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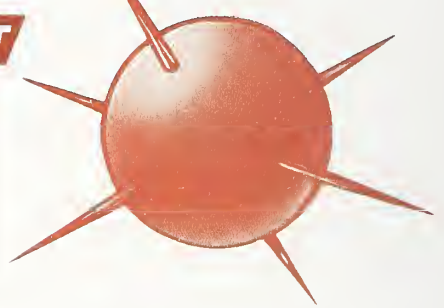

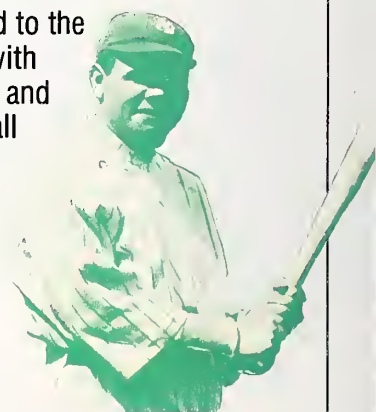

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EDITORIAL After The Boom . . .

There are some fairly obvious signs of one way in which the record labels are dealing with the industry-wide recession.

Until recently, only two albums in the history of the **Cash Box** Pop LP chart have debuted at the #1 spot. Now, in as many months, two have bowed at the top spot: last month's Led Zeppelin and this week's Eagles LP.

Both groups have been away from the recording studio for quite some time. Their sudden reemergence, along with numerous recent and forthcoming releases by other past platinum-sellers such as Donna Summer, Stevie Wonder, the Village People, Gloria Gaynor — to name only a few — can hardly be a coincidence.

More likely, the sudden glut of top releases suggests that the labels have decided to heat up a sluggish industry with an injection of superstar product.

Apparently this strategy is working. A recent article in the *Wall Street Journal* listed convincing facts and figures which pointed to just such an upward

turn in sales.

While **Cash Box** applauds the Eagles' and Led Zeppelin's stunning chart performance and welcomes the return of better days for the industry as a whole, one caveat should, we feel, be mentioned.

Flooding the market with superstar product is only a stop-gap remedy against recession and will inevitably perpetuate the boom and bust cycle which has characterized this year.

And as the gift-giving season approaches, the temptation to put out even more records will grow stronger. It is a temptation which should be resisted for the benefit of everyone involved.

A healthier and more sound economic policy is one in which albums by superstars would be released at roughly even intervals throughout the year.

Cash Box strongly recommends the sort of planning that resists short-term financial windfalls, planning that promotes long-term stability and healthy, continued growth.

Black Artists, Promoters In Head-On Clash Over Venues

NEW YORK — Kenneth Gamble, president of the Black Music Assn. (BMA), scored members of the United Black Concert Promoters (UBCP) for failing to appear at a press conference that was supposed to be held jointly by the two organizations in New York last week.

The press conference was called to show the industry that black artists and concert promoters had settled their recent differences. The artists who were present, including Maurice and Verdine White of Earth, Wind & Fire, Teddy Pendergrass, Betty Wright, Lonnie Liston Smith and Dexter Wansel, all supported the BMA's call for an organized economic block and legal maneuvering to end alleged discrimination against black concert promoters. The UBCP, on the other hand, endorses boycotting and picketing of venues where black promoters have allegedly experienced discrimination.

At the press conference, Gamble pointed out that the UBCP had been developed through the BMA at the request of the concert promoters, who felt they were "a dying species. Ten days ago, we had a meeting in

Philadelphia between promoters and artists like Earth, Wind & Fire and Teddy Pendergrass, who were the objects of the UBCP's attack, and we developed guidelines and strategies. This was the first time artists and promoters had come together; but the promoters chose not to show up. This has happened within the past 24 hours. The BMA's position is that we will protect the art form of black music."

Pointing to the artists in attendance, Gamble said, "The presence of these people here show that they want to help, but we can only help people who want to help themselves on a level of intellectual competence. At this point, the UBCP will not be able to do business with the BMA, because of their refusal to recognize that the old way of doing things — the emotional way — doesn't work. Dick Griffey (president of UBCP) told me he would be here. Now it is his (and the promoters) turn to initiate dialogue, because I'm not going to talk to them."

Teddy Pendergrass then read the BMA statement on artist-promoter relations, which called for the formation of a steering committee "designed to protect the rights of performing black music artists." Pendergrass is interim chairperson of the committee, which also includes Maurice and

CBS Inc. Posts Third Qtr. Rise In Sales, Profits

NEW YORK — CBS Inc. reported record sales and earnings for the third quarter. Revenues of the CBS Records Group were reported to be "essentially equal" to sales for the third quarter of 1978, however, profits for the CBS Records Group declined during the quarter, primarily due to soft sales and heavy returns in the U.S.

CBS Inc. posted third quarter net income of \$53.1 million, up nine percent from \$48.5 million in the prior-year period. Third quarter revenues were \$882.9 million, an increase of nine percent over the previous year's figure of \$807.4 million.

For the first nine months of the year, CBS Inc.'s net income decreased three percent to \$136.7 million from \$141.6 million in the prior-year period. (This decline was attributed principally to unfavorable results in the first quarter.) Revenues, however, jumped 14% to \$2.62 billion from \$2.30 billion in the first nine months of 1978.

The CBS report emphasized the fact that CBS Records International continued its strong performance during the third quarter.

Country Music Awards Show Hands Out A Few Surprises

NASHVILLE — On Country Music's finest night, amid all the glitter and gleam of sparkling stage backdrops and prime time network television, Willie Nelson, wearing blue jeans, a cowboy shirt and his hair in a braid, won the prestigious CMA Entertainer of the Year award, Oct. 8.

The award came to Nelson several years after he had made a huge swirl in the industry by leaving Nashville, moving to Texas, letting his hair and beard grow, and breaking the so-called "established way of doing things" in country music. It was a fitting tribute for Nelson to receive that honor from the CMA after the organization had been accused of ignoring the 'outlaw movement' in country music that had resulted in gold and platinum record sales and country music reaching a new and bigger audience primarily through artists like Nelson and Waylon Jennings.

Another unexpected honoree was Charlie Daniels, known for years in southern rock circles as one of their kings of boogie, who walked off with three awards — Single of the Year for "Devil Went Down To Georgia," and Instrumentalist of the Year and Instrumental Group of the Year for the Charlie Daniels Band. Daniels is another outstanding example of the relaxed boundaries of country music and the recognition by the CMA of the diverse elements within country music.

The other big winner was Kenny Rogers, who hosted the show and walked away with three awards: Male Vocalist, Album of the Year for "The Gambler" and Duet of the Year with Dottie West. Rogers had been nominated in five categories, tops of any of the nominees.

It is ironic to note that those who have

received a great number of nominations at the CMA Awards show have not made a "clean sweep" as always predicted. Last year's Entertainer of the Year, Dolly Parton, is an example here, as is Waylon Jennings from several years back and Rogers this year.

The Statler Brothers "won back" their award as Vocal Group of the Year. Last year, the Oaks won the award, breaking the Statler's six-year winning streak.

Other award winners were Don Schlitz, writer of "The Gambler," for Song of the Year; Barbara Mandrell for Female Vocalist.

Hank Snow and Hubert Long were inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame. Long, inducted in the deceased category, was a key executive in country music, one of the founders of the CMA and a noted publisher and talent agent. Snow, the

As Sales Tool, LP Graphics Receive Qualified Praise

LOS ANGELES — Retail chain executives, label merchandising executives and graphic artists all agree that while it is the music that ultimately sells an album, the graphics on that album do contribute to sales.

Studies have shown that albums are often impulse items, and the executives and graphic artists surveyed emphasized the pivotal role a catchy album cover can play in such impulse purchasing.

"A very substantial number of sales are essentially impulse-oriented," Butterfly Records president A.J. Cervantes says. "Therefore, covers in particular as well as any other type of in-store stimulus can have a tremendous impact on sales."

Impact Debated

Just how much impact is a matter of debate. Although there are no statistics correlating sales with album graphics, John Cabalka, head art director at Motown, estimates that cover artwork may account for "25% worth of sales. Graphics do help sell an album, but if the album is good and gets a lot of airplay and word of mouth, people are going to buy it whether it's a good or bad cover."

Echoing this sentiment, Gribbitt art director Paul Gross says, "Music is the #1 seller. But a good record with a bad cover could go unrecognized because of the huge number of releases. People will always reach for a prettier package whether they're buying LPs or toothpaste."

Ben Karol, president of the New York-based King Karol's retail chain, tends to downplay the effectiveness of album graphics. "Album art has a minimum amount of effect. However, if an album cover is so unusual that it calls attention to itself, it might get looked at instead of being glossed over."

Eye-Catchers

Like Gribbitt's art director, Karol believes an eye-catching album is important in a store filled with albums. "There are thousands of records in a shop, and the customers can be overwhelmed. Many

Other Distributions Not Contacted During Arista-Pickwick Talks

NEW YORK — Six months ago, in his keynote speech at the NARM Convention, Elliot Goldman, executive vice president and general manager of Arista Records, called for "formal contractual relationships" between independent distributors and labels. But a recent **Cash Box** survey has revealed that except for unspecified negotiations with Pickwick, none of the distributors that handle Arista product has received any formal follow-up to the proposal.

According to Bob King, head of distribution for Western Merchandisers, which handles Arista in the Denver area, "after all the talk at NARM, I expected something to come within two to three months at the latest, but it's cooled down to the point where nothing has been done and we have not been contacted. All of a sudden it just faded from the picture. And as long as it was a manufacturer's suggestion, I think that they should be the ones to initiate negotiations."

Contracts Unnecessary

According to Joe Voynow, head of Bib Distributors, which handles Arista in the Charlotte area, "There has been talk about contracts and there's no need for contracts. If a manufacturer is turning out good product and a distributor is making sales I think that this should be sufficient as a contract. As far as I can see, most contracts are

Apple Corp. Files Suit Against Clark, ABC For 'Birth Of The Beatles'

LOS ANGELES — Apple Corp., Ltd., a holding company for The Beatles, filed a civil suit in Los Angeles Superior Court Oct. 10 against Dick Clark and the American Broadcasting Company to prevent them from using the names of group members Paul McCartney, John Lennon, George Harrison and Ringo Starr or using Beatle imitators in the upcoming Dick Clark Production, "Birth of The Beatles."

Injunction Sought

In the suit, Apple stated that it is seeking an injunction against both Clark and ABC from airing the show, which is set for Nov. 23 on ABC-TV, as well as \$40 million in general damages and \$100 million in punitive damages.

Although Clark was unavailable for comment, a source close to the TV personality/producer said that "as of now, there has been no change in the air date of the film."

Apple Corp. had previously filed suit against the producers of the stage musical "Beatlemania," seeking a similar injunction.

made to be broken."

According to Richard Brown, sales manager for All-South Distributors which handles Arista in the New Orleans area, "There's been virtually no talk about it on the label level. It's something that I've heard on and off for twenty years, and frankly, if it was such a good idea, it would've been done a long time ago. Contracts are just not going to make that much of a difference. When business is good, then everything is all right, whether there's a contract or not, and if the label doesn't have the product, or if the distributor isn't doing a good job, then either party can find a way to break that contract."

Other Arista distributors, including Stans in Shreveport, Schwartz Brothers in Washington, D.C. and Associated Distributors in Phoenix, said they had had no substantive discussions with Arista on the subject of contracts. However, there was some awareness that the label was involved in what appeared to be exclusive negotiations with Pickwick.

According to Tony Dallesandro, president of M.S. Distributors, which handles Arista in Chicago, "Though we haven't been approached by any of the labels regarding contracts, it would appear that Pickwick would be the distributor that a label would want to negotiate with on the first go-round."

But representatives at Pickwick would not elaborate on their reported talks with Arista. According to David Ehlen, vice president of marketing for Pickwick International, Inc., "Although there might be an announcement forthcoming shortly, right now would not be appropriate as we are in the middle of some reasonably sensitive discussions."

Elliott Goldman confirmed that Arista was negotiating with Pickwick and that the label might have a "major announcement" to make in the near future.

Conflicting Views On Radio's Future Emerge At NRBA Meet

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Nearly 1500 radio broadcasters gathered in Washington last week for the National Radio Broadcasters Assn.'s sixth annual conference, which saw Harriett (Sis) Kaplan elected president for coming term.

Among the other highlights: former CBS commentator Eric Sevareid received NRBA's 1979 Golden Radio award; over 80 equipment and program service booths were set up, and concurrent sessions covered such topics as promotion, sales, management, engineering and programming.

In addition, Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz) got a standing ovation for advocating

Diener Appointed Exec VP In Latin Branch Of CRI

NEW YORK — Former ABC Records president Stephen Diener has been appointed executive vice president of creative operations, Latin American operations, for CBS Records International.

Diener will oversee all aspects of marketing, planning and A&R for CRI's Latin American operations, as well as marketing of Spanish and Portuguese product in the U.S. He will report to Nick Girillo, senior vice president of Latin American operations for CRI.

This is not Diener's first post with CBS Records International. He joined CRI in 1971 and served as director of marketing for European operations until 1975.

In light of Diener's appointment, it is uncertain whether or not Caytronics, a subsidiary of Cayre Industries, will continue to handle distribution of CBS Latin product in the U.S. At press time, however, a CBS spokesman would only say that the company will soon make an announcement on the subject.

that radio be released from government control. "You know how to serve your listeners without the FCC or the courts looking over your shoulders," said the co-sponsor of S.622. The bill would lift the Fairness Doctrine, eliminate ascertainment requirements, format regulations and program logs, government regulation of most advertising and would provide indefinite license terms for radio. Goldwater noted the Senate calendar is crowded with energy and SALT issues and, since the election year is approaching, "don't look for communications legislation in this Congress," he advised.

Future of Programming

Looking ahead to programming in the '80s, a panel of experts focused on the major pitfalls and booms to be expected in the coming decade. Among the rapid-fire predictions:

- George Burns of Burns Media Consultants said the program managers of the '80s will be "product people" with their noses in the figures, attuned to marketing research.

- Marlin Taylor, president of Bonneville Broadcast Consultants, suggested the future of computerized programming is bright. "It will be simply one more management tool to assist the programmer so the sound of the station doesn't change with personnel shifts. And it will become more affordable."

- Gary Worth, executive vice president of Mutual Broadcasting System, predicted satellite broadcasting will play a large role in the '80s. "The technology exists and sta-

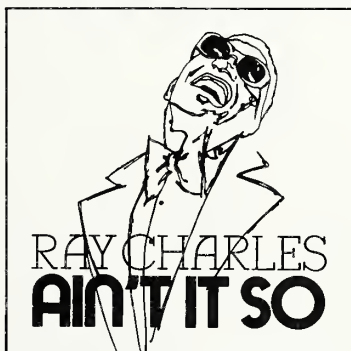

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Shoes

The youthful Elektra/Asylum quintet known as Shoes hail from the small Illinois border burgh of Zion, but the scope of their pristine pop-rock could hardly be considered small town. Since the band's informal beginnings in 1974, when brothers John and Jeff Murphy first got together with high school buddy Gary Klebe to write and play as a trio, Shoes has incorporated an international range of influences into its music, from The Beatles to The Byrds to David Bowie.

However, from the first homegrown recordings to its new E/A debut LP, "Present Tense," the band has steadfastly preserved the raw immediacy of its sound in an era of conventionally facile pop.

"We're real conscious of the fact that there is good deal of slick, polished music on the market today," said singer/guitarist Gary Klebe. "But it's so sterile and we've always tried to avoid that."

Actually, it was the rough-hewn quality of their first self-produced and marketed album in 1976, "Black Vinyl Shoes," which was recorded in the Murphy's living room on a four-track, that brought them critical acclaim. By that time, the trio had added drummer Skip Meyer to complete the unit. Despite the press raves and an offer to record a single for the L.A.-based Bomp label, the boys were still stuck in Zion working day jobs.

"After 'Black Vinyl Shoes' we got the reviews and thought, 'Oh great!'" bassist/vocalist John Murphy stated. "We were putting things on hold until the Bomp single came out. That's when we moved over to an eight track studio and started putting new demo tapes together, playing a few gigs here and there to pay the bills."

That meant wandering into the cold Midwestern winter to gig at local clubs and discos, playing up to five sets a night for the door take or even "auditioning" a full evening just to get the chance to return for a paying engagement. Despondent but undaunted, Shoes continued to send out its demos as the band yearned to leave the confining rock scene around Chicago and Milwaukee.

"In Chicago, people have a very definite idea of what they want their music to be and sound," noted John Murphy. "Styx, REO Speedwagon, Kansas... people see that as Midwestern rock 'n' roll and that's not what we're about at all."

A reprieve came in the form of Ken Butrice, Elektra vice president of promotion, who flew out to Chicago shortly after hearing "Black Vinyl Shoes" for the first time. Sire had picked the album up for distribution in England by that time and it was selling domestically on the small PVC label, distribution by JEM.

"When we saw the limo pull up to the house with the Elektra people we were a bit freaked," John Murphy said. "They asked us if we could come to California the following week."

Shoes was immediately signed to a long-term deal with the label and the members promptly quit their jobs to prepare for a trip to England to record "Present Tense" at the Manor studio, with Mike Stone assisting on production of the album.

As the band preps for its first real tour, which is scheduled to begin sometime early next year, Jeff Murphy said, "The well is deep with songs for our next L.P."



Fabulous Thunderbirds

If the Blues Brothers can be credited with helping to rekindle the current interest in the blues, one such hard blues band to profit from this explosion is The Fabulous Thunderbirds. The Austin-based quartet, whose debut album for Takoma Records is called "Girls Go Wild," comes highly recommended by no less an authority than Muddy Waters, who has called the group's lead vocalist, Kim Wilson, the finest white blues singer he has ever heard.

When the group made their New York City debut in September with Roomful of Blues, whose own sound revives the saxophone-dominated jump blues of the '40s and '50s, the enthusiasm of the crowd lent credence to the fact that a music recently thought moribund as very much alive. The T-Birds' program touched on the majority of tunes from their LP, which combines all the energy, innocence and exuberance of the various blues greats in their prime.

"I don't like to put a label on the sound. I just like to call it good music," says Wilson, a commanding, emotional singer whose harmonica playing has also drawn rave notices. "Blues players have had this elitist attitude over the years that's turned people right off. It's no wonder they haven't wanted to listen to the music. But we're not into that. We're into people having fun, getting out on the floor and dancing. That's what the music is all about."

Although Wilson's father used to sing "a Danny Thomas type of gig" on the radio in Detroit, it wasn't until his family moved to California that he started "going to bed with the radio every night." "I was around ten at the time, and the AM was playing people like James Brown and Ike and Tina. Wolfman Jack would play Little Walter and Bobby Bland every morning at eight o'clock. I was a little too young to know what I was listening to, but it stayed with me in the back of my mind."

During high school, Wilson played wingback and defensive halfback for his high school football team, but when he heard Paul Butterfield and "Harmonica" George Smith play live for the first time in a local club, "I knew that I wanted to make music my career." Following stints in house bands in California and Minnesota during which he backed up such blues greats as Eddie Taylor, Howlin' Wolf, Albert Collins, Muddy Waters, Big Mama Thornton et al., Wilson came to Texas in 1975, where he met guitarist Jimmy Vaughn in a rib joint outside of Austin.

"We hit it off pretty good," he recalls. Vaughn, a guitarist of great sensitivity and control lived near one of the late Freddie King's neighbors, and the guitarist frequently attended Vaughn's gigs with a local band called Storm. With the addition of bassist Keith Ferguson and drummer Mike Buck, the group began to play such Austin venues as Antone's and the Rome Inn, where they still play every Monday night. They signed with Takoma late last year.

"There's a definite reason why the music we play is on the upswing," Wilson insists. "Groups like The Nighthawks, Roomful and ourselves saw the need to stick together when we first started playing together five years ago. Now it seems that comradeship is starting to pay off."

ARTIST PROFILE

Tenor Great Rollins Scales New Spiritual, Musical Heights

LOS ANGELES — At the end of 1954, Sonny Rollins entered the federal drug facility in Lexington, Kentucky for the second time in a stubborn fight against heroin addiction.

Last month, Rollins performed an awesome tenor sax solo before an audience of 15 million during a guest shot on the *Tonight Show*.

These two incidents, coming nearly a quarter of a century apart, perhaps best illustrate the ups and downs that have characterized Rollins' brilliant and stormy career. Although clearly on the upswing today, there was a time in the early '60s — and again from '68 to '71 — when he dropped out completely. During these long periods of self-imposed layoff, Rollins reexamined his values, studied formal composition and metaphysics, practiced on a walkway over the Williamsburg Bridge, spent several months in an Indian ashram and quit using drugs, alcohol and tobacco.

For Rollins the past few years have been especially satisfying, with critical and commercial success finally beginning to approach the level of his immense talent. A case in point was last year's Milestone Jazz Stars tour, a national concert series with bassist Ron Carter and pianist McCoy Tyner that introduced the phenomenal saxophonist to a new generation of young fans and provided an opportunity for those who

lost track of him during his "sabbaticals" to get reacquainted. Now, in an astute bit of timing, Rollins' label, Milestone, has released his new album ("Don't Ask") in the wake of the mass exposure afforded by his appearance on the *Tonight Show*.

Dislikes Recording

"It's hard to get me into the studio. I don't like to record unless I feel everything is exactly the way I want it — my chops are where it's at and all those things." The after-

Infinity's First Year Features Golds, 'Rising Star,' Pope LP

LOS ANGELES — On Thursday night, Oct. 11, the staff of Ron Alexenburg's Infinity Records gathered at their New York offices for a very special private party. In the midst of the festivities, as the clock struck midnight, the staffers rejoiced, as the moment marked the completion of Infinity's first year in the business — a year that saw the label earn its first gold single and album, introduce the reduced list price "Rising Star" concept to the industry and release the first musical album ever recorded by a reigning Pope.

"To capsize the year," said Gary Mankoff, Infinity marketing/finance vice president, "it's been a succession of good music and the rewards of having achieved chart successes with the majority of our album product."

MCA Distributing Corp. Issues Policy Statement Regarding ABC Returns

LOS ANGELES — The following statement was issued last week by MCA Distributing Corp. regarding the return of ABC Records product:

"In order to improve the procedure for the return of records manufactured by ABC Records, MCA Distributing will accept at its Indianapolis depot delivery of those returns directly from any dealer/subdistributor for the account of the independent distributor from which the records were purchased if so authorized by such independent distributor. The returns may be shipped "collect," and MCA Distributing will pay for the freight charges.

"Credit on these returns will only be given to the independent distributor from which the records were originally purchased. MCA Distributing will not credit the returns to the dealers/subdistributors which may return the records. Such dealers/subdistributors must arrange

Starting with the Oct. 12, 1978 release of Hot Chocolate's "Every 1's A Winner" single (which eventually went gold), Infinity went on to release approximately 20 albums and 30 more singles from a roster that now stands at 30 artists and groups.

"Our philosophy has not changed since the company's inception," Mankoff went on to explain. "We intended to develop new and exciting talent without chasing superstars. We didn't want to take somebody else's established talent, but instead, we wanted to sign acts with a potential we could develop into our own superstars.

"We feel we have come a long way toward that goal with Spyro Gyra, New England, Hot Chocolate and some exciting product we have out now like Nature's

Divine, Blue Steel and Rupert Holmes," Mankoff concluded.

Bolstered by the success of Spyro Gyra's "Morning Dance" LP, which spent an extended period of time at or near the top of **Cash Box** Jazz chart and was recently certified gold, Infinity's first year was also highlighted by two striking innovations — the "Rising Star" and the Pope album.

'Rising Star'

Introduced with the Sept. 14 release of Richard Stepp's "Holiday In Hollywood" album (**Cash Box**, Sept. 8), the "Rising Star" concept featured a list price of \$5.98 for the first 75-100,000 units sold. Implemented in conjunction with MCA Distributing Corp. (Infinity's distributor), the "Rising Star" concept was designed to aid in the breaking of new artists by offering a lower-than-normal list price.

"As soon as the program was developed, we jumped on it," Mankoff recalled. "We felt that one of our strong points as a company was our creativity and our ability to be innovative without having to go through a lot of corporate red tape. We had the flexibility to try interesting new promotional

and marketing concepts and we were very pleased to have been given the opportunity to be the first in the industry to come up with the 'Rising Star' concept."

Pope Album

Nevertheless, one of Infinity's biggest stories of the year was the recent release of the album "Pope John Paul II Sings At The Festival of Sacrosong." Released Oct. 1 (**Cash Box**, Sept. 29), Infinity had negotiated the rights to the album from Petri Pax, and pledged "a major portion" of the proceeds from the sales to the Pontifical Mission Society.

"We are anxious to get on with our second year," Mankoff concluded, "because we've laid the groundwork during the past 12 months. We can look forward to second albums from our groups. We very much look forward to the next Spyro Gyra, the next New England, the next TKO and the next Dixon House. This gives us much more ammunition than we had a year ago.

"We now have a roster of artists who aren't 'new' anymore, but are established. We have something to build upon and that makes the prospect of the coming year very exciting for us."

Butterfly Label Implements Complete Reorganization Of Pop Promo Staff

LOS ANGELES — In a major staff reorganization designed to reinforce and strengthen the pop promotion staff, six people were named this week to new positions at Butterfly Records.

Heading the list of staff appointments was John Davis, who was named to the post of marketing vice president. Davis moves over from his previous position as the label's promotion vice president.

Other appointments included John Heathfield as national promotion director, Thom Williams as creative services director, Karen LaFont as national secondary promotion director, John Resnick as national retail promotion director and Pamela Plant as production director.

Among the product the new personnel will be working are two projected mid-November releases, a 12" single by Cheryl Dilcher entitled "Here Comes My Baby" and a two-record compilation album entitled "The Best Of Butterfly."

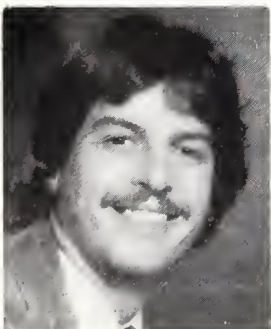

Dilcher's single will be the label's second "rock-disco" effort, following Bob McGilpin's "Superstar."

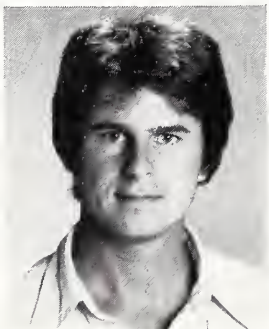

The label will employ special packaging, including special vinyls for promotional copies, which will be given away as a limited edition collector's item. The album will list for \$8.98.

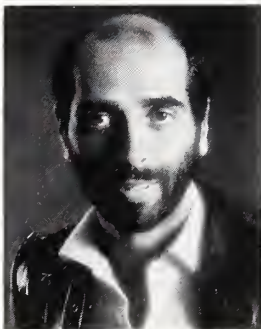

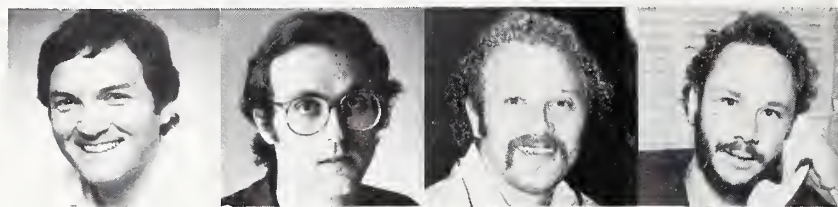

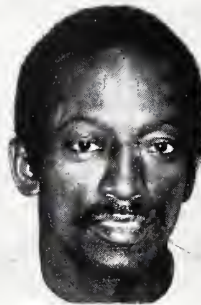
The source added that he was not sure whether the initial batch of video products would be sold only through Pickwick's Musicland stores. "There's still some uncertainty about that."

If you haven't heard of DOR (Dance-Oriented Rock) by now, then it's time you did. **Instant Funk**, for example, plans to have some songs with a rock beat on their new album, and at **Howard Stein's** Xenon, where deafening disco is *de rigueur*, this reporter heard an amazing segue from a stone disco song into **The Knack's** "My Sharona" and then into **Bill Haley's** "Rock Around the Clock." And be it noted, people kept right on dancing . . . Congratulations to **Herbie Mann**, who just released his 50th album, "Yellow Fever" on the 20th anniversary of his association with Atlantic Records.

NEW BANDS — In response to our request for the name of good local bands across the country, readers have generously taken the time to write in, and here is a partial listing: From Minneapolis — **The Lawyers**, **Mission Mountain Wood Band**, and **John Bayley**; from New Jersey — **T. TUSK — Fleetwood Mac — Warner Bros. 2HS 3350 — Producers: Fleetwood Mac, Richard Dashut and Ken Callat — List: 15.98

This is The Mac's most adventuresome LP to date, and it'll probably be six months before people really realize what a creative masterpiece the two-LP set is. Oddly produced and a million dollars in the making, it represents a bold step into the avant-garde from a band that most people thought would never change musically. The patented Mac sound is still intact, but Lindsey Buckingham's interesting arrangements and Mick Fleetwood's primal drum work are the keys to the music here.

IN THE NICK OF TIME — Nicolette Larson — Warner Bros. HS 3370 — Producer: Ted Templeman — List: 8.98

Ms. Larson serves up another fine example of earthy California rock on her second Warner Bros. LP. Her pure, high flying vocals are in top form on a variety of styles on this LP. However, like contemporaries Raitt and Ronstadt, she is at her best on ballads like Lowell George's "Trouble" and Bobby Troup's "Daddy." The classic on the album, and probable Top 40 hit, is a duet with Michael McDonald entitled "Let Me Go, Love." Other top cuts on this Ted Templeman produced affair include "Just In The Nick Of Time" and "Rio De Janeiro Blue."

DANCIN' AND LOVIN' — Spinners — Atlantic SD 19256 — Producer: Michael Zager — List: 8.98

With new producer Michael Zager at the helm this classy R&B unit jumps feet first onto the dance floor. There is plenty of rhythm kick, but the Spinners inject just the right amount of mellow soul into the disco. Vocal dynamics, as usual, are the order of the day, and "Body Language," "With My Eyes" and the funky "One, One, Two Two, Boogie Woogie" are the key cuts on the vocal group's latest adventure. For disco, pop and R&B lists.

XII — Fatback — Spring/Polydor SP-1-6723 — Producer: The Fatback Band — List: 7.98

Fatback is still going strong after seven LPs, and its latest is an uptempo funk affair that should really get folks dancin'. Bill Curtis' voice is smooth and affecting, and its supported nicely by the bottom ridden sound of this stellar octet. The top tracks on this outing are streamlined funk cuts like "You're My Candy Sweet" and "King Tim III (Personality Jock)." The lilting ballad, "Love In Perfect Harmony," is the tour de force on this LP.

A TASTE FOR PASSION — Jean-Luc Ponty — Atlantic SD19253 — Producer: Jean-Luc Ponty — List: 7.98

This fine French musician takes us on another jazz/rock voyage with his soaring violin on "A Taste For Passion." Many of the songs on the album, although played with a musical fury, have a calming effect on the listener. However, the title tune and "Life Cycles" are classic examples of Atomic jazz. Ralph Armstrong on bass and Joaquin Lievano on guitar are the standouts in a fine working band that follows the vapor trails of Ponty's sonic violin work. This LP should garner attention from AOR and jazz programmers.

A CHRISTMAS TOGETHER — John Denver & The Muppets — RCA AFL1 — 3451 — List: 7.98

This LP is guaranteed to tickle the yuletide ears of any child. Denver, with his natural floating vocals, is the perfect foil to the humorous harmonies of such stellar personages as Miss Piggy, Kermit The Frog and Fozzie Bear. While the album won't exactly set the Top 40 charts on fire, it should make for some great holiday moments with the little ones. "Little St. Nick" and "Twelve Days Of Christmas" are the most fun on the album.

UNLEASHED IN THE EAST — Judas Priest — Columbia JC 36179 — Producers: Judas Priest & Tom Ailom — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

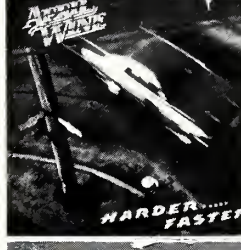
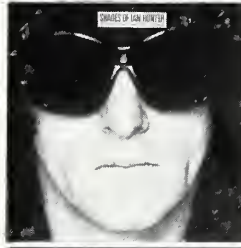
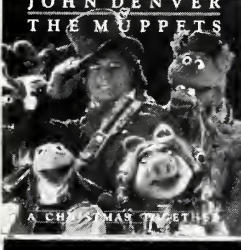
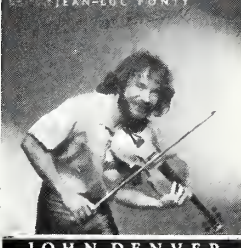
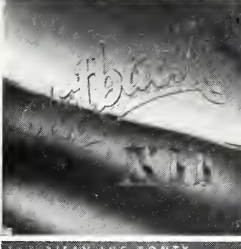
Judas Priest has been around for nearly a decade now. They will not go away and do not even attempt to. A live package, then, seems to be in order at this stage in their career (they do seem to be constantly on the road). Live LP's seem to have a two-fold purpose: One, to attempt a vinyl rendering of a stage show and second, to serve as an informal greatest hits package. This release succeeds beautifully on both counts.

SPECIAL VIEW — The Only Ones — Epic NJE 36199 — Producer: Robert Ash & The Only Ones — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

The Only Ones popped up about a year ago on the London punk circuit and glommed onto a contract which eventually resulted in healthy sales stateside via the imports bins. Can the U.S. find room for these deserving boys now that their official American debut has been released? One would hope so; the tight, yet warmly human instrumentation packs an unfettered exuberance and the vocalizing of Peter Perrett may even remind a few of Tom Verlaine.

AT THE CHELSEA NIGHTCLUB — The Members — Virgin International VI 2120 — Producer: Steve Lillywhite — List: 7.98

Even at the onset a majority of groups conveniently labeled as "new wave" tend to be so over-produced and studio processed that what was once an aggressive stance quickly becomes Boston with half the overdubs. The Members, on the other hand, adroitly side-step this pit-fall completely. Lyrically and musically these Londoners have something to say and the sheer weight of their collective talents forces instant recognition.



REGGATA DE BLANC — The Police — A&M SP-4792 — Producers: The Police and Nigel Grey — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

The Police was one of the first punk/new wave bands to reach the Top 40 in America, and its tough rock/reggae sound is still commercial and tasteful. Andy Summers' West Indian guitar rhythms and Sting's intriguing high pitched vocals make the album another collection of classy rock 'n' roll. There are plenty of torrid rockers and clever lyrical twists on the disc, and the top tracks are "Message In A Bottle" the title cut and "Walking On The Moon."

SHADES OF IAN HUNTER — Ian Hunter & Mott The Hoople — Columbia C2 36251 — Producers: Hunter, Bowle, Mott The Hoople, Baker — List: 9.98 — Bar Coded

This is a classic 2-LP collection of the very best from the man behind the shades. Anyone who doubts Hunter's crafty cockney influence on today's new wave movement should give a listen to "One Of The Boys" or "England Rocks" on this album. There are plenty of B-side collectables as well as some unreleased gems, and this is a must for fans as well as those who are unfamiliar with this fine performer's vast body of material. Hopple classics like "Marionette" and "Saturday Gigs" are also included on the AOR must.

I'LL ALWAYS LOVE YOU — Anne Murray — Capitol SOO — 12012 — Producer — Jim Ed Norman — List: 8.98 — Capitol — Bar Coded

This Canadian songbird's offerings have always been staples on soft rock and adult/pop radio stations, and this album is full of songs that should follow suit. Once again, the string sweetened ballads are about love lost and found, and Murray delivers each tune with that "pure as the driven snow" vocal style. The album's most engaging cuts are David Loggins' "You've Got Me To Hold On To" and Jesse Winchester's "Wintery Feeling."

BACK ON THE RIGHT TRACK — Sly And The Family Stone — Warner Bros. BSK 3303 — Producer: Mark Davis — List: 7.98

Sly and the gang prove that they are their own band, by avoiding the disco trend and sinking their teeth into some funky R&B meat on the neat comeback album. His "everybody is a star" lyrics and those funky Family Stone arrangements are more low key on this album than in past efforts, but "Remember Who You Are" is a Sly classic if there ever was one. Other fine cuts on the album include the title cut, "It Takes All Kinds" and the wah-wah wacky "The Same Thing."

HIGHWAYMAN — Glen Campbell — Capitol SOO-12008 — Producers: Glen Campbell — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

Glen Campbell runs through an introspective set of folk oriented tales on his latest effort. His powerful vocals are an excellent vehicle for such fine lyric oriented songs as Jimmy Webb's "The Highwayman" and Tommy Stuart's ode to Elvis' "Hound Dog Man." However the fast paced ballads of pianist Michael Smotherman take the limelight here, and Campbell interprets them beautifully. For pop and A/C formats.

HARDER... FASTER — April Wine — Capitol ST-12013 — Producers: Myles Goodwyn & Nick Blagona — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

This is April Wine's second Capitol release and it totally makes good the forceful promise exhibited on their last one. The emphasis is on boogie oriented material and bone crunching rockers, to be sure. But, what sets April Wine apart from lesser coliseum acts is their tendency to include eye brow raising melodic forays best exemplified by their full-blooded harmonizing which skims over rock solid guitar chording. For AOR outlets.

AIN'T IT SO — Ray Charles — Atlantic SD 19251 — Producer: Ray Charles — List: 7.98

Ray lends that ever so soulful voice to such classics as Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Some Enchanted Evening" and Mercer and Arlen's "Blues In The Night," and it turns out to be his best album in years. All of the songs on the album are extended versions of the originals and his bluesy Georgia style gets better with each song. Two modern day standards, Maniow's "One Of These Days" and Mentor Williams' "Drift Away" are prime cuts.

BURN — Melba Moore — Epic JE 36128 — Producer: Peter Belotte — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

Moore's volatile vocals smolder as never before on "Burn." However, Peter Belotte's production work and Thor Baldursson's dancin' arrangements are the other factors that should make this album her most successful to date. Disco Infernos like the title cut, "Night People" and "I Don't Want To Lose Your Love" should garner alot of play in the clubs. Disco programmers will pop this on the turntable right away.

EMPHASIZED — Wayne Henderson — Polydor PD-1-6227 — Producer: Wayne Henderson — List: 7.98

While fans will be taken aback at first by this jazz great's voyage into the steady rhythm kick, throbbing bass, out-front vocal world of disco, they will be pleased to find that he succeeds. This ex-Crusader gives the dancin' music a light jazz lift on the first side. The second side of the LP is devoted to some stellar jazz/fusion compositions with Henderson's sliding trombone leading the way. "Monte Carlo" and "So In Love With You" are the best tracks on the album.

SONGWRITER PROFILE

Hit Songwriter Working On Revived Recording Career

LOS ANGELES — It's been a good year for songwriter Allee Willis who has penned three Top Ten songs this year for such diverse artists as Earth, Wind & Fire and Maxine Nightingale.

Asked how she is enjoying her recent success, the curly-haired artist deadpans, "All I got out of it was a second garage. No house, no property." She then goes on to point out the fact, which a group of songwriters are trying to do something about, that composers only get 2 3/4 cents from every album sold. "And you have to split that with your publisher and all the people who wrote the song with you."

At present, Willis, who lives in what she calls a "relic of the '50s," complete with 107 pairs of saddle shoes, pink flamingos on the lawn, a Howdy Doody marionette and teen idol paraphernalia, is planning to cut her own album as an artist.

She is, however, careful about marketing the LP and her career. "Too many writers, after they have one or two hits as a composer, rush into the studio to record their own work. I'm working against a timetable which hopes to see 10 hits before I go into the studio."

Unhappy Debut

Her caution is based on past experience. A few years back, her debut album on Epic, "Childstar," had some of the most covered songs in recent memory. At that time, Willis was named to Esquire's annual "Heavy 100" list. Due to a poor showing in LP sales, Allee ended up checking hats at an improv/singers' showcase club in New York.

There, she suffered the delicious irony of hearing other artists perform cuts off "Childstar." "No one knew who I was," she says of her tenure behind the coat and hat check counter. "I'd get these furs jammed in my face and a quarter tip. Then the same people would go up on stage and sing 'Childstar.' I'd think to myself, 'I should be playing Carnegie Hall, and I can't even get a gig in a dump like this.'"

In all, she estimates she put in "two serious years hanging coats." Her present reads more like the typical success story of Hollywood, where she now makes her home. "After four welfare-ridden years, I sold 'Lead Me On,' 'Got You On My Mind,' and 'God Knows,' within three weeks," she says.

Of her musical style, Willis says, "You can smell my lyrics a mile away. They deal a lot with heartbreak and despair. 'Lead Me On' was based on a personal trauma."

With the success of Earth, Wind & Fire's latest LP, which Willis co-wrote all the songs

for, the composer has understandably enough become associated with disco. "I like disco. I'm really glad that it's brought back strings and melody, even though I think my lyrics are a bit too sophisticated for it."

Likes Ballads

"I'm really not a disco writer, though. My songs tend to be slow ballads. I've never written an up-tempo song. In fact, all my demos had to be speeded up," she reveals.

In addition to such frankness, Willis possesses a deadpan, off-the-wall humor which not only adds a biting edge to her lyrics, but makes her a great conversationalist as well.

Ask the composer what her ultimate career goal is and she replies, "I want to be a permanent square on the 'Hollywood Squares.'" She reflects pseudo-seriously for a moment, then corrects herself. "No, really I want to be the host on the most hostile talk show imaginable."

Perhaps, but the release of her upcoming album will determine if she is to become the next Joe Pine or a recording star.

Kolotkin is currently engineering and mixing French group Shakin' Street's upcoming LP for CBS International. Kolotkin also produced Mercury recording act Duke Jupiter's new LP "Taste The Night."

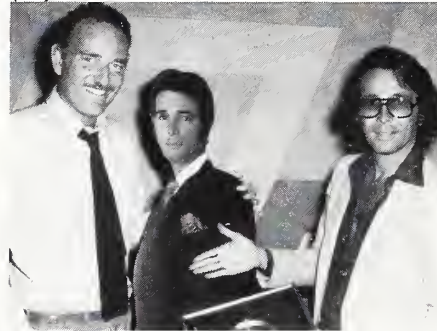

INFECTIOUS ROCK 'N' ROLL — Hard touring raunch and recently their contagious brand of rock 'n' roll fun was reported to have gotten out of hand with the ladies in Holland. Sources say that an ad was taken out in a Dutch newspaper that advised all women who had recently come in contact with AC/DC to check into the nearest hospital. This incident takes the AC/DC adage "If You Want Blood" to an even further extreme.

MUSICAL MIRTH — Rhino Records, in its usual satiric fashion, has put out a new album by the **Yiddish People** entitled, "Matzo Man," which is receiving a lot of local airplay. In addition, Rhino has released a new single by blues singer **Perrier Waters** entitled "Beverly Hills Blues."

APPLE JAMS — All in one week in the Apple: The first New York City Jazz Festival's "Highlights In Jazz" concert featured three of the greatest Texas born saxophonists alive, and a 12-hour jazz marathon. The NYCJF was a scantily publicized affair that was put together by trumpeter **Dizzy Reece** to help promote some lesser-known local musicians. Among those who played for more than a thousand listeners at Damrosch Band Shell in Lincoln Center were **Clifford Jordan**, **Harold Cusley**, **Charles Davis** & **Harold Vick**, tenor saxes; **Barry Harris** & **Albert Dailey**, piano; **Ronnie Cuber**, baritone sax; **Mickey Bass**, bass; and **Jual Curtis** and **Leroy Williams**, drums; and Reece, **Tommy Turrentine** & **Lonnie Hillyer**, trumpets. . . . Some of those same folks played at St. Peter's Church and at the 10th annual "All Nite Soul," Oct. 7-8. The 12-hour plus performances celebrate the weekly Jazz Vespers conducted, by the **Reverend John Garcia Gensel**. Vespers is held every Sunday at 5 p.m. with a featured jazz artist aiding in the celebration of the mass. The 1979 version of the marathon was no different than all of the others in that it ran so far behind schedule that the 5 a.m. closing time passed unnoticed, save by some of the groups who never got to play. But those who hung around got to see and hear **David Amram**, **Art Farmer**, and pianist **Adam Mackowicz**, along with **Zbigniew Namyslovski** on alto sax, **Blakey** scions **Art, Jr.** and **Evelyn** with her group **Celebration**, **Dick Hyman**, **Helen Humes** and a rehearsal band under the direction of **Charles Byrd**. . . . Some of the early-morning emcee duties were handled by producer **Jack Kleinsinger**, whose "Highlights in Jazz" series is into its seventh season at NYU's Loeb Student Center. His last concert featured **Arnett Cobb** and **Buddy Tate** on tenor saxes and **Eddie "Cleanhead" Vinson** on alto sax, with a rhythm section of **Ray Brant**, piano, **George Duvivier**, bass, **Wayne Wright**, guitar, **Panama Francis**, drums, and **Ray Barretto**, congas. The remainder of the season includes concerts by alumni of **Duke Ellington** & **Cab Calloway**. . . . Speaking of bands, the **David Matthews** aggregation is appearing at Seventh Ave. South every Monday. . . . The **Lew Tabackin-Toshiko Akiyoshi** band begins a two-week European tour on Oct. 20. Stops include Scandinavia, Poland and Germany. . . . A really big band, the **Royal Philharmonic Orchestra** of London to be exact, has been recorded, by Gryphon Records in a **Don Sebesky**-written two-record set. On it will be a major 28-minute work called "Bird & Bela In B Flat," an imaginary meeting between **Charlie Parker** and **Bela Bartok**. Soloists include **Jon Faddis**, **Alex Foster**, **Richard Davis**, **Joe Beck**, **Gordon Beck**, **Jimmy Madison** and **Bob Brookmeyer**. In addition, the collection includes a reconstruction of **Stravinsky's** "Rite of Spring," and "Sebastian's Theme," inspired by **J.S. Bach**. . . . Erratum: We incorrectly stated that an upcoming **Joao Gilberto** set being produced by **Bob Hurwitz** will be out on ECM; make that Warner Brothers.

MANN'S FEVER — **Herbie Mann**, who recently stopped by at **Cash Box**, said that his latest Atlantic release, "Yellow Fever," is an "attempt at a disco record that can be danceable, but also enjoyable as good listening." Mann explained his recent spate of records in the disco genre: "A successful pop artist has more opportunity to be creative because of sales history than does a jazz artist. **Billy Joel** can have **Freddie Hubbard** solo; **Michael Jackson** can hire **Quincy Jones**; **Steely Dan** can feature **Wayne Shorter**. He said he has been on all three levels: as prognosticator, pulse-taker and trend-follower. "I'm in a grey area," noted Mann, "I was the original 'sell out,' went to Afro-Cuban music, Latin, fusion. Then everyone else caught up and I was into pop. Pop writers write better songs than jazz writers. And that's the bottom line in today's market. With costs going up, buyers are being more choosy." Mann asked rhetorically if any other improviser would dare take a chance and record a pure disco album like "Superman." His answer to his own questions "If I have to listen to pedestrian music — minimally creative music — I would rather listen to disco than to rock; at least disco swings."

KENTON SCHOLARSHIP FUND — The National Association of Jazz Educators and **Audrey Coke** have founded the Stan Kenton Jazz Education Memorial Fund which will provide scholarship money for music students. Says NAJE executive director **Matt Benton**, "This is what Stan sought to do during his lifetime through his own generosity and the well known clinics." Kenton died of a stroke Aug. 25. Contributions may be made to NAJE, P.O. Box 724, Manhattan, Kan. Coke was Kenton's manager.

JAZZ ALBUM PICKS

MINGUS AT ANTIBES — Charles Mingus — Atlantic SD 2-3001 — Producer: Nesuhi Ertegun — List: 12.98

A recording of the Antibes Jazz Festival held at Juan-les Pins, France on July 13, 1960, this is a fine complement to the Mingus anthology released early this year by Atlantic, entitled "Charles Mingus, Passions of A Man." With a band featuring Ted Curson, Eric Dolphy, Booker Ervin and Dannie Richmond, Mingus cooks throughout. Some have called the concert one of the best in the late bassist's career.



YELLOW FEVER — Herbie Mann — Atlantic SD 19252 — Producer: Silvio Tancredi — List: 7.98

A fully discofied effort by the master of adaptability, this is an offering of the typical Mann sound applied to the latest musical fashion. At points somewhat boring like full-fledged disco can become with repetition, Mann comes through on "Comin' Home Baby" (a cover of Mel Torme and his own effort on "Live At The Village Gate") and "City Of Dreams." Mann adds a touch of the unusual on this LP with some sax too.



"YA BETCHA B.P.!!" — Benny Powell — Los Angeles Records LA PR-1007 — Producer: N/A — List: 7.98

A top-notch mainstream effort, Powell really swings on his trombone. Producing a big band sound, Powell leads his group of excellent sidemen (including Wilton Felder) through a variety of tunes that showcase not only the leader but the others as well. Top cuts include the swinging "Thumbs Up," the exotic "All Turned Around" (featuring the singing of Powell's wife Petsy) and "I Tried And Tried."



FAUN — John McNeil — SteepleChase SCS 1117 — Producer: Nils Winther — List: 7.98

This is a second effort by trumpeter-fluegelhornist McNeil, who surrounds himself with the finest musicians he can find. This time it's David Liebman on tenor and soprano sax; Richard Beltrach, piano; Buster Williams, bass; and Billy Hart, drums. There is not a bad or dull track on the album. The spunky "Ruari," and "C.J.," a hard bop tune, are standouts.



KEVIN, MY DEAR SON — Frank Wright — Chiaroscuro CR 2014 — Producer: Sebastien Bernard — List 7.98

This not-quite avant-garde album makes a good introduction to Wright's unusual brand of jazz. Wright's sextet (sextet when vocal instrumentalist Eddie Jefferson is added) offers more diversity than many bands twice the size. Jefferson is on two tracks, "No End To The Sun," and "Long Way From Home," while the others feature Wright along with among others, French pianist George Arvanitas, Reggie Workman on bass and Philly Joe Jones on drums.



BALLADS & BLUES — Tommy Flanagan — Inner City IC 3029 — Producer: Horst Weber & Matthias Winkelmann — List: 7.98

Of the seven tracks here, the most recognizable are covers of Dizzy Gillespie's "Birk's Works" and Charlie Parker's "Scrapple From The Apple." There are also originals by Flanagan and his accompanying bassist, George Mraz. The most ambitious work is Flanagan's ballad, "With Malice Toward None."

DISCO BREAKS

TIDAL WAVES IN THE POOLS? — Columbia Records' new pool servicing policy continues to make waves at some of the largest and most influential pools in the country. As reported earlier in **Disco Breaks**, Columbia has instituted a new servicing program whereby the label sends a limited number of copies to the pool, which in turn is supposed to distribute the copies to select members. Based on the initial feedback from these DJs, the label then decides whether or not to service the pool with copies for its entire membership. That's the way it is supposed to work. However, various pool presidents, including **For The Record's Judy Weinstein**, **BADDA's Jon Randazzo** and **A.J. Blair** of the Southern California pool, find themselves in a bind trying to implement this policy. Says Randazzo, "If I have only 30 initial copies to give our 125 members, I'll soon find myself with 30 friends and 95 enemies." During a recent conference call, the three pool heads came up with a solution, which Columbia promotion director, **Vince Pellegrino**, has yet to respond to. They suggest that Columbia send only one copy to each pool, and at their weekly meeting all the members can listen to the product and give their immediate feedback on the marketing potential of the record. "I can call Vince back right away," Weinstein says, "and give him all the information he needs. This will save me the confusion and paperwork of trying to track down 30 DJs and their opinions. I respect Columbia, and appreciate Vince's attempts to put some order into the glut of product that's been coming out. But I can't randomly hand out

copies to a limited number of members." At press time, Pellegrino was unavailable for comment.

DUELING DIVAS — The new **Donna Summer/Barbra Streisand** duet, "No More Tears (Enough Is Enough)," which ships as a 12" from Casablanca Oct. 15, is sure to be the #1 hit of the year (see **Reviews**). An interesting sidelight concerns the 12" jacket cover artwork, which hints at the byzantine politics that govern top artists' billing. As befits Casablanca's premier recording star, Donna gets first billing on the cover. But the gorgeous, back-to-back photos of the two women places Barbra first. The apparent compromise does not end there, however. Barbra also appears to be about two inches taller than Donna. Now, anyone who has met the two knows that Summer is at least a head and a half taller than the petite Streisand. Wonder if Barbra's Columbia LP, which also contains the single, will give Barbra top billing, but show Donna physically towering over her? **Paul Jabara**, who co-wrote the current release, and scored earlier with Streisand's "Main Event" and Summer's "Last Dance," should be persuaded to cut his own album performing all his hits which other artists initially recorded. The elfin Oscar winner, however, may just be too busy, since he is planning to tape an ABC variety special in January with **Cheryl Ladd** and himself performing his disco opera, "The Third Album," in its entirety.

HOT SPOTS — A new disco called the **Garage** recently opened in Las Vegas a dice throw away from The Strip. Designed by former L.A. DJ **Bill Motley**, the predominantly gay dance club features spartan black Hi Tech walls, naked bulbs, hubcaps and car bumpers suspended from the ceiling. **Michael Bailey**, a member of the **Nevada Disco DJs Assn.**, spins at the disco, which has a 600 capacity...The **Mother Lode** opened its doors Oct. 10 at the site of the former **Rascals** in L.A. The new stand-up bar, which sports a country & western motif, is owned and operated by **Buzzy Heiserman**, who also runs L.A.'s **The Eagle**, an establishment favored by local promo reps for breaking new product...Look for a mid-November opening of the **Bond** disco in Manhattan at 45th & Broadway. **Richie Kaczor**, who reportedly left **Studio 54** because of pressure to spin more rock 'n' roll product, will DJ at Bond's...Former **New York, New York** DJ, **Burt Bevans** will be spinning at the new **Playboy** club, **Hef's**, in Manhattan. **Chip**, who used to do the light show at **Studio 54**, will do similar chores at the club, which opens Oct. 18. Bevans is scheduled to spin every night, but he is looking for an alternate. Interested DJs can contact him at (212) 740-2208.

ALIEN-ATED — 20th Century-Fox Records will be servicing clubs and radio stations with 12" and 7" disco singles of the theme song from the motion picture blockbuster, **Alien**. L.A. area DJs and members of the press will get a sneak listen after a special screening of the film on the studio lot Oct. 16. The mostly instrumental recording, produced and arranged by **McKinley Jackson**, is scheduled, appropriately enough, for a Halloween release.

DONNA SUMMER & BARBRA STREISAND — No More Tears (Enough Is Enough) — Casablanca NBD 20199 DJ — 12" — Promo

If this were baseball, it would be Sandy Koufax pitching to Hank Aaron; if it were baroque, it would be Scarlatti playing Vivaldi's greatest hits. But this is pop/disco, and the two musical forms' leading exponents, Barbra and Donna respectively, go tusk to tusk here on what is unequivocally the hottest release of the year. Extra heat is supplied by co-producer Giorgio Moroder and sharpie co-writer Paul Jabara, who has duplicated the format of his "Last Dance" with an oh-so-slow ballad intro followed by a multi-BPM explosion. Not surprisingly, Barbra steals the song in the extended ballad segment, while Donna dominates on the disco portion. Time: 11:40.

FREDDIE JAMES — Hollywood/Dance Little Boy Blue — Warner Bros. PRO-A1-833 — 12" — Promo

These two tracks, also featured on his new LP, show that Freddie's earlier hit, "Get Up & Boogie," was not a fluke. The 15-year-old Montrealer is no flash in the pan teen tenor. "Hollywood" is medium-paced, heavy on percussion, but leavened with James' graceful, wispy chanting of the song's title. More synthesizer tricks and BPMs on "Dance Little Boy Blue." Horns wisely deployed. Tony Green, who produced & penned the entire LP, seems to specialize in precocious youngsters, since he does similar chores for fellow Quebecois France Joli. PEACHES & HERB — Roller-Skatln' Mate — MVP/Polydor PRC 116 — 12" — Promo

A touch of synthesizer, a lot of kick drum and some brass distinguish this up-tempo, R&B flavored tune. P & H provide their trademark high-energy vocalizing which they must if they are to hold their own against the heavy orchestration. Guaranteed danceable — on or off roller skates. Time: 6:48

JEANNE SHY — Night Dancer — RSO RSS 308 — 12" — Promo

A full, beautiful arrangement showcases Shy's superlative singing style. Starts slow with minimal backup, then gradually slides into multi-BPMs. Long break employs synthesizer and echo chamber. Look for this dazzler to break soon. Time: 10:25

tions will have a 10 to 15-foot disc atop their roofs with multiple program sources coming in simultaneously."

Shelly Grafman, vice president and director of operations for ACR stations in the Century Broadcasting chain, said the marketing focus will be aimed at college students within the traditional 18-34 demographic.

The "model programming" approach was discussed by Lee Abrams, partner of Kent Burkhart in the Burkhart-Abrams consultant firm. Abrams said the model idea means "honing in on a small segment of music, narrowly programmed to a large audience." In rock, for instance, Abrams would play "state of the art hardpower rock" in its purest forms.

More Stations

Jim Schulke, president of Schulke Radio Productions (which serves beautiful music stations nationally), said "In the '80s we're programming twice the number of stations we started the '70s with." He noted further that the reason older Americans aren't better served by radio is "because the younger demos are where the money is." But others on the panel argued that now there is more programming directed to older tastes than ever before.

Several panelists noted the resurgence of live radio, including news/talk formats, and its expansion on AOR radio. "Block programming" will continue to be important for AM, they noted, offering the listener specific reasons to tune in. Country music formats on AM will continue to be largely "invulnerable" to FM competition, according to the panelists.

What about the possible addition of 2,000 stations if the FCC moves to open up the spectrum? "We have to market ourselves better," said Kent Burkhart. "The money is available for us and the economy will grow with us."

However, Marlin Taylor presented the harsh realities in a slide show following the panel. The '80s will be "the video decade," he said, with a negative impact on radio from cable TV, videocassettes, videodiscs, large screen TV and radios with built-in TV audio. Taylor's answer to the challenge: "Innovation. Radio is the most personal medium and the one able to generate station loyalty," he concluded.

Deregulation Panel

A key topic throughout the convention was radio deregulation, and specifically the current efforts by Congress and the FCC to let the marketplace rule the industry. During a heated panel discussion on the issue,

frustration was focused at Andy Schwartzman, director of the Media Access Project, a citizens action group. Schwartzman promised broadcasters that interest groups will block total deregulations. "Sure there are petty annoyances," he said, referring to the complex ascertainment and logging requirements. "But in exchange for the opportunities the broadcast industry has, the regulatory requirements aren't too severe." Broadcasters were quick to contradict Schwartzman's appraisal that the system needs "relatively minor tinkering rather than wholesale change."

Jim Gabbert, president of K-101 Radio in San Francisco (and former president of the NRBA), argued that the current FCC proposals for deregulation do not go far enough. Gabbert scored the "nonsense" involved in ascertainment in local communities and said, "I know better what my market needs than the guys in Washington do."

'Facts, Not Rhetoric'

FCC Broadcast Bureau deputy chief Frank Washington urged the NRBA members to "give us the facts — not rhetoric" to help the commission in the rulemaking process.

Speaking for House Communications Subcommittee chairman Lionel Van Deerlin, Harry (Chip) Shooshan urged "a separate solution" for radio, split from TV, in the matter of deregulation. He warned, however, that "an industry that comes before Congress and asks for deregulation and then turns around and files against adding stations on the spectrum, won't be favorably received."

Black Artists, Promoters In Head-On Clash Over Venues

Verdine White, Betty Wright, Stevie Wonder, Bobbi Humphrey, and Dexter Wansel.

The second part of the statement called for the development of a code of professional ethics and business conduct for concert promoters. The proposed code would include the input of the steering committee, the rest of the BMA, and the United Black Concert Promoters.

To show how the BMA was seeking to implement change, Gamble introduced panel member Louise West, co-chairperson of the Black Entertainment Lawyers' Association (BELA), a recently formed BMA division. West explained that one of BELA's priorities would be to initiate suits against venues and promoters that were engaged in exclusive contracts, and that BELA's services would be available to all BMA members.

Opportunism Charged

During a question and answer session that followed, Gamble was asked if the UBCP's actions stemmed not from philosophical differences with the BMA, but from opportunism. Gamble replied, "It could be anything. When communication is not completed, the answer could be anything."

In an exclusive interview, Dick Griffey, president of the UBCP, later told **Cash Box**, "I'm basically in total agreement with the BMA, and I'm sorry that my absence was misconstrued. We were not trying to embarrass the BMA. I had other business to attend to and I thought Georgie Woods (chairman of the UBCP) was coming. He's right there in Philadelphia and he's chairman. I'd made it known that I wasn't going to be there."

If the promoter's absence was unintentional, does this mean that the UBCP was in agreement with the BMA?

"Black artists have a moral obligation to support blacks who are professionally qualified," said Griffey. "If they don't, there has to be a demonstration of unrest. Everybody would prefer to talk business, but if you can't get the guy to the table, then there should be some other way. Whatever gains the promoters have made so far have come from applying pressure."

At press time, Georgie Woods was unavailable for comment.

A&M To Release New Police 45, LP Oct. 17

LOS ANGELES — A&M Records will be releasing the second album by the rock group The Police, entitled "Regatta De Blanc," and the first single from that LP, "Message In A Bottle," in the U.S. Oct. 17. The single has already been added, as an import, to a number of AOR playlists here, following its release in England. Both the album and the single have already risen to #1 on the British pop charts. The Police have already had a Top 40 hit here with "Roxanne," off of the "Outlandos d'Amour" LP.

BARBRA STREISAND/DONNA SUMMER (Columbia/Casablanca 1-11125)

No More Tears (Enough Is Enough) (4:39) (Olga Music/Fedora Music — BMI) (P. Jabara, B. Roberts)

The 7" version of this excellent pop-disco duet between the reigning divas of contemporary music, Streisand and Summer, is on the Columbia label, while the 12" will be marketed by Casablanca. A tender, ballad-like intro quickly moves into a zesty disco beat. A stone smash.



MICHAEL JACKSON (Epic 9-50797)

Rock With You (3:20) (Almo Music Corp.-ASCAP/Rondor Music (London) Ltd.) (R. Temperton)

Excellent production highlights this soft, classy number from Jackson's "Off The Wall" LP, as the multi-tracked harmonies virtually leap out of the grooves. A modified dance beat meshes nicely with shimmering flute tones and jazzy guitar work, as the tune sways with Jackson's vocal accents. A nice followup to "Don't Stop Til You Get Enough."



LITTLE RIVER BAND (Capitol P-4789)

Cool Change (3:56) (Screen Gems — EMI Music Inc. — BMI) (G. Shorrock)

The second single off of LRB's "First Under The Wire" LP is a soft, thought-provoking ballad, opening with a well-defined piano line and building to a full-blown orchestrated chorus. A warm sax break is one of the highlights here, along with the LRB's renowned high harmonies. Top 40 and A/C adds will mount rapidly on this track.



ROBERT JOHN (EMI America P-8023)

Only Time (3:02) (High Sierra Music — ASCAP) (M. Piccirillo, G. Goetzman)

Hot on the heels of John's recent #1 single "Sad Eyes" comes this equally appealing cut from his current self-titled LP. A lush background of chimes, strings, electric piano work and easy drumming create a feathery texture for John's light vocals, which are nicely overdubbed with his trademark falsetto. Both retail and radio should seriously take note.

CLIFF RICHARD (EMI America P-8025)

We Don't Talk Anymore (3:40) (ATV Music Corp. — BMI) (A. Tarney)

While Richard hasn't had a hit single in the U.S. since "Devil Woman" a few years back, this new cut from the veteran British hit-maker is beginning to take on radio with a vengeance. Already a #1 English hit, the bubbling pop melody here, benefitting from the bright keyboard work, whirls about Richard's bouncy vocals and harmonies. A winner.



JUDIE TZUKE (Rocket PIG 41133)

Stay With Me Till Dawn (3:35) (Unart Music Corp. — BMI) (J. Tzuke, M. Paxman)

The first single to be released under Rocket's new distribution pact with MCA, this track was a chart topper in Britain and could well repeat that success here. Stark, spare keyboard work, crashing drum crescendos and strings weave a wonderful melody about Tzuke's plaintive vocals. The fusion of MOR with pop creates the perfect offering for A/C, Top 40 formats.



SHOES (Elektra E-46557)

Too Late (2:42) (Shoetunes — BMI) (G. Klebe)

The first single from Shoes' E/A debut LP, "Present Tense," rings with the spirit of '60s rock 'n' roll, as an insistent drum base provides the support for the foursome's delicious harmonies, twangy guitar refrain and slicing lead guitar runs. Pop, AOR programmers won't be sorry they put on these Shoes.



SNAIL (Cream CRE 7938)

Tonight (3:33) (Butter Music/Blue Ave. Publ., Inc. — BMI) (B. O'Neill)

From Snail's new "Flow" LP, this single is a delightful mixture of early Byrds-influenced guitar work and spirited harmonies with well-placed lead guitar runs. Staccato drum work accentuates the most palatable pop hook. Pop programmers should be aware of this sleeper, as it is quickly picking up adds. AOR will also be interested.

SINGLES TO WATCH

DIONNE WARWICK (Arista AS 0459)

Deja Vu (3:40) (Ikeco Music/Angela Music Co. — BMI) (I. Hayes, A. Anderson)

Warwick remains one of the purely original singer/stylists in contemporary music and she recently scored a hit with the smooth "I'll Never Love This Way Again." This track is equally as polished but it's funky in a very sedate way. Both A/C and pop lists should be on the watch for this.

NICK LOWE (Columbia 1-11131)

Switchboard Susan (3:46) (Almo Music Corp./Bluebeard Music Ltd. — ASCAP) (M. Jupp)

Lowe established himself as a Top 40 force to be reckoned with on his last single, "Cruel To Be Kind" but this cut is a little sassier than the pure pop of its predecessor. Rockabilly influences are evident. AOR is already strong on this one.

BLACKFOOT (Atco 7207)

Train, Train (3:33) (Bobnal Music — BMI) (Shorty Medlocke)

The younger Medlockes of Blackfoot borrow their father's bluesy tune and add a pummeling rock interpretation in typical southern boogie fashion. From the "Strikes" LP, this is already garnering good pop radio support.

EDDIE RABBITT (Elektra E-46558)

Pour Me Another Tequilla (3:25) (DebDave Music Inc./Briarpatch Music — BMI) (E. Rabbitt, E. Stevens, D. Malloy)

Wispily acoustic guitars open the second selection off of Rabbitt's "Loveline" LP. Although the sound of this cut will surely appeal to A/C radio, it is more or less guaranteed to be a C&W chart topper. Another superb tune from Rabbitt.

KARLA BONOFF (Columbia 1-11130)

When You Walk In The Room (2:57) (Unart Music Corp. — BMI) (J. DeShannon)

This track was a hit in 1964 for The Searchers (and, later, for its writer, Jackie DeShannon) and should do the same for Bonoff, a much acclaimed artist who is a good deal less popular than her songs. The arrangements are true and her vocals are strong.

GENYA RAVAN (20th Century-Fox TC-2430)

Steve ... (3:29) (Fox Fanfare Music, Inc./14th Floor Music, Inc. — BMI/20th Century Music Corp./Alysonne Music Publishing, Inc. — ASCAP) (Ravan, Taylor)

Ravan adds a touch of the Four Seasons together with a dash of '50s do-wop on the intro to make an infectiously off-beat first outing from the "And I Mean It!" LP. Production is top-notch. AOR, don't pass this one up.

NIGHT (Planet P-45907)

Cold Wind Across My Heart (3:27) (Braintree Music/Snow Music — BMI) (T. Snow)

Night's fine debut with the single "Hot Summer Nights" established a good pop base, which this new song should easily build upon. Moving from an easy opening to a crashing rock chorus of male and female vocals, this cut is a sleeper for AOR, pop lists.

YACHTS (Polydor PD 2027)

Yachting Types (2:48) (Chappell Music — ASCAP) (H. Priestman)

Wirey electronic blips whirl around steady bass work and rock solid drumming on the first single from Yacht's self-titled domestic LP. The band could pass as an English variation on The Cars and AOR should have a field day with this sort of fun. Highly recommended.

BILLY THORPE (Polydor PD 2025)

Dream-Maker (3:45) (Rock of Ages Music/Careers Music, Inc. — BMI) (B. Thorpe)

The third single off of Thorpe's "Children of the Sun" LP employs some of the spacey electronic effects which marked his last mid-charting cut. However, it relies mostly on a haunting guitar figure behind Thorpe's edgy vocals. For AOR, pop lists.

YIPES! (Millenium YB-11780)

East Side Kids (3:26) (Big Teeth Music Publishing Co. — BMI) (A. Bartel)

Yipes! pack a pop-rock punch on this street tough tune from their debut LP, bringing back the rhythm of the tambourine into pop music. Fine lead guitar work and harmonies harkens back to '50s rock 'n' roll. An auspicious first outing.

CHICAGO (Columbia 1-11124)

Street Player (4:15) (Balloon Head Music — ASCAP) (D. Seraphine, D. Wolinski)

Chicago returns once again to its old horn-dominated sound after an ambitious attempt to move more into a rock mode on its last single, written and sung by new member Donnie Dacus. This new track has the familiar Chicago sound, led by Danny Seraphine. Jazzy percussives are the highlight here.

DAVID LOGGINS (Epic 9-50783)

The Fool In Me (3:38) (Sailmaker Music/Chappel Music/Patchwork Music/Leeds Music Corporation — ASCAP) (D. Loggins, R. Goodrum)

A jumpy, fetching soft rock number is supplied by Loggins and ace songwriter Randy Goodrum as the first single from the "David Loggins" LP. A smart sax solo marks this choice add for pop, C&W and especially A/C lists.

GEORGE THOROGOOD (MCA MCA-41136)

In The Night Time (3:08) (Electrocord Music Publishing Co./Intense Music — ASCAP) (Henderson, Rivers)

Thorogood and his fine band the Destroyers rip their way through this rock 'n' roll classic with a hard, steady bass line leading the way. From the "Better Than The Rest" LP, this track is a driving rocker that is made for AOR.

THE STATES (Chrysalis CHS 2381)

My Latest Girl (3:25) (ATV Music Corp./Wooded Lake Music Inc. — BMI) (Chandler, McDonnell)

The States put in the latest bid for the power pop sweetpakes and judging from this single off of their self-titled debut LP, it's a legitimate one. Unique lead vocals spark this cut, with its melodic '60s ensemble work. The hook is a killer. For pop and AOR lists.

HIGH INERGY (Gordy G 7174F)

Skate To The Rhythm (3:58) (Jobete Music Co., Inc. — ASCAP) (T. Gordy, G. Gooden, M. Torrence)

Bobbing bass guitar, shakin' guitar and snappy snare and high hat work back High Inergy's cute vocals on this skate dancing tune. Finger poppin' beat is accentuated by horns and percussives. A fine B/C or dance add.

Consultant Tackles Disco At NRBA Meet, Feels Radio Is Facing Washout

WASHINGTON, D.C. — "Like lemmings to the sea," radio programmers joined a stampede to disco formats, said consultant **John Parikh**, and now they're experiencing a washout. The record companies are the main culprits, according to **Parikh**, vice president/director of Joint Communications in Toronto and former student of **Marshall McLuhan**.

"The record companies don't do research, they are faddish and they're now abandoning disco." As for the future, **Parikh** predicted that disco will "transform and adopt rock elements" and influence other musical styles.

RKO Radio Live Via Satellite

LOS ANGELES — The RKO Radio Network, utilizing satellite technology, went on the air via Western Union's Westar on Monday, Oct. 1. The satellite transmissions were fed to the 12 RKO Radio owned and operated stations which are located in eight major U.S. markets. The live feeds consist of three-minute newscasts fed hourly on the half-hour and 90 second lifesound features fed at fifteen minutes past the hour.

In addition to the daily news and lifesound feature feeds, the RKO Radio Network will provide exclusive stereo-produced music specials to all affiliates. The two-hour specials feature major artists, groups, and music events that will be fed to affiliate stations every other month.

SBN To Build Radio, TV Facilities In Iraq

LOS ANGELES — A contract to supply, install and commission a radio/TV broadcasting system for the Conference Palace in Baghdad, Iraq, has been awarded to a partnership called **SBN Euro Consortium**.

Comprised of **Sahkoliikkeiden Oy** of Finland, **Robert Bosch GmbH** of Germany and **Neve Electronics** of the UK, **SBN's** project will include audio sound control in the main auditorium, two radio studios, three commentator's booths, a TV studio, a master control room and an audio dubbing room.

Disco music itself is also to blame for its current disfavor, he said. The songs got "self-indulgent and boring," talking about itself — "dand, dance, dance" — instead of what the public really wants to hear, which **Parikh** defined simply as "romance."

The record companies have failed to package disco correctly, in **Parikh's** view. According to his company's research, women dislike the sexy LP covers and prefer romantic designs. "It's been over-funkified," **Parikh** said, referring to the sometimes "incomprehensible" LP cover art. The record companies have yet to develop a "star system" for disco, and only time can produce a disco "gold list," he said.

Parikh predicted the "one-hit wonders" will continue to come and go in the next year. However, he emphasized that disco will have a longterm impact on music. Finally, he warned, "all this becomes an academic discussion as the product starts disappearing; record companies are just not delivering strong disco product."

Parikh was the sole speaker on what was to have been a four-person panel at the NRBA convention last week. The session's low audience turnout as well testified to disco's weakened drawing power.

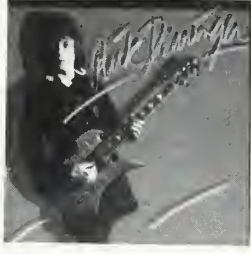

Tenor Great Rollins Scales New Spiritual, Musical Peaks

noon before the *Tonight Show* taping. Rollins was sitting in his hotel suite explaining that recording has become "a big trauma for me." Clothed in a black T-shirt and contrasting draw string pants, he looked trim and fit. After a pause, he continued:

"It's funny that I should feel that way about it at this point, because I've done a lot of recording (his first record date was a 1949 session with vocalist Babs Gonzales and trombonist J.J. Johnson). Maybe it's because I'm a Virgo; Virgos are very precise, very self-critical, they nit-pick. As a result, very seldom am I happy with what I record." But Rollins wasn't complaining. On the contrary, although he once seriously considered giving it all up to become a yoga teacher, he now accepts making records as a fact of life. "The whole business is geared around your turning out a certain amount of product. And, from an economic standpoint, you have to so that the record company can promote them (records) properly."

In the next room was Rollins' wife of 19 years, Lucille. Sonny handles the music. Lucille takes care of business. She emerged from behind closed doors once during the interview when a telephone call required Rollins' personal attention.

Lucille apologized for the interruption as Sonny excused himself and left to get the phone. When he returned after a few minutes, he looked at Lucille and nodded. "That's what I thought he'd say," she smiled. "I just wanted to make sure."

Since 1972, Lucille Rollins has been her husband's manager. She books the concerts, maps out the tour itineraries and rents the equipment, thus leaving Sonny free to pursue his quest for spiritual enlightenment and musical perfection. He seems to like the arrangement.

"For a time I was fed up with the music business, so I had to get away from it all. Now, I'm able to blend my career and my home life," he said. "Before it was either one or the other."

Paradise

Home for the Rollinses is Germantown, in upstate New York. There is a one-room studio behind the house where, during the several months out of each year when he isn't touring or recording, Rollins is able to spend the day exercising, meditating and practicing.

"To me it is paradise," Rollins said of his practice studio. "It's taken me a long time to get a place like this, where there is such a productive environment. Today I have everything I really want out of life."

Through the years, critics have had a field day attempting to analyze Rollins'

music. At various times it has been called "hard bop," cool, avant-garde, free and fusion. But trying to pigeonhole him only serves to obscure the unifying factor in all his works — change.

According to Rollins, the secret is to incorporate the best of the old with the best of the new. "I like to walk a tightrope," he said. "I appreciate the Art Ensemble (of Chicago); I appreciate Ornette (Coleman); I appreciate Grover Washington and Stanley Turrentine and all those more melodic players. Through listening to all of them, I am able to make a statement of my own, without having to align myself with one school or the other. In other words, I use whatever is good out there and combine it with what has come before . . . using my own interpretation, of course."

Higher Authority

In the end, though, Rollins could care less about what the critics think of his work. Like many of the seminal figures in jazz history, he answers to a higher authority.

"I see jazz as a positive force," he concluded as the sun began to set outside and the room grew dim, "because it transcends everything — war, politics, bigotry. Jazz musicians have always lived sort of ahead of their time. I don't know how much good that can do, or if music can change people's minds, but I'm glad I'm here in this life as a musician."

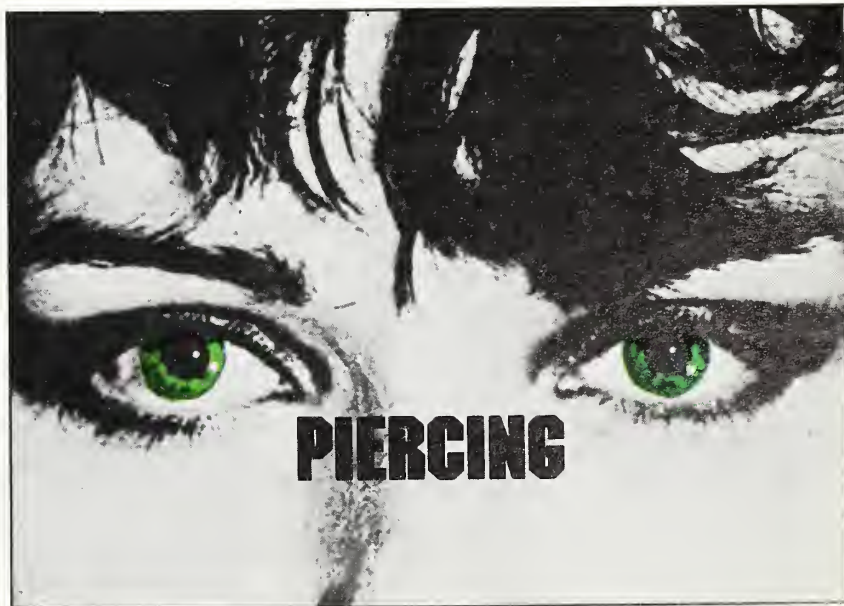
ASCAP Licenses Dancing Schools

LOS ANGELES — Under the terms of an agreement which is both experimental and conditional, ASCAP is now issuing licenses to dancing schools for the public performance of musical compositions and works.

The licensing agreement was reached between ASCAP and a committee of dancing school associations and instructors in response to the new copyright law which requires the schools to obtain licenses from the owners of copyrighted compositions.

The agreement is conditional in that, if 5,000 licenses are not executed by July 1, 1980, ASCAP has the right to terminate the license and it will not affect either side in positions taken after its expiration. Annual fees will be dependent on the type of instruction offered and the average number of students taught per week.

The three categories agreed upon are "ballroom," "combination," encompassing a range of instructional styles from jazz to classical, and "ballet." The fees for association members range from \$10 for ballet instruction with less than 75 students to \$80 for ballroom instruction with more than 300 students.

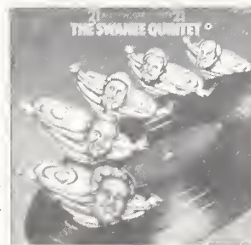

NASHVILLE — One hundred-fifteen writers and 66 publishers of 83 songs have been presented with Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI) Citations of Achievement in recognition of popularity in the Country Music field, as measured by broadcast performances for the period from April 1, 1978 to March 31, 1979. The awards were made at ceremonies in Nashville on Oct. 9 by BMI President Edward M. Cramer and Frances Williams Preston, vice president of BMI's Nashville office.

The 10th annual Robert J. Burton Award was given to "Talkin' In Your Sleep," by Roger Cook and Bobby Wood, and to Chriswood Music and Roger Cook Music, publishers. The award, honoring the late BMI president, is an etched glass plaque mounted on a brass pedestal. It is presented each year to the writers and publishers of the most performed BMI Country song of the year.

Billy Sherrill was the leading Country writer award winner with four songs, followed by Bob McDill, Dolly Parton, Ben Peters and Rafe Van Hoy with three awards. Steve Davis, Stephen Dorff, Larry Gatlin, Wayland Holyfield, Curly Putman, Eddie Rabbitt and Even Stevens received two awards each.

Four Song Winner

Tree Publishing Company, Inc. was the leading publisher-award winner with 10 citations, followed by The Welk Music Group with eight awards, Pi-Gem Music Publishing Co. with five and Algee Music Corporation with four.

Acuff-Rose Publications, Inc.; Briarpatch Music, Debdave Music, Inc.; Velvet Apple Music and Warner-Tamerlane Publishing Corporation each won three awards. American Cowboy Music Company; Ben Peters Music; Duchess Music Corporation;

The festive evening got underway at 8 pm with more than 500 key industry leaders, including numerous recording artists, writers, publishers and music executives, witnessing the presentation and joining in the licensing firm's salute to its writers and publishers.

Paul Heinecke Citation

Highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Paul Heinecke Citation of Merit, the firm's highest honor named after its founder, to WSM's "Grand Ole Opry," "in recognition of its role as America's oldest continuous radio show and its unsurpassed leadership over the past 54 years in the promotion and exposure of country music to millions of devoted fans throughout the vast clear-channel WSM area." The Paul Heinecke Citation of Merit has been presented on only four previous occasions. Past winners include the Country Music Association; the Honorable Winfield Dunn, former governor of Tennessee; the late Hubert Long and Irving C. Waugh, former president of WSM, Inc.

During the festive evening that

highlighted the New World of SESAC, the firm showcased some of its young composer/artists. Included was Craig Moore, who records on the Kimpat label and has appeared at O'Lunney's in New York City, Nashville East in South Jersey and numerous other clubs throughout the New York-New Jersey area.

The second showcase featured SESAC writer/artists Leslie Robinson and Mike Ryan, who presented some contemporary sounds of their original compositions. 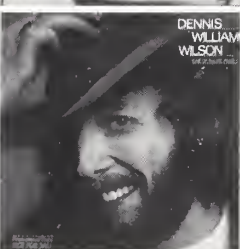

SOUND VIEWS

Time-Life Video Introduces New Line Of Music-Oriented Programs

CBS MOVES INTO HOME VIDEO MARKET — With the recent reorganization of the **CBS Records Group**, the **CBS New Ventures** division has been created to "develop and market products utilizing the new communications technologies," according to **Walter Yetnikoff**, president of the CBS Records Group. No specifics were offered by CBS as to the scope of its new division and a president of New Ventures or date of introduction has yet to be named. However, it is expected that the "new technologies" will cover vid discs, cassettes and cable TV programming. It is significant that CBS is the only entertainment conglomerate to place its home video wing under the control of a record division. As Yetnikoff stated, "Record people have something to learn about how to present things visually . . . part of this thing will certainly be our own artists in a visual presentation."

SONY SWAPS TECHNOLOGY WITH N.V. PHILIPS — **Sony Corp.** and **N.V. Philips** recently agreed to trade patent rights for a number of products, including laser-based audio and video technology. Philips, under its U.S. affiliates **North American Philips** and **U.S. Philips Corp.**, has already marketed its video disc system jointly with MCA Inc. under the Magnavox label (Magnavision) and has demonstrated its **Compact Disc** audio system but an introduction date has yet to be announced. Sony has also demonstrated its own optical systems for both video and audio discs. The alliance between the two corporations is expected to be a giant step toward standardization and compatibility between audio and video disc systems, as Sony's and Philips' products are planned to be interchangeable. In addition, Sony should also benefit from the recent IBM-MCA pairing, as products from that joint venture will also be compatible with Philips' technology.

HOME VID TAPING DECLARED LEGAL — In other Sony news, the corporation was declared the winner recently in a law suit brought about by **MCA/Universal** and **Walt Disney Studios** to prevent Sony from manufacturing and selling its Betamax home video recorder (**Cash Box**, Oct. 13). Home video taping of over-the-air free broadcasts was not considered to be in violation of the Federal copyright law revised in 1976, in the opinion of the presiding judge. However, the ruling does not affect taping of pay programs or tapes used outside the privacy of one's home. The decision is being appealed.

GREEN LIGHT FOR STV — The rapid expansion of subscription TV (**STV**) has been assured by a recent FCC ruling relaxing the standing law limiting one STV outlet per market. The decision does not affect the rule barring STV from markets with less than four TV signals.

VIDEO PREDICTIONS FOR THE '80s AND BEYOND — At the annual conference of the Broadcast Financial Management Association recently, **Harold Vogel**, an entertainment industry analyst for **Merrill Lynch**, predicted that about 14 million video discs will be sold during the next decade, split evenly between the MCA and RCA systems. Vogel also stated that by 1995, all the new "delivery systems," encompassing cable TV as well as vid discs, could conceivably be larger than broadcasting itself. **Dick Blank** of **CBS** predicted that cable penetration during the '80s would be about 40% of all TV homes, while Vogel offered a more conservative estimate of 33%, representing 25 million homes in the U.S.

VIDEOVISION EXPANDS — **VideoVision**, a N.Y. based distributor of pre-recorded videos, recently opened **Video-To-Go**, the first in a series of retail video outlets to be opened in key U.S. cities. In addition, VideoVision has purchased the American Tape Corp., a custom audio tape duplicator, and Radiant Corp., owner of a large catalog of master recordings.

VIDEO GOES STEREO — **Vidtronics Inc.** of Hollywood has become the latest video post-production house to incorporate 'state-of-the-art' stereo sound capabilities with the opening of their new audio studio designed and built by Sierra Audio Corp. Jerry Kurtz, president, states, "The new audio studio is designed for the 1980's and beyond. Stereo TV is just around the corner, and with the new facility, Vidtronics will be ready to meet the industry's changing needs."

VIDEO CLIPS — **Warner Bros.** recently shot new artist **Prince** as well as Island recording artist **Robert Palmer**. The Palmer shoot was done during a live concert at the Capitol Theatre in Pasaic, New Jersey for Warner Cable TV. More material is now being planned by the label for Warner Cable . . . **CBS** has wrapped up work on **David Johansen** and **Crystal Gayle** videos and they should be ready shortly . . . **Casablanca** has completed a **Cher** film, in addition to two **Village People** films for both international and domestic use. Concert footage on **KISS** has been wrapped up for a forthcoming film . . . **Elektra/Asylum** is currently at work on a video of new act **Shoes**, which should be out in two weeks . . . **Chrysalis** is now shooting a video on **Blondie** which will contain all songs from their new "Eat To The Beat" LP. Production is being handled by **Jon Roseman Productions** . . . In other Roseman news, the production firm has also finished work on a **Kinks** special for HBO, part of which was shot live at a concert in Providence, Rhode Island . . . **Kramer/Rocklen Studios** is doing a commercial for Casablanca's **Woody Allen** LP. The production concern is also editing **The Tubes** recent L.A. Greek Theatre concert and a piece for **Fleetwood Mac's** "Tusk" LP, which will be used for promotional purposes . . . **Riches & Rubinstein** recently shot **Chocolate City** recording act **Cameo** in N.Y.C. and films on **RSO** acts **Sweet Inspirations** and **John Stewart**. A film on **A&M's Joan Armatrading**, shot live in Boston, has been completed and will be used for international promotion. The film was co-produced and directed by the label's **Claire Baren**. A get well wish goes out to **Peter Rubinstein**, who was hospitalized recently after he was held up and shot in Los Angeles . . . **Spencer Davis**, formerly of the **Spencer Davis Group**, will be moving into video work very shortly with an L.A.-based production group. He is currently producing his new band, **L.A.R.K.s** (Los Angeles Rhythm Kings) . . . N.Y.-based department store **Bloomingdale's** recently presented a "new wave fashion" videotape at **The Kitchen Center for Music, Dance and Video**, integrating new wave music with the new "fashion trend."

DIGITAL DISC DEVELOPMENTS — **Discwasher** has just released 'the Good Life' by the **Paul Smith/Barney Kessel Jazz Quartet**. Out soon will be 'Horn of Plenty' with **Don Menza** and 'Redeye' a jazz/rock disc with **Michael Melovin**. Discwasher is now distributing **Chalfont/Barese Sarabande** digital discs; two **London Symphony** recordings, **Morton Gould** conducting; 'Latin American Symphonetta' and 'Digital Space' comprised of various movie themes. **Audio-Technica** recently released **Tchaikovsky's** "1812 Overture" with the **Cleveland Orchestra** and 'Naturally' with **Mel Lewis** and the **Jazz Orchestra**, both digital discs on the Telarc label. Future releases include **Tchaikovsky's** Symphony #4 in F Minor' on **Telarc**, a direct disc, 'The Manne We Love' on **Toshiba-EMI**, and an advanced analog **Umbrella** disc 'Boss Brass'.

NEW YORK — Time-Life Video, a distributor of music-oriented cassettes to the home entertainment market, will offer video programs featuring Devo, the Kinks, Grace Jones, Barry Manilow, and Peter Tosh to retail outlets across the country "in the very near future," according to Sam Szurek, director of entertainment programming for the company.

The films, which are currently marketed through the Time-Life Video Club, are available in both Beta and VHS configurations. Other films in the catalog include programs starring the Cars, the Police, Robert Gordon, and Neil Young's "Rust Never Sleeps."

Concomitant with its marketing plans, Time-Life Video has been contracted by Hurrah, the popular rock-disco here, to initiate an exclusive showing of its video

catalog at the club beginning Oct. 16.

Twenty-five color television sets, ranging in size from 14 to 21 inches, will be affixed to the walls and ceiling of the West Side club. Concert, concept, and feature films, as well as promotional shorts leased or sold by various record companies to Time-Life, will be synchronized to the club's sound system.

'Other Avenues'

"Our primary thrust is to the home market, but we are finding other avenues to expose the films," commented Szurek. "Our association with Hurrah is an experiment to see how we can apply the concept of home entertainment to such environments as rock-discos, concert halls, and colleges. It's just another way to promote ourselves and showcase what we have to offer on videocassette."

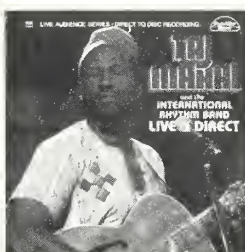
MOUSSORGSKY — **Pictures At An Exhibition; Night On Bald Mountain** — **Cleveland Orchestra, Lorin Maazel, conductor** — **Telarc Digital 10042** — **List: 15.95**

Recorded on a Soundstream system, this album offers both fine performances and exceptional sound quality. Brass and percussion transients have a real bite, while additional presence is added by the unusually wide dynamic range of the recording. Maazel's interpretation of "Night On Bald Mountain" is boldly etched in the wildest colors of the orchestral palate. And, while his version of "Pictures" is a bit pallid in such sections as "The Old Castle," Maazel compensates with splendid renditions of "Promenade" and "The Hut On Fowl's Legs."



MENDELSSOHN — **Rondo Capriccioso in E major** — **Three Fantasies or Caprices** — **Fantasy in F-sharp minor ("Scottish Sonata")**, and **Scherzo a Capriccio in F-sharp minor** — **John O'Connor, piano** — **Denon OX-7157-ND** — **List: 15.00**

One would not ordinarily think of solo piano as a medium that is tailor-made to exhibit the advantages of digital sound. But this recording, one of Denon's first using Nippon Columbia's DN-034R PCM system, has a brilliant sheen that cannot be found on analog keyboard albums. This extra resolution is especially noticeable in the second of the "Three Fantasies Or Caprices," where the pedal would normally obscure individual parts. In addition, O'Connor is a pianist of unusual sensitivity and skill.

TAPE NEWS — TDK has announced a major marketing campaign this fall for its 'D' audio cassette series. Utilizing the talents of recording artist **Stevie Wonder**, the 'Amazing Music Machine' promotion will concentrate on intense media and print advertising. The cassettes will be promoted on the retail level through dealer priced multipaks and polybags. A 'Stack Your Deck' and Stevie Wonder poster promotion will also be available as well as in-store window streamers, counter-cards and floor displays . . . Another big push is planned by JVC Corporation in conjunction with 3M. This effort will be aimed at increasing consumer awareness of metal-tape superiority over conventional tapes. Customers who compare recordings at JVC outlets will qualify for a weekly giveaway of a \$1,500 metal cassette deck. In addition, all JVC metal decks sold will include a free 46 minute Scotch Metafine cassette.

BOGUS TAPES — TDK Corporation recently discovered that fraudulent versions of its SAC-90 cassettes are being sold in the New York area through mail order ads in the Times and other newspapers. Sold in boxes of ten for \$2.59 per tape, as compared with the genuine article retailing at \$5.69, the cassettes differ slightly in appearance, and greatly in sound quality. The company is now taking steps to alert consumers to the fraud.

NEW ONE-STOP — Cardinal Export Corp. has opened a domestic one-stop, which will service the entire east coast. Operating out of Long Island City, New York, the plant occupies some 37,000 square feet of space. It is planning to offer a full popular catalog with same day delivery on most items. The outlet will also offer items such as radios and cameras, which could be sold in record stores. Video tapes and video cassettes will also be featured.

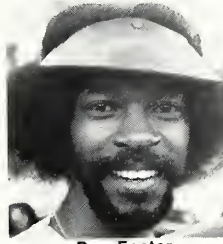

LAX RECORDS WILL SURPRISE YOU — Steve Gold and Jerry Goldstein's L.A. International Records will have its first annual meeting Oct. 25-28 at the Continental Hyatt in Los Angeles. The label will have meetings throughout the three days that will announce new artists signings, product presentation and staff appointments. **Jack Gibson** will be the keynote speaker. **Al Edmondson**, vice president of the label will be organizing the conference.

PROGRAMMERS PROFILE — **Doc Foster**, program director at WSOK in Savannah became interested in radio when he was in his junior year of college. "All during the time I was in school it was planned that I would be going to medical school, but I was very interested in football, I had to quit the team because since I had gotten a scholarship for

tennis, my tennis coach was afraid I would get hurt, so he talked me out of playing football. Because of my interest I eventually became a spotter for the team, and met the play-by-play announcer **Manny Clark**, who was also the program director at WGIV on of the major stations in Charlotte where I attended school." Foster spent 8 years at WGIV, he went to WEAS in Savannah for a short while before he went to WSOK where he has been for the last two years. Foster says, "Though I attended a radio workshop course to learn about broadcasting, in addition to **Manny Clark**, **Slack Johnson** who was also an air personality at WGIV really helped me to learn the majority of what I know about broadcasting."

LINDA CLIFFORD IN THE RIGHT NICHE — Clifford has found a song that fits perfectly with her vocal ability. Her latest release "I Just Wanna Wanna" is a change from the disco-oriented material she has been doing, but has a fluid danceable and listenable sound.

ARTIST ACTIVITY — **Lou Rawls** will co-host "The Lou Rawls Parade of Stars," where top celebrities will make appearances. The show is being done in conjunction with Anheuser-Busch Corp., who donated \$200,000 to help raise \$3 million for the United Negro College Fund. This \$200,000 will serve as seed money for the multi-million dollar fund raising effort that Rawls will involve himself in. Rawls will also be involved in a radio feature that is scheduled to air over 103 black radio stations in 1980. . . . The **New York Knicks** will be using a track from **Smokey Robinson's** album "Where There's Smoke" as their theme during the forthcoming basketball season for all televised games. The cut to be used is called "Get Ready."

RADIO ACTIVITY — The National Association of Broadcasters has again asked the U.S. Court of Appeals not to allow the FCC and The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission to exchange information about broadcast licensees' employment practices. The NAB feels that this practice is intimidating broadcasters into foregoing their right to court hearings on discrimination complaints. . . . The NAB has established a minority Executive Council, replacing The Minority Advisory Committee. The council members are **Eugene Jackson**, National Black Network; **Edward O. Romereo**, general manager of KBNO in Denver; **Ragan Henry**, president Broadcast Enterprises Network; **Edward Gomez**, president KABQ in Albuquerque; **Bill Summers**, president and general manager of WLOU in Louisville, and **Pierre Sutton**, president of Inner City Broadcasting. Chairman of the council **Eugene Jackson** says, "This is the first time the NAB will have an advisory committee composed of minority owners and managers which will provide input to the board and staff at the top level." . . . **Frankie Crocker** has made some additional staff changes at KUTE in Los Angeles as **Lon Thomas** and **Lee Bailey** have resigned from the station. Crocker has not yet announced who will take their places. . . .

Sheridan Broadcasting Network (formerly Mutual Black Network) held its second regional affiliates meeting in Jackson, Miss. Oct. 10-11. The two-day meeting was held at the Downtown Holiday Inn, where there was an excellent turn-out of programmers, general managers and air personalities from the area. The workshops and panels discussed broadcast legislation, sales, promotion, programming and station acquisition. On hand to answer questions about some of these topics were **Jerry Boulding**, program director of KDIA in Oakland, **Ragan Henry**, president of NABOB and president of The Black Enterprise Network; and **Keith Adams**, national program director for Black Enterprise Network. Adams gave an in depth talk about radio deregulation, while Henry's speech centered around the activities of NABOB. Boulding gave a searing speech about programming black radio in the '80s. . . . The Arbitron Radio Advisory Council has extended the terms of six of its twelve members for an additional year. For the sake of continuity, the council has decided not to change members every two years as it had been doing previously. **Paul Downs**, general manager at WRAP in Norfolk, represents the black oriented stations. All Arbitron clients having the position of GM or higher are eligible to be elected to the council; subscribers will be notified about the election process. . . . **Hardy Jay Lang** has been promoted to PD/MD at WENZ in Richmond.

LATIN BEAT

Joh nny Rodriguez has been associated on an ir.ormal basis with Latin Percussion Inc. since its conception in 1963. He has just joined the record division, Latin Percussion Ventures, Inc., where his responsibilities, in addition to A&R work and record production, will include promotion and international product placement.

Rodriguez sometimes refers to himself as a "young old man," a reference to his devotion to the rhythmic traditions of Cuba, from where so much of today's most popular music derive their origins.

Rodriguez, known to his closest friends by his nickname, "Dandy," has been a top pro since he was 16 years old, when he played bongos with the **Tito Puente** Orchestra at a time when this band was at its peak of popularity.

He has worked with every leading name in Latin (now frequently referred to as Salsa) including **Tito Rodriguez**, **Eddie Palmieri**, **Ray Barretto**, **Joe Cuba** and is currently the leader of the band **Tipica '73**.

Rodriguez has been one of the significant forces to bring about a cultural exchange between the Latin musicians of Cuba and America, and plans are underway to begin recording, under his direction, some of the founding fathers of Cuban music.

His first effort for the Latin Percussion Ventures label was the album "Dandy's Dandy," a unique blend of traditional and jazz elements.

One of the most liked persons in his profession, Rodriguez has the ability of uniting diversified talents to create historical settings, as evidenced by the highly successful 1979 European tour of the Latin Percussion Jazz Ensemble which consisted of **Tito Puente**, **Carlos "Patato" Valdez**, **Sal Cuevas** and **Eddie Martinez**. Rodriguez will again serve as musical director of this group during his upcoming tour of Japan during December, 1979.

Sept. 13 will stand out as an important day in the life of **Tito Puente**. It was the day he and his band took off for Washington, D.C. to perform at the Second Annual Con-

gressional Hispanic Caucus Dinner in the Washington Hilton Hotel.

President Carter was the keynote speaker, and for the occasion Tito wrote a special arrangement of "Georgia." "The King" and the band wasted no time getting into the song, following a recorded version of "Hail to the Chief." Then it was a Latin-jazz version of "Peanut Vendor." Tito had it in his mind to play a merengue version of "Hail to the Chief" as President Carter was making his entrance, but his suggestion was shot down by one of the official coordinators of the affair.

Some of the songs Tito and the band played (which got ex-Deputy Mayor of New York, **Herman Badillo** and Congressman **Robert Garcia** onto the dance-floor) were "Girl from Ipanema," "Copacabana," "Moliendo Cafe," "Oye Como Va," "September," "Soniendo Con Puerto Rico" and "La Boriquena." In an effort to reach out to all of the guests, Tito played music from Venezuela, Mexico, Spain, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Columbia and Argentina.

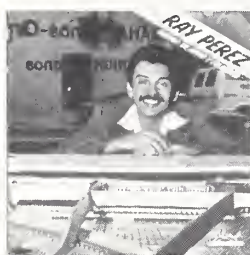
Tito did get a chance to chat with **President Carter** following his keynote speech.

It is always a plus for Latin music when American television channels show their interest by booking top Latin artists for their shows. Recently PBS (Channel 13) in New York taped a show devoted to "Salsa" as part of its "Skyline" series. The show featured **Ray Barretto**, **Tito Puente**, **Charlie Palmieri** and bassist, **Sal Cuevas**. Opera star **Beverly Sills** hosted the show, and it is to her credit that she felt perfectly at home at the Casino 14, one of the "homes" of Latin music, where the show was taped. A date has not yet been set for the airing of the program, but it will most likely be in early November.

Oscar DeLeon has been knocking them off their seats (literally) in his cross-country tour. He has hit such cities as Miami, Houston, San Antonio, Boston, San Francisco and Los Angeles, over a four week period

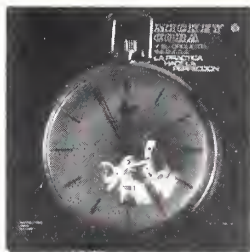

GRT Canada Close To End; Magnum Could Go To WEA

TORONTO — After months of speculation about its financial solvency, GRT Records of Canada Ltd. appears on the edge of collapse.

Under the draining economic burden following the demise of the firm's American operations earlier this summer, and unable to negotiate a reciprocal manufacturing deal to continue its well-oiled branch distribution system in this country, the firm is expected to shut its doors before the end of October.

While officials at both companies declined to confirm reports, it is expected that GRT's domestic record label, Magnum, will be sold to WEA Music of Canada Ltd. Among the label's Canadian commodities are Dan Hill, Prism and Moe Koffman.

One executive at GRT, although hesitant to confirm what have become widespread ruminations within the music business community this past week, told **Cash Box**, "It's definite. We can't sustain ourselves much longer. We're almost isolated in the business. Our credit line is at an end."

Another GRT executive, stressing that "nothing has been signed yet or done about

the company," told **Cash Box** by phone, "We're definitely feeling the economic pangs of losing our U.S. operations."

Ironically, the Magnum move to WEA would reunite the label's artists with the former president of GRT, WEA's executive vice president, Ross Reynolds. It was Reynolds in the later part of the decade who pieced together the label in Canada, launching international careers for Hill, Prism, Klaatu and others. His departure last year, in the eyes of some, signalled an end of the firm's aggressive posture in the market.

In a phone interview, Reynolds says the move to WEA by Magnum is "just a wild rumor at this stage. I don't want to fudge, but I can't comment one way or the other on the matter right now."

Trapped in the middle of the muddle are the label's artists, both on Magnum and the distributed licensees. Malcom Glassford, manager of FM, a Canadian progressive music band whose last disc on Passport went gold in Canada, says the label dilemma has stalled the group's second album release in Canada.

"Essentially, we're stuck in the middle of the mess. 'Surveillance' (the new FM album) has been ready for some time, and we've scheduled touring on the premise the album would be released by Labor Day. Now, we can't do anything."

Glassford maintains his act has an escape clause in its contract, and is presently shopping around for another deal.

Dan Hill is reportedly preparing a disc for January release.

Officials from other Canadian firms reportedly in the running for the Magnum label were unavailable for comment.

Canada

TORONTO — The New Music Magazine, the CHUM-financed consumer rock publication, has ceased publishing after just more than a year in the marketplace. Its demise once again opens a void in the rock press in Canada. Advertising revenues dropped to a point where the magazine was losing substantial amounts of money each month.

CBS is reportedly preparing "unique" campaigns for the second **Battered Wives** disc, "Cigarettes," on their newly acquired Bomb label. Also in the works, on the Basement Records mid-price budget record line, under the aegis of Attic Records (another CBS-distributed label), is an effort from the **Numbers**. CBS is also faring quite well with a video-marketed **Englebert** album, "Especially For You."

Lisa Dal Bello is preparing her first for Capitol... **Harlequin** is ready with its first for CBS Canada. The hard-rocking Winnipeg band should make quite a splash commercially, if their concert show is any indication.

The Secretary of State, **David MacDonald**, has indicated he is in support of lessening Canadian content regulations for TV and will encourage the CRTC to weaken the strict limitations, particularly in view of the advent of satellite transmission.

The retailing situation seems to be exploding in the downtown core, with a handful of new stores opening this past

summer on Yonge St. Also on the rise is the proliferation of delete (cutout) stores like Charlie's and Cheap Thrills. They're doing brisk business.

On the concert scene... Two nights of **Fleetwood Mac** from Nov. 25-26... Two nights of **Billy Joel** in mid-October... **Hall & Oates** playing a rare club date at the El Mocambo, Dec. 5-6... **Spyro Gyra** making their first indoor appearance here, Oct. 29. **Bruce Cockburn's** next disc will be recorded with the ECM masters and will likely be issued everywhere but Canada on that label. Cockburn, a veteran folkster, scored his first major AM hit here.

PERSONALITY PROFILE

Game Plan's Ken Anderson Brings Banker's Saavy To Job

CHICAGO — From banking to pinball in 12 eventful years. Ken Anderson, Game Plan's vice president of marketing, could write that book.

In 1967, Anderson the banker crossed paths with the coin machine industry. His bank was financing the San Francisco distributor, R. F. Jones, and he liked the business. Consequently, he went to work for Wurlitzer as western regional credit representative. The following year he moved from finance to distribution as head of the Wurlitzer distributor branch operation management program in San Francisco, and that initiated a series of mobile steps up the bureaucratic ladder: from Los Angeles sales representative to assistant manager, San Francisco distributor; then Los Angeles branch manager followed by branch manager Rocky Mountain States, and climaxed at the dizzying height of regional sales manager for states west of the Mississippi.

The only roadblock to Anderson's further ascension was the untimely demise of Wurlitzer in 1973. Undaunted, Anderson joined Chicago Dynamic Industries, Inc. that year and served as director of marketing until the company's extinction in 1975. Afterward he became director of marketing for Fun Games of San Francisco, but the fledgling manufacturer bit the dust after a brief success.

In 1977, Anderson hooked up with a new-born manufacturer, Game Plan. As vice

president of marketing, Anderson, among others, nurtured the company into a reputable maker of cocktail pinballs and, with the advent of their standard size pinball "Sharpshooter," a serious competitor to the old line manufacturers.

Remains Optimistic

Despite a dozen years of up and down struggles, Anderson remains an optimist about the industry. "At no other time has there been anymore opportunity for growth, for a complete revolutionary change, because of such fine products and

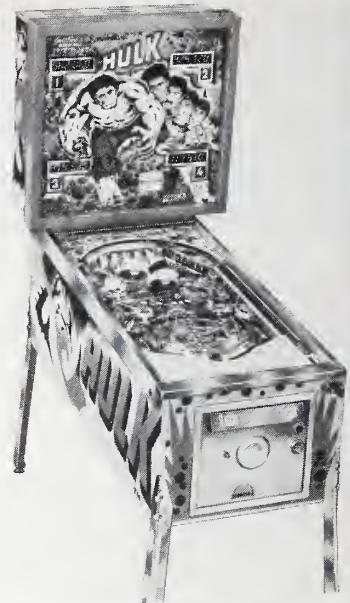
Gottlieb & Co. Introduces Its Newest 4-Player Flipper, 'The Incredible Hulk'

CHICAGO — "It's an incredible game," said Tom Herrick, Gottlieb marketing vice president, referring to the company's new 4-player solid state pinball game, "The Incredible Hulk." "It would be hard to find a more timely or topical theme for a flipper game in the fall of 1979," he continued. "Marvel's famous comic book character has a steady following of millions of Americans and the television show of the same name has continuously been in the Top Ten."

The backglass artwork, framed in rich magenta, features an eye-transfixing series of illustrations transforming man to beast; and the new Gottlieb "tailored" sounds offer the operator the choice of startling arcade sounds or a musical Bach-like cascade of notes with easy playfield contact.

The game's new "spotting" feature, in connection with four top rollovers, can advance the bonus multiplier 2, 3, 4 and 5 times. Hitting all 7 drop targets lights the "C" in the A-B-C feature. When the player combines the A and B ball shooters with knocking down the set of drop targets, it adds a 5,000 point bonus and lights the "special". Also, there are three stationary targets and by hitting all three, the player lights the extra ball rollover.

"'The Incredible Hulk,' combines all of the elements of a high earning flipper," concluded Herrick, "a contemporary

theme recognized immediately by millions of Americans plus an ingenious arrangement of playfield elements, fast action on the board and scoring combinations that provide limitless variation."

The game is available with dollar coin acceptor and is now on display at Gottlieb distributors throughout the U.S.

the possibility for new product development."

New locations are opening up to absorb the new products. Anderson observed that since he has worked with pinball cocktail tables, he realized the existence of untapped locations, that the market was expanding, and the business elevated in the public eye. The operator could now buy better merchandise for these newer locations like lounges, restaurants, discos, instead of hauling out an antique from his warehouse.

In this era of growth, Anderson lavishes praise on the distributor. He's the pulse of the business. He must handle the sale of a game, live with it, and trade it in later. He's done a good job handling new manufacturers and has the opportunity to move more good product than ever before, but he does have to take a long, hard look at marketing."

Over-stocking

Amidst this optimism, Anderson recognizes dangers to the business. With his banker's sense he advises careful scrutiny of open lines of credit for financing, and he fears over-production. "With over-production the distributor is stuck, the operator is stuck, and in the end it will affect the manufacturer. A cash flow problem would result." To avoid over-stocking and a stagnant inventory Anderson suggests, "the operator should pick and choose a piece of equipment, be selective, prospect, market, expand beyond the usual loca-

tions, test equipment, and only take money makers."

How does Anderson view the future of the industry? Some of the snares seem unavoidable. "The industry runs in cycles. The operator and player have a tremendous thirst for a particular game. The manufacturer responds to that thirst. A year later a new thirst comes and the manufacturer cannot change quickly enough. He still saturates the market before he can pursue new directions."

Nevertheless, certain safeguards against saturation can be provided. "The future will require close evaluation of product development by the manufacturer and of purchasing by the distributor and operator. The manufacturer will have to do more field testing, pre-test games on the distributor level. Without ample test time — trouble. Poor games create panic buying, price cutting, and closeouts. All bad. We need

long range planning from both operator and distributor."

Anderson's concern and affection for the industry are underscored by an experience he had at Game Plan. When the factory needed parts to complete "Sharpshooter," competing manufacturers helped out. They stuck together for the sake of the industry. The camaraderie impressed Anderson. "I've met as nice a bunch of people in this business as anywhere I've been. You may fight hard as competitors, but there's a mutual respect. It's a stimulating business."

Martin To Test Record

LOS ANGELES — Mandi Martin, a member of the Organization Of Women In Music, will attempt to top her own world record of playing 216 hours of pinball, by playing for 500 hours (21 days). She is attempting the pin marathon in support of the City Of Hope, which will establish a pediatrics research fund in her name.

Elton John

UNIVERSAL AMPHITHEATRE, L.A. — During his week-long appearance here, veteran rocker Elton John reaffirmed that he is not only one of the best songwriters of the past 10 years with a perfect tenor to display his works, he is also a master pianist.

His virtuosity, first at an extra-long acoustic piano and later at an electric organ, merits him the title of the "Horowitz of Pop."

Except for percussionist Ray Cooper's entrance amid billowing, 10-foot high flames, the accent of the show, which featured no orchestra other than John at his keyboards and Cooper's drums and percussion embellishments, was on simplicity.

With no buildup or searchlights or any other of the technological bombast that usually announces the arrival of a rock star, Elton simply walked out onstage wearing a baggy vinyl jumpsuit, waved perfunctorily to the audience and sat down at the piano. His classic opening number, "Your Song," really didn't require any of the above-mentioned pyrotechnics. The fire, however soft and subdued, was all in the song.

The audience, which was evidently made up of zealous fans, enthusiastically joined in when John invited the crowd to sing along with "Good-bye, Yellow Brick Road." Amazingly, they even seemed to know the chorus.

"Funeral For A Friend," originally recorded with a huge orchestra, was a *tour de force* for the performer, as he managed to evoke a full symphonic sound with only his piano and a little help from Cooper on congas and xylophone.

Even greater artistic risks were taken, successfully so, with his *capella* rendition of "Harmony." His poignant homage to Marilyn Monroe, "Candle In The Wind," concluded with Elton rising from his piano bench and literally applauding the memory of the damned blondshell.

In short, the evening served as a catalogue of John's greatest crowd pleasers, and included such classic chestnuts as the lilting "Where To Now St. Peter," the plaintive "Rocket Man" and the anthemic homage to the weekend, "Saturday Night's Alright For Fighting."

John's acoustic ballads remain as contemporary as anything in music today, and he strategically avoided playing any of the cuts from his new lushly produced all-disco LP while in the solo piano setting.

AC/DC

LONG BEACH ARENA — AC/DC has finally achieved headlining status in the States, and if its recent Long Beach Arena gig was any indication, the band is next in line for coronation as the king of heavy metal riff-rock. Playing selections from its "Let There Be Rock," "High Voltage," "Powerage" and "Highway To Hell" LPs, the band proved once again that it is Australia's most appealing high decibel export.

Primitive, abnormally loud and unrelenting, the group blasts out a sound that makes it the ultimate teenage boys band. And while heavy metal is somewhat of a dinosaur as a musical art form these days, this five member group of Downunder rowdies infuses its music with the wild boy,

abandon and rock 'n' roll excitement that makes today's punk/new wave movement so engaging.

Angus Young, the lead guitarist for AC/DC, puts the same macho intensity into his ear splitting lead lines that Clint Eastwood put into the film persona of Lt. Harry Calahan. Young is indeed the rock 'n' roll version of Dirty Harry, and his Magnum 44-like guitar work is what makes the Aussie band one of the most lethal live acts in rock. Young still wears his prep school uniform and bookbag on-stage and this possessed Holden Caulfield has a superb rock 'n' roll image — the school boy barely out of his rompers who has caught the spasmodic sickness of power chord rock.

The hard driving rhythm team of drummer Phil Rudd, bassist Cliff Williams and rhythm guitarist Malcom Young, furnished the perfect background for vocalist Bon Scott, a shirtless, tattooed stud whose vocals are reminiscent of the cry of the banshee, and the guitar antics of Angus Young.

Songs like "Highway To Hell," "If You Want Blood," "Sin City" and "Whole Lotta Rosie," rock's equivalent to the "Too Fat Polka," provided non-stop explosions of musical mayhem. Although many of the females hung on to their boyfriends as they leapt up and down during the set, the majority gave up, plugged their ears and submitted to the power and the glory of unabashed raunch.

While the band will never win any prizes for breaking ground musically and seems more akin to a chili burger than the Chateau Briand rock of The Cars and Roxy Music, AC/DC totally involves its audience and creates more concert hall bedlam than most any group around.

Brand X

THE ROXY, L.A. — Since recording its first LP, "Unorthodox Behavior," Passport recording group Brand X has had a rough go of it here in the States. Their music is caught in that grey area between progressive rock and jazz fusion, causing a good deal of confusion among programmers who don't quite know where to place them.

Fortunately, lack of airplay hasn't stopped them from gaining a small but fervent cult of believers who've religiously followed them through such stunning masterworks as "Moroccan Roll," "Masques," a live set, entitled "Livestock" and their most recent concoction, "Product," which sees the return of Genesis drummer Phil Collins to the forefront of the band.

In concert here, Collins' drum work brought a rhythmic rock base back to many of the older numbers, such as "Malaga Virgin" from "Moroccan Roll," and the diminutive performer's vocal work on two new songs, "Don't Make Waves" and "Soho," underscored the band's latest bid for popular recognition through a more acceptable approach.

However, Brand X has hardly discarded its jazz flavorings. From Percy Jones' deft, Charlie Mingus-inspired bass work on his fretless electric guitar to Peter Robinson and Robin Lumley's elegantly styled keyboard textures, the band maintained its jazzy melodies, allowing each of the players to stretch out on his own, building through each selection with a swelling rush of electronic power.

Guitarist John Goodsall provided the cutting edge for most of the songs, as his piercing, wailing notes rode on top of the exacting rhythms.

people like to browse, with nothing particular in mind. A good cover can catch their attention."

More bullish on the subject, Peaches executive vice president Richard Diamond states, "Graphics are extremely valuable. Anytime you can draw the attention of customers, you sell records."

Just how that attention is drawn is the business of label vice presidents in charge of creative services, and not surprisingly, they have done a lot of thinking on the subject.

"The cover should give an indication of what's going on inside. It should convey an impression of the music itself," according to Pat Siciliano, creative services vice president at Jet Records. He mentions Gary Moore's album as an example of this interplay between musical content and graphic style. "Gary is a rough English rock 'n' roll guitar player. We used a close face shot of him looking mean."

Artist Identity

Another creative services vice president, A&M's Jeff Ayeroff, stresses the important role that graphics play in giving a recording group an identity. "Supertramp has a limited identity. They're musicians/showmen as opposed to showmen/musicians. So, for the 'Breakfast In America' cover, we didn't focus on the artists themselves but on a single image, 'Libby the Waitress.' The band is very conscious of graphics. In fact, they chose 'Libby,' who's actually an actress. She's become a living logo, making appearances across the country in support of the LP."

Both Ayeroff and Sciliano agree that an important distinction must be made between established groups and new artists when designing an album cover. "With superstars, people expect a certain quality on the jacket. And we also include lyric sheets inside," Siciliano says.

Anonymity Problem

Although anonymity is an obvious problem with a new artist, Ayeroff does not believe in putting the picture of an unknown on the front of the jacket. "If you have five pictures of five non-famous guys, you're competing with yourself. They may not look alike to us, but to the public they do."

He illustrates his point by mentioning new artist Joe Jackson's "Look Sharp" album, which features two white pointed shoes looking just that.

Invariably, in-store displays incorporate album artwork. Several objects featured on ELO's "Discovery" graphics, including the

treasure chest, dagger and gem containing the band's logo, were lifted off the jacket and turned into mobiles, six-foot stand-ups and other items for in-store promotion.

However unquantifiable their effectiveness may be, in-store displays must work, if the current proliferation of them is any indication.

"Sure they help," Ben Karol says. "We who live in this business 24 hours a day tend to forget that those who aren't in the business don't know what is going on, what is new, what is available, what is hot. In-store displays and displaying the jackets help draw attention to the product."

While conceding that such displays are effective, Lenny Bove, a manager for the Record World chain, feels that it is hard to determine just how effective they are. Besides, he says, "In-store record play sells a lot more product."

Of all the theories and all the merchandising ploys, there would probably be little disagreement on whether sex sells records.

Sex Sells

A.J. Cervantes tackles the subject head on. "I agree with using sex to sell product as long as it's aesthetically appealing and in good taste."

He cites one instance where Butterfly did not exactly follow this dictum. "The Blackwell cover about a year ago was too extreme. It showed two girls frolicking in the nude. That hurt us with rack sales." But, he adds, "If Detroit can sell autos with sex, why not use it for a much more sensate-oriented medium like music?"

Even a random sampling of album graphics shows that most labels answered that question in the affirmative quite a long time ago.
