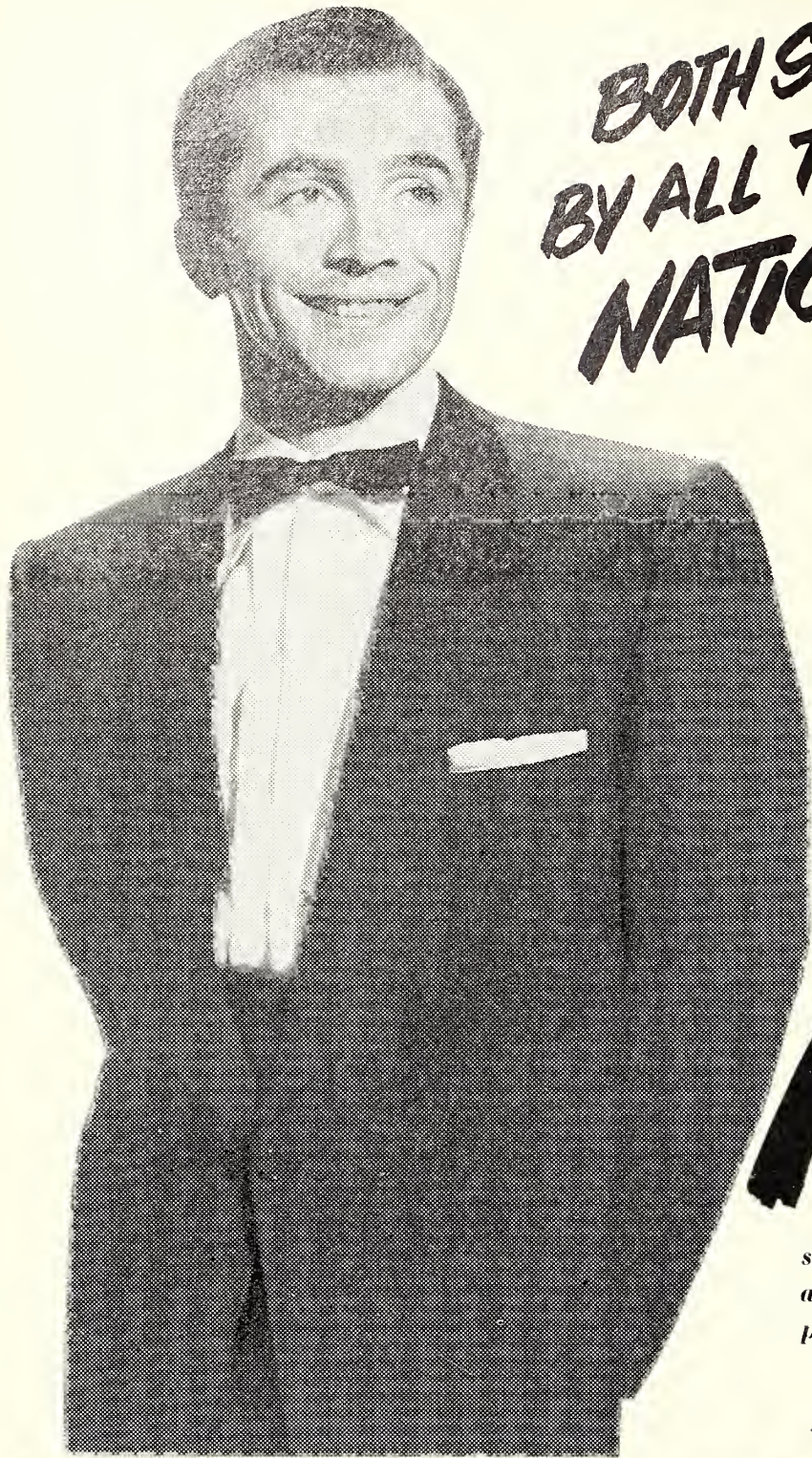

“HELP THE RETAILER”

“Help the retailer” is the most insistent and urgent demand from almost every distributor with whom you get into conversation these days.

The retailer situation has been one of the most discussed problems by the trade in the last several years, but never has the note of urgency been as strong as it is today.

The distributor, in analyzing sales prospects, if retail dealers are forced to go out of business in any number, sees two devastating results:

1) The manufacturer will be unable to get full mileage on his catalog inasmuch as no other facet of sales carries the large number of catalog items as does the retailer. The dealer is still the prime mover of catalog merchandise.

2) It will be almost impossible to break a single record. When a disk jockey begins airing a release in strength and it begins to take hold with the public, the initial order from the retailer is in two's and three's. Only the dealer can buy such minimal orders while the record is in the process of building into larger and larger sales

until finally it breaks out into a hit. At this point the other sources of sales—the rack, the discounter, the chain and the department store step in with quantity orders.

This problem has been recognized by many manufacturers who have devised plans to aid the retailer. Many other manufacturers are giving the situation serious thought.

On the other hand the retailer must help himself. He must think in terms of special promotions, price leaders, personal services, better trained salesmen, local newspaper advertising, new lines to supplement records, better use of display material supplied by manufacturers and aggressive selling instead of accepting the role of order-taker.

For a healthy and growing record industry we need the dealer. The manufacturer will sell more records and begin to sell them sooner. The distributor will sell more records. Even the other pipelines to the consumer like the discounter, the chains and the department stores will sell more records if the retailer is around to help make the hits.

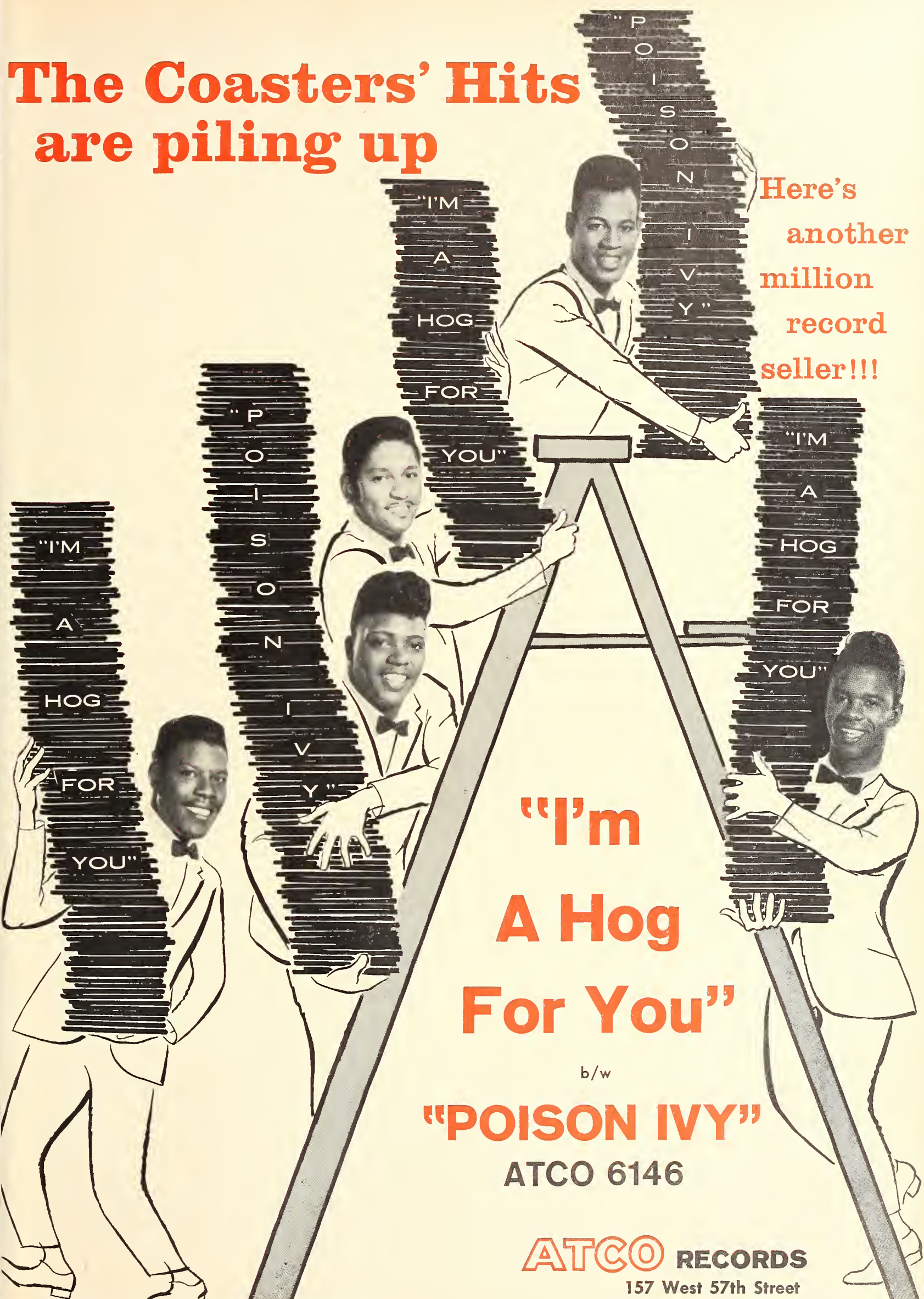

"POISON IVY" (2:43) [Tiger BMI—Leiber, Stoller]

"I'M A HOG FOR YOU" (1:59) [Tiger BMI—Leiber, Stoller]

COASTERS (Atco 6146)

● More delightful rock humor by the team on "Poison Ivy." Fellas warn about a "crazy" dame who can give a guy poison ivy ("you're gonna need an ocean/of Calamine lotion"). Deck is an easy chart follow-up to "Along Came Jones." Underlid is an infectious item that stands a chance for listing success. But, we're strong on "Poison Ivy."

"HEY LITTLE GIRL" (2:15) [Roosevelt & Tollie BMI—Blackwell, Stevenson] "IF IT WASN'T FOR YOUR LOVE" (2:32) [Gladstone ASCAP—Clark]

DEE CLARK (Abner 1029)

● Performer can follow his "Just Keep It Up" smash with a two-sided click. Initial reaction will probably center around the outstandingly infectious belter, "Hey Little Girl," but there's also chart news written into the beautifully portrayed "If It Wasn't For Your Love," a lovely teen ballad.

"OKEFENOKEE" (2:39) [Conley BMI—Slay, Crewel]

"KOOKIE HAT" (2:05) [Claridge ASCAP—Dean, Harris]

FREDDIE CANNON (Swan 4038)

● Cannon should be driving his way on the charts again (he's still on with "Tallahassie Lassie") with "Okefenokee," the name of a famed Florida swamp and the locale of Walt Kelley's "Pogo" comic strip. The contagious date is sure-fire teen stuff. Good belt-novelty—"Chipmunk" voices included—on. "Kookie Hat." Could be active, too.

"THE REAL THING" (2:16) [Dufferin ASCAP—Manning, Hoffman]

"GOT A LOCKET IN MY POCKET" (2:10)
[E. H. Morris ASCAP—David, Pockriss]

FOUR LADS (Columbia 41443)

● Group is its usually fine upbeat self on a mighty cute and tuneful romantic, "The Real Thing." Lyric compares a "true diamond" with "true love." Programming will be strong, giving deck important chart-bound exposure. Boys are again in a bright mood on "Got A Locket In My Pocket." Should be watched.

"SAVING MY KISSES" (2:34)
[World-Kemo BMI—Sherman, Sherman]

"UN JARRO" (2:19)
[Bobby Tunes BMI—Addrisi, Addrisi]

ADDRISI BROTHERS (Del-Fi 4120)

● The songsters, who hit with "Cherrystone," offer two important takes for teen acceptance. Boys have an Everly Bros.-like glow on the tender "Saving My Kisses," while "Un Jarro" spotlights them in a different-sounding and highly exciting Latin pose. Watch for both.

"OO LA LA LA LA" (2:00) [Margie ASCAP—Catalano, Kulaga]

"A LITTLE GIRL CRIED" (2:20)
[Nevins-Kirshner ASCAP—Martin, Harvey]

BARBARA EVANS (RCA Victor 7576)

● Songstress, who was active last time out with "Souvenirs," could show-up strong on the merry can-can-styled ditty, "Oo La La La La." Lark's sunny delivery is supported engagingly by the Mort Garson ork-chorus. Be on the look-out for this festive date. Exposure can do things for the performer's touching rendition of the potent wistful, "A Little Girl Cried." Should be watched.

LINDA LEIGH

(American-International 540)

B+ "I PROMISE YOU" (2:12) [Dijon BMI—Johnston, Harriet] Lark and combo-chorus support are strong on the potent emotional ballad. Stands a chance to make it. From a pic tagged "Ghost Of Dragstrip Hollow."

B "MY GUY" (1:35) [Dijon BMI—Brasch] The rock-novelty offers youngsters a good upbeat sound.

TOMMY MERCER

(Volcano 1)

B "MEET MY LITTLE DOLLY" (1:45) [Weitz BMI—Weitz] Singer Mercer and combo-chorus offer a contagious beat session here. Happy sound that could be active.

C+ "VOLCANO ROCK" (2:01) [Weitz BMI—Weitz] A semi-dramatic melody gets the weirdo-rock treatment.

MARY SWAN

(Unart 2019)

B "CRYING IN THE CHAPEL" (2:27) [Valley BMI—Glenn] Songstress convincingly renders the one-time Darrell Glenn smash. Of note is the unusual choral opening, a Glee Club-sounding affair.

C+ "DANCIN'" (2:28) [Barbro ASCAP—Wisner] Contagious upbeat display that has a feel of the roaring twenties.

BRUCE & JERRY

(Arwin 1003)

B+ "I SAW HER FIRST" (1:41) [Daywin BMI—Johnston, Cooper] Two fellas musically battle it out over who saw the gal first. Bit is done extremely well, with a good vehicle and excellent combo backing. Watch this one.

B "TAKE THIS PEARL" (2:12) [Daywin BMI—Johnston] Two-some blends strikingly on the affectionate teen ballad.

TOMMY HUDSON

(D 1073)

B+ "SWANEE RIVER GAL" [Glad BMI—Ashburn] Barroom keyboard opens with strains of "Swanee River" and then Hudson and combo take-over in sizzling style. Tune is partly used in the Hudson vocal too. Strong sound that could make it.

B "BAND STAND ROMP" [Glad BMI—Snills, Ashburn] Wild stuff, with instrumental work a potent highlight.

BUBBER JOHNSON

(King 5232)

B+ "I DO (Love You)" (2:34) [Jay & Cee BMI—Phillips, Toombs] An infectious declaration from Johnson and important combo-chorus support. Could break in both pop and r&b circles.

B "COME HOME" (2:50) [Jay & Cee BMI—Johnson] The songster shows-up fine on the attractive soft pleader. Two commercial sides.

THE PRIVATES & COLONELS

(ABC-Paramount 10037)

B+ "THE CANNONS ON BUNKER HILL" (2:06) [Pamco BMI—Reedes] Effective build-up marcher on the "Skip To My Lou" tune. Flute carries the tune, while brass and percussions pound out the beat. Could show-up.

B "CHOPSTICKS CHA CHA" (2:05) [Pamco BMI—Reedes] Familiar keyboard exercise goes Latin.

FELICIA SANDERS

(Decca 30937)

B "IN OTHER WORDS" (3:00) [Almanac ASCAP—Howard] The lovely opus is handled beautifully by the thrush. Deck with class. Jocks will go for it.

B "SUMMER LOVE" (2:53) [Victor Young ASCAP—Young, Berle, Arnold] One of the late Victor Young's finest melodies and again it's class all the way.

JERI SOUTHERN

(Capitol 4250)

B "DON'T LOOK AT ME THAT WAY" (2:58) [Harms ASCAP—Porter] The rare Cole Porter delight is fashioned deliciously by the stylist, who is backed by engaging arrangement-of-the-twenties work by the Billy May ork. Side is included in performer's recent LP, "Jeri Southern Meets Cole Porter." Sure-fire deejay stuff.

B "RUN" (2:06) [Famous ASCAP—White, Wolfson] Interesting rock-a-cha-cha date, with Miss Southern getting intriguing percussion moments from the Bob Thompson ork. Can get strong plays, too.

VAN ALEXANDER

(Capitol 4258)

B "THE BIG OPERATOR" (2:33) [Robbins ASCAP—Alexander] The ork does a neat job of pounding out the jazz-inspired pic main-title. Stuff in the "Peter Gunn" line that can get good air-play.

B "THE SHAKE" (2:12) [Wild Tone BMI—Harris] Solid swinger that recognizes the teen market.

SANDY NELSON (Original 5)

● "Teen Beat" is a terrific percussion treat and could zoom way up the charts. Middle portion of deck gives guitars a chance, but it's the percussion pounding that sells deck. Watch it! Bottom lid is trigger-fast.

"RUN, BOY RUN" (2:08) [Gregmark BMI—Hazlewood]

"NEW KIND OF FOOL" (1:41) [Gregmark BMI—Hazlewood]

SANFORD CLARK (Jamie 1129)

● Haunting "Run, Boy Run" session can be Clark's vehicle back to the charts (he had "The Fool" some time ago). Effort is about a fella who's on the run because he's stolen and thus the authorities are after him. Much can be said for Clark's rhythmic middle-beat "follow-up" to "The Fool," "New Kind Of Fool." Should be eyed also.

"JUST TO BE WITH YOU" (2:18) [Audicon BMI—Kalfin]

"OH MELANCHOLY ME" (2:08)
[Jimskip Audicon BMI—Barkan, Baron]

PASSIONS (Audicon 102)

● New songsters can score the first time out. Side of particular note here is the strong ballad, "Just To Be With You," which the boys present in an excellent teen light. "Oh Melancholy Me" is fine upbeat stuff and could move. Label was formerly tagged Acusticon and came-up with the recent Magatons' hit, "Velvet Waters."

Audio-Fidelity Reports Heavy Action On 99¢ Consumer Summer Bonus Plan

package at the regular price during August, is the label's first venture into consumer pricing promotions. To the dealer and distributor, the plan's obvious consumer attraction is en- hanced by a chance to stork up for the Fall. Though the deal will "definitely" terminate midnight, August 31, AF will fill any orders received hp to that deadline.

The plan was planned and launched to break simultaneously throughout the United States, Canada and South America and Hawaii on August 1. Over 3,000 dealers in these territories received kits containing dealer aids, including day-glow streamers, broad- sides. The dealer is also given the opportunity to participate in coop ad- vertising, with dealer, distrib and AF sharing the costs.

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK

A DATE WITH ELVIS



"A DATE WITH ELVIS"—Elvis Presley—LPM 2011 & Stereo LSP 2011

Twelve Presley performances, among which are "We're Gonna Move," "Good Rockin' Tonight," "Young and Beautiful" and "Blue Moon of Kentucky" are packaged in a double-fold, hang-up calendar, containing no less than 17 photos of the artist. Will move fantastically.

"BELAFONTE AT CARNEGIE HALL"—Harry Belafonte—RCA Victor LOC 6006 (Monaural & Stereo)

Recorded in performance during his April Carnegie Hall stint, this two-disk set features the artist doing the best of his wide folk repertoire. Session includes "Day O," "Jamaica Farewell," "Darlin' Cora," "John Henry," "Danny Boy" and 15 exciting minutes of audience participation on "Matilda." Although all are available on previous Belafonte releases, this outing combines the best and most popular sides.

"KOOKIE"—Edd Byrnes — Warner Bros. W 1309 & Stereo WS 1309

The hair-combing, hip-talking, cool-sounding Kookie ("Lend Me Your Comb") talks his way through twelve numbers. Featured along with Byrnes is the Don Ralke ork, a chorus and femmes Connie Stevens and Joanie Sommers, all of whom support the star. Tunes include a revised version of "You're The Top," "'A' You're Adorable" and the smash "Kookie Kookie (Lend Me Your Comb)." This wax will sell like crazy, man.

"GATHER 'ROUND" — Tennessee Ernie Ford—Capitol T 1227 & Stereo ST 1227

Folk songs and folk tunes are colorfully rendered by Ford in his full, rich baritone voice. Jack Fascinato creates suitable mood settings, with occasional assistance from a femme chorus, around the singer for his delightful interpretations of such treasures as "Black Is The Color of My True Love's Hair," "Barbara Allen," "Freight Train Blues" and "My Grandfather's Clock." A chart position awaits this set.

"THE NUN'S STORY" — Original film soundtrack—Music composed and directed by Franz Waxman—Warner Bros. B 1306 & Stereo WB 1306

Vividly dramatic music has been composed by Waxman to compliment the stirring story, which is currently being hailed as an outstanding motion picture. Bold, sweeping orchestral colors, depicting the various film scenes, provide a gratifying listening session. Film's eminent success should be a boon to record sales here. Cover makes for excellent display material.

"WHEN YOU'RE AWAY" — Carmen McRae — Kapp KL 1135 & Stereo KS 3018

The singer's second Kapp LP finds her directing her crystal-clear voice toward a dozen poignant love ballads. Light orchestral backing by Luther Henderson, Jr., and Frank Hunter (two tracks) allow Miss McRae's beautifully distinct and subtly jazz phrased voice to shine on such perennials as "The More I See You," "I Concentrate On You," "I'm Glad There Is You" and "Two Faces In The Dark." Can attain chart status.

"GLAD TO BE HERE"—Ed Townsend—Capitol T 1214 & Stereo ST 1214

Townsend possesses a formidable singing talent and puts it to excellent use here, singing twelve songs of varying moods. The ever-present Nelson Riddle has arranged outstanding showcases, surrounding Townsend with vibrant ork settings for such tunes as "Deep In A Dream," "On The Street Where You Live," a deliciously swinging "Don't Get Around Much Anymore" and Townsend's self-penned rockaballad, "What's Wrong With Me." Immensely satisfying session.



"THE SWINGIN' ERA"—The Tommy Dorsey Orchestra Starring Warren Covington — Decca DL 8914 & Stereo DL 78914

Echoes of the big bands that flourished during the "Swing Era" are heard here, as four arrangers have recreated the numbers most identified with those orks. Headed by Covington, the Dorsey band romps through Miller's "Litt Brown Jug," Goodman's "Sing, Sing, Sing," Basie's "One O'Clock Jump," Hampton's "Flyin' Home" and Shaw's "Traffic Jam" among other lively nostalgia.



"DANCING ON THE CONTINENT" — Lester Lanin and his Orchestra—Epic LN 3578 (Monaural & Stereo)

This is Lanin's eighth Epic album, attesting to the wide acceptance and popularity for the infectious dance music he creates. This outing features 43 of the most popular European melodies arranged in 13 dance sets, and played in various tempi. Large chorus is heard occasionally. Staple dance shelf item.



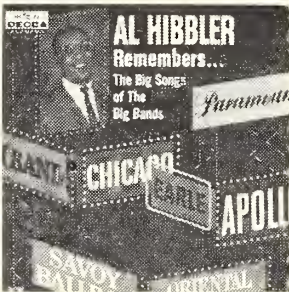
"REFLECTIONS"—The Roger Wagner Chorus—Capitol P 8491 & Stereo SP 8491

The Wagner Chorale, in its latest Capitol outing, continues to offer some of the best examples of popular and classical choral work. The mood setting this time is quiet and sentimental, and features an array of delightful melodies. Selections include Dvorak's "Songs My Mother Taught Me" and "Goin' Home," Brahms' "Lullaby," Schubert's "Serenade," the traditional "Dann" and five others. Choral virtuosity here.



"CHEERS"—Burl Ives with the Ray Charles Singers—Decca DL 8886 & Stereo DL 78886

Burl Ives is the lead singer, the Ray Charles Singers join in for the choruses, and Tony Martin directs the ork. With these three potent ingredients the album can't help but emit a bevy of happy, cheerful sounds. The lighthearted songs include "Oh By Jingo," "There Is A Tavern In The Town," "Viva La Compagne" and "Polka Wolly Doodle." A sparkling song fest.



"AL HIBBLER REMEMBERS THE BIG SONGS OF THE BIG BANDS"—Decca DL 8862 & Stereo DL 78862

Leading off with "Don't Get Around Much Anymore," an Ellington tune he sang during his eight year tenure as Duke's featured vocalist, Al Hibbler renders tunes that were identified with big bands during the "Swing Era." Reaching back for several lesser-known items, Hibbler revives memories of Lunceford's "I'm Walking Through Heaven With You," Hines' and Ellington's "I'm Falling For You" and "Jelly, Jelly Solid, swinging performances.



"VERA LYNN SINGS SONGS OF THE TWENTIES"—London PS 156 (Monaural & Stereo)

The powerful voiced British thrush takes sixteen American songs which thrived during the twenties. With the Michael Sammes Singers at appropriate settings by the Eric Rogers ork, Miss Lynn emotes a bright, happy sound on such memorables as "Back In Your Own Backyard," "That's My Weakness Now," "Bye Bye Blackbird," "Drifting and Dreaming" and "Yearning Well performed nostalgia.



"MUSIC FOR MEMORIES"; "MUSIC FOR ROMANCING"—Paul Weston — Capitol T 1223 & Stereo ST 1222; ST 1223

These two mood albums were among Weston's best-selling releases his first time around with Capitol. These are new versions, newly recorded in stereo and retain their original titles and selections. The "Memories" set is all lush and features "Deep Purple," "East of the Sun," and "All The Things You Are." The "Romancing" disk, besides the lush pieces also contains a few sprightly readings. It includes "Orchids in the Moonlight," "Do You Ever Think of Me" and "Time On My Hands." Standard for the mood shelf.

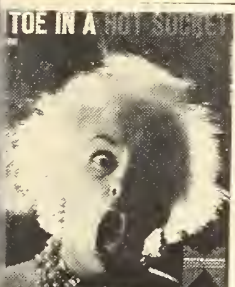

"THE ERNEST TUBB STORY"—Decca DSXA 7159 (Monaural & Stereo)

Twenty-four newly recorded songs, packaged in a two-disk, book-type binder, commemorate the long and successful career of country singer Tubb, a country institution. With few exceptions, the tunes are all Tubb originals and include "I'll Get Along Somehow," "Slippin' Around," "Walk-in The Floor Over You," "Careless Darlin'," "Last Night I Dreamed" and "Blue Christmas." Country collector's item.



"WET TOE IN A HOT SOCKET!"—Phyllis Diller—Mirrosonic SP 6002

Recorded in performance at the Bon Soir, New York, the album presents comedienne Phyllis Diller in a variety of witty monologues and songs. Her humor is of the chic, sophisticated kind, but providing many hilarious moments. Appreciative audience response is sprinkled liberally throughout session. Among the few songs are "To Keep My Love Alive" and "Just Like A Man." Delightful session.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



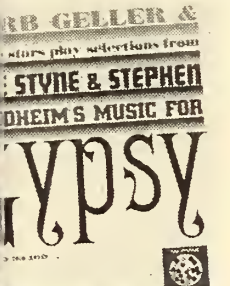
"AN HOUR WITH THE RAMSEY LEWIS TRIO"—Argo LP 645

One of the most enjoyable hours of jazz listening is provided by the trio, which swings effervescently through a dozen extended numbers. Although the lighthearted Lewis piano is the main attraction, each member complements each other forming a cohesive unit. Among the tunes are "The Way You Look Tonight," "The Ruby and the Pearl," "Angel Eyes" and "Love For Sale." Excellent jazz package.



"CARMEN" — Barney Kessel — Contemporary M 3563

Guitarist Kessel fronts a group of leading West Coast musicians in a definitive jazz interpretation of Bizet's famous opera—the first such undertaking. The arrangements are by Kessel, who has scored the music into eight tracks, utilizing three different types of groups—a quintet (Kessel, Victor Feldman, plus rhythm), a woodwind combo and a brass combo. Featured with Kessel are Shelly Manne, Andre Previn, Buddy Collette and Joe Mondragon. A swinging session.



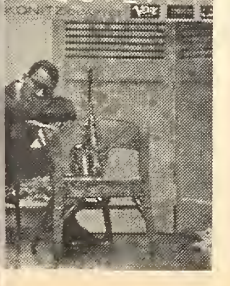
"GYPSY"—Herb Geller and his All-Stars—Atco 33-109 (Monaural & Stereo)

The All-Stars are the Jones brothers, Hank, Thad and Elvin, plus bassist Scott LaFaro. They offer a sparkling interpretation of eight tunes from the musically bright Broadway hit. The addition of young jazz vocalist Barbara Long on "Everything's Coming Up Roses," "Together," "Mama's Talkin' Soft" and "Small World" is a unique departure from the usual album of this sort, and comes off as a refreshing change. Good outing—should fare well.



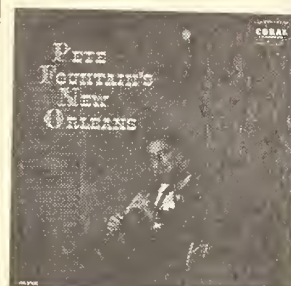
"JO JONES PLUS TWO"—The Jo Jones Trio—Vanguard VRS 8525 & Stereo VSD 2031

Besides the amazing percussion talents of Jones, the trio contains the outstanding brother team of Ray Bryant, piano, and Tommy Bryant, bass. Of the nine numbers played, five are originals by Ray Bryant, the remaining four being loose and free moving improvisations of "Sweet Lorraine," "Old Man River," "Sometimes I'm Happy" and "Satin Doll." Album spotlights one of the all-time leading drummers—should be well received.



"TRANQUILITY" — The Lee Konitz Quartet—Verve MG V-8281

For clear, unaffected, listenable jazz expression, Lee Konitz (alto) stands out as one of the leading figures. Accompanied rhythmically by guitarist Billy Bauer, drummer Dave Bailey and bassist Henry Grimes, Konitz is in a quiet, reflective mood here playing ballads "Memories of You," "People Will Say We're In Love," "The Nearness of You" and "Sunday." One of the best of the "balladeers."



"PETE FOUNTAIN'S NEW ORLEANS"; "THE BLUES"—Pete Fountain—Coral CRL 57282; CRL 57284 (Monaural & Stereo)

After a stint as a featured performer with the Lawrence Welk organization, clarinetist Pete Fountain marks his return to jazz expression with two new Coral decks. On "New Orleans," Fountain heads the usual rhythm section on a lineup of Dixieland standards ("Basin Street," "Tin Roof Blues," "The Saints"). The "Blues" session finds him heading a larger, brassier group on more oldies ("St. Louis Blues," "Memphis Blues," "Wang Wang Blues"). Fountain will be welcomed back to his original habitat; his Welk popularity will add greatly to sales.

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



TCHAIKOVSKY: "Concerto in D Major for Violin and Orchestra"; MENDELSSOHN: "Concerto in E Minor For Violin and Orchestra" — Isaac Stern, violin, Eugene Ormandy conducting the Philadelphia Orchestra — Columbia ML 5379 (Monaural & Stereo)

The pairing of these two concertos enables violinist Stern to exquisitely demonstrate his world-famous virtuosity. The Tchaikovsky was written mainly as a show-piece, and is one of the more difficult of such works, while the Mendelssohn is constructed much more simply. Two masterpieces.



PUCCINI: "Gianni Schicchi"—Tito Gobbi, Victoria de Los Angeles, Orchestra of the Opera House, Rome, conducted by Gabriele Santini—Capitol SGAR 7179 (Monaural & Stereo)

Puccini's one-act comic opera receives its first waxing here, complete on one disk, box packaged and complete libretto (Italian and English) included. Aside from the world famous principals, who turn in outstanding performances, the cast also features Anna Maria Canali and Carlo del Monte. Much awaited-for first release, will be well received.



BEETHOVEN: "Piano Concerto No. 1 in C Major"—Robert Goldsand, pianist, Carl Bamberg conducting the Frankfurt Opera Orchestra—Urania USD 1035 (Monaural & Stereo)

Beethoven's richly assertive score provides an excellent vehicle for the virtuosity of both pianist Goldsand and conductor Bamberg. Fine addition to the work's catalog.



DVORAK: Symphony No. 5 in E Minor ("From The New World")—The Cleveland Orchestra conducted by George Szell—Epic LC 3575 (Monaural & Stereo)

A new recording (March 1959) of Dvorak's "New World Symphony" by Szell and the Cleveland, who have a recording of the work available on Columbia. Recording techniques at Severance Hall, the ork's home, have been much improved and result in a "modern sounding" disk here. A distinguished performance of the oft-recorded piece.



"THE STRING QUARTETS OF FRANZ JOSEPH HAYDN" — The Griller String Quartet — Vanguard VSD 2033 & VSD 2034 (Monaural & Stereo)

Two sets of Haydn's string quartets (same title) are issued by the label and feature one of the world's foremost string quartets, the Griller, in brilliant performance. One set contains Quartets in G Minor, E Flat Major and F Major. The other contains the D Major, B Flat Minor and C Major. For the astute classical mart.

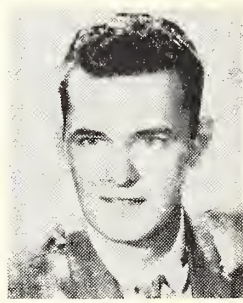

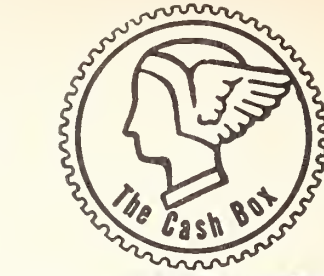

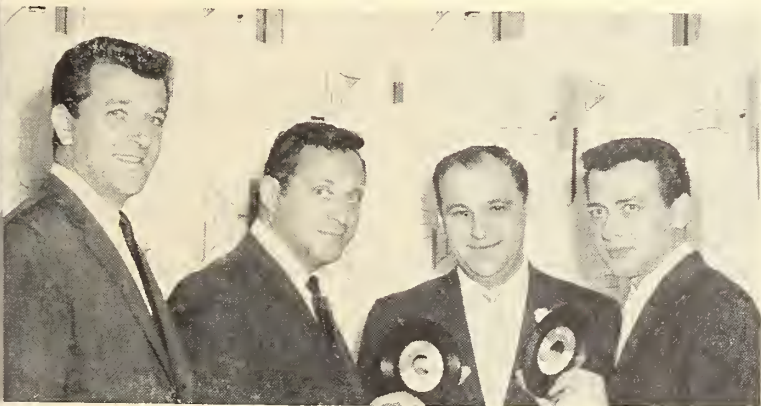

Other important dates include the Dick Clark TV'er this weekend, the Concord Hotel in New York over the Labor Day weekend and a week's engagement at the Three Rivers Inn in Syracuse, N.Y.

Songster's latest issue, a follow-up to his "Dream Lover" smash, is "Mack The Knife," a tune from his successful "That's All" LP which was issued from the album due to deejay plays. Sessions on a new Darin LP are being conducted in Hollywood.

Liberty Releases 2 LP's

LOS ANGELES—Liberty Records has followed its "highly successful" June stereo program with a special two album release last week, it was announced by label veep Al Bennett.

MGM "Profitonic" Plan Gets Overwhelming Distrib Acceptance At Nassau Convention

100% Distribs Go Over Quota As Total Sales Top \$1,300,000

NASSAU, BAHAMAS—When the last MGM distributor boarded his plane after five fun filled days at the British Colonial Hotel, Nassau, Arnold Maxin, president MGM Record Company, stated that his sales force, headed by national sales manager Charles Hasin, had written one and one-third million dollars business for the company's "Profitonic" fall plan. Maxin further predicted that the plan would eventually top two million dollars.

The success of the plan and its acceptance was attested to by the fact that at a planned "beef session" not one distributor showed up although the inducement of refreshments and food was offered. The "beef session" had been widely promoted at meetings as an opportunity for the distributor to get his complaints off his chest.

Highlight of the presentation was the dealer plan with which the distributor will work.

On all purchases of all MGM long-play products (with the exception of Lion) the dealer receives a 20% return privilege.

The return privilege consists of any 12-inch long-play album—any value—any label—for which the dealer receives a credit of \$2.47 per unit.

The dealer must return merchandise covering a full 20% of the purchase to earn the credit.

The dealer receives October 10—November 10—December 10 deferred billing.

This program starts immediately and terminates September 30. Hasin, in describing the plan to the gathering, said, "There is nothing new about many of the features of this plan, but no other company has ever offered so complete a deal with so many extra plusses. Believe me, we had to sharpen our pencil plenty in order to make this plan possible." To clarify the plan Hasin used the following example: "The dealer order totals \$1500. He earns a 20% return privilege—\$300. The \$300 return privilege consists of 121 12-inch long-play albums—any value—any label—for which the dealer receives a credit of \$2.47 per unit."

Utilizing a slide presentation, with the voice of Jerry Marshall, WMGM-New York, telling the story, MGM presented its fall line consisting of eleven MGM albums; one Metrojazz; two Cub albums; two Academy Series (a new deluxe presentation consisting of three records each); and six new Lion albums.

Maxin opened the business meeting with a short speech of welcome and then introduced Charles Hasin who outlined the various features of the plan.

In addition to the dealer plan described above and the releases on the five labels, Hasin also unveiled a big push on thirty-three best all-time sellers.

Harold Drayson, sales manager of Lion Records, talked at length about the Lion product and its planned drive at the dealer and rack jobber. On the subject of the rack jobbers,

Maxin, Hasin and Drayson all made it quite clear, in firm tones, that if the distributor failed to bring in the rack jobber business, MGM would go into the territory direct.

Sol Handwerger, advertising, publicity and exploitation, and Ed Heller, sales promotion manager, handled a co-ordinated presentation of promotion from the dealer and the distributor thru MGM's own plans for consumer and trade publications. Heller urged dealers to take advantage of the materials that MGM was offering and asked for dealer, distributor cooperation with local theatres and newsdealers. Handwerger advised that in addition to trade advertising, a hard-hitting campaign would appear in Playboy, Esquire, New Yorker and Saturday Review. Teenager ads were also planned for the right publications with teen appeal.

Heller also announced a special contest for distributors, salesmen and dealers. The first prize, for the salesman, is a fully equipped Simca Deluxe Sedan. The winning distributor receives a Philco Stereo Console, Miss America model. The winning dealer will be awarded with a Philco Portable TV.

Prizes are awarded on the basis of weighted market averages plus the percentage over quota. All distributors must qualify by first ordering their respective quotas. Salesmen will be asked to keep their itemized sales in duplicate for contest awards.

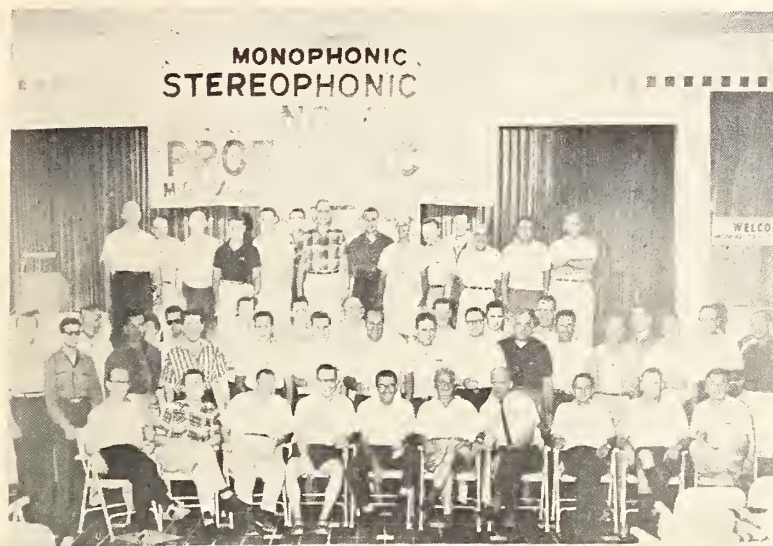

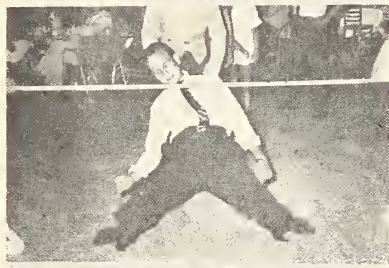

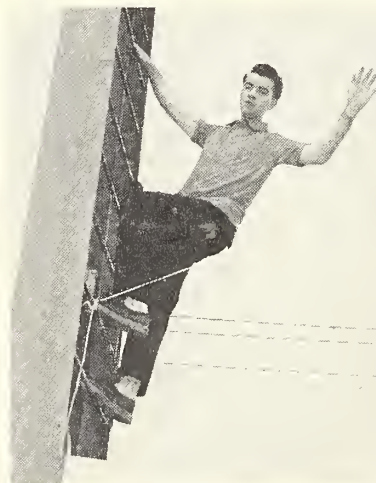
Art Velen, president of Advance, advised that they now have seven men representing the firm in the field. Other merchandise carried includes sound and tape accessories.

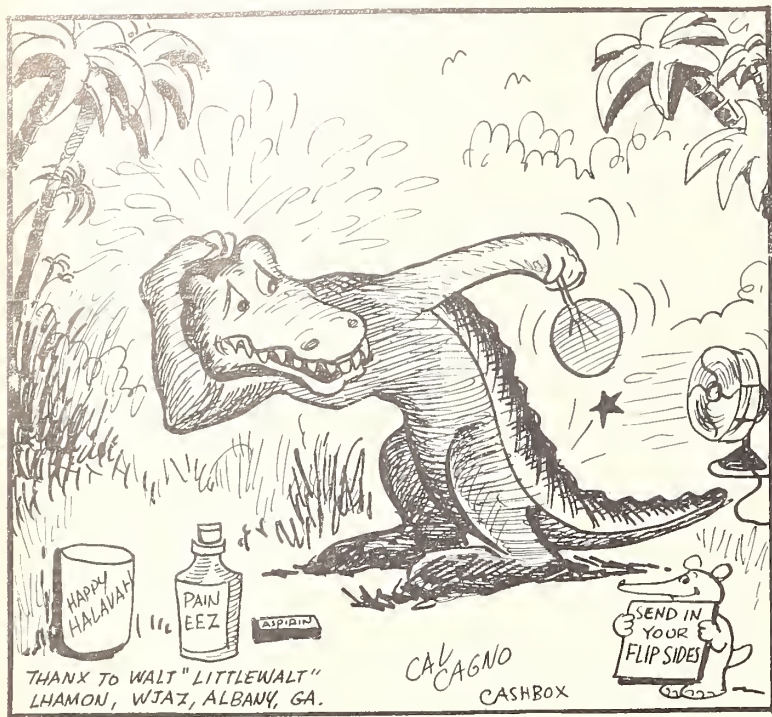

Los Angeles To Get 1st Jazz Fest, Oct. 2 & 3

LOS ANGELES—This city's first annual Jazz Festival will be held at the Hollywood Bowl on the evenings of October 2 and 3, it was announced jointly last week by jazz impresario Hal Lederman, coordinator of the event, and William Severns, general manager of the Hollywood Bowl.

The Jazz Festival, reportedly the first of its type ever presented in this city, represents Los Angeles' initial attempt to spotlight the growth of jazz.

Already contracted for this Fall's festival are the Count Basie orchestra, Joe Williams, Sarah Vaughan, the George Shearing Quintet, the Ahmad Jamal Trio, the Cal Tjader Sextet and the Moder Jazz Quartet, with other greats of the jazz world to be announced at a later date. The eighteen piece Basie band will appear at both evenings' concerts. Programming for the remaining artists is now being set.

Hal Lederman, president of Omega Enterprises, has been responsible for numerous concerts on the East Coast but the Hollywood Bowl is his initial presentation in California.

According to Lederman, "Southern California, though the most logical area in the nation for such an event, has been completely neglected in the

scheduling of a jazz festival. The enormous national and international interest in jazz has created an ever increasing number of festivals throughout the country but October 2 and 3 will be the first such local presentation, representing a vivid cross-section of the nation's leading jazz artists in what has come to be America's most vital contemporary music."

Lederman complimented the Hollywood Bowl on its cooperation and stated he was so impressed with the interest shown on the forthcoming festival that he was already making plans for next year.

"The great figures of jazz, presented with their proper recognition in the beautiful setting of the Hollywood Bowl, should make the first Los Angeles Jazz Festival an annual event of world wide importance," Lederman concluded.

Philco's radio line includes table, clock and transistors models and the company also produces a full line of portable phonographs.

The MGM distributors will be serviced by Philco's regular field force of district representatives and division managers, Mr. Bowes said.

MGM distributors on the second day of the Nassau convention. Len Gross and Jack Kane, Philco, outlined the Philco plan with a slide presentation of the line available to MGM distributors. A complete discussion followed in which all questions were answered. Such topics as financing, territories, advertising local quotas, national advertising with coverage in national consumer magazines, tv programs, etc. were clarified.

A colorful slide presentation with commentary by Len Gross acquainted MGM's distributors with the complete line of radios, radio clocks, and phonographs that they will carry. The line was also on display for actual physical contact and a staff of Philco executives were on hand to answer questions.

It was reported that many MGM distributors signed up with Philco before departing from Nassau.

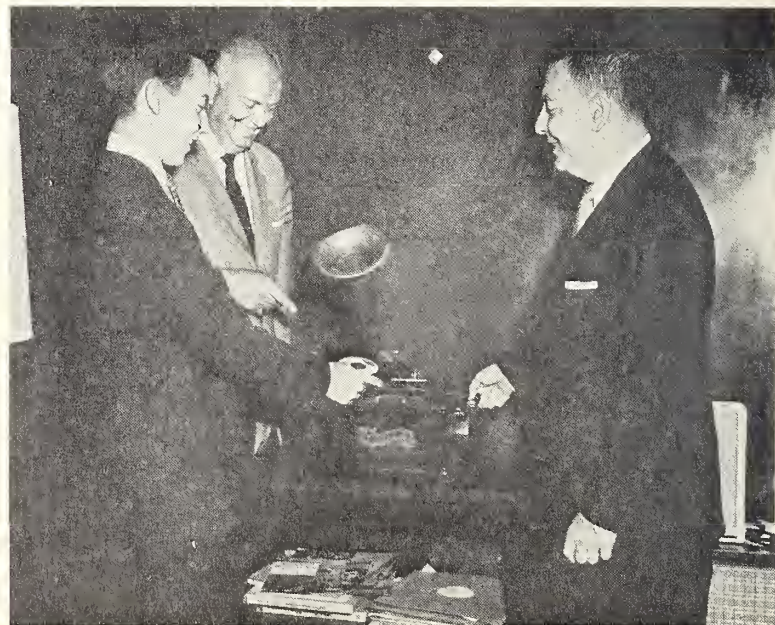

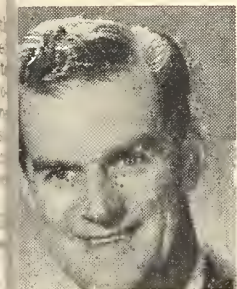

Australian Action

There seems to be quite a stir (in the retail trade) brewing over the fact that one of the record clubs—retailing 12" LP's at 35/—has secured the rights to produce some material from the E.M.I. catalogue. The club announced the forthcoming availability of the disks in several full-page reads in leading daily papers last weekend. It is understood that negotiations granting the material to the club were completed through E.M.I. in England. Artists under this deal include Sir Thomas Beecham, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Alceo Galliera, Claudio Arrau, Walter Susskind, Malczynski and Sir Malcolm Sargent.

A song written about Her Royal Highness, Princess Alexandra, in honor of her forthcoming visit to Australia, by two Queenslanders—composer Clyde Collins and Russ Tyson A.B.C. radio personality, has after considerable correspondence received official Royal approval. The title of the tune is "The Alexandra Waltz" and has been successfully issued this week by the internationally famous Horrie Dargie Quintet as a single on the Columbia label and features the composer, Clyde Collins, at the E.M.I. Hammond Organ. The official letter received by Clyde Collins not only approved the title but also gave permission for a picture of the Princess to be used on the cover of the sheet music. It is felt that the "Alexandra Waltz" could make strong representation in Australia, particularly during the Royal visit which commences in September.

Record pressing companies throughout Australia welcome the report published in the daily press that the huge American B. F. Goodrich Chemical Co. of Cleveland, Ohio has announced that it will build a £2 million plant in Australia producing geon vinyl for record production and other manufacturing uses. The state in which the company will build has not yet been announced.

A new jazz club, The Embers, opens in Melbourne this coming week. The club owners have re-built what was formerly Claridge's night club in South Yarra, a suburb of Melbourne.

The record price war continues with several retail-level reductions announced this week. E.M.I. has brought the stereo disks into line with the monophonic products. Gem Records—low-priced subsidiary of W & G—have hit the market with their second release of five new 12" LP's, including the top-selling American stereo release "The Soul Of Spain" by 101 Strings, to retail at 35/., the lowest priced stereophonic and monophonic 12" range on the open market.

Popular 2UE (Sydney) disk-jockey Tony Withers is the co-writer of a new popsong called "Teenage Baby" which is expected to be just as popular as his two earlier collaborated compositions "The Wild One" and "What D'you Know" both of which did very well locally under records by Johnny O'Keefe.

Headliners Pty. Ltd., which is active in bringing American stars to Australia for concert tours, plans another show for October. American stars include Jimmie Rodgers, Dodie Stevens, Arthur Duncan and The Champs.

For the first time in Australia there is real competition among the major record companies for custom pressing work. Previously all majors had their own factories and did very little outside work. Now, however, several companies, including the new Pye record label, Roulette and the Lee Gordon disk company do not have such facilities, contracts for pressing work are being battled for with unprecedented vigor.

E.M.I.'s Record Promotion Manager Joe Loufer is now in his second year running his own 15-minute TV feature under the title of "Jazz College" on Sydney's TCN-9. In this short but concise program, Joe discusses different facets of jazz and its varied styles and introduces teenage groups of jazz enthusiasts to provide the illustrations, together with records. At a recent session the guest artist was the noted tenor and bassoon star Erroll Buddle, who will be well remembered in America for his work with the Australian Jazz Quintet.

Jack Argent, No. 1 man of Leeds Music Pty. Ltd., has his publishing house presented with four Australian compositions on the 2UE Top 40. "Pathway to Paradise", "Why Do They Doubt Our Love", "(Rockin' Rollin') Clementine" and "I Wanna Love You". Southern Music also has a big local success in a number called "Doreen".

W & G Records is embarking on a solid promotion drive in connection with a new item entitled "Chartsville Boogie Rock" and Ron Gillespie, W & G manager, reports that initial sales and disk-jockey reaction is sufficient to indicate sure success. The song is recorded by The Four Hounds and has already jumped into several radio station hit charts.

The battle for top-selling single honors is a close race between Johnny Horton's "Battle Of New Orleans", "Personality" by Lloyd Price, Stonewall Jackson's "Waterloo" and "Lonely Boy" by Paul Anka.

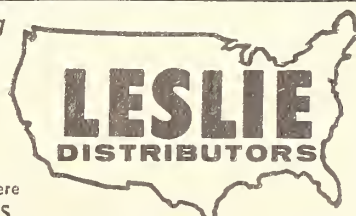

CHICAGO—The various facets of Mercury Records' concerted program of expansion in all phases of manufacture and marketing in both the national and international fields has caused president Irving B. Green to make this commentary: "Our general over-all expansion plan during the past months, and for the years ahead, has been designed not only to reflect Mercury's sharp increase in volume, but is also in support of the growth of the recording industry itself, and what appears to be its unlimited potential.

"Now in progress is an extensive recording program by Mercury in all foreign countries. Under the supervision of A&R director Art Talmadge we are applying our own progressive techniques to record the music and songs indigenous to each of the international locales. In this way we can hold the quality to the known levels of American manufacture while reproducing the flavor and character of the music each country knows best. Since early June our sound-trucks have been in Europe—currently they are in Brascia, and Milan, Italy, recording, in collaboration with Ricordi, various Italian operas for Mercury's 'Living Presence' classical series."

Mercury's album releases for August number thirty-three, all in stereo and monaural. Scheduled for release,

Still other phases of internal expansion are the enlargement of Mercury's home base to additional space in the Pure Oil Building in Chicago and the complete renovation and redecorating of all offices. Added improvements feature the latest techniques in punch-card and machine accounting systems. Irwin Steinberg, Mercury Records' treasurer, said, "We are increasing our home-office facilities not only to improve parent corporation operation but to handle foreign corporate matters, as well as to centrally administer Mercury's company-owned distribution offices located in various parts of this country."

MGM Pics & Cole Settle

NEW YORK—The MGM Pictures-Comet Music-Capitol Records dispute over the use of "Sweet Bird Of Youth" as the title of a song has been settled. Comet is the publisher of the song and Capitol Records cut Nat "King" Cole on it.

MGM Pictures brought action against Comet and Capitol when it objected to the use of the title, which is the title of the Tennessee Williams play MGM owns the screen rights for, and which MGM will film next year. MGM cancelled a cease and desist order against distribution of the Capitol deck when it was agreed that the voice of Cole could be used on the soundtrack of the film, should MGM desire to do so, singing either the present "Sweet Bird Of Youth" or some other song.

Mogull Aids Merrill

NEW YORK—Ivan Mogull, head of Ivan Mogull Music (ASCAP) and Harvard Music (BMI) last week announced that he will take up additional duties as general professional manager for writer Bob Merrill's publishing firm, Valyr Music.

Mogull said he is now in the process of securing recordings on Valyr's next Broadway show score, "Take Me Along," the musical version of Eugene O'Neil's "Ah, Wilderness," music and lyrics by Merrill. RCA Victor has already acquired the original cast album of the show, which opens in New York on October 19. Show stars Jackie Gleason, Walter Pidgeon, Eileen Hurley, Ruth Warwick and Robert Morse.

The move to larger quarters was necessitated by the projected expansion of the 20th Fox operation. Plans call for a step-up of album production.

CHICAGO—With its "Big 8," a fall phonograph cartridge promotion, Jensen Industries is offering dealers a free stock cabinet in combination with the eight most popular crystal cartridges.

A bonus to dealers worth \$9 retail, the two-drawer case has room for a total of 36 cartridges when full. A placard in the bottom of each compartment comes into view as each phono part is sold, simplifying retailer's stock control.

Jensen estimates that 90 per cent of the dealer's crystal cartridge calls can be met with the eight assorted units contained in the "Big 8." Each cartridge is fitted with a matching needle which insures superior sound reproduction in any player or hi fi system.

In selecting the eight cartridge types

for the new promotion, the F. Park, Illinois, firm analyzed the frequent requests of servicemen record retailers for replacements, though Jensen now produces more than 50 cartridge types, most customer demands fall within the B group.

The Jensen cabinet is modular design, which means that it can be combined with similar units to form a stock case of any height desired. The conception of public officials, legislators, music collection agencies, and a certain group of unsavory characters—which has filtered thru to the general public—is that those in the coin machine business earn tremendous amounts of money.

This spectre was probably created years ago by the individuals operating slot machines, further emphasized by movies, radio and television fiction.

With the development of the business over these past many years, the entire picture has changed. But no one has made any effort to inform the world. They've taken the abuse—shuddered—and hoped it would pass over and be forgotten.

Unfortunately this hasn't happened. If anything, in the past few years the situation has become worse—to a point where it is now unbearable, morally and financially.

Every agency—public and private—wants to dip their fingers into the "rich" coinman's till. And, of course, the money isn't there.

Were these agencies aware of the truthful financial condition of the operator, they would shy away from him like the plague. They could realize there must be other sources available, which would be many times more lucrative.

However, the condition exists today—and the coin machine industry must refute the myth. To do so, engagements on a number of fronts are now necessary—all costing money. The members of

the industry must engage legal talent to defend themselves against unfair and confiscatory taxes. They must defend themselves against private agencies who are spending fortunes to cut into an already depleted revenue. They must fight off hoodlums who have been led to believe fast, easy money is ripe for the picking. They must spend innumerable hours before "investigating committees".

These defenses create a tremendous problem. How can the industry accumulate the necessary funds to defend itself? The average operator, the small businessman, who works hard and long hours, just makes a nice living. He cannot employ a lawyer to defend him against any specific abuse, nor can he afford to retain one on an annual basis, to "lobby" against discriminatory taxation. He moans when the taxes are effected—but pays them. He cannot fight off hoodlumism by himself. He cannot, in most instances, devote the time and money to acquaint the press, public and legislators about his business and personal integrity.

Then—how can he stand off, or protect himself against these abuses?

He can, by joining with his fellow operators, and thru combined efforts and nominal expenditures, try to ward off these many problems hitting at him—and then at the same time use these offices to show himself off in a true light. These efforts will take time—maybe years. But if the members of the industry start now, maybe in a few years, they may be successful in having the true story of the coin machine industry reach the public and the government officials.

NEW YORK STATE PR PROGRAM READY AS FUND DRIVE STARTS

Coinmen To Sponsor "Juke Box Jamboree"

NEW YORK—The Public Relations Committee of the New York State Coin Machine Association held its regular meeting Wednesday evening, August 5, at the offices of the Music Operators of New York, Inc. During the session several items on the agenda were discussed and the group continued to make progress, as it has since its inception only two months ago, in the direction of creating a true picture of the coin machine industry in New York State.

Chairman Al "Senator" Bodkin opened the meeting with a step by step analysis of the operator mailing that is scheduled to be launched this week, soliciting five dollars from each operator in N.Y. State plus contributions of whatever amount the coinmen wish to donate. The money will be used for a program currently being presented to Mr. Fahey, director of public relations for the Police Athletic League.

"I will propose a monthly social for the youngsters belonging to P.A.L., and to be sponsored by the coin machines industry of New York State," stated Bodkin. "We intend to call the functions, the 'Juke Box Jamboree', and we will feature refreshments, a juke box with all of the top records, and whatever else is necessary to provide an evening's entertainment for the kids. In this way, we hope to establish ourselves, eventually, as an industry that has a good side, and that the good side is a reflection of the majority of coinmen in the State," continued Bodkin.

Bodkin was given free rein to handle the program with the P.A.L. authorities, after a motion from the floor. "I will respect the authority the committee has given me, and I will strive to get the very best deal possible for the coin machine industry, always with an eye to the public relations goal we have in mind," said Bodkin.

Several events of the evening included a vote of support for the public relation committee from the Upstate New York coin associations, in the received during the meeting and the treasury, before a formal solicitation of funds, totaled several hundred dol-

Amelia McCarthy advised that as soon as the operator mailing goes out she will follow it up with a reminder notice to all of the operators in the upstate area. "I think this move will help familiarize the operators with the program and stress the importance of support from every coinman in the upstate area," stated Mrs. McCarthy.

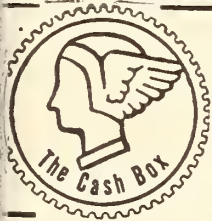

Frankfort Fair Looks To Attendance From Coinmen Around World

GREAT BRITAIN GLIMPSES

A large contingent of British coin machine people is expected to visit Frankfort Fair, at Frankfort, Germany, scheduled for Aug. 30th through 3rd. Music, games and vending machines from European manufacturers, as well as several American manufacturers will be displayed. The fair will be the first coin convention to be held in Germany in three years. The attention committee, under the direction of Herr Fischer, points out that German export figures for coin machines indicate that the future of the coin industry in Germany is most optimistic. Visitors are expected from nearly every country in Europe and from other continents. Reports from America indicate that large groups of American coinmen are also expected to attend. . . . Dodgem Cars, made by Whittaker Bros. (Shaw) Ltd., have been fitted with coin chutes, as originally demonstrated by the firm at the Amusement Trades Exhibition, in London, are now in operation at Black's Olympia and Southsea. . . . An American ball gum manufacturing company is moving into the British market almost at once and will offer products for ball gum venders which have not previously been available here. The firm is Leaf Sales. They claim to have sold three million pounds weight of products on the Continent of Europe last year. They have flown American planes to a new factory in the Kilcock district of Dublin where they will produce ball gum for export to every country in the world, other than America, at highly competitive prices. Sales to all these territories will be controlled from London, where a staff is being established at Leaf Sales Ltd., Clarence House, Archer Street, London W.1. Among the products they will offer will be their unique hollow ball gum (with a bigger ball for the same price) which they have offered for eight years elsewhere. The British concern will be Alphonse den Ouden from Antwerp, director of the company. Marshall Leaf of the American company will be in London this week. . . . American Steel Export Company, Inc., Seeber representatives, have agreed to terms with The Ditchburn Organization, whereby Ditchburn will distribute the Seeburg line in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. (See separate story elsewhere in this issue.)

M.O.N.Y. Consents To Restraining Order

NEW YORK—The Music Operators of New York, Inc., this city, consented without admitting to any guilt, to a Supreme Court order restraining it from engaging in monopolistic practices, it was reported last week by Al Denver, president of the Association. There was no trial or adjudication in the courts.

In a final judgment to an action started April 29, Justice Charles Loreto empowered the Attorney General, Louis J. Lefkowitz, to dissolve the corporation should it violate any of the provisions of the Donnelly Act, the New York State anti-trust law.

The final judgment prohibits M.O.N.Y. from maintaining any system of registration of customers, allocating customers, prohibiting members from soliciting customers, adjusting operator disputes, or requiring the use of M.O.N.Y. labels on music machines.

"The Music Operators of New York, Inc. is primarily a trade association

and will continue to fulfill its duties and functions in servicing its members," advised Denver.

NEW YORK—Still pending as part of Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz' action against the coin machine industry, is a similar Supreme Court action against the Associated Amusement Machine Operators of New York, Inc., local games association.

Assistant Attorney General Harry C. Fischer said A.A.M.O.N.Y. faces charges of monopolistic practices, with a case up for trial during the fall term of court.

Trieman Leaves Natl. Rejector

ST. LOUIS, MO.—Ray Gottfried, vice-president and general manager, National Rejectors, Inc., this city, announced effective August 1, 1959, Claud Trieman, general sales manager, will no longer be with the firm.

"We regret the resignation of Claud Trieman and request that in the interim, matters normally directed to Trieman be channeled to Norman Burzen or Tom Flick."

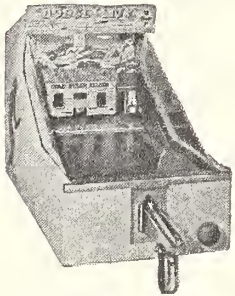

Summer Season Perks As Music, Games and Cigs Sell

EASTERN FLASHES

Business generally this summer season carries all of the optimistic sign that indicate a successful operating period. Of course, arcade and resort ops have reported, almost since the start of the Spring, that business has never been so good. Weekenders at seashore spots have continued to pack the resort areas, week after week, helping the hot July 4th weekend turn into solid foundation for general summer business. Atlantic City, Asbury Park and similar seashore playlands are SRO on the beaches and, more important, the boardwalks, every weekend. Upstate operators report that the mountain resorts, including the biggest and the not so big, cater to the fun houses every weekend, with several ops commenting that the high price hostelries casually turn away reservation requests for even the \$150 per week fun houses. The money is definitely around, regardless of its source, whether it is the result of planned savings, or planned financing. Retail store sales in the city are high, construction is at its peak, and even the clubs in New York report top name attractions during steamy summer months. With unanimous reports from the critics as to the bad quality of summer TV, it will remain to be seen as to its effect on the stay-at-home viewer, who might have been nudged out of the house and into the local taverns. While stereophonic music is moving steadily, and definitely here to stay, it appears that the monaural units will continue to represent a good portion of sales in this area. Stereo recordings, released by record manufacturers slowly but surely, have gained momentum, and will continue to pick up until such time as several factors (retail sales, quantity sales to coin ops, general record distributor practice) make the stereo single the logical record to stock. Collection reports from areas of the country show tremendous gains in stereo installations with reports of 100% and 200% increases in collections. Most reports are from ops willing to invest in the "complete stereophonic system", namely, sufficient speakers and wallboxes to showcase stereo sound in its very best form.

Cigarette ops are faced once again with a flood of new brands onto the market, which must be sold through machines that cannot accommodate even the number of brands already available today. Selective merchandising and shrewd elimination, with every single cost factor being taken into consideration, resulting in the fractional difference in profit being the reason for, what might appear to be a good move, being cast aside in favor of a better move and the profit difference being a fraction of one percent to the op. But in the small percentage that could spell success, if taken into consideration all along the line, from product to sale, and the many facets that enter into the sale of a product to a most discriminatory consumer. Merchandising the answer for cigarette ops, and the sooner the op realizes the steps necessary to capitalize on proven techniques of selling this same public, the sooner he will join the millions of successful businessmen in the nation who have long since contended with and solved similar problems in their own industry.

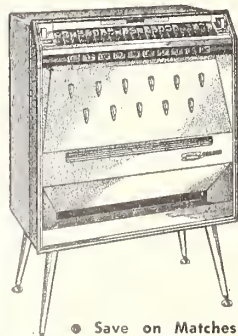

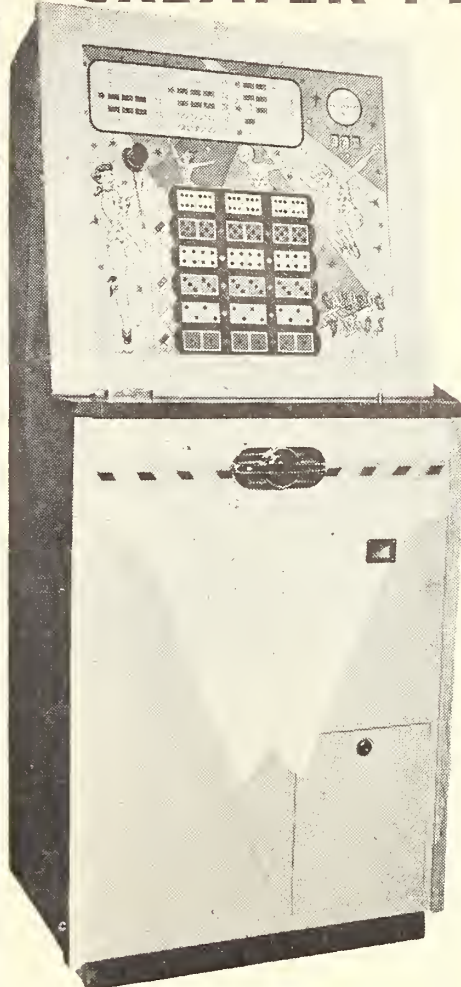

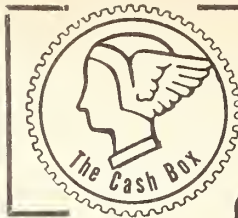

CALIFORNIA CLIPPINGS

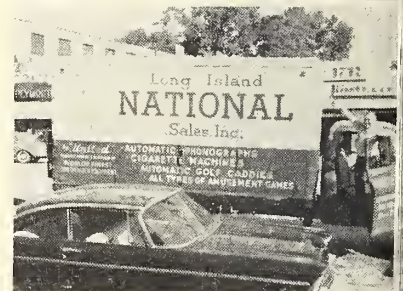

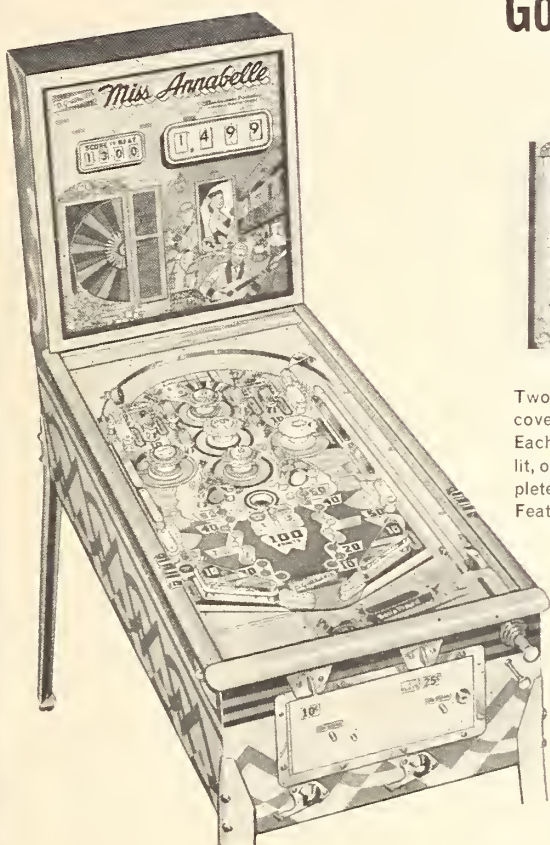

Only 16,000 Music Machines In Britain

Possible 100,000 Locations Without Automatic Music

LONDON, ENGLAND—There are over 16,000 juke boxes in Britain, according to The World's Fair, coin machine trade publication. This publication states that the saturation point is far from view, with the possibility of 100,000 locations suitable for music machines.

With the expansion of juke box operations, it is also predicted by this British publication that amusement machines will also be suitable for setting in these locations.

Once the outlet for thousands of machines (before the War) England's coin machine business has been retarded from gaining its complete coverage by the country's rebuilding program and the barrier set up against import of equipment from the United States.

At this time England has removed the restrictions on the imports of juke boxes, and will permit license to import amusement machines not available from English manufacturers. This latest move, coupled with the establishment of manufacture of American products in England, gives the coin trade the inspiration and ability to expand its activities.

The complete cycle will be reached when the British government will permit American firms to ship its new and used amusement machines into the country.

Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

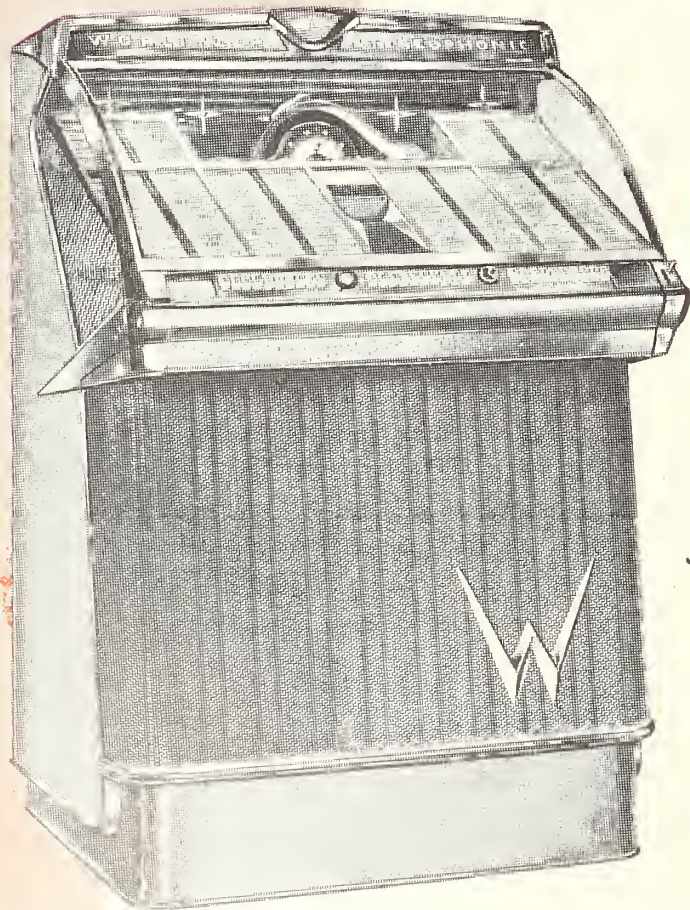
