A Challenge For Retail

There's more to business these days than just records. More than ever, record merchants continue to be in the home entertainment business. 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ON THE COVER

Continuing the chart-climbing momentum set in motion 20 years ago, legendary recording artist Diana Ross scores again with her new LP for RCA, "Swept Away." The single of the same name, already listed at #25 on the **Cash Box** Top 100 singles chart, is a prime example of the new dance sound from this incomparable performer.



As the leader of the most popular girl group in recording history and as one of the founders of the original "Motown sound," Ross is much more than a symbol of nostalgia. Coming back year after year with fresh material, a new image and enduring talent, the Ross name has become synonymous with professionalism in the music industry.

Crossing over into film, Ross was nominated for an Academy Award as Best Actress in 1972 for *Lady Sings the Blues*. Ross' recent record-breaking engagement at Radio City Music Hall is further testament to the ongoing popularity of the artist and her music, another landmark in a career that has seen more #1 hit singles than any performer but Elvis Presley and The Beatles.

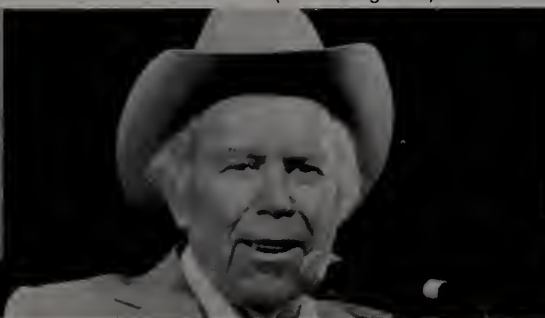

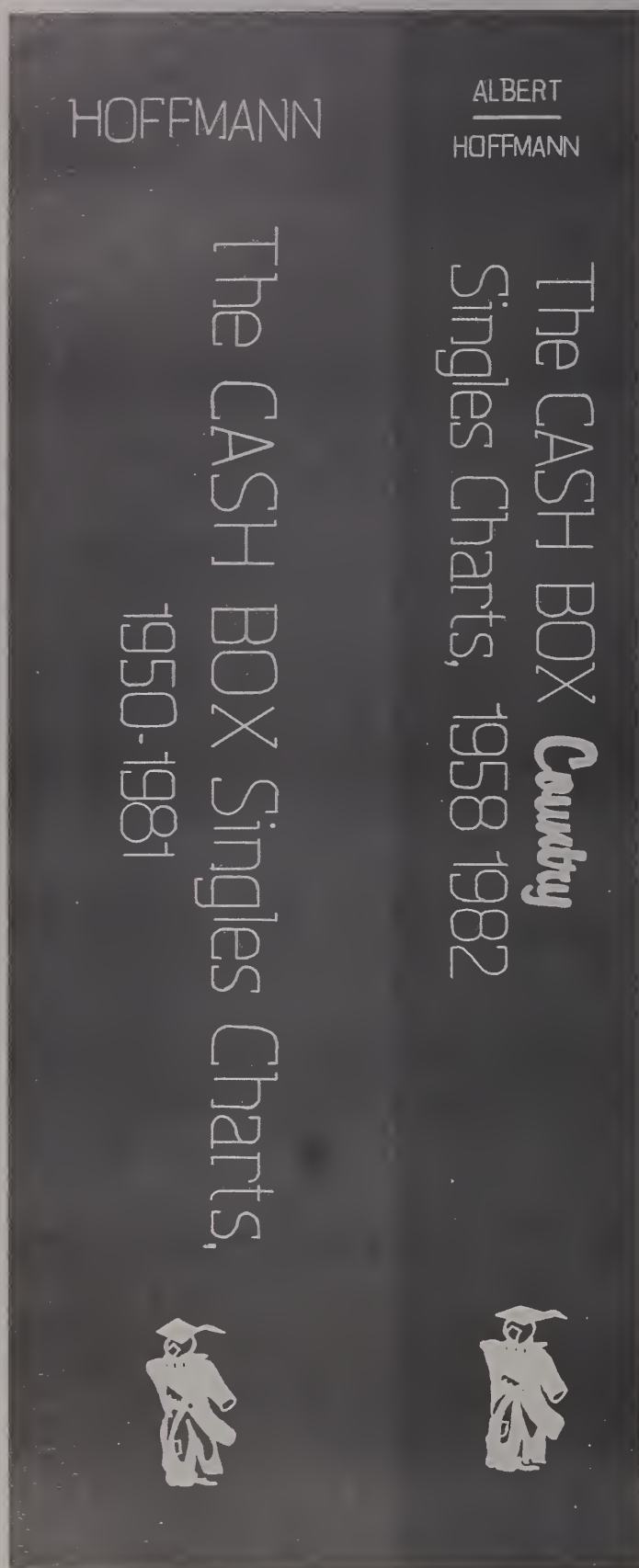

NEW YORK — Much of the second, third and fifth floors of the New York Hilton were transformed into a vast technological wonderland last week when over 2,000 professional audio engineers and enthusiasts jammed the hotel for the 76th Audio Engineering Society convention.

The seminar, held October 8-11, offered the world's largest display of professional audio recording equipment as well as a wide range of technical papers, workshops and instructional briefings. Topics ranging

from "computers in audio" to "digital systems interface" to the economics of running a recording studio to such "primitive" topics as "digital signal processing" were available to the largely technically-oriented crowd.

Over 175 exhibitors displayed every type of single processing equipment imaginable and some not. By far, the most popular exhibits were those dealing with digital synthesizers and music systems. Synclavier's exhibit hall was among the

CBS Study Shows Copyright Infringement Major Concern

NEW YORK — According to a report released by CBS Inc., U.S. communications executives consider copyright infringement to be the major international trade problem facing U.S. motion picture and television, prerecorded entertainment, publishing and advertising industries.

The report, entitled *Trade Barriers to U.S. Motion Picture and Television, Prerecorded Entertainment, Publishing and Advertising Industries*, is based on interviews with over 60 industry and trade association executives. It is the first report to lay out trade restrictions to these industries in order of priority and on a country-by-country basis.

Said CBS chairman and chief executive officer Thomas H. Wyman, "CBS recommends that the U.S. include intellectual property issues, including copyright, within the General Agreements on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) rules. This recommendation does not denigrate U.S. efforts in other service trade areas, but identifies which U.S. negotiating effort could most benefit the motion picture and television, prerecorded entertainment, publishing and advertising industries."

Investigative Firm Established To Combat Counterfeiting

LOS ANGELES — The increasing concern of all facets of the business community over the proliferation of counterfeit product on the market has led to the formation of Commercial Counterfeit Control Inc. According to the company's president, the Los Angeles-based firm has been formed, "to preserve the reputations

and business of a wide range of industries by cutting off the sources of counterfeit and unlicensed goods."

The company was formed by Jack Fox, who spent years as director of licensing for Mattel Toys. Before joining Mattel, Fox was an investigative reporter for a number of publications including the *New York Post*. According to Fox, "the Commercial

CBS Records Posts 3rd Qtr. Profits

NEW YORK — CBS/Records group profits rose 52 percent on a revenue increase of 15 percent, according to CBS Inc.'s quarterly report. The Records group's revenues were \$16.3 million, up from \$10.7 million for the same period last year. CBS/Broadcast Group profits rose 34 percent on a revenue increase of 16 percent in the quarter, thanks in large part to "the strong performance of CBS Television Network." The Broadcast revenues rose to \$64.8 million, up from \$48.2 million last year.

NEW YORK — The 27th Annual Grammy Awards ceremonies will be telecast Feb. 26 on the CBS Television Network, it was announced by Mike Melvoin, President of the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences, which presents the annual awards, and by Pierre Cossette, of Pierre Cossette Productions, executive producer of the program. The three-hour special (8-11 PM, ET) will reveal the Grammy Award winners in 69 categories and will be presented live from the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles. Nominations for this year's Grammy Awards will be announced Thursday, Jan. 10.

NEW YORK — Leonard Feist will step down as president of the National Music Publishers' Association Dec. 31, after 18 years with the organization. Synclavier Debuts In N.Y.

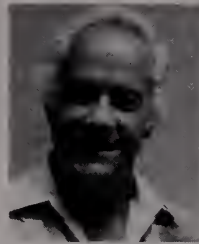

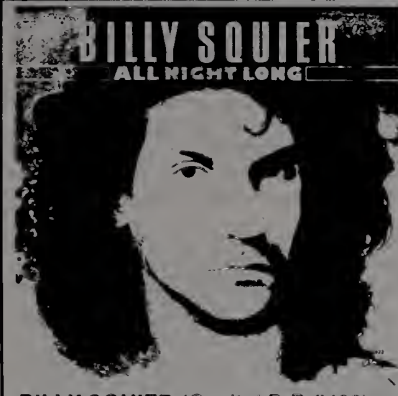

Meaningful words dealing with survival accompany a singable, vibrant tune and point to likely success for this single.

From the album "Warrior" and following the hit single of the same name, Scandal is in fine form again with this uplifting dance tune. Patty Smyth offers a thoroughly captivating and commanding lead vocal and is backed by strong, rich, harmonic voicings. The tune itself, dealing with the fear of losing love, never totally takes off and is marked by a certain redundancy, but still is a pulsating piece boosted by excellent vocals and tracks.

This amazing collectors package of six albums which include Sun session outtakes, various rare concert recordings and a host of television recordings contains a myriad of classic performances. From Presley's fluid reading of "Harbor Lights" to the audience-hysterical Tupelo concert to the later years — which include interviews and outtakes — the album is an amazing historical perspective on the man that changed the face of popular music.

OPEN MIND — Jean-Luc Ponty — Atlantic 80185-1 — Producer: J.L. Ponty — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

Jean-Luc Ponty, famed internationally for his unique blends of jazz, rock and classical music is back with another strong effort. As writer, orchestrator, producer and violinist, Ponty clearly puts heart and soul into all his works, and it certainly pays off in this LP. With the emphasis almost exclusively on jazz, these six pieces all share an ethereal, airy and futuristic quality, particularly so with Ponty's electric violin usually playing in the foreground. All the cuts have a light, seemingly improvised sound, though Ponty usually writes out every part in detail. Enhanced by the talents of George Benson and Chick Corea on two songs, this LP should do very well on A/C stations and at the retail level as well. A definite winner.

WOMAN IN FLAMES — Champaign — Columbia FC 39365 — Producer: Champaign — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

Skillfully combining pop and funk styles, Champaign offers eight well-produced and performed songs in this latest effort. The songs, all written by the bandmembers, are energetic and dance oriented. One of the strongest tunes, "Off and On Love" is currently number 33 in the B/C charts. The other songs run the gamut from the sensual and melodic "Be Mine Tonight" to the driving and dramatic title cut, "Woman In Flames." The bandmembers, as writers, producers and performers should easily please old listeners and readily gain new ones.

MIDNIGHT MISSION — The Textones — Gold Mountain 86010 — Producers: Brad Gilderma-Barry Goldberg — List: 8.98

Transplanted from Austin, TX to Los Angeles, Carla Olson has created a substantial following with her rough-edged and gutsy vocals and country rock 'n' roll songwriting. Addressing herself to the realities of love and life, Olson and her top-notch band recall the heart and soul of Bruce Springsteen and The Band on such cuts as the title track, "Hands Of The Working Man," "Number One Is To Survive" and the previously unreleased Bob Dylan track "Clean Cut Kid." Excellent lead guitar from George Callins and Olson's own honky-tonk vocals highlight this gem.

SHOUT — Devo — Warner Bros. 25097-1 — Producers: Devo — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

The kings of techno-wave are back with "Shout" which reestablishes the group as the central purveyors of some of the funniest and most socially astute music around. The album centers on the battle cry title track which calls on people to live with a sense of enthusiasm and finally reaches its parameters with the surprise cover of Jimi Hendrix's "Are You Experienced?" Though the group often leans too heavily on one sound, their writing and heavily synthesized execution is creative and flawless.

U2 (Island 7-99704)

Pride (In The Name of Love) (3:45) (Island Music/BMI) (U2) (Producers: Brian Eno-Daniel Lanois)

This rousing anthem from U2 has already started its assault on the pop charts, and with its powerful vocal and guitar tracks "Pride" is guaranteed to do well on CHR radio and on AOR. Bono's writing and vocal delivery are pure inspiration as is the pounding rhythm section. Keeping the band's tradition of cut-to-the-bone lyrics alive, the theme is lifted even higher on this cut by Eno and Lanois' deft production, which is both subtle and hard-rocking. An off-the-bat winner which will rally U2 a new army of fans.

UB40 (A&M-2681)

If It Happens Again (3:39) (New Claims (UB40) (Producers: UB40-Howard Gray)

After the multi-market success of last year's "Labour Of Love" LP, UB40 is set for wide success with this distinctive track. While still grasping the group's trademark reggae roots, "If It Happens Again" also injects a tasteful harmony vocal mix and a thoroughly danceable beat. Sure to be a new music and college radio winner, the single should also continue to break UB40 into the AOR, B/C and dance markets. Irresistible melody and a pop-oriented Jamaican groove drive this track all the way through.

FREE FLIGHT (Palo Alto 7075)

Norwegian Wood (3:10) (Maclen Music/BMI) (Lennon-McCartney) (Producer: Stanley Clarke)

West coast jazz/fusion masters Free Flight take this classic Lennon melody and turn it into a burning and velvety instrumental tour de force. Bright flute line holds the basic line while a flying bass/drums track works the tune into a sweat. Clarke's production is as probing and effective as always on this cut which has a bright future on both the A/C and urban stations. Excellent musicianship throughout and a superb choice of material.

FRANKIE GOES TO HOLLYWOOD (Island 7-99695)

Two Tribes (3:20) (Perfect Songs Ltd./BMI) (Gill Johnson-O'Toole) (Producer: Trevor Horn)

The band, the song and its video have already gained a huge chunk of media attention, but now the original 7" version of "Two Tribes," which entered the British charts at #1 earlier this year, has been released and its frenetic pace is heating up the airwaves. A more scintillating anti-war track than Culture Club's latest single, "Two Tribes" is both an effective dance cut and a piece of modern art. Trevor Horn's production is notable for its seamless and dramatic instrumentation.

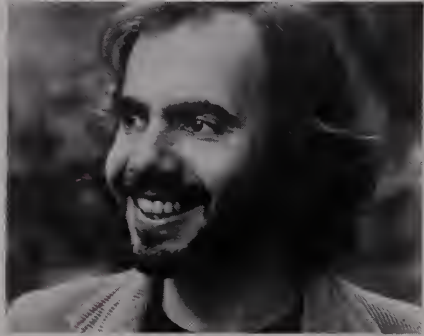
BANGLES (Columbia 38-04634)

Going Down To Liverpool (3:19) (Megasongs Ltd.) (Rew) (Producer: David Kahne)

The establishment of the Bangles as an independent and powerful rock force finally came with the dramatic "Hero Takes A Fall," and now the band shows another dimension of itself on this mid-tempo rocker that puts the accent on vocal and musical layers and strong songwriting. Not overpowering, but it hits the mark with just the right combination of '60s groovin' and '80s syncopation. Nice Stephen Stills-ish melody is broken up by thickly threaded guitar riffing and soulful backing vocals.

TRIBUTE TO AN AMERICAN FOLK POET — Longtime folk singer, songwriter **Steve Goodman** died in late September after a lengthy bout with acute leukemia. Veteran of the local club circuit from the late 60s, Goodman is probably best known for penning the classic "City Of New Orleans" which **Arlo Guthrie** originally made a hit and with which **Willie Nelson** is now enjoying success. A tribute to Goodman was recently scheduled and it will include many of the top names in the recording industry. **Jackson Browne, Randy Newman, John Prine, Jimmy Buffett, Nelson, Jethro Burns, Rosanne Cash, Emmylou Harris, Kris Kristofferson, J. D. Souther, Martin Mull, George Carlin** and many other special guests will be on hand at the Pacific Amphitheater November 3 for this special tribute. While Goodman never achieved the public notoriety that came to many of his performing comrades, followers of the folk scene and musicians from every kind of music knew of and respected Goodman's wry sense of humor and prolific and sensitive songwriting ability. All proceeds from the tribute go to leukemia research.

of love that is at once a jazz retrospective extraordinaire and an educational set of music captured at the famed Monterey festival. Featuring performances by everyone from **Cannonball Adderly** to **Dizzy Gillespie** to **Elvin Jones** to **Joe Zawinul**, the album captures the evolution of the music form over a span of 22 years. Wong noted, "Once I proposed the idea and got permission, there was an amazing amount of sifting through tapes and working out of the many royalties-rights details." While albums had been made of parts of the festival in the past, the music was never uniformly recorded and stored away each year. Wong explained that the festival had a volunteer archivist named **Chase Weaver** who had kept the many tapes in some semblance of order and helped him tremendously in organizing the music. "I finally had narrowed it down to about 50 candidates for the album, but I didn't have anything from the first year of the festival, 1958. By coincidence, my brother ran across a guy who said he had all the original tapes from that year." It turned out to be **Pete Hammer**, curator for Ampex in Redwood City, California. The story goes that Ampex had some new and sophisticated recorders that it wanted to try out and the testing ground was the 1958 Monterey Jazz Festival. None of the tapes had ever been released and along with the one cut from 1958 that appears on "Jazz Monterey," the tapes also capture one of **Billie Holiday's** last live performances — but that's another story. Including performances from many different years, the two-album set is a tribute to Dr. Wong's determination and to the festival's founder and general manager, **Jimmy Lyons**. The other nice thing is that like Palo Alto Records' **Bill Evans** collection, the proceeds from the album go to charity, in this case to the jazz education program of the Monterey Jazz Festival. If you don't know already, then buy the album and give it a listen because the program is a very worthy cause.

THE STAPLES ARE BACK! — With their cover of the **Talking Heads'** "Slippery People" gaining B/C and assorted CHR airtime as well as good coverage in the dance clubs, the legendary Staple Singers are back in force. Taken from their upcoming Private I/CBS disc "The Turning Point," the single sounds as if the Staples should have written it. . . and the Heads' **David Byrne** attributes the song's genesis to "church folk acting crazy" and "when the spirit hits you." **Mavis Staple's** lead vocal and the call and response with **Papa Staple** recalls the family's classic soul tracks of the '60s and '70s which included "Respect Yourself" and "I'll Take You There."

NO VOID HERE — **Romeo Void's** recent L.A. appearances at the Palace proved once and for all that the five-piece San Francisco group is not a one-hit wonder — "Never Say Never." The SRO crowd's loud and enthusiastic reception of the group and the band's dynamic and varied show fulfilled all expectations and more. Vocalist **Deborah Iyall** and saxophonist **Benjamin Bossi** provided the central excitement as the group worked through material off of their debut EP and their latest 415/Columbia disc. The tracks "Talk Dirty To Me" and "A Girl In Trouble (Is A Temporary Thing)" were highlights and it's obvious that the band is here to stay.

CLOSE TO THE EDIT — Another Palo Alto Records artist, **Dianne Reeves**, was in town recently and gave a powerful performance at Concerts By The Sea. Reeves' elastic vocals covered the musical gamut from jazz to soul to pop. A touching "My Funny Valentine" highlighted the set. . . **Lee Ritenour** will be at the Roxy Oct. 15, 22, 29 and Nov. 5. . . **At My Place** is celebrating its third anniversary, congratulations! . . . **Ella Fitzgerald** will be at the Fairmont Hotel's Venetian Room Nov. 6 and **McCoy Tyner** will be at the venue Dec. 4-9. . . **Bruce Springsteen's** seven L.A. dates at the Sports Arena were sold out in less than eight hours. One hundred and ten thousand tickets worth more than \$1,750,000 were sold.

NEW FACES TO WATCH

"It's something that we can live with and we won't throw up when we hear it 20 years later," says Nic North about "Deal With It," the latest Mercury/Virgin album from Comateens.

Comateens — currently Nic North, bass and vocals; Lyn Byrd, synthesizer and vocals; and Oliver North, guitar and vocals — have been through a lot since 1978. They've changed personnel, they've changed from using a live drummer to using a rhythm box to using a live drummer and back again and they came close to throwing in the towel in 1981. However, Oliver and France came to the rescue. Oliver said, "Let's give it one more shot." They did, Cachalot Records picked up on the band and they, in Nic's words, "ended up going to play in France. And we met with immediate success in France. So far, we've done four tours of France."

"And this success we've had in France led to a Virgin/U.K. record deal and, through that, a PolyGram record deal. It was a strange, circuitous route." Their first Mercury/Virgin LP was last year's "Pictures On A String."

According to Nic, the European success isn't a surprise because, "I think there's a lot of European influence in our music, European sound. You know, we're closer to, sort of, a funky ABBA than to mainstream American rock."

One thing the band has now — quite definitely — is a flesh-and-bones drummer, Chuck Sabo. "The real drummer adds a lot of dynamics to it that we sort of lacked with the rhythm box," says Nic's brother Oliver.

Lyn Byrd began her career as a Comateen as the band's rhythm box programmer. "She would just stand off to the side of the stage with her arms folded while me and the other guitar player would play," says Nic.

The three members plus the drummer are currently tight, funky,

and content. They are rearranging their highly-danceable material for clubs "so that, on stage, it's not quite true to the album; so if people have heard the record they can have something a little different to mull over at our live shows," according to Oliver.

As to their future plans, Byrd says, "The very nature of being in the rock business, you don't feel that you want to look too far ahead, unless you want to scare the hell out of yourself. In the near future, we're doing a European tour and some American dates. There's a possibility we'll be doing a video, for a song called "Don't Come Back," which is getting some airplay at the moment. And we just, basically, are going to be really trying to get heavier into promotion and make ourselves more visible with more touring, more TV, whatever we can do."

"We have a lot of confidence in this new record. We like it a lot — no matter what happens to it, we can look at it and say, 'This is good. We did this and we're glad.'"

And Nic North sums up the band's current status: "We've done gigs in every possible tiny place. We've paid our dues, as they say. Now we're even going to gigs in cabs, and all sorts of things."

Tree Acquires Blue Book Catalog

NASHVILLE — Tree International announced that it has attained Buck Owens' Blue Book song catalog out of Bakersfield, CA in a reported multi-million dollar agreement.

Blue Book contains 60 number one country songs and 30 Top 10 hits, and was one of the last large country song catalogs not located in Nashville. Most of Buck Owens' hits are in Blue Book including "Act Naturally," "Crying Time,"

"I've Got A Tiger By The Tail" and "Love's Gonna Live Here."

STUDIO PROFILE

Fantasy Studios: Recording With Technology And Comfort

When renovation of Fantasy's recording studios was begun some years ago, the goal was for the studios to ultimately become some of the best in the country and the best in its home base of the San Francisco Bay Area. With the introduction of studio D in 1980, northern California's only completely computerized 46-track digital facility and the recent opening of the all new studio C, Fantasy has indeed achieved its goals.

While Fantasy studios are located at Fantasy Records' headquarters in Berkeley, away from the two major hubs of the recording industry — New York and Los Angeles — they draw many of the country's top acts. Studio manager Nina Bombardier notes that while the local Bay Area artists such as Journey, Santana and Jefferson Starship make the rounds of the community's three top studio operations, more and more out-of-town artists are making their way to Fantasy's full-service studios. And while recording artists obviously make up the majority of Fantasy's clientele, film soundtracks are also becoming more prominent. The best example of this comes from Fantasy's owner Saul Levantz who produced the film *Amadeus*. While the soundtrack was recorded in England, all of *Amadeus* was mixed and mastered at Fantasy.

The three main rooms, A, C and D all feature Neve boards with Studer and Ampex recorders. Fantasy also has the top mastering facility in the area, utilizing the Zuma Audio Computer with the Neuman Disc Mastering System.

All these features coupled with the facility's clean and lush atmosphere help make Fantasy recording studios one of the most attractive and technically sophisticated operations anywhere.

EAST COASTINGS

TRAVERSING THE ROCK SPECTRUM — Three current acts which on the surface seem to reside at opposite ends of the rock continuum (with one in the middle, of course) actually offer surprisingly conventional and accessible music, while employing radically different styles to accompany their recorded output.

For all his androgynous excesses and cheeky posturing, **Boy George** has always turned out solid, simple tunes that draw on much of black music's refinements and traditional emphasis on rhythm. On October 26, **Culture Club** will release its third Epic/Virgin LP "Waking Up With The House On Fire" and cross the U.S. on a major concert tour. The album has been preceded by "The War Song," a pop chant that will have no trouble continuing the string of hits that the Club

has put together in such a short time. The single is available in 7-inch and 12-inch, featuring a special "shriek mix" created by producer **Steve Levine** and Culture Club's **Jon Moss**. Some of the cuts on the LP (10 in all) include titles such as "Don't Talk About It," "The Dive," "Hello Goodbye," and "Dangerous Man." The Club's first two albums, "Kissing To Be Clever" and "Colour By Numbers," have now sold a combined total of over six million copies in the U.S. alone and spawned seven consecutive Top 10 singles including "Do You Really Want to Hurt Me," "Church Of the Poison Mind," "I'll

Tumble 4 Ya," and "Karma Chameleon."

Meanwhile, back in London, the band has completed a stunning new video for "The War Song" with director **Russell Mulcahy**. Shot in the docklands of the city's East End, the video is a satire on the "glamor" of war and features 500 London schoolchildren following singer George, the "Pied Piper of Pop," through the city streets. George himself undergoes six radically different changes of costume and hair color, it says here, "including red, black, blonde and pink!" It doesn't say which colors are the costumes and which are the hair.

Despite Boy George's pace-setting visibility, it is the band that deserves the credit for the infectious grooves and state-of-the-art composing. Come November, New York "Clubophiles" and "Boy-maniacs" will get a chance to judge image and music when Culture Club hits Madison Square Garden on the last leg of the U.S. tour. The tour kicks off October 25 in Dallas.

EYE OF SURVIVOR — **Sylvester Stallone** obviously has an ear for commercial power pop, the form which sometimes walks a thin line trying to attract harder-edged rock fans and the Top 40 market at the same time. Two of Stallone's movies, *Rocky III* and *Staying Alive* were the launching pad for the musical careers of **Survivor** ("Eye of the Tiger") and Sylvester's bro, **Frank** ("Far From Over"). "Vital Signs" is the fifth album from the former act, a group of Chicago-based rock and rollers. You can almost see Survivor's niche in the pop music hierarchy. Their sound is 70s-based suburban and they create a tuneful, yet powerful product that puts them this side of **Chicago** and (dare I say it?) **Three Dog Night** on one front and **Bruce Springsteen** and **John Cougar** on another. "Vital Signs" is Survivor's first album with its new lead singer, **Jimi Jamison**, a former member of the southern-based rock band **Cobra** and, according to Survivor guitarist/keyboardist/singer **Jim Peterik**, "a wild man onstage. He's got a voice that fits the Survivor sound but also adds his own personality." Both the single and the album were produced by **Ron Nevison**, the producer of the first Survivor album in 1980 and, says Peterik, "the band's only choice when we decided to have fun in the studio and hire somebody else to produce the record."

Jamison's style insures that "Eye of the Tiger" will sound authentic in concert, and the rest of the group — **Frankie Sullivan**, **Marc Droubay**, and **Stephen Ellis** — play together as tightly as many similar groups who have enjoyed more name familiarity. Survivor may need to bring its image somewhat more squarely into the 80s to deserve its name, but the group has a confident way with melody and energy, which should allow it to make an imprint on the continuing musical blotter.

HANOI VIA FINLAND — **Hanoi Rocks** is almost as good a name as **Let's**

Active, and the triple entendres are enough to keep anyone wondering long enough to slap on the record. Is it a southeast Asian cable show? Is it a geological tour of the land beyond the rice paddies? Or is it a Finnish metal group? By the time you figure out that it's the last answer, you've already been surprised by Hanoi Rocks' music, which is not the bellowing energy release that sums up much of metal. In fact, the Rocks' version of **John Fogarty's** "Up Around the Bend" sounds downright respectful, as opposed to, say, **Wendy O. Williams'** "Stand By Your Man," (which, nevertheless, has a character all its own). Part of this can be attributed to the band's Scandinavian origin. European interpretations of metal always seem a tad more civilized (usually the death knell in the American metal market, but not in this case). Hanoi Rocks was formed in Finland in 1980 by lead guitarist **Andy McCoy**, front man **Michael Monroe** and bassist **Sam Yaffa** (which answers the question, "Whatever happened to Sam Yaffa?") and drummer **Razzle**, who replaced original drummer **Gyp Casino** (also probably a stage name). After success in Europe and Asia, the band signed with CBS Records in June '83. The new album "Two Steps From the Move" is a straight-ahead rock and roll album punctuated by somewhat more anarchic vocals. Still, a little anarchy in front of a rock-solid rock and roll outfit is what metal should be about. Hanoi Rocks, and America with it.

KIM FIELDS (Critique 1208)
He Loves Me-He Loves Me Not (7:14) (Willensky) (Music Center/ASCAP) (Producer: Hal Davis-Elliott Willensky)

Kim Fields' luxurious voice starts this one off, with the cut working into a quick-tempoed drum track. Perfect for faster grooves, "He Loves Me-He Loves Me Not" also features steamy backup vocals and an assortment of synthesized musical fillings. Yodeling sax break works the track into a deep fever which cuts into Fields' tantalizing vocal. Making a name for herself at the club level.

THE RICKIE CLARK COMPANY (Becket Records 521)
Time To Throw Down (6:33) (Thomas/Clark) (Big Seven-Sizzlin' Hot-Clark Pub./BMI) (Producers: Stanlee Paul Thomas-Reggie Griffin)

This Circle City Records release shows a knack for a strong back beat and an enticing melody. Utilizing synthesized vocals, the cut is straight-ahead funk at its best — thoroughly danceable with a sense of humor. AUDIO/VIDEO

PURE CONCEPT — *The Evolutionary Spiral* is a video 45 released by Sony in September. This is but one of a whole new line in Sony video programming, part of its three-year plan which began in 1983 with the "year of awareness," currently "the year of distribution" and moves into next year with "the year of sales." Part of the overall Sony plan is to distribute product with high repeatability, and that's where *The Evolutionary Spiral* comes in. This highly-conceptual 14-minute video features the acclaimed jazz musicianship of **Weather Report** and sets out to chronicle the whole evolutionary shepel, from the development of the planet to man's current technological adolescence. It is an archeological odyssey with cultural imagery and dazzling computer graphics intertwining. Visually, *The Evolutionary Spiral* joins art and science with complex and fleeting intensity. It isn't until the latter stages of man's development into high tech that the graphics get particularly interesting, but when they do the effect is like computer gymnastics. The video was produced by **Mark Mawrence**, whose production background is primarily in the field of political science and who cofounded Earth Sky and Open Sky Productions with **Larry Lachman**, the video's director. Mawrence is eloquent on the subject of concept in music videos, a medium to which he is now devoting 100 percent of his time. "I tend to disagree with the usual concept of conceptual video, or at least to deepen the idea, by stating that the true conceptual video is one that has thematic continuity,"

said Mawrence, "That there is a genuine concept, theme or storyline to it that's followed through and through." Mawrence adheres to the notion of conceptual videos in the truest sense — no vague romantic plots and lipsynching for him — and that is precisely what is achieved in *The Evolutionary Spiral*: clear, concentrated concept moving in a focused direction and, in this case, offering some educational qualities along with the computer art and entertainment. Graphics credit goes to computer artist **Joni Carter**, who, along with Lachman, created the computer animation sequence. Editing services were provided by the Post Group in Hollywood and by MTI Studios in New York. Graphics equipment used from the Post Group's ultra-sophisticated array include Bosch, Aurora and Quantel Paint Box modes. Another important feature of this video 45 is its exceptionally affordable price: \$16.95, which is sure to grease the wheels for Sony's 1985 "year of sales."

COMPUTERS — Speaking of computers and continuing in the video vein, what about a video that teaches you how to use a computer? The dovetailing of technology always inspires awe. Well... MGM/UA includes among its fall lineup of videocassette offerings a tape entitled *Everything You Always Wanted To Know About Computers... But Were Afraid To Ask*. 'Bout time, I say. The tape runs 88 minutes, in which time a host of awkward computer questions are answered, to wit: the do's and don'ts of software, how to choose a computer and then into the really hardcore stuff, such as information management, educational programs, word processing, financial planning, programming tips and, just to get the whole family thinking computertalk, computer games have been thrown into the package. The tape was produced and directed by **Stephen Mantell** and written by **Laurence Gonzales** for A Film for the Humanities Productions. Touted as non-jargon and easy to understand, *Everything You Always Wanted To Know About Computers... But Were Afraid To Ask* might just help get you through the '80s and beyond!

WHILE WE'RE ON THE SUBJECT — Taking up where we left off, with computers

that is, a new piece of equipment now in demand in post-production centers from Ceylon to Oxnard is the Montage Picture Processor. The machine does just what the name implies — processing pictures in much the same way that word processors process words. The montage system is light years ahead of conventional off-line editing systems, and VCA Teletronics, in cooperation with the Montage Computer Corporation are currently sponsoring seminars as an informative service to the television and film industries. Editing is not only faster and more agile with Montage, there is a lot less audio interference, in fact there's virtually no interference at all, a situation which VCA says has users in a condition known in the trade as "user shock." NEW TECH. — Holographics, an audio technique currently in use among the broadcast radio, TV and cable industries, is now being developed as a follow-up to stereo. All conventional consumer electronics reproduce the holographic effect, which encodes spatial information on audio track, which is then decoded by the human ear. The audio benefits gained through holographics can be applied to the video industry, and the Discovery Music Channel plans to incorporate the technique into its 24-hour video music programming.

Counterfeit Control method is the only way to effectively plug this multimillion-dollar leak in the corporate profit structure and the subsequent loss of 130,000 jobs."

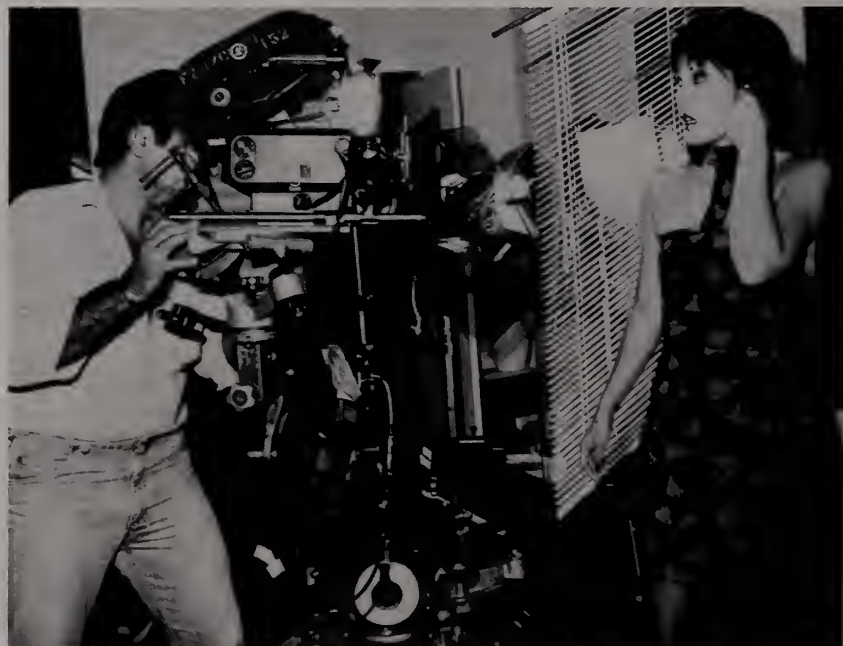
Though the company is involved with many industries, Fox addressed the problems encountered by recording artists and labels. "The counterfeit records and merchandise is for the most part produced overseas. For that reason we have people in Taiwan, South Korea, Manila, Bangkok, Hong Kong and in the next six months we'll be moving into Europe."

Fox explained that his three-month-old company has an investigative team located "in the top merchandising areas of the country." In addition he claimed, "we have a spotter group and retail group of 160 people utilized on a reward basis." These people are located at various retail outlets and other related organizations. According to Fox, "I issue bulletins on what is being knocked off and what to look for." Since Fox utilizes the mailing lists of three major civic organizations, he claimed, "I have

more than 100,000 sets of eyes out there."

When asked what type of client he would serve, Fox gave the following example. "An artist's management company came to me because they were being ripped off horrendously. I have already found records, T-shirts, balloons and other things that identify the talent. This stuff is sold at concerts or it is sold at the retail level or wherever a souvenir item is sold. These are items that are not licensed by the artist and thus he or she is losing money every time they are sold."

The company president explained that they are not solely interested in the peddler of the goods, it's the source they're after. "The best way to punish these people is to let them manufacture it, let them package it and let them ship it. We know where it's traveling and we have it impounded there at customs. That way they've spent all their money and derived no profit. It cost them money and it never goes any further. The merchandise is destroyed once it's here. It is up to the client to prosecute under law."

FALL STOCKING GUIDE

Compact Discs: The Future Arrives

NEW YORK — In a single year, the compact disc has gone from a curiosity for the hardcore audiophile to a piece of equipment that stands ready to threaten the LP and the tape for the ears of the listening public. The number of CD titles on the market has soared from about 550 at the end of '83 to an estimated 1,700-2,000 by year's end (with the number of popular discs beginning to overtake the disproportionate number of classical and jazz discs released last year), the list price has dropped to a comfortable \$15.98 or so, and the hardware has become more accessible both economically (with some players selling for under \$300) and physically (with car players and portable units about to hit the marketplace).

Making the public aware of CDs has been a difficult chore. It is impossible to get across the clarity of the sound without physically getting people to hear a player — you can't impart it on radio or television. So convenience has been stressed: the discs are small and easy to store, they are virtually indestructible and they can provide as much as an hour of uninterrupted music. With the hardware prices plummeting and the new ability to play the discs both in cars and while strolling around town, it seems that the public is getting ready to seriously consider adding the new technology to existing systems. More than four million discs are supposed to join nearly 250,000 players in leaving retail stores in 1984.

The proof of the CD's acceptance has to be the large number of pop music discs coming out this year and the ever-shortening length of time between the release of the album and the release of the same product on CD. As album list prices rise, and CD list prices plunge, it seems the last impediment to full acceptance of the CD is dwindling. Full measure of the confidence that the major record companies have in CDs is the opening of CBS/Sony's Digital Audio Disc Corporation last month, the first CD plant in America.

Timeliness, Low Prices Mark Home Video Releases

Releases from video manufacturers this fourth quarter are characterized by the kinds of product we've seen on the shelves in growing numbers over the past year: surprisingly recent theatrical hits and alternative programming of a more varied content. The shift toward retail sales continues, with titles selling at a faster rate than ever before, aided by general price lowerings. It's hard to say whether those sales are a result of, or reflected by the general upswing in product of greater viewer repeatability, but with more alternative programming available and increased timeliness of movie and music titles, the industry continues to boom.

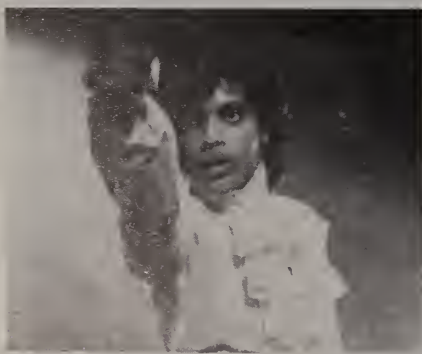
A prime example of the substantial drop in videocassette pricing are the 25 titles to be released in November by Paramount Home Video. Originally ranging in price from \$34.95 to \$79.95, these rereleases of some of the creme of Paramount product of the last several years will be made available to the consumer for just \$24.95. Certainly a sales-oriented reduction.

Spearheading holiday sales campaigns this year is Walt Disney Home Video, which has switched into overdrive with its all-out, knock-'em-dead "Wrapped And Ready to Give" Christmas promotion. Seven first-time video releases, wrapped in their own individual Christmas packages and "ready to give" will be on the market in late October. Disney made waves in August with an elaborate pre-book kit for retailers, known as the "everything dealers will need to pre-sell Christmas 1984 without spending a dime" campaign, which was shipped to Walt Disney Home Video Product dealers nationwide.

Still enjoying box office and due November 19 from Warner Home Video at the utterly low price of \$29.98 is the Prince summer hit, *Purple Rain*. Other big titles on the way this quarter include the CBS/Fox November release of *The Empire Strikes Back*, and MGM/UA Home Video's late October release of *Breakin'* — but these are just a few.

As for alternative programming, certainly the most unusual is MCA Home Video's Halloween-oriented *Max Maven's Mind Games*, and hour-long video cassette that features the mind reading hijinks of "the thief of thoughts" himself — Max Maven.

The availability of "hot" video product made accessible to consumers while the demand is high is a primary concern to retailers, and this season tops last year's with such releases. With major titles like *Purple Rain* hitting the video market so soon after its theatrical success with a low, sales-oriented price, the 1984 holiday season is certain to become the best yet for sales of videocassettes and video related products.

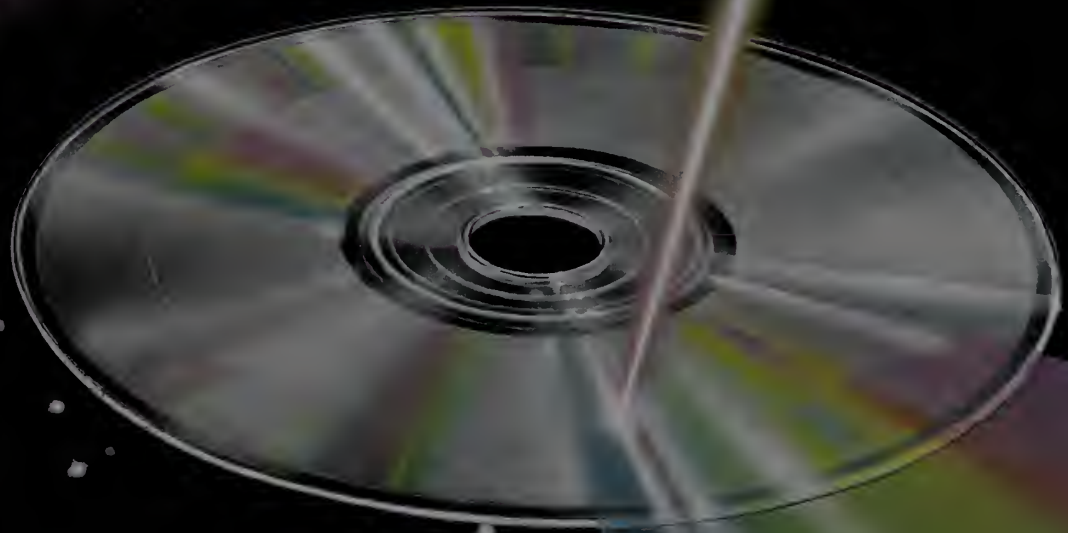

Accessories Continue To Post Sales Increases For Retailers

LOS ANGELES — The term "record store" continues to be less appropriate as accessories continue to be responsible for a greater percentage of sales. Retailers have continued to allot more space, more buying budget and more advertising dollars to music and video accessories of all kinds.

Though blank audio and video tape continue to be the runaway best sellers, "lifestyle" items such as posters, shirts, tour merchandise, books and magazines have posted incremental sales increases for most dealers over the past 12 months.

Personal electronics have also been a source of increased revenue for those dealers stocking such items as Sony's Walkman as well as the larger "boom box" portables. Many retailers have increased their price ceiling points, sensing an increasingly favorable market. The increasing popularity of these items has been a factor in what some retailers termed "the best year yet" for batteries, headphones and other related personal electronics items.

Dealers also reported incremental sales increases in cleaning product, which many related directly to the proliferation of home video as well as the continued popularity of the blank audio cassette.

On the down side, most retailers have either greatly reduced or totally eliminated their stock of video game related items. As one accessory buyer stated plainly, "video games have hit the skids."

Cash Box contacted a number of key retailers, many of them surveyed 12 months ago, to see if the last year met their expectations and to find out what to expect for the upcoming year.

Durham North Carolina's Record Bar reports incremental increases in accessories across the board. One year ago (**Cash Box**, Oct. 8, 1983), Record Bar projected that after the chain's move into the personal electronics field, sales of these items could reach three percent of total sales in fiscal 1984. According to Paul Fussell, Record Bar's special product manager, the chain couldn't maintain a high enough stock level to meet consumer demand. He anticipates reaching the three percent level and higher by the end of fiscal 1985.

The chain has raised its ceiling price point for personal stereos from \$100 to \$170 and has expanded its list of suppliers to include among others Sanyo, Toshiba and Aiwa. According to Fussell, "the personal stereos and boom boxes are very marketable to the younger demographic" Fussell said that appeal would

spread to the older demographics as the holidays draw near. In addition Record Bar has been testing different models of the Casio keyboard which, according to Fussell, "have been doing quite well in some stores."

Record Bar continues to offer spiff programs on several accessories as well as increasing the stock of posters, postcards and 8-by 10-inch photos that have been turning a profit for the chain.

As for the future, Fussell claimed, "We're jumping in with blank video tape. We feel we can do a real good job with it. I think it is an extension of what we have been doing with our blank audio tape. We've seen a lot of retailers out there who are just putting blank video tape out and not doing anything with it. We've just started a massive promotion with not only blank video but also audio 10-packs. With video, our price points have been lowered since August 1 and we've seen some good sales patterns coming out of that."

Mark Briggs, director of operations of Cambridge, Mass.-based Strawberries Records and Tapes, also cited the large increase in sales of "lifestyle" accessories. "The appeal end of the music business is growing so the boutique concept is certainly becoming more valid." Straw-

berries has recently introduced the "Roadie" line of concert apparel and has continued to stock t-shirts featuring the chain's logo as well as logos of local radio stations. Briggs also continues to stock posters and has in the past year offered breakdance kits but added, "I don't get

into little stuff like buttons, stickers and painter's hats."

Briggs sees the company continuing to become heavily involved with videotape, both blank and pre-recorded. According to Briggs, "if it has to do with music then we're involved."

North Canton, Ohio's Camelot proved the exception to the "lifestyle accessories sell" rule. According to audio/video buyer Mike Stephenson, "it has not taken off for us. We did test 'lifestyle' items over the

stating the company would take a "wait and see" attitude. "We will re-evaluate video games at the end of this quarter," he stated. "There's been a lot of talk in the industry and we really don't know. But if there are going to be sales, then we're still committed but it all depends on what the fourth quarter brings."

Suzanne Rastatter, buyer manager of video and general merchandise for southern California's Licorice Pizza was another example of retailers enthusiasm over "lifestyle" items. The chain carries t-shirts, bumper stickers, buttons, 8 by 10 glossies, postcards, posters and painter's hats among its boutique items. According to Rastatter, "I think what really turned the 'lifestyle' product around is the popularity of heavy metal. Even when you carry merchandise of popular rock and roll artists like Bob Seger or a Tom Petty, they usually won't sell. They're popular artists but people who listen to their music don't necessarily want to wear a t-shirt or use a bumper sticker. Bands like Iron Maiden, Def Leppard, Quiet Riot and Van Halen are what did it for us."

Rastatter reaffirmed the company's commitment to remaining a software-only retailer. "Hardware is not part of the company's plan."

Rastatter stated that while the chain does carry some books and about five or six different magazine titles, "books and magazines have always been a hard area for us." She said that the biggest problem with such products is finding the most effective merchandising technique.

Rastatter acknowledged that once again the best-selling accessory item was blank tape. "Blank audio tape is far and away the leader," she stated. For some promotions we'll include 'super sales' — which is all blank tape on sale and when we're not doing that then we usually have a Maxell month, a Memorex month or a TDK month. At the same time we usually do some kind of sales or display contest.

According to Rastatter the chain is looking to prerecorded video as the area of major growth. "We're chainwide now. Thirty-four stores are carrying prerecorded video for both sales and rentals. It is an area that has increased greatly for us."

Patty Steinbaugh of Show Industries pointed out that Show's Music Plus chain is continuing to remodel various locations, making the stores half audio and half video. She agrees with Rastatter in projecting prerecorded video as one of the areas of greatest future growth for the chain.

It is the opinion of most surveyed, that "lifestyle" items will continue to accrue a greater percentage of overall sales, though none would state that it would overtake the continued booming sales of blank audio and videotape. As Steinbaugh remarked, "nothing touches them."

past year but we as a company have taken a direction more toward a video end, more toward a movie sales and rental end. We don't carry magazines or books. We did test t-shirts but we pulled them out."

Last year, (**Cash Box**, Oct. 8, 1983) Stephenson noted that both audio and video cleaning product would be a big item in the following 12 months stating, "last year we weren't carrying any video cleaners but this year we expect them to be big." One year later, were they that big? According to Stephenson, "They were not as big as we anticipated, but being optimistic I think they're going to be three to four times as strong as last year because the company is definitely into a selling push. In addition we have educated our people in selling cleaners, so I'll probably see this year what I expected last year." The chain carries cleaners from Koss, Scotch and Allsop.

Stephenson reported that the general increases in sales of personal stereo equipment have remained steady coupling with the doubling of battery sales in the last 12 months. The chain carries a wide variety of personal stereo equipment from promotional lines to the high-end Sony Super Walkman and JVC "boom boxes." The chain's price ceiling is now \$199.

Stephenson claimed that Camelot has not yet abandoned the video game market,

Arista
The soundtrack from the film *Ghostbusters* lifted Arista to the top of the charts recently, and the label should also see significant response to its other recent releases including Tom Browne's "Tommy Gun" and the latest from Heaven 17. October/November should be even stronger for Arista with albums expected by Whitney Houston, The Kinks, Whodini, Sonny Okosun, Dionne Warwick, Alan Parsons Project, Angela Bofill and Sakhile.

Capitol
While the label is still doing very well on the album charts with Tina Turner and Billy Squier, Capitol also has a number of other strong LPs set for pre-Christmas release including Steve Miller's "Italian X-Rays," Ashford and Simpson's "Solid" and The Tubes' lead singer Fee Waybill's first solo effort "Read My Lips." Also set for November shipping are Duran Duran's live album "Arena," which includes one new track and the Little River Band's "Playing To Win."

Chrysalis
While the label is still having good extended success with Huey Lewis' LP "Sports" and Billy Idol's "Rebel Yell," Chrysalis is set to release Pat Benatar's next album "Tropico" later this month with the first single "We Belong" to ship next week.

Columbia
Bruce Springsteen's latest and Julio Iglesias' "1100 Bel Air Place" are sure to be on many Christmas lists and Columbia has a host of equally strong LPs awaiting release this month. Among these are the latest by Toto, the much-heralded debut from Britain's Wham! and Paul McCartney's soundtrack LP "Give My Regards To Broad Street." Also set for store dates in October are albums from Phillip Bailey, Bill Clayderman and a live disc from Johnny Mathis. November will see new product from Columbia including the debut from I Am Siam and albums from Peter Brown, Rachel Dennison, Roy Ayers, The Spitfire Band, Mark Grey and Paul Anka.

Elektra
The label has Jane Fonda's next LP "Prime Time" coming out in November as well as Linda Ronstadt's latest, which will be another Nelson Riddle collaboration, called "Lush Life." Also in November, Elektra is releasing the Whispers' "So Good," a live LP from The Cure and new albums from Midnight Star and Shalamar.

EMI America
Its recent chart success with the John Waite and Peter Wolf solo discs notwithstanding, EMI America has other strong product coming up for its pre-Christmas release schedule. The Del-Lords are putting out "Frontier Days," J. Geils is releasing its first LP sans lead vocalist Peter Wolf called "You're Gettin' Even While I'm Gettin' Odd" and other EMI product includes a best of collection from Michael Martin Murphy and the soundtrack from *First Born*.

Epic
With the Jackson tour scheduled to end in late November or early December, Epic's "Torture" by the group should continue strong into Christmas, yet other highlights of the label's fall schedule include Culture Club's next LP "Waking Up With The House On Fire" which has already spawned the single "The War Song." Other October albums include those from Molly Hatchet and John Hunter and later in the month, Epic is releasing REO Speedwagon's next, Teddy Pendergrass' "Greatest Hits," and discs from Teena Marie, Carl Anderson, Madame X, Detroit and the soundtrack from *Mistral's Daughter*. November albums include the Isley-Jasper-Isley LP, the *Le Bal* soundtrack and an album from Widow.

Island
While Island is enjoying immediate success with its just-released album from U2 "The Unforgettable Fire," the label is also set for a big response to Frankie Goes To Hollywood's debut double-album set "Welcome To The Pleasure Dome." Featuring both "Two Tribes" and "Relax," the LP should be out late in October as should a Motorhead anthology, John Cale's live album, reggae albums on Mango from Toots & The Maytals, Gregory Issacs, Steel Pulse and a toaster DJ album.

MCA's October release schedule includes the long-awaited Dan Hartman LP, new albums from John Conlee, Ray Stevens, Reba McEntyre, Gene Watson, The Who, The Planet P Project and the solo debut from Oingo Boingo's former lead vocalist Danny Elfman. November will see new material from Tom Petty, Britain's fave Bronski Beat, Klymaxx, Carrie Lucas, Triumph and Thelma Houston.

Motown
The bulk of the label's fall push is on the market right now; the Stevie Wonder/Dionne Warwick "Woman In Red" soundtrack leading the way. Other product expected to bring in healthy Christmas season sales are the debut Sam Harris LP, the debut Vanity LP and the latest Dazz Band disc entitled "Jukebox."

The project was begun by Lennon as a surprise

for Ono's 50th birthday, February 18, 1982. After languishing in the can in the aftermath of Lennon's murder December 8, 1980, the compilation was completed by Ono with the participating artists and producers. In addition to songs from "Every Man Has A Woman" and the Lennon/Ono "Double Fantasy" LP, "A Present For Yoko" features Ono discussing her roller-coaster years with Lennon, the birth of their son Sean and their subsequent role switch, and how the songs she and Lennon wrote collectively and individually arose from their relationship. She also details how the contributing artists came to be involved in helping her finish "Every Man Has A Woman." Lennon would have turned 44 October 9.

NOT SO QUIET RIOT — Top heavy metal recording artists Quiet Riot will be featured on the Friday, October 19 *Supergroups* concert over the ABC Radio Networks. The 90-minute concert will be broadcast live via satellite from the San Antonio Convention Center.

KLOS TEAMS WITH CARMINE — Carmine Appice, in conjunction with L.A. radio station heavy KLOS-FM, have announced the "Fifth Annual Carmine Appice Drum Off." BONANDRINI — When Giovanni Bonandrini comes to New York from Milan he doesn't spend a lot of time sightseeing. No, he spends a lot of time — almost all of his time — recording and mixing jazz LPs. When he departed two weeks ago, after about three weeks in town, he left with new albums by **John Lindberg**, **Anthony Braxton**, the **Charli Persip Big Band**, **Oliver Lake**, **John Stubblefield**, **Billy Bang**, **Muhai Richard Abrams**, **Frank Lowe** (with **Don Cherry**) and **Jaki Byard** and the **Apollo Stompers**. Some time in '85 those efforts will appear on Black Saint/Soul Note, without a doubt the most important record label in contemporary jazz. With a catalog of some 200 albums, every one still in print, Black Saint/Soul Note has ignored market trends and released albums by practically every shining light

in contemporary jazz (**David Murray**, **Steve Lacy**, the **World Sax Quartet**, **Old and New Dreams**, **Leroy Jenkins**, **Chico Freeman**, **Cecil Taylor**, **Lester Bowie**, **Air**, **Sam Rivers**, **Bill Dixon**, **Ran Blake**, **Craig Harris**, **Andrew Cyrille**, the list is extensive), a smattering of more traditional players (**Jimmy Knepper**, **Lee Konitz**, **Clifford Jordan**, **Kenny Drew**, **Art Farmer** and others) and an impressive list of lesser-known players (**Tom Varner**, **Jameel Moondoc**, **Tiziana Ghigloni**, **Saheb Sarbib**, **Claudio Fasoli**, and others). With over 30 albums distributed this year and an equal number still in the can, Giovanni Bonandrini shows no sign of abating the company's remarkable output (it is distributed in the U.S. by PolyGram Special Imports).

"I started as a collector," says Giovanni Bonandrini during a rare moment out of the control room, "a lot of jazz producers start as collectors. I was a teacher, I had been teaching for many years, and I also taught at night school. The money I got at night school I spent buying records. The importer was an American who had his warehouse in Milano and from whom I bought the records directly. I'd wait five or six months and then I'd go and buy, maybe, 400 records, so he gave me the same price as he gave the shops.

"And then one day he told me he couldn't go on. He said, 'Don't you want to take over this job?' But I had no money. So I spoke with some friends of mine and they told me, 'Yes, okay.' So we started in 1974 as Hi-Fi and Record Center."

The distribution business was a success. In 1977 Hi-Fi and Record Center purchased the struggling avant-garde label Black Saint (named after a **Charles Mingus** composition, "The Black Saint and the Sinner Lady"), retaining **Giacomo Pellicciotti**, the label's producer. Pellicciotti was an adherent of, in Bonandrini's words, "the extreme avant-garde," so Bonandrini began Soul Note, a subsidiary intended to record more traditional artists. Soon Pellicciotti was out and Bonandrini became the auteur behind the two labels. In the meantime, the Hi-Fi and Record Center split into two — I.R.D., the distribution company, and IREC, the production company, which oversees Black Saint/Soul Note and Appaloosa, a country/folk label. At this point, Black Saint and Soul Note have equally hefty catalogs and there is no difference between the two companies — basically, the artists who began under the Black Saint imprint remain Black Saint artists.

Question: Does the label make money?

"We are losing money, frankly," says Bonandrini. "If you take only the production business itself, we are losing money. You see, if we had no other income — meaning the distribution business — we'd lose money. We'll see what happens in two or three years, whether we really have lost money — because I'm sure the records will continue to sell — but I do think that you don't make money at all, of that I am sure."

Question: Then why do it?

"Because I like the music too much," says Bonandrini. "When I am here in the States I am rather surprised, because people think that you **must** make money in a business, but that's not my opinion. Of course, you must have another job which allows you to live, but when that is assured you can have, also, another business which you enjoy very much.

"In this business, your work is a contribution to the music, to the music staying for the future. Even if my partners tomorrow will refuse to put more money in the business, I will always go on and do this. Because I like it and because it's something that stays. When a producer of jazz starts a label and comes to it as a collector, like I did, he comes not to make money, but because he likes the music. That's the point."

Question: Is this guy nuts?

Well, of course he's not nuts. He is in the record business, as are so many other owners of small jazz labels, for one reason: Love. He's never had a record sell more than about 12,000 copies; he doesn't press more than 2,000 copies of most titles; and he won't let a record go out of print "as long as I live." Despite the crushing blow dealt by the powerful dollar (worth almost 1900 lire), despite the fact that PolyGram would be happy distributing fewer than 34 albums per year, despite the fact that he **knows** in advance that some of the odder items have little chance of ever selling out their initial run, Giovanni Bonandrini plows on. When asked what criteria he uses in order to decide who to record he answers very simply: "I record who I like."

PUBLIC PROPERTIES — New Jazz at the Public Theatre, under the superb auspices of **Nancy Weiss**, has gone to the lands of pastries and Voodoo for its next two presentations. **The Vienna Art Orchestra**, one of the finest big bands in Europe, will bring its madcap but highly musical antics in Oct. 20. **Mathias Ruegg** and company are unique and not to be missed. The evening before, Oct. 19, the public will offer "Papa Zaka," a 29-member Haitian Music and Dance Theatre, with music by **Erick Paul**, choreography by **Louines Louisnis**, and featuring the conga playing of **Louis Celestin**. Tickets for either show are ten bucks each and available at the Public Theatre, 425 Lafayette St., NYC (212-598-7150).

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FEATURE PICKS

MAKOTO OZONE — Makoto Ozone — Columbia BFC-39624 — Producer: Gary Burton — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

Not to be confused with Quest guitarist Makoto, Ozone is a young, gifted pianist with a beautiful touch and a romantic heart. With producer Burton kicking in some vibes work, this should appeal to fans of Bill Evans, Chick Corea and other lyrical ivory-ticklers. Such pieces as "Crystal Love" and "Flight" are just filled with lush beauty. Ozone is a player to watch.

ELECTRIC OUTLET — John Scofield — Gramavision GR 8405 — Producers: Steve Swallow, John Scofield — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

This is Scofield's first domestic release in several years. His guitar work manages to encompass an extraordinary number of influences — jazz, blues, rock, even country — and his compositions are tasty and unique. With Dave Sanborn, Ray Anderson, Steve Jordan and Peter Levin in tow, this record should finally help get Scofield the big play he's long deserved. "Pick Hits" should garner the big airplay. Scofield, by the way, continues his stint with Miles Davis.

WEE SNEEZAWEE — Jimmy Lyons Quintet — Black Saint BSR 0067; dist. by PolyGram Special Imports — Producer: Giovanni Bonandrini — List: 9.98

Jimmy Lyons has been a steadfast member of Cecil Taylor's Unit for 24 years, but this record makes it clear that he is not lacking his own abilities as a leader. Bassoonist Karen Borca and trumpeter Raphe Malik join with Lyons' alto for some very tight ensembles, and drummer Paul Murphy and bassist William Parker steam along, but it is the leader who fans the flames to sky-high levels. Lyons also turns out to have a very pretty pen.

RIGHT DOWN YOU ALLEY — Ray Anderson — Soul Note SN 1087; dist. by PolyGram Special Imports — Producer: Giovanni Bonandrini — List: 9.98

Raucous, burly and incisive are pretty good terms to describe the trombone playing of Ray Anderson. With only Mark Helias on bass and Gerry Hemingway on drums, Anderson takes the avant-garde stomping back to the days of tailgating New Orleans slidemen. He wails, he squeaks, he roars, he ignores barriers, and he lets the trombone sound like a trombone, but he also knows how to purr and whisper.

JAZZ JOURNEY — Pete Petersen and the Collection Jazz Orchestra — Pausa PR 7163 — Producer: Ashley Alexander — List: 8.98

It's not Texas Swing, but it's from Texas and it swings. Don Schamber's big band arrangements of the songs of Berlin, Gershwin, Youmans and Schamber (to name a few) are delicate and spry; the soloists (including ringer Ashley Alexander on trombone) are melodic and to the point; and the whole project is yet another feather in the cap of North Texas State, where most of the Collection first collected.

In New York the program will air on WPIX-TV, Channel 11. Meanwhile, Sutra artists the Fat Boys (nee Disco 3), Alphonso Ribeiro and members of the cast of *A Soldier's Story* were set to help out UNCF over the Weekend by lacing up and stepping out for the annual "Walk a Mile to Save a Mind" walkathon on Saturday, October 13.

"The dream of equal education is one that should extend beyond race, sex and social classes," said Mark Morales of the Fat Boys. "I'm happy to be working with the United Negro College Fund to make this dream a reality for many of America's underprivileged youths."

"We feel assured that Michael's support has created a momentum and enthusiasm that will spark a call to action. We hope his fans and friends will follow his example and applaud his selection of UNCF as a worthy recipient," Edley said. The news of Michael's donation came two days after a star-studded kick-off party for the fund drive, which culminates with the "Parade of Stars" telecast. The party was held at Pickfair, the world-famous estate that was the home of Douglas Fairbanks and Mary Pickford and which is now occupied by Dr. Jerry Buss.

The "Lou Rawls Parade of Stars" is UNCF's primary fundraising vehicle. Its production has been sponsored by Anheuser-Busch Companies, Inc. since 1980. The Budweiser brand of Anheuser-Busch provides promotional support through advertising and marketing. Procter and Gamble is providing a \$1 million contribution to the telethon through its five major brands: Crest, Crisco Oil, Crisco Shortening, Pampers and Charmin. This is the second year Procter and Gamble has made a major commitment to the "Parade of Stars."

Since its inception 40 years ago, UNCF has raised over \$350 million in support of its member colleges and scholarship programs. More than half of the 45,000 students enrolled in UNCF schools come from families earning less than \$14,000 annually, and most require financial aid. "Michael Jackson's philanthropy supports the very special mission of the United Negro college Fund and underscores the importance of charitable support for minority educational achievement," according to Edley.

TEENA'S BACK — Teena Marie's new single "Love Girl," the first release from her upcoming Epic album "Star Child," is out. Marie has achieved a string of hits dating back to 1979's "I'm Just a Sucker For Your Love," and including "I Need Your Lovin'," "Square Biz" and last year's "Robbery."

"It's a fun song," says Marie of the single. "It's a real rock-funk record — one of the songs that made us decide to put a sticker on the album that says, 'Warning: the Surgeon General has determined that this album may be hazardous to your feet.'" Marie wrote, produced and arranged the song herself. "Love Girl" will soon be the subject of a video to be directed by Cicely Tyson, who definitely knows something about acting, and who surely knows something about music (being Mrs. Miles Davis). Tyson was Marie's own choice to work on the project.

"Star Child," says Teena, is a departure from last year's "Robbery" LP, which she calls "my most polished and intricate album and one I loved. But this one is a lot rawer and funkier, with simpler arrangements and no horns. It reminds me of some of my earlier records, albums like "Irons in the Fire" and "It Must Be Magic."

Marie wrote six of the album's nine tracks by herself and collaborated on the other three. The songs include a short spiritual, the funky rap-spiked "Young Blood," a tribute to Marvin Gaye and "Alibi," a song which begins with a European new-wave feel and turns into a heavy rock ballad.

Teena Marie's albums include "Wild and Peaceful" and "Lady T" as well as the aforementioned discs. "Robbery" was her first for Epic.

STAPLES MEET HEADS — The Staple Singers have returned from a four-year hiatus with a Talking Heads song, "Slippery People." The cut highlights "The Turning Point," the group's new album on Private I/CBS. "It's nothing but a gospel song talking about church people," says Roebuck "Pop" Staples of the song, which is sung by Mavis Staples, with help from Pop as well as Cleo, Yvonne and Pervis Staples. "The Staple Singers are always interested in doing something constructive and affirmative, and David Byrne wrote that song about the way church people sometimes behave."

"The Turning Point" brings the Staples, who have been singing professionally since the mid-50s, back into the limelight. After moving from straight gospel to secular, message-oriented music, they scored a string of early-70s hits that included "Respect Yourself" and the number one hits "I'll Take You There" and "Let's Do It Again." Mike Piccirillo and Gary Goetzman produced "Slippery People" and "This Is Our Night," while Pervis Staple and Henry Bush handled the bulk of the album.

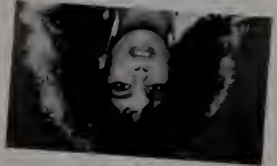

Over 800 people attended the event which honored the writers and publishers whose 70 songs were ASCAP's most performed country tunes during 1983, including 22 songs that reached the number one position on the country charts. Charlie Black and Tommy Rocco, each with 4 individual ASCAP awards, were honored as ASCAP's County Songwriter of the Year. Honored as the ASCAP Country Publisher of the Year was Chappell/Intersong Music Group-USA. home during the show, and thanked her public for their support. Songstress Anne Murray was the night's only double award winner, taking home honors for Album of the Year with "A Little Good News," and for Single of the Year with the title cut from the LP.

The Song of the Year award went to writers Jeff Silbar and Larry Henley for their ballad "Wind Beneath My Wings." The tune has been recorded by numerous artists and was a hit for singer Gary Morris.

Repeat award performances of the evening included Lee Greenwood, who once again won the Male Vocalist of the Year category, marking his second year in a row to claim that title. Willie Nelson was again a winning partner in the Vocal Duo of the Year; this time with international star Julio Iglesias for the song "To All The Girls I've Loved Before," which they did as a duet number during last year's CMA Awards show. Nelson garnered the honor last year with his duet with Merle Haggard, "Pancho and Lefty."

The accolade for Vocal Group of the Year went to The Statlers, and marked their ninth CMA award. The evening's honor tied them with Alabama as the most awarded act of the CMA's history. In fact, the win broke Alabama's three-year winning streak in that category. It was a Statlers-composed tune which introduced the nominees for the Female Vocalist of the Year. The announcement of the winner, Reba McEntire, brought the audience to its first standing ovation of the evening.

The CMA Horizon Award winners were The Judds, the mother-daughter duo which in the past year has gone from unknown to the top of the charts. The

award, developed four years ago, honors the artist who has had significant career accomplishments during the past year.

Guitar virtuoso Chet Atkins picked up the award for Instrumentalist of the Year, which marked his seventh career win in that category. This year's Instrumental Group of the Year was The Ricky Skaggs Band, receiving its second year in a row honor in that category.

Inducted into the Hall of Fame for their contributions to country music were Floyd Tillman and the late Ralph Peer. Tillman, who was elected in the Open category, has written many of country music's classic songs including "I Love You So Much It Hurts," which he borrowed for a line in his acceptance speech. Peer, honored in the Deceased Non-Performing category, founded the Southern Music Publishing Company and Peer International Corp., and was responsible for popularizing country music through recording acts such as Jimmie Rodgers and The Carter Family.

Also announced during the Awards show were the CMA Disc Jockeys of the Year. The winner in the major markets was Deano Day, KLAC AM/Hollywood, while Lee Shannon, KWKH AM/Shreveport took the medium market honor and Kent Crider, WKYQ FM/Paducah was the DJ of the Year in the small market category.

Kenny Rogers was the host for the 18th annual ceremonies, with entertainment by Dolly Parton, Willie Nelson & Kris Kristofferson, Ray Charles with Ricky Skaggs, B. J. Thomas, Janie Fricke, and The Oak Ridge Boys, Loretta Lynn in tribute to the late Ernest Tubbs, Lee Greenwood, Exile, Michael Martin Murphy, Alabama, Waylon Jennings, Crystal Gayle, Bill Medley and Lionel Richie.

SESAC Hosts 20th Annual Awards

NASHVILLE — An estimated 200 winning artists, writers and publishers attended the 20th annual SESAC Country Music Awards Ceremony Oct. 11 at the Hermitage Hotel. Hosted by Country Music Association chairman and president A. H. Prager and C. Dianne Petty, vice president and director of country music, the event honored its award winners and for the first time presented a special tribute to its writers and publishers for video performances of music that received national exposure on MTV, CMTV, HBO, Showtime or *Night Tracks*. Selected as song of the year was "Grandma Got Run Over By A Reindeer" by Elmo and Patsy. The tune also garnered a "Writer of the Year" award for its composer Randy Brooks. Songwriter Jerry Gillespie, for the second consecutive year, received four of the evening's awards, having been recognized

COUNTRY COLUMN

SONGWRITER PREMIERES IN NASHVILLE — Nashville's Belle Meade Theatre was the scene Sunday Oct. 7 for the world premiere of *Songwriter*, starring a couple of country music's finest tunesmiths, **Willie Nelson** and **Kris Kristofferson**. At a press conference prior to the screening, Nelson told of how the idea for the film originated about four or five years ago when he was talking with writer **Bud Shrake** about the music business. He said that Shrake wrote some of the stories down, then added some of his own creative touches to the plot. The movie deals with the ups and downs and adventures in the lives of picker Blackie Buck played by Kristofferson and songwriter Doc Jenkins, Nelson's character. There are failed marriages, bad business ventures, bad business deals, but there are good songs that keep the two going and picking and writing. Along with Doc and Blackie are the characters of Gilda, a young singer played by **Leslie Ann Warren**, and a shady wheeler-dealer played by **Rip Torn**. *Songwriter* was directed by **Alan Rudolph** and produced by **Sydney Pollack**, who directed Nelson in the film *The Electric Horseman*. Original songs were written by Nelson and Kristofferson, appropriately for their roles and additional music for the film was provided by **Larry Cansler**. The movie premiere itself was a lively, star-studded event with country music personalities such as **David Allan Coe**, **Larry Gatlin & Brothers**, **Mel Tillis**, **Tammy Wynette**, **Rosanne Cash**, **Rodney Crowell**, and **Chet Atkins** among the many other luminaries who came out under rainy Nashville skies to see the big screen work of the Nelson/Kristofferson partnership. After the screening, the crowd made way to the Richland Country Club for a reception and a fine performance from singer/songwriter **Keith Stegall**. The debut of *Songwriter* will follow along the southern belt and includes the cities of Atlanta, Charlotte, Dallas, Oklahoma City, Jacksonville, New Orleans, Memphis, Tucson, Phoenix, Denver and Cincinnati.

A NIGHT OF SHINING STARS — The 18th annual CMA Awards show, which was televised nationally Oct. 8 from Nashville's Grand Ole Opry House, should certainly be an envy to the producers and directors of the many other award programs that fill the television schedules these days. The evening's event went off beautifully — moving smoothly from presentation to presentation with just enough well-timed intros, entertainment, and acceptance speeches to make an entertaining and interesting production. The stage lighting was very good and flexible enough to capture the mood of each of the acts that performed, allowing each to create the mood of the performances from **Dolly Parton's** opening number of "Tennessee Homesick Blues," **Ray Charles'** performance with a score of country music artists, Alabama and its cast of fiddlers, to **Loretta Lynn's** moving tribute to the late Texas Troubadour **Ernest Tubbs**, the performances were all top notch.

VISITIN' DAYS — The **Cash Box** staff had some good company to keep last week when **Cynthia Spencer** and **Kriss Brooks**, independent publicists from Ft. Worth, dropped by the offices with songstress **Deborah Allen** to visit and catch up on Allen's latest adventures, not the least of which was a skydiving venture along with her husband, songwriter **Rafe VanHoy**. And if that wasn't enough excitement, she's going to New York soon to work on her first video, *Rockin' Little Christmas*. But little did Allen know that she would get another first time opportunity that day at the **Cash Box** offices, and, actually, neither did the **Cash Box** staffers. It happened that **Dave Roberts**, manager of **John Conlee**, was in the office to give us a listen to Conlee's latest LP entitled "Blue Highway," which just happened to have a cut on it "A Little Bit Of Lovin'" that was written by Allen and VanHoy. As it turned out, we all got to hear the album for the first time, including Allen, who heard Conlee's interpretation of the tune and even added her own background vocals to the chorus.

BOB'S GEORGE BOOK — During the week of country music festivities, Doubleday & Co. and Network, Ink, Inc. held a party to celebrate Nashville journalist **Bob Allen's** publication of *George Jones: The Saga of an American Singer*. Allen, whose articles have appeared in *Esquire*, *Playboy*, *Rolling Stone*, *The Atlantic Monthly*, *Country Music* and *Cash Box* along with many other publications, chronicles Jones' music, life, loves, and controversies and examines the phenomenon of his influence and contributions to the continuing turns in country music.

COUNTRY IN GOSPEL — A trio of fine Nashville writers, **J.D. Martin**, **Gary Harrison**, and **Gloria Thomas**, wife of singer **B.J. Thomas**, have written the first gospel song to be represented at the World Popular Song Festival in Japan. The tune entitled "His Eyes" will be performed by gospel artist **Sheila Walsh** at the event, which is sponsored by the Yamaha Music Foundation. The competition takes place next week in Tokyo. Another of Music City's finest who has been involved in gospel music recently is Compleat artist **Vern Gosdin** who has released a gospel album called "If Jesus Comes Tomorrow, What Then." Gosdin singing the gospel songs makes for a great opportunity to hear where his early musical training began. He commented, "I've always loved good gospel music. My mother played the keyboard in church when I was just a boy. I used to stand right next to her as she played. That was my first experience with music. I was about 8 or 9 years old." This is Gosdin's first gospel album, and it contains songs ranging from the classic "I'll Fly Away" to some of the latest gospel songs written by Nashville writers.

AND MORE NEWS — George Jones has announced the formation of his own booking agency, Country Gold Talent, which is located at 4101 Lone Oak Road, Nashville, TN37214. Serving as agent is **Brenda Sherrick**.

IT COULD HAVE CINCHED THE WORLD SERIES — Lee Greenwood's rendition of the National Anthem seems to do something for the home team. The last three times that he has opened games with it have led to wins for the **Minnesota North Stars**, the **Texas Rangers**, and the **Seattle Mariners**. In fact, the morning after the late-season game in Seattle, a fan sent him a telegram that read, "Even the Mariners win for you."

From their roles in the movie *Songwriter*, Willie Nelson and Kris Kristofferson offer "Music From Songwriter," an LP full of original material from the talented two. The two sides of the platter are broken into Doc's Side and Blackie's Side, respectively Willie's and Kris' characters in the film, and each side features a duet from the pair. Nelson comes through with some strong ballads, "Who'll Buy My Memories" and "Songwriter," plus a tune with spirited lyrics, "Write Your Own Songs." Kristofferson contributes some fine numbers such as "Down To Her Socks," "Under The Gun," and is the co-writer of the first single release from the LP, the duet "How Do You Feel About Foolin' Around."

With "Treadin' Water," Earl Thomas Conley delves a little deeper into crossover-oriented material, but his writing efforts shine brightly on this LP and the throaty richness of his vocals come through a little more polished, but still distinctive and sincere. Stevie Ray Vaughan

CARNEGIE HALL, NEW YORK CITY — Putting Stevie Ray Vaughan on stage at Carnegie Hall with 10 pieces behind him is like taking a prime New York sirloin and preparing it like chicken fried steak: no matter how you dress it up, the meat is going to shine on through. With the Roomful of Blues horn section riffing stage right, with Dr. John sitting behind a concert grand and electric organ stage left, and Double Trouble joined by a second guitarist (Vaughan frere, Jimmie) and drummer (George Rains) stage center, it was Vaughan himself who provided the power and juice that made this "Soul ReVue" an evening to remember.

The concert's first hour was a typical Stevie Ray Vaughan set. He and Double Trouble kicked back, with Vaughan churning up and spitting out Jimi Hendrix (doing "Voodoo Chile"), Eric Clapton, and every hotshot guitarist who has blown out of the Texas blues scene. With heavy metal overtones, Vaughan ground out blues licks that many self-respecting blues guitarists wouldn't touch — thick, psychedelic and gruff. With the audience a-hootin' and a-hollerin', the velvet-clad guitarist showed off, pure and simple. But he was just warming up.

The second half of the concert was the "Soul ReVue." And with those five thorns chafing at the bit, those two drummers chugging like mad, Jimmie Vaughan warmed up and Dr. John just sitting there looking majestic, Vaughan poured it on. That is to say, he played and played and played and played. He played behind his head, he played behind his back, he played and he overplayed. He let his brother solo for a minute or two, and then he blew him away. He did not let the Roomful of Blues horns solo once. He did not let Dr. John solo once (though a guest vocalist, Angela Strehli — who did two bland numbers — had the sense to give Dr. John a piece of a chorus). He did not do very much interacting with the assembly. He just played and played and played and played. Now, let's face it — the Roomful horn section isn't exactly the Ellington Orchestra, but it is capable of turning in a good solo or two; and Dr. John isn't Professor Longhair, but he, too, can knock off some tasty tidbits on organ or piano. So why didn't Vaughan let them shine (notwithstanding the fact that the sound was muddy for the keyboards and horns)? I suspect it was because he was in the mood to play. And play he did. Boy, did he play. And when it was time for an encore, he did the sensible thing. He left

Double Trouble and company in the wings, sat himself on the edge of the stage and played a beautifully-wrought piece of a capella blues.

Afterward one didn't leave Carnegie Hall with the sound of horns or keys or whatnot ringing in one's ears. One left with some piercing electric guitar sounds reverberating through one's memory. It could have been 1,000 pieces on the stage: when Stevie Ray Vaughan feels like playing, look out!

Kenny Rogers and Oak Ridge Boys

BRENDON BYRNE ARENA, EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Kenny Rogers is at that coveted place in the music business where he would just about have to commit a felony to lose popularity, and even that might not be enough. Rogers brought his unique living room/laid-back/Las Vegas style to the Meadowlands recently and proved he is one of the most natural and believable performers who reside in the superstar category.

Rogers delighted the crowd with his self-effacing and witty stage rap, while serving up an almost complete feast of hits. He breezed through tight, professional arrangements of "You Decorated My Life," "She Believes In Me," "Lucille," "Coward of the County," "Lady," "Islands in the Stream" and "Evening Star." For "The Gambler," video screens framed the in-the-round stage to feature scenes from Rogers' film version of the tune, and Rogers announced that production would soon begin on *The Gambler III* for CBS. The screens returned for a professionally produced montage of Rogers' son's formative years as the star sang "You Are So Beautiful." For nostalgia buffs Rogers provided "Something's Burning," "Ruben James," and "Ruby, Don't Take Your Love to Town." Backed by an ensemble as tightly organized as any in show business, Rogers also featured newer material from his latest RCA album "What About Me," and rewarded a number in the crowd with tambourines, though the number of flowers Rogers picked up from fans throughout the show far exceeded the flung tambourines. All in all, Rogers' show is an honest, relaxed and thoroughly professional one devoid of any of the hype usually associated with show business acts of his caliber.

The Oak Ridge Boys warmed the crowd up in a hurry. With only their second album of greatest hits to promote, the band provided the crowd with a tightly-paced barrage of hit songs, including "Elvira," "Everyday," "Thank God For Kids" and the show-stopping closer,

"Bobby Sue." The Oaks are equally comfortable with gospel, ballads, straight-ahead country and good ol' rock and roll and each of the lead singers (Duane Allen, Joe Bonsall and William Lee Golden) takes his studied turn in the spotlight. But it's the booming, powerful, sexy bass of Richard Sterban that the crowd waits for. If you've forgotten what it was like to see the Beatles with a bunch of teen-age girls, you should catch the Oaks when Sterban is soloing. Records don't do his voice justice. When he wraps himself around a mike it's like the old movie days of "Sensurround." When your chair is vibrating and the crowd is screaming for the man in the immaculate suit, it's an unparalleled concert-going experience.

Romeo Void

THE PALACE, L.A. — Romeo Void survived the new wave art band pigeonholing of the late '70s to take its place among some of the less commercialized dance rockers of the '80s and Friday's late show at the Palace here proved that endurance. Since its early days of what could easily have been passed over as your average, run-of-the-mill art school pretention, Romeo Void has risen above that stereotype to gain enough popularity that it can now demonstrate its merits sans gratuitous flamboyance.

The mesmeric dance tempos of this act were a frustration to the shoulder-to-shoulder crowd, which strained for movement during virtually all of the band's tunes, which, even on a downtempo have that magnetizing swaying motion from the incomparably modulating monotone of vocalist Debora Iyall. Iyall, positioned center stage and close on the apron, was all but worshipped by the down-front crowd, shaking more hands and accepting more gifts than a politician. Bedecked in a simple mesh sack dress and copper jewelry, Iyall made a complete image departure from the performers who once preferred a nurse's uniform and matching syringe to the tasteful attire of Friday's show. The Iyall vocals have also taken a mellower and more melodic turn, though still driven by the underlying edge of frenetic tension that is a calling card of the Romeo Void sound. Faithfully running the gamut of the band's growing repertoire of club favorites, Iyall's performance was restrained enough to give her occasional gut-level intensity all the more spark.

Ben Bossi's saxophone was well oiled for the Friday show, laying down some shining solos which deserve recognition as some of the finest around. Bossi gave strength and electricity to the set, which lent an exciting contrast to Iyall's often underplayed vocals.

Romeo Void has massive, one might say animal, dance appeal. The Friday Palace show proved the infectiousness of that aspect of its music. Particular outbursts exploded during the current popular single, "A Girl In Trouble (Is A Temporary Thing)" when frenzy took the floor. Five years down the line, Romeo Void has shaken the art school label and joined the ranks of international dance club favorites.

Pointer Sisters

GREEK THEATRE, LOS ANGELES — After the postponement of their original Greek dates earlier this summer, RCA recording act the Pointer Sisters brought their electrifying stage show to L.A. last weekend. With a long history of pop smashes that stretches back to the early '70s, the Pointers had more than enough well-known and captivating material to please the capacity crowd on every cut.

Though sister Bonnie has gone her own way with a solo career, Anita, June and newly-recognized lead vocalist Ruth Pointer captured the evening from the first songs of the hour-and-a-half set. Working through such classic first hits as "Yes We Can" up through "Should I" and the sensuous "Slow Hand," the sisters proved their lead and harmonizing vocal prowess. With a crack six-piece band backing them yet not pushing them forward too hard, the ladies also showed the excellent timing and stage sense that comes with years of performing experience.

Trading off lead vocal chores, each of the sisters' voices were excellent and their flashy outfits only accentuated the well-rounded show. The three hits off of their latest disc "Break Out" were especially well received, including Ruth's smash "Automatic," "I'm So Excited" and their final encore "Jump," which the ladies used for a little audience participation.

From start to finish, the Pointers two-night engagement at the Greek was a textbook example of showmanship and ultimately well written and executive pop/R&B material. With the help of producer Richard Perry, the Pointers have remained a major crossover force, but this perfor-

United Kingdom

LONDON — Island Records, flushed with its success at hogging the number one singles and album spot with Frankie Goes To Hollywood and Bob Marley during this year, has launched itself into the home computer software business.

Island Logic, formed last fall, has put out its first release called The Music System. Using a floppy disk or cassette tape this converts a home computer into a sophisticated synthesizer for just £24.95 (\$32).

The Music System is a joint venture between Island Logic and Memorex and is being distributed in the UK by EMI. It will be launched in the U.S. next spring for the Commodore 64 micro and will be distributed by Simon and Schuster.

Island claims The Music System is the most advanced micro-based music program on the market. Island Logic's managing director is Adrian Boot, who first made his name as one of Europe's most respected rock photographers.

Following the success of the EMI/Virgin partnership for the marketing campaigns of "Now That's What I Call Music" compilation albums, EMI has struck up a new partnership with A&M. This partnership will handle all the promotions for two albums — Elkie Brooks' "Screen Gems" and The Carpenters' "Yesterday Once More." Both are greatest hits albums.

The liaison reinforces EMI's commitment to the TV market. "We are looking much closer to the TV than at any other time in the last five years," says Charles Webster, head of TV exploitation for EMI.

The Elkie Brooks album is unusual in that it is the first product ever to be initially released on compact disc only. The vinyl and cassette versions will follow in late October. Brooks has just started a marathon UK tour.

U.S. singer Andy Williams has just signed to EMI. He has been one of the most successful artists over the last three decades. His first album for the label "Greatest Love Classics," will be released next week. It was recorded at Abbey Road Studios with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and features well known love melodies by classical composers set to modern lyrics.

Deep Purple, who announced its reformation in April, has signed a worldwide deal with Polydor. The band is currently putting the finishing touches on the new album, set for worldwide release in October. They embark on a world tour in November. Ian Gillan comments, "To be back with Purple and doing it right is all I ever wanted, but half the time I didn't know it. The instantaneous feeling of

being together again reached us all as soon as we started working — and that was all the confirmation any of us needed. We have all worked our hang ups out of our systems through our solo careers and are very glad to be back together. It's very difficult not to smile in photographs these days."

Kim Wilde has signed an exclusive deal with MCA Records. The first fruits of the signing come in the form of a single titled "The Second Time" which was released October 1 in the UK. The album to follow is titled "Teases and Dares."

Kims' first MCA release is to be backed with a massive ad campaign. The video will be shot by the award-winning Big Features team. U.S. release for the single and album will most likely be the first quarter of 1985.

Japan

TOKYO — Uptel-Industries Co., Ltd. went bankrupt on Sept. 25, 1984. It's the first case of a big record company affiliated to JPRA (Japan Phonograph Record Association) that has experienced a failure. According to the JPRA, this case is an indication that the business conditions of the record industry in Japan are much worse than previously supposed. The liabilities of the company have been estimated at 7,500,000,000 yen (\$3,200,000). A good source in the Japanese music industry said that the main reasons for the failure of the company were the severe decrease in sales of "Karaoke-tape" (background music tape) which was the most salable item of the company. The company has submitted an application to the Tokyo district court asking an extension of payments for the liabilities overdue and permission to make an effort to reconstruct the company by a law for reconstruction of a company in bankruptcy.

Nippon Columbia is starting to release "the laser-videodisk-Karaoke" (background-music-video-disk), titled by Columbia Karaoke Videodisc: Best Eight Series Nov. 1, 1984. In its first release, the company is preparing 31 titles.

According to a survey of some big record dealers in Tokyo, the sales of disks and pre-recorded-tapes at the record-retailers level are very poor and growing worse. Some retailers said "both catalogs and new releases are not showing any signs of recovering sales. It's not clear yet for us whether the main reason for the poor sales is in the shortage of good product or the prevalence of rental record practices. At any rate, attractive sales strategies by major labels are indispensable for the sales season at the end of this year."

RCA Sales Conf. Looks Ahead

LONDON — The annual RCA Records sales conference took place two weeks ago in Blackpool. It included presentations from RCA, Columbia Video, Magnet Records and Telstra as well as Motown.

Their logo, 'Non-Stop To The Top' was fairly appropriate for the week because Motown's Stevie Wonder was at number one on the charts.

New managing director Don Burkheimer told the delegates: "We have excellent management, sales and promotions teams, but I'm not saying that we don't have any problems. However, we have a company that can only get better and will go all the way to the top."

Highlights of the conference included a presentation of a new musical project — *Chess*, written by Benny Andersson and Bjorn Ulvaeus of Abba fame, with lyrics by Tim Rice. *Chess* is a monumental work featuring 150 musicians and singers. Leading vocal parts are taken by Elaine Page, Murray Head and Barbara Dickson. The album will be released October 26, the day before a performance of the entire work is to be premiered in London. The stage show of *Chess* is planned to be followed in a year's time.

Other major albums planned for release over the next two months include "Big Bam Boom" by Hall and Oates and Kenny Rogers' "What About Me." Also set for release is the long-awaited soundtrack from the film *The Woman In Red* by Stevie Wonder which includes his number one hit "I Just Called To Say I Love You" and duets with Dionne Warwick.

K-Tel Int'l. Files Chapter 11

LOS ANGELES — K-Tel International, the Minneapolis-based company built on the sale of prerecorded, licensed music products, has filed for protection under chapter 11 of the Federal Bankruptcy Code. With 950 creditors, the company has listed assets of \$42,000,000 and liabilities of \$77,600,000, including a security debt of \$16,500,000. Also reported in the petition was the loss of \$11,512,000 for the first nine months of its most recent fiscal year. No date has been set as yet for the bankruptcy proceedings and K-Tel has received permission to continue in business.

Copyright Issue Addressed At UCLA

LOS ANGELES — Updating of copyright laws to keep up with the recent technology boom will be the main topic at an upcoming UCLA extension forum. Vice president of ASCAP Arthur Hamilton will coordinate the one-day forum which will take place October 27.

Entitled "The Burning Issues Of The Copyright Controversy," the meeting concerns the protection of creative rights under the new technology, and topics will include: record rental and home taping; the proposed jukebox amendment; video rental and home taping; piracy; formation of a Copyright Council and others.

Edward Asner, president of the Screen Actors Guild, congressman Howard Berman, attorney Jay Cooper and songwriter Tom Snow are also participating in the forum. For more information call UCLA at (213) 825-9064.

best-attended. The company, New England Digital, wowed even the experienced technicians with its unit, which offers a 32-track digital memory recorder, with SMPTE and MIDI provisions, a music printing option, individual speed and pitch control of each track and a host of other features. Equally sought out were units from Fairlight and Kurzweil, who exhibited in fifth-floor suites, most of which were commandeered by manufacturers. Eventide and Ursula Major offered free software updates to owners of their units, the Eventide SP2016 and the Ursula Major 8X32. Otari showed an impressive new line of recorders, Southcraft a new line of power amps, JVC a new digital audio mastering

system and their Super Beam microphone, designed for use at sports events, government hearings and music recitals and Stanton magnetics its highly researched Epoch II cartridge series, which can track even highly warped records. With these exhibitors added to the other established companies (JBL, Dolby, DBX, Orban, Panasonic and on and on) the AES needed four days just for attendees to make all the rounds.

Other important events on the society's agenda included a special program on the multi-media presentations developed for the 1984 Olympics and the convention Awards Banquet. Entertainment was provided at the banquet by the Norman Luboff Choir.

The label is enjoying current success with many top-charting albums which should show continued appeal into the Christmas season. Among these are

The GATT, subscribed to by 88 governments, is the only multilateral forum that sets rules for international trade. It focuses solely on trade in goods and does not now make rules for service industries such as the communications businesses subject of the CBS report. The GATT is scheduled to meet in Geneva in November.

The CBS report evolved from a study of subcommittee, headed by Wyman, advising the Office of the United States Trade Representative about U.S. trade problems in information- and entertainment-based industries.

their checks from abroad. The novelty, according to Metz, is in the rapidity with which clients will receive their payments.

Unlike ASCAP and BMI, which deal with various separate societies around the world and pay out royalties semi-annually (quarterly for domestic performances), Suisse will adhere to the 10-day format no matter when checks may arrive. Metz stated that instead of the usual 18-month period, writers and publishers may expect only a nine-month wait for first reports from Suisse's foreign licensees. Again, in contrast to ASCAP and BMI, performances will be recorded by each individual licensee rather than by survey experts.

Therefore, Suisse will be a publishing house that administers catalogs and not a collection agency. The new system, said Metz, "makes the client feel a lot safer," referring not only to the expediency of payments but also adding, "a bank cannot afford to give you a short cut." Citing the expenses writers often face when audited, Metz claims that his system will necessitate far fewer audits, if any.

Clearly, however, the greatest enthusiasm at Suisse is in regard to the lack of rigid, regular payment schedules which has been the norm with collection agencies and publishers.

When asked for whom this system will have the greatest appeal, Metz suggested, "it would fit maybe more into the television and motion picture area because these people have poor representation overseas." There are, however, songs in the catalog, and Metz sees virtually no limit to the appeal of Suisse's plans in the music arena. The company presently handles such clients as Newland-Raynor Productions, Barry Weitz Productions, The Film Consortium, Ten Four Productions, Billy Fine Productions and Arkoff International Pictures.

Suisse, a publicly-held company traded over the counter, will also be involved in film production, with a projection of about one feature per quarter. Regarding the company's plans in music, Metz feels Suisse's arrangement with Western United National Bank is "just going to revolutionize the publishing world."

New Firms Sign Up For AMOA Expo '84

CHICAGO — More than 45 new companies will be on hand to display their products and services at the October 24-27 AMOA exposition in Chicago's Hyatt Regency Hotel. "These companies have never exhibited before at the AMOA Expo," advised **Leo Droste**, AMOA's executive vice president, "and they look forward to participating in the coin-op industry's largest and longest-running exposition."

The 1984 convention will provide the largest exhibit space in the 35-year history of this outstanding industry event. More than 171 companies will be exhibiting their products and services in over 59,000 net square feet of space on two floors. Total exhibit area

exceeds 127,000 gross square feet.

Operator response to AMOA Expo '84 has become an encouraging sign that the industry is on an upswing, according to Droste. He also noted that manufacturers have been expressing an optimistic attitude about the show, with several planning to introduce new products expressly for the Expo audience. Some of the pieces being featured have never before been seen at any industry show, Droste added.

Dynamo's '84 World Championships Draws Record Attendance In Dallas

CHICAGO — Over 500 table soccer players from the U.S., Canada and Europe traveled to Dallas for the recently held 1984 Dynamo \$40,000 World Championships (8/31-9/3) at the Holiday Inn-D/FW Airport North. The four-day competition featured 15 categories of play, including events for both professional and novice players. Thirty-four states and three countries were represented at the tournament and attendance was up 30 percent over last year.

The action took place on 70 new Dynamo Soccer tables, set up in the hotel's ballroom and the events began Friday evening with Mixed Doubles and a Draw Your Partner Doubles. Saturday morning, novice players were treated to a free pro clinic conducted by **Tony Bacon**, the number one ranked player

going into the tournament. At noon, Dynamo president **Bill Rickett** officially welcomed all the players to Dallas and thanked them for their support of the Dynamo tour throughout 1984.

A highlight of the weekend, the Open Doubles category which offered \$5,000 for first place, began at 2:30 Saturday afternoon and the turnout exceeded all expectations, according to **Kathy Frainard**, Dynamo's director of promotions, with 103 teams taking part (compared to 72 teams in the same category at last year's World Championships).

Another big Saturday event was the Pro/Celebrity "Challenge for Charity," co-sponsored by Miller High Life and radio station KZEW-FM, which paired top table

An updated version of "Eve Of Destruction" (the 60's rock hit by Barry McGuire) was recently recorded by Stuey Fox on GP Records and is starting to pick up steam on college campuses and in the eastern market, according to Ben Arri-go of Glenn Productions. He feels it's perfect for jukebox programming. Ops may obtain promo copies by contacting Ben at 157 W. 57th St., New York, NY 10019.

Dateline Hialeah, home of Centuri, Inc. — where the "Hyper Sports" kit is currently in delivery. Sales manager Tom Siemieniec had just returned from attending the North Carolina state convention and was getting ready to head out to Richmond for the 10/12-14 Virginia state convention when we called. Tom told us Centuri is enthusiastic about the upcoming AMOA convention and is planning to introduce new product at the show.

Viking Intro's New Concept In Game Design, Service & Franchise System

CHICAGO — Viking Amusement, Inc., a recently formed company based in Alsip, Illinois, has developed a new concept in interchangeable software backed with a unique service program and a carefully structured national franchise system, designed for the current operating market. The Viking Delta System applies a hi-tech interchangeable software concept to Viking's new coin-operated video game and, unlike other interchangeable software machines, is compatible with most manufacturers' game software.

"The unique advantage of the Delta System," says Viking president Jim McClelland, "is that . . . operators can choose from a virtually inexhaustible selection of game programs and change software in a matter of minutes to keep pace with consumer preference. Plus, software can be rotated an unlimited number of times within the same cabinet."

Bill Caldwell, vice president, added ". . . the Viking Delta system offers flexibility and profitability that dedicated or other so-called interchangeable games can't compete with. The fact is, changing a game program simply involves unplugging one logic module and replacing it with another. And that's very appealing, especially when you consider the available alternatives, like complete hardware rotation."

To compliment the system, the firm has developed a simplified service program called DeltaServ. With DeltaServ modular construction, a total of only four modules comprise the entire electronic inner-workings of Viking machines; and these are the logic board (or software), the CRT module, power supply and control panel. In the event of a malfunction, the problem module is simply unplugged from the machine, exchanged and replaced.

McClelland emphasizes that DeltaServ virtually eliminates downtime for route operators. "And I don't think I have to tell you what a devastating effect downtime has traditionally had on operators' profits. That's what Viking is all about . . . breaking the traditional profit deadlock with the application of high technology." The replacement modules and software are available to route operators

through a local unit franchise owner.

The Viking Franchise System, also unique in the coin-op industry, has been developed to provide an avenue for independent entrepreneurs nationwide to establish their own coin-operated video amusement routes through Viking Franchise Owners. It also provides an efficient means of distribution for Viking's new products. "And franchise owners are afforded the opportunity to earn dual-source income," according to Caldwell, "one from establishing routes with independent operators and one from self-operated routes."

The Viking Franchise System functions as game distributors as well as local service offices for Viking's national operations, for a total market penetration.

The self-sufficient nature of Viking's total business system is, in McClelland's words, ". . . the key to the success of Viking's operations." Viking provides training for its franchise owners in the areas of location strategy, business operations as well as licensing and powerful marketing technique. Also, a carefully structured and documented operating and procedures manual provides a manageable format for franchise owners to follow.

In addition to the unit franchise owner, Viking has designated area licenses to be franchised for larger territories. These Viking Area Licensors receive exclusive rights to sell and service new unit franchise on a total market basis. The three-tiered system (National Franchisor, Area Licensor and Unit Franchise Owner) seems to be working even better than expected, according to recent company projections and past performance.

McClelland concluded, "Until now, the coin-operated video amusement business has been a tightly controlled industry. The Viking Franchise System opens up this industry to a fresh new market, creating new opportunities from new ideas. Our product, service and franchising systems were designed to work together — to provide support and increase profits for the operators . . . in short, to make it possible for the individual entrepreneur to successfully compete for his rightful share of this multi-billion dollar industry."

soccer pros with Doug Donley of the Dallas Cowboys, disc jockey Chris Taylor from KZEW and Dynamo's Mark Struhs, vice president of marketing and sales, as doubles teams. These Pro/Celebrity teams then accepted challenges from the other players for the price of a donation to Variety Club's Children's Charities. The Singles events began on Sunday and the finals in all events took place on Monday. The *PM Magazine* television crew from Channel 8 in Dallas was on hand to cover the finals and interview the winners. (Coverage was aired in the Dallas area Sept. 26).

About 300 people crowded into the grandstands on Monday evening to watch the Open Doubles final match, in one of the most exciting and intense displays of pro table soccer ever witnessed. In Mixed Doubles, Frank Garbuglio from Ohio and Jodi Wittenberg from Florida defeated Bob Gibson and Tami Grabber from Denver for first place. Third place went to past World Champions Doug Furry from Minnesota and Lori Sebranz from Dallas.

'The Wireless'

"The Wireless," currently being marketed by Digital Controls of Norcross, Georgia, allows individualized pricing on any number or type of coin-op games in a location, so that operators can price games according to their earnings performances. The unit eliminates the hassle of making change or counting tokens and can be plugged in to any wall socket to control the credit functions on up to 16 games.

The Wireless telephone-type key pad is banked by A-B-C-D lettered keys allowing the user to add anywhere from one to 99 plays on a game. For example, pressing key "A" or "B" will cause a preset number of games to be credited; the "C" function causes the number of plays set at The Wireless receiver to be automatically credited and the "D" function allows the user to go to the telephone



key pad to enter any number of plays that are to be credited to a game, from one to 99.

The Wireless rests in "watchdog" mode, overseeing an extensive theft-proof security system, which is backed by a noisy alarm. A second set of contacts allows for alternative controls, such as special lights, buzzers, etc. Up to 16 transmitters controlling a total of 256 games can be used on a single existing power line.
