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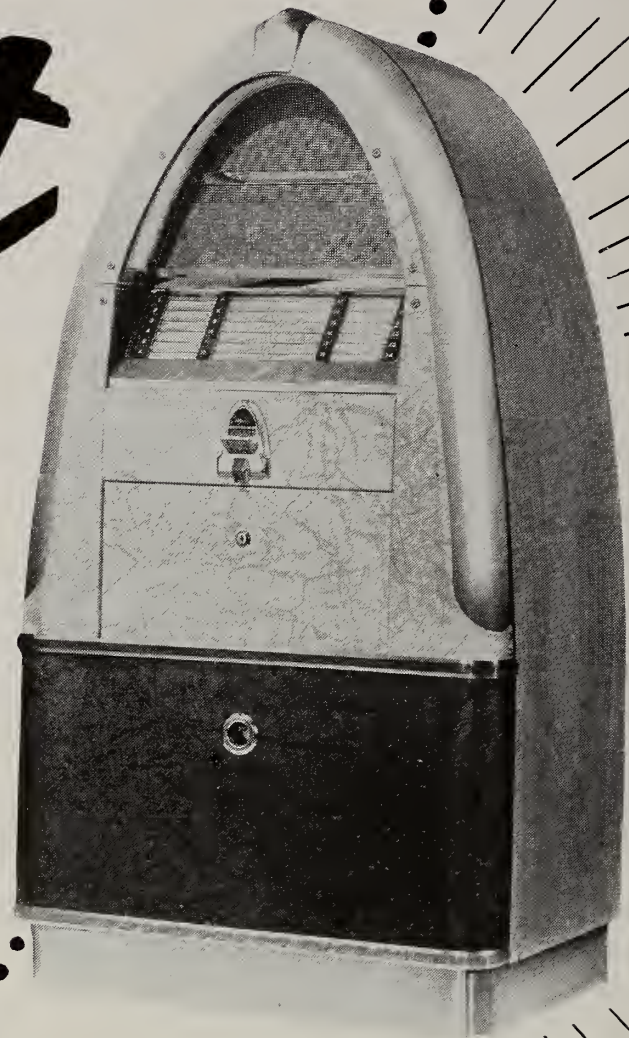

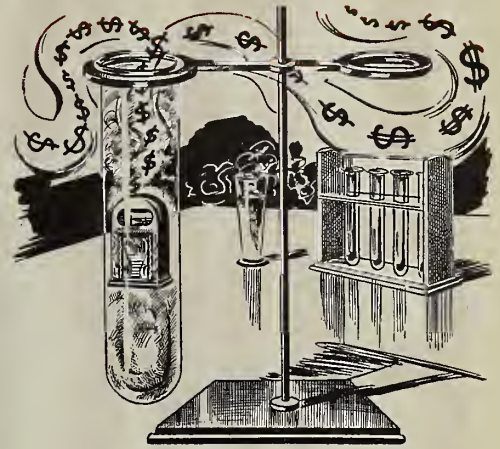

## Talking It Over



The "Volume Play Plan" for juke boxes is definitely past the "test-tube" stage. The time is now at hand when the average juke box operator must decide for himself whether he does, or does not, want to increase his earnings by using every possible means of exploitation at his disposal. Leading juke box ops agree that the "Volume Play Plan" is most meritorious of all plans which have been presented.

The "bargain" feature of the "Volume Play Plan," offering 6 plays for 25c, not only meets with what the public demands of the entertainment world today, but, it opens the way for the automatic phono operators to definitely increase earnings while, at the same time, giving the public just what it wants.

The record manufacturers are producing more and still more two minute recordings, in keeping with the suggestion made by *The Cash Box* sometime ago. This publication pointed out, during its campaign urging the cutting of two minute disks, that these meant 50 per cent more income to the juke box operator. In short, during peak play hours his machines could handle 30 two minute disks for a total of \$1.50 per hour, where formerly they could only handle 20 three minute platters at only \$1 per hour revenue.

Now that the record manufacturers have started to come thru with two minute records this, too, adds up to the appeal of the "Volume Play Plan." It means that the average juke box operator can sell the 6 disks for 25c in much faster time than he formerly sold four of the three minute recordings.

At the same time, and as all juke box operators know, the "overplay" which results from 25c phono action, also cuts down playing time. In short, player following player, depositing quarters, to take advantage of the six play bargain will, in almost every case, duplicate two, three and even four of the same tunes, the tunes most popular at the moment and, thereby, cut playing time down to a low point so that the operator enjoys greater profit.

Manufacturers, distributors and leading juke box operators all agree that the "Volume Play Plan"—the 6 plays for 25c—is one of the best merchandising plans the trade can use at this time to increase interest in the juke box and to also increase earnings.

The "test-tube" period is over.

● The three charming Dinning Sisters, Ginger, Jean and Jayne, come thru with a brand new hunk of wax that's got lots of "c-o-i-n" pressed into it, as they get together and in perfect harmony give out with "Makin' Love Mountain Style," from the MGM pic, "Merry-Go-Round," with the Art Van Damme Quintet to give them beautiful backing. Tho it's done in "folk-tune" style, it's got enough "pop" in it to make it one of the best sides the three charming gals have cut in many a moon. On the flip, "You're A Character, Dear," from the gals' grand album, they again "sell" a number that will bring lots of nickels into juke boxes. This is one platter you can order. It's good.

"You Call Everybody Darling" (2:27)

"Turkish Delight" (2:40)

VARSITY ORCH.  
(Varsity 103)

● Another platter featuring one of the nation's most popular tunes, "You Call Everybody Darling," presents Frank and The Boys warbling the lyrics to the backgrounding of the Varsity Orchestra. It's a good side of wax that has lots of moolah slapped all over it. On the flip, "Turkish Delight," with vocalizing by Frank and the chorus, and the Varsity Orchestra once again to the front to handle the instrumental, here is a disk that has that beat many like. All in all, a very fine platter.

"Floatin'" (2:58)

"A Woman Always Understands"  
(3:15)

LES BROWN ORCH.  
(Columbia 38292)

● This platter opens with an instrumental deck which shows off the talents of Les Brown and his ork. Maestro Brown has always captured plenty of fans among the younger set with his grand instrumentals and this is one more time when he's sure to win their approval and, without doubt, gain many more followers. He sells the song right over the top. His fingering of the 88's and the way the rest of the crew bring in the beat, makes for grand wax. On the flip, "A Woman Always Understands," Maestro Brown beautifully backgrounds his thrush, Eileen Wilson, in slow, romantic and sentimental style to make this side one of those swooning hunks of wax for the dim lit spots where the romantic couples like to gather 'round. It's a good platter and sure to go in many a spot.

"S Wonderful" (2:30)

He's like money in the bank for juke box ops everywhere. On the flip, "Ida I Do," Bingo once again cuts shellac with rhythm and beat, tho in slower tempo, that has all the action and all the vocal any op could ever ask for. Just grab a boxful and spread 'em around.

The gal sings her way right into the hearts of the listeners while Maestro Carle and his ork background her beautifully and, at the same time, featuring Frankie's grand fingering of the 88's. It's wax that has every sign of big success written all over it. On the flip, "A New Kind Of Song," Maestro Carle once again cuts a side of wax that's gonna be heard for months to come. It's got just about everything anyone can ask from a disk. In slow, romantic and sentimental tempo, Nan Wright spoons the lyrics to all those couples who have the lovelight in their eyes, and with Maestro Carle's gorgeous piano artistry to back her, while the ork do a grand job of supporting the chirp, the side proves itself one of the best yet heard. The gals and Bing do one of their very best vocalizing jobs here. On the flip, "A Hundred And Sixty Acres," continues the western tang of the topside with the gals and Bing. It's grand wax, and it's got plenty of nickels, dimes and quarters pressed right into it. Grab yourself a boxful and spread 'em around your spots—they'll bring in the moolah.

The guy knows how to handle wax to the public's delight. Sammy Fidler and his ork must be given a big hand for the way he handles the backgrounding to Amsterdam's warbling of the novel lyrics. On the backing, "Little Darlin'," Morey takes off on a parody of the folk tunes that makes this side sparkle. Actually the title is, "I'm Sick And Tired Of You Little Darlin'," which gives you some idea of what the wax is all about. So just listen in to Morey Amsterdam doing two grand sides of shellac that have every possibility of catching many a laugh wherever they're placed.



# Diskers Amazed At Peak Record Sales—Many Fall Behind In Production

NEW YORK—The recent upsurge in disk sales during the past two weeks caught the bulk of the nation's diskers, currently riding with hit recordings, short this past week, with the net result that many for the first time this season were lagging in production schedules.

Major diskeries have added a great number of pressing personnel it was learned this past week. It was also reported that factories which had been closed by Columbia and Decca Records might be reopened shortly to handle the unusually large amount of platter sales.

Capitol Records prexy Glenn E. Wallichs disclosed that the firm at present has ten records selling in the hit category.

"In order to keep Capitol dealers supplied with these top selling items, we have already made some additional production adjustments," Wallichs explained. "Our release schedule has been moved back one full week to permit factory production for an entire week on hit records."

"In addition we are working two full shifts and overtime on Saturdays. A large amount of production is also being subcontracted to other pressing plants, with Capitol quality control engineers supervising the work."

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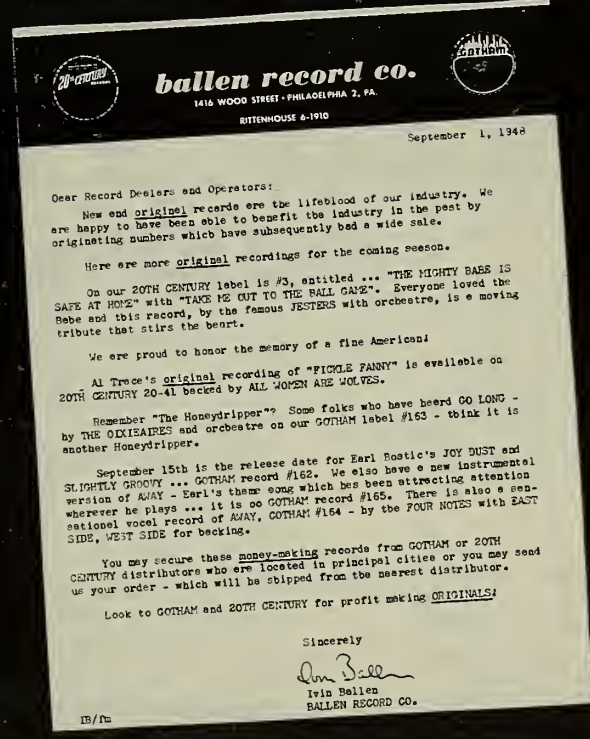

● Barbara Brown proves herself among the top thrush ranks with her vocal on the well known topside of this platter, "A Tree In The Meadow." Spoons the lyrics in slow, soft, sentimental tempo and gets grand backing from the Jimmy Valentine ork to turn the side into a very fine hunk of shellac. There's no doubt that many an op is going for this one. On the flip, "Blue Bird Of Happiness," an oldie that's clicking about the countryside, Jimmy Valentine with his Quintet, backed by the orchestra, again produce a neat side of wax. For this platter, we choose Barbara Brown and the topside. Listen in and decide for yourself.

"Family Polka" (2:54)

"Surefire Polka" (2:43)

MILTON G. OLEKSON

● Want the real, old fashioned kind of polkas accepted as the "McCoy" in all the spots where the people who know polkas gather 'round? Then latch onto this biscuit, brother, for this is what they ask for. Milton Olekson and his ork simply tear the old timer's idea of the polka to little bits with, "Family Polka," and Milton adds plenty of zest, actually talking right out of the wax to the listeners to come on in and dance to the tune. He calls, "Hey, Mike," "Hey, Joe," "Hey, John," and adds a bit of lyric to the name that's bound to get many a polka lover up from his chair and whirling about the floor. It's a great hunk of wax for the real polka spots where the people know their polkas. On the flip, "Surefire Polka," Milton and his crew once again tear into polka time and, in between the instrumental, give it that come-on shouting that's bound to get 'em spinning around. This is a lively biscuit with plenty on the ball. A surefire moneymaker if you've got the spots where the foreign element gather 'round and like polkas as is polkas.

"Willow Weep For Me" (3:07)

● Here's that "Progressive Jazz" you want and that is makin' the kids sit up and shout all over the nation as Stan Kenton and his ork play concert after concert. But, starting off this disk is one of Stan's oldies, "Willow Weep For Me," with thrush June Christie to spoon the lyrics in romantic mood which is sure to grab coin in many and many a spot. June does a grand job and Maestro Kenton's backgrounding is about all that anyone can ask for for any hunk of wax. On the flip, with Jack Costanzo to do the bongo solo, Kenton cuts loose with a speedy spinning disk to sell "Bongo Riff" right down the line. A surefire side of shellac for junior and his pals and one that's going to get lots of play 'round the schools as the Fall term opens. It's the Kenton wax that there's been so much talk about. Latch on if you've got the spots.

With Don Rodney to warble the lyrics, and with Maestro Lombardo backgrounding him in smooth, soft, romantic tempo, the side turns into

one of the very best Lombardo has yet turned out for the nation's juke boxes. Here's wax that's simply bound to go over in location after location. It's grand. On the backing, "The Moon Is Back In Business," Maestro Guy Lombardo again puts his Royal Canadians thru the paces to produce a side of restful, relaxing, romantic wax that will click with couples from sixteen to sixty anywhere. Here's wax that has every possibility of pleasing the customers clear 'cross the country. Latch on. This is a moneymaker.

It's a tune that has "tear jerker" written all over it, but, with a glass of beer, a romantic partner and a soft lit spot for props, this side of shellac can bring in the moolah. an organ instrumental that has lots of lilt and melody. It's a good side for the locations that like organ music. All in all, the total spells good wax.

● With the demand for spirituals growing greater every day, The Bright Lights, a beautifully harmonious sextette, enter into the picture, and hit the top with their very first recording for Apollo. Here's a disk that's sure to click in every spot in the land. Beautiful harmony, grand lyrics, gorgeous beat and lilting melody carried

thruout the platter by these six boys who are aces in their chosen field. The topside, "I Just Rose To Tell You," is one of the finest spirituals ever cut. The lilting harmony, with a grand beat carried thruout, is going to click with listeners. On the flip, "Let Us Cheer The Weary Traveler," the boys once again knit together a tune and send it right over the line. If this is any indication of the type of platters these boys are going to cut from now on in, then Apollo has one of the greatest combinations yet put together. This is wax that has moneymaking dynamite pressed right into either side, and whatever side is favored by the juke box operator, it's going to win lots of acclaim. Grab a boxful and spread 'em around. This is wax as is wax, with "moneymaker" written all over it.

It's a side that's gonna please every Louis Jordan fan everywhere in the wide, wide world. On the flip, "We Can't Agree," Louis goes blue and gone, dippin' deep into the beat and liftin' the melody and the lyrics right to the top to sell the side for all it's worth. Latch on to this platter.

This is wax you can bank on.

It's lowdown and blue singin' with piano, guitar and drums to back him up that makes for a disk loaded with moneymakin' possibilities.

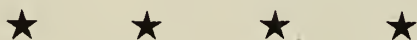

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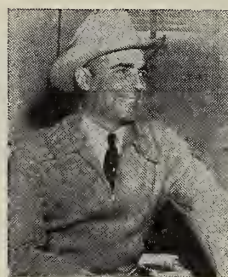

● With Bob Wills to do the warbling and with the hot strong band of his Texas Playboys to back-ground him, "Never No More Hard Time Blues," turns out to be one of the best of the tunes heard in many a moon. Here's beat and rhythm, grand vocal and great lyr-

ics, all in medium fast tempo with a nice dash of Bob's yodeling thrown in for flavor to add up into a side of shellac that's sure to cull coin on many a location. Bob just simply lets go on this topside of the disk and his blues singin' is going to capture nickel after nickel. It's a "Bull's Eye" if there ever was one. On the flip, "Maiden's Prayer," Bob Wills and His Texas Playboys go into some of that old time playing that's so well liked by the old timers. It's real old time to the point of nostalgia. An instrumental that's bound to click with even the newer generation and will, most certainly, go over big with the old timers. ● Andy Parker really shines right out of this side of wax, "She's So Fragile." The instrumental background of the Plainsman plus Andy's grand warbling adds up to "moneymaker." On the flip, "A Lie Can't Mend A Broken Heart," Andy goes into slow tempo to again turn out wax that'll have 'em applauding. Latch onto this disk.

"She's Got The Cutest Eyes" (2:30)

● Two boys you can absolutely depend on at all times to produce grand wax. Once again Karl and Harty cut two sides that are gonna please their fans. In lively tempo, with guitar and mandolin background, the boys tell all about the fact, "She's Got The Cutest Eyes," and sell the song to a fare-thee-well. On the backing, "Single Man Blues," they'll convince all listeners that it's best to get a wife. Here the boys go into slower tempo and work as a duet. Latch on.

It's good wax. Just listen in.

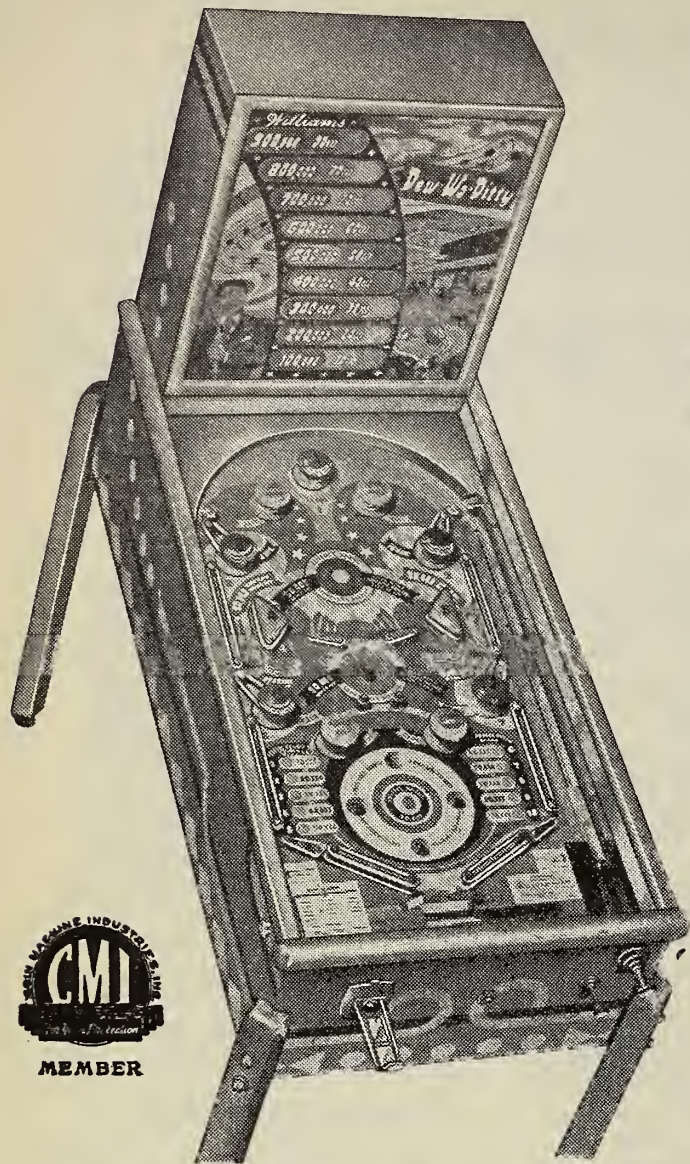

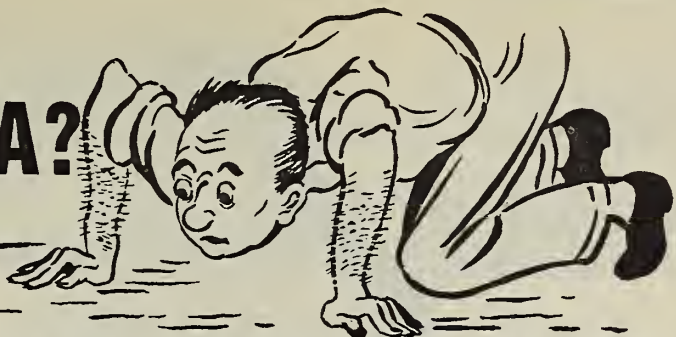

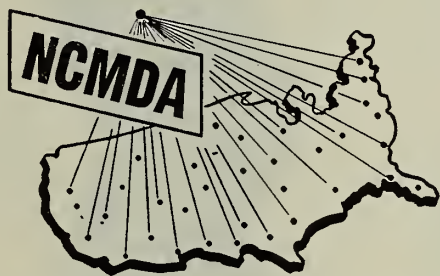

## "Yes—No Bumpers"— Genco Brings Out "Screw Ball"

CHICAGO—Probably one of the most outstanding teaser advertising campaigns to appear this year was Genco's "Yes—No Bumpers" which was noted for the first time in the August 28, 1948 issue of *The Cash Box*.

According to officials at the Genco plant, inquiries have been received from all over the country asking, "What kind of a game have you got that has no bumpers?"

This has inspired many imaginative ideas, according to Genco execs, with some of those who phoned asking, "Is the playing board all empty with just rollover buttons featured?"

Others were inspired to visualize various types of five-ball machines with nothing on the board.

The truth of the matter, as released by Genco this past week, is that the game features the new rubber bands which were first seen on "Merry Widow" at the top of the "Merry Widow" game.

There are ten of these on the board and they act with the same sharp action as do bumpers. The player can light up these ten with five balls and, after he gets number seven, he starts accumulating free plays. Seven starts him off and when he reaches ten he has been awarded ten free plays for his skill.

But, to add even greater thrill to the game, Genco reports, they have also placed a skill hole in the center of the board, featuring a kicker which kicks the ball into this hole, and which counts for an additional ten free plays,

after the ten have been lit.

The live action of the rubber bands can also kick the ball into this hole and also bring up the number of free plays. In short, with just one ball, if the player is sufficiently skillful, he can hit all ten bands and also get into the skill hole in the center of the board and, perhaps, have the kicker continue to kick the ball into this hole time after time running up an amazing score.

Other features of the game are just as interesting. And because the game has this screwy ball action, the Genco execs decided to name it, "Screw Ball," Certainly a fitting name and certainly one that will bring much attention to the game from all players.

Tests of the game conducted in one city, Trenton, N. J., to be specific, have proved "Screw Ball" one of the greatest five ball free play games ever yet presented. The Pearl brothers, owners of the game here claim, "This is the greatest moneymaking five-ball free play game we've ever yet operated."

Result of all this has been to jam the Genco plant with more orders for "Screw Ball" than for any game ever previously presented.

As one official stated, "We're working harder trying to just take care of the initial orders than we ever worked before on any other game we presented this year. If these advance orders are any indication at all," he continued, "our new game, 'Screw Ball,' is going to prove itself the biggest hit ever yet produced."

## Telequiz Corp. To Get Going On Big Production

CHICAGO—Joe Beck, Telequiz Corporation, this city, reports that their brain tester quizz game will soon be coming off the production line in good quantities.

Up to this time, Beck has been active in arranging for top distributors in various parts of the country. These distributors have had several quizz games on hand for some weeks, testing its earning power and mechanical stability.

"We've known for a long time that we've had a real money-making machine" stated Beck. "Now that we've had reports from all over the country, all indicating that the machine has a tremendous public appeal, and brings in big collections, we're all set for a big, steady production at the factory. In addition, our distributors tell us that the machine works perfectly mechanically. As a matter of fact, these distributors are calling us continually for more and more equipment."

Distributors who have been operating the quizz machines are Scott-Crosse of Philadelphia, Pa.; The Markepp Company, Cleveland, Ohio; Buck Lambert, Alliance, Neb.; Supreme Distributors, Inc., Miami, Fla.; and Runyon Sales Company, Newark, N. J. Willie Blatt and "Doc" Eaton of Supreme have placed the games in Miami Beach hotel lobbies, and report that altho their real season is months away, the games have been taking in wonderful collections. Barney (Shugy) Sugerman, of Runyon, has eleven machines out, and states it's one of the best money makers he's ever operated.

Beck states that Charles Stearns and Roger Koch of Pamona, Calif. have been appointed factory representatives for the West Coast.

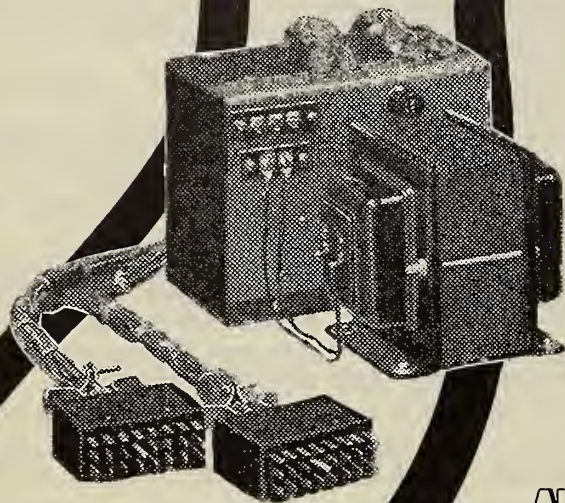

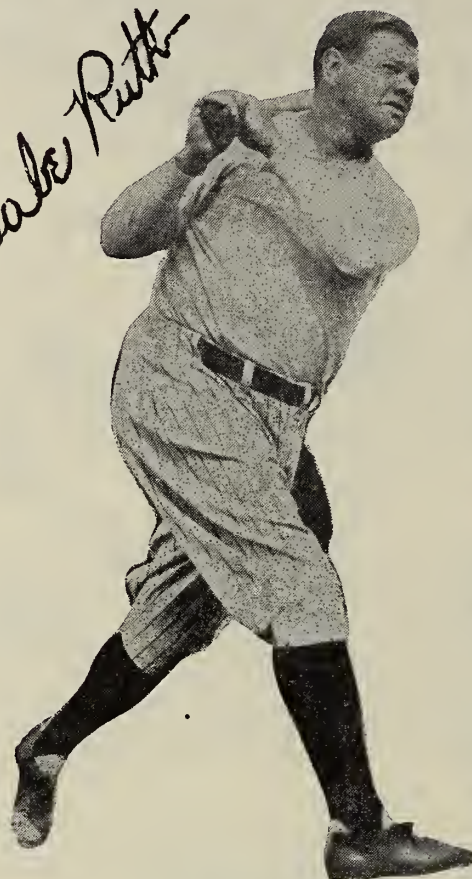

The pinball division of the industry is to be tremendously congratulated for building those giant sized "The Time Of Your Life" games. This not only helps this industry to a better and closer understanding with the public and all its officials, but, most important, by co-operating with the big United Artists movie organization, it helps to raise more money for so worthy, so great and so charitable a cause as the Damon Runyon Memorial Cancer Fund; to once and for all time eliminate that dread disease which killed the idol of so many, many American boys, Babe Ruth, as well as so beloved a man as Damon Runyon.

But, for the life of us, we can't understand the intolerance of a weekly publication, which is sold for a quarter on newsstands, so that everyone can pick it up and read it, including movie people and public officials as well as police chiefs, should jump down on the necks of the first men who made a mistake in the promotion of "The Time Of Your Life" charitable campaign.

In such a vast, yet so marvelous program, where such a great, great charitable cause will benefit, surely even such a publication should tell about the grand job being done by other cities, too, and should make it its business to cooperate 100 per cent, as well as work very hard to notify the people in each city what goodwill resulting from this effort will mean for the people from whom they obtain so much revenue to continue publishing their weekly magazine.

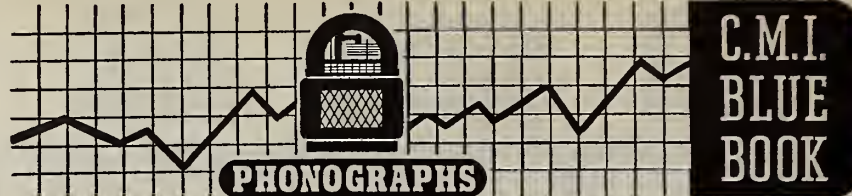

Prices continue to be very widely divergent these days. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

**METHOD:** The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.
