

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Last March, one of the darker moments in the general lackluster economy, Cash Box took the occassion to evaluate what it believed to be "That Silver Lining In Current Downturn." This editorial offered a hopeful future philosophy, the point being that valid cost-cutting measures taken as a result of the nation's economic woes could, when things got humming again, mean a higher rate of profitability.

There is good reason to believe that a "silver lining" means more at this time. The music business has gone through a good last quarter. This is a traditional situation in the business world, of course, but the feeling within the music business itself is that it's resuming a new upsurge in sales.

We suggested in that earlier editorial that an economic upturn would, in view of tighter operations, realize "a greater stability and strength to endure the cold-spells that most companies go through even in the best times." While it's still too early to deny a good deal of caution, we believe we are close to better times, much better times. General retail sales are about 10% over last year.

This means that companies with tight operations sufficient to operate under tight economies may require both personnel and manufacturing growth. It is in this area that we add our own note of caution. This process of internal growth must be weighed intelligently, lest "profitless prosperity" take its toll as it did even when things were humming. If a new prosperity is on the horizon, the music business can at least look back upon a period of economic retrenchment with the cold eye of an eye-witness to hard times. It's hard to learn a lesson in prosperity; companies should get the point after going through a rough period.

And the basic point is that intelligent growth in the face of an expanding market is a vital factor in making the profitable most of a good business climate.



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Ron Delsener: Too Many Booking Agents Not 'Hustling Promoters'

NEW YORK Concert promoter Row FORK — Concert promoter Ron Delsener chides many of the big booking agencies that "aren't hus-tling." "Too many of them wait for their phone to ring," Delsener observes

The agency that is smaller and newer tends to be more aggressive with promoters, and this is to the benefit of both, he continued. One of the most useful tools for a promoter of concert attractions is a list of the dates that an agency's talent is available for concerts in a given section of the country. APA for instance, issues such a sheet regularly, but Delsener reports that most of the paper that crosses his desk from booking agencies merely lists the names of the current talent they represent, and does not include their upcoming itineraries with locations and dates specified. Such a detailed newsletter would be a boom for both the promowould be a boom for both the promo-ter and the agency, but so far it has not accepted as a regular practice. The "holes" that often exist on cur-rent tours could be more eaily "filled in" by dates in near-by cities if such information was regularly provided in advance to the promoter.

The sound of Memphis soul continues to figure as a major factor in both the r&b and pop charts, thanks most recently to Hi Record's Al Greene. The London-distributed diskery has seen Al through to two successive top 10 items, "Tired Of Being Alone" and the current "Let's Stay Together," bulleted at #6 on the Top 100.

Al Greene has also broken the general rule that r&b albums do not sell strongly in a pop market. "Gets Next To You" has enjoyed several months of LP chart listings and it's still going strong at #67 this week. From the land of Joe Tex and Otis Redding comes a man who is now taking his rightful place along side the giants of the back-to-the-roots movement in r&b.

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Untapped Audience

Untapped Audience "Anyone who tells you they know the next trend music will take is full of soup," Delsener quipped, making the point that a multiplicity of mu-sical styles as well as a multiplicity of audience demographics should al-ways be kept in mind. While the suc-cess of Carole King, James Taylor and Joni Mitchell points to a softer scene for the 16-25 bracket (that age group which today buys the largest share of seats), there will always be a market—and a rather prominent one— for the louder acts like Led Zeppelin and Grand Funk. And the "rock 'n roll revival" movement has proved that if you give an older audience something to turn out for, they will show up.

Whereas not too long ago, most popular music concerts featured ar-tists like Sammy Davis and Johnny Mathis, the MOR performer has been forgotten about as a drawing card. "But this business is just like McDon-ald's. You can bring them in when the price is right and there's a promotion to go with it." NEW YORK — That MIDEM, the international record and music pub-lishing market, has become a world-

In 1967, MIDEM's first year, 900 attended the Cannes-based meeting, with representation from 327 compan-ies and 14 countries. For the sixth event—running seven days from Jan. 15 to 21—more than 4700 tradesters will be on hand. The company total will be at least 650, with a total of 45 countries rep-resented. These figures are new MIDEM highs. For the U.S., there'll be a 15% increase in attendance, in-cluding the presence of 75 firms (only exceeded by the 100 firms each from England and France). 

Catena Brings **Class Action** Against Capitol

HOLLYWOOD -- Rocco Catena, former vp at Capitol Records, has filed a class action in U.S. District Court in Los Angeles against Capitol Records alleging the violation by the label of Federal and State securities laws.

seeking The suit. damages The suit, seeking damages for Catena and other Capitol stockhold-ers, contends that Capitol execs made "untrue statements of material fact and/or failed to make disclosure of material information regarding the true financial condition" of the company.

The defendants in the action are: The defendants in the action are: Capitol Industries, Capitol Records, EMI, and Capitol Records officers Brown Meggs, E. C. Khoury and W. P. Rozett, Other defendants are Sir Joseph Lockwood, chairman of EMI and a director of Capitol, J. E. Read and J. G. Stanford, director of EMI and Capitol. Also named was the late Glenn Wallichs, co-founder of Capitol and chairman of the company at his death. death.

As a stockholder, Catena, who left the company last May, claims finan-cial losses due to "gross internal mismanagement and self-dealing by officers and defendants."

officers and defendants." Catena is seeking damages totalling \$120 million plus damages equal to the difference between the stock's cur-rent price and what Capitol common was when the plaintiffs purchased it. The suit notes that Catena paid \$20 a share (he is believed to hold 100 shares) for Capitol common stock in May, 1970. The stock, reflecting Capi-tol Industries poor financial showing of late, has been selling at around \$11 for some time. for some time.

Capitol Statement

In reporting it had been served with the action, Capitol attorneys termed "the lawsuit without merit and will not succeed," and the label said it would "vigorously contest these unfounded accusations." The company referred to Catena as a "disgruntled ex-employee" who had received a 100 shares of Capitol stock under a stock plan at a price "sub-stantially less than their market value." value."

In turn, Catena's lawyer, N. Mitch-ell Feinstein, said "I don't believe it is Capitol's place to challenge the propriety of this action.

Glenn Wallichs Dies At 61; **Co-Founder Of Capitol Label**

HOLLYWOOD -- The last remaining HOLLYWOOD — The last remaining member of the triumvirate who founded Capitol Records twenty-nine years ago, Johnny Mercer, has termed Glenn Wallichs "a genius . . . not only at organizing and hard work, but at picking and handling men. He really did in weeks what it takes some men years of twing to accompliab"

did in weeks what it takes some men years of trying to accomplish." Wallichs, president and cofounder of Capitol Records, Inc., and chair-man of the board of Wallichs Music and Entertainment Co., Inc. died Dec. 23 at Hollywood Presbyterian Hospi-tal after a long illness. He was born in Grand Island, Neb., Aug. 9, 1910 and was the son of a railroad man. Wallichs moved with his family to the San Fernando Val-ley in 1926. He had an early fascina-tion with radio and in 1930 rebuilt a model T Ford, installing in it what is generally believed to be the first auto generally believed to be the first auto

generally believed to be the first auto radio—an Atwater Kent table model with five tuning dials. In 1932 Wallichs went into busi-ness for himself in a bedroom-size shop at Ivar St. in Hollywood, just a few blocks from the present site of the Capitol Tower. He sold radio parts, made his own sets for sale. He also made and sold car radios. In the mid-thirties he expanded, setting up five similar businesses in Holly-wood and Beverly Hills and two re-cording studios.

cording studios. The late Al Jarvis, in an article written for Cash Box's 25th anniver-say celebration of the founding of say celebration of the founding of Capitol Records, nostalgically re-called, "I opened a record store (in the 30's) at 5205 Hoolywood Blvd. called the Stomp Shop... as part of the shop I had a small recording studio. One day my recording engi-neer imparted the news that he was going into the record business. I tried my best to talk him out of it but he

going into the record business. I tried my best to talk him out of it but he wouldn't listen to me. If he had I wouldn't be writing this, this tribute to Capitol Records and to my former recording engineer, Glenn Wallichs." In that same issue (Sept. 16, 1967), Wallichs recollected the early days of Capitol Records: "The found-ing of Capitol Records: "The found-ing of Capitol actually was a result of a discussion I had with Johnny Mercer back in 1941 at the Music City Record Shop. Johnny said, 'We could make records of music and things like that.' At the time he had a couple of

dozen hit songs... the real question was how to do it, since all my money was in Music City and Johnny was waiting for royalties. He introduced waiting for royalties. He introduced me to our third partner, the late Bud-dy De Sylva, a topflight ASCAP songwriter and brilliant showman, who served as executive producer at Paramount Studios. Buddy made the original investment to get us start-ed." The amount was \$10,000.

Wallichs Music City

It was in 1940 that Wallichs, along with brother Clyde, opened Wallichs Music City, the largest record store at that time. He remained chairman of the board of the music and entertain-ment even even though his brothment complex, even though his broth-er is the major owner and sole manager.

In his private life he was a director of the Boy Scouts of America and a member of the board of regents, Red-lands University. As recognition of his stature in the recording industry, (Cont'd on p. 12)

Max Steiner Is Dead At 83

HOLLYWOOD-Max Steiner, 42-year veteran film composer and orchestrator and winner of three orchestrator and winner of three Academy Awards for scores, died here last week (28) at the age of 83.

The Vienna-born talent won Oscars The Vienna-born talent won Oscars in 1935, 1942 and 1944 for his scoring of "The Informer," "Now, Voyager" and "Since You Went Away," re-spectively. Among his many other credits was the score for "Gone With The Wind," the longest film score ever written.

Steiner started writing for films in Steiner started writing for films in 1929 when composer Harry Tierney brought him to Hollywood for the orchestrations for the film version of his hit Broadway show, "Rio Rita." The next year he became music direc-tor of the RKO music dept. Another music highlight of his Hollywood out-put was "King Kong." His first ori-ginal score for a film was "Cimar-ron" in 1930. Steiner is survived by his wife

Steiner is survived by his wife, Leonetta.



To fill the need for an auditorium midway in size between a Carnegie and an MSG, Delsener has taken to the policy of multiple-night as op-posed to multiple-show bookings. He recently arranged for groups like Poco and Chicago to perform for three to five nights running instead of the traditional one-nite stand. Both the audience and the talent seems to find this new experiment a most suc-cessful one. Meanwhile, the need for an auditorium capable of seating 5,-000-10,000 for one performance has yet to be met architecturally. The "ballroom" concept where the ques-tion of "seating" and "comfortable" did not arise until it was too late was responsible for its own demise, ac-cording to Delsener. Addressing himself to the recent price scales (where the "top" of five years ago is now the "bottom"), he said, "I just don't know where all those kids get the money, but they do, for an act they truly want to see." Menon Remarks

Menon Remarks Bhaskar Menon, current president and chief executive officer of Capitol Industries, made the terse announce-ment of Wallichs' death: "Mr. Wall-ich's . . . courage, strength of will, and decication to highest ideals in both personal and professional life, despite the terrible adversity of a long and difficult illness, have been an inspira-tion to all who have known him." In 1968, when Wallichs temporarily following months of hospitalization, he told this reporter, "I can't forecast what will be happening in ten years or twenty-five years in our industry. Or even in '69. Only to recall that it began a few blocks from this tower 26 years ago with a 78 RPM disk. Now we're into 7 inch, LP's 4 and 8 track cartridges, cassettes, reel to reel, in-strumentation tape, music publishing, distributing, duplicating, rack job-bing, farming, lodging . . . we're con-tinuing to examine additional diver-sification. One thing all of us learn as years fly by—nothing stands still."

"His death has taken from the in-dustry one of its true pioneers. NEW YORK: WHAT HATH ROY LICHTENSTEIN WROUGHT?

Ninety three million people per year. Yeah? More than the populations of France and Luxembourg put together? No fooling? And that figure is only the number of buyers and we should times it by three for the total readership? What?

Two hundred and seventy odd million? Can this be real? Actually it is very real although the product itself is in the realm of fantasy and imagination. Marvel comics have just that sort of audience, according to **Stev**e Lemberg, youthful president of National Copacetic, the company which recently acquired rights to the characters in the series.

Already in the works is a sixty-five installment, five minute radio show format which will be distributed nationally and aimed at the 16 to 25 year olds who constitute 75% of Marvel readership. This is the opening salvo in a broad spectrum of multi-media projects based on the Marvel heroes. All will employ

top-grade ultra-contemporary scores. "We are doing a Carnegie Hall multi-media show January 5," says Lemberg, "and are working on a tv special featuring Alain Resnais, a film, and a \$2,500,000 giant arena spectacular. Albums are obviously a major part of the picture, and we're also planning a mixed media book package. There is almost no limit to the way the Marvel characters can be presented." If that is true (and who are we to gainsay it) then such heroes of the cosmos

as Thor, son of the regal Odin, from the far dominion of Asgard, the Spider Man, The Hulk and The Fantastic Four will reach an even wider audience during the coming year. Certainly the upcoming Carnegie Hall show is already shaping up as one of 1972's first must-see events.

Slated to appear at that Gotham showplace are film director Resnais, a long time Marvel addict; Peter Boyle of "Joe" fame; the Beach Boys' Dennis Wilson (who will introduce new musical material inspired by the Silver Surfer); drummer Chico Hamilton, who will improvise background music; Australian illusionist Geof Crozier; actor-comedian-talk show host Earle Doud; WPLJ's disk jockey Zacherle who will read a Dr. Doom narrative. And, of course, Stan Lee, the creator of Marvel Comics.

According to Lemberg, "The center of the Carnegie stage will be a giant Mylar throne, around which will weave the weird and wonderful works of Peter Nevard, who will create a cacophony of Asgardian effects with film, slides and lighting. Magician Crozier has devised some never-before-seen illusions for the show, which will be the most elaborate production ever staged at Carnegie Hall. Two Marvel artists, John Bessman and Herb Trimbe, who originated the Fantastic Four and The Hulk, will animate a fight sequence on the spot. Eddie Carmel, the nine foot, eight inch man will improvise poetry dedicated to his Marvel heroes and in the lobby the audience will be surrounded by 128 huge panels, an exhibit created by **Stan Lee** to show the evolution of the comic book."

If that sounds like fun, imagine what might follow. Or let Lemberg imagine it since he will be the one to do it. He has already proved himself a capable production manager, having served in that capacity at Fillmore East as well as at numerous rock festivals. He got the idea for the whole Marvel project while browsing in a San Francisco book shop. "I saw these comics while I was just hanging out there and I bought a few and then it came to me.'

DAWN—MUSIC YOU CAN GET YOUR TEETH INTO "I think that our biggest difficulty now is with our image. People in the trade tend to think of us as 'bubble-gum', when really we're doing something quite different." The speaker was Tony Orlando, leader of Dawn, in town for a couple of

days' quick promotion work and an American Bandstand taping. Tony's back as an artist after a period of activity with Columbia's publishing arm, April-Blackwood. Dawn, he explains, was an accident. "Hank Medress, who produces the group, has been a friend of mine for some time. He occasionally bounces ideas off of me. He had made a record called 'Candida'. It was completely finished, with a full instrumental track and a lead vocalist. He asked me if I thought it would appeal to any record company in particular. I told him that it sounded like a Bell record to me. He took it to **Larry Utall**, who flipped for it, except for the lead vocal. Hank came back and asked me to put one on. I did, and the single became a hit. We thought it was just a one-shot thing. Then we made 'Knock Three Times'. That sold more than four million internationally, and we felt that we might be on to something."

We asked Tony what he felt his music was, if not bubble-gum. "We're into a 1960's Drifters kind of thing. When I was recording for Epic, twelve years ago, the first four sides I cut were new Carole King-Gerry Goffin tunes—'Some Kind of Wonderful,' 'When My Little Girl is Smiling,' 'Take Good Care of My Baby' and the hit, 'Halfway to Paradise.' Carole was 18, and she arranged the session, played piano on it and sang background vocal. I think that what we're doing now has the same kind of feel. It explains why a large part of our audience is in their 30's . . . they grew up on that stuff. You go to our shows, and you'll find that it's not mostly kids who show up."

Besides Tony, Dawn includes two girl singers, Telma Hopkins and Joyce Vincent. Both were established session singers before joining the group; it's Telma singing 'Shut yo' mouth' on Isaac Hayes' "Shaft." They've been with Dawn, though, since the first sessions with Tony.

"A funny thing," Tony mentioned as his manager, Marc Gordon, showed up to take him somewhere. "We played our new single, 'Runaway' to the people at Bell the other day. Everybody liked it except Larry. He said that I was singing 'too soulful'. See what I mean? Even he thinks we're bubble-gum."






WHISKY A GO GO, L.A. — The thing to remember is that whatever initial hype power Fanny may have once had in being an all-girl band is long gone, having ended at about the time of their second local appearance. To bring out crowds like they do now—large and responsive—they must have something more going for them, like talent. They do.

This time out, Fanny presented a substantially new show; sort of a preview to their third Reprise album, "Fanny Hill." That the instrumental work on the numbers wasn't up to standard and was a bit loose, and that the words likewise suffered can be at the vocals likewise suffered, can be at least partially blamed on the newness of the material. Because when Fanny get themselves together, they are sim-ply a great mainstream rock band in the same general musical direction as, for instance, the Faces.

the same general musical direction as, for instance, the Faces. Older numbers in the set; things like "Special Care," "Ain't That Pecu-liar" and "Charity Ball" showed that Nicky, Jean, June and Alice provide one of the more pleasant musical diversions around and are certainly worthy of whatever fame they might acquire over the next couple of years. Second-billed Alan Parker brought with him an act eminently suited to the Whisky—a mini review of back-up singers, two horns and a rhythm section including himself on lead gui-tar and vocals. They propelled them-selves through a set of originals plus "Chest Fever" and "Fanny Mae" with almost enough enthusiasm to compen-sate for the fact that, musically, they aren't terrifically accomplished. Park-er, formerly with Dunhill's Smith, has good stage presence (though he doesn't talk much) and is an o.k. singer and pretty good guitarist. The group sounded substantially better on the borrowed material than on Park-er's originals. But overall, they're fun to listen to and get the dancers on their feet. Golddiggers COPACABANA, N.Y. — If Jules Po-dell wants to bring back the old Copa chorus line, he need go no further than the Golddiggers, as pretty a pro-fessional group of singers and dancers you're apt to find anywhere. Already familiar to TV audiences via their Dean Martin and summer re-placements shows the aight performplacements shows, the eight perform-ers are lovely to look at, sing with a festive exuberance and are lovely to look at. Choreography plays a key role, too. It's something on the order role, too. It's something on the order of go-go dancing, yet in a more **refined way. Costuming also reflects a** tasteful go-go touch. In truth, there isn't that much depth to the singing, but the point of it all is George Ab-bott-like pacing and a communication of a joyous spirit. And they're lovely to look at. The group was recently signed to RCA Records, and its first LP is now on the market. Also on the bill is singer Rick Daniels whose yobill is singer Rick Daniels, whose vo-cal range nicely covers rock and big-ballad vocalizing. At 24, he has a relaxed way on the floor, and is often engaging in his banter.

John Lewis, Milt Jack-son, Connie Kay and Percy Heath showed once more why they continue to receive worldwide acclaim. An added attraction was the appearance of alto great Paul Desmond, who played for the first time ever with the MJQ, in the second part of the even-ing's performance.

Opening with Lewis' "Django," which was played brilliantly, the group purred through its hit single of some years back, "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen," ("England's Carol"), a seasonal favorite. Another high point of the first part of the program was "Plastic Dreams," from the group's new Atlantic album of that name. With the appearance of Desmond, the five musicians played on a level to delight the most demanding fan, with John Lewis particularly providing shimmering, lyrical and exceptionally creative piano excursions. Jackson was his usual cool and competent self as was Desmond. Percy Heath lent unflagging, powerful rhythmic sup-port from that magnificent bass of his and Connie Kay's drumming was a delight throughout. The large and extremely apprecia-

Alex Harvey TROUBADOUR, L.A. — Very pre-dominantly a folk-sometimes-rock club, this is the wrong room for Helen Reddy; that was obvious when she played here last June. But rather than spending this time around at a more "adult" room, admittedly difficult to find in L.A., she decided to return. Her appeal, as it turns out, is strong enough that the audience found her. Halfway into her run the crowd appeared to be on the average at least ten years older than the club norm.

Miss Reddy's strongest asset is her taste in selection of material—really good songs by the likes of Van Mor-rison, Paul Parrish, David Blue and John Lennon—that would go over equally well in the more chi chi rooms. Glory be, she even occasional-ly credits songwriters! Vocally, she's certainly adequate.

ly credits songwriters! Vocally, she's certainly adequate, though the night reviewed she didn't appear to be singing with much con-viction. Her band, led by pianist Tom Hensley, was more than up to the test of accompaniment, though a bit loud and out of acoustical balance with one another. Hensley, by the way, performed a marvelous solo interlude on a Leon Russell tune that might be called "Childhood Lovers." Second-billed was Alex Harvey, like

called "Childhood Lovers." Second-billed was Alex Harvey, like Miss Reddy a Capitol act. Accompa-nied by a band of two guitars, bass, drums and piano, he sang a selection of all-original songs, including many he had written for others ("Ruben James," "Someone Who Cares") with varying degrees of success. His sing-ing is sort of a cross between "Dany varying degrees of success. His sing-ing is sort of a cross between Tony Joe White and Joe Cocker, with a tendency to fall out of tune every once in a while. But that probably doesn't bother listeners nearly so much as all those songs about Jesus he performs, and Harvey is a strong interpreter of his material He and his hand have worked hard

He and his band have worked hard. should be commended. It might also be noted that Harvey is one musician who, when performing without his in-strument, knows what to do with his hands.

NEW YORK: HARVEY FUQUA-MAN ON MANY FRONTS

In a totally new concept, Harvey Fuqua has joined five different working acts, who will record for the RCA label and perform in-person as individual artists as well as with the New Birth group. New Birth is made up of eight musicians known as The Nite-Lighters; four female singers, The Mint Juleps; four male singers, The Now Sound; and one male singer, Alan Frye.

For the past five years, Fuqua has served as the executive director of the artists development department for Motown Records, as well as a producer for the label. He has produced performing acts of such artists as The Supremes, Tempta-tions, Stevie Wonder, Martha Reeves and The Vandellas, Smokey Robinson and The Miracles, Gladys Knight and The Pips, Willie Tyler and Lester, Marvin Gaye and Tammi Terrell, The Four Tops and Marvin Gaye, and for mostly all of the major national television shows, including, the Johnny Carson 'Tonight' Show, Dick Cavett, Merv Griffin, Smothers Brothers, Ed Sullivan, and Hollywood Palace.

His record producing credits are equally as impressive, with just a partial list of those done for Motown including the singles, "Yester-Me, Yester-You, Yester-Day" by Stevie Wonder, "Someday We'll Be Together," by Diana Ross and The Supremes, "What Does It Take To Win Your Love," by Jr. Walker and The All-stars, "My Whole World Ended," by David Ruffin, "Ain't No Mountain High, Ain't No Valley Low," by Marvin Gaye and Tammi Terrell and albums, "Irresistible Tammi," by Tammi Terrell, "You're All I Need," by Marvin and Tammi and "Unit-od by Marvin and Tammi ed by Marvin and Tammi.

From 1.953-1959, Fuqua was signed as a recording artist to Chess Records where he served at the same time as the lead singer of two groups, The Moonglows and The Moonlighters. He was also the writer, producer and manager for both groups. The Moonglows achieved major success with such Fuqua originals as "Most Of All," "Ten Commandments Of Love," "See Saw," and "Sincerely," which earned Fuqua a Gold Record for the million-seller achieved by The Mac-Guire Sisters. The Moonlighters in the meantime made hits out of "Shoo Doo Bee Doo" and "I'm In Love." Along with The Moonglows, Fuqua appeared in three Alan Freed movies, "Rock, Rock, Rock," "Mr. Rock and Roll," and "Go Johnny Go." Fuqua also acted as writer, producer and singer for the duo of Etta (James) and Harvey, and they had success with "If I Can't Have You" and "Spoonful." In 1959, for one year, Fuqua served as the director of artists and repertoire for Anna Records, out of Detroit, Michigan. In 1961, he formed Tri-Phi Records as a pop label and Harvey Records, as a rhythm and blues label. He also formed the Fuqua Publishing Company, Tri-Phi Publishing and Birdsong Publishing. Two years later, Tri-Phi and Harvey Records were acquired by Motown Records, and Fuqua became an executive in the sales department at Motown.

Besides his current production company, Fuqua owns a management company, Kevmon Mgt. and the Rutri Publishing Company. When he's not in an airplane, Fuqua makes his home in Louisville, Kentucky.

What makes the unison so important is the fact that promoters who book the act are able to get an entire evening of entertainment by booking the complete package. Also important is the fact that all of the members of the group have performed, rehearsed, and enjoyed each others company for so long, that they can anticipate every move whether improvised or rehearsed. It's an interesting idea, and Fuqua has already proved that it works.

HAPPY AND ARTIE TRAUM-WHERE HAVE ALL THE FOLKIES GONE?

Most artists will sit up and growl when you label their music folk, much like a dog will react to the word "cat." Above and beyond an understandable distrust of short, all-inclusive phrases to describe anyone's music, performers dislike the term "folk" because if you look in that bin in record shops, you find dusty relics of a forgotten period—they have since moved **Dylan**, **Baez**, **Collins** and all the real "heavies" to the rock section. And while most will mouth platitudes about Woody Guthrie, they don't want their LPs filed next to his.

Happy & Artie Traum have only certain reservations about the label, and not your usual ones. They are proud to be products of what was called the "folk revival" and their credentials are stronger than most. If they dislike being called "folk," it's only because they are modest—they would rather the term be reserved for performers of long standing like Pete Seeger—legends in their own time. Happy & Artie aren't legendary, but being the singular talents that they are in a world gone gimmic crazy, they certainly will qualify soon. Happy (for all intents and purposes, his real name) is the elder brother and

began his recording career with a track on a Broadside sampler in '62 which also featured one Blind Boy Grunt. 1963 saw him join a group of the times, The New World Singers (Atlantic), being the first to record "Blowin' In The Wind" and "Don't Think Twice" (two of Blind Boy Grunt's early successes). He served as a major contributor and editor of the still (but just barely) surviving Sing Out! magazine. He moved to Woodstock in '68, but more of that later. All through his performing career, he has written numerous books on guitar guiding the seeker

to areas such as fingerpicking, blues and rock. (Happy's never been clannish). Artie, the younger, served as sideman for **The Lovin' Spoonful** for a spell, but was at home with **Jean Ritchi**e and a group which began the jug band revival, True Endeavor Jug Band (which also boasted Danny Kalb and Sam Charters), as well. With Happy, he became part of a rock band, Children of Paradise, which (without Happy) became Bear and wrote and performed the score of the first anti-draft film (the first at least that was any fun), "Greetings." Somewhere in there, he managed to leave Danny Kalb's Quartet before they became the Blues Project. No regrets, though.

Artie soon joined Happy in Woodstock to settle down, of sorts. Getting together as an act (two LPs on Capitol and currently negotiating for a new con-tract with another diskery) brought them closer together rather than further apart. While they don't live like Siamese twins, their music is increasingly reflecting the blend of personalities and if it is folk music, well, let us rejoice.

Official bios usually are chocked-full of meaningless (if not mis-) information, but theirs' glows with one line that really sums up their approach to song. "The first three listenings may find you humming la-la-la, but on the fourth the words pop out." With so many singer-songwriters around, it should be praise enough for an act when a listener gets to the fourth listen without being dragged there. Happy & Artie are carriers and their music's contagious.

NEW YORK-HAPPINESS IS NEVER HAVING TO HATE YOUR PAST

There are old stand-by queries that interviewers have to get in there, even though they're as tired of asking them as the artists are of trying to make each answer seem unique. Perhaps the biggest of them all is, "Well, what have you done before this?'

This is a put-down of sorts-you wouldn't ask that of The Stones, The Beatles or even Little Richard. Unless you were trying to antagonize them or make yourself look stupid. No, this is a question you ask of an alleged "newcomer" always knowing that if it is meaningful at all, you may still look stupid for not having gone to the trouble of finding out for yourself. But many times you can cite your busy schedule as an excuse for not reading a bio first, or you can occasionally uncover things that might have passed over the heads of the PR people who write such fun things. Or under.

Some acts won't talk about past deeds because their music has broken with their before, usually for good reason. But smile if you feel like smiling as the tale unravels and frequently an interesting anecdote or two will uncurl before your very notepad or cassette.

Kim Carnes is a very attractive singer-songwriter whom I would have much rather met under less professional circumstances, but when I seemed genuinely interested in the fact that she was once the Clairol Summer Blond girl, things began to open up. (Oh admit it too, smug one. You watch that thing and remember what you've seen as well!) Kim also wiped off a Scotch-Guarded couch, thumbed her fingers through the Yellow Pages and was the original United Airlines girl in another life as TV commercial actress, one which might have kept her from writing or recording at all had it not slowed down a bit for her a short while ego.

Somewhere along the line, she did get into music of sorts, as the "third inter-changeable blond" in the New Christy Minstrels. But she admits the material she had to carry with her from college one-niter to college one-niter was a personal bore, for the most part. But through her rather anonymous stint in the group, she did form lasting friendships with Kenny Rogers and the original members of the First Edition and meeting Mike Settle eventually brought her to write the theme for the movie "Vanishing Point." Big Mama Thornton sang the song

("Sing Out Strong For Jesus") and it got 'em both off. Kim's first LP is on Amos ("Rest On Me," dist. by Bell) and if you think you'd like to get into the music of a singer who's kind of a cross between Rita Coolidge and Carole King, you might find an ex-Christy Minstrel TV commercial lady right up your alley.

Billy Joel's past runs through so many groups, he can hardly remember them all. There was the Lost Souls (Mercury), The Commandos (Jubilee), The Hassles (United Artists) and then there were those piano sessions for The Shangri-Las. As a singer, he used to hold true to that Long Island philosophy that you were only as good as your vibrato was long. After tiring of stretching words into miles, he became half of Atilla (Epic), a drum-organ ensemble "who Lee Michaels had to come along and kill." This was not longevity but decibel rock, and this too proved unsatisfying. "Yeah, we'd get standing ovations" Billy muses. "Every-one would clap as they ran for the door."

Now soloing as a singer/songwriter on Family (his LP is "Cold Spring Harbor"), he seems to be able to throw both vibrato and volume off his list without the least bit of difficulty, relying instead on his own verbal wit and musical versatility (drawn from classical training only seeing Lorin Hollander in concert stopped). The man who as a boy faked Beethoven by playing it all by ear to please his opera-singing parents is still a musical skeptic. Never content with any one style, he still in his own words "likes to get obnoxious" every once in a while for the hell of it.

He once boasted that what Hendrix was to guitar, he was to organ. Now he lets his music speak for itself in whatever tone of voice seems most appropriate.



WEST COAST GIRL OF THE WEEK-Last week in this space we tossed off a dozen or so names—our favorite new acts of '71. Among favorite new acts of '71. Among them, Kim Carnes, an astonishing blonde and a rarity of rarities—a na-tive Angeleno. Kim, who recently completed her first solo album ("Rest on Me") has been touring and rec-ording for the past few years, ever since she was graduated from high school. We encountered her first, back in '69, thumping a tambourine against her thigh with the New Christy Min-strels. It was early in '71 that she visited Jimmy Bowen with a few of her comps and he promptly signed favorite new acts them, Kim Carnes, visited Jimmy Bowen with a few of her comps and he promptly signed her to a recording contract with Amos. Kim has composed songs for Kenny Rogers and the First Edition. Big Mama Thornton, and her voice was featured in the soundtrack to the "Vanishing Point" flick.


HOLLYWOOD: DENNIS COFFEY-WHITE, BUT STRONG

We were down at the Continental Hotel the other day, on our usual evening rounds of searching for the Superstars in their natural habitat, when whom should we meet up with but flash Detroit session guitarist Dennis Coffey.

One of the few musicians to make the rounds between Motown and the Holland-Dozier-Holland complex ("I refuse to play politics . . . only music"), the 32 year-old guitarist began playing in rock and roll bands and wound up spending five years studying music theory at Wayne State University in Detroit. His first session for Motown was the Temptations' "Cloud Nine" single and album ("Norman Whitfield, their producer, lets me do pretty much what I want. He's a good friend of mine."). Since then, he has been on all the Temptations' records; most Motown sessions, in fact. He harbors especially strong feelings for Valerie Simpson ("her charts are the hardest I've ever seen to read, but they're just fantastic") for being the first to break the long-time Motown taboo on crediting musicians on record jackets.

Coffee seems pleased with the success of his Sussex single "Scorpio" not so much because of the added income and prestige it will bring him, but because it's the fruition of many months of work. "I have a tape recorded in my basement that will go sound-on-sound. I worked out all the tunes and all the parts on it before we went into the studio."

GUITAR BOOGIE—Eric Clapton, Jeff Beck, Jimmy Page—RCA—LSP-4624 (e) If you remember the RCA British Archives Series, then you remember all of the selections included in this one album that features three of England's finest and most respected guitar-ists. All previously contained in the BAS vol-umes 1-4. "Guitar Boogie" represents some of the earlier material recorded by Clapton, Beck and Page long before they were known to us. Clapton and Page share the spotlight on "Choker," "Draggin' My Tail," and "Freight Loader," while the remaining seven selections feature the three individually. JERUSALEM-Horst Jankowski-Beverly Hills

BHS 32 The man who took us for "A Walk In The Black Forest" returns to guide us on another piano dominated tour—one which goes to "Jerusalem." This is an album of rare artistry. It includes Jankowski interpretations of such recent classics as "The Windmills Of Your Mind," "Eleanor Rigby," "Gentle On My Mind" anad "El Condor Pasa." Also featured is the duo's new single, the Dolly Parton-penned "Down From Dover," a melo-dramatic but moving little number.

RUBY JONES—Curtom CRS 8011 Once you get into the voice of Ruby Jones (and that may take quite a few listening ses-sions) you may well begin to really enjoy this initial album from the group which bears her name. With a somewhat speedy approach to song, Ruby tries her hand on nine songs in-cluding the Curtis Mayfield number "Stone Junkie." We could have done without some of the echo effects and predictable horn arrange-ments but we found much to applaud on tracks such as "99,000 Times" and "45th Street." Could click in a big way.

Brenda Lee is more than a misty memory. Beginning her career as a child popstar, she is now concentrating on the country market. RONNIE DOVE (Decca 32919) Kiss The Hurt Away (2:42) (Mydov/Chu-Fin, BMI—C. Reed, F. Duncan)

Popster Ronnie Dove comes up with a slow c&w torch song in true traditional form. His vocals bridge a gap between pop and country that should earn this tune substantial airplay in both listener markets. Flip: "He Cries Like A Baby" (2:32) (Moss Rose, BMI-D. Wilkins).

RUNNING BEAR (Curtain Call 357121)

See The Eagle Die (2:00) (Blanket, BMI-C. D. Draper)

Given Indian tom tom treatment, this tune has a clever angle. Using the Indian point of view in a c&w tune, Running Bear makes a very timely statement about how the White Man is ruining his own natural resources. Keaton Travel Bureau in Nashville, Tennessee is handling all details of the tour with deadline for reserva-tions set for February 25, 1972.

The first nine months of 1971 have seen an overall growth rate of only six per cent over 1970 with sales totalling £27.1 million and production reaching 84.4 million records. This modest increase reflects the generally stagnant atmosphere which looms over the British econom-

Outside are the united forces of eleven Record Companies (Ariston, Carosello-Curci, Decca, Durium, EMI, Fonit-Cetra, Phonogram, RiFi, Saar, Sif, Vedette) that, being in agreement for the first time in their history, are making a strong effort for getting substantial changements in the Festival's rules; inside are the City Mayor's forces (the members of the Administration's Commission) that, even declaring themselves available to all possible concessions, on the other hand cannot be insensible to the dilatory and not clear action of the three other big Companies (RCA, CBS-Sugar, Ri-cordi) that give the impression to be willing to keep alive the old system under the management of Mr. Ravera and Mr. Radaelli (not to be forgotten that many people say that last year these three Companies got 34 places for their artists on the total of 48 available). The latest act of the run-ning battle is the bulletin recently sent out by the Eleven's Headquarter that, under the title of "New Invita-tion of Phonografics for a Democratic San Remo", states: "The undersigned companies had a

San Remo", states: "The undersigned companies had a "The undersigned companies had a meeting to discuss the Agenda re-garding the XXII Festival of San Remo, agenda which had been already fixed and passed on to the press. The meeting was arranged with the aim to reach a unity among the phonograph-ic industries and in this intent the legal representatives of CBS-Sugar, RCA and Ricordi have been invited again with the most open spirit of co-operation. During such a meeting

a telegram from RCA was received asking for an adjournment to the following day, owing to previous en-gagements of theirs.

Lately, during the said meeting, a cable has been received from Guido Rignano, general manager of the Ri-cordi Company, saying that previous undelayable engagement prevented him to join the meeting and pointing out that several pointing of the aronda out that several points of the agenda were not agreeable to him. The "Elevwere not agreeable to him. The "Elev-en" noted that Rignano's telegram a) does not correspond to the agenda already forecast and of which Ricordi was aware; b) is contrasting with positions already set up and previous-ly agreed; c) signifying the dissent about the possible participation of 36 songs/singers (agreed unanimously about the possible participation of 36 songs/singers (agreed unanimously with the legal representatives of CBS-Sugar, RCA and Ricordi during the meeting of Oct. 25th), actually this would mean a reduction to 24 from 48 of the artists performing. As a consequence of Rignano's position, the Eleven Companies are brought to understand that Ricordi, by its policy, wants practically to

brought to understand that Ricordi, by its policy, wants practically to exclude the possibility of such a dia-logue on the San Remo Festival. As regard to CBS-Sugar that has pre-ferred to show no opinion at all, the "Eleven" assume that CBS-Sugar is not interested in an action of unity of the sector for a manifestation based only on criteria of equity and renova-tion. tion.

Row Over Royal Albert Hall 'No' To Isaac Hayes Concert

LONDON — The management com-mittee of the Royal Albert Hall found itself embroiled in a major row in the

itself embroiled in a major row in the pre-Christmas week after its mem-bers decided to withdraw their origi-nal agreement to allow promoter Arthur Howes to present the British debut concert by Isaac Hayes at the venue on Jan. 24. The committee's decision was pri-marily inspired by an article in the Sunday Times, which contrasted the musical styles of Hayes and James Brown. Earlier in the year, incidents at a James Brown concert at the Hall involving members of the audi-ence and commissionaires resulted in Brown being banned from future appearances at the venue, and the committee were apparently appre-hensive that Hayes would attract a similarly ebullient audience.

Dolby Japan Visit

LONDON—Dolby Laboratories exec Adrian Horne, licensing manager, and David Robinson, chief engineer, have just returned from a three week trip to Japan.

They were joined during their last week by Ray Dolby and were assisted throughout by their Tokyo office Atsushi Suzuki. During this time the team visited more than a dozen Dolby B-Type licensees in Tokyo, Nagoya, and Osaka, where they discussed technical and marketing questions re-lated to noise reduction. David Robin-son commented, "A splendid array of hardware is in the pipeline. We hope some will be available within the next two or three months. Almost all our licensees have new B-Type hardware scheduled for the Consumer Elec-tronics Show in Chicago."

tronics Show in Chicago.' Several new potential licensees were visited, and licensing agree-ments with them are expected in the near future. "Resistance is declining," declared Adrian Horne. "The heavy demand experienced by our existing licensees is a real stimulus to new licensees."

A high point of the trip was the signing of a license agreement with Sony Corporation. Sony's decision on noise reduction has been awaited in the consumer electronics industry with considerable interest, because of the company's record as a technical and marketing leader. The curious decision was savagely attacked in both musical and national press and by Polydor Records who released the Stax "Shaft" album and single here, as "archaic and out-rageous." Promoter Arthur Howes, who claimed to have already sold the six thousand-odd seats for the single concert via advance orders. single concert via advance orders, bore the verdict stoically and re-funded all monies decling to comment. Although most of London's major pop concert promoters view the commitconcert promoters view the commit-tee's reasoning processes with dismay they are individually reluctant to voice their discontent and risk losing the only sizeable concert hall in cen-tral London for future concerts. Hayes' European tour has now been re-arranged and he will play two concerts at the 3,000 seater Rainbow Theater on Jan. 27 and 28.

EDITORIAL: The Route Facelift

"Come and get it or I'll throw it away!" was the well-known cry of the mess sergeant back in service days. It can also be the mournful cry of the marginal location owner, bone-tired of looking at the same old music box, game and/or pool table in his place; tired also of reading the disinterest in his customers' faces when he suggests that someone might play one of them.

It is not the nature of coin operated music and amusement machines to move onto a location floor and stay there, generating top play, until the "cows come home". Since this is a novelty business, the machines must be changed when their appearance becomes so familiar to the customers they start to blend right into the wallpaper. Even the good old pool table has got to get a face lift from time to time, else play is gonna fall off as sure as the sun sets every night.

The trouble with today's operating business is that the routes are bigger than they ever were-fewer routes, of course, but the biggest in history. When an operation becomes so large, a good number of stops, especially those classified as "marginal", tend to be ignored. Sure, they're collected from and a new record or two is tossed onto the juke, but they're not taken very seriously . . . not until, however, the owner calls and says "get this junk out or I'll throw it out." Why? Well, maybe a new operator's coming in to fill a service gap you unconsciously created.

Point is, it's human nature to ignore anyone or anything that doesn't complain. When collections fall off in any given stop, the operator's first thought is "that's a bum location anyway." Maybe the blame more properly belongs on the machines, and not on some vague generality like a "bum location."

Every tradester must remember that jukes and games vend entertainment, not a commodity like a pack of cigarettes. A new cigarette machine won't sell any more smokes than an old one (all columns being equal), but a new juke will sell more music than its predecessor because it's selling that intangible thing called entertainment. So once again the story comes back to machine rotation. It may be an old eyesore to some operators to see those words in print, but, a fluid policy where fresh machines re-place old ones in every location is the soundest way to increase earnings . . . even earnings in the most marginal of stops.




