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OPTIMISM REIGNS!

There's probably been no other period in the history of the record business when the outlook appeared so secure and when the people engaged in it were so confident about the future. Everywhere you turn, record firm executives predict continued strong sales during the Summer and major increases in sales for the Fall. Surprisingly enough, these statements come at a time of the year when record men are usually a little disheartened at a seasonal decline and heretofore have been apt to see that decline lasting far beyond its actual duration. But this year, particularly, that attitude seems to have been reversed.

It is one more indication that in the last several years, the record business has undergone an imperceptible, but nevertheless tremendous, change. A great deal of the frenzy of our business used to be caused by the absolute necessity of coming up with a hit. That's what the profit and loss statement depended on and without that nothing else mattered. Today the hit is wonderful to have and naturally everyone is working as hard as ever to achieve it, but it's no longer quite the question of life and death that it was just a short while ago.

The record business has matured in the last several years. It's grown up. And just as it frequently happens that when an individual passes from adolescence to adulthood, he gains new security, so it has happened in the

record business. This security has been achieved by enlarging the areas on which the prosperity of our industry depends rather than leaving it all concentrated on the necessity to create the pop hit.

The record business today has a great catalogue of material, some of which is released as singles from time to time but most of which is almost daily being used for new packaged goods. In addition, the record industry has now come to rely on its basic juke box sale, which is currently stabilized at about 25% of the entire market and which doesn't vary greatly because the number of juke boxes on location and their needs do not readily vary.

Record executives who are currently expressing themselves in the most optimistic terms, therefore, are not wrong at all. They certainly are not viewing the situation in any rosier terms than it actually is. For the overwhelming trend of the record industry has been toward expansion to ever greater markets. This trend certainly shows no signs of being arrested. On the contrary it gives every indication of continuing at an even greater pace.

In fact, we wouldn't be at all surprised if, a few years from now, these very record men who see the future in the most optimistic terms, will say, looking at the progress that our industry has made, "We never would have imagined that we could have come this far."

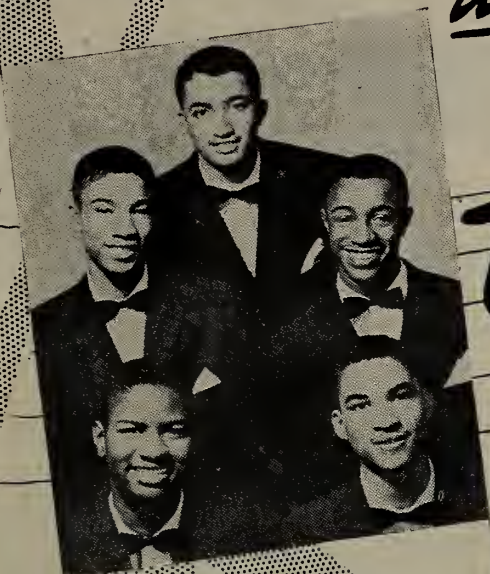

(Capitol 3459; F-3459)

B "MISTER CUCKOO" (2:23)
[Melodie Der Welt BIEM—Turner, Parsons, Mattes] Frank Weir, the ace sax star who a few years ago smashed through with "The Happy Wanderer," bows on Capitol with another refreshing and inviting novelty that could follow in the "Wanderer's" footsteps. A chorus handles the lyrics in a pleasant lighthearted manner. Watch this one.

C+ "IF EVER YOU GO TO PAREE" (2:49) [Enoch & Cie BIEM—Kosma, Parsons] This side, also recorded in London, is a beautiful blues ballad. A modernized version of the French favorite "Bonjour Paris." Moody deck.

B "REBEL IN TOWN" (2:40)
[Saunders ASCAP—Adelson, Baxter] The exciting new title tune from the big Paramount flicker "Rebel In Town," is dramatically rendered by the talented Diahann Carroll. Sounds like a big song and the thrush's treatment is sure to bite off a chunk of the melon.

B "I DIDN'T KNOW WHAT TIME IT WAS" (2:49) [Chappell ASCAP—Hart, Rodgers] From the Rodgers-Hart classic "Too Many Girls" comes this lovely standard dramatically styled by the lark. Joe Reisman sets up a big backing for this strong reading. Jockeys'll like this one too.

B "MOUNTAIN GOLD" (2:35)
[Goday BMI—Smiles, Cowan, Rivers] Rex Trailer, a rich voiced balladeer who sings with a most inviting Western flavor, gallops through a refreshing outdoor tune with a pretty melody and a simple lyric. Fine job that should enjoy a healthy run.

C+ "EL DORADO" (3:08) [Coliseum BMI—Hackady, Mure] You can almost picture a cowboy ambling along slowly in the sunset as Rex sings this tune. Pretty, easy-going Western.

B "FOR ONLY YOU" (2:27) [Fredrick BMI—Smith] Bob Anderson lends his big voice to a strong fish-beat romancer which he sends across potently. Choral backing adds to the side's excitement.

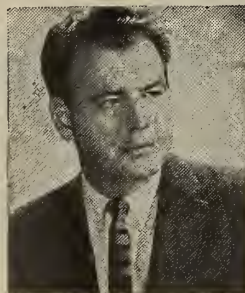

Delightfully informal interpretation of a funny tune. Should do well all around.

B "MY GUY" (2:55) [Coliseum BMI—Hackady, Naylor] The romantic side of Miss Read is displayed on this half. A touching melodic love song describing the singer's boy friend. Pretty song. Two big sides.

B+ "THE ITALIAN THEME" (2:35)
[Peter Maurice ASCAP—Giacomazzi] BBC Show-Band leader Cyril Stapleton employs the harpsichord to best advantage as he introduces a delightful string-filled ditty. Catchy novelty that makes for inviting listening. Could catch in an area and spread fast. Watch this one.

C+ "TIGER TANGO" (2:46)
[ASCAP—Hamilton, Earley] Here the crew glides through an illustrious tango item with some interesting sound effects imitating the roar of a tiger.

[Harms ASCAP—Gershwin, Gershwin] Bob Hope does a delightful job on the title tune of his latest Paramount flicker. Great Gershwin creation handled in a delightfully informal manner by Hope and the Skylarks.

[Harms ASCAP—Handley] Another great standard revived in the film, is offered as the coupling. The Skylarks and Hope work well together and come up with a cute side.

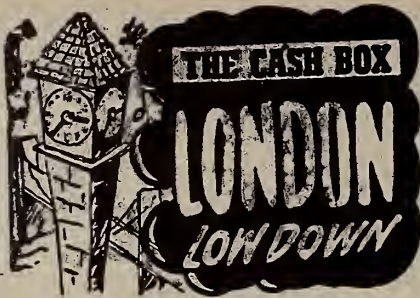

Walker Named President of RIAA

NEW YORK—Frank B. Walker of MGM Records will be elected President of the Record Industry Association of America, Inc., at a Board of Directors meeting scheduled for June 27. This meeting, however, will be a mere formality since each of the Directors of the Association has stated individually that Walker will be his choice and has agreed that all other present officers of the Association will be re-elected.

Walker will succeed James B. Conkling who, on Friday, June 15th, withdrew both as a Director and President of RIAA when he resigned as President of Columbia Records, Inc. A resolution will be presented praising Conkling's accomplishments and expressing the appreciation of the directors for his many contributions to the welfare of the whole record industry, and, particularly, for the guidance and support he has given the Association during his term as its chief executive officer. A poll of the directors indicates that this resolution will be passed unanimously.

It is customary for each president of RIAA to serve for two terms of one year each. Milton Rackmill of Decca Records was the first president of the Association and served during the years 1952 and 1953. He was succeeded by Conkling who served during 1954 and 1955, but has continued in office during the first half of 1956 due to the fact that no quorum of directors was available to elect a successor. Walker will serve as president for the remainder of 1956, but has indicated that he does not wish to continue as president beyond this year. Walker has been treasurer of the Association since its inception and will continue in this capacity also during his term as President.

Walker has been General Manager of MGM Records since that company was first organized and was recently elected Vice President of Loew's Inc. He has one of the longest terms of service of any executive in the record industry and at various times in his career has served with both RCA and Columbia.

Goddard Lieberson, the new President of Columbia Records, Inc., was last week elected Director of RIAA as successor to Conkling who had served on the Board of the Association since it was first organized.

The other officers of RIAA who will serve during 1956 are as follows:

Harry C. Kruse, Vice President; Dario Soria, Vice President; Randy Wood, Vice President; John W. Griffin, Executive Secretary.

Ernest S. Meyers will continue as General Counsel to the Association. The complete Board of Directors is as follows:

The Big Three companies have organized effectively in Europe to handle professional exploitation of its catalogs and to administer its business affairs."

The Big Three group has substantial interests in companies which operate in London, Paris, Frankfurt, Cologne, and Brussels, and professional representation in Milan, Stockholm, Vienna, and Madrid. European representative for The Big Three is Paddy Crookshank, who operates out of the London office of Robbins Music Corporation Ltd. Ed Slattery of The Big Three New York office co-ordinates professional activity for Europe in conjunction with Crookshank.

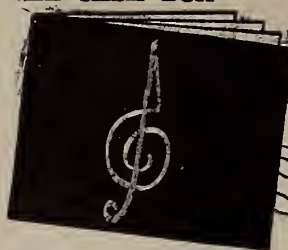

FILM SOUNDTRACK

"THE KING AND I"—Music From The Soundtrack Of The Film—Deborah Kerr, Yul Brynner—Music Supervised And Conducted By Alfred Newman—Capitol W740 (1-12" LP)

"The King And I" is the third Rodgers and Hammerstein Broadway musical-play to come to the screen. As with the previous two, "Oklahoma" and "Carousel" Capitol has obtained the soundtrack score—and a melodic delight it is! Yul Brynner repeats his Broadway role as the King and Deborah Kerr is Anna. Rodgers' music contains some of the most inviting melodies he has ever penned and Hammerstein's lyrics are amazingly witty and adult. The recording itself has captured the atmosphere of the play with some handsome vocals by the principals. The attractive package should, in a short while, make a strong appearance on the charts just as the other albums did.

Lovers of folk-music have a new group that will delight such enthusiasts with their modern, yet basically traditional, folk sense. It is fortunate that the group has selected tunes from various locales rather than one in particular. For on one record, and especially an initial entry, the listener will find the group's fine rhythmic and harmonic approach meeting each of the different nations' songs with equal zest and appeal. The 17 selections include familiar favorites and some engaging less well-known folk-songs. It would seem that the Wayfarers are going to be a name to contend with in the near future. Exciting listening.

Warm jazz, in many cases, can be classified as mood music. One of the most successful and direct examples of this is this latest Bobby Dukoff entry. It essentially appeals to the soft and sweet music loving audience, but Bobby Dukoff's tenor sax often falls, and delightfully so, into a strong jazz approach. On the other hand, the Ray Charles Chorus, with its expressive mood feeling, balances out the two musical ideas. The material has been tastefully selected. Take it in what field you will, the package makes for beautiful listening. Excellent follow-up to Dukoff's "Sax In Silk" LP success.

Errol Garner's "Summertime" and Louis Armstrong's "Aunt Hagar's Blues" are two jazz pressings that round out the well diversified release. The set includes an attractive brochure insert describing the albums in the "CL 500" series. Priced at \$1.49, the waxing is a sure-fire sales winner.

Organ music on records these days seems to be playing a dual role. Principally, organ music and popular songs seem to be getting along together as they never have before. And the result has been an increased appreciation of organ music. Secondly, organ pressings are critical tests of true hi-fidelity equipment. Shay Torrent will please both audiences here. Sharing standards and novelty numbers, Torrent plays imaginatively and with an eye on audiophiles. "Danse Orientale" and "The Bells Of St. Mary's" are two well-played hi-fi demonstrators. Strong disk.

One side is devoted to 8 distinguished show-tunes and the second is entirely taken up by 6 attractive melodies by Kreisler. The pair has a good following in both the pop and classical field. This pressing makes a direct hit on both.

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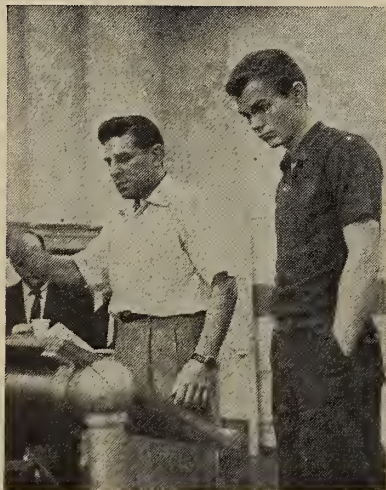
ABC-Paramount Opens Seattle Branch

With America still taking up most of its dance floor time with the ch-cha-cha, mambo and merengue, Fiesta offers one of the top exponents of such steps, Jose Curbelo. Those who dance or listen to the attractive arrangements will be reminded of some of the top Curbelo pressings. Effective use of white space on the package makes the album an eye catcher. Though in a highly competitive field, name value will give the disk a flying sales start. Party pleaser all the way. Curbelo is currently one of the hottest latin music men in the business. This should have an important effect on the LP's sales.

JAZZ

"OUR NEW NELLIE"—Nellie Lutcher with Russ Garcia And His Orchestra—Liberty LRP 3014 (1-12" LP)

HAVE YOU EVER BEEN LONELY; YOU MADE ME LOVE YOU; (ALL OF A SUDDEN) MY HEART SINGS; SOMEONE TO WATCH OVER ME; THIS CAN'T BE LOVE; BLUE SKIES; ROSE COLORED GLASSES; IT HAD TO BE YOU; NEARNESS OF YOU; SUNNY SIDE OF THE STREET; OLE BUTTER MILK SKY; THREE LITTLE WORDS.

This platter features one of the better song stylists who approaches her material with individual tempos and phrasing. Nellie Lutcher's numbers, with the possible exception of two, have excessively made the rounds in all conceivable music mediums. But, the thrush's unique and polished attack puts an entirely fresh light on the tunes. She can attractively hold on to a romantic lyric (i.e. "Someone To Watch Over Me") with a delightful "blues" result, or race with the words (i.e. "This Can't Be Love") to achieve a bright rhythmic sense. Nellie does this with incredible timing. The set is undoubtedly Nellie's best LP waxing to date. She has a loyal following which will consider this platter a must.

"THE MODERN JAZZ SEXTET"—Dizzy Gillespie, Trumpet—Sonny Stitt, Alto Saxophone—John Lewis, Piano—Percy Heath, Bass—Skeeter Best, Guitar—Charlie Persip, Drums—Norgren MG N-1076 (1-12" LP)

TOUR DE FORCE; DIZZY MEETS SONNY; OLD FOLKS; WHAT'S NEW; HOW DEEP IS THE OCEAN; MEAN TO ME; BLUES FOR BIRD.

This disk features two additions to the well received "Modern Jazz Quartet." Making the group a sextet are Dizzy Gillespie (Trumpet) and Sonny Stitt (Alto Sax). As it turns out on the platter, the two newcomers are most of the story here as they face each other with some commendable swing stylings. The highlight on the waxing is the Gillespie, Stitt and Heath stint with the ballad medley. With Heath's warm keyboard support, Diz and Sonny beautifully run through the melodies. Extra-special jazz entry.

"WHEN YOUR LOVER HAS GONE"—Claire Austin—Bob Scobey, Trumpet, Barney Kessel, Guitar, Stan Wrightsman, Piano, Morty Corb, Bass, Shelly Manne, Drums—Contemporary C 5002 (1-12" LP)

WHEN YOUR LOVER HAS GONE; CAN'T WE TALK IT OVER; MY MELANCHOLY BABY; I'LL NEVER BE THE SAME; LOVER, COME BACK TO ME; THE HOUSE IS HAUNTED; I'M THRU WITH LOVE; SOMEONE TO WATCH OVER ME; COME RAIN OR COME SHINE; WHAT IS THIS THING CALLED LOVE?

Contemporary has come up with a polished set featuring singer Claire Austin. Her approach, basically the blues, manifests itself with a straight-forward, sincere style. The deep richness of her voice is best heard in "I'll Never Be the Same" and "What Is This Thing Called Love?". Miss Austin's superb support includes Barney Kessel on guitar and Bob Scobey on trumpet. It's practically a toss up as to which audience Miss Austin appeals to. Both the pop and jazz market will find the waxing highly gratifying.

"A HAYES NAMED MARTHA"—Martha Hayes—Jubilee 1023 (1-12" LP)

BY MYSELF; HOW LONG HAS THIS BEEN GOING ON?; BLACK COFFEE; GET OUT OF TOWN; IT NEVER ENTERED MY MIND; LITTLE GIRL BLUE; YESTERDAYS; GOOD MORNING HEARTACHE; GYPSY IN MY SOUL.

Martha Hayes takes full advantage of the freedom given the jazz stylist. Her phrasing is off-beat and she can often skillfully take a melody on an unusual ride. To supplement her adroit jazz interpretations, Miss Hayes' selections are lyrically and melodically superior structures. Porter's "Get Out Of Town" and Rodgers and Hart's "It Never Entered My Mind" serve as excellent material well treated by the singer. Good accompaniment. The package makes for notable listening in its area.

CLASSICAL

"SHOSTAKOVICH PLAYS SHOSTAKOVICH"—Six Preludes And Fugues—Capitol P18013 (1-12" LP)

One of the major contemporary classical composers, Dmitri Shostakovich, takes six preludes and fugues from his ambitious "24 Preludes And Fugues" and presents them on this Capitol recording. The six pieces move from sombreness, lyricism, and playfulness to nationalism. Composer-pianist Shostakovich delves into the selections with firm authority and insight. The disk was recorded brilliantly in the composer's native Russia. It makes one think of how wonderful would be the thrill of hearing Beethoven play Beethoven, Chopin play Chopin etc. A record takes on a "something-extra" quality when a composer plays his own creations. A worthy addition to any classical catalog.

Sukin Leaves Frank Music For Own Firm

NEW YORK—Mike Sukin, professional manager of Frank Music for the past three years, and Frank Loesser, its head, have come to an amicable parting of the ways. Sukin has vacated his post as general professional manager as of June 15, 1956. Sukin plans to enter into a new venture involving personal management, music publishing and recordings. For the time being he will direct his activities from the Frank Music offices. Frank Distributing Corp. will act as his sole selling agent. There will be no immediate replacement for Sukin's position, as Loesser plans to more actively concern himself with all the

firm's professional activities.

The only other change at this time sees Stuart Ostrow, former member of F.M.C.'s professional department, leaving for the West Coast the first week of July to head up Western writer-relations, and will assist in the implementation of the expanding Frank motion picture representation in the Hollywood Frank Music offices. Frank's West Coast operation in the recent past has acquired representation of Desilu Productions, Liberty Songs, and current negotiations include talks with RKO Pictures and other major television and motion picture companies.

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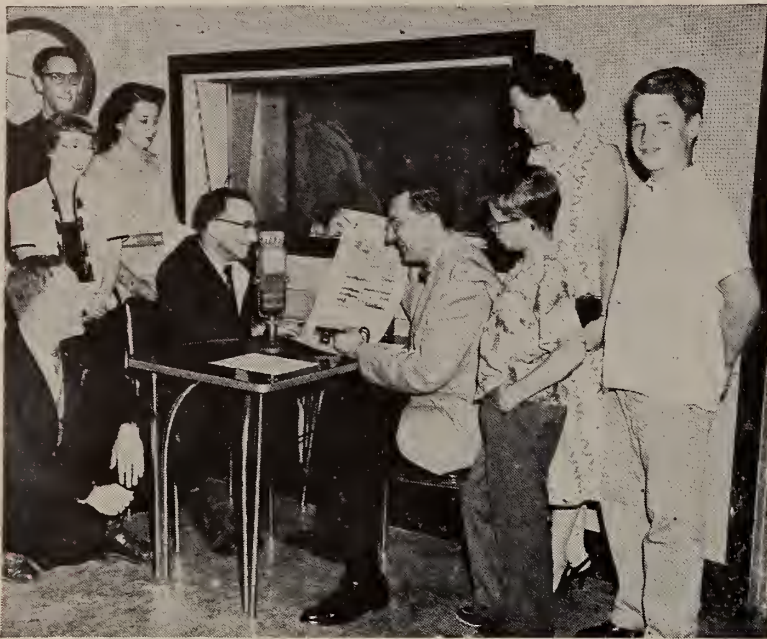

"Stranded In The Jungle" Causes Music Biz Flurry

NEW YORK—A new novelty out of the rock and roll field seems to have become the most talked about item in the record business this week. The song is a humorous jump ditty called "Stranded In The Jungle" which tells the story of fellow downed deep in the heart of Africa while his girl friend back in the states is being romanced by another gent. The story line of the song switches from the jungle to the U. S. and follows the events of the leading characters in each location.

Published by Flash Music of Los Angeles, the song was introduced by a group called the Jayhawks on the newly organized Flash label. The disk was an immediate success in many of the leading record towns in the country and was covered by the Cadets on Modern Records. Saul Bahari reported that as of June 21, he had already shipped more than 200,000 of the Cadets' record and had a backorder of another 60,000.

Last week, Mercury Records hopped on the bandwagon and rushed out a big rendition by the Gadabouts featuring "Wild Bill" Putnam.

In the meantime, excitement is high for the publishing rights. Many pubs have already bid for the tune, but at press time it looked as though Murray Deutch, general professional manager of Peer International, who flew out to the coast, had the inside track on the number for a reported \$5,000 which includes world rights.

Commenting on the assignment Leonetti said, "This is the biggest break of my career. I consider Johnny Carson one of television's greatest new 'finds' in the field of comedy and I look forward to appearing regularly with him in this important new series of telecasts."

On the program of Monday, June 18, Leonetti sang his latest Capitol release, "Free."

Decca Introduces New Phonograph Line

There are fourteen different models in the new phonograph line, including high fidelity consoles, table models, kiddie machines, portables, etc. Also in the new accessory line is a high-fidelity am/fm radio tuner.

The consoles range in retail price from \$199.95 to \$499.50. Table models run from \$139.95 to \$144.95. Portables from \$15.95 to \$79.95. The new Winky Dink kiddie phono will sell for \$19.95 and a demonstrator phono carries a suggested list of \$129.95. The am/fm tuner will sell for \$99.95. Phonograph tables, wire record racks and record storage albums round out the new line.

Statler Books Diaz Quartet

NEW YORK — The Horace Diaz Quartet will begin an engagement in the Cocktail Lounge of Hotel Statler in New York City, Monday evening, June 25, according to an announcement made by Thomas F. Troy, General Manager of the hotel.

Diaz, a well known pianist, will have with him at the Statler three instrumentalists playing the bass, drums and the accordion.

He began his career as an orchestra leader in 1944 playing the leading clubs of Southampton. He also led an orchestra at the St. Regis Hotel for four years, played three summers at the Atlantic Beach Hotel at Atlantic Beach and last summer at the Monaco Beach Club, Lido Beach. He was booked for four weeks by Bill Miller at the Sahara Hotel in Las Vegas and was held over for a period of six months. He has had successful engagements at the La Rue and at Ed Wynn's Harwyn Club.

Recording with Columbia, Victor and Kapp records, he is head arranger and musical advisor at the Southern Music Publishing Company in the Latin department. He orchestrates most of all the Mambo, Cha Cha Cha's and Merengues that are printed by the firm.

Fein Acquires Ward Song

NEW YORK—Hal Fein, general professional manager of Roosevelt Music, announced last week that his pubbery has taken over the tune "Home Is Where You Hang Your Heart" from Ward Music Publishing. The song was recorded on Decca Records by Billy Ward and his Dominoes.

Dexter Heads Promotion For Jubilee & Josie

NEW YORK — Morty Palitz, vice president of Jubilee and Josie Records, announced last week that Herb Dexter will be in charge of national promotion of both Jubilee and Josie in addition to assisting Palitz in the A & R department.

The label is currently getting great reaction to its new Della Reese album and is making available for operators only, two bands from the LP, "My Melancholy Baby" and "One For My Baby".

This week, Jubilee and Josie reported the signing of four artists: Bob Haymes, well known songwriter and disk jockey; Betty Ann Grove, familiar to TV audiences for her work on "Stop The Music" and "The Big Pay-off"; stage song star Martha Wright who skyrocketed to prominence in the role created by Mary Martin for "South Pacific"; and 11-year-old newcomer Sharon Strauss.

Haley Breaks All Records

WINNIPEG, CAN. — Bill Haley and his Comets broke all time records on his June 14 stand in Mankato, Minn. when he played to 4,940 at two performances at \$2 each.

Two days later, Saturday, June 16, Haley pulled 5,500 payees into the Auditorium in Winnipeg, Ontario, with one show. The Gee brothers, promoters of this tour, declared that already the towns in the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta, where Haley is skedded for six one nighters, are completely sold out. This is the first time that Haley has appeared in this territory.

Miller Ork Off To Good Start

NEW YORK—The Glenn Miller Orchestra, under the direction of and featuring Ray McKinley, is off to a fine start on its first few dates. Reports from promoters are that at Hershey Park (June 9) the band drew the best crowd of the season. At the Port Dover Dance Hall in Port Dover, Ont. (June 15) the operators experienced "the best advance sale in 36 years" and the band went into percentage at Idora Park, Youngstown, Ohio (June 16) and Edgewater Park, Celina, Ohio (June 17th).

25th Lecuona Album

NEW YORK—The issuance of Stanley Black's London Album, "The Music of Lecuona", marks the twenty-fifth such album, devoted exclusively to the songs of Cuba's great composer, Ernesto Lecuona.

Ernesto Lecuona who has been for many years under the sole contract to the Edward B. Marks Music Corporation, recently himself cut three albums for Victor: "Lecuona Plays Lecuona" and "Lecuona Plays For Two". The third, as yet untitled, will be released soon.

Movie Pact For Bobby Scott?

NEW YORK — Negotiations are currently under way with MGM films regarding a term movie pact for ABC-Paramount recording star Bobby Scott of "Chain Gang" fame. The William Morris Agency is representing Scott in this deal. Bobby is under contract to personal managers Jerry Levy and Fred Amsel of Directional Enterprises.

Winston Forms Onyx To Specialize In R & B

NEW YORK—Jerry Winston, president of Mardi Gras Records, one of the most successful Latin rhythm indies in the business, has announced the formation of a new label Onyx Records, that will specialize in Rhythm and Blues and Rock and Roll material. The company's first release, out this week, features the Velours, a new group of teenagers from Brooklyn singing "My Love Come Back" b/w "Honeydrop".

Onyx has also signed a male quartet called the Chordells and a femme foursome called the Dreamettes. Both will be heard on new releases scheduled for the near future.

Other artists are being auditioned currently.

Victor Rushes Dixieland Album

NEW YORK — RCA Victor is rushing into release "The Magic Horn," a Dixieland album whose jazz stars and title were taken from the NBC Alcoa Hour "live" telecast, one of the most talked about this year. The band was put together by George Wein, impresario of Boston's Storyville Jazzclub. It consists of Jimmy McPartland and Ruby Braff on trumpet; Milt Hinton, bass; Vic Dickenson, trombone; Peanuts Hucko, clarinet and Ernie Caceres, baritone saxophone. All these artists had speaking as well as musical roles on the NBC telecast of "The Magic Horn," a story of the great Dixieland jazz musicians who brought their music to Chicago during the twenties.

When RCA Victor learned that this story was being televised, they got the band together and pre-recorded the following selections for the "Magic Horn" album: Squeeze Me; The Magic Horn; Struttin' With Some Barbecue; Monday Date; On The Sunny Side of the Street; Sugar; Loveless Love; Dippermouth Blues and Ain't Gonna Give Nobody None of My Jelly Roll. Most of these tunes were played later on the Alcoa Hour telecast. The recording session was supervised by Fred Reynolds, new head of Victor's Jazz department.

Hefti-Wayne To Play Clubs This Summer

NEW YORK — Neal Hefti, one of the busiest arrangers, composers and conductors in the record field, will take a six piece band featuring vocalist Frances Wayne out on the road this summer.

Working in clubs for the first time with a group of this size, Hefti will hit the road some time in August and play the leading jazz clubs.

To date, bookings are set in Toronto, Camden, N. J., and Basin Street in New York. Other bookings are currently being arranged.

Hefti is in the midst of preparing a new 12" album with his wife Frances Wayne. One side will feature Neal and the band on a jazz kick. The other side will feature Fran on a half-dozen standards.

THE CASH BOX RHYTHM N' BLUES Ramblings

NEW YORK:

Scanning the lists brings out the interesting fact that the individual r & b male artist is really making a man-sized dent in pop sales. In the approximately three years since "cat" records opened up a new field for the r & b indie, whatever success has been attained was largely through the efforts of the "group." Starting with The Crows' "Gee" and The Chords' "Sh-Boom" right up to today's Platters' "Only You"; "The Great Pretender"; and "The Magic Touch," it was the group that made stronger and stronger impacts on the pop markets as the barriers splintered and more jockeys began programming the releases. This exposure resulted in growing awareness of the pop listener to the talents of the individual artist. Chuck Berry did it sometime ago with "Maybellene," but that was an exception and based on novelty material. Johnny Ace made his mark with "Pledging My Love," but he had the morbid publicity of his death to captivate the imagination of the thrill seeking public. While it was a tremendous record, it was again the exception, given this tremendous boost by the fatal Christmas Eve happening. But today we find Fats Domino with a two-sided hit, "I'm In Love Again" and "My Blue Heaven"; Clyde McPhatter with "Treasure of Love"; Little Richard singing "Long Tall Sally" and his new one "Rip It Up"; Little Willie John with "Fever"; and just breaking in "Roll Over Beethoven" by Chuck Berry. Joe Turner did it also, but only lightly, with "Corrine Corrina." What is more spectacular is not that these r & b artists are in the pop charts, but that they "own" the big selling version. Not too long ago, when a record broke r & b it was covered by a big name pop artist and the pop market bought the pop cover. Today the r & b version is so acceptable that the majors don't even bother to cover an r & b hit unless they can issue it almost simultaneously. Given a headstart of any kind, the r & b version usually cannot be stopped unless the indie clicking has such small distribution it cannot get the original around fast enough. Wit the exception of girls, r & b artists, both groups and individuals, have it made. So—referring back to this column in the June 23rd issue, can you see the r & b indies and artists giving up this big fat market? . . . Note from Lorene Williams tells us Elmore Morris, new Peacock artist, has hit with his initial release, "Don't Let It End This Way" and "Darling, Depend On Me." Also moving in large quantities is "Rock and Roll Bells" by Louis Jones. Mrs. Williams reports that Bobby Blue Bland's newest, "You've Got Bad Intentions" and "I Can't Put You Down" is racking up a big initial sale. . . . Over at Bess Berman's Apollo label, action continues to stay strong on "Just For A Day" by Chuck Higgins, breaking out in several new areas. Two new releases on Apollo are expected to stimulate good sales activity. They are the Vocaltones "Darling You Know I Love You," and Eddie Bo's "Please Forgive Me." . . . Morty Craft excited about the way "Gone With The Wind" by the Sheppard Sisters, after a spotty reaction, has now taken off in a big way in several areas. Melba also issuing the new Willows follow up to "Churchbells May Ring" this week. . . . Freddie Mendelsohn, Savoy Records, back from a trip around the country. He had a happy trip, what with plugging two exciting releases, "Candy" by Big Maybelle, and "Tain't Whatcha Say" by Little Esther. . . . George Klein (KWEM-Memphis, Tenn.) running a new rhythm and blues-rock and roll show since June 1. George hopes interested record companies will send him their latest releases to fit into this type show. . . . Ember Records rolling with great sales on The Five Satins' "I'll Remember." The deck looks like it will be a chart item in short order. Herald Records issuing a new Al Savage, "Sugar Wugar" and "Bride of Love"; and The Mint Juleps will bow with "Bells of Love" and "Vip-A-Dip." . . . George Goldner, Rama, Gee and Tico prexy, fighting off a bad cold for a couple of weeks now, finally ended up by passing it along

to his three youngsters. George just bought a 14 room 2 acre estate in Scarsdale, N. Y. and has tremendous plans for making it an all around vacation spot for his family. His new Clefones' "Can't We Be Sweethearts" looks like a tremendous pop hit and George plans to follow in about ten days with another Teenagers. It promises to be a big summer season for the label. . . . Jerry Winston, president of Mardi Gras Records, now in the r & b field with a new label, Onyx. The first release is by the Velours, "My Love Come Back" and "Honeydrop." Also signed are the Chordells, a quartet of teenagers, and the Dreamettes, a quartet of girls. Jerry has been auditioning and will announce new signings shortly. . . . Chris Ford, Tuxedo Records has released two spirituals. The Capitol City Stars singing "Let Jesus Lead You" and "Happy Am I"; and the Imperial Gospel Singers' "Just As I Am," backed with "I Found Him." Ford has also signed young Jimmy Carter, blues singer. . . . Tuesday evening, July 7 will be Palladium Mambo Night at the Coral Reef Beach Club, Lido Beach, L. I. Emceeding the affair will be dancemaster Killer Joe Piro and five dance teams from Broadway's Palladium Ballroom. Y., will feature many of the rock and roll vocal groups at his summer resort during July and August. . . . Buck Ram has booked his Colts back into Buffalo's Town Casino for a ten day engagement beginning September 8. This will mark the vocal quartet's third appearance at the Buffalo nitery this year. . . . The Blockbusters, instrumental combo whose Aladdin recording of "In A Little Spanish Town" is among the current r & r hits, have signed an exclusive contract

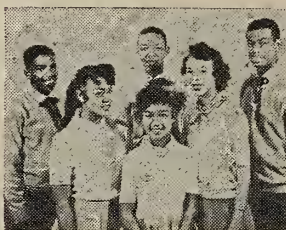

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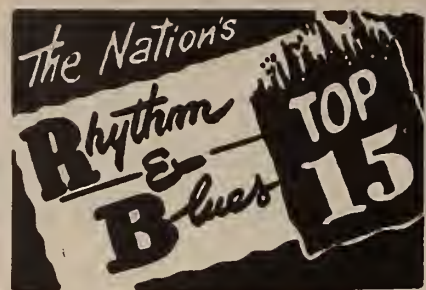

Country Disk Jockeys Meet In Springfield

SPRINGFIELD, MO.—The first annual gathering of the Country and Western Disk Jockey Association was held in Springfield, Mo., June 14-16 with an estimated 220 names in the country music field in attendance. Crossroads TV Productions and Top Talent, Inc., hosted the visiting deejays, whose president is Nelson King of WCKY, Cincinnati, Ohio.

The announced purpose of the Springfield meeting by the board of directors of the CMDJA was dedicated to the purpose of furthering public acceptance of Country and Western music. Another listed purpose was the raising of money for the organization's treasury. In that connection, a big annual show will be held to gain proceeds. There will be annual meetings, in connection with the show, in different cities.

Plans for next year's meeting were kept a secret; however, it was disclosed that the news of next year's meet, which will be announced later, would be of much interest to the trade.

More than \$1,200 was added to the CMDJA treasury as the result of the first show, held at Springfield's Jewell Theatre, home of the "Ozark Jubilee". 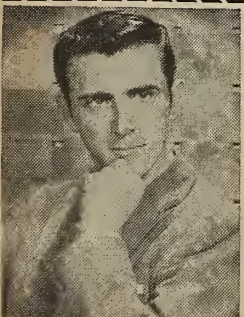

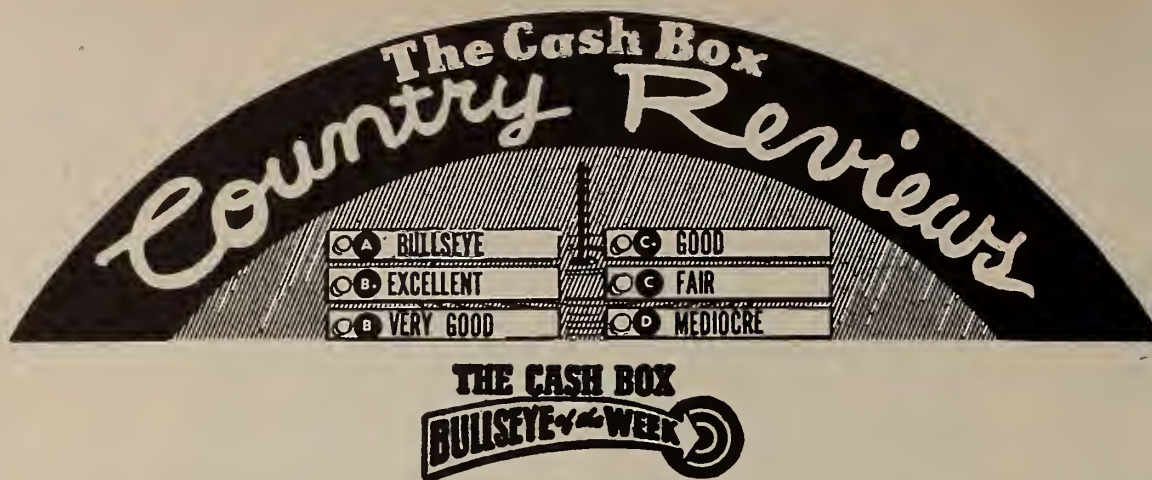

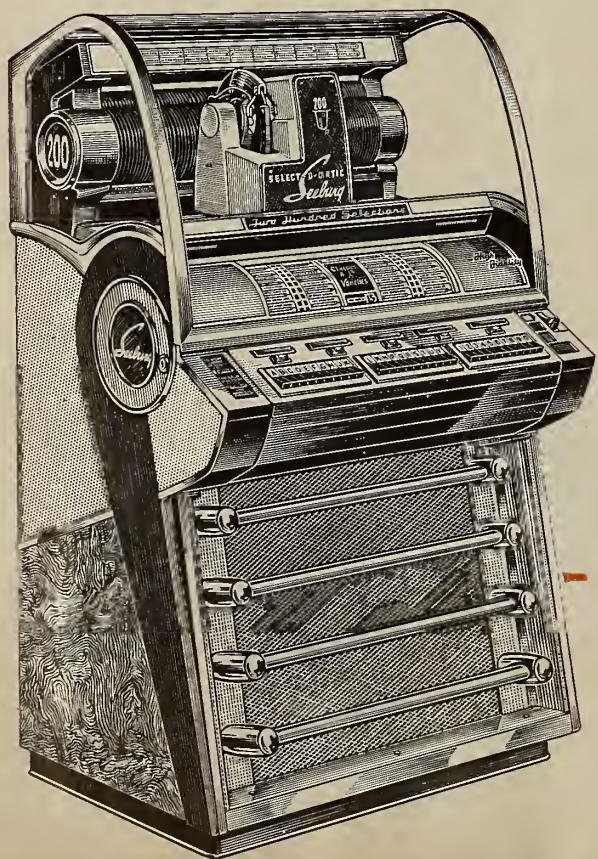

Here and There

NEW YORK—Over the past many years, The Cash Box has been editorializing on the necessity of switching over to dime play. Actually, right at the moment, we cannot think of any item which is still selling for the same price it did in 1932—that is, except the music vended by the juke box. We don't have to remind operators of the difference in operation costs since that year. However, to stress the point, we reproduce some statistics published this week by the New York City regional office of the U.S. Department of Labor Statistics. In New York City, salaries of office workers have risen faster than the earnings of factory workers. The average weekly salaries of office workers rose 27.1 per cent from April, 1951 to April 1956, while the average weekly earnings of factory workers went up 19.6 per cent. During this same period, the bureau's consumer price index rose 2.9 per cent. Average weekly salaries of women workers in office occupations in April 1956, ranged from \$46 for office girls to \$78.50 for secretaries. In 1951, the range for the same jobs was \$35.50 to \$62.50. Stenographers now average \$63 a week, an increase of \$13.50 over the five-year period. Routine typists and file clerks paid \$41 and \$38, respectively in April 1951, now receive \$53.50 and \$49. Preliminary results of the bureau's sixth annual cross-industry wage survey in 1956 also indicates that skilled maintenance workers rates increased 3.4 per cent and unskilled plant workers 4.7 per cent from March 1955 to April 1956.

NEW YORK—The number of husbands in the civilian population totals almost 39 million, according to a report by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. And about 95 per cent of all married men under 65 are working. About 25 per cent of these husbands are under 35 years of age. The number over 65 years old is close to 4.4 million, or about 11 per cent of the total. (Editor's note: There's a good gag in this item somewhere, but just at this moment we can't put our finger on it.)

GLENDALE, CALIF.—If any of our readers are interested in buying an automatic bar for their homes or offices that will dispense favorite mixed drinks in three seconds, just drop a note to the manufacturer, General Controls Company of Glendale, Calif. Oh, by the way, this company has turned down a sale at \$10,000.

How Thin The Dime?

Inflation has caused many values to depreciate tremendously. As much as the Federal Government withholds dollar distribution, causing loans to tighten and interest on money to zoom upward, these inflated dollars do little to lighten the load of lost valuations.

The basic fact remains that the dollar isn't worth anywhere near a dollar anymore. Its purchasing power has continued to fall. It's not even worth as much as the dollar of just five years ago.

Similarly, that means the value of the dime has fallen proportionately. The dime of '56 isn't worth as much in purchasing power as the dime of five, or even two, years ago.

The saving factor has been the constant growing population. More people spending more thinner dimes somehow equalized the lost value of the dime.

Better and more appealing, attractive equipment, greater music selectivity in phonos, for example, have coaxed more of the thinner dimes out of the public's pockets to help somehow equalize the higher cost of equipment and the tremendously increased overhead expenses.

It was just few years ago when this publication, during its almost thirteen years crusade urging adoption of dime play, pointed out that the nickel was worth but 2½c and, therefore, the dime

was worth but 5c, compared to the basic coinage valuations of 1939. This is the year, 1939, on which the nation's economists base their money values.

How thin the dime? Since that time, just a few years ago, the dime has become much, much thinner. Has again fallen in value.

Today, according to the nation's economists, the dime is about 3c thin, based on the year of full economic financial calculation, 1939.

What's even more serious, because of the present constantly creeping inflation, this thin dime grows ever thinner. If inflation persists, the thin dime of today may well be considered the penny of 1960.

Perhaps, then, the better minds of the industry should think hard and plan ahead. New type equipment with greater play appeal and faster timed action. New ideas for ever higher coin play and greater intake. New operating methods with better commission percentages and front money to favor the operator. This latter to be done automatically by the machines.

In short, the time has come when all who seek profitable operations must begin now to find the answer, so that their profits will remain constant and assured as the thinning dime grows thinner.

NEW GAMES NOW UNDERGOING EXTENSIVE, EXHAUSTIVE TESTS

Factory Executives Carefully Studying Results of Tests Being Conducted on New Amuse Products. Foresee Deluge of New Games Coming To Market This Summertime to Set New Record

CHICAGO—It is the general belief here that this summer of 1956 may see a new record set for numbers of new amusement machines that will be introduced of the trade.

It is reported that every games factory here has new machines on test.

These new machines are reported to be undergoing the most extensive and exhaustive tests possible.

Factory executives and engineers are watching results of the tests and studying the results with great care.

Many are of the belief that what will result from all these varied machines being tested at this time will be new hit amusements that may bring back the best boom days.

There are some factory execs who are of the belief that the new amusement products they have out on test occasions are already proving themselves among the very best they have yet produced.

Some manufacturers are already re-

ported to be preparing to get into production with such new games.

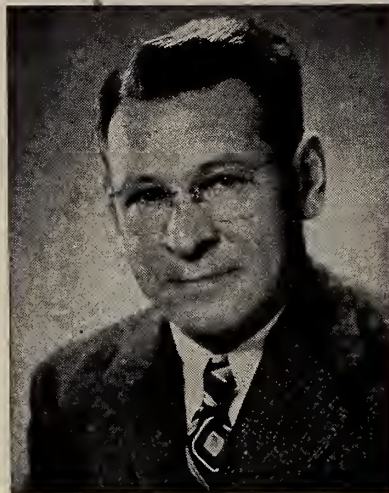
The new machines, it is said, will prove of varied kinds with each manufacturer presenting what he believes the field requires at this time.

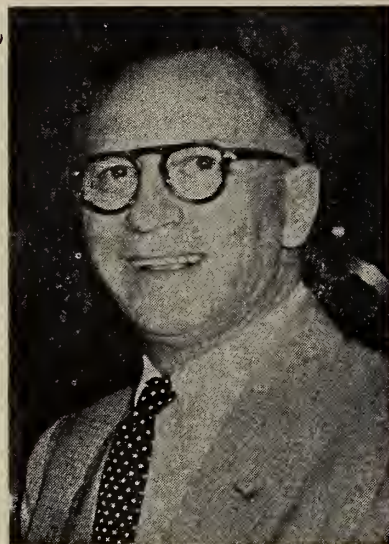
34 counties comprising the southeast Texas trading area.

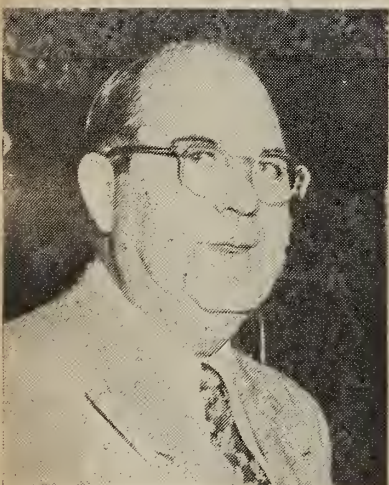

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2c Music Play Ops In Losing Income vs Expenses Battle

2¢ Music Play Ops Find Constant, Creeping Inflation That is Skyrocketing Costs of All Necessities to Continue to do Business Wiping Away All Profit Possibilities

CHICAGO—The 2¢ (nickel) music play juke box ops are getting more deeply mired in the losing battle of expenses vs. income.

Many are reported to have slashed their personal salaries. One 2¢ (nickel) play music op advised he's cut his take-home pay from his business "about fifty per cent."

He admits that this is "very tough" on him and also on his family. Yet he ineffectually asks:

"But what else can I do?"

Nor is he the only 2¢ (nickel) play juke box operator who is suffering from constant creeping inflation that is slashing deeper and ever deeper into the income from his equipment. Chopping to the point where there is no profit left after expenses are met.

Many other 2¢ play music ops are facing consistent, continuing loss as labor's wages again prepare to zoom upward in another round of raises now being set up in basic industries.

As this publication pointed out many, many years ago, even if the 2¢ (nickel) play music ops lost 50% of their weekly or monthly number of plays, when changing over to dime play, they would still be better off. They would still be able to show a profit.

Fifty per cent less action on dime play would, first of all, bring in the very same amount of income the 2¢ (nickel) play operator is now obtaining.

But, what's most important, 50% less play volume would show him profit because of less servicing, less parts and supplies to purchase, less need for mechanical help, less wear

and tear on his equipment which would make the machines last longer and assure better trade-in value because they would be in better condition.

Less parts, less servicing, less supplies, less mechanical help, all adds up to a definite profit in and of itself. This is only possible on dime play.

So even if the 2¢ (nickel) play music operator gets only half as many plays when he changes over to dimes, he still gets as much income as before and earns more than he earns today.

Yet, nowhere in all the nation, has any former 2¢ (nickel) play music operator reported a 50% drop in play volume when he changed over to dime play.

In fact, the lowest, temporary drop ever reported was just about 25%. Furthermore, and within a few weeks, play action not only returned to its former volume but, in most cases, actually increased.

The 2¢ (nickel) play music operator, many times, cuts down on buying new machines in an effort to stave off expense. What usually results, in such cases, is that competitors grab his spots by bringing in brand new, high fidelity, beautifully toned, modern phonographs of greater selectivity.

If the 2¢ (nickel) play juke box operator insists on fighting the tremendously tough forces of an inflated economy, sooner or later and, usually sooner, the flood waters of constant creeping inflation are going to entirely engulf him. Sink him. Drown him in bankruptcy.

(Editor's Note: Latest reports from the nation's leading economists place

the value of the American dollar at about 40¢ as compared to the dollar of 1939, the economists' basic valuations year. In 1939 the American dollar purchased a full 100 cents' worth of merchandise. In 1956, the American dollar purchases about 40¢ worth

of merchandise, as compared to the 1939 dollar. This means that the present American Nickel is worth but 2¢. And with a new round of inflation in prospect as basic industries face higher wage costs even this 2¢ Nickel is bound to drop in value.)

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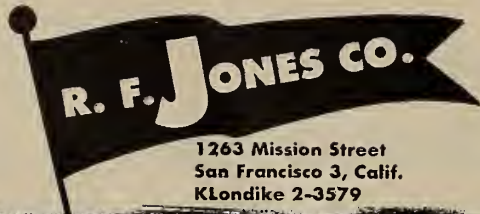

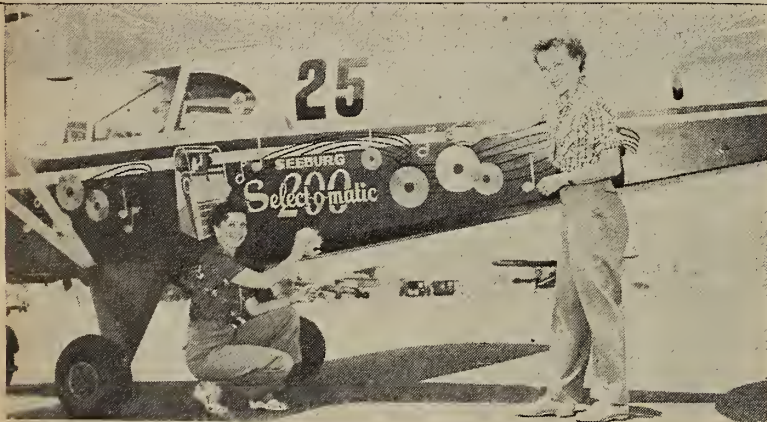

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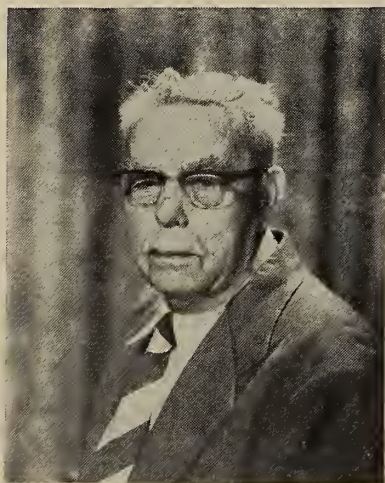
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Two Honored by Seeburg For Forty Years of Service

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business, and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics. These buyers will purchase machines "as is" at prices quoted by the trade at large and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.
