difficulty that we attempted to recreate squeaky versions of cockney barrow boys, cheeky Geordie chappies and loveable

Yorkshire tykes. For the international sound banks, we use various translation/ recording studios throughout the world.

WRIGGLE ON

Will you continue making Worms games?
OLLIE SCOTT, VIA EMAIL

PAUL KILBURN: Absolutely. We currently have three Worms games in full development but at the moment aren't speaking about them till we have started discussions with publishers, which will be around May time for the first one. None of which are in the 2D style that you are all used to and all are highly original in their own way.

ALL-OUT WORMS

Have you ever thought of making a real-time *Worms* game?

OLLIE SCOTT, VIA EMAIL

JOHN EGGETT: Some of Worms
World Party's missions are played in single-player real-time, and are not turn-based. Some of the missions play more like mini-games than a full-blown game of Worms, because they utilise the Worms engine and physics but the game objectives are not the norm. Oh, the variety!

GRANT TOWELL: I think *Worms* is best left in its current incarnation as a turn-based game. Real-time is something we've played with in the single-player game side of things in *Worms World Party*. Some of the stuff we've managed to get out of the engine after endless tinkering really is something to be proud of.

WORM FAVOURITES

What are your favourite games on Dreamcast, excluding your own?

OLLIE SCOTT, VIA EMAIL

KC: I love the 'rhythm' games (hee hee!), especially Dance Dance Revolution [Japanese import] and Samba De Amigo! The magic of Shenmue had me transfixed for a long time, and Soul Calibur is great for two-player bouts with your mates.

JE: Most things that are multiplayer — Dead Or Alive 2, Virtua Tennis. You just can't beat playing against a real person. GT: Mr Driller and Virtua Tennis. Both are extremely playable.

SLOW WORMS

Why has Worms World Party's release been delayed so much?

ALEX BERROYER, OLDHAM

PK: Good question. The Dreamcast online side was up and running last September, but we've had numerous problems making sure that it all runs stable with four players through Dreamarena. On top of this we have the Dreamcast submission process to go through, which takes anywhere from six weeks to 12 weeks from when we actually finish to when the game appears in the stores. The good news is the game is now totally finished and approved by Sega Europe and will be on sale by the time you read this.

NOT ENOUGH WORMS

Why did *Worms Armageddon* only work with one joypad? That was really annoying.

NIC VINCENT, VIA EMAIL

JE: Yep, someone has a red face, thus Worms World Party now allows gamers to select which pad they wish to use. So now you can fight over who gets the pad with the rumble in.

WORMS DIMENSION

Are you going to do a 3D Worms game?

JOOLS TARRIER, NOTTINGHAM

PK: Yes we are and have been working on designs and prototypes for the last few years and finally we believe we have it right, but it's still a way from release so we don't really want to give too much away. What I will say, is it moves the game forward quite significantly in terms of how it's played, and that was the most important thing for us. Thankfully, with the technology jumps that have happened with the next-generation machines, it now means we can deliver the game we want to. Producing this on the last generation

machines would have meant the game took a step backwards in terms of gameplay, and that was something we weren't prepared to compromise on.

ALIEN RESURRECTION

Is there any chance of a new *Alien Breed* game? The Amiga version was excellent.

PK: Thanks Ray! This is one of the most popular questions we get asked and one of the most enjoyable. Alien Breed is also a huge favourite at Team 17, and everyone here can't wait to share what we are doing on the next-generation version. The game is almost finished in terms of the design stages. We've brought the original lead programmer (Andreas Tadic) and artist (Rico Holmes) back together and are building a development team around them to ensure it's everything that the fans and Team 17 expect the game to be. I can tell you the design is absolutely fantastic, and I've been lucky enough to see some of the early work as it's been coming along. You won't be disappointed, I can tell you!

MASSIVE WORMS

How many copies have the *Worms* games sold worldwide? Did you have any idea they would be so big when you first saw the original game?

STEPHANIE KIRKLAND, BURY

PK: Worms games have sold in excess of five million copies worldwide thus far. I'd love to say 'yeah, sure we knew it was going to be this big' but truthfully we knew the game was very special, but had no idea that it would go on to be the success that it has. That said, games like

Worms deserve to do well as they focus on the most important element of a game – and often the least focused area (by far too many games companies) – and that's gameplay.

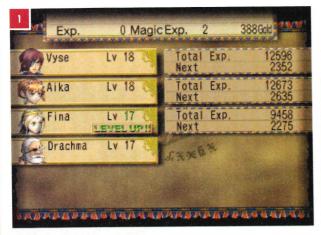

RANDOM BATTLES * Silver and yell each other. 3 Alternatively, to

- Most of the fights you'll face will be random battles. These can pop up in any 'danger' area, and also whilst you're moving from place to place in your ship. You can run away from battles, but it's a good idea to stand and fight. Run away too often and you'll get a reputation for being a coward, and you'll run into problems later as a result. Furthermore, every scrap you get into builds you up. You'll learn Magic, earn Gold and gain vital Experience. The more Experience you get, the more formidable you'll be.
- Always change the element of your weapon before you go into battle, since you'll do more damage that way. Every adversary is represented by a colour, which is indicated by the border around the picture of them in the top right-hand corner of the screen. Use the following elements against the following colours:
 - Use the red element against green enemies.
 - Use the blue element against red enemies.
 - Use the purple element against blue enemies.
 - Use the green element against purple enemies.

- Silver and yellow are equal to each other.
- Alternatively, use the element that will help you learn the Magic you most want. For example, if you use only the red element, you'll learn the red Magic quicker. Initially the most useful Magic to learn is green, because it includes the healing spells. Once you've learned Sacres, you won't know how you managed without it. Later, once you've earned the silver element, try and learn silver Magic. These spells include Curia (which will heal ill effects cast by enemies), Riselem (which revives an unconscious ally), and Eterni (with which you can attempt to kill an enemy instantly).
- denerally speaking, it's a good idea to concentrate on one enemy at a time, rather than spreading your attacks across all of the creatures in a battle. Some of your adversaries can use healing Magic or call allies, and of course they still do the same damage to you, no matter how badly wounded they are. Skies Of Arcadia uses a turn-based system, so the more enemies are still alive the more attacks you'll face in a round. So finish 'em off!
- Spirit Points are, in many cases, the key to victory since they allow you to perform Magic



and Super Moves. The most important thing to note about these is that you can't carry them from battle to battle, so don't worry about using them up. It can be worth building them up for a turn or two in order to perform the really draining Super Moves, but otherwise just employ them however seems best to you at the time.

One of the best ways to use them is to do things that would normally cost you Items and Magic Points to achieve. Examples of these include Aika's Epsilon Mirror (which regenerates Magic Points) and Fina's Lunar Blessing (which regenerates Hit Points).

Don't forget that the characters can use Items and Magic on each other as well as on themselves. If you find that a particular character is not of much use in a battle, then use them to heal the others. This is often the case with Fina and, to a lesser extent, Aika (more detail on this is featured in the individual character sections). You'll often find this when fighting bosses, since you'll need to heal frequently but won't want to let up your attacks. If a character is at a total loose end during a battle, just guard or focus. As long as they're still conscious, they'll be generating Spirit Points and are







CHARACTERS

The characters in your party each have different functions in battle. Here's a helpful rundown on how to use them most effectively.

1 VYSE: Vyse is your main character, and he's usually the best on the attack. He's the only one to begin with a Super Move in his armoury: the Cutlass Fury, which you'll find useful throughout the game. Later, you'll find that his other Super Moves are the ones that are vital when you come up against the tougher bosses.

> The Rain of Swords costs a lot in terms of Spirit Points, but sometimes when you face multiple enemies, it's worth focusing for the first round and using the Rain of Swords in the second. It'll usually wipe out at



least a couple and free you up to work on the others.

2 AIKA: Vyse's travelling companion (they're just good friends, apparently). She's not as strong on the offensive as he is, but she comes into her own in other ways. Learn her Alpha Storm move as soon as you can it's not as powerful as the Rain of Swords, but it only uses four Spirit Points and is a great opening strike.

> Aika's Magic is less powerful than Fina's, but later on she has the advantage that she can regenerate her Magic Points with the Epsilon Mirror. Because she's an all-rounder, Aika should be used wherever she is most









FINA: Fina possesses the most powerful Magic but she is the weakest character physically. She joins later, after you save her from Valua, and remains until the end of the game. Her weapon is Cupil, a little round creature who evolves when he eats Chams. Until you've built Cupil up, Fina's attacks are almost useless, so she's best used to focus and heal.

> She also has a great Super Move in the Lunar Blessing, which gives each character in your party an extra 200 HP at the beginning of each round. If you're facing a lengthy battle, use the Lunar Blessing as early as possible.

DRACHMA: You'll meet Drachma when rescued by the Little Jack. He's a grizzled old pirate who's hunting a legendary whale. Drachma is a little slow but his attacks are very powerful. You don't even necessarily have to use his Super

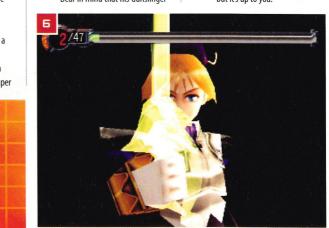
Moves - his regular attacks are often enough. He's also more robust than the other characters, so you can sometimes afford to leave him unguarded. In boss battles, Drachma's Spirit Charge can be very useful. It doubles his Spirit Points and often means that you can use Super Moves in every round.

GILDER: Gilder joins your party when he rescues Vyse from Crescent Island. He's a pretty sharp dude and brandishes a pistol rather than a sword. His role in battles is not dissimilar to Drachma's. He can take a lot of hits and, as you'd imagine, he can do considerable damage with that gun, although he's younger and therefore faster. Bear in mind that his Gunslinger

attack can waste even the strongest of enemies. Plus, it looks really cool.

ENRIQUE: The Royal Prince of Valua grows dissatisfied with his mother's rule as the game goes on, and joins your party after they escape from the city for the second time. He begins with a surprising amount of Experience, considering he's barely been outside the walls of his city. Being roughly the same age as Vyse, though, he's similar in battles.

> Drachma, Gilder and Enrique come in and out of your party, and are never all there at once. At the end, you can choose who you want to take into the final battle. Smart gamers take Gilder, but it's up to you.





BOSSES

The bosses in *Skies of Arcadia* are, in fact, much like the regular enemies, only with more Hit Points and better attacks.
Frequently, you'll find that the only way to knock those Hit Points down is to use Super Moves, so really it's just a case of using a more extreme version of the strategies we've already described.

The attacks designed for use against multiple enemies (Alpha Storm, Lambda Burst, Rain of Swords) tend not to be of much use against a single adversary, and they certainly won't kill boss characters outright. Cutlass Fury, Gunslinger and the like will work better. For this reason, using Aika to focus rather than attack is often a good idea.

The majority of the bosses you'll face in Skies Of Arcadia are pretty easy, until you come up against Carcer. Carcer and his spellcasters are the barrier to your daring rescue of Vyse's father and his crew. The best way to tackle this is to try and get rid of the spellcasters first because, although they are much weaker than Carcer, they will cause you havoc if you leave them to fight whilst you concentrate on the executioner himself. When you've done that, you'll find that Drachma's attacks are the most damaging to Carcer and you should use Vyse's Super Moves as support.

■ Guarding Daccat's Coin are a couple of big ugly heads called Destra and Sinistra. The key to this is to kill off one of the heads as quickly as possible, because they have a nasty little trick called the Death Waltz, which they can do for one or more of your party in one turn. However, they can only perform the Death Waltz together, so once you're rid of one, the other is a much less terrifying prospect. To achieve this, use Vyse's Super Moves, and have Fina boost the attacks with Increm. Also note that the heads have different element colours, so don't forget to change your own element when you move your attention to the other head.



Tortigar, guardian of the Blue Moon Crystal, is another hard nut to crack. He has a defence called Steelskin, which can see off almost anything. Try to keep everybody alive and use the Special Prophecy - it's useful here because it is the only thing that happens on the turn it is employed, so Tortigar will not be able to use Steelskin against it. It uses a lot of Spirit Points, though, so you might have to do some focusing. Try arming Vyse with the Black Map and have him defend whilst the others focus. Three hits with the Special Prophecy should see him off, but if Tortigar uses Sacres magic, the battle may well be much longer.

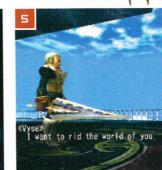
5 Galcian will return to trouble you again near the end of the game, and he's a formidable adversary. He's highly likely to cast Eterni spells on you, so counter these using Gilder's Aura of Denial. Again, Vyse



should be boosted with Increm, and he should use Pirate's Wrath. This will obviously use a lot of Spirit Points, so focusing might be a good idea if you're willing to risk leaving yourself open. Riselem Crystals will be invaluable, seeing as how Galcian can knock out characters instantly with his Terminal attack.

After that, you'll face Ramirez —
twice! Like Galcian, he'll also be
using Eterni spells, and this is
why it's a very good idea to
take Gilder with you into this
final section. Use his Aura of
Denial again to protect you from
this. Be warned that Ramirez
also has Lunar Blessing, which
gives him another 600 HP in
each round.

As if that wasn't bad enough, when you fight him the second time, he can use the Silver Nightmare to control a character for a round. It goes without saying that you need to tackle Ramirez cautiously, but if you're too cautious he'll always have time to repair whatever damage you do. As with Galcian before him, Pirate's Wrath is your best bet against Ramirez.

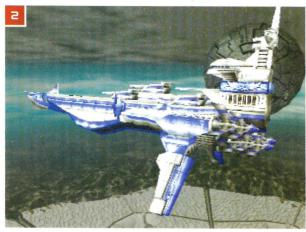






SHIP BATTLES

Pou'll start to encounter Ship
Battles once you meet Drachma
and travel on the Little Jack.
They're a little different from
the regular battles, but you'll
soon pick up how they work.
They can seem quite tough at
first, but actually they are
usually a case of staying alive
until you can use that ship's
special weapon. The Little Jack
doesn't have any at first, but
when you reach Sailors' Island,
talk to the merchant in the ship



parts shop. This will eventually get you the Harpoon Gun, which is enough to do for most of the ships you encounter whilst sailing with Drachma.

After your capture by the Armada and escape from Valua, Enrique will give you the Delphinius, which is a significant step up from the ships you'll have seen so far in the game. This possesses the awesome power of the Moon Stone Cannon, which you can use in much the same way as the Harpoon Cannon. Always fire these special weapons when you have the chance, since the opportunities to use them can be infrequent. They use a lot of Spirit Points, though, so it can be a good idea to focus when you're not sure what else to do.

 There's a pretty straightforward strategy for the ship battles, and it can be applied to all the battles in the game with some success. The turns are coded green, yellow and red. You should attack on the green turns, heal on the yellow ones and guard on the reds. As noted earlier, though, you should mostly endeavour to just avoid getting shot down until you get an opening for the special weapon. When that happens, you should usually ignore the colour of the turn, since it could be your only chance to finish your opponent off.

Some of the battles are harder than others, and we'll take you through a few of those now.
The Lynx is the first really tough



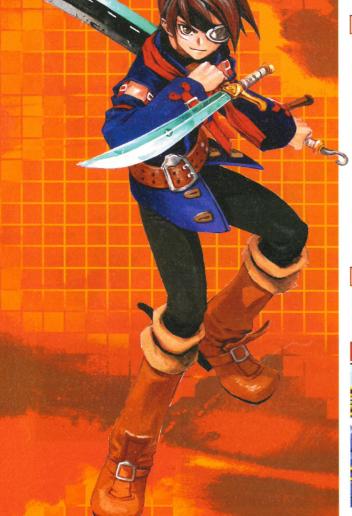
ship battle, which you have to fight for the Red Moon Crystal. She can do you some pretty serious damage in just a couple of turns, so heal frequently (always buy lots of repair kits when you get the chance — they don't cost much and you'll use a lot during the big battles). Try to catch the Lynx off guard. When you get the option, go into a sharp climb — it'll give you the opening you need.

Moon Crystal, the Delphinius will really be tested when you face three battles in a row, with Gregario's ships attacking you one by one. You'll get a chance to fire the Moon Stone Cannon on the Cruiser in the second round, so focus for the first and you should be fine. Play defensively against the Gunboat, and wait to be given to option to close in on it. Finally, the Flagship will take you on. This'll be a long fight, since it can take a lot of

battering. It often tries a barrage attack after the Hull Ram, so watch out for that. Use Increm to boost your attacks.

Galcian's Sky Fortress, the Hydra, is probably the most difficult ship battle in the game. You'll face attacks on virtually every turn, doing a total damage of more than 10,000 HP in each round. Your only option is to use a Complete Kit at some point in every round. Again, use a lot of Increm and only use your most powerful weapons.

It's here that you should take particular note of the colour of turns, since if you leave yourself open on a red turn the Hydra Cannon may finish you off instantly. Just be patient, and go into this battle well tooled up. The same strategy, incidentally, will serve you well when you fight Zelos a little later on.











DISCOVERIES

As with many RPGs, you work your way from the beginning to the end in the quickest way possible or complete it properly, by going everywhere there is to go and finding everything there is to find.

There are two aspects to completing *SOA*. One is locating all the crewmembers for the Delphinius (which we'll cover next month), and the other is making all the Discoveries.

to be made in this game. They are in the form of lost relics, legendary creatures and mythical places, and you'll be introduced to them just after the opening stage on the Valuan Battleship.
Once you've defeated Antonio and raided the battleship, you take control of Captain Dyne's ship and are told to set sail for Pirate's Isle.

Before you head for your home island, though, there's a Discovery to be made. Almost directly in front of you, to the south, is a small island. Sail over it and press A when you see the compass start to spin.

The Pirate's Grave will pop up, and a little placard of information about it will follow. The other crewmembers will then explain Discoveries to you. Press A whenever you see the





compass spin around like this to find more Discoveries.

Discoveries are a useful source of money, as the information on them can be sold at any Sailors' Guild in any decent-sized port you come across. They also improve your standing. Go and see Domingo at Gordo's Bistro from time to time, and you'll get rewards for your intrepid exploits (Domingo will join your crew on the Delphinius after you've made 30 Discoveries.)

Don't hoard Discoveries — sell them as soon as you get the chance. Frequently, somebody else will beat you to it and your information will be rendered almost worthless.

However, there is one time you should keep a couple in reserve. After you find the Green Moon Crystal, the Little Jack will be attacked and the party will be



split up. Vyse carries all the Gold and Items, so Aika and Fina will be left penniless and illequipped for the journey to find Daccat's Coin. If you've got a few Discoveries up your sleeve, though, this can easily be remedied. You'll certainly need healing crystals and suchlike for this quest, so get the Gold for your Discoveries and stock up. Other than this, there's no real value in keeping Discoveries in reserve.

Well, you've found the Pirate's Grave — let's help you to find the other 63 Discoveries. There are several that you'll end up finding by following the plot. It's worth noting what they are, so that you know that they count as Discoveries and can be sold.

TEMPLE OF PYRNN: To the north-east of Maramba. The Red Moon Crystal is located here.
IXA'TAKA: This lies at the end of the tempestuous South Ocean.
GOLDEN MAN: Atop the rock to the left of the King's Hideout, in the little forest.

THE GREAT BIRD: Also near the King's Hideout, just past the Golden Man. Look down and you should see it cut into the plains.

GATES OF RIXIS: Follow the pointing finger of the Golden Man and the beak of the Great Bird until you reach the golden gates.

GUARDIAN WALLS: These are on the other side of the Dark Rift.

S YAFUTOMA: The city within the Guardian Walls.

WORLD IS ROUND: Travel east from Yafutoma to Crescent Isle to establish this.

LANDS OF ICE: In the area to the south of South Ocean. The Purple Moon Crystal is here.



AND THERE'S MORE...

The remainder of the Discoveries are just scattered around the map. In order to be the first to make the Discovery, and therefore claim the reward, this is the order in which we suggest that you look for them.

RARITIES

If you complete *PSO* and start playing through again on the Hard setting, or regularly play Hard or Very Hard online games, you'll begin to find 'rare' items. These are usually more powerful weapons or better armour, and are great for taking on higher level baddies. Some rarities are harder to find than others, and can be sold or swapped with other players. Here's the lowdown

The armour listed on the right are the best types, but can only be found in Very Hard mode (either online or offline) and even then only from enemies — not in the shops. 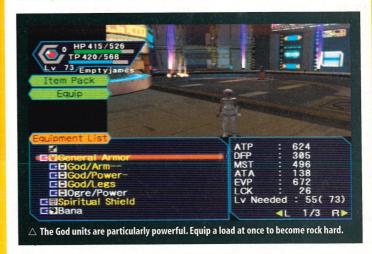

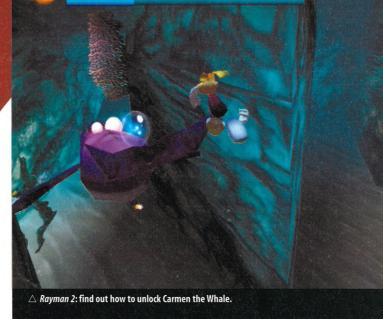

After killing a pirate situated in the centre of three islands, you smash a door with a barrel and will find a cage inside. Break that, then climb the trees outside. Use the Purple Lum to swing over and go through the door to a new area. If you swim underwater and enter a small cavern near the shore, you'll be able to swim to a small area on the other side. Shoot the switch on the other side of this room and that will open the door to free Carmen. Now you can try the underwater stage.

Yes Tracy, there is a way to unlock every single track, car and cheat mode that South Park Rally has to offer, but it's quite difficult to execute. Basically, you have to complete the Championship mode without collecting any tokens. Good luck!

A VM (Visual Memory) is a memory card that plugs into your Dreamcast controller and enables you save game data. It's absolutely essential for titles like *Shenmue* and *Metropolis Street Racer* where you want to save your game position. The official Sega Visual Memory unit costs £19.99.

WHY DOES IT HAVE AN LCD SCREEN BUILT INTO IT?

To show additional information (hit ratios in Ready 2 Rumble Boxing, player data in NBA 2K, for example) when you're playing games. Also, when the VM is unplugged from a controller you can play mini-games (for example the Tamagotchi-style Chao game from Sonic Adventure). These are 'downloaded' via Dreamcast games or direct from the Net, and are stored in memory.

HOW MUCH INFORMATION DOES A VM HOLD?

128k, divided in 200 'blocks'. In other words, enough to store data from several different titles and/or a mini-game.

HOW MANY BLOCKS DOES EACH GAME USE?

It depends on the game, but here are some examples: Shenmue (80 blocks), Metropolis Street Racer (68), Virtua Tennis (2), Rayman 2 (2 per save plus 2 for configuration).

WHY DOES MY DREAMCAST BEEP WHEN IT STARTS UP?

The beeping is your DC telling you that the VM unit's batteries have run out.

WHERE CAN I GET NEW BATTERIES FOR IT?

Try Tandy if there's one near you, or any similar electronic retailer.

The model number is CR2032 and they cost about £4 for a pair.

WILL I LOSE MY SAVE GAMES IF THE VM'S BATTERIES RUN OUT?

No. You won't be able to play mini-games on it, but it will still work as a memory card.

ARE SEGA EUROPE STILL GOING TO RELEASE THE 4X MEMORY UNIT, PREVIOUSLY MENTIONED IN ODM?

No one is entirely sure. We'll keep you updated on this.

I'VE HEARD OF A VM ANIMATOR FOR PCS. WHERE CAN I GET ONE?

You can download the animator and loads of sample animations from Booyaka (www.booyaka.com) and Planetweb (http://dreamcast.planetweb.com/ community/vmu/).

WHAT'S THE POINT OF VM ANIMATIONS?

There isn't a point as such – it's just a bit of fun. Ghostface (based on the movie Scream 3) is our favourite. Others well worth a look include Star Wars: Episode II, Alien Encounter and The Great Battle.

WHICH DC TITLES INCLUDE VM MINI-GAMES?

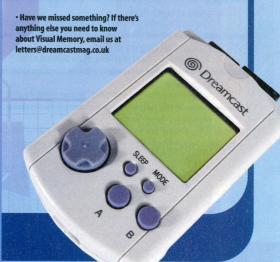
Try the likes of Skies of Arcadia, Sonic Adventure, Trickstyle, Power Stone and Zombie Revenge.

CAN I DOWNLOAD MINI-GAMES OFF THE NET?

Yes you can. You can find some other bits and pieces at Booyaka and Planetweb (site addresses above).

CAN I DOWNLOAD GAME SAVES OFF THE NET?

Yep.VMU Centre (www.vmucentre.co.uk) have a pretty good collection.

PERIDHERALS



I HAVE A 100HZ TELEVISION, AND THE DREAMCAST LIGHT-GUN DOESN'T WORK. WHY?

This is because the screen refreshes faster than the game, so the light-gun hits aren't registered properly. There's nothing you can do about this, we're afraid.

I'VE HEARD THAT THE SEGA LIGHT-GUN WON'T WORK WITH SONY SUPER TRINITRON TVS. IS THIS TRUE?

Turn off the Auto Picture facility of the television and you'll be okay.

DOES THE LIGHT-GUN WORK WITH GAMES OTHER THAN HOUSE OF THE DEAD 2?

Currently no, but more compatible games are expected soon including *Confidential Mission* (see page 46), *Gun Valkyrie* and *House of the Dead 3*.

WHY SHOULD I BOTHER WITH A SCART LEAD?

Simply because it will improve picture quality compared with using the RF cable (or 'TV lead') which is supplied with the DC. A fully wired RGB SCART cable is the best option, but check that your TV is compatible before shelling out.

WILL SEGA BE RELEASING A PRINTER SO I CAN PRINT OUT WER PAGES?

No. For the record, there's a button marked 'Print' on the Dreamcast keyboard simply because it's based on a PC model.

WHAT'S ALL THIS I HEAR ABOUT A DC CAMERA?

Sega announced a camera, called Dreameye, last year but it's highly unlikely that we'll see it released in Europe now.

WHAT'S A VGA BOX?

It's an adaptor that enables you play DC games on a PC monitor, offering improved picture quality. Sega haven't officially released their VGA box in Britain, but you'll find one if you look hard enough.

WHY DON'T ALL GAMES SUPPORT A VGA MODE?

Because it takes extra time for the developer to include support, and some don't think it's worth their while. If support is included, then it should be a seen as a *bonus*. Look for a logo on the back of the box for compatibility or check out the Games Directory on these pages.

WHY HAVEN'T SEGA OFFICIALLY RELEASED THE VGA BOX IN THE UK?

We're not entirely sure but would guess that Sega Europe don't wish to confuse gamers by promoting a product which works with some games but not others.

WHAT'S A RUMBLE PACK, AND DOES IT WORK WITH ALL GAMES?

It's an add-on that plugs into your controller and makes it vibrate. It's compatible with virtually all games. Expect to pay under £15 for an official Sega one.

WHY SHOULD I BUY A KEYBOARD AND MOUSE?

A Dreamcast Keyboard is pretty much essential if you're using your Dreamcast for regular emailing. Get a Dreamcast Mouse as well if you intend playing lots of *Quake III Arena*. Each costs less than £20.

WHY DOESN'T THE DREAMCAST MOUSE WORK WITH THE DREAMKEY BROWSER?

Because the browser was programmed before the Mouse became available. Unfortunately, you'll have to wait for the next version of Dreamkey for compatibility.

IS THE SEGA ARCADE STICK COMPATIBLE WITH ALL DC GAMES?

Yes, but with varying degree of usefulness. We'd only really recommend buying one if you're a die-hard fighting game fan (they're especially good with Capcom beat 'em ups).

IS IT WORTH GETTING A STEERING WHEEL?

Only if you feel like splashing out. Obviously you can only use them for driving games, and the standard DC pad gives you analogue steering, acceleration and braking, so there's really no need.

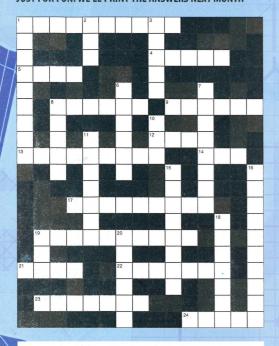
WHY DON'T ODM REVIEW PERIPHERALS?

WHY CAN'T I PLAY .WAY FILES ON MY DREAMCAST?

You can, as long as they're embedded in Web pages. The Dreamkey browser can also play .au and .aiff sound files, and has partial support for Javascript as well as Macromedia Flash (version 3).

WHEN WILL A NEW VERSION OF DREAMKEY BE RELEASED?

Probably around Easter. Sega are adding improved Javascript and Flash support. Watch out for news on our website (www.dreamcastmag.co.uk) or Dreamarena.

CAN I USE MY OWN INTERNET SERVICE PROVIDER (ISP) WITH DREAMCAST?

Currently no, but watch out for news on this.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST TO USE MY DC ONLINE?

Calls are charged at nationwide local rates, so check with your phone operator. With BT standard charges are 1p/min at weekends, 1.49p/min during weekday evenings and 3.95p/min during peak hours but that's before any discounting.

CAN I ADD THE NUMBER TO MY BT FRIENDS & FAMILY LIST?

Yes. And if you nominate the number as your 'best friend' number you can get further discounts.

WHAT NUMBER DOES THE DC DIAL?

The number in the UK is 0845 757 6339.

WHY CAN'T I ACCESS CERTAIN WEBSITES?

Because Dreamkey has a built-in child lock to filter out 'inappropriate' content. Annoyingly, this also includes some legitimate sites like Hotmail. Over 18s can deactivate the filter by reregistering on Dreamarena (look for a check box at the bottom of the screen).

CAN I ACCESS NEWSGROUPS ON DREAMCAST?

Yes, via sites like www.remarq.com and www.deja.com which provide a Web interface for newsgroups. Sites like these aren't among the easiest to browse on DC, however.

WHICH NEWSGROUPS ARE WORTH LOOKING AT?

That depends on your personal tastes. For Dreamcast gaming, uk.games.video.dreamcast is a good place to start.

CAN I STILL RECEIVE EMAILS EVEN WHEN MY DREAMCAST IS SWITCHED OFF?

Yes! Your mail is stored on Sega's servers and isn't affected by what you're doing with your Dreamcast.

WHICH DREAMCAST GAMES ALLOW ME TO PLAY OTHERS ONLINE?

The big ones are Phantasy Star Online (ODM #17, 9/10), Quake III
Arena (ODM #15, 9/10), and ChuChu Rocket! (ODM #9, 9/10).

OKAY, SO WHICH OTHER GAMES HAVE ONLINE FEATURES?

Metropolis Street Racer, F355 Challenge and Sonic Adventure are among those with online facilities. Others, like Rayman 2, include bonuses which can be unlocked by going online. Check out the Directory starting on page 86.

CAN I USE A US OR JAPANESE DC ONLINE IN THE UK?

Yes, but only to surf the Web. You won't be able to access the Dreamarena portal or gaming network.

I'M HAVING PROBLEMS WITH MY DC ONLINE. WHO CAN I CALL FOR HELP?

Drop them off within the time allowed to collect their cash. Then find another customer — but be quick! There's a host of excellent mini-games that will get you perfecting some of the special techniques that are buried beneath the surface of the main game. Essentially a score attack, this is an excellent conversion of the hit arcade game that manages to add a number of unique home features that'll make you play for ages.



ECCO THE DOLPHIN SEGA • ISSUE #9 • 9/10 • GUIDE #11, 12, 13

Beautiful aquatic adventure starring a young dolphin out to save Earth. An enemy known as the Foe has shattered the Guardian, the source of the Earth's defences – it's up to Ecco to search for the pieces. Controlling Ecco is easy. Think of it like a flight sim – you can swim any way you like, roll, turn upside down and leap out of the water... you can even get Ecco to tailwalk. The action starts easy enough, but soon gets very, very tough, with sharks and octopuses causing Ecco trouble and levels set underground – dolphins need air, remember? This is a stunning and entertaining underwater odyssey.



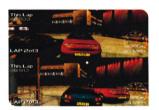
F355 CHALLENGE

Like the *Challenge* part of the title coincidentally suggests, *F355's* adherence to realism and the laws of physics make it tough to master and has left the game with a love-it or loathe-it label. Playing *F355* is all about obsession. It'll take plenty of practice just to finish a race, let alone finish in the points, and as every car in the game is a Ferrari you've got to be in love with cars. Luckily, it's very easy to be obsessed about a Ferrari. It's a little short on extras, but the in-game detail and circuits are spectacular, and the handling is a triumph of software engineering. A purist's driving game, not for Sunday drivers.



JET SET RADIO SEGA • ISSUE #14 • 8/10 • DEMO #14.18

Employing a ground-breaking graphical technique that makes 3D characters look like flat cartoon drawings, JSR will guarantee a "wow" from anyone who sees it in action. Luckily, it plays as good as it looks. You're ollerblader/graffiti artist who's out to tag every territory in the neighbourhood to show rival gangs who's the boss. Collect spray-cans, skate to the 'tagable' areas, then get spraying! But rival gangs and the police are out to stop you. Later levels get tougher, with the army called in and there's a greater reliance on tricks to reach new areas. With stunning looks, level design and music, you can't get fresher than this.



METROPOLIS STREET RACER SEGA • ISSUE #12 • 9/10 • DEMO #12 • GUIDF #16. 17

The major appeal of MSR is the three ultra-realistic cities you get to drive around — San Francisco, London and Tokyo are all perfectly recreated. You get to race around the famous streets in the flashiest of motors without the hindrance of the usual heavy traffic. The structure of MSR is also unlike any other racer, rewarding you with kudos points for good driving. These points in turn unlock new circuits — there are more than 250 in total — and allow you to obtain faster cars. There's unique handling for each car that makes them very different to drive but all enjoyable. One of the most revolutionary racers ever.



NBA 2K SEGA • ISSUE #5 • 8/10 • GUIDE #7

Basketball may not be as popular as football in the UK, but if you're after a decent sports game NBA ZK is a much wiser investment than any of the DC's footie titles. Gorgeous graphics and a good play-by-play commentary should help those unfamiliar with the sport's rules. Real teams, players and more statistics than you'll ever need add to the realism, with each match flowing back and forth just like the real thing. Loads of tournaments and options make it a title that offers an excellent recreation of the sport with plenty of longevity. Playing NBA 2K only raises one question: why can't we have a footie game this good?



PHANTASY STAR ONLINE SEGA • ISSUE #17 • 9/10 • MOVIE #15 • GUIDE #18, #19, #20

Planet-saving role-playing game from Sonic Team that avoids the usual clichés of RPGs by being set in the future, offering real-time battles and boasting the ability to team up with players from Europe, Japan and the USA for the price of a local phone call. You play an adventurer, paid to carry out missions on a strange planet inhabited by a vast array of creatures. There are more than 50 quests that can be played solo or, to really see what the game can do, online. A translator has been built into the game that enables you to communicate with anyone, no matter what their native tongue is. Fantastic!



POWER STONE FIDOS • ISSUE #1 • 8/10 • GUIDE #1

A fast-paced fighting game that offers complete 3D freedom of movement and a level of interactive items previously unseen in the beat 'em up field. There are loads of weapons, ranging from bats to bazookas, but you can also make use of other objects in each room, such as chairs, lamp-posts etc. Throw them at your opponent or hide behind them for defence. The power stones of the title also appear during each bout — grab three and you can transform into a super-powerful being and launch a devastating special attack. A hugely entertaining fighter. We think the original is better than the OTT sequel.



QUAKE III ARENA

SEGA • ISSUE #15 • 9/10 • GUIDE #18

It may have been originally designed for PC, but the truth is *Quake III Arena* is far better suited to a console — specifically Dreamcast. This first-person shooter is fast and easy to understand, and quick reactions are essential. It's equally brilliant in single or multiplayer modes and you can also play it online. Single-player games play pretty much the same as multiplayer, due to the inclusion of 'bots' (computer-controlled adversaries that roam each level trying to hunt you down). The only disappointment is that to *really* appreciate it, you have to invest in the Dreamcast Mouse and Keyboard, especially if you're going to be battling online.



RAYMAN 2: THE GREAT ESCAPE UBI SOFT - ISSUE #6- 8/10 - DEMO #5,7 GUIDE #8,9,10

Platform thrills as Rayman tries to stop pirates terrorising his friends. Originality may not be its strong point, but when something plays as good as this you can't complain. It's also very tough, despite the simple opening levels to ease you into learning the controls. Rayman scores points for offering lots of variety — some levels see Rayman using rockets, spacecraft, and even a giant snake to water-ski. A great multiplayer bonus game is included. A simple yet extremely playable platformer, Rayman 2 is cute, colourful and fun, and a supremely polished and well-constructed game.



RESIDENT EVIL CODE: VERONICA EIDOS • ISSUE #8 • 9/10 • DEMO #9 • GUIDE #9, 10, 11

The Resident Evil series continues in stunning fashion. It looks infinitely better than the original PlayStation titles, with true 3D characters and backgrounds and real-time cut-scenes. You control Chris and Claire Redfield, two survivors of previous RE games. As usual you're up against a zombie horde and a host of other hideous creatures. The only way to survive is to sensibly use the ammunition you find and solve puzzles to progress. This is a story-led adventure with plenty of shocks to keep you jumping and lots of secrets to discover to make you play again and again.



SAMBA DE AMIGO

A bizarre 'rhythm action' title that has you standing in front of your TV shaking specially designed maraca controllers to correspond to the commands on screen. Essentially it's 'Simon Says' with famous Latin tunes to encourage you to get shaking, including some Ricky Martin hits and a very upbeat version of Aha's Take On Me. Despite an astronomical £100 price tag (due to the cost of manufacturing the sensor technology of the maracas), Samba is a winner. A guaranteed smash at any party, it will put a smile on anyone's face within five minutes of playing.



SHENMUE

UE #14 • 10/10 • MOVIE #14 • **GUIDE #16.17**

Shenmue is in a class of its own. You play Ryo Hazuki, a Japanese teenager who is searching for his father's killer. A mixture of many different game styles, the best way to describe Shenmue is that it's kinda like real life. You take over the life of Ryo completely, waking each day, going to work, to shops, talking to other characters. Luckily, Ryo's daily life isn't mundane. As he starts to mix with a criminal element, you'll get involved in a bar fight among other treats. The most expensive game ever created. Play it and you'll see why it's money well spent.



SKIES OF ARCADIA #19 • 8/10 • DEMO #19 • GUIDF #20

Massive pirate-themed RPG with ships that sail the skies rather than the oceans. The plot echoes Star Wars - a princess with valuable information being chased by an evil empire - but the rest of the adventure is entirely original. Explore both the sky and land, with islands to visit and labyrinthine dungeons to negotiate. Mini-games and a VM sub-game indicate Skies' diversity. Add incredible ship battles, a large colourful cast and a stunning world to explore, and this is a long-lasting and highly re-playable adventure that you shouldn't miss.



SONIC ADVENTURE

Sonic is back doing what he does best racing at lightning-fast speed and collecting rings through some of the most fantastic levels ever seen in a platformer. But that's only half of it. Adventure stages see Sonic explore his world at a slower pace, searching for clues that will lead him to his arch nemesis — the evil Dr. Robotnik. There are also five other characters that you'll get to control, with their own quests that intertwine with each other thanks to a plot that ties everything neatly together. Sonic Adventure is a fun title with stunning set-pieces and a host of mini-games that make excellent use of a VM unit.



SOUL CALIBUR 10/10 · MOVIE #2 · **GUIDE #3.4.5**

This is still the best fighter on Dreamcast. Fights take place in small arenas, starring medieval heroes who batter each other with big swords and axes in best-of-three bouts. The characters appear large on screen, are incredibly realistic and animated superbly. Look closer and you can see that they breathe, wince, and smile! Best of all though, Soul Calibur plays far better than it looks. The Mission Battle mode adds longevity to play - you travel the world and fight battles where the rules are constantly changing. Doing this unlocks a host of cool secrets. You shouldn't rest until you've seen it all.



TONY HAWK'S PRO SKATER 2

A great example of how to turn a specialist sport into a game that everyone can enjoy. Pro Skater 2 allows you to perform an array of stunning skateboard tricks in locations that encourage you to go crazy. Once you've learnt the basic controls you'll be addicted. Then you can practice tougher moves that score more points and successfully complete the ten tasks that are set on each level. It's a huge challenge to complete the game, with some tasks seemingly impossible at first. Working your way through reaps its own rewards, with new areas and abilities made available. You even create your own skater or design your own skate park. Nice.



ULTIMATE FIGHTING CHAMPIONSHIP GUIDE #15

Realistic fighters battle in no-holds-barred matches in a wire-enclosed ring. Based on the American TV sport, UFC is the most brutal beat 'em up on the market. It looks mean, plays mean and it definitely sounds mean. Fighting styles are fully represented - jujitsu, freestyle wrestling and submission fighting are just a few. There's 22 characters, more than 3,000 moves, 1,200 combos and a wealth of modes. It wouldn't mean squat if it wasn't fun to play, but despite being brutal UFC rewards technical mat skills. It all adds up to make the most complex unarmed combat title ever created.



VIRTUA TENNIS 2 • 9/10 • DEMO #11, 17 • GUIDF #13

Despite only using two buttons to select shots, Virtua Tennis isn't simple. Through a combination of positioning and timing, you can hit a much wider variety of shots than the standard and lob returns suggest. There are 20 computer opponents to challenge, including real players, who have different playing styles and characteristics. There's the straight-up Arcade mode or the more challenging World Circuit mode. Virtua Tennis is a fantastic multiplayer game. Play against an equally skilled friend to discover why, in the Best of the Best feature in ODM #16, the experts voted it number one.



WORMS WORLD PARTY

Control a team of four worms and fight rival teams in a turn-based battle. There is a huge array of weapons available for you to mount your attacks, ranging from simple fists or handguns to bazookas and full-on air strikes. There are also some unusual weapons like skunks, exploding sheep and OAPs. Worms is simple on the surface, but dig deeper and there is a great depth to the gameplay. It's always been famous for being a great multiplayer experience but falling flat in single-player. The same problem is evident here, but now you can battle online, so you'll never have to play alone again — unless you really want to.

WHAT'S A GD-ROM?

A custom type of compact disc used for Dreamcast games They hold up to 1Gb (1024Mb), which is more than a regular CD-ROM (650Mb)

WHY CAN'T I PLAY JAPANESE OR AMERICAN GAMES ON MY UK DREAMCAST?

Dreamcast games use something called 'territorial lock-out', a data track specific to the part of the world in which the game is supposed to be sold and played (ie Japan, Europe or America). This helps stop illegal imports of foreign goods.

WHY DO GAMES COME OUT IN JAPAN AND AMERICA MONTHS BEFORE THEY DO IN THE UK?

Because it takes time to convert them for our TV system (PAL) and to translate them into all the European languages. Games developed in Europe, like Metropolis Street Racer and Ecco The Dolphin, generally come out first here though

WHAT IS THE RRP (RECOMMENDED RETAIL PRICE) OF A DREAMCAST?

It's recently been reduced to just £99.99 - an absolute bargain! Some retailers offer packages with games included, so shop around for the best deal.

WHY DO RELEASE DATES KEEP CHANGING?

Making games isn't an exact science, so it's often hard to tell how long it will take to finish them. Games are usually delayed to make them better though.

WHO'S NAOMI?

Naomi is Sega's latest arcade hardware and it's very similar in design to Dreamcast, so coin-op to DC conversions are easy to do. Crazy Taxi, Dead Or Alive 2, Jambo! Safari, F355 Challenge and 18 Wheeler American Pro Trucker are all Naomi games.

WILL ALL NAOMI GAMES COME TO DREAMCAST?

Not necessarily. Some arcade games don't work well as home conversions

WHY CAN'T MY DC PLAY WINDOWS GAMES?

Because it isn't a PC. Some Dreamcast games use Microsoft's Windows CE technology, but it doesn't make your Dreamcast a PC.

WHEN IS SHENMUE II COMING OUT IN THE UK?

Early 2002, Probably

SKIES OF ARCADIA

REVIEWED: ODM #19, 8/10

WE SAID: "There's no doubting the quality of SOA, but it's got so much to it that it will probably put a lot of people off."

WHAT YOU THOUGHT

I was desperate for a decent RPG on the Dreamcast. *Phantasy Star Online* seemed to fit the bill, but I needed an RPG right here, right now. So, I ordered *Skies Of Arcadia* and I must say, this is the best offline RPG ever to come out on the DC.

I was amazed at the best ever 3D graphics in role-playing. The whole world of Arcadia and its environments are huge and beautifully presented – much better than *Sonic Adventure's*. And the gameplay is unique – there's so much involved, where you get to fly ships and customise your own little paradise island. The battle system is like the *Final Fantasy* series, but it is clever in its own way and a lot of strategy is required. The characters are cleverly

designed with facial expressions, body language and (crappy) voice actors. It delivers a strong storyline that makes you want to know what happens next.

Like all games, there are flaws. The only flaw I see in the game is that there are no full-motion video sequences, but this is easily overlooked with the great animation of the characters. Also, the game is too combat-heavy, but the strong plot draws you in. I could go on about its greatness, but trying to describe it in just 250 words is impossible. 10/10. EDWARD MIRO, VIA EMAIL

VANISHING POINT

REVIEWED: *ODM* #17, 7/10

WE SAID: "Vanishing Point sits somewhat uncomfortably between arcade and simulation. It's good, but perhaps not good enough."

WHAT YOU THOUGHT

Receiving only middling reviews from most sources, this was recommended by a friend of mine with the proviso that I never try and play it on the default control setting. Obviously, that was exactly what I initially did, and my response was one of apathy and disappointment.

However, once I'd set the responsiveness to 'medium', the hideously floaty, rubbery steering was gone and in its place is a fast and enjoyably believable driving feel.

Agreed, the time-trial structure of the main game sits uncomfortably with the 'rival' drivers, whose on-track performance bears no relevance at all to their posted finish times. But the big red 'rival' markers can be turned off at the menu and you can play as if you're racing in traffic against a tight time limit. Much better.

Clockwork's claims of intelligent and aggressive artificial intelligence aren't too far off the mark, and the physics engine works well, providing some exciting moments as you escape a multi-car pile-up on two wheels while a boisterous rival tries to force you into the armco.

The game's structure is its greatest asset (though initially confusing) – rewards for success are regular and plentiful, and the fact that a new car or track may be unlocked with just one more race makes it endlessly addictive.

So, despite a number of prominent flaws in concept and execution, there is a fantastic game hidden away in here. Well done Clockwork for cleverly hiding a fresh and inventive variation on the tried-and-tested *Need For Speed* formula from the eyes of the world...

HAVE SEGA REALLY STOPPED THE MANUFACTURE OF DREAMCASTS?

Yes, Sega production stopped at the end of March. However, there are as many as two million unsold Dreamcasts around the world, so they'll still be available in shops for a long time to come.

HOW LONG WILL GAMES BE RELEASED FOR DREAMCAST?

For quite some time yet – certainly well into 2002. It's impossible to know an exact number but we reckon there are at least 50 games which are still due to be released in Europe.

WILL THERE BE A SHORTAGE OF DREAMCAST PERIPHERALS?

There shouldn't be, no. Sega have large stockpiles around the world.

WILL I BE ABLE TO REPLACE A FAULTY DREAMCAST IN THE FUTURE?

Yes, Sega will, of course, always honour guarantees. If your console develops a fault, contact the Sega Consumer Line – the number is on page 6.

WHAT PLATFORMS ARE SEGA DEVELOPING FOR?

Sony PlayStation 2, Microsoft Xbox, Nintendo Game Cube, Nintendo Game Boy Advance, mobile phones... you name it, Sega are developing for it! It's all part of their plan to become the number one software developer in the world. However, it will be quite some time until we see original Sega games released on other home platforms before Dreamcast.

WHAT'S ALL THIS ABOUT A DC-COMPATIBLE SET-TOP BOX?

A British-based company, Pace Micro Technology, are developing a digital cable/satellite TV decoder which includes a hard disc-based personal video recorder (PVR) and 100 per cent compatibility with Dreamcast software. It doesn't, however, run existing titles (it doesn't have a CD tray). Instead, users will download games via broadband connection.

WHEN'S THE SET-TOP BOX COMING OUT AND HOW MUCH WILL IT COST?

No one knows the cost, or how games will be distributed/priced as Pace have yet to sign a deal with a satellite or cable operator.

The set-top box is unlikely to be released until the middle of 2002.

WHAT'S GOING TO HAPPEN TO THE DREAMARENA PORTAL AND ONLINE GAMING?

According to Sega, Dreamarena will continue in its current form for the foreseeable future.

HOW LONG IS OFFICIAL DREAMCAST MAGAZINE GOING TO

We obviously can't say for sure but we hope to be around as long as games are still being released on Dreamcast.

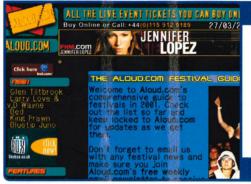

SO WHAT EXACTLY ARE SEGA'S PLANS FOLLOWING THEIR ANNOUNCEMENT THEY ARE TO DEVELOP FOR OTHER PLATFORMS? ODM READERS ASK SEGA FACE TO FACE...



<u>□□M</u>: Why do you think Sega announced the shift of focus away from Dreamcast and on to software production?

Paul: It seemed that right from the beginning there was not enough money in Sega's budget to market the Dreamcast properly. There is absoloutely nothing wrong with the product itself - many of my friends who have seen the games have been totally bowled over by them, so Sega clearly weren't selling a bad product. They just didn't have the budget that Sony does for marketing. Also, the competition in the market place wasn't really an issue - Sega already had a 12-14 month lead on the PlayStation 2 and the Dreamcast is definitely a superior product to the Nintendo 64 and the PlayStation.





JOHN MANN, 31 "BETWEEN JOBS"

Has been playing games since he was ten. Owns a PlayStation but hasn't looked at it since he got his DC. He is saddened by Sega's recent announcement.



DAN TRENT, 25 WRITES FOR ODM

Has been writing for *ODM* since the beginning. Been playing games on and off since the Spectrum but, in true student fashion, really picked up the habit at university...



ALAN JONES, 32 HEAD OF UK MARKETING, SEGA

Worked in gaming retail before moving on to marketing. Admits he's "not a massive gamer, but I love the gaming scene as an entertainment industry".

Taking all of that into consideration, the Dreamcast's demise must have been down to the marketing.

AL=N: I think there are two things that really stick in my mind - the first issue was that we were coming into a market which was always going to be very tough for us. Having a superior product doesn't necessarily mean that you are going to sell millions from day one! Sony's whole share of the market and grip on everyone's minds in terms of gaming is extremely difficult to crack! They have had six fantastic years and gaming is seemingly synonymous now with the word 'PlayStation'. My other point relates to budgets. We were very much in an environment where we had a brand new product which was very leading edge. We were trying to bring something to the

market that wasn't just a games console - it was an email and Internet machine. So you had multiple messages to get across to the consumer and to do that with the money we had wasn't necessarily possible - we didn't have the budget to get all the messages across. So there was a dilution of the Dreamcast 'message' and therefore not everyone was going to buy into something when they were not quite sure of what it did or

Do the readers here think Sega were talking up the wrong things at launch then?

l think so. I mean the quality of software at launch was great - Soul Calibur [ODM #2, 10/10] and Sonic Adventure [ODM #0, 9/10] were there within the first month or two of

the Dreamcast's launch. There were lots of great games to shout about, and maybe that would have been the right thing to do at that point. Then later on, when Quake III Arena [ODM #15, 9/10] was launched, maybe that would have been the time to start saying 'six billion players' because it is now a reality. With Phantasy Star Online [ODM #17,9/10], you do have

players from all over the world and that 'six billion players' ethos has come to fruition - but it took 14 months. At the beginning, Sega also seemed to be on the defensive after the Watchdog report about their seemingly misleading campaign. After all, millions of people watch that show every week and parents going out to buy a games console would

have thought, 'Ahhh, the Dreamcast – I don't want that for my kids. It's been on *Watchdog* and it's rubbish according to Anne Robinson!'

The market we were aiming the product at in the first place was exactly the same market that tunes into Watchdog. We wanted to get into that mass market straight away.

JOHN: So why weren't there any online games available for the console from day one?

perhaps it was a bit naive to go out and say, 'Wahey! We are online! We have this stuff and that stuff, and soon you'll be able to play online games!' We had some great games at launch – like Sonic Adventure and Ready 2 Rumble Boxing [ODM #1, 9/10] – but it was only afterwards that developers began asking, 'How can we use the modem for gaming?' The developers then started programming for specific online games, culminating with ChuChu

Rocket! [ODM #9, 9/10] the following summer. With hindsight, it was a mistake taking that long.

delayed the launch and tried to have delayed the launch and tried to have some online games out before releasing the console itself – even something like ChuChu Rocket! bundled with the machine could have worked.

DM: Turning to the future, how long can Dreamcast owners expect to be playing new software?

AL=N: We will make games until around March 2002.

that we will sell all the remaining Dreamcasts, and that means that there will be ten million Dreamcasts out there in the future. So there's nothing stopping a third party developer out there saying, 'Hold on! There are ten million people out there with Dreamcasts, so why don't we just make a game for them?'

Dan: I think one of the reasons Dreamcast owners can be cheerful is that there are still some very big games on their way. There's plenty that *ODM* are rooting for – *Headhunter* being a prime example. It's a very exciting game with a big budget. In fact, it's almost like a European *Shenmue* [*ODM* #14, 10/10] in a way, because of the amount of care, money and time being invested in it. It's not something that has been rattled out overnight, so I think that's a visible sign that developers and Sega aren't running away from the Dreamcast and its owners.

looking forward to, as well as Virtua Tennis 2 – especially if it has the rumoured online capabilities.

JOHN: I'm really looking forward to *Crazy Taxi 2*.

Paul: And Daytona USA 2001 [ODM #19,7/10] – although I was really disappointed to hear that it doesn't have any online racing in the European version.

STUBET: Yeah, I was quite disappointed to hear about that as

well! The issue, though, was the telecommunications network here. Americans have this wonderful, easy programmable system for online gaming, whereas Europe has this complicated network system. It worked out that with all the recent announcements that the developers only had a small window of opportunity where they could program stuff before moving on. They worked out that they could either program for the European market or the American market, and unfortunately they were swayed by the American market. Bear in mind, though, that they literally had only two weeks to do the online version! We got the short end of the stick here in Europe and the Americans got the online version.

release titles simultaneously across platforms, or are Dreamcast owners going to have the games first before they appear on the likes of PlayStation 2?

which runs up to the end of next February, our plan is to have Dreamcast-only titles and a couple of ports from Dreamcast to PlayStation 2, plus one PlayStation 2 exclusive title. The majority of our schedule is aimed at existing Dreamcast owners and all our quality titles are on Dreamcast and only Dreamcast. This means that we're not saying, 'Yeah, okay, Dreamcast is a

platform which we don't want to support anymore, so we will now start making everything for PlayStation 2 and port everything back'. So in terms of development for this year, Dreamcast is our primary format. PlayStation 2 owners will get a couple of our better titles as ports and one exclusive title so that we can say to Sony that we are actually developing for their platform. It is a political feat to build up our relationship with Sony over the long term. At the end of the day though, we are very much Dreamcast-focused.

DEN: I think that is news that
Dreamcast owners are going to want
to hear. The speed of the decision to
stop making the Dreamcast came as
quite a shock to many owners and
people need to be reassured – and
anything that does reassure them is
going to help. I think the fact that
PlayStation 2 owners are going to get
Crazy Taxi [ODM #5, 9/10], whereas
Dreamcast owners are going to get
Crazy Taxi 2 around the same time, is a

prime example of Sega's commitment. It does take the gloss off the Sony side of things!

Paul: It still doesn't seem quite right that Sega are releasing games on other platforms, but I guess it's really just a case of having to get used to it. It's good in a way though, because it means that there will still be Sega products out there. I guess that's the best thing you can say about it. Ultimately, if people are talking about console gaming going the way of VHS and DVD and there being only one platform, then maybe this is the beginning of the move towards a single platform. I don't know! But that would be good news for gamers because it means we would not be shelling out on a number of different consoles simply because we want to play Nintendo, Sega or Sony games we could have just one console and play all the games that come out. At the moment though, we are losing out because it is our console that's going down the pan but ultimately, if you are

trying to put a positive spin on the whole situation, the future might look a bit rosier!

□**□** I think Sega owners are very emotionally attached to the Dreamcast and their games. That has always been a big difference that Sega fans would point out when it comes to comparing themselves with PlayStation owners – that there is a real bond between Sega owners and well-known Sega games such as Sonic and the Virtua games. So for those people who have that emotional bond between the games and the Sega brand, it is definitely going to be a bit of a wrench to see their games out on the PlayStation 2. But once that shock subsides and realism kicks in though, people will eventually come round and accept it.

DIM: So do you think Sega's plans to turn themselves into a software publisher will be successful?

Dreamcast experience has shown, the console market is a very difficult and fickle one. It is very hard to predict what will happen. I think, though, that when the Dreamcast came out, everyone was saying, 'It's a good product but maybe the timing is not right.' With Sega's move into games publishing only, I think you will find that the general ground level opinion is that, 'Yeah, this time they are doing the right thing.'

Paul: Yeah, I think that Sega's

track record of producing games is much better than their reputation for producing consoles.

JOHN: I just know they will make it as a software publisher, because, as we all know, they make some of the best games in the world! I am really glad that they are still going to be around and wish them lots of success for the future.

DDM: So where does Dreamarena sit in this grand scheme of things?

Dreamarena is to make it a multiplatform gaming portal. We are hopeful that people will come and play Sega games through this portal, whether they are playing on a mobile phone, Palmpilot, or a games console. Dreamarena will stay and develop in the future, making the community grow still further.

DDM: Finally, where do we all expect Sega to be in three years' time?

DOWNER

Sega claim to be supporting the Dreamcast until early next year and that there are still 100 new games to be released, but they have not yet confirmed that their biggest game is to come to the Dreamcast.

I am, of course, referring to Virtua Fighter 4. Now I know that relatively very few people bought Saturns so they may not remember Virtua Fighter and its amazing sequel. As such, they may not be sure why I, and many others, are so excited (Virtua Fighter 3 on Dreamcast was very poor by comparison).

But Sega must know already that this is going to be their game of the year? Sega are becoming a software developer so I can understand why the game is to be ported to PlayStation 2 - it will show everyone that it is better than Tekken! However, I can't understand why Sega haven't put the game on their Dreamcast release schedule and

games still to come out on Dreamcast. When Sega announced that they were to cease production of the console in January there were thought to be around 100 Dreamcast games in development around the world.

Several of these have, of course, been released since the announcement. Some (such as Soul Reaver 2 and Woody Woodpecker Extreme Racing) have since been cancelled, while others (such as Illbleed and esoteric Japanese titles) aren't likely to ever get a UK release. How many does that leave? We're not entirely sure to be honest, but we'll run a full list in the next issue of ODM.

You're right about thirdparty developers not being attracted to Dreamcast in the future. The plain truth is that no company is likely to start

well done Sega Europe for supplying us with a disc of such quality this time around.

Reading through the mag, it's obvious that the Dreamcast's future is still pretty rosy on the software front, at least for another year or so. As well as the aforementioned titles, there's still Headhunter, Unreal Tournament and Sonic Adventure 2 among others.

One thing that's made me laugh recently are the amount of negative comments from readers, saying Sega have 'betrayed us'. A perfect example is a letter from Craig Anderson of Coventry, saying "Why should PlayStation owners get to play Crazy Taxi?". I can only assume, then, that Craig has never played any of the PlayStation ports to DC, such as Tony Hawk's, or the Resident Evil series, or V-Rally 2? And if Bleemcast ever gets released, of course Mr Anderson would also bypass the chance to play the likes of Gran Turismo?

It's sad that Sega are pulling out of hardware but I hardly think that a company that gave us the first 128bit machine, with online capabilities, online gaming, and some of the most innovative software on any machine ever, all for an original price of £199, has betrayed videogamers.

Then again, maybe I'm missing out, and I should plump for a £299 machine with pretty much bugger all at the moment, bar some dodgy DVD playback. I think not. The DC will be remembered as one of gaming's greatest understated heroes. To miss out is to truly miss out.

"I BEGAN GAMING WHEN I was 70 years old. I got completely hooked on my granddaughter's Mega Drive, so I bought one for myself. Then, two years ago, I went into the games shop in town and the lads there gave me the Dreamcast promotional video. I watched it and thought 'Oh, those graphics look so real!'

"So I booked in advance and finally got a Dreamcast with a keyboard and a copy of Sonic Adventure [ODM #0, 9/10]. My 11-year old grandson Alex and I have a great time playing on the Dreamcast on Saturday afternoons. At the moment, we are into Shenmue [ODM #14, 10/10]. He's got one file and I have another. I must boast because I got him out of the warehouse in the game. He couldn't do it so I went round the back of the warehouse instead — I was very crafty.

"I'm not a better player than him, though. He wants to be a games tester. He is very good but sometimes I think he lets me win on purpose, but then sometimes I do beat him properly — like with *Power Stone [ODM #1, 8/10]*. When I win properly, I can tell by the look on his face!

"As well as Shenmue and Power Stone, I have got Rayman 2 [ODM #6, 8/10] and Wacky Races [ODM #9, 7/10] which is great fun. Shenmue is my favourite, though because I like searching games. I'm not too keen on just racing through a game – except with Sonic Adventure because that's quite a good, relaxing title.

"I don't care for games like *House of the Dead 2* [*DDM* #1, 9/10] and those kinds of titles, though. I am too old and near the end of my life so I don't like them. All that killing! They are too gruesome and violent for my tastes.

"I don't play for many hours because I am busy in the day when myself and my husband go out into town, but I don't go out at night so I play for an hour after tea while my husband washes up. I've got him trained, you see! If there is football on the telly, I play for longer. So that's when I load up *Shenmue*. After all, you have got to do a day in *Shenmue* time to really to make it worthwhile.

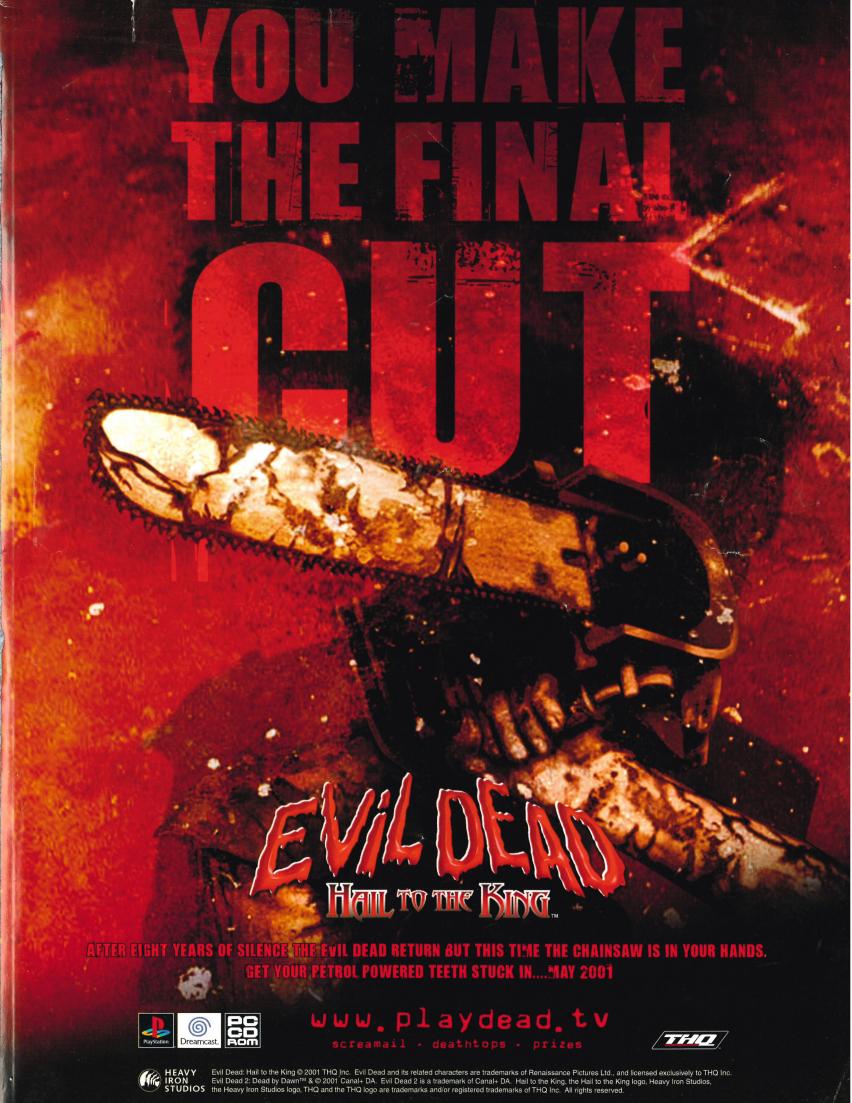
"I haven't tried online gaming yet — I feel I am not quick enough for the younger people and I think I would spoil it. I

wouldn't mind playing someone that is my age but I don't have the confidence to go online really. I also daren't run up the phone bill either. They charge so much! We have to be careful.

"In terms of my age, I do think that I am the exception to the rule when it comes to playing games, but there is bound to be somebody else out there who's my age and enjoys the Dreamcast. One of the lads in the game shop called Simon said he tried to get his gran to have a go but she didn't have a clue!

"My friends haven't got a clue either but they think it is very good that I do it. I tell them I enjoy it and that I do it for myself. At the end of the day, I would like to know if there are any other people out there of my age that like playing games.

"Ultimately, I think that there are benefits for senior citizens who play videogames. I had quite high blood pressure but I can go on the Dreamcast and can forget everything — I think it is very good for people to forget their troubles for a bit. You do get lost in the games and I think it has helped keep my blood pressure down. When I play, I feel relaxed but I do get a bit cross at times, but then I say 'That's it, I'll leave it for now!"
