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EDITORIAL

No Hype About Publicity

The record industry, like the movie world, operates on a star system. Not only are the recording artists stars, but also the personnel at the respective record companies. But there is one department that is consistently overlooked by both top-level executives and even many artists - and that is the under-staffed and overworked publicity department.

In this era of media saturation, press has become a valuable marketing tool for labels in an effort to expose and break new acts. Artists like Meat Loaf and The Cars have become "darlings of the press" and this has helped in their overall success. With the marketplace being flooded with new talent and albums, exposure through newspapers, magazines and television has become as vital as live concerts and airplay. Every facet of exposure is necessary for new and growing artists to attain new sales levels.

While promotion staffs are usually flashy lots with slick lines and an aversion to the word "no," the publicity people are lower-keyed but with a similar dedication to success. But, because there is no way to gauge how ink sells records, the efforts of the publicity staff often go unnoticed.

As the competition becomes increasingly tough among record companies, let us hope that the status of publicity rises commensurately with that of other departments, and that the role of the publicity staffer is duly accepted as an integral function of selling records

20th-Fox Music Earnings Dip **During Corp.'s Best 9 Months**

LOS ANGELES - Losses posted by the record division of 20th Century Fox Film Corp. were the sore spot in the company's recently released third quarter and nine month financial statements.

The record division posted a \$3.8 million loss for the quarter, compared to a \$2.3 million profit earned during the summer quarter of 1977. And nine month figures for the divison reflected a \$5.9 million loss, against last year's \$1.5 million profit.

The contrast to last year's figures can largely be attributed to the release and sales success last summer of the soundtrack LP from the film "Star Wars" on 20th Century Fox Records.

'Star Wars' Felt

The effect of "Star Wars" was also felt in the overall corporate figures which reached a new high for the nine month period but dropped substantially in the third quarter when compared to the same period last year, which reflected the earnings gained from the film's release.

Jukebox Petition Is Twice Refused

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Five jukebox operators and the 1,100-member AMOA were turned down twice last week in attempts to obtain an injunction against the Copyright Royalty Tribunal's recently adopted jukebox regulations. First, Judge Aubrey Robinson Jr. denied the motion for a temporary restraining order and preliminary injunction in Federal District Court here Oct. 31. The plaintiffs then filed petition in Appeals Court to seek a stay on the lower court ruling and that, too, was refused.

The action shifts back to District Court for a hearing on a final injunction to be scheduled sometime after the CRT's hearing on Nov. 9.

Jukebox owners and operators had threatened to file suit against the Tribunal immediately after the CRT's regulations were announced (Cash Box, Sept. 16). The location listing requirement, adopted the CRT in September, was the major point of contention. The rule mandates that jukebox operators furnish the Tribunal with the name of each establishment where jukeboxes are placed and the number of machines at each site, plus updated annual

Coin machine owners/operators bitterly opposed the ruling, arguing throughout the cent to \$18.4 million, or \$2.26 a share, from last year's \$31.6 million, or \$4.02 a share, in the same quarter. Total revenues fell 6 percent to \$161 million from \$171.5 million during last year's third quarter.

For the nine months ended Sept. 30, net income climbed 28 percent to \$51.4 million or \$6.43 a share from \$40 million, or \$5.16 a share in 1977. Revenues for the nine month period were up 30 percent for a record high of \$469.1 million, compared to last year's \$361.6 million figure.

Losses Examined

The losses posted by 20th Century Fox Records were examined Oct. 27 at a board of directors meeting.

"It was just a routine review," said Alan Livingston, 20th Century-Fox entertainment group president. "The record company has been showing some losses this year and it was just a discussion of what our projections are and whether or not we can look for a turnaround."

Livingston said he was optimistic that the record company would soon begin to offset its losses as the result of the label's fall program and stressed that the corporation has no plans to shelve its music operations.

"The corporate attitude is that the record industry is a three-and-a-half billion dollar industry domestically and eight billion internationally," Livingston said. "We are an entertainment company and it's a business we should be in. That attitude hasn't changed.

Selective Signing

Livingston said that the label would not

Changing Social Climate Aids Detroit's Musical Resurgence

NEW YORK - Six years after the departure of the entire Motown operation from Detroit, Motor City gives every indication of re-establishing itself as a center of music industry activity.

Recent gold records for Detroit artists the Dramatics, the Floaters, and Enchantment, in addition to the R&B, pop, jazz and disco success locals Michael Henderson, C.J. and Company, Al Hudson & the Soul Partners, the Mike Theodore Orchestra, the ADC Band, and the Fantastic Four offer evidence that there is a resurgence of the Detroit sound that Motown built an empire

But, whereas the success of Detroit soul music in the '60s could be reasonably attributed to the genius of one man, Berry Gordy, the Detroit scene today is galvanized by a wide variety of factors and by a number of individuals. To some, responsibility for Detroit's musical resurgence can be seen in terms of the larger social climate of the city.

'Bad Publicity'

Tom Collins, operations manager for Detroit's WJLB, said, "Detroit had a lot of bad publicity for a while, the 'murder capital of the world' sort of thing, and Motown's departure corresponded to the city being in a very bad state. Five years ago you could walk down a street at 5:30 in the afternoon and it would be deserted. Now, there's more building, more employment and people are getting back into music and getting down and boogeying."

Michael Henderson, a leading artist in the musical resurgence of Detroit whose "In the Night Time" album is charted jazz, pop, and black contemporary, said, " You have to give Detroit's mayor, Coleman Young, all the credit for holding Detroit together when Motown left. He fought hard to have the Renaissance built in Detroit, which is the largest hotel, bank, and business complex in the country, and was responsible for turning this city around, and the attitudes of people towards it. A lot of entertainers who were going to leave staved when they saw that happen.

There have also been a number of other factors in the city's resurgence. J. Michael McKay, WJLB's program director, said, "The talent was always here. Detroit is like a sea full of fish, and for every group you find that's dynamite, there are two more that are better. But until recently, most of the local talent here did not have the knowledge to go to the people that could help them and say, "Hey, I'm dynamite, give me a shot. The attitude that prevailed was, 'let's be satisfied with making it big in Detroit.'

Picking Up The Pieces

Bill Craig, vice president of field activities and A&R, special markets, for ABC Records, noted that "the music scene here started to pick up the pieces here about three or four years ago. Immediately after

Business Is Booming For Independent Promotion Men

NEW YORK - Despite the numerous problems that have plaqued many small, independent businessmen within the music industry, most of the country's independent promotion men have benefited from a booming business, and have diversified their operations to include AOR, retail, and artist relations services

According to Dick Kline, executive vice president and national promotion director for Polydor Records, the independent promotion man's continued success has been a result of the industry's rapidly accelerating growth and competition. 'There's even more of a need for the independents now," Kline commented, because, with all the competition out there, the record company is gaining another positive. The independents have a

history of being able to deliver, or else they wouldn't be there. Their credibility is well established in a market, and after the local man lays the groundwork for a record, they play an essential role in closing the project in key areas.'

"They're specialists," stated Sammy Vargas, northeast promotion manager for MCA Records. "The independents are onto the pulse of the marketplace, and their expertise in specialized product is invaluable to a company." Vince Faraci, national pop promotion director for Atlantic Records, another company with a history of utilizing independents, added, "We plan to continue using them as a support tactic in the marketplace. Everybody's looking for that extra edge."

Personnel Changes

Independent promotion men themselves cite frequent company personnel changes as one reason for their own durability. "Let's face it," said Jerry Brenner, a veteran New England promotion man, "a good promotion man always moves up the ladder, and that leaves a void in the market. But the independent is always there, and knows what each station needs at a par-

NEW YORK — In one 90-day period this year, TK albums by Peter Brown, KC and the Sunshine Band, Betty Wright, and Foxy all went gold. This was no accident; TK, which had its first hits with singles, has finally become a full-fledged album label.

Among the 40 or so LPs that TK now has on the market are Bobby Caldwell's selftitled debut on TK/Clouds, T-Connection's "On Fire" on TK/Dash, Latimore's "Dig A Little Deeper" on TK/Glades, Eddie Daniel's "Street Wind" on TK/Marlin, the Ritchie Family's "American Generation" on TK/Marlin, "Phil Upchurch" on TK/Marlin, Ralph McDonald's "The Path" on TK/Marlin, "USA/European Connection" on TK/Marlin, "Dorothy Moore" on TK/Malaco, Gwen McCrae's "Let's Straighten It Out" on TK/Cat, Gregg Diamond's "Star Cruiser" on TK/Marlin, Jimmy Bo Horne's "Dance Across The Floor" on TK/Sunshine Sound, Michal Urbaniak's "Ecstasy" on TK/Marlin, and Michael Bloomfield's "Count Talent and the Originals" on TK/Clouds. In addition, TK has recently signed deals with Jimmy Castor and Joe Tex, and albums should be forthcoming from them shortly.

This proliferation of albums on a label that used to be considered singles-oriented is the result of a conscious campaign that was initiated by Henry Stone, TK's president and founder, two years ago. "In the record business, you have to change with the times," Stone commented. "I made a commitment about two years ago to become an album company, and now it's a pure album company."

Naturally, only a small percentage of TK's LP output can be expected to go gold or platinum. But Stone points out that a fair number of his current records (e.g., Voyage, U.S.A. European Connection) are selling in the 150-200,000 range. "It's not gold or platinum," he said, "but it sure adds up to a lot of sales when you have eight or ten of those things going. Now we're on the way to gold album with Bobby Caldwell, another new artist."

New artists have been the lifeblood of TK since its establishment in 1970. All of the original artists on TK, including Betty Wright, Beginning of The End, Timmy Thomas, Latimore, George and Owen McCrae, and KC and the Sunshine Band, were newcomers to the music business when they had hits with the Miami-based abel. And it is still Stone's policy to look for new acts with hit potential — a policy that has recently paid off handsomely with such artists as Peter Brown and Foxy.

An increasing number of well-known names, however, are beginning to crop up on the TK roster, including Joe Tex and Jimmy Castor. According to Stone, signing these acts is part of his campaign to build a strong album company.

Another part of that strategy is TK's recent expansion out of its R&B and disco base into jazz, rock and gospel music. TK's Clouds label, for example, specializes in rock, with Bobby Caldwell as the major artist and other acts to be signed early next year. The Roots, another TK-distributed label, features such blues artists as Jimmy Reed, Gene Barge and Wild Child Butler. Marlin is a jazz fusion/disco label, where Michael Urbaniak and Eddie Daniels brush shoulders with Gregg Diamond and the U.S.A. European Connection. There are also two TK-distributed labels that specialize in gospel, Malaco and Gospel Roots.

Expand Base

"I'm trying to keep my base very strong, which is the R&B-disco thing," Stone commented, "and there is a need for us to expand. We've done it with the jazz fusion thing, and rock, I guess, is the next thing to get into. But we have to do it very selectively and very cautiously, because you can't go in there and not actually compete with the majors in that.

"We'll build our own rock acts — that's the main thing. I'll use my promotion knowhow. I mean, there's still nothing like hit product, you know? If it's in the grooves,

Pic Disc Serves Notice To Alberti On Patent Issue

LOS ANGELES — Pic Disc, Inc., a picture disc manufacturing division of the Fitzgerald/Hartley Co., has put Alberti Record Mfg. on notice that its method of manufacturing discs may infringe on Pic Disc's exclusive patent.

The action came following the release of an Alberti-manufactured "Rocky Horror Picture Show" picture disc. A spokesperson for Alberti downplayed the written notice from Pic Disc and said that "we are breaking no law."

But Mark Hartley of Fitzgerald/Hartley said "with the popularity of picture discs, we are actively seeking to enforce our exclusive patents. The one in question with Alberti is U.S. patent no. 3,584,094 which was filed a while ago by Harold Dague. It covers the method which it appears upon examination is the method used by Alberti."

The notice from Pic Disc requires that Alberti immediately cease and desist from further infringement or provide proof that it has not and is not now infringing the methods of picture record manufacture covered by Pic Disc's patent.

John Alberti of Alberti Mfg. called the notice "a joke," and that Alberti was not in violation of patents. "We checked it out and we are not in violation of any patents held by

them (Pic Disc)," Alberti said.
With Picture Records Inc. serving as an intermediary between Alberti and its clients, Alberti is currently working on a Linda Ronstadt picture disc.

Solleveld Affirms Commitment Of Polygram To U.S.

NEW YORK — Coen Solleveld, worldwide president of Polygram, recently sent out a letter to U.S. Polygram employees in which he explained his motivation for coming to America.

"My reason for coming is straightforward: to establish a strong and vigorous liaison and interchange among our rapidly growing U.S. businesses and our international operations," he noted.

"The growth and development of U.S. markets are key to Polygram's continued success. In turn, the expertise generated in making Polygram pre-eminent in the U.S. entertainment industry will be invaluable for Polygram elsewhere around the world."

Solleveld emphasized the fact that "while here as worldwide president of Polygram, it is my intention to maintain all existing management and reporting lines."

After several years of singing and numerous, varied performances to her credit, Cheryl Lynn is finally beginning to feel some of the confidence in her talent that her manager Delbert Langston has had all along.

"Delbert always told me I could make it, but I never believed it. So he has been the one to do all the pushing," Cheryl says.

But after the last couple of years, having landed a role with the road production of "The Wiz," having taken the top prize on the "Gong Show" and subsequently having been signed to Columbia Records because of her "Gong Show" performance, now Cheryl is starting to believe Langston was right.

Her debut single, "Got To Be Real," is moving up the charts and her self-titled debut album is continuing that success.

For all the years she has been singing, Cheryl said only in the last few years did she seriously consider performing as a career. Before she made that decision, she says she was "really into school." It was only in 1976 that she quit her studies at USC, where she was studying to be a speech pathologist, to audition for "The Wiz."

Her first step toward a professional singing career, though, was taken when she tried out for a group called Happy Free & Easy.

"Delbert, who went to the same high school I did, called me up one day and asked me if I wanted to audition for a group," Cheryl says.

"He told me there would be other candidates and that I should show up precisely at my assigned try-out time. I got very nervous, figuring there would be a lot of other girls there. As it turned out, I was the only one.

"So I made it into the group, but I wasn't really serious. Delbert and Tommy Brown (who later joined Hues Corporation) always had to push me to get me to the rehearsals. I would have rather been at the basketball game or something," Cheryl says.

Later, it was Langston who convinced her to audition for "The Wiz," a role she also won. "I was understudy for the Wicked Witch of the West, and when we got to Chicago, I got to play the role." While still involved with the show, she auditioned for, and received, a spot on the "Gong Show." Chuck Barris later said of Lynn, "Of the 4,000 acts I've seen, Cheryl Lynn is the all-time great."

"After the show," she says, "we were getting calls from lots of record companies. But I got one call I just couldn't forget. It was from Bob Johnston at CBS. I picked up the phone and he said, 'Hello darlin'. You looked so innocent there on the TV, I just had to save you from the wolves.'"

That phone call, she says, was the turning point in her decision to go with Columbia. She has continued to work with Johnston, who is executive producer of the album.

Only after she was signed did she try to write songs, which she says is turning into another satisfactory venture for her. Her goal now is to continue to develop as a writer and performer as well as to get a band together so she can tour and promote the album

"I want to keep writing, making records and maybe even start a production company with Delbert to produce other artists."



Wilton Felder

Throughout the 1960s, the Jazz Crusaders were esteemed by their peer group for their creativity and feeling for improvisation. But the group found that the connotation of the word jazz in those days was less than a viable commercial commodity. To broaden their sound and scope, the group became the Crusaders, and have since inhabited the pop charts on a regular basis.

During this transitional period, the group's founding members began to enjoy success as studio musicians, producers, and solo artists. Pianist Joe Sample was the first to strike out on his own with "Rainbow Seeker." And now tenor saxophonist Wilton Felder (who also lives a double life as an electric bassist) has emerged with his solo debut for ABC Records, entitled "We All Have A Star."

"Our intention has always been to establish the group as an entity first," Felder says. "But now we feel that the time has come for each member to express a side of himself that might not ordinarily develop as a Crusader. Ultimately, this kind of individual expression will enhance the unity of the Crusaders as a whole."

One of the factors that distinguishes Felder's new album from Sample's is the use of lyrics, since the Crusaders don't ordinarily sing on record. Felder explains that "I took a gamble in this respect because I wanted to surprise listeners with an approach that they might not expect from a member of the group." He attributes the direction of the LP to a "freeness the Crusaders has experienced in the last couple of years that has enabled each of us to grow more confident in our own abilities."

Felder notes that the titles of the songs on "We All Have A Star" parallel "the spiritual feeling that the album tries to convey. For instance, 'We All Have A Star' is an affirmation of the soul, while 'Ride On' tells the listener that everything is going to be all right. Honesty and sincerity are qualities that are very important to me, and the album is my way of saying that I care."

He emphasizes that the chart successes of melodic jazz composers like Chuck Mangione has proven that "the climate is right for songs and melodies. Musicians have gotten so sidetracked with vamps that they've forgotten the importance of conceptualizing beautiful melodies. That's why Billy Joel's 'Just The Way You Are' was so popular."

Though he won't accept an outside recording date, (which he strictly reserves for "the Crusaders' sound"), Felder asserts that session work has helped him to appreciate the fundamentals of "putting a song together instead of just playing over it." He had originally learned to play the bass when the Crusaders' long succession of bassists had to be shown what and how to play, and has since recorded with such pop artists as Joni Mitchell, Barry White, Steely Dan and Michael Franks.

Though the Crusaders are kept busy with their individual free-lance commitments, Sample, Felder and Stix Hooper recently found time to co-produce B.B. King's "Midnight Believer" LP. As aspiring musicians growing up in Houston, the group frequently listened to the guitarist's records. "You can imagine the thrill," he says, "of not only playing on his album but producing it and then coming up with a hit."

Popovich Finds Comfortable Home For Cleveland Int'l

LOS ANGELES — "To some people being based in Cleveland might seem like a disadvantage, but to me it's most important to be somewhere where I feel real comfortable."

Those are the feelings of Steve Popovich, president of Cleveland International Records, which has been headquartered in Popovich's Cleveland home since its inception in 1977. Popovich says he feels comfortable in Cleveland for a number of reasons.

"It's a good market to live in because it allows you to keep a perspective on the business," he says. "Cleveland has a great cross-section of radio, it's always been a great breakout market and it's always been behind new music."

It was in Cleveland, Popovich says, that his label's first release, Meat Loaf's "Bat Out Of Hell" LP, received initial airplay after its release last November. The album recently was certified double platinum.

Exposing New Talent

"I think a lot of radio people in some cities have gotten so far removed from new music that I would find it real uncomfortable to live there," Popovich says, "Cleveland radio is the best radio in the United States from the standpoint that the stations are into exposing new talent."

Popovich was no stranger to the Cleveland market when he opened offices there in March of 1977 after leaving CBS, where, after 14 years with the company, he was serving as A&R head at Epic Records. In 1963 Popovich took his first job in the music industry working in the CBS warehouse in Cleveland. And from 1967 to 1969 he worked local promotion in Cleveland for MCA and CBS Records. While at CBS Popovich met Stan Snyder and Sam Letterman, who worked in the

RSO Re-signs Clapton, Releases New Album

LOS ANGELES — Eric Clapton has renewed his contract with RSO Records and his personal manager Robert Stigwood. Clapton's new studio LP "Backless" is scheduled for release By RSO Nov. 6 and a European tour to support the album will begin Nov. 5.

"It gives me great pleasure, both personally and professionally to work with an artist as widely respected as Eric Clapton," said Stigwood. "He has long been one of rock and roll's premier performers and it is an honor for me to be involved with him, not only as his manager, but also as his friend. Grammy Voters Hold Meet In L.A.

LOS ANGELES — Representatives from the recording industry gathered here Oct. 27-28 to screen several thousand entries for this year's Grammy Awards. More than two dozen producers, performers, writers, trade journalists and recording company and radio station personnel participated in the all-day sessions which were held in the national office of the Records Academy (NARAS) in Burbank.

The participants discussed numerous recorded performances submitted by academy members and record companies to make sure the entries were included in the correct musical categories.

Prior to the meeting, pre-screening sessions in selected fields had been held in Nashville and New York, where committees had reviewed entries in the country, gospel, inspirational, jazz, latin, children's, comedy and documentary fields. In addition, in New York, a committee of experienced classical record members, under the chairmanship of David Hall, had screened all classical entries.

Next Step

The next step in the Grammy procedures will be a review of the screening results in first draft form by the seven chapters' board of governors and the Academy's national trustees. Following their ratification, the lists will be mailed late in November along with first round ballots, to the Academy's 5000 active members. Their votes will determine the Grammy Awards finalists in all except craft categories which are being nominated by special committees in the various chapters. These will be announced Jan. 8 at press conferences in Los Angeles and New York.

A second round of voting will determine this year's winners, which will be announced Feb. 15 during the Academy's annual CBS-TV special.



FCC Boosts Limit On Routine Fines

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The amount of the fine the FCC is allowed to impose on broadcasters has doubled, as has the authority of the FCC staff to act without consulting the commission before imposing a routine fine.

The amount Congress has authorized the FCC to fine a broadcaster for violation of commission rule or policies, or for violation of the Communications Act, is \$20,000. And the commission ordered that the staff be authorized to impose fines of up to \$4,-000 without bringing the matter to the FCC for review. Previously, the staff was able to impose fines of up to \$2,000 without checking with the commission first.

The aim of the new policy is to delegate to the staff these routine matters which are governed by existing policy.

Momentum Building Green Package Comes Out

by Joey Berlin

LOS ANGELES - A year-and-a-half ago when Cream Records was born, president At Repnett and his associates drew up a rive-vear plan aimed at developing a strong, broad-based independent record company. Last week, Bennett looked at his company and pronounced it "right on schedule," with a major release days away, a second single from his top rock act getting good response and a couple of potentially strong acts waiting in the wings.

Set for release on Nov. 8 is one of Cream's most important albums to date, soul singer Al Green's "Truth In Time, along with the first single, a cover of Lulu's hit "To Sir, With Love," and a 12-inch disco cut, "Wait Here." Promotion vice president Don Graham says the LP-45-EP multirelease, which will be packaged together for promotional use, is an industry first. Cream is also releasing a second single from the debut LP from Snail and is planning a major push for recently-signed quintet Leas Diamond. A joint venture with singer Johnny Rivers is also reported to be in the works.

First Steps

The first steps in building the label were acquiring talent and building a strong financial base. The talent search resulted in the purchase of Hi Records whose roster includes Green, Ann Peebles and O.V. Wright, rock bands Snail and Legs Diamond, black-disco artists Brenton Wood and O'Mar, Canadian folkie lan Tamblyn, Leon Russell protege Don Nix and the dozen acts on Don Schlitten's Xanadu jazz label. The financial base for Cream Records was solidified with the acquisitions of Hi Records and its publishing company and the 527 copyrights of East Memphis Music, including such titles as "Respect," "Dock of the Bay" and "Theme from Shaft."

With the initial goals met, Cream is now trying to build up sales and airplay momentum. Based on the successes of Green, Snail and O.V. Wright with their initial Cream releases and Green's grand prize award at the recent Tokyo Music Festival, the label feels it has established credibility with retailers and radio.

"We feel the momentum building," says Paul Culberg, Cream marketing vice president. "In less than two years we've got better than 70 percent of our distributors firmly on our side. After seven months the Snail LP is still selling and when we released the group's second single the reaction from radio was, 'Oh, a new Snail single,' not

Springsteen On Tour

NEW YORK — Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band began a second tour of the U.S. on November 1 in support of their current platinum LP, "Darkness on the Edge of Town." The tour opened in New Jersey at Princeton University and concludes in Cleveland on December 31 at the Richfield Coliseum

Springsteen played 86 dates in 70 cities during a four-month concert tour earlier

With the release of "Catch Me," Snail's second single, Cream is optimistic that the IP which has currently sold in excess of 125,000 copies, will catch fire. The company has backed the Santa Cruz quartet with an extensive marketing campaign and was lucky enough to have much of the band's poster material used on the set of this season's top-rated new television series, "Mork & Mindy." The cover art on the Snail album earned a certificate of distinction from Art Direction magazine.

Legs Diamond

Cream is scheduled to release "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling," the company's first single from Legs Diamond, in two weeks. The Los Angeles-based band had two albums out on Mercury and were rediscovered by Cream A&R vice president Hal Winn. If the single does as well as expected the quintet's first Cream album will be released early next year, in keeping with the company's policy of staggering its releases so that each one can get maximum attention from the promotion and marketing staffs.

"You can't just throw stuff out and wait for it to hit, you've got to work all your product,' (continued on page 20)



BACKLESS — Eric Clapton — RSO RS-1-3039 — Producer: Glyn Johns — List: 7.98

On the heels of his top selling "Slowhand" album, this veteran guitarist/vocalist/composer has emerged with another striking work which spotlights his moderately-paced, refined rock numbers. Clapton several years ago largely shifted from his hardrock stance to a more controlled yet resonant delivery, and this LP continues in this vein. Spearheaded by the charted single, "Promises," "Backless" also contains "Watch Out For Lucy" plus "Roll It," a stinging rocker which features the vocals of Marcy Levy.

FEEL THE NEED — Leif Garrett — Scotti Brothers/Atlantic SB 7100 — Producer: Michael Lloyd — List: 7.98

Leif Garrett bounds from teenage heartthrob to disco sensation with his first Scotti Brothers release. "Feel The Need" features "I Was Made For Dancing," which presents three minutes of frenetic dancing fun that is too engaging to worry listeners about its overly familiar hooks. Garrett and producer Michael Lloyd have created a solid collection of new and reworked favorites guaranteed to re-deliver hardcore Leifsters and capture older music lovers as well. Disco and pop 40.

MISS GLADYS KNIGHT — Buddah BDS 5714 — Producer: Tony Macaulay — List: 7.98

After many successful years with the Pips, Gladys Knight's first solo effort will most assuredly garner her extensive chart activity and airplay. Though the disco single, "It's A Better Than Good Time" did enjoy some chart success, it is the album's mood-making ballads which should be the most appealing to the songstress' mainstream, pop-oriented following. The gospel/MOR sound of "Sail Away/Freedom For The Stallions" and "I'm Comin' Home Again" are the outstanding cuts here.

SMOKIN' — Smokey Robinson — Tamia T9-363A2 — Producer: William "Smokey" Robinson — List: 9.98

Recorded last May at his Roxy engagement in Hollywood, this two-record set exquisitely captures the intense, soulful energy which Robinson delivers in concert. The album should please Robinson fans of all ages, because the material here features a solid sampling of both his classic Miracles numbers as well as his more recent solo tunes. Standout tracks on the LP include "I Second That Emotion," "The Agony And The Ecstasy," and "The Tears Of A Clown."

SARAH DASH — Kirshner JA 35477 — Producers: W. Gold, J. Siegel. G. Knight and G. Allan — List: 7.98

On her first solo since leaving the soul trio Labelle, Sarah Dash has concocted an album which should appeal to both a disco and pop audience. The key to this effort is the stirring, high-soaring vocals of Dash, plus the crisp arrangements of Leon Pendarvis. "Sinner Man" boasts a propelling dance beat, while other numbers such as "You" and "I Can't Believe" display Dash's ability to perform tender ballads. Overall, a promising, frequently satisfying endeavor.

LEGEND — Poco — ABC AA-1099 — Producer: Richard Sanford Orshoff — List: 7.98

Yes, Virginia, this is a brand-spankin' new Poco album and it is a good feelin' to know. Spearheaded by group veterans Rusty Young and Paul Cotton, "Legend" finds this year's Poco downplaying its trend-setting "city 'n' western" stance in favor of a truly beautiful, fragile MOR tonality which never bores as those Poco harmonies soar. A more than commendable return. "Boomerang," "The Last Goodbye" and "Legend" the top cuts featured on this splendid effort.

1969 — CREEDENCE CLEARWATER REVIVAL — Fantasy CCR-69 — Producer: John Fogerty — List: 9.98

Fantasy Records has re-issued this group's first six albums in the form of three two-record sets which should revive interest in the Creedence catalog. All three repackages contain top-notch material, ranging from such early hits as "Suzie Q" and "Proud Mary" to later classics like "Up Around The Bend" and "Have You Ever Seen The Rain." The "1969" set may possibly be the strongest, featuring the songs of "Green River" and "Willy And The Poor Boys."

PARTNERS IN CRIME — Bandit — Ariola SW 50042 — Producer: Matthew Fisher — List: 7.98 This is the type of rock 'n' roll music which some feel is

This is the type of rock 'n' roll music which some feel is specifically geared for instant acceptance by America's AOR outlets. Charlie, Prism, Fotomaker (its latest), Foreigner and countless others are cited as examples of this supposed trend. Bandit steals from all of these yet manages to fence their musical booty in such a way that it emerges as both innocuous and inoffensive to even, say, Elvis Costello fans. For FM formats.

PRONTO MONTO — Kate & Anna McGarrigle — Warner Bros. BSK 3238 — Producer: David Nichtern — List: 7.98

With its third album, the Canadian McGarrigles continue to evocatively perform its original pop/folk compositions. The twosome has received extensive critical praise since its debut album a while back, and "Pronto Monto" is sure to win acclaimation as well as hopefully establish a wider pop audience for the duo. Evenly divided between intimate ballads and affectionate upbeat tunes, this LP includes "Oh My Heart," "Come Back Baby" and "Side Of Fries."



































TWO FOR THE SHOW — Kansas — Kirshner PZ2 35660 — Producer: Kansas — List: 13.98

Due to the success of its last two albums ("Leftoverture" and "Point Of Know Return") this midwestern progressive rock outfit has established itself as a major recording attraction and concert draw. This live two-record set captures the group's energetic, hard-rocking onstage delivery, providing a power-packed souvenir for Kansas' legion of fans. Including such recent hits as "Carry On Wayward Son" and "Dust In The Wind," the LP also features lengthy renditions of many of Kansas' earlier compositions.

PLAYIN' TO WIN — Outlaws — Arista AB 4205 — Producer: Robert John "Mutt" Lange — List: 7.98

"Playin' To Win" expands upon the guitar-oriented progressive southern rock sound which helped establish this Florida band's stronghold on AOR and pop stations across the Union. On exhibit is the sextet's obvious love for playing and singing, particularly on "You Are The Show," where the Outlaws' acknowledge its loyal audience. Already the #2 Most Added album on FM this week, watch for that audience to acknowledge back with chart bullets.

READY TO ROLL — Thelma Houston — Tamla T7-361R1 — Producers: Hal David and Greg Wright — List: 7.98

Producer Hal David has most assuredly given this album his magic touch. Thetight, elegant production compliments the fine vocal ability of Thelma Houston, taking her to the height of her artistic ability. From the smooth melodic ballads to the forceful uptempo tunes, this album spans the gamut of every radio format. Although Houston was beginning to be known primarily as a disco artist, this LP displays her versatile musical talent.

LOU REED LIVE TAKE NO PRISONERS — Arista AL 8502 — Producer: Lou Reed — List: 11.98

On the heels of his critically acclaimed album, "Street Hassle," and a highly successful tour, Lou Reed has released this two-record set which was recorded at the Bottom Line in New York. This LP includes such recent tracks as the controversial "I Wanna Be Black" and "Street Hassle," plus such early Reed classics as "Sweet Jane" and "Walk On The Wild Side." Unlike his previous two live albums, this LP displays a more sensual, unified sound that effectively captures the street-wise intensity of Reed's current band.

HIS BEST — Paul Anka — United Artists UA-LA922-H — Producers: Various — List: 7.98

Containing seven of his most famous studio compositions and three cuts recorded live in Japan, this greatest hits package reaffirms Paul Anka's creative skills as a contemporary poprock/easy listening singer/songwriter. "His Best" features such Anka standards as "My Way" and "(You're) Having My Baby," as well as such works as "The Times Of Your Life" and "Let Me Try Again." This LP should be a strong Christmas seller.

GREEN LIGHT — Cliff Richard — Rocket BXL1-2958 — Producer: Bruce Welch — List: 7.98

A pop hero from London to Lima since 1958 and a one-hit wonder in the U.S. since 1976, Cliff Richard now graces these shores again with his third Rocket album. Utilizing the composing and back-up vocal talents of Tarney/Spencer and ex-Shadow Bruce Welch once again as producer, Richard creates an album that deftly shifts from an intensity last heard via Roxy Music ("She's A Gipsy," and the title cut) to wonderfully uplifting ballads ("Start All Over Again").

STREAMLINE — Lenny White — Elektra 6E-164 — Producers: Larry Dunn and Lenny White — List: 7.98

Ex-Return To Forever drummer Lenny White digs from a multi-format stockpile of rocking fusion chops on this Larry Dunn-produced release. Let the jazz traditionalists cringe as White works wonders on star tracks like "Lady Madonna" (guest vocal by Chaka Khan) and his unashamedly bashing "12 Bars From Mars;" what matters most is that this music is good and will open the ears and minds of new listeners raised on mainstream rock, jazz, and R&B product.

WELCOME TO THE CLUB — Richard Kerr — A&M SP-4721 — Producer: Christopher Bond — List: 7.98

An established songwriter who has composed material for Barry Manilow, among others, Richard Kerr launches his solo recording career with this album. "Welcome To The Club" showcases Kerr's talents as an effective pianist, singer, and most importantly, as a composer of uplifting, accessible poprock selections. Backed by an array of studio musicians, this LP contains such tunes as "I Can't Afford That Feeling Anymore" and "I Feel It All." For MOR and pop formats.

NEW MOON RISING — Lisa Lawalin — Monument MG7630 — Producer: Fred Foster — List: 7.98

"New Moon Rising" marks the debut of Lisa Lawalin, a former Miss Georgia and a skillful vocalist in the adult contemporary/pop vein. Lawalin possesses a caressing, pleasant voice which capably handles this collection of lush ballads and affectionate upbeat tunes. Produced by Fred Foster, this album includes such tracks as "Your Love," "Steppin' Stone" and a rendition of the '60s Motown classic, "Dancing In The Street."

Cash Box received an advance copy of the LP, which is actually the group's second effort, the first being "The Clash," released a year-and-a-half ago in England. Along with the Sex Pistols, the Clash spearheaded the British punk movement, and now with the Pistols gone, the responsibility of reaffirming the power and impact of the punk movement rests almost entirely

"Give 'Em Enough Rope" lives up to all expectations, exhibiting the intense rock 'n' roll energy of the early punk sound combined with a fiercely determined working class stance, biting, highly imaginative lyrics, and the clean, crisp production of Blue Oyster Cult producer Sandy Pearlman. Featuring the compositions of lead vocalist/guitarist Joe Strummer and guitarist Mick Jones, the LP is scheduled to be released the third week of this month. Song titles include "Safe European Home," "All The Young Punks" (thematically similar to Mott The Hoopie's "All The Young Dudes"), "Guns On The Roof" and "Julie's Been Working For The Drug Squad." . . . The female musical trio, Hot, has been cast to perform the lead roles in Harry Hope's 30th film, "We Can Be Strong Together." The group, which

features Gwen Owens, Cathy Carson and Juanita Curiel, will also record the soundtrack album. The film, which is directed by Dan Seeger, is due out next April.

BARBATA INJURED — John Barbata, drummer for Jefferson Starship, was seriously injured in a car crash early Saturday morning, Oct. 28. Driving through the town of Comptche in Mendocino County, CA, Barbata and his friend **Terry Hill** collided into a tree after Barbata swerved to miss a deer which was blocking the road. Hill died in the crash, and Barbata was taken to Santa Rosa Memorial Hospital, where he spent five hours in the operating room. The drummer suffered a fractured neck, right forearm and jaw, plus a concussion and he is expected to take six to eight months to recover. On a lighter note, the Starship is scheduled to appear on the "Star Wars Holiday Special" on Nov. 17 on CBS. For the show (taped before Barbata's accident), the group will perform without Grace Slick, and will introduce its forthcoming single, "Light The Sky On Fire," written by Craig Chaquico ... Last month Kendun Recorders in Burbank was the site of a mastering seminar conducted by Leila Greenstone, Kendun's director of creative services, Leah Bernstein, executive assistant to owner Kent Duncan, Jo Hansch, mastering engineer and Althea Mathis, traffic supervisor. The subjects discussed were "the language of mastering," "technical requirements" and "deadlines and shipping," among others . . . Warner Bros. recording group Funkadelic has started a national tour in support of its latest LP, "One Nation Under A Groove." The tour, which features the Brides Of Funkenstein as the opening act, consists of 33 dates, concluding in San Francisco on Nov. 19.

Produced by Richard Perry, this is the first release on the new E/A Planet custom label. Excellent vocals and perky delivery make this a good Top 40

JACKSON BROWNE (Elektra/Asylum E-45543) You Love The Thunder (3:57) (Swallow Turn Music — ASCAP) (J. Browne)

"Running On Empty" has been on the street for nearly a year now but interest is still there. This third single has a moderate pace, good lyrics and a strong hook. The slide guitar work and backing vocals are effective. Top 40 shot.

says Culberg. "We give ourselves the opportunity to promote and work each act individually so that we give each act the exposure necessary to get it to the consumer's attention. We time our releases to keep our artists in the public eye - the more staying power the greater the sales.'

Other upcoming Cream releases include a disco single from Brenton Wood, "Let's Get Crazy Together," and another disco effort, "Freaky Monstrosity," by O'Mar. Don Nix is mixing his label debut now and lan Tamblyn, a Canadian who Bennett believes has unlimited potential, is currently formulating his recording plans.

Xanadu

As part of its plan to build a broad-based company, last January Cream made a manufacturing, distribution, promotion and advertising deal with Don Schlitten's jazz label, Xanadu Records. Xanadu issues two series of jazz albums, a gold series of classics (mostly not previously released) and a silver series of new material. A Xanadu sampler released early this year sold out, and the new album by Rutgers music professor and jazz guitarist Ted Dunbar is doing well. Until now, all Xanadu releases have had gold or silver covers, depending on which series they were part of, but the label is planning to begin using color on its upcoming covers in an attempt to increase its sales appeal.

On the international front, Cream is rapidly concluding licensing, distribution and publishing agreements for the entire record-buying world, according to international division vice president Bob Weiss. A former European director for Capitol and the first Warner Bros. international vice president, Weiss personally visited all the countries Cream has made deals in and reports that Green, Snail, Wood, Peebles

and Wright are all viable international acts. He also indicates Cream is attempting to set up a two-way flow of talent that will see foreign acts record for Cream in the U.S. and the company is working toward simultaneous worldwide release of major artist product.

Independent Distribution

Bennett has firmly committed Cream to independent distribution. Despite the loss of much indie business to the majors, Bennett believes the long range outlook for independent distribution is good.

"Indies are healthier now than they were in the early '70s," says Bennett. "They are at the mercy of the indie labels, but if they get successful product they'll be successful. With some labels going with the majors I'm getting more concentration on my product, but the stronger the indie distributors the stronger the indie label, so now I'm hoping my competition does well."

Bennett also commented on two rumors concerning Cream that are making the rounds. One has former Bennett associate Johnny Rivers renewing their relationship, the other concerns a reported offer from the Polygram Group to buy out Cream Records.

"Johnny and I have been talking, but to date nothing has been consumated," reports Bennett. "But I know how to merchandise him and he knows it." Rivers' Soul City label was distributed by Bennett's Liberty Records in the '60s as a joint venture. A similar deal is reportedly in the works.

But on the subject of a possible sell-out to Polygram, or anyone else, Bennett is unequivocal. "The rumors are totally unfounded," insists Bennett. "There have been no such discussions. Cream Records is right where I wanted it to be and we are moving into our next phase.

THE CASH BOX EDITORIAL

April 30, 1955

There can be little doubt that the economy of the United States is on the verge of one of its greatest eras of prosperity. And the effects of this bright future on the music and record fields will be spectacular . . . The social changes which have occurred in the United States in the last two decades have all tended in the direction of greater productivity, greater distribution of wealth and greater leisure for the majority of the population. These changes . . . can only affect the music and record business favorably.

January 24, 1964

The success of the Beatles in America could change the whole thinking of American record companies toward all British product. Until recently, the British sound didn't fare very well in the States . . . Now, however, everything seems to be coming up British . . . It's quite obvious that the belief that "the British sound is too square for American teenagers" has been broken. And if our guess is correct, we'll be seeing more releases from the Isles on a regular basis.

September 9, 1972

Along with the boom in black music has come the increasing importance of black radio. It has reached the point where many of these outlets are competing effectively for share-of-audience with their Top 40 counterparts...There is, however, a basic difference between the two... (Black) stations are generally operating on a less restrictive programming schedule, offering more time to not only the established recordings, but new entries ... We believe this development is something Top 40 radio should be weighing with considerable thought.

October 7, 1978

New artists are the lifeblood of the music business. This hackneyed phrase is certainly valid, but the practical application of this philosophy is not being developed to its fullest potential . . . We believe that there is a way to increase exposure and sales of records by these unknown artists . . . We propose a sliding scale of suggested retail list prices to cover the various career stages that artists pass through . . . The basic concept is to make the struggling artist a more attractive purchase.



Upward Movement Reflected On Current Country Chart

by Bob Campbell

NASHVILLE — Activity on this week's Cash Box Country Singles' Chart reflects the heaviest upward movement of 1978.

Several singles by major artists in the top 25 show strong capabilities of moving into the top five or #1 position. As a result, competition in the next few weeks for prime slots will be stiff, and record sales will play a large role in determining which singles land prime spots during the next month.

On this week's singles chart, seven records moved upwards 20 or more positions, and five other records moved upwards at least 15 numbers. By comparison, only one song, Marty Robbins' "Please Don't Play a Love Song," moved 20 points or more last week. In the Aug. 12 Cash Box three months ago, Emmylou Harrris' "Easy From Now On" was the only record which moved 20 spots, and only two records moved 20 points in the May 13 issue six months ago.

Williams Climbing

This week, "Tulsa Time" by ABC's Don Williams, moved 46 positions to #25 bullet. On the chart two weeks, "Tulsa Time" jumped more spots than any record ever on the singles' chart. It is also the most added record this week with 46 stations adding "Tulsa Time." John Conlee's ABC release, "Lady, Lay Down," moved 26 points to #27 bullet this week after only two weeks on the chart.

Five other records moved 20 positions. Jacky Ward's "Rhythm Of The Rain" on Mercury moved to #32 bullet after two weeks, Loretta Lynn's "We've Come A Long Way Baby" on MCA, moved to #36 bullet after two weeks; "Please Don't Play Me A Love Song" by Columbia's Marty Robbins, moved to #38 bullet after three weeks; Kenny O'Dell's "As Long As I Can Wake Up In Your Arms" on Capricorn, moved to #49 bullet after two week; and "Playin' Hard To Get" by Columbia's Janie Fricke, moved to #63 bullet after two weeks.

Five other records show unusually high chart movement this week. Joe Stampley's "Do You Ever Fool Around?" on Epic, moved 19 places to #40 bullet after only two weeks on the chart; "High and Dry" by Ovation's Joe Sun, moved 19 points to #53 bullet after two weeks; Stella Parton's "Stormy Weather,, on Elektra/Asylum moved 17 places to #30 bullet after five weeks; Susie Allanson's "Back To The Love" on Warner Bros. moved 16 positions

to #34 bullet; and "Love Survived" by ABC's Roy Head, moved 17 points to #70 after two weeks.

"Sleeping Single In A Double Bed," by ABC's Barbara Mandrell, rides the #1 spot this week, but three records are in a close race for the top position next week. The Oak Ridge Boys' "Crying Again" on ABC is #2 bullet after 11 weeks, The Kendalls' "Sweet Desire" on Ovation sits at #3 bullet after eight weeks, and "I Just Want To Love You" by Elektra/Asylum's Eddie Rabbitt is close behind at #4 bullet after seven weeks. weeks.

Twelve records between the #10 and #25 positions carry bullets this week, and each of these records are by major artists. Bobby Bare's "Sleep Tight, Good Night Man" on Columbia is riding the #11 spot after six weeks, and Columbia's Moe Bandy, Capitol's Billy "Crash" Craddock, ABC's Tommy Overstreet, Warner Bros.' Con Hunley, Elektra/Asylum's Vern Gosdin and RCA's Charley Pride are lined up right behind Bare.

Other strong records which entered the top 25 this week are Johnny Paycheck's "Friend, Lover, Wife" on Epic, Willie Nelson's "All of Me" on Columbia, "Don't You Think This Outlaw Bit's Done Got Out Of Hand" by RCA's Waylon Jennings, Kenny Rogers' "The Gambler" on United Artist and Williams' "Tulsa Time."

Top Single Recorded At Woodland Studios

NASHVILLE — Woodland Studios, an independent "state-of-the-art" recording facility here which has been utilized by such artists and acts as Neil Young and Kansas, is also used by many country acts. And the top two songs on the Cash Box Country Singles' Chart this week were recorded at Woodland.

Barbara Mandrell's #1 song, "Sleeping Single In A Double Bed" and the Oak Ridge Boys' "Crying Again" were both recorded at and mastered at Woodland. And Ronnie Milsap's "Let's Take The Long Way Around The World," which hit the #1 position last week, was also recorded and mastered at Woodland.

Other songs on this week's chart recorded at Woodland include Billy "Crash" Craddock's #13 record, "Hubba Hubba," Con Hunley's "You've Still Got A Place In My Heart," which sits at #15; and Larry Gatlin's "I've Done Enough Dyin' Today," which debuts this week at #60 bullet.







For instance, the old Turtles song, "Happy Together," and "I'd Like To See Jesus On The Midnight Special" fit him perfectly. His voice is also growing deeper. Most of these songs are sophisticated, but still retain a deep country strain. "When Can We Do This Again" is also included.



If country fans have raised an eyebrow at the changes Dolly Parton has made lately, they certainly aren't ready for the 'new' Tanya Tucker. Beyond a shadow of a doubt, the cover graphics are the most blatantly sexual of any album jacket ever released by a country artist. And the music inside is tough LA rock. Tanya does throw in a small dose of country, but this is in no way a country album. At any rate, it is a fine album and should garner airplay and sales in all markets.



It seems Willie Nelson has been on every major record label at one time or another. Now United Artists has polished up some old masters and packaged this collection of previously released and unreleased material. Willie Nelson fans will want this album because that unmistakeable Nelson sound is evident even though these cuts are more than 10-years-old. "I'll Walk Alone," "Am I Blue" and "There'll Be No Teardrops Tonight" are the strongest cuts.



Bill Medley used to sing that deep bass part for The Righteous Brothers and here he is again, this time singing country music under the production reins of Larry Butler. These songs fit Medley's rich baritone, and he seems at home with country-pop material. If anything, Medley's vocals seem more controlled and smoother than years ago. Best songs here are "Statue Of A Fool," "Why Don't We Go Somewhere And Love" and the title cut







Welltextured, this record ought to hold up well under repeated play.

Changing Social Climate Aids Detroit's Musical Resurgence

Motown left, the raw talent was here, but it was just so dissipated that the music scene appeared to have diminished. There was no longer the single entity like Motown to look towards.'

In addition to discovering its untapped talent, Detroit stayed alive by retaining its musicians, the backbone of its sound. As Michael Henderson pointed out, "Motown left, but the sound stayed. Your best session men, like Earl Van Dyke on keyboards, James Jameson on bass, and Pistol on drums all stayed." Henderson, who played bass on many Motown sessions, explained why he stayed as well, "I just figured that the sound wasn't with Motown, it was with Detroit."

In addition to the musicians that stayed, the scene was further tapped by the return of musicians who had left earlier and returned. Armand Boladian, president of the Detroit-based Westbound label, said, When Motown left, a lot of the musicians left, also, feeling that Los Angeles was where they had to go for work, but when they got there, the scramble and the competition was more than they had bargained for. A musician who was unchallenged in Detroit met his match in L.A., and one by one they started coming back.

Sustaining Momentum

Credit for sustaining the scene in the wake of Motown's departure is also freely given to veteran record men like Boladian and producer/studio owner Don Davis. Bill Craig stated, "I attribute the resurgence most to Armand Boladian. When Motown left, Armand came on like gangbusters with the Detroit Emeralds, Fantastic Four, and Funkadelic," Michael Henderson added, "I think Don Davis turned it around. He had Groovesville productions, and was producing hits at United Sound for Johnnie Taylor, Marilyn and Billy, and the Dramatics, and more than anyone else, he was giving local musicians work and a reason to stay.

Davis himself cited the number of professionally equipped studios, including his own United Sound, for giving the scene a certain backbone. But, if Boladian and Davis helped keep the Detroit music scene stable with their solidly professional approach, it was the entrepreneurial spirit of the new record men and their growing professionalism that were vitally reflected in the resurgence.

John Smith, vice president of promotion, special markets, for ABC Records, said, 'Look at the growth of an Al Perkins in the studio. Look at the difference between the early records he produced on Al Hudson and the Soul Partners, and his new one, 'Spread Love.' The difference is like night and day." Bill Craig added, "I have to give credit to a Woody Wilson, who produced the Floaters while he was working as a maintenance man for Hertz Rent-a-Car. Now you know that a guy who works for Hertz can't afford to take off from work, and by no means can he afford to fly to California - he comes back home and he doesn't have a gig. People around here still know that Berry Gordy started Motown on \$600 and you're starting to get records cut here that are as good as any others on the country, by guys who have saved their \$700 to \$1,000.

Show Of Confidence

ism of the record men has come a greater show of confidence from the major labels. A little over a year ago, for example, Atlantic Records took over the distribution of Westbound; and a couple of months ago, ABC Records disclosed that it would open an office in Detroit with Bill Craig heading it

More To Come

But many feel that the growth that has been shown so far is only the beginning of much more to come. For example, the music of George Clinton and his various P-Funk spinoffs is considered to be a Detroitoriented music, by virtue of the fact that Clinton evolved Funkadelic from his Detroit-based vocal group, the Parliaments, and, in addition, does all of his recording at Don Davis' United Sound Studios. According to Davis, "The closest thing to a Berry Gordy that exists in Detroit today is the P-Funk organization. And God knows when it's going to stop, because they're getting better all the time. But they're really ushering in a new era of music, which is what Berry Gordy did. He saw that there was a need for a hybrid and he had the foresight to put the ingredients together. George has been recording a long time, and now the time has become

Davis' assessment of his role in Detroit's music and his plans for the future inspire still more confidence in Detroit's contemporary music scene. "I became primarily involved in my studio operation because I needed a 24-track machine to record with and there were none in town. So I looked at the stable of acts I was producing and figured that, for the amount of studio hours I was going to use in a year, it would pay for me to buy my own. But even as I was booking the time for acts I was not involved with, I noticed that their formulas for success were different from mine, and that suddenly, in the course of two years, the whole street scene was changing, and a style that I was successful with, for Marilyn and Billy (McCoo), and for Johnnie Taylor, was cold.

"But it's been to my advantage to work so closely with George, going back to the days when I used Bootsy to play bass on 'Disco Lady,' because if you look over to your right and you see that you're working right next to the people who are changing the sound of the street, it's that much easier to absorb what they're doing and free yourself form your own shackles of style. I have just recently made the decision to start putting together a stable of acts and to start grooming talent the way Berry used to.

The most interesting development to come out of the annual NARAS screening committee meetings in Los Angeles (which determines placement of Grammy Award entries) was the problem of dealing with Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown and his LP on Music Is Medicine. The album, which was a pick on this page several months ago. shows Brown's total immersion in a wide variety of styles, including jazz, traditional blues, bluegrass and country. The committee thoroughly enjoyed each of the tracks, but where does one place an album which contains such diverse music? Since the artist has an acknowledged following in Nashville, has frequently appeared at jazz festivals, has a huge following in France and is venerated by blues fans, it might be a good idea to have ABC delve into his classic Duke/Peacock performances of the 1950s, which have never appeared on LP

"Opening Remarks" is the title of **Ted Dunbar's** initial Xanadu effort. Dunbar did
all the writing for the quartet, which in-

cludes Tommy Flanagan, Sam Jones and Leroy Williams.

Inner City is very excited about the debut album of Richard Sussman ("Free Fall"), which features Tom Harrell, Larry Schnelder and Mike Richmond. Classic Jazz, the IC sister label, has new releases by Tiny Grimes and Arnett Cobb. The former is a quartet date featuring Lloyd Glenn, while the latter is a nine-piece band including some Llonel Hampton alumni such as Wallace Davenport, Buster Cooper, Milt Buckner and Eddle Chamblee.

Lennle White, Donald Byrd and Patrice Rushen headline on new Elektra releases. White's album, "Steamline," may disappoint those looking forward to the further adventures of the "Astral Pirates" but should please lovers of progressive jazzrock. The Byrd LP features his new group, The 125th Street Orchestra and The Uptown Singers and is titled "Thank You For Funking Up My Life."

INTIMATE STRANGERS — Tom Scott — Columbia JC 35557 — Producers: Tom Scott and Hank Cicalo — List: 7.98

Tom Scott has established himself as a top studio arranger and performer, composer and support player, but with his first solo effort for Columbia it's time for his own career to blossom. Backed by some of the finest studio cats around, Scott's sax and lyricon work is up to his usual highest-quality standards. Side one, a three-part, six-song suite that tells the story of a sax player's brief romantic encounter, is one of the most beautiful and challenging jazz pieces ever captured on vinyl.

PRE-RAHSAAN — Roland Kirk — Prestige 24080 — List: 8.98

Two diverse settings, recorded seven years apart, for the multi-talented/multi-reedman. The earlier date finds him in the company of organist Jack McDuff in a rather conservative, but thoroughly stimulating set, while the second album finds him in the company of Jackie Byard, Richard Davis and Alan Dawson in a wildly inventive display of virtuosity. Kirk was a remarkable musician, and this is some of his very finest work.

CHANGES & THINGS — Sam Jones — Xanadu 150 — Producer: Don Schiltten — List: 7.98

It's hard to image how veteran bassist Jones could have done any better on his latest for the Cream Records-distributed Xanadu label. From the choice of collaborators — including Blue Mitchell, Slide Hampton and Louis Hayes — to the distinctive material to the freshness of the solos, "Changes & Things" is one of the most solid mainstream offerings to come along in quite some time. Jones' percussive approach to the bass is best showcased on a track called "Sam's Things."

Klemmer has abandoned use of the echoplex in his band performances but on this very special project (which has concerned him for several years), Klemmer returns to the electronic device for solo improvistations. Whether offering fast runs and popping low notes on "Intimacy" or the straight ahead blow of "Waterfalls," this album is a quintessential example of the solo saxophone statement.

PREZ CONFERENCE — Dave Pell — GNP Crescendo 2122 — Producer: Dave Pell — Ilst: 7.98

Saxophonist Pell with his group has created a tenor Super-Sax here in a program designed to honor Lester Young. Three tenors and baritone play harmonized (courtesy of Bill Holman) solos by Lester Young. Soloists are Sweets Edison (who has rarely sounded better) and Arnold Ross on piano. Ten tunes, mostly of pre-war vintage, encompass some of Young's most memorable solos. Well conceived, well executed and well worth a listen.

BLUES ON DOWN — Benny Golson — Milestone 47048 — list: 8.98

These days, Golson plays disco for Columbia on soprano sax. But in the '50s and early '60s, he played great jazz on tenor for a variety of labels, including Riverside (the source of this music). Compatriots here include Kenny Dorham, JJ Johnson, Wynton Kelly and Barry Harris, and the music is among the best of its time.

you stand a better shot. We know how to merchandise it; we know how to sell it. I've been doing it for years. It's a matter of making the commitment, and I'll make the commitment."

West Coast Connection

One source of new rock acts for TK will be Inphasion Records, the West Coastbased label that was recently formed by Danny Kessler and Clancy Grass. Under terms of Inphasion's recently signed distribution deal with TK, the label will be distributed by TK in the U.S. and Canada, with Polydor taking care of worldwide distribution.

Another distribution deal has been signed between TK and Muscle Shoals Sound, which has just formed a new label. "We'll be drawing a lot of strength from Muscle Shoals, which has always been a tremendous wealth of talent and material," Stone remarked. "You know, a lot of acts have gone down to record at Muscle Shoals, but what they've done is they've picked up the material down there."

TK also has an office in New York, which accounts primarily for disco talent. But the center of TK's A&R operation remains Miami, and it is in the Miami area that Stone has discovered some of his top acts, including Betty Wright, Foxy and KC and the Sunshine Band.

KC now has his own TK-distributed label, Sunshine Sound, as well as a brand new studio. While his own group remains a TK Records act, Sunshine Sound includes Jimmy Bo Horne and Fire.

TK employs three in-house producers: Cory Wade, Ray Martinez, who specializes in disco, and Steve Alaimo, executive producer and Stone's partner in TK. In addition, they use many outside producers. But, whoever produces a TK album, there is usually a certain sound on the LP that identifies it as a TK product.

While Stone agreed that there is a "TK Sound," he stressed his hands-off policy in the studio. "We get involved with outside producers who do their own thing," he said. "They do realize that TK has sort of a funky, happy, nice dance music or whatever you want to call it — and they do their own thing and sort of integrate that into it. And it seems to work.

"I mean, I wouldn't go to a Gregg Diamond and say, 'Gregg, this is the way you have to do it.' But you listen to the album, man, and it's all groovin' and TKish, you know? And it still has Gregg Diamond all over the place."

Always A Record Man

Henry Stone has been in the record business for over 30 years, and he knows every phase of it. But his first love was always discovering and recording new talent, and TK Records has proven to be the perfect outlet for his creativity.

Stone came to Miami in 1946 after having played jazz trumpet and worked in publishing in Los Angeles. At that time, he

remembers, there was "nothing but palm trees" in Miami. Stone discovered a warehouse in town that was filled with 50,000 78s on the Black and White label which the owner was trying to unload. Having peddled some records from the back seat of his car in California, Stone thought he could sell them; and so he found himself in the record distribution business.

For a time, Stone worked for Pan American distributors, then set up his own Seminole Record Distributors. Meanwhile, he was beginning to record a few acts on the side. "I always had a studio in the back of my pocket," he recalled in a previous Cash Box interview (Cash Box, March 27, 1976). "And around this time I recorded Ray Charles on Rockin' Records, my own label. I also recorded John Lee Hooker under a pseudonym."

der a pseudonym."

In the early '50s, Stone went into partnership with Syd Nathan of King Records in Cincinnati. Together, they formed Deluxe Records, and Stone produced James Brown's classic, "Please Please Please," on Federal, another of Nathan's labels.

Stone founded Tone Distributors after parting ways with Nathan in the mid-'50s. At the same time, he had a label called Chart Records, "which put out a lot of those early Alan Freed-type (rock) groups." He also had several other small labels over the years, most of them distributed by Atlantic. In 1960, one of these ventures, Dade Records, had a hit with James Brown's "Mashed Potatoes."

Throughout the '60s, however, Stone concentrated mostly on building Tone, which at one time, he says, distributed nearly every independent label for the state of Florida. Today, Tone is still one of the biggest independent distributors in the Miami area. But Stone is no longer directly connected with the enterprise, which is now run by Lynda Stone Millman.

Stone credits Warner Bros., Elektra/Asylum and Atlantic with giving him the impetus to start TK Records. By forming WEA and pulling their lines from independent distribution in 1971, he says, they pushed him into doing what he really wanted to do: become a record manufacturer.

Independents Are Strong

How does Stone feel about independent distribution today? "I feel very strongly about it," he replied, "because I'm one of the major labels. There's A&M and TK and there's 20th Century and Arista — there are not that many (major independent) labels. So we get a tremendous amount of recognition at the independent distribution level." Stone added that, since the independent manufacturers have relatively few releases at any given time compared to a CBS or a WEA, they can work them better than the major branch outfits can. "That's a super advantage for TK and a few of the stronger independents. And that's why I believe that the independent network at this point is very, very strong."

At the same time, he noted, the very size of CBS, WEA and Polygram is working to the advantage of the indies from an A&R standpoint, "There's a situation out there now, which I'm feeling as a major independent, where people cannot get their product released. They just can't go to CBS right now. CBS has so many commitments, WEA has so many commitments, and Polygram is just committed up to their teeth. So people can't get their product out. And we're a growing, creative business. So what's going to happen? There are just going to be people springing up with product. A few of them are going to have a rough time, but it's going to expand. It's the creativity of our business: You just can't control it.'

has been able to return to the basics of the

"As a small company you can oversee everything every step of the way, from the recording process to the artwork to getting the mastering approval from the artist," Snyder says.

Although he is based in New York so he can be close to CBS operations, Snyder echoes Popovich's sentiments concerning the decision to headquarter the label's three-man promotion staff in Cleveland.

"In Cleveland we have the biggest breakout radio market that I think exists," Snyder says. "And it's real tough to break a new act without radio."

New Acts

And new acts are what make up the Cleveland International roster, which consists of Meat Loaf, The Euclid Beach Band, Ellen Foley, Jesus Alvarez and The Boyzz. The Euclid Beach Band just finished recording its debut LP while Foley and Alvarez are currently in the studio working on their first efforts. The Boyzz LP has been out for about a month and a single, "Wake It Up, Shake It Up" recently was released.

All the acts were signed by Popovich, who assumes the lion's share of A&R responsibilities in addition to the role he plays directing the label's promotion staff out of Cleveland.

Popovich was tipped off to Meat Loaf by a long-time friend who was managing the rock artist. Ellen Foley was signed after Popovich heard her perform as a back-up singer in Meat Loaf's band. And the Euclid Beach Band was discovered by Popovich while he was out driving one afternoon.

"They had a local record here called 'There's No Surf In Cleveland' on Scene Records and I heard it about 13 times once on my car radio," Popovich says. "So I called Scene trying to track it down. We bought the single and agreed to do an album with the group."

Popovich says Cleveland's proximity to Chicago, which he considers a hotbed of undiscovered talent, is another advantage to his label's location. The Boyzz were playing in a Chicago club when Popovich first heard them.

"We've found that Chicago is full of clubs and new bands," says Snyder. "That environment doesn't exist in New York and it sure doesn't exist in Los Angeles, New York and L.A. clubs serve primarily a showcase function for thr record companies."

But with five acts on the Cleveland International roster, Popovich says he has no plans to sign any new acts in the near future.

"We want to keep a small roster here for

the first couple of years so we can be totally committed to the people we have already signed," he says. "With this type of operation we're able to stick with an album for a year as we have with Meat Loaf."

Unlike many custom labels, which leave all promotional responsibilities to their distributor, Popovich says he attempts to get his records off the ground even before they are released to prove to CBS that they deserve to be priority items.

"Meat Loaf's first record shipped 100,-000," says Snyder. "But it took six weeks of field work prior to the release of the album with cassettes we made. We called the CBS branch people, FM radio people and accounts and in effect, we pre-sold the album. We got instant airplay and sales in the Cleveland and New York markets."

Currently the label's promo staff is trying to get the ball rolling on the Boyzz LP, a new Meat Loaf single and The Euclid Beach Band's LP.

"With just three promotion men we can cover the whole country out of Cleveland," Popovich says. "For example, one guy drove to Buffalo this morning and he'll work that market today and go to every station there with the records. He'll also get together there with a tip sheet and the biggest account."

But even though Cleveland International may attempt to cover the whole country, the real muscle for marketing and promoting the label's product has to come from it's distributor.

"I think our role in this whole thing is to first of all make hit records," says Snyder. "Next we go out and bring them to a certain level which will allow CBS and their tremendous marketing operation to move in and take it to whatever level it can reach. That's it in a nutshell."

Gene Parsons Signs To Sierra/Briar Records

LOS ANGELES — Gené Parsons, former member of the Byrds and the Flying Burrito Brothers, has signed with Sierra/Briar Records. Parsons' first solo LP since 1973 is slated for release next spring.

Parsons who is currently touring with the re-formed Flying Burrito Brothers, will continue to serve as A&R director for Sierra/Briar.

Atco Inks Lindisfarne

ticular time. He's a fixture, in a constantly changing marketplace."

Another factor, according to Ken Kandell, a promotion man working with Joe Cash in the Washington, D.C. area, has been the "streamlined function of the independent. He doesn't," Kandell said, "have to be burdened with a lot of other company-related tasks, like filling out expense forms and sitting in on conference calls. His main concern is the program director, and he can concentrate on that."

Since the promotion man's relationship with a radio station program and music director has traditionally been crucial, most promotion men surveyed by **Cash Box** echoed Joe Cash's comment that "credibility is the key. We can afford to be honest, and we have to convince stations that we're the best tool they can use to decide what's right for them."

AOR Specialists

Another service that Cash and other promotion men have begun to provide has been that of an AOR specialist. According to Brenner, who has recently added album specialist AI Perry to his staff, "For an independent promotion man, AOR has probably become just as important as Top 40. And Top 40 is constantly watching AOR, a fact you can see on their playlists, which are about 70% similar."

Steve Leeds, a five-year promotion man with Atlantic Records who has just started his own northeast regional AOR company, stated, "It's still a new field, but the reality is that AOR radio is incredibly sophisticated, and they're subject to the same needs and pressures as Top 40. We're filling a vacuum that has emerged in the marketplace."

Another new AOR firm, Could Be Wild Promotion from Buffalo, has also, according to co-principal Bruce Moser, incorporated artist relations services into their structure. "We've set up live radio concerts and in-store appearances for artists," Moser stated. "Radio is just the first step. Then we have to concentrate on the retail accounts and any other vehicle which might be helpful to the artist and his record."

Among the problems facing the AOR promotion men are the limitations of budgets and competing consultancy services like Burkhart/Abrams, "AOR is an ad-

ditional budgetary problem for companies," Leeds said, "and smaller companies often can't afford to keep an album specialist."

Kandell viewed the consultancy problem "as an example of AOR radio degenerating itself into robot media. The Burkhart/Abrams format is unreceptive to new product, making it really hard for the human factor, which the promotion man provides, to break into the rotation. And the research that they claim is bullshit."

Cash added that many AOR formats have proved frustrating for Top 40-oriented promotion. "They seem to either have a liberal add list, which is great, but doesn't provide concentrated rotation. Or else they're as tight as AM and you don't get any rotation."

Aside from AOR, retail has become another key promotional target. Bill Harper, a longtime Philadelphia-based promotion man, stressed the importance of "convincing an account to buy with enthusiasm." Nowadays," Harper said, "you have to develop a rapport with the buyer at key accounts, as well as with radio station programmers, in addition to providing display material or in-store promotion services, if necessary. In other words, you must treat (retail) accounts like stations."

hearings that the location lists would be "unduly burdensome" and that they violate the businessmen's right to confidentiality. The performing rights societies, on the other hand, disputed those claims.

Nov. 9 Hearing

The CRT will go ahead with a hearing on Nov. 9, due to cover several jukebox items.

Among the points on the Tribunal's agenda is a request to reconsider the previous decision to adopt the jukebox rule. Also, several questions on the Freedom of Information Act and its application to the location list requirement are to be considered.

Finally, the Tribunal will look at BMI's suggestion that copyright owners be given further guidance on how claims should be submitted and how surveys should be conducted. As previously detailed, ASCAP and SESAC endorse a random sampling of actual performances on jukeboxes, while BMI believes royalties should be distributed according to information gathered from trade paper charts.

Only \$8 will make your juke box legal under the Copyright Law.

On January 1, 1978, a new copyright law went into effect.

Under the new law, writers and publishers are entitled to compensation for juke box perfor-

mances of their music.

In order to assure this compensation, the law requires that juke box owners register every box they operate with the U.S. Copyright Office, and pay that Office an \$8 annual fee for each box. You'll receive a certificate for each juke box, which must be displayed on it.

It's an easy law to comply with.

But, failure to register and pay the required fees can make you a copyright infringer, liable for damages of at least \$250 per song infringed. And lawsuits against jukebox operators for copyright infringement are being brought.

Whether you own one box or 101 boxes, you must have a license and pay the appropriate fees.


If you haven't registered your juke boxes with the Federal Government yet, now's the time to do it.

Just contact the U.S. Copyright Office, Licensing Division, Washington, D.C., 20557, Tel. (703) 557-1394, and they will send you the simple forms you need.

After all, it scarcely seems worth risking so much for something you can get for only \$8.

Welcome From Association President Don Van Brackel

AMOA's 30th year, 1978, is certainly an important milestone in the history of an association which, in my opinion, has done far more for this industry than most of us can possibly realize. AMOA has not only waged an unending battle on copyright legislation, but it has consistently developed services for the membership.

In January the new \$8 jukebox royalty became effective. We assisted in the implementation of the new law by distributing licensing information as a matter of service to members and cooperation with the U.S. Copyright Office. Prior to that, in May of last year, we strongly recommended to the Copyright Office the need for simplified methods of compliance. The members were advised of these recommendations. There is still much to be done on this problem, some of which will be costly, and we must ask the entire industry to help in this endeavor as well as our dues-paying members. We will not give up the fight for what we consider fair and equitable treatment.

This has been a year of growth and progress for AMOA. Because the exposition has become an international event, gaming equipment is being exhibited for the first time this year. Our audio visual slide program on the industry, which has been presented to state conventions and government agencies, has been praised as a valuable public relations tool. Last month we initiated a cost-of-doing-business survey the results of which will be a valuable service for all of us. Earlier this year we hired an assistant for the executive vice president because of the increased workload of administering the association.

The exposition seminar this year will cover two important subjects: a discussion on the jukebox royalty with our legal counsel and the chief of the Licensing Division of the U.S. Copyright Office as panelists; and. second, a discussion on amusement centers with three leading authorities on the subject making up the panel. Further to AMOA's education programs, our Mechanics Schools will continue to be held wherever needed throughout the country. There will also be a management level seminar next March conducted by the University of Notre Dame. For convenience. this will be held at the O'Hare International Airport in Chicago, and I urge you to register during this exposition.

My warmest congratulations to the board of directors, to the exposition chairmen and committees, and to the staff of AMOA, for the tremendous job they have done in planning this year's exposition. There is nothing like it anywhere.

Get The Most From The Show

by Fred M. Granger

AMOA's executive vice president Fred Granger has prepared a list of guidelines for visitors to follow in covering the annual convention. His suggestions are as follows:

1) Go to the exposition with the intent of learning as much as you possibly can, especially about new equipment. Attend educational sessions such as the AMOA Seminar. Visit AMOA service booths on the exhibit floor. Keep an open mind.

2) If possible, attend the exposition with someone from your own company. Then you will be able to discuss, on the spot, the merits of the products you see. Or you may wish, at least some of the time, to split up and each concentrate on different parts of the show and then compare notes later.

3) Use your AMOA Exposition Program and Directory of exhibitors complete with floor plans. Then you can check off names

of exhibitors you may have visited or may wish to visit again. Make sure to visit every exhibitor. The one you miss might be the one who could do you the most good.

4) Ask questions. Be inquisitive. Exhibitors cannot always display everything they have, nor can they publish all of their technical information and know-how. So, ask questions.

5) Discuss your particular problems with exhibitors. In this show most exhibitors will have technical people on hand to help you. Read the exhibitors' literature. Collect what you think will be helpful and take it home with you.

6) Get in the habit of taking notes. Amidst such a large display of coin-operated equipment you will find it impossible to remember everyting. So carry a notebook in which you can jot down names, products, manufacturers, ideas — whatever might be helpful. Don't trust anything to memory.

7) Keep on the move. The AMOA Exposition is a wonderful opportunity to talk shop with others in the coin machine business. Sometimes informal conversations can yield a gold mine of valuable information.

8) Meet new people. Introduce yourself. Your badge gives you the right to approach new people, most of whom will be glad to meet you. Eat with someone different at

Happy Birthday, AMOA

AMOA is celebrating its 30th anniversary; three decades of growth, progress and fulfillment, culminating in its present status of international significance. The annual AMOA convention in Chicago is noted the world over, and each year finds an increase in the number of foreign countries represented at the show. This was a contributing factor in the association's decision to permit coin-operated gaming equipment to be exhibited at the 1978 exposition.

At birth, AMOA (then MOA) was a 14-member committee, formed as a defense against adverse legislation and this remains a primary goal, with strong leadership and membership support providing a much more powerful defense mechanism, today. With the passage of the new copyright law, which imposes an \$8 per jukebox royalty fee, a long-standing legislative battle came to a partial end for the association. Partial, in that certain "regulations" of the law draw strong membership opposition and, while diligently assisting operators in complying, AMOA resumed its efforts towards securing a more simplified method of compliance.

Among the milestones in AMOA's history was the first national convention, held in Chicago in 1950 for an audience of less than 500. Not an impressive figure by today's standards but the event was the forerunner which established the annual trade show as a vital industry function. In the ensuing years, as the association progressed, numerous membership services were implemented, along with organizational programs commensurate with the association's internal growth. By 1977, AMOA had more than a thousand members and this past year the association increased its office staff.

As further evidence of the association's outstanding 30-year growth pattern, the 1978 annual exposition, Nov. 10-12, at the Conrad Hilton Hotel, will occupy three exhibit halls. The display of coin-operated amusement equipment, and related products, will be unsurpassed, according to association officials. American firms will be well represented in the ranks of convention exhibitors as they've been in previous years, but there'll also be a marked increase in the number of foreign firms exhibiting products at Expo '78. Attendance, on both the domestic and foreign level, is expected to reach an all time high. This year's convention should dramatically reflect the association's 30 years of achievement. Happy birthday, AMOA.

9) Ask for help. If you don't know who can aid you with a particular problem, consult one of the AMOA officers or directors. They will usually know who is most qualified or experienced to help you. Or consult members of the trade press who are very knowledgeable and will be glad to help you. If you are from another country, you can get help from AMOA's International Visitors Booth.

10) Finally, to get the most out of the show, work it systematically. Spend as much time on the exhibit floor as possible. Check the floor plan from the official directory, the trade magazines or the enlarged floor plan posted throughout the show. Work the show carefully, thoroughly. The AMOA Exposition is a very special, high quality show. It only happens once a year. Get the most out of it.



business convention of the year; no other meeting attracts such a broad crosssection of industry representatives in one marketplace.

This year's convention, the association's 30th, will be held Nov. 10-12 at Chicago's Conrad Hilton Hotel.

See New Product

Midway Grows as the World Plays

In a recent survey, distributor company

executives said the primary reason for attending the AMOA Expo is to view new product and discuss sales and promotion strategies with factory representatives. They also said AMOA is the ideal forum for comparing notes with fellow distribs on issues of mutual concern, such as priceper-play and location ownership of games. Finally, many distributors feel it is their duty to attend the show in order to keep customers apprised of the latest developments in the industry.

"I don't think there is a distributor in the country that doesn't attend AMOA," said John Scavarda, general manager of Circle International in Los Angeles. "It's the most important show in the industry.

'AMOA makes purchasing easier by giving us a preview of what's coming out in terms of new product. Also, it gives us a handle on adding new lines."

Ray Hibarger, president of Hanson Distributing, Bloomington, Minn., agreed that the show's primary function is to expose new equipment.

"AMOA is an excellent place to feel the pulse of the industry, where it is headed --specifically what we can expect in the coming months in the way of product," he said.

Enhance Marketing Capability "It's an opportunity to meet with the manufacturers we represent in an attempt to enhance our capability to market their products, with particular emphasis on game concepts, service and promotion.

"Another important thing is it exposes us to new manufacturers with other new

Hibarger said it is also helpful to be able to see how operators respond to the new games.

"The environment at AMOA is very condusive to getting an idea of how our customers feel about the new pieces," he said. "Their reaction is much more candid because they are not in a sales environment."

Similarly, Ira Bettelman, vice president of C.A. Robinson & Co. in Los Angeles, said: "Although I may already be familiar with a new game, it's important to see the way 200, 300, 500 operators react to it. I may not be looking at the game as much as I'm looking at the people.

The executives stressed the importance of comparing notes on topics of mutual interest with other distributors attending AMOA.

"At any convention you go, number one, to see new products," said Art Warner, assistant sales manager at Betson Enter-prises in New Jersey. "But it's equally as important to see other distributors and get feeling for what's happening nationwide."

What sort of things do distribute discuss at AMOA?

'We talk about general trends and directions in the business - what inventories look like, location commissions, price-perplay, things like that," said Ira Bettelman.


As a result of these discussions, existing pieces are frequently reevaluated as to their earnings potential, said Hanson Distributing's Hibarger.

Reevaluate Equipment

"Oftentimes in exchanging ideas with other distributors we find that their customers have found a place for a particular piece that is generally not a good earner," he said. "And it helps us to know, for example, if a piece that does not do well in a bowling alley does very well in an arcade. Then we can recommend it to customers who have had a bad experience with the piece."

More than that, distributors say they are responsible for keeping their customers in-

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Bee Gees

Artist Of The Year

Twenty years ago few people around the world knew much about the Bee Gees, but 20 years from now they will still be talking about the "Bee Gees Fever of 1978."

In fact, when one looks at the 70s in contemporary music, no other group has made an impact on the scale of the Brothers Gibb — Barry, Robin and Maurice. Their ascension has been deceptive, but never more convincing than their history-making surge into 1978, the year the Bee Gees Fever truly captured the pulse and the hearts of the people.

The "Bee Gees Fever of 1978" not only represents the phenomenal chart successes of the Gibb brothers during the year, but it symbolically reflects the mood of the times. The stage was set last year when Barry, Robin and Maurice began working on the soundtrack album for "Saturday Night Fever," produced by Robert Stigwood for Paramount Films.

Almost simultaneously, the Bee Gees had just completed their "Here At Last... Bee Gees... Live" album, a million-selling two-record set that featured 22 of their greatest hits, and were preparing for a major tour of the same title. Their previous album, "Children Of The World" (1976), was nearing double-platinum, and "Main Course," the one before (1975), was still lingering as one of their most well-received albums ever.

They also had enjoyed three #1 hits; "How Can You Mend A Broken Heart" (1971), their first #1 in America; "Jive Talkin'" (1975); and "You Should Be Dancing" (1976). In between, hits like "Love So Right," "Boogie Child," "Run To Me" and "My World" kept them constantly in the Top 20.

While Stigwood sought their writing talents for the music in "Saturday Night Fever," he also engineered their first starring roles, in "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band," released this summer, costarring the Bee Gees and Peter Frampton. The \$12 million RSO musical extravaganza, directed by Michael Schultz and produced by Robert Stigwood, oozes with plenty of glitter and musical excitement, making it one of the most anticipated and highly acclaimed film releases this year.

Amidst this wave of activity, the Bee Gees finally sat down, in Paris, to write the title song for "Saturday Night Fever." The song they delivered, "Stayin' Alive," drooled with the frenzy and fiery excitement that sparked John Travolta's memorable and academy-award-nominated performance as Tony Manero, Brooklyn's disco king.

The Bee Gees later wrote and coproduced, along with Albhy Galuten and Karl Richardson, the majority of the "Saturday Night Fever" soundtrack album. Within weeks of its release, the album spread a fever throughout America unlike any experienced since the Fabulous Four blitzed

Crystal Gayle

Record Of The Year

If the last year is any indication of the things to come for Crystal Gayle, then the sky's the limit for the lady from Nashville.

In 1977, Crystal was presented with the "Outstanding Female Vocalist" award by both the Academy of Country Music and the Country Music Association. In February 1978 NARAS presented Crystal with her first-ever Grammy for the country female vocal performance of the year. Also in 1978, both the Academy of Country Music and the Country Music Association named Crystal their "Outstanding Female Vocalist" for the second consecutive year.

Combining pop, country and blues, Crystal is an artist whose country feel is apparent, yet because of her varied musical tastes, her own style is hard to categorize.

Crystal was born in the small eastern town of Paintsville, Kentucky where singing immediately became a part of her life since all four brothers and three sisters were involved in music. At the age of four, Crystal and her family moved to Wabash, Indiana where she actually got her first taste of performing live. It was during her high school years that she performed in church, for charities and other civic organizations.

After graduation, Crystal signed her first recording contract with Decca Records, now MCA. Her first single, "I've Cried (The Blue Right Out Of My Eyes)," hit the top twenty on the country charts and when it was re-released in 1977, it moved high on the country charts again.

In January 1973, Crystal signed with United Artists Records. Her first UA single, "Restless," received heavy airplay and was a country chart item. Through the success of "Restless," Crystal found herself performing in many of the top nightclubs across the country.

Now she's working constantly, traveling from one city to the next. Crystal and her husband Bill, (who is studying law) now live in Nashville. Although Crystal is quite a homemaker, most of her spare time is spent writing songs and trying out new musical ideas.

Crystal's first album, "Crystal Gayle," contained three country hits, "Beyond You," "Wrong Road Again" and "This Is My Year For Mexico." Her second album, "Somebody Loves You," contained more of the same, including the hits, "Somebody Loves You" and her first #1 country hit, "I'll Get Over You."

Crystal's third work, entitled "Crystal," showed crossover activity to the pop market and included the hits, "One More Time," "Do It All Over Again" and "Never Miss A Real Good Thing."

Crystal's fourth album, "We Must Beiieve In Magic" is her best seller to date achieving platinum status in February 1978. Her recent success is due in part to a strong crossover into the pop stream of music. Her hit single off the album, "Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue," went platinum.



Debby Boone

Pop Record Of The Year

People who debate the importance of heredity versus environment in the parenting of talent will have a difficult time separating the genes from the upbringing in the case of 21-year-old Debby Boone. Daughter of rock 'n' roll patriarch Pat and granddaughter of country & western star Red Foley, one could easily say that Debby was 'to-the-manner-born.'

Debby was born in Hackensack, New Jersey, and moved with her family to the Los Angeles area when she was four. Shirley Boone dressed her four daughters alike (the others are Cherry, Lindy and Laury) and taught them to sing four-part harmony. As might be imagined, there was always a lot of singing going on in the Boone family, whether at impromptu home gatherings, at church or on tour. Debby's earliest memories of family sing-alongs center around her dad's career. Debby's 'big break" occurred eight years ago when Pat headlined a bill in Japan with the then unknown Osmonds. It was decided that if the girls could come up with one song they could sing in the show, they could accompany him to Japan. The song they chose was "What The World Need Now Is Love, and the singing Boones have been a welcome staple on musical circuits throughout the world ever since.

With two of the daughters now married and one in college, the logistics of wideranging tours became more and more difficult. The time seemed right for Debby to step out on her own. Producer Mike Curb had been after Debby to record solo for the last three years. Her first Warner-Curb solo single "You Light Up My Life" (the theme song from the Columbia motion picture of the same name) was the longest running top-of-the-charts single in 23 years. Her debut album "You Light Up My Life produced by Michael Lloyd, Mike Curb and Joe Brooks and released in September 1977, features Debby's sisters singing with her on several songs, including a few fine oldies such as Lennon-McCartney's "From Me To You." Although she claims she's more comfortable with ballads, like "End Of The World," her version of the upbeat "Hasta Manana" proves her versatility.

Thus far, the year 1978 has not only seen the continued expansion of Debby's creative horizons, but her emergence as a talent of major stature within the entertainment industry. At the 1978 Grammy Awards, Debby and "You Light Up My Life" won Best New Artist and Song of the Year, respectively. "You Light Up My Life" was an Academy Award winner as well, for Best Movie Theme Song, not to mention NARM awards for Best Selling Single and Best Selling LP By a New Artist.

Debby's second album is titled "Midstream" and highlights material perfectly suited to her distinctive vocal style. The LP was produced by Brooks Arthur and Joe Brooks,

Bonnie Tyler

Country Record Of The Year

Within the past year, vocalist Bonnie Tyler has become one of the most popular recording artists on the international charts. Her latest single, "It's A Heartache," reached #1 in Austria, #3 in Germany, Holland and Belgium, #4 in England, #5 in Australia and Top 10 in South Africa. It's her fourth globe-spanning hit, but there's still a major goal to be reached — the American charts.

One sure indication of the enormous momentum Bonnie's career has achieved already is the race by several U.S. artists to cover her latest hit. But RCA Records, which now releases her discs throughout the world, has rushed out the original hit version of "It's A Heartache" in this country first.

Some European journalists have recently taken to describing Bonnie as a female Rod Stewart. At her record company's offices in London they refer to Rod Stewart as a male Bonnie Tyler. But Bonnie herself simply says flatly, "I hate the comparisons with anyone else. And if anyone thinks me a lightweight, instant success, I shall be around to remind them that my real success is only just starting . . ."

With her career being guided by Gordon Mills, one of the world's top managers, Bonnie is certain to be taking some giant steps. Color photos of the blonde singer with blue eyes appear frequently in Europe's pop music publications and with the success of each hit, particularly "It's A Heartache," her fame spreads to new corpors of the world

ners of the world.

Bonnie Tyler was born in a small Welsh town just outside of Swansea. While working as an assistant in a candy shop, she used to sing into an imaginary microphone and dream of appearing on BBC-TV's Top Of The Pops. She had her first multi-nation smash with "Lost In France," which is included in her debut album "The World Starts Tonight" (released in the U.S. on Chrysalis). Other highlights of that initial LP include "More Than A Lover," another of her global hits, and a unique interpretation of the classic Janis Joplin number "Piece Of My Heart."

Her second album was the first to feature her new, fulltime band. Members are Kevin Dunn on bass, who's been with Bonnie for Four years; drummer Mick Gibbons, who played with Badfinger; steel and rhythm guitar player Peter King; keyboard player Roger Bara, the band's only non-Welshman; and lead guitarist Taff Williams. The album contains "It's A Heartache," "Heaven" and a memorable version of "You Make Me Feel Like A Natural Woman.

Tyler's third release, recently recorded at London's Rak Studios contains 10 new tunes co-produced by Ronnie Scott, Steve Wolf and Robin Cable. As yet untitled, the new LP is slated for release by RCA in January of 1979.



Heatwave

Soul Record Of The Year

The most refreshing new band to emerge on the International pop scene in 1977 was Heatwave, the seven-piece group whose debut American single, "Boogie Nights," was one of only three singles to be certified platinum (two million records sold) in the United States by the RIAA over the course of the year. Significantly, "Boogie Nights" was the only one of those three platinum singles to be written by the act who performed it. Moreover, Heatwave's success didn't stop with that record, as their debut album, "Too Hot To Handle," has since been certified double-platinum (two million units sold) in the U.S. by the RIAA. Most recently (late March 1978) it was learned that the second single picked from that LP, namely "Always And Forever," had climaxed its dramatic Top 20-pop/Top 5-R&B chart run with RIAA gold certification (one million records sold) in the U.S. — that announcement coming just days before the release of Heatwave's long-awaited second album, "Central Heating."

Heatwave's leader and founder is Johnnie Wilder, Jr., a dynamic singer who has overseen every step of the band's career. A native of Dayton, Ohio, Johnnie's family includes five brothers, one of whom, Keith, has been the second lead vocalist of Heatwave since his joining the lineup in late 1975.

After attending Central State University in Wilberforce for a year, Johnnie enlisted in the Army, and was shipped out to "Strat-Com" headquarters in Heidelberg, West Germany, at the beginning of 1969. To point a finger at Heatwave's earliest origins, it would be the Cashmeres, a five-man acapella vocal group that Johnnie organized to sing at service clubs on weekends. Soon he met a group of German musicians calling themselves the Soul Sessions, and they were able to achieve a sound emulating the Chi-Lites, Temptations, etc. When the Army's red tape took away a couple of the singers, though, Johnnie reorganized the group as the Noblemen, and eventually became its solo lead singer until his discharge in January,

Johnnie immediately returned home to Dayton, but in two months he was back in West Germany singing with Soul Sessions for another half-year. It didn't take long before Johnnie found countryman Tommy Harris, drummer-leader of the Upsetters, and they began practicing together at a small room in Zweibrucken — it was the percolating radiator in that room, which never stopped pouring on the heat 12 months a year, that gave them their new name: Heatwave.

Johnnie Wilder, Keith Wilder, Mario Mantese, Rod Temperton, Bilbo Berger, Roy Carter and Billy Jones — together in Heatwave as their second album, "Central Heating," again produced by Barry Blue, begins its reign on the charts.

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1978 Jukebox/Games Route Survey

This survey was compiled from questionnaires sent to operating companies coast to coast. It is indicative of operating trends throughout the country but is in no way an absolute method of measuring these trends. This **Cash Box** feature cannot be reproduced in any way without the expressed permission of the editors of **Cash Box**.

reported they had increased their purchases this year.)

Average weekly music gross\$40 (A slight increase over last year. Our survey also revealed taverns to be the most profitable locations for phonographs; with lounges considered a close second and such youth oriented spots as college campus centers and teen clubs reported sporadically.)

When asked how long a phonograph is kept on the route, the majority of reporting operators said seven years.

Fully 98% of the operators polled said they own furniture style phonographs (and this figure compares exactly to last year); however, when asked to indicate how many units were on location the individual figures ranged from a low of four to a high of 50 and we were unable to determine an accurate average.

The predominant pricing on phonographs continues to be 2-25¢, as indicated by the majority of responding operators. In two instances, however, operators reported straight quarter play on 20% of their routes.

Weekly Record Purchases

Our poll revealed that operators purchase new records at the rate of three per machine, per week. Depending upon the number of machines on the route, this figure could range from between a total of 150 to 600 on a weekly basis, which serves to emphasize the operator's significance in the singles market.

Programming Singles

In programming their jukeboxes, operators rely on a routeman to select the singles for their machines, according to 40% of those polled, with the one-stop a close second; 20% said the responsibility is handled by an employee-programmer and 10% reported that they make the selections themselves.

We asked operators to list in order of importance the five most useful sources as guidelines in selecting new records. Here are the findings:

- 1. Trade magazines
- 2. One stops
- 3. Location requests
- 4. Personal selection by route personnel
- 5. Local radio station charts.

Trade magazine charts continue to play a major role in jukebox programming, as the poll revealed. One-stops, however, were elevated to the number two position (over last year's number four), surpassing location requests which dropped slightly to number three.

Operators were asked if phonograph collections this past year were more than last year, the same, or less. 55% reported collections to be the same as last year, 35% reported an increase, 10% reported collections to be lower than last year.

Promoting Phonograph Play

In response to the question "What do you do to promote more play on your phonographs?", one operator replied, "Program to the location...make every effort to get request records," and this eloquently sums up the feelings expressed by the majority responding. While some operators suggested colored title strips to call attention to new releases, spotlighting particular recording artists with high appeal, maintaining jukeboxes in clean, ship shape condition to encourage play, most felt that a jukebox stocked with records patrons want to hear will get the most play.

Location Commissions

50/50 continues to be the most widely used commission split, with 85% of the operators reporting it. 5% reported 60/40 (operator's favor); a small percentage use rentals and one operator applies a \$6 service charge.

Popularity Chart

The most popular games in locations that are mainly in business to serve food are pinball machines and video games. Likewise, pinball machines and video games also rate high in arcades or other off street locations, according to our survey.

Piay Pricing

Straight quarter play on flippers took a decided upturn in this year's survey, with 50% reporting it and 50% using 2-25¢ pricing. Shuffle alleys also reflected a departure from last year: 65% of the responding operators use straight quarter pricing on shuffle alleys and 35% 2-25¢. Video games were unanimously reported at straight quarter.

The Machine Purchase Graph

When asked about new game purchases this year 90% of the responding ops said they bought more new equipment this year than last, and only 5% said they bought less. This dramatic increase was similarly reflected in our 1976 survey; in 1977, however, only 30% reported buying more new machines.

When asked about used equipment (continued on page C-12)

purchases, 85% reported buying "less than last year" with two ops reporting buying

Queried as to how long various machines are kept on the route, responses averaged out to: four years for pingames; 5-1/2 years for shuffle alleys; 5-1/2 years for pool tables and 2 years for video games.

Electronic Pinball Machines

The growing popularity of electronic pinball machines was evident in our survey: 95% of the responding ops have them and, what's more, 85% feel they are higher earners than their electromechanical counterparts. As to the number of units on the route - here again, an average was difficult to determine, since the figures ranged from a minimum of five to a total of 150 spread over an individual route. This is a far cry from "one 'being evaluated' to a total of 21' on a route, as reported in last year's survey. On the subject of servicing the electronic models a slightly larger percentage (than in '77) feel they are easier to service, but the majority of responding ops expressed an opposing view.
General Trade Information

When asked to report on new locations added to the route this year, 80% of the ops responded that new additions were "good" (as opposed to 15% last year); 10% reported they were "satisfactory" (as opposed to 85% in '77) and 10% said they "lost more than they gained."

In response to our queries on tournaments, 30% reported some participation, specifically in pool tournaments; the feeling being that, when properly handled, they do

"Do you lease jukeboxes to locations" was another question we asked. 60% of the operators said "yes" and the financial arrangement averaged out to around \$33 per week

Attesting to the merit of national and state associations, 90% of the operators polled said they are members of both AMOA and their local state association.

When posed the hypothetical question "If you could operate only one type of machine, which would it be?" the pinball got 50% of the vote, with pool tables a close second, jukeboxes as number three -- and one op said "Sprint II."

"Cut throat competition" is one of the most irritating things about the operating business, according to one operator. Other comments on the subject included: "loans, bonus and poor distributor service;" "night lack of parts;" "high taxes and high cost of doing business;" "escalation of customer loans to impossible amounts;" "location demands in excess of income."

The following comments were made in response to the question "What can factories do to improve equipment and service to operators?": 1) sponsor more schools and provide better service manuals; 2) improve quality control so that machines will be fully operational when uncrated; 3) expedite parts shipments; 4) test equipment more rigorously at the factory; and 5) increase hot line service. Most of the comments dwelled on "quality control" and one operator suggested that "some game factory . . . make a good game that can be sold to the operator for \$995.

Here's a sampling of what operators feel distributors can do to improve their service:

formed about what is accomplished at the convention.

"We try to attend all the business meetings," said John Scavarda, "because what is of interest to the operator is also of interest to us. A lot of operators look to the distributor for information they don't get on their own - especially in Los Angeles where there are many mom and pop operators.

Chuck Farmer, vice president of sales at Shaffer Distributing. Columbus, Ohio, agreed that "the more we are familiar with the operators' problems, the better we can serve them.

"We make it a point to attend the various meetings and pass the information we gather along to operators who didn't make the show.

Relay Information

While noting that only 5% of the operators in his area attend AMOA, Marty Cerin of Mountain Coin in Denver said, "I attend the seminar and the different manufacturer events because it's important for us to relay this information to the operators back home.

Hibarger said he prepares a special (continued on page C-24)

more service schools; 3) provide good test equipment; 4) have more service information available; and 5) improve the quality of repair and provide faster service.

In forecasting what lies ahead for the music and games industry operators displayed mixed feelings, ranging from op-timism to — "if game prices are not lowered, the games business will be dead

in two years!"

One operator predicts "a bright future for the industry" and "many new oppor-tunities;" another sees the "games business increasing over the next few years" and "more advance technology;" another said "inflation is a terrible threat to our pricing structure as exemplified in the conversion from 2-25¢ to 1-25¢ ... where do we go from here;" while still another astutely observed that "business gets better and better each year" but predicts that "the large routes will ultimately dominate the industry.

The final question in our survey asked, "If there is room for improvement (in the industry) what improvements would you suggest." Here are some of the responses: "Less distributor credit to help keep the 'fly by nights' out of this business;" "Operators should recognize the fact that they are business people, in a flourishing industry, and act accordingly in the conduct of their own businesses;" "The high cost of operating should prompt us all to take a second look at our pricing;" "Let's take full advantage of the opportunities available to us for learning how to service today's equipment.'



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



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Daily Routine Of Free-Lance Mover Is Very Rarely Routine

by Frank Manners

The free-lance mover is a little noted and much maligned member of the coin machine business; a bone or a boon depending on the operator to whom you talk. At the least, they envision him as a necessary evil, a man in motion who, for a nominal fee, transports their machines between distributor and location, location and location, shop and location, and back again, ad infinitum.

At best, he is more than just a mover suppying only horsepower and manpower. He performs an invaluable service to the operator. Firstly, he does a burdensome job that frees the operator for other tasks, and he does it cheaper than if an operator rented a truck and did it himself. Secondly, he acts as the operator's unofficial public relations man at the location, listening to complaints and soothing the ruffled egos of location owners. Thirdly, he's part service man. He sets up the game, checks it out, puts on the operator's locks and licenses, and has it earning money before the operator even arrives. Some movers will change records in the juke box as part of their service. Ultimately a capable mover can virtually manage the route, and in certain cases, the operator does little more than collect, allowing the mover to make decisions about ordering new equipment and switching old.

Daily Routine

The average mover runs his business like a modest entrepreneurial effort. The

daily routine: out on the street in the morning by 8:30 or 9:00 and back in at 6:30 the earliest, 9:00 the norm. He works Saturday, and reserves Sunday for dire emergencies. The mover usually owns and operates two to four trucks. He may rent extra trucks during extraordinarily busy spells, with two men per truck, and he groups the deliveries by areas; first-north, south, west, and east, and then subdivided into neighboring streets. He spans a radius of 50 miles. Normally the operator must schedule a move a day in advance, but the trucker's reputation depends on efficient, rapid service so he attempts to squeeze in last minute requests. To increase speed and responsiveness. some use a radio paging beeper hooked to their belts so the operator can contact them directly with a fifteen second message. Others work from a central office manned by a woman, and the drivers constantly call her to pick up new moves.

The daily routine, however, is rarely routine. The unusual is usual, the bizarre, commonplace. Obstacles inevitably occur to derail the mover from his appointed rounds. Time is his nemesis. He may arrive at a location in the boondocks while it's closed or he arrives at lunch time, and they tell him to come back two hours later, thus destroying his schedule. At times, a location may refuse to accept a machine or to give one up. If they accept it, the machine may not fit through the door, and an insistent location owner demands that they remove the door and the screen and

possibly the transom so he can have his game. Often he must haul a game up or down flights of stairs which laboriously prolongs an apparently simple move, especially if it's a loaded can vendor or pool table. One time, a mover squandered three hours when the band holding juke box records in place popped loose. One hundred Spanish records tumbled all over, the non-billingual mover had to put each one back in the correct slot.

The worst pitfall that can happen? Two nominees. Dropping a machine. The cost of the damages wipes out profits from several deliveries. Or getting to a location with a truck load of equipment, and hearing the owner roar, "I don't want these. Get them out of here. The operator promised me new stuff." Now the mover's squarely in the middle, a place he often finds himself. Whether or not he goofed, the trucker conveniently becomes the operator's scapegoat. If the game doesn't work, blame the mover. If the equipment is scratched, the mover did it.

Nevertheless, the free-lance mover often rises above these mundane setbacks, gloriously meets the challenge of the job, and ascends briefly to the rarefied atmosphere of earthly Olympus. One mover, alone, once strapped a juke box to his back, and, hunched over, carried it up a flight of stairs. Another trucker and his helper, stymied by an arcade's small front door and impossibly winding staircase, hauled thirty games up the rear fire escape and through the second floor emergency

door. Finally one legendary figure has been known to cart 20 football bowlers and pool tables singlehandedly into a location by walking them on end like an inanimate dancing partner. The same mover once found himself in a devilish dilemma. While he lugged a half-ton can vendor up a steep stairwell, an operator's helper on the bottom decided to let go and walk away because hauling machines wasn't his job. Stooped over the vendor, holding it tenaciously, the mover couldn't go up and he couldn't go down. He broke out in a cold sweat, he tasted salt in his parched mouth, burned with tension, and remained freeze-framed in his own personal limbo.

Rewarding Business

Despite the tribulations and tests of true grit, the movers generally agree that the business is rewarding. If not, they would leave it. You meet people and make a buck, although you may have to chase an operator for it. You can function on a moderate level or grow boundlessly, like one trucker, from a humble \$150 pickup truck to a nine diesel fleet. You freely set your limits. You work in the great outdoors which possesses an undenlable attraction regardless of the heat and sleet, snowing and blowing. And once a year you may blissfully experience the mover's dream a week when everything goes smoothly. You hit all the locations when they're open, all machines are accepted, they all work, and you get paid on the spot. To the mover, nirvana is not half as blessed as this.

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Bally **Flippers With Sound** Tips **About** Some

by B.M. Powers

With the advent of an electronic sound system in Ballygames, there have been a few significant changes. These changes effect not only the present games but, in some ways, effect the games prior to the introduction of electronic sounds. I will take the changes one at a time and discuss their significance and uses.

The first change that has taken place was the installation of the sound module itself. The part number for this module is AS2518-32. This module is divided into six circuit areas: power supply, tone date processor, programmable frequency generator, tone trigger generator, voltage controlled alternator, and audio amplifier.

The trouble shooting procedures for this module are no different from the other Bally modules and are included in our 'Bally Electronic Pinball Games Repair Procedures.' This manual is a new one and is identified as F.O. 560-1. It replaces F.O. 560 and is effective for all electronic flippers from Freedom through Lost World and future games.

It should be noted that F.O. 560 should be replaced with F.O. 560-1 in your files. F.O. 560-1 is included in all Bally games as was F.O. 560.

The next significant factor evolved around the electronic sound package is the ability to install it in electronic games that did not have electronic sounds, i.e., putting

it in a Night Rider or Eight Ball. This will not give the same exact sounds or tunes as a game like Lost World. It will give an electronic chime sound in place of the solenoid.

The sounds are different but not to the extreme interrelation of sounds on games like Lost World or The Six Million Dollar Man. It does give the ability to control the volume of the sound.

To make this conversion, order Bally Kit #525. The kit consists of the following:

The next change that has taken place is the modification of our basic (without personality ICs) Mircro Processor Module. The basic number has changed from AS 2518-17 to AS2518-35.

The AS2518-35 is adaptable to games prior to Lost World by changing the jumper requirements.

First, let's refer to Table I that will give us the common 'personality' or ROM combinations used on AS2518-17 MPU Modules in games prior to Lost World.

As stated above, the jumper requirements change when using a new style or AS2518-35 Module in one of these games. A jumper is a soldered wire between the two connections which are labeled on the faces of these boards.

Now, let's take a look at Table II which gives us the I.C. combinations and jumper requirements. Compare Table I to Table II.

Taking the opposite view — that is, using an old style or AS2518-17 MPU Module in a later game — Lost World or the Six Million Dollar Man is not quite as easy a procedure.

There are certain modifications that need to be made for adaptability. First, however, let's look at Table II, the IC Combinations for these games, using the new style module AS2518-35.

The first thing to be discussed is how to use, say, a Night Rider MPU Module in a Six Million Dollar Man. This is in reference to using an old style or AS2518-17 MPU in a later model game which requires the base module to be an AS2518-35.

The AS2518-17 Module can be converted for use as an AS2518-35. In order to make this conversion, order Bally Kit #523 from a Bally distributor. This kit includes the following:

This conversion will give you the ability to use it in the later games.

After the conversions are made, this module will be labeled with one of the labels in the kit as 'AS2518-17, modified per F.O. 597.

This module still has the ability to be used in prior games which exclusively used the AS2518-17 Module and the later games using the later module, AS2518-35

The only things that have to be watched now are the memory combinations and jumper requirements which change for the games that initially had this MPU. Let's now refer to Table Iv, Memory Combinations and Jumpers, for use with MPU AS2518-17, modified per F.O. 597

The changes sound more complicated than they are in actuality. The main thing that becomes more important than before is taking special notice of the jumper combinations

in referring back to Table I, most of the jumpers were the same between modules and many times, during module replacement, a person did not even look and just changed the ROM packages successfully.

The ROM or personality IC Combinations will continue to be published for both (continued from page C-24)



style modules AS2518-17 and AS2518-35, as new games are produced.

With the inclusion of an additional module, the sound module, there are some other ramifications affecting the testing procedures. Refer to Figure 1 which shows the power distribution for a flipper with electronic sounds. This easily illustrates that there is an additional module (A8) that will also now be included during the diagnostic tests.


The self-diagnostic tests are approached in the same manner as prior games. Power-on sequences the MPU module until MPU operating condition is successfully obtained. Then, by the use of the self-test button located inside the front door of the game, the following diagnostic routine takes place.

- Pressing the self-test button the first time cycles the switched lamps to flash on and off continuously.
 Pressing the self-test button the
- Pressing the self-test button the second time cycles each digit on each display from 0 thru 9.
- The next press of the button cycles the solenoids individually. This depicts an identification number on each display as the solenoid is energized.
- Pressing the self-test button again causes the MPU to energize the sound module. A tune will be played repeatedly.
- 5. The last self-test causes the MPU to search each switch assembly for stuck or closed contacts. An identification number would be displayed on each display if the search encounters a stuck switch

As can be seen, the only significant change is the inclusion of the sound module during the self-test sequence.

The next change evolves around the field test unit Kit #485. Kit 485 consists of two (2) Aid Units that are used in conjunction with the MPU. The Aid Units have been changed to accommodate the additional modules. The kit number had changed to Kit 485-1. These changes can be made to existing Aid Kits.

Kit 485 is good for games from Freedom through Strikes and Spares — those



without sound modules. Kit 485-1 is good for all games, Freedom through the Six Million Dollar Man and future games.

To update the Aid 1 Module, replace intregated circuit U1, E-720-14 with E-720-31. E-720-14 is a plug-in ROM. The new E-720-31 ROM is available through a Bally distributor.

The other change is to the Aid 2 Module. This change includes the addition of 1.25 Ohms, 1/4W resistor, and the drilling of four holes. Refer to Figure 2 which gives a visual depiction of the change to Aid 2.

Bee Gees Named Top Artist

the country 14 years ago.

It was a coup for the Brothers Gibb. In less than six months of its release, in November 1977, "Saturday Night Fever' had erased all previous record-holders as the biggest grossing album in the history of the recording industry.

At one point in February 1978, the album sustained peak sales of one million units in successive weeks. During the same period, the Bee Gees had written or produced five singles in the Top 5, and "Night Fever," released on the tail of "How Deep Is Your and "Stayin' Alive," became their third No. 1 single in succession, a feat which had only been achieved once before in the seventies. Added to their previous number ones in the seventies, the Bee Gees total jumped to six, tying yet another record for the most No. 1 singles in the past decade. They also had the No. 1 and No. 2 singles ("Night Fever" and "Stayin' Alive") in the same week, marking the first time it has been done since the Beatles did it in 1964.

Younger brother Andy's "Love Is Thicker Than Water," written by Barry and Andy Gibb, and co-produced by Barry Gibb, Albhy Galuten, and Karl Richardson, also became a No. 1. In addition, other Bee Gees songs and artists featured on the album were also affected by the fever. Their tunes (written by Barry, Robin and Maurice, and produced by Freddie Perren), "If I Can't Have You," performed by Yvonne Elliman, and "More Than A Woman," performed by Tavares, scored high in the charts.

The Bee Gees had become the No. 1 musical act in the world, leveling a final and decisive blow to any speculation that their future was in jeopardy. More important, the Bee Gees had conquered their own internal strife. They became pacesetters and shining symbols of what it takes to survive: determination, flexibility, raw talent, and creativity.

They first learned the essence of survival as youngsters in Brisbane, Australia, where their father, Hugh, a bandleader, took his five children in the fifties to escape the grimness of post-war England. Coached by their father, they first started singing at Ovals (speedway stadiums) in Australia, and in 1958 Barry, the eldest, and Robin and Maurice, non-identical twins, were christened The Bee Gees.

"Bee Gees First," their debut album gave the brothers their first potion of stardom before Barry had reached age 20. One of their first major tours featured a concert at

London's Royal Albert Hall. Still teenagers, the Bee Gees were augmented by a 60piece orchestra, a huge choir, and the Royal Air Force Brass Band. Their second album, "Horizontal," and third, "idea," hit big in America, and singles like "Massachusetts," "I've Gotta Get A Message To You," and "I Started A Joke" found their way to the Top 10, to sustain the momentum.

The sixties were crazy days, and the Bee Gees, caught amidst the craziness and their meteoric rise to stardom, broke up early in 1969. Barry and Maurice continued to record together, while Robin pursued a

In late 1970 they rejoined, and the Bee Gees' second phase kicked off with their No. 3 hit, "Lonely Days." A string of others followed: "How Can You Mend A Broken Heart," "Don't Want To Live Inside Myself,"
"My World," and "Run To Me." "Two Years On" and "Trafalgar" followed as successful albums, but it wasn't until they teamed with ace producer Arif Martin that the Bee Gees really took off once again. With a fresh R&B twist to their music, their albums "Mr. Natural" and "Main Course" opened new horizons and proved that the Bee Gees were on their way to the top again. Their self-produced "Children Of The World" album finally revealed a well-defined Bee Gees style, and the most powerful and memorable sound thus far in the 70s.

Says Barry, "We've been through all the stages, struggling and then hitting it big. We've split and reformed, had number ones and toured the world. We're proud of the music we've created, and we hope to keep on doing it.

"We've all got the same brain wave now," Robin explains. Says Maurice, "Our music has always been based around melodies classical pop.' It's our songwriting that has kept us going, and in a sense we were the first group to use an orchestra on record, with bass and drums, to fit in rhythmically.'

The Bee Gees' influence on the world of music has been remarkable. No other three voices harmonize with the distinguishing qualities of the Brothers Gibb, and their songs possess that delicate lyrical and musical balance that makes them timeless and precious gems. They have been survivors and purveyors, and one can't help but believe that the "Bee Gees Fever of 1978" could well be the fever of '79, '80, '81, and of many, many years to come.



If implemented, the plan would allow consumers to purchase Canadian albums with used Wintario lottery tickets, each of which would be worth 50 cents for a maximum two dollar discount towards LPs retailing over three dollars.

The government proposal still being deliberated by the provincial cabinet could take effect by January 1979, said Reuben Baetz, the minister in charge of overseeing the operation of the Wintario lottery draw.

The draw, which takes place every other week, has historically used its profits for

CBS Canada Displays Strong Sales Increase

TORONTO - CBS Records Canada enjoyed a third quarter consolidated sales increase of 30.1% over a similar period in 1977, and an overall 28% increase in comparison with the 1977 company fiscal year, according to Arnold Gosewich, chairman and chief executive officer of the label.

"The so-called 'third-quarter doldrums' were not in evidence at CBS Records Distribution (up 44%), All Records Supply (the company's rack-jobbing outlet, up 16%), A & A's(the company's retail franchise chain, up 38%) or Custom Factory Sales(up 29%)," Gosewich said. "What is particularly gratifying is that strong sales results have occurred within every major profit center of CBS Canada."

Despite an ongoing cost increase, Gosewich noted that record sales for the company continued to grow. The firm has had a total of 56 gold and platinum record awards from January to September of this year, an increase of 57% over 1977

In addition, it has been allowing ticket purchasers to partake in its "half-back" program, which allows them to use their old one-dollar lottery tickets as fifty-cent vouchers towards the purchase of Canadian books and magazines. Since the half-back program took effect last year, Canadian book sales have risen by one-third in the province.

"No matter how you look at it," says Brian Robertson, president of the Canadian Recording Industry Association, "it will benefit the Canadian music business. It is going to encourage people to listen to more bands here, and give us a competitive edge over records from competing countries."

The Wintario half-back program is also going to be extended to Canadian movies. and is likely to also be used in the theatre industry by mid-1979.

All of the industry personnel surveyed by Cash Box hailed the government's proposal as "extremely beneficial" to the growth and development of the music business in Canada. Ross Reynolds, executive vice president of WEA Music Canada Ltd., said the move will "be an immense help to the promotion of Canadian music in this province. I expect that more Canadian albums will go gold and platinum as a result."

Need Clarification

Retailers are indicating that they will not increase their prices to reap rewards from the new plan. But as a spokesman for A & A's retail chain said, "We're going to have to have more clarification as to what exactly constitutes a Canadian record. Likely we'll also have to attach "CanCon" stickers to the right discs so both consumers and retailers know what disc qualifies under the program.

Wintario is also attempting to put money directly into the pockets of upstart Canadian music groups, by sponsoring crossprovincial tours for them, although their efforts have been received reluctantly by the Canadian music industry. As one spokesman for GRT Records put it,"a government body should only go so far in the interference of an artist's career.

Virgin Signs Publ. Pact

LONDON - Virgin Music has signed an agreement with Shelter Records publishing companies for UK representation. The Shelter roster includes such artists as Tom Petty, JJ Cale, Phoebe Snow, as well as song titles by Peter Tosh, Bunny Wailer and Leon Russell. The deal was secured for Virgin by Carol Wilson and for the Shelter group by Don Williams. Virgin's first aim will be to place some unrecorded Tom Petty songs with several major British artists.

CHUM Will Broadcast 10 Concerts In TV-FM Simulcast By Oct. 1979

TORONTO - As part of its agreement with the CRTC when it purchased CITY-TV in Toronto, CHUM Limited announced it will broadcast 10 concerts with television-FM radio simulcasting by Oct. 31, 1979.

The first of 10 shows will be a Murray MacLauchian concert from the El Mocambo club Nov. 4 at 11:00 p.m., Eastern time. CHUM-FM program director Warren Cosford stated that the concerts, featuring Canadian talent exclusively in its initial stages, will be held at intervals of one month over the next year.

Moses Znaimer, president of CITY-TV, said at a press gathering at the El Mocambo Oct. 19, that he envisions the broadcasts as "a potentially enormous step in the right direction for the music and television business" towards the alignment of rock and television industries in this country, "Television has done a bad job in trying to capture the essence of a rock performance in this country. We want to develop this program into a state-of-the-art presentation utilizing the highest standards

It is felt that CITY-TV will likely attempt to syndicate the live broadcasts to other markets. "We are going to spend large sums of money in presenting these performances," Znaimer told Cash Box. "We will have a two-day set-up time, and will be using over 60 people in the presentation. While we will keep the show to CITY-TV initially, we hope that it will be a worthy syndication product before too long.

The program will help fill a void in Canadian television, which has historically snubbed rock music to a large degree. While pop stars Patsy Gallant and Rene Simard have successful network shows, the music presentations have not been realistic rock performances. "We don't think that we'll be interfering at all in the musical performance," says Znaimer, who added that commercial interruptions will be minimal throughout the one-hour show.

Cosford intimated that the program will also expand its perimeters by late 1979, and feature international performers. "We've already had inquiries from two big-name American artists for such a program," he

CBS/True North national publicity director Joe Owens, the label for which Murray MacLauchlan records in Canada, said that the label was proud to be a part of the first of many such simulcast performances.

Polydor Records-UK Merges Two Depts.

LONDON - Polydor Records-England has merged its existing promotion division with an overseas exploitation division to form a new unit, according to A.J. Morris, Polydor managing director.

The new division will be headed by Tony Bramwell, who has previously been working as an independent promotion man for Polydor for the past seven years. His function will now be full-time. Deputy head of promotion goes to Adrian Rudge, who is currently overseas exploitation manager. Rudge will maintain his overseas responsibilities, but will merge his activities into the new division.

Other members of the new promotion division include John Howson, Bob White, Chris Withers-Green, Joe Reddington, Theo Loyla, disco promotion, and Maurice Gallagher, artist liaison manager.


