

DIME PLAY VS NICKEL PLAY

Controversy regarding whether ops should switch over to dime play, or continue on nickel play, waxes stronger each day.

This same situation came about immediately after World War H. Some of the jake box manufacturers went all out for dime play, others sat by silently waiting to see what would happen, but, at the same time, preparing their phonos so that dime play could be used. One manufacturer went all out against dime play.

This latter manufacturer won out. The there were many surrounding factors at the time that played in his favor. The most important, that the war was over, and people were supposed to again return to normal.

The first proposal for dime play was a suggestion of *The Cash Box* over eight years ago. This was during World War 1I.

Prices of everything were somewhere up in the blue sky, and going higher every day. Operators were having their hands full trying to keep step with tremendously rising overhead expenses and general costs.

The Cash Box, during that period, and while the public was extremely liberal with its coin, foresaw an opportunity for the jnke boxes to swing to dime play and urged that the trade change over, while the changing over was good, so that dime play would come into being for the years after the war when, The Cash Box predicted, costs of equipment and general overhead expense would be greater than the industry had ever before known.

All this has come about. Costs have risen far over 150% as far as cost of equipment is concerned. All other overhead costs and expenses have risen anywhere from 100% to far over 200% and, in a few cases, some expenses have risen over 300%.

By the end of 1950, as war began to become more imminent with the Korean incident assuming ever larger and more frightening proportions, many in the field began to clamor for a change to 10° play, for music and amusement.

This clamor continued until some of the leading operators' associations decided to place the matter to vote. Many then jumped to 2 plays 10¢ and 5 or 6 plays 25¢.

But, even this speed-up music merchandising

method, didn't seem to be able to take care of the additional coin needed to continue in business on a profitable basis.

Since then, there have been many who called for straight out-and-out dime play. Some of the music and amusement ops adopted this type play and reported their findings. Many of these have been published here in *The Cash Box* in the past months,

The most outstanding swing to dime play, of course, as far as the music field is concerned, was that of the Recorded Music Service Association of Chicago on April 4. This is the music operators organization of that city.

At a packed meeting the operators (73 of them) vo.ed manimously the evening of April 4 to change their machines over to 1 play 100 and 3 plays for 250.

Of course, as is understood, there will always be a few spots where this won't happen. As well as spots which will, in all probabilities, demand that their music machines either remain at 50 per play or have them removed.

These Chicago operators realized all this even before they cast their votes. 71 of the 73 present voted for 1 play 100 and 3 plays for 25¢. The other two abstained from voting.

Since then, The Cash Box reported (April 21, 1951 issue) some who were against this change, but, who at this meeting hadn't so stated, or, perhaps, hadn't even attended.

Dime play versus nickel play is now starting on its way down the home stretch. There will be much close attention paid to what happens in the midwestern metropolis of Chicago. Many ops who have, for a long time, advocated such change, will be carefully watching results.

There is no doubt that television has ent deep into jnke box income. This fact had to be over-

Another important factor is that, today, the new juke boxes, offering from 40 to 100 selections, are giving the public greater and more varied selectivity of the music the public wants and likes and can, because of this fact, ask for more coin.

Still mother important factor is that the telephone companies everywhere in the untion are switching their coin operated pay phones from 5° to 100 and have found, even the the phone is considered a necessity, many believed that those "extra, nunecessary" phone calls would be eliminated.

It has been proved that the public will insert as many (and in some cities even more) dimes than nickels.

There is no doubt that juke box music is not a necessity. But, as one well known music leader stated, "It does become a necessity to whorver goes into a tavern and intends to spend sometime there."

At the same time the operator's peak play time bas been cut down considerably by TV. Where some enjoyed three hours of continuous play, usually from seven until ten in the evening, this has now been cut down to one hour and, in most cases, much less time than that.

The operator is being forced to do whatever he thinks is best, to get as much as he can, during the small peaktime play that is left to him on his locations.

The location owners, after a discussion with many Chicago music ops regarding the changeover to 10c play, have agreed that they, too, want to earn more from their music machines. So, in most cases, the location owners are cooperating with the juke box ops.

Whether this change to dime play for juke boxes will also cause a change to dime play for five-ball games, isn't as yet predictable.

Some pinball ops are already on dime play. Others are holding off. The majority agree that the shuffle and rebound games can obtain a dime.

There is no reason then, some state, while the average pinball game can't also obtain a dime for each play. It certainly is much easier to adjust pinball to dime play.

In the meantime, the controversy, as to whether there should be a changeover to all-out straight dime play, as against present nickel play action, continues at a hot and heavy pace,

It is believed that if the Chicago music operators' experiment proves itself successful that the untion's large cities will follow suit, and that they will drag along with them a great number of the smaller cities and towns thruout the nation to also adopt dime play.

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Time Grows Short

Announcement by The National Production Authority that the long-heralded CMP (Controlled Materials Plan) would go into effect for the third quarter of 1951, beginning July 1, has shortened time considerably for this, and many other, industries.

The fact now remains that, beginning on July 1, 1951, the larger industrialists of the nation, the prime contractors for the defense work now being rushed out in billions of dollars by Government agencies, will have priorities to the three basic metals: copper, steel and aluminum. They will, in turn, so arrange their priority quotas that they will include their sub-contractors.

Whatever copper, steel and aluminum is then left, after these giant industrialists have taken their bite, will be pooled for all other industries.

This still does not mean that these industries can rush to their suppliers and grab what's left. They will be given a chance to scramble with all others for whatever their quota share amounts to of the metals left.

In short, there's going to be a real scramble, if ever there was one before. The few tons of copper, steel and aluminum which the large industrials will not want, will be subject to grab by all other industries. All other small, and some large, manufacturers who have no war work and are not considered essential, will try to grab somewhere up to what will be their quota.

In the meantime, of course, the large industrialist will be calling on the smaller factories to take on more and still more sub-contract work. Like during World War II, he will attempt to get the smaller manufacturer to work exclusively for him, if he possibly can, so as to allow him some space and labor for his own regular products.

The small manufacturer cannot refuse. Rather than scramble about trying to get a few tons of steel, copper and aluminum (if he can get them) he will be more than happy to keep his plant in operation doing sub-contract work for the larger industrialist. In short, he must sacrifice his regular products in an effort to survive. There is no other way out for him.

Therefore, the time grows short.

Shorter than a lot of men in this industry realize. NPA's announcement that the CMP would go into effect on July 1, 1951, shortened the manufacturing life of this business tremendously. Nothing else, short of all out war, could have so shortened it.

As the weeks go by, after July 1, less and still less new equipment will be manufactured. The manufacturer who can scramble a bit better than some other, may get a few more pounds of copper, steel and aluminum. But, whatever he does obtain, won't be sufficient to keep him in continuous

operation. He is, and has been, searching for sub-contracts. He will continue searching for sub-contract work more intensively than ever.

That also means that the average operator, jobber and distributor must prepare himself, as the weeks go by, as time grows short, for whatever eventualities will arise in the near future.

General production of all equipment has been deeply cut. Manufacturers are continuing along, in most cases, on very shorted production schedules. But, they want to continue, to keep their hand in this business, and be ready to swing back if, and when, the time comes.

It is also important to remember that war can come at anytime. Should this happen, everything goes by the board. It will mean that wartime methods and wartime economy must again be the rule.

But, while war is seriously in the offing, according to the experts, this, and all other industry, wants to continue along as best as it can. Therefore, all engaged in this field, at least those who will want to remain in it, must take into consideration the fact that time has, most suddenly, been very much shortened and that all must act quickly not to get caught short.

Operators who haven't as yet arranged for a more equitable commission percentage arrangement, or for higher coinage play action, whichever they most desire, should think very seriously of this move now—and think fast.

Jobbers and distributors who haven't prepared themselves for whatever they can best do when, and if, no new equipment is forthcoming, should work very fast in this regard. Either set up immediately for converting, or for whatever else they think themselves best fitted.

The business slideoff will go out very soon. As less and less production of new merchandise becomes the case, inventories will continue to disappear, and then the rush which will result will be of little, or no value, for there just won't be anything to rush for—except materials for war.

Perhaps, as the experts state, by 1953 a wartime economy will so deeply pervade the present type economy that the public will become accustomed to more austere living conditions. People will then get used to finding very little of the merchandise they want. Less cars, less refrigerators, less everything and anything new.

But, until 1953, there are still about 18 months for the members of this industry to work and earn a livelihood. They must, then, prepare now for the vacuum which seems to be about here. The time when little, or no, new equipment can be purchased.

Time grows short.



An oldie gets Sammy Kaye's usual smooth treatment on the top deck as Tony Alamo does the vocal. The second side is a western sort of thing which comes out very listenable with Tony and the Kaydets getting together. Ops have a couple of good sides here.

TONY MARTIN & DINAH SHORE (RCA Victor 20-4126; 47-4126)

Tony Martin and Dinah Shore team up again to give out with a couple of novelties. Both ends are cute items which the pair sing with their usual accomplished style. Although not as strong as "A Penny A Kiss," these ditties should find some interest in the machines.

PHIL HARRIS

(RCA Victor 20-4124; 47-4124)

Phil Harris has a couple of novelties to offer here. On the first side he joins up with his wife, Alice Faye, and together they make this cute thing very listenable. On the bottom half he goes it alone with a fast inspirational item which has a lot of zest. Ops should listen in.

"I LOVE TO DANCE THE POLKA" (2:54)

"PIZZA AND BEER" (2:47)

LOUIS PRIMA

(Robin Hood 108)

Louis Prima has a very potent item in the tune on the top deck. It's a polka with a lot of meaning in the lyrics which should help it go over big on the boxes. The bottom half is another novelty in Louis's typical style which his fans should eat up. Ops better not miss the top side.

BOBBY WAYNE

Bobby Wayne has a big dramatic number which he bursts out with on the upper level. This side has a production with a chorus and Dick Hayman's orchestra backing Bobby up. The second side, in contrast, is a soft ballad done very easily by Bobby. Ops will want to hear the top deck.

best seller lists. This time Patti combines a folk type tune called "Mister and Mississippi" and a ballad "These Things I Offer You" and makes both of them sound outstanding. Ops who want a real two sider will find it on this disk. The top deck is a very unusual number with a lot of change of pace involved in which Patti switches from a single to a combination of several voices every few phrases. The second side is a rather sultry ballad, right for her type of delivery which keeps you clinging to her every word. On each side Jack Rael provides just the proper backing and the whole affect is a terrific one. Here's a disk which ops are gonna have a great time with.

"GOODNIGHT" (2:50)

"LOVE IS FOREVER" (2:00)

BUD BREES

(Pyromid 251)

Here's a sleeper for ops to watch. It's a ballad, written by Elmo Russ and sung by Bud Brees in terrific style. Accompanied by a chorus, Bud gets a big production into this making it a real potent side. The bottom half gets a similar treatment from Bud and the group. Ops are advised to keep an eye on the upper half.

(Decca 27589; 9-27589)

● Bing Crosby takes two tunes from "The King And I" and gives them his own treatment. The top deck is happy sounding thing which Bing does in a lighthearted vein. The lower end is another wonderful song offered in bright style by Bing. Ops will do ok with this.

"OLD SOLDIERS NEVER DIE" (2:43)

"LOVE AND DEVOTION" (2:53)

VAUGHN MONROE ORCH.

(RCA Victor 20-4146; 47-4146)

One of the best versions of this old soldier song which has currently been getting a big push is put forward by Vaughn Monroe. Vaughn sings it in his straightforward manner and if the song goes, this should be the version. The lower end is another interesting item with some good lyrics which should do well in the boxes. Ops will have to get going here.

"IF IT HADN'T BEEN FOR YOU" (2:37)

ARTIE WAYNE

(Corol 60457; 9-60457)

A couple of ballads are turned out here in the styling of Artie Wayne. Taking it very easy, Artie does these numbers in an extremely soft manner as The Encores provide a chorus and the Herm Saunders Quartet comes through with a fine, small instrumental backing. Ops might take a peek at this disk.

"RED SAILS IN THE SUNSET" (2:47)

Frances Langford returns to the recording picture with two oldies which she vocalizes in a straight forward manner. The top deck is a nostalgic ballad while the second half is a Latin American rhythm thing which sounds real good. Ops will want to hear Frances again.

THE MADCAPS

(Decco 27582; 9-27582)

The Madcaps have a couple of good instrumentals to offer as they go to town on a harmonica duet. On the upper half, they have Ev Ralston backing them up on the piano while on the second side they do a driving number just with harmonicas. One may want to take a look at these sides.

ELLA FITZGERALD

(Decco 27578; 9-27578)

Ella Fitzgerald takes a novelty that's causing a lot of excitement as an instrumental and sings some lyrics to it on the upper half. With Sy Oliver's orchestra doing the backing, Ella makes this sound very cute. The second side is another item with clever lyrics which Ella delivers in her well known style. Ops oughta tune in.

SARAH VAUGHAN

A lovely new ballad gets a wonderful rendition on the top deck from Sarah Vaughan. With Percy Faith and the orchestra backing her up, Sarah really lets herself go with this one. The bottom half is the standard which she again does very smoothly in her listenable voice. The top deck could be a big one.

"ZING WENT THE STRINGS OF MY HEART" (3:25)

RED NORYO TRIO

(Discovery 147)

Red Norvo and his Trio take two oldies and give them a ride on this platter. The first side is a slow treatment of a very attractive tune while the bottom half is a light rendition which races all the way through. Ops with the right locations will want to get with this one.

TONY BENNETT

Two beautiful ballads are given a vocal going over from Tony Bennett. Each end finds Tony at his best singing out the lyrics with real feeling as Percy Faith comes in on the backing. Each of these tunes has a very melodic appeal and ops are advised to listen in.

This new disk teaming Frankie Laine & Jo Stafford is gonna take off in the rhythm & blues field but can also hit in the pop field. The pair really let themselves go on both ends with some high flying backing from Paul Weston and the orchestra. Opshave a double barrelled threat in this one.

Featuring a cute set of lyrics, this novelty might take off. The second side is a very appealing thing which Godfrey does with the Chordettes. It has some clever lyrics too and oughta be heard by ops.

"OLD SOLDIERS NEVER DIE" (2:54)

LEROY HOLMES ORCH.

(MGM 10977; K10977)

Leroy Holmes teams two English military tunes on one platter here. The top deck is one which has a lot of current interest and gets a very military sounding going over from the orchestra. The second side is a cute item which was very popular during the war in England. Ops will want to listen in.

Georgia has a light hearted way with a tune, "Tom's Tune" in this case, and ops are due to have a goodly amount of coin to count when they get this one into their machines. Glenn Osser backs her up as she runs through the cute lyrics in a pleasant manner and this novelty is one which keeps you humming a long time after the disk is over. No matter who's tune it is, Tom's or anyone else's, Georgia makes it hers. The second side is another novelty which she does right by. It's a very attractive item again getting a wonderful vocal and just the right backing from the orchestra. Here is a disk for ops with two sides to go on. It's one that can't be missed.

"HOT CANARY" (2:00)

PERCY FAITH ORCH.

Two instrumentals are sent our way on this platter by Percy Faith. Both sides have his distinctive flair which makes them excellent to listen to. The upper half is the well known ditty currently getting a big play while the lower half is a skittish thing on which the piano playing stands out. Two good sides.



Retracing the legendary Armstrong career from 1925 to 1931, Columbia's musical history covers the four major periods in which Armstrong established his reputation.

Forty-eight titles originally recorded for the Okeh label are included in "The Armstrong Story," performed by a series of notable ensembles including the famous Hot Five, the Hot Seven, the ensemble in which Earl Hines was band pianist, and the first Armstrong big band. Selections in this Armstrong anthology were culled from original masters assembled and preserved at Columbia's vaults in Bridgeport, Connecticut by George Avakian, jazz authority.

Distribution centers, he said, should not be more than 150 miles apart for when they are, dealers and operators in the in-between territory are sometimes serviced only once a month or even less.

Cities currently under consideration for new King distributorships are Butte, Montana and Knoxville Tenn.

Nathan also revealed that his firm has gone into territory such as Columbia, S. C. where there had previously been no record distribution at all, and has nevertheless been doing a fine business there.



Edward Kassner, English Publisher of Walter Rivers Resigns "IF", Starts New American Music Firm

Acquires English Rights To "Mr. & Mississippi"

NEW YORK—Edward Kassner, the English publisher who owns "If," has started an American publishing firm, Edward Kassner Music Co.

The firm, which controls many European copyrights, will not only publish American tunes but will also acquire songs here for European use. In line with this, Kassner has just secured the English rights to "Mr. & Mississippi" from Shapiro-Bernstein.

Kassner, who today owns more than 10,000 works started in the publishing business after he was discharged from the British army in 1946. Since then he has been manager of 8 firms.

He came to the attention of the New York music world when he leased the American rights to "If" to Shapiro-Bernstein. Kassner found "If" in the Cecil Lennox catalogue which he had bought and for two years tried to interest American firms in the song before finally making a deal with Shapiro-Bernstein. The Cecil Lennox catalogue includes such standards as "Lady of Spain" and "Let's All Sing Like The Birdies

In England, Kassner is in partnership with Sidney Braun and last year he had five tunes there in the best seller lists at the same time.

His influence was also felt in the American market, for not only was "If" his property, but also "I Never See Maggie Alone," "No Orchids For My Lady" and "Let's Do It Again."

He's now entered the American market in full force, having just published "There's No Return" which was written by Don Reid, who he's signed to a one year contract. He's also purchased a half interest in the Lincoln Music catalogue which includes all the old Larry Clinton tunes. Moreover he's obtained from Bibletone records the rights to two tunes, "Wondrous Word" and "Hometown, USA."

"Sing Everyone Sing" Theme For National Music Week

NEW YORK — National Music Week, which starts May 6 this year, will for the first time have a theme song, RCA Victor's recording of "Sing Everyone Sing" with Jan Peerce.

The song was written by Fred Morritt, a New York State Senator from Brooklyn, who is well known as a songwriter. For his latest work, he composed new lyrics to an old folk tune.

National Music Week is an event which each year receives the wholehearted cooperation of all agencies and manufacturers connected in any way with the art of music.

The basic aims of National Music

National Music Week, carried on by Committee made up of the Presidents of some 40 national, civic, social, and patriotic organizations with an honorary committee composed of all of the Governors of the States with the President of the United States as Chairman, will be celebrated this year in some 3,000 communities.

All over America in schools, homes, churches, industries, recreation de-partments, the press, radio and television and organizations of all kinds will be participating in this nation-wide tribute to the important part that music plays in American life.

Capitol Issues 45 RPM **Disks With New Center**

HOLLYWOOD-A major problem in the record industry has been solved with Capitol's new "Optional Center" 45 RPM records. These "O.C.45" records are like the present available 45's in every way, except that the center hole is small, permitting the record to be played on 3-speed players, with small spindles without the use of adapters. Record buyers who have the standard 45 players, with large spindles, merely push out the center with the thumb, leaving the large hole for use on these 45 machines.

Capitol's development of "O.C.45" opens a new market for 45 records among the five million owners of

3-speed players.

Beginning with Release Number 265, all new Capitol 45 pressings will be issued with this Optional Center. Credit goes to William Fowler, Capitol's Vice President in Charge of Production, and James Bayless, General Plant Manager for overcoming the engineering problems involved in this development.

De Campo Inks Coral Pact

NEW YORK — The announcement has been made by Jimmy Hilliard, vice president in charge of recording at Coral Records, that vocalist Vinni De Campo has signed a one-year contract, with options, with Coral.

The Boston-born singer was featured vocalist with Harry James' or-chestra for two years. Vinni is currently seen on the Kate Smith day-time TV show.

He formerly recorded for London. His first Coral recordings will be released some time this month.

"Lollipop Tree" Promotion

During his stay, he was responsible for signing such stars as Yma Sumac, whose album has been in the best seller lists for months. He also acquired Mary Mayo for Capitol.

Rivers, who hails from Savannah, and owns a home in that city, will take a two week vacation and start his new job on June 1st. He will act as customer contact man and good will ambassador for the Savannah





IN EVERY JUKE BOX IN AMERICA

COIN INDUSTRY STILL HELD TO CURTAILED STEEL QUOTAS

Industry NOT EXEMPTED As Erroneously Reported In "Billboard". Steel Production To Go For Essential Defense Products — Civilian Items Will Get Very Little In Near Future

CHICAGO—The coin machine trade was unduly upset this past week when an erroneous interpretation of the NPA order M-47 by The Billboard appeared in its past issue.

The Cash Box has been informing the trade that usage of steel (and certain other metals) is restricted to 80% of the average quarterly use in the manufactured item during the base period. The Billboard stated in its story that the NPA amendment sets more steel for coin machines, creating a false optim.sm that production of equipment would be more available.

Actually, of the many hundreds of industries using steel, NPA is exempting only five categories—these items which are considered either of prime necessity, or where the amount used is so minute that total consumpt.on would not be effected.

The attention of this industry was called to the tight steel situation in a story appearing in the April 28 issue of The Cash Box, when it was reported that The New York Times, in a special survey among steel producers in Pittsburgh, Pa., stated that steel customers who had ideas that supplies would be easier in the coming months, were not only doomed to disappointment, they were due for a shock.

The New York Times, at that time, stated, "The opinion that steel supplies for less essential uses will be tight for some time was further supported by information indicating that some steel companies were already closely approaching the point where 45 per cent of their total steel shipments were slated for direct defense and defense-supporting agencies."

This survey found that there was already evidence at that time that the plight of the non-essential manufacturer was growing worse. While some manufacturers of less essential civilian goods were still operating at a good rate, many others were less fortunate, and were frantically searching for supplies.

The conclusions drawn from the Times survey indicated that as the Controlled Materials Plan goes into effect on July 1, it is expected that strictly military orders will be on a quarterly allocation basis, with actual requirements matched against available supplies. It was believed that stairght orders would be ordered in much greater quantities within the next thirty, s.xty and ninety days.

The coin trade, therefore, can easily

see, that not only is the industry being kept on the same 80% restriction, but that steel will be most difficult to obtain in any proportion, as practically all of it will be going into defense factories.

George A. Miller Warns Music Operators Against "Gimmicks"

OAKLAND, CALIF.—George A. Miller, national president of MOA (Music Operators of America), from his headquarters in this city, is greatly perturbed over the many reports he's been receiving that music operators in some areas have been "sold" on the idea of using outside "gimmicks" to try to supplement their income.

'51 Arcade Season Expected To Reach Record Heights

NEW YORK—The opening of any Arcade season hasn't seen such optimistic anticipation as is shown this year by arcade owners since the years of World War II.

More arcade equipment, both new and old, has been sold during the early months of this year than in any previous year in the memory of its oldest dealers. It is pointed out that there are two reasons for this lively activity. First, arcade owners, in anticipation of a big year due to the increase in the armed forces (who are lively players of arcade machines) and the increased number of defense workers, both groups seeking economical entertainment and relaxation. Second, the buyers of equipment are trying to forestall any possibility of being left out in the cold when equipment becomes scarce or extremely high priced.

Also, in addition to those arcade locations already established, a number of coinmen have plans to open brand new spots near service installations and in amusement centers nearby cities and towns humming with defense work.

Another sales source that drained many arcade pieces out of the market is the foreign market, which this year is unusually active. These foreign buyers, remembering the dearth of machine which was created by the last war, due to lack of shipping facilities and government bans on import, have been rushing to obtain machines in the event another conflict of world proportions gets under way. Wholesalers have been shipping arcade machines to all points of the globe.

Arcade owners in this country, who in the past several years were contented to open the season with whatever games they had from previous years, changed their views this year, and it seems that all are seeking to protect themselves from a scarcity, which seems sure to develop within the next several months.

An eastern arcade owner explained his position as follows: "In addition to trying to protect myself in the event machines are unavailable, or the price zooms to the sky, I want my equipment to stand up mechanically during the entire season. I recall some of my worst problems during the past war was repair of machines on the floor. Instead of bringing in revenue many of the machines were idle, either being repaired or waiting until a mechanic could get to them. If things get tough again, we're sure to run into the mechanic situation again. Many of the boys will be in the armed forces, and many will take employment in defense factories, where the pay is greater than a coinman can pay. My thinking is that if I have good working machines, this will be one problem I can solve with a minimum of heartaches."

Arcade owners, therefore, are looking toward a record season in 1951. Happy sunshine!

"Every so often some new 'gimmick' shows its ugly face on an automatic phonograph. Either the beer distributors or some particular brand of cigarette comes along with an idea of advertising their merchandise on juke boxes. They want to place advertising on the phonographs, or place records on the machines which mention their product; and, of course, they try to impress the music operator with the idea that it is going to increase the operator's revenue. This is not only untrue, but it is unsound and certainly doesn't add to the dignity of good music.

"It has just been called to my attention that some of the operators are putting on a contest known as the 'Juke Box Mystery Tune' contest. The slips that are being handed out state that for each nickel the player is entitled to one guess. In case there is more than one correct answer, then a drawing will be held to select a winner.

"This, in the writer's estimation is a lottery or game of chance and can easily put the automtic phonograph in a bad light as far as the general public is concerned. I most sincerely recommend that those responsible for the contest eliminate it from juke boxes because it will be a short-lived affair as far as income is concerned; but the damage to the industry can live on forever. I feel that if the owners desire to continually improve the public relations and morale of the automatic phonograph industry, all 'gimmicks' or advertising of any kind should be kept off the automatic phonograph.







an additional tax of \$50 annually on each machine which is "leased, rented, stored, distributed or consigned and not sold."

Introduced by Rep. J. H. Peeples Jr., of Glades County, the bill would apply to coin-operated music boxes, pinball machines and others which permit "engaging in a game of skill."

Peeples also introduced a bill which would raise the license fees levied on most coin-operated machines from \$5 to \$25. The levy on vending machines located in business establishments would be upped from \$2 to \$5, and the tax on machines which operate with a penny would be raised from 50 cents to \$1.

Tube Shortage Imminent With Tungsten Supply Becoming Scarce

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Availability of materials for electronics equipment needed in defense and essential civilian production was discussed this past week at a meeting of the transmitting and Special Purpose Tube Industry Advisory Committee with officials of the National Production Authority.

Industry spokesmen told NPA that although they had managed to maintain good production levels to date, they are concerned over growing shortages of nickel, cobalt, tungsten and copper.

Officials of NPA told the committee that there is little relief in sight in the tungsten situation and pointed out that demands for tungsten far exceed anticipated supplies. The government is considering a plan to purchase supplies of tungsten abroad, NPA said, but even this additional supply will not be sufficient to meet all requirements.


Officials said that approximately 12 percent of all tungsten used goes into electronics and lighting equipment. They warned the committee that there will be a considerable reduction in the amount of tungsten available during July and August.

NPA told the committee that while there is no immediate problems in fine wire drawing production, forthcoming miniature and sub-miniature tube programs for radar and other military and essential industrial uses probably will create shortages.

Growing shortages of products using cobalt were reported by the industry. NPA pointed out that the future picture for cobalt is probably better than that for tungsten.

Little immediate relief is to be expected in the nickel situation, NPA officials said, but the importance of the electronics industry is recognized and CMP procedures probably will provide some relief on critical materials.

The Electronics Products Resources Agency is conducting a requirements survey for the industry, and the information will be presented to NPA when it is completed.






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The set-up shown in the picture is only one of many possible combinations that challenge the skill and judgment of the player. Note that player has succeeded in placing his first 3 pucks on first, second and third bases. If he hits a Home-Run roll-over with his fourth puck, the circular turn-table will revolve, and, as each cup advances from third-base to home-plate, puck will be automatically kicked out of cup, scoring 3 runs as the 3 "men" romp home. However, if player hits a Single roll-over, he will score only 1 run, as "man" on third goes home. "Men" on first and second bases will merely advance and be on second and third bases at the start of the next Inning. If 2 players are playing, opponent will start his half of the Inning with 2 "men" on bases. If player who shot the set-up shown in the picture can drop his fourth puck into home-plate cup, before hitting a roll-over, he will score 4 runs by hitting Home-Run roll-over. Single roll-over will score only 1 run and leave bases loaded for opponent. Single or Home-Run hit ends Inning, and each player plays 9 Innings.
