## **Talking It Over**

One very important event, which may have escaped the attention of the average busy coinman, is that of the telephone com-panies thruout the nation are appealing to their states as well as the Federal Govern-ment for installation of 10c coin boxes, in-stead of the present 5c boxes. This lends greater solidity to The Cash Box statements of some seven years now that the average coin operated machine should feature a 10c coin chute. The Cash Box brought this to the front for automatic music equipment as well as amusement ma-chines. The vending machine people had already arranged their equipment to accept the quarter and give change where and when necessary. All other businesses had, by one method or another, also changed to more coin. more coin.

when necessary. All other businesses had, by one method or another, also changed to more coin. The introduction of the large, standard size shuffleboards to the coin machine in-dustry, brought about the first chance for the average amusement op to obtain 10c play per man and, in some cases, even more. It was then found that The Cash Box statements were true. That 10c play was "the answer" to more profitable operation. From the shuffleboards came a new devel-opment for the smaller size location, the shuffle games, and these immediately adopted the 10c coin chute, for their cost as well as the unique play which they offered, forced such action. The result in this case is that a new industry has been born with the advent of the shuffle games and many are now of the belief that this will lead to an entirely new type of auto-matic amusement business. In the interim, the automatic music in-dustry did not remain static. It took up The Cash Box appeal to swing over to a better and more equitable commission basis. Many did change to 60%-40% and to The Cash Box commission basis of 70%-30%, as well as a front money service guar-antee. Television entering into locations forced many music ops to change to this more equitable commission set-up with the result that music has come thru the adjust-ment era with flying colors and is gradu-ally, regraining its status of leadership. Still the average juke box op is reluctant to swing over to 10c play. He has, instead, used every subterfuge he possibly could. Some have even offered the public 6 plays for 25c as an inducement to obtain more quarters. Others have piped music thru their juke boxes in an effort to obtain a weekly guarantee from the location. Still others have switched from one method of operation to another also with the intent and purpose of obtaining more assured in-come.

and purpose of obtaining more assured income.

Yet, the juke box industry hesitates to change to 10c coin chutes, even tho the amusement machines division has already made this change and found it profitable. Therefore, should the telephone companies prove successful in their appeal to FCC to change over to 10c public coin boxes, instead of the present 5c boxes, the automatic music industry will then have every reason to swing over to 10c play and better assure its future.

Regardless of the fact that the price of records has gone down to some extent, regardless of the fact that the so called nonbreakable disks have been introduced, and regardless also of the fact that these disks give longer and better wear, overhead has continued to increase and the juke box operator must battle for every nickel today to assure himself some sort of profit on his investment.

The answer for the juke box industry will, therefore, come about, just as it did in the amusement field, when the new equipment is offered to the public with 10c coin chutes as the telephone firms jump to this coin with Federal sanction.

In fact, "The Cash Box" was the very first publication in the country to bring forth the fact that the United States Mint should once again produce a 71/2c coin. Proving, in the editorial which "The Cash Box" printed, that such a coin would mean tremendous savings as well as better business for hundreds of industries all over the country.

But, knowing what a great length of time would elapse prior to the minting of a 71/2c coin, "The Cash Box" returned to the suggestion (and appeal) that the trade had better turn to 10c play.

This was very hotly contested by certain persons in the field.

Today, the Shuffles and Rebounds have proved that "The Cash Box" was right. These games are not only bringing in more money for operators everywhere in the nation as well as meeting approval of the American public by featuring 10c coin chutes but, surprisingly, waking up an entire industry to the fact that its unique and econ-omical entertainment is recognized as worth 10c.

Even the telephone companies thruout the country are now pre-senting arguments that they must get 10c. They cannot longer con-tinue on nickel pay telephones. "We must obtain 10c," they are tell-ing FCC, as well as state and city governmental agencies. This will surely come to pass. There is no other way out for this extremely important communications agency. They must obtain 10c to insure their profitable continuance. And these firms are among the largest and most important in the nation. The same has already happened in other fields. Long ago the

The same has already happened in other fields. Long ago the tavern owners, restaurateurs, and others, changed from 5c to 10c. Even candy bars, shoe shines, and other daily necessities swung over to the dime.

This was pointed out each time by "The Cash Box". It was urged on the coin machine industry where it met with foul looks and harsher statements from a few in the field. It even caused certain forces to come forth with items refuting the statements which "The Cash Box" had made. Even tho "The Cash Box" statements were backed by FACTOR FACTS.

Now, at long last, the industry has come to the point where it realizes that the 10c coin chute is the answer to profits. At least a normal return on the huge investments being made in coin operated machines.

Whatever the game which will result from the combination of the five-ball and the shuffle and rebound, this game will, to insure its success, appear with a 10c coin chute. Only because, everywhere in the nation, operators now agree that the dime is the "logical coin." The nickel is today the penny of yesterday. What with increased overhead, increased cost of machines, increased cost of operation, the 5c coin can no longer present a profit margin to the operator. He must obtain at least 10c per play. The dime is the difference be-tween profit and loss.

Tho "The Cash Box" has been singing this tune for over seven years, it now, triumphantly, sings it again. The dime is today the logical coin for play on any type of amusement and entertainment product in this industry.

The field cannot survive on pennies. And the nickel is the penny of yesterday. The increased cost of equipment alone answers the question.

question. Not to speak of the tremendously increased operating overhead, cost of supplies and parts, and other costs and taxes which have come about since the pre-war era. Also the further fact that, with labor demanding more and still more money, even these costs will continue to increase as time goes on; as pensions are voted; as employees re-ceive three weeks vacation with pay; and as other benefits come into being on a bigger, more socialistic scale than any business man in this nation ever imagined would happen. This industry is most definitely tied in with the retail business of America. The 2,500,000 retail locations are today, to a great ex-tent, dependent on profits from their coin operated equipment. They no longer can disregard this factor. They must work with this industry. They must live with it today because it is a very definite part of their business. Therefore, it is time to give sincere thanks that the coin operated

Therefore, it is time to give sincere thanks that the coin operated business has swung over to a better profit factor for its investors who are today obtaining a 10c coin where, formerly, they gave the same service for 5c and suffered tremendously. Even to a point where the industry seemed destined for destitution instead of destined for the greatness which is its due.



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



## "All The Way Choo-Choo" (2:55) "University of North Carolina Medley" (2:50) JOHNNY LONG ORCH. (King 15030)



ROCHESTER, N. Y.—In a prece-dent-making decision, The Public Service Commission in Albany, the state's capital, authorized the Roches-ter Telephone Corporation, this city, to charge 10c for local coin box tele-phones. It is the first increase in telephone coin box rates authorized by the commission since 1907.

Forerunner For Rest Of N. Y. State

It is authoritatively believed that this decision is a forerunner to similar rulings for coin box charges in New York and other areas served by the New York Telephone Company. In a recent decision regarding New York the commission indicated that the existing five cent rate was unfair.

The change cannot become effective at once, but has to await the acquisition and installation of new equipment.

Usually the week between Christmas and New Year's is the deadest of the year on coinrow. Not this year, however. And all credit is due the shuffle bowler type games. Every element in the business is begging for more equipment—operators are visiting all the jobbing and distributing firms on the row, using all their wiles to cajole a few pieces—jobbers and distributors are pressing regional representatives for deliveries—and distributors and regional representatives are phoning their Chicago factories for added quantities and quicker deliveries. It all seems to add up to a profitable 1950 for all in the trade. And in addition to the activity in the games division, strangely enough for this time of the year, reconditioned music machines are moving.

First deliveries of Scientific Machine Corporation's "Jungle Joe" arrive at Mike Munves, and makes an immediate hit with ops who get a look-see. Munves is the eastern regional representative for Scientific, covering the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New York and New Jersey. "Jungle Joe" is a ray pistol machine with a moving target in the midst of a highly colorful backboard which is hung up on the wall of the location. All space problems of any type of location are solved, as the pistol attached to a cable can be operated from any distance away from the target as is feasible. Munves is receiving complete production from the initial test run by Scientific at this time, and Max Levine, president of the manufacturing firm states a full announcement will be made to the trade in a very short while.

Ben Becker, regional representative for Bally Manufacturing Company, home with his family for the holidays. The psychology of the machine playing public is a serious study, which can be used to the advantage of the coin trade. And Leon Minogue, operator from Long Branch, N. J., is one member of the industry who never misses an opportunity to apply it to his gain. Operating both an arcade and individual spots, Leon, varies his strategy. "People playing games in the arcade like noise" states Leon. "Every machine I had there, either had a loud bell or clapper, and if it didn't originally, I inserted one. When consoles were permissable, I had a string of machines along side of each other, and every one had some gimmick noise maker but each one different. The players inserting their nickels would be aware at all times of someone hitting a winner. One time we bought a ray gun and I noticed it wasn't getting any play. I picked up a auto drum brake and fixed a hammer to strike it whenever a bullseye was made. It sounded like a fire alarm and could be heard half a mile away. But it did stimulate play to the extent that the cash box overflowed before we could make our first collection."






