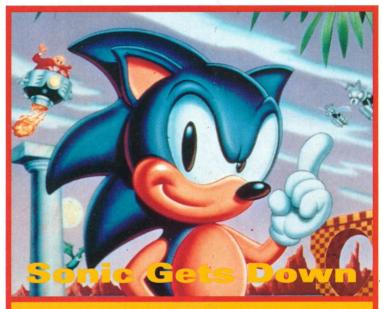
ifelike, fluid, beautifully animated and colourful.

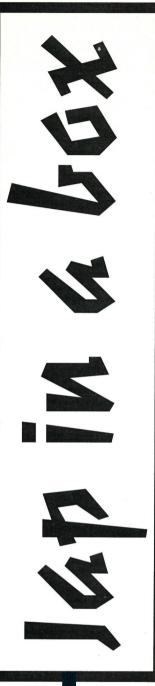
nother duet that Sega is quick to play down is the collaboration deal struck with General Electric, a company with its fingers in more pies than Mr Kipling. The thing is, Sega has long been keen to buy into the burgeoning business of virtual reality (you know *The Lawnmower Man*, and all that malarkey). GE, on the other hand, has extensive experience in the allied technologies of military simulation and image generation.

The first fruit of this union will be a Sega-designed image generator board, based on some of GE's spooky 'photo-texturing' software. Due out in mid-1993, this product will form the basis for a series of smart VR entertainment systems. And if all goes well there's the possibility of Sega games incorporating some of GE's huge library of virtual environments. Anyway, to give you a taster of just how sophisticated GE has made its simulations check out these screenshots from the Marconi simulators pictured here. Knocks *Marble Madness* into a cocked hat,, doesn't it?

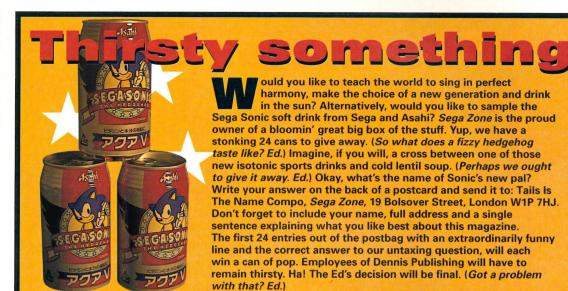


ave you heard it? The new Sonic The Hedgehog dance hit, Super Sonic? Here at Sega Zone it's had us whirling around the office. It was released on 24 November to coincide with Sonic 2sday and Sega is confidently predicting that, Cliff willing, it'll be the Crimbo No.1. (Not 'arf, pop pickers. Ed.) The popular music combo, HWA (Hedgehogs With Attitude) is the brainchild of Jeremy Healey, club DJ and formerly of Hayzee Fantayzee. According to our sources it all started as a lovely, sensitive ballad (you know the stuff: boy meets Hedgehog, boy loses Hedgehog, boy accidently squishes Hedgehog under the wheels of his truck), but it then evolved into all that dancey 'Yo switch on' business.

So will Sonic become a rock 'n' roll legend, and end up choking on his own vomit, face down in his pool? Or will he return to being a home-loving games star? Sonic's management are quick to scotch rumours of a future duet with the Pet Shop Boys, singing the Eurythmics classic Thorn In My (Back) Side, but we're not convinced. ekipaki from Toaplan?
Sounds like a furniture
shop in the Far East, but it's
actually a simple *Tetris*-style
game. Various coloured blocks fall
from the top of the screen. You
have to make a straight line of
more than five blocks of the same
colour. This line can be horizontal,
vertical or diagonal. When you've
made it, the blocks in that line
will disappear. Sound familiar?

There are special blocks, too. One of them erases all the blocks currently in view and another stays in the air to prevent blocks from falling further. You can change the level of difficulty by selecting the block size, speed or number of colours. *Tekipaki* is out now for the Mega Drive.

n a spree of busy press launches, Sega has made not one but six important product announcements concerning the Mega Drive and Mega-CD.

* Firstly, there's going to be a new console next year – the Mega Drive 2. Before you get too excited, there will only be slight cosmetic differences between it and Sega's current model.

* The next is Megadora Mouse (working title). This accessory, a fancy addition to the normal controller, can also be used like a trackball if you turn it upside down, making games like *Populous 2* and *Ultima Underworld* much easier to handle.

* Sega's response to the rival Mario Paint from Nintendo will be released in March 1993, although the price has still to be decided.

* Next, there's the Fighting Pad 6B (working title) which has six fire buttons instead of three. (Now there's a surprise. Ed.) If, or should that be when, Capcom finally converts the most excellent Streetfighter 2 over to the Mega Drive or Mega-CD, these extra buttons will come in very handy indeed. A release date and price haven't been announced but the first Fighting Pad 6B compatible game will be Real Fighters from Sega.

* The company is also working on a multiplayer accessory for the Mega Drive, enabling up to four players to simultaneously compete against each other.

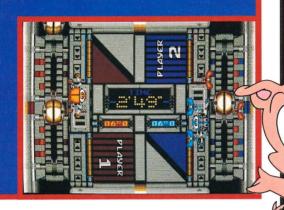
* Last, but by no means least, we have a Karaoke amplifier for the Mega-CD. Due for release on 18 December, this crazy bit of gadgetry costs ¥19,800 (around £107) and is there to help you sing along to the likes of She Loves You, You're The One That I Want and My Way. It comes with a microphone and connecting cable. (Phew! Is that everything? Ed.)

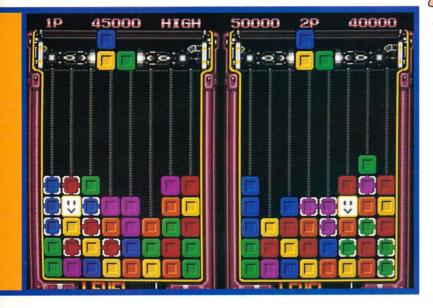


It's got balls!

trying the two-player mode where
you have to help one another. It's
actually a five-stage arcade game set in
New York. Stage four is particularly
gruelling, as the baddies from the first
three levels come back to try their
might and luck against yours. TMNT

will be out on 22 December for ¥6,800 (roughly £36).

Tiny Toon Adventures and Sunset Rider will follow shortly afterwards. There's no news of any Game Gear, Mega-CD or Master System conversions yet.



hen it comes to mindless shoot 'em-ups, they simply don't get any more thrilling than Sega's Loss Of Consciousness By G-Force, more commonly known as G-LOC. It's just brainless aerial dogfighting and a brief snatch of strafing followed by, wait for it, more brainless aerial dogfighting. If you're a fan of fast jet fighters, you'll love it.

Unfortunately, the designers at Sega may have made a fatal mistake with this one. While Afterburner 3 is available for the Mega-CD, G-LOC comes on a Mega **Drive cartridge** instead. This means the graphics come nowhere near arcade standard. On the plus side, the aircraft movement is smooth and it plays like the



original. Initially set for take-off in December, *G-LOC* has been delayed until February 1993 for the programmers to tweak the game system, although it still needs a lot of work if you ask us!

Each character has many unique moves, plus two special attacks that puff you out each time you use them. There's all sorts of throws, jump attacks and backwards moves for any bandits at six o'clock. If you play with a friend, you can choreograph this Fred-and-Ginger-style move where you jump off each other – as you can imagine - steam into a ruck-wielding Max and you're laughing. What's more there are knives, swords, iron bars and some of the heavier root vegetables, which can all be picked up, used, or hurled at a distant foe.

However, to accomplish all this you have to perform a frightening array of keypress permutations: Not only does it depend on which button you press, but also the speed you press it, the position of the D-pad, the nearness of the enemy, and whether there's an 'r' in the month.

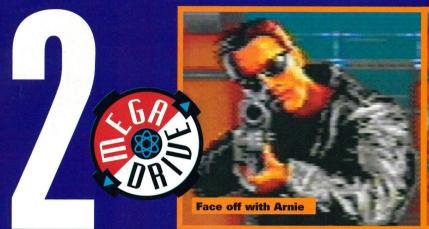

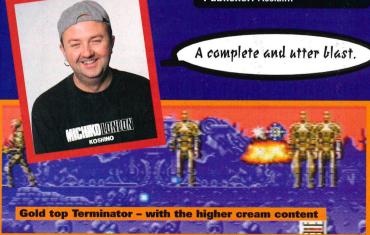

The good old Sega joypad isn't ideal for this game (there are some who would say it isn't ideal for any game). There seems to be a slight inertia effect on the movement of the sight cursor around the screen; there's a teensy delay that takes a little while to get used to. or those of you who don't know anything about Road Rash (and there's always one, so everyone else can just be patient for a minute), you're supposed to be a newcomer to an illegal and hazardous roadracing circuit. Apart from the usual dangers associated with tearing down country roads at excessive speeds, there's the additional minor detail of the 14 other racers being more than happy to beat you about the head, batter your expensive bike and push you in front of heavy goods vehicles in order to finish ahead of you.

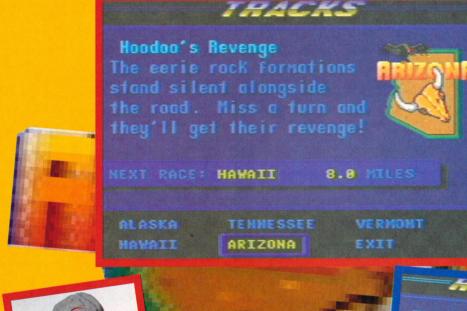

Road Rash 2 at last has a two-player option, hopefully quieting the thin, reedy voices of discontent that were raised when the original appeared. It's obviously been quite difficult to achieve and the Mega Drive seems to be struggling to cope with it, but at least it's there.

I'm not sure exactly why, but the steering in two-player mode is harsher than in single-player and, until you're used to it, you veer all over the place as if the bike isn't the only thing that's well-fuelled. Once you've adjusted your technique, however, it's quite manageable and has all the fun and violence you'd expect. The info showing your speed and position and so on isn't in the most convenient position visually, and there either isn't enough memory or enough space on screen for rear-view mirrors. It's also a little disappointing that there aren't any engine noises either, but the fact that the game manages to rise above this stuff anyway says a lot for it. There are two types of two-player game.

This is where it gets personal: pick a track, pick a weapon (billy club or bike chain) and set off, just you and your 'friend', with no computer opponents, in a battle to decide who really is the Bast of Basts. Not recommended to those with fragile friendships.

hazards, faster opponents and it's also harder to knock people off their bikes. In RR1, a welltimed head-punch or kidney-punch could remove someone in one go; now it doesn't happen. You can now, however, use chains as well as clubs to hurt people and (hooray! hooray!) batter the police, too. The kicking and punching sound effects have been improved from the slightly computer-beepy to the wincingly evocative, but the lack of engine noise on the two-player options is disappointing. There are more bikes, too

a limited number of nitro boosts per section. 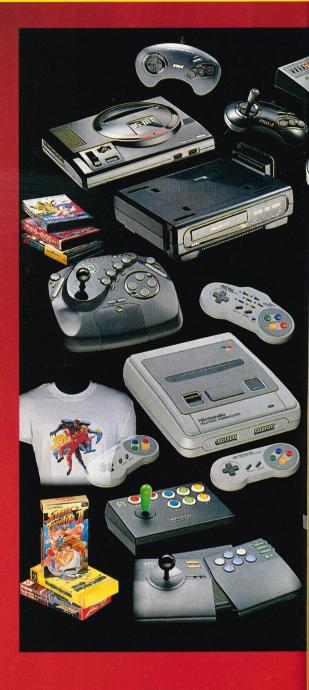

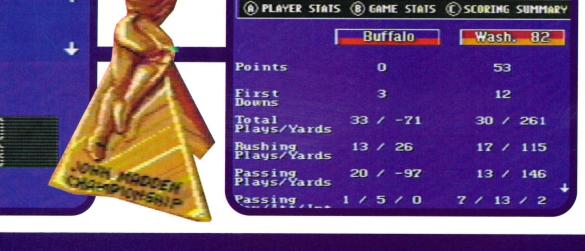

 Enough to worry about. Meanwhile, I'm still stuck in this mask, which is perhaps why I

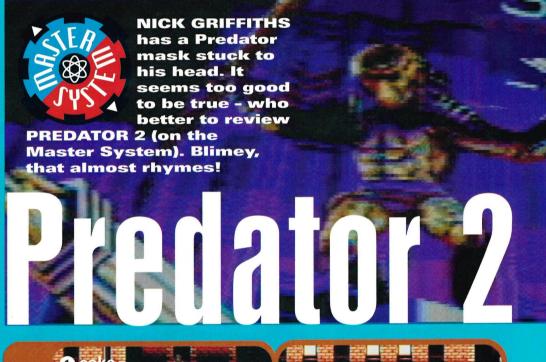

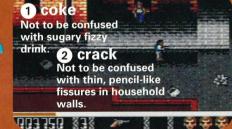
Based very loosely around that of the film, you wander around LA killing people who have taken too many drugs, informing them of their rights and saying, "You're not doing your body any favours, you know." Part of your mission is to rescue hostages, which is completely unlike the film because there weren't any in the film. The Predator takes no hostages. He is the Mexican-looking guy in westerns who squints a lot, chews tobacco and calls everyone 'Gringo'; he is the bloke with the mask and beret who swings through embassy windows; he is the dodgy geezer on the 747 with numerous explosives strapped to his stomach; he is... well, you get the idea. Preddie shoots first and asks questions later. In fact, he generally omits the question part altogether.

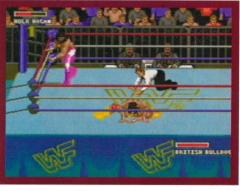

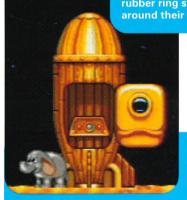

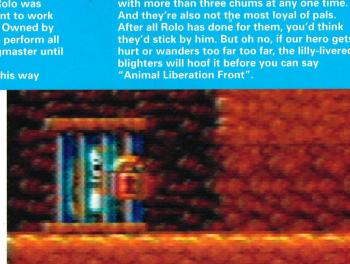

Our Rolo has a maximum friend capacity quota: his heart cannot cope with more than three chums at any one time. And they're also not the most loyal of pals. After all Rolo has done for them, you'd think they'd stick by him. But oh no, if our hero gets hurt or wanders too far too far, the lilly-livered blighters will hoof it before you can say



One of the fabbest features of the game is the fact that once the animals are freed, they get to ride Rolo, (That calls for an oo-er. Ed.) should the fancy take them. This involves up to three cuties balancing precariously on Rolo's back. Although, the schnooky value soars when you perform this trick, it's also an advisable safety measure for when the going gets tough.





RABBITS

After breeding, rabbits' favourite passtime is jumping. These particular rabbits can jump higher than any living herbivore and more to the point, higher than Rolo or any of his other friends.

MOLES

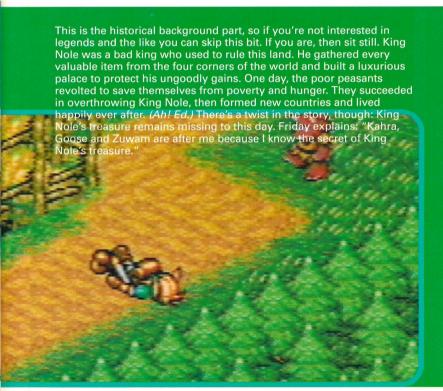
We needed a cool, swashbucklin' super hero to swash his buckle through this fearsome fantasy world of monsters, traps and tricksters but they were all out to lunch so we had to get RIK HAYNES and MASAKI OJI instead (well it was the best we could do). And the verdict? They can't put the thing down.

16Mbit game to hit the Mega Drive? Anybody who answered Streets Of Rage 2 or Bare Knuckle 2 should go straight to their lonely garden shed and write, "I must not believe everything printed in other inferior video game magazines," until they wise up. In case you haven't guessed yet, Landstalker is the first Mega Drive cart to sport an almighty and totally whopping 16 megs of memory. (Well, what's all the fuss about, guys? Ed.) Hmmm... essentially it means the designers of the game have the freedom to add lots of extra graphics, sounds, levels and other nice features. Judging by the sheer size of this epic fantasy RPG, the staff at Climax Entertainment and Sega must have squeezed every available bit out of their

rumbustious baby.

If you're new to this zany world of Sega entertainment, then, in a nutshell, Fantasy RPG is a short and easy way of explaining something that comes close to an interactive play. In this case, you take the role of a treasure hunter called Ryle. He's no Macbeth or Hamlet, but who's complaining? Starting out with nothing but his trusty sword and a will to win, Ryle must overcome the many obstacles and tribulations that lie in wait before him. Like any good script, there's a basic plot running through this rib-tickling adventure. If a beastie is walking towards you, try to kill it with your sword. If a treasure chest or bag is lying around, see what's inside. It could be some cash, a more powerful weapon, a new pair of gloves, an extra life or something bad and stinky. If a moving platform appears, jump on it carefully. And if another character, who doesn't obviously look like a baddie, is standing nearby, try to talk to them. The rest, as they say in the biz, is pure improvisation, luvvie. Got it?

The look of Landstalker is reminiscent of a corking 3D





According to Friday, Mercator Island holds a hint to the whereabouts of King Nole's long lost treasure. This place is infamous because many monsters live there. Even the toughest adventurers refuse to visit. Being a hard bast, Ryle decides to go there at once. Trouble is, he clumsily tumbles over the edge of a waterfall while trying to evade another giant boulder. Luckily, the mayor's daughter finds Ryle lying down on the ground near the waterfall and takes him to Masan Village. When he finally becomes conscious again, somebody tells Ryle that the old wise man who lives in the dungeon at the basin of the waterfall might be able to help him. Let the quest begin in earnest.

diorama from Airfix, except there's no sign of any pill boxes or German Panzer tanks. The hot, pumping, steaming hardcore action (What? Ed.) is seen from a slightly warped angle above. It's as if the security cameras on this elaborate set have been left running and we're being treated to a sneak glimpse of what's going on. This unusual viewpoint can be a real Pain In The Ass™ when trying to move Ryle into 'pixel perfect' positions along the edge of high ledges or near oppressive demons.

Like any good activity holiday in the countryside, there's simply too much to explore in one day or even a week. The list of things to look out for on your sightseeing trips should include trees, forests, hills, swamps, rivers, waterfalls, villages, towns, caves, dungeons, shops, churches, castles and everything else you would expect to find in a land of pure fantasy. It's picturesque, comical and very Japanese.

There are traps and tricksters aplenty, of course. Landstalker isn't short of a monster or two. Most of the time, it's just a question of a few quick jabs on the fire button to counter these pests with the only thing they respect and fear... the feel of cold steel.

As Ryle progresses through Mercator Island, the background soundtrack occasionally changes to reflect the intensity of the situation. If you're stuck in one particular area, however, these tunes can quickly become rather tedious. Our fave piece can be heard during the intro sequence where it sounds a bit like one of

those classic Bruce Lee kung-fu movies from the Seventies. On a less dramatic note, the sound effects aren't that impressive. (Only a few sampled screams? You've got to be joking! Ed.) And yes, those crazy Japs are about to release a special remix version of the music on compact disc.

It comes as no surprise to learn that Landstalker immediately became the best-selling Mega Drive title in Japan. Rumours of a sequel to this stonking romp are already circulating through the gleaming corridors of Sega's busy Tokyo HQ. And there's the snag; Landstalker is all in Japanese! That's right. No stupid dubbed voices or incomprehensible subtitles to help sort you out. It's just you and a whole script of katakana to contend with. Although you can happily stroll along doing your own thang, sometimes it helps you to understand exactly what your character and the rest of the cast is talking about. If Sega does actually decide to translate the staggering amount of text, the English version of Landstalker still won't appear until spring 1993. (Why should the great British public bother with it, then? Ed.) Well, if you like them big and meaty with oodles of gameplay, this is just the job.

Forget Zelda, goofy actor Robin Williams will be calling his kid Landstalker from now on. We started this review with a question, so why not end with one? (Is that it? Ed.) Erm, no. Does anybody know why Ryle and his chums are wearing those unfeasibly large booties?

The Sega Mega Drive apparently looked quite 'trendy' and 'en vogue' when first drooled over about three years ago. Nowadays, however, in the age of peanut-sized televisions and videos that look like After-Eight mints, the Mega Drive is a shiny hub of plastic, with a black banana for a joypad and buttons that would look crap on your mum's cooker. But it has two design pros: a) it's black; and b) it's flat, giving it a sleek

aerodynamic look and glossy space-age shine. If you want to be (very) imaginative about this, it looks how you'd imagine a scud launcher to look - the round base of the missile would slot into the cartridge area while the volume control acts as the 'fire

engines' switch. Luckily, you can be quite brutal with it. Ram a cartridge in the port and it crunches home with

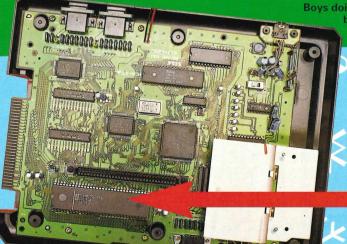
a satisfying thud. Flick the power switch on and off as many times as you want in a second. Play 'broom broom' back and forth with the volume control. Even poking the plaster-like reset button really hard does no damage. The joypad's just as indestructible. The three buttons (As usually fire, Bs usually second weapon, and Cs usually smart-arse ninja gun), a paracetemol doubling as a start button and a spongy joypad - all survived the ultimate in Sega Zone test violence, physical abuse, and emersion in three-day

nder the sleek exterior, lies a heart of hi-tech gold. A mass of dedicated chips slave away to produce special effects for games. Hardware scrolling, without which Sonic would be just a squashed bit of flesh on Dad's tyre, is catered for; it can be pushed to produce parallax or 'layers' of scrolling backgrounds for extra 'wow'ness. Sprite Handling, too, is chip-operated; between 64 and 80 sprites (or 'moving characters' if you want to be patronised) can swamp the screen at once, sized from 8x8 pixels to 32x32. Add to this 64 colours on screen from a palette

of 512 and an impressive screen resolution of 320 by 224 pixels and you're looking at some pretty pretty games

Inside there's a 16-bit 68000 central processor running at a reasonable 6.7 mhz, support by the dedicated game chips and an 8-bit Z80A controller chip. Sound is eight channel and split between chip-generated 'beepy' PCM sounds for lasers and sirens, and a second FM (Frequency Modulation) which han-dles the music. It's designed to make the tunes sound as much like Supermarket Muzac and drumbeats sound like one of the Fat

The grandad of the Sega range, the Master System was thankfully redesigned last year, changing it from a black plastic parasol-base into a black plastic object that may well have fallen off a Klingon Star Destroyer. Nowadays, in fact, it looks like a table top version of the Game Gear, with a cartridge 'hump' replacing the screen and, on the whole, a much smoother finish. The power buttons and volume control are subtly placed on the left side, leaving the rest of the base free for the manufacturers to write Sega at every opportunity (twice in fact). As for comparison to household objects, the Master System II (as the new model is termed) is about the size of a large phone and shape of something quite funny you might find in the kitchen (which I can't think of).

It, too, like its 'son' the Mega Drive, is very hard and durable, surviving the most excruciating of flights across the Sega Zone office. The carts are quite small and cute and about the size of a reasonable cut of cheese. The joypads, however, are a let-down. Soggy, cheap-looking, cheap-feeling, with two rubbery buttons, and a one-piece pad with damp feedback. But, suprisingly, they do the job and respond very well. Looks aren't really that important at the end of the day.

Sega's concentrating mainly on the Mega Drive and Game Gear leaving the Master System out shivering in the cold of the Christmas winter. Don't be put off, though. The immense software range and 'trendification' of the design means the Master System is still a box to reckoned with. Especially as it's packaged thus:

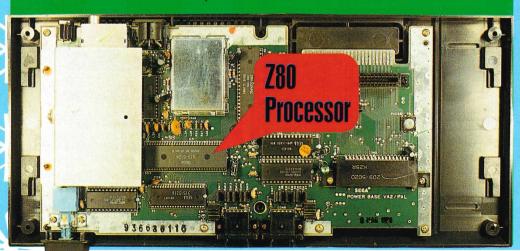

pening up the Master System reveals a small label which reads: OPENING OF THIS CONSOLE WILL INVALIDATE YOUR GUARANTEE Oops. Oh well, it's worth it just to see the antiquated Z80A Custom processor which controls the entire console. Z80's are a bit dated these days due to their lack of speed but are mainly used in arcade machines to handle sound effects. The Master System's CPU, however, is custom-fitted with the microchip equivalent of go-faster stripes and halogen headlamps. There's a 160x146 screen resolution and 16 colours (decanted from a palette of 64). The 4-channel ratherbeepy-but-what-do-you-expect-fromsomething-so-cheap-the-London-Philarmonic? sound chip performs admirably on the revving motorcycles, laser beam, explosion front





master system converter sega £29.99

The Master System converter rather reminds me of the peak on a baseball cap, but in fact it's a piece of kit which slots into the top of your Mega Drive and allows you to play Master System games on your Mega Drive. It's handy if you've traded up from a MS to a MD, but can't bear to part with some of your golden oldies. You'll also be able to play games out on MS not on MD (probably far and few between) and also borrow carts from your MS-owning mates.

This dual use 'novelty' joystick - a) to play games; and b) to scare your mum with - looks like it should be crap but actually plays like a dream. Fitting 'amusingly' in your hand, use its ah, tail as a joystick, and its eyes as buttons. It also has auto-fire and microswitches for extra sensitivity. It's brilliant and funny and reasonably cheap.

Although quite ugly in design, the Game Gear is being marketed as a street credible addition to any wunderkind's school bag. On the minus side, it's rounded and bulging and dirty grey in colour. It's also the shape I've imagined the pancreas to be. It can't be held with one hand, so it looses the 'casual look' most handheld gamesplayer crave.

It has a spongy joypad on one side, and two clickly buttons on the other. The power and volume controls are wisely hidden across the top edge. Colour-wise, the Sega designers have gone for the old 'blue, orange and grey colour scheme' ploy. The result is quite attractive but not as 'habitat' as the Game Boy. Of the three, the Gear looks the most futuristic. It's streamlined, ergonomic and bulky (about the size of a good novel), but then again, spaceship-shaped enough to attract the femmes. However, coincidentally enough, of the three the Gear is the one that most resembles a handbag.

n the techno-speccy side the Game Gear is almost identical to the Master System. The chips are closer together and the palette has been expanded to a whopping 4096 (bigger than the Mega Drive). An extra special screen resolution (480x146) has been sneaked in to anticipate the arrival of the TV aerial tuner (see ADD-ONS). The screen is a lovely 3.2inch backlit affair, which provides minimum glare and stops people looking over your shoulder to watch how crap you're doing.

It is handy however for hunting for clues when Miss Scarlet gets it in the library with the lead piping. Pay £12 for a large clearer picture and save £10 on an eyetest charge (That's a bit political. Ed.)



master-gear converter sega £12.99

Another clever clever Sega invention. This cheap add-on boosts the Game Gear's game collection umpteen times by making it Master System games compatible. But, before you start drooling and dribbling in expectation, bear this one thing in mind. A lot of Gear games are straight ports from the Master System, so they're identical anyway. Still, it's useful if you have a Master System 'chum' or a rental emporium nearby.

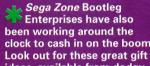

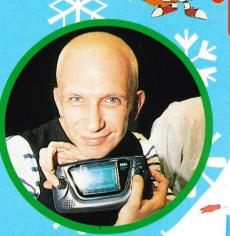

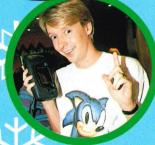

Not a true shoot 'em up in the sense of the word as there is a small smattering of strategy, but fast and furious action is guaranteed. The object of the game is to basically rescue as many American hostages s possible from the clutches of the evil abs. Simple, addictive. Classic.

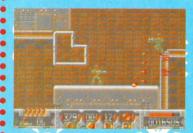


2 Thunderforce III (Techno Soft)

This is probably the finest arcade style shoot em up on that slab of plastic known to many as the Mega Drive. Great backdrops and sound, coupled with extremely fast gameplay and more power-ups than you can handle, make this the Pop Tarts of shoot 'em ups, although some have argued that it's a teensy weensy bit easy.

3 Universal Soldier (Accolade)

Previously Turrican II on the computer formats, Universal Soldier is a shoot 'em up come platform game with levels that are bigger than Bernard Manning's underpants Plenty of power-ups, hidden rooms and enemies. Just as good as the classic computer versions, if not better.



4 Thunderforce II (Technosoft)

The infamous Thunderforce series makes another showing in the chart, this time with the second game. Made in 1989 it has stood the test of time well. Contains everything you'd expect -, fast scrolling, plenty of enemies and more power-ups than you could shake a medium-sized cabbage at. Addictive arcade frolics quaranteed.

5 Star Control (Electronic Arts)

This game really comes into its own in two player mode. A classic reworking of a classic old game, although you either completely lurrve it (as most do) or completely hate it (a small minority)

6 Fatal Rewind (Electronic Arts)

Escape from a maze of platforms and puzzles in a futuristic game show while an ever decreasing time limit and deadly rising acid keep you on your toes. Great fun, especially the novel action replay feature which allows you to watch your death and rejoin at any time.

7 After Burner II (Sega)

The legendary arcade coin-op hit makes its way on the Mega Drive with no troubles at all. Simple blow everything up type action in a plane. Very fast and very addictive, if you liked the arcade, you'll like this. If you didn't, well,

8 Mercs (Sega)

This is basically a reworking of the Tony Blackburn of shoot 'em ups, *Ikari Warriors* Except this time the scrolling is 8-way, the graphics are improved and the power ups make the Iraqi weapon deposits look like rejects from an old series of Blakes 7. The idea of the game is to rescue the president of America who's been kidnapped, but that's just an excuse for some mindless violence. Great fun.

g Zero Wing (Sega)

10 Xenon II (Virgin)

5 Kid Chameleon (Sega)

When this game was first released it was underated by most people. As it stands this is well smaaaarrt with over 100 levels, meaning it'll last longer than an economy pack of Andrex. You have to go around and collect different sorts of helmets. Sounds bizarre but is great fun. Addictive as well and will keep you playing well into the small hours. (Or untill your mum won't let you play on the Sega anymore 'cos it's too late.) Smaaart.

6 Spiderman (Sega)

Rather good fun, rather good graphics and rather good sound make this a rather addictive game.

7 Gods (Import)

Apparantly Sega doesn't think this is good enough to be released in old blighty so it's only available on import at the mo, but hopefully this situation will change soon as Gods is an excellent platform game with countless hidden bonuses and a special feature which adjusts the difficulty level depending on how good you are at it. Very addictive and very playable.



8 Alien z (Acclaim)

At last! A conversion which is better than the original film! You control Ripley as she makes her way around the alien-infested corridors searching for the odd prisoner or two who have been captured. Spooky atmosphere due to the graphics and eerie sound, make this a bit more than your average platform game. Plenty of large weapons are also available. Great fun. If you liked the films, then you'll love this.

g Wonderboy z (Sega)

Another of Wonderboy's outings, and arguably one of the best. Usual platform fare with our pal Wonderboy having to yet again rescue his gal. Smarto graphics and plenty of cunning puzzles put this above the other games in this series, although some have said that it does get a tad repetitive.

10 Chuck Rock (Virgin)

Prehistoric platform japes here in this strangely humorous game. You control a fat overweight caveman who has to rescue his wife. The graphics are wonderful, and for the first time ever this is a console game that is actually funny. Not that fast, but still very playable. Great sampled speech as well.

1 NHPLA Hockey (Electronic Arts)

This is basically EA Hockey 2 and it's really rather fab. Even if you're the sort of person who detests ice hockey you'll probably like this. It's got a very good control system which is surprisingly easy to pick up. As with all sports games this is not too much fun in one player mode but it comes into its own in two player mode. Excellent.



2 John Madden '92 (Electronic Arts)

If you don't already have this it's basically a rather good American footy game, which is totally excellent in two player mode. z Speedball 2 (Virgin)

Ultra violent sports game set in the future. It's basically football, except you're allowed to use your hands and there are no rules, whatsoever. The futuristic arena contains pinball style bounce domes and other objects and this basically means you can just beat everyone up all the time.

Brill in one player mode and is totally amazing in two player. Probably the all-time greatest two player game.

4 PGA Tour Golf (Electronic Arts)

If you're a fan of wearing daft trousers and telling people how great your handicap is, then this is the game for you. If, on the other hand you're not a great fan of the game played by top 'celebrities' such as Bruce Forsyth and Jimmy Tarbuck then you'll probably find this as intresting as a compilation video of the greatest moments of the Royal Variety Show. Great for golf freaks, not so good for people who aren't so mad on it.

5 Euro Cup Soccer (Tecmagik)

This is a conversion of the well received Manchester United game that was available on the computers a while back. Smarto graphics and animation wise, although the control method can get a tad annoying. It's got a rather strange viewpoint, which is a kind of horizontal, slightly in the air one. Pretty smart game, even if you don't like footy.

6 Sports Talk Baseball (Sega)

The thing about most sports games is that if you don't like the sport that much, you probably won't like the game. Sports Talk Baseball is one such game. If you like baseball and want a baseball game for your Mega Drive then this is the best one available. If you don't, well why are you reading this?

7 Bulls Vs Lakers (Electronic Arts)

Another case of a game for basketball fans only. Packed to the rim with more statistics than you could wedge in a pair of very large underpants and loadsa flashy presentation, this is a very nice game to look at and play. Once you've got the hang of it, it's very addictive, a must for any basketball fan.



8 Aquabatics (Electronic Arts)

James Pond and his pals are back, this time in an alternative Olympics. There are plenty of events in this game to keep you interested, ranging from stopping seals from being woken up (!) to basic running races. Once you've got the control method sussed, this is an excellent game. The game has nice graphical touches, and okay-ish music. You can have up to three other friends competing along with you, which is brilliant. Strangely enough the game is just as good in one player mode.



g David Robinson's Basketball (Sega)

Once again it's one of those sports games with the commentators so annoying, that they make repeats of Winner Takes All with Jimmy Tarby Tarbuck (or Jimmy Tory bast' Tarbuck as we prefer to call him) look watchable. If you want a basketball game get Bulls Vs Lakers first, but if you're still hungry for more then this would be a wise choice. The most exciting thing in the game, except for the actual basketball itself, is probably when David himself pops up at half time to offer some advice. Swooon!

10 Joe Montana II (Sega)

This is basically a poor man's John Madden '92. That doesn't mean that it's bad, quite the opposite, but if you don't have an American footy game then get JM92 first. A novel touch is the spoken, sampled commentary throughout the match, but this isn't that good, unfortunately, and soon gets on your nerves. Gameplay-wise this is pretty playable and addictive and it is quite nice graphically. If you're bored with JM92 and want a new challenge then this is worth getting, but if not just stick with John Madden.

TOP 10 BEAT 'EM UPS

1 Streets of Rage (Sega)

With Streets Of Rage 2 out any moment now this could soon be knocked off the top spot, but as it stands, this is one of the finest beat 'em ups available. Presentation-wise this game has lovely backdrops, big sprites, fabby animation and an excellent soundtrack. Couple that with a simultaneous two player mode and some smart playability and you've got a rather excellent beat 'em up. Unfortunately, as with most beat 'em ups, it's a bit easy.



2 Revenge of Shinobi (Sega)

Although this game has been knocking around for a fair bit of time, it's still excellent. If you haven't played *Shinobi* before, you have to go around shooting your throwing stars at

whoever gets in your way. On the presentation front there's lots of varied levels, some rather smart music and some just as smart graphics. So addictive it makes you want to shout "Hiiiiii Yaaaa" at the top of your voice. And not many games make you want to do that do they?

7 Two Crude Dudes (Sega)

Quite a humorous beat 'em up this one. Simultaneous two player mode is the call of the day here. This is an almost areade perfect conversion. You control two rather musclebound chaps as they head off to find a mad professor who wants to take over the world. Okay, so the plot may be not much cop, but the game certainly is. It's well worth having a look at.

4 Pitfighter (Tengen)

Bare knuckle fighting is not only very violent, but not very nice really. It's also very illegal and just as dangerous. It also makes a rather fabby Mega Drive game with oodles of digitised graphics and sampled sound. Just as good in one player mode as it is in two player mode and just as playable. More fun than getting beaten up by someone, which isn't really that much fun is it? One of the best single location beat 'em ups available.

5 Strider (Sega)

A better than average conversion of a better than average coin-op. Addictive slash 'em up gameplay mixed with Russian style graphics make a rather good game. You play this Strider chappy, who is more flexible than an Access card, and can do countless numbers of somersaults, cartwheels and handstands. Some of the backgrounds are amazingly drawn, and the sound ain't too bad either.

6 Golden Axe II (Sega)

If you're already the proud owner of the original Golden Axe there is not much point in buying this because it's virtually the same. But then if you don't own either, then this is quite a good game if you're in the mood for some medieval-style sword play. It is a tad too easy though, but is good fun in two player simultaneous mode.

7 Shadow Of The Beast (Electronic Arts)

In this game you have been turned into a beast and you have to battle your way through various stages to reach the Beast Lord so that you can be turned back into a man again. This allows for lots of jokes about losing your 'manhood' and 'beastiality'. Graphically and musically this game is superb. It is true to say that the gameplay does get a bit repetitive after a while, but the MD version is a lot better than the Amiga original from which it was converted.



8 Double Dragon (Accolade)

Although this game is definitely showing its age now, it's still fab. And as you can buy it at a knock down price, it's a bit of a barg really. The conversion is almost spot on from the arcade, which is no major feat considering how old the arcade is, but is still good fun. Best in two player mode though. Presentation wise, it's pretty smaaart.

g Batman (Sun soft)

Not amazing, but this is an okay beat 'em up starring the caped crusader. Quite nice, dark, moody graphics. It does get a bit boring after a while due to the repetitiveness. Unfortunately the Boy Wonder doesn't get a look in, and Batman doesn't look like the horizontally challenged actor Adam West but I suppose you can't have everything.

10 Alien Storm (Sega)

This has been described as a Golden Axe meets Buck Rogers with a bit of Oppo Wolf chucked in. Basically you just go around frying all the aliens. Crap on the Master System, not crap on the Mega Drive. Great laff in two player mode, although the idea is not that original. It's still great fun though.

TOP 5 DRIVING GAMES

1 Road Rash (Electronic Arts)

This, as you probably know, is a rather good motor biking sim with a difference. The difference being that you can beat up the other drivers. Hurrah! Road Rashers aren't large slices of bacon left on the side of motorways as you may have expected, but people who take part in illegal races to boost their funds. In these races, the basic idea is to be the first to get to the finish. That's about as far as the rules go really. A fantastic game.



2 Super Monaco GP II (Sega)

The sequel to Super Monaco GP believe it or not. Not very different to the original, but still very good. The control system isn't the best in the world, but once you've got the hang of it, it's pretty smart. Speedwise you're onto a winner too. This is probably the best driving game on the Mega Drive.

z Test Drive II (Ballistic)

More of a sim this game than an arcade style game, but that doesn't mean it's boring. Actually, it's quite good fun. You drive around various exotic locations, such as mountain tops, in 'dream cars' such as Ferraris etc. (But if you're a bit of a sad boy who dreams about cars, then I pity you.)



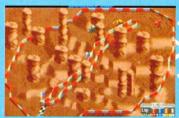


4 Super Hang On (Sega)

The infamous arcade motorbike game makes its way onto the Sega. Actually it did this a long time ago, which is probably why it's at such a knockdown price. This game does look somewhat dated these days, but it's still quite good fun. If you liked the arcade, you'll love this and if you've never seen it before it's worth checking out if motorbikes are your scene, (only after you've tried the superior Road Rash of course).

5 Super Off Road (Accolade)

Another arcade conversion here and quite a good one at that. You control a jeep and have to drive around various obstacle ridden courses, from a super sprint style viewpoint. Not too amazing in one player mode, but with a friend in two player mode it's excellent.

1 R-Type (Sega)

The evil BYDO empire has taken over the planet and your task is to wipe out their evil forces. So it sounds simple? Well it's not.. If you couple frustratingly addictive gameplay with rather spiffo graphics then you've got a very good conversion of the arcade classic. With rather more power-ups than you could shake a very large retro booster at, it's not a bad little shoot 'em up. Smaart.

2 Galaxy Force 2 (Sega)

If any one out there remembers the arcade version of this you'll remember that the game was housed in a round pod type thing which looks like an old prop from *The Prisoner*. This spun around a lot and made you sick. Well unfortunately this isn't available on the old Master System, but what is available is rather fabbo gameplay, 3D scrolling, surprisingly good sound and some neat graphics.

3 Xenon II (Virgin)

The Bitmap Brothers classic makes its way on to the Sega, yet remains very close to the Amiga original (ie. power-ups meatier than seven pork chops and a leg of lamb, smart graphics and addictive gameplay). One of the big selling points of the game originally was the music, provided by Bomb The Bass, but on the humble Master System this sounds like it's being played on the bottom of the range Bontempi keyboard. (ie. totally crap).

4 Darius II (Sega)

Yet another conversion, this time it's the underwater adventures of *Darius II* which is making its way onto the Master System. Usual shoot 'em up fare here, nothing original. But who cares? Not me, 'cos it's extremely addictive and has some rather wizzo graphics.

5 Choplifter (Sega)

Right, brace yourselves. (Oh dear. I sense a crap joke coming up. Ed) This is a game about CHOPPERS. Ha ha ha. The old ones are the best, aren't they? And Choplifter is no exception. It may be older than Val Doonican's grandparents, but it's still damn playable. Horizontally scrolling action is the order of the day here.

6 Super Space Invaders (Domark)

Space Invaders is back, but this time it's been 'remixed' into a much more enjoyable game for the gamesplayers of today. This means that as well as the normal shoot up the screen bits, there are power-ups a plenty, large mutha guardians, scrolling backgrounds, improved graphics and a sub game where you have to rescue cows(?). It's basically Space Invaders with knobs on, but my, what knobs!

7 Mercs (Sega)

Another conversion which has just had its knobs enlarged (Steady on. Ed) is Mercs, a remake of the old classic Ikari Warriors. Once again, the classic addictive gameplay remains as you blast your way through countess war ridden terrians, but as you'd expect the graphics, sound and power- ups have all been improved. Excellent.

4 Vigilante (Sega)

Usual multi screen beat 'em up game which for some unexplained reason is strangely addictive. Maybe it's because of the many different screens, buckets of action and the excellent playability. Unfortunately, as with most beat 'em ups it's not that hard, but it is quite good fun to come back to.

5 Dynamite Dux (Sega)

The usual Jimmy Nail lookalike thugs in beat em up games have been replaced with psycho teddy bears, killer pandas and hard not dogs). Then replace your usual beefcake heroes with two big ducks with boxing gloves



and give them stupid names. Couple this with some rather sweet graphics, annoyingly humable tunes, simultaneous two player action and a fair splodge of addictiveness and you've got a rather good game.

6 Golden Axe (Sega)

A jolly good conversion of the infamous arcade medieval beat 'em up. Plenty of stages of unadulterated beat 'em up action. The two player mode is jolly good too, as are the rather nicely drawn graphics. A once amazing game is now starting to show its age, but it still is great fun. Bit too easy though.

7 Rampage (Sega)

8 Shadow of The Beast (Teckmagik)

Well the Master System does its best at emulating the Amiga version presentation-wise, but on the playability front It fails! It vastly improves on the Amiga version! Quite a tough one this, and it'll keep you at it for ages!



g Moonwalker (Sega)

The man with no genitals (allegedly) who picks his nose from a catalogue is back! This time in a suprisingly good beat 'em up cum platform game. You play wacko Jacko and you have to go around and rescue all the little kids from the clutches of the evil Mr. Big. Awww! Isn't that sweet. The graphics are pretty good, but somehow the humble old Sega doesn't seem to be able to cope with Michael's funky little ditties.

10 Shinobi (Sega)

Fanatical Welshmen

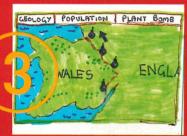

Peace Squadron

My game is a shoot 'em up in which there's a twist – there are no weapons and no power-ups. None at all. The idea in *Peace Squadron* is to avoid conflict at all costs. You control your spaceship (up/down/left/right) and have to make it, unscathed, through the eight increasingly tortuous levels. When you get to an 'end-of-level nasty', you have to try to 'talk it out'.

The control system changes from your spaceship to a point 'n' click affair where you cobble together sentences from a list of onscreen verbs, nouns and adjectives. If you anger the end-of-level

nasty, he will kill you. If you can make him see the senselessness of his violent ways, he will let you pass unscathed. So what do you think? I feel this is the sort of game we'll be seeing more of in the Nineties.

part one

This is the character generation screen, where you set Taffy's attributes. After you've done this, to help get you in the mood for the game to come, there's a short animated introduction showing Taffy as he grows up (it includes key events in his life, like his school trip to Birmingham). This intro would be longer on the Mega CD.

part two

Now Taffy must get some explosives. This part is a vertical and horizontally scrolling platform 'shoot and collect 'em up'. Taffy starts off using his fists, but can find a stick or iron bar. The explosives would be hidden in boxes marked TNT. (Well hidden then. Ed.)

part three

Your success now depends on your success in the previous part of the game, ie whether you found many explosives or not. In this third part of the game, you have to plant your explosives at key points along the Welsh/English border. There's a map to study, with geological reports and plate tectonics surveys to digest.

parts four and five

Here things get complicated, as the game plays differently, depending on where you planted the bombs in part three. If you planted them correctly the whole of Wales should have blown west slightly – into the Atlantic Ocean – setting up a natural sea border between it and England. (You get a congratulatory message and move on to part six.) If you didn't plant the bombs in the correct locations, however, Wales will remain where it's always been – joined onto England, but some of it will have been destroyed needlessly by the explosive force of your attempt and you'll have civil disorder on your hands as a result. (You'll need to quell this uprising in an up/down/left/right scrolling beat 'em up.)

part six

This is the management section of the game, where you have to look after your population and set up trade with the other countries in the world. You also have to juggle your resources and defend your borders against a possible English attack. (They're none too pleased, obviously.) This part of the game uses a point 'n' click interface for the most part and at the end (it goes on for ages, until Taffy dies of old age) you can find out how successful you were by the number of people who attend your funeral. The end.



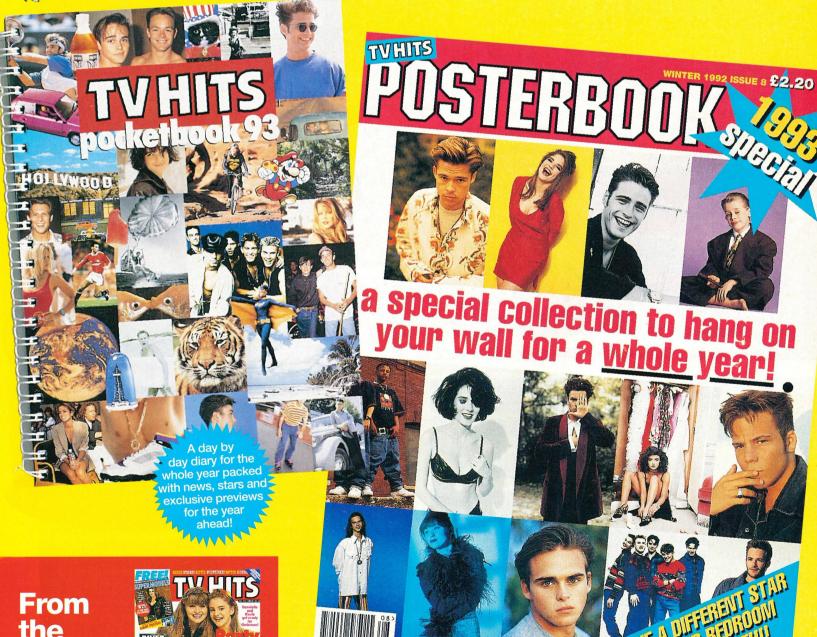
