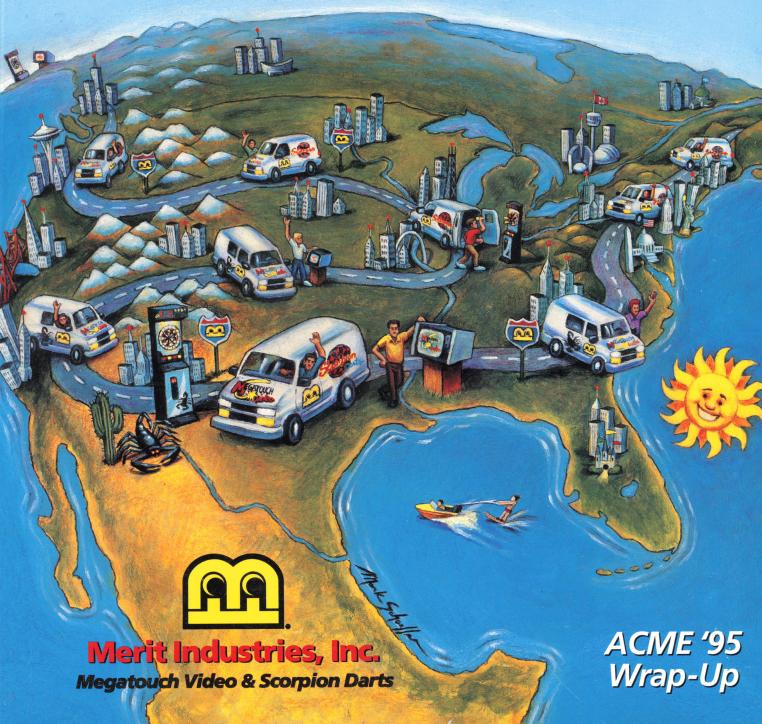
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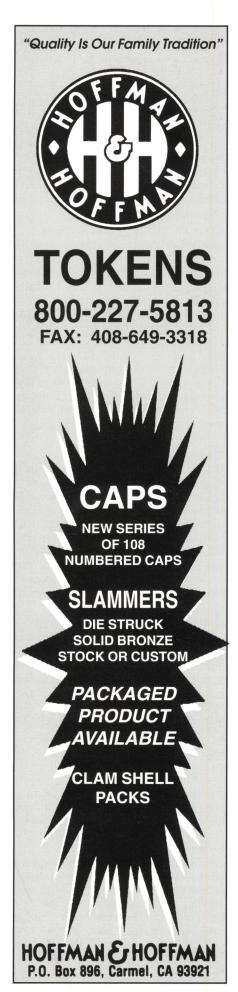

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### NEWS NOTES

#### **✓ SOUTH CAROLINA GAMING FACES HURDLES**

Several recent court rulings in South Carolina may jeopardize the future of legalized video gaming, which has been plagued by roadblocks since it passed in all but a handful of counties last year.

The first decision was handed down by a judge in one of the counties that voted no. In it, he ruled that the county-by-county referendum held last year was in violation of the state constitutional clause prohibiting the passage of certain special legislation on the local level. The suit was brought by operators in counties that voted against the referendum. As a result, enforcement of the referendum has been stayed, at least temporarily allowing previous gaming activities to continue in the counties that voted the measure down.

But state association president George Harrison of Darlington Music Co. said if that decision is upheld by the state Supreme Court it could result in another referendum statewide. "We have local optional sales tax and Sunday sales of alcohol," he explained. "If the referendum is declared illegal, they would be illegal as well. But nobody's taken the other issues to court."

In another ruling, the state Supreme Court has determined that 8-line machines are not covered under the legal exemptions to gaming. However, Harrison said the court by its own admission did not consider a 1993 state law addressing the issue because the case stemmed from 1991.

"The '93 law was clear that they are included in the exemption," he said, adding that the state is not requiring the machines to be removed until June. "In the meantime we hope we can get something passed by the Legislature that says we can keep them."

On other fronts in South Carolina, some state officials say they want to retain an eight-machine limit despite the fact that last year's referendum reduced that number to five. The reduction will cost the state \$8 million annually, some officials have predicted. There is also a move afoot to raise the licensing fee for five machines from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and to charge \$3,500, \$5,000, and \$7,500 respectively for each additional machine if they are allowed.

#### ✓ VIDEO GAMING KILLED IN NEW MEXICO

Six months after voters approved video lottery in New Mexico, operators are back to square one with little chance of seeing legalized gaming in bars and restaurants this year. The failure of video gaming began early in '95 when the state Supreme Court ruled that the referendum was unconstitutional because it addressed both a paper lottery and video gaming.

The state Legislature sealed the envelope this spring by failing to pass a bill authorizing video gaming. New Mexico's constitution does not expressly prohibit gambling, thus such a move could have been enacted by legislators.

"In the last two minutes of the session, the bill died on the floor," explained Ken Anderson of A & B Vending in northeast Albuquerque. "There has been some talk of a special session because of the referendum." Anderson said he predicts the issue will lay dormant for the year despite pressure from race tracks, which say they are sure to lose money from the paper lot-

tery the legislature did enact and casinos being developed by Indian organizations around the state.

"It's going to be tough," noted Anderson. "When the Indians come in, you not only give away the gambling, you give away the bars, you give away the restaurants. The street operator doesn't have a chance on the reservation. But come next year we'll be back at the legislature trying to get video gaming in the bars if there are any left."

#### **✓ WMS GAMING AND BALLY GAMING STRIKE A DEAL**

On April 18, WMS Industries announced that its wholly owned subsidiary, WMS Gaming Inc. in Chicago, Ill., has reached an agreement in principle regarding the terms of a merger transaction of Bally Gaming in Las Vegas, Nev., in which shareholders of Bally Gaming will receive 0.6 shares of WMS common stock for each outstanding share of Bally Gaming common stock (about \$12 per share on the day of the announcement).

The transaction is subject to the completion of due diligence, regulatory approvals, the approvals of the boards of directors and stockholders of both companies, and the execution of a definitive merger agreement. The companies expect to reach a final agreement by mid-May.

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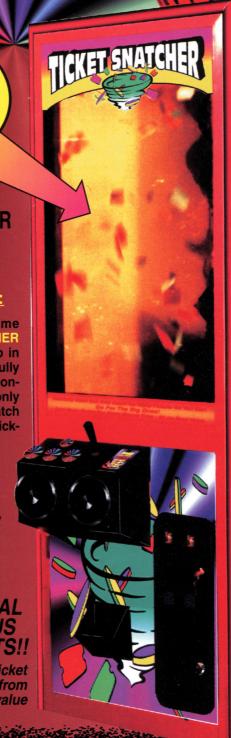

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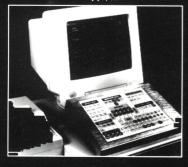

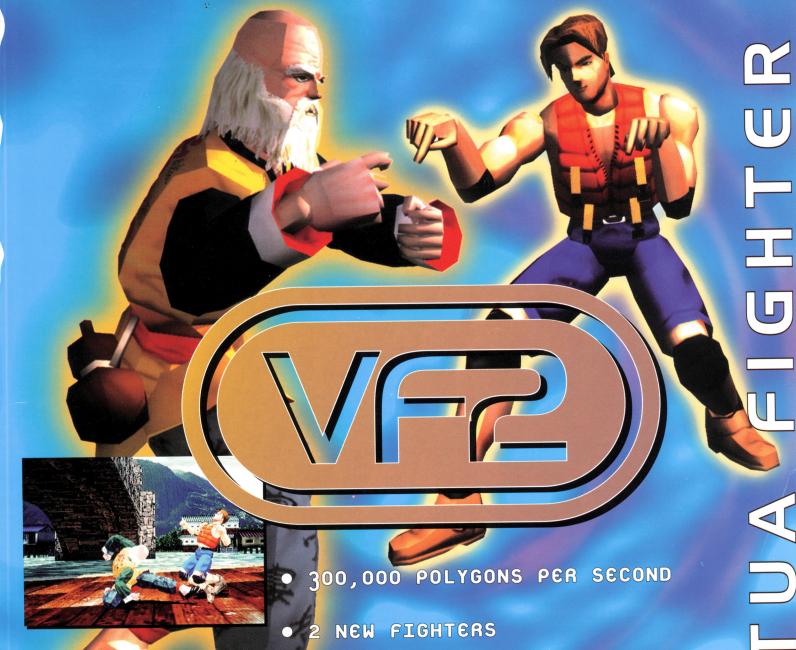

### Yes, that was my fault

he man was admitted to the hospital for amputation of his right foot, which had been injured severely in an accident. His apprehension was understandable, but he knew it would save his life. He had adjusted to what life would be like, balancing on crutches or using a prosthetic. At least, he rationed, I'll have one good foot!

The doctor tells his family the operation was a complete success. He was recovering quite nicely, and he'd be able to go home in two or three days. It wasn't until his family gathered at his bedside that they noticed the doctor had amputated the wrong foot. The staff scurried around, frantically calling the doctor, who was horrified at his mistake. Back to the operating

room where the remaining foot was removed.

In another hospital in another state, a woman is suffering from total kidney failure. She is blind and can't speak. Her doctor sees a tube protruding from her stomach, figures it's a feeding tube, and orders feeding solution pumped through it. When the fatal mistake comes to light—the "feeding" tube was actually a dialysis catheter—the patient is dead.

These are not isolated incidents, but are two that have been featured in the paper lately. Naturally, you are sympathizing with the patients

thizing with the patients and their families. Their lives have been forever altered because of carelessness. That they will suffer is a given. What about the doctors who caused it? That's another story altogether. Take doctor number two in the dialysis error: he was sentenced to prison. The American Medical Association and other doctors' groups have taken up an impassioned defense of him, claim-

ing that he is being subjected to unprecedented and unwarranted persecution. They say that criminal charges have wrongly replaced civil sanctions in this case.

Now ponder the case of a manic-depressive man accused of a brutal attack on a police officer. The man had apparently stopped taking his medicine, causing him to become violent. The judge ruled that the accused was not criminally responsible for the assault after a psychiatrist testified that he is not a threat to society as long as he is medicated. An outrage? Certainly. Unusual? Not a bit.

None of those involved in any of these

incidents have taken responsibility for their wrong-doing. It's always someone else's fault, and society is finding more and more people to blame. A cold-blooded killer now can claim he was abused as a child so his actions are not his responsibility. A young mother can murder her beautiful children and claim molestation by a stepfather contributed to her crime. Could the ultimate example be Michael Fay, who thought a life of crime in a foreign country would be tolerated as well as it is here? The shock of actually being fairly punished for his crimes sent people reeling. He was the Rodney King of the younger set with a much different ending.

The democrats and republicans can beat each other up all they want about whatever issue is popular, but nothing is going to change until society is called upon to take responsibility. Things happen and, yes, people do make mistakes. That's not the issue; it's how those mistakes are faced. It's the media that jumps in where fools fear to tread. Or maybe that should be where decent folks don't care to go. However, even those decent folks will take a peek; it's not their responsibility to turn the story off.

Does this really have anything to do with coin-op, you might be asking yourself. It has everything to do with it because our industry is part of society with similar motives and feelings. How many times have you heard someone complain that he can't make money because the manufacturers charge too much for games? How about manufacturers complaining because operators don't buy enough games?

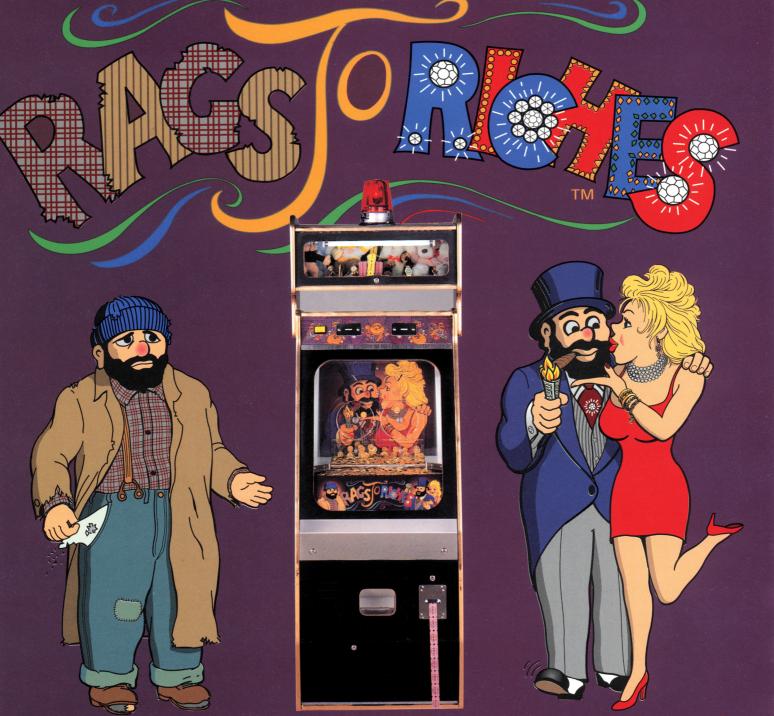
Before you get all mad at me for saying that your destiny is in your own hands, think about it awhile. When we were younger, the world was in our hands. Fate seldom dealt a cruel blow and our innocence was intact, if not quite understood. When something knocked the wind out of us, it was up to us to handle it. It was then that we grew up. 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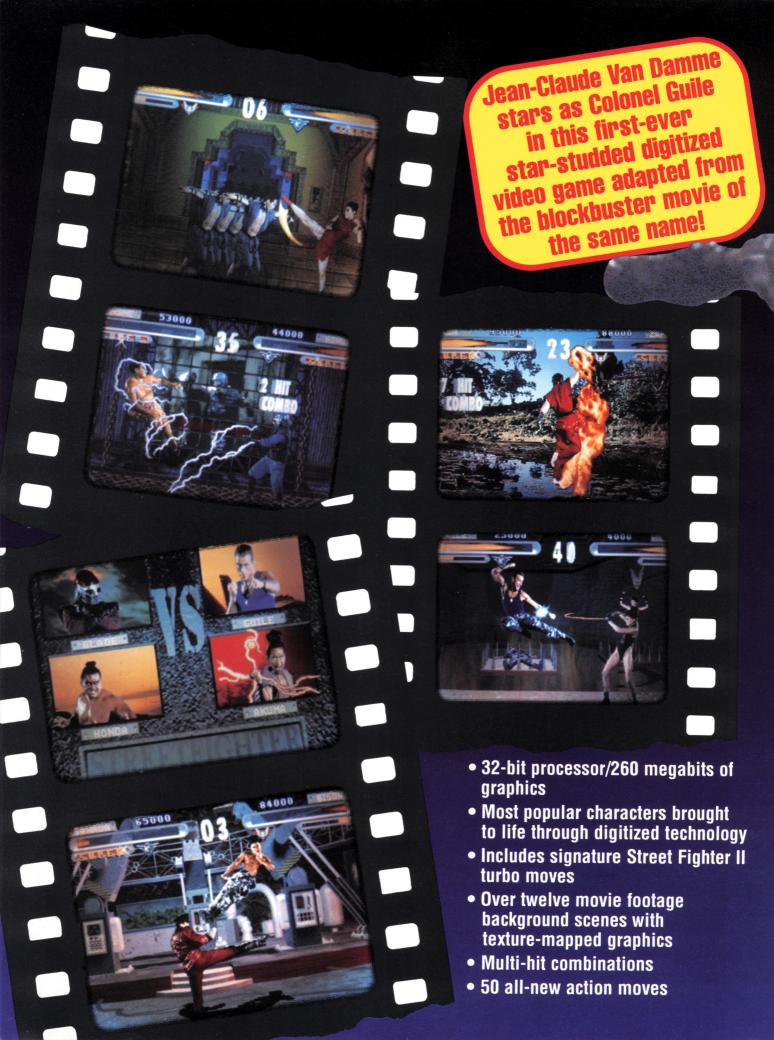
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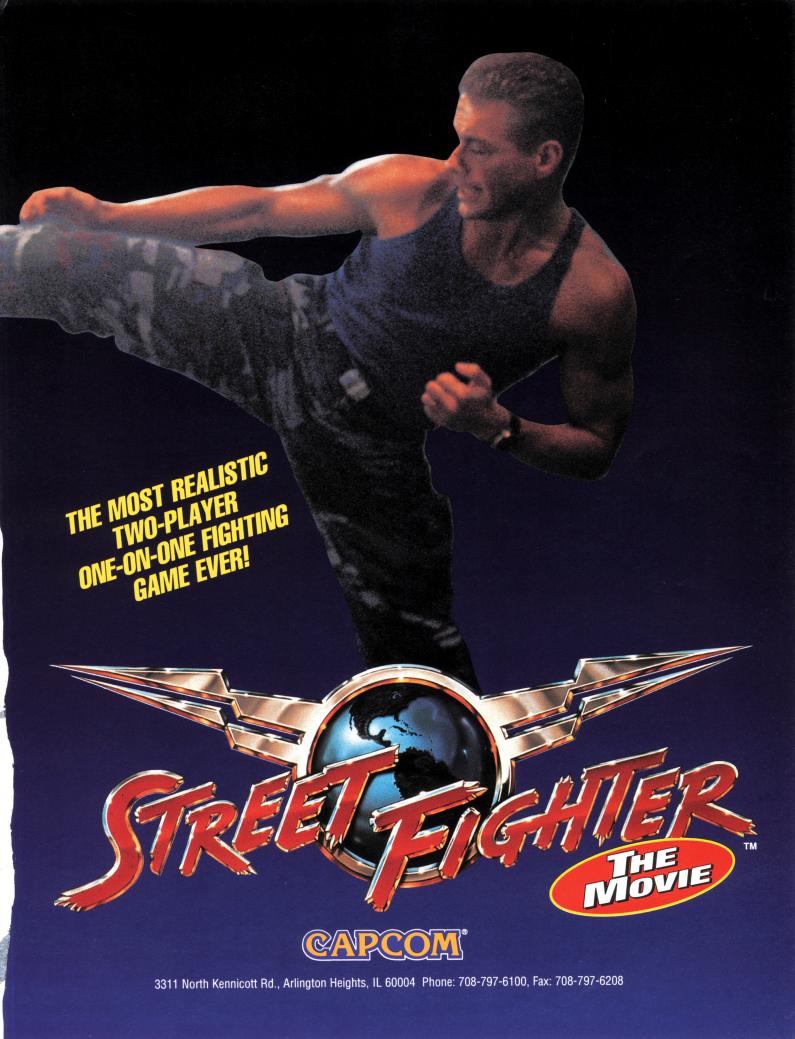

## Have redemption, will travel

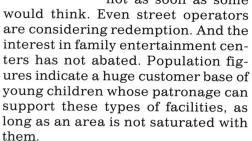
arry Gatlin of the Grammy Awardwinning Gatlin Brothers recently said in an interview, "These days, in country music, if you're over 25 and don't wear a hat, forget it."

That statement could be changed slightly to suit our industry, "These days, in the coin machine world, if you're an operator and don't have redemption games, forget it."

For several years in a row redemption equipment has dominated

trade show exhibit floors. The justpassed ACME '95 in Reno probably set a record. Not long ago booth spaces were crowded with cranes. Everyone and his brother were making cranes. Our files were overflowing with brochures on the latest companies to sprout from the woodwork with a new crane. Many came and went quickly.

How soon before the interest in redemption pales? Perhaps not as soon as some



Statistics compiled by the International Family Entertainment Center Association indicate that 80 percent of such facilities are still mom-and-poptype locations. Apparently, it's not true that large companies are taking over this segment of the business. The big guys are more likely to look at the major markets, meaning there are still growth opportunities in smaller communities.

Trade shows are not the only indica-

tor of the flourishing redemption craze. Our Spring Buyer's Guide of last month included a dizzying number of pages (70!) devoted to over 500 games suitable for fun centers. Here's a breakdown by page count for anyone keeping tabs: sports-themed games—7; coin pushers—3; alley bowlers—2; roll downs—3; coin drop—3; video redemption—1; non-ticket novelties—4; specialty machines and bulk vendors—7; cranes and rotaries—8; kiddie rides—16; and novelties (for children and adults)—17.

After a quick once-over it's clear where dramatic growth has occurred: in the last two categories. Kiddie rides and novelties have mushroomed in number. Coin drop games did not exist as a category until this year. Although the games occupied a mere three pages this time, look for more in the future. It seems that no manufacturer worth his weight in tokens can be without a coin drop unit in his stable of games.

Nor a redemption game without a progressive jackpot. Perhaps because nearly three-fourths of the 50 states have lotteries, the public in general is used to taking a chance on the big payoff and will gravitate to games that offer mega-tickets as well. Whatever the mentality, progressive jackpots are either built-in or optional on many redemption games, and available as kit updates for older games.

After ACME '93 I predicted a redemption game of the future: a giant gumball/baseball pitching machine with a progressive jackpot that paid out in pounds of gumballs instead of tickets. It's time to amend that prediction. How about this for a new redemption game: players shoot tokens at targets with one hand, bop licensed character heads that pop up at random with their other hand, and kick a soccer ball past a goalie with one foot—all at the same time. or nearly 20 years Merit Industries has set itself apart by manufacturing electronic dart and video games with the street operator in mind. Located in Bensalem, Pa., Merit is committed to producing innovative, high-quality equipment that best fits street operators' needs.

Company president Peter Feuer explains, "We understand the street operators' business needs. Operators want affordable, durable products with long-term return on investment."

Dave Myers, vice president of sales and marketing, added, "Merit understands the day-to-day challenges of the route operator. I've been there; I was one. Drawing from that experience, Merit has set up a network for immediate feedback in the form of operator surveys, maintenance reports, and daily income reports. Ideas from operators received on a Monday, for example, can find their way into a game by Friday. Merit's goal is to give the operator exactly what he wants."

Dave goes on to say, "We've heard that operators can work 15 to 18 months or more to recoup their initial investment on some equipment. We hear that with Merit games, the numbers are closer to

nine months or less. Nothing could better demonstrate our commitment to street operators."

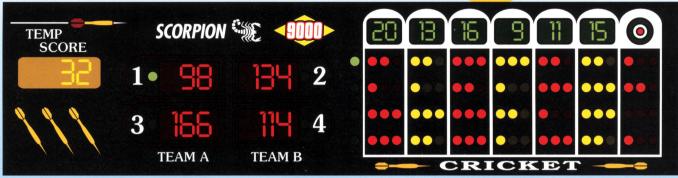
Merit has a long heritage of producing successful, affordable, and profitable games for street and tavern operators. Merit notes that its Trivia Whiz, released in the early '80s, revitalized the tavern market. Second only to Pac-Man, according to the company, Trivia Whiz launched Merit into national prominence. Merit went on to produce such hits as Phraze Craze, Match 'em Up, Sex Trivia, Trivia 1-5, Pit Boss, Super Pit Boss, Supertouch 30, Megatouch, Megatouch II, and the soon-to-be-released Megatouch III. The Megatouch series includes popular moneymakers like Run 21, Great Solitaire, Royal Flash, and Trivia Whiz 2000.

Merit's five-person sales team of Ron Hunt, Paul Chilopolous, Bob Lentz, Chuck West, and Tom Hines is constantly on the street talking with operators. Under the guidance of Dan McAllister, Merit's national director of sales and marketing, the sales team is educating operators on the long-term value of Merit's equipment. "The shorter return on investment with Merit products," said Dan, "allows the operator to reinvest and expand his markets much faster than with other products."

Merit credits its user-friendly approach to operators as the reason the company has seen a dramatic increase in sales of its touch-screen countertop over the last year. According to Dave, many operators even credit the game with reviving their tavern video business! To keep up with the evergrowing demand, Merit has increased its production staff. "We want to make certain that the product is there when operators need it," explained Dave.

even more, Merit makes a variety of kits that allow operators to turn their older games and cabinets into modern money-makers.

With the ever-popular 13-inch countertop style, the 19-inch upright version, and the newest 13-inch Cabaret game, operators can open doors to new markets by offering tavern owners a selection of sizes and designs to fit any location.

#### Advances in darting

As chief financial officer and general manager, part of Don Nogowski's job includes keeping the company up-to-date on the latest technological advances. "We have to keep up-to-date so we can keep our customers up-to-date," Dan declared.

Don gets excited when he talks about the company's new Electronic Data System (EDS), used to operate Merit dart leagues. "Operators no longer will need to spend time and money tabulating the dart league information; Merit's EDS will do it for them. This system will revolutionize the dart league industry," Dan explained.

"Merit is investing close to a half million dollars in technology to administer dart leagues from our headquarters," Dan added. "We will invest in personnel and equipment to establish a network of employees to organize leagues and carry out promotions. This is the only league management system that is totally hands-off for the operator."

As a manufacturer of dart game machines, Merit knows the difficulties operators have in finding the staff, time, and money to run successful dart leagues in addition to their normal coin-op business. The EDS system relieves operators of this responsibility, while allowing them to enjoy the profits of having dart leagues in their locations.

Dan explained briefly how the EDS system works: "The EDS is an automated system that operates through state-of-the-art fax servers. Instead of dart league players mailing in their score sheets, or having them collected by the operator, league captains will be able to fax their specially designed, easy-to-fill out score sheets directly to Merit's dart headquarters. Merit personnel then feed the score sheets into the computer and are able to return results to the operator within 24 hours. The EDS system takes league management responsibilities away from the operator, freeing him to spend more time with his business.

"As a bonus," Dan went on, "for each tavern that operates at least two dart leagues, Merit will supply the fax machine! Using new technology makes running leagues much less expensive; a 30 percent to 40 percent savings in fees can be passed on to the player."

The EDS is already in place to kick off the '95 dart league season.

#### What's ahead for '95?

"Every weekend a dart event will take place within the United States," states Jimmy Beyer, Merit's national director of promotions for darts. "Merit's regional dart promoters—Lucas Reeves, Bob Wiles, Scott Dougherty, Daniel Aymar, and Lane Helgeson—will be in the field educating and assisting operators with dart league startup, tournaments, and promotions.

"With the organization of this promotional "Dream Team" and the addition of 10 customized vans, look for Merit to run dozens of tournaments, complete with prize giveaways and huge promotions," said Beyer.

In an effort to increase the number of leagues out there, Merit is offering a special package: with a purchase of 10 Merit games, operators will get a dart promoter, who will stay on location for three to four weeks to get the program up and running.

After 20 successful years of making games that make money for street operators, Merit calls its EDS system just one more example of how the company is leading the way in responding to operators' needs. Operators reap the profits without the expenses. Now that's an offer that's hard to refuse!

### MK3 aims for new heights



In an age when knowledge equates to power, Williams Bally/Midway has embarked on a history-making marketing campaign designed to unlock previously unseen earning power in the coin-op market with its new game, *Mortal Kombat 3*.

The strategy includes a \$40 million feature film, an animated video, national television advertising on MTV, a live-action tour, and a barrage of print advertising in trade and player magazines.

"Right now the coin-op industry needs some fresh air," vice president of sales Joe Dillon told reporters during a press conference at ACME '95 to unveil the game. "We think it's an unprecedented program that is really designed to take this game as long and far as it can."

For operators, the good news is a window of opportunity between now and September, when the home game will be released. And even then, Williams will provide operators with a free CD-ROM update for the coinop games that will bring with it new moves, characters, and backgrounds not included in the software for the home.

based on the first two games, is scheduled for release in August, and the animated video will be available for retail in July. In addition, the liveaction road tour showcasing martial arts and illusion will kick off at Radio City Music Hall in September. Plans are to stage tournaments in conjunction with the tour at each of its stops around the country.

All of this is being described by the company as a carefully constructed strategy designed to bring video game players back to the arcade.

Coupling this with the mystique that will surround secret combat codes, to be covertly included in the movie, live tour, and advertising, is sure to generate unparalleled interest, Dillon said. "We think this will drive

players back for more and more."

"We all know the kids out there are already waiting for MK3," added game designer John Tobias. "Our hope is to break that market open even more and expand it."

Drawing on input from its operator and distributor committees, the company is putting out MK3 as a kit as well. Dillon said with so many previous Mortal Kombat cabinets already on location, it only made sense. "It evolves around staying in touch with the needs out there," he said.

Operator response at ACME was positive for the most part. "With anything new like this there will be some mistakes," said one large midwestern operator. "But when the first attempt is this impressive, it can only be

good for the industry."

Other manufacturing companies, operators also said, should take note of the way Williams has structured its promotional campaign to fit their needs.

Nevertheless, while the promotional campaign may be the vehicle to catapult *MK3* into a higher earnings bracket, the company insists that it is the quality and integrity of the game itself that will keep it there.

The secret codes, game designers said, will help players unlock powers that will add up to a million possible combinations. Also new is a run button, which will allow for faster, more intense play. Bi-level play, allowing game characters to be sent hurtling into a differ-

ent background, is another added attraction.

MK3 features a total of 17 characters, seven of them brand new warriors. Classic favorites returning for action include Kano, Sonya, Liu Kang, Shang Tsung, Kung Lao, Jax, and Sub Zero.

Game designers have been hard at work on these innovations since last June, and when the game was put on test at a Chicago arcade it brought in over \$1,300 in one week, they said.

As the third in a series, *MK3* offers twice as many hidden features and 50 percent more image memory for smoother animation than its predecessor. Designers have also employed more animalities, babalities, friendships, fatalities, and secret moves per character.

"We concentrated on superior game play for maximum operator earnings, while using the latest technology to respond to player demand," explained game designer Ed Boon. "All action is packed into 11 3-D rendered backgrounds for maximum visual entertainment, along with the challenge players have come to expect from our

games."

Boon added that game play has been revised to reward more aggressive play based on player suggestions.

Responding to questions from the press, Boon discounted any potential operator fears arising from circulated move sheets that might shorten the life of the game.

"That's a nice problem to have, that kids are interested enough to write things down," he commented.

Another industry concern that should not be a problem, according to the company, is the issue of violent content. Dillon said the game will have the official AAMA parental notification about the game content included in the attract mode.

"There is no controversy because we have fulfilled our obligation," he said. "It's up to the parents."

Dillon also refused to confirm or deny rumors that the game would be put out on the Sony home platform but did say that ultimately it will be distributed by Williams on other platforms.

#### WMS Gaming gets Illinois license

WMS Gaming has recently been granted a supplier's license by the Illinois Gaming Board to supply electronic gaming devices to riverboat casinos in the state.

The company, a wholly-owned subsidiary of WMS Industries, manufactures two complete lines of casino gaming machines. 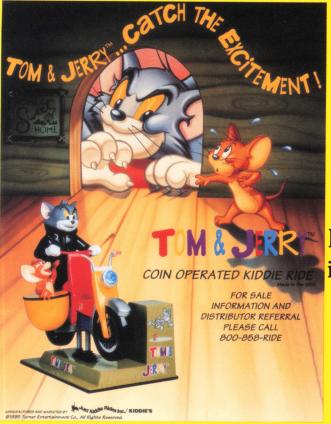

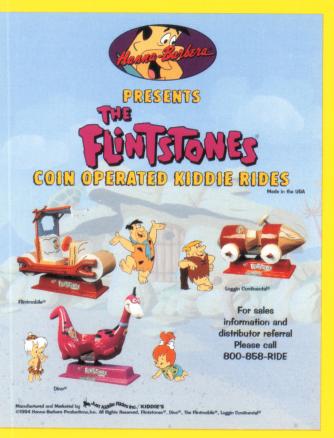
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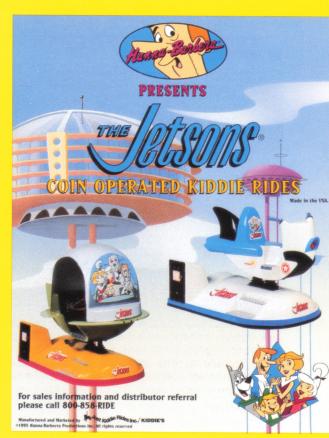

#### CD technology advances made

Automated Wagering Intl. (AWI), a subsidiary of Video Lottery Technologies, has been given the contract to operate the on-line systems for the Arizona lottery.

AWI replaces GTECH, which has run the lottery since its inception in 1983. The annual amount of the contract is reported to be approximately \$6.2 million.

"This award is a validation of our technology and management services," said AWI president Mark Cushing.
"Arizona is similar to other states in that they want the most advanced technology, creative marketing support, and competitive prices. We have proven that we can deliver these vital features."

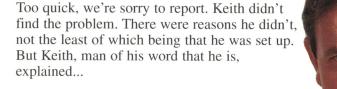

### **Dollar coin tops** legislative agenda

The chairman of the House Banking Subcommittee on Domestic and International Policy, Michael Castle of Delaware, has announced that hearings will be held on dollar coin legislation.

The measure has also been included by Rep. John Kasich, who chairs the Budget Committee, in a list of recommended savings. This list is being looked at as a blueprint for this year's federal budget.

A hearing on the issue is expected to occur early this month. AMOA staffers and members spent much of last month holding meetings with congressional representatives in their home districts.

Members are also being urged to contact members of the subcommittee to rally support for the proposed legislation.

Members of the committee include: Bob Barr (Georgia), Dick Chrystler (Michigan), Floyd Flake (New York), John Fox (Pennsylvania), Barney Frank (Massachusetts), Sue Kelly (New York), Joe Kennedy (Massachusetts), Frank LoBiondo (New Jersey), Frank Lucas (Oklahoma), Caroline Maloney (New York), Bob Nev (Ohio), Lucille Roybal-Allard (California), Edward Rovce (California). Bernard Sanders (Vermont), and Melvin Watt (North Carolina).

Sponsoring the bill are Jim Colby of Arizona and Estevan Tores of California.

Dollar coin legislation will be the key focus of the Government Affairs Conference held in Washington May 21-23.

#### In other legislative news:

- A House bill was introduced seeking a moratorium on new Indian gaming compacts until a standard compact and national commission have been set up.
- The AMOA announced that it will establish an interim parental advisory sticker program to address the video game content issue. The program will be based on guidelines the AAMA has requested manufacturers to include in the attract mode of video games. At press time, the details of the sticker program had not been finalized.
- Proposed legislation in Montana that would have increased the gross tax from 15 to 30 percent on video gaming machines, as well as a bill authorizing the establishment of a central monitoring system for the machines, was defeated. At press time, a bill that would increase the payout on poker machines from \$100 to \$800 was still pending. Keno machines can currently pay up to \$800 in the state.
- A bill authorizing video lottery in hospitality establishments in Minnesota passed the House Subcommittee on Gambling. The legislation provides for state-run machines that would be serviced by private companies.

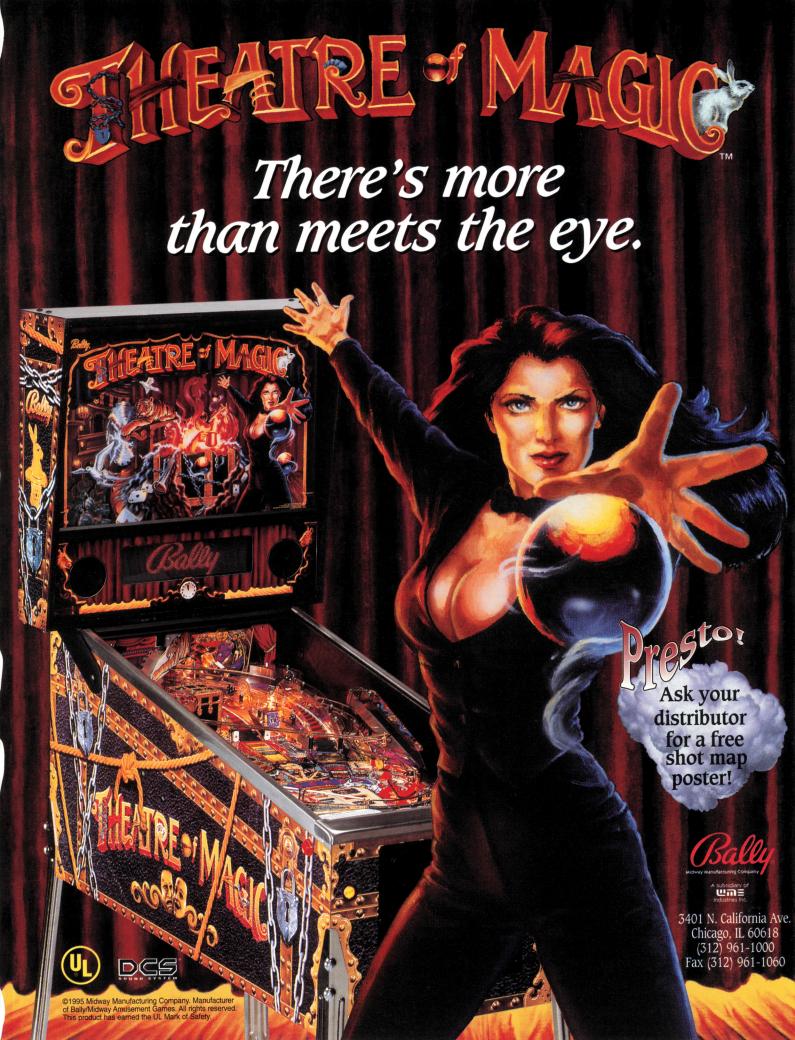

# LAI embarks on Asian expansion

Leisure Allied Industries, a leading manufacturer and distributor of coin-op equipment in Australia, will embark on a major expansion into Southeast Asia targeting Indonesia and Singapore at first.

The 33-year-old company employs a staff of over 700, includes a network of 64 Timezone stores, and operates in commercial outlets.

LAI's manufacturing in Indonesia will initially be assembly only, located in Jakarta. Plans are to establish a total manufacturing plant similar to the Australian facility, within

three years. The company has had a presence in Singapore for 18 months.

LAI also has joint ven-

ture negotiations underway with other Asian countries. The company sees the potential for establishing 150 to 200 locations in India and 20 locations in Malaysia in the next five years.

# Arcades damaged in Kobe earthquake

Arcades and amusement parks are among the victims of the earthquake that ravaged the Japanese cities of Kobe and Nishinomiya earlier this year.

A two-month survey of the areas conducted by Japan's *Game Machine* magazine reveals that "at least 14 arcades were destroyed or rendered unsafe and had to be torn down. Of these, two were destroyed outright and hundreds of games were lost due to building collapse

and fire. In addition, more than 200 games were destroyed in at least 30 street locations."

Twelve facilities housing arcades were either partially destroyed or rendered unsafe. Access to amusement parks has been hindered, causing difficulties for both the facilities and the arcades within the parks. Lack of transportation and communications to the damaged areas are slowing the pace of recovery.

# Canada's Cineplex to enter the FEC market

Canada's Cineplex Odeon Corp. of Toronto, Ontario, has declared plans to augment its current in-theater amusement game business and enter the FEC market.

To further that goal, the company has appointed Grant Nielsen as its director of North American amusement games.

Nielsen's responsibilities will include developing amusement game strategies for new locations, optimizing revenue from existing games, and designing dedicated family-oriented entertainment centers adjacent to key multiplexes.

In other Cineplex news, the company recently announced its intent to merge with Cinemark USA Inc. When this transaction is complete, the combined entity will be named Cineplex International Corp.

Cineplex owns and operates motion picture cinemas and related food service concessions in six
Canadian provinces,
14 U.S. states, and the District of Columbia, for a total of 1,617 screens in 354 locations.

In summary, Sandy Bettelman said the post-expo events should spell good things for the coin-op industry. "We received a lot of orders on equipment that was being shown for the first time and a number of renewed orders on equipment that has been on the market for a while," he said.

# ACME 195 Hall the fun was getting these to have a show even when the weather is good," pointed out one

The topic of discussion was not the games, it wasn't the seminars, it wasn't even Reno. The hot question was "where did you get stuck

Wednesday night?" Why? The Reno airport was snowbound with incoming blizzards and flights were few and far between if any. The Reno Hilton, the host hotel, reported over 500 no-shows that night. We're talking, course, about the American Coin Machine Expo (ACME), held in Reno the end of March.

Once everyone finally made it to Reno the next day, they had an adventure to tell. In

fact, here's a small sampling of what people did to get to Reno: traveled by train from Seattle; by train from Las Vegas; re-routed to Salt Lake City; after two passes in a snowstorm, the last plane finally sets down in Reno before the airport is closed; stuck in California—Fresno, San Jose, Oakland, Sacramento, San Francisco; spent the night in Dallas; flew past Reno in a snowstorm and stayed over in some surrounding city; derailed in Denver; slept in the Phoenix airport; rented a limousine and drove from Las Vegas: staved in Las Vegas: and drove from Lake Tahoe on the last open highway.

And then there were Play Meter's Steve White and Valerie Cognevich who said the heck with it, rented a car, and toured Sedona, Ariz. "We heard the Reno airport was closed and would be all night. The clincher is that there were no

rooms in Phoenix, so we rented a car and drove out of town. And why not do a little sight-seeing while we're at it!" they said.

OK, by Thursday, everyone who wanted to had finally made it into Reno, and the show was on. After sharing war stories about trying to get to Reno, conversations turned to the business at hand, ACME '95. Tami Norberg-Paulson, president of AMOA, said, "The only good thing about having this show in Reno is that those who complained to me about AMOA being in San Antonio said even San Antonio was better!"

Comments about Reno did not let up. "This place is a terrible city

to have a show even when the weather is good," pointed out one attendee." "The locals are so rude!" exclaimed another. But as bleak as some made it seem, show organizers insisted it wasn't that bad. Here are the numbers: 797 distributors, 1,080 arcade operators, 975 route operators, 111 other operators, and 147 technicians. That brings that

category total to just over 3,000, better, they said, than the previous year. In addition, there were 552 people from 38 countries. and over 4,000 exhibitors, manufacturers, suppliers, and guests. "We're not happy with the weather, said ACME show committee chairman, Bill Cravens of Bulldog Amusements. "but all in all we're up a bit. We didn't think anyone was going to make it!"

In fact, ACME representatives

explained that plans for Reno were made several years ago and "the show has grown so much." They added that the future may hold a more constant home for the ACME show. ACME '96 is scheduled for Orlando and ACME '97 is planned for Las Vegas. Both locations are being studied as potentially permanent.

And while many would argue that numbers don't lie, it was not a group of happy campers that had their say about the show in these comments:

"There's not a lot new here and what's here is priced too high."

"It doesn't matter what I like. It's important to know what the

players want."

"The market is still driven by video; it's the biggest part of the market and what happens there has an impact on all of us to some extent."

"I'm staying with basics right now because at least I know I'll

make money. Looking at equipment is a waste of time. So why am I here at all? I'm here to talk to fellow operators about how they are doing. It's hard to find them at this show. Those that I do see are telling me things are terrible."

Now maybe those were negative comments, but there were quite a few positive ones:

"Some operators are looking for a miracle. If they don't see it within the first few hours, they say there's nothing at the show. They still whine that redemption is not for them. It's the miracle they have been waiting for, but they have their eyes closed."

"If operators could just get past

the videos to see the other equipment. As a small manufacturer, I'm a realist. If I sell three games to new people, the show has been a success for me."

"I come to the show with an open mind. I come for ideas. I never go home without fresh ideas. If I find

"I come to the show with an open mind. I come for ideas. If I find good equipment, that's a bonus."

good equipment, that's a bonus."

Other comments focused on the used equipment market:

"There is a lot of orphan equipment on the market from companies that had a good concept but went out of business and from FECs that have closed."

"I read one of your editorials where you said there might one day be a glut of equipment as FECs were weeded out. Well, I'm here to tell you that ay has come."

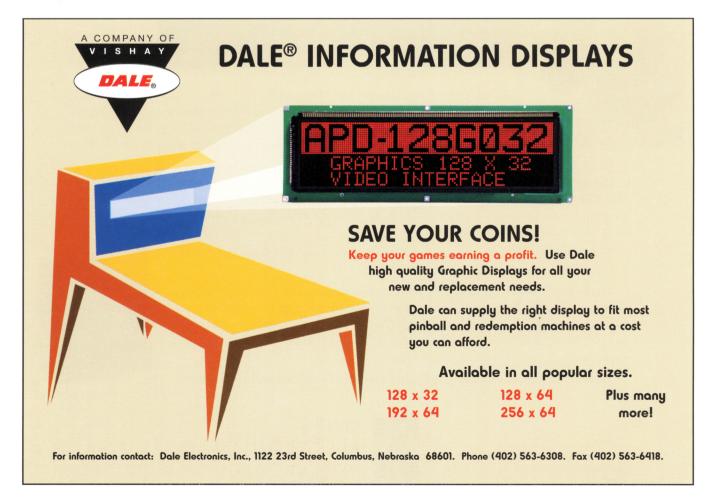
"As costly as equipment is, especially video games, I am forced to wait for someone who could afford it to begin with to sell it on the used market. That's worked pretty well in the past, but I don't see those

games being sold soon enough. I do see some redemption equipment and pinballs but not enough used videos."

Cravens said, "We're trying to expand in ways that will help the operator. Operators need more than just another product show today. That's

why the mission of the show committee is to continue to develop new and innovative programs."

He added, "While exhibitor attendance and space is bound to get smaller as companies' show budgets decrease, ACME will continue to pursue quality services like the TechFest, coupon book, and treasure hunt."

The American Amusement Machine Association presented awards to American Vending Sales as the "Distributor of the Year" and Valley Recreation as "Manufacturer of the Year."



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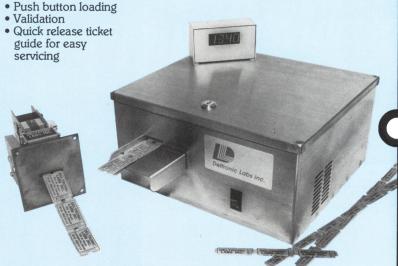
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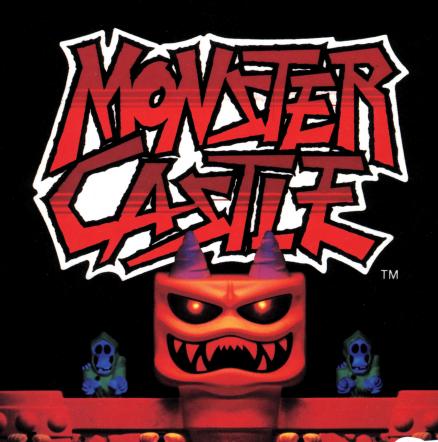

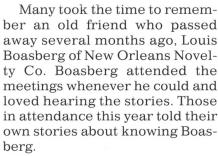

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# Redemption field trip satisfies idea-seekers

One hundred stalwart souls braved the elements the day before the show to visit four family entertainment centers in the Reno area: Circus Circus Midway, Boomtown Family Fun Center, Fun Quest at the Reno Hilton, and Clarion Entertainment Fun Center.

For the second year, Rhonda Fletcher of ARMS International and Sue Monday of Spirit Designs organized this pre-show event that recognizes the current interest in fun centers and the need for more knowledge about this segment of the amusement industry.

The first redemption field trip at ACME '94 in Rosemont, Ill., was a resounding success. Plans are already underway for an equally impressive third outing of this nature at ACME '96 in Orlando. Fla.

Following is a brief description of attractions offered at each of the four Reno locations.

Circus Circus Midway: Group race games are plentiful in the 35,000-square-foot fun center; a separate area is provided for video games in another part of the hotel. One

of the few coin-op redemption games is Bromley's *Wheel 'M In*—a dozen are banked together in a fashion similar to the multiplayer race games.

Says shift manager Candace Copple, "Don't be afraid to bank games. Our Wheel 'M In games are doing fantastic." That success is leading management to consider adding more coin-op equipment.

Other familiar coin-op games include Lazer-Tron's *Pogger* rotary, cranes, and a bank of 11 alley bowlers under the name Circus Bowl. Of the traditional midway-style games, the 28-player station Fascination is by far the biggest draw. Players can even win sets of china.

Plush is king; every size, shape, character, and color are represented. Items are changed constantly, and players can trade-up for larger prizes. Merchandise is geared to the game; for example, basketball games award sportsthemed plush. Cameras are everywhere for security reasons. Management and staff circulate throughout the center at all times. The center uses cash

As in other Circus Circus locations in Nevada, live circus acts perform in the middle of the center every 20 minutes.

Signs are plentiful, meaning it is clear what you are playing, what is required to win, and what your prize will be. instead of tokens. A snack bar temporarily closed due to remodeling is scheduled to reopen in another part of the center.

The real, live, walking symbol of Circus Circus is Canoli the Clown, who greets customers and interacts with



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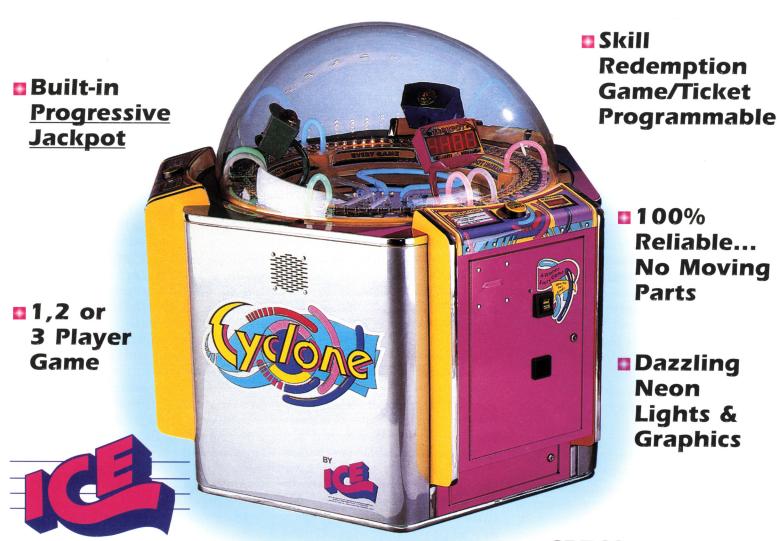
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children. He is also a goodwill ambassador for Circus Circus within the community.

Boomtown Family Fun Center: A Western-themed 35,000-square-foot family fun center that houses over 100 video, arcade, and redemption games; an 18-hole indoor miniature Ghost Town golf course: a replica of an antique carousel: and a 40-seat Dvnamic Motion Theater simulator with hydraulically-powered seats that move in sync with the action on the screen in five thrilling adventures (Runaway Train, Roller Coaster, Devil's Mine Ride, Cosmic Pinball, and Desert Duel). An indoor ferris wheel will be added this spring.

A large party room that accommodates 100 people is an integral part of this FEC. It is ideal for children's parties, but also for graduations, banquets, adult meetings, and other group functions. The Tumbleweed Pizza Cafe offers more than specialty pizzas, and a jukebox in the center of the action provides a musical break.

The redemption counter is "awesome" as young customers are apt to say. You can find everything from 10-point rubber lizards and 150-point plastic swords up to 400-point Star Trek figures, 4,000-point plush, and a 15,000-point mountain bike.

A local operating company, Tip Top Amusement Co., provides the video games. All games operate on tokens, which are also good in bulk vendors. Rides require the purchase of tickets. An unlimited passport for one day includes continuous use of the carousel, Motion Theater, Ghost Town Golf, and \$2 in tokens. The center has been open for two years.

Fun Quest: Currently at 33,000 square feet, the center is undergoing an expansion that will bring it to 35,000 square feet.

table games among them) into a 10,000-square-foot space originally designed as an adult sports and entertainment area above the casino.

"Party rooms are not only for children's birthdays. They can be marketed for graduations, sports banquets, adult meetings, and other group functions."

Included are Krazy Kars; Namco's Galaxian Theater and a bank of Ace Driver deluxe simulators: a giant ticket and redemption counter: a 4,500-square-foot Kid Quest kiddie zone with battery-powered Mason cars; a host of redemption and video games; and Q-Zar, the laser tag-style game that lets players "zap" opponents without harm but with a great accumulation of points.

Several party packages are available. The center offers the Quest Club membership that affords discounts as well as invitations to special events. Just outside of the entrance to Fun Quest are several food emporiums in the Reno Hilton.

Security is a priority. Visitors must pass through a metal detector as they enter. Tip Top Amusement Co. provides most of the coin-op games for the facility, as well as three employees in the center at all times to assure that games are kept running. Fun Quest opened in July 1994.

Clarion Entertainment Fun Center: The smallest of the four centers, this one packs 59 redemption games and 20 non-redemption games (deluxe sit-down videos and Ten TV monitors tuned to coverage of sporting events attest to this earlier vision.

The focus shifted to more of a children's facility, with a heavy dose of ticket-dispensing games, and a '50s diner atmosphere at the Snack & Deli-Bar Soda Fountain, where an attendant said the burgers and fish and chips rated tops with kids while moms preferred salads.

Plans for the summer call for the addition of a party room, a 2,200 square-foot soft play area, and 30 more coinop games. The center opened in September 1994.

Each location was different from its nearby neighbor but all shared two things in common: constantly adding or improving attractions and frequently changing prize merchandise. In other words, they do not remain static but strive to keep customers interested in returning for another enjoyable visit.

Idea-seekers came away with plenty of new information on various aspects of FEC operation, from the color of tokens to snack bar fare and from prize displays to the value of birthday party rooms.

At the helm of the three-day event was Play Meter technical writer Randy Fromm, whose countenance could be seen on bilingual instructional videos from one end of the exhibit space to the other.

Also exhibiting their services at TechFest were Capcom, Hantarex, Micro Manufacturing, Pentranic, Time Warner Interactive, Valley Recreation, Sencore, Wells-Gardner Electronics, Wico, and Williams Bally/Midway.

The verdict at the close of the

One of the best-kept industry secrets is out of the bag: Steve Epstein of The Broadway Arcade in New York, N.Y., is the winner of Play Meter's Ralph C. Lally II Operator of the Year award for outstanding dedication and service to the coin-op amusement machine industry.

Epstein was but one honoree at the all-show cocktail party on the opening day of the expo. It was also the occasion for Play Meter to present awards of excellence for six outstanding games, and for the American Amusement Machine Association to present its silver, gold, diamond, and platinum game awards.

The Operator of the Year award was a well-guarded secret. Play Meter enlisted the assistance of Michael Gottlieb of Williams Bally/Midway to ensure Epstein would be present.

Epstein has logged 30 years in the industry and still wears a change apron and works the night shift.

In a Coinman Interview in March 1994 he credited his suc-

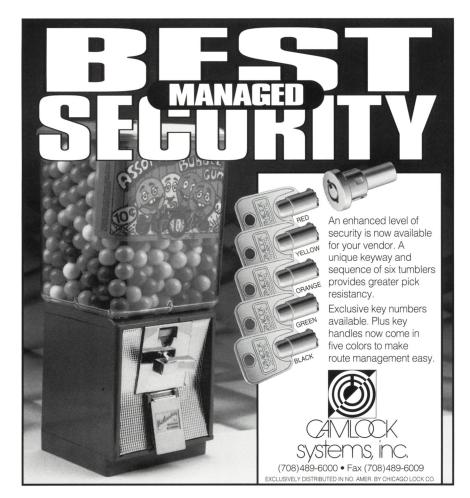

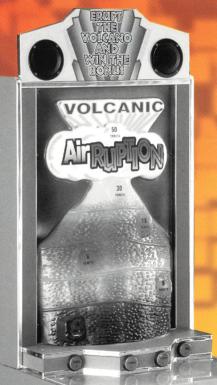

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# The wonderful world of redemption merchandise

Spring is sprung, the grass is riz, I wonder where all the cool merchandise is? As we all know, spring certainly was nowhere to be found in Reno, especially for those of us un-

fortunately detained in some other part of the country wondering whether we would ever get to the show.

After finally touching down at the airport Thursday morning, with four hours of sleep and a courtesy overnight kit from the airline, I arrived at the show dead on my feet. However, my travel ordeal was well worth the wait.

Between all the glitz and glamour of "The Biggest Little City in the World" (and an occasional slot machine or six) I got to peruse all the neat new stuff for which our customers will be knocking down the doors. So you ask, "Francine, what's it going to be this year?"

There was so much cool merchandise at the show that it is difficult to describe everything, but I'll do my best. The unique always captures my attention, and there was plenty.

When I walked into the Ace/Acme booth a six-foot Sylvester was looking down at me as if to say, "Sufferin' succotash, you look just like Tweety Bird." I saw quite a few other licensed Looney Tunes keychains, yo-yos, paddleboards shaped as characters, playing cards, and licensed character

families that ranged from a 6" size that fits in your pocket to six-foot tall characters that would excite a child to no end. Imagine being that child's parent, trying to make the toy fit into the Honda Accord and then deciding where to put it after getting home! Time for one of those famous devices used by Wile E. Coyote.

I found more licensed merchandise at Play By Play Toys & Novelties, including sculpted play faces (soft and hugable, lightweight pillows) in the shape of the Pink Panther, Bozo the Clown, Sonic the Hedgehog, Felix the Cat, Lambchop, Fred Flintstone and Dino (my personal favorites), as well as Animaniacs, Power Rangers, and Betty Boop.

Something familiar to every TV watcher are the ever-popular Coca-Cola polar bears. Play By Play has these lovable, collectible animals, and now you can too.

How about a small Coca-Cola theme in your operation using these bears and Lazer-Tron's new Coca-Cola Ring Toss game? And for all of the Harley fans you can offer Harley Davidson hogs, which are stuffed pigs wearing Harley jackets that are as cute as can be.

Another rebirth of an older cartoon character is being marketed by HMS Monaco with the addition of Casper the Friendly Ghost to the company's line. Well-known for manufacturing their own costume and novelty jewelry, this firm creates reasonably-priced rotary kits that include items that appeal to a wide variety of customers.

The Spinner is a continually entertaining novelty, which is also a relaxing stress reliever. It's an item that once picked up is difficult to put down. Duzall Toys carries this unique item, which many of you have probably seen me carrying around at the last several shows. It can be customized with your company logo or used for any fund-raiser. Duzall also carries a wide variety of milk caps that may be personalized to create a neat giveaway or promotion.

Who better to merchandise a LAX rotary machine than Noel Industries, the maker of the game? Noel specializes in novelty pre-packs for games. These items are hand-picked and put together with the neatest novelty items, so there is nothing boring about these kits.

I also found some interesting new gadgets at Bonita Marie International—Klixx Sticks. So you ask, what is a Klixx Stick? Well so did I, but soon found myself playing with this bendable, movable, shapable thinga-ma-bob, which can be unsnapped and resnapped with another to form an even longer one, truly making it a habitforming toy. I even saw a salesman making a fashion statement by wearing some as bracelets and a necklace. They went well with your suit, sir.

Rebecca's, a merchandise company that carries a wide variety of items, had one that really caught my attention. For those of you who provide birthday parties, Rebecca's party kit contains a five-piece place setting that includes a 9 oz. drink cup, 6" plate, beverage napkin, placemat, and spork (a

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spoon/fork combination). All of these items are decorated with a juggling clown or a skating panda and are available at an unbelievable price: 14-1/2 cents per place setting! That makes a 10-place setting for as little as \$1.45.

Other impressive items here were telephones shaped like an order of french fries, a slice of pizza, a puppy dog, and a kitten. This is a prize for today's child.

Young and old football fans will appreciate Rhode Island Novelty's oversized inflatable NFL helmets, an item every sports fan should not live without. I see quite a few children, even as young as four and five, who adamantly support their favorite team. These inflatable helmets will surely appeal to them.

It's always good to see new merchandise firms in our industry, and I would like to extend a personal welcome to several that I discovered at the show. These firms seem to be making a real effort to fill a niche by offering items that have never been seen in a redemption display.

One of the neatest new items was a colorful T-shirt wrapped in cord to form the shape of a lollipop, snake, alligator, or fish, offered by Kemac Distributing. After the shirt is molded into shape, it is tie-dyed in bright fluorescent colors, then displayed in marketable packaging. These items seem to be so cool that most customers will not want to cut the cords to reveal the shirt.

I found more interesting merchandise at One Stop Inc., which carries licensed characters from "The Pagemaster" movie as well as Beavis and Butt-head items in the form of plush, figurines, mugs, pencils, and sipper straws. For locations that cater to younger children,

new Sesame Street merchandise should prove popular.

While sorting through all the different items I came across another rather interesting novelty. When I inquired about the funny-looking, rubber bandloaded, big-toothed keychains, I was told they were Chomper Keychains. Although I haven't the slightest clue as to whether they serve any useful purpose, they really make a perfect guard for anyone's keys. Who would think twice about stealing your keys with their fingers in jeopardy?

worth mentioning. One in particular was the animal tail in a bag. This novelty accurately resembles a cat, raccoon, or rodent that has made its way into the sack and is rummaging around for something to eat. You really must see this one!

Place it in an obvious spot, perhaps inside a potato chip bag, so your customers will gape in amazement as the little fellow tries to find himself some dinner!

How about a more adult-oriented stress relieving device? In several booths I found Chi-

Patriot Novelty Co. specializes in pre-packs that provide both quality and color appeal. All are personally selected and color coordinated by the owner herself, who truly takes pride in her products. Custom-designed pre-packs, which can include licensed characters, are available at the customer's request.

Mei Da Toys, another new company, impressed me with quality and colorful soft plush at reasonable prices.

Ceramic World, although not a new company, made its merchandise debut. Some ceramics are hot items, but need to be displayed in a bright case and in multiple quantities. I recommend some especially good ceramics, which include unicorns, teddy bears, picture frames, clowns, ducks, puppies, and kittens.

There were also quite a few items offered by more than one merchandise firm that were nese relaxation balls in different sizes. They are alleged to have therapeutic effects. These balls, available in either polished metal or cloisonne, create a soothing sound when worked around in the hand. I've met individuals who have been able to manipulate several sets at once.

I was shocked (quite literally) to find a set offered by Noel Industries that even produced a light electric shock when used, although I don't know whether the effect is therapeutic or just a gag.

On another note, who ever thought that milk caps would have become the rage? Milk caps, although a little more extravagant than their more utilitarian predecessors, are popping up everywhere.

Not only have they been appearing in FECs and amusement centers, but also in hobby shops, gaming stores, comic



book and sports card stores trying to cash in on this fad. Even a local tobacco shop here in Frederick, Md., proudly displays their milk caps. Although these actually surfaced more than three years ago, they only caught on recently.

Our old friend the Slinky is still popular, especially in new shapes like stars and hearts and in neon colors. Balancing birds on pedestals, and Nutty Putty (reminiscent of silly putty although not sticky), are also worth mentioning and can help give your redemption center a wider assortment of interesting and desirable merchandise.

More than anything, you must remember that the best prizes in the world will not move as well if not properly merchandised. As I've mentioned before, bright, colorful, and well-organized displays are a must.

Don't merely place items in a

box and expect them to sell. Try to have cases that follow a theme, and arrange the merchandise in a manner that will draw attention. It really works!

If you missed any of this merchandise at the show, or missed the show entirely and would like to see all this cool stuff for yourself, give the companies a call. You can never have too many catalogs, and most firms are more than happy to help you get as many as you need.

# Prized predictions: more "hot" merchandise

Ultimately, the players vote with their tickets and decide what prizes are most desirable. To stay one step ahead of the hunt, Play Meter canvassed the exhibit floor and talked to merchandise suppliers to find out what items they predict will draw players to redemption counters, and games, this spring and summer.

Ace/Acme: "Looney Tunes!" was the first thought from Rorie Keller. Those familiar characters are available in plush, on T-shirts and hard goods (pencils, yo-yos, superballs, frisbees), and on inflatable baseball bats and hammers. Also, Animaniacs characters Yakko, Wakko, and their sister Dot. In anticipation of the Disney animated film, "Pocahontas," due for summer release, expect Indian dolls to be popular collectibles.

Bonita Marie: Klixx Sticks, or the "ultimate fidget widget." It's a plastic chain that you can click together or pull apart. Pocahontas items will also do well, as will Harley Davidson items to address the growth in the adult-themed locations. Kids are also collecting rainbow-colored rotary dishes.

Duzall Toys: David Marcus mused, "Obviously milk caps will be the hottest item for the summer. We have a wide variety and can customize." He added that small toys such as collectible cars will do well in cranes and redemption counters.

Goffa International: Paul Lam is looking forward to the "Pocahontas" movie, stocking Indian bears in three sizes (8", 12", 16") and raccoons in three sizes (8", 10", 12").

HMS Monaco: For the coming year items connected with Disney's "Pocahontas" are expected to sell extremely well. Plush items will include Indians, raccoons, Pocahontas dolls, drinking cups, and other collectibles.

Hugfun International: The company's biggest sellers are animal figure plush (bear, mouse, koala, dog, elephant). Newest is a baby bear with a pacifier that fits into its mouth, available with either pink or blue bib and diapers.

Maxson: Caught in the Sac is sure to draw interest. It features a furry animal tail hanging out of a brown paper bag. Tail-wagging action is generated by a battery-powered motorized gyro.

Mei Da Toys: "Lions are big right now. In the future we will have raccoons when the movie 'Pocahontas' comes out," said Mel Posin.

NANCO: Stephen Lipkin pointed to Bounceables, inflatable plush basketballs emblazoned with NBA team names, available in two sizes: 7-1/2" and 18". These can be rolled up deflated for use in cranes or inflated for an impressive display above midway games and on redemption counter walls.

Noel Industries: Hockey pucks are popular nationwide, said Chris Noell, especially those bearing the name of either the Anaheim Mighty Ducks or the Los Angeles Kings. The company also does a brisk business in milk cap kits for rotary capsules.

One Stop Redemption: Richard Tyler looks for great interest in the characters from "The Pagemaster" movie (Adventure, Fantasy, and Horror), available in plush and hard goods such as mugs, pencil-toppers, and desk figures.







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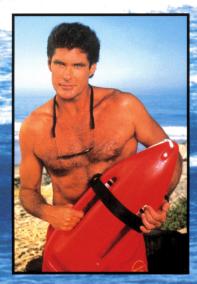
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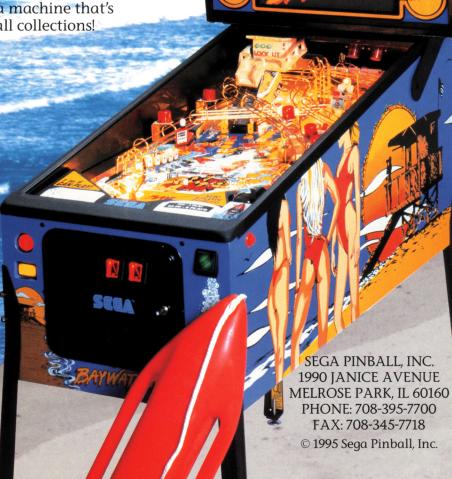
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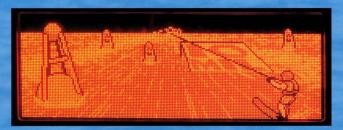


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A line developed around the TV series "Sesame Street" offers plush figures of Elmo, Grover, Bert, Ernie, and Cookie Monster in sizes ranging from 12" to 36". In addition, there are pencil-toppers, desk figures, and combs with the lovable characters.

Licensed pre-packs and sports licensed pre-packs are also a good investment. And although Beavis and Butt-head items are slowing in retail, they are just now hitting redemption.

One Stop's Tony Lawlor added, "In redemption you need product with a high perceived value. Customers have been offered the same types of items for the last 10 years. The redemption market is becoming more sophisticated; we have to upgrade our prizes."

Oriental Trading: Aaron Graves said customers are looking for big generic items with quality features such as nice eyes. "For us it's not the animals; it's the sizes. What's doing well are the 7" to 10" pieces."

Nadel & Sons: Big Bucks pencils are recommended, and a bird that balances on anything, including your nose, as demonstrated in the booth by Tom Suraci. Also look for hot color jump ropes with foam handles, liquid-center paperweights (beads that float in a gel), and upgraded plush items.

New Orleans Plush: Darleen Hansen recommends wildlife plush (zebras, kangaroos, tigers) to liven up a prize selection. She advises purchasing better quality kits and trade-up items and looking at cranes as "miniature retail outlets."

Patriot Novelty Co.: Phil and Harriet Julo think licensed sports plaques will draw attention. The likes of football's Emmitt Smith, basketball's O'Neal, hockev's Shaquille Wavne Gretzky, baseball's Nolan Ryan, and other NFL, NBA, NHL, and Major League players appear on plaques in an action shot along with an engraved nameplate and their sports card from Don Russ, Topps, Fleer, or Upper Deck. Sizes are 4" x 6", 10" x 13", and 12" x 15".

Play By Play: Leslye Hillman immediately pointed to the new Coca-Cola elephant, dressed in a red and white swimsuit and holding a life preserver. These are available in graduated sizes. Currently, the Coca-Cola polar bear is one of the company's top-selling items.

Hillman also recommended the new design Harley hog dressed in blue jeans and leatherette hat. In terms of novelties, it's neon-colored electronics and a line of Coca-Cola and nostalgia electronics pieces. Said Hillman, "We focus on color to improve the flash and help explode your redemption centers." Also mentioned: bright acrylic displays that keep "slum" items neat in the cases.

Plush Appeal: Any type of lion is popular because of the release of "The Lion King" video, according to Daryl Fletchinger. "Players want to win something nice," he added.

"The higher perceived value makes people play the games. Licensed product is always good, due to the big recognition factor among small children. We still enjoy good play on Bullwinkle and Barney look-alikes."

Plush 4 Play: According to Georgia Orozco, neon plush is at the top of the list because it has "so much color." Day-glo green, orange, pink, and blue on items from 6" on up should draw the player's eye. Choose

traditional figures such as bears, pups, and lions in nontraditional neon colors.

**PRIZES!:** One of the best things around are the Hutch balls featuring college athletic themes.

**Promax:** Caps and slammers of all kinds, including two-dimensional slammers that contain anything from novelty decorations to real-life scorpions, are very popular with kids.

Rebecca's: "As kids become more knowledgeable they save for more high-point items," said Debora Cherry. "The market is broadening and maturing into locations that draw a wider age group. Items need not be expensive to be perceived as valuable." She cited floral diamond-cut pens among items not for children only.

Rhode Island Novelty: Inflatable NFL helmets and footballs are new, explained Dan Highcove. Minibasketballs with college logos are another good idea. Youngsters will also like the jumping furry spider. The female gender will appreciate ceramic masks, figurines, and clown dolls.

Star Trak: Bob Ingenito is still hanging his merchandise hat on milk caps and slammers. "They're hot for cranes and candy machines," he said.

United Plush: Bailey Cui feels there is a big demand for generic sports items, such as plush animals holding footballs and basketballs. His animal plush dressed in country-style clothing is being well received, along with colorful boy and girl clowns and tropical fish plush.

U.S. Toy: Donald Linn leans toward colorful snakes and reptiles suitable for capsules in rotaries, or loose in display cases.▲

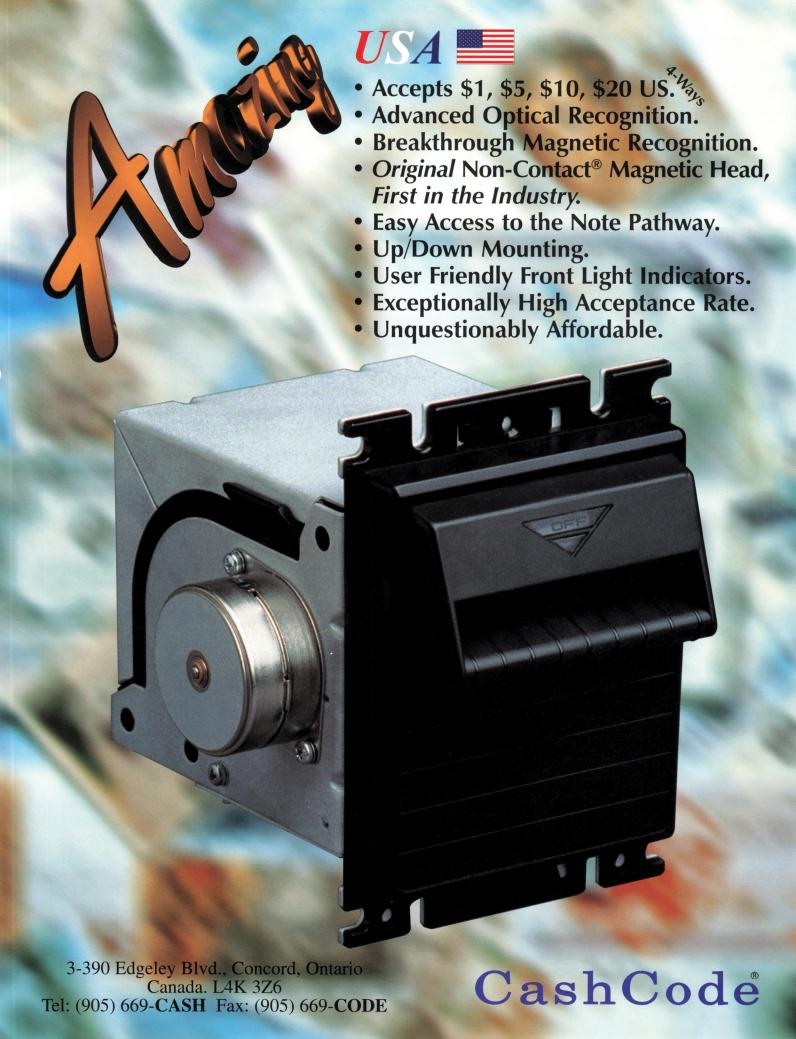

- 3. Cyber Cycles/Namco— Linkable twin motorcycles. Choose three different bikes. The game has Ridge Racer hardware and good graphics.

#### Michael:

- 1. Cyber Cycles—A great game in the tradition of Suzuka 8 Hours, an easy pick.
- 2. Sega Rally—The drawback to this game is that you can only link four seats at a time. Great response and graphics.
- 3. Cruis'n USA—It's been out for a little while, but it is still a great value. The program has great depth for those locations with a regular clientele.

#### Video Kits Frank:

- 1. Mortal Kombat 3/Midway—With national promotion, secret codes, and updates for coin-op when it is released to the home, this is a great game.
- 2. X-Men: Children of the Atom/Capcom—Earning high revenues and reasonably priced.
- 3. Street Fighter: The Movie/Capcom—Great graphics and tag team feature.
- 4. Bust-A-Move/Taito—Non-violent game with high earnings for the Neo-Geo system.
- 5. Tekken/Namco—Have had this one for a while, and it continues to do well.

- 1. Mortal Kombat 3—A nobrainer! With all the P.R. that it's going to receive, this is sure to be a winner.
- 2. X-Men—A great kit. A great value. Enough said!
- 3. Tekken—Earnings on this piece have been good in the arcade, but excellent on its own.

#### Pinballs Frank:

- 1. Theatre of Magic/Bally—Simply the best new pin available. It looks to be a classic.
- 2. Stargate/Premier--Plays well, new features.
- 3. No Fear/Williams—Good motorcycle theme.
- 4. Baywatch/Sega—Great diagnostics and special features package. A good start for Sega. It's very attractive, but I don't think it has real legs.

#### Michael:

- 1. Theatre of Magic—It looks like the next Addams Family to me. Lots of fun to play and a whole lot to learn as well!
- 2. No Fear—A real player's game.

3. Baywatch—Another actionstyle pinball with a lot to master on the playfield.

### Redemption Frank:

- 1. Cyclone/I.C.E.—Simply the best redemption game for all markets in our industry. This three-player game is earning numbers for me in the \$1,000-1,500 per week ranges.
- 2. Smokin' Token/Seidel—Many new features, eight different wheels, great new look, and operator friendly. Congratulations to the Seidels.
- 3. Ice Ball/I.C.E.—Great alley bowler and great on service as all sections are removable.
- 4. Coca-Cola Ring Toss/Lazer-Tron—New technology for scoring. All ages will play. The only drawback is the rings are dispensed near the bottom of cabinet, and it's hard for adults like me to bend down that far. However, the plus is that adults must try the game 'for old times sake.'
- 5. Super Prize Super Shot/NSG—Skee-Ball cylinder vended prize on winning score, similar to Rage 'N the Cage, which is also a great game.
- 6. Full Court Fever/I.C.E.— Newly designed, runs smoother

and quieter.

- 7. La Cucaracha/Taito— Spanish version of Wacky Gator and very cute.
- 8. Spider Stompin'/Jaleco— Use your feet to step on the spiders. Great for the kiddie market.
- 9. Boomer/Benchmark—Four-player game. It can capture all the jackpot. Great concept, but hard to understand. Needs some work.

#### Michael:

- 1. Smokin' Token—A coin action game that's built for the player and the operator. More manufacturers should note the care that was taken to provide operator-friendly adjustments and readouts, along with extra capacity cashbox and ticket racks. A must-have game that will probably earn best when banked.
- 2. Cyclone—A fast game that can handle three players at one

time. A great looking piece that delivers.

- 3. Wheelin-N-Dealin/Lazer-Tron—I think this game is going to be great for parents. I ordered some as soon as I left the booth.
- 4. Spider Stompin'—A fun piece for the kids market. I think that the look is great.
- 5. La Cucaracha—Another wacking game that's a little wacky. I think it can be a great rotation piece.

An additional note, Michael says, is to keep an eye on two other games, Boomer from Benchmark, which still needs a little adjustment but should be great, and Lazer-Tron's Coca-Cola Ring Toss. Because it is a technically complex piece, he wants to test it before recommending the game.

As you can see, Michael and Frank have chosen many of the

same games, but in different order. They came up with slightly different categories for kiddie rides and novelty games.

Michael combined the two categories, choosing the Batmobile by Just Kiddie Rides as his first pick. With the movie coming out this summer, the timing is perfect, he said. Coming in second was Konami's Pirate Ship, which he called a "cute piece with a nice look."

In novelties, Frank chose Smart's Ticket Center. This small unit with a newly reduced price is a must for busy redemption centers to help reduce lines at the prize counter, he said.

As for Frank's kiddie ride picks, one and two respectively were Tom & Jerry and the Batmobile, both by Just Kiddie Rides. In the music category, his nod went to the Eagle wallbox by Rowe/AMi.





## Player's Opinion: What did I like?

The success of the new games introduced and promoted at ACME '95 depends on the last level in the industry food chain—the players. This year, there were many games that proved themselves worthy and capable of luring copious quarters from my pockets. Thankfully, the machines were all set on free play, or I would have filed chapter 11 on the way out of the convention door! I spent nearly 20 hours searching the floor for standout games that I felt would do well in arcades.

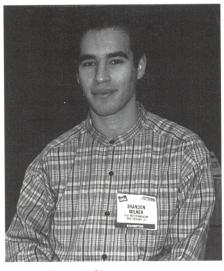
#### **MORTAL KOMBAT 3/Midway**

Midway made a huge presence at the show with its latest in the venerable *Mortal Kombat* series. New characters and moves as well as a host of new features hopefully will cause long-time *Mortal Kombat* veterans to renew their frenzied spending that landed this game in the number one spot in the past.

New to *MK3* is a run button designed to make an already fast game even faster. Characters can jump and dash across the screen with astonishing speed, unleashing lethal combos to crush opponents in seconds. All the new moves are innovative and visually appealing.

The animations, along with those in Midway's *Killer Instinct*, set the standard for smoothness and convincing game play. I personally prefer the graphics in *Killer Instinct*. Its dark, gothic environments and complex texture-mapped characters really earned my attention. In the arcades in my area, it tends to attract a crowd whenever someone is playing.

I saw experienced players glued to the *MK3* machines trying to figure out the new moves of the new characters. I also

saw a disillusioned group of inexperienced first time players walk away from the machines shaking their heads. Their games were lasting a mere 20 seconds at most. I'm concerned that the new *MK3* is initially far too hard for new players. I'm no slouch of a fighter myself, but I was unable to last more than three or four rounds even after practicing for nearly an hour.

To promote the new game, Midway has launched an unprecedented media campaign involving a new \$40 million movie and ads on MTV. Subliminal magazine ads featuring a series of codes to be typed in as passwords to new secret features are beginning as I speak. Will these mysterious codes catch on and cause kids to rush to arcades? I asked an expert, a 12 year old player at the show, "Umm...yeah...well, probably."

#### **THEATER OF MAGIC/Williams**

The best pinball game at the show, by far, was Williams' *Theater of Magic*. Designed by the veteran team of John Popadiuk, Jeff Johnson, and Dave Zabriskie, this game occupied more of my time than nearly any other game at the show. It

has a clever magic show theme which lends itself to interesting takes on standard pinball features. When you lock a ball, the display shows the ball wrapped in chains a la Harry Houdini. The variety of trap doors, ramps, and the surreal use of magnets can all be rationalized within the magic show theme.

Pinball must strike a delicate balance between complexity and simplicity to be effective. You can't just place small targets along the back wall to make the game challenging. You must integrate some easier items with more difficult shots to make the game appealing both short- and long-term. Theater of Magic does this beautifully. The central magic trunk target is large, and it spins for four different scenarios. There are large, wide ramps which even beginners can hit to send the ball hurtling across the playfield in three dimensions. To keep the game challenging over time, many different magic tricks, initiated via the trunk target, require different ramp combos and more precise shooting. I was hooked.

I must mention the quality of sound in this game. Being an aspiring sound engineer myself, I was struck by the realistic and unique dialogue snippets and sound bytes used. A clear, theatrical voice announces targets to aim for and magic tricks to resolve. It provides both the necessary exciting build-up for multiball and the balance of lighthearted comedy which lets you know that *Theater of Magic* still has a sense of humor.

#### CRUISIN' USA/Midway

Driving games were abundant at the show, and several of them stood out as offering good variety and addictive playability. Midway's *Cruisin USA* ap-

pealed to me because of its unique choice in cars, including a mid '60s Corvette and a 1995 Toyota Supra look alike. Several of the units appeared to be hacked to include novel cars like a hot rod school bus. It was a welcome shift from the standard formula I styles. Crashes, an inevitability in a racing game, are great in this game. Bumped cars skid dangerously across the highway and at times even bounce and flip over head. I found myself ducking and weaving to avoid creating a five-car pile up.

Each time you continue, you

can choose succeeding courses in a trek across the country from San Francisco to Washington, D.C. The many different environments keep the game from getting as repetitive as it might on a standard racetrack. Adding to the fun are hilarious and engaging sound bites such as a desperate, "oh...look out!" screamed when dangerously close to crashing. Game play is challenging, believable, and fun. Friends can play against each other in linked mode, and I even watched new friendships develop over matches between strangers.

Cruisin' USA led a trio of games—Namco's Ace Driver and Sega's Rally were the others—that garnered my attention into the wee hours of the show. Ace Driver had the edge on playability for novices, and Sega's Rally had the edge on realism with its uncanny simulation of Dukes of Hazzardstyle oversteer and backroads race technique.

#### **GAME THEMES**

I noticed that most of the video games being shown fell into one of two categories: fighting or driving. While the quality of many of the offerings

was high, I wondered why most games were polarized into these two camps. Whatever happened to the space shoot'em ups like *Galaga*? Or new sports games that don't involve hacking arms off as a strategic maneuver? Because fighting games like *Street Fighter* 2 gave the industry a much needed kick, it appears many designers are attempting to copy each other's games.

Capcom's Street Fighter, The Movie has digitized images from the movie to give it a look more like the Mortal Kombat series. Sega's Virtua Fighter 2 and Namco's Tekken are nearly identical twins. Data East's Backfire and Kaneko's Great 1000 Mile Rally are also near exact replicas of each other. I'd like to encourage manufacturers to break out of these molds and create new premises for games. I would think arcades would be hesitant to present

both games out of these pairs because they are so similar.

In contrast, I am really excited about the state of pinball design today. The new games, led by Theater of Magic, incorporate clever themes and offer a good variety of play. Pinball games really are exploring the three dimensional possibilities of ramps and chutes and are using special magnets to challenge expectations of the way the ball can move. I'm also glad designing designers are around original themes and not merely adapting movies to fit a game. I noticed that every pinball game based on an original based on movies. Keep those original games coming!

Overall, I thought most of the games, both video and pinball, were good. Some of the games were great. I noticed the enthusiasm among the players at the show was high, and I constantly heard snippets of dialogue like, "whoa, that is so cool! show me how to do that" and "watch this, you gotta see this." Now if I could only get everybody to share and let me have a turn.

anley Lawson of Lawson Music Co. Winter Haven, Fla., and I went on a Caribbean adventure in February. It started out when I wanted to fly my plane to Trinidad, where I was born. When Manley, who is also a pilot, caught wind of my plans he did not have to be asked twice; the trip was on!

Although my plane is capable of making it all the way to Trinidad with only one fuel stop, we decided that the trip would be made far more enjoyable by spending a couple of days at several islands of interest along the way there and back experiencing some culture from each place.

The 4,000 mile plus adventure included stops at Providenciales (Turks & Caicos), Antiqua, Barbados, Trinidad, St. Thomas, and Grand Turk (Turks & Caicos).

Almost every island had

some form of legal gambling, and the ones that did not (St. Thomas and Trinidad) were considering it in upcoming elections. Providenciales and Antiqua had gaming casinos, while Barbados, which currently only allows slots, was in hot debate on the subject of casino gambling. On several islands there were signs that read "Game Room," which meant a small room of about 800 square feet with only slots. In all cases, never were any amusementonly games in the same room with gambling games.

Throughout the islands. everyone in coin-op complained that business was down and that the cost of video games was getting out of reach. In Trinidad where the exchange rate is \$5.75 TT = \$1.00 U.S., games like Daytona USA are out of the question. And that does not take into account the extra cost of shipping and import taxes. As a matter of fact, no Killer Instincts were seen in any of the islands. Price could be the determining fac-

Froggies Arcade in Barbados (which really was a game room) had about 25 video games with DarkStalkers being the newest and most popular. Not so astounding was the fact that Ms. Pac-Man and Galaga were found everywhere and, of course, being played!

Manley and I spent some time with Vishnu Maraj, who owns Galaxy Games with arcades in four locations in Trinidad. Vishnu plans to open

an FEC in late March or April at the Gulf City Mall near San Fernando directly opposite one of his arcades.

45-game He wants the arcade and the FEC to remain separate and be distinctly different atmospheres. The Galactic FEC, which was still under construction, was very impressive encompassing 9,000 square feet. Food, birthday room, a shooting gallery, redemption, and a huge kiddie train will all be part of the fun. Gulf City Mall is the largest in Trinidad, and if this FEC concept hits here, you can be sure that there will others to follow.

In Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, Funcity Entertainment Centers Ltd. recently opened an 8,000 square foot FEC, which sported a well-designed neon lighting scheme and many of the popular games. But unlike the Galactic FEC, the video games were in the same area as the

other games.

St. Thomas, another beautiful Caribbean island, was no stranger to arcades. Dorothy Riley, who is a supervisor for U.S. Customs there, owns the Time-Out arcade. This is her

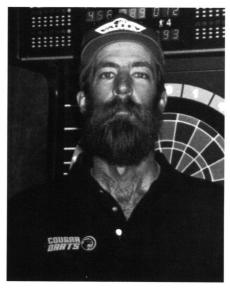

Qualifiers get an all-expense-paid trip to Las Vegas, and winners at the national level will qualify as members of Team USA which competes in Europe in the fall.

Here are results from the latest tournaments:

### Isolation and video games

get a lot of questions about isolation transformers. Just about everyone knows that the monitor in a video game must get its power through an isolation transformer, but many confess that they don't fully grasp the reasons why. After all, the isolation transformer uses 120 volts AC as an input and produces 120 volts AC as an output. It seems silly doesn't it? Why not connect the monitor directly to 120 volts that comes through the line cord in the game?

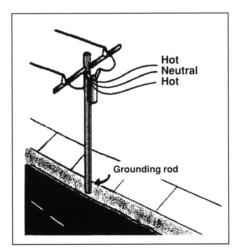

To get a better understanding of isolation, we need to take a look at the way the AC power distribution system works. In a typical overhead power system, the wires carry 12,000 volts AC from the generating facility or substation. A pole mounted transformer is used to step the voltage down. The output of the transformer is a center-tapped, step-down winding that has just one turn of wire for every five hundred turns of wire on the input winding. This 500:1 ratio is known as the "turns ratio," and it's the turns ratio that determines the output voltage of a transformer. In this case, the transformer on the pole receives a 12,000 volt AC input and produces a 240 volt AC output. The center-tap allows the 240 volt AC output to be split into two 120 volt AC outputs.

The center-tap of the transformer is known as the "neutral" connection. It is electrically neutral, having neither positive nor negative voltage. The neutral connection is always at 0 volts and provides the "return-path" for the alternating current. The two outside leads are called "hot" connections. It is from the hot connections that we get our 120 or 240 volts AC (see figure 1).

At each pole-mounted transformer, the neutral connection is grounded. As the name implies, "grounding" means connecting the neutral lead of the transformer to the Earth itself. This is accomplished by driving a long, metal stake into the dirt at the base of the pole. A heavy wire runs down the side of the pole, connecting the neutral to the metal stake. By grounding each transformer, a common reference point is created for balancing the entire power distribution system. This so-called "Earth ground" can also provide a measure of defense against shock in case of electrical failures.

The important thing to realize here is that the earth ground provides almost as good a connection to the center-tap of the transformer as the metallic connection provided by the neutral wire itself. The Earth is a very good conductor of this type of alternating current (see

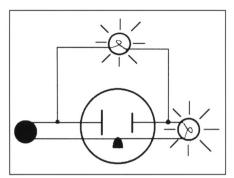

figure 2). A load connected between hot and neutral will receive essentially the same voltage as a load that is connected between hot and earth ground.

#### **Hot-chassis monitor**

Now let's take a look at the

monitor and see how it fits in the picture. More specifically, let's look at the bridge rectifier in the monitor's power supply. The 120 volt AC power connects to the bridge rectifier through a fuse. The negative output of the bridge is connected to the "chassis ground". The chassis ground is not electrically connected to the earth ground in any way.

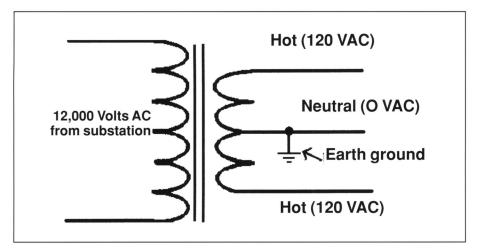
If the monitor is powered directly from the 120 volt AC line, the metal chassis of the monitor will become connected through a diode to hot. This is technically known as a (you guessed it) "hot-chassis" monitor. The entire chassis will have 120 volts on it. Needless to say, this is a very dangerous situation. If you are connected to earth ground in any way (by leaning against a grounded control panel or coin door, for instance) and touch

the chassis, you may get a nasty shock.

So, the hot-chassis monitor design presents us with a real safety hazard. But here's another important point to consider. Most video games have an earth ground wire that connects to the chassis of the monitor. This earth ground wire comes from the round, earth ground pin in the AC plug. If the earth ground is connected to the hot-chassis. it short circuits one of the negative diodes in the bridge rectifier. This causes a massive amount of current to flow through the other negative diode, causing it to fail. It's normal to find one or both of the negative diodes shorted in a situation like this. As a matter of fact, it's just about the only thing that causes these diodes to fail. Most of the time, it's the positive diodes that fail.

With the shorted bridge rectifier now drawing enormous current from the 120 volts AC, we discover yet another problem. The earth ground may have bypassed the fuse in the monitor, blowing the main AC fuse in the game or the circuit breaker in the building. There's a 50/50 chance of this happening. If the hot side goes to the fuse, damage to the monitor may be minimized. But if the fuse is connected to the neutral lead instead, it will be completely bypassed by the earth ground that is connected to the chassis. This can cause a lot of damage to the power supply in the monitor, taking out diodes, transistors, resistors and voltage regulators.

#### Isolation

We get around all of the problems associated with the hotchassis monitor by using an isolation transformer. An isolation transformer has a 1:1 turns ratio, producing an output voltage that matches the input voltage. We get 120 volts AC from the output of the transformer but lose the ground. In other words, there is no longer a neutral side that is connected to the Earth. The transformer has a 120 volt AC output that is "isolated" from any connection or reference to the Earth. With the neutral/earth ground connection broken, the chassis of the monitor can be safely grounded without shorting the diodes in the monitor's power supply. Isolation from a ground referenced source of power also reduces the chance of shock.

The average video game monitor draws about 75 watts of power, so an isolation transformer with a one amp rating should theoretically be able to handle it. However, transformers are only about 80% efficient, with the lost 20% showing up as waste heat. A transformer can get quite hot to the touch. Obviously, a larger transformer will be able to distribute the heat through a larger mass and run cooler. This may prevent premature transformer failure. Also, some people hook up more than just the monitor to the isolated output of the transformer. It's not unusual to see the power supply, fan and fluorescent light connected to the output as well. This will, of course, increase the load on the isolation transformer. Suffice to say that a one amp transformer is acceptable for powering the monitor alone, but a higher rated output of two or more would be better if the cost is not significantly higher.▲
