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CHRISTMAS SINGLES

As is always the case at this time of the year, Christmas singles are coming in by the dozens. But there's a tremendous difference in the type of Yuletide disks as compared with the material we used to see five years ago. As a matter of fact there has been a drastic change in Christmas record thinking in just the twelve months since the last Xmas release.

With Christmas record programming beginning after Thanksgiving (a phenomenon which has become an unwritten rule) and air play limited to a maximum of four or so weeks, very few new Yuletide ballads are being issued. Most of the new Xmas releases are novelties. And it is quite interesting to note how many new Christmas issues feature novelty voices at various speeds. Almost everyone seems to be convinced that it must be a novelty with a gimmick to make it in today's short-run-for-exposure market. Although this thinking may indicate good business sense, especially when one considers the tremendous amount of exposure a ballad needs to make the grade,

nevertheless, the sorry thought that there may never be another "White Christmas" or "Christmas Song" is most depressing.

Re-issues are playing a much more important role in Christmas singles this year than ever before. Many records which were just beginning to make it last year, or those which might have been overshadowed by other Christmas hits, are being re-released. Although we don't recall ever seeing a Xmas re-issue hitting strongly in its second year, the whole industry will be watching a number of powerful re-releases entered in the 1959 stakes.

We have also noticed a considerable increase in the number of religious recordings being issued on single wax this season. Although no one factor can be termed responsible for this situation, the success on the charts of "Battle Hymn Of The Republic" by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and Wink Martindale's "Deck Of Cards" must be considered a motivating force.

It should be an interesting Christmas from the singles view point.

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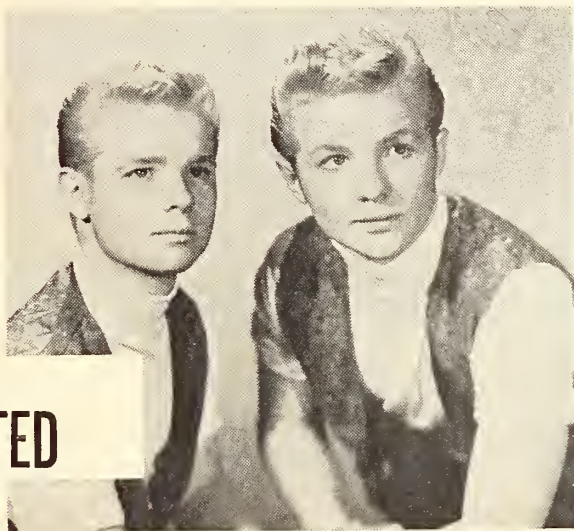

RANDY STARR (Mayflower 17)

B+ "WORKIN' ON THE SANTA FE" (2:18) [Volkweim ASCAP—Starr] There's a good-sounding, "16 Tons"-like touch about this display. It's a folk-inclined sound that has commercial potential. Could be another click for the diskery (currently hitting with "Enchanted Sea").

B "YOU'RE GROWING UP" (2:14) [Volkweim ASCAP—Starr] Here, matters turn to a sweet ballad expression.

SANFORD CLARK (Jamie 1139)

B+ "SON - OF - A - GUN" (2:19) [Gregmark BMI—Hazlewood] Clark, who grabbed the national spotlight awhile back with his "The Fool" (on Dot), should enjoy more of the same here. Clever lyric twist refers to the son of an outlaw. Could step way out.

BILLY BRYAN (Blaze 351)

B+ "CRADLE OF MY ARMS" (1:52) [Medal BMI—Scott] New songster Bryan displays the infectious attitude of a Clyde McPhatter. His backdrop chorus-combo backing speaks with fine rhythmic joy. Can happen big.

GOOGIE RENE ORCH. (Class 262)

B+ "CAESAR'S PAD" (2:35) [Leon RENE ASCAP—Rene, Rene] Intro offers some beatnik poetry, then the Rene ork takes over for some interesting "cool" talk. Can pick-up pop-jazz plays.

B "SERENADE IN THE NIGHT" (2:45) [Mills ASCAP—Bixio, Cherubini, Kennedy] Sentimental oldie receives a good band-styled cha-cha approach, trumpet in the solo spot. Both tracks hail from Rene's "Romesville" album.

D.J. PAUL (D'Or 1001)

B "SMARTY" (1:45) [Corn, Weinstein, Perez] Rocker with a Latin kick. Effective arrangement should help garner jock support.

C+ "HI YA PIERREPONT" (2:23) [Melissa ASCAP—Corn, Weinstein, Perez] Brisk rock-jazz combo item with occasional spoken lyric to break up forward drive of item. Should also see spins.

BOBBY WEBB (Savoy 1578)

B+ "SAME OLD STORY" [Jamil BMI—Webb, Thibodeaux] A "fairy tale" ballad affair with the lyric and vocal engagingly highlighted by rumba-rhythm combo backing. Good attention-getter.

B "MY DREAM" [Jamil BMI—Webb, Thibodeaux] With a rock beat to back him up, Webb soulfully projects the tender lyric. Should put some teen coin into circulation.

CHUCK & CHUCKLES (Shad 5015)

B+ "ONE HUNDRED BABY" (2:15) [Trinity BMI—Paxton] Light-hearted beat-romancer which mentions some recent hits (i.e. "Primrose Lane," "Sea Of Love").

B "BURY THE HATCHET" (2:30) [Trinity BMI—Battin, Paxton] This pounder gives the kids a good novelty in the Coasters' vein.

ERNIE KUCERA (D 1101)

C+ "WHEN WHEN POLKA" (2:10) [Glad BMI—Kucera] Medium-tempo polka item, given a nostalgic beery treatment by the group. For the dance set.

C+ "ERNIE'S POLKA" (2:12) [Glad BMI—Kucera] Another danceable, gay polka offering.

SAM COOKE (Specialty 667)

B+ "HAPPY IN LOVE" (1:54) [Venice BMI—Cook] Cooke—in a session cut when with Specialty—does a fine upbeat essay of the contagious ditty. This sunny deck could make the grade.

B+ "I NEED YOU NOW" (1:54) [Venice BMI—Cook] That individual Cooke way with a ballad comes-through very well. Number is good, too. Better eye both ends here.

RONNIE BROWN (Keen 82107)

B "WHEN IT'S SPRINGTIME IN THE ROCKIES" (2:28) [Robbins ASCAP—Saver, Taggart, Woolsey] Sprightly combo-chorus stint on the familiar sentimental, with a brisk keyboard spearheading the way. Legit uptempo side that should garner good jock attention.

B "ELSIE'S DREAM" (2:22) [Arcadia ASCAP—Gorody] More merry-making has the chorus playing a major sans-lyric role. On the cool side.

LARRY BIRDSONG (Cherokee 1018)

B+ "SINCE YOU LEFT ME BEHIND" [LaVern BMI—Bubis, Birdsong] Birdsong does a rhythmic vocal on the order of Jackie Wilson and could succeed here like the latter. Exciting sounds from the combo-chorus. Watch R&B lists, too.

B "YOUNG AND FANCY FREE" [Poncello ASCAP—Jarrett] Songster puts a fine romantic foot forward. Combo backs effectively.

MIKE SCOTT (Omega 701)

B "DIG!" (1:54) [Davon BMI—Ecton, Scott, Hubert] Affable rock-novelty in which the guy spells-out all the things he digs about the gal. Good beat for the hops.

C+ "DANCE THE NIGHT AWAY" (1:54) [St. Lawrence BMI—Randcliffe, Roberts] The youngsters have a pleasant affectionate here. Approach is light rock-a-cha.

QUINN MILLER (Magnet 700)

B+ "THE SEA WITCH" (2:09) [Colonna Moontunes ASCAP—Hoffman] Interesting rock re-write of the familiar sea-chanty, "Early In The Morning." Miller and good femme chorus are striking, and there's an infectious middle-beat combo sound. Can happen.

B+ "MY CUCUZZA" (2:08) [Milnac ASCAP—Corpora, Rogers] Prima has a good Italian-styled novelty here, the kind of session, of course, he's a pro at. Catchy affair has a chance of making a stir.

B "H E Y! BA-BA-RE-BOP" (2:05) [Leeds ASCAP—Hamner, Hampton] The familiar zoot-suit era ditty gets some updating and typical Prima, Sam Butera & the Witnesses zest.

LONNIE JOHNSON (King 5293)

B+ "TOMORROW NIGHT" [Bourne ASCAP—Coslow, Grosz] The oldie—currently clicking country-wise—receives a distinctive essay from Johnson. Strong chorus, soft-beat combo setting. Good for those ballad spins.

B "PLEASEING YOU" [Lois BMI—Johnson] Johnson is easier in another sentimental date.

SPENCER ROSS (Columbia 41532)

B+ "TRACY'S THEME" (2:50) [Devon BMI—Ascher] Deck offers an intriguing melody in a captivatingly lush ork arrangement. The number, to be used as theme material in the upcoming "Philadelphia Story" TV'er. Could develop into a real hot item.

B "THANKSGIVING DAY PARADE" (1:17) [Devon BMI—Ascher] Item, from the TV'er "Miracle On 34th Street," is a spirited marching band arrangement, with a compelling sound spelling lotsa holiday air play.

KING'S LANCERS (Brand-X 110)

B+ "LANCERS' CHARGE" (2:00) [I.D. BMI—King] This is a power-house combo driver, with a growling sax leading the way. Sans-lyric chorus is effectively used. This workout could go over big.

B "NIGHT RIDE" (2:45) [I.D. BMI—Spisso] An instrumental about-face as the boys take it easy on the catchy theme. Distribution is handled by Apollo Records.

COBY (Epic 9347)

B+ "LOVING YOU" (2:34) [AMC ASCAP—Ram] Songster Coby (formerly known as Coby Dijon) turns in a solid ballad performance on the true-love romancer, somewhat similar to "Only You" (writer Buck Ram also wrote "Only You."). Things can happen here.

B "YOU'LL NEVER GET AWAY FROM ME" (2:20) [Chappell ASCAP—Sondheim, Styne] One of the standouts of the "Gypsy" musical gets a swinging, Latin-arranged combo setting. Jocks will like.

JOHNNY ARMENTEER ORCH. (Palette 5026)

B+ "TICKER TAPE PARADE" (2:06) [Zodiac BMI—Adams, Barnes] Spirited, catchy 4/4 timer that includes strains of "Battle Hymn Of The Republic" in the arrangement. Whistles are the sounds upfront. Gotta watch these things.

B "FRENCH HORNS IN BUCKINGHAM PALACE" (2:04) [Zodiac BMI—Adams, Barnes] A regal air to this marcher ("Yankee Doodle Dandee" is heard as a principal theme).

NORM ALEXANDER (HoneeB 106)

C+ "TRUSTING YOU" (2:07) [Sage Brush BMI—O'Neal] Slow ballad soundly sung by songster Alexander. Could use exposure.

C+ "ON LONELY LONESOME STREET" (2:36) [Sage Brush BMI—O'Neal] Bottom lid features a blues item done in slow rock-style.

FREDDIE FLYNN (Lyric 107)

B "HAZEL" (2:20) [Rhymetime BMI—Gerst] One of the wildest drivers to power down disk row. A good bet to keep jukes jumpin' with teen coin.

C+ "GREEN STAMPS" (2:07) [Rhymetime BMI—Gerst] A somewhat milder tho still frantic rock-drive affair, that also jingles with teen-cash sound.

IVORY JOE HUNTER (King 5280)

B "DON'T FALL IN LOVE WITH ME" (2:44) [Lois BMI—Hunter] Relaxed and inviting sax opening and then the famed blues artist eases nicely over the ballad. A pleasant, years-back quality to side.

C+ "GUESS WHO" (2:50) [Lois BMI—Hunter] Approach here has much the same feel.

FLINTS (Okeh 7126)

B "SKIPPIN' AND A-JUMPIN'" (2:03) [Walnut BMI—Barnes, William] Rock activities on-the-way-to-school are described with fine novelty effect by the songsters. Combo offers good pounding support. Could show-up in pop-R&B fields.

B "PEOPLE SAY" (2:33) [Walnut BMI—Barnes, Martin] Attractive romancerisgently rendered. Strong dreamy-dance entry.

FRANKIE VALLY (Decca 30994)

B "PLEASE TAKE A CHANCE" (2:30) [Sunno BMI—Macioci] Songster takes a chance on love in an easy-rock presentation. Engagingly simple delivery over choral-combo backing might cause teen activity, given sufficient DJ exercise.

C+ "IT MAY BE WRONG" [Sunno BMI—Bibeault] Multi-track effects are featured on this side, with several Vally's delivering a standard rock-ballad. Can also generate some teen interest.

NINA SIMONE (Colpix 135)

B+ "THE OTHER WOMAN" (2:52) [Favorite Robinson] Stint by the distinctive stylist has the same sort of compelling wistfulness as her hit on Bethlehem, "I Loves You Porgy." Strong enough jock attention could get deck to charts. Side's from her new LP, "Nina At Town Hall."

B "IT MIGHT AS WELL BE SPRING" (3:15) [Williamson ASCAP—Rodgers, Hammerstein] The great Rodgers & Hammerstein plaintive is performed with sensitivity. Another one for the jocks to take to. Album source is "The Amazing Nina Simone."

FERRANTE & TEICHER ORCH. (United Artists 196)

B "LOVERS SYMPHONY" (2:44) [United Artists ASCAP—Costa] The piano-duo & ork take a familiar theme from a Tchaikovsky symphony for a strong rock-a-string ride. Side could show-up.

B "DREAM CONCERTO" (2:45) [Malin ASCAP—Ferrante, Teicher] Another Tchaikovsky theme, the one from his piano concerto (pop standard form of melody is "Tonight We Love"), receives a similar lush treatment.

RON MURPHY (MGM 12848)

B "CLIMB EV'RY MOUNTAIN" (2:56) [Williamson ASCAP—Rodgers, Hammerstein] Vocalist—sounding somewhat like Johnny Mathis—understandingly & dramatically delivers the Rodgers-Hammerstein inspirational. Worthy version of the number.

B "HOLDING HANDS AND MAKING LOVE" (3:04) [Sheldon BMI—Shapiro, Lebowsky] A similar "big sound" on the heart-felt ballad.

FRANKIE ERVIN (Rendezvous 112)

B "BLESSING IN DISGUISE" (2:20) [Mardon House Of Fortune BMI—Regan] A pro entry in the dramatic rock-a-string area. Ervin tells of a guy who says he's found a nicer gal, so he's glad his former flame has upped and left him. Could make noise.

B "THE STORY" (2:07) [House Of Fortune BMI—Mitola] Ervin touchingly recites a tale of a love gone astray (fella's not happy here) and receives a fine fine rock-a-string setting (side opens with effective falsetto voice). Exposure could make side happen.

HOLLYWOOD STUDIO SYMPHONY ORCH. (United Artists 195)

B "MARCHING MATILDA" (1:45) [Unart BMI—Powell] The big ork does an able march version of the "Waltzing Matilda," the Australian folk favorite which will be a principal musical theme in the upcoming flick, "On The Beach."

B "WALTZING MATILDA" (2:50) [Carl Fisher ASCAP—Paterson, Cowan] A chorus enters the scene for a fine reading of the ditty.

ART FOSTER (Star 527)

B "HOUSTON, TEXAS" (2:03) [Ed Rudy Star Selections BMI—Foster] Foster and combo have a blueser on the order of "Kansas City." It's a beat the kids will take to.

B "JAY DANCING" (1:30) [Ed Rudy Star Selections BMI—Foster] While this fella waits for the traffic light to change, he indulges in some rock dancing. Good punctuated comments from guitar. Lively big beat fare.

PHIL CELIA/WILBUR KIRK (Penny 102)

B "WRONG WOMAN" (2:53) [Prior BMI—Blois, Priolo] Release offers two versions of same number. This deck done to a slow swinging beat, features a sultry vocal which packs lotsa femme appeal.

B "WRONG WOMAN" (2:53) [Prior BMI—Blois, Priolo] Under side is dished up in warm throbbing harmonica fashion. Both are good jock bets.

MALON HURST (Reed 1035)

C+ "LOVE AIN'T NOTHING BUT SORROW" (2:30) [Double "M" BMI—Hurst] Singer displays a country-style delivery on a slight up-tempo rock ballad as his band backs with rock-boogie rhythm. The item has an interesting sound which could benefit from exposure.

Everest To Distribute Thru Indies; Cuts Prices Of Album Line

NEW YORK — Ted Wallerstein, head of Everest Records, and Charles Schicke, national sales manager, last week announced two major changes affecting the Everest line — one a change in the distribution set-up of the company and the other in the suggested list price of the Everest product.

Everest has amicably severed its distribution association with Decca Records and will hereafter distribute its line through independent distributors throughout the country with the exception of New York, Chicago and Los Angeles where the diskery will have company owned offices.

Wallerstein gave full credit to the Decca Company for having pioneered the sale of Everest Records, but felt that now, with Everest branching out into all fields including a major effort behind singles, the company could do a more effective job in this competitive industry by handling its own distribution.

A number of independent distributors have already been signed by the company and will be announced next week. The Compo Company in Canada, Decca's Canadian Company, will continue to handle the Everest label. Until such time as independent distributors are geared to carry Everest, the Decca distributorships will service the field with the label's product.

The New York branch, located at 762 11th Ave., is headed by Jack Sweeney, who brings with him a background as assistant branch manager of Columbia Records. He was also associated with Audio Fidelity Records.

Sid Love, former assistant branch manager of London Records, will head the Chicago branch at 1314 S. Wabash Ave., Chicago.

Chuck Dondero, ex-Decca branch manager, who was at one time affiliated with Melody Sales in San Francisco, will head the Everest Los Angeles Branch located at 2960 W. Pico Blvd.

The Newark territory will be handled out of the New York Branch and the Milwaukee territory will be covered by the Chicago branch.

The second major Everest announcement is a sweeping price change in the label's product plus a special dealer offer in conjunction with the new price structure.

Effective immediately all Everest stereo pop albums will carry a suggested list of \$3.98. The stereo list for pops was formerly \$4.98. Everest monaural and stereo pops will therefore both list at the same price \$3.98.

The label's classical price line is being slashed to \$4.40 for both monaural and stereo. Prior to the change, Everest classical monaurals sold for \$4.98 and classical stereos for \$5.98.

In conjunction with the price cut, Everest is offering dealers a 50% discount on all purchases of any titles in the Everest line. The offer becomes effective immediately and expires January 1st. Standard return privileges are in effect for this offer.

Marks Comments On Europe

NEW YORK — Back from a two-months business trip to Europe, Herbert E. Marks, president of the Edward B. Marks Music Corporation, observed that whereas England still follows the American "pop" trend in songs, Italy has leaped into a position rivalling the U.S.A. as a source of "pop" music as far as many other European countries are concerned.

Marks was pleased, however, to find that such perennial favorites from his firm's catalogue as "Malaguena", "Peanut Vendor", "Port Au Prince", "The Breeze And I", "Say Si Si", "Yours", "My Shawl", "Tango Of Roses", and "Amapola" continued to be popular throughout Europe.

Form Jota Records

NEW YORK — Herb Wasserman and Roy Passman have formed a new record company, Jota Records at 1650 Broadway. Passman was formerly with the George Paxton and Ivan Mogul music companies.

Jota's first release is "Snow and Stars" b/w "From Here to Bethlehem" by Alan Greene and the Joan Wile Singers. Both songs were written by Alan Greene and Lewis Allan. Composer-singer Greene is a former arranger and conductor for Harry Belafonte, having written some of Belafonte's material as well as the theme for the singer's latest film, "The World, the Flesh and the Devil." Allan has an Academy Award for "The House I Live In."

Sing Along With Santa

NEW YORK — RCA Victor's new Bluebird release, "Santa Claus In Person", gives children a chance to sing out on 19 tunes with Santa and the Polar Elves, stars of the LP.

The album, packaged with a songbook, offers a built-in promotion tie-in for department stores during the Christmas season when Santa takes over the toy department, Ray Clark, manager, planning and merchandising stated.

The cover of the LP is illustrated with a full-color drawing of Santa surrounded by singing youngsters.

The album is offered at the nationally advertised Bluebird price of \$1.98.

Lambs Honor Jack Mills

NEW YORK — Jack Mills was feted last week (14) by the Lambs Club in honor of his 50th year in the music business, 40 as topper of Mills Music. Part of the proceedings involved sketches which light-heartedly traced Mills' career. Walter Kiernan emceed. Acts included Jack Carter, Bert Wheeler and Red Buttons.

Villa-Lobos Dies

RIO DE JANEIRO — Hector Villa-Lobos, the famed Brazilian composer died here last week (17). He was 72. Among his most famous serious works are "Bachianas Brasileiras" and "Choros."

"Payola" Investigations

NEW YORK—The word "payola" reached headline proportions last week as congressional and state officials probed further into the question of "commercial bribery" in broadcasting.

At week's start, Dick Clark—the most prominent deejay—was reported to have been asked to testify by the House Special Subcommittee on Legislative Oversight—the same that held the TV quiz-fix hearings—when it resumes its study of payola and allied air-wave matters (Dec. 9).

Later in the week, New York City District Attorney Frank Hogan subpoenaed the books and financial records of 11 record companies. The diskeries are: Dot, Roulette, Liberty, Gone, Kapp, King, Cadence, Jay-Gee, S&S Associates and Coral. The District Attorney's offices said that the subpoena of the latter's financial records should not infer any illegality on their parts.

The disclosure of Clark's appearance before the subcommittee coincided with an announcement by Clark that he was relinquishing his interest in Swan Records and several publishing firms. Clark was complying with a directive by his network, ABC, that said: those who "select and play records" on the station would have to divest themselves of all financial inter-

ests in recording and associated enterprises. Tony Mammarella, who produced Clark's "Bandstand" show over ABC, also has similar interests, but he chose to resign from the show rather than comply with ABC's policy. He said he saw nothing wrong in playing "hit" records that came from his own firm.

ABC—giving Clark a vote of confidence—stated that "examination of all evidence available to us concerning these programs and their production organizations and have concluded that Dick Clark has neither solicited nor accepted any personal considerations—money or otherwise."

Subcommittee staffers planned to visit various cities (they were in Philly talking to Clark last week), including Boston, Miami, Chicago and Los Angeles.

Indicative of the coverage the payola investigation will be getting in the consumer press, Life mag's current issue contains a 4-page pic-story spread. Lead article is written by deejay Ed McKenzie, who recently quit Detroit's WXYZ because of "Top 40" programming. Some of the jocks pictured — together with caption quotes from them—include New York's Alan Freed, and William B. Williams; Baltimore's Buddy Deane; Chicago's Howard Miller.

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



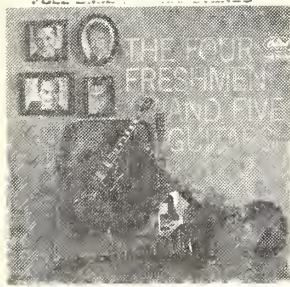
"THE FABULOUS FABIAN"—Chancellor CHLX 5005

Packaging alone can get deck on the charts. Double fold jacket with full color Fabian's on front and rear, a large 17x24 autographed color photo inside, plus numerous other attractive black and white pics. The record contains standards "Ain't Misbehavin'" and "Gimmie a Little Kiss" plus ten new performances, several written by the successful teams of Doc Pomus-Mort Shuman and Bob Marcucci-Peter De Angelis.



"BEN HUR"—Music from the Soundtrack —Composed by Miklos Rozsa—MGM 1E1 (Monaural & Stereo)

The 15 million dollar spectacle is currently premiering thruout the world and the extensive promotion it is receiving will undoubtedly reflect in sales of this deluxe packaged soundtrack disk. Included in the package is a hard cover book which details with color pics the production of the film (sells separately for one dollar in theatre lobbies). The music is in the spectacle aspect of the film, broad sweeping patterns, bold, forceful, at times frenzied and continually stirring. Disk has 14 selections, each relating to incidents in the film.



"THE FOUR FRESHMEN AND FIVE GUITARS"—Capitol T 1255 & Stereo ST 1255

Five amplified guitars provide accompaniment for the unique vocal stylings of the Freshmen, who also come in with some of their own instrumental solos—Bob Flannigan, trombone, and Ken Albers, trumpet. They swing gracefully through "Rain," "It All Depends On You," "Nancy" and "Come Rain or Come Shine," among others. An imaginative vocal set that will further enhance the group's popularity.



"RITCHIE"—Ritchie Valens—Del-Fi DFLP 1206

One of several memorial albums released by the label, this one contains 12 never-before released recordings. An accomplished guitarist, the youngster is represented by three instrumentals too. Other tracks are a combination of blues and hard rockers, both at which Valens was proficient. One of the better rock and rollers, his work here will get strong teen acceptance.



"THE WHIMSICAL WORLD OF IRVING TAYLOR"—Warner Bros. W 1352

The whimsical world of Irving Taylor revolves around "Hawaiian Worm Raiser," "Garbage Collector in Beverly Hills," "Prison Interior Decorator" and sundry other people. This album is a collection of some of Taylor's best satirical works culled from previous WB albums. As important as the subjects and lyrics are the orchestra and vocal arrangements which hilariously kid the tritest cliches and phrases, and give the album its funniest moments. Taylor is a master of satire and these are his most successful excursions.



"GREAT FILM THEMES"—Stanley Black, his piano and Orchestra—London PS 113 (Monaural & Stereo)

Having created a wide appreciative audience for his Latin American disks, Stanley Black "goes straight" here. That is, he offers non-Latin renditions of several famous flick songs—many of which have won Academy Awards. Black's piano, thoughtful, delicate and melodic, is the feature attraction, backed subtly by lush strings. Among the selections are "Love is a Many Splendored Thing," "Be My Love," "Three Coins in the Fountain," "Secret Love" and "My Foolish Heart." Lovely mood album.



"LET'S DANCE AGAIN"—David Carroll and his Orchestra — Mercury SR 60152 (Monaural & Stereo)

The stereo version is necessary for full appreciation of this set for, although Carroll provides wholly adequate dance music, the package is an excellent demonstration of "ping-pong" stereo effects. The leader's arrangements are clever and cute, especially tailored for tricky stereo sounds. Selections include "Bouncing Ball," "Play a Simple Melody," "Adios" and 10 others. Pleasing and unobtrusive performance.



"GUITAR—TWANGY, WITH A BEAT"—Dean Hightower—ABC Paramount ABC 312 (Monaural & Stereo)

Disk debut of what could be another record star. Hightower proves here to be a potent guitarist, playing in a twangy but original manner. He generates an infectious drive that will be appreciated by the kids. Among the tunes are "Peg O' My Heart," "Harbor Lights," "Sweet Georgia Brown" and several originals by George Barnes. Give it careful attention.



"DON CORNELL SINGS LOVE SONGS—TEMPERAMENTE ITALIANO"—Signature SM 1001

A brace of "Italian" love songs are sung by Cornell in his most enthusiastic manner. He lends his identifiable, stylistic feelings to "Pretend You Don't See Her," "You're Breaking My Heart," "Just Say I Love Her," "Volare" and others in this area, singing both the American and Italian lyrics. An enjoyable listening session of sentimental favorites.



"LAZY AFTERNOON"—Peggy King—Imperial LP 9078

Pert and pretty Peggy King manifests an entirely new approach to singing, debuted here. She displays a throaty, sensuous and intimate style on twelve quiet ballads. They include "Imagination," "I Remember You," "Love Walked In" and "Nobody Else But Me."



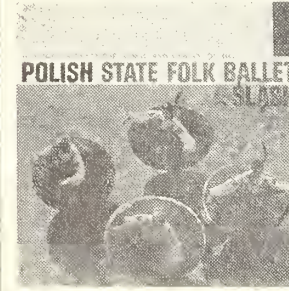
"THE SAME OLD MOON"—Jerry Vale—Columbia CL 1380 (Monaural & Stereo)

Lush ballads (and a few light swingers), all preoccupied with the "moon" theme are essayed with care and tenderness by the smooth-toned crooner. The accompaniment is naturally strings, adding up to a pleasant romantic mood. Included are "Moonlight Becomes You," "The Same Old Moon," "No Moon At All," and "In the Chapel in the Moonlight." A pleasant excursion for Vale.



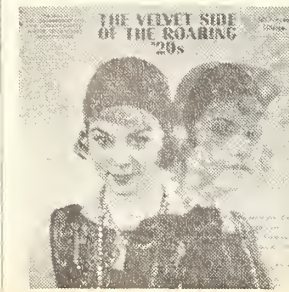
"GENE ALLISON"—Vee Jay LP 1009

Young singer, who belts the blues with strong feeling and deep rooted attachment, offers an album of mostly blues plus a few driving swingers. He scored single-wise with "You Can Make It If You Try," included in this collection, and should attract further attention with his moving performances on this album. Other selections include the touching inspirational "Have Faith," the shouting "Hey, Hey, I Love You," and the delicate "Everybody But Me."



"POLISH STATE FOLK BALLET"—Monitor MF 325

The folk ballet ("Slask") has gained international critical acclaim. Now appearing in the U.S. under impresario S. Hurok, they should win many admirers here—potential customers for this disk. Fourteen numbers are presented, sung by the large chorus and played by the ballet ork, as performed on stage. An admirable "cultural" product that should interest many.



"THE VELVET SIDE OF THE ROARING TWENTIES"—20th Fox FOX 3017

The Twenties weren't always roaring according to this album, which presents the softer, sentimental music of the period. Harry Simeone and Hugo Montenegro have fashioned light arrangements of such tunes as "I'll Get By," "Yearning," "I'll See You In My Dreams," "The Best Things in Life Are Free." They are performed adequately by a chorus and several capable soloists. High nostalgic interest here.



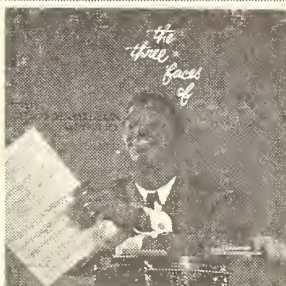

SONGS OF PRAISE



"SONGS OF PRAISE"—The Sensational Nightingales—Peacock PLP 101

The Nightingales represent the raw unpolished type of gospel group which most effectively communicates the passion of hymns and spirituals. Their sincerity and honesty is unquestionable in their performances. Lead voice is especially earthy and thrilling. Selections include "The Blood of Jesus," "Morning Train," "I Want To Go" and "Standing at the Judgement." This is gospel music for the true lovers of this music.



"THE THREE FACES OF CHICO HAMILTON"—Warner Bros. 1334 (Monaural & Stereo)

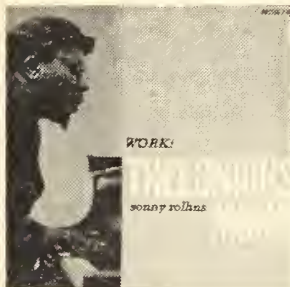
Hamilton's three faces are his vocals (disk debut) percussion solos and leader of a quintet. First his voice: Breathy, whisper-like, pleasant but the least impressive of his three faces. His percussion solos are interesting but could be more exciting if Hamilton made more imaginative use of his equipment. It is on the "Newport News" quintet track, scored by Kenny Dorham, that the group shows its capabilities. More Dorham things could bring the group to life.



"STACCATO" — Music from the TV series—Capitol T 1287 & Stereo ST 1287

Elmer Bernstein is the composer-arranger-conductor of the twelve selections from the current John Cassavetes-starred TV series, which features a Greenwich Village jazz spot in its scenery. The music is similar to others of the dramatic-jazz-for-private-eyes ilk, exciting and scene-heightening, but departs by using a small informal combo on a few tracks (as played at the jazz spot). Success of the show could result in good sales here.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



"WORK"—Thelonious Monk, Sonny Rollins—Prestige 7169

The three tracks here that feature Monk and Rollins together were recorded in 1953 and 1954 when Rollins was playing in a much more bop vein than he is now. His closeness to Monk's music is evident in the way the two play so well together here. Tunes are Monk's "Friday the Thirteenth" and two standards, "The Way You Look Tonight" and "I Want To Be Happy," the latter two achieving a happy, unself-conscious feeling. "Work" and "Nutt" are Monk trio sessions (1954) and reveal the master happily at work. Great sessions.



"BLOWIN' THE BLUES AWAY"—Horace Silver Quintet & Trio—Blue Note 4017

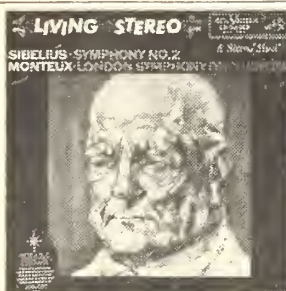
Silver's quintet has become one of the most popular groups in the east by concentrating on the blues, playing it with an unreserved fire. And the ballads are especially tender—"Peace," in this set is one of the most beautiful new ballads, perfectly achieving the meaning of its title. "Sister Sadie" is a cooking down-home gospel number that breaks it up at Silver's appearances. In addition there are two trio tracks—"St. Vitus Dance," "Melancholy Mood"—allowing close inspection of Silver's technique. A satisfying and very enjoyable album.

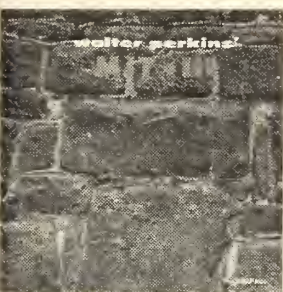
"ANNA MOFFO SINGS MOZART ARIAS"—Philharmonia Orchestra, Alceo Galliera, Conductor, Anna Moffo, Soprano—Angel 35716 (Monaural & Stereo)

Anna Moffo sings beautifully. She has a keen sense of style; her phrasing is sensitive and supple; and her voice possesses range and lustre. The orchestral support on this album is definitely first-class. This LP has all the requisites of a big seller.



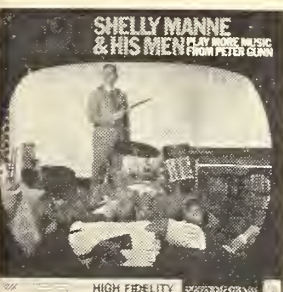
SIBELIUS: "Symphony No. 2"—London Symphony Orchestra, Pierre Monteux, Conductor—RCA Victor LSC 2342 (Monaural & Stereo)

An outstanding version of the Sibelius. It is no secret that M. Monteux is one of the greatest living conductors, and the London Symphony responds as one instrument to his authority, imagination, and fiery virtuosity. A definite seller.



"WALTER PERKINS' MJT 3"—Vee Jay LP 1013

A quintet of five young musicians, all fairly unknown, come up with an exciting and rewarding album. Perkins, drums; Harold Mabern, piano; Bob Cranshaw, bass; Willie Thomas, trumpet; Frank Strozier, alto; are the five who provide a breath of fresh air with their honest, swinging playing. Their association with the blues is strong and dominates the atmosphere here. Strozier is the most significant voice in the group. Now only 22, he could develop into one of the leading altoists in modern music. Disk deserves exposure.



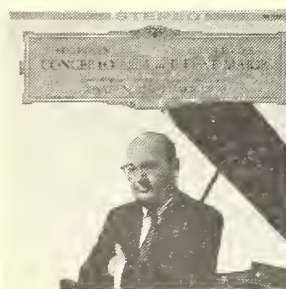
"SON OF GUNN!!"—Shelly Manne & His Men play More 'Peter Gunn'—Contemporary M 3566 (Monaural & Stereo)

Henry Mancini's compositions for "Peter Gunn" receive a small combo treatment here. Whereas the Mancini version (RCA Victor) is tightly arranged for big band, the same music is treated improvisationally, and with much more blowing going on—therefore containing more value as jazz—by Manne, Victor Feldman (vibes), Joe Gordon (trumpet), Richie Kamuca (tenor), Russ Freeman (piano) and Monty Budwig (bass). Interestingly Feldman also plays marimba on the session, an almost completely-disappeared jazz instrument. Good easy treatment of dramatic jazz.



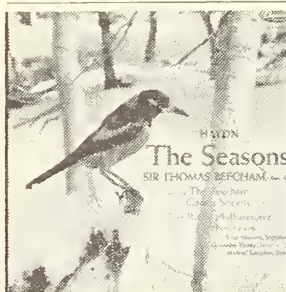
"THE SHAPE OF JAZZ TO COME"—Ornette Coleman—Atlantic 1317

Coleman's "new" jazz is difficult to listen to at first, for he combines a harsh, almost aggravating alto tone with a complete breakaway from usual jazz forms. The quartet—with Donald Cherry, trumpet; Charlie Haden, bass; Billy Higgins, drums—plays six Coleman compositions which are unquestionably original, imaginative and intriguing to the listener, but public acceptance of Coleman will be a difficult thing to come by. However, he should be listened to for the complete freedom that he advocates.



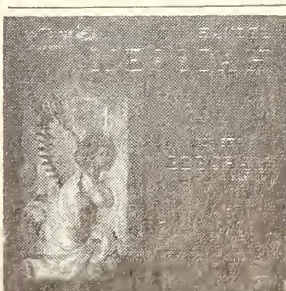
BEETHOVEN: "Concerto No. 5 in E Flat Major (Emperor)"; "Sonata No. 25 in G Major, Op. 79"—Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, Ferdinand Leitner, Conductor, Andor Foldes, Pianist—Deutsche Grammophon DGS 712011 (Monaural & Stereo)

Foldes' performance is unselfconscious, a virtue seldom encountered in an "Emperor" performance. If his rendition is not memorable, the pianist's personal approach—his naturalness—enables this version to stand on equal footing with the best catalog entries now available. The sonata contains some measures of distinctive playing, but the level is not consistently maintained. Album could be a sleeper with sufficient exposure.



HAYDN: "The Seasons"—Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Sir Thomas Beecham, Conductor, Elsie Morison, Soprano; Alexander Young, Tenor; Michael Langdon, Bass—Capitol 7184 (Monaural & Stereo)

Beecham demonstrates that the years have in no way dimmed his vast conductorial gifts. This performance is consistently first-rate in every department. The attractively packaged item is a valuable catalog addition which should have wide commercial appeal. Excellent recorded sound.



HANDEL: "Messiah"—Royal Philharmonic Orch., Chorus & Soloists Conducted by Sir Thomas Beecham—RCA Victor LDS 6049 (Monaural & Stereo)

Beecham offers an inspired reading of the complete version of Handel's epic score. His outstanding abilities are too well-known to describe here, and the Ork, chorus and soloists are admirably equipped to convey his brilliant grasp of the work. The 4 disk album is handsomely packaged, with an informative brochure containing notes on the text. This "Messiah" should enjoy steady sales with an extra boost at Christmas.

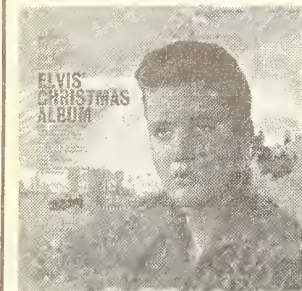
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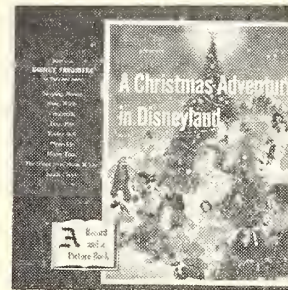

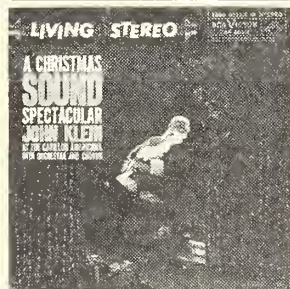

a dancing beat, and the ork is reliable in main-
taining it. Vocalists are featured on several tracks.
Included are "Jumpin' Jiminy Christmas," "Sleigh
Ride," "Christmas Chopsticks."



"HAPPY BIRTHDAY JESUS"—Larry Caton at
the Organ—Mark MLP 1000

Organist Caton is supplemented with chimes
and celeste in a program of 22 Christmas selec-
tions. One side contains 10 carols and hymns,
played reverently and in accord with the religious
spirit. The other side is a brisk run-through of 12
seasonal songs on the lighter aspects of the holi-
day, including "Toyland," "I Wish That I Were

MGM Promotion Guns On "Ben-Hur"

NEW YORK — Early openings of the MGM's flick production of "Ben-Hur" at Loew's State, New York; Saxon Theatre, Boston; Egyptian Theatre, Los Angeles and at the Boyd Theatre, Philadelphia found MGM Record distributors ready with merchandise and display material to meet and promote the early opening dates.

Such display material as full color posters showing scenes from the picture, background wall paper, 36 x 36 blow-ups of the MGM Records deluxe album cover, window streamers, special mailing pieces have all been sent to the theatres with opening dates. A movie playdate service listing for distributors and dealers has been circulated along with a matching list of names and addresses of MGM pictures film branch managers and exploitation men.

In New York MGM Records distributor, Al Levine, Ideal Record Products, has set up full window displays in Gaiety, Tin Pan Alley, Strand, Colony, King Carroll and Capitol record shops. Eddie Heller, MGM album director, arranged for full window displays in Woolworth stores throughout the city.

MGM's Sol Handwerger, handling advertising and publicity, is covering radio stations in the early opening date areas by sending special allocations of disk jockey promotional copies in bulk direct to the distributors who will be responsible for getting them out to radio stations. Special attention will be given record editors throughout the country who will start

receiving their review copies next week.

Reams of publicity and promotion material have been turned out by the team of Heller and Handwerger the like of which has never been equalled for any other album release. The film, which cost \$15,000,000, will be supported by a co-op advertising tie-in in both film and MGM Records' two albums, the first of which ran the week of Nov. 16 in *The Cash Box*.

Kicking off the consumer advertising campaign was a full page ad placed by Doubleday Book shops in the New York Times (Sunday Nov. 22). Distributors in early date areas are now making arrangements for similar tie-in dealer advertising. For such insertions MGM Records is preparing mats, photos and line cuts, making them available to distributors, dealers and publications setting their own ads.

The MGM Records' deluxe package of music by composer Miklos Rozsa will retail for \$4.98 Monaural and \$5.98 in stereo and will contain a 32 page hard cover souvenir book in full color showing thrilling scenes from the production.

The Lion album of musical highlights from "Ben-Hur" will retail for \$1.98 Monaural and \$2.98 in stereo. This is believed to be the first time in the history of recorded motion picture background music that two albums of the musical score have been released by the same company at the same time.

Deutschman To Head Decca Classical Promo & Publicity

NEW YORK—Ben Deutschman has been appointed to head the publicity and promotion department of Decca Records classical department. Deutschman comes to the label from Everest Records, where he was director of advertising, publicity and public relations.

Other positions held by Deutschman include: promotion and publicity for Capitol and Mercury; educational sales director for Children's Record Guild and Young People's Records; radio shows on WGBA and WRBL in Columbus, Ga.; public school music teacher. He maintains active membership in the Music Educators National Conference and the New York State School Music Association.

Nov. Biggest Month For UA

NEW YORK—United Artists Records is enjoying its most successful selling sprint since entering the record business almost two years ago, the diskery reported last week. The label is building up sales both from its singles and album releases.

The company is currently represented on the singles charts with three records, "Love Potion #9" by The Clovers, "You Got What It Takes" by Marv Johnson and "I'll Walk The Line" by Don Costa in strong positions.

Recent album releases by Burl Ives, Modern Jazz Quartet, Villa-Lobos with Bidu Sayao, Stokowski, Herbie Mann, Art Farmer, the Wurlitzer Pipe Organ series and sound track sets, are, says UA, helping to shape up November as the strongest monthly sales period in UA's history.

A group of new single releases by the Jamies, Diahann Carroll, Rosemary June and Eddie Holland are "starting to break out, contributing to the stepped-up activity." The big singles push on the label is being provided by the company's new A & R chief Don Costa. The label's talent roster has undergone significant broadening since Costa moved over to UA, and the appointment of Andy Miele to head sales is proving to be a major factor in the company's increasing growth, the label said.

ENGLAND

One of the most prolific independent record producing companies in Europe today is Record Supervision. Founded by its present Director, the former leading jazz disk jockey Denis Preston, the company first kicked off in the entirely specialised field of jazz and West Indian music. Now, five years after, the current releases range from virtuoso flamenco guitarist Jose Motos whose first L.P. is released this month on the Top Rank label, to Mike Preston's "Mr. Blue" on Decca. Leading jazz men under contract to Record Supervision include Humphrey Lyttelton, Chris Barber, Acker Bilk, Ken Colyer, Mick Milligan and Alex Welsh which means that Preston controls something like 90% of the salable jazz talent in this country.

Acting as his own A & R man Preston records in his own modern up-to-date and elaborately equipped studios releasing material to all the major manufacturers including Decca, E.M.I., Philips, Pye and Top Rank. Currently supplying Columbia with a complete jazz catalogue under the title "Lansdowne Jazz Series." Two Record Supervision disks "Acker's Away" by Acker Bilk Band on Columbia and "Chris Barber Jazz Parade" on Pye have shown recently in "The Cash Box" British Top Ten E.P.s.

Biggest hit this year has been the Chris Barber-Monty Sunshine golden disk award "Petite Fleur" on Pye, topping over one and a half million sales. Another 1959 hit was the second prize winning entry from the Eurovision Song Contest "Sing Little Birdie" recorded by Teddy Johnson and Pearl Carr on Columbia.

This month Columbia is issuing the first series of American jazz recordings made for Record Supervision in New York under the personal direction of Stanley Dance, celebrated jazz critic. This is the first time since the 1930s that a series of jazz records has been made in the U.S. expressly for release in this country. Denis Preston told "The Cash Box" that November releases total 15 12" albums, 2 E.P.s and 4 singles. Labels represented include Columbia, Parlophone, Top Rank, Fontana and Pye.

Flying to the States on December 5th is Leslie A. MacDonnell the man who, on January 1st this year, succeeded Val Parnell as Managing Director of Moss Empires, the largest chain of live theatres in the world, which this year celebrates its Diamond Jubilee—sixty years of show business. At present MacDonnell controls all the group's theatres except one—the most famous of them all—The London Palladium, mecca of all the greatest names in show business. This, he will take over, again from Val Parnell, on January 1st, 1960. In a special interview with "The Cash Box" representative MacDonnell outlined the plans of his forthcoming American trip. After a weekend in Los Angeles he flies to Hollywood for conferences with Liberace concerning his 12-week visit to this country in the Spring of next year. Liberace will star for eight weeks at the London Palladium in a revue specially designed and built around him. MacDonnell then flies to Las Vegas (December 8th, 9th and 10th) where he says "it is possible to see a greater aggregation of star talent than anywhere else in the world—and I hope to do deals with one or two artistes for the big Palladium show which will follow the Liberace season." Then to New York (December 12th to 16th inclusive) to look up old friends.

As a result of a contract signed some six months ago with 'Starday', the American Country & Western label, 'Ziggy' Jackson, General Manager of Melodisc Records plans to further cement the large and ever-growing demand for this type of music over here. With a mass of new releases on the Melodisc label Country & Western fans will have access to many disks never before available in this country. Jackson plans to popularise Country & Western still further with juke box exploitation. Great names to be released by Melodisc include Frankie Miller, Bill Clifton, The Country Gentlemen, Buz Busby and Jim Eanes. Launched in the immediate post war years Melodisc initially promoted jazz records. In the early 1950s this independent company switched to calypso, then to the 'pop' field. Four years ago Melodisc broke into the African market and is now a major label there both with African and calypso material. Jazz wise Melodisc holds the Stinson catalogue with fine records taken from 'Folkways' and 'Commodore' masters.

Len Edwards, General Manager of Barton Music London is delighted with the seemingly endless popularity of Frank Sinatra's "High Hopes" currently high in the British charts and is looking forward to equal success with Frank's latest Capitol release "Talk To Me."

As a Director of the Nevins-Kershner group, Len received a congratulatory cable in glowing terms from the States on the entry into the British charts of Neil Sedaka's "Oh Carol" on R.C.A. after his best selling "I Go Ape." The instant success of this latest disk confirms Neil's fast growing popularity over here. Lloyd Price's "I'm Gonna Get Married" published by Lloyd-Logan of which Len Edwards is also a Director, is still doing well. Met newcomer to Mellin Music and Associates Lennie Black, late of Chappells, who has already established himself as a go ahead exploitation manager for the group.

Maurice Scopp, Vice President of Robbins Music arrives in London on November 30th for discussions with Alan Holmes of the London office.

Leslie Osborne has rejoined the Keith Prowse Music Publishing Company as Exploitation Manager. Osborne recently completed seven years with the Ascherberg Music Publishing Co.

Singer Susan Denny, holidaying in Greece this year, heard a Greek song "Takori Mou" liked it and brought it back to England. Took it along to Dave Toff, Director of Dave Toff Music Publishing Company who also liked it. With new lyrics and the title of "Annabella Brown" Susan has recorded it for Oriole and is being released December 1st.

A thick London fog gave Frankie Vaughan a typically English welcome when he flew into London on a three-day visit to appear in Val Parnell's Sunday Night at the London Palladium. With him came manager Paul Cave with news of Frankie's sensational success in the Perry Como show resulting in an invitation for a repeat performance. A further film offer has been made for Frankie to star in a straight dramatic role next May.

Fast climbing American success "Uh! Oh!" by The Nutty Squirrels released here on the Pye International label.

Winifred Atwell's Christmas hit "Piano Party" with eleven hit tunes on one single disk released here by Decca.

Popular Scandinavian artistes Nina and Frederik have waxed their version of "Mary's Boy Child" on the Columbia label.

From Philips comes a new Harry Secombe recording "The Holy City" backed with "Jerusalem."

Chris Barber and his singer Otilie Patterson were married this week in London. The wedding was a closely guarded secret and of the Barber band only trumpeter Pat Halcox was present—he was best man.

British recording artiste Donald Peers who once topped the bill at the London Palladium makes a welcome return to disk with "Roses From Venice."

Many New Record Shops In Britain

ENGLAND — The unprecedented boom here in the record industry over the past few years has brought about the opening of many new record shops up and down the country ranging in size from the one-man retailer to the introduction of record departments into well established stores.

In this category one of the most successful ventures has been that of W. H. Smith & Son Ltd., Britain's largest chain of booksellers and newsagents. Their entry into the record market came in March 1958 with the opening of a record department in one of their London shops. To date records are sold in nine of their branches in various parts of the country. Further expansions are planned for the coming year.

Each record department is a completely self contained unit—a shop within a shop—managers of each branch are responsible for ordering their own records and staff are trained under experienced supervision. Every label is represented and special atten-

tion is given to international records and children's disks. Attractive display posters are another feature.

Sales are equally divided between pops and classics. The record sales advisor sees no sign of a decline in sales and feels that with careful buying the market is still wide open for expansion. Unlike America the British retailer is not permitted to sell off stock at a reduced rate except in the case of "imminent deletions." No percentage discounts are allowed and the only channel through which a retailer can dispose of surplus stock is by the quarterly 5% returns allowance direct to the manufacturer.

In certain instances he would welcome closer cooperation between manufacturers and retailers and in this respect would like to see more manufacturers offering training courses for their dealers and assistants. Programs of this nature arranged by the E. M. I. group at their Great Castle Street headquarters have proved both helpful and successful.

ITALY

The Voce del Padrone-Columbia-Marconiphone S.P.A. is the oldest and currently one of the most important record firms in Italy. The firm's origins go back to the beginning of the Italian record industry.

In 1906 an Italian representative of the English Gramophone Co. was established. This company later assumed the now-famous "Voce del Padrone" trademark and became the first Italian record company. It was first to distribute records and to introduce the latest technical developments in recording such as the change from mechanical to electric recording, and subsequently to hi-fi, microgroove and now stereo.

In 1937 the Voce del Padrone and Columbia merged (by international agreement), thus forming a single complex which then accounted for 70% of the total Italian record production. The new firm, still known by its name of Voce del Padrone-Columbia-Marconiphone S.P.A., progressed rapidly in the radio and record field. Today the firm's main activities are centered on record production and distribution, distributing the Columbia, Capitol and Pathe labels and its subsidiary labels. Its catalog is diversified, containing besides pop, opera, classical, light and chamber music. Its opera activities reached its peak with an agreement between Columbia and the La Scala Opera to produce a series of operas at La Scala with world famous artists.

The commercial organization is one of the most efficient in the field. It consists of three branches, various depots, four shops and employs a large number of agents and salesmen.

I had a long conversation with Mr. Franchetti, who has been inspector general of the SEDRIM (Societa Esercizio Diritti Riproduzione Meccanica), about whether he will accept the position of secretary of the Gruppo Fonografico Italiano, to which he has been appointed. Mr. Franchetti informed me that he is almost certain he will accept the charge officially.

Mr. Robbiani, administrator of the Carish Co., indicated in a recent conversation that Peppino di Capri is the label's best selling artist. His most popular songs are "Malattia" and at present, "Ghiaccio." His recently-formed quintet plays music which combines modern rock and roll with the Neapolitan traditional sound. He is currently appearing at the Pipistrello night club in Rome and in Dec. will play the Caprice in Milan. On Dec. 9 he appears with the quintet at a Milan musical show which also featured Caterina Valente, the Four Saints, and a jazz combo comprised of Chet Baker, Lars Gullin, Jimmy Pratt, Romano Mussolini, Franco Cerri and Glauco Masetti. This troupe is now touring Italy.

Dr. G. Giannini, foreign operations manager and export sales manager of C.G.D., informs me that M.G.M. Records will now be distributed in Italy by his firm (Compagnia Generale del Disco). The first M.G.M. record under the new distribution agreement is "Mona Lisa" and "Halfway to Heaven" by Conway Twitty.

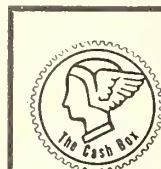

SCANDINAVIA

American jazz singer Helen Merrill is in Europe and has been for a few months. The other day she showed up at the Stockholm's jazz Mecca, the Nalen, where she sang with Stan Getz Quartet, who just opened for a 12-day stay. Miss Merrill reported she will sing with them during their stay at the Nalen. The Nalen people, on other hand, became a little confused and declared they could not afford Miss Merrill as they had the Getz Quartet under an expensive contract. Miss Merrill answered that she hadn't said anything about any money, and Stan Getz declared that he and the quartet would pay her from their own pockets as long as she sang with them. . . . Swedish television has now 500,000 license owners. The non-commercial state-controlled Swedish TV is sponsored by licenses which cost 100 Kronor (\$20.—) annually. In the last months, the number of tv-viewers has been growing steadily and the number of 500,000 was reached already in beginning of November, against, as everybody expected, sometimes in February 1960. License owner No. 500,000 got a five-years' free license as a present from the authorities. . . . Bandleader Anders Burman has reported that he will break up his orchestra early in 1960. His band has been one of Sweden's most popular dance and show bands. "My future job, which will take all my time, will be as a-&-r man of Metronome Records", Burman reports. Anders Burman is one of the Burman brothers who founded Metronome ten years ago. . . . Folke Sjödin from Upsala is the latest discovery on Swedish disks. He made his first sides for Metronome a few days ago. Sjödin is in the pop field. . . . Danish calypso-singers Nina and Frederik has been contracted for TV-appearances at the BBC in London. They will appear in a show with Harry Belafonte and Lena Horne. During the last weeks, Nina and Frederik has been topping the EP-sales lists at the British Hit Parades. . . . The British operetta "Salad Days" has not yet scored any particular interest from Swedish stages, but the Swedes will be able to see it, anyhow. The Swedish TV has decided to present the musical on January 5th next year under the Swedish title "Ung och grön" (Young and Green).

New Brussels Pressing Machine

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM—The Fabeldis company, here, has made available a new Fabel record press. The firm claims a high degree of safety, simplicity, rapidity, and economy. Also of note, Fabel says, is the steel frame. Models include 7", 10" and 12" presses.

An important safety measure is that two buttons have to be actuated at the same time for operation of the machine. There is "easy" pre-selective adjustment and all speeds do not require any tooling. Rapid features include: closing time: 2 seconds; automatic opening time after pressing: 3 to 4 seconds; time required for changing matrixes: 2 minutes per set; automatic disengagement of the centers issuing from the central hole of the records. Economy is the result of low consumption of high pressure, oil or water (about ¼ gallon per record).

The record die is claimed to provide quick heat conductivity ("special high

resistance metal"); no water or steam leaks and fast assembling of the matrixes.

Fabeldis is a 30 year old firm, which—in addition to the Fabel record press—maintains stocks enabling it to supply all other parts and accessories for the pressing industry.

U.A. In Stockholm Deal

NEW YORK—United Artists Music and Unart Music have recently signed an agreement with Multitone A.B. of Stockholm Sweden for the establishment of a new music publishing firm tentatively named Karin A.B.

Karin will be owned jointly by the United Artists subsidiaries and Multitone. The newly formed firm will operate in the territories of Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Finland and Iceland and will act as sole agent of the United Artists companies to exploit music controlled by them.



GERMANY

Several German record stars are scheduled for forthcoming American trips. Caterina Valente will go to New York soon to record an album and to appear on Revlon's "Big Party." Alice Babs, a Swedish singer who first achieved fame in Germany, is slated for a four week engagement at the Coconut Grove in Hollywood. Reception to Sophia Loren's new record, "Bing! Bang! Bong!" (on Philips) is enthusiastic.

Deutsche Grammophon Gesellschaft and the Polish company Polskie Nagrania have jointly recorded three albums by the famous Russian pianist Svyatoslav Richter. Compositions by Mozart, Schuman, Rachmaninoff and Prokofieff are included.

Lale Anderson, Electrola star about whom I wrote three weeks ago, was awarded the "Silbernen Hund" (Silver Dog) emblematic of her twenty year success with "Lilli Marleen." Fred Bertelmann received the "Goldenen Hund" a while ago for his "Lachender Vagabund," the first such award ever made.

Cliff Richard received a Gold Record recently for his recording of "Living Doll."

Little Gerald's new release, "Jung und Verliebt" and "Baby Lover" (on Electrola) looks like it could become a hit.

The Platters arrived in Germany Nov. 14 for personal appearances and to make a film titled "European Nights."

Electrola reports that it is shipping 10,000 copies of Rocco Granata's "Marina" each day.

Los Espanoles, an authentic Spanish quintet very popular in Germany, are out with a new Polydor release, "Kanimambo" and "Marina."

Another record that can hit the best seller lists is Jimmy Makulis' East-German song, "Gitarren Klingen Leise Durch die Nacht."

Artone's system is applied to single- and double presses and gives a faster production, lower rejects and better quality. The operator has to do nothing but to put in material, to press the button and after the cycle to take off the record.

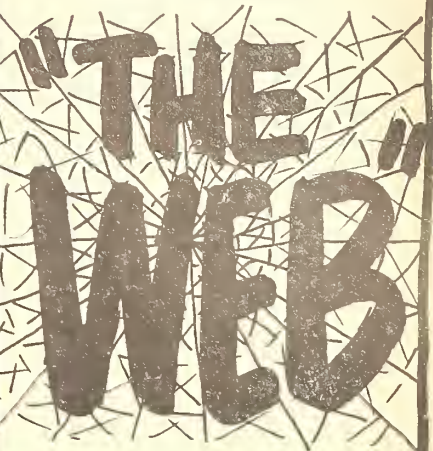

New board directors include Dub Albritton and Dee Kilpatrick—Artist Management, Bob Cooper and Joe Allison—Radio and TV Management, Cindy Walker and Bob Sauer—Songwriters and Composers, Roy Acuff and Pee Wee King—Artists, Len Ellis and Cracker Jim—Disk Jockeys, Jim Denny and (re-elected) Wesley Rose—Publishers, Joe Lucas and (re-elected) Ken Nelson—Record Companies, Harold Moon and Si Simon—At Large. Connie Gay introduced all the members at the First Annual Banquet held Friday night at the Brentwood Country Club.

McLaughlin To Walton Music

HOLLYWOOD — Joe McLaughlin, veteran expert in music copyrights and for twenty-five years in charge of the musical copyright and music clearance departments for Warner Bros., has been appointed general manager of Walton Music, coast publishing firm headed by Norman Luboff.

Luboff, one of the most active choral directors in motion pictures, television, and records, announced the appointment last week to become effective immediately.

McLaughlin will make his headquarters in Hollywood, and will supervise all activities of the publishing company.

RCA Victor Begins Christmas Push

NEW YORK—The big Christmas promotion by RCA Victor is in full swing now to back up the label's Christmas release, it was reported by William I. Alexander, manager, advertising, publicity and promotion.

Appearing now is Victor's full-page 4-color ad featuring Christmas LP's, gift albums and the new Soria Series. The ad can be seen in various leading consumer publications.

Network radio and TV are being covered with Victor Christmas record commercials on the new Saturday evening western, "Bonanza", on the new Sunday TV special, "Sunday Showcase" and on radio "Monitor".

On the local level, four shopper

newspapers mats have shipped to all distributors along with 30 and 60 second transcribed radio spots.

One of the special features of the point-of-sale campaign are specially developed Christmas seals and tapes which can be used for special seasonal color displays, on dealer mailings, for decorating gift packages, and for spelling out Christmas messages on windows, packages and counters. Other point-of-sale, Alexander reported, includes an illuminated full-color window display, a full-color eight-page supplement featuring Christmas merchandise and 7-inch and 12-inch shopping bags.

Roulette Reports Heavy Reaction On Xmas LP's

NEW YORK — Roulette Records last week reported that the first reorders coming in on its two Xmas albums, "It's Christmas Once Again"—Jimmie Rodgers and "St. Patrick's Cathedral Choir Sings Christmas Carols," represented the heaviest reorders the label has enjoyed on any albums since it opened shop.

The albums, according to Joe Kolsky, executive vice president, have only been in the distributors' hands since the second week of November. This means that the dealers have had the album in stock for a little over a week. Despite this brief period of time, Kolsky revealed that just during this past week alone reorders were placed by Boston, Chicago, New York, St. Louis, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Detroit.

Everyone of these distributors he explained received very heavy initial quantities and although Roulette anticipated reorders once the heavy air play on Xmas records got under way, the sudden flood of reorders at this early date caught the diskery by surprise, Kolsky said. As a result, both Modern Album Finishing, the outfit producing the St. Patrick's Cathedral album jackets and Peerless Album, which is responsible for turning out the Jimmie Rodgers jacket, have been ordered to produce additional quantities on both jacket covers. Also, an additional pressing plant besides the two now pressing the LPs will be

stamping out the albums in order to meet the demand.

Roulette has also made up a special direct mailing piece to Catholic parochial and Jesuit institutions all over the country on the St. Patrick's Cathedral album and, according to Kolsky, this too has added to the "tremendous" increase in orders.

In conclusion, Kolsky pointed out that since there are single releases from both Christmas albums ("Carol Of The Drums"—from the St. Patrick LP and "It's Christmas Once Again" and "Wistful Willie" from the Jimmie Rodgers LP) and taking into account the fact that after Thanksgiving the air play on Christmas LPs and singles will really hit its stride, Roulette is therefore looking forward in Nov.-Dec. to be the biggest billing months in the company's history.

Slezak Debuts At Met

NEW YORK—Walter Slezak will make his Metropolitan Opera House debut in the title role of "The Gypsy Baron" on November 25, marking almost 50 years to the day that his father, the late, great tenor, Leo Slezak, sang his first role at the same theatre on November 17, 1909.

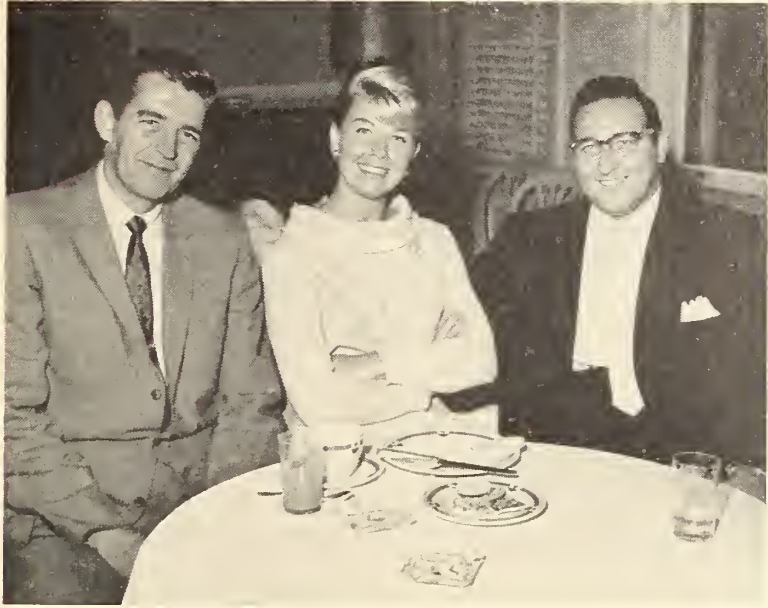

Distrib Survey Sees Need For One-Sided Hit Singles At 49¢

PHILADELPHIA—Teeners would go for a one-sided hit record priced at 49¢, Chips distribs' Bob Heller reported last week. Heller based his opinion on a recent field trip and survey of dealers.

"Today a store doing \$1,000 a week record business," Heller said, "breaks down its sales as follows: \$850 for LPs and \$150 for 45s. The teenage buyer is now buying LPs instead of 45s, the reason being that the value is so much better."

Talking to the youngsters, Heller found that 98¢ is "just too much to spend for a record." Heller thinks they would like to buy a one-sided hit, with the other side either blank or containing a picture of the artist.

Heller said: "A record such as this could be priced at 49¢. The record could be placed in a colorful sleeve and the other side of the sleeve would have the lyrics of the song." The exec feels that the purchaser wants to sing-along with the records.

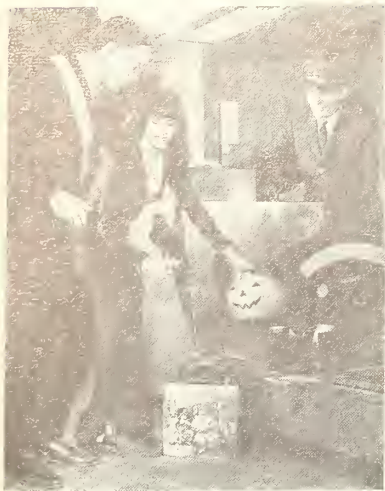

The new Presley LP, "50,000,000 Elvis Fans Can't Be Wrong—Elvis' Gold Records, Volume 2", is a follow-up to the best-seller "Elvis' Gold Records, Volume 1", released in the spring of this year.

The new album, containing "I Beg of You", "I Got Stung", "A Big Hunk O' Love" and other smash hits by the great young singer, will be heavily promoted by RCA Victor. Full page ads will appear in Teen, The Hit Parader and Song Hits. A special full-color deluxe window display in da-glo will be available for in-store use.

In addition, mounted album covers will be shipped and the LP will be RCA Victor's choice for the Dec. blinker box. The new Presley album will also be featured on RCA Victor's illuminated Christmas display.

CHICAGO—Nick Adams, star of TV's new serial, "The Rebel" and of many motion pictures, has been signed by Mercury Records to a recording contract. Adams recently told newspaper interviewers that he had been approached by a recording company but "I don't expect anything to come of it, I told them I could carry a tune but I can't sing—". This, according to Art Talmadge, Mercury's A&R chief, is one of the year's understatements:

"Nick is a natural talent, his singing is as distinctive as his acting. Just one more form of expression for a fellow who writes, directs, does everything well. As a recording artist, we expect him to hit immediately."

Adams' first single for the diskery is due in Jan.

CHICAGO—Jensen Industries announced last week the marketing of a "lifetime" diamond phono needle. The needle retails for \$25 and carries a guarantee against "any kind of wear anytime during the life of the owner." The needle is being manufactured for every model of hi-fi set available.

NEW YORK—Mort Hillman, recently appointed general manager in charge of Sales and A & R of Seeco Records, announced last week the pacting of French chanteuse Lilo, jazz thrush Teal Joy and singer Joe Arthur to exclusive disk deals with the indie label. In addition, Hillman stated, Seeco has re-signed Shoshana Damari, the Israeli songstress who has already cut two LP's for them.

In an innovation for Seeco, Hillman declared that he has made a distribution deal with the Finesse label, jointly owned by Johnny Green and Lee Osser. The first Finesse platter, the oldie "Heart And Soul" by "Samson and the Goliaths" has already been sent out to deejays and distributors.

of the "Chipmunk Song" b/w "Alvin's Harmonica". Arrangements have been completed by Liberty to tie-in strong plugs for the Chipmunks' records in all advertising and point-of-sale display material boosting the apparel, toys, novelties and books patterned after the disk favorites.

Since the allied merchandise ranges from newsstands, toy stores, clothing outlets, paint and wallpaper stores, to hardware and novelty outlets, Liberty said it is garnering peak penetration for the Chipmunk disk in many areas not normally open to record sales promotion and merchandising.

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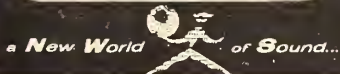

2000 Make Nashville Country DJ Festival A Solid Success

NASHVILLE—One of the most successful Disk Jockey Festivals in the eight year history was concluded in Nashville last Sunday after three days of music, meditation and merriment.

More than two thousand platter spinners, recording industry reps, and publishers flocked into Nashville to help celebrate the 34th birthday of the Grand Ole Opry, and to learn first hand some of the more material aspects of the country music field.

Money, and how to make more of it, was the theme of the Festival. This was touched upon in conversation and dwelt upon in the business sessions, which included a panel of Dave Tone, owner of the Station KDAV, Lubbock, Texas; KPEP, San Angelo; KZIP, Amarillo, and KPIK, Colorado Springs; James Denny, President Jim Denny Artist Bureau; and Cedarwood Publishing; Cas Walker, Knoxville City councilman, and owner of a string of super markets; and Harry Stone, executive director, Country Music Association.

Delegates gathered in the historic War Memorial Auditorium to hear the serious discussion, liberally sprinkled with Walker's humor.

Dr. Spencer Thornton, surgeon, student of religion, and a national television and radio personality in the field of extra sensory perception, was the keynoter. He disarmed his audience with a display of ESP, and then lifted the Festival on a spiritual plane by pleading for good taste and a little moral value in the furtherance of country music.

The Festival was not without its gimmicks. One lady promoter tried (somewhat successfully) to further the career of her client by bringing a live lion into the lobby of the Andrew Jackson Hotel, the Festival headquarters. She promptly landed in jail, at which point her client forgot her. One D.J. paraded on stilts—another dressed himself as a prisoner with a ball and chain. For the most part, however, the Festival was kept on a high level with a relatively subdued atmosphere.

Six big sponsors pitched in to help feed and entertain the great masses of visitors. They were BMI, Cadence Records, Columbia Records, D Records, Dot Records and RCA Victor Records. The Festival, naturally, was hosted by WSM.

Probably the highlight of the entire two and a half day event was a festive opening called, "Musical Roll Call Of The Stars Of The Grand Ole Opry." Each opry member appeared on the Auditorium stage to give a brief rendition of his or her greatest hit. It was a regular who's who of country music, with Roy Acuff, Chet Atkins, Margie Bowes, Carl Butler, Archie Campbell, The Carlises, June Carter, Wilma Lee and Stoney Cooper, Cowboy Copas, Skeeter Davis, Roy Drusky, Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs, Don Gibson, Billy Grammer, Hawkshaw Hawkins, Ferlin Husky, Stonewall Jackson, Cousin Jody, Johnny and Jack, Grandpa Jones, The Jordanaires, Lonzo and Oscar, The Louvin Brothers, Benny Martin, Bill Monroe, Jimmy Newman, Ray Price, Jim Reeves, Marty Robbins, Rusty and Doug, Jean Shepard, Hank Snow, Stringbean, Ernest Tubb, Porter Wagoner, Kitty Wells, The Wilburn Brothers, Del Wod and Faron Young. Minnie Pearl, scheduled to appear, ran into flight difficulties and missed the

opening. She appeared in time for an interview on "Its Network Time" an NBC feature. The network, by the way, carried six hours of live coverage from the Festival on radio and video-taped portions for television.

The DJ's saw WSM's Friday Night Frolics, a two hour live broadcast featuring Grand Ole Opry stars, and Mr. Dee Jay, USA, with Grant Turner. On Saturday night, at the climax of the Festival, they took part in observing the Opry birthday.

An added attraction this year was the group of Antonio Maciel and his Aquillillas of Mexico City, who sang the country music of that nation. Further international flavor was added by the attendance of more than a dozen DJ's from Canada.

Nearly every state in the nation was represented. Ohio, Indiana and Tennessee led the list in registration.

Awards were presented at a Saturday afternoon party hosted by WSM.

Another feature of this year's Festival was the publication of a special country music newspaper, with two editions to keep the delegates up on the events of the affair.

In keeping with the occasion, Governor Buford Ellington declared last week "Grand Ole Opry Week", and names Saturday as "Tennessee Monitor Day". Secretary of State Joe Carr spoke on behalf of the Governor in welcoming the delegates.

A special taping session was held in which time was set aside for the DJ's to make tape recordings with the Grand Ole Opry stars to take home.

Merely Lindsay and his Jubilee Band played for a special Festival Dance Friday night.

Plans already are underway for next year's 9th Annual Country Music Disk Jockey Festival.

The diskery released 6 stereo singles last April.

Red Nichols To Tour Near & Middle East

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol's Red Nichols and His Five Pennies will start the New Year by embarking Jan. 2, on a 12-week, 12-country goodwill tour of the Near and Middle East. Tour is to be sponsored by the State Department, under the auspices of President Eisenhower's International Culture Exchange Program, as administered by the American National Theater Academy.

Nichols and his band will be the first American entertainers to make such a tour in 1960. They will leave New York by jet airliner Jan. 2 for Athens, and will conclude the State Department portion of their trip March 17 in Ceylon. They will then fly to London to begin a three-month personal-appearance tour of the British Isles and Europe.

In addition to Greece and Ceylon, Nichols and his band will give concerts in Turkey, Cyprus, Lebanon, Syria, Jordan, Egypt, Iran, Afghanistan, West Pakistan and India. In all, Nichols and His Pennies will give more than 75 concerts.

In preparation for the forthcoming tour, Nichols and his men took part in a special television news feature filmed by the U.S. Information Agency International Television Service in Capitol's Tower recording studios, Hollywood Film, which was directed by the USIA's George Wallach, will be shown abroad prior to Nichol's arrival.

Members of the Nichols crew include: Pete Beilmann, trombone; ROLLIE CULVER, drummer; Joe Rushton, bass sax; Bill Wood, clarinet; Al Sutton, piano.

For Nichols, 40-year exponent of the jazz idiom, the globe-girdling tour climaxes one of the most successful years of his career. Last spring, Paramount Pictures released "The Five Pennies," a film based on Nichols' life, and as a result Nichols and his men have been receiving many requests for network television appearances. Simultaneously, sales of Nichols' Capitol recordings have reached the highest level in his 10 years as an exclusive Capitol artist, the diskery said.

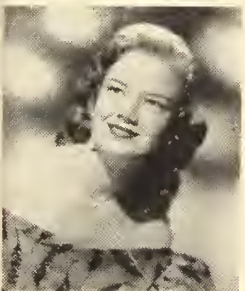

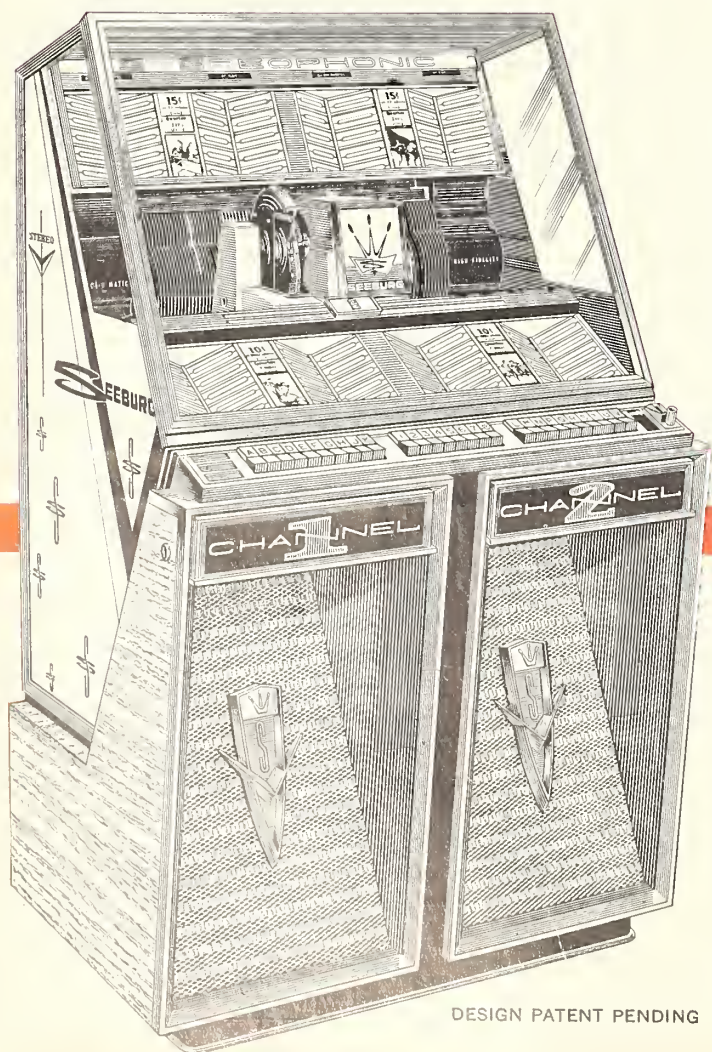
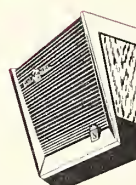

The Trend Is Toward—

DIVERSIFICATION

For the past several years, members of the coin machine industry — manufacturers, distributors and operators — have implemented their initial and fundamental types of businesses with equipment formerly considered foreign to their specialized operations.

In the past year or so, this trend has become more pronounced.

Manufacturers of music machines started to produce vendors; manufacturers of games are making vendors; a manufacturer of games produced a music machine; and a manufacturer of vending machines purchased a music machine firm.

With manufacturers active in these various divisions, distributors who were specializing, are now diversifying as well.

Operators, whose locations were suitable for several types of equipment began to expand their operations to service these locations with whatever was needed.

The trend to diversification, while quite obvious these past few years, is now becoming a definite trend. More and more coinmen are taking on lines of varied types of machines — especially music and amusement machine operators adding cigarette vendors.

Cigarette vendors are particularly suitable for operators catering to locations which they service with music and amusement machines. Statistics available at this time indicate that 35% to 40% of the operators handling music and amusement machines also have cigarette routes.

The reason for the interest of operators in a diversified coin machine business is obvious and logical. The location owner, in most instances, prefers to deal with one operator for all equipment. If the operator is friendly with the location owner, he doesn't find it too difficult to get agreement to place all the machines. Therefore, if a location can use a cigarette machine in addition to the music and amusement machine already on the premises, the one operator services all. For the operator, it is an economical business procedure. With the exception of his investment in equipment and cigarettes, in most instances he can conduct his business with practically none, or very little, added overhead.

It is therefore easy to see why many operators have diversified their operations — and the prediction by those close to the situation is that the trend will continue to increase.

PARKS SHOW ATTRACTS 18 COIN EXHIBITORS

Expect 7000 Visitors During Nov. 29-Dec. 3 Outdoor Convention

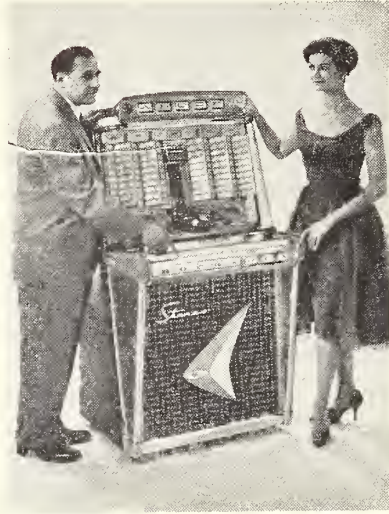
N. Y. State PR Coin Group Rolling With Teen Dance, Charities, Membership Early Results Stir Statewide Enthusiasm

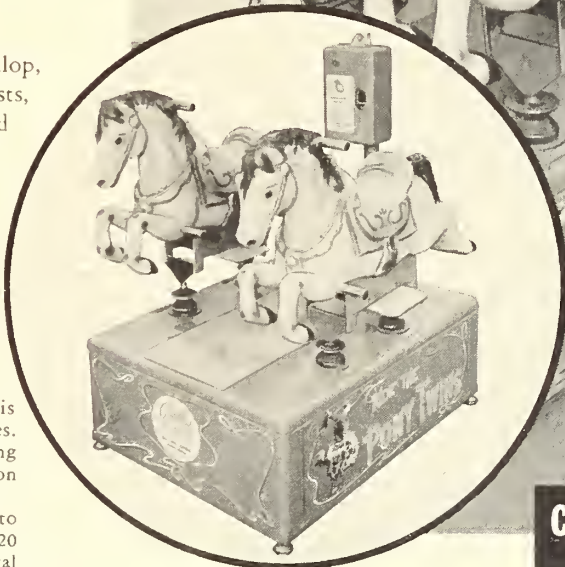

Automatic Canteen Votes Share Rise

CHICAGO—Arnold M. Johnson, president, Automatic Canteen Company of America, this city, advised that stockholders in the company approved an increase in the authorized common shares to 6,000,000 from 3,000,000, at a special meeting held last week. The vote authorized a 100 per cent distribution of common stock to present holders.

Directors had authorized, pending stockholder approval of the proposed increase in the shares, the distribution of December 18 of one additional common share for each common share held. As of October 15, there were 2,328,811 common shares outstanding. Johnson said the executive committee had voted to recommend that the

board, after the distribution of the new stock, establish a dividend rate at 50 per cent of the rate on the present shares.

The firm has been paying 25 cents quarterly and declared that amount on the present stock, payable January 2 to holders of record December 3. Stockholders on November 2 also received a 5 per cent stock dividend. Johnson informed stockholders that earnings for the fiscal year which ended October 3 were equal to about \$1.90 per share, based on a preliminary estimate. This compares with a \$1.53 figure per share for the preceding fiscal year.

Standard Financial Announces New Trade Credit Plan

NEW YORK—A new Trade Credit Plan will help vending machine manufacturers carry the growing load of trade credit granted to their industrial customers, was announced here by Arthur F. Silbert, vice president of Standard Financial Corporation. Lengthening terms of sale plus increasingly tighter money were said to be responsible for the squeeze on manufacturers.

Gross receivables in this industry have increased by \$31,000,000 since 1954 and trade terms have been lengthened so that the average customer takes longer to pay his bills, Silbert explained. As a result, vending machine manufacturers have had their working capital squeezed flat, Standard Financial finds. Currently, the typical vending machine manufacturer has receivables about 20 per cent greater than in 1954, but working capital has increased only 4 per cent.

"More than half the manufacturing firms in this industry reduced or eliminated the cash discount between 1953 and 1958", Silbert said. "This was done because the manufacturers' profit margin was shrinking and efforts were made to pick up extra income. But reduction of the cash discount also discouraged customers from paying in a hurry. Result: the collection period on the average account receivable lengthened.

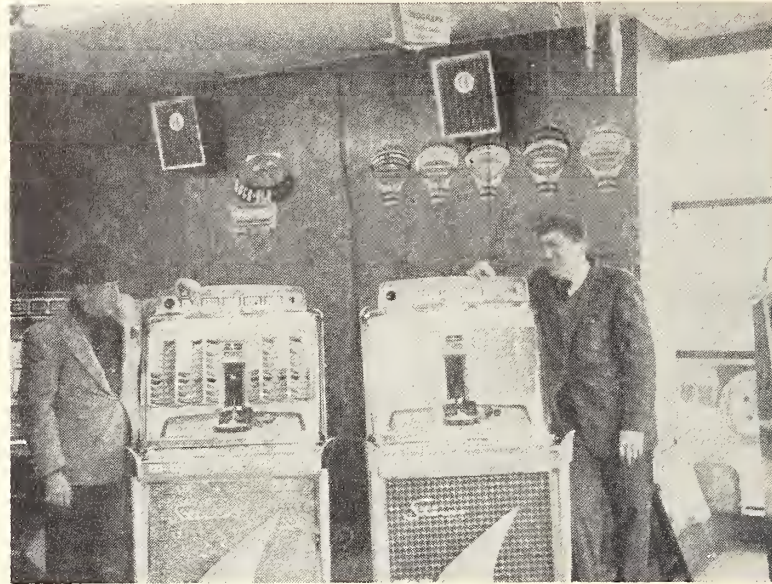
"In addition, the tight money situation in 1955-57 forced many business customers to ask for longer terms. But when the money situation loosened in 1958, the trade terms were not shortened. Thus, many manufacturers in this industry find they are giving longer terms today than ever in their history, and because of competition, are being forced to lengthen terms still more. More risky customers are being carried longer, and a larger proportion of receivables are becoming non-current.

"Among manufacturers in this industry, the proportion of the current assets represented by cash and treasury securities declined from 27 per cent in 1954, to 21 per cent today. At the same time, the proportion represented by receivables rose from 22.5 per cent to 26.7 per cent."

Standard Financial's new financing plan would take all receivables off the hands of manufacturers and substitute cash immediately upon shipment of goods—in order to ease the manufacturers' working capital position. This secured financing would permit the manufacturer to sell as widely as he wished, without endangering his financial ratios or cash position. Additional funds would be advanced for expansion of business or for acquisition of new income-producing equipment wherever desirable.

The financing will be administered through Standard Financial's offices and subsidiaries in New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Chicago, Dallas and Los Angeles.

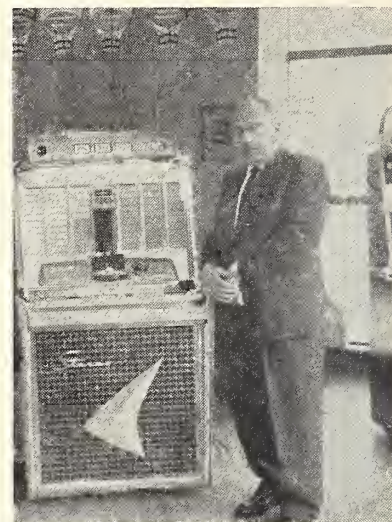

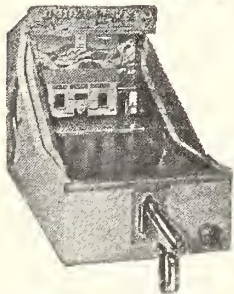

F. T. C. Charges ABC With Antitrust Move

Sherman Denies Charges

WASHINGTON — The Federal Trade Commission last week accused ABC Vending Corporation, Long Island City, New York, of violating antitrust laws by buying out major competitors.

ABC, the nation's largest operators of vending concessions in movie theaters, also was accused of using unfair methods to try to frustrate the growth of competitors and eliminate their opportunities for business survival.

The F.T.C. said ABC violated the anti-merger law by acquiring the Confection Cabinet Corporation, East Orange, New Jersey, and Charles Sweets Concession Company, both of Philadelphia, in 1957.

Confection Cabinet, with thirty-four subsidiaries, was ABC's principle national competitor, the F.T.C. said, while the Charles Sweets companies were the largest competitor in the Philadelphia metropolitan area.

The complaint said:

"ABC has eliminated these principle competitors; has increased its already dominant and controlling position; has become one of the few concessionaires, and sometimes the only one, with whom motion picture theater owners in certain sections of the country may contact and do business; and has acquired a decisive and competitive advantage over competitors in acquiring and maintaining and operating vending concessions in theaters, and in buying vending products, vending fixtures and equipment."

The commission charged further that ABC coerced certain manufacturers and suppliers into refusing to deal with competitors and used its dominant position to demand and get favored treatment from suppliers.

Charles Sherman, ABC chairman, denied the F.T.C. charges categorically upon being asked for comment last week. He referred specifically to the F.T.C. antitrust charges on elimination of competition by acquiring other companies.

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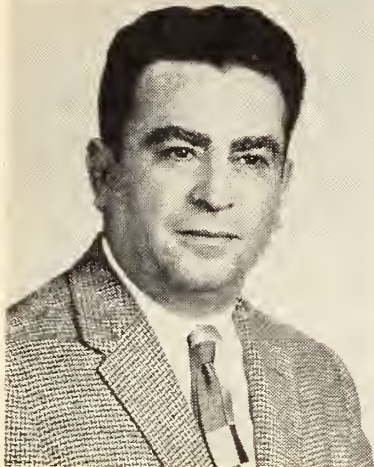

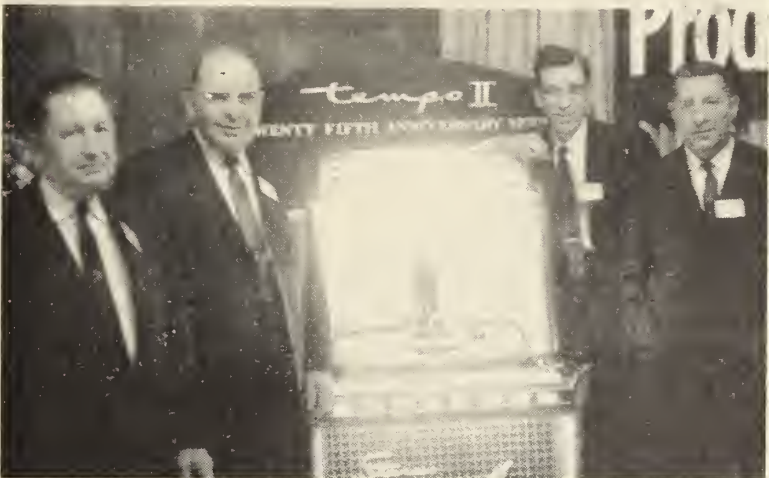

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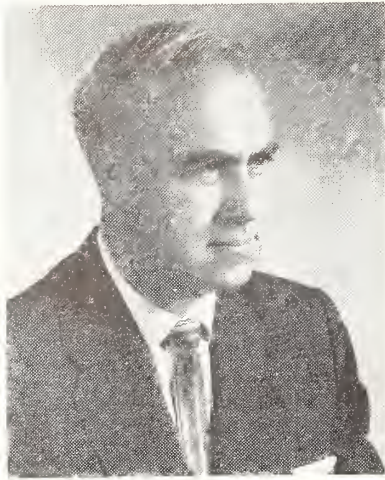
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Wurlitzer Names Chief Development Engineer

"The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

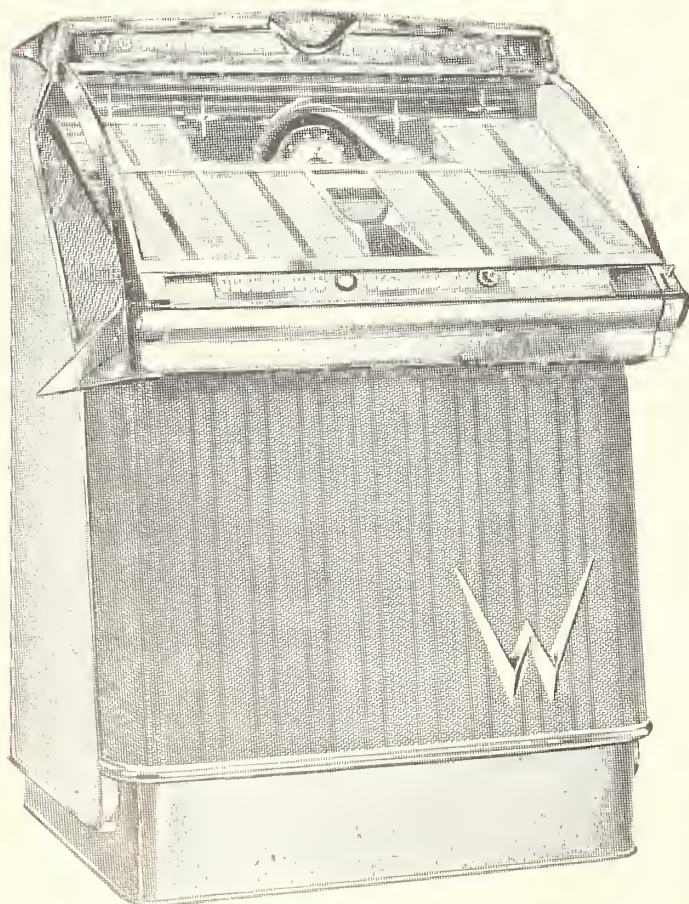
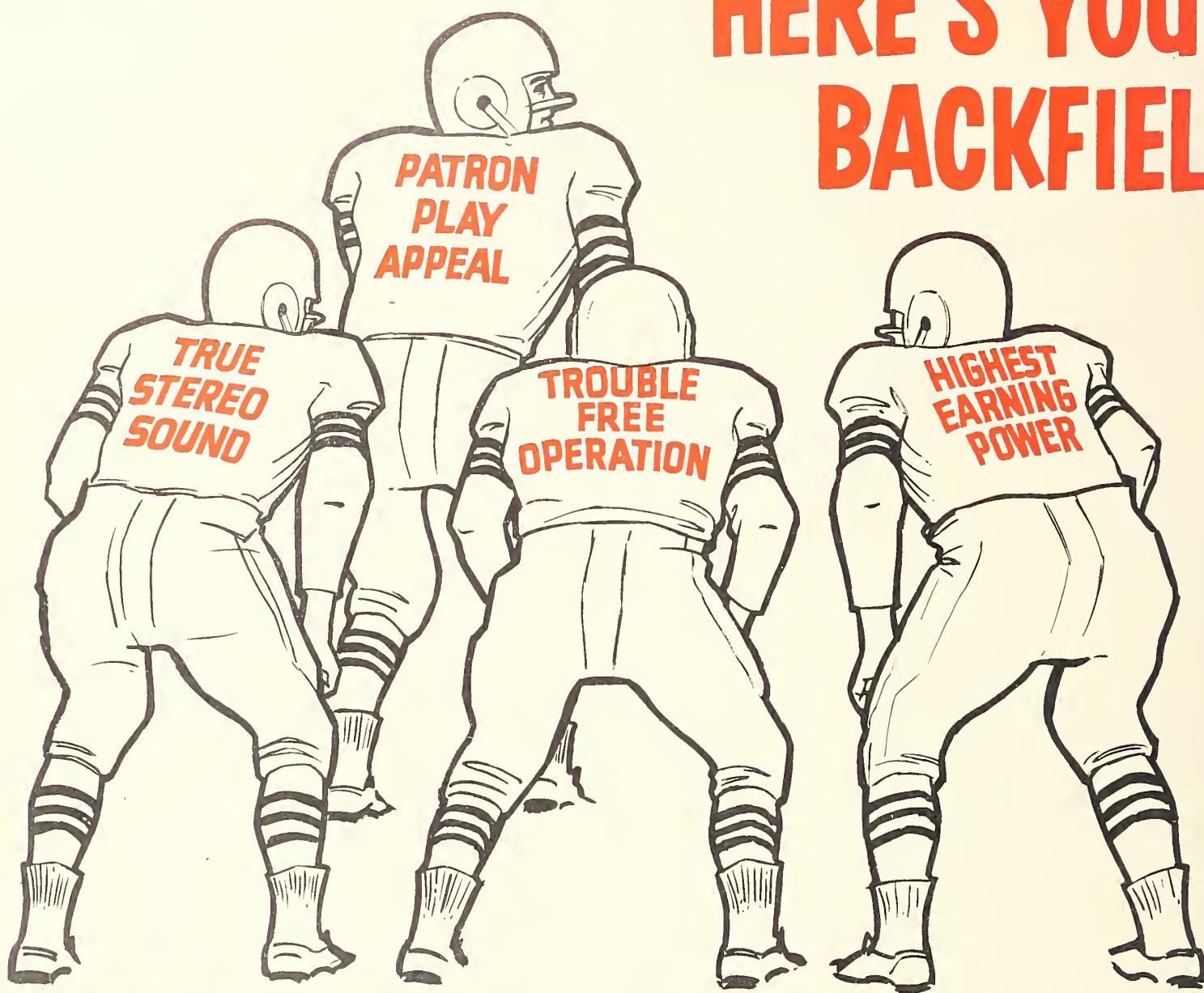

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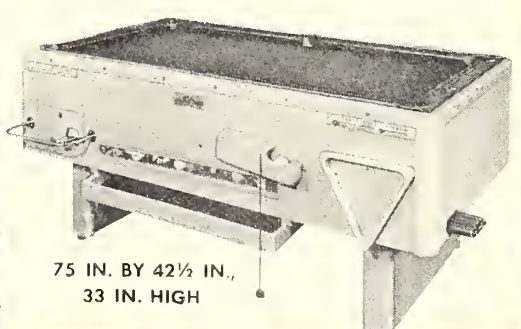
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
