Photographic Memory

It's not just movies that get the Saturn treatment, you can build up your own photo CD library too. Up to 100 pics can be fitted onto just one CD. 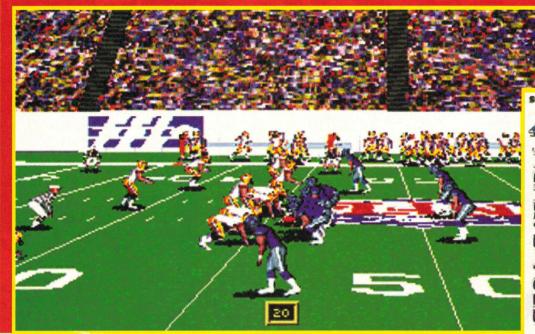

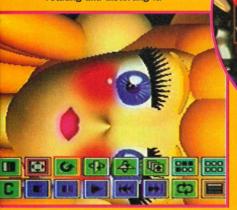

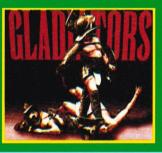




Pin-Ups

Considering the Jap fascination for all things with ball-bearing-shaped objects in them, it's not surprising that the nation that's home to Godzilla is also the home of some excellent new pinball games. *Digital Pinball* is a flip-'em-up based around wacky samurai movies while *Gladiators* isn't about Trojan, Jet and Wolf but REAL Gladiators with sharp swords and everything.









Pirates, tattoos, lost treasure and lots of babes - sounds like Mark Pilkington's kind of holiday. We sent him packing on Hudsonsoft's latest adventure with just an inflatable parrot for company...

here aren't many games on the Sega systems which cater for the older audience. Snatcher did a fine job when it was released about a year ago now. A strange blend of text and puzzles, it managed to combine Manga-style violence with more than a hint of naughty bits. Mr Twenty-Something Gamer was grinning from ear to ear for about a month - that was until he completed it. Now he doesn't have to go back to playing with hedgehogs as Cobra: The Space Adventure offers even more sexy smut of the blatantly nonsophisticated kind.

Using the same point and click interface as Snatcher, you follow the action by choosing from a number of on-screen options. These consist of standard RPG choices like Look, Search, Talk, Fight and Open. It's up to you to pick the right option at the right time. Cobra's not too complicated to play once you get the hang of it, and you should be able to get stuck into the adventure pretty quickly.

The game follows the exploits of a guy called Cobra as he battles to solve the mystery of some pirate's buried treasure. He discovers that the pirate fathered triplets who happen to be rather gorgeous young ladies. Being an odd sort of pirate, he tattooed his treasure map on their backs. Unfortunately, you can only find the true whereabouts of this treasure when you line all three daughters up at once, and they're all missing. Guess what you have to do!

Along the way you'll inevitably runs into loads of bar fights, boxing matches, high speed chases and, of course, women. All this is handled in the very worst possible taste and the programmers don't shirk from using naughty swear words either! It's a man's game, if only in that it's extremely sexist. You have been warned.



Regarded as the grand-daddy of all modern adventure games, Zork was a text-driven affair (the first one had no graphics!) although later Zork titles showed you nice piccies of the dank dungeons and slimy swamps that you had to trudge through.



Snatcher was the first Mega-CD game to be given an '18' certificate, and it's not really surprising when you consider just how violent and sexist it is! It's a great game though if you're not easily shocked by pixellated blood.

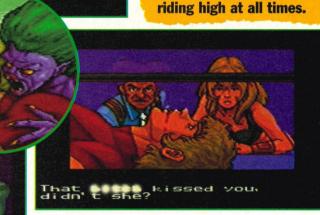

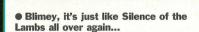

After working late to fix the Doc's computers Lance comes across the fiendish and evil plan for world domination by the evil brain Dr Neurosis, but before he can scream "HELP!", the Doc's evil sidekick, Fritz, is on the cover-up case with a cleaver. Before you can say "Christ! Lance is going to get his head smacked in with a cleaver!" a chase ensues taking in the Doc's mad castle and its grounds. These are packed with fiendish critters just dving for a light snack of computer repairman but our Lance must escape and save the world from Dr N's cruel dominion.

If that wasn't enough to make you go back to electronics school, you are being hunted down by the half-human thing that is Fritz, who's armed with all manner of pain-inducing implements. In the meantime, you're going to have to negotiate the tricks and traps that await you, while avoiding the attentions of that vampire femme fatale, Draculette. Will your mind survive the strain? Driving Lessons

The best way to take any corner is to go tight in and gain the ideal racing line. The rest of the field are just as fast as you – if not faster – so any advantage that you can gain on them is a bonus. It's important to get to know the turns and bends in the game, so practise the different tracks as much as you can.

On the really tight turns, you'll have to slow down quite early if you



hope to make it through without touching any obstacles. Never take a bend on the outside because you'll only end up on the grass. If you do this,

you'll more than likely end up hitting an obstacle. Then again, if you manage to drive around them, all the better.

A good start is essential. When the race is under way, keep to either side of the track, giving the rest of the field plenty of room until you reach top speed. This ensures you're not bashed at the start and don't lose speed as you accelerate away. Remember, power is nothing without control.

ollecting the stars is something which is a sure-fire way of winning races. The more stars that you collect, the faster your car will go. You will find the general handling of the car gets worse, but you shouldn't have too many problems with it.





1. Take as much time as possible to practise on each of the tracks. Keep on practising until you've perfected your driving skills and you know exactly when to turn and brake on the track. The better your knowledge of the circuit, the better your chances of finishing in a good position at the end of the race.



- 2. Control rather than flat-out speed will get you the fastest lap times. Keep a tight hold of the direction pad. Swerving around costs valuable seconds from your time, and more often than not this will count against you in the end result.
- 3. Continually refer to the track map at the top left corner of the screen in one-player mode. This will help you remember exactly where on the track the tight bends and chicanes are.
- 4. To avoid some of the more troublesome obstacles on the road, try slowing down when you start to swerve off the track. If you do go off the track, make sure that you drive around any obstacles that are coming towards you.
- 5. The amount of damage you take will affect your car's top speed and handling. You can repair your car by picking up the

Damage Repair Power-Ups that can be found lying on the tracks. Try to go out of your way to get these.

6. You can use your jumping ability to jump over other cars in front of you. A sneaky tactic if ever there was one. Also, use it when you land off the track, as it keeps your speed up.

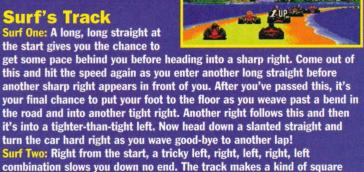

Suzulu's Track

Suzulu One: A bendy, twisty track if ever there was one. From the word go, head up into a curve going towards the left. Now hit the brakes and screech around to the right before taking a long-ish curve which heads up to a short straight. When you

reach here get ready for a hard bend to the right and then a steep curve to the left. Two tough right turns greet you next and they're followed by a turn to the left. A curve to the right follows that before heading out into a straight and then another right.

Suzulu Two: When the lights turn red, it's time to start heading left and up a slanted straight. Now turn left before heading into a slanted curve going up to the right. When you reach the end of this, turn sharply to the left and head down a long, long straight which is only broken by a chicane which heads into a turn to the left. A short straight leads

Lost Ark, but also the Sankra Stones and the Holy Grail. Staying very close to the films, you move from one adventure to the next, solving clues and outwitting the baddies.

US Gold's Indy's Greatest Adventures is essentially a platform game, but the 28 levels vary quite a bit. Some are side-scrolling, fairly standard collect and kill

romps but there are also vertical and forward scrolling sections. The forward scrolling ones are the most impressive, particularly when you are in the mine cart hurtling into the screen towards danger signs and knife-throwing natives.

Your journey will take you from dimly lit caves to dangerous back street alleys but, wherever you are, there are weapons, health points, extra lives and (of course) baddies to watch out for.

Film conversions are notoriously bad but because the Indy films are so adventure based, they're quite well suited to the platform genre.

Where the game falls down, is in the dodgy character animation. Indy doesn't react fast enough to oncoming danger and his movements are pretty restricted.

There are tons of film stills which explain where you have got to in each part of the adventure. These look impressive and are quite fun, but they don't really help remedy the game's shortcomings.

To be honest, it still has some of the problems from the old Master System Indy game, especially when vou come into contact with the baddies. It is almost impossible to get near them without being hit. This does of course mean that it's one heck of a challenge, so if

that's what you want, and you have a hankering to be a sweaty, go-get-'em sort of hero, you still might want to have a crack at this.

had my reservations even before picked up Ultimate Parodius . It's based on a very standard NES shoot-'em-up. Has it been spiced up enough to survive on the super console?

Well, yes and no. Have a quick glance at the screenshots and you can't fail to be impressed by the overall quality. Graphically, this is up to modern arcade machine standard. On the other hand, when you actually start to play the game, you're bound to be disappointed by the lack of scaling, rotating and general technical wizardry. The only hint of the true power of the Saturn is when you select your fighter on the options screen and you double your size after collecting a special power-up. And that's it. After that

it's all just straightforward dodging and shooting action.

In the game's favour, you can choose from plenty of loopy characters to control, and they certainly dredge a smile from your lips when you play them. This is also

one of those games where there's never a dull moment. In terms of things to kill and powerups to collect, there's no game like it on the Saturn. Then again, for a great deal less money (we're talking £70 here) there are plenty of superior blasters which you can pick up for the Mega Drive. That's why I have a problem with this.
