MoJazz As A Lifestyle Choice

Lifestyle has always been associated with jazz. There were manners of dress, lingo and carriage that have accompanied each wrinkle in the continuum known as jazz. And at Motown's MoJazz Records label, the executives are working hard to define the lifestyle represented by that part of jazz which melds with supple R&B grooves and new jack sensibilities. Artists such as Norman Brown, Wayman Tisdale, Pharez Whitted and Daryle Chinn are being marketed to consumers that may not be acquainted with the mainstream echoes of jazz, who have been raised on contemporary urban music and who are defining the lifestyle of a generation. *Cash Box* urban editor Peter Miro talked with MoJazz executives about their mission and how the campaign is progressing.

Midyear Sales Show 'Modest' Gains, RIAA

Net unit shipments by RIAA signatories up 6.8% in the first half of '96.

CONTINUED STRONG SALES OF CD ALBUMS and a remarkable jump in the popularity of CD singles were the primary factors leading to the 6.8% increase in units shipped during the first half of 1996, according to figures released last week by the Recording Industry Assn. of America (RIAA), which measures the sales of its signatory companies.

In the first six months of 1996, unit shipments of CDs, CD singles, cassettes, cassette singles and music videos by RIAA companies rose to 521.5 million, up from the 488.3 million registered at the midyear point last year. The overall dollar value also was up over the same period last year, logging in at \$5.5 billion (based on suggested list prices), a 5.8% rise from the \$5.2 billion tallied in 1995's first six months.

Growth, however modest, is a remarkable achievement given the tremendous competition from other forms of entertainment," said RIAA chairman Jay Berman. "Our success in the first six months of this year is due to the continuing consumer demand for full-length CDs and a marked surge in the market for CD singles.

CD unit sales jumped 16% in the first half of 1996, to 361.7 million from 311.8 million the previous year in the same period. The dollar increase was 11.6, or \$4.3 billion, compared to \$3.9 billion tallied at midyear 1995.

With many companies lowering the price on CD singles, and the configuration in many cases offering bonus tracks, CD singles soared a whopping 128.8% in unit shipments and 76.1% in dollar value over the first six months tally of 1995. Unit shipments in the first half of 1996 were 13.5 million, compared to 5.9 million in the same period last year. Dollars from CD singles were up to \$63.4 million at the midyear point in 1996, compared to \$36 million in 1995

Cassette sales showed a remarkable decrease in both unit shipments and dollar value, while music videos posted solid unit growth but more modest dollar value increases. Cassette sales dropped $19.4\,\%$ in the first half of 1996, down to 101.9 units from 126.5 at midyear 1995, with a dollar value drop of 15.5%, to \$866 million in the first half of '96 from \$1.037 billion the year before. Cassette singles were down 7.6% in 1996, 30.4 from 32.9 in '95, and dollar value slipped 16.4%, to \$95.3 million from \$114 million in '95's first half.



LAST DAYS OF SUMMER?: Compared to the last few years, this season along the East Coast has been almost like a second Ice Age, where temperatures have not gone above ninety degrees since the middle of May. Lincoln Center is putting on its 26th annual *out-of-doors* festival, which runs for three weeks starting August 13th. Celebrating their 25th anniversary J&R Music World is also putting on a series of concerts across the street from its complex of stores in City Hall Park from August 22nd to the 24th. On the 22nd Ramsey Lewis, Rodney Kendrick and The Mingus Big Band; on the 23rd Art Porter, Javon Jackson and Marcus Printup; on the 24th Bill Perry, Diane Krall, Kenny Garrett and the Essence All-Stars w/Lenny White, Eddie Henderson, Marcus Belgrave, Javon Jackson, Ron Carter & Stephen Scott.

All of this will be happening at the same time as **The Panasonic Village** Jazz Festival will be taking place from August 17th to the 26th which includes a film series, poetry, art, dance and even a fair as well as eleven venues hosting different musicians over the course of the revery. Some of the attractions include Gato Barbieri, Terrance Blanchard, Abraham Burton, Thomas Chapin Trio, Charles Davis Quartet and Abdullah Ibrahim among many others. Plus a free concert in Washington Square Park by Herbie Hancock on the last evening of the celebration. So, if moderate weather isn't enough to get you heading onto the island of Manhattan, these musical inducements should be more than enough to get you across those bridges and tunnels.

COUNTRY MEETS WILD WEST RETRO: An artist as popular as Patsy Cline is someone that has had record companies releasing the same material for decades. Now, with The Birth Of A Star put out by Razor & Tie you can get your hands on a myriad of previously unreleased performances that track the Country sensation's early career including TV appearances. These numbers shine almost as bright as her later more polished material. Someone who was never smooth, but a gem none the less, was Little Jimmy Dickens who didn't quite reach five feet tall. This diminutive coal miner's son became an early staple of the Grand Old Opry in the fifties and the sixties. With I'm Little But I'm Loud, Razor & Tie offers an excellent window into an artist who has faded from most memories. Zulu Records has released a trio of CDs that give you a flavor of the ferment that was not just going on in London and the American Coasts, but also in Vancouver, British Columbia. Whether it is the raw energy of the Young Canadians (nee' The K-Tels), the breakneck hooks of the Modernettes or the more romantic yet still punchy Pointed Sticks these are three collections that should be sitting alongside many of the greatest hits from the punk outfits of that era.



MoJazz: Jazz As Lifestyle

BRUCE WALKER, GENERAL MANAGER, MoJazz Records and sr. vp of A&R, Motown Records, still recalls the day he met with newly-appointed CEO Andre Harrell, the young mastermind behind the Uptown Records juggernaut. Walker entered the chairman's suite harboring distinct misgivings that Harrell's pledge to "hip hop" Motown Records into the future would mean eliminating MoJazz, the fledgling jazz-oriented ancillary label founded in 1992. Eric Reed, a skilled pianist, wasn't setting sales charts on fire, melodically gifted soprano saxophonist J. Spencer was straining at a hip hop leash, Foley was an experiment gone awry, Norman Connors was all but ignored in stark contrast to his '70s stature as an R&B composer of magnitude. Only Musicians Institute guitar professor Norman Brown was clicking with record buyers with his *Just Between Us* debut. Harrell dispelled any ominous tension firsthand. "You need more money," he said. "This is a lifestyle that people need to know about. You need to get your records done now."

Walker and MoJazz have received considerable marketing support since that October '95 meeting. Now he is an avid point man for a revitalized slate of artists, with Norman Brown still outpacing the pack. ''MoJazz is the new face of jazz, the bridge between R&B and jazz,'' offers Walker, emphasizing the label's focus and identity in the contemporary jazz market.

Gone are the days when a jazz record was considered a success if it sold 40-50,000 units, supported by only airplay on jazz stations and live club dates attended by core fans. Some specialty labels without a huge overhead can probably still be content with that, but with the swollen budgets of today's leviathan record conglomerates, such a return would be regarded as a hemorrhaging instead. "The way jazz was marketed stagnated," says Michael Mitchell, sr. vp of communications, West Coast. "(The artists) expected everyone to come to them. Jazz is far from over. You have to remind people that it's there."

A shrewd marketer like Harrell quickly discerned that MoJazz had to be market-driven in its approach to the music. "The main thing is to introduce the MoJazz lifestyle," continues Walker. "Great music, accessible music for people with diverse tastes. A lot of young people are really into what we're doing. We're not limiting jazz. We hope to help the jazz arena. We're bringing back good music, live performance values, with great artists, performers and entertainers."

Eric Talbert, director, MoJazz, shapes the company position further. "I think the label's vision is to have everyone think they're not a jazz lover, but they are." He diagrams the MoJazz formula thusly. "Take an urban bass

form, add musical instrumental composition...it's jazz. People are tired of hip hop. Take real music, writing from nothing, not just samples and loops. We needed to change the message to reach the audience. We're taking an urban face of music, including cover tunes to break the ice. They immediately identify with it.'' Doc Remer, director of nat'l promotions recounted the tweaking and fine tuning needed to make the MoJazz product appeal to radio, given its fragmentation. "Radio isn't really sure what they get from us. It's always been good, but not always been a good fit. We had to make enhancements— diffrent mixes for different formats. The product is for flavor. It's a combination of comtemporary jazz and urban contemporary music.''

"It's difficult to define jazz," elaborates Steve Corbin, vp, marketing. "The purist will always buy Thelonious Monk. We're not trying to box MoJazz into being only jazz music. There's a variety for the adult consumer. We put it out, worked it on a street level and people found it. Bruce Walker has definitely brought lifestyle marketing focus to MoJazz. It gives Motown another dimension."

About two and a half years ago MoJazz realized its approach had to change. Now the nucleus of a championship team is in place reflecting favorable sales numbers, impacting in various radio formats and consumer

groups with execs and staffers timing their efforts like an improvisational jazz combo. Cassette samplers, and listening posts trumpet the MoJazz sound favorably, such that a debonair urbanite will want to step out with his date to a MoJazz performance. Norman Brown remains the sales leader. His '94 LP *After The Storm* is approaching gold status. His dazzling combination of guitar virtuosity and stage showmanship make him an ideal frontman for the label's roster. His current LP *Better Days Ahead* is surging with 100,000 units shipped, and its title track is the #1 most added record on NAC radio. A video for ''After the Love Is Gone'' was recently shot in Northern California.

Daryle Chinn's first LP, From The Heart has a subtle, romantic instrumental approach. Wayman Tisdale follows the 120,000 unit performance of his debut LP, Power Forward with his 4th quarter sequel Watch Me Play. An all-star video will be lensed in New York next month. Trumpeter Pharez Whitted, also a music professor, will promote his Mysterious Cargo LP with nationwide appearances at Borders Bookstores. Norman Connors is nearly finished with his new instrumental album, and singer Ronee Martin, releases her debut Remember next month. A multiple artist Christmas album will round out '96, and about eleven projects are in the

works from MoJazz for 1997.

Imprompt2 offers a hybrid flavor to the roster. Legendary vibist Lionel Hampton made the timbre of his hammers felt on the recent Olympic Games jazz album, *People Make The World Go Round*.

By tailoring product for the masses, and marketing a desirable lifestyle, MoJazz has steadily transformed consumer awareness of the label as a distinct entity in its own right. Black AC, urban, and Quiet Storm formats play its music alongside NAC, AC and jazz radio. So there is a wider spread from which to reap consumer dollars and new listeners. A freewheeling compositional approach remains the signature of the MoJazz sound, and tolerance among new listeners is growing for the label's product. Its most staunch supporter remains the man thought to amputate the label before it had a chance to fulfill its promise.

"I'm approaching MoJazz's development similar to the way l approached Uptown," Andre Harell stated. "We are developing a lifestyle label. If we start to put labels on our MoJazz acts, we will limit them. I see a Waymon Tisdale or Pharez Whitted not just appealing to the jazz audience, but to the hip hop heads who are now discovering the music of such greats as Miles Davis as well as to the audience who groove to a Stanley Jordan. We are looking to make artists (into) personalities. Norman Brown could easily become the George Benson for a younger, more active record buying consumer."

PENNILESS PEOPLE OF BULGARIA: "Velocity" (Altered CD-378-2) A gorgeously layered, big track

Modern Rock stations, "Velocity" is replete with the kind of anthemic, fuzz-distorted, cool hooks that have already made the band a hit in its native Finland and elsewhere in Europe.

WILD COLONIALS: "Charm" (DGCD-A-24973)

Angela McCluskey's haunting, strong voice, this stunning single's uncluttered, soaring guitars, and a quirky charming edge that's vaguely Cranberries-like combine for a sound that couldn't be more dead-on fashionable today. The Wild Colonials' "Charm" will surely catch on at modern rock radio first, but could cross over to active and other rock formats.

THE QUEERS: "Punk Rock Girls" (Lookout 140 CD)

The veteran punk band takes its patented mix of raw punk plus '60s bubblegum-happy rock to make an entirely silly, fun, accessible single, kinda like the Ramones and Lesley Gore getting together for a jam. "Punk Rock Girls' is from the band's *Don't Back Down* disc, which is differentiated from its previous offerings by sharper, bigger production.

JOSH CLAYTON FELT: "Soon

Enough" (A&M AMCDP 00279) And today's luckiest guy in the world is Josh Clayton Felt, who recently got handpicked by Tori Amos to open her current tour. The former singer of School of Fish, which had a hit with "Three Strange Days," Felt offers an easy, jazzy groove and a quirky hook for a charming tune that's currently being worked at commercial alternative and college stations. "Soon Enough" is the second single off Felt's solo debut, *Inarticulate Nature Boy*.

EARTH: Pentastar: In The Style of the Demons (SubPop SPCD 361)

Earth is a big, lumbering, deliberately, interminably slow metal band that takes the Black-Sabbath-via-the-Melvins-and-Codeine route, periodically adding Phantom of the Opera keyboards, ambient noise loops and other appropriately atmospheric flourishes. Most of the tracks on this disc are too long for radio play, but this is an extremely inventive, cool disc that could increase the band's already-solid cult following (the outfit has a stellar history, counting Melvins' Joe Preston and, some years back, Kurt Cobain among its former members.)

DOGSTAR: Quattro Formaggi (Zoo 72445-11128-2)

This four song EP is just a preview of Dogstar's Our Little Visionary full-length album, which will be released in the fall. In the meantime, this four-track Enhanced CD plays on a conventional CD player and

What would you get if you crossed the Rev. Horton Heat, the Cramps and a Quentin Tarantino/Robert Rodriguez movie? Welcome to the creepy and amusing world of Deadbolt, which makes good ole rockabilly twang sound like the most ominous thing in the world. The disc's hilarious, darkly sarcastic tone and fun rootsy sound could make any of these tracks-"Convict Man," "A Hit Gone Wrong," "El Perversio" - a novelty hit.

ROBERT MILES: Dreamland (Arista 18930-2)

A major-league hit in Europe, Robert Miles gets ready to take the U.S. Miles' single "Children" sold more than two million units and reached #1 in seven countries. A trancey, dramatic dance track from the former pianist, club DJ and producer, "Children" appears on Dreamland in two versions, with plenty of other similarly lush, hypnotic Giorgio Moroder-meets-Enigma dance tracks in between, including the space-age blip of "Landscape' and the high-drama crescendos



and plaintive keyboard arrangement of "Princess of Light."

PICK OF THE WEEK

FAILURE: Fantastic Planet (Slash/Warner Bros. 9 46269-2)

A swirly, inventive mix of hard-edged industrial sounds and sweetly harmonic melody lines, Failure is a commercial alternative natural, with weird but anthemic tracks like "Saturday Savior" and the sadly lilting and extremely catchy "Pitiful." Much of the rest of Fantastic Planet takes off for an extended sonic adventure, with peculiarly and brilliantly deconstructed sound. This is a real hang-out-under-the-earphones record which includes car sounds ("Segue 2"), feedback and other assorted strangeness in the mix. Although a new band, Failure is no stranger to national touring, having completed an extensive trek opening for Tool in support of its earlier disc, Magnified.

FACEMOB: The Other Side Of The Law (Rap-A-Lot/Noo Trybe 7243 8 41336 2 7) Producers: James A. Smith, Brad Jordan.

A clackup and a blam begin this cold gangsta saga by Scarface protegés Facemob. It has its share of hard-cussing, heavy-thumping hip hop tracks, but it also steps the pace down to an easygoing groove on "Millions" and "Tales From Tha Hood," without lessening the sting of its lethality one whit. "Respect Rude," while about mobbing, is downright funky to listen to, thanks to its bassline. "The Other



Side'' continues the floating mood, but it's tunes like "Da Coldest'' which can adapt to club action for its danceability. Expect remixes to increase underground support from a loyal fan base for anything Mr. Scarface is connected to. Arrived in stores August 6.

SIR MIX A LOT: *Return Of The Bumpasaurus* (American 2-4301-A) Producers: Sir Mix-A-Lot, Mike Kumagi, Quaze, Funk Daddy.

It can finally be told. Atlantis was settled by George Clinton, and when it sank, his funk was dispersed by survivors who wcren't fried by the solar power jewel in the center of the city. Sir Mix-A-Lot incorporates some of that legacy onto his pimp game-laced compositions, with "Buckin My Horse," "Mob Style," and "Bumpasaurus" especially sounding like vintage "Knee Deep." Mix-A-Lot's trademark rhythmic conversating is evident on "You Can Have Her," rips into ungrateful back-stabbers on "Lead Yo Horse," and hilariously dissects "cross-over" sisters who abandon their ghetto roots on "Aunt Thomasina." Chris Rock's comic intro sets up the absurdist mirth of this celecic platter, and "Da Bomb" makes use of female dialect to add to the send-ups which are all over this LP. Fun stuff.

TRICKY: Tricky Presents Grassroots (Payday/FFRR 697-124-105-2) Producers: Tricky, Drunkenstein.

This is really an extended EP with five cuts being released and marketed with all the fanfare of an album. Not a problem. We'll accomodate him here. Featured artists are The Hillfiguzes ("Heaven, Youth Hell'), Tricky, ("Tricky Kid"), Laveda Davis ("Devil's Helper" w/Tricky), Stephanie Cooke ("Live W/Yo Self") and Roberto Malary, Jr. ("Grass Roots" w/Tricky). Tricky spins tales in a gravelly voice on this laid-back alternative hip hop project, but it's Stephanie Cooke's performance on "Live W/Yo Self" that is thought-provoking and sublimely entertaining at once. She comes from a deep center of wisdom in her lyrics, and offers the most radio-ready tune herein.

PICK OF THE WEEK



THE BRAXTONS: So Many Ways (Atlantic 82875-2) Producers: Bryant Reid, Jermaine Dupri, Daryl Simmons, "Tricky" Stewart.

Besides the hit single "So Many Ways," Tamar, Towanda, and Trina Braxton show their musical mettle on a menu of sultry ballads, with equal opportunities to display vocal prowess. Can't say "The Boss" by Diana Ross belongs on the collection, unless it's there to appeal to a

techno-oriented dance crowd. Its straight-up hip-hop intro would have made a nice tune if it was fleshed out, but the rest of it sounds incongruous on this otherwise tranquil, luxuriant disc. Think of the fine crystal of "Slow Flow," "I'd Still Say Yes," "L.A.D.I.," the briliance of "Take Home To Momma," with its gutsy phrasing, the nitty gritty of "Where's The Good In Goodbye," and "What Does It Take," and then the magic is dispelled with "The Boss." The Braxtons will earn increased respect for their solo skills with this LP, but get "Little" Louie Vega and Kenny "Dope" Gonzalez to make a complete joint out of that mix show beat they came up with so the ladies can snap up some of the hip hop market to boot.

THE RHYTHM

Al Bell discusses "social science marketing" principles being employed for a surge of releases his Bellmark Records label will launch in the 4th quarter '96. A total of 22 albums and singles ranging from blues to jazz, rap, bass, dance, R&B and "God-inspired (gospel)" genres are planned to continue the musical legacy begun at Stax Records for the '90s and beyond.

FOR WHOM BELL TOILS: Bellmark Records CEO AI Bell is covering as many bases as possible to position his label to maximum advantage in today's ur-

ban music marketplace. Releases on his label are now being distributed through RED, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Sony Music. Bellmark has regrouped after the label's Tag Team craze of '93, and the independent success of the Paisley Park maxi-single release "The Most Beautiful Girl In The World," which helped the symbol known as Prince prove a point to Warner Bros. about his creative viability. Bellmark is now targeting various market niches with a new slate of artists for '96, with special attention being devoted to upcoming projects by The Dramatics, Lenny Williams, Stylistics and Chi-Lites. These classic groups may be considered "old school," but Bell emphasizes that they are "great, unique artists who hadn't been given the opportunity to enjoy the fruits of their talents to the fullest." He wants to play a role in popularizing their talent for contemporary audiences, and allow the groups to be seen and heard anew. As a marketer, Bell says they offer "great music, great songs and great performances." He points out that young African-American producers are secking vintage soul to graft onto some of their current creations, reinforcing the viability of classic material. So in his view, it seems intelligent to sign these veteran groups and add a contemporary flair to their songs, ripc for AC radio exposure.

Remaining label offerings are diverse. Tag Team's sequel release is due early '97. Top Secret is a bass music act from Augusta, GA who raps and sings, coming forth with a project titled "Ghetto Booty." Stefanie Bolton, age 23, is a Memphis-bred vocalist, "a beautiful, dynamic performer," whose appeal parallels that of Atlantic artist Brandy, and whose range, pipes and vocal gymnastics are compared to Aretha Franklin. Doug Lazy & Science, from D.C., are receiving preliminary mix show action on their "Get Your Groove On" single, prior to their LP's late August release. There are also West Coast rappers Terrorist Society, Chicago balladeer Brad Watson, who's traveled with R. Kelly, the Kerry Gordy-produced dance diva E. GEE, whose upcoming LP and single are called "Butterfly Me," and Hillside, described as a contemporary Bar-Kays. Eleven releases are forthcoming on the "God-inspired" Life Records label, and its exceptional sales performance has expanded to the general market. Separate marketing plans have been devised for each group in the mix. Video will be a judiciously-used promotional tool, on an as-needed basis.

promotional tool, on an as-necded basis. "What I've always wanted to do," says Bell, "is present to people the music that is a part of, or influenced by, the African-American experience, irrespective of period or genre. I always dealt with music as an artform. I always wanted to present that art to the masses. It was always born in me to ferret out that which was unique. At Stax, the most important word in contracts was 'unique.' Unique artists, unique songs, unique presentation. I don't like the categories, I just like unique music. I respect the validity and power of the genre, but I just look for great unique art. As a social science marketer, my steps are finding the art, examining the purchaser, determine the approach, target the niche, promote and advertise the art until it becomes popular, crossing over to the general market. I don't use a rote approach. I like figuring out unique ways to market product," he concludes.

BLACKJACK: "Whatever It Takes" (Penalty/Tommy Boy PENCDPRO 0173) Producer: Blackjack.

Culled from his upcoming LP Addicted To Drama, "Whatever It Takes," is a mellow R&B track about the indispensability of cash, rapped with serious street knowledge grafted onto it, a gift Blackjack has exercised in his recordings for Spice-1, Method Man, 2Pac and E-40. Vocals and a crisp hi-hat pace this groove. Sounds and subject matter get more intense on "F**k Your Life," and "Nine Of 'Em," which allow MC Eiht, The Luniz, Notorious B.1.G. and other members of the Criminal Minded Clique an opportunity to state their outlook.

LUTHER VANDROSS: "Your Secret Love" (Epic/LV ESK 8356)

Producer: Luther Vandross.

The title track from Luther's forthcoming self-produced LP has the elements of his patented style: a soothing serenade, emotive backup vocals, sustained notes held over the refrain, a romantic flair. Altogether it's spelled "chartbound."

MINT CONDITION: "What Kind Of Man Would I Be" (Perspective PSSAD 00261) Producers: Jimmy Jam & Terry Lewis, Mint Condition for Mint Factory Productions.

Contemporary balladeering flair from a talented band, this single rated ink well in advance of its August 20 release date, it was that hard to sit on, but the hook-up is on so take notice. Lead vocalist Stokely wallops major you-know-what on an excitingly rendered love jam, hitting highs and falling into the chorus to telling effect. Its guitar solo interlude reminds one of "Let Me Put Love On Your Mind," by Confunkshun, (and for all that "old school" talk, it's doubtful that one member of Confunkshun is collecting Social Security). Repeated plays will see this jam rocketing and bursting like Chinese New Year every night, and twice on Sunday. From their Sept. 20 LP *Definition Of A Band*, there will be heavy trading in the latest pressings from the Mint.



Blues News And Notes

Johnnie "Good Love" Taylor

"LET'S TALK ABOUT NOT KILLIN' PEOPLE, and how to make a little love here," quotes veteran bluesman Johnnie Taylor.

On the making of his new album *Good Love*, Johnnie remarks, "I just wanted to make some sense out of music again. I wanted to give folks what they wanted. Some nice words and good melodies. Bring a little love back into the music." And it seems to be working.

Good Love is the ninth album Taylor has made for Malaco Records. Capitalizing on the recent resurgence of Southern R&B, Malaco's Tommy Couch Jr. says the company is having

a field day. "This is the fastest moving record we've had in a long time, and we're having problems keeping up with the orders."

The album has sold more than 200,000 copies since its release in May.

Born in Crawfordsville, Arkansas and raised in West Memphis, Johnnie grew up with strong influences in both gospel and the blues. In 1960, Taylor found himself lead singer of **The Soul Stirrers**, replacing **Sam Cooke** after an almost 10 year tenure. Then newly-formed **SAR Records** realizing Johnnie's potential, quickly signed him to a recording contract, which resulted in his first chart success "Rome Wasn't Built In A Day."

Taylor's tireless career certainly wasn't built in a day. Hit records are few and far between but Johnnie always made the best of what he had. Years on the *chitlin' circuit* built a solid fan base for the illustrious entertainer and has served him well through the years. "I have always been able to work at least six months out of the year since I first hit the charts, and that has kept my family and me alive," says Johnnie. "But I must admit, I have had a great deal of good luck to go along with the hard work."

Some of what Johnnie equates as good luck was his recording of "Who's Makin' Love" for the Stax label. "For a long time after that hit it seemed like I could do no wrong," said Johnnie, and because of the tremendous sales of that record, he wound up being listed as one of the all-time best selling acts on Stax even with Otis Redding, Booker T. And The MG's and Sam & Dave signed to the label.

At the time, when disco became the rage, Johnnie, always moving with the flow, achieved gold status with his monster hit, "Disco Lady" for Columbia Records.

Cash Box asked Taylor what Malaco thought about the Jewel/Paula release of *Stop Half Loving These Women*, product he had recorded for RCA with **Don Davis** after the demise of Stax. He replied, "Tommy was mad, but I told him you can't stop a guy from hustlin' his wares. Tommy Sr. and **Stan** Lewis have been in competition for a long time and it's good for business."

It's certainly good for Johnnie Taylor's business and now, entrenched in the number one spot on the *Cash Box* Blues Chart, Johnnie is traveling across the USA spreading goodwill and helping to sell his record.

How does Johnnie Taylor feel about having one more hit? In his own words: "With the release of *Good Love* I've noticed that the kids are coming back to see my shows. I think, to me, that's the most gratifying reward of all."

BLUES BEFORE SUNRISE NEEDS HELP: As of September 1st, one of America's finest blues shows is leaving WBEZ Chicago after being on the air for over 15 years. *Blues Before Sunrise* is widely recognized as a presentation of great historical depth giving exposure to many great blues artists who perhaps would have never been heard. Host **Steve Cushing** cites station management decisions as the problem and is now funding the show, which is broadcast via satelite to 58 markets, with his own resources. HOW DOES A MOM AND POP STORE compete against mega retail outlets like Tower, HMV and Virgin, et. al? Well, if you're the three enterprising souls that own New York City's Other Music, you open your doors right in the shadow of the giant Tower Records store in the Downtown complex, and consequently become one of the most talked about indie stores in recent history.

Combining experience, knowledge about the product, unique inventory and a regular slate of artist in-store appearances, Chris Vanderloo, Jeff Gibson and Josh Modell have managed to carve out a solid niche in the thick music retailing universe of Manhattan.

Despite the aformentioned attributes, Other Music's locale is what initially raises eyebrows. Opening literally across the street from Tower is a risky proposition, but according to Vanderloo, "We had been thinking about this for a year. We finally found a place after a long search. Location is always the key thing. Traffic patterns, foot traffic, safe neighborhood, plus we wanted something that was very visible (are other factors)."

But after attracting customers to the store, what keeps them there and draws them back is the inventory. Featuring the usual rock and oldies (which skew toward the more obscure), mixed with LA/Decadence, krautrock, ambient and other subgrenres is what sets the store apart. "We sell what we like," Vanderloo says. "It reflects all our interests; all three of us have individual tastes."

But the Other Music people keep their ears open. "You listen to what people are looking for and you react to that, too. We're not out to compete with Tower at all. We're filling a niche that they don't."

To achieve this goal, the trio mounts a tireless search for music and use a couple of dozen distributors on avergae per month. But it doesn't stop there. "We search out through many distributors to get the littlest thing, which gives us an edge over the Towers," Vanderloo says. "They will deal with some big one-stop, and we will call up the label," which makes the hard to find things more accessible to the customer.

Another feature that sets the store apart are the appearances by several artists, such as Matador Records' Yo La Tengo, Killing Rock Star's Elliot Smith, DJ Spooky on the Ashphodel label. Store logistics lend themsleves to this feature, as the racks and fixtures are portable enough to accommodate the performance and the increased traffic that it attracts. "The in-store performances have definitely spread the word," says Vanderloo, who adds that the store usually offers a special price on the visiting artist's records. "We try to use co-op advertising so that with the help of the labels we can highlight the event in our ads."

Perhaps the most important customer draw for the store is service, according to Vanderloo. "The biggest thing is the way we treat people in the store. This spreads awareness more than anything. Someone comes in and they ask us a question and more than likely they are going to get an intelligent answer. And if we don't know, we can steer you in the right direction. Someone goes away with that and they tell their friends, and they also come back. Word of mouth is most important."

Keeping daily operations up to established standards is hard work, though. "There's too much work," Vanderloo says. "I feel as though I could be up 24 hours and not get all the work done. It has been a bigger undertaking than all three of us thought possible."

But the hard work is proving that a small store can shine through—even in the neon afterglow of the giant stores.

> GARY MYRICK & HAVANA 3AM: Texas Glitter & Tombstone Tales (Burnside BCD-0024-2), Producers: G. Myrick & 3AM. Jammi's in 1. A. Jours

Jammin' in L.A., touring the world and recording with a broad cross-section of musicians has left quite an impression on this Texan, who combines a rootsy guitar attack with some fine rhythmic diver-

sity. The songwriting/storytelling is from the gut and the delivery is strietly for fun. His self-described "spaghetti western surf with a dash of rockabilly and punk" ghoulaash style is most evident on tracks like "Imaginary Western," "Tex Pawnshop & The Tremelos" and "Teenage Mafia." The music is seasoned with more Mexican textures and rhythms on "Jimmy Was Addicted" and "Havana," and the two flavors are fused on the rowdy track "Acid Cowboy "

VARIOUS ARTISTS: Frosty (WaveForm 86104-2) Producers: various.

There's some money due to the owners of music publishing for The Beatles, Kool & The Gang and others as several of the studio/lab tracks on this compilation, eo-ops riffs liberally. That is not to say that the acts aren't inventive in their use of the borrowed material, and m some cases, the tracks are built from the ground-up. WaveForm has been building a fine catalog of ambient, trip-hop albums that meld fine rhythms with ethereal, or cool, textures. This collection is best described by its title. Opening track "Fuzz" by The Egg slaps on the bass line from "Come Together," yet the track built around it is unique and jazzy, while the Jaziae Sunflowers' "Eyes Of Love" is largely a remake of The Gang's "Summer Madness." Cuts like "TBC" by The Eff Word and Mr. Electric Triangle's "Falling" provide some original groove oriented excusions into spacy terrain. The label is going after expansive retail coverage through listening stations, end caps, a POP promotional program and requesting sectional placement in retail bins More than 1,500 radio stations and club DJs have been serviced with the album ("Falling"; is the focus track) and the collection is being advertised on the syndicated radio program Musical Starstreams

A departure from its normal punk, broken throttle, ear-hleed offerings, Alive releases this largely blues-based EP by the recently formed, L.A.-based Streetwalkin' Choetahs But there is abundant evidence that the group has the stuff for an in-your-face, balls-out album, which is reportedly what the band's forthcoming Overdrive album will be like. Tracks like "Won't Leave Me Alone" and "Built For Speed" capture some of that energy. But the quartet is more traditional on tracks like "Red River Down" and "Boxear," the latter of which features a guest turn by guitar icon Wayne Kramer. The Ep is actually meant as promotion for the band's forthcoming album, and both titles are being pumped in fanzine ads as the group plans selected West Coast performance dates in advance of the album's release.

TOP UK SINGLES: Still spicing up the charts in number one spot is Spice Girls' "Wannabe" followed by the moving up Los Del Rio's "Macarena," which jumps to two, pushing Robbie Williams' "Freedom" down to three with newcomer Eternal's "Some Day" hitting four, followed by Paul Weller's new one, "Peacock Suit" on five. Dodgy's "Good Enough" is good enough to hit six and Fugees' "Killing Me Softly" pushes down to seven with OMC's "How Bizarre" coming from lower in the charts to land on eight. Holding onto nine is Underworld's "Born Slippy" and we find, at the crossroads of number ten, Bone Thugs-N-Harmony's "The Crossroads." Alanis Morissette's Jagged Little Pill is the album most dropped in the shopping

Alanis Morissette's Jagged Little Pill is the album most dropped in the shopping cart in the UK with Bill Whelau's Riverdance—The Show still the top music video sold. Also holding their own on top are the sales video Swan Princess and Seven in the rental field. Now with the Olympics out of the way, Mega Drive's Toy Story is back on top and Super Nintendo says its top rental is Donkey Kong Country 2. And the UK's boxoffice hit is still Warner Bros./UIP's Twister (but blowing hard on it is the opening of Fox's Independence Day).

on it is the opening of Fox's *Independence Day*). Europe's top single still remains Fugee's "Killing Me Softly," which tops the charts in Austria, Belgium, Croatia, Denmark, Finland, Germany, Holland, Italy, Macedonia, Switzerland and Yugoslavia.

Fugees' album *The Score*, leads in Austria, Belgium, Holland, Germany and Norway while other albums are represented by one country each.

Check your favorite book store in the UK for Lys Symonette & Kim H. Kowalke's Speak Low (When You Speak Love): The Letters of Kurt Weill and Lotte Lenya (Hamish Hamilton). Also in the music field are Noel Ross Russell's There Will I Sing (Open Gate Press) and Geoffrey Skelton's Selected Letters of Paul Hindesmith (Yale).

Celebrating 13 weeks in the top ten UK Best Seller List is number one Jack Ramsay's SAS: The Soldiers' Story (Macmillan) on the non-fiction hardback list. Newcomer Ben Elton's Popcorn (Simon & Schuster) is the fiction hardback choice. It's a Hollywood story. Paperback non-fiction's newcomer is Bill Bryson's Notes From A Small Island (Black Swan), a personal travel book covering the UK and moving back to number one after ten weeks on the fiction list is Nicholas Evans' The Horse Whisperer (Corgi).

BULLS AND BEARS: Thorn EMI at ± 17.65 is up 3.9% and PolyGram selling for NLf 96.80 ± 37.74 is up 6.4%. Down is **Rank Organization** going for ± 4.63 , down 1.9%.

NO BEER AT THE OASIS last weekend as up to 250,000 **Oasis** fans spent the weekend listening to what is being called the biggest pop concert in the 90s. The 4-mile circumference site was favored with good weather and with giant video screens all over the place, everyone got a view of what was going on on stage, even though some were as far as half a mile from the stage. The promoters face a police bill of £400.000 even though there was little trouble. One reason given was that with up to a two-hour wait to buy a beer, most opted to enjoy themselves without liquid refreshment. The large crowd caused all-day long traffic jams and high prices all over the place and with public transportation overwhelmed, thousands were left stranded.

GREEN OASIS, as the group is scheduled to play Cork, Ireland at the end of the week. With up to 40,000 expected, the Irish bus and train systems have geared up with extra trains and busses running as far as Belfast in Northern Ireland. However, American Michael McGinn, owner of Mallow Castle, which was scheduled as the home for Oasis while they were in Ireland, has said that he didn't want them staying there.

A PENNY SAVED IS a budget label CD and Koch International has come up with a new budget label, Koch Discover International. Music covered ranges from the classical to ethnic folk like *Classical Jewish Songs From Russia* to songs by Weill and Lehar.

DROPPING OUT OF THE RANK-S are expected to be such companies as the UK's **Pinewood Studios** and **Rank Film Distributors**, which are regarded as small businesses that don't fit into the new Rank's master plans. The company's new CEO, Andrew Teare wants to restructure the company into four core units under the name of **The Rank Group**, **PIc** which will replace **Rank Organization**. Among others to be dropped will be the company's £930 million stake in **Rank Xerox**. Teare wants to concentrate on Rank's film and entertainment retailing services, holiday, recreation and theme restaurants like the **Hard Rock Cafe**. Marketing analysts expressed disappointment at the scale of changes thus far announced, however. Teare pointed out that he has been with the company only three months and it's asking too much to restructure a company in that short a time. Teare has been with several other companies where he specialized in disposing of subsidiaries that didn't fit into the so-called grand picture. He's expected to drop off Rank businesses worth some £1.6 billion, leaving money to concentrate on Rank's core businesses.

GIMME YOUR LIP as the deal was completed between the UK's **Boosey & Hawkes**, music publishers and instrument manufacturers and California's Rico **International**, which was founded in 1936. Rico makes some 26 million reeds a year for saxophones and clarinets and holds some 70% of the U.S. market and 50% of the world markets. Sales price was reported at £17.9 million. Last year Rico made pre-tax profits of £1.7 million off sales of £11 million.

BOOSEY AND THE MOUSE: No, it's not a new **Disney** movie, it's just a U.S. court case in which **Boosey & Hawkes** took Disney to court eoneerning the use of copyrights in video versions of their films. The court ruled that the rights to use **Igor Stravinsky**'s "Rites of Spring" in the film *Fantasia* covered only the 1939 film's release. Boosey bought the rights to Stravinsky's works in 1947 and claimed that Disney failed to negotiate video rights with them. In 1991, Peggy Lee won her case against Disney for using her voice in *The Lady Is A Tranp*, winning her claim that the company only paid for her singing in the film, not the video.

FORGIVE ME FATHER could be the opening lyrics of Germany's Lazarus Society's new CD-ROM, *The Confession*. Users select as many sins as they want from a list of 200 (soon to be increased) and for each sin they receive a number. When "confession" is completed, the computer totals up the numbers and then spits out the correct penance. Some people in the Catholic Church say it ain't kosher and others worry about putting priests out of work

HOW USEFUL IS THE REALLY USEFUL GROUP? Well, ask Sir Andrew Lloyd Webber who reportedly has taken a 63% pay cut this year. But don't cry for him, Argentina, he's still taking home some \$60 million a year. Blame is put on the fact that he hasn't come up with a new show since *Sunset Boulevard* and there is a slowing down trend for the old standbys *Cats, Phantom of the Opera* and *Starlight Express*, all of which seemingly have been running forever.

HIGH FLYERS: A new art form has been born in Ireland as the "4 To The Floor" exhibition of promotional night club flyers opens in Dublin's trendy **Temple Bar** area. 4 To The Floor is the name of a certain kind of house-music beat. And most of the flyers usually end up on the floor. The night club flyers, given out all over town have been recognized as a legitimate marketing tool and this year two Irish Creative and Advertising Design Awards were given for flyer design.

UP AGAINST THE WALL with the finalists of the Mercury Music Prize's Album Cover Award. This year's contestants were students of art and design from all over the UK and they had to come up with CD covers illustrating the theme of a celebration of music. Show is running at London's The Gallery until the end of September.

GIMME THAT OLD TIME MUSIC: Not that old; Greek musician **Panos Viagopoulos** has succeeded in building a "hydraulis." the grand-daddy of the modern church organ. The last time anyone played a hydraulis was around 100 A.D., so there aren't too many critics around to judge Viagopoulos' playing. The instrument uses a metal tank of water and a pump to maintain air pressure instead of the modern bellows.

GREEC-ING THE WAY: Chicago-based **Teros Gaming** has invested more than \$10 million in a new casino outside the town of Patras in Greece. For a while there was doubt if the government would grant the final permit. But the company said it would donate 2% of the casino's gross income to the local authorities as well as make a donation of a quarter of a percent of house winnings for Greek earthquake relief.

HABLO ESPANOL? Well, if you want to make big bucks in Spain, the two most profitable businesses in Spain are cinema houses and undertaking, not necessarily in that order. On the other hand, keep away from the arts as the government is set to cut the subsidies given to the music and film industries by past governments.

ARE YOU HUNGARY? Well, comes October in Budapest, you can eat at McDonalds and Burger King as well as buy your CDs at Virgin Megastore and rest your footsies at the Village Roadshow's cineplex. The Duna Plaza is Hungary's first "American-type" mall and expects to serve more than 50,000 a day to start.

WHERE THE BOYS ARE: Well, they're not at the top of the charts, that's for sure. Earlier this year the boy bands were still the hottest thing in town but all of a sudden the girl bands, led by the Spice Girls have knocked them off their high perches. Three weeks ago their debut single "Wannabe" knocked **Take That**'s former lead singer **Gary Barlow** off the top spot and then the following week they forced ex-Take That's **Robbie Williams** down to two. In the first three weeks the single sold more than 700,000 and in the fourth week it was still top of the charts. **Virgin Records** is smug about having their girl group and other labels are looking around tor one of their own.

PUT 'EM ALL TOGETHER AND WHAT DO WE GET? Why, a compilation album. *The Best Of...The Top Songs Of...*etc. Nowadays there are so many of them, not only on legit labels, but pirate ones as well and lots of artists are making big bucks by selling their songs off to compilation albums. If they were listed on the album charts, industry analysts say they'd have almost a third of the chart. And the business is estimated at more than £250 million a year.

TriStar's Fan, A Dark Fascination

Robert De Niro is an obsessed baseball fanatic and Wesley Snipes his objective in The Fan.

WHEN DOES A GAME ccase to be a game and when does a fan cross the line into fanaticism?---When the players are paid too many millions of dollars and the fans dig deeper into their pockets to pay out of adoration and adulation. Just read the papers.

Or, for a less simplistic explanation read Peter Abrahams' book The Fan and go see Tony Scott's interpretation of it on the screen. It's all there in varying degrees but with each point sharpened and honed like the knives Robert Dc Niro's character peddles: The effect a \$40 million salary has on the sportscasters, players, fans and their families; what's a true fan and what's a game fan, and the consequences when one of those fans steps across the line into obsession. It's a fascinating, Tony Scott-styled work with the characters brutally rooted in fact, psyches explored through piercing and multi-layered performances from De Niro and Wesley Snipes, a Hans Zimmer score which is a map of characters and story in itself and simply an expert job of filmmaking.

There's never any doubt that it's Tony Scott at the helm. That's good and bad. Bad in that, often that calls attention away from the whole of the piece.

Were the cast not as forceful as they are, the director-as-star element would detract to the detriment of the film as a complete entity. Fortunately Scott works with actors the caliber of Dc Niro and Snipes, Benicio Del Toro and John Leguizama here (Denzel Washington and Gene Hackman in last year's Crimson Tide) whose forces and strengths demand they be paid attention to. When Scott comes in contact with powers like these, you're in for a treat; not so when the talent's not quite up to Scott's level of style or the material flounders, as Phoef Sutton's script seems to do in the final quarter measure here-this could be due to, I suspect, some editing for time. Also, this is the good because it's where Scott's imposing style covers the missing moments impressively.

The attitudes brought to their characters by De Niro and Snipes are often mind-bending. In the course of a fifteen-minute period you can feel sorry for, empathize with, fear, love, hate and pity De Niro. He's an abusive-loving father; a control freak one moment, beggar losing his job the next; frozen on the couch depressive and a split second later a knife-throwing killer, a man lost and a man obsessively determined. Balancing that act as the overpaid baseball player is Snipes, causing you to sneer at his verbal arrogance while supporting his visual inner fear and weakness. He's a nice guy one moment, a browbeating star snob the next, self-obsessed bastard then loving father. Both actors manipulate the audience wonderfully because we discover that we feel, anyway, that we like them and on some level, understand their angst-whether completely or not is another matter, but we are with them. Excellent work.

No less solid are Benicio Del Toro as a rival team member, the focus of Snipes' irritation, and John Leguizamo the high-powered agent. Ellen Barkin does a turn as a radio talk show host bridging the gap between street fans and players by asking the hard questions

Dariusz Wolski's photography often attempts to go into the actors' heads, giving us a claustrophobic feel, as if we're trapped in the same tormented maelstrom as De Niro's character while Zimmer's score assures us that we're experiencing what he's experiencing. This is expertly edited together by Christian Wagner and Claire Simpson.

When an audience walks out of the theatrc, in spite of the end sequence being flooded with Scott's fascination with rain, you'll want to breathe deeply to free yourself. It's a contender.

Par's Brady Sequel Is 'Cool'

BELLBOTTOM PANTS, PLATFORM SHOES, Ma's helmet hair that can't be styled with a chainsaw. You bet your bippy, the Bradys are back, blissfully oblivious to the travails of the nineties and happier than clams in a sherry sauce.

Paramount's A Very Brady Sequel captures the same loopy warmth the merged families exuded so successfully in The Brady Bunch Movie and undoubtedly this will bring 'em in at the boxoffice enough to spawn a sequel-sequel. Could be another Paramount franchise. Between Star Trek and the Bradys Par's sitting pretty. This one also gets plugs in for Gilligan's Island (already set for feature filming) and I Dream Of Jeannie, along with a myriad of other references back to the original 1969-1974 series—which, incidentally, is still running somewhere, right this moment! As we speak! Somewhere in the world the original Brady Bunch is being shown and it's never been off the air! You don't think they can cull an audience from that? If you don't, then you've got your head in the seventies, wrapped in polyester.

And I defy you to leave the theatre after seeing this and not have series creator Sherwood Schwartz & Frank DeVol's theme song, "The Brady Bunch" haunt you for the next 48 hours. If you can do that, you've got a hard heart, Hannah.

Sure, there's a built-in audience for this, of all ages. Even the very, very youngsters at the screening know the Bradys and the oldsters who grew up with them seemed just as anticipatory. Perhaps part of their charm is that they overcome adversity simply by ignoring their surroundings and the audiences want to do the same, if only for an hour and a half. Another part is the spirit of fun with which the filmmakers imbue the project, from the on-screen performances to the spirited color designs of production designer Cynthia Charette and the bright photography of DP Mac Ahlberg. The whole thing is *Fun*!

Screenplay by Harry Elfont & Deborah Kaplan and James Berg & Stan Zimmerman from a story by Elfont and Kaplan has Carol Brady's, Shelley Long, first husband (ostensibly) and the girls' (Christine Taylor, Jennifer Elise Cox and Olivia Hack) long-lost father, Tim Matheson, return. Mike Brady, Gary Cole, and sons Christopher Daniel Barnes, Paul Sutera and Jesse Lee stoically invite him into the home as a guest and the troubles begin. All in good fun and delightfully so with Alice's, Henriette Mantel, meatloaf and spaghetti with Matheson's hallucinatory mushrooms. Needless to say, so let's not waste any time there, all works out well. Script references old series episodes, as did the first one, other series and other characters, all highly recognizable. Several tributes are paid to creator Sherwood Schwartz along the way.

This bunch of actors are terrific, playing in another era, practically a time and sense warp. They *are* the Bradys, and sustaining that design without dipping *somewhere* along the line into at least a partial parody mode is simply super-groovy-cool—damned fine acting: oops, sorry; *darned* fine acting.

Arlene Sanford makes her feature film directorial debut here, moving out from her work in TV for which she's picked up a CableACE Award as Best Director for her work on *Dream On*. She was a solid choice for this assignment.

Composer Guy Moon's original score is wonderfully supplemented with some classic period 8-track populars: "Sugar, Sugar," "Brandy (You're A Fine Girl)," "Good Morning Starshine" and others to make up a collectible soundtrack.


ROBI DRACO ROSA: Vagabundo (Sony Latin, 81929) Producer: Phil Manzanera. ROCK.

YVONNE: THE PRINCESS OF MER-

ENGUE: The Puerto Rican songstress of merengue, **Yvonne**, graced the City of the Angels recently. An exclusive recording artist for the Miamibased indie label, **MP Records**, she flew in from her home in Puerto Rico as part of a promotional tour. She also gave a concert appearance at the annual "Fiesta del Sol" event on Aug. 4th at Whittier Narrows Park in the nearby city of Rosemead. Ten thousand people were in attendance. Yvonne signed autographs for several hundred admirers alone. The vivacious vocalist was asked to return next year with her full orchestra.

With two hit albums under her belt, Yvonne evokes the image of a natural born entertainer. Her first album *Segueme* brought the singer to the forefront of the merengue stage. "El Poder de las Mujeres" served to clinch Yvonne's position as a heavyweight in the market. Quite an accomplishment since competition is tremendously fierce, especially in Puerto Rico. Says Yvonne, "On the island itself, there are 54 actively working merengue bands alone, at lult power, we like to party!" The artist has done exactly that throughout the U.S. and Latin America as well.

Yvonne appeared on Channel 22's TV show Facilisimo where she attracted the highest viewer ratings for that program since the airing of the *Fiesta Broadway* event (earlier in the year). Says Yvonne, "It was really happening, there was a lot of energy, lots of it." Another show, *Hola LA*, on Channel 52 asked her to perform three songs instead of the one that had been scheduled earlier. The music video program, *Salsa Showcase*, on Channel 38 plans to air the second portion of their interview with the singer. They likewise received numerous call-ins from their viewers. Telemundo's (locally on Channel 52) *Hora Lunatica* with hosf **Humberto Luna**. The singer's warm and infectious personality easily allowed her to score hit after hit across all of these mediums.

Yvonne also caused quite a furious frenzy at salsa mght spots like Vasilio's in Downey, Limon y Menta in Glendale, and the Mayan in downtown L.A. Fans and new admirers crowded around the "Princesa del Merengue" anxiously seeking a promotional single or autograph. True to her followers, Princess Yvonne would not hear of disappointing any of her loyal subjects.

During her radio promotions, Yvonne's interview on the bilingual 112,000 watt salsa show, *Canto Tropical*, 90.7 FM, KPFK, was heard throughout the Southland. Says co-host Armando Nila, "Listeners from San Diego, Palni Springs, Orange County, to Santa Barbara were calling in and dying to speak with her. It's like if we had announced we were giving away money or candy!" After her interview on radio station KRTO 98.3 FM, *La Naeva Ritmo* aired her hit single "El Poder de las Mujeres," no less than thirty times within a three week period primarily due to females requesting the song.

The man who made this public relations dream a reality was MP's West Coast representative, **Carlos Montani**, who's based in Los Angeles. Says Montani, "Yvonne will be one of the biggest stars in Puerto Rico and the Latin market in general 1 can say this because of her awesome talent. She is an incredible performer on stage. Being the only female merengue artist on our label. I am very proud to have her with our company. Yvonne is a great talent, a terrific person, and has the uncanny ability to attract people to her. There are very few artists who immediately make you feel at ease, as if you're on a one on one relationship."

Perhaps her training as a teacher (English as a second language) evokes these kind of feelings. The proud mother of two daughters, Yvonne amazingly juggles her career with her personal life. She is very close with her lovely young girls spending lots of quality time with them.

Born in New Jersey, Yvonne's childhood was influenced by American rock, R&B, Motown, and other pop artists. Her family later moved to Puerto Rico. There Yvonne was drawn into the world of merengue by a friend who insisted on her participation. Says Yvonne, "I learned to feel merengue music, to love it, and to embrace it as my own." With definite plans to visit the Dominican Republic with ideas for new music. Yvonne expressed a desire to record with the renowned Dominican producer, Manuel Tejada. "I want to go there and explore the roots (of merengue)," says Yvonne.

Future plans and dreams include crossing-over one day. For merengue to do that, says the singer, would require some changes, but the result would be exciting. Another goal would be to become an actress. She had studied when she was in college and actually won a scholarship to a New York college "That's been one of the greatest things I have regretted," remarks Yvonne "Who knows where I would be right now." Imagine Yvonne with Marc Anthony in a remake of *Cross Over Dreams*!

Yvonne plans on entering the recording studio by the end of this year. Her third album for next year promises to be as exciting, eclectic, and, of course, as powerful as the woman herself.

Music video unit shipments rose 62.2%, 7.3 million from 4.5 million a year ago. Dollar value for the configuration was up to \$101.7 million from \$93.7 million in the first half of last year, a shift of 8.5%.

Vinyl, the forgotten configuration, showed a 20% increase in unit sales (up to 1.2 million from 1 million) and a 43% dollar value increase (\$14.3 million from \$10 million in '95's first half). Vinyl singles dropped slightly in unit sales, 3.5% or to 5.5 million units compared to 5.7 million in '95, but registered a dollar value increase of 6.7%, up to \$25.6 million in '96 compared to \$24 million during the same period a year ago.

IMAGINARY ROAD A REALITY: Will Ackerman, the impresario that co-founded new age/jazz label Windham Hill Records, and the label's former vp of A&R, Dawn Atkinson, have formed Imaginary Road Records, a joint venture with PolyGram Classics & Jazz and the Philips Music Group. Ackerman will serve as CEO and Atkinson will be president of the acoustic-oriented label.

Imaginary Road will focus on contemporary instrumental music and seek to sign singer/songwriters with classical and folk influences. The company's initial releases include *The Chant Of Christmas Midnight*, a holiday album of Gregorian Chants, and albums by singer/songwriter **Frank Tedesso** and guitarist **Rob Eberhard-Young**. A Different Mozart, a compilation of the composer's works interpreted by contemporary instrumentalists, is currently being produced by Atkinson for October, 1996 release.

And maybe it's time it turned around. Rosie O'Donnell's *Rosie* has rolled out a good sized afternoon wave without as much pollution as a Santa Monica beach.

And if the press conference at Beverly Hills' Four Seasons Hotel announcing *Naomi* is any indication, the show will be a definite air freshener in that stale talk show bus. Quincy Jones, introducing Naomi Judd remarked that "If anybody can endure the road…because the road, sometimes you don't grow on it, it grows on you…" can survive this milieu.

From that point on Naomi Judd took over. She worked the press like she'd work a playdate—or perhaps a TV show?—by taking a remote mic rather than remaining with the others on the dais and fielding questions, the lady, belying the fact, even up close, she's a grandmother, moved freely among the floor making direct communication with her questioners.

She's comfortable, down-homey, with a quick wit and a caring, concerned patina. Relating the history of the show she revealed she'd been pitched for Daytime TV up to two years prior. "Thanks, but no thanks," was the reply, "1'm into real people and real life."

Her agent said, "Hear me out, you have an extremely high TV Q." For those not in the know, the "Q" is a Quotient draw listing that is rumored *not* to exist. "Do I need shots?" Judd queried.

The upshot of it all is that some people felt Naomi Judd, after her years on the road, traversing this country as a performer and on the lecture circuit, has a direct touch with "people." Perhaps people who watch daytime TV, or at least, people who might watch daytime TV *because of* Naomi Judd.

With QDE and Quincy Jones and David Salzman backing, Judd said yes.

It promises to be an interesting ride. Phil Donahue, attempting to retain some sort of dignity, had the switch thrown on his long running show. *Oprah*, another QDE product, slipped recently in not stooping to the current trend, but she's still strong.

QDE and Rysher aren't in the habit of backing something remotely iffy. QDE's history includes the aformentioned *Oprah*, *Fresh Prince of Bel Air*, *In The House*, *MAD-TV*, '96's Academy Awards, upcoming motion pictures, magazine publishing, live music entertainment venues, interactive content and broadcast television station ownership. Rysher, established in 1991, has built a literal empire in that short time encompassing network programming and first-run syndication with TV shows including *Highlander: The Series*, *F/X—The Series, The Hitchhiker* and *Saved By The Bell*. On Network TV, the Fox Series VR.5 and the new Nash Bridges and are currently represented in the feature film market place with *Escape From L.A.* International Television Distribution is a strong area for Rysher also with product placed in more than 100 countries worldwide.

Gearing up for a Fall debut, we'll see if *positive* will sell in one of the most decidedly *non*-positive areas of entertainment.

possum is still sober, but with "Honky Tonk Song," he's liable to make radio drunk with gratitude for coming back to his calling.

DERYL DODD: "Friends Don't Drive Friends..." (Columbia 67544)

Continuing with the drinking theme, newcomer Deryl Dodd puts a tear in your beer with his debut single. He's lost his girl and his best friend-to each other. Just when you're about to reach for that razor. Dodd opens his mouth and out comes a voice straight from honky tonk heaven. Dodd's deft note-bending will gain him many converts among the traditional crowd.

DIAMOND RIO: "It's All In Your Head'' (Arista ASCD-3019)

If Bobbie Gentry's "Ode To Billy Joc" moves along in first gear, then "It's All In Your Head" runs in overdrive. Like Gentry's tale, Diamond Rio's tune is rooted in Southern imagery. But unlike "Ode," it's





Gill Scores Seven CMA Noms

VINCE GILL REALLY IS the host with the most—CMA nominations, that is. Gill, host for "The 30th Annual CMA Awards," racked up seven nods. This year's nominees were announced by Lorrie Morgan and Marty Stuart at a press conference at the Grand Ole Opry House courtyard August 13.

Winning CMA awards is nothing new to Gill. The MCA recording artist holds the esteem of being the top award winner (15 thus far) in CMA history. Gill's nominations were expected but the 1996 list of honorces is not without a few surprises. Alison Krauss, first-time CMA nominee and winner of four awards last year, is nowhere to be found in '96. And CMA nom regular **Reba McEntire** did not make the cut in the Female Vocalist of the Year or Entertainer

of the Year categories.
