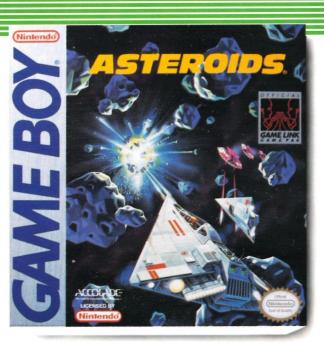

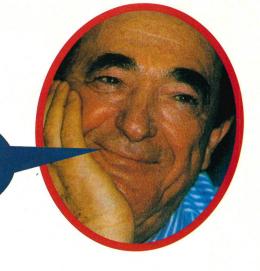

According to recent speculation in the Japanese press, Matsushita (the massive conglomerate that owns just about every consumer electronics company you've ever heard of – including Panasonic, Technics and Pioneer) has a neat box of tricks ready to give Nintendo and Sega a run for their money next year.

Details are still up in the air but many believe this new deck will sport trendy technology like CD-ROM and hopefully appeal to the whole family with a wide range of software and accessories. Some pundits have even suggested it could also play laserdisc movies. This format is very popular in Japan thanks to the brilliant

## fist of the north star

fter the tremendous success of last Autumn's release of Akira, the animated movie based on the comic by Katsuhiro Otomo, Island World Communications has decided to release a series of animated manga epics, on its new Manga label.

The first release was Fist Of The North Star on sale since the Spring, sporting an 18 certificate and priced £12.99. The original comic, written by Buronson and drawn by Tetsuo Hara and available in English from most good comic shops (published by Viz Select Comics, a Californian based group, nothing to do with the UK Viz comic) has been an inspiration for a Nintendo NES video game from Taxan which sold over 150 000 copies in the US.

Fist is set in a future world destroyed by nuclear war, where mutant warlord tyrants of giant proportions hold sadistic domain over the surviving populace. The hero, Kenshiro, a student of the North Star (Big Dipper) martial arts technique has been chosen by his elderly master to be the world's saviour. The film is quite an assault on the senses with hardly a few minutes footage passing without some dismemberment or exploding heads. Island hopes to release six titles on its new label this year.

### in the realm of the sensei

raditionally in Japan,
doctors, artists, teachers
and other learned
persons are addressed by the
title sensei – meaning 'teacher'
or 'master' (the term means
'one born before'). Comic book
artists who attain any standing
are also referred to as sensei

artists who attain any standing are also referred to as sensei by their assistants, fans and editors. Most sensei in the past tended to be older people, but because of the youth of the industry and young artists acquiring millions of adoring fans, this has even led to the existence

of teenage sensei.
This creates a big
problem in age and
status conscious Japan.
If an 18-year old can be a
sensei, how do you refer
to an older, more
experienced artist? The

answer was to create a new hierarchy of honorifics. The industry's new titles include sõsho, slightly above sensei, kyoshō, 'great master' or maestro, ōsama, 'king' and kyosō, 'founder of a religion'! Osama Tezuka, the founder of the modern Japanese storycomic is accorded the supreme accolade: manga no kamisama or 'The God Of Comics'.

Who could we get to write an informative piece on Manga - Japanese comics? When David 'Billy Bunter' Wilson stepped up and announced "The Manga is a fleshy fruit, yellowish red in colour, eaten ripe

or used green in pickles", we thought we'd teach the fat bast a lesson.



onsole games have become a modern day Japanese phenomenon. An older one is the comic or 'manga' (the Japanese word for comic). In Japan the comic industry is a huge multi-billion dollar operation that has tens of millions of devoted fans from schoolboys to businessmen, employs 3,000 active artists and serves as a window on Japanese culture and the Japanese mind.

With the boom in the console gaming industry, it was only natural that even when not directly using characters from comics, the game graphics would borrow enormously from this popular visual culture. Until recently however, not that much was actually known of this huge Japanese publishing phenomenon. Why?

Well, firstly there are the obvious cultural differences: "The Japanese comic is designed for Japanese readers who share particular attitudes and customs, many of which are unknown outside of Japan," wrote 'God of Manga' Osamu Tezuka, the author of Astro Boy.

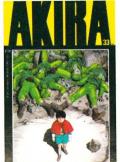


fundamentally Japanese comics are designed to be opened and read from right to left making it hard for a Western reader to follow. In printing the excellent Akira series in English, Epic Comics (the arm of Marvel Comics devoted to more adult material) had to take the original Japanese publication through a lengthy process of Westernisation' - but more of that later.

What was largely responsible for encouraging awareness of the Japanese comic, was the creation of an animated television series based on popular manga. In France Goldorak is hugely popular, Doraemon is equally avidly watched by TV audiences in Hong Kong, and youngsters in China all sing the tune to Astro Boy. The current manga title working hardest as an ambassador for Japanese comics is undoubtedly Katsuhiro Otomo's Akira, which

behind the original comic, Otomo himself.

Akira the comic, is currently being published in English by Epic Comics, who along with Viz Premiere Comics are largely responsible for bringing many popular Japanese titles to these shores.

Perusing a specialist comic shop these days you will find many titles like Lum, Nausicaä Of The Valley Of Wind, Fist Of The North Star, Pineapple Army, Lone Wolf And Cub, Mai The Psychic Girl, and Crying Freeman, yet this is only the tip of the iceberg when you consider that Japan is one of the most print saturated nations in the world. Some enterprising reporters have remarked that Japan uses more paper for its comics than it does for its toilet paper.

The main problem stopping a larger proportion of manga reaching these shores aside from the

### barefoot gen

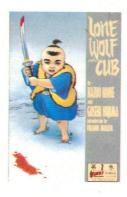
adashi No Gen, or Barefoot Gen is another title to make the transition for Western consumption. Barefoot Gen is the semi-autobiographical story of Keiji Nakazawa, who at the age of six, at 08:15 on the 6 August 1945 witnessed his father, sister and brother dying in the atomic bombing of Hiroshima. Nakazawa survived by chance but the scars of that ent remained with him into adulthood when he became a comic artist with a mission - to convey the horror of atomic holocaust to a generation that knows nothing of war.

The universal message of Barefoot Gen is no more Hiroshimas' and to this end the tale has been translated into several languages, has been made into three live action feature films, an animated feature film and a much acclaimed opera. It was even the first Japanese story comic to be translated and published in a European language.

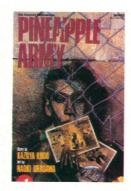
subject of manga. One of the most popular forms of pastime is gambling at pachinko parlours, mah jongg salons, race tracks and lotteries. Now, you wouldn't think the rather static game of Mah Jongs (a sort of Japanese dominoes if you like) would be the ideal theme for a comic book story, but in 1975 a comic called Maio. 75 a comic called Mājan irōki (Tales Of A Wandering Höröki (Tales Of A Wandering Mah Jongs Player) was a runaway success! Since that time there has been Fighting Mah Jongs, Blood Spray Mah Jongs Tiles, No-Panty Mah Jongs Tiles, No-Panty Mah Jongs Tiles Turned, Mah Jongs Turkish Bath, The Wild Animais Mah Jongs Tiles In Shinjuku, Song Of Wandering Mah Jongs, The Lewd Mah Jongs Devil, and Wild Rider Mah Jongs Tiles At Sunrise!



### comics: bane or boon

ou've no doubt heard the current debate a whether or not video games are bad for you. Well, in Japan the same debate has reged about the go of comics. A neurophysiologist in a Tokyo paper wrote that too much speed reading by younger omic readers may not provide much exercise for the ynapses in their frontal lobes of the brain and could re a lack of discipline!

Other psychologists, educators and researchers have come up with the belief that comics transmit important information more effectively than text alone, that they help readers develop an ability to quickly perceive the essence of a problem without relying on finear logic and that they may be a factor in the dexterity with which young Japanese handle computers and related software.





translation and the costly business of producing 'mirrored' artwork, is the fact that many comics feature subject matter incomprehensible or uninteresting to people unfamiliar with the Japanese way of life. They are also rich with symbolism, dozens of esoteric gestures and symbols inextricably linked with Japanese cultures and hosts of in-jokes shared between artists and readers. The violent and erotic content of many could also prove problematic.

Although more and more titles are breaking through the cultural barrier the most predominant way in which the Japanese comic phenomenon is influencing the West is in terms of commercial spin-offs.

The Eighties animated cartoons Robotech, Gobots, Defenders Of The Earth and Transformers were all based on Japanese concepts created in comic books from the Fifties and Sixties. Hasbro Bradley's robot toys, Transformers were actually designed and manufactured by Takara and reaped \$100 million in their first year! The robot fad was a goldmine for Japanese toy manufacturers even though the genre was thought 'trashy' at home. It did succeed in generating some controversy for being 'an orgy of annihilating violence... a cult of allegiance to great warriors, a worship of the

### the miller's tale

n a 1982 Comics Journal interview, American comic artist Frank Miller, the creative hand behind Daredevil and Batman The Dark Knight, said, "Japanese comics are as violent as anything I've ever seen... The violence in them is rather honest. They are willing to be violent and admit that that is what they want in their fiction. I think that we are much more hypocritical about it. Violence in fiction has a stigma attached to it here. It's obvious that people want it, it's obvious that people get a certain amount of pleasure out of it, and it's obvious that people feel guilty about it. I don't see the guilt as necessary. It is definitely not the same thing to read a violent story as it is to Frank Miller followed his Dark Knight

(a recent landmark in popularising the graphic novel) with a six part samurai saga Rooin. This featured cinematic layouts and frame progression – the hallmark of Japanese story-comics, and credited the Japanese samurai classic Kozure Õkami as its main inspiration.

great machine' (in the words of an Italian member of parliament) and in 1984 an American woman was injured in a near riot of shoppers vying to buy transforming robots for Christmas(!). The influence of Japanese comics is also being borne out in the work of Western comic artists like Frank Miller with his Elektra Assassin and Rõnin, and Wendy Pini the author of Elf Quest.

Where the manga culture is most likely to be exported is through the medium of the video game. Although the subtleties, the violence and eroticism of much adult manga would never escape the rigid control of Sega and Nintendo, the graphical style, themes and scenarios of video games owe much to the Japanese comics tradition. The story has even gone full circle with special Japanese comics being published to detail the adventures of Sonic The Hedgehog and Mario the plumber.

With the release of Fist Of The North Star on the NES by Nintendo third party publishers Taxan, maybe this could mark the beginning of a flood of manga onto Western video consoles. Although most titles currently seem to fall into the cutesy platform genre, if some of the wealth of different comic material were to filter through we could look forward to a host of new game scenarios, ideas, and action.





redator Two is coming soon to a Master System near you, but the journey has been a troubled one. Want to know why? And want to know how the game is shaping up now? Then read Oh No, We Seem To Be Jiggered, But Maybe We're Not! (The Game Zone behind the scenes documentary)...

### scene one: predator one

Predator 2 was a film in which... well, it was a film in which Arnie Schwarzenegger didn't appear for starters. He was off making Kindergarten Cop or something. Predator 2 wasn't set in a jungle either, being set instead in New York city. There were loads of baddies hanging about in the city, they were drug dealers, and they had guns. There were loads of goodies also hanging about in the city, cops, and they had guns as well. And the alien who could sort of turn invisible was hanging about too. The goodies were trying to kill the baddies, the baddies were trying to kill the goodies, and the alien didn't care who he killed. Or something like that. It was a film that demanded a computer game. (But I... 0h, never mind. Ed.)

### scene three: the master system version

Now we get to the problems. The game was started in March 1991, and was going to be coming fairly soon afterwards courtesy of Mirrorsoft. But something happened: something which made things not go quite as planned. It all started when... well, read scenes four and five and you'll get the idea.

The seasons continue unabated. A small white rabbit called Blinky dies of Scabulus Scabulosis, and is eaten by ants. The earth continues to revolve about the sun. A small asteroid skirts the edges of the solar system and collides with Pluto. New galaxies are born in the far flung reaches of the universe. Chesney Hawkes becomes famous, then he becomes unfamous again. And so on.

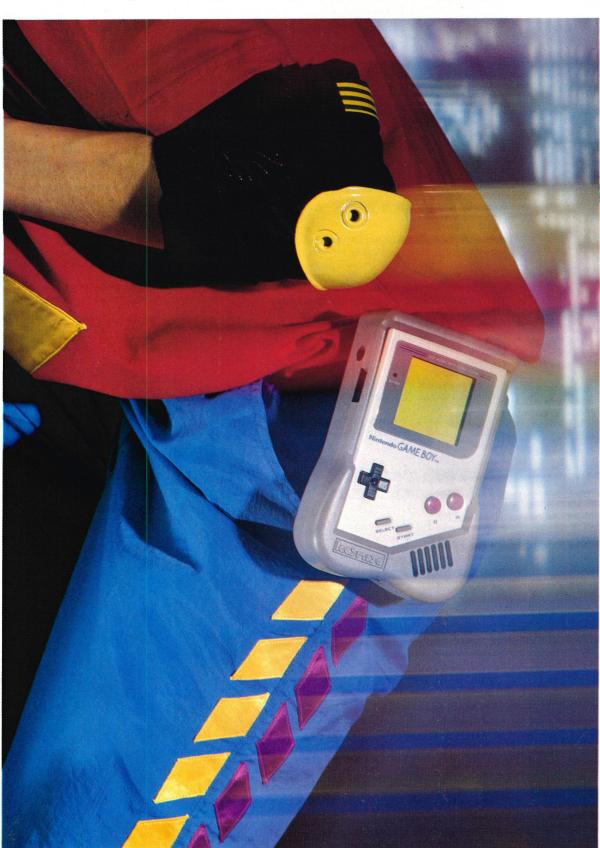
### scene eight: enter acclaim to rapturous applause

there was one thing still wrong – the original programmer had decided he was off. He was sick of waiting around for so long. He was going, and that was it. "We can handle that," said the person from Acclaim, "We'll simply bring in **our** top programmer and he can take over." And they did just that. *Predator Two* was back in business.

### scene nine: a look at the game

And this is what it's all about. A seven level, gun totin' extravaganza with more nasties than you could shake, well, a gun at. You play Haggerty (a cop, and the hero from the film) and your aim is to rescue the hostages on all the levels before the Predator causes them to blow up. Simple? No, because, as you can imagine, the game isn't just you sauntering through a load of empty levels, it's actually full of people who want to kill you - the drug dealers, basically, from the film. Out they pop, right left and centre. Out of the ground, too, from underneath manhole covers and suchlike. Each time you score a kill, the drug dealer concerned releases a hypodermic needle, which can be collected for bonus points. There are also, as you'll have guessed, power-ups galore.

Level one is set out on the street and is hard enough, but level two leads you down into the subway where things only get worse – not only are the drug dealers still in evidence, it's also your first encounter with the alien (and don't forget, the alien in *Predator 2* can become

invisible. Nightmare). Level three is another street and it's blast, maim, kill all the way - as you can imagine - using any power-ups you happen to have come across (and not lost) from your previous encounters. Level four takes you from the street all the way up to the rooftops, where death doesn't just come in the form of bullets from your enemies, but also from accidentally falling off the edges. There's not a lot of room to play with up there, you see. After negotiating the rooftop section, it's onto level five - the slaughterhouse. The screen scrolling speeds up a tad in this section, and the action follows suit. Another thing about the slaughterhouse level, apart from being frantic, is that it's completely gory (mind you, what would you expect from a factory in which cows have steel bars slammed through their skulls?) After the slaughterhouse, it's back to the street again before hot-footing it to the final level, level seven, the alien's spaceship. So there you go. Shoot bullets or throw bombs. Kill or be killed. It's hard going, but each time you complete a level, you're given an access code - meaning you can start from where you left off every time you come back to the game.

As you'll have gathered, although Acclaim has come to the rescue and *Predator 2* is back in the running, it's still not quite finished. What we've seen so far looks pretty fab, though. What do you think? What would Robert Maxwell have

In a rare never to be repeated oneoff opportunity, Game Zone has allowed Camden Rhyme Aficionado Posse (CRAP) to write this intro: "He walked into a portal, And we did chortle, But then we let Marcus Berkmann Review The Immortal."

h, graphic adventures - we all know where we are with them, don't we? Wizards, demons, dragons and pixies. Trolls. Magic amulets. Dungeons. Spotty dreebs with volcanic skin problems. No acknowledgement of the concept of deodorant. Green teeth. Smelly socks. Breath like a three-week old corpse. Could this be why all too many right-thinking gamesters steer as clear of graphic adventures as they do of nuclear waste?

Still, occasionally a game comes along that confounds all our appalling prejudices and makes even the most furiously trollist of us repent our ways and admit that perhaps elves aren't that bad after all. The Immortal, Electronic Arts' Sega best-seller, is one of these

rare games.

Normal gamesters with Oil Of Ulay skin and gloriously scented footwear have been heard raving about it everywhere. It is, to use that technical term, a ripsnorter. And now - wave your enchanted staff and say the magic word "Flobalob" - it's on the Nintendo. Praise be, o master of the infinite labyrinth!

But why does The Immortal so appeal to gamesters and reviewers who would not normally touch a graphic adventure with 57 bargepoles tied end to end? 'Tis clear, green and horned one. It's because The Immortal isn't really a graphic adventure at all. Graphic adventurers, festering slowly in the corner, probably don't care for it one bit.

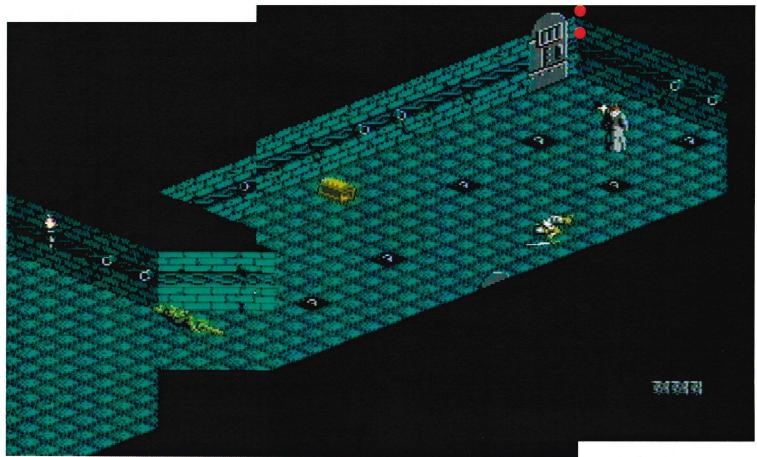
Oh sure, there are loads of adventurey bits in it - millions of viciously hard puzzles to solve, various keys needed for various doors and above all, loads of goblins doing whatever it is that goblins do (Gobblin' perhaps? Ed.) - but the real appear of the game is elsewhere. It is, not to put too fine a point on it, violent. Very violent. %¢∞¶@-ing violent, in short.

After all in how many graphic adventures are there 18 different ways of killing an opponent? And in how many graphic adventures is the killing quite so, er, graphic? As you wander through the 3D isometric landscape (all right, it's just a load of dungeons really, but doesn't "3D isometric landscape" sound so much better?), you will, fairly frequently, encounter huge geezers with only one thing in mind - slicing you

When this happens, you flick straight to a combat scene, in which the tiny stick figures from the main gameplay are transformed into large heaving thrusting sprites, boasting substantial weapons and even more substantial pectorals suddenly, what you thought was a nice jolly little strollabout has become a vicious slash 'emap - although the huge quantities of blood apparently visible on the Sega version don't show up here.

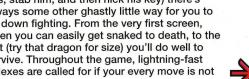
### level one

be littering the screen. Not that you'd guess any of this from the basic description of the game, which is the usual quest to save someone from certain death.

Your old teacher Mordamir has been taken prisoner in the mysterious Labyrinth Of Eternity (no, I'm not making any of this up), and although few of us would even consider risking certain death to rescue some bloke who once taught you French, you are, it seems, made of sterner stuff. That's why they call you The Immortal. There's only one snag. You're not actually immortal at all. Far from it, in fact.

For amongst its many fine qualities, perhaps the best thing about The Immortal is the wide and entertaining variety of potential deaths that it has lined up for you. Time and again, just when you think you have it taped (yes, avoid this, stab him, and then nick his key) there's always some other ghastly little way for you to go down fighting. From the very first screen, when you can easily get snaked to death, to the last (try that dragon for size) you'll do well to survive. Throughout the game, lightning-fast reflexes are called for if your every move is not to be your last.







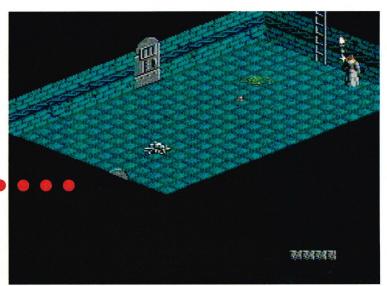

Meanwhile, the brain needs to be kept fully charged (eat lots of fish) for those puzzles, and here is where your graphic adventurer might come in useful. The first couple of screens on level two, for instance, tax both reactions and your imagination to the limit. Your brain gets overloaded with questions. How to get past the slime? How can you pay for the slime potion? How to get past those irritating little fireballs? How do you get the third gem for the puzzle? How do you solve the puzzle? And what on earth is the dust of bleeding compliance?

In the end, you're even expecting to be killed when you're least expecting it: this is a game where you need every hint you can get, and then some. With eight levels to crack, this should keep even the most ingenious gamemeister utterly absorbed for weeks.

Gripes? The game is very difficult and while its very hardness might suit some tastes, but I'm

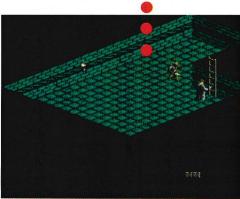

sure there will be a fair few players who give up in disgust after a relatively short time (it might help if you got your hands on issue one of *Game Zone*, for the codes to levels one-four).

Also the graphics, much praised on other versions, aren't anywhere near as spectacular as thad expected –

compared to other 3D isometrics like Solstice, the sprites are disgracefully small, and the backgrounds rather dull. It's well animated, for sure, but oddly colourless: a game designed primarily for another system (the Amiga) and now converted without, it seems, much thought for what the NES's more modest graphics can or cannot do.

Nevertheless, it's fair to say *The Immortal* does seem to have been built for speed not looks. After all, it's the game that counts, and there's certainly enough of that here. Devilish puzzles AND 18 ways to kill people?

Clever stuff. The smelly sock brigade may not like it, but you will...

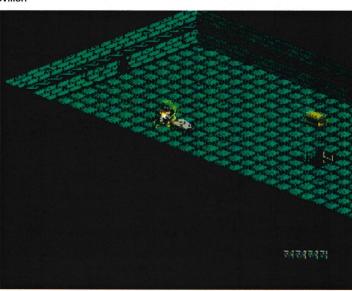

### the game show

Basically, the deal with Smash TV is that it's an ultra violent gameshow where you, the contestant, are sent into a closed arena to do battle with opponents of the human, subhuman and decidedly non-human variety, in the hopes of winning dosh, prizes, fame and fortune. Are you schmuck enough to risk your life for all that? Then get ready for Smash TV.

### the game

Smash TV is basically a shoot 'emup of the 'shoot-everying-that-moves' variety. As the star contestant on Smash TV, you have five lives per level and you're armed with a basic machine gun with which to dispatch the numerous foe that swarm upon you in every room. Power-ups equip you with grenades, missiles, killer-discusses, multi-direction blasters, killer force-fields and smart bombs.

If you're not too busy slaying all and sundry, you can pick up bonus prizes, too, such as a brand new toaster, although quite what use a brand new toaster is when you're confronted with a roomful of murderous thugs, I don't know, but there you have it. Perhaps you could offer them a nice

hot buttered crumpet as a wily distraction ploy or perhaps not.

At the start of each level you get a chance to have a peek at a map of the studio, showing the location of bonus rooms, which is worth pausing and copying, if you can possibly rest your itchy trigger finger for a moment, and at the end of each level, there's a big boss to dispatch. Make it through all four levels, and you'll get a chance to pop the Gameshow host - a neat idea that would greatly increase the popularity of many contemporary gameshows, I'm sure.

### and now, back to the game...

Playability-wise, like all the best blasters, a good bout of Smash TV is guarantied to leave you breathless and a bit jittery and keen for another bout, pronto. The controls take some getting used to - you use the directional pad to move your man, and each of the four buttons to control firing in one particular direction. To make things even more complicated, you need to hit combinations of two buttons to fire diagonally, but surprisingly, you get used to the whole caboodle fairly quickly until you find you don't really have to think about it at all.

The graphics are nothing blinding, but they're sharp, colourful and sound nevertheless. And talking of sound, the audio is pretty ace too - including some neat vocal interludes like the host's occasional oily cries of: "Good luck - you'll need it!" On the downside, all the levels are a little samey, without much variation worth mentioning, but it's enjoyable nonetheless, and that's what counts. Smash TV is particularly good with two players, so if you often get the opportunity to play with a chum, as it were, we're

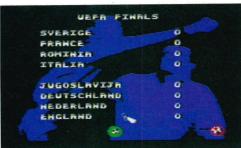

hampions Of Europe carries the official European Cup licence. This makes it a pretty hot property. It also explains that stupid bloomin' bunny that's plastered all over the packaging and opening sequence. Ball drops into hole, ball bounces out of hole followed by bunny who kicks the ball about while the nation cries out "What's this got to do with football?"

Once this little hiccup is out of the way the game settles down to making a lot more sense. This is partly due to an extremely simple icon driven options system. *Champions Of Europe* is a European game you see and that means it has to be comprehensible to someone whose command of English goes no further than Bobby Charlton, Sir Winston Churchill or fish and chips (ie. Mancunians).

Most of the options are fairly basic, wind speed, weather conditions, that sort of thing. They're effective too, a wet pitch makes for a stodgy game, a dry one for high speed and bounce. Playing in high wind is nothing if not an excuse for a joke from the Dominik Diamond Joke Book.

As all true footie loyalists know matches are often won or lost not by the men in the middle but by the man in the middle... the man in black... the ref! In Champions Of Europe there are eight different refs to choose from and they can make all the difference. The difference between a good hard challenge and yet another bloomin' free kick. The difference between a goal and an early bath. All the difference in the world.

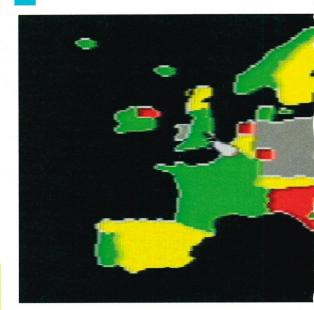
What with all the rows and claims of 'not fair' surrounding the notorious penalty shoot out it's comforting to find that *Champions Of Europe* gives you choice. You can either dabble in the future of football by electing to have extra time and penalties or else opt for the the old fashioned "If it was good enough for Stanley Matthews it's good enough for me" 90 minutes then straight back to the Dog And Duck for a pint of Winter Warmer and a pack of Pork Scratchings.



### ooop for the coop

Still, what happens down on the pitch isn't the main feature of this game. Oh no, it's what happens in the hotel after the match; the TV smashing simulator, the three nuns and a confused blue whale in a bed RPG, that's what makes Champions Of Europe special. No, hang on, let's start that again. The really special feature of Champions Of Europe is that it's tied to the European Cup.

Obviously this gives everything an extra edge, partly 'cos the games have some meaning (ie. you're trying to win your way through to the final not just playing for the sake of it), partly 'cos it'll be much on people's minds this Summer. Unfortunately *Champions Of Europe* slightly misses the boat since, although it has the correct format of the competition, the teams/groups are randomly generated. Half of





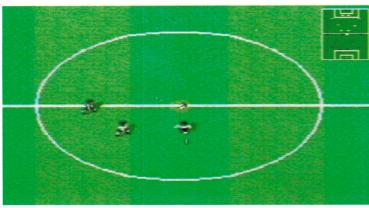

the appeal of a licensed game like this should be to exactly mirror the real event (as Italy 1990 did a couple of years back). Instead this could be any Euro Cup in any year. On the plus side this adds to variety and longevity but even so it's a bit of a let down.

The championship works in one or two player mode. However player one sticks with one team all the way through while player two plays all his opponents, with no special team loyalty. Bit of a raw deal for player two unless he's a true European, recognising no national boundaries and all that sort of malarkey. The weather, wind conditions and referee are also randomly chosen in Championship mode. (Presumably with the assistance of a full council of European Ministers all looking disturbingly like Leon Britten.)

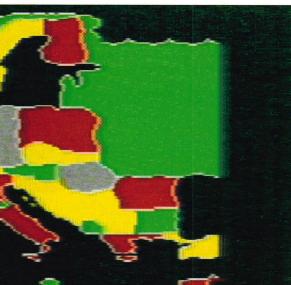
find yourself stringing together the sort of passing moves that Nottingham Forest would be proud of.

Another couple of neat playing touches in Champions Of Europe are the corners and acceleration. For corners you place a target where you want the ball to end up and then rely on skill, wind direction and prayer to do the rest. The acceleration option allows a player to sprint towards the ball – or away from it if you're having one of those days. You can only operate this for a short while and the player is a bit sluggish afterwards. Oh the realism of it all.

Some of the extra touches are a bit more pointless. The speech bubbles with which both players and refs give vent to their feelings are a fun if pointless novelty. One novelty that works less well is on the tactical side. If you're in possession and press both buttons you can alter your formation (4:2:4, 4:3:3 etc). Nice idea, far more realistic than having to wait for half time. Sadly it's a complete beggar to operate. The game moves so fast that while you're hanging about trying to flick through to the right formation you've lost the ball, the initiative and your self esteem.

The other let down is the collision detection which is a bit shakey. It's not a serious problem but the amount of times the keeper makes a save without appearing to move even though the shot was well wide of him is a mite frustrating.

### on the day

All this stuff about options, licences and tournaments is of course only so much window dressing. What really matters is, does it play like a dream or like Graham Taylor's nightmares (the ones where Paul Mariner is still centre forward). The answer is that *Champions Of Europe* is almost Linekeresque in its all round skill factor.

Alright I've avoided saying this for a while now but there's no getting away from the fact that *Champs* looks more than a little like *Kick Off*. However the angle is better, the sprites seem more detailed and perhaps even a tad faster. There's also, of course, a wider range of playing skills and strips on offer. The whole of Europe is your oyster... well 34 countries of it anyway.

Champions Of Europe is slightly easier to play than Kick Off. The ball doesn't have such a tendency to fly off your player's foot. The control/passing system is really neat, allowing you to trap the ball and then deliver fairly precise passes. After a little practice you'll soon

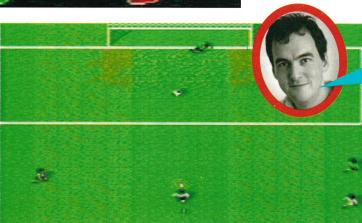

Our bird-like chappie can defend himself by shooting out energy balls. These can be powered up and put in three different



configurations. Wor also has the power to call forth eight different types of magic. (See the Amazing Wor's Magic Show.)

## c'est si bon?

Now we know what Gynoug is all about, let's see whether it's any good. Well it's a sideways scrolling shoot 'em-up with more than the average amount of baddies. There is a mid and end-of-level boss on each level and plenty of minor gruesomes get in your way throughout.

# graphically gory

The graphics are superb and a lot of them are knee-shacklingly horrific and gut-wrenchingly gory... Take the boss on level four for example. He is a de-skinned torso who throws little discs at you (get ready to duck behind your pillow when you actually see him). The main sprite seems minuscule compared to many of the sprites especially the bosses who take up three quarters of the screen. Wor's flying is well animated and looks realistic.

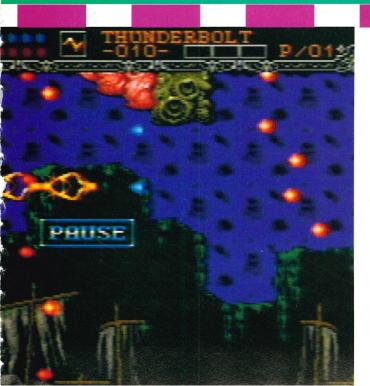

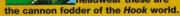

hat is so flippin' fab about being young eh? Who wants spots, school, breaking voices. Mark my words youth, or yooooffff, is pretty bloomin' overrated and that great girl's blouse Peter Pan was a sadly misguided creature.

Not however as sadly misguided as anyone who forked out five or six spondoolicks to see Spielberg's gross, modernised, Americanised and pantomised version of what was a pretty noncey story in the first place.

Not that I've got anything personal against Pan. Oh dear me no. If a bloke called Peter wants to dress up in tunics and tights and fly through windows then fair enough. Some people will









do anything to impress the girls. (Why on occasion I've been known to... but I think we'll save that for another time.) Just as long as they do it in the safety of their own home and keep out of Kensington or my local Ritzy cinema.

So there we are, we've established that Peter Pan is a drippy book and an even drippier movie. Prosecuted, tried and convicted without the need for the jury to leave the room. It's also responsible for the name Wendy which should add a few years to the sentence. So let's approach the game with a really open mind eh? (I bet it's a bit noncey though.)

# what's the aim of the game?

The Lost Boys are no longer lost. They know exactly where they are. Unfortunately where they are is on a pirate ship as unwilling guests of Captain Hook. (Not to be confused with his better educated brother, late Seventies

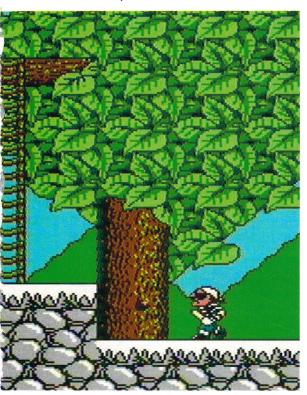
songsters Dr Hook.) As Peter Pan you must rescue your chums from the evil pirate. Fortunately you're not alone Tinker Bell (or Tink as we hip, cool, back-slappin' good time Yanks like to call her) is there with advice and magic dust.

# what's the real aim of the game?

To work your way across a Mario-type island by completing all the levels on it. Although the level can vary from tree hideouts to underwater caverns, the basic aim in each level is the same. Collect a set number of apples, iced buns, pearls or whatever and then leg it to the exit. There are also special objects like magic swords without which you can't get onto later levels.

Bonus points can be picked up by fairly obvious means such as unearthing treasure chests or buried treasure and by some pretty dodgy means too such as playing basketball. (I'm sure J.M. Barrie didn't include that in his book.)

Once you've completed a level you have a choice of two or more to go onto. These are accessed through a compass which guides you round the Never Land. (Shouldn't that be Never Never Land?) If for some reason a level is closed



to you, Tink (can I call you Tink?) will let you know what you're missing, in no uncertain terms. You can really go off Tink in this game.

# how good is it?

The most striking thing about Hook is the colour. Really bright and strong, easily putting most NES games in the shade. The graphics are well drawn, the backgrounds are occasionally a tad obvious but just look at the detail on those leaves. The main sprites are well drawn, well animated and varied. Peter Pan and Tink are a bit on the short and stumpy side but so's Robin Williams.

Hook plays very well too. Peter Pan is easy to control and the collision detection is pretty precise. There's also quite an appealing range of traps and tricks to work through. The problem is that anyone who's played a couple of decent platform games will have seen them all before. Even if you haven't it doesn't take long to suss

the style. The same ideas keep coming round. Add to this a collection of fairly harmless monsters and a lack of frenetic activity and you're left with something switched straight into easy mode.

# how noncey is it?

Pretty noncey. Not only are some of the objects you have to collect a bit embarrassing but combat is virtually non existent. Peter is armed with a sword which is not much bigger than a drawing pin and a lot less use. You can't pin posters up with it for instance. Rather than try to battle it out with the enemy it's much better to simply jump over them, avoid their arrows/spears/bullets and leg it onto the next screen. This is nothing like as difficult as it sounds

It's not that I was expecting Peter Pan to be tooled up with an Uzi sub machine gun and whopping great machette. Obviously the game is trying to catch the magical innocence of the book and film. However since it's borrowed so much from Mario it could have borrowed the old 'jumping on baddies' heads' idea. It's cute, not very violent and a heck of a lot more fun than waving a drawing pin about.

There's no way I'd pan Hook, not even for the sake of a pun that could single handedly win me the Nobel Prize for Literature (with the Peace and Chemistry prizes thrown in for good measure). The graphics and gameplay are both outstanding. Even the sound is pretty nifty, with ghosts that go "Woo woo!" and a hero that goes "Aaaahh" when he cashes in his chips. (Or treads on his drawing pin.) The playing area is pretty substantial too, though individual levels can be a bit short.

Unfortunately it's all a bit slow and all a bit repetitive. Not only is it like lots of other games but it's like a lot of itself. The same ideas and tricks keep cropping up. You can guess where the last piece of fruit will be and the exit will be.

It get's guite a lot harder later on, especially when you're underwater but the action never speeds up enough. It's addictive but never really exciting. Mind you if you're an inexperienced gamester or looking for something for a younger bro or sis's burfday then this is a bloomin impressive introduction to what the NES is capable of. E

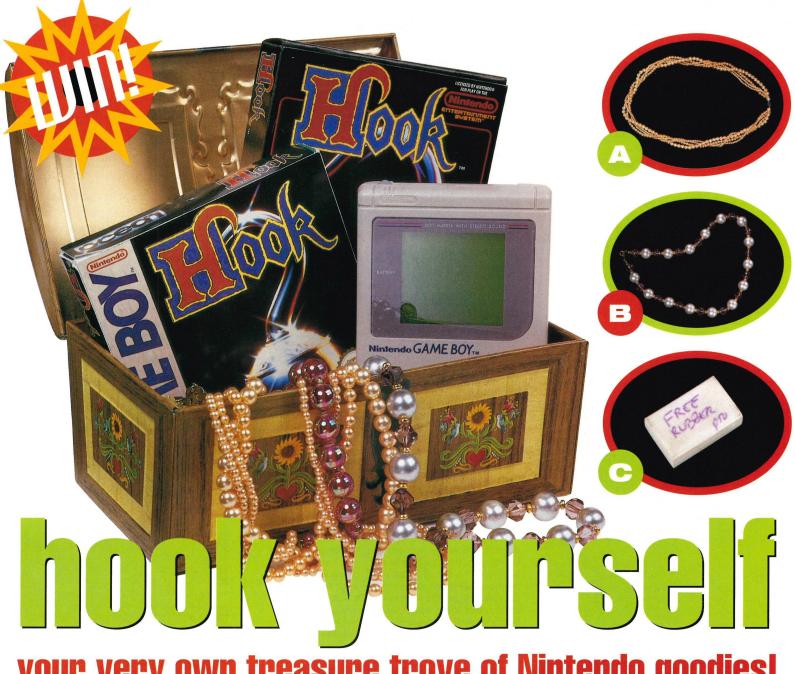

All seems a bit pointless, if only this wasn't such a frustratingly addictive and frankly quite spiffing game (an opinion at last!).

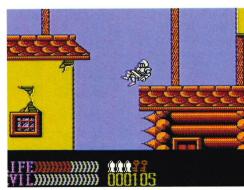

You begin by getting ol' Higgins to explore each one of the eight islands in turn – that's Fern, Lake, Desert, Ice, Cave, Cloud, Volcano and Dinosaur Island. Each island takes its name from the dominant local flora and fauna to be found on it, which means that Ice Island is a bit nippy and penguin filled, Lake Island a bit wet and aquatic creature filled, Cloud Isla... (Yes, yes, yes, I think we get your drift! Ed.)

Mind you, while it's true that in some ways each island is different in environment from the others, in other ways they are also very similar. Every island is sub-divided into between nine and 14 different areas, each of which must be explored before you can get off the island and each area is made up of a series of either horizontally or vertically scrolling sections which take you across, up, down and around all kinds of obstacles. There are huge boulders and gaping chasms to be leapt, spiders, pigs and penguins which prove fatal to the touch, and even underwater areas to swim. And at the end of each island of course, there's a big bad boss character to finish off before you can move onto



At dusk on Fern Island, the sun dipped beneath the horizon, and the sky turned a lovely shade of pink. A real island paradise. But paradise is not without pitfalls and Higgins knew that if he tried to crack open this, the first of the eggs in the area, he'd find all his energy drained in a picosecond. Oh dear!



# verdict

The kind of classic arcade adventure that our lovable grey box does so well.

Higgins' disarming smile is his only weapon as he begins the game, which obviously is not of much use against a rather peeved pig. But if he cracks open a few of the eggs to be found littering each area, he can pick up some useful extra weapons and allies. These range from stone axes and skateboards to captosaurii and flying pteranodons.

If Higgins can hang onto his weaponry and allies until the end of each area, he can stash them in a store until he needs to use them again. Smart for two reasons: a) the store can hold as much weaponry as Higgins likes, and b) obviously the more eggy contents he collects, the more ammunition he has available for

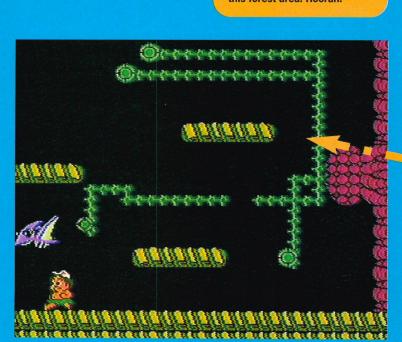

Any time you spend not avoiding aliens and missiles, you spend avoiding more aliens and missiles. The R-Type genre really doesn't need much more explaining than that does it? So you'll no doubt be wondering...

# what's it like?

Well, graphicswise, you can't really fault it. It looks and plays identically to the arcade (that's £150 worth of Super NES hardware for you). The graphics are so colourful, they'll give you a headache if you look at them too long. They move so fast and smoothly you'll squint if you try to follow them. Some are so big you'll get bugeyes trying to get them in your field of vision.

It's got it all – huge 'spacey' backdrops, big disgusting nasties, mechanical and biological scenery. The lot. You even get stereo, space tunes to add rhythm to your battles. Add clever parallax bits, ultra-smooth scrolling and pretty satisfying 'grungy' explosions, blend for three minutes and you've got a really watchable game.

The playability however, can be a bit slack. Too difficult too early. Most games'd give you a chance to get off the first level. Thousands of tricky waves of alien don't really give the novice a chance. This and the boring 'Go Back To The Start When Dead' syndrome and my particular fave, 'Lose All Your Power-ups When Dead' disease really gets on your nerves after a while. But there is a little tactic-ette you can learn for each wave of aliens. If mastered this lets you through without too much hassle next time.

# **Verdict**

If you've got *R-Type I*or *II* don't bother with this unless
you're a glutton for punishment.
Otherwise an excellent buy for
hours of sweating, groaning
and swearing.

Technically things can get a bit 'dodgy'. Famicom or no Famicom, action slows down to a snail's pace when the screen gets clogged with sprites (ie. very often). It's annoying but not too bad because it increases your survival chances. There's nary a flicker or glitch, so we'll forgive them for that.

If you're sore for a shoot 'em-up to test your powers on and you like to try where others have failed, then *Super R-Type* is a must. Otherwise, you shandy nonce, buy some schalppy cutsie bounce 'em-up like *Mario* and stop wasting real gamesplayers' time. Go on! Get outta my sight.

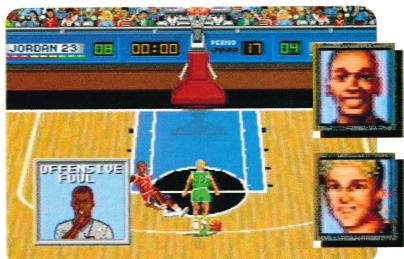

These apples have to be dropped to the ground to complete a level. They can also be dropped onto the various baddies which is smart. If your timing's a bit out, then they're more than likely to drop on you which is painful.

but it didn't light my As well as cunningly dropping candle. large Coxes Orange Pippins on your foes' foreheads you're also tooled up with... a bouncy ball. Okay so it's not as much use as an Uzi sub-machine gun but it's no slouch at bouncing baddies out of action. Unfortunately it is a bit of a slouch at coming back to you. More of a crap boomerang than a bouncey ball to be honest. You fire it off, kill something then stand about looking embarrassed and embarrassingly unarmed until it bounces back to you. This is

no way to fight a war.

And that, my friends, is just about that. And that's not enough. Not for me anyway. The collision detection is wobbly, at times irritatingly so and the control system is not all that it might be. 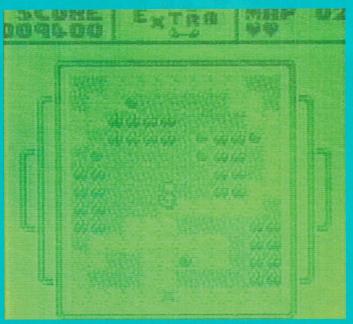

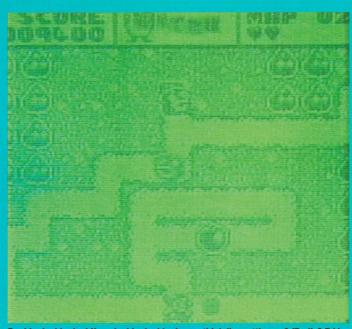
A well balanced mix of strategy and action, I should say, but it leaves me as cold as yesterday's rice pudding. This is all very

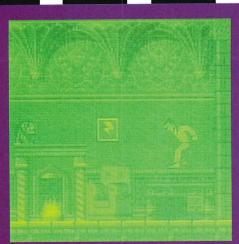




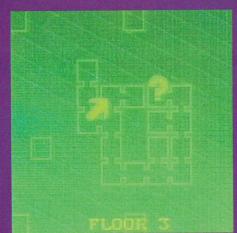

o you like 'Wandering Around, Picking Up Things And Avoiding The Nasties'-type games? Yep, me too. Give me a few things to pick up, loads of nasties to avoid and, say, 230 screens to wander around, and I'm a pig in clover. And indeed, after an hour or two frootling around with Dr Franken, I find myself oinking with such unabashed porky pleasure that a small curly tail can now be sighted emerging from the back of my capacious casual strides.

But enough of trousers, as this latest Elite product is, as far as Game Boy fans should be concerned, the veritable business. 'Downright corky' only hints at its wondrousness.

'Terminally tophole' might be nearer the mark. Not since, aw, last month (when I was similarly taken with Solomon's Club) have I been so swiftly and terminally hooked by a Game Boy product.

So what's the gen? You, it pushes the Game Boy seems, are the final creation of Dr von Frankenbone - a masterpiece of spare-part surgery, according to some reliable sources, and a total dork made out of kitchen utensils and old potato peelings, according to the mirror.

For years, you and your girlfriend Bitsy have lived happily in the Doctor's old castle, but the other fiends, monsters and ghoulies created by the deceased mastermind have become jealous of your simple pleasures, and dismantled your girlfriend. Chunks of her can be found in every corner of the old castle (yeugh!) as can nasties who are determined to get in your way.

What this all means, of course, is a ripsnorting arcade adventure which owes much to Mikro-Gen's old Wally games, although at least here you can actually dispose of nasties by firing at them. With eminently smooth scrolling, and some lusciously drawn backgrounds, the castle's atmosphere is perfectly evoked. Where do you start? Fortunately, the map screen not only shows you where you are, but where you should be going: to get off level three (for that's where you start) you need to collect something and take it somewhere else, and a floating question mark gives you clues to both. After that, you're on your own kiddo...

What makes this a little easier on the brain than many such puzzle/exploration games, fortunately, is that any objects that need to be collected float conveniently about like the question mark on the map screen, which means you don't waste time trying to pick things up that can't be picked up.

Nor should you waste time not killing things, because removing those meanies that can be killed generally gives you a little breathing space

for other matters. Like how are you going to get that key floating up there?

More often than not, the various objects in the background act as platforms, enabling you to jump from one to another Sometimes it's obvious how to do it, sometimes it's not.

Sometimes it's easy, sometimes it's £\*@%ing difficult...

I won't give too much away, as this is the sort of game that you'll want to get into yourself, without any help from me (it's not too hard to start, and the learning curve has been finely judged). All I'll say is look out for the Master Bedroom on level four, which is the only room in which you can fully regenerate your energy when you're getting low. So far I've found two bits of Bitsy (I'm too much of a gentleman to say which bits, naturally) and amassed a mere 14 percent, but I'm working on it. Dedicated arcade adventurers should have weeks of fun here.

here can be something terribly worrying about sequels like Metroid II, especially if, like me, you've played Metroid I and you can't remember anything about it. In fact, I saw it on the NES yonks ago, looked at it briefly and came to the swift but probably erroneous decision that it wasn't the game for me. Probably erroneous, because Metroid II is a cracker. It's one of those odd little games that doesn't look an awful lot - but then you play it, and play it, and just keep on playing...

The main thing here is that you're a big girl. That's you, that is. And your mum. (Get on with it. Ed.) No, seriously. You are Samus Aran, greatest of all the Space Hunters, and conqueror of the pirates from the planet Zebes.

Quite where metroids fit in is anyone's guess, but what this all boils down to is that you're alone on the planet SR388 wandering around a series of underground caverns, which just happen to be swarming with the aforementioned metroids.

So you wander, and you wander, and nothing much seems to be happening. The graphics here are anything but impressive and the few nasties you run into are easily picked off. So what's the fuss? Suddenly, you see the first of 39 metroids. It's not easy to kill (your beam's useless, so you'll have to use some of your missiles). Then the cavern shakes. There's been an earthquake. What does this mean? And why can't you get those two useful-looking icons apparently stuck in the middle of the rock?

At this stage you refer, rather desperately, to the instructions, only to find that, as usual, the instructions have been translated into English by someone whose only languages are Portuguese and Serbo-Croat. Could this mean that that pool of impassable liquid on the other side of the start point has receded? Will you now be able to get through over there?

The upshot of it all is that you never know quite what is going on, other than the fact that you want to find out. Every so often you come up against an obstacle, and it's up to you to work out how you're going to get past it. The answer may be somewhere else in the maze - or it may just need a little bit of lateral thinking.

What makes it all worthwhile is that every so often you can save the game, and as the cartridge has battery back-up, you can start next time where you left off this time, or at least somewhere fairly nearby. Is that seriously

spanky, or what?

And it is, I suspect, an absolutely vast game. I've been playing for hours and hours and I have so far disposed of precisely one metroid. And that's not because I'm crap - it's

because I've only come across one metroid to dispose of. Where are they hiding?

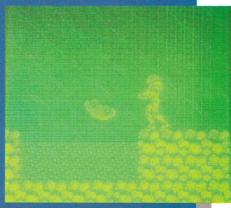
Faults? Well, as I've already said, the graphics aren't the most staggering thing you've seen, but once again the Game Boy proves that you don't need fab graphics for a fab game. (Sometimes I wonder whether fab graphics actually get in the way of a fab game, but that's another issue.)

The sound, by contrast, is excellent, with some great whooshy swooshy sounds if you plug in your headphones. What counts is that this is one of the best judged blends of fast-paced action and brain-blending puzzles I've yet seen - clever, challenging and fiendishly addictive. I wonder if Metroid I's as good...

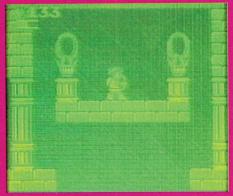

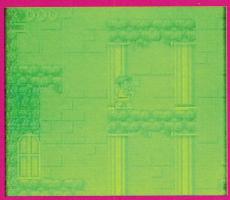

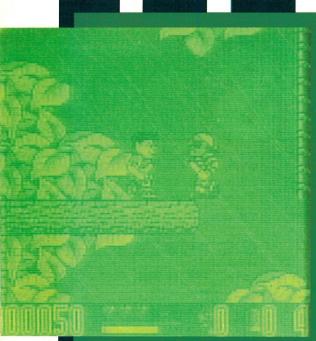

Although actually you're more of an old wrinkly than a 'yoof' in this game, as when you first get to meet yourself, not only have you got a house, a dog and a car, but also your own set of 2.2 kids to boot. Er, and there lies the problem actually. That old rogue Captain Hook has kidnapped your sprogs so you as Pan must don poncey pixie garb, grab yourself a short sword and set out across Never Never Land in search, not only of Hook, but your lost nippers too.

You begin your quest by peering at a vast, scrolling map of Never Never Land. You can use your trusty compass to help you plot a course to each of the levels, (there are 27) and you'll need to battle through them all if you want to see your kids again.

As well as providing a route to Hook, each of the levels also provides a

veritable Wish You Were Here tour of Never Never Land. You'll find yourself in various classic platform environments set either overground in forests, underground in mines, underwater through lakes, over water on pirate ships and even airbound.

But as you make your way through each level, it'll not simply be a matter of seeing off Hook's pirate cronies, who are out to make you use up all of your three lives and three continues before you even get to reach Hook. Indeedy no, 'cos you also need to search each level for a required number of thimbles and marbles, apples and cherries, coins and other goodies. As only after you've collected these will the level exits open up and let you travel onto the next area. And as each level is a pretty huge, free scrolling environment in itself, finding (and remembering) where the level exits are will take some doing

All in all then, there's plenty of challenge here, plus some great music and neat graphics to smarten up the appeal of the whole package. If you like classic platformy arcade style adventures, with a bit of a mappy and puzzley appeal, as well as a variety of gameplay, then you'll love Hook. 巨

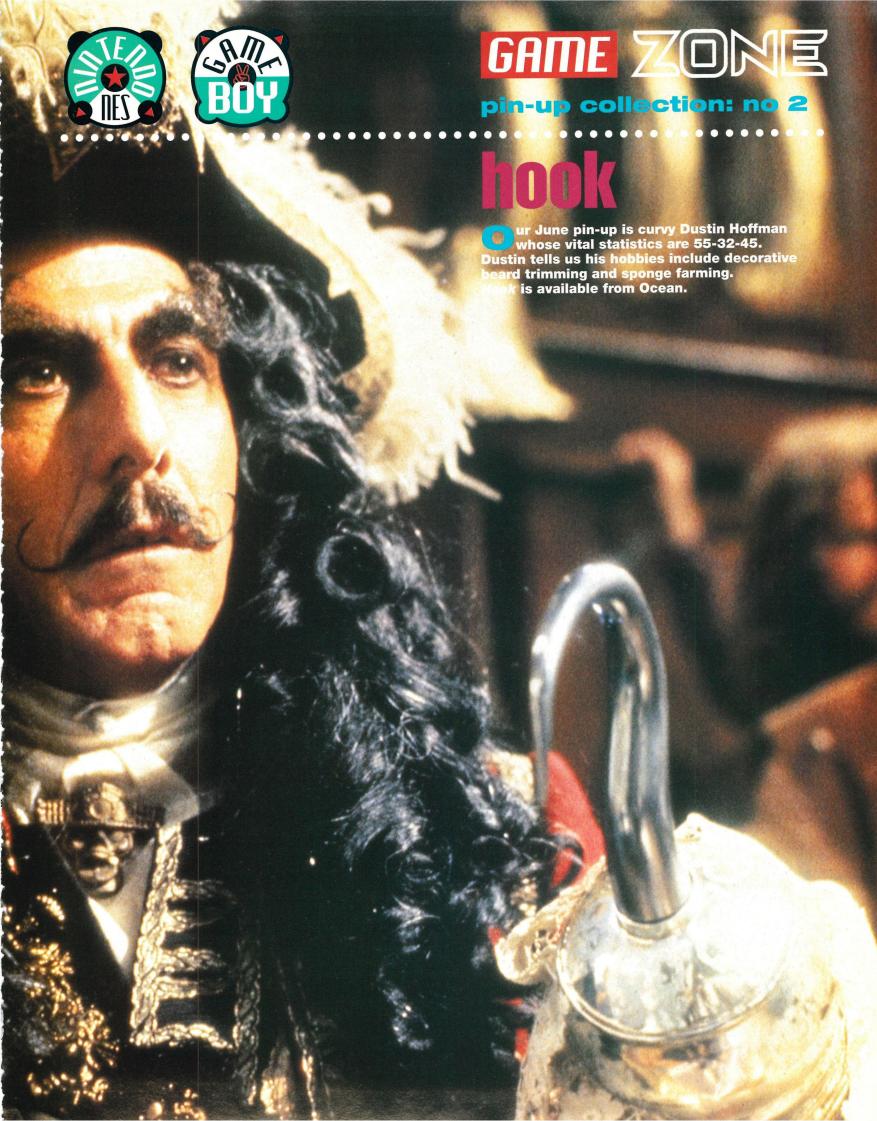




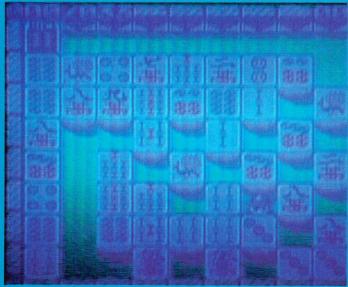

The long introduction is accompanied by music of impending doom and several digitised voices. In fact the whole thing is so much like a Japanese TV cartoon that you're just getting ready to put your feet up with a cuppa when you're thrust into a world where quick reflexes are imperative. Oh dear.

Wearing my wonderful swishy cape I went into action attacking the enemy with my fab rapier. I was assaulted on all sides, evil knights, resurrected people attacking with outstretched arms, skeletons, huge fiery orange lizards and perilous end-of-level mutha dragons. There was so much going on that it was quite tricky to switch spells (using the spellbook in the left hand corner) and fight simultaneously. These spells are brill - lightening, fireballs, cyclones and so are the bonuses you can collect once you've duffed a few people up. #### No. 6: A cardboard model of Sonic The Hedgehog





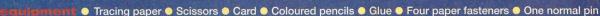








- 1) Trace over all the shapes I've given you, using the tracing paper and one of the coloured pencils.

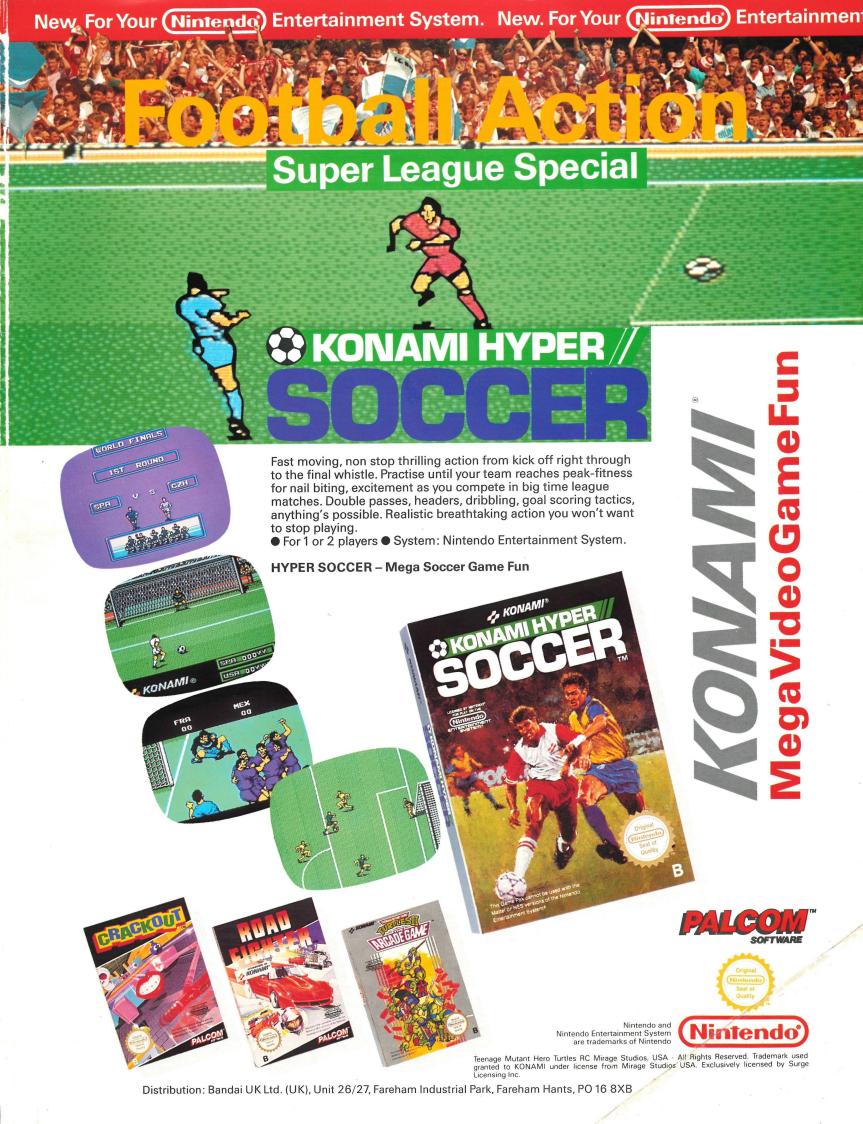

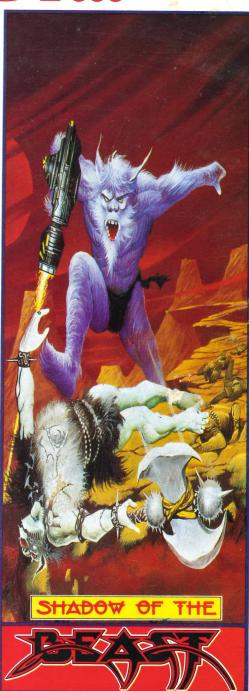

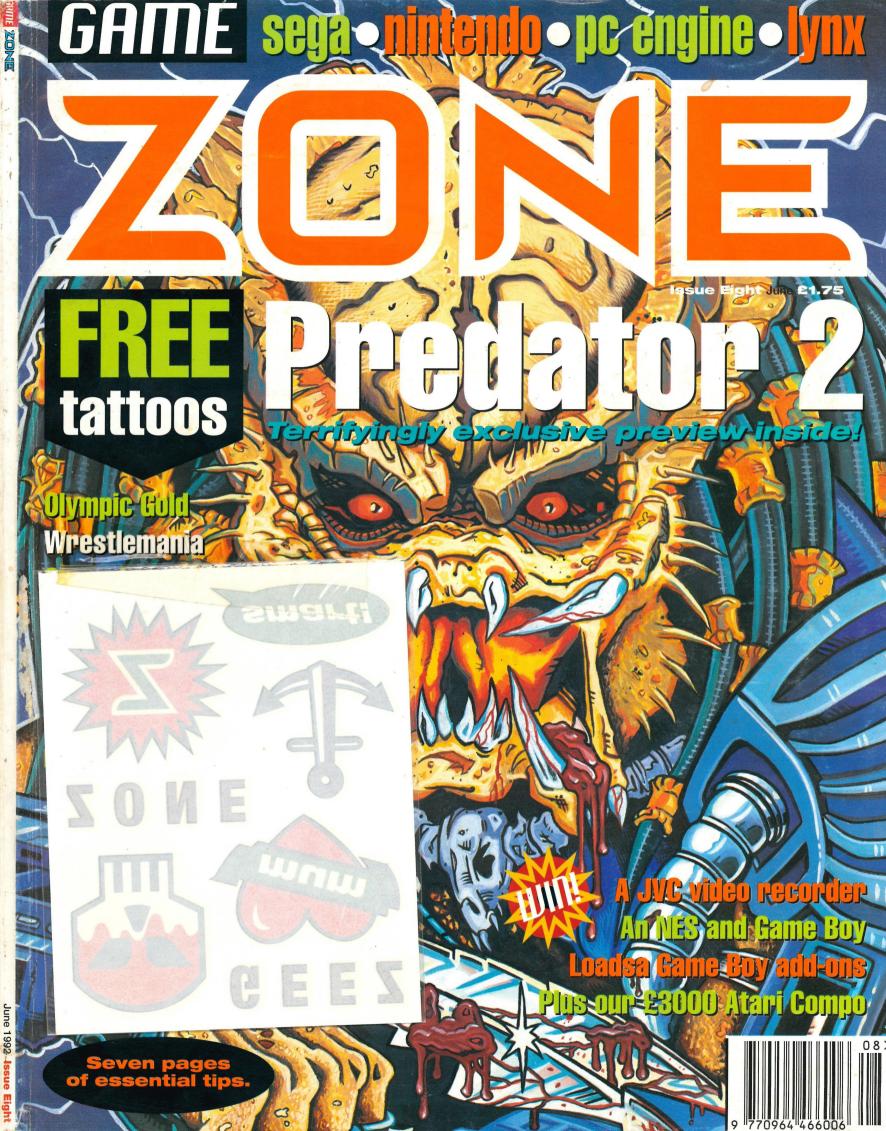
