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High Time for Trade To Get INTERPRETATIONS to Clarify Various Rulings

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With the approach of the New Year many changes have come about in the industry.

(EDITORIAL)

Methods which were in vogue for many, many years, have now completely changed.

New laws and new rulings, which have come into effect, have been responsible for creating an entirely new type industry.

Not only new national, but new state, city, and village laws are now in effect.

These make for new methods, new type business operations and, especially, for an entire change in the overall sales and operating picture of this trade.

For years there has been a hush-hush attitude regarding obtaining interpretations of new laws.

In years gone by all believed that, somehow, as time went on, interpretations of new legislation and rulings would come about of their own in the natural course of events, and that the industry could then proceed more freely.

But, those were the days when investments in this field were, comparatively, very small.

Today, investment in the coin operated machines businesses all over the nation, for small and large operators alike, runs into many, many thousands of dollars.

Men with so much money invested want to know how to proceed. What they can, and what they cannot do, so that they do not endanger the large investments they have in their businesses.

As one noted leader in the field stated just a short time ago:

"It's high time for the trade to get interpretations to clarify the various uew laws and rulings which have come into effect."

The legislative crusade seems to have run its course and, at long last, has settled down, after raising the roof with many businesses.

There are now so many, many rul-

ings in effect, one piled atop the other, that the statement by this leader is sound and logical.

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Complete clarification of all new rulings thru official or judicial interpretation is the one and only way in which the peoples engaged in the industry can learn just where they stand.

This is the only way the members of the field will know how to proceed in the future.

There is no one in business today who wants to endanger his investment thru ignorance of the facts.

Few know, even among those who created the legislation which has come into effect, just what interpretations can be, or should be made, regarding the laws created.

But there are men with many thousands of dollars invested. Some have worked an average lifetime to accumulate these investments. Others entered into the field on the theory that whatever they have invested is safe.

These men, as well as all others in the trade, want to know where they stand.

What are they doing which may, in any fashion whatsoever, be construed as opposite of the new legislation and rulings which have come into being?

Few dare to tread the stairway of legal or official entanglements in these days even to clarify their own business situation.

But, the time has at long last arrived. when men of stout hearts and inquisitive, as well as intelligent minds. must face the facts.

They want to know just how they stand.

They want to know what they must do to stay within the limits of the new rulings.

The one and only way they will ever know, so as not to endanger their large investments, is to obtain official or judicial interpretations which will most completely clarify all questions regarding the new rulings.

Incomplete In sk Labels Causes Loss

We received a hurried phone call the other day. It was from a disk jockey at a major station. "Who's the publisher ofhe asked. "We've been receiving requests to play the tune. Yet the record we have has no publisher identification and so we can't get it cleared for air play."

Can you imagine the number of records that are not played as soon as possible because they aren't cleared? Can you imagine how often the disk jockey throws the record aside instead of going to a source that can furnish the necessary information?

Our conversation with this disk jockey was an unusual one. Usually, he just forgets about the song and waits for clearance to come eventually. In this time, the initial impact of the record and tune is being wasted.

And yet the disk jockey cannot be blamed for setting the record aside. He should never be put in the situation where he has to look for this vital information. It should be right there on the label where he can have it a glance.

The label of every record that leaves a pressing plant should have all the pertinent facts on it. And this means records that go to the public as well as those which go to the trade.

Besides the title of the song, its author and the artists on the record, a label MUST have the publisher's name, his copyright affiliate and the time of the record. This is not extraneous material. It is absolutely necessary information to get a song going fast.

Many of the majors do make it a practice to include all this information but the independents-and particularly the newer ones who are most in need of all the help they can get--are frequent offenders in this matter.

It's almost certain that the last thing a recording man thinks of when he puts out a disk is what goes on the label. Yet for a new independent, that is one of the most important things that can be taken care of. For the independent manufacturer is putting his record under a burdensome handicap to start with if he neglects the facts which are going to clear its path for play.

A diskery that does not put the publisher's name on the label is also hurting the kick off on sheet music. For in our present day publishing set up, where new firms are frequently established for particular artists and material, even a sheet music jobber has a tough time keeping track of what's coming and going. And very often when a record begins to kick off and the first requests for sheet music copies come in, the jobber has no idea where to get them and so these first sheet music sales are lost. Add up the number of times this happens and you have a loss of thousands and thousands of copies.

Now the record company official may ask "Why should I worry about whether sheet music is sold or not?".

Well he should worry. First of all because the demand for sheet music is one of the most important ways in which a publisher knows whether his song is doing well and second of all because a percentage of the profit which a publisher makes on his sheet music is going into the promotion of his song which in turn helps to promote the disk firm's record.

As in all other businesses, what helps one end of it helps the other.

As for the time of a record, that information is necessary to anyone who does any programming at all and that includes the juke box operator, the program director, the disk jockey, the librarian and everyone else. How can anyone who works with a time element operate without knowing the length of the record? The time is one of the most important things that can go on a label. Leaving it out very often means leaving the disk out-out of a lot of play which it might otherwise have.

A record label is there to give necessary information. The only time that it performs its function well is when it is giving all the information that may be necessary.

Disk firms should use that label to help garner as much play for their records as possible instead of hindering play by keeping absolutely pertinent material a mystery.



"DOWN IN THE VALLEY" (2:52) "RED RIVER VALLEY" (2:59) ANDREWS SISTERS (Decca 27894; 9-27894)

• The Andrews Sisters take two standards and give them a lovely working over on this platter. The first half is done by the girls and a chorus with Vic Schoen doing the accompanying and it comes out real pretty. The lower end is another pleasant sounding side featuring the harmony of the girls. Ops won't want to miss this

"DANCE ME LOOSE" (2:49) "SLOW POKE" (2:52) ARTHUR GODFREY

(Columbia 39632; 4-39632)

• Arthur Godfrey goes into a Dutch accent to turn out a side which has been getting a big push. A happy sounding novelty, this item is helped along by the Chordettes and Archie Bleyer's orchestra. The second half is current hit which Godfrey also does in his own style. The top half might go.

"OOH, LOOK-A THERE, AIN'T SHE PRETTY?" (2:48) "KEEP ME IN MIND" (2:45) BUDDY GRECO (MGM 11131; K11131)

• A standard receives the Buddy Greco treatment on the upper end as Buddy and the Three Sharps go through their paces. With a good vocal and some piano work to match, this one sounds fine. Bottom half is a ballad which Buddy also does ok with. The top deck gets our nod.

"SWINGIN' DOWN THE LANE" (2:39) "SNOWMAN" (2:31)

HELEN FORREST (MGM 11128)

• A reissue of a couple of wonderful sides by Helen Forrest makes for terrific listening here. The upper half of the platter is a grand oldie which Helen knows exactly what to do with while the bottom half is another tune which she sings beautifully. Ops will want to listen in here.

"YAASS" (2:50) "DOMINO" (2:20) SIDNEY TORCH ORCHESTRA (Coral 60611)

• A fast moving number with a foreign flavor to it is belted home in a convincing manner by the Sidney Torch orchestra and the Torch Singers. The chorus and the treatment make this an interesting end. Flip is a current hit that gets an exciting rendition from the orchestra. Both lids should get some play.

LLOYD SLOOP & BOB MITCHELL (Tempo 1244)

• Two similar sounding ends are turned out by the organ playing duo of Lloyd Sloop and Bob Mitchell. The boys combine their talents and blend nicely on both lids, which are oldies that are done slowly and softly. This type of music could go if ops have the right locations.

• An oldie that's been transformed into a Latin American number is once again given another whirl by Jose Melis. This instrumental should draw coin. The lower deck is another instrumental of a fast moving samba and here too the boys do a good job. The top level deserves some attention from ops.

• A pretty ballad is made to sound appealing on the first side by the Four Matys Brothers. The vocal lead does a good job and makes the lid strong material. The boys have themselves another slow number on the lower portion of the disk and with the help of a steel guitar come up with a listenable item. Ops should look in.

"THERE'S A HOLE IN THE BOT-TOM OF THE SEA" (2:28) "UNCLE POCKETS" (2:40) DANNY KAYE

(Decca 27895; 9-27895)

• An old favorite rondelay is given a modern interpretation by the energetic vocalizing of Danny Kaye. Danny and the chorus make this cute novelty an interesting end. The bottom deck is another novelty that Danny handles easily and here too ops have some interesting material to work with.

"A WEAVER OF DREAMS" (2:47) "TAKE ME BACK" (2:38) BILLY ECKSTINE (MGM 11125; K11125)

• Two pretty ballads are given the typically fine vocalizing of Billy Eckstine on this new waxing. Both lids are done softly and smoothly with Billy's distinctive style carrying them through to first rate completions. Nelson Riddle and his orchestra do the musical setting. Ops should watch both halves carefully.

"SHRINE OF SAINT CECILIA" (2:56)

"SOMETIME REMIND ME TO TELL. YOU" (2:30) PHIL BRITO

(MGM 11127; K11127)

• The upper end features Phil Brito with the vocal of a slow, easy going oldie. Putting lots of feeling into the lyrics Phil comes out with a potent platter. The second level is another slow thing that Phil and the orchestra bring home as a listenable lid. Our nod goes to the first dish.

"JALOUSIE" (2:45) "LULLABY" (2:39) BUDDY MORROW ORCHESTRA (Mercury 5753; 5753 x 45)

• A current revival is sent through its paces by the Buddy Morrow orchestra and the result is a pleasureful half. Buddy himself handles the trombone and adds to the listening appeal with a fine bit of blowing. Flip is a standard that's slow and dreamy and again the boys have an ok side. Ops might take a peek at the upper end.

"BE MY LIFE'S COMPANION" (2:29)

"THE OKLAHOMA POLKA" (3:00) GEORGIA GIBBS

(Mercury 5758; 5758 x 45)

• A current plug tune that seems destined for lots of play is run through in an interesting manner by Georgia Gibbs and the Glenn Osser orchestra. On the lower deck Georgia and the boys belt a fast moving and happy polka around. The upper level is the one that's gonna make noise and ops should watch it.

(Decca 27890; 9-27890)

• A couple of old Tommy Dorsey sides are reissued here and they still make for wonderful listening. The upper half is a standard which Jack Leonard sings in grand style as the orchestra backs him up superbly. The lower half is a ballad done as an instrumental and this too comes out smoothly. This is a good bet for ops.

"BERMUDA" (3:21)

"THE LITTLE WHITE CLOUD THAT CRIED" (2:31)

ROBERTA LEE (Decca 27893; 9-27893)

• Roberta Lee comes through with two strong sides. The top end is a new number written by a ten-year-old and it certainly sounds terrific. The bottom half is a tune which is already climbing on the charts and this version will give it another push. All in all two fine sides.

ETHEL SMITH (Decca 27896[°]9-27896)

• Two current pop hits are taken in tow and given the Ethel Smith treatment here. Ethel runs through these tunes making with her grand organ music. Both sides have been getting a big play and for the spots which go for organ music, these treatments should be just the thing.

"PUT YOUR LITTLE FOOT RIGHT OUT" (2:43)

"DIXIE" (2:40)

RUSS MORGAN ORCH. (Decca 27846; 9-27846)

• A happy sounding side is dished

out by Russ Morgan as he shows up with a good version. He and the Morganaires come through on the vocal as the orchestra makes with the music. The bottom half is an old favorite getting a new version. The top deck looks good.

"THERE'S NO USE PRETENDING" (2:36)

THE RAVENS

(Mercury 8259; 8259 x 45)

• The vocal harmony of the Ravens is put to wonderful use on the top end. As a result the boys break out with a lovely oldie that might easily go all the way again. The second level is a ballad that the group also carries through in a winning fashion. The side to watch closely is the upper one.



"I WANNA SAY HELLO" (2:29) "I LOVE THE SUNSHINE OF YOUR SMILE" (2:28)

SIR HUBERT PIMM & ELLEN SUTTON (Kem 2710)

• A honky tonk number that's breaking all over the country bids fair to be the next sensational record hit. With a piano workout from Sir Hubert Pimm and a shouting vocal from Ellen Sutton, this one has a sound which could very well make it step out. Ops should find it a steady coin catcher in their machines. The voices in the background give the disk a happy setting which makes you feel as though you're in a large group and the combination of the piano playing and music hall vocal is enough to send it across. The bottom half, done in the same style is a tune which was first introduced several months ago. It too gets the treatment from Sir Hubert Pimm and Ellen Sutton. It's the first half that's breaking, however. Ops better not pass it up.

"DON'T LET JULIA FOOL YOU" (2:46)

"I'VE TRIED A MILLION TIMES" (2:43)

BENNY STRONG ORCH. (Capitol 1898; F-1898)

• The top deck is a cute oldie that's given a first rate treatment from Benny Strong and his orchestra. This half is a novelty number and it might prove interesting material. The lower end too is done in the novelty vein and ops in the market for a disk of this nature oughta look in.

"IT'S ALL IN THE GAME" (2:55) "ALL OVER AGAIN" (2:45) BETTIE CLOONEY

(King 15150)

• Two wonderful ballads get lovely vocals from Bettie Clooney on this new waxing. Both lids are current favorites and this alone can easily make the disk attractive fare. Bettie receives a good musical assist from the Elliot Lawrence orchestra in putting the tunes over. Ops should take a look.

"SHUT THE DOOR" (2:50) "I IDOLIZE MY BABY'S EYES" (2:55)

JOHNNY LONG ORCH. (King 15117) ·

(King 15117)

• A jumpy novelty number with some very cute lyrics is handled pleasantly by the Johnny Long orchestra. Rod Kinder pipes the lyrics here and adds to the appeal of this half. The bottom dish is another cute novelty thing that finds Jimmy Sedlar on the vocal. Looks like a toss up from here.

"BLUES" (2:45)

"FLAPPERETTE" (2:30)

JERRY MURAD'S HARMONICATS (Mercury 5756; 5756 x 45)

• A tune that has had the top instrumental groups making recordings is now dished up by Jerry Murad's Harmonicats. The distinctive harmonica playing of these artists make for some grand listening. Again on the under siding the group turns in a fine performance of a cute sounding thing. Ops should watch it.

"DIXIE JUMP" (3:24)

"JUST ONE MORE CHANCE" (2:55)

RALPH FLANAGAN

(RCA Victor 20-4402; 47-4402)

• A terrific instrumental is turned out by the Ralph Flanagan orchestra on the upper end. It's an oldie that gets a wonderful send off by the whole group and it should make good juke box fare. The second end finds Harry Prime handling the lyrics to another oldie that has currently been revived. Ops oughta get with the top deck.

"CRAZY HEART" (1:58)

"ANY TIME" (2:11)

HELEN O'CONNELL (Capitol 1895; F-1895)

• From the western field comes a pretty tune that Helen O'Connell goes through in an enjoyable manner on the first level. Cliffie Stone offers the musical setting here and continues his fine baton twirling on the under half which is another grand number that Helen brings home easily. Ops can take their pick here.

"OUT IN THE COLD AGAIN" (2:58)

"CHARMAINE" (3:00)

JULIA LEE

(Capitol 1896; F-1896)

• A tune that's still hangin' around is sent through its paces in a slow and feelingful manner by Julia Lee and Her Boy Friends. Dave Cavanaugh and his sax are featured on this top end. The lower lid is a fast moving instrumental that shows the fine drumming of Baby Lovett to good advantage. Both numbers have drawing power.

"CRYIN' SHAME" (2:26)

"SAVOY BLUES" (2:50) BOB CROSBY

(Capitol 1894; F-1894)

• Bob Crosby, assisted by Jeanne Gayle and the Bobcats, spins through a novelty number that comes out as good listening. These artists give the tune a thorough going over and their treatment helps belt it in. The bottom dish is a slow instrumental that also makes for easy listening. Ops have their choice of either lid.

"DON'T LEAVE MY POOR HEART BREAKING" (2:44) "LOVIN' MACHINE" (2:34) ELLIOT LAWRENCE ORCH. (King 15137)

• The Elliot Lawrence orchestra, with Lloyd Copas and Rosiland Patton handling the lyrics, turn out two contrasting sides. The first level is a western sounding ballad that comes out ok. The second level is a new rhythm and blues number that is given a listenable treatment. Ops might take a peek.

"SIN" (2:26)

"AIRPLANE POLKA" (2:21) GAYLE WALTON (Pyramid 374)

• Gayle Walton offers a pair of organ solos on this new waxing. The top end is a pretty rendition of a current hit and this side could prove interesting in the right spots. The bottom deck is a likely polka that also carries lots of appeal and ops with the proper locations oughta watch it.

During one of our aimless peregrinations the other ayem, we found ourselves right back in the midst of Radio Row, too tired to continue our nocturnal plugging, yet too much alive to go home and put the body to rest.

Accordingly, we made tracks for one of the surreptitious haunts of the elite d.j.'s. A little bar which plays wayward host to the galaxy of record experts and yokkers of our realm.

We didn't have too long to wait before one of our confreres joined us in the sweet concoction: "Hale's Dream." (After two, it becomes a nightmare!)

Having had the two, we now decided to discuss the ways and means to propel the record industry on toward the golden age of progress. The primary in-tent was to foster so titanic an idea that the period from 1952 through 2000 A.D. would go down in history as "The Record Era."

Some four hours and sixteen nightmares later, feeling thoroughly pleased with ourselves, we swore undying devotion to the record business, vowed that we would plug each other's product (Boy, this drink is really potent!) and hied ourselves homeward.

As is our wont, we took our daily inventory of the three or four hundred scraps of paper in our pockets the next morning, and found some fourteen bar-checks filled with notations.

In summation, then, here are some of the ills and tribulations of the record industry which we are going to circumvent and alleviate:

1.-Henceforth, the only tunes acceptable for recording must be submitted by a disc jockey, a coin-ma-chine operator, a radio-station receptionist, an elevator operator (in the radio building only, of course) or the wife of any of same. Since these are our main source of contributions at present, anyway, we might as well make it official.

2.-Every record must sell a million! In order to force this issue, each record manufacturer will press the million discs immediately, and not release another record until this stock is sold. In that way, all the claims we hear from time to time will, in effect, be justified.

3.-Every record must be made on the first "take." This is a very simple matter, since that is the practice today. This will merely make it legal.

4.—No artist will agree to do any number at first glance. Every singer, every band leader, every instrumentalist, etc., will argue with the A. & R. division like crazy before condescending to record the number. From current publicity, it's the style.

5.—No artist will be signed to a recording contract unless he or she owns a publishing company. No comment.

6.-No distributor will be allowed to know his sales figures of his organin the country for the label. This will eliminate a national sales manager say-ing, "Do you realize what the guy in Council Bluffs has done on this record in three days?" ization. Instead, he will be furnished with the charts of every other distributor

7.- No artist will arrive in any city for personal appearances without an entourage of seven or eight counterparts (i.e., doubles.) Thus, the artist will be enabled to make the radio shows of the seven or tight d.j.'s who insist on having him or her first!

By this time, the notations were beginning to assume the aspect of neanderthal hieroglyphics, which made further translation impossible. Which may be just as well. The thoughts were there anyhow.

But don't get us wrong--we love the record business. . . .

Besides, what else could we do, what with bookie licenses now up to fifty bucks per annum. Aw, Hale!



In Baltimore, Md. there is an interesting situation regarding one sponsor having two DJs working on the same account on two different stations. Both DJs play the same type of music and generally have like shows. Chuck Richards, of WBAL, and Tom Hawkins, of WFBR, for the first time have a major brewery as bankroller. National Brewing Company of Baltimore has embarked on an unprecedented sales campaign that is paying off in more National Premiums being sold as a result of the combined efforts of Tom and Chuck. Seldom, if ever, will you



find the sponsor of a disc jockey show attempting more than one show in a given market. It is hoped that DJs across the country, who read this item, will take it to advertising managers, and show them that a big manufacturer in one major city has used more than one show in one market. And that it has proven financially successful.

Too often DJs striving to get an account are deterred, and finally completely discouraged, by the slamming of doors in their faces. Because the client already has a show beamed at the certain market, or group, that the DJ hopes to sell. May we point out that all cigarette manufacturers use several coast-to-coast AM and TV shows. Each with different talent. Yet all reaching the same markets. A major problem with DJs is that, generally, they are wonderful collectors of hard-to-get jazz records, but know too little about the problems of selling "time" to a prospective client. This is of vital importance. Particularly where a station does not guarantee to carry a DJ sustainer. He is only on the air for such time as he is commercial. Small stations seldom have a commercial department. The DJ has to get out and do his own hustling for business. If he is operating in a town, where some one big bad wolf is supposedly well intrenched, he may think there is no point in contacting certain accounts because they have been on with Mr. Big Bad Wolf for so long that there is no chance of getting the account to switch, or add a new show. Jack Thompson, Sales Manager of Armour Packing Company, wrote: "Ten Commandments For A Salesman." It's an excellent item for one's pocket. We will gladly send a free copy in response to your request.

Just back from a trip to New York and particularly to the 58th floor of the Empire State Building, where from the windows of Cash Box's office we saw much, and heard lots, which we will report in this column soon.

Disk Assoc. To Hold Full Session In Jan.

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
NEW YORK-At a meeting of the board members of the newly formed Record Industry Association of Am-erica in New York this week, arrangements were made for a general session to be held sometime in January

"RED WING" (2:20) "ANNIE'S RAG" (2:10) EDDIE SMITH (King 1019)



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The Cash Box

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Seasonal Slowdown(?)

Reports Indicate Holiday Season Has Not Slowed Coinbiz. Buying Continues Brisk. Take Holds Up. Premium Sales Boom. Mfrs Speeding Production Before Year Ends.

CHICAGO-Your reporter covered many city miles here meeting with visiting and local distribs, as well as operators, and used long distance phones calling operators, jobbers and distributors, as well as many suppliers in the surrounding big midwest area, in an effort to learn whether there was, or was not, a seasonal busi-ness slowdown at this time.

"There is no seasonal business slow-down," one well known member of the industry stated:

He added, "Business is much better than we ever thought it would be at this time of the year.

"In fact," he said, "this is one holi-day season when business has con-tinued just as brisk, and in some cases even more brisk, than it has for many past weeks."

This man, and many others like him, attribute the better business to the fact that all realize that, after the first of the new year, there will be far, far less materials available to the manufacturers, and that this will mean a tremendous cut down on new machines manufacture, which will affect everyone in the field.

One operator was frank enough to state, "Usually at this time of the year we look for a real letdown in our collections. But, this season, we are enjoying collections on a par, and in some cases even better, than we have enjoyed for some weeks."

Distributors report that machines are moving out just as brisk as ever. This includes both new and used equipment. Many report they have advance orders which manufacturers haven't as yet been able to fill for certain new machines.

The premium business, which is only natural at this time of the year, is actually booming (as has been re-ported in previous issues) and many of the operators are featuring the fin-est of premium merchandise to attract est of premium merchandise to attract play.

In fact, ops are also giving their location owners some of the best premiums as gifts.

The manufacturers thruout the city are pushing production as hard as they can. Many explain that this is due to the fact that they want to speed out everything they can, while they can and before the year ends.

The manufacturers realize that with the slashed quotas which come into effect during the first quarter of 1952 they just won't be able to equal the production which they have enjoyed up to this time.

In fact, the majority are of the be-lief that the second quarter of 1952 will again see a deep cut in materials quotas. So while they can they are working as speedily as possible, to get equipment out to their customers.

In short, there's no seasonal slowdown in the trade this year.

Coin Shortage Now Over

Now Have Three Games In Production

Only Nickels And Quarters Still Scarce

WASHINGTON, D. C.-The Fed-eral Reserve banks stated this week that it appears as if the coin shortage that has plagued the greater part of the nation for nearly a year is overat least they hope it is.

The Reserve banks feel that the chances are about four to one that there won't be any rationing of any coin with the beginiing of '52, when coin normally come back to banks.

The U. S: Mint is even more certain of it, and thinks its own record-breaking production has had something to do with tipping the scales.

Anyhow, on the basis of its current supply and demand, the Federal Re-serve Bank of New York has put pennies, dimes and half dollars on the free list, which means that banks can get all they want of these coins. Only nickels and quarters are still



in scarce supply, but the rationing of quarters is now 50 per cent, thanks to an unusually heavy recent ship-ment from the Philadelphia Mint, which had stepped its working week up to 50 hours as compared with a normal of 40 hours.

It is claimed that the coin shortage this year would not have taken place had Congress legislated more intelligently and that no future shortage can occur if Congress modifies exist-ing practices. Congress appropriates certain sums of money to enable the mints to turn out a certain maximum number of coins of various denominations each fiscal year. However, the mints, to produce more than a certain quota in a given quarter, must be in a position to assure Congress that they will not require a deficiency appropriation for that particular fiscal vear.

Copper Producers Tell NPA MORE COPPER IN TWO YEARS THAN ALUMINUM

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Of interest to the entire coin operated machines industry was the meeting of the Primary Copper Producers Indus-try Advisory Committee with NPA (National Production Authority) here on November 29.

NPA reported, "While admittedly copper is still in short supply, there is no likelihood that the scarcity of this critical material will be a per-manent one."

The Primary Copper Producers In-dustry Advisory Committee advised NPA that: "The copper supply may be rela-

tively better than the aluminum supply in two or three years, because of the probable aluminum demands of the aircraft production program."

Figures were presented by the copper producers to NPA on anticipated increases in the supply of copper during the period 1952-1955.

A committee spokesman expressed the belief that:

"In two years those concerned with the situation will be wondering what to do with copper instead of worrying about allocations."

Industry members took exception to what they described as efforts by the Government to bring about substitution of other materials for copper, on

the assumption that the copper shortage will be a permanent one.

The result of this meeting indicates to many users of copper that the copper producers are well under way to tremendously increase the supply of this critical material and that, as they stated, during this meeting:

"In two years those concerned . . . will be wondering what to do with copper instead of worrying about allocations."

In the meantime it is noted that copper quotas which have been

granted to the juke box and amusement games manufacturers will continue very much lower than they have tinue very much lower than they have ever been during the first quarter of 1952 with the possibility that they will continue as low, if not lower, for the second quarter of 1952. After that, if the copper producers are correct in their predictions and estimates, the copper situation should

estimates, the copper situation should sufficiently loosen to warrant grant-ing larger quotas to the manufacturers in the coin operated equipment in-dustry, it is hoped.



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

(Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added costs of reconditioning.) "The Confidential Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory. METHOD: "The Confidential Price Lists" should be read as follows: First

price listed is lowest price for the week; Second price listed is highest price.

The music machines did not increase proportionately with the other equipment, but the division did show greater activity. The popular prices again led the way and continued to bring almost the same quotations of last week. The bartering here seems to indicate more action in the future.

Prices here too kept pace with those asked last week and little fluctuation was noticeable. The most interesting development in this division was the entrance into the used equipment market for the first time of many pieces. About seven new pieces were added and this was the first time in a long while that new games were placed into this division. Arcade equipment also caught some of the increase and showed a noticeable rise in action. As usual the popular numbers continued to draw most of the activity, but the other games brought their share of quotations.
