
Philips has launched a new version of its extremely popular CM8833 colour monitor. The original is claimed to be Britain's (and the world's) best selling monitor with sales of 200,000 here and 2 million in total

It's especially popular with ST and Amiga owners – Atari and Commodore have bought thousands from Philips in the past and badged them with their own logos, as have a whole host of IBM compatibles manufacturers.

Curiously, the CM8833 Mark II will be much the same as the four-year-old original, with changes restricted to aesthetics. It's still a 14-inch colour CGA but the new model looks better and conforms to all manner of European safety standards.

It still costs a reasonable £269.99 with a TV tuner optional at £64.99. It has a TTL digital and RGB analog signals, CVBS input for video signals, stereo sound, a screen resolution of 600 x 285 and line frequency of 15.6 KHz.

A spokesman for Philips said: "We just didn't think there was much point in making too many changes. But we felt it important to get in line with the new European safety standards."



BARK TO THE FUTURE

The European Parliament last week laid down a proposal to register every dog in Europe on computer. If the registration plan passes into law then 36 million dogs could be carrying ID in the form of a tiny microchip inserted in the scruff of the neck. The info will be held on central computers in Strasbourg.

It is hoped that this will help combat the continuing spread of rabies and the difficult problem of strays.

Justice in the courts

Computers have been enlisted by Wimbledon's All England Tennis Club to ensure everyone has a chance to see the world's greatest players perform in the game's most prestigous tournament.

In the past, buyers of Wimbledon tickets have had to simply fill in an application form and enter a draw. The trouble with this very fair system is that many lucky winners can't resist selling their tickets to the wealthy for a lucrative profit. This makes a seemingly democratic system

highly plutocratic.

Now the club has decided to log all the names of ticket holders onto a computer database. A series of spot checks at tournament time will make sure the original ticket buyers haven't been replaced by different people. Anyone attempting to break the rules will be asked to leave, which will be just a tad inconvenient for those people who can afford to spend hundreds of pounds on one illegitimate ticket. What a shame...

hristmas is coming, and this is the one time of year when you guarantee that computers will be bought in vast numbers by people who know very little about them. Express hit the streets to find separate the good from the

Shops will be piled high with all manner of computers, handhelds and consoles this Christmas. On the one hand this is good news for you the buyer. On the other it can mean that the shop assistants will have had so much hardware chucked their way that they will hardly know their GX4000s from their Amiga 500s.

However, there is one thing of which you can be reasonably certain, the hardware with the best mark-ups will be pushed most firmly at you. So, whether you are buying for yourself, your little sister or your Granny you should read the following guide.

Are the High Street Stores better? or worse than the independents? Does quantity negate quality or are the big chains finally getting their acts together. Do these people know what they're talking about? And how should you deal with them? All these questions are addressed.

Don't believe the hype

The High Street stores, those big names we all know so well, have only relatively recently moved into selling computer hardware. This fact should be borne in mind when opening the glass doors with your cheque book or credit card in hand. To a great number of shop assistants (and managers for that matter) a computer is something to sell in the same way as a dishwasher or a toaster.

All of these products have been sold to the store by reps and various deals have been struck between the two. This is why, for example, Rumbelows will sell you an ST at £299 and an Amiga at £399 while Comet will sell them both for £399. Different chains will have received different deals on these packs. So, the truism 'shop around' holds more than true.

Question one for you to ask is "What exactly am I getting?". If this befuddles the assistant, simply ask him or her to get hold of the details which will have come with the machine. If that is not available then it's time to leave the shop; the mere suggestion of this is normally enough to get some action.

Question two is simple enough as well "Can I see it in action?". Whether the shop is busy or not,

don't be afraid to ask this one. Shop assistants are normally difficult enough to track down, so once you've trapped one, he or she is yours.

This Christmas look out for the following line "This one's called Shadow of the Beast II" it's great, 'just look at the graphics." The Beast you will see running on shop Amigas is a demo. Get them to run some other games, maybe even a word processor if you have the time.

Question three only comes into play when you've decided on the machine you want to buy and they have brought it up from the warehouse all boxed and sucking the money from your pocket. The question is "Can I see this one working as well?" This is normally a show stopper, but it is important that you ask it. The machine which has been up and running in the store is not the same as the one you are going to get out of the box. If your chosen machine doesn't work exactly, get them to bring you another one and then try that.

Question four comes into play before you part with money. It is "Does the shop offer a guarantee as well as the manufacturer?" Get the guarantee signed in the shop. The machine will have been out of the box so this shouldn't be difficult. If it is, then don't buy.

Credit where credit's due

All of the big chain stores offer credit. This is how they make their money. There are several questions to be asked here.

Question 1:Is there a penalty clause relating to early repayment. Some credit policies want you to take the full period to repay your purchase. The reason for this is that every month you're repaying makes the store more interest. If there is such a clause then move on.

Question 2: Is there an insurance clause? This is a matter of choice and it normally costs a few pounds on the top. What it means is that if you are made redundant or fall ill your payments are covered. Queston 3: What is the APR% (Annual Percentage Rate)? This is the amount which will be added to your repayment. Check this even if there are signs in the shop screaming "0% Interest".


Question 4: When was the last time the APR changed? If it came down recently you're in luck. If it hasn't changed in the last five months, find out why because interest rates have.

A final tip is to check the rates before buying and then compare them to the credit card companies.

RUMBELOWS



Keen on the Commodore at Rumbelows

The service in Rumbelows was more prompt and even friendly. We were immediately lead to the Amiga and it transpired that the assistant owned one. After five minutes raving about it we moved onto the ST. Two second later we were back on the Amiga because, "The ST's got a bad sound chip."

The patter relating to the Screen Gems pack (although this name was never mentioned) was clean, with a mistake when it came to Workbench "very useful is Workbench... er, for graphics"

We asked why there was £100 difference between the ST and the Amiga. We were told "It's a better machine." Very subjective indeed, especially because we had been told nothing about the ST.

We asked about getting parts for the machines "Commodore parts are very easy to get hold of." He could not be budged on any other machine.

Consoles were swept aside [the Mega Drive was definitely called the '16-Bit'] with the same distain as anything else un-Amiga. So, with the feeling that the salesman had been on a commission from Commodore we moved onto the next shop. rmed with hidden tape recorder and camera we visited three stores local to us. The aim here was to discover what level of service and technical knowledge you could expect when shopping around.

Happily this did not prove as disheartening exercise as last year's which gave the immortal quote about the C64 from Laskys "Yes there's loads [of software] for it - and then you can run Vic 20 games on it too - you can use any Commodore games as long as they're lower than 64." It appears that this year the big chains have started to employ people who have a rough grasp of the subject.

DIXONS

After spending five minutes waiting to be served, a managerial sort wandered over.

We asked about the Amstrad console. We were told "It's only been out a few weeks, it's brand new. But the best bet is the Nintendo to be honest with you. It's got the Turtle game which is all the rage and it has the widest range of available software... Of these sort of things, the Nintendo is the most popular by a very long chalk" Not at all true as Sega and Atari would most certainly agree.

We asked where Nintendo came from. We were told "I don't know, I think they're probably made in Japan, but they are an American company." Wrong, and bodes ill for product knowledge

We asked about the difference between cartridges and disks. We were told "... cheaper than disk", while this true in some cases, it is far from so as a generality.

We asked what the difference was between a console and an Amiga " These [consoles] are 80 quid, the Amiga's £400" That wasn't exactly what was meant and the price tags on the hardware had

already answered the question. Still it showed where the thrust of the sale lay.

We asked the difference between the ST and the Amiga. We were told "You'll find it easier to get software for that one [the Amiga] and the graphics are certainly better" Totally wrong on the first count. Dubious in the extreme on the second.

With that we left the shop.

COMET

We visited two Comet stores; one was housed in Bristol's massive Debenham's, the other was a dedicated shop in Bath. Neither were encouraging. The actual displays were poor, verging on the abysmal. In the Bath shop, the hardware on show was tucked away in a corner and comprised a tired looking Spectrum +2, a moribund looking +3, an Amiga 500, a Sega Master system, and a C64. The Debenhams office had the same plus a Mega Drive (called a 16-Bit). Attracting the attention of assistants in both stores entailed walking over to some more expensive gear such as a washing machine and then leading them back.

The opening line in both places was a simple "I am looking to buy a computer for my brother." The Debenhams response was a tired run around of the C64 and the Sega Master System.

We asked about memory. After an impressive sounding start, the assistant started to waffle "With the Commodore you get 64k of memory. A 'k' is eight bytes, a byte, er..." Generally, and even if it wasn't service with a smile, we were lead around the small range of available hardware in some detail.

The Bath branch was a different story and serves to illustrate the fact that while chain stores rave about training, countrywide shop similarity and homogenity overall, it's just not true. Every store is different.

The service was distinctly surly, verging on the "What are you doing here at all?" Product knowledge was poor. Take these examples:

Of the Spectrum we were told "You won't get as many games as the rest of them." Games for the Speccie are more widely available than posters of Gazza.

How many colours do you get on screen with the

Spec "It depends." When again prompted the assistant looked dolefully at the monitor, a TV, and obviously did not have the slightest idea.

We asked for a demonstration, the disk was missing, or it had been wiped, he wasn't sure. When we tried to extricate information relating to other machines this happened:

The Sega Master system "It's a console"

So what's a console? "That [the master system]

Will the +3 last "Well they bring it out every Christmas." Lack of product knowledge to say the least.

The Amiga "It's more expensive, but has more bits"

So, what's a bit? "Er...."

The ST "It's roughly the same as that [the Amiga]"

So, with the idea that we had been served by a person with more of an interest in NICAM stereo than computers, we left.

It is a sad fact that the small, independent computer shops suffer at this time of year. Price is a premium and the chains can afford to undercut the indies.

Don't let this put you off, however. There are two hard and fast facts in computing life: firstly, crashes always occur before you back-up, secondly, independent dealers give the best advice.

The same rules apply when shopping in either – ask exactly what you're getting. Get a demonstration of the machine you are going to take home. Check on guarantees.

Shopper show twice a year

Even before this year's December Computer Shopper Show has opened its doors, plans are already afoot for not one, but two Shopper events next year.

Organiser Blenheim Database Exhibitions has announced a Spring Shopper Show in addition to the annual pre-Christmas event, once again sponsored by Computer Shopper magazine.

Blenheim says that the spring show has come about because of the huge success of the December event. It claims that this December's show is almost sold out already.

According to Michael Meakin, head of Blenheim, the spring show "will complete our plan to provide the trade and end-users with large spending events at the two most important times of the year for product launches".

Meanwhile, this December's event will be supporting a fundraising appeal by the Starlight Foundation, the excellent charity set up by one time *Dynasty* actress Emma Samms which grants the wishes of chronically and terminally ill children.

Cyber conference

The second European Cyberspace Congress will take place in Amsterdam from March 10 to 12 next year, it was announced last week.

The conference will centre on the technical aspects of emerging virtual realities as well as focusing on the possibilities of art, philosopy and science in cyberspace.

Organiser Sala Communications says the attendance fee will be set at a relatively cheap £150, although the conference will be limited to 250 attendees.



Test drive a PC



• 3D Benchmark: A colourful way to test your system.

If you want to MOT your PC compatible or road test a system before deciding whether to buy it, then 3D Benchmark, a new utility in the public domain could be just what you need.

The program, produced by New Dimension International, measures the speed of PC compatible VGA systems by timing one cycle of a continuous three dimensional demonstration, then calculating the average number of screen updates a system has achieved in one second. The result is expressed in frames per second (fps).

Among systems already tested, the Apricot Qi900 performed very well at 15.6fps whilst results at the lower end of the scale hovered around the 1.5-3fps mark.

Dimension hopes the program will establish a reference point for comparing systems and is actively encouraging free duplication and distribution.

The graphics have been created using the Superscape 'Alternative Reality' system, and are the same as in games like Castle Master.

Psion knocks pounds off laptops



• MC squared: new changes for Psion line-up

Psion was busy last week announcing comprehensive changes for its line-up of 'Mobile' computers.

Prices have been slashed across the range with the entry level MC200 down £50 to £495. The British company sees this as an important break through claiming that the machine is "the ultimate personal computer at an affordable price".

The MC400 is down from £845 to £695 with the top of the range PC compatible MC600 slashed by £200 to £1.295.

The range of Mobiles were launched in September 1989 to a favourable reception, but they have failed to spark the same enthusiasm as the handheld Psion Organisers which launched the company into the limelight during the late 1980s.

On the price cuts chairman David Potter enthused: "For the first time the man in the street can have a full function portable computer for less than £500."

Psion has further developed Version 2 of the system software for the range. All built in applications have been enhanced and extra help functions included. A graphic spreadsheet is now available for the 200 and 400 which allows Lotus 1-2-3 files to be imported.

Tandy talking

Available now from Tandy is a desktop PC bound to appeal to users fed up changing disks all day long, and it talks to you as well.

The company claims the 1000SL/2 is the first PC to offer MS-DOS and Deskmate as integrated software, in ROM.

This means the user will not have to keep on inserting disks as software for letters, storage and retrieval of records, mathematics and seven other functions are all stored on hard disk.

The other unusual feature of the 1000SL/2 is that it can talk. The built-in three voice sound circuitry featuring DAC (Digital to Analogue Converter) allows for the recording, storing and playing back of sophisticated speech, music and sound.

The1000 SL/2 costs £699.

Media scare unfounded:security systems are 'far too complex'

BANKS SCORN HACKING CLAIMS

The Chartered Institute of Bankers (CIB), which represents Britain's high street clearing house fraternity, last week poured scorn on claims that hackers are wreaking havoc on sensitive financial computer networks.

And two of Britain's top hacking experts, Steve Gold and Hugo Cornwall, agree, insisting that banking security systems are far too complex for even the best hackers.

The Independent on Sunday reported on 14 October that the computer systems of four high street banks and one leading merchant bank in the City had been penetrated by a team of hackers intent on blackmail. Subsequently, Independent Television News and a number of quality daily newspapers picked up on the story.

But the CIB says that it is "extremely unlikely" that any hacker had broken into any one of the hundreds of networks used for financial transactions. Spokesman Alexander Moffatt told Express: "We spend more money on Information Technology and its security than any other business in the country. The electronic transfer of funds is as secure as it can be."

He said the banks do not fear the threat of hackers, but are spending millions of pounds combating internal fraud linked to computers.

The computer systems of high street banks and City financial institutions are a formidable barrier to even the most tenacious computer criminal. Not one bank has suffered at the hands of an external break-in of a computer system.

However, The Independent story claimed that a number of hackers had left messages inside computer networks, and had demanded "substantial sums of money" in return for their expertise and details of how they penetrated the computer systems. It is not known if the hackers are a gang, or if they are working independently.

The banks have not contacted the police, but are believed to have initiated low level investigations by freelance security firms

So why are the banks claiming to be secure from invasions of their computer systems?

 Despite the public perception of a completely interlinked computer system, the electronic financial clearing systems are, in reality, a patchwork of computer programs which can perform only one function each, and are not connected to

any other part of the network.

Unlike the computer networks of, say, university systems, banking systems are not designed to be informative or accessible. All you can do is access one part of the system, leave your message, and log off. There are no doors or windows to pass through.

• If you were to try your hand at illegally moving funds from one account to another you would probably start off with the Bankers Automated Clearing Service (BACS). It works in much the same way as a cashpoint machine. You dial up a readily available number, and are then invited to enter a four digit code number, followed by your account number, then you key in the transaction.

If you get the number wrong the system shuts off and the bank is alerted. The only way to defraud this is to steal someone's number and details, which can hardly be construed as hacking.

Even then, each account has its own limit and the bank's security system carefully monitors all transactions. Let's say you attempt to move £10,000 from Company A into an account in Europe. If Company A rarely deals with Europe, or if it never deals in figures exceeding £5,000 the bank will be alerted. You would need detailed inside information.

The same system works with cashpoint cards. If someone steals your card, secures your PIN number, and then starts drawing large sums from different parts of the country, the bank's comput-

ers will alert a human operator.

• A hacker in the know would have to attempt a break in of the more heavy duty systems. The Clearing House Automated Payments System (CHAPS) is set up to provide inter-bank transfers. And the Society for World Wide Inter-bank Financial Transactions (SWIFT) is its international version. Millions of dollars have passed through these systems every day since they were installed six years ago. There is not one documented case of them being defrauded by a hacker.

Both rely on the state-of-the-art in American encryption techniques. One false move will trigger off an auto-destruct program. Remember that hackers rely on trial and error to break through systems.

Internal fraud

The banking community firmly believes its computer security is only threatened by insiders who have all the relevant data and could transfer enormous funds from one account to another, before leaving the country. CIB spokesman, Alexander Moffatt, commented: "The electronic transfer of funds makes internal fraud easier than in days gone by." He said that the CIB, which also acts as an education and examination board for its members, had seen a sharp increase in the number of bank managers taking Information Technology courses in order to fully understand their computer systems. The

CIB was formed in 1879 and boasts 136,000 members.

Former hacker Steve Gold, who was arrested in 1985 for breaking into Prince Philips' Prestel mailbox, told Express: "Given the level of secuity in the British banking system I would be very surprised if anyone had managed to get in. I'm also surprised with the blackmail story. If anyone was clever enough to get in there, the smart thing to do would be get hold of £10 million and get out.

"There are some good hackers around, but I don't think any of them are that good." He said that any security breaches will have been either inside jobs or at an absurdly low level. "I think this whole thing is a storm in a teacup. But given the media interest I wouldn't like to be in the shoes of anyone who had broken in. The banks are very formidable. Now itll be a case of no holds barred."

Prohibitive nature

One London based security consultant, who preferred to remain anonymous, said that many people in the hacking community liked to pretend they had broken into systems which they had not. Indeed, one "hacker" called us the day after The Sunday Independent article appeared claiming that he had broken into a bank's system. We asked him to provide technical facts, but he could not.

Hugo Cornwall, author of top selling guide The Hackers Handbook commented: "The prohibitive nature of the banking computer networks make it very unlikely that anyone has actually got in there." In his book, published before the Computer Misuse Act came into force, he advised hackers not to attempt breaking into the banking system, mainly because it is almost impossible to crack.

It is understood that the media was alerted following a banking and security conference held in London last month. An off-the-record meeting took place there, where the story of the five hackers was brought up. Details of that meeting were inevitably leaked.

As with most hacker scare stories precise details are desperately thin on the ground, and given the tremendous obstacles facing a would-be hacker it would appear that any attempted fraud would have to be an inside job.

However, Express regularly receives anonymous phone calls from individuals claiming to have either hacked a bank, or to have knowledge of bank hacks. Regrettably, we have yet to receive sufficient information on any case to warrant a deeper investigation.

Serious labels

Gallic software company Loriciel is to launch an upmarket label for its more "serious" products.


The new label, Futura, will publish what the Loriciel terms as its "quality product", such as the recent simulation-style games Sherman M4 and Tennis Cup.

The Paris based company feels that such games deserve to be marketed separately from the arcade/action-style games since "They are very different genres".

Meanwhile, the good old shoot-em-ups and action games will continue to be published on the Loriciel label.

The first titles due to appear on Futura are DISK next month and Advanced Destroyer Simulator and Panza Kick Boxing in January. All will be published in the UK via US Gold.

A dyslexic 14-year-old boy who could hardly write two years ago has managed to publish a book of short stories, thanks to the word processor.

Compiled originally as a Christmas present for family and friends Defeating Dyslexia: A Boy's Own Story is a testament to the progress Paris Innes has achieved using his Amstrad PCW and a Smith Corona PWP 7000 portable.

The London lad was diagnosed as dyslexic at the age of nine, and by the time he was 12 he was having real difficulty writing. But when his parents bought him a second-hand Amstrad for Christmas two years ago, the transformation was immediate.

"In six weeks the word processor made more difference to Paris' progress than two years of special lessons," says his father Trevor.


Bouncing ball game bounces back!

We've heard a lot about grand new technologies currently under development, but it is pretty hard to appreciate the likes of CD-I or DVI if you're stuck at home with the trusty old 8-bit.

Nevertheless, even the most hardened futurenaut must feel a twinge of excitement at news of a complete video gaming system being developed by Intel and Matsushita.

The Digital Video Interactive (DVI) system will allow you to play games using television

quality graphics. So instead of steering a graphical representation of a Stealth Fighter in your favourite flight sim, you'll be flying video footage over real landscapes. We kid you not!

This technology isn't so far away. Both Intel and Matsushita reckon on releasing a real video machine for business purposes next year. That would be used for interactive in-store point of sale material or as a business presentation tool. Perhaps a car manufacturer could let prospective clients test drive a new







A2000 FOR THE 90S

After the recent news that Commodore may drop the current Amiga 2000, I recently heard rumours concerning the machine's replacement. According to a source in the States, Commodore is working on a 32-bit version of the 2000, based around the 68020. OK, Commodore already has a 68020-based 2000 in the shape of the A2500, but rumour has it that this machine will be a true 32-bit computer, just like the A3000.

The new machine will come complete with ECS, OS version 2.0, the A3000 display enhancer and 2Mb of 32-bit RAM. According to my source, Commodore may even re-case the machine in a 3000-like system box. We can but hope.

Speaking of future developments, it seems that the Commodore A500-Professional – complete with ECS and Workbench 2.0 – is definitely happening. I recently spoke to a developer who had contacted Commodore after reading the story in Express 97.

Although Commodore officially told us that the story is nothing more than 'speculation and hype', it confirmed to my developer source that the story was completely true. Furthermore, it seems that we may well see the new machine in time for a Christmas launch.

A1500 PRICE SLASHED

Checkmate Digital has just announced a substantial price cut for its popular A1500 case conversion kit for the A500. As you will know, the A1500 transforms the A500 with its impressive expansion capabilities. Not only that, but it also provides A500 owners with a detachable keyboard, just like the 2000 and 3000 Amigas. The kit is now being sold by Checkmate for just £199, which certainly seems to be good value for money.

For those of you who still can't afford the full kit, Checkmate has finally started shipping its keyboard conversion kit for the A500. This £60 kit brings the A500 keyboard out of its case and mounts it inside the same case as used by the A1500. The remaining hole is then covered with a blanking plate. The keyboard is then attached to the machine via a curly cable. For more, give Checkmate a call on 081-909 3885.

MONEY MATTERS

Microdeal has finally released an Amiga version of its Personal Finance Manager program, a sophisticated personal finance program that was originally released on the Atari ST more than 2 years ago.

The program was written by none other than Dan 'Allad Jones' Lennard, the programmer responsible for Microdeal's recent Quartet Amiga sample sequencer. Dan – who no doubt put the money he earns from PFM towards that Lotus Turbo Esprit he's been promising himself for so long – has been hard at work fine-tuning PFM to take advantage of the Amiga's

increased graphics capabilities. *PFM* provides an easy way of looking after all those various bank and building society accounts, credit cards etc. As Microdeal says, using *PFM* is as simple as filling in a few forms (but we all know how complicated forms can be, don't we readers?). Anyway, look out for a full review in next week's *Express*.

200 MBYTES

Do you feel held back by your A590? Is 20Mb just not enough? For those of you who yearn for true 'power computing', Checkmate Digital has the answer with what could easily be described as the ultimate upgrade for the A590.

For just £499, Checkmate will fit a 200Mb SCSI hard-drive inside your A590. The drive offers an average access time of 15 ms, which is pretty damned quick (especially when you consider that the 20Mb Commodore drive fitted to the A590 has an access time of 88ms!). Even if you don't own an A590, the drive will also work fine with any standard SCSI interface.

If you're feeling rich, Checkmate can offer a complete hard drive system consisting of a 200 Mb A590 fitted with 2Mb of fast RAM for £900 (although the price may well have dropped by the time you read this!). PICTURE THIS!

So you've got a friend who has an ST, and you want to swap pictures,eh? Well matey, here's how it's done. Before you can convert any picture file, you'll obviously have to bring the file across from the Atari onto an Amiga disk. The easiest way of doing this is to get your hands on a very useful utility called CrossDOS (£29.95 from Power Computing on 0234 273000). This allows you to read Atari (and PC) format

disks on an Amiga.

Next, the conversion process itself. If you wish to convert a Neochrome picture to IFF, then you need a package called PIXmate from Progressive Peripherals & Software. PIXmate can handle Neochrome images in both high and medium resolutions.

If the picture is in Degas format (not compressed DegasElite), then you can convert it to IFF with a PD program called IFFConverter. I haven't actually seen this on offer in this country, but you can get it by buying the latest issue of Newsflash, the Amiga's premier disk magazine (ask for disk 13). This handy little program will happily read Degas files and convert them to both IFF and AmigaRAW format. Newsflash is on

0924 265593.

But what if you want to give some Amiga pictures to your ST friend? Well, providing your friend has either DPaint ST or Degas Elite (both from Electronic Arts), then they can already load IFF files directly. DPaint is the best bet though, as it can read and write both compressed and uncompressed IFF, whereas poor old Degas can only handle uncompressed IFF.

Pictures with no more than 16 colours can be ported straight across without modification, but if you're porting pictures with 32 colours or more, then you'll need to knock them down to 16 colours using an image processing package such as PIXmate.

Weapons have to be bought from a machine, using the coins that are scattered around the place, and there are interesting looking switches and buttons for 'beep victims' to press.

It is just a little too easy: with a few hours concentrated playing you can finish the whole thing. But the graphics are clear and neat, the play is diverting and none of the puzzles are too taxing - except perhaps what to do with the jam jars. The soundtracker score is pleasant, with different tunes for different rooms, so none become too grating. There are a couple of cute touches. First is the game icon, which shows something of the Jeckyl and Hyde character of the professor when you select it. Second, if you ignore the game for a while, the prof cleans his specs then taps impatiently on the screen, with a wonderful 'inside the glass' sound. The whole game has a bizarre and humorous air about it.

Conclusion: a bob short of 20, but possibly the best platforms and ladders on the Arc since Chuckie Egg under the emulator. It's rivalled only by Terramex, from the same author.

MOUSE MADNESS

It's self-evident that three buttons are better than two or one. Just count the buttons on Britain's trendiest Levi's if you'disagree with me. Yup, five on my pair too. Less is not more, though to be fair to Walter Gropius, I don't believe he was thinking of mice at the time. So this week, it's the first in a series of 'mouse

specials'. Part one is entitled '10 things you had no idea you could do with the Adjust button'.

(1) On the desktop, Adjust on the zoom box (top right of a window) zooms the window without bringing it to the front. You can move a window 'under' another by using Adjust to drag its title bar. So using Adjust moves the window 'without' bringing it to the front.

(2) Adjust, on a scroll icon or next to the scroll bar scrolls the document the opposite way - so Adjust on the Down arrow scrolls upwards.

(3) Adjust on the Close icon (the X at top left) closes a filer window but opens its parent - the equivalent of *DIR. Also, double-click Adjust to open a directory and close its parent useful to avoid having 19 filer windows open at once.

(4) In Paint, you can often draw in the background colour — for example with the pen of sprite brush tools. In fact, the 'background colour' is the first colour in the palette, usually white.

(5) With circle or rectangle tools, Adjust allows you another go at the last point - so you can move the centre of a circle that you haven't quite got right.

(6) In Draw, while you have any tool other than Select or text, clicking with Adjust allows you to edit the points in an

(7) In Edit and many other text editors (Impression, Ovation etc), Adjust will select the text between the cursor and where you click - so it's ideal for selecting blocks bigger than you can fit on the screen. Put the cursor at the beginning of the block, scroll with the scroll bar and click Adjust at the end of


(8) In PrinterDM and other printer drivers, it allows you to step backwards through the list of available printers. Click Select on the printer icon to see this dialogue box, then Select or Adjust on the name of the printer.

(9) Back on the desktop, you can select several files at once for deleting, copying and so on. Use Select for the first file, but use Adjust to add to the

TO BALDLY GO

If you're at all technically minded, whether you just watch Star Trek, or have a real interest in astronomy, then Orrery is for you — even at £109. Pop down the local astro-software emporium this weekend and buy it.

An orrery was an eighteenth century clockwork model of the solar system — peas and pinheads representing planets stuck on the hands of a complex clock, all rotating at the correct speed around the sun in the centre of the clock dial. The artist, Joseph Wright of Derby, painted a famous picture of one.

Spacetech's Orrery application is a little less beautiful to look at, but no less intricate than the eighteenth century clockwork masterpieces. It presents you with a picture of the night sky, exactly as it would look if you went outside, with stars, planets, outlines of the constellations and so on. It takes the real-time from the Arc's clock. You can pick another specific time, and the display will adjust to show the sky as it would appear then. Want to see what stars the survivors from the Titanic gazed up at? What will the sky look like on your next birthday? Just dial in the location, time and date! Or you can animate the display at any speed, from a minute at a time to several years per frame, to show stars wheeling across the sky. There's a tape-deck-style

control panel for this. Like time-lapse photography, the effect is breathtaking — the sky even slowly turns light blue as it gets light in the morning.

On the display, you can point at a star or planet and Orrery will give you further details, including digitised picture of the planets. As an aid to skywatching, the only problem is 'How can I get my Arc out in the garden?' There are other views too, looking inwards from outside the solar system. You can superimpose outlines of the constellations on the sky, incorporate an artificial horizon and show a grid of declination and right ascension on the sky to aid setting up your telescope. Finally, you can save a Draw file of the sky map.

My only complaint is Orrery's speed, or lack of it. Not the speed of animation — that's as fast as you can reasonably expect. But it's a little unresponsive in window movement and in popping up menus and this can become a little tiresome. It's written in BASIC, so perhaps it could be compiled to give a little more vim, but then it might not run in a 1Mb machine. Top marks to Spacetech, which can be reached on 0305 822753.

COMPATIBILITY PROBLEMS?

The disappointing thing is that the whole point of Amstrad 'sealing off' the enhanced hardware in the new machines was – supposedly – to make it possible to completely rule out the risk of any incompatibility with existing CPC software.

Well we already knew that certain 'clever' software didn't work, like Goldmark's Nirvana, for example, but we had hoped that would be the end of it. From now on though, we're going to have to make sure that all new software will indeed run on the Plus. To be fair, the vast majority that we've had in since we got the machine does.

The only significant difference (that we know of so far) between the new Plus and the old CPC is in the way the ROM is arranged. And, providing programmers have used Amstrad's jump block system correctly, there will be no problems. Where they've 'cheated', however, trouble may well occur.

CONSOLE JOYSTICK

Within weeks of the announcement of Amstrad's GX4000 and Plus models, joystick maker Cheetah has come up with a model designed specifically for these machines.

Unlike the CPC, these cartridgeplayers need a joystick with two Fire buttons. Of course, you get the game paddles with the two machines, but many gamesters still prefer joysticks, and while existing 'sticks will more often than not work fine, some of the new software does require two buttons.

Cheetah's new GX4000-compatible joystick actually has four buttons! Two correspond to button A, two to button B. The device is also designed to be used by both left and right-handed players.

running on the Amiga. It's multi-level parallax scrolling, incredible backgrounds, sprites and animation pretty well set new graphical standards overnight.

Mind you, when it came to the reviews, testers soon established that the gameplay wasn't quite as earth-shattering as the graphics. It was very tough, and not particularly original. Nevertheless, it was still a milestone in gaming folklore.

Well, Shadow of the Beast, the Amstrad version, is finished – and I've been playing it for most of this week. It's now been licensed by Gremlin, of course, and the question on everybody's minds must be how successfully could the company convert a game which relied so thoroughly on 16-bit graphics onto an 8-bit micro?

Very successfully indeed, as it happens. Initial impressions are a bit mixed, as although the main sprite is detailed and well-animated, the background is a bit dodgy. The programmers have attempted to shade the sky and foreground, even though they're using the Amstrad's four-colour mode, and it doesn't really work.

Get below ground on subsequent levels, however, and things get much better. The screen is distinctly monochromatic, but the use of the higher-res screen mode pays off handsomely. There may not be the same breathtaking colours as on the Amiga version, but Gremlin's game is very highly detailed, with good animation and scrolling (which jerks only occasionally). The main thing is, that the very strange and instantly-recognisable main character has made the transition to the Amstrad very well indeed bringing much of the atmosphere of the original along with it.


Shadow is essentially just another scrolling exploration/collecting/killing game. What sets it apart from the rest, however, is its combination of excellent graphics, large game-playing area (it comes on both sides of a 3-inch disk) and steadily-escalating difficulty level.

There is one huge bad point, however. When you die you go back to the start, no matter how far you'd got! Nasty, nasty. One collision or blow from an enemy doesn't kill you though. You start out with the ability to take 12 hits before you croak, and various potions and power-ups can be found along the way.

The variety of enemies is great, and the game follows the route of the original very closely. Giant flying and walking insects need careful timing to punch into oblivion, while the large bats that appear periodically are even nastier. Later on, you'll have to judge your timing to perfection to get past huge spiders dangling from ceilings, giant bouncing eyeballs (!) and dragon heads and tree roots thrusting suddenly from floors and ceilings.

There are end-of-level guardians to contend with too, each of which needs a special weapon, available somewhere else on that level, to defeat it. Keys, spanners and other objects lurk in dark corners too, and are needed for later stages in the game.

Shadow of the Beast is a very unusual game. The Amstrad's four-colour mode was a bold choice for Gremlin but a very successful one, to produce a very good game in its own right. Amstrad Shadow of the Beast still isn't perfect, but it's still worth the asking price – which is £12.99 on cassette, £15.99 on disk! That stings, doesn't it? I still say you won't regret it, though.



BATTY GAME

News has been somewhat thin on the ground this week so I've had the chance to take a close look at one of the heavier software releases. Adventurers only, read on...

New in from Ubi-Soft and causing much scratching of heads among those who've seen it, is the role playing opus, BAT, in which you play an agent of the catch-all organisation, the Bureau of Astral Troubleshooters. Your mission begins on the planet Selenia, where you must seek out and eliminate Vrangor a thoroughbred psycho who is threatening to wipe out life as Ubi-Soft knows it.

You can play a pre-generated character or design your own individual character. The design system for these is quite flexible. Certain characteristics are preset for all novice agents (such as level and experience), while others can be customised at your discretion from a points pool. This means that you could design a character who's great at following suspects but not too hot at aiming at targets more than fifty feet away. Or you could create a smoothtalking weapons expert who wouldn't know a clue if it landed on his head and shouted, "Take me to your leader!" It's a balancing act of course and one which will ensure that no two players ever have a similar game.

But the game itself is weird. Once your character is up and running it works through a number of screens

depicting various scenes. To start with, the entire screen is taken up by a view of some alien spaceport, with various aliens scuttling around beneath a spaceship of the kind H.R. Giger would be happy to see landing in his garden.

The only device to remind you of the game is the joystick pointer. As this passes over certain areas of the screen it changes shape, indicating that some particular type of action may be pursued there. Over some aliens, for instance, it changes into a speech bubble, indicating conversational possibilities. Over others, it changes in to a profile of a face before an exclamation mark (general encounter). Then it changes into directional arrows when you want to proceed in a given direction. You select the action of your choice by hitting the fire button when the cursor corresponds to the appropriate shape. If you select the fire button at any other time, a number of personal options present themselves, including the option to use your character's wrist-implanted computer.

From here you can do such things as set up a translation unit so you can understand some of the extraterrestrials around you (you have to select between robots and aliens) or program nuggets of useful code.

Once you make a move from your start location, the screen becomes cropped and the relevant picture, illustrating your new location, is displayed in the remaining space. The cursor only moves in that portion of the screen allocated to displaying your current position. Later, text supplements appear on the screens, making the game look a little more akin to the kind of adventure you have probably come across in the past. But playing BAT leaves you in no doubt that what you have here is something entirely different.


Ubi-Soft's game is different to the

traditional adventure in other important respects as well. It's open-ended allowing a number of solutions to given problems - and a choice of approach to the game generally. The problem with this is that the game lets you wander around in various unproductive directions without any concern for your mission (in which there is a game-time limit) and without the usual clues to point you in the right direction. As a result, BAT comes over as something of a curiosity rather than a game. It offers a sophisticated role-playing environment for you to involve yourself in and this is coupled with a highly convoluted plot. But you actually have to go looking for the game. It's not rammed down your throat in the conventional fashion and a certain amount of effort and patience is called for on the part of the player .

The manual, unlike most manuals of this ilk, is actually wellworth a sitdown read, rather than the usually ponderous game manual form, which rarely summons forth more than a reluctant skim. That's not to say that it manages to convey much in the way of being able to play the game but it does lay it on thick with the background, and this is nice because it sets the scene, creates the mood etc. Just how much of this wealth of waffle will be of use to players in the long term is impossible to tell but it would appear that the author gets a regular fix of serious science fiction.

To be honest, BAT goes heavy on the disk accessing, but don't worry changing between the two double-sided disks isn't too frequently a problem. It's a slow and confusing game and not ultimately completely satisfying, but certainly the best of it's kind for some time. And it's just screaming to be converted to ROM, so I suppose that's going to be something something to look forward to isn't it?

LONG LIVE THE PC

The PC will still be around when you're dead and gone - don't listen to anyone who tells you otherwise. Yes, I know people said the same thing about CP/M machines in the 1970s, but that was different. At their height they only had around 1000 commercial applications many of which, like the machines, were rough and didn't suffer from too much standardisation. By contrast the PC has more than 10,000 commercial packages, with more arriving daily. Moreover, the hardware itself keeps improving - well, at least it gets faster. The platform for that speed is the 386 chip (and the 486 and no doubt, soon, the 586).

What few users are aware of is that only Intel - who designed the 386 - makes it. It won't issue licences to anyone else. So what? So several things. With only one supplier and a PC market totally tied in to the Intel range of chips, as the PC is, Intel can charge what it likes. After all, the customers can't go anywhere else. Since, in chip terms, Intel doesn't make very many 386s - and since IBM gets first call on them anyway, it isn't surprising that 386 chips go for around \$500 each; a price you can buy two entire 386SX motherboards for.


That's one thing. Another is that Intel doesn't make them in very many places - a relatively small earthquake would foul up the whole market. A company called AMD is currently working on a clone of the 386 and expect to exhibit this autumn - if Intel doesn't persuade the American courts to stop it. And we're talking big money for the successful law firm here. If AMD succeeds expect to see 386 machines drop dramatically in price over the

following year. Until then you can just sit and seeth, green with envy of a company that's managed to get a stranglehold on such a lucrative market.

Few home users buy 386 machines - most go into business. Their arrival ensures a slow, but constant rain of lesser PCs descending - like manna from on high. The amortisation period (which just means how long the accountants allow before writing off the initial cost) for PCs is about two years pretty standard in the business world. Once paid for they get replaced and passed down the chain. If 386 machines suddenly become the business norm we could see a sudden rush of 12Mhz AT machines appearing on the second-hand market and in the auction rooms in the next year or so. These are more likely top be in my price

I don't know about you but I'd welcome a second hand AT on my desk at home - it's going to be a long time (like never) before I need multi-tasking, but I wouldn't mind a bit more speed and a bigger address space. Let's all wish AMD every success.

Oddly enough, despite those 10,000 software packages, most PC users are familiar with only three or four at most (claims a recent report, pointing out that Mac owners generally use five or six applications - but they steal them). Personally I think three or four is good, in business you can find many users familiar with nothing but WordPerfect. Totting up my own favourites I get to five items that I can claim to be familiar with - and wouldn't like to be without. All my actual work gets done with just two packages -Protext and Xtree Pro, a word processor and a hard disk manager. For

DTP stuff I use Timeworks. Zortech C does for programming and the Brief text editor for editing because it's

Looking at this list I suddenly realised that all of them run happily on an XT (what do you mean they're mostly cheap too? The phrase you're looking for is 'a high price/performance ratio'). For those who regards a PC as a tool (rather than a sex object) the XT remains adequate for many tasks. In fact I challenge you to state whether a word processor is running on an XT or an AT without reading the label on the front of the system box. The power of programs like these - and their low cost is the reason that the PC will never die.

When Express asked me to stand in for Stuart for a week they said 'don't just rant, talk about some products'; oh all right. The very best program I've seen recently won't cost you a bent Pfennig. It's also the first good argument I've ever seen for a home PC user to invest in VGA colour graphics (I like the Hercules display for writing, actually). It calculates and displays Mandelbrot images, Julia sets and sundry other clever, chaotic images. It does it fantastically fast (ten times faster than one of my own programs). You can

zoom in on the image interactively. It will map the resulting images on to spheres, give 3D renderings of them or cycle through the colour palette - which makes the images appear to come alive. The program is called Fractint, It's in the public domain. You can get it from the PDSL (tel 0892 663298). Oh yes, and it runs on just about every other graphic adaptor too.

At very nearly the other end of the scale in terms of cost - but still in graphics mode - is Picture Publisher. This is professional quality monochrome picture editing software. In the bad old days men and women with airbrushes had to take the spots off models for the big spreads in Vogue. Now you just scan the photograph into your PC and edit it electronically. Not only is Picture Publisher incredibly powerful, it's great fun to use. With it you can, for example, place Vita Sackville-West in bed with the character of your choice - undetectably. Who says the camera can't lie? Not only can't you believe everything you hear, but from now on you'd better check out what you see as well. Picture Publisher is available from Ctrl-Alt-Deli on 0908 662759. It needs VGA, Windows 3, a flatbed scanner and a photo-typesetter for best results.

The Speccy's often thought to be a bit lacking in musical ability but that's never stopped any of Stock, Aitken and Waterperson's evil disciples and I'm glad to report another music-making utility has just arrived. This of course is only a few months after the thoroughly splendid Music Writer package was released to much tossing of hats in the air and loud hurahing.

Childs Play is a composition program for the Plus-3 only (although a tape version is apparently due for release soon) that allows you to write masterpieces on-screen and then replay them through a Midi system or television.

The process of writing tunes is pretty straight-forward, even for someone like me who used to mess around in music lessons at school. First of all you select the note of your choice from the main menu using a cursor system and then the display switches to the music screen. Here you use the cursors to place the note on the stave. You're able to string notes together to create double notes, there's an option to repeat sections of your piece and both dotted notes and triplates. whatever they are, can be selected. I don't know, but apparently these are good things to have in a musical utility.

If you're rich enough to own Midi instruments, Childs Play lets you play your ditties in four separate note voices, but humble commoners who have to make do with a TV only get three voices. The whole thing's been written in BASIC, although it doesn't really seem like it, so you can fiddle about with a back-up copy to let you get the most out of any hideously expensive and trendy Midi equipment you want to use in conjunction with the program.

On the flipside of the disk is a loader routine that lets you replay any compositions you've saved to disk for posterity. Two demo pieces have also been thoughtfully included for your listening pleasure.

Even someone as musically ignorant as I found Childs Play pretty easy to use, despite the fact that the manual's a bit on the weedy side. It's not as professional looking, or contain the wealth of complicated musos' features that Music Writer had, but nevertheless it's a fair deal cheaper at £8 for the Plus-3 disk version, or £6 for a Plus-2 copy on tape. Midi owners seem to be better served with this program too, although I'd ask someone who knows a little bit more about musical things than I do before splashing out for it. 

PHILIPS CHOP MONITOR

The 'world's best-selling monitor' (according to Philips) is dead.

The snappily monikered CM8833 is said by its manufacturer to have sold an astonishing 4,000,000 units in its four year life. So, like the acute marketing machine it is, Philips has now chopped it off at the mains lead.

Well, sort of. Make way, if you would, for the Mark II, a redesigned and upgraded model. Its chief boast is that it meets stringent new safety standards expected to be introduced throughout the European market (cue hisses from that old xenophobe Nick Ridley).

For those among you whose garment of preference is of the warm waterproof hip-length with a hood variety, this particular 14 incher boasts TTL-digital and RGB-analog computer input signals; CVBS input for video signals; stereo sound and an earphone socket.

This little lot will set you back £300 - and since prices differ enormously it's definitely worth shopping around (as it always is for hardware items).

POOLS WINNER CORNER

Most of us dream of one day expanding our ST memory up to the current supported limit of 4Mb. Not those notoriously power-hungry Germans (that's quite enough for one week from you, Ridley), who have come up with a board with a complete new MMU that offers you not 4Mb nor even 8, but a whacking great 12Mb.

It's really quite an advance on the current version that you see when you boot-up. You can change screen resolutions without having to reboot, and you can drag files and folders onto the Desktop, so stuff you're likely to want is where you can find it.

Icons can be of any design, and any program, and every option that you usually have to activate from those bloody awful pull-down menus, can be selected from the keyboard. These improvements are exactly the kind of things people have been urging for years.

It does indeed look, as several catty types have observed, as if Atari has taken a peek at the Macintosh desktop, which is enough to make anyone who has to work with the Atari version - yours truly included - physically sick with jealousy.

THE POWER OF THE PEN

Active's rather spiffing Dragonflight was very well received in ST Format last month - apart, that is, from one thing. £34.99 is really too much, said the magazine.

'Fair enough', said Active. And promptly dropped the price by a fiver. Such is the power of the pen.

NEW MACS

Last week, I talked about the Mac Classic, which is undoubtedly going to be the most popular of Apple's new Macintoshes. But there are two other new arrivals – the LC and the Ilsi – which are certainly worth consideration.

The LC is Apple's lowest-cost colour computer, and at £1,495 for the LC and a 12-inch, 256-colour monitor, represents great value. It's twice as fast as the Classic and the SE, and runs a 68020 chip. If you've got the money, go for this one. The only problem? It won't be on sale until January next year.

The Ilsi becomes the cheapest member of the Mac II family. Running a 68030 at 20MHz – which means that it will be able to handle virtual memory when (if!) System 7 finally arrives – it should be up to five times faster than the Classic. The extra power of the 68030 and the fact that it accepts NuBus cards (the standard for Mac addons) means that the Ilsi will be the choice of many companies.

BARGAIN CITY

If you can't afford a Classic, or you want a machine that's slightly faster but can't afford the LC, then don't despair. The second-hand value of older machines has plummeted. People who hoped to sell an SE 2/40 for around £1,600 are accepting that they'll need to knock about £700 off that price to be able to get rid of it. So for the same price as a Classic 2/40, you could pick up an SE – which is faster, and has stood the test

of time as a reliable model, although it may be out of guarantee. For those who really want a cheap bargain, look out for second hand Mac Pluses. These will start to sell on the second hand market for silly prices – with the base-level Classic costing £575, the owner of an unexpanded Plus can't expect to get more than about £200-£300.

SAVE THAT SCREEN

I mentioned screen 'burn-in' above; the Mac is more susceptible to it than most computers because some of the items on the screen - like the menu bar, the disk icon and the wastebasket - are always present, and seldom move. There are two things you can do to counter burn-in: the first, cheapest and most obvious is to keep the brightness of your screen fairly low, and not to leave your Mac switched on all the time. The second is to buy a screen saver - a utility which blanks your screen and then puts up a moving image when you haven't used the computer for a certain amount of time.

While there are free and shareware screen savers available, the two best cost money (of course). There is a battle for screen-saving supremacy going on at the moment between Pyro! (Riva Ltd, 0420 22666) and After Dark (from Softline Distribution, 081 642 4242), with After Dark being my favourite because of it's on-screen diversions. It's fun and useful and sellsfor only £30.



SOFT LOGIK'S PAGESTREAM 2.0 UNVEILED

Soft Logik of St Louis in Montana has announced it is working on release two of its popular Pagestream professional DTP system for the Atari ST.

Already available for the Amiga and the ST, version two for the ST is around three months away from shipment and, when it arrives, it is going to be fully compatible with the Atari TT series.

But the most important advance in 2.0 is going to be its support for Agfa, Compugraphic's hinted outline fonts and Adobe Type 1 IBM format fonts. Font size support has been extended down to six points and up to 600 points and, as a result, it now includes some support for Bezier curves.

Surprisingly, despite the long list of enhanced features, Pagestream 2.0 on the ST costs just \$299-95 - get your orders in right now!

MORE FROM WAACE

As the doors closed on the WAACE Atari-specific computer show in the US earlier this month, the ST-Report newsletter says that 3,600 of the Atari faithful made the pilgrimage to the show to check out what is happening in the Atari world. By all accounts, they weren't disappointed. Nice to read that Andy Bennett of Frontier Software in Harrogate made the trip to the US to show the US Atari fans that there is Atari life in England!

Star attraction at the show was, of course, Dave Small, of Gadgets by Small, who showed off prototypes of the company's forthcoming 68030 accelerator card for the Atari ST. The prototype at the show was installed in a Mega ST with the cover off, allowing all comers to inspect the workmanship - a far cry from other add-in cards for the ST (the laws of libel prevent me from saying who). The board - code-named the 68030 SST - should be available to end users by the turn of the year and, although a price hasn't yet been fixed, a

lot of interest was generated in this product. And no wonder, the board features up to 8Mb of 'fast' RAM, effectively turning a 4Mb Mega ST into a Mega 12. Despite the somewhat awkward change in choice of microprocessor and the boosting of RAM capability, Small reckons that most existing programs will run on the 68030 SST card.

And now for the bad news - initially, I'm afraid, the card in question is only going to be available for the Mega ST series, although other ST model support is apparently on the way. According to Small, standard ST and STe versions will have fewer features. since they will be optimised for smaller RAM configurations.

The 68030 SST card slots in, in place of the 68000 microprocessor on the Mega ST's motherboard. Because of the 030's system high performance, Small claims that its 16MHz performance is around 5.33 times faster than anything presently possible on a 68000 microprocessor-based ST, even with other accelerator and RAM-catching software installed.

AMIGA ASSEMBLER FROM DOWN UNDER

Digisoft, an Australian company of Brisbane in Queensland, Australia, has released something known as Macro 68, a new assembler for the Amiga that is able support all the Motorola 68xxx family, including the 68030, 68882 FPU, and 68851 MMU. Amiga programmers will no doubt be pleased to hear that the multipass assembler package will support the new 68000-family assemblylanguage syntax, and it even comes with a module that converts old-style syntax source code.

According to Digisoft, the majority of Macro 68's facilities will be limited only by available RAM on the host machine. The software includes a fulllisting control. Also included are full cross-reference capabilities, along with user-accessible files.

The Aus\$195 package will run on any Amiga - including the A1000 - provided that it has at least 1Mb or more of main RAM available.



At the US launch of a software package called Co-operation earlier this month, NCR executives are reported to have shed their previously stuffy and staid image in favour of a more fun-loving and hip style worthy of Steve Jobs and Steve Wozniak at the time when they were both in charge of Apple.

"Nobody can call NCR dull anymore," NCR chairman Charles Exley Junior told the press conference, as he put on a pair of dazzlingly bright red sunglasses fitted with flashing lights. That's true. It was only a month ago when NCR all but abandoned its allegiance to the Motorola 68xxx camp and revealed that a new range of Intel 808x and 80x86-based machines are now entering production.

Very interesting from a sartorial point of view, but what's going on? Obviously NCR has discovered that there is an important consumer market out there as well as the more traditional business buyers that have previously been their mainstay and have adopted an appropriate style. 



As our main man Keith Pomfret is currently touring the Soviet Union, enter Pat McDonald as the man with the mains, telling you how to control two computers simultaneously.

There was a time when it was the realm of the true hardware nut to link computers together – even machines of exactly the same make and type. If you had two computers, you needed two keyboards, two monitors and two pairs of hands (think about it).

With the advent of the WIMP system, pioneered by Xerox and Apple in the extremely successful Macintosh system, all that changed. Here's why:

WIMP systems rely mostly on mice for people to interact with computers. Keyboards are pushed to one side, because most of the time they're simply not needed. This week's CC looks at the possibilities of controlling two (or more) computers simultaneously with just one mouse!

WHO NEEDS IT?

For a start, you need two computers, which most people don't have. But, surely you know somebody else with a computer? Preferably a computer where the mouse is compatible.

Now, just as an exercise, imagine you have say two STs. These very nice machines have built in MIDIi ports, to talk to synthesizers. What if you want to control more than 16 MIDI devices at once? MIDI is limited to 16 channels and although there are ways round this, most of the sequencing software available at the moment has a limit of 16 different synthesizers/drum machines or whatever.

Plus you have the problem of sequencing them all exactly. MIDI signals usually start to misbehave after passing through five or six instruments without MIDI splitters or synchronizers, and you have a problem.

Assuming you have two computers, you could control two sequencing programs with one mouse. And you synchronize the two programs by pulling down the play option with one mouse on at the same time on just one machine.

PROBLEM: If your two computers are always connected to the same mouse, they will behave exactly the same all the time. That's not what is needed – you need to have independent control when you want, and simultaneous when you want...

What is needed is a box, with an input for your mouse at the front and two leads coming out of the back to plug into the mouse ports of two computers. Of course, you could control more machines by having more leads, but this still leaves us with the problem of

WHO ELSE NEEDS IT?

Let's talk Amiga for a moment. The Amiga is blessed with four separate channels on which to play samples. What if you want more than four samples playing at once, without spending lots of money on hardware?

If you can blag/borrow/steal another machine, and could control both machines with one mouse (when you needed to), you could select two different play options at the same time. Giving you eight sample channels to play with.

sometimes not controlling two computers.

So, you mount a switch on the front of the box. This has three positions:

- 1) Feed the mouse signals to one of the leads.
- 2) Feed the mouse signals to the other lead.
- 3) Feed the mouse signal to both at the same time.

Sounds easy, doesn't it? Well, here's where it starts getting a bit fiddly. Assuming that you are trying to build a box for an ST or Amiga, you will need the following components:

- 1) A box!
- 2) Two female 9-pin D connectors.
- 3) One panel mounted male 9-pin D connector.
- 4) Sufficient eight core screened cable (use the screen for the ground connection).



Again, it's not common – you'll probably have to settle for 10 pole single travels and not use a pair of connectors. Or you could acquire lots of little switches, and switch them all over simultaneously. DIP switches would do the job fine, so long as you could get at them without taking the box apart.

WIRING IT UP

This is the really fiddly part – not intellectually, just a bit tedious. From the male connector (where you plug the mouse in), you have to run two wires back from each connection to the two different sets of switches.

From the switches, you have to run one wire to



5) One 9 pole triple travel switch.

The last item is rather rare. In fact, it's non-existent, which is probably why nobody has ever built such a box. You could get some tame techie (the author lacks this quality – Ed) to make some solid state circuitry- ie use a few off-the-shelf chips and wire them up in a most improbable fashion to a standard three-way switch to get the desired effect.

However, there is an alternative. Rather than have one switch, use two. So item five now becomes:

5) Two 9 pole single travel switches

SWITCH INFO

For those who've never really thought about it, this talk of 9 or 10 pole single or triple travel switches is a bit nonsensical. A switch works by:

- 1) Having an input (one of the poles).
- 2) Having a travel (connected/not connected).
- 3) Having an output (another pole).

A single pole, single travel switch (just like a light switch) would have two contacts (one for in, one for out) and would be on or off. A 10 pole, single travel switch would have 20 connections – 10 inputs, 10 outputs, and again they would all be either on or off.

each of the female connectors (the ones you plug into the computers). Each of the connections should be from the relevant pin to the same pin on the opposite connector, with a switch contact in the middle.

For example, pin 1 of the male connector has to be connected to both banks of switches. From each switch output, a wire is connected to pin 1 of each female connector. The above diagram might help to clarify things.

Exactly the same is true of pin 2, and pin 3, until every pin on the mouse side is connected to the same pin on each of the computer connectors – but with a switch in the middle. In case you're wondering, the pins are numbered clearly: but you usually need a magnifying glass to make them out. Congratulations, you are now a grade one hardware nut!

BIDDING TIPS

- Prices at auctions can be quite a lot lower than those in shops, but you will have to pay in full on the day, and usually no warranty is given.
- Get a catalogue beforehand.
- Set yourself a limit.
- Give your selected items a good looking over and see if there's a warranty card present.
- Wait for the auctioneer to call the first bid he'll come right down if no one offers.
- Don't be tempted to outbid over the odds you might be up against a dealer for whom a bargain is just a higher than normal margin.

RIGHTING WRONGS

In theory, everything at an auction is sold as seen, but you do have the rights of a secondhand buyer. So the onus is on you to make sure the kit you buy is worth the money you're likely to bid.

Most auctioneers won't mind you opening up machines and having a good look at the contents. As most of the machines are powered up, you can always take along your own software to see if it runs as it should. Take along a benchmark test as well so you can make sure that 386 isn't just a case with a 286 at its heart.

If however, an item doesn't tally with the description in the catalogue, the Sale of Goods Act entitles you to a refund. Unofficially though, most auction companies will refund your money if you buy piece of kit that doesn't work as it should.

The reels of computer tape work fine as audio tape if you can find a machine that will take that width. You'll have to spool them onto audio reels, though computer reels don't fit on audio reel to reel players. We tried a couple of reels of computer tape on a half inch multi-track studio machine and were pleasantly surprised. the quality was a bit hissy, but at least it worked. I've no doubt that a dose of

the Dolbys will clean the sound up. We also got the office slave to spend an hour or two winding some of the computer tape on to a video cassette, but there was no success here. Garbled audio reception and no video signal. Still, you can't win them all.

The punch card readers should be encapsulated with dry silica gel and held onto for a hundred years or so. ■ HELP! Disk Doctor

Recently I was approached by a friend who asked if I could help out with a disk that a colleague of his seemed to have knackered up. As she works in a busy office she is finding the apparent loss of information worrying.

My friend explained that there are about 38 .DOC files on the disk and that access to 10 or so result in the prompt line display showing: " " (name.doc)" is not a supported file type". One of these files (over 120k) contains customer information vital to her.

When I slammed it through CHKDSK (MS DOS v3.3) I found that I too had problems when so much information came up on the screen. I'll illustrate with one file:

\FLJBOOKS>DOC

Allocation error, size adjusted.

100 lost clusters found in 10 chains.

Convert lost chains to files (Y/N)?

VFLJBOOKS.DOC

Is cross linked on cluster 99.

In fact, the first three files that came up with "allocation error" were the IBMBIO.COM, IBMDOS.COM and COM-

MAND.COM files. I believe the package she is using is called DisplayWrite 4. David Ross. Durham

It sounds as if strong medicine is called for. First rule when there is a problem on a floppy disk is make a copy of the corrupt disk if that's at all possible. This way you always have the original to make more copies of if your disk surgery kills the patient. Dead and dying disks with corrupt word processor files can sometimes have the files recovered by attempting to load them into a less fussy word processor or by using a word processor with a file convert utility that turns the affected file into pure ASCII.

It sounds as if you require something much stronger, though. Disk utilities such as Norton Utilities or PC Tools can help with disk and file problems and are very powerful, but can be dangerous in the hands of a careless person. If you wish to use them, be sure that you understand them and their documentation. If you have any qualms about their use, get someone who understands them to watch over your shoulder.

Pic tricks

My friend owns an Amiga 1000 and an Atari 1040ST. He has some IFF format pictures I would like to use in my art programs. Is it possible to get the IFF pictures to my ST without using the RS232 (null modem etc)? I have heard that the Amiga can read/write MS DOS format disks (which is OK for the ST) with a program called DOS-2-DOS, so maybe this could do the trick?

I'm also looking for penpals, preferably in the London area, who also use Spectre (the Mac emulator) semi-professionally. I can be contacted at the address below.

I'm loathed to believe that someone somewhere can't do a thing about what is, apart from the fact that I can see damn little of what is going on, a fully working machine.

■ TIP! Maplin's rescue

Jack Blackler's problem is, I believe, solvable by Messrs Maplin. They do a chip numbered MAX232 which has a built-in voltage converter, 5v in, 10v out and vice versa. A few more small components are necessary. Maplin's part number is FD92A. Ask for the application sheet which will give all the details when ordering.

■ TIP!/HELP! Star printer

I have often read that the AMSTRAD 9512 does not recognise or drive any other printer unless the daisy wheel printer is connected. This, as you know, is not correct when using Locoscript. All my writing is done on a DMP and the daisy is never plugged in until I want to use CPM. But this gives rise to another thought. If Locoscript can print on a DMP without the daisy connected why can't some genius amongst your readers come up with a file that can be added to the CPM disk to enable the daisy printer to be discarded altogether?

I use the STAR 24-10 printer and as I said the daisy is never used for printing. It just takes up space on my desk that could be put to better use.

PCs are reliable beasts. That's one of the reasons why practically every business in the UK (and all over the world for that matter) uses them. Like any complex piece of machinery, things can go wrong. It's just as well to know that your machine isn't just about to cough and splutter to a halt.

Well now you can know. No more sleepless nights, breaking out into cold sweats. You needn't worry whether your machine's in tip-top condition or not. There's a whole bunch of utilities on this disk that will let you know just how well your machine is feeling, and how favourably it compares with others. Coretest informs you of the state of your hard disk. It performs a test that measures the efficiency in terms of speed, size and general sexiness.

The program rapidly reads and writes data to the disk, and gives you all the stats. Seek-time, speed of data transfer and various other techie terms are taken into consideration. The combined results are given as a performance index.

The program has been written by a company which specialises in - would you believe - very fast hard drives. In its final analysis it compares the efficiency rating of yours with theirs, telling you just how rubbish yours is in comparison.

Disks that are used frequently whether they are fixed or floppy - lose performance compared to fresh ones. This is because every time you load and save information the data is redistributed all over the place. If you erase a batch of files, gaps will be left over the surface of the disk. When new information is written, these gaps will be filled up, leaving files spread in numerous places.

This slows things down considerably. The disk-head zooms around all over the place, constantly moving back and forth as it searches for the elusive data. The net result is loss of speed. Information stored sequentially on the disk is accessed much faster.



For most applications, this difference in speed is inconsequential. What's a few milliseconds? However, programs that make constant disk access will become noticeably slower. A database is a typical example, it's frequently accessed and constantly updated and changed. The files for this kind of program get very disorganised with time.

The program Reformat is intended to tidy up your disks. It works by reading

all the information and then re-writing it in a more logical order. It'll do the business with both hard and floppy disks though it's recommended that you remember to back-up everything before you commence the operation. If anything should go wrong midway through - well, you'd really be in the poo if you hadn't done this.

Hard disks are a big job, taking anything up to half an hour or more to redistribute the data. The process is fully automatic, so you can leave your computer to it while you go and have a cup of tea and some buns.

Just how fast is your disk drive? It may seem like a silly question, but to maintain accuracy, it is important that the disk drive keeps up a constant rotation speed.

300 revolutions per minute is the norm, so if your drive's playing up, then maybe it would be a good idea to check that it's keeping perfect time.

That's exactly what RPM sets out to do. Bung a disk in the drive. RPM sets it spinning, and tells you whether your computer is driving above - or below - the speed limit.

Diskoray is another speed test program. It allows you to measure the speed of any disk drive in milliseconds, and step in or out by a track at a time.

It's not all disk related stuff on this disk though. Pkunpak is a program dearchiver. It's especially welcome, as many of the utilities on the disk come in archived form.

87 Test tells owners of the 8087 coprocessor chip it's doing its sums correctly. I can't really imagine the answer would ever be anything but 'yes'.

There are a couple of pretties on the disk too. There's EGAfrac, for minutes of fractal fun. A little program called LJ - don't ask me what it stands for has also been lovingly carved onto the ferric oxide coating of the disk. Weird







Ponder, if you will, an ocean bed made poisonous by leaking canisters of chemicals, or water polluted by the waste from a nuclear power plant, or even lobsters trapped in baskets in an already over-fished sea. To solve these marine disasters, Millennium has conjured up its own super-sleuth – the soon-to-be-infamous James Pond, in a 007 spoof.

James Pond doesn't come armed with any special skills or abilities – he's just a perfectly ordinary fearless sprat. To put the water to rights you have to use this character to solve a series of twelve underwater missions.

Your first big mission is to release lobsters by tracking down keys and dropping them onto the lobsters' baskets. Since you can only carry one item at a time you cannot race round the level collecting all the keys and dropping them over the lobsters later. While







ore than any other invention since perhaps the wheel or the internal combustion engine, the computer has created work for people. Not in the sense that they make existing jobs difficult, although in certain cases this is true, but in the sense that they create job titles that didn't previously exist. For example, people with a keen design sense who are too messy or unco-ordinated to be paste-up artists have found gainful employment in magazines produced by desktop publishing.

This idea of producing something entirely in the memory of a computer is a new and ever expanding field. It became obvious, when DTP became the rule rather than the exception, that desktop based applications would revolutionise the production of the media we all consume. Desktop publishing revolutionised the production of books and magazines by replacing costly paper paste-up and photographic repro processes with Apple Macintosh computers, running programs which make the pages up in memory and output them directly to film.

Desktop music became a reality when the Musical Instrument Digital Interface standard caught on in professional production, and in this field the Atari ST, by having MIDI ports built in, became the accepted standard. Although the ST still holds most of the cards, especially for amateur musicians and cost effective home use, the Macintosh is rapidly becoming the professional choice as the MIDI engine in the recording studios of the world. Having completely changed publishing and music, desktop video is the obvious choice as the "next big thing".

Desktop video, or DTV, is not as well formed a market as DTP or MIDI music but only, because the perfect platform for the medium has not yet emerged from the current pack of hopefuls. As an example, the DTP field only became a force to be reckoned with after the Apple Macintosh became the

perfect DTP engine, complete with all the software and hardware support needed to produce professionally acceptable results, this being the yardstick by which these things are measured. Similarly in desktop music, until the cheap and MIDI literate Atari ST came out, along with piles of cheap and professional software, MIDI hadn't got a computerised leg to stand on. But as yet, no professional quality DTV standard has nosed ahead of the pack, although if any machine can claim to be a contender at this stage in the game, the Commodore Amiga can.

To start with the Amiga was specifically designed in the first place to be fully compatible with TV, positively 'TV friendly' in fact, with common screen resolutions and easy access to TV sync through genlocking. As with the Amiga's sound, the Amiga's graphics have a lot of the hardware needed for external jobs like video sync and A to D converters for sampling already built in. Although the quality of the results you get are fairly low grade as compared with professional titling and solid modelling computers like the Quantel Harry or Iris workstations, the Amiga is in use in more video studios than almost any other micro computer, and more than reasonable results are easy to achieve with minimal equipment.

Also there is more DTV style software and hardware for the Amiga than for any other machine, too. So if you're shopping around for a computer to start with, you are better off looking at an Amiga solution than, say, a 386 PC or Mac.

It's becoming clear that the future of DTV is assured, in one form or another, especially as

another buzzword on everyone's lips at the moment is multimedia. As the Mac, PC and Amiga all have multimedia firmly on the agenda, with things like video E-mail and digital video now being a possibility rather than just a twinkle in the eyes of Apple's Neat Ideas Dept. This Autumn the Amiga based CDTV unit goes on trial in 2,000 British homes and goes on sale in the new year. That, above anything, will show that interactive TV is very much a thing of the present. So, it looks like rather than computers becoming more integrated with video and audio, that video will more likely become just another colour in computing's ever expanding palette.

AMIGA

No discussion about TV production hardware on the Amiga can begin without first mentioning the G2 Video centre. Although not really a professional product, it is expandable into a true pro video set-up.

There are upwards of eight genlocks currently available for the Amiga ranging in price from just under £100 to well over £1,000, so why is there a need for another priced at £800 odd? Well, the G2 is made by a firm who up until now have specialised in producing pro quality genlocks which don't give you much change from £100,000, so the quality of signal you get from this device is great. Other than that, the machine has sockets for S-VHS, which allows for a much more stable and usable finished image. In fact, as the colour is separately encoded and decoded, the machine can output straight RGB. No conversion to PAL using an RF modulator is needed, as the signal can go directly and cleanly to tape as

RGB video. The quality of the output is as good as you can get on desktop equipment.

Fitting the G2 is simple, you just plug the unit into the RGB out on your Amiga, plug the RGB out to your monitor, and send the composite video down a lead to your video recorder. Then you connect a video source to the input on the G2 and you're ready to mix live or taped video with Amiga graphics.

As well as being high quality, the unit is small, and can easily fit onto your desk along with an Amiga, VCR, TV and Monitor. The functions of the unit can be controlled using hardware switches and sliders on the top of the unit, or using software if you

want to hide the unit away.

If £800 is too rich for your blood, then how about the MiniGen, which only costs £99? This is a small phaser shaped unit with plugs into your RGB port and looks not unlike the A520 TV modulator you probably got free with your Amiga. Obviously the scope, and more importantly the quality, of this unit are far below what you can achieve with the G2, but for the tight (or near empty) of pocket this is the cheapest way into the TV business.

Finally, on the hardware front there is the new high end Simpatica system by Artbeat. This is a system where you can transfer Amiga animations and single ILBM files to hi-band video, frame by frame. This allows for smooth animation, but also excellent quality. This is pro quality equipment and comes with a pro price tag of around £1,500, not including the necessary hi-band recorder or Amiga needed to run the thing. The interface box fits between the Amiga and the recorder and drives the machine frame by frame, offloading the animations and frames stored in memory following a list in the computers memory.

In the software stakes the Amiga wins hands down. There are more video products on the market for this computer than any other. Just to mention a few which are essential for serious work: DeluxePaint III — This is the premier graphics and animation engine, bar none. Although the program doesn't handle memory hungry 4096 colour HAM images, it outperforms any other package at 2,4,8,16,32 and 64 colour resolutions. Deluxe Video III — the video oriented brother of DPaint. Allows you to sequence animations using a simple WIMP interface. The Director - a more difficult beast, but one which is used professionally to produce computer displays in films and on TV shows like Star Test. AMOS - not so obvious this one, but this new program enables you to move graphics around in ways not possible with ordinary programs. If you know Basic, you know AMOS. Disney's Animation Studio -

a new program just out from Disney's new software arm. Looks to be the closest thing to real movie animation on a computer ever invented. Disney actually uses Amigas these days in the production of its films and the program was developed using techniques it utilises professionally.


So, the Amiga is already king of the heap, but we will have to wait impatiently to see what will happen once the CDTV interactive video version comes out next year.

ST

The DTV revolution is far less evolved on the ST than it is on any other computer. There is precious little in the way of hardware and software support for video on the Atari's, mostly due to its technical limitations, problems not unlike those which hold the PC back. For a start it cannot use the full screen area, and so titling is limited to inside the screen border. Other limitations are in the resolution department, and unlike the Amiga, no thought was given to interfacing with TV on any level besides the RF modulator fitted at the back. There is some stuff for the ST owner who is desperate for TV graphics, and that is GST Gold.

Once you've cracked the problem of how to sync the ST to video signals, the rest is easy. But most of this clocking has to be added to the hardware, as the ST has no real method of doing this feat on its own. Certain companies have tried to create external sync pulse generators for the machine, and failed, but one company which has made just such a device is Third Coast Technologies. Although the unit costs a pricey £499 and is the only option for this kind of work, the GST Gold is a remarkably able piece of kit.

Another small problem is that in order to run the GST you will need a Mega ST. This isn't just a RAM problem, although the extra leg room doesn't hurt. No, the 1040 and 520 ST's need to be physically modified to accept external sync and although this

can be done, it's not to be recommended.

Installation is a tad complex and not for the faint hearted. You have to pop the 2591 chip out of its socket and slip in the new custom housing and plug the chip back in. The lead coming from the housing then feeds the video signals to the ST and GST. So then you're ready to rock and roll, as they say.

After all that minor surgery, it's nice to see something that's just ready to up and run. The new Deluxe Paint ST has everything you will need for creating your own video graphics, especially animation. Using the flexible interface designed for the Amiga and PC, the program is by far the best package for fast and flexible graphics creation on the ST. Animation is a breeze, and the program allows you to create and animate in 512K machines as well as Mega ST's and STE's.

Another program which you might not think of as video oriented is STOS, from Mandarin software. With this you can create your own animations using sprites and backgrounds. This is easy to use too for animated cartoons and titles.

It remains to be seen if the ST can build its reputation in DTV, as the advanced new STE has yet to show any promise as far as DTV software making use of its facilities is concerned. We'll just have to wait util next year to see how it shapes up.

PC

Although there are very few low end (and even fewer high end) video applications for the PC, there is one program which is sweeping the board and that is Animator. It is an animation and graphics program which lets you create animations and show them on

the PC screen. Obviously you need some kind of interface to get the art onto video, but *Animator* is the best way to create the basic graphics you need.

One of the options for video work is the pioneering device from Vine Micros which is a PC EGA flavour genlock. Vine Micros is famous for its CGA/EGA/VGA to RGB monitor or TV devices, and this was clearly seen as an obvious gap in the market, especially noting the success of Animator as a kind of standard.

Although the PC figures a lot in the high end of presentation slides and such, the PC is yet to make much of an in road into video itself.

CHEAP VIDEO

Video is not as expensive a medium to get into these days as it was even just three years ago. The price of high spec equipment has come way down and the introduction of new standards, like Hi-8 and S-VHS, has brought near broadcast quality into the home for the very first time.

Among recent innovations was the Amstrad Twin video, which not only enables you to record two programs at once, but also does tape to tape dubbing. Such a device is invaluable in desktop video and for its small footprint on your desk as well as the technical savings.

Video 8mm is gaining ground as a format, too, with its miniature tapes and high quality stereo sound. This is the portable note book system that, especially using the new high band width Hi-8 system, could form the basis of news-gathering systems based on computer editing suites.

The march of the camcorders is relentless, with more models coming out each week, far too rapid for any of us to keep track of all the new features and prices. Basically the best buy will be the one you can afford. Picture quality has risen to the standard where, as long as it's a name brand and it's fairly stable, like on a tripod, the quality you'll get is equal to

any other machine. Even the new breed of tiny VHS 'C' machines with no internal playback facility offer quality unheard of on older machines costing thousands and weighing about 14 times as much.

Another surprising turn up for the technical books is the rise in production of home editing controllers. Edit controllers operate two video recorders at once, in some cases using the infra red controllers.

DIGITISERS

No DTV setup is complete without a digitiser and this is very easy to sort out. Some of the best you can get are all made by Rombo - these are the VIDI Amiga, VIDI PC and VIDI ST. Although the Rombo machines are more like frame grabbers (grabbing their pictures from video) very good results can be

gained. Especially using their RGB splitter, which saves off three images for the red green and blue components and then combines them as one picture for full colour grabs. These grabs can be made into animations, allowing you to overlay moving "video images" over other video sources. There are other methods of getting your images onto a computer, scanners and the like, but these will run your budget figures up to the £1,000 mark again. The Rombo units are fast and cost effective.

EXTERNAL SOURCES

Even if you can't set up a completely independent DTV set-up on your desk, the possibilities for production don't end there. Like the music or publishing industries, it is possible to assemble your productions at home on a computer and post them to a third party who turns your floppy disk and source tapes into a finished production. This has been happening in the magazine business for some while, where writers and artists write or draw the bits of a magazine at home and take them into the office for merging into a finished product. This happens more often in the world of music, where music is written on simple multi-timbral synthesisers in the home and then transferred to the New England Digital Synclavier or similar megabucks production system

in the studio for mixing and recording.

In the home you can set up edit lists on your home computer which are basically textual lists of SMPTE codes and the software tools to tell computer driven video editing suites where to make the cuts in your video automatically. Or with the aid of the Simpatica system by Artbeat Computer Graphics, you can actually generate computer generated animations composed of single IFF files and ANIM files which the interface sends to video tape in the studio one frame at a time.

Search the audio visual press for studios which specialise in "off-line editing" and call them to see if they run your make of computer. Agreed - there aren't many at this time - but the numbers are growing. As usual Amiga owners are particularly well served in this regard, with Amiga based studios popping up everywhere like mushrooms, like Alternative Image of Leicester. They provide a service to put IFF format graphics onto 35mm slide and video. Other such services are appearing all the time, so watch

THE NEWTEK VIDEO TOASTER

Most people say that the technical advance which pushed the Mac into the lead in DTP was the development of the Laserwriter and Pagemaker software. The same people say that the Atari ST was really made by fitting MIDI ports and using Steinberg software. The one thing which could be the equivalent technical advance for the Amiga and DTV is the Video Toaster from NewTek of Topeka Kansas.

Newtek are famous for their digitiser DigiView and many other more advanced programs for the Amiga, but the Toaster is several orders of magnitude bigger than that. Take a seven input switch card, broadcast quality digital video effects, frame



grab and store, character generation, 24 bit frame buffer, 3D animation, and 24 bit paint capability, and stick them all on a card for about \$1,595. The unit began shipping on 3 October this year in the US in an NTSC version, so its full effect won't be seen for a few months yet, and a PAL version still more distant.

If it succeeds in delivering the quality of graphics needed by users of professional systems, it could change TV production, and the role of the Amiga in the marketplace, for ever.

A SHORT DTV GLOSSARY

The Amiga IFF standard file format for animations, usually a compressed series of IFF ILBM files.

BETAMAX

Or Beta for short. This used to be an alternative format to VHS, but VHS out-sold its machines and so video libraries now very rarely stock it, although blank tapes are still available.

EDIT LIST

A list of cuts in a film or video tape which using the SMPTE code runs an automated editing machine and assembles a piece of work with little or no human interference.

FRAME BUFFER

Essentially a huge chunk of memory for producing graphics at a higher resolution than usually possible.

GENLOCK

A simple device which allows the user to overlay computer graphics onto a live or taped TV picture.

A Quantel TV graphics computer which costs £200 per hour to rent, so goodness knows what they cost to buy.

High resolution U-Matic video tape.

Stands for Interchange File Format, usually referring (wrongly) to a standard bitmap picture file on the Amiga, more precisely called IFF ILBM files.

ILBM

Stands for InterLeaved BitMap, a bitmap graphic on the

IRIS

A high end graphics workstation.

LOW BAND

Low resolution U-Matic video tape.

Stands for Society of Motion Picture and TV Engineers, and is a special time code for linking any audio and vision in the professional world of movies and video.

S-VHS

Stands for Super VHS, a high quality version of VHS for use in pro and home environments. The high quality signal comes from coding the picture and colour info separately, reducing the degradation of the final image.

A professional cassette based videotape format for use in TV studios.

VHS

A cassette based videotape format for use in the home, which is generally the standard home video format, presumably until something more digital comes along.

VIDEO 8

A new home use cassette based videotape format, using cassettes no bigger than a normal audio cassette.







Which computer(s), if any, do you own? ...

urely all computer users have heard of Electronic Arts' *Deluxe Paint* graphics system? Since its release way back in 1985, *DPaint* has asserted itself as the premier paint system for personal computers. Amiga owners were the first to experience its state-of-the-art painting tools, closely followed by PC owners. Now - almost inevitably- it's out on the ST.

What makes *DPaint* so wonderful? Surely paintpackages are all basically the same - plop a pixel here,
draw a circle there, drop in a bit of colour and Bob's
your uncle! Not quite so - producing a decent paint
package is an art form in itself. *DPaint* has earned its
enviable reputation from its powerful, flexible and easy
to use painting tools. *DPaint* is one of the few paint systems that allows even talentless morons like myself to
produce decent artwork. (Well I think it's good!)

ARTISTECH TALENTS

The ST version of *DPaint* is based on the latest release (version 3) of *DPaint* for the Amiga. Surprisingly, ST *DPaint* wasn't written by the well known author of the PC and Amiga versions - Dan Silva - instead, EA drafted in the services of three talented programmers

NEW KING OF

After almost five years of existence, Electronic Arts' DPaint system has finally made it onto the ST. Amiganaut, Jason Holborn checks it out.

unique look and feel. It doesn't even take long to spot those changes - as soon as the program is loaded, they are more than evident.

The most noticeable change is that famous strip of icons that have become the trademark of *DPaint*. Instead of running down the right hand side of the screen, they've been relocated to run horizontally along the bottom of the screen. Most of the icons are identical to those in Amiga *DPaint*, but a re-organising of

the *DPaint* icon strip. Simply by clicking with the right mouse button on any one of the available icons brings up the sub menu for that icon. These sub menus contain all sorts of options for controlling *DPaint's* powerful painting tools. Virtually all of *DPaint's* tools can be customised in some way or another.

SCREEN SCENE

One of the biggest disappointments of ST *DPaint* is that it only runs in low resolution. Ok, low resolution is arguably the best mode for producing artwork, but why limit yourself? All of *DPaint*'s main rivals – *Flair Paint*, *Degas Elite*, etc - work in all three of the ST's screenmodes, so *DPaint* may find itself losing sales to this obvious oversight.


Thankfully though, *DPaint* does fully support the enhanced display hardware of the STE. If you're the owner of Atari's latest baby, then you can take advantage of the STE's 4096 colour palette – although you can obviously still only use sixteen on screen at once.

Colour control has always been a strong point of Deluxe Paint and the ST version certainly isn't any different. Palettes can be constructed in a number of ways. The most obvious (but not necessarily the easiest) way is to set up each colour register in turn by setting RGB (or HSV) sliders for that register. An easier way is to use DPaint's powerful 'spread' function which allows a range of colours to be set up simply by defining the colour of the first and last registers in the range. DPaint then does the hard work of calculating the shades in between.

THAT BIT BETTER

In terms of basic painting tools, *DPaint's* got the lot. You can draw freehand with any size of pixel brush, draw lines, bezier curves (even the Amiga version doesn't support these!), boxes, circles, fill an area with a colour of your choice, spray graffiti across your masterpiece with the airbrush . . . the list continues. But even withthese basic painting tools, *DPaint* still manages to handle them a bit better than the rest.

For starters, they can all be modified in some way

who collectively make up ArtisTech Developments, a development house which I'm sure ST owners will be hearing from a lot more in the future.

Instead of opting for a straight port from the Amiga (which wouldn't have necessarily have been a bad thing) ArtisTech decided instead to write ST *DPaint* from scratch, revising many of the program's functions in the process. As a result, the ST version has its own

That icon strip has become the workhorse of *DPaint*. All operations are now accessed from the *DPaint* icon strip - gone are the pull down menus of the original. All the functions that previously lived in pull down menus have been moved to sub menus which appear below

MOUSEY MATTERS

The one thing that lets ST DPaint down (and indeed any ST paint package) is the quality of the ST mouse – to call it rough would be paying it a compliment. It really is quite impossible to draw smoothly with the ST mouse; regardless of how steady your hand may be, the ST mouse seems to have a mind of its own.

If you're serious about your artwork, then treat yourself to one of the many alternative mice available for the Atari. I use a Naksha mouse - of all the mice I've ever had the pleasure of using, Naksha's unit wins hands down in terms of reliability, resolution and smoothness. Not only that, but the same mouse can also be used on both the ST and the Amiga. This is done by simply resetting a switch located on the mouse's underside.

ANIMATION

Animation is a relatively new addition to DPaint (Amiga owners didn't get it until version 3), but it still manages to hit the competition for six.

The DPaint animation system works on the same principle as the old flip books. By drawing each frame individually, the illusion of movement could be created by rapidly flicking through a large number of frames. You can create animation within DPaint by simply drawing each frame in turn, but this can be a laborious task.


To make things simpler, DPaint automates much of the process.

Just cut out the brush to be animated and then tell DPaint where and how you would like the brush to be moved through a specified number of frames. You can move the brush in 3D dimensions and even rotate it in true 3D perspective.

Simply by entering a couple of numbers, you can create such effects as spinning logos with unbelievable ease. For example, if you had a logo you wanted to send spinning into the distance, all you would have to do is enter something like '1000' for the Z distance, '360' for the Z rotation (this will make the logo rotate full circle as it moves away) and then click on 'DRAW' button - DPaint then generates your spinning logo in a matter of seconds. Fantastic or what?

Also included is a handy little utility to convert ST DPaint animations for use with the Amiga and PC versions of DPaint. At last you can swap not only pictures with your Amiga friend, but animations as well!

OF ST ART?

to offer greater flexibility. The airbrush isn't just limited to a single colour spray – you can have up to sixteen colours in your paint pot, varying the population (intensity) of each colour within the spray just by setting a few sliders.

For more precise editing, it's always nice to be able to zoom in on any section of a picture and edit on a pixel-by-pixel basis. DPaint uses a zoom window which is displayed below the icon strip. You don't even have to select this to use it - it's there as soon as you load the program (although it can be turned off if you need to view a larger section of your picture at once). Wherever you move the mouse pointer, the zoom window is sure to follow, updating the zoom display as it goes. Ok, nothing special so far, but what makes the DPaint zoom facility so wonderful is its speed. Most art packages tend to slow down terribly when moving about with a zoom window open, but DPaint handles this task without even a hint of things slowing down. Even when you move the mouse pointer across the screen at high speed, DPaint updates the zoom display at a phenomenal speed.

FONTASTIC COLOUR

One of the most interesting menus within *DPaint* is the FX menu. From here you can alter how *DPaint* lays down colour. As if you were working with 'real' paint or charcoal, you can smear pixels, blend them, smooth

them, overlay tints, plus a whole lot more besides. Degas has similar functions, but they're nowhere near as powerful as these.

Text control is superb - even the Amiga version could learn a thing or two from ST DPaint's powerful text facility. Most ST art packages limit you to the boring

ROM fonts, but *DPaint* offers a wide selection of its own custom fonts. However, what really makes them special is that they can contain up to 16 colours. These colour fonts are great for desktop video – imagine having at your disposal a selection of fonts that look as if they are

BRUSH STROKES

Messing about with brushes is the thing that DPaint does best. Any section of the screen can be picked up and used directly as a brush for painting. Unlike most packages that treat brushes as simple rectangles of colour, the background can be made transparent, therefore allowing you to grab irregular shaped brushes.

Once you've got your brush, you can do all sorts of wonderful things with it. At the simplest level, you can just paint, but DPaint offers so much more. It can also be used as a fill pattern for tools such as fill (obviously), circle, box etc. Brushes can also be distorted in a number of ways including skewing, rotating, shrinking and doubling and halving in size.

Unfortunately, even with these relatively powerful tools, brush manipulation isn't a patch on the Amiga version. Amiga owners can perform perspective rotation of a brush, map a brush onto any irregularly shaped area of colour, plus a whole lot more besides. Although ST DPaint offers perspective rotation with its animation facility, it doesn't offer anything like the scope of brush manipulation facilities available to Amiga DPaint users.

made of different materials – gold, granite, glass, etc. With colour fonts, all this is possible. Even if you're not happy with the fonts that EA provide, you can create your own from within *DPaint*. An edit sub menu allows you to build up entirely new font sets by drawing each character on the screen, cutting it out as a brush and then storing it as a character within the font being edited. You can alter the position of the baseline and even the font's kerning (spacing) type.

FUN WITH FORMATS

DPaint supports both Neochrome and Degas file formats, so you can import your existing artwork into the program for further editing without having to mess around with PD utilities such as PicSwitch. Surprisingly, DPaint's native file format isn't an ST file-format at all. Instead, EA has wisely built in support for Amiga IFFILBM files, which means that not only are the pictures that ST DPaint produces compatible with Amiga and PC DPaint, but you can also load pictures from those machines into ST DPaint. Obviously you can't load an Amiga 32 colour picture, but any picture with no more than sixteen colours should load fine. If only everything was as simple as this!

So is *DPaint* the ultimate ST paint system? It sure is. If you can live without high or medium resolution painting (which isn't really too much of a loss anyway), then *DPaint* is quite simply the most powerful ST paint package available – it lacks in some areas, but more than makes up for them in others. Even if you already own an ST paint package, you'd be foolish to miss out on this remarkable paint system. Put simply, no other paint system even comes close.

REVIEW

HARD COPY

t's ten years since the first photocopier and a good many more since the first commercial examples of xerography. When the first colour machine appeared some three years ago it was a slow, heavy, cumbersome beast that needed the regular delicate touch of a dedicated engineer and the budget of a small republic to run.

Things have changed and the beast is now a more manageable size, is user friendly enough to let all the staff loose on it and more over, costs a lot less. It was only a matter of time before someone took the scanning and printing abilities of the copier and mated that with the processing power and graphics manipulation abilities of a computer. At a recent update show on the Canon CLC500, we expected to see a working copier and interface and perhaps a computer to show it off. Instead, Canon provided acres of machines, a choice of several computers from a PC, to a Macintosh to a Workstation and brought software developers who had written software and connected the kit to the machines.

A PICTURE IS WORTH . . .

The technology involved in colour photocopying no longer causes gasps or lives on the secrets list, but to take the copier which is analogue and standardise an interface with the digital world of computing is a race that Canon started, ran and won. The company now dominates more than 75% of the world copier market.

A light grey box, the size of a fat PC tower system sits alongside the copier. A card inside this box contains the clever stuff that takes the scanning and printing abilities of the copier and adds the computing power to make 400x400 dpi imaging possible.


The interface was designed with the use of third party developers in mind and on the day of the launch there were over a dozen different programs and peripherals attached.

Canon linked a still video camera to the interface via the stills player, for the purpose of the demonstration, photos were taken on the camera, the disk was placed in the player and after being displayed on a screen for checking and editing, the image was printed from the copier as a full colour picture. Canon has developed devices to allow a transparency to be printed in this way too, but the most exciting was a peripheral that allowed real time grabbing and storing of image from 35mm cine film.

To demonstrate the versatility of the system, the 400dpi colour images could be printed to a thermal transfer medium and 'ironed' on to any handy fabric. Existing artwork, magazine illustrations, paintings, logos and even fabric were scanned in and printed out on to thermal transfer media (T Shirts with Ed and Tech Ed pix for sale!).

DEVELOPMENTS AHOY

Because the Canon system uses a standard interface, developers have been able to work around machines and software that they are already familiar with, config-



uring existing systems to work with the Canon Copier and developing new systems that are compatible with existing ones.

At simplest, the colour copier appears as a very clever colour graphics printer with scanning abilities.attached to a computer. Most developers, however, take the opinion that it is an important node to an interactive system.

For instance, a textile designer can run a suite of software on a Macintosh designed to take different designs and textures of cloth and make multiple matches without having to go through the expensive

business of weaving and printing. A full colour image of a model can have the cloth and texture of the dress mixed and matched in design, shading and fabric, and the results printed out. These results can be a simple sample of what the cloth will look like or even multiple pictures of the model wearing the finished product for comparison.

The software can tell the difference in texture

between,for example, cotton and wool and offer a realistic image accordingly. As well as its obvious uses in design studios, in its present form it could scan in an image of a room and allow the operator to overlay different fabrics for drapes, wallpapers and paint colours. With minimal development, it could be transformed into a full environment where colour and texture can match everything from the car to the kitchen.

PUBLISHER'S CHOICE

Desk top publishing gains a new directness with the Canon system - taking away the time consuming and expensive jobs previously handled by colour reproduction companies.

Any image can be scanned, edited and printed. using still video cameras – it's possible to take pictures and port them straight into a document which can then be printed. Cine and Video film can be scanned and pictures digitised in real time to disk storage.

A company that couldn't consider a short run colour document because of the time and cost involved will now benefit from the ability to produce snappy full colour presentations in-house. The colour copier, with its ability to repro six pages a minute, means immediate decisions can be made from full scale colour proofs.

THE FUTURE

With the equipment that's now available, a room 10'x10' is large enough for a design studio, editorial, artwork, repro and proof output. One person can finally handle every facet of full colour publishing from one desk.

The open system with its machine compatible interface means that more applications will bolt on to the equipment. The system that includes the necessary interface, processing modules and copier weighs in at £43,000. Of that, around £12,000 is for the copier/scanner. The rest is for the processor and modules.

So far, over a dozen developers have wheeled in their equipment to give an exciting idea a healthy start. There is nothing with which to compare its price to and the value of the equipment that it can replace can be measured in the hundreds of thousands.


