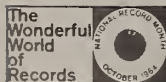

The naming of October as National Record Month is a spotlight on the industry long overdue. Monthly promotions are nothing new to the business—a month long consumer tribute to its product is.

And what a product it is! If it were only for music, the record would stand as one of man's greatest miracles in the mass dissemination of a great art. But the area covered by recordings is so vast today, that even one who detests music can be indebted to its existence.

The span of this existence is nearing the 100 year mark, exactly 75 years, if we start with the introduction of the first conventional type "Disk" in 1889. It's hard to imagine that recordings, so in tune with today's electronic miracles, were born in the Victorian Age.

Only the telephone, perhaps, can stand beside recordings as the oldest mechanical-electronic invention whose physical characteristics have remained essentially unchanged almost from the time it was ready for public use—and is still a major factor in our daily lives.

But, like the telephone, we are apt to take recordings for granted. Few of us are old enough to have lived at a time when both the telephone and the record were NOT miracles taken for granted.

National Record Month will have achieved its purpose, we believe, if many who see its poster or logo are prompted to stop for a moment and reflect on the joy and satisfaction that have become so readily available to them through records.

Though intended for the general public, National Record Month can also make its mark on the trade itself, with the realization, so often lost in the day to day rush to bring disks to market, that it is producing merchandise that can enrich the lives of its purchasers.

The record industry deserves a National Record Month, not just this year, but every year. The Record Industry Association Of America (RIAA) deserves the gratitude of the industry for the sponsorship (without regard to membership in the organization and on behalf of the entire business) of National Record Month.

Senator Hartke Speaks of Phonograph Record's Educational Qualities in Effort To Prevent Contemplated Rise in Rates of Mailing Disks

NEW YORK—It must have been most gratifying to everyone in the business who heard or read about Senator Vance Hartke's (Ind.) comments on the record industry. The Senator was speaking on the Senate floor recently in defense of the phonograph record as an item of educational value so that records may continue to be mailed around the country under the reduced "educational material" postal rate. He aimed his remarks at the Post Office Department which has been contemplating revising the postage rates on records because they feel that records represent entertainment value only, rather than educational value.

Senator Hartke's statement follows:

"Mr. President, it may come as a surprise to some of my colleagues to learn that the State of Indiana is now one of the major centers of phonograph-record production in the world. Three of the major manufacturers of phonograph records employ ap-

proximately 16,000 citizens of Indiana, in plants located in Bloomington, Indianapolis, Marion, Terre Haute, Monticello, and Richmond.

"Naturally, it is disturbing to these fine people and to me to learn that the Post Office Department is contemplating the arbitrary act of revising the postage rates on phonograph records, on the ground that they represent entertainment value only, rather than educational value.

"Mr. President, I find the reasoning of the postal officials absurd.

"For many years, phonograph records have played an increasingly important role in the education of our young. They have been a major tool in the development of language skills among students of all ages.

"From a cultural point of view, the manufacturers of phonograph records have been responsible for raising the entire national level in connection with the appreciation and the performance of classical music. Our libraries of recorded music form a panorama of the talents and the tastes of our generation. They will be one of the major sources by which future generations will be able to judge the quality of our culture and our civilization.

"In relatively recent years, the recording companies have made the most brilliant theatrical performances of our time available in permanent form throughout the entire world.

"What would not our students of the theater give, for instance, to be able to hear the great actors of the past play their most famous roles? What would they not give to hear Garrick, Irving, Booth, Ellen Terry, Duse, Bernhardt, and all the rest of the dramatic geniuses of the ages in their prime? But the recording companies of this age have made and are making it possible for future generations to hear the geniuses of our generation exactly as they portrayed the classical and contemporary roles in our dramatic repertory. No future historian will ever have to wonder and surmise about the talents of Gielgud, Olivier, Lunt and Fontaine, Edith Evans, and all the other performers whom we consider great. The recording companies have caught all these performers at the height of their powers, and have frozen their greatness into permanence.

"Mr. President, this is not only an educational service, it is one of the

very highest forms of educational service. The recording companies, through what they are achieving today, are enriching the education of generations to come, in a way that never before was possible.

"I invite my colleagues to visit my office. We have arranged there a display of albums of records manufactured in Indiana. I defy anyone to look at that display and deny that its value is just as educational as the displays to be found in any bookstore or in any news agent's store.

"The recording industry has had a hard economic struggle against the competition of television and radio. It has survived in that struggle, mostly because of the educational values, of a permanent nature, which it has created.

"The makers of phonograph records, Mr. President, deserve from the Post Office Department the same consideration that all other manufacturers of educational devices receive. I sincerely hope the Post Office Department will not persist in the arbitrary and ill-considered plan to discriminate against these manufacturers.

"A statement prepared by the general counsel of the Record Industry Association of America, Mr. Edward S. Meyers, will be of interest to my colleagues; and I ask unanimous consent that it be included in the RECORD as a part of my remarks."

With no objections, Meyers' statement was ordered to be printed in the Record. The lawyer's comments delineated the educational merit of records in various market categories.

Kicking-off with a discussion of language records Meyers noted: "Records have long been accepted as the best way to learn a foreign language.

A fast-shrinking world brought closer together by vast improvements in transportation and communications has wrought a phenomenal upsurge of foreign language study in the U.S. Meyers went on to point out that these disks offer English courses for the non-native born and also aid children with speech impediments.

The attorney put special emphasis on the value of recorded drama and literature. According to Meyers, these disks are, in many cases, tailor-made for the serious student of drama. In highlighting the growth of this

United Artists Buys Lionel Bart's "Maggie May" For Movie

NEW YORK — "Maggie May," the new musical by Lionel Bart and Alun Owen which opened to rave reviews in London last week, has already been purchased for the screen by United Artists and Brookfield Productions. Brookfield is the producing firm owned by Peter Sellers and John Brian.

Sellers will produce "Maggie May," and United Artists will distribute the film in the U.S. and issue the soundtrack album. Still in the planning stages, no dates for production of the film, or its release, have been announced.

Although no plans have been announced for a Broadway production of the hit show, Bart's smash hit, "Oliver," which is still running on Broadway, was produced in this country by David Merrick, and a similar arrangement for "Maggie May" is a possibility.

In the LP's in this year's program are: "Merry Christmas In Carols," "We Wish You A Merry Christmas," and "For The Whole Family At Christmas." Custom-tailored merchandising aids for the Rheims lines is available from Liberty salesmen.

NARA's Dave Dixon Dies

CHICAGO—Dave Dixon, president of the National Association of Radio Announcers and program director of KATZ in St. Louis, died in a St. Louis hospital (19) as a result of injuries received in an auto mishap. He was 38 years old.

A requiem high mass was conducted for Dixon last week (24) in St. Marks Roman Catholic Church (St. Louis) which was followed by burial services in a St. Louis cemetery.

Dixon is survived by his wife Corinne; children Catherine and Dave Jr.; his mother Mrs. Evelyn Dixon; and a brother Jerome Dixon.

9 New Camden Oct. LP's

NEW YORK—RCA Camden will offer three popular and six children's albums in Oct. The pop trio includes "Original Recordings By Great Bands Of Our Times," "Have I Told You Lately That I Love You" by Jim Reeves, and "Living Guitars Shindig."

The kiddie sets are Dr. Seuss Presents "Horton Hatches The Egg—The Sneetches & other stories with Marvin Miller, "Jack & The Beanstalk & Other Stories" with Shari Lewis, "The Hector Heathcote Show"—Orig TV soundtrack, Walt Disney's "Johnny Appleseed and Pecos Bill" with Dennis Day, Roy Rogers & Sons of Pioneers, "I Like Holidays" by Tom Glazer, and "Hardtack (He's A Fine Old Engine) and Famous American Railroad Songs"—Gil Mack, Art Malvin, Mary Mayo.

Vee Jay Gets Exclusive U.S. Rights To Honeycombs Decks

HOLLYWOOD—Jay Lasker, executive vice president of Vee Jay Records, has announced that the label has secured exclusive U.S. rights to all product forthcoming from the Honeycombs, the click British group currently represented on the charts with "Have I The Right."

Louis Benjamin, managing director of Pye Records in England, visited here last week to complete negotiations and sign the contracts with Vee Jay. Included in the deal were release rights for Vee Jay on another British group, the Takers, and their current English hit, "If You Don't Come Back." Benjamin also brought tapes along for a debut LP by the Honeycombs.

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Johnny Pate Joins ABC-Par's A&R Staff

NEW YORK—Johnny Pate has been named to the A&R staff of ABC-Paramount Records, it was announced last week by Sam Clark, the label's president. Pate will headquarter in Chicago, where he has been active for some time as an arranger.

Pate, who is remembered for his hit, "Swinging Shepherd Blues," on the King label some years ago, has been responsible for arranging all of the Impressions' hits for ABC-Par, in addition to arranging duties for Jerry Butler and Betty Everett, Gene Chandler, Major Lance, Joe Williams and the late Dinah Washington.

One of the executive's activities will be the scouting of new talent for the diskery. He has recently signed a group called the Marvelos, which will record for the label in the near future. Reporting to Sid Feller, ABC-Par's A&R director, Pate will also function as an artist for the company.

Hess New Amy-Mala Sales Mgr.; DeMann Duties Expanded

The expansion accompanies the rapid growth that the company has had over the past year with many singles successes and the entry into the LP field.

CAPITOL'S FISCAL '63-'64 BEST YEAR IN HISTORY

HOLLYWOOD—Sales of Capitol Records for the fiscal year ended last June 30 reached the highest level in the label's 22-year history.

Glenn E. Wallichs, chairman of the board and chief executive officer, disclosed last week that Capitol's net sales totalled \$57,460,133, an increase of \$8,855,187 over the previous fiscal year. Net income for the year was \$1,952,533, an increase of \$951,517 over the previous year. Earnings amounted to \$4.24 per share of common stock outstanding at June 30 compared to last year's \$2.17 per share.

In a letter to Capitol stockholders, Wallichs commented:

"As was the case for most English-speaking countries, 1963-1964 was for Capitol the 'Year of The Beatles.' With an unbroken string of million-selling albums and singles, the phenomenal British foursome became the fastest-selling artists in the history of the American record industry. With The Beatles leading the way, Capitol clearly dominated the American singles market, with four different records achieving No. 1 chart status.

"Equally impressive was Capitol's performance in the album field. Besides the ubiquitous Beatles, a dozen artists were represented on the best-seller charts: The Beach Boys, Nat King Cole, Dick Dale, Bobby Darin, Judy Garland, Jackie Gleason, Peggy Lee, The Lettermen, Al Martino, Wayne Newton, Peter & Gordon and Nancy Wilson.

"During the year, Capitol made further progress in the important Broadway-show field through the acquisition of original-cast rights to one of the season's biggest hits, 'Funny Girl,' featuring Barbra Streisand. For next season, Capitol has already obtained rights to two extremely promising musicals, 'Golden Boy,' starring Sammy Davis, Jr., and 'Ben Franklin In Paris,' starring Robert Preston.

"Similarly, Angel Records enjoyed a year of notable achievement. Among the outstanding releases were the complete Beethoven piano sonatas as performed by Arthur Schnabel; 'Great Voices Of The Century,' a

collection of vocal performances that achieved best-seller status on 'pop' charts; and a number of complete-opera recordings, including 'Andrea Chenier' and 'Samson & Delilah,' that drew unanimous praise from critics and consumers alike.

"The past fiscal year saw Capitol terminate its activities in the electronics field through the sale of this aspect of its business. Despite significant sales for the three-year-old electronics division, Capitol's management determined to withdraw from this highly competitive field.

"Prospects for the new fiscal year are bright, with new product from both domestic and overseas sources finding immediate success and enabling Capitol to maintain its substantial position in both the single-record and album markets."

Bob Skaff Promoted

HOLLYWOOD—Bob Skaff, vice-president and general manager of Imperial Records has earned VP stripes in the entire Liberty organization, it was announced last week by Alvin S. Bennett, the label's topper.

According to Bennett, the new assignment expands Skaff's duties to include overall supervision of the A&R and promotion departments for the whole firm. Liberty's executive A&R director Don Blocker and promotion head, Bob Fead, will not be affected although other department heads will coordinate all activities with Skaff.

"In little more than a year, Imperial has chalked up an amazing growth record under the aggressive leadership of Robert Skaff," said Bennett. "For this reason, we believe his talents should not be limited to one facet of our organization."

Skaff joined Liberty four years ago as a promotion man. Shortly thereafter he became national promotion director—an assignment which lasted three years. In late 1963, he was upped to general manager of the newly-acquired Imperial label and in early '64, following a series of important strides, he was upped to vice-president.

Vee Jay Sets Push On New Gospel LP's

HOLLYWOOD—Bill Siegel, national sales director for Vee Jay Records, has announced that the label is readying an eight-album gospel release slated for Oct. 1. The label, which has more than 30 spiritual and gospel artists on its talent roster, is preparing a "sampler" album to introduce the artists featured in the eight new sets.

The Oct. entries are "Soul Of The Patterson Singers," "Let's Go To Church Together," "The Soul Of Charles Taylor," "The Soul Of The Argo Singers," "The Soul Of The Gospel Harmonettes," "The Soul Of The Thompson Community Singers," "Wonderful Memories From The Family Prayer Book," and "Come Closer To God."

"Fiddler On The Roof"— A Hurricane On Broadway

NEW YORK—"Fiddler On The Roof," the new Zero Mostel musical, opened on Broadway last week with the force of a Fall hurricane and heralded the new musical theater season with one of the brightest and most widely acclaimed shows to bow in many a year. The new Bock and Harnick show has been likened to "How To Succeed," "Hello, Dolly" and "Funny Girl" in importance and projected box-office receipts.

The New York Times reported that following the opening, lines of ticket-seekers converged upon the box-office of the Imperial Theater and that police barricades had to be set up to allow entrance into the neighboring Piccadilly Hotel. Carl Fisher, general manager for producer Harold Prince, estimated that advance sales have topped the \$650,000 mark and that Broadway ticket brokers are complaining loudly over the few tickets available to them.

RCA Victor Records, which did not invest in the show, (an unusual situation by today's standards is reported to have paid a higher royalty fee for the original cast rights. Victor etched the album this past weekend (27) at the Webster Hall studios, and is expected to rush the package into release by this week (Oct. 1). For the label, the instant success of "Fiddler" portends a cast album of major significance with heavy sales guaranteed as soon as the LP is issued.

"Fiddler," with a book by Joseph Stein who adapted it from stories by Sholem Aleichem, has a score by

Jerry Bock and Sheldon Harnick who have garnered raves in the past for the "Fiorello" of a few years ago, "She Loves Me" of last season, and for the New York World's Fair production, "To Broadway With Love," which closed only because of poor Fair attendance. The score is published by Tommy Valando's Sunbeam Music, BMI's most prolific publisher of show music to date. Sunbeam has published all of the earlier Harnick and Bock shows including "Tenderloin" and "Body Beautiful."

The show's star, Zero Mostel, fast becoming one of the foremost performing names in the world of musical comedy, was a driving force in his last show, "A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum," and has been acclaimed by the critics as a major contributor to the success of "Fiddler On The Roof."

The major backers of the show, as reported in the New York Times, are the First Theater Investing Service (\$71,000), Morton Mitosky (\$22,500), and Anthony Brady Farrell (\$22,500) retired producer and former owner of the Mark Hellinger Theater. Profit splits and fees include a fee of \$10,000, 15 percent of the profits and 3 percent of the gross to Jerome Robbins for staging and choreography; \$4,000 a week to Mostel against 10 percent of the gross and a 2 percent royalty from the album. Stein, Bock and Harnick will share 10 percent of the gross and 3 percent of the profits.

RCA Victor Unveils 31 LP's For Oct.

NEW YORK—RCA Victor will release 31 new albums for Oct., plus the original cast album of the new Broadway smash, "Fiddler On The Roof," which was cut last week (27) and is being rushed into release to highlight Oct. product.

The 12 new popular sets are "Frankie Carie Plays The Big Imported Hits," "The Worth Is Yet To Come" by Stan Worth, "In A Young Mood" with the Marty Gold Orch., "The Ed Ames Album," "David Merrick Presents Hits From His Broadway Hits" with John Gary, Ann-Margret, Merrill-Staton voices, "Fractured Folk Songs" by Homer and Jethro, "The Travelin' Bare," by Bobby Bare, "Sam Cooke At The Copa," "Fess Parker Sings About Daniel Boone, Davy Crockett, Abe Lincoln," "Original Music From The Rogues," Nelson Riddle Orch., "Dracula's Greatest Hits" by Gene Moss, and "Small Wonder" with Rita Pavone.

The sacred release includes "Silver Saxophones Play The Golden Hymns," Darol Rice, "Doris Akers and The Statesmen Quartet Sing For You," and "The Blackwood Brothers Present Their Exciting Tenor Bill Shaw."

Two new sets have been added to the Vintage series catalog with "Smoky Mountain Ballads" by various artists, and "Stomp And Joys" by Jelly Roll Martin.

Entries from the Red Seal division are Shakespeare's Othello with Laurence Olivier; "Humoresque" with Leonard Pennario; "Italian Arias" by Vickers, & Serafin; "The World's Greatest Marches" with Leinsdorf/Boston Symp. & Fiedler/Boston Pops; "A Ceremony Of Carols/Rejoice In The Lamb/Festival Te Deum"—Robert Shaw Chorale; "Songs Of Faith And Inspiration"—Robert Shaw Chorale; "Amahl & The Night Visitors"—original cast of '63 NBC-TV; "Songs At Eventide"—Anderson, Bennett; "Peter And The Commissar/Variations on 'How Dry I Am/The End Of A Symphony'"—Allan Sherman, Arthur Fiedler; Rigolotto—Verdi with Moffo, Merrill & others.

RCA Victrola, the label's low-priced classical line, will offer "Finlandia & Other Favorites by Sibelius & Grieg"—Mackerras, London Proms Orch; Beethoven's "Symphony No. 6" with Montieux and Vienna Philharmonic, Ravel's "Concerto In G" and "Concerto No. 2 by Prokofieff"—Munch/Boston Symp.; and Donizetti's "Lucia Di Lammermoor" with Peters, Pearce, Tozzi, Maero and Leinsdorf.

Columbia To Etch "Bajour"

NEW YORK—Columbia Records will record the original cast LP of the new Broadway musical, "Bajour," according to an announcement by Goddard Lieberman, president of the diskery.

"Bajour," with music and lyrics by Walter Marks, is based on the Ernest Kinoy adaptation of Joseph Mitchell's 'New Yorker' stories dealing with gypsy life in New York. Produced by Edward Padula in conjunction with Carroll and Harrie Masterson and Norman Twain, the musical will star Chita Rivera, Nancy Dussault and Herschel Bernardi, and co-star Robert Burr and Mae Questel with Gus Trikonis.

Currently in rehearsal, "Bajour" will open out-of-town at the Shubert Theatre in Boston (Oct. 12-24), followed by an engagement at the Shubert Theatre in Phila. (Oct. 28- Nov. 14).

The show's Broadway premiere will take place at the Shubert Theatre on Nov. 23.

Brenda Lee's English Hit Issued By Decca For U.S.

NEW YORK—Decca Records has released, "It It True" by Brenda Lee for the American market as a result of the deck's success in England. The tune was cut in England and went top 20 on the British charts within two weeks.

The diskery has announced that samples and stock have been shipped to dealers and stations around the country in anticipation of heavy demand for the deck.

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PLATTER SPINNER PATTERN

In a formal letter to the Beatles' manager Brian Epstein, WWDC-Washington personality Carroll James has proposed that the British vocal foursome return to Washington in the near future and appear there for the benefit of the John F. Kennedy Center For the Performing Arts. In a recent special interview, the deejay posed the question to Beatle Paul McCartney and the quartet's press officer, Derek Taylor. Both Englishmen seemed more than interested but would not commit a definite answer to the proposal. James indicated in his letter to Epstein that perhaps the Beatles could return to Washington (where they performed their first 'live' American concert in Feb.) not necessarily for another concert, but for a charity party with the entire proceeds going to the JFK Center Fund. Phillip J. Mullin, administrative officer for the Center, stated he felt the idea could easily be the means for raising a large sum for the Fund. Mullin says that at present the Fund is shooting for about \$5 million more to assure all administrative costs, since the U.S. Government is matching only contributions that go specifically for construction costs of the Center. James offered to head a Citizen's Committee on this project to get the ball rolling. At present, he is awaiting reply to the correspondence mailed to Epstein.

WIBC-Indianapolis' Jim Shelton knew he had a hot item on his hands when he read an item called "Strange As It Sounds" during his program and the phone lit up. Five follow-up mentions on his "Pick-A-Pocket" and "Tello-Test" programs resulted in

more than 4,600 requests for a copy of the mailing piece, each accompanied by at least one stamped self-addressed envelope. Many enclosed several envelopes so that copies could be sent to friends and relatives. The piece is based on an amazing set of co-incidences surrounding the deaths of John F. Kennedy and Abraham Lincoln. At last count, more than 10,000 copies had been distributed by mail or by Shelton at his remote broadcasts.

Cordic is observing a decade-long association as the morning personality on the outlet with a daily, zany give-away which will run for ten consecutive days. Among the prizes to be awarded are: a private catered screening of the winner's favorite movie; Christmas shopping for ten names on the winner's gift list (with KDKA selecting, purchasing, wrapping and delivering the gifts); free rental, for ten hours, of anything from furs to a limousine.

Often, something that has been done before can be done again—profitably. WFLA-Tampa-St. Petersburg was reminded of this recently. Hurricanes were very much in evidence all around Florida and, of course, the station spent much air time alerting its listeners to the possible dangers.

Coordinates for locating the storms were frequently given. From phone calls the station soon determined that many listeners would like to track the storm paths but had no suitable map. WFLA had sent out hurricane tracking charts before but had not done so for some time so they hurriedly got one out. The station's "Hurricane Information and Tracking Chart" contains not only a handy map for tracking the storms, but a wealth of hurricane information and a listing of life-saving hurricane precautions. WFLA is supplying these booklets free to listeners, and there's been a huge mail response. Just goes to prove that the promotion you're looking for right now may be one you did five years ago and then forgot about.

Jack Eno, who spins 'em on WEBR-Buffalo, recently played a record for a listener and was thanked with a ten pound lollipop, mounted on a mop handle. It was agreed by his nine children that the giant sucker was even too much for them to eat so Jack, the lollipop and a pile of albums are heading for the new School for Retarded Children in West Seneca, a Buffalo suburb for a special lollipop-eating party. His two youngest children will make the presentation.

KSFO-San Francisco's Al Collins recently served as master of ceremonies for an all-star CORE benefit concert at SF's Masonic Auditorium. Among the headliners on the bill were Dizzy Gillespie, Bill Cosby, Carol Sloane and Vince Guaraldi.

When the Allegheny County Fair recently opened in steel town, KQV-Pittsburgh drove right to the heart of the activities. Highlighting its participation were live broadcasts from the KQVehicle during the entire 5-day run of the Fair and a special "Find The Emperor" Contest. Each day station personalities Steve Rizen, Dave Scott, Don Shafer, Keeve Beraman and Chuck Brinckman were at the Fair site with records and on-the-spot accounts of the excitement at Pennsylvania's largest outdoor show.

Located in the center of the exhibits and displays the vehicle served as a top reporter as well as main attraction. The week preceding the Fair, the outlet's morning deejay Hal Murray had announced that he would "mingle with the masses" two days of the Fair. The first person who recognized him each day would receive \$100, if properly identified with the exact words: "Are you KQV Radio's Emperor Murray?" The catch, however, was that Murray was disguised as a commoner. In workman's clothes and bushy wig, the Emperor paraded through the Fair grounds stroking his mustache and listening to visitors around him asking the question. Eventually, he was identified.

Windy climbed aboard the big wheel one Sunday AM and rode continuously until the following Sunday, accumulating 183 hours round and round and round. Under the rules established by others of this ilk, Windy was allowed a five-minute break every five hours. Craig sent back live progress reports every half hour to his fellow WOLF platter spinners via wireless microphone.

Martha Crane, director of women's programs for WLS-Chicago, recently addressed the wives of the International City Managers Association during their annual conference at the Windy City's Sherman House.

BIOS FOR DEEJAYS

J. Frank Wilson



J. Frank Wilson, who is currently zooming up the charts in his "Last Kiss" teaming up with the Cavaliers on the Josie label, was born 23 years ago in Lufkin, Texas. He grew up in the East Texas lumbering town and graduated from the local high school. Shortly after graduation, J. Frank joined the U. S. Air Force. During his career with the Air Force, J. Frank was stationed at San Angelo, Texas and became lead vocalist with a group called the Cavaliers. With the group he played school proms and teen dances and soon became the number one attraction in the entire area.

After his discharge from the service, J. Frank opted to stay in show biz. For eighteen months things were rough. Then, in the spring of 1964, things began to happen. Indie producer Sonley Rush dug the guys and recorded some tunes with them.

Enter; Major Bill Smith, an associate of Roush's, who took J. Frank's demo, which just happened to be "Last Kiss," to Josie Records. The rest is history.

Hondells



The driving force behind the Hondells, who are presently clicking with "Little Honda," is a 25-year-old young man named Richie Burns. Richie began to take life and a career very seriously at the age of 10 when he formed his first music group at his grade school in Bethesda, Maryland.

In high school Richie, who not only sings but plays bass, guitar and piano, continued his musical activities with a group that performed at school functions, private parties and charity bazaars. After high school, he attended the University of Maryland.

But a music career still tempted him and finally he headed for Southern California in 1962, where he became a familiar face performing at fraternity and sorority parties at USC and UCLA.

Richie became friends with Indie producer Nick Venet, who asked Richie to work with him on an album of hot rod tunes. He agreed, and the LP enjoyed moderate success.

Then the Honda craze hit. Venet contacted Mercury. Would they be interested in a Honda record? The answer was yes, and Richie quickly contacted three friends, Wayne Edwards, David Hager, and Terry Davis, to form the Hondells. Their first cut effort was "Little Honda."

THE JUDY COLLINS CONCERT—Elektra EKL 280

Judy Collins established among America's top-rung folksingers after her concert last spring in Gotham's Town Hall. Elektra perfectly captures the pulse and spirit of the concert with this fine album boasting a rich sampling of the songs she sung that night. The lark-guitarist's sensitive rich voice and lyrical delivery shines as she delivers "My Ramblin' Boy," "The Lonesome Death Of Hattie Carroll" and "Bottle Of Wine." Plenty of potential here.

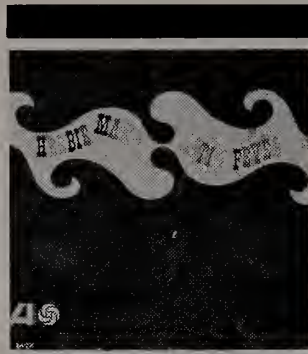
INSIDE DAVE VAN RONK—Prestige FL 14025

HAWAII KAI—The Waikikis—Kapp KL 1366

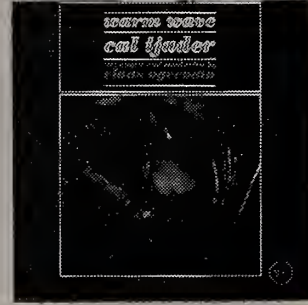

WARM WAVE—Cal Tjader—Verve V 8585

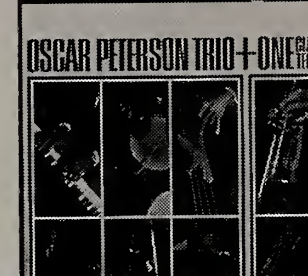

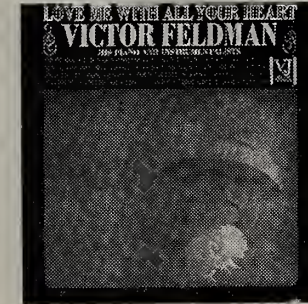
GREAT SCOTT—Shirley Scott Trio—Impulse A-67

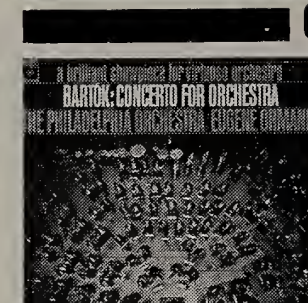
OSCAR PETERSON TRIO + ONE CLARK TERRY—Mercury SR 60975

The Met soprano is surrounded by a fine cast that includes Cesare Valletti, Rosalind Elias, Fernando Corena and Renato Cesari. Excellent performances by the principals make for superb opera listening.

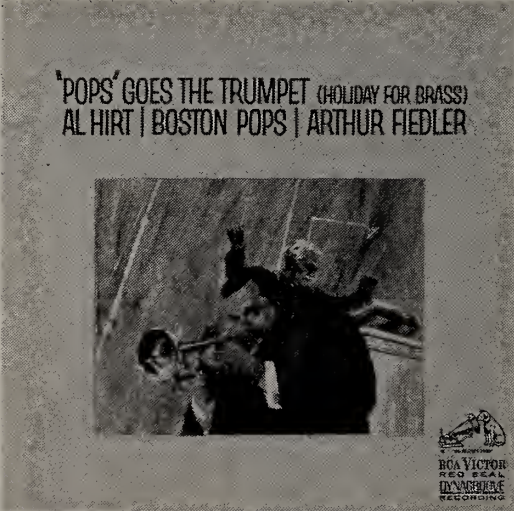

It was Dean who named Acuff as the King Of Country Music.

Ott Devine, manager of the Opry, announced that a special presentation would be made to Dean at WSM's official opening breakfast, Fri., Nov. 6 in the Music City.

UA Appoints Dick Forster To Supervise Coast Promo



NEW YORK—Dick Forster has been named west coast promotion man for United Artists Records, it was announced last week by Si Mael, veep and general manager of the label.

Forster is a veteran of five years in the music biz and for the past two years has had his own record promotion organization in San Francisco and numbered UA and Jubilee among his accounts. Prior to this, he served as a regional sales manager for Jubilee in the southwest.

Forster's duties with UA are three-fold. He will be promoting singles product in the west for the company, working closely with national singles sales manager, Andy Miele, and national promotion director, David Greenman. He will serve as a sales rep under the supervision of album sales manager, Joe Berger, and he'll also be seeking masters for UA and its subsidiary labels.

The appointment is effective Oct. 5, and Forster will headquarter in San Francisco.

Tribute To Youmans LP Issued By Evergreen

NEW YORK—"Through The Years With Vincent Youmans" a new album on the Evergreen Label produced by Bill Borden and Steve Marvin for their own company, Monmouth Records, Inc., has been released to coincide with the birthdate of the late composer who was born Sept. 27, 1898.

A tribute to Youmans, the album contains 36 songs arranged chronologically and spanning his song writing years, 1921 to 1933. It includes 10 songs recorded in full for the first time.

Millie Slavin, Ellie and Bob Quint, and Nolan Van Way are the performing artists with Paul Trueblood as musical director and arranger. Stanley Green, author of "The World of Musical Comedy" provided the program notes.

NEW YORK — "A Hard Day's Night," the smash Beatles soundtrack LP, this week becomes the second Beatles album to spend 11 consecutive weeks in the #1 spot on the Cash Box chart. The previous LP to accomplish the feat was "Meet The Beatles," which first hit the chart Feb. 8th. Since that date, the Beatles have occupied 26 out of the 35 weeks with their LP's. The two LP's above as well as "The Beatles' Second Album" accounted for the accomplishment. The only other albums to break into the #1 slot were the "Hello, Dolly" original caster and the Louis Armstrong "Dolly" LP.

ASCAP Symposium Focuses On Folk And C&W Music

NEW YORK—The differences and similarities between folk and country music were recently discussed (17) at the second session of the ASCAP Symposium on American Music at Judson Hall, this city. The panel consisted of composers Teddy Bart and Fred Hellerman, arranger Milt Okun and RCA Victor A&R producer Brad McCuen.

The panelists agreed that both country and folk music derive from traditional forms of spontaneous song making, both have a simplicity of form, and both use words that are easily understood. But, as Okun pointed out, country music was being written down as a commercial product long before there was any effort to compose original folk songs. In the view of McCuen, one particular distinction is that very often folk songs are concerned with general themes, such as social injustice, while country music sentiments are usually limited to more individual personal emotions. Hellerman thought too that what determines a folk song or a country song often depends on the way the song is performed, and who performs it. It was Bart's belief that country music would always have a wider appeal than folk music because it is less complicated than the folk music heard today. He also questioned the existence of any identifiable "Nashville Sound."

New Label & Pubbery Formed in New Jersey

NEW YORK—Norman Seldin has started a record and publishing company in Red Bank, N.J. The new operations are Selsom Records and Selsom Music (ASCAP). Diskery has already inked the Valtairs, Tony Maples, the Dhondelles, the Uniques, and the Naturals as exclusive artists.

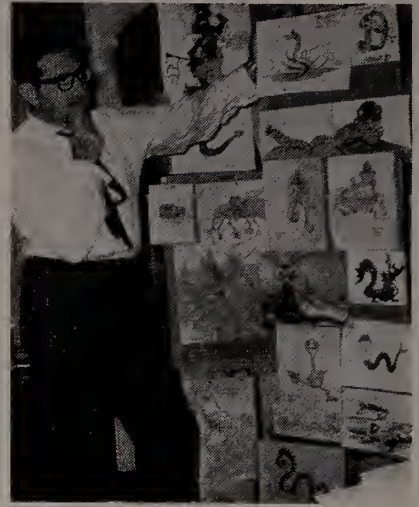

Based on the 32-second "Slithery Dee" cut in the Smothers Brothers current LP, "It Must Have Been Something I Said"—54 radio stations participated in the contest asking listeners to send in their version of what a Slithery Dee (a monster that comes out of the sea) looks like.

Entries ranged from giant painting on sheets to wood carvings, from Slithery Dees made out of scouring pads to dimensional pictures of paper napkins.

The winner, 17-year-old Sue Roper of Phoenix, Arizona, will have her design made into a toy by noted toy designer Ruben Claymer. Sue and her mother, plus Bob Furry of KOY-Phoenix, the deejay who submitted Sue's entry, and his wife were flown to San Francisco Sept. 17, to be guest of the Smothers Brothers for a weekend at the Fairmount Hotel, where the pop-folk duo were appearing.

Additional prizes of Smothers Brothers albums were awarded to 33 runners-ups.

Busloads of industry leaders from five states converged for a champagne tour which also included a theatrical presentation of Triangle's new syndication program product, a whirlwind view of landmarks in the Greater Philadelphia market and the Phillies-Red night baseball game at Connie Mack Stadium.

Roger W. Clipp, Triangle's chief broadcasting executive, was host to the press corps, advertisers, agency executives, educators and VIP guests for a tour of the facilities, banquet and a satiric revue spoofing both the new building and the broadcasting industry. George A. Koehler, station manager for WFIL, hosted a reception before a Warwick Hotel dinner to introduce Vincent G. King, architect of the new Center.

The new circular building, with 80,000 square feet of floor space and a diameter of 178 feet, allots one entire floor to each local radio and television operation. Two floors are devoted to administrative officers and a dozen conference rooms, all in vivid colors and unusual shapes. Not one room is a perfect square or rectangle.

The \$5 million Center stands on four acres at the junction of Monument and City Avenues in the city's Golden Mile district. In addition to the WFIL stations, almost all the Triangle outlets are housed in recently-completed quarters.

On one side of the disk are the latest singles by the label's Cilla Black ("It's For You"), and Peter and Gordon ("I Don't Want to See You Again"), plus a short introduction to each song and the artist by the composers—Beatles' John Lennon and Paul McCartney.

Lennon and McCartney themselves offered to record the introduction while they were on tour in Los Angeles. The result was the promotional disk for the two current hot singles.

"I Don't Want to See You Again" is the third song Lennon-McCartney have written for Peter and Gordon. In fact, the prolific team has penned every Peter and Gordon release—and eventual hit—in this country. Their first was "World Without Love" (which became the No. 1 seller in America several months ago) and the second was "Nobody I Know," another best seller.

"It's For You" is Cilla Black's second single for Capitol and the first written for her by Lennon-McCartney. Her first, "You're My World," became a best-seller when released in the U.S. by Capitol in June of this year.

Miss Jackson, a Columbia Records artist, has cancelled all engagements through Oct., and has turned down an invitation for a White House dinner Oct. 6. She was married a few months ago to Minter Sigmond Galloway, an Indiana building contractor.

ASCAP Symposium To Discuss Jazz

NEW YORK—ASCAP's fourth symposium on American Music will be aimed at jazz at the panel meet skedded for Oct. 1, at Judson Hall. The panel, to be led by WNEW's Billy Taylor, will also include Mercer Ellington and Eddie Sauter.

Taylor, a jazz pianist and composer, is currently pacted to Capitol Records. Ellington, son of the famed pianist-orkster, has been a trumpeter, composer, arranger and conductor. Sauter, of the famed Sauter-Finnegan Orchestra, has been a composer-arranger for Benny Goodman, Artie Shaw, Stan Getz and Ray McKinley.

Blue Boys Band Continues With Reeves Office

NASHVILLE — All facets of Jim Reeves Enterprises are continuing under a full head of steam. The scope of the operation now includes the exclusive booking and promotion of the late chanter's band, the Blue Boys. The Blue Boys are continuing their career as an act of their own and are currently on a tour of the southwest. Bunky Keels, who played with the band last year, has been hired to take the place of pianist Dean Manuel, who was killed along with Reeves in the air crash last July. Ray Baker, the business manager of the Reeves office, will handle the bookings.

Carol Records Merges With Swingline Label

NEW YORK — Edward F. Conway, Jr., vice-president of Carol Records, announced last week that the label will be discontinued, with all artists and material going over to the firm's Swingline label. Reason for the change-over is because Carol was continually being mistaken for another company under the same name. The exec also noted that Swingline will continue to be handled by Celtic Recording Productions.

"D" Kilpatrick Joins Philips

CHICAGO—"D" Kilpatrick, a veteran of 19 years in the recording industry, artist management and related fields, has been appointed a field manager for Philips Records.

Beatles Play To Full House At N.Y. Charity Concert

NEW YORK—The Beatles gave their last performance in the U.S. last week (20), before returning to England, at the Paramount Theatre here in a benefit concert for United Cerebral Palsy of New York City and Retarded Infants Services.

The British foursome played a capacity house of 3,800 people, who contributed gross receipts of \$75,000. Tickets were priced at \$5, \$10, \$15, \$50 and \$100.

The Beatles donated their talents free, as did the other acts on the show. The theatre facilities were made available through the courtesy of Paramount Pictures and the real estate firm of Webb and Knapp.

The concert marked the windup of the Beatles' first tour of the country. Steve Lawrence, Eydie Gorme and Ed Sullivan were the co-hosts of the show. Other performers included: the Shangri-las, the Brothers Four and Jackie De Shannon.

Immediately following their performance, the Beatles were honored onstage with the presentation to them of a scroll by Leonard H. Goldenson, chairman of the board of United Cerebral Palsy Associations. The scroll read:

"To John Lennon, George Harrison, Paul McCartney and Ringo Starr who, as the Beatles, have brought an excitement to the entertainment capitals of the world and who, as individuals, have given of their time and talent to bring help and hope to the handicapped children of America."

field, he noted that today there are 35 complete recordings of Shakespeare plays where three years ago only one such album was in existence.

"No aspect of the record business better illustrates its present-day cultural and educational importance than the growth of the so-called talking book," Meyers said in launching an in-depth discussion on the talking books for the blind projects. These albums, distributed by the Library of Congress, are loaned out and not sold, and consequently bear no excise tax. The counsel further noted that some talking books which are sold by charitable institutions are exempted from paying the excise tax.

Meyers focused on religious music by mentioning that this variant has been a significant part of America's musical heritage since the early days of the Pilgrims. "The phonograph record permitted the world's great religious music, as performed by some of the greatest artists of their time, to be brought into the home," noted the lawyer in stressing his point.

The meaningful cultural advantages of recorded operas were effectively summed up in the statement: "The average Met season includes about 175 performances of some two dozen operas—impressive enough to rank the Metropolitan with the world's leading companies. However, the schedule seems small in comparison with the 720 complete performances of 219 operas available on records today. It would take the Met slightly more than four 175-performance seasons to equal the number of complete operas on records today."

Meyers' statement paid special attention to the value of records in preserving distinctive American forms such as jazz, country music and the works of native born composers (e.g. Gershwin, Anderson, Copeland, etc). In line with his preservation theme, he noted the importance of the spoken-word or history-on-records sets. Meyers contended that the recorded words of our contemporary world leaders will serve as an excellent method for future generations to understand our era.

The attorney brought out the fact that the pop music field manifest a lasting factor to our cultural heritage. He noted that the pop singers of today may well be regarded in more significant terms in the coming years. Meyers noted the tunes from Tin Pan Alley and Broadway's musical stages are another aspect of the nation's indigenous musical perspective and are a contribution to the enjoyment of the peoples of the world.

Meyers' statement concluded with a detailed accounting of how records are utilized as teaching aids in our schools.

Trini Lopez Honored By San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO—Trini Lopez, who recently returned from a smash engagement at the Olympia Theater in Paris, was feted at homecoming ceremonies by the city of San Francisco. Welcome events included a motor parade through the streets, and presentation of a key to the city by Mayor Shelly.

Lopez, whose 4 Reprise albums have all been chart items, is in San Francisco to complete an engagement at the Off-Broadway, a North Beach club, after which he'll start on a Mid-Western one-niter tour and a South American trek.

George Brunz To Score '65 Allen & Rossi Tour

Light had distributors in from various parts of the country as well as many of New York's dealers and one-stops when he previewed the label's "Discotheque" debut. And for dramatic effect, Light had popular dance pro "Killer Joe" Piro and a troupe of dancers swing through the exciting teen steps employed at the Discotheque niteries. The dancers taught distributors how to do the steps.

The album was also premiered Monday, Sept. 21 at Sheppard's the most noted discotheque nite club in New York.

Special Awards For ASCAP Writers

NEW YORK—A total of \$484,600 in special awards made by 2 panels of distinguished music men, will be distributed among 1,318 "standard" and "popular-production" writer members of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers for the distribution year beginning Oct., 1964. This money represents special awards by the panels to members of ASCAP whose catalogs, in the considered judgment of the panels "have a unique prestige value for which adequate compensation would not otherwise be received . . . and to writers whose works are performed substantially in media not surveyed by the Society."

Top awards of \$2,000 were made to writers in the standard field, which includes the symphonic and concert works, while in the popular-production field the top award was \$1,100. Only members of limited distributions from ASCAP are eligible for these awards. A substantial portion of the awards made by both panels go to young and promising new talents who are just beginning to make their marks.

NEW YORK—Composer-pianist Peggy Stuart Coolidge, who recently bowed on London Records with an album tagged, "The Unique Artistry of Peggy Stuart Coolidge," has been praised by Senator Margaret Chase Smith for her contribution toward better understanding among people of the world through music.

Senator Smith's remarks have become a permanent part of the Congressional Record dated Sept. 8.

Last year, Mrs. Coolidge became the first American woman composer-pianist to appear in concert behind the iron curtain, having been invited by the Hungarian government. She has since been invited to play in Russia, Poland, Roumania and Czechoslovakia. She recently broadcast around the world via the facilities of the Armed Forces Radio network and on the Voice of America.

Multi-Operation Stereo System From Capitol

HOLLYWOOD — "The Command Performer" a fully transistorized, multi-operational portable stereophonic phonograph, equipped with high quality components, priced to sell for less than \$200, has just been placed on the market this month, it was announced by Oris Beucler, special products manager for Capitol Records Distributing Corp.

Beucler, who developed "The Command Performer" (Model SA 510), asserted that the compact kit, which plays stereo and monaural records, marks the first time that such a transistorized portable, equipped for so many operational functions, has been introduced for the consumer.

"The idea came to me about a year ago," stated Beucler. "My son plays the electric guitar. To play his guitar and his records he was forced to use several separate pieces of electronic equipment. It seemed awkward to me.

"So I designed a compact package and put everything into one unit. I incorporated a stereo phonograph, so he could play along with the big bands; and ear phones which enabled him to tune down the amplifier so he could practice at any time without disturbing the neighbors—or his parents!"

The solid state light-weight portable, equipped with 11 transistors and two silicon rectifiers, uses a Garrard AT5 deluxe high quality four-speed automatic changer with automatic last record shutoff, with a rubber-matted 10½" turntable.

It comes equipped with a balanced lightweight tone arm with compatible ceramic (featheride) cartridge and also incorporates another "new exciting first—an elliptical stylus—for more faithful record reproduction."

"The Command Performer" can also be used as a public address system, a private stereophonic listening device with the aid of earphones or a pillow speaker and will benefit aspiring musicians and singers because they can "jack-in" and perform along with a record.

Although its design makes it an ideal guitar amplifier, "The Command Performer" can be used with almost any musical instrument by using magnetic pickups, crystal pickups or contact microphones.

An ALL position is provided on the function switch which will electronically allow users to sing and strum along while the record is playing. A separate volume level control is featured for each of the functions.

Because of its multiplicity of use, Beucler describes "The Command Performer" as a "timely innovation in the area of phonograph design" because it is being released by Capitol in the midst of an electronic instrument boom, ignited by the tremendous interest in folk music and a thing called "Beatlemania!"

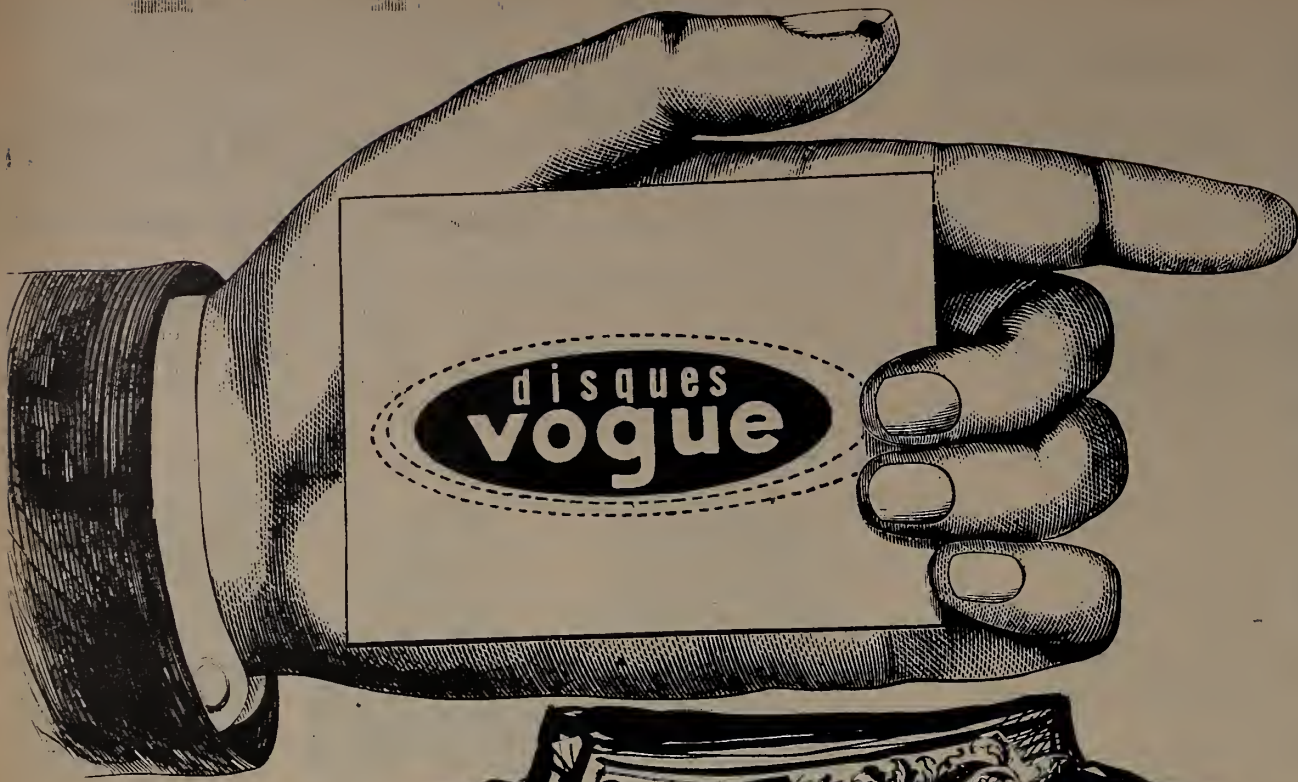

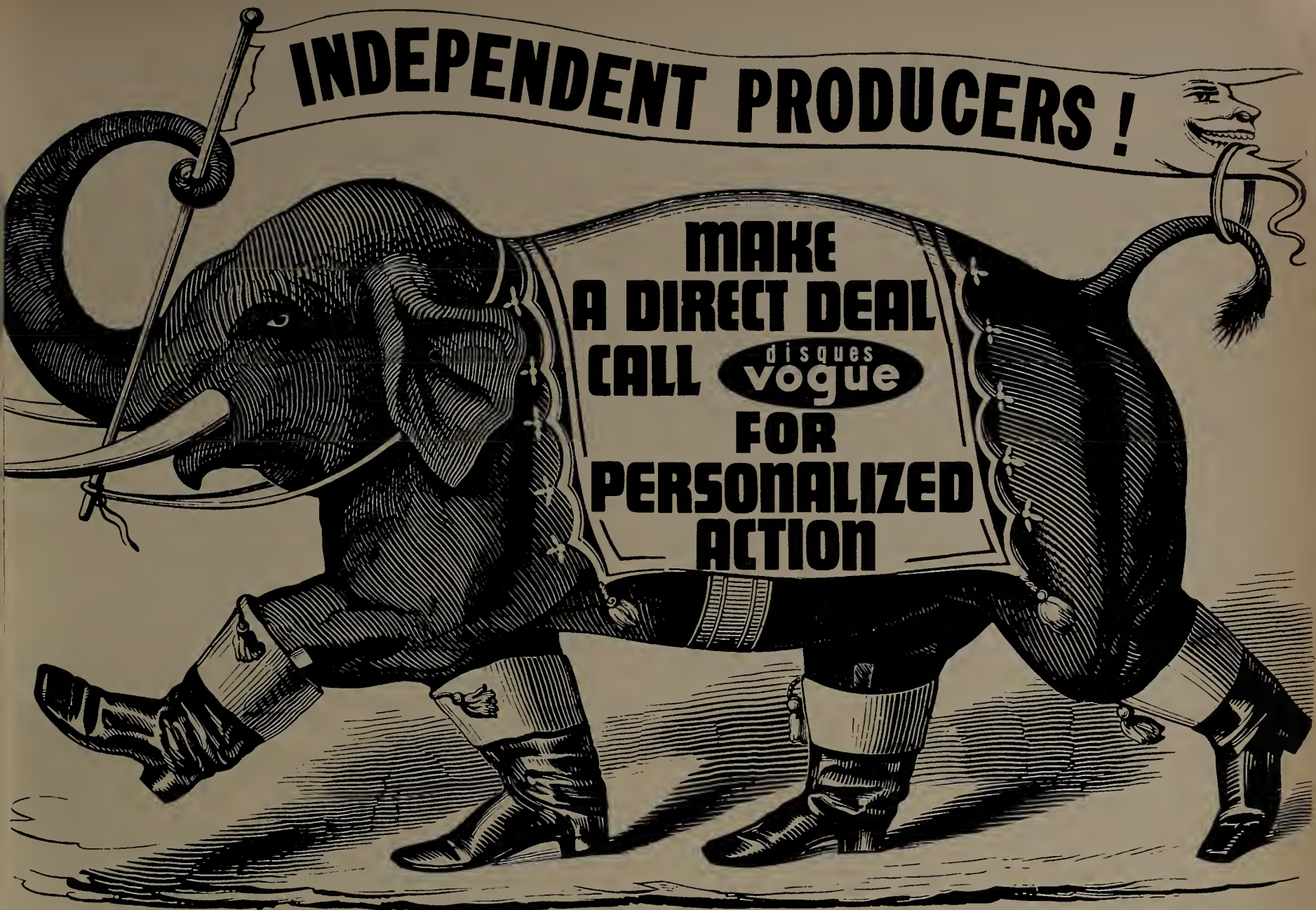

Fred has been given the green light in the P.D.'s post at LX, following the departure of long time Lakehead radio man, Gary Parkhill. Gary has gone west, young man, where he will now host a morning radio segment and a daily TV stanza on CFCN, Calgary. He takes with him the best wishes of his many friends and associates on the broadcasting scene in Canada. Fred also reports that the first two of four sides just cut in Nashville by Myrna Lorrie will shortly be out in Canada on Quality. American release is still pending. Myrna did big record business some years ago in both the U.S. and Canada and has everything that's required to be a top notch chart rider again. Fred offers demos to any interested parties. Simply contact him at CJLX-Radio, Fort William, Ontario. Some of Nashville's leading lights, including Floyd Cramer and The Kerr Singers were on the session that the four masters resulted from reports King.

Lee Farley confirms all the west coast reports on "Automatic Reaction" by Nino And The Ebb Tides. Side's a blockbuster in Vancouver, topping sales reports from Quality man Ken Welsh for the past several weeks. Solid air play over CFUN, that city, have moved it into the number 4 spot on the station's playlist, says Brian Forst. It has yet to break in eastern Canada, but if Lee has anything to say about it, the west coast action will occur in the eastern half of the country in very short order, with the next step being some U.S. attention. This is the reverse of of the usual procedure in as much as this is American product, happening first in Canada.

Paul White figures that the next wax sensation from Great Britain (What? another one!) will be Herman's Hermits. They are represented on Capitol in Canada with "I'm Into Something Good." "Do Wah Diddy Diddy" by Manfred Mann figures to be the next number one item in Canada, and the Beach Boys continue to move up the charts with both sides of their latest Capitol outing, "When I Grow Up" and "Little Honda." The newest outing by The Animals, "Take It Easy Baby" b/w "I'm Crying" was previewed by George Morris on his CKGM-Montreal air seg (19/9) as he featured a battle of the sides gimmick. His listeners were strong in their support of "Take It Easy Baby." Early action south of the border seems to favor the "I'm Crying" side.

Some considerable air action noted on the recent Sparton release by The Ray Charles Singers. Although "Al Di La" was the big item at the outset, many Canadian jocks have now flipped the disc and are concentrating on the Charles group's rendition of "Till The End Of Time." "R.P.M." will shortly debut a cross-country deejay opinion panel. Each week five key spinners in five different Canadian centres will offer opinions in print upon the chart merits of a new release. The same newie to be considered by all five panel members.

One of the best sets aimed at teens in recent memory has to be the set on RCA Victor by The Astronauts. Entitled, "Astronauts Orbit Kampus," the set packs considerable teen appeal with such oldie but goodie items as "Good Golly Miss Molly," "Let The Good Times Roll" and "Be Bop A Lu La." The group won fame not so long ago with their instrumental smash, "Baja." Not so this time around as each track of the in person, before a live audience session packs some solid singing by the fine group. It could be a big seller with the teen set if sufficient exposure is supplied by the country's spinners.

Another giant-in-the-making at RCA currently is the Sam Cooke reading of "Cousin Of Mine." Nat Cole's latest single release is showing signs of becoming a two-sider. "I Don't Want To See Tomorrow," is the fine ballad side of the pairing while the flip, "L O V E," is coming in for a good deal of attention from Canadian deejays.

Another hot item in several Canadian markets is the latest by Tracey Dey on Amy, "I Won't Tell" figures to be a good sales item, quickly.

Columbia in Canada will distribute a hot new master in Canada, produced by Dave Leonard and Alex Sherman through their Monticana set up. It's "Stop Look And Listen," a very commercial teen entry by young Montrealer, Ronnie Fraser. This is one of the first such arrangements entered into by the label in Canada. They could very well have a winner with the good newcomer. "Lumberjack" by Hal Willis on Sims has hit several Canadian centres like a bomb. It packs that "Dang Me" sound that did so well for Roger Miller, and could be a monster. It'll be distributed by Quality in this country.

Strong chart possibilities under the Reo Banner of late include, "Golden Records" by Judy Thomas, "Do You Wanna" by Bo Pete and a strong instrumental reading of "The Dartell Stomp" by the Mustangs. All of them are in the "Almost Chart" area and with a little exposure help will break the chart barrier.

Good C&W action noted on the latest Hickory release by Ernest Ashworth, "I Love To Dance With Annie." Side has been a pick and heavy air play item on Montreal's C&W outlet, CFOX.

Hal Ross has been very happy these days over deejay reaction to the newie by Jan And Dean on Liberty. Even though the spinners are having trouble with the jaw breaker of a title, "The Anaheim Asuza Etc.," is all over the country's airwaves.

Nancy Wilson has another big winner in her new capitol single, "I Wanna Be With You" is making it with rock jocks and good music programmers alike. Could be that Bernadette Castro's newest from Colpix could develop into a chart climber in short order. "His Lips Got In The Way" is getting some extensive air play at the early stages of its chart push.

Jimmy Darin, P.D. at Winnipeg's CKY, is another strong booster for young Terry Black from Vancouver. Jimmy has directed an unsolicited endorsement of young Terry's ARC release, "Unless You Care" to the Canadian trade press, indicating that the disk is high on the 'KY chart, and that Terry is being touted as a future super star on the wax scene by the 'KY "Good Guys." Dave Lyman, 'KY's untiring promotion topper, reports that The Beatles made an unscheduled and unannounced stopover in the Prairie Metropolis during their North American tour. CKY was tipped off and greeted the Beatles as they set foot on Canadian soil in Winnipeg. An impromptu press conference on the ramp of the Beatles' aircraft followed, and CKY got a tremendous amount of broadcast mileage out of the tapes cut at the airport.

GREAT BRITAIN

Top R.C.A. recording star Peter Nero on his first visit to Britain drew a galaxy of British talent to the reception hosted in his honour by Decca Records on behalf of RCA Victor. Nero confounded his admirers with a virtuoso performance on the specially hired Steinway. During his ten-day visit the pianist telerecorded four guest appearances on BBC 2s "The Best of Two Worlds" with Percy Faith.

Recipe for a hit record. Take one solo Hickory artist Larry Henley, team him with duo Dean and Mark from the same label, call them the Newbeats, mix them together in the recording studios and tag the result "Bread and Butter" and you've cooked up a major hit. The Newbeats in England to promote the platter attended a press reception hosted jointly by the publishers Acuff Rose and the record company Pye Records. They also appeared in several TV shows including "Ready Steady Go" and "Top of the Pops" and it looks like Pye will have their first Hickory hit since taking over the U.K. distribution in January this year.

French recording star Frank Alimo was introduced to the British press via a cocktail party at London's Hilton Hotel. In France he records for Barclay and plans are under way for U.K. release. Alimo hopes to cut tracks in English for Micky Most's Rak independent recording company. Most has recently scored a hat trick by getting Herman's Hermits into the charts with "I'm Into Something Good." His two previous successes being The Nashville Teens' "Tobacco Road" which is also making inroads in the American charts; and the celebrated "House of the Rising Sun" by The Animals which topped the charts of both Britain and America and earned the group a Cash Box Gold International Award for achieving such a feat.

Susan Maughan's latest Philips disk is a revival of the oldie "Little Things Mean A Lot" published by Robbins Music but Sid Green of Edwin Morris is quite happy to have the flip side—a Clint Ballard Jr. composition "Some Other Place" which is getting a lot of airplay.

Three young British writers John Carter, Perry Ford and Ken Lewis who had the distinction of penning Brenda Lee's first British-recorded-disk, have decided to put their own vocal talent on disk. Calling themselves The Ivy League, a name culled from the college society students in America, the boys first vocal waxing is "What More Do You Want" issued on Piccadilly and published by Southern Music.

The latest elaborate and informative press folder issued by Philips Phonographic Industries, Holland, features top British and continental star Dusty Springfield. Currently backing her American chart success with a nationwide tour she returns to Europe for the Grand Gala du Disques in Amsterdam on October 3rd to be followed by a European tour promoting disks recently waxed in French, German and Swedish.

Apologies to Decca and The Rolling Stones whose best selling L.P. "The Rolling Stones" we omitted from the company's Best Selling Lists of L.P.s June 1963-1964 in our Annual Directory. The album was, in fact, Decca's Best Selling L.P. of the year.

Philips Records threw a luncheon party to meet CBS folk singing group The Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem on the eve of their British tour. The group take the ballads and traditional folk songs of their native Ireland around the world with singular success particularly in America where their recordings on the Columbia label enjoy fantastic sales.

With the Gonk craze all the go in Britain it just had to happen. A new group The Gonks have arrived on the scene with "The Gonk Song" on Decca. If you want to know what a gonk is, be a gonk and buy the record or ask publisher Philip Solomon of Favourite Music.

Mark Wynter (Britain); Lill Babs and The Hootenanny Singers (Sweden); Renee Franke (Germany); Harry Mooten (Holland); Toots Thielemans (Belgium) and Wenche Myhre (Norway) were featured in the second 'Nord Ring' series of six concerts scheduled from Norway, Sweden, Germany, Holland, Belgium and Britain. The concert was presented by Sveriges Radio, Stockholm.

Tony Jackson who broke away from The Searchers recently to form his own group makes his bow with The Vibrations with "Bye Bye Baby" on Pye—a Mary Wells composition published by Belinda Music.

Pye issued the third of their Golden Guinea Collector Series this month comprising four classical albums featuring works by Brahms, Debussy, Beethoven, Dvorak and Tchaikovsky. From the newly acquired Redbird catalog Pye release The Shangri-Las' American hit "Remember (Walkin' In The Sand)."

Latest signing by Brian Epstein is —no not another group but a ballad singer. Twenty-five year old Michael Haslam makes his debut in the recording world with "Gotta Get A Hold Of Myself." Another stepping stone to success is the fact that the disk was produced by EMI's George Martin for release on Parlophone.

From the American musical "Funny Girl" comes a host of recordings of "People" headed, of course, by Barbra Streisand's version on CBS. Ella Fitzgerald has waxed the number for Verve and Harve Presnell on MGM and an orchestral version by Nat King Cole is out on Capitol. Copyright is held by Chappell & Co.

From Switzerland comes news from Cedric Dumont about his new Pick record label which will have a catalog of pop, dance and Swiss music as well as a selection of semi-classical favorites by Cedric Dumont and the Pro Musica Orchestra. Dumont is also interested in acquiring distribution rights for foreign labels especially from Germany, Italy, France and the U.S.A.

Quickies: Pye issue "Pourtant Tu M'aimes" by Francoise Hardy—a hit in her native France. . . . Wayne Fontana and the Mindbenders have waxed "Um, Um, Um, Um, Um, Um" on Fontana which proved a hit in the States for Major Lance at the beginning of the year. . . . The Johnny Ray hit of 1958 "Look Homeward Angel" has been given a new lease on life by The Fortunes on Decca. . . . Four r&b albums issued on Pye feature Muddy Waters, Chuck Berry, Memphis Slim, Little Walter, etc. . . . Pye also issued four EP's which combine the r&b talents of Bo Diddley, Sonny Boy Williamson, Howling Wolf, etc. . . . The Supremes' "Where Did Our Love Go" on Stateside hurtling up the British charts. . . . The much publicized James Bond movie "Goldfinger" opened this week and EMI issued Shirley Bassey's waxing of the title song on Columbia.



FRANCE

Novelty disk releases have just started to flow in and on this subject Georges Boujnah seems to be a very happy man. He has just released a new single by Charles Aznavour tabbed "Que C'Est Triste Venise." Two new titles by Enrico Macias that appear to be having a nice take-off are "S'il Fallait Tout Donner" and "Ma Raison De Vivre." A new 33 RPM by Trini Lopez includes "Michael" and "Perfidia." Still with the Americans, this time Nat King Cole is out with "Don't Forget" and "A Little Voice" is Dean Martin's newie.

Two youngsters who seem to be breaking through are Jocelyne with her rendering of "Le Dimanche Et Le Jeudi" and Thierry Vincent, a young chap who has caught the eyes of many young girls with his title "Je Ne Peux L'Acheter." On the CBS label we have Kenny Rankin singing "Longtemps, Longtemps." We also re-find J. J. Debout with "Nos Doigts Se Sont Croisés" after his triumphal success at the Rose D'Or De La Chanson Française. Debout is confirming his success. Let's point out a new disking by Richard Anthony with two good songs: "Ce Monde La" and "Les Garçons Pleurent." Adamo a young Italian who sings quite nicely in French supplies us with "Ballade A La Pluie." We wish him as much success as he obtained with "Tombe La Neige." Still with Pathe, Marconi Jaqueline Boyer comes out with "Le Temps De La Vie" and "Chaque Jour." Another youngster, Eric Le Mans has "Un Palais" and "Toi Mon Arbre." Two 33 RPM's, one by Georges Guetary with his first hits "Robin Des Bois," "Moulin Rouge," etc., and the second one by Gloria Lasso with "El Soldado De Levita," "Granada" among others. In the musical scores from films we must mention "Echappement Libre" starring Jean Paul Belmondo and Jean Seberg. Lets continue with the novelty releases and say that the first releases on the Riviera label are at hand. Karen Besy, a young lark, is out with "Qui Pourra Me Dire Pourquoi" and "Quand Mes Copains." On the 707 label another young thrush, Julietta, newie is "Si J'Etais Sur" and "Je T'Emmenerai." On the Festival ticket a good disk but a bit special is Leo Vidal's "Paso Doble De El Litri."

On the Mercury ticket are very few releases. We noticed an EP by N. Legendre with "J'Attendrai Demain" and "Un Jour Viendra." Let's now switch over to Vogue and note a disk by Michelle Sarna, "Le Train" and "Father Jones." We have also received novelties from Vega. This is quite a change. First of all there is Fats Domino on the ABC label with "Valley Of Tears" and "I'm A Fool To Care." Still on the same ticket is a record by the group called Les Impressions, who have "Keep On Pushing" and "I'm So Proud." From the same catalog Tommy Roe supplies us with "Wives And Lovers."

We now pass over to the festivity side of the program, that is to say the success obtained by Dalida during her actual appearance at the Olympia Music Hall, as well as Claude Nougaro whose talent we really appreciate. Included in her new singing tour we especially mention "Je Suis Sous" which will perhaps not have the same career as "Una Petite Fille" but will go a long way to please Brigitte Bertholier who is the happy writer of the song. She was one of the first people who had confidence in Nougaro's talent and now she is getting her rewards.

In the next spectacle at the Olympia we are looking forward to Claude François and Dionne Warwick. As to the latter star the Paris trade people are wondering how the public will react, and whether they will really appreciate this artist. In any case, if we judge her record sales, her name by her talent, and the continued work and exploitation of prexy Cabat, this is a good view of a future success.

Very little news from prexy Meyerstein. On the other hand Eddie Barclay continues his vacation at Cannes, but comes back to Paris every week for a couple of days. This is sufficient to supply us with some very good recordings.

With Pathe Marconi it appears that some changes are in preparation but this has not been completely terminated, so we can not say anything for the moment. It does seem, however, that a new commercial director is in place simply because F. Valoussiere has been called upon to take over other more important functions. Brunet continues to be what he is.

As to the publishers, let's say that Charles Talar has replaced Regis Talar on the Tutti staff, the latter having taken over the direction of one of the Eddie Barclay publishing firms. We wish Talar all the good luck in the world.

After the big success of "Rose-Marie," at the Mogador Theatre, Henri Varna is working on a new show tabbed "Michel Strogoff" which will open on Dec. 5. The producer has already inked Marcel Merkes and Paulette Mervel for leading roles. . . . Flick star Estella Blain's first deck is out on the CBS label. This talented performer not only sings but writes the words and music to most of her songs.

New sheet music from Wilhelm Hansen, Musik-Forlag, includes "Row, Row" with Danish lyrics (Ro, ro ro) by Mogens Dam, "Hjertenes fest," a local song composed by Otto Lington with lyrics by Erik Haaest, "Bryllup i Athen" (Wedding In Athens), another local copyright composed by Otto Lington—the latter two referring to the recent wedding in Athens when the Danish Princess Anne-Marie married the King of Greece. Melcher Musik-Forlag A/S in Copenhagen has released "Whadja Put In That Kiss?" and Reg Connelly, Musik-Forlag A/S has published "Show Me The Way To Go Home" with Danish lyrics (Nu er der en der skal hjem) by Mogens Dam. The latter two publishing houses are distributing thru Wilhelm Hansen.

NORWAY

There'll be some changes in record biz in Norway Oct. 1 when A/S Nor-Disc is leaving Arne Bendiksen A/S and joins Siemens Norge A/S. The latter company will change name, or more correct, the record dept. at Siemens will join Nor-Disc A/S, which will be the future name of the two companies. Manager of the record dept. at Siemens is Sverre Dahl and Sigurd Johannessen is manager of Nor-Disc. Siemens is handling labels as Brunswick, Coral, Decca, Deutsche Grammophon, Heliodor, London, Polydor, United Artists and Verve, among others, while Nor-Disc A/S has some 21 different labels, such as ABC-Paramount, Cameo-Parkway, Prestige, Vee Jay, and others.

Jorg-Fr. Ellertsen, head of recently started Jorg-Fr. Ellertsen A/S told Cash Box that his company is one of the busiest in Norway. Since last May, there have been 20 singles and five EPs released on the two labels Troll and Kristne Toner, the latter specializing in religious music. He has already had his first top seller on the charts, Toril Stoa with a Norwegian version of "Today's Teardrops," which was on the charts for four weeks. At the moment, the company is specializing on its local production, but of course, the company is looking for foreign material, too. Ellertsen said. He has in fact signed his first foreign contract with American label Crescendo, from which there will be at least five singles released. Danish singer Birthe Wilke has also signed a contract with Troll, where she will do some recordings in Norwegian.

New on the charts this week are "Have I The Right" with The Honeycombs and Pye, and the local song "Pappa'n til Tove-Mette" with Rolf Just Nilsen and Birgit Ström on Nor-Disc.

Rolf Syversen of Iversen & Frogh A/S (EMI in Norway) told Cash Box that it was very promising to note that sales are going up almost every week, and has done so the last weeks. It seems to be a general trend in Norway, Syversen said, and the fact that EMI has been particularly happy with The Beatles and other British groups doesn't make them being the only company to get advantage of the growing sales figures. Syversen also mentioned the release of Norwegian recordings in the United States, among others, Capitol has released one LP album so far, and two more are coming. Among the recent releases from Iversen & Frogh A/S can be mentioned an EP with the Norwegian Balalaika Orchestra conducted by Russian born Nikolai Arsenjev. The Balalaika Orchestra celebrates its 45th Anniversary this year.

Arne Bendiksen, head of Arne Bendiksen A/S now in Germany on a promotion campaign for local talent Wenche Myhre who just has done her first German record for Polydor.

Rolv Wesenlund, manager of the record dept. at Arne Bendiksen A/S told Cash Box that the strike among musicians against participating in recording sessions continues and there is no light seen in the situation. It might in fact continue for another six months. The problem circles around money, with the musicians asking for higher payment for participating at recording sessions. The situation is good and bad, maybe more bad for the musicians themselves. While Norway used to be—and perhaps still is—a market for adults, the strike forced the record companies to do more recordings with those numerous small so called teenage groups, who were not organized in the Musicians Unions. This has started to shift the market from an adults market to a teenager's market.

Norsk Konsertdireksjon A/S, a part of Arne Bendiksen A/S, is working hard to bring more and more of today's popular international artists to Norway, Cash Box was told. At the end of September and beginning of October concerts are being arranged in Oslo, Trondheim, Stavanger and northern Norway with a package show including The Swinging Blue Jeans, Wenche Myhre, Ray Adams, The Cool Cats and Arne Bendiksen. The British group The Searchers are contracted for a tour between December 3 and 13, Millie is coming in middle of December, The Zombies in end of November, etc.

The Edderkoppen Theatre in Oslo is now very successful with the musical "Stop The World, I Want To Get Off" with Rolf Just Nilsen in the leading role. A/S Nera has released the RCA Victor recordings with Jan Malmstjöm and Anna Sundquist made last year when the musical was playing in Stockholm, Sweden.

At a recent private gathering of some leading record company executives, the subject of low-priced imported albums was discussed at length. It seems quite staggering that albums can be imported mostly from the United States—and sold to dealers at such crazy low prices if all commitments are being met according to the law. Cash Box is aware of instances where large quantities of fully imported albums are being offered to dealers at between 60 cents and one dollar each, this is about one quarter of the dealer price of regular albums being pressed and marketed by all major record companies in Australia. It would be in the best interests of the record industry if all interested parties made a thorough examination of all aspects of these low-priced imports before the situation worsens to the stage where the local manufacturer finds himself with a factory full of presses for which he cannot find work. CB believes it is ridiculous for record companies to wait until these low priced imported packages really flood the market before deciding on some definite action. There are several avenues of investigation open to the trade and advantage should be taken of them now.

It seems we goofed in the column a couple of weeks ago when we said that the Burl Ives record of "Pearly Shells," released by Festival, was the first version of the song to be issued in Australia. Our thanks to our friends at Station 5AD in Adelaide who were quick to point out that the Joe & Eddie version of "Pearly Shells," on the Vocalion label, was out several weeks before the Burl Ives release.

T. S. Woodbridge, general manager of APRA, recently announced a change in the chairmanship of APRA Board of Directors. George S. Cooper replaces Ernest Lashmar, who was a foundation director of APRA, and occupied the chairmanship for twenty-eight years. Lashmar is still active with Chappell & Co. Ltd. and that firm's new director on the APRA board is W. B. Ahrens. Cooper is managing director of the publishing firm of Boosey & Hawkes (Aust.) Pty. Ltd., he has been a member of APRA Board continuously for twenty-eight years and has held many important positions during that term on various sub-committees. Cooper was the original chairman of the APRA Music Foundation Fund which came into existence in 1954 and only relinquished that position recently when Professor Lindley Evans was appointed to succeed him. The trade offers congratulations to Mr. Cooper on his appointment.

"Starlift 64" is the tag which Harry Miller (Pan Pacific Promotions) has given to his big new show which commences its Australia-New Zealand tour in Dunedin (N.Z.) on 25th September and winds up in Perth (Western Australia) on 10th October. Artists on the bill are The Searchers, Peter & Gordon, Del Shannon, Eden Kane and New Zealand artist Dinah Lee.

Australian Record Company is already getting keyed up for the December release of the film version of "My Fair Lady." Scheduled in their next batch of singles is the Andy Williams single (on CBS) of "On The Street Where You Live" which is taken from Andy's latest album.

The stage production of "Camelot" has already played extensive and successful seasons in Adelaide (where it was premiered twelve months ago) and Melbourne (where it is currently playing) and is scheduled to open in Sydney on 17 October. Australian Record Company have the Broadway cast album of "Camelot" and have enjoyed good sales wherever the show has been staged—they are now making solid preparations for the Sydney market.

Under an agreement between the record division of Astor Electronics and Stuyvesant Productions Inc. of the United States, the American Red Bird label is given its own identification on releases in Australia. Latest issues on Red Bird are "Top Down Time" by The Rockaways and "People Say" by The Dixie Cups.

New singles from RCA are the locally produced "Do The Dog" and "All For You" by The Viscounts a local group; "Shrum" by Floyd Cramer and Connie Smith with "Once A Day" and "The Threshold." RCA should also grab sales with the album "Astronauts Orbit Kampus" which has just been released.

The late Jim Reeves is represented by a new album release from RCA, music from the movie "Kimberley Jim" which was the first starring film in which the artist appeared. The movie was shot in South Africa where Jim Reeves commanded a fantastic following.

Local artist Derek Lee has a single out on the Leedon label which carries "My Heart Can't Make Up It's Mind" c/w "Watch What You Do With My Baby".

GERMANY

The German record industry has released their sales figures for the first half of 1964 and they show that the singles record once again took a beating to the tune of 7.6% decrease in sales. LP sales rose once again giving the record firms a substantial business. Here is a chart showing sales for the first half of 1964 compared to 1963.

Most of the sales on records went over the record shops but 600,000 singles, 900,000 LP's, 300,000 10" LP's, and 600,000 12" LP's were sold by people other than regular record dealers. Classical music continues to play an important role in sales as 300,000 singles, 900,000 EP's, 300,000 10" LP's and 1.2 million 12" LP's of classical music were sold. That means that 16.6% of all records sold were classical representing 26.7% of the dollar volume of records sold in Germany. This is an increase of 2.6% over last year's figures. Stereo continued to gain in popularity on the LP front as 30% of all classical LP's or 420,000 stereo LP's and 26.3% of all pop LP's or 500,000 stereo LP's were sold. That means an increase of 13.6% over last year. Export showed big gains this year rising in volume from 4.5 million to 5.2 million for the first half of this year. That is an increase of 15.6% over last year. 20.4% of all the records produced in Germany this year were exported. Last year 19.3% were headed for export. Import has decreased from 880,000 to 670,000 records, a decrease of 24.4%. That's a picture of the first half year's business in Germany.

General Manager Leif Kraul of Metronome Records is now a partner in the firm as of September 1, this year. Kraul made the announcement at the same time as he reported that the firm had 23% of all the single sales in Germany for July. The firm has its biggest hit in the history of Metronome with "Liebeskummer Lohnt Sich Nicht" by Siw Malmkvist which has passed the 700,000 mark in sales. Right now the firm heads the charts with "Das Kommt Von Rudden, Das Kommt Vom Segeln" which is also well over the 100,000 mark. "Non Ho L'Eta" from Gigliola Cinquetti did over 300,000 records, the other festival number for the firm "Junge Mann Mit Roten Rosen" by Dorthe also has passed the 140,000 mark. Leif also tells us that his firm also held down the same percent of sales for August. These remarkable figures for a minor label show the power of the small company in Germany today.

Philips Records reports that Leslie Gore is in Germany for TV appearances and her first recordings here in German. The disc date will be made in Munich under the supervision of Gerhard Mendelson, the producer of Connie Francis in German and many others.

Ralph Maria Siegel reports that he is writing the music and Robert Gilbert who wrote the German versions of "My Fair Lady" and "Annie Get Your Gun" just to mention 2 big ones and Max Colpet who has written hundreds of hits are working on a new German musical based on "Charlie's Aunt." The new musical will have its premiere next year. Polydor reports that they have recorded 17 year old Wencke Myhre from Norway with her first German language disc and the record is getting a top promotion and publicity push.

Fermata-Latin America chief Enrique Lebendiger visited Munich where he met with important publishers and writers. Enrique picked up plenty of top material for his trips to other countries and placed lots of his copyrights from South America for Germany. He is especially working on the Mercury waxing of "The Wedding" by Julie Rogers which is moving like crazy in England. It looks like a smash hit for the whole world!

That's it for this week in Germany.

ITALY

Winner of the Neapolitan Festival is the tune, "Tu Si 'Na Cosa Grande" penned by Domenico Modugno. Modugno returns suddenly on the hit scene, both as a composer and singer. He had as first-rate partner on the Neapolitan scene in Dischi Ricordi's Ornella Vanoni, who gave him a strong help to bring the song to victory. The song is published by Curci Publishing Group. The song has been acquired in the U.S. by the Big 3 pubberies which also published Modugno's "Volare" smash.

Presently we don't know if there is a reaction on the Italian market for the two recordings of "Tu Si 'Na Grande" (Ornella Vanoni on Ricordi and Domenico Modugno on Fonit-Cetra) but we must point out for the three nights of the Neapolitan contest, the event was followed with close interest by the Italian public.

As we had the occasion to report in recent columns the production presented this year on the stage of the Politeama Teatre of Naples was really of a high level. As happened this year at the San Remo contest, the Naples production was organized by impresario Gianni Ravera, who received full cooperation on part of the record industry. This strong help plus the three nights spotlight on television assured the commercial success of the Naples event.

If only one of the 24 songs presented will have a reaction on the market the Festival of Naples will return to be, as some years ago, the second top music light in Italy (the second after San Remo. Perhaps "Tu Si 'Na Cosa Grande" winner of the Festival, will have the power to reach the top of our best-selling list.

From Rome we received the news that Giuseppe Ornato, General Manager of RCA Italiana, was also appointed Managing Director of the Company. Our congratulations to Mr. Ornato.

Still on RCA: we have received the list of the participators to the RCA meeting of the A&R managers of the Spanish-speaking countries association. As we reported the meeting is held in Rome from Sept. 21-26. The names of the guests were: H. Urbina, General Manager of Corporation De Radio de Chile; J. Camacho A&R Manager of RCA Victor Argentina; P. Rocco, A&R Manager of RCA Elettronica Brasilera; D. Reid, General Manager of RCA Elettronica Brasilera; R. Fuentes, A&R Manager of RCA Victor Mexicana; M. R. Conde, Manager Special Projects of RCA Victor Mexicana; G. Caram, General Manager of RCA Espanola; A. Gallego A&R Manager of RCA Espanola; R. Villasmil, Manager Record Dept. of RCA De Venezuela, and L. Couttolenc, Manager Publishing Dept. of RCA Victor Mexicana.

Chairman of the meeting was R. F. Cook, V.P. of RCA International, who especially came over from New York. Other personalities present at the meeting were P. Baumberger, VP of RCA International of Geneva, L. Shapiro, Manager for Foreign Record Sales of RCA Victor in New York, E. J. Dailey, VP of RCA International of New York, and also from New York, Dario Soria, VP of RCA Victor.

We wish to point out an interesting step by CGD Internazionale which constitutes a major change into record market. Every record sold by CGD International is provided inside the cover with a special post card which serves as a "questionnaire". Buyers are invited to reply to the following inquiries: (a) How do you think this record is? (very good—good—no good). (b) Which are your comments on this record? (c) Why you decided to buy this record? (after a broadcasting or a TV show, because it was suggested by a friend, because it was recommended by the press, it's a gift).

Other inquiries put on the CGD card concern reports about new singers and so on. CGD received back 10,000 of these cards fully completed, and as Joe Giannini reported, the results of this survey is interesting and represents a big help in understanding the nature of the record market. As a matter of fact, it seems that a lot of buyers said they buy records on suggestion of their friends.

Little news about Phonogram activity in Italy. Under the title "Olympia 64" Phonogram issued an LP containing a living performance by Johnny Hallyday at the Olympia Music Hall in Paris. The record is released on the Philips label.

Didi Balboni, is the young songstress who was spotlighted at the Venice contest "Festivals Stage" has recorded a disk containing the number she sang at the contest: "Con Tanto Affetto" (published by Bideri, and issued under the Bideri's label, Edibi) backed with a surf-beat item tabbed "Unico".

The Casino of Taormina organized this year a series of shows entitled "Songs Around The World." They invited to perform on the stage of the Casino some of the top International stars: Marlene Dietrich, Shirley Bassey, Gilbert Becaud, Amalia Rodriguez, Carmen Sevilla, Domenico Modugno, Dionne Warwick, and a newcomer, Tiny Yong, who was recently pacted in France by Disques Salvador (Distributed by Philips).

Bovema-Day 1964 in Amsterdam-Hilton

On Monday 14th September last many Dutch dealers were present at the Bovema-Day '64, held in the majestic Hilton-Hotel, Amsterdam. Guests of honor on this occasion were a.o. EMI's N. L. T. Dines, Mr. and Mrs. White, J. and S. Kruger of Ember Records, London, Mr. Lesley of The Lesley Webster Co., London, Mr. Berson of Pathé-Marconi-Paris, Mr. Batzem of Elektra and Mr. de Boeck of S.A. Gramophone. After the inaugural speech of Bovema's President Mr. G. M. Oord Jr. who was appointed "Skipper" of the KLM by this Air Company's Director of Public Relations Mr. R. Vogels during lunch—the morning-part of the show—the keynote of which was "aviation" and which was bearing the title "With A Record Around The World"—started with solo dances by members of the Dutch Dance Theatre, thus presenting Bovema's 6-piece Ballet-series on both HMV and Columbia-labels. Trossat, Director of Philips Records Cy. in Chile, had come in connection with the personal appearance of pianist Claudio Arrau. Distinguished Dutch guests were L. de Kok (Director of Philips Nederland N.V.) and J. W. A. Langenberg (Director of Philips' Phonographic Industries) who gave evidence of their high personal interest in Phonogram's new presentations.

Speakers of the day were Phonogram's Director Jack Haslinghuis and the new chairman of the Dutch Association of Record Dealers, J. J. Weenenk. Special invité was dealer Lex de Heer. As a specialist in the promotion for religious music, he offered "Silver Harps" to single-choir leader Kees Deenik (over ten years on Philips records) and the vocal-duo De Zingende Zusjes (Marry and Thea Verhey) for their extraordinary qualities in this very special field of Dutch popular music.

High-light of the day was the personal appearance of the South-American born master pianist Claudio Arrau. Arrau, contracted by Philips, has recorded the five Beethoven Piano Concertos recently with the Dutch Concertgebouw-orkest conducted by Bernard Haitink! The splendid album (mono and stereo) is getting extra attention in a special sales-campaign: until December, the public can enjoy both a most favorable shortage on the definite sales-price and the possibility to pay in three installments, if filling out and signing the special order-form available with dealers.

Stress on LP-Series

Phonogram's new record-season 1964-1965 opened with a very definite stress on LP-series. We mention the "De Luxe Series" (Philips), consisting of ten LP-albums with gold imprinting and a new kind of packaging in elaston. Among the outstanding classical recordings, we mention a Ravel-programme by the London Symphony, the very last recording of Pierre Monteux. Also the much cheaper priced "Concert Series" (Philips and Decca) met with enthusiasm, featuring a Gerald Souzay Recital, a Feike Asma Organ Concert or the Old Church Organ of Amsterdam, a Vienna Promenade Concert under Boskovsky and a Recital by Teresa Berganza. The "Sacred Music" series of Philips consists of six LP-albums, in presentations with drawings and etchings by Rembrandt. Another introduction that met with long applause was the London-Globe Series with brand-new folk-music albums from Spain, Germany Greece, Turkey and Roumania. In the popular field, the "Surprise Series" (10 LPs, Philips and Decca) drew the attention, with albums by The Marinierskapel, the Dutch Swing College Band with Rita Reys ("Jazz Sir That's Our Baby"), the Sweet Sixteen Girls' Choir, a teenage-show "Five Seconds from Woof," and an album devoted to Holland's most popular girl-singer: Willeke Alberti. Also the new single-hits were presented in the form of a series "Favorieten Express," featuring many Dutch and foreign popuar singers an ensembles like Roy Orbison, Drafi Deutscher (personal appearance), The Rolling Stones, Mieke Telkamp, Corry Brokken, Anneke Grönloh, The Blue Diamonds, Willeke Alberti, The Three Jacksons, Johnny Lion and The Jumping Jewels.

ARGENTINA

Two weeks ago, Cash Box printed in this column a comment regarding independent producers in Argentina. Now, it has been announced that Phonogram has signed a contract with Ricardo Mejia, owner of the RM label and also TV producer. Mejia will become an IP for Philips and the first official one in this area. As we noted in that article, several musicians and arrangers have been working as IP's at one time or another, but this is the first association between one of them and a major label.

During a lunch with this CB representative, Adolfo Pino, sales & promotion manager of RCA, unveiled some of the details of his recent trip to Chile, Peru and Brazil. The main point in this tour was the coordination of releases between the RCA branches. The first local artists whose waxings will be released in these other markets are Palito Ortega, Violeta Rivas, Anibal Troilo, Antonio Prieto, Juan D' Arienzo, Los Chalchaleros and Johnny Tedesco. Besides, in Chile and Peru, there will be strong promotion around Chico Miranda, Lalo Fransen and several more. Several artists will fly to Lima to appear on Channel 4 in that city in a few weeks. Others, will go to Brazil with the same purpose. On the other side, Brazilian artists like Sergio Murilo and Ronnie Cord will come to Argentina. Palito and other local artists will also record their tunes in Portuguese, for the Brazilian market.

Everybody is happy about Surco, since it seems that the label has a big seller in Tito Rodriguez whose "Inolvidable" has reached the charts in a very short time, while the album, "With Love," is among the LP Top sellers. Rodriguez is receiving very strong air play and deejays have been asking for more records by him. On the local side, Los Pelicanos, a new group, have completed an album for Colombian Cumbia Music, with titles like "Los Motilones," "La Flor" (a merengue) "La Lengua," and "Cumbia Bendita." Surco expects this one to become a fast seller, too.

Famous reports that it is distributing the second kiddie record issued by Patatin. It is titled "El Muñeco de Mariana" after the Carlos Mayon play staged at the Argentine Theater. The first title, belonging to this series was "Perico El De Los Palotes" which reportedly sold well. Famous has a good seller in the pop field with "Por Favor" (Please) by Frank Ifield, as we mentioned a short time ago.

News from CBS: The label is releasing a new record by Sandro. According to the Press Dept. the titles are "En Mi Mente" and "Los Brazos En Cruz"; this one is a big Johnny Hallyday hit. Los Trovadores Del Norte have cut "Vidala Del Chango" and "Los Bichos," two nice folk tunes while Catherine Spaak's new single carries the "Bailando Surf" title. There is a new Village Stompers Compact 33: "From Russia With Love." Also out are releases by George Maharis, Larry and Jorge Cafrune. The Cuarteto Imperial has its first LP on the market, including its hit singles "Cumbia Sobre El Mar" and "Color De Arena."

News from Tonodisc: the label has released two new Grand Award (Command) albums, designed especially for "big music" lovers. Titles are the Second Volume of "Persuasive Percussion" by Terry Snyder and his All Stars and "Fabulous" by Dick Hayman and orchestra. Both albums were produced in the States by Enoch Light.

More about Phonogram: the label threw a cocktail party to visitor Johnny Tillotson, who has been performing in Buenos Aires. Next week we'll give more details about Johnny's visit, which includes appearances on TV and dance parties.

Odeon is releasing a new single by US singer Dean Reed, currently clicking in Buenos Aires with "La Bamba" sung in Spanish and "Jerico." The waxing was made with Armando Patrono's orchestra. Reed is performing on several programs aired by Channel 9, including the high-rated "Sabados Continuos." Other releases are "En Tu Dia, Madre" and "Feliz Cumpleaños" by the popular tropical music group Los Wawanco and "Pum Pum" by Pereira and his group. The label's top sellers last week were "Twist And Shout" by The Beatles, "Sometimes On Friday," Claude Gordon, and "Chin Chin," by Richard Anthony.

Hugo Celano of Sprint Music is busy with "Se Mi Bocciano Agli Essami" (Si Me Bochan En El Examen), a new Italian tune. (Spanish lyrics are already available.) Several recordings are planned, and among them one by Los Azurros (Music Hall). Sprint is also working hard on "Colorado," cut by Elsa Quarta (Philips) and Violeta Rivas (RCA) among others.

Microfon reports the release of a new modern tango music album, cut by Leo Lipesker and the Tango Chamber Quartet. There is also a new album out by Atilio Stampone and his tango orchestra. Also one more by Reinaldo Micheli and the first one by Toto Rodriguez. With these albums, Microfon hopes to build the strongest line available of modern music from Buenos Aires, with an eye on the international market.

The Ray Charles Singers appear on a new compact titled "Love Me With All Your Heart," North-American version of "Cuando Calienta El Sol," a music that was high on the charts of Cash Box in June. 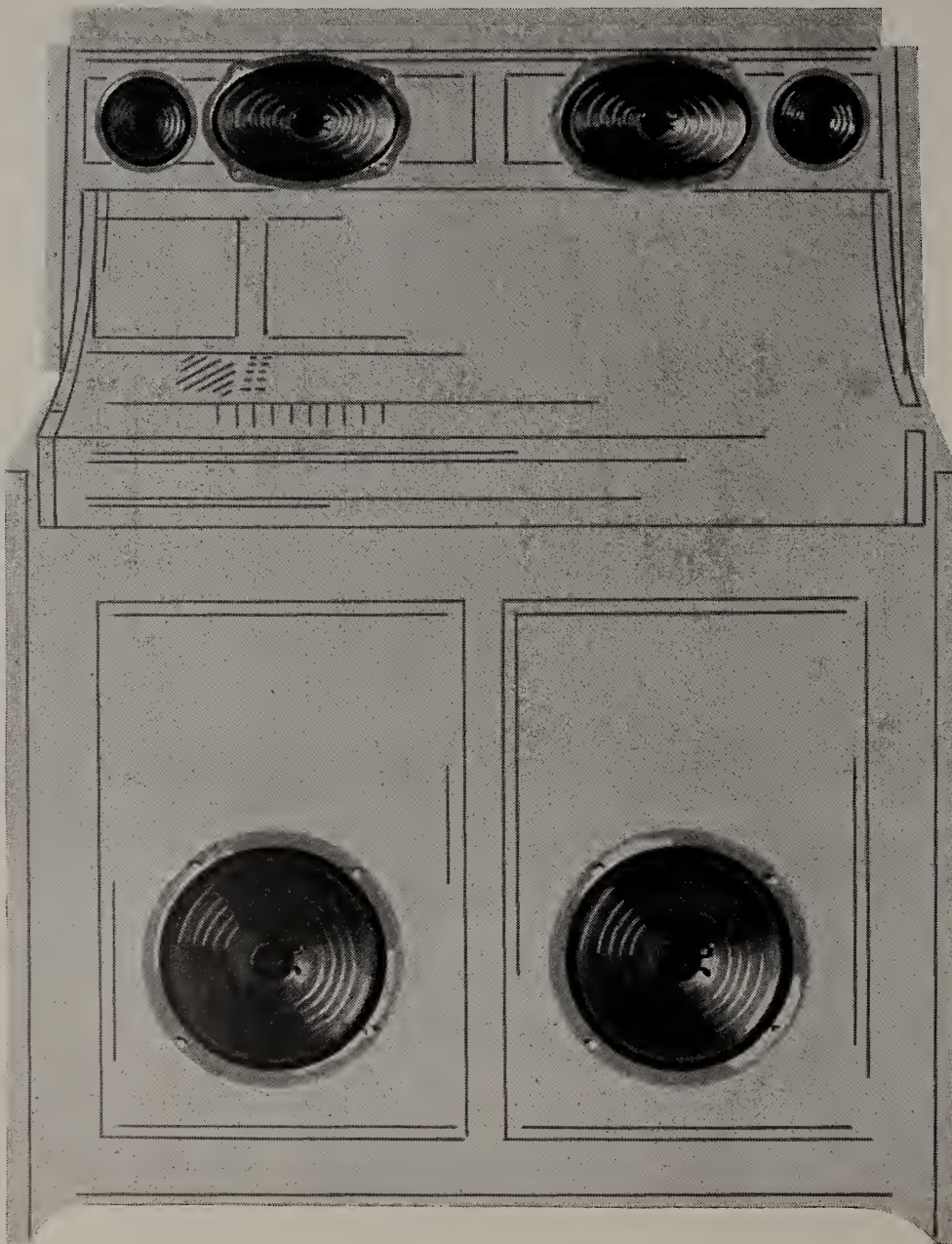

Editorial

IN SEARCH OF A CUSTOMER

When the National Association of Concessionaires Convention opens on Monday, September 28, vending machine manufacturers will begin a week of selling to an industry which accounts for a goodly portion of equipment sales over the year. Last month these same manufacturers left the Coliseum in New York after pitching laundry and dry cleaning operators on the merits of vending machines and bill changers. Having just returned from Texas following the tobacco distributors convention in Houston, the exhibitors will have hardly caught their collective breath when the MOA and NAMA Conventions will be upon them.

Even if they skip several smaller conventions which take place following the major Chicago trade shows, each one will more than likely find it necessary to take part in the bottling show in Atlantic City in early October. NAMA holds its west coast convention two weeks later and it is doubtful if at least one more convention won't pop up between then and Christmas. That's a lot of road work, and a lot of selling, but it is all evidently very necessary in order to cover the ever-growing field of machine buyers.

Distributors, for the most part, follow the lead of the manufacturer and when the meeting or convention is held in their territory, they usually back up the promotion and selling with individual contact on a local level.

But what of the operator? Is he to sit back and await the leads which may come about from such exposure? We think not.

Too many operators allocate too little time for location contact in search of new business. Perhaps coin machine operators can take the cue from many vending operators who solicit new business periodically with sales letters and brochures and circulars outlining the equipment available for specific locations. Not only can the operator, in this way, represent himself as the company serving business with factory equipment exactly as outlined in accompanying literature, but he can step into an industrial plant, laundromat, or theater operation owned by people who more than likely were contacted by the aforementioned factories at various shows. Music ops are pretty much in a saturated situation, but these same firms are now in cigarettes, candy and refreshment vending. In addition, there's the novelty amusement machine that fits into industrial game rooms, and similar locations not considered standard outlets.

There are always methods in which new business can be attained if the operator seeks it out. Too many coinmen rely heavily on the new address, the new location, the change in ownership, to spot the new location opportunity. More effort should be exerted if the lost location is to be replaced, and if a route is to grow.

Kaye To Premier New 'Eldorado' Shuffleboard Line At MOA Show

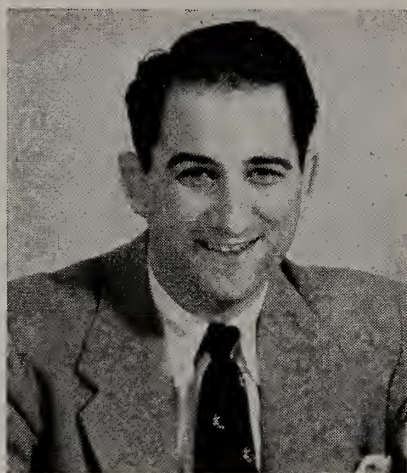

The new line, to be called the 'Eldorado' shuffleboard series, will be Kaye's entry into this area of the coin machine market, and will shortly be available to operators through the company's authorized distributors.

Kaye described the design of his new shuffleboard as "the ultimate in modern styling." The entire scoring mechanism of the game will be contained in the "head", Kaye advised, with the exception of the coin acceptor which will be located in the board's center leg. The scoring mechanism is being manufac-

tured by Bally in Chicago, of which Kaye is an interested partner. The game will be assembled in Chicago and marketed through Kaye's regular network of distributors from the two base factory points in Chicago and New York.

West Virginia Ops Elect Wallace, Pres., Discuss Sales Tax On Vending Sales

■ Tax Expert, MOA's Granger, NAMA's Funk Addresses Ops

HUNTINGTON, WEST VA. — The West Virginia Music & Vending Association elected John "Red" Wallace to the Presidency of the association here last week (Sept. 18-19) as the operators in the State celebrated the Tenth Anniversary of the association.

Highlight of the meeting was a talk delivered by Max A. Bunn, Director of Consumer Sales, Tax Div., State of West Virginia. At the moment, operators in the State pay a sales tax which amounts to 11.1% on a ten-cent vend, based on the present 1¢ tax on a ten-cent vend. The sales tax is slated to begin at six-cents. Because of the inequitable rate for vending ops, the Association is working toward a sales tax scale which would begin at 11¢, thereby alleviating single ten-cent purchases for a tax per vend. Bunn advised the operators that while the State is studying the present tax rate, he would take "a neutral position" insofar as Association presentation of a new tax plan is concerned.

Richard W. Funk, Legislative Counsel for NAMA, told the audience of about 100 guests that the task ahead for 1965—to put an end to

the unequal treatment of vending operators—would be an even greater one than the previous successful chore of defeating a per-machine taxation here last year. "Although the law on its face appears to treat all retail sales on the same basis, the fact is that only the vending operator must pay 10% of his gross on 10¢ sales," said Funk. Out of the 38 states which impose a sales tax, fifteen states provide for relief on sales made through vending machines. Funk suggested, as an example, a sales tax on total sales, as a solution to the problem. Funk promised the Association total NAMA support in this endeavor.

The Ron 3000 employs an 8-transistor amplifier with a 10-watt undistorted output and a two-way speaker system. Featuring a crystal-type pickup and diamond needle, the manufacturers claim will maintain a superior tone quality for an extra long period of time.

A tour through the factory facilities of the Kaye Co. is both a lesson in how craftsmanship can be maintained on an assembly line production and also a sneak preview into some of next year's most stylish coin-operated and professional 6-pocket table models, along with a new shuffleboard, scheduled for an MOA Convention premiere.

From his main factory on Prospect

Place in Brooklyn, and from his other metal and woodworking facilities, Irving Kaye, his sons Howard and Arnold, and scores of skilled employees produce what they consider to be the industry's most durable and modern looking coin-operated table and also the finest of regulation sized billiard equipment. The accent at the Kaye Co. is on style, and this is apparent in such exotic color combinations as 'Matador Red and Pink', 'Midi Blue and Pale Blue' and 'Pumpkin and White' and such cabinet finishes as 'Platinum Walnut', 'Macassar Ebony' and 'Teak'.

Besides the thousands of sq. ft. of area at their woodworking and metal facilities, there are 34,000 sq. ft. of working and storage space in the Brooklyn factory and an additional 10,000 sq. ft. from an adjacent piece of land, recently purchased by the Kaye Co., on which they plan to install two new loading docks for receiving and shipping. Irving Kaye claims that such a vast amount of area is a “must” for any company which ships so large a volume of equipment they must continually keep an inventory stock of between 1,000 and 1,200 tables on hand.

There are several stages in the construction of a pool table, each requiring the talents of trained specialists, according to Arnold Kaye,

the company's production manager. The first step at the Kaye Co. begins each morning when the empty cabinets arrive from the company's woodworking facilities. Kaye cabinets are constructed of the popular hard woods and offer a formica exterior. Each features die-cast and chrome-plated marker buttons, four recessed score counters, aluminum trim with vinyl inserts, wide diameter caster levelers and triple plated corner sections (copper, nickle and chrome).

Step two involves assembly and fitting of the ball-drawer which contains the coin mechanism. This drawer, which dispenses the balls and collects the money, fits flush with the cabinet and is said by Kaye to be one of their many industry innovations. When the unit is completely assembled and fitted into the cabinet, it is carefully inspected—one of many inspection stations.

While this is going on, the slate



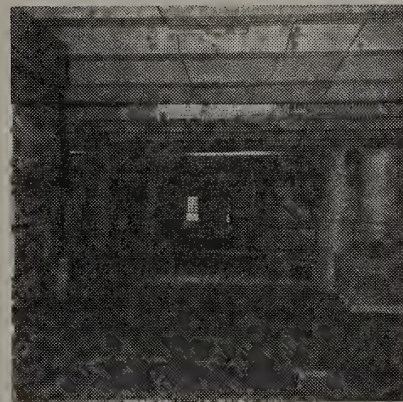

team has been working. With cutting and polishing facilities, the factory services thousands of pounds of slate daily—weights range from a small 75 lb. section to a total of 850 lbs. in the non-coin 'Continental' profes-

sional model. After the tedious and rigidly exacting construction of the cushion rails, the table is completely assembled and must pass a final inspection before being shipped.

Kaye's chief engineer, Jack Firestone, with whom he has been associated for 20 years is a coin biz vet who can include among his many inventions the Mutoscope 'Drivemobile' and early Bally pingames. Together they designed the 'Eldorado' pool table series—the series which Irving Kaye believes did more to boost the

standards of the pool table industry than any other factor.

Under the capable hand of the company's sales manager, Howard Kaye, the company will surely continue to enjoy the fruits of a solid business foundation. It should also continue to pioneer new ideas which will keep this particular phase of the coin machine industry as prosperous as it stands today.

Coin-operated pool table models which the Kaye Co. is currently offering operators through the company's authorized distributors include: five models of the 'Deluxe Eldorado' series—the Mark I, II, III, IV and V; the 'Deluxe Satellite' and two models of the 'Klub Pool'. 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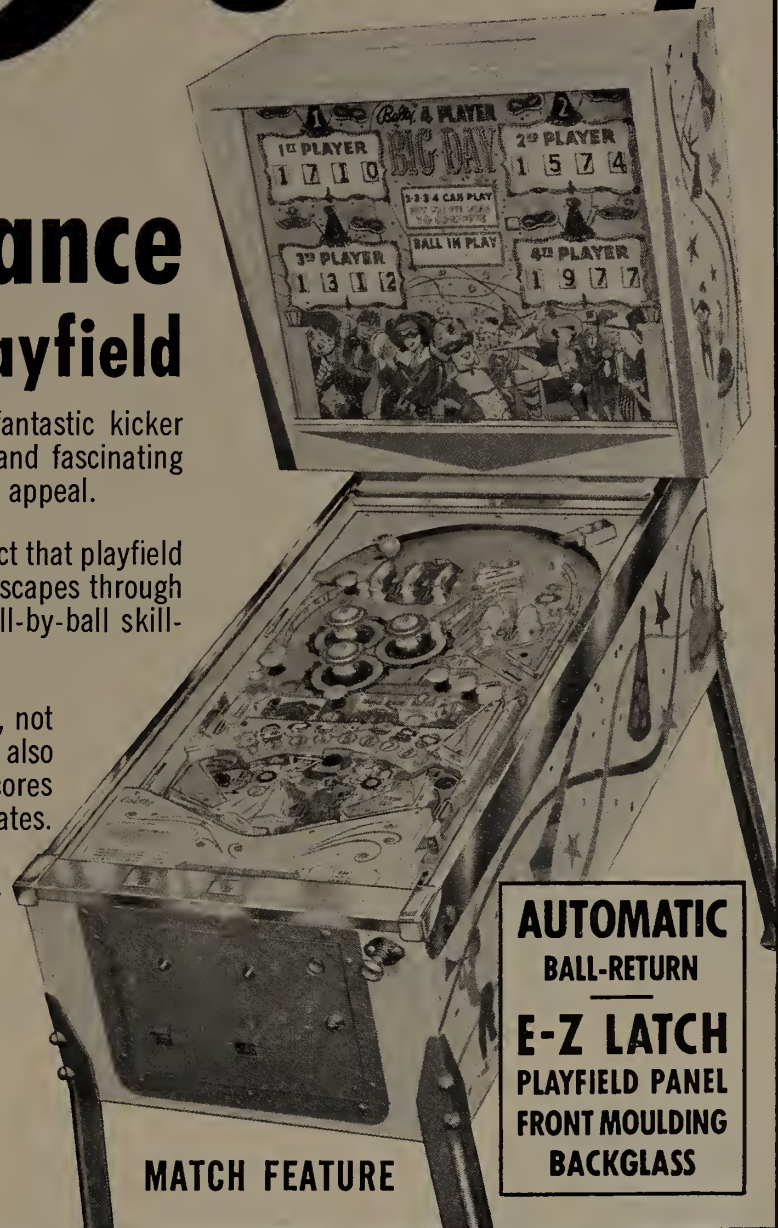

Wholesale Tobacco Prices Raised By Canadian Mfr's.

MONTREAL—Several Canadian cigarette manufacturers raised their wholesale prices last week 42 Canadian cents per thousand, causing a subsequent rise in the price of cigarettes per pack on the retail level of approximately one cent. This is the first price increase noted on the Canadian tobacco market since 1959.

Canada's largest producer of tobacco products, the Imperial Tobacco Company of Canada, was the first manufacturer to announce that they would increase the wholesale prices on their products. Among those brands effected by the price hike are the country's largest selling cigarette, 'Players' and the largest selling filter brand, 'Du Maurier'.

The rising price of labor, packaging materials and the leaf tobacco itself were among the reasons cited by those companies for effecting the increase. Those companies which joined Imperial Tobacco in authorizing the price hike included Rothmans of Pall Mall

Fedur Inc. Appoints Former Apco Exec

NEW YORK—Ed Kresky, has been appointed to an executive position with Fedur Enterprises, Inc. of 304 Long Beach Road, Island Park, L.I., New York, according to an announcement by Fred Durr, President.

Kresky, who had been in a similar position for Continental-Apco, Inc. for eight years, brings his experience to the Fedur Company, which specializes in the reconditioning and selling of used vending equipment.

Kresky lives at 24 Roberta Lane, Syosset, L.I., New York, married, he has two children.

Canada, Ltd. and Benson & Hedges, Ltd.

As in the United States, Canadian tobacco manufacturers suffered a drastic drop in retail sales immediately after the U.S. Surgeon General issued his 'Smoking and Health' report last January. However, as in this country, sales have since picked up to a point relatively the same as before the report was published.

ABC Consolidated 1964 Earnings Up

Expect Substantial 3rd Qtr.

NEW YORK — ABC Consolidated Corporation expects substantial gains in third quarter earnings and looks for 1964 profit that might well go to a record \$1.40 a share, Jacob Beresin, president, reported last week. Sales in the year should rise to about \$116 million, he said.

Last year, the national food service and vending company earned \$2,819,971 or \$1.03 a share on sales of \$102,637,909. Beresin said the company's revenue for July ran 14.9% ahead of July last year to \$12,048,000 from \$10,487,000, and that this 14-15% monthly revenue rise will continue through the end of the year. Net income in the 30 weeks to July 26 rose 45.4% to a record \$1,892,000 or \$.68 a share from \$1,301,000 or \$.47 a share in the like 1963 period. Sales climbed to \$65,505,000 from \$57,201,000.

Better utilization of overhead has reduced administrative costs and is contributing to the company's strong profit picture. Higher gross sales from recent new business including the Stein and RKO theatre chains, and from the company's network of toll road food service operations and industrial plant feeding, have also been contributing factors, the official said.

Edelman To Make Audio-Visual Conversion

NEW YORK—Iz Edelman, President of Cine-Sonic Sound Inc., background music manufacturing firm, announced last week that the firm will go into the production of units which will enable juke box operators to convert present models to audio-visual machines via a television tape unit fitted out with tapes available from the firm's present inventory of fifty selections. Edelman said that 100 tapes would be available by the end of the year.

The unit, which is to be a low-cost machine, will fit atop a juke box and will activate a tv tape— $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch in size—thereby projecting the picture on a screen, similar to taped television techniques used today by tv stations.

If successful, the unit could stimulate interest and sale in the audio-visual concept which is presently being marketed by Cinevision Corp. of America (Scopitone), and Scopitone-USA (Scopitone), two firms which import the units from Europe for sale to operators here.

Edelman will not have the unit at the MOA Convention in October but expects to release the conversion by the end of the year.

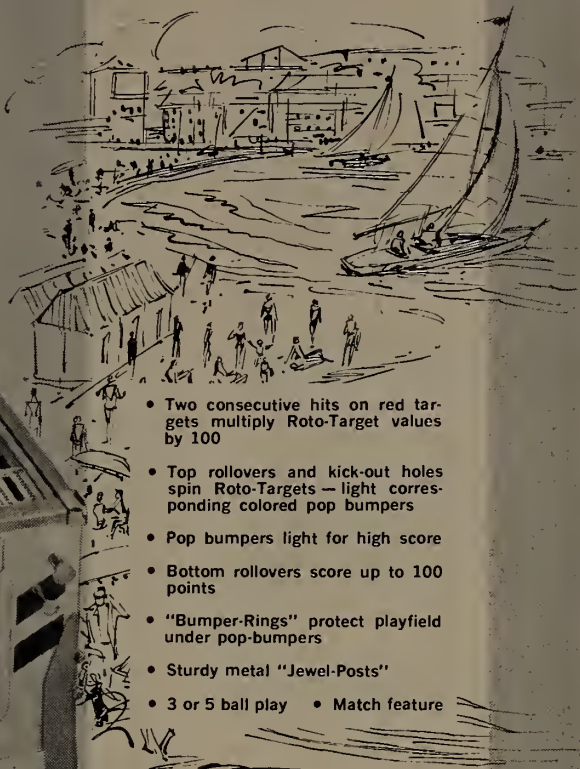

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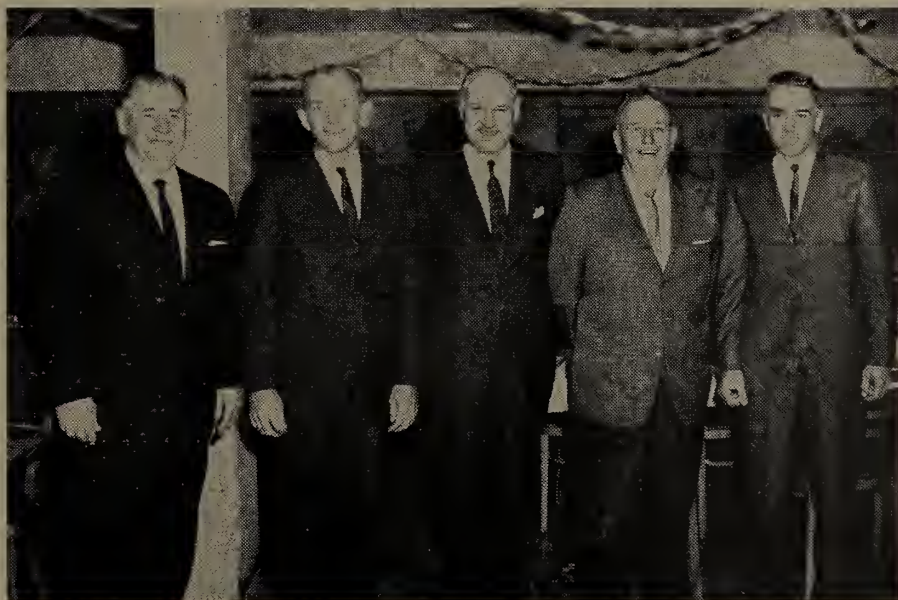
