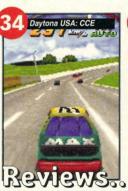

- ▶ Jon Ritman is known amongst older gamers as the brains and eyes behind some highly popular ancient games for the Spectrum such as Match Day and Head Over Heels. The good news for people-in-the-know is that he's bringing his mighty talent to the Saturn for a game to be released next Spring. The project's called QAD and all we know at the moment is that it's going to be released through Phillips.
- ➤ Carrying on from Euro '96 and Actua Golf, it would appear that Gremlin are to continue their motion-captured sports titles. The news has slipped out that their next project is to be Actua Tennis. A provisional release date is set for next Spring, but it's bound to slip to June to coincide with Wimbledon.
- ➤ Once it was all on, then it was all off... Finally now it would seem, Re-Loaded is all hunky-dory and back on for the Saturn. Again, it's started to show up on release schedules at Gremlin and initial impressions have it as a marked improvement over the (and let's be honest here) slightly drab previous version.
- ➤ The Resident Evil debate continues. Capcom are still looking into the possibility of doing a Saturn version of the game and we hear that if one is to go into production then it'll definitely feature new elements. Big if, though.
- ➤ Based on the PlayStation hardware and Capcom's first entry into the thrilling world of 3D beat-'em-ups, Star Gladiators seems to be (according to Virgin) ripe for a Saturn conversion. Thankfully nothing to do with Wolf and sadly nothing whatsoever to do with Ulrika, this can only be good news for Saturn owners as the PlayStation original is hardly crap.

> The creator of the Manga hero Akira, Katsushiro Otomo is working on an action/adventure title for the Saturn, provisionally titled Fakedown. The eame's expected to launch in March of next year and is said by those who've seen it to be a little like Resident Evil in appearance.

Although the majority of the levels will revolve around the same city/mothership/explosion

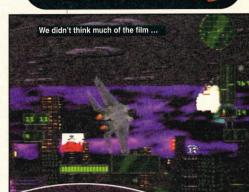

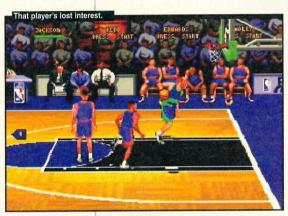

n a shameless show of hype, Sega recently made a wholly original bid to try to sponsor the yellow and red cards carried by referees in football matches. They approached the referee's association with a proposal to have Worldwide Soccer '97 branded on

all cards in all games for the rest of the season. Not the worst idea We've ever heard.

"We hope that each time a referee has to show a player a card, the Sega branding will remind the offender that 'after all, it's only a

game', thereby reducing the psychological pressure referees face during each game," commented Andy Mee, Sega's marketing director. We don't believe a word of that and we're not too hopeful for Sega's chances, but well done for trying.

Slowly but surely the Saturn is metamorphosing. While its main strength has always been (and probably

always will be) as a powerful games console, Sega have plans to take the machine's capabilities beyond the gaming arena. Indeed, a digital camera system has already been launched in Japan, using the Saturn to bridge the gap between family photo and a CD storage medium.

And then there are Sega's plans to launch in Internet add-on for the Saturn. It'll happen prior to Christmas in the USA, and next Easter in the UK and retailing at under \$200. The 'Sega Saturn Net Link' simultaneously guarantees the Saturn's future as a games system and gives it the potential for true multimedia appeal -offering full World Wide Web browsing capabilities, as well as e-mail and Internet gaming opportunities. Indeed 10 network-based games are expected to arrive at the same time as the hardware.

Phone call charges may be much higher in the UK than America, but that hasn't stopped PC and Mac owners taking to the Internet with breath-taking enthusiasm. It makes perfect sense then for Sega to bring their Net hardware to the UK, particularly when, combined with the Saturn, it represents the cheapest way to get onto the Internet. And with the myriad possibilities for multiplayer gaming over the phone lines, it's just possible that the whole way we play Saturn games could change.

"I think we've always viewed the Saturn as a multi-media machine," reckons Mark Maslowicz at Sega. "The Internet is something we feel is important for the future; it's going to be taken very seriously next year. The demand in America is massive, and we've already launched versions of Virtua Fighter and Sega Rally to work with the Net Link. The CD that comes with the system gives the user full web-browsing and e-mail options." And there's always the option of a keyboard for those who send really long e-mails.

Sony have always maintained that their PlayStation would be purely a games console. But if Sega's plans to bring the Saturn further into the family market succeed, that policy may well have to change. As Sega Of America recently said: "In our arsenal we have the strongest exclusive software library, Internet accessibility, the most expandable hardware system available and the best price. Sega Saturn is poised to not only win the next-generation battle, but the whole war itself."

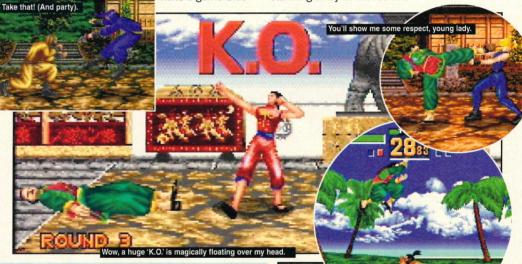
The first, and most obvious, difference between this and the Saturn version is the use of sprites. Hundreds of thousands of texture-mapped polygons running at 30 frames-persecond is still a feat of programming we're yet to see on the Mega Drive so, rather than try a bolstered-up chip affair (like *Virtua Racing*), Sega have wisely kept to sprites. The effect of this is to make a game that

plays rather like *Street Fighter 2* or *Mortal Kombat* – you begin to forget that the origins of the game came from an extra, third dimension.

Strangely enough, Sega have left out the two characters added to the second version of the game, so there's no Shun Li or Lion. Apparently this was due to the fact that these characters have lots of 3D moves that wouldn't translate to a 2D game... APPARENTLY.

Other differences are mainly small. Although the remaining eight characters have been included, only a few of the backgrounds have. And checking over the options screen, Sega have had to make a few minor cut-backs there as well. Finally, the only other thing I noticed missing was was the replay function.

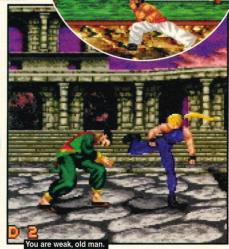

Want to make computer games? Fancy starting your own games development company? Sega Power sent James off to Frankfurt to see how it's done.

eon are the snappilynamed development team responsible for one of the Saturn's slickest games yet: *Tunnel B1*. Based near Frankfurt, Germany, the team of 18 programmers and designers have grown from humble beginnings to become one of Europe's hottest properties. The near-rapturous

reception that the PlayStation version of *Tunnel* received a few months back is all the more remarkable when you consider that four years ago Neon didn't exist and its six lead programmers were sitting at home playing any computer game that they could get their grubby hands on.

Yes, if you've ever wondered how die-hard gamers actually get into making games, Neon is your answer. Far from finishing a university course in computer science and then casting around for something to do, the six

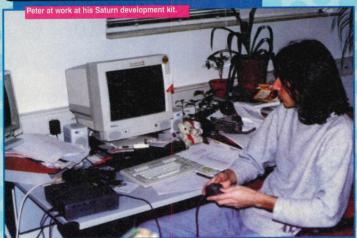

The Saturn conversion



Format-crossing games have a checquered history and PlayStation-Saturn conversions particularly so. Wipeout fared well on the Saturn (it dived on PC) but Destruction Derby looked distinctly ropey. "It's all a matter of how much time your prepared to spend on the conversion." says Peter Thierolf, Tunnel B1's lead Saturn programmer and Neon's leading authority on the innermost workings of Sega's little black box. "Porting across the basic 'C' [the language in which most modern computer programming is written from the PlayStation took about three months but I spent a further nine months optimising it and getting it to run as fast as we wanted on the Saturn. Happily, it's just as fast now - maybe even a little faster.

"The dual-processor arrangement in the Saturn can make programming really difficult sometimes" is Peter's answer to the usual enquiry about the Saturn's internal eccentricities: "In the end we split the logic functions on to one chip and the display and maths on to the other - you really have to know how the Saturn works to get the best out of it. It certainly takes a while but Sega have got a lot better recently in supplying help to developers

With the extra time it took to complete the Saturn version of Tunnel, Neon also had time to design an all-new, Saturn-exclusive level. "We felt that Saturn owners ought to benefit from the extra time it took to develop a version for their machine' says Nathan Wilson, one of Neon's English links to Ocean, their publishing company. "With all the hard work that's gone into the game we didn't want people to think it was just another dodgy conversion. I think the new level and some allnew features gives Saturn gamers one-up on their PlayStation counterparts"

on. Eventually there were six of us all with this passion for games and a determination to make a living out of it" says Boris: "By 1994 we had enough money between us to rent some office space, buy some equipment and set up Neon as a proper development company."

So far so good, all Neon needed now was some proper paid work. "Our first game was a Kellogs' Frosties giveaway" laughs Jan: "It was a kind of platform adventure starring Tony the Tiger." "We were quite into Platform games at that stage" remembers Boris: "We'd all seen Sonic on the Mega Drive and were really impressed with its speed. We wanted to make something as fast and so we started on our first full-length game: Mr Nutz for the Amiga." "It was really well-received on the Amiga" continues Jan

"Although the versions that appeared for the Mega Drive weren't - we didn't do that conversion and really it was a mixture of our work and another company's."

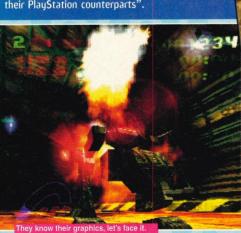
The launch of the Saturn and PlayStation in 1995 focussed the groups attention on 3D gaming and work began on Tunnel B1. "I'm a big admirer of games like Panzer Dragoon, Wipeout and Sega Rally" says Boris: "And I wanted to do a game along those sort of lines." "We talked for ages about the game's design and concept" continues Jan: "Originally it was going to contain several different gameplay styles - something along the lines of Die Hard Trilogy, for instance. However, when we saw the first segment, the tunnel section, we were so pleased we decided to expand it and build the entire game around that bit alone."

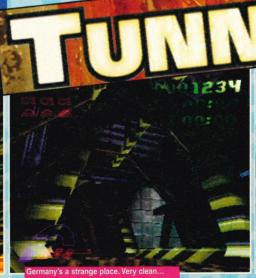
Even with the PlayStation Tunnel completed and the PC and Saturn versions almost there,

Neon aren't short of new work. Their next Saturn/PlayStation game is Viper, a helicopter "The motivation shoot-'em-up which hopes to knock Thunderhawk 2 of its undisputed chopper perch. A sequel for Tunnel, the imaginatively titled Tunnel B2 is also in the pipeline. "At the moment we're happy to develop for PlayStation, Saturn and

PC. We'll even consider the Nintendo 64 when it finally launches in Europe" says Boris. "We do take advice from our publisher Ocean about which type of games are most popular and likely to sell well" adds Jan "But ultimately we'll only do a game if we like it. The final say about what we do is always with us because if the team wasn't completely enthusiastic about the project, we wouldn't end up with such a good game at the end of it all."

There can be no doubt that Neon have made a superb entry into the 32-Bit gaming market and if their past history of selfimprovement is anything to go by their future can only be rosy. With









their laid-back style – the nine-to-five lifestyle is not their thing at all – they're in the enviable position of doing what they enjoy most and reaping the rewards for doing it. Not only are they an excellent example of an independent, gaming-lead development outfit, they also show that if you're committed-enough you can make a living out of an interest in computer games. • James

ome might argue *Micro Machines Military* – or *MMM* as it will henceforth be known – is merely a cash-in. Others, however, would suggest that this is the Codemasters swansong; their last venture into 16-Bit territory.

On playing the game, those undecided about whether or not to suspect shady going's-on at Codemasters HQ will be reassured that it's anything but a cash-in. A lot of work has been put into the title, not least of which is the inclusion of said military vehicles. In football manager

speak, "that's got to be good for the game."

With the inclusion of the much-hyped J•Cart, MMM offers the opportunity for up to eight players to compete at one time. 'Party Play' presents you with a tricky but nonetheless inventive multi-player scenario. By dividing the four joypads in half, one player

controls his vehicle using the D-Pad whilst the other uses the letter buttons. Consequently, eight cars can race using four pads at the same time. Unsurprisingly, this quickly becomes essential.

Generally speaking, though, seven mates aren't going to be readily available (unless you live in a Waltons-style family) so the four-player facility is likely to offer more frequent play. This too proves gratuitously playable and once again showcases the Codemasters unrivalled ability in the multi-player department.

But, for all that, it's the addition of the two new features that will be of most interest. The first of these is the inclusion of firepower during the races. Vehicles are now equipped with their own set of missiles which can be used to get the

better of opponents. It certainly livens-up proceedings although frustration often walks hand-in-hand with the excitement of striking someone when you yourself are hit.

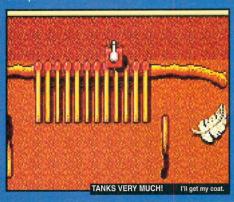

Level 13

- 3 A quick grenade (don't stand too close) will open up this secret room. Collect a shotgun and some ammo here.
- 4 Going through the left door will bring face-to-face with two chest bursters. Disposing of them will leave you free to turn the lights on (the switch) and open the

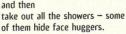

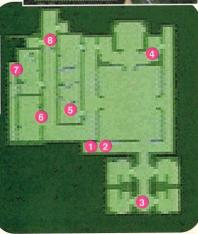

- 6 The guys here protect the main control room. Shoot them and throw the smaller of the two switches. You'll now be able to access the other room and the corridor that runs behind it.
- 7 In the secret room at the end of the back corridor, you'll find armour and some more ammo.
- 3 Now throw the big switch in the control room (you'll need that battery) to release eight prisoners and the end room door. Back off from the prisoners and take them one by one. Once dead they'll give you ID tags and a







Level 15

Based around a large central chamber, level 15 is initially quite confusing. The key to success is working out which lift takes you where.

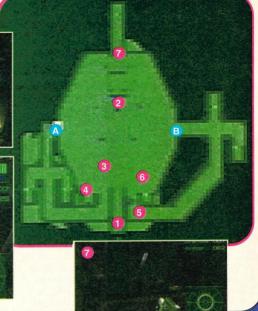
- 1 This level is slightly more complicated than some of the others and you'll need to concentrate on which switch you flick when.
- 2 You'll be greeted by four prisoners on arrival. Turn left towards point A and go down the stairs. Shoot the prisoners and huggers you'll find there and collect the goodies in the two small rooms. Now proceed down the corridor.
- 3 Turning left in the corridor will bring you up against a large crate barricade. Each crate contains a hugger so shooting them one by one is to be advised. Switching the switch will activate a lift at point A. Walk back and step on it.
- 4 Going up on the lift will bring you to this higher level and face to face with three prisoners. Turn left (ie South) and find the first of the two

main switches behind a door. Activate it and jump down at A.

- Froceed to point B and go down the stairs. Kill the huggers and prisoner waiting for you and collect the goodies in the two blind corridors. Now go down the long corridor.
- 6 At the end of the corridor will be a switch for the lift at point B. Flick it, walk round and get on. Go South and find the second of the two main switches (and a prisoner) hidden behind a door.
- 7 Jump down at B and reactivate its switch. Get back on the lift and go North. Flick the switch at the end of the gantry and jump down. Behind the door is the exit to the level.







Level 16

One of the best levels in the second part of the Trilogy, level 16 revolves around a set flame jet switches.

- 1 This is one of the best levels in this section. There are loads of secret rooms and packets of ammo. It's quite straightforward you've got to shut down some gas jets so don't rush things.
- 2 Straight out of the entrance there's a secret room to your right. Inside you'll find some seismic charges.
- 3 Take your first proper right and shoot the welcoming prisoner. Carry on down the corridor to find a control room with two prisoners, the auto mapper and the first gas jet switch.
- 4 Back in the main corridor, the nest room on the right contains alien eggs and some seismic charges. There's also a secret room behind with some medkits in it.
- Walking South down the main corridor you'll meet another prisoner and come across a false wall leading to this secret room. It contains an adrenaline burst but

- only use it if your health is significantly below 200%.
- 6 Avoid the flame and activate the lift. Carefully make your way over to this point.
- 7 The secret room at the far West of the map contains seismic charges. After shooting the crate blockade and activating the switch, you'll get into this room. Three consecutive secret rooms lead North from here containing flame thrower fuel, pulse rifle clips and grenades.
- 3 Continue North up the corridor to find this next secret room containing a couple of prisoners, explosive barrels, ammunition and some night vision goggles
- In the big North room are some door switches and the next two gas jet switches. There are also four prisoners so watch out.
- 10 In the far North corner of the big room is a small secret room with four eggs.

- (1) You'll have a few dog bursters to deal with along here. There's a switch in the room half way along which should be activated. Now go back to the lifts.
- 12 Use the lifts to get around to this point. Activate the switch to use the next lift along.
- (13) Getting around to the far South of the map will give you a chance to open this secret room. Inside you find the smart gun and plenty of hugger company. Kill,

collect and make your way back to the far West lift point.

Congratulations, you've now completed the level.



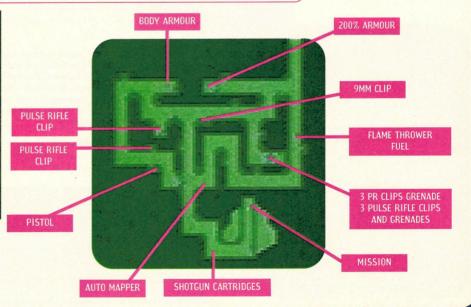


Level 17

The first of the bonus levels in the second part of the Trilogy. Use it well and collect as many goodies as possible



1) You only have 60 seconds to collect as much ammo and armour as possible on this level. Everything is contained in crates — you'll have to shoot them open which can slow you down considerably if you've not selected a powerful-enough weapon. The location of the best items are marked (right). It is essential that you get some armour on this level to prepare for the tougher ones ahead.

Qunning use of the explosive barrels in this room will kill the two marines waiting for you. Collect the ammo to be had and then blast the false West-wall. Stepping into the room will activate its central lift and bring in two red aliens. You have been warned.

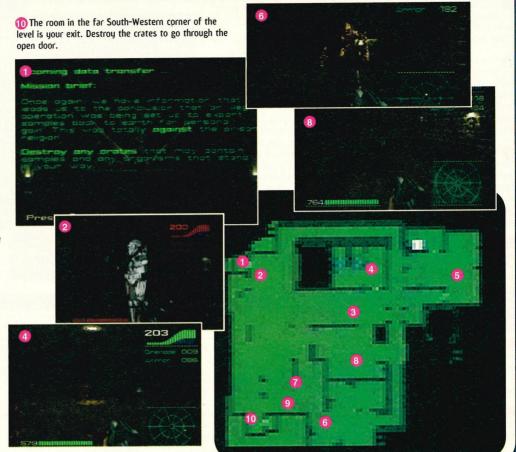
5 Go over the bridge and open the door in the East wall. Be careful as the room beyond is packed with nasty surprises. You may well want to use grenades here. The North room contains the auto mapper and a ceiling-hugging alien. Be sure to collect the battery hidden somewhere in these two rooms and destroy all the crates.

6 Back-track to the middle of the large room and take the central gantry over the water to the back rooms. The kitchen at the back contains a red alien and the battery operated switch that opens the exit door.

7 North from the kitchen is this switch. Throwing it will allow (wet) progress to the middle room.

3 The final room of the level contains a couple of red aliens and plenty of crates. When you've finished all these go back the way you came using the switch.

Hidden in the far water section is a 200% armour suit.



Level 19

Level 19 is fun and not too tricky. There's plenty of ammo to pick up and apart from a nasty surprise at the beginning it shouldn't pose to much of a problem.

A bit of a tester is level 19 — mainly due to the excess number of aliens and heavily armed replicants and prisoners — turning off the steam valves is easy. Finish the red alien and the replicant (use a grenade) on arrival and turn immediately right (South).

2 The five trapped aliens cannot be shot in situ. Their gates will be released when the grenades are picked up off the table. Before you let them out, dispose of all the eggs in this room and pick up the mapper. Back off quickly when you do release the aliens and grenade them. Flick both switches, the larger is the first steam valve.

3 Once the side room is completed, move to the far North of the level and off the two replicants you'll find in the corridor. Now move towards the big room in the North-West of the level.

4 The North room contains five red aliens and two more

steam valves. The secret room and the secret room in the corridor contain eggs, charges and pulse rifle clios.

5 Back track and drop into the Northern recessed area. Kill the two red aliens down here and use the switch to get back up (the lift is quite a way from the switch — you'll have to run).

ammunition. Continue North West and kill the advancing red aliens. The room at the end (the Southern recess) has smart gun ammunition.

3 This secret room consists of two rooms on top of one another. The first has huggers and some ammo, the one behind it, a red alien and some more goodies. Now make your way back to the egg room.

 Getting to close to the boilers will cause serious damage so be careful around here. There are four red aliens on the main floor as well as the eggs. Try to take the eggs first. The room to the South is where the exit is.

So you've made your decisions, withdrawn your money and you're ready to plunge into the world of second-hand or mail order gaming. Before you do, take a look at the following to ensure your buying safety.

Buying second hand/reduced price stock is not without its risks and certainly not as simple as going to your local Electronic Boutique. However, with a bit of knowledge and the sense to take the right precautions, you can buy and save with relative safety.

Second hand shops

Second hand shops owe their customers the same statutory rights as any other shops. The goods they sell must be fault free unless the fault can be attributed to reasonable wear and tear or was pointed out at the time of sale. It is also an offense for the shop keeper to lie or make false claims about an item of merchandise. If you receive an assurance that the games or hardware you buy are in good working order, then you are covered if they don't.

Second-hand shops remain the bargain-hunter's safest hunting ground as most rely on their good reputation to make a living and they won't try to rip you off.

Ask to see your purchase working in the shop - if the place is any good, they won't mind. Look up your local shops/exchanges in Yellow Pages.

Computer shop sales

Pretty self-explanatory this one. Most big computer stores have sales, some at the oddest times of the year. Look out for some severe reductions on older (especially Mega Drive) titles.

Boot sales

Including jumble sales and the rest. The prices here can be truly eye-opening, but you really do take your chances. Because most car booters are not professional traders they owe their customers fewer obligations. Goods sold do not have to be fault free but they must be as described (it's still illegal to lie).

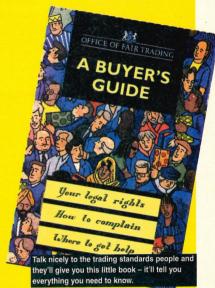
If possible, ask to see your

purchase working. The golden rule is to ask for as many assurances from the stallholder as possible and listen carefully to their answers - it is actually quite hard to lie convincingly. Also never think that the first price you're quoted is somehow set in stone - it's amazing how much it can drop if you seem likely to walk away

Small ads

Small ads in the specialist press are quite a good way to get hold of old games, although the prices charged for hardware are often unrealistic. How you actually go about exchanging the goods and money is a question to decide between you and the other person involved but, if you go through Sega Power we will try and sort out any problems that you might have.

If you have any enquiries about secondhand goods or wish to make a complaint against a particular trader, contact your local Trading Standards Office. You'll find their number in the phone book.



TEN STEPS TO SAFETY

When you're buying from any mail order company, it's worth following these Sega Power guidelines:

- BEFORE YOU send any money, ring the supplier to make sure the item you require is in stock. Ask questions about the company's policy on delivery and returns of faulty equipment. Make sure there are no hidden costs such as postage and packaging. Find out when you can realistically expect to receive your goods.
- ALWAYS READ the small print on adverts
- BEWARE companies that do not include their address on their adverts, Also, avoid companies that do not answer or return your calls.
- BY FAR the best method of payment is by credit card. If ordering goods of more than £100 in total value remember that you are legally entitled to claim compensation from some credit companies if the retailer goes bust. Check your
- KEEP records. If you are buying by credit card, keep a note of the order and ask for an order number. When ordering anything over the telephone, always doublecheck the price.
- IF YOU are sending a cheque, keep a note of the cheque number, the date and the exact value. Make sure you know the exact name of the mail order company.
- faulty, contact the supplier immediately.
- ALWAYS ORDER from the most recent issue of Sega Power.
- IF A PROBLEM does arise, contact the supplier in the first instance. Calmly and misunderstandings that can easily be resolved. If you think you have a genuine grievance, contact your local Trading Standards Officer. The number is in the

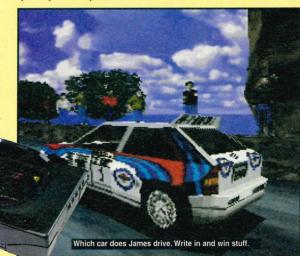

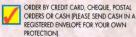

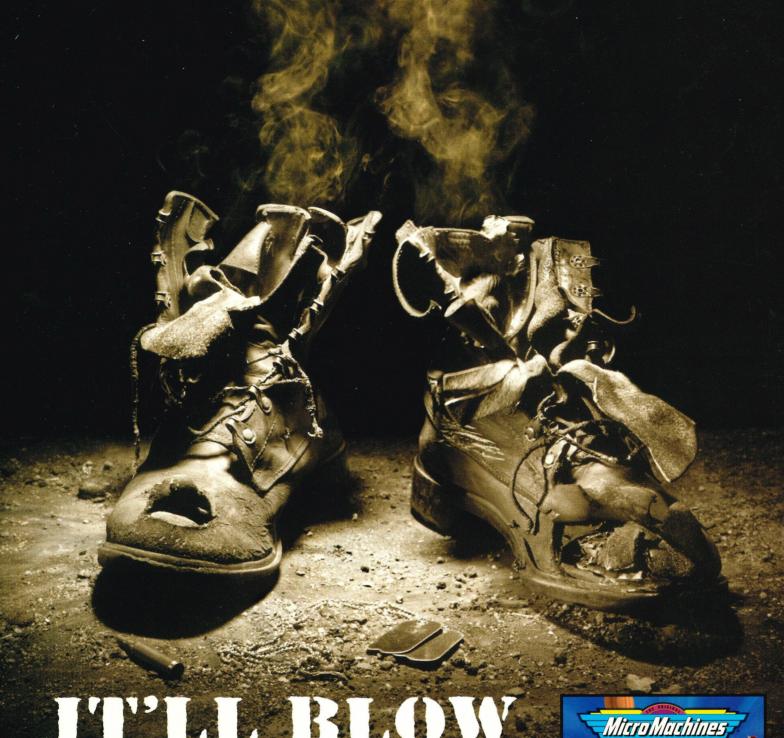
