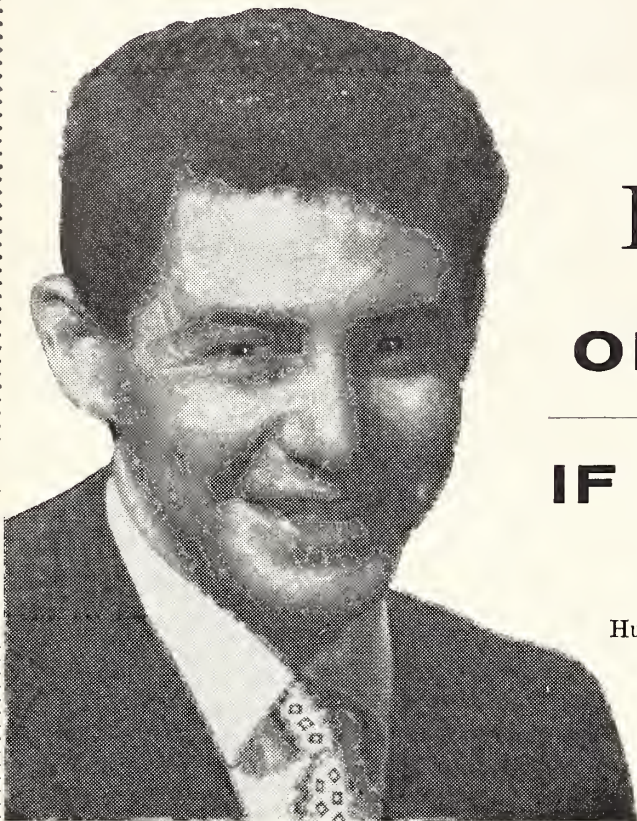

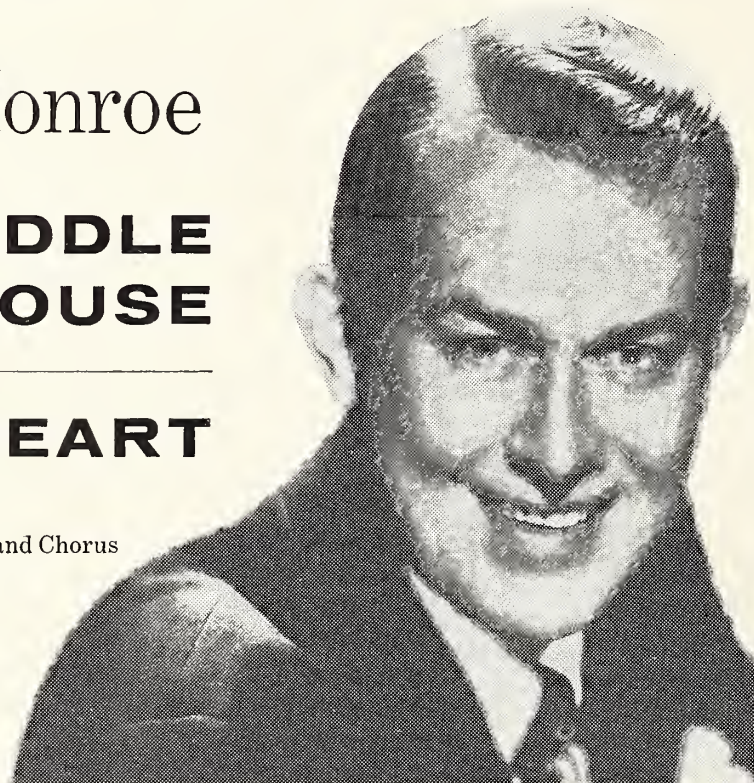

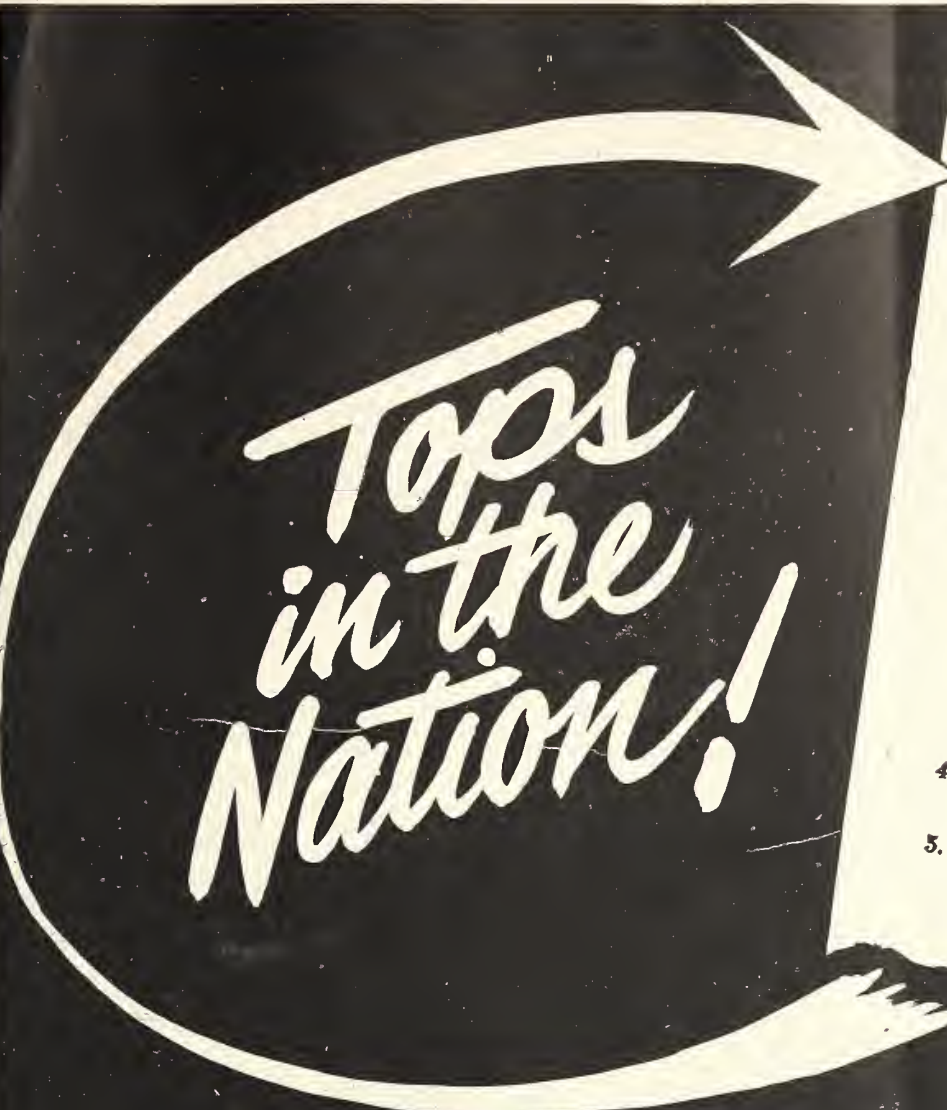

BUDDY GRECO

(Kapp 155; K-155)

B+ "LOVE DON'T BE A STRANGER" (3:00) [Dorsey Bros. ASCAP—Linsley, Ross, Ross] Buddy Greco comes thru with one of his strongest sides in a long while as he belts out a potent rock and roll beat ballad that should please the kids. Sy Oliver and a chorus provide an excellent backdrop. Good side to watch.

C+ "IN TIME TO COME" (2:26) [E. H. Morris ASCAP—Leigh, Singer] Buddy is smooth on this end as he chants an interesting sophisticated ballad.

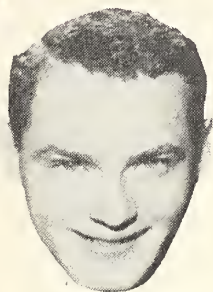

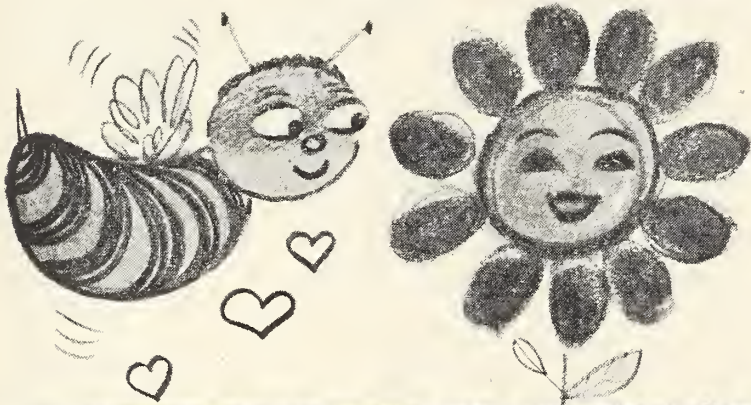

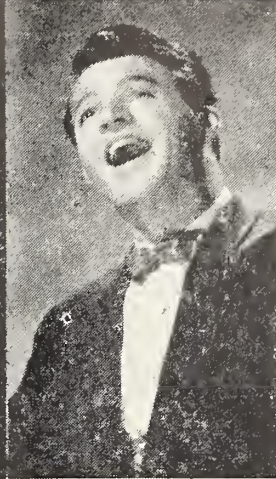

The new high fidelity merchandise includes the following:

Capitol of the World—Classical: "A Spanish Guitar Recital," with Maria Luisa Anido; Bizet's "Symphony In C Major and Jaux d' Enfants," featuring the London Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Emmanuel Young; Dukas' "La Pari" and "Sorcerer's Apprentice" and Saint-Saens "Omphale's Spinning Wheel," by the orchestra of the Paris Opera, conducted by Robert Benedetti; Elgar's "Sea Pictures" and "In the South," performed by the London Symphony Orchestra, con-

ducted by George Weldon, and featuring the voice of Gladys Ripley, contralto; and Sibelius' "Symphony No. 2 in D Major," by the N. W. D. R. (Northwest Deutsche Rundfunk) orchestra, conducted by Schmidt-Isserstedt.

Record Releasing Corporation Set Up Similarly To United Artists Movie Co.

LOS ANGELES, CALIF.—The Record Releasing Corporation, an independent West Coast company has announced an entirely new record producing set-up whereby recording artists can become the owners of their own label and thereby benefit from the capital gains clause of the tax laws. This is similar to the manner in which Hollywood film stars have gone into independent film producing firms.

The RRC has been designed along the lines of the United Artists Movie Distribution Company. It will have its own chain of distributors and will not invest any monies in the actual production of the recording. RRC will make its money from a percentage fee which it will charge for handling the distribution.

The Record Releasing Corp. is headed by William Bowers, president; and Guy Ward, Vice president. Lynn Bowers will be in charge of RRC's publicity and promotion; Ruby Rasnik in charge of A & R.

It is reported that many free lance artists and artists whose contracts expire in the near future have shown interest in the new idea.

RRC has forty distribs throughout the country. All an artist is required to do is bring to RRC tapes for a two sided disk. The company will take it from there.

Bowers, who owns Sunset and Starlite Records, stated that the RRC operation will function entirely independently of Sunset and Starlite Records.

"OH, ROSALINDA—A Direct Recording From The Sound Track—Featuring The Voices Of Sari Barabas, Alexander Young, Dennis Dowling, Walter Berry And The Weiner Symphoniker Orchestra—MG 20145 (1-12" LP)

"Oh, Rosalinda" is an English film version of the old Strauss opus, "Die Fledermaus". It has been brought up to date, but the plot still retains most of its humorous ingenuity. Happily, too, the infectious Strauss melodies have had their eternal freshness kept intact. The film features such stars as Michael Redgrave and Mel Ferrer. Almost all the singing roles in the production, with the exception of Michael Redgrave, are sung by others than the speaking principals. Mr. Redgrave displays a very agreeable tenor voice in his role as Eisenstein. The Wiener Symphoniker Orchestra is joyfully in the spirit of things as well as are all the dubbed-in singers. Another version of "Die Fledermaus", recently seen on TV was labeled "Rosalinda" and will undoubtedly increase sales of this disk substantially.

"Solo Mood" comes on the heels of Weston's similar "breakaway" from other mood disks, "Mood For 12". Using the slow, wistful delivery of the latter tune as a base, the listener delights in Miss Page's versatility in branching out to the novelty ("Money, Marbles And Chalk") and rhythm ("Now That I'm In Love") selections. With Patti at the peak of her fame, the entry should enjoy solid sales. The title tune is Patti's lovely theme.

"NIGHT OUT MUSIC FOR STAY-AT-HOMES"—Featuring Nat King Cole, Errol Garner, Matt Dennis, Cy Coleman and Billy Taylor—Coral CRL 57040 (1-12" LP)

SWEET LORRAINE; SLOW DOWN; YESTERDAYS; LOOT TO BOOT; GASLIGHT; BLACK LACE; JUST A GIRL THAT MEN FORGET; THE LONESOMEST WHISTLE; DARN THAT DREAM; MY HEART STOOD STILL; CAPRICE; SABIA.

Coral has assembled five familiar jazz-pop names and have come up with a sophisticated mood music platter. Some of the recordings, the Nat "King" Cole and Errol Garner sessions in particular, go back a number of years. But both offered class jazz techniques in those early years and the items on this disk have both boys in fine form. Matt Dennis, Billy Taylor and his Quartet and the Cy Coleman Trio are also on their Sunday best with their own brand of musical intimacy. The disk has name value and a solid mood-jazz sales potential.

"THE MEDICINE MAN FOR THE BLUES . . ."—Ted Lewis And His Orchestra—Decca DL 8322 (1-12" LP)

WHEN MY BABY SMILES AT ME; SHE'S FUNNY THAT WAY; I'M THE MEDICINE MAN FOR THE BLUES; JAZZ ME BLUES; TIGER RAG; WEAR A HAT WITH A SILVER LINING; JUST AROUND THE CORNER; DOWN THE OLD CHURCH AISLE; SWEETHEART OF SIGMA CHI; THREE O'CLOCK IN THE MORNING; GOOD NIGHT.

With 40 some-odd years behind him in show business, Ted Lewis still ranks as one of the most popular entertainers in show business. Because Lewis' show business personality retains a timeless formula (i.e. sentiment and a happy philosophy) he appeals to millions young and old. This Decca release contains the familiar happy-go-lucky Lewis style blended into his sincere voice, caught on by his orchestra and interpreted through sturdy material. Here's an entertaining peek into the past and into the present too. The Lewis following will consider this session a must.

"MY HEART IS IN VIENNA"—The Stradivariety Orchestra Under The Direction Of Louis Marischal—Epic LN 3241 (1-12" LP)

THE DANUBE; BLOSSOMS, RED AND WHITE; A VIENNESE WALTZ; ALL THE TIME; VIENNA IS LOVELIEST AT NIGHT; MY MOTHER WAS BORN IN VIENNA; SAY GOODBYE MY VIENNA; BROTHER AND SISTER; SAY YES, MY DARLING, SAY YES; THE WORLD IS WONDERFUL; CASTLE IN THE MOON; IN THE MOONLIGHT IN VIENNA.

The association of music and Vienna is a famous and notable one. This Epic entry features The Stradivariety Orchestra directed by Louis Marischal in 12 lesser heard items suggesting the city. The ork has a schmaltzy finesse that, of course, fits the occasion perfectly. Those who look fondly upon such sentimental waltzes, and the mood music crowd, are the set's principal audience. Attractive cover.

"HAL McINTYRE'S BEST"—Camden CAL-302 (1-12" LP)

AUTUMN SERENADE; SOUTH BAYOU SHUFFLE; THE COMMANDO'S SERENADE; SENTIMENTAL JOURNEY; SINGING IN THE RAIN; HOUR OF PARTING; SWANEE RIVER; DAISY MAE; FRIDAY AFTERNOON; PLAY 249; PETER, PETER, PUMPKIN EATER; MY FUNNY VALENTINE.

Another Camden dip into the Victor shellac catalogue uncovers the bright band arrangements of Hal McIntyre and his Orchestra. The disk displays an impressive rhythm section on such pieces as "Friday Afternoon" and "Singing In The Rain". Other arrangements are designed for dancing and include two vocal chores. A name aggregation and the Camden price make this waxing good competition for higher priced sets in the same field.

"GRETA"—Greta Keller—Heritage LP-H-1208 (1-12" LP)

I GET ALONG WITHOUT YOU VERY WELL; WHEN THE SUN GOES DOWN BEHIND THE ROOFTOPS; BE NICE TO ME; THESE FOOLISH THINGS; CLOSE YOUR EYES; AT THE OPERA BALL IN VIENNA; WITH YOUR HAND IN MY HAND; A LOVE LETTER; LAZY AFTERNOON; C'EST MAGNIFIQUE; ONE FOR MY BABY; UNDER THE TREES OF THE OLD LANE; THIS TIME IT MUST BE LOVE.

Those who enjoy the song stylings of Greta Keller have a prize package in this Heritage release. On the pressing Miss Keller sings a mixture of Continental (German and French) and American melodies. Though it may seem that Miss Keller would be more at home with the former selections, it is with the latter that she makes the deepest impression. In this department her most able intimate feeling is transmitted on Hoagy Carmichael's "I Get Along Without You Very Well" and John Latouche's "Lazy Afternoon". There's a limited but quick sales audience for the set.

LATIN RHYTHMS

"CUBAN CARNIVAL"—Tito Puente And His Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM-1251 (1-12" LP)

ELEGUA CHANGO; WHAT'S THE IDEA; FOR DANCERS; WHAT IS IT; LISTEN TO THE GUAGUANCO; YAMBEQUE; HAPPY CHA-CHA; MAMBO BUDAL CHA-CHA DE POLLOS; GUAGUANCO MARGARITO; CUBAN FANTASY.

Tito Puente and the ork take a slight detour from the normal run of Puente pressings with this Victor release. Puente, who is notably associated with the current cha-cha-cha, mambo, merengue craze, is heard in 11 exciting, colorful rhythms of Cuba. These numbers, incidentally, include a few cha-chas and mambos. But it is the basic, percussion-minded numbers that are of major interest here; and they're played with all their rhythmic worth by Puente. Good sound. Undoubtedly, Puente's fame will account for healthy sales.

JAZZ

"JAZZ FESTIVAL"—Various Artists—Kapp KS-1

MOUNTAIN GREENERY; THEY DIDN'T BELIEVE ME; YESTERDAYS; WHAT'S NEW; WHY CAN'T YOU BEHAVE; HIGH STREET STEPS; THE SONG IS ENDED; WILL YOU STILL BE MINE; YOU'RE AN OLD SMOOTHIE; EV'RY TIME; LOUISE; SUNNY SIDE UP.

Jazz or otherwise, this waxing is one of the most worthwhile efforts to be offered at a special "sampler" price. Kapp has quite a jazz roster and the 12 selections feature them in top-notch form. The unique harmony of The Hi-Lo's is heard in "They Didn't Believe Me", Ruth Price sings an expressive "Ev'ry Time", and Matt Dennis has fun through his "Will You Still Be Mine". Instrumentally, there are fine innovations by The Dave Pell Octet in "Mountain Greenery", The Art Harris Trio with "What's New" and the George Wettling Jazz Trio in "Louise". At \$1.49 this pressing is a sure-fire sales treasure.

New York Dealers See Decca Fall Line

Brennan And Goodman Leave For Montreal For Salesmen-Distributor Meetings

NEW YORK—Decca Records presented its new fall product at a show and party for record dealers in the Hotel New Yorker on Wednesday, August 1st. Between the hours of 12 noon and 12 midnight more than 500 guests viewed and listened to the new Decca record and phonograph lines. Guests included leading record dealers from the entire New York Metropolitan area. Also present were many disk jockeys from the area, as well as several top Decca recording artists. The dealer meeting was hosted by Al Simpson, Eastern Division Manager; Lou Sebok and James McDonald, Assistant Division Managers; Ed Hurley, New York Branch Manager; and salesmen from the New York branch. Also present were representatives

from several of the other Decca branches, and executives from Decca's national office. Similar "open house" meetings, at which dealers were introduced to the Decca fall line, were held in Hartford, Newark, Philadelphia, Boston and Washington, D. C.

Claude Brennan and Stanley Goodman, Decca Records sales execs, last week flew to Montreal where they will conduct a meeting attended by the company's Canadian salesmen and distributors. At the confab Brennan and Goodman will present the fall promotion to the Canadian Decca representatives. This promotion, among the most extensive in the company's history, will be based on the simultaneous release of 52 new 12-inch Decca LP's.

Kapp Announces August-September Packages

NEW YORK—Kapp Records announced its August-September package plans this week. Twelve new albums are scheduled for release, bringing the Kapp catalogue up to 46 12-inch albums.

Special merchandising aids were announced in conjunction with the release including points of sale display, deejay promotions, and a new sales tool for distributor salesmen.

Kapp, fast growing independent, also announced that plans for the October, November and December selling period were very ambitious and were already in the works.

Mooney Waxes Dean Tribute

NEW YORK—Art Mooney, MGM Records star, who became fast friends with the late Jimmie Dean when Mooney was in Hollywood last year to make the MGM flic, "The Opposite Sex," has released a coupling paying tribute to Dean, killed last year in an automobile accident.

The tunes are themes from two of Dean's pictures: "Rebel Without A Cause", and "East of Eden." MGM has sent the record out with a jacket decorated with scenes from both pictures and a large photo of Dean.

Henry Okun has been retained to exploit the disk. Art Mooney, now in the Midwest, will contact deejays and TV stations.

Addy Set Up Dot NAMM Booth

NEW YORK—Dot Records was one of the few record companies who exhibited at the recent NAMM show in this city.

The booth was very attractively decorated and the subject of much comment. To Mickey Addy, of the promotion department of Dot, goes the credit for setting up the displays. One record company made Addy an offer to decorate its booths for forthcoming conventions.

Iversen In Civilian Defense

NEW YORK—Bob Iversen, executive vice president of Southern and Peer Music, was one of the key men in the entire Civilian Defense operation during the mock air attack a few weeks ago.

His job was to keep track of each municipality in Bergen County, N. J., to see when it was mobilized, check on "casualties," and keep tabs on the entire operation during the mock attack. The *Sunday News* carried an almost full-page feature, one of the pictures showing Iversen at his post.

Myers Records For Waldorf

PHILADELPHIA—James E. Myers who, under the pen name of Jimmy DeKnight, wrote "Rock Around the Clock" with Max Freedman, has reverted to his prewar days recording twelve sides for Waldorf Records, New York label.

The billing will read Jimmy DeKnight and his Rock Around the Clock Orchestra. Tunes cut are two DeKnight originals: "Rattle My Bones" and "Toole-Oo Kangaroo" plus "Corine Corina," "My Blue Heaven," "Boppin' the Blues," "Roll Over Beethoven," "Hallelujah I Love Her," "Rip It Up," "Steady Teddy"; "Stranded In The Jungle," "Can't We Be Sweethearts," and "Fever".

Coral Moves N.Y. Distrib Office

NEW YORK—Coral Records announced this week that effective July 31, its new distributing office for the New York area will be located at 50-15 Queens Boulevard, Queens, L. I.

Howard Kaye, branch manager, said: "With these expanded and modern facilities at our disposal we will be in a position to offer more complete and expedient service."

Phil Chess, tremendously enthused over these disks and the processes used in their recording reported:

"We believe this new sound will enable the listener to better enjoy jazz at home."

All Quiet On The "Flying Saucer" Front

NEW YORK — Like yesterday's newspaper, the trade in general seems to have lost interest in the famous "Flying Saucer" affair. There is an occasional "Is there anything new?", but on the whole it has burnt itself out in a fury of charges and counter-charges.

All the action is now centered on the sales activity of the disk itself. The "Flying Saucer", in the short space of a couple of weeks, has become one of the nation's best sellers, resting formidably in the number four spot of the "Top Fifty". In the national rhythm and blues sales charts it has taken over the number five spot.

The story about the trade is that Warren Troob and Saul Goodman, representing Luniverse Records, have made a deal with the Harry Fox office, representing the publishers. At presstime Troob, when reached, refused to comment, and Julian Abeles, attorney for Fox, was out of town. Some of the stories about the settlement have come from parties very close to the picture.

Both Goodman and Buchanan were in touch with The Cash Box this week and reiterated their plans to build Luniverse into an important label. They will shortly release another record by another artist, and will follow with another Goodman and Buchanan release at the proper time.

New N. Y. Distributor

"CLIFFORD BROWN AND MAX ROACH AT BASIN STREET"—EmArcy MG 36070 (1-12" LP)

WHAT IS THIS THING CALLED LOVE; LOVE IS A MANY SPLENDORED THING; I'LL REMEMBER APRIL; POWELL'S PRANCES; TIME; THE SCENE IS CLEAN; GERTRUDE'S BOUNCE.

In midst of building solid jazz reputations trumpeter Clifford Brown and pianist Richie Powell lost their lives in an auto accident a few months ago. Examples of what the jazz world is going to miss is available in an EmArcy issue of Brown, Powell, Max Roach (drums), Sonny Rollins (tenor sax) and George Morrow (bass) on 7 skillfully played numbers. Powered by Brown's trumpet and Roach's drums, the supple piano of Powell (who composed 3 tunes on the set) and Sonny Rollins' expressive tenor sax, moments of striking jazz spontaneity are frequent. Here's a jazz entry that should become a collectors' item.

"THE BREW MOORE QUINTET"—Fantasy 3-22 (1-12" LP)

THEM THERE EYES; THEM OLD BLUES; TEA FOR TWO; ROSE; FIVE PLANETS IN LEO; I CAN'T BELIEVE THAT YOU'RE IN LOVE WITH ME; FOOLS RUSH IN; ROTATION; I WANT A LITTLE GIRL.

The numbers on this disk were taken from various appearances by Moore's Quintet during the early part of this year and the middle of last. Led by Moore's swinging tenor sax, the group paves some smooth jazz offerings. The sessions also draw expressive work from pianist John Marabuto. The latter composed two of the set's numbers, "Them Old Blues" and "Five Planets In Leo". Laudable jazz entry.

CLASSICAL

BEETHOVEN: Symphony No. 5 In C Minor. Op. 67—MOZART: Symphony No. 40 In G Minor, K. 550—The Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, Conductor—Columbia ML 5098 (1-12" LP)

Despite the vast LP representation of these two staples, there is always room for more. Certainly an important place must be provided for this superlative treatment of the Beethoven and Mozart works by The Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy's direction. The triumph of Beethoven's opus and the tragedy of Mozart's is performed with considerable insight and authority by the famous orchestra as read by its equally famous conductor. Notable sound. Beautiful package. The pressing should hold its own in an awfully crowded catalogue of the pieces.

KARL-BIRGER BLOMDAHL: Chamber Concerto—RICHARD DONOVAN: Soundings—JOHN VERRAL: Prelude And Allegro—MGM E3371 (1-12" LP)

Three unusually patterned works by three contemporary composers are presented on this MGM pressing. Blomdahl's "Chamber Concerto" and Donovan's "Soundings" rely heavily on evoking strange, and often fascinating, sounds from the instruments employed. During the Adagio of the former opus, there is a semblance of lyricism; but as for "Soundings", it remains strictly on a sound effects level. John Verral's "Prelude And Allegro For Strings", is just about the reverse of the other two pieces since it retains a romantic nature throughout most of its duration. Composer-Conductor Carl Surinach's direction of the MGM Chamber Orchestra, Chamber Ensemble and String Orchestra deftly overpowers the difficult chores. The more daring classical crowds have an interesting waxing here.

Bringing Their Own Equipment Along



NEW YORK—Wilma Cozart, head of the classical department of Mercury Records, recently returned from one of her frequent trips to Europe. Miss Cozart visited England for about four weeks where she spent most of the time cutting for future releases. One of the most important albums to come out of this last trip was the premier recording of Vaughan Williams' Symphony #8 by Sir John Barbirolli and the Halle Orchestra. This symphony, Vaughan Williams' latest, was premiered last May and dedicated to Sir John Barbirolli. Although Barbirolli is well known throughout the world, it is his first American release of records in many years.

An unusual feature of the trip was the truck, shown above, which Mercury took to England from the United States. It contained the finest recording equipment available. The truck, with its built-in equipment was moved directly into the studios where the sessions were held. C. R. Fine, sound engineer who was in charge of the sessions, also came from the United States specifically to handle the recording. When Miss Cozart returned home the truck was left behind so as to be available when Mercury's classical head returns to England shortly for more sessions.

Urania Fall Program

NEW YORK—Urania Records this week unveiled its fall merchandising program to its distributors.

The plan includes a discount program for dealers, dating, and 100% exchange privilege on the entire catalog.

The discount structure is effective August 1 through September 15. It allows a dealer a 10% discount on the entire catalog including new releases. Dating provides for one-half in September and one-half in October. Strong sales promotional material to spark the drive will be supplied to distributor salesmen.

Urania also announced the appointment of Ideal Record Distributors to handle the line exclusively in the New York metropolitan area. The deal was consummated between David Rothfeld, sales and merchandising manager of Urania, and Al Levine, president of Ideal.

Ideal will distribute Urania's complete catalog including opera, classical, mood and jazz series. Color-tunes, Urania's kiddie line is expected to be ready by fall.

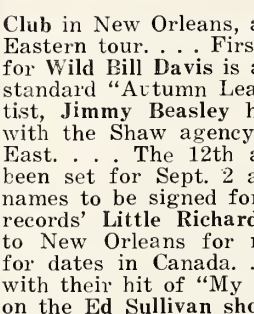
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LOS ANGELES:

WINS "Entertainment All-Night" to Promote Music Personalities

And, to stimulate audience interest, Warren has scheduled radio's first Jazz Festival to begin August 15th. He'll examine the various phases of the timeless art from its conception in New Orleans' Dixieland region to its present "new sounds" phase.

Any musicians or artists who are interested in promoting their latest effort are urged to get in touch with Warren at the WINS studio, and are assured they can obtain time on his all-night show.

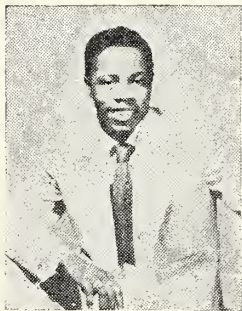

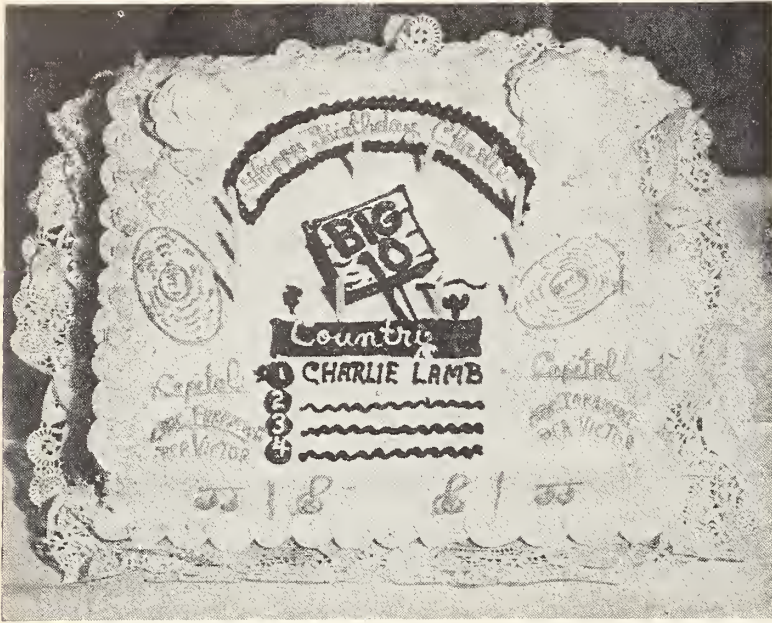

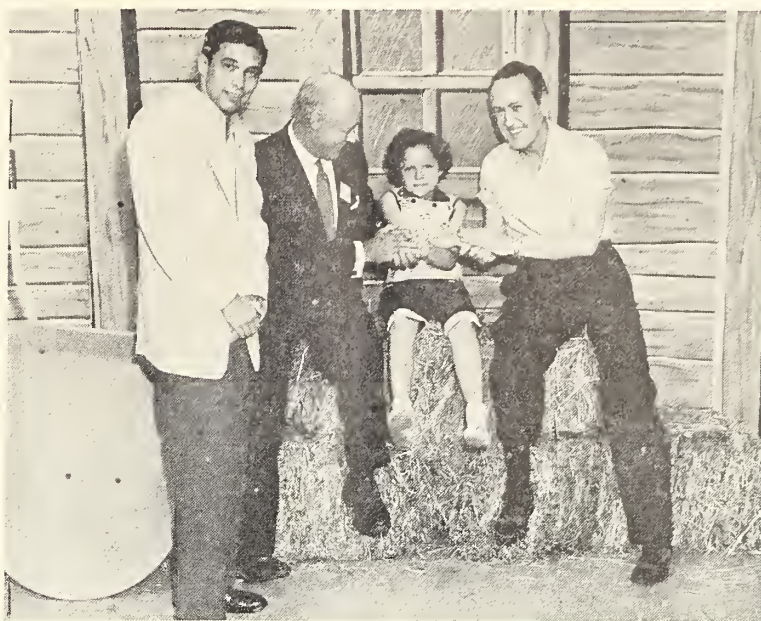

Eddy Arnold, the consistent hit-maker who certainly needs no introduction to ops, dealers or deejays sends across a fabulous new coupling that could very well develop into a double-barreled smash. The chanter's readily recognizable vocal stylings are pleasingly evident on two sides that are as different as day and night. On one half Eddy revives the wonderful, old-time favorite, "Casey Jones," and rhythmically wraps it up in most attractive style. Sparkling choral and instrumental support on this quick paced delighter. "You Were Mine For Awhile" features the chanter at his ballad best. It's a lovely, slow paced romantic lament which he renders with utmost sincerity. They're two big winners back-to-back.

THE OSBORNE BROTHERS & RED ALLEN

"RUBY, ARE YOU MAD?"
B+ (2:58) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Emmy] Here's a real down-home, cornball novelty that's a cinch to create loads of excitement in the country market. It's a high-flying, mountain-flavored slicing on which Red Allen and the Osborne Brothers colorfully showcase a captivating vocal job by Bobby Osborne. Watch this one. It could be tremendous.
"MY ACHING HEART" (2:19)
B [Copar BMI—D. Sloan, E. Sloan] This half the boys neatly blend their vocal and instrumental talents on a fast paced, 'pure country' lament. Strong coupling for ops and dealers.

ARLIE DUFF

(Decca 29987; 9-29987)
"ALLIGATOR COME ACROSS"
B+ (2:20) [Old Charter BMI—N. White] Arlie Duff takes hold of a delectable, little rhythmic ditty and does it up in most appealing vocal fashion. Enticing lyrics on a tune that rocks along about mid-deck. Dandy instrumentation on a solid contender for the charts.
"SO CLOSE AND YET SO FAR"
B+ (2:47) [Hudson-Dart BMI—N. White] Here Duff puts his heart into his delivery of a middle beat romantic heartbreaker and comes up with another potent effort. Double-threat coupling.

TEX DIXON

(Starday 564; 45-564)
"YOUR LOVIN' LIES" (2:28)
C+ [Starrite BMI—J. Atkins, W. Dickey] Tex Dixon intros on the label with a persuasive reading of a moderate paced lover's lament. The warbler sings the poignant lyrics with warmth and sincerity.
"I'M JUST FEELING SORRY FOR MYSELF" (2:51)
C+ [Starrite BMI—J. Atkins, W. Dickey] On the lower end Dixon turns in another feelingful performance as he tenderly etches a middle beat, sentimental piece. Subdued strings support the artist on both halves.

JIMMIE SKINNER

(Mercury 70894; 70894x45)
"WILL YOU BE SATISFIED THAT WAY?" (2:38)
B+ [Ernest Tubb BMI—J. Skinner] The deep and full tones of Jimmie Skinner show up to good advantage as the chanter effectively renders an old blues favorite that he did on another label a while back. Tune is currently making some noise and this current version should cash in anew.
"MUDDY WATER BLUES" (2:25)
B [Acuff-Rose BMI—J. Skinner] On the under deck Skinner stays in the blue mood as he distinctively styles another self-penned, quick paced biscuit.

DELBERT BARKER

(King 4951; 45-4951)
"THAT'S A SIN" (2:30)
B+ [Mar-Kay BMI—C. Gore] The King label adds another bright new name to its roster as newcomer Delbert Barker comes through with a terrific vocal effort on his initial release. It's a slow paced, rhythmic blues item that the artist spins in enchanting style. Strong side. Could happen.
"NO GOOD — ROBIN HOOD" (2:30)
B [Mar-Kay BMI — Barker, Innis] On the reverse etching Barker favorfully socks out a tantalizing, country-rock 'n roll novelty. He's an artist to watch.

TOM GLAZER

"COUNTRY AND WESTERN"
B+ [Skidmore ASCAP—T. Glazer, S. Clayton] Tom Glazer, known for his work in the kiddie field, aims his newest release at the over-all country market and comes up with a happy-go-lucky ditty that's sure to appeal to one and all. It's a quick beat pleaser on which Glazer and chorus express their love for C & W music.
"THE 4th 'R' (RELIGION)"
B [Shapiro-Bernstein ASCAP—T. Glazer, H. Ahlberg, S. Martin] On the under deck Glazer and the vocal group send up another fetching item designed to cover a wide market. It's a meaningful, quick beat, religious-flavored, toe-tapper that bounces along in spirited style.

BOBBY LORD

"WITHOUT YOUR LOVE" (2:15)
B+ [Cedarwood BMI—W. Jackson] The polished tones of Bobby Lord come across with telling effect as the chanter expressively renders a tear-compelling, middle beat lilter. Heart-felt lyrics on a deck that could step way out.
"EVERYBODY'S ROCKIN' BUT ME" (2:03)
B+ [Acuff-Rose BMI—Turner] This half the songster changes the pace as he belts out an intriguing, country-rock 'n roller that's sure to keep the boxes hoppin' all day long. Powerful two-sider.

LESTER FLATT, EARL SCRUGGS & THE FOGGY MOUNTAIN BOYS

"JOY BELLS" (2:23)
B+ [Golden West BMI—Organ, Certain, Stacey] Backed up in top calibre instrumental style by the Foggy Mountain Boys, Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs hand in a fine vocal duet on a lively, quick beat religious piece.
"GIVE MOTHER MY CROWN" (2:47)
B+ [Cedarwood BMI—Bailes] On the bottom deck, the entire crew comes up with another excellent performance, this time, on a moderate paced sacred opus with heart rending lyrics. An outstanding pairing for bible belt enthusiasts.

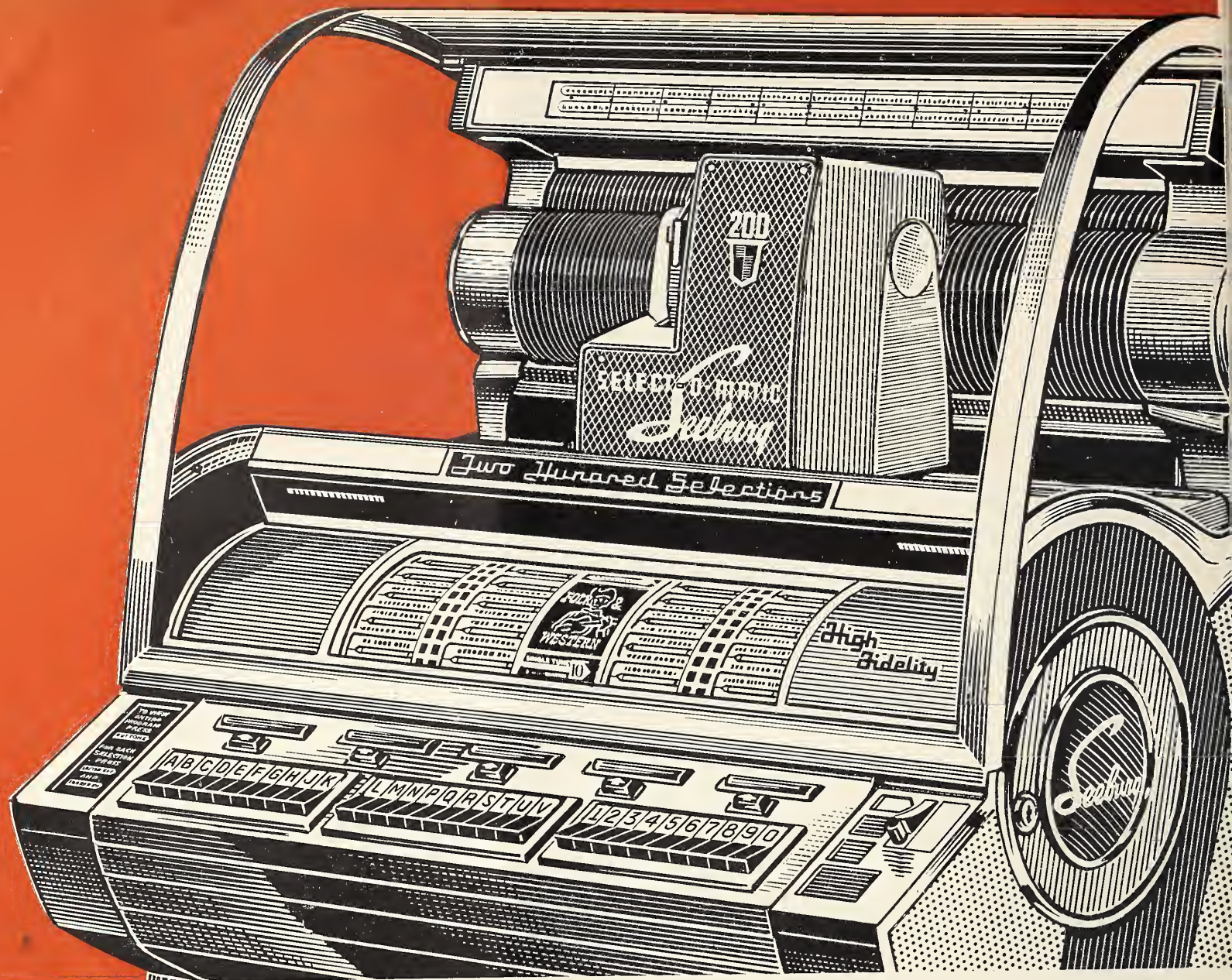
from KTHE in Thermopolis, Mont. to KBMN in Bozeman.

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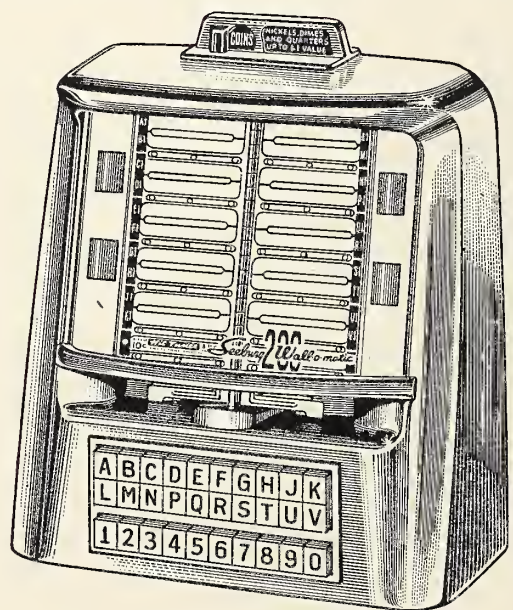
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The Industry's 5 Great Needs:

Here and There

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF.—On many an occasion some manufacturer turns out a coin operated device, which by every known factor, should become an accepted and profitable piece of equipment. But some unknown pops up and boom! The condition comes to our notice when a firm here introduced a food vending machine for installation in lobbies of apartment houses. The premise of the manufacturer, and a good one, is that the consumer can drop down to the lobby and buy various food products without the trouble of going out to the market to shop. San Francisco's legal department has ruled that installation of food vending machines in apartment house lobbies "is a commercial or business purpose and as such clearly prohibited (in apartment house districts) by the planning code." Other cities have similar restrictions. It is reported that the opposition to the food vending machines in apartment houses stems primarily from the city's food retailers.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Most economy experts, at the end of 1955, predicted that the first six months of 1956 would show some slump, but the last six months would bounce back again. Disputing these predictions is a report by the Department of Commerce this week. The personal income of Americans rose in the first half of 1956 at an annual rate of \$320 billion, \$21 billion above the 1955 level. Increased wage and salary payments accounted for \$16 billion of the rise. Other increase was created by dividends and interest payments. Personal income in June jumped almost \$1.5 billion over May. The department also reported that manufacturers' sales in June totaled \$27.8 billion, close to the May rate, and \$400 million higher than in June, 1955.

NEW YORK—Of interest to the Kiddie Ride manufacturers and operators is the latest Department of Commerce birth rate figures. The first five months of 1956 showed an increase over the record figures of 1955. A total of 1,640,000 live births were recorded thru May of this year, compared with 1,612,000 reported for the same period of 1955.

PUBLIC RELATIONS BUREAU TAX COUNCIL CREDIT BUREAU SCHOOL FOR MECHANICS BOARD OF TRADE

Since its inception, *The Cash Box* has continued to urge the industry to bring into being these five great necessities for its further progress, finer welfare and greater prosperity.

Many of the original suggestions of this publication have already been adopted by the industry. The MOA (Music Operators of America) is only one such proposal which has come into being. Dime play is another. Location contracts still another. Front money guarantees. And many, many more.

But more important than any other needs at this time is the creation of the five great necessities for the industry listed above.

This publication has printed thousands on thousands of words regarding the need for a *Public Relations Bureau*. There is no need now to go into the logical reasons why, except to state that it has become absolutely vital that a *Public Relations Bureau* quickly come into being. To this all will surely agree.

A *Tax Council* grows more necessary each day. Just a few months ago an editorial here pointed out how license fees have been hiked in one community, one state after the other. There is now no central bureau, no place where an operator can obtain legislative facts, legal data, former decisions and rulings, license laws and existing license legislation. No place where he can receive such vital information and experienced counsel. This need becomes more desperate with each passing day.

A *Credit Bureau* has become a most definite necessity. Distributors are worried about the tremendous extension of credit. Operators, them-

selves, desire to prove their own financial stability. Manufacturers, too, think hard before extending credit. This is one need that must soon be remedied. There is no way out of the credit morass without an inner-industry *Credit Bureau*.

Operators thruout the nation have agreed with *The Cash Box* over the years that there must come into being a *School For Mechanics*. The acute shortage of skilled mechanics is holding up growth and progress. Many operators, who would like to expand their routes, frankly report that they can't do so because they lack skilled mechanics. This is also true of distributors who are forced to delay repairs, while operators lose time and money with the machines under repair because they, too, lack skilled mechanics to get repairs out quickly.

A *Board of Trade* is of very great importance. If all divisions of the industry, music, amusement and vending, would have one suitable, central spot where they could all sit down together to arrange for a set of operating ethics, the industry will find, as time goes on, that it will once again come closer together and, perhaps, the *Board of Trade* can, of itself, arrange for one big exhibition each and every year.

It is the hope of *The Cash Box* that, as time goes on, the industry will accept these original suggestions. That the industry's members will do everything in their power to bring these five great needs into being.

Then the path to greater progress, finer welfare, surer prosperity will have been cleared of a great many obstacles.

Dime Play Plus Front Money:

ASSURES MUSIC OPS HOLDING ON TO PRESENT PROFIT LINE

However, Leading Ops Report Need for New Games and Venders to Help Better Diversify Operations and Continued Steady Profit Growth

CHICAGO—Leading music ops throughout the country foresee the time coming when they will need more new equipment to help bolster intake from diversified routes.

These men, in the majority, report that route diversification has kept them far ahead of competition and has also enabled them to progress more rapidly.

Those who are featuring dime play and, especially, those who also have a front money guarantee arrangement along with dime play, report that they have been able to hold onto their present profit line as far as their music operations are concerned.

"But," as one operator advised, "the great majority of the operators in this area feature completely diversified routes."

"We operate games, venders, even service machines, along with our music."

"This means we have to be on our toes for new products at all times so as to be able to maintain the profit line which we have reached and, at the same time, be able to progress forward."

This operator, like many others everywhere in the country advises that, as far as vending machines are concerned, unless there is something very radically different and better introduced, his route is well equipped to handle the vending needs of the patrons on all of his locations.

He adds, "But where games are concerned, we are up a tree at this time. We need something new to maintain the players' interest. We have to keep this part of our route more active than any other. We find that by more constant interchange of machines, adding new games and switching others, we keep our profits at a high level."

Operators who have diversified their routes look to new products being constantly introduced. They believe that their surest progress can come from the amusements field. Need for new amusements is, therefore, growing.

Said one operator, "Lots of players are becoming much too accustomed to the games we are featuring at this time. They have been asking the storekeepers to get something new."

No Action On Forand Bill As Congress Adjourns

Believe Congressman Forand Will Re-Introduce Bill in Next Congress. Places \$25 License on Pinballs That Reward Players No More Than \$5.00

WASHINGTON, D. C.—No further action was taken on Congressman A. J. Forand's (Dem., R. I.) bill, (HR.-12298), even though the bill had been passed by the House Ways and Means Committee as Congress adjourned.

This bill contains, among the many excise tax cuts it proposes, the proposal that pinballs, which reward players no more than \$5, be licensed at \$25 per year by the Federal Government.

This would mean that should a player obtain a number of free plays he would then be able to purchase up to \$5 in merchandise from the store where the game is located.

It is generally believed that Congressman Forand will reintroduce his bill in the next Congress.

It is also believed that this bill has a very fine opportunity of passing.

Taking Out Costs Becomes Big Job Of Factory Engineers

Object: Lower Prices to Ops—if at All Possible, While Maintaining Same Fine Quality Equipment. Will Mean Greater Tooling Costs to Manufacture Many Parts and Components Now Purchased Elsewhere

CHICAGO—Little known to the average man in the industry are the inner workings at the large manufactories here.

One outstanding drive now under way at all of the factories is to take costs out of new equipment without, in any fashion whatsoever, losing the fine quality which is today built into new equipment.

This isn't, as can easily be imagined, an easy task. Tremendous tooling costs are involved in such an operation.

It will mean, as factory engineers explain, making many parts and components themselves, instead of purchasing them on the outside from other factories.

In the meantime, the tooling costs involved in arranging to manufacture their own parts and components will run into a great many thousands of dollars.

"But," as one engineer stated, "if this will help to take some of the costs out of new equipment, and sales continue at a good rate, then the original tooling investment can eventually be amortized."

"At the same time, this will assure the operators that the factories will be able to maintain an average price line for new machines," he concludes.

This effort is not confined to any one division of the industry. It covers all segments of the field. Engineers of amusement games, music and vending machines are working day and night in an effort to cut costs. In this fashion operators will be able to enjoy prices that will not rise at inflationary levels now feared by many as a result of the new wage scales and higher prices for raw materials being placed into effect by all leading producers.

"It is extremely difficult today," one engineer says, "to come up with a really outstanding product that will prove interesting to all the people and build such a product at a low price."

He points to the fact that even though such products have been produced, their life has been very short. He claims that the more intricate prod-

ucts, especially the new type high fidelity juke boxes, continue on ahead.

But, as he points out, prices are going ever higher for raw materials and components to manufacture such outstanding equipment.

Whatever the end result, the field will benefit, according to many here, as engineers continue their all-out program to find more ways to cut costs so as to maintain a fair market price for new machines.

CHICAGO—Alvin Gottlieb, advertising and sales promotion manager of D. Gottlieb & Company, reported that the firm's current 5-ball game "Classy Bowler", has broken all previous re-order records.

"We expected our usual summer slowdown," stated Alvin, "but instead we were amazed and gratified at the way demands of distributors kept pouring in. No other game we ever produced came even close to the record set this summer by 'Classy Bowler.'"

"The re-orders flooded in not only from distributors in this country, but from all over the globe."

"Based on the summer performance record of 'Classy Bowler,'" added Alvin, "the coming fall season should prove to be even better than we anticipated."

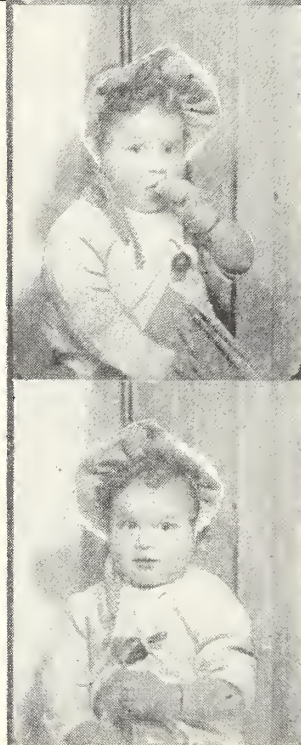

"I'll find some angle," he confidently assured Mary, "or you can call me the worst salesman in the company."

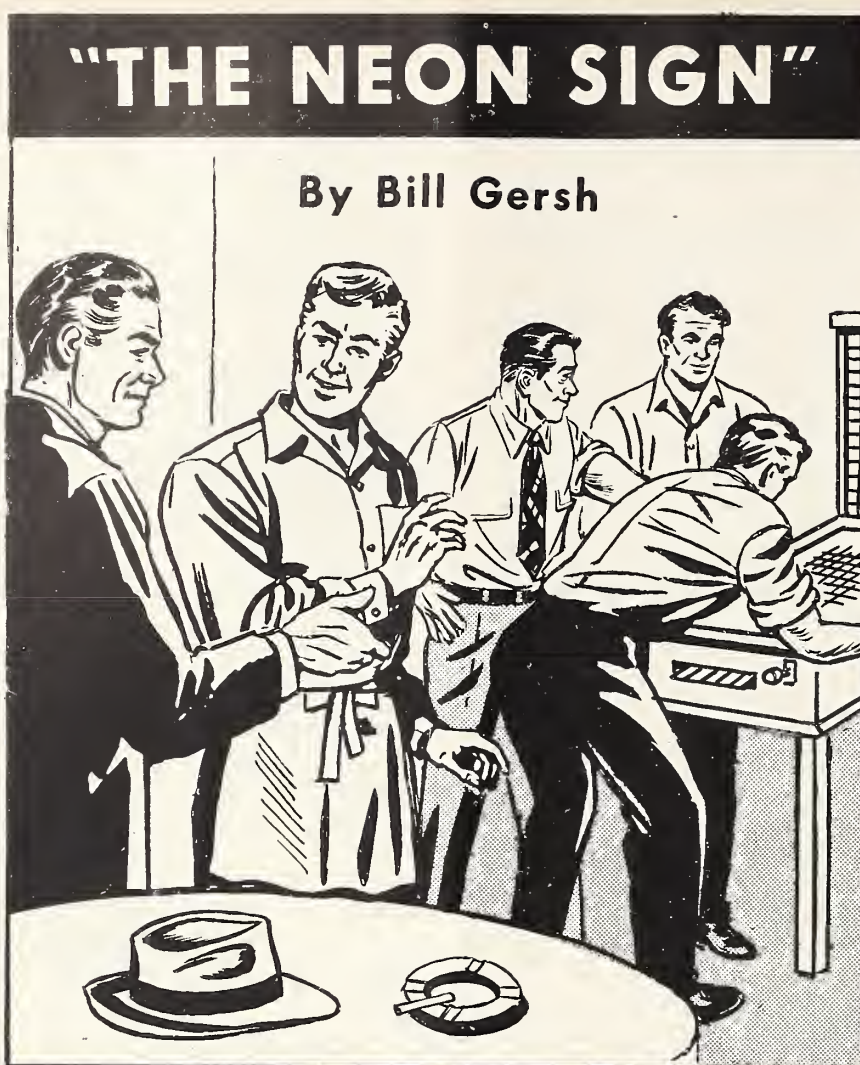

"I'm a coin machine operator now with the best locations in this town."



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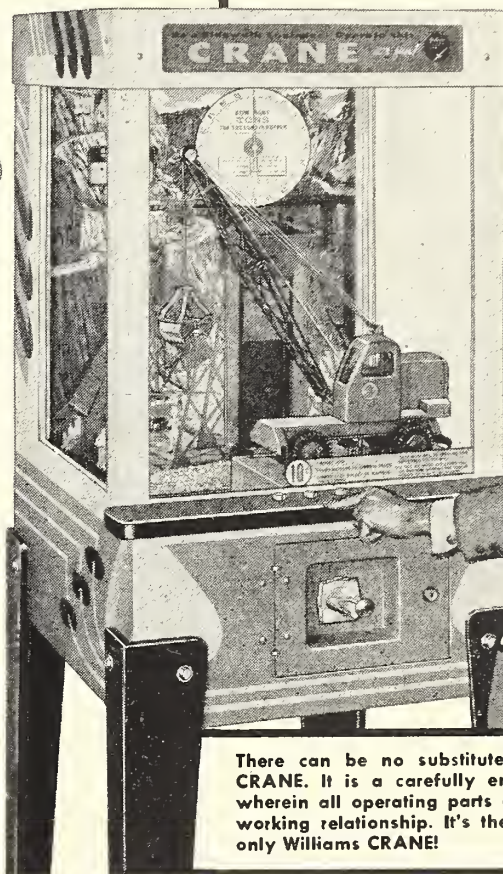


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Amusement Ops Hope For Big Convention

"This", he continued, "always

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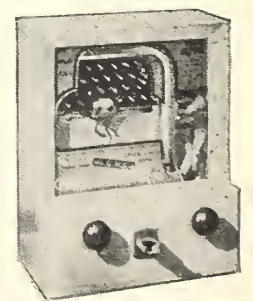

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such buyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.

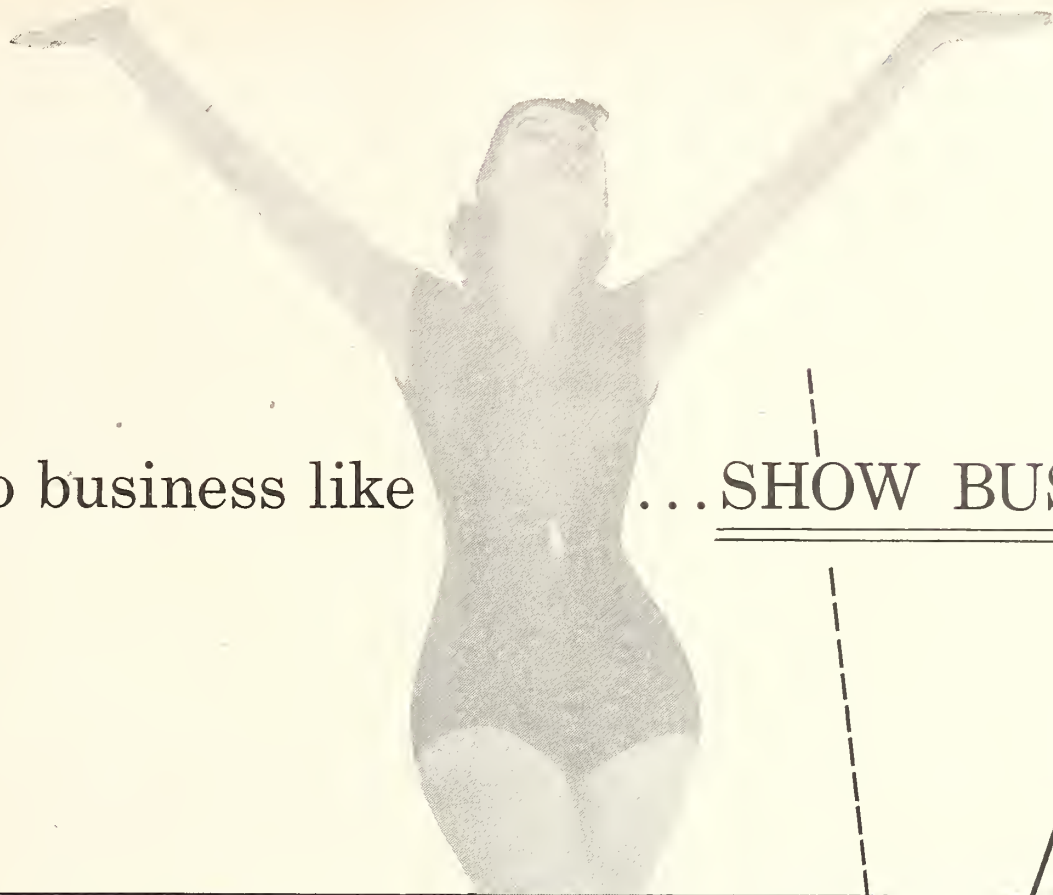

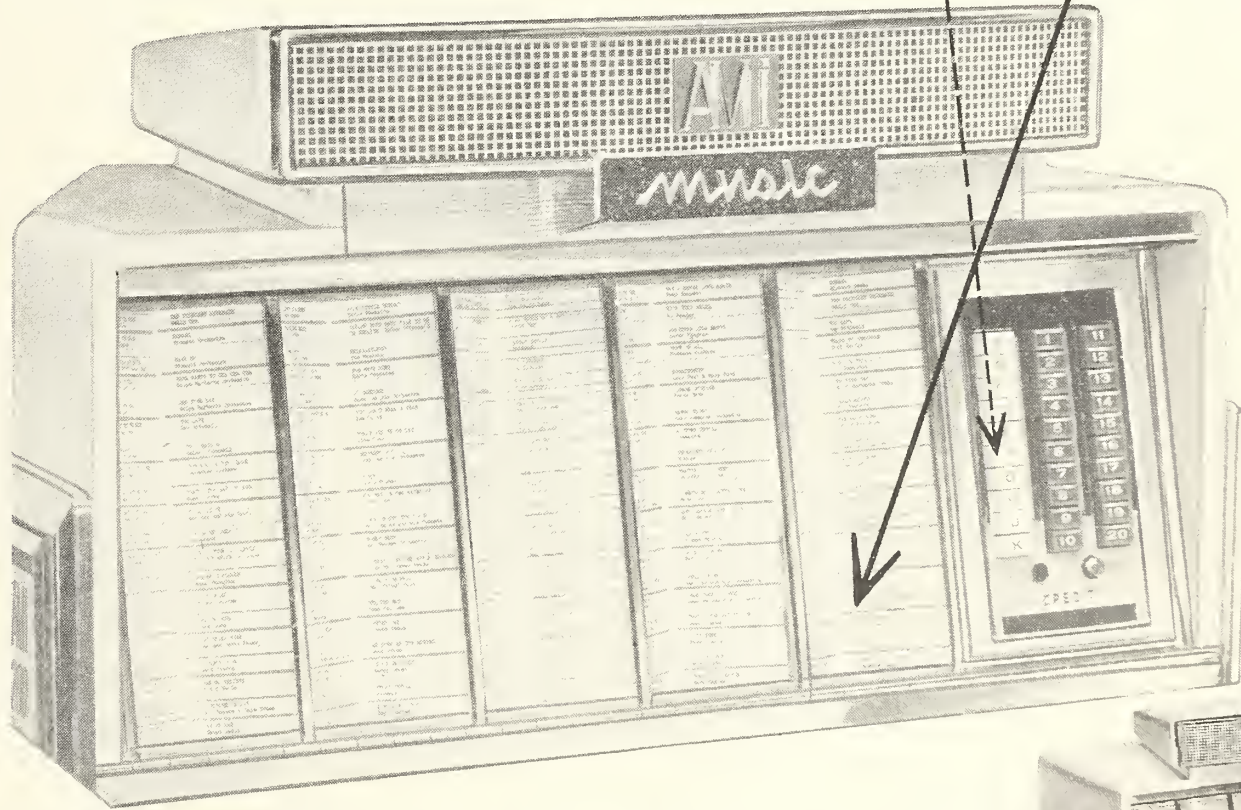

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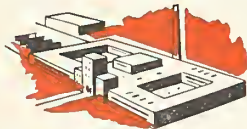
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
