Quad: It's Talking Music

Quadraphonic sound—whether it's discrete or matrix that eventually dominates the market—is a further evolutionary process in the presentation of pre-recorded music. As simplistic as this statement may appear, music should be the heart of any new development on the recording scene. And with regard to quad, we're happy to report that industry excitement revolving around quad is one of great musical sophistication, one that foregoes the early days of stereo when it was more important to stress—often without musical validity—a distinct separation of musical sounds between two speakers.

But, there have been many musical developments that have flowed under the bridge since the advent of stereo. Rock, of course, with the best of it disciplined, yet free-form. And classics, a rich reservoir of orchestrated wonderment that seems to make ever-increasing headway among younger audiences.

The present flow of discrete and matrix product represents all of these musical values, adding a new feeling of presence for music in the home. To this will be added—according to the breathless prose of composers and producers—a New Music that from both the rock and classical fields seems destined to usher in a new dimension in pre-recorded music. As one industryite put it for the rock end

of things: "rock musicians just can't wait to utilize sensibly the tools of quad in the studio." We sense that this also applies to any adventuresome composer, whatever his musical bent. Music in quad can be throbbing in its aggressiveness; it can be expressive in its romanticism.

It is this utterly musical approach to quad that we like.

Few, if any, talk in terms of gimmicks, the artificial tricks designed to slam a new recording concept home. Over the years, the creative forces on the recording scene have attempted to say something of musical value. It all doesn't succeed, of course, but this, we feel, does represent the mainstay of what appears in all forms of today's pre-recorded music.

The possible New Music, an exciting re-evaluation of all the great music that already exists. The industry has entered into the quad era with the highest of musical standards. It is not so much as what one can do with quad, but the far greater purpose of what one can say with quad. With all the possible razzle-dazzle talk of a four-speaker, front-and-behind approach, the fact that music as music seems to be the standard for quad bespeaks of a mature industry ready to make available great music to the most sophisticated recording market of all time.

Uriah Heep recently had its latest Mercury album, "The Magician's Birthday," certified by the RIAA for sales in excess of one million dollars. This marks the group's second gold LP within four months (the first being "Demons and Wizards"). The five man British group starts its first U.S. tour of the new year Feb. 22 in Atlanta, hitting the Southeast, Midwest and Northwest. Uriah Heep returns to the U.S. in April after a tour of Japan for dates in the East and Southeast.

Although "The Magician's Birthday" is still a strong chart item, Uriah Heep and its members continue to turn out new product. Organist Ken Hensley will have his first solo album released this month by Mercury Records, "Proud Words on a Dusty Shelf." In addition, a new Uriah Heep LP is tentatively set for release in late March. It will be a live double-LP set.

NARM Undertakes Study On 'Returns'

Prelim Findings At NARM Confab

NEW YORK — NARM, the merchandisers association, has undertaken a study on the "returns" problem, considered by many in the industry to be of crisis proportions.

The association has retained Fry Consultants to produce a feasibility study, the preliminary findings of which will be reported to the NARM membership during a "returns" seminar to be conducted during the upcoming NARM Convention in Los Angeles. On Tuesday morning of Feb. 27, Hendrick (Ric) Smith, vp of Fry and formerly of McKinsey, Inc., which has produced marketing studies for many labels, will report preliminary findings relating to the feasibility of "improving the performance in the area of returns." "Smith will discuss the nature of the overall problem and focus specifically on opportunities for cutting the costs of processing returns," according to Jules Malamud, exec director of NARM. Malamud has already received from Smith a memorandum—under the tag of "Minimizing Profit Drains Due to Returns"—outlining the study objectives (see below).

Smith and Alan Harvey, also of Fry, are presently out in the field visiting both large and small mer-

chandisers in order to study their internal operations. They have already done legwork with all segments of the industry.

The NARM "returns" study is the outgrowth of a NARM board meeting held late last year in New Orleans. At the time, Bruce Lundvall of Columbia Records and Lou Simon of Phonogram, both of whom are on the manufacturer's advisory committee's planning unit relative to "returns," worked with David Press, president of NARM, and Malamud, on the prospects of a study.

Smith Memorandum

Following is part of Smith's memorandum to Malamud on the study's objectives:

Briefly stated, the overall objective of the study is to identify and define workable approaches for: (1) reducing the incidence of product returns relative to sales and/or purchases, and (2) cutting the costs associated with processing returns.

Reducing the Incidence

There are some obvious steps both record companies and merchandisers could take that would decrease the frequency of returns—for example, concentrate only on proven artists or obvious hits. Unfortunately, these actions would also mean the loss of profits that the other releases could—in fact, do—produce. Thus, the objective of merchandisers and record com-

panies is not to achieve "zero returns" but rather to control returns at an "acceptable" level: the point where the extra profits on additional sales volume is offset by the cost of processing the higher rate of returns likely to be generated in obtaining this added volume.

Accordingly, in the course of the study for NARM, we would want to make a rough assessment of what this "acceptable" returns level is for merchandisers (which may depend to some degree on the merchandiser's sales level or the customer mix). In addition, we will evaluate how much merchandisers typically depart from this "acceptable" returns level and what profit penalty they incur. However, we will direct the bulk of our effort to digging into the underlying

Chi Fed. Court Increases Payment Of Infringements

NEW YORK — Judge Edwin A. Robson of the United States District Court in Chicago, entered on Jan. 24 a judgment for copyright infringements in favor of 37 Fox Agency publishers against Gary Spies, the alleged manufacturer of bootleg recordings sold under the label "Tape-A-Tape". The judgment confirms a report of the Special Master appointed to ascertain damages following entry of a summary judgment of liability.

According to Al Berman, managing director of the Fox Agency, the judgment is of "extreme importance" because it represents another favorable application of the increased penalties granted to music publishers for mechanical infringements under the 1971 Sound Recording Act. "The Chicago Federal Court joined the Connecticut Federal Court in applying the increased penalties to infringements which occurred before the amendment," Berman said.

Decision's Impact

"Unlike the Connecticut actions, where the court applied the minimum statutory damages in the absence of proof of the number of copies," he added "in Chicago we were able to establish quantities. The yardstick employed by the court of \$1 for each copyrighted musical work on each recording is precisely the kind of penalty which will take the profit out of bootlegging. Under the old law, our publishers were limited to a recovery of \$.08 for each copyrighted work on each recording against the manufacturer, and \$.02 against the seller. Obviously, if a bootlegger has to pay up to \$12 per tape when he deals in a bootleg tape reproducing 12 copyrighted works, he will be unable to walk away with any profit.

"In addition, the court held that the recovery sanctioned by the new law comprehends an award of profits in addition to damages. In one instance, defendant's liability was determined to be \$7.50 for each tape recording, representing \$2.50 profit and \$5.00 damages for the use of five copyrighted works. Of course, the financial consequences are even more burdensome to an infringer when the courts add an attorney's fees, which in this case amounted to \$15,600."

Britain In Common Market Poses Music Market Problems

CANNES, FRANCE — One of the major topics of interest discussed at the luncheon, dinner and business meeting during the MIDEM Convention was the confusion that has developed because of Britain's entry into the Common Market.

With duties and taxes removed from the shipment of product from one country to another in the Common Market, the trade in France, for example, can conceivably order records from England for sale in the French market. And if a small manufacturer with a big hit in America, has not made a deal for the release of the record in France, it is now possible for the British company to swing a deal for the American record

negotiating for the right to sell the disk both in England and France.

And on the publishing end, if, for example, an American company does not find a publisher he can live with or do business with in France, he can make a licensing arrangement with a publisher in England for both territories.

There may no longer be a need to have pressing plants in each country.

U.S. Analogy

The whole atmosphere appears to be developing into a situation similar to the one we were confronted with in the U.S. when record companies recognized state and city boundaries when they assigned distributors for their product in America, only to find out that the Government did not recognize any boundaries and, thereby, opened the door for "transshipping" and what eventually developed into the competitive price situation that now exists in this country.

There was a great deal of discussion on this subject at MIDEM and there was obviously great confusion as to how licensing deals and sub-publishing deals would be structured when existing contracts expire. "No wonder there were so many attorneys at MIDEM," someone remarked.

Grammy Telecast, Local Events Take Shape

NASHVILLE — Grammy Award Ceremonies surrounding the 15th Annual Telecast of the Grammy Awards presentation by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (NARAS) have been announced by local NARAS Chapters. Festivities range from nominee parties in New York and Chicago in late Feb. to gala banquets in Nashville and Los Angeles in connection with the live 90 minute CBS telecast Mar. 3rd, emanating from Nashville.

Twelve Grammy presentations will be announced on the telecast with 35 additional Grammys to be presented at banquet ceremonies in Nashville and Los Angeles the same night as the telecast. The New York Chapter of NARAS plans a banquet at the Americana Hotel February 22 to honor nominees, with the Chicago NARAS chapter planning a banquet to honor nominees on Monday, Feb. 26, at the Chicago Hyatt House. Many members of the Atlanta Chapter of NARAS plan to fly to Nashville for the telecast and banquet. The Nashville Chapter, which is hosting

Rocco Laginestra, president of RCA Records, said that "recent events and announcements within our industry have more than vindicated RCA's faith in the discrete four-channel phonograph record, and this release signals our stepped-up schedule of Quadradiscs. By midsummer, about 50% of our new albums will be Quadradiscs." Laginestra is referring to the impending W-E-A announcement on going discrete, and the possibility of a similar move for the Polygram labels, Phonogram, Polydor and MGM.

The five recordings are: "1001 Sonic Delights: Scheherazade" (Rimsky-Korsakov); Debussy/Ravel: "La Mer," "Prelude to the Afternoon of a Faun" and other selections; "Bach's Greatest Fugues"; Sibelius: Symphony No. 2; and Rachmaninoff: Concerto No. 2 for Piano and Orchestra, with Arthur Schnabel.

RCA Drive On Wayne LP On 'America'

NEW YORK — RCA Records has released a new album by film star, John Wayne, "America, Why I Love Her," and has launched a major advertising and publicity campaign. It's Wayne's first recording project.

Announcement was made jointly by Don Burkheimer, RCA Records' vice president of A&R, and Billy Liebert, president of Bertell Productions, Inc., which produced the album.

In presenting the album, RCA Records has announced details of its advertising, promo and publicity campaign.

Promo Plan

Bil Keane, director of market development and planning, said the advertising campaign alone will reach more than 125,000,000 Americans through media insertions in Readers Digest, Sunday (weekend supplement in 51 newspapers) and TV Guide as well as the music trades.

Chappell/Hinde Publishing Ties

NEW YORK — Chappell Music and Toronto-based indie producer Harry Hinde have concluded a long-term publishing agreement encompassing the catalogs of Hindsight Music (CAPAC) and Ole Colony Music (BMI). The agreement was negotiated in New York by Buddy Robbins, director of professional activities.

Hinde is currently moving up Canadian Top 100 charts with his Copper Penny hit "You're Still The One" (Sweet Plum). The record, which has just been released in the United States on the Big Tree label, is published by Unichappell (BMI) here. Closely associated with Hinde on the project is noted arranger Dave Van De Pitte. Record is being played on a majority of Canadian major markets including CKLW in Windsor.

In Canada, Hinde has produced such artists as Ginette Reno for Parrot and Joshua for GRT Records. He has also worked extensively in Detroit. Production work on Copper Penny's first LP, is now being completed.

The catalog will be coordinated in Canada by Cyril Devereux, manager of Chappell-Toronto, and Jerry Renevych.

Hutson Starts Solo Career On Curtom

CANNES, FRANCE — Leroy Hutson, who replaced Curtis Mayfield when he left the Impressions to go solo, has also spun off from the group in an effort "better express himself as an individual," according to Marv Stuart, manager of Mayfield, the Impressions and Hutson.

The Impressions are expected to announce the new addition to their threesome in a matter of a few weeks.

Hutson is currently represented on the boards with a new single called "So In Love With You," on the Curtom label. And he will solo on an LP set for March release.

The Impressions, featuring Fred Cash and Sam Gooden, plus their soon to be announced new addition will also be completing an LP, parts of which they will premiere on the up-coming "Midnight Special" TV that follows the Johnny Carson TV'er in the near future.

Bill Farr Polygram Mkting VP

NEW YORK — Bill Farr becomes vice president of marketing at Polygram Corp., effective this week (5). According to Kass, the first Buddah recordings by the group are

scheduled for release in May. "In joining Buddah, we are making a major commitment to the new label, one of the most significant moves that we, as a group, have ever made." A Buddah recording is scheduled for May to introduce the group to Buddah's foreign markets.

The deal was negotiated by Art Kass and Bogart with Buddah's manager, their attorney, and Ed Seidenberg, president of SAS, Inc., Buddah's business manager.

Together for the past 20 years, Gladys Knight & The Pips joined Motown in 1965 after a four year, hitmaking stint with the now defunct VeeJay label.

The group said that one of its primary reasons in signing with Buddah was "their dynamic promotional and merchandising ideas and the incredible family atmosphere of their organization."

Col Classics At Radio City

Event Mar. 2 At Midnight

NEW YORK — Columbia Records will present the first classical concert ever at New York Radio City Music Hall on March 2 at midnight. Clive Davis, president of Columbia, said that E. Power Biggs, Anthony Newman and the "Monster Concert" will perform the "Keyboard Colossus" at the world-famous 6,000 seat auditorium. In addition, Walter Carlos is "doing everything possible to clear his schedule to make it."

"This event will bring new excitement to classical music," said Davis in announcing the concert. "We're really thrilled by the fact that classical record sales were up 40% last year, and also by the knowledge that an increasing number of young people are turning to classical music. We felt that a midnight concert at Radio City Music Hall gives us the advantage of not only a great hall, but also the atmosphere and hour to create a new musical experience for a large number of young people."

Format

Although each of the artists has adhered to a traditional career, which has included solo, chamber and concert performances, each has agreed to perform in a format which would be ordinarily found in rock or pop concerts, that is, to "share the bill". Because of the diversity of each of the performers, the concert will provide a wide range of repertoire, style and interpretation.

Biggs, who will perform on the World Famous Radio City organ, has recorded over 40 recordings on Columbia Masterworks.

Newman will conduct a chamber orchestra in Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 5 (a work he has recently recorded on Columbia), and will play the concerto part from harpsichord. For the performance, original instru-

ments, when available, will be used.

The "Monsters," a group of 16 musicians, led by Eugene List, who sold out their first New York midnight concert at Philharmonic Hall this past Halloween, perform on 10 Steinway Grands. This group of musicians from the Eastman School of Music have played a repertoire which has ranged from Rossini's "William Tell Overture" and Scott Joplin's "Maple Leaf Rag" to works by Strauss, Liszt and Milhaud. Their first recording, "Monster Concert," was recently released by Columbia Masterworks.

Discussions with Walter Carlos are just about finalizing. Carlos was the first artist to bring electronic music to a large audience with his million-selling Switched On Bach.

The concert, which will be geared to both those who go to pop and classical events, will be simulcast on WQXR in New York. Projected ticket prices are \$4, \$5.50, \$6.50 and \$7.50.

Reviewing the half-year results, Bhaskar Menon, president and chief executive officer said, "Even though sales in the half-year ended December 31, 1972, were marginally (2%) below the corresponding period of the previous fiscal year, net income before extraordinary items increased by 65%. Menon said that although no new album product by the Beatles was released in the first half of this fiscal year, Capitol "enjoyed notable sales and chart success" with a number of other artists, including the Band, Bloodrock, J. "Capitol Records devoted itself with rewarding success to achieving significant acceptance for several exciting new performers of potential star-quality," Menon said. "New artists who have already made impressive debuts in the national charts during the last six months are Edward Bear, Flash, Sam Neely, Nitzinger, the Raspberries, Hurricane Smith, and Rick Springfield.

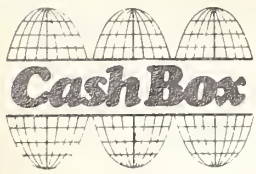

CBS-New York Top U. S. FM'er; 'Future Gold' Augments Oldies

NEW YORK — WCBS-FM radio has emerged as the number one FM station in the country with a format of 'solid gold.' According to the station, only six AM stations in the country have larger average audiences.

Some six months ago, the station adopted a format of programming only oldies with a playlist that consisted of million selling hits from 1955 to the present. Currently, the station reaches some two and a half million people, age 12 and over, and it is still number one with the 18-34 year old crowd during the average quarter hour Mon-Fri between 3 and midnight and weekends from 6-midnight.

Cash Box spoke with Candy Henry, the station's music director who revealed that the station works from a playlist of 2500 oldies that are available to their air personalities. "Although there are so many oldies to

choose from, we still allow the jocks to program their own shows."

Future Gold

"In addition to our oldies, we have instituted a new segment called 'Future Gold' which enables us to program some of the current hits," continued Henry. "Our future gold playlist now consists of 15 records—two of which are played every hour. Though the listener reaction to the new singles has been quite strange, we feel it is our duty to make our audiences aware of current releases as well as the oldies."

In checking our own Cash Box charts, we discovered that there are 10 oldies songs enjoying new success on the singles chart. They are: "Daddy's Home," Jermaine Jackson; "Jambalaya," Blue Ridge Rangers; "Do You Wanna Dance," Bette Midler; "Looking Through The Eyes of Love," Partridge Family; "Reelin & Rockin'," Chuck Berry; "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes," Blue Haze; "Tweedle Dee," Little Jimmy Osmond; "Oh No, Not My Baby," Merry Clayton; "But I Do," Bobby Vinton; and The New Seekers' version of "Come Softly To Me."

Music Fair Buys WORK

NEW YORK — The board of directors of Music Fair Enterprises Inc. has approved the acquisition of radio station WORK in York, Pennsylvania. The announcement was made by Lee Guber and Shelly Gross, chief executive officers. Subject to the approval of the Federal Communications Commission, the station will be purchased for cash from Associated Broadcasters, Inc.

WORK, a 5,000-watt non-directional station by day and 1,000-watt by night, is an NBC affiliate.

Based in Philadelphia and New York, the principal business of the company is the operation of five arena theaters in suburbs of New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington, D.C., and the Deauville Star Theater in Miami Beach, a joint venture with the Deauville Hotel. Music Fair's flagship theater is the Westbury Music Fair in Westbury, Long Island.

Music Fair's production of "Lorelei," an updated version of "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" starring Carol Channing, will begin a one-year national tour on February 26.

Management III Inks ABC's Rivera

NEW YORK — Jerry Weintraub and Sid Bernstein of Management III have announced the signing of Geraldo Rivera, 29-year-old award-winning reporter and commentator for WABC-TV's "Eye Witness News" to a management and television production contract.

In addition to working with Rivera on the management of his career, Weintraub and Bernstein also announced that they and Rivera have formed a television production company.

Rivera, within the past two years, has become one of the most respected and noted television journalists in New York, winning two Associated Press awards for excellence in broadcasting, as well as numerous other honors in the field of journalism.

KSFO Debuts Listener Movie Reviews

SAN FRANCISCO — Radio station KSFO has instituted a new policy of allowing listeners to rate motion pictures on the air. Termed "People's Movie Reviews," the concept was introduced by Larry Diggs as a feature on the Jim Lange Show from 6-10 a.m.

According to the format of the show no reviews will be accepted from celebrities or industry personnel. Diggs goes directly to a movie theatre with his tape recorder and questions persons as they leave a movie house. Diggs' only question to them is "What did you think of the film?" The answers are frank and candid.

Out of a possible score of 10, listeners rated Barbra Streisand's "Up The Sandbox" at 3.4, while the Steve McQueen/Alfred Hitchcock film of "Getaway" was rated at 8.

In future weeks, listeners will be asked to review "Jeremiah Johnson," "The Jail," and, believe it or not, a pornographic film.

As a result of 8½ hours of continuous air-play, telephone lines were jammed, and the police were called in to calm crowds gathering outside the station as well as to check out a report that KSFX had been hijacked. Eyewitness news reporters showed up to cover the scene while the crowd continued to grow. According to MCA promotion vice president Pat Pipolo, word spread very quickly. On Monday morning home phones were ringing with inquiries from other stations as to when the record would be released. Dobie Gray's debut Decca LP for MCA was shipped on Jan. 14.

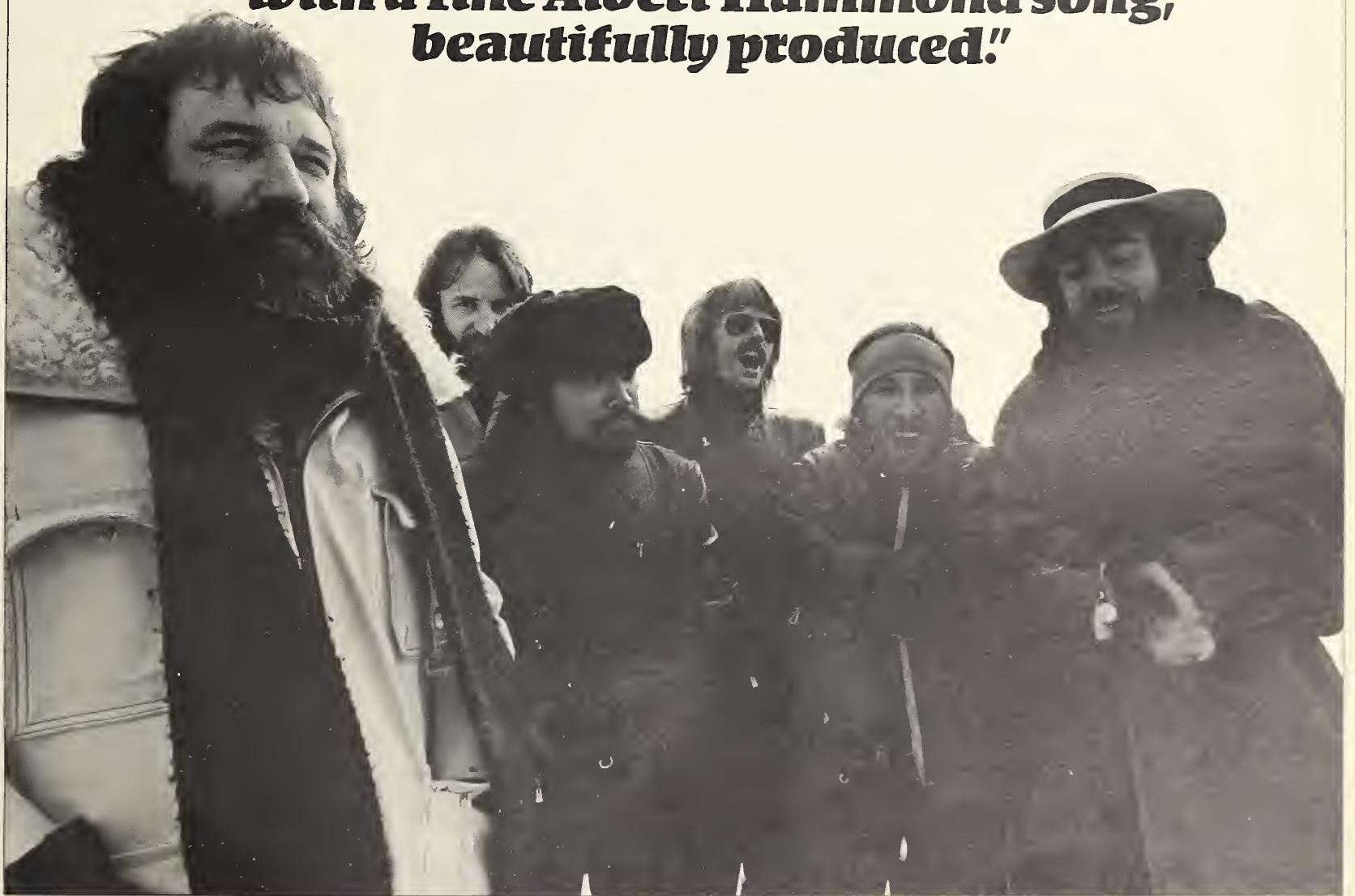

ALOHA FROM HAWAII VIA SATELLITE — Elvis Presley—RCA-VPSX 6089

Why, you might ask, has Elvis Presley been able to sustain these many years as the 'king'? The answer is quite simple; take a two-record set like this one that already has advance orders of over 500,000 copies even before the release date. Add to it the fact that Elvis always gives his audience more than a mere 100%; consider the fact that this quad package contains eight new songs never before recorded; it all adds up to one thing—when you're number one, there's a good reason! This new Presley-pak was recorded live at the Honolulu Int'l center on Jan. 24, and it could easily become Presley's biggest selling album to date.



THE POWER OF JOE SIMON—Joe Simon—Spring-SPR 5704

The power of Joe Simon is awesome. Considering that this new album contains such former hits as "Drowning In The Sea Of Love," "Power Of Love," and his current chart climber, "Step By Step," this conceivably could be called a greatest hits package. Simon's delivery is unique in that he makes each song his very own. It's soul power-personified. Simon at his best, and no doubt another gold outing.

LIFE AND TIMES—Jim Croce—ABC-ABCX 769

"You Don't Mess Around With Jim," and "Operator" were just the beginning of a career that will see Croce become recognized as one of the finest contemporary singer/songwriters today. Now, with his new single ("One Less Set Of Footsteps") also included, Croce will take his place in the top 20 circle. Some of the more outstanding tracks, and potential follow-up singles include "Dreamin' Again," "Next Time, This Time," and "Bad, Bad Leroy Brown" which sounds very similar to Lloyd Price's "Stagger-Lee". Album provides great programming for both top 40 and FM markets.



COMPOSITE TRUTH — Mandrill — Polydor-PD 5043

With the release of their latest album, "Composite Truth," Mandrill takes another giant musical step forward. They should not be compared to groups like Santana or Malo simply because Mandrill music is more ballsy and raw. More driving and spiritual, if you will. The eight tracks on this LP (including their recent single, 'Fencewalk,') are representative of the advanced stages of a group that takes much time between album releases. Listen closely to "Polk Street Carnival," and "Moroccan Nights." They speak a language all their own.

16 GREATEST HITS — Steppenwolf — Dunhill-DSX 50135

Now that Steppenwolf is no more, you'll want to have their collection of hits. Having attained seven million selling albums and three gold singles, this collection spans the group's seven year career and includes all of their singles hits as well as their classic FM tracks. The raunchy, raging vocals of leader John Kay will always be remembered on such classics as "Born To Be Wild," "Rock Me," "Magic Carpet Ride," and the now classic "Monster." A certain chart album in the weeks to come.



ALL MY CHOICES — Mary Travers — Warner Brothers—BS 2677

There's a certain magical quality about Mary Travers that just can't be described in words. It's more than her feeling for a song. And much more than her delivery. When she sings, we believe her. There's a delicate touch to her voice that allows her to feel a song like nobody else can. It's obvious from listening to "That Year There Was No Winter," and "The Half Of It," Mary adds renewed life to Jackson Browne's "Doctor My Eyes," and to John Denver's "Goodbye Again," but the truly beautiful experience comes from listening to "Five Hundred Miles" a tune that Mary Travers owns. All in all, a remarkable album.

CURTIS MAYFIELD: HIS EARLY YEARS WITH THE IMPRESSIONS—ABC—ABCX-780-2

It's no secret that before his solo career rocketed him to the top of the national charts, Curtis Mayfield was the front man for the highly successful Impressions. This two record set contains the greatest hits of that legendary group—and is certain to become a collectors item as well. "Gypsy Woman," "Amen," "Keep On Pushing," "I'm So Proud," "We're A Winner," "It's All Right," and 14 others span the entire career of The Impressions under Curtis. Definitely a set worth owning.



DION & THE BELMONTS LIVE AT MADISON SQUARE GARDEN—Warner Bros.—BS 2664

On the night of June 2, 1972, Dion & The Belmonts walked onto the stage at New York's Madison Square Garden to take part in Richard Nader's Rock 'n Roll Revival #9. It was more than an historic moment for the crowd who gave them a standing ovation and thunderous applause. For Dion & The Belmonts were a supergroup even before the term came into existence. This "Reunion" album is a part of history that we're not likely to forget. "I Wonder Why," "A Teenager In Love," "Where Or When," "No One Knows," and "That's My Desire" represent some of the group's classics, while Dion as a soloist performs "Runaround Sue," "The Wanderer," "Ruby Baby," "Little Diane," and "Drip Drop." We would like nothing more than to see this album gain certification as a gold record. Just for old times' sake. Enjoy!

LET ME TOUCH YOUR MIND—Ike & Tina—United Artists UAS-5660

No act in the business comes close to this kind of excitement (Ruth Buzzi's recent stab at it as Tina on the "Carol Burnett Show" notwithstanding). On this one, they tackle quite a few blues and oldies: "Early One Morning," "Annie Had A Baby" (Hank Ballard's controversial hit of the fifties), "Up On The Roof" and even a soul try at "Born Free." But our favorite, besides the title tracks, is "Popcorn," which is a new tune. Sounding something like "Shotgun" with moogification, it could bring them back to the singles charts in a blaze of glory. Package is designed to resemble a paper fortune-teller.

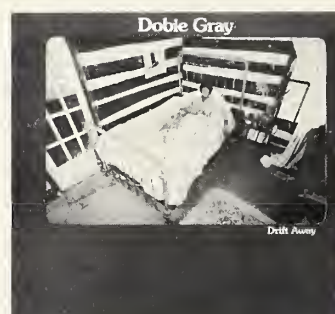
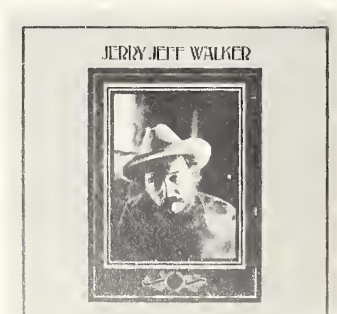


THE HISTORY OF THE GUESS WHO—Pride PRD 0012

It's been many years since we've heard from Dobie Gray. But now he's returned to continue where "In Crowd" left off. And he's certain to do just that with his latest single, "Drift Away" which is the title track of this album. "The Time That I Love You The Most" seems like a natural follow-up single, but the remainder of the album is consistently as strong. Gray mixes the tunes well, weaving from the up tempo "L.A. Lady," to the soulful "We Had It All." Special credit must be given responsible for writing almost all of the songs to Troy Seals and Mentor Williams who were on what has to be described as a truly exceptional album.

Yoko's latest two-record set features some of the best instrumental tracks she's ever had in support. Credit goes here to Elephant's Memory and the Endless Strings and Choir Boys. As if the LP title weren't intriguing enough, there are songs with such monikers as: "I Felt Like Smashing My Face In A Clear Glass Window," "What A Bastard The World Is" and "What A Mess." This time, she's decided to be lyrical rather than avante-grade in her vocal styling. Should be well-received by her fans.



THE LAUGHTER AND THE TEARS—Randy Edelman—Lion LN-1013

The MGM-distributed label should do well with this peaceful young man who plays a piano like he means it. In addition to his talents on the 88's, Randy sings like a believable bird and has arranged the entire LP. Some songs are sparsely attacked, while others get a rich and well-balanced treatment. He sings of places ("Mexico," "Paris," "Kentucky Blue") and feelings ("Lost," "It's Nice To Have Something To Believe In") in such a way as to make us take notice, both of the subject of his music and his own varied talents.



BARBARA KEITH—Reprise MS 2087

We have a friend who, upon hearing any name vaguely sounding like "Barbara Keith," jumps up, applauds and allows his general level of enthusiasm to go completely unchecked for several minutes at the very least. Now her Reprise album is on our turntable, we understand. Completely. Barbara is now much more to us than the pen behind Delanie & Bonnie's "Free The People." Anyone who can convey the countryside of "Detroit Or Buffalo," the rock 'n' gospel excitement of "A Stone's Throw Away" and all stops between earns a quick but lasting place in anyone's heart. Larry Marks' best production to date.



LARK—Linda Lewis—Reprise MS 2120

"And you got a very fine nose/You got flowers in your toes..." The debut of an English sprite who comes on like a cross between Millie ("My Boy Lollipop") Small, CSN&Y and Donovan. Linda accompanies her angelic voice on piano and guitar, with able assistance from a fine band when and where called for. "Spring Song" is a supreme up, "Gladly Give My Hand" is a bosa-love song with sweet sax from Michael Eve in support. She's doing fine, thank you, in England, and should translate well into the musical scene here.



BLUES AT MONTREAUX—King Curtis & Champion Jack Dupree—Atlantic SD 1637

This set was recorded live at the Swiss bluesfest just three months before King Curtis' death in '71. Jack, who usually plays his barrelhouse piano/vocal blues on the solo, teamed with the legendary saxman here for the first time; the results are most impressive. According to the Champ, five of the six tracks were especially composed for the event and they bear the names of both blues greats as composers. With the King on this occasion: Cornell Dupree on guitar, Jerry Jemmott on bass, and Oliver Jackson, drums.



WE GOT A GOOD THING GOING—Hank Crawford—Kudu 08

When it comes to up-to-the-minute mood jazz that's black but also universal, you've got to consider Hank Crawford and his richly-handled alto sax. Here is a program of pop standards ("Imagination," "I'm Just A Lucky So And So"), seasonals ("Winter Wonderland," "The Christmas Song") and current soul stirrers from Motown to Bill Withers. Musicians include Bernard Purdie, George Benson, Cornell Dupree and Richard Tee. Up to the label's generally high pop jazz standards.

A new store in Concord, Calif., will be opened sometime in May, and the Company hopes to add at least eight additional units in the state by December, 1973, with 34 stores in operation by that time.

The Company also announced the formation of a separate division to handle record and tape sales relating to export, schools and libraries, direct mail, and club activities.

Hartstone said he expects the second six months of this fiscal year to reflect an increase in sales and earnings over the same period last year.

Queen City Adds Partner; Sets Expansion

CINCINNATI — Edward Bosken, president of Queen City Album, Inc., custom record pressing and packaging firm, announces that Walter W. Thiemann, local banking executive, has joined the firm as partner, vice-president and treasurer, and that the company has embarked on an expansion program that will more than double its present facilities.

Queen City Album entered into the mastering, plating and pressing of records in 1963. In 1966, the company moved to its present location, 2832 Spring Grove Ave., where it occupies 25,000 square feet. Bosken recently acquired an adjoining building which is being fitted with new automatic 45 record presses, a complete new automatic jacket fabricating line and 8-track tape cartridge manufacturing facilities to occupy an additional 13,000 square feet. In addition, the firm is expanding its customer warehousing and drop-shipping facilities.

Last year, Bosken added new automatic LP record presses, a complete color separation department, new and larger litho presses and computerized typesetting equipment.

Queen City Album has long been one of the major pressers and packagers of gospel albums in the nation. Bosken is currently in production on a gospel LP to feature 12 of the top gospel name groups, with release set for early Mar.

MJA 6 Mos. Profits Up

NEW YORK — Marvin Josephson Associates, Inc., recorded sharply higher profits for its six month reporting period ended Dec. 31, 1972, Marvin Josephson, president of the entertainment and leisure-time oriented company, has announced.

For the first half of its 1973 fiscal year, the company increased earnings by 42% to \$782,800, compared with net income of \$552,700 for the same period last fiscal year.

Earnings per share rose to 75¢ for the six month reporting period, compared with 54¢ for the same period a year earlier. Computations were based on 1,048,100 average shares outstanding in the current period and 1,033,000 average shares outstanding in the year earlier period.

Revenues increased to \$5,725,400 from \$5,161,600.

For the three month period ended Dec. 31, revenues were \$3,151,000, compared with \$2,836,900, while net income totaled \$525,200, up from \$381,900. Earnings per share were 50 cents, compared with 37 cents.

Commenting on the results, Mr. Josephson said: "The six month results continue to reflect both our ability to increase our participation in the entertainment fields and the continued improvement in the industry's environment. Indeed, we see a continuation of both trends through 1973."

Chaiken's first projects for Almo Productions have included the ABC Television Movies of the Week, "Trouble Comes to Town" and Lorimar Productions' "Girls of Huntington House." He will continue his activities as an independent contractor through his Jules Chaiken Musical Services.

Prior to aligning with A&M on a project-to-project basis, Chaiken handled orchestra contracting for several films, including "Lost Horizons," "Hang Em High" and Hospital. He has also done extensive work in TV commercials and recording studio session contracting. His clients have included Continental and United Airlines, Chevron, Olympia Beer, Kodak, and in the studios, Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass.

NEW YORK — Terry Knight and GFR Enterprises, Ltd. have filed lawsuits in the United States Federal Court against the Evansville, Indiana Municipal Auditorium, the Nashville, Tennessee Civic Center Arena and Lon Varnell Enterprises, Inc., promoter of the Nashville performance of Grand Funk Railroad's concert there and against the Mobile, Alabama Civic Center charging trademark infringement and unfair competition. Each lawsuit seeks damages in the amount of \$300,000.

These are the first three auditoriums on the new Grand Funk Railroad tour which was announced last week.

AGAC Members '72 Increase; New Officers

This and other matters concerning the association, which assists writers in the collection of royalties, were revealed at the association's annual meeting here on Wed., Jan. 24.

In addition, officers were inaugurated. Ervin Drake was elected president, replacing Edward Eliscu. The council members elected were: east: Alex Kramer, Sheldon Harnick, Ervin Drake and Leonard Whitecup; west: John Green and Ray Evans.

Also, treasurer, Sheila Davis; assistant secretary-treasurer, Donald Kahn; secretary: Sheldon Harnick; 2nd vp: Lewis Spence; 1st vp: Leonard Whitecup; exec vp: Alex Kramer.

Edward Eliscu, outgoing president, was among those who addressed the meeting. "An important area of AGAC activity," he said, "has been the fight to properly reward the secondary lyric writers—that is, those who write lyrics in English for foreign tunes." He cited the aid of Stanley Adams, ASCAP president and AGAC member, Ed Cramer, president of BMI, and Sal Chiantia, president of MCA Music and the publisher's association, NMPA, in helping to get the matter introduced at the Conference of Societies of Authors & Composers (SISAC).

"At three meetings of this international body—in Las Palmas, Paris, and New York—it was declared that there should be fair payment when a lyric was used anywhere in the world," Eliscu said.

"Regrettably," he added, "in spite of constant AGAC prodding, this fine statement of intention has not been universally implemented. Recently, the AGAC committee was told candidly by a top SISAC member that it is not known which countries, if any, are paying for the use of secondary lyrics at this time."

The meet also featured performances by AGAC members Sheldon Harnick and Will Holt.

Originally known as the Songwriters Protective Association (SPA), AGAC was formed in 1931 by Billy Rose, Edgar Leslie and George Meyers.

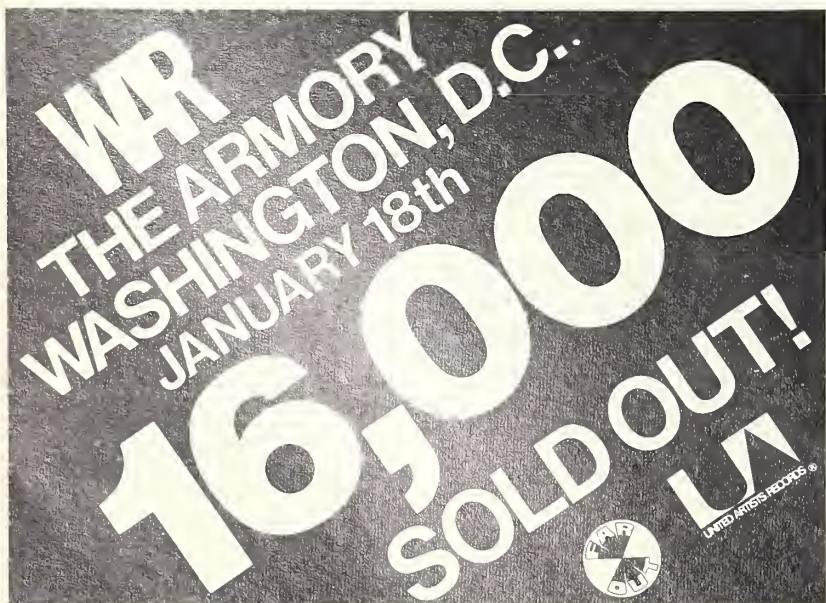
Capitol Names Asst. Counsel

reasons for "off par" performance and examine possible remedies. Some of the potential "solutions" we will want to evaluate include, for example:

—Stimulating greater selectivity in record companies' new releases.

—Designing approaches for better matching of orders and stocking practices with local market demographics.

—Streamlining and speeding up returns handling procedures to enable greater distributor and rack jobber recycling of saleable merchandise.

—Developing procedures for identifying accounts with out of line returns experience as well as methods for working with these problem accounts to reduce returns.

—Promoting ways to minimize unfavorable impacts of "cut-outs" on inventories at regular retail channels.

—Providing better information or analytical approaches for making buying decisions on new releases.

Reducing Processing

Concentrated programs, such as those discussed above, may enable merchandisers to push down returns ratios nearer to "acceptable" levels; however, this means that some amount of returned merchandise (and the related accounting paperwork) will still need to be processed.

We believe that actions to cut the cost of returns processing will, similar to reducing the incidence of returns, require some degree of joint cooperation between the various segments of the prerecorded music industry. In this area, however, we suspect that most of the profit improvement potential can probably be obtained through independent efforts of rack jobbers in streamlining their handling and recordkeeping systems.

Naturally, the first step toward cutting costs is to pinpoint the target for cost reduction—i.e., determine how much returns processing is now costing a typical rack jobber. Next, we will examine the cost improvement potential of streamlining a rack's existing system without changing the basic functions (processing requirements) the system now performs. On this count, we have found from past experience that a 20 percent potential cost reduction is a reasonable expectation to achieve through an in-depth examination of this kind of paperwork and handling system.) Finally, we will evaluate the potential savings through making changes in returns processing that go beyond the scope of the internal systems employed by racks.

Some of the possible changes—involving both racks' internal systems and overall returns flows—that have been suggested to us for consideration include for example:

—Eliminating detailed listing of merchandise by title on returns sheets (substituting instead broader product categories).

—Speeding up the returns authorization process to reduce warehouse

space requirements.

—Avoiding double handling on some product by reducing orders for returned titles than can be recycled

—Reducing requirements for manual sorting of the actual returned product according to catalog number.

—Cutting transportation costs on returns through greater delivery and pickup coordination.

—Using in-house or outside EDP services to perform selected record keeping and clerical functions involved with returns.

order. (The British Government subsidizes a percentage of the cost of British firms who attend the MIDEM).

New countries represented this year who were never present before include: Cuba, Guatemala, Hong Kong, No. Ireland, Jamaica and New Zealand.

Bubble Top

Because there was tremendous demand for more booth space at next year's meet (the four floors of the Palais Des Festivals that houses the exhibits was completely sold out) Chevy advised that he plans to construct a balloon-bubble top over the whole top floor outdoor terrace and make room for another 30 offices. The list of performers and presenters for the annual Grammy telecast continues to grow with additional names to be announced as plans are finalized.

Wesley Rose, national president of NARAS, said this year's presentation promises to have one of the most "exciting" lineups of talent in the history of NARAS, and will include several innovations, including a tribute to NARAS by Columbia's Johnny Cash.

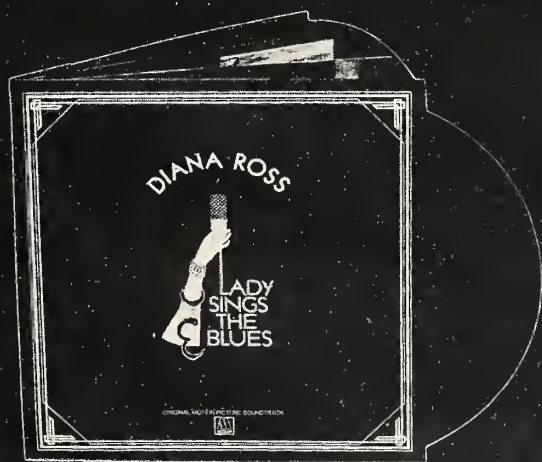

The song, Commissioner Kennedy has pointed out, marks not only the first time a professional sports league has adopted an over-all theme of its own, but the first time every franchise of such a league will have had the same musical theme with localized lyrics.

Curtis Mayfield Impressions

SANTA MONICA CIVIC — Curtis Mayfield, who's penned dozens of hits for the Impressions (the group he used to sing with), including "Keep On Pushing," appears to be pushing only one kind of musical message these days, mostly all anti-drug oriented. This of course is due in part to his walloping success with the music to the film "Superfly." Just prior to this particular "funky junkie" music, Curtis' compositions were still on the soap box with protest songs filled with black altruism. It was during the period that he launched his solo career, and that's fine, but the only thing is: everything in moderation. The packed Civic got an inordinate amount of great rhythms with the same "Superfly" story, and too many flies can drive anyone batty.

Curtis has a great track record, an unsurpassed soundtrack, two gold singles off it, "Superfly" and "Fredy's Dead," and a following of old fans and new ones. The only thing missing is a more well rounded repertoire that perhaps would include some of the great love ballads that made him famous as an Impression. This would truly convey his diversification.

Preceding him on the bill were his old cohorts. Impressions members Sam Gooden, Fred Cash, and Leroy Hudson did all the vintage Mayfield songs, like "Gypsy Woman," "People Get Ready" and "I'm So Proud." The latter actually drew sentimental sighs from the ladies in the house.

Lily Tomlin Gunhill Road

BITTER END, NYC — We caught Lily's first show Friday evening and feel we have to review the audience first before we get to Ms. Tomlin.

The crowd was a strange blend of politeness and rigidity. Oh, they laughed—how you could help that?—but it was the way they laughed that left Ms. Tomlin in a rather strange predicament. You get the feeling she would have welcomed some honest-to-goodness heckling, a few tomatoes, or any outburst of reaction. What she got—through absolutely no fault of her own—was a much-reserved blah-appreciation.

When she asked for leading questions as Edith Anne—her personal answer to Eloise—she got silence. Judging from their general lack of true warmth, we can't imagine anyone going over well on this particular occasion.

But Lily spoke to them about her unhappiness and then went on with her show. Such is the nature of a true professional and a genuinely honest individual who feels that speaking her mind is as important as doing the rehearsed bits of hilarity that have made her a national comedic giant. The Polydor artist reiterated most of the skits she had performed some months before at Carnegie Hall, but they were still easily enjoyed by anyone who was willing to give back just one fraction of the involvement Lily Tomlin always puts into her act. Even in front of a "bah humbug!" audience.

Opening the bill was Kama Sutra's Gunhill Road, a trio with limited instrumental prowess but one with a fine understanding of the potentially current applications of white fifties harmony. "42nd Street" as usual was a high point; but so too "Back When My Hair Was Short" and the catchy "Sailin'." They need a lot of work in the patter department, but they have the stuff to stand out from the crowd because in their own non-assuming folksy way, they can be daring.

Traffic Free

SANTA MONICA CIVIC—A recent capacity Civic crowd seemed delighted at being submerged by three Island Records acts, all boasting new albums and all exhibiting broad appeal. Traffic played a lengthy but rewarding set. Triumvirate Steve Winwood, Cris Wood, and Jim Capaldi drive their audience into many moments of musical rapture via their highly stylized orchestrations. They are all superb musicians, probably some of the finest around. Particularly nice were "40,000 Headmen" and "Nothing To Say." The song "Sometimes I Feel So Uninspired" off Traffic's latest vehicle "Shoot Out at the Fantasy Factory" sounded like a potential hit single.

Sandwiched in between Traffic and John Martyn was Free. The group's lead singer Paul Rodgers was "free" enough with his microphone: the hot-wired affair ended most abruptly at the end of the act when Rodgers uncontrollably threw it to the rear of the stage. This kind of exhibitionism along with the group's previous hits "Fire And Water" and "All Right Now" seemed to bring the act home free. They provided visual and audio excitement.

John Martyn, who opened the show, didn't command the attention of his audience until after his audio was turned up. His new Island album is called "Solid Air," and though he is good, it will probably take a hit single to make him a solid attraction. The best received numbers were the acoustic instrumentals.

Sarah Vaughn Billy Paul

TROUBADOUR, L.A. — This club departed from its usual folk/soft-rock fare last week to present the lovely Sarah Vaughn, whose charm and grace proved well-adapted to any room. Backed by a three-man band, the first tuxedoes to grace that particular stage in some time, Vaughn opened and closed with "Tonight." Between those endpoints she stretched a line of vocal discipline and subtlety that evoked repeated cries of appreciation from the audience—not always appropriate to the mood of the song, but well-intentioned nevertheless.

One of the visual treats in the audience, which included Della Reese, Billy Eckstine, and Vaughn's 11-year-old daughter, was Taj Mahal, whose dancing, smiling reaction expressed the sense of mellow, intense communication that never disappeared. From "Misty" and "Gingerbread Man," which included some inspired humming over several octaves, to cuts from her new Mainstream album, sung with the prompting of the sheet music in front of her, Vaughn demonstrated an equal command of sultry blues and upbeat rockers. Of the new entries, "Rainy Days and Mondays" was most effective, a stunning interpretation that brought new life and maturity to the standard. When she left the stage, hands reached out from all directions to grasp hers, heads bent over to kiss her, and enthusiastic applause accompanied her to the exit.

Billy Paul celebrated his Troubadour opening by accepting a platinum record for his first hit, "Me and Mrs. Jones." Accompanied by a well-stocked band that overflowed the small stage, his unique vocals, high-pitched and visceral, were easily the center of attention.

Fanny Frankie & Johnny

MAX'S KANSAS CITY, NYC — Fanny is a total rock experience. In the three years that the group has performed and recorded they have combined a rare talent in their selection of tunes and an outstanding stage presence with four of the finest and most competent musicians around these days. Especially impressive were Jean Millington's imaginative bass lines, the keyboards and husky vocals of Nickey Barclay and beautiful three and four part harmonies.

Their set at Max's included two songs from their last album and tunes from Badfinger, Marvin Gaye and Randy Newman. The five new songs performed to be released shortly on their next album are tunes to look forward to owing greatly to the new musical concepts the group has worked out.

The exceptional tune of the evening was Randy Newman's "Last Night I Had A Dream" featuring extraordinary three part harmony. This entirely different rendition of the author's version demonstrated the ever growing need in rock for interpretation lacking in so many rock groups that tend to rely on inferior original compositions.

Fanny has definitely overcome the major problem many groups suffer from. They have ably managed to avoid that one mediocre album or performance. Their consistent musical progress and prowess will be obvious with the release of their fourth album. Upward and onward to the top

Loggins & Messina Albert Hammond

TROUBADOUR, L.A. — Remnants of the legendary Buffalo Springfield continue to flourish, the newest being Jim Messina, whose association with Kenny Loggins is proving most fruitful. Returning to L.A. for a week sold-out in advance, Loggins and Messina demonstrated a mastery of the ascending curve performance, starting out calmly, with Loggins solo for three acoustic numbers, building steadily to an excitement that had the audience gasping for more, and leaving them totally satisfied after two encores, including their hit single "Your Mama Don't Dance."

Boasting an excellent but so far under-recognized guitarist in Jim Messina, whose presence contributed greatly to Poco's distinctive instrumentals, and a versatile, powerful vocalist in Kenny Loggins, a fine guitarist himself, the group combines mellow, acoustic material with good-time rock 'n' roll. Merle Brigante and Larry Sims, formerly of the locally popular Sunshine Co., join a well-arranged wind duo in accompaniment.

Albert Hammond, opening the show, has perhaps been boxed into the pop category too quickly on the basis of his single "It Never Rains in Southern California." In a club atmosphere, accompanied only by acoustic guitar (his own and Jay Lewis'), he sounds much folkier. Where his single resembles a Bobby Sherman, his acoustic performance is closer to Cat Stevens. Assimilating these various elements into his image should increase his appeal to both underground and Top 40 outlets.

There is much to be said for the many endeavors of Al Kooper. His latest project, the formation and production of Frankie & Johnny on Warners, opening the bill at Max's, is one of his finest to date. One doesn't have to read the liner notes from F&J's first LP to get that Kooper feel. His influence on the group as a unit is ever present. However, the group is a unit in itself. Live, the group (making their premiere performance at Max's) has retained much of the style learned when they played behind Kooper during several of his fairly recent performances without sounding like a Kooper replication. Their treatment of Kooper penned tunes are entirely unique interpretations. Also included in their repertoire are several original tunes in addition to one song from an early Free album and a Roy Orbison tune among others.

Viewing the group at their first professional attempt was an exciting and promising experience. There is a definite need for improvement on some of the vocals, but instrumentally the band is already a tight group that works together with no one musician in a constant spotlight. Exceptional tunes included "Go Tell Ma," and "Lay Back" which demonstrated their superior rhythm section featuring John Paul Fetta on some fierce bass transitions. This driving new hard rock ensemble have begun their journey to the top.

Bobby Womack

WHISKY, L.A. — Bobby Womack preaches the power of love, but even more evident in his music is the power of Womack. A disciple of the late, great Sam Cooke, Womack has worked with an impressive array of talent. After hearing him on his own, one might almost say it was their privilege to work with him.

Backed by Peace, a ten-piece group from Macon, Georgia, Womack provides all the excitement himself. Peace offered three respectable warm-up numbers in their heavy brass style, but were transformed by Womack's tiger-shirted appearance. Some performers play to themselves and allow the audience to listen in; Womack plays to the audience, without which, it would seem, his performance would be meaningless. From the outset, he exhorts them to clap stomp, to react in any way that lets him know someone is there. Someone was there, no question about it. ("Y'all can applaud if you want," he says. "It makes me feel good.")

A feigned modesty accompanied by an obvious and thorough enjoyment of the agitated response characterizes Bobby Womack's appeal, a self-assured charm that remains whether he is lamenting a lost love or dispensing advice with a sagacity honed by experience. The basic energy of his music extends through his own hits, such as "Woman's Gotta Have It" and "That's the Way I Feel About 'Cha" to his notable versions of others, like "Sweet Caroline" and "Close to You."

Sharing the bill was Eddie Zip and Fast Company, a five-piece back-up group plus three interracial Supremes that centered around the lead singer and his fine keyboard work.

Higher Earnings Viewed By MJA

CHICAGO — Marvin Josephson Associates, Inc., has increased its earnings projections for its 1973 fiscal year, Ralph Mann, exec vice president, told a meeting of securities analysts here.

"The fundamental picture in the entertainment industries is excellent and this, coupled with our ability to increase our share of the business, makes us optimistic that we can produce earnings per share of at least \$1.60 in our fiscal year ending June 30," Mann explained. The company had been estimating earnings per share of \$1.50.

"This would give us a compounded growth rate in earnings in each of the last three years of 33½ per cent, which has been our internal goal," Mr. Mann continued.

For the six month period ended Dec. 31, MJA's earnings rose 42% to \$782,800 from \$551,700 for the comparable period a year earlier. Earnings per share were 75¢ compared with 54¢ in the first half of fiscal 1972. Revenues rose to \$5,725,400 from \$5,161,600.

In its 1972 fiscal year, MJA earned \$1.21 a share compared with \$1.03 a year before. This was based on revenues of \$10,687,100 and net income of \$1,252,400.

Previn Lyric On 'Tango'

HOLLYWOOD — Dory Previn, a singer-composer-lyricist under contract to United Artists Records as an artist, and to United Artists Music Group as a songwriter, will provide the words to Gato Barbieri's theme music for the much-talked-about United Artists film, "Last Tango In Paris".

Ms. Previn's accomplishments as a lyricist include Academy Award nominations for "Come Saturday Morning" (from "The Sterile Cuckoo"), music by Fred Karlin, and for "A Second Chance" (theme from "Two For The Seesaw") and "The Faraway Part Of Town" (from "Pepe"), both of which were composed by Andre Previn. Her lyric contributions to films also include the theme for "Valley Of The Dolls," a gold record seller for Dionne Warwick, "You're Going To Hear From Me" from "Inside Daisy Clover" and "Goodbye, Charlie," once described by John Lennon on BBC as his favorite movie song.

Ms. Previn has had four successful albums via United Artists Records—"On My Way To Where," "Mythical Kings And Iguanas," "Reflections In A Mud Puddle," and the recent "Mary C. Brown And The Hollywood Sign".

Southern Library Broadens Scope

NEW YORK — The Southern Library of Recorded Music has been revamped, augmented and updated, report Emily Klinger, eastern service and west coast division head Roy Kohn.

Ms. Klinger, who works closely with library clients, has recently returned from London where she met with Dennis Berry, managing director and founder of the Library. In detailing the considerable changes in the Library, she points to the addition of the Contemporary 9000 Series, which adds an expansive range of of contemporary moog, rock, jazz, Spanish, Mexican and a wide variety of international music to the already extensive Library collection. These new additions plus new recordings of Bach, Beethoven, Brahms, Chopin, Mozart, Schubert and Strauss works bring a completely fresh sound to the widely used Library.

Recorded around the world, The Southern Library of Recorded Music supplies mood, theme, background music and sound effects for thousands of projects each year. Library music is heard on TV and radio commercials, documentary and feature films, and in educational and corporate presentations as well.

Darin Chess Match

HOLLYWOOD — Plans have been finalized for the first annual Bobby Darin International Chess Classic to be held in Los Angeles this Oct. under the auspices of the International Chess Federation (FIDE) and the United States Chess Federation, according to U.S. Chess Federation executive director Edmund Edmondson. Darin has personal interest in Chess.

The Darin Classic will have the biggest prize money total in the history of tournament chess: \$25,000. The Darin Classic will be the first 16-man Grandmaster tournament ever held in the Western Hemisphere.

George Graff Dies; Wrote 'Irish Eyes'

NEW YORK — George Graff, charter member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers and lyricist of "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling," died at his home in Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania last week (24) at the age of 86. Graff, who was born in New York City of Dutch and German parents on Aug. 5, 1886, had lived in Stroudsburg for many years and until fairly recently had run the Kol-Ax industrial stove company there. A widower, he is survived by his sister and his daughter, Mrs. Rosemary V. McMann of East Stroudsburg, Pa.

Graff, who collaborated on some 400 songs but always considered himself a businessman with a gift for lyrics, joined ASCAP in 1914—two years after his big hit with composer Ernest R. Ball, who also joined ASCAP as a charter member in 1914. Some of their other joint efforts included "As Long As the World Rolls On,"—their first success—and "To the End of the World With You," "I Love the Name of Mary," "Mother of Pearl" and "Till the Sands of the Desert Grow Cold." Ball died in California in 1927.

In recent years, Graff devoted much of his time and energy to ASCAP's efforts to secure revision and modernization of the copyright laws—an issue still pending before Congress.

R & B INGREDIENTS—Annette May Thomas, daughter of the well known gospel singer Brother Joe May, who has been with the Reverend James Cleveland Choir as an accompanist and soloist, is preparing her first album for Gospel Truth, which is distributed by Stax. Annette, booked for a Tonight Show stint, Monday, February 5th, also sings duets with her brother, Charles May, who's written many songs for her and accompanies her on piano. Her current Gospel Truth release is, "I'll Keep My Baby Warm" . . . The Bar-Kays, who are soon to be seen in the Wattstax film, have earned numerous musical back-up credits serving as the resident Stax rhythm section. Their studio credits include providing rhythm concepts for such artists as Albert King and Isaac Hayes' albums, "Hot Buttered Soul", "Movement", "To Be Continued", and "Shaft". From their involvement with the "Shaft" score came the idea for the Bar-Kays own single, "Son of Shaft". Their new album release is "Do You See What I See", and also judging from their performance in the Wattstax film, the group seems destined to become a Stax super group. The original Bar-Kays were formed in 1966 but all, except two of the original members, were killed in the plane crash which also killed Otis Redding. Of the two survivors, James Alexander has remained with the Bar-Kays and has been instrumental in creating the musical style and showmanship. The other survivor was Ben Cauley, now with the Isaac Hayes Movement. James Alexander, who plays bass guitar and an occasional tuba with the group says that "we're right back in the Otis Redding bag—we're back to our roots, you might say, and happy to be back". Larry Dodson, vocalist, was formerly with the Temprees. Harvey Henderson, sax, came from the Wildcats. Winston Stewart, organ, came from the Brothers Unlimited. Charles Allen on trumpet, Vernon Burch on guitar and Donnelle Hagan, drums, round out the current lineup. And, the Bar-Kays wear costumes that, to say the very least, have to be described as spectacular!

Aretha Franklin, who has a new Atlantic single, "Master Of Eyes" is serving as chairman and host for the tribute dinner being held for Ruth Bowen (Queen Booking Corp.) on March 14th. Ruth is being honored for her long and arduous years of endeavor in helping Black artists and a stellar lineup of talent is certain to be on hand to honor Ruth . . . Plans are underway for a coast-to-coast Latin Music TV program to start sometime in February, and Fania recording artist Joe Bataan is scheduled as master of ceremonies.

JAZZ NOTES—Atlantic Records will release "We're All Together Again For The First Time", featuring the Dave Brubeck Trio plus original member of the Brubeck Quartet, Paul Desmond, as well as Gerry Mulligan. The album marks the first time all three jazz giants have ever recorded together. The Dave Brubeck Trio, including Jack Six on bass and Alan Dawson on drums, Desmond and Mulligan will also appear in the Lincoln Center "Great Performers Series" on February 16th at Philharmonic Hall in NYC. The evening is billed as "Two Generations of Brubeck", and appearing with the above-named artists will be the Darius Brubeck Ensemble (with Danny Brubeck on drums) and Chris Brubeck's "New Heavenly Blue Rock Band". "We're All Together Again For The First Time" was recorded live in concert in various cities in Europe last fall, and is slated for release in March.

ON THE STREET—A new Tommie Young (Soul Power) single, "Do You Still Feel The Same Way" is a regional breakout. The waxing could make it all the way . . . The new Joe Simon single, "Step By Step" is also another Spring release that seems destined to hit the mark across the boards.

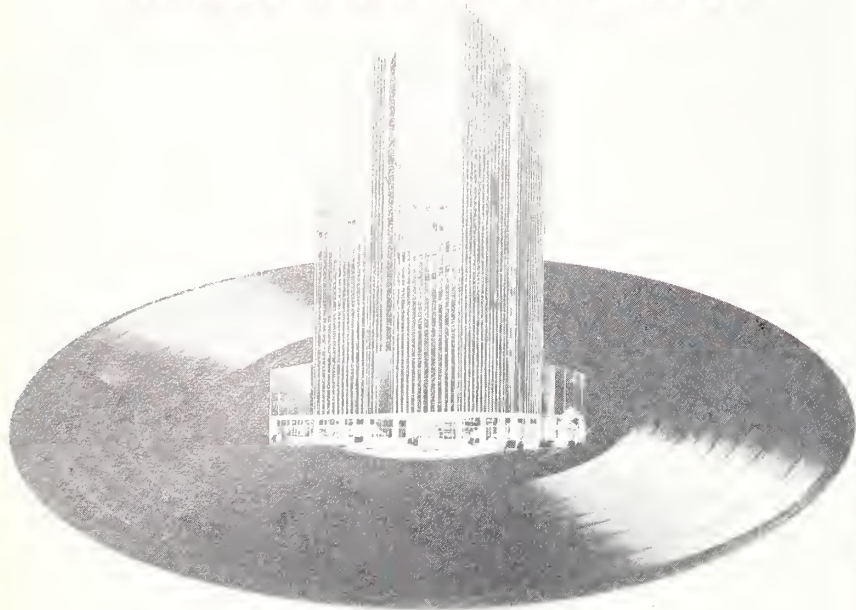

Isaac Hayes Scores

MEMPHIS — Isaac Hayes is a man you just can't separate from his music. And still riding high on the success of his Oscar-winning theme from the movie "Shaft", he brought all of the excitement of that popular theme song to life during the concert WattStax.

In the age of the afro, Hayes is a performer whose distinctive trademark is a clean palate. Just before he arrived on stage as the final act in a seven-hour concert, it was none other than Jesse Jackson who made the introductions.

Then, two escort motorcycles growled as they passed noisily through the main tunnel of the Los Angeles Coliseum with red lights and sirens in full action. As the audience stood spellbound in anticipation of their "Black Moses", Hayes emerged from his transportation, climbed to the middle of a small platform at mid-field and met Rev. Jackson on stage.

By this time, the band had begun the highly stylized introduction to that theme song which had sold and made millions while adding a new dimension to the complex art of movie scoring.

With a coy smile and a twinkle in his eye, Jackson slowly lifted a hat that had adorned the now famous bald head. And as the band moved on to a driving climax, Hayes threw off his colorful cape and stood resplendent in Academy Award glory: Attired in a gold chain vest and metallic orange tights with black and white fur-cuffed boots. Wardrobe-wise, he easily topped all who had preceded him that day.

"Right on, right on," Hayes called back in mellow baritone as he acknowledged the ovation of the crowd. Here stood a true artist who had grown along with the Memphis-based Stax Organization, first as a writer, then as a recording artist and now as a star composer and performer.

By this particular point in the evening, the audience had witnessed five hours of a wide variety of Black music. Still, the response to this veteran songwriter, who had touched the souls of his listeners so many times before, was intense. For they had all memorized those words from "Shaft" long before.

And just as he and his score had helped to effectively make that mythical private eye John Shaft a national hero, Hayes had proved himself equally proficient in reflecting the reality of the universal brother on the street. So when he performed the stirring ballad, "Soulsville", the symbolic imagery managed to generate nods of understanding acknowledge-

All in all, Hayes has certainly accomplished a great deal in a short time and his title of prophet has not been accorded without merit. As a singer and consummate musician, he conveys excitement and real meaning in his music.

NEW YORK: SHEL SILVERSTEIN—HE'S THE BALD ONE

It was raining on Shel Silverstein's clean and free-being head the day we got together for a bite and a rap. (No, he really doesn't bite.) According to Shel, rain and bald do not go together well. That's probably the only time he might opt for a full head of hair; but after joking about how much easier it is for him to dry off his top, he didn't seem at all envious.

Shel's been known to the industry for quite some time, not so much as a recording artist but as a songwriter. But music in any form hasn't always been his life. He sold his first cartoon to the Crib Diaper Service magazine some years back as an art student and worked his way up to one of *Playboy's* most respected illustrators. From cartoons, he got into children's books, thence to full-fledged songwriting. He's got a number of hits under his belt: from *The Irish Rovers' "The Unicorn"* onto *Johnny Cash's "A Boy Named Sue"* and just about everything *Dr. Hook & The Medicine Show* would ever think of doing—including their biggest "Sylvia's Mother" and their current "Cover Of 'Rolling Stone'."

Shel has recorded before—for Elektra, Atlantic, and RCA. Now, he's got a chart LP for Columbia, "Freakin' At The Freakers' Ball." A cut from the album, a Dr. Seuss-ian narrative called "Sarah Cynthia Sylvia Stout Would Not Take The Garbage Out" is breaking out of Seattle and looks like a real left-field giant. The darn thing was charted at KJR even before it was released.

Shel Silverstein is a man of many talents. The "Sarah" song might well be another "Rubber Duckie"—but the kiddies get a rather uniquely titled B-side for the same money, "Stacy Brown's Got Two." And if they get to the alarm, there's more R-rated goodies for their immeasurable pleasure and teehee-ing. Columbia finds this an interesting state of affairs, but their minds are open.

Shel's mind opens up at the drop of a suggestion. In a very non-egotripping way, he's quite opinionated on many subjects. Having followed the scene around the country (quite literally, having lived since 1955 where it was ever happening at the time of peak excitement), Shel's now moored in a house boat in Sausalito,

HOLLYWOOD—JIM WEATHERLY: SUNNY FORECAST

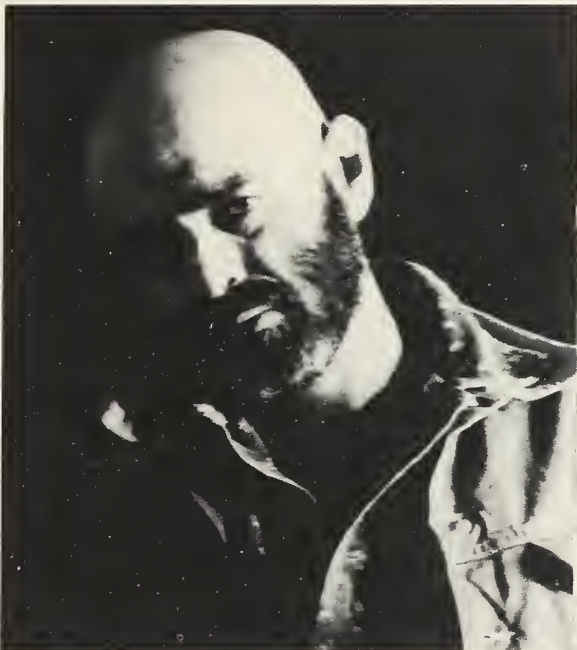
RCA Recording artist Jim Weatherly is a tunesmith who can thank his twisted toe. You see, if Weatherly, once a quarterback for the University of Mississippi, hadn't twisted his toe during a tackle, he might have gone on to play pro. However had he done this, he probably wouldn't have become the singer he is, signed to RCA, nor would he have written the new Gladys Knight and the Pips hit, "Neither One of Us."

Truth of the matter is "neither one of us" will ever know what might have happened if circumstances had been different, though it's always fun to play hypothetical merry-go-round. The days when he was an all-American candidate, and selected along with Joe Namath as quarterback for the Southern Eastern Conference, have long been played and passed. However it was during those days, maybe in quarter time, that he got involved playing in a band.

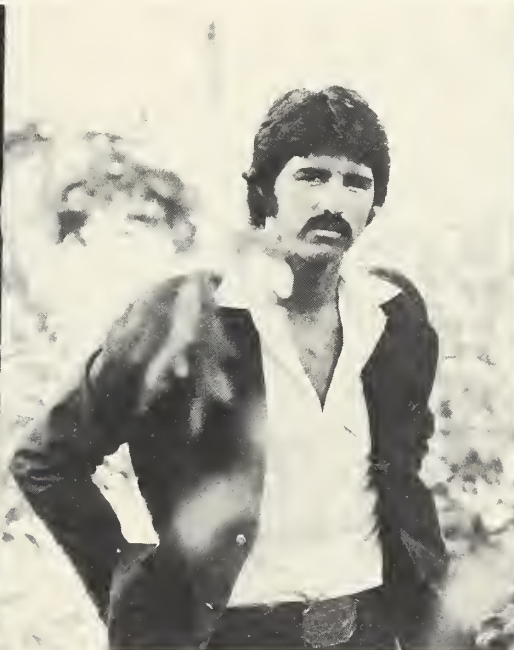
The group called themselves the Gordian Knot. When Jim made up his mind, with the help of his toe, that, he would no longer aspire to be a pro football hero, he went off to score in another field, that of recording and performing. The Gordian Knot was soon thereafter signed to MGM-Verve. They had one album, a segment on a Fred Astaire TV special where they did "Top Hat," some unmemorable singles, some good club dates, and some dives, and that was it. Making it big was something the Knot did not.

There was a short abeyance in Jim's career, but he didn't give up. By now it was clear to him that performing and writing were his life. So he continued to tackle music. It wasn't too long after, that he became a writer for Jim Nabors' publishing firm where he really learned how to concentrate on writing and developing an original style. Jim Weatherly confesses that up until his association with Jim Nabors he had always written songs as a hobby. As a writer for Nabors, he recalls deliberately working hard. He drawled, "If I'm taking a man's money, I've got to do him a day's work."

The guy who had been known to make a touch down in two minutes now

waiting for the next place to happen. Meanwhile, his songs are doing things to people's heads (bald or hirsute) wherever they may be.

Silverstein doesn't believe in reviews on a personal level. He just won't read them. Being fairminded, he feels that if you're going to go up on the highs of favorable press, you also have to sink with slings and arrows of raging fury and discounted from the same quarter. Doesn't believe in the representative form of doing business either. Those who have done Shel's songs have gotten them because Silverstein has visited them with his game himself. Chet Atkins first brought him down to Nashville and showed him around . . . now folks like Loretta Lynn don't regard him as anything but one of the gang down there. If he's freaky, he's also earthy, forthright and personably honest. That cuts a lot of mustard with musicians of all persuasions.

Shel is also of the Harry Nilsson school of the performing arts—he won't, except on record. He's not against a fan club though, should any of our readers be so organizationally inclined. He claims that while he's not complaining about his sex life, to date there is no true example of a Shel Silverstein groupie. Somebody really ought to help him find out. Can't think of anyone who wouldn't be curious to see the result. **robert adels**

learned it didn't take much more time to write good songs. He wrote a song Peggy Lee recorded called "He Used Me" in about ten minutes. On the other hand some songs required as much as a year and a half, like his "Once in a Lifetime Thing." He explains, "I was so in love with the song that I couldn't finish it until I got exactly what I wanted."

Working for Nabors afforded him the opportunity of doing some stand in comedy bits on the Jim Nabors TV Show. In fact his college football coach, Johnny Vaught, might have caught his star player on the tube telling Roy Rogers' "Snake Eyes is Coming." After a two-year tenure with Nabors, Weatherly discovered it was time to scrimmage somewhere else. He remembers there were no immediate openings so he just took it easy for awhile, writing songs and playing football at a Beverly Hills park during the weekends.

It was on a Saturday afternoon throw-the-ball-around that Jim was introduced to one of the team regulars. The player was Gary Usher who played an integral role in helping Weatherly's career. Usher sent him to Larry Gordon, a manager-publisher. It was under Larry's aegis that Nilsson and Paul Williams had made it. Jim played a few songs of his for Larry—"Loving You Is Just an Old Habit" (which turned out to be his first chart record) and "Neither One of Us." It only took a few minutes for Larry to realize how good a talent Weatherly was and for him to come up with a mutually satisfying deal, to hand Jim a pen and to ask him to touch down upon a Keca Music Publishing contract. The deal was consummated and, Weatherly says, "It's fantastic being with someone who knows how to use 150% of his energies. The only thing is he has to believe in it."

No one can undermine Larry's belief in Jim as a writer and performer. He was able to get Weatherly a good recording deal with RCA, he was able to get Gladys Knight to record Jim's "Neither One of Us," and he's been placing other tunes left and right. Bob Luman has a hit country version of "Neither One of Us" and Cissy Houston has just recorded his "Midnight Plane to Houston" for Janus. Cissy's version will be called "A Midnight Train to Georgia." These tunes are all found on Jim's first RCA album, simply called "Weatherly." (He will soon be recording his second LP.)

The next time people fill a stadium to see Jim Weatherly, it will be to hear him sing. **ron baron**

HOLLYWOOD—ALUMNUS OF THE GOLDEN WORLD

If you were a seventeen year old whose rambunctious ways were always suspending you from school, you too might wander deliberately down into a recording studio in Detroit's ghettos and play off that energy with a tamboreen. That's what Mowest's Mike Campbell did to stay out of the nippy weather his school principal would throw him into.

Some precocious youngsters retreat to fantasy worlds to harbor from the sometimes harsh world, but Mike's was "Golden World," a studio where "Agent Double-O Soul" and "Cool Jerk" were recorded. He reverberated the tamboreen on the latter record.) Campbell was truly an integrating factor there since he was practically the only blue-eyed soul to be found anywhere around Golden World. A little time went by, and he was soon promoted from tamboreen and "getting the coffee" to congos and occasional background singing. His next graduation, since this was a kind of school for Mike, earned him a place in a Capitol group called Scorpion, many of whom are now in Dennis Coffey's band. Success was not eminent, and the only sting that Mike and his fellow Scorpions felt was that of those blistering cold nights playing cabarets in Detroit union halls.

Well, that all soon ended with a shiver, and the next thing Mike recollects is being coaxed by his father to audition for the Detroit company of "Hair." He obliged and auditioned along with four thousand other aspirants. His first audition won him a burst of applause and a return call. Finally the cast was selected, and although he had been trying out for the flamboyant part of Burger, he at first only got a part in the chorus. He lost the part of Burger to an outrageous guy who pulled his pants down during the reading.

The important thing was that Mike was in the show. The rigorous choreography, which now appealed to his energies, didn't permit him much time to wallow over not getting the part he wanted. Only three weeks remained until opening, and Mike remembers how strict the choreographer was: "We weren't the June Taylor dancers, in fact we were the remotest thing from them." Campbell found the dance routines to cumbering, so he faked a broken ankle and began limping around. This resourceful thinking excused him from dancing dictation. It also gave him time to study and understand the role of Burger. About a week before opening he performed his interpretation of Burger for the director and was moved into the lead role. The show played in Detroit for seven months during which time Mike was signed to Motown Records. That was three years ago.

Last week his first single, "Angel Got a Book," was released on Mowest. Since he was one of the first white artists signed to the Motown group, he had to wait until the time was right. Rare Earth and R. Dean Taylor harbingered the way for Mike. His record is fabulously orchestrated and should make waiting three years for success just as easy for him as it was to win the role of Burger.

NEW YORK—B. B. KING: A CREATOR OF FIRSTS

B. B. King has finally arrived at the crossroads in his life which entitles him to the status of "super star", but you can rest assured that he had to utilize every means at his disposal, which included endurance, tremendous amounts of energy and, above all, many sacrifices. It would be safe to say that he has been through it all. The point of this article is not to delve into the past history of B. B. King, but to point out the advances that he has helped to establish for Black artists in general. Of course, there are many X-factors involved, but when all the factors are considered and the fame that B. B. King has achieved, one has to sit back and give credit where credit is due. B. B. King has been quoted as saying, "soul is for everyone, I think music has brought the races closer together. I have noticed this in performing in places like Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas, The Fillmore East in New York, The Americana Hotel and the Greek Theatre in Los Angeles." B. B. was one of the first to help break the Black TV barriers with appearances on the Sullivan Show, Johnny Carson's Tonight Show and he has been a welcome and preferred guest on many other major programs. Although his basic roots go and remain in blues he is an artist that transcends the blues. Joining Sidney A. Seidenberg, Inc., in 1968 with Sidney as manager was also another key link in B. B. King's career. Sidney believes in offering all media means to his artists, "No longer can a manager work out of a one-room office in a single dimension, he must create new income and new activities for his clients in multi-media and multi-dimensional directions," says Sidney. These concentrated efforts has helped B. B. King to explore new fields of endeavor. B. B. King was one of the first to work college concerts and he has also been instrumental in attracting a great number of college students into an awareness of blues. He has been giving a series of lectures at several colleges going into the History of Blues. And, what better mentor than B. B. King. He seldom plays at the lectures, although he does demonstrate. B. B. King will also be a main room attraction, co-headlining with Ann Margret at the Hilton Hotel in Las Vegas, opening February 24th for a three-week engagement. In fact, Sidney says B. B. has a 2-year contract at the Hilton. In addition to his full concert and club schedule, Sidney announces that plans are in the works to release the B. B. King lectures in-cassette for future release. And, Playboy Magazine is doing an article in the Feb. issue on the B. B. King benefit prison concerts. B. B. truly has achieved international status as "King Of The Blues". don drossell

Famous Hosts C&W Symposium In NY For WHN 'Transition'

NEW YORK — New York City's first Country Music Symposium, hosted by Famous Music, was held last Tues. (30) in the Gulf & Western building. "The purpose of this symposium," explained Charlie Johnson, director of product planning and development of Famous Music, "was to help WHN make its new transition into country music."

5. The broad scope of the country music market—its appeal to people of all ages, colors and religions in all parts of the country.

6. The ways the different record companies can cooperate with WHN.

7. How country music artists can help to promote the station on and off the air.

Participating in this symposium from Famous Music besides Johnson were: Tony Martell, president; Carmen LaRosa, director of sales; Andy Miele, director of marketing; Larry Baunach, vice president of sales and promo, Dot Records, and Tommy Overstreet, Dot Recording artist whose current hit single is "Heaven Is My Woman's Love."

National country promo directors of the following record companies also participated: Columbia, Gene Ferguson; Epic, Bill Williams; ABC-Dunhill, Tom McEntee, and Monument, Tex Davis.

Participants from WHN were: Bob Russo, assistant program director; Corrine Baldassano, music director and the following three sales account executives: Mel Lerner, Jim McGawn and Jack Murphy.

Johnson concluded by saying that, "Most of the record company representatives flew to New York to attend the symposium from Nashville, which is the current home of country music."

DOTTIE WEST



COCA COLA'S COUNTRY SUNSHINE GIRL—Dottie West is reported to be the first country singer to be heard on a national TV commercial. And when she's singing about "Country Sunshine" she knows what it's all about as she was born on a farm near McMinneville, Tenn. and learned early in life that hard work went a long way toward building character and the winning of success.

In between her work at home, Dottie did her utmost to find odd jobs which gave her the money for music lessons on the side while she was in elementary and high school. The same bits and pieces of work provided the needed cash for the college tuition at Tennessee Tech in Cookeville where she was a music major.

Slowly building an entertainment reputation based on night club work, she eventually joined the music industry in Nashville and signed an exclusive writing contract with Tree Publishing Company. Then she became a regular on the Grand Ole Opry. Everything Dottie aimed for began to fall into place. As a songwriter she began to reap success from her efforts. "Here Comes My Baby" which Dottie recorded as did Perry Como and 51 other artists, brought her a 1964 Grammy for the best female performance of the year. She was the first female artist to ever receive the Grammy Award.

"Here Comes My Baby" has been joined by "Is This Me" and "Didn't I" and "Would You Hold It Against Me" for BMI Awards. Dottie has also written all of the Coke commercials and is co-writer for the "Country Girl".

Being first seems to be Dottie's "thing". On a recent European tour she was the first American artist in any field to appear on Dutch TV before a live audience. Dottie has also been nominated by the Country Music Festival in Great Britain in the top five in two categories, as top female artist of the year and top country entertainer.

Starting the new year as RCA's Artist Of The Month, Dottie's current album is titled "The Best Of Dottie West", with her current hot chart climbing single being "If It's Alright With You" which was produced by RCA Executive producer Jerry Bradley.

tion's subsidiary, Nashville Talent and Booking and will work from the company's offices at 802 18th Avenue South, Nashville.

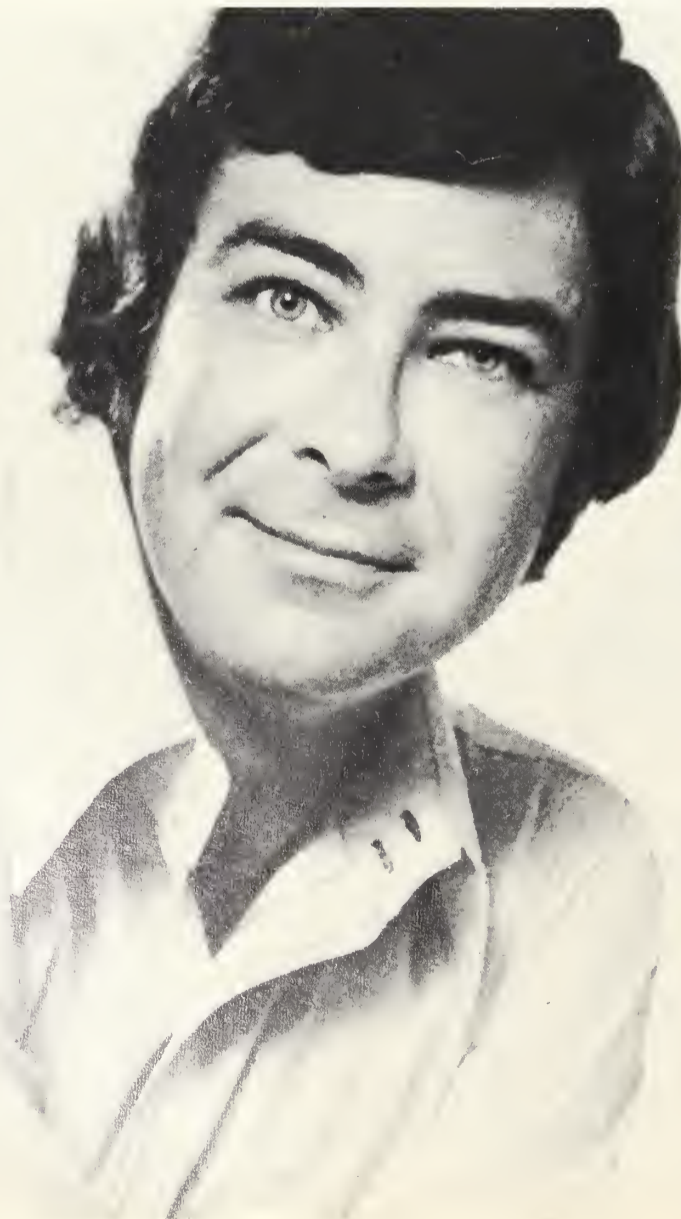

MEL TILLIS AND THE STATESIDERS ON STAGE—Mel Tillis—MGM SE-4889

Recorded live at the Birmingham Municipal Auditorium, this album is a dynamo because you can sense Mel's devotion to the songs and his love of live performances. The medley which have "The Arms Of A Fool", "Glory, Glory Hallelujah" and a few others are nicely blended. The humor and the warmth of this album will, if you aren't already, make a Mel Tillis fan out of you. Some cuts are: "Welcome To My World", "Neon Rose" and "Brand New Mister Me."

CONNY VAN DYKE—Barnaby BR-15005

Conny Van Dyke sings her way into our hearts with this very hearty package. Sounding a little like so many other great country female singers, she does however add her own warmth and charm. Conny's single, "I'll Take The Kids" is included in the album and some other outstanding cuts are, "I Just Don't Feel At Home" (In Your Arms Anymore), "The Cellar Of My Mind", "Whisper My Name".

TRUE TRUE LOVIN'—Ferlin Husky—ABC X-776

Ferlin's initial album offering on ABC has the potential to go all the way. His just released single of the same title as the album is included as the first cut on side 1. Some very good tunes on the album are: "She Cheats On Me", "Legend In My Time", "It Keeps Right On A-Hurtin'" and "My Special Angel". It maybe awhile before it begins to happen, but when it starts it will be big.

BILLY WALKER'S ALL THE GREATEST HITS—Billy Walker—MGM SE-4887

Billy's latest offering is self-explanatory. Although a person may not think that they are all his greatest hits they will however be satisfied cause the package is extremely delightful to listen to over and over again. It should gain immediate attention from programmers and listeners alike thus making the album a sure fire hit. Some offerings are: "Charlie's Shoes", "My Mind Hangs On To You" and eight others.

DO YOU KNOW WHAT IT'S LIKE TO BE LONESOME?—Jerry Wallace—MCA 301

One very interesting aspect of this new Jerry Wallace album is that Wallace has decided to record songs by some of his very favorite writers rather than recording pop or well known country songs. On these selections especially, he excels. All the warmth and sincerity he possesses is beautifully delivered through his interpretations of "Sound Of Goodbye," "Until You," and "Where Did He Come From." All in all, a very warm and honest effort from one of Nashville's best performers.

GREAT HITS FROM 2 DECADES—Tompall & The Glaser Brothers—MGM SE-4888

This great hits album from 2 decades is actually a selection of their best songs that they recorded on MGM since 1966. They do all of the songs exceptionally well but they do stand out superbly on Paul Simon's "Home-ward Bound" and Kris Kristofferson's "Help Me Make It Through The Night". Also included are: "Woman, Woman", "Proud Mary" and seven others.

WHISKEY RIVER/THERE STANDS THE GLASS Johnny Bush—RCA LSP-4817

This package marks Johnny's debut on RCA records. It is evident that it shall not be his last. Some entertainers rely on voice, style, flair or a different presentation but Johnny has them all and he uses them with great success. Some tunes which stood out are, "There Stands The Glass", "Whiskey River", and "This Has Got To Last".

Rice Acquires Bare Masters

NASHVILLE — In a major move to bring Rice Records into national prominence, the label has announced the purchase of all Bobby Bare master recordings that the star performer recorded for Mercury Records. The transaction was handled by E. Jimmy Key, president of Rice, and Irwin Steinburg, president of Mercury. The purchase price was not announced.

The masters include all recordings made by Bobby Bare over the two year span that he was a member of the Mercury roster. Many of the sides have never been previously released. Among Bare's bigger singles included is, "Come Sundown," "Sylvia's Mother," "Don't Tell Me How The Story Ends" and "That's How I Go To Memphis."

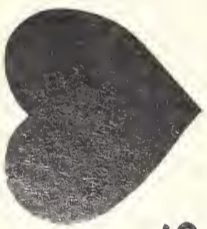
Jean Shepard Inks Contract With UA

Since 1955 Jean Shepard has been a regular cast member of the Grand Ole Opry, where she remains one of it's most popular songstresses.

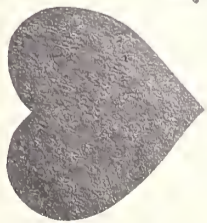

A teary type of a tune it involves a guy who left what he loved to find something better only to come to the full realization that it was a mistake and now he's hoping to find an ash that could rekindle the old feeling. BILL ANDERSON (MCA—40004)

If You Can Live With It (I Can Live Without It) (2:30) (Stallion, BMI—B. Anderson)

Bill's new song deals with a split-up between husband and wife. She has fallen in love with someone new and she wants to know how her husband will take it. As usual Bill's voice and the melody are sure to make this song a standard for his followers, and should demand strong chart and airplay activity. JACK BLANCHARD & MISTY MORGAN (Mega 615-0101)

A Handful Of Dimes (2:28) (Birdwalk, BMI—J. Blanchard)

Jack and Misty, a smooth vocal "marriage", team up for what will surely arrive on the country scene as a definite hit. This tune about a telephone call should bring in much more than a "Handful Of Dimes" for this fine duet. If by any chance it does criss-cross to MOR it can surely be a hit there also. LIZ ANDERSON (Epic 5-10952)

Time To Love Again (2:10) (Duchess, BMI—H. Cornelius)

A fantastic country rocker with a contagious beat. Liz's dynamic vocals and the toe-tapping music are sure to make this a big hit not only on the country scene but also possibly in the MOR/pop arena. 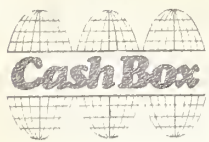

Bob Montgomery, who joined Chappell Music in May 1972 has been appointed managing director of Chappell & Company as from January 15th 1973. The appointment was announced by Georges Mayerstein-Maigret, president of Polygram Publishing and Steve Gottlieb, chairman of Polygram Leisure Ltd.

Respected musician and former Cream Drummer Ginger Baker, whose new studio complex and record company in Lagos, Nigeria officially started business on January 20th, has signed a world wide pressing and distributing deal with Island Records excluding Nigeria. The studio and label are both called ARC (Associated Record Company) and the directors are Baker, Bayo Akiyinsola and Torche Taïre. The studio, which was designed by Sandy Brown and built by Dick Sweetenham of Helois, is said to be on a par with European complexes, and it is hoped that European clients will be attracted there, Osibisa having already utilized the facilities. Baker, not only a legendary drummer, is also an expert on African music, having studied it for many years. Along with Tony Palmer he has made a BBC television special on African music. First releases on the label will be out next spring. Commenting on the scheme Baker said, "The idea is to encourage and publicize Nigerian music and musicians and to provide an opportunity for them to reach a wider audience than that of West Africa alone, much in the same way as Chris Blackwell (Island head) introduced Jamaican Music to Britain". ARC are to have a London office, which will be managed by Ian Farrell. Island will press product for the Nigerian market in Britain, and has an option to release the material in all remaining territories excluding Africa.

Gaff Management, managers of Rod Stewart & the Faces, are launching their own record company to be known as GM Records. The label, officially launched at MIDEM, is headed by Brian Hutch, formerly label manager for Warner/Reprise. Prior to that he was director of public relations at Kinney (WEA). First releases on the label will be in late March to early April, and they include an album by Chris Jagger, Mick Jagger's brother. Pressing and distributing deals are currently under negotiation, an announcement is expected soon. Also further executive positions are to be announced soon too.

Another new label launched this week is Matrix Records, who make their debut with an album titled "Magical Love" by a German rock band Saturnalia. The label is headed by former Curved Air manager Mark Hanua. Also, within the company a

Kruger has also arranged British tours for Glenn Campbell and Anne Murray commencing April 19th. Ember are also to link together two films "Togetherness" starring George Hamilton and Peter Lawford and the western "The Gattling Gun" starring Guy Stockwell, to be screened throughout the country. Kruger's visit to the States immediately follows his visit to the MIDEM festival.

The New Theater at Oxford is to have their third "music week" commencing February 18th thru 22nd. John Burrows, head of Howard & Wyndhams concert department, the bookers, said that they were surprised at the success of booking the New Theater and added, "We have already over 20 concerts lined up for the New Theater in spring and summer, and we are planning to do more in autumn including another "international music week". Acts booked for the event are Jack Jones, Tony Bennett, two leading English rock bands Genesis and Strawbs, Scottish folk group The Corries and Roy Harper.

Canada

Columbia making a lot of noise with their latest domestic productions. Roverson's "Clear Night", culled as a single from their album, has gained a foothold in several major markets. The group is fronted by pretty Frankie Hart, who also plays piano and acoustic guitar. Other members are: Rayburn Blake, who penned much of the material on the set, Brian Edwards and latest addition, drummer Graham Lear. Patsy Gallant has bounced back on the scene with her single release of "I Don't Know Why". Columbia pulled a switch from the usual and brought U.S. group, Space Opera into Canadian studios (Manta) and, under the production guidance of the label's A&R chief, John Williams, taped an album, released under their own name. A single follow-up, "Country Max", has now been released. On the country side, Columbia looks good with Dick Damron's "Going Home To The Country", "Lonely Woman" by Diane Merritt, Orval Prophet's "Judgement Day Express", and "Old Ira Gray" by Dallas Harms.

A&M's latest Sound 80 album, "The Beginning", was given a red carpeted sendoff in Winnipeg with one of the best press receptions seen in the city for some time. A&M's national sales chief, Joe Summers hosted the affair at the North Star Inn with producer Bob Burns taking the bows along with his arrangers, Bob McMullin and Neil Harris. Due to prior commitments, the Mayor of Winnipeg, S. Juba and the Premier of the Province, Ed Shreyer, were unable to attend but they sent telegrams of congratulations to be opened and read during the reception.

The Stampeders recently added a first for a Canadian group to their credit with the awarding by the United Nations of a Gold Record for the group's royalty-free contribution of "Sweet City Woman" to the "Top Star Festival" album. Much credit for the group's success must go to their manager, Mel Shaw. He took advantage of the Maple Music Junket door opener and was the first Canadian group to hit the circuit in Europe. The press they received plus the return engagements and their re-

ceiving the coveted Edison Award promptly gained them the tag of "Canada's most important rock group". Both their albums, "Against The Grain" and "Carryin' On" were certified Canadian Gold as was their international single, "Sweet City Woman". Their label, Music World Creations, and distributing label, Quality, have repackaged "Carryin' On" to be released as "A Double Collection of Stampeders". They are currently represented on the charts with "Johnny Lightning" and the solo single by Rich Dodson, "Get Up Julia".

Latest Golden Oldie hustler to move into the Canadian market is Ronco Teleproducts, headed up by Australian Frank Sears. Their first set, carrying a suggested list of \$7.88 has made an impressive showing across Canada. Sears is just as interested in the small retailer as he is the large chains and rackers, which would appear to be the success of this Chicago-based firm. The Ronco firm is now officed in Toronto with distributors across Canada and a giant warehouse in Toronto. Some of the oldies included on the first set are: "Twist and Shout"/Isley Brothers, "Rock Around The Clock"/Bill Haley, "Earth Angel"/Penguins, "Louie Louie"/The Kingsmen and many others.

WEA have a Canadian content single with the single release of "Hello Hurray" by Alice Cooper. The music and lyrics were written by Rolf Kempf, whose worldwide rights are held by Warner-Tamerlane Publishing Corporation.

Newest promotion face on the scene is Jeff Burns, who takes over as Ontario Promotion manager for MCA Canada. Scott Richards, himself just recently appointed national sales manager for the label, picked Harris out of several applicants. Harris was former assistant manager for A&A's recently opened Montreal store.

RCA did a big promo number on George Hamilton IV's "Out West Country", which contains all Canadian compositions. Most requested is "Dirty Old Man" written by Bob Ruzicka, perhaps Hamilton's next single.

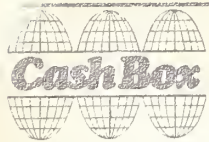

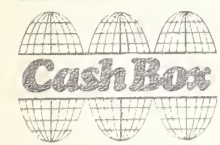

New Wms. Flipper Intro's Timer To Pinball Business



Wms. TRAVEL TIME 1PI

CHICAGO — An innovation in flipper game play is at hand and the bow goes to Williams Electronics, Inc. for its new "Travel Time" single-player which literally operates on time rather than on a 3 or 5 ball limit.

The game, according to Williams' sales manager Bill DeSelm, offers 45 "units of time", or approximately 45 seconds of play with an unlimited number of balls that can be launched during that period. (The number of time units is adjustable by the operator). Each player can extend his time, however, as the game offers a wide variety of ways to gain additional time units, as well as a way to "stop the clock."

For example, the player can add ten units with a skill shot through the top rollover. Also, by striking a combination of targets, the player can light up the word "Travel" in the backbox, then hit the bottom shooter to gain 25 units and 5000 points. Likewise, if the player lights the word Time, he gains the same time and scores extras.

The player knows exactly how much time he has left via the time mechanism simulator depicted dead center on the playfield. High scores, of course, can gain additional replay, or an extended play, depending upon the operator's needs.

A truly fascinating thing happens at games end when time has run out and a ball is still in play. Should the player be skillful enough to hit targets that add time, he continues. Of course, if he doesn't, he's out.

"This is not just another flipper but a whole new ball game," DeSelm declared. "They'll be playing against time, trying to add extra seconds while shooting up the score. Certain to command super maximum play at any flipper location."

DeSelm also advised that Williams recommends 2-25c play pricing on Travel Time. He also revealed that an income totalizer kit is available with the item.

Operators can inspect the new Travel Time at their nearest Williams distributor.

EDITORIAL:

Thanks to the success of MOA's first series of business seminars for operators (held in Notre Dame, New York City and Las Vegas during early 1972), the association has decided to continue the program. Not to beat an old cliché to death, but the seminar is literally a once-a-year golden opportunity. Anyone (and we mean anyone) who participated last year, can vouch for that. On that subject, we expect many "graduates" to be coming back.

The gist of the seminar is not so much that university instructors try to tell you how better to run your business, but really how other industries run theirs, point up the similarities and then draw the obvious conclusions. Sure, the workshops sessions provide a fine forum for the exchange of problems and possibilities to boost income on the route; but it's listening to the wisdom of the instructors who know the new and sophisticated ideas other industries use to get ahead . . . and which can help the juke and games operator to get ahead . . . that really makes the weekend invaluable.

If you're an MOA member and receive a registration blank in the mail over the next couple of weeks, fill it out immediately and make plans to get to Notre Dame this April . . . that is, if you want to get ahead.

Registration Open For MOA's Second Annual Seminar

CHICAGO — The Second Annual MOA Operator Seminar will be held at Notre Dame University (South Bend, Ind.) April 13-14. The two day program, so successful last year in its initial running, will again be coordinated by Dr. Gerry Sequin, assisted by veterans of last year's seminars Dr. Sal Bella and Dr. John Malone. A new addition to the seminar faculty this year will be Dr. William Sexton who will hold forth on human relations and motivation.

"Bill is new to MOA but he is an old hand in the executive development field," said MOA president Harlan Wingrave last week. "His experience in business and his research activity give him an outstanding background for his discussion."

As last year, the two days will be divided into lectures in the morning, followed by workshops in the afternoon. The program will cover the following: "New Perspectives on Operator Economics", "Making and Implementing Personnel Decisions" and "Communications: A Key to More Profitable Business Relations." Classes will be held in Notre Dame's Center for Continuing Education; lodgings, meals and social activities will be accommodated at the Morris Inn.

Registration fee (which covers seminars, materials and most meals) is \$70.00. Registration is limited to 75 persons. Deadline is April 9th, and MOA executive vice president Fred Granger will shortly be issuing registration forms, via the mails, to members. Housing reservations will be made by writing directly to the Morris Inn (deadline here is March 29th).

Granger expects a heavy return of registrations to arrive at the MOA Chicago office within days after operators receive their mailings. Last year's seminar program was staged in three different cities (South Bend, New York and Las Vegas) and with only one larger meeting slated for 1973, he's sure many late registrants will have to be turned down due to an early "full house." It's first come, first served!

Vending Exports Continue Healthy

CHICAGO — Export of vending machines from the United States remained at a high level between 1968 and 1970, accounting for nearly half of all countries' shipments, but several European countries registered gains, according to a compilation by N A M A from government data.

U. S. exports in 1970 totaled \$19,782,000 for a world market share of 39.5 per cent, a substantial increase from 1965, but lower than the all-time high of 1968, according to Joann M. James, N A M A market research supervisor.

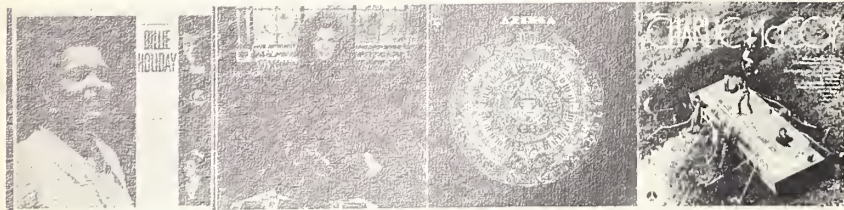
Market share for U. S. companies was 49.5 per cent in 1968, when shipments were valued at \$20,134,000. Increases during the 1965-1970 period were registered by Italy (from 4.4

per cent to 9.9 per cent), by Denmark (6.1 per cent to 7.2 per cent) and by the United Kingdom (3.9 per cent to 5.6 per cent).

Denmark ranked as the top exporter of equipment to the United States followed closely by Japan and Canada. Vending machine imports to the United States from other countries were minimal throughout the period, compared to U. S. exports, however, totaling only \$2,706,000 in 1970, compared with U. S. export totals of \$19,782,000.

The N A M A report also lists 1972 exports through September, 1972. Canada continues as the largest market for U. S.-made vending machines with a total of \$4,048,111, followed by Japan and West Germany.

Vernon L. Jeffries, executive director of Delphi, stated: "From the pinball tournament we were able to bring together a cross section of the community in close cooperation toward the same goal. We were able to reach thousands of individuals and bring to their attention the drug problem. Such publicity efforts made possible by the news media, playing the tournament story heavily, made the contributions possible."

John Bilotta and Herb Gross (Nice Day Productions) said they have received requests from other operations for information on their tournament program.

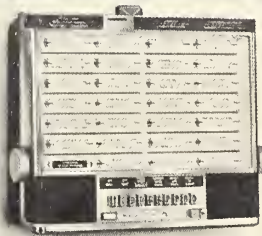

Guys on the Island, in Jersey and Westchester got between 6" and 9". . . . Ben Chicofsky of MONY advising of upcoming association meeting. . . . Al Simon and staff due back from London business meet. . . . Charles Steindecker of the Charles Raymond Co. back from the A.T.E. in London where he joined Rene Pierre at their rather large display booth showing the latter's line of coin-op products (including the popular table soccer machines).

FROM JERSEY—Artie Daddis (United Billiards) shipped initial samples of his new 'Ice Hockey' game to distributors last week; will continue supplying his dealers "ad infinitum," he says. "This is the only hockey game today that does not have an air cushion attachment and is just as fast," Art stated. "May I add that as a result, it's more realistically priced," Daddis declared. . . . The board of directors of Coffee-Mat Corp. has increased the dividend for the current quarter to 12¢ per common share, in view of a 30% increase in earnings for the quarter which ended Dec. 31st. The disbursement is payable Feb. 27th to shareholders of record Feb. 13, 1973. (Coffee-Mat's dividend paid in the previous quarter on Nov. 17th was at the rate of 9¢ per common share).

FROM PHILLY—Al and Marc Rodstein delighted that so many applications have come into their office from operators registering location customers for the grand Feb. 25th 'Brunswick Air Hockey Tournament'. The Rodsteins also remind their Air Hockey customers that deadline for registering players is April 12th and that only the first 96 will be accepted. VENDING NEWS—Soft drinks have edged out coffee as America's favorite beverage, according to a recent report. Per capita consumption of soft drinks reached 34.8 gallons last year, placing them one-tenth of a gallon ahead of coffee. Milk is the third most popular drink at 24.9 gallons per capita. Beer is fourth at 19.1 gallons, followed by tea (7.2 gallons) and juices (5.0 gallons). Distilled spirits (1.9 gallons) and wine (1.5 gallons) complete the list. Not included in the list are water and other beverages which total over 53.4 gallons. . . . Unit sales of cigarettes rose 3.1% in 1972, according to the annual market report. Highlights of the report: Total domestic consumption hit 554.2 billion units; Philip Morris, Inc., outpaced the industry's gain with a 13.7 increase, and so did Brown & Williamson, with a unit gain of 5.6%; B & W's Kool king edged close to 2nd ranked Pall Mall non-filter; two of P.M.'s Marlboro types showed sales leaps, and industry wide, 100 mm cigarettes now account for 21% of the total and estimates indicate their share to reach 30 percent by the end of the 70's. . . . Teenagers concerned that consumption of chocolate is a cause of acne can rest easy, as a result of a study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. The study analyzed the effects of chocolate on 65 subjects and determined that no relationship between chocolate and acne could be found. As part of the investigation, many of the subjects were given ten times amount of chocolate contained in a typical candy bar.

UPSTATE HAPPENINGS—Johnny Bilotta into New York City Sunday evening last for the New York Baseball Writers dinner at the Americana. Following day he attended services at the Marble Collegiate Church to hear Dr. Norman Vincent Peal's sermon entitled 'You Can Handle Any Problem' and was suitably impressed. Johnny also very interested these days in the career of a new and budding singer name of Fortunato (Russo) shown right. The lad was born in Naples 21 years ago and according to Johnny, also born with the voice of a Caruso. Fortunato is performing up Johnny's way at the Starlite in Auburn, N.Y. Then it's into the Regency Room in Syracuse beginning Feb. 15th.



SUNSHINE STATEMENTS

The FAMA Board of Directors held their quarterly meeting on Sunday, January 28 at 1:00 pm at the Hawaiian Village, North Dale Mabry, Tampa. House Bill 4465 concerning occupational license tax was discussed in full depth. This bill could save ALL members a considerable sum on their occupational licenses from municipalities where they do not maintain offices. Also discussed was the sales tax on cigarettes which many of our vendors are being audited for at the present time. . . . Indications are that defective records and records that are too long will be among the continuing concerns during 1973. Other programming trends include the widening popularity of country and soul music and the success of programming oldies. In the games industry, it looks like the "dart games" will continue to be the big thing with the national average of collections for operations being over \$40 gross per week. The big factor in the cigarette sales outlook is the growth in the 25-to-44 age bracket which accounts for the bulk of cigarette consumption. The one dark cloud on the cigarette sales horizon, experts say, is the pressure for continued increase in cigarette prices which have been rising fast, due mainly to a staggering tax burden. The average tax on a pack of cigarettes has shot from 5.6¢ in 1964 to 12.5¢ this year. . . . Since November 1966, the amendments to the Self-Employed Individuals Tax Retirement Act of 1962 help owners-managers of small business in getting ready for their retirement. The amendment increased the amount of allowable income tax deduction to self-employed persons who set up retirement programs for themselves and their employees. According to Small Marketers Aid #131, published by the Small Business Administration, an owner-employer must meet certain requirements when he sets up the program. FAMA members are urged to learn about the rules; a free copy of the publication is available at any field office of SBA, or write to the Small Business Administration, Washington, D. C. 20416, requesting Small Marketers Aid #131. . . . The MOA Board of Directors will hold their annual Mid-year meeting at the Americana at Bal Harbour on March 22, 23, 24.
