EDITORIAL Restoring The Spirit

Have we gotten too excited too many times over too many artists?

Remember when music, regardless of label affiliation, aroused passion among industry members? What ever happened to those days of genuine enthusiasm?

In this current Age of Consumption, we continually strive for more and more heroes in all fields, including the arts. But, faster than a speeding bullet, we use them up and toss them aside at the first sign of a newer, fresher replacement. Maybe there are too many "superstars."

Everyone in the record industry has been pumped up for so long that the anticipation now outweighs the event. It is somewhat anti-climactic when the long-awaited album is finally released; as a result, radio, retail and the label reps can hardly maintain the "fever pitch." In short, we cannot consistently excite today's record buyer.

It appears that fewer albums will be released in the coming year, which should help restore credibility and enthusiasm. It is now more apparent than ever that every new artist is not the forerunner of a new musical trend. Nor will the latest "superstar" album be assured of mega-sales.

11 Fans Die At Who Concert; Crowd Control Laws Proposed

LOS ANGELES — The decision to proceed with The Who's American tour and the possibility of legislation regarding concert procedures highlighted the events following the tragic incident at Cincinnati's Riverfront Coliseum Dec. 3, where 11 people were killed in a rush to reach their seats prior to the British rock group's concert.

At least another eight persons were seriously injured, and many others sustained minor injuries in the incident, which began when three of the venue's 50 doors were opened to allow 6,000 general admission ticketholders into the arena.

In the ensuing rush to reach the "first come, first serve" festival-style seating in the general admission sections (there were

AFM Members Ratify Contract

NEW YORK — Members of the American Federation of Musicians (AFM) have ratified a new contract with the major record distribution organizations for a new Phonograph Record Labor Agreement. The pact, which was announced by Victor Fuentealba, president of the AFM, is retroactive to Nov. 1, 1979 and expires on Dec. 1, 1981.

The contract, which was tentatively approved Oct. 26 (Cash Box, Nov. 10), was ratified in a secret mail referendum by musicians in the U.S., Canada, and Puerto Rico who earned a minimum of \$1,000 from the recording industry during 1978. Acceptance of the contract, which was approved by a vote of 1,550 to 240, had been unanimously recommended by the AFM International Executive Board.

The pact calls for an 8% increase in all categories of wages for the first year of the contract and an additional 7% increase for the remaining 13 months of the agreement. Terms and conditions covering the recording of chamber music, in addition to a new formula for symphonic and operatic "on location" recordings, were also reached during the negotiations, which Fuentealba said were the most difficult the Federation had experienced since the 1940s, "due to the severe slump" that the record industry had been undergoing since the latter part of 1978.

an additional 12,000 reserved seats), the crowd apparently got out of control, and the injuries and deaths soon followed.

Most of the concert audience was apparently unaware of the tragedy and the show went on as scheduled.

In the aftermath of the tragedy, speculation abounded that the remaining dates on The Who's first American tour in over two years would be cancelled. However, except for the cancellation of a Dec. 17 date at the Providence Civic Center, the tour will continue as scheduled, according to Joshua Gold of Left Field Services, tour coordinators.

"The group, of course, is extremely upset about the whole thing," Gold stated, adding that he expected security measures to be beefed-up considerably for the remainder of the tour — which includes dates in Cleveland (Dec. 6), Pontiac (Dec. 7), Chicago (Dec. 8), Philadelphia (Dec. 10 & 11), Largo, Md. (Dec. 13), New Haven (Dec. 15) and Boston (Dec. 16).

Meanwhile, in Cincinnati, Electric Factory Concerts, the promoters of the event,

American Imports Creating Snags For Foreign Licensees

NEW YORK — The recent preliminary ruling by the English High Court against CBS Records UK in its move to block the importation of American-manufactured titles by Charmdale Record Distributors points to the growing problem of parallel imports into the United Kingdom and other European countries. A Cash Box survey shows that the importation of front-line goods manufactured outside the European Economic Community (EEC) is widespread throughout Europe.

The major reason for the rise in parallel imports into Britain, where the problem is especially acute, is the recent strengthening of the pound against other currencies. This has benefitted British LP importers, who have been able to realize greater profits on product brought in from the U.S. and certain European countries such as Portugal.

Although the Portuguese import problem has been mitigated by the fact that Portugal recently joined the EEC, the importation of U.S. product has increased as a result of the massive quantities of records that were returned to American manufacturers earlier this year. Much of this product was dumped in the U.S. market (Cash Box, August 4), and some of it has found its way to Europe as well.

The importation of front line goods from the U.S., due to the devaluation of the dollar in major currency markets, continues to pose a major problem for record company licensees, as evidenced by a spate of legal proceedings initiated by such companies as CBS UK and Polydor. Although a temporary injunction has been imposed by Justice Bram Wilkinson against Charmdale in its litigation with CBS UK, the judge

stated in his preliminary ruling that the decision was based on "the balance of convenience" and that importation, in his view, is not unlawful. The case, when finally resolved, is expected to clarify a clause in the 1956 English Copyright Act which questions whether copyright infringement can exist outside of the EEC.

Prior to its action against Charmdale, which had imported domestically-pressed copies of albums by Barbra Streisand, Melba Moore, Rick Derringer, The O'Jays, Ray Conniff, Marlena Shaw, Ellen Foley, Toto, Steve Forbert, and Lonnie Liston Smith, CBS UK had successfully brought suit against Our Price Records and Disc Empire, which had imported quantities of Stan Getz's "Children of the World" and Cheap Trick's "Dream Police." Both defendants operate import divisions in addition to their retail operations.

Polydor Action

Polydor has also tried to stop UK importers from bringing in certain titles manufactured in the U.S. and Canada. Bostock Records was recently fined 1,000 pounds for importing and selling Canadian copies of "The Kids Are Alright" by The Who, and Our Price Records agreed to pay 250 pounds for importing U.S.-manufactured copies of The Jam's "This Is The Modern World," "Making Magic" by Pat Travers, and UK's self-titled album. Polydor is currently in litigation with the London-based Stage One Records for importing Canadian-manufactured copies of The Who's "Who Are You."

As a result of these actions, at least one major British retail chain executive, Raymond Moss of Harlequin Records, told Cash Box that the company is "terrified" of importing product from outside the EEC. "We just can't do it anymore," said Ross.

Personalities On Comeback Trail In NYC, L.A. Radio

LOS ANGELES — Reversing a trend that dominated much of the '70s, radio personalities have been making a comeback recently, occupying more and more of the vital time spots in the major markets. Featuring words and wit, in addition to the music played, personality radio has become one of the prime methods used to attract a larger audience share.

"The human voice is a very important part of radio programming," explains Don Langford, PD for KLAC/Los Angeles. "It is probably the most important element next to the music we play."

That is the crux of the issue. In major markets like Los Angeles and New York, where literally dozens of stations compete for shares of the same audience, radio personalities can add or create a distinctive identity for the station, above and beyond the selection of records to play.

"There has definitely been a revitalization of personality radio," adds Al Brady, operations manager for WABC/New York, where Don Ingram, the top personality, was moved to the morning drive in direct competition with WNBC's Don Imus, one of the city's top-rated jocks. "Listeners can hear basically the same music on just about any radio station," Brady concludes, "so we try to offer more in entertainment value."

The need for personalities is especially keen for Top 40 AM stations, where the quantity and type of music offered is often somewhat short of what can be heard on FM.

Explaining the hiring of nationally known Rick Dees to handle the morning drive, Chuck Martin, PD at KHJ/Los Angeles, adds, "We're trying to revive what KHJ used to be — personality radio going in the right direction. It's a newer approach to younger people. The older demos never felt comfortable with just music and silence. They like personalities who give information, too. On our part, it's a commitment to be an overall

Restructures Nonesuch Label; Sterne Is Discharged

NEW YORK — The Nonesuch budget classical label, a division of EMI America's Nonesuch Records, is being restructured. Four Nonesuch employees have been discharged, including Keith Holzman, vice president of E/A and general manager of Nonesuch.

Keith Holzman, vice president of E/A, will oversee the activities of Nonesuch along with Bill Berger, marketing director of the label. Sterne, who has guided Nonesuch for most of its 15-year history, told **Cash Box** that she has turned down an offer to continue working for the company as an in-

dependent producer.

In a statement released last week, E/A chairman Joe Smith commented, "Nonesuch Records has a distinguished history and we believe an outstanding future. We intend to place great emphasis on the marketing and sales of the existing catalogue and the new albums that will be released throughout the year. The adjustments being made are necessary if we are to continue to keep Nonesuch a viable and unique entity in the face of difficult market conditions. We are dedicated to preserving the high standards of Nonesuch and building the company for the future. We are planning the lineup of 1980 releases along with special programs for all past recordings."

Sterne said that she had been told to halt production of new product and to cancel all recording sessions, which had been scheduled through May. But Keith Holzman affirmed Smith's statement that Nonesuch would continue to release new product. He noted that six releases which had originally been scheduled for November but were delayed due to production problems will be issued three at a time in January and February. According to Holzman, Nonesuch product will be released in greater quantities than in the past.

"Nonesuch remains very much alive," stated Holzman. While he said he was not yet in a position to reveal specific plans, he indicated that the label will probably return to a greater emphasis on licensed material while continuing to release newly created recordings.

RCA VideoDisc System Set For Early 1981 Bow

SAN DIEGO — RCA will bow its "SelectaVision" VideoDisc system nation-wide in the first quarter of 1981. At a Dec. 6 conference here, RCA president Edgar H. Griffiths told RCA distributors that the conglomerate expects to sell as many as 200,000 players during the first year.

Initial shipments of the system for demonstration and training purposes will occur in December of 1980. While no definite price has been set for the videodisc player, Griffiths said that it should sell for less than \$500 in 1981 dollars.

In order to provide software for the players, RCA has entered into programming deals with several major film studios, including Paramount, 20th Century-Fox and Disney. Programming will also feature a series of classic MGM musicals and original rock concerts, the latter coming from a deal with rock impresario Don Kirshner (see separate story).

Largest Investment

The RCA system will finally debut after 15 years of research and development and represents the company's single largest investment in a consumer electronics product. The investment tops the \$130 million which RCA put into color television hardware in 1954.

At the confab, Griffiths made some predictions about the future of the videodisc system, speculating that within 10 years, 30-50% of households owning

MCA Distributing Closes 4 Offices

LOS ANGELES — In a restructuring and economy move, MCA Distributing Corp. last week closed four of its sales offices. Since Dec. 4, all sales personnel in San Francisco, Hartford, Charlotte and Houston have been working out of their residences, according to MCA Distributing president Al Bergamo.

Bergamo says the move will have a "positive effect on expenditures" and will not interrupt business operations. "The physical structures have been eliminated in these areas because these were flat markets and our projections showed no real growth patterns over the next three years," explains Bergamo. "It's your staff which works the records, and they can do it just as easily out of their homes."

\$27 Million Suit Filed Over Who Concert

LOS ANGELES — The Who, Riverfront Coliseum officials and the concert promoter were charged with negligence in a \$27 million class action suit filed in connection with the deaths of 11 people Dec. 3 at the British rock group's concert in Cincinnati. While an official coroner's report has not been completed, it is believed that the victims suffocated in the pile-up caused when 6,000 fans tried to enter through three of the arena's 50 doors. (For additional information on the concert and its aftermath, see story on page 7).

Kirshner, RCA In Video Disc Deal

NEW YORK — RCA Inc. has entered into a licensing and developing agreement with Don Kirshner Productions to create music-based shows for the RCA "SelectaVision" VideoDisc. This represents RCA's first major videodisc deal in the contemporary music field.

In an exclusive interview, Kirshner told **Cash Box**, that "while the deal had only been signed a week ago, and commitments for programs have yet to be firmed up, the deal could result in any number of programs ranging from fifteen to thirty. Material used will include performances from old 'Rock Concerts' as well as new concepts. Creative input will also range from programs we develop independently to those we develop in conjunction with RCA."

In early 1980, Thorn Electrical Industries will change its corporate name to Thorn EMI Limited.

The Bar-Kays are a band reincarnate. The group's roots go back to the mid-60s when Stax Records signed the Memphis-based band. They soon became the house band for Stax, and eventually signed on as the back-up group for the great Otis Redding. However, all but one of the original Bar-Kays of that period died in the Wisconsin plane crash that also claimed the life of Otis Redding.

James Alexander, the Bar-Kay who had taken another flight that fateful day, reformed the group in 1968. The revitalized band served as the instrumentalists for Issac Hayes ("Hot Buttered Soul," "To Be Continued" and "Black Moses") as well as other Stax greats like The Staple Singers and Johnnie Taylor. It has been estimated that the prestigious R&B/funk band played on more than \$50 million worth of recordings while with Stax.

The years, 1973-76, were unprofitable for the band as the group became caught in the contractual red tape that grew out of the bankruptcy of Stax Records. When those problems cleared, Mercury Records moved on to the scene and signed the group.

Presently, the Bar-Kays are composed of Larry Dodson (lead vocals), James Alexander (bass guitar), Winston Stewart (keyboards/clarinet), Michael Beard (drums), Charles Allen (trumpet), Harvey Henderson (saxophone), Lloyd Smith (guitar), Frank Thompson (trombone), Mark Bynum (keyboards/vocals) and Sherman Guy (percussionist).

In 1976, the Bar-Kays released their first album in more than three years, "Too Hot To Stop." The band followed with the gold certified "Flying High On Your Love" album in 1977 and "The Light Of Life" LP in 1978.

The group is currently riding high on **Cash Box's** pop and B/C album charts with "Injoy" at #27 and #6 respectively. The first single from the new LP, "Move Your Boogie Body," is presently #3 on the **Cash Box** B/C singles chart.

NEW FACES TO WATCH



Gilda Radner

Gilda Radner: A.K.A. RoseannRoseannadanna; Lisa Loopner; Emily Litella; Candy Slice, Rhonda Weiss.

Background: A popular cast member of NBC-TV's "Saturday Night Live" since the show's inception in 1974, the 33-year-old comedienne was born in Detroit, Michigan, where her father ran a hotel. Since many actors who stayed at the hotel gave her father tickets for their shows, the elder Radner took his daughter to one theatre regularly and Gilda decided at an early age that she wanted to be an actress.

Radner attended the University of Michigan as a theatre major, and left during her last semester in 1969 to go to Toronto, where she got a job with the Board of Education. She performed for kids in grade school doing pantomime in white face.

After performing for a year in the Toronto production of "Godspell," Radner became a member of Toronto's Second City Revue, a renowned improvisational comedy group. Through Second City, she met Dan Aykroyd and John Belushi, who persuaded her to come to New York to work for the National Lampoon Radio Hour and the "National Lampoon Show" as a writer and performer. She joined the cast of "Saturday Night Live," along with Aykroyd and Belushi, when producer Lorne Michaels remembered watching her work in Toronto and hired her without an audition.

A Brief History Of Her Debut Album (And Broadway Show). "Gilda Radner: Live From New York": Warner Brothers Records approached her with an offer to record an album early in 1979. "My first reaction was that I did not want to make a comedy album," Radner says, "because they're too aggravating to listen to. It's too hard to find the parts you laughed at when people come over."

"I was determined to have music on my album. So I linked up with Paul Schaffer, who I worked with when he was musical director for 'Godspell' in Toronto. He wrote the music and I wrote the lyrics. We tried to do all the characters musically. One night I had Michael O'Donoghue over for dinner and got 'Let's Talk Dirty To The Animals' out of him."

"So we went to Lorne Michaels with all this music and said, 'Here's what we've got,' and he said, 'Let's do a show out of this — let's make a Broadway show.' So we went backwards — we had the idea for the record, and then made the show out of it. I always say we took our underwear off before we took our clothes off." (Radner's show, "Live From New York," ran at the Winter Garden Theatre on Broadway for over five weeks in the summer of 1979, and proved to be an immense box-office success.)

Radner And Rock And Roll: "I grew up with a radio on the headboard of my bed. I loved rock and roll. It was real important to me in school. I liked the Beatles because their music vibrated the seat of the car. The song 'Honey (Touch Me With My Clothes On)' is a tribute to that time."



Tom Johnston

Although "Everything You've Heard Is True" is the first solo album for Tom Johnston, one listen to his voice will bring back memories of Doobie Brothers days gone by. Johnston penned and lent his gritty, bluesy vocals to such Doobie classics as "Listen To The Music," "China Grove," "Rockin' Down The Highway" and "Long Train Runnin'" during his tenure with the Bay Area band.

He remained the focal point of the Doobies from 1971 to 1976, and wrote the bulk of the material on the five albums that were created in that time span. The decision to leave the group was brought on by a peptic ulcer that he developed during the "Stampede" tour.

"I had to go into the hospital to get rid of it," said Johnston. "I had lost an incredible amount of weight and was a total wreck physically. Then I got into lifting weights and drinking beer and built myself back up."

However, when the revitalized Johnston returned to the band to record the "Living On The Fault Line" LP, Michael McDonald had taken over as the Doobie Brothers' chief tunesmith, and was leading the band in the soft pop direction that characterizes the group's sound today.

"I think that music is incredibly well done and that Michael is a superb singer," explained Johnston. "But, I just couldn't play that kind of music onstage."

Over a year and a half in the making, "Everything You've Heard Is True" represents the first music recorded by the former Doobie Brother in over three years. The album features some great rock 'n' roll ("Man On A Stage" and "Outlaw"), but should be noted for its heavy R&B flavor.

"I could never have recorded that material with the Doobies," said Johnston. "It just wasn't their style. Now, as a solo artist, I have the freedom to do what I want."

Johnston labels himself a "musical recluse," listening mostly to Lee Dorsey records or New Orleans blues instead of the radio. His love for R&B was nurtured when he started listening to Bo Diddley, James Brown, Wilson Pickett and Joe Tex during his childhood years in Tulare, Calif. He began as a saxophone player, but lost his heart to the blues guitar in high school.

A decision to attend San Jose State College in the late '60s proved to be an important move for the soft-spoken Mill Valley resident. For it was in the Bay Area that Johnston struck up a friendship with ex-Moby Grape guitarist Skip Spence. The relationship led to a musical alliance with drummer John Hartman (who is part of Johnston's touring band), the discovery of guitarist/vocalist Pat Simmons, and the birth of the Doobie Brothers.

Johnston's first post-Doobie waxing has much of the rhythm and bluesy feel that typified the band's early work, but, through the aid of producer Ted Templeman, and a passel of noted West Coast session musicians, it is a much more refined fusion of rock and R&B.

ARTIST PROFILE

Versatile Todd Rundgren Now Exploring Video Production

LOS ANGELES — Bearsville recording artist Todd Rundgren has built up a reputation as somewhat of a Renaissance man in the recording field over the course of the 12 years he has been in the business.

Beginning with the seminal power pop group The Naz in 1967 and continuing through various incarnations, both solo and group, up to the present four-member band Utopia which he leads, Rundgren has established himself as a well-known performer. In addition, he is considered a studio wizard, often composing, arranging, producing, engineering and playing all the instruments on the album.

In fact, Rundgren's experience in the studio alone pre-dates his solo career, first engineering The Band's "Stage Fright" LP in the early '70s, then moving on to producing more than a dozen acts, including Grand Funk Railroad, the New York Dolls, Patti Smith Group, The Tubes, Rick Derringer, and Meat Loaf.

Video Experiments

Five years ago, Rundgren became absorbed in experimenting with videotape recording and is now subsequently quickly establishing himself in a new and unique role... that of the video artist.

Beginning in the back room of his home in Bearsville, N.Y., just outside of

"The deciding factor was probably the Sony BVH-1000," says Rundgren, referring to the one-inch broadcast format videotape recorder. "Formerly, you had to spend upwards of \$150,000 for a broadcast quality machine. Now, you have helical scan machines. At the time I bought the Sony BVH-1000, they were less than \$40,000 and I bought one of the first 20 machines to come into the country."

"Suddenly, it became feasible for me to make broadcast quality video without spending a million dollars."

Rundgren adds that although he made the commitment to building his own studio for his production firm, Utopia Productions quite sometime ago, it took many years for it to actually come about. The \$2 million studio, built near his home, will open approximately the first of the year.

"It's been financed by record productions, essentially," states Rundgren.

Videodisc

Within the last year, Rundgren has produced some five albums, including the second Meat Loaf LP, in addition to touring with Utopia and working on recording the band's forthcoming album, "Adventures In Utopia." During the same period of time, Rundgren was preparing what was to become one of the first original music-oriented videodiscs, an interpretation of RCA recording artist Tomita's electronic

Sara (4:37) (Fleetwood Mac Music — BMI) (S. Nicks)

The second single off of the group's "Tusk" LP makes a high entry onto the pop singles chart this week and with good reason. A lush, entrancing Stevie Nicks composition, with effectively echoed lead vocals by Nicks, it sports a glistening arrangement of wispy keyboards, light guitars, wind-like harmonies and a full, steady rhythm section. A Top 40 powerhouse.



LED ZEPPELIN (Swan Song SS 71003)
Fool In The Rain (6:08) (Flames of Albion Music, Inc. — ASCAP) (Jones, Page, Plant)

Urged by the massive airplay "All Of My Love" received as an album cut, Swan Song has released this upbeat, slightly funky track from Led Zeppelin's "In Through The Out Door" LP. The first single for the Zep in three years, the cut features a zesty Latin-samba instrumental break, Page's sharp lead and rhythm guitar work and Plant's high, tough vocals. A sure hit.



BARRY MANILOW (Arista AS 0481)
When I Wanted You (3:31) (Home Grown Music, Inc. — BMI) (G. Cunico)

Like Manilow's last Top 10 single, "Ships," this cut features the singer's trademark pop-symphonic arrangements. Building from the "lost at love" lyrical refrain, Manilow hits the grandiose crescendos with power. Mining the same emotional vein as he has in past songs, this may be formula but nobody does it better than Barry. Sublime A/C, pop stuff.



DAN FOGELBERG (Full Moon/Epic 9-50824)
Longer (3:14) (Hickory Grove Music/April Music, Inc. — ASCAP) (D. Fogelberg)

A rich acoustic guitar melody meshes nicely with strings, French horn touches and piano on the first single off of Fogelberg's new "Phoenix" LP. Lyrically, this tender ballad is the perfect lover's anthem and Fogelberg's delicate, hushed vocals make it ring true. Undoubtedly an A/C, pop smash.

ROD STEWART (Warner Bros. WBS 49138)
Don't Want To Talk About It (4:12) (Crazy Horse Music — BMI) (D. Whitten)

Written by the late Danny Whitten of Crazy Horse, this simple, affecting ballad is the only cut on Stewart's new "Greatest Hits" package that has not been previously released as a single domestically. Strings and light acoustic guitar glide with the vocals to make it a winner for both A/C and Top 40 lists. From the "Atlantic Crossing" LP.



20/20 (Portrait 2-70038)
Tell Me Why (Can't Understand You) (3:36) (Accidental Music — BMI) (M. Gallo, S. Allen)

Like The Beat, 20/20 mines '60s era pop-rock in a new wavish fashion, but prefers the simple melody to the high-speed hook. Here, the boys follow up the light "Cheri" with a crackling display of harmonies on the 'studer' chorus. Like "Cheri," Beatles influences abound, but the instrumental edge is a bit sharper. A solid pop, AOR choice.



THE BEAT (Columbia 1-11161)
Let Me Into Your Life (2:35.3) (Grajonca Music — BMI) (P. Collins, E. Money)

The Beat have the '60s teen pop style down cold but they've managed to extract only the best elements for the first single from their consistently strong debut LP. Lead singer Paul Collins displays undeniable energy while the rest of the group cranks away at the simple, catchy pop-rock rhythms with youthful abandon. Highly deserving of pop play.



BOB WELCH (Capitol P-4790)
Rebel Rouser (3:39) (Glenwood Music Corp./Cigar Music — ASCAP) (B. Welch)

Hot, stinging fretwork marks the first single off of Welch's new "The Other One" LP, as the singer/guitarist finds a harder rock edge here than in recent efforts. A lean, sparse yet driving rhythm and even backbeat set the pace for the building lead guitar work and solo. A very tasty rock tune, this is prime for AOR, pop play.

SINGLES TO WATCH

JOE JACKSON (A&M 2209)
I'm The Man (3:30) (Albion Music, admin. in the U.S. & Canada by Almo Music Corp. — ASCAP) (J. Jackson)

The insistently rocking title track from Jackson's current LP is new wave at its most palatable, yet the singer/songwriter doesn't sacrifice any of the instrumental or lyrical bite for pop gloss. Frenzied guitar and rhythm work make this a choice AOR, pop add.

RANDY NEWMAN (Warner Bros. WBS 49149)
The Story Of A Rock And Roll Band (2:54) (Six Pictures Music — BMI) (R. Newman)

Newman's amusing parody of a highly successful, classically-influenced pop group pokes fun in light-hearted fashion. As a novelty track, pop programmers may want to play this cut with songs by the actual group. Pop humor at its best.

THE MANHATTAN TRANSFER (Atlantic 3636)
Birdland (3:40) (Mulatto Music — BMI/Hendricks Music West — ASCAP) (Zawinul, J. Hendricks)

Jon Hendricks, responsible for the highly-acclaimed "Evolution Of The Blues" stage musical, has put words to Weather Report's jazz standard and the Transfer add their patented '40s swing vocal stylings for a flavorful pop outing. A sleeper.

ROY SUNDHOLM (Polydor PD 2023)
The Girls Are Out Now (3:22) (Dizzy Heights Music Publishing, Ltd. — PRS) (R. Sundholm)

Sundholm makes highly accessible English rock 'n' roll, with a dash of pop a la The Boomtown Rats, as this first single from his debut Polydor LP proves. A shaking beat permeates the track, aided by the crackling rhythm section. Perfect for AOR and pop lists.

ELLEN SHIPLEY (New York Int'l. YB-11775)
Man Of The World (3:35) (Little Gino Music/Shipwreck Music — BMI) (E. Shipley, R. Schuckett)

Shipley blends do-wop opening with smolderingly intense vocals on the second single from her self-titled debut LP. Co-writer Ralph Schuckett contributes neat keyboard twists, which combine with xylophone work, for a unique, magical pop, AOR add.

JACK JONES (MGM/Polydor MG 14851)
Love Boat Theme (2:57) (Aaron Spelling Prod. — BMI) (P. Williams, C. Fox)

The theme from ABC-TV's popular "Love Boat" series receives a light disco treatment here with veteran crooner Jack Jones supplying showroom-style lead vocals, assisted by a chorus of femal backup singers. From Jones' "Nobody Does It Better" LP, this is fine for A/C, pop play.

THE SPORTS (Arista AS 0482)
Don't Throw Stones (2:58) (Australian Tumbleweed/Emu Music) (Cumings, Pendlebury)

Australia's The Sports follow up the promising success of "Who Listens To The Radio," the band's first single here, with the compelling new wave rock of the title track from their current LP. Lead singer Steve Cummings' forceful vocals should sell AOR, pop programmers on this track.

FATBACK (Spring/Polydor SP 3005)
Love In Perfect Harmony (4:14) (Clita Music — BMI) (J. Flippin)

Sparkling keyboard work opens extremely infectious ballad from the "Fatback XII" LP. Chime effects, clicking rhythm work and shimmering harmonies provide the easy background textures for luscious male-female vocal tradeoffs. A superb B/C, A/C and pop add.

LOU RAWLS (Phil. Int'l. ZS9 3738)
Sit Down And Talk To Me (3:15) (Mighty Three Music — BMI) (K. Gamble, L. Huff)

The much-vaunted horns of TSOP herald the opening of the title track from Rawls' current LP, moving into a swaying, Latin-tinged MOR-dance number. Rawls wraps his mature bass vocals around the sensitive lyrics, building to an upbeat climax. A nice B/C, A/C choice.

NAN MANCINI AND JDB (Windsong JH-11880)
Man's World (3:49) (Four or Five Guys From Jersey/Noo Noo Music/Windsea Music — BMI) (F. Smith, N. Mancini)

Melifluous vocals meld nicely with "soft" instruments, such as xylophone and muted horns, to produce an MOR number with just a dash of disco. Melodic lines are sophisticated and suggest AM radio potential. Breezy, light and fun.

BELL & JAMES (A&M 2204)
Only Make Believe (3:38) (Mighty Three Music — BMI) (L.M. Bell, C. James)

The title track from Bell & James' new LP is a swaying concoction of clicking instrumentals, striking a steady groove, with a full accompaniment of horns and strings, while the duo harmonizes easily, with some female backup assistance. Right for B/C and pop lists.

LARRY RASPBERRY & THE HIGHSTEPPERS (Mercury 76028)
Please Forgive A Fool (A Song For Missy) (3:47) (Shifrylepole Music/Cookhouse Music — BMI) (L. Raspberry)

Raspberry recalls the bluesy ballad style of Leon Russell on this single from his "No Accidents" LP, as his rough, raspy vocals stand out in front of a stark instrumental arrangement of piano, strings and reed work. A/C and pop, check this one out.

CITADEL (Boltax BOL 104)
Gonna Catch Up With You (3:22) (Sunbird Music/Civitas Music — BMI) (G. Akerley, R. Loy)

Citadel is a little known rock band who should be making big waves in the near future, judging from the high musical quality of the first single from their self-titled LP. Cut firmly in the Styx mold of synthesized pop-rock, this is highly recommended for pop, AOR lists.

DEMETRISS TRAPP (AVI AVI-297)
Power Of Love (2:52) (Equinox Music/Excellorec Music — BMI) (L. Darnell)

Trapp's soft, sensual vocals wrap around a lilting dance ballad on her first single for the AVI label. Backed by a full chorus and a sweet string section, this is fine for A/C, dance play.

CONTOURS (Solid Gold SG 554)
I'm A Winner (2:49) (Jodi-Pat Publ./Del Norte Publ. — BMI) (M. Valvano)

The Contours, presented here courtesy of Motown Records, continue to mine the vein of vintage '60s R&B vocal stylings which brought them a number of hits. Updated slightly with a slightly heavier bass and drum beat. For B/C play.

Decca Sets Date For Meeting On Polygram Offer

NEW YORK — The pending sale of Decca Records, including its United States company, London Records, to the Polygram Group, is set to be discussed at an Extraordinary General Meeting of Decca's shareholders during the first week of January, 1980, according to a spokesman for London.

Sir Edward Lewis, chairman of Decca Limited, stated on Oct. 30 that "an outline agreement has now been initialled, and Decca and Polygram expect to sign formal agreements for the sale at an early date."

However, Lewis added, the agreements would be subject to "certain UK fiscal and government consents, and, in view of the importance of the sale, the agreements would also be subject to the approval of Decca's Ordinary shareholders."

In his statement, Lewis noted that the trading losses of Decca's record business amounted to 1.6 million pounds to March, 1979. Lewis attributed the losses to "unfavorable market conditions for records and tapes both in the U.K. and the U.S.A." and to the "fall in profits of the Nigerian Record Company, which had made a large contribution in 1977 and 1978."

Overall, Lewis described 1979 as "a very difficult year for the Decca group." The British company lost 384,000 pounds before taxes in 1979, compared with a profit of 12.3 million pounds in 1978.

Capricorn Files Under Chapter XI

NASHVILLE — Capricorn Records and its publishing companies, No Exit Music Co. and Rear Exit Music Co. filed a voluntary petition of bankruptcy under Chapter XI of the Bankruptcy Act on Nov. 21 in the Middle District of Georgia.

Capricorn president Phil Walden attributed the move to the companies' inability to pay outstanding creditors. The filing was also explained as an attempt to reschedule debts and revitalize Capricorn.

Sources at the Macon, Ga.-based label blamed the current problems on disputes and ensuing litigation between Capricorn and Polygram, which distributes the label.

History

Originally a production company, which was organized in 1969, Capricorn was associated with Atlantic Records and its distributor was Atco Records. In 1971, Atco initiated Capricorn as a full custom label.

From 1972-77, Capricorn was distributed by Warner Bros. Records. In 1977 Capricorn parted with Polygram, expanding its promotion and sales staff.

Notable artists on the label included the Allman Brothers Band, the Marshall Tucker Band, Wet Willie, Jonathan Edwards and Martin Mull. Despite signing a variety of artists from different musical backgrounds, the label was best known for its southern rock talent.

The planned reorganization may meet the demands of the company's indebtedness and allow Capricorn to continue, according to label spokespersons.

Film Company Acquires BMI Publishing Firm

LOS ANGELES — Western International Pictures has acquired International Entertainment, a personal management firm and BMI publishing company. The purchase sum was not disclosed. W.I.P. president Bob Barich said of the acquisition, "Western International is broadening its base of operations in the entertainment industry by obtaining close to a 1,000 song library which I.E.M. has published over the past 12 years."

Record Merchandising, In Debt Over \$4.5 Million, Files Chapter XI Petition

LOS ANGELES — Record Merchandising, west coast independent label distributor, has filed a petition for reorganization under Chapter XI of the bankruptcy laws. In a filing in U.S. District Court here, the company listed assets of \$3,932,193 and liabilities of \$4,664,999.37.

At the same time, Federal Bankruptcy Judge William Lasarow has issued a notice of stay of actions and lien enforcement.

Major creditors, in order of indebtedness, include: Motown Records, \$1,471,502.76; A&M Records, \$473,838.84; CBS Records, \$253,169.48; Polygram Distributing, \$251,731.98; Fantasy Records, \$228,447.56; WEA, \$129,411; City National Bank, \$95,000; RCA Records, \$188,371.30; Janus Records, \$88,536 and Memorex, \$68,401.

Jobete Catalog: A Tie That May Not Bind

LOS ANGELES — In town to negotiate the acquisition of Jobete, Motown's publishing wing, Martin Bandier, who with Charles Koppelman heads the Entertainment Co., a music public firm based in New York, mentioned a potential stumbling block: "One problem in acquiring Jobete's catalog is that its magnitude makes it difficult to part with because of the emotional tie."

In existence for only five years, the Entertainment Co., which is also a production company, has during its relatively short tenure acquired the Wes Farrell and Music Maximus catalogs. In fact Bandier admits, "We're trying to buy us as many catalogs as we can."

The Entertainment Co. has chalked up an impressive track record in both producing and publishing. Bandier cites Jimmy Webb's "By The Time I Get To Phoenix," which Bandier's firm publishes and which holds the BMI record for the past 13 years as the most performed contemporary standard. In addition, the Entertainment Co. produced Glen Campbell's "Southern Nights" album, a chart-topper a few years back.

Barbra and Thelma

More recently, the organization's Gary Klein produced Barbra Streisand's "Wet" LP and co-produced with Giorgio Moroder the current #1 single, "Enough Is Enough" off the album. Upcoming is Thelma Houston's first recording for RCA, which is being executive produced by Jimmy Webb, also of the Entertainment Co.

If the Jobete purchase materializes, Bandier says he will reopen his Los Angeles office. He currently has about 20 employees working here on an ad hoc basis.

Arista Undergoing Staff Alterations

NEW YORK — Arista Records is currently involved in restructuring its staff, but a label spokesman would not say that the staff is being reduced. "The net result is that we will have an increase in personnel, not a decrease," he said.

According to the spokesman, three or four jobs will be eliminated, with their functions being absorbed by other personnel. In the long run, however, he noted, more people will be hired by the label than are being currently 'aid off'.

The source confirmed rumors that some former Infinity staffers are being considered for positions at Arista.

He would not confirm speculation that Ariola's U.S. operation will be moved to New York and marketed by Arista.

NARM Cleared On Anti-Trust Charges

NEW YORK — The anti-trust portion of a suit brought against the National Association of Recording Merchandisers by International RPM Inc. of Cherry Hill, New Jersey was dismissed last week by a Camden County, New Jersey Superior Court judge.

A day after the beginning of the jury trial, Judge H. Hurlburt Tomlin told attorneys that he lacked jurisdiction in the anti-trust part of the action, since he doubted that "the plaintiff has shown an ability to submit testimony that would show either a conspiracy or a restraint (of trade) in this state."

International RPM claims that in 1974, NARM promised to endorse a recording industry trade show proposed by RPM and then reneged on its promise. According to the suit, NARM and its then executive director, Jules Malamud, withdrew support from the proposed trade show due to pressure from its rack jobber members. International RPM contends that the rack jobbers feared the competitive threat of the trade show, which would have given retailers the opportunity to place orders directly with record manufacturers.

Despite the dismissal of the anti-trust action, the part of the suit charging NARM with breach of contract in its failure to endorse the trade show will be heard in Superior Court. International RPM is seeking an unspecified amount in damages.

'Rudolph' Celebrates His Thirtieth Birthday

NEW YORK — The ABC-TV presentation of "Rudolph's Shiny New Year" on Dec. 16 marks the 30th anniversary of the song, "Rudolph The Red Nosed Reindeer," composed in 1949 by Johnny Marks.

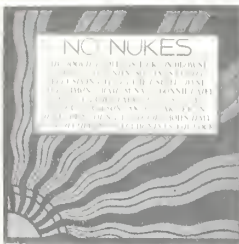
"Rudolph," first recorded by Gene Autry, has sold over 128 million records worldwide. Over seven million copies of sheet music for the song and 25 million copies of 140 arrangements of "Rudolph" have been purchased.

Marks, currently head of the New York-based publishing firm of St. Nicholas Music, has also composed "I Heard The Bells On Christmas Day," "Rockin' Around The Christmas Tree" and "A Holly Jolly Christmas."

In addition to the "Rudolph" special on ABC, "The Tiny Tree," a Christmas special featuring Marks' music, will air on CBS-TV Dec. 12.

This beautifully packaged three record set features the performances of the stars who made the MUSE concerts at Madison Square such an important musical and political event. In many ways it is a fitting LP to cap off the decade, as it showcases those artists who care for their fellow man as well as their beloved rock 'n' roll. There are 19 performers on the LP, but the most stunning exhibitions are put on by Jackson Browne, Tom Petty, Bonnie Raitt, The Doobie Bros. and Bruce Springsteen. An AOR must.

TEDDY LIVE COAST TO COAST — Teddy Pendergrass — Philadelphia International KZ2 36294 — Producers: Gamble & Huff — List: 11.98

This B/C Valentino has finally put out the album that his fans have been crying for. The two record set, three live sides and one studio/interview side, contains all the sexual electricity, intensity and female hoots and hollers of a Pendergrass show. His vocals are not as restrained as on his studio LPs, and it is a pleasure to hear the Otis Redding in him come out in a live setting. Highlights of the album include "Life Is A Song Worth Singing" and all of side three.

THE ROSE — Bette Midler — Atlantic SD 16010 — Producer: Paul A. Rothchild — List: 8.98

While the movie falls short of some people's expectations, Bette Midler's performance as the Joplin-like character is riveting. The in-concert sequences are exactly Bette's meat, and much of the passion and power of her celluloid performances are captured on the superbly recorded soundtrack. Most of the material has a hard pumping rock/R&B sound, and her between song raps are as engaging as the music. "Love Me With A Feeling," "Keep On Rockin'" and the title cut bring new meaning to the Midler performance.

LIVE & UNCENSORED — Millie Jackson — Spring SP-2-6725 — Producers: Millie Jackson and Brad Shapiro — List: 11.98

While a great deal of the material on this raunchy live two-record set will burn the ears of most B/C programmers, it captures the true essence of a Jackson live performance. Her raps, which seem to be geared toward the domestic black female, are both outrageous and comical. However, her gritty vocals are what really make this live collection work. "Put Something Down On It," "If Loving You Is Wrong," "The Soaps" and "A Moment's Pleasure" are the album's high points and Jackson emerges as the black Midler.

NEW YORK-LONDON-PARIS-MUNICH — M — Sire SRK 6084 — Producer: M — List: 7.98

Everybody is talking about "Pop Muzik," and the mysterious M, Robin Scott, has his finger firmly planted on the pulse of the music of the '80s, techno-pop. The inane talked/sung vocals, the silly electronic arrangements and mocking lyric content make the music danceable synthesized fun. Scott's infectious sound is augmented by Wally Badarou's interesting keyboard patterns, Julian Scott's guitar work and a bright horn section. The finest cuts on this commercial masterpiece are "Moonlight and Muzak" and "Pop Muzik."

IT'S ALL ABOUT LOVE — Jorge Santana — Tomato TOM-7033 — Producer: Allen Toussaint — List: 7.98

Jorge Santana has long been a leader of the Latin movement in rock. With "It's All About Love," he returns with a fine collection of Latino jazz/funk numbers that are as listenable as they are danceable. The music is rife with Santana's sophisticated guitar rhythms and leads and the percussion of "Yogi" Newman, but the accent is on easy moving funk. The finest cuts here are the title track, "Love Me Tonight" and "Feeling Good."

SABOTAGE/LIVE — John Cale — IRS SP 004 — Producer: John Cale — List: 7.98

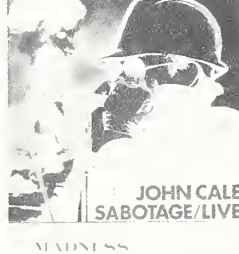
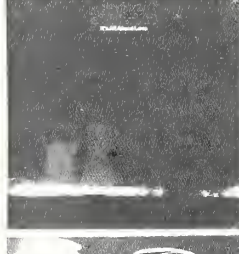
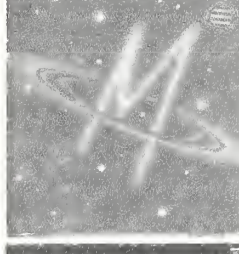
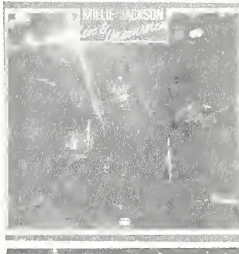
This spectral artist's latest LP contains much of the raw intensity that marked his early work with The Velvet Underground. Cale's warbling, haunting vocals are supported by a "hell bent" band led by guitarist Marc Aaron and keyboard player Joe Bidwell. Cale's penetrating historical and social rantings in this torrid live set are paced by "Mercenaries," "Dr. Mudd," "Captain Hook" and the title cut. This rock 'n' roll Flying Dutchman has once again turned in another package of nightmare songs for AOR.

ONE STEP BEYOND ... — Madness — Stiff SEEZ 17 — Producers: A Clander and Alan Winstanley — List: 7.98

Currently the darlings of the London club scene, Madness introduces "Ska" (a blending of reggae, rock and skiffle stylings) to the American pop audience with "One Step Beyond ...". While the band will most likely be lumped in with the current batch of new wave arrivals, the band is closer to Benny Hill and British music hall stylings than to The Clash or Magazine. Top tracks on this zany collection include "Tarzan's Nuts," "Mummy's Boy," "Chipmunks Are Go" and "Bed & Breakfast."

CITADEL — Boltax BOL 711 — Producers: Various — List: 7.98

This versatile New York-based band possesses a commercial progressive rock sound that is reminiscent of Kansas and Styx. Side one, paced by "Gonna Catch Up With You," "Stompin' Ground," and "Just A Little Bit Further," has a pop/top 40 flavor. However, side two lets the foursome kick out the prog-rock jams with a multitude of keyboard filled compositions.



NARM Prepares For 1980 Annual Convention

NEW YORK — The National Association of Recording Merchandisers has mailed out advance registration forms for its 1980 convention, which will be held March 23-26 at the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Commenting on the objectives of the 1980 convention, Joe Cohen, executive vice president of NARM, said "First, the NARM Convention must provide an environment for effective communication, an industry forum for constructive dialogue, eliminating altogether any aspect of an 'adversary' situation.

"Second," Cohen continued, "the NARM Convention must address itself to the stimulation of additional business activity at the retail store level by maximizing potential opportunities in the marketplace. We will do this through in-depth educational programming, as well as via the development of an exciting exhibit area."

An audio visual presentation on "The Gift of Music," the convention's theme, will highlight the opening business session. The presentation will introduce the logo and slogan for the industry gift-giving campaign, and will focus on year-round gift-giving merchandising and advertising opportunities.

Other business sessions will focus on editorial and advertising opportunities in the print media; home video entertainment merchandising opportunities; new developments in digital and direct-to-disc recordings; and capitalizing on sales of plus-profit items.

In addition, the convention will cover the impact that computers will have on the recording industry during the 1980's, with special emphasis on bar coding and inventory management.

FBI Raids Major LP, Tape Pirate In Texas

NEW YORK — An estimated \$15 million worth of tape duplicating equipment and allegedly counterfeited recordings were seized at two locations in Fort Worth, Texas, recently, from what FBI officials described as "the major distributor of counterfeit recordings for the southwest United States."

The locations that were raided, J&J Sales and an unnamed warehouse on Victory Avenue in Fort Worth, were said to be owned by Jerry May.

The buildings were described by FBI officials as factories where counterfeit tapes, illegal duplications of recordings originally issued by every major record company were being manufactured and distributed.

Mondays will be given over to new talent as a showcase night... At 515 West 18th St, Roxy, an entirely different kind of club, has 25,000 square feet of space and is being run by **Bill Graham** and **Steven Greenberg**. It features a gigantic roller skating rink made to order for roller disco dancing, as well as a restaurant and a regular dance floor... Down in Soho at 101 Greene St., there's a brand new club named, appropriately enough, **Greene Street**. Jazz and dinner will be emphasized at this lavishly refurbished truck warehouse, which is apparently, going after the chic dating crowd.

20 YEARS AT FOLK CITY — Folk City hasn't exactly been chic in the past few years, but it's managed to survive, nonetheless, as the premier venue for good, honest folk music in New York City. This week, from Dec. 10-16, the club will be celebrating its 20th anniversary. **Mike** and **John Porco** will host the festivities, and folksinger **Bob Gibson** will act as master of ceremonies. What's particularly significant about the anniversary is the fact that Folk City remains one of the few venues where a young artist can develop his or her talent and material without undue pressure from management. This tradition is a long-established one at Folk City, as evidenced by the long list of performers who debuted in New York there, including **Bob Dylan**, **Simon & Garfunkel**, **Peter, Paul & Mary**, **Tom Paxton** and **Judy Collins**. More recently, Folk City has provided an invaluable springboard for the careers of **Steve Forbert** and **Carolynne Mas**... Incidentally, the club still features hootenannies every Monday night.

IN THE STUDIO — **Chaka Kahn** finishing up her second album for Warners with **Arif Mardin** behind the boards... **Andy Gibb** is cutting tracks at Criteria in Miami with **Ahlyb Guluten**, **Karl Richardson** and **Barry Gibb** producing... **Mike Cuscuna** is producing **Norman Connors'** latest effort for Arista... and **Tommy LiPuma**, back at Warners, is producing the new album by **Michael Franks**... **Peter Gabriel** and **Genesis** are in Europe doing their separate albums... **Journey's** latest album is being produced by **Geoff Workman** and **Kevin Elson**... And the **Crusaders** will be playing on, as well as producing, **Randy Crawford's** new album...

SAVVY — A recording artist who keeps him or herself ignorant of conditions in the music business these days is definitely starting out behind the eight ball. But that charge certainly cannot be levelled against **Bob Welch**, who just released his third solo album, "The Other One." So if he's so smart, why isn't he touring to promote the album? "There's just not much happening out there right now," answers Welch, who has opted to go on the road for a radio and press promotion tour instead. "The ways things are now," he says, "a tour just wouldn't make sense." Welch feels the financial burden of a tour, especially in a soft economic climate, doesn't have to be a fact of life. "I think something can be worked out where two acts in the same league can work together as co-headliners. Everybody would benefit." Welch also says that he "busted his ass" to get his album in the stores by Christmas. "I'm betting on increased store traffic to get proportional sales," he said, "If the superstar albums do well, I'll get the drippings from that. If it doesn't sell in December, it ain't gonna sell in January." Looking ahead, Welch sees the adult contemporary format as a trend that will "follow the demographic change in the country as the number of teenagers decrease."

ROUNDER STATES POLICY — In the wake of the announcement that Rounder has taken over distribution of lines formerly handled by the New York-based Record People operation (**Cash Box**, Dec. 8), **Bill Nowlin** of Rounder has told us that his company will continue to carry "legitimate" jazz albums on these independent labels. He added that recordings which have not sold enough to pay anything to the artist will be dropped. Among the labels currently distributed by Rounder are AECO (the Art Ensemble of Chicago's company), Arhoolie, Artists House, Bee Hive, Biograph, Black Saint, Contemporary, Creative World, Delmark, El Saturn (Sun Ra's label), Eubie Blake, Euphonic, Flying Fish, French RCA, GNP, HoneyDew, Horo, IAI, India Navigation, JCOA, Nessa, Philly Jazz, Progressive, Red, Sackville, Steeple Chase, Xanadu and Zim. Nowlin went on to say that he and Rounder are seeking to maintain continuity for the smaller independents. "We recognize the need for solid distribution so that these records can be placed in retail outlets and into the hands of the public."

THE GLITTERING SILVER — **Horace Silver**, pianist and composer and originator of the Jazz Messengers. As you read this, he is putting final touches on his latest Blue Note album, a double-pocket set containing an ambitious 18-movement work. It may be Silver's last for the label with which he has been associated for 28 years, as his contract expires with this album. **Cash Box** recently spoke with Silver, who said he is "open for bids" from "reputable record companies who have staying power." He has yet to meet with the people at EMI, the company that took over the United Artists/Blue Note companies recently, "Maybe I will stay with them," he confided. "I don't know until I meet with them. Maybe I will go elsewhere. Depends on the offers and the talks." Silver has the longest on-going contract among any jazz artist living. The only record he cut outside of Blue Note was a Columbia LP called "Silver Blue," after he did two-ten-inchers with a trio for Blue Note. Columbia liked the extended group (including Hank Mobley and Kenny Dorham), recalled Silver, "so they asked me to do one under the name 'Horace Silver Quintet.'" That group eventually became the Jazz Messengers, which Silver drummer **Art Blakely** took over when Silver decided to opt for a solo contract with Blue Note.

FOR THE STAY-AT-HOMES — Last New Year's Eve was considerably enhanced by National Public Radio's all-night broadcast from both coasts. This time around, NPR will be bringing "Jazz Alive!" to the nation from three venues: Washington, D.C.'s Blues Alley, Chicago's Jazz Showcase, and San Francisco's Keystone Korner. Blues Alley will present **Zoot Sims, Al Cohn, Jimmie Rowles, Carole Sloan, Eddie 'Cleanhead' Vinson** and the **Ray Bryan Trio** from 9:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. ET (Happy New Year I); Jazz Showcase will have the **Woody Shaw** ensemble and the **Von Freeman Quartet** from 12:30 a.m.-2:30 a.m. ET (Happy New Year II); and Keystone Korner will air **Art Blakely** and all-star alumni **Cedar Walton, Freddie Hubbard, Curtus Fuller** and **Airto** from 2:30 a.m. to approximately 5:00 a.m. (Happy New Year III).

DISK BITS — Inner City has repackaged the first **Jeff Lorber** Fusion album and the more recent **Judy Roberts** collection. . . . 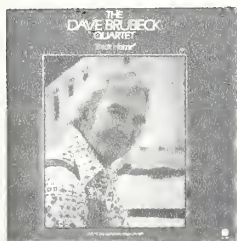

Brubeck's signature keyboard virtuosity gets a full workout on this outing. **Jerry Bergonzi's** wild tenor sax performance points to Brubeck's continued ability to attract top sidemen. Slower paced, but equally riveting in a subtler way is "When The Masquerade Is Over," a haunting homage to jazz's poetic powers.

STREET OF DREAMS — **Bill Henderson** — Discovery DS-802 — Producers: **Bill Henderson, Albert Marx** and **Dennis Smith** — List: 7.98

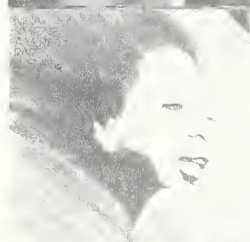
Several show tunes by **Rodgers, Hammerstein** and **Jerome Kern** get the jazz treatment here. Arrangements have a distinctive Vegas cabaret flavor. Not for jazz purists, but "Street of Dreams," because of its eclectic mix, should appeal to a wider audience. Somber melodic line of "Whisper Not" belongs more to mainstream jazz as Henderson gets a chance to showcase his mellow singing style.

NIGHT CHILD — **Oscar Peterson** — Pablo Today 2312 108 — Producer: **Norman Craz** — List: 8.98

Oscar Peterson on electric piano? Yes, indeed! Whether tentatively experimental, as on the opening "Solar Winds," or the lusty swinger we know, as on "Dancin' Feet" Peterson beautifully acquits himself on an instrument that often renders soloist identification impossible. He leads a luminous quartet including **Joe Pass** on guitar, **Louis Bellson** on drums, and **Niels Henning Orsted Pedersen** on bass.

PRESSURE — MCA/LAX 3195 — Producer: **Ronnie Laws** — List: 7.98

Lively a cappella vocals start the first track, "That's The Thing To Do," on this album produced by **Ronnie Laws** for **Pressure**, his backup group. One of LAX's first offerings, **Pressure's** self-titled album features a lot of bass improvisation and ingenious synthesizer tricks. Hold on to "Hold On" cut, penned by group guitarist **Melvin Robinson**. It's a dreamy, mid-tempo number with lilting vocals.

A VERY RARE EVENING — **Nina Simone** — PM PMR 018 — Producer: **Gene Perla** — List: 6.00

Anything by this lady of song is welcome, especially when she's in front of an adoring audience, as she is in these decade-old, never-released sides. **Simone** covers all bases from **Barry Gibb's** "In The Morning," to **Pete Seeger's** adaptation from the Book of Ecclesiastes, "Turn! Turn! Turn!" She gives special meaning to such tunes as the poignant "The Other Woman," the gospel inflected "Save Me," and "I Think It's Going To Rain Today." But the highlight is her own tune, composed with keyboardist **Weldon Irvine**, "Revolution."

ALIVE! — **ALIVE!** — Urana/Wise Women Enterprises STWWE84 — Producer: **Althea Waites** — List: 7.98

The debut LP by this all-female quintet from San Francisco swings with the confidence that comes only with experience. Vocalist **Rhiannon** composed part of the "Alive!" material along with percussionist **Carolyn Brandy**. From the opening track, "Somebody's Talkin' To You," through the concept pieces, "City Life" and "Dark Side of the Moon," and the African-derived "Yemaya, Sister Of the Fishes," "Alive!" jumps with a rhythmic spirit and a melodic bite that grabs the listener instantly.

IN THE NUKE OF TIME — Rock 'n' roll conservationists **Jackson Browne** and **Graham Nash**, the two people who were most responsible for producing Asylum's "No Nukes: The MUSE Concerts For A Non-Nuclear Future" LP, can rest a little easier now that the album has been released. The two confessed that they'd hardly slept a week when they brought a test pressing to E/A headquarters in Los Angeles for a listening session. The mammoth weight of trying to get the three record set out quickly, less than three months after the original MUSE concerts, had fallen directly on the backs of Browne, Nash and fellow MUSE board members, **Bonnie Raitt** and **John Hall**. There were more than 20 hours of raw live music to contend with and the 19 artists represented on the album had to evaluate their own tracks, and pick the performances they wanted to include on the LP after the songs had been mixed. At the same time it was necessary to sequence the tracks so that the LP would have its own rhythm and become a perfect sampling of the five concerts. Consequently, Browne was spending hours on end in the Sound Factory in Hollywood working on a **Bruce Springsteen** transition, and then turning to a **Doobie Bros.** track. Meanwhile a few miles away at Rudi studios in Hollywood, Nash was getting heavy eyelids as he toiled over a **Crosby, Stills & Nash** number. An occasional catnap on a studio couch was the only respite. Unmixed tapes of songs arrived via record company pouch, and then were sent back for artist approval. However, the process was not fast enough, and Browne ended up flying across the country no less than four times in ten days. "We worked as hard on the album as we did on the concerts," said a rather dazed Nash. Happily all the painstaking effort was worth it. The album is not only a great representation of the Sept. 19-23 concerts, but is also a timely record to close out the decade. The finest artists of the last ten years have found their way on to vinyl here. The album is highlighted by **Browne and Nash's** version of the old folk song "Crow On The

"Somebody Must Have Loved You Right Last Night." The picture will be directed by **David Greene** and produced by Greene and **Mack Bing**. . . . Daniels**, the firm's founder, and written by **Bernie Rollins**. The film deals with the struggle for success in the record industry while also telling a tale of tokenism and tax write-offs. The film stars Daniels, **The Love Machine** and **John Goff**. **Mable King**, **David Hubbard** and **Bryan O'Dell** are featured in guest performances. . . . "No No Pickle," an animated short featuring **Arlo Guthrie's** classic song of the highway, "The Motorcycle Song," is set to play for a limited seven day run at the Avco Cinema in Westwood starting Dec. 12. The film directed by **John Wokuluk** and produced by **Peter Starr**, is being exhibited in order to qualify for Academy Award consideration.

SELFISH — **The Knack's** "My Sharona" has gone to the number one position in Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Hong Kong, Guatemala, Israel and France. However, the people at Capitol are not content. On Dec. 24 the label will release the mocking "My Balogna" by **"Weird" Al Yankovich**.

STUDIO TRACKS — **The Beach Boys** are in at Rumbo Recorders, the new studio built by **Captain & Tennille**. The 24 track studio has a nautical motif, in honor of the Captain, and is located at 20215 Saticoy in Canoga Park. . . . Transcendental saxophonist **Pharoah Sanders** is currently recording tracks at the Automatt in San Francisco for his latest LP on Theresa Records. . . . Drummer **Carmen Appice** is in at El Dorado studios in Hollywood laying tracks for his next album. . . . El Dorado is also where the new new wave television show, **"Hollywood Heartbeat 1980,"** is having its sound mixed. . . . **Pyramid**, Capitol records recent signing, is currently recording at Scott/Sunstorm studios.

SEMINARS & CLASSES — A UCLA extension class entitled, "The Art and Practice of Marketing In The Music Industry" will be held Jan. 12 at 4 p. m. in Dodd Hall. The intensive one-day seminar will investigate all disciplines involved in breaking new artists and the marketing of recordings in a highly competitive industry.

NEW RELEASES — Atlantic is releasing "Fool In The Rain" as the first single from the Led Zepplin's "In Through The Out Door" LP. The song is backed by a rockabilly flavored ditty entitled "Hot Dog". . . . Another heavy metal giant that is following in the tradition of **Sam Phillips'** legendary Sun label, the spawning ground of such legendary acts as **Elvis Presley** and **Jerry Lee Lewis**, is **Queen**. Elektra has just released the group's new single, a rockabilly song entitled "Crazy Little Thing Called Love." . . . "Setting Sons," the new album by the **Jam** highlights Polydor's late January release schedule, which also includes LPs by **Phillips & McCloud**, **Arpeggio**, **Sweet People**, **Hi-Fi** and an **Amnesty International** album on the Charisma label. In February, Polydor will release LPs by **Pat Travers**, **Buckeye**, **Alton McClain & Destiny**, **Wayne Henderson & Roy Ayers** and the mysterious **Robert Fripp**.

Polydor Campaigns Hard For Jackson's New X-Rated Album

NEW YORK — "Live and Uncensored," Millie Jackson's new double album set on Spring Records, distributed by Polydor, is the object of an intensive print, radio and television campaign coordinated by the two labels.

Because some of the material on the album is X-rated, the package has been stickered with the legend, "For Mature Audiences Only: This album contains explicit language which may be considered objectionable by some listeners." Additionally, the cartons in which the LP arrives at the stores have a bright orange decal which reads, "X-Rated, X-Plicit, X-Actly Like It Is."

Teasers

In addition, a series of teaser commercial spots are being run on the radio with the theme, "To hear the new Millie Jackson album un-censored, you'll have to take it home with you." The media campaign will also include TV spots, outdoor billboard ads, and posters in many major markets.

On the retail side, listening sessions are being held all over the country with the theme, "After Hours Party for After Hours Music." Some stores will also feature "Mature Listeners Only" areas, equipped with headphones where customers may preview the album. Posters, streamers and bumper stickers with the triple-x message, along with over-sized, kiss-shaped buttons for in-store personnel to wear, are also being utilized. Finally, various tie-ins are being utilized with the "Royal Rappin's" album, Millie Jackson's current collaboration with Isaac Hayes.

Court Upholds Right Of ASCAP Members To Sue Religious Stations

NEW YORK — The right of ASCAP members to bring copyright infringement actions against religious radio stations who use copyrighted material without making any payment was upheld when the U.S. District Court signed an order denying certain religious groups a preliminary injunction in an antitrust action against ASCAP. The religious broadcasters had also sought to prevent ASCAP from collecting license fees and from settling pending infringement actions while the antitrust action is pending.

Since the suit, entitled the Alton Rainbow Corp. et al v. ASCAP, and filed in early March, 1977, members of ASCAP have instituted more than 30 infringement suits against religious stations.

Directors' Discontenters Economics

Discussions of survival strategies permeated the three-day National Record Pool Conference at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel Nov. 25-28. Disco pool directors met with record label execs in a series of meetings which emphasized industry economics.

The assembled pool directors from all over the country basically agreed on self-regulation, better feedback reporting methods and increased attention to manufacturer promotional requirements. There were few complaints from most of the assembled pool operators about record label service.

Chart Complaints

Much effort was also expended on the wording of an open letter decrying the "inaccuracy of trade charts." The group asked that chart compilers expand the list of reporting discos in order "to reflect a broader cross-section" of spinners and locations.

Bo Crane and John Terry of the Florida Record Pool co-chaired the sessions. Keynoter Stan Hoffman, executive vice president of Prelude Records, warned, "There are many record execs who would like to see disco dry up and blow away."

Disagreements were minimal during the confab as the record pool people seemed to be more interested in proving their value to the industry.

Pool directors also discussed the importance of maintaining a professional attitude and the possible necessity of increasing DJ members' dues as rosters are trimmed in the face of label cutbacks.

Participants were also entertained at numerous local discotheques, highlighted by a welcoming party. Jackie Moore and Loleatta Holloway headlined the slate of guest artists at the event.

RCA Posts Dividend

NEW YORK — RCA directors have declared a quarterly dividend of 40 cents per share on RCA Common Stock payable Feb. 1, 1980 to holders of record Dec. 17, 1979.

At their regular meeting, the directors also declared dividends of 87½ cents per share on the \$3 50 cumulative first preferred stock and one dollar per share on the four-dollar cumulative convertible first preferred stock, both for the period from Jan 1, 1980 to March 31, 1980, both payable April 1, 1980 to holders of record March 14, 1980.

WHAT'S IN-STORE

TAPE NEWS — In an effort to maximize exposure to the "Full Color Sound" TDK campaign now in progress, a multi-colored 24" x 36" poster is being offered to consumers. Customers purchasing two Sony SHF audio cassettes in any tape length will receive the "Full Color Sound" poster of the original Sony print advertisement with artwork by commercial artist Milton Glaser. Valued at \$200, each videotape in the series will be available from 3M with a 12-month cumulative purchase of \$200 of Scotch brand helical and video tape and \$20 to cover the cost of duplication and distribution.

BRITISH DISTRIBUTION — The Gillette-Madison company of New Jersey has announced its acquisition of distributorship rights for BBC Records in the United States. The long-term deal provides for sale to the retail market of such acts as Monty Python's Flying Circus, Dr. Who, Two Ronnies, as well as other items from the radio and television stations of the British Broadcasting Corporation. The first release, to be accompanied by an industry promotion campaign, is scheduled for January, 1980. In addition to the pop items already mentioned, the release will include religious and classical items such as Dame Margot Fonteyn with the Royal Opera House Orchestra.

LABEL PROMOTIONS — Several labels are currently conducting major contests. . . Chrysalis has been holding a national Blondie "Eat to the Beat" display and consumer competition. Display kits, which include posters and album jackets, have been circulated widely in the sixteen regions where the label is distributed. These kits also contain entry blanks for the customer contest. The grand prize winner of the national drawing will receive a trip for two to Paris, including dinner at Maxime's Restaurant. There will also be four second prizes of Sony Betamax and eleven third prizes of dinner-for-two in the customer's town. In addition, there will also be 16 regional store winners in the display contest, with each winner receiving a color TV set. It is reported that between 3,000 and 4,000 accounts have already participated. . . CBS Records reports its own push behind the new Crystal Gayle album. There are numerous display contests in progress in Southern California, Phoenix and Albuquerque, with several chains, (Tower, Licorice Pizza and Musicland), participating. Tower, San Diego, for example, has constructed an elaborate window display featuring a rented carriage, a mannequin dressed like a southern belle and a 25' x 30' hand-painted background mural.

HOLIDAY HELP — Considerable charitable activity reported so far this Christmas season. . . The Korvette's chain and FM 99 (WXLO) are running a John Denver and the Muppets' charity drive throughout the New York area. For each of the LPs sold, \$1 will be donated to the FM99 Children's Fund. The fund, in existence for 34 years, aids hospitalized youngsters. The station's on-air personalities are making numerous announcements about the promotion each day while the participating stores have posted signs to promote the drive. . . Cracker's Records and Tapes, Denver, in conjunction with radio station KAZY and CBS Records recently held a day-long dance marathon with the proceeds going to the March of Dimes. In this event, held at the Denver University Student Union, each of the 100 entrants solicited sponsors who pledged money for each hour that they survived the marathon. The dancer with the greatest cash sponsorship was awarded a full weekend for two in Dillon, Colorado. In addition, the seven dancers who lasted the full 24 hours were also given prizes. CBS provided Beat T-shirts to all participants who could "keep the beat" for at least 15 hours. The March of Dimes reported the event a tremendous success with over \$2000 pledged. . . Still another event held by Charts, Phoenix and KOPA for fatherless children. Dubbed the "KOPA Christmas Miracle," it operates as follows: Kids without fathers call the station and tell over the air what gift they most want for Christmas. Customers then bring in that gift and place it under a large tree in the store. This will continue until the tree has been completely surrounded by presents. A Christmas party will then be held for these children, where they will be given the gift that they had requested. . . Finally, Peaches, Oklahoma City and KAEZ (107 FM) are conducting a toy drive for the Oklahoma Association for Retarded Children. The first 107 people who donate toys will receive a certification for a free cut-out LP from the store.

SOUND VIEWS

WARNER CABLE PROPOSES 125 CHANNEL CABLE TV WEB — Before the New York City Board of Estimates last week, Warner Cable Corp. proposed a web of cable TV systems, constructed to carry some 125 channels in four separate "tiers" (price-product levels), as part of the most ambitious cable system yet to be designed. The proposed system in New York City alone is expected to hit some 1.6 million homes in Manhattan, Queens and Brooklyn. The system will also utilize three coaxial cables, to be installed side by side, to handle the heavy channel load. Tier #1 would carry approximately 24 channels, including broadcast re-transmissions; Tier #2 would carry those same 24 channels, plus a total of 12 more; and Tier #3 would carry an additional 12, for a total of 48. Tier #4, the highest-priced level, will carry Warner's QUBE two-way interactive service, now operating in the Columbus, Ohio market, along with some 80 channels. Additionally, some four separate pay TV channels have been proposed as part of the web, including **Time Inc.'s Home Box Office, Spanish International Network's Galavision, Warner Amex Satellite Entertainment Corp.'s the Movie Channel** and the independent **Home Theatre Network**.

U.S. GOVERNMENT ENTERS HOME VIDEO MARKET — **The National Audio-Visual Center**, a division of the **National Archives**, is expected to put most of its documentaries and informational films on home video formats, in addition to custom duplicating other titles which it controls upon demand. The National A-V center already rents, as well as sells, films, including a collection put together by the National Park Service and "Documentary Film Classics" group, featuring the work of such noted directors as John Ford, William Wyler, Frank Capra and others. Although most titles are in the \$100-\$200 range, the Center does accept credit cards.

THE CHRISTMAS GIFT FOR THE VIDEO BUFF WHO HAS EVERYTHING — Neiman-Marcus has come up with the ultimate Christmas gift for the video buff who has everything... just short of a broadcast-quality video studio. In its Christmas catalog this year, the Dallas-based department store chain, which caters to the elite, is advertising a fiberglass, aluminum and steel backyard antenna dish, intended to be aimed at SATCOM 1, RCA's communication satellite which is some 22,000 miles above the South Pacific. The dish, which retails for some \$36,500, captures the satellite signal and is converted to a television picture via a receiver inside the home. Thus, the owner of the backyard station can "eavesdrop" on the 16 channels beamed from SATCOM 1, receiving more than 10,000 movies annually, 6,000 hours of children's programming, live coverage of the House of Representatives meetings, in addition to financial reports and news from Reuters... Four manufacturers are already selling the satellite television antennae directly to the consumer, and more can be expected to enter the market, as a result of the FCC's recent decision to free receive-only satellite antennae from licensing requirements.

VIDEO CLIPS — **Kramer/Rocklen** has begun editing footage of Warner Bros. recording group **Fleetwood Mac** for international use. Already set for the video is the band's new single, "Sara." The production company has also recently completed a commercial spot for A&M recording artist **Herb Alpert's** "Rise" LP, which is already being aired nationwide... In other Kramer/Rocklen news, **Jerry Kramer** and the firm's **Robert Lombard** recently served as guest lecturers for **Bob Emmer's** USC class. Emmer, new vice president of **Alive Video**, invited the two to speak on the marketing of video software... **Keef Co.** has finished shooting a promotional video for **Rocky Burnette's** "Tired Of Toeing The Line," a big U.K. pop hit. The company is also putting together a promotional film of Elektra/Asylum group **Queen**, involving animation... WNEW-TV in New York, Channel 5, ran Keef Co.'s film of **Paul McCartney's** Columbia LP, "Back To The Egg," with the addition of the single "Goodnight Tonight," without commercial interruption. The presentation was

AUDIOPHILE LP REVIEWS

MARC LEVINSON PRESENTS — **dbx Recording Technology Series** — **dbx RTS-1** — **Distributor: dbx, Inc.** — **List: 15.95**

dbx, Inc., utilizing a compression-expansion process, has endeavored to bridge the gap between low noise levels and lifelike dynamic range of current recording technology and the limitations of vinyl discs. Judicious use of the volume control is necessary as the lack of disc noise offers no clues to the awesome range of dynamics on this meticulously recorded repertoire of jazz and classical selections. From the powerful low registers of the cathedral organ to pianissimo notes on the concert grand, transparency and realism are the words here.

DREAMBOAT ANNIE — **Heart** — **Nautilus NR 3/MRS 5005** — **Producer: Mike Flicker** — **Distributor: Orion Marketing** — **List: 14.95**

There are many excellent audiophile releases but until recently there were few pop-contemporary offerings. Nautilus' decision to issue Heart's "Dreamboat Annie" as the first release in their "SuperDisc" (half-speed mastered and pressed on pure vinyl) series is a welcome one. Evocative lyrics and vocals, elegant arrangements and flawless production all helped to make this album a platinum winner in 1976. With a combination of high musicality, master tape fidelity, and an audiophile quality pressing, "Dreamboat Annie" should prove a winner three years later.

TCHAIKOVSKY: Symphony No. 4, Cleveland Orchestra, Lorin Maazel, conductor. Telarc Digital 10047. List: 14.95

This is the same team — including producer Robert Woods and the Cleveland Orchestra under Maazel's direction — that made the excellent Telarc recording of Moussorgsky's "Pictures At An Exhibition." Once again, the results are superb. The clarion trumpet call of the opening has an unbelievable amount of presence and clarity, and the various instrumental sections can be heard separately even when they are playing together. Maazel's direction, while firm and straightforward, features enough flexibility to encompass the mercurial moods of the Russian master. The pizzicato strings in the third movement are especially elegant, standing out in relief against the totally noiseless background.

Dallas Set As The Third Market For Magnavision Videodisc Player Set

LOS ANGELES — Dallas has been slated as the third introductory market for the Magnavision Optical Videodisc player. The players became available to consumers through local outlets on Dec. 7.

The Magnavision player, which utilizes an optical laser system to "read" both picture and sound on a 12-inch disc, made its debut in Atlanta a year ago and was introduced to the Seattle-Tacoma market in May of this year.

The player will continue to sell for a suggested retail price of \$775. Dealers carrying the Magnavision player, as well as the MCA DiscoVision discs, include Sanger Harris, Joske's, Rick Furniture, Boyd's Good Housekeeping Shops, Orion Magnavox, Inman's Television and Dillard's Department Store.

3rd Market

According to Kenneth Ingram, senior vice president of sales and marketing for the Magnavox Consumer Electronics Co., Dallas was selected as the third market for the player following Magnavox' research of owners in the Atlanta area. Ingram stated that 1/3 of all Magnavision systems owners in the Atlanta market owned video cassette recorders as well, indicating little conflict between the video cassette recorder and the disc player.

"Dallas residents have a high disposable income, and there are a large number of high income families," Ingram said. "Also, there is a high color TV penetration, and the sophistication of the Dallas market suggests a good match between the highly sophisticated electronics offered by the player and the potential Dallas area buyer."

Rubin Named As VP, Cable Programming, For Group W Prod.

LOS ANGELES — Robert H. Rubin has been named vice president, programming for cable, a new position, for Group W Productions. The announcement of Rubin's appointment was made by Edwin T. Vane, president and chief executive officer of Group W Productions.

Rubin previously served as director, program development, Premium Program department, and executive director, QUBE Games, with Warner Cable Corp., from 1977 to earlier this year. Most recently, he has been producer and creator of variety specials for cable networks with Leslie/Kleiman International.

RCA Inks License Deals For Its 'SelectaVision' Videodisc System

NEW YORK — RCA Corporation has concluded two separate licensing arrangements to obtain material for its "SelectaVision" VideoDisc system. The first, with ITC Entertainment Inc., and Black Lion Films Ltd. is for the release of "To Russia, . . . With Elton," documentary of Elton John's series of concert and club performances in the Soviet Union.

Walt Disney Deal

The second arrangement is with Walt Disney Productions, giving RCA the rights to use 16 feature motion pictures and eight one hour programs featuring the best of Disney's animated characters. Among the feature films licensed to RCA are "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea," "The Love Bug," "The Absent Minded Professor," "The Shaggy Dog," "The Prince and the Pauper," "Kidnapped" and "Escape to Witch Mountain."

RCA has also entered into a deal to license material for videodiscs from Don Kirshner Productions. (See separate story.)

Alive Ent. Forms Alive Video, Inc.

LOS ANGELES — Alive Enterprises has formed Alive Video, Inc., which will supply pre-recorded video software for the home video market. Alive Video's formation was announced by Shep Gordon, chairman of the board of Alive Enterprises.

Allan Strahl has been named president of the company and Bob Emmer will serve as vice president of business affairs. The new company now expands the media services of Alive Ent., which has departments in film, TV, music publishing and personal management.

The first product from Alive Video will be "Yvonne Elliman in Concert," a videocassette featuring RSO recording artist Yvonne Elliman performing live. The cassette, offered in both VHS and Beta formats, will be distributed under a non-exclusive agreement between Alive and Visual Records of Anaheim. The Elliman program is also the first video cassette manufactured under a fully executed contract with the American Federation of Musicians.

AFM Deal

According to Alive Video's Strahl, the Elliman videocassette is the first home video music product on the market "to our knowledge, in which the artist, music publishers and musicians will all be receiving royalties." The deal between Alive and the American Federation of Musicians was signed six months ago and Alive Video will release the Elliman cassette and "all future Alive Video product under the full cooperation, approval and acknowledgement of the American Federation of Musicians," added Strahl.

Alive Video also plans to release video cassettes of Philadelphia International recording artist Teddy Pendergrass, performing live in concert; Capitol recording artist Anne Murray, and a compilation of Alive Enterprises' greatest hits.

color televisions would also own the player system. An average annual business in the '80s of from 200-250 million discs was also predicted by the RCA chief.

By the end of the decade Griffiths foresees a \$7.5 billion industry for videodisc product. He summed up the conglomerate's attitude toward the new product when he said, "RCA has nothing short of a total commitment to videodiscs, with absolutely massive support and money being supplied to do the job."

A description of the system and its operation was also showcased at the distributors' meeting. The player uses a diamond stylus that is so small that fifty of the needles could rest on the edge of a dollar

Baker's very country flavored record, on the Seeds & Stems label, has received national airplay from **KRTH/Los Angeles** and **KILT/Houston** to **WFIL** and **WMMR** in Philadelphia and many points in between. It is also one of the few available on the retail level. Another tune that was first heard on **Top 40 WSGN/Birmingham**, and is now receiving much country airplay, is "Message to Khomeini," by **Roger Hallmark** and **The Thrasher Bros.** This too is available on the retail level. Programmers will have to make up their minds whether to play these records or not, but the fact is, they are available.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION — The three Most Added albums on FM are "The Wall," by **Pink Floyd**, which debuted on the **Cash Box** Top 200 Albums Chart at 39 bullet, followed by the "No Nukes" live compilations of various artists, and last week's Most Added, "The Very Dab" by **Fingerprintz**. Programmers definitely welcomed the **Floyd LP** citing "In The Flesh," "Another Brick In The Wall Pt. 2," "Mother," "Hey You," and "Young Lust" as the prime cuts. The same is true for the "No Nukes" LP with "Before The Deluge," "Teach Your Children," "Takin' It To The Streets," "Long Time Gone," and "Honey Get Out Of L.A." getting immediate acceptance. A popular cut off the **Fingerprintz** album is "Invisible Seamz." . . . service organization."

"People look at AM as a place to get information and entertainment," adds **Marsha Green**, promotion manager/publicity director for **KMPC/Los Angeles**, where the top personality is the multi-talented **Gary Owens**. "It's like a friend, talking to you as opposed to just spinning a record."

Nevertheless, the return of radio personalities has not been confined to the AM stations. Referring to the installation of stand-up comic **Frazer Smith** in the morning drive at **KLOS/Los Angeles**, **Damion, PD** at the station, explains, "Everything goes in cycles. Now you see more and more personalities, especially in the morning. There will probably be more and more personalities added in the future, but when you think about it, in the **Real Don Steele** days, there were only a dozen or so personalities across the nation. So there may be more for a while, but I think it will start moving back towards that eventually."

Nonetheless, as competition for listeners increases, the need for personalities grows. In the highly competitive morning drive in **Los Angeles**, where **Dees** at **KHJ**, **Smith** at **KLOS**, **Robert W. Morgan** at **KMPC**, **Jeff Gonzer** at **KMET**, **Lohman & Barkley** at **KFI** and **Charlie Tuna** at **KHTZ** all have their own followings, fully automated **KRTH** recently installed the team of **John London** and **Ron Engleman** live to join the fray.

This has also added another dimension to the PD's job — managing and working with superbly talented performers who may require other than conventional working conditions. "I like guys on the air who challenge me as a programmer," explains **WABC's Brady**. "To manage them properly, to channel their energies so they don't lose sight of the station's goals can sometimes lead to confrontations, but with mutual respect, you come to solutions."

This attitude is shared by **Joe Piasek, PD** at **WPIX/New York**, who adds, "dealing with an ego who may feel he's being sacrificed or exploited can be difficult. For an ego to grow without becoming egocentric, you must let the personality carry the ball within the structure you outline. Personalities need to be appreciated and respected. Personality is essential to radio, but it should not be an obstruction to your basic goals."

And with the basic goal being numbers and entertainment, it becomes vital to pick the right person for the job. "The radio personality must have the ability to communicate one-to-one," explains **KLAC's Langford**. "The personality is faced with the

unique problem of going into a room, closing the door and entertaining the microphone."

Echoing this sentiment, **KMPC's Owens**, whose fame spreads far beyond radio, adds that "you have to realize that there are a million audiences of one out there. You have to be general to relate to the great masses of people out there, but you've also got to be personable, where the audience can feel that you're talking to them as individuals."

"The audience will forgive you for being wrong and exciting, but never for being right and boring."

Trendsetters

Also important is a personality that can be looked up to as someone slightly ahead of his time. "A good personality should be setting the trends," explains **Frankie Crocker, PD** at **WBLS/New York**. "So you have to give a talented DJ the freedom to work within your format. With a talented person on the air, it's a big plus for the listener, as well as the station."

"People get bored with the machine-like formats," says **KLOS' Smith**. "With all the jocks sounding primarily the same, playing primarily the same type of music, a lot of the public couldn't care less what station they listened to. If you can offer something different, something up-tempo, a lot of the public will wake up and recognize what you're doing. Then you've succeeded in what you started out to do."

This sentiment was shared by **KMPC's Owens**, who has been with the station for the past 18 years. "You can possibly have the same numbers without a personality, but you won't have the same loyalty."

Versatile Todd Rundgren Now Exploring Video Production

adaptation of Gustav Holst's "The Planets" using a science-fiction fantasy as a backdrop.

The video production ended up costing Rundgren \$150,000 to produce one album side, most of which was put together in a recording studio, as Rundgren's own video workshop was not yet completed. Rundgren consequently brought the production, still on videotape, to RCA which, he says, were aghast at the price. However, they did buy the promotional rights to the video for \$30,000, a good deal less than it cost him to make.

That experience with RCA, Rundgren explained, forced him to re-think his original ideas of producing video projects for the home market, via the videodisc or videocassette mediums, through a major manufacturer. Rundgren now believes that, at this point, the manufacturers do not have the interests of the video artist in mind nor does he feel that they will be receptive to video artists such as himself in the near future, primarily because the cost is so great and the market so small.

"I was doing this thing for RCA in the hopes that along with this mercenary attitude that they have, they might adopt some artistic responsibility," says Rundgren angrily. "But, of course, I was wrong."

'Hardware War'

Rundgren fully admits that he approached this decision as an artist rather than a businessman. His own attitude and philosophy, he states, is that manufacturers in the video industry are forcing the consumer to become embroiled in a "hardware war," with little concern for the development of a new art form by the video artist or for the consumer himself.

"The manufacturers are not concerned with making things better for the consumer, but better for themselves," says Rundgren. "Ideally, if they wanted to make things better for the consumer, they wouldn't involve him in a hardware war, they would establish a standard and strive to perfect that standard."

"The whole concept is that one of these companies wants to triumph over all of the rest, corner the market and force everyone to buy licensing rights from them."

However, Rundgren does believe that television, as a broadcast medium with its burgeoning alternative programming offshoots such as pay cable, satellite stations, two-way interactive QUBE systems and the like opening up, has considerable potential for artists and consumers as a

viable outlet right now.

"Television is the most widely disseminated and most immediately accessible medium of communication we have at the present," says Rundgren. "Its services just have to be broadened."

In fact, Rundgren adds that a video project he is trying to develop for the "Adventures In Utopia" LP will be produced with TV in mind.

"Any project I develop at this time will be aimed at a broadcast or cable outlet," stated Rundgren bluntly. "I'm not even going to bother conceptualizing for the so-called videodisc or cassette mediums. The most realistic thing for me as an artist is to aim my work for some realtime transmission medium, be it broadcast, cable, satellite or whatever."

Utopian Network

In keeping with his utopian philosophy, Rundgren says that he would ideally "like to see an artist-oriented world satellite network devoted to socially-conscious artists." Utopia Studios, he asserts, will be a production haven for artists who share a similar line of thinking and are looking for alternatives to standard commercial production facilities.

Rundgren also envisions the day when digital television will be the norm and all of the contemporary lines of "information distribution" will be replaced by a central computer bank which will handle all facets of our daily lives. Regarding his own future in video, Rundgren is quite confident that his career in the field will continue to grow and expand.

"I'm going to be in business a long time because I deal in the software," he summed up. "I may have to buy a new tape recording machine because mine becomes obsolete, but my ideas or approach won't become obsolete."

Word Clubs Rank High in Selling Gospel Albums

Top Selection

The number of marketing channels in the world of marketing is often easy to overlook. The elements of gospel album marketing are no exception. The Word Record Club is a chance for consumers in rural areas, who have no access to get gospel albums, a chance to get product directly from the company and delivered to their home.

The number of customers in the Word Record Club varies between 80,000 and 110,000, depending on a variety of factors, including the time of year and membership drives and solicitations. The Word Record club has been advertised in Reader's Digest, T.V. Guide and Parade magazine, however, the primary thrust is in Christian publications where there is a known Christian readership.

Two Categories

The club is divided into two categories — traditional and contemporary. Approximately 60% of the members are in the traditional category. This contrasts with regular record sales, of which approx-

imately 20% in retail outlets is in traditional music. (This figure will vary according to what music and which artists are labeled traditional or contemporary.)

Top Selection

Each month, an album is selected as the "club selection" that month, although customers may pick from any number of others available. The Club aims at a 23% acceptance of that album by the club members as the level of success. Occasionally, as in the example of a Bill Gaither album, that figure may go as high as 37%.

Debbi Holliday, manager for the record and tape club, says the albums and artists are selected by their past sales performance, the attention received from radio, and whether the sales — particularly on a new artist, has continued to build.

In its direct mail campaigns, Word considers a 1% response good and a 3% positive response for a successful campaign. Although the record and tape club will concentrate primarily on Christian outlets in the future, Holliday stated that the company hopes to increase its visibility in secular publications.

Husband/Wife Teams To Co-Host 11th Annual Dove Awards Show

NASHVILLE — A new concept in hosting will be seen at the Gospel Music Assn.'s 11th annual Dove Awards Show, to be held in Nashville at the Opryland Hotel March 26, 1980. The husband and wife teams of Walter and Tramaine Hawkins, Bill and Gloria Gaither and Paul and Kathie Lee Johnson will consecutively assume the duties of co-hosts during the course of the awards presentation.

Walter Hawkins and the Love Center Choir have produced a number of top soul gospel albums, including "Love Alive" and "Love Alive II" on Light Records. Tramaine Hawkins has just signed a solo recording pact with Light and her first album, produced by her husband, will be released shortly.

Bill and Gloria Gaither, known for their songwriting, comprise two-thirds of the Word Records group, the Bill Gaither Trio. Gaither won eight consecutive Dove Awards for Songwriter of the Year.

Paul Johnson, a writer, producer and arranger, is president of Paul Johnson Music Productions, Inc. with successful publishing, and record/jingle/soundtrack production divisions. He has produced

and/or arranged over 100 commercial albums. He currently produces his wife, Kathie Lee for Chrism Records. Kathie appears on the TV shows "Hee Haw Honeys" and "Name That Tune."

The 11th annual Dove Awards Banquet and Show will climax four days of concerts, showcases, seminars and workshops to be held during the second annual Gospel Music Week.

Greentree Inks Voegtlin, The Wall Brothers Band

NASHVILLE — The Benson Company has announced the re-signing of The Wall Brothers Band to the Greentree label and the signing of new artist Karen Voegtlin with the same label.

The Wall Brothers Band originally signed with Greentree in 1976 when that label was first established. They are based in Sioux City, Iowa and members include Kraig Wall, Greg Wall, Randy Nelson and Dennis Holt. They have recorded three albums for the label.

Nashville Music Publishers Are Looking To Washington

NASHVILLE — Members of the music publishing community here are considering sending their own representatives to Washington, D.C. in anticipation of the upcoming Copyright Tribunal hearings.

This was one suggestion that emerged from a recent meeting hosted by the Nashville Music Publishers Forum (NMPF) and ASCAP. Some 100 songwriters, publishers, lawyers and industry personnel attended the Nov. 28 session at the Hall of Fame motel to hear featured speaker Leonard Feist, president of the National Music Publishers Assn. (NMPA).

The main topic of discussion was the Copyright Tribunal hearings, slated for some time in early 1980. Among other things, the CRT will review the mechanical royalty rate payable to songwriters and publishers for the sale of phonograph records using their licensed works.

Feist's presentation focused on the history of the CRT and its powers. It was followed by a question and answer discussion concerning the NMPA's strategy for the impending hearings.

But when pressed about the tack NMPA intends to pursue, Feist replied, "Does a football coach release his game plan before the big game?"

Frustration, Confusion

Afterwards many of those in attendance who had hoped for a definite plan of action to emerge from the meeting, expressed frustration and confusion at the absence of any concrete proposals.

Among them was MCA Music's Ted Barton, who told *Cash Box*, "I wasn't satisfied with the answers to my questions. I think I got the runaround on just about everything."

Barton went on to reiterate a suggestion made during the meeting to the effect that the Nashville publishers organize a group to go to Washington and present their case directly to the CRT.

"Maybe we could include a couple of copyright attorneys, a couple of publishers and maybe even a couple of songwriters — a panel where every faction would be represented. I think the NMPA should work closely with the panel; it would benefit everyone concerned. If not, I think the Nashville publishers should have a separate body to represent them," says Barton.

David Luna, of Peer-Southern Music in Nashville, agreed that some sort of representative body should be formed.

"I think that he (Feist) is somewhat underestimating the impact the Nashville

publishing community can have on the entire world of music," says Luna. "If the Nashville publishing community could send a representative body that would speak on behalf of all the people, I think that would work very well."

Warner Bros. Music's Tim Wipperman is one of the principals behind the NMPF and

'Horesman' Film Debuts In Austin

AUSTIN, TEX. — Some 75 radio program directors and media representatives attended the recent premiere of "The Electric Horseman," starring Robert Redford and Jane Fonda and featuring the acting debut of Willie Nelson.

Nelson also performed songs in the film score, and those that attended were given an advanced pressing of the soundtrack album as well as another pressing that was a special one hour radio show entitled "Willie Nelson — New Horizons," featuring a compilation of interviews with Nelson, film director Sydney Pollack, various members of Nelson's band and containing recent songs by Nelson, including those from the album. In the interviews, Nelson discusses his reaction to his acting career.

The purpose of the gathering was to promote the movie as well as the soundtrack.

The Storyline

The film, involves an ex-rodeo cowboy (Redford) who is now peddling breakfast cereal and a TV news reporter (Jane Fonda), who follows the cowboy when he steals the \$12 million horse the cereal firm owns. Nelson is cast as the cowboy's sidekick and manager. Director Pollack was so impressed by Nelson's acting that he has cast him as the lead in another movie, "Honeysuckle Rose." "Honeysuckle Rose" is currently being completed in Austin.

The soundtrack to "The Electric Horseman" features Nelson singing "Mama's Don't Let Your Baby's Grow Up To Be Cowboys" as well as "My Heroes Have Always Been Cowboys," which will be the first single from the album — and "Midnight Rider," a Gregg Allman song that the label plans to release in the future. The radio programmers, who represented major markets all over the country, will be the only programmers in their market to have the advanced copies. The records will be

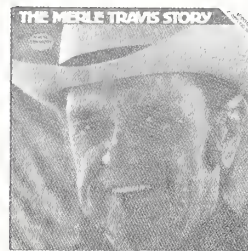

was instrumental in bringing Feist to Nashville to speak. Wipperman explained that Feist had pointed out to him (Wipperman) before the meeting that he would not be able to reveal any specifics of NMPA's strategy for the CRT hearings, primarily because he didn't want to tip the association's hand to the record companies.

"I was pleased with the turnout," Wipperman says, "and I am pleased with both the positive and negative reactions the meeting has drawn. Both reactions are welcome, and I think they will help us in determining what course to take as far as trying to present our point of view to the Copyright Tribunal."

Surprised

When contacted by **Cash Box**, Feist said he was surprised at the publishers reaction to the meeting.

"I don't know why they should be disappointed," Feist says. "We aren't going to be involved with the hearings for some time,

and we probably will only make our position clear when we present it to the Tribunal."

Limited Participation

"At the meeting I indicated that a proceeding before a governmental agency — which is what the Tribunal is — is in some ways similar to a judicial proceeding," Feist continues. "And there isn't participation by all interested people in such a situation."

"I don't mean to indicate they ((Nashville publishers) can't play a role. I just mean to say this is not that kind of a proceeding."

In any event, Feist feels it would be premature for the Nashville publishers to take any action at this time, since the hearings are still several months away.

"I can't think of anything they can do at this time," Feist says, adding that he feels the Nashville publishers should be complimented for their interest in the hearings. "It indicates a very great deal of involvement and sense of responsibility on the part of the Nashville Forum," he concludes.

RECORDING WITH A FASHIONABLE NOTE — Beverly Johnson, model and Bud-dah/Arista recording artist's debut album was released this week with more than the usual amount of fanfare. A kick-off celebration was held in New York where over 600 top models, designers, photographers and music industry people attended. Frankie Crocker, WBLB program director was on hand to introduce Johnson to the gathering. Plans are presently being made to have a similar celebration in Los Angeles. The album, "Don't Lose The Feeling," was produced by Betty Wright, and includes performances by Osibisa. Mixing was by Mtume. The title cut, "Don't Lose The Feeling," is already being played at WBLB in New York.

PROFILE — Willie Davis has made his mark — from the cuts and bruises of pro-football to the hard knocks of starting in the business of radio broadcasting practically from scratch. Spending 12 years as a pro ballplayer, which included two years with the Cleveland Browns, and ten years with the Green Bay Packers, Davis feels that the drive he had to have as an athlete has given him the basics to succeed in broadcasting. "I was approached by a broker in 1977 who discussed with me the fact that KAGB in Los Angeles was going into bankruptcy, and wanted to talk with me about purchasing the station. He said that several people had mentioned to him that they felt that I would be an owner who would definitely seek to fulfill the commitments that the station had to the community. After giving the idea some consideration, I concluded that it would give me the opportunity to give the community what it needed, and also have some fun." April 11, 1977 was the first day of broadcast for KACE/FM in Los Angeles, and Davis has since purchased WAWA/WLUM in Milwaukee. He is quick to mention that since KACE was his first venture into the broadcasting world, it is a source of great pride to him. "When I was initially organizing the station personnel, the most unbelievable thing to me was the number of people that seem to come from everywhere, and wanted to do everything for me. I was certainly amazed since I was involved in a much more conservative business of operating a Schlitz brewing franchise." Davis has nothing on the drawing board in the way of new broadcast properties acquisitions.

NEW ON THE BLACK CONCERT PROMOTER SCENE — Darryl Oliver, formerly associated with Ouentin Perry's Taurus Productions, has formed his own operations to promote concerts in the Midwest. Oliver will also be starting a management arm called Black Music in Management and Entertaining Performances, which will involve itself in artist development. The company will be based in St. Louis. CBS RECORDS TO INITIATE CENSUS PROMOTION — LeBaron Taylor, vice president black music marketing, is organizing a program to get CBS recording artists involved in assisting the 1980 Census count, particularly as it pertains to minorities. The promotion will involve several top CBS acts recording 10, 30 or 60-second spots encouraging people to co-operate and be counted during the 1980 census. The spots will then be distributed to radio stations who will be asked to air them as public service announcements. "Though we are initiating the program here at CBS, we had not planned for this project to only involve CBS artists, and we will make the PSA copy available to any label who wants to get involved," Taylor explained. "The more that minorities stand up to be counted increases their economic standing for federal funding." Also involved in this project is the National Black Network, which will be contributing any necessary studio time, along with Sandra DaCosta and Janice Gilbert who are organizing details of the projects.

ARTISTS ACTIVITY — MCA recording artist B.B. King will be starting a six-day tour in Anchorage, Alaska, Jan. 22. Look for a new Cheryl Lynn single, to be released this week called "I've Got Faith In You." The album, entitled "In Love," will follow in a few weeks. The Lou Rawls album "Sit Down And Talk To Me" will be released this week. Look for Prelude recording act Inner Life, whose single, "Caught Up In A One Night Love Affair" is catching on across the country, to have an album out next week.

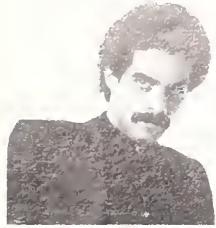

"We're not scolding the trades, we just want to prolong the life of the disco industry," says John Terry, Florida Record Pool director, regarding the open letter sent to the recent National Record Pool Conference in Miami Beach. The letter, which reflects the unanimous opinion of the pool directors who attended the late November conference, calls for an expansion of the scope of their disco charts, in particular the number of DJs who will "reflect a broader cross section of area demographics." The pool directors are offering their services and expertise in selecting the additional DJ reporters.

They feel they are in a unique position to do so, since they analyze all their pool members' reports before forwarding the questionnaire and feedback sheets to the labels and trades.

WE'RE WAITING FOR 'SANTA JEAN VALJEAN' — Lyricist Jimmy Goings recently phoned the L.A. offices of Cash Box to discuss the origins of his Casablanca recording group, Santa Esmeralda. The 25-year-old Menlo Park, Calif.-based artist says the name honors Esmeralda, the gypsy heroine who befriends Quasimodo in Victor Hugo's "Hunchback of Notre Dame." Okay, but where does the "Santa" come in? He denies reports that Casablanca is trying to cash in on the Christmas buying season with a tie-in to the Claus

character of the same name. Rather, "Santa" or Saint reflects the group's desire to "canonize" a musical format which is special to the group. "Another Cha Cha," the chart topping single off their latest LP, relies heavily on folkloric music adapted for modern ears — and considering its disco popularity — modern feet as well. The single employs the bandonia, a gypsy, accordion-like instrument, and the flamenco guitar. The gypsies' long sojourn in Spain is represented by the song's salsa flavoring. Prior to the latest album, Santa Esmeralda bowed with "House of the Rising Sun" and "Beauty" albums, both in 1978 and both on Casablanca. The group has enjoyed its greatest popularity in Latin America, where not surprisingly salsa music heavily influences disco music. More surprising is the group's chart success in Japan. Goings is keeping busy writing the next Santa Esmeralda album which he says will be less disco and more pop, while retaining the group's signature salsa style.

ANOTHER UNLIKELY PROMOTIONAL EFFORT — Last week the Disco Preservation Society under the cover of "cute" commandments raised some important points about what is troubling the disco industry. This week a lighter (and somewhat confusing) tone has been taken by the newly formed Operation Stump the Pool Director. According to organizer Jim Hudak of A&M, each week four "mystery" promotion reps will gather at an undisclosed location and make phone calls to three pool directors and ask them specific questions. The nature of these questions is top secret, Hudak says, and judging from the current rocky relationship between the pools and labels, the questions are probably unprintable as well. Grand prize for answering all the questions correctly is reportedly a weekend in the Caribbean. The mystery promo reps will be drawn from three categories, according to Hudak: in-house, independent and "inconsistent." Disco Breaks will keep its readers posted on developments, if there are any.

NEW CLUBS — Phoenix has been logging some heavy discotheque action with at least four new clubs opening or about to open. Two "disco restaurants," which does not mean that you bogie while you nosh, opened last week: **Hamburger Hamlet** and **C.B. DeMille's**. KXTC radio personality **Rick Nuhn** is the program director at C.B.'s with Kurt Gonzalez spinning **Luke Cuesack** deejays at the Hamlet. On Dec. 29 **Bob Baldwin**, director of operations at the **Southwest Record Pool**, will open the **Cuckoo's Nest**. Baldwin will do double duty as program director and DJ. Sometime in the next two weeks, **Houlihan's** will open with an as yet unnamed DJ. Reports are that **Scott Tuchman** may leave **Ride 'N' Rock**

HERB ALPERT — Rotation — A&M SP 12032 — 12"

Another laid back instrumental from the king of mellow brass and haunting melody. Even more relaxed than Alpert's previous chart-topper, "Rise," "Rotation" nevertheless avoids the musical doldrums so many other instrumentals sink into. A pleasing kind of tension is created by the insistent electric keyboards, which contrast nicely with hypnotic hornwork.

THEO VANEES — Thank God There's Music/I Can't Dance Without You — Prelude PRL 12173 — LP and 12"

Staccato hornwork and kick drum underline the get tough sound of "Bad Bad Boy" Theo Vaness on these two tracks off his self-titled LP, debuting this week on the Cash Box disco chart at #33. Choral work by sassy female backup. "Thank God There's Music" is a bit rougher edged than "I Can't Dance Without You," but both are up-tempo.

JOE LONG SOUND — O Holy Night — Pronto/Salsoul SG 318 — 12"

This year's only new Christmas disco carol performed by Joe Long Sound, the artist responsible for last year's "Hallelujah/2000," a discofied version of Handel's "Messiah." "O Holy Night" might seem an unlikely candidate for discofying, but this treatment is tasteful, reverential and beautifully arranged. Half a dozen percussives are employed, including finger cymbals, triangles and chimes. Numerous musical styles are also represented: gospel, country, classical and funk. Claudia Clyde King and Pat Hodges provide the rich vocals. Mid-tempo. Spin at the height of the evening throughout the Christmas holidays. Time: 14:10

BARBARA JEAN ENGLISH — Dancing To Keep From Crying — Zakia ZK 100 — 12"

Outstanding vocals by English are nicely backed by generous use of heavy percussives. Traces of '60s Motown here and just a bit of Gloria Gaynor's feisty feminism in the heartbreaker lyrics. Ingenious synthesizer tricks discriminately employed. Time: 6:59

SCOTT ALLAN — I Think We're Alone Now/Will You Love Me Tomorrow — T.K. TKD-426 — 12"

The '60s pop classics get the disco treatment by new and promising artist Scott Allan. Silky vocals appropriately backed by strings, acoustic piano and other symphonic touches. Graceful segue from "I Think We're Alone" to Carol King's "Will You Love Me Tomorrow." Some synthesizer and echo chamber embellishments. Time: 8:53

issued a statement that read in part, "Electric Factory Concerts categorically denies that at any time, during or before The Who concert, it had any control over the number of ushers or ticket takers available or the number of doors to be opened to concertgoers prior to or during the concert."

Nevertheless, two upcoming concerts scheduled for the Riverfront Coliseum have been postponed indefinitely and Cincinnati Mayor John Kenneth Blackwell has instructed the city's legal department to prepare drafts of ordinances to prohibit festival-style seating at concerts and to place crowd control measures in the hands of the city (Riverfront Coliseum is privately owned). Presentation of these drafts to the full City Council has been scheduled for Dec. 19.

In addition, Councilman David Mann, chairman of the City Council's Law and Public Safety Commission, has scheduled public hearings on the two proposed ordinances before his commission Dec. 12. Attendance at this hearing and the City Council meeting the following night is expected to be heavy.

Bill Proposed

Finally, it was reported that State Senator Stanley Aronoff has announced that he will introduce a bill in the Ohio legislature requiring that concerts offer reserved seats only, that the crowd be admitted at least one hour before the beginning of the concert and that there be enough doors available for the crowd to pass safely.

Other legal actions surrounding the Cincinnati incident included the City Of Providence cancelling The Who's scheduled Dec. 17 concert at the

municipally owned civic center, and the Dec. 5 decision of the Boston City Council to allow the scheduled Dec. 16 concert to take place as planned.

Further ramifications, both legal and quasi-legal, will surely be felt once the facts of the incident are sorted out. However, at this time, a measure of confusion still reigns over the causes of the tragedy and any practical means to prevent such an occurrence from happening again.

What the future may bring was expressed by John Gould, attorney for Electric Factory Concerts. "I think in the long haul, even in the short period," Gould explained, "what's going to happen is that fact will strip away from fiction, and we'll be left with a situation where changes will have to be made on how concerts are run. Yet, this concert was run like over 100 other successful concerts have been run. Just why those procedures failed to handle this problem is something that may never be known."

\$453 Million Spent On Mail Order LPs, Tapes

NEW YORK — Consumers spent an estimated \$453 million for records and tapes purchased by mail in 1978, according to Maxwell Scroge Company, Inc., a Chicago based mail order consulting firm.

According to the firm's 1979/1980 edition of "United States Consumer Mail Order Industry Estimates," Candlelite Buyers had the largest mailing list among record companies, with 1.9 million buyers. Candlelite was followed by Columbia Cartridge Club, with 1.6 active members; RCA Record and Tape Club, with 1.3 million active members; Columbia Record Club, also with 1.3 million active members; and Sessions Records with 1.2 million buyers.

The report also pinpointed a shift from general to specialized methods of marketing and merchandising. Walt Disney Productions, which sells records and tapes of the Disney movie classics; Longine Symphonette Society, which sells classical records, and the Elvis Record/Tape Buyers which sells Elvis Presley songs, were cited as examples of "lifestyle special interest segmentation" within the record industry.

Overall, according to Scroge, sales for the entire mail order industry reached \$26.2 billion in 1978, and accounted for 11.8% of general merchandise sales. Two factors contributing to mail order sales, the report said, have been the extraordinary influx of women into the labor market and the accelerated growth of small households. These situations, according to Scroge, have put a premium on convenience, thereby benefitting mail order marketing.

UA Music To Hold Nat'l Meetings In Dec.

NEW YORK — United Artists Music will conduct five days of national meetings, Dec. 14-18, at the firm's Los Angeles headquarters at 6753 Hollywood Boulevard.

The meetings, which will host key executives and senior professional managers from all the U.S. offices of UA Music, will be largely devoted to future professional campaigns and new artist development procedures. Other planned meetings and functions will concern future film music projects, the company's administrative plans for the '80s and a discussion of new agreements and legal procedures geared to the company's expansion program.

In addition, there will be a special panel previewing new graphics and promotional materials to be geared to record company and advertising agency creative personnel, as well as to radio and TV music directors.

Argentina

BUENOS AIRES — Brazilian chanteuse **Claudia Barroso** recently visited Buenos Aires as part of a promotional trip that will also include Paraguay. Recording for the Continental label in Brasil, Barroso made TV appearances and radio interviews arranged by **Bernardo Bergeret**, manager of Continental's representative in Argentina.

Julio Saenz of CBS returned from a long tour that covered Europe and the Americas, and reported to **Cash Box** that there is substantial interest in several markets regarding some local artists like **Trlo San Javier**, **Cacho Tirao** and **Maria Martha Serra Lima**. The label has been building an impressive local cast, since it is believed that local music will increase its share of the market in the next two years.

The import of finished product is growing, and while there is concern among some producers about the situation, other companies have decided to jump on the bandwagon. Polygram has imported 80,000 copies of the **Bee Gees'** latest double album, which is selling briskly at the same price as locally produced LPs. Microfon's **Marlo Kamlinsky** has also decided to import directly some 20,000 copies of **Stevie Wonder's** latest album, "Journey Through The Secret Life Of Plants." Importing the finished product seems justified in this case, where the elaborate jacket would have been very costly to re-produce here.

RCA's **Buddy McCluskey** will travel to Sweden soon for more work in Spanish lyrics for **ABBA**. The Swedish group sold more than 700,000 copies of their international hit "Chiquitita" here in a Spanish language version. "Chiquitita" has also become a top hit in Mexico and has made inroads in the USA, as recently reported in **Cash Box** (Nov. 24). McCluskey also revealed plans to attend MIDEM at the end of January in Cannes, France.

Sicamericana has finished new deals with Hispavox, the Spanish label, concerning **Jose Luis Perales** and newcomer **Pedro Marin**, who is considered a potential star by **Nestor Selasco**, president of the label. The first big promo efforts around this artist seem to be successful, while Perales has been a good seller here for the last couple of years. Sicamericana is also gaining strength in the local rock field, via its Sazam label.

The kiddie market has another star in **Carlos Bala**, a well-humored actor who hosts a Sunday evening show on Channel 7 here and on a network of stations in the interior. The song of this program turned into a single that skyrocketed onto the charts, and his latest album on Microfon sold approximately 25,000 copies in a few days.

Folks artists **Cuarteto Zupay** are recording an album with 12 of their greatest

hits for Polygram. The group appeared recently on Channels 7 and 11 after some time of absence.

Australia

MELBOURNE — The theme from the hit series *Prisoner* has become Australia's largest selling single by a female artist, with sales to date in excess of 70,000 units. The singer, **Lynne Hamilton**, has just released her debut album through WEA and is planning a trip to the USA, where the series was recently picked up. Naturally, she hopes there'll be some rub-off from the series on her plans for international success as a singer.

TV show compere **Ian Meldrum** has formed a company to lease video packages of local and international artists to clubs, hotels and discos. The company, Video Pop Australia, has acquired exclusive rights to most local and international film clips, although CBS is reportedly uncommitted to the project. Each video package will be comprised of clips of current Top 40 material, edited to include the logo of each artist's record label. Meldrum, who comperes the national television pop show *Countdown*, has formed the company with **Jim McKay**, marketing director of the Victorian Football League.

Mushroom Records, celebrating its seventh anniversary, last week awarded platinum albums to a Melbourne retailer and the customer who bought the label's millionth album — a copy of Jo Jo Zep & The Falcons' "Screaming Targets."

Kim Gibb, former wife of the youngest Gibb brother, **Andy**, has won the legal right to talk about her life with the singing star, with whom she had a daughter, **Peta**. A Sydney newspaper had begun to serialize Kim's life story when Andy, through his solicitors, issued an injunction seeking to restrain her from talking about their life together. Kim and the newspaper appealed, and a family court discharged the injunction in full and ordered Andy to pay all court costs.

MUNICH — According to Bundesverband der Phonographischen Wirtschaft, record and tape sales stagnated during the third quarter of 1979 (July 1-Sept. 30). While singles sales were still good and growing, with classical music also on the rise; low-priced and budget LPs and cassettes continued their downtrend. Pirated pop product, however, also increased and must be fought with all means available. The third quarter of 1979 was equal to the previous year for LP sales.

Stiff Records Modifies Policies On Pricing, Returns For The 1980s

LONDON — Stiff Records, one of the more successful of the new independent companies to emerge in the UK during the 70s, has announced new business structures and a move to larger premises.

Changes in Stiff's trading arrangements include some price increases, a cut in dealer margins and the institution of a 5% returns policy.

Effective Jan 1, 1980, regular priced LPs will increase by 21p (45 cents) from the current 4 pounds 78p (\$10.30) to 4 pounds 99p (\$10.75). However, the label will still be one of the cheapest on the market.

To soften the blow somewhat, Stiff will also issue limited quantities of LPs by new artists at a special price of 3 pounds 99p (\$8.60).

To supply dealer incentive, Stiff will bring its dealer margin in line with Virgin Records (whose sales force sells Stiff product) and CBS, its distributor. The margin will be set at 33%.

In addition, the label will institute a 5% returns policy, to be administered by CBS.

The label's schedule for new year releases include the second album from Lene Lovich, Wreckless Eric's third LP,

Rachel Sweet's second LP and the debut LP from the New York band, The Feelies. Singles from all of these artists will be released, plus new product by Kirsty MacColl and the G.T.s.

Record, Tape Sales Up In Japan In October

TOKYO — Total volume of records and tapes sold during October increased slightly in comparison with the previous month and the same month last year, according to Saburo Watanabe, president of the Japan Phonograph Record Association (JPRA).

Total output of records during October reached 17 million units, 3% up from September and 4% over October, 1978. Sales revenues of 15.8 billion yen (\$63.5 million) increased 13% over September totals, but dropped 1% from October 1978.

Total output of tapes during the month reached 5.8 million units, up 17% over September and 38% over October 1978. Sales revenues of 9 billion yen (\$36.2 million) were up 22% over September and 29% over October 1978.

A somewhat biographical book by musician/producer **Olaf Kuebler** was recently released and stated that Lindenberg stole most of the funny talks and lyrics that made him famous. If this case goes to court for plagiarism and copyright infringement, Lindenberg could lose his writer royalties for his German language albums — eight in total, which sold millions altogether. The talk is that this figure could be in the neighborhood of 500,000 marks (\$275,000).

CBS recording group **Toto's** "Hydra" LP received top promotion this week through *Musikmarkt's* tip *Hitparade* . . . While MCA's catalog is changing distribution to Ariola Jan. 1, Metronome will retain the Butterfly catalog . . . American artist **Judy Cheeks** is recording a new album for Ariola with producer **Thor Baldursson**, who arranged the last **Elton John** LP . . . A&M recording artist **Tim Curry** is currently on a promotion tour through Germany.

EMI sure knows how to push the new **Stevie Wonder** LP, "Journey Through The Secret Life Of Plants." It's "Stevie Wonder Week" in the German retail business.

Swedish pop/rock group **ABBA** has agreed to a long term extension of its contract with Polydor. Manager **Stig Anderson** travelled to Polydor International's Hamburg offices to sign the contract, which covers Germany, Austria, Switzerland, The Netherlands and others parts of the world.

LONDON — WEA has entered the book/cassette market with the launch of 'Bookcassettes,' a two-cassette pack containing excerpts from best selling books read by the authors. The first four titles released by WEA are "Snakes And Ladders," featuring film star **Dirk Bogarde** reading extracts from his autobiography; **Alex McCowen's** solo performance of "St. Marks Gospel;" **Shella Hocken** reading from her best selling autobiography, "Emma And I;" and "The Famous Five," featuring two stories from **Enid Blyton**. WEA is the first major record company to enter this lucrative new book/cassette market and they hold worldwide rights to all of their new product . . . On the record side, WEA recently increased the dealer price of their records. The move will bring WEA dealer prices more into line with those of its

major competitors, and is also the first stage of a series of changes designed to move away from recommended retail pricing in all aspects of its business. Tape prices will remain at current levels and relevant album prices will be increased to match. On a single album, this means that dealer prices will increase from 2 pounds 90p (\$6.25) to 3 pounds 4p (\$6.55), a rise of just under 5%. Standards 7" singles will increase similarly from 64p (\$1.38) to 67p (\$1.44). Explaining the price changes, **David Cliphams**, WEA director of sales and marketing stated, "The prevailing media view, supported by some artists, is that 'prices are too high.' The reality is that prices, as the law allows, are free to be set at whatever level the individual dealer determines, which is currently (and increasingly) well below the recommended retail price. It is our belief that the dealers freedom to price at whatever level he chooses is, rightly, total. Our only concern should be the price we charge to him, and not the final retail price."

On the eve of their first UK tour in over three years, **Paul McCartney & Wings** performed a free concert for 700 pupils of his old school, The Liverpool Institute, where he was educated with fellow former **Beatle George Harrison**. McCartney and the group were in Liverpool for three concerts, but the free concert was, as McCartney put it, "For the kids and for the fun of it. It was my way of saying thank you to the school. Many people knock their school days, but for me they hold many memories."

The classical division of EMI Records UK have shipped into UK stores the first digital classical album from EMI Music Operations. **Debussy's** "Images," played by the **London Symphony Orchestra** and conducted by **Andre Previn** was released on the HMV label this week. Overseas territories will be releasing the album before Christmas . . . And EMI's MOR Division held a lunchtime celebration for MOR singer **Iris Williams**, whose debut EMI single, "He Was Beautiful," recently charted in the UK Top 20. The lunch last week for media and industry personnel also marked the release of Williams' album on EMI titled the same.

One of the leading instigators of the current wave of Mod nostalgia, I-Spy Records' mod band **Secret Affair** have their debut LP out now, titled "Glory Boys." The mod boys are currently on a five week 'I-Spy Dancing In The Street' tour of the UK, with I-Spy stablemates **Squire** supporting. The nostalgia boys will play London's Rainbow Theatre Dec. 8 . . . One of the oldest independent ex-underground hippie music mags, **Zig Zag**, has been revived and will hit the streets again Dec. 1, edited by **Kris Needs**.

Chrysalis May Sue Decca Over 'Blondie' Record

LONDON — Chrysalis Records is threatening legal action against Decca Records over a song recorded by Debbie Harry of Blondie. The single, titled "Little G.T.O." and released by Decca/London under the group name of New York Blondes, was made by American D.J. Rodney Biggenheimer with members of Blondie and other well-known musicians.

Blondies' motive for working on the record was apparently as a favor to Biggenheimer, who had helped them in the early days of their career. According to Chrysalis, the favor was carried out on the understanding that the tape would be wiped out afterwards.

Now, through solicitors, Decca has agreed to cancel its promotion campaign associating the record with Blondie.

Chrysalis is also considering whether or not to exercise its right to sue Decca for damages. Furthermore, legal proceedings have commenced against the makers of the record, Dan and David Kessel of Deep Sleep Productions, Hollywood, for breach of agreement.

CMA Of Great Britain Gives Annual Awards

LONDON — The Country Music Association of Great Britain held its annual awards dinner and show at the London Hilton, Nov. 26. The awards were presented by Epic recording artist Tammy Wynette, who extended her UK stay especially for the event.

MCA UK Restructures Marketing, Promo Units

LONDON — In the aftermath of increased chart activity and sales, MCA Records has re-structured its marketing and promotion department under Stuart Watson, who now becomes general manager, marketing.

Reporting to Watson will be Ray Still, formerly Infinity Records' label manager, who becomes MCA Records product manager. He takes with him former Infinity Records secretary Sioban Wells.

London promotion manager John Gould and Dave Brown also take on new responsibilities. Gould becomes creative promotion manager involved in specific areas of the operation, including responsibility for disco promotion and product. Brown becomes promotion manager involved in all areas of promotion.

MCA's regional promotion department continues under the direction of Martin Satterthwaite, artist development manager, who also reports to Watson.

RVC Records Reports 39% Jump In Revenues

TOKYO — Total sales revenues for RVC Records increased 39% during the first half of the 1979-80 fiscal year over the same time period a year ago. Revenues of 3.8 billion yen (\$1.7 million) for the period from March 21-Sept. 20 also represented a 2% jump over the previous six month period.

The company attributed the jump in revenues to the strong sales of Japanese music, which earned 2.8 billion yen (\$1.2 million) — up 11% from the previous six months and 92% over the same time period last year.

International repertoire revenues, however, dropped — earning 1.0 billion yen (about \$500,000), which represented drops of 8% and 1% from the previous six months and the same time period last year.

But only one original member has dedicated the majority of his work to preserving the music of El Chicano. **Bobby Espinosa** has always been a major contributor to the sound of El Chicano. Bobby is keyboardist and vocalist, who, along with his brother Henry, was responsible for

organizing the first recording session for the group. That session produced El Chicano's first single and its first gold record, "Viva Tirado."

Since then, Bobby has been involved with composing, arranging and producing most of El Chicano's music.

Producing records was not a part of the band's duties in the early recordings. After "Viva Tirado," the band was usually put in with a well-known producer, but for some reason, they were never able to capture the sound the band was creating live. So, after long and exhausting discussions with their record label, Bobby was allowed to co-produce El Chicano's fourth album, which included the group's second gold record, "Tell Her She's Lovely."

Since the break-up of the original band, Bobby has concentrated in choosing musicians for a new El Chicano band, and after almost a year of rehearsing and developing the sound (maintaining the old and creating a new), and not performing live, the New El Chicano was growing.

Curious to see the response of the public towards the group, Bobby booked a two week tour of Texas with the popular **Santa Esmeralda** group, in August 1979.

With the public accepting the group overwhelmingly, the group spent a very happy and successful two weeks in Texas. The New El Chicano was ready. The current lineup includes: **Mike Albert**, lead guitarist; **Lorenzo Leyba**, guitarist-vocalist; **Roger Sanoval**, bass guitar; **Kenny Roman**, drums; **Ernesto Rios**, lead vocalist; **Johnny Conga**, percussionist; **Hector Andrade**, percussionist and **Barney Martinez**, tenor sax and flute.

The future for the group looks bright. Currently they are working on a new album, to be released in late February, a major motion picture score and they are negotiating another film about street-gangs.

The group will not be touring nationally until the release of their album. But one thing for sure, "El Chicano" is alive and well.

COIN MACHINE

Rubinson Brings Back Radio Golden Age Via Judith's Jukes

SAN FRANCISCO — While the jukebox continues to remain an integral part of the music and coin machine industries, the "Golden Age" of the coin operated phonograph is generally acknowledged to have been the years 1937-48. The superior craftsmanship, inventive design and sheer art deco beauty of these phonographs are the original reasons behind producer David Rubinson's transformation from a zealous jukebox aficionado four years ago to one of the largest commercial collectors in the country today.

"I was working on a project with an engineer (Gene Kolotkin) when he told me about a guy named Jukebox Jerry down on Mission Street who had a warehouse full of jukeboxes and was selling them cheaply," said Rubinson. "I went down there to buy a bunch for Christmas presents, but when I looked around I saw that many of the boxes were from the '30s and '40s. As I saw more and more I became a crazed hobbyist."

Forms Juke Company

Rubinson, producer of such acts as Herbie Hancock and Santana and owner of the technologically advanced Automatt recording studio in San Francisco, eventually ended up procuring a majority of art deco masterpieces when he got right hand man and former Herbie Hancock road manager, Vincent Lynch, to "develop a relationship" with Jukebox Jerry and to obtain the vin-

tage phonographs. Lynch is now manager of Rubinson's new company, which specializes in sale, service and restoration of 78 RPM jukeboxes, Judith's Jukes (named after Rubinson's daughter).

Lynch has quickly become a jukebox expert and is consistently on the road to find bargains. In addition to ferreting out deals on the collector's items, Lynch, who is currently in the midst of writing a book on the "Golden Age" of jukeboxes, oversees the restoration and selling of the phonographs.

"As I began collecting them the cost of servicing the machines became astronomical," stated Rubinson. "I had to

NAMA Relocates Western Meeting

CHICAGO — The 1981 Western Convention-Exhibit of Vending and Food Service Management will be held in Phoenix from April 3-5 instead of San Diego, according to an announcement from Jack Rielley, NAMA's director of sales.

Traditionally held in California, the NAMA Western Show is being rescheduled to Arizona's largest city because the trade show has outgrown the available San Diego exhibit facilities, Rielley said. The Phoenix Civic Plaza Convention Center has outstanding exhibit and meeting facilities, he added.

The two convention hotels for the 1981 show are the Adams and Hyatt Regency, located only one block from the exhibit hall, and both are less than five years old. Rielley pointed out that in a recent survey of exhibitors and convention participants, Phoenix outranked such other cities as Los Angeles, Seattle and Portland as the site for the 1981 convention.

As previously announced, the 1980 NAMA Western Show will be held in Anaheim, Calif. March 14-16 and this event usually draws more than 3,000 participants.

Stern Debuts 'Galaxy' Pinball

CHICAGO — "Galaxy," the new outspace-themed solid state 4-player pingame premiered by Stern Electronics, Inc. at the 1979 AMOA Exposition has been tentatively scheduled for production in January 1980. The model follows the factory's "Meteor," which is ranked by Stern as its current all-time best seller.

Galaxy was designed by pinball industry pioneer Harry Williams with some of the most outstanding graphics, light and sound in the industry. It is enhanced by such innovative features as top-arch geometry, shooting laser-like light display and a sophisticated new adjustable audio attract mode to capture attention on location. Explosive sounds are synchronized with the machine's exciting playfield action and for added player appeal there are remote spotting drop targets which can be knocked down in two ways, either with a direct smash or by hitting a special target on the other side of the playfield.

Among other highlights of the new model are 27 front-door program functions and total front-door accounting; reset memory which duplicates the playfield as each player takes a turn; the innovative "top-arch" design which adds unique scoring opportunities; a side horseshoe kicker that runs up the score; improved flipper design and an exciting game finish whereby completion of the word G-A-L-A-X-Y sends the playfield into explosive light and sound frenzy.

Rubinson Brings Back Radio Golden Age Via Judith's Jukes

find a new guy for each separate box. Finally I hired a staff of four people who specialize in jukeboxes. One man handles sound, another cabinets, etc."

Lucrative Business

The hobby has turned into a full-time operation and a lucrative business. "Take the Wurlitzer 950 as an example of the increasing value of jukeboxes," said Lynch. "It is a top of the line model, has beautiful etched glasswork and has more components than most boxes. About 3,400 of the machines were built before production was halted by the war effort in 1942. Today, maybe there are 50 left. One of these machines could have been purchased for \$4-5,000 four years ago. Now they are worth four times that."

Most of Judith's Jukes customers are either in the music or motion picture business (some of the company's recent customers include George Lucas, Francis Ford Coppola and Neil Young) or are antique dealers. "You can liken jukebox collecting to classic cars," explained Rubinson. "Obtaining a Model 950 or a 'Peacock' model is like collecting a '63 Corvette. It has certain features that haven't been used before or since."

Although Rock-Ola, Seeburg and AMI created some excellent models, it was Wurlitzer and designer Paul Fuller that came up with such innovative features as the bubble tube — an evacuated tube of glass on the machine inside of which was a methanol based liquid with a low boiling point.

Disco Of Yesterday

"The jukebox was the disco of yesterday," stated Rubinson. "People would come up to it to see its lights flash and revolve and the mechanism work. You not only got a song for your nickel, but a show as well. It was truly an entertainment center."

Besides its use as a record merchandising tool, the coin operated jukebox provided an alternative to radio play.

Jukeboxes, especially those manufactured by Wurlitzer, saturated the market after the war. The industry flourished and in 1950, when there was one jukebox for every 330 people in the U.S.

However, the uniquely American phenomenon was to be short lived. The advent of television, the 45 RPM record and Seeburg's introduction of a lightweight utilitarian machine that held 100 records contributed to the demise of the "Golden Age."

Lynch has a network of operators across the U.S. that provide Judith's Jukes with quality machines, and he prefers to buy boxes in mint condition — all original parts intact and undamaged. However, he usually ends up buying three or four phonographs to restore one complete jukebox. While a perfectly renovated 1940 Model 850 Wurlitzer (The Peacock) or a 1947 AMI Model B might sell for as much as \$10,000, most of the company's jukes sell for between \$1,750 and \$8,000.

"Our customers pay top dollar but they get the best," said Lynch. "We recone old speakers, replace etched glass, and we buy reproduced parts for some models. We make some sheet metal parts ourselves. In the gears we try to use only the original plastics. The staff is comprised of art school graduates and they have high aesthetic values."

Record Library

Judith Jukes also boasts a library that contains more than 25,000 78 RPM records. Most of the records are sold to customers for \$8 to \$10, but "if you're talking early rock 'n' roll and Elvis, it'll run you from \$20 to \$50," said Lynch. "Elvis' Sun sessions can cost anywhere from \$300 to \$500."

Rubinson maintained that some people like to collect antique autos and others accumulate old Gibson guitars, but that his passion is jukeboxes. "It's just lucky that my hobby turned out to be a rather profitable venture."

Imported Product From America Creates Problems For European Record Licensees

who is the company's managing director. "The labels are even looking for ways to stop us from buying European goods at cheaper prices."

Exporter Loses Business

The legal proceedings have had a similar effect on the business of one New York-based exporter, who said that he has lost approximately \$40-50,000 worth of billing per month since July because his British customers are "afraid" to buy from him. "CBS UK and Polygram Ltd., in particular, have told my customers that any record in their catalog cannot be imported, and in the last month alone it's cost me at least \$50,000 worth of sales."

"The provision in the Copyright Law that protects the UK manufacturers from imported product was never enforced until this year," he continued. "Then the dumping started, and now the licensees are trying to fight back. If foreign companies aren't allowed to import, why have CBS and Polygram domestic told me that I can buy any record or tape they manufacture and ship it worldwide? When I contacted the Department of Justice, they told me that any European company that is owned or controlled by an American corporation is putting a restraint of trade on me by telling us that our customers can't import our product."

Another New York-based exporter contended that U.S. companies actively encourage the exportation of American-manufactured product. "If it was up to them, they would have us send out everything," he said. "The more we export, the more they get rid of. Warehouse space is too valuable. U.S. labels publicly castigate exportation of new product, but privately they condone it."

Denials

Although they declined to discuss the subject in any depth, American record manufacturers denied that they were encouraging the export of their product overseas. In addition, they denied that they were dumping their overruns in other countries.

Executives at a number of international record labels agreed that parallel imports have impacted sales for some licenses, but maintained that the situation is readily understandable wherever there are substantial differences in currency rates.

"Wholesalers aren't stupid," said Norman Stollman, vice president of administration for Columbia Records International. "They know that they can make money on the 50¢ wholesale difference that exists between Portugal and England, and that can create a substantial problem."

"Right now, there is a great amount of Portuguese product in the English record stores," he continued. "To the extent that the Portuguese jackets are of inferior quality, it ameliorates the problem because the consumer can see that the product is inferior. To the extent that a good jacket has been manufactured, a problem occurs."

Stollman said that it was important to distinguish between "those companies that are international in scope and can see that importation of certain titles into a particular territory can destroy that operation, and those companies to whom an independent licensee is of indirect concern. A company like CBS knows that a record sold as an overstock in this country for \$1 could cost us a profit of \$2 on a sale that our German affiliate, for example, could have made. It doesn't make sense from a corporate point of view."

Tough Problem To Kick

Arthur Martinez, division vice president of international for RCA Records International, said the company's licensees "persistently complain" about the parallel import problem, but that it is hard to deal

with due to "the movement of goods in a free economy." Martinez said the company had experienced some problem this year with the movement of quantities of Canadian-pressed copies of the "Hair" soundtrack LP into Holland, Germany, and Scandinavia, but that the company has no control over the ultimate destination of goods that it sells to its customers.

"Anybody that buys goods from us is free to dispose of them in any way that they choose," he noted. "We do not impose sanctions or restraints upon people who buy records from us. It is the responsibility of the licensee to protect its trademark in the territory where it is owned. And the way for the licensee to compete is to be on the market quickly and in a price category that pre-empts a parallel import situation." Martinez said that RCA International had just "assured" that on the fall releases by Hall and Oates and Jefferson Starship.

Lee Mendell, director of business affairs for WEA International, said that the company had also moved to block a potential parallel import problem when it set a worldwide release date for the new Fleetwood Mac and Eagles LPs. Asked if there was evidence that U.S. exporters were shipping overrun WEA product overseas, Mendell said that he thought there were, but that the selections would probably be limited to "fringe items, at best."

Choice Overstock Titles

The influx of imports into the United Kingdom is a microcosm of a troublesome situation throughout Europe. Among the titles that first appeared on U.S. overstock lists this summer and are now in demand in Europe are: "Dynasty" and the four solo albums by Kiss; "In Flight" by George Benson; "Little Criminals" by Randy Newman; "Layla" by Derek and the Dominos; the "Sgt. Pepper" soundtrack LP; "Love Will Keep Us Together" by Captain & Tennille; "I'm In You" and "Frampton" by Peter Frampton; "Brother To Brother" by Gino Vanelli; "Street Hassle" by Lou Reed; "Easter" by Patti Smith; "Sleepwalker" by The Kinks; "Deceptive Bends," "Live and Let Live," and "Bloody Tourists" by 10cc; "Soul Searching" by the Average White Band; "Tormato" by Yes; "Luna Sea" by Firefall; "And Then There Were Three" by Genesis; "Oxygen" by Jean Michele Jarre; "The Marshall Tucker Band's Greatest Hits"; "Luxury You Can Afford" by Joe Cocker; and "Bad Boy" by Ringo Starr.

In addition, one midwestern cutout dealer said that during July and August, he

had sold approximately 100,000 Blue Note albums to exporters, of which half were shipped overseas. He added that 30,000-40,000 Milestone and Prestige twofers that he sold to exporters this fall had also found their way overseas.

In most cases, overstock single discs are retailing from \$1-\$5 in Europe. For imported front-line goods, retail prices in the United Kingdom, Germany, Italy, and the Scandinavian countries are selling from \$8-\$10 for product listing at \$7.98 in the U.S., compared to homegrown prices of \$9.50-\$10.50. Imported goods listing for \$8.98 in the U.S. are retailing from \$12-\$13 in Europe.

The import situation is also having an effect on the publishing community. "The devaluation of the dollar and the overproduction of the U.S. record industry during 1979 has contributed to a problem that is widespread throughout Europe," said Felix Faecq, head of the Belgian Music Publishers Association at the recent MUSEXPO convention in Miami. Faecq noted that "American-manufactured LPs and cassettes that were either cut out or overrun in the past year have robbed many European publishers of their subpublishing rights because of the ambiguities in the Rome convention on fair use of copyrights."

"The problem is that every U.S. company wants to show black, and if they have overproduced by 100,000 copies domestically, they want to be able to salvage something from it," said Walter Hofer, chairman of the Copyright Service Bureau. "Compare the dollar they might get on a record with the 5¢ a pound they would get in scrap vinyl. That's their basic motive. Unfortunately, it's at the expense of the publisher, subpublisher, licensee, artist and producer."

"There's no doubt that one of the better markets for the sale of discontinued product by U.S. manufacturers is to American exporters," said Al Berman, president of The Harry Fox Agency. "But there is nothing we can do about product on which royalties have been paid in the U.S., since we have no say regarding where the product goes. It becomes the responsibility of the foreign copyright owner to police the product that is shipped into his territory and to see that royalties are paid on all product sold abroad. If the royalty rate is 2 and three-quarter cents in the U.S. and 8% of the retail selling price in Europe, which might come out to about 4-5¢, don't you think the foreign publisher is entitled to the difference?"

A spokesperson at Butterfly, however, says discotheques will remain an important avenue of exposure for the artist. . . . bill and is only visible under an electron microscope. The disc revolves at 450 revolutions per minute (RPMs) and contains up to one hour of programming per side. The player can be attached to any color or black-and-white TV.

The consumer never actually touches the disc, which is housed in a plastic sleeve resembling a record jacket. After it is placed in the machine, the disc is removed from the sleeve by the player. The sleeve provides protection for the disc, which is reportedly very fragile and coated with a special lubricant necessary for something which spins at so many RPMs.

Monaural Initially

When Griffiths announced that the initial players would be monaural rather than stereo, some of the members of the audience questioned how this would affect the substantial musical programming which comprises the software. The president explained that the monaural system was only temporary, but did not specify when the stereo system would be introduced. He explained the move by citing cost effectiveness and a desire to put the system on the market as soon as possible.

RCA is competing with Magnavox-MCA's "Magnavision," a system incompatible with RCA's "Selectavision" and retailing for almost \$300 more. The conference, in part, was seen as part of the two competitors' race to persuade other electronics manufacturers to choose one of the two systems, rather than introduce more incompatible systems.

Fourth Street East To Manage Mushroom

LOS ANGELES — The management of Mushroom Records has been taken over by Fourth Street East, Inc., a new management company headed by Gary Salter.

Mushroom will remain under the ownership of the Vancouver-based Vogel family and label staff will include Rick Sobatka, formerly of CBS Canada, as vice president and Tony Donato, from Black and White Sales Consultants, as general manager. Rich Block will continue to handle business affairs, while Joe Owens supervises marketing and promotion.

According to Salter, all U.S.-based personnel will continue on with the label and offices will be maintained in Los Angeles, Vancouver and Toronto.

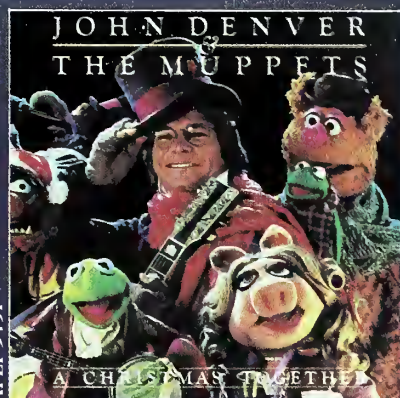
