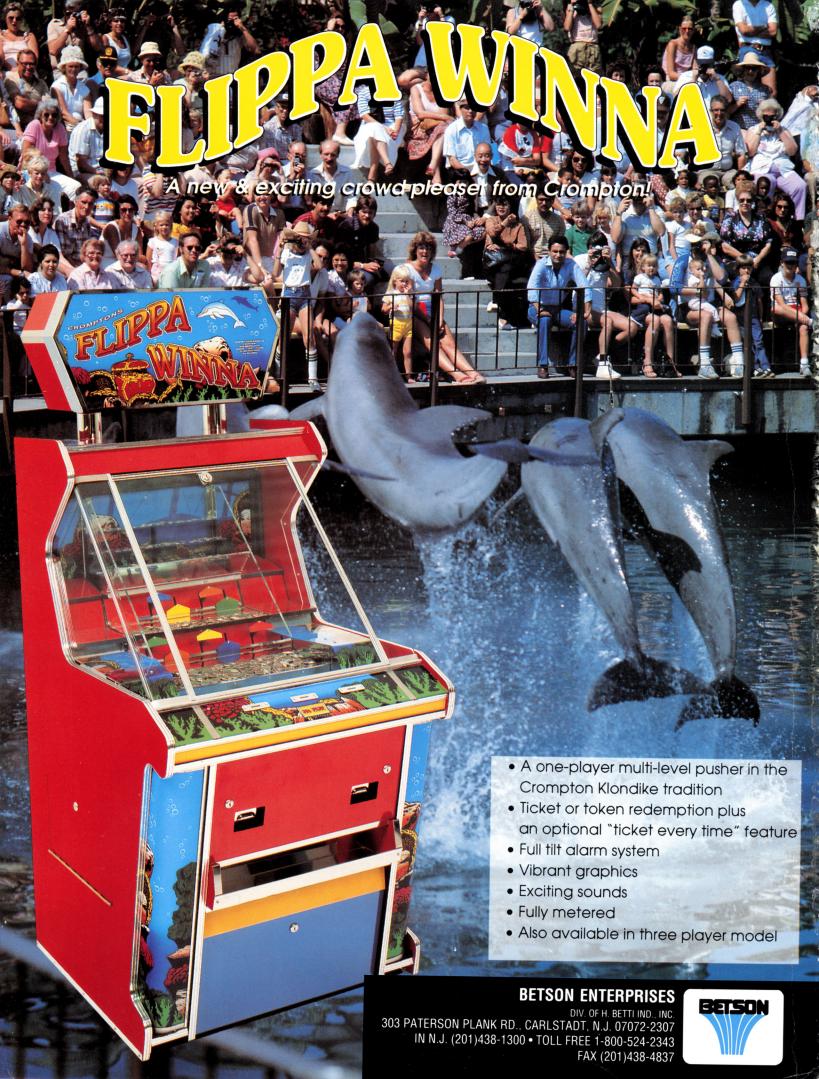

#### **COALITION ON VIOLENCE MEETS AT CES**

A recently formed coalition of consumer and coin-op industry members met during the Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas last month to discuss what to do about violence in video games. Representing the coin-op industry were AMOA board members Randy Chilton and Frank Seninsky; AMOA government relations manager Laura Olson; and AAMA associate director Elaine Krieger. Also present were members of the Video Software Dealers Association, the Software Publishers Association, and a staffer from Connecticut Sen. Joseph Lieberman's office.

"We went in not knowing what to expect," Chilton told Play Meter. "We wondered, 'What's up?' Well, what's up is this: the games are absolutely going to be rated, whether voluntarily or involuntarily. The consumer market makes up the big picture in this coalition. It was pretty humbling to look around the room and see the heavyweights from Nintendo, Sega, and about 50 other people, and then realize that two people—Frank and I—were there to talk about coin-op. The SPA, by consensus, will organize the coalition, but they very much want our support. We'll be right in the middle of it."

On Feb. 8 the AMOA representatives will meet with an AAMA committee that includes Williams Bally/Midway's Joe Dillon and Strata's Richard Ditton to coordinate a unified coin-op position on the violence issue. Though on one hand the industry needs to have a voice in the coalition, might it not also be a good idea to keep a distance from the consumer side and its problems?

"Sen. Lieberman's staffer specifically referred to the coin-op industry as being part of this; there's no escaping it," Chilton said. "I guess we could attack this thing on our own and get away from the consumer side, but that wouldn't be my personal recommendation. I would rather see all of the coalition members get together, agree on something we can all live with, present it at a Senate hearing, and put this

whole issue behind us."

He believes that a rating system could work for both the coin-op and consumer industries. "Not only could it work, but in fact I think it's the right thing to do," Chilton said. "But it has to be an informational rating system like the movie industry has. You can't lock a 13-year-old boy up for going to an R-rated movie; it's not against the law.

'We also have to avoid age-controlled environments. Say I have to put a sign on *Mortal Kombat* that reads, 'This game is rated 17; it may contain scenes of violence and/or sex that may be unsuitable for players under the age of 17.' That's fine. Just don't make me put all my 17-rated games in a separate room and check IDs, and then, if the duties are neglected, the proprietor goes to jail. We can't let these types of situations occur. That's not what lawmakers are asking for, but uninformed people, if left uninformed, make decisions like that.'

In related news, Sega has withdrawn the current CD version of the controversial game *Night Trap* for re-editing. The company says the new version will be released only after and industry-wide rating system is in place.

#### **JUKEBOX LICENSE FEES DUE**

Melonie Krisza, manager of the Jukebox License Office, wanted to remind jukebox operators of the license fee structure for calendar year 1994. It's \$287 for the first jukebox; \$54 each for jukeboxes two through 10; and \$46 each for every jukebox thereafter. The JLO must receive the money by March 15. Beyond that date operators will be assessed a 1-1/2 percent finance charge per month.

#### **DATA EAST USA CONSOLIDATES**

Data East USA announced on Jan. 13 that it will be consolidating some of its operations in the Chicago area, where its subsidiary, Data East Pinball, is located.

Included in the move will be the coin-op sales, service, and parts functions. The consumer business operations and some of the coin-op market research functions will remain in California. The consolidation process will take place over many months.

#### **FORQUE JOINS ARACHNID**

Arachnid Inc. has expanded its sales force to the West Coast, naming Lamar Forque sales manager for the area. Forque, a 22-year coin-op veteran who worked most recently for Merit, will be stationed near Seattle. One of his duties will be to increase sales of Arachnid's *Galaxy* dart game. #### **GLASCO EXPANDS DISTRIBUTOR NETWORK**

Glasco, which formally debuted a new line of vending equipment at last fall's NAMA show, has added three distributors to its exclusive network. The additions give Glasco a distributor network of 26 offices in the United States, South and Central America, and Puerto Rico.

Mountain Coin has added the Glasco line to its Denver, Salt Lake City, and Albuquerque offices; the line is now represented in all five of the Mountain Coin branches. Three new companies were appointed in California. A-1 Distributing in Sacramento will serve the Northern California market. David's Vending in Burbank will distribute in the greater Los Angeles area, while Hoffman Sales and Service in Chula Vista will handle distribution in and around San Diego. #### **CRAVENS ELECTED AAMA VP**

Cravens has been actively involved in a number of activities since becoming a board member in 1987, including work with the American Amusement Machine Charitable Foundation and the Joint Venture/ACME Committee. He was also the recipient of the Joe Robbins Award in 1987.

Jerry Gordon, senior vice president of Rowe, was named to the AAMA board to fill the position vacated by Cravens' move to vice president. Gordon has a long history in the coin machine industry and is looking forward to working on the board.

#### CHICAGO LOCK, CAMLOCK FORGE ALLIANCE

Chicago Lock Co. and CamLock Systems have formed a co-distributorship agreement to market each other's products worldwide. The agreement was announced by Dale Padjen, sales/general manager of Chicago Lock, who has rejoined the company from CamLock.

"This will be an outstanding alliance of two quality product lines that complement each other," he said. "With our new association, Chicago Lock products will now be distributed in Europe. CamLock products will be distributed in North America."

#### **VLT AND EDS FORM PARTNERSHIP**

Video Lottery Technologies, parent company of Video Lottery Consultants and Automated Wagering International, and Electronic Data Systems, a wholly-owned subsidiary of General Motors, have agreed to a 10-year partnership that will in effect accelerate and expand VLT's systems services and research and development efforts in the entertainment/gaming industry. Separately, EDS will take a minority equity position in VLT.

EDS and VLT will collaborate on a wide range of product development and service enhancement projects, including VLT's Masterlink Advanced Gaming System, which is currently being implemented for the Atlantic Lottery Corp. in four eastern Canadian provinces and was recently selected by the Delaware state lottery to operate its on-line

system.

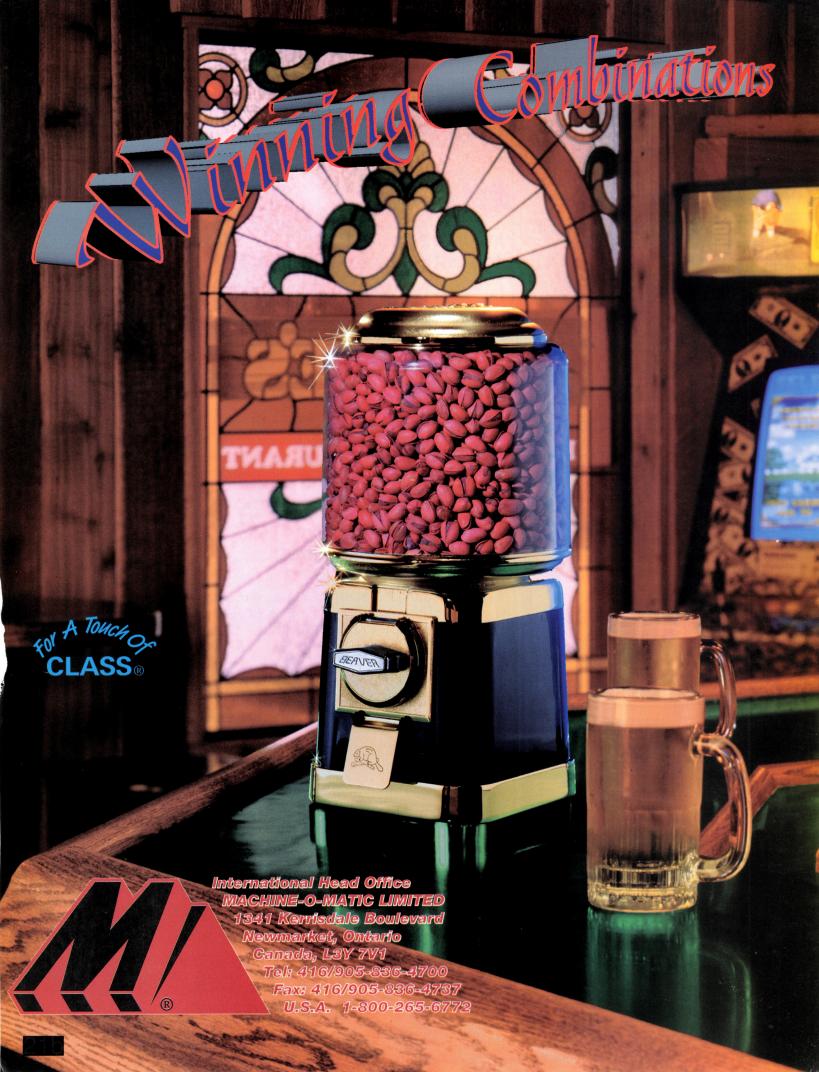

# FROM THE EDITOR

### Don't believe everything you hear



y nephew raced into the living room Christmas morning and began ripping open packages. His Sega system was "just what he wanted." Then he opened the other surprises which, of course, weren't really.

"What, no Mortal Kombat?" he said, gen-uinely surprised, his mother related to me later. "There is no way I would even consider buying that game," she stressed in her most concerned motherly voice. "I've heard it's simply awful.'

I asked her if she had played it or even seen someone else play it. "I didn't have to," she replied. "With all the publicity about it, I know it's just too violent."

How many conversations have you had with people like this? Not just about violence, but about various issues within our industry. People always just know what the media has told us we should know. But it's usually so one-sided that it's hard to believe we accept it so blindly. The media certainly

are experts at making mountains out of mole hills. I'm thinking of a very recent example concerning President Clinton. Suddenly, we're all questioning whether he actually had illicit affairs and whether the police helped him make his secret rendezvous.

Front page stories dredge up the Gennifer Flowers

accusations, presented with pride by the media during the pre-election days. Remember Gary Hart and his fateful run for the highest office? Would he have made a good president? Was he qualified? Who cared—he had an affair! Gasp! Of course, he couldn't be president. Is Clinton any less capa-

ble because of the possibility of past infidelities? I'm sure there are many other reasons to choose from. Now, I'm not condoning illicit affairs for anyone, but I'm trying to make a point. The media so often sidesteps important issues to dwell on something that makes no difference at all. Well, maybe it'll mean a financial windfall for the policemen when they decide to write a book or sell the movie

I've also been following the Brady bill concerning gun control. The media has been in a frenzy over this. In fact, I'm sure no one really knows the issue from simply reading what the media has chosen to feature. Being familiar with guns and able to shoot fairly well, I resent some of the rationalizing done by the media. I am one of those who believe that if guns are outlawed criminals will still have guns or other ways to kill innocent people. However, for the same reason, I can see where guns in the hands of irresponsible

people uneducated in handling handguns could be fatal.

No matter where your sympathies lie, the only thing that's certain is that the media has found a juicy subject: anything they dredge up will be accepted as fact. Sound familiar? Sure, our industry gets onto that treadmill occasionally. It becomes a "hot topic," something like Sen. Bob Packwood and his nowfamous diaries. It seems someone once complained about playing video games so long that his elbow hurt. Ah hah, said the media, video games cause medical problems! Didn't they just have a field day with that one. Maybe if we complain of breaking out in a mysterious rash from paying taxes, someone will try to ban them!

It's so unfortunate that the media can distort issues so completely. Remember the guns mentioned earlier? We're all so fed up with crime and murders (New Orleans reported nearly 400 murders in 1993) that we are trying to find an answer to the problem. Since many of the crimes involved teenagers, the focus seems to be who to blame. Violence on TV, disgusting shows, violent content in video games.

The media fueled an uproar when a fiveyear-old set his house on fire, killing his baby sister, after allegedly being influenced by the Beavis and Butt-Head show. No one asked why a five-year-old was allowed to see such a show. Instead of blasting the show (I personally think it's disgusting), why didn't someone admonish the parents? Why isn't someone in the media lashing out at parents of 13and 14-year-olds who are on a killing spree?

As Chris said in his "Last Word" column last month, he may have wanted to drink beer and watch pornography when he was 13 but his parents put a fast end to that idea. They didn't set out to ban beer and pornography; they settled the matter at home. I'm sure Chris would have been a little shocked if they would have watched him guzzle a few and click on the X-rated flicks, blamed the breweries and filmmakers, but did nothing else to stop him.

Where are parents today? How I wish someone in the media would speak out about the corruption in the family unit and place the blame for many of our problems squarely where it belongs. It's time that parents take a little responsibility for their children and stop trying to place blame everywhere else. In the meantime, we can all campaign to remove violence from video games and plead with manufacturers to reconsider some offensive scenes. But we should know that until the media finds another juicy topic, we're it, folks.

Let's do what we always do when we're attacked—wait for the media to let up so we can get on with our business.  $\square$

# **AAMA** group visits China

Representatives from the American Amusement Machine Association (AAMA) spent 11 days in China in early December to expose coin-op product to the Chinese market and establish contact with government officials, according to AAMA executive director Bob Fay. The trip also served to educate the contingent on methods of conducting business in China.

The AAMA group consisted of Fay; Dynamo's Mark Struhs, chairman of AAMA's Foreign Business Development Committee; and Fabtek's Frank Ballouz, an AAMA board and FBDC member. They exhibited games at the Hotel Expo and met with government and business officials in Beijing and Shanghai.

Fay reports that there's a dearth of modern coin-operated amusement games in China. In Shanghai they visited two Namco arcades, but such modern facilities are rare in China. "Several small entertainment or amusement centers exist in Beijing and Shanghai, but they contain very limited equipment, most of which is copies," Fay said. Current duties were to have been reduced by 50 percent as of Jan. 1.

"The Foreign Business Development Commit-

tee is the one with the most interest among AAMA members," Fay said. "Certain things are going to happen in the United States that, as an industry, we might not have the financial resources to control, such as fiber-optics and violence in video games. The export market is a nice secondary market for our members to enhance their businesses, especially in Asia. where there's capital available. Eastern Europe is a dead market.

"I think this first trip to China was extremely successful. We learned a lot, though there's a heck of a lot more to learn. Business dealings can be a little confusing. what with the size of the country and the fact that you're dealing with a Communist government that's still going through reforms. This was a break-the-ice trip. We'll be going back to Shanghai at the end of March for another Hotel Expo. About 14 AAMA-member companies have

signed up for that so far."

There are critics who condemn American companies for doing business with China because of the government's history of human rights violations. Fay says AAMA hasn't caught any flak for trying to do business in China.

"There's been enough of a commitment from people in the government to go forward with reforms," he said. "There are still hard-liners, but hopefully over the next year or so the reforms will increase and the abuses will decrease. China probably lost a chance to host the Olympics because of those abuses. They need to do something about it if they want to be accepted in the world community. But changes won't happen overnight; it'll take a while. The business that is being done is taking place in Hong Kong and Taiwan.

"Another reason I think these internal problems will be corrected is that they need the United States as a trading partner. They have to convince the government that progress is being made: otherwise they could lose most favored nation status. China used to have trade with North Korea and Russia, but that's gone now. They really don't have anyone left."

### Valley celebrates dart achievement

Valley Recreation Products staged a special celebration dinner last fall to commemorate an achievement unique to the electronic dart industry: the sale of 50,000 electronic dart machines to a single distributor, NSM Aktiengesellschaft in Bingen, Germany.

The 50,000th NSM-destined game rolled off Valley's Sycamore, Ill., production line in the spring of 1993, the eight-year anniversary of the companies' relationship. "We are now well past the 55,000th game shipped to NSM and see no sign of a slow-down," said James Griffiths, Valley's vice president of international operations.

The celebration dinner, held near NSM's headquarters (in the Frankfurt/Weisbaden area), was hosted by Valley president Chuck Milhem, vice president/ general manager Dick Shelton, and Griffiths. Senior NSM management, including managing director Ullrich Schulze and director of marketing Peter Kuhn, attended the dinner, as did other key management staff.

The highlight of the occasion was the presentation of a foot-high, faceted lead crystal representation of a dart target etched over a dimensional globe. The handcrafted artwork, commissioned by Valley, was presented by Milhem to

Schulze; smaller replicas were given to those in attendance.

preserve equipment of historical value.

In other news concerning Valley darts, the first qualifying tournament leading up to July's Valley Gold Cup took place in Phoenix last fall. Player Dart Inc. hosted the tournament for the first time. "A lot of people found out what Valley Gold is all about," said director Gary Burge. "I think it's great that Valley offers this to their operators."

The Valley Gold Cup is held in Las Vegas. The top finishers there then comprise Team USA, which travels to Europe to compete against international teams in the fall.

#### NAMA introduces software package

Which products in a vending machine will make the most profits for the operator? That vexing question will be easier to answer now that the National Automatic Merchandising Association (NAMA) has made available a software package and supporting instruction manual.

Called the "NAMA Direct Product Profitability (DPP) Model for Vending Machines," this Lotus-based spreadsheet tool measures the profit contributions of all products in a vending machine, compares them to others within that

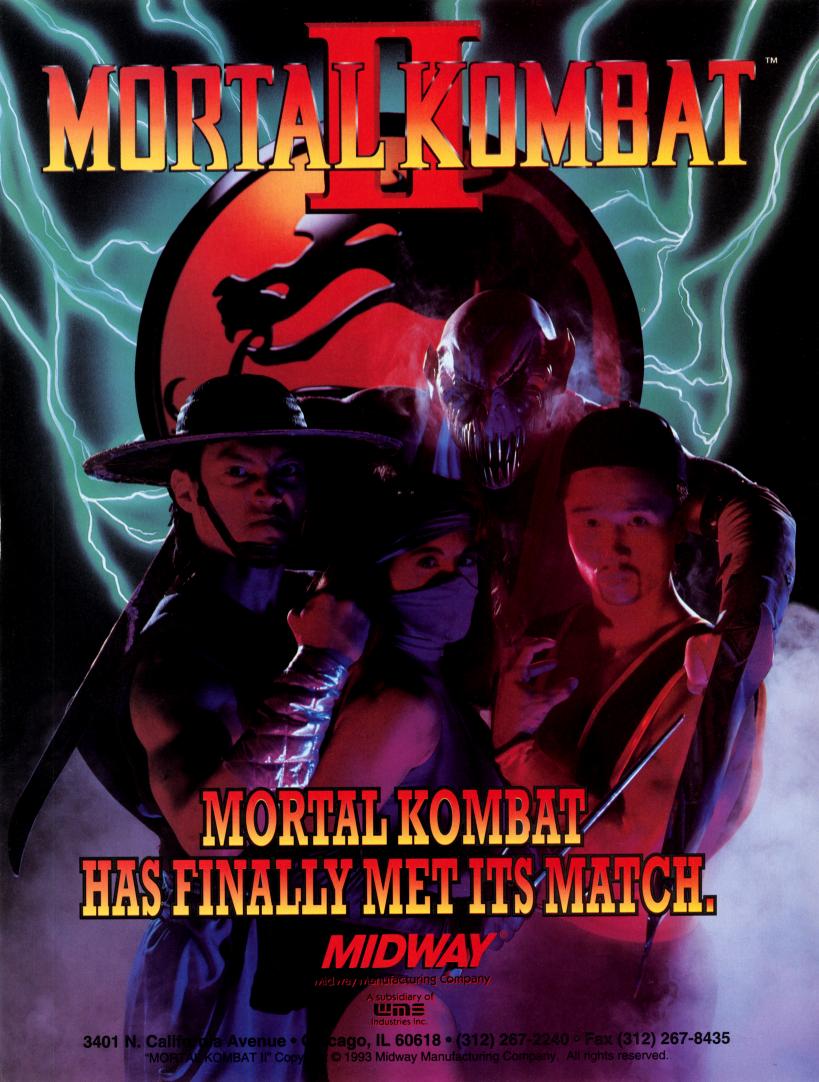
machine, and then evaluates the machine in relation to others at the same or other locations.

The DPP Model adjusts the retail price of each item in a vending machine for allowances. discounts, and taxes. It also factors in such items as the operating costs of handling and storing products in the warehouse; route service; machine costs: and location commissions. The model can calculate the profit advantages or disadvantages of changes in service for locations, or for machines within each

"Operators may find

that certain products in their machines may make more money than others, even though they cost more," said Richard Geerdes, NAMA vice president of member services. "Others may find that certain products are more 'efficient' in their machines because of their high salesto-space-requirement."

#### N.Y. raid nets counterfeits

TNT Vending and Amusement Vending in Brooklyn, N.Y., and Jamma Electronics in Queens have been sentenced in conjunction with guilty pleas for violation of New York state copyright and gambling laws. All three companies received five-year probations and fines.

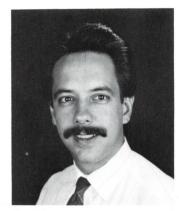
Raids conducted in June 1993 of these and other businesses resulted in the seizure of 994 gambling devices, 289 counterfeit printed circuit boards (Street Fighter Champion and Mortal Kombat), \$122,000 in cash, a number of vehicles, and assorted weapons. Prosecutor David Levine said additional prosecutions are probable.

AAMA has established a successful enforcement program that includes working with the FBI, U.S. Customs Service, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and Mexican Customs to decrease the flow of counterfeit product into the United States, Canada, and Mexico.

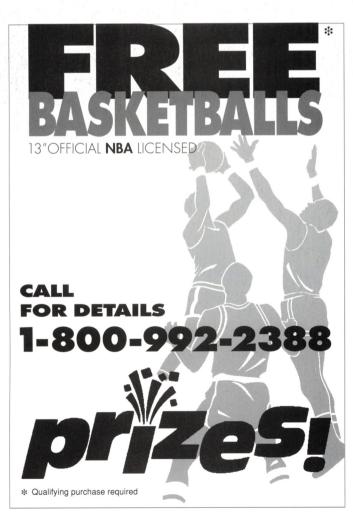

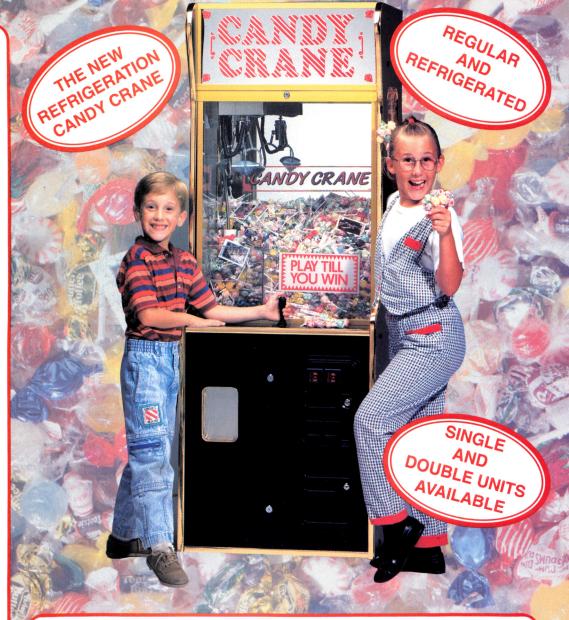

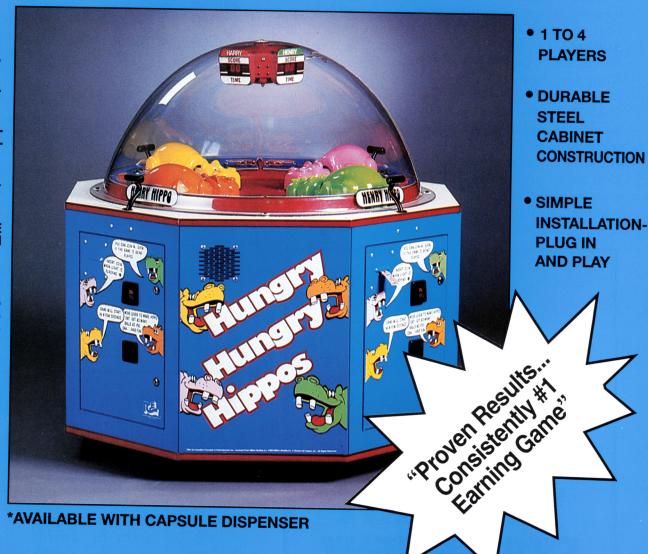

## INTERNATIONAL NEWS

#### **GERMANY**

A joint warning has been issued by Germany's "Big Three" manufacturers-Gauselmann, NSM, and Bally Wulff—against the illegal use of poker and blackjack machines in Germany. They can only be used as "points gaming machines without payouts," but there have been a growing number of instances where the points won have been exchanged for cash or goods.

This is illegal in Germany, and those involved are risking fines or even imprisonment. The three organizations have instructed their sales departments not to retail machines which store points or which have other features that may be used for illegal accounting procedures.

Elsewhere in Germany, NSM chairman Ullrich Schulze is predicting a growing importance in the non-payout machine business. He said in a recent press interview that machines involved in sports, music, and entertainment will gain an increasing share of the overall market.

What little investment currently going into the German coin machine business is being directed at payout equipment. Nevertheless, this sector is the most heavily taxed. Schulze believes non-payout equipment will therefore attain growing importance.

#### UNITED KINGDOM

There is a slight risk that video games can trigger epileptic fits, according to a U.K. government inquiry. In Britain up to 150 victims could be affected each year, the majority of them between seven and 19 years old.

The inquiry was set up after a national newspaper alleged that a number of children with no history of epilepsy had been affected while playing Nintendo or Sega consumer games on television screens. The flashing lights can trigger fits in children who are susceptible, the inquiry found.

The Department of Trade and Industry prepared the report with the help of the National Society for Epilepsy. They found that about 600 of the 30,000 people in Britain each year who have an epileptic fit for the first time are "photosensitive" and at risk from TV, video games, or even flashing strip lighting.

Consumer Affairs Minister Lord Strathclyde said that video games only carried a small chance of triggering fits, adding that playing games would very rarely spark a seizure in those who have no history of the illness.

#### **FINLAND**

Automaattivuokraajat Ry, the Finnish coin machine trade association newly admitted to Euromat, is conducting a campaign to break the monopoly of the state-owned RAHA organization in Finland (also known as RAY). RAHA controls most of the coin machines and all of the payout machines in the country on behalf of the government, which distributes the proceeds to charities.

The trade association is using Finland's high-profile entry into the European Community on Jan. 1 as a means to break the monopoly. Its membership in Euromat has been used to highlight the situation, and it has appealed to other members to lobby their own governments to take action.

Secretary Tapio Kauppi said, "We want the European Community to demand the dismantling of Finland's four automatic machine monopolies, in particular because they violate the Treaty of Rome and the Treaty of Maastricht (the laws on competition contained in those documents).

"If Finland's coin machine monopoly is permitted to remain, then similar monopolies in favor of charitable organization may also come into existence in other EC countries."

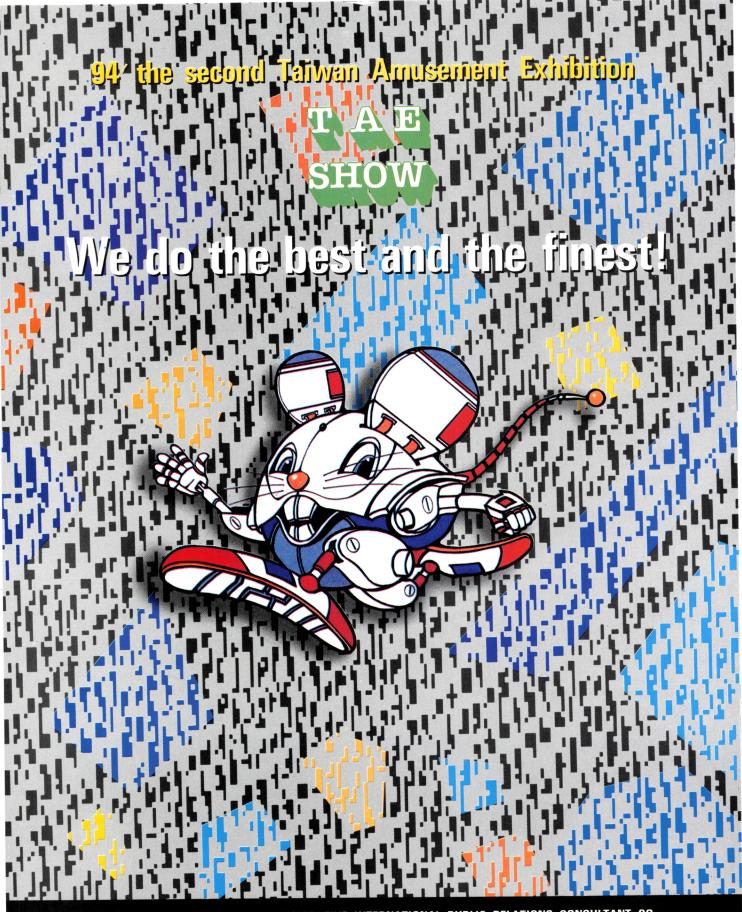
RAHA also has jukeboxes and kiddie rides with which it competes with private operators. Automaattivuokraajat also contests RAHA's coin-operated pool table, which is rated as an amusement machine yet competes with ordinary non-coin-op games that are provided by private entrepreneurs. It leaves for the rest of the industry jukeboxes, reaction testers, certain sports games—darts, basketball, and golf—non-coin-op pool, and kiddie rides.

Automaattivuokraajat chairman Seppo Henriksson said: "The machine monopolies in Finland are the only ones in Europe. They provide problems of competition because different types of machines complement each other to some extent. RAHA competes with private companies for the limited space available in restaurants for coin machines. It is the most efficient and profitable way for the monopolyholder to collect as much as possible from as few slot machines as possible, and give preference to those machines for which RAHA pays the minimum share to the location.

"In order to achieve a maximum profit, RAHA only provides restaurants with a limited number of machines which are affected by the monopoly. This results in an uneven competitive situation between locations because some are left completely without machines, and few of them get as many as they want."

#### **AUSTRALIA**

and Allied Industries of Perth, Western Australia, to develop the largest leisure center in the Southern Hemisphere. To be located at Queensland's Surfer's Paradise, it will likely have a carnival theme, cover 4,000 square meters, and become the second largest in the world. The cost to develop the center? Around \$4 million.

#### **SOUTH AFRICA**

As South Africa moves toward its first fully integrated elections on April 27, the heat is apparently off the country's coin machine industry. The government had cracked down on illegal casinos and a range of other equipment, including unlawful gambling machines and video pokers.

It seemed that further troubles were in store for the industry, but it has been overtaken by far larger political considerations as the elections loom, with the near-certainty of a black majority rule for the first time. It looks likely that the country will be split into 10 provinces, based on tribal areas with a high degree of individual autonomy. The industry is hoping that this autonomy will extend to decisions on whether gambling will be legalized in any form.

#### **GREECE**

There is still confusion in the Greek coin ma-

chine industry following the apparent opening of the market to payout machines and a change of government. It is understood that the new government has done nothing to overturn the previous administration's decisions on coin machines.

The Greeks appear content with JPM's Reel Magic machine as the mainstay of the market, and it is being copied extensively. The machine is described by the official Greek government documents as being made by Jac van Hamm in Holland (JPM's distributor) and imported by Serdaris-Xatzianestiadis of Thessaloniki. An official definition of the game has been prepared, of which EuroSlot has an English translation.

#### **MOROCCO**

Pool is gaining popularity in the hotels and cafes around Casablanca, according to Stan McKenna of Hazel Grove Music. The tables are being exported from France and the United Kingdom.

The managing director of Moroccan distributor Yanda, M. Laredo, has taken on the line of Hazel Grove Music's U.K. pool tables and is siting them in the Casablanca area. Laredo first saw the tables in France—where the game is extremely popular—and

took on the exclusive distributorship for Morocco. They're distributed throughout France from HGM's base in Rennes (located in the Brittany region). Laredo has visited the company's head office in the United Kingdom, where the tables are manufactured.

Distributors and operators in Morocco are continuously looking for new leisure outlets. Laredo has become a member of the French pool association, AFEBAS, to prove his commitment to the game's promotion. AFEBAS runs national tournaments in France.

As a predominantly Muslim country, Morocco has strict rules about alcohol and gambling. This means that the only type of coin machines permitted are amusement games. There are also, therefore, few bars; pool tables are usually located in large hotels or pool centers.

#### **TURKEY**

License fees for casinos in Turkey have just been increased by about 200 percent for 1994. This means that a 50-slot, 10-table operation which paid \$150,000 in 1993 will now pay over \$400,000. The table license fee of \$100,000 for an unlimited number of tables will now only cover the first six tables; each additional table will cost \$15,000.

In 1993 slots were licensed at \$5,000 for the

first 15 and \$400 after that. This has increased to \$15,000 for the first 15 and \$800 thereafter. Membership cards were available to casinos for \$37,500, but this will increase to \$201,250.

The large city-based casinos should have no problem covering the new fees, but the seasonal casinos on the coast will struggle. Their argument is that they deal with international tourists who don't need membership cards, and that the minimum of 500 now required is too high.

Another complaint is that the government had promised to close illegal casinos, but it has only happened to a limited extent. Many of the estimated 50 illegal casinos are operated by influential people. There are 50 legal casinos licensed in Turkey; most are in Istanbul and Ankara.

The Turkish government, struggling to finance the continuing battle against the PKK (Kurdish terrorists), has announced a wide range of tax increases on VAT rates, gasoline, and imported goods. This is serious news for all coin machine operators. The rate relating to coin machines has increased from 38 percent to 88 percent, which means that a machine costing \$5,000 will have \$4,400 added in import duty.  $\square$

To that end we solicit greater input from you, our operator readers. Thanks to the faithful who send their polls in regularly. To others who have not returned a poll lately, drop it in the postage-paid envelope and send it along. An automated system may become a reality down the road, but in the meantime we rely on the mail and you.

By the way, the last set of instructions in our automated system of the future would be: "Press P for a real, live person. You can be painfully honest; we'll listen."  $\square$ 

P.S. While on the subject of the Equipment Poll, in an effort to rate brand new and recent releases for our readers we now include on the ballot only games introduced within the last two years. The history of older equipment is widely known and well documented. Video games that debut as dedicated and later appear as kits are moved into the kit category.

# Rowe unveils new jukeboxes in Dallas

Operators anxious for a new model of Rowe International's *LaserStar America* need wait no longer. In fact, the company raised the curtain on *two* jukeboxes at a principals-only distributor meeting in Dallas on Dec. 1.

Production begins this month on the 1994 LaserStar CD-100D Black Magic and the LaserStar CD-100D Lady In Red. The former is black with gold trim, the latter red with gold trim. New features on both include the words "Compact Disc" on the bottom; a top multi-reflective enclosure that produces a moire effect and has three CDs that rotate in a rainbow of changing colors; and a programmable message center on the keypad for up to eight messages. The jukeboxes are equipped with a Rowe bill acceptor that takes \$1 and \$5 bills; it's available with a 500 or optional 1.000 bill stacker.

"We had operators who specifically asked us for a red jukebox, something that's not common," explained senior vice president Joel Friedman. "The Lady In Red

gives operators an interesting jukebox for locations that warrant it. As for the *Black Magic*, it's created quite a strong reaction from those who've seen it. The black with gold trim is just beautiful

"The *Black Magic*, we think, will be the number one choice, but we want to leave that decision to the operators. The *Lady In Red* is more of a specialty jukebox, to the extent that it's for operators who want something different in terms of color."

And what did the distributors who gathered in Dallas think of the new jukeboxes? Here are some of their comments:

Phil Sternberg, Eastern Music: "These are rich-looking pieces. Operators have been asking for color changes, and Rowe has come up with some nice ones. I expect both jukeboxes to earn really well."

Morris Piha, Greater Southern: "I believe the red jukebox will go well in certain areas, but personally I prefer the black one. In some cases the operators will really benefit from the choice of colors. Take the University of Georgia, for example. With the school colors being black and red, it's a natural location. And I'm glad Rowe didn't make any mechanical changes, because the mechanism is working beautifully."

Lou Ptacek, Bird Distributors: "They are very attractive and should sell well throughout 1994. I think operators will appreciate the choice of colors."

John Gatens, Southgate Amusement: "The last model worked fine and was very reliable. I'm well satisfied with the new model

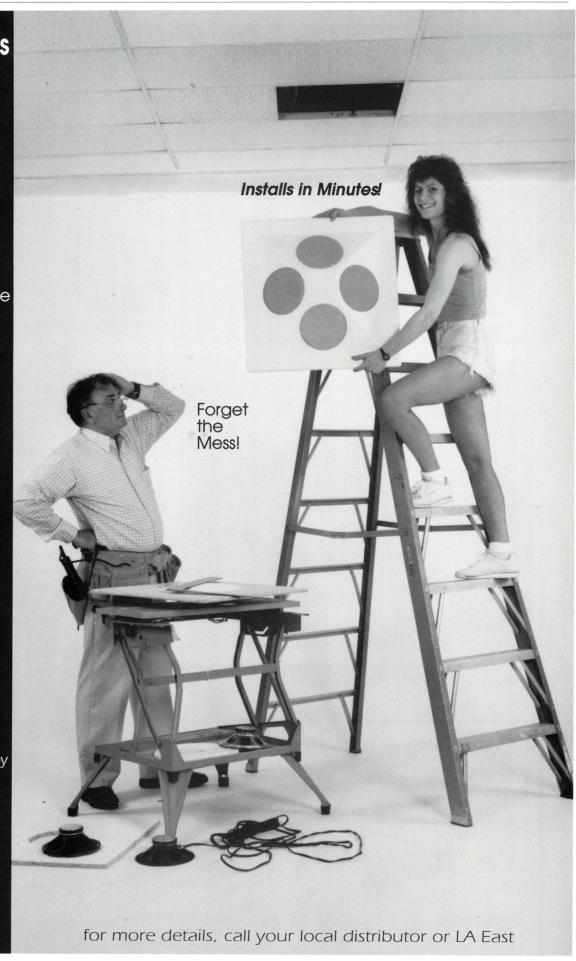

and look forward to selling it this year."

On another front, Friedman savs Rowe will produce an add-on karaoke kit later this year. "We've always felt we have a responsibility to look at the marketplace and what may be happening in the future," he said. "One of the things we considered early on is CDG, which is another form of CD. It looks the same as a CD but has graphics added to one of the tracks. So one of the things we thought about was how to incorporate that into a product if it becomes a reality, which it really hasn't to date.

"What we've done from an engineering standpoint is come up with a prototype for taking our jukebox and adding karaoke or CDG. At the AMOA show we displayed an engineering prototype that was done in conjunction with Philips Electronics. We received such a positive response that we're going to produce an add-on kit for the LaserStar America jukeboxes. I expect it to be ready by the middle of the year. It'll give operators another opportunity to compete in the locations."

Rowe/AMI is celebrating its 85th anniversary this year, and the company's jukeboxes can be found in 50 countries and six continents. The Rowe family of jukeboxes now consists of the two new models, the *CD-51*, *CD-Nostalgia*, *Wallette*, and *Wallstar Hideaway*.

"We think 1994 is going to be a really good year," Friedman concluded. "What we continue to hear from operators is that CD jukeboxes continue to earn well for their routes. The Rowe CD jukeboxes have been out for five years now, and we find that operators are starting to replace older models in larger numbers. The base of opportunities of where CD jukeboxes can go is expanding, and operators are expanding with it. They're finding that CD jukeboxes are good for business." □

# Bromley Inc.: a lifetime of learning pays off



Lauran Bromley and Joe Bundra.

Lauran Bromley, president and founder of Bromley Inc. and Funland, has been around the coin-op industry literally all of her life. Her story begins in New York long before she was born.

Her grandfather, Irving Bromberg, was a successful operator and distributor of games. He brought the first pinball machine to New York and started the Irving Bromberg Co., which had five offices in the state.

After selling the business and moving to California, he reopened the Irving Bromberg Co., the only Bally distributorship in California at that time. Irving was delighted when his only son (Lauran's father) Martin took an interest in the industry, even operating some of his own games while still in high school. Tragically, Irving died at a young age of Parkinson's disease.

Martin Bromley (he had shortened the family name) never left the coin-op industry. He was one of the founders of Service Games. Of course, we know it better as Sega.

We asked Lauran how she got her start in the coin-op industry; she tells this story: "My parents divorced when I was only two and my mom, my sister, and I ended up in Hawaii. When I was around 13, my dad would often send me brochures of games. I'd cut them up and re-paste them so they looked better."

She continued, "When I was 16, I began going to the AMOA conventions in Chicago. I was still dealing with brochures, this time handing them out in front of the booth."

But when did she have her first real job in the industry? "I've

never had a real job," Lauran exclaims. "This is the coin-op industry; how could you call this a real job!"

Seriously, Lauran didn't actually start working in the industry until after finishing college. She majored in drama at USC, but knew after working on several movies that films would absolutely not be her chosen career. After finishing school, she summoned up her nerve and asked her dad if she could come into his industry. To convince him, she reasoned that the industry was not so unlike working on films—a pinball has a beginning, an end, and a theme.

Marty agreed. However, although he had an interest in Stern Electronics, he made it clear that Lauran would have to interview with Gary Stern and earn a job on her own merits. Lauran was hired on a one-year training program, where she served time in every department.

Lauran left Stern just ahead of its demise. Not wanting to leave the industry, she and another former Stern Electronics employee, Larry Seigel, formed Bar Star. Lauran calls their game a great concept. It was a totally portable poker machine about the size of a cigar box, operated by batteries—perfect for bar locations. There was just one problem: when they tested them they were shocked to realize you couldn't play them in the dark. Said Lauran, "That was the end of that company!"

Lauran reluctantly left the industry, but vowed to find a way to get back into it. Her chance came when Gary Stern started Data East Pinball, just blocks from Lauran's house. She eagerly signed on as a one-woman "volunteer department," working for nearly a year. When the company moved nearly an hour away, she was put on a contract basis for specialty jobs.

Eventually, she was hired permanently in the purchasing department, racking up four more years of industry experience. In the mid-80s, Lauran was fascinated with the redemption phenomenon sweeping the industry. She had no doubt that she wanted to be a part of it. It was time to venture out on her own.

Lauran describes the experience: "It was like getting out of the industry, but not really, because it took nearly a year before the first product was ready."

When *Little Pro* hit the market, Lauran describes the feeling as "pretty darn good!"

Why was that first game and subsequent ones—Rock N' Bowl, Wheel 'Em In-so successful in a very competitive market? The answer comes easily to Lauran: "What makes us so unique is that we haven't created games, we've re-created games. We have taken wonderfully successful games and brought them up-to-date. Little Pro was a game done by Harry Williams decades ago. Rock N' Bowl was done in Spain in the early '60s. In fact, there were over 100,000 of them built in Spain."

Obviously, since Lauran is too young to remember the games, she praises her mentor—her dad—who remembers them very well. Lauran laughs when she tells us this story: "My dad will say 'Doll, remember that game built in 1950?' and I'll say 'Dad, I was negative-eight then!' But he'll promise to get one of the old games and the rest is history."

Marty is very proud of his daughter and even admits that he doesn't even mind when people say, "Oh, so you're Lauran's father!"

Many would have been content with the obvious success Bromley Inc. has enjoyed with its list of must-have redemption games.

Not Lauran. Last year she opened Funland, touted as Chicago's largest family amusement center. Funland is 16,000 square feet with a strong mix of redemption games and a 30-foot-long redemption counter chock full of tempting prizes.

Funland features specialties like the Sega R3600 flight simulator and the only indoor bumper cars. You'll also see Namco's Suzuka 8 Hours, Sega's Virtua Racing, and many other hightech games. An entire floor is dedicated to the younger set with an interactive, educational playroom featuring soft play and a fun ball crawl.

Lauran knows that there will be a weeding out of redemption companies, but is confident Bromley Inc. will survive. Why? "Those who know what redemption is and what the kids want will be around for a long time. There must be extensive testing to know if the game is good. We're willing to do that. I've seen companies stick a ticket dispenser on any old game and say, 'Hey, I'm in the redemption business.' That's not what redemption is all about. It's much more, and those who understand that will survive and be very successful."

Of course, we're always curious about upcoming games. Bromley

We asked Lauran what she sees for the industry in the near future. Here's what she had to say: "The redemption market will continue to expand. However, the competition will be fiercer than ever. If you look back 10 years ago there were probably only three companies making redemption pieces; there are dozens now. Operators will have to be cautious about who they are dealing with. They need quality equipment that doesn't break down. They need a company to stand behind its games; you only get that from reputable companies. Operators are going to be making some tough choices. Bromley Inc. has vowed to introduce only those games that will give operators a fair return on their investment."

Inc.'s product line-up will soon include *Dino Rally*, a remake of a hit game called *Turf Champ*. It's out on test right now and should be ready to preview at the March ACME show, to be held in Bromley's backyard of Rosemont, Ill.

But Lauran is quick to point out that she couldn't do it alone. She has the very capable help of Joe Bundra, her vice president of sales. She describes him as "the hardest worker she knows." Joe and Lauran, the core of Bromley Inc., work closely on a daily basis and are making plans to open more Funlands throughout the Chicago area.

Other key employees include engineer John Kubik, software engineer Vito Caporusso, and field technician Mike Modrzejowski.

# **Emphasize quality service** and game reliability



s an operator in the highly competitive market of the greater New York area, I can trace one of the key elements of our operation's continued success to a principle set down by my grandfather: if you want customers to enjoy themselves, you must provide a facility with games that work!

At our facilities, the philosophy is simple: every flipper, drop-target, bumper, button, pedal, and coin mech **must work** or the customer is entitled to a complete refund. In my opinion, this policy has contributed to the success of some of our original family game centers.

A typical business hears from only four percent of its dissatisfied customers. About 96 percent just go away; 91 percent never come back. If you apply these statistics another way, it could mean these customers might never try a game again if one does not work correctly the first time.

A common problem for arcade operators is the **unnoticed** game that is not working properly. Machines without sound, indicator lights, or functional input/output controls (joysticks, buttons, accelerator pedals, etc.), will make far less money than they should. Unless there is a knowledgeable employee interested enough to attend to these problems, customers will walk away unhappy and usually not tell anyone about it.

Maintenance reviews must be performed periodically. These should cover not only input/output controls, indicator lights, and sound volume, but also locks and security measures, game cleanliness, and option settings.

It's not necessary to have a technician perform the review function. A properly trained arcade change attendant is capable of constantly checking for common machine ailments that can affect your business. This type of training takes time, patience, and a willingness to learn on the part of the trainee.

Some items can be checked at any time. Indicator lights, loose controls, or obviously broken parts can be found and repaired immediately, or the game can have an out-of-order sign placed on it until a technican arrives.

Other problems are seen only while the game is being played. This takes more effort on the part of the employee and may entail giving a customer refund. Showing customers that quality is a top priority in your location is one of the best ways to promote repeat play. A customer refund is a powerful way to send this message.

This attitude also tells customers that if they alert you to a problem on a game you will reward them with a free game. The result is that the vocal four percent of dissatisfied customers now work with you to provide a better facility for all.

Start training your staff to be observant and maintain the quality of the products you've spent so much time to select and so much money to purchase. This mindset of quality assurance is the one thing you can do to increase customer satisfaction and long-term repeat play.  $\square$

# Drew's builds on family tradition

Young Hugh Andrews II came to love and understand the coin machine business at an early age. One of his most vivid memories is that of rolling nickels with a hand-held device when accompanying his parents on their collection rounds for Andrews Amusement Co.

"I loved it and was interested from day one," he says with an affectionate tone. Andrews officially started working for his dad at age 12; by the time he turned 17 he had decided to make the amusement business his career. Andrews took the \$8,000 his folks had saved for his college education and bought his first building, a beer tavern. He rented it and installed his own games there.

Horace Hugh and Geraldine Andrews worked long hours seven days a week managing a route of jukeboxes, pool tables, bingo pinball machines, and other equipment. Their strong work ethic made an impression on their son, who bought a half-interest in the family route in 1974, then the other half in 1978. He opened Drew's Distributing Co. in 1981 when he was president of the South Carolina Coin Operators Association.

"I'd been involved with the association for years and knew all the operators," explains Andrews. "I envisioned distributing as a way to buy the games I needed for my route at a discount, as well as to sell games to my friends across the state. At first it was a sideline; I never dreamed it would turn out to be such a good business."

Andrews could see that the state was leaning toward operating draw poker games. He aligned himself with a manufacturer in New Jersey and started handling that company's products in South Carolina. In 1983 he entered the manufacturing field and started producing his own games.

At present, Drew's Distributing Co. manufactures the following games: Treasure Chest video poker (four single-game models), Respin 8 video slot machine, Deuce's Wild and Double-Up poker games, Monte Carlo 8-line, and Jackpot Bingo video bingo. In addition, the M1A and M2 changers are manufactured at the 12,500-square-foot company headquarters in Spartanburg, S.C. Drew's plans to expand this year and double the size of its physical plant.

On the distributing side, the company represents U.S. Games (Pot-O-Gold and Bar Brain), Eagle-Wing (Dream Jack and slot

machines), Mikohn (progressive jackpots), IGCA (live craps games), Blitz (Bank Robber), Excellent Systems (Dream 9), Mars Electronics, Mali billiard cloth and cues, Valley cues, Norwood cues, and Eagle Lift lift gates. Quite a jump from the first tavern location.

## South Carolina's unique situation

Whenever a list of legal gaming jurisdictions is published, South Carolina's name does not appear. Video gaming devices have been legal there since 1978, an exception to the state's gambling laws. Each game must be licensed; the fee is \$1,500 per unit per year (some two-year license terms, some one-year).

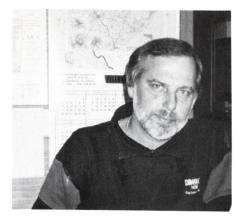
Video poker and 8-line games can be found in convenience stores, restaurants, taverns, bowling centers, truck stops, and washaterias—just about anywhere. The games cannot pay out money directly; accumulated credits are cashed in at the register. The low-profile operation of the games changed in 1991 when a Supreme Court ruling brought attention to the loophole in the law that allows payoffs on the games.

According to Andrews, suddenly South Carolina went from approximately 15,000 video poker and 8-line games to 24,000 in one year. When as many as 30 games began to appear under one roof, public concern led to more regulations, something SCCOA members had wanted for years.

A law passed in 1993 limits the number of games per location to eight, with no one under the age of 21 allowed to play. Central computer system accountability will be required down the road, by July 1, 1995. In four-and-a-half years all games in the state must be random generating, a totally different animal than existing games on location.

Can operators in the state hope to keep current poker and 8-line games and merely make adjustments? Says Andrews, "I don't believe this is possible for several reasons. First, the program for these games would have to be totally rewritten, and I don't believe there's enough in the hardware design to make the necessary changes. Second, there's also not enough hardware to go on-line with a statewide computer. Third, the state is going to require that acceptable games be tested in a gaming lab."

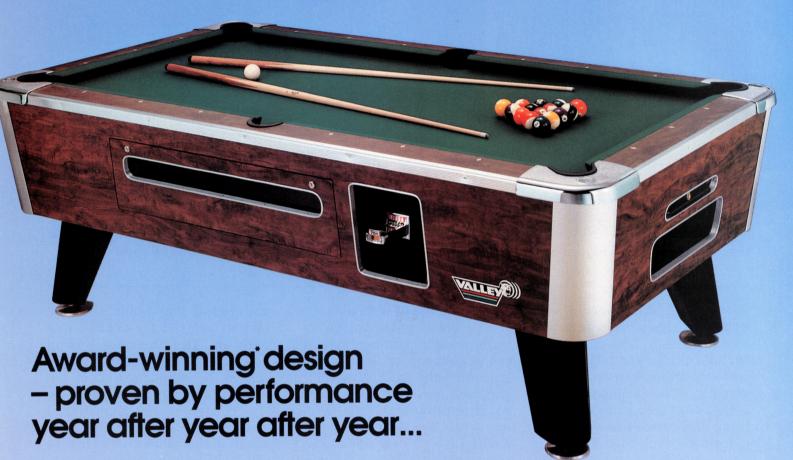
A statewide referendum (county by county) looms ahead in November, at which time voters will be asked whether to keep video poker legal in the state.

Andrews points out, "A lot of people don't realize how much these games have helped small businesses stay in business. The economy has grown substantially over the years because we've been able to operate these games. We were always in momand-pop-type stores. I would like to see that protected, as opposed to seeing small-scale casinos with 40-50 games."

While there's been a decided slowdown in coin machine operator-backed efforts to obtain legalized video gaming, does Andrews still see a future for gaming?

In his words, "The market is exploding in terms of Indian gaming." On other fronts: "Here in South Carolina I hope for coin machine operators to be involved as much as ever. At Drew's we've been working on legal gaming machines for the industry for the last few years."

Few outside of the manufacturing ranks understand the time and money that go into game research and development. Andrews concedes: "I can see where you can sink \$1 million into developing a game with no problem at all. In our *Treasure Chest* and

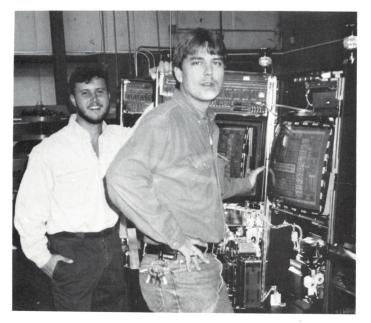

Respin 8 we have probably spent \$400,000 on the game concept and cabinet design. And that doesn't include the board." The games were developed in conjunction with Eagle Wing of Japan.

He adds, "You go to sell something and customers want to buy it for \$100 over cost. They don't realize what you've already invested in the game."

While quietly handling its own affairs, South Carolina has felt pressure from out-of-state interests looking for gaming opportunities. "I feel like the carpetbaggers have moved to the state," comments Andrews. "They come here promoting land-based casinos and pari-mutuel betting. I don't see any succeeding, with the exception of a lottery. I expect to see lottery lobbying in the Legislature this year."

The state constitution prohibits a lottery but, says Andrews, "The concept seems to be well accepted here, with 66 percent of the citizens in favor. People don't see a lottery as being something you can overdo. It's probably the same as other gambling but isn't perceived that way."

## Games of yesterday, today, and tomorrow

Since video gaming equipment is the mainstay at Drew's, which games are the most popular? "For the past three years or so the most popular game for us has been the *W*-7 8-line," answers Andrews. "Our new video lottery-type games seem to have the most interest at this time."

the product line. Notes Andrews: "When the fad for cranes was over and the business slowed down at the end of the '80s, we ceased to manufacture them. We haven't seen it as a market for us; the return is not significant enough. We could build them again if the market was not so soft."

Andrews attributes the down-

To what does he attribute the success of 8-liners? "I think it's the fact that they resemble a slot machine, are easy to play, and provide a high 'hit rate.' You win nearly every hand. A lot of times you don't win as much as you bet, but something is happening all the time."

Tiger Paw cranes, both standard and jumbo, were once high on the demand list at Drew's. Now the games are no longer in

turn in cranes to several factors, one being inferior product on the market. "Some companies geared up, thinking it would be tremendous, and ended up with inventory they couldn't sell. At first, people played the cranes to WIN. They played for everything at the beginning, then they got particular. There's still a place for cranes but now it takes a special place."

Does the company have any

plans on the drawing board for new products in 1994? "We're experimenting with some new games," notes Andrews. "For example, a six-player craps game. We may be approaching the era of games where five or six people sit down together to play. It could become a new category of equipment, one that we could distribute in South Carolina."

Andrews admits that he is so geared to gaming equipment that it's difficult to stay in-tune with other available product. "The arcade pieces, they're hard to keep up with, hard to pay for, and you can't charge enough to get a good return on investment. But it's been that way for 10-12 years.

"The biggest concern of our customers who buy gaming equipment is the higher cost of new games. They're waiting to see what happens with the fall referendum. That means major sales of new gaming equipment will come after November this year."

### All in the family

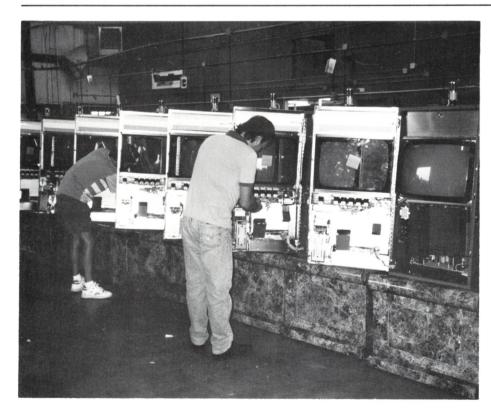

# Income forecasting: the only way to depreciate

n mid-1993 the IRS issued a private letter ruling that allowed coin machine operators to use the income forecasting method of depreciation. Even though some operators had already been using it, the ruling provided an important precedent. This significant victory, secured by AMOA and, more specifically, immediate past president Craig Johnson, means operators can now defer thousands of dollars using this method.

With April 15 not far away, we thought it would be a fitting time to speak with operators who have either used the income forecasting method for years or who have only recently discovered its benefits. Either way, their message is clear: if you operate games—especially video games—and don't use the income forecasting method, it's time to give it serious thought.

"The number one thing the income forecasting method allows operators to do is depreciate the equipment while it's earning."

### Background

(Note: The following background information comes from a booklet prepared by the international accounting firm of Deloitte & Touche in Salt Lake City, which assisted AMOA and Johnson.)

Prior to 1981, video games were depreciated over a period of 24 months or less. For video games purchased between 1981 and 1986, Congress increased the depreciable life to five years. Under the current federal tax depreciation rules (MACRS), a video machine is depreciated over a five- or seven-year life, depending upon whether the

machine is considered a computer or entertainment equipment. In the volatile video game industry, either a five- or seven-year life grossly overstates the actual operating period of most video arcade machines. In fact, video games generally lose most of their public appeal after the first or second year.

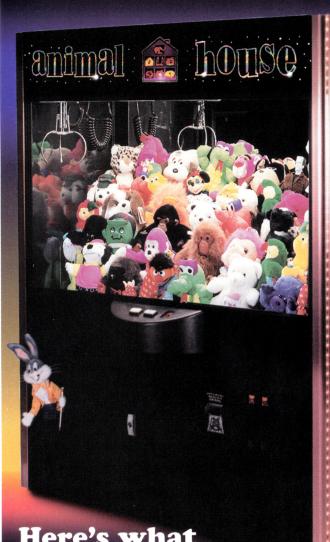
Congress has allowed other entertainment industries, such as the motion picture and publishing industries, to avoid MACRS useful life classifications and use the income forecast depreciation method. The income forecasting method recognizes that certain assets generate uneven flows of income and have unique incomeproducing potential.

Video games fall within this classification since the income potential for video games is wholly dependent upon public appeal. For example, under the income forecasting method the movie "Jurassic Park" would likely be depreciated over a longer period than the movie "Last Action Hero" since "Jurassic Park" has shown a stronger audience appeal, which may continue for a longer period.

In a recent private letter ruling, the IRS allowed a video game operator (Johnson) to use the income forecasting method of depreciation for federal tax purposes. While the IRS states that the ruling cannot be cited as legal authority, it reflects the IRS's current position on a national level with respect to the use of the income forecasting method for video machines. As such, local IRS agents should consider the private letter ruling when examining an operator's method of depreciation.

In the past, IRS auditors who have disallowed the use of the

income forecasting method did so because no specific IRS ruling allowed such a method for video games. Now that the IRS has issued a private letter ruling allowing it, the video operator's next concern should be to establish a reasonable method for calculating depreciation using income forecasting. Only industries such as the motion picture and publishing industries have been previously authorized to use it, and most of the IRS's written direction for calculating depreciation under the income forecasting method was intended for those industries.

### Tax benefits of using income forecasting

Again, according to Deloitte & Touche, "Most of the tax savings from using the income forecasting method are found in the year new machines are purchased and placed into service. Based upon a survey of video game operators that we performed, the average income forecasting depreciation percentages, as compared to fiveand seven-year MACRS depreciation percentages over a fiveyear period, are as follows":

For example, a video game purchased for \$3,000 and depreciated in the first year would result in a tax deferral of \$252 as opposed to depreciating the asset using fiveyear MACRS. Such deferral assumes a 28 percent tax bracket and no salvage value for the video game.

Randy Chilton, **Chilton Vending** 

Chilton, the current AMOA treasurer, says income forecasting is the association's greatest achievement in 20 years.

"The number one thing the income forecasting method allows operators to do is depreciate the equipment while it's earning. Over a 20-year period, it doesn't matter a hill of beans how vou depreciate vour equipment. But what income forecasting allows you to do is depreciate the product while it's earning the majority of its revenue, which is good because that's when you've got to pay for it. Secondly, when you elect to use income forecasting, it no longer falls under the acid test of the alternative minimum tax method.'

He estimates that mediumsized operating companies, depending on their level of video game purchasing, could save between \$30,000-\$50,000 in any given tax year. As for that level of purchasing, Chilton says it doesn't matter if you buy one video game or 100-income forecasting is the way to go. "It simply

cranes, and other steady-earning equipment.

"There's a big difference; look at the revenue stream," he explained. "A pool table will still be good in 10 years. Buy a video game and a pool table today and consider their likelihood of actual use over 10 years; it's a dramatic difference. Operators need to make a category-by-category decision. You don't have to use income forecasting for all of your equipment."

If an operator's accountant isn't familiar with the income forecasting method of depreciation, "make sure he becomes familiar. This is just too important not to take advantage of it," Chilton concluded.

### Tony Parina, Parina Enterprises

Parina has been using the income forecasting method for eight years. After going back and forth with him as to whether the method could be used, the IRS gave its approval, albeit implicitly. Why didn't that translate into a precedent for operators?

"Craig Johnson received a private letter ruling, whereas the IRS essentially told us they had no problem with us using income forecasting—but they wouldn't issue a private letter ruling," Parina explained. "They wanted \$1 million from me, and I ended up paying roughly \$300,000. At the time I used income forecasting and took ITC (investment tax credit), which is no longer available. I could only have one, so I did have to pay the \$300,000, but I did not have to pay for the use of income forecasting."

As an example of how much money can be saved, in the third year of using this method of depreciation. Parina realized a tax deferral of about \$700,000 for a video game investment in the \$5 million range.

income forecasting is ideal for equipment like video games and pinball machines, not as much so for jukeboxes, pool tables, etc. "Income forecasting has traditionally been a depreciation for the movie industry," Parina explained. "They don't know how long a movie will be popular with the paying public. Obviously 'Gone with the Wind' couldn't be written off over two years, while others could be written off in an hour-and-a-half! This same situation exists for operators of video games."

Not everyone, however, is a candidate for using income forecasting, Parina says.

"A lot of people operate equipment that isn't 100 percent legal," he said. "Therefore they will not be able to use this method, because detailed, accurate accounting is needed. If you have gray games all over the place and are paying under the table, you better stay away from income forecasting; it's a free ticket to jail. But those who operate legitimate games on a commission or lease basis should utilize income forecasting."

To illustrate how painstaking income forecasting is, Parina gave the following example:

"Every game—each unit—has to be set up on income. Let's say you have a Mortal Kombat II that started out at a pizza parlor, went to a bowling center, then back to another pizza parlor, then was broken because someone stole the board out of it. The different locations will obviously experience different earnings. Here's the key: you can't take your purchase of 40 Mortal Kombat IIs and try to come up with a value on it. You must track each and every one of them and determine what the income was for the year and what you expect it to be in the future."

Is it all worth it? "In my opinion,

yes, by all means," Parina concluded.

### Wendell Cannon, Amusement Games of Texas

Cannon had been using a form of income forecasting prior to being audited by the IRS. At the audit he was told that he shouldn't be using income forecasting; Cannon disagreed. On the eve of going to court, he settled with the IRS, but not before spending about \$113,000 in legal and accounting fees and interest for a \$21,000 tax bill. "It was a real horror story: I never want to have to go through that again," Cannon said. He was audited for 1988, 1989, and 1990. Despite having charts, graphs, industry figures, income forecasts, etc., which substantiated that his video games dropped over 50 percent in value after the first year, the IRS would hear nothing of it. At an 11th hour meeting before going to court, Cannon and the IRS reached a settlement.

"One of the main reasons they settled was because I was using the income forecasting method, or at least a derivative of it," Cannon said. "I believe that had we gone to court, we could've proven that the games do deteriorate quickly in value and that the income forecast method is a valid method of depreciation. I think the IRS would've received an adverse ruling.

"I've switched to a pure income forecasting method. I contend that you can use it for any amusement equipment that takes a quarter. But be careful that you accurately ascertain what the income is going to be and what percentage is going to be obtained in the first year, second year, and third year. That said, the only safe way to depreciate equipment—especially video games—is using income forecasting. Otherwise you take seven-year MACRS, which is a catastrophe."

Cannon says a real no-no is storing old, never-to-be-used-again games in a warehouse. "Most operators will take their old pieces off the route and keep them in the warehouse; that's a mistake," he said. "Sell them or throw them in the junkpile! That's the only thing that saved me. Otherwise the IRS can come in and say, 'The games are still here, aren't they? You have to apply seven-year MACRS to them all.' Boom, the operator's dead."

In the most emphatic of terms, Cannon concluded: "Quit fooling around with alternative methods of depreciation. If your accountant doesn't know how to use income forecasting or doesn't want to, fire him! As for the IRS, they're nothing but a bunch of crooks."

Finally, here's how Craig Johnson sums up the private letter ruling allowing income forecasting: "Income forecasting depreciation, simply put, gives video game owners the ability to properly account for their assets. This means that you are not giving the government your money in advance of when it is rightfully due. By depreciating video games using the income forecasting method, you can keep very accurate books and at all times know what your business is doing and where you stand.

"This year video game owners will keep hundreds of thousands of dollars that would have been paid to the government if they had not been using income forecasting. With the ability of computers today, keeping track of your equipment for the use of income forecasting is not difficult."

# Retire, but don't sell your business

his war story is true. A reader of this column—let's call him Joe recently called with a typical request: "Irv, I want to retire. Will you value my business so I know how much to sell it for?"

After a short conversation, two important parts of Joe's financial picture puzzle came into clear focus: 1) Joe's business was valuable and would be easy to sell, but 2) the tax cost would be murder. Unfortunately, many readers, like Joe, are in the same boat; they just don't know it.

An in-depth consultation a few weeks later completed the puzzle. Joe is 62 years old, has two kids—a son and a daughter—in the business and one son who is not interested in the business. Joe owns all of the stock of Family Co., a C corporation (a tax-paying corporation). Family Co. owns appreciated assets-land, buildings, and goodwill—that are worth about five times their book value on the company's books. Goodwill, as is usually the case, is not on the books or, put another way, is put on the books for zero.

Joe started the business 31 years ago with \$1,800 of his own and a large loan from his dad. To keep it simple, let's say that Joe's tax basis for the Family Co. stock is zero.

Now the economic facts and the tax problem. The business, including the appreciated assets, is worth about \$2.5 million. Great! The tax hit to the corporation is about \$.6 million. What happens when Joe takes the \$1.9 million balance out of the corporation? Another tax hit. This time about \$570,000. True enough, the \$1,330,000 left is a nice bundle of

cash, but not nearly enough for the after-tax investment income (estimated at \$60,000 to \$80,000 before taxes per year, depending on interest rates) to maintain the retirement lifestyle Joe and his wife have dreamt about. For Joe to pay almost half of the business's value in taxes to accomplish his retirement goal is insanity. What to do?

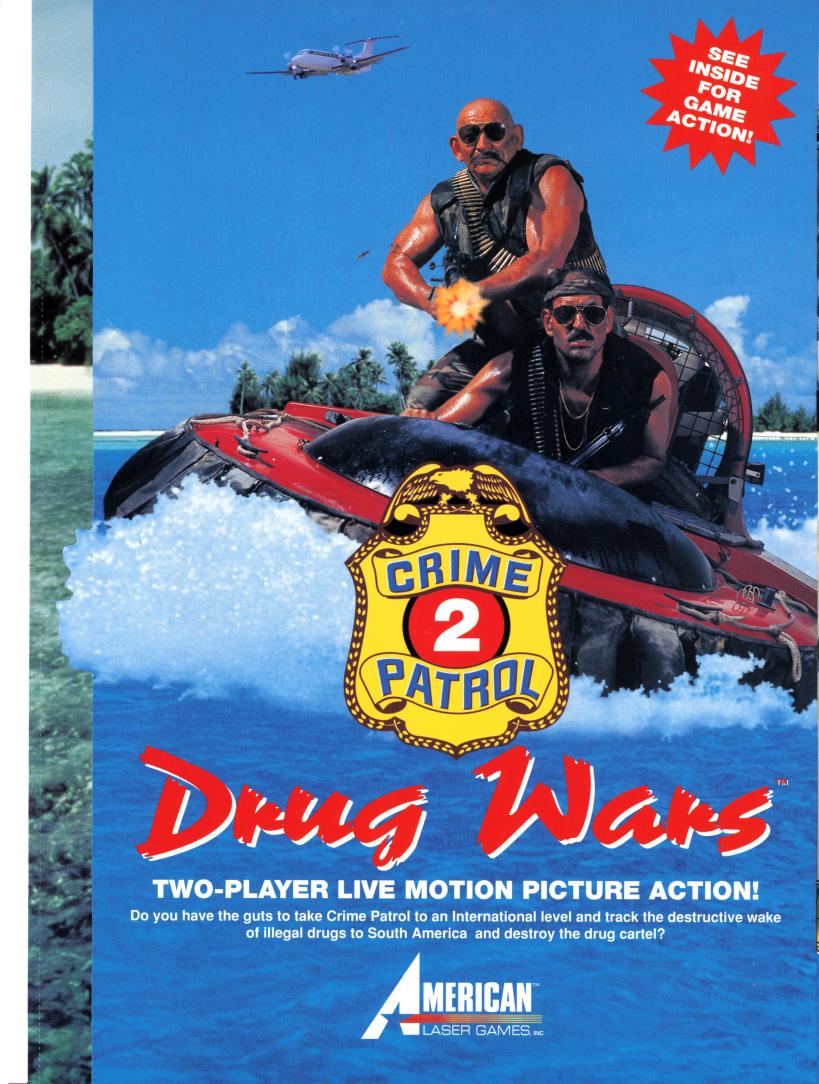
Don't sell the business. Keep it. Without covering every detail, here's the basic plan we worked out for Joe. Family Co. elected S corporation status. Joe retired; the kids run the business anyway. Yes, Joe consults—working half days—about six to 10 times a month, except in the winter when he goes south.

Family Co. usually made \$300,000 to \$450,000 per year before any salary or fringe benefits to Joe. That leaves plenty of room for Joe to take \$100,000 after taxes (more or less) of S corporation dividends to fund his annual retirement needs. We also put two plans into effect: first, a transfer of stock plan to the children, including a buy/sell agreement; and second, an estate plan for Joe and his wife, funded by insurance, that will eliminate all estate taxes.

### IRS caves in

OK, all together now. Stand and cheer. Applaud, for the IRS no less. Why? Because the IRS has finally come over to our side on a how-to-value-your-closely-held-business issue that will save you and your family a bundle of taxes.

Here's the story. For over 20 years, my office—via these articles, special reports, valuation

books, and actual reports valuing closely held businesses for tax purposes—has been screaming at the IRS, "We are entitled to take a minority discount when a majority owner of a closely-held business transfers a minority interest to one or more of his children or grandchildren." Over the years, the courts have agreed with my position; the IRS has not.

Now the IRS agrees—in writing. This is what the IRS says in Revenue Ruling 93-12: "A minority discount will not be disallowed solely because a transferred interest, when aggregated with interests held by family members, would be part of a controlling interest."

The ruling offers this practical example: "P owned all of the single outstanding class of stock of X corporation. P transferred all of his shares by making simultaneous gifts of 20 percent of the shares to each of his five children: A, B, C, D, and E."

Let's translate the example into dollars for your business. Suppose X Corp. is your business and is valued at \$3 million. Everyone agrees with the value, even the IRS. In our office we would typically take a discount for general lack of marketability (usually in the 35 percent range) and an additional discount for minority interest that would bring the total discounts to 45 percent, or \$1,350,000 (\$3 million x 45 percent). This means that the value of your business for tax purposes is only \$1.650,000 (\$3 million minus \$1,350,000).

The IRS has accepted the marketability discount theory for years. Adding the minority discount theory to the IRS's acceptance list puts us (the business valuation appraisers and you—the business owners) in the driver's seat. Now the IRS can only argue the amount of the discount, and as long as our discounts are

reasonable (like the percentages used above), you are on solid ground.

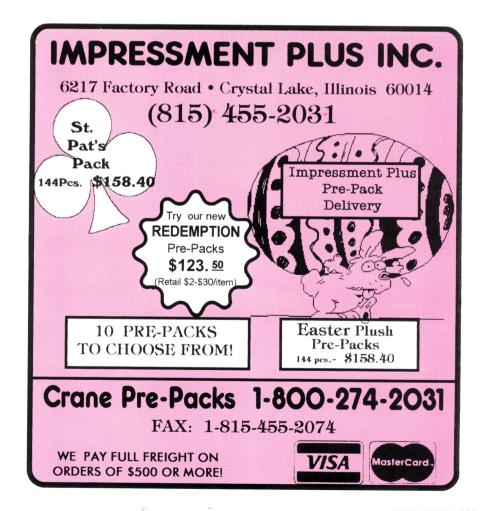
# Two magic bullets to help you beat the tax collector

Do you really know the true tax cost of every dollar you earn? Most people don't, not even successful people.

Let's crunch the numbers. To make it easy, assume you're in a 30 percent income tax bracket—a 50 percent estate tax bracket. After you read this you may want to substitute your actual brackets. Also consider what Washington did to tax brackets in 1993. And

don't forget that your home state gets a piece of your tax action.

For example, if you make \$1 the first 30 cents goes for income tax. You've still got 70 cents, which you save and some day die with. Now the estate tax robs half: 35 cents goes to the IRS and 35 cents goes to your family. Yep! The tax collector gets 65 cents (usually more) of every dollar you earn and save. Your family gets 35



cents and often less.

Let's apply this basic (but unfortunately true) example to the two kinds of assets you own: tax-paid and tax-deferred. Tax-paid assets (like cash, CDs, stocks, bonds, etc. that you bought out of savings) will be clobbered by a 50 percent estate tax when you pass on. Or put another way, each additional \$1 million in your estate is only worth \$500,000 to your family. Sorry!

Now what about tax-deferred assets (like the funds you have in a pension plan, profit-sharing plan, 401(k), or an IRA)? Better sit down. Ready? Take \$1 out. Just like the basic example: the result is 65 cents to the tax collector, 35 cents to your family. Or put another way, each additional \$100,000 of your tax-deferred assets is only worth \$35,000 to

vour family!

What happens if you die with the funds still in the tax-deferred plan? Same thing. Only 35 cents out of every dollar to your family.

OK, now you might take a few minutes (or a few hours) to pencil out what your estate is really worth.

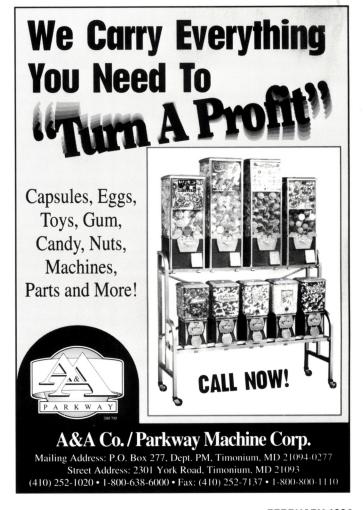
Now here's some exciting news. We have developed a new concept that beats the estate tax—legally. Best of all, if you or your spouse is insurable, it always works. In a nutshell, here's how. It's a three-step process.

Let's use \$1 million as an example (your amount can be higher or lower and assets can be taxpaid or tax-deferred, in any combination). We're going to apply the concept to tax-paid assets:

Step #1: Buy a \$1 million singlepremium immediate-pay life annuity (assume you are a 64-year old male and your wife is 59). You will immediately begin to receive \$108,000 (the amount varies with age, sex, and current interest rates) per year as long as you live. A portion of the \$108,000 is tax-free. Remember that a portion of that \$108,000 is a return of your \$1 million. The tax is only \$19,973, leaving \$88,027 of spendable cash. Now, the first magic bullet—when you die, there is zero estate tax. Why? The annuity has no value at your death.

Step #2: Buy a \$1 million second-to-die policy (on your life and your wife's life). The cost is \$20,905 per year, leaving you \$67,122 in after-tax (and after the cost of the insurance) spendable income every year. That's a 6.71 percent return after taxes. Compare it to your current rate

of return.

For years I have been telling my business clients—with tongue in cheek—that one of the first rules for saving taxes is "If you pay it, deduct it. If you can't deduct it, don't pay it—or cut the cost."

Well, let me tell you why this old quote is appropriate here. Life insurance premiums are not deductible. Whole life premiums are never deductible. With one minor group-term exception, term life insurance premiums are not deductible. Yet millions of business owners (for various reasons) own term life insurance policies. The bet, technically called premium, gets higher every year. And it ain't deductible.

# Stock bonuses: a great way to transfer stock

The family business, an S corporation, is worth about \$2 million. You would like to give Ann five percent of the corporation, a \$100,000 gift. Such a large gift has gift tax consequences. 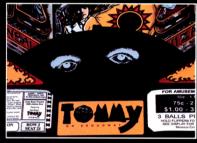
A stock bonus can do some neat tax tricks for most business owners with this kind of problem. Suppose Your Co. gives Ann a \$100,000 bonus—not in cash, but in stock in the company. The tax consequences are near perfection. Ann must pay income tax on the \$100,000. No doubt you can make a gift to Ann of the cash to pay this tax. Where will you get the money? Well, the \$100,000 stock bonus is deductible by Your Co. That will reduce the corporation's profits and your tax burden. Simply put, Ann pays tax on the \$100,000 while you get a deduction (through the S corporation).

Can anything go wrong with this tax plan to get stock and money out of your business? Yes,

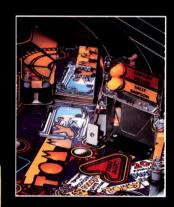

two things. First, the IRS may attack by saying Ann's compensation is unreasonable. This problem is easily solved by paying out the stock bonus over a period of two or more years.

Secondly, the IRS may attack the valuation of the shares.

Having a competent business appraiser value the shares issued as a bonus is the easy way to avoid any conflict with the IRS. And remember, the value of the shares is entitled to two significant discounts: a discount for general lack of marketability and

a discount for a minority interest. Combined, these discounts are in the 35 to 45 percent range.

One more point. This technique can be used by a regular tax-paying C corporation, as well as by an S corporation.  $\square$ 

## 401(k) plans: a sure tax winner

Do you know what successful business owners identify as their favorite long-term tax-saving technique? Hands down, a qualified pension or profit-sharing plan always wins. And why not?

Where else can you control your tax-saving goodies every step of the way? You get a tax deduction when you put money into the plan's trust; the earnings of the trust accumulate tax free; and when you take your share out of the trust, a special averaging break cuts your tax burden.

Can you match or even beat the tax benefits listed? Well, maybe you can with a 401(k) plan. Actually, a 401(k) plan is an old-fashioned profit-sharing plan with a wonderful twist—the employee can make deductible contributions to the employer's plan.

Here's an example: Success Co. establishes a 401(k) plan that allows employees to contribute up to 10 percent of their compensation to the plan. Bart, who earns \$50,000 per year and is in a 30 percent tax bracket (including state income taxes), contributes \$5,000 to the plan. You'll love the tax results. Bart's income for the year is only \$45,000 (\$50,000 minus \$5,000). His income tax saving is \$1,500 (\$5,000 x 30 percent).

The most important feature of the plan is that contributions made by the employee get the same tax benefits as employer contributions to a regular profitsharing plan—the contributions are deductible. Better yet, from the employer's viewpoint, the company provides a solid tax opportunity to the employee without using one dollar of company money to fund the plan. Can high-paid executives and stockholder/employees contribute? Yes. Is a 401(k) plan right for your company? The answer depends on a host of factors, but here's a list that tells if your company is a likely candidate:

- 1) Your current profit-sharing plan is subject to the top-heavy rules. You are forced to make a minimum three percent contribution for all eligible employees.
- 2) You currently have a thrift plan. Your employees are making nondeductible contributions to your present plan.
- 3) The cost of a traditional plan is too high. You must include too many non-key employees.

4) Your profit margins are low. Since you can't afford to make contributions, you never installed a qualified plan.

tion if the entertainment occurred under circumstances where there was little or no possibility of engaging in the active conduct of business.

Sure, the activity was businessrelated and of a general economic benefit to Go Go. Even the IRS conceded that. But the fact remains that such activities are primarily non-deductible goodwill.

Could the deduction have been saved? Yes. If the agenda had included bona fide and substantial business discussions before or after the fun time activities, the golf outing expenses would have been 100 percent deductible.

## Golf tax bogie

There are sand traps and there are tax traps. This sad tale involves both. Here's the story. A company—let's call it Go Go Inc.—promoted a three-day golf outing at a resort. The agenda was vacation-like: dinner and open bar the first night; golf activities with dinner, followed by awards the second day; and departure after breakfast on the

last day. The festivities were enjoyed by 49 employees of Go Go and 108 representatives of customers.

Can Go Go deduct the expenses of the outing—food, lodging, golf fees, prizes, and transportation? No, says the IRS (Letter Ruling 8315006). Shocked? Don't be. The IRS is right. The law clearly does not allow a deduc-

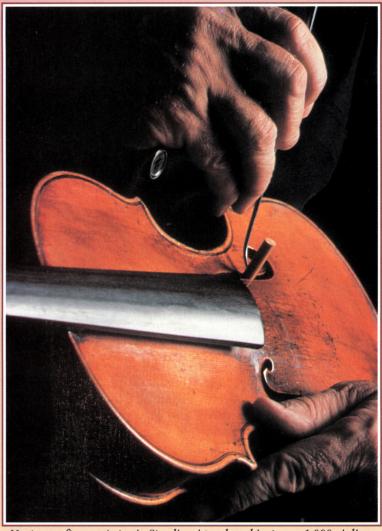

# Cut their pay and your employees will love you



uried in the IRS Code is a provision with great potential and a very unlikely name. Salary Reduction Plans let you and your employees pay for fringe benefits with before-tax dollars, lowering federal income tax liability and, in many cases, state and local income taxes as well.

Anything involving the IRS is a minefield of Is and Ts and red tape. Let's see if we can get to the other side. Here's how a basic Salary Reduction Plan works.

Suppose you pay the health insurance premium for your employees, but not their dependents. Through payroll deductions, employees electing dependent coverage pay \$50 per month. With a Salary Reduction Plan, the dependent premium is subtracted from gross earnings to determine taxable income. An employee earning \$18,000 annually pays taxes on \$17,400 and, at a 15 per-

cent tax rate, saves \$90 in federal income tax, plus possible state and local income tax savings. Now \$600 insurance premiums cost \$510 or less.

There are hoops to jump through to implement the plan, i.e., filing forms with the IRS. After that, your present payroll procedures remain basically intact, but Box 10 on the employees' W2s (wages, tips, and other compensation) show the reduced gross pay.

Important: There are Social Security (FICA) and Medicare tax savings to the employee and the employer under some Salary Reduction Plans, but not others. See your accountant or benefits advisor for details.

Though vou won't see a substantial dollar savings from this program, it's an almost no-cost benefit you can provide employees (and yourself). Afraid of being tarred and feathered at an employee meeting announcing a Salary Reduction Plan? Call it something else. Salary Conversion Plan sounds better, or use another IRS term, Cafeteria Plan.

You can stop reading the magazine and tell the bookkeeper to make these changes. Or you can wait and consider the best time to implement the plan. We all face inevitable annual increases in medical premiums. If employees pay part of the cost, you might time the Cafeteria Plan to begin with the next premium increase, softening the blow.

However, with health care reform looming large on the horizon, you may want to begin now, while tax savings are definitely available. Whatever you do, before implementing any of the suggestions in this article, talk to

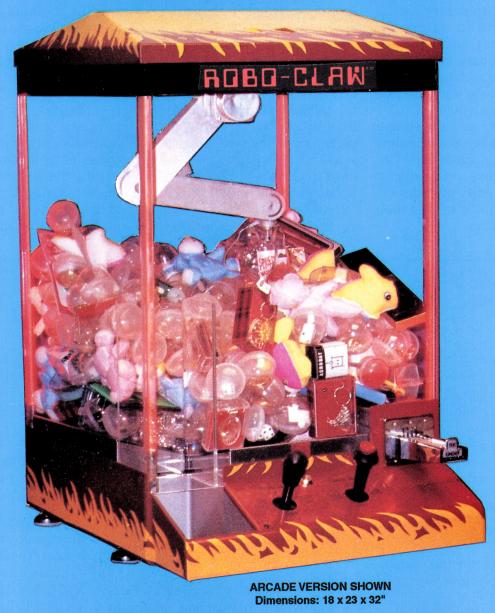

## Other benefits eligible for salary reduction

Besides insurance premiums, Cafeteria Plans apply to other benefits, but time and administrative costs increase. Under current tax rules, a portion of dependent care costs (child, elderly, disabled), subject to salary limitations, are allowed as credits against federal income tax. Covering these care costs under a Cafeteria Plan reduces employees' taxable income and may provide greater tax savings.

David Sharkey, a tax manager with the international accounting firm of Arthur Andersen & Co., says each employee must decide whether tax credits or a dependent care account is best in their individual situation.

Employees who opt to cover dependent care cost in a Cafeteria Plan determine their monthly care expenses; you subtract that amount from their gross pay just like the insurance premiums above. The funds are withheld from employees' wages and individual accounts track employee contributions. Periodically, employees present care cost receipts; reimburse them with tax-free money they have set aside.

If you begin a care cost plan, be sure your employees understand the pitfalls. Employees decide how much to set aside at the beginning of the year. You deduct that amount from their salary until the next election date, even if their circumstances change.

If an employee doesn't use all the money in his account, they lose the funds. You can offset employee losses by distributing total unused funds in the plan to all participating employees or rolling over unused funds into the employee's account for next year.

You can't return an individual employee's excess contributions. The problem of excess funds can be minimized by the employee's careful planning. Care costs are generally easy to predict.

Another Cafeteria Plan option covers reimbursed medical expenses: deductibles, co-payments, and non-covered items (i.e., dental expenses, cosmetic surgery, and eyeglasses). The administrative procedures are the same as for care cost, but estimating the amount to set aside is more difficult. Unused funds are forfeited. Still, if the kids need a great smile, or their noses trim-

### **IRS Key Employee Rules**

If your plan provides nontaxable benefits to key employees (defined below) that are more than 25 percent of the total of the nontaxable benefits provided for all employees under the plan, key employees must include in income the value of the benefits that could have been elected. (Special rules apply to key employees concerning group life insurance.)

A key employee is any employee or former employee who, during the year, or any of the four preceding years, was:

- 1. An officer or the employer having for any year listed below, annual compensation of more than:
  - a) 1989—\$49.032
  - b) 1990—\$51,291
  - c) 1991—\$54,482
  - d) 1992-\$56,111
  - e) 1993—\$57,820

- 2. One of 10 employees having annual compensation of more than \$30,000 and owning (or considered to own under related-party rules) the largest interests in the employer.
  - 3. A five percent owner of the employer.
- 4. Or a one percent owner of the employer with annual compensation of more than \$150,000.

A related party includes members of the employee's family (including spouse, children, grandchildren, and parents). These rules also apply to certain individuals, corporations, partnerships, estates, and trusts. Related parties are treated as if each owned both his or her own interest and also the other party's interest.

med, tax-free money can be set aside for those needs. Again, the sting of forfeiture can be eased by redistributions and rollovers.

Important: Employees can submit claims for more than they've deposited in their medical expense account. If Jane begins depositing \$100 per month in January and submits a \$1,000 claim in February, you must honor it.

Where does the extra money come from? If the pool of funds from all employees is large enough, you rob Peter to pay Jane. But in the end, Jane's claim must be honored as long as she has scheduled deposits for that year sufficient to cover it. This means you may be out-of-pocket funding employee medical expenses.

What if Jane leaves the company before depositing enough to cover the money paid to her? The answer isn't pretty. You suffer the loss. Because of the potential liability, you may only want to implement a medical expense plan if your business has low employee turnover and screens its employees well.

Other plans can also be funded

with before-tax dollars. Sharkey explains that while 401(k) plans and SEP plans are not Cafeteria Plans, they operate in much the same way.

There are two common types of 401(k) plans: profit-sharing and savings. Under the 401(k) profit-sharing plan, you *must* make contributions to the plan on behalf of your employees. Typically, companies match part of their employees' tax-deferred contribution up to a predetermined percentage of salary. For example, you might match employees' contributions 50 cents on the dollar up to six percent of their salary; employees may contribute up to 10 percent of their salary.

For a small business a 401(k) profit-sharing plan may not make sense, unless it substitutes for all or part of a general salary increase. Even then, administration (accounting, investment decisions, vesting provisions) can be difficult to do yourself, or expensive contracted out. You might consider a 401(k) savings plan or a SEP plan instead.

Employees make tax-deferred contributions to a 401(k) savings plan with no employer match.

Limiting investment options cuts down administration and expense. A SEP plan is even less of an administrative burden.

A SEP plan is a self-directed Individual Retirement Account funded by regular payroll deductions. Employers may choose to match all or part of employees' contributions to a SEP. Employees determine how much to deduct from their pay (subject to IRS rules). You send their money (along with your contribution, if any) to the bank, investment firm, etc., that the employee designates.

After that, the employee decides what to do with the money. The process for your business is no more complicated than payroll deductions, U.S. Savings Bonds, or the United Way.

"Small and medium-size companies compete with each other and with large companies for employees," says Sharkey. "Cafeteria Plans, 401(k)s and SEPs give a small company a low-cost way to attract and keep competent people."

Is it worth implementing any of these plans to attract qualified employees or to improve morale or relations with current employees? The accompanying table showing typical fringe benefits provided by small businesses may help you decide.

We've discussed various tax-reducing/deferring plans in their increasing order of difficulty and administrative expense. By now you've realized they're called Cafeteria Plans because employees choose which benefits they want. An employee with no dependents and good health might opt out of a medical reimbursement plan and choose the 401(k) savings plan; another might choose exactly opposite; and a third may choose both.

While Cafeteria Plans can have dizzying complexity, administra-

# IRS Nondiscrimination Rules For Highly Compensated Employees

If, in any plan year, your Cafeteria Plans discriminate in favor of highly compensated individuals as to eligibility to participate in the plan, or as to plan contributions or benefits, highly compensated participants are taxed on the amount of the taxable benefits that could have been elected. An individual or participant is highly compensated if he or she is:

- 1. An officer.
- 2. A shareholder owning more than five percent of the voting power or value of all classes of the employer's stock.
  - 3. Highly paid.
  - 4. A spouse or dependent of a person described in 1, 2, or 3.

Note: If your plan is maintained under a collective bargaining agreement it is not treated as discriminatory.

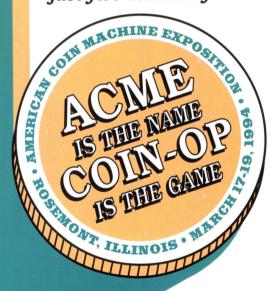

tion is made easier by a personal computer. Forrest Smith, vice president of Software Services Inc. in New Orleans, recommends the accounting program RealWorld to handle deductions and employee accounts (Real World Corp., Concord, N.H., 800-678-6336).

### A word of caution

Cafeteria Plans provide nice benefits for the owners of a small business, but may be too expensive or time consuming for all employees. Here the IRS nondiscrimination and key employee rules kick in.

If a Cafeteria Plan favors certain employees (including owners) in eligibility, contributions, or benefits, those employees are taxed on the benefits. The accompanying tables give the simplified IRS nondiscrimination rules and

key employee definitions.

For more detailed, free information about these plans, call the IRS at 800-829-3676 and request Publication 515, Business Expenses, and Publication 525, Taxable and Non-taxable Income.

Cafeteria Plans should be tailored to the specific needs of your business. Difficulties can be overcome and pitfalls avoided with planning and the advice of a com-

petent employee benefits specialist. Expert advice is especially needed in light of the new tax law, which affected the maximum salary used to calculate contributions to 401(k) and SEP plans.

Changes in IRS regulations as a result of the new tax law, and court interpretations, could cause further revisions. But working your way through the minefield will help you attract and keep good employees.

## **EMT**: a force to watch



e were witness to a madman bent on destroying everything in the place," said John Margold, head of EMT Kiddie Rides, a newly formed division of NSM-America.

"No testing lab would ever consider doing what this guy did to these things," remarked Tony Lantz, EMT's new American service manager.

"OK, it was a little crazy—a lot crazy, really—but the guy made his point," stated sales manager George Haydocy.

These were just a few of the comments made by observers of a recent durability demonstration given by Ulli Kunnecke, the president of the German-based parent company.

Dubbed "Mr. Destructo" by those witnessing the demonstration, Kunnecke was showing Margold, Lantz, Haydocy, and the rest of management the differences between EMT's kiddie rides and competitive rides. The new American company, a sister company to NSM-America that's housed in its Illinois-based facility, was formed to distribute German-made EMT rides in the American marketplace.

The "totally unscientific" demonstration took place at the loading docks in EMT's portion of the NSM-America office/warehouse facility. Kunnecke had flown in from Germany just for the demonstration and, in preparation for his visit, had asked to have, in addition to an EMT ride, three competitive rides—"any three models from any three manufacturers"—on hand for the demonstration.

The demonstration started with Kunnecke disabling overload protectors and climbing on each of the four rides. He then invited two others to join him—yes, the

full weight of all three men on one ride at the same time. Two of the four rides lasted less than five minutes before their motors started to overheat. A frame member supporting the fiberglass shell on one of the competitive models failed altogether. EMT's *Mercedes Benz*, on the other hand, passed nicely.

"That's because our motors are nearly half-horse, 110/220 volt, 4.5 AMP, asynchronous, heavy-duty motors," Kunnecke pointed out.

Then, without any warning, according to Margold, "Ulli started kicking the fiberglass shells with all the force he could muster—like a madman."

That was Kunnecke's fiberglass strength test. Again, two of the four didn't make it without severe cracking, and one had a hole in its fender about the size of a size 11 shoe. You guessed it, the EMT *Mercedes* only bore some healthy scuff marks from the "madman" episode.

But Kunnecke wasn't through. He pulled a can of rubbing compound out of his briefcase and rubbed out those scuff marks, leaving only a few scratches that could only be seen if you stood at the correct angle. "EMT's gel coat—the outer layer of fiberglass resin that is color impregnated—is exceptionally thick. If it gets scuffed, you just rub it out," Mr. Destructo explained.

Are you convinced yet? If not, there's even more; this time it's the moving test. EMT's rides are built with wheeled castors on one end, stationary feet on the other, and come with a wheeled leverage handle that slips under and raises the stationary end. You just "lever up" and walk away with the ride in tow. Kunnecke towed his *Mercedes* over to the edge of the loading dock, then

wrestled the others over one by one, making certain his observers amply appreciated all of the "grunt and groan" effort he had to go through to move the competitive rides. His ending remark was: "Enough said about mobility, gentlemen?"

With that the madman resurfaced. Kunnecke flung open the dock door and pushed his *Mercedes* off, followed by the three competitive models. According to vice president of finance Jurgen Jost, "It took us by surprise; Ulli certainly achieved the desired effect. We knew that EMT rides were very well built. We'd seen all the words and heard all the descriptions, but something like this—well, it was very impressive."

Lantz then manned the forklift and was heading out to hoist the "remains" back on the dock, when Kunnecke thought of something even more bizarre. He grabbed the water hose and preceded to wet all of the games thoroughly. The water-logged rides were put back on the dock; two were all but destroyed, the third made strange sounds when it was plugged in. The Mercedes? Intact, but showing a few healthy bruises along with a cracked windshield. With a note of confidence. Kunnecke asked two oth-

If you guessed that it ran perfectly, you were right. Kunnecke had more than made his point. And we suppose, three grown men riding up and down on a wet kiddie ride in the back of a warehouse probably makes some kind of point about management, too. Where's a camera when you need it!

A number of other more "humane" tests were run, like cutting paper along rough fiberglass edges where little fingers might reach and forcing open cash boxes that big fingers try to reach.

The rides are obviously durable, but they aren't cheap. Margold said they cost about a third more than ordinary rides. "Operators looking for an upfront bargain won't find it at EMT. On the other hand," according to Margold, "operators who are looking at long-term earnings will find that EMT rides are a real bargain."

He added, "Our rides are built to last indefinitely. Naturally, it costs us more to build these rides to last. In fact, our costs are probably half-again as much as the next guy, yet our pricing is only an average of a third more."

Kunnecke stressed that making rides that last and are as close to service-free as possible is only the first task of a kiddie ride manufacturer. But there's another key to their earnings success. Kunnecke explained, "Our rides earn more every day because we do what major toy manufacturers do—professionally design them with all the enticers that attract and interest kids."

He continued, "Toy manufacturers spend a great deal on researching and testing their products before ever putting them on the market; EMT does the same thing. Toy designers have learned how to use sounds, animation, movement, color, and

object-design in ways that capture young imaginations; EMT has honed their skills accordingly.

Margold added, "Look at the dashboard on our *Mercedes*, for example. It's filled with 36 colored, sequencing lights. Push the gas pedal and you'll hear 'Vrrrooom.' Push a button and a Mercedes-sounding horn will honk. There's a reason for all of it."

Margold and Kunnecke emphasized that to entice a child to want to ride once is not what's hard. The trick is to design a ride that stays interesting, that keeps kids coming back. They pointed out that for every 10 rides they design and test, maybe two actually ever see the marketplace.

Margold added, "Kiddie rides should look enticing to parents,

too. As enticing as the toys they buy for their kids. It's a real trick to accomplish.".

The days of kiddie rides designed on "whim and fancy" are coming to a close. Safety is another challenge when designing kiddie rides. "Overcoming the inherent conflict in designing a ride that represents a thrill to a 10-year-old, yet is safe to even a 3-year-old, is not an easy task," Kunnecke said.

But EMT has evidently accomplished it. EMT rides have passed German TUV laboratory tests and the goal is for all rides to bear the ETL Certification Seal in the near future.

Why did EMT wait until its third decade of operation to enter the American market? "It took us that long to learn the business and to get to a level of production

that we could handle more than our European market," Kunnecke explained. "Up until recently, EMT has been selling everything it could manufacture right in our own European backyard."

What can U.S. operators and fun center owners expect to see from EMT next? We doubt that you'll see any more "not-a-shred-of-scientific-value" Mr. Destructo test demonstrations. And you probably won't see German-based Kunnecke in the forefront of the American EMT effort anymore. Margold, Haydocy, Jost, and Lantz will be representing EMT products here.

But you will see a host of new ads in coin-op publications that give prospective EMT operators details on the rides. You'll also see EMT at all the shows, including ACME in March.  $\Box$

## **FAMILY FOCUS**

## Look before leaping into fun centers

his is a nice fun business. It feels so good, how can I go broke? Famous last words. A well-equipped family entertainment center in an area without the traffic to support it is doomed.

Don't let this happen to you, cautions Marshall Gardner, president of Designs International in Dallas. Gardner offered sage advice during a seminar at the third Fun Expo last fall. His suggestions bear repeating.

Gardner believes in "doing your homework up front. Better to lose a little money at the start rather than more later." The money in question pertains to "soft costs" of \$5,000-\$50,000 for such items as feasibility studies and research.

"The goal is to know your area, the marketplace, and who your real customers will be."

Gardner recommends visiting older and newer parks and family entertainment centers and observing what works and what doesn't. Gather all the print material you can get your hands on, from trade magazines and trade associations to your local library.

Know what you're trying to accomplish. To determine what you can and will spend on a family entertainment center, turn to a feasibility or demographic firm. The goal is to know your area, the marketplace, and who your real customers will be. Don't be shy; ask for a list of the firm's clients and talk to them. According to Gardner, "Ninety-five percent of those who hire architectural or feasibility firms never meet any of

the company's clients face to face."

He strongly advises, "Never let an architectural or feasibility firm buy equipment for you unless you have a fixed fee in writing. Don't be gullible. Be aware that side fees of from three to five percent may influence the decisions."

When it comes down to game and ride selections, Gardner suggests discussing maintenance with the manufacturers. Ask about product liability. Be sure it's not just your insurance company that's out on the line. Discuss trucking and moving costs.

His top amusement ride choices include family rides that accommodate both children and adults (a trend that began in '93), a child's airplane ride, bumper cars (available in three sizes), a soft play area (an element, not an entire facility), a mini-coaster for kids only, a train, a kid's model ferris wheel, an umbrella ride for smaller children, a wet boat ride, and lastly, a carousel.

Says Gardner, "Parents and grandparents love carousels but they take up a lot of space. If a carousel is to be in the amusement mix, buy an overhead-driven model. Remember, a ride the size of a carousel brings people into a location but does not earn like bumper cars and other rides."

The bottom line: plan carefully; there are no shortcuts. Gardner added, "We would like to see you succeed so you buy more equipment and stay in this business."

## **Merchandise machines**



ver the last several years, I have heard of many locations nationally removing, due to declining income, what have been and are the highest grossing amusement games on our route—cranes and rotaries.

This phenomenon has totally amazed me because with a small but consistent amount of marketing effort, these machines can and will produce the greatest amount of net revenue per square foot than any other profit center within the location.

Our typical truck stop or bowling center crane today grosses \$800-\$1,000 per week, while our typical four-player rotary merchandiser consistently earns about half that amount. I know of some locations where these same types of machines are continually averaging double these figures. After deducting an approximate average of 40 percent in merchandise costs, the \$800 crane is netting \$480 per week, while the \$400 rotary is netting \$240. Not bad for a piece of equipment that has been in the same location for several years!

Like everything else, cranes and rotaries do require some work to keep them producing week in and week out in order to keep players interested. Below are some tips to give these machines an injection of pep and an increase in revenue.

1) Visibility—Highly visible machines are, without a doubt, the best earners. If you want them to be played, don't hide them. I strongly suggest placement near the location's primary entrance, thus being exposed to the greatest flow of customer traffic.

- 2) Location/location/location— The type of person who plays these machines is typically not the video or pinball game player. Merchandise games are usually played by seniors, adults, women, and young children. By placing one of these machines in the location's game room (if it has a separate area for arcade games) you may alienate your players, and they will not venture in to play. If at all possible, keep these machines away from your other games, and as previously stated, as highly visible as possible.
- 3) Winners make players—Are vour players winning enough to make them want to come back for more? Would you continue to put 75 cents into a soda machine if it did not dispense any product? When cranes first surfaced several years ago, players would have played for a 10 percent payback. However, in today's saturated merchandise machine market, I find that a 40 to 50 percent win percentage keeps even the most sophisticated players returning. Furthermore, as legal authorities nationwide question the classification of these games as games of skill or as gambling devices, a higher win percentage will do nothing but strengthen the argument that they are indeed games of skill.
- 4) Merchandising—In most locations, the same players play these machines week after week. The following factors pertaining to merchandising are essential in order to insure success:
- a: Display—Machines should be clean. Internal lights need to be working to give the best visibility of prizes. Prizes should not be arranged so that the player has

no chance to win and should be displayed in an attractive manner.

b: Quality—Merchandise should be of an assorted quality and price range, but in all cases, merchandise should be perceived to be of real value so that players feel they are getting something for the dollars they have spent. In recent times, we have had the greatest success using watches and jumbo plush in our cranes. In addition to the perception of increased value it gives to players, it has enabled us to increase the price per play by as much as 100 percent. However, it is important to note that although the price per play has been doubled, the payout percentage still remains at 40-50 percent.

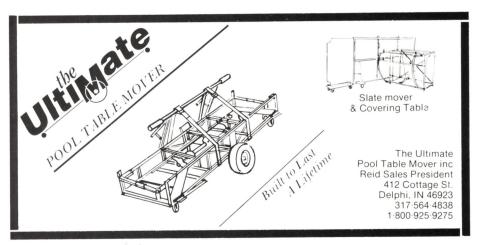
c: Rotation—Merchandise should be changed frequently so that players do not tire of the same prizes. This rotation will help sustain income levels.

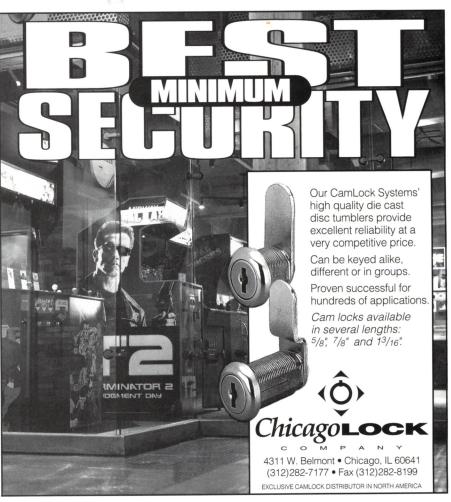
5) Model type—We have experimented with many different types of cranes and rotaries. It is my opinion that while there may be many satisfactory units by different manufacturers available, the Cadillac of crane machines is the Classic Jumbo crane by Smart Industries. Likewise, the best rotary merchandiser is the fourplayer LAX rotary by Noel Industries. While it is not my normal practice to endorse specific products, these two machines are far superior to others I've tried.

Also, most of our merchandise games, especially cranes, are equipped with dollar bill acceptor options which give credits but no change. I have found this option will increase revenues by 20 to 30 percent.

Try some of these suggestions and watch your revenues soar!  $\Box$

## The redemption myth



ombatious, the God of Arcade, looked down on his people and gave to them a gift. He called it Crane. He said you must work hard, make it always look nice, and you shall prosper.

His people took the crane with great glee. Soon cranes were prospering in every location. The people were happy. However, within a year some operators began to cut corners in an effort to save money. They also ignored cleaning out the lint. Once they failed to appease the gods, they were struck down. Their cranes were no longer making a profit and soon had to be sold.

Combatious beheld the tragedy and since he loved them, he gave them another gift to help heal the wounds. He gave them Redemption. The concept caught on and soon many operators were asking, "What can redemption do for me?" But it was the wrong question to be asking. The people should have been asking, "What can I do to make redemption work for me?"

These operators need to see that redemption is *labor intensive*. Redemption is *hard work*. But it also can be rewarding and can boost your location's profits if you are willing *to put in the effort*.

These laws are universal, and only with these laws can the gods be appeased and redemption made to prosper. If you are a true believer and a hard worker, redemption will work for you. Listen well to those who have given of themselves to please the God of Arcade.

Depending on the size of your location it can take up to \$350,000 to start up. Once you have your games and merchandise, the cost

of maintenance will go way down. At least \$5,000 of the initial start-up cost should go into your redemption counter. Your shelves should be overflowing with bright, attractive prizes and always be clean. You need to make sure your games always have plenty of tickets in them and that your prizes are not outlandishly priced.

Your employees must be kind and friendly and, most of all, make sure your redemption area looks like a retail store and not a salvage store. Your prizes and the allure of your store sell the games, not the war-torn, swapmeet motif of yesteryear. The rigors of redemption cannot be taken lightly. If you are willing to put in the work, redemption can be added to most locations and be very rewarding. From bowling centers to family entertainment locations, let redemption ring.

Two examples of operators adding redemption to perk up their locations are Stephen Shyrack of Colorado Game Exchange and Jim Holt of Bowling & Billiards in Texas. Colorado Game Exchange operates over 30 bowling centers; 15 of those are Brunswick Bowling Centers. There are locations in Colorado, Arizona, Iowa, Nebraska, and Utah. Four of the locations have redemption. There are approximately nine redemption pieces per location, 10 video, an air hockey, a pool table, a CD jukebox, and two cranes. They added redemption six weeks ago to one of the bowling centers and their base income rose 23 percent, with the gross revenue doubling or even tripling in the third week.

Stephen says that although

these figures are impressive, "redemption is not something everybody needs." He explains that you have to be sure of your location. Redemption will do best in high-traffic centers where a lot of children are present. Redemption doesn't necessarily draw more customers in, but more parents will bring their kids into a location and stay longer. Steve emphasizes the need for strong management that understands that redemption is labor intensive. A saying at Colorado Game Exchange is: "Everyone likes to look for an easier way to make more money; redemption is just the opposite."

Jim Holt also operates in existing bowling centers. He runs approximately 130 locations. Of the 15 with redemption, he says 14 are successful. The locations

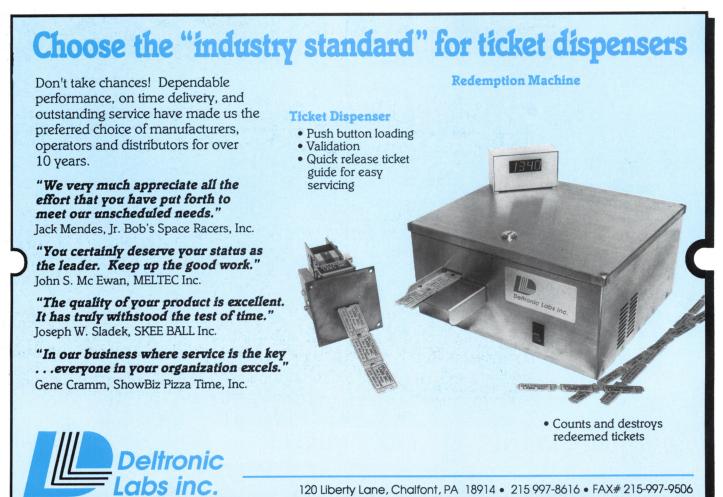
average 16-20 pieces of redemption along with video, pool, air hockey, jukeboxes, and cranes. Jim states that, in general, the gross revenue has doubled and the baseline is up 20 percent.

Secondary expenditures like food concessions also are up in these centers. Jim warns that revenues will drop after three months, but only slightly if you have strong management. He advises that redemption is viewed as a retail business. The prizes and management drive the business, not necessarily the games. Redemption can be a big boost to a location if the people want to be there.

Redemption has been added to bars, family entertainment centers, and bowling centers. On the average, game rooms will increase 20-25 percent with the gross revenue up 100-150 percent. Translated into English—redemption can be very profitable. The general advice from successful operators is this: you have to commit a lot of time. If you're not prepared to invest the time and treat redemption like a pampered child, it won't work for you.

So what's the moral to this myth? Don't eat Mexican food and stand near an open flame.  $\Box$

## Diverse trio offers challenging competition

Kombatants looking for new challenges will find their wishes fulfilled in *Mortal Kombat II*, the dedicated video from Midway Mfg. Sporting competition of a different nature awaits in Namco's *Numan Athletics*, a kit for one to four players. On the pinball side, skiing and snowboarding serve as a change-of-pace theme for Premier's *Wipe Out*. Something for everyone.

#### Mortal Kombat II

It's here! Probably the most anticipated video game sequel, following the huge success of the first *Mortal Kombat* and its accompanying home system versions and comic book merchandise.

The popularity of the game probably lies in the near-realistic digitized graphics and serious nature of the theme, as opposed to fighting-themed games with more cartoonish effects. *Mortal Kombat II* continues the adventure after the defeat of Shang Tsung and the apparent death of Goro, his servant in the original game.

Tsung's failed attempts to dominate the ancient Shaolin contest lead him to beg forgiveness from his demon master, Shao Kahn. Khan grants it and allows Tsung to kompete with other kombatants in his dark ancestral home.

Midway creators combined six new characters with six characters from the original game for battles against each other, a new half-human dragon named Kintaro, and finally Shao Kahn himself.

Raiden, Scorpion, Sub-Zero, Liu Kang, and Johnny Cage are again among the choices. Each character has slightly altered costumes and all the same techniques they previously possessed, plus an added new attack.

Shang Tsung is now a regular kombatant, looking much-younger and capable of transforming into his opponent or firing screaming skulls. Reptile, a character seen only in home system versions, can now be chosen by the player. New characters include Baraka, a mutant with retracting scissor blades; Jax, an American wrestler; Kitana, a female ninja armed with sais; and Kung Lao, a Raiden-like character who can teleport and throw his hat as a weapon.

New background scenes highlight the sequel and are much darker and more evil than in the original. Sometimes players kompete in the Living Forest, a dark wood with talking trees, or the Armory, a weapon-filled dungeon with rusty chains and hooks hanging from the ceiling. The most impressive background is the Wasteland, a dead landscape with a surrounding black lake, clouded purple sky, and distant fortress. The fighter progression screen has changed from a tablet to a mountain peak with Shao Kahn at the top and kompetitors down to the base.

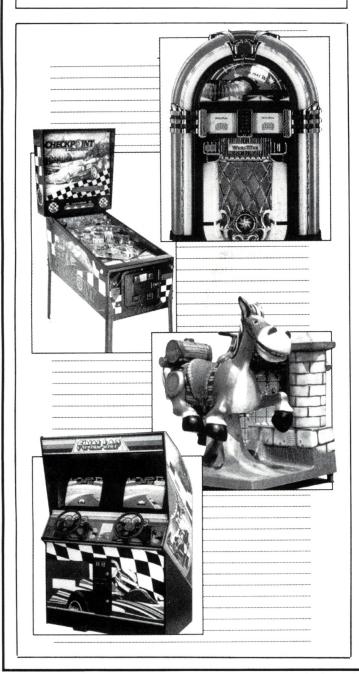
To say the game is great is an understatement; it's perfect. The dedicated cabinet is again imposing, with a photograph of Raiden on the side and dragon symbols all over the game. Character choices are more extensive, allowing the player a chance to test a kombatant's mastered skills from the original game in a

new environment, or to use one of the newly created fighters.

Characters themselves are even more realistically digitized, and the use of new costumes gives the impression that no shortcuts were taken in making the game. The improved distance attacks, such as Raiden's electricity, Reptile's venom, and Liu Kang's fireball, are more detailed and cause the opponent realistic visual pain or rising smoke as a result of the impact.

Background scenes are beautifully painted with a dark fantasy touch combined with ancient Oriental art, as in the Wasteland. The deep voice that referees the battles has become deeper and all the finishing moves and fatalities have been preserved.

Mortal Kombat II is one fighting game that has original appeal. Further sequels would not ruin the theme. Placement of the game is welcome anywhere, though preferably where an older crowd gathers.

#### **Numan Athletics**

This interesting kit from Namco takes the eternal theme of sports competition to new levels with unusual events and superhuman athletes. It's a modern version of *Track and Field* or *Hyper Sports* with grander goals and devastating defeats. Players may choose from among four characters, each with the superhuman strength, speed, and agility needed to compete in eight events leading to the championship.

The various events take place around the world, with each competition characteristic of the location. Competition begins with the Turbo Dash, a race on foot that accelerates so fast the background blurs before the finish line is reached. Next is the Interceptor, a challenge for players to knock down incoming missiles from distant ships by using fireballs at their disposal.

The Missile Toss is a javelinlike event involving an exploding projectile. Mutant creatures that appear at random must be targeted in the Numan Sniper round. A strength challenge named Vs. Express follows, in which players must stop a train.

Tower Topper is a race to reach the top of twin buildings by

bounding in-between them.

A combination of timing and strength is needed to break down a boulder in the No-Stop Rock Chop round. Finally, the Niagara Jumps challenge athletes to bound over the famous falls or be dragged under.

These events are completed by perfect timing in the manipulation of the three buttons per player. Often the A and C buttons are alternately pressed to simulate running or the strength build-up of a particular character, and the B button is used to fire a projectile or jump obstacles as they are encountered.

The theme of superhuman competition is appealing and has potential for further game releases. *Numan Athletics* is fun to play for one-player progression or multi-player competition. Gra-

phics are clean and colorful, resembling cartoons or comic books done in the distinct Japanese style. The game's availability as a conversion kit for multi-player cabinets is welcome.

#### Wipe Out

Premier's latest Gottlieb pinball release uses the winter sports of skiing and snowboarding for its theme. There's a ski lift with a waiting gate in the upper left corner of the playfield, which takes the ball up to a ramp and onto a mini-playfield raised in the avalanche mode, or a slalom run through lighted bumpers for points.

The lift and vibrating ramp are most interesting during multiball, resembling a busy day at the slopes. There is a loop through the Psycho Ski Club at the top of the game and a hot doggin' ramp down the middle. Players can "Rip the Crud" on an upsidedown loop or target the panic button five times in a row for an extra ball.

The field is deep to accommodate the ski lift. Mountain effects make the game play seem a bit more realistic; the mini-playfield takes up a lot of space. The lighthearted winter sport aspect of the game is appealing, giving the player an experience rather than just a game.  $\square$

## **Ticket meters revisited**

There seem to be some questions about redemption ticket meters that need to be answered. For instance, "Do all redemption games have a ticket meter?" "Are they expensive or difficult to install?" "Will they damage my game?" The answer to all of the above is "no."

Redemption ticket meters are a must if you really want to know how much your redemption operation is making (or losing) in terms of profit and player enjoyment.

I'm not going to get into the ticket percentages for redemption games; talk to Frank "The Crank" Seninsky for that information. However, I will discuss the meter itself.

Most redemption games manufactured within the last two years already have a ticket meter.

Whether mechanical or electronic, this meter's function is to count the number of tickets vended by the game. If you have some older redemption games, chances are that you will need to install a ticket meter.

Before you connect a meter to a redemption game, find out if the wiring harness and/or the electronic driver circuitry for a meter is not already in place on the main logic board or somewhere inside the game. Some game manufacturers choose *not* to install a ticket meter because of cost (one ticket meter = \$3.95!).

Some ticket dispensers offer you the option of connecting a meter to the ticket dispenser itself. The newer dispensers from Clever Devices, Coin Controls, and the DL-4SS or DL-4PS dispensers from Deltronic already have this circuit, so all that is required is a meter and a plug.

The DL-1275 dispenser from Deltronic Labs and the ticket dispenser from the older Clever Devices ticket mechs require a meter that is connected to the output of the dispenser. The ticket dispenser output is called the notch output. This output is an open collector and goes to ground (low) when a ticket notch is sensed by the sensor.

To connect the 5-volt meter, connect one wire to the notch output and the other meter wire to the +5 volts. You must connect a diode across the meter to eliminate any interference that will be caused by the meter. The diode that should be used is a 1N4004 from Radio Shack. If you can't find any 1N4004 diodes, any one

of its "sisters" will work (1N4003, 1N4002, 1N4001).

The diode must be connected so the cathode of the diode (the gray band) is connected to the + side of the power wires (+5 volts). A couple of notes regarding this installation: the ticket meter will be activated or "on" whenever the ticket sensor inside the dispenser is "open." An example is when a dispenser is out of tickets; the meter will advance once for every time the tickets run out. (Don't let your game run out of tickets!) Use a better-quality meter if you have one that has a metal casing. which draws too much current and is not fast enough. It will damage the notch output of the dispenser. The meter must have a minimum rating of 15 CPS (cycles per second).

If you want to use the +12 volts that is already at the ticket dispenser instead of running a +5 volts wire, it can be done.

## "Redemption ticket meters are a must."

However, you will have to change the notch output transistor to one that will handle the additional current. A TIP120 pinball transistor works great. The TIP120 is quite a bit larger than the original transistor, so you will have to be careful that it doesn't get knocked loose when refilling tickets. A 5- or 6-volt meter can

still be used in this case, since the pulse from the dispenser is so short only about 6 volts is going to the meter.

After you connect the meter you will need to mount it so it can be seen easily when you need to read it. Also, mount the meter where it will not interfere with refilling tickets. After you have installed the meter, you will need to test it. Pull the tickets out of the dispenser and view the meter. It should be "half clicked" or "energized." Put your finger on the notch transistor: it will be slightly warm. If it's hot, remove power and recheck all of your wiring and the position of the diode. You may have to replace the notch transistor on the ticket dispenser since it probably was damaged due to an error.  $\Box$

# TECHNICAL TOPICS

## An introduction to digital electronics

There are two distinct types of electronic circuits: analog and digital. If you've been working on power supplies, monitors (on the video amplifier circuits or the vertical deflection circuit or the horizontal deflection circuit), or jukebox amplifiers, you have been working on analog circuits.

There are only two TTL logic levels. A logic "LOW" is from O to .8 volt. A logic "HIGH" is from 2.4 to 5 volts. Anything in-between is a disallowed state called the "gray area."

So, what is meant by digital electronics? What's the difference between the two? Well, there are lots of differences between analog and digital electronic circuits. In fact, they're so different that you really don't have to know much about analog electronics to be successful in repairing digital systems. Some of the best techs I've ever met are great on microprocessor systems, but aren't worth a darn when it comes to fixing monitors.

In the analog world, you'll work on circuits that have all kinds of different voltages. As little as 7/10s of a volt will turn on a transistor. A video signal may have anywhere from 0 to 4 volts on it. The power supply circuit voltages are +5, +12, and even -5 volts! A monitor will have a B+ supply of +115 to +130 volts. There's even 20,000 volts or more at the second anode!

The world of digital electronics is much simpler than the chaotic realm of analog circuits. You know how all the logic boards are powered by +5 volts DC? Well, in digital electronics, that's just about all you'll see.

If you use an oscilloscope to probe just about any "node" (any connections between integrated circuits are called nodes) you'll see that the voltage there will be either around +5 volts or it will be close to 0 volts (or it will be alternating between the two as shown in figure 1). This is called "pulsing." That's it. In fact, if you see anything else, you've probably found something wrong—a circuit fault of some type.

Video games and pinball machines use a family of integrated circuits known as TTL—Transistor, Transistor Logic. There are only two states allowed in TTL, digital electronics. Either a signal is at a logic "high" or a logic "low." A logic high isn't really exactly 5 volts. There's a threshold voltage of 2.4 volts. Anything above 2.4 volts is considered to be a valid logic high.

The threshold for a logic low is .8 volts. Anything in-between is a "disallowed state" called the "gray area." Normally, you will not see signals in the gray area. That's one of the things you look for when troubleshooting digital circuits. If I'm probing around in a circuit and I see a signal that's in the gray area, I gotta think that

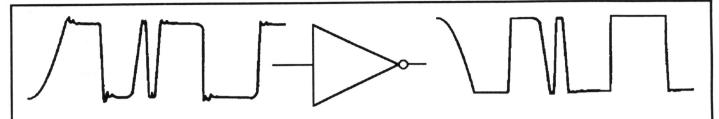

something's not correct. A gray area violates the "rules" of digital electronics and that's what I'm looking for.

Digital electronics follows very specific rules of operation. The rules state things like "if this input is high, this output will be low" or "if these two inputs are both low, the output will be high." This is called "digital logic."

Troubleshooting digital electronics is kind of like playing baseball. If you don't know the rules, you can't play the game. The rules of operation are contained in a reference book called a "databook." It contains a fact sheet (in some cases, many fact sheets) on each device and tells you how the integrated circuit is supposed to operate. It's the rule book! Without this book, you can't play the game. The really cool thing is that this book is absolutely FREE! In fact, you can get four different data books absolutely free just by calling National Semiconductor at (800) 272-9959. You don't even have to pay for the call. Ask them for the TTL databook 400044.

There are other books available, too. Radio Shack (believe it or not) has a number of books and pamphlets on the subject of digital electronics. These were written by well-known technical writer Forrest Mimms. Wico has some good publications as well. One I highly recommend you get is the "TTL Cookbook" by Don Lancaster. Just about anyone interested in learning digital

electronics should get this one. Another is the "CMOS Cookbook."

## The inverter & buffer

The simplest circuit is called an "inverter." To invert something means to flip it upside down. That's exactly what the inverter does. If the input signal to an inverter is mostly high, with narrow, downward-going pulses, it comes out upside down; the pulses are now going up (figure 2). Sometimes a signal is upsidedown from what we need in a circuit and an inverter is used to flip it right-side up.

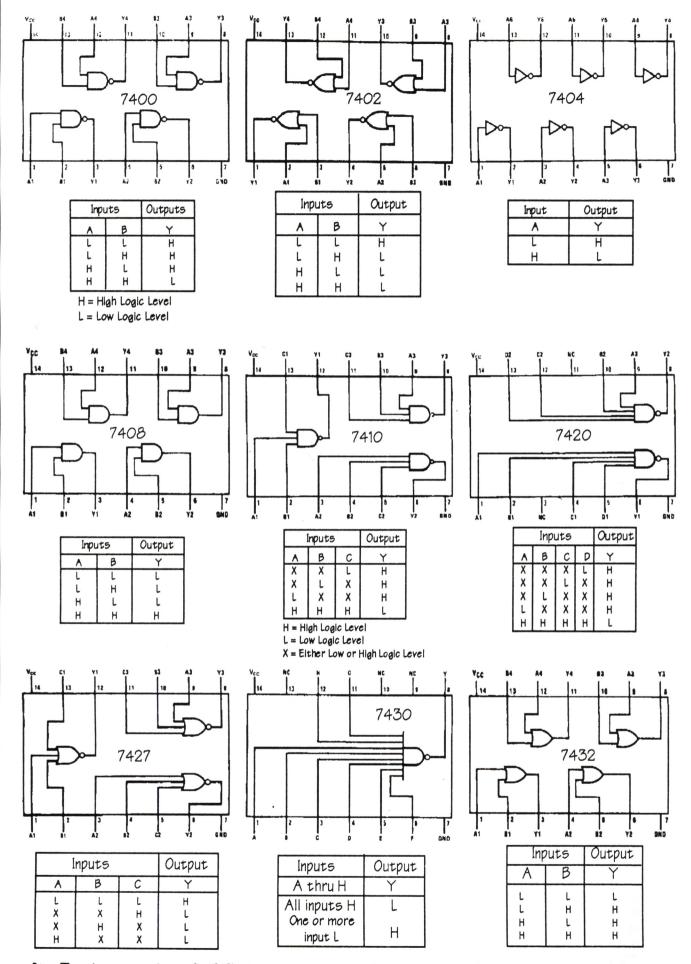


fig.3 A sample of TTL inverters and gates with their truth tables

So, the rules for the inverter are: when the input is low the output is high and when the input is high the output is low. The rules are printed in the "truth table" that's in the data book (figure 3). A is the input; Y is the output. 'Nuff said?

The 7404 is called a "HEX INVERTER" because there are actually six inverters in the one package. They only share a common power connection.

You may notice that the signal looks cleaner that it did before (figure 2). See how the input is not a clean waveform but the output is? In addition to inverting the signal, the inverter also cleans it up. Remember, anything above 2.4 is a high. Anything below .8 is a low. The inverter ignores all the garbage. Digital circuits kind of clean themselves up as the signal

is passed from device to device.

If we need to clean up a signal without inverting we can use a circuit called a "buffer." The buffer passes the signal through unchanged but cleaner. The buffer is also used when the output of an IC is used to drive a lot of other inputs. This is called "fanout." A typical fan-out for TTL is 10. That is, the output of one chip can drive up to 10 inputs on other integrated circuits. Each input is called a "unit load." A typical TTL output can drive up to 10 U.L. If you're a designer, this is an important consideration. As technicians, it's not generally too important. By the way, some inputs are more than 1 U.L. and some are less. Again, this is more important to design engineers than technicians, who are only interested in locating and replacing bad parts.

## **Totem-pole output**

The output of a TTL device is known as a "totem-pole" output (see figure 4). The way it works is really simple. To make the output go high, (output a logic 1) transistor T3 is turned on. This allows the +5 volt power source (also known as Vcc) to pass through resistor R3, transistor T3, and diode D1 to the output pin of the chip. When the output is high, the chip is said to be "sourcing" current.

To bring the output low, transistor T4 is turned on. This grounds the output pin, making it

0 volts—a logic 0. When the output is low, the IC is "sinking" current.

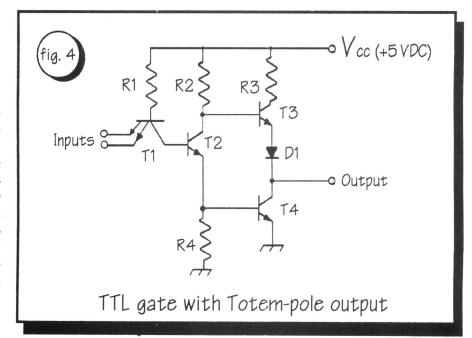
Never connect two totem-pole outputs together. If one output goes low while the other tries to go high, the low will always win over the high (often producing a "gray area" output) because transistor T4 connects the output directly ground. A logic high must be delivered through resistor R3 and the diode. Also, the "high" output chip might be damaged due to excessive heat dissipation across R3, T3, and the diode.

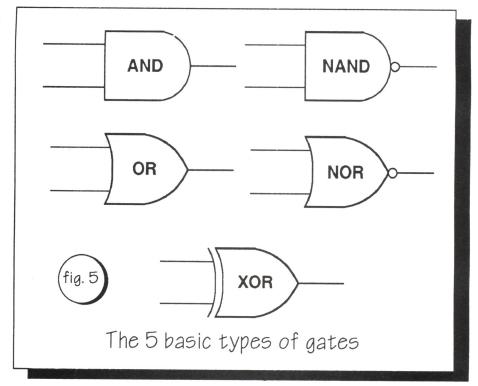
Another type of digital IC known as a "tri-state" device allows multiple outputs to be wired together. Tri-state devices can completely disconnect themselves from the common output, allowing only one active output regardless of the fact that the output pins of the integrated circuits are hard-wired together on the printed circuit board. Tri-state devices are common in micro-processor systems.

Since the totem-pole output does a better job of "sinking" current than "sourcing" it, the "active" output of an integrated circuit is often a low rather than a high. An "active low" function is called a "NOT" function. That's what the small circle on the end of the inverter symbol is for. The circle is sometimes called a "bubble" or a "zirc." The circle indicates the NOT function. That is, whatever function the device performs, the output comes out inverted.

## The gates

Inverters and buffers can't make any logical decisions. To do that, we need to use something called a "gate." Gates are the building blocks for all the logical functions in digital integrated circuits.





The first gate we'll look at is called an "AND" gate (figure 5). It looks like the letter "D" with the inputs on the flat side of the D and the output on the rounded end. If both inputs are high, the output will be high. If one input is high AND the other input is high, the output will be high.

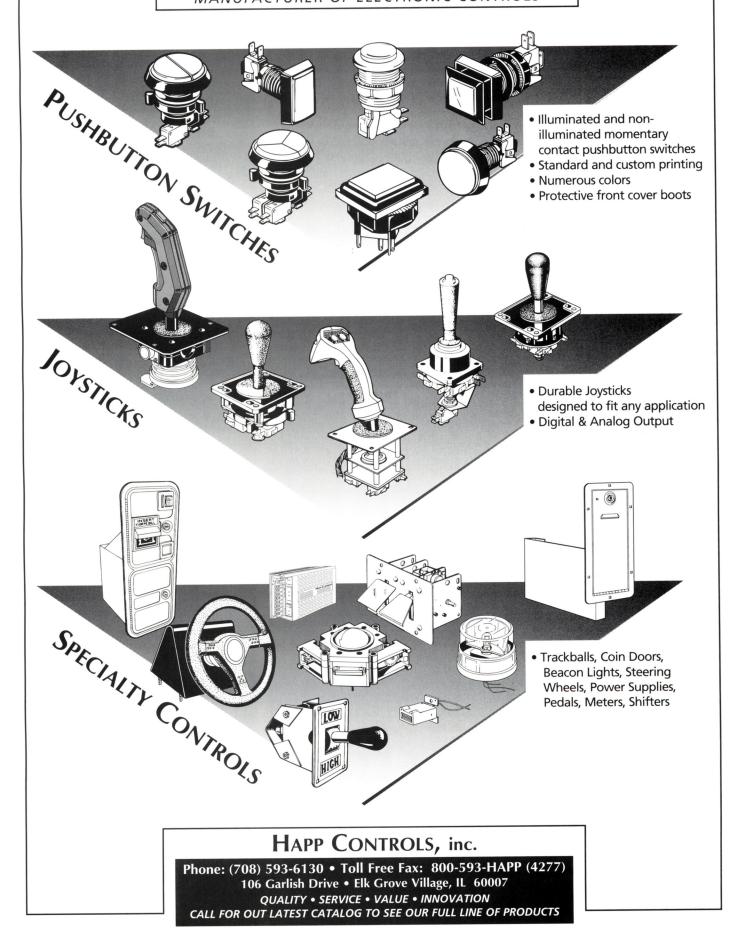
Offhand, that may seem pretty limited but here's what you can do with it. If you have a signal that needs to be turned on and off (for example, a momentary audio tone that sounds off when a ticket is vended in a redemption game), you can connect a continuous

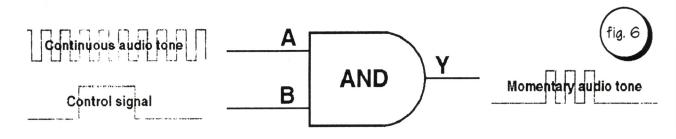
audio signal to one of the inputs of a gate (figure 6). The other input is connected to the "control" signal—a momentary pulse that goes high when the ticket is vended.

When the control signal is low, the audio signal is blocked and the output of the AND gate is low. Remember, both inputs must be high in order to get a high out. But when the control signal is high, the audio signal is passed through to the output. It's like opening a gate and letting the signal through. That's why it's called a gate!

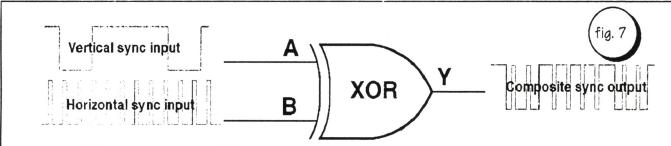

Remember when I mentioned that it's easier for an IC to go low than it is to provide a high? There is another kind of AND gate. This one includes the NOT function we saw in the inverter. It's called a "NAND" gate. NAND stands for "NOT AND." It's like an AND gate followed by an inverter. Take a look at the 7408 integrated circuit. It looks like the AND gate but it has the bubble on the end. Look at the truth table for the NAND gate. It's exactly the same as the AND gate, but the output is reversed. In the NAND gate, both inputs must be high in order to get a low out.

There are some other types of gates as well. One is called an "OR" gate. If one or the other or both inputs are high, the output will be high. The active low version of the OR gate is called the "NOR" gate. If one or the other or both inputs are high, the output will be low.

Another type of OR gate is called the "exclusive OR." You'll

see it abbreviated XOR. If one or the other input is high, the output will be high but not if both inputs are high. If both inputs are high, the output is low. An example of the XOR in action is in a video game where the vertical sync is connected to one of the XOR inputs and the horizontal sync is connected to the other (figure 7). The output of the XOR gate is composite sync.

When you are thinking about logic functions, don't get hung up on the name of the gate. To illustrate my point, let's go back to the AND gate. When one input AND the other are both high, you'll get a high out. That's logical, huh? After all, it is called LOGIC, isn't it?

But think about it like this: imagine both inputs as being high. If both the inputs are high, the output of the gate is high, right? But if one input OR the other input goes low, the output will be low, won't it? In this case, we are using the AND gate to

perform a kind of OR function, aren't we? This is a perfectly acceptable way to think of the AND gate. It's called "negative logic."

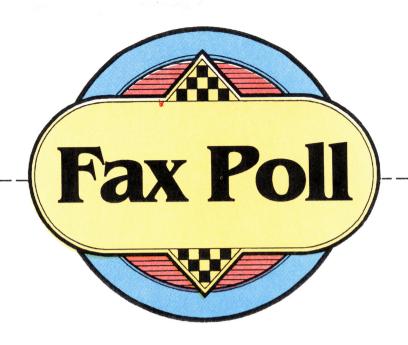
It's the same with the OR gate. The truth table states that if one input OR the other input is high, the output will be high. In terms of negative logic, if one input *and* the other input are both low, the output will be low.

How does this affect us as technicians? Not much as far as testing the individual gate is concerned. That remains the same no matter what. It does go toward understanding how that particular device is being used within the system.

Next month we'll take a look at some more advanced types of integrated circuits called "flipflops" and "counters." We'll also take a look at digital troubleshooting, and I'll show you a way to find bad ICs using just a battery, two wires, and a finger!
