THE DRIFTERS (Atlantic 2087)

The Drifters, who recently sat in the chart throne with "Save The Last Dance For Me," are sure to rock-a-cha cha their way right back there with this new slice. It's another great, tailored-for-teen-tastes opus, tagged "I Count The Stars," that the crew dishes up with money-making authority. Flipside, group's bass voice takes the lead on the remake contained in a recent LP.

DINAH WASHINGTON (Mercury 71744)

The lark's long hit chain (which currently lists "Love Walked In") should soon include both ends of her new Mercury outing. They're the short-while back Nat Cole click, "Looking Back," and the rousing newcomer, "We Have Love." Former's an ultra-lovely ballad offering while the latter's from the bright jump school. Sock choral-ork support on both winners.

"CALENDAR GIRL" (2:32) [Aldon BMI—Sedaka, Greenfield]

NEIL SEDAKA (RCA Victor 7829)

Sedaka, who's rapidly becoming one of waxdom's most consistent hit salesmen, has another pair of smash contenders to add to his collection. Leadoff slice, "Calendar Girl," is a sunny shuffle beat opus with a tantalizing set of year-round lyrics. Catchy drum bits here. Coupler's a heart rending, dual-tracked country-angled weeper that can also step way out. Excellent Stan Applebaum-led backdrops.

ROY ORBISON (Monument 433)

Either end of Orbison's new Monument slice can provide him with his third smash in-a-row (i.e. "Only The Lonely" and "Blue Angel"). One's a new entry, tabbed "I'm Hurtin'," that follows the infectious, crying towel, rock-a-cha route of the previous outings. The other, "I Can't Stop Loving You," is the while-back C&W ballad beaut that Roy (and chorus) updates superbly. Great pairing.

DUANE EDDY (Jamie 1175)

Take your pick here. There's double-barreled sales dynamite packed into the new Duane Eddy release and both ends are as different as day and night. "Pepe" is the title tune from the up-coming, star-studded pic and it thumps along in the typically happy, shout-filled Eddy Style. The "Lost Friend" side is a captivating, slow moving Eddy original with an absolutely beautiful, classical-like melody. Can be the big one in the long run.

PATTI PAGE (Mercury 71745)

Looks like another pair of chart-makers for Patti. One half, "Don't Read The Letter," should easily continue her current string of country-oriented clicks. It's a touching waltz tempo opus. The dandy companion piece, "That's All I Need To Know," is a happy-go-lucky shuffler that the lark brightly breezes thru. Two fine multi-tracked efforts.

JACK SCOTT (Top Rank 2093)

Scott, who recently made the chart rounds with "Patsy," has two more potent contenders here. One half, "Is There Something On Your Mind," is a slow paced, country-tinged weeper. The other, "Found A Woman," is a delightfully haunting rhythm entry. Both are self-penned affairs that Scott (and the Bill Sanford ork-chorus) works over in money-making manner.

VIC DAMONE (Columbia 41915)

(B+) "IF EVER I WOULD LEAVE YOU" (2:51) [Chappell ASCAP—Lerner, Lowe] One of the big ballads from "Camelot" gets a sure-handed ballad touch from Damone, who scored some years back with Lerner-Loewe's "My Fair Lady" number, "On The Street Where You Live." Alex Stordahl heads the legit full ork backing. Should be making the deejay rounds in solid fashion.

(B) "I'LL BE YOUR LOVER" (2:43) [I. Mogul ASCAP—Stillman, Rascel] Intimate Latinish approach to an English version of an Italian import.

MARIENE STOLZ (Palette 5069)

(B+) "GUTE NACHT, JOHNNY BOY" (2:21) [Zodiac BMI—Jay, Harris] German thrush invitingly caresses the lovely romantic, which effectively combines both German and English lyrics. This "Sailor"-like affair could develop into a chart stand.

(B) "NACH DEM SERVUS GIBT'S EIN WIDERSEHN" (2:35) [Zodiac BMI—Kreuder, Hilm, Aleda] "Farewell is not goodbye" is the English translation of this German-sung sentimental.

RICKY PAGE (Rendezvous 139)

(B+) "YES I'M LONESOME TONIGHT" (3:07) [Bourne & Cromwell ASCAP—Turk, Handman] Thrush "answers" the remarkable Presley hit with a silken quality vocal and, about half way, a narration. Smooth combo-chorus setting. Could succeed.

(B) "STANDING ON A MOUNTAIN TOP" (2:29) [Figure BMI—Matola, Regan] Triplet-featured rock-a-ballad stand.

LINDY ESTES (Fraternity 872)

(B+) "WHERE WILL I GO (To Forget You)" (2:18) [Kenny Marlow BMI—Powell, Stough] Strong country-styled plaintive is sensitively essayed by the singer against a first-rate rock-a-string & wordless chorus backdrop. Could develop into a click session.

(B) "MARIA" (1:48) [Benjon BMI—Young, Cox] Haunting Spanish-flavored arrangement of the dramatic name-song, not the "Maria" tunes from "West Side Story" or "Sound Of Music."

ROGER DOUGLASS (Philtone 1102)

(B+) "YOUR HAPPIEST YEARS" (2:38) [Arch ASCAP—Schroeder, Gold] Songster nicely handles the appealing rock-a-cha affectionate. Backing includes inviting Stan Applebaum ork-chorus work, highlighted by harmonica bits. Merits teentime exposure. Label is a Fleetwood Records subside.

(B) "LADDER OF LOVE" (2:15) [Arch ASCAP—Schroeder] A catchy rhythm-rock stand.

DON COVAY (Bigtop 3060)

(B+) "HEY THERE" (2:30) [Frank ASCAP—Adler, Ross] The "Pajama Game" standout gets an interesting teen-slanted light-bounce view from the singer and rock-a-string (& chorus) accompaniment. Could move via strong deejay plays.

(B) "I'M COMING DOWN WITH LOVE" (2:10) [Roosevelt BMI—Covay, Berry] Deep-down blueser with effective combo-chorus arrangement.

JERRY MAHONEY & PAUL WINCHELL (Epic 9428)

(B+) "WHEN YOU COME TO THE END OF A LOLLIPOP" (2:21) [Topper ASCAP—Hoffman, Manning] The popular ventriloquist's Jerry Mahoney dummy warbles a good kiddie-directed waltzer. Opus is tune-ful and many of Winchell's young fans will enjoy the date. England's Max Bygraves has a version on London.

(B) "ROLY POLY SNOWMAN" (2:00) [Topper ASCAP—Manning] Winchell is himself in this cute rock-a-cha sound.

THE KIRBY STONE FOUR (Columbia 41878)

(B+) "SMACK DAB IN THE MIDDLE" (2:17) [Roosevelt BMI—Calhoun] Cheerful vocal-instrumental team do a bright job on the old blues-swing. Should get big airplay a la their "Kids" take.

(B+) "MY MAMMY" (2:00) [Warrock, Donaldson & Bourne ASCAP—Lewis, Young, Donaldson] Team employs its familiar shuffle-beat sound in this likeable updating of the Al Jolson-associated standard. Also due for solid spins.

JOEL MOORE

(ABC-Paramount 10173)

(B) "RHUMATIZ" (2:43) [Tune-Kel BMI—Moore] Shout-type bits by Moore. Sly beat sound back-up. Rates attention.

(B) "SEEKING" (2:08) [Tune-Kel BMI—Orange] This good semi-sock R&B rhythmic delivered by the singer and sound-wise combo setting. Beat is good for both pop-R&B exposure.

LES BAXTER ORCH.—CHORUS (Capitol 4489)

(B) "PEPE" (2:32) [Shapiro, Bernstein ASCAP—Wittstatt, Langdon] The first lyric version of the pic main-title, currently getting active disk industry attention. Vibe-sounding keyboard heads the instrumental backing. Sprightly showing is worth sunny-time spins.

(B) "DOLCE FAR NIENTE" (2:51) [Frank Rinimer ASCAP—Willson] Same keyboard effect in this attractive all-instrumental stint on the pretty "Molly Brown" sentimental.

LINDA LEE (Shasta 146)

(B+) "ARE YOU LONESOME TONIGHT" (3:05) [Bourne ASCAP—Turk, Handman] A soft-spoken retort to the Presley smash. Male voice opens with the title and Miss Lee goes on to "answer" him. Narrative portion is included. Could step-out.

(B) "THERE HE GOES" (2:46) [Riverside ASCAP—Ray] Light-beat lost-love stint.

BETTY ROCHE (Prestige 181)

(B+) "COME RAIN OR COME SHINE." Betty Roche, a vet of the blues circuit, offers her warm, personal, sensuous vocal tones in a bluesy reading of the Harold Arlen standard. Simple organ-highlighted combo backing helps the murky mood.

(B+) "A FOGGY DAY." A lightly swinging turn on the Gershwin mainstay is a treat. Both cuts are from the thrush's "Singin' & Swingin'" Prestige LP.

"MY LAST DATE (WITH YOU)" (2:30)

[Acuff-Rose BMI—Davis, Bryant, Cramer]

"SOMEONE I'D LIKE TO FORGET" (2:31)

[Moss Rose BMI—Davis, Wilson]

SKEETER DAVIS (RCA Victor 7825)

The lark follows her "(I Can't Help It) I'm Falling Too" dual-mart answer click with a lyric version of the Floyd Cramer instrumental sensation, "Last Date." This one's labeled "My Last Date (With You)," and it's delivered with telling (dual-tracked) effect. More fine sounds on the lilting coupler.

"OH, HOW I MISS YOU TONIGHT" (2:50)

[World, Bourne ASCAP—Davis, Burke, Fisher]

"A LITTLE BIT LONELY" (2:41) [Central BMI—A. & J. Allison]

JEANNIE BLACK (Capitol 4492)

The chirp, whose 'answer recording' of "He'll Have To Stay" played a major role in her copping 'most promising' honors (in the recent Cash Box juke box ops' poll), comes up with another chart threat in "Oh, How I Miss You Tonight." It's the lovely, lilting evergreen designed as an 'answer' to the current Presley smasher. It too, has an effective recitation bit. Backing's a very pretty, similarly-styled weeper.

"YES, I'M LONESOME TONIGHT" (3:23)

[Bourne, Cromwell ASCAP—Turk, Handman]

"TOO YOUNG" (2:02) [Jefferson ASCAP—Dec, Lipman]

DODIE STEVENS (Dot 16167)

The current answer craze, which now centers on the Presley revival of "Are You Lonesome Tonight," can give Dot's young thrush her next big coin-catcher. The answer, tagged "Yes, I'm Lonesome Tonight," is handled convincingly by Dodie and chorus. Potent recitation bit. Also keep tabs on the enticing, teen beat cha cha comeback of the Nat Cole smash, "Too Young."

"BUT! MAYBE THIS YEAR" (2:25) [Iris—Trojan, Welch, Marlo]

"CRAZY DAISY" (2:15) [Marielle, Pub BMI—Hatcher]

JO ANN CAMPBELL (ABC-Paramount 10172)

Miss Campbell, whose "Kookie Little Paradise," was recently a topic of teen conversation, gives the kids more to talk about in "But!! Maybe This Year." It's a delectable rock-a-cha cha ditty that the chirp carves out in sparkling fashion. Tempo is upped on the teen appealing hard-rock "Crazy Daisy." Sid Feller's crew supplies the sock instrumental support.

"YEAH BABY" (1:46) [Ultra-Romeo BMI—Peace]

"WHAT ARE YOU DOING NEW YEAR'S EVE" (2:31)

DANTE & THE EVERGREENS (Madison 143)

Group, coming off two novelty hits in "Alley-Oop" and "Time Machine," really gets its chance to display its vocal versatility here. Artists' driving, hard-rock style shows up to good advantage on the fast moving "Yeah Baby" side. Teeners'll love it. The wonderful year-end sturdy is warmly wrapped up on the lower end. Top half for the quick action.

"YES, I'M LONESOME TONIGHT" (3:12)

[Bourne, Cromwell ASCAP—Turk, Handman]

"GIMMIE A LITTLE KISS" (2:01)

[ABC, Cromwell ASCAP—Turk, Smith, Pinkard]

THELMA CARPENTER (Coral 62241)

Thelma Carpenter steps on the 'answer bandwagon' with a deck that could ride into hitsville in the coming weeks. The fine vet talent hands in a splendid sentence-by-sentence response (complete with recitation) to the Presley chart-topper. Artist's standout answer's titled "Yes, I'm Lonesome Tonight." However, don't overlook the sensational beat-ballad up-dating of "Gimmie A Little Kiss." Ork-chorus showcase credits belong to Henry Jerome.

EARL KING (Imperial 5713)

(B+) "COME ON" Part 1 (2:30)
[Travis BMI—King] Infectious blues swinger in which vocalist and combo share equal disk time. King works up a frenzy in the Ray Charles manner.

(B) "COME ON" Part 2 (1:55)
[Travis BMI—King] Session looses momentum here, unlike most two-part'ers, and sort of peters out. Side one carries the ball.

OSCAR BROWN, JR.
(Columbia 41870)

(B) "BUT I WAS COOL" (2:55)
[Kicks BMI—Brown] Singer-actor-writer Brown bows on Columbia offers bluesy sing-a-narrative about a guy who breaks-up under trying circumstances, but insists he always plays it cool. Worth humor spins.

(B) "DAT DERE" (2:56) [Upam BMI—Brown, Timmons] Another bluesy laff bit, with Brown portraying a child who asks endless questions about the world around him. Melody in the setting is a familiar Bobby Timmons jazz opus. Two clever stints by Brown.

THE MERRI-MEN (Apt 25051)

(B) "ST. LOUIS BLUES" (2:12)
[Handy ASCAP—Handy] Hard-beat combo rockin' on the classic is headed by a sax. Guitar pounding is an important setting feature. Good rock go for the opus.

(B) "BIG DADDY" (2:17) [Tinker ASCAP—Pingatore] Sax and organ get the spotlight in this hand-clapping blues jumper.

ALAN MALACULSO (Myers 110)

(C) "I'VE HAD THAT LAST CRY OVER YOU" (2:35)
[Myers ASCAP—DeKnight, Brown] Old-fashioned romantic gets a triplet setting.

(C) "THAT'S THE WAY LIFE GOES" (2:05) [Myers ASCAP—Russell, Spickol, Snyder] The vagaries of life are described by the vocalist in a light-beat swing arrangement.

MILES & ANDREW (Play 1002)

(B) "TILL THE END OF TIME" (2:30) [Ben Hue BMI] Vocal twosome recites the affectionate—not the pop version of the Chopin melody—with tender R&B finesse. Pretty affair for the kids.

(B) "CRAZY MIX-UP FEELING" (2:15) [Ben Hue BMI] Medium-beat essay with Latinish combo accompaniment.

MILLARD WOODS (Del-Fi 4150)

(B) "DON'T PUT ME DOWN" (2:05) [Maravilla BMI—Johnston, Randolph] Songster takes on a hip swinger in an easy manner while chirps offer comments along the way. Can make good station time.

(B) "(I'm Just A) COUNTRY BOY" (2:43) [Folkway BMI—Brooks, Barer] Relaxed ballad warbling on the pretty oldie.

BUDDY HUGHEY
(United Artists 264)

(B+) "WONDERING" (2:00) [Hill & Range BMI—Werner] Old country success is given an interesting plaintive pop sound from the songster and well-done ork-chorus backing. Could move with sufficient exposure.

(B) "IT'S ALL OVER BUT THE CRYING" (2:43) [Nash-Beau BMI—Greene] Another wistful wax date.

PAMELA LAW (Boyd 1986)

(B) "JUST LIKE YOU LIKE IT" (2:20) [Tree BMI—Riley] Lark gets a contagious sound from the combo for her bluesy semi-sock vocal. NRC handles the good-sounding take.

(C+) "WHAT DID YOU DO?" (2:13) [Cedarwood BMI—Walker, Wilkins] Wistful essay with a country feel.

BOYD BENNETT (Mercury 71724)

(B+) "HERSHEY BAR" (2:34)
[Marty's Music BMI—Emerson] Interesting shuffle-beat teen item by distinctively-voiced Bennett. Combo hands-in a rock-wise arrangement.

(B) "BIG JUNIOR" (2:37) [Ben Jan BMI—Bennett, Young] A narrative-type novelty with a hard-beat sound from the musicians.

BEN SHERWIN (Liberty 55281)

(B) "HAVE A GOOD TIME" (2:17) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Bryant, Bryant] Against a legit band sound, Sherwin does a nice-n-easy vocal on the old romantic. Pleasing stuff for the jocks.

(B) "JOHNNY GOOFED" (2:33)
[Central Songs BMI—Allison] Hip swing rewrite of the "Frankie & Johnny" classic.

HUGO WINTERHALTER ORCH.
(RCA Victor 7824)

(B) "THEME FROM AN UNFILMED MOVIE" (2:42)
[Shapiro & Bernstein ASCAP—Maxwell] Though the title is tongue-in-cheek, the "theme" itself is pretty and the ork surveys it with an attractive full-ork arrangement. Worth lots of spins.

(B) "THE GIRL FROM AMSTERDAM" (2:37) [Shapiro & Bernstein ASCAP—Garson] Swinging zither-like sound is the feature of the cheerful date.

BILL DANA (Signature 12,046)

(B) "U.S. SENATOR" (2:15)
[Hollybrook ASCAP—Burns, Sargent] One of the funny takes from Bill (Jose Jimenez) Dana's best-selling Signature LP.

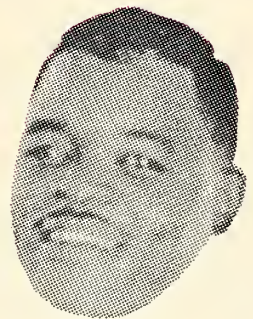
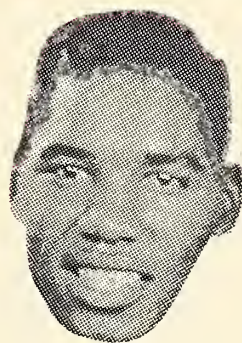

JOE TEX (Anna 1124)

Joe Tex can break out on the r&b-pop scene with his sequel to Jerry Butler's "He Will Break Your Heart." It's a 2-part'er, dubbed "I'll Never Break Your Heart," that Joe rocks out at a sock Latin beat clip. Infectious instrumental gimmicks open both halves. Side 2 is devoted to Joe's talk-sing style. It's the part 1 portion, tho, for the big coin.

"UTOPIA" (2:15) [Arch ASCAP—Schroeder, Gold, Kalmanoff]

"I AIN'T GOT A GIRL" (2:04)

[Harvest ASCAP—Muskin, Mann, Glaser, Glaser]

FRANK GARI (Crusade 1020)

Teeners oughta be alerted to this winning slice dished up by newcomer Frank Gari on the new Crusade label. Deck, titled "Utopia," is a warm, pretty opus from the teen beat "Venus" class. Soft, appealing choral-ork support for Gari's effective performance. Slick ballad-with-a-beat stint on the underlid.

"LIKE A FROG" (2:00) [Sigo BMI—Singleton, Ogermann, Coleman]

"CORAL" (2:32) [Sigo BMI—Singleton, Ogermann]

THE TORNADOES (ABC-Paramount 10174)

This one can easily start a whole new dance fad. It's a rhythmic hand-clapper, tabbed "Like A Frog," that romps along in jumpin' bunny hop fashion. There's a few catchy vocal remarks that add to the lid's hit teen sound. Flip's a fetching change-of-pace, lazy hip-swing with some here-and-there lyrics.

The Cash Box Best Bets

EYDIE GORME (United Artists 283)

(B+) "I LOVE TO DANCE (BUT NEVER ON SUNDAY)" (3:10) [Esteem, Sidmore BMI—Manos Hadjidakis, Michaeljon] The happy Don Costa instrumental click is treated to an equally delightful vocal performance by the lark. It's a real ear-pleaser that could bust wide open. It's the Costa crew that backs up here.

Newport Must Decide By Dec. 20 On '61 Festival

NEW YORK—Whether there will be a Newport Jazz Festival next year rests in action by the city of Newport by Dec. 20. At a meeting with city officials last week, Louis L. Lorillard, the tobacco-heir who is president of the festival, set the deadline as the last possible date to start planning the '61 fete.

After college-youth rioting during the festival last July 4th weekend, the city revoked the festival's license, ending the festival before its scheduled completion and bringing public pressure against another festival.

The festival instituted a \$450,000 damage suit against the city for its action. The suit, however, was not discussed at last week's meet.

Lorillard and festival treasurer James P. Maloney also gave the city a financial report which stated that \$142,000 was needed to meet the festival's obligations.

According to Lorillard, \$45,000 is needed for ticket refunds to those who could not attend the canceled performances; \$72,000 for commercial obligations including payment to performers under contract who did not perform due to the canceled performances; \$25,000 to start next year's festival.

The council promised Lorillard it would hold further meets—including a possible public hearing—on returning the festival.

Coast Distrib Names Single Sales Topper

HOLLYWOOD—Ralph Kaffel, vice-president and general manager of California Record Distributors, has announced that Gene Simmons, the firm's advertising and promotion manager, has been appointed sales manager in charge of singles. Simmons will supervise the entire singles operation of California Record Distributors. Sonny Bono and Margie Williams will handle promotion under Simmons' direction.

This year, after 10 years of being an album house exclusively, the outlet went strongly into the singles field. Success in building up such hit singles as The Olympics' "Baby Hully Gully," "Big Boy Pete," and "Shimmy Like Kate," Jimmy Charles' "A Million to One" and "Don't Go To Strangers" by Etta Jones, indicated that the singles market needed it own special staff, Kaffel said.

Epic Reorganized; Remains Indie; Bill Gallagher Heads New Operation

NEW YORK—Announcement was made last week of a re-organization of Epic Records. Bill Gallagher, vice-president in charge of sales at Columbia Records, Epic's parent firm, will head the Epic operation.

Al Shulman, who headed Epic as general manager, has been transferred to Columbia, where he will report to Norman Adler, the diskery's executive vice-president, and work on special marketing assignments.

Gallagher emphasized that the re-organization, which takes effect immediately, is not an integration of Epic into the Columbia organization and that "every effort will be made in the months ahead to continue Epic's growth into an outstanding independent label."

"... We will continue to market through independent distributors throughout the United States and during 1961 we will make every effort to improve the present distributing organization representing the Epic product lines. Certain immediate changes in distribution are contemplated... to strengthen weak areas. In most cases these changes will be to Columbia Distributors, however, the markets affected are marginal in volume potential and do not reflect any nationwide tie with Columbia Distributors.

"In major markets, Epic will continue to be sold by leading independent distributors. Epic must not be recognized because of its association with Columbia, instead this recognition will come with quality of product, in-

NEW YORK—Folk singer Bob Gibson has been signed to an exclusive long-term contract with Elektra Records, it was disclosed last week. The pact calls for a minimum of two albums per year over the term of the agreement. Gibson has concertized widely and has made a successful previous recording for Elektra of "Ski Songs."

Elektra president Jac Holzman and chief engineer Mark Abramson will fly to the west coast in mid-December to supervise the first sessions. Expected release date is March, 1961.

William Levy, formerly with Columbia, has been appointed Epic director of A&R and merchandising, reporting directly to Gallagher.

In his new responsibility, Levy will coordinate the activities of the label's A&R staff consisting of Miss Jane Friedman, classical A&R; James Fogelsong, popular A&R; Mike Berniker, pop A&R; C. Snyder, international A&R.

Levy will also be responsible for the coordination of Epic merchandising programs with the label's department of creative services and manufacturing. He will also work directly with Fogelsong and Berniker in producing and acquiring Epic singles product. Gallagher said that Epic would rely on independently produced masters for many of their singles releases.

Fishman and Levy will also be responsible for the development of monthly release schedules and merchandising programs with the assistance of Epic's complete sales and A&R departments.

"In addition to the Epic field staff as outlined," Gallagher said, "I will also make available the assistance of Columbia's field sales force of twelve men whenever their services can provide efficiencies and economies toward Epic's future success."

According to Wallichs, Livingston will be responsible for all A&R activities, formerly handled by Dunn, as well as the creative aspects of all future activities which the company may undertake in the general field of entertainment.

Under the realignment of executive functions, Daniel C. Bonbright, Capitol Records vice-president for administration and finance will add to his present duties the supervision of Capitol phonograph business, formerly divided between CRDC sales and the diskery's manufacturing and engineering division. Capitol secretary and general counsel, Robert E. Carp, who formerly reported to Bonbright, will now report directly to Wallichs.

In concluding his announcement of reorganization, Wallichs stated that Capitol Records vice-president James W. Bayless (manufacturing and engineering) and Joseph Csida (Eastern operations) would continue in their present posts.

NEW YORK—Nat Shapiro, Columbia Records director of international A&R, has announced the appointment of Pedro J. Rosaly to the new position of coordinator of Latin American artists for the label. He has been transferred from the Columbia Broadcasting System, International, where he was sales manager.

Rosaly will assist in programming, scheduling and promoting Latin American artists and product in the U.S. He will also assist in promotion of U.S. artists and their catalog in Latin America. In addition, he will coordinate creative services relative to Latin American product.

Granz Sets Ella Tour Abroad

BEVERLY HILLS—Ella Fitzgerald has been set by impresario-music man Norman Granz for her eighth consecutive concert tour of Europe, kicking off Feb. 11 in Amsterdam, to be followed by her first tour of Israel, March 29, for ten days.

The Verve thrush will also tour Turkey, Greece, and Teheran, Iran for the first time. Granz plans to tape some fifteen concerts during the tour and will issue one or more as albums to follow-up Miss Fitzgerald's current best-selling LP, "Ella In Berlin."

In preparation for her ten-day Israeli tour, the songstress has been learning choruses of her repertoire in Hebrew.

Fabian Inked To New Film Pact By Fox

HOLLYWOOD—Fabian has been signed to a new seven-year non-exclusive contract by 20th Century-Fox Studios, it was learned last week. The pact, calling for a reported substantial increase in salary over the youngster's previous pact, provides options for two films a year. Fabian appeared in two films for Fox in 1960—"North To Alaska" and "High Time."

The deal climaxed three weeks of negotiations by Robert Goldstein, head of Fox; Bob Marcucci, Fabian's manager, and Martin Baum, William Belasco and Jack Gilardi, representing GAC.

Fabian was also recently signed to co-star with Tommy Sands in "The Beach Pad" for Paramount.

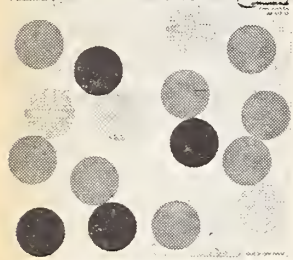

PERSUASIVE PERCUSSION



"PERSUASIVE PERCUSSION" Volume 3—The Command All-Stars—Command RS 817 SD

This third volume in the year's most successful LP series serves notice that the label has pulled out all the stops in stereo entertainment. Enoch Light and Lew Davies have collaborated on producing a dozen striking rewrites of pop tunes, loading each track with delightful musical surprises in both the solo and ensemble departments. Selections include "Moments To Remember," "Perdido," "One For My Baby" and "Autumn In New York." A must-stock item!



"HIS HAND IN MINE"—Elvis Presley With The Jordanaires—RCA Victor LPM-2328

Again, as he did in his best-selling "Peace In The Valley" EP, Elvis Presley reveals a deep reverence for religious music. In a humble and genuinely honest manner he offers performances of such sacred hymns as "In My Father's House," "I Believe In The Man In The Sky," "Joshua Fit The Battle" and "If We Never Meet Again." An important vocal assist is given by the Jordanaires, who are well-versed in this music. Huge sales potential.



"OLE ALA LEE!"—Peggy Lee—Capitol ST 1475

The swinging Latin groove which did so well for the thrush in her last LP, "Latin Ala Lee," is maintained through another torrid session. Here, assisted by Joe Harnell's tropically heated scoring, Miss Lee breathes sensuous fire into danceable Latin-ized versions of "By Myself," "Love And Marriage," "You Stepped Out Of A Dream" and "From Now On."



"PERCUSSION ORIENTALE"—David Carroll and his Orchestra—Mercury PPS 6002

With Latin dates saturating the market, Carroll opens new stereo entertainment vistas with this LP of exotic "oriental" music. Most of the selections derive from the classics, and you can bet the Russian composers are well-represented: Tchaikovsky, Borodin, Rimsky-Korsakov. Among the selections are "Caravan," "Harem Dance," "Dance Of The Slave Maidens," "Scheherazade" themes and "In A Persian Market." Has big sales potential.



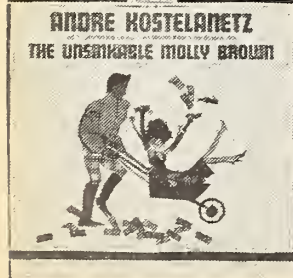
"COME ROCK WITH ME"—Johnny Preston—Mercury SR 60609

The exciting vocal personality of Johnny Preston is heard in a program of previous hits and new items. He rocks vibrantly through "Charming Billy," "Feel So Fine," "Cradle Of Love," "Just Little Boy Blue" and "Leave My Kitten Alone." Powerful pop LP date.



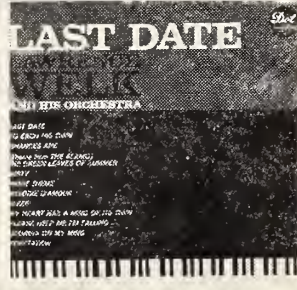
"TENNESSEE ERNIE FORD INVITES YOU TO COME TO THE FAIR"—Capitol ST 1473

Pandemonium broke loose when Ernie Ford opened his Indiana State Fair appearance with a rollicking performance of "Back Home In Indiana" and crowd acceptance continued heartily through his monologues, anecdotes, singing of "Your Cheatin' Heart," "Tennessee Waltz," "Sixteen Tons," a reading of a poem of faith and the singing of religious hymns. It's all been caught by this "live" recording and should stand up well under repeated hearings. A delightful entertainment package.



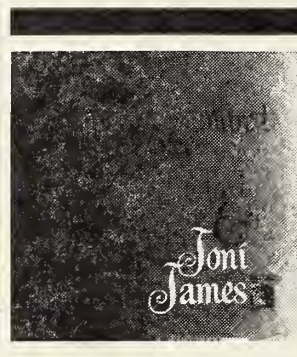
"THE UNSINKABLE MOLLY BROWN"—Andre Kostelanetz and his Orchestra—Columbia CL 1576

Kostelanetz' long sympathy for show music crops up again here as the maestro serves up a tempting platter of instrumental tidbits from the successful B'way show. The Meredith Willson score, both sophisticated and cornball, but always delightful, is treated to some Kostelanetz surprises, especially the "I Ain't Down Yet," "Are You Sure" and "Beautiful People Of Denver" tracks. Outstanding orchestral album.



"LAST DATE"—Lawrence Welk and His Orchestra—Dot DLP 3350

Leading off with his recent single, Welk batons his ork in pleasant danceable versions of a dozen pop tunes. This is not the Welk "champagne music" but the more modern sound as heard on "Last Date." Tracks include "The Green Leaves Of Summer," "Please Help Me, I'm Falling," "Misty," "Chances Are" and "Georgia On My Mind."



"100 VOICES, 10 STRINGS & JONI JAMES"—MGM E3892

An elaborate showcase of strings and choir for the soft, graceful Joni James voice in concert with twelve religious and inspirational pop songs. Under Tony Acquaviva's direction, the thrush sweetly warbles such offerings as "Ave Maria," "The Lord's Prayer," "You'll Never Walk Alone," "Wither Thou Goest" and "Bless This House." Strong merchandise with extra power for the Christmas season.



"ECHOING VOICES AND TROMBONES"—Don Costa—Ultra Audio WWS 8501

Costa has arranged an instrumental program for stereo listening utilizing male and female wordless choruses and a trombone choir in various opposing and ensemble voicings. Percussion, in the form of bongos, gourds, etc., is an added spice. The tunes are sturdy pops and melodic respect is accorded them in the arrangements. They include "Day In Day Out," "Just In Time," "Thou Swell," "But Not For Me" and "Adios." The Costa name is strong.



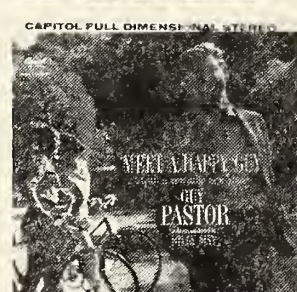
"NO COVER NO MINIMUM"—Billy Eckstine—Roulette R 52052

The mellow baritone of "Mr. B," scoring heavily on the nitery circuit, has been caught in a Las Vegas engagement for this disk outing. He charms the audience, and should do the same to the disk customers, with his engaging performances of "Lady Luck," "Lush Life," "It Might As Well Be Spring," "That's For Me" and "Have A Song On Me," the brassy, pace-setting opener. Eckstine's faithful have a choice item here.



"SOPHISTICATED SIXTIES"—Larry Elgart and His Orchestra—MGM E3891

The Elgart ork is in full swing here with its pungent performances of a lineup of sturdies which includes "Just One Of Those Things," "This Heart Of Mine," "Too Close For Comfort," "Do Nothin' Till You Hear From Me" and "Keepin' Out Of Mischief Now." The band's sound is basically trombones vs. woodwinds in the ensemble, with very little solos. It's an efficient, well-organized crew and, primarily, makes good dance music.



"MEET A HAPPY GUY"—Guy Pastor—Capitol ST 1465

Guy Pastor is one of the few newcomers to disks to take the legit road to vocal success. And he will get there if talent is any measure. He has a big, deep, rich baritone voice, in the crooning tradition, and he uses it expressively and honestly. He does equally well on the bright swingers as on the misty ballads and here has the reliable Billy May to bank on for outstanding ork assistance. Among the selections are "Meet A Happy Guy," "My Foolish Heart," "You'll Never Know," and "I Like The Looks Of You."



"MARINA AND OTHER ITALIAN FAVORITES"—Rocco Granata—Laurie LLP 2003

Granata, of "Marina" fame, performs this hit on his first LP for Laurie as well as 11 other Italian songs, old and new. The moods vary considerably between numbers and the singer handles each with Neapolitan suaveness. Album contains "Tango Delle Rose," "La Bella," "Volare," "Souvenir D'Italie" and "Julia."

"SWING-A-SPELL" — Jimmie Dodd — Imperial LP 9121

Spelling songs of both adult and kiddie interest are given a big swinging treatment by Dodd, a kiddie chorus and a bright, high-stepping ork under the George Weir baton. Dodd expounds the lessons of "Rag Mop," "Harrigan," "Mickey Mouse Cha Cha Cha," "Massachusetts" and "I've Got A Gal In Kalamazoo" in delightful fashion. A good natured listening session.



"BONGOS" — Don Ralke — Warner Bros. W 1398

With a tremendous assemblage of percussionists and percussion instruments under his baton, Ralke whips up a frenzy of Afro-Cuban rhythms that will delight the audiophiles. The selections are mostly originals which use vocal chants, lots of rhythms and counter-rhythms and very little melody, except in its most primitive state. For real down-to-earth percussion, this is the choice.



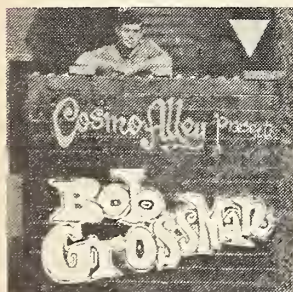
"ROGER AND OVER" — Roger Price — A.A. Records AR-1

Roger Price, droodler and theorist, trades on the more daffy aspects of life for his comedy. Here, in a "live" performance cut at New York's Village Vanguard, he expounds his latest theory, the Price-Stern Theory of Names, which offers the listener lots of entertaining chuckles. The other side of the disk, studio made, contains Price's "Expose of Hi-Fi," "A True And Authentic History Of Vermont Jazz" and "Sound Droodles." Real kookie comedy.



"BALDWIN ORGAN AND BONGOS" — Audio Fidelity DFS 7004

Eddie Osborne proves a master at eliciting the widest array of musical tones from the Baldwin electronic organ. And with a percussive rhythm section in tow, he offers delightfully diverting versions of "El Cumbachero," "Barbara Polka," "South Of The Border," "Washington Post March" and "Ma, She's Making Eyes At Me." The counter-positioning of the organ and the percussionists make for fascinating stereo listening.



"COSMO ALLEY PRESENTS BOB GROSSMAN" — Eureka 501

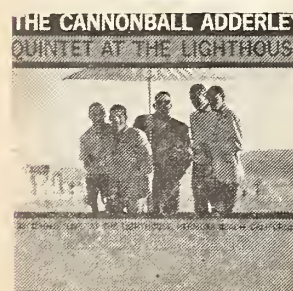
Grossman, an uncommercialized singer of folk songs, debuts here in a performance cut at Cosmo Alley. The singer's work is marked by an extraordinary understanding of the history of his material and the inclusion of explanations into his performance. His rapport, with the disk listener as well as the "live" audience, is as warm and as close as possible. Selections (sung in their original language) include "La Quince Brigada," "Zog Nit Keynmol," "Le Chevalier de Paris," "The Fox" and "Suliram." Complete texts and translations are included in booklet form. A fine, new disk talent.



"HOMEWARD BOUND" — Ed McCurdy — Rodeo International RLP 102

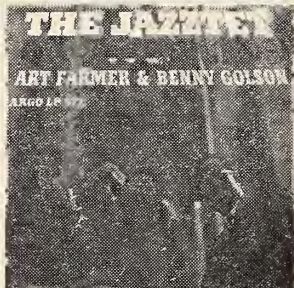
McCurdy, as authentic a singer of folk songs as there is, tackles a program of Canadian folklore, which includes such tunes as "Harbour Le Cou," "The Bonnie House Of Airlie," "The Nova Scotia Song," "When The Caplin Come In" and "Come All My Old Comrades." He performs them in simple, straightforward terms, with an appealing sincerity, and accompanies himself on guitar in the process. Of sizable interest to folk enthusiasts.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



"THE CANNONBALL ADDERLEY QUINTET AT THE LIGHTHOUSE" — Riverside RLP 344

Adderley returns to the West Coast, the scene of his first "live" LP triumph, for his third quintet outing for the label. The group has been caught in performances at the Lighthouse, rocking the customers with its brand of earthy, low-down "soul" music. Tracks include "Sack O' Woe," "Azule Serape," "Blue Daniel" and 3 others. Highly marketable jazz.



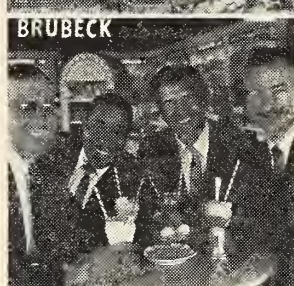
"BIG CITY SOUNDS" — The Jazztet — Argo LP 672

The group continues to make a strong impression on both pop and jazz markets. This is due probably to its precision arrangements, the melodic Benny Golson originals and the warm personality of its members. Here they offer a program consisting of Golson's "The Cool One," "Bean Bag" and "Five Spot After Dark" plus standards "My Funny Valentine" and "Wonder Why." Commercial date at no artistic expense.



"ANITA O'DAY AND BILLY MAY SWING RODGERS AND HART" — Verve MG VS 62141

The team of O'Day & May did wonders in re-creating over-done Cole Porter songs in their recent LP collaboration and here do the same for a lineup of a dozen tunes from the wondrous pens of Rodgers & Hart. They change tempos with measured abandon and generally mix it up all over the place with "Johnny One Note," "Bewitched," "Have You Met Miss Jones," "It Never Entered My Mind" and "Spring Is Here." Music excellence prevails throughout.



"BRUBECK A LA MODE" — The Dave Brubeck Quartet featuring Bill Smith — Fantasy 3301

Another Brubeck session from Fantasy features the pianist playing second fiddle to clarinetist Bill Smith and ten Smith originals. Though not at all as fascinating as current Brubeck disks, there is still a good swinging feeling attained throughout. Among the selections are "Dorian Dance," "Invention," "Frisco Fog," and "Ballade."



"DON JACOBY AND THE COLLEGE ALL-STAR BAND" — MGM E3881

Jacoby, faculty member of the National Dance Band Camp, among other endeavors, leads a spirited group of top flight college musicians, dubbed the All-Stars, in a striking big band outing. The boys play with conception and precision which belied their age, plus the all-important enthusiasm. There's lots of explorable talent here. They play "Salt Peanuts," "A Sunday Kind Of Love," "Just Because," "I Wish You Love" and 12 others. The tracks are immensely danceable, but are even greater as exciting listening experiences.

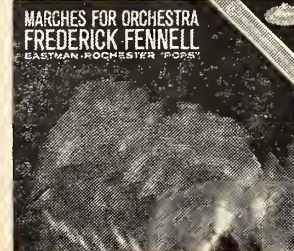
VERDI: "Aida" — Tebaldi, Bergonzi, Simionato, MacNeil, the Vienna Philharmonic conducted by Herbert Von Karajan — London OS 25206

The grandest of the grand operas received an overwhelming performance on the complete London set, recently released. This single disk of highlights is but a sampling of the delicacies to be tasted in the whole set, but it is a wonderful sampler, containing such arias as "Celeste Aida," "Ah! Tu Dei Vivere!" and the Trumphal scene. Performances are exquisite.



PROKOFIEV: "Peter And The Wolf"; SAINT SAENS: "Carnival of the Animals" — Beatrice Lillie, London Symphony Orchestra conducted by Skitch Henderson — London CS 6187

The inimitable Bea Lillie tackles a man's job ("Peter and the Wolf") and her delightfully feline personality stands her in good stead as the only female to record the work. This "different," motherly approach marks it as good competition in the over-abundant "Peter" catalog. Ogden Nash's verses for the Saint Saens music is totally adult fare, and very challenging indeed for the precocious youngster. Two wonderful vehicles for Miss Lillie.



"MARCHES FOR ORCHESTRA" — Frederick Fennell conducting the Eastman-Rochester Pops — Mercury SR 90271

Fennell adds yet another package of classical marches to his already substantial catalog. Here he directs his ork in stirring readings of Beethoven's "Turkish March," Schubert's "Marche Militaire," Sibelius' "Alla Marcia" and Grieg's "Homage March," and others. Stereo enhances the music considerably.

There is probably more than a few pointers in each for even the "professionals" (eg: golf swing, bridge bid, bowling hook). Best part of course is that you play back the instruction when necessary. The label has obtained some of the best teachers available for the subjects. Commercial Value: Very good bet for top sales. The idea has proven itself with success in the weight reducing category and appears to have an even stronger attraction in the golf, bowling, bridge, categories. Package should make for an attention-getting display.

Both Grosswold and Hague will work under regional sales manager Bob West while Bryant reports to regional head Dick Bruce.

NASHVILLE—Ott Devine, manager of WSM's Grand Ole Opry, has announced the addition of Columbia songster Bobby Lord to the Opry cast. For five years Lord was a member of "Jubilee U.S.A.," a country show out of Springfield, Missouri.

Angel Offers 50 Top LP's In 100% Exchange Deal

HOLLYWOOD — A 100-per-cent exchange privilege on the fifty top-selling albums in the Angel catalog is being offered by Capitol Records Distributing Corp., according to CRDC President J. K. Maitland.

According to CRDC's chief executive, the program is being offered "to give dealers the kind of protection that will encourage them to stock and display the very cream of the Angel catalog in depth. We think dealers are going to welcome this opportunity to order these proven best-sellers in quantity without financial risk to themselves, especially now, with the four best retail-selling months just ahead."

The 100-per-cent exchange program, effective Nov. 28 through Dec. 24, requires a qualifying order of ten disks, with a minimum of five titles. Customers may exchange up to 100-per-cent of selections purchased under the program for other Angel selections of equal monetary value. Exchange period is between Jan. 1 and June 30, 1961. Exchange merchandise must be in salable condition and must be accompanied by an order of equal monetary value for other Angel selections.

Included in the program are eight albums featuring the celebrated soprano, Maria Callas; three of Angel's top comedy disks, "The Best of (Peter) Sellers," "At The Drop of a Hat" and "The Hoffnung Interplanetary Music Festival"; and such all-time Angel best-sellers as "The Soviet Army Chorus and Band" and "Mozart Horn Concertos" as performed by the late Dennis Brain.

B. F. Wood's Mills On Road For Epic's "Carillon" Deck

NEW YORK—Stanley Mills, head of B. F. Wood Music, a Mills Music affiliate, took to the road last week on behalf of the firm's Xmas deck, "The Carillon" by The Merrill Staton Choir on Epic. He will visit deejays between Pittsburgh and Chicago. Pubbery has published the song—introduced last year—for vocal solo, piano solo and concert orchestra.

3 New Command Packages

NEW YORK — Three more albums have been added to the successful Command Records line. Included is the third volume of "Persuasive Persuasion," the series with which the label began its best-selling business. Performers on vol. 3 are The Command All-Stars. The other LP's are "Big, Bold And Brassy"—Enoch Light & The Light Brigade; "Command Stereo Check-Out Record," offering recorded signals for checking frequency response, maximum channel separation, distortion and turntable rumble of playback equipment.

Within the next few weeks, the diskery will release 4-track stereo tape versions of the first two LP's.

"Selectivity" Key To 1961 Rank Albums

NEW YORK—Dewey Bergman, Jr., director of albums for Rank Records of America, last week announced the firm's 1961 LP program.

Bergman revealed that his department is budgeted for thirty-eight packages during the coming year but stressed that emphasis will be placed on "selectivity", clean inventories, specialized merchandising tie-ins and unique sales value. "We are not tied to any specific number. We are thinking in terms of quality, not quantity; individual sales value of each LP, not 'mass releases' for the sake of 'catalog'. In short, everything that we produce will be something that has strong sales potential in itself. We refuse to put out masses of recordings for the sake of flooding distributors and retailers. Every set will have its advertising, promotion and publicity campaign custom tailored in advance."

Included in the albums that Top Rank will release starting in January will be Bud Greenspan's documentary LP's with "blockbuster" tie-ins.

Canadian-American To Norman Distrib In St. Lou

NEW YORK—Neil Galligan, Canadian-American topper, has announced that the label will now be handled by Norman Distributors in the St. Louis area. Galligan said the move is the first in a series of distrib re-alignments.

The jazz albums are: "Jo Plus Jazz"—Jo Stafford with quintet; "Lambert Hendricks & Ross Sing Ellington"; "Trombone & Voices"—J. J. Johnson.

Decision was at a local board of governors meeting on Nov. 17. Selected to spearhead the scholarship committee is Walter S. Heebner. Burke also announced plans for a general membership discussion-meeting for west coast members this month.

UA Study Notes Armed Forces Interest In Albums; Stereo Exceeds Mono

NEW YORK—"Members of the Armed Forces, whether miles under the ocean in a submarine, or stationed in the Antarctica, are not only buying albums in increasingly large numbers, but the ratio of stereo to monaural is now heavily in favor of the former." These facts were discovered in a special study conducted by United Artists Records which has just been completed and reported to the trade last week.

"An analysis of sales during the current year to the Army, Navy and Air Forces shows sharp increases in all three areas. "Art Talmadge, vice president and general manager, stated. "These sales cover not only the domestic outlets for the three services, but the world-wide market.

"Perhaps the most interesting facet of the study," Talmadge said, "was the tremendous increases noted in the stereo area. Here we found that of orders placed this year, 85 per cent of the albums were ordered in stereo, 15 per cent in monaural. This almost reverses the figures of a year ago."

Analyzing the orders placed during the year, it was found that orders are placed on practically all new releases, but in carefully maintained allocations, thus affording the outlets selling to the members of the various branches of the services a complete, but tight inventory. Re-orders, too, are made in regular, but controlled time periods, according to the study.

Orders are received from the armed forces on new releases concurrently with those placed by local distributors, Talmadge said, and each of the three branches constantly urge immediate advice on new album goods so that the orders can be obtained, placed and shipments made to the furthestmost points as quickly as possible.

Preferences, music-wise, according to the analysis, shows that jazz is a heavy favorite universally, while soundtracks, including those from "The Apartment" and "Never On Sunday" have also enjoyed "heavy" sales. Most pop releases are covered in the initial orders received from the armed

forces, as are the classical items.

"While the album picture is extremely bright," Talmadge pointed out, "the trends in the single field are quite pronounced. Here sales have been steadily diminishing as far as general ordering is concerned. Instead, there is now much greater selectivity, with buyers for exchanges, Navy stores, etc. obviously watching the best-seller charts, and placing their orders only when the individual disks begin to move. Too, orders are placed in conservative quantities, with re-orders placed more frequently than a year ago."

With the emphasis on stereo so pronounced, a special introduction of the new Ultra Audio Sound Series was set-up by the company, Talmadge reported. Special pressings of the stereo versions of the new five-album series were prepared, along with another set of specially-pressed monaural versions, for distribution to the armed forces buyers.

Meyer Davis Ork To Play Kennedy Inaugural Ball

NEW YORK—Meyer Davis, the vet society ork maestro, has been appointed musical director for the inaugural ball for President-elect Kennedy. His orchestra of fifty pieces will play for the ball, which will be held at the armory in Washington on Friday, Jan. 20. Davis has made thirty-one appearances at the White House and has played for six inaugural balls, including those of Hoover, Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower. He also played for the debut of Mrs. Kennedy and for her wedding at Newport.

DJ'S In Del-Tone Xmas Decks

LOS ANGELES—Two deejays are featured in Xmas issues from Del-Tone. Coast deejay Jim Ameche has "The First Christmas Tree" and Webster Webfoot, who is really Jimmy Weldon of KCOP-TV, has "Who Will Take Me Home For Christmas."

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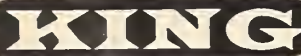

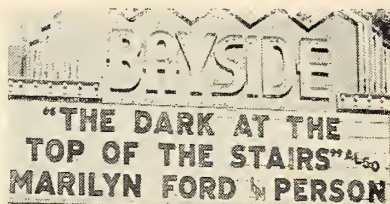

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records Distributing Corp. is putting four of its hottest single records on increased 100% exchange to dealers under the firm's new guarantee policy.

Dealers can stock twenty-five copies of the decks instead of ten allowed under the increased set-up.

The records are: Jeanne Black's "Oh, How I Miss You Tonight"; Ferlin Huskey's "Wings Of A Dove"; Wanda Jackson's "Happy, Happy Birthday" and "Mean, Mean Man"; Frank Sinatra's "Ol MacDonal." The Huskey deck tops the Country Top 50 chart; both portions of the Wanda Jackson deck are on this week's Looking Ahead; and the Sinatra side is thirty-two on the Top 100.

Wienstroer Forms Norman Label

ST. LOUIS—Norman Wienstroer, president of Norman Distributing Co., this city, has announced the formation of Norman Records, Inc. The new record firm will begin release of single records and albums this month under the Norman Records label. Wienstroer, as president, will direct the operation of the company from his office at 1914 Washington Avenue.

The first single record is scheduled for release December 5th and features the Norman Petty Trio. Future releases will be on a "highly selective" basis. St. Louis talent and recording facilities will be utilized to a large degree.

Distributors have been appointed by Wienstroer, who selected those with whom he had worked successfully in the past while national sales manager of Coral-Brunswick, and more recently as head of Rank Records of America.

Distribution outside of the United States will be handled by Paul Marshall's International Cooperative. Maurer Studios in New York will supervise album cover production. Promotion on Norman Petty's single will be handled by Lelan Rogers in the south, Al Oldrich in the midwest, and Irwin Zucker on the west coast. Jo Harper, of Petty's New York office will cover eastern markets.

Wienstroer also announced that starting in January, his distributing office will begin operation of a Dealer's Record Club under a franchise arrangement with Herman Enterprises of Indianapolis. Distribution of many single record lines is being discontinued and emphasis will be on labels of "established volume now being carried by Norman." November has been the biggest month to date for Norman

NEW YORK—A group of eight young German amateur jazz musicians will make a two-week visit to the United States this month under the auspices of the Coca-Cola Bottlers of Germany.

The musicians won the trip as a result of a nationwide competition held recently in West Germany. They will arrive in New York Dec. 5 to begin a tour which will also take them to Atlanta, New Orleans and Chicago. In each city, they will meet leading jazz groups, see the sights and be entertained. A highlight of their New York visit will be a reception for them at Birdland on Dec. 6, to which 100 jazz musicians and trade members have been invited.

The eight musicians are members of the Footwarmers and Oscars Trio (two members of the Trio also form part of the Footwarmers), winners in the traditional and modern jazz categories, respectively, in the German Amateur Jazz Festival. This year, the Festival, a national event since 1955, saw more than 250 bands throughout the country compete in local and regional preliminaries to qualify for the three-day final in Dusseldorf. Thirty bands competed in the finals.

Accompanying the group on its tour will be Karl H. Lyrmann and Burkhard Gottschalk, founders and organizers of the festival; in charge of arrangements for the activities of the musicians while they are here are Gary Kramer (for New York), director of advertising and publicity for Atlantic Records; Richard Allen (for New Orleans), curator of the jazz archives at Tulane Univ., and John Steiner (for Chicago).

The musicians are: Klaus Doldinger, Jurgen Bucholtz, Manfred Lahnstein, Claudio Szenkar, Alfons Zschockelt, Heino Ribbert, Kurt Bong and Gunther Lennartz.

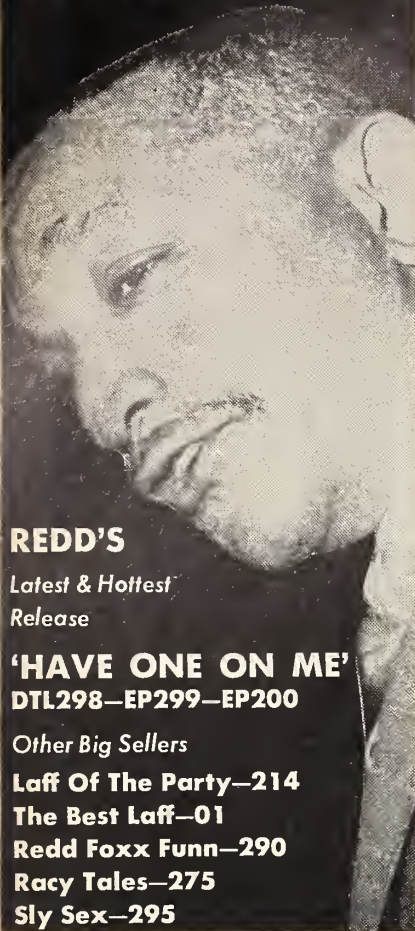

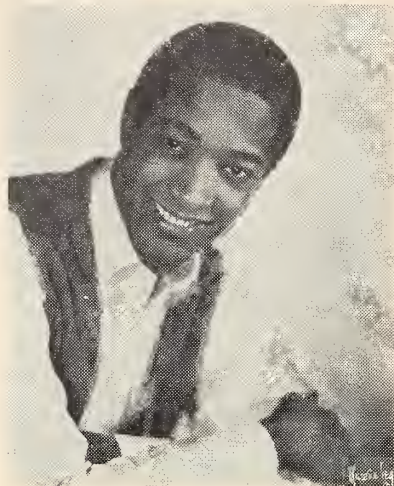

It was as a gospel singer with The Soul Stirrers during a concert in Los Angeles Shrine Auditorium that Sam Cooke first came to the attention of the record company executive that asked him to record some popular songs. With the permission of his father, the Reverend Charles Cooke, Sam obliged the exec and began a career that has since produced "You Send Me" (his first hit), "Sentimental Reasons," "Win Your Love For Me," "Only 16," "There I've Said It Again," "Wonderful World," "Everybody Loves To Cha Cha," "Chain Gang" and now—"Sad Mood," his latest single excursion for RCA Victor.

The son of a Chicago minister, the 25 year old Cooke is a deeply religious youth. He is also a serious musician, writing much of his own material and playing the guitar as well. He appeared in his first dramatic role recently when he co-starred with Sammy Davis Jr. on the General Electric Theatre.

The day La Vern Baker was born they paraded. Actually, the parade wasn't for her (she was born Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1929) but it set an appropriate opening for a lively and colorful career that was to make her a favorite throughout the world.

When she was 17 (old enough to get her first cabaret license) she opened at Chicago's Club DeLisa and stayed for six months. Next stop on the way up was an extended engagement at the Flame Show Bar in Detroit, where club manager Al Green signed her to a personal management contract. Then followed a tour as vocalist with the Todd Rhodes Band after which she ventured to Europe, staying six months in Italy. Her disk career really began in 1954 when she signed with Atlantic Records and recorded "Tweedledee." Since then she has maintained a top status in pop and blues. Now hitting with "Bumble Bee," she also has to her credit "I Cried A Tear," "I Waited Too Long" and "Wheel of Fortune."

The Balaban station, one of three in the chain, has also witnessed great acceptance to its high school jingles. The jingle idea is now spreading to other stations with WWDC-Washington, D.C. picking up the cue with its own jingle salute to area schools. . . Ron Roddy, jovial jockey from KQV-Pittsburgh, was in New York last week and stopped in to say hello. Ron, on a week's vacation, made it a point to pay his respects to his many friends in the city. . . Lud Sterling, WLEE-Richmond personality, recently lost his title of "Last of the Big Time Free loaders." Thanksgiving morning he hinted frequently for three hours that he certainly would like a turkey sandwich. Results? One skimpy ham sandwich. Thanksgiving evening, WLEE jockey Gene Loving mentioned this lack of response and was almost buried under a deluge of turkey, cheese dips, apples and cookies. Loving now wears the crown. We attribute this incident to the surplus of leftovers on Thanksgiving night. . . WQTE-Detroit is holding a "Cutie Hop" every Friday night at the new Cobo Hall, the world's largest convention hall, and has seen from 4,000 to 5,000 kids turn out for the weekly festivities. The show is emceed by WQTE jockies Tom Clay, Dave Hull, Danny Murphy and Bob Bennett.

From the society pages this week we learned that Stan Richards (WINS-New York) tied the knot with Roxanne Delmanon Dec. 4; Dick Clayton (WIL-St. Louis) did the same on Dec. 3 with Susan Dail of Des Peres, Mo.; and it was a girl—Terri Ann—for Ann Blue, KUTT's (Fargo, N.D.) Girl Friday. . . With the ski slopes open in Utah, KALL-Salt Lake City celebrated the season with its "Broken Leg Contest." To the first person breaking his leg on the slopes, the station is offering a wheel chair, crutches, cane, knitting needles and the latest TV Guide. The response, according to the station's Will Lucas, was nothing short of an avalanche, as the studio was flooded with claims from all sorts of poor souls. A winner was proclaimed and a promise of running the contest again was made. . . In launching a city clean up campaign, KAFY-Bakersfield, Calif., asked its listeners to bring matchbooks to the studio, and, for every twenty matchbooks, offered a 45 rpm record in exchange. After seven days, the station counted 41,000 matchbooks. A good way to clean out the library too. But we think program director Al Anthony is looking for trouble when he disclosed that the next item in the clean-up will be beer cans. . . First on the bandwagon was WHIM-Providence, who, through a local Ford Dealer's enthusiasm, is offering a two-week vacation for two in New York with Ford picking up the tab for transportation, hotel, meals, etc., to the person who writes the best personal "open letter" to Khrushchev. According to Joy execs, other stations are initiating their own local contests.

Wichita's KFBI is now KIRL and new at the station is Bill Miller. Bill, from KOCY-Oklahoma City, is handling the early morning slot and production director duties. . . Reed Farrell has been brought in to completely revamp the programming of WAMM-Flint, Mich. As program director, Farrell said the music policy of the station will definitely change, with emphasis placed on reaching the largest possible mass audience through a "new, exciting kind of radio." "We are giving radio back to the people," commented Farrell, "and we're going to play exactly what they want to hear." Farrell is a vet of 12 years in radio, working most recently at WIL-St. Louis. He also heads up his own ad agency in Flint. . . After two years with the all-night show on WINZ-Miami, Jerry Knight is moving to the morning stint at WALT-Tampa, Fla. He leaves the name Jerry Knight (copyrighted station name) behind, and assumes his real monicker of Marv Ray. . . Johnny Bell makes the move from WTBO-Cumberland, Md. to the new WHPL-Winchester, Va., assuming the general managership. . . Newcomer to WMCA-New York is Johnny Dark. Dark, who worked at WBBM-Chicago under the name Jim McShane, goes into Joe O'Brien's 4-7 PM slot, while O'Brien heads into the wake-up show. . . Leland Bisbee Broadcasting, owner of KRUX-Phoenix, has assumed control of Copper State Broadcasting, owner of KTKT-Tucson. No staff or format changes are contemplated by the new ownership. . . Lee Rothman was promoted from program director to assistant manager of WRIT-Milwaukee. . . WINQ-Miami is on the air now, daytime, but plans to go off as soon as the FCC says "go." The station, owned by Rex Rand, who also owns WINZ-Miami, has lined up staffers Rich Pauley, Dick Allen, Al Dunaway (from WSAI-Cincinnati) and Art King.

Sill and Hazlewood began producing for Jamie in March 1958, claiming credit for fourteen hit singles, among which are "Rebel Rouser," "Forty Miles of Bad Road," "Because They're Young" and "Peter Gunn," and several hit EP's and LP's.

The pair said they are in the process of grooming a new guitarist and instrumental group, with releases skedded for early 1961.

Del-Fi Adds 2 Distributors

CHICAGO—Earl Glicken, who handles national sales for Del-Fi Records out of his office in this city, returned last week from a business tour during which he covered Detroit, Cleveland and Cincinnati, adding two new distributor outlets to handle the Del-Fi line. In Cleveland he appointed Duncan Sales Company, and the new distributor in Detroit is Aurora Distributing Company.

Singles Glicken says he is getting much action with are "I'm A Country Boy" by Millard Wood, "I'm a Mojo Man" by Larry Bright and Ron Holden's "Who Says There Ain't No Santa Claus."

High on the Del-Fi record album list of big sellers, according to Glicken, are "Pacoima Junior High" by the late Ritchie Valens and "Ham And Cheese," Ronnie Fever's organ LP.

Presley "Lonesome" Deck Not Lonely On Answers

NEW YORK—The answer-the-hit-craze has reached new heights with the host of recordings tieing-in with Elvis Presley's smash Victor single, "Are You Lonesome Tonight?"

The Bourne and Cromwell pubberies have four direct answers in "Lonesome" diskings by Dodie Stevens (Dot), Thelma Carpenter (Coral), Linda Lee (Shasta) and Ricky Paige (Rendezvous).

In addition, Bourne splits a copy-right with World Music on the new Jeanne Black single on Capitol, "Oh, How I Miss You Tonight," the standard being revived as another answer to the Presley single.

It was Miss Black's successful answer to Eddie Arnold's Victor hit of "He'll Have To Go"—tagged "He'll Have To Stay"—which sparked the revival of answer decks. Other click answer singles include Skeeter Davis' "I Can't Help It I'm Falling," an answer to Hank Locklin's "Please Help Me I'm Falling," and Damita Jo's current chart smash for Mercury, "I'll Save The Last Dance For You," an answer to Drifters' hit, "Save The Last Dance For Me."

Off-Beat Issues Tammy Grimes Single

NEW YORK—Off-Beat Records, operated by Pickwick Sales, is taking advantage of Tammy Grimes' starring role in Broadway's "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" with the release of a single from her previously released LP for the label and a band around the LP which notes her part in the show. Single is "Doodle Doo Doo" and "Limehouse Blues."

Mercury Reports 60,000 Advance On Nichols-May LP

CHICAGO—Mercury Records last week reported a distrib advance order of 60,000 on "An Evening With Mike Nichols & Elaine May." The LP, taped on-stage at the Nine O'Clock Theatre in New York where the comedy team opened to rave reviews, puts a reverse twist on the comedy disk trend, according to Kenny Myers, the label's director of sales.

"In many instances," Myers said, "it has taken a successful LP to build a moderately-known comedian into a big name stage or cafe star." In this case, the sensational success of the legit show has created a demand for what looks like a smash album.

Myers also pointed to promotional help from write-ups on the team in such mags as Look, Esquire, Playboy and others.

LP will be backed by point-of-sale material plus trade and consumer ads, Myers said. In addition, 7,000 deejays are now receiving 7-inch samplers of the LP.

UA Previews Comic LP At New York Pic House

NEW YORK—United Artists Records is previewing its new comedy LP, "Candid Telefun" by Harold Flender, at the New Yorker Theater. Preview was held last week and one is set for this week. The package was played at two intermissions during the evening with an announcement from the management that the LP was being unveiled for the theatre audience prior to its national release.

ENGLAND

First details of the 1961 Eurovision Song Contest to be held in Cannes on March 25th are announced this week for which, once again, BBC television will enter a new and unpublished British song. BBC TV's entry on behalf of the United Kingdom will be determined by the votes of a nation wide jury in a program to be televised in this country on February 15th. For the first time the songs under review are to be submitted by three of Britain's major recording companies—E.M.I., Decca and Philips. These organizations are particularly qualified by experience to select and subsequently exploit the type of British song most likely to have an international appeal. The result of last year's contest was France No. 1 with "Tom Pillibe" by Jacqueline Boyer and Britain No. 2 with "Looking High, High, High" by Bryan Johnson.

E.M.I. Records this month awarded the first British platinum disk to Victor Silvester. Although he has never made the hit parade he has, in more than 25 years recording for E.M.I., sold over 30,000,000 singles! During this time Silvester has averaged two releases every month. E.M.I. Records Ltd. will also present their first silver LP for the sale of 250,000 LP records by the famous Victor Silvester (Strict Tempo) Orchestras. Columbia has two Christmas LPs by the maestro "Another Party With Victor Silvester" and "Victor Silvester Plays For Your Party."

Doyen of Denmark Street, Lawrence Wright, recently celebrated his 50th year of publishing, writing (many of his greatest hits were written under the nom-de-plume Horatio Nicholls including "Among My Souvenirs") and producing. (His "On With The Show" was a regular summer season attraction at Blackpool for 32 consecutive years). Bill Ward, General Manager for Lawrence Wright, who has been with the firm for 44 years, recently visited Milan where he arrived in time for the launching of exploitation for the film "The Apartment" for which Lawrence Wright hold world rights. Bill told The Cash Box that H.M.V. has just released a double sided E.P. of Clive Richardson's "London Fantasia." This musical picture of wartime London is recorded here by Semprini. Published in England by Lawrence Wright and controlled in the States by Chappells. Lawrence Wright also publish two sheet music selections of their Christmas hits; Winifred Atwell's "Old Pi-Anna Party" on Decca and Russ Conway's "Even More Party Pops" on Columbia.

Cyril Shane of the Kassner Music Company is currently swinging with "A Boy Without A Girl" by Anthony Newley on Decca and another British disk released this week "Portrait Of My Love" written by Cyril Ornadel and recorded on Parlophone by Matt Munroe—arrangement and orchestration directed by Johnny Spence. The flip side "You're The Top Of My Hit Parade" is published by Feldmans. Shane told The Cash Box that his company will publish the title song "Pepe" from the Columbia picture starring Cantinflas which opens at New York's Criterion Theatre on December 21st and has its London premiere at the Columbia Theatre on February 13th 1961. The song written by Hans Wittstaff is sung in the film by Shirley Jones. Kassner has signed an agreement with Morty Craft, President of Selma Music Corporation of America and will, in future, handle all the copyrights of Selma and Yukon Music for this country. First disk handled by Selma Music London is "Keep Loving Me" by Nelson Keene on H.M.V.

The Andy Williams version of the fast climbing stateside hit "Don't Go To Strangers"—the number originally waxed by Al Martino way back in 1954—is released there this week on London. Publishers are Bron Associated who also handle "Let's" by Sarah Vaughan on Columbia.

Publisher Leslie Conn of Melcher Music had three hunches, cut three demos, resulting in three disks being released by three different companies in the same number of weeks—"Ten Swingin' Bottles" backed with "Whole Lotta Shakin' On The Range," a first disk by Peter Chester (son of comedian Charlie Chester) and The Consulates on Pye; "What's It All About Eh?," a slapstick comedy number recorded by popular d.j.s Pete Murray and Brian Mathews on Decca; and thirdly "The Charleston Is Gonna Rock The Hop Tonight" by Martin Slavin and his Slavedrivers on Oriole. Conn has also formed companies for Melcher Music in France, Italy, Scandinavia.

Jeff Kruger of Ember Records International just back from three and a half weeks in America. After top level discussions with Henry Onorati, President of 20th Fox, a mutual beneficial arrangement was reached resulting in the release of the 20th Fox product in England. Rush release this week "Our Concerto" coupled with "It's All Over But The Crying" by Al Martino and a special for Christmas "The Little Drummer Boy" and "Onward Christian Soldiers" by The Harry Simeone Chorale. These are the first American stars to be signed to the Ember International label under the new agreement. Among other top names included in the 20th Fox catalogue are the original Glenn Miller Band, the original Tommy Dorsey Band, Art Tatum, Shirley Temple and George Gershwin.

Sid Coleman of Ardmore & Beechwood has the latest Rolfe Harris disk "The Uncomfortable Yogi" on Columbia. The waxing features the successful wobble-board effect used for Rolfe's previous hit "Tie Me Kangaroo Down, Sport."

Polydor Records release a new Lorne Lesley platter "We're Gonna Dance" backed with "Bloodshot Eyes" and for Christmas the label hopes to enter the charts with a medley of seasonal numbers entitled "A Merry Christmas From Crazy Otto."

Back in London after four months in Australia is songwriter Eula Parker with a new number "Don't Forget"—publishers Francis Day & Hunter who handled her successful "The Village of St. Bernadette" last year.

Also back in London after her successful first appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show is singer Shirley Bassey. Her representative, Peter Charlesworth, told The Cash Box that a return visit is likely in the New Year.

With the completion of his second film for 20th Century Fox "The Right Approach" Frankie Vaughan returns to London and an extensive tour of one-night stands in Northern England.

Ray Conniff's "Hi-Fi Companion"—two L.P.s for the price of one on the Philips label sold 35,000 copies in less than a week! The disks contain 24 tracks and comprise such numbers as "You Do Something To Me," "People Will Say We're In Love," "Cheek To Cheek," "Laura" and "I'll See You Again." This album has jumped straight into No. 7 place in the British Cash Box L.P. charts. Another bargain is Johnny Mathis' "Rhythms and Ballads of Broadway"—23 titles from Broadway shows not previously issued by Mathis released here on Fontana.

Two recordings of "The Gurney Slade Theme"—incidental music specially written by Max Harris for Anthony Newley's ATV series "The Strange World of Gurney Slade" have been released—one by Max Harris on Fontana and one by Alan Ainsworth on Columbia. Published by Robbins Music.

Before leaving for Zurich and Milan en route for New York and Hollywood, Bob Weiss, International Director for Warner Bros. Records in London for talks with the London Manager Roy Lister and top Decca executives. Weiss was full of praise for the way Decca have handled the launching of Warner Bros. Records in this country. Since April this year the company has been launched in 19 countries throughout the world and in these eight months they have had four major hits in the British charts—Connie Stevens "Sixteen Rea-

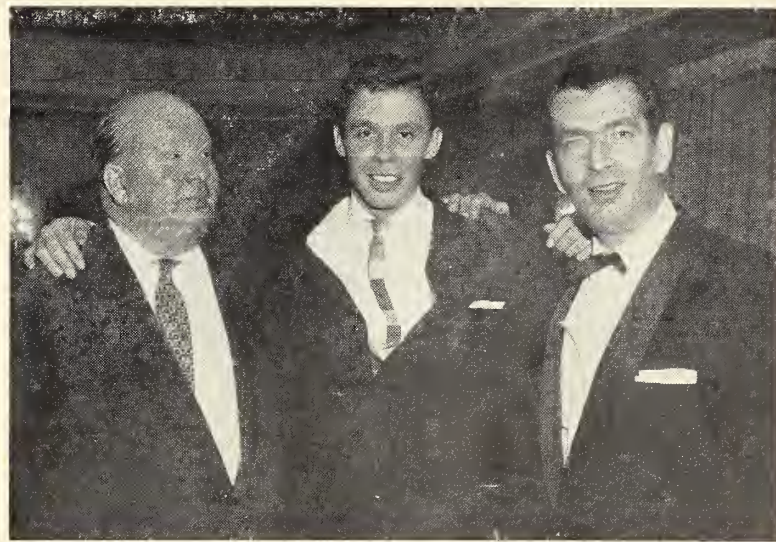

Ella Fitzgerald waxes "We Three Kings Of Orient Are," "Oh Little Town of Bethlehem" and "White Christmas." Heading the Palette Christmas bundle is "Like Party" by The Planets issued in a special seasonal sleeve.

SWEDEN

BFB has prolonged its contract with singer Gunnar Wiklund for another 3-year period. The same label has also inked Ingeborg Nyberg. Ake Wassing, who is well known here for two novels of a biographical type, has recorded his own song, "Du Inspirerar Mig" (You're Inspiring Me) for BFB. Wassing, before he became famous as an author, had several songs on the Swedish hit parade. His new song is published here by Reuter & Reuter, and according to Lennart Reuterskiöld, the song has great possibilities in the world market.

Scandinavian Record Company (Sonet, Storyville, Roulette, Colpix, Gazell and other labels) brings Art Blakey and The Jazz Messengers to Stockholm, where they will give concerts in the Concert Hall on December 6. According to Gunnar Bergström, head of the company, Sonet's next great hit here will be Umberto Bindi's Italian recording of "Il Nostro Concerto." Southern Music is the Swedish publisher of this song. A Swedish lyric has been written by Karin Wollgast.

Stig Andersson, composer and writer of "Klas-Göran," told The Cash Box that he now handles a music publishing firm, Bens Music, which handles Paul Anka's music company, Spanka, in Scandinavia. Bens also brings out some Continental songs. Bens expects a lot from the Greek song "Ilyssos" (Love) by Manos Hadjidakis, writer of "Never On Sunday."

Helge Roundqvist of Cupol Records said that his company will release Tobin Matthews' hit "Ruby Duby Du" in Scandinavia. The original recording is released in the U.S. by Chief Records.

The Dutch singing brothers Blue Diamonds, singing on Philips, might come to Sweden for TV appearances in near future. Philips also reports that they have contracted a new singing Swedish group calling themselves Four Hits.

Anders Holmstedt of EMI reported that MGM just released the original version of the theme music from the TV serial "Bonanza," played by David Rose and his orchestra. This melody has quickly become a bestseller here where the show is one of the most popular of the Swedish TV viewers. Another record which looks like a hit here is Frank Sinatra's "Ol' MacDonald" on Capitol. Since there's no doubt that "Save The Last Dance For Me" will become a hit here, EMI has rushed out its answer, Damita Jo's version of "I'll Save The Last Dance For You" on Mercury and the sales figures look very good already, reports Holmstedt.

Ivar Nordström of Edition Odeon, EMI's publishing house, reports that the firm has had great success with a French song, "Rose" written by Henri Salvador. Three Swedish recordings, and several French versions, are already available here. Nordström has just returned from a visit in Oslo, where he discussed the Norwegian release of some new songs by Swedish singer-composer Thore Skogman.

There will not be any strike in Swedish radio and TV. The negotiations ended the other day with both parties coming to an agreement, just a few hours before the strike would have started.

Swedish TV presented a new serial the other day "Plattparaden" (Disk Parade), a Swedish version of the British TV program "Disc Jockey Jury." In the program, records are played for a jury of four which after listening are supposed to say if they think they will be hits or not. According to a newspaper interview with some record executives, trade people liked the program and the idea behind it.

NORWAY

The sale of "Fröken Johansen Og Jeg" (Miss Johansson and I), the Swedish song which has been topping the Norwegian best sellers during the last weeks, continues satisfactory, reports Rolf Syversen of Iversen & Frogg A/S in Oslo. The record has already been awarded a silver disk after the sale of 25,000, but there is great chance that this record also will get a golden disk, when the 50,000 peak has been reached. These awards are in Norway distributed by the daily paper Arbeiderbladet and started January 1 this year. So far, the paper has given out eight silver awards but there has not yet been any gold award. EMI expects Inger Jacobsen to become the first gold disk winner—if the present sale of the record continues, and it might do so now when the Christmas sales start.

A Norwegian record of a Norwegian song appears on the best-sellers here this week. It is "Hjemlandets sang" (The Song Of My Country), sung by Björg and Per Gunnar on Triola. According to Jörg-Fr. Ellertsen of Egil Monn Iversen A/S, it is something of a sensation when a record which has not appeared among the top twenty of Radio Luxembourg becomes a best seller at the Norwegian market.

Heidi Bruhl's first English record will be released in England on January 2, just in time for her TV appearance there. It will be an English version of her big hit, "Wir Wollen Niemals Auseinander Geh'n," which went far over the half million mark here.

Lale Anderson has passed the 300,000 mark with her recording of "Never On Sunday," which still tops the charts here.

Marlene Dietrich's new LP is moving well here. She wrote 2 of the texts herself under the name Max Kolpe. Not only a pseudo-name, but a pseudo-gender.

Germany finally has its Brenda Lee. Fourteen year old Gitte from Denmark has done a terrific job on the Lee hit, "I'm Sorry," in German. Gitte, a jazz-loving youngster, is at present filming in Scandinavia. Lou Von Burg, the Dutch quizmaster with the big voice, is giving up his German speaking version of "A Dollar A Second" this year. He'll open up next year with a new show called "Music, Music, Music" which is probably a takeoff on the "Stop The Music" quiz idea. Lou is also selling like wildfire with his new Electrola records.

English star Laurie London, who topped the charts with "He's Got The Whole World In His Hands" a few seasons ago, is concentrating hard on the German market. He's set for a TV shot in Zurich along with other stars on a show called "Show Boat." A few days ago in his hotel room, the telephone rang. Laurie picked it up and said "Here is London." The voice at the other end said "No, No, No, I didn't want a long distance call, I just wanted to speak to room 408."

The Quincy Jones Big Band will be presented on German TV on December 5 in a program presented by jazz critic Joachim Ernst Berendt. The German public will be treated to a full half hour of the Jones brand of music. Lolita, whose "Sailor" is in the top 20 in The Cash Box charts, has her first LP on the market.

Polydor is featuring many of its artists on single LP's, which is really something new for Germany. Peter Alexander, Peter Kraus, and several other pop stars now have LP's under their own names.

"Mustafa" is leading the charts in Yugoslavia. This song is getting plenty of "behind the iron curtain" action.

Polydor has signed the Paraguay-Argentina group "Los Amigos Del Amambay" to an exclusive contract. There'll be an LP on the market here soon. They have also recorded an LP with the South Rhodesian group "The City Quads."

Rainer Bertram has been signed to sing "Itsy Bitsy" in a new film here.

Elvis Presley sang in German and the wheels started turnin'. Elvis' recording of "Wooden Heart," based on an old German folk song, with one chorus sung in German has been culled from the LP, "GI Blues" and has been released as a single by RCA. Polydor followed immediately by cutting the record completely in German by former GI Gus Backus, who recorded lead with the Del Vikings in the states and is currently making chart action with his version of Johnny Preston's "Running Bear."

Sam Cooke's "Chain Gang" is being recorded by the Teddies on Polydor. Ralph Maria Siegel's Jupiter Records has released an instrumental version of the Udo Jurgens hit "Jenny" featuring trumpet player Roy Etzel. Ariola is starting something new. On its record jacket is a printed juke box strip ready for the box. The operator has just to buy the record, cut out the strip and set it and the record in the machine. The first record with the new cover is "A Fellow Can Dream What He Wants" from Danish teen duo Jan and Kjeld.

Germany's biggest record firm, Deutsche Grammophon, has formed its own distribution organization. The firm has always been represented by the parent firm, the Siemens Corporation. Label feels that it will now have better control over the sale of its product.

Ralf Bendix moved into 2nd place in the Stuttgart "Schlager Scala" show after one play on his new recording of "Venus Waltz," reports Peter Rebhuhn from Rolf Budde Music.

The trade is still talking about the romance between Connie Francis and German teenage idol Peter Kraus. It seems that Vienna was the focal point of the romance, but when the ocean separated the two youngsters, the romance cooled off considerably.

Mr. Music Man of Switzerland Cedric Dumont, the light music director of the Swiss Broadcasting Company and head of Edition Coda in Zurich, was in Germany for talks with top industry and publishing officials. While here, Dumont judged an international amateur contest sponsored by the Bavarian radio, Radio Salzburg in Austria, and the Swiss Broadcasting station of Zurich. Dumont stressed the necessity of foreign publishers placing their numbers directly to a country such as Switzerland and not with one publisher for all of Europe or for the German speaking lands. Radio Bremen held a Dixieland Jubilee recently featuring Armand Gordon from France, the Two Beat Stompers from Frankfurt and the Spree City Stompers from Berlin.

Gina Dobra, the young Bulgarian lass who is now recording here in Germany, is filming in the GI recreation center of Königsee. Army officials are not a bit worried about sabotage from the beautiful 20 year old songstress.

The Isarspatzen, Bavarian singing group, just visited the East Zone of Germany in a cultural trade with Russian pianist Emil Gilels. Sonet records which is now distributed by Metronome, has picked up the Colpix line for Germany.

The music publishing collection agency for Germany, GEMA, picked up 100,000 dollars in royalties from ASCAP and BMI this year and paid out 700,000 dollars to the two agencies.

Due to the success of Peter And His Rockets and The Blue Diamonds in Holland, the Belgian trade paper, "Song Parade," organized a special teenage vocal-instrumental contest at the Antwerp club, The Laughing Cow. Original first prize: a cow! Present to discover new talents were Hubert Terheggen (Radio Luxembourg), Louis Marshall (Philips), Jef de Boeck (His Master's Voice), Albert Van Hoogten (Ronnex Records), Jos Van Hoogten (Moonglow records) and many publishers. Emcee was Belgium's only indie record producer/publisher, Louis J. Van Rijmenant. After listening for six hours to forty-three candidates, the jury gave first prize to The Spoutnics, a lively combo from Heist-op-den-Berg. It is the second time this year that hot talent came from the same small village: Belgian chartmaker Bob Rocky, who recorded "It Is Over," comes from the same village.

"Sucu Sucu" by Ping Ping and the Al Verlane on the fast label combo proving to be an international deck. This recording has been sold to Holland, Germany, Scandinavia, England, Canada, South Africa, New Zealand and Australia.

Decca-Belgium recorded the tracks for a new Bing Crosby album. Harry Frékin clefted. It's generally known that Belgian studios, arrangers and musicians are of an outstanding quality and, due to the fact that the costs for recordings are low in Belgium, more and more foreign producers come to this country to record.

Newest sensation on the Belgium record market is The Cousins, a combo who made their record debut on the Palette label with "Kili Watch" and "Fuego." These young people were discovered in Les Cousins, a Brussels club.

Bovema's president, Gerry M. Oord, visited EMI in London recently for very important and extensive discussions with regard to the extension of the Bovema factory. Mr. Bolle has been appointed Bovema's public relations officer.

Singer-producer Thom Kelling, who records his Latin-American songs on the Philips label (L.C. Phonogram), has gone to England to discuss the English version of a film he recently made.

Willy Alberti, popular Dutch singer of Italian hitsongs, just signed a contract with the national "Sleeswijk Revue," which will give Alberti fans even more chances to see and hear their idol in person in all the big cities of Holland. On his latest Philips record, issued just a few days ago, Willy is heard for the first time singing an Italian song in Dutch: "War Ben Je Nu" (Abbracciami). A rush release, of which big sales are expected.

The Blue Diamonds, Hollands most popular singing teenagers, returned from a very successful series of appearances in Singapore and Ceylon. In Singapore, they had to be rather careful in the selection of songs, because rock 'n' roll is forbidden there. In the near future, The Blue Diamonds will have guest appearances on TV in Copenhagen and Hamburg; there are also plans for a visit to Barcelona. Just released is a Blue Diamonds EP for the Christmas season on which the boys sing four favorites, accompanied by a choir and orchestra directed by Jack Bulterman: "Silent Night, Holy Night," "Mary's Boy Child," "White Christmas" and "Winter Wonderland." The record, presented in a beautiful colored cover, is on the Dutch Decca label (L.C. Phonogram).

The wellknown French singer Charles Trenet, whose records are released on Bovema's Columbia label, made his first personal appearance on Dutch TV on a recent variety program last week.

The news from the His Master's Voice diskery of Bovema is the release of the third and last part of the Toon Hermans—One Man Show 1958. Hermans is considered as one of the leading comedians in European show-business. Also, the HMV, LP "With A Joke Around The World" by the Dutch King of jokes, Max Taille, has been received very well. Potential hit records in Imperial and HMV single repertoire are Fats Domino's "My Girl Josephine" and Conny Froboess' "Midi-Midinet." Lale Anderson, HMV's recording star, who was wellknown for her singing in the Zarah Leander-vein, finally got recognition with her latest hit "Ein Schiff Wird Kommen," from the motion picture "Never On Sunday."

There is good news for jazz fans in Holland. Three more single records have been released in the "Jazz Festival Series," wonderful versions by the Zoot Sims Quartet, Clara Ward and her famous Ward Singers, and the Benny Goodman Quintet. Another treat is a 'live' recording of Chris Connor at the Village Vanguard in New York on a London LP, "Chris In Person" (L.C. Phonogram). A real swinger is the EP "It Happened In Monterey" by the Buddy Greco Quartet, also on the London label.

Leeds-Holland (Basart) is bringing out the Sam Cooke number, "Chain Gang," with a special promotion program. The song is already on the Dutch charts. Basart-Holland is also bringing out the Sikorski song, "Ein Ring Mit Zwei Blutroten Steinen" (A Ring With Two Red Stones), which won the Wiesbaden song festival. There is a Caterina Valente record and a very strong Dutch version by the popular songstress Liana. "Alone At Last," sung by Jackie Wilson on Brunswick, has been published in Holland. Basart has obtained the Dutch rights. An exclusive contract was signed recently between Johnny and his Skyrockets, CNR recording artists, and Basart-Holland, under which Basart will publish all the compositions of this successful rock 'n' roll group. The first titles, "Please Come Back" and "Johnny's Beat," have already been sold in various countries.

Bovema's Warner Bros. label manager, C. Pompe, told The Cash Box that Bing Crosby is still a very popular recording star in Holland. The Warner Bros. release of "Join Bing And Sing Along," containing 33 great Crosby-songs, caused a lot of enthusiasm among Crosby fans in this country.

The Schriebl & Hupperts jubilee, mentioned in last week's column, was celebrated in the accordionists' home town of Kerkrade. Artists appearing in this great show around the popular duo included Corry "Milord" Brokken, Willy "Mariana" Alberti, Rita Corita and Tobi Rix. A gold record was presented to Karl Schriebl and Jos Hupperts for their best selling version of "Schnee Walzer" on Philips.

Annelies de Graaf, Dutch singing and songwriting teenager, has just made a new record on the Decca label: "Rosalie, Nu Niet Huilen" (Caterina Valente's German hit, "Rosalie, Musst Nicht Weinen") and "Ik Ben Een Kat (Of Een Schat)," Dutch version of the Heidi Brühl filmsong, "Ich Bin So—Oder So."

Bovema's MGM label manager, Frank Visser, plans to release a single from the LP soundtrack, "The Subterraneans." The record will feature the Andre Previn trio and singer Carmen McRae. There's a lot of interest for Jimmy Jones' LP "Good Timin'" and, as far as Connie Francis is concerned, "she's the gasser of the market today with 'White Christmas' and 'Many Tears Ago,' said Visser. MGM will release the motion picture, "Butterfield 8," in Holland, starring Elizabeth Taylor and husband Eddie Fischer. The themesong will be played on an MGM single by David Rose.

Pick of the L.C. Phonogram releases on the London label: "Theme From The Apartment" by Ferrante and Teicher; "You've Got To Move Two Mountains" by Marv Johnson; "John Henry"/"Hang Up My Rock And Roll Shoes" by Jerry Lee Lewis; and "A Million To One" by Jimmie Charles.

Vic Tahar, important juke box operator was present at the latest one and was especially impressed by Sasha's rendition of "C'est Tout, C'est Tout," Maurice Teze's French adaptation of "That's All (Chappell). For the same publisher, Dario Moreno will record for the Fontana label "Soleil de Lima" and Luis Mariano's astonishing come-back has been helped by the tune "Quand On Aime."

M. Colin of France Melodie-Robbins has announced that Philips will release an LP album, "L'Histoire de Ben Hur," original music by Miklos Rozas, narration by Jean Servais and Y. Furet. John Wayne will attend the Paris opening of "Alamo" when the film starts in the French capital on or about December 14.

After a special agreement with Jacques Denton, Barclay and Bel-Air Records will re-make their recordings of "Green Leaves Of Summer" under the new name "Le Bleu De L'été."

Back from Italy where he attended the 10th anniversary celebration Curci Publishers, Philippe Boutet (Editions Barclay) took the opportunity while there to cede to Curci the rights to "Rue De Siam" and those of "Très Chic" to Leonardi Publications. George Garvarentz (French Music) says Aznavour is back in Paris and reports that Jacqueline Francois (Philips) will soon wax her firm's "Meme S'il Arrivait Quelquechose."

Salabert Editions which keeps in close touch with Edith Piaf reports that she has now recorded its "Boulevard Du Crime" by Rivegauche and Monet, M. Segal of Ricordi Publications has acquired the rights to the film track of G. Aurez's "Les Mariolles," music by Aminollah Hossein. Fontana will release the record.

Madame Breton is pleased because her firm's "C'était Moi" has won the grand prize awarded by the "Academie Francaise du Disque." Having finished his opera, Gilbert Becaud is working on an Oratorio which may be presented at Christmas time. Albert Ferreri-Karusell's "C'est Ecrit Dans Le Ciel" has won a prize in the "Union des Radios" contest.

Bob Weiss, International Director of Warner Brothers Records, says an agreement for French distribution of this label is due very soon. Negotiations with Monsieur Azan of Fontana are in an "advanced stage."

L. Cabat, Vogue's President, informs that his firm is setting up a Vogue-Africa society and will open offices in Abidjan for coverage of the Ivory Coast, the High Volta, Dahomey and French Nigeria. Monsieur Beruet will head the African office. Within two years, Cabat plans to have Vogue societies throughout Africa. Also to keep in step with all the other record firms, Vogue announced its new Children's Series, in an original presentation which will sell for 11 New Francs. Newest release on the label Korafas' first waxing in French, "La Joie D'aimer" ("Need Of Love").

Eddie and Nicole Barclay have done it again! L'Academie Francaise du Disque awarded them a grand prize for Paul Paray's version of Strauss' "Salomé" (on Mercury), another for Melina Mercouri's "Les Enfants Du Piree" (Never On Sunday) on the Barclay tag and still a third prize for the Oscar Peterson-Louis Armstrong 10-inch album (on Verve).

Duke Ellington, in Paris to make a film, has made the acquaintance of writer Charles Aznavour. They plan to write some tunes together.

Barclay Records has signed a new rock 'n' roll group of which Eddie and Nicole expect big things. The formation includes a singer, 3 guitars and a drum. Also for Barclay, the first disk of the Cuban all-girl orchestra, "Les Neireida."

The Beethoven Symphonies conducted by Bruno Walter (7 12-inch albums) won the special prize for excellence for Philips in the Academie Francaise du Disque listings. The Université de France award went to "Comtes de Grimm" (Grimm's Fairytales) by J. Fabbris.

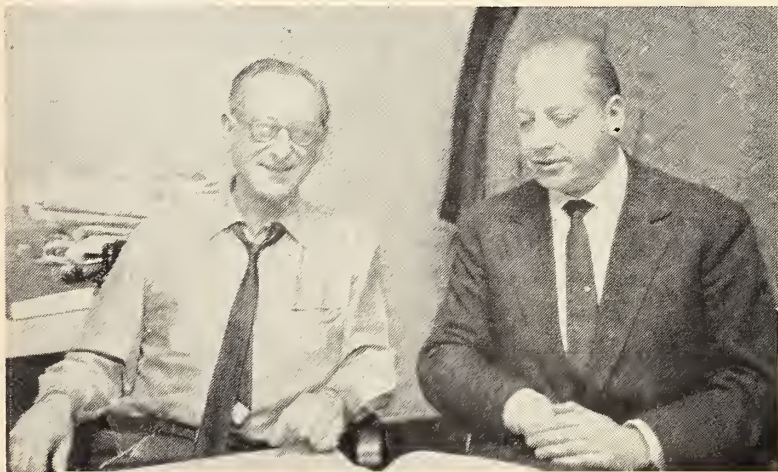

Philippe Weil, Fontana's A&R man, is happy about sales of Dario Moreno's "Banjo Boy" disks. Two of the titles—"Fabiola" and "Valse De La Reine" (The Queen's Waltz").

He is now on the West Coast and plans to spend time in Mexico City, after which he'll return home by Dec. 15.



AUSTRALIA

Christmas selling is really starting to stir up some action at retail level. Most record companies and leading retailers report a healthy increase on sales—particularly in albums and EP's. Singles are still at a fairly low level, with the exception of a few really hot ones, and they aren't showing any marked increase even in view of the free-spending Xmas rush.

Ken Taylor, Festival's general sales manager and A&R manager—also a director of Festival Records—has just announced the appointment of Sandra Patterson as assistant A&R manager. This appointment has been created by the huge expansion plans within the Festival organization. Miss Patterson has been with Festival for four years and began as a junior typist. She was then promoted to secretary to Taylor and early this year was transferred to the A&R department of Lee Gordon Records. Now with the acquisition of Lee Gordon Records by Rex Records, Miss Patterson returns to Festival's Head Office.

The Roulette label has broken through solidly with a strong batch of hit singles; among them are "You Talk Too Much" by Joe Jones, "Diamonds And Pearls" by The Turbans; "Sailor" by Lolita; "Wait For Me" by The Playmates; "Night Theme" by Mark II and "Oliver Cool" by Oliver Cool. Most of them are starting to get some sales action, particularly "You Talk Too Much" which, due to some early confusion, was released on Top Rank—this version has now been withdrawn. "Oliver" cool is starting to make some noise and shaping like a good hit.

Damita Jo is stirring up plenty of interest and action with her great Mercury single of "I'll Save The Last Dance For You." This one could very easily reach to top ten across the nation within the next week or so. It's Damita Jo's first big hit in Australia and should become a major single for Mercury.

Sixteen year old Noeline Batley, Rex recording star, is riding on a wave of popularity with her hit, "Barefoot Boy." This number was written by a charming and talented young French girl Helen Grover, now living in Sydney; she is sharing in the publicity spotlight with Noeline. Helen Grover has written twelve more numbers for Miss Batley and Rex is expecting big things in the future for the pair. Noeline has been featured on national teenage TV programs, particularly Brian Henderson's "Bandstand" and Johnny O'Keefe's "Six O'Clock Rock." The big news has just broken to the effect that "Barefoot Boy" will be released through Top Rank in the USA and the musical backing has been re-arranged for American exposure. Australian disk-jockeys have all received samples of the new recording and this has resulted in double exposure for the disk in Australia.

GTV-Channel 9 in Melbourne has completed arrangements to video-tape an Ella Fitzgerald spectacular during her current Australian visit. The show will be taped at The Embers, where Ella is due to open on December 4 but is not likely to be shown until the New Year. The full hour spectacular will be completely devoted to Ella and the show should be a major television attraction not only in this country, but also overseas where it is likely to be placed.

In honor of Ella's Australian visit, the Verve label is making a big drive on all Ella's material with a very special effort on the album, "Ella Wishes You a Swinging Christmas."

2GB in Sydney—key station of the Macquarie Network, reports great success with its new half-hour program aired weekly "The All Australian Hit Parade." This sponsored program is broadcast through 33 stations and features recordings by Australian artists exclusively. The parade is based on actual record sales in capital city retail stores.

Festival Records has received news from EMI in London—which presses and distributes Top Rank records in Great Britain—to the effect that Col Joye's smash hit, "Yes Sir That's My Baby," which completely outsold the Ricky Nelson version in Australia, will be released in England on the Top Rank label on November 25. This will tie in nicely with Col's English tour in December. Col's manager and brother, Kevin Jacobsen, will be leaving first to arrange tour details and Col will follow on three weeks later.

EMI's Columbia label has a new single by English artist Cliff Richard, "Nine Times Out Of Ten" c/w "Thinking Of Our Love." The star did very well with his "Please Don't Tease," which was also a big hit in England. Another EMI release (this time on MGM) destined for big things in this country is the great Bing and Satchmo single which couples "Muskrat Ramble" with "Dardanella." Both artists have long been favorites, particularly as a team.

Latest cover versions of hits released by Rex Records include popular disk jockey Rhett Walker with "Cincinnati Fireball" and "Take Another Step," while Rock Martin is out with "Oliver Cool" and "A Dear John Letter." Dig Richards has a good single on Rex, two local compositions "You Gotta Love Me" and "My Baby's Not A Baby Any More." The youngster is just finishing a pretty good run with his previous chart rider, "Little Lover."

Pye Records reports substantial results with its recently issued "Acclaimed Series," a range of off-beat longhair albums. Harry Sutcliffe, Pye chief in Australia, says that interest is rapidly increasing with each new release in the "Acclaimed Series."

RCA should create fantastic sales figures here with soundtrack album from Elvis Presley's movie, "G.I. Blues." Elvis is still the number one disk attraction throughout Australia and his single, "It's Now Or Never," still heads our best sellers, a position it has held for several weeks. His follow-up "Are You Lonesome Tonight" is sure to be a sensational smash also.

FROM HERE AND THERE

Jack Argent, chief of Leeds Music in Australia, is on a quick visit to the United States to confer with the Leeds people in New York. Leeds is currently among the leading publishers in this country and is handling many hot locally written hit songs.

American star Mel Torme has been a big success in TV appearances in this country and has also been working to capacity houses at The Embers in Melbourne. Ella Fitzgerald goes into The Embers after Mel and then both stars move out on a four-state concert tour.

American vocalist Don Cherry has been signed for a four weeks Australian season next March for The Embers and GTV-Channel 9. Cherry has enjoyed moderate success here with some of his records.

Another US importation due here for a television season is Toni Harper, she is scheduled to arrive on December 5.

Belinda Music reports excellent results with "Save The Last Dance For Me." The Drifters' disk is currently the No. 2 top single throughout the nation. Belinda also anticipates healthy action with "Let's" (Sarah Vaughan) "Happy Go Lucky Blues" (Tommy Steele) and "Mildred" (Gaynor Bunning).

ITALY

A big and wonderful dinner party was held recently at the hotel Continental to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Curci publishing house. At least a hundred people attended, with guests coming from many regions of Italy and also abroad. I had the pleasure of meeting Patrick Crookshank of Robbins Music from London; Henry Liechti, general manager of Societe Intercontinentale D'Editions Musicales from Geneva; and once again Philippe Boutet, director of Editions Musicales Eddie Barclay. Mario Vinciguerra and Mr. Ciampi, president and director of SIAE, respectively, gave Alberto Curci a golden plate as official acknowledgment of Curci's world-wide music activities and enterprises on the part of the Italian association of authors and publishers. Another gold medal was given to Curci by Giovanni D'Anzi, writer of hit songs published by the firm. Curci is only exceeded in age in Italy's publishing business by Ricordi, which is 150 years old.

I met Marcel Stellman, Decca European sales representative, who was in Milan for business talks with Mr. Bacchini and Mr. Tosi of Italian Decca. Asked if they were planning to open an Italian catalog of light music, Bacchini and Tosi said that they are thinking of signing only Italian singers who have strong possibilities of succeeding.

Al Brackman, vice-president of the Howard Richmond Publishing Group, stopped in Milan on his European trip. After the usual series of visits to the Italian music publishers, including, of course, Mr. Sugar, Italian representative of the Richmond house, he told The Cash Box that he was surprised by the size and elegance of Italian publishing offices. He also said he found a lot of interesting material both in Italy and France.

Gian Costello and Pino Donaggio, VCM artists, will be guests of a new TV show, "Moderator Swing," which begins in the middle of Dec. Neopolitan singer Sergio Bruni, also on VCM, is on tour throughout the main towns of southern Italy, singing his latest compositions which he has cut for the label.

Mr. Matalon of Italdic, which handles the activities of Mina, the songstress whose "Il Cielo In Una Stanza" (The Sky In A Room) tops the Italian charts, told The Cash Box that he is thinking of having Mina appear abroad, including the U.S.

The next San Remo Festival will surely take place. Ezio Radaelli, organizer of the festival, has said that the method of voting for the festival songs will be correct and there will be no possibilities of entanglements on the part of music and record firms. Therefore, SIAE has changed its opinion regarding the festival and has given its members official permission to take part in the contest.

EMI Reports Higher Profit

LONDON—In its annual report to shareholders for year ended June 30, 1960, EMI has announced a final net profit, after tax deduction, of 2,413,000 pounds compared with 2,232,000 pounds in the previous year. In dollars, this amounts to \$6,756,400 and \$6,249,000, respectively.

In reviewing the activities of EMI, firm chairman Sir Joseph Lockwood said that "in a special study which we have done of the production of sales of records in all countries of the world, we have found that our share of the total world market is approximately one quarter." Lockwood noted that a British music magazine, Disc, gave silver disks to fifteen EMI artists over the financial period reported. He also reported success with the diskery's classical and light music category, recalling the introduction in Sept. of '59 of a series of 7" 45 RPM disks tagged "Your Kind Of Music," devoted primarily to music in the classical area. This was followed in Nov. of '59 by a low-priced series of 12" classical LP's on the HMV label entitled "Concert Classics."

Regarding stereo, Lockwood said that "the changeover to stereophonic records is taking place slowly, but these records, especially among long-play types, are becoming firmly established."

More TV For Australia

NEW YORK—Artists and records will be getting more exposure in the Australian market as the result of twenty-six stations to be established there. Most of the commercial stations are expected to be in operation within a year.

This move is the third stage in the development of TV in Australia. The fourth stage—to be worked out when the third stage is complete—will involve outlets in South and Western Australia.

Centers involved in the third stage are Canberra, the Federal capital; Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland and Tasmania. Thirteen local indie firms will be licensed to operate individual commercial stations.

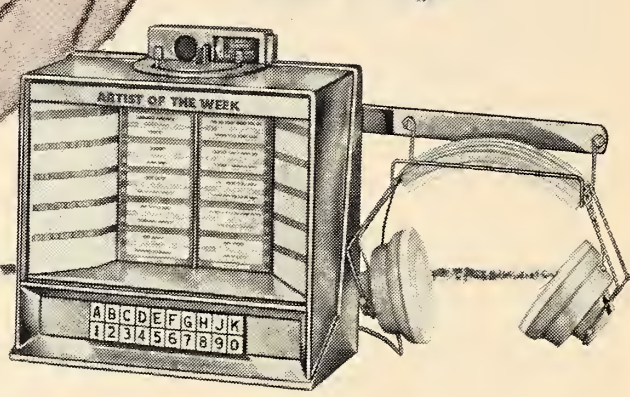
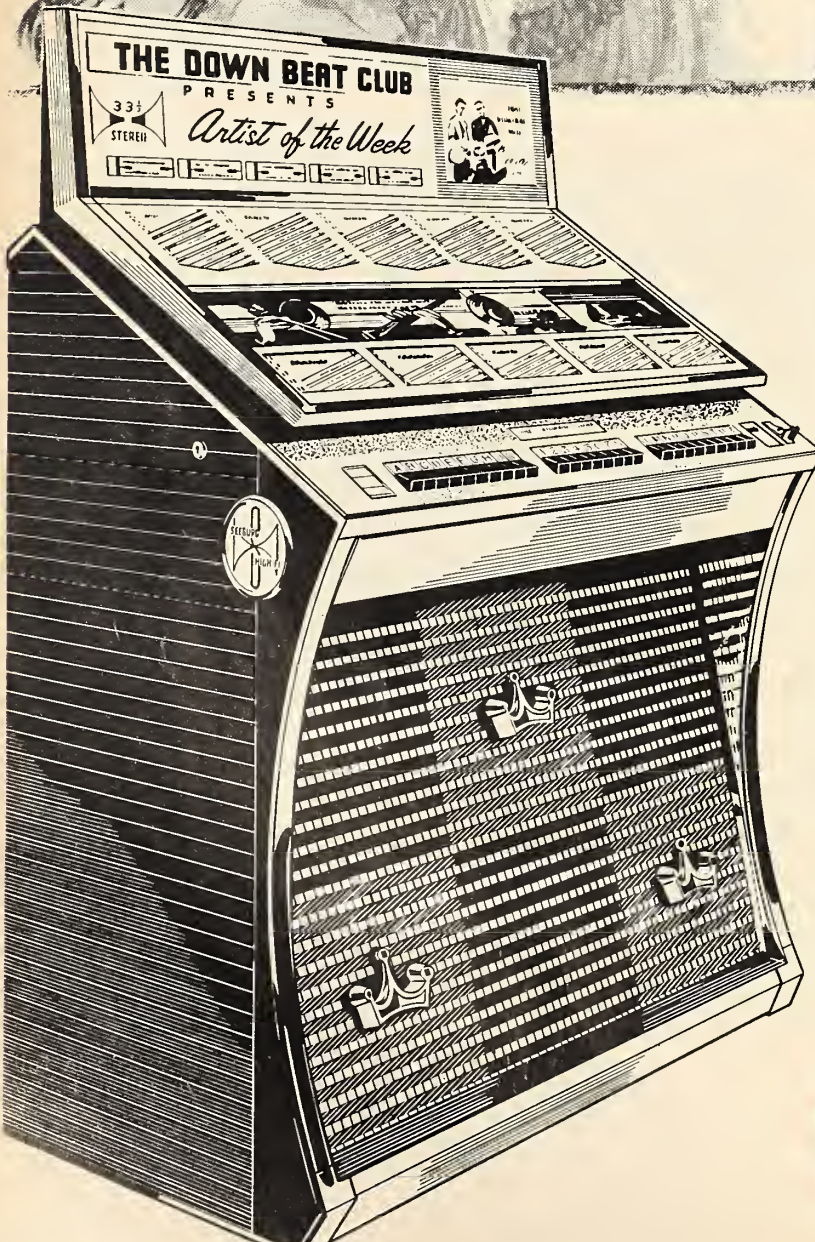

What's Wrong With The Coin Machine Business?

The coin machine business is unique in that it depends entirely on the direct sale of a product that is first and foremost a luxury whether it be music or amusement. The moment money tightens the sale of luxuries suffers. And that is what is happening now.

Business in the United States could be better. A glance at the financial page will immediately indicate that many industries are suffering from a poor economic situation. Steel, oil, automobiles, aluminum—take your pick. Business just isn't what it should be. Once business in general picks up, the coin machine business will see an increase in collections. So it is not the coin machine business that is off, it is American business in general, upon which the coin machine industry depends—to a greater degree than many other businesses since it is primarily a luxury depending on nickels and dimes—offering in return nothing more tangible than several minutes of relaxation and amusement. When money tightens, this type of spending usually is restricted. The respective plants of various industries are not sending home millions of workers with overtime pay. They therefore do not have the amount of money they are accustomed to spending. The taverns are suffering as well as the food stores. The automobile salesman finds it just as hard to sell the '61 model as the operator who is doing everything on his route to stimulate collections. The steel industry would like to see a full capacity production run. The stock market is off, although not as much as it was several months ago.

We must take the good with the bad. But most important, we must understand why a situation is "bad" and do something to improve it.

To knock our own business is the natural thing to do. But a check of other businesses will indicate that they are doing the same thing.

The trouble lies in the overall national picture which is subject to change overnight. An announcement from Washington concerning credit, depreciation, price control, et al, could influence the economy of the country in many respects. The creation of a loose money situation could lead to a buying surge. These things lead to greater production and exchange of money with rapid circulation resulting in a brighter economic picture for all.

Of course, with a change in the national picture, the introduction of an exciting new type amusement machine would help matters even more so.

The next time the cash box doesn't total what it should, think twice before you place the blame on the machine—or the industry. You've got plenty of company in other fields. Fortunately, we can look to improved economic conditions in the near future.

Four days of meetings on all phases of the amusement business with helpful hints to amusement entrepreneurs from all over the country headlined the convention business sessions which began on Monday, November 28th.

The convention was opened by retiring president Robert L. Plarr of Dorney Park in Allentown, Pa., with the invocation offered by Marvin Stator of Springlake Park, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Reports by all standing committee chairman with unfinished business took up the major part of the sessions on Monday morning.

The Monday afternoon session was highlighted by President Robert Plarr's address on "Success in the Sixties." He said that the 60's will be a very exceptional period for the amusement business providing that taxes to the industry remain proportionate to the growth.

The keynote address by Irv Wermont of New York City, N.Y. closed the Monday Sessions. Wermont delighted the audience with his quick wit and amazing powers of retention. His talk centered around "Fun—our Secret Weapon."

Evening sessions took the form of seminars or "shop talk" discussions on various aspects and problems that relate to individuals in several areas of the amusement trade.

The second general session met on Tuesday afternoon, November 29. Topics of discussion were presented to the audience, for the most part, on a panel discussion basis.

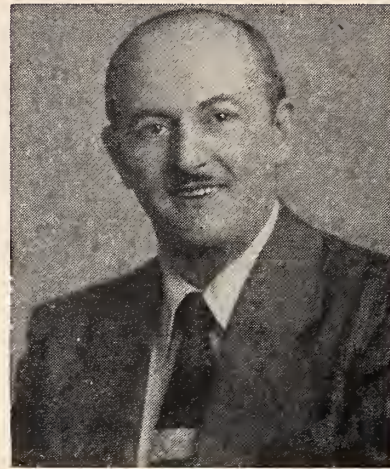

He closed by saying that you profit most from a trade organization by putting time into furthering the association.

The Tuesday afternoon session was concluded with an audio visual presentation by Dr. Herbert True of South Bend, Indiana who delighted the delegates with his mild, carefree manner and his slide descriptions. Dr. True spoke to the audience on "Ideas That Make Men Great" asking them what they had done lately to justify their own business survival and telling them that they alone make the difference. He also stated that when you start measuring yourself by other men you are incapable of doing anything excellently. In closing he remarked "The great leveler of men is that the greatest discovery of our time is that men alter their lives by altering their attitudes."

The Tuesday program was completed by the annual NAAPPB banquet on Tuesday evening with master of ceremonies duties capably handled by TV, radio and movie favorite Bob Crosby.

Aside from the recognition luncheon on Wednesday afternoon and the trade exhibition which ran concurrently Sunday through Wednesday, the only other Wednesday activity was the pool and beach operators session which again discussed individual problems on Wednesday morning.

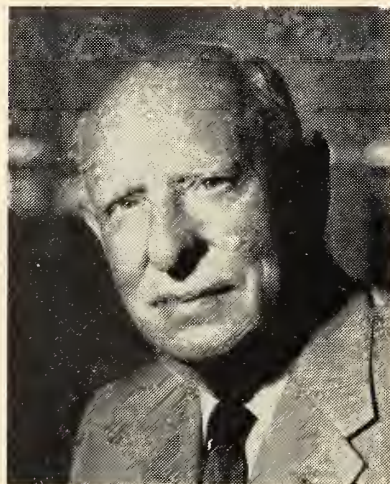
Fish addressed the body concerning his activities during the previous year and the status of Music Operators generally since the Supreme Court decision outlawing free plays on games of chance.

Coinmen are asked for no special sum although Bodkin stated that several last minute smaller donations put them over the top last year. All checks are to be made payable to the Cardinal Spellman Servicemen's Club and are to be returned in the stamp addressed envelope provided.

The funds are used by the organization to support the welfare, care and recreation of hundreds of thousands of servicemen from all over the world, who stop regularly in New York City and find their way to the Cardinal Spellman Club.

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Coin Council Membership List Grows

CHICAGO—The rate of membership growth in The Coin Machine Council, industry-wide public relations organization for the coin machine industry, is "gratifying," said Herbert B. Jones, chairman of the Council's membership committee and Vice President of Bally Manufacturing Company, Chicago.

The organization, which was officially introduced to the public press only a few weeks ago, has received considerable national press notice and is making long strides each month toward its goal of industry-wide representation, Jones said.

"The enthusiastic response of the industry as a whole to the concept of an organization to act as a spokesman for it," Jones went on, "shows that a real need for such an organization has been felt. We're proud of the early response—a hard-hitting campaign has been planned which will

justify the faith the members have placed in the Council."

He pointed out that any legitimate businessman engaged in coin machine activities can become a member. This includes operators, distributors, jobbers, suppliers, and manufacturers of coin-operated machines, whether music, amusement or vending.

Louis E. Casola, Council president and president of Mid-West Automatic Vending Company, said that the largest category in terms of strength of members is that of operators. Fees for operators range from \$10 to \$50. A participating member contributes the top fee, he explained, while a sustaining member joins for \$25, and a supporting member for \$10.

"Membership fees are the sole source of income for The Council," Casola explained. "A member can join at any time and renews his membership one year from the date his fee was received.

"The scope of our program will depend on the size of our membership," he went on. "Thus present members will find it beneficial to themselves and to their industry to help recruit new members, when and wherever possible. "I am certain operators will rally around "their program" in much greater numbers in the months ahead."

Membership fees for manufacturers are based on annual sales, Jones said. Suppliers are divided into three fee categories, of \$25, \$100 and \$250 each.

O. L. "Bob" Slifer, CMC Public Relations Steering Committee Chairman and executive director of National Coin Machine Distributors Association, stated that Distributor and Jobber members of CMC have shown an eager willingness to cooperate with Ben Rogers of the Public Relations Board (CMC's public relations counsel) and we face the future with utmost confidence that all other Distributors and Jobbers will lend their time, talents and financial support by joining CMC.

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U.S. Tobacco Dividend

NEW YORK—United States Tobacco Company declared last week a regular dividend of 30 cents per share and an extra dividend of 15 cents per share on the common stock of the Company. A year ago the Company declared an extra dividend of the same amount, the first extra since 1950.

The Company also declared a regular dividend of 43¾ cents on the preferred shares. Normally, the Company has paid 30 cents per common share, or \$1.20 a year. With the regular dividends of \$1.20 per share and the extra of 15 cents, 1960 payments to common stockholders will total \$1.35.

Distributors and jobbers can join the Council simply by mailing in their membership fees. The membership fee for distributors is \$200, and for jobbers is \$100.

Gordon, vice-president and head of Seeburg's coin-operated Phonograph Division, consisted of more than 100 distributors, sub-distributors and key dealers, representing a cross-section of all phases of Seeburg's business activities in the phonograph, vending and background music divisions in Belgium, Denmark, England, Finland, France, Germany, Holland, Italy, Luxembourg, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland.

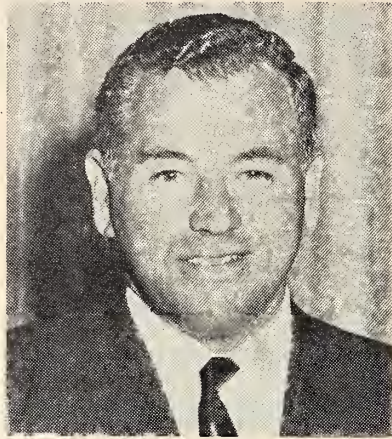
The convention was opened Monday morning by Delbert Coleman, president of the Seeburg Corporation, who greeted his guests and gave them a brief preview of the interesting program in store for them. George Gilbert, vice-president of the Seeburg Corporation, emceed the entire convention. He also conducted the morning sessions of the first day's activities, which were devoted to the Seeburg vending equipment line.

The Monday afternoon session, following a luncheon (both day's activities were recessed by noon lunches), was directed by Stuart Auer, vice-president in charge of the Seeburg Background Music Division. Auer explained in detail the concept of background music. And as an added surprise there was an actual on-the-spot music recording session on the stage conducted by the internationally renowned orchestral director, Cedric Dumont.

Dumont had with him for this live recording demonstration a special 9 piece orchestral combo from Basle, Switzerland. He demonstrated the technique and meticulous care that goes into producing the particular type of background music programmed exclusively for the Seeburg background music libraries.

During this recording period Milton Blink, musical director of Seeburg Corporation's background music libraries, explained the further advantages of the tailored library services offered by the Seeburg Corporation.

The second day of the convention (Tuesday) was directed by Jack Gordon, vice-president of the coin-operated Phonograph Div., who detailed all that Seeburg stands for in the field

George Gilbert's assistant in the Seeburg International Corp., Frank Vonderach, supervised the pacing of Gilbert's presentation and demonstrations conducted on the floor with Seeburg vending equipment.

In heralding the success of this first Seeburg overseas convention, Gordon said: "This is the first time any manufacturer in our fields of enterprise has ever brought a convention of this magnitude into the European markets. We certainly intend to hold many more such trade showings in foreign countries from now on. The great success of this showing strongly urges us to strengthen this phase of operation further.

"It has been made possible," he concluded, "through the establishment by Mr. Coleman of the new Seeburg International Corp."

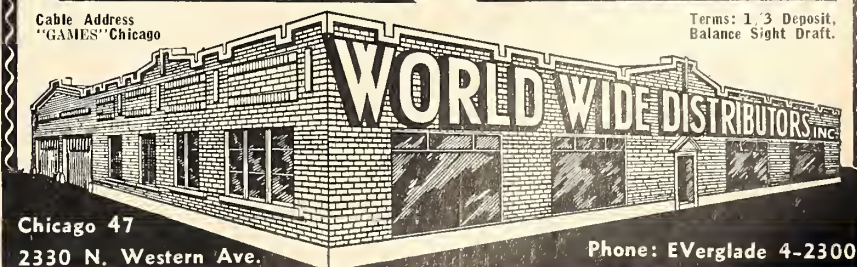

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Australian Firm Expands Via England

LONDON—Leonard Ainsworth, Managing Director of Ainsworth Consolidated Industries (Pty) Limited, Australia's leading coin operated vending and fruit machine firm, recently vis-

ited in England where he has set up a subsidiary company. The parent company was founded in New South Wales in 1933 primarily for the production of dental goods, then a new Australian industry. Later its interest spread to scientific equipment of the specialist class and precision equipment until in 1953, aware of the demand for a good quality coin machine, the company commenced manufacture in this field. The Ainsworth Organization now manufactures amusement equipment of every description as well as having phonographs and vending machines and other specialty lines in Australia. Ainsworth indicated that the newly formed English subsidiary would develop along similar lines to meet customers' requirements.

Since his appointment in February this year as General Manager, Hal Eldridge has been busy setting up the English subsidiary, Ainsworth Consolidated Industries (Great Britain) Limited, with first class showrooms and offices. In expressing his satisfaction with the progress made and in the appointment of distributors and sales results to date, Ainsworth was most emphatic that head office instructions as to the need to preserve both the integrity and reputation of the business, in the interests of distributors, was imperative in view of the misconceptions held by many existent operators and distributors regarding The Gaming and Betting Bill as passed.

During a visit to the London showrooms The Cash Box representative saw the latest consignment of the Aristocrat Sheerline and Clubmaster fruit machines to arrive from Australia. Ainsworth said "The machines are of world quality and include many original design features of a patented nature that increase reliability whilst maintaining simplicity, thus making them ideally suited to the British market which is a club market as in Australia." He also expressed the opinion that although the British club approach to the machines would be a conservative one and that the demand would fall far short of the wild speculations being made in some quarters, he was confident that Ainsworth Consolidated would gain more than their fair share of the market. Ainsworth described the wild newspaper stories currently appearing in the national press, suggesting the entry of criminal elements into the fruit machine industry in England, as completely reckless and unfounded, pointing out that the terms of the British Act preclude private gain and therefore make such practices impossible.

Before leaving London for his return to Australia via the United States Ainsworth completed negotiations, not only for the manufacture of British and American equipment in Australia and its distribution throughout the South Pacific, but also made reciprocal arrangements which would make Ainsworth Equipment available to the world market.



EASTERN FLASHES

If collections are off don't blame the coin machine industry. Talk with your friends in the steel, oil, aluminum or stock broker business and hear their story. Business in general is just bad throughout the nation. It's an economic cycle. Until things pick up and money gets slightly "looser" and more available the coin business won't necessarily improve at the location level. But it's not the fault of the industry nor does it have anything to do with machines. It's the economic status of the USA and it will invariably start on an upswing, as it has before, with steel production trying desperately for a greater than 50% production level, thereby enabling workers to take home a full size check. The money will find its way into retail stores and coin machines as well. So tighten your belt, do everything you can to improve present collections, and wait for the pick-up. But don't blame the industry. The automobile salesman is blaming Detroit and he's wrong, too. Autos will move when the money starts to flow from plant payrolls to workers' hands. When this happens the nation will naturally have more money in circulation and a larger amount available for the neighborhood tavern, the shopping center, the bowling alley or wherever you happen to operate. In the meantime do everything you can to improve present income.

Frantz Game Premiered At Parks Show

CHICAGO—John F. Frantz, president of J. F. Frantz Manufacturing Company, this city, introduced a new

pistol target amusement game at the NAAPPB Park Show last week. This machine carries a "New Frontier" title as its name. Inspiration for "The New Frontier" tag comes from President-Elect John F. Kennedy's campaign slogan of the same name (New Frontier).

The game, according to Frantz, is a quick-draw, pistol target game, complete with saloon swinging doors and moving targets.

The player has full vision across the playfield since it is completely enclosed in a molded plastic unit above the playfield.

Another Frantz innovation concerns the fact that he is promoting sales of "The New Frontier" direct from the factory to operator with no middle handling of the game.

"The operator can readily be assured of much greater savings by purchasing this game directly from the factory," Frantz asserted.

"An added advantage," he said, "is made available to the operator since no outside servicing is ever required. The pistol assembly and cash box unit can be very easily removed by the operator with absolute ease.

"To remove the target section at the rear of the machine," Frantz continued, "all the operator need do is release two easy-to-reach springs, then a single finger motion drops the target assembly into the operator's hand. This is absolute simplicity of operation on location.

"Also," he said, "there are no troublesome wires or electrical systems to mess with, no engineering know-how is needed, and no tools are necessary."

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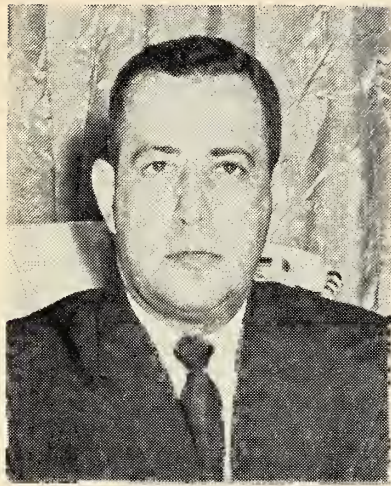
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**Williams "Voice-O-Graph"

CHICAGO—Williams Electronic Manufacturing Corporation introduced the new Williams "Voice-O-Graph" record vending machine at the NAAPPB Parks Show last week and Sam Lewis, vice-president in charge of sales, advised that there was considerable interest shown among amusement park and arcade operators during the four day trade show and convention.

A slogan on the side of the "Voice-O-Graph" cabinet urges people to—"Sing it—Say it on a 45 rpm record—and Send it home!"

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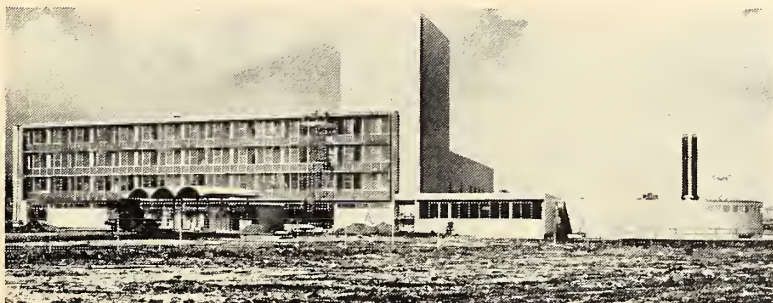

CHICAGO—J. A. (Art) Weinand, director of sales for Chicago Dynamic Industries, this city, lifted the wraps on the firm's new "Ray Gun" for the benefit of visiting operators to the Parks show held here last week.
