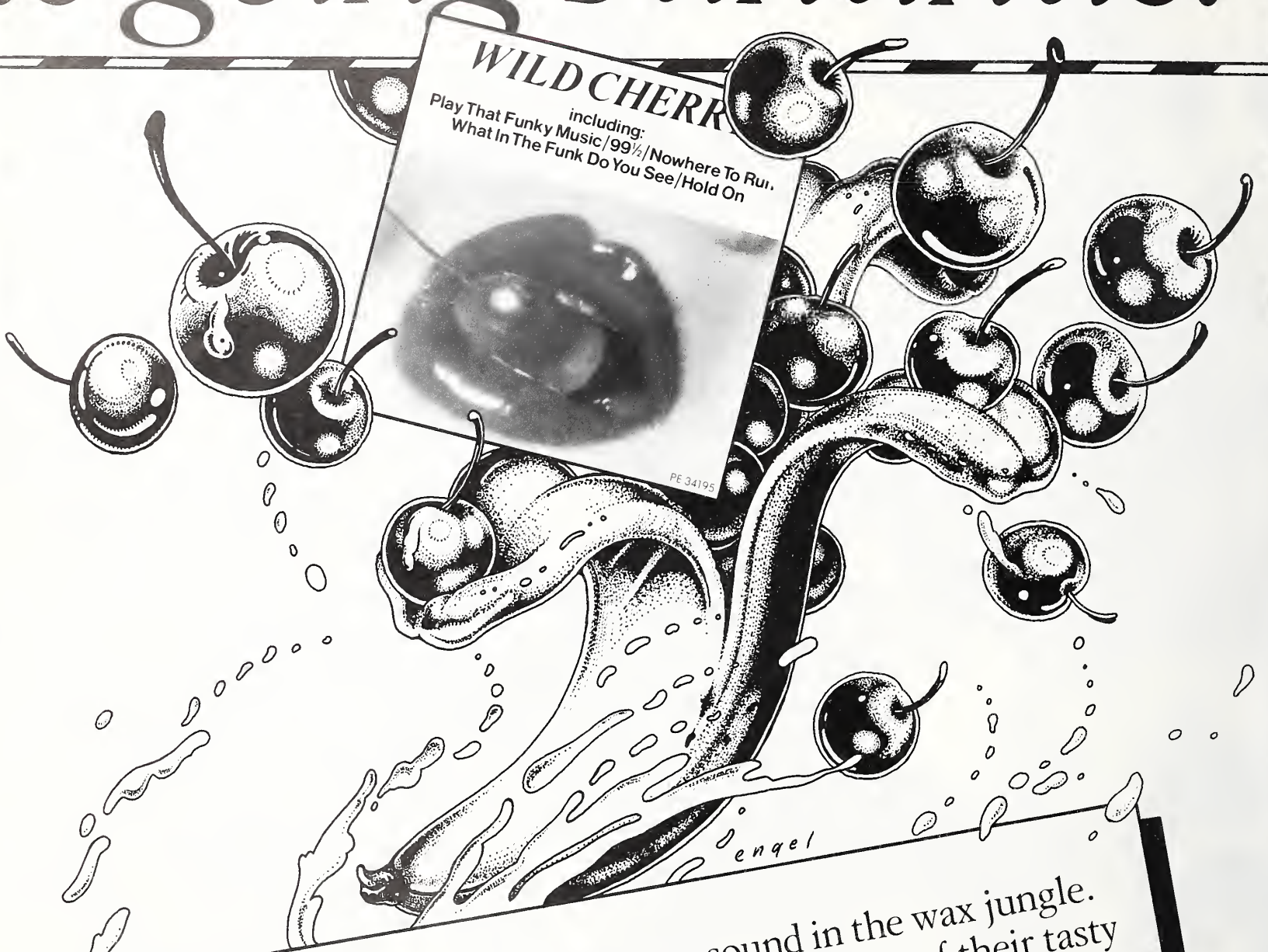

cash box editorial

A Unique, Workable Approach To Cutting Down On Returns

By implementing a bonus program for accounts who hold down their returns (see news story p. 7), ABC Records has recognized a number of important considerations in dealing with returns:

- That returns are with us to stay, and that only through a radical change of the pricing and discount structure could they be totally eliminated, a change that possibly would not even work,
- That returns can, should and must be kept to reasonable levels,
- That by cutting down on returns, a manufacturer can make more money on the same amount of sales . . . and so will the accounts,
- That return rates from different accounts are not uniform, and some accounts abuse their return privilege, sometimes using all of the theoretical 100% return privilege,
- That those accounts who keep their returns down should not have to pay for those accounts whose returns are substantially higher than those of others,
- And that those accounts that keep their returns down should be and are entitled to a discount, based on the actual cost savings involved, for keeping their returns below certain levels.

As a result of their move, ABC has:

- Put all accounts on notice that lower returns mean money — more money for the account,
- Warned accounts whose returns are high that they had better improve their ordering and merchandising techniques and procedures if they want to qualify,
- And they have rewarded those accounts that have been keeping their returns down all along.

All of that from one intelligent, rational, admirable move. Congratulations, ABC Records, on a unique approach to the problem of returns, that should go a long way toward solving the industry's returns problems. We hope the policy will be copied by others in the industry, and that the criteria for the discounts will be raised to more strict levels. That will put the poor merchandisers on notice that they had better improve their merchandising significantly, or it's going to cost them even more money.

ABC Implements New Returns Program; Lower Returns Earn 1-3% Discounts

LOS ANGELES — ABC Records is implementing a new returns program that will give accounts discounts of from 1% to 3%, if they hold their overall return rates under three different levels. The extra discount, which will be based on net purchases in the six-month period from July 1-Dec. 31, 1976, will be awarded on purchases starting Jan. 1-June 30, 1977. The new program is being announced in a three-page letter from Don England, ABC's vice president of sales and distribution, and is dated June 28, 1976. From unofficial sources, **Cash Box** has obtained a copy of the three-page letter.

Two Discount Structures

There will be two discount structures for the two different types of accounts, one for retailers and one for rack jobbers:

Retailers:

16%-20% return 1% discount
11%-15% return 2% discount

0%-10% return 3% discount
Rack Jobbers:
21%-25% return 1% discount
16%-20% return 2% discount
0%-15% return 3% discount

Retailers, then, who hold their returns in the next six months under 10% will qualify for an extra 3% discount, or about 11¢ an album, on every album purchased next January through June. On the other hand, if their returns in the next six months go over 20%, they will receive no extra discount. With different increments, the program applies in the same way to rack jobbers.

Among other details of the program announced in the letter:

— Accounts will be able to make only one return per month. Should an account need to make more than one return in the month, they will be disqualified from the program for the six-month period.

— Returns include all product and for whatever reason," which would apparently include singles, tapes and defectives.

— All multi-store chain locations will be treated as a single entity for the purposes of the program, whether they buy individually or centrally. As a result, rack jobbers or retailers with some locations who have above average returns, might disqualify the entire account for the discount.

— All figures, on purchases, returns and credits, will be determined by ABC, and according to the figures.

— Perhaps most important, "In order to earn the 'Returns Award Performance Program' discount, all qualifying accounts must be in a current payment position, as determined by ABC Records."

Cost Saving

ABC is taking this step because "reducing the rate of return can be as profitable as

increasing volume in all segments of our business," and as a result, "ABC is pleased to share these cost savings with all of our accounts . . ." ABC's England opened his letter by noting "One of the most costly items to the record industry over the years has been returns." He further noted that "ABC Records Inc. understands that returns are a part of the present day record business, but we also know that cost savings can be accomplished by our customers and ourselves by proper handling and processing of these returns."

'A Positive Step'

As to sharing the savings with accounts who keep their returns down, England concludes "We at ABC Records, Inc. feel that this is a positive step toward rewarding all of those accounts who properly handle their returns but at the same time allowing for the fact that, at least for now, returns are a part of the business."

The Managers: Leber & Krebs — Market To Market Growth Key To Aerosmith Success

NEW YORK — The new Aerosmith album, "Rocks," is number three this week on the **Cash Box** LP chart, a position it reached three weeks after its chart debut. That this band, which only a few years ago had strength only in the Boston area, could achieve such chart success is a tribute to the talents and insight of their managers, Steve Leber and David Krebs.

Met at Morris

Leber & Krebs was formed four and a half years ago by the two, who met in the pop music department of the William Morris agency, which was headed by Leber. They have managed Aerosmith from before they began recording. The rise of the group from regional favorites to superstars has proven the Leber/Krebs theory that regional popularity should be an asset and not a hindrance to a group. They believe in spreading that regional pop-

ularity by "playing a place until we break it," and feel that if a group can really excite a live audience, they can be as successful on record. Groups who are big concert draws but are not able to transmit that success to records are either badly produced or badly managed, they say. "Performance is the key," says Leber. "We won't sign a group without a strong live show."

Live performance is what attracted them to Ted Nugent, one of the surprise successes of the year. Nugent has been around for years on several different labels, never reaching true national success. His first Epic album is now heading towards gold. Says Leber, "Epic would've been thrilled with 100,000 on that album. But we don't believe in giving up on an album. We also believe in catalog sales; that is why we will never do an Aerosmith's greatest hits

Analysis: ABC's New Return Policy More \$ For Lower Returns

NEW YORK — By granting discounts of from 1%-3% for accounts who hold their returns under various percentage levels, ABC Records is moving to reward those accounts who keep their returns down. At the same time, they will be penalizing accounts whose returns are not kept to the lowest levels, by granting their competitors a competitive advantage.

A retail account, for example, whose return rate is below 10% over the next six months, qualifies for a 3% discount, or roughly 10.5¢ per album, for the following six months. And in today's cutthroat retail market, 10¢ is a lot of money — to be made as profit or to be given away or shared with the consumer as a lower selling price.

No Subsidy

What ABC appears to be saying is this: Since returns cost everyone money, especially us, we will pass along some of our cost savings to you, our accounts, as a form of bonus or extra discount for keeping your returns down. And you will no longer have

to subsidize those accounts who don't keep their returns down, and therefore cost us more money. And the company is also telling their accounts: get your returns down, way down. And if you do, there's money in it for you. The magic words are "There's something in it for you if you do."

Don England, ABC vp of sales and distribution, noted in his letter to accounts that returns are a part of today's record business. What he is saying is if you lower returns, you can make some extra money. And ABC also recognized that rack jobbers have more of a return problem than retail accounts, because of the double inventory involved. As a result, their return levels are 5% higher at each step, to qualify for the discounts. To qualify for a 3% discount, retailers have to hold their returns under 10%. The rack jobbers can have a 15% return and still qualify for the 3% discount.

The ABC actions will put intelligent ordering and merchandising at a premium.

CBS, WEA Intensify Pushes At Retail Level In 5 Markets

NEW YORK — An examination of this week's retail selling prices of records and tapes reveal a heavy concentration of advertising in relatively few markets. Cleveland and Washington, in addition to Los Angeles, New York, and Philadelphia, were targets of several major campaigns; in contrast, no record company advertising appeared in major Sunday editions in papers in Chicago, Dallas, Denver, Miami, New Orleans, and St. Louis.

Columbia Records expanded its "Campaign '76" to cover nine accounts in Cleveland and the entire Columbia/Epic catalog was featured in the New York and Philadelphia areas. To further enhance the campaign, the CBS family offered selected \$5.98 list LPs for \$2.99 in promotions in Baltimore and Washington.

Warner/Elektra/Atlantic continued its "Magic's in the Music" sale in conjunction with Korvettes in five markets surveyed: Baltimore, Detroit, New York, Philadelphia, and Washington. Further special features were evidenced in Cleveland and Washington, where a 13-store retail chain highlighted 22 bestsellers.

Popular music, however, was not the only significant concern of advertisers, as witnessed in the 12 markets that reported activity. Broadway show music, specifically, the 20th anniversary production of "My Fair Lady" (Columbia) appeared in five metropolitan areas: Boston, Los Angeles, New York, Philadelphia, and Washington. Opera was featured in Boston and New York. Classical music was promoted in Cleveland, New York, and Washington. Even original broadcasts from the early days of radio were offered in Atlanta.

Average sale prices for tapes remained relatively constant in comparison to recent weeks, falling in most cases between \$4.77 and \$5.99. Prices for LPs, however, were distorted by two prevailing factors. First was the preponderance of \$5.98 list albums on sale, particularly the aforementioned Columbia/Epic product used in conjunction with "Campaign '76." Finally, the "price war" in New York was again, manifest in an Alexander's ad offering ten bestsellers (limit of 100 of each title per store) for \$2.99 (\$6.98 list), the standard sale price for \$5.98 list recordings.

Mathias Amendment Passes: Agony Over Says Ringer

WASHINGTON, D.C. — "Part of the agony is over," said Copyright Register Barbara Ringer when the House Copyright Subcommittee finally passed Section 118 of the Copyright Revision Bill after three weeks of debate.

Licensing System

Known as the Mathias Amendment, Section 118 will provide both a voluntary and a compulsory licensing system for public broadcasting entities' use of non-dramatic, musical, graphic, and sculptural works. If voluntary royalty rate negotiations break down, the Copyright Royalty Tribunal will have the authority to set mandatory rates for the parties at five-year intervals, beginning as soon as the bill becomes law. But voluntarily negotiated rates will be able to pre-empt Tribunal set terms.

Altered Version

The House Subcommittee on Courts, Civil Liberties, and the Administration of Justice, fundamentally altered the Senate version of 118 when it kicked literary works out of the compulsory licensing scheme.

Separately, Transamerica, who owns UA Records, is completing the sale of Eric-Mainland in San Francisco and Record Sales in Denver to Milt Salstone and his MS Distributing operation, as originally reported in **Cash Box** (May 1, 1976). The status of Roberts Records, the indie distributing operation in St. Louis, was still unclear at press time. Last week (June 19), **CB** reported that Salstone was transferring Eric's warehouse from San Francisco to Los Angeles.

'Artist Oriented' Island Is Making Chart Impact

NEW YORK — Island Records does not wish to be known as a "reggae label." This may be a hard tag to drop, at least for the moment, with the Bob Marley album "Rastaman Vibration" at number 12, bulleted for the eighth week in a row on the **Cash Box** charts.

Charles Nuccio, president of Island, said that the company is an "artist oriented, new music label. The backbone of this company is the artists, and everyone here has a close relationship with them." The company, which began in England and has the English distribution for acts such as Bad Company and Cat Stevens, has been distributed independently in the United States for two years. Aside from albums by Traffic, the Marley album is the most successful in the company's history as an independent here. Nuccio was asked whether his "artist oriented" company has been a profitable venture in the U.S. so far. "Aside from the time right after setting up when you have to pay rent and have no real product out there, yes, we've been pleased."

Artists Have 'Background'

Nuccio was asked if there was anything

unusual about Island's distribution setup. He said that it is a standard independent setup, using the same distributors as most of the indies. He felt that what made Island different from other independently distributed record companies was that most of the artists on the label "have a background. There is a built-in audience for most of our acts, even if it is small. There is a market for an artist like Robert Palmer, who people know from the group Vinegar Joe. Most of the newer independents lack superstars; the indies seem to have an equal market share on the coasts but dip in the middle of the country. That wouldn't happen with more name artists."

The Next Big Thing

Nuccio was asked what he saw as the reasons for the chart success of the latest Marley album. "We always felt that reggae was the next thing in music and that Marley was a superstar. We've sold 300,000 to 400,000 Marley albums in the last two years, with very little returns. It all felt right. The thing about Marley is that he would be a star no matter what kind of music he played." With that statement in mind, Nuccio was asked whether he thought that reggae's time had finally come in the U.S., or whether Marley's success had more to do with his own strength as an artist. "Reggae turned some people off originally until they understood what it was about, that it was a beat music, that you can dance to it. It's just like rock 'n' roll when that first started. I think we've broken that barrier of acceptance." He continued that the important thing to do now in order to assure the music of future success is to eliminate the name reggae. "These artists should not be stars by categories. If Peter Tosh (formerly of the Wailers) is a success with his new

Commercial Music Renamed Heilicher Of St. Louis

MINNEAPOLIS — Heilicher Brothers has announced they have changed the name of their St. Louis distribution operation from Commercial Music to Heilicher Brothers of St. Louis. Ira Heilicher, vice president of Heilicher, told **Cash Box** this was "merely a name change" to give a uniform name to all of the Heilicher distribution operations. Heilicher runs independent distribution operations in Minneapolis, Dallas-Houston, Miami, Atlanta and Memphis, in addition to St. Louis.

Sorry, Elton

MCA Records admits a very human error. Two weeks ago in an ad placed in **Cash Box** introducing Lesley Duncan, MCA referred to one of Lesley's songs, "Love Song," as being the latest single by Elton John. Indeed Lesley Duncan wrote "Love Song," but "Love Song" is not Elton John's latest single. MCA humbly apologizes to Elton John for this error.

A&M 'X-mas In May' Features 'Unique' Marketing; TV Used

NEW YORK — Results of A&M Records recently completed catalog promotion campaign, "Christmas in May," are still incomplete, but one fact appears certain. Christmas came early not only for fans of such as Peter Frampton and Captain & Tennille, who were treated to a month of reduced LP and tape prices, but for the California-based independent record company, as well.

"We wanted to let the industry and consumer alike know how hot A&M is," commented Barry Grieff, director of merchandising. "Consequently what we constructed was a campaign to push artists. It was almost an image campaign, with the purpose being to alert the public to our attractive artist roster, and eventually sell more records and tapes."

'Hot' On The Charts

An examination of this week's **Cash Box** charts confirms these contentions. Six A&M LPs and seven singles appear on the respective "Top 100" lists (four LPs in the top 50, four singles with bullets).

Thus, in an effort to capitalize on A&M's successes, the company produced a "sale" campaign with, what Grieff termed, "a unique approach" to advertising and merchandising. For the first time for an A&M sale (two are held each year, one in the fall and one in the spring), television was utilized in conjunction with conventionally tested radio and print media to expose the label's artist roster. The TV portion of the campaign comprised the largest single use of TV A&M had ever employed, and formed the central foundation for the entire "Christmas in May" promotion.

Six markets were selected for television advertising: New York, Boston, Denver, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Los Angeles, and San Francisco. These areas comprise 20% of the nation's population, which created a sort of gamble for A&M. Rather than attempt to reach a nationwide audience via TV, it was determined that populations would be selectively chosen based on sales potential, and then saturated.

225 Commercial Spots Used

"Each viewer in our six test areas saw one of our ads, statistically, an average of two-and-one-half times during the campaign," explained Doug Spellman, media consultant to A&M. This was accomplished by a list of 225 commercial spots, which generated 40 million viewing impressions, according to Spellman. (A viewing impression is a term used by media experts to denote the number of times something is seen by anyone, regardless of whether that person has seen the spot in question before.)

"Television is a relatively new medium to the record industry in terms of advertising potential," Spellman continued. "Still, we didn't even use it as it had been used previously. We concentrated on prime time and late news shows to attempt to maximize viewer awareness." This resulted in large expenditures for commercial time on such attractions as Eyewitness News in New York, Mary Hartman . . . Sonny & Cher, and the \$6 Million Man.

Two commercials were constructed, one 30 second spot and one of 60 seconds' duration. Though the whole catalog was sale priced, the TV spots focused on twelve of the currently most visible artists. "Consistent with our intent, we did not mention albums at all," mentioned Spellman. "We featured artists, and as such, used pictures of the artists, as opposed to album covers or pictures." Featured artists included Peter Frampton, the label's current bestselling artist, Captain & Tennille, Carpenters, Brothers Johnson, Nazareth, and The Tubes. All are currently represented on **Cash Box's** "Top 100" charts.

\$200,000 Budget

A total of \$100,000 was spent on television advertising, which appeared from May 13 to May 30. This was roughly one-half the budget allocated for the campaign. Radio and print advertising accounted for approximately \$70,000 (evenly divided between the two), and promotional material, including T-shirts, two posters, and a streamer distributed in various retail accounts, comprised the remainder of the \$200,000 spent.

Yet, even though the major emphasis revolved around TV, the more conventional advertising vehicles were not ignored. Radio was utilized in markets primarily where television was not employed. These areas included Washington, Cleveland, Buffalo, Dallas, Baltimore, St. Louis, Atlanta, and various locations throughout Florida (over 90 stations) and California (18 stations).

Newspaper advertising in radio and other markets served to further emphasize the campaign. This part of the promotion, however, was also dealt with in a manner not traditionally employed in the industry. Rather than concentrate resources on weekend editions, advertisements were spread almost equally over every day of the week. In fact, in certain areas, print advertising during the weekdays predominated. "We wanted to try new, different things to see what would work and how effectively," commented Grieff. "When the results are in, we'll have a good idea as to what worked and what didn't."

This will be accomplished by an examination of three major markets: Boston, Los Angeles, and Denver, according to Bob Fead, vice president of sales and marketing. "We moved more merchandise through our distributors than even our preliminary predictions called for," declared Fead. "Now we'll have to wait about two months for the cycle to complete itself at the retail level (including returns) to see how successful "Christmas in May" really was."

EMI Backed By European Court In Columbia Trademark Dispute

LUXEMBOURG — EMI Ltd. of Britain is legally entitled to exclusive rights in Europe to the phonograph record trademark, Columbia, that it bought from CBS Inc. in 1922. The ruling was issued by the European Court of Justice in response to requests by West German, Danish, and British courts, which are handling suits filed by EMI against CBS.

The European Court also said EMI's demand that CBS obliterate the Columbia name and even replace it by another label "forms part of the permissible consequences of the protection" afforded the European recording conglomerate.

In New York, Richard Asher, president of the international division of CBS Records, told the Wall Street Journal that the court's ruling "really doesn't change anything and as a practical matter, hasn't any business significance at all." He explained that practically all of the company's sales in Europe are made under a CBS trademark, and only in "a few oddball cases (less than 0.1% of the division's sales)" had records with the Columbia trademark been imported for sale in Europe.

EMI sued CBS claiming the U.S. company was marketing in Europe records bearing the Columbia label through CBS's own subsidiaries in disregard of the 1922 exclusivity accord.

The Beatles "Rock 'n' Roll" album is a project which was conceived of some two and a half years ago, as an adjunct to the two volume Beatles hits packages, "1962-1967" and "1967-1970." Those albums were representative of the best known songs of the group. "Rock 'n' Roll Music" was intended to highlight the rock and roll side of the group, and it features many songs from the fifties, which were the songs that originally influenced the Beatles. FCC To Re-regulate Broadcast Station Rules

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Small market radio stations, as well as other radio and TV broadcasters, seem to be getting a break under the FCC's four year-old re-regulation policy.

Pushed by Commission Chairman Richard Wiley and President Ford, who wanted to aid regulated industries, re-regulation was announced April, 1972. It was intended to overhaul Part 73 of the Commission's rules pertaining to radio and TV, and to promulgate new rules consistent with the state of the art.

Understandable Rules
"As a result of this comprehensive study," the re-regulation task force declared in its first statement, "it is hoped that a simple, more readily understandable set of rules may be developed which will better identify the Commission's current regulatory requirements with respect to broadcasting stations, particularly radio, and will also assure that the operation of these stations continues to serve the public interest, convenience and necessity."

"The purpose has got to be to quit burdening stations with unnecessary rules and regulations so that radio broadcasters can go on about their business," according to Jonathan Hall, an NAB spokesman. "Too many burdens are placed upon small market guys," says Hall, "and there are a lot of regulations that are unneeded and unnecessary."

Log Requirements Eased
Rule changes have affected every aspect of radio broadcasting. Logs, inspections, station and sponsor identification, technical standards, licenses, and construction permits are a few of the areas re-regulation has touched. The latest change is a probable easing of program log requirements, a rule adopted May 25 and expected to be announced publicly as **CB** goes to press.

The FCC so far has modified or excised over 400 rules, but there's still a lot yet to be done. "At the time it was instituted we had no idea of the amount of work involved," claimed FCC re-regulation task force member Steve Crane. "Once the rules are finalized, a couple of people will be given the assignment of tender loving care over keeping them in shape."

Two Steps
Crane described re-regulation as a two-

step process. The first step, nearing completion, was to remove inadequate, contradictory, or non-applicable rules from the books.

The 42 year-old law, established by the 1934 Communications Act, has been amended and re-amended many times. "What we've done to date is to take out those most glaring inaccuracies, and some of the contradictions," said Crane. "The rules for the most part are now in very good order."

The second step is to re-format the rule book in order to make it "simpler and more efficient to use for those who must use them daily," Crane said. The FCC will attempt to bring rules up-to-date, and correlate all the separate parts pertaining to AM, FM, and TV. With a new alphabetical index, and new

Starland 45 Shoots To #1; Radio Play The Key

NEW YORK — The Starland Vocal Band single, "Afternoon Delight," which jumps from 8 with a bullet to number one with a bullet on this week's **Cash Box** singles chart, is a classic case of a single whose airplay has run significantly ahead of its sales. In fact, the record is just now beginning to break the 100,000+ copy a week mark.

From an airplay standpoint, the record's success is unbeatable: for the fourth week in a row, it is the number one most active single on the Radio Active Singles list in the **Cash Box** Pop Radio Analysis (last week it was tied for number one). Four weeks ago, in the June 5 issue, Starland was also the most added record of the week, with 21% of our reporters adding the single for a total of 93%. It was most active that week, the following week, tied for most active last week, and is most active again this week. Last week, it also filled in some holes on airplay, picking up another 6 stations, for 98% of the **CB** radio reporters.

This week, "Afternoon Delight" is top 5 at 35% of our reporters, number one at 14 stations and finally picked up WABC. Now, the sales are beginning to catch up to the play; for complete details, see the Singles Bullets.

Producer/engineer Parsons has been associated with a number of notable artists and hits including The Beatles' "Abbey Road" and Pink Floyd's "Dark Side Of The Moon."

Island Records Sets 'Reggae Got Soul' Push

NEW YORK — Island Records has launched a "Reggae Month" marketing campaign, beginning with the release of the new album by Toots and the Maytals. The new LP and the campaign are entitled "Reggae Got Soul," and encompasses the entire Island Records reggae catalog, headed by the Bob Marley and the Wailers LP 1/2 "Rastaman Vibration." Shipping at the same time as the LP by Toots and the Maytals is a new LP by the Heptones, entitled "Night Food." The campaign includes 15 albums in all.

Tape Pirate's Conviction Upheld

SAN FRANCISCO — The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit has upheld the conviction of Richard Taxe, alleged head of the nation's largest tape piracy operation. The decision was unanimous.

Taxe, owner of Gault Industries of Bel Air, California, was originally convicted in July, 1974, of conspiracy, twenty counts of copyright infringement, and five counts of mail fraud. He was sentenced to four years' imprisonment and fined \$26,000.

Also upheld by the Court were convictions of three of Taxe's employees: Ronald Taxe, his brother and the company's shipping foreman, Mrs. Geraldine Gonzales, production manager, and Rick Ward, national sales coordinator. All were convicted on 20 counts of copyright infringement and one count of conspiracy. Each was sentenced to jail sentences ranging from six months to one year and fined between \$2000 and \$4000.

Taxe's Other Firms

In addition to Gault Industries, Taxe allegedly headed a number of other firms involved in the manufacture and distribution of pirate tape recordings, including Daytax Enterprises, Soundco Corp., Sound 8 of Atlanta, Georgia, Standard Tapes of Detroit, Michigan, and Sound Sales of Las Vegas, Nevada.

This is the second legal setback suffered by Taxe in 1976 involving his music production ventures. Earlier in the year, he was bound by a Federal Trade Commission consent order as an officer of the Sound Alike Music Corporation, a California-based manufacturer and distributor of sound alike recordings (as reported in **Cash Box** last week). The FTC ruling was issued to curtail the company's deceptive selling tactics.

Thirteen Albums Bow On CB List; 13 Bullets

NEW YORK — Five albums have debuted on the **Cash Box** "Top 100 Albums" list this week, each with a bullet. Most prominent among the new releases is "Rock 'N' Roll Music" (Capitol), a compendium of 28 songs from the Beatles' catalog, re-packaged, but previously released on various albums or as singles, which entered the chart at #69.

"Wired" (Epic), the newest Jeff Beck album featuring Jan Hammer appeared at #78, while Carly Simon's "Another Passenger" (Elektra) is #95. Also in the list of the top 100 albums, the first week they are on are "Long Hard Ride" (Capricorn) by the Marshall Tucker Band and "Summertime Dream" (Warner Bros.) by Gordon Lightfoot at #97 and #99, respectively.

Eight additional albums appear for the first time, all with bullets. They are: "Mirror" (Warner Bros.) by Graham Central Station at #119, "Collector's Item" (Phila. Int'l.) by Harold Melvin & The Bluenotes at #123, "Sleeping Beauty" (Ode) by Cheech & Chong at #133 and "Good King Bad" (CTI) by George Benson at #169. Also appearing are "Three" (CTI) by Bob James at #170, "It's A Good Night For Singing" (MCA) by Jerry Jeff Walker at #177, "Young Hearts Run Free" (Warner Bros.) at #179, and "New Riders" (MCA) by New Riders of the Purple Sage at #187.

Finally, three more albums are evident for the first week, though without bullets. They are: "Accept No Substitutes" (Fantasy) by Pleasure at #195, "Mysteries" (ABC/Impulse) by Keith Jarrett at #197, and "Cardiff Rose" by Roger McGuinn at #199.

In all 16 albums have been added to the pop LP list this week, 13 with bullets.

E-C Industry Suit Dismissed

MILWAUKEE — A suit against a number of record manufacturers, the RIAA and NARM, brought by E-C Tape Service of Milwaukee, charging the companies and associations with anti-trust violations, has been dismissed with prejudice in Federal Court here. By dismissing with prejudice, there is usually no factual basis for refiling or appealing the decision.

E-C had sued the manufacturers, Atlantic, Capitol, CBS, Elektra, London, MCA and MGM, after the manufacturers had sued E-C to stop unauthorized duplication of their recorded music product. E-C counter-charged the record companies with

conspiracy to monopolize and control the publication of music and the manufacture and distribution of records and tapes, along with price fixing and attempting to exclude competition.

The suit was dismissed by Chief Judge John W. Reynolds, of the Federal District Court.

7th Gold For Santana

NEW YORK — Columbia recording artists Santana have had their latest album, "Amigos," certified Gold by the RIAA. This is the seventh gold record for the group.

picks of the week

BILL WRAY (Legend/MCA 40576)

River City (Rock 'N' Roll) (3:20) (Tall Tale/Big Legend — CAPAC/ASCAP) (B. Wray)

"There's something about that old boogie beat," Wray sings, and it's true. This is almost a mini-history of rock, with a great reference to The Beach Boys. The tune is already getting a lot of FM airplay, and will certainly receive a lot more. Excellent guitar breaks abound.

STEPHEN STILLS (Columbia 3-10369)

Buyin' Time (2:40) (Gold Hill Music — ASCAP) (S. Stills)

Stills phrases this moderate funk tune with great style, biting off the words, accentuating the rhythm and melody. An excellent arrangement, particularly in the keyboards, will contribute to heavy FM play of this record. The chorus is the kind that sticks in your head, and Stills is playing his usual superb guitar.

THE GUESS WHO (RCA JH 10716)

Silver Bird (2:39) (Septima — BMI) (Bachman, Cummings)

A nice ballad from this Canadian group. The arrangement is relaxed, not forced, and the lead vocal seems to drift over the hypnotic rhythm. A natural for FM progressive radio.

LADY FLASH (RSO/Polydor RS 852)

Street Singin' (3:11) (Kamikazee/Angel Dust — BMI) (Barry Manilow, Adrienne Anderson)

An incredible first single! This group of women singers can really put a song together. A cappella voicings are mixed up with a full musical backing, and the whole song is one big hook. Arranged and co-written by Barry Manilow, this is a unique offering that should get major pop play and has strong chart potential.

JOHNNY GUITAR WATSON (DJM/Amherst DJUS-1013) **I Need It** (3:25) (Vir-Jon—BMI) (J.G. Watson)

This is the best thing we've ever heard from this artist, Watson seems to have gone through some musical changes, and what's emerged is a classy funk offering — it's very sophisticated. The horns and drums are top-notch, and Watson's voice and guitar are completely under control. R&B, disco and pop play is mandatory.

TAJ MAHAL (Columbia 3-10368)

Easy To Love (3:34) (Prankee — ASCAP) (R. Fitzpatrick)

The first single from the "Satisfied & Tickled Too" LP, this is a smooth cut that's probably most suited to discos, FM, progressive and R&B radio play. Taj Mahal has always been good at assembling good players, and this is no exception. The music flows — this is primarily an instrumental. Great flute work.

BUNNY SIGLER (Philly International/CBS ZS8-3597)

My Music (3:28) (Mighty Three Music/BMI) (B. Sigler, L. Huff, J. Whitehead, G. McFadden, V. Carstarphen)

A tune that chronicles a possible formation of a band to play the music. Sigler runs through all the instruments, and as he calls them out each one is added smoothly to the arrangement. The trick is done well, and therefore it's quite a hook. Should get heavy R&B play — it's a great song. Sigler's voice is attractive and professional.

LOVE COMMITTEE (Ariola America P7628)

Can't Win For Losing (3:33) (U.S. Arabella — BMI) (Tyson, Frazier)

Synthesized jungle music kick this tune off to an exotic start. Then the beat resolves into a chunky up tempo funk rhythm. The single is mixed well, the backing vocals work just right against the lead. A good candidate for some serious R&B play.

GENERAL JOHNSON (Arista AS 0192)

We The People (3:21) (Music in General — BMI) (G. Johnson)

General Johnson had a pretty good-sized hit with "All In The Family" last time out, but we feel that this one is closer to the mark. It's colorful, and it just moves right along. The drummer emphasizes and enhances the natural rhythm in Johnson's phrasing. The tune has got an uplifting lyric which really adds a good hook. Should chart heavily in R&B, and it's a good candidate to cross pop.



BEE GEES (RSO/Polydor RS 853)

You Should Be Dancing (3:23) (Casserole/Unichappel — BMI) (B. Gibb, R. Gibb, M. Gibb)

This is *better* than "Jive Talkin'." The playing is more polished, and the band does some things to the vocals, with trading off, which are highly ear-catching. Should hit the number one spot on the pop charts in short order.



MAXINE NIGHTINGALE (UA UA-XW820-Y)

Gotta Be The One (2:56) (Unart Music — BMI) (P. Tubbs)

This tune grows on you. At first it didn't sound as strong as "Right Back Where We Started From," but on the second and third listen we kept wanting to hear more. It's got a good rhythm, with a healthy amount of syncopation, and should hit summer AM radio power.



THE BLACKBYRDS (Fantasy F-771-A)

Rock Creek Park (3:20) (Blackbyrd — BMI) (Johnson, Saunders, Toney, Hall, Killgo)

The Blackbyrds strike fast on the heels of the number one "City Magic." This is in a different vein, relying more heavily on the musical instruments. The song really cooks though, the bass and guitar drive the song, and the voices, repeating the title, add distinctive punctuation. AM, FM, disco, R&B.

GLEN CAMPBELL (Capitol P-4288)

See You On Sunday (3:33) (ABC/Dunhill/One of A Kind — BMI) (Lambert, Potter)

A ballad from the cowboy. The Lambert-Potter tune is finely crafted, and Glen gives it his best. Keyboards answer the vocal phrasing with fine style. It's kind of a tearjerker, complete with a spoken verse about the psychic ramifications of a divorce. Should get a lot of MOR and pop play.

CATE BROTHERS (Asylum E-45326)

Can't Change My Heart (2:49) (Flat River — BMI) (Earl & Ernie Cate)

Their last single from "The Cate Brothers" LP was "Union Man," and we feel this one will be more successful. It's in a good groove, kind of southern white R&B, and it's got the kind of punch that Robbie Robertson might put into a production. This is the one that will break the Cate Brothers.

L.A. EXPRESS (Caribou/CBS ZS8 9014)

Midnite Flight (2:55) (India Music — ASCAP) (M. Bennett)

A tight fusion jazz offering from the L.A. Express. This is being played already as an album cut from the recent "L.A. Express" LP and features well-charted horns and a dynamic fill from Victor Feldman on the Fender Rhodes. FM progressives should pick this one up.

AMERICAN TEARS (Columbia 3-10365)

Born To Love (3:38) (Waterstone — ASCAP) (M. Mangold, J. Foley)

A new rock group with a brand new single, American Tears shows the potential for a force to be reckoned with. Horns are added to a solid rock arrangement, and the vocals are always interesting. Should be big with FM progressives and some AM pop markets. Good production by Jim Foley.

BOBBY WILLIAMS (R&R Records RR 15312)

You Need Love Like I Do (3:32) (Lerobal Music/Music In General — BMI) (G. Johnson, M. Tynes, D. Woods)

This is an excellent R&B tune. Williams sings this love song with conviction, and is backed well by both instruments and voices. Co-written by General Johnson, this melody is ultimately attractive and pleasing. R&B programmers should check this one out! Sensitive sax work is a bonus.

PAUL NICHOLAS (RSO/Polydor RS 851)

Reggae Like It Used To Be (2:40) (Blackwood — BMI) (Bugatti, Musker)

Get ready for this one, because you're probably going to hear it all summer. It's reggae in one of the most commercial applications we've heard — complete with tenor sax solo and great vocal backup. It's got a terrific melody, and is headed straight for the top.

CHRIS HILLMAN (Asylum E-45330-A)

Step On Out (3:09) (Bar None — BMI) (C. Hillman, P. Knobler)

Hillman really is stepping out with this one — and it seems like a good idea. The tune is in the country rock band, a heavy backbeat kicks the song along. Terrific instrumentation and a good lyric line will get this single added to every FM progressive list.

TOMMY ROE (Monument ZS 8 8684)

Slow Dancing (3:09) (Danor — BMI/Almo-ASCAP) (T. Seals, M. Williams)

An upbeat MOR oriented ballad that's sung well. Roe gets behind the good melody and really shouts it out. Good chorus, based on the title, that should hang around in the listener's head for some time. Pop play in all markets.

OZO (DJM DJUS-1012)

Listen To The Buddha (3:06) (April — ASCAP) (K. George)

This is an exotic single — kind of like Arabian reggae, if you can imagine it. The reggae beat is slowed down; it's really a haunting arrangement. The singing is terrific, especially on the chorus. The tune is already making chart headway, and has an excellent shot at the higher reaches.

THE SECOND SEASON (Janus J-261)

Down Highway 200 (3:33) (Sugar 'n' Soul/RTR — ASCAP) (M. Sameth)

This is a natural song for AM radio. The tune is, perhaps, the best Bicentennial song we've heard — it's subtle and tasteful, about driving down the highway and seeing all the historical sights. The melody is great and it's a good production overall. Should get immediate airplay.

THE SANDS OF TIME (Kirshner/CBS ZS8 4263)

A Tribute To The Beach Boys '76 (2:43) (Kirshner Songs/ASCAP) (S. Sawyer, P. Fornatale)

This one is dedicated to the Beach Boys, and it's a timely release, what with all the rumors floating around that Brian's back. Some BB titles are strung together with a good melody, and the harmonies are just like, well, you guessed it. Should get some heavy AM play this summer.

EASY STREET (Capricorn/WB CPS 0255)

I've Been Lovin' You (3:34) (No Exit — BMI) (R. Burgess, P. Zorn, P. Marsh, K. Nicol)

This song is surprisingly good! It starts out with a kind of shuffle, acoustic, and then it gradually builds to a fuller sound. The lead singer has a lot of class — he can sound slow and sweet, and then, in the next bar, sound like John Lennon at his craziest. Great for pop radio, and we predict that this one will rise high on the charts.

OBATALA (Dash/TK 5024)

I'll Remember April (3:38) (MCA Music) (D. Ray, G. DePaul, P. Johnston)

This is a good disco number. Nice synthesizer work is laid on top of the rhythm tracks with obvious care. The vocals are clear. Often, disco arrangements tend to step on the melody line, but not in this case. Hot jazz guitar licks take up a solo — and the guy's really hot. An excellent musical offering that should get more than a few dance-club spins.

TOMMY TATE (Koko KO-722)

Hardtimes S.O.S. (3:30) (Klondike-BMI) (J. Baylor, T. Tate)

A funk tune that finds its groove in the first bar and never lets up. The acoustic piano is used well in the rhythm section. Tommy Tate's voice plays off against the arrangement. The tune has a good hook in the title, and should find a home in the R&B market. Uptempo cut, could be for discos too.

J.J. WALKER (Buddah BDA 529)

Abbadabba Honeycom (3:08) (Leo Fiest — ASCAP) (A. Fields, W. Donovan)

J.J. Walker is the television star of "Good Times," as well as a couple of movie appearances, and he sings this song with enthusiasm and good timing. He plays the funny lyrics just right, not overworking it, but just getting what he has to. Should get some R&B play, because of the great arrangement. Pop play will also result, because of the heavy media tie-in.

RANDY PIE (Polydor PD 14332)

I Am The Joker (3:15) (Chappell & Co. — ASCAP) (R. Pie, J. O'Brien Docker)

A rollicking R&B and pop tune here. Randy Pie sings each phrase with strength, and the female backup voices respond in kind. The synthesizer work is reminiscent of Stevie Wonder's in some respects. The song is truly worth a listen for any smart programmer.

Has it really been ten albums? Yep — all great too. #10 is no exception. The sounds are as rich and tasty as any the group has ever laid down, and of course, the production of Caribou master James William Guercio is squeaky clean. As all merchandisers should know, this LP will be a hotter than hot seller, so display it prominently. The feel is characteristically Chicago, offering up a fine collection of tunes which range in emotional intensity from the smooth sentimentality of "If You Leave Me Now" to the sensual strains of "Skin Tight." Sweet indeed.

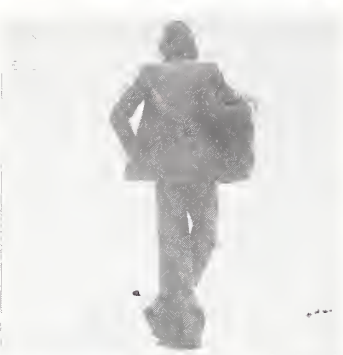


BEAUTIFUL NOISE — Neil Diamond — Columbia PC 33965 — Producer: Robbie Robertson — List: 6.98

This LP is a perceptive musical recollection of knockin' around New York's tin pan alley in the early sixties. The songs are definitely some of Diamond's best to date, probably because they are so deeply personal in content. Needless to say, this album is predestined to become a monster hit — retailers should react accordingly. Backed by some of the best sidemen in the business, Neil really shines on "Lady-Oh" and "Don't Think . . . Feel." Production work by Robbie Robertson of The Band is also worthy of note.

IN THE POCKET — James Taylor — Warner Bros. BS 2912 — Producers: Lenny Waronker, Russ Titelman — List: 6.98

Mellow-rocker James Taylor, aided and abetted by a list of back-up folks that reads like a Who's Who of rock, has turned out a fine work with "In The Pocket." Taylor's reassertion of his mellow countrified roots is a pleasant turn, with "Show The People" and "Slow Burning Love" standing out as prime examples. The depth of perception which surfaces via Taylor's flowing lyrical style is refreshing, his voice much more confident than ever before. All tunes were penned by Taylor except the classic "Woman's Gotta Have It" and a tune which Taylor jointly penned with Stevie Wonder, "Don't Be Sad 'Cause Your Sun Is Down," which we highly recommend.

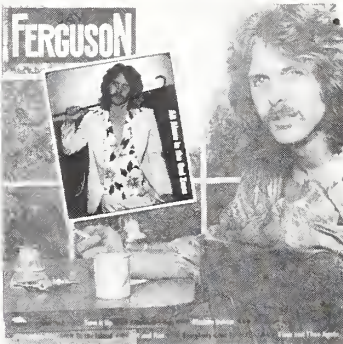


A KIND OF HUSH — Carpenters — A&M SP 4581 — Producer: Richard Carpenter — List: 6.98

The dynamic duo of the MOR/easy listening idiom have come up with another winner. "A Kind Of Hush" is a clean collection of tunes that is truly representative of the kind of music that the Carpenters are famous for — smooth, ingratiating melodies that bear their contemporary trademark. This LP is bound to be an instant success with both the pop and MOR audiences, with the title tune and their cover of the Neil Sedaka hit, "Breaking Up Is Hard To Do" standing out as prime shots for the AM market.

THAT'S THE WAY IT IS — Nilsson — RCA APL1-1119 — Producer: Trevor Lawrence — List: 6.98

As an artist, Nilsson's creative abilities speak for themselves. His track record is long and consistent — his musical product always refreshingly innovative. Joined here by many talented friends, Nilsson displays his penchant for versatility in his choice of material, which ranges from the funkified feel of "Just One Look/Baby I'm Yours" to the reggae strains of "Moonshine Bandit" (remember "Lime In The Coconut"?). A couple of good shots in the AM market, with a strong overall appeal to the progressive FM listener as well as the cult-following which he has acquired.



ALL ALONE IN THE END ZONE — Jay Ferguson — Asylum 7E-1063 — Producer: Bill Szymczyk — List: 6.98

Jay Ferguson, veteran of Jo Jo Gunne And Spirit, is smooth and clean in this collection of self-penned material (excepting his cover of Traffic's "Medicated Goo"). His rock 'n roll roots have taken their place alongside a growing funk influence, characterized by his frequent use of scratchy guitar and orchestration. The entire effort will please the progressive FM market and all of the fans of the two aforementioned groups, and the AM airwaves are sure to be carrying some of this material. "Snakes On The Run" is our pick.

STARZ — Starz — Capitol ST-11539 — Producer: Jack Douglas — List: 6.98

With Kiss and Aerosmith leading the race, Starz are one more example that America can indeed produce first-rate rock bands. Their music is straight-ahead and laden with that cast-iron charm that comes only from the best equipment being stroked in the proper fashion — and that's relentlessly. Retailers should be made aware that this group has very heavy support from their record company via an intensive promotional campaign. They're a natural for FM airplay and live performances are sure to boost LP sales. Programmers: watch "(She's Just A) Fallen Angel."



AIN'T THAT A BITCH — Johnny Guitar Watson — DJM DJLPA-3 — Producer: Johnny Guitar Watson — List: 6.98

Philly-style funk blends well with a strong big band sound to create a nice synthesis of styles that will appeal to R&B, pop and FM markets equally. Jazz listeners will appreciate Watson's horn arrangements on tunes like "I Want To Ta-Ta You Baby." The up-tempo "I Need It" should receive some attention along with the title track, which really shows off Watson's production talents.

SPIN — Spin — Ariola/America/Capitol ST 50013 — List: 6.98

Very tight progressive jazz renderings blend well with some rock rhythms to create an airy sound with substance. The feel is very diversified lending the album much crossover potential. FM rock stations are sure to be bedazzled by the spacey guitar licks of "Sea And Seasons" while pop and progressive stations will devour the funky chops of "Grasshopper," which features some very tight horns. So that no one is left out, the progressive jazz programmer should pick up on "Spinning," a fine composition.



SPEAK NO EVIL — Buddy Rich And The Big Band Machine — RCA APL1-1503 — Producers: Richard Evans, Bill Traut — List: 6.98

Big band master, Buddy Rich, offers up a king-size helping of some fine contemporary sounds. His Big Band Machine is tighter than ever whether leaning into a clean jazz piece like "Yearnin' Learning" or skating through a slick disco cut like "Speak No Evil." Rich makes no bones about giving the spotlight to all his personnel and consequently, there are some fine solos ranging from tasty guitar to electric piano and, of course, his great horns. A strong shot for the jazz programmer which shows a lot of promise as a pop item.

BUFFALO SMOKE — Lou Courtney — RCA APL1-1696 — Producer: Lou Courtney — List: 6.98

Hot new R&B action with Lou Courtney! Accompanied by his new group, Buffalo Smoke, Courtney flies through a collection of tunes that represent a fine fusion of R&B and progressive genres. The strong, funky rhythm section lays a firm foundation for the vocal and guitar/keyboard interplay. An easy winner in R&B circles, this LP should also receive a considerable amount of attention in the FM progressive market with some pop potential as well. Top cuts include "Danger (Watch Your Step)" and "911."



IMPACT — Impact — Atco SD 36-135 — Producer: Bobby Eli — List: 6.98

A strong soul offering from this new group featuring the dynamic lead vocals of erstwhile Temptation, Damon Otis Harris. The feel is slick and clean, due, in part, to the fabulous production job of Bobby Eli, who also co-wrote all of the selections on the LP. A strong rhythm section supplemented with some fine strings takes a back seat to the beautiful vocal work of Damon and the background work of the rest of the group. A natural for the R&B airwaves, much AM/pop potential here. Watch the movin' cut "Friends."

The rich vocals and clean keyboard lines of Larry Santos float effortlessly atop a rolling rhythm section which provides just the right balance for the MOR genre. The tunes reach deep within the listener, playing on sensitivities that are easy to relate to. The album also shows promise in the pop vein with such lilting melodies as "Lovin' Woman" and "Early In The Morning." All in all, a very delightful offering whose crossover potential makes it worth keeping an eye on.



SAVE YOUR KISSES FOR ME — Brotherhood Of Man — Pye 12134 — Producer: Tony Hiller — List: 6.98

Clean pop tunes which are made effective via some very nice arranging and orchestration. Leaning heavily into the MOR market, this collection of tunes reflects a high degree of professionalism that's sure to make this a frequent addition to popular playlists. Of particular note is the fine vocal interaction between the male and female counterparts of the group. Programmers, watch "Now" and "Dream On."

Another entry in the progressive race is this German group which features a unique fusion of jazz and progressive electronics to produce an offering which is original, to say the least. The synthesizer is definitely the dominant force in the musical melee, however keyboard lines frequently share the spotlight with the interpretive vocals of Herbert Natho. This LP is sure to win many converts in the FM progressive market while cuts like the title track might find willing listeners in some progressive jazz areas.

Though their roots are solidly in the South, their music is only slightly influenced by the Southern-rock sound. This LP is a strong collection of pop material which features the lead vocals of Bruce Blackman, who also wrote all of the group's material and co-produced the album. The songs display a true talent for the pop hook which will makes tunes like "I Got To Know" and "Lash LaRue" great pop fodder.

The artists will be placed with companies in the United States on an individual basis, starting with the placement of British rock band Judas Priest on Janus Records.

WB Pacts Whitfield

LOS ANGELES — Whitfield Records, a new label headed by veteran producer Norman Whitfield, will be manufactured and distributed by Warner Bros. Records, it was announced this week in a joint statement by Warner Bros. Board Chairman Mo Ostin and Norman Whitfield, President of Whitfield Records.

The agreement calls for worldwide distribution of all resultant product and the exclusive services of Norman Whitfield as producer for the label. Antilles

Island has a "mid-price" line called Antilles which features contemporary experimental music. The line lists for \$4.98, and unlike most mid-price lines, is elaborately packaged with vinyl-lined inner sleeves usually only found on expensive classical records and imports. Said Nuccio of the line. "Most record companies can't put out an album which they know is going to sell maybe 15,000 copies. They do it all the time, but supposedly not knowingly. We can do it with Antilles because we don't expect them to sell like pop LPs. We've set up a different P and L (profit and loss) for them, and most of them are one-off items which we license." He added that most of the Antilles albums are the sort of records which would formerly only have appeared in the U.S. as imports, which, he added, are very expensive. He emphasized that it is not a line which they use to build artists and that artists of any stature are encouraged to use it for work they may do which is out of the mainstream. He added that not only is the material out of the mainstream, but the marketing and promotion. The line is offered with only a five per cent return rate, as opposed to the usual 100 per cent. "This leads it into the right shops; if they take it, they know they can sell it. It goes primarily to the shops which do well with imports." The line is also advertised differently, concentrating on stereo publications and the Schwann catalogs. Nuccio is aiming this advertising at the "buyer at the other end of the classical spectrum."

As for the future of the label, Nuccio predicted "So far, we have always been the forerunner of most contemporary music, such as reggae, and we will continue in that tradition."

format, broadcasters will be able to get all FCC regulations in a single book, instead of the current 2-volume listing now available.

Positive Reaction

Reaction to re-regulation has been fairly good. "It's been positive in terms of what they've done so far," says NAB's Hall. "They have eased dealing with the FCC."

Chuck Shepherd, of the National Citizens Committee for Broadcasting, concurs, saying the point of re-regulation is "to get government off the backs of radio and television." But Shepherd has qualms about its affect on the public interest. "It's free enterprise-oriented," he feels. "It's still supportive of the broadcasters."

Applauded Effort

"I think the industry, public individuals, and professionals have applauded this effort," said the FCC's Crane. "Both the regulators and the regulated find a lot of good in it."

Eleven re-regulation orders have been issued to date. In addition to the rules on program logs, new rules on automatic transmitters and remote pick-up stations will be out by the end of the year.

600 Comments

Broadcasters and citizens have been involved throughout the re-regulation process. Over 600 comments were received by the FCC after its initial re-regulation announcement. Most came from small market radio stations.

Several NAB committees have also provided input. "Sometimes they do what we ask, sometimes they don't" said Hall of the FCC. "But the spirit of Chairman Wiley's efforts is that (he) wanted broadcasters to get involved. Even if it's only to sit down and write a letter to the Commissioner," he added.

Most of the music played on radio and most of America's hits are licensed by BMI.

KLOS-FM — Programming To Listener Expectations A Secret To Success

by J.B. Carmicle

LOS ANGELES — "There's a real simple formula to having a successful radio station," Tom Yates, KLOS-FM, Los Angeles PD related to *Cash Box*. "All you have to do is find out what it is people want to hear on your station and program to listener expectations." Yates formula must be working. KLOS, the ABC owned FM outlet, has led in the ARB ratings books for its particular format for some time in this city. Exploring two entities that contribute to a station's success, music and jocks, Yates expounded on both.

Explaining that finding out what people want to hear on your station isn't the easiest task, Yates mentioned "quantitative and qualitative" research is a must in achieving success. "You have to find meaningful research and apply it logically to listener expectations," he explained, "it's easy to hang out in record stores for instance and find out who's in the store, watch the age groups and what they're buying, and get an idea of such things as ethnic backgrounds and marital status."

"People program your station too," he continued. "We watch requests and the mail. We know when something is being hyped by a selective set of people or one person, and I know by handwriting and writing style what letters we can ignore. But in the same respect, sometimes I'll get a letter from a teenager and then a school teacher who basically say the same thing. It's not necessarily a trend at that point, but it's interesting . . . it's something to watch. That's part of the way we find out what people want to hear on KLOS."

Mentioning that 117 local stores are surveyed each week and national trades are checked by his music staff, Yates emphasized that this quantitative research is transformed into qualitative research at music staff meetings. How? Ruth Pinedo and Dabar Hoorelbeke do the research, a consensus is reached, and the tabulations are presented to Tom. "We're an adult station . . . let's be careful how and what we play," he related. On a numerical value system, the numbers are not strictly adhered to as far as number one receiving more airplay than the rest, etc. "A #8 record on that consensus may be played in heavier rotation than a #5 because of who's buying what. We look at the age and sex of the sales reports and even though teens may be causing a record to show up strong on the consensus, we may not automatically

program it in that proportion." That's where qualitative research from numbers shows the music staff the right perspective in programming to make a successful station.

"We want the listener to be taken to the limit of his comfort zone," said Yates, "when he tunes into KLOS it's like a great big party and the disc jockey is playing the records. We're like an old pair of shoes or wearing a tuxedo at a special event. We want to be comfortable to the listener in the same way a familiar shoe feels or returning home from a concert and getting back into Levis."

Competition from other stations in Los Angeles doesn't bother Tom Yates either. "If you operate in a vacuum, you have a

limited lifespan on this earth. It's so easy to be subjective and to sit back when you're number one . . . we like being number one. But you have to divorce yourself from being subjective. Especially when you realize that there's an objective enlightenment that comes to you when you realize your job is on the line as a station programmer."

Jocks? "I feel we've got the right combination of air personalities who sound right with the music they play, and they're programming to listener expectations. A jock must know two things," Yates continued, "what time it is and who he is."

Yates expressed that jocks on KLOS are

album. We want every Aerosmith fan to have all of their albums."

Close With Promoters

One of the reasons for the success of the Leber/Krebs team is that, having been agents, they have close relationships with the promoters across the country. This has helped them to get the maximum out of the touring schedules of their acts, and also helped them to implement their theory of playing a market until they break it. Another factor that has been important in the growth of their acts, particularly Aerosmith, is their unusual use of TV advertising. TV spots which are designed to promote the concert appearances but which also feature the album covers are used locally prior to dates. The spots are produced and paid for by Leber/Krebs and the TV time is paid for until the afternoon and evening of the show in order to sell out the last, crucial seats.

Following concert appearances, spots for the albums are run by Columbia. Leber and Krebs feel that once someone has seen an act live, they should be widely exposed to all the product available.

Market by Market

"Columbia followed our market by market, city by city build," stated Krebs. Their strategy was built on seeing the U.S. as 12 to 15 different countries. According to Krebs, the country is segmented musically; certain types of rock 'n' roll are more popular in some areas than others. "Once we showed Columbia how strong we were in certain areas, they realized that we should be able to spread this popularity." Krebs emphasized that the market-by-market build is especially necessary with an album-oriented group: "You can only break nationally, in most cases, with singles." While they realize that the success of their single "Dream On" has helped the group tremendously, they do not want Aerosmith to become a singles-oriented act. "We are looking for long-range development, rather

than success with singles. With singles, as useful as they are, you always face the problem of coming up with the next one. In this business, once you've made it, it is by rote. A lot of people fail in this business because they don't understand the live concert end of it, or because they don't understand the idea of timely delivery of product." Aerosmith is contracted to deliver two albums a year to Columbia, but only deliver one. "The record company wants two albums a year, because they don't know when this thing is going to stop, and they want the most out of it. But we are looking for continued success, not just a couple of years. Aerosmith has been managed along the same lines as Led Zepelin, the Who and the Stones, that is, not concentrating on singles, and now we are successful, not overexposing by touring constantly. Peter Grant has kept Led Zepelin going long after the law of averages said it should have ended."

Total Belief

When asked what they felt the most im-

Banking

portant thing about managing was, Leber responded, "The most important thing is total belief in your artists. If the artist has talent and you are a good manager, you will have your day. Also, the ability to stick it out, to never quit. The inter-relationship between artist and manager during the embryonic stages of their career is also very important. You have to be both mother and father to the artists."

Leber added that an increasingly important function of a manager is banking an act. "We have \$500,000 invested in our groups right now. Aside from the record companies, and a few banks on the west coast, the only banker left is the manager. A group needs a lot of money to get started, for equipment alone. Managers with capital are becoming more important to a group starting out than a record company." Besides handling Aerosmith and Nugent, Leber/Krebs also handles Elliott Murphy, Stu Daye and Mahogany Rush, among

COUNTRY ARTIST OF THE WEEK Vernon Oxford



The "Redneck" — Vernon Oxford had to go all the way to London to be discovered in Nashville. However, Vernon's strong country singing, his quiet perseverance, and RCA's belief in his talents is now paying off with hit records.

Vernon's story begins like many others. He was born in Rogers, Arkansas, and began singing at age four. Somewhere between growing up, learning chords C, F and G7, suffering from aching fingers and singing other stars' songs, he began to develop his own solid country singing style, which eventually took him to a singing club job in Wichita, Kansas. He sang there for awhile and then, in 1964, at the urging of some of his Kansas fans, he made the move to Nashville. He took his guitar and walked into RCA Records and announced he had come to make some records for the label. A short time later, however, Vernon left the label, and the business of music for a few years.

But then Lady Luck finally tossed him a break, in the form of a 27-song, 2-album set that RCA put together and released in the overseas market. Response was slow but strong, and his bandwagon started to creak slowly forward again. Based on the acceptance of his RCA album overseas, he was asked to substitute for another singer on a 3-week tour in England, during the spring of 1974, and he was back in business.

Playing British country music clubs and small hotel supper clubs, Vernon's soulful country singing began to turn on the English honky tonk fan. He developed a following overseas and his record sales continued to rise there. Word drifted back to RCA Records in Nashville, and in 1974 Vernon Oxford again became an RCA recording artist, and he had a moderate hit with a song called "Got To Get A Man Named Peter Off Your Mind." His record sales continued in England, Belgium, Australia, Norway, Ireland and Scotland, and today he has a reputation of being hot overseas with his hit "Shadows."

Meanwhile, back in the States, Vernon had another single release on RCA titled "Giving The Pill," an answer to Loretta Lynn's hit. It received fair response, and then RCA producer Bob Ferguson found a song called "The Shadows of My Mind." It became Vernon's first real stateside hit, and helped bring his name and country singing style to the foreground.

He has been back to England twice during the last six months and began working club and show dates here in this country.

Vernon has a new single release on RCA titled "Redneck." It's all about honky tonks, six-packs, tight blue jeans and huntin' honky tonk queens.

Vernon's bookings have recently been taken over by Buddy Lee Attractions, Nashville.

The twelve 1976 inductees include: Bob Atcher, Hoyt Axton, Jim Ed Brown, Vernon Dalhart, Mac Davis, Mickey Gilley, Joe E. Lewis, C.W. McCall, Red River Dave McEnery, Ronnie Milsap, Ramblin' Tommy Scott and Ray Whitley.

The event was attended by artists and their representatives, scores of country fans brought to Nashville for Fan Fair activities, music industry executives and the Country Music Foundation staff and board of trustees.

Bill Ivey, foundation executive director, welcomed the visitors and inductees to Nashville and the Hall of Fame and introduced Frank Jones, Capitol Records vice president and chairman of the board of the Country Music Foundation. Jones noted that this year's ceremony honored "both all-time greats and stars of today." Stressing the importance of the Walkway to the Hall of Fame and to the Foundation Library, Jones stated that "proceeds from the Walkway will be particularly helpful this year, because both the museum and library are involved in an expansion program." Each artist inducted into the Walkway of Stars donates one thousand dollars to the Country Music Foundation, and these funds are used in the library program.

Two walkway memberships involved special efforts by many people. Goldrup was on hand to accept the walkway certificate on behalf of the deceased Dalhart.

Conway Twitty and Jimmy Jay of United Talent attended the ceremony to accept the walkway certificate on behalf of Joe E. Lewis, longtime leader of Twitty's "Twitty Bird" band. Lewis was killed in an auto accident this past April, and Twitty and Jay spearheaded a drive to place his name in the walkway. The family of Joe E. Lewis was available for the ceremony.

Country Fan Fair Draws Record Crowd

NASHVILLE — Nashville's Fifth Annual International Country Music Fan Fair, held June 7th through the 13th, reported a record breaking crowd of 12,600 registrants who enjoyed a wide variety of indoor and outdoor events, which included: a free celebrity softball tournament, a four-hour bluegrass concert, more than 25 hours of live entertainment as presented by record labels and music industry organizations, live country music tent shows during lunch breaks, a grand masters fiddlin' contest, picture taking and autograph sessions with country artists and songwriters in the exhibition area dominated by fan club booths, as well as visits to the Country Music Hall of Fame, the Grand Ole Opry and Opryland.

Celebrity Softball Tourney

The third annual Fan Fair Celebrity Softball Tournament was held on Monday, June 7th at Nashville's Two Rivers Park. There were 17 teams in the men's division, and four teams in the women's division.

The finals took place on June 8th, with Ray Griff's Rays of Sunshine defeating the Nashville Pickers 9-8 in extra inning play. The Mary Reeves' Reev-ettes took the women's title with a 22-6 win over the Po' Girls. Dave Rowland of the group "Dave and Sugar" was voted the men's division Most Valuable Player. Country artist, Wilma Burgess, was voted the women's division Most Valuable Player.

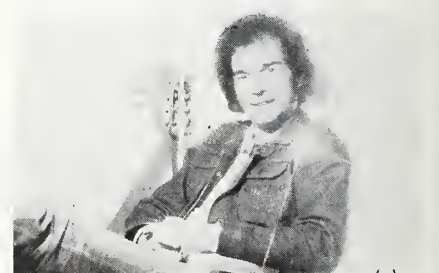

Johnny Gimble produced and wrote this Texas tale with plenty of Texas swing. Sounds like good box and chart action.

Weather Report

ROXY, LA — You wouldn't have needed a meteorologist to predict the Weather Report for the Roxy recently. These Columbia recording artists, with an album called "Black Market" that has been widely accepted by radio stations, had no trouble in putting their act together in great style. Weather Report stands out as a rhythmic, pulsating, straight-ahead percussion sound and that percussive excellence boosts the latin flair of the other instruments. With double drummers providing everything from a super bass bonga sound to the timed use of bells and chimes, percussion didn't stop there. Vocal oohs and aahs from one drummer complemented a feverish instrument-with-voice solo that ran the gamut from latin cha-cha to a mystical African beat. Combine these sounds with a keyboard master panel that looks like a plane cockpit, and a player who masters that panel to get exactly what he wants, and the result is the "heart" of Weather Report's sound. Horns and piano had their individual spotlighted segments, but a duet between the two proved to be so tender and intimate that some onlookers shh'd others into quelling the useless disruptive chatter that goes on when the tunes mellow from loud to soft. It certainly didn't affect the band. They'll be charming people with a cohesive exciting show wherever they appear.

But a soft slow solo vocal on a tune called "Maybe You Think You Know Someone" by one of the singers highlighted the set. An electric piano was accompanying her on the tune and the effect was very well received. Stoneground's acceptance will be immediate and as spontaneous as the group is talented.

Hall & Oates Lesley Duncan

THE ROXY, L.A. — The atmosphere in the club was strictly electric. The band played some crashing chords for introduction, the stage was still dark, and then the lights went higher as the two men came out and became the focus of attention.

Daryl Hall & John Oates have, perhaps, the most effective mix a duo could have: On stage, they look strikingly different, one tall, blonde, the other just the opposite; more importantly, each man's music complements the other.

Although Oates was restrained at the Roxy, when he let loose it was clear that he was a fine guitar player. His rhythm work was outstanding, and he played his instrument with flair.

The band was not at all unlike the tight, much vaunted E Street Band. The rhythm section of Steven Dees on bass and Eddie Zyne on drums, along with Oates, was tight and responsive to the needs of all the various tunes.

The music was almost frighteningly good. Hall & Oates have managed to achieve what seems to be a magical interaction. Changes were reflected in simple gestures; nothing was overplayed. Hall performed an interesting solo tune on piano, and before you noticed it the band had left the stage and was back. The set flowed, the pacing was excellent; there were no false moves.

Certainly the peak of the evening was a beautiful rendition of "Sara Smile." Hall sang the tune, packing more emotion into each phrase, more than you thought possible. He is, as well, an accomplished showman. He had all the moves, and they all seemed to be a direct and honest reflection of his music.

Paul Revere & The Raiders

PLAYBOY CLUB, CENTURY CITY, CALIF. — It seems that in the last few months we are experiencing a resurgence of interest in the 60's, with the re-release of Beatles material and new hits by such artists as John Sebastian and the Beach Boys. One of my favorite memories of the period is rushing home from school every afternoon to watch Paul Revere and The Raiders on the TV show "Where The Action Is." I always enjoyed their comedy almost as much as their rock and roll. Although one of the most commercially successful groups ever, the group has never achieved the critical acclaim that they deserved. They have suffered under the "bubble gum" and "teenybopper" appellations, even though their music is often as tight and professional as that of their more critically lauded contemporaries.

For their recent appearance at Century City's plush Playboy Club, the Drive/TK recording group opened their set with the perfectly chosen "American Band." Drummer and lead singer Omar Martinez has a powerful and versatile voice that is well suited to the Raiders' rockers, and that can also be delicately sensitive on ballads. Martinez has to be one of the better drummers on the rock scene today, besides being a fine singer. Lead guitarist Doug Heath, bassman Ron Fooks and organ and keyboards player Bobby Wooley also take their turns being spotlighted on vocals. Leader Paul Revere utilizes his solo spot as a vehicle for his outrageously funny humor. Revere could have had a great career as a comic if he had not chosen music as his profession instead. Though the group has had numerous personnel changes through the years, it has remained a polished unit with a combination of showmanship and musical ability.

If one side of the room he's playing isn't responding, they're a deaf-mute convention and he's talking to them with sign language. The laughter never stopped, with Henry spitting out insults at his own show. "The reviews are great . . . it's word of mouth that's killin' us." Pat Henry's show is not to be missed.

Frank Sinatra, Jr. performed a series of modestly received tunes that ran from a very smooth, "Most Beautiful Girl In The World," to an up-tempo "Never Can Say Goodbye," utilizing an electro-synthesizer on backup.

The man who never stops moving from the minute the show starts is Sam Butera. "It's a pleasure to kill ourselves for you," he quipped and he put on one of the best opening sets ever. From a rousing "First, Last, and Everything," to "Basin Street Blues," and "I'm In Love," Butera and the Witnesses held total control of an audience who experienced the good style of straight ahead entertainment not seen anymore.

Whether it's Buera's powerful torch style vocals or his body giving emphasis to his instrumentation Butera is an entertainer all the way and his show was just right for this night.

George Fischhoff Tom Cunningham

ERIC'S BACK ROOM, N.Y. — George Fischhoff, onetime camp music director, is back again with his unusual piano act. Why do you say unusual? Fischhoff is bringing the history of piano to his audiences via blues, rock & roll, boogie woogie, jazz and classical. Best known for his hit compositions "98.6," by Keith, and "Lazy Day," by Spanky and Our Gang, Fischhoff includes "Georgia Porcupine," his piano hit from a few years back and "Funky Doodle," his new single on Ranwood Records. Of particular note, audience participation is demonstrated when Fischhoff performs one of his blues pieces.

Tom Cunningham, a troubadour in the acoustic blues vein, performed a tasty set of soulful, folk blues. His vocals were strong, especially on "I Can't Stand Living On My Own" as was his bottleneck playing on Robert Johnson's classic "Ramblin' On My Mind."

Savoy Brown Russ Ballard

BOTTOM LINE, NYC — From hard blues roots to rock and soul, heralded by the album "Street Corner Talkin'," the guitar of Kim Simmonds has always been the central focus and main identification of Savoy Brown through ten years on London Records. The group's latest edition finds keyboard player Paul Raymond, who has been associated with the group for nearly five years, taking the majority of the lead vocals, dispensing with the band's former reliance on a lead singer onstage. Simmonds and bassist Ian Ellis are less than adequate even for their short solo singing assignments, but they provide a spirited feel when vocally backing selections such as "Get Up And Do It," the lead cut from the recent "Skin 'N' Bone" album. From older albums, Simmonds and the group chose a true-to-life blues story, "Hero To Zero," and a cataclysmic finale in "Hellbound Train." Though this club's tight scheduling would not allow time for an encore, Savoy's New York followers persisted in demanding one until they were politely ushered from the room.

Russ Ballard's songwriting abilities may have been camouflaged while he was a member of Argent, but his Epic album, "Winning," and first solo tour will finally allow him to promote his own name. Ballard's current works range from the driving rock of the album's title cut or "Halloween," to ballads with a strong story appeal such as "Song For Gail." His powerful voice is equally adaptable to varied styles, and his instrumentally tight band carries the high harmonies so important to Ballard's sound. "I Don't Believe in Miracles" roused the enthusiasm of Argent cultists present, but the most cogent reminder of the potential depth of Ballard's talent was the song that Three Dog Night was wise enough to cover, "Liar," while some maintain that pop hits are inherently conservative this tune has always been captivating in its originality.

soul waves: Record Company Reaction To LP-Oriented AM Radio

Record company reaction to **KDAY's** new programming format was mixed. Larger and more LP orientated companies felt the move to play more LPs was quite favorable, however the smaller labels who work with smaller budgets felt the move would hurt them in trying to establish a group into a viable top notch act. Here are some comments from some top executives at various companies.

Miller London, vice president of national singles and albums of promotion at **Motown**, feels that the **KDAY** move is an attempt to kill the single business. Miller remarked that if every black and pop Top 40 station did this, it would kill any chance for new artists to develop themselves. "Our policy towards singles is to use them as a tool to create excitement for an upcoming LP. But in some cases, singles deals are made. How can you build these artists? If a trend like this develops around the country it will kill the development of many new and exciting R&B artists. I think radio stations don't realize that in the near future the Temptations, Isleys and groups of this caliber may retire and where are you going to find acts to replace them. If you can't build and develop artists, you can't create future superstars," London said.

Norman Gardner, vice president of promotion for **London Records** admires the move

toward more LPs, however he is concerned regarding whether or not the LP will be getting the same high rotation that singles get. "If they go on an LP cut, will it be played four or five times a day or just once if they change their programming toward 50-60 LPs?" Gardner sees this type of programming happening more in major markets rather than smaller markets. "In a larger market where you have four or five R&B stations you can do more diversified programming techniques, but in smaller markets I don't see this type of programming happening in AM radio. I think it's going to be a very selective situation," Gardner said.

Otis Smith, vice president of **ABC Records** feels the **KDAY** move is fantastic. "At ABC we make few if any single deals. We are an LP oriented company and if we do come with a single we follow it up with an LP within two to three weeks. Other stations around the country have different philosophies. We're in the album business, so if the stations are into programming more LPs, that's what we like."

Hilary Johnson, director of R&B product for **Playboy Records** still feels that singles are still, and will be, a strong and influential part of the record business. "Up until this year, we were only making singles deals. We are a smaller company and we don't have the budget of companies like Columbia, RCA, Warners, and ABC. So we put out singles to break new acts, to create a demand for LPs. I think the KDAY move is a good one, but I don't see it developing into a nationwide trend. I see black AM's playing more LPs and LP cuts because black FM's are becoming so strong. If everybody at record companies were forced to do LPs and not singles, many artists would have to be dropped from the rosters due to the financial impact. Moves like this don't affect the large companies, but they greatly hurt the small companies and new artists."

Gerry Griffin, regional promotion marketing manager for **Columbia**, feels the move will not hurt the major artists, however he feels it may affect new groups or artists trying to get off the ground. "The new breed of program directors are going more towards this type of format. Your Black FM's around the country are becoming quite strong and I see Black AM moving more in this direction just to remain competitive. A move like this doesn't hurt us because we release a great number of LPs, however we also release a lot of new singles and in this area, if the trend continues, it will be very hard for these artists to get off the ground."

Cecil Holmes, president of **Chocolate City Records**, does see a trend developing toward more LP play rather than singles. "It's getting very hard to break singles. Black FM's are becoming much more of a dominating force in the R&B field, so I can see why more black AM's are going toward this type of format. We ourselves are not really looking for the single deal. We still get involved with them once in a while, but now we're more interested in LPs. Ten years ago the single was the pulse of things in black music, today the LP is the dominating force."

Chris Clay, national R&B promotion director for **Chelsea Records**, feels the **KDAY** move is unfair. "Moves by AM stations like this hurt independent companies. It kills the chances for a new artist from being heard. The smaller independent companies don't have the budgets the large companies have to put out LPs. We, in many instances, can't make that kind of commitment in the beginning. However, if we put out a new single, and it happens then we can follow-up with an LP because there is a demand for this artist. I don't see this trend developing nationwide, especially in the South and Midwest, because singles are still very strong in these areas."

Larkin Arnold, vice president and general manager of the Soul division of **Capitol** feels the **KDAY** move will have positive and negative impact. "The move will be helpful to the established artists, but it may be a problem for new acts trying to become established."

Wendall Bates, west coast A&R, R&B director for **RCA** has mixed feelings about the change. "A move like this doesn't hurt well-known acts, but it will make it that much harder for companies to develop new ones. In many instances, new acts don't get the budget that the larger ones do, so if the AM's cut off this avenue of airplay, I don't see how these people who may be very talented, will be able to grow. Being involved heavily in A&R work at RCA will make me watch this trend closely."

Mike Abbott, national R&B manager for **H&L Records**, feels moves like this by AM's hurt small companies. "What I see occurring if this type of trend continues is that the bigger companies will get bigger and the smaller companies smaller. Moves like this in major markets make it that much more difficult to break artists. I think that many of the new artists should to the FCC and complain about not being heard. I see moves like this more as an experiment rather than as a trend, otherwise it will be almost impossible to break new records and new acts. Nowadays it's getting so tough to get AM airplay, that I have been thinking of breaking records on CB Bands," Abbott said jokingly.

Following *Spector* on a less-than-fruitful talent hunt through Max's Kansas City, the *Journal* quoted opinions from *Arista's Bob Feiden*, who called A&R "the lifeblood of a record label," while *CBS' Bruce Lundvall* spoke of the "passionate hunger" a label must feel before signing a group, considering the tremendous and all-consuming commitment demanded in breaking new acts. Overall, there was a logical fascination with the pressure and long hours imposed upon the "talent scout," in the rather esoteric pursuit of discovering what large groups of people will want to hear.

BLUE NOTES — The **New York Jazz Museum** will reopen at a new location, Broadway and 54th Street, with a celebration entitled "The Jazz Trumpet." others. As for the future of the business, **Leber** sees a move towards the matching of contemporary music with theatrical presentations, such as the touring company of "Jesus Christ Superstar," which they handled and which **Leber/Krebs** is now reopening on Broadway. They have the rights to produce a rock-theater version of "Desperado," the concept album by the *Eagles*. They see this sort of presentation prospering following the large amount of stadium concerts of supergroups this summer. "There will be too many acts out there this summer. The concept album show will

explode, it will be a whole new industry." The concert-going public will have their fill of large concerts after the summer and thus start looking for something new, says **Leber**. He also sees the use of cable video to present concerts in theaters over video-projection systems to areas which groups do not play live. He sees video cassettes and discs as potentially being the "most dangerous part of the business" in that there is a lot at stake in that market. Obviously optimistic about the future of the music business, **Leber** offered this projection. "I see the music business becoming a five-billion dollar industry in the near future."

RCA To Release New Starship LP

NEW YORK — The Jefferson Starship's new album, "Spitfire," will be released next week, coinciding with the group's summer tour. The Grunt album, distributed by RCA, is the Starship's first since the two-million plus selling "Red Octopus."

In addition, RCA is releasing "Highway Robbery," an album by Free Beer, the first from an association between Lorber/Scheer Productions and RCA Records.

Agents negotiating rates for non-dramatic literary works will nevertheless get an anti-trust exemption allowing them to bargain, and collect, collectively.

Other changes include:

- * an anti-trust exemption allowing public broadcasters and other copyright owners to "designate common agents to negotiate, agree to, pay, or receive payments" for royalties;
- * a six-month limit for the Tribunal to review an established binding royalty rates;
- * a requirement that the Copyright register report to Congress on January 3, 1980 on the extent of voluntary licensing arrangements for non-dramatic literary works by public broadcasting stations;
- * copyright infringement liability will rest with public broadcasting institutions rather than individuals.

Single Entity

It's expected that public broadcasters will choose to negotiate with the music performing rights organizations as a single entity rather than separately. Rep. Ed Pattison (D.-N.Y.) tried to prevent this with an amendment that "attempts to preserve the normal patterns of negotiations," for musical works.

The Pattison amendment "would allow the performing rights societies to opt to avoid the Tribunal by agreeing to compulsory arbitration under the rules of the American Arbitration Association," according to Pattison. In return for the agreement, the music performing rights societies would be able to negotiate much as they do with commercial broadcasters. "This way PBS does not get a single deal with all negotiating parties," said Pattison.

Complex Mechanism

Most subcommittee members felt however, that the Pattison amendment only added to the numerous negotiating and licensing procedures already written into the bill. Reading from a list of objections prepared by PBS, Congressman Railsback (R.-Ill.) noted that the Pattison amendment "creates a complex mechanism that results in a great number of negotiating paths in place of a single, and simple system under the Copyright Royalty Tribunal." Added Chairman Kastenmeier (D.-Wis.) "I don't know that the Pattison amendment changes things drastically, but it does raise the complexity."

Gangbusters

Congressman Drinan (D.-Mass.) wondered if Pattison's amendment could even make it through the full Judiciary Committee and the House-Senate Conference Committee if public broadcasters came on like "gangbusters" against it. The Chairman responded by saying "I don't think the decibels of complaint should be the determining factor."

Despite the Chairman's reassurance, the subcommittee bagged Pattison's amendment in favor of language which has a slightly better chance of getting through the full committee and the House.

Stones Postpone U.S. Summer Tour Until Fall

LOS ANGELES — The Rolling Stones' concert visit to the United States this summer has been postponed until the fall because of the group's exhaustion from their current tour of Europe which kicked-off in Frankfurt on April 28 and ends in Vienna on June 23. It comprised 36 concerts in 24 cities and 11 extra performances were added while the tour was in progress. The group will begin recording a new album in mid-July and complete it before resuming concerts.

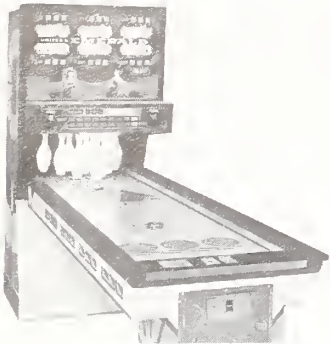

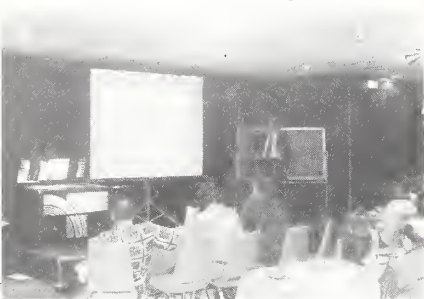
School In Session

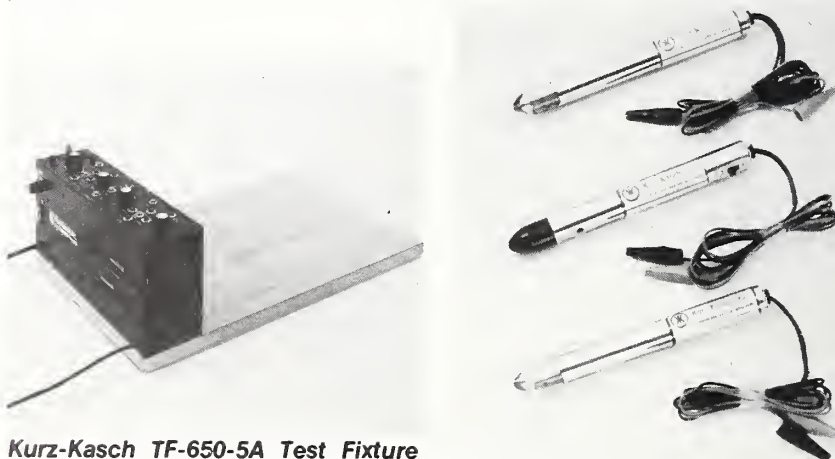

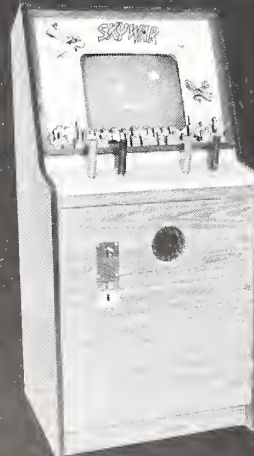

'Knights In Armor' New Video Upright From PSE

SUNNYVALE, CA — Project Support Engineering recently announced that distributor shipments are currently underway on the firm's newly introduced video upright called "Knights In Armor."

measuring 3" in height. There is a white knight on a black horse and a black knight on a white horse; each carrying a lance and a shield which are both maneuverable by the player. A hand grip on a steel rod controls the lance and a "T" handle controls the shield.

As both knights charge out from the left and right of the screen, the object is for the player to skewer the opponent with the lance while defending himself with the shield. If this is accomplished, the stricken opponent is lifted off his horse and "carried off the screen" on the victor's lance. When both players successfully skewer each other, they are both knocked from their horses and shown being dragged off the screen with a leg caught in their horse's stirrup.

Points are digitally scored on the screen in the following manner: a single body hit gains 8 points; a double body hit gains 4 points for each player. The screen displays "Hit" and "Score" beneath the successful player's score.

The game is operator adjustable to vend either an 8, 10 or 12 "run" game and, although the factory recommends 2 for 25c play, pricing is also adjustable.

Knights In Armor is housed in an all plywood cabinet measuring 4 ft. x 2 ft. x 2 ft., and contains an extra-large locking cash box located beneath the coin door. The game's audio effects include the sound of charging horses, the "crash" as the lance strikes the knight and a scraping sound when the knights are being dragged.

At Official Signing Of NYC Pinball Bill

All machines must be approved by the NYC Consumer Affairs Department, and will be located in hotels, movie theaters, taverns and other adult establishments.

Latter event will be a \$500 open doubles only tournament.

'Soap Operas' Big In Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO — Still booming: the "Soap Operas" LP series. Som Livre, the label owned by TV Globo — the strongest national network — releases two albums for each "soap opera" here which runs a half-hour novela or chapter each night. The albums split attention between domestic and international music. The last release, "Pecado Capitol," included "Il Maestro Di Violino" by Domenico Modugno, and other international songs from different origins which have given Som Livre pressing rights on special rates in order to get fantastic television promotional exposure.

"Mamae Eu Quero," an old song still a hit during Carnival, is also a big winner this year in terms of performing rights. The composers will receive the sum of \$16,000 (American dollars) for three days of performances, and TapeCar is releasing a single which presents the tune in "hustle" style for international release.



FALLEN ANGELS — Since going independent recently, Jan Olofsson has been concentrating on the international market and has wrapped up an exclusive publishing deal with Claude Carrere in France. The deal calls for Olofsson to pick up songs or records suitable for France and supply them to Carrere through "Catalogue Blue Eyes." One of the first examples of the arrangement is illustrated through "Fallen Angel" by Rogue, which Olofsson heard prior to MIDEM. Negotiations were recently finalized and now the tune has hit the French airways with TV promotional appearances supporting. The deal includes sub-publishing on "Fallen Angel" and other selected Rogue material written by Guy Fletcher and Doug Flett.

Olofsson is still looking after Young Blood International, which has recently seen European action with "Tribute To Buddy Holly" by Mike Berry who has since been signed by Polydor for the U.S. On the production end, Olofsson has begun producing records and has also signed an exclusive deal with Mickie Most of Rak for the release of Johnny Roman in the UK. First release, "Buona Sera" (an updated version), hit the streets June 4. Picture shows Olofsson (l) with Doug Flett, co-writer of "Fallen Angel."

Nippon Victor Reflects Gain

TOKYO — Nippon Victor Co., Ltd., parent company of Victor Musical Industries Co., Ltd., has held an executive meeting to settle its 86th term (Mar. 21, 1975 to Mar. 20, 1976) account.

Total sales for the term were 110,422,861,480 yen (\$368,076,205) — 3.5% more than the previous year (106,643,944,807 yen). Business profits (including gains brought forward from the last account) were 2,464,785,255 yen while profits from this term were 1,017,286,072 yen — 14.8% less than the previous term of 1,194,572,709 yen. Audio sales brought in 52,765,000,000 yen (47.8%); TV earned 32,038,000,000 yen (29%); records and music tape accounted for 7,214,000,000 yen (6.5%); and miscellaneous machine earnings totalled 15,992,000,000 yen (14.5%).

A sales target of 130,000,000,000 yen was set for the 87th term.

Antonio Carlos, Jocafi and Maria Creuza (exclusive RCA artists) are preparing their next show here in Rio (for Teatro Joao Caetano in July) since their return from the Palma de Majorca Festival where they presented "Voce Abusou" and "Diacho De Dor." Next September they fly to Spain again for a month of shows and in December they will begin a two-month tour of France, Italy and Germany.

A new artist, **Fafa De Belem**, has received a good deal of positive critical reaction to her new Polydor LP which includes the traditional song "Tamba Taja" by W. Henriques. A new voice, original style and dramatic interpretation are the main highlights of this young singer.

The **Copacabana label** is in the process of producing a surprise LP by Benito De Paula which will see an internationally-coordinated release.

ABC Records, now represented here by Contin Ental (Gravacoes Electricas), is releasing its first albums with a strong promotional push. For the first time, the market is getting a glimpse of the tremendous possibilities behind the material of this major label.

A. Rignano Elected New AFI President

MILAN — A general meeting of AFI (the Italian Association of Phonographic Industries) has been held to appoint a president and for the renewal of the executive committee.

Newly elected president of the organization is Guido Rignano, managing director of Dischi Ricordi, who succeeds Giuseppe Ornato of RCA.

The executive committee remains almost entirely unchanged, with the exception of Roberto Esposito who takes the place of Armando Sciascia. Elected members include Giovan Battista Ansoldi (Ri-Fi); Romano Bacchini (Decca); John Bush (EMI); Antonio Casetta (Produttori Associati); Roberto Esposito (Phonotype); Aurelio Fierro (King); Giuseppe Gramitto Ricci (Carosello-CE.M.E.D.); Ettore Minoretti (Fonit Cetra); Alfredo Rossi (Ariston); Piero Sugar (CBS-Sugar); and Alain Trossat (Phonogram).

Italian Raids Nab 4 Pirates

MILAN — The fiscal police have intensified their fight against pirates, recently concluding two brilliant operations which uncovered a pair of illicit music cassette factories, both located in the Milan area. The first, which seems to have been a very important operative center, yielded more than 3,000 tapes ready for the market, 90,000 labels and dubbing sets worth an estimated 50 million lire (\$59,500). The investigation started with the casual discovery of a store containing more than 10,000 pirate cassettes. The second operation brought a seizure of an additional 4,000 counterfeit cassettes. Five persons have been arrested in connection with these operations.

Argentina Jails Offender

BUENOS AIRES — As part of the anti-piracy fight headed by the record industry in Argentina, Carlos Alfredo Gonzalez was sentenced by the justice to four months of prison under charges of illegally duplicating recorded magnetic tapes and selling them. The Argentine Chamber of Record Producers is currently engaged in a full-scale campaign against piracy, under the direction of Nestor Selasco, who foresees a staff devoted exclusively to this task.

Dr. Carlos Garber, in charge of artists and repertoire at Trova Records, has just returned from a new trip to the United States, which included being present at the concert offered by Astor Piazzolla in the Carnegie Hall, marking the opening of modern Argentine music to the U.S. audience. Piazzolla is currently living in Europe, but spends two or three months a year in Buenos Aires and offers concerts regularly with Argentine musicians in other countries.

Artist manager Gustavo Yanquelevich confirmed to **Cash Box** that his artist Raul Abramzon has received offers to perform for two more months in Mexico, Venezuela and the Caribbean, after the success of his first appearances in these markets. Abramzon will return to Buenos Aires to tape a special TV program with the songs of his new LP in Sept. His waxings are released by CBS.

Sherry, Lewis & Meehan Form Nems Agency

LONDON — Well-known music business executives John Sherry, Vic Lewis and Patrick Meehan have all joined forces to start a new agency to be known as the Nems Agency Ltd. It will operate from within the Nems group of companies at their Hill Street headquarters. Sherry will be managing director and Vic Lewis will be chairman. The company will be employing seven agents and representing over fifty acts, including Wishbone Ash, Supertramp, Camel, Sutherland Brothers & Quiver and Jeff Beck, making the agency the largest in the world outside the US.

David Paramor, currently general manager of Sunbury Music has been appointed to the position of general manager of popular repertoire development at EMI Music, according to Ron White, managing director. Paramor has had extensive experience in all fields of the music business, starting as a record producer for EMI and working at Dick James Music. He will report directly to creative director Terry Slater.

Marquee Club Abandons Outdoor Pop Festival Plans

LONDON — Another planned outdoor pop festival has been dealt a death blow by an unwilling local council, this time Luton Council, where it was hoped a rock concert could be staged on July 10th. The reasons behind the motives for dis-allowing the concert are vague, but unfortunate timing owing to local council elections don't seem to have helped the organizers, who are the Marquee Club on behalf of the National Jazz Federation. The Marquee also organizes the annual Reading Jazz Festival, and they hoped that this year a special promotion at Luton could have augmented the already popular Reading event. Initially the council invited the organizers to stage the event at the allocated site, but there were police objections which took time to overcome. On May 4th a copy of the draft agreement for regulations concerning the event was submitted to the organizers, but there were certain points to be discussed. It was decided that a committee from the council should have a meeting with organizers to discuss the agreement and sort out any problems still existing. This would have worked out providing the council elections had not taken place on May 6th. To erode the situation even further the labor council were ousted by the conservatives, and because the red tape involved in setting up a committee to look into problems like these takes time the meeting was not held until May 27th. The conservative committee felt that it could not comply with the requirements of the organizers, so the Marquee decided that the best course of action was to withdraw. The new council has decided not to approach any other promoters to stage the event; there will be no concert July 10th.
