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

Many Attribute Increased Collection Averages to Warmer Weather. Foresee New Equipment Helping **Boost Averages to Even Greater Highs** to

NEW YORK-Good news hits the trade this week with reports from leading coinment all over the nation advising that collection averages are going up and that they foresee the end of the bad weather when averages were down to lows never before experienced by the industry

From every section of the nation oper-

ators reported that, with the return of warm weather, they ahve experienced a definite upswing in collections. As one noted operator of music and games, as well as cigarette machines, stated, "This is the first time, in months, that we can truthfully report an up-swing and one that is continuing upswing and one that is continuing up-ward."

He also said, "For a while we had some good collection weeks, but, on the average, they were very poor. These past weeks, as the weather warmed up and the snow began to disannear, and people again began to circulate around, we found that the collections from our machines had boomed right up again.

"They may not yet be considered nor-mal", he continued, "but, we can safely state, they are already very close to what we like to believe is normal, and we therefore feel that, with the new equipment which we are buving and which has already proved itself, we are going to see even better collections as the warmer weeks come in."

This same statement can be attributed to almost everyone of the coinmen questioned. Each expressed the belief that with the manufacturers turning out good equipment that they can expect to see some of the best collection averages during this Spring and forthcoming Summer.

One op even went to the extent of say-ing, "There is no longer any doubt now that the poor avearges we had this past winter can be attributed to the cold weather we had almost everywhere in this area. It was so bad at times that peo-ple just wouldn't leave their homes."

"And, in addition," he stated, "many of the plants here closed because of lack of fuel for heating purposes. All this hit us very hard. But, now we are again enjoying good averages and, it seems to me, we are on the way to even better collections as people begin to realize the bad spell is finished. Just like my own family they sure want to get around once again."

Most heartening is the fact that locations, which had never before figured as "top spots", were now coming thru with better collections than they formerly ever did

Whereas many of the larger industrial plants had fallen off, especially where the merchandise machine ops are concerned, other locations had picked up, and these seem to have balanced off any industrial spot loss to bring back normal collection returns.

One well known game and music op, who also operates cigarette, drink ven-

dors and candy machines, reported, "Because the factories we have are working so spasmodically these days, we find that our overages in these spots, which used to be our best locations, especially during the war, have fallen off.

"But", he continues, "this is balanced off by the fact that our other merchandise machine locations have picked up and to

such an extent that we are enjoying a better average all around. "Of course", he also says, "we have raised our candy, cigarette and drink prices."

From this survyey it can be reported that the games field continues to lead. Amusement machine ops are reporting best returns so far. Merchandise and music equipment coinmen are next in line

It is believed, tho, that the music machines will outdistance the merchandisers as the warme rweather continues. Most of the music men have completely covered all resort spots, some even allowing eqquipment to remain over the winter months to hold good spots.

On the average, tho, this news is the most heartening which has reached the trade in many months, and the further fact that the operators believe in the new equipment of the manufacturers to help boom their averages even higher, is a sure sign of a real business revival for the entire industry.

PROS AND CONS OF Background Music

CONS: Wires Still Hard to Obtain and More Expensive. Most Good Industrial Locations Already Covered. Many Professional and Retail Spots Holding Back Until Return of Better Business. Existing Contracts Must be Terminated with Ops in Financial Position to Wait for Termination. Small Towns Found Economically Impractical.

PROS: Music Ops in Position to Quote Lower Rates for Same Service and Operate with Lower Overhead. Understanding of Type Music Community Likes by Present Ops Invaluable Aid. Allows Ops to Obtain All Possible Locations Within Present Operating Area. Assures Ops Definite Income. Ops Can Use Present Mechanisms Plus Knowledge of Single Channel Music to Advantage. Most Systems Fully Automatic.

NEW YORK—The Cash Box was first to point the way to many of the nation's juke bov ops that there were moneymaking opportunities in single channel wired music for industrial, professional and retail iocations, with the result that some of the country's music ops immediately adopted the suggestion and have made this a very definite part of their business.

Once again, in the March 6, 1948 issue of *The Cash Box*, there appeared an editorial on this sort of music quoting the experiences of some of the ops who had entered into it. This attracted much attention and has, since then, practically flooded the offices of this publication with inquiries as to the means, methods, whys and wherefores of background music.

The result is that *The Cash Box* in this issue publishes some of the outstanding "psos" and "cons" of those opertors who have, or who are in, background music commercially. These men have already made many installations. Some have found this type of musii profitable, and others do not believe that it ran beiome a business by itself, at least as far as the roin operated musir machine operator is concerned.

The most outstanding part of single channel wired mhsic is the fact that the operators already have experience with it, from their wide dse of non-selective

mhsic boxes. It is practically the very same system, but, becomes fully automatic because of the units now available and therefore eases the pressure of hiring more employees.

This is not double channel music where an operator is needed in a studio to answer the call, on what is known today as wired telephone music It is simply sending a one way wire into a location at a specified monthly charge, and on contract for anywhere from one to three or more years, with eqquipment which can be installed in any music ops' headquarters.

But, it does require fine music. It also reqquires a deep knowledge of programming hsually the operators in any territory know what the public likes, as far as music is concerned. Therefore, they already have a head start. Now they must study the requirements of industrial music that will give employees a "lift" to pep them up at certain hours of the day and increase productiveness.

The "cons" have much against installation today. They claim wires are too expensive and too difficult to obtain. They also claim that most of the good industrial spots are already covered and because many factories are no longer on definite production schedules it is much more difficult to "sell" such a system.

As far as professional (doctors, dentists, etc.) are concerned, and retail background (banks, beauty shops, restaurants, etc) these are holding back from paying a monthly fee for music until business becomes better.

Then, of course, they point to those organizations who already have their systems in these places and the fact that, even tho they can sign the owners to contracts, they must have the finance to wait for the termination of the present contract before they can start to operate.

Another factor is that the smaller towns, where there aren't many factories and professional and retail locations concerned, that do not already have automatic music, these are economically impractical. The installation of units and the cost of continuance and maintenance is far and above whatever income can be enjoyed.

The answer, then, to the value of single channel wired background music, whether for industrial, professional or retail locations, is for the individual operator who is planning to enhance his present operation with such music, so as to obtain a definite monthly sum for the knowledge of music he already ha sgained in the juke box field, to carefully study this music in relation to his own operation and his own territory and decide whether he can make such a system an integral and profitable part of his present music operation.

Pair of sides that shine brightly for music ops as well as rave fave Cliffic Stone are these offered in exceptional fashion. We go for the top deck, with Cliffie giving with some excellent vocal treatment all thru. Instrumental work displayed here equals to hypo the wax. Flip shows as effective and might do the trick to. Lend an ear and spin 'em.

"Betty Ann" "My Bank Accoutn Is Gone" Jesse Ashlock (Columbia 38114)

More nelody for the crowd that goes for folk music and able Jesse Ashlock to render the rhythm. Both sides are suited for the dance and listener crowd alike, with the top side getting the spotlight. Fiddles spark the disk all the **ray** while a bright vocal spot comes in for

some well needed filling. Flip parrots the title and might find coin. The pair is there - you take it. Bear in mind the artists popularity - it should add to the disks potential coin culling powers. Page 10



Annisteen Allen chirps pretty on the flip to offer a pleasing piece for the crowd that lovesto jump. Grab the top deck!

"GOOD ROCKING TONIGHT" "GOOD MORNING MR. BLUES" Wynonie Harris Orch. (King 4210)

Pair of favorable sides by Wynonie "Blues" Harris and some stuff tailor made for the hep crowd. Top deck is currently kicking up a big storm and should meet with fair approval. Flip, with Wynonie on top to wail the vocal chorus shows as some stock race material, done brown with loads of holler and riff.....Familiar sax tones spill throughout the wax. The many Harris fans should go for the duo.

"MEM'RIES OF MINE" "THE GIRL WITH THE LITTLE RED CROSS" Bob Stewart (Headline 113)

A top notch ballad by newcomer Bob Stewart and the spark of a dark horse that should go like sixty. The moving, melodramatic style Bob utilizes should spike the demand here. Bob's soft plush delivery rates heavy attention all 'round. On the flip with a piece of onion material, the piper comes back for another first rate rendition of a fairish tune. Top notch orchestral work by maestro Bill Bruno spikes both sides and lends the wax hypo. "Mem'ries Of Mine"is the side that will get a slew of calls - rush out and latch one.

"WHOSE HAT IS THAT" "LONG 'BOUT MIDNIGHT" Roy Brown (DeLuxe 1154)

More meat for ops with race spots and the terrific and torrid tones of the hep Roy Brown crew. The wax, titled "Whose Hat Is That" & "Long 'Bout Midnight" should find Roy's many fans going wild with joy once they get an earful. Top deck is loaded with all the riff andholler one can possibly offer, with Roy wailing in full voice throughout.Flip is a switch to slow tempo with thetitle of the ditty offering the bill of fare. Both sides of the wax rate heavily-whirl the pair for a harvest of buffalo heads in the phonos

"MAKING WHOOPEE" "DO IT AGAIN" Mel Torme (Musicraft 534)

Soft and intimate setting of a pair of oldies with Mel Torme to render the vocal refrain. It's one of the better Torme disks to date and a pair of tunes that always drew sighs.Back ing by the Ted Dale ork.... is both fond and enchanting Torme's wide following will account for loads of demand with this pair. "ENCORE CHERIE" "SATURDAY DATE" Tex Beneke Orch. (Victor 20-2770)



Top deck "Encore Cherie" features balladeer Garry Stevens in delicate mood tainted with a French setting. Wax is extremely pleasing as it stands and should be greeted with favor. Flip shows as a playful ditty with maestro Tex spilling the cute lyrics. Loads of beat are offered here with the band rounding out the side. The platter rates a spot on your phono.

The recent formation of a record distributors group by a large majority of New York disk distribs is prompting others in the disk industry to investigate the basic plan...the increase of dealers who are not maintaining the best possible credit stan ding is rumoted to be a major reason behind much of the current activity .. the current slump in all of the disk industry has many indie manufacturers and distributors morethan just "worried"....a large portion of diskers are now shipping disks only when they are assured prompt payment. Businessmen who are involved are at a loss to ascertain the decided drop in business. As al-ways, diskers are turnig to the music operator, to boom disks via the big promotional value derived from the phonos.

Top deck is some heavily laden blues weaving thruout the wax in slow time, with the vocal spot round all the way. Tibbs gives with loads of tricks that echoes beautifully. Flip shows with the metro at a faster pace, with the ork chiming in for a vibrant spot. Both sides should draw loads of coin altho the top deck shines very brightly.

"Free Lancin' Again" "Groovie Movie Blues" Johnnie Moore (Exclusive 265)

Another potential strong item for phono ops with this bit by Johnny Moore and His Three Blazersand fashionable piece it is. Charles Brown grabs the vocal spotlight with the topside tune, to come thru in a big way. It's more mellow melody done up in light tempo, with the instrumental work as it stands, very fashionable. Backside parrots the top deck as the title offers the bill thruout. Both sides deserve your avid listening time.

"Trouble Is A Man" "Oooh Wee" Martha Davis (Decca 24383)

Torchy chirping of chirp Martha Davis should make for loads of jitney in a slew of machines. Gal's piping is nothing short of sensational on the oh so pretty "Trouble Is A Man". Utilizing a hatful of tricks in her delivery, she sends torrid music at you. Grab the title for the flip. It's the top deck they'll run for - whirl it.

Les Elgart This bit is tailor made for the phonos! It's anotheryes one more-smash platter for Bullet and a sure fire stepping stone for maestro Les Elgart. Ditty, titled "Doodle Doo Doo" is a cinch to score with the youngster set. Feauting a vocal combination hailed the Uptowners, the group get together for some exquisite moments of scintillating harmonious music. Of course its all in the title - with Les and his boys rounding out the side in grade A manner. "ax will have young and old alike in a frenzy - that is the extent of its beauty. Flip is an-time its Hartford. Wax is attractive as it stands and should meet with fair favor. Top deck will literally eat up all the moola-snatch it.

> "Love Is Fun" "Shine" The Mills Bros. (Decca 24382)

Pair of attractive sides by the Mills Bros. spill here with the melody ringing out true throughout. Topside is sure to grab off a load of coin the harmony work is really superb. Wax is light and airy, with the entire group singing brightly. Flip is well known to music ops and as offered on this bit of wax, should meet with its market. We go for the top side-we're sure you'll like it too.

"It's The Sentimental Thing To Do" "Like We Used To Do" Vaughn Monroe Orch. (Victor 20-2748)

Pair of attratictive sides by maestro Vaughn Monroe spill here, with the sweet offering echoing fondly of potential coin play. Ops should go for the refrain of the topside tune as the maestro teams with the Moon Maids to set up a cutie. Wax is loaded with soft, sentimental misic flavored by a ton of reed and string music throughout. Flip is another soft light setting with the same combo coming back for another set. We go for the top deck - it's easy on the ears.

"Shasta" "I Ain't Got Nobody" Little Willie Jackson (Modern 20-571)

Another hunk of wax for ops with race spots with hep Little Willie Jackson serving up some mellow music. ^Both sides are offered in adequate manner with a ton of haunting sax rhythms filling thruout the wax. Top side spills in slow tempo, while the flip, an oldie gives with a fond vocal spot. The pair is there for the asking - you take it from here.

"The One I Love" "What A Diff'rence A Day Makes" Sarah Vaughn (Musicraft 552)


Fancy vocal styling of chirp Sarah Vaughn sets the pace for this pair of oldies here. Offering the favorite "The One I Love" and "What A Diff 'rence A Day Makes", Sarah displays her versatile styling on the pair by utilizing a bagful of tricks and quiver in her pipes. DISK DISTRIBS FEEL BITE AS OPS REFUSE TO BUY POOR QUALITY RECORDS

NEW YORK - A recent survey made among several leading record distributors in the east vividly points out that a large majority of music operators, as a unit, are not buying records for the simple reason that the purchase of an order, will in the long run, mean higher operating expenses.

In plain everyday languague it means that the ops are "fed up" with poor and even "chalk" records.

A recent smash hit by an indie recording, proved in the long run, to be more costly to the music operator than if he had no hit to work on. Altho he received a great many calls and a heavy demand for the record the fact that the disk did not stand up, coupled with that same heavy demand, forced him (the operator) to spend much more than the meager profit the record would have allowed him.

Operators have been, as of late, taking those same poorly pressed records and turning them back into the distributor. The disk distrib, in order to keep the good will and faith of the music op, in the line he carried, had to make good to the op and substitute a like number of recordings.

When the record distribs asked the manufacturer to make good for the records he had taken in on a returnbasis, the diskery refused.

Altho the above points to only one record manufacturer; it is a simile that is happening each and every day.

One well noted music op stated when queried as to the quality of disks, "I absolutely refuse to buy a single record, until and unless I can be guaranteed in nickels, the purchase price of a recording.

"This situation", he continued, "does not only hold true to the indie disk



company - it is just as true of the majors. I've bought records in the past that didn't give me as much as five lusy plays. It costs me more than 49¢ to run over to a location, and make a record change especially so when I haven't even received 10 plays or the equivalent of the price I pay for records."

"If the buying public, the Johnny Q. Public disk fan knew that the records he bought would not even give him twenty plays, let alone the supposed fifty and hundred plays, he would not buy records."

The survey conclusively proves that a great majority of record manufacturers are in business just for the ride, and how much they can get out of **it**.


Were a diskery firmly interested in their organization, he (the record manufacturer) would not be as haphazard as they are about the quality of their records.

Consensus of opinion among record distribs and juke box operators seens to be that many record makers will soon find themselves out of business. Distribs indicate that they will not hesitate to drop lines and discourage record buyers from patronizing those lines that continue to issue poor records.

Dince disk distribution is the primer and alphabet in the success of any disk company, many will find that not only are they losing prestige, but they are losing business as well

Distributors are quick to realize the many problens confronting the music operator today, and also realize that the music op represents more than 30% of his total sales potential, and are therefore putting pressure upon their record label offials.

With operating costs more than double what it was in pre-war years, or during the war years themselves, music ops must secure a better quality recording.

The the plattery's gross was higher than that of '46 - their net was lower. Decca clipped the mark at \$32,508,700, a figure which surpassed by more than 2 million their previous high. Decca's net this past year was put at \$1,618,550 - a loss of over 300,000 dollars from last year.

While those not connected with the Decca organization might possibly view the figure with a smile of fespect, Decca salesmen and other employees who total up sales continued to have the general blues existing among all diskers today. MGM alone is said to be be in an envious position by following up with consecutive hits.

Majestic Halts Newark Pressing

NEW YORK - Majestic Records last week halted the pressing of disks in its Newark plant for reasons said to be centering around the idea that distributors and dealers were not exhibiting any anxiety to pay for them under the theroy that the company was deeply involved in the Chandler Act, and since they were, they (the dealers and distribs) would not pay unless forced to do so.


Rumors continue to persist that offers have and are being made to buy the firm.

Existing trade reports point out that there is an alleged plan afoot by Decca Records to purchase the plattery and all its assets, principally consisting of their Newark & Elgin, Ill., pressing plants and their artistss contracts. Among the big name talent is Eddy Howard, a piece of property who would undoubtedly hypo the sales of any plattery.

This is the first inrod that DeLuxe is making in this territory, generally considered by most indies as "poor" selling market.


DeLuxe never ventured into this territory before becasue they felt that the majority of their records did not contain enough variety to satisfy the taste of the buying public.

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

NEW YORK - George Seedman, secretary and director of Rowe Corporation, this city, was elected Chairman of Region 2 of the National Automatic Merchandisers Association at their annual meeting held at the Hotel Commodore. Frank J. Bradley of Automatic Equipment Company, the outgoing chairman, had served the organization for the past two years.

More than 60 merchandise machine operators, manufacturers and suppliers were on hand, and heard NAMA officials report on activities of the association, and later engaged in several open round table discussions on the various phases of the business.

George Pratt, vice president of Automatic Canteen Co. and chairman of NAMA's national legislative committee, stressed the importance of keeping close watch on proposed legislation, which he states is the heart of the business. He claims that it was largely due to the action of NAMA that the recently passed "enabling act" by the New York Legislature, didn't include vendors in the bill which permits the various cities to legislate a \$25 per year tax on coin operated equipment. Pratt urged merchandise vendors to report any tax threats to the national committee immediately so that they can take the correct means to combat it.

Fred Brandstrader, NAMA legislative councel, also spoke on tax matters, and he too, cautioned members to report to the national body on any proposed taxation level-

ed at the merchandise machine operator.

Howard Olsen, NAMA membership director, pointed out that the activities of the national organization is to aid individuals ops to conduct a profitable business. He presented NAMA "uniform operator accounting program that is planned to standard ize accounting procedures applicable to operators.... Olsen then spoke of thework of the insurance committee, that is headed by Aaron Gol dman of the G.B.Macke Corporation, Washington. He also outlined the progress of the traffic committee which is now working to decrease the freight rates.

W.G.Fitzgerald, president of International Ticket Com pany informed the gathering that the 1948 NAMA meeting will be held at the Palmer House, Chicago, on December 12 to 15th.He stated that the '47 meeting at the Palmer House was "a milestone in the history of antomatic merchandising" and predicted that the next 1948 convention would be greater than ever. He urged all members to be sure to attend.

CHICAGO -United States Vendannounced ing Corporation this week the addition of two well known coinmen to their executive force.

Joe Stella, formerly with Mills Industries, Inc. as assistant sales manager of the music division, will head the service department.

Henry T. Roberts of USVA stated that the addition of these two experienced coinmen is in keeping with the policy of the firm to bring into its fold coimmon with long experience in the field.

The firm is now ship ing its new air-conditioned candy vendor to its 18 distributors.

CIG VENDORS IN PRODUCTION

NEW YORK - News reports have been received from two manufacturers to the effect that their new cigarette machines are now in production and that the vending machine mer chants can soon expect to re ceive delivery.

From St.Louis, Mo., Ben W. Fry, president of National Vendors, Inc.announced that production was under way on their new 9E-C console model cigarette machine. This is the new merchandiser National Vendors, Inc. displayed at the NAMA show in the Palmer House, Chicago.

Capacity of the cigarette merchandiser is reported to be approximately 675 packs. The machine displays actual packs of cigarettes. This machine also features an automatic change maker which is self replenishing.If will reject a coin if the proper change is not in the changemaker at the time.

From Los Angeles, Calif., Bernie Shapiro, Adams-Fairfax Corp.announced that production had started on their cigarette merchandiser. This machine clicked with all who saw it at the past NAMAshow. It appealed to a great many automatic merchants due to the fact that it was suitable to a tremendous number of lo cations whete cigarette mer chandisers are not being fea tured at this time.

Furthermore, the Adams-Fair fax A-F cigarette machine is low priced. The machine features five columns and a cap acity of 140 packs.Weighs 37 lbs. The machine is 23 inchs high, 23 inches wide and 8in ches deep. Stand is 36 inchs high. The complete machine with stand weighs 63 pounds. It operates on 2 dimes and is loaded from the front.

News of these machines entering into production heartened automatic merchants this past week. It meant cig arette machine men claim, the field was getting under way again. Other manufacturers are expected to announce pro duction schedules very soon.




