FLORIDA TAX UPDATE... Manley Lawson, chairman of the Florida Amusement & Vending Association's (FAVA) legislative committee, reports that on March 13, minutes before convening, the Legislature passed a bill more crippling than the gross receipts tax law now in effect.

Senate Bill 918 imposes a \$100 per machine annual license fee for locations with five machines or less, \$250 per machine for six or more. It makes the location owner responsible for the license but places "difficult and costly reporting requirements on the machine owner," Lawson said.

In commenting on the bill, he said it "simply sacrifices almost the entire industry to provide windfall tax savings to a few of the very large arcade chains in the state. In over 10 years of monitoring the Legislature, this is the most blatant example of how money can influence legislation that only benefits the very few, with no regard for logic, fairness, how others are hurt, or even the overall interests of the state."

However, if a compromise cannot be reached during the legislative sperial session, promises have been made to revert back to the 7.81 percent gross receipts tax law. FAVA president-elect Steve Piantieri says even that despised law is preferable to the annual license fee. We'll outline the whole Florida situation in a May report from the FAVA show.

➤ SCARE IN NEW YORK...The New York General Assembly and Gov. Mario Cuomo were uncomfortably close to bringing sole-source video lottery to the state in late March, but the New York State Coin Machine Association (NYSCMA) was able to quash it in time.

Association president Ralph Ceraldi said things had been on track toward operator-involved video lottery when, during the last weekend in March, a push for sole-source came from out of the blue. Lawmakers, with Cuomo's blessing, were prepared to include video lottery proceeds in the April 1 budget (the beginning of the new fiscal year). But operators mobilized and knocked the proposal out.

"Now that it's not in the budget, we'll have time to educate lawmakers and show them that we're legitimate businessmen, not members of organized crime," Ceraldi said. "We can point to safeguards in the bill and ease their minds, as well as point out the benefits of operator-involved video lottery. I'm confident that this extra time will help us get in there. But I'll tell you, it's been a roller-coaster ride."

He wanted to give special thanks to association lobbyist James Faraldi & Associates and operators Frank Calland and Jerry Respoli, all of whom have helped Ceraldi immeasurably from day one to the latest battles.

- ➤ OREGON HAS FITFUL VLT START... State-run video lottery got off to a troubled start in Oregon when communications stalled between terminals and the central computer system on March 23. Five of six pilot locations were involved in the test start-up. Dedicated phone line problems were blamed for the less-than-smooth debut of the program, which is expected to enroll 3,300 terminals in 750 taverns and restaurants throughout the state.
- ▶ GAMBLING MEASURES DIE IN WISCONSIN... Despite recommendations from the governor's blue ribbon task force favoring expanded gambling activities, legislators failed to approve separate bills proposing video lottery, riverboat gambling, and dog track casinos in the legislative session that ended in March. The video lottery issue in particular became a political "hot potato" once Gov. Tommy Thompson proposed his own bill seeking 45 percent of video lottery proceeds for the state. Look for more in May, once the dust clears on this one.
- ➤ KAMA VISITS LEGISLATORS... Thirty-three members of the Kansas Automatic Merchandising Association spent March 24 at the state capital contacting legislators and gaining support for video lottery. Over 200 contacts were made as operators strive to legalize video gaming under a tightly regulated program administered by the Kansas Lottery with coin machine operator involvement.
- CHICAGO CASINO PROPOSED... Circus Circus Enterprises, Hilton Hotels, and Caesar's World—three giant hotel/casino corporations—have joined together to propose a Las Vegas-style gambling and entertainment complex on 100 acres in downtown Chicago.

Mayor Richard Daley, a former opponent to gambling in the city, confessed to being excited about the proposition. In the March 25 edition of the Wall Street Journal, he said, "Face reality. People need jobs." An estimated 10,000 construction jobs and at least 15,000 to 20,000 permanent jobs could be created, as well as a steady stream of tax revenue. Gov. Jim Edgar, however, has reservations about expanding gambling activities beyond the current slate of riverboats, race tracks, and a state lottery.

The project would include entertainment choices of four casinos, a high-tech theme park, and a performing arts center.

SUSPECTED COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED... The New York State Police arrested Chang Yong Lee of Blue Bell, Pa., on Feb. 26 for allegedly importing counterfeit printed circuit boards into the United States, according to Bill Kidwell, AAMA director of enforcement. The arrest was based on a U.S. Customs seizure of U.S. counterfeit Street Fighter IIs.

In another development, six operators in the Ottawa, Ontario, area have been charged with copyright violations. Multiple charges were filed against the six by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police after completion of its investigation, which began in December 1991. They made their initial court appearances on April 2

Kidwell warned those attempting to import counterfeits that AAMA and its members are aggressively working with U.S. and Canadian law enforcement agencies to prevent copyright and trademark violations. Operators who are not sure whether a game they're considering is counterfeit can call Kidwell at (319) 337-9618 for assistance.

► ATLAS BUYS MONROE ASSETS . . . Atlas Distributing has purchased the assets of Monroe Distributing's Cincinnati office, effective March 16, according to an announcement by Atlas' Jerry Marcus and Ed Pellegrini.

The new Atlas branch will continue under the direction of branch manager Jerry Grotjan. Randy Cesco and all other Monroe Cincinnati personnel will remain in their current positions; in short, there won't be any changes at the branch. "The office has always done well under Jerry Grotjan, and we see no reason for that to change," Marcus said.

The office will remain at 297 Northland Blvd., Cincinnati, OH 45246. Atlas, based in Chicago, has other branches in Indianapolis and Grand Rapids, Mich.

- ANDERSON TO SEGA... Ken Anderson has been named director of sales and marketing, coin-op division, for Sega Enterprises USA. He has 25 years of experience in the industry, having worked most recently for Data East USA and also Leland, Game Plan, Chicago Coin, and Wurlitzer. "I am so pleased to have such a well experienced and highly enthusiastic sales executive leading our coin-op efforts," said president Tom Petit.
- ▶ RUMBLINGS IN MICHIGAN...On March 18, Michigan Gov. John Engler signed an executive order banning all smoking on state property and in state buildings, as well as the sale of tobacco and placement of cigarette vending machines. It also prohibits Michigan prisoners from making cigarettes in prison, which was previously allowed, though they can be brought in.

Candace Super, executive director of the Michigan Coin Machine Operators Association, says it is unclear how the Legislature will react to Engler's actions. It has kicked around various bills restricting cigarette machines, but no final action has yet been taken. Engler, unfortunately, has made it clear that he will sign any restrictive bill that reaches his desk, including a total ban. Stay tuned.

- ▶ GERMAN DISTRIBUTION FOR PREMIER... Premier Technology has signed a deal with German distributor Tuning Electronic to handle Gottlieb pins for the German and Austrian markets. Said Tuning head Reymond Safft, "We are proud of signing a long-term contract with a company that has built successful pinballs for more than 60 years. Since the introduction of its System 3 hardware almost two years ago, the flippers of Gottlieb have improved so much."
- SAYERS JOINS WILLIAMS-BALLY/MIDWAY...Lenore Sayers, who worked most recently as director of marketing for Sega Enterprises USA, has been named West Coast regional sales manager for Williams-Bally/Midway.

"We are indeed fortunate to be able to add Lenore to the Williams-Bally/Midway family," said vice president of sales Joe Dillon. "For almost 20 years, Lenore has proven that she knows the game business and, most importantly, that she understands the needs of distributors and their customers."

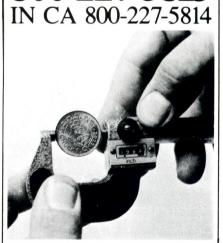

Mistakes are as certain as death and taxes

e've known since we were small that there are two things in life we can count on: death and taxes. But there's something else just as certain, but we don't talk about it as much. It's that we all have and will make mistakes. It's inevitable. If you think you are an exception, forget it, because you will make a mistake, guaranteed.

There are different degrees of mistakes, from talking about your coworker before finding out he's standing behind you, to forgetting to do something vitally important. And just as there are numerous types of mistakes, there are also different ways of handling those mistakes. Some ways are obviously better than others.

Do you remember the last time something went wrong and you knew all too well that it was your fault? What did you do? Was it fairly easy to blame someone else? After all, if someone else would have reminded me, not left work early, or not left more work on top of what I was doing, the mistake wouldn't have happened. Of course, you know in your heart of hearts that it wasn't their fault. But if you could just convince those around you, you'd be off the hook.

Boy, it is really easy to blame someone else. Just think, there are millions of people in the world. But that's a little extreme. There are at least a handful of people you work or live with. They're all perfect scapegoats. I remember a recent incident when I blamed my son for losing my keys. When I realized I'd made a mistake blaming him, it wasn't very easy to admit I'd made a mistake.

And that's the point I'm coming to. Once we realize we've made a mistake, we sometimes find it too difficult to get those two little words—"I'm sorry"—out of our repentant mouths. Why is that? Maybe it's the times. We're all looking for perfection in our health, bodies, kids, spouses, jobs, etc. Admitting to mistakes is like confessing that we aren't perfect, even though everyone else already knows it anyway.

I believe that no one can be as mad at us as we can be at ourselves. Even the smallest mistakes can send us reeling with guilt and anger-at ourselves. Surely this is the major reason for not wanting to own up to our mistakes. Our industry is unique in some ways because it's small and we deal with many of the same people on a regular basis. There are also unique opportunities to make mistakes. A manufacturer comes out with a game that he feels will revolutionize the industry. It bombs and the company realizes it made a mistake. What an opportunity to handle a situation. They can blame operators (they aren't smart enough to know a good game when they see it), blame distributors (they didn't try hard enough to convince their customers how good it was), or blame the players (what do they know anyway?).

Although rare, I've seen manufacturers admit a game wasn't up to snuff and then offer a replacement kit to those that bought the original game. Admitting their mistake and then doing something about it gives them a lot of credibility. I'd feel pretty confident about dealing with them in the future.

In our end of the business—a trade publication—you can be sure that there will be times we make mistakes.

Perhaps it's spelling someone's name wrong, having a typo in an ad, or publishing the wrong date for an event. We'll admit our mistake and try to make up for it; it's all we can do.

But we all run across that horse's hindquarters that can't let it go. They will hold a mistake against you forever. No matter what you do, no matter how sorry you are, they will not let it go. If you can honestly say that you have done all you can to make up for your mistake against them, forget it. You can hope for the day that they make a mistake and are treated as unfairly. Don't worry, it will happen.

Last month, Reader's Digest ran an article, "When You've Done Wrong" by Mary Murray. I wish I could reprint the entire article, but since that's impossible, here's a few pointers mentioned for handling the inevitable mistake: air the details because it may take more than a quick apology; show your true feelings and don't be too reserved in your feelings; don't look for excuses like blaming someone else; make restitution if necessary; and give a nod to fate and forgive yourself.

But the most important, positive aspect of handling mistakes, according to the article, is that it will make you stronger. Ms. Murray quoted William Shakespeare from "Measure for Measure": "They say the best men are molded out of faults, and for the most, become much more the better for being a little bad."

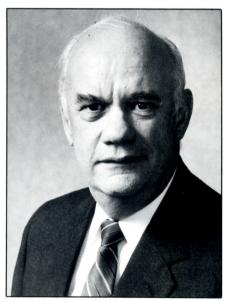

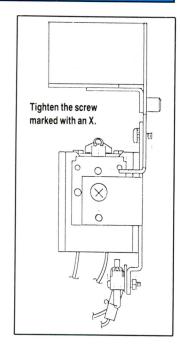

Symptom: The up/down ramp doesn't always come back down.

Solution: Check the rampup switch to ensure that it is closed when the ramp is up. If the switch is functioning properly, check to make sure that the coil bobbin screw on the latching mechanism is secured. A limited number of games did not have loctite applied. We suggest you tighten and loctite the bobbin screw on your next maintenance service call.

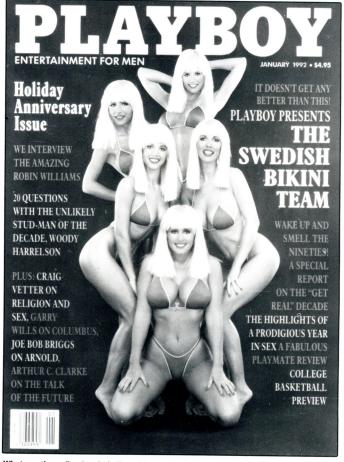

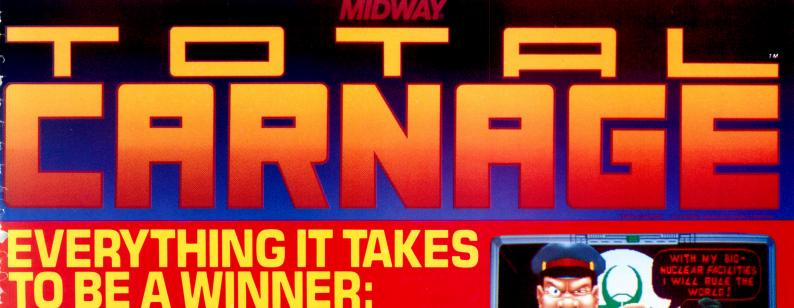

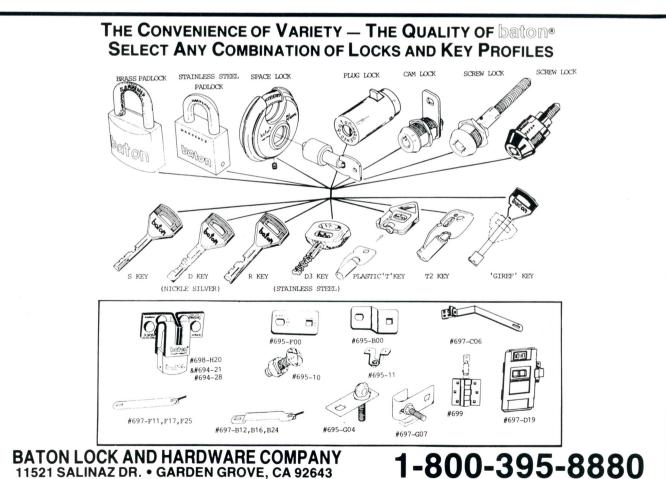

New York cigarette, video lottery update

Ralph Ceraldi, president of the New York State Coin Machine Association (NYS-CMA), reports that a temporary restraining order has been secured against New York City to prevent it from enforcing a tough cigarette vending ordinance. The law, which went into effect Jan. 1, bans cigarette machines from all locations except taverns, and there they must be 25 feet from any doorway.

The restraining order expires on or about April 1, at which time a decision will have to be made as to the ordinance's future. The city asked that the restraining order only be extended to those involved in the litigation—members of AMOANYC—and a judge granted

the request.

On the video lottery front, Senate Bill 7030 has been filed in the New York Legislature. Assemblymen Stafford and Velella are the cosponsors. The bill calls for the state to receive 25 percent of the revenue initially, with it going up to 33 percent later. Allowing operators to have a larger percentage at the outset will help them pay back the cost of the VLTs more quickly.

"We tried to do things a little differently than other states," Ceraldi said. "Many states announced everything they wanted to do right from the start, but we decided to keep things quiet. The idea was to get legislative support first, behind the scenes, before introducing the bill. We've gotten a lot of positive feedback from legislators so far. When they tackle the budget and see how desperately the state needs money, it should work to our benefit."

Edison Brothers Mall Entertainment, a division of Edison Brothers Stores Inc., has named Andrew Hanshew and John Hayes assistant vice presidents. Both are divisional sales managers for the Time-Out and Spaceport family entertainment centers.

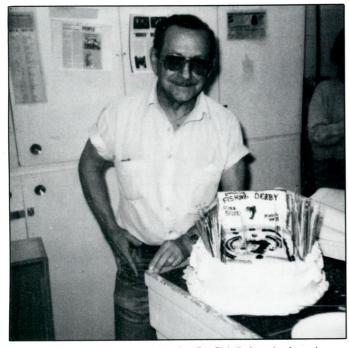
AMOA nominates officers

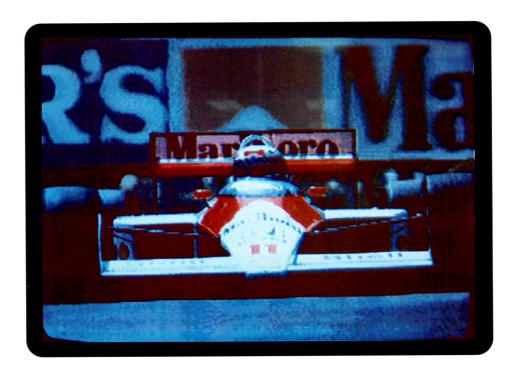

Puritan goals not practical

erhaps we have our Puritan ancestors to thank for our hang-ups about gambling. Or maybe its roots are to be found in religion, although bingo games flourish in church basements. How can we embrace one form of gambling and refuse another? I'm plainly perplexed at the double-standard.

Why the uproar over video gaming when most states already offer several gambling choices, such as the lottery, horse racing, and dog racing? Folks, this is gambling. Elderly ladies walking knee-deep in pull-tabs at charitable bingo halls are gambling. They're not playing just for the heck of it. Everyone wants to win: that's why they play in the first place. Lotteries dangle those million dollar jackpots before us to sell tickets, not for humanitarian reasons. Just because lotteries have existed throughout history, long before electronic poker games, doesn't make them any less a gambling forum. If the goal is "no gambling" on moral grounds, then eliminate all forms of gambling and let's be done with it.

The gambling issue aside, here's another topic of national and local significance: the goal of a "smokeless society." Commendable. One of the first plans of at-

tack to reach this goal appears to be imposing restrictions or outright bans on cigarette vending machines. That way, no teenagers can get their hands on those cancer sticks, right?

Statistics prove that teens have easy access to cigarettes. Although posted signs in C-stores and groceries say "No cigarettes sold to minors," this is clearly not enforced. Teens can sneak them at home if their parents smoke, or get them from friends who have parents who smoke. If teens want to be "cool" and imitate what they consider to be adult behavior, there are easier ways than searching out cigarette vending machines that are not located in places where teens usually congregate.

If we really want to do what it takes to achieve that smokeless society, attack the problem at its roots: outlaw growing tobacco, producing cigarettes, marketing them. End of temptation. Not so fast; the powerful tobacco lobby in Washington, D.C., would stop that move in its tracks. It's impractical. The tobacco industry would disappear, meaning lost jobs and a catastrophic impact on the economies of tobacco-producing states and companies founded on cigarette production.

It's easier to look at cigarette vending machines and tell ourselves that teens will be saved from cigarettes if only those blasted machines weren't around. Once you are no longer a minor, you play in the major leagues. Adults who jeopardize their health with cigarettes can get them any place they want.

Restrictions on smoking in restaurants and on airplanes has not turned smokers into nonsmokers. It's only limited the time and place for smoking; the habit persists. Despite all available information, a conscious choice is made to bet against the odds that smoking will damage your health. The thinking is: "Ill be the one who's not affected. I might give up all the things I like and be hit by a truck tomorrow."

I haven't heard of any efforts to restrict the placement of vending machines that dispense chocolate candy bars, to help achieve the goal of a "cholesterol-free society." Also commendable but impractical. Vending machines aren't the problem; their elimination is not the cure.□

the middleman

ost companies adorning our front cover are proud to display their latest product or top personnel. While Williams would have no problem finding either of these assets to feature on this month's cover, the company chose instead to give credit to its distributors, who get far too little praise for the challenging job they do.

Williams has a long, rich history spanning nearly half a century, when the legendary Harry Williams began the tradition of superior pinballs. Through changes, growth, and maturing, Williams has maintained its reputation for games that generate money for operators.

But as Joe Dillon, vice president of sales, is quick to point out, "That's not really the story here. What we want to focus on is the tremendous job our distributors are doing in these tough times."

Dillon reminds us that distributors in the United States have a very tough, demanding job. They are the middle in what sometimes seems like a tug-of-war between operators and manufacturers. They must be best friends with operators and also the manufacturers' confidants. A distributor's job is to give sound advice to his operator customers and be able to answer their questions honestly, fix their games, offer the best product available, and stock thousands of parts.

The distributor must also must

be the conduit between the manufacturers and operators, two groups who often don't see eye to eye. It's a tricky role, one that requires constant attention. Dillon explains that Williams has been trying to work with its distributors, going back to what he calls traditional distribution. "We chose distributors that are well-capitalized, have adequate service capabilities, carry most of the major lines, and have good reputations. We have supported them, and the real story here is the way they have supported each other by doing things right."

Dillon continued, "Williams' support includes extensive testing before a game is released. Distributors have four weeks to test the game before committing with orders. That way, we are basing our production on orders, not, as some others do, basing orders on what they have to sell. Our belief is that the market is helped by not forcing bad product on an unsuspecting industry."

An example of this philosophy was acted out with a game called Trog. It was introduced with much fanfare and hype at one of the shows. However, after further study, Williams realized that the game wasn't quite up to standard, so it was not introduced as planned.

Williams prides itself on its design teams, who have been together a long time. Dillon gives high praise to Ken Fedesna, who was vice president of engineering before being promoted to vice president/general manager. "Ken knows the ups and downs and the ins and outs because he's been there. He deserves a lot of credit for the tremendous job he has done at Williams."

Dillon added, "We're proud to be an American company dedicated to making good games for the world market. Our design teams challenge each other, know the American market, and are experts at what makes people want to play games. We focus on what we know. We wouldn't presume to design a pachinko game for the Japanese market, for example, because we don't know and haven't lived that market. Similarly, it's this very reason that many Japanese games don't make it here: the designers don't really know the American market.

"We've got the people to design the best product possible, but we need the middleman. If we were suddenly faced with no distributors, there's no way we could establish quality relationships with the thousands of operators across the country. No one expects to deal with Ford Motor Co. if there's a problem with their new car. No, they would call their local dealership and expect satisfaction. Distributors are the same vital link in our industry. We salute those gallant men who value the industry and who have worked to make it better."

Can video meet changing global market needs?

n videoland we've truly entered the arena of the world market, where the stakes are high and the battles are as fierce as those portrayed by the games themselves. New competition from

home units, and a host of economic changes, are the furnaces forging a more dynamic marketplace. Reading Alvin Toffler's book "Power Shift" helps grasp the structure of the changing global market.

Almost every game was a hit in the early days of coin-op video. But it was true for only a few years. Since then the industry in this country has pulled in its horns and become more conservative.

Let's start at the beginning with *Pong*, a game that would herald the dawn of a new age and a new industry. In 1972 Nolan Bushnell fathered this new phenomenon. He started us down the

road to the industry as we know it today. Bushnell is still a powerful force for the advancement of interactive computer products.

Pong rapidly led to a series of games with improved graphic and audio capabilities. The makers of these early games went as far as available technology could take them. The primary points of concern seemed to be better graphics.

smoother action, and improved sound, often pursued without considering if the games were fun to play or not.

"As early as 1970, when American business leaders still thought their smokestack world secure, Japan's business leaders, and even the general public, were being bombarded by books, newspaper articles, and television programs heralding the arrival of the 'information age' and focusing on the 21st century. While the end-of-industrialism concept was dismissed with a shrug in the United States, it was welcomed and embraced by Japanese decision-makers in business, politics, and the media. Knowledge, they concluded, was the key to economic growth in the 21st century.

"It was hardly surprising, therefore, that even though the United States started computerizing earlier, Japan moved more quickly to substitute the knowledge-based technology of the Third Wave for the brute muscle technologies of the Second Wave past.

"Robots proliferated, sophisticated manufacturing methods, heavily depending on computers and information, began turning out products whose quality could not be easily matched in the world markets. Moreover, recognizing that its old smokestack technologies were ultimately doomed, Japan took steps to facilitate the transition to the new and to buffer itself against the dislocations entailed in such a strategy. The contrast with General Motors and American policy in general could not have been sharper."

Games of today

Graphics and programming in today's games are interrelated and stored in solidstate computer memory. The games use silicon-based graphics, which means the images are held in memory IC chips that are programmed at the factory. The IC chips contain the 1s and 0s that represent the pictures. These numbers must be processed by the unit's computer chip(s) before they can be displayed on the game screen.

This is where we find the main limitation of standard systems. The computer chips can either make pictures that are very detailed (and move slowly), or

images made of little squares of color that appear coarse (and move rapidly).

These problems can be overcome with very fast computers and high speed memory arrays. Solutions are expensive to develop and manufacture. These chips have, by nature, several limitations and create games which are difficult to upgrade in the field.

New laser disc units

Current games using some of the potential of available technology include Betson's Mad Dog McCree and Who Shot Johnny Rock?, Leland's Dragon's Lair II, and Sega's Time Traveler. All employ a laser disc player for the graphics. In Dragon's Lair II the graphics are real animation from the disc player. Kramer's trivia game *Vision Quest* has the latest disc player; new discs are promised every six to nine months.

All of the above games still use only a small percentage of the power locked in the systems. The manufacturers did a very good job in unknown territory, but there are alternatives that offer exciting advantages for the future. The real level of results that can be achieved with this media has not yet been approached. With better techniques in video, and the ability to put programs on discs (such as the MagicVision system), possibilities are overwhelming.

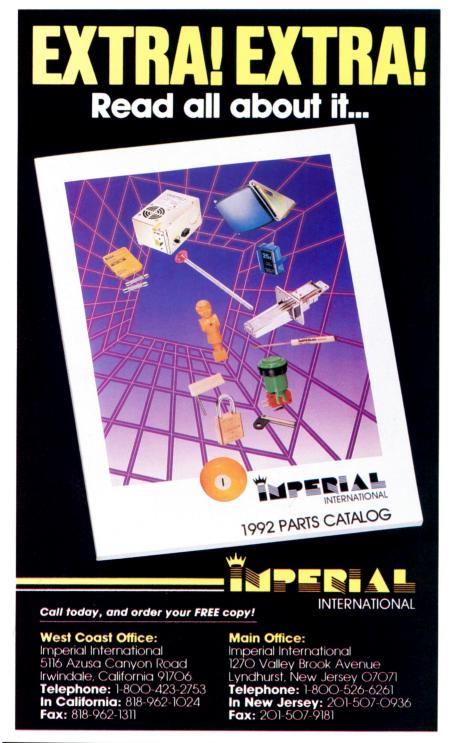
The use of a graphics storage system that does not require image processing from a computer will improve graphic ability in both speed and resolution. The laser disc, as a video source, can produce real-time graphic results with a television-quality picture. This video source requires of the computer only that it be told which point on the disc to play from. The computer then makes the variable images such as shot marks, scores, etc. These visual effects are the ones produced in response to the player's actions.

"We've entered the arena of the world market, where the stakes are high and the battles are as fierce as those portrayed in the games themselves."

What lies ahead

With the use of a laser disc player as the primary video source, you can make each single event in your game have a beginning and an end. Then you provide on disc, as parallel islands, all the possible outcomes. If this process is thought through clearly you can utilize a single scene several times in the same game.

You can also use still frames that increase usable disc space. In this way the computer sees each single action or set of actions as a block. It then stacks these

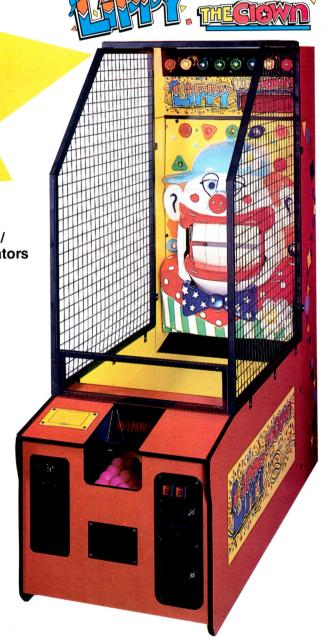

blocks in a new order each time the game is played. Also possible: a game with variable levels of play to accommodate the novice, as well as the expert, and everyone in-between. The benefit is that your player will neither be confused by a high level of difficulty, nor figure out the game quickly and become bored with it. The longer the playing time, the more money you make.

When using a laser disc player you can employ a cost-effective video source, such as an Amiga toaster or a MacIntosh animation package. Speed is no longer a consideration when you use the laser disc. It will take slowly produced graphics and play them back at real-time speed. There is even a new board which allows direct translation between MacIntosh and Commodore. This means an economic use of high-resolution graphic images moving in realtime, and programs from both sources.

The other computer graphics you need can be inserted into the

laser disc picture before it reaches the screen. These are small and can be easily generated in realtime by a cost-effective computer board. With the proper considerations for formatting the disc and writing the program, the net results can be beyond all current arcade equipment.

There's even a unit that contains the entire program on the video laser disc itself. This will have no effect on either the video or the audio quality. These systems can contain dozens of standard video games on a single disc, or a game of real-time NTSC (television picture standard) video/graphics/program. Upgrading is achieved by changing the disc and cabinet artwork.

Projected costs for these new single-piece systems is very low. They will include the computer, laser disc player, and video and audio components as a self-contained, stand-alone unit. The only missing items will be the monitor, front panel, coin/bill acceptor, and cabinet. The result: a

complete and upgradable unit for an amazing price. I predict this to be the largest growth segment of the video game industry in the immediate future.

With a blend of high-resolution graphics, real video, proper formatting, and good programming, you can attain unparalleled results. Utilize the technique of video masking (covering part of the primary video image with an image taken from the disc's video and held in memory until needed) and you can use the same set of video events in both one- and two-player scenarios.

The technique can also be used to make games that are easily linked with minimal programming and interfacing considerations. Combine it all with a few other techno-tricks and a *truly fun game scenario* and you could have a rash of hits on your hands. Designing successful games—it's a dirty job, but someone's got to do it.

Lazer-Tron's rise to the top

he concept of Lazer-Tron began as an offshoot of an electro-optical engineering project conducted at San Diego State University by Bryan Kelly and Jorge Fernandes. The result of this project was Lazer Maze, a lazer interactive technology product. which allowed players to run through a darkened maze while shooting laser guns at targets along the way. The goal: to be the player with the fastest time through the maze. The response was enthusiastic when Lazer Maze was introduced during SDSU's homecoming festivities. As a result it was nationally televised on MTV and ABC.

With the success of the project, Bryan and Jorge approached Bryan's brothers Mark and Matt in 1987 to design, market, and produce similar products. The Lazer-Tron Haunted House became their first collaboration and was introduced in 1989 at the IAAPA trade show in Dallas. Production began soon after on the large, 15-gun amusement park and carnival-style shooting galleries.

Although the units were impressive and fun to play, minor

design flaws soon surfaced. The inexperience of the personnel was blamed, considering the oldest was just shy of 30 and the others were in their early 20s. Admitting their inexperience, they'll tell you that at their first ACME show in Reno, Nev., they had never even heard of a ticket dispenser!

But they didn't give up and viewed this as a challenge. The game was redesigned and new manufacturing processes were implemented, resulting in a trouble-free production unit.

To implement the improvements necessary and expand the company, Norman Petermeier was brought on as president in 1989. He had the experience necessary in electronic design, manufacturing, and management. Under his leadership, the Shuttle Launch was introduced in 1990 and has continued to be successful. Located in many miniature golf courses and family-oriented spots like Chuck E. Cheese, it has been Lazer-Tron's bread and butter product for the last two years.

In 1991 Lazer-Tron developed Hop-a-Tic-Tac-Toe and licensed it to Data East. It's been accepted as

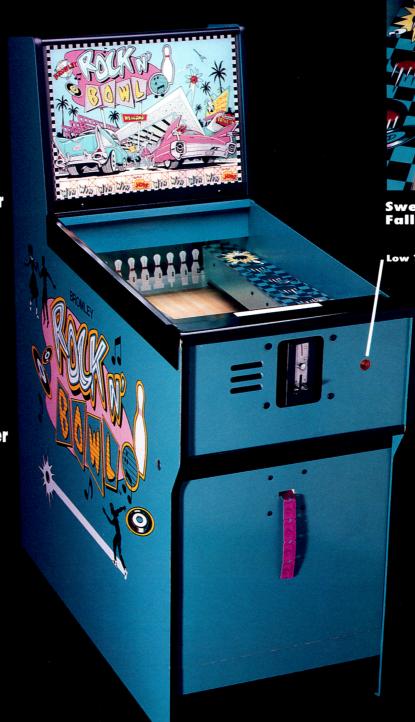

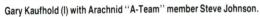

What this column is all about

irst off, let's get one thing straight. I've heard that many people don't read game reviews because they claim that the manufacturers have "bought and paid for" them, insuring favorable and enthusiastic reviews. I can't speak for anyone else, but as far as this weasel is concerned, it's a lie! I write about video games because I like video games.

It works like this: I go out into the world and visit arcades that feature new releases and test pieces. I call Valerie and tell her what I've seen, liked, and want to review. Valerie says, "Wonderful! Do whatever you want to because, in my eyes, you can do no wrong!" [Although my memory is not what it should be, I don't remember putting it exactly like that!...Ed.] Then I call the manufacturers and ask for as much information as possible. Sometimes the game is only on test and they ask me not to say anything about it yet, so I don't. Sometimes an on-the-ball P.R. person will call and invite me to preview an upcoming title and meet the team responsible for the product. This is great but does not insure a favorable review. Of course the really-on-the-ball P.R. people only show me what they know I'll like.

On rare occasions, Valerie will suggest a game that I may not have heard about. I check it out and if I think it's lame I tell her that I'd rather not review it. I don't like giving bad reviews—they're no fun for me and they're certainly no fun for the manufacturers. In a worst case scenario, where I can't avoid reviewing a game that's not my style, I at least try to stay objective about whatever good points the game does have.

always reliable earners, so what makes *Grand Prix Star* a contender? First of all, the graphics are so pretty that they're downright distracting. The side-by-side, two-player cabinet features an attract mode that utilizes both monitors to display cinemascope-like images. The scenery along the three championship circuits (Germany, Monaco, and Japan) is lushly textured, and keeping your eyes on the road as cotton candy clouds go

Bought and paid for? Not bloody likely! And do you know why? Because I'm not just a weasel, I'm a gentleman. Because I've got standards and principles. (Does this sound bought and paid for yet?)

Tried-and-true formula aside, even I cannot dismiss *X-Men* so easily. First of all, there is the ability to play any one of six, yes six, Marvel mutants—Cyclops, who blasts enemies with his optic force beam; Colossus, who changes his flesh to steel for virtual invulnerability (but still gets pretty soundly thrashed); Wolverine, possessor of an unbreakable adamantium ske-

leton, retractable claws and a pen that even writes upside down: Storm, the mysterious African princess, who controls the weather with just a thought (she must live in Chicago); Nightcrawler, the former circus acrobat with an understandable fear of fishermen; and Dazzler, the beautiful actress who blinds opponents with her pearly white teeth (Cut it out!...Ed.), er, I mean who converts sound into sonic light blasts. Their mission does it really matter?—is to find the kidnapped Professor X and wipe out Magneto and his evil mutants.

cellent and for what might possibly be the first time for me, the characters actually seem to be responding logically to my commands.

Example #3: The distributor's gambit

they fly from room to room, opening and closing doors and even materializing from out of the toilet. Tickets are dispensed during the game according to score.

This is really a neat little game and one that does not suffer by being an obvious Ghostbuster derivation.

Example #4: Schwing!

Namco's Starblade-Starblade has been out for some months now. but I've only just had the opportunity to play it. Sell my guitars, I've gone to heaven! This is it! Playing Starblade is like being part of the best special effects sequences in the "Star Wars" trilogy. This has got to be the smoothest, most breathtaking use of 3-D polygon technology outside of a multimillion dollar military flight trainer. Using quadrophonic sound and a 42-inch, parabolic mirror to

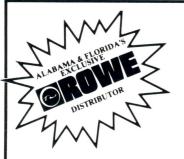
enlarge the actual 25-inch monitor display, Starblade envelops you in nonstop spacefighter action.

Climb into the gaudy but comfortable sitdown cabinet and you become the U.G.S.F.'s top gunner aboard the flagship "Geosword". From the very moment you launch, you are under constant attack by the forces of the mechanized planet Red Eye. Remember the scene in "The Empire Strikes Back," where the Millennium Falcon winds its way between massive star destroyers and leads enemy fighters through an asteroid field? Well, wake up, it's your turn! Suddenly they break off and hyperspace back to protect their home planet. You give chase and must punch your way through Red Eye's vast defense system to destroy the planet's power reactor. Every hit you take depletes your

shield energy and rocks your seat with a surprisingly convincing subtlety.

The only fault I can find with Starblade is its "greased rail" approach. You don't actually fly your ship, its vectors having been preprogrammed so that you can concentrate on shooting up everything in sight. You're basically riding shotgun through the magnificent illusion of endless space, colossal spacecraft, and wave after wave of totally awesome enemy firepower. What Starblade lacks in depth of game play. it makes up for in its dramatic presentation. Only the new Virtuality system could possibly hope to outdo the technological achievement on display here.

Neutral state looks at VLT situation

icture the scene: a man and his family settle into their theater seats on a Saturday evening to watch the controversial, yet heralded film, "JFK." Ten minutes into the movie his beeper goes off. The emergency: a dollar bill jam in a jukebox. He immediately leaves the theater to handle the problem.

This is not a typical businessman. This is a coin machine operator who knows that neither he nor his location can afford to have that jukebox down for the duration of the movie. He does what the rank-and-file in the industry do best—provide entertainment and service at all hours.

Can the state find employees with the same interest to administer a state-run video lottery program? Employees who know what it's like to deal with location owners and game players? Employees who properly display and promote the games, penetrate the market, and provide a thorough follow-up?

The scene at the opening of this article is not fictitious. It really happened to Chris Wilson of Sound Entertainment in Phoenix, Arizona. Wilson also serves as

president of the 10-year-old state association, the Arizona Coin Machine Council.

Arizona is in the minority as far as video lottery is concerned; there is no effort underway to pass legislation favoring legalized video gaming. The state association has no war chest, but recently hired a lobbyist to monitor any pertinent legislative activity.

When asked about Arizona's pulse on video lottery, Wilson

said, "Right now our eyes and ears are wide open. We have a lot of long-term operators who have colleagues in other parts of the country. We don't have a particular agenda right now, but we want to be prepared. We don't want to be blindsided."

Arizona's legislature reconvened on Jan. 13 and heard a bleak State of the State speech from Gov. Fife Symington. He wants to reduce taxes and free up some

money, but it means cutting back on a number of budgets for state departments. Arizona is in the same predicament as many other states: it's time to tighten the belt and it's not an appealing proposition. The scenario is a familiar one of increased taxes and decreased government spending. The search is on for the least painful way of balancing the budget.

Arizona operators want to stay tuned with video lottery developments. "Iowa and Oregon got our attention last year," commented Wilson. "We need to know what's working, where and why. If video lottery came to pass we'd like an opportunity to participate."

Wilson feels that Gov. Symington is for small business, saying, "He understands that viable

chine. The state doesn't operate vending machines or pool tables. If the reason behind sole-source is management, then operators would have to adhere to the same safeguards and controls the state would employ if they operated the machines. If a state wants background checks, we welcome them."

What does Wilson have to say about that old notion of the coin machine business being unsavory? "The checks we mail for sales taxes, county taxes, state taxes, and income taxes aren't considered unsavory. If someone thinks there's something shady going on, and a George Raft-type character from the movies will break their knees, then we welcome them to come in and pro-

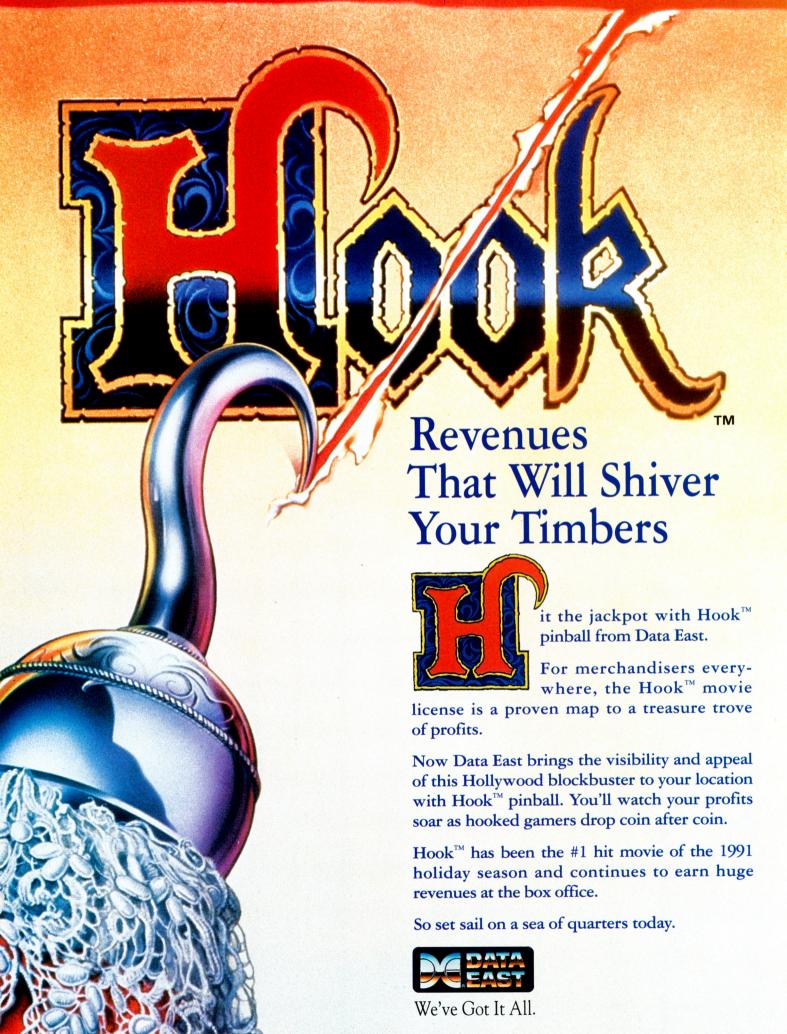
small businesses need to exist and that we must attract more of them. A sole-source situation in any state means one segment of commerce would slap those ideals in the face.

"What scares us as operators," continued Wilson, "is any solesource arrangement. We feel this is an end-run around an operator's market. Why would states want to put coin-op gaming equipment in taverns when they didn't want to do that with Pac-Man? We're concerned that a solesource situation would cause our amusement game revenues to fall right off the chart. When an operator spends \$4,000 for a video game, and the state puts a poker game next to it, I have a pretty good idea of which game patrons are going to play.

"A video gaming device is a coin-operated amusement ma-

ve it. We don't operate that way. We fix our machines and stick to our agreements with locations. We have implied or written contracts and provide equipment that works. If we don't perform, we're out of business.

"We don't make phenomenal amounts of money. We are impacted by interest rates and the economy the same as anyone else. Some of our locations have gone out of business because of the recession. The fact remains that there are new pieces of equipment coming out all the time. We have to decide which ones to purchase. The operators who get the accounts and keep them are the operators who don't 'over promise' and 'under deliver.' We're just business people. There's a demand for the products we provide. Tavern owners don't want to recover pool tables or program

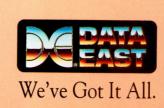

jukeboxes. We provide that service. We're 100 percent service.

"If video lottery comes in and coin machine operators can't participate at a financial level profitable for operators, locations, and the state, then regular video games will become the buggy whip of the '90s. Perhaps states considering sole-source should check with the local better business bureaus to see which types of businesses have more complaints. Are coin-op companies in that number, or are used car dealers, body shops, gyms, and spas?"

There's no doubt that our industry has an image problem that needs to be corrected. Said Wilson, "Whether video lottery is on the table or not, education is important. The perception some people have of our industry is not always accurate. An AMOA Expo or ACME is a pretty good indicator that this is not a back room, greasy business."

Arizona has been a very conservative state, one with significant growth levels in the '60s and '70s. That growth has tapered off. Copper and cattle were once the mainstays; now electronics and tourism represent a significant part of the state's commerce.

Citizens who wish to find gaming equipment can find it just six hours away in Las Vegas, Nev., or four hours away in Laughlin, Nev. It is unsure if the political climate is such that legislators would embrace additional gambling activities since there already is a state lottery, dog and horse race tracks, and games on Indian reservations.

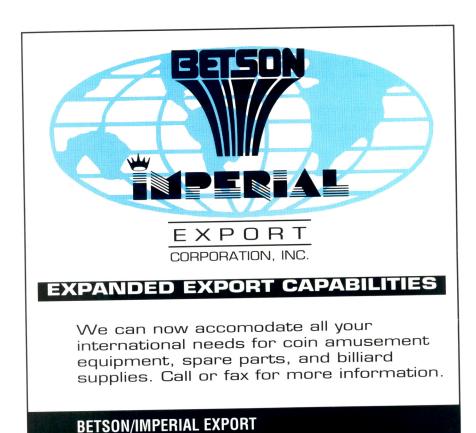
"It depends on the extent you want to raise revenues for the state," said Wilson. "There would have to be a lot of soul searching. Whether you call it video lottery or not, semantics aren't going to change it. It's video gambling. If the electorate thought it was a pill worth swallowing to gain revenue, then the Arizona Coin Machine Council would like to have the option to be a part of it. If things never change in Arizona it would be fine with everyone. If things do change, we'd like to be invited to the party.

"Every state could use the revenue from these games. Each state must decide for itself. Right now the Arizona Coin Machine Council has an agenda that includes keeping track of how we are being taxed and licensed. We want to have a good working relationship with each other and the

state. Let's not give the state any reasons to throw stones in our direction."

Wilson conducts his daily business in the same straightforward manner he approached the VLT conversation. The man who left "JFK" for a jukebox jam is also the man who searched out a CD copy of "Auld Lang Syne" on New Year's Eve to fulfill a very late location request.

"This business can't be run on an eight-to-five basis," explained Wilson. "It's not a transactional business where you don't see the buyer or seller again. It's a labor intensive service business. We have a close, ongoing relationship with our clients. You meet a lot of nice people in this business." We just did. Thanks, Chris. □

Pac-Man stops production at nearly 100,000 units

ould you believe that it was just 10 years ago that Nintendo was making plans to move from New York to its present Seattle location? It had only 22,000 square feet of space ready for the move, with another 30,000 square feet in the works. Mr. Arakawa was optimistic about Nintendo's future. He had these prophetic words about home games, "We are thinking of home video, but have no particular plan yet." The company was readying its first two coin-op games to be introduced at AOE.

Roger Sharpe wrote an article titled "The Spotlight's on Video and All is Not Well." In it he talked about how the industry was coming under intense scrutiny because of video games. And it was not all favorable, as we were

all finding out.

Time and Newsweek said video games heralded a revolution that far surpassed anything that had ever occurred in the history of the industry. Ronnie Lamm, a mother and president of her PTA, hit the airwaves on the Phil Donahue and Today shows with a crusade to get rid of game rooms completely. She tried to convince the world that video games were dangerous for children and that there were serious sociological concerns as well.

The top videos appearing on Play Meter's Equipment Poll were Donkey Kong, Stargate, Ms. Pac-Man, Galaga, Tempest, Centipede, Pac-Man, Frogger, Qix, Defender, Kick-Man, Mousetrap, and Omega Race.

The top pinballs on the poll in-

cluded Haunted House, Centaur, Black Hole, Eight-Ball Deluxe, and Elektra.

In other news 10 years ago, Bally received the Supreme Court's decision to remand the City of Mesquite vs. Aladdin's Castle case back to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals; Midway was granted an injunction against 25 companies, restraining them from using, buying, or selling copies of Pac-Man, Rally-X, and Galaxians; in a New York Times story, Midway's Stan Jarocki said that Pac-Man production had ended at 96,000 units and nearly 30 companies had signed licensing agreements for the familiar character; Bally/Midway also broke ground for its new headquarters in Franklin Park, Ill.; AMOA set up a committee to study gray area games; Centuri joined the ranks of video game companies offering their games for the home market; a proposal to ban coin-op games in a small Connecticut town was disposed of after a public hearing, when 300 people showed up protesting the ban; and Chuck Arnold was named president of Bally Northeast Distributing.

New products introduced in the April 1982 issue were *Got Ya* and *Dambusters* by Game-a-Tron, *Devil Fish* by Artic, *Space Duel* by Atari, *Robotron 2084* by Williams, and *Zaxxon* by Sega. □

otential video poker machine owners in Louisiana attended a trio of operator/distributor briefings on March 10 (Shreveport) and March 11 (New Orleans and Baton Rouge). International Game Technology sponsored the event for its Louisiana distributor, Delta Gaming (an affiliate of Imperial Trading Co.). The briefings were designed to shed light on the central computer system and ticket validation equipment used in the new legal video gaming program.

IGT was awarded the central computer system contract for Louisiana in January. The system will

link up an estimated 25,000 video poker machines in nearly 5,000 locations. The program is set to start on July 1.

IGT speakers included Bob McMonigle, executive vice president of sales; Kit Hall-Johnston, director at large; John Baker, systems operations manager; Walt Hawkins, regional sales manager; and Kerry Reppert, sales manager (video sales). Also on the agenda were John Georges, president of Delta Gaming, and Frank Lopiccolo, president of South-West Utilities.

Among the topics covered were

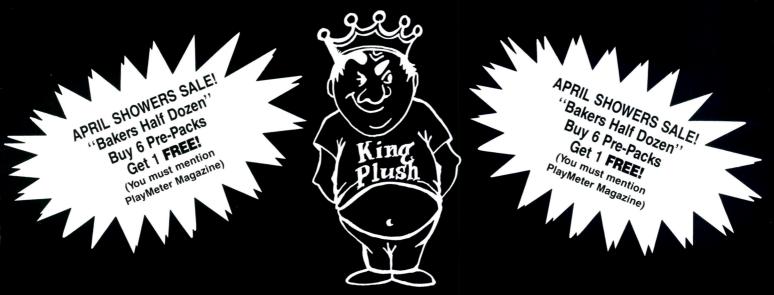
the bid process and system overview, installation and maintenance of equipment, phone line requirements, and both the location control terminal (LCT) and the clerk validation terminal (CVT).

The La. State Police, the regulatory body for the new program, at first required a ticket validation system but later made it optional. Although many coin machine operators in the state feel that fraudulent tickets will not be a problem, the state police wants the most secure system possible. The CVT is seen as the best method of protecting the device owners and

In simple terms, here's how the system works:

The central computer will be located at La. State Police head-quarters in the state capital, Baton Rouge. The computer will "dial-up" or poll video poker machines daily across the state for data on all

game activities (money wagered, tickets paid out, etc.).

The computer communicates with the machines through a modem at the computer front end. It connects to machines in the liquor-licensed establishments via regular voice telephone lines—one dedicated line per location used only for this purpose.

The phone line connects with either the LCT or the CVT. The difference is that the LCT is required

to communicate with the central computer. It stores data but is not interactive. The CVT validates tickets and provides daily activity summaries (accessed by a key that rests in the care of the device owner). The central system will provide printed reports for device owners, but not on a daily basis.

As Baker explains it: "There are no hello's or how-are-you's. Just give me your data, goodbye. The CVT stores all pertinent data until the prime controller asks for it. The computer knows the address and serial number of each machine, type of game by manufacturer, and game choices on each machine. All this data is available to the device owner at the CVT." According to Baker, no special phone lines are needed. The line is only used when the computer front end talks to the machines, otherwise it is dead. Polling takes only six to eight seconds.

"The CVT is seen as the best method of protecting the device owners and locations from sophisticated photocopied tickets, altered tickets, or tickets issued on machines other than those in an establishment."

Baker also discussed the fiber optic cable, which is required in the IGT system. All IGT machines and other manufacturer's machines will use fiber optic cable. Although more expensive than conventional copper wiring, fiber optic is lightweight, requires no soldering, does not pick up static, is flexible and easy to work with, and is immune to electromechanical interference. It was noted that certain ceiling

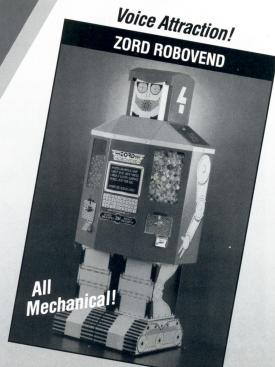

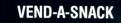

configurations may dictate the use of glass cable.

Lopiccolo's detailed the video poker network service offered by his company, South-West Utilities. South-West recently completed installing thousands of on-line Lotto game terminals for the Louisiana Lottery. He encouraged operators to deal with experienced phone line contractors. For their part, South-West stands ready as a resource for coin machine operators in the state. It's not too early to make arrangements for phone line installations.

Hawkins then demonstrated the CVT, which measures 16" long by 7" high and weighs 10 pounds. Said Hawkins, "It's a small box of hitech wizardry. It not only validates tickets, but indicates any problems with the machines, from printer to touch-screen to open doors." When the alarm goes off the location knows there's a problem instantly. The CVT constantly validates tickets; other data can only be obtained by the device owner with the key.

Louisiana operators must purchase either an LCT or a CVT for each location. Up to 64 machines can be connected to either unit. Pricing until June 14 is \$475 for the LCT and \$595 for the CVT. After

June 14 pricing will be \$495 for the LCT and \$795 for the CVT.

The LCT and CVT are being priced at manufacturer cost, says IGT. An ample supply will be available at all distributorships in the state. The first shipment is expected to arrive by May 1. A 90-day warran-

ty comes on both products.

Said Reppert, "We think the CVT is to everyone's benefit and want to keep the price low for the initial period. We have to be pro-active. We should all want nothing but the most secure system."

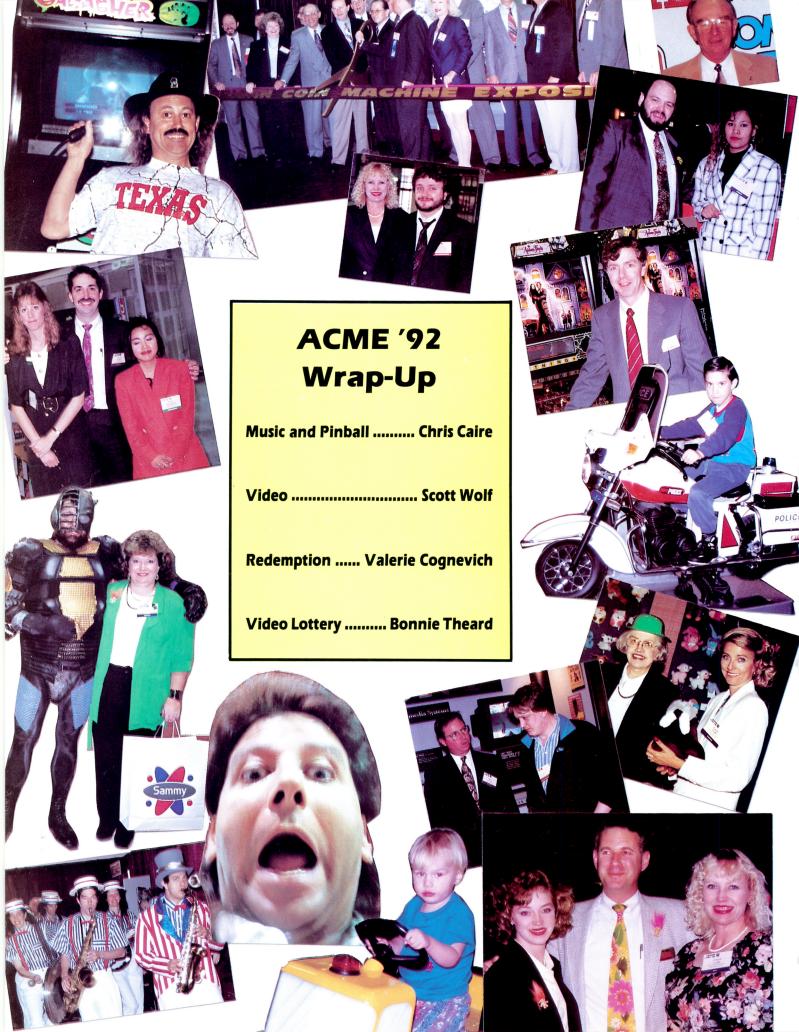

It all came together for a fantastic show

he ACME show, sponsored by Play Meter Magazine and AAMA, was held in San Antonio on March 15-17. The ninth largest city in the United States was a pleasing host for this annual event, which drew nearly 6,000 attendees. There were a record-setting 770 booths holding more than 210 companies.

Route operators grumbled that there were not enough street pieces for their typical locations. They said they felt slighted by the dominance of redemption and the larger arcade games. There was a subtle shift from shows held for the past decade that were rated simply by how good the videos were. This show was dominated by redemption equipment, the goodies to go with them, and perhaps to a lesser extent, video lottery equipment. In fact, the two highestattended seminars were on redemption and video lottery.

Operators knew going into the show that Capcom would be showing its newest *Street Fighter II*, *The Champion Edition* video. One exhibitor said that he would probably be directing operators over to the Capcom booth.

Operators gushed over the new pinballs. One operator said he never thought he'd be around long enough to see pinball this popular again. Even though South Dakota, Montana, and Louisiana are the only states approved to legally operate video lottery machines, many others are involved in the the lengthy process of seeing a bill passed. Over a dozen companies had their video lottery equipment on display.

Redemption and Novelty

Over 40 companies offered redemption and novelty games for all age groups. Redemption games ran the gamut from haunted houses to ducks, and many used ping pong balls. There were more ping pong balls on the ACME show floor than at a ping pong tourna-

ment, used to knock down, hit, fill up—you name it.

Those who have predicted the popularity of redemption were certainly right. Nevertheless, there were those who questioned the feasibility of getting into it. "I'm a video game operator basically, and I'm not even sure how to go about getting into redemption," noted one operator.

Another pointed out that this is a common complaint and that there are many operators who would get into redemption if they just knew how. "You never get enough education on the subject," he said. "With redemption it's a whole new ball game. You're in the retail business and you have to learn that business. You have to watch inventory, know how to dispose of used tickets, and many other things not a part of operating games."

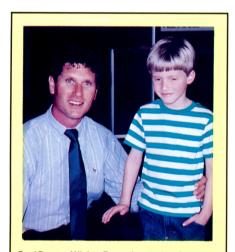
One New England operator pointed out that in the next two years the country will see the lowest number of teens than it's seen in a long time. The video game industry depends primarily on teenage males that simply won't be there. In that case, he added, operators will have to find other ways to fill the void. How? They will have to cater to the younger

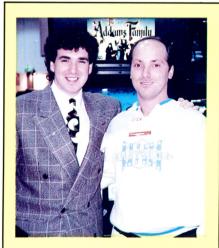

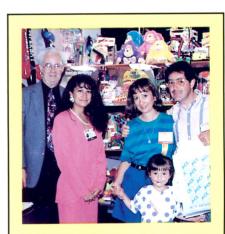

and older groups of players.

Pool, darts, music, video poker games, and countertops are the drawing power for the older, more mature player-they always have been. Kiddie rides have provided the very young with quite fun entertainment since the first penny horse ride. But now there's a need—no, a demand—for another category of entertainment, which could very well be filled by redemption. According to statistics, there were more babies born in 1990-4.2 million—than there has been in 28 years. These babies are being labeled the second baby boom, and as was the case after World War II. society will be catering to these boomers. Our industry will watch them grow and must be prepared to meet their entertainment needs.

Adults and children will be playing together more than ever in amusement centers catering to a family experience with inexpensive entertainment. There's a delicate balance in providing both parents and children entertainment while providing a value. The focus today is on the recession, a shaky economy, and saving money. Looking for that little extra has become the great American pastime. Winning a prize or redeeming tickets is a value-added consideration. Offering fun, exciting equipment may not be quite enough anymore. Offering your customers something in addition is an attractive proposition.

There was a healthy selection of redemption pieces aimed at young children, for those a little older, and even some designed with adults in mind. Smart Industries' *Big Bertha* or *Buddy Bear* appealed to children, while receiving an approving nod from parents. You couldn't have been too young or too old to

take a thrill in watching the hefty lady devour balls and gain 25 lbs. for each one. Young and old alike chuckled when her dress popped up, revealing her yellow bloomers. *Buddy Bear* played a pretty good game of catch and talked to you besides.

For the very young, Fabtek showed a game developed by Partec called *Jungle Jogger* that had the attention grabbing graphics adored by kids. The company also showed *The Farm Yard*, a ball-throwing game decorated with adorable farm animals. It was designed by Dave Stubben, a former design engineer with Atari.

dicensed goods are sizzling. Characters from cartoons, movies, TV, music, and sports were at nearly every booth."

Other appealing kiddie games shown were Froggy, Ol' McDonald, and Cat 'n' Mouse from Coin Concepts; The Simpsons Cupcake Contest from Bromley; Can Alley from Bob's Space Racers; The Great Frog Race from Meltec; Barnyard Babies, a version designed by Skee-Ball for kids; and Quackers, a rolldown with ducks, and Dino Roll, with dinosaurs, from Seidel Amusements.

If you're old enough to remember the allure of the so-ugly-they'recute troll dolls, then you weren't surprised to see them resurface on *Troll* from Exidy. It's bound to be an attention-getter wherever it's placed. Apparently, the munchkins are making a comeback all over. *Melody Mouse* from Coastal, with cute, appealing graphics, challenges players to get consecutive tubes filled with falling ping pong balls.

For the not-quite-as-young generation, perhaps pre-teens, there were some enticing offerings: Fireball from Alter Enterprises, Circus Rolldown from Bay-Tek, Sidewinder from Bob's Space Racers, Shooting Star from Bundra/Adastra, Robo Bop and Crazy Clown from Coastal, Wacky Gator from Data East, Hungry Hungry Hippos from I.C.E., and Cracky Crab from Namco.

Then there's games for adults. Sega had a fascinating game called *Speed Shot*. The player controls either a red or green LED light with a track ball. When the ping pong ball lands in the lighted spot, the player hits the shoot button, propelling the ball toward his competitor's goal. It seems to have all the appeal of air hockey or foosball, but with a technologically advanced flair. This would be ideal for parents and children to enjoy together.

I.C.E. has a tremendous hit with *Putting Challenge*, which brings out the best golfer in each of us. The course changes and the challenges get tougher. Some other games that appeal to adults were the pitching games, of which there were several variations. Adastra/Bundra's version challenges players to hit a lighted number on the back wall, and Na-

tional Sports Games' *Pinch Hitter* offered a game on a playfield with correct throws.

Bromley Inc., the company that has given us remakes of popular games like *Ghost Town* and *Rock 'N' Bowl*, tantalized us at the last show with a prototype of *Hawk Avenger*, affectionately referred to as "The Helicopter Game." It's finally finished and looks like its appeal will be universal, from young to old.

Many redemption games have a common attraction with the concept of interaction. Rather than standing still, as you would a video game, some redemption pieces encourage interaction with others or the game itself. Lazer-Tron, the company that gave us *Hop-A-Tic-Tac-Toe* and *Bank-It*, offered a selection of interactive games. *Haunted House* and the newest *Vine Climb* offer a competitive challenge to players.

The show floor was alive with operators asking pertinent questions about getting into redemption and seeking advice from those already established. One redemption veteran had these words of wisdom: "If you are considering redemption, you can't expect to do business the same way you are now. To be successful you must do research and attend as many seminars as you can. If you pick up just one idea or advice about equipment, you'll agree it was well worth it."

Redemption Merchandise

What's hot and what's not in plush and redemption merchandise? The answer depends on who you ask. Nevertheless, as evidenced by the wares shown by the plush and redemption merchandise firms, there most definitely are

trends in merchandise.

The most obvious? Sports! Sports! And more sports! Seasonal sports items, like sports cards, are definitely hot. Several firms-Asahi-Seiko USA, Grayhound Electronics, Play Ball! Cards and Novelties, and Smart Industriesare marketing dispensing units to vend cards directly from games. Many of the merchandise supply companies are selling the cards and related items. A.L.D. Services is marketing a special "Sports Pack," and Prizes! has a separate division called Sports Caps with helmets stuffed with card packs for cranes.

operators may be tempted to look at pricing only. That's not a good philosophy."

Larry Morris of Laramie Interests says, "Licensed sports in plush or redemption is a must." David Katz of Bonita Marie agreed, adding that his firm will localize its sports items for the nearest professional team.

Another trend is toward bigger, softer, and more expensive. Acme Premium's Jack Kelly said his customers are looking for retail quality plush. "They want name brands like Applause, Dakin, and Ross Berry on the label." King Plush's Patrick Klasno predicted, "The 25 cents per play crane will

soon be history; 50-cent and \$1 jumbo cranes will be the standard."

He added, "We are selling more jumbo mixes than we are standard ones. That wasn't the case six months ago." Laramie Interests' Larry Morris echoed this prediction: "High-end plush is needed as a teaser in any crane mix if you want to maximize revenue."

Licensed goods are sizzling. Characters from cartoons, movies, TV, music, and sports were at nearly every booth. There were "Terminator 2," "Wayne's World," "Beverly Hills 90210," "The Simpsons," and major league sports teams on a wide assortment of items. However, Jack Kelly of Acme Premium said his company is moving away from licensed products. He explained, "Generic items like trolls can be in as much demand and offer more merchandise for the money, since no licensing fee is involved."

Electronic goods are proving to be popular for mid- and high-end redemption. Headphone radios, clocks, boom-boxes, telephones, and TVs were shown by firms like RMK, who specialize in electronics and add-ons to the product line-up of companies like Bonita Marie and Acme Premium.

David Katz of Bonita Marie gave this advice for buying crane and redemption merchandise: "Be conservative; no one—not the redemption supplier or redemption center owner or operator—knows for sure what will appeal to the player. Buy a little of any one item, and if it moves, buy more!"

Video Gaming Equipment

Before ACME '92 started it was dubbed "the Louisiana show" because Louisiana operators would have their first chance at

hands-on experience with legal video gaming equipment. While other states struggle with stalled legislative efforts, Louisiana looks forward to start-up on July 1.

Eight months have passed and machines are not yet in place. The process of passing legislation may take as long as four years. Even after success is achieved it takes about a year for the structure to be in place, rules and regulations to be formulated, games to be approved, and background checks to be completed before licensing begins.

Although the law establishing legal pokers was signed on July 30, 1991, no machines have been allowed in the state for demonstration. Trade shows, direct visits to factories, and scouting trips to Montana and South Dakota have provided the only access to the machines. Many Louisiana operators have done all three.

In addition, smart operators attended every meeting or hearing related to the proposed rules and regulations, sending their comments and suggestions in writing to the La. State Police. Seminars hosted by distributors and manufacturers maintained the enthusiasm and afforded valuable data.

"The more informed the better," said one Louisiana attendee. "That's why I'm here. I can't afford to miss a scrap of information. Now I finally have the chance to sample the games for myself at my leisure. Questions that accumulated can now be answered."

And what are those nagging questions? For starters: which games will be the most popular, and is touch-screen or button the way to go?

Said one Louisiana service entity: "Most pokers are basically the same. The important factors are service and dependability. We can't compare Louisiana to South Dakota or even Las Vegas. It's a different type of player. We don't know which games will have the most player appeal. The player will dictate which machines will be most popular."

"If operators would take as much time trying to run their current businesses as they are worrying about getting into video poker, then the whole industry wouldn't be so down."

Many operators may be tempted to look at pricing only. "That's not a good philosophy," said the same individual. "A few hundred dollars more at the start may mean the difference between staying in business a short time or a long time."

How many different manufacturer's machines will an operator buy? The answer hovered at two. "Some people will hit it lucky with the first type of machine they put out, but who knows?" was one comment.

Then there's the sticky dilemma of choosing between casino-style or upright machines. Several attendees felt that the casino models have the greatest eye appeal and really look like something new in a location. Location and patron preference, if researched beforehand, will help determine the models purchased.

There is a bit of controversy raging over touch-screen vs. button model machines. "Some people just love to slap those buttons," said one manufacturer. "Some of the older players will want that same sensation with the new equipment."

In South Dakota the touchscreen models appear to be leading the pack in game revenues. Apparently, players make a quick adjustment to touch-screen with no problems. It's a faster game and experienced card players like that aspect. It's no secret that the company with the first touch-screen models has the biggest market share in South Dakota. Most manufacturers offer both button and touch-screen models. There are no instances of touch-screen games in South Dakota being replaced by button models. It could be compared to CD jukeboxes-touch-screen representing the wave of the future.

One Southwestern Louisiana operator said he wanted to go with touch-screen models in all his locations, citing the dismal prospect of having a competitor offer touch-screen machines while his locations didn't have any. "Go with the most advanced technology possible," was his credo. "Offer the locations and players the best equipment you can. This applies to all areas of our business, not just video poker games."

A touch-screen company's representative put it this way: "The other aspects of speed, etc., are nice. But the two most important elements to consider are game revenue and multiple game flexibility. If Louisiana operators choose the wrong machine they will have an upgrade problem. If they choose the right hardware they know they can easily upgrade."

All manufacturers showing video gaming equipment reported high interest at their booths, noting that many attendees made the rounds and came back for a second look. All these interested parties are not from Louisiana alone. Increased interest in video gaming around the country has created a heightened awareness of gaming and all its implications.

Not everyone was happy with all the hurrah over gaming. Said one Midwesterner: "If operators would take as much time trying to run their current businesses as they are worrying about getting into video poker, then the whole industry wouldn't be so down."

This view was shared by another Midwestern operator. Recounting the time already expended away from his company in pursuit of legal pokers, he said, "We have a vending business to run here too. We can't lose sight of that fact."

In Wisconsin, where media reporting on a proposed video lottery program has released the proverbial "can of worms," the matter has simply turned ugly. A Wisconsin operator said regretfully: "I personally think we'd all be better off if it was never proposed in our state."

A Southern operator said it's no longer a matter of taking a neutral position. States starved for rev-

enue are looking into video gaming and if operators don't get active it might pass without their input. Oregon's state-run program will not escape the notice of any entity looking into video gaming.

An even more pessimistic view was expressed by a distributor in Illinois: "Video lottery could spell the end of the industry as we know it. It's not the same as operating other games, no matter what anyone says."

Many companies not normally producing video gaming devices had a prototype unit in their booths. One operator was decidedly confused and alarmed, stating, "Everyone and his brother is making a machine and that scares the hell out of me. There will be a lot of operators who will get burned on equipment."

Other questions on the minds of attendees were: Where will all the manufacturers be in the next five years? What are the company track records? How do the companies handle old customers who don't represent new sales? Are we going to be "sold" and abandoned?

The "me too" syndrome is reminiscent of the crane explosion in the mid-1980s. Where are most of those companies today? How about all the companies that made telephones or condom vending machines?

Aside from the evaluation of manufacturers and product, one vital fact remains: the push for legalizing video gaming is in full swing. State governments have made a decision to consider underwriting gaming. The numbers generated from this adult form of entertainment cannot be ignored. Coin machine operators have to fight to be a part of it, calling attention to their contributions to their communities and proving themselves worthy of inclusion.

Considering the difficult task at hand, and the need for a unified effort, it seems an odd irony that many state association-sponsored efforts are fragmented. Sometimes the problems start within an organization itself. Said one showgoer: "If operators in a state can't work out their own differences, I'd like to know how they think legislators feel about their ability to run a multimillion dollar video lottery."

Considering the emphasis on video gaming, it was not surprising to see a dramatic decline in amusement poker games on the show floor. Operators seriously pursuing legalized video gaming are advising their peers to get out of the gray area games and concentrate on what they feel is the future of the business.

Pinballs

Ah, pinballs. Like cats and broc-

coli, operators either love pinball machines or hate them; there is no middle ground. Many gush that pinball is in the midst of a renaissance, excitedly declaring that there's never been so much good product available. Others poohpooh that notion, pointing out that their older pins earn comparably to newer ones—why spend the money? And please, can we talk about the constant breakdowns!

Compare, for example, the following statements, made about the same game within the span of 20 minutes:

"The Addams Family is my number one pin on location right now. Before that, it was Terminator 2. I never used to be a big fan of pinballs, but they're outearning all but my best driving games. I have no choice but to buy them."

Then again...

"I'm not buying *The Addams Family*. I take that back; I have bought one. But I placed it beside a *High Speed*, and after two weeks they earned almost the same. I'm not saying it isn't a good pin. Let's just say I can do without it and all the other licensed pins the manufacturers are giving us."

Most, though, shared the opinion of the first respondent. The Bally pinball from Midway Mfg. has earned well for the majority of operators polled. Designer Pat Lawlor says *The Addams Family* is so loaded with features that it's able to do well long after the film has left theatres.

"The tie-in with the movie gets players in there for the first few weeks after its release," he said. "Then you'd better have a darned good game if you expect it to earn weeks and weeks later."

Williams' The Getaway: High Speed II, a Steve Ritchie game, was described by more than one operator as "solid." Said the owner of a pinball-laden arcade, "It's no T2, but how many of those do you run across? I expect The Getaway to be a solid earner—nothing record-setting, but no dog, either. Players will be attracted to the 'Supercharger' feature most of all."

A West Coast operator was more enthusiastic: "I *love* this game! If I didn't know better I'd think he designed it just for me. I predict it will do very well out here."

Data East Pinball brought its licensed movie tie-in *Hook* to ACME '92. The company has been actively pursuing licenses for its games, and it's paid off—for them and operators of their pins. In fact, Data East Pinball has broken all previous company sales records with *Hook*, reports design director Joe Kaminkow.

"We're just doing better with each pin," he said. "I think people are starting to recognize the innovations that we've brought to pinball: the dot-matrix on *Checkpoint*, the music in *Back to the*

Future, the solid-state flipper. We're really excited about our future." (The future, by the way, is Lethal Weapon, which was previewed in the Data East suite.)

Getting back to *Hook*, this operator quote was representative of most: "I like the fact that Data East has been tying its games in with a license. They seem to catch the player's eye more than a game without one. *Hook* follows a string of good Data East licenses, and I hope they keep it up."

Premier Technology introduced Operation Thunder at ACME. Feelings were mixed: "It's not as strong as Surfin' Safari. I'm not sure if I'll buy any," said one operator. Another, though, was more complimentary, saying, "I've got some locations that would probably embrace a pin like Operation Thunder. I've been giving Premier another look lately. They've been on the right road with Cactus Jack's and Surfin' Safari."

Premier will enter the licensing fray with its next pin, *Super Mario Brothers*. We'll feature it in the near future.

Lastly, Alvin G. & Co. (the "G" stands for Gottlieb, by the way) debuted a game that borders on the pinball/novelty categories. Called A.G. Soccer-Ball (A.G. Football for the European market), the two-ended game features head-to-head competition, though a single-player mode is available. A female respondent called it "loads of fun," while her gender-opposite competitor labeled it "a nice departure from conventional pinball machines."

An operator said the price needed to be brought down before he'd buy *Soccer-Ball*, but another said it was "where it should be." (Do

operators agree on anything?) Whatever the case, production for the game is set for the end of June.

Table Games

One doesn't look to the table game category for "what's hot," because here it's steady, long-term earnings that count, not flash. Those strolling the aisles of ACME '92 in search of solid product, however, didn't leave disappointed.

Valley Recreation Products continues to offer operators a varied choice of billiard tables with the Cougar ZD-4, The Leopard, and Bumper Pool. Dynamo does likewise with its Dyna Pool bumper, standard Dynamo Pool Table, and the top-of-the-line Excaliber. American Shuffleboard checked in with its Bumpa Pool and Classic (as well as the line of shuffleboards), while Great American Billiards, a new coin-op billiards company, made its debut with an attractive table.

The company with the most unique table, though, was 8-Pocket Right Angle Billiards. The table is shaped just like the name says, with eight pockets in heretofore unseen positions. For those afraid that it might not fit through location doorways, the company has a model available that allows the portion jutting out to be removed.

Imagination Leisure showed an improved *SST* air hockey table; it now comes with over-the-top scoring. The company also exhibited its *Super-Bowl* bowler. Dynamo's standard and deluxe air hockey tables continue to draw operator bravos, and it covers all bases with the Dynamo soccer table. Stella International again showed its glowin-the-dark *Disco Taifun* air hockey.

Tornado Table Soccer exhibited its tried-and-true *Tornado 2000*

foosball table, while Imperial International offered operators its long-time *Premier Championship* soccer table.

Finally, Williams displayed its high-tech *Strike Master* shuffle alley, complete with dot-matrix display and varied strike values.

Music

For you vinyl holdouts who've waited and waited for this "CD thing" to pass, it's time to throw in the towel and face up to reality: if you want to be a jukebox operator in the '90s, CD is the only way to go. Oh sure, you can still get your hands on 45 rpm boxes, and certainly some locations don't warrant a sparkling 100-CD beauty. But the jukebox manufacturers exhibiting at ACME '92 made it clear through their product offerings that CD is the road ahead; vinyl is a glance in the rearview mirror.

For those trying to choose which jukebox to buy, the decision can be daunting—especially with so much good product available. The numbers show that most operators have been picking the Rowe Laser-Star, and they chose it the "Jukebox of the Year" in Play Meter award balloting. But who knows why? Vice president of music Joel Friedman does.

"Our jukeboxes have the most presence, by far, of any on the market," he said. "They have the rapid title display and are userfriendly, which gets the customer to spend his money quickly. That's the bottom line—the cashbox. Our jukeboxes earn better for the operator than anybody else's. It's proven."

Other factors in the Rowe formula for success, Friedman says, are the jukeboxes' long-term reliability and profitability, the "great distribution network," and the attitude of not resting on the company's laurels.

"When you put all that together, you can see why this American company and this American product is growing in overseas markets, despite many of them having high tariffs," Friedman said. "Rowe jukeboxes are in 54 countries all over the world. Twenty-two of them were represented at a distributor meeting we had at the ATEI show in London. They know we're sincerely trying to build the best jukebox we can."

The latest entry from Rowe is the LaserStar CD Wallette, a smaller unit designed to work with a CD Hideaway or LaserStar CD-100. Friedman says it's already receiving a "fantastic response" from operators using it in truck stops, diners, and other such locations. As for future plans, Friedman hinted that Rowe is "working on several new products that will knock operators out."

NSM-America's booth featured a replica of a souped-up Indy car. Was it another vehicle-meets-jukebox creation from Paul Harmon, formerly of Carson City Mfg. and now with NSM? No, the "High Performance Machine" sign hanging over the Indy car referred to

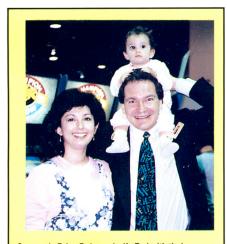

NSM's jukeboxes, which are loved by enough operators to place NSM-America in a solid second position behind Rowe in the U.S. marketplace.

"Operators are attracted to the 'Quick Change Artist,' the CD changing mechanism that changes discs faster than any other jukebox built today," said George Haydocy, NSM-America's national sales manager. "They also know that we stand behind our product. (National training manager) Keith White travels to distributorships all over the country to conduct service schools. So operators know that their distributors really understand how to service NSM jukeboxes.

"We're really excited about our growth. I see us getting more and more of the marketplace, and it's happening because of the quality product and the service to back it up. We owe a lot of our recent success to our distributors, who've been just fantastic."

NSM is currently marketing its 100-CD *Performer-Grand* jukebox, the first in an upcoming series of *Performer* models. Haydocy says that by this fall's AMOA show, look for the *Performer Classic* and *Performer Wall*, along with the "ES-V" system, a technological step up from the existing ES-IV. "This will all be part of the *Performer* family of jukeboxes, which will have different applications for an operator's varied needs," Haydocy said.

Pioneer Laser Entertainment exhibited its *CD LaserJuke* models, the *CJ-V99* and *V-77*. To attract operator interest in these sleek black beauties, Pioneer has gone incentive-crazy: zero percent financing, through Firestone Financial, on the purchase of any

jukebox before April 30. First-time buyers also get a free pair of speakers (a \$360 retail value), and those who spring for three or more boxes receive a free service kit.

"I was already close to buying a few Pioneer jukeboxes, but this makes my mind up for me," said one operator. "I think it's really nice of Pioneer to help operators out like that."

"Rowe jukeboxes earn better for the operator than anyone else's. It's proven."

PLE president Ted Karasawa says he's happy with the company's steady growth and present market position, considering it's only been in the jukebox arena for less than three years. "I'm pleased with a lot of the young, aggressive operators," Karasawa said. "They're the ones showing the most interest in our CD jukeboxes."

Pioneer's jukebox program with Burger King, begun last fall, has been temporarily suspended. A survey of franchise owners is being taken to see if they want to continue the program, which also involves a partial distribution of proceeds to Cities in Schools. The corporate-owned stores, on the other hand, like it and will continue onward. (Note: Rowe has a similar jukebox program with other Burger King franchise owners.)

One area that's ripe for explosive

growth, Karasawa feels, is Pioneer's *Laser Karaoke* sing-along system. There are 600,000 Karaoke locations in Japan, with 4,000 songs available; here the numbers are 6,000 and 1,200, respectively. He expects 16,000 total locations in America by March 1993.

After being absent at AMOA '91, Seeburg International returned at ACME '92 with a new management team and a new jukebox, The Skyline. The unit, a facelifted Seeburg Model D with assorted improvements, is available for shipping in mid-May. Mindful of Seeburg's recently sullied reputation, new president Tom Hacker is still hopeful that former Seeburg operators can be brought back into the fold.

"We're slowly coming back; our distribution network is being built again, and operators have come by the booth to check out the new Seeburg," Hacker said. "They're giving us another chance, and we're responding with what Seeburg has always done best: providing the finest-sounding CD jukeboxes in the business. There's definitely a niche out there for us."

The Skyline holds 60 CDs, and future models will offer a higher and lower number to give the company a varied product line, Hacker added. One operator summed up the Seeburg situation this way: "They were the first ones involved in CD jukeboxes, and they earned well for me until they hit that bad stretch. I'm willing to give the new guys (management) one more chance."

Wurlitzer's New York, NY continues to draw praise from operators, who are impressed with its beautiful rendering of the New York City skyline and the sound emanating from its six speakers.

Said one operator, "I hope Wurlitzer keeps giving us jukeboxes like *New York*, *NY*. Having good product, plus the fact that they've opened an office in New York City, makes me believe Wurlitzer is serious about competing in the American jukebox market."

Rock-Ola was the last jukebox manufacturer to produce a dedicated CD unit. The result, *Trilogy*, has been hailed by Rock-Ola adherents as being able to compete with the best CD boxes on the market. Said a particularly confident operator of Rock-Ola's *Trilogy*, "Close your eyes and listen to this box compared to a Rowe or an NSM. You'll pick the *Trilogy* every time."

Two companies also exhibited CD conversion kits for operators not wanting to buy new CD units. Digital Disc America has expanded beyond its regular conversion kit by now offering a hideaway unit called the "DJ 2000," to be teamed up with a wallbox. It boasts "the world's fastest music-to-music feature"; as one disc fades out, it's immediately replaced by another one. Flipping pages is another new option.

Besides the regular kit and the hideaway/wallbox, DDA has a dedicated unit called *Super Cougar*. It contains the regular CD kit, holds 100 CDs, and has flipping pages available.

The CD Jukebox Kit Co. debuted its new 50-disc conversion kit, complete with programmable pricing, bookkeeping functions, attract modes, the ability to program out unwanted songs, and a 12-month warranty on the CPU and disc player.

Finally, Hot Hits' Bill Guler announced that his company now has pop and rock discs available. A

new 14-song disc will be released every six to seven weeks, with country discs coming out every month.

Darts

Valley, Arachnid, and Merit, the big three of the dart world, displayed their newest products at the show. Valley Recreation took the occasion to introduce the new Cougar Wall Mount, which offers all the same quality components as the company's free-standing games. Features include the T-60/30 target; American size target standard (interchangeable with the International size); Valley's selectable, patented double bulls-eye; nylon target segments: and high quality matrix that accepts any soft tip dart up to 30 grams in weight. In addition, there's overhead scoring with fourplayer Cricket standard, 16 game selections, and multiple dip switches for operator-controlled options.

Arachnid offered a host of units, most notably its *Galaxy* darts with DartMan II software that sorts and calculates all league information recorded on the game. Features include a super "spider" with thin-rib construction, square entry holes, flush surface, and missed dart detector. The game also allows the

retrieval of league information through a modem.

Merit Industries showcased its *Scorpion* darts, a unit that incorporates the company's Solo Challenger feature, which enables the player to compete one-on-one against the game's built-in challenger with four selectable skill levels. *Scorpion* has a linear power supply, over/under cash box door, drop-down front service door, operator-adjustable options, and built-in diagnostics and bookkeeping.

All three companies feature an extensive lineup of dart games to suit a particular operator's needs. Newcomers to the dart league and tournament concepts will be happy to know that Valley, Arachnid, and Merit offer operator assistance in the start-up stages of new programs. Extensive written materials are provided, as well as onthe-scene help from field representatives.

Video Games

The name's Wolf, Scott Wolf. Some people call me The Video Weasel. Of course some people also believe that Dan Quayle has a functioning brain. It takes all kinds, I guess. Instead of a badge I carry a flimsy business card with the wrong address and phone number and rather than a gun I carry a ballpoint pen. OK, so I carry a gun, too, but it's only illegal if I'm caught.

Anyway, I found myself on assignment at something called the ACME '92 show, apparently a showcase for the latest in coin-op technology. One operator said that to be successful, you must be at the shows to see what is out there. Boy, did I get an eyeful, and I'm not just talkin' about the video games.

For those operators looking for video games to add to their street routes, there seemed to be a variety. However, comments from street operators seemed to indicate otherwise. It was obvious from comments that operators were searching the aisles for equipment that would last longer than they have come to expect from video games.

As was expected going into the show, Capcom's *Street Fighter II:* Champion Edition drew quite a bit of attention. And Namco made a huge impact with its larger-thanlife selection, from video to redemption. While major trade shows seem to be judged on video alone, this show had much more. Redemption overshadowed video. But many operators view redemptions.

tion as being out of reach for the average street operator. If you study the game listings, you'll see a healthy line-up of video with a variety of themes.

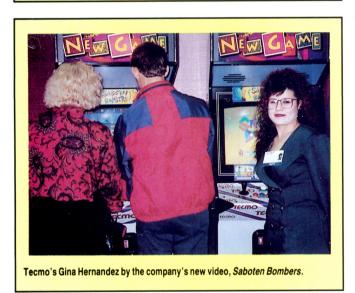

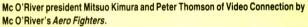

- Relief Pitcher—The Great American pastime. A 2-player baseball game viewed from behind home plate. Controls for each player include a joystick and 3-way "cluster" button. Very nice graphics.
- Road Riot 4WD—Now available as a Universal one-player kit, this proven off-road racer can now be fitted to virtually any driving game cabinet. A link kit is also available for head to head competition.

• Mad Dog McCree—An oldie but a goodie. Set in the old west, you must rescue the mayor or his daughter or something. Mostly you just get to shoot stuff.

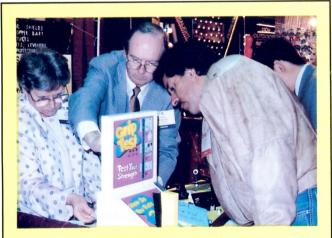

My redemption picks from ACME '92

wice a year Play Meter puts me on the hot seat to predict the redemption games that will emerge as winners from the spring and fall trade shows. As I return from ACME in San Antonio, I once again find myself on the hot seat (actually, I am in Seat 16C on a flight from Chicago to Newark).

First of all, let me predict that there was no one standout redemption game that will dominate sales during the spring and summer of 1992. There were, however, a few solid-looking games. Kiddie redemption was well represented, and it was the games geared for young players that impressed me the most.

Smart Industries' best-looking new game is called *Feed Big Bertha*. The player tries to toss as many plastic balls as possible into Big Bertha's mouth. The more balls you feed her, the bigger she gets. Children—as well as their parents—will enjoy winning tickets and helping Big Bertha get fatter and fatter.

Namco's *Cracky Crab* is another new piece aimed at the young crowd that looks to have play appeal. Namco developed *Wacky Gator* (marketed in America by Data East), and *Cracky Crab* looks like a natural follow-up.

Coastal Distributing had a new game by Harry Levy called *Melody Mouse*. Because the graphics are cute, it will have an immediate appeal to children. *Melody Mouse* is a true skill game. Players must release rolling balls at the right time to fill tubes. The better you become at timing the release, the more tickets you will earn.

Two other games are worthy of the "honorable mention" category. Data East showed *Lizzard Command*, a one- or two-player tank game. This piece has major presence and a good hands-on feel. National Sports Games exhibited a follow-up to *UB-QB* called *Pinch Hitter*. It is a pitching accuracy game that may have application in sports bars and redemption centers. The game needs more

work before it will be ready.

The final game on my list is Taito's Super Sonic Blastman. It was not new at ACME, but I ignored it last year when it was introduced. The collection reports on Super Sonic Blastman have proven me wrong. I should have listed it as one of the hits of the show last year—better late than never.

While at ACME I looked for new premium ideas as well as new games. Regular readers of this column know that I believe proper prizes are a vital element in the success of a redemption center.

One item that was popular when I was a kid (30 years ago) is making

a comeback: the troll. These gruesome-looking characters were in abundance. Ace Novelty had a wide selection—both big and small. They will make a popular redemption item and can also be used in your cranes.

Laramie Interests' display had several attractive redemption items. Little characters named Bobble Heads are available dressed in professional sports team uniforms (baseball and football). They have all the pro teams represented, and you can purchase an assortment or all one team.

If you want top-of-the-line plush

for your redemption center, Laramie has a brand called "24 Karat." These are the softest stuffed animals I've ever felt. Retail stores will get \$70 or more, but Laramie buys them as close-outs so that you can get these great premiums for less than \$20.

The booth that had the most action on the prize end of redemption was probably HMS Monaco. The film "Wayne's World" has become a mega-hit, and HMS Monaco has the movie's logo on buttons and

The Crank sizes up the show

his year's ACME in San Antonio, Texas, left me with two uncomfortable observations. The first was the lack of operators on the show floor. They either couldn't afford to come (San Antonio is not an easy place to get to), or they came but couldn't resist sightseeing for three days in this most beautiful city.

The economy likely had a lot to do with poor operator attendance, and besides, the distributor open houses will give operators a chance to see the best games anyway. At any rate, there were thousands of manufacturers and distributors on the show floor.

Secondly, it was quite evident that R&D money did not go into video but was instead put into redemption. There were many good new redemption games, but there were also a lot that should be put into a new category: "games with a ticket or card dispenser that operators should not buy." I may even print this list so as not to give redemption a bad name.

Here, then, are my game picks:

Video (dedicated): First place goes to Capcom's Street Fighter II, Champion Edition. These models were always being played, and there is little doubt that the game will be a good investment for the operator.

Konami's *X-Men* (six- and fourplayer models) is also outstanding. This game is earning tremendous amounts of money. Operators should get in early, as these big numbers will not last forever. As far as I'm concerned, that's it for newly released dedicated video!

Video (kits): This category was not very strong, but there are a few titles to watch and a few kits to update certain older games.

- 1. Atari's *Relief Pitcher* is a good baseball kit.
- 2. Steel Gunner 2 by Namco is a \$1,500 kit that goes right into Operation Thunderbolt.
- 3. Konami's *Turtles in Time* should do well this summer.
- 4. Pop Shot by Romstar is a \$1,000 plug-in kit for Operation Wolf, Operation Thunderbolt, or Mechanized Attack.
- 5. Keep an eye on *Total Carnage* by Williams, *Knights of the Round Table* by Capcom, and *Undercover Cops* by Irem.

System games: Fatal Fury and Mutation Nation on SNK's Neo-Geo look to be the best.

Sit-downs: "Big Disappointment." No, that's not the name of a game. I just ordered more Steel Talons and Final Lap IIs, because Big Disappointment—the new crop of sit-downs—are not worth buying. There was, however, a great sit-down game called Suzuki 8 by Namco. It's a linked GP Rider-type game that's way too overpriced for my checkbook, but I thought it was great for large arcades.

Pinballs: The Getaway by Williams is another great pin that follows such smash hits as Terminator II and The Addams Family.

Novelty: Betson's Space Pirate, the new software for Mad Dog

McCree, will give Mad Dog a shot in the arm for summertime, with more software to be introduced at AMOA. Sonic Blastman by Taito got a lot of attention, as did Sega's Speed Shot. I also liked A.G. & Co.'s Soccer-Ball, a two-player, at-the-same-time pinball.

Redemption: Before getting to the listings in my favorite category, I wanted to mention that over 30 manufacturers attended the AMOA Redemption Standardization Committee meeting at ACME. It resulted in more than 20 new standards for redemption games. I'll report on this in the next issue. Now, on to the new games:

Namco's Cracky Crab is expensive but looks and plays great. Pop-A-Slot by Coastal is a great variation on its Pop-A-Ball format. Other very good redemption games are Troll by Exidy; Coin Concepts' multi-rim basketball, Around the World; and Smart's Big Bertha and Buddy Bear.

Note that Doyle didn't show any new games, but of the dozen redemption games they always make, five are still rated very highly on my redemption chart: Hoop Shot, Pro Pitch, Batter Up, Bull Pen, and Lil' Hoop Shot. ICE's Hungry Hungry Hippo and Betson's Clown Around single-player pusher also rate high on my chart.

I hope that the above will help operators make the best buying decisions. As always...keep cranking!

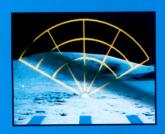

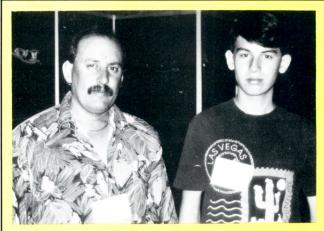

ince there has been a renewed interest in interactive games, we called upon Dr. Peretz to answer a few questions about them.

Why is there so much interest in human interactive entertainment?

Video game technology has been striving for reality. The latest systems, like *Virtuality*, create this reality. Unfortunately, the cost is prohibitive to most entertainment complexes.

Why are entertainment complexes interested in lazer games?

They all need a central concept to attract customers. Video game arcades have depended on miniature golf, go-karts, water slides. theme parks, and mall settings. These options, once innovative, are now commonplace and often lack the imagination needed to stir public interest. Lazer games provide something new that will draw people into a location. Systems like the one we have are affordable to most, while still creating excitement.

What type of facility should consider lazer games?

Our experience has shown that locations with a proven traffic flow of over 100,000 people a year make ideal places for this type of attraction. For example, our lazer attraction in Orlando is part of the Mystery Fun House complex that

also has the fun house, game room, gift shop, restaurant, and miniature golf.

There should be at least 1,500 square feet and at least a 12-foot ceiling. The rest is up to your imagination.

Can you give us a brief description of what type of lazer games there are?

Generally, there are two types: one in which the room is divided into two parts; the other has no restrictions in player movement. In the first type, there are teams on each side of the room. Neither team can cross the midline of the room. Each player hides behind barriers as he tries to deactivate the other teams' guns. When a gun is deactivated, it turns off. The player must then go reset his gun at his team's reset station. Resetting the gun gives a point to the opposing team.

In the second format, the lazer game is played in an open arena. There are no restrictions limiting opposing team players from interacting with each other.

Which type is best?

It all depends on the location. At Starbase Omega we use arena play. Since Orlando is mainly a tourist location, individual scoring is more efficient. We also found that the special effects were very important in that market. Our arena has a super-padded surface to create the illusion of space gravity. We also added a 12-passenger flight simulator (one we designed and built) as well as high-tech arena graphics under black lights and a time warp return tunnel.

On the other hand, there is a low budget, cost effective layout, which has simple barriers made of cardboard with interesting graphics painted on them.

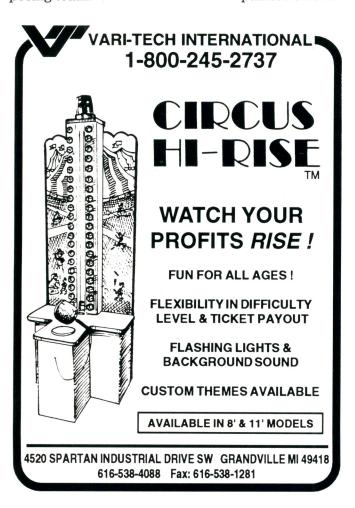
How does the lazer equipment work?

The lazer gun shoots a beam of light, visible and/or infrared. If the shot hits a target and/or target sensor, it scores a point in memory. In the more primitive systems, when a target sensor is hit, the gun is deactivated. To reset it, the player goes to a reset station, which reactivates his gun and scores a point for the opposing team. The score appears on a scoreboard posted in the room.

In the more sophisticated systems, the gun and target sensors record how many shots are fired, how many times a shot hits a target, and who shot the targets. This collective information is downloaded to a computer, usually after the game is over.

What should you look for when selecting a system?

Remember the concept of "keep

This type of system requires special building requirements. Stay away from systems that use head gear and vest packs because they create additional maintenance headaches and additional sanitation problems.

Select a system that has good visual appeal. When the lazer beam is fired, is it visually appealing to both the player and the opponent? Are the sound effects audible to everyone on the playing surface? Does the equipment allow the operator flexibility in game design? Does the equipment allow players to deactivate each other's guns? Does a deactivated gun allow for player reset or just a time

penalty feature, or both? Does a reset station give both team and individual points?

Is there a difference between a laser and a lazer?

A laser with an "s" refers to a light source that emits a beam of light, utilizing a specific wavelength that can be extremely intense. A lazer spelled with a "z" refers to a light source that is not actually a laser but creates the illusion of a beam of light resembling an actual laser beam.

How can an operator protect himself from buying the wrong system?

Talk to people who have purchased and have experience with any system you are considering. Ask them if it's dependable. How long does the battery charge last? How often must they change parts? Which parts fail the most? Who repairs the equipment and at what cost? What is the turn around time on having the equipment repaired?

What are the major problems in operating a lazer game attraction?

The more common problems are in the hardware, rather than the software. Be careful of products that have just hit the market and appear to function correctly. They haven't passed the test of time.

What are some common problems with most systems?

The cords connecting the gun to the computer pack fails; the access to replace a failed light source is difficult; the battery capacity and charging system is inadequate for a continuous 16-hour shift; the trigger assemblies do not hold up to normal lazer game use; the plastic casings do not last; and the electronics can't withstand the force of normal wear and tear. We have resolved these problems through experience, so we know that they are problems to be aware of with other systems.

What options do you need?

As many as possible. We've found that different locations have



different requests. Some want the equipment to keep individual scores, others want team scores. Some want to change the time of play or want reset stations and a stun or kill feature built into the guns. Still others may want the equipment to dispense redemption tickets based on scores. Just like dip switch settings on video games, we suggest the system you select have all of the above and more.

The best systems let operators create their own game play features. The game equipment should have a microprocessor that allows for operator flexibility and programmable sound options.

Now for the big question: how much do these systems cost?

Most systems offer the option of purchasing just the equipment, usually based on a minimum of 12 player sets. This set needs to include charging units for each player set and either a team reset station with scoreboard or an individual scoring station. The cost for this starts at about \$20,000.

Leisure Expo: a learning experience

ast year when Scott Rarowsky, president of Tourist Attractions and Parks magazine, asked me to put on a redemption seminar for a new show, Leisure Expo, to take place just two weeks before ACME, I was a little concerned. "How can you get people to come to another show?" I asked. Scott assured me that his "reader's response" cards indicated that there are many small mom and pop attraction owners and pinkslipped managers thirsty for knowledge about the amusement industry.

He explained that most of these people don't even know about AMOA, ACME, Play Meter, or our other trade publications, and are interested in seminars on go-karts, redemption, miniature golf, food concessions, and participatory play.

New shows like Leisure Expo help our coin-op industry. The expansion of businesses to include amusements, expansion of existing attractions, and building indoor entertainment centers all provide better locations to place games and improve the industry's image. This new breed is quick to learn.

The coin machine industry is one of the last mom and pop industries left. In the food and retail businesses, large chains are gobbling up most of the market share. People want to go to large, beautifully decorated restaurants and stores. This trend is also happening in our industry with chains like Edison Brothers and Aladdin's Castle. There are also rumors that several Fortune 500 companies are ready to take the plunge into coin-op operations in a big way. But for now, the entrepreneur has a chance of making a living with amusement attractions.

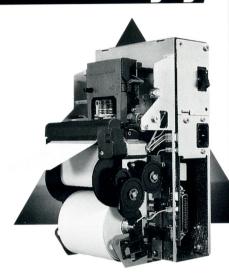

Gasoline Alley, and Jim Gallagher. Their handouts were exceptional and included a checklist for putting together a business plan to obtain financing, along with a demographics and revenue-

projection study. The redemption seminar also drew 250 people and lasted an additional two hours! John Margold of Betson joined me on the panel. I can't recall a seminar where the audience was that hungry for knowledge. The miniature golf seminar drew over 100.

Although there were just 80 exhibitors, they wrote quite a bit of business. Gordon and Jeff Smart of Smart Industries sold dozens of their new kiddie ball toss, Big Bertha, which I can already predict will be one of the top new redemption games. Joe Gilbert is back with a game called Ball + that dispenses tickets for throwing a baseball for accuracy. Bob's Space Racers and Lazer-Tron also did well. There were many exhibitors expressing an interest in exhibiting at other industry shows.

I also learned quite a few interesting tips at the seminars: community profiles, obtained from any town library, are very important to operators and can help in finding better locations for games; do not invest heavily in towns that only have one or two major employers; look for a community with a high average wage/hour pay scale; seek towns with high savings and deposit accounts in local banks; and get local schools to help you advertise your business by donating what they really need.

Another tip is when looking for bank financing, start with your third choice, so if you are rejected you can find out what additional information is required and what they didn't like about your presentation. By the time you actually see your first choice, you should have your best possible presentation and have a better chance of getting the loan.

Leisure Expo show manager Al Barry said that Leisure Expo II will be in Daytona Beach, Fla., January 21-23, 1993, a week before Super Bowl. As always…keep cranking! □

DEADER'S RESPONSE

We decided to zero in on what operators view as the most pressing concerns in the industry. It was up to our readers to answer the question posed or express opinions about whatever else is on their minds. We will periodically change the question but continue to invite you to tell us what you are thinking. We are counting on you. Your opinion counts!

If the shoe fits!

I've been in the coin machine business for about 15 years and I've got to get something off my chest. It is getting harder and harder to do business because many people ride their suppliers until they look like a swayback mule.

I may be in the minority, but I do not subscribe to the philosophy of "operate on the other man's money." If you can do that and stay within the understood terms—great. It's the people who ask for the cash prices and then ride you for 90 days to a year and still expect to retain a "good credit" status. In my opinion they deserve a "no credit" status.

I think everyone knows that standard "open account" terms mean payment in 30 days. That doesn't mean mail the check in 30 days. It means that the check should be received within 30 days. This should apply to manufacturers, distributors, and operators. Go to the number one retailer in the United States and see what kind of terms you get. Try to drive a new car off the dealership's lot without paying cash or signing a finance agreement. This industry is plagued by a few spoiled brats and poor managers.

Another eyesore in this industry is the constant lying you hear every time you call to ask where your part or game is. It seems too commonplace to simply tell a customer that the truckline picked it up yesterday, rather than being honest and saying you haven't even gotten it yet.

If you have to tell an operator that you don't know when a pinball will be in, why not say, "I don't know." If you have to tell a location that you don't know when you'll be able to bring out that new pinball, just say, "I don't know when it will come in." If you have to tell a distributor that it may be two or three weeks before delivery on that load of equipment, then say, "It will be two or three weeks."

Editors note: Boy, will this letter hit home with just about everyone. I'd like to add that even magazines can be included in the scenario. We offer incentives to those who pay for their ads within the specified terms. You guessed it—many take the discount and do not pay anywhere near those terms. Taking it to extremes, we have one customer who uses an advertising agency that waits nearly a year to pay and then boldly pays the discounted price! How would you like dealing with this character?

Thanks for telling it like it is. In your case, one lie can filter down and affect a great many people. I think we've just become so used to telling tales when things don't go like we planned that there's little chance for change. However, we can all hope!

Cellular phones can be a tax trap

ellular phones seem to be like mushrooms: they are popping up everywhere. If you're sporting one in your car or elsewhere, think of it as an automobile or computer. Why? Well, in terms of the tax law, those little telephones are subject to the same special depreciation and record-keeping rules. Here they are.

Cellular telephones are not eligible for accelerated depreciation unless they are used more than 50 percent of the time in a qualified business use. But you can use straight-line depreciation (five-year life) if you miss the 50 percent target.

No deduction is allowed, even if the phone is used for business, unless the business use is substantiated. No personal use, which would mean 100 percent business use, won't work either. Substantiation will make or break your deduction.

When an employee uses a company phone for business, the employee must pay tax on the value of the use unless the business purpose is substantiated. Be careful; this one is a double-edged sword. Suppose you don't provide your employer with the

necessary proof (substantiation). First, the employer gets no deduction for even the legitimate use. Second, you get socked with a tax on the value of the entire phone use

If you are willing to do it, this will get you home free: keep a diary of all the business use of your cellular phone. Mark down the date, time, and business purpose of each call.

Second tax opinion saves the day

The phone rang; it was a reader of this column (let's call him Joe). "I need a second opinion," he said. Joe had decided he was at the age (59) when his estate should be put in order. He and his wife Mary (58) had each just signed their own new will and trust agreement. Yet, somehow, Joe still felt uncomfortable.

I asked Joe a series of pointed questions about such things as his

business and personal), and copies of the new wills and trusts.

TWO FOR THE LONG RUN



Suppose Joe died first, before Mary. Here's what would have happened to his assets: his IRA, pension plan, and profit-sharing funds would have gone directly to Mary, since she is the beneficiary. The same goes for the substantial life insurance on Joe's life. All of Joe's significant other assets—the business stock, house, condo, investment stocks, and some other assets—are held in joint tenancy with Mary. If Joe was to die, Mary would own all of these assets outright, not Joe's executor or trustee.

Simply put, Joe's property would not have flowed through the will and then into the trust. Everything would go directly to Mary. First, it would be a tax disaster ultimately costing Joe's family about \$250,000 in extra estate taxes. Second, Joe's assets

would not have been subject to the protection of the trust.

Fortunately, we were able to change all that. The trust became the beneficiary instead of Mary. All the joint tenancies were terminated, and each asset was put solely into Joe's or Mary's name (or their trusts) as dictated by their objectives.

for many years, I've discovered they usually have three goals concerning these types of investments.

They want to save income taxes, reduce or eliminate estate taxes, and stay in control of the property for as long as they live. Naturally, they want all the income and wealth to stay in the family. It sounds impossible, but there is a way to get the job done. Follow these three simple steps:

- 1. Form a new corporation and elect S corporation status.
- 2. Exchange the investments (say, a \$100,000 treasury bond) for stock in the new S corporation. This transaction is tax-free.
- 3. Over a period of time, gift portions of the S corporation stock to your children, grandchildren, or others. Gift to a maximum of 49 percent of the stock. By keeping 51 percent, you will always be in control of the S corporation. Now let's take a look at the tax consequences.

Gift tax: You can gift up to \$10,000 tax-free per year to each donee. If you are married, you can double the amount to \$20,000 by having your spouse consent to the gift. It is smart not to exceed the \$10,000/\$20,000 value per year limit. Spread your gifts out over two or more years as necessary.

Income tax: The stockholders pay tax on their proportionate share of the income. For example, let's say the income of the corporation was \$10,000 for the year and the kids owned \$40,000 of the stock. Their share of the income would be \$4,000; yours would be \$6,000. This is a great way to build an education fund for the kids. Remember, any child who has not attained age 14 must pay tax on unearned income in excess of \$1,200 at his parents' top tax rate. But that's not so bad because of the estate tax result.

Estate tax: The shares of stock owned by other members of the

family will not be included in your estate. The top estate tax rate is 55 percent. So, as you can see, significant savings are possible.

One warning: you must operate like a corporation. Title to the assets must be in the corpora-

tion's name. You should actually issue certificates of the S corporation stock to each stockholder. Ask your professional adviser to make sure you follow all the necessary details.

Understanding vertical deflection circuits

t's fairly common knowledge that a television or video game picture is made up of hundreds of closely spaced horizontal lines. Each of these lines is called a "raster line" or a "video line." The exact number of lines will vary between games, but a typical video game picture contains approximately 250 individual lines.

Some games use a "medium resolution" system, with a special monitor that displays more lines. Atari's *Paperboy, Championship Sprint, APB* and *Hard Drivin*' all fall into this category. Of course, more lines will give you a betterlooking picture. But regardless of how many there are, the lines are stacked so close together that when viewed from any distance they seem to blend together into one seamless picture.

The part of the monitor that's in charge of putting each of the lines in its proper place is called the "vertical deflection circuit" or "vertical sweep." When the vertical deflection circuit is doing its job properly, it will place each consecutive line of the picture, one beneath the other, and space them evenly across the screen from top to bottom.

The spacing between the lines is important. It's called "vertical linearity." If the vertical linearity is not correct (due to a component failure or poor adjustment) the picture will appear distorted. Round objects, for example, may appear pear-shaped if the lines at the top of the picture are spaced further apart than those at the bottom.

The top of the picture may be so stretched out that it actually appears to fold over onto itself at the top of the screen and display a bit of the image upside down and backwards. This symptom is known as "vertical foldover." In many cases, the vertical deflection circuit fails completely, leaving just a single horizontal line runn-

It's not at all unusual to encounter problems in the vertical deflection circuit of a monitor. In fact, in older monitors this is one of the most common failures you'll see. There are a few different symptoms, depending on the nature of the failure. You might see a picture that doesn't quite fill the screen from the top to the bottom, no matter how you adjust the vertical size or height control.

Another symptom is a picture that's squished at the top of the screen, cutting off the picture and making the scores unreadable. ing down the center of the monitor.

Theory of operation

Inside the slender neck of the picture tube, an "electron gun assembly" with three electron guns creates three beams of highenergy electrons. These electron beams are shot toward the screen, which is coated on the inside with stripes of red, green, and blue "phosphor." Each beam is precisely aligned so that it strikes just one colored phosphor. When the high-energy electrons strike the screen, the phosphor coating

glows.

But the electron gun assembly is aimed at the exact center of the picture tube. By itself, it can only produce a dot at the center of the screen (not too entertaining). The electron gun assembly cannot move to direct the beams to other areas of the screen. In order to move the electron beams around the screen, the beams are "deflected," or pushed around with magnetism.

Mounted on the neck of the picture tube are two coils that form an electromagnet assembly called the "yoke." The yoke is powered by two different circuits on the monitor chassis and generates two separate and very powerful magnetic fields. The two magnetic fields point in two different directions: horizontal and vertical.

The magnetic field generated by

the "horizontal deflection coil" in the yoke causes the electron beam in the picture tube to scan from left to right, drawing a horizontal raster line across the screen. The beam is then turned off for a quick return trip to the left side of the screen, where the beam is turned back on and the process is repeated. This horizontal scanning is continuous. Whenever the monitor is powered up, the beam is scanning horizontally.

The magnetic field generated by the vertical deflection coil in the yoke starts by pushing the horizontally scanning beam to the top of the screen so it can draw the first line of the picture where it belongs. To draw the second line of the picture, the magnetic field pushes the beam down a tiny bit. When the next horizontal scan occurs, the second raster line is plac-

ed right underneath the first one! Again, the beam is pushed down a little so the third line can be drawn underneath the second one. The process is repeated for each line, with the vertical sweep pushing the beam down as each line is drawn lower on the screen.

Eventually, the entire screen is filled with raster lines. It takes approximately 1/60 of a second from the time the first line is drawn at the top of the screen until the last line is drawn at the bottom. One complete screen full of lines is called a "field," and the vertical deflection circuit in the monitor generates approximately 60 fields per second.

The frequency of the vertical sweep is approximately 60 cycles per second or 60 Hertz (60 Hz). This is the same frequency as our household 120 volt AC power.

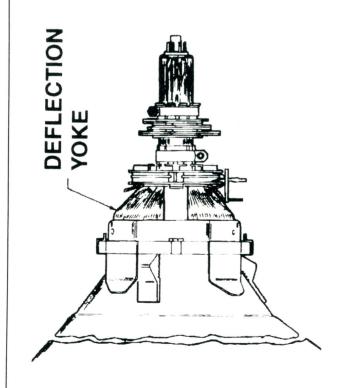
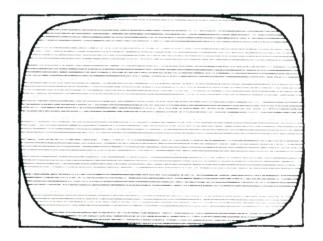

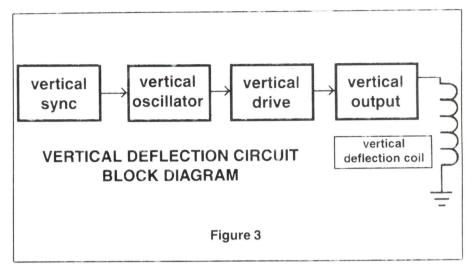
However, the monitor does not depend on the 60 Hz AC power for its vertical sweep. It just happens to be the same frequency. The 60 Hz vertical sweep is generated internally by the vertical deflection circuit. After all, if a monitor depended on the 120 volt AC power for its 60 Hz vertical sweep, you couldn't have battery operated televisions, could you?

After completing one field, the beam is positioned at the bottom of the screen. The vertical sweep now reverses direction and quickly (in about one millisecond or 1/1000 of a second) brings the beam back to the top of the screen. This is called the "vertical retrace." To prevent any lines from being drawn across the screen as the beam races from the bottom to the top during the vertical retrace, another monitor circuit known as the "blanking" circuit turns off the electron guns.

Vertical deflection circuits

There are a few different types of vertical deflection circuits. Some monitors use all discreet components (individual parts like transistors, diodes, capacitors, and resistors). Some monitors combine an integrated circuit with a pair of transistors, while others use two integrated circuits. There are even monitors that use just a single integrated circuit and a small handful of other components for the vertical deflection circuit. Regardless of the specific hardware, all video game monitors use the same basic concept for vertical deflection.

The logic board in the game generates a signal known as "vertical synchronization" or "vertical sync." This is simply a momentary pulse that the computer sends out at the end of every field. There is a wire that carries this pulse from the edge connector of the logic board (pin P on the JAMMA harness) to the sync input connector of the monitor. With the sync



signal to guide it, the monitor starts drawing the first line of each field (the top line of the picture) just after each vertical sync pulse. Without sync, the picture will roll.

The vertical sync pulse keeps the picture from rolling by passing along to a circuit called the "vertical oscillator." The vertical oscillator generates the 60 Hz signal that will eventually drive the vertical deflection coil in the yoke. By triggering on the vertical sync pulse, the vertical oscillator stays exactly in step with the logic board.

The output of the vertical oscillator is nowhere near powerful enough to drive the vertical deflection coil in the yoke. It has to be amplified first. There are usually one or two stages of amplification that take the weak signal from the vertical oscillator and boost it in voltage and current. This vertical amplifier circuit is often called the "vertical drive."

But we're not through yet! There's still one more stage of amplification needed. Following the vertical drive, a higher powered "vertical output" circuit is then used to drive the vertical deflection coil in the yoke. It is in this vertical output circuit that we find a lot of our component failures. More on that later; stay tuned.

In the next installment, we'll take a close look at the vertical deflection circuitry in several monitors and see how they work, how they fail, and how to troubleshoot them using just a meter (and maybe a capacitor too!).

A guide for redemption game manufacturers

ecently a technician friend spoke to me about all the problems he was having with a certain redemption game, the name of which I will not mention. It's one of the newer games on the market and is built by a company that has been in the coin-operated redemption industry for a while.

Some of the problems included the following: some of the cabinet screws that hold the game together were loose and coming out; the power supply was underrated and had to be updated; and one of the motors was binding, causing the underrated motor fuse to blow each time the motor made a complete revolution. The game was brand new, right out of the box, yet experienced all these problems!

I don't want to knock any of the redemption game manufacturers or scare anyone wanting to get into this part of the business. But I think there should be some guidelines for the manufacture of redemption games, sort of like the AMOA standards for video and pinball games.

I know that redemption games can be very different from one another. Any strict standards would cramp the style of the manufacturers. I'm not here to tell you what to do and what not to do; all I'm proposing is a list of items that redemption game

- 5. Install a "ticket error" message for jammed tickets.
- 6. Staple a dip switch setting list near the PC board to aid in adjusting the game for the correct

manufacturers should take into account when designing a redemption game. This list is solely my opinion and does not reflect the views of Play Meter.

- 1. Since redemption games can be quite heavy to move away from the wall for rear access, make all PC boards, power supplies, etc., easily accessible from the front of the game.
- 2. Make it easy to gain access to the ticket dispenser.
- 3. Make the loading of tickets as easy as possible. Don't hide the ticket bin deep inside the bottom of the game.
- 4. Install a "ticket low" indicator lamp on the outside of the game, near the ticket dispenser.

- 7. Make the game out of plywood, *not* pressed wood. Remember, the game should be made to last!
- 8. Create a complete manual for the redemption game *before* going into full production.
- 9. Put inside each game a "care package" of light bulbs, a tube of motor lube (if your game uses a motor), fuses, etc., like some of the pinball game manufacturers are doing.
- 10. If your redemption game uses balls, supply some in the care package. Also, provide a second source for the balls if you are unable to supply them.
 - 11. Program the game for some

sort of diagnostic mode, a game test for all switches and lights.

- 12. Provide complete settings of game options so the game can be set for the proper percentages.
- 13. If your game uses mechanical parts, enclose the items so that overzealous players won't try to get free games or free balls by reaching under or over the game and creating an out-of-order condition.

- 14. For operators who want to install and use them, provide "taps" for a ticket and coin meter. Better yet, install both meters in the cabinet!
- 15. Don't use any weird connectors or plugs. Stay with what's proven, i.e., Molex or Amp products.
- 16. Finally, if your new redemption game uses a new gun or other control that you've designed, ask this question: "If a game player forced this new gun all the way to the left, would it break?"
