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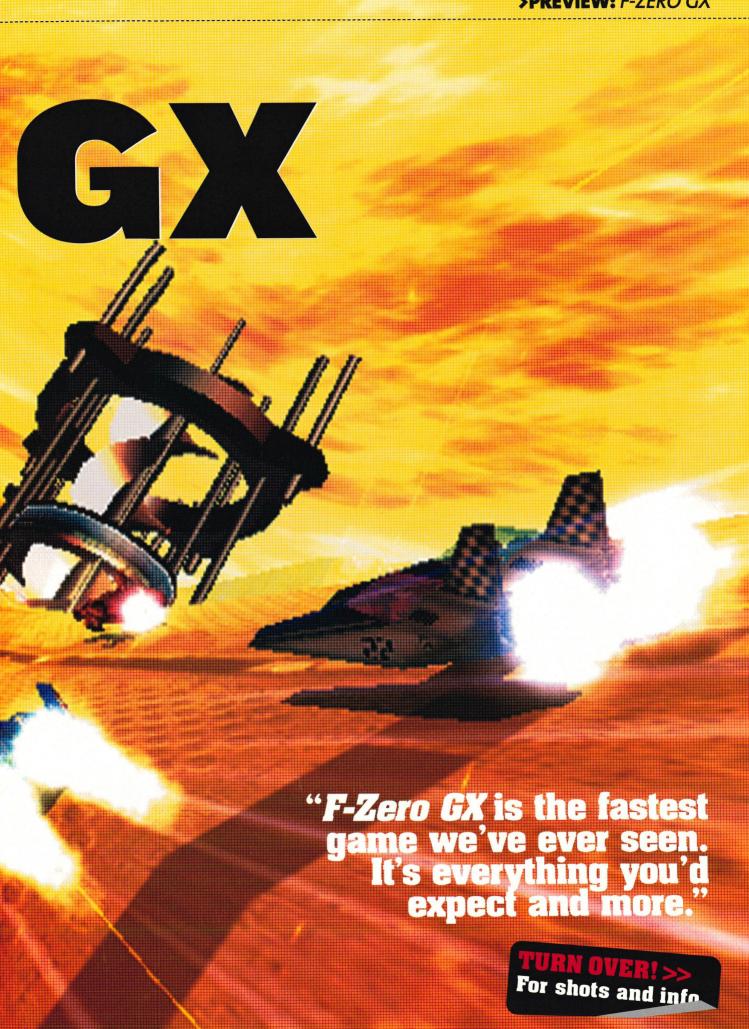
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There are more than 30 playable ships to race in F-Zero GX, but you'll only have a choice of four at the start. To get the rest you'll have to unlock 'em. Soz! The first time out on the track you'll be blown away

by the game's speed, but once you're used to the pace it's time to think about what type of ship best suits the tracks you're racing on. Let NOM UK guide you through the initial choices, but which one will you choose?



Weight: 1,960kg

If you're an aggressive racer, you'll
love its solid body – not even the
Wild Goose can survive a hit. You'll
need crazy racing skills to make up
for its weak boost power, though.

Captain Falcon's ship is a solid choice on any course. The handling is tight so it's best to practise in this ship and move on to others once you can handle its supersonic speeds.

Body: D Boost: A Grip: D Weight: 1,420kg

Reasonably heavy and fast, you can fire its boost jets and leave the pack to eat your fumes. However, with only a D grade for grip, you could end up eating wall on thin tracks.



Its twitchy handling makes it tough to steer around bends without hitting walls and demands practise. Tame this and you'll be unstoppable, with great boost, body and weight.



20 reasons why the new tracks rock!



THE 1,700KPH LAP Vegas Palace, Ruby Cup

The first Vegas Palace track in the game is the fastest. It folds around in a huge oval and you won't have to turn your ship much at all. It's also littered with boosts and a long recharge lane, meaning you can boost through an entire lap no problem.



TWO TWISTING LOOPS Lightning, Ruby Cup

Chessington? Boring. Alton Towers? Child's play. These are the biggest loops you've ever seen. A boost before the first sends you rocketing to 1,400kph, then, after a corkscrew, you're sent spinning around the second that passes through the first.



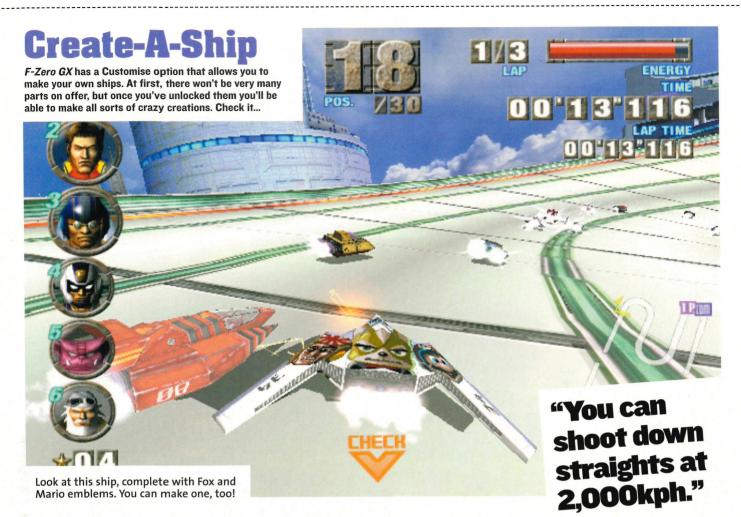
HEART-STOPPING HUMPS Fire Field, Diamond Cup

If you can't stand the heat, don't even bother attempting this Fire Field track. The straights consist of a series of massive humps that throw you into the air, leaving your guts down on the track. What's more, there are no barriers. Feel the burn!



HOLOGRAM TRACK Phantom Road, Diamond Cup

This sensational course looks awesome because the whole track is made from a multicoloured holographic surface. It looks a hundred times better than Rainbow Road. The feeling of speed here is absolutely intense.





The first thing you need to do is sort out the body. You can customise it in three sections, top, middle and bottom. You'll also have to consider if you want a light or heavy ship.



Now it's time to get a little paint. To make your colours, you need to alter the red, green and blue levels. A little awkward maybe, but better than a limited pre-set colour pallet.



Now for the final touches – the transfers. You can either make your own in the Icon Editor or use the awesome Nintendo icons, like AiAi, Mario, Slippy and Kirby.



SUICIDAL DROPS Aeropolis, Diamond Cup

This has three of the game's biggest drops and we're sure you'll wet yourself as the track disappears from underneath you, leaving you to fall hundreds of feet, three times in a row. With 29 other racers all around you, it's breathtaking.



KILLER TURNS Aeropolis, Diamond Cup

You know when a roller coaster speeds into a turn that's so harsh you feel your eyes falling out? That's what these are like. Just think about hitting a boost going into a bend that then curves up, turning sharply at the same time. It's sweet!



TRACK SPLITTING MADNESS
Cosmo Terminal, Diamond Cup
This track is mental splitting

This track is mental, splitting into three thin sections that twist and wind around each other. With no barriers, racers scramble to get on a path as the track divides. Forget winning, you'll struggle to make it around three laps without falling off!



BROKEN STRAIGHTS OF DEATH Sand Ocean, Diamond Cup You'll need the reactions of a

You'll need the reactions of a super ninja to get around as huge sections of the straights are broken in half. You'll have to dodge left and right to avoid falling to your doom. There are signs to help, but we'll see how useful they are at 1,500kph.

This is like a training mission. Captain Falcon blasts off in his ship and activates a virtual reality computer. You're placed on a simple oval course and have to collect every gold orb on three laps within 80 seconds.

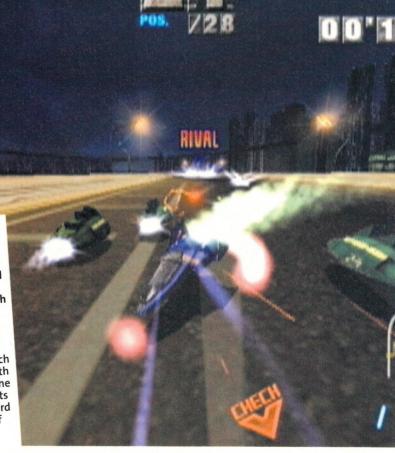
Once upon a time

The biggest new feature of *F-Zero GX* is the Story mode. Here you'll follow Captain Falcon as he faces a series of different challenges and scenarios in the world of *F-Zero*, on and even off the track. Each at steel together brilliantly with luscious-looking FMV cutscenes that show you how the scenarios unfold. It's brilliant stuff, with the only downfall being that Captain Falcon is such a camp, spandex-wearing freak.

To progress through the Story mode, you'll have to purchase each chapter using points that you earn. At first, you'll be rewarded with enough points to unlock the next chapter simply by completing the previous one. But as you go further you'll have to earn extra points from the Grand Prix and Time Attack modes, allowing you to afford the next chapter in the sequence. You'll have your work cut out if you want to finish this game, so here's a taste of the first six

missions we played...





PAD-BREAKING CHICANES Big Blue, Emerald Cup

Moving at supersonic speeds around bends is a tricky business, but when you've got to speed through four right-angled turns in five seconds you should worry. Once you get the hang of blasting through these turns, you'll feel a king.



CHOICE OF ROUTE Big Blue, Emerald Cup

This course gives you a fraction of a second to choose your preferred route. Heading right sends you blasting to a straight, skipping the twisty bends to the left. You'll be amazed as you take off and come crashing onto the crowded track below.



BOTTLENECK BATTLING Big Blue, Emerald Cup

With 30 racers on the track, it's always intense, but when the track's width is suddenly reduced to just a few feet, you can only imagine the mayhem. It's truly insane as you and 29 others plough into a narrow space, crashing as you go.



BANKED CURVES Desert Ocean, Ruby Cup

This desert track features two insane turns that are banked down the middle of the track and the turn is blind, too. With an uneven surface, only a few feet of vision and loads of other victory-hungry racers, these turns will make or break you.

Chip off the old block

The F-Zero series has come a long way since F-Zero X on the N64: better graphics, a new Story mode, a ship editor and much more. However, you'll be surprised just how much of the new racer has been ripped straight from its N64 counterpart.

The Grand Prix, Time Attack and Practice modes are all in F-Zero GX, but these modes are typical to most racers. More surprisingly, all of the ships and pilots we've seen so far are the same as the old game although some of the awesome areas are made-over versions of past F-Zero games, including Mute City, Sand Ocean and Fire Field (see p16).

The only option that hasn't made the cut is Death Attack where 30 racers charged around an oval course using spin attacks to become the last man standing.



This is the Ship Selection screen from F-Zero X. If you're familiar with this, you will instantly recognise the ships in F-Zero GX.



Death Attack mode was great fun when you fancied a break from supersonic racing, but it's no child's game. One smash and you're sailing into oblivion.



THE VERTICAL HAIRPIN TURN Aeropolis, Ruby Cup

This turn defies all the laws of physics. Performing a full 180° arc in F-Zero GX is hair raising in any circumstances, but on this track, you'll have to do it at a vertical angle. Words cannot explain how awesome this is, just look at the screenshot!



EXPLOSIVE JUMP-BARS Aeropolis, Ruby Cup

If you've played any previous *F-Zero* games, you'll remember the yellow bars on the tracks that blast you into the air. In *F-Zero GX*, their up-thrust is even more powerful, as you'll witness on this course. You can leap the full length of this straight!



INNER-TUBE RACING Port Town, Sapphire Cup

Here you'll have to race on the inside of a giant tube – the anti-gravity ships in *F-Zero GX* can race upside down. To spice things up even more, pipes stretch across the inside of the tube, which you have to dodge. Just watch your head that's all!



OUTER-TUBE RACING Fire Field, Emerald Cup

If you think the inner-tube racing is impressive, this will make you gasp in amazement as you shoot down the outside of this huge twisting tube, burning around it to hit the boosts and stay on the inside of the bends. This will make your brain burn!

As most of you will already know, we westerners often miss out on many games and peripherals that are only released in Japan, like the Mana Blue GBA SP, or the awesome Winning Eleven 6: Final Evolution.

F-Zero GX players in Japan will be able to transfer ships only available in the GameCube version to the arcade version, or take new ships out of the arcade to race at home. They'll also be able to upload custom-made ships to the arcade game, or bring home new ship parts.

This sounds awesome, but don't get excited because this feature won't be included on the few cabinets that make it over here. But if rumours on the internet are to be believed the arcade game is unlockable later in *F-Zero GX*. You've just got to be a demon at playing the game to get 'em.



Burning onto UK GameCubes in October, F-Zero GX won't have connectivity to an arcade version. But who cares? They might just be unlockable!



49,000 points to spend! Well, don't just stand there, get Megalo some decent racing threads. At 2,000kph that wind is sure gonna kill!

It's all about the GameCube difference

Have you ever played an old game that you used to adore, only to realise that it doesn't look nearly as good as you remember?

F-Zero X wasn't a bad looking game, but once you've seen how amazing F-Zero GX looks on screen it'll put the fog infested visuals of its older brother to shame.
Thankfully there are no such popup issues with the GameCube F-Zero, just some of the most impressive worlds you'll ever see and it still shifts at lightning speed.

Mute City



Mute City was not much like a city at all. The flat, 2D scrolling background shows a few buildings, but that hardly creates the illusion of a sprawling metropolis. Maybe the city is hidden somewhere in all that purple fog.



On GameCube, gigantic buildings tower over the course. Look a bit closer and you'll see loads of holograms with adverts and other messages scrolling along the scenery. Whether you'll have time to read them is another matter.

Sand Ocean



Again, the only scenery here is a smattering of 2D mountains in the background. The yellow fog could be passed off as a sand storm, but apart from a few banners on the trackside, there's nothing much else to see.



Huge whirling tornadoes whip up the sand as the scorching sun causes a heat haze. You'll pass large Egyptian sculptures and see fish flying through the sky, almost as though this track is underwater. Bizarre, but awesome.



HAZARDOUS HALF-PIPES Lightning, Emerald Cup

This is similar to the inner-pipe races, but if you're not careful you'll be thrown off the course on a tight bend. With a well-placed spin attack, you can destroy a few unsuspecting racers. Winning is all that matters, so fight dirty.



DROP OF JUSTICE Mute City, Sapphire Cup

There are many drops into the unknown, but this is the most unexpected because it's right at the start, off a right-angled turn. We crapped ourselves when, after squeezing around the sharp bend, we were suddenly freefalling through the air. Arrrrrgh!



SLIPPERY ICE Aeropolis, Diamond Cup

This track may look a piece of piss, but that shiny surface will make your ship handle like a duck skidding on ice. You'll be doing the most awesome power slides to get around these bends as you try to hold on and finish in first place.



LETHAL LASERS Lightning, Emerald Cup

This is nearly impossible to survive, being a half-pipe with no barriers. To make things worse, red lasers zap your health away, causing you to explode if your shields are too low. Avoid them and you'll be able to fly on to the finish.

Big Blue



The Big Blue world on the N64 was represented by a wide-open sea under the track. Those must be the calmest waters we've ever seen - not a ripple in sight. You'd have more chance seeing the Loch Ness monster than a wave.



On GameCube, the Big Blue course winds around a city with huge white buildings like something from Coruscant. There are even waterfalls surrounding some sections and glass pipes that take you under the water.

Fire Field



The track surface has a little more texture on this course and you can clearly make out the golden lava below. There's also a huge jump on this track that'll shoot you up through the low-level clouds floating above.



This will blow you away. The lava returns, but now it glows with intense heat and flames shoot everywhere. Just check out that metal architecture! Words cannot describe how sweet this looks. You must see it for yourself.

Port Town



Port Town looks just like Mute City, only it's orange instead of purple and the sprites in the background look like futuristic industrial sites. Sort of. The jump between two 3D towers is as spectacular as it gets here.



In F-Zero GX, you'll race around an amazing looking space port, with enormous floating ships passing by incredibly detailed buildings. And if you're quick enough you'll also catch a glimpse of ROB the Robot.

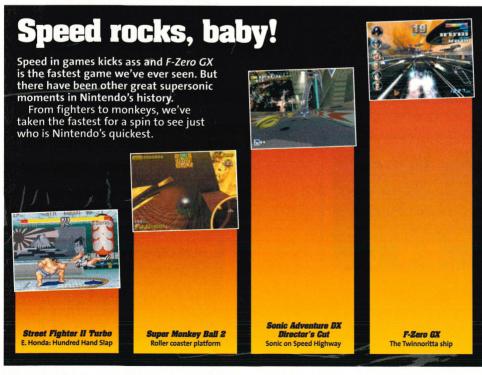

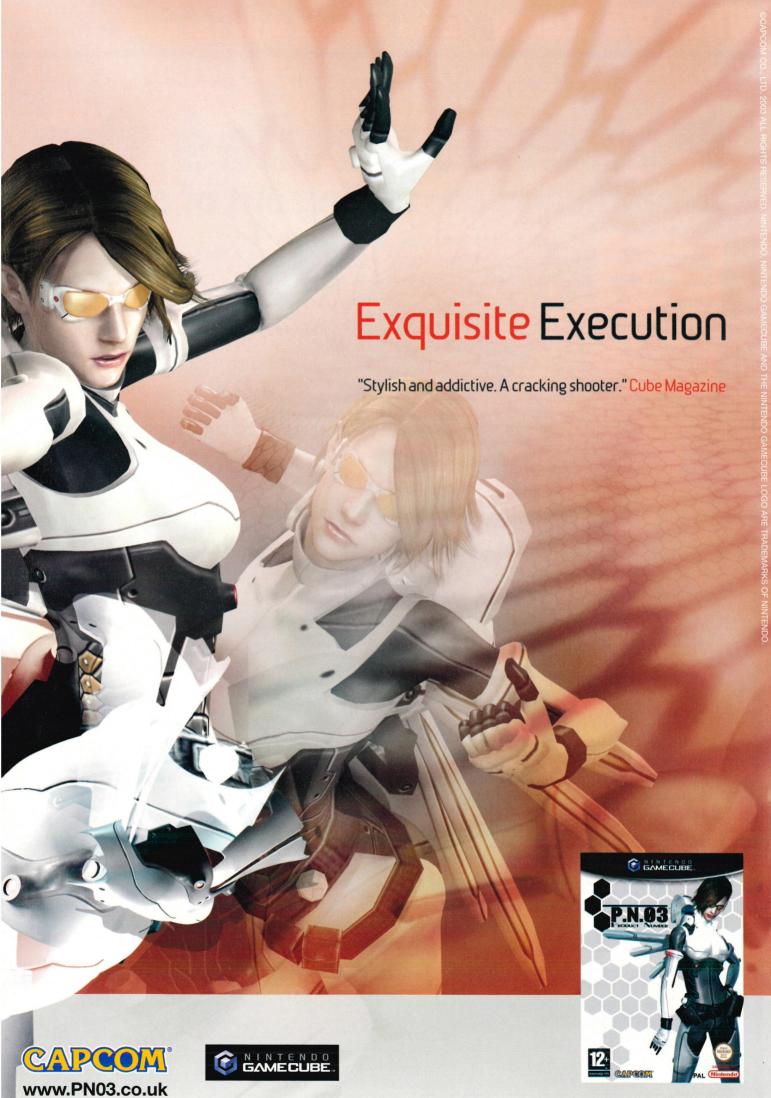

Japan remains the capital of Poké mania, with a massive 4,000,000 games sold in the first month and a half on sale. That came as little surprise to Nintendo, as the signs were good before the launch. The 2002 Pokémon Festa event at the Tokyo Pokémon Centre drew record crowds of 90,000 eager Pokémaniacs. ■ Just so you're in no doubt where the hedgehog's new nest is, another exclusive Sonic game is on its way to GameCube. It's not Sonic Heroes, but an all new outing. There are no facts other than this.

NO SAMUS MOVIE

■ Zide/Perrt Entertainment, the 'brains' behind American Pie and Final Destination, have announced that their license to produce a Metroid movie has expired. They had previously asked fans via a website who to cast in the lead role, with Cameron Diaz one of the names suggested early on.

GAME BOY DOES MILLIONS

■ You might think you're clever for owning a Game Boy Advance. Yes, you and the other two million people in the UK that have one. That's the latest GBA sales milestone, with 6.5 million machines sold in Europe in total as well as 22 million games. Hardcore.

SCREEN DREAMS

■ Nintendo are already out hunting for the screen for the machine that will succeed the GBA. Hardware engineer Tsuyoshi Kiyuna acknowledged the need for a "dust free" screen, and talked up a new power efficient technology called 'organic electro-luminescence'. The upshot? A bigger and brighter screen than the current GBA.

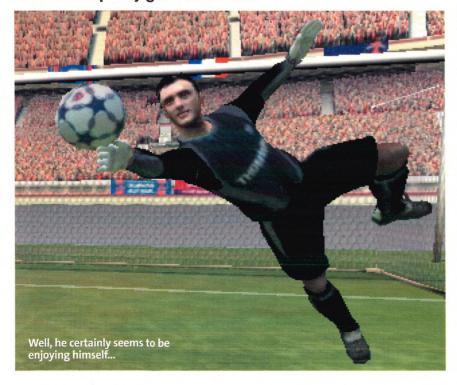

What Nintendo game are you most looking forward to?

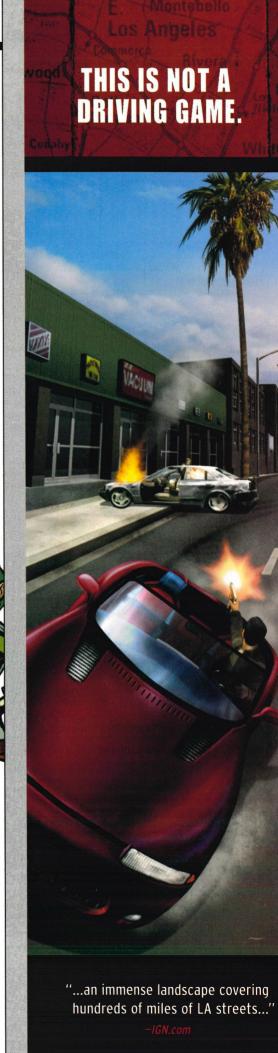

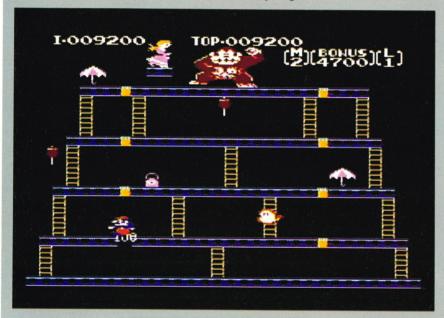
New old world record set!

All that muddy water surrounding Rare's **GBA** projects is starting to clear... slightly.

Rare. Remember those guys? Formerly Nintendo's best buddies in the UK, the company is now sheltering under the giant scaly wings of the

Microsoft corporation. Well, they had a fistful of

GBA games on the go before the buyout and it looks like these will see the light of day very soon.

Álthough it was kept very quiet, Rare did the coding work on the recent GBA remake of Donkey Kong Country. 'We did convert it', a Rare spokesman confirmed, 'but all of the other PR for the game we left up to Nintendo. They've always been good at pushing the games'.

It seems that Game Boy Advance development has continued, despite the change of owners, with Rare also mentioning that they had GBA games completed and ready to roll.

'The games will be released as soon as the new publishing deal is finalised', said Rare. Grunty's Revenge is thought to be ready to go, but Diddy Kong Pilot might undergo a change of name: Microsoft has registered the name Banjo Pilot and it would certainly make sense if

they swapped in a character set they owned (Banjo-Kazooié) for one they didn't (Donkey Kong). We expect to have the full

details of the new arrangements soon, but at least Rare are keeping busy. Hopefully that DKC port isn't a sign of the quality. because that was a bit crap.

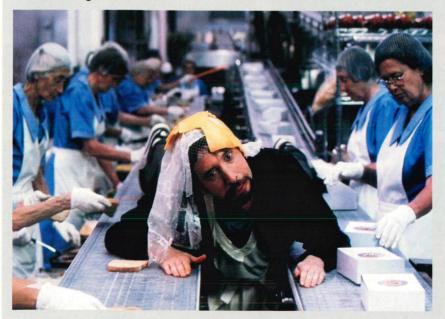

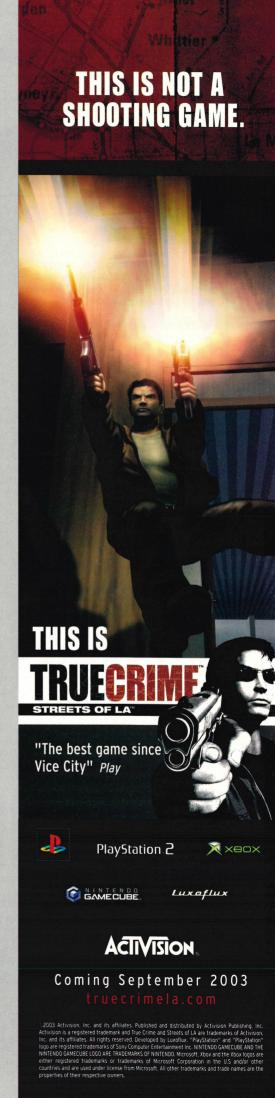

Slap it into your Game Boy Advance. It fits into an SP, too, but there's some unsightly through-port overlap.



Hold the card so the picture side is facing up and pass the card through the slot. Not too quickly though.

Scan multiple cards in any order you like. Remember, some cards have data on the top and bottom edges.



And that's it! The game is now stored on the reader for instant access and it stays until you swipe in a new one.

You want it, but you can't have it. For now, at least. This sleek Super NES-styled digital pad makes Game Boy Player action feel even better for our Japanese friends, but there's no

It clips the GBA SP onto your body so you can carry it. Despite the fact that the only pockets in the world small enough to not hold a GBA are those watch pockets on jeans. Make sure you clip it in the right way round or the GBA will fall out.

POWERDOCK SP. £14.99

It looks like a clear plastic toy bus, but its actual purpose is even more pointless. Instead of using the recharge cable that came FREE with your SP, you can buy this

cumbersome device and charge your machine by plugging the SP into it.



HOW TO... CLEAN A GAMECUBE DISC

ave you ever wondered what Kirby is made of? Does he have any internal organs? How does he hear or smell? Can he take a dump without a butt hole? In the main mode, currently known as Air Ride, you whizz around eight weird and wonderful tracks, ranging from the icy slopes of Colda with floating whales in the sky, to the lavafilled caverns of Magheat. But this is no Mario Kart clone as there are no cup or tournament events. You just choose your track and race. Weapons and power-ups are yours by sucking up enemies that are wandering around the track and stealing their powers instead of grabbing an item box. Some of the cooler power-ups allow you to slice other racers with a Link Sword, zap them with electricity and even turn into a tyre to get more speed.

There are two other modes, Top-Ride and City Trial. Top-Ride is an overhead

ow do you improve the best golf game on GameCube? How about you add some more top golfers. Okay, that's a start. Then throw in new courses, let's say seven, and refine the Create-a-Golfer options so you can make a player in your own image. Then just tweak the controls a bit, throw in some new shots, sprinkle with a graphical update and you'll be somewhere near finished. Hang on, that's just what EA's done with Tiger Woods PGA Tour 2004.

The first thing we noticed about this game is how 'last year' it all looked. The intro movie is identical, but that's because it's lifted from Tiger Woods 2003 for this preview version. The menus are also very similar to the last outing and the tutorial takes place on the same hole as before, with the same commentator offering the same instructions. It's early code, but, on first inspection it's all alarmingly familiar.

We weren't put off, though, and started by creating a NOM pro golfer, so we headed into the Create-a-Golfer option. Wow! The amount of customisation is truly staggering. Everything from foot size, to jaw shape and nose length can be determined with a few flicks of the 3D Stick. With a bit of patience we're confident you could create a golfer that looked as close to your ugly mug as a Nintendo game is going to get.

Selecting the Play Now option we were taken out onto the course, but first we needed to get a few pointers from the cover star, so it's out onto the practice hole with Tiger to learn how to play. The same swing controls apply, with the 3D Stick being used to alter the amount of power you require. Smooth movement of the Stick from back to front must be used or you'll hook or slice the shot and end up in a hazard.

A new chip shot has been introduced to allow you to pop the ball up onto the green when required, but generally the controls are just as smooth.

But if all of the controls have remained the same and the golfers are just, well, golfers what can possibly be done to make the game more fun? Depth is the way to go. You can now select to take part in a full 52-week PGA Tour, and we're not talking one year either – you can play up to ten years on the tour circuit. You can also enter the World Tour mode and play golf around

the globe, unlocking new golfers and equipment. More of everything is always a good thing, especially as EA haven't tampered with the basic controls

If we're honest, only Tiger Woods 2003 fans will notice the subtle changes, but as far as the standard EA upgrades go this is just what aficionados want. There's no getting away from the fact that Tiger 2003 was simply great and this is purely an extension of that greatness. Is it worth another forty quid? That's your decision, but based on this evidence it's certainly going to be worth considering.

So how does this actually work? Well, data from your *Pokémon* cart is transfered onto the GameCube via the Link Cable and then you've got two choices: check out the organiser or play *Pokémon* in style on your TV.

The organiser's features are the perfect companion for any *Pokémon* fanatic. You can store 1,500 creatures in the system and customise their storage boxes with different backgrounds. You can then access their Pokédex info and view all of the stats and their condition. It also allows you to sort

Pokémon into groups so you can shuffle your creatures into types, specific teams, your favourites, rare creatures and so on. You'll then be able to view your Pokémon in 2D.

For true *Pokémon* fans there's even the ability to play *Ruby* or *Sapphire* through your TV without shelling out for a Game Boy Player. Best of all, though you can transfer the data from the GBA and then turn it off while you wander around Hoenn. You'll just need to save the data back to the cart before you switch off, otherwise you'll go ballistic and smash your GameCube into about a trillion pieces.

To say that Pokémon Memory Magic will have limited appeal is a massive understatement, this title is niche in the extreme. It's hardly pushing the GameCube to its limits, but then it's not meant for this. It's just an extra tool for those wanting to get everything out of their Pokémon Adventures. And, as you can play Pokémon Ruby or Sapphire on the big screen it should be a lot cheaper than shelling out for a Game Boy Player. Roll on October, we say.

oday speed freaks get all excited at the thought of a Skyline going from 0-60 in three and a half seconds. Pah, that's child's play. Say that to someone in the year 2025 and they'll laugh in your face, hop on their XGRA bike and fart all over the Skyline.

Forget all the laws of physics. None of them apply in the insane world you'll witness in XGRA. The tracks are bigger, longer, wider and faster than you could dream of. Then, there's the bunch of nutters who strap themselves into suicidal jet-propelled bikes and rip around at break-neck speeds. Sound good? We want some of that action.

We last saw XGRA back in NOM 128, and brought you details on the new career mode, which is looking every bit as good as those in F1 Career Challenge and V-Rally 3, if not better.

Everyone may be looking forward to F-Zero GX, but XGRA isn't going down without a fight. Even if it's not as fast, XGRA is not to be overlooked, with some truly amazing courses. Each one has adrenaline-pumping loops, hairpins, drops and turns that will leave your guts 300 yards behind if you enter them at full-speed after just having gone over four speed boosts. No matter how many times we race, it's always exciting stuff.

There are points on many of the courses where the road rises, then shoots sharply down again. When you bomb up these hills, we expected the









bikes to fly off the top just like F-Zero, but instead they seem to stick to the track like glue. With that amount of speed, it would be great to take off once in a while.

Each of the supersonic bikes have side-mounted weaponry and front-mounted machine guns something F-Zero's never had. You can shoot the machine guns whenever you like, at the expense of an energy bar that will drain as you fire. You'll have to stop shooting when this bar gets too low, though and allow it to regenerate.

But the real destruction comes in when you grab a weapon power-up. These pick-ups float just above the course Mario Kart-style and when you drive through one, the icons at the top of the screen will show the weapon you've acquired. The arsenal ranges from energy-draining beams to lasers and explosive missiles and you'll grin with satisfaction when you nail an opponent with a missile to the rear wheel and watch them explode in a ball of

flames - and all at 200mph.

But you'll need to shoot your weapons like Han Solo if you want to get the better of the competition because Acclaim have vastly improved the A.I. of the computer-controlled racers over the last game. Before, the tracks were sparse, with hardly any competitive racing at all. This time the other bikers swarm around you like angry bees, pounding you with weapons and blasting through chicanes like Schumacher. With this much competition, you'll be racing with a frown on your face in sheer determination to win a race.



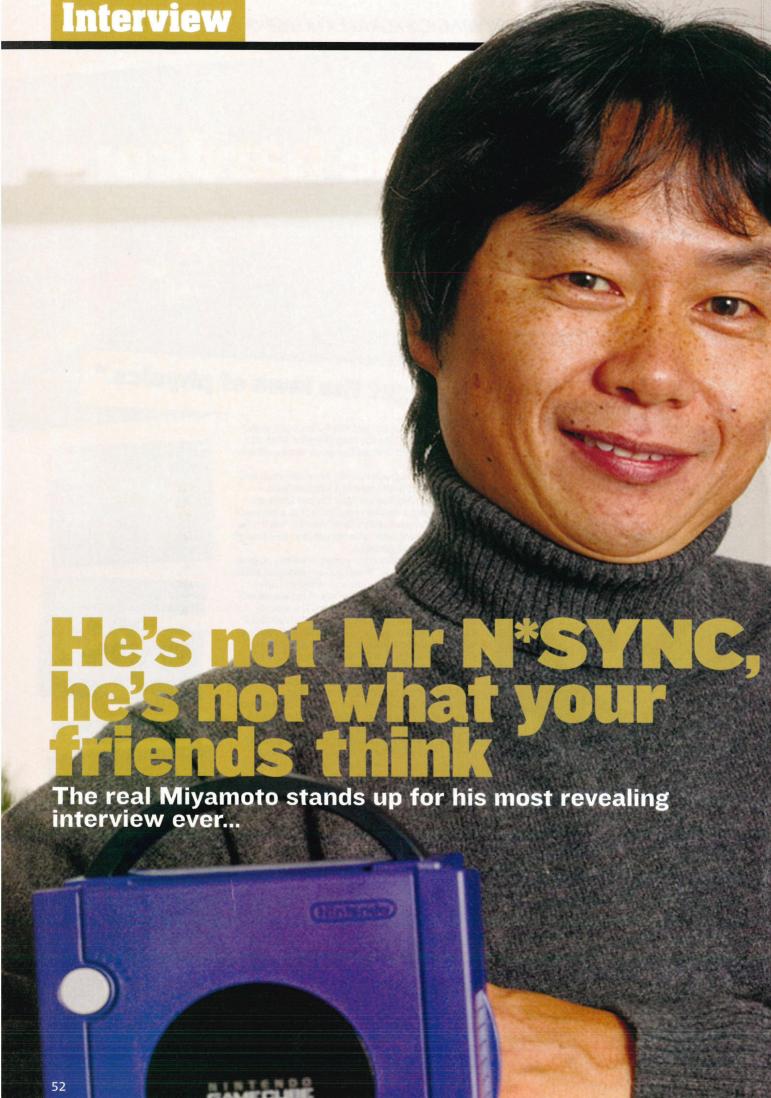

sually when you interview Shigeru Miyamoto, he doesn't let a lot slip. He's been briefed by Nintendo on what to say, and sanitised by the interpreter relaying the words to you. We decided to see what would happen if Miyamoto was allowed to speak his mind free from these constraints, by sneaking a translator into a lecture the great man gave at Tokyo University.

The result? Probably the most revealing Miyamoto interview you will ever read. Think you know the man behind Mario? Think again...

The classroom, which can hold around 200 people, filled up almost instantly. By the time we entered the room, Mr. Miyamoto was already sitting in a chair next to the blackboard. Of course, the lecture was conducted entirely in Japanese, so you'll just have to trust us with the translation. Off we go then...

Q: When I think of Nintendo, I get the impression that they usually don't allow much media exposure to the process of how games get made.

Shigeru Miyamoto, Nintendo: That's because it's not something you can see progressing as you watch. There're some desks, and there are lots of Choco-Egg figures [the Japanese equivalent of Kinder Surprise eggs], and there're also some hardcore model kits here and there... that's basically it. We expanded the size of the desks a while back, but the extra space ended up turning into a receptacle for more Choco-Egg figures.

Q: Speaking of which, what role do you play in development? SM: I'm a board member. There was this shareholders' conference a little while back, and I was scared I'd have to go up and say something... but in all seriousness, I don't think there are any strict definitions for "What is a director? What is a project document?" in this business.

I joined Nintendo as a designer and I made a few different games, but I guess it was around 1979 that the *Space Invaders* boom hit, and when I made a *Galaxian*-ish game we ended up with lots of unsold games in America. The game I made with all those extra boards was *Donkey Kong*, and I drew all the dot graphics for it. I talked with a few people from outside the company, but these other technicians—there were only two of us at Nintendo back then, including me—they were, like, "What can this long-haired student do? Who is this guy?"

Q: So you showed them?

SM: At that time, one person could take care of every part of the game and he was called a designer. There weren't any "designers" like there are today, so I had to do all the graphic-design and

game-direction work by myself.

Overall it took six or seven people to make the *Donkey Kong* game and hardware, and there were about six people on the Famicom too, I think. Once we all got a little bolder and hired on apprentice-type people, around the time of the original *Super Mario Bros.*, I could just bring out the initial design and leave the rest to the apprentices. That ended up being the best way of all to make games. So by that time I was a director.

Q: So by this point you were calling the shots? They weren't berating you as a long-hair anymore?

SM: After the Famicom's launch, the Disk System was completed in 1985, and I started work on Mario and Zelda sequels at the same time. I was the director on both projects and I really thought I was going to die. At the time, of course, Nintendo wanted to make games that were gentle on young children's eyes, so all of the backgrounds were always black. However, with things getting prettier all around the industry, we made the background sky-blue on Mario and increased the size of the characters.

You could save games onto the disk, too... before then I had to write down these long *Dragon Quest* passwords [the first game did not have battery back-up RAM]. I thought that was a pretty decent workaround, but fortunately you could save your game in *Zelda* instead of having to type this in. Eventually, though, the head office said to me "Just pick one and do it!", so I ended up wrapping up *Mario* [2] in three months and went straight into *Zelda* after that.

Q: So why did you begin calling yourself a producer?

SM: Once we finished Mario and Zelda, the next thing I wanted to do was sequels. I thought Zelda could turn into a new and different game if the game system was more fun and we could switch between maps and things, so... I had people under me do Mario 3 and The Adventure of Link, so I figured, hey I'm a producer now

between maps and things, so... I had people under me do Mario 3 and The Adventure of Link, so I figured, hey, I'm a producer now.

These days, a typical game takes about 20 or 30 main people and then another 20 or so support guys to create. People say that it takes three years to complete the software, but really, if you have 30 people and eight months, you can make the software. Zelda, though, takes more like a year. So what do we do with the other two years? Well, first there're five of us who build the basic concept and project plan. I, along with an employee who serves as the director, get involved at this point, and for the next half year this plan gets solidified... then another half year, and so on, until the full design behind the project is decided upon. After that, eight months and that's it.

Q: How does a game get completed?

SM: First you have to decide what to complete the game around. You have to fish out the core, the fun part of the game. However, the director has his own desires; he wants to put this and that into the game. Plus, if everyone in the project is just trying to get along with each other, then it could all fall apart. When it gets to that point, I bust it all out in a conference. People refer to that point as the time where I "knock over the table". I'm not a nice guy; if I was a nice guy I'd just sidle up to people and say "Why don't you do this?", but no, sometimes you have to bite down and show that, like, "I'm stroonng!" (laughs) When I flip out, it's because I'm being sincere in my desire to get something done with the project.

Let's say there's something unle with the project.

Let's say there's something in the game that I think is fun. I bring that over to the programmers but I don't get any response; I say "How is this?" but I don't get any kind of good reaction. Then later, when they show me what they've done... well, it's not what I was thinking of. So what should I do then? Well, if I'm not getting the message across, then it's time to put some light in their eyes.

Right now, I stick really close by four or five Nintendo titles a year. At the ten-title mark, it's down to the level where I help out in the final stages or when the project's getting derailed here and there, or I yell at them if nothing's going anywhere. If I'm working as a supervisor, then I'm really not involved much at all.

With an overseas team like Retro Studios with Metroid Prime, we

With an overseas team like Retro Studios with *Metroid Prime*, we do a phone conference once a month and exchange employees once every two or three months.

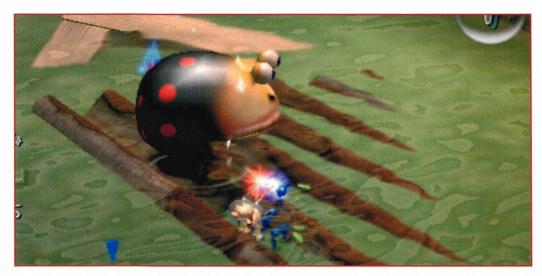
Q: So what are the basics if you want to get an "okay" from Mr. Miyamoto?

SM: Well, this is something that struck me at this year's E3. For some reason the game industry always puts out the same stuff it's released before at events like these. American companies are definitely getting good at game creation, but to me it's the exact same as last year. I wouldn't let stuff like that pass.



"The response at E3 was okay; people said "It's not real!" and "I want to shoot guns!" and so on. That's the way America's pointing right now, I guess."







I respond to the sincerity of someone who says "I really want to make this!" I give the okay to things that have a chance of success. I don't mean things I'm confident will sell in the marketplace; I'm talking about things that succeed over what's already out there. Games that tackle ideas never stimulated before, games that try to make people say "This is neat..."; those are the things I think have a chance of success. Those are what I give my okay to.

Q: What is the most common mistake people make?

SM: Project documents that start out with "If you did this and that to this other game, I think it would be really fun" are absolutely no good. Don't tell me about that! Tell the person who made that other game about it! (laughs) That's what I want to say to them

When someone's making a game, he develops a sort of complex toward that game. I used to draw comics, and I always felt like something wasn't quite good enough in what I did. Sometimes I get project documents and they're so pompous, like "Enemies will be encountered at random intervals..." If you want to show something, then you have to show your feelings about it in the writing

Even if you try to write something good, you end up imitating something else. Whenever someone asks me for an autograph, what I really want to do is draw up a caricature of the guy asking me, but then I get worked up about what'll happen if it comes out weird, or if they decide to display it in public somewhere, so I end up drawing Mario instead. I'm used to Mario. But, really, being able to write what you want is important. You have to deliberately try to make something that only your team, and nobody else, can create.

Q: Is a game director as important as a movie director?

SM: When some popular game sells well, while I don't like admitting it, it's not because the director was good; it's the content of the game. For example, in a cut-scene, a single instant can move a player's emotions. You can make movie scenes with a graphic designer, a sound guy, and a programmer... and so that becomes the game's core.

Now, this seems like a wonderful idea at first glance, but no matter Now, this seems like a wonderful idea at first glance, but no matter who makes this, no matter what system it's on, it'll always end up being the same thing. The PS2, Xbox and GameCube are similarly capable. If you keep this up, then the competition becomes one to up the graphics, to up the sound, and that costs money. You might already all know this, but game sales in general are dipping.

For one minute of an opening movie in a game, it costs around 20-30 million yen to make (£150,000). This is the hugeness of the scale we're talking about. And then the demands everywhere else become greater—you have to have some kind of special effects when an action takes place, and you can't have lame sound effects so you end

action takes place, and you can't have lame sound effects, so you end up requiring several people just for sound effects. The more staff you add, the harder it gets to shape the whole thing together. It becomes

this unfinished game, and then the users start complaining.

Personally, I think it's best to work on what you think are stupid ideas, but this is a business, so you do have to work on some sellable products, too. Because, really, to be brutally honest, there's no difference between the PS2, Xbox and GameCube. So where do we try to make a difference? In the software. That, and Nintendo has the GBA, so we have to keep on building up the GameCube/GBA link.

Q: So you think that the link-up play will prove to be successful? SM: Mmmm... Who knows? ...I don't. (laughs) But still... um... There are some things I'm sure will work out there. (smiles)

Q: Who actually sits down to help you test gameplay concepts? Or you just trust your own judgments and run with it?

ŚM: I invite employees and their kids, and I look at their reaction. I let women or kids play and I watch them from behind. I don't say anything; I just gauge their reactions. I may say to myself "Don't do that!" or "Yeah, that'll help you out later", but I don't open my mouth. That's important because you can see whether children can deal with the controls, or whether they're actually reading all the text as they play.

"I never see a film and then say 'I'll make this now'. I want to help people who play games become more creative, and cause things to happen. Passive movie cut-scenes are a big part of games now, but I think that unless you're actively doing something, it's not a game."

All praise the wrestling god! There he/she was, sitting on a cloud strumming a harp when prayers from GameCube owners arrived from Earth. 'Please let there be blood in XIX' came the cries and he listened. 'Don't let THQ bugger it up like the last one'. The wrestling god was curious. Where was the blood they craved and why was X8 so crap? Surely GameCube's second next-generation WWE title wasn't going to be another dog? Thankfully your prayers have been answered.

While it's not quite the claret fest we saw in brutal bruiser UFC, at least the red stuff is in there. Within 30 minutes' play of the latest WWE jamboree Triple H's forehead was spurting blood from a head wound after a ladder in the face. Justice has already been done.

But has THQ listened to anything GameCube owners have said about how awful Wrestlemania X8 was? Well there's no ringside commentary because of the prolonged wrestler entrances, or so we're told - so the only atmosphere is the sound of wrestlers being dropped on sweat-stained canvas or your opponent getting bollocked from the flat-

sprite crowd (there's no NHL Hitz-style crowd here). But the entrances are authentic; The Undertaker on his Harley. Hogan dressed in his feather boa and the

music fits the correct superstar, unlike some in X8.

Fights now have an extra dimension thanks to new counter moves, but actually pulling them off requires splitsecond timing. Getting it right is bloody frustrating as too button icons appear above your wrestler just as you're about to be hit, but once

perfected you'll find yourself

countering grapples and other

moves to win bouts. If there was a games Oscar for the range of options in one game, then XIX would surely get the nod – it's exceptional. There

are over 40 of WWE's finest backstage, including fanfavourites Triple H, Brock Lesnar and The Undertaker. Body models have been given a makeover, too, so the likes of The Rock are extremely close to the real thing, Goldberg's been vastly improved and Al Snow looks and sounds wicked in his role as the tutorial instructor.

As for match-ups it's everything you'd expect from King of the Ring to Ladder and Tag Team. You can even set up a grudge match in

the actual Wrestlemania XIX arena, among others, which is all good by us.

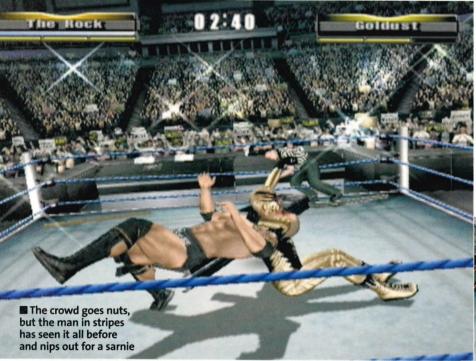

Now P.N.03 is here. From a distance, she looked quite attractive. But what's that? A wart? Ugh! A moustache as well! What was supposed to be Cameron Diaz has turned out to be a right old minger.

Okay, it looks good, it really does. Vanessa T. Schneider is like a fit and futuristic Lara Croft and her laser fire lights up the

sideways as it returns fire. You mash fire again. It dies. It's the same pattern to progress through every corridor and they send you to sleep with their uniform white futurishness.

Listening to the noise the pad

makes while someone plays P.N.03 bears this out. A series of quiet taps as A is pummelled, then a couple more bassy mashes as the shoulder

buttons are abused. You know how you put a CD on when you're playing a good game? Your brain gets tuned in to the action and before you know it the CD is about eight tracks

further on than you thought? Well, try listening to some tunes while you play this and you'll hear every note; here, the comfortable repetitive thrash of P.N.03 becomes the background activity.

Vanessa can flip and roll like a gymnast, but that's just a smoke screen. She actually isn't very agile at all: instead of backpedalling, she does little backwards pirouettes that look

stupid: she can't shoot while she runs; and she can blast beams out of both hands, but not at the same time. This is a girl who's supposed to kill people for a living. It just looks like a ballerina who's somehow got lost on the set of the new Star Wars movie.

Between missions you can buy new suits, but the gameplay doesn't change: you get a suit that lets you shoot harder at the expense of defensive power; you can buy in more special attacks that are clumsily actioned through the D-pad like you're playing Street Fighter II; you can buy more continues, but as long as you stave off the boredom of shooting and dodging you won't need them. 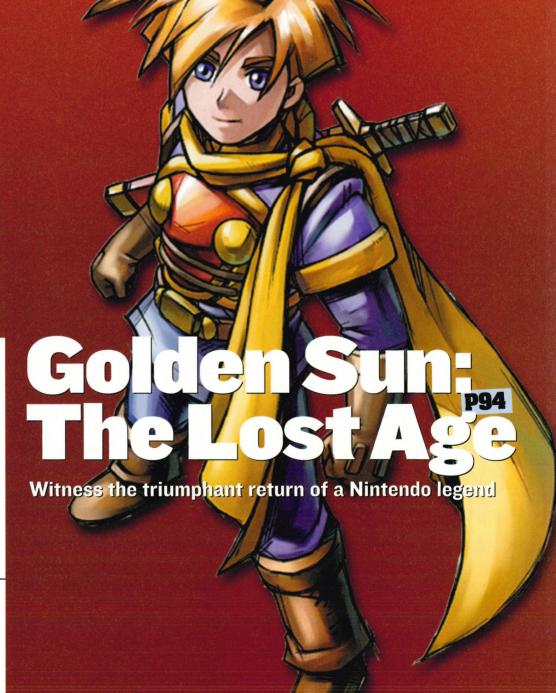

SUPER MARIO BROS. 3: SUPER MARIO ADVANCE 4

Four Mario games in 21/2 years! That's a lot of mushrooms and enough profit for an all-new **Mario platformer!**

ou don't need to be told that Ferraris are fast cars. You don't need some clever dick to let you know that a bear's toilet is in the woods. And seeing as you're reading this magazine you don't need us to tell you that another Mario game coming to Game Boy Advance is a good thing.

Super Mario Bros. 3 was anticipated like nothing before. And Nintendo delivered. Mario Bros. 3 gave you more moves, more enemies and more fantastic costumes, and it comes across brilliantly on GBA with the vivid levels and tight controls combining to give you a Mario game that's lost none of its magic. It still puts modern platformers to shame.

As usual that strumpet, Peach, has been kidnapped by the scaly green fiend, Bowser, and now you've got to rescue her. That means eight worlds made from clouds, water, desert sands and slippery ice that combine to provide you with level upon level of excruciatingly tricky and hugely addictive platform fun.

It's a shame that this is being released after Mario Advance 2 as the levels seem much shorter. You have to consider that this was originally a NES title with all the constraints of the cartridge capacity of the time. But small as they are, every level is a test of skill and mental endurance as you'll be pulling your hair out after falling down a chasm or landing on a Koopa for the umpteenth time. You'll try again though - it's a Mario game.

Another stroke of genius are the boss battles. Instead of working your way through a booby-trapped castle (that's relegated to the mini-bosses) you have to hop on board a

vast, floating pirate ship packed with cannons and Bullet Bills. Timing and patience are the key in getting to the game's harder bosses.

Where previous Mario Advance games only had Mario Bros. multiplayer, at least no.4 has something extra. Nintendo has now added e-Reader functionality. The basic cards add items to your inventory – like something as simple as the Frog Suit. You can swipe this card in as many times as you like although this smells like cheating to us. One of the cooler cards will be of help to any gaming lepers out there as it uploads a demo of a good gamer (like one of us) completing a tough section. But the best bonuses are the extra levels that the cards open up. They aren't just from this game, they can come from any Mario game from the past, like the original Super Mario Bros., but you

get to use the Mario from Mario Bros. 3, including all his power-ups.

Super Mario Advance 4 is everything you'd expect - and that's just the way we like it. Mario games are famous for being addictive, fun and hard as nails, and this certainly isn't going to disappoint. It would have been nice to see some alterations to the twoplayer games - Mario Bros. is getting seriously boring, Nintendo!

As for the e-Reader functions, we'll have to wait and see if they make it onto the European release. It sounds a bit like another ploy to rob people of their money, but if Nintendo can come through with some unique mini-games or bonus levels then it may be worth the extra cash. What's more, the American release date has been moved back, so Europe may follow suit. We'll bring you a full review as soon as we get a UK version.

The developer, Camelot, has improved on almost every aspect of the original. The Lost Age looks amazing with vibrant towns, huge landscapes and vicious magical battles. The soundtrack is outstanding, especially if played through a set of headphones; it's

a sweeping score filled with variety and atmosphere. The battle system has been streamlined and

is easier to

handle, although there's still a problem if an opponent dies before one character attacks – the move gets wasted and you're left open to a counter strike.

RPG fans will feel at home this is as traditional as it gets, with levelling-up, new spells and loads of artefacts. What makes The Lost Age different is the Djinn, tiny creatures that can summon elemental forces to aid you. In Golden Sun they were pretty straightforward to catch, but here they've been given a rebellious streak. You'll need to trap and battle Djinn before they'll obey you and it's a welcome addition the only real difference between this and the last game.

"*Golden Sun* fans will love it, but it'll do nothing for newbies."

And that's what'll make you decide whether or not to buy this. It's still one of the best RPGs available, but it does nothing new. Choose this over the original and you won't get a better game, just a longer one. 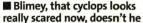

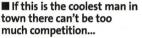

In reality, the futuristic Tokyo setting could be anywhere and occasionally it feels like you're playing a *Tony Hawk*'s game with only one objective. His first invention for the company was the Ultrahand, that cool accordion-like grabber thing that you could make out of Lego Technic.

When Nintendo entered the digital age, Yokoi was charged with the task of creating something different – he came up with Game & Watch. After assisting Miyamoto with the making of Donkey Kong, Yokoi went on to invent the Game



Boy. He then lead a team making Metroid and Kid Icarus on NES and Super Mario Land on Game Boy. Still not finished, Yokoi-san refined the, slightly chunky, Game Boy and came up with the Game Boy Pocket. Sadly, he was killed in a car accident in October 1997.

Parallax Scrolling

Ever wondered how 2D games create the illusion of depth? It's all down to a technique called parallax scrolling and it works on the idea of perspective. If you're sitting in a car on the motorway and you look to the side you'll see the road moving really quickly, the barrier moving slightly slower and the trees in the distance moving slower still.

To recreate this in the gaming world, as





seen in most platformers like Yoshi's Island on GBA and Tomb Raider Curse of the Sword on GBC, the screen must be split into layers. It's then a case of programming each layer to move at a faster or slower rate, giving the impression of depth. Layers can be placed in the foreground or background and some amazingly clever effects can be created. Say, for instance your character is inside a house with a window.

The interior could be one layer giving you the impression of being inside the building, but a second layer could be placed behind the window, moving at a slightly slower speed. So, when you pass by it feels like there's a world outside.

Quickest Way To Kill... when he launches a volley of glue globes, jump onto one and, as it gets close to him jump off and Ground Pound his head. Grab the dazed spider and spin him around. Repeat until dead.

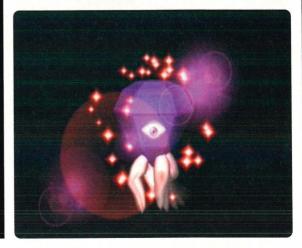

Once all are free the Jewel will be dazed, so get up there and Wing-Ding Swing him to throw the Black Jewel

out of the arena. Repeat to win.

On the final lap of a race, try to save a full bar of Burnout goodness for the last dash to the finish. If the finish line is just after a steep bend, use your boost before you reach it – you wouldn't want to skid out and crash right at the end



DID YOU KNOW?

As you hear 'go', quickly tap 3 and then slam 4 for a fast start.

CLASSIC CARS

The golden oldies might be good to look at, but they're varied in performance. Some of them, like the Hot Rod are fast. Others, like the unlockable Classic motor, are sluggish and have the turning circle of an Alfa Romeo. Just as in real life, these cars are more about show than speed. More serious racers who want to make mincemeat of the opposition should go for the sports beasts.

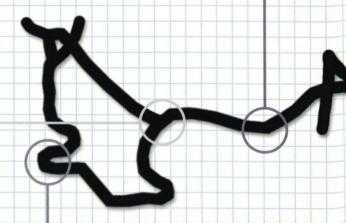


2 At the start of a long straight

Long straights like this are the best places to fire off a Burnout. But when you do, don't swerve through traffic too harshly or you'll lose control of the car's rear end, sending you skidding dangerously across the highway.

Bang. That's Game Over.





3 Steep bends

Never use a Burnout in sections like this that contain one or more tight bends – you'll just end up chewing the roadside. Instead, use them to perform a king-size power slide, charging up a fat boost in the process.



Busting the hardest parts

SUVs

These are big and heavy, making them great for the Crash for Cash mode. With massive tyres, they're easy to control, meaning that you can weave in and out of traffic without losing control of the motor – that's why all mums use them on the school run each morning. However, they do suffer in the top-speed department. Not a good choice for fast races.



4 Jumps

Jumps are dangerous because you can't see any cars that are on the other side of the hill. But you'll charge some mega-boost by getting big air over the humps, especially if you skid a little when you land — you'll gain over half a bar of boost this way.



5 Long Bends

through a long, gradual bend without a crash you'll fill your boost bar in seconds. Don't be afraid to use a Burnout on these bends — the long slide will give you a linked Burnout to use on the next straight.



7 At the end of a long straight

down the straight, drive into the oncoming traffic. Do this a lot, but don't release the Burnout button for the whole boost as you should earn a second boost.



6 Tunnels



Going down the wrong side of a tunnel is a great way to charge your boost. It's risky, but if you drive down the centre of the road along the white line, the oncoming motors will swerve away from you, which should help you rack up Near Miss bonuses, too.

SPORTS CARS

These are the bad-ass motors of the game. With insane top-speeds, not only do they rip up the tarmac in Championship races, but they also wreak havoc in Crash-for-Cash's high-speed collisions. But beware – some are tough to control and it takes a skilled driver to keep these hot-hatches on the road.

HOW TO... fight like you're Neo's twin brother

Take on SWAT, Police and even Agents with the skills of The One in *Enter the Matrix*.

I Focus abilities

Do... use Focus power tactically to evade enemy fire easier and make your gunfire more accurate. Your blows will cause a lot more damage to opponents and can often knock them flying through the air. **Don't...** exhaust your Focus in one go. Use it temporarily to dodge fire as you approach shooting enemies, to finish off an opponent during a battle or to spring out and blast a few accurate shots at enemy forces.

REMEMBER...

Your Health and Focus meters recharge themselves. They will also charge up quicker when you're killing enemies, so you can use Focus more when you are battling several opponents at once.



DID YOU

When using Focus power, you can jump much further.

2 Hand to hand

Do... use fly-kicks as your first attack to get the edge against your opponent straight away. Use throws to get enemies out of the way quickly. If you're losing a fight, just retreat for a few seconds. You are not a Terminator! **Don't...** let enemies surround you. Move around and use Focus throws to get enemies out of the action. Attack in different directions by pushing the C-Stick at the angle you want to strike and then hit punch.

REMEMBER...

A moving target is hard for enemies to hit. You should always keep shifting around during scraps. Enemies will find it impossible to surround you if you move in circles around a single enemy. Also, try to concentrate on one enemy at a time.

3 Gunfights

Do... hide behind walls, crates and any other scenery, ducking out to shoot enemies. Hit jump while peering around a corner to spring out in flashy style and fire a few shots before hiding again. Also try diving forward while shooting.

Don't... worry about saving ammo – you can pick up guns dropped by most opponents. Use guns against enemies that are shooting from range, especially if they're using machine guns.

REMEMBER...

When running, put your guns away – you'll be faster and won't be such an easy target for enemy fire. You can also run at a wall with Focus activated to do a wall flip, landing behind a chasing goon.



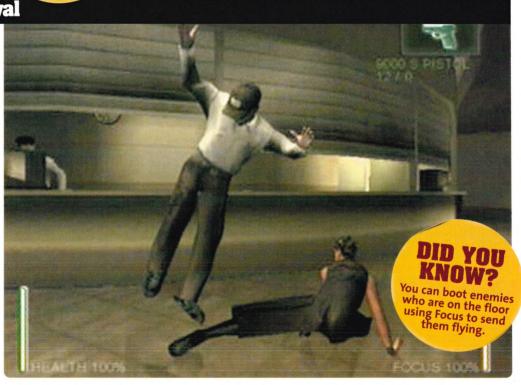
4 General survival

Do... vary your kicks and punches to get the best-possible combos. If you keep using one-button attacks you'll be easily defeated. Better combos will strike high and low points on the enemy's body, making it even tougher for opponents to block your attacks.

Don't... let your Focus run out completely. You never know when you might need it to escape a dangerous enemy or dodge a bullet heading for your face. Whenever the bar gets down to about five percent, hide and wait for it to regenerate.

REMEMBER...

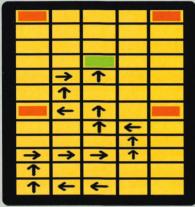
Don't neglect blocking. It's easy to forget about defending yourself and simply smash the kick and punch buttons into oblivion, but you can block during a fight to recharge Focus if it's running low. When it's charged, activate it and open up a whole new can of butt-kick on someone's ass.
