STOP MAKING DIRTY R & B RECORDS

Rhythm and Blues records are today coming into their own. Their acceptance among pop audiences has skyrocketed in recent months. Some of our top hits have come from the R&B field and R&B records are gaining wide popularity throughout the entire nation.

This is a wonderful achievement and a commendable one.

However, there's a fly in the ointment.

Now that these records are reaching pop audiences and getting greater air play than ever before, every word in them is being carefully scrutinized, every phrase searched for subtle meanings.

Unfortunately some companies have taken the course of the quick buck and have turned out really dirty records which have become best sellers. Naturally you can market smut. No one denies that. But there's a point at which the men who make their living from this industry have the responsibility to think of this industry's future as well as its present.

Nothing can kill the popularity which R&B records enjoy today quicker than the issuance of dirty records. These records are being played in juke boxes around which teenagers gather. They are getting air time on programs which these same teenagers are listening to. And already the complaints are pouring in from their parents.

These complaints, if they last long enough, are going to result in all sorts of restrictive legislation which will be disastrous to the en-

tire record industry. It's going to do no one any good if censorship boards are set up in each state to determine what can or cannot go into the juke boxes. And this is already being threatened.

But beyond the effects on the record industry alone, there is a sociological problem which is even more important. This country today is faced with a tremendous juvenile delinquency problem. Until now, one of the ways of fighting delinquency has always been with music and records, gathering the kids into a wholesome atmosphere, turning on the juke box and letting them have fun under the proper supervision.

What a disaster it would be if suddenly the idea were implanted in the minds of educators and parents that records, instead of ameliorating delinquency conditions, were actually contributing to them.

The problem is an immediate one—and vital to our future. This is not the time for a display of irresponsibility on the part of anyone in the record industry. R&B records can be hits without being dirty—as the majority of them have shown. And these clean records can achieve the most widespread acceptance among pop audiences—as they are doing today. But the dirty ones are in a position to kill off that market not only for themselves but for all R&B records.

Let the worst offenders—and they know who they are—ponder their responsibility for this possible future situation.

Below we present our first "Sure Shots" feature. Look for it every week in The Cash Box. You will know what records are selling as soon as they begin to sell.

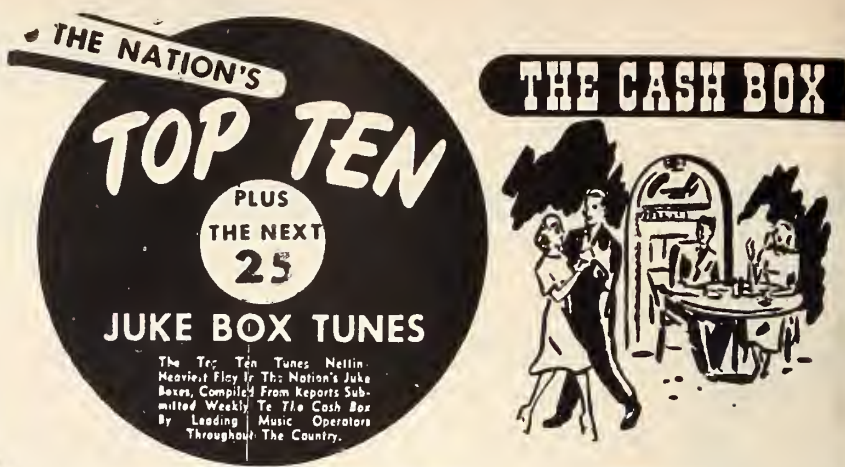

B "THAT'S WHAT YOU MADE ME" (2:41) [Shapiro, Bernstein ASCAP—Reid, Altman] With Lew Douglas and a chorus assisting, Tommy Leonetti leans into a very pretty love tune that could make the grade. Polished performance.

C+ "I LOVE MY MAMA" (2:40) [Starlight Songs ASCAP—Jerome] A pretty "mother" song is offered with sincerity and feeling by Tommy. Melodious item, a bit on the heavy side.

AL MORGAN
("X"-0052; 4X-0052)

C+ "TELL ME NOW" (2:24) [Billy Jr. BMI—Linsley, Kardon, Gordon] Al ("Jealous Heart") Morgan gets a good rhythm assist from Howard Gibeling's ork as he rides through the colorful item. Good beat.

C+ "BELLS OF MEMORY" (2:52) [Odette ASCAP—Kennedy] A sentimental tune is smoothly fashioned by the songster. Pleasant job.

DINAH SHORE

B+ "I HAVE TO TELL YOU" (2:40) [Chappell ASCAP—Rome] From the forthcoming B'way musical "Fanny" comes this lovely ballad so expressively rendered by Dinah Shore. Beautiful delivery. Harry Geller's ork assists.

B "NEVER UNDERESTIMATE" (2:32) [Laurel ASCAP—McIntyre, Huddleston] A light and appealing novelty is chirped by the star. Cute ditty with a clever set of lyrics based on a popular saying. Has possibilities.

B "I DON'T WANT YOUR PITY" (2:40) [Laertes ASCAP—Krell] A pretty love tune with a pleasing lilt is invitingly chirped by Mitzi Mason with the Fred Norman ork in the backdrop. Good tune.

The coupling, "Fanny," is the romantic title tune of the predicted smash musical which is scheduled to hit this city soon.

Assisted by a chorus and a big Jack Pleis orking, the boys offer one of their best jobs to date. It has all the earmarks of a number one hit. Flip, "The Cuckoo Bird" is a zany novelty. The top half is the one to watch.

C+ "NOCTURNANDO" [—Cairo] Pellin' Rodriguez handles the vocal chores on this mambo item. Good beat and sound. Top side has it.

ROSALIND PAIGE
(New Disc 10011; 45-10011)

B "WHEN THE SAINTS COME MARCHING IN" (2:30) [Leeds ASCAP—Redding] The sparkling voice of Rosalind Paige comes over with gusto as she sings an old favorite. Nassau Jazz Seven supplies the backdrop. Commercial stuff.

C+ "NOBODY'S SWEETHEART NOW" (2:32) [Mills ASCAP—Kahn, Erdman, Meyers, Schoebel] Another great oldie gets the lively styling of the thrush. Real punch-packed material.

FRANK W. METIS
(Bethlehem 1298; 45-1298)

C "JOHNNY WAS ABSENT FROM SCHOOL" (2:43) [Win-Gus BMI—Nathan, Metis] The Frank Metis ork showcases the voice of Sally Sweetland as she offers a pretty waltz item on the light side.

C+ "THE MOMENT YOU KISSED ME" (2:45) [Esquire ASCAP—Metis, Nathan] The Ostrus Chorus does a smooth job on the vocal segment of this beguine. Music is again supplied by the Metis ork.

THE THREE SUNS
(RCA Victor 20-5874; 47-5874)

B+ "THE TOUCH" (3:06) [Duchess BMI—Gimbel, Weiner] The Three Suns, riding high with "Moonlight And Roses," come up with another potential hit in this exciting, bluesy theme from a current Italian flick. Another unique and stellar performance by the boys. Watch it.

C+ "SOUTHERN STAR" (2:55) [Filmart-DeFelipe, Coronel, Rueda] A pretty Spanish tune with a gay melody is offered by the Suns on this end. Inviting deck.

CHRIS DANE

B+ "LOVE YOU DIDN'T DO RIGHT BY ME" (2:46) [Berlin ASCAP—Berlin] The romantic voice of newcomer Chris Dane is wonderful showcased by Harry Arnold's lush backdrop as the crooner wends his way through a big ballad from the flick "White Christmas." A polished job that could click fast.

C+ "STELLA BY STARLIGHT" (3:01) [Famous ASCAP—Washington, Young] On this end, the songster delivers a classic standard in his warm, tender manner. Pretty reading.

B+ "THE BANDIT" (2:21) [Leeds ASCAP—Turner, Carr] An exciting instrumental of a tune with big possibilities is given a "Delicado" treatment by Percy Faith and the ork. Thrilling arrangement that could click.

C+ "RAINFALL" (2:35) [Regent BMI—Heywood] Bernie Leighton handles the harpsichord on this fast moving instrumentation of an exciting number. Faith ork supports with lush backing.

LOUIS ARMSTRONG
(Decca 29280; 9-29280)

B "MUSKRAT RAMBLE" (2:41) [Geo. Simon ASCAP—Ory, Gilbert] Louis Armstrong's sandpaper voice and golden trumpet add new life to an oldie that's on the revival trail. Real colorful job. Should draw big coin.

C+ "SOMEDAY YOU'LL BE SORRY" (3:04) [International ASCAP—Armstrong] The Commanders back Louis on this deck as he toots and pipes one of his own creations. Up tempo ballad.

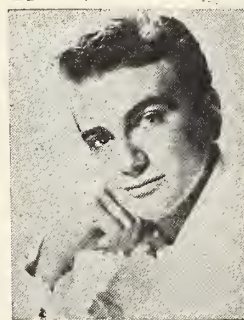

The two records provide an absorbing Toscanini treatment of the Wagner masterpieces—tender, blazing, dramatic, jubilant as the composer intended, and at all times thrilling. The album will be a wonderful experience for Wagner lovers and an exultant discovery for those who hear these works for the first time.

SCHUBERT SYMPHONY No. 9 in C—Arturo Toscanini—RCA Victor LM-1835 (1-12" LP) List: \$6.63

With the NBC Symphony Orchestra
The triumphant Symphony in C, which it developed was Schubert's final composition, just prior to his death, is offered by the maestro, Toscanini, with the NBC Orchestra. Toscanini had previously recorded the 9th Symphony for RCA Victor, but this is a new recording made prior to his retirement. The masterpiece is expressively and dramatically interpreted by Toscanini whose demands of perfection and attention to the smallest details are evident on this recording. The single LP is not packaged in the regular sleeve, but rather in a hard covered book which binds a complete short story of the life of Schubert by Andre Maurois, the famous French novelist.

"SALOME" 'Dance of the Seven Veils'—Richard Strauss—RCA Victor LM-1806 (1-12" LP) List: \$5.67

"Also Sprach Zarathustra"—Fritz Reiner conducting the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

This album is "Richard Strauss in High Fidelity". The music, which is brilliant in score, sensuous, exotic, mysterious, languorous, is a delight to the hi-fi enthusiast. It lends itself to the technical skill of the engineer who highlights the instrumentation, bringing forth sounds so often lost, the percussive explosions, without for one moment destroying the music itself. The "Dance of the Seven Veils" is complete, tho it is so beautifully performed it seems too short. The "Also Sprach Zarathustra" is an excellent companion piece. The jacket is the book type which opens to reveal the notes on the inside and is adorned with a lush full colored reproduction of the Renoir "Salome". This record should appeal to a large market.

BRAHMS "Concerto In D Major for Violin and Orchestra Op. 77"—Nathan Milstein—Capitol P 8271 (1-12" LP) List: \$5.72

William Steinberg conducting The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra
Classical buyers are long aware of the artistry of Nathan Milstein and when it is applied to the Brahms' "Concerto in D Major" for Violin and Orchestra the result is a Grade-A album that will provide many hours of pleasure. Although at the time of its appearance it was facetiously dubbed "a concerto against the violin" because of the difficulties it presented to the performing artist, Milstein's treatment is flawless. The album has several good versions to compete with, but this album stands on its own merits.

MOVIE

"THE EGYPTIAN"—Alfred Newman conducting The Hollywood Symphony Orchestra and Chorus—Decca DL-9014 (12" LP) List: \$5.85

If you've ever seen a motion picture without music, you know how flat it is. Music adds brilliance to a movie and makes more vivid the action taking place. Here, Alfred Newman conducts the Hollywood Symphony Orchestra and chorus through the music which he and Bernard Herrmann—two of filmdom's most prominent composers—penned for Darryl Zanuck's "The Egyptian". The music is a work of art and should appeal greatly to enthusiasts of background music. Themes are both exciting and beautiful. Picture is a smash throughout the country. Album should go big too.

JAZZ

CHRIS CONNOR sings "Lullabys of Birdland"—Bethlehem BCP 1001 (10" LP) —List: \$3.85

I HEAR MUSIC; WHAT IS THERE TO SAY; COME BACK TO SORRENTO; WHY SHOULDN'T I; LULLABY OF BIRDLAND; TRY A LITTLE TENDERNESS; ALL ABOUT RONNIE; SPRING IS HERE.

If you'd like to hear one of the tops in jazz singing, then you've just gotta listen to this Chris Connor album. A star vocalist with the Stan Kenton orch in the past, the thrush dishes up her first LP on which she sings with the accompaniment of a trio for the first time. Aided by Ellis Larkins, Everett Barksdale and Beverly Peer, Chris is wonderfully showcased on her presentation of a number of top standards. Her rich voice is in great form on these decks. We're wild about her "Come Back To Sorrento" and the title tune. Jazz followers will love this one.

Mozian records a collection of sweet jazz that paints moods in lush colors, intrigues the ear and invites the feet to partake. Definitely a commercial album.

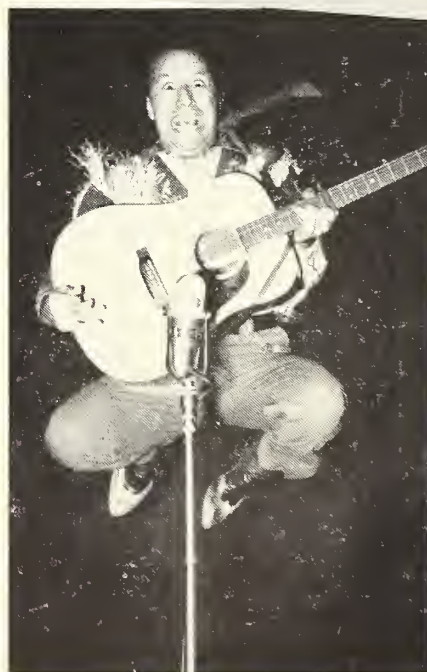

10¢ Play, Larger Juke Boxes Stimulate EP Purchases By Ops

NEW YORK—A recent survey of juke box operators in Westchester who have been on 10c play revealed that EPs are being used extensively in their machines. Some estimates run as high as 40% of the total.

With the gradual change over to 10c play that is going on throughout the nation, proper programming be-

comes an even more important task—and certainly a more complicated one. It has been found, for instance, that just the right balance has to be established between current hits and standards. And that's where the EPs come in.

Whereas customers will readily pay 10c for a current hit that they want to hear, they might hesitate about paying that for an older song. Under these circumstances, EPs offer the bargain of 2 records for the price of one.

EPs have also been giving operators an opportunity to stock their machines with a much greater variety of disks, those which have been discontinued as singles and older tunes which people still want to hear but which are available now only in album form.

It has been the enlargement of the capacity of modern day juke boxes which has also contributed to the use of EPs. If the machines still had the small capacity of several years ago, it would be economically unsound to use EPs because all the slots would have to be taken up by top money-making disks. But today, with the large number of records that machines can hold, an operator can afford to offer the utmost variety in programming. And it is through EPs that this is being done today in 10c locations.

So we are witnessing a new development in the use of records in juke boxes. EPs have become an important factor because 10c play and the increased capacity of juke boxes makes their use desirable—and in many cases, necessary.

Enterprise Music Reactivated

NEW YORK—Before leaving for the West Coast last week, Barbara Belle announced that Enterprise Music, the firm she owns with Louis Prima, had been reactivated. It will operate from California. And it is now split 50-50 between Miss Belle and Prima whereas formerly Prima owned 75% and Barbara Belle 25%.

NIGHT CLUB REVIEW Wallington & Heywood At the Concert

NEW YORK—With jazz on the upbeat throughout the country the Park Chambers Hotel on West 58th St. stepped in the swing of things by unveiling a new and smart, intimate jazz spot tagged the "Composer". It was a triple opening, highlighting the pianistic wizardry of Eddie Heywood and George Wallington along with his newly formed piano and string quintet.

With Eddie Heywood seated at the Steinway the customers were, once again able to delight to the intricate keyboard interpolations that put the artist into the jazz spotlight a few years back. Billed as "Where the Beguine Ends", Eddie brings back his broken-chord stylings of the standards that the public, had later on, stifled in favor of more routine arrangements. Tastes and moods ultimately change and so Eddie "Begin the Beguine" Heywood's artistic treatments step out once again.

Dividing opening night laurels, was George Wallington and his Modern Strings. George, long time jazz favorite, and his crew dish up a wonderful assortment of slow and fast four-beaters. It's a mixture of pretty, relaxing melodies at a just right conversational-dining level. The combo, playing a sort of "classics in jazz", collection consists of a cello, viola, bass, violin and piano. Each member of the string section has a rich, classical background. Joseph Cali, violin, a graduate of Julliard was concert master and asst. conductor at the Roxy Theatre for ten years. Dave Uchitel, viola, with the Met for the past six annums. William Eder, cello, former solo cellist with Victor Herbert ork and the Longine Symphonette. Clyde Lombardi, bass, studied with Anselme Fortier and played with the National Symphony. With Wallington's deft variations paving the way it looks like the piano-string merger should prove quite successful.

Cadence Pacts Swedish Singer, Chris Dane

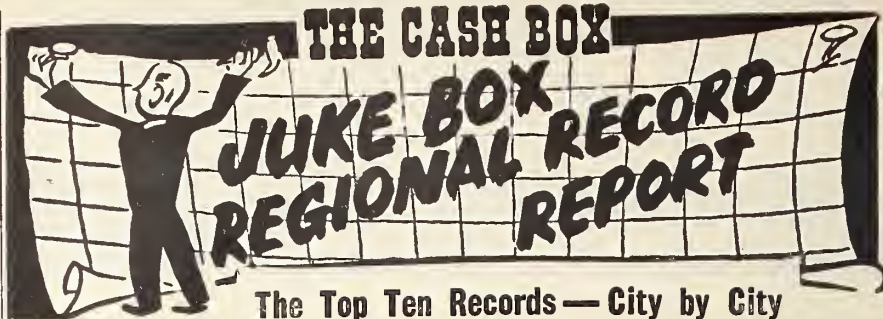

**Camden Line Released
To RCA Victor
Distributors**

NEW YORK—Now that Camden's goal of one solid year of testing in major record stores throughout the country has been achieved, distribution will change from factory-direct selling to the regular RCA Victor distributor channels.

Distributors are getting all of the details of “Operation Breakthrough” (as the changeover has been christened) from RCA Victor executives who are currently touring the country announcing the Camden change, the release of volume two of the Glenn Miller limited edition album and the release of the Toscanini “Verdi Requiem”.

In announcing the change in distribution policy for the Camden line, J. P. Davis, Manager of the Custom Record Department, which is responsible for the label, said “Just as we expected, we learned a lot about Camden in the last twelve months. Now we're going to pass on to dealers all over the country the benefits of the past year's experience.”

As an example of experience gained, Davis points to the fact that it was found that the originally required minimum ordering quantities per selection were too high; as a consequence this has been lowered. Further, it was discovered that the Camden line does not interfere with the sale of higher priced lines. In many instances Camden dealers not only upped their overall volume with the label but even increased the sale of RCA Victor disks due to the interest generated by the lower priced Camden records.

As a result of the past year's sales Camden is also able to give distributors and dealers an ordering guide in the form of a listing of the twenty best selling Long Playing disks and the twenty best selling Camden E.P.'s.

To back up “Operation Breakthrough” Camden has scheduled national advertising space in November and December issues of *Life*, *Time*, *National Geographic*, *Saturday Review* and the *Schwann Catalogue*.

Further advertising support will be given dealers through the liberal co-op advertising benefits being allowed. Other advertising aids include several items designed for retail outlets when they become Camden dealers. These include point-of-purchase display pieces featuring Camden's low prices; a new catalogue listing the 102 Long Playing and 106 Extended Play disks being offered dealers; booth hangars; and suggested dealer newspaper ads.

In making the change in distribution channels, Camden is also changing its releasing schedule. D. J. Finn, Sales Manager of the Camden line, made the announcement: “Originally we felt that quarterly releases would be sufficient. We discovered, however, that dealers prefer a monthly release.”

Another new development effective with “Operation Breakthrough” is the introduction of “Grave/Gard” as a regular feature of the Camden label. “Grave/Gard” gives permanent protection of Long Playing record surfaces by having a raised center and a raised outside record edge.

**First Hank Williams Memorial Day
Celebration A Huge Success**

MONTGOMERY, ALABAMA—In a mammoth parade, Country Music Stars, amidst a cheering throng of fans and spectators, rode through the streets of Montgomery beneath sunny Southern skies to pay tribute to one of the greatest names in the “Country Music World” . . . the late Hank Williams . . . solemnizing the first annual Hank Williams Memorial Day Celebration.

The multitude of events surrounding the occasion began early Sunday (Sept. 19) and grew in momentum until the entire city mushroomed with activity. A swarm of writers, artists, disk jockeys, publishers, and members of the Country Music trade converged on the city, and registration began early on Monday (Sept. 20). Radio Station WBAM with disk jockey Fred Wamble as emcee, carried a continuous salute with music and interviews . . . reviewing the highlights of Hank Williams' fabulous career. Ed Brown, TV personality of WCOV-TV, contributed his entire TV program for the occasion, spotlighting the visiting artists, who came without compensation to pay respect and tribute at this first Memorial Day Celebration.

Main attraction for Monday (Sept. 20) was the presentation of three big dances . . . “Stars On Review” which began at 7:45 P.M. and ran until midnight. At each of the big dances held in the city's largest auditoriums, such Country Music Artists as Pee Wee

King, Jim Reeves, Hank Snow, Ernest Tubb, Jimmie Davis, Ferlin Huskey, and hundreds of others “beat” out the music for the occasion.

Activity began early Tuesday (Sept. 21) with the meeting of the crack passenger train . . . “The Pan American” carrying visitors from Nashville, Tennessee and Grand Ole Opry. Shortly after the arrival of the train, automobiles were assembled to carry visitors to the Oakwood Annex Cemetery, where Hank's son, Randall Hank Williams, and Audry Williams' daughter Lycretia, placed a wreath on the grave of the nationally recognized singer-composer. Ceremonies at the cemetery were directed by Jimmie Davis, favorite Country Music artist, and onetime Governor of Louisiana.

With soaring temperatures prevailing, the mass of Country Music entertainers and disk jockeys were assembled for one of the largest parades this city has ever witnessed. An eight-unit procession began rolling through the streets at 2:45 P.M. and came to a halt as the sun lazily faded into night-fall.

B "NO TRUE LOVE" (2:18) [Melody Trails BMI—J. Logsdan] Flip deck is a zestful, quick tempo item that Horton sends across in pleasing fashion. Appealing string backing.

RUBY WELLS

B "I'M NOT ASHAMED TO CRY" (2:20) [Tannen BMI—B. Carver] Ruby Wells turns in an engaging reading as she waxes a tender, middle tempo weeper. An infectious platter that oughta pull a goodly share of the sales and spins.

B "A KISS AND A PROMISE" (2:32) [RFD ASCAP—V. Horton] Flipside, the chirp dishes up another polished performance on a moderate beat lover's lament. Effective instrumental backdrop.

DAVE DENNEY

B+ "CRY FOOL, CRY" (2:40) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Denney, Lupe] Dave Denney, entertainer and deejay, makes his debut on wax and he could have a big one on his initial entry. The artist displays a fine vocal style on a heartfelt, middle tempo romantic ballad. Could happen.

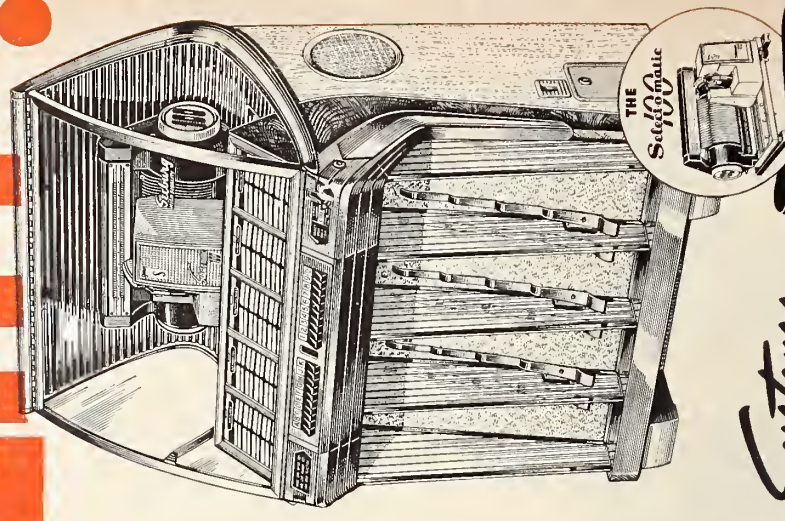

Here and There

TOKYO, JAPAN—According to an AP report, "Pachinko," the Japanese version of pinball (a vertical game played for the sound of the ball) does more business in Japan than the department stores. "Pachinko" parlors throughout Japan, it is stated, take \$42,000,000 a month while Japanese spend \$35,000,000 a month in department stores. "Pachinko" parlors number 40,000 in Tokyo alone. The number of machines totals 185,000 in Tokyo—and 2 million in all Japan.

CUMBERLAND, MD.—Operators in this area can look forward to many new locations in the future. While the actual condition will not exist until 70 years from now, it's a good idea to keep the following information in mind. The Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company broke ground here for a new \$34,000,000 plate glass producing plant, which will occupy a space of nearly three-quarters of a mile in length. Officials of the company estimate that approximately 1,000 employees will be required to staff the planned production facilities. Of interest to operators is the fact that these 1,000 employees will need housing, food, clothing, recreation, etc., which will mean the opening of a number of new locations for coin operated equipment.

CHICAGO—One of the important items necessary in the production of coin operated equipment is copper wire. Manufacturers here are hoping that the recent strikes in this country and in Chile at copper producing and refining companies do not result in higher prices. Copper is already scarce, and it is expected to become scarcer in the next few months, according to a report in the Journal of Commerce. A scarcity problem is expected to result soon unless the Government helps by slowing up deliveries to the stockpile and diverting fabricators, or releasing directly from stockpiles.

NEW YORK—This is for the "just lug-it-in" operators, and "just-sit-round" wholesalers: Business, like an automobile, will not run itself—except downhill.

Music Ops Agree On Need For:

BETTER RECORDS AND EQUALIZED TONE LEVEL

Urge Juke Box and Record Manufacturers Meet to Arrange for Equalized Tone Level and Finest Possible Recordings to Meet Requirements of New Outstanding High Fidelity Phonographs of Industry.

Juke box manufacturers are, today, producing the finest type of high fidelity musical reproduction instruments yet known to the entire music world.

These instruments, given the proper high fidelity recordings, produce tone that is so beautiful and so outstanding the world's greatest musicians are not only thrilled by these modern juke boxes, but, actually acclaim them as the finest of all musical reproduction instruments.

At the price for which these marvelous high fidelity juke boxes are being sold they are, without any shadow of a doubt, the greatest bargain to the man who understands custom built high fidelity music equipment.

The fact remains that just the components alone, to build a comparable high fidelity musical instrument for any music lover's home, would cost almost as much as what the complete present type juke boxes are being sold for to operators today.

Even more astonishing, to place into the inches of space of today's juke box all such components as are required for true high fidelity music and, at the same time, produce so outstandingly beautiful an instrument is, in itself, a

modern miracle of electro-mechanical construction.

The members of the juke box industry are just as impressed as is the general public over this tremendous achievement on the part of the nation's juke box manufacturers. All are welcoming the entrance of high fidelity musical reproduction with the greatest possible acclaim.

But, now that the juke box operators are purchasing the new high fidelity automatic phonographs they have, more prominently than ever before, run up against the problem of obtaining the correct type of quality recordings their juke box patrons demand.

As the entire automatic music industry knows, *The Cash Box* has crusaded for years, begging all the recording manufacturers, both majors and independents, to get together and arrange for an equalized tone level, as well as set up a definite standard of quality for all future records.

With the fact that the new hi-fi juke boxes will pick up even the whisper of a violin bow being ever so lightly and gently drawn over muted strings, recordings of varying tone levels and poor quality now create serious friction between the music operators and their locations.

No operator dares to install a juke box today without placing one or more tone level adjusters around the location where the location owner can get to them very quickly and easily.

Only because one record will suddenly blare forth with the shriek of a siren and the cacophony of an atomic bomb blast, and the next record played won't even be heard by the listeners, after the location owner dashes over to

turn down the ear drum smashing noise of the first recording.

This is due to the fact that the record manufacturers just can't seem to get together for the betterment of their very own industry and arrange, between themselves, to equalize the tone level at which all of them should record.

Juke box operators also report that, since high fidelity automatic phonographs have come into being, poor quality pressings are extremely noticeable. The scratch and surface noise of such records sounds absolutely horrible, and is actually nerve grating, when being played in a hi-fi juke box.

This, too, the juke box operators believe, the recording manufacturers could most definitely cure by setting up a standard of pressing quality for themselves thru their own organization.

It seems that all the crusading which *The Cash Box* has done in this regard, and all the complaints of the juke box operators which this publication has printed over the years, have had little, or no effect.

Now the nation's juke box operators believe that, since all the automatic phonograph manufacturers are producing such marvelous high fidelity musical reproduction instruments, they should call into meeting with them the nation's major and independent record manufacturers, and that all should get together on a standard of recording quality as well as on an equalized tone level for all records.

This will assure the juke box operators that the records they buy will so completely please the public that greater and better business will result for all concerned with the music industry.

10c PLAY EXPERIMENT BY WESTCHESTER OPS SUCCESS

10c, 3 For 25c Play On New Phonos Increases Gross 30% To 40%. To Overcome Immediate Objection Of Certain Patrons, Op Used About 40% Extended Play Records, Which Permits 2 Plays For 10c, 6 For 25c. Programming Music Very Important Function

PORTCHESTER, N. Y.—The Westchester Music Guild held a special meeting at the American Legion Hall, this city, to hear reports of several of its members who were experimenting with juke box play at 10c, 3 for 25c, with new equipment.

Representatives from most of the distributing firms were on hand, as were delegations from the Music Operators of New York, New York State Operators Guild, Suffolk & Nassau Operators Association, and some upper New York State operators.

Five operators reported to the gathering, and every one was emphatic that dime play is the answer to add revenue needed by music operators. It was estimated that the experiment increased gross collections some 30 to 40 per cent. Members making the reports were Carl Pavesi, Seymour Pollak, Max Klein, Meyer Budinoff and Jim Smith. The experiment was conducted with new machines only, and an added incentive was offered the patron with operators making extended play records available. "We definitely need this gimmick," stated Pavesi. "The extended play records makes it possible for the patron to get 2 tunes for a dime, or 6 for a quarter if he so wishes. These records should take about 40 per cent of the tunes available, and they should be fine standards. If the patron wishes to listen to the top artists and tunes, he has to insert a dime. If he objects to the price, he still can play fine music and well known tunes for 2 for a dime, or 6 for a quarter."

Some of the operators now advise that, in addition to running at a dime on all new equipment, they intend to take some of their better moderate spots and institute the same dime play principle on earlier phono models.

Henry Knoblauch, Glen Falls, N. Y., one of the visitors told the Westchester group of his experiences with dime play. Altho the only operator in his area working on dime play, Knoblauch is definitely sold on it, and will so continue.

Henry Wertheimer, Davis Sales Co., came in from Albany, N. Y. to attend the meeting.

"The Champion" Ballyhorse, Again Available

CHICAGO—Jack Nelson, general sales manager, Bally Manufacturing Company, announced "The Champion" Ballyhorse has been put into production again because of the continued demand for the popular pony ride.

"Orders have been piling up for 'The Champion'," explained Nelson, "but, because of the heavy demand for Bally 'Moon-Ride', together with 'Jet Bowler', 'Rocket-Bowler' and 'Variety', we have not been able to squeeze the horse into our crowded production lines. Now, however, the completion of a large Navy contract has freed a considerable section of the main Bally plant, and we have lost no time in shifting our lines around to permit production of 'The Champion'. Judging by the collection-reports coming in from Ballyhorses on location for periods up to two years, and the almost total absence of Ballyhorses on the used market, operators will welcome the news that 'The Champion' is again available."

Smutty Records Smell Up Spots Music Ops In Some Southern Cities Facing Official Wrath as R&B Disks Featuring Suggestive Lyrics Appear in Teenager Locations. Leaders Fear Disciplinary Measures Unless Ops Pull Disks From Phonos

CHICAGO — Word reaching here from southern juke box leaders is to the effect that music operators in the deep south are beginning to attract attention of officials, as well as the wrath of parents, who are finding a few R&B disks featuring suggestive lyrics appearing in juke boxes in teenager locations.

One leading juke box distributor of Atlanta, Georgia, when questioned in this regard, stated:

"Seems like all the teenagers are attracted to the outstanding R&B records. As is well known, many of the top blues recordings have gone pop, and the result is that the teenagers are asking location owners to get the juke box operators to feature blues tunes in the juke boxes.

"Those operators who haven't studied the situation carefully listen to the location owners and, without full consideration and study, place disks in their phonographs, some of which feature double extended lyrics, on the demand of the location owner who gets the request.

"The result is", as this leading juke box distrib reports, "that the wrath of some officials is becoming rather prominently known and, unless these operators pull such suggestive disks out of their boxes, something really serious is bound to happen in this territory.

"Disciplinary action will bring about censorship and worse. If this happens many an operator is going to lose a good part of his income which is based on his teenager locations. But, more important, everyone is going to be hurt. And this will reverberate thruout the entire industry."

Rhythm and Blues has come a long way since its pre-recording days when the Negro folk music was confined to the Negro people. Slowly, since the 1920's when the recording industry began to wax Negro artists and their music, Rhythm and Blues material made definite inroads into pop music, affecting its tempo and orchestrations.

In this way it first conditioned the pop buying public to its music until the buyer of 1954 recognizes and desires its beat, melody and artists. But this is only the beginning. Complete acceptance is not yet here. These few hungry manufacturers, operators and location owners can ruin not only the operator by having local ordinances outlaw juke boxes as machines harmful to juvenile morals, but can ruin the entire Rhythm and Blues field because of the onus which will attach itself to the entire industry because of a few smutty recordings put out by short sighted manufacturers.

A well known Florida music and juke box distributor had the following to say, "The trouble with a lot of operators is that they accept the demands of their locations without first checking up by listening to the records being demanded of them.

"We have most definitely refused to place some of these R & B tunes in our machines. We not only have definitely refused, but, after we let the location owner listen to such recordings he, too, has agreed with us that for his own best business interests he had better not allow such recordings in his place.

"The operators who aren't sufficiently careful in their choice of records for teenager spots are going to hurt everyone of us here. We know what the officials think about this. They have already contacted us. They have warned us that if they get any more complaints they will not only close down the places where such recordings are featured but will also arrest those operators who placed such recordings in their machines turning the juke boxes into instruments of an immoral character."

Other leaders in music thruout the south have come thru with the same reports to The Cash Box. They have urged this publication, as one of these men says:

"To, once again, come to the front to condemn such recordings, as The Cash Box has always done, for this can be the worst thing that can happen to our business because a few operators are greedy for a few extra coins."

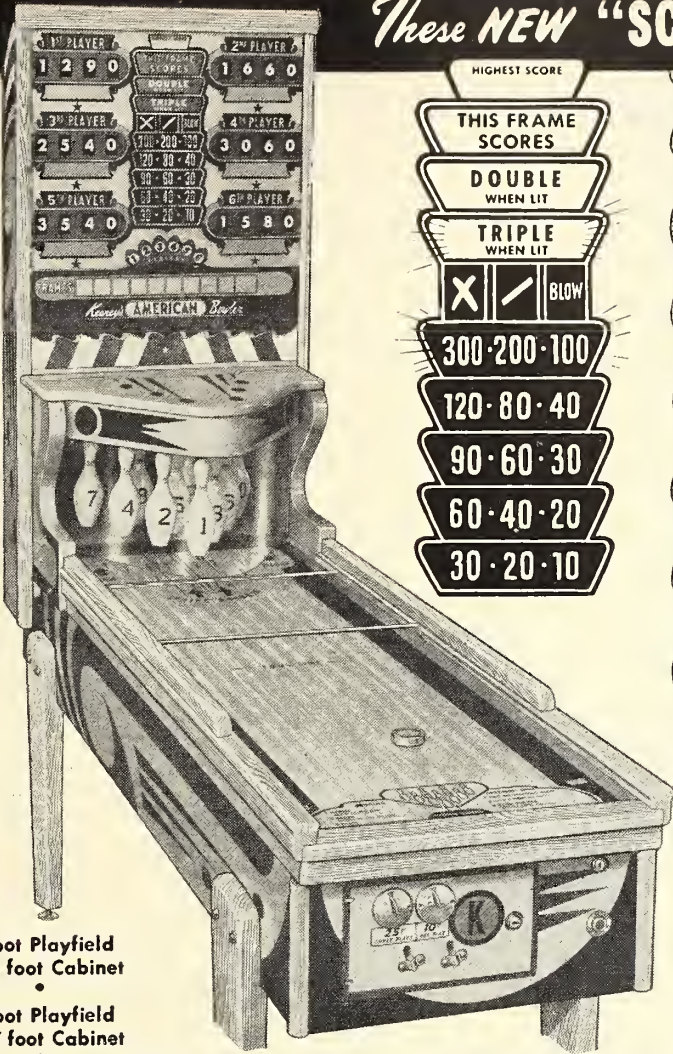

Op Lauds Cash Box "Tone Level" Stand

GREAT FALLS, MONT.—Pete L. Weyh, Havre, Mont., one of the old time operators, in a letter to Bill Gersh, publisher of The Cash Box, expressed his appreciation for the editorial stand by this publication in the issue of September 11 regarding a universal "Tone Level" for records. (Ed comment: Another editorial appears in this issue).

"Since 1935 my biggest gripe has been the need of universal tone level" writes Pete. "In all the years I have been in business I have not only talked that subject, but have been screaming about it, but as yet to no avail."

As everyone in the business knows, the press on numerous occasions has lambasted the juke box for its noisy blasting of music on locations. Weyh encloses an editorial which appeared in the September 12 issue of the Great Falls Tribune, which we reproduce in full:

PLEASE TURN THE DAMN THING DOWN!

Personal-like, we're getting old and a little more cantankerous as the years fly by. Probably a little deaf, too. On the latter score, even our best friends haven't told us yet, but it's probably no coincidence that we get mail extolling the virtues of various hearing aids.

We're not so deaf yet, however, that the blare of the ubiquitous juke box wherever we go these days doesn't irritate us beyond measure. Yessir, it's one of our pet peeves. Nothing disturbs our disposition and digestion more than this jet-level cacophony in places where we would otherwise like

to eat and drink at a leisurely pace. Philosophers and gourmets have long agreed that the enjoyment of flavorful refreshment is much enhanced by the spice of conversation. We fear the juke box is making conversation a lost art. Whose favorite story can be heard over the crash of the Beer Barrel Polka? Try and get a word through that banshee chorus of nasal sopranos who Cross Over the Bridge all night.

We think proprietors and their staffs probably build up an immunity, like workers in a foundry, and get so they never realize that the joint is jumping with enough decibels to level the walls of Jericho. Otherwise, they would be looking over their shoulders for the arrival of the little men in white coats.

Years ago in Chicago there used to be a restaurant called Henrici's that advertised "No Orchestral Din" and they did right well. So perhaps the lament of this unhappy soul is not just one voice crying in the wilderness.

We're not for junking the juke boxes. They're pretty things, with pretty lights in fluid ribbons of rainbow hues. They're even capable of dispensing good music. No doubt they earn good money.

Our only plea is to turn the volume down on the damn thing. Make the music background where it belongs, instead of vice versa. Advancing age is disheartening enough without worrying over whether we might not even hear some dear friend's offer to buy another drink or pick up the check.
