“JUST WHAT DOES THE CASH BOX POLL MEAN?”

Prior to the start of *The Cash Box*' 9th Annual Poll of the Automatic Music Industry, to determine the best money-making records and artists of 1954, the Editor-in-Chief asked me to write something about this poll. To explain just what this poll actually means to the music industry.

His question (a very good one, indeed) was: “Just what does *The Cash Box*' poll mean?”

There are so many, many polls being conducted today, but, none that was ever as much imitated as *The Cash Box*' poll.

The reason is very simple. *The Cash Box*' poll (to determine the best money-making records and artists of the year) is the public's very own poll.

This is something that the public actually decides. And not just when the public is “put on the spot” to decide the poll, but, the public decides the poll over the entire year—not knowing that it is actually so doing.

How? Simply because each time any man, woman, or child, drops a coin into a juke box, whether in Maine, California, Florida or Washington, that coin registers public preference for a certain tune and a certain artist.

As the days, weeks, months, and then the year, passes by, the nation's juke box operators look back reminiscently to the recordings and the artists which earned them the most money.

This, therefore, is the best, and the only way, in which the artists, the bands, the combos, the vocal groups, and all others, in any fashion whatsoever connected with the music industry, can get clear, concise and truthful judgment.

This we remember. A statement by the late Jack Kapp made in our presence and which statement has always remained with us:

“I don't care,” he said, “if you put two cats on a fence with B. G. blowing his licorice stick at them. If this makes money, then this is what the public wants. And to me,” he concluded, “this is the greatest music in the world.”

In that statement is the reason “why” the late Jack Kapp so closely and intently watched each week's returns in *The Cash Box*' poll to determine the best moneymaking records and artists.

As he told the writer, “This is the best poll of all. This,” he said, “is what the public really thinks of the nation's popular music in every category. This is what we want to know.”

Therefore, when *The Cash Box*' Editor-in-Chief asked me to write about the forthcoming 9th Annual Poll, we felt that there were a great many things a great many new people in the music industry would like to know.

We sort of pride ourselves on the fact that the old timers in this grand, thrilling and exciting music business of America know all the reasons “why.”

But, most important to one and all, is *The Cash Box*' poll fair? Is it properly conducted? Does it get to the core of the subject? Does it bring in the correct answers? Can we depend on it?

These were the questions the writer, and those who were connected with him during the First Annual Poll of *The Cash Box*, had to answer—to themselves—their consciences—so that their readers—and the entire music industry—would be able to benefit from the results.

The first thing that had to be arranged was a fair and square method for the votes of the nation's juke box operators. It was decided, after much study,

that the one sure and equitable way was for each operator to be given one vote for each juke box he owned that was on location, and also one vote for each wall and/or bar box which was on location, along with one vote for each music shell which he had on location.

The reasoning here is very simple. This would allow the larger operator, who bought records in so much greater quantity, to sort of swing his weight into the voting.

The votes, as can be noted from the above, were based on the fact that each music instrument, or accessory to that instrument, which was allowed a vote, was an instrument which carried a “title strip” showing the recording and the artist who made the recording.

The writer also realized that it would take more than just a week, two, or three, to obtain all the results needed to completely and correctly tabulate the votes.

Juke box operators are busy people. Some of the small operators are out ‘on the street’ from early morning until the next dawning.

Therefore, the poll would have to be conducted over a period of weeks, until the very greatest possible majority of the owners of the nation's 550,000 juke boxes would have cast their votes.

Now, back to the question of *The Cash Box*' Editor-in-Chief, “Just what does *The Cash Box*' poll mean?”

Once all this was under way, a most completely equitable, fair and square method to handle and judge the votes, a most complete fair and square method of reporting the votes (let the chips fall where they may), and once *The Cash Box* poll of the best moneymaking artists and recordings of the year was completed, then the entire music industry would have something of most tremendous, definitive, actual, factual value, on which to hang its opinions.

In short—THIS WOULD ACTUALLY BE WHAT THE PUBLIC, ITSELF, THOUGHT OF THE ARTISTS AND RECORDS THAT WERE PRESENTED DURING THE PAST YEAR AND WHICH THEY, THEMSELVES, MR. AND MRS. AND MASTER AND MISS PUBLIC, INVESTED THEIR COIN TO HEAR.

For any newspaper, or mass circulation magazine, to suddenly burst forth with a poll, and to ask the people (its reader circulation—certainly not as great as the circulation reached during an entire year by the nation's 550,000 juke boxes) wouldn't give as truthful, or as factual, an answer as would *The Cash Box*' poll.

Simply because *The Cash Box*' poll bases itself on WHAT HAPPENED ALL THE PAST YEAR LONG.

Not suddenly and surprisingly grabbing at the public to cast a vote. But, continuing week after week, so that the nation's juke box operators could take their time, could look back, could decide, and could then cast their votes, fairly and squarely based on the numbers of recordings which they continuously purchase and which is, in turn, based on the numbers of machine they own.

That's what *The Cash Box*' Poll means to the music industry. It's the PUBLIC'S DECISION OF THE YEAR'S BEST ARTISTS AND RECORDINGS!

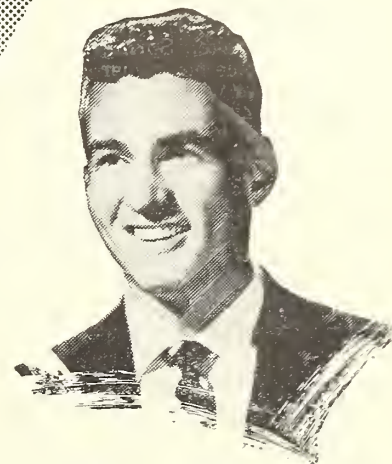

VAL VALENTE
(Columbia 40316; 4-40316)

B+ "TILL YOU'RE MINE" (2:30) [Joy ASCAP—Drake, Springer] The powerful tenor voice newcomer of Val Valente comes over with brilliance as the songster gives out with a lovely romantic item. Could break. Chorus rounds out the backing. Big voice.

C+ "THAT'S WHERE YOU ARE" (2:32) [Joy ASCAP—Gallop, Springer] The artist gives out with another big reading of a pretty tune adapted from a popular Tchaikovsky melody. Exciting Lanza type voice.

DON SENAY
(Debut 112; 45-112)

B "FANNY" (3:02) [ASCAP—Rome] The title tune of a big musical production slated to hit this city soon, is tenderly handled by the warm, polished voice of Don Senay. The Charles Mingus ork assists beautifully. Song is hitting.

C+ "EDGE OF LOVE" (2:47) [BMI—Baker, Ables, Goode] The talented crooner gives out with another appealing performance of a good love song. Artist has a brilliant future in store for him. Quality voice.

THE FONTANE SISTERS
(Dot 15248; 35-15248)

B+ "WILLOW WEEP FOR ME" [Bourne ASCAP—Ronell] The Fontane Sisters, who made a strong first showing on the Dot label, have another potent hit contender with their slow rhythm treatment of a terrific oldie. They sound great.

C+ "A LOVE LIKE YOU" [Gallatin BMI—Griffin, Simms] The Billy Vaughn orchestra sets up another effective backdrop for the trio's delivery of a pretty new tune. Lead voice has a Mary Ford sound.

FRANK CHACKSFIELD
(London 1484; 45-1484)

B+ "MISTY VALLEY" (2:31) [Robbins ASCAP—Yorke] The lush Frank Chacksfield orchestra creates a brilliant picture in music as it glides through a lovely instrumental item full of warmth and tender beauty. Could follow "Ebb Tide."

B "BLACK VELVET" (2:46) [Connelly ASCAP—Hart] Another beautiful melody is given the string treatment by the Chacksfield men. Two pretty decks back-to-back. Both ends could make the grade with a push.

JACK PLEIS ORCH.

B "BEYOND THE BLUE HORIZON" (2:40) [Famous ASCAP—Whiting, Harling, Robin] A beautiful favorite is given a big choral and ork presentation by Jack Pleis and the crew. Exciting deck full of color. Could bring tune back.

C+ "FOR ALWAYS" (2:18) [Treble ASCAP—Pleis, Shapiro, Nadauld] The chorus wends its way through another pretty tune, this one written by Pleis. Pretty arrangement and orking by the batoneer.

● A sensational tune that's been around for some months now and has finally begun to hit, is jumped

on by one of the queens of the wax world, Jo Stafford. Accompanied by a tremendous Paul Weston orchestration, the thrush leans into this torchy ballad tabbed "Teach Me Tonight." It's a fabulous reading of a penetrating love song that could go right up to the top. It's one of Jo's best presentations this year and she gives her all for the tune. Her smooth, moving reading could take over the many other versions in short order. The lower lid is a top grade Staffordian vocal of a lovely romantic item that's recorded by another artist every few months. It's the inviting favorite "Suddenly." "Teach Me" is slated for a top spot.

VERA LYNN & FRANK WEIR
(London 1501; 45-1501)

● London Records, a few months ago, teamed two of its top artists, David Whitfield and Mantovani on a record called "Cara Mia." The results were fabulous both in England and the U.S. Now two other top London stars join to send up a new disk that could hit the #1 spot. It's a stirringly beautiful recording called "My Son, My Son" featuring the sparkling voice of

Vera Lynn and the ace sax artistry of "happy wanderer" Frank Weir. The sound of the sax and tender tones of the thrush blend beautifully. An excellent performance by both artists that could result in another "Oh My Papa" hit. Chorus assists. Another melodic ballad "Our Heaven On Earth" occupies the flip deck. Upper lid has it all.

B+ "I'LL TAKE YOU" (2:18) [Ferrer BMI—Douglas, Wachtel] Archie Bleyer and the ork set up a perfect backing for newcomer Mary Del's delivery of a cute calypso beat novelty. Clever ditty that could catch quickly.

C+ "HURTS ME TO MY HEART" (2:38) [Monument BMI—Singleton, McCoy] The thrush shows her versatility as she switches from a novelty to blues. This is a high flying r & b hit.

LES ELGART ORCH.

B+ "ONE O'CLOCK JUMP MAMBO" (2:27) [Feist ASCAP—Basie] A tremendous instrumental of some years back is set to a "crazy" mambo beat by the Les Elgart band. Real wild deck that could go way up there. His best job to date.

B+ "I DON'T WANT TO SET THE WORLD ON FIRE" (2:31) [Cherio BMI—Seiler, Marcus, Benjamin, Durham] A slow dance item is offered by Les and the crew as they cruise through another top oldie. Classy dance arrangement. Could hit too.

BOB STEWART
(MGM 11846; K-11846)

B+ "WONDERFUL TO KNOW" (2:50) [Brighton ASCAP—Danzig, Gallop] A pretty new ballad is warmly and beautifully fashioned by the excellent Bob Stewart voice. A good job that could catch on if programmed enough.

B "IT'S A WOMAN'S WORLD" (2:38) [Robbins ASCAP—Mockridge, Cahn] The lovely title tune of a new 20th Century film is given a polished delivery by Bob. Strong showing. Tune is already clicking. LeRoy Holmes supports.

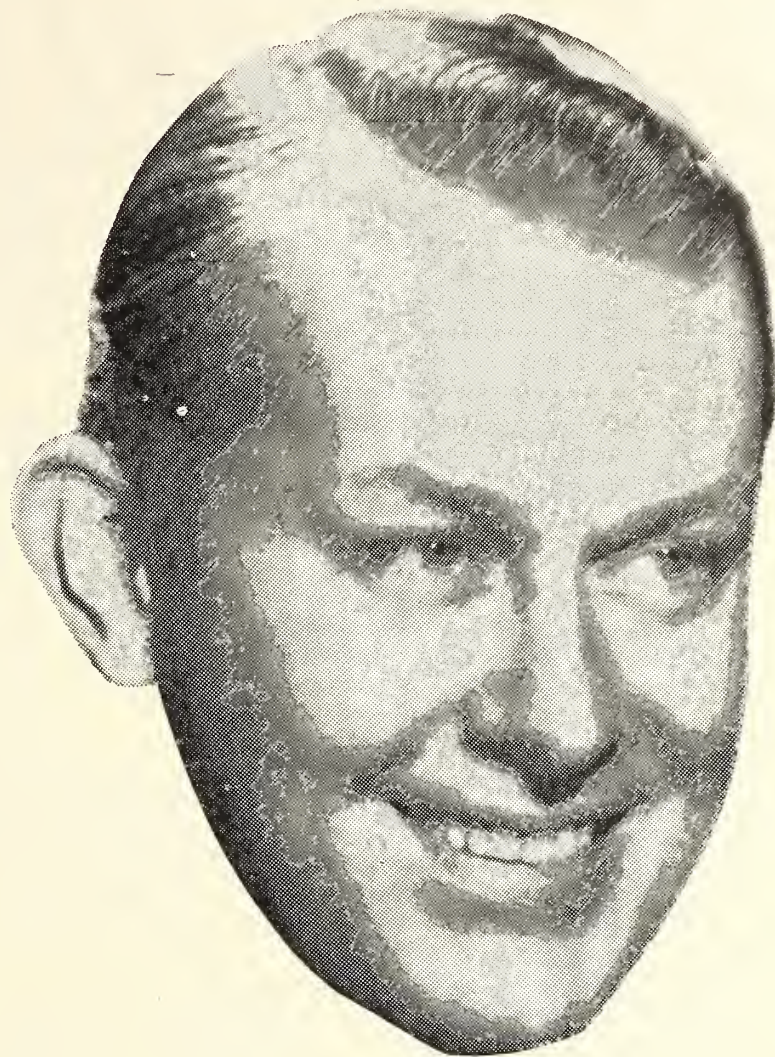
B+ "SONG OF THE BAREFOOT CONTESSA" (2:35) [Chappell ASCAP—Nascinbene] A beaty and melodius instrumental item is this exciting version of a flicker tune by the Hugo Winterhalter ork. Dramatically beautiful offering that could be big. Chorus assists.

B "LAND OF DREAMS" (2:45) [Meridian BMI—Gimbel, Heywood] Pianist Eddie Heywood takes the spotlight on this attractive mood music instrumental. Hugo has a tremendous arrangement on this side too. Potent coupling.

B "BEI MIR BIST DU SCHON" (2:10) [Harms ASCAP—Secunda, Cahn, Chaplin, Jacobs] "Mr. Piano Man" Jackie Lee, comes up with a terrific cornball piano arrangement of an old favorite. This could revive it.

C+ "MISSOURI WALTZ" (2:12) [Forster ASCAP—Logan, Shannon] Another beautiful oldie is given the unique Lee 88 treatment. Colorful side.

REMOVAL OF 20% CABARET TAX CAN HELP HALT MUCH JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

Juke Box Ops Urge THE CASH BOX Continue Drive to Get All in Industry to Cooperate in Nationwide Effort to Eliminate 20% Wartime Cabaret Excise Tax So That Dancing to Juke Box Music Will Again be Possible by Getting Congressmen and Senators to Vote It Out of Existence in Forthcoming Congressional Session.

CHICAGO—Overwhelming commendation for this publication resulted from the article which appeared in this past week's (October 9, 1954) issue of *The Cash Box* relative to the fact that the entire juke box industry get together in an all out effort to help remove the onerous 20% Wartime Cabaret Excise Tax.

As *The Cash Box* explained in its October 9 issue, this is not the first time that this publication has urged all the nation's juke box operators to do everything in their power to get this wartime excise tax measure voted out of existence. *The Cash Box* historically reviewed all its many efforts in this direction.

The result was phone calls, wires and letters from leading juke box operators urging *The Cash Box* to continue its efforts, stronger than ever before, so that all in the industry would get together in a nationwide force to help eliminate the 20% Cabaret Tax or, at least, have this excise tax measure amended as far as the juke box industry is concerned.

The Cash Box pointed out that this was the time when everyone of the nation's juke box operators should write to their Congressmen and their Senators, as well as get their friends, suppliers, religious and civic leaders, and their officials, to do the same. Because of such concerted all out effort the forthcoming Congressional Session might be induced to vote this excise tax measure out of existence.

The Cash Box also pointed out that the American Federation of Musicians was engaged in an all out effort to also do this very same thing. This organization believed this would bring about greater employment of live musicians. This would not, in any fashion whatsoever, conflict with what the juke box operators of this nation wanted.

The fact remains that the removal of this tax will not only give employment to many peoples all over the nation but will, of its own accord, boom business for a great many organizations so that, if Congress is interested in better business for the nation, this is one move it can accomplish to help bring about better business.

The Cash Box witheld from men-

tioning the most important effect the removal of the 20% Cabaret Tax would have, as far as this nation and the juke box industry is concerned. That would be to help, to a great extent, to halt juvenile delinquency.

It is agreed among many that because youth has nowhere to go, which brings about mischievous boredom and, furthermore, because youth does not seem to have its own favorite places to wear off excess energy with which it is naturally endowed, much trouble has resulted. The problem of juvenile delinquency has become a major factor in the nation's crime.

If the kids were allowed to dance off this excess and vibrant energy to economical juke box music which would, at the same time, eliminate boredom by giving them favorite meeting places, like they used to have prior to the introduction of this wartime excise tax measure then, perhaps, much juvenile delinquency would be halted and even eliminated.

This is something for deep and serious consideration by the nation's Congressmen and Senators. This is something, if these legislators are also parents, for them to most seriously think about. The fact remains that the kids will be dancing under the supervision of business men where the juke boxes are located. This, in itself, is the finest kind of supervision there is for the kids of the nation.

Here, then, by the removal of this onerous 20% Wartime Cabaret Excise Tax, is a probable answer to the present nationwide juvenile delinquency crime wave. This is something everyone in this industry wants to help eliminate.

The juke box industry has given away juke boxes everywhere in the nation. Has helped to create youth canteens. Has done everything in its power to help halt juvenile delinquency. Now the nation's lawmakers can, with one fell sweep, do what so many others have failed of doing.

The nation's legislators, by voting the 20% Wartime Cabaret Excise Tax out of existence, are then doing something that has every possibility of halting, and even eliminating, juvenile delinquency.

If there is any doubt that Mambo is getting a terrific ride just tune in any musical program, be it pop, country or r & b. TV programs are highlighting big production numbers around the mambo dance. Ed Sullivan, on a recent national TV show devoted a portion to mambo with Augie and Margo, scintillating New York Paladium dance team revealing their magic to the vast army of viewers. Directly opposite Sullivan at the same time, the Colgate Comedy Hour (NBC-TV) featured Johnnie Ray doing his "Papa Loves Mambo". So 40 million people saw mambo, some of them getting their first indoctrination. Nightclubs are going in for a splash on the Latin tempo. For the first time the New York nitery, Copacabana, is featuring a Cha-Cha-Cha routine in their production. . . . Most of the top pop recording artists are now showcasing one mambo bit in their acts. To name a few—Perry Como, Johnnie Ray, Vaughn Monroe, Billy Daniels, Vic Damone, Dolores Hawkins, etc. Almost every band is adding mambos to his book and every recording band is issuing several mambo disks. . . . Tito Puente, at the Palladium 4 times weekly, is at the Wide Away Hall every Thursday night in Newark. Opening night, September 23 the place was jammed with a crowd of 800 people. . . . Philadelphia going mambo crazy with three new clubs opening. The House of Mambo, Club Zel-Mar and Mambo Town. . . . From Baltimore we hear that the Chanticleer, which formerly booked top pop recording artists, has switched to mambo. The club is booking the Mambo-Jets and Jose Curbello and his Fiesta Mambo Orchestra to open November 2. . . . Lew Chudd, Imperial Records, is starting a new label devoted to mambos. . . . Bob Rosen, Seeco Records, reports "El Jamaiquino" by Machito doing very well. The item is a Cha-Cha-Cha. . . . Tito Guizar flying in from the west to do his first date with Seeco. Rosen also reports the appointment of Seaboard Distributors in Hartford, Conn. . . . Ralph Seijo, A & R for Rainbow Records just returned from a deejay tour in Philly and Baltimore. At the same time, prexy Eddie Heller shot up to Boston. Both got some exciting reaction on Pepi Adorno's "In Old Shanty Town Mambo". Rainbow's big gun, Alfreddito, will be guest star on Dick Sugar's WEVD-New York Friday mambo show on October 22. . . . MGM released a country item by Sheb Wooley titled, "Hill Billy Mambo". . . . RCA Victor has a strong wax item in The Four Escorts "Loop De Loop Mambo". . . . The popularity of the mambo in the Bay State was affirmed last Monday, October 4, when a capacity crowd of 1200 swooped down on the Sheraton Plaza in Boston for a mambo festival with Fiesta Record's Monchito and his Mambo Royals. Fiesta announced last week the acquisition of the defunct Landia label, the first release of which, under the Fiesta label, will be "Annabocoo" by Daminron, his piano and rhythm. Jose Morand figures that "Anna", one of the all-time greats in mambo, is due for a revival. . . . WHAT Philadelphia program director-disk jockey, Chaso O'Donnell says that he has to average about three mambo's per program daily because the requests are so heavy from his teen-age listeners.

Eddie Fisher Celebrates 5th Year of Recording

NEW YORK—Eddie Fisher celebrated the fifth anniversary of his recording career last week and looked back at a record of 19 consecutive hits with sales totalling 15 million copies since he made his first disk, "My Bolero" on October 1, 1949.

In his five years with RCA Victor Fisher has received three gold records presented for disks selling at least one million copies—"Anytime" (1951), "I'm Walking Behind You" (1953) and "Oh! Mein Pa-Pa" (1954).

His latest record is "Count Your Blessings," and "Fanny."

In 1949, when Fisher made his first disk with Hugo Winterhalter, who has since conducted for every subsequent Fisher hit, the young singer was virtually unknown.

Since then he has achieved the unique distinction of 19 consecutive hits. He also has his own NBC-TV show "Coke Time Starring Eddie Fisher."

Fisher's hits include "Turn Back the Hands of Time," "Anytime," "Tell Me Why," (1951); "That's The Chance You Take," "Just A Little Lovin'," "Maybe," "Wish You Were Here," "Lady of Spain," "That's What Christmas Means To Me," "Even Now," (1952); "How Do You Speak To An Angel," "I'm Walking Behind You," "With These Hands," "Many Times," (1953); "Oh! Mein Pa-pa," "My Friend," "I Need You Now," "Fanny," "Count Your Blessings" (1954).

Fisher's anniversary was marked by a luncheon tendered the singer by RCA Victor Records and NBC executives, headed by Manie Sacks, Vice-President and General Manager of RCA Victor and Sylvester L. Weaver, President of NBC.

Eddie Calvert will star in Jack Hylton's show "Off the Record" starting at London's Victoria Palace, shortly, for a six weeks season. . . . That number I mentioned recently titled "Small Talk" is a British number having no connection with the "Small Talk" number featured in the score of the "Pajama Game". All the same, I once again will tip you off by telling all you A. & R. men to take a good look at what we here feel is another "Lullaby of Birdland".

LES BROWN: "Concert At The Palladium"—Coral CX-1 (2-12" LPs) List: The Second World War destroyed the band business. Mainly because of financial problems, bands either folded or made drastic changes in their structure and personnel. One of the few to last through this crisis was the Les Brown Band of Renown. Changes in the crew and style have been minor through the years and the only alterations made were revamps that would keep up with the changing tastes of the American public. In September of '53 Les took the band into the Hollywood Palladium for a three-week stand. He arranged to have all the broadcasts from the ballroom tape-recorded. On this LP, the cream of the 3 week crop is offered. Backed by an all star cast of instrumental aces too numerous to mention in this small space, Les presents his dynamic interpretations of more than twenty-five great standards. Each number is sparked by the enthusiasm of a live audience. Bound in a deluxe and attractive cover, this album should go great guns with the folks who lived and loved band music in the thirties and forties. Should be a tremendous package seller for the diskery.

The album is a relaxing collection of tunes sung by Miss Parks in a most acceptable manner. What could hold back the sales is the buyer's relative unfamiliarity with the artist's talent. A pleasant half hour of listening pleasure for the pop audience.

"HULA"—The Waikiki Hula Boys—Columbia CL 565 (12" LP) List: \$4.85 Hawaiian music has a dreamy, romantic quality so captivating that the sound of its gentle tones has lured many a tourist to the shores of the isles. On this album, some of the most famous Hawaiian musicians deliver a collection of some less familiar Hawaiian melodies. The Waikiki Hula Boys employ the use of a Ohe, one of the most ancient of Hawaiian instruments in their delivery. Fans of this type of music will appreciate the album. Limited appeal.

The beautifully bound case, in addition to the three great LPs, also contains a brief history of ballet, fabulous photos by George Platt Lyres, one of the leading ballet photographers, a short synopsis of each ballet, short bios on each conductor and for hi-fi fans, information about the conditions under which each piece was waxed. Ballet lovers will adore this. Should be a great Christmas gift too.

A Toscanini release means money in the bank for all dealers. The maestro is probably the greatest conductor of all time. On this LP, the outstanding figure offers some of the public's favorite selections. These numbers do not often appear on a symphony orchestra's program mainly because of their familiarity. However, the Toscanini treatments of these popular selections are not common. They are in a class by themselves. From the melodic segments to the sombre portions, Mr. Toscanini is unbeatable. His amazing deliveries give new light and freshness to these often recorded pieces. A must for the Toscanini worshipper.

Paul Paray conducting the Detroit Symphony Orchestra

The pairing of Schumann's D Minor Symphony and Liszt's "Les Preludes" pairs two of the most stirring and lovely classical pieces available and provides a basic must for any collector's library. However both works have been recorded often and by top-flight orchestras, and this could keep sales down. The pieces are performed expertly; the technical sound all that could be desired and for those who do not yet possess either piece this album represents an excellent buy.

JAZZ

BARNEY KESSEL — Vol. 2 — Contemporary Records C2514—(1-10" LP) List: \$3.00

SPEAK LOW; LOVE IS HERE TO STAY; HOW LONG HAS THIS BEEN GOING ON; ON A SLOW BOAT TO CHINA; BARNEY'S BLUES; A FOGGY DAY; PRELUDE TO A KISS; 64 BARS ON WILSHIRE.

This is Barney Kessel's second album for Contemporary and the only two to our knowledge that has Kessel fronting his own combo. To many in the music field Kessel is the number one guitar in the country. There is no doubt in anyone's mind that he is definitely one of the top men around and this album will do nothing to hurt his reputation. The combination of the guitar, Bob Cooper on the oboe and tenor sax; Claude Williamson, piano; Monty Budwig, bass; and Shelly Manne, drums, brings forth a sound that will appeal to all phases of music lovers. Kessel maintains the melody throughout while putting into effect his ideas and musical experiments. His linear notes on the back of the album are very informative and extremely interesting.

JAZZ ON THE CAMPUS LTD., Vol. 1.—Max Kaminsky and his Dixieland Bashers—RCA Victor LJM 3003 (1-10" LP) List: \$3.67

JAZZ ON THE CAMPUS; I WISH I COULD SHIMMY LIKE MY SISTER KATE; SHIM-ME-SHA-WABBLE; WHIFFENPOOF SONG; IF I HAD MY WAY; UGLY CHILE; SATANIC BLUES; CARRY ME BACK TO OLD KAMINSKY.

With the emphasis on jazz releases and the resultant increase in the Dixieland issues, it was just a matter of time before Max Kaminsky was the featured artist on one of them. RCA Victor brings the trumpet star to an audience well acquainted with his talents. Assisting Kaminsky are clarinetist Hank D'Amico; Cliff Leeman on the drums; Ray Diehl on the trombone and Dick Carey on the piano. The group dishes up such Dixieland perennials as "Shim-Me-Sha-Wabble", "Ugly Chile" and "I Wish I Could Shimmy Like My Sister Kate". A fine release that will surely please Dixieland enthusiasts.

THE WORKSHOP OF THE GEORGE WALLINGTON TRIO—Norgran Records MG N-24 (1-10" LP) List: \$3.85

George Wallington, working with such topflight artists as Dizzy Gillespie, Joe Marsala, Charlie Parker, Georgie Auld, Kai Winding and many others, has slowly but surely carved a niche for himself in the modern jazz field. His nimble fingering, writings, and arranging ideas are put forth on this album and the results are such that they should result in sales to the modern jazz fan. Wallington is aided by Arthur Taylor on the drums and Curly Russell on bass. Of the eight pieces performed, five are Wallington originals.

With the buyer penchant for the deluxe album on the rise, RCA Victor offers the complete version of Berlioz' "The Damnation of Faust" with a fine cast that includes Suzanne Danco, soprano, as Marguerite; David Poleri, tenor, as Faust; Martial Singher, baritone, as Mephistopheles; and Donald Gramm, bass, as Brander. Students, Citizens and Soldiers are portrayed by the Harvard Glee Club and The Radcliffe Choral Society and the brilliant orchestral work is done by The Boston Symphony Orchestra with Charles Munch at the helm. The opera is a seldom recorded work and this version should appeal to collectors of operas. An extensive booklet is enclosed with detailed notes and translation of the text. The hard cover book album is adorned with a brilliantly colored abstract original by the famous Mexican painter, Rufino Tamayo, on direct commission from RCA Victor.

Brubeck & Bostic At Basin Street, New York

NEW YORK—Dave Brubeck and Earl Bostic share title honors at the Basin Street with strong support from Carmen McRae and the Matt Matthews Quartet. A well rounded and enticing show.

Brubeck's scintillating piano work, the solid alto saxwork of Paul Desmond and the rhythm work of Bob Bates on bass and Joe Dodge on Drums changed a cold audience to an enthusiastically responsive one. Brubeck, who is credited with being responsible for the changeover of West Coast tastes from Dixieland to Modern, had the blase table sitters eating out of his hands by the time he had finished his set of modern classical interpretations. The group has an entirely different sound than that associated with any other combo. The readings are alive and filled with spirit and it is obvious Brubeck will win many converts to Modern before he is through.

On an entirely different vein Earl Bostic dished up a variety of tunes in his specialized jazz-rhythm and blues treatments. His newest recordings, "Mambostic," "Mambolina" and "Blue Skies" was well received and his topper and final number, "Let's Have A Ball Tonight," was the wildest sax performance we've ever seen. Bostic was supreme. A great showman and a crowd pleaser.

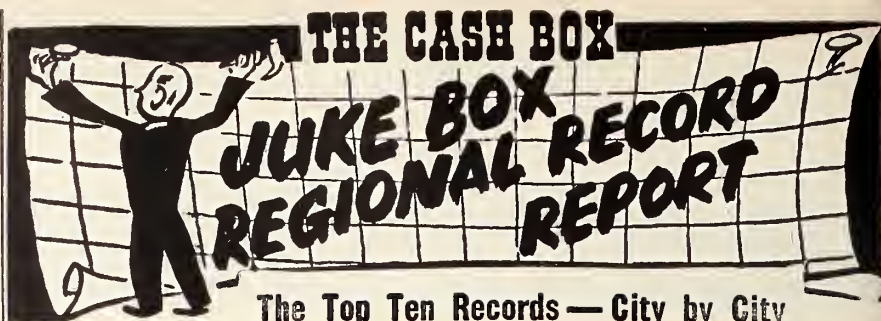

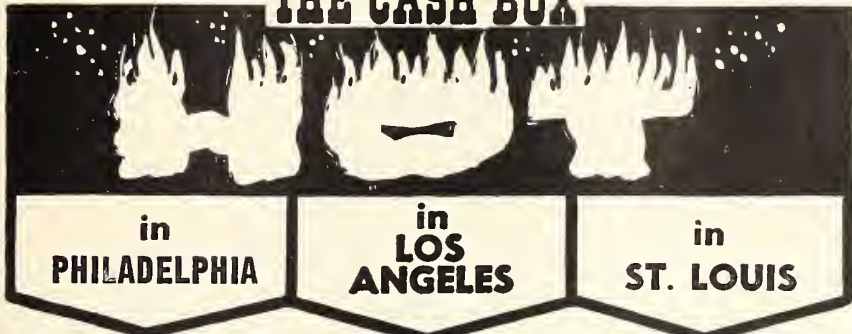

At times I've seen them smile as if amused, bounce about and pat their feet to the groovy rhythms that these slicings contained. True they went to their pockets and wallets for the coins which upon being exchanged made it possible for the said pressings to establish resting places in the charts of the nation. True, nobody forced these patrons to buy the platters that were loaded with many distasteful sets of lyrics. They made the many treks to and from the racks because they wanted good music, good music to listen to and good music to dance to. And a great many of the above type did possess this. In fact in many cases the musicians, arrangements and other gimmicks which served to support or background that which was taking place down front, was so much in good taste that the guys and dolls went for this good quality alone. I offer in support of the above statements the fact that in many cases manufacturers and A & R men have formed the opinion that with the rhythm and blues things it really wasn't necessary at all times to understand all the words. Therefore the artists' deliveries sailed on to great heights and made terrific amounts of money for all concerned, covering up the filthy or too suggestive wordings with tricky bits of slurrings or phrasings. This writer took it upon himself to see to it that some of the uptown men of position and some of the customers chanced to glance at the recent issue of *The Cash Box* which gave out with a very timely notice to men of the trade to do something mighty quick about the release of this type. These people were much impressed and showed great appreciation for this move by the publication. Many asked for additional copies of the magazine for future reference. I repeat, the Harlem uptown record buyer along with uptowners all around have never accepted and never will accept these degrading sets of nouns, pronouns, verbs etc. Check back gentlemen and once again give a listen to a few of the big r & b sellers which were immaculate. The difference in the number of sales if there is any is really not worth the risk of endangering the reputation of a good company. These writings are not directed to any particular individual, but is just this scribbler's way of trying to be a bit helpful. We are very close to the purchaser. We overhear their opinions and think it a great service and advantage to the gentlemen who invest the money if we relay our findings to them so that they might proceed along their merry ways merrier. We also suggest that the makers of the wax hits and the spinners of the wax hits take a little time out to better acquaint themselves with the difference between a good piece of blues material and shady type. Believe me, wise gentlemen of the record row, the scene is fastly changing. The r & b buyer is definitely showing more and more appreciation for the better type of listenings. Just thought you'd like to know these things.

"Adventures of Hajji Baba"

The swashbuckling "Adventures of Hajji Baba", 20th Century Fox' mysterious Near East adventure should pull big with all age groups, especially the youngsters who go for the blood and thunder type story. In this category, the flicker has everything from the horseback chase to knife and sword play.

The CinemaScope film is the story of a young Persian barber in the post Arabian Nights era who gets involved with a Caliph's daughter.

Fawzia, played by Elaine Stewart, against her father's wishes, makes plans to escape from the palace with a courier, to marry Prince Nur-El-Din. Hajji Baba (John Derek) bribes the courier and escorts the lovely Fawzia in his place.

The two are captured by a band of beautiful women bandits who prey on passing caravans and merchants. Nur-El-Din, hearing of the capture, sends his army and saves Hajji Baba and Fawzia from torturous death.

However, during this period, Fawzia has discovered that she is really in love with Hajji Baba. With lances, knives, swords and trick riding, Hajji wins the princess and marries her.

It's an imaginative adventure filmed in beautiful color that shines on the CinemaScope screen.

The title song of the picture is excellently performed by Nat "King" Cole. The tune is heard at least a dozen times throughout the film. There's no doubt that this recording will sell in great quantities since the flicker will be visited by hordes of teenagers.

Ethel Smith On Tour

NEW YORK—Ethel Smith, internationally known organ recitalist, launches her fall-winter national concert tour October 26, when she performs with the Indianapolis Symphony at the Murat Theatre, Indianapolis, Indiana, her third recital with his symphonic orchestra. This concert will be sponsored by the Indiana State Medical Association, which is holding its annual convention on the 6th and personally requested the organ star's presence at the Hammond. Other concerts to follow for Ethel Smith will take in the cities of Cleveland, Dallas, New Orleans, and Milwaukee.

"Carmen Jones"

"Carmen Jones", which was a smash on Broadway about a decade ago has been translated into a movie version with Harry Belafonte as Joe and Dorothy Dandridge as Carmen.

The setting is a modernized one in which the famed Bizet music is brought up to date with lyrics which fit the present situation.

The story takes place down South and opens in a parachute factory in which Carmen works and where Joe is stationed as a soldier. Although the picture doesn't have the same color and excitement which the stage production had, it should go a long way in repopularizing the Bizet music.

As far as the principals are concerned, the film will undoubtedly spread the fame of Harry Belafonte, Dorothy Dandridge and Pearl Bailey throughout the entire world.

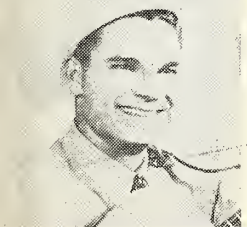

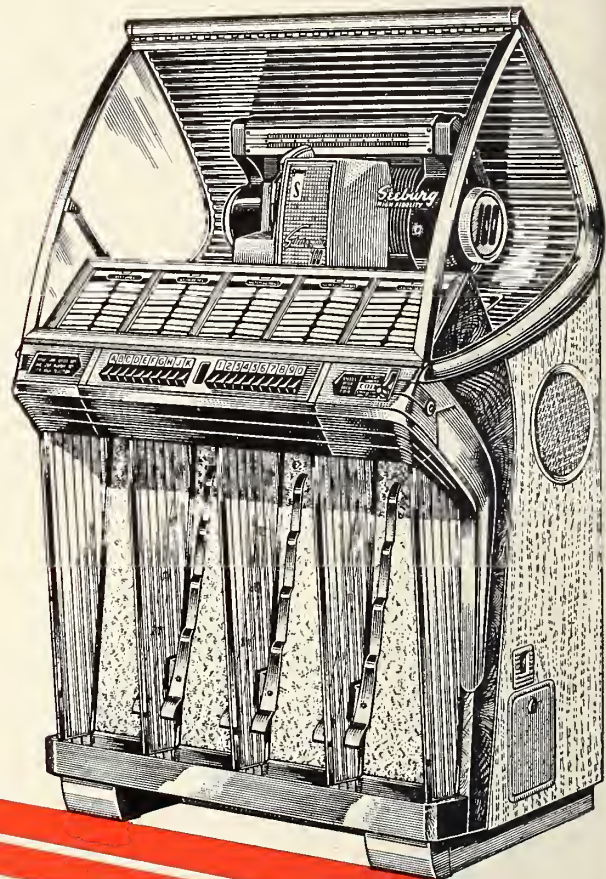
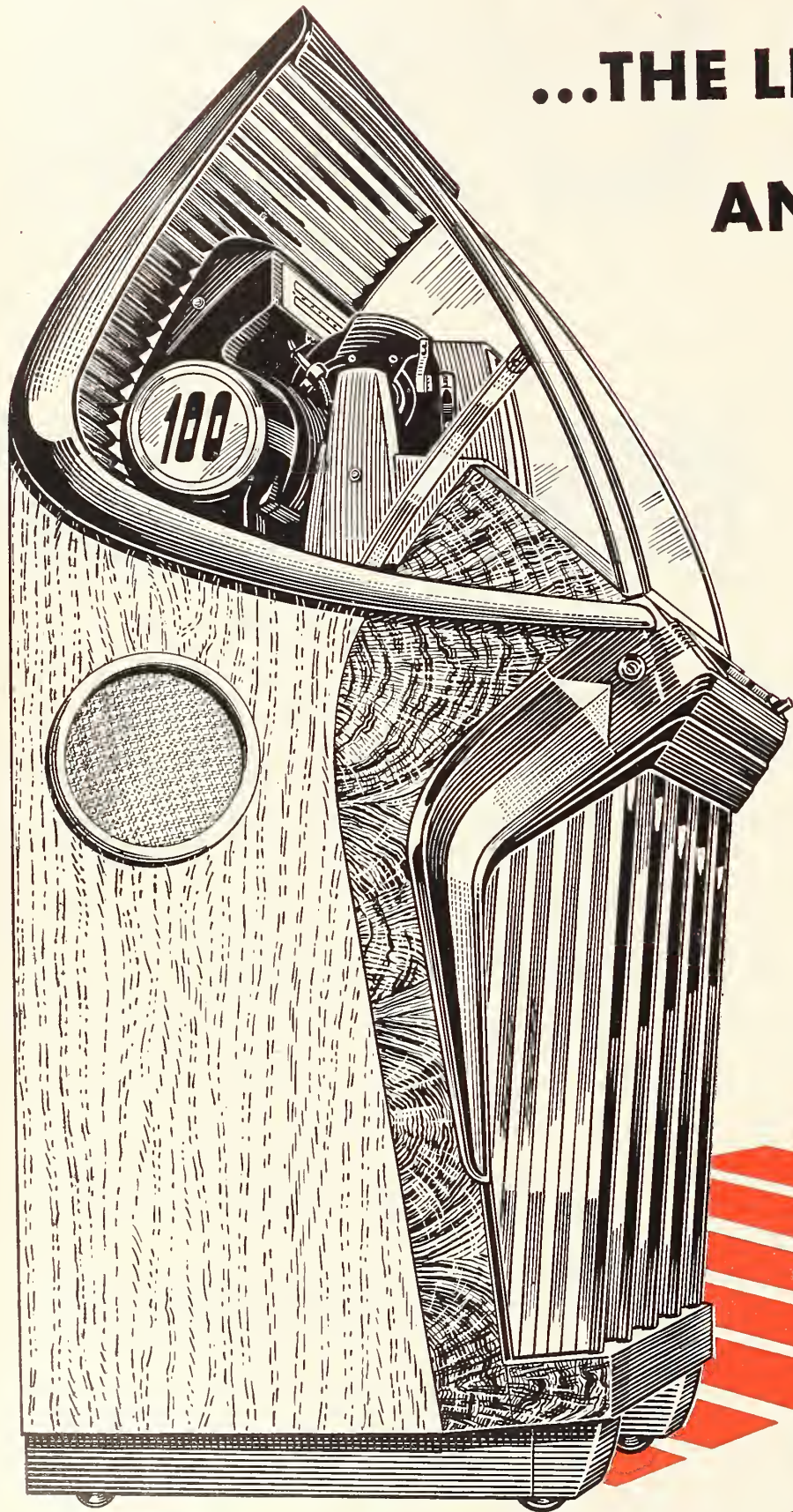

HOW TO LOSE MONEY BUYING RECORDS

Here and There

NEW YORK—In the past few years, salesmanship has once again taken its rightful place in the nation's economy. For many years, business prospered because of demand being bigger than industry could supply. Now with supply ahead of demand (in the coin machine business as well as in most all other industries) sales efforts are most necessary. Recognizing this fact, many firms are running sales contests among its distributors, awarding them prizes. Foremost prize award is a trip somewhere. An expert estimates that at least 120,000 super-salesmen will have taken luxury trips this year as a reward for selling. The trip usually provides accommodations for the wives as well, which it is stated, increases the incentive of the sales people. A manufacturer of coin operated phonographs used this travel award prize to good advantage during the past months, and will soon announce that about a dozen distributing executives and their wives will take off on a luxury vacation trip to the Southland.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—At a meeting of the National Association of Sheet Metal Distributors and the National Wholesale Hardware Association, Bennett S. Chapple, Jr., assistant executive vice president of U.S. Steel Corporation, said the American economy could easily operate next year at a level which would make 1955 the second or third highest year in the post-war period. "There is reason to believe that operations in the steel industry will average slightly above our 1954 experience," he said. He added "Next year will be a period of over-all business stability, with volume at approximately the present level." This prediction augers well for the economy of the entire country, as it is acknowledged that if "steel," being the nation's basic industry, increases its business in 1955, business in general will also increase.

NEW YORK—In a film "Tune In Tomorrow" designed for showing to advertising, business and broadcasting industry groups, CBS stated that American business can expect by 1960 an over-all market of 177,000,000 persons ready to spend \$70,000,000 more than they do today. At the current rate of growth, the film sets forth, the population should go up 16,000,000, with a 20 per cent higher standard of living by 1960. It states that advertising has helped to build the current economy and says the business problem consists of "making everybody want the satisfaction that a higher standard of living can bring."

The other day a very well known music operator visited with us. We talked about this, that and the other thing. We complimented him on the marvelous public relations work he was doing for all in his territory. Then, as an afterthought, we asked:

"Say, how come you're no longer sending us your ten top money-making tunes as you used to do each week?"

He hesitated. Then, in a somewhat embarrassed fashion, he told us:

"Well, if you want to know the whole truth, I don't have anything to do with the records we buy. I've got a little girl working for me in the office and she takes care of this for me."

Is there any need to go any further? We could stop right here and, without any doubt, hundreds of music operators reading this would, just like this music man did, after we let go at him with all we had regarding the most important and vital essential to his business—the buying of records, be just as shamefaced as he was when he left us.

Here was an outstanding music operator. A music operator who could, without doubt, repair any type of phonograph on his route. An operator who knew electronics and mechanics. An operator who knew how to really operate. He has been engaged in the operating business for over twenty years.

An operator who spent his good money on public relations advertisements to benefit himself, as well as all the operators in his territory. Who called together all the other operators to arrange for a better commission basis. Who had dozens of locations that have been his locations from the day he started in business.

But a music operator, like hundreds of other music operators, who just didn't know music. He had made himself dependent on some little girl in his office to purchase what she thought, sitting in that same office eight hours a day, was what his customers on his many locations would like to hear.

If ever there was anything that could be called gross neglect and absolute inefficiency, certainly this is it. This music operator isn't alone in this gross neglect of the most vital element of his business, the buying of records.

Hundreds of other music operators all over the nation are just as shamefully neglecting their locations. The very same operators who cry that present collections aren't big enough. Operators who howl because machines don't come down in price when they, themselves, read that labor

continues to win ever higher wage agreements all over the country. When they know that because costs are high they must absolutely practise the very greatest efficiency.

Without records, of what value is even the finest automatic phonograph in the world? Without the right kind of recordings, the records that the patrons of each and every different and individual location want to hear, what value is there keeping the phonograph in the location and howling about losing money on this operation?

How in the world can a little girl, confined in the office of an operator approximately eight hours each working day, know what the different kinds of people who patronize certain types of locations really want to hear?

Even if and when a location owner phones her and tells her of records his patrons request from him, which is something no music operator worth his salt ever wants to hear has happened to his business, all she can do is simply comply with the request, and hope that these records will bring some coin into the phonograph in that location.

The fact is that the record requested by this location owner may not even be the correct recording to be used in that very location. If the operator, himself, will visit the location, remain there for a while when the place is busy, listen and talk with the people who patronize the place, to learn the kind of people they are and the kind of music they like, he may be the most surprised man in all his territory to find that, when he properly programs his phonograph with the kind of recordings he learns the patrons of his various locations really want to hear, his collections will take a sky high jump.

There is only one way to properly program any automatic phonograph, and that is to spend sufficient study time in the location where the phonograph is located. To thereby learn exactly what the people in each individual location really like to listen to in the way of music. Then, and then only, will the operator be able to properly program his phonograph, and be able to enjoy top collections from each one of his locations.

How to lose money? It's very simple, Mr. Music Operator. Just leave the programming of the phonograph on each one of your locations to some 'little girl' confined in your offices eight hours each working day. Just let her, without any knowledge whatsoever of the different kind of people who patronize each of your individual locations, or the kind of music they really like to hear, do all the record buying for you!

UNITED MUSIC OPS OF MICH. VOTE TO ADOPT 10¢ PLAY

Will Set Day for Entire City of Detroit to Change Over to 10c Play at Special Meeting October 18

Bill Gersh, Publisher of The Cash Box, Given Great Ovation by All Present for Stirring Speech That Led To Vote

DETROIT, MICH.—Roy Small, Conciliator and Public Relations Counsellor of United Music Operators of Michigan, was just as happy and elated as any present at the biggest gathering in the history of this organization when, by a unanimous vote, all members present decided to adopt 10c play for the City of Detroit.

The distributors present, Lou Nemesh, Joe Brilliant, Carl Angott and Tony Sanders all joined in and made stirring speeches of their own telling how they would cooperate 100 percent with the operators.

Lou Fisher, Pat Patton, Tony Vance, Ed Carlson, Roy Small and many, many others also got up to speak on 10c play.

Irving Ackerman, well known De-

troit attorney, congratulated the entire organization on its great and progressive development. He explained that he had hoped, when he arrived to attend this, his first meeting of UMO, that the men would vote to adopt 10c play.

Edward L. Carlson, president of UMO, presided. J. M. Jeffrey, vice-president; Harry L. Norton, secretary and Anthony Syracuse were the officers in attendance. Honorary past president, Frank Alluvot, was also on hand.

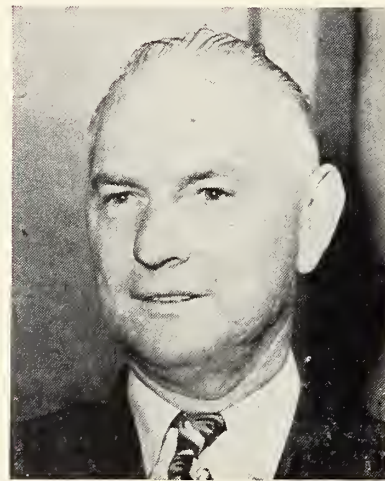

In the meantime, a committee has been appointed to return with the information the members desire regarding cost of changeover for phonos as well as wall and bar boxes. Also the best and easiest way to make the changeovers and also whatever other information, such as the letters and type advertisements to location owners, that should be arranged prior to the entire city switching over to 10c play.

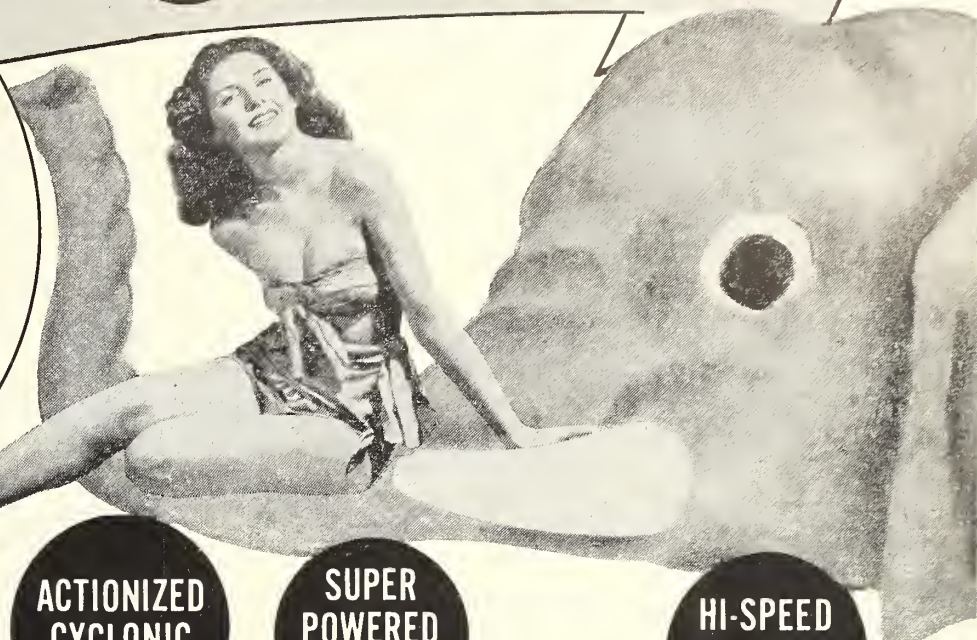

AMI Intros Model "F" Phono

Features Multi-Horn Hi-Fi Sound

Distributors Hold Open House Showings Week of Oct. 9

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH. — AMI Incorporated's new Model "F" automatic phonograph, the first and only juke box with multi-horn high fidelity, went on display this week at distributor points across the country, John W. Haddock, president, announced.

An outstanding feature of the new series of three machines being introduced, said Haddock, is the "Sonoramic Sound" which surrounds the listener with music that is recreated in the full range and exact tonal shading of every voice and instrument. This multi-horn high fidelity is an exclusive AMI development for reproducing music of a quality and realism until now known only in the concert hall, he declared.

"'Sonoramic Sound' brings a new dimension to music and does for the ears what the wide screen 'Cinerama' movies have done for the eyes," Haddock said. It makes possible, through the use of both bass and high frequency horns, high fidelity reproduction not previously possible except in the most costly custom built installations, he added.

The new Model "F" series, the sixth to be introduced since the end of World War II, includes Model "F-40" which plays 40 selections on 78 rpm records; Model "F-80" which plays 80 selections on 45 rpm records; and Model "F-120" which plays 120 selections on 45 rpm records.

Another notable development in the new Model "F" machines, asserted Haddock, is the use of a principle of color dynamics, entirely new to the automatic music field, as an aid to music merchandising. A new "Miracle Finish" is used on the cabinet, practically impervious to abuse, in a wide range of smart, full-tone decorator colors.

The cabinet itself is of contemporary design modeled in the clean-line functional manner of smartly designed furniture, set off by bright metal trim.

Operating in conjunction with both the bass and treble horns is a unique

cross-over frequency dividing network that sends low frequencies to the bass horn and high frequencies to the treble horn. Each horn handles the frequencies for which it was specifically designed. One horn picks up where the other leaves off so that there is no fading in the important middle range.

A new, extremely light but rigid die cast high fidelity tone arm uses the General Electric variable reluctance cartridge, with a single instant-change stylus. Acoustical output of the full range amplifier, with a signal well beyond 20 to 25,000 cps, equals 50 watts with ordinary speakers.

The turntable runs with the precision of expensive studio transcription turntables. It was a new sure-grip friction drive and plays records horizontally, the same way they are recorded, to prevent any wows, rumble or flutter.

With its solid, one-piece back, the new Model "F" ends "back-door" nuisance. The door at bottom front of cabinet leads to the new amplifier, credit unit, junction box, cash box, receiver, opening to the bass horn speaker enclosure, and slug rejector. Service is easy and fast because of this easy accessibility to inside equipment.

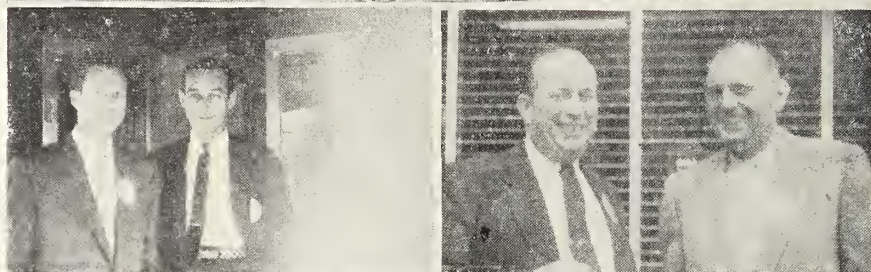
Commenting on the multi-horn fidelity system of the new series, AMI engineers said the use of horns is universally accepted by audio engineers for exact duplication of sound waves. Without horns, waves set in motion by the vibrations of loud speaker diaphragms tend to dissipate, slur and build up unpleasant resonances. With the horns, sound waves grow to their original quality and magnitude without alteration of wave patterns. Faithful bass reproduction requires horns of great size that provide ample room for the slow vibrations of the lower frequencies to develop. AMI engineers have created such a bass horn and ingeniously folded it into the lower portion of cabinet.

The folded bass horn is more than the equivalent of nine 12-inch speakers, or nearly 50 inches long when extended. Like the giant pipes of an organ, the horn brings out the lowest low with unparalleled fidelity. True lows are obtained without the juke box "boom."

The treble horn is activated by a loudspeaker or "driver" diaphragm also. Unlike its bass counterpart, however, the size of this horn must be greatly restricted to avoid distortion and electronic exaggeration.

High frequency waves vibrate rapidly and the instant response necessary to their high fidelity reproduction requires a diaphragm of extremely small diameter such as the one-inch metal disc used in AMI's treble horn which is flared to disperse

music to all parts of the room. This horn is located at ear level to avoid tonal muffling from furniture, rugs, drapes and other objects that obstruct low-placed high frequency speakers.

Everything can be heard on the new

machines from 40 to 14,000 cps. Visitors to the High Fidelity Show held in the Palmer House, Chicago, recently had a sneak preview of the new Model "F." It was the only juke box on display at the show.

Westchester Music Ops Grow More Enthusiastic Over Dime Play as Collections Continue to Jump. Skeptics High In Praise

PORTCHESTER, N. Y.—"10c Play Experiment By Westchester Ops Success" was the headline of a feature story which appeared in October 2 issue of *The Cash Box*.

Since this report was made, Westchester operators are more and more jubilant over the results. Collections have been mounting steadily, and the most skeptical music operators are now the most outspoken in their praise of the dime, 3 for 25c play.

Not only are these operators satisfied with their initial conversions, but are now expanding their programs to take in practically every location possible.

One of the foremost operators here, Max Klein, observed dryly that originally he was against the idea of 10c play. "I am completely satisfied that dime play can be a success and increase our collections greatly, if it is done correctly" now states Klein. "Our average gross collections, as of now," he continued, "are up from 30 to 40 per cent. We have had practically no trouble, with the exception of a complaint from location owners, on the average of about 1 to 12 spots.

We were able to overcome any objections to dime play in these few spots by educating the owners and bartenders to explain to the patrons that they can select extended play records, (we insert from 20 to 30 records in each machine, depending upon the location) which gives them 2 tunes for a dime, 6 for a quarter. This extended play feature is very important at the start and has been extremely helpful in overcoming any location complaints. And, of course, the plan was initiated with only new model phonographs."

Another prominent operator, Seymour Pollak, was bubbling with enthusiasm. "Altho we've been on dime play a short time" he said, "we've found that our collections continue to increase each week, as the patrons evidently become more agreeable to inserting dimes. At this time, we find that our gross collections have risen to from 60 to 75 per cent over what it was on 5c play. The location owners, receiving greater shares for themselves, are also very happy over the changeover."

Pollak also credits much of the program's success to the use of extended play records.

Paul Calamari and Bob Breither of the Bally engineering staff are heading to the Pacific Northwest to conduct service schools sponsored by Dunis Distributing Company. Eddie Morrison and Johnny Michaels of the Dunis organization will be hosts at the schools to be held at the Park Hotel, Great Falls, Montana, October 18; Dunis Headquarters, Spokane, Washington, October 19; Dunis Headquarters, Seattle, Washington, October 20, 21. Calamari and Breither then move on to Dunis Distributing Company, Portland, Oregon, October 22, 23, where popular Lou Dunis will greet coin machine men from that area.

While Calamari and Breither are covering the Northwest, Henry "Brownie" Brown, another seasoned veteran of the Bally engineering staff, will conduct the Bally Service School at New Orleans Novelty Company, New Orleans, La., October 19, 20. Louis Boasberg and Ray Bosworth will be hosts at this gathering.

At all schools the Bally engineers will provide up-to-the-minute servicing methods and other pertinent information on current Bally products, "Jet" and "Rocket" Bowlers, "Variety" in-line game, and the two popular kiddie-rides, "Moon-Ride" and "The Chamion" horse-ride, now produced in new flashy colors plus other improvements.

Operators and servicemen are urged to attend these schools, as they are certain to obtain many pointers that will do much to increase earnings and reduce service calls to an absolute minimum.

juke box industry, that he would prove that big city drug stores were great locations for automatic music.

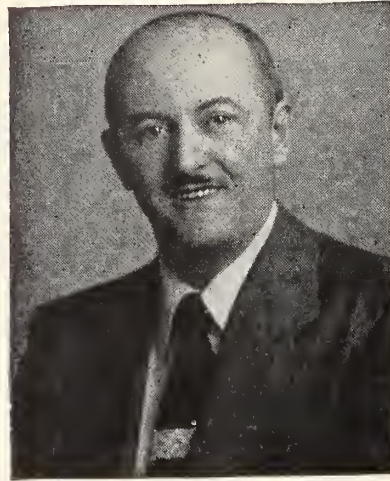

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TAX HIKES AHEAD

Many States Face Financial Troubles. Seek Ways and Means to Hike Sales and Business Taxes. Coinops Fear Big Increases of All Coin Machine Taxes When State Legislatures Convene

Need for "Nat'l. Tax Council" Grows More Grave

CHICAGO — Reports emanating from the annual conference of the National Tax Association, the state tax collectors, definitely indicate that the fears of many operators, which have been reported here for sometime, that the states all over the nation would be seeking to hike sales and business taxes, were most completely correct.

Even tho the states took a record breaking \$11.1 Billions this past year, they find themselves facing serious financial troubles.

Minnesota, it is reported, plans a new sales tax. New York wants higher gasoline taxes. California expects to obtain higher truck taxes. Connecticut recently boosted its sales tax from 2% to 3% which was supposed to be a "temporary measure" but which, it now seems, will become permanent.

Almost every single state in the union has one plan or another for increasing all license taxation in an effort to stave off financial bankruptcy. And almost every plan, in one form or another, hits at the coin machines industry.

Operators have for sometime now been writing to this publication advising that they feared greatly increased taxation when their state legislatures once again convened.

The Cash Box has, for over eleven years now, called for the industry to create a "National Tax Council" to

help all and any operators who run up against sudden tax increases and have no past precedents or legal statistics with which to forestall such increases.

So far the few attempts which have been made to bring into being a "National Tax Council" have failed. It is the hope of this publication, now that the states have become desperate for more income, that something will be quickly brought into being to help the many operators who will need such aid.

It must be remembered that, as the states increase license and tax fees, the cities and communities thruout the state usually follow suit. This means that if the state sees fit to hike a machine license from \$25 to \$50 the city that is obtaining \$10 for the same machine license will, in almost every case, hike the fee to \$20.

The average operator can't stand any more such license fees increases. He is hard put to meet the license fee demands each year to keep his machines in operation as it is.

Increases all over the nation will terribly effect the industry and, therefore, it is the hope of this publication that somehow a "National Tax Council" will quickly come into being to start collecting the necessary legal data to help the operators who will be faced with hiked taxation as their state legislatures convene.

Chi Coin Intros New Bowler

CHICAGO—Chicago Coin Machine Company, this city, through its director of sales, Ed Levin, announced this past week the introduction of an entirely new play principal on its new six-player "Flash Bowler."

"Never since 'advance scoring,'" said Levin, "has a bowling game stirred so much excitement. For the first time, the player's skill determines the value of strikes and spares."

"This is accomplished," Levin revealed, "by the new 'Flash-O-Matic' scoring feature."

"This 'Flash-O-Matic' scoring feature is located on the score glass just below the score drums and has a series of strike and spare scores which flash progressively from left to right and continue to travel until the first puck is shot."

"The object, of course," Levin clarified, "is to shoot the puck skillfully to stop the strike and spare count on the highest possible score which, in the 'Flash Bowler', is 150 points."

"As soon as the player finishes his shot and after his score (1800 is high score for the entire game) is tallied in any particular frame, the 'Flash-O-Matic' score light again begins to travel from left to right for his next frame or for the next player if more than one player is playing the game."

"Because 'Flash Bowler' requires

player timing as well as a skillfully directed shot," stated Levin, "new player appeal is accomplished. Persons must actually play 'Flash Bowler' to feel the thrill of accomplishing new high scores because of 'Flash-O-Matic' scoring."

"Flash Bowler" has a new look in cabinet design. It features large slanting legs. The cabinet has wide-grooved side moldings that extend from the front to the rear giving the game a long appearance, and yet the entire cabinet is only 8 feet long.

The score cabinet features a hinged score glass which is locked automatically by shutting the frame from the front and held securely with a tamper-proof latch.

The foul line rod, glass moldings and trim are highly polished chrome. A newly designed, highly colored formica playfield is introduced for the first time.

"Flash-O-Matic scoring," predicted Levin, "will prove to have much more player appeal than any of the many features which previously have been introduced into bowling games by Chicago Coin Machine Company for the past three years."

He also revealed that "Flash Bowler" is at all the firm's distributors with quantity shipment being made.

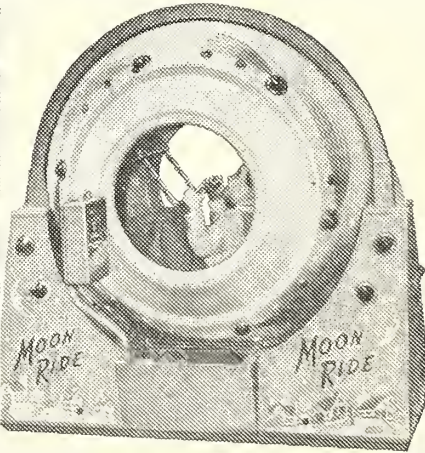

Editorial

WHO LOSES WHEN AN OPERATOR WON'T BUY NEW MACHINES?

To the intelligent and progressive operator the above sounds like a very foolish question, indeed. It is a very foolish question if asked of the progressive and intelligent operator. As any of these men will immediately answer:

"The operator loses, of course!"

Whether it's the purchase of new machines, or new shelves, or a new air conditioning system, new dishes, new uniforms, or more new and better merchandise, and whatever business it concerns itself with, the fact remains that any business man who desires to progress and to gain top favor with the general public, his customers, must constantly bear in mind the three R's of good business:

Renew, Revive, Replenish.

There are, believe it or not, some operators, here and there about the nation, who believe that they are outsmarting their location owners, and who also believe that they are hoodwinking their distributors and/or the manufacturers, when they stop buying new equipment.

As everyone who has been in this industry for any length of time, or any other industry for that matter, knows—they are simply kidding themselves.

The coin machine operator caters to the very people all other business men cater to. When this coin machine operator, who thinks he is outsmarting his location owners, distributors and/or manufacturers, walks into a restaurant that hasn't changed a chair or a table cloth or modernized its kitchen; that doesn't give him the proper type of air conditioned and modern atmosphere; and where food is just something to be stuffed into his mouth from unclean dishes, and not something truly delectable to whet his appetite—he just simply walks out of the place. What's more, he never goes back. And he also tells all his friends, "What a lousy joint it is."

What, then, does this operator think the players tell each other about the worn out, dirty, decrepit old games he's still trying to force them to play?

What happens when a progressive, modern, up-to-the-minute operator, an operator that's on-the-ball, walks in and shows this operator's locations the difference between new machines, constantly changed new machines, better service, plus finer cooperation, for greater intake?

How long does the operator remain in business who thinks he's outsmarting his location owners by not bring-

ing them new equipment? Only until such time as some intelligent and progressive operator finds out what's happening and barges down on his locations. That's all!!

Would it really be a marvelous business world if there wasn't constant change? If there wasn't constant challenge to the more agile and logical thinking power of the man who engages himself in any business? If there wasn't that challenge for the business man that keeps him on his toes because of new improvements and developments that, of themselves, create constant competition?

The operator in this industry is no different than the business man in any industry today. He must quickly adapt himself to modern business methods. He must be sufficiently flexible to change with the changes which come into force in the places where he places his machines.

The old type dirty looking restaurants and taverns have turned into beautiful and more expensive locations. These restaurateurs and tavern keepers keep up with the constant changes in their business. With the continued purchase of new merchandise. With improvements. With regular modernization programs. They know that they cannot long last in business unless they are on their toes all of the time.

There is no way to dodge facts. The operators who are constantly progressing, who are definitely on the way up, who lead their territories, are the operators, like the business men in their communities, who keep pace with the progress of their industry.

Such operators bring their players, the general public, the best and newest machines, so that no competitor can challenge their right to their locations. At the same time, they have the satisfaction of maintaining their income at top peak levels while leading their industry in their areas, both financially and progressively.

Who loses when an operator won't buy new machines? The location owner loses. Since the operation of the machine is not actually the location owner's business, he looks at that machine, as he notes the constant downward trend in the intake, with very jaded and dissatisfied eyes. And, as every operator knows, he very soon says: "Take your machine out of here."

Who loses when an operator won't buy new machines? The public loses.

The public tires of the old. Just like they tire of old and wornout automobiles. Just like the public tires of drinking the same kind of juice every morning of every day for days and days. The public likes change. The player likes change.

Any juke box operator who won't change his records constantly very soon finds the patrons of his phonographs going somewhere else to play the music they like—new music—new records.

The same is even more true of the games business. Games are still novelties. The public likes them while they're new and fresh and challenging to their skill. But, once the public has played, played, played and played them some more, the public wants something new and different, to renew, revive and replenish the challenge that is contained within them as to their prowess and skill to play anything well.

Who loses, then, when the operator won't buy new machines? The operator who won't buy new machines! Because this operator is no longer a good business man. Because this operator won't cater to his customers. Because, tho this operator wants other business men to cater to him, he thinks he doesn't have to cater to his public anymore.

This sort of operator should get himself out of this business as soon as he possibly can. Because this operator is simply wending the path of bankruptcy. Not only financially, but bankruptcy of good service which, in turn, takes years to rebuild by some other operator. Some other operator who practically breaks his heart rebuilding what this first operator tore down.

Who loses when an operator won't buy new machines? The whole industry loses. Every operator loses. For the kind of an operator who won't renew, revive and replenish, is simply building bad will with the players.

He's neglecting them. He's scorning them. And they, in turn, scorn all that is coin operated.

Yes, everyone loses, not only in sales, but also in prestige, in progress, in the future greatness of this industry for all those men and women in this field who have worked so hard to win respect and prestige and great attention from all the public.

Like someone once said, "You've just simply got to gas up your car regularly to keep it running."

WHY 10c PLAY?

The basic financial year adopted by all the nation's economists as the year of comparison with all the years that have since followed is 1939.

The reason the economists chose 1939 is because in 1939 the U. S. dollar was actually worth a full and complete dollar: 100 American cents.

Here are just a few changes which have taken place in the nation's economy since 1939. After the juke box operator studies them for a while, and whether his fellow operators in his territory do, or do not, want to go to dime play, the rest is left up to his own good judgment.

All this regardless of the fact that records are better and last longer. That the four ounce tone arm with its tough, hard, wearing needle has been replaced by gram weight sapphire and diamond cartridges. And regardless of all other improvements that cut down on wear and tear.

The fact still remains that phonographs cost more, that sapphire and diamond cartridges cost more, and that because everything else, including recordings, cost more, the juke box operator must obtain more income to be able to meet his overhead to at least keep his head above the engulfing waters of financial bankruptcy by charging more. Just the same as all other business men charge more for the merchandise they sell because their costs, too, have risen 300% and more since 1939.

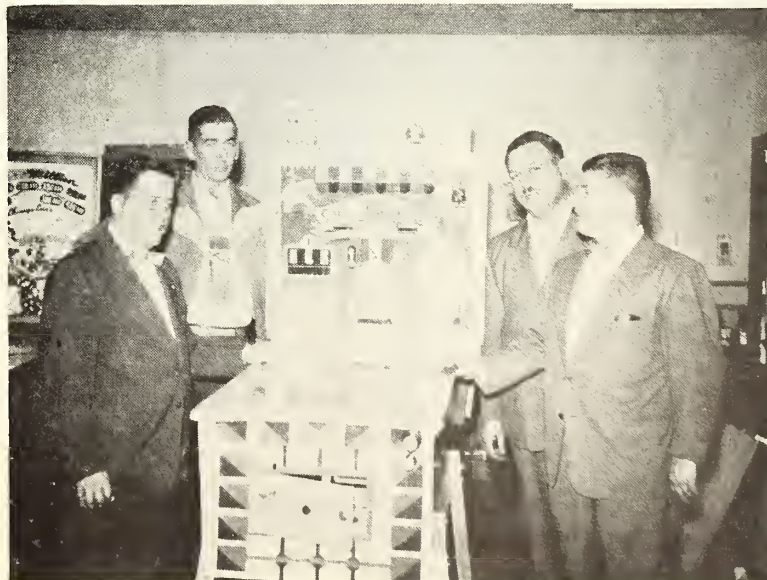

"Multi-Horn High Fidelity" is an exclusive AMI development for reproducing music of a quality and realism until now known only to the concert hall. This instrument incorporates the many high fidelity components essential to superior sound, but its use of horns makes possible the unique SONORAMIC SOUND that surrounds the listener.

The use of horns is universally accepted by audio scientists for exactly duplicating sound waves. Without horns, waves set in motion by the vibrations of loud-speaker diaphragms tend to dissipate, slur and build up unpleasant resonances. However, with exponential horns that expand in area proportionate to the distance from the loud-speaker diaphragms, sound waves are confined and grow to their original quality and magnitude without alteration of wave patterns. Faithful bass reproduction requires horns of great size that provide ample room for the slow vibrations of the lower frequencies to develop. AMI engineers have created such a bass horn and ingeniously folded it into the lower portion of this cabinet. It is equivalent to nine 12-inch loud-speakers using the floor itself as an added extension to couple sound waves and surrounding air for optimum bass acoustics.

The treble horn is activated by a loud-speaker or "driver" diaphragm also.
