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Shut out: In what activists called a blatant act of union-busting, the Sprint long-distance company last month closed a San Francisco subsidiary named La Conexion Familar one week before its 235 employees were scheduled to unionize. But the workers aren't going quietly. Most of them are Latino, and when Sprint sponsored an event in the Mission District — allegedly to promote Latino business — Debora Marta Simsponsored an event in the Mission District — allegeaty to promote Latino Districts — Debold Marta Sim-covich and 40 other former employees showed up for a silent vigil. Meanwhile, the Communication Work-ers of America have filed a federal labor complaint against historically antiunion Sprint, with support from the San Francisco Labor Council, the Latino Democratic Club, and Supervisor Terence Hallinan.



All the while I lived in Rome, I longed for San Francisco: The smell of the Bay at Aquatic Park, the sound of the foghorns in the night, and sourdough toast for breakfast. Since moving back here two years ago this week, I've fallen under the spell of Rome's nostalgia: The dank, heavy smell of history in the centuries-old palazzi; the colors of the market at Campo de' Fiori; the frenetic impatience of the Italians.

I have several friends - all native San Franciscans - who have recently moved back here, or are considering moving back, from as far away as London and as close as New York. They all say the same thing: They don't want to totally abandon the ideal of San Francisco without coming back and giving it one last try, if nothing else as a tribute to the city that they can't get out of their system. So we're all trying, but it's hard to get much done with all these house guests.

Speaking of nostalgia, check out page 37, where Johnny Angel rakes the forced, commercial recreation of Woodstock over the coals. For news that you definitely didn't read in the Chronicle, read Martin Espinoza's page 18 article on the gutting of Nancy Pelosi's Presidio bill last week. On page 17, City Editor Ron Curran reports on the lessons San Francisco can learn from L.A.'s experience in trying to bring ethics to City Hall. Pia Hinckle

More popcorn

very much enjoyed Brad Wieners's article "Popcorn and Caviar" on Bay Area literary agents [July literary supplement]. I am a published novelist from the former rugoslavia where, like much of Europe, agents are rarely used. Instead, a writer deals directly with a publisher. Once established, he/ she becomes a "house writer."

As a newcomer to the Bay Area literary pulpit, I have had to learn some startling things from agents:

1. Let them choose your topics. You're a writer, so let them tell you what to write about. They know. They are looking for something 'good and contemporary." My new (sixth) novel, The Former Future, deals with the turmoil in my country. After briefly consulting with a few agents, I've decided next to write a cookbook titled What to Do with Broccoli Leftovers.

2. Always choose a font appropriate to your plot and characters. For example, never use Roman T scalable 14-point italic if you are writing about Rwanda. It just doesn't "go."

3. Be careful about selecting the right post office for mailing your work. You shouldn't use Lathrop if you're sending your masterpiece to Two Fifth Ave. in New York. Also, the stamps you put on the envelope holding your work - don't use nature stamps if you're writing about industry.

4. If you scent your envelope, use Opium perfume only when you're sure that what you have is not a book for children.

5. Agents are concerned about length. The best way to avoid having a 150- or 500-page novel is to let them do the page numbering. Leave a blank space for numbers, at least on the pages with boring passages.

TITH COMMITTEE ON JOBS representatives from AT&T, PG&E, the Chamber of Commerce, the Shorenstein Company, and others in full lobbying dress in the audience, the downtown forces won yet another major victory at the Aug. 8 Board of Supervisors meeting.

Supervisors Terence Hallinan and Sue Bierman pleaded and cajoled the two purported liberals (Supervisors Carole Migden and Kevin Shelley) to vote their progressive credentials and approve a payroll tax on business to help save some of the services and glories of San Francisco. Shelley even twice voted in ignominy against continuances so that the five absent supervisors could vote at later meetings. The power of JOBS — representing the CEOs of 23 of the city's largest employers, most of whom live out of town and won't have to live with a bleeding city — was evident once again.

The following day, JOBS members were poised to launch a new front in their move to take even more power at City Hall, crush progressive politics, and continue their attack on the neighborhoods and small businesses of the city. JOBS was once again seeking to kill the only voice small business ever had in City Hall — the Small Business Advisory Commission (SBAC) — and quietly replace it with a JOBS-dominated commission operating under the mayor with no independent staff, executive director, or budget (see On Guard, page 10).

JOBS and Chamber of Commerce types have always detested the SBAC, founded in 1985 by a group of independent small-business people, and have tried to strangle and starve it to death since its inception. When Jordan took office in January 1992, the SBAC had an office, a staff of three, an executive director, and a budget of \$150,000, and was providing valuable technical help and information to entrepreneurs and small-business owners.

Quietly, brutally, the downtown business forces, working through Jordan, decimated these programs and then moved to kill the SBAC and replace it with a big-business commission in City Hall. They were beaten and SBAC "saved" by a last-stand rally by independent small-business forces. However, the chamber hired away the executive director, and Jordan allowed the commission to become defunct by refusing to appoint new members as their terms expired.

Now, after this nasty affair, JOBS is back with the same big-business commission proposal, working through the mayor and Supervisor Annemarie Conroy.

We will say some of the same things now that we said then: JOBS already has plenty of power inside and outside City Hall, and enough front groups willing to take its lobbying money. Small business, the engine that drives the local economy and creates new jobs, desperately needs a strong independent voice at City Hall. If there is to be another business commission, it ought to be the one that is already in place and has been shown to be useful and effective.

To JOBS and its latest attack on small business and the neighborhoods, we say: No, no, no — a thousand times no.

Let's revive the SBAC and make it work.

P.S. If you want to check how JOBS and Mayor Jordan look upon small business, call the SBAC at (415) 554-6500. No one answered when we called repeatedly during reporting for our July 20 cover story ("When the Chains Come Marching In"). Once our story ran, a recording was left on the number asking callers to leave a message. We did. We got a call back the next day from Carolyn Tavares, in the Mayor's Office, who abruptly cut us off when we asked why the mayor had let the SBAC die. She said she would call us back, but didn't. We left another message at press time; still no call back. Is this the epitaph for small business in the JOBS/Jordan administration?

Nuts to the Police Commission

HE SAN FRANCISCO Police Commission's Aug. 3 meeting provided a sparkling example of all that is misguided and potentially illegal with the Police Commission's modus operandi: a lack of zeal in pursuing its

modus operandi: a lack of zeal in pursuing its oversight functions and an enduring penchant for secrecy.

At that meeting, ACLU Police Practices attorney John Crew pointed out for the third time in six months that Police Chief Anthony Ribera has not disciplined officers against whom serious misconduct charges have been sustained.

And for the third time Crew's concerns were ignored by the commission.

Crew, using statistics provided by the Office of Citizen Complaints for the second quarter of this year, pointed out that Ribera had not disciplined 26 of 32 — or 81 percent — of the police officers against whom charges were sustained by the OCC. Of the others, one officer received a one-day suspension and five received a written reprimand.

The commission, most notably Commissioners Katherine Feinstein and Anthony Rodriguez, objected to Crew's assertions but refused to address the issue of whether Ribera had acted properly in not disciplining the officers involved.

Ribera then offered the commission the opportunity to privately review each of the disputed cases with him and his staff, stating that "you'll clearly see the logic of why I did what I did." Crew asked that the results of the chief's review be made public.

After refusing to acknowledge that a discipline problem existed, the commission moved to handle the problem secretly.

Commissioner Clothilde Hewlett refused Crew's request to share with the public the chief's rationale for not disciplining officers.

Frank Jordan's Police Commission is quite comfortable with such star-chamber proceedings. In 1993, after sexual harassment charges were filed against Ribera by police officer Joanne Welsh, the commission scurried behind closed doors to consider the evidence. When they reappeared, the commissioners unanimously declared that Ribera was cleared of all charges and promptly sealed the records of the case from public view. Then, after federal magistrate F. Steel

Then, after federal magistrate F. Steel Langford rightly blew the whistle on this wrongheaded secrecy and ordered disclosure, the commission then voted unanimously to appeal the ruling. More, the commission would have adopted a public records policy in violation of state and local sunshine laws, until stopped by open-government advocates.

We say nuts to all of these Police Commission shenanigans. The commissioners ought to remember that they are police chief Anthony Ribera's boss, not precinct sergeants who have to stand and salute whenever the chief squeaks in his swivel chair. And they must move to regain public confidence by demonstrating a commitment to open, accessible government.



Woodstock of a different color

EGARDLESS OF WHAT will or won't come off at Woodstock '94 this summer, I'm satisfied. I've just had my own kind of Woodstock.

The music wasn't rock — at times it was salsa or hip-hop or Chinese pipa — but the place was rocking.

It was called UNITY '94. And in Atlanta from July 27 to 30, it was an unprecedented gathering of the four major minority journalists associations in the country, brought together in Atlanta to highlight issues of race, media, and the news industry.

For at least a decade — two decades for some groups — the Native American Journalists Association, the Asian American Journalists Association, the National Association of Hispanic Journalists, and the National Association of Black Journalists have gathered independently of one another.

Not always aware of the other groups' existence, much less action, we nonetheless knew that UNITY '94 was a long time in coming.

Come together, it did. Four days, four groups, and 5,800 journalists of all backgrounds — black, Asian American, Latino, Native American, and, yes, European American — met, talked, and cut loose.

In pure terms of power, there were more top media executives in attendance than any of us are accustomed to seeing. Speakers included President Bill Clinton, by satellite, and former U.N. ambassador Andrew Young. Four major plenaries addressed the notion of political correctness, examined historical and modern stereotypes, assessed the civil rights and cultural movements of the 1960s and '70s, and probed the direction in which new technology will take the news industry.

There were plenty of formal motions and positions on journalism issues. The UNITY '94 board formally called on the news industry to refrain from using the terms *illegal alien* or *illegals* as nouns. Meeting in the city that gave us the Atlanta Braves and the "Tomahawk Chop" — the board also called on the news industry to stop using all sports team mascot names that are named after Native Americans. And it reminded the industry of its own oft-broken standard of using race identification in news stories only when race is truly relevant.

People struggled with nomenclature — the battleground of the political correctness debate — with no answers, but new insights.

Gathered under a joint banner in a united effort to focus attention on bringing change to the industry, it was a special moment in time. But not to everybody.

A white editor, who stayed back home in the Bay Area, took to calling it the "VFW" convention — short for "Very Few Whites."

Nonetheless, in a time when rhetoric substitutes for debate and the term "diversity" has been transformed into a meaningless buzzword, something real was happening at UNITY '94. In the hallways of the Georgia World Congress Center, where much of the meeting took place, in the little lounges and at the coffee stands, there were real people getting down to brass tacks.

I think of Sheila Stainback, now a CNBC correspondent, who spoke honestly of having to confront and cope with her feelings when she was removed from a weekday anchor slot and replaced with an Asian American woman.

I think of Ruben Villejas, a Latino copy editor for the *Rocky Mountain News* in Denver, who joined the Asian American Journalists Association this year to get familiar with issues for those journalists. Next year he's going to join the National Association of Black Journalists and then the Native American Journalists Association.

I think of Marin Independent Journal city editor Pamela Moreland, an African American, singing "Midnight Train to Georgia" at the Asian American Journalists' karaoke night, with a multicultural stage full of Pips.

Enough of us had those experiences to want to do it all again, to see how much further we can progress. Next time it may include a host of groups, including lesbian and gay journalists. Already, the buzz is: Let's come back for a "UNITY '98" or "UNITY 2000."

That was the real accomplishment of UNITY '94.


Bay Guardian bash at Fillmore salutes the best "Best Of" ever

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

Perata's tough new job

FEW WEEKS after Alameda County supervisor Don Perata lost his primary bid to be the Democratic candidate for state controller last June and in the process gave up his seat on the Board of Supervisors, I was talking to him about what his future might hold. I asked if he would be helping his old friend Mayor Elihu Harris in his November reelection runoff race.

"Nobody can help Elihu," he replied with a frustrated laugh. Two weeks later he took over as Harris's new campaign manager.

So last week I visited Perata at Harris's new campaign digs on 3rd Street just off Broadway near Jack London Square. ("I insisted we put the office somewhere that shows Oakland is working," Perata told me.) The first thing I asked him was why he took on such an admittedly difficult task. His answer was both personal and political.

He and Harris have been friends for 22 years, and when Harris asked, Perata said he had to assist. Then, sounding what will be a campaign theme, Perata called Harris's opponent Ted Dang "a recycled Reaganite" who would undo all the work Perata had accomplished in his time representing East Oakland, when he brought in millions of dollars of services through the East Oakland Fighting Back and Castlemont Corridor programs.

But Perata didn't minimize the difficulty of the task before him. An incumbent pulling only 37 percent of the vote in the mayoral primary was a terrible showing, Perata said. "Changing that will be like turning around a battleship in a tub," he added. But he's already started. "The first thing we have to do is slow Elihu down," Perata said. "He has

"The first thing we have to do is slow Elihu down," Perata said. "He has only one speed — fast. And he tries to do too much. That's an asset for an elected official, but it's a liability for a candidate. So we've hijacked his schedule. Instead of doing twenty things a day, he'll do eight and do them better."

That the normally independent-minded Harris has acceded to Perata's strategy can be seen in last week's reversed decision to debate Dang. Perata said Harris had been frustrated with the unfocused formats of the primary debates. With 10 candidates having only a couple of minutes per question, he never had the time to respond to all the inaccurate accusations the challengers threw at him. He didn't have room to define his positions, let alone display his wide-ranging knowledge of the issues, his agile mind, or his debating skills. This time it will be different.

"A debate should be driven by the incumbent," Perata said. "We should have bragging rights. Ours is not just another opinion."

Perata concedes Harris has an image problem stemming from his abrupt style and short fuse that people see on the televised council meetings. Perata plans on dealing with this by putting Harris on the house-party circuit, gladhanding in small groups. "He's at his best among people," Perata said. "He's not good at contrived events."

But the issues ultimately will decide this race and Perata plans to emphasize the sharp distinctions between Harris, who has used the position of mayor to bring in state and federal grants for community programs, and Dang, who wants to cut the mayor's staff and thinks government should "butt out" of service programs. With the other major issue on the Oakland ballot being an initiative to repeal the Landscape and Lighting Assessment District (LLAD) — a \$15.6 million property tax that funds the city's streetlights and parks — the issue of local government's role in the community will be front and center. Dang has joined the tax revolters in supporting repeal of the tax that hits hardest landlords who, like Dang himself, own multiple properties. Harris, like every other elected official in Oakland who has faced the agony of slashing social services to balance the budget, opposes the repeal. "LLAD will be the defining issue," Perata said. "It expresses to Oakland what we're here for."

Because Dang's cut-business-taxes, more-money-for-police and to-hellwith-services platform is so extreme, of all the council members, including Republican vice mayor Dick Spees, are backing Harris. (Interesting note: During the primary campaign, Harris often replied to criticisms of city policies by defensively saying he was only one vote on a nine-member council. If Dang is elected, the new mayor would essentially be useless because he won't have four other council votes to implement his policies.)

Playing up Dang's right-wing fanaticism is an important part of the strategy to mobilize local progressives who sat on their hands in June. Harris's campaign has lined up the endorsements of nearly every progressive group in the city, Perata said. And it may already be paying dividends. At a recent dinner held to thank primary-campaign workers, so many people showed up to volunteer for November that the hosts were overwhelmed. "We expected 100 people and got 250," said campaign coordinator Kerry Hamill. "We were scrambling for enough food. We had to do a kind of 'fishes and loaves' thing."

It may not take a miracle for Harris to win reelection. But be looking for Perata to pull a few rabbits out his hat.

Out of small business

Jordan moves to replace panel with big-business allies

FTER EFFECTIVELY killing off San Francisco's Small Business Advisory Commission (SBAC) two years ago, Mayor Frank Jordan is once again quietly seeking to replace it with one dominated by big downtown businesses.

A nearly identical proposal supported by Jordan was voted down by the Board of Supervisors in 1992 after a coalition of independent small-business representatives mobilized to save the SBAC. But Jordan (in possible violation of the City Charter) then let the SBAC commissioners' terms expire without appointing any replacements.

The latest proposal, sponsored by Supervisor Annemarie Conroy, would replace the SBAC with a new "Business Advisory Commission" consisting of 15 members from businesses of all sizes. The proposal is to be considered at this week's meeting of the board's Economic Vitality and Social Policy Committee.

Many former SBAC commissioners and business owners say they fear the proposal would effectively eliminate the only voice small business has at City Hall. "The small-business community doesn't have enough representation," Roland Quan, a former SBAC commissioner, told the Bay Guardian. "We need an independent voice so that we can work with big business on an equal playing field."

"The interests of large business and small business are not the same," Alan Trachtenberg, another former SBAC commissioner, told the *Bay Guardian*. "While small businesses really need help from the city, the big businesses in this town really want nothing but less taxes."

The SBAC, approved by a unanimous vote of the board in 1985, was once a strong voice for small business. As recently as January 1992, SBAC had an office, a staff of three, and a budget of \$150,000. But that was before Jordan let the terms of the commission members expire — five in 1992 and the remaining four in February 1994 (see Editorials, page 6).

Restaurant owner Andrew Lolli was still serving his term on the SBAC when the meetings stopped. He says he wrote a letter to the mayor to find out what happened and "to suggest that I thought it was very important that he have the commission." Lolli says he also tried repeatedly to reach Jordan aide Kent Sims, but his calls were never returned.

Phyllis Schneider, former director of the Small Business Development Center in San Mateo, said that government help in San Francisco became so scarce that merchants would come to her for advice. "If the city wants these people to continue to do business in San Francisco, it's going to have to provide some assistance to them," Schneider told the Bay Guardian.

Former SBAC commissioner Bob Sanchez said that before being phased out, the group was a real boon to small business. Commissioners routinely addressed problems ranging from securing city permits to concerns about chain stores moving into neighborhoods, he said.

Now, Sanchez told the *Bay Guardian*, those merchants have few places to turn in San Francisco. "I have nothing at all against big business," he said, "but there are issues that specifically concern small business and they're just not being addressed."

Stephen Cornell, former head of the Council of District Merchants, said he was part of the group that approached Conroy with this latest proposal. He said that the new broader-based commission would give small businesses more clout when dealing with the city. Businesses of all sizes "tend to have the same problems," Cornell told the *Bay Guardian*.

Cornell — who cosponsored a Committee on JOBS political advertising campaign targeted at neighborhood newspapers denied any connection between Conroy's proposal and JOBS. But he said he has asked JOBS representatives to testify in favor of the proposal at this week's committee hearing.

State senator Quentin Kopp (1-S.F.), a former supervisor, introduced the 1985 ordinance that established the SBAC. "[The proposal] shows a lack of respect for the difference between small business and corporate business in San Francisco," Kopp told the *Bay Guardian.* "It will be viewed by small-business men and women as a hostile act."

Conroy failed to return numerous Bay Guardian phone calls, and her aides refused to comment on the proposal. The measure would mandate that a majority of the commissioners, as well as the chair, come from businesses with fewer than 25 people. No seats are guaranteed for very small businesses, while two seats are saved for businesses with more than 500 employees.

POLICE Ribera's wrist-slaps Commission looks other way as bad cops let off easy

S AN FRANCISCO police chief Anthony Ribera has failed to discipline police officers charged with misconduct, and the Police Commission has refused to look into the matter, according to the director of the ACLU's Police Practices Project.

"This is an ongoing scandal," ACLU attorney John Crew told police commissioners during their Aug. 3 meeting. "There are 32 sustained cases and there has been no discipline in 81 percent of those cases."

Crew's figures came from a statistical report for the second quarter of 1994 that was just released by the Office of Citizen Complaints (OCC), the civilian-staffed agency that investigates complaints against police officers, interviews the officers involved, and, if the complaints are sustained, forwards the cases to the police chief for action.

For serious offenses, the chief can request that the commission hold a full hearing on the matter; individual commissioners can also schedule their own hearings. The commission can impose long suspensions or fire an offending officer. The chief may also suspend an officer for up to 10 days without *Continued on page 12*

Collecting history SAN FRANCISCO Ben Friedman, the legendary rock-art archivist of North Beach, turns 84. By Rafer Guzman

EN FRIEDMAN IS LIVING PROOF that a head for business and a kind heart are not mutually exclusive.

The San Francisco historian and owner of the Postermat, North Beach's rock-art archive and poster shop, celebrated his 84th birthday Aug. 7 in a modest flat above his store, surrounded by friends eager to offer testimony to his legend and sweetness.

"When I was eight years old, I came to Ben's store and saw Kitty-Kitty sleeping in the glass counter," A.J. Roques III told the *Bay Guardian*. "Ben saw me staring at the cat, so he took him out of the counter and let me pet him. What I didn't know was that the cat was so popular, Ben had begun charging a nickel a pet. So the whole store was watching me pet the cat and counting: '5, 10, 15, 20 ...' Finally, someone said, 'Hey, the kid's up to 50 cents, Ben.' But Ben said, 'The kid don't have to pay.' "

Friedman isn't the yarn-spinning live wire he once was — he had to give up his station behind the Postermat counter recently after suffering a stroke that left him partially paralyzed — but he's still "a real character," said Blandina Farley, a friend who now helps care for him. "Even though he was already an older man during the '60s, he loved hanging out with the kids. Especially the girls, of course. He thought it was a good idea to surround himself with young people."

Friedman started Postermat as Guerrilla Records sometime around 1960. When the Fillmore began staging its seminal concerts, kids would wander into the store with their free posters, which Ben would buy for around 50 cents and then sell for a dollar. Eventually he called Bill Graham and the Avalon Ballroom's Chet Helms and began buying the posters wholesale.

The atmosphere at the shop at Columbus and Vallejo was one of "diversity, even drama," writer Walter Medeiros recalled in a 1992 issue of Off the Wall, a poster art magazine. "The vibes from behind the counter were laid-back, no hustle on you. There was usually an attractive young woman back there, and Ben in his fisherman's cap.... To spend part of an afternoon or evening there was a nice little high — which I don't remember getting from the Haight Street poster shops."

When the hippie movement began its tailspin in the late 1960s and interest in the old posters began to wane, Friedman bought the bulk of posters left over at the Fillmore, the Avalon, and Berkeley Bonaparte, a production company. He then owned the nation's most extensive collection of poster art, storing the prints in an old North Beach eggnoodle factory and selling them at his Postermat store. He also loaned portions of his collection to museums and even opened up his own "Sixties Gallery" for a while.

Longtime acquaintances say that Friedman has been as instrumental as Greil Marcus or Jon Savage in documenting the history of rock and roll.

One of Friedman's admirers is poet Lawrence Ferlinghetti, who dropped by the birthday party to say hello. "I'm not really a close friend of Ben's," said Ferlinghetti, who nevertheless spent much of the evening at Ben's side, "but my dog knew his cat. In fact, my dog wanted to take his cat down to the Fillmore one evening, but Ben wouldn't allow it. He was afraid the dog would keep the cat out too late. Thought the dog was a bad influence, you know."

When asked what he thought of today's neo-Bohemians, Ferlinghetti grumbled: "They don't know how to draw. The posters from the sixties were real works of art. Look at this," he said, pointing at a rare Grateful Dead poster. "That's beautiful."

Blandina Farley and A.J. Roques III are determined to ensure that Postermat remains an archetypal San Francisco "business with a small b," more interested in performing a service than turning a profit. "We just try to get the posters out to people," said Roques, "and make sure there's a dollar in it for Ben. As long as Ben is here, we'll be here."



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

taking the matter to the commission.

This is what Ribera has done in most cases, much to the benefit of the accused officers: Of 32 cases that were sustained by the OCC during the second quarter of this year, just five officers received reprimands and only one was suspended — for one day.

Last November, police commissioners approved guidelines for disciplining officers who have complaints sustained against them by the OCC. The new discipline schedule allows for lesser sanctions due to mitigating factors, but the ACLU's Crew says that mitigating circumstances can't explain away the "almost I00 percent lack of discipline" that he described to police commissioners.

"Did 8I percent of these sustained cases end up with mitigations that resulted in no discipline whatsoever?" Crew later asked the *Bay Guardian*. "I find that very hard to believe. In fact, I find that impossible to believe."

Despite Crew's testimony, the five-member commission showed little interest in getting Ribera to get tougher with rogue officers. Commissioner Katherine Feinstein attempted to refute Crew's allegations by stating she "was very pleasantly surprised" at the expediency with which sustained cases were being brought to Ribera. But she did not address the issue of Ribera's subsequent lack of disciplinary action. Commissioner Anthony Rodriguez got visibly angry at Crew's comments. "Don't start accusing the commission of delaying these cases," he told Crew

Ribera told the commission that he would be happy to have the commission "go over the aspects of these cases with me and [my] staff," adding that "you'll clearly see the logic of why I did what I did." But when Crew asked that the commission make public the findings from any such meetings, Commissioner Clothilde Hewlett responded, "We can't release that."

When commissioners told Crew they would need more time to evaluate his allegations of lax discipline, Crew pointed out that he had raised the issue after the release of each OCC quarterly report. "We've brought this issue up to you twice in the past six months," he said.

Police Commission president Harry Low told Crew that he would have a response within 30 days.

Gebbie, the sequel?

Activists say Clinton's new pick lacks power

IDS HEALTH-CARE activists are calling President Clinton's choice to name an interim — rather than a permanent — AIDS coordinator last week yet another sign of his lack of commitment to finding a cure.

Clinton named Patricia Fleming, a former special assistant under Health and Human Services director Donna Shalala, to coordinate the nation's AIDS programs and oversee an expected \$2.6 billion budget. She replaces former "AIDS czar" Kristine Gebbie, who resigned under heavy criticism from AIDS community leaders for her ineffectiveness.

But activists are not thrilled with Gebbie's replacement, either.

"[Fleming] is not to be confused with anyone who could do any good in this job," Joe Fera, director of communications for the San Francisco AIDS Foundation, told the *Bay Guardian*. "The Fleming appointment," he added, is "a delay in appointing anyone who has any real authority."

Fleming did little to ease apprehension over her lack of authority when she said on Aug. 2 (the day of her appointment) that people shouldn't consider her to be an AIDS czar, but rather a traffic copstyle administrator.

Michael Weinstein, the president of the Los Angeles-based AIDS Healthcare Foundation (the nation's largest community provider of AIDS care), said that "there are many people of stature who would be good for the job." But, Weinstein said, the perception among potential candidates such as retiring Connecticut governor Lowell Weiker and retiring Oregon governor Barbara Roberts is that the position has little authority and few defined duties. Clinton's choice to appoint an interim coordinator, Weinstein added, is "a way of lowering expectations."

Since promising to make AIDS a top priority during his presidential campaign, Clinton has neither defined the parameters of the lead post, nor given Gebbie or Fleming any measurable power. "The AIDS community was outraged during the Reagan-Bush years because of [the] lack of action, but I think we've been lulled a bit under Clinton," Fera told the *Bay Guardian*. "We have a client base that's growing daily, so the situation is not better than it was."

If any community desperately needs national leadership in the AIDS arena, it's San Francisco. With just .29 percent of the U.S. population, Health Department statistics indicate that San Francisco is home to nearly 3 percent of the people with AIDS in the United States. Studies conducted by the department also indicate that the number of local AIDS-related deaths — soon to total 20,000 will continue to rise, because younger people are disregarding safe-sex practices.

Weinstein says that Clinton's appointment of Fleming should be a wake-up call for AIDS activists to put the pressure back on the White House.

"There needs to be a renewed commitment to activism," he said. "The honeymoon is over."

Berkeley's 'City Hall Live' Bay Cable will air educational and public-access shows

OOK OUT, Roseanne. Tuesdaynight TV is about to have a new contender this fall: The Berkeley City Council is going prime time.

After years of negotiations and preparation, Berkeley is about to provide "public, educational, and government" cable television for its residents. The new system will start out with one channel and then expand to three and ultimately eight channels if demand and funding allow. The station, to air on cable channel 25, will be available in Berkeley and accessible with basic cable services.

The nonprofit Berkeley Community Media (BCM) will run the station for the city. As part of Berkeley's deal with Bay Cablevision, the local cable carrier, the station will receive \$900,000 worth of

production from the company over the next 15 years. The station's \$115,000-a-year operating budget will come out of the 5 percent monopoly franchise fee that the city gets each year from Cablevision.

Because of its shoestring budget, almost all of the programming will be done by volunteers.

BCM executive director John Luvender told the *Bay Guardian* that programming should be on the air by October or November, depending on when the equipment and production studio are ready.

The station's educational programming will be coordinated by a committee with representatives from the Berkeley Unified School District, UC Berkeley, and Vista Community College, although Luvender added that any private school in the city is welcome to participate.

Luvender said that because government and educational institutions already have funding set aside for programming, most of the station's programming budget will be used for public-access productions. Luvender envisions the public-

Luvender envisions the publicaccess programming as a kind of electronic free-speech forum for the community, with restrictions pertaining only to shows that are pornographic or slanderous.

Workshop training for publicaccess programming and on-air slots will be determined on a first-come, first-served basis. "But we will have an affirmative-action approach to empower communities that don't usually have access to media," Luvender told the Bay Guardian.

Luvender hopes to eventually get the city to contribute more funding for the station. "We're under pressure to perform the first year to justify asking for more the second year," he said. "We're looking for lots of volunteers to make it work."

PG&E gets competition

City can bid on park power contract

N A PRECEDENT-setting move, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission on Aug. 4 approved the city's request to bid for the contract to provide electricity to the proposed Presidio national park, sending the request on to the Park Service for final consideration against a bid submitted by Pacific Gas & Electric.

The National Park Service is expected to award the Presidio power contract in September.

Larry Klein, General Manager of

San Francisco's Hetch Hetchy Water and Power agency, told commissioners that the city's bid would undercut PG&E's estimates considerably and would save taxpayers millions of dollars. "If they take our bid, [the Park Service] can save literally millions of dollars that they can spend on more important things at the Presidio," Klein said. Klein told the *Bay Guardian* that a copyof the agency's bid would not be made public until the Park Service's decision.

In his presentation to the commission, Klein echoed many of the arguments that public-power advocates have made over the years, most notably that city-supplied power can reduce electric rates while at the same time raising badly needed revenue for San Francisco.

Last year, the Park Service, in violation of federal competitive bidding laws, negotiated exclusively with PG&E for the takeover of the Presidio's electrical system (see "The Presidio Power Grab," 1/12/94). The Park Service paid PG&E \$80,000 to conduct a study of the system, which PG&E ultimately determined had to be replaced in its entirety at a cost of \$11 million.

But city officials commissioned their own study of the electrical system and found it to be "basically sound." The study, conducted by Sacramento-based Resource Management International (RMI), confirmed what many public power advocates had suspected: that PG&E's replacement of the whole system — which the Army has invested \$4 million in over the last 10 years — would be a huge waste of taxpayer money.

As a result, Klein explained, Hetch Hetchy's proposal contains two separate bids. The first, which includes the required estimate for building a whole new system, would probably still come in much cheaper than PG&E's estimate, Klein said. The second, "optional bid" proposes to retain and upgrade the existing system, at a savings of millions of dollars. "Part of the problem is that PG&E is trying to build a totally new system for the Presidio, and nobody knows what the Presidio will look like," Klein told the commission.

Klein added that another appealing feature of the city's bid is its commitment to energy conservation. George Frazier, vice president of RMI, said San Francisco's bid includes such energy-saving devices as state-of-the-art meters. "The city's proposal is going to include the equipment that would make the Presidio a world center for energy conservation and efficiency," Frazier said, adding that the city's Bureau of Energy Conservation would be oversee institution of the programs.

When asked whether the Park Service will give serious consideration to the city's bid, Mel Fowler, contracting officer at the Park Service's Denver offices, declined to comment.

The federal Raker Act of 1912, which allowed San Francisco to build a hydroelectric dam in Yosemite National Park, requires that the city operate its own publicpower system. But PG&E has used its political influence to keep that from happening for the past 70 years. Daniel Zoll

Kiss my assessment

Downtown to fight fairer Muni taxes

HE FIRST SALVO of the campaign against the creation of a Downtown Transit Assessment District was fired just a day after the measure qualified for the ballot, and it came from an increasingly familiar interest group in City Hall — the Committee on JOBS.

The progressive ballot measure, which would force downtown interests to pay a more proportional share of Muni costs, was submitted to the Registrar of Voters on July 27 with approximately 17,500 signatures, almost double the amount required to qualify for the November ballot.


A day later, Solem and Associates, which has been coordinating JOBS lobbying efforts, faxed an undated memo to members of the Board of Supervisors outlining a "Summary of a Possible Alternative Measure."

The alternative measure would redo work already completed more than a decade ago and — if placed on the ballot and approved by voters by a larger margin than the one given the Downtown Transit Assessment District — could delay implementation of a DTAD for years.

"This is merely a delaying tactic," land-use attorney and DTAD proponent Sue Hestor told the *Bay Guardian.* "The city went through all of the things Solem proposes 14 years ago. Why would they want to do it again unless it were to delay things?"

In 1980, the city commissioned an independent study to determine what benefits downtown property owners received as a result of the high concentration of Muni service to the downtown corridor. When the study was released in 1981, it revealed that downtown property owners received a \$21 million benefit in property values as a result of the frequent rail and bus service. Community leaders from other parts of the city tried to create a downtown assessment district to force property owners there to contribute more toward Muni, but then-mayor Dianne Feinstein killed the idea.

An earlier attempt to derail the latest DTAD ballot measure came this summer, when representatives of municipal labor unions — in conjunction with Jordan and JOBS proposed an alternative at a meeting between proponents of the DTAD and the JOBS/labor/Jordan alliance *Continued on page* 14

that would have included huge sections of outlying neighborhood business districts in the transit assessment district.

"Jobs and the labor unions were ready to expand the district to include hundreds, if not thousands, of small businesses and property owners along the Geary Avenue, Bush Street, and California Street corridors," said Calvin Welch, a neighborhood activist.

Very strange bedfellows

Feinstein helps Helms repeal gay gains in USDA

S en. JESSE HELMS (R-N.C.) cut federal funding for schools that teach tolerance for gays last week, but, worse, he scored a less-publicized victory for homophobia a couple of weeks earlier with the unlikely support of Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-Calif.). On July 19, by a 98-8 vote, the Senate approved a Helms amendment to a \$68 billion appropriations bill for the U.S. Department of

On July 19, by a 98-8 vote, the Senate approved a Helms amendment to a \$68 billion appropriations bill for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Specifically, the amendment was designed to undo progressive changes implemented by Agricultural Secretary Mike Espy, such as the USDA's recognition of the Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Employees Organization (GLOBE) as an employee organization.

According to the Congressional Record's account of Helms's remarks in support of his amendment (first obtained by the Bay Area Reporter), Helms told colleagues that he hoped to "stop the waste of taxpayer funds on activities by the Department of Agriculture to encourage its employees or officials to accept homosexuality as a legitimate or normal lifestyle. I wish this amendment were not necessary. But it is. You see, the Clinton administration has launched a concerted effort to extend special rights to homosexuals in the federal workplace - rights not accorded to other groups and individuals. The Department of Agriculture is obviously at the forefront of this effort."

Helms made it clear that he intended the vote to be seen as a referendum on gay rights. "I shall insist on a roll call vote because every American is entitled to know where his or her senators stand at the crossroads of twisted values," he said.

Sen. Barbara Boxer (D-Calif.) was among the eight senators who opposed the amendment. Feinstein voted for the bill with the amendment intact.

Feinstein's office did not comment on *Bay Guardian* inquiries by press time. Tom di Maria, president of the Bay Area Chapter of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, told the *Bay Guardian* he had spoken with a representative of Feinstein's office, who told him that the vote was made to end Helms's maneuvering on the bill and help it emerge from the committee stage with elements that Feinstein favored intact.

"I hope her vote was made in the spirit of moving forward, and that in the future she will be more vigilant about challenging him," di Maria said. But, he added, "It's extremely disheartening to have a moderate-toliberal Democratic senator and former mayor of San Francisco voting with the homophobic Helms. It sends the message that 92 senators are willing to vote with him just to get him to shut up, and I don't like the gay and lesbian community being seen as a disposable card. "

UPDATE

The San Francisco Independent, a minority-owned thrice-weekly free newspaper, is suing the San Francisco Examiner, charging predatory advertising pricing related to the Examiner's bid for the city's public notices contract.

The San Francisco Newspaper Agency, which manages advertising and printing operations for the *Examiner* and *Chronicle* under a federal joint operating agreement (JOA), was also named as a defendant in the suit filed in superior court last week.

The Examiner undercut the Independent by 30 cents per advertising line, charging \$1.10 to the Independent's \$1.40. But, according to the lawsuit, the Examiner and the agency are violating the California Business and Professions Code section 17043 by submitting a bid that was \$1,222 below its actual production cost.

Independent publisher Ted Fang told the Bay Guardian he doesn't see how the Examiner makes up for the loss, but that some of that financial information will be made available during the lawsuit.

The second cause of action alleges that the *Examiner*, through its pricing practices, is trying "to injure [the *Independent*'s] advertising revenue, and intended to destroy competition in the newspaper industry in San Francisco by eliminating the *Independent* as a competitor in that market."

"We sued [the agency] once and ended up settling in good faith," said Fang. "They've shown a record of bad faith — this time we're going to go all the way."

The *Independent*'s suit is the latest chapter in an almost yearlong battle for the lucrative contract to publish the city's legal and public advertisements.

"There was a little bit of a fight to win the bid, but I don't think we expected to be sued," said Steve Falk, senior vice president of advertising for the agency. "We think we're in a very strong position." Agency CEO and president James Hale declined to comment because the fight is now a matter of litigation. Martin Espinoza

Standing up to JOBS

SAN FRANCISCO What the city's new ethics commission must do to force reform. By Ron Curran



Carpetbaggers: Nearly 25 years ago, the Bay Guardian reported that more than half the leaders of the politically driven San Francisco Chamber of Commerce lived outside the city, effectively carpetbagging into town to make a buck before leaving the city's problems behind and heading back to their homes on the Peninsula and in Marin. Things aren't much different now with members of the Committee on JOBS.

Things aren't much different now with members of the Committee on JOBS. Voting and property records show that a full dozen of the committee's 23 board members have their primary residences outside the city and county of San Francisco. As the map illustrates, the remaining 11 board members who do live in the city have a very privileged perspective: Only two have homes anywhere south of Geary Boulevard and four are clustered in a few square blocks of old-money Pacific Heights, near the Presidio. There goes the neighborhood — or, if the Committee on JOBS has its way, the neighborhoods.

AN FRANCISCO has a new city ethics commission, with commissioners finally appointed and an executive director soon to be hired. The commissioners come armed with an overwhelming voter mandate to clean up City Hall and a budget to start pursuing potential influence-peddling and conflict-ofinterest cases.

Now they may have a blockbuster first case.

Supervisors Terence Hallinan and Kevin Shelley have independently told the *Bay Guardian* that they may ask ethics commissioners to probe the behind-the-scenes political campaign being waged by the Committee on JOBS, a consortium of San Francisco's most powerful corporate leaders pushing a big-business agenda at the expense of the city's neighborhoods.

As detailed by the Bay Guardian

in recent weeks (see "Hostile Takeover," 7/13/94) JOBS board members — including executives from Pacific Gas and Electric, the Gap, Bank of America, Pacific Telesis, and Transamerica — have spent more than \$1 million since 1991 to grease political wheels in City Hall. The elaborate operation includes contributing to various politicians, paying \$350,000 to the well-connected lobbying firm of Solem and Associates, and buying prominent ads in neighborhood newspapers.

In essence, JOBS is a private organization secretly shaping public policy — so far, without being subject to any public oversight.

The ethics commission was created by San Francisco voters last year to stop the same kind of insider influence-peddling epitomized by the JOBS effort. The five-member panel is nearly ready to investigate alleged violations of city ethics laws, and both Hallinan and Shelley say a probe of JOBS might be an appropriate first case.

"In my opinion, the way these JOBS guys are operating is completely illegal, at least as far as statutes like the federal tax law," Hallinan said. "I was going to take this to the city attorney, but if the ethics commission can finally get going, that might be the place to go now. We may need to tighten loopholes in city lobbying laws, but we should have the commission look into it and make a preliminary determination." (Hallinan has introduced legislation to make lobbyists disclose specific work done on behalf of clients, rather than simply list the general issues on which they work.)

Shelley, author of the Proposition K ethics measure approved last November, agreed with Hallinan. "The timing couldn't be better," Shelley said. "The more we learn about how JOBS is working the system, the more we should realize how much we need conflict-of-interest and campaign-finance reform. There seems to be real questions of special access involved."

But Shelley conceded that these powerful political entities will continue to try to sabotage the commission's authority at every step. "There's still enormous pressure and resistance out there," he said. "I'm sure there'll be legal challenges to the law."

Indeed, serious questions remain about whether the commission will be able to rein in JOBS and City Hall's myriad other entrenched special interests.

Local campaign-reform advocates have long pushed for creation of a local ethics commission, but were always met with vociferous opposition. The Prop. K movement was no different. Mayor Frank Jordan dismissed the effort as "imprudent" and suggested the city instead create "a citizens committee, appointed by the mayor, to address general issues of ethical concern."

Voters approved Prop. K, but there has since been some compromise. The commission has a support staff of only three employees and an annual budget of just \$160,000, compared to 16 employees and \$1.1 million for the Los Angeles ethics commission on which the San Francisco version was modeled. And rules governing full disclosure of lobbyist affiliations and political financing need to be strengthened.

Full access to details of political relationships is central to any reform effort. "Disclosure is the key," said Xandra Kayden, one of the country's leading ethics experts and a senior fellow at the Institute of Leadership Studies at Loyola-Marymount University in Los Angeles. "Without strong disclosure requirements, it's impossible to determine if a relationship or decision constitutes a conflict of interest. It's that simple."

Kayden added that disclosure is particularly important as governments increasingly incorporate private-sector input into public policy. "There's an argument to be made for bringing in new ideas, but too often there's a presumption that privatesector leaders should be put above the more-stringent requirements imposed on public-sector leaders. Monitoring these relationships becomes complicated, and you need a city's complete commitment to a strong ethics commission if it's going to wind its way through that public-private minefield."

Locally, the Committee on JOBS campaign provides a perfect example. Despite orchestrating an obvious political campaign (that has included hiring a lobbyist to sit in on salaryreform meetings with Mayor Jordan), JOBS members insist that the group doesn't have to report expenditures because it's a private organization.

L.A. lessons

Don't expect JOBS, other specialinterest groups, or their allied politicians to stand idly by if the city decides to toughen ethics requirements. Reformers in Los Angeles found that out the hard way, and the legal wranglings and political backsliding that plagued the formation of the L.A. commission offer an education for San Franciscans who support stronger ethics regulations.

A full 75 percent of L.A. voters approved creating a commission in 1990. But, as in San Francisco, many of the specific provisions and parameters were left to be finalized by the politicians, lobbyists, and lawyers whom the law was designed to monitor.

First, City Council members slashed the salary for the executivedirector position when it became clear that former Common Cause executive director Walter Zelman was the most qualified applicant, which led to Zelman no longer pursuing the job.

Respected ethics-advocate Benjamin Bycel — an attorney who once worked as a press aide for San Francisco mayor George Moscone — accepted the position and met with more council resistance. Bycel determined that the commission's autonomy could only be preserved if the council allowed him to use an independent counsel. City Council members, however, felt that City Attorney James Hahn was a better choice. Hahn was heir to one of L.A.'s most powerful mainstream Democratic families.

Perhaps the most audacious legal challenge of the commission came from a group of Los Angeles officials who filed a lawsuit in 1991 charging breach of privacy. The group was led by consummate L.A. power broker Doug Ring, a powerhouse attorney, government appointee, and scion of one of L.A.'s best-connected real-estate empires.

The new ordinance required Ring and others to publicly identify their personal financial holdings and the organizations that paid them to lobby. They sued and City Council members backed down, approving revisions that significantly weakened the law. The plaintiffs agreed to drop their suit— then billed the city for \$330,000 in legal fees they claimed to have accrued in gutting the law. City Council members, of course, agreed to pay.

Litmus test

San Francisco's commission could face some of the same problems. Enforcement of sanctions is left up to the city attorney (though Shelley says he'll fight for independent counsel) and some control over the budget to the politicians. The five commissioners were appointed by the Board of Supervisors (Virginia C. Gee), the Mayor's Office (Jo Ann Hendricks), the district attorney (Peter Aviles), the city attorney (Camille Pating), and the controller (Daniel Kalb).

Most of the appointees have a good reputation around City Hall for independence.

Potential problems and possible successes remain purely theoretical, of course, until the commission considers its first case. An investigation of the Committee on JOBS would provide a perfect litmus test for the new commissioners' legal skills and political will.

All quiet on the Pelosi front PRESIDIO Congress guts Presidio bill's financial powers. By Martin Espinoza

T WAS REMARKABLY quiet in Rep. Nancy Pelosi's (D-S.F.) office last week, despite the fact that Congress had just gutted her legislation to fund a public benefits corporation to run the proposed \$600 million Presidio national park.

On Thursday, Aug. 4, the powerful House Ways and Means Committee voted 18-16 to include a series of amendments that effectively remove many of the proposed corporation's controversial funding mechanisms — including the ability to borrow unlimited amounts of money from the state treasury.

Pelosi made no public comments to any media regarding the future of her embattled bill even though, as the *Wall Street Journal* reported Aug. 5, "some Ways and Means Committee members said the ... vote effectively guts the Presidio initiative by quashing the backdoor financing method that had been central to the plan...."

Local media were also quiet about the vote. The San Francisco *Examiner* and *Chronicle*, both of which have supported Pelosi's Presidio bill, HR3433, printed next to nothing about the crucial vote. The *Examiner* had a story by local writer Gerald D. Adams buried on page A24, and the *Chronicle* didn't even mention the vote — despite both papers' having Washington, D.C., bureaus.

After the Aug. 4 Ways and Means Committee hearing, Bay Guardian sources here and in Washington reported that the vote was a bipartisan effort: Restricting amendments were introduced by acting committee chair Sam Gibbons (D-Fla.) and committee member Bill Archer (R-Texas). The approved amendments limit the corporation's ability to borrow federal funds and subject any such borrowing to the congressional appropriations process - a yearly and time-consuming procedure. The changes are bound to slow up the plans for private development at the Presidio and would pit the park against funding requests for other national parks.

"Archer's amendment takes away the Presidio [corporation's] ability to freely borrow money from the government," said one San Francisco official in Washington, who asked to remain anonymous. "The sense is that the bill will not make it to the floor and will be reworked or dropped."

"Good riddance to bad rubbish," said Neil Eisenberg, a member of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area Advisory Commission, about Pelosi's bill. Eisenberg told the *Bay Guardian* that since early this year, he's been asking his fellow commissioners what would happen if the Pelosi legislation didn't fly.

Eisenberg said the response from other commissioners was always the same: Pelosi would take care of it.

"Everything was predicated on there being a [Presidio corporation]," Eisenberg said. "The inmates of Napa State Hospital couldn't have done a worse job of environmental planning."

The Ways and Means Commit-

tee amendments to HR3433: • Place a cap of \$150 million on state treasury fund-borrowing.

• Give the treasury lending discretion and base loan requests on "analysis of the credit worthiness of projects to be funded."

• Prohibit the corporation from borrowing from private markets.

• Require the corporation to abide by Internal Revenue Service code guidelines regulating 501(c)(3) tax-exempt charitable trusts.

A committee staff report on the financial aspects of the bill states, "The committee contends that the [Presidio funding mechanism does] not represent a model to be used for any future legislation."

The committee's actions last week represent the first real monkey wrench thrown into the Pelosi legislation steamroller that critics say could lead to the commercialization of the 218-year-old Presidio military post, and set a dangerous precedent for the national park system.

Bay Guardian phone calls to Pelosi's Washington, D.C., and San Francisco district offices were not returned.

Bay Area corporate and private interests have contributed more than \$2.5 million to the Presidio conversion planning process (see "Presidio Inc.," 1/12/94). Downtown financial and legal firms, most critics agree, stand to benefit from the estimated hundreds of millions of dollars of economic activity expected to take place in the park.


Pelosi and Park Service officials have defended the concept of a public/private corporation on the grounds that without it, the Presidio conversion would never have the funds to get off the ground. The Park Service, they argued, does not have the expertise or resources to carry out the rehabilitation and leasing of the Presidio's infrastructure and hundreds of historic buildings. Private management, they said, was the answer.

But for the past several months, the Park Service has already been conducting bidding and lease proceedings for the Presidio's multimillion-dollar electrical distribution system, a child care center, and the 1.3 million-square-foot Letterman Army medical complex.

Don Scott, a retired state and national park ranger, told the *Bay Guardian* that Pelosi's bill is completely unnecessary and should be "overwhelmingly defeated."

Scott said that Congress doesn't need to create a private corporation to manage the Presidio or any other park. Instead, he said, it should bring the National Park Service back to its original purpose: Preserving public resources.

"The Presidio is the site that is either going to make or break the National Park Service," Scott said.





Environmental showdown?

Pelosi ducks animalcruelty issue

N WHAT COULD BE the beginning of an environmental showdown over appropriate uses of the proposed Presidio national park, Rep. Nancy Pelosi (D-S.F.) has ducked former Sierra Club leader and San Francisco environmentalist David Brower's objections to possibile animal experimentation in the park's planned research facilities.

Control of the 218-year-old Presidio military post is scheduled to be transferred from the Army to the National Park Service in October. Some neighborhood groups and urban environmentalists fear the \$600 mIII on park project could end up looking more like a business complex, with blomedloal research being conducted by public and private groups such as the University of California at San Francisco.

Although Pelosi aliles like state Assemblymember John Burton have quietly taken a position against animal testing at the future Presidio, animal-rights advocates say Pelosi is resisting such a position because it could hinder the chances that UCSF will become the Park Service's first major tenant.

"She might as well be saying that she totally opposes David Brower's and John Burton's statements that they oppose animal cruelty in a national park," Eliot Katz, founder and president of the animal rights group In Defense of Animals (IDA), told the Bay Guardian.

Katz added that Pelosi has refused requests from IDA members that her iegislation include provisions prohibiting animal crueity at the Presidio. Frustrated IDA leaders contacted Brower's Earth Island Institute, a respected Bay Area environmental organization, and Brower responded with a June 29 letter to Pelosi in which he stated that "abuse of the environment or any living creature has no place in a national park."

Pelosi effectively dodged the issue in a July 12 letter to Brower by stating that her legislation "does not specify any particular use of any facility at the Presidio.... Tenant selection for the Letterman complex is within the exclusive jurisdiction of the National Park Service and its review board.... My office does not, and will not, have any role in tenant selection."

Brower was unavailable for comment at press time.

Earth Island institute president Carl Anthony told the Bay Guard-Ian that supporters of animal rights were not appeased by Pelosi's response. "It would be horrible to have animal testing at the Presidio," said Anthony, whose organization backed the Pelosi bill. "Our support did not imply any support for animal testing."

Pelosi did not return Bay Guardian phone calls for comment on the subject.



Rwanda's killing fields: The French legacy

An interview with Rakiya **Omaar. By Dennis Bernstein** and Greg Saatkamp

CAN'T BELIEVE THIS," one French soldier said, horrified, as he yanked the body of a barely breathing infant from a stack of limp corpses - all Rwandan refugees - about to be bulldozed into a mass grave near a refugee camp in Goma, Zaire. "This is beyond the imagination," he told a Reuters reporter. "Indeed it is," one Red Cross worker in Zaire told the Bay Guardian. "it feels like humanity itself is dying."

While the French soldier gasps at the byproduct of Rwanda's killing fields, little has been said about his government's involvement in propping up the Hutu government that facilitated the tribal massacres that in turn led to one of largest refugee exoduses in modem history.

According to international aid workers and human-rights activists, the French government helped train and arm the Hutu government's military forces in the civil war against the Rwandan Patriotic Front (RFP), the Tutsi and Hutu minority rebel group that declared victory in mid-July.

The fighting that led up to the RFP victory, and the Hutu-led slaughter of more than half a million Tutsis and minority Hutus that triggered the flight of more than two million Rwandans (a quarter of the population) into neighboring countries, began after Hutu president Juvenal Habyarimana died in a mysterious plane crash April 6, just days after signing a peace agreement with the RFP.

When the RFP rebels were on the verge of triumph over the Hutu government forces, the French government sent a United Nations-sanctioned mission to set up a "security-zone" in southwestern Rwanda to protect endangered refugees. Toward the end of June, Hutu military leaders began broadcasting announcements from a clandestine radio station inside the French zone that the victorious Tutsis were killing every Hutu left in Rwanda. The radio broadcasts sparked another mass exodus into neighboring Zaire. The French government said it was unable to locate the radio station and stop the broadcasts.

According to aid workers and international news reports, among

the thousands of Hutus now in refugee camps in Zaire are also troops from the Hutu government, many still armed and in intact battalions, apparently organizing to relaunch the civil war against the RFP from Zaire.

In the following interview, Rakiya Omaar, codirector of the London-based African Rights, an international human-rights organization focusing on Africa, talks about the situation on the ground

inside Rwanda in the aftermath of the slaughter and mass exodus, and about the role the French government played in creating it. Omaar, a Somali national, recently returned from three months surveying the situation in Rwanda and its neighboring countries. She spoke to the Bay Guardian by phone from London.

Bay Guardian: What were your impressions of the situation in Rwanda?

Raklya Omaar: I think one of the most shocking things is the scale of the killings. It's very difficult to play numbers games in such a situation, but I cannot believe that fewer than three-quarters of a million people have been slaughtered in Rwanda. Inside the country, you see thousands of people with the most horrific wounds lying in hospitals and orphanages. Almost every church in Rwanda has evidence of these slaughters.

A lot of the parishes [mostly Catholic-controlled villages] can hold up to 75,000, 100,000 people. In many of the parishes, you will see thousands of decomposing bodies — still inside the church, under the altar, inside the maternity clinic. You see whole villages that are completely empty. You see tens of thousands of displaced people wandering around terrified, dumbstruck with the enormity of what they have seen. Nothing, absolutely nothing

that I have ever done in human rights could have prepared me for Rwanda. It is a truly shattering experience.

BG: So the massacres actually happened in the churches?

RO: The majority of people, having fled their homes, went to a church. Some fled to schools or hospitals, but the most common sanctuary sought by people was a church, precisely because they thought that surely they cannot come into a church and kill unarmed civilians. In spite of the fact that Rwanda's history has been punctuated by killings, it has never happened that people were killed inside a church. They thought this would offer them protection, but unfortunately this time they were wrong.

BG: If France's interests in Rwanda are not all humanitarian, then what do you think they are?

RO: France has been criticized vociferously both within and without Rwanda for supporting a regime that is guilty of genocide and other terrible human-rights abuses. By promoting so-called humanitarian intervention, I have no doubt that the French would also like to make people forget about their previous involvement in Rwanda, and be remembered instead as the only country that acted when the rest of the world would do nothing. But I also think that without Africa, France will have no opportunity to be a great player on the world stage, and

therefore France must be seen to be a key player in Africa.

BG: Are there links between the French military and the militaryled massacres in Rwanda?

RO: Well, the French have sold and provided an enormous arsenal of weapons to Rwanda over the years. French officers provided military training of the militia, and when the RFP invaded Rwanda on the first of October, 1990, the French sent troops into Rwanda that fought on the side of the government. The French did not leave until August 1993, nearly three years later. So, the French military has been involved in Rwanda since 1990 and in sending the government weapons long before that. The French have a very, very close relationship with the killers.

BG: What is your assessment of the United Nations and the Security Council's support for the French intervention in Rwanda?

RO: The very fact that the U.N. operation in Rwanda is being held hostage to the French initiative that the U.N. will only go in when it's convenient for the French just goes to show the bankruptcy of the U.N. policy in Rwanda. The Organization of African Unity (OAU), whose politics I have criticized very much in the past, in this instance can hold its head up high. When the U.N. secretary general said he wanted to send 5,500 men into Rwanda, the secretary general of the OAU worked very hard and found most of those men. The government of Ethiopia volunteered to contribute not just men but also weapons and even offered to arm some of the other contingents if that was necessary. The only thing the Ethiopian government requested was help with the transport of troops to Rwanda.

Now if the French really wanted to help Rwanda, why didn't they make the resources available to transport those men from Ethiopia into Rwanda? Indeed, the French were only there to prevent an all-out military victory by the RFP, but it appears too late for that.

BG: What about the U.N.'s initial response when the massacres began?

RO: The United Nations had more than 2,500 men in Kigali, in the Rwandan capital, the day the slaughter began. Tens of thousands of people were killed on the streets in Kigali under the very noses of U.N. troops, and they did absolutely nothing except airlift a few prominent politicians to Brussels. The disgust and the sense of bitterness about the role of the U.N. in Rwanda is something that really and truly overwhelms you as a visitor.

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SURFING

Secret swell

Outing Northern California's monster wave. By David Batstone



Wave action: "At the time everybody was talking about the big waves off the north shore of Hawaii, and how 16-year-olds were tackling them," says leff Clark. "I wanted to keep up with those guys ... here.

HE SURFERS ARRIVE at the first break of dawn. Colonies of seals and sea lions are there to greet the board-riders as they paddle their way out beyond the rocky reef. In a matter of minutes the biggest wave you've ever seen emerges from the sea mist. The surfers are immediately transported atop emerald cascades of rushing water.

Yells of triumph and terror echo as they glide across the wall of water, when out of the deep flies a freshly snapped board cut loose from its beleaguered rider. Several sea lions push off their rocky perch in chase of board and surfer. A marine carnival is set in motion.

Welcome to the magical world of Mavericks, the monster-wave capital of surfing. Daredevil surfers come from around the world to brave its swells, which in the winter can mean waves of up to 50 feet. It is the Mount Everest of surf, the ultimate challenge in a sport that pits human ingenuity (and a slice of Fiberglas) against forces of nature.

Too bad Hawaii has all the killer waves, right? Well, believe it or not, Mavericks isn't located in the 50th state. Instead, you can catch some of the biggest waves in surfdom within 25 miles of San Francisco.

Located off Pillar Point at the northernmost tip of Half Moon Bay, Mavericks easily qualifies as one of Northern PHOTO BY WILL SMITH

California's best-kept secrets.

Mr. First Rider

Local surfer Jeff Clark has been in on the secret for some time. Clark, now 37 years old, was 10 when his family moved to nearby Miramar Beach. And he wasted no time learning the fine art of board riding.

Big waves were always his first lovc. There were days when the riptide was so fierce out in the Pacific that surfing was out of the question. So Clark would paddle out into the water and just lay on his surfboard, feeling the power of the water surging up and down.

He recalls hearing older surfers drop references to Mavericks, "but no one let himself think he had the ability to try it." Mavericks's swells typically break a quarter-mile off the coast. Clark and his buddies would surf a bit further up the coast at a spot closer to the shore. But when the waves on their breakwater reached the 15-foot mark, they could sec a swell off in the distance churning out the kind of humongous waves that feed a surfer's imagina-

"At that time everybody was talking about the big waves off the north shore of Hawaii, and how 16-yearolds were tackling them," says Clark. "I wanted to keep up with those guys ... here. So I always pushed it, surfing the biggest waves I could find. That's why Mavericks was constantly gnawing at the back of my mind.'

("Gnawing?" Terrorizing might be closer to the mark. Imagine this scenario: You are casually walking down Market Street one sunny afternoon when a four-story hotel lifts off its foundation and hurtles toward you. You turn on your heels and run, but the hotel gathers speed and is rapidly gaining ground. In desperation, you jump feet-first on the hood of a taxi that is waiting for the light to turn green. The taxi takes off down the street as you fight to keep your balance. You're now moving 35 miles an hour, but the building is still in hot pursuit. If you lose your footing and fall, the hotel will crush you...)

In 1974, the moment finally arrived. Clark had conquered his fear and felt ready for the challenge. Problem was, he couldn't find anyone crazy enough to do it with him. So he went out to meet his destiny alone.

The ocean was perfect that day, no wind and a glassy surface. Clark

set off from the jagged shore and made his way out past the rocks to the break. Once there, he positioned himself for an incoming swell. He paddled furiously to catch the first wave at its break point, when the beautiful swell becomes a treacherous curl. Within a split second he was up on his feet, then the water shot up 35 feet in the air, bringing him along with it. No time to react, he was free falling down the face of the wave, the board barely clinging to the water.

The next moment, he was being thrown forward at high speed as the wave flattened out and accelerated toward the next shelf. He glided to safety

His first reaction: "Man, I've got to get a bigger board."

A star is born

Mavericks became Clark's own private Idaho for the next 15 years. Not that he didn't try to share the fun.

"I always knew it was a worldclass wave," says Clark with a laugh, "but it was all I could do to get someonc to paddlc out there to keep me company." Fear kept his friends away. Territorial pride stifled the curiosity of others

Santa Cruz has always enjoyed the reputation of being the surf town of Northern California, a crown Southern Californians have always bequeathed with more than a little condescension. So when Clark told other surfers that the biggest wave in California, and maybe the world. could be found off Pillar Point, everyone just laughed. They knew the big fish/small pond rap of the local surfer all too well.

In 1990 he finally convinced two San Francisco surfers to come down to his neighborhood for a joy ride. They rode Mavericks for several hours and lived to tell the tale - to everyone they knew in the surf world. It wasn't long before surfer magazines heard the rumors and sent their correspondents to sniff out a story. The coverage reached a crescendo with a 20-page color spread in Surfer's Journal. There, on the cover, is a photo of Jeff Clark outriding a titantic Mavericks special. The word was out.

From almost complete obscurity a few years ago, Mavericks has reached something akin to cult status. Images of its wave now adorn posters, center spreads, T-shirts, and videos.

Surfers like the young and talented Evan Slater talk as if they've found a new religion. Slater was weaned on the swells of Todos Santos in Southern California, a site long considered the number-two bigwave spot in the world (after Hawaii's kingpin, Waimea Bay). Slatcr came to Northern California to check out prospective universities (that are near big waves, that is). After three days on Mavericks, he chose UC Berkeley. "This place makes Todos Santos look likc Disneyland," he was heard to say.

Not everyone is so willing to elevate Mavericks to superstardom. Again, ego and tradition are at stakc. It is no coincidence that the first news story on Mavericks in the mag-Continued on page 24

azine Surfer featured only Santa Cruz surfers. It was made to look like they had dawdled their way up the Santa Cruz coast for the afternoon. It took a while for local surfers like Jeff Clark to get their due.

Mavericks also is consistently snubbed by the mainstream surf world. For instance, it is completely ignored in the current canon of wave meccas — Endless Summer II.

Clark does not attribute these oversights solely to envy or slight. "It is such an ominous wave, it represents the dark side of the surfer's psyche," says Clark with a Freudian twang. His final analysis: Many surfers hope that Mavericks will simply go away.

Surfer spirituality

That dark side of the surfer psyche manifests itself in a very personal relationship to the sea.

A few years ago Clark went to nearby Montara Beach to check out the surf. The conditions that day were lousy, but he decided to go in anyway. There was one board rider already out there, though the guy seemed more interested in waving back toward the beach than in surfing. But as Clark paddled closer, he realized that the surfer, overwhelmed by Montara's slashing riptide, was in trouble. By the time Clark reached him, the surfer was nearly unconscious and foaming at the mouth.

Clark grabbed him by the waist, threw him over his own board, and headed back to shore. Once on land, he dragged the surfer's limp body up the beach, rolled him over, and pumped liters of water out of him. Emergency services were called and the guy survived - by the skin of his teeth.

More than enough trauma to call it a day, right? Just goes to show how little we understand the surfer psyche.

Clark remembers: "After the ambulance took him away, I paddled back out and tried to surf. But it was like the ocean was saying to me, 'Yeah, right, you're not surfing here today.' So I got angry and yelled back at it, 'Why were you trying to drown that guy?' The ocean growled, 'Don't even ask that question or I'll slap you around.' And that is exactly what happened. I got my butt kicked on every wave 1 took!"

Here is the unadulterated spiritu-

ality of the surfer, stripped bare of the dreamy search for the perfect wave. It all boils down to the surfer-'s relationship to the ocean.

"The ocean's so alive," Clark says with a tone of reverence. "You cannot compare it to playing baseball on a field. Since every wave is different, no two rides will ever be the same. The ocean has moods, you know. So the better your relationship to the ocean, the more focused you will be on a board."

Boon or bust?

Half Moon Bay has always seemed a world away from San Francisco. Costanoan Indians lived here for hundreds of years after the arrival of European settlers to California's shores. In 1585 a Spanish navigator charted the rocky shoreline and its tempestuous waters, claiming it for the king, but warned off any future voyages. That was a lucky break for the natives, since they were not "discovered" until 1769.

By the mid-1800s, the surviving Costanoans were good Christians and Pillar Point had been transformed into a whaling center. But a rugged coastal mountain range still kept the region isolated from the San Francisco peninsula. That's what made it such a haven for bootleggers in the 1920s.

It is easy to understand why Clark and other local surfers do not

want an influx of board-riding tourists to ruin their privileged bond to Mavericks. Clark speaks with shivers of a recent trip to the northern shore of Hawaii, where he had to fight off 30 other surfers for every wave. The fevered pitch of the crowd drove him to distraction and sent him out of tune with the rhythms of the water below.

He is quictly confident, however, that Mavericks will never turn into an amusement park. For starters, it is nearly impossible to ride its waves with a standard 7-foot board. while the cost of a custom big-wave board is around \$500 (at present Clark sells specially designed "Mavericks boards" out of his garage). The cost alone eliminates all but the most serious of surfers.

Then there is the intimidation factor. Clark says that many people, including professional surfers, have bought one of his custom boards, paddled out to Mavericks, watched the first set of waves at close range, and returned to shore to sell the board back to him.

Even the Mavericks name came about from the grassroots tradition: Local legend has it that it was named after a surfer's dog in the 1960s.

So local Half Moon Bay merchants are not exactly expanding their inventories in response to Mavericks's new-found fame. Most surfers are not cash-heavy tourists who spend their time culling through boutique stores. More realistically, the local 7-Eleven might see an upswing in Slurpee sales.

But Mavericks may give Half Moon Bay what whale hunting, bootlegging, or the annual pumpkin festival never could: Mystique. Sure, a local restaurant is haunted by a bootlegger's girlfriend who was killed during a rum run back in the '20s, but that's like a fog machine compared to the mystique of a 50foot wall of water with mood swings.

The geology of the wave

T THE RISK of spoiling the magic that envelops Mavericks, the key to its power lies on the ocean floor. At the entrance of the chan-nel that runs toward the northern end of the Bay lies a canyon that is nearly 100 feet deep. It is the unusual depth of the canyon that allows large swells to enter the zone unobstructed. Water then moves rapidly through the canyon until it hits a shallow reef of 15 to 20 feet. Once the fast-moving swells hit that reef, the excess water has to go somewhere, so it moves straight up. Momentum then carries the newly formed wave forward over the top of the water that runs below.

That's why Mavericks Is In full bloom during the winter season, when stormy weather is more apt to blow large swells toward the coast. Its swell window" typically runs from Nov. 1 through April 15. Climb up the cliffs behind the Pillar Polnt radar station between those dates and you are likely to see a spectacle. Visit in the summer months and you may see locals on their rafts sipping iced tea.

The biggest winter storms start in the Aleutians and pass south along the Pacific Coast. Clark, who has a loose network of friends in Oregon who alert him once the swells are rising, is not the only surfer who is privy to this information. But most dedicated surfers are also hooked into a weather-satellite fax system that sends out charts tracing the movement of the storms.

The swells usually last for two days, but Clark recalls that in January '93 they came rushing in nonstop for two weeks. "You don't pass up an opportunity like that!" he says. "By the end of

the second week we were all suffering from adrenaline fatigue.

The Feminine Critique

Iroquois home

PSTATE NEW YORK — This visit to my native biosphere has' been a chance to check back in and find new things in old places. It's wet here in the Northeast — it's rained a lot so the leaves and grasses don't have to grow hard, shiny shells to hoard moisture. They're soft, open, expecting the rain they need.

People have a harder time. But that's another story.

Here's my report on my summer vacation. It's about the Iroquois Indian Museum, set blasphemously on a road of tourist traps in the beautiful rolling farmland that was once Iroquois forest.

I became fascinated with Iroquois culture long after I left the Iroquois land where I grew up. I discovered that centuries before 1848, when the first U.S. women's rights convention was held in Seneca Falls, the Seneca themselves, along with the Cayuga, Onondaga, Oneida, and Mohawk, built the power of women into every aspect of their political and social lives. Councils of women elders chose chiefs at all levels and removed them from office if they didn't watch it.

So when I got to the Iroquois Museum I turned into one of those weird people who read every word on every little white card. I will restrain myself from telling you the exciting things I learned about the triangle in Iroquois design, the symbolic significance of wampum, and Iroquois dream analysis. But if you end up near Cobleskill, N.Y., someday, check it out.

What I liked best, of course, was that the museum confirmed what I already thought — such a reassuring experience for the opinionated. The importance of women in Iroquois society was basic, like the forest. It was evident in everything in the museum, from historical accounts to the contemporary painting exhibit: The artist chose to depict leadership by doing a series of portraits of his tribe's current clan mothers.

In traditional Iroquois society, women were responsible for growing the basic food — corn, beans, and squash — along with the usual duties of cooking, making clothes, raising children, etc., etc. Lineage was traced through the mother, and extended families, connected through women relatives, shared longhouses. The oldest woman was the head of the longhouse, and each adult woman had her own section. If she wanted to marry, she proposed to a man. If he accepted, he moved into her place in the longhouse. If it didn't work out, he went back to his mother's longhouse. The kids stayed in the home with the group of 10 to 30 adults and kids they'd always known.

The stability and community the longhouse offered children contrasts painfully with the way so many kids and parents are tossed around and isolated today. The new campaign of political moralism (Clinton, Charles Murray, etc.) is trying to fix all that disruption by telling parents they should all be married. It reminds me of the proposal to stop seismic activity by pouring concrete into the Hayward fault.

It's always seemed so risky to me to base children's economic and emotional security on something as volatile as a romantic relationship. The Iroquois longhouse wasn't a convent. It encouraged and supported sexual unions. It just didn't stake home and children on the myth that they would all last forever.

I don't know what new forms of family and community people today will create, but I do know that they won't all look the same. I've gotten over my first enthusiastic conclusion that everybody should copy the Iroquois longhouse. But I still think it has a lot to teach us.

Another inspiration I'm sending back is the Iroquois's greatest true story. We all need to hear it, we who live in such a violent society that we can hardly believe it's possible to do what the Five Nations did: They called off war. *And* they created a peaceful, democratic federation that lasted for centuries.

The Great Peace didn't come because women were leaders, nor because of Native Americans' spiritual superiority. It was achieved through a long political campaign by a small, committed group of people whose home villages started out thinking they were nuts. Two guys (Diganawideh and Hiawatha) became outcasts in their tribes for advocating peace. They hooked up with each other and with a woman (Jigonsasee) who agreed with their views, and the three went from tribe to tribe arguing and bargaining. They won many converts, and finally overcame the most stubborn opponents by offering them powerful jobs in the new federation. Then peace reigned among the Iroquois for centuries.


But there was a catch: Wars against other groups continued. That's partly because not all peoples bought into the Pax Iroquoisiana. But also, without war, there wasn't enough for the men to do. Sure, for a while in the fall they could hunt. Everybody appreciated a little bear meat in the succotash. But it was really just an extra. So when the Algonquin or some other tribe wanted to start something, the Iroquois guys were ready.

Unfortunately the clan mothers didn't realize the solution: Computers and sportscasts.

Better yet, what about weeding the corn or telling the kids a story or \dots

Star Lite, star bright

NLIKE San Francisco's famous Chinatown, the East Bay version in downtown Oakland is underpublicized and geared more toward locals.

In Oakland's Chinatown, as in San Francisco's, Cantonese cuisine dominates and Szechuan follows. But Thai, Vietnamese, and Cambodian cuisines are also represented in the form of numerous bakeries, coffee shops, produce markets, and restaurants.

But you needn't worry about making a decision when the time comes to choose between Chinese and Vietnamese cuisine. You can enjoy *both* under one roof in a casual, spotlessly clean lunch and dinner house called Star Lite Restaurant.

Star Lite is easy to spot with its brightly decorated facade and equally cheery interior. On the second visit I was issued a "new, improved," severely abbreviated, user-friendly menu organized into categories and designed for those unfamiliar with Asian cuisine. I suggest ordering from the less-organized but comprehensive tome if possible. Save the short version for hunger crisis.

The cold noodle roll (no. 3; \$3) at Star Lite — tightly packed with skinny rice noodles, fresh mint and basil, prawns, and thinly sliced pork — was as good as any you'll find. Ditto for cold beef salad with mint (no. 153; \$5), a dish defined by thin

Due for release are Vanilla; Pears: A Country Garden Cookbook; and International Chicken Soup Cookbook. slices of tender beef tossed with peanuts and several varieties of fresh mint, served on a bed of finely shredded red and white cabbage and thinly sliced sweet onions. The accompanying vaguely sweet-hot sauce enhanced the bright, refreshing flavors.

I'm not sure how king crab egg rolls (no. 1; \$4) earned their name, but the little deep-fried cylinders made with egg wrappers (rather than Southeast Asian-style rice paper) and filled with cellophane noodles, carrots, ground pork, and a pleasant-tasting mystery substance, was a greaseless, delectable appetizer.

One taste of the crab soup (no. 14; \$4) confirmed my initial suspicion regarding its price tag. The translucent, robustly flavored broth included a couple lengths of green onion, large squares of silky tofu, fresh tomatoes, disintegrating fish balls, and a few reconstituted dried shrimp - but not one shred of crab. The classic lemongrass beef (no. 17; \$4.25), although delicious, also seemed to be missing an ingredient: The mixture of thinly sliced lean beef, caramelized onions and shallots, garlic, toasted peanuts, and dried chili peppers had nary a hint of lemongrass, but it did make a tasty topping for a tangle of rice noodles.

On the other hand, five-spice barbecue chicken (no. 57; \$5), exhibited all the right stuff in all the right proportions. Spice-infused chunks of succulent dark meat sporting crispy-brown skins showered with toasty shallots and garlic, and garnished with barely pickled garlic cloves, carrots, and cucumbers, made for a generous and palate-pleasing dinner. As venison, quail, squab, frog legs, and eel are all offered at Star Lite (check with your waiter for availability), plain old duck may seem tame. Those enamored with coconut curries, however, will relish the succulent chunks of bone-in duck, sweet onions, and carrots swimming in a sumptuous, fire- and spice-laced coconut-milk sauce spiked with peanuts, ginger, jalapeño peppers, and garlic (no. 163; \$5).

Shrimp and barbecue pork salad (no. 66; \$6.25) was a bit more complex and visually stimulating than expected. One can make neat little bundles using lettuce leaves to wrap the thin, rectangular "pads" made from cooked rice noodles, sliced cucumbers, sprouts, fresh mint, and skewered and grilled prawns or thinly sliced marinated pork.

Vegetarian chow fun (no. 48; \$5) at Star Lite was subtle and delicately flavored, albeit a little oily, in comparison to most meat and/or poultry versions. A colorful mixture of fresh Chinese greens, broccoli, snow peas, carrots, bok choy, red bell peppers, baby corn, straw mushrooms, roasted gluten, fried tofu, and plump rice noodles defined this satisfying meat-free meal.

If the ridiculously low prices aren't enough reason to visit Star Lite, make it the endless number of truly authentic, well-prepared dishes. Add the amazing assortment of exotic and familiar beverages and desserts, and you have the makings of an outstanding dining experience.

All disclaimers having been disclaimed.



reviewer, so let me tell you about what we ate....

Honestly, the p's were not intentional. Without even thinking twice I ordered "plato tipico" (\$4.70), which consisted of two pupusas, one pastelito, and one enchilada Salvadoreña. And I don't know how many times she thought, but T-C² got "pollo Salvadoreño" (\$5, served with rice and refrieds) and "platanos fritos y crema" (\$2.75). And we both would have had melon drinks, I swear, except that they were out of them, so we had to settle for pineapple.

The enchilada was the best thing on my plate, although it wasn't really an enchilada, if you ask me and I wouldn't if I were you, because what do I know about Salvadoran food? (Answer: Nothing.)

It was a crispy corn tortilla piled up with pork, cheese, lettuce, and some other things — in other words, a taco. Well, whatever it was, it was good.

The pupusas — one chicken and cheese and one bean and cheese were bland and dry until I figured out that I was supposed to wet them down and spice them up with that pickled cabbage/carrot mixture, and salsa, and whatever else was lying around. Do you know what pupusas are? I didn't. They're these flat, fried things, see, with stuff in them.

As for the pastelito, I still don't know what that is. Well, it's a fried thing with stuff in it, sort of, only smaller than and different from pupusas. I found it pointless.

The fresh salsa (\$1.50) was soupy and mild, and therefore pointless as well, except when mixed in with the unfresh salsa, which was hot as heck.

Thump-Chuka Thump-Chuka, in spite of her odd name, kindly fixed me up a sampler plate of her selections. I thought the chicken was good, the refrieds and rice were medium, and the fried plantains were bad. But then, I don't like plantains, fried or otherwise, so I should probably keep my mouth shut.

Overall, I wasn't impressed with EI Zocalo's food, and neither was $T-C^2$, who does like plantains. I found the restaurant atmospherically uneventful and servically so-so. However, I can think of several reasons to go back there, or to go there, if you haven't been...

One: The prices really are very cheap.

Two: The menu is huge. Judging by all the many untried Mexican and Salvadoran dishes, I'm sure there are some great ones. (I'm pretty sure, anyway.) And three: It's open until at least

And three: It's open until at least 3 a.m. seven days a week, and until 4 a.m. on Fridays — which is a rare and beautiful attribute in San Francisco, especially useful for deejays, uke-players, and other happenin' nightlifers.

Bad behavior

T WAS ALL going fine at the Warfield's big Sandra Bernhard solo show last year. She was channeling the supermodels, steamrolling . over jazz standards, doing her cynical semi-striptease, and making the fans spit up their drinks as they gurgled out laughs. Then this annoying hiss issued from a table near the front — and I would have turned and told the person to shut up. But, as it happens, the hiss was coming from me.

The problem was, Sandra Bernhard was starting on Queen Latifah as a rapper who deserves special critique for spelling her name out too much. I agree, there are only so many times you can hear "Q-u-e-e-n-L-a-t-i-f-a-h" and find it danceable. At that moment, however, I was thinking I'd much rather see Bernhard being read for taking a cheap shot than hear Queen L. being called to task on her affinity for spelling. But even as I struggled to swallow my drinks and enjoy the rest of

But even as I struggled to swallow my drinks and enjoy the rest of show, I realized the comedian had accomplished her goal. She'd created a mixed gut-reaction.

After listening to Bernhard's new product, *Excuses for Bad Behavior* (coming to a store near you Aug. 16), I experienced the pleasure of ambivalence once again: Ecstasy during her rendition of "Manic Superstar," with an Axl Rose-like psychopathological Jesus, and agony during "The Letter," her lesbian dis.

It's another collection that will give Camille Paglia plenty to think about. Because, like Paglia and her collection of female greats, *Excuses for Bad Behavior* doesn't offer any. It's more of a rudeness demo. The preview tape that came my way played side A on both sides, but it's not hard to get the idea from the first half-hour of covers and caps. Sandra Bernhard doesn't take issue, she ridicules the idea of it.

She opens with a standard New Age parody and moves on to the old age (of Aquarius), where we can be embarrassed by the idea of sexual liberation — an anachronism now — as Bernhard mournfully, caustically croons out her version of Sylvester's "Mighty Real." She takes a shot at self-indulgent alienation with the cast of homicidal New Yorkers in "Lonely Town," and another at self-indulgent romantic angst in "Who Knew." Finally, she gets to the people who really seem to piss her off — women who like *Roseanne* too much.

In "The Letter," she graduates from critic to bully. "Oh Christ, why is she singing," it begins. "I didn't buy this album to hear her sing. I want her to bitch and complain and talk about supermodels and act sexually ambiguous and titillate me and make me resent her for not being there as a role model in the lesbian community." She goes on, in whiny character, "You see I don't feel good about myself and when someone like her changes gears and starts singing, it scares me because I think she's getting soft and turning her back on me, running away into this false security of mainstream America, like maybe she wants some *peace and quiet* and that makes me feel unwanted and unloved or frankly completely rejected like I want to cry and cut myself with a razor so that when my lover comes home she'll forget about herself and run into the bedroom and hold me with vanilla candles burning and Tracy Chapman playing."

OK, then. Time to cross lesbians off the marketing plan for this particular tape? Time to call in the focus group for some earnest soul-searching? Or time to just realize that it's better to be publicly addressed than publicly ignored?

It's not actually the most difficult question to answer. If lesbians weren't out there listening, it's difficult to know who, exactly, would get the joke. Bernhard finesses the difficult position of speaking to an audience without speaking for them. If the piece isn't about "being nice," neither is Sandra B. And to be on the list of targets, right there with Jackie O. and Prince, is, well, an achievement with different consequences than landing a segment on *Geraldo*. Sandra Bernhard's audience is not the Bible Belt. It's the post-Boomer Belt, the world where cultural references connect people the way telephone wires once did. It's nice to know that vanilla candles and Chapman-o-philes have made it onto the phone tree.

Out where?

While Sandra Bernhard pushes the identity politics pain threshold, Marci Blackman and Trebor Healey's new anthology, *Beyond Definition* (published by Manic D), does its own original work in the world of boundaries. Susie Bright introduces the collection of stories and poems by talking about fighting her own persona to get more than a sound bite out when she's interviewed. Recently she was described, she says, "for the umpteenth time," by a New York journal of record as "a San Francisco lesbian sex guru." "If anyone told *me* they were a 'lesbian sex guru,'" Bright says, "I would tell them to get a life."

Thankfully, no one in *Beyond Definition* makes such claims. Underexposed greats of the local queer literary scene(s) such as Christian Huygen, Elissa Perry, and Al Lujan demonstrate how free-range nonstraight writers can be when they aren't boxed into "coming out" stories and political diatribes.

Club trouble

East Bay scene searches for a place to call home

AN PLONSEY and his band the Manufacturing of Huniidifiers were looking forward to their first show at Merchants, one of the few venues to regularly feature live underground rock and experimental music in the East Bay. Two days before the July 29 gig, however, Plonscy got a call from the club's booker notifying him that his show, along with other future bookings at the tiny downtown Oakland dive, had been cancelled.

It wasn't the first time Plonsey's band had a local gig canceled at the last minute. A few days before the Manufacturing of Humidifiers were slated to play Oakland's Heinz Afterworld Lounge in the spring of 1993, that club shut its doors on live music for good. "I've started to think, 'Oh no, we're cursed,'" said Plonsey. More likely, it's the East Bay

More likely, it's the East Bay club scene bearing the curse. With the sudden closure last year of the much loved Heinz, Larry Blake's recent move away from adventurous rock bookings in favor of a lineup heavier on dance music and traditional blues fare, and the temporary cancellation of shows at Merchants following the firing of booker Lorieann Murray two weeks ago, local underground bands have had a hard time finding a permanent home.

And though Merchants's owner Pat Jackson says the bar will begin presenting live music again this weekend, the episode highlights the perpetually fragile state of the East Bay club scene. Despite the wealth of adventurous-minded musicians and music fans who live in the East Bay, few clubs catering to underground music have managed to stay alive for long. "There hasn't been an owner of

"There hasn't been an owner of a club to come along that was sympathetic to the needs of community," said Marc Weinstein, co-owner of Berkeley's Amoeba Music and himself a member of several local bands. "There hasn't been an owner yet to come along who realized the commercial potential."

Funky locales like Merchants, Weinstein said, have thrived for short periods of time because of the efforts of "really wonderful, highenergy, idealistic people" such as Murray and former Heinz booker Lexa Walsh who get something going, despite little or no financial support from the club own-

Murray, who was fired following a clash with the club's management, says she and a crew of volunteers had hoped to build a community for local musicians and artists at Merchants. "Dan Rathbon [a member of the band ldiot Flesh] had built the stage there," she says. "He never asked to be paid, it's all volunteer." Another local musician revamped the sound system, she adds, and others would provide celectic tapes to be played between bands.

Murray managed to reschedule the Manufacturing of Humdifiers' show to the Stork, another down-

town Oakland bar, and has since begun booking music therc regularly. Even if the Stork's environment is geared more toward oldtime country than avantgarde rock, Murray says the management is supportive of her plans.

"They're willing to put money into it," she says, including hclping to pay part of the advertising costs for shows and keeping admissions costs low. "Their enthusiasm is really refreshing, they're nowhere near as cynical as other club owners."

Murray says she hopes to organize a

consistent schedule of live music at the Stork club by October. And if Merchants succeeds in reestablishing its own regular shows, what started as the latest blow to the East Bay music scene could end up providing the impetus for a low-budget local club revival.

The trouble started when a temporary roommate of Wilkerson's appeared briefly on a recent episode. "He liked some girl who was on the show," explains Wilkerson, "and he got on, kissed her, and left her a note saying 'call us anytime.' And the number was shown." Wilkerson says MTV attempted to blur the last four digits of the num-

Wilkerson says MTV attempted to blur the last four digits of the number, but failed to obscure them. A professional BMX bike rider, Wilkerson says he keeps his number unlisted because he gets too many calls from fans as It is. Now he's mad because he had to change his number without being able to wam his family, friends, or business associates. Wilkerson says he's considering suing for damages.

The illin' fields

Why Woodstock '94 was born to fail. By Johnny Angel

MAGINE THE REACTION ONE MORNING last week when the post-drive-time deejay on boomer-oriented '70s rock station KABL announced that, with less than two weeks to go, ticket sales for the 25th anniversary - Woodstock festival were 100,000 short of a sellout.

Not much of a surprise, really, with each ducat fetching \$135 (plus a \$30 service charge), and Woodstock Ventures promoters selling them only in blocks of four. But you could almost feel the palpable joy in the deejay's voice as she made the announcement, as if this was her generation's shining moment, her chance to tell off those bastards for commercializing the sacred pilgrimage to Saugerties, N.Y. Maybe I'm inferring more than I should, but to the thirtyand-somethings of our rancid global sphere, Woodstock has taken on a mythos that dwarfs its real significance.

Consider: Neither the Beatles nor the Stones, Elvis, or Dylan played the first Woodstock festival. Nor, for that matter, did the Velvet Underground, Black Sabbath, Led Zeppelin, the Stooges, or the MC5. The former acts were the onus of all rock music at that time; the latter were the backbone of the music's future. Besides Jimi, the Who, Sly, Janis, and Creedence, Woodstock i was mostly a parade of tired folkies and blooze jammers of the white male persuasion. And as far as the hippie Utopian vision goes, Woodstock - not Altamont was the beginning of the end.

The real heroes of the three-day fcstival in August 1969 weren't the promoters, who were woefully unprepared to handle the aromatic, mud-encrusted throng, but the U.S.

Air Force. The same guys responsible for napalming the Vietcong were dispatched to airlift food to the site. So much for "kill the pigs"; that day it was more like "free bacon, yippie." And don't kid yourselves: Had this been a political rally instead of a stoned, anarchic version of the vastly superior Monterey Pop Festival, it would have been Dickie Nixon and His Army headlining, not Jimi Hendrix and the Band of Gypsics.

Twenty-five years later, Woodstock has taken on a significance that bears no resemblance to the muddy orgy at Max Yasgur's farm. And even if anything good came out of the first festival, it certainly can't be reproduced today, like some colorized filmic update of

newsreel hippie heaven. That was then, this is now. And now, there's no such thing as a unified mass bohemia; no vestige of what the wags back in peace 'n' luv times called the *counterculture*.

Having Osterized our society into minute market shares and demographic segments, there is no youth-culture-based united front today like there was in 1969. The Vietnam War may have polarized the nation as a whole, but as a frightened teen it at least helped you define what side you were on. It would be easier to Superglue Humpty Dumpty's shell than to piece together today's fragmented youth market. Better a rap-a-thon on one stage, a mega-rave on another, and a grunge fest on another. Even Lollapalooza's multikulti vibe appeals to an almost entirely white, middle-class, college-bound crowd.

In 1994, rock itself is old and tired. At the first Woodstock, promoters took a chance on unknowns like Santana and Joe Cocker and made them stars. (Both acts are also reappearing this year, perhaps hoping for another career shot in the arm.) At Woodstock II, the most left-o'-center performers slated are Green Day and Nine Inch Nails, both recent MTV stars and goldrecord recipients. Add to that the slew of rules that will be imposed on the crowd: no alcohol allowed; no video cameras; toting children is

strongly discouraged. This time around, concertgoers won't even be permitted to bring their own food. As Joel Selvin reported in the *Chronicle*, promoters say it's because they're worried about food spoilage. But the move also ensures a gouge-a-thon for Food Host Corp., which will operate 900 concession stands on the festival grounds.

The biggest question of all? How did Woodstock '94's venal promot-

ers expect to dupe 250,000 souls into paying through the nostrils for the privy of enduring a mass campout in a carefully fenced swamp-tobe that sounds about as attractive as a weekend in Secaucus and an expensive one at that?

Don't think these criticisms have escaped the entrepreneurs who've spared no physical or spiritual expense to assuage the agony that's certain to result from that gaping hole in your bank account. In addition to on-site ATM machines, the Woodstock '94 grounds will house its very own "Eco-Village," which a glossy media brochure trumpets as a model community "alive with knowledge, hope, and a genuine commitment to improving life on earth." Funny how they try to soften the blow of their own brazen profiteering with politically vapid parlor tricks and calculated P.R. moves. It reminds me of porn movies that throw in a sprinkling of socially redeeming dialogue in order to earn an NC-17 rating instead of the dreaded X.

But, as they say, Woodstock '94 is an event. A happening. The rockand-roll Super Bowl. Buffalo cookies, says 1. It's merely an attempt to milk the unconscious, atavistic yearning for a time when people made a bona fide effort to accept and tolerate each other, at least under the aegis of a rock show. And it is doomed to fail. In fact, Woodstock '94 may leave no cultural imprint deeper than an overpriced sound track, commemorative hats and T-shirts, and those glimmering limited-edition Woodstock Pepsi cans.

So, to update Joni Mitchell's "Woodstock," that rousing tribute to pastorality and Edenic togetherness, join me in a sing-along of this year's should-be anthem, the aptly titled "Corpstock":

By the time they made us Live-stock We weren't a quarter-million strong

And everywhere was a palm that I had to grease, yeah

I dreamed I saw Mr. Donald Trump's plane riding shotgun in the sky

Dropping twenties, tens, and fives upon our nation

We are starstruck



And I've got to admit I've lost my boho hard-onunnnn.





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

Mommie dearest First-time director David Russell explores uncomfortable territory in Spanking the Monkey. **By Dennis Harvey**

AMILY IS like a gun — you point it in the wrong direction, you're gonna kill somebody," deadpans Martin Donovan in Hal Hartley's 1991 film *Trust.* Writer/director David O. Russell's debut feature, *Spanking the Monkey*, takes that idea of emotional punishment to cruel and unusual extremes.

Raymond Aibelli (Jeremy Davies) is a fast-track college sophomore paying an emergency visit home. Arriving in his Upstate New York burg, callous traveling salesman dad Tom (Benjamin Hendrickson) decrees that an eagerly awaited summertime D.C. internship will have to wait: Mom Susan (Alberta Watson) has broken her leg in a drunken fall and needs constant care.

We soon realize that Tom and Susan's neglected, resentful marriage is past saving. But will they drag Raymond's life down along with it? Dad barks orders long-distance; bedridden mom's self-pity acquires increasingly gamy undertones; Raymond's relationship with mom goes oedipal. A flirtatious local girl (Carla Gallo) offers solace, but Raymond can scarcely get out of the house long enough to explore his options. Meanwhile, his internship looks more and more like the sole escape route from a toxic nuclear-family atmosphere that's set to blow.

A surprise "audience favorite" winner at Sundance, Spanking the Monkey's "black comedy" billing is a misnomer. While most recent films with that label offer predictable, quirky satire with a dollop of "bad taste" (i.e., Serial Mom), Spanking is a genuinely queasy experience.

Yet its manipulative qualities are counterbalanced by Russell's authorial prickly sympathy. Like a bored child tormenting a pet, Raymond's mother doesn't exactly *mean* to be cruel — she simply lacks more suitable toys to distract herself. Ex-high school pals torment Raymond, mistaking his anxiety for snobbery. Even dad doesn't turn out to be quite the monster he appears.

Still, the sum of all these snarled communication lines devastates Raymond. No one respects his need for privacy, or sees how each insult or set back creates an overwhelming sense of entrapment. Remove some darker threads and *Spanking* reads just like umpteen frustrated-teen comedies in which everything awful happens to the hapless hero — until, natch, it all works out. But when Raymond tells the flirtatious teenager how folksinger Phil Ochs ended his own woes at a hanging belt's end, the desperation isn't funny at all.

Painful maturations

Spanking the Monkey isn't alone in taking normal growing-up traumas toward near-horror terrain. There's been a recent influx of excellent movies about the sadism inherent in pre-adult rituals and painful maturation. My Life as a Dog, The Secret Garden, King of the Hill, The Cement Garden, Sunday's Children, even Abel Ferrara's Body Snatchers update (a literalized teen-vs.-family horror pic) all trade in notions of formative alienation and parental abuse/neglect/abandonment.

As with *The Cement Garden*, *Spanking the Monkey*'s nervewrackingly tuned portrait of adolescence under pressure will probably be overwhelmed for many by its incorporation of the reigning '90s taboo. On a recent publicity stop in San Francisco, the 35-year-old New York writer/director discussed whether he considers *Spanking the Monkey* an incest film.

"I don't like to reduce it to that that's part of the scenario, not its ality," said Russell. "The whole totality, film is like a libido logjam. The parents are jammed, Raymond is jammed. Finally it all explodes and you know things are going to change. I've had shrinks come up to me and say 'Oh god, this is a very important film, it's going to speak to the community of male incest survivors.' Others see it as just an exaggerated reflection of the kinds of convolutions they've experienced in their own homes ... which was more my intention.'

Russell's own father is a publishing sales exec, his mother "a local political rabble-rouser." And yes, he admits, "There was a summer, in 1980, when my mother had a real bad period — she got into a car accident and was laid up. I was home; my sister and father were gone. I think when the kids leave the house, it contributes to this libido vacuum. The marriage can start to fall apart because it's been focused so long on the kids. But what happens in the film is much more intense than anything I experienced."

How have mom and dad reacted to *Spanking the Monkey*? "They're easily embarrassed people," he says with a laugh and a slight cringe, "so they're proud, and mortified too for fear anyone might take it as some direct reflection on them."

When asked whether the characters are a direct reflection of his own parents, Russell hedges: "Well, I've got to tell you," he says, "there *are* a lot of parents like that."

He's nice-guy cop Nicolas Cage, married to fickle firecracker Rosie Perez. She's good-hearted waitress Bridget Fonda, buffeted into bankruptcy by estranged husband Stanley Tucci the same day Cage comes into her café for coffee. She tells him her story, he tells her he has a lottery ticket and that if he wins he'll split it with her what a guy! And he does — \$2 mil-lion each, to be exact! Cage's generosity hits the presses, and as time goes on and the pair help the homeless and a police charity, rent Yankee Stadium for the neighborhood kids, and dream up ways of helping people out, they become media darlings besides falling hopelessly in love. But don't grieve for Perez — *she's* getting married to lottery millionaire Seymour Cassel, who's cut from the same cloth she is, in Andrew Bergman's charmer of a movie that's never maudlin, and in which the cast, particularly Cage, is amazingly good and will have you believing it all could happen to you. (Kabuki, S.F.; Shattuck, Berk.)

Just like a Woman

Can American-banker-living-in-London Adrian Pasdar find happiness with his family, his promising career, and his passion for dressing in women's clothing? Certainly not with his wife, who comes home unexpectedly from a trip and discovers his large selection of lingerie, et al., and promptly files for divorce. Pasdar moves into Julie Walters's boarding house, where she's busy hacking off her wedding ring, having just got divorced. The two become friends and would-be lovers, but Pasdar can't perform, and finally tells Walters everything about himself, including the fact that he's not gay. Once she gets used to the idea she encourages him, until a freak occurrence causes Pasdar to lose his comparatively high-ranking job and earn crooked boss Paul Freeman's hatred. But Walters takes care of that too in Christopher Monger's beautifully balanced delight of a movie, and just like a woman, makes it uniquely entertaining in the bargain. (Gateway, S.F.)

North

North makes you want to rush south from the opening scenes of precocious 11-year-old Elijah Wood's problem with his parents. When they're home they talk at each other and ignore their gifted son entirely. Enough already! Via a lawyer, Wood severs his nonexistent family ties, and gets wise and wacky judge Alan Arkin (in all too small a role) to allow him to embark on an international quest for the perfect parents. Enter Bruce Willis as a guardian angel of sorts who manages to turn up wherever Wood's search takes him — be it Hawaii, where we're treated to far too much of the boy's crack; Anchorage, where the elderly are ritually left to die; or Paris, where a collage of TV sets endlessly features Jerry Lewis - while back in the states, America's youth are following Wood's lead and rebelling against their parents too. The ending is a complete cop-out in this Rob Reiner movie that seems mostly to have robbed Reiner of his hitherto considerable talent, while Wood only makes you wish he wouldn't. Drag star cabaret Charles Busch makes his first Bay Area appearance in a decade. By Dennis Harvey

HARLES BUSCH wrote and starred in such 80s camp send-ups as Vampire Lesbians in Sodom, Psycho Beach Party, and The Lady in Question. Though he's only in his late 30s, an early start and too many alreadylost icons of drag theater have given him the status of an underground legend. Busch's plays are sloppy, sporadically inspired odes to pulp lit and screen kitsch. When pro-duced outside New York, they've too often cried in vain for that justifying drag-star je ne sais quoi. They can't quite stand on their own without his galvanic central presence.

Busch's current cabaret act at Josie's (his first Bay Area appearance in a decade) reverses the equation, offering star power without sufficient contextual support. This hour-long vehicle attests to its headliner's supreme grasp of entertainment-world cliché --- his smallest gestures can spark hilarious glam recognition. But the drifty performance makes you hunger for a glimpse of Busch amid some more fully realized scenario of his own devising.

He enters wearing peg-legged black pants and a glittering black smock, saying, "Tonight 1 thought I'd be a bit more butch — well, I tried." An ape of Barbra's recent show-opener (by dreaded A. Lloyd Webber) is cut short by, "I can't be Streisand! I've gotta be me! But who am I?" This leads into "I've Got Something She Ain't Got," a statement of purpose that goes purposefully fuzzy on the details: He ain't so sure just what he's got beyond the realm of mocking impersonation.

If only we were surer. Busch, with his strikingly androgynous visage and able, if modest, singing voice, seems uncomfortable without a sustained stage role to inhabit. He fleetingly lights on several possibilities: "Mr. Man of Mine" hilariously reworks '30s Back Street slumto-penthouse, suffering-mistress roles toward a crass new monetary focus. "Passman Sings Piaf" is another hysterical, if overlong and slightly mean, docudrama of a Scarsdale French teacher's "tribute" to da French chantoosey

These half-song, half-monologue bits suggest Busch as a powerfully funny and resourceful player in larger contexts. Elsewhere, the show meanders. "Cable Man Blues" (cowritten by Busch) is a Rusty Warren-type burlesque novelty; so is Frank Loesser's "Rumble, Rumble." The Weill/Hughes "Lonely House" and Rusty Magee's new "The Green Heart" are big-voice ballads this interpreter isn't quite up to. Much of the show feels oddly stalled between rote standup autobiography and imaginative drag-scene play. Busch never puts a wig on. You might wish he did — the naked truth being a shade too slim for comfort.

Funny how the assumption of female drag can completely ghettoize the appeal of some performers (e.g., self-described "minor cult figure" Busch), while others may assume the dress du jour without fear of career torpedoing. While mainstream audiences seem to enjoy drag so long as it's a forced, strictly hetero-minded plot device (e.g., Mrs. Doubtfire), they cringe at the suggested real gender blur that consensually cross-dressing characters afford. Then again, The Crying Game was a big hit. So what do I know? Maybe some evolution of mores is truly on its way.

Bite to spare


Still, it's strange that the drag-cast Greater Tuna hasn't kicked up the least bit of protest in its many gigs around the country. It hasn't been tagged as a "gay show" or been taken to task for its rather corrosive view of one stereotypically "straight" milieu. Making yet another local visit on an endless national tour, this two-man show remains prickly and quite amusing - it's one traveling institution that hasn't fossilized just yet.

Glimpsing a fairly normal day in the life of the titular "third-smallest town in the Lone Star State," the evening crosscuts between some 20 characters whose lifestyles seem drawn equally from As the World Turns, The Plain Truth, and Soldier of Fortune. Along the way, we suffer along with depressed hausfrau Bertha Bumiller and her dysfunctional brood; glimpse the grisly cover-up that follows a purebred hunting hound's untimely demise; and discover why the region's late judge was found cardiac-arrested in bed wearing a woman's one-piece swimsuit.

Whipping through male, female, and canine character quick-changes, performers Brent Briscoe and Greg Currie are just fine, though longtime fans may miss the sometimes subtler colors Jason Williams and Joe Sears (who wrote the script with director Ed Howard) brought to these roles originally. Last year's return visit found the sequel A Tuna Christmas so intricately polished that this first chapter pales by comparison; the overlapping story lines here don't build quite so cleverly toward resolution.

Still, Greater Tuna is satire with bite to spare. You have to wonder how Texans swallow this bilious self-portrait, in which censorial library "smut snatchers," record burning parties, KKK meetings, UFO sightings, used-weaponry sales, pet poisonings, murder, and general xenophobic mean-mindedness seem to disturb no one's sense of righteous patriotism. Tuna may be hilarious (as well as deliberately disturbing at times), but a Texas travel poster it ain't.

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

History lessons

Two works in the Summertime Dance Project bring social issues back to dance. By Rita Felciano

ITTING IN ONE OF THEATER ARTAUD'S funky offices one recent afternoon, choreographers Pearl Ubungen and Shakiri compare notes about *Bamboo Women* and *Barnstormin'*, the new works they each will present during this year's Summertime Dance Project (Aug. 11–Sept. 4). Both pieces deal with history and social issues. Shakiri and Ubungen admit to each other that they were a little scared to take on the material, but agree that these are stories that need to be told.

Ubungen's Bamboo Women, for 19 dancers, deals with the fate of Filipina "comfort women," both those captured by the Japanese during World War II and those exploited by the U.S. Navy at Subic Bay in the Philippines. Shakiri's dance-theater work Barnstormin' employs nine performers and recounts the history of the African American baseball leagues that flourished from the Civil War until Jackie Robinson was finally admitted to the majors in 1947.

Tackling history and social issues is not something that dancers have been comfortable with — at least not since the 1930s. According to Susan Manning's recent book, *Ecstasy and the Demon*, rising nationalism in the '30s made it increasingly difficult for artists to combine political engagement and artistic commitment. Those dancers who had made work about the pressing issues of the time — and there many of them — lost out to those concerned with developing personal expression.

So when Ubungen and Shakiri agree that they don't want to make work that is abstract (though Shakiri loves to perform in it), they may appear to be at the edge of a new social consciousness in modern dance, but they also are plugging into an underground stream that is just beginning to re-emerge.

The two dancers, however, see themselves less as part of the latest trend than as being connected to their own past. "When you come from cultures whose history has not been told, you feel a special responsibility," explains Ubungen. "You may wonder whether you're up to touching something that is so strong and of undeniably greater importance than the dance world or even your own desires. But then you just do what has to be done."

Both women have a small but consistent track record with work that attempts to create waves beyond the small puddle of dance. Shakiri is probably still best known as the irrepressible Nutcracker in Contraband's The Revolutionary Nutcracker Sweetie, and as one of Zaccho Dance Theatre's frequently airborne performers. She formed her company, Rootworkers, only last year, but its first work, With My Face on Their Face, a response to the Rodney King trial, was impressive for its passionate articulation and its raw emotions.

Pearl Ubungen's works, such as the fiery solo T.R.O. (Temporary Restraining Order), have also dealt with violence --- both emotional and physical. No Justice, No Peace, her Rodney King piece, was performed in a number of outdoor venues in poorer sections of San Francisco. She has also been putting on yearly performances about homelessness "Performance in the Gutter" in the Tenderloin, where she is working in the after-school program for children at the Tenderloin Reflection and Education Center. Some of these young people, performing native Vietnamese dances alongside adult modern dancers, participated in her Waltz for Teo,

which was part of last year's Bay Area Dance Series.

Out of the park

"I started out thinking it would be a fun piece," explains Shakiri about the genesis of *Barnstormin*', "sort of an entertainment, based on the photographs I kept looking at of all these beautiful men." But she soon realized that she had stumbled onto a gold mine of material.

At the height of their popularity the black baseball teams filled stadiums all over the country with as many as 40,000 people. They were in constant demand, traveling from Mexico to the Caribbean and all over the United States.

In the beginning these games were played mainly as entertainment, but the players became much more serious and exceedingly proficient about what they were doing.

"They did not have to integrate. They became very, very successful on their own," Shakiri explains. "There was so much more of a community because upper, middle, and lower classes had to stay together, and everyone went out to [the games]. There could have been a separate black society that could have been viable...."

But it was not to be; integration not only opened doors, it slammed a lot of them as well. "Just as people stopped going to the Apollo Theatre, when they could go downtown, they stopped going to the games."

The further back in history Shakiri went, the more she realized just how extraordinarily inspiring these men were: "I kept thinking how these people started out with nothing during the Civil War. They had no clothes, no homes, some of them didn't even have a name. Yet they traveled all over at a time when folks were being lynched."

In their baggage, in addition to bats and balls, the players carried news and information to segregated and often isolated communities. They were riding a freedom train from North to South.

"They would come from New York and go to some little town in Mississippi where they could communicate that there was some kind of movement going on back East," Shakiri explains. "They worked very hard all the time. But not only did they live and survive, they *thrived.*"

A lack of choices

It was a similar type of personal bravery that inspired Ubungen to broaden a work she had started about the lack of choices for contemporary Filipina women.

"I was planning a piece about the prostitutes in Subic Bay and trying to connect it to stereotypes about Asian women," Ubungen says. "Then I had the opportunity to see a former 'comfort woman' who had been captured by the Japanese. She's 65 years old and went on an international tour, sponsored by Gabriela [the Philippine women's rights organization]. The minute 1 heard her voice I knew I wanted to dance to it."

The voice belongs to Amanita Balajadia, who after hearing about the fate of Korean women at the hands of Japanese soldiers during World War II, decided to speak out. "She broke a 50-year silence and has suffered much backlash because of it," Ubungen says. "We have this whole shame thing in our culture."

Though she admits that coercion during wartime and coercion due to economic and social pressures are not the same, Ubungen feels that the end result for contemporary Filipina women is not all that different: lack of alternatives, brutalization by military forces, inability to advance themselves economically and as individuals. More insidiously, Ubungen says, "it has made this whole overseas sex-trafficking possible. Filipina women, with their government participating in it, are sent off as domestics or mail-order brides and end up in prostitution, often being raped and even killed."

But the degrading of Filipinas doesn't only happen somewhere else. Take the example of the British actor who recently told a reporter in New York that he could not take the journalist to his loft because he "kept a bunch of Filipina women locked up there."

"Why is it that there is now this association with Filipina women and chains and hitting and people can joke about it?" Ubungen asks.

An earlier, much simpler version of Bamboo Women premiered at the



Yerba Buena Center for the Arts last spring, and this, in addition to her other works, has made Ubungen something of a heroine among young Filipinas.

Barnstormin' has also made an impact, even though it hasn't rolled off the boards yet. "I show these photographs to a lot of people and they're so touched by them," Shakiri says. "If you think about what is going on in the black community today, this is powerful. Here are all these black men standing together, a team, a real team."

The photographs have also elicited a number of good stories from former baseball players (one of them, former Oakland mayor Lionel Wilson, played for the Oakland Larks) who still live in the Bay Area. Shakiri has been able to incorporate some of that material, and several of these old-timers will participate in *Barnstormin'*.

The question of whether dance is an appropriate means to explore social and historical issues is an old one. Some think it inherently incapable of doing so, being much more suited to exploring the general and the known than in conveying specific and complex information. Attempts in the modern-dance world of the '30s were certainly short-lived. That may have been, as Susan Manning claims, because the threat of being labeled "red" was too daunting, and the rise of ballet as an abstract American art form too steep.


Today's socially responsive choreographers — and there still are just a handful — almost always resort to supplementing the body's language with verbal language. Both Barnstormin' and Bamboo Women rely extensively on text. Of course, ultimately, it doesn't make a bit of difference whether a work is called dance or not. The risk for the artist putting herself out there with tough stuff is none the smaller.

Losing the muse

On Public Enemy's ill-conceived sixth album, the group's once-prophetic message rings hollow. **By Cheo H. Coker**

HAT HAPPENS to a dream deferred?" Langston Hughes pondered in his poem "Harlem." "Maybe it just sags like a heavy load." Or, like Public Enemy's latest effort Muse Sick N Hour Mess Age (Def Jam/ Polygram), it implodes, shrivels up like a sun-dried raisin, and blows directionless in the harsh winds of materialism and musical change.

While listening to this jumbled tapestry of a new album, even P.E.'s most devoted fans are forced to ask themselves, What happened to hip-hop's most powerful voice?

Three or four years ago, being into P.E. marked you as someone who thought about social injustice and black revolution. Chuck D's booming baritone could hit your mind and body in places you didn't know existed. Overwhelmed by the music's power to inform, agitate, and entertain, you sat there for hours, memorizing the words, reading the album covers, pondering a new social order and your place in it. The message was provocative and the music moved in a way that not only propelled Jeeps down the boulevard with its pounding bass, but also sent an entire generation of rap fans to the bookstores and cultural archives.

Now, in what sounds like an attempt to sell black rage to a curious, ever growing white demographic with deep pockets and the urge to slam dance, the revolution rings hollow.

Muse Sick N Hour Mess Age's structural weaknesses stem not only from lackluster production the Bomb Squad is still present, but it's missing key sonic pioneers Eric "Vietnam" Sadler and Hank Shocklee here — but also from the very thing that always separated Public Enemy from the sheeplike rapping masses: the lyrics. Chuck provides little new or memorable material this time out, and what in '87 sounded positively anthemic now teeters on the edge of pompous sloganeering.

Musically, the record straddles the fence between hardcore and alternative, but its lack of decisiveness is a disappointment on both stylistic fronts. P.E. needs to rock woofers and blow minds, knocking the gangsta shuckin' and jivin' "Gin and Juice"-swilling youth of AmeriKKKa back on track. Instead, they bring a whiffle ball to a major-league ball game.

It's evident that the crew has rediscovered "noize" — the agitated fury of simultaneous loops, guitar screeches, and turntable scratches — but unlike a "Rebel Without a

Pause," the loops on Mess Age flatten out the sound, dulling the edge of the lyrics. "Give It Up" moves the blood; amid the guitars and hard beats, "What Side You On?" shows that the crew can still sound ferocious when they feel like it. But by the time you get to "Bedlam," the steam begins to run out. With "So Whatcha Gonna Do Now," Chuck asserts that "everybody's talking drive-by shit" without offering a reason - or a musical antidote — compelling enough to put the lyrical Glock-toters in check. By the time you get to "Race against Time," you want out. But you sit there, hoping that, as Chuck so forcefully asserted on Fear of a Black Planet, "B-Side Wins Again.'


No such luck. Other than the standout "Aintnuttin Buttersong," the album continues its Dantean spiral into hip-hop hell. Just as the album hits rock bottom, however, Chuck D explodes into "I Stand Accused," rapping with his old fire over a guttural, brooding rhythmic undercurrent. Ironically, his anger here is directed at physically threatening critics who dare question his musical direction.

"All a fuckin' critic does is draw

a fuckin' line," he raps. "Cross a line and dis my rhyme and then they ass is mine/If you find a critic dead/Remember what 1 said/Who killed a critic/Guess the crew did it."

(Note to Chuck: We're not "back-stabbers," as you suggest. It's just that we let you off easier than we could have on the last three records because we loved you so much. But even our rap deities have credit limits — just ask Kane, lce Cube, and Rakim if you don't believe me. Either it's time to do like KRS-One and get a dope-ass producer and knock fools out the box with consistent skill and intellect, or it's time to get dethroned. Killing us won't change the rules.)

Despite what the group would characterize as my so-called niggatronic reaction, I'm confident the real P.E. spirit still lurks beneath this *Mess Age*. One can only hope Chuck and company take the deluge of harsh criticism that's greeting the album as a wake-up call, not as an ultimatum. Perhaps then P.E. might heal its sick muse and return to the deep concepts and funky beats the hiphop nation needs now more than ever.

Sir Mix-A-Lot

Chief Boot Knocka (American Recordings)

S IR MIX-A-LOT HAS HAD a longer career in the rhyme biz than anyone could've ever anticipated. From the quasi-daneehall debut "Posse on Broadway," with its eerie, deep digital-delay-frosted beats and jokey patois, to the erossover monster smash ass-man anthem "Baby Got Back," this Seattle oddity has lasted six years in a field where most are here today and gone tonight.

Like his flannel-clad brethren in the rock end of the great Northwest, Sir Mix is no groundbreaker, and he's never claimed to be. He's a great assimilator, though, and that's what elevates *Chief Boot Knocka*. Because even if the opener, a Bootsy/Clinton jam called "Sleepin' with My Fonk" (replete with live fat-back bass courtesy of altie-rock idol Flea), isn't the most auspicious kickoff in the world, credit the man for not overindulging in the P-Funk catalog. That turf isn't trod on again until the obligatory "Atomic Dog" sample nine cuts later on "Nasty Dog." Thankfully, Mix doesn't dip into the flavor of the day just to stay on top: There's no jazz nods, assumed eulteha ploys, or Blue Note samples here, just the bare essentials.

The most right-on aspect of this modest success is the way Mix-A-Lot keeps his bravado on the subtle side. Instead of laying out a litany of conquests in every rap, Mix shakes it up with a hilarious take on the perils of polygamy with "Don't Call Me Dada." Sure, he lays it on thick and heavy with his cars, his wimmin, and his general Maek-daddyhood (Mix beats out the Raiders' quarterback for a woman on "Brown Shuga," playing the poor jock for the fool). But there's always a bit of silliness to temper his misogyny, as is the case with the absurd follow-up to "Baby Got Baek," the show-us-yer-tits anthem "Put 'Em on the Glass."

Somewhere between 2 Live Crew's horny clowning and Big Daddy Kane's matter-of-factness is the land of Mix, and he holds the ground with suave confidence. His most eloquent and vehement rage doesn't come out in Mix's own life story, "What's Real," but in the fuck-da-IRS "I Fought the Law"-type rant, "Take My Stash." Almost makes you pity the poor millionaire, doesn't it?

More amusing than amazing, this is hip-hop whose altitude ain't attitude. It's just a funny and witty sucker with straightforward wordplay and beats, devoid of the sensitive male horseshit that has been dribbling outta Washington's grunge scene for what seems like eons now. So what if the verbal mastication is Chuek D-style over-the-top: Mix says what he means with enough élan to get it over. And he isn't rubbing anyone's face in it, either. He's unapologetic and consistent, still making worthy recordings and still a winner, which is a lot more than you can say about his beloved, albeit chokin', Seattle Supersonics. Worth a 10 or two.

Beck

One Foot in the Grave (K Records)

ONTRIVED SLACKER or genuine oddity? The pale, childfaced 23-year-old Beck Hansen doesn't even look up from his guitar to acknowledge the question. He just shrugs and sings, "There ain't nobody left to impress/and everybody's kissing their own hands...."

With two albums out this year (and one more to come), Beck has proven that there's a lot more to him than one insanely catchy fauxrap novelty single. On this album, recorded in Olympia, Wash., with K Records honcho Calvin Johnson and a few other pals, Beck alternates between shambling, bent country blues and solo acoustic strumming. He even covers a few traditional gospel tunes.

Beck has an incredible talent for tossing off surreal lyrics that rattle around in your memory and end up meaning something. "Definitely this is the wrong place to be, there's blood on the futon, there's a kid drinking fire," he begins in "Cyanide Breath Mint," and a vivid scene takes shape, like some grubby carnival backstage. "Hollow Log" is an oasis of tenderness, a casually beautiful love song with a delicate guitar melody: "Walk till you're restless/sleep till you're tired/wake up without thinking,/ you're the one that I desire." This year's most gratifying pop surprise, Beck sings that he's still "in need of a good hot meal and a life to call my own." So do the guy a favor let him crash on your couch if he happens to stumble by.

Vangelis

Blade Runner (Atlantic)

THANK WHOEVER found the director's cut of *Blade Runner* lying on a cutting-room floor for also releasing the original sound track from its 12-ycar exile in a London studio. If not for the critical acclaim that greeted the 1992 version of the film, Vangelis may have held on to the master tapes and his anger at Ridley Scott for reediting his already-scored scenes — forever.

The Greek composer's unique atmospheric style puts him a cut above his colleagues in the soundtrack business, especially those for whom scoring a science-fiction film means using some variation of Holst's *The Planets*. With instrumentation as artificial as a Nexus-6 replicant, he creates expansive yet unencroaching themes that often border on the ambient.

Ethereal sirens populate "Rachel's Song," while a Middle Eastern mantra snakes through "Tales of the Future" with echoes of Dead Can Dance. "Damask Rose" furthers the ethno-teehno vibe with a synthetic sitar. However, a very real and very sultry sax blankets nicely over the brooding "Love Theme."

Save for lead android Rutger Hauer's elimactic self-epitaph during "Tears in Rain," the samples of dialogue that erop up during oceasional musical lulls do little but exhibit the composer's fears of listener boredom. Thankfully this bit of '90s revisionism excludes the dreary post-Sam Spade narration Harrison Ford used in the original.

One long trance interrupted only by the accelerated bpms during the end credits and the strangely placed pseudo-swing of "One More Kiss Dear," this is an ideal come down after a raver's night of synaptic overload.

Helmet Betty (Interscope)

wo years ago, Helmet's debut hit the music world with a giant headbang, leading the second wave of hard-andheavy elub bands that got sucked into the mainstream behind Nirvana's megaplatinum tsunami, Nevermind, Critics were impressed with head Helmeteer Page Hamilton's master's degree from NYU; the public was stoked on the band's potent mix of raw power and cool, clean production. Helmet's second effort, Betty, hasn't drawn the same contrail of hype and hoopla, but on it the band quarries up even more monstrous hunks of granite riff-rock than it did on the first slab.

The tunes on *Betty* are tectonic for sure: hulking and hard, steel and cement funneled straight through the speaker cones into the back of your skull. They're built around growling, chunky guitar sounds and punctuated by a whip-tight rhythm section with a pummeling kick and a snare whose closest relative is a steel oxygen tank getting beat on by a ball-peen hammer. The riffs roll out in a repetitive pulse, and by the second or third song you'll find your head bobbing on a tide of electronic autism.

It's hard to pin down band comparisons here. Is Helmet the Melvins on speed? Ministry on junk? Pantera with a brain? "Biscuits for Smut" has a Primusty aroma, "Clean" goes heavy on the Urge Overkillness factor, and there are undeniably Lemmified vocals in "Tic." Betty crackles with tension between the raw and the refined, which is a fine line to walk, but Helmet pulls it off without a stumble. All in all, Betty is like a fat slab of beef jerky - hard and dry, but chewy and full of flavor once you sink your teeth in.

AP JOURNALISM is a game that's becoming increasingly dangerous. For an art form that prides itself on the pursuit of truth and freedom of expression, many rappers just can't take it when a writer applies the magnifying glass to their work. They can dis fellow emcees all day — Hip-hop culture is rooted in the street-corner "dozens" culture of African Americana — but if you offer even the slightest suggestion of displeasure about any aspect of their craft, some of them are ready to roll on you to adminster the beatdown — no joke.

"Yo, Cheo, **Dres** is looking for you," said the receptionist when I called **The Source** on some other business earlier last week. Seems that he didn't appreciate the review I wrote in the September issue about **The Legion**, a group on the One Love record label he runs with his partner in the group **Blacksheep**. I told the truth as I saw it, and while Dres and company are cool, intelligent brothers, business is business. I wasn't going to hold my tongue when it came time to expressing my views, the same way I wouldn't expect any other rap artists to curtail their voices to please others. I looked forward to talking to Dres despite his anger, since one of the reasons beefs never get resolved in rap is a lack of communication.

But before we could even talk, I come to find out that some side fools — not even in the respective groups but brothers from around their way had planned to go to *The Source* office looking for me. It shouldn't even come to that. It's getting to the point where reviewers have to fear for their safety just because they don't like someone's album, and that's ludicrous. Nobody is above reproach, whether it's a new group or old-school veterans.

As the hip-hop journalist who is better known for being attacked by a few members of the **Wu-Tang Clan** than for anything he's ever written, I can testify to the fact that threats won't ever deter me from expressing myself. I live and die by the word just like anyone else who feels committed to preserving this culture. If there's something about a record I don't like, I'll write honestly about it — you could be my mama, and I'd still keep it real. If your doctor told you something you didn't want to hear, you wouldn't beat him or her up — you'd go looking for a second opinion. Same thing with this rap game. Regard the advice with a grain of salt and keep on moving. The quickest way to immortalize an unfavorable review is to physically reprimand a critic; not only will you alienate other publications, you will taint the reviewer's attitude toward everything associated with your group in the future. I respect rappers' rights to honesty and they should respect mine; even though we might not see eye to eye, it's never a personal thing.

Speaking of brothers who "take it personal," **Gangstarr** and **Jeru the Damaja** float through town Saturday for what is sure to be an explosive, mad, blunted appearance at the **DNA Lounge.** If you haven't heard any of the jazz-influenced funkers displayed on both of these respective albums, get with the program ASAP. If jazz rap for the trendy masses is more your thing, check for **US3** at the Fillmore on Monday, Aug. 22. Those looking for more progressive poetry than the "Flip Fantasia" type should check opening acts **The Fugees**, L.A.'s forceful **Soulsonics**, or **Nyorican Cafe** veteran **Reg E. Galnes** for added flavor. What more could you need?

Demo Tape o' the Week

S.F. Envelope

HERE'S SOMETHING appealingly yin-yang about laying dulcet vocals against a backdrop of grumbly, wall-of-sound guitar. The S.F. Envelope guys know this, and they work it well on this eightsong sampler of existential boy trouble. "Love to Feel" has singer Paul Brill's tremulous voice tempering the electric drone with genteel, slacker-kid angst: "Tired of fragments/I want to be a whole/I don't know what I want/Maybe what I need is only to be left alone." In the same vein, the brooding "Nightshade" spotlights woozy psychedelic riffs and a Mansonian warning that when "the serious shit starts coming down/I'll shut it down." Brrr. No happy flower children these. The penultimate track, "Fe," climbs from a trippy bass-and-guitar weave into a crescendo of wild drums and a doleful litany of "I don't know, I don't care/This world means nothing to me." Hmmm. When all's said and done, S.F. Envelope's blend of melodic melancholy and edgy psychedelia is hotter than a mosh pit at a Thorazine rave. STILL THE KING He was revamping traditional Nigerian music long before the makeshift Afro-beats of Peter Gabriel, Paul Simon, and Talking Heads made it into heavy rotation on MTV. In the early '80s the Yoruban prince King Sunny Adé (that's right, he's royalty) kick-started a Western appreciation for Afro-pop when he brought his retro-fitted juju sound - a bouillabaisse of polyrhythmic talking drums and congas fused with synthesizers, electric bass, and pedal steel guitar - to American shores. He has recorded more than 70 albums worldwide, including the recently released Live at the Hollywood Bowl, with various incarnations of his 17-piece megaorchestra, the New African Beats. You've got five days to check out the real thing, but be prepared to sweat profusely. Through Sun/14. 8 and 10 p.m., Kimhall's East, 5800 Shellmound, Emeryville. \$18-\$20. (510) 658-2555. THINK BIG would have been a good motto for the First Emperor of Qin (pronounced chin), whose résumé includes the unification of China in 221 B.C. and the construction of the Great Wall. But it wasn't until 1974 that his most fascinating project was discovered: an army of 7,000 life-size ccramic statues guarding his burial site, each one unique and representing a different real-life soldier from 2,000 years ago. The vast majority of the fig-ures remain where they were discovered in the Xi'an province. However, thanks in part to the schmoozing abili-ty of Mayor Jordan on his 1993 visit, San Francisco is blessed by a visit of seven of the figures as part of the Asian Art Museum's **'Tomb Trea**sures from China: The Burled Art of Ancient XI'an.' In addition to the soldiers, the museum will also exhibit other rare objects spanning 1,000 years of ancient Chinese history. Through Oct. 30. 'All You Can Eat, \$7.99'



S bords fill present market niche by satisfying (on the relative cheap) indecisive, adventuresome, capacious, and not particularly picky eaters. All You Can Eat. \$7.99, featuring

local comics Mimi=Freed, Liz White, and Mary-Lynn Rajskub, satiates in that peculiar stuffed-yet-still-hungry way that smorgasbords are famous for. Rajskub, who is more of a performance artist than a comic, opens the show with a nervous, nonsensical, rambling landslide of disjointed text-bits culled from bathroom walls and bureacratic jargon-laden instruction manuals; Mimi=Freed delivers a kind of meta-standup routine, at once critiquing and employing the same degrading battle-of-the-sexes jokes that she complains male comics have built their careers on; last - and by far the best --- Liz White rocks the house with a harrowing, hilarious Las Vegas standup routine, booming, "Hello Papaya Room!" before launching into a tirade against a beer-swilling, limp-dicked husband and naive 15year-old son. Though the night only tenously hangs together, with rough transitions and a loosely defined, self-reflexive plot (something about being trapped in Bindlestiff Studio with three standup comics?), this latenight bill is just weird enough (particularly when the three join up for the Salem witch trial/driver's school parody) to be worth it.



Gilles Peress



s A nation that experiences its wars abstractly via the reducing glass of a TV set, we're shielded from the physical and psychological impact of war on the people caught in the

middle. Gilles Peress, a French photojournalist who has documented the Irish civil rights struggle (Hate Thy Brother, part one), spent three months in Bosnia and Croatia last year roaming the cities and countryside on a long and winding road of grief and suffering. Shot from a ground-zero perspective and queasy expressionist angles, the resulting photo-essay, "Farewell to Bosnia" (Hate Thy Brother, part two), is a brutal Hitchcockian barrage of 80 large-scale (30"x40") unframed black-and-white prints that reads like a diary of devastation. Chaos ruptures the calm, ordinary lives are violently uprooted, and the grisliest slices of life capture soldiers and civilians reduced to human carcasses: victims lay in hospital beds with legs ripped open or arms chopped off at the elbow. Although Peress attempts to "bridge the gap between art and journalism," his roving camera (and gorgeous compositions) occasionally veers toward selfconscious artiness. Fortunately, the artist's unflinching focus on the human tragedy and decimated landscape quickly jolts the viewer back to reality

Andrea Stein, O-Lan Jones, and Jim Turner were L.A.based actors - Jones and Turner expatriate Bay Areans with notable local stage credits despairing of the limited creative ops film and television work afforded. So they conceived and wrote this late-night "experimental" stage

vehicle. Cult adulation ensued. By the time S.F.'s Climate Theatre secured a run two years ago, the group had already signed with veteran Hollywood marginalist Paul Bartel (Death Race 2000, Eating Raoul) for filmic translation. Deftly cinematized despite its inherently stagey "story," Shelf Life is just an excuse for daft, often uproarious improv theater-style skits. The star trio portrays kids who've remained underground in a suburban bunker since their now-dead parents' fit of cold war hysteria some 30 years before. Sustained by canned goods, these grownup children engage in role-playing games that pervert faintly recalled real world familiars into oft-hilarious pretzel shapes. It has taken Shelf Life a while to get off the distribution-limbo shelf, but inspired performance riffage and lunatic pop-culture parodies make this Bartel's strongest --- not to mention funniest - effort in many moons.

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

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

But Allison Anders takes each of these motifs out of its Hol-lywood habitat — unlike Colors, Menace Il Society, Boyz N the Hood, etc., the blood-and-bullet action occurs mostly off-screen. What the film leaves on are the afteref-fects: bruised egos, wrecked cars, raised eyebrows. The story centers on Sad Girl and Mousie, two girls who cling to each other until they end up clinging to the same man. When Sad Girl gets pregnant by Mousie's boyfriend, the friendship disin-tegrates into a showdown — and the sur-prise resolution sets the stage for a series of mini-morality tales.
