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(Music Editorial)

Record Biz In High Gear For

After coming through one of the most successful summers in years, the record business is moving into high gear for the Fall season.

From every side come indications that this should be a great season. Almost every major has new dynamic merchandising plans all set. And there are at least a half dozen independent firms already making noise, already garnering orders and reorders.

The strength of the record industry, its ability to maintain its sales standards, many times even during periods which are considered poor for sales in other industries, sometimes surprises those within the trade. But it shouldn't. For the record industry is a stable industry, one for which there is a basic need. And the recording companies fulfill that need completely and well.

More and more, however, it has become acknowledged fact that the stability of the record industry and its rock bottom support stems from the juke box trade.

For the juke box operator serves a dual role in the making of a hit. Not only is he collectively the greatest actual purchaser of records in the country today, but at the same time he provides a promotional medium through which records can be heard over and over

The support which the juke box operator gives the record industry is a continuous one because those 550,- 000 juke boxes must stay filled, no matter what. Each slot must have a record and the operator is constantly searching for those records which will have the most appeal, bring him in the most revenue. Therefore he must be continually changing disks, buying new ones . . . and in doing this, he gives the record industry the backing which it could get from no other source.

Today there is just no longer any doubt about the importance of the juke box industry to the establishment of a hit record. As one smash after another has been made on the boxes, all factors of the industry have come to the realization that there is no other outlet quite like the market provided by the juke box operator.

Therefore, as recording firms go back onto full schedules for the coming season, as each company comes out with the best it has to offer, we can expect even greater concentration in the juke box field than we have had until now. In fact, it is likely that many record firms and music publishers will be putting their main—and in some cases their entire-efforts into establishing a disk on juke boxes and in that way reaching the public.

Almost all sources in the industry expect a robust Fall season. With the proper handling of the juke box operator's needs, it could be more than that. It could be a season that sees sales marks set that have never been approached before.

The record industry will team up with the jockey to "save" professional baseball for the Wilkes Barre, Pa., community in the heart of the Pennsylvania coal mining region. On August 27 combined Record Companies-Disk Jockey team will stage a Save Baseball Night in Wilkes Barre. The night is sponsored by jocks representing eight Wilkes Barre area radio stations and one TV outlet, as part of their effort to boost the Barons, the only community-owned and operated baseball club in organized professional baseball. The major and indie labels will send stars to participate in the day long program. The show will take place at the home of the ball club and a record breaking crowd of 10,000 is expected.

Western Record Pressers Plan Public Relations Program

LOS ANGELES, CALIF.—The Western Record Pressers Association, Inc., with 20 members in this area, are planning a public relations program, so that the trade will better understand what this organization is attempting to accomplish to benefit the recording industry.

Heading this organization is Louis M. Guttman as president, who also owns the California Record Manufacturing Co., Inc.; Al Elsworth, vice-president; Al H. Levine of Alco, Secretary-Treasurer; Saul Alberti and Vincent Puccio, in addition to the above three, make up the board of directors above the

These men have given much of their time and effort to the organization. They are of the firm belief that the standards of the entire record pressing industry has definitely been raised here since the organization came into being 18 months ago.

They have been instrumental in setting up, enforcing and maintaining definite standards for materials and processes. The association's seal appears on the 100 disk master shipping cartons.

They have created a credit information bureau which is proving invaluable to all the members of this organization and to many non-members as well. Out of state record pressing firms have found it extremely valuable to phone and write the organization for credit information.

This has now reached the point where many record pressers from the east and the south have applied for membership in the Western Record Pressers Assn., Inc.

As an example of what has happened, Louis M. Guttman points to his own plant, which has continued to steadily grow.

steadily grow.

He says, "Eight years ago, when I took over my plant, we had only two presses. Today, and much of this investment is due to the faith I have in our association, we have 12 presses with a capacity of from 75,000 to 80,000 records per week."

None of the pressers here is worried about the size or extent of any individual order or combination of orders. Price quotations are entirely independent of the association. But should any individual member find himself behind on a hit number he can immediately have the cooperation of everyone of the other plants to help

In this regard, Gutman says, "When a letter arrives at our association offices asking for pressing facilities here the letter is turned over to everyone of the members. They can all write, if they want the work, giving their qualifications for the job and quoting their individual price.

"We are all adhering to a definite code of ethics", he continued, "to which all the members of our organization have prescribed, so that any recorder who wants pressing facil-In this regard, Gutman says, "When

recorder who wants pressing facilities here in southern California, knows that he will be given the finest and fairest treatment by a member of our organization, regardless of who that member is."

On August 11, the Western Record Pressers Assn., Inc., held their regular meeting at the Carolina Pine Restaurant and a new board of directors was elected. They are John Galitza, Vince Puccio, Al Levine, J. Alberti and A. Ellsworth. At the September meeting a new president, vice president and secretary will be elected. An advertising campaign is also

An advertising campaign is also being planned, which will act as the backbone of the public relations program, and which is expected to bring into sharp focus the work and endeavors of this organization to bring about the finest kind of work, as well as the most astute relations between recorder and presser the industry has ever yet known.

"DEAR MARIE" (2:28) The David Matin Orchestra again accompanies as Les eases through another lovely number. He packs a load of feeling into this deck. Good song.

HENRI RENE & HUGO WINTERHALTER (RCA Victor 20-5405; 47-5405)

B- "ELAINE" (2:36) [Hill & Range musette accordion as Hugo Winterhalter conducts the ork through a lush and flowing Latin beat item. The combination is sensational and the sound ultra lovely. Could hit.

"THE VELVET GLOVE" (2:45) [E. H. Morris] Henri works on the same instrument and a harpsichord joins in for added effect. The tune is beautiful. A two sided threat in the boxes. Watch for it.

BOBBY WAYNE & RICHARD HAYMAN ORCH. (Mercury 70211; 70211 x 45)

Goday-BMI] Bobby Wayne does one of his best jobs to date as he offers a peppy bouncer with a country flavor. His lively and spirited vocal is supplemented by a terrific orking by Richard Hayman with a chorus. A hit.

"HIS BUSINESS IS LOVE" (2:25) [BMI] A fine set of lyrics and a solid jump rhythm are the highlights of this end on which Bobby does such a great job. This happy ditty is loaded with punch.

ROSEMARY CLOONEY (Columbia 40031; 4-40031)

"TENDERLY" (3:20) [E. H. Morris-ASCAP] Columbia re-issues two of Rosemary Clooney's recent waxes that clicked well for the thrush. Here she offers the oldie in her soft hazy styling.

"BLUES IN THE NIGHT" (3:25) [Remick-ASCAP] Percy Faith backs Rosey on another re-release that helped make her a top star. Platter is too well remembered to catch again.

TONY IAVELLO ORCH. (Della 117)

"PERIQUITO" (2:33) [Lucienne-of Tony Iavello does an exciting job on a samba beat item that is chock full o' rhythm. The boys have a good sound.

"THIS IS NEW YORK" (3:06) [Halliburton-BMI] With a chorus opening the number with a vocal introduction of the title, the orchestra takes over and smoothly glides through the author's impression of N. Y. Pretty melody.

Still breaking records on his personal appearances throughout the country, Tony Bennett has been looking for another big record and it looks like he has it in a thrilling version of a ballad labelled "Rags To Riches." Tony sings every word right from the heart. But adding to the excitement and good quality of the platter is an unusual and to the excitement and good quality of the platter is an unusual and zestful orchestration by Percy Faith and the orchestra. The beat for the backing in not the type you would expect to find behind a balladeer, but it's really exciting. Could be a smash hit. On the under side Tony delivers a sentimental ballad labeled "Here Comes That Heartache Again." His rendition carries a load of feeling. Another beautiful reading. Keep an eye on the top half. It should be all over the top half. It should be all over the boxes in short order.

PETE HANLEY (Okeh 7005; 4-7005)

"MEXICAN JOE" (2:46) [American-BMI] Pete Hanley of "Big Mamou" fame takes a #1 country hit and gives it his individual styling with dubbed voices and all. The chorus and lively samba beat makes for exciting list oning. citing listening.

"TWO LITTLE ROSES" (2:29) [Fred Kramer-ASCAP] The orchestra of the Leyden Brothers sets up a shuffle rhythm for Pete's jump version of a cute ditty. A good dance number with a full chorus backing.

JACK PURCELL & CORONETS (Belle 2051; 45-2051)

B "THE WALTZ I CAN'T FOR-GET" (2:50) [Highland-BMI] A pretty waltz number with an inviting tune gets a warm going over by the soft voices of the Coronets as Jack Purcell and the ork accompany. Terrific arrangement of a fine song.

"BELLA COSA TANGO" (2:38) [Highland-BMI] The Purcell ork works without the Coronets on this end as it presents a sultry tango with a lovely melody.

THE MARVELEERS (Derby 829; 45-829)

(2:12) [Music Hall-ASCAP] A terrific tune that's presented to a lilting beat is belted out by the impressive and exciting voices of the Marveleers. Their rugged harmony is the stuff that's selling today. Fine lead.

"FOR THE LONGEST TIME" "FOR THE LONGEST TIME" (2:26) [Broadway-ASCAP] More of the boys' commercial harmony is demonstrated on this end as they flow over a pretty ballad with a moderate tempo. Their sound is vibrant.

MERV GRIFFIN (Columbia 40026; 4-40026)

"I'LL BE THERE" (2:34) [Folk-ways-BMI] Merv Griffin sends up a hushed type of vocal in romantic fashion as he offers a pretty tune. With Percy Faith and his ork in the background, the results are pleasing.

"I KISS YOUR HAND, MADAME" (2:31) [Harms, Inc.-ASCAP] Percy leads the ork through another lush accompaniment for Merv's tender treatment of a lovely

TED POWERS ORCH. (Dana 3135; 45-3135)

'TUBA POLKA" (2:27) The tuba takes the featured role on this lively polka item that should draw spins and laughs from the folks. It's an amusing item loaded with that rah rah feeling.

"HI-HI-HO POLKA" (2:18) The folks will be swinging to this one as Ted leads the gang through another lively polka item. Number has that good old European flavor.

CLAY LONG ORCH. (Allen 237; 45-237)

B"THE CLOCK" (2:53) [Lion-BMI] With this number sitting atop the Hot charts, Clay Long and the ork come through with it for the pop field. Thrush Jerry Snyder handles the vocal and does a terrific job. The guitar in the backdrop is effective.

"MY SENORITA" (2:25) [Gornston-SESAC] A lively country and western item gets a peppy going over by Clay as he accompanies himself on the guitar. A good piece for the right locations the right locations.

THE MARINERS (Columbia 40047; 4-40047)

"I SEE THE MOON" (2:15) [Plymouth-ASCAP] Assisted by the David Rhodes Orchestra, The Mariners work on an interesting and unusual number with a sermon like air, yet the spiritually flavored piece gets the rinky backing of piano. Odd item.

"I JUST WANT YOU" (2:30) [Merion Music] Here the boys offer a better demonstration of their talent as they shuffle through a catchy ditty. The barber-shop type of harmony is appealing.

JOE "FINGERS" CARR (Capital 2557; F-2557)


B "SAN ANTONIO ROSE" (2:00) [Bourne-ASCAP] The ragtime master of keyboard, Joe "Fingers" Carr shows his digital agility as he glides through a raucous version of a great oldie. The accompanying instruments sound like they're talking.

"DOODLE-DOO-DOO" (2:14)





Walter Framer, a disk jockey from way back in the days when it was a dj's job to sweep the floors as well as change records upon completions at the rate of \$30 a week, is now head of Walt Framer Productions, the TV production company that is responsible for two of today's top TV Quiz shows, "The Big Payoff" and "Strike

With his creative mind constantly on the search for new ideas and gimmicks to improve his currently successful programs, the producer is also deep in the formation of a new idea for a TV quiz program. An idea which has been his baby for years. A quiz show based directly on records and juke boxes. An idea called "Jack In The Juke Box." And from all ends it looks like a natural for a top video hit.

At the meetings with the diskery reps and juke box manufacturers, Framer laid down the format for the entire show: The juke box and the records in it are to be the heart of

the show. The audience will be requested to fill out an information card and the ones with the most incard and the ones with the most interesting replies, as to why any one song is his favorite, will be contestants on the program. It will be the contestant's job to attempt to hit his favorite tune on the juke box and by so doing, become eligible for the jackpot. A guest recording star will be featured on the program. Every week a disk jockey will be invited to appear as a guest. And most important the show will be slated for network, coast to coast, coverage.

With all questions based on popular music in its recorded form, every record company, both major and in-

With all questions based on popular music in its recorded form, every record company, both major and independent, stands to gain much through this nationwide coverage. Millions of listeners will get to meet recording artists and the artist will have an opportunity to promote his or her latest release. A plug which will reach into the tens of millions of listeners. The increase in juke box play as a result of this show is inevitable. Listeners will have an opportunity to become more familiar with the disk jockies that they have been listening to for years, when they appear on the show as guests. The increased listenership to the dj, as a result of this appearance needs no explanation.

One of Framer's major plans is to give away the juke box that will appear on the show, to a deserving charitable or religious organization, each week. Every week a juke box from a different manufacturer will be used. One week AMI, one week Rock-Ola, once a Seeburg and another a Wurlitzer. Then the rotation will start again. Via this gimmick, the public will be aquainted with the relationship between the juke box and the prevention of juvenile delinquency. For the juke box people it will be an unpaid for campaign to "keep the kids out of the gutter and in the club room with good music". The good will created between operators and the community via this promotion is obvious.

when the show is in action, the portion of suspense will be supplied by the juke box. When the contestant selects a record, the camera will come in for a close up of the selector and the box' mechanism. The TV camera will follow the selector to see whether it lands on the correct number for the prize money. This should interest people who have never had an urge to drop a coin into the juke box, to do so. People will become more and more familiar with the great entertainment that can be gotten from the juke box at so low a cost.

Framer is looking for assistance

Framer is looking for assistance from record stores, operators and record companies to place on every location, streamers popularizing the industry's own show "Jack In The Juke Box". Every phase of the recording industry can see the tremendous boom that this show could have on the country. country.

Although it is Framer's object to create a program that will draw the greatest listenership possible, indirectly every segment of the music world stands to gain. It's his attempt to mold the show around the teenager thus interest not only the teenager, but the entire family.

All concerned agreed that the record companies, artists, juke box manufacturers and operators, and disk jockies should not underestimate the value of this video program.

They felt everyone should help in every way possible to make "Jack In The Juke Box" the record industry's own show.

E. B. Marks Creates Special R & B Dep't.

To Be Headed By Marvin Frank

The growing importance and popularity of rhythm and blues and jazz at many of the major record companies, which was cued by the success of the hordes of independent labels in those fields, has spurred the interest of music publishers to place greater stress on their r. and b. and jazz catalogues. In line with the trend Edward B. Marks Music Corporation recently created a special rhythm and blues department headed by Marvin Frank, under the aegis of Harry Link, general professional manager.

Rhythm and blues material which used to be considered as an incidental source of income to publishers because of its limited audience, is now making its influence felt in the popular song market. Most network stations and practically all of the independent radio stations now have from four to eight segments of jazz time on their daily programming, with rhythm and blues material also receiving a hefty part of the play. The revitalization of public interest in this type of music can be partially attributed to the reissuing of great jazz recording which were collector's items and are now available in attractive LP

Another important factor in the publisher's favor is that the jazz and rhythm and blues departments of the rhythm and blues departments of the recording companies are more accessible than the high powered and tremenously competitive A&R men in the popular field. Also, there are many instances where pop A&R men decide to cover songs that come from subsidiary labels. An outstanding example was the case of Johnnie Ray, whose million selling record of "Cry" was first released on Okeh and then switched to the Columbia label for greater distribution and exploitation.

NEW YORK—The expanded use of drink vendors thruout the nation has a good deal to do with the expectation of the soft drink industry, which predicts sales will surpass its record sales volume attained in 1952. Of the leading soft drink companies, Coca Cola and Pepsi-Cola showed the biggest sales and profits for 1952. Total sales of Coca Cola Co. and its subsidiaries rose to \$245,600,000 in 1952 from \$225,700,000 in 1951. Pepsi-Cola reported volume sales in 1952 amounting to \$53,300,000 against \$48,900,000 in 1951. For the first 6 months of 1953, sales figures are not available, but earnings rose to \$12,940,424 compared to \$12,263,199 in 1952 for the Coca Cola Co. Pepsi-Cola's earnings in the first 6 months rose to \$2,775,000 as against \$1,725,000 for 1952. While actual figures aren't available, reports indicate that the smaller soft drink manufacturers have also increased their sales this year. manufacturers have also increased their sales this year.

WASHINGTON, D.C .- The Depart-WASHINGTON, D.C.—The Department of Commerce reports that for the first half of 1953, total income was running at a rate of \$283 billions, or 7 per cent above the same period of last year. Non-agricultural income makes up for the increase, as farm income was down slightly. "Since the close of 1952, private wages and salaries have advanced \$6 billions, or almost 4 percent under the impetus of continued advances in both employment and wage rates", said the department.

NEW YORK—The liquor industry predicts that consumption of distilled spirits in 1953 will approximate 193 million gallons, compared to 183.6 millions in 1952. However, they point out that on a percentage basis, the per capita use has declined, as the adult population has increased by 9 millions since 1952. Here's something of interest, which not many people know. The industry is considerably restricted in its promotional work. It cannot stress that liquor in moderation is good for the aged; that it is administered to many ill persons in hospitals under certain conditions; and that it is a beneficial stimulant for most persons when consumed in moderation.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The experts are convinced that the nation is not training highly-skilled workers as fast as the industrial world is demanding them. The National Manpower Council—a joint enterprise of the Ford Foundation and Columbia University—completed a three day discussion here, and a long-range survey is now under way. Recommendations will be submitted to President Eisenhower. It is expected, too, that the council will recommend both public. and private scholarship programs and will supply an appraisal of the adequacy of existing training facilities and methods.

With his overhead expense, and costs of equipment to maintain himself in business, as well as salaries he has to pay, tires, trucks, and the myriad supplies and parts he requires, now costing him anywhere from 100 per cent to over 500 per cent more than pre-war, he simply can no longer continue to sell his merchandise at the pre-war price of 5c.

And even when he raises his selling price to 10c, he is not obtaining all that he should, to gain a profitable position in his business, somewhat like that of the average retailer who has continued to raise the price of his merchandise as his cost was increased.

That is why, in many, many cases thruout the nation, juke box owners are finding the going tougher than ever. They simply cannot exist by selling their entertainment at 5c when all their overhead has been raised much more than double.

It would be well, then, for any juke box owner in the nation, at least those juke box owners who haven't yet attempted to raise the selling price of their merchandise to 10c, to check with those who have, and learn from these men whether this increase in the selling price has helped.

It would also be good business for the juke box operator, who hasn't yet tried to obtain 10c per play, to discuss this with his location owners.

To talk about "how much more" these location owners are paying for the merchandise they sell. For labor. For taxes. For parts and supplies. For general maintenance.

For the hundreds, and even thousands of costs which are, today, part and parcel of the conduct of any business.

If, after all this survey, and all this discussion, as well as a close check of his costs with his own accountants, he believes that he can continue to sell his merchandise, which costs him anywhere from 100 per cent to 500 per cent more than it did pre-war at 5c, then let that juke box owner continue on nickel play, and let him face the treacherous waters of bankruptcy as they flood in on his business.

But those juke box operators who wish to conduct a profitable business. Who want to at least earn as much today as they did yesterday. Who want to be sure that they will remain in business against sharp and progressive competitors. Who want to be able to purchase the new phonographs to enliven their routes. Who want to buy all the records they need to give the public all the music the public wants. Who feel they want to remain in this business. Let those operators do the one thing that is necessary: change to 10c per play—today. Because "the Nickel of yesterday—is the Dime of today!"

Framer suggested that each week, rramer suggested that each week, another coin operated phonograph will be used on the show. One week AMI, one week Rock-Ola, one week Seeburg and one week Wurlitzer. At the end of each week, the machine that will have appeared on the show will be given away to a charitable or religious organization.

From the discussion at the gathering, Framer was elated to hear that all of the juke box reps were 100% behind him in helping make this the juke box and record industry's own show. He also asked for all the promotion available, mainly by pasting streamers on every location, to popularize the show and promote the juke box industry.

The program, which is scheduled for nation wide coverage, should be one of the greatest means of promotion for the juke box industry. Should the idea materialize, tens of millions of listeners will get to see the juke box, and how it operates. The good will created by the giving away of the machine on the show would be immeasurable.

All of the representatives at the gathering were thrilled with the idea, and consultations with the manufacturing companies will be held immediately.

equipment he operates, and how much money he takes in.

"Remember," he continued, "this man would have the Federal Government on his side by Federal Law. If the juke box operator wouldn't cooperate he could very simply and easily step over to the Federal Court and subpoena him and, at the same time, make him open his books in court, while obtaining a Federal injunction against him, forcing him to halt all business until the Court halt all business until the Court


Miller again pointed out, "This is the time when every music operator, if he wishes to avoid such catastrophe, must come in with funds to help MOA bring together all of the nation's operators who want to testify in Washington, just as MOA did in 1952 during the Bryson-Kefauver Bill hear-

"This is not just supposition. It is fact. The hearings are bound to be held immediately after Congress convenes again on September 15. We have to present our defense against the statements which have already been made by ASCAP and the other proponents of the McCarran Bill.

"We can't just put our heads in sand, like ostriches, and think that the Senate's Judiciary Sub-Committee is going to pass us by. We must be ready. And we need funds to be prepared. Lots more money than we now have. So that we can present an efficient defense."

Miller would like to hear, particularly from operators in Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Nevada, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah, Vermont, Virginia and Wyoming.

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


Wurlitzer's Page Ad In North Tonawanda Newspaper Outlines Company's Position
