The Promo Man:

Maintaining

His New Image

The record promotion man is no longer the character whose depth of intelligence was once measured by his one-liners. That image, thank goodness, has been shed by not only the bright newcomers, but many of the veterans, who have picked up on the no-nonsense (not meaning lack of good-humor) approach that estab-

lishes credibility and awareness. Yet, we have been told lately that promotion-the basic link (and image) between the recording industry and broadcasting-is a misunderstood function, one that is costing many companies dearly in terms of hit prod-uct and others in terms of a low morale factor among its promotion force. One key promotion man puts the roots of the problem at the very top of label executive suites: "The promotion man may be talking to the president or other execs of a non-promotion-minded company, but no one is listening. They are taking the narrow view of 'how come you can't get that specific record played?' No other factors, such as the record itself, tight play lists and the long-range relationship between the promotion man and

his radio contacts, are taken into account."

What is discouraging about this front-office commentary is that it eradicates at one swipe all that is supposed to have evolved in promo man functions in recent years: an honest relationship between him and the broadcaster, thus bridging the credibility gap. A broadening of promo man activities to include regular contact with wholesale and retail establishments so that a proper level of inventory is maintained on successful product and that he gain a proper "feel" of the type of product flow in his territory.

We have no intention of downgrading the concept of getting play on records. But, won't undue pressure on that "one" record or, for that matter, every record on release damage that hard-won credibility relationship? We think labels and their promo force can do a better job by understanding the role of promotion within a broad context, one that does not rise or fall on one release. More airplay on deserving product will come of it. And, naturally better communications between the home office and its promo force.

companies owned by SSC, it was noted that recent recommendations by auditing and business advisors have resulted in the dissolution of 32 subsidiary companies and/or corpora-tions. Since July 1, all suppliers, the company stated, have been notified by mail that the parent corporation would be responsible for all debts. 3 Dog Night Mgr: Concert Pact Stipulation— No Security, No Performance

HOLLYWOOD — Burt Jacobs, man-ager of 3 Dog Night, is adding a rider to all future contracts with pro-moters stipulating that he must be satisfied with their security precau-tions or the group won't play--an industry first for this kind of action.

According to Jacobs, no matter who the promoter is, "I want to know who's handling security and, more important, how they're going to handle it."

to handle it." His move on behalf of 3 Dog Night results from a serious distur-bance at the San Diego Sports Arena a week ago on Sunday, Aug. 29, when the group followed Osibisa on stage after the break. "It took only 90 seconds," says Jacobs, "but about four or five hundred kids came stor-ming up front right after the group started to paly. It was the first time I've ever really been frightened—and I've been through some 260 shows of this kind. But a lot of young people

got socked around, a number of them really got hurt, and I saw at least one being carried out on a stretcher. We had to stop the show six times." The real danger, Jacobs em-phasizes, is that people can and do get hurt when this kind of minority action prevails. "And just because the promoter thinks he can save a couple of bucks by cutting corners on secu-

promoter thinks he can save a couple of bucks by cutting corners on secu-rity," he adds. Provng his point that it is purely a matter of insufficient training on the part of security personnel, and insufficient numbers as well, Jacobs points out that just prior to the San Diego date Three Dog Night had played the Salt Palace in Salt Lake City to the same size audience (some City to the same size audience (some 14,500) without incident. NEW YORK-FROM A CHILD'S JOURNAL .

Yesterday, when the sun died, the sky turned gold with pink stripes all through it and running down like wet paint near the bottom and very far away, where the sky touches the earth. There was a strange kind of very far away, where the sky touches the earth. There was a strange kind of stillness then, sort of a rustling held in check, as if all the animals and birds and little things were holding their breath until the sun was laid to rest. And so it was, because the darkness brought the sounds: the chirrupping and the soft bare padding, the delicate scraping and gentle sniffing.

It's raining today. Last night was the clearest night I've ever seen, like there was no air at all and, looking up, the stars burned and burned so strongly that my eyes got all watery and I had to turn away for a while. But I kept looking back at them because it was only them and the wind, skipping from tree to tree, that was left. It was cool but I lay down in a bed of leaves and I wasn't cold because the stars burned so brightly, and there were so many of them, they looked all sewn together. And I reached up and pulled my starquilt down and over myself and I was warm.

It's raining today. Something woke me up very early. Well, I wake up early anyway before hardly anyone else is up because, the world is mine then; I'm anyone I want to be. Anyway, I didn't wake up by myself today, something woke me. It could have been the rain, but I doubt it; I'm so used to being out in it, I like to be out in it. So maybe it was the voice. I've trained myself to listen for new sounds, and I'd never heard him before, so that must have been it after all.

Everything was white with the mist. I mean, you could hold your arm out in front of you and not see your hand for it. And it was wet. The rain sliced through the white without opening it up at all, you could just feel it, hitting your head and face and shoulders. Up close, I could just make out the lowest leaves sticking to their trees. And when I breathed, the wetness took all the air out

of me. And all I could hear was that muffled dripping. Then the voice came again, singing: "Morning has broken, like the first morning. Blackbird has spoken, like the first bird." I looked around and knew he was right. Today was like the first day I could ever remember in my life; almost as if I'd never lived before now. "Mine is the Sunlight; Mine is the Morning. Born of the One Light, Eden saw plain."

HOLLYWOOD-CANNED HEAT FANS SUPPORT FOR THE REDWOODS

A call to Skip Taylor's office yielded the information that the manager and producer of Canned Heat was laid up. But we did get to talk with his secretary and Gal Friday, Stephanie Brody, who got to telling us a little more about Taylor's Music Mountain project, which has, since last heard from, been formed into a non-profit California foundation. The idea behind it, and one that the music community is being urged to support, is to save some redwoods—specifically a huge grove of them in an upstate area called Skunk Cabbage Creek consisting of some 2000 acres, of which 1600 are virgin timber. The remaining 400 has already been logged by Humboldt County's Arcata Redwood Company. All of it is surrounded by the existing Redwood National Park, but is higher up so that it occupies a strategic ecological position as far as the park is concerned. Any damage through erosion, wind, fire or flood to Skunk Cabbage Creek would

directly imperial the park. The man behind the project, originally, was the late Alan Wilson, singer-composer of "On the Road Again" and "Goin Up the Country." Skip and Canned Heat, along with a number of other major groups, have pledged in his memory and on behalf of Music Mountain to donate all proceeds from at least one big concert during the coming year. 

One listen to her reading of John Lennon's "Mother" is all it takes to fall in love all over again with this incredibly gifted performer. She is equally effective on the buoyant "Space Captain," "Love," (an-other Lennon song) and Laura Nyre's "I Never Meant To Hurt You." For extra good measure, there is also Barbra's recent single, "Where You Lead." Oh, and a beautiful poster too. If talent and taste will out, this will be a top selling album.

BLESSED ARE . . . —Joan Baez—Vanguard VSD-6570/1

VSD-6570/1 Now, more than ten years after she first appeared on the folk scene, Joan Baez contin-ues to carry it on. This two record set features twenty songs, plus a bonus "little record" of "Maria Dolores" and "Plane Wreck At Los Gatos (Deportee)" Miss Baez' own composi-tions, pa.ticularly "Gabriel And Me" and "The Hitchhikers' Song," are marked by a beautiful-ly poetic flow. Her readings of "Put Your H nd In The Hand," the Jagger-Richard work "Salt Of The Earth" and Mickey Newbury's "The 33rd Of August" are flawless and tasteful. Her surprise top ten hit, "The Night They Drove Old Dixie Down" is here too. A superb offering from first track to last.

I THINK WE'RE ALL BOZOS ON THIS BUS-The Firesign Theatre—Columbia C30737 Madness is afoot and not a minute too soon. The Firesign Theatre, most inventive and amusing of all the groups working in recorded comedy, have concocted another irrepressible brew, stepping deftly along channels of absur-dity and firing the odd shot here and there. This one is about a bus trip into the future but it really is about much more. It's a tribute to Firesign that their albums stand up after repeated plays and this one is no exception. It should be a high chart LP.

ONE DOZEN ROSES—Smokey Robinson & The Miracles—Tamla T312L Newest bouquet from Smokey and the gang is sparked by "The Tears Of A Clown" and "Crazy About The La La La." But among the other satisfying items are the group's treat-ment of Simon & Garfunkel's "Cecilia," a de-lightfully talky song titled "No Wonder Love's A Wonder" and "The Hunter Gets Captured By The Game." Another top notch entry from this act.

THE LIFE AND TIMES OF COUNTRY JOE AND THE FISH FROM HAIGHT-ASHBURY TO WOOD-STOCK—Vanguard VSD-27/28 If there can be such a thing as a greatest hits album for Country Joe and his band, this is probably it, since in this two record set can be found the songs which catapulted the Fish from their niche as the house band for Berk-eley to a prominent position in pop music. Along with such staples as "I-FeeI-Like-I'm-Fixin'-To-Die Rag" and "Flying High," there are some live tracks, recorded at Fillmores East & West and Woodstock. About half the album is previously unreleased material and the rest is CJ&the Fish at their familiar best.

THE TIME TO LIVE IS NOW—Buzzy Linhart— Kama Sutra KSBS 2037 Buzzy is the guy next door, if you shou'd be fortunate enough to live next to a freaked-out musical longshoreman, or a someone who bears a resemblance to a cross between a steel worker and a guy who smiles for his living. Carly Simon has made his "And The Love's Still Growing" legend, and here it is in a strikingly original setting. "Friends" or the title track could easily catch the Top 40 market unawares while "Cheat-Cheat-Lied" provides him with something to run bare-foot through, scat singing and having one helluva time. This LP is fun, pure and simple, and it should bring out his fans in droves.

THE FIRST GREAT ROCK FESTIVALS OF THE SEVENTIES—ISLE OF WIGHT/ATLANTA POP FESTIVAL—Columbia G3X 30805 This is a three record live album selling for the price of two disks. While the sound and quality of performance varies from cut to cut, there are plenty of things to recommend it, not the least of which is the opportunity to hear the late Jimi Hendrix on three songs, Mount in turning in a strong effort, Poco de-livering in fine fashion, Johnny Winter And laying down some blues and Sy churning up "Stand" and "You Can Make It If Your Try." Since open air rock festivals may soon be a thing of the past, fans should want to latch onto this set if only for memory's sake.

SOUL TO SOUL—Original Soundtrack—At-lantic SD 7207 Released simultaneously with the motion picture, this album should shape up as one of the big soul sellers of the year. It was recorded live and stomping at an independence day celebration in Ghana, West Africa and it features such powerhouse acts as Wilson Pickett, Ike & Tina Turner and Roberta Flack. Th t would usually be enough for excitement aplenty but the set also boasts Eddie Harris & Les McCann, the Staple Singers and the Voices Of East Harlem. Should take right off and become a major chart item.


B. B. KING: LIVE AT THE REGAL—ABC S-724 Many longtime fans consider this to be B. B. King's finest recording. Made in Chicago in 1964, it has now been repackaged and re-issued, largely for the benefit of the young and predominantly white audience which has 'discovered' B.B. during the past couple of years. This artist's charm and his unique style of working and relating to an audience make this an exceptional live album and the songs are blues, blues, blues. And more blues. GREATEST HITS, VOL. 2—Four Tops—Mo-town M740L

Among the goodies to be found herein: "If I Were A Carpenter," "Still Water (Love)," "Still Water (Peace)," "You Keep Running Away," "Just Seven Numbers (Can Straighten Out My Life)" and "Don't Let Him Take Your Love From Me." Six more tracks round out an ap-pealing package from a consistently fine quartet.

THE BEST OF KOOL & THE GANG----De-Lite DE-2009

DE-2009 If you're going to have a gang, it should be like Kool's. They have put together a kind of funky sound which is quite unmistakably their own. "Kool And The Gang," "Kool's Back Again," "Let The Music Take Your Mind" and "The Penguin" are the really strong tracks here but the remaining eight numbers are in the same vein. Pop Best Bets

BLACK MAGIC WOMAN—Fleetwood Mac—Epic EG 30632

EG 30632 This is a two record package consisting of early Fleetwood Mac things. The excellence of the songs and the relative obscurity of "Fleet-wood Mac" and "English Rose" makes this a reissue of more than passing interest, Twenty-four songs in all, including the legendary "Shake Your Moneymaker" and "Albatross." Title tune, which of course was later recorded by Santana, is another standout. A welcome reminder of what an important group this was.

TOUGH AND TENDER—Charlie Starr— Prophesy SD 6052 When the person in the adjoining studio dropped in to say how great he thought this album was going, blind singer-guitarist Charlie Starr had to be convinced that it was indeed James Taylor paying him the compliment in the form of three tunes: "Riding On A Rail-road," "One Man Dog" and "Don't Talk Now." So they became part of the finished product, along with material from Joni Mitche I, Carole King and some gifted original numbers (especially "When Does A Man Be-come A Man"). Charlie has been getting press that's just short of phenomenal on his recent tour; reviews and sales here should confirm the double meaning inherent in his last name.

LABELLE—Warner Bros. 1943 Just off a U.S. tour with The Who and with their organization solidly behind them, expect this soul trio to make big inroads into the progressive and r&b markets simultaneously. Patti LaBelle and her women whittle a tune down to its barest essentials and then build it back up in their own image. Thus stand-bys like "Wild Horses" and "Time & Love" take on new shades of excellence. LP con-tains both sides of their single ("Morning Much Better" "Shades of Difference") and both album and 45 should benefit from the other's exposure. Strong come-back for a trio who's managed to do well since their "Junkman" days by becoming one of the most sought-after back-up acts in the business.

40 MILES PART WOODSTOCK—Jeremy Storch —RCA LSP 4541 A former band-fellow of Mountain's Leslie West (in a group called the Vagrants), Jeremy makes his own statements for the second time on LP. This outing, he is much more relaxed and so is better able to excite and enrapture an audience that's ready to sit back and hear some piano-rock and piano-poetry. Although shades of Laura Nyro and Neil Young crop up, his sound is quite unique and while it may take some getting into, the substance one reaches for the effort expended more than justifies the journey. "Spend Your Life With Me" and "Smooth Southern Born Lady" will get the airplay and should spark the album to a hearty buyer reception.

SILENT NO MORE—Theodore Bikel—Star ST 119-18

119-18 An album with musical as well as historical interest. These are "freedom songs" of Soviet Jews, smuggled out of the U.S.S.R. and artfully interpretted by the master of Hebraic music, Theodore Bikel. Profits from the sale go to a scholarship fund for Soviet Jews at The Hebrew University, but the act of purchase is more than charity. Bikel has done a totally professional job here and buyer interest engendered by the cause will be rewarded with a thoroughly moving and compelling package of 11 tunes.

GIVE ME A CLEAN HEART—James Cleveland And The Southern California Community Choir—Savoy MG-14270 In the field of gospel music, James Cleve-land reigns supreme. The many awards he has won over the years, including a Grammy nomi-nation, can attest to this. Teamed with the Southern California Community Choir he presents a formidable collection of eight gos-pel tunes, including "I Came To Jesus," "He Will Come In A Hurry" and "There's A Bright Side Somewhere." Also featured as soloist is dynamic Annette May who is something to hear. Enthusiasts of the best in gospel sounds will want to own this disk.





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

Since 1958, when the trio was first organized, the group has sold more than 18,000,000 records and earned approximately \$12,000,000. Of the 28 albums they have recorded, eight are certified million-dollar sellers, and their imposing list of single smashes includes "Tom Dooley," "Tijuana Jail," "M.T.A.," "Worried Man," "Where Have All the Flowers Gone," "Greenback Dollar," and "Reverand Mr. Black" (featuring John Stewart, who replaced Dave Guard in the ear-ly 60's). Guard, who had retired to Austra-lia, is now living in San Francisco. All original members have been con-tacted and, according to the Capitol informant, are anxious to cut an al-bum of current folk-oriented tunes.

informant, are anxious to cut an al-bum of current folk-oriented tunes. Currently under discussion: a club date kick-off for the LP, possibly at the Troubadour in L.A.

the Troubadour in L.A. Group disbanded four years ago, announcing that each would go his own way, that they had become vic-tims of musical type casting. Audi-ences, they said, wanted to hear "only the same old songs sung in the same old way."

The verified answer filed in U.S. District Court of New York further counter-claimed for the sum of \$20 million in damages for libel and slander of Mrs. Sperber and the Original Ameri-can Touring Company through a plethora of press releases issued by the plaintiffs and their attorneys. In a relatively new application of an established theory of law, the complaint went on to claim exem-plary damages of \$10 million for the violation of Mrs. Sperber's civil rights by the Stigwood Group's at-tempt to systematically destroy her ability to make a living.

ability to make a living. Judge Pierce, who had dissolved a temporary restraining order against Mrs. Sperber and the Original Ameri-can Touring Company only two weeks earlier because he had "serious doubts as to the plaintiffs' ability to demonstrate the probability of suc-cess on the merits," found that the Stigwood Group had not sufficiently made out a case for a preliminary injunction sought by the Stigwood Group against Mrs. Sperber's use of the name "The Original American Touring Company". "Plaintiffs have failed to present

"Plaintiffs have failed to present evidence of confusion sufficient to meet their burden on a motion for a preliminary injunction," he concluded.

cluded. While he prohibited the use of the title of the work in the advertise-ments for the Original American Touring Company concerts Judge Pierce went on to state that such a decision "would not preclude defen-dants from identifying the individual song titles in the publicity for their performances."

Jerry Corpett & CENTRAL PARK, NYC-Capitol's Jerry Corbett has joined forces with Charlie Daniels in a country-rock band which is capable of a wider variety of moods than most. Opening with a song pleading, won't you give a "Country Boy" a chance, the crowd gave them at least that to allow them to prove that they've got more than ersatz emotions to back up their act. Corbett, a former member of the Youngbloods is long, tall, handsome and totally professional in contrast to Daniels who is a chubby cut-up from start to finish. Together they drive home a country message hard or soft, and they had no trouble be-hind the wheel. Randy & Gary Scruggs record without pops for Vanguard, and al-though a bit shaky and nervous, the band managed to meld the country side of Dylan with some nice elec-trified down-home instrumentation. Originals like "The Lowlands" were received with the same warm re-sponse that greeted more familiar tunes such as "You Ain't Goin' Nowhere." mous. Seals & Crofts have fanatical fol-lowers too who scream like banchees until the first few notes begin, and then become utterly silent so as to worship their idols. The duo also plays some bluegrass, but they are at their best on their more contem-porary, introspective numbers. They look quite content up there on stage; satisfied minds make plenty of good music. r.a.

GREEK THEATRE, L.A.—Quincy Jones and Roberta Flack put togeth-er a smashing show for this pre-Labor Day gig. The band that Jones assembled was, for starters, one of the basic ingredients in that success since it brought together some of the best first-desk men and soloists in the business. But the two stars did the rest. rest.

rest. A kind of Renaissance man of mu-sic—composer, conductor, arranger and hip m.c. (on this occasion)— Jones got things off to a very special beginning by announcing that he and Miss Flack would share the stage for the evening. It was going to be a the evening. It was going to be a sort of family affair, he said, and indeed it seemed that way. The big-band selections alternated with Miss Flack's solos, she at the piano or standing with hand mike or just sitting on the sidelines obviously hava whale of a good time. And the friendly, unbuttoned mood on stage was completely infectious if the re-sponse from the sold-out audience

Altogether there were few sur-prises (one, a beauty, was Jones' new theme music for "Ironsides"), and the predictably professional way the concert its course contributed much to the pleasure it gave. Flying Burrito Bros. **Cheech & Chong**

BITTER END, NEW YORK CITY— Slowly, and most carefully, A&M Records is breaking every artist on their label. And next in line are the Flying Burrito Brothers. In a time when more and more country music seems to be infiltrating the pop and MOR charts, the Burritos seem the likely choice to make their move. The Burritos play a special kind of country flavored music which sets them apart from all other artists in their genre. Their songs are sad and bluesy and always project an image of loneliness and hurt. Their songs cry out to be felt-and not just listened to. They ask you to respond with thought rather than with hand clapping. The Flying Burrito Brothers com-bine both music and vocals ever grace-fully. The two are never in conflict, but rather, serve to compliment each the other resulting in a set of pre-cisely planned and expertly performed songs. At their Bitter End debut, the Burritos galloped through a brief set of material pulled from their three A&M albums. From their latest LP effort, the Burritos performed "White Line Fever," "Tried So Hard," "Four Days Of Rain," and "Why Are You Crying," a likely candidate for their next single release. Sharing the bill with the Burritos were another A&M act, Cheech &

next single release. Sharing the bill with the Burritos were another A&M act, Cheech & Chong. Not the least bit musical, C&C have been described as the first 'hard rock comedy team.' Their routines are inventive, contemporary and more im-portant, appealing to all age groups. They can be best appreciated live, though their album is extremely re-presentative of their stage act presentative of their stage act.

Together on the same bill, the Flying Burrito Brothers and Cheech & Chong deliver an unusually entertain-ing evening of music and comedy. And a well balanced evening at that! k.k.

Miss. Fred McDowell **Tom Everett Steve Haggard**

Steve Haggard GASLIGHT II, NYC—His last album for Capitol was called "I Do Not Play No Rock And Roll" and his patter tries to make the same point. But when Mississippi Fred McDowell plays "My Babe" or "Shake 'Em On Down," you just know that this is the epitome of blues, whether it be blues-rock, -jazz or -folk. "I don't do much," he continued. "Just kind of play these guitars, doing the same thing every night." Well, if Fred is monotony, lots of folks crave it. His bottleneck style is not his only trademark; his voice is more distinctive than most bluesmen. Together they sing of troubles and hard times: the good old way.

way. If an artist sat down with the most way. If an artist sat down with the most popular of the teen fan mags as his models and tried to come up with an ideal pop idol, it is unlikely he could chissel features finger than those of Tom Everett. But musically he's a lot more than cute; the RCA artist has an inherent yodel-quaver and Ian Tyson inflection in his voice which is most striking. His earlier tunes, many of which appear on his "Porch-light On In Oregon" LP tend to exaggerate these features at the ex-pense of melodies, however, and his tremeloes can carry themselves off-base when they are uncontrolled. A song he just finished, "Did I Get A Rotten Apple Baby?" speaks well for his future. While the Oregonian might have chose the country route, rock audiences in the near future will be glad he chose to sing for rock audiences in the near future will be glad he chose to sing for them.

Steve Haggard (no relation to Merle) opened the show with undis-tinguished original tunes but a rich, gutsy voice.

Ten Years After

Ten Years After CONVENTION CENTER, LAS VEGAS—Just a few hours before Ten Years After's appearance for a capacity crowd of 8,000, the group's exceptional lead guitarist Alvin Lee had been taking the press to task for categorizing his group with the likes of Grand Funk and Led Zeppelin. He resented the implication that Ten Years After was nothing more than another "power group."

of Grand Funk and Led Zeppelin. He resented the implication that Ten Years After was nothing more than another "power group." While the British quartet is cer-tainly capable of making much more creative music than either of their "power" contemporaries, their Las Vegas concert would have served very poorly to reinforce Lee's argument. From the very first number, Lee was pulling out all of the guitar tricks he knew--from barring with the microphone stand to hammering the neck of his instrument to achieve an uncanny synthesizer effect. While the guitarist is obviously an accom-plished musician (as was excitingly illustrated by his frequent scat-like vocals, which paralleled his guitar ine), his bravura showmanship was definitely in questionable taste. Ten Years After is distinctly not a power group. nor do they rely very heavily on over-loud amplification. Rather, their forte is speed. Bassist Leo Lyons, who is accurately credited with being "the fastest bass player working today," provided most of the musical support for the group, working very closely (both physical-ly and musically) with Lee. Drummer Ric Lee managed to keep the pace of the music, but delivered an exception-ally unimaginative and disappointing solo during "Las Vegas Stripper." Chick Churchill on organ provided some tasty musical asides, but his function was more often limited to filing out the sound rather than con-tributing much of his own. Only once did the group slow the furious pace, noticeably with their "Bues in C," but even that number succumbed to a get-'em-to-their-feet finale. c.v.n.

Wishbone Ash/Help

Wishbone Ash/Help WHISKY A GO GO, L.A.—The two groups booked for this five-night run share two mutual ties—they both record for Decca, and they are both managed by Michael Gruber's Just Us Productions. Aside from that, they have little in common. Help is what used to be called a Power Trio—meaning that they turn their amps up to 10 and from then on it's every man for himself. Cream was a Power Trio. Grand Funk is one. Hep stands somewhere between the best and the worst, beating your brain to a pulp with their unceasing hurricane of sound but doing so with at least some knowledge of how to play their instruments. And Jack Merrill even plays his guitar with his tongue, just—well, almost—like Jimi Hendrix.

Hendrix. But groups like this have never "needed" critics, and doubt'ess never will. Help looks good on stage, and keep gettng better at whatever it is they do, each time around. Chances are, given the right breaks, they'll be monsters. The opening night

The opening night crowd had the Whisky packed full (not too many freebies. either), and apparently it was Wishbone Ash that did most of

the pulling. Judging from their two albums, the group has an instrumental virtuosity well above most of the competition, and they play long, fairly compli-cated but moody pieces displaying the talents of their two lead guitarists.

It was somewhat disappointing, It was somewhat disappointing, then, to see them stumble through a program of half-baked blues. One wonders if they changed their pro-gram for the type of crowd attracted to the Whisky. Of course it must be mentioned that most of the club reg-ulars didn't seem to mind a bit ulars didn't seem to mind a bit. t.e.

HOLLYWOOD PALLADIUM, L.A.— "You've got to bring your own cot-ton," said the guard at the door with a wink of his eye. "That's for your ears."

ears." Inside, Lawrence Welk and his Champagne Music Makers had aban-doned their home temporarily, and in their place was a hard and heavy bill led by Windfall Records' Mountain. Trimmed to a trio for the occasion (no mention was made as to why their planist was absent), Mountain kept things moving at high pitch; confirming their place at the top of the rock heap. They're probably the oddest looking supergroup around: Felix Pappalardi looking a bit like Frank Zappa in a spangled outfit, and Leslie West grunting and groan-ing as he dwarfs his guitar, are prob-ably no-one's idea of what a teen-age ideal looks like. But their music more

aby no-one's idea of what a teen-age idol looks like. But their music more than conpensates for their physical appearance; it hits you smack-in-the-face with West's first chord, and the impact doesn't let down for a minute. Black Oak Arkansas is a hard-driving Atco Records band with a lot of character. Much of it comes from Jim Mangrum's "hot and nasty" (his term) vocalizing, but the other five members of the band should not be underestimated. They can—and did-work an audience to a frenzy with their only somewhat put-on raunchiness.

their only somewhat put-on raunchiness. Asylum Records' Jo-Jo Gunne opened the show 25 minutes late, which did nothing to help their luke-warm reception. They play a brand of hard rock which is indistinguisha-ble from that of probably hundreds of other bands. At present, their strong points seem to be limited to the hype value of numbering two former members of Spirit among their ranks, and of having David Geffen as their manager. **f.e.**

Jimmy Witherspoon Eric Burdon

ASH GROVE, L.A.—A few moldy figs might object, but this pairing has a chance to open up a whole lot of new ears. It's a blend of the estab-lished and the relatively new that might lead to the development of wider audiences for both Wither-spoon and Burdon

might lead to the development of wider audiences for both Wither-spoon and Burdon. 'Spoon, very dapper in a double-breasted white suit, took charge over the proceedings as an elder statesman must; his performance, though, didn't hint to the fact that he is something like twice his partner's age. Burdon, more casually dressed, was singing better than he has in years. He's a clear example of a talent that prom-ises a lot more than he generally delivers. The experience with Wither-spoon can only be doing him good. The material is fine, ranging from standards like "Going Down Slow" and "Drifting Blues" to newer songs like James Taylor's "Steamroller" (wth a lot of the parody inherent in the original version missing in With-erspoon's) and the duo's single, "Soledad." Backing them is a four-piece band, Tovarich Lead guitarist John Ster-

"Soleda." Backing them is a four-piece band, Tovarich. Lead guitarist John Ster-ling tried his damnedest to sound like Jimi Hendrix, and drummer George Suranovich pounds away like crazy, so the group's "sound" is awfully strong. They should lay back a bit and let the vocals stand out more by themselves. In another context, though, they'd be fine. The one-night Ash Grove stand, a benefit performance for members of the Living Theatre held political prisoners in Brazil, was the group's third time out in public. If they con-tinue to develop, and if Burdon can control his often-overboard manner-

control his often-overboard mannerisms, it could be a most fortuitous development for both vocalists.

CMA Calls For **Rodgers Support**

Whereas, Jimmie Rodgers is gen-erally known as the Father of Country Music and is one of its greatest Pioneers; and whereas, 1972 marks the 75th anniversary of the birth of Jimmie Rodgers and the 45th an-niversary of his first phonograph recording; and whereas, no recognition in the form of any honor on a nationwide basis has been afforded him; and whereas, Country Music organizations, record manufacturers and consumers feel strongly he should receive such honor; be in resolved, that the Country Music Association unanimously lends its support to a proposed commemorative stamp honoring Jimmie Rodgers.

No country music performer has been so honored. Letters supporting the proposal should be sent to the Advisory Committee and individual Senators and Congressmen immediately. The address for the committee is: Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee, c/o U. S. Postal Service, Washington, D. C. 20460.

JERRY KENNEDY PLAYS: WITH ALL DUE RE-SPECT TO KRIS KRISTOFFERSON—Mercury SR 61339

SR 61339 Since Jerry Kennedy has played such a major role in Kristofferson's rise to fame, wax-ing his tunes with Dave Dudley and other acts under his production umbrella, it is both fitting and proper that he should devote an all-Kris, all-instrumental LP to the writing ge-nius. A programmer's delight, the 11 cuts here should fit the country and easy-listening mar-kets perfectly; their gentleness and warmth fill a lone speaker or a whole country. Album should slide as smoothly up the charts as it lands on the ear.

THIS IS JERRY WALLACE—Decca DL 75294 Jerry kind of came in country music's back door a few years back when he began to shed his MOR disguise. This package still shows why easy listening audiences often speak well of him, but the country feeling is what is most obvious. With "The Morning After" getting some strong regional action, this could be one of his best selling packages to date, featuring in addition, Joe South's "The Greatest Love" and Freddie Hart's "Hands Of The Man" for added programming appeal. His version of "New Orleans In The Rain" will also draw much favorable comment. THIS IS JERRY WALLACE-Decca DL 75294

DIDN'T HE SHINE—Archie Campbell—RCA Although primarily known now for his comic role on "Hee Haw," Archie is a gifted singer and arranger of gospel tunes. His last single, the title track is worth the price of an album all by itself—the finest religiously oriented song to come out of Nashville this year. The other nine tracks are all traditional, but Archie carefully updates them for the ear of today without sacrificing the old-time religious spirit. The Nashville Sounds are superb on back-up vocalizing on such tunes as "The Ninety And Nine" and "When Morning Comes." Not just a Sunday LP, it can be savored every day of the week. Buyer interest should be substantial.

JUST BECAUSE I'M NOT THE MAN I USED TO BE—Jim Richards—Princess PR 1115 Album is titled after his latest single re-Album is titled after his latest single re-lease, but whatever he used to be, Jim is a fine country singer today. Standards such as "Four Walls" are well-h-ndled as are those of more recent vintage: Kristofferson's "Sunday Morning Coming Down" and Buck Owens' "Together Again." High-point of the album however, is Jim's reading of Merle Kilgore's "Top Of This Town" which should be in for some considerable airplay. With proper ex-posure, LP could make a substantial chart dent as easy-going, old-styled country bal-ladeers are always welcome.

BLUES COUNTRY STYLE-—George Avak—K-Ark K-6030 George has been a top-billed attraction as a gun-shooter, but his musical career is still in the fledgling stages. On this, his second al-bum for the label, he proves he can easily rank with guitarists and singers as well as the holster set. Many standards are included, given a fine reading by his pleasing vocal style: "Green, Green Grass of Home," "Shackles And Chains," "Help Me Make It Through The Night" and "Me And Bobby McGee." And he displays a fine country wit in "The Impersona-tor" and "The Next Time You Accuse Me." Airplay should start the sales action here, sure as shootin'.





















The third series is a medium price Story Of series, with couplings by such famous names as the Andrews Sisters, Paul Robeson, Roy Orbison, Beach Boys, George Shearing and others. others.



EDITORIAL: Pride of Ownership

In this day and age, many of our operating com-panies are "big business" all the way. Plenty of heavy deals always cooking. Lots of lunches, meetings and the like with department store reps, civic leaders and all the others who directly affect the juke and games business. Unfortunately for these heavy operators,

they just don't get around the route much anymore. Maybe that's okay, you say. After all, why does a man pour his blood and sweat into building a business if he still has to play with the nuts and bolts of it after so many years have gone by and it's thriving. Why can't he enjoy the good life now that he's a success? Sure he can . . . he's a fool if he doesn't. But the problem is to fall so far away from the route that it begins to fall apart.

Think about it. When was the last time you took the luxury of visiting your locations apart from contract time, or a major service call that required your as-sistance? You say there's not that much available to you to make these "courtesy calls". Well, you should make time just to check up on things, to see that the equipment looks as good as you'd like anything with your name on it to look. You should see if your machines are placed properly at each stop, if the personnel there are satisfied with service, if anybody's really interested in playing that game back in the corner, and so on.

In short, you should personally inspect your route locations to see if things are the way you want them to be. Call it good business sense or simply "pride of ownership" . . . but every operator, large or small, must make that colonel's inspection tour from time to time. Else, how can he push along all the new pro-grams without fingertip knowledge of "all the troops in the field."


