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Music Biz Heads South for

COUNTRY MUSIC DJ FESTIVAL

This week, key representatives from every major record company and numerous execs from indie firms migrate to the south to take part in the 8th Annual Country Music Disk Jockey Festival.

According to reports from the Festival's registration committee, this year's convention is expected to be one of the biggest. Coming from foreign countries as well as the United States, 2,000 people from every phase of the music business are expected to attend. Taking into account the fact that only 100 people attended the first Country Disk Jockey Festival eight years ago, the event's growth has been truly fantastic.

But it should be no surprise to anyone in the music business. Through the years, Nashville has been well represented in the "Pop" music market, especially so during the past ten months. The following are some of this year's many big pop successes which are associated in one form or another with Nashville:

Johnny Horton's "Battle Of New Orleans"; Stonewall Jackson's "Waterloo"; the chain of Everly Brothers' smashes; Homer and Jethro's "Kookamonga" novelty; Presley's endless assembly line of gold disks; Webb Pierce's "I Ain't

Never"; Carl Smith's "10,000 Drums"; Wink Martindale's "Deck Of Cards"; Eddy Arnold's "Tennessee Stud"; Mitchell Torok's "Caribbean"; Conway Twitty's pop hits; Don Gibson's steady clicks; Carl Dobkins' "My Heart Is An Open Book"; The Browns' "Three Bells"; Marty Robbins' regular pop hits; Johnny Cash's best selling LP's and singles; George Jones' waxings; Johnny Tillotson's "True True Happiness"; the new "Tennessee Waltz" hit; Billy Grammer's clicks; Chet Atkins' "Boo Boo Stick Beat" and a host of others too numerous to mention.

Therefore, it is no surprise that anyone interested in the source of good recording material is making it his business to attend the Nashville fest. Nashville is an area which has produced more than its share of hits.

The Nashville convention has become an institution in the music business. It will never be replaced by any other jockey gathering or national convention. It is an important and separate entity in our industry—an affair at which time members of every phase of the business can renew old acquaintances and establish closer relations with the creators and producers of many of our industry's best selling records.

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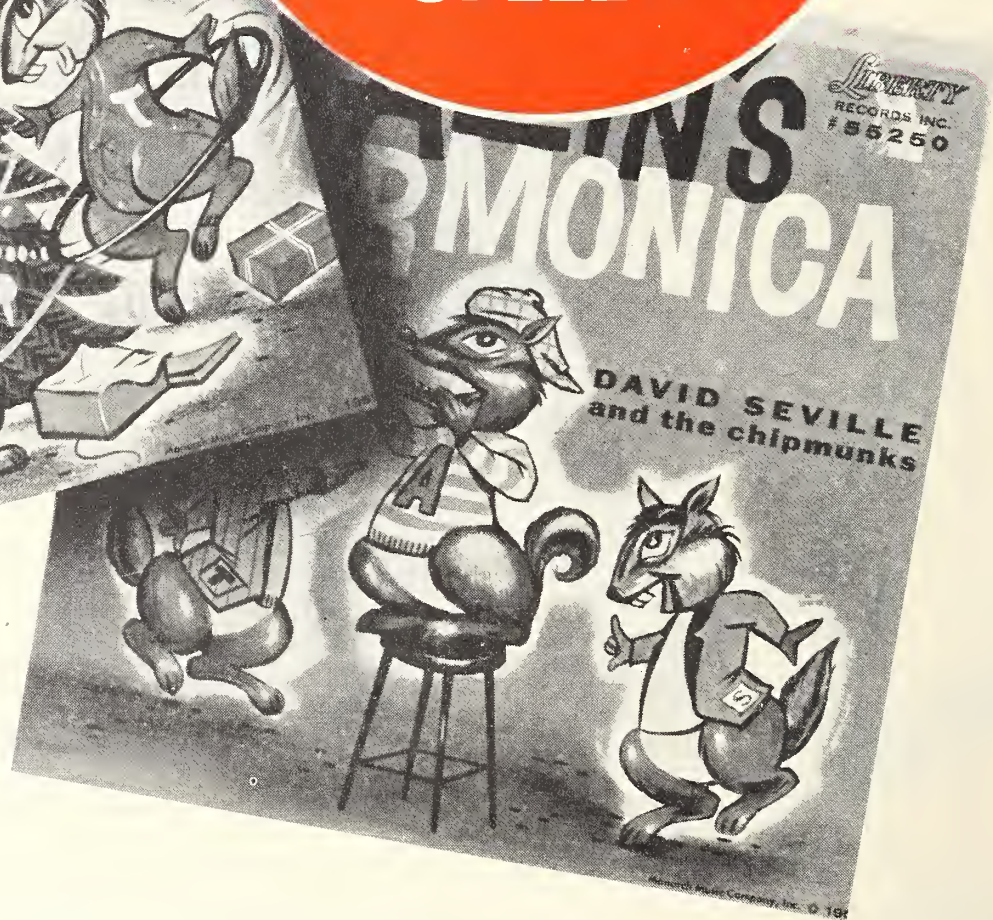
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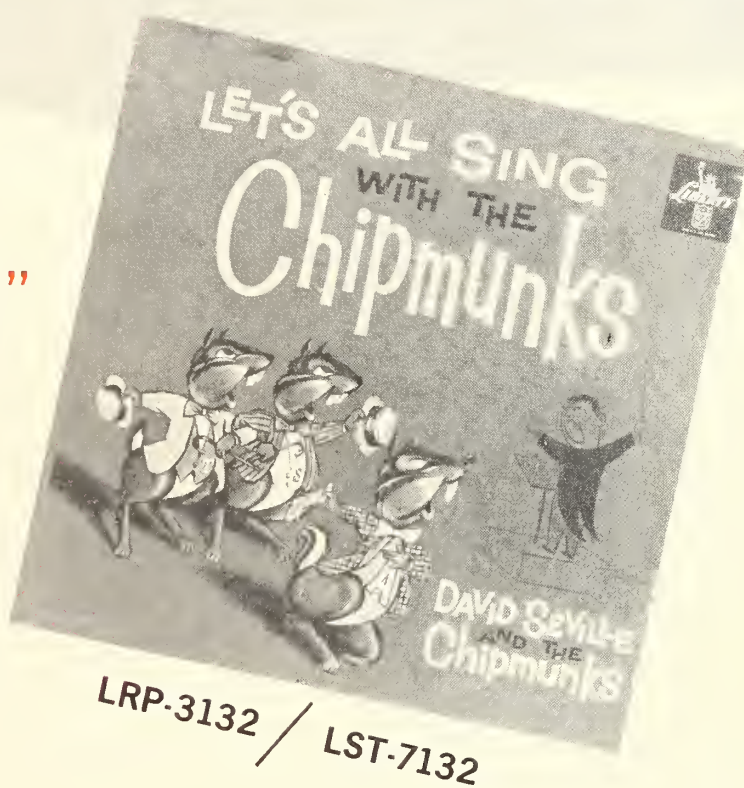

"IT'S TIME TO CRY" (2:19) [Spanka BMI—Anka]

PAUL ANKA (ABC-Paramount 10064)

● "It's Time To Cry" should easily follow in the footsteps of "Put Your Head On My Shoulder" for the talented singer-cleffer, who keeps turning out one rock-a-ballad chart smash after another. Chorus and ork superbly assist Anka as he waxes this emotional romancer with heartfelt sincerity. The trigger-quick rock delighter on the flip is another potent Anka original.

RICKY NELSON (Imperial 2304)

● Another Nelson entry, another sure-fire teen attraction. Watch both: "Mighty Good" is the star's belt bid, while "I Wanna Be Loved" is a flavorful blues item. "Just A Little Too Much" and "Sweeter Than You" were Nelson's recent back-to-back hits.

FRANKIE AVALON (Chancellor 1045)

● The teenage sensation should soon be adding "Why" to his already log list of hits (that currently includes "Just Ask Your Heart"). Set to a sort of soft shoe beat, it's a charming romantic lilter with an "In A Spanish Town" flavor. Flip, an even stronger departure from the youngster's r&r groovings, features Frankie swinging along in a pleasing jazz-inclined fashion. Chalk up two more fine assists for the Peter DeAngelis-led ork and chorus.

● Leave it to the trio to come around with something different and it does just that on "Coo Coo-U," a calypso-styled novelty in which the title phrase is constantly used to unique-sounding advantage. Watch this wild one. "Green Grasses" is a pretty, purring offering. Group clicked with "A Worried Man" last time out.

PAT BOONE (Dot 16006)

● Boone offers a fine rendition of the hymn-like "Beyond The Sunset" and also offers a narrative portion. Upcoming Holiday Season should enhance the appeal of deck. More in an inspiring vein on "My Faithful Heart," a number from Boone's new flick, "A Journey To The Center Of The Earth." Can also count in the coming months.

Side is in the rockin' vein of the Isley Bros.' "Shout." The other half is a real amusing continuation of his current joke-trading dual-mart smash, "Say Man." Two sensational coin-pullers for Bo.

B+ "BAGHDAD ROCK (Part 1)" (2:03) [Lively Arts BMI—Zane, Ramal, Tharon] This pounding rocker can go places. A soprano clarinet on an exotic theme gets an occasional solo sport.

B+ "BAGHDAD ROCK (Part 2)" (1:45) [Lively Arts BMI—Zane, Ramal, Tharon] Same sort of good-sounding stuff continues here.

DAVE REO

(Terrilyn 050159)

B "PRETTY LITTLE BABY" (1:42) [Terrilyn BMI—Clyburn] Debut for the label is an affable up-beat vocal-instrumental stand. Some rock spin power.

C+ "WITHOUT LOVE" (2:39) [Terrilyn BMI—Clyburn] Reo has the right plaintive feel on the wistful.

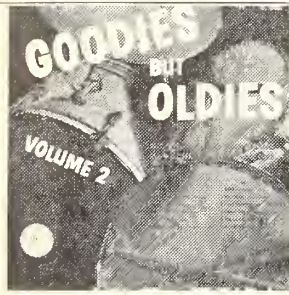
"SWINGIN' ROUND THE WORLD"—The Jonah Jones Quartet—Capitol T 1237 & Stereo ST 1237

The man who gave many people their first taste of jazz comes through with another lightly swinging set of tunes—here keyed to a trip-around-the world theme. 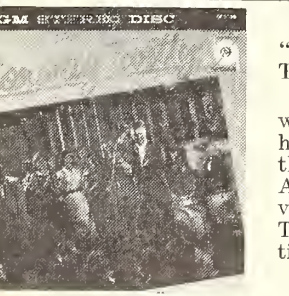
"THE GENIUS OF RAY CHARLES"—Atlantic 1312

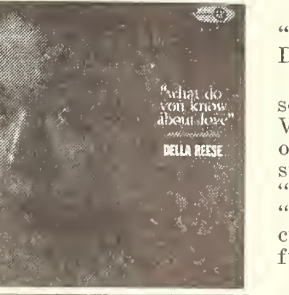
"GOODIES BUT OLDIES"—Warwick W 2008

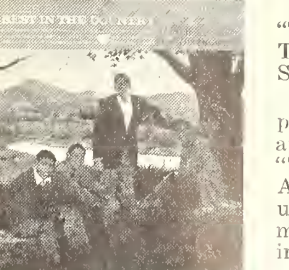
"SATURDAY NIGHT WITH CONWAY TWITTY"—MGM E 3786 (Monaural & Stereo)

Twelve songs that have made it big in both pop and c&w areas (most originating via country artists and writers) are surveyed by the Brothers. "Tennessee Waltz," "Your Cheatin' Heart," "Half As Much," "Mockin' Bird Hill," and others are updated via the Winterhalter ork's accompaniment and the Ames' harmonically attractive singing. An album with lots of sales appeal.



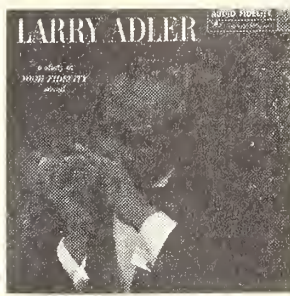
"KISS ME, KATE"—Alfred Drake, Patricia Morison, Lisa Kirk, Harold Lang—Capitol TAO 1267 (Monaural & Stereo)

The Simeone arrangements are clever and melodic. Strong potential.



"LARRY ADLER"—Audio Fidelity AFLP 1916 (Monaural & Stereo)

The international harmonica virtuoso offers improvisations of thirteen melodies, most of which are standards. Assisted by unbilled piano, trumpet, bass, guitar and drums, Adler jazz-tings such tunes as "How High The Moon," "Love For Sale," "Sophisticated Lady," keeping close to the original melodic lines yet using sufficient subtle changes to variate interestingly. He has a large following.



"SPIKE JONES IN STEREO"—Warner Bros. WS 1332 (Monaural & Stereo)

Paul Frees is a master of vocal mimicry and on this date gets a chance to indulge in recreating the voices of Bella Lugosi (Dracula), Boris Karloff (Frankenstein), Alfred Hitchcock, Ed Murrow, Peter Lorre, and others in a session that teams him with Spike Jones. Jones supplies his usual, unusual music for an effective horror show on disk. Good stereo depth aids the performers in special comical adaptations of "All Of A Sudden My Heart Sings," "I Only Have Eyes For You," "Tammy" and other songs and routines. Stereo is a must.



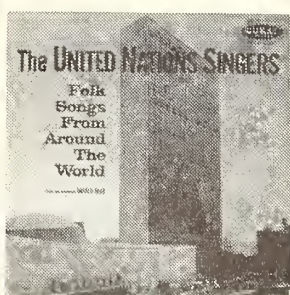
"THE MELODY LINGERS ON"—Georgie Auld and the Mello Larks—Top Rank RM 306

The accent is on melody here and twelve superior pop songs, all of which owe their melodic allegiance to classical composers, have the benefit of charming performances by the harmonically smooth Mello Larks and Georgie Auld's polished sax work. Auld is an important asset in setting the moods of such lovelies as "My Reverie," "I Think Of You," "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows," and others, as he unfolds soft, supple passages from his horn in graceful accompaniment to the vocals. Beautiful session.



"POLYNESIAN PARADISE"—Phil Moore—Strand SL 1004

Through the use of unusual instrumentation, acoustical effects, a chorus (occasionally) and an array of bird calls, Phil Moore presents an album of "exotic" music a la Martin Denny and Arthur Lyman. Most of the selections are adaptations of standard material: "Bali Hai," "Return To Paradise," "Blue Hawaii," "Moon Of Manakoor." Soft strings throughout create a fine illusionary mood.



"THE UNITED NATIONS SINGERS"—Folk Songs From Around the World—Coral CRL 57301

The Singers are comprised of U.N. Secretariat members and number almost every country in their ranks. Under the direction of Donald Read they offer an international folk song concert of 18 numbers; two American songs, "Too Dum Day" and "Whoa, Mule, Whoa!" are included. Others are from Russia, Norway, Sweden, Italy, Nigeria, etc. Deluxe packaging and combined U.N. & Coral promotion can win large audience.



"LONGHAIR GOES CHA CHA"—Ralph Font and His Orchestra—Westminster WP 6118

Popular Latin ork leader Font, in search for new material, comes up with a dozen familiar classical melodies transformed into Latin danceables. Such revered items as "Minuet in G," "Habanera," "Melody In F," and "Liebestraum" are instilled with an infectiousness that will be appreciated by lovers of Latin music. Font rates high with bistro customers in the east.



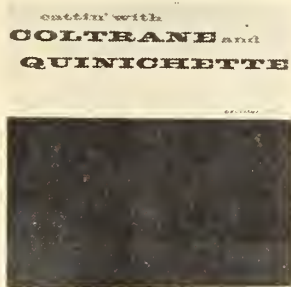

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



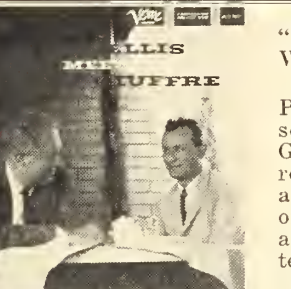
"IMPROVISED MEDITATIONS & EXCURSIONS"—John Lewis—Atlantic 1313

John Lewis is spotlighted in a series of thoughtful piano improvisations that allow a closer inspection of his technique and individual piano character than with his work with the MJQ. His rhythm accompaniment is by two MJQ compatriots—Heath and Kay, with Duvivier replacing Heath on some tracks—but here they are relegated to a minor rhythm role, of which they are immensely capable. Lewis' playing here is basically introspective and sensitive. Important jazz issue.



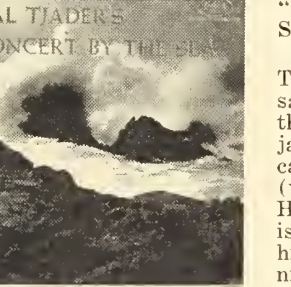
"CATTIN' WITH COLTRANE AND QUINICHETTE"—John Coltrane and Paul Quinichette—Prestige 7158

This date is intriguing in that it permits an intimate comparison of the two distinctly different styles of the principals, each representing a major school of jazz. Coltrane, a hard bop exponent, is by far more original and subsequently a much more important influence than Quinichette, who has filled the vacancy left by Lester Young as a leader in the cool idiom. Interest reaches a high point when the two trade solos—and the market difference between them is striking if not shocking.



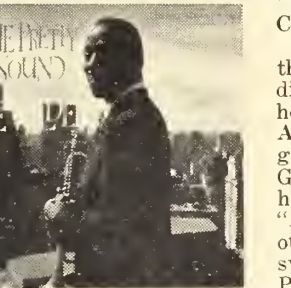
"HERB ELLIS MEETS JIMMY GIUFFRE"—Verve MG V-8311

In his first solo date since leaving the Oscar Peterson Trio, Ellis reveals that he is an effective soloist and can develop further in this direction. Giuffre's writing is tight, tying Ellis down to the restrictions of a sax section (all fine musicians) and not really giving him the freedom he needs, or had with Peterson. Despite this stiffness, the album is interesting, affording inspection of Ellis' technique and Giuffre's continual development.



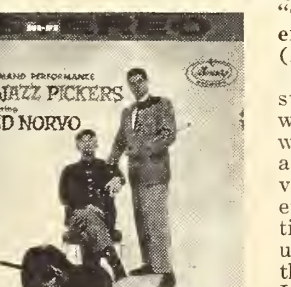
"CONCERT BY THE SEA"—The Cal Tjader Sextet—Fantasy 3295 (Monaural & Stereo)

Recording in concert at Carmel, Calif., the Tjader group plays in a most inspired fashion, forsaking, except for the extended "Afro-Blue," their usual Afro-Cuban approach for more direct jazz expression. The rhythm section is impeccable, driving ferociously behind soloists Tjader (vibes), Paul Horn (alto & flute) and Lonnie Hewitt (piano). Horn is the most individual soloist, the music taking on added interest during his presence. Tunes include "Round About Midnight," "Doxie" and "Laura."



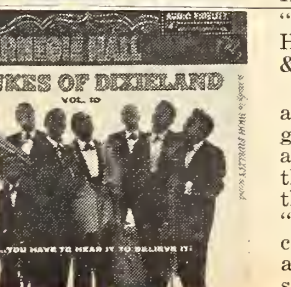
"THE PRETTY SOUND"—Joe Wilder—Columbia CL 1372

Wilder, behind the scenes studio musician for the past few years, steps out here on his own displaying a soft, well-rounded trumpet tone that he suply wraps around several quiet ballads. Accompanied alternately by three different groups, among which are Herbie Mann, Urbie Green, Hank Jones, Osie Johnson, Wilder reveals his debt to Harry Edison on "Blue Moon," "Autumn in New York," "Greensleeves," and other ballads. "Guys and Dolls" and "Caravan" swing exuberantly, sparked by Mann's flute. Pleasing package.



"COMMAND PERFORMANCE"—The Jazz Pickers featuring Red Norvo—Mercury SR 60126 (Monaural & Stereo)

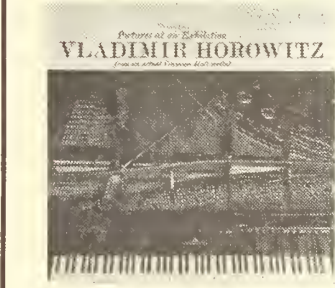
Harry Babasin's Jazz Pickers, due to its instrumentation of guitar, bass, drums and cello, would normally make for fairly dull listening but with the addition here of Red Norvo, the first and still one of the most exciting and individual vibraphonists in jazz, this album takes on an entirely new meaning during Norvo's on stage time. His approach is basically percussion-like, using very little vibrato, which fits in well with the style of the group. Tunes are "Lester Leaps In," "Stinger" and "Someone to Watch Over Me."



"THE DUKES OF DIXIELAND AT CARNEGIE HALL"—Audio Fidelity AFLP 1918 (Monaural & Stereo)

Recorded during the group's 1958 appearance at Carnegie Hall where their many adherents gave them a rousing welcome. Nine selections, all dixie standards with the exception of "Mack the Knife" and "76 Trombones," are played in the group's now familiar style. "Tin Roof Blues," "Yellow Dog Blues," "Muskrat Ramble," are included in this set. Introductions and applause are spotted throughout and "Mack the Knife" sports a fair vocal. Can make it commercially.

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



MOUSSORGSKY: "Pictures At An Exhibition"—Vladimir Horowitz, Pianist — RCA Victor LM2357

An overwhelming performance, reinforcing the Horowitz pianistic legend. His intense deeply dramatic musical insights are projected through his unmatched articulation in scale passages, lightning wrist and octave technique, and crushing power, which enable him alone to create genuine orchestral effects on the piano. This album is one of Horowitz' best interpretations, and one of the great piano recordings of all time, approached in the catalog only by the previous Horowitz "Pictures."



"ARIAS IN THE GREAT TRADITION"—Eileen Farrell, Soprano Columbia ML 5408 (Monaural & Stereo)

In arias by Beethoven, Weber, Cherubini, and Gluck, the soprano demonstrates her solid vocal technique, and rich, supple voice. Her production is effortless, her upper register possesses color and her phrasing is consistently meaningful and well-shaped. A vocal album of special merit.



MOZART: "Eine Kleine Nachtmusik (K.525)," Divertimento in D Major (K.136), "Serenade in D Major (K.239)"—I Musici—Epic LC 3613 (Monaural & Stereo)

Here, one of the finest instrumental groups offers thoroughly delightful performances of familiar Mozart items. Its wide experience as a chamber organization as well as the members' individual virtuosity on their instruments enables the I Musici to invest their interpretations with spontaneity, imagination and discipline. Wonderful chamber offering.



MOZART: "Concerto No. 1 in G Major, K.313" "Concerto No. 2 in D Major, K.314"—The Philharmonia Orchestra, Efram Kurtz, Conductor—Capitol SG 7135 (Monaural & Stereo)

Two Mozart flute concerti here receive sympathetic readings from the soloist and orchestra. Miss Shaffer is an accomplished flutist, who plays musically and with a well-developed sense of style. The Philharmonia, under Kurtz, provides admirable support. A pleasing Mozart album.



RESPIGHI: "The Pines Of Rome"—Symphony of the Air, Leopold Stokowski, Conductor—United Artists UAL 7001 & Stereo WAS 8001

Stokowski demonstrates his virtuosity as a conductor, as well as the range and color of the orchestra in a colorful performance of the Respighi standard. The reverse side offers very early music as a change of pace. Stokowski's "Pines" will have to show against extremely formidable catalog entries.



FRANCK: "Symphony In D Minor"; Psyche et Eros — Philharmonia Orchestra, Carlo Maria Giulini, Conductor—Angel S 35641 (Monaural & Stereo)

This performance of the Franck Symphony lacks sufficient penetration, giving it a somewhat episodic quality which fails to realize the profound spiritual unity of the work. The specific drawbacks here seem to be a faulty grasp of architecture, of pacing, and a lack of aggressiveness in the use of dynamics. A dedicated attempt to project a very difficult work. The "Psyche" is pleasingly performed.

Liberty's Year-End LP Release

LOS ANGELES—Liberty Records launched its final LP release for the year last week with the expectation of topping all previous sales records for the label, it was announced by Don Bohanan, national sales manager.

The five album stereo and monaural November release is paced by Julie London's "Your Number Please" LP, arranged and conducted by Andre Previn; and Dolton's initial Fleetwoods album, "Mr. Blue". Latter is titled after the current No. 1 best selling single which is released by Liberty.

Miss London's latest, which is previewed by her "Makin' Whoopee" single recently released, presents a "new" sound for Julie, with Previn's arrangements ranging through such standards as "It Could Happen to You", "It's a Blue World", "Love is Here to Stay" to "Two Sleepy People".

Liberty continues Martin Denny's hot sales pace with the stereo version of "Hypnotique", to augment the previously released monaural version of the best seller.

Variety is the keynote in the five disk November release, which also includes "Command Performance" featuring the piano and orchestra of Harry Sukman. Album includes such melodic variations of "Intermezzo", "The Breeze and I", "An Affair to Remember" and nine other instrumentals winding with "Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2".

The John Buzon Trio joins Liberty with "Cha Cha On The Rocks" in both stereo and monaural.

The Liberty November outing is capped by Ken Alford's "Dixie Cats at Waikiki".

Mounting a full-scale promotion push behind the release, Liberty is incorporating strong trade and consumer advertising with point-of-sale display pieces and nationwide disk jockey promotion.

Dealer terms offer 10% discount to all outlets meeting minimum sales requirements; a 100% exchange privilege is offered. Program is in effect from November 9 through November 30.



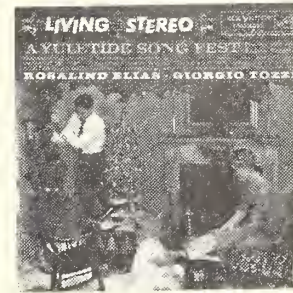

CHRISTMAS PICKS OF THE WEEK



"SEASON'S GREETINGS FROM PERRY COMO"—RCA Victor LPM 2066 & Stereo LSP 2066

In what should be one of the biggest albums of the season, Como is teamed with the Ray Charles Singers and Mitchell Ayres' ork in a well-balanced program of Yuletide favorites. Side one is devoted to the pop song: "Home for the Holidays," "Winter Wonderland," etc.; while side two contains hymns and carols: "Silent Night," "Come, Come to the Manger," "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen," etc.



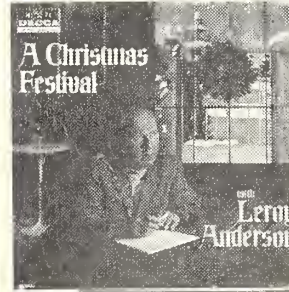
"A YULETIDE SONG FEST"—Giorgio Tozzi & Rosalind Elias—RCA Victor LM 2350 & Stereo LSC 2350

Miss Elias and Tozzi, distinguished mezzo-soprano and bass, respectively, of the Metropolitan Opera, bring a rarely heard vocal brilliance to a lineup of Christmas Carols. Hearing these two leading opera stars sing carols that are often ineptly sung by less capable voices is an unexcelled treat. Lehman Engel adroitly conducts the ork and chorus support. Among the 15 selections are "Patapan," "Gesù Bambino," "The Holly and the Ivy" and "In Dulci Jubilo." Magnificent recording.



"HAPPY HOLIDAY"—Wally Stott, his Orchestra and Chorus—Warner Bros. B 1341 (Monaural & Stereo)

English maestro Stott has fashioned a beautiful concert of Christmas cheer that achieves its desirability through the imaginative use of male and female choraleers. The two groups are used in both contrasting and complementary roles, and Stott maintains a high level of musical value by not calling on the usual trite orchestral effects. A thoughtfully conceived and brilliantly produced Xmas package. Selections include "The Christmas Waltz," "The Holly and the Ivy," "Shepherd's Chorus" and "Snowfall."



"A CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL"—Leroy Anderson and his Orchestra—Decca DL 8925 & Stereo DL 78925

Quite different from the usual array of Xmas releases is this ambitious and resultingly enjoyable undertaking by Anderson. A total of 28 seasonal carols are divided into four groups subtitled: A Christmas Festival, Suite of Carols for Brass Choir, for String Orchestra and for Woodwind Ensemble. As each title indicates the music is arranged featuring the different ork sections in the spotlight. Uniqueness of approach marks this album for special attention.



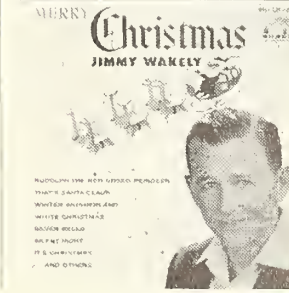
"IRA IRONSTRINGS PLAYS SANTA CLAUS"—Christmas Music for those Who Have Heard Everything—Warner Bros. B 1339 (Monaural & Stereo)

Ira Ironstrings, Warner's leading exponent of fun music, leads a happily conceived program of seasonal favorites in his ricky-tick, dixieland-ish style. Banjos, whomping horns, and assorted rhythm devices cavort merrily through "Let it Snow," "Jingle Bells Stomp," "Skater's Nightmare," "Christmas is for the Birds" and assorted other sundry items. "A CHRISTMAS MEMORY FROM 'BREAKFAST AT TIFFANY'S'" — Truman Capote—United Artists UAL 9001

Esteemed author Truman Capote offers a reading of "A Christmas Memory," a touching story excerpted from his best-selling book, "Breakfast at Tiffany's." The story concerns a man's sentimental reminiscences of a Christmas spent with an old, childlike woman when he was seven years old. It is a compelling and exquisitely delicate tale and its tautness is furthered by original string quartet music composed by Irving Joseph. Capote's followers will appreciate his personal interpretation.



"MERRY CHRISTMAS FROM JIMMY WAKELY"—Shasta SHLP 502

The country-pop singer presents warmhearted, sincere and comfortably homey renditions of Yuletide songs and carols. With chorus and light ork companionship, Wakely brings his intimate charm and personality to "Silver Bells," "Away in a Manger," "Frosty the Snowman," "Winter Wonderland" and nine others. His style will be appreciated by country and pop markets.

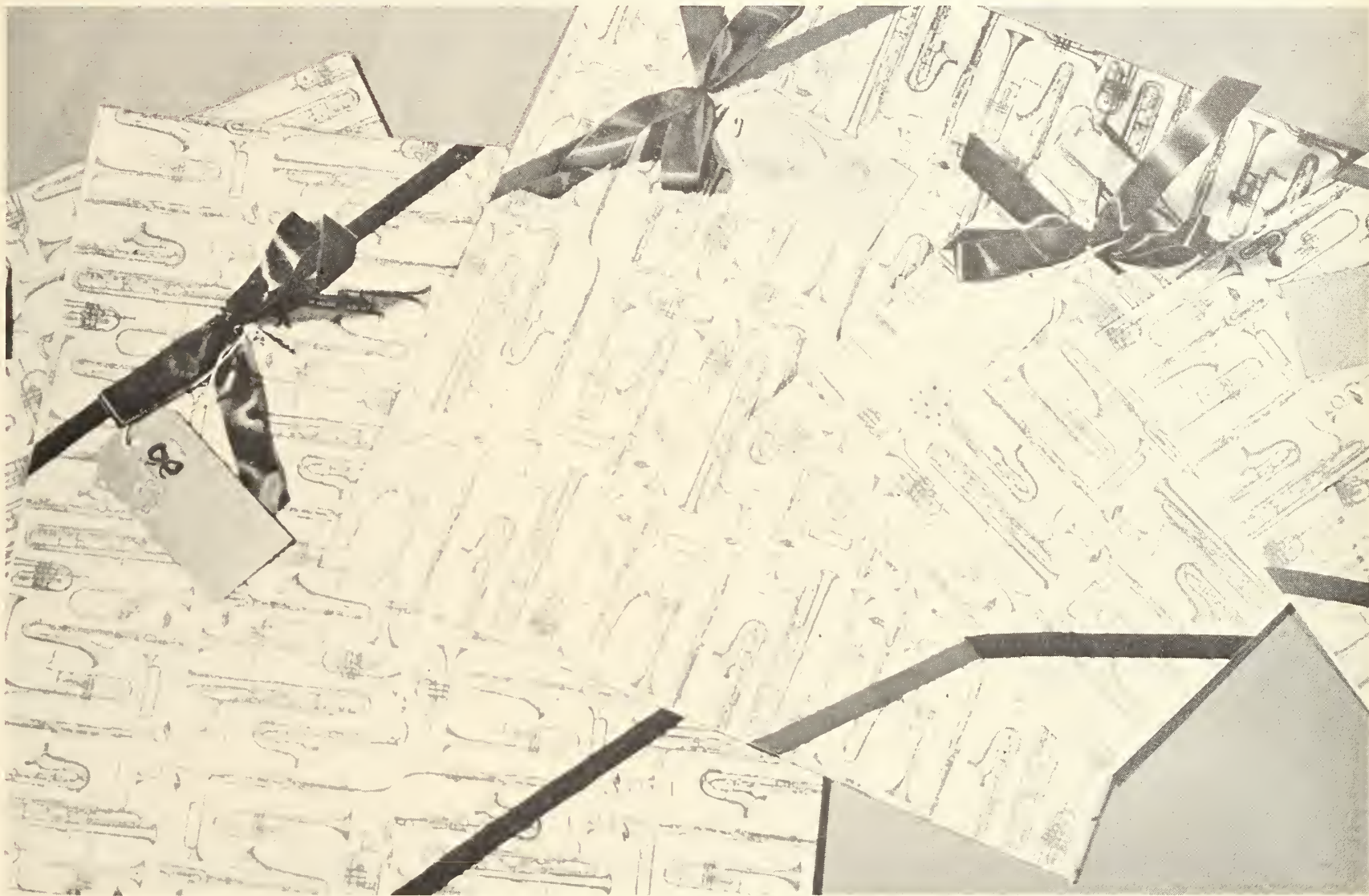
Criterion Selling Agents For "Marina"

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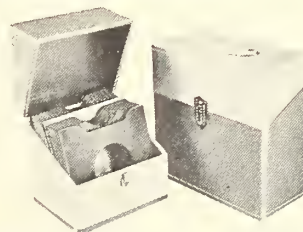

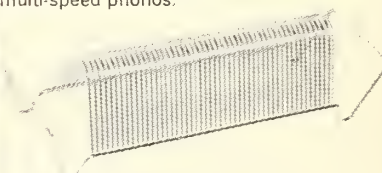

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ITALY

The famous composer, Gino Redi, who wrote so many successful songs such as "Non Dimenticare", has recently received from Nat "King" Cole the following note of admiration: "I thank you very much, dear Maestro, for the beautiful song I enjoyed singing so much". Through this Italian column, Gino wishes to send Nat "King" Cole his best thanks for his magnificent interpretation of "Non Dimenticare".

On October 25th, I visited the Fonocrom Records Factory in Bellagio, on the lake of Como. Tommaso Grossi, who is the owner and manager of the factory, described the technical novelties of its plants and their galvanic transfer and injection moulding operations. The Fonocrom was first in Italy to adopt the injection moulding machines. At present, these plants can turn out as many as 10,000 45 NP records a day. The Fonocrom works for the following Italian firms: Bluebell, Italdisc, Sabrina, Caprice, Italia Canta, Combo.



GINO REDI

Marino Marini is often called the Ambassador of Italian music. "La piu bella del mondo" is his hit song, and "Sei bella" his latest success. He records for the Durium firm, and during his career his sentimental songs, which he writes by himself, gained him many prizes. In less than 9 months he sold 1 million records in France and this was the comment of a French newspaper on his popularity: "Maybe it would be a good idea to change the 'Boulevard des Italiens' into the Boulevard de Marino Marini!". In England the Quartet appeared several times on radio and television and toured the island. Half a million copies of his record "Come Prima-Volare" were sold. He also toured Spain gaining fame and success together with the title of "Embajador de la Simpatia y del ritmo". He is now planning to tour Middle East and waits to cross the ocean to the States.

The Cetra Quartet's songs have been distributed under Ricordi label, winning 6 Silver Masks with different motivations. The October 25th TV broadcast, "Serata di Gala" was entirely dedicated to the Cetra Quartet.

During the first fortnight of November, Caterina Valente, Chet Baker, I Signori del Jazz, The Four Saints, Peppino di Capri will tour Italy visiting Milan, Rome, Florence, Bologna, Genoa and Turin.

On October 26th, Ferruccio Lanfranchi, who had been offered the presidency of the Sorting-Out Committee of the San Remo Festival, has informed Senator Anfossi, President of the Festival Corporation, that he has irrevocably given up the position.



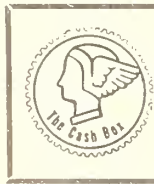
WALTER GURTLER

Claudio Villa works for the Cetra Records firm, but his contract is soon to expire. The renewal seems uncertain.

On Friday, the 23rd of October, Mr. Gurtler and the manager of his press office, Vladimiro Albera personally took me around to visit the various branches of their organization. The Gurtler Bros. Enterprises were founded in 1950 by Walter and Ernesto Gurtler, both of Swiss origin, and comprise two firms, the Saar Co. and the Gurtler Co. In its turn the Saar Co. is formed by: 1) Saar (manufactory), endowed with 14 presses and a galvano plastic department, (yearly output capacity 3 million records); 2) Saar (Records Firm), which puts on

the Italian market the following labels: Jolly, Barclay, Verve, Gene Norman, Keen, Anx, Ensign, Good Time Jazz, Contemporary, Dixieland Jubilee. The sales department has 14 product managers. The Gurtler Co. is composed of a recording room endowed with a very modern Ampex Neuman and Telefunken equipment, and a sales department with 12 product managers for the distribution in Italy of the following labels: Mercury, Music, World Pacific, Atlantic Jazz Series, Prestige, Metronome. The Gurtler recording room has already done some stereophonic recordings for American firms.

A single office, located in Rome and Milan, is in charge of the Public Relations of both firms. The Gurtler Enterprises control approximately 14% of the home records market; in this percentage LP's account for 10%, EP's for 25%, NP for 65%. "Only You" (Platters), "Come Prima" (Tony Dallara), "Ti diro" (Tony Dallara), were the Gurtler Bros. best sellers. At present "Il tuo Bacio e come un rock" (Celentano) and "Les Gitanes" (Dalida) appear on the list of the Italian top ten.

AUSTRALIA

There appear to be signs that record sales in the States of New South Wales and Victoria have almost recovered from the initial setback caused by the impact of television. These two states have now had TV operating for just three years and it cannot be denied that the introduction of television—whether directly or indirectly—did have an adverse effect on the over-all record market. However, now that the "crisis" has been passed, disk manufacturers and dealers anticipate a "record record" Christmas period. We are now into our summer season and the trade is beginning to take on a bright new approach to every facet of the business. Interest in records seems to be increasing at consumer level also.

* * * * *

Several national newspapers—particularly the weekly publications—are waging a fairly solid "war" against the "suggestive content" of the rock 'n roll shows being presented here by American and Australian artists. Their early action has been confined to concerts, but this week one paper started a "blast-off" at televised rock programs. In an article headed "Rock Shows Need Clean-Up", "Truth" says of rock 'n roll shows "they've become a competition between one artist and another to see who can be the most suggestive". Your correspondent considers that there are grounds for complaints in this direction and that promoters should attempt to overcome this stigma at present being associated with such shows. Some of the gyrations of certain artists and the lyric content of some material leaves rock 'n roll shows wide open to such severe newspaper attacks.



PERRY COMO

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The Perry Como Show returned to our TV screens last night (29th October) with great artists Everly Brothers, Peggy King, Jack Cole and The Hitch Hikers. It's great to have "Mr. Nice Guy" back again.

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Festival Records star, Col Joye, is currently riding high in Sydney and after only two weeks on the market, his new record of "Oh Yeah Uh-Huh" has leapt to a high position in hit-parade programs.

* * * * *

The very attractive song "Morgen" is shaping into one of the biggest hits of the year in Australia. The Ivo Robic version, released by Philips, has jumped away to an early lead in the race for top honours. Australian publisher, Jack Argent, of Leeds Music, said that he has so far had no less than 40 different sets of lyrics submitted as alternatives. Jack says he is going along with the Messer, Sherman ones but would like to submit some of the others to Robic for consideration to place to the melody of "Morgen".

* * * * *

Radio station 2UW is planning a tremendous publicity and promotion campaign behind the introduction of their new disc-jockey, good looking young American Rhet Walker. Walker should do well in this country.

* * * * *

Wynne Records of America has advised Ron Gillespie of W & G Records (Australia) that they will release the single of "At The Woodchoppers' Ball" by Bruce Clarke and The Rockers in the United States. This one is starting to make some sales noise here and looks set for success.

* * * * *

The new 12" LP of local boy Dig Richards, released by Festival, looks like doing some big sales business. It was released in the midst of the blaze of publicity surrounding his recent motor accident. The young artist is recovering from his injuries and is already making big plans for his re-entry into his regular show business activities.

* * * * *

Harry Wren, of the Celebrity Theatre Circuit, apparently has plenty of future shows planned because he is reported as having signed up a great number of American stars for future visits to Australia. They include Billy De Wolfe, Eddie Fisher, Patti Page, Tony Bennett, Georgia Gibbs, Don Cornell, Dave Barry and Red Skelton. The Australian tour by Mickey Rooney and Kathryn Grayson for this circuit starts on 6th November.

* * * * *

There could be some big news soon concerning changes in a leading Australian record company. It is believed that this forthcoming action will leave the way clear for the full-scale release of material from a major American film company record label.

* * * * *

Leading English promoter and businessman Val Parnell is now in Australia (30th Oct.) on a visit to his business associates. Mr. Parnell has interests in radio, television and records here.

* * * * *

English/American singing and recording star Alan Dean starts his Melbourne TV season on 8th November. Dean will do a four-weeks run on the highly-rated five-nights-a-week TV show "In Melbourne Tonight".

* * * * *

In a surprise move during the weekend, Mr. Harry Wren, top man with the Celebrity Theatre Circuit, announced that the Mickey Rooney, Kathryn Grayson show would not open in Australia as planned, and heavily advertised in Melbourne—where it was scheduled to open on 6th November.

Booking had been open for several days but ticket holders will have their money refunded. Mr. Wren said that the show had been postponed but was not available for further comment.

Young singer Lydia has become a record star in Holland in a very short period of time. In Spring of 1959 the young teenager had great success with an audition for Bovema's talent scout, Frans van Schaik. She made her debut with her own orchestra, The Melody Strings, on an Imperial EP with "Send Me The Pillow", "It's A Sin", "Don't Stop", and "Heart Beat". Last July she was at the International Song Festival at Knokke (Belgium). Her hit, "Send Me The Pillow", is a mixture of rock and hillbilly and the song seems destined to become very popular in our countries. She now has two new numbers released on a single, "Your Cheatin' Heart", and "Lipstick On Your Collar".

Jules Nijs, manager of Rocco Granata of "Marina" fame, has made an exclusive deal with Artone Gramophone for distribution of all new Rocco Granata recordings in Holland. Rocco Granata's new single, "E' Primavera" and "Oh, Oh, Rosi" is breaking fast in Holland. Jules Nijs also made an exclusive deal with Moonglaw for Belgium.

Eric Dreyer's initiative in setting up a national Dutch fan club this summer, sponsored by Artone Gramophone has become a tremendous success. Thousands of teenagers subscribed to the Artone Hit Parader, the monthly paper of the club, and the number of subscribers is increasing daily.

On November 7th, 1959, the Dixieland Orchestra of Kid Ory will play at The Concertgebouw at Amsterdam (Holland). On November 14th, Art Blakey and The Jazz Messengers will visit our countries and give a concert at the Kurzaal at Scheveningen (Holland).

Lloyd Price and Paul Anka are among the most popular artists in Holland. Both artists have been high in the charts with "Personality" and "Lonely Boy".

One of the biggest record factories in Holland, Argram Phonographic Industry (a subsidiary of Artone), has put the first new type double presses in operation; production capacity over 200 records per hour. These presses make a super fast service for hits possible.

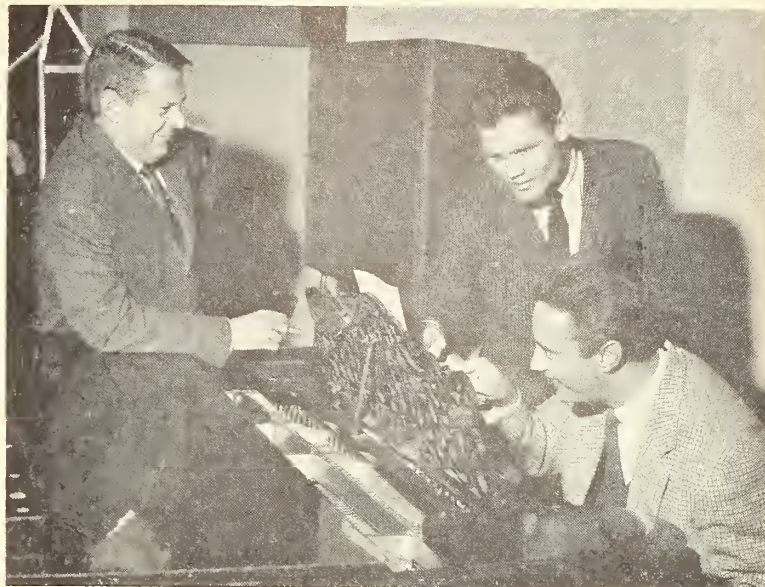

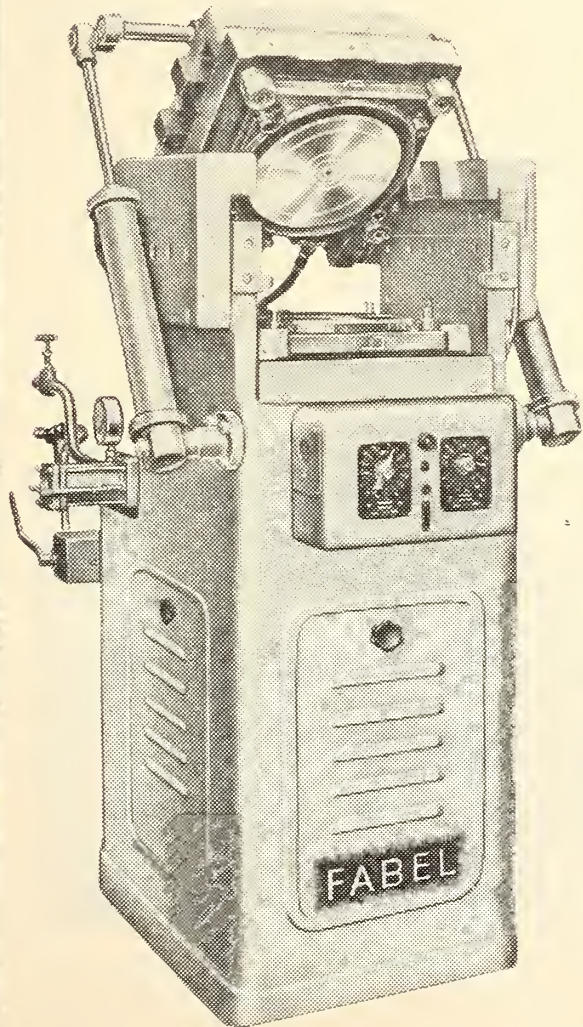

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GERMANY

As I wrote last week, on November 17th the "Deutsche Schlager Festival 1959" will come off in the Rhein—Main—Halle in Wiesbaden. This festival, which is the first in Germany, is an arrangement by the town Wiesbaden in cooperation with Radio Luxembourg. German music firms have sent three songs to Radio Luxembourg, which are composed of German componists and texted by German authors—and which up to now are not published by record firms, radio or film. The songs were sent in form of little arrangements and were presented by Radio Luxembourg. The jury then decides which song should get a prize. The three titles chosen get the golden, silver and bronze Lion of Radio Luxembourg. Radio later on will present these songs in its Hit Parade. Also the best text and the best music will get the German Critics Prize. The Mayor of Wiesbaden will establish a prize for the publisher of the best song, also a prize from the Minister-President will be given out on November 17th. Last, but not least, the three best singers, who placed on the best seller list of Radio Luxembourg will get the Golden, Silver and Bronze Lion, too. These are, Freddy Quinn, the Golden Lion for "Die Gitarre und das Meer", Dalida, the Silver Lion for "Am Tag als der Regen kam", and The James Brothers, the Bronze Lion for "The Three Bells".

The "Deutsche Grammophon Gessellschaft", seated in Hamburg, with its "Weltliteratur auf Schallplatten" will issue German language disks of poetry and important interpretations. On longplayers, which are provided with text, one can hear the dramas, romance and poems of the most famous poets of the world. So the best actors of Germany speak Shakespeare's "Hamlet", Goethe's "Faust", dramas of Schiller, Homer's "Odyssey", and the best German lyric poetry.

Ariola is connected with The Top Rank International. This gives them American music, produced by independent American firms and which is distributed by the members of the Cooperative in their own countries. These records are published under the title, "Top Rank International". In the main point those songs offered are those which already have been successful in America.

In October, Polydor started the distribution of MGM Records. These records are distributed in Austria and in Switzerland, as well as Germany.

As my English colleague Neville Marten wrote about meeting Cy Leslie in London, I have also had a date with him in Hamburg and the chance for an interesting interview. Leslie, who is the president of Pickwick Sales, merchandising arm for Design, Stereo Spectrum, Cricket, Instant Learning and Off Broadway Records, is on a four weeks trip throughout Europe. He spent two days in Germany to discuss distribution of his records as well as his publishing interests. On his journey (he already had been in Denmark, Sweden, England and will go to France and Italy), he is accompanied by his very charming and attractive wife, who with great joy bought souvenirs in each country for her three little daughters. With this rather lovable married couple, I spent nice hours in the town on the Elbe.

Out of Denmark comes the 13 year old Ilse Bronnley, who is called the "girl with the golden trumpet". She is a daughter of artists and plays the accordion since she has been a baby. When she appeared before an audience for the first time, she was immediately signed for engagements in Stockholm, London, Paris, Wien and Berlin. She has already played with Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington and Johnny Hodges. In August she was seen on German television, and now her first record is published by Ariola. She plays the self-composed, "Kopenhagen-Boogie" and "Sleepy Time Gal".

German-U.S.A. Pub Deal

NEW YORK—Peter Schaeffers, a prominent German publisher who has enjoyed great success in the field of popular music in that country over the past five years, has just concluded an agreement with the Shapiro, Bernstein Publishing firm and their associate firm, Columbia Pictures Music, to handle their complete catalogue for all German-speaking countries, including Germany, Austria, and Switzerland. These catalogues will be handled from Schaeffers' new offices in Munich and a special exploitation man will be engaged to handle the vast quantity of material.

The agreement was arranged through Eddie Kassner, who is associated with Schaeffers in America and England and also has a successful German operation with Schaeffers.

Schaeffers is currently on his usual business trip to the United States. He is here with Aldo Von Pinelli, who is Schaeffers' partner in his Melodie Films Company, a firm which has produced three of Germany's successful musical films, "Freddy," "The Guitar and the Sea," and "Peter and Conny." Pinelli is also one of Germany's well-known lyricists and scenario writers.

Schaeffers and Pinelli spent last week in Hollywood and plan to return to Germany, November 14th.

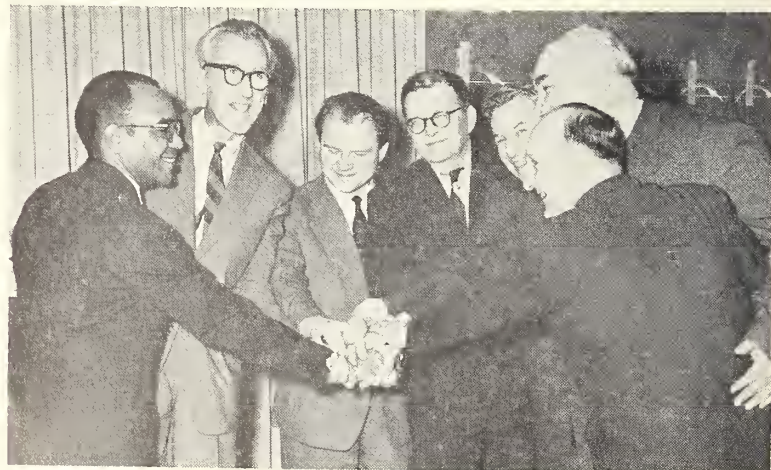

A British independent company with a specialised catalogue is Delyse-Envoy. The company was founded five years ago and is controlled by Mrs. Isabella Wallich. Her mother was American opera singer, Louisa Frederics of La Scala, Milan and her uncle F. W. Gaisberg who came to this country from Washington D.C. in 1898 and with Emile Berliner invented "the talking machine" or the gramophone as we know it today. Gaisberg pioneered the record industry in this country by founding the H.M.V. label from which the great E.M.I. catalogue has been built. He became the first and greatest Artistes' Manager in the World—his major discovery was, of course, Caruso.

Starting with one L.P. release five years ago the catalogue now totals over 50. Records are made at London's I.B.C. studios under the direct supervision of Alan Stagg. Delyse-Envoy enjoys a nation wide distribution in this country and in the States is handled by Washington Records Inc. World distribution includes Canada, Australia, Africa, New Zealand and the Far East.

Among the latest Delyse releases are Beethoven's Scottish, Irish, Welsh and English songs scored as the composer wrote them for four voices and piano trio. "Guitar Recital Volume 2" by the young British guitarist, John Williams, will shortly be released in

Sir Malcolm Sargent was guest of honour at London's Savoy Hotel to launch the first six low priced 12" L.P. classical records released by H.M.V. in their new series "Concert Classics". These disks are aimed at the younger generation at a retail price of 22s.6d. The first six releases are "Gilbert and Sullivan Overtures", "Beethoven's 'Choral' and Fifth Symphonies", "Beethoven's 'Emperor' Concerto", "Ballet Music from 'Faust', 'Coppelia' and 'Sylvia'" and "Mozart's 40th and 'Jupiter' Symphonies".

More low priced 12" classical favourites have been issued on the Philips label. These also retail at 22s.6d, and feature World famous artistes, orchestras and conductors.

Philips' top teen-age idol, Marty Wilde, this week cut his latest disk "Bad Boy" written by himself backed with "It's Been Nice" by Doc Pomus and Mort Shuman, composers of Marty's hit record "A Teenager in Love". Philips expect this to be a chart topper. Quite a week for Marty who announces his engagement to 18-year old Joyce Baker who appears with him on TV's "Boy Meets Girl".

Les Freres Jacques, famous French comedy quartet have opened a two-week season at London's Adelphi Theatre. Many of their items are on disks but Philips are issuing two E.P.'s in this country. Philips also plans to release the original cast L.P. of Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Flower Drum Song" to coincide with the London premier next March. From Fontana comes Johnny Mathis' latest disk "The Best of Everything". The film of the same title opens in London on November 5th.

Attended the party given by Decca Records and Bron Music Publishing Company to launch Tolchard Evans' first disk, "Singing Piano" backed with "If" on the Decca label. Tolch, as he is popularly known, will be remembered for his No. 1 Oscar winning hits, "My September Love" and "Everywhere", as well as the Eddie Fisher best seller "Lady of Spain" and "Let's All Sing Like The Birdies Sing". For his first record Tolch decided to find himself a gimmick and hit on the idea of the singing piano—the result is melodic and unusual.

Buttonholed Bill Ward, General Manager of Lawrence Wright Publishing House on his way to London airport for a 48-hour visit to Paris for discussions with his Continental Company, Publications Lawrence Wright. Bill was delighted with the success of his current British song, "Maybe This Year" recorded on Parlophone by Edna Savage. This number is building quickly. He is also pleased by the reaction of foreign publishers; Sam Fox Company having acquired the American rights. Ralph Peer has secured it for his European companies in Germany and Austria and a deal is being currently negotiated with important Scandinavian publishers.

Another Lawrence Wright success at the moment is Clinton Ford's recording of "Old Shep". In the immediate future Bill is very excited about a song just acquired from Herbert Marks, President of America's E. B. Marks Music entitled "Starry Eyed" (Cash Box Pick of the Week).

Teddie Holmes of Chappell & Co. Ltd. received a cable from Gracie Fields in New York asking for the recording orchestration of her latest hit, "Little Donkey" on Columbia which she plans to use in her Ed Sullivan TV show. Two airings of this number by Gracie on British TV screens has put the song into the sheet music hit parade. Teddie Holmes reports it as being the best selling song sheet music wise that Chappells have had this year. Chappells were so impressed by this first published number by Eric Boswell that they have put him under a long term contract.

Teddie Holmes also gave me news of a new publishing company, Britannia Music, opening here on November 9th, in association with Chappells. Directors will be Monty Norman and David Heneker, composers of the music of "Make Me An Offer", London's latest smash hit musical, and Julian More. They aim to concentrate on British productions and they look like having a winner to start off with. Professional Manager will be Johnny Mathieson, late of Mellin Music.

Current West-end musicals handled by Chappells include "West Side Story", "My Fair Lady" and the record breaking "South Pacific" film.

Bill Phillips, General Manager of Peter Maurice Music Publishing Company has a very big song from Italy entitled "Carina" recorded by Ray Ellington on Oriole. Bill has high hopes that this will make the charts and Sammy Cox of Peter Maurice in New York has the American rights which are currently negotiable. Peter Maurice London also handle the music from Tommy Steele's new Associated British picture "Tommy The Torreador" in which he sings five songs. One of them "Little White Bull", is being released as a single, and Tommy is donating his record royalties to the Imperial Cancer Research Fund.

Audio Fidelity Shows Progress In England

LONDON — After six months in business reports indicate that Audio Fidelity Records has established itself as a strong independent record company in England.

Six months ago Sid Frey, head of Audio Fidelity, set up shop in London by appointing John Ridley general manager and David Sparks as his assistant. Ridley at the time was national promotion director of the label in New York and Sparks was ex-sales manager of Vogue and late of Top Rank.

Combining American recording and mastering techniques with British pressings, Audio Fidelity's initial release in England comprised 14 albums of a diversity of titles and sold over 12,000 records to date. Of this initial release the most popular have proven to be "The Brave Bulls," "The Dukes of Dixieland," "Mallet Magic" by the Harry Brewer Quintet (the most played record at this year's National Radio Show) and "La Zambra," an album of flamenco and classical guitar, which is the biggest seller of the group.

When in this country last year, Frey recorded 12 classical albums by the specially-recruited Virtuoso Symphony of London under the direction of American conductors Alfred Wallenstein, Arthur Winograd and Emanuel Vardi. Having already been released in the U.S., these albums are set for a December release in England.

General manager Ridley feels that the high price, 44s (monaural) and 47s (stereo), is more than justified by "a rich, emotional experience in sound" that is available on Audio Fidelity disks.

British distribution problems have been solved by Hi-Fi Equipment distributors.

"Review Present TV Regulations"—Parnell

LONDON — Before flying to Australia to work on his British radio and television interests there, Val Parnell, managing director of Associated Television, urged the government to review the present viewing regulations limiting studios to 50 hours a week.

Parnell stated that the need for extra hours is urgent if the whole development of British television is not to be held up. "With extra hours it would be possible to offer programs with a minority appeal; talks, discussions, documentaries, etc.," he said.

Parnell further emphasized that new ideas could be tried out; newcomers could be trained and experiments made with technical developments.

3 TV Shows For Vaughan

LONDON — Paul Cave, Frankie Vaughan's manager here, disclosed that the entertainer has been set for a Nov. 22 NBC-TV appearance with Eddie Cantor and Mort Sahl. The Pontiac-sponsored special will be taped on Nov. 20.

This brings to three the total of major U.S. TV appearances this fall for Vaughan. He is already booked for the Nov. 11 Perry Como Show and the Dec. 20 Dinah Shore Show.

Content: Past hits of Woody Herman, Artie Shaw, Tommy Dorsey, et al, are played by the Williams orch in similar style. Cover: Dancing couples are boxed with name band leaders listed at bottom of each photo. Orange background and large titles combine for solid display. Performance: The Williams orch manages to follow the original in most instances quite faithfully with stereo separation enhancing the overall sound making for a solid swing band deck. Commercial Value: Big bands of yesteryear strike nostalgic notes and usually make for good sales getters. This deck should share in market, especially from racks.

"THAT GOOD OLD PIANO ROLL" Freddie "Fingers" O'Leary, Tops-Mayfair-9674S, \$2.98

Content: "When You Wore A Tulip", "The Band Played On", "Red River Valley" and others. Cover: Natural color shot of O'Leary at piano and gal costumed in a gay 90's costume. Performance: O'Leary's "piano roll" is contagious, creating airy party atmosphere while rhythm section adds to the beat and stereo adds to enjoyment. Oldies performed with nostalgic feeling. Commercial Value: A good party deck as well as solid offering for old favorite market. Good sing along deck. Rack choice.

"TV THEMES" Richard Gleason Orch., Tops-Mayfair-9661S, \$2.98

Content: "Navy Log March", "Peter Gunn", "Alfred Hitchcock Presents" and others. Cover: Cartoon art depicts TV western scene being filmed on sound stage. Large bold titles give jacket strong display. Performance: Some seldom heard themes (Hitchcock, Navy Log) are played in full length with orch providing full big band sound. Standard selections (Gunn, etc.) round out a TV flavored deck. Commercial Value: The charts show TV themes strong at top as recorded by original tracks. No reason for this deck not to share success especially with seldom heard themes such as "Mike Hammer", "Restless Gun", etc.

"THEMES FROM THE MOVIES—VOL. II" The 110 Strings Orch., Tops-Mayfair-9642S, \$2.98

Content: "Moon Is Blue", "Slaughter On 10th Ave.", "Foolish Heart", others. Cover: Color shot of scene from "Three For The Show" with Betty Grable center stage. Title and artists in display lettering. Performance: Slow paced lush string delivery in soft caressing tones provides a top notch presentation of some solid movie chestnuts. The "110" style enhances while stereo adds even more to overall sound. Commercial Value: Good background deck that should catch super sales on strength of selections and "strings" feature. Looks like a good entry.

"OKLAHOMA—CAROUSEL" The London Theatre Company, Richmond S-30062, \$2.98

Content: Selections from the Broadway musicals include: "Oh, What A Beautiful Morning", "Oklahoma", "If I Loved You", "You'll Never Walk Alone". Cover: Color photo illustrates "sing around the fire" scene with titles balanced at top. Performance: The M. Sammes Singers shine as does a most solid cast. Show tunes are performed with great vigor in a first rate performance with backing by a top notch orch. Very good show tune entry. Commercial Value: Show tunes sell consistently well. This dual R&H offering should stand up with the best.

"PORGY AND BESS—SHOW BOAT" Frank Chacksfield and Orch., Richmond S-30059, \$2.98

Content: Show tunes include "Plenty Of Nuttin'", "Summertime", "Ol' Man River", "Make Believe", others. Cover: Split with color shots of female leads from each of two shows dividing the jacket. Color throughout with strong titles. Performance: Chacksfield caresses some of the best tunes from each show in a "bluesy" feeling, at times, interpreting in a style that is rich in tone and most pleasant to hear. Balances slower paced tempos with fine up-tempo offerings. Trumpet and trombone solos are outstanding. Commercial Value: Strong show material with Chacksfield's name featured on bottom of jacket front—ought to catch a ready market for Broadway show tunes.

At that time he will record "Scene of Mystery," title song of the first Smell-O-Vision motion picture, and "The Chase" from the same film. He also said that during his supper club engagement, he will record an album titled "Eddie Fisher At The Waldorf."

Headquarters for Ramrod Records will be in New York.

Kruger-Kaye Productions

NEW YORK — Buddy Kaye and Jeff Kruger of London, announced the formation of a new corporation, Kruger-Kaye Productions, Inc., to produce low budget musical films.

Kaye left for California this week to further the plans of the new corporation. He will be there some 10 days or two weeks.

Kruger, who spent a few weeks in the United States, left for London, Sunday, Nov. 1.

Xmas Trees In Cole Promo

NEW YORK — One hundred and fifty Christmas trees will be given away to the needy as part of a promotional stunt on Nat King Cole's new Yuletide offering, "The Happiest Christmas Tree." Jack Gale, whose Sweco Music publishes the tune, made the announcement and also noted the release is Cole's first Xmas single in almost ten years. The last one was "The Christmas Song."

Columbia Appoints Bolton

NEW YORK—The appointment of Bruce Bolton to the position of administrative assistant in public relations has been announced by Columbia Records' Deborah Ishlon, coordinator of creative services.

In this newly created position, Bolton is directly responsible to the coordinator of creative service for the administration of all clerical functions performed by public relations and for lending assistance to the coordinator in carrying on departmental activities.

Bolton attended the University of Southern California and the Sorbonne in Paris. For the past twelve years he has been engaged in various administrative functions with overseas projects in Europe and the Middle East.

Powerful Victor Dealer Promo Set For First Rod Lauren Single

NEW YORK—The all-out saturation campaign to launch new pop singer Rod Lauren swings into high gear this week as RCA Victor offers a powerful dealer promotion. Conceived both to give dealers a chance to make a 100% profit on their initial order of Lauren's first release, "If I Had a Girl" b/w "No Wonder", and to give the singer massive and continuing exposure, the promotion will be featured in specially-coupled double-page trade ads ap-

pearing this week.

Details are: RCA Victor is offering 25,000 free copies of Lauren's first single to one thousand dealers who reply via the coupon and return mail. Each of the thousand dealers will receive a carton of 25 Lauren records on the basis of earliest-postmarked replies.

Lauren himself arrives in New York this week from the west coast to start a national promotion/press tour.

Roulette's Roster Grows

NEW YORK—Over the past number of months Roulette Records has signed a number of new artists to its growing roster. In some instances the artists have been signed for package presentation, others for singles and still others for both single and album releases.

In the label's November-December album release, 4 artists will make their initial bow on L.P.'s. Two of the performers are not new to the record buyers, namely Turk Murphy whose set is entitled, "Music For Wise Guys and Boosters, Card Sharps and Crap Shooters" (Taken from the song "Ace In The Hole"). This is Murphy's second Roulette album, his first, "Turk Murphy At The Roundtable" was released in August. Another famed dixieland jazz star, Jack Teagarden will be out with Jack Teagarden At The Roundtable which was etched on-the-spot at the New York club. Anne Phillips, who was for a number of years connected with the Ray Charles singers, debuts with "Born To Be Blue." "The St. Patrick's Cathedral Choir Sings Christmas Carols" rounds out the new album performers on Roulette for November-December. Tico Records, Roulette's Latin-American division, will be out with the Argentinean composer — arranger Astor Piazzola's first LP, "Take Me Dancing".

Looking ahead in January, Roulette will have albums by pianist and composer-arranger Marc Fredricks; a first album by Illinois Jacquet; a first effort from saxophonist "Big Sam" Marowitz; an organ set from Bob Wyatt; a vocal and piano set from Chico Randall. "Big Daddy" who is currently represented with a single release, "Where In The World", will have an initial blues set released on the recently reactivated Gee label.

Among some of the new artists out with their first single efforts are: Don Rondo, "Batch Of Love"; Jimmy & The Rebels, "You Are My Sunshine"; Larry Ellis, "Hide And Seek"; Kenny Rossi with "But I Do", on Gee.

Among some of the new Roulette discoveries who scored with hits in 1959 and will be out with albums shortly are: Ronnie Hawkins who connected with two in a row with "Mary Lou" (Hawkins is already out with his first LP); the Rock-A-Teens, who are high on the best seller lists with "Woo Hoo"; Cathy Carr whose first LP, "Shy", is in the release and Mickey Mozart, whose odd instrumental of "Little Dipper", was a chart seller just a short time back.

Joe Reisman, A&R chief for Roulette, summed up the long list of new artists this way, "The public's desire for new faces on records, is not as some believe relegated to just rock 'n roll stars on single discs. There is a market for new voices and instrumentalists on albums and Roulette doesn't intend to ignore this market."

New Cole LP Promotion

HOLLYWOOD — A promotional campaign linking the record and men's apparel industries is being launched on the heels of Capitol's Nov. 2 release of Nat King Cole's new album, "A Mis Amigos."

On the album cover, the popular singer is shown wearing a checked hat against a backdrop representing the Latin American countries he visited on a tour last Spring.

Men's wear dealers all over the country may order full-color reproductions of the album jacket along with two previous album covers also picturing Cole and Frank Sinatra wearing cloth hats. These are Cole's "The Very Thought Of You" and Sinatra's "Come Dance With Me."

The National Cap and Cloth Hat Institute is handling the distribution of the album jackets, and specially prepared streamers and posters. The Institute's representatives will distribute to record dealers actual hats and caps to be displayed with the album covers in the reciprocal arrangement.

The Institute's newsletter said of the agreement:

"For the first time in the history of the apparel industry, a large-scale promotion has been worked out between a record company and a whole facet of men's apparel."

Lawrence & Martin Form New Alanna Label

PITTSBURGH—Bill Lawrence announced last week that he and Lennie Martin had formed Alanna Records, this city. First Alanna issue, "Don't Sweat It Baby" by the Four Seasons has reportedly broken out here and in L.A., with action also reported in Detroit, Chicago, and Hartford.

Lawrence and Martin were formerly associated with Calico Records, but recently left to form Alanna. Lawrence said he and Martin co-produced and A&R'd the successful Skyliners' and Donnybrooks' sessions on Calico. Both groups, Lawrence further stated, were his and Martin's discoveries. Lawrence was also national Calico distributor during the past year. Lawrence also heads Bill Lawrence Distributors and is a partner in One-Stop, both this city.

Rage Developing LP Line

HOLLYWOOD — Rage Records, here, is "developing" an LP line for availability to its distributors in January, according to an announcement by prexy Don Locke and veep Jim Maitland. The new label, said general manager Dave Fontaine, is getting regional activity on its initial offering, "Cricket" b/w "What's The Matter" by the Uptowners.

Big Sendoff For Connor's LP

NEW YORK—Chris Connor's new Atlantic album is the subject of a unique promotion by Atlantic Records. Titled "Witchcraft" the album will be released to the public on Friday the 13th (Nov.) Five thousand specially prepared disk jockey EP's, containing four selections from the album are being mailed out to reach their destination by the Nov. 13 release date.

The album, according to the diskery, is Miss Connor's first in which the emphasis is on pop rather than jazz. Whereas her previous albums were released in the 1200 series (jazz), "Witchcraft" is in the 8000 series (pop), selling for one dollar less.

The promotion will be sparked by ads in trade papers and six major consumer publications.

The album's cover, in keeping in the theme of the promotion, features an enlarged eye of Miss Connor, about which Atlantic's director of sales Bob Kornheiser quipped, "It's guaranteed to hypnotize customers."

**"Home Music Library" Project
Tested By Columbia**

NEW YORK — Columbia Records will begin limited testing of a new localized marketing project, latest in a continuing company program designed to "expand the base of the record market." The new project, called "Home Music Library" involves sale of phonograph and guidance materials as well as a "starter set" of records. All dealers in the test area will be shown details of the project. The company intends to inform them of further developments and to invite their cooperation and participation.

Columbia executives consider expansion of phonograph ownership vital to the growth of the record market. Current research indicates that only one out of four families in the country owns modern record-playing equipment. Thus, the tremendous growth of record sales in the past ten years has been accumulated by only twenty five per cent of the families in the United States. The new program is designed to broaden the potential market by equipping the non-record-buying consumer with a record player and thus stimulating his interest in further purchases.

Liberty LP's On Bel Canto Tape

LOS ANGELES — Liberty Records has concluded negotiations with Russ Molloy, president of Bel Canto, calling for the exclusive distribution of all tape versions of Liberty product via Bel Canto Stereophonic Recordings, it was announced by Al Bennett, Liberty vice president.

First Liberty tapes to be released by Bel Canto will be Martin Denny's "Exotica" albums; "Julie is Her Name, Volume II" by Julie London; and "Hot Cha Cha" by Don Swan and his Orchestra.

Also in the first release will be "Half Time" by the University Brass Band conducted by Russ Garcia and "Alma Mater" by the Johnny Mann Singers.

All releases will be in two-track, four-track and in cartridge form.

Kesselman To Atlantic

NEW YORK — Howard Kesselman has joined Atlantic Records as assistant to sales manager Bob Kornheiser, effective November 16. Kesselman's primary concern at the outset will be in connection with the activities of Atlantic's new subsid, Trey Records.

For the past year, Kesselman has been on the staff of The Music Vendor. Prior to that he was producer-director at stations WPTR-Albany; WKBC-TV-Cincinnati and WWTW-Cadillac, Mich.

Imperial Appoints Wood

HOLLYWOOD — Lew Chudd, president of Imperial Records, last week announced the appointment of Randy Wood (not to be confused with Dot Records Randy Wood) as eastern sales rep for the firm.

Wood will headquarter in New York and cover sales and promotion with distribs and deejays through the east. Previous to joining Imperial, Wood was midwest sales rep for Kapp Records.

The disk jockey who receives the most mail, also will receive the above prizes. Capitol also will be presenting thousands of Frank Sinatra albums to individual winners of the participating stations.

Daniel Foster, Jr., stationed on the island with the 3D Marine Division, sent Joy a letter requesting copies of "My Little Marine" and future sessions by Miss Horton for the stations there, KSBK and AFRS. Seems, according to Beasley, the Marines on Okinawa have started a Jamie Horton fan club. Joy, by the way, does not have Okinawa on its mailing list, nor does it have a distrib there.

"Each recording and each album will receive concentrated exposure in all media; radio, television and the press," Conkling said, "with all Warner Bros. field exploitation personnel concentrating on a release."

"With a full year of experience behind the company, we expect to make even greater accomplishments in all phases of our activities during 1960," continued Conkling.

"In one year's time we have firmly established the nucleus of our administrative, sales and artist repertoire departments. The latter, under the direction of George Avakian."

"Under the aegis of Hal Cook, vice president and director of sales, we have built a most aggressive and flexible sales organization, with nine company-owned sales branches, and 27 independent distributors."

Statistically, the company released 118 long-playing popular albums and 97 pop single records during the year. Conkling pointed to the latter as indicative of the company's faith in the future of the industry, and more specifically, of Warner Bros., serious intent on becoming a "major record company operation." All of the albums were recorded in stereo and monaural.

In discussing the firm's product and its artists, Conkling averred that the Warner Bros. catalog is representative of all fields of musical appetite. "We have diversified enough to have LP product in virtually every musical category. We intend now to concentrate on enhancing the position of our artist," Conkling said, "while at the same time building new talents."

Jimmy Jones Single Breaks

NEW YORK—MGM Records' new Cub release, "Handyman" by Jimmy Jones, which has been "simmering" since its release a few weeks ago, has broken wide open according to reports from the diskery. National sales manager Charlie Hasin said that the record first broke in the widely separated areas of Pittsburgh and Los Angeles last week and since then has spread to Philadelphia, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, Cincinnati and Kansas city.

MGM reported "heavy continuous action" on the disk as of close of business on Friday (5). Based on this reaction, Cub (MGM subsid) is re-servicing disk jockeys with the record through normal distributor channels.

Settle "Too Much" Royalty Suit

NASHVILLE—After a long legal battle concerning the rights to royalties from the Elvis Presley hit, "Too Much," U. S. District Judge William E. Miller has held that Lee Rosenberg and Bernard Weinman are entitled to all writer royalties and that Southern Belle Music has full right to their publishing royalties.

William D. Beasley and wife filed suit in Federal Court in June of 1957 against Miss Rosenberg and Weinman and Southern Belle, claiming that they had writer and publication rights in the song. The court held, however, that "Too Much" as recorded by Presley on RCA Victor had been rewritten by Miss Rosenberg and Weinman, one of the original writers, as contended by Weinman, Rosenberg and Southern and that any rights in the song which the Beasley's might have had, had been relinquished by them prior to the time of its commercial success.

Xmas Tape Special Offered

CALDWELL, N. J.—Stereophonic Music Society, Inc., national sales agency for Livingston Stereo Tape, is offering a special Christmas bonus plan for its distributors.

S. M. S. will give an album of Christmas songs by Tom and Jerry Vincent free for every two tapes the distributor buys. The tape is available in both two and four track stereo versions.

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CRDC Sets National Promotion Conclave

After the convention, Swint will tour CRDC's eastern branches before returning to his Capitol Tower headquarters.

Como Disk Picked As Christmas Seal Song

NEW YORK—Perry Como's RCA Victor recording, "I May Never Pass This Way Again", has been selected by the National Tuberculosis Association as the 1959 Christmas Seal Song.

The TB Association, RCA Victor and Trinity Music, the publisher, will push the Seal Song with a three-way public service promotion in conjunction with the annual Christmas Seal Campaign to help fight tuberculosis. The promotion, which starts November 16, will be highlighted by a special disk jockey record using Como's own voice tracks as Christmas Seal lead-ins to the song.

RCA Victor is shipping the special promotion disk to 2800 jockeys and Trinity to its own list of 1800 DJ's. The Association's 3,000 local affiliates will be scheduling both live and recorded performances of the song in their local areas.

The Christmas Seal Song is an annual music tradition which has become a popular staple of the holiday radio fare for nearly a decade. Every year the annual selection has been recorded by one or more artists and used as an integral part of the Association's Christmas Seal Campaign. "I May Never Pass This Way Again" is the second Como recording to be selected as the National Tuberculosis Association's yearly theme. The first, "One Little Candle" was chosen in 1953.

"I May Never Pass This Way Again" has just been released by RCA Victor as a single for the first time in this country. It previously was available as a single in England, where it became popular as a result of being sung there by Como on a kinescope of his television show.

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Scott Named Exec A&R Head Of Capitol & Angel Classics

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 4—Francis M. Scott III Capitol's Director of A&R Administration, has assumed executive A&R responsibility for all Capitol classical products, including Angel Records, it was announced last week by Lloyd W. Dunn, vice president for A&R.

In his new post, Scott will continue to serve as Dunn's executive staff assistant for Recording, and will undertake many duties formerly handled by the A&R head himself.

According to Dunn, the idea behind the establishment of Scott's new office was to free Capitol's A&R head from many day-to-day classical responsibilities and reduce the number of executives reporting directly to him. The A&R chief will now concern himself only with the broader aspects of Capitol's classical activities, principally long-range product planning.

Under the new set-up, both Leo H. Kepler, director of Angel repertoire, and Richard C. Jones, director of Capitol classics repertoire, will report to Scott, as will Roland Fribourghouse. Fribourghouse will take on some of Scott's former administrative duties, while continuing his own work in the field of artist and publisher negotiations.

The current moves thus complete a general reorganization of Capitol's A&R division begun by Dunn in October, when, in the division's pop wing, the posts of executive producer, producer and associate producer were established. Under the new organization, only Scott, Lou Schurrer (director of album packaging), and six executive producers report directly to Dunn.

In commenting on the new plan, Dunn remarked:

"I feel that the new organization will let us exploit the advantages of our company size, and at the same time let us maintain the free-swinging A&R operation for which Capitol has always been known."

Scott has been with Capitol in 1949. He has handled the signing of such Capitol classical attractions as Carmen Dragon, Erich Leinsdorf and the Hollywood Bowl Symphony. Back in 1955, Scott started Capitol in stereo.

Lancer Signs The Twins

PHILADELPHIA—Lancer Records has signed the Twins to an exclusive recording contract. The Twins, Jim and John, formerly recorded for RCA Victor under the name Twin-Tones. Their first record for Lancer, "Heart of Gold," was released last week.

Ann Hasin of Lancer said that due to the Twins' favorable reception at record hops they are being set for a cross-country disk jockey promotion tour. A national promotion campaign is also being readied for the artists.

2,000 Expected At 8th Annual Country Music Festival This Week

NASHVILLE—The Eighth Annual Country Music Disk Jockey Festival will take place in Nashville, Tennessee, November 13 and 14 with more than two thousand disk jockeys, artists, publishers, management men and women, and representatives of the recording industry expected to attend. The occasion will coincide with the 34th anniversary of the beginning of the Grand Ole Opry, the oldest continuous program in radio.

Originated and still sponsored by WSM, Inc., the Festival brings to Nashville more people than any other single event in the entire year, more talent than has ever been assembled anywhere else, and a wealth of overall knowledge of the music industry.

The Festival began in 1951 with an attendance of about a hundred people, and, in eight years, has multiplied in attendance twenty times. This year, it has just about everything in the way of program attractions—panel discussions, informative talks, parties, entertainment, broadcast sessions, and what have you. Joining with WSM in making the Festival such a booming success are many of the leading figures of the radio and music field. There will be breakfasts, luncheons, dinners, open houses, banquets and parties, hosted by some of the recording firms.

Opening session Friday, November 13, with Ott Devine, Program Manager of the Grand Ole Opry, presiding, will feature a welcome from Governor Buford Ellington of Tennessee, a long-time country music enthusiast, and WSM President, Jack DeWitt.

Also on the program will be an appearance of one of the nation's experts on extra-sensory perception, Dr. Spencer Thornton, who will look into the future of the industry and make prognostications that should interest his audience. Dr. Thornton is a surgeon by profession. Before entering the Southern Baptist Seminary in Louisville in preparation for service in the Orient as a medical missionary, he was in private practice in Nashville. Having temporarily put aside his practice, he turned to the hobby that he developed as a teenager and with which he paid his way through college and medical school. . . . Mentalism. It was with this hobby that he gained national attention. He now maintains a double role: seminary student and entertainer. He is a frequent guest on the Jack Paar Show, appears monthly on CBC Television in Canada and can be heard on his own "Monitor" (NBC) Show "Mysteries of the Mind" every weekend. He is also a syndicated columnist with King Features, writing the weekly column "Mysteries of the Mind." He claims only the ability to amaze his audiences and avidly disclaims any supernatural powers. He flatly does not claim any ability to see into the future but presents his "challenging" program purely for entertainment. Feature articles have appeared about him in magazines such as "Saga," "American Weekly," "Saturday Evening Post" and others.

For the first time all the Stars of the Grand Ole Opry will appear at the Opening Session in a production number that should "out spectacular" any "spectacular" ever presented! Written and produced by veteran writer Cliff Thomas and Emceed by T. Tommy Cutrer, this will undoubtedly prove to be one of the highlights of the entire convention.

A panel discussion on the Friday session will feature the subject, "Money, and How To Make More of It Through Country Music."

Those taking part on the panel are: Dave Stone, Country Music Disk Jockey and Owner of Radio Station KDAV at Lubbock, Texas; Cas Walker, Owner of Chain of Food Supermarkets; Jim Denny, President of Jim Denny Artist Bureau, Inc., Cedar-

wood Publishing Co., Inc., Denny Music, Spook Publishing Co., Radio Station WJAT, Swainsboro, Georgia, and WBRO, Waynesboro, Georgia; and Harry Stone, Executive Director of C.M.A.

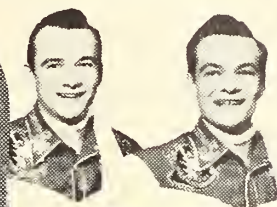

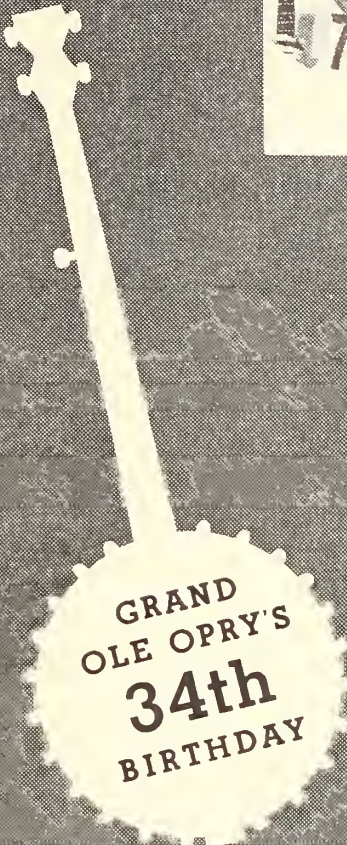

● On the heels of his "Partners"—"I'm Beginning to Forget You" two-sided hit, Reeves follows with two more solid slices that should rack up pop sales as well as country. They're both weepers—"In a Mansion" is an up-tempo, flavorfully melodic cut, while contrast is offered with the tender, carefully-wrought waltz-ballad, "He'll Have To Go." Reeves gives 'em both his most sympathetic manner. Fine two-market pairing.

"DEAR MAMA" (2:15) [Bayou State BMI—Kilgore]

"JIMMIE BRINGS SUNSHINE" (2:26) [Bayou State BMI—Kilgore]

MERLE KILGORE (Starday 469)

● Kilgore should have his biggest record to date here and both sides display big hit potential. "Dear Mama" is a tender inspirational type ballad that the singer handles with a Johnny Cash-like expressiveness. "Jimmie Brings Sunshine," taken a slightly brisk pace with a melody reminiscent of "Davy Crockett," is a great testimonial to ex-Governor of Louisiana Jimmie Davis which should delight non-Louisianians as well. A chorus shines on both sides.

"THE GIRL WHO DIDN'T NEED LOVE" (2:30) [Wonder, Marlow BMI—Isle]

"YOUR KIND OF PEOPLE" (2:28) [Rondo BMI—Miller]

PORTER WAGONER (RCA Victor 7638)

● Wagoner should easily get back in the hit groove with both ends of his latest Victor outing. He pours his heart out on two tearful episodes; "The Girl Who Didn't Need Love," a touching love story on which Wagoner gets fine assistance from a femme voice, and "Your Kind Of People," a honky-tonk styled pleader. Both feature excellent ork-chorus backing.

"THE ONE YOU SLIP AROUND WITH" (2:17) [Jat BMI—Howard, Owen]

"I WISH I COULD FALL IN LOVE AGAIN" (2:15) [Jat BMI—Howard, Stewart]

JAN HOWARD (Challenge 59059)

● This could be the one the thrush will achieve national recognition with and the side to do it is "The One You Slip Around With." Tune's a traditional weeper, taken at a slightly upbeat pace, that Miss Howard delivers with deep feeling and poignance. A real attention-getter. Don't neglect "I Wish I Could Fall In Love Again" on the lower end, a slow, tearful ballad.

"BILLY THE KID" (2:35) [Starday BMI—Starcher]

"RUNNING AWAY" (2:08) [Starday BMI—Starcher]

BUDDY STARCHER (Starday 460)

● Starcher's telling of anecdotes about the young western outlaw, "Billy The Kid," could start him on a road to hitsville. The singer joins forces with a chorus and together they romp over the steady driving, quick paced ditty in fine folk song fashion. Flipside, "Running Away," is a medium paced country blues item that's handled with a big helping of sincerity. "Billy The Kid" is the side to watch.

JENNY HERRELL

(Sims 109)

B+ "BOTTLE OR ME" (2:00) [R&R BMI—Franks] The gal feelingfully offers her man a choice between drinking or her. The quick paced lament features effective recitation parts.

B "HONEY I GOTTA HAVE YOU" (2:25) [R&R BMI—Jones] Lively, up-tempo romantic ditty is enchanting material for the thrush here. Appealing entry.

KEN IDAHO

(Fame 506)

B "FROM LOVING YOU" (2:38) [Mel-Mat BMI—Taylor] Middle beat, soft blue theme is carved out with quiet feeling. Pop angling (chorus and beat) can add plays.

B "SCHOOL OF LOVE" (2:23) [Mel-Mat BMI—Aderhold] Another pop-styled ballad is taken the tender route by Idaho. Jimmy Hear's ork provides fine backing on both sides.

CURT GIBSON

There's More Export Sales —

If

PROPER MERCHANDISING STEPS ARE FOLLOWED

The "overall marketing concept", a term heard frequently in corporations manufacturing and selling merchandise to the American consumer, embraces every sales step necessary from the actual manufacturing of a bar of soap or an automobile, to the point of sale—through retail stores into the hands of an unseen consumer. Every step in the marketing of a product is considered of prime importance since the manufacturer's customers are just faces in a crowd of 180,000,000 American consumers. The sale from manufacturer to consumer cannot be a personal transaction between the two.

A comparison is drawn here with the coin machine industry, especially when the ultimate consumer is a person who is also an unseen buyer—the far-flung export market of coin machine wholesalers and operators. To sell this export market every step of the "overall marketing concept" must be utilized. No longer does the wholesaler have the buyer in person in his showrooms to view merchandise. Machines must be sold through personal correspondence, advertising, or at best, a personal visit to the importer's homeland. No longer are terms of cash or credit a matter awaiting immediate decision. Letters of credit, sight drafts and other credit techniques take valuable time before a business deal may be consummated. No longer may a machine be sold verbally, with profit-making features explained on a person-to-person basis. And probably most important, no longer may a wholesaler *benefit* from a possible complaint such as damaged equipment, incorrect filling of an order, or anything that may be construed as a breach of contract regarding terms of sale between buyer and seller. A complaint may not be received for weeks at a time, or worse yet, may never be received at all. An unfortunate circumstance could develop that would otherwise not pose a problem had the sale been made in a domestic territory, in person.

The American wholesaler is also much like the mail order house depending entirely on reputation, advertising, past performance, and repeat business for success. While personal visits bring the export market closer to the typical domestic business area, the bulk of the export market is sold on a more impersonal basis.

It is our contention that to insure a ready export market for regular outlet of used equipment, exporters must do everything in their power to instill in the minds of the unseen buyer a feeling of confidence. This can be brought about by educating and informing the importer as to what is available and at what price. Delivery dates should be exact, as is humanly possible, terms of credit should be clear, and honest opinions on types of equipment recommended for certain operations should be offered. Possibilities of damaged equipment on arrival should be considered from every respect. Repeat business, along this same line, should be a matter of immediate follow-up and at regular intervals, just as it is here in the U. S. The export buyer cannot be expected to close a deal every time an offering is made, just as the domestic buyer does not buy each time a sales pitch is made. However, the actual sales presentation must be a continuous one.

Summarizing, while jets and progress bring foreign countries closer to our doors with every passing day, a closer relationship should be made through the various means outlined above. Eventually, the wholesaler may expect to cultivate a buyer to the point of buying unseen merchandise eliminating many of the preliminaries that delay the final sale, once he has instilled in the buyer a feeling of confidence. The wholesaler may bring this situation about more rapidly if he considers the "overall marketing concept", not forgetting one detail that goes into a successful sale and eventually a repeat order.

8000 ATTEND 13TH ANNUAL NAMA CONVENTION IN CHI

CHICAGO—The keynote of the National Automatic Merchandising Association's 13th annual convention last week at the vast Navy Pier, in this city, was "Sight on the Sixties", as expressed by industry leaders.

The general consensus of opinion by the huge crowds in attendance was that a new milestone has definitely been reached in automatic vending equipment and merchandise planning.

In excess of 8,000 paying visitors viewed more than 130 exhibits, and attended the various meetings, general sessions and daily lectures, October 31 through November 3, at the Navy Pier and the Conrad Hilton Hotel. Every conceivable type of vending equipment, offering merchandise and service, was represented in exhibits on the mile long upper floor of the Navy Pier.

Besides the regular vending crowd which generally attends NAMA conventions, there was a considerable representation from visiting games and music coinmen from every section of the country and overseas.

Thomas B. Donahue, vice-president and treasurer of National Vendors, Inc., St. Louis, Mo., was elected president of the National Automatic Merchandising Association at the annual meeting, November 1. Donahue succeeds William S. Fishman, vice-president of Automatic Merchandising Company of Chicago, who held the high office for the past two years.

Other officers elected Sunday include Herb A. Geiger of Geiger Automatic Sales Co., Milwaukee, 1st vice-president; Norval B. Rader, Automatic Canteen Co., Chicago, 2nd vice-president; and Henry Davidson, Davidson Automatic Merchandising Corporation, Los Angeles, treasurer.

A new board of directors was also impaneled. Those elected to three year terms are David D. Dayton, Tennessee Service Co., Inc., Knoxville, Tenn.; Donahue; Meyer Gelfand, G. B. Macke Corporation, Washington, D. C.; J. Richard Howard, Howard Vending Service, Indianapolis; W. B. Manning, Jr., Rudd Melikian, Inc., Hatboro, Pa.; Carl Millman, Automatic Merchandising, Milwaukee; and, Robert W. Wagstaff, Vendo Co., Kansas City. The lone one year term director is Lenarth C. Anderson, Rochester Coca Cola Bottling Corp., Rochester, N. Y.

Long active in NAMA activities, Donahue has served on numerous committees of the association and has also served as treasurer, 2nd vice-president and most recently 1st vice-president. A certified public accountant, Donahue has been with National Vendors, Inc. for the past fifteen years.

Donahue, in accepting the presidency of NAMA, spoke at the annual meeting, predicting that automatic retailing will experience dynamic growth in the next decade as "Americans on the move will rely increasingly on impulse buying for an even greater share of their needs at work and at play."

"People will have more time to play in the sixties and more people will be working in our growing economy," Donahue said. "The job of

automatic vending specialists will be to serve our customers while they are at work as well as to satisfy their needs while they are enjoying leisure time and play."

Donahue cited newspaper descriptions dating back to the 1920's which predicted even then the advent of grocery vending, automatic hair curlers and other "flights of fancy".

Pointing out that the automatic merchandising industry has already surpassed many of its early dreams, he commended "operating companies in the industry for constantly seeking new products and new types of machines through which to retail goods and services.

"Our industry is moving at a tremendous speed in the development of new machinery and methods. Manufacturers of vending machines are developing machines to satisfy the future needs even before they are apparent to many in the industry," he said.

"We will benefit from fuel and power concepts in the advancement of refrigeration systems, prefab structures for use in outdoor vending stations, and the new plastics with characteristics of metals which can be stretched, molded, and formed into tubing."

He predicted an early solution to the industry's urgent need for trained manpower "because young people move toward the new and dynamic growth industries, and ours has more than its share of romance and excitement. It fairly sparkles!"

He cited many other needs, and voiced his satisfaction at the continuing trend of solution and constant advances; and concluded by stressing that with this kind of progress and effort being put forth by the industry the road ahead in the sixties looms very bright and filled with optimistic predictions.

Chi Coin Ships New "4 Game Bowler"

"Before releasing the '4 Game Bowler' to the trade," Weinand said, "we tested it considerably in many different locations all over the country. Results were definitely very optimistic, and earnings particularly high.

"Sizeable shipments have been made to Chicago Coin's distributors throughout the nation. And we urge operators to make it a point to visit their showrooms and see '4 Game Bowler' in action."

The game has a large colorful backglass, beautifully constructed, highly polished playfield, and giant bowling pins. There is a single 10¢ coin chute or a double coin chute for 10¢ and three for a quarter play available.

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Seaway Expects 1960 Toll Rate Increase

NEW YORK—With the St. Lawrence Seaway's first year of operation coming to a close by the end of November, it is predicted that toll rates will be increased for 1960.

The estimated tonnage predicted for 1959 will not be reached, and probably will fall some 40% below the figure set. It is reported that much of the demands for a toll increase is coming from Canada, with little doubt that it will have the support of the United States.

It is claimed that several factors

brought about this condition. Forecasts originally predicted were nearly 25% too high; long transit delays in the Welland Canal (an all Canadian affair); inadequate docking facilities in some ports which held up cargo loading and unloading; and some lesser reasons.

As a result of the first year's trial and error period for the Seaway, it is reported several changes are being made both by the ports and the Canadian government to speed up the movement of ships next year.

N. J. Voters OK Prizes On Skill Games

TRENTON, N. J.—The coin machine industry received one of its greatest victories in this State when the public, thru a referendum on Election Day, voted overwhelmingly to permit the operators of skill games in Seashore areas, Amusement Parks and Amusement Palaces to award prizes.

The New Jersey voters voted 873,000 to 599,000 in favor of this amendment.

Arcade owners are jubilant at the public's vote for the awarding of prizes, erasing a law passed in 1956 which banned prizes on skill games.

It is felt that much credit should go to the combined effort of those in the trade who worked hard to erase the ban. A newspaper campaign addressed to the general public evidently had much to do with the victory.

The State will now appoint a commission (similar to the State Liquor Authority) which will supervise the arcades. The Commission will have a Commissioner who will have full authority and the last word as to the type of equipment and prizes.

Arcade and coinmen in the New York-New Jersey-Pennsylvania areas were delighted with the outcome of the elections since they have been operating under the former ruling all during the 1959 season.

Some of the loss expected to have been incurred because of the ruling this past summer was recovered when the weather and a combination of three-day weekend holidays brought record crowds to the amusement spots in New Jersey.

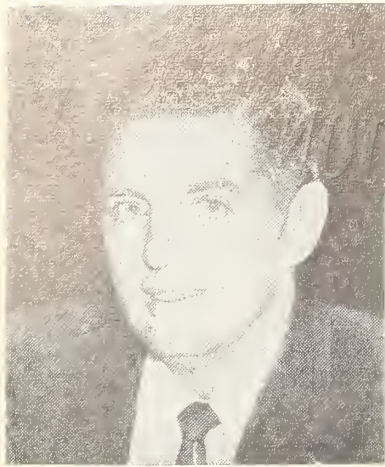

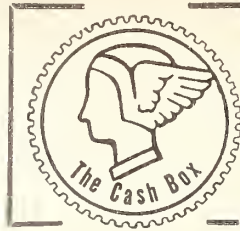

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Kaye Ships "Cue-Ball" Novelty Game

Features Conversion To Bumper Pool

BROOKLYN, N. Y. — Irving Kaye, president, Irving Kaye Company, this city, announced last week that the firm has shipped its newest game, "Cue-Ball" to distributors across the country.

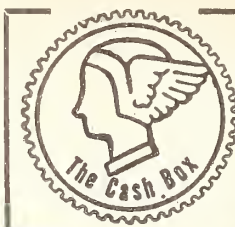
"The game is similar to the successful cue-ball games of ten or eleven years ago, many of which are still in operation today. Measuring 75 inches by 42 inches, our game is larger than the old Bert Lane model, which many people in the industry will recall as being promoted via the radio and press because of the reluctance of the general public to accept a 'pool table' type of game that was coin-operated. Today, as we all know, the coin-operated pool game is probably one of the most popular games in the country. We therefore expect to have immediate acceptance of 'Cue-Ball', especially after a seven week test period here in the East," said Kaye.

"'Cue-Ball' can accommodate 1, 2, 3 or 4 players. The slate top has no pockets, but instead, features nine different holes in the playing field, placed strategically in various spots. The ball return brings the balls back as long as the game is in action. However, a three minute time limit controls the length of time, and after the three minutes are up, a gate drops on the ball return preventing further play until another coin is inserted. A red light indicates game in play and turns off when time limit is reached.

"Score markers are used for score-keeping and each hole is numbered 100, 200, 300, etc., according to position of the opening in the play field. A wooden 'mushroom' sits in the center of the playfield, and acts as an obstacle which must be circumvented, or knocked over. This adds to the skill of the game. Six balls and a cue ball are used in playing the game.

"A large fluorescent light reflector is housed above the playing field and each hole in the table is lined with a colorful plastic liner which makes for a most attractive looking game. The phenolic resin balls are 2 1/8" in diameter, and weigh 5 1/4 ounces. Formica top rails, top quality cloth, a cue stick repair kit with cleaning brush and four 2-piece cue sticks make up the parts that go with each game," continued Kaye.

"Probably the most attractive feature of the game is the fact that it can be converted to a super jumbo bumper pool game in a short time, with our bumper slate top, that lists for \$79.95. This makes 'Cue-Ball' a solid 2-for-1 game attraction and should help move it to operators that much faster. Incidentally," concluded Kaye, "this game is licensed in New York City and is actually a novelty game, not a pool table."

Empire Coin's Joe Robbins quips that he went through all of the NAMA exhibits and almost died of thirst—he only drinks tea!! On



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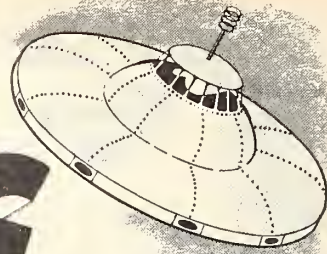

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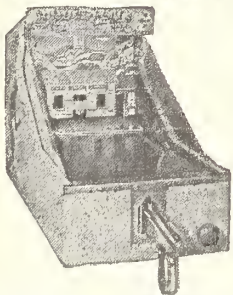
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Nebraska Music Ops Meet Dec. 5 and 6
