

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EDITORI*A*L Realistic Business Returns

It appears that the record industry's longstanding policy of 100% returns may be coming to an end, following the recent establishment of return ceilings by CBS and Polygram.

It remains to be seen whether or not this is a viable alternative to guaranteed sale of records and tapes. But what is important to note is that the manufacturers perceived — and rightly so — that 1979's unusually high level of returns was a major impediment to industry growth. And they decided to do something about it.

The pros and cons of putting a ceiling on the amount of merchandise dealers can return are well documented. Manufacturers that support such a limit contend that retailers should share the risks, as well as the rewards, of being in business. Conversely, dealers say that they would be unable to operate at peak efficiency without the assurance that they can return unsold goods for full credit.

Ideally, a compromise exists between these two positions. We would like to see a return policy that is flexible enough to encourage whole-hearted retail support without forcing manufacturers to offer unrealistic deals in order to achieve maximum product penetration.

In the meantime, we hope that other manufacturers who are considering the possibility of changing their return policies will offer plans that a) take into account the unique needs of the various types of accounts (i.e. racks, retailers, subdistributors); b) include provisions for new or developing artists; and that c) allow for a smooth period of transition.



Performance Rights Hearings Slated To Begin In November

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Proponents of the controversial performance rights bill, H.R. 997, will have a better chance than ever before to push the legislation through Congress when the House Judiciary Subcommittee begins hearings on the bill next month.

That is the opinion of Bruce Lehman, subcommittee counsel, who told Cash Box: "Quite clearly, the proponents are in a stronger position than ever before

Lehman added that backers of the bill, introduced last January by Rep. George Danielson (D-Calif.), have witnessed "a dramatic leap" in support since the last

Co-Sponsors Line Up

A strong indication of the increased support for the bill came last week when an additional 47 members of Congress signed on as co-sponsors.

The battle for a performance right, which would entitle those who own copyrights on sound recordings to collect royalties when others perform their works in public or via radio/TV, has a stormy history dating back to the 1940s. The controversial issue resurfaced in the early '70s during hearings on the new Copyright Act.

Columbia Pictures Closes Sale Of Arista To Ariola

NEW YORK - Columbia Pictures Industries, Inc. has completed the sale of its Arista Records subsidiary to Ariola-Aurodisc, GmbH, a subsidiary of the European-based conglomerate, Bertelsmann AG

Columbia received "in excess" of \$50 million in cash for Arista, according to a company statement. While this was the same amount that had been announced earlier, Columbia stated that it had realized a smaller gain on the transaction than had been expected. The company's gain was approximately \$4 million, or 41 cents per share, compared with the profit of \$7 million, or 72 cents per share, that had originally been predicted.

According to Joseph A. Fischer, executive vice president of Columbia Pictures, the lower gain on the sale "had to do with the change in equity and the intercompany account" in the finalization of the deal. In simple terms, he explained, it turned out that Arista owed CPI more than had

The proposed royalty rate, which a Copyright Office study found to be "fair and not overly burdensome," would be as follows: 1% of advertising receipts for stations with revenues over \$200,000 a year; \$750 for stations with annual revenues of \$100,000 to \$200,000; and \$250 for stations with yearly revenues of between \$25,000 and \$100,000. Stations with annual revenues of under \$25,000 would be exempted under the bill.

NEW YORK — As a result of the minimum purchase requirements recently established by some major labels, the nation's one-stops are anticipating and, in certain cases, have already seen an increase in their business as small and medium-sized retailers start to buy more conservatively. Whether the current upswing is in direct response to the new policies, to the arrival of several major new releases or to the coming of the holiday season is still unclear. But most one-stops contacted by Cash Box feel that they are now in a good position to increase their penetration in the marketplace. The true picture, they say, should emerge in January of 1980, with the holiday season over and the advent of return ceilings on CBS and Polygram product.

Should business increase appreciably for the one-stops, it will probably be in the servicing of 45s to those accounts unable to purchase singles in configurations of 25 per selection. An increase in their LP business could also be realized after the returns ceilings are fully instituted.

Although this policy has been adopted by both Polygram and CBS, retail sources have indicated that CBS will probably reduce the minimum figure because many accounts seem unwilling to commit themselves to such a high figure. In addition, sources said, the policy was hindering the movement of the company's oldie singles series, since few dealers ever bought as many as 25 of a given selection

Conversations with one-stops and retailers of various sizes point to the fact that retailers who normally buy direct are consolidating their orders on both LPs and singles and purchasing fill from the onestops to hold them over. Though some dealers privately admit that they are losing ad dollars in the process, they note that this

is one way to show their displeasure with the manufacturers

Although the majority of one-stops stand to benefit from the new policies, there are others that stand to lose business because cost price increases to them have risen to the degree that it now makes it cheaper for

FCC Unit Backs Renewal Of RKO General's TV License

The Broadcast Bureau said its decision was based on the fact that General Tire's payoffs were unrelated to broadcasting and did not affect WNAC-TV or the Boston station's ability to serve the public interest.

Court Rules In Sony's Favor On Home Videotaping Case

LOS ANGELES - After three years of litigation, the legality of home videotaping of free off-the-air television broadcasts was upheld by a Federal Judge here Oct. 2.

Universal/MCA and Walt Disney Studios were denied all requests for injunctive relief

and damages in their lawsuit to prevent Sony Corporation from manufacturing and selling its Betamax home videotape recorders. Claims of copyright law violations by home videotaping were dismissed by Judge Warren J. Ferguson who said that Congress "didn't intend to include the reproduction of ...recordings for home use" in copyright legislation and that copyright holders "have monopoly power only over those uses of their works that Congress has protected through legisla-

Recession Cuts Major Label Jazz Support Yet Companies Still Pursue Elusive Market

- Jazz music appears to be one of the victims of the soft record sales that have dominated 1979, especially in terms of the marketing priority it commands today at the major record com-

Five of the major labels — A&M, Atlantic, Capitol, Polydor and RCA — for example, have issued a minimal number of contemporary jazz releases this year, if any at all, and none of the labels have indicated that this policy will change.

Moreover, according to executives from labels that still do have a commitment to jazz — including Columbia, Elektra/Asylum and Warner Bros. — soft sales in 1979 have resulted in a much more cautious budgetary attitude within their companies. This has translated, they say, into fewer signings, a more careful scrutiny of their current rosters, less merchandising leeway and more difficulty in breaking developing

In addition, RCA recently stopped distributing the Bethlehem jazz line. TK Records severed its ties with Sonny Lester's jazz-oriented LRC label, and A&M Records has dissolved its Horizon line. which was headed by noted jazz producer

To be sure, there have also been notable successes in the jazz field thus far this year. Albums by the Crusaders on MCA Records, Spyro Gyra on Infinity Records, George Benson on Warner Bros., Herbie Hancock, Bob James and Weather Report on Columbia and Grover Washington, Jr., on Elektra/Asylum have all enjoyed outstanding sales success. And such labels as Arista, ECM and Inner City have all taken an

Petty Album Due

LOS ANGELES — Tom Petty's "Damn The Torpedoes," is set to ship Oct. 26 and marks the debut album release for the MCA-distributed Backstreet label.

Yet the prevailing industry attitude towards jazz is one of caution. "Jazz as a whole is still in the developmental stage in terms of major record companies." commented Vernon Slaughter, vice president of jazz/progressive marketing for CBS Records. "It's still a growing area, and there's always a tendency by the companies when times are hard to go with the safe areas. That's the danger that may happen at certain companies.

While conceding that sales have "been down across the board," Slaughter said that he does not foresee "any drastic surgery" in store for Columbia's jazz division, and, in fact, he termed 1979 "more successful than last year in terms of jazz sales."

Selective On Signings

Dr. George Butler, vice president of A&R for the jazz/progressive division of CBS Records, added, however, that the company now "has to be very selective in terms of signings amid the reality that has hit the business. We are operating under strict guidelines in terms of signings, budget, and spending dollars for recording dates.'

Butler said that Tony Williams was the only artist who has been dropped from the

Slaughter cited the overall sales dip in 1979 as one reason for the cautious attitude towards jazz throughout the industry. "The dip," he said, "says that the retailer has less dollars to buy records, so you're going to get hurt." He also blamed "the tunnel vision of radio, particularly AOR radio, for severely limiting the amount of exposure the music gets. And the success of any area of music is dependent on the amount of exposure it gets."

Ron Goldstein, director of jazzprogressive music for Warner Bros., felt that jazz has also been the victim of "a stocking problem. This was not caused by any lack of production or effort at WEA," he added, "it's just that the stores to a great extent are closing us out."



Pat Benatar

After listening to Pat Benatar's music, the only doubt one is left with is whether her most impressive quality is her striking multi-octave vocal range or the variety of uses to which her voice can be put. Her debut Chrysalis album, "In the Heat of the Night," has a similar impact. It is a dramatic showcase for her near-operatic range and covers a striking diversity of material, from teary-eyed torch songs to hard-nosed rock and roll. Benatar admits to a taste in music far more widely ranging than most.

It is, perhaps, her love for the classic British rock 'n' roll singers, such as Robert Plant and Roger Daltrey, coupled with an early background of regular voice lessons, that makes her own vocal style so unique and original.

"When I was in school, I liked lots of rock and roll, from Led Zeppelin to the girls groups, but I also studied legitimate singing and sang cabaret, and it hangs over."

After graduating from high school, Benatar forsook her singing aspirations for marriage, but when her husband Dennis went into the army and was stationed in South Carolina, Benatar managed to take a circuitous route from waitressing to cabaret singing, "where I got tired of being told I sounded like Barbra Streisand once a night," to her first genuine rock and roll band. She describes the latter as "a great experience because I'd never performed like that before."

Still infected by the rock and roll bug, Benatar pursued singing in New York where she had returned with her husband after he left the army.

Her first real break came when she auditioned at the showcase club, "Catch A Rising Star." Club owner Rick Newman was impressed enough with Benatar to take on her management. Newman got Benatar a few well-placed gigs, which was followed by highly enthusiastic press, a TV spot with Bruce Morrow, and a contract with Chrysalis Records.

At that point, however, the dominoes began to fall less quickly. While she impressed super-producer Mike Chapman enough so that he broke a vow not to take any additional production assignments, she had to wait nearly a year before he could make time for her.

"Waiting was frustrating," recalls Pat. "I couldn't go out and perform from September until now, but it was worth the wait."

The album is unique. While it has the classic teen pop sheen that Chapman's productions are noted for, Benatar's underlying emotional intensity makes the record different from any other produced by Chapman.

"There's a blend on the album that exists because everybody has their own style," says Benatar "Chapman has his, there are members of my band that have strong personalities: and I have mine. It's hard to dop all I've been influenced by and I still like to sing the kinds of ballads that meet the high part of my voice."

Pat and her band are just now completing a grueling schedule of rehearsals that will finally put her back in the public eye. "We'll be going out to tour soon and then we'll go back into the studio, again with Chapman. This interview is the longest chance I've had to sit down in months. This schedule is driving me off the deep end, but I love every minute of it."



Blue Steel

Blue Steel is an affable quintet of western musical desperados whose debut Infinity LP, "No More Lonely Nights," has seemingly come out of nowhere to hit the **Cash Box** Top 200 albums chart at #169 in just three weeks. The members of this new rock unit are hardly greenhorns, however, as Blue Steel was recently chosen to open for the Eagles on their upcoming tour of the LIS

Though the group in its present form actually didn't come together until a relatively short time ago, the ballad of Blue Steel began in the mid-sixties, when lead guitarist Richard Bowden was playing in a Texas-based band named Felicity with future Eagle Don Henley. That group was managed by Howard Burke, currently rhythm guitarist for Blue Steel.

"I was basically road manager for the band then," said Burke. "We gigged at a lot of fraternity parties in this days, during which time I earned my nickname 'Immaculate Load' for being the roadie."

Burke went into the Air Force when he was drafted and Bowden moved to southern California, where he put two unsuccessful bands together, Shiloh and Lone Star, the latter with cousin Michael Bowden and "Sneaky" Pete Kleinow.

"Lone Star cut a demo tape together, which we sold to Ariola Holland for about \$600, stated the burly Bowden. "They changed the name to 'Sneaky Pete and Cold Steel'."

Bowden went on to join Linda Ronstadt's backup group in 1971, with friend Henley and Glenn Frey, only to split shortly after her "Don't Cry Now" LP to play with Roger McGuinn. When Burke returned from the service, he took up road manager responsibilities for a number of artists, including Jackson Browne.

Bowden eventually ended up playing with the group Fool's Gold. "I was added on to take up the slack," Bowden said. "I did two tours with the band, opening for Boz Scaggs and then Loggins and Messina."

Frustrated with his role in Fool's Gold, Bowden moved on once again and took a year off to put together his own demo tape for Elektra/Asylum. E/A passed on the tape, so he started shopping it on his own to little avail. Things began to gel, though, when Bowden hooked up with guitarist Leonard Arnold, an old friend from North Texas State, and called up Burke, then road manager for Warren Zevon.

"Leonard, Richard, myself and a rhythm machine all got together to create 'Crate Jam 1' and 'Crate Jam 2'," said Burke. "It was the beginning of the group."

The trio brought in drummer Mickey McGhee, who in turn enlisted the aid of bassist Marc Durham, now a permanent member. After adopting Leonard's C.B. handle (also a southern slang term), the band played a series of showcases in L.A. before finally settling on a contract with Infinity. McGee left the group shortly after the LP was completed and the band spirited drummer Michael Huey, who played briefly with the band as an original member, away from Walter Egan's group. Huey's addition was the final weld on Blue Steel's structure.

Bowden said that the band has "about five or six new songs" for the upcoming tour and second LP, which they plan on recording early next year, if all goes according to schedule. There is little doubt that hard rockin' Blue Steel is here to stay.

Small Retailers Give Budget Convention A Distinct Flavor

DENVER, COLO. — The most unusual aspect of Budget Tapes and Records' recent convention, held at the Regency Hotel here Sept. 25-28, was that record suppliers were not meeting with employees of a single company, but with a number of small business owners. For these franchised retailers, representing 85 out of Budget's more than 90 outlets, this convention was their one opportunity of the year to meet directly with manufacturers' reps and to contact the mainstream of the record business.

Budget has held meetings of its store owners for the past two years, but each of those conferences was held in two parts, one in Denver and the other in Seattle. This year's meeting, attended by 150 people, was the chain's first unified national convention.

Supplied by the Danjay One-Stop in Denver and the PJL One-Stop in Seattle, Budget Tapes and Records has grown into a truly national chain since its inception in 1970. It's stores can now be found in a 20-state area stretching from Wisconsin to Anchorage, Alaska, but despite the size of the retail web, no one franchise owns more than six stores, and few own more than two or three.

Evan Lasky, president of Budget, explained that much of the chain's success stems from the fact that it is comprised of small retailers who know their own markets. Due to the volatile nature of the record business and the "alterations" of individual markets, said Lasky, it is impossible to run a large retail operation properly from a central location. "A guy can't sit in L.A. and figure out what's really happening in the field." he remarked.

Don't Depend On Radio

Lasky noted that Budget storeowners aggressively promote new music and don't worry about the amount of superstar

product in current release. "They've learned not to depend on product or even on radio." he stated. Adding that, especially in sparsely settled areas, radio can't be counted on to play the records that are selling nationally. "You have to be willing to get behind a piece of product you believe in and work it in the stores." said Lasky.

Budget franchises also have plenty of latitude in designing their stores and in merchandising records. However, coop ad money and merchandising materials provided by the record labels are funneled to the Budget stores through Danjay and PJL. In addition, Lasky is always ready to advise his franchisees on such matters as size of inventory, how much to order, etc. "We are total baby sitters." he commented.

'Conservative Growth'

Budget enjoys a "healthy" sales increase and a 15-20% profit rise in 1979, according to Lasky. Nevertheless, the chain is continuing to follow a policy of "conservative growth." This year, for instance, six Budget stores were closed. 10 new outlets were opened, and several other units were enlarged or moved to better locations.

"That to me is the best kind of growth," said Lasky, "because you're improving the quality of the situation and you're increasing your profitability."

Lasky expected to open 10-12 new

"The Ronald McDonald Discovery Series promises to be one of the most exciting retail programs ever offered the American public," Bogart said.


Marketing plans are extensive, according to KidWorks president, Merenstein, and the series will also be available through a special Ronald McDonald Book and Record club.

CBS Initiates Fall Program, Weighs Revision

NEW YORK — CBS Records has revised its earlier stated policy concerning fall programs and is considering a revision of its minimum order policy for seven-inch product.

The program to retailers and rack jobbers involves 45 current and major catalog record and tape titles and will run from Oct. 1-19. Among the artists involved in the program are Billy Joel, Bruce Springsteen, Bob Dylan, Karla Bonoff, Meat Loaf, and the O'Jays. Ten free records will be offered for every 110 purchased.

There is also speculation that the company will reduce from 25 the number of singles now required for order on a given selection.

ASCAP Sues Jukebox Operators In 12 States

NEW YORK — ASCAP has stepped up its campaign against unlicensed jukebox operators by filing 35 lawsuits in Federal courts in 12 states including California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Washington. The plaintiffs are members of ASCAP whose songs are played without permission.

Under the compulsory license system which was passed as part of the new copyright law, a jukebox operator may obtain the right to perform all copyrighted music for \$8 per year per jukebox by registering the jukebox with and paying the fee to the United States Copyright Office.

According to an ASCAP spokesman, juke box operators have failed to pay millions of dollars yearly to composers, authors, and publishers.

ASCAP previously brought a number of lawsuits against unlicensed jukebox operators who paid their fees soon after they were sued.

Warner Bros. Kills Early Airplay On Fleetwood Mac LP

LOS ANGELES — Warner Bros. Records delivered a cease and desist order to the RKO radio chain on Oct. 4 in response to the network's premature broadcasting of an unauthorized copy of the new Fleetwood Mac LP, "Tusk." According to Bob Merlis, director of publicity at Warner Bros., the RKO stations ceased playing the record once the papers were served.

"We are contemplating further legal action," said Merlis. He also said that no advance copies were sent to any radio stations and that "Tusk" is still set for release Oct 12

Among the stations that allegedly aired the unauthorized LP are: KHJ-AM and KRTH-FM in Los Angeles and WXLO-FM in New York.

RADIO OF THE FUTURE? — "In a threesome situation, one person must take the lead, and the other two must cooperate." Not exactly your typical public service announcement, is it? How about "if a single woman wishes to lure a married man, she has to make the first move, because a married man will be reluctant to approach her." What's going on here, you ask? Wait, there's more: "If a woman wishes to be picked up at a bar, she should sit at the bar instead of in a booth, because men will be more likely to approach her there." Those pearls, folks, are now being broadcast over WGMA in Miami as part of the station's new format, called "The Lady — For Singles Only." WGMA vice president and general manager Jim Glassman recruited consultant Bill Cunningham and program director Dave Denver, and after "a lot of research" they concluded that

"lifestyle" was very important to their south Florida listening audience. "Adults 18-49 are interested in being hip," Glassman said, adding that "we found the majority of married adults 18-49 missed the fringe benefits of the single life style. Sexual fantasies, therefore, are an important, healthy aspect of their everyday lives." As a result, Glassman decided to make "lifestyle" the cornerstone of his new format, affecting news and music. "We'll carry very few national or local news stories," Glassman enthused. "We're in the business of entertaining people. For example, we didn't carry Carter's speech about Cuba. Our news is who's divorcing who . . ." Sort of like People magazine? "Yes, that comes close," Glassman agreed. Musically, WGMA

switched from country to "adult contemporary mass appeal" featuring "name groups" like Barry Manilow, Rita Coolidge and the Doobie Brothers. However, fans of Conway Twitty, Johnny Cash, Mel TillIs, et al, were none too pleased by the format change, especially when a WGMA jock spent Sept. 30 "making fun of country music in a light-hearted way." Well, after remarks such as questioning Conway Twitty's gender, several pickup trucks carrying about 20 armed men showed up at the station, and the irate country fans started pounding on the building with sticks and lead pipes. Soon the DJ's control booth was under attack, and it wasn't until the jock appealed for police help over the air that the attackers fled the scene. Glassman says he's received bomb threats and threats to burn the building down, but he's sticking with the "For Singles Only" approach. "The response has been phenomenal" he said.

Castor, best known for his classic soul/jive records, "Bertha Butt" and "Hey LeRoi (Your Mama's Calling You)," started out in business in the late fifties as a 12year-old contemporary of Frankie Lymon ... B.B. King has sung all kinds of blues songs, but "Wall Street Blues"? Yes, that's the Beale St. Blues Boy himself singing the theme song for the hit ABC-TV series, "The Associates" . . . Want to join the fight to legalize prostitution? Margo St. James' annual "Masquerade Ball" comes to Roseland Dance City Oct. 16. Tickets are \$40 . . BJ Hollywood, a New York phenomenon whose rap is nearly as popular as the records he plays, will record a "disco rap" album for Treeline Records . . . The old West Side airlines terminal on 42nd St. and Tenth Avenue is slated to become the new home of National Recording Studios. It's all part of New York's multi-million dollar 42nd St. redevelopment project.

THIS TIME IT'S HER TIME — "This Time Baby" marked a dramatic return to the top of the charts for Jackie Moore. The last time she occupied such a lofty chart spot was in 1971 when she scored a gold record with "Precious, Precious" on Atlantic. But the following years were not exactly successful ones for Moore. She wasn't able to follow up "Precious, Precious" with another hit, and besides severe bouts of depression, her husband, Calvin Hopkins, came right out and told her she was "too fat." With a doctor's assistance and Hopkin's encouragement, Moore managed to shed 112 pounds, and, as a result, she says, "I went to another level, mentally. Losing the weight did something to my mental awareness and rekindled my faith in myself. Perhaps not coincidentally things began to happen after that. In 1978 she signed a contract with Columbia, and in

November of that year she went down to Sigma Sound in Philadelphia to record her debut album for the label with producer Bobby Eli. Once again, Hopkins made a timely suggestion. After listening to the **O'Jays**' version of "This Time, Baby" on their "So Full of Love" album, he felt his wife should cover it. The result, of course, was a huge disco and pop hit, but an overlooked fact is that the rest of the "I'm On My Way" album is crammed with some very strong material. Columbia is going with "How's Your Love Life Baby" as the next single, and meanwhile, Moore is off to Europe for a series of promotional dates. She'll be back at Sigma Sound with producer Eli and the MFSB crew by January.

LOS ANGELES - A drive to increase royalty payments to songwriters has been launched by Songwriters Resources & Services. The main target of the drive has been directed toward the Copyright Royalty Tribunal, which is a five-person regulatory and judiciary panel appointed by the President to study issues and procedures dealing with copyright laws.

PetitionThe Songwriters group will present its petition to the Tribunal at its meeting in 1980 and urge the panel to ask Congress that the Tribunal be allowed to meet more frequently. Currently, the Tribunal meets only once every decade.

Music publishers, independent songwriters, the Alternative Songwriting course, ASCAP and BMI have been asked to sign a petition calling for the royalty increase for songwriters.



classic, "Wait For Me," are the top cuts. FUTURE STREET — Pages — Epic NJE 36209 — Producer: Bobby Colomby — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

This is an auspicious debut album, by a band that incorporates the vocal approach of the Doobie Bros. with the jazz/rock sophistication of Steely Dan, and, yet, emerges with its own unique musical identity. Led by vocalist/keyboard player Richard Page and guitarist Icarus Johnson, the band irresistible "I Do Believe In You," and the Weather Report-inrockers and streamlined white rhythm and blues ballads. The irresistible "I Do Believe In You," and the Weather Report influenced "Chemistry" are the top tracks on this commercial, musical wonderment

ONLY MAKE BELIEVE - Bell & James - A&M SP-4784 Producers: LeRoy Bell and Casey James — List: 7.98 — Bar

This sophisticated and soulful duo have come up with a superb R&B/disco affair this time around. The harmonies are air tight, and guiding light Tom Bell's string and horn arrangements are some of the most inventive heard this year. Even the disco songs have a classy, cut-above-the-rest feel to them. The energetic "Shakedown" and the floating "Only Make Believe" are two of the finest tracks on a super-fine LP.

UPROOTED — Rob Grill — Mercury SRM-1-3798 - Producers: Robbie Buchanan and Rob Grill — List: 7.98

This former Grassroot should surprise a few people with "Uprooted" as he delivers a collection filled with gritty rock 'n' roll numbers. That streamlined, Grassroots pop sound is nowhere to be heard in songs like "Feel The Heat," "Rockin' On The Road Again" and "Strangers." Fleetwood Mac helps out on "Rock Sugar" and the song should do well on Top 40 radio, An old standard, "Where Were You When I Needed You," supplies the album with its most dramatic moments.

ORSA LIS — Infinity INF 9015 — Producers: Hal David and Archie Jordan — List: 7.98

Orsa Lia could emerge as one of the freshest talents A/C radio has seen in a long time with this new LP. She has a pure. lilting voice that is perfectly suited to the lyrics of Hal David and the stellar compositions of Archie Jordan. The pretty piano string arrangements are what adult hits are made of, and Lia could have a nice string of singles with this LP. "No Walls, No Ceilings, No Floors" and "What Am I Supposed To Do" are the best of the lot.

GUITARS AND WOMEN - Rick Derringer - Blue Sky JZ 36092 — Producers: Todd Rundgren & Rick Derringer — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

"Guitars And Women" is the kind of album that many longstanding outfits would (or should) attempt to produce when they seem to be intent on shedding the stylistic entrapments of former efforts. Rick Derringer has placed himself in good hands with co-producer Todd Rundgren. The result of the pairing is Derringer's best, richest album to date, and one that should easily garner Derringer a first-class ticket for that trip into the eighties. For AOR into the joys of cookin'.

THE CRYSTAL MANSION — 20th Century-Fox T-588 Producer: Brooks Arthur — List: 7.98

Crystal Mansion sports a bouncy, horn filled A/C pop sound The group, led by vocalist Johnny Caswell, specializes in soaring harmonies and songs like the breezy "Lonely, Faraway, Missing You" and the lushly orchestrated ballad, "I Hear Music" benefit greatly from the band's vocal prowess. While the band takes on a lot of styles with this debut, it has a decidedly spiritual flavor. For Gospel, A/C and pop lists

PH7 — Peter Hammill — Charisma CA-1-2205 — Producer: Peter Hammill — List: 7.98

The former main cog of Van Der Graaf Generator is still keeping things simple on his solo LPs as he sticks to an eight track recording on "PH7." He is the most unpredictable and emotional of the rock avant-gardists. This is Hammill's most commercially listenable album to date, although fans will still delight in Grahm Smith's haunting violin work and Hammill's violent vocal outbursts. "My Favourite," "Mr. X" and "Careering" are the AOR programmer's best bets.

























VICTIM OF LOVE - Elton John - MCA-5104 - Producer: Peter Bellotte - List: 8.98

One look at the producer on this LP is enough to tell you that Elton has put on his dancin' shoes. However the "single man' fairs well on this all disco outing. Currently in the midst of his solo piano tour with percussionist Ray Cooper, John demonstrates that he is a versatile performer by branching out and delivering a passle of songs for the dance crowd. Thor, Baldursson's arrangements, as usual, are inventive, and the album's top tracks are: "Thunder In The Night" and the title track. For pop and disco lists.

LIVE AND SLEAZY — The Village People — Casablanca NBLP-2-7183 — Producer: Jacques Morali — List: 13.98

These disco darlings have always put out outrageous, hilarious waxings, and this live/studio package is no exception. The choral/disco band delivers a frenzied set with the live LP, culled from its summer performances at L.A.'s Greek Theatre, and a polished and inventive studio album with new lead singer/policeman Ray Simpson. "Fire Island" and "In Hollywood" make the live album more fun than a Broadway musical, and "Ready For The 80's" paces the studio tracks. For pop and disco programming.

I'M THE MAN — Joe Jackson — A&M SP4794 — Producer: David Kershenbaum — List: 7.98

Jackson is one of the most accessible and commercially viable new wave rockers around, and last time his punk/reggae sound made the Top 40 with "Is She Really Going Out With Him." His bright, rock style and wry, observant lyrics are in full bloom, once again, on "I'm The Man." Like Elvis Costello, Jackson can spit out a vocal with conviction and true, punk emotion. Stinging, social comment songs like "Friday" and the title cut are what Jackson's style is all about. For AOR and Top

20/20 — Portrait NJR 36205 — Producer: Earle Mankey — List: 7.98 - Bar Coded

The first impulse is to simply dismiss 20/20 as Epic's answer to The Knack. Not true. Musically there are philosophical similarities: both bands are traditional quartets with one Beatle boot firmly planted in the sixties. But whereas The Knack are given the erstwhile thunder of The Sweet to their sound, 20/20 leans more heavily into the Tom Petty/Shelter vein. In the grooves, then, becomes the final end-all issue, and 20/20 have simply got what it takes on all creative levels.

PARTNERS IN CRIME — Rupert Holmes — Infinity INF 9020 — Producers: Rupert Holmes and Jim Boyer — List: 7.98

Rupert Holmes writes romantic soft rock songs that are reminiscent of Harlequin novels, and the 25-34 female demographic should eat this type of material up. Holmes infuses the easy going sound with jazz and Latin rhythms. "Escape," "Lunch Hour" and "The People That You Never Get To Love" are the cuts to listen for on this talented singer/songwriter's Infinity debut. For A/C and pop formats.

BACK ON THE STREETS — Gary Moore — Jet NJZ 36187 — Producers: Chris Tsangarides & Gary Moore — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

Gary Moore is Ireland's best kept secret. Active since the mid-sixties with bands such as Skid Row and Thin Lizzy, this is the first of his solo efforts to surface stateside. The man knows and fully exploits the bottomless potential of the guitar thoroughly. Lizzyesque rockers segue with soulful balladeering and the odd foray into the world of jazz-tinged progressive music thrown in to make this one of the more listenable efforts this year.

POTLIQUOR — Capitol ST-11998 — Producer: Bill Evans -List: 7.98 - Bar Coded

This Louisiana-based boogie band makes extensive use of a horn section. The band does inventive things with the southern rock genre, and are somewhat reminiscent of the gumbo rock of Little Feat. The band boasts strong vocals, but the brass steals the show on this LP. "Right Street/Wrong Direction," 'Life Should Be A Laugh" and "Oh So Long" are the tunes that AOR programmers should give a listen to.

RECENT SONGS — Leonard Cohen — Columbia JC 36264 -Producers: Leonard Cohen and Henry Lewy — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

It has been a while since we've heard from this singer/bard. His spoken/sung style is always a vehicle for his penetrating lyric content, and he always has something important to say about the human condition. The music on this LP, once again, plays second bill to the words, but a group of stellar studio musicians (including Oud player John Bilezikjian) provide a dramatic setting for Cohen. "Guests," "The Traitor" and "Ballad Of The Absent Mare" are especially affecting.

NO ONE HOME — Lalo Schifrin — Tabu NJZ 36091 — Producer: Lalo Schifrin — List: 7.98 — Bar Coded

Schifrin is noted mostly for scoring such television classics as "Mannix" and "Mission Impossible." He makes use of the best studio sessioners in the business on the album as he sails through a smooth set of jazz-oriented funk. The music is light and rife with structured, wah-wah jams. Sylvia Smith handles the lead vocal chores nicely. The best tracks are "No One Home" and "You Feel Good."



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FEATURE PICKS

BARRY MANILOW (Arista AS 0464)

Ships (3:46) (Ian Hunter, Inc./April Music, Inc. -ASCAP) (I. Hunter)

Though the arrangements are slightly different, Manilow is, for the most part, true to Ian Hunter's original rendering of this tender ballad. The first single from his new "One Voice" LP, this cut has already met with heavy radio acceptance across the board. Manilow's vocals have never been better and the instrumentals are handled with the utmost taste. A winner



KENNY LOGGINS (Columbia 1-11109) This is it (3:35) (Milk Money Music-ASCAP/Snug

Music — BMI) (K. Loggins, M. McDonald)

Loggins' first single from his new "Keep The Fire" LP, co-written by Michael McDonald with lush backup vocal support, is a lilting, breezy tune which builds from a breathy intro to a full-blown chorus. Slight Carribean influences are mixed here with strings in a most original manner, meshing perfectly on the enticing hook. Multiformat appeal spells success here.





DARYL HALL & JOHN OATES (RCA PB-11747) Walt For Me (3:40) (Hot-Cha Music Co./Six Continents Music Publishing, Inc. — BMI) (D. Hall)

Fans of Hall & Oates' early blue-eyed soultinged numbers will be easily pleased by the first single off of their "X-Static" LP. Taking up where mentor Todd Rundgren left off after his first pop hits, the duo employs a rhythm machine, glistening bell and chime effects, keyboards and neatly placed guitar runs behind a lilting vocal melody. A stone smash for Top 40.



SUPERTRAMP (A&M 2193)

Take The Long Way Home (4:03) (Aimo Musio Corp./Delicate Music — ASCAP) (R. Davies, R. Hodgson)

The third single off of Supertramp's current top charting LP, which continues to see hot rack and retail action, is a bouncy, uptempo number, lade with pop-symphonic instrumentals, highpitched vocals and harmonies and a jaunty harmonical figure. This snappy song will no doubt see a good deal of Top 40 play.

ELECTRIC LIGHT ORCHESTRA (Jet ZS9 5064)

Confusion (3:42) (Jet Music Inc. — BMI) (J. Lynne)
The third single from ELO's "Discovery" LP is another bubbly Lynne concoction, mixing a glossy pop melody with alternately grandiose and circuslike keyboard fills. The jumpy hook is superb as is the all-around craftsmanship of the song, with its dense texture, solidifying another big Top 40 hit for ELO.



20/20 (Portrait 2-70035)

Cherl (3:18) (Accidental Music — BMI) (R. Flynt) A wall of guitar chords kicks of the first single

from this Los Angelenos power pop quartet, moving into a Beatlistic melody and raw, simplistic instrumentals that will inevitably draw comparisons to The Knack. However, 20/20's hooks are more melodic, balanced with hard guitar rhythms, creating an identity all their own. Highly recommended for pop and AOR formats.





ANN-MARGRET (Ocean/Ariola 7511)

"Love Rush" E-Minor (3:58) (Kreimers Music Inc. - BMI) (P. Sabu)

A whirlwind-paced disco beat, led by congas and a variety of percussion effects, is augmented by a battery of strings, electric piano and horn flourishes to provide a sonically scintillating background for Ann-Margret's aggressively sexy vocal stylings. An auspicious introduction to dance music for the actress/singer, the clubs will hop on this, as will disco and pop lists.



MARVIN GAYE (Tamla T 54305F)

Ego Tripping Out (5:10) (Bugpie Music Publishing (adm. by Jobete Music Co., Inc. — ASCAP) (M Gave)

Gaye has often integrated a social message into his lyrics and the lesson here centers on the overwhelming pain an inflated ego can cause to others. Half talk, half singing, to a sweltering R&F beat replete with popping keyboards and jazzy horn arrangements, this cut should attract considerable B/C attention.

SINGLES

THE SPORTS (Arista AS 0468)

Who Listens To The Radio (3:24) (Australian Tumbleweed — EMU) (Cummings, Pendlebury)

A re-mix of the same cut on The Sports' upcoming domestically-released LP, this hard-charging number is a very promising start for the Australian lads. Quick licks. aggressive vocals and handclaps liven up the "made-forradio" theme.

AMII STEWART (Ariola 7771)

Jealousy (3:42) (ATV Music — BMI) (B. Leng, S. May, G. Morris)

Though Stewart's last single failed to make an impact on pop audiences, she reasserts her standing as a first rate singer/stylist on this dance cut. A throbbing wave of relentless electronic effects, especially on the crunching breaks, should spell success on dance and pop lists.

THE BOOMTOWN RATS (Columbia 1-11117)

I Don't Like Monday (3:47) (Zomba Enterprises, Inc. -BMI) (B. Geldof)

Lead Rat Bob Geldof has asserted that this cut, which deals with a San Diego school girls' tragic shooting spree, points more to the social conditions which elicit such reckless violence. This huge English hit deserves to be heard. For pop, AOR.

THE EUCLID BEACH BAND (Epic 9-50782)

End Of The World (3:16) (Camex Music, Inc. — BMI) (E. Carmen)

Fellow Clevelander Eric Carmen appears to be the guiding light behind this group, both writing and producing the second single from their self-titled LP. A strong, stirring pop ballad, with high, airy vocals, this should see good pop, A/C play.
THE NAUGHTY SWEETIES (Elektra E-46554)

Allce (3:33) (Sheljac Music — BMI) (I. Jack)

The Sweeties are an L.A.-based group who previously released this single on a tiny local label with some success. More or less in the bar-band mold, like early Bob Seger and the Silver Bullet Band, this track has a hard rockin' quality, perfect for AOR.

BAR-KAYS (Mercury 76015)

Move Your Boogle Body (3:44) (Bar-Kays Music Publishing/Warner Tamerlane Music Publishing — BMI)

(J. Alexander, L. Dodson, A. Jones, M. Beard, F Thompson, W. Stewart, C. Allen, L. Smith, H. Henderson, M. Bynum, S. Guy)

The Bar-Kays have always been one of the most popular purveyors of party funk and this steadily throbbing tune continues much in the same vein as "Shake Your Rump To The Funk." For B/C lists.

THE POLICE (A&M 2190)

Message In A Bottle (3:50) (Virgin Music, Inc. — ASCAP)

The Police's palatable mixture of pop and new wave found Top 40 acceptance with "Roxanne" and this first single from their "Regatta De Blanc" LP finds the trio back in the same irresistably likeable groove. A mesmerizing guitar figure, reminiscent of Blue Oyster Cult's "Don't Fear The Reaper," is the hook here. For pop, heavy AOR play.

DANN ROGERS (International Aritsts IAS-500)

Looks Like Love Again (2:36) (ABC/Dunhill Music, Inc. - BMI) (D. Marino)

From Rogers' "Hearts Under Fire" LP, this easily paced tune should quickly appeal to A/C, pop and C&W formats. Light instrumental backing of strings, together with acoustic guitar, blends in with Rogers' captivating baritone and soaring harmonies.

DAN PEEK (Songbird/MCA 41123)

All Things Are Possible (2:42) (Christian Soldier Music ASCAP) (D. Peek)

Originally available on Lamb & Lion, this light, bright inspirational tune has a Christian orientation subdued enough for A/C and pop play and an engaging acoustic/electric melody. Former America member Dan Peek's singing is as distinctively easy as ever.

ELLEN FOLEY (Epic 9-50770)

What's A Matter Baby (3:35) (Times Square Music Publications Co./Eden Music Corp. — BMI) (C. Otis, J.

Foley's girlish vocals fit this reworking of the '60s hit like a glove and Ian Hunter and Mick Ronson's production provides an authentically dense texture to the song.

From Foley's "Nightout" LP, this track should garner instant AOR response.

PABLO CRUISE (A&M 2195)

Want You Tonight (3:45) (Irving Music/Pablo Cruise Music — BMI) (C. Lerios, D. Jenkins, A. Willis)

A fusion of rock guitar chording and a danceable beat on Pablo Cruise's first single from their "Part of The Game" LP is quickly proving to be a winning combination, judging by the immediate radio response this cut has gained. A variety of formats should pick up on this.

NITEFLYTE (Ariola 7747)

If You Want It (3:50) Torano Pub./Scandal Music Inc. — BMI((S. Torano, H. Johnson)

Already charting, this cut has met with encouraging B/C activity, quickly crossing to pop lists as well. Lush, well-crafted instrumentals and vocals reminiscent of E, W & F, especially on the hook, are the key ingredients.

JOHN HIATT (MCA MCA 41132)

Slug Line (2:59) (Bug Music/Bilt Publishing — BMI) (J. Hiatt)

Hiatt stands out head and shoulders above what most people consider to be the cream of the new wave crop. His music is hard to pigeonhole, cutting across musical definitions, and this highly original title track from his LP shows why. A must spin for AOR.

GENE CHANDLER (20th Century-Fox TC-2428)

Do What Comes So Natural (5:00) (Gaetana Music/Slyheart Pub./Cachand Music — BMI) (V. Willis)

Chandler makes his bid as a more than adequate balladeer on this sensuous "love" number, with a warm sax solo and full female harmonies creating just the right atmosphere. Strings set the romantic mood. For B/C

CHERIE & MARIE CURRIE (Capitol 4754)

Since You've Been Gone (2:54) (Island Music — BMI) (Ballard)

Super songwriter Russ Ballard provides the perfect anthemic rocker for the Currie twins, who add a sexy female teenage vocal approach. The breaks are chilling and just right for more AOR and pop play.

Denver got on the air and asked listeners to call and dispatch the police to the station. The intruders promptly left and when the police did arrive ("our switchboard was flooded with calls from your listerners") they were complete with the head of the SWAT team and the canine patrol. Angry phone calls and even some bomb threats followed for a couple of days, but the new WGMA, or 'The Lady-For Singles Only' format is on the air, alive and well.

aynard Ferguson

THE ROXY, L.A. — The inimitable Maynard Ferguson — possessor of the lip that produces the note that only dogs can hear came to town, went to town and proceeded to blow everyone away with a swinging set that ultimately spurred the audience to its feet, shouting for more.

A veteran performer, Ferguson's set was well-paced, starting in a familiar groove, building through a swinging cover of Zawinul's "Birdland," and finally culminating in an intensity just short of ex-

plosiveness.

As has become his custom, Ferguson was backed by a 13-piece band comprised mainly of young college and session musicians on the way up. All were top-notch performers — some worthy of eventually being soloists in their own right - and provided the perfect complement to Ferguson's screaming horn.

The band reached a swinging peak with renditions of Sonny Rollins' "Airegin" ("Nigeria spelled backwards") and the theme from "Rocky II," with wild ovations

following both numbers.

Another highlight was an interesting piece with Indian musicians Vemu Mukunda on the vina (predecessor of the sitar) and Cassandra on the tamboura. A frequent visitor to India, Ferguson and Mukunda were obviously good friends, and their music was an exceptionally successful attempt at fusing their divergent musical styles and traditions.

However, in spite of the swinging band, the Hindu-jazz fusion and the excitement of the set, the highlight, as always, was Ferguson's quest for that ever-higher note. Following the "Rocky II" theme, each member of the four-man trumpet section took up Ferguson's note-searching riff in turn, pushing higher and higher and building the anticipation of Maynard himself stretching to the limit.

Finally, with the audience practically straining in its seats in anticipation of the moment, Ferguson let loose with the note quaranteed to straighten your spine and curl your toes at the same time. Pandemonium ... and another standing ova-

Ferguson encored with the theme from "Star Trek" off his new Columbia LP, "Hot," and it was exciting enough . . . but since we had already been treated to music in the upper ranges of the human hearing capability, all the encore could do was broaden the smiles already there.

ram Tchaikovsky **Blind Date**

THE WHISKY, L.A. - Let's clear things up from the outset. Bram Tchaikovsky and his boyish trio of backing musicians (as a group, they collectively fall under their red-haired singer/guitarist/front man's name) are not classical in the strict sense of the word. Nor are they contemporary novelty classicists, in the mold of P.D.Q. Bach and

They are a group of classic rock 'n' rollers of the British pub-rock variety (Bram is an ex-member of The Motors) who have forged a distinctively melodic style that has already won them a degree of critical and popular acclaim in the space of just one LP

It is little wonder, then, that their live debut here was an over-sold event, with dozens of new converts crammed onto the small floor in front of the stage. Bram hardly let them down, as he appropriately ripped into the title track from the "Strange Man, Changed Man" LP, seguing neatly into "Lonely Dancer" with its building bass line, supplied by Mickey Broadbent, as Bram's vocals wafted above the sonic guitar licks.

Like the LP, the show was a perfectly paced affair and the relentless energy rose to a fever pitch as the band cranked the opening chords to their Top 40 "Girl of My Dreams," which, like Roxy Music's "In Every Dream Home A Heartache," is an ode to the joys of an inflatable doll. Other highlights of the set included "Bloodline," a paean to amphetamines and motorcycles, revealing Bram's English Mod background, and several early rock covers.

Windsong recording group Blind Date, who opened the show, garnered lukewarm response to their set of pop-flavored rock numbers, including the new single "I'll Take You Anywhere" off of their debut LP. Unlike Bram, Blind Date's approach seemed to be more perfunctory than inspired and therein lay the problem.

Everyone returned to the stage for "I Found My Blue Jeans," featuring Sebastian's hot harp, before Tim's solo performance of "Misty Roses." Hardin was accompanied by the audience for "Reason to Believe," whose verses are so well known that the song soared into the air above the performers, a tribute to the songwriting contributions of the evening's host.

The charismatic John Sebastian took the stage for powerful acoustic and electric self-accompaniment on "Nashville Cats," and "Don't You Run With Him," before the whole band and company returned for "Night Owl Cafe," a lively "Amen," and an encore, "The Seventh Son."

It was not any one individual's performance that made the evening remarkable. It was instead the opportunity the unique format provided to introduce newcomers to the audience and reacquaint established artists, amidst the smooth flow between blues/rock and acoustic music, proving both to be classic, undated musical genres

developed on the horizon. Radio stations are more profitable today than they have ever been.

The taping of off-the-air radio broadcasts is also perfectly legal according to Judge Ferguson's opinion that although the 1976 revision of the Copyright Act "appears to give copyright holders exclusive rights over all recordings, the congressional intent was that home use sound recording was not prohibited."

If the Copyright Act were interpreted any other way it would result in intolerable problems of enforcement and invasion of privacy. Ferguson noted, "Home recording simply cannot be controlled. Nobody is going into anybody's home to prevent it."

Limited Ruling

Judge Ferguson limited the scope of his decision as he noted that issues of pay TV of cable copying, tape swapping, and tape duplication were not addressed in this trial as well as the use of tapes outside the home. Ferguson wrote, "The ramifications of this new technology are greater than the boundaries of this lawsuit. This court recognizes that the full resolution of these issues is preeminately a problem for

Sony Corp. of America indicated pleasure with the court ruling and repeated its contention that video recorders are in the public interest. The attorney for MCA and Disney, Stephen Kroft, said both companies will appeal the decision and added, "We certainly don't agree with it and will vigorously pursue the appeal.'

Recession Cuts Major Label Jazz Support; Some Press On

problems I see is that we're able to get out initial orders on a lot of jazz product in the stores, but I don't see the reorders coming

The economic climate, Goldstein feels, has been a definite hindrance to jazz sales. "I definitely think we've lost sales although at ECM we have not seen the loss of one single record, because of the marketplace," he said. "One result is that in terms of signing acts, we're being much stricter." But, he emphasized, "At Warner Bros., specifically, there is no curtailing of emphasis on the division whatsoever.

New Conservatism

Don Mizell, general manager of the fusion division at Elektra/Asylum, also cited roster and budget scrutiny at his label as a result of the soft marketplace. "Adventuresome forms of music." he said, "and marginal jazz acts are the ones who will get hurt the most. The audience does not run out to get these albums, and it takes a long time to realize your sales potential. But the business is geared to quick sales."

Mizell's division recently dropped the word "jazz" from its title, pointing up the fact that fusion music has been one of the main beneficiaries of this year's sale trends as evidenced by the near-gold sales totals of Grover Washington Jr.'s "Paradise" LP on E/A. And even Inner City Records, primarily known as a mainstream jazz label. has moved into the fusion field, according to president Irv Krakta. "We are heavily focusing on fusion at the moment," he said.

Kratka's label has been an exception to the downward sales trend of 1979, he says, mainly because of the Inner City's new selfcontained distribution system, whereby the company ships records directly to accounts from warehouses in New York and Chicago.

Although Inner City is currently scrutinizing its expenditures for recording sessions and releasing fewer records than last year at this time, Kratka says he is convinced that "jazz is not subject to the sharp swings that affect the pop market. There is a solid core of buyers out there, and if you provide them with quality, commercial product, they will support you."

'Bullish On Jazz'

Echoing Kratka's view is Lenny Scheer, vice president of sales and distribution for Arista Records, which has been one of the only major labels to aggressively pursue the progressive jazz market, specifically through its Novus and GRP lines.

"I'm bullish on jazz," Scheer said, "because we know if we make the product the consumer wants available, it will sell. A lot of dealers are reluctant to stock jazz because of its low turn, but although the turn won't be as much as Fleetwood Mac, it's still there. We feel it's a viable market with definite sales.

Jazz sales for Arista in 1979, were, according to Scheer, "far more significant than in previous years. We made a concentrated effort to cross over our jazz artists. and in the case of Angela Bofill and Tom Browne on the GRP label, we feel we succeeded."

The company, which experienced strong sales from Norman Connors, Phyllis Hyman and Jeff Lorber on the Arista label, also carries the progressive Novus line. Artists on both lines, as well as on the GRP label, have been the focus of a concentrated marketing approach that Scheen says will include a jazz sampler, incentive programs to dealers, and in-store display material.

In-Store Play

Scheer, like other executives surveyed by Cash Box, stressed the importance of in-store play for jazz records in a time of economic recession when radio play is par-

tion in both the news and sales areas.

On the job since Sept. 5, Fisher also serves as the project coordinator for the Cash Box Confidential, a recently introduced service offering detailed chart information to record merchants.



ANAHEIM CONVENTION CENTER — In the midst of their first-ever North American concert tour, ABBA — Anni-Frid Lyngstad, Benny Andersson. Bjorn Ulvaeus and Agnetha Faltskog — brought their clean cut, "wholesome" pop sound to the L.A. area and came away big winners.

Known almost exclusively by their constant procession of radio hits, ABBA in the flesh proved a very pleasant surprise for all those lucky enough to get one of the 8,200 tickets available.

While ABBA's relative lack of tour experience sometimes showed, no one in the audience seemed to care much, as the group substituted enthusiasm for polish, playing a full two-hour set without the benefit of an opening act.

And the well-paced set was all any ABBA fan could ask for ... and more. Including such ABBA standouts as "Voulez-Vous" (the opening number); "Knowing Me, Knowing You," "Chiquitita," "Fernando," "Name Of The Game," and "Dancing Queen" (the second encore number), the group showed that their sound live is at least equal to their slick recordings.

Lyngstad and Faltskog, both clad in attractive body stockings, were outstanding with the soaring vocal harmonies that often characterize the group's music; while Ulvaeus (guitar) and Andersson (keyboards) displayed a high level of musicianship—sometimes taking the lead with unexpected instrumental solos.

ABBA's apparent decision to throw caution to the wind and come out strong was also evident in the selection of material, forsaking some of their better-known hits for the introduction of new material. One of the best of the new ones featured Faltskog singing lead on "Gimme Gimme Gimme (A Man After Midnight)," an uplifting disconumber that really lit a spark in the audience.

Finally, in recognition of their support of UNICEF's "International Year Of The Child" (the group has pledged all the royalties from "Chiquitita" to this cause), ABBA was joined on-stage by a chorus of local school children to perform the number "I Have A Dream." It was an inspiring moment.

Los Angeles had to wait years to finally see ABBA. After finally experiencing their show, I hope that they won't take so long to pay a return visit.

UNIVERSAL AMPHITHEATRE, L.A. — Ignore the clown make-up and the sequined formal gown which looks like a wardrobe reject from a Lawrence Welk taping. Forget the landmark bosom, miraculously concealed under quite a bit of yardage. Pay no attention to the Mae-West-On-LSD wig.

Those are all part of Dolly Parton's media-image.

Onstage, the Nashville thrush comes across as a sincere, down home celebrity who refuses to take herself seriously. During the course of her set, she showed herself willing to indulge in self-parody, taking pot shots at her natural endowments and her unnatural coiffure.

Her music reflects the same mentality — most of the time. The country tunes, a great

deal of which she penned herself, are all genuine, well-conceived and handsomely delivered. Especially noteworthy were a tender, introspective rendition of "Applejack" and the lyrically endearing "A Coat Of Many Colors."

But this woman should stay away from pop. Her country corn interpretation of the Beatles' "Help" was just this side of laughable. A blanched version of Jackie Wilson's R&B hit, "Higher," deserves reprimand from the NAACP.

She fares much better with her disco crossover attempts. "Here You Come Again," in addition to being her biggest hit to date, was the highlight of the show, as normally saccharine strings went salty when combined with Dolly's spicy vocalizing.

"Baby I'm Burning" ended with real fireworks exploding on stage, but they paled in comparison to Parton's performing pyrotechnics.

Eddie Rabbitt opened the concert with a catalog of his greatest hits, including "You Don't Love Me Anymore" and his most recent country crossover, "Suspicions."

EVANSVILLE, IND. — It was in a tiny town near Evansville, Indiana where over 4500 dedicated country fans crowded themselves into a high school auditorium to hear an evening of music by two of their favorite artists, the Statler Brothers and Tammy Wynette. It is in these surroundings, and others like it, that one is allowed to step outside "the music biz" and find out what the people who buy country records are really like and what they respond to.

It was also a special event because it was staged for the benefit of a small Baptist college and the families of George Richey and Tammy Wynette were all there to see the performance and a scholarship established in Richey's father's name.

The Statlers started off the show with "Thank You, Thomas Edison" and proceeded through hits such as "Shirley Jean Burrell," "Do You Remember These," "Here We Are Again," "Class of '57," "How To Be A Country Star," "Do You Know You Are My Sunshine," "Bed of Roses" and "I'll Go To My Grave Loving You." In between, they did some comedy with the Reid brothers, Harold and Don doing the talking while Lew and Phil prefer to just sing. Their comedy is centered on Don Reid acting as the straight man and witty Harold Reid the funny one. It comes across that while Don is losing his hair, Hal is losing his mind.

There were several highlights during the show — one when they did a medley of songs beginning with "Carry Me Back" and including "Things Just Ain't The Way They Used To Be" as well as a recitation from Hal, the latent sex symbol of the group.

It's refreshing to find a family oriented show the caliber of the Statler Brothers. Their show proves you don't have to live in Nashville to be a country star. The Statlers' songs, which many call maudlin and corny, seem to strike a more responsive chord with audiences than a number of the songs written in Nashville more for other songwriters than for country fans.

Another highlight was when the group sang "Flowers on the Wall," their first big hit written by Lew DeWitt, and followed it with "How Great Thou Art" for which they received a standing ovation and promptly went into their final chorus again.

Their encore was demanded by the fans and it was "Thank You, World," a song that

Don Reid introduced by saying that it expressed the way the group felt about each other as well as their audiences.

Tammy Wynette came out in a stylish black dress with silver trim and a red rose in her short, blonde hair. She and her back up band, all dressed in white tuxedos with the girl singers in white dresses, all looked positively stunning.

Tammy first sang a medley of "Your Good Girl's Gonna Go Bad," "I Don't Wanna Play House," "D-I-V-O-R-C-E," and "Singing My Song," then went into a medley of songs she had written, followed by a gospel segment and then a section where she spotlighted different members of the band, including Sue Richards, Charlie Carter and Sunshine, a group of two girls and guy that accompany her. She also invited two of her daughters, Tina and Georgette on stage to each do a number to the delight of the crowd.

She finished the set with "You and Me," "They Call It Makin' Love," "Take Me To Your World," and "Stand By Your Man," where she went out into the audience and sang to members of the crowd. She encored with "I Believe In Fairy Tales."

Tammy's band was extremely tight, owing no doubt to the fact that husband and noted session player George Richey was on the piano leading the group. don cusic

REO Speedwagon

LONG BEACH ARENA — For lovers of heavy metal, especially that variety that sends a rush through the eardrums directly to the nerve endings of the brain, the fourand-a-half hour triple play featuring REO, Blackfoot and Blue Steel was all you could ask for.

Blue Steel opened the marathon with a competent set, followed by an eardrum-puncturing jam by Blackfoot. Both bands played with enthusiasm, and the crowd, comprised almost equally of "freeks" and high school kids, really seemed to like them.

The crowd's excitement reached a peak with REO. Cheering and screaming wildly as the band pounded through a set featuring both its older hits and a preview of side 1 from the new "Nine Lives" LP, the crowd became an integral part of the show, adding a frenzied excitement to the band's familiar hits.

Lead singer Kevin Cronin's enthusiastic but somewhat trite strutting, bumping and grinding was exciting to some in the crowd, lead guitarist Gary Richrath proved that REO can play as loud as anyone . . . and overall, the crowd liked the show.

he Babys Nick Gilder

CAL STATE NORTHRIDGE — The Babys are among the most powerful and consistent live acts currently active in the domain of heavy-duty mainstream English rock 'n' roll. This assertion was substantiated by their performance at the California State University, Northridge, gym which indiscriminately brought down the house on devotees and sceptics alike in a facility that combines the personal comfort and close range factors of a small auditorium with the energy-generating capabilities of a much larger one.

Presently at work on their fourth album, the Babys have tightened up after relatively recent personnel changes and the set list for the performance indicated there's no looking back. The group performed only three songs from their first two albums, concentrating instead on "Head First" tracks and new material. The best numbers were the la-dee-dah desperado song "Mexico," "Everytime I Think of You," with outstanding back-up vocals by Ann Marie Leclerc, then a new song with an electric piano and synthesizer intro from Jonathan Cain called "In Your Eyes," and one of the most entertaining drum solos ever in "Looking for Love," featuring Tony Brock.

Brock drums like a laid-back jackhammer and with Ricky Phillips' steady bass lay the substantial foundation for the Babys' aggressive, matured sound. Wally Stocker's guitar stays primarily in the lower ranges, thereby adding additional low-end weight. The musical contrast comes through the keyboards and vocals. Jonathan Cain has a structured and strong keyboard style with a classic touch on solos. The Babys' trademark continues to be John Waite's high, clear and somewhat plaintive vocals, choosing the surprising instead of the expected note. As a front man he seems a little meaner, but his smile in answer to the audience's positive response was all the more warm.


THE ROXY, L.A. — Few bands are as delightfully esoteric as new Warner Bros. recording group The B-52s, a five-member unit from sleepy Athens, Ga. who invaded the Big Apple not long ago to cause quite an underground stir. Their engagingly eclectic fusion of '60s guitar rock, a la The Ventures, with other worldly vocal embellishments, ranging from campy lyrics to banshee-like wailings from the resident sirens, captured the imagination of an enthusiastic packed house here with a steamrolling set of original tunes from their debut LP.

Opening with "Planet Claire," the quintet set the pace for most of the show with a pummeling backbeat, aided by Cindy Wilson's insistent bongo work. Wilson also sported the band's namesake "beehive" hairdo while Kate Pierson was decked out in spacey cheerleader togs, adding to the visual appeal of the group.

Wilson and Pierson were joined on vocals by Fred Schneider III, whose herky-jerky presence further enhanced the humorous tone of their approach as he frugged and watusied his way through such dances as The Shy Tuna, The Aqua Velva and others during "Dance This Mess Around," "Lava," "52 Girls" and "6060-842." The relentless beat was adeptly handled by drummer Keith Strickland and rhythm/lead guitarist Ricky Wilson, who utilized a double-necked electric guitar for rapid transitions.

Unfortunately, the Roxy seemed much too sterile a setting for The B-52s' irresistably danceable numbers and despite the off-handed encouragement offered by Schneider, the closely packed chairs and tables in the club proved to be inhibiting to all but the most inspired dancers. Hopefully, when the band plays here again it will be in a larger venue with plenty of room to move.

Country Goes Pop But Still Keeps Traditional Flame Alive

As 1979 draws to a close, it seems appropriate to assess the state of the art for country music not only for this year but for the decade.

The sixties ended with Glen Campbell being voted the top male country vocalist and Tammy Wynette the top female vocalist in the Cash Box polls. This trend of moving away from the hard country sound really began here as Campbell ended Buck Owens' reign as the Cash Box top country male vocalist. Before Owens, George Jones had held the position for several

Tammy Wynette ended the eight year stretch of Loretta Lynn as the top female vocalist. Before Loretta, it had been Patsy Cline and Kitty Wells. The top group in 1969 was Tompall and the Glaser Brothers and the top single was "Harper Valley P.T.A." a sassy number that sold eight million records.

In 1970, Johnny Cash kicked off this decade by garnering the top male country vocalist award from **Cash Box**. Both Cash and Campbell had their own television shows during this time, bringing country music to the huge home audience weekly. The top album was Cash's "At San Quentin" and the top single was "A Boy Named Sue."

The Statler Brothers were Cash Box's top group in 1970 and Conway Twitty and Loretta Lynn were voted the top due

Loretta Lynn were voted the top duo.

Perhaps it is ironic or perhaps it is a

testimony to the stability of country music that the top artists a decade ago are still around — and still doing well. In that sense, country music has not really changed that much in the last ten years.

That is not to imply that there have been no new acts during the past ten years in country music. In fact, some of the acts that have broken through in the '70s are Ronnie Milsap, this year's top male country vocalist for Cash Box and Eddie Rabbitt, who finished second in the voting. Top female vocalist Barbara Mandrell and second place winner Dolly Parton were around a decade ago but Crystal Gayle, who finished third, was not. Other award winners this year are the Oak Ridge Boys, who were a

top gospel act ten years ago; Kenny Rogers and Dottie West as a duo and the Charlie Daniels Band.

The changing faces and sounds of country music have not been without detractors. There are some that say country music is not what is used to be. Some even say that it has reached the point of not really being 'country' anymore. These people use the examples of George Jones and Hank Williams as being 'true' country artists and the likes of Olivia Newton-John, Tom Jones, Mac Davis and numerous others as non-country artists who have been on the country music charts to support their charges

In that light, they are absolutely correct

— country music is definitely not that 'country' anymore. With the exception of a few artists such as Moe Bandy, Gene Watson, George Jones and a few others, country music has moved away from the mountain nasal sounds to a more middle-of-the-road sound. Some would call this move a move to a more sophisticated sound while others would classify it as phony.

There has also been criticism leveled at radio stations that they are not really playing 'country music' and that they have watered down their sound to a country tinged blandness.

There is some substance to these claims but there is also substance to the fact that country music today is reaching more people than it ever has. By diversifying or "smoothing out" its sound, it has managed to capture large ratings in the radio markets and consequently more people have tuned into country radio. Looking back twenty years ago you would see country radio as a turn-off for all except the die-hard country fan.

To those who lament the bygone days of yesteryear, when there were no fuzzy areas between country and pop, it is disheartening to look at the country charts and see acts and records that don't fit the traditional mode of country music. These people feel country music is losing its identity and they are right — or at least they are right in assuming it is losing its original identity and gaining a brand new identity.

History Of Country Music As Rich As American Soil

Country music is as diverse as the many sources from which it has grown. It spans a wide spectrum ranging from bluegrass to country pop, and from folk ballads through the Nashville Sound, from hot dance music to religious hymns. Yet through all its changes it has consistently been a music of the heart, a music which appeals strongly to emotions we all — mountaineer, plainsman, city dweller, suburbanite — share. It is a music which touches us all.

Ultimately its roots can be traced back to the ballads and tunes of long ago Scotland, England, and Ireland, which came to the New World with its first settlers. These were authentic folk songs and fiddle tunes, passed from one generation to the next without a word or a note ever written down, a tradition of songs and singing and fiddling common to every community, regardless of region.

Yet country music was much more than Anglo-American folksong; it has been touched and shaped and changed by the influence of numerous other musics. For example it has always been strongly influenced by the blues and other black musical forms. Religious music has been another strong influence.

Around the middle of the last century two other musical forms began to influence country music. The first was the minstrel show, which not only produced songs like "Old Dan Tucker," but also introduced the five string banjo. The twangy sound quickly

combined with the lonesome, mournful strains of the fiddle. The other influence was the popular music of the Victorian age. The sentimental ballads and songs were, a half century later, to become some of country music's first "hits" in its early days on record. Among them were "Wildwood Flower," which was written as "I'll Twine Mid The Ringlets" in 1860, "Little Rosewood Casket," "The Letter Edged In Black," and "Maple On The Hill."

It wasn't until around the turn of this century that the guitar and the mandolin were introduced to country music. Other influences of the time included ragtime, vaudeville, blues guitar, the growth of the mandolin orchestra. Hawaiian music has also swept part of the country.

Besides several comedy pieces and a few recordings of orchestras playing tunes like "Turkey In The Straw," authentic country music did not become part of the recording until 1922. That same year, radio stations in Ft. Worth and Atlanta broadcast "Hoedown"-like programs.

A former light opera tenor, named Vernon Dalhart, brought country music to national attention in 1925 with his hugely successful record, "The Prisoner's Song." From that point on, country music became a major factor on record. Radio firmly established country music as an integral part of its programming with the WLS National Barn Dance in 1924, and WSM's Grand Ole Opry in 1925.

Country music's first real stars were dis-

The Future Looks Bright For Country Music Labels, Artists

Without the aid of a soothsayer, of at least a working crystal ball, it is rather difficult to accurately predict the future of anything. But it is especially difficult to predict any sort of future happenings for something so fickle and ever-changing as the music business — specifically, country music.

One way, perhaps, to gauge the future, is by judging the past and summing up the present. Country music has grown by leaps and bounds in the past decade, and is presently enjoying an extremely healthy existence. The general forecast within the infustry seems to be optimistic — some of the knowledgeable people within the business have even boldly proclaimed that country music as the music to watch for in the coming decade.

Monster Explosion

Certainly, country music has made great strides in the past few years, and is standing on the brink of what could be a monster explosion for the business. To gain a little more insight into the matter at hand, and some concrete plans of a highly lucrative business, **Cash Box** talked with Jo Walker, executive director of the Country Music Assn., and a woman who has been involved with country music's past, and will certainly be a part of whatever future the business carves for itself.

"Country music sales today have held up as well as any other, and better than some," noted Walker, who has been the executive director of the CMA for 19 years. "I'm inclined to agree with Dr. Roger Blackwell, a professor at Ohio State University, when he says that country music will be the music of the '80s as far as really significant strides and significant things happening to it."

Country music has reached its current healthy condition through constant and effective exposure to the masses. Walker sees continued exposure as a route to sustained growth for the market-exposure through the mediums of television, motion pictures and radio. But the big coup will be the conquest of the international market, which Walker sees as one of the most important stratagems of the near future.

If country music can attack the international market with the same vigour and drive it utilized in conquering the American field, the harvest should be good.

"One of our goals is to expand the overseas market for country music," said Walker, who was the CMA's first employee. "We hope to rev up our campaign in the coming decade. We hope to air this award show (Oct. 8) in several foreign countries. Last year it was broadcast live for the first time in Canada. Right now we are working on airing the show in 15 countries. If we get half that number for the first time in Canada. Right now we are working on airing the show in 15 countries. If we get half that number for the first year, I think that will be good."

TV Exposure

As in this country, television exposure in foreign countries would be a big plus in the promotion of country music internationally.

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1979 Booking Season Draws Mixed Reviews From Promoters

As the curtain prepares to close on the 1979 booking season, mixed reviews are already coming in. Although this has been by and large a solid and successful booking year, the uncertainty of the national economy seems to have booking agents taking a long hard look at 1980, rather than gloating over this year's successes.

Jim Halsey, on one hand, is buoyantly optimistic. "We've had a record year, by far the biggest year we've ever had. I keep reading these dismal economic reports, but we're doing more business and better business this year, and that goes for every single act we have.

"I can't speak for the business as a whole, but our firm did substantially more business last year, and we're well into 1980 now, with per date gross revenue per entertainer way up. Our Vegas business is way up, and the fair season was the biggest ever: more revenue, more fairs, and bigger crowds."

On the other hand, Hap Peebles, as both an agent and a talent buyer, sees serious problems looming in the near future. "Escalating talent prices are having a serious effect on the business. The prices have gotten so high they are forcing promoters out of business. Everybody is concerned about these rising prices, and

they are not justified. The entertainers and their agents seem to feel promoters owe them a living. Of course there's no objection to an act getting a realistic price, but most acts these days are overpriced. It's a serious situation we're going to take a long hard look at."

Charting more of a middle ground is Andrea Smith, of the Top Billing Inc. "This has been a great year for us for a number of reasons. For one thing we are at last learning to team up with the record companies, and they with us. We are pooling our talents in support of our artists, and it has been great for our artists. The booking business, in Nashville, is becoming a great deal more sophisticated.

"There has also been a trend toward major record and media markets for Nashville acts, which is an exciting sign — again, label support is a key here, and the fact that we're working together is making for a very successful year."

What of the smaller booking agent? David Snowden, of Triangle Talent in Louisville (which books country as well as a variety of acts) says that for him, 1979 has also been a boom year: "Business is great! The credibility of agents has picked up across the country, which has resulted in the business being tougher; therefore, the

good agents have survived and winnowed out the bad.

"A trend I'm seeing is more and more agents getting involved in country music, and the reason is simple: more people are demanding it. We've noticed a big increase, nationwide, in bluegrass on a larger scale than ever — it all goes back to supply and demand

"As country music continues to move toward the pop sound bookings continue to grow; it's becoming more commercial, and we've had a big increase in bookings in motel and hotel lounges, many of which, because of the intermittent gas shortages, are now looking to attract area residents rather than entertain travelers."

The effect of the economy is foremost on nearly every business person's mind, and booking agents are no exception. Again, the reactions differ as to the course they are taking and the plans they are making.

Jim Halsey said "Of course I'm watching to see what's happening with ticket sales across the country, but I don't have any dismal reports at all. Everybody's apprehensive, and the media keeps promoting this as a crisis, but my feeling is that it may hurt the fringe buyer and the fringe booker, but that it won't hurt the major bookers or buyers, nor the artists nor the fans.

"People will spend the money on who they want to see, regardless of the economy. And I hope this recession is exaggerated; it certainly hasn't affected us yet and I hope it won't. I think this country's strong enough to stand a little belt tightening anyway — it'll probably help things."


Smith is nearly as optimistic: "We at Top Billing have had an ambitious wintertime bookings program here; the only difference is that this year we began it about three weeks early to prepare for an economic crunch. The results have been fantastic, and we're very enthusiastic.

"Just as the old saw says, entertainment is always strong even in hard financial times, and it seems true."

Hap Peebles, though his predictions are more gloomy, does not forsee disaster, though he does forsee some change: "I think the biggest acts, demanding all that money, are the ones who'll be hurt. Fair operators seem to be turning to the medium price acts, because, honestly, they draw as well as the ones with overinflated prices. This may be the end of the era of the really big acts, because the promoters know they'll have so many people at the fair no matter who is there."

David Snowden echoed Halsey's sentiments: "The economy could well hurt next year, but nevertheless the Great Depression was a great entertainment era. Some bookers, some promoters, some acts may go out of business, but in general people will pay to be entertained no matter what."

Snowden, in fact, underscored that statement with one which seems to sum up the sentiment of country bookers in 1979 as they look forward to 1980. "No matter what happens, people will be entertained."



Songwriters: Unsung Heroes Of Country Music Enjoying New Popularity And Status

Country songwriters today are enjoying a new-found appeal and popularity that seems to transcend musical boundaries. Hard work and dedication, not to mention talent, has enabled the work of a songwriter to take on a universal appeal, to carve a new path for the direction of country music.

For example, writer Don Schlitz enjoyed a great deal of success with "The Gambler." The song topped the country charts, and dogged the pop charts for 22 weeks, peaking at the #13 position. Randy Goodrum who penned "You Needed Me," is another local writer whose universal appeal is leading him down a path of gold. Even Stevens co-writer of "Suspicions" and writer of "When You're In Love With A Beautiful Woman," and a field of writers too numerous to mention are all making great strides in promoting their craft through consistently fine work.

Songwriters' creations have fed the appetites of literally millions of fans for many years, and for too long these tunesmiths have not received the pat on the back they so deserve. Cash Box recognizes the efforts of these people, and would like to especially congratulate its 1979 composers of the year, and the composers/performers of the year.

Top Composers

Heading the list of top composers, according to Cash Box chart activity, is Bob McDill. A member of the Welk Music Group, McDill has composed such chart contenders as "It Must Be Love," "Amanda," "Just Like Real People" and "Nobody Likes Sad Songs," which he wrote with Wayland Holyfield.

Following McDill is Sonny Throckmorton, a member of the Tree Publishing

Family. Throckmorton has enjoyed a good deal of success this year with a variety of songs, including "Last Cheater's Waltz," "I Had A Lovely Time," "It's A Cheatin' Situation" and "You Feel Good All Over."

Next, Ben Peters, owner of his own publishing company, Ben Peters Music, penned such songs as "Burgers And Fries," "Before My Time," "Living Our Love Together" and "Loving On."

A writer with Pi-Gem, Archie Jordan, cowrote a number of hit songs this year "Santa Barbara" with Hal David; "I Never Said I Love You" with Hal David; and "In No Time At All" with Richard Leigh.

And finally, Angel Wing Music's Steve Gibb entered the list of Top 5 composers with his hit, "She Believes In Me." Gibb is also responsible for the songs "If I Ever Had To Say Good-Bye To You" and "Don't Blame It On Love."

Composer/performers

In the composer/performer category, Dolly Parton held the #1 position. Parton has been responsible for such notables in the past as "Baby I'm Burning" and "To Daddy."

Following Parton is Eddie Rabbitt, who has enjoyed phenomenal success this year with such songs as "Suspicions," co-written with Even Stevens, David Malloy and Randy McCormick; "I Just Want To Love You," co-written with Stevens and Malloy; "Hearts On Fire," with Stevens and Dan Tyler; and "Pour Me Another Tequila" with Stevens.

Composer/performer Don Williams also enjoyed a good year with material like "Lay Down Beside Me," "Not A Chance" and "When I'm With You."

Merle Haggard earned a position in the Top 5 category with "Red Bandana," "It's Been A Great Afternoon" and "My Own Kind of Hat."

And finally, Waylon Jennings secured a position in the Top 5 with his "Don't You Think This Outlaw Bit's Done Got Out of Hand."

Songwriters have indeed carved their niche in the musical totem pole. Credit can be attributed to the work and dedication of many individuals and several organizations, including the Nashville Songwriters Assn., International. Maggie Cavender, executive director of NSAI, recently talked with Cash Box about two subjects very dear to her heart — songwriters and the work of NSAI, specifically the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame.

Cavender, who was one of the first people to take a pronounced interest in the plight of the songwriter, was also instrumental in the organization of NSAI. Utilizing the theme "it all begins with a song," the 12-year-old organization is dedicated to promoting and aiding the would-be tunesmith, as well as the erstwhile songwriter. The NSAI boasts some 1,200 members internationally.

Songwriters and Nashville have always been an attractive coupling — there is some magneticism about the city that attracts hundreds of songwriters every year. Among the possibly thousand of songwriters in the Nashville community, Cavender estimated that there are perhaps 500 professional songwriters in the Nashville area, and as few as 50 actually making a viable living at the craft.

Why take a chance and play Lady Luck against such formidable odds? Cavender believes most songwriters are made of very special stuff.

"Songwriters have a long, hard struggle of it — they work very hard, usually with

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MCA Buys ABC's Nashville Artist Roster And Label Staff

In a dramatic move, MCA Records acquired the artist roster and entire staff of ABC Records' Nashville Division this past year to become the pacesetter among Nashville record labels.

In both the Country Music Association Awards last fall and the Academy of Country Music Awards this spring, artists on the new MCA roster gathered more honors than those of any other label. MCA's share of the country charts continues to increase, and in many areas the company leads the industry.

The entire artist roster of the merged companies accounted for 81 charted singles, more than any other record label, during the last 12 month.

Top Of The Chart

The number of MCA artists reaching the top of the charts has grown steadily since March, when MCA President Bob Siner appointed former ABC/Nashville chief Jim Foglesong as President of MCA/Nashville Division. Foglesong brought his staff to MCA, with Erv Woolsey as director of promotion, Ron Chancey as vice president of A&R and Jerry Bailey as publicity director. MCA marketing veteran Chic Doherty was retained as marketing vice president.

The purchase of ABC's Nashville Division by MCA brought some momentum and solidarity to an operation that had seemingly been experiencing constant change. Almost every artist on the roster has experienced increased activity and sales since ther merger, even though overall industry sales have been down. Foglesong estimates that sales for the division by MCA by MCA and MCA by MCA

sion have more than doubled in the last year. Tape sales have increased dramatically for the country roster since the purchase of GRT Tapes by MCA Records.

MCA Records declared the month of July as "Country Music Month" with a marketing campaign designed to give the label's solid country roster high visibility in the market-place, and exceeded the projected sales quota by half a million dollars in the midst of an industry recession. The program, titled "I Love Country — Yours and Mine," promoted 65 album selections. New releases, major current releases and the best catalog items from 34 artists including Conway Twitty, Loretta Lynn, the Oak Ridge Boys, Barbara Mandrell, Don Williams, Tanya Tucker, Merle Haggar, Poco, Roy Clark and Mel Tillis were featured.

Tucker Gold

Tanya Tucker had the first gold album of her career during the last year, with sales of "TNT" approaching 700,000 units. Barbara Mandrell's career explored new dimensions this year with singles which held on to the top of the country charts and climbed high in the pop and R&B charts as well. Loretta Lynn's life story was made into a movie this year with an \$8.5 million budget, set to premiere in early March next year.

Conway Twitty and Merle Haggard both experienced surges in their careers with a series of strong singles boosting their album sales. The Oak Ridge Boys performed before record-breaking crowds as they toured with Kenny Rogers during the spring and fall.

In addition, the Oak Ridge Boys and Bar-

bara Mandrell were among the mostwatched performers in country music as they appeared on dozens of network television shows like "Sha Na Na," "The Susan Anton Special," "The Tonight Sow," "Today," "Dukes of Hazard," "ABC Sports," "NBC Sports;" "PM Magazine," "Dinah!," "Mike Douglas," "Merv Griffin," and various TV movies and specials.

Roy Clark, Barbara Mandrell and the Oak Ridge Boys were the first country artists ever to appear at the Montreux Jazz Festival in Montreux, Switzerland. John Conlee continued to bag number one records and awards as top new male vocalist of the year.

Don William's continued to reign as country music's gentle giant both in the U.S. and abroad, with consistent chart-topping records and awards. Williams renewed his contract with MCA recently, though he was courted by several other major labels. Also signing a new contract with MCA was

Brenda Lee, returning to the label which had sold more than 80 million of her records during her international career.

Optimism At MCA

Foglesong is optimistic about the coming year, stressing the strength of the MCA artist roster. "The artist roster is taking shape," he said. "The two teams have become one unit."

Considering the names on that MCA team — Bill Anderson, Kim Charles, Roy Clark, Jerry Clower, John Conlee, Joe Ely, Micki Fuhrman, Jerry Fuller, Merle Haggard, George Hamilton IV, Rainey Haynes, Lee Hazelwood, Melanie Jayne, Brenda Lee, Loretta Lynn, Barbara Mandrell, Abby Marable, Bill Monroe, Nick Nixon, The Oak Ridge Boys, Ray Pillow, Ernest Rey, John Wesley Ryles, Ronnie Sessions, Cal Smith, Hank Thompson, Tanya Tucker, Conway Twitty, Rafe Van Hoy, Don Williams, Leona Williams and Faron Yong — MCA has never been in better shape.

The newly-realigned marketing operation swung into action in 1979 with the very successful "Country's Winning Team" merchandisisng campaign. With a combination of new and popular catalog product that included Dolly Parton, Ronnie Milsap, Tom T. Hall, Waylon Jennings, Charley Pride, Jerry Reed, Dave & Sugar and others, the program featured openend design allowing retail and radio to inject their own twists to the baseball and winning team themes. RCA provided a variety of point-of-sale materials; from posters to mobiles, and items for give-away, such as baseball caps. gloves, bats and balls. Product outside the "Winning Team" promotion, also received a heavy merchandising push with posters in a variety of sizes, centerpieces and mobiles, T-shirts and other utility items

Regional Artist Showcases

RCA/Nashville also embarked on a series of regional artist showcases that met with overwhelming approval from radio personnel, account representatives and press. Showcases have been staged this

year in New York at the Lone Star Cafe, featuring Tom T. Hall; at Chicago's Nashville North spotlighting Jim Ed Brown and Helen Cornelius, with speical guest Razzy Bailey; at a dude ranch just outside of Dallas with Razzy Bailey, Randey Gurley and Steve Wariner; in Atlanta's Midnight Sun Dinner Theatre for Dave and Sugar; and a Denver showcase of Ronnie Milsap's talents. According to Joe Galante, division vice-president, marketing, RCA, Nashville, "The purpose of these regional showcases is to take these artists to audiences that may never have the opportunity to see them

in a live situation. To that end, 1979's been very successful for both the artists and us at both radio and retail."

For RCA Records/Nashville

Setting the marketing group apart from other Nashville operations is the regional pop promotion staff reporting to Galante. This affords RCA/Nashville the ability to react immediately to the first signs of multi-format potential.

Yet to hit the airwaves will be appearances on NBC's Country Music Special from Washington's Ford Theatre in mid-October; a slot on the CMA awards Show Oct. 8, and a slated special of her own in early Spring for NBC. In person, Dolly has entertained the Far East with a month-long tour and is in the midst of a twomonth long tour of the United States highlighted by five days in September at LA's Amphitheatre. This year also saw her "Heartbreaker" album turn gold, while her latest release, "Great Balls of Fire" (which along with the single, "Sweet Summer "/"Great Balls of Fire" is seeing action on both the pop and country charts), nears gold status

Musical Gold For Jennings

Waylon Jennings continued his dominance of the musical gold standards, racking up two gold LP's ("I've Always Been Crazy" which shipped gold and "Greatest Hits," now nearing platinum) while the legendary "Wanted: The Outlaws" nears the double-platinum level. Waylon is looking to the upcoming album, "What Goes Around Comes Around" and a new single "Come With Me" to maintain the level of

"These combined force undertakings are indicative not only of our investment in the future of CBS Records, Nashville, but also in the future of country music and its evergrowing musical direction," notes Rick Blackburn, vice-president of Nashville's Marketing Division. Blackburn, along with director of marketing, Roy Wunsch, spearhead the Nashville Marketing efforts. With them, the following lineup of specialists round-out the marketing department: Sue Binford, director, press and public information; Mary Ann McCready, director, artist development, Jim Kemp, Epic product manager; Jim Carlson, Columbia product manager.

RIAA Awards

In the past year, CBS has again solidified its commitment to its artists in sealing audience acceptance by aiding to achieve RIAA platinum certification for Willie Nelson's Columbia LP, "Stardust;" and gold certifications for "Willie And Family Live," Willie and Leon Russell's "One For The Road," Johnny Paycheck's Epic LP, "Take This Job And Shove It," and Tanya Tucker's Columbia LP "Tanya Tucker's Greatest Hits."

In the past year, CBS Records model marketing and merchandising techniques have again achieved impressive results. Whether approached from comprehensive campaign, angles — involving strategic

media mixes coupled with strongly visual point of purchase materials, such as its "We've Got The Hits," a fourth quarter campaign that derived significant billing to lead into 1979's first quarter; the "Person to Person Music Program," inclusive of both first and second quarter, and "Hit Wave," third quarter — or approached in a concentrated manner on specific artists projects, CBS has steadily surged above its financial goals

Widespread Exposure

Directly related to CBS' sales successes has been the awareness of its artists to the key element of exposure. Working hand and hand, CBS and its artists have been able to "map sophisticated marketing and merchandising approaches, via the company's artist development and marketing ends, to enhance, revitalize or establish artist's musical acceptances in tandem with radio, television and tour promotion," notes Roy Wunsch. In addition, portions of proceeds from Daniels' annual Volunteer Jam went to benefit the Van Zant-Gaines Children's Fund and the T.J. Martell Memorial Fund for leukemia research.

Since Capitol Industries acquired United Artists Records in February, 1979 and merged the label with EMI-America Records, the new company has made considerable progress, particularly in its already established country division.

Kenny Rogers, though he is an international superstar transcending musical barriers, has anchored the growth and success of EMI/UA's country division with three gold, one platinum, and one double platinum albums all within the past year and a half. "Love Or Something Like It," "Ten Years Of Gold," and "The Gambler" LP is well past double platinum at this time and continues to sell thousands of copies every week.

As a result of Kenny Rogers' success he has received the much coveted Hollywood Walk of Fame award and his star now shines on Hollywood Boulevard with other great entertainers. This, added to his Grammy, Academy of Country Music and numerous other awards, places Kenny Rogers at the forefront not just of the EMI/UA country roster, but its pop roster as well

An integral part of Kenny Rogers' live performances these past two years is Dottie West. Their duet LP "Everytime Two Fools Collide" has been critically acclaimed and has helped bring Dottie recognition. Dottie has a new album scheduled for release later this fall that will be a focal point of

EMI/UA's coordinated marketing program designed to highlight LPs by Kenny Rogers ("Kenny"), Billie Joe Spears and Crystal Gavle "Greatest Hits".

One of the highlights of 1979 for UA's country division has been the acquisition of Cristy Lane. Ms. Lane, who was named Best New Female Artist by the Academy of Country Music after her major success with the single "Simple Little Words," has just had her UA debut LP of the same name released to critical acclaim.

Another major act that has broken down musical barriers, The Dirt Band, has a new album entitled "An American Dream" which retains a great deal of country charm and an interesting version of the 60's hit "Wolverton Mountain."

It's impossible to speak of UA's diversified country roster without mentioning "The Silver Fox," Charlie Rich. This fall will mark the release of a brand new Charlie Rich LP which finds the talented singer in

Among the artists, Emmylou Harris continued to impress as one of country music's stars. Both singles were culled from T.G.'s "¾ Lonely" album, a project combining the talents of Sheppard with those of veteran producer Buddy Killen. The LP immediately outsold his two previous efforts.

T.G. also toured with Dolly Parton, is slated to play the important Fair Buyer's Convention in Las Vegas with Helen Reddy and guested on a number of national TV shows.

The Bellamy Brothers, who enjoyed a number one pop single in 1976 with "Let Your Love Flow," duplicated the feat on the country charts in 1979 with "If I Said You Had A Beautiful Body Would You Hold It Against Me," a single that topped the charts for three weeks. Howard and David's followup, "You Ain't Just Whistlin' Dixie," also moved into the top five.

Considered by many to be the "Everly Brothers of the '80's," the duo has established a "Florida Sound" they take to the road 200 times annually. The pair also scored international success, particularly in England, Holland and Germany.

Donna Fargo continued to mine her top 10 vein with "Somebody Special," while

Track Record

This track record reflects the mixture of old and new which characterizes the E/A Nashville roster. The past year saw the signings of Mel Tillis, Hank Williams Jr., Jerry Lee Lewis, Tommy Overstreet, Susie Allanson, Roy Head, Jim Weatherly and Red Steagall. Tillis and Head will release albums this month.

The classics and the comers are balanced by new talent like Diana, Rock Killough Troy Seals, Sterling Whipple, Bobby Braddock and Dennis William Wilson. Many of these debuting artists are songwriters stepping forward as performers, continuing the E/A tradition of the singer songwriter with a Nashville inflection.

That there is no Iron Curtain between "pop" and "country" is the belief of Jimmy Bowen, who joined E/A Last December as its first vice president/general manager of Nashville operations. A former MCA

Derrick Records Finds Success As An Independent

Derrick Records was founded in 1973 by Kenneth R. Couch, now president of the label, who had been involved in country music for 20 years. After leaving the business briefly, Couch's interest in getting back into it resumed after attending some sessions with friends Moe Bandy and Ray Baker, and the new label was born.

Shortly afterward, Leon Rausch, concluding a 15 year involvement with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys, began to record on the Derrick label with Ray Baker as producer. Prior to this time, Leon had recorded for a number of other labels, as well as recording with the Playboys until Bob's last day. Leon is also the singer for The Original Texas Playhouse on their Capitol releases.

Rausch has had 13 single releases on Derrick and the fifth one, "Through The Bottom of the Glass," began generating chart activity. After six years, Derrick is preparing to release the 14th single on Rausch.

In April, 1978, it became evident that Derrick Records would have to improve distribution and promotion if the company was to become recognized nationally. Someone was needed with the experience and understanding of the business for the required reorganization. Jack Bernstein, Pickwick vice president, suggested Steven Newell for the job.

The first steps taken were in establishing a national distributing network. This was

Cachet Intros New Concepts In Promotion

Cachet Records was given birth in May of this year; bringing forth a new concept in that it incorporates traditional promotional techniques with direct response TV advertising

These six months have proven to be extremely fruitful for the new label. Internationally renowned star, Nana Mouskouri, was signed to the label almost immediately after its formation. Her single release of "Nickles and Dimes" was followed by release of her "Rose and Sunshine" LP which is already double platinum in Canada. A second Cachet single is set for stateside release in the near future.

On the heels of the Mouskouri signing came a lease-purchase arrangement between Cachet and Pete Drake Productions on the Drake-produced "Ernest Tubb: The Legend and the Legacy" LP which is already certified gold in Canada and securely riding the Top 10 portion of the U.S. charts. Tubb's rendition of "Waltz Across Texas" in duet with Willie Nelson became the first single released and his harmonious version of "Walkin' The Floor Over You" with Merle Haggard and Charlie Daniels is set for immediate release.

Other Signings

Additional signings to Cachet brought in the multi-talented Ronnie Prophet whose first Cachet LP, "Just For You," was recently certified gold in Canada and his first single release there of "Everybody Needs A Love Song" is in the top of the charts. Prophet, host of the Juno Award winning "Grand Ole Country" TV show in Canada, was nominated again this year in Canada's RPM Big Country Awards Presentation in the Male Vocalist, TV Show and Entertainer of the Year categories.

Veteran entertainer Ferlin Husky was recently signed to the label and has a new single, "Baby," set for release now with an album to follow in November.

Then, in August, Johnny Cash brought "the album I've wanted to do all my professional life" to Ed LaBuick, president Cachet and an exclusive North American release deal was finalized. Entitled "A Believer Sings the Truth," the brand new, collector-packaged double album was preceded with release of the "There Are Strange Things Happening Every Day" single in September with the full record set for shipping this month complete with a major marketing this month complete with a major marketing and TV promotional campaign.

A division of Global Communications of Canada, Cachet maintains offices in Los Angeles, Nashville and Toronto. Its founder and president, Ed LaBuick, is headquartered in Toronto. Sol Greenberg serves as general manager of all U.S. operations and moved recently into new quarters in Los Angeles with Patrica Paul as his assistant. Ted Kleinman recently joined the company as controller in the L.A. office.

Heading up the Nashville offices, which houses all Cachet promotional activities, are Mike Kelly as national promotion director and Randy Lavigne as director of operations, Nashville.

Kendalls' Success No Fluke As Ovation Duo Prove In '79

A year has gone by since The Kendalls won the CMA Single of the Year and Brien Fisher won Producer of the Year awards for "Heaven's Just A Sin Away." Since that time a lot has happened at Ovation Records, Nashville.

The Kendalls have had another year of non-stop success, both on the road and on the charts. They will cap out their touring schedule this month when they will import their unique sound to Germany and sing their songs to country music lovers and their fans overseas.

Joe Sun, whose first record climbed to #14 on the national charts last year, has fulfilled all the early promise with his new album on Ovation released this summer. Sun, who Johnny Cash called, "the greatest

The sisters have also signed a booking agreement this year, aligning themselves with the Nashville office of William Morris. Their single, "Make Love To Me," did well on the country charts and at AOR and A/C stations nationally.

Showcase

In the spring of 1979, Ovation held a showcase for NARAS at the Stagedoor Lounge of the Opryland Hotel. The date was sold out as the Nashville music industry turned out to see The Kendalls, Joe Sun and his band Shotgun, The Cates, and Ovation Records' newest pretty face, Sheila Andrews. ficially open the new ASCAP building on Nashville's "Music Row." With that ceremony a new era began in the field of country music.

"The record breaking growth which began in ASCAP's Nashville southern offices in the late sixties has again produced unprecedented success as reflected by the Society's eighteen #1 country songs in the trade charts just this year," commented ASCAP southern regional executive director, Ed Shea. "Our total involvement in Nashville, as the pivot, and the surrounding territories in the past decade has mushroomed to the point where 1979 has truly been our greatest year ever.

ASCAP members' recent success in the Academy of Country Music Awards highlights the extraordinary growth of ASCAP music in today's Country market. At the ACM Awards, Randy Goodrum's "You Needed Me" was chosen Song of the Year and Kenny Rogers was named both Entertainer of the Year and Top Male Vocalist.

ASCAP country writers also figured prominently in other 1979 awards presentations: Don Schlitz won a Grammy earlier this year for the Best Country Song of the Year, "The Gambler," and the Nashville Songwriters Association International Award for Best Song went to "You Needed Me" (Randy Goodrum), and for Best Songwriter of the Year to Sonny Throckmorton.

ASCAP's impact on the country scene has mounted significantly over the past several years with the result that the presence of ASCAP licensed material on the country charts has more than tripled.

In 1978, the CMA Awards included ASCAP writers in the categories of Best Song: "Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue" (Richard Leigh); Best Male Vocalist, Don Williams; Best Album of the Year: Ronnie Milsap; and Best Duo: Kenny Rogers. In the same year Grammys were won by Kenny Rogers for Best Country Vocal Performance; by Richard Leigh for Best Country Song ((Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue"); and by Hargus "Pig" Robbins for Best Country Instrumental Performance as well as for Best Country Instrumentalist of the Year.

BMI Nashville Broadens The Scope Of Its Activities In '79

The BMI building on Music Row in Nashville has become a center for not only the gathering of affiliated writers and publishers, but for meetings of major music functions and organizations.

Over the past year, BMI Nashville has remained totally involved with the Country Music community, while reaching out and cementing lasting relationships with various other segments of the American community.

"While helping to develop the southern area as a cornerstone of the music industry, we at BMI have not only sought the writers and publishers of today and the future, but have placed ourselves in the position where we can enhance the thrust of all music in America," says BMI vice president, Frances Preston.

"We have a staff deep in experience. which has become immersed in all music wherever and whenever it happens within our territory." She continued, adding, "A chief concern of ours, of course is Nashville and making it the complete music center, which attracts, assists and develops talent from all over the world.

How does the BMJ operation in Nashville go about doing a job that produces such extensive results? It encourages its executives' talent to become involved.

Preston, for example, serves and often heads key committees and organizations in Music City and has become a national music figure. However, all of her involvement doesn't keep her from her daily activities overseeing the Nashville operation, keeping abreast of the activity within the music community, spending time with new writers and publishers, as well as being visible at all music functions that take place. She has been named by Rosalyn Carter to the commission that will help select new recordings for the White House library with duplicates stored at the Kennedy Center in Washington. She is also heading a project wiht the Country Music Association to take Country Music to China.

The other major BMI executives in Music City, Del Bryant, director of performing rights relations; Jerry Smith, assistant director of writer relations; Joe Moscheo, director of affiliate relations; and Patsy Bradley, director of publisher administration, are active locally and beyond.

Equally important, BMI Nashville has become increasingly immersed in the acts and activities of the music community by making the rounds of concerts, clubs, recording studios, listening rooms, and by keeping an open and understanding ear to songwriters and publishers and their

BMI Nashville also honors its own people with special events. For instance, a luncheon, the first of its kind, honoring the writers and publishers in the Southern area of Million Performance Songs, and a luncheon for Nashville's Disco writers have been held. BMI also hosts many events in its facilities on Music Row. The Copyright Tribunal, the National Music Publishers Association, the Young Music Publishers Association, the Black Music Association national board meeting, a luncheon for Tennessee representative Albert Gore, Jr. and music business notables where

problems in the music industry have been discussed and certain questions resolved.

All this activity, local, state and national. will continue on an escalated level. Frances Preston insists that the future of BMI in Nashville and in the entire music industry for that matter, depends on involvement in music of all kinds and in interaction with other organizations, writers, publishers, lawyers, agents accountants and bankers, the academic community, local, state and federal governments promoting the cause

SESAC '79: A Year Of Changes

1979 was a year of dramatic change for SESAC, both in Nashville and throughout the music world. Early in the year, a totally new image was adopted for the 48-year-old music licensing firm, stressing a greater involvement in new musical trends. The firm's logo, well-established throughout the industry, took on a new look and became a stylized musical cleft, encompassing the SESAC world of music

In the Nashville office, a complete reorganization took place with C. Dianne Petty, one of Nashville's leading women executives, taking over as SESAC's director of country music. To her new post, Petty brought a wealth of music industry ex-

Since joining SESAC this year, Petty has garnered numerous new writer and publisher affiliates for the SESAC roster and has placed many promising young writers with the firm's already established publishing affiliates. But SESAC's activity in the country field is not limited to Nashville. The firm's roster now includes important country writer and publisher affiliates in such areas as Texas, Oklahoma. California and Alabama, with the list continuing to grow.

Naming Petty to head SESAC's country division was only one of the many changes that took place in the firm's Nashville office. Lisa DeMontbreun, also formerly with ABC Music Companies, Inc., joined Petty as her administrative assistant, and Jennifer Bryan was named office administrator. David DeBolt, a well-known figure on the Nashville music scene, was named public relations coordinator for the Nashville office, and in this capacity, he will work closely with both the country and the gospel divisions.

This new young team of top professionals is joined by veteran SESAC executive Jim Black, director of gospel music, and the entire staff is presently moving into expanded renovated quarters in the SESAC building at 11 Music Circle South, in the heart of Music Row.

1979 found SESAC copyrights appearing regularly on the charts by some of the industry's leading artists. Both in the U.S. and throughout the world, the hit motion picture, "Convoy," brought added performance to that already record-breaking C. W. McCall hit. The Kendalls' chart-topping "Heaven's Just a Sin Away" continued to get heavy exposure, both on the air and at






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1979 Marks Successful Year For The CMA

1979 marked the beginning of the Country Music Association's third decade, which was highlighted by major growth internally as well as externally. Additionally Hill and Knowlton, the world's largest PR firm in conjunction with CMA's board of directors, who met for the first three of 1979's quarterly board meetings in Puerto Rico, Tucson, Arizona and Calgary, Alberta was retained to plan and direct the association's activities for the coming year.

In June CMA once again co-sponsored Interntional Country Music Fan Fair in Nashville and was responsible for producing several of the live shows, including the Cajun Show, Reunion Show, Independent Label Show, and International Show; as

Nashville NARAS Expands Local, National Projects

Under the leaderhsip of president Bill Justis, who was re-elected to a second term, executive director Francine Anderson and the board of governors, the Nashville chapter of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (NARAS) continues to expand its scope of activities to include several projects of both local and national significance.

On May 8, 1979, the Nashville chapter of NARAS honored Nashville's most valuable musicians, background vocalists and engineers at a gala awards banquet held at Richland Country Club.

The Nashville chapter continued its series of showcases with local aritsts and record labels with proceeds providing supplemental revenue to further develop and expand the Nashville chapter's activities and membership benefits. The following were the showcases held during this past vear: a gospel music showcase in conjunction with the Gospel Music Association; a disco music showcase in conjunction with Dillard & Boyce Productions; a country music showcase in conjunction with Ovation Records: and the W.O.R.S.T. (World's Oldest Rock Stars Together) showcase which was held on September 25 at the National Guard Armory

The Nashville chapter's scholarship fund was activated in January 1979. This fund was established to lend finaincial aid to talented and deserving students presently studying the music business. Belmont College, Middle Tenn. State University and Fisk University were the recipients of \$1,-000 scholarship each.

The NARAS Institute Journal is now being sent to all Nashville chapter members as a newly added membership benefit.

Another high point of the year was the membership increase which entitled the Nashville chapter of NARAS to elect an additional national trustee to represent the chapter on a national basis. The chapter's national trustees include: Bill Justis, Buzz Cason, John Sturdivant, Roger Sovine and Glenn Snoddy. Don Butler was elected national vice president representing the Nashville chapter.

The chapter's future plans include seminars covering the different facets of the recording industry, more scholarships, the continuing series of showcases and the on-going membership drive. well as coordinating the annual Fan Fair Celebrity Softball Tournament. This year for the first time, CMA brought Mutual Radio's "Larry King Show" to Nashville to broadcast live every night from Fan Fair. The program, which is one of radio's most popular shows, has a listening audience of approximately 12 million.

Following Fan Fair, Tennessee Senator Jim Sasser brought the five members of the National Copyright Tribunal to Nashville to meet with country music industry personnel. CMA hosted a breakfast for the Tribunal members during their visit.

In 1979 — for the first time — CMA presented a Special Award to the person who had contributed most to country music during the past year. The recipient of the award — unanimously voted upon by CMA's board of directors — was President Jimmy Carter. A CMA delegation travelled to Washington in May to present the award to President Carter, including Willie Nelson and Charley Pride, who actually made the presentation. The award consisted of an engreaved Steuben glass bowl and a certificate.

CMA has enjoyed a long and pleasant relationship with another fine music association, NARM, which is approximately the same age as CMA. Since 1967, CMA has presented country music during NARM's annual conventions. The two organizations have also worked together on regional meetings, the latest one having been held in Nashville in September.

International Thurst

CMA's current thrust of developing country music internationally took a giant leap forward during 1979. Concurrent with the MIDEM conference in Cannes, France this May, CMA had a meeting of its international development committee chairmen from several European countries, as well as Japan and Australia and members of the CMA board's international committee. International development committee chairman from all over the world were invited to attend the 1979 third annual board meeting in Calgary, as well.

Recently, CMA hosted a dinner in Nashville for visiting members of the Black Music Association's board of directors, who were meeting there. A country supper was served at the stately Two Rivers mansion; then BMA representatives were taken to the Grand Ole Opry, where Stevie Wonder made a guest appearance.

In preparation for Country Music Month in October, CMA arranged for Willie Nelson to send letters to governors requesting Country Music proclamations from their respective states. To promote country Music Month, CMA produced and mailed out public service spots by various artists; worked on a promotional display with 600 shopping centers throughout the U.S.; and placed a display in the Nashville Ariport.

On Oct. 8, the 13th Annual CMA Awards Show will be telecast live from the Grand Ole Opry House in Nashville. This year — for the second time — CMA has also offered a simulcast of the Awards Show to several radio stations. And for the first time, there will be a 90-minute Post Awards Show boradcast live over the NBC Network.

Instead of its annual banquet and show, CMA is hosting a Post Awards Party, immediately following the Awards Show in a structure adjacent to the Grand Ole Opry House. Nominees, winners, presenters and performers, and CMA members have been invited to attend this party.

During the past year, McManis And

During the past year, McManis And Associates, a management consulting firm in Washighton D.C., was engaged to assist in restructuring the office of CMA, which went into effect mid-August. A new associate executive director, Ed Benson, was added to the staff, and four new departments were created: Programming and Special Projects; Membership Development; Public Information; and Administrative Services.

In announcing these major steps, Jo Walker indicated that CMA continues to be the strong force behind country music and a leader in the music industry.

Reflecting upon CMA's 21st year, executive director Jo Walker commented upon the exciting growth country music has experienced. "The number of radio stations successfully programming country music has taken a decided upward leap. The amount of country music on television is phenomenal compared to a decade ago. with the greatest number ever in 1979. In addition to CMA's Awards Show on Oct. 8, there's the special made at Ford Theatre in Washington on Oct. 2, featuring Mother Maybelle Carter's music, the Crystal Gayle special, Kenny Rogers' special, Johnny Cash's Christmas special, Merry Christmas from the Grand Ole Opry, Chritmas Carol (Charles Dicken's tale told by country music stars,) plus numerous apperances on other network shows before the close of the year. The continued success of "Hee Haw," "Pop Goes The Country," "That Good Ole Nashville Music," "Nashville on the Road," "Porter Wagoner's Show," 'Marty Robbins' Show," etc. is further witness to the growing acceptance of coun-

CMF Expands Via New Exhibits, Projects In 1979

Two major new museum exhibits, and dramatically expanded record collection, and major advances in education and audio lab projects were just a few of the high points of 1979 for the Country Music Foundation, the nonprofit organization that operates the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum on Music Row.

The Museum added more exhibits than at any previous time in the past three years, including "Songs and Songwriters," a tribute to country tunesmiths that includes original manuscripts of hit songs and pushbutton games featuring publishing facts; and "How Stringed Instruments Work, which lets people hear the sounds made by the banjo, guitar, fiddle, and piano by playing replicas of the instruments.

The Country Music Foundation Library and Media Center added about 7,500 recordings to its collection, boosting its holding of sound recordings to well over 75,000 discs. In addition, the Library, after two years of negotiation, has initiated an agreement with the Library of Congress which will enable the Foundation Library to acquire a complete set of Armed Forces Radio & Television Service transcriptions, and copies of other government-produced discs, dating from 1943. This agreement will add up to 300,000 discs over the next several years to the Foundation Library's collection.

The Foundation Library's audio restoration lab is now 90 percent complete, and is scheduled for dedication in January, 1980. The lab, which will be used to restore and preserve the Foundation's recorded sound collection, will be the best facility of its kind in the South.

The Foundation's Education Department reached over 12,000 students in the Nashville area with free in-class presentations during the 1979-80 school year on the history of country music in Nashville.

The Foundation's Publication Department has expanded its range of activities, and has taken a new interest in more commercial publications, including a historical country music calendar, a calendar spotlighting the Museum's exhibits, and a redesigned "Journal of Country Music," which is now geared to present popular articles as well as features of a scholarly nature. A recent in-depth interview with Don Williams indicated the new direction the "Journal" is taking.

These full-time staff members joined the Foundation in 1979: Al Cunniff, director of publicity and advertising; John Lomax, oral historian; Kookie Liles, publications assistant; Melissa McCrary, an assistant in tour, travel, and museum operations; and Linda Chestnut, an accounting department assistant

In 1979 the Foundation hosted a visit by Sen. Robert Byrd, the installation of new members of its Walkway of Stars, the Fan Fair's Reunion of veteran country musicians, and visits by members of the boards of CBS, Inc. and the Black Music Association.

The Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum, like almost all other U.S. tourist attractions, was hurt by this summer's drop in tourism due to the gas shortage.































The new facilities house the Nashville administration, Jim Vienneau and Voque Productions, and staff writers — Bob McDill; Dickey Lee; Larry Kingston; Don Williams, Wayland Holyfield; Marcia Routh; Danny Flowers: David Williamson: and Kenneth Bell, Terry SKinner & J. L. Wallace of Muscle Shoals.

Writers, McDill, Holyfield, Williams and Flowers were responsible for six Top 5 songs in the charts this year, three of which were #1, including: Ronnie Milsap's, "Nobody Likes Sad Songs," written by

The past year has seen a major thrust of McDill and Holyfield; "Tulsa Time," written by Flowers and recorded by Don Williams; and McDill's, "Amanda," a tremendous cross-over hit by Waylon Jennnings. published by Gold Dust Music, and nominated for CMA Awards, "Single of the Year" and "Song of the Year.

Welk has also seen continued success with the catalog material of writers, Foster & Rice, Larry Kingston, Marcia Routh and Dave Loggins. "Pieces Of April," a Dave Loggins composition and recording, acquired by Welk 21/2 years ago, has also been a great cross-over hit for the

publishing firm.

Don Williams, while continuing his writing career with the Welk Group, re-, signing with MCA and recording a new album, has also been touring the United States and still remains the top Country artist in Europe. Williams has been nominated for "Male Vocalist of the Year" by the CMA.

Dickey Lee, in addition to his writing, has signed a new contract with Mercury Records, who has released a new album, entitled, "Dickey Lee," and a single, "I'm Just A Heartache Away," written by Lee and Holyfield.

New Pop Group

Another new development this year was the birth of a new pop group, BAMA, comprised of writers, Terry Skinner, J. L. Wallace and Kenneth Bell. Bama's first album and single, "Touch Me When We're Dancing," has recently been released on the RCA/Free Flight label. The album, produced by Jim Vienneau and Bama for Vogue Productions, is a compilation of a musical variety of the three writer's songs, covering a wide spectrum of formats, including A/C, Pop, Country and Disco/Funk.

Screen Gems-EMI Growing

Charlie Feldman, general manager of Screen Gems-EMI Music Inc./Colgems-EMI Music Inc., Nashville Operations, cites several significant factors in the company's growth during the past year.

First, there have been new additions to the songwriting staff, Casey Kelly, Julie Didier and Beth Nielsen. Kelly and Didier have had songs recorded by such artists as Kenny Rogers and Dottie West, America, Helen Reddy, Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Ed Bruce, Loretta Lynn, Johnny Rivers, Charlie Rich Janie Fricke and others. A major recording deal with Capitol Records is currently in the works for Nielsen, who will be produced by Barry Beckett of Muscle Shoals Sound Productions.

Second, the company has enjoyed extensive catalog activity during the past year with such singles as "Come On In," a Top Five hit by the Oak Ridge Boys; "My Heart Has A Mind Of Its Own" and "Breakin' In A Brand New Broken Heart," both country hits by Debbie Boone; "Spanish Eyes," a recent Top 20 hit by Charlie Rich; and "I Love How You Love Me," a Top 20 hit by Lynn Anderson. In addition, "Always On My Mind," recorded by John Wesley Ryles, has just been released as a single. Screen Gems/Colgems also has songs in 20 albums currently in the Cash Box country album charts, including "Waylon's Greatest

Hits," "Classics" by Kenny Rogers & Dottie West, Anne Murray's "New Kind Of Feeling," "Waylon & Willie," "Willie & Family Live," and "The Best Of Dolly Parton."



Int'l Records Dist. **Assoc. Diversifies** Into Many Fields

The country was in the midst of the 1973/74 recession when Mike Shepherd, then manager of the Warner Bros. Records office in Nashville, and arranger/conductor Hank Levine recognized the need for a distribution outlet for the independent record* producer and small label. They felt their potential hit product was being regularly rejected by major labels due to the economic conditions in the record industry at the time, and so they started International Record Distributing Associates (IRDA). Their idea then, as now, was to press up the necessary promotional copies of the record, mail them to radio stations, follow up with promotion and sales, then collective from distributors on each record sold keeping a small amount as royalty and disburs-, ing the balance of the funds to the owner after pressing costs were deducted. The idea was new, and it worked.

In the first few months of operation the company had a Top 10 hit single with "I Want To Hold You In My Dreams Tonight? by Stella Parton on the Soul Country label, followed immediately by "The Man On Page 602" by Zoot Fenster on Antique Records. These hits were followed over the next five years by chart records for Randy Barlow, David Rogers, Cathy Barnes, Christy Lane, Brick, John Wesly Ryles, Hot Ice, Vicky Fletcher, Brian Shaw, Bobby Smith, Candy Lee, Tommy Overstreet and

In the meantime, the company expanded into distribution of album product for small labels, and to date, numbers over 150 titles in its Album World division catalog. Among them are such name artists as Duke Ellington, Peter Frampton, Tommy Overstreet, Sly Stone, Muhammad Ali, Neil Sedaka, Tony Orlando, Gladys Knight And The Pips, The Ink Spots, Tina Turner, Rod Stewart And Faces, Hoyt Axton, Jerry Lee Lewis, Sarah Vaughn, Billie Holiday and Ferlin Husky. Executive vice president Mike Shepherd states, "These albums are

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WHN's Gamble on Count

by Bob Campbell

is simply talked-about radio station in the entire New York area."

New York City hammers with a pulse and rhythm all its own - a sturdy alloy of blood, bone, steel, concrete and untamed energy — at first glance, an unlikely place to harbor the soothing strains of modern country music

But thanks to a heavy bet placed by WHN radio back in 1973, New Yorkers today hear large, daily doses of Kenny Rogers, Eddie Rabbitt, Crystal Gayle, Glen Campbell, Johnny Cash, Dolly Parton, Willie Nelson, Elvis Presley and other country stars. WHN gambled that New York, a city with a big heart underneath its abrupt exterior, would respond to the warmth of country music. Now, WHN stands as the #2 station in the entire New York radio market and is simply the most talked-about station in the metro area

In 1973, the 50,000-watt AM station switched formats from MOR to all-country, but it failed to work. However, in 1975 a team of top professional radio men was brought in and the tide began to turn.

Together, they educated New York on the feasibility and potential strength of country.

The assumption in those days was that country listeners were a rough-hewn lot of blue collar workers who did little in their spare time but kick their feet up on a table and drink beer. But studies proved that a high percentage of listeners were college graduates. In general, they were people in the 25-49 age group who bought homes, new cars and other quality items.

Like a good poker player, WHN didn't fold because of a couple of weak hands. The station figured the odds, waited for an opening, and then struck for the jugular vein in the most competitive radio market in the world. WHN reaches nearly two million listeners a week these days. The station has been featured in several media and broadcasting trade magazines and is courted by the top sales accounts in the city.

No one handed success to WHN on a silver platter. It was an uphill battle, but a fruitful one.



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

The History Of Country Music Is As Rich As American Soil

covered in 1927 as Jimmie Rodgers and the Carter Family first recorded in August of that year. Uncle Dave Macon, Carson Robison, Charlie Poole, Fiddlin' John Carson, Riley Puckett, Gid Tanner and the Skillet Lickers, and Ernest Stoneman were among country music's first recording stars in the pre-Depression era.

The 1930s, Depression or not, proved to be country music's most creative decade. A wide variety of musical styles bloomed all at once. Gene Autry drew national attention to country music with the development of the singing cowboy, and Tex Ritter, the Sons of the Pioneers, and Roy Rogers all gained national acclaim. Ernest Tubb and Al Dexter defined and refined honky tonk, while the Hackberry Ramblers brought in Cajun music from the Bayou South. Bob Wills and Milton Brown developed country dance music and called it western swing down in Texas. At the same time the duet sound of the Monroe Brothers, the Delmore Brothers, and the Blue Sky Boys preserved the mountain sound of the southeast. Bill Monroe and Roy Acuff forged new styles out of the mountain tradition.

The 1940s and early 1950s saw the rise of

the individual singing star, as Eddy Arnold, Kitty Wells, Red Foley, Merle Travis, and, of course, Hank Williams came to national prominence. The 1950s also saw the continued growth of the star system — Ray Price, Carl Smith, Webb Pierce and others. However, it was seriously disrupted by the arrival of rockabilly — a synthesis of hard-edged country music and modern rhythm and blues. Its greatest proponents were Carl Perkins, Jerry Lee Lewis, Johnny Cash, and, of course. Flvis Presley.

Rockabilly Emerges

When rockabilly swept the nation it disturbed much of the country music world. An alternative developed, and Nashville musicians and record producers like Chet Atkins and Owen Bradley developed the Nashville Sound. It fathered its own stars, among them Jim Reeves and Patsy Cline. It also established Nashville as a national recording center of considerable importance. Beginning in the late 1950s, a great many national firms established offices, studios, and publishing companies in Nashville. The Athens of the south became known as Music City U.S.A. This pattern of growth has not been interrupted to this day.

The 1960s and 1970s have witnessed few

dramatic musical changes — other than, perhaps, the rise of the singer-songwriter. After the success of Kris Kristoferson, a whole new set of influential performers developed, among them Loretta Lynn, Merle Haggard, Dolly Parton, Willie Nelson, and many others.


Mainstream Influences

As country music has grown in national influence, it has made many accommodations to and with mainstream popular music. Popular singers like John Denver, Charlie Rich, and Olivia Newton-John are brought in under the increasingly widening umbrella of "country." Yet it is a tribute to country music's loyal and divergent fans that at the same time a "progressive" Austin sound is flourishing. Revivals of more traditional country music like bluegrass and western swing, are reaching more people now than in their historical heyday. Honky tonk can still be heard on nearly every jukebox, rockabilly rocks on, and todays' singers still emulate Jimmie Rodgers' lonesome blue vodel. A host of small record labels provide historical and current bluegrass, Cajun, string band music,

music. It is obvious that country music from all areas continues to grow at a remarkable rate.


Exciting Music

Country music is the sum of many, many parts, and its listeners and devotees are just as eclectic and diverse in their tastes as the music they love. What they find in country music, regardless of what style, era, or performer they favor, is exciting music. More than this they find music of authenticity, genuine sincerity and of the heart. Uncle Dave Macon sang of truth and life, as does Loretta Lynn. Tex Ritter's cowboy songs are not so dissimilar to yesterday's train songs and today's trucking sagas. The folk singers of the mountains a hundred years ago knew and conveyed the pain of Careless Love. It is the same pain today's singers recognize in "For The Good Times." The single long unbroken thread running through all the wildly various and desperate elements in country music is this constant touching of genuine emotion, real feeling. In this way, country music speaks to us all, shares the emotion we feel - elation, excitement, depression, religious conviction, pain and love.

"Sleeping Single In A Double Bed" by Dennis Morgan and Kye Fleming was picked by Cash Box as the #2 song for 1979. It was recorded by Barbara Mandrell and also reached the number one position. Her most recent single "Fooled By A Feeling" also written by Morgan/Fleming is on its way up the chart. Pi-Gem writer Geof Morgan has three custs on the latest Bar-bara Mandrell album, "Just For The Record.

Other Successes

Charley Pride has reached the #1 spot with two Pi-Gem songs, "You're My Jamaica" written by Kent Robbins and "Burgers And Fries" written by Ben Peters.

Dave and Sugar hit number one with "Golden Tears" composed by John Schweers (Chess). John is now producing Cliff Cochran (RCA) and his first single,

"Love Me Like A Stranger" (John Schweers and David Wills) climbed into the top 25, and his latest single, "First Thing Each Morning, Last Thing At Night" is looking even hetter

Charles Quillen and Conrad Pierce (Chess) teamed up to write "Back On My Mind Again" while Archie Jordan (Chess) joined talents with Hal David to write "Santa Barbara." This double sided single hit the number one spot for Ronnie Milsap.

Martin/Jordan

Naomi Martin (Pi-Gem) and Archie Jordan teamed up to write "Let's Take The Long Way Around The World" which also hit the number one spot for Milsap. He is currently on his way to #1 with "In No Time At All" composed by Archie Jordan and Richard Leigh.

Kye Fleming and Dennis Morgan teamed with two other writers to put "Got To Give Into Love" as recorded by Bonnie Boyer on the Pop and Disco charts.

Thomas Gospel

Archie Jordan and Hal David are producing Orsa Lia and wrote "I Never Said I Love You" and currently have a new single out by her which is entitled "I Can't Hold On.

Archie Jordan also produced B.J. Thomas gospel. "Happy Man," the first album they had out, won a Grammy for Vest Inspirational Performance. The current album is "You Gave Me Love.

Reneau (chess) have the most recent single on Joe Sun, "I'd Rather Go On Hurtin" which is getting action on the Cash Box chart

Sylvia, a new artist on RCA, had a mid-September release with the song "You Don't Miss A Thing" (Morgan/Fleming). Another recent release from the Pi-Gem organization is "Endless," recorded by David Wills on United Artists and written by Don Pfrimmer and Gary Harrison.

7 Number Ones

Pi-Gem/Chess Music, Inc., under the leadership of president Tom Collins, has 17 chart records in Cash Box this year, 7 of which went to number one.

Hudson Agency Goes To Bat For Opry Broadcast

Bill Hudson & Associates, whose fifteen vear association with the entertainment industry has included public relations services for both music companies and the film industry, launched one of its most unique campaigns during the year for the famous Grand Ole Opry.

The agency was retained to rally support of the clear channel voice of WSM whose Grand Ole Opry is beamed out each week to millions of listeners in 34 states. The first step was to organize the many fans of the Grand Ole Opry into a viable force, offering suggestions on a nationwide basis to the thousands of pleas of "what can we do to help." An organization called "Friends of the Grand Ole Opry" was formed with Roy

Acuff as honorary chairman, and the effort was launched

Letter Campaign

Thousands of letters were sent from listeners in the States and many foreign countries to the F.C.C., in addition to letters and petitions sent to both congressmen and senators from the fans and the industry's stars. Over 100 country music radio stations joined in the effort by running radio spots recorded by recording artists Ronnie Milsap, Danny Davis and Tom T.

Hundreds of items ran nationwide in the press, including many editorials in support of the Opry and the television networks came to Nashville to air reports on the pending threat to the Opry. Minnie Pearl flew to Washington and created a sensation when she testified before the Congressional Sub-committee on Communications, requesting the continuance of the Opry broadcast, known nationally and internationally for its wholesome family entertainment and home-spun humor.

Tennessee Congressman Bill Boner introduced H.R. 1913 which, if passed, would prohibit the F.C.C. from reducing the coverage area of the nation's 25 Class 1-A clear channel stations, and to date, has 56 co-sponsors in the House. Both Senator Baker and Senator Gore provided guidance and support of the efforts, in addition to S. 622, introduced by Senator Barry Goldwater before the Senate. Both bills are pending before the respective Congressional Communication Sub-

Committees.

Government Action

While no decision has been made yet as to whether the F.C.C. will break down the clear channel question, both the F.C.C. and Congress are well aware of the impact any such move would have on the service provided by clear channel stations, especially the unique programming of the Opry on WSM. The "Friends of the Grand Ole Opry" are continuing to communicate with the Communictions Sub-Committees and are hopeful the status of the clear channel stations can be maintained.

The Hudson agency provides both advertising and public relations to the music industry and was recently presented an award from the National Advertsing Agency Network, whose members represent 38 major advertising markets, for its national public relations program for the Grand Ole Opry.

New Staff, Song Action Highlight Cedarwood

The addition of new staff members, new song activity in the U.S. and abroad, and extensive remodeling of its offices and recording studio were some of the highlights of the past year for Cedarwood Publishing Co., Inc., one of Nashville's oldest publishing firms.

The recent announcement that

IBC Paced By 'Cheaper Crude'

IBC Records has released three nicely received singles this year. "Cheaper Crude Or No More Food," by Bobby So Fine Butler, "Please Sing Satin Sheets For Me" by Jeanne Pruett and the recent release by Hilka and Jebry, "I Just Wonder Where He Could Be Tonight." A fourth record, "If You Got It, A Trucker Brought It" was serviced but never released because of the subsequent backlash from the trucker's strike.

"Cheaper Crude Or No More Food" was one of the most publicized singles of the year. The record was reviewed by the New York Times, L.A. Times, Newsweek, Business Week, and Us Magazine. Good Morning America, The Today Show, and all of the network nightly news shows featured it. Paul Harvey broke a record on his nationwide broadcast by playing it three separate times. It was the first time Harvey had ever played music in his thirty years of broadcasting.

IBC's president William Sorenson, stated "We have expanded from three offices to ten with seven full time employees, while releasing few but quality recordings. More of the same can be expected from IBC in its' second year, hopefully with even greater

Cedarwood's "Teddy Bear" would be the subject of a full-length motion picture also marked the start of what Cedarwood president Bill Denny hopes is a new trend for his company: music for films, both as story themes and soundtrack music.
"Teddy Bear," "Tobacco Road," and

"Ruby (Don't Take Your Love to Town.)" all Cedarwood classics, have each had at least five cover versions in the past year in Europe, a sign of the company's new effort to increase foreign royalties.

Cedarwood's "domestic cuts" thus far this year include songs by Elvis Presley (whose version of "Are You Sincere" was released this year), Mel Tillis, Faron Young, Susie Allanson, Jerry Lee Lewis, Sammi Smith, Jessi Colter, Carl Perkins, Joe Sun. Jerry Jeff Walker, Porter Wagoner, Red Sovine, and Hank Snow.

In addition, Cedarwood enjoyed exposure on two major reissues: an album of Kenny Rogers' greatest hits (which included "Ruby"), and a Buddy Holly album (including Cedarwood's "Think It Over").

Larry Lee has joined the Cedarwood staff as a professional manager. Larry formerly worked in this capacity for House of Cash and Screens Gems publishers. Barney Evans has been promoted to manager of Cedarwood's recording studio, and Michael Heeney has been named director of creative services. A new staffer, Keven Haggerty, has been assigned to commercial sales.

Cedarwood is interested in developing new songwriters, especially writers with performing talents. The current lineup of Cedarwood writers includes Dewayne Orender, Lee Morris, Zack van Arsdale, Larry Lee, Duke Faglier, Michael Heeney, Mitch Torok, Ramona Redd, Dale Royal,

and Rusty Summerville. Cedarwood has a catalog of over 5,000 songs, and has earned 67 BMI awards and two Grammies. The company has sub-publishing agreements in 19 foreign countries.

Cedarwood also made a major commitment to remodeling its offices and recording studio in 1979. The company built three new writers' rooms, redesigned its reception area, and improved its 16track recording studio by adding noise reduction equipment, installing a drum booth, and adding other features geared to increase outside bookings.

The publishing company also recently released its 1979 "Music City Quick Look Phone Numbers" book, a free, concise listing of virtually all music-related and Nashville-related attractions, services, and contacts of interest to those in the music field. Cedarwood, which is now in its 26th year of operation, has offered this popular booklet free for the past 10 years.

The only man to win three consecutive CMA awards for the best album started this vear with a gold album, "Only One Love In My Life," and his newest, "Images" (which he produced for the first time in his own studio), is nearing gold. Ronnie also maintains a constant road schedule, highlighted this year by his Alabama State Fair show for 30,000 people. As his career expands, with the help of new manager. Dan Cleary. Milsap will be seen on a special edition of the Today Show and the "Ford Theatre Special" in the near future. Following his appearance at the Wembley Festival, the BBC did a 20 minute special on the man

Jim Ed Brown and Helen Cornelius are nominated again this year for CMA Vocal Duo of the Year topping another banner year. Their current LP, "Jim Ed Brown and Helen Cornelius," has yielded the top 10 single, "You Don't Bring Me Flowers," number one, "Lying In Love With You" and Grammy nominee "If the World Ran Out of Love Tonight."

Reed Balancing Two Careers

Jerry Reed spent the better part of last year balancing time between two careers (music and movies) while watching his last silver-screen effort, "Smokey and the Bandit," grow to be the 11th highest grossing film in Hollywood's history. In the last year, Reed has starred in two movies; "Hot Stuff" with Suzanne Pleshette and Dom DeLuise, and a CBS made-for-TV movie entitled "Concrete Cowboy" set to air in early November. He's preparing to shoot a sequel to "Smokey," including previous castmembers Burt Reynolds, Sally Field and Jackie Gieason. His latest album, "Jerry Reed Live Featuring 'Hot Stuff' "features the theme that Reed wrote for the movie.

Dave & Sugar repeat again this year with a nomination for CMA Vocal Group of the Year moved into the year with a new member, Melissa Dean. With changes in booking, management and personnel, Dave & Sugar have proven to be consistent chart-

makers and an increasingly dynamic live act. This year has seen Dave and the girls perform at the Lone Star Cafe in New York and Dodger Stadium, doing the national anthem for a recently televised home game. This year has also found increasing acceptance of Dave & Sugar at Pop/Adult and Top 40 radio which have contributed to an increasingly diverse base and audience.

Tom T. Hall's year was highlighted by the release of his second children's album — the first for RCA — and his autobiography (told in novel style). While in New York as the featured artist on a Lone Star Cafe showcase, Hall appeared on the Today Show to talk about his book, his records and his career.

Pride In England

Charley Pride recorded for the first time in England this year. The resulting album yielded two number one singles, "You're My Jamaica" and "Where Do I Put Her Memory." Pride, too, continues his constant cross-country tour schedule supporting his albums and singles. While not busy performing in clubs and auditoriums, Pride has been caught as ringmaster for the Muhammed Ali-Lyle Alzado fight; taking part in a Celebrity Challenge Off-Road race

(with-the likes of Chips' Robert Pine, Bruce Jenner and Ted Nugent)and singing the national anthem for the Minnesota Twins.

Several RCA warhorses have recently seen a resurgence in their careers with new singles and a refreshed approach. Among them are veterans Eddy Arnold (with "Goodbye") Hank Snow (who also has an instrumental album coming up), and Jim Reeves, who continues as a consistent seller on the 15th anniversary of his death.

While the warhorses pulled their weight, the new kids on the block were doing their share helping Nipper to a record breaking year. Razzy Bailey breaking from his stronghold in the Southeast, garnered three consecutive top five singles while Zella Lehr, Steve Wariner, Mary Kay Miller and Cliff Cochran also made laudable chart showings as they continue to develop. On the horizon for the year-to-come are recently signed artists Randy Gurley and Sylvia, who promise to be doing their share for the Nipper effort in the next few months.

With a combination of tradition, progressive foresight and solid talent, RCA and its artists are building for the future with the pride instilled by being a traditional winner.

honor, the Song of the Year. This award was presented to Randy Goodrum for "You Needed Me." Songwriter of the year honors went to Sonny Throckmorton. another addition was plaque awards to Songwriter of the year finalists: Bob McDill, Wayland Holyfield and Billy Sherrill. The 1980 symposium and songwriter honor event is scheduled for February 29 and March 1.

In its ever expanding educational service, both NSAI members, directors and Maggie Cavender, executive director, have traveled to many colleges to participate in panel discussions, and in many cases, classroom lectures. The lates of this type of work occurred on September 28 and 29 in Atlanta, Georgia at a weekend seminar held at Georgia State University and which culminated Georgia Music Week. Participation for NSAI were songwriters Jerry Chesnut, Tim Wipperman, Patsy Bruce, president, member of teh board, Diane Petty, and Maggie Cavender appeared on teh panel which discussed songwriter organizations and protection services.

The educational facet has been furthered in this year as last December NSAI inaugurated its area workshop — Songwriters Bob McCracken and Tom Pallardy lead the bi-weekly sessions, under the guidance and counsel of Maggie Cavender. Guest songwriters and publishers dropped in on the session and joined in the Discussions and Song Critiques. This group is projecting a workshop songwriter showcase sometime in the spring of 1980.

NSAI participated in Fan Fair '79 last June, with songwriters manning the organization's booth, meeting and signing autographs for the thousands of fans in Nashville that week. The NSAI show

features those writers who were award winners the previous February, and was one of the three chosen to be televised by WDCN-TV, Nashville's public television outlet. It is scheduled to be shown locally on the Channel 8 in Nashville on November 7.

The administration offices of NSAI, through Maggie Cavender and Dot Thornton, the association's membership coordinator, counsel with many songwriters each day. and Sammy Davis Jr. as well as with Sterling Whipple, Mel Tillis and Roy Head. Among Bowen's declared policies is that a Nashville-based E/A artist will be taken with the same seriousness as an act like Queen, Jackson Browne, Linda Ronstadt or The Eagles, and that he or she will have the benefit of the resources of the entire company in promotion, merchandising, publicity and in every other area.

A realignment of the E/A Nashville staff has allowed the office to continue funcitoning with superior efectiveness. Norm Oscoordinates sales activities, acting as liaiason between WEA branches and the west coast home office. He is assisted by Teresa Grier, Ewell Roussell is director of Nashville operations, assisted by Carolyn Gilmer, who also maintains a demanding schedule as A&R coordinator Martha Sharpe has also joined E/A as assistant to Jimmy Bowen, All assistants are fully qualified to participate in the decision-making process.

The Nashville offices also house an artist development staff under Deborah Pardee, and Rhett Walker, E/A local promotion rep/Nashville.

E/A's Nashville team moves into fall '79 with a series of promising new releases. Stella Parton and Vern Gosdin have just released Best Of sets with Eddie Rabbitt's Best Of scheduled for October, E/A debuts by Mel Tillis and Roy Head are on the way. along with Hank Williams Jr.'s second for the label. The coming months will see new albums by Bobby Braddock Sterling Whipple, Rock Killough and live and studio sets by Jerry Lee Lewis and more.

The economic downturn has not affected E/A's policies towards its Nashville artists. "Knowing up front that some of our new acts will take time to develop, we're fully prepared to work their records until we're proven wrong," comments Ewell Roussell. "We've never been negligent with production and promotion dollars; we're going to find out if we have a record first and then we will spend the necessary dollars on it. When one hits, we'll go full tilt."

Songwriters Hall of Fame. Founded in 1970, the list of Hall of Famers now boasts some 74 names. Four more songwriters will be immortalized this week (Oct. 7) when the association announces this year's new

A nomination list is comprised yearly by the NSAI board of directors, the past president of the association and a selected electorate. The criteria is two-fold: the songwriter must have made his living by songwriting for at least 10 years (originally it was 25 years). The electorate also takes into consideration the impact a songwriter has made on the music scene as a whole.

In the first two years of its existence, the Hall of Fame played a catch-up game, entering 41 names to its prestigious Hall of Fame roster.

Members inducted in 1970 include Gene Autry, Johnny Bond, Albert Brumley, A.P. Carter, Ted Daffan, Vernon Dalhart, Rex Griffin, Stuart Hamblen, Pee Wee King, Vic McAlpin, Bob Miller, Leon Payne and Jimmy Rodgers.

Also inducted in 1970 were Fred Rose, Redd Stewart, Floyd Tillman, Merle Travis, Ernest Tubb, Cindy Walker, Hank Williams and Bob Wills.

Inductees for 1971 include Smiley Burnette, Jenny Lou Carson, Wilf Carter, Zeke Clements, Jimmie Davis, Alton Delmore, Rabon Delmore, Al Dexter, Vaughn Horton

That year also found Bill Monroe, Bob Nolan, Tex Owens, Tex Ritter, Carson J. Robinson, Tim Spencer, Wiley Walker. Gene Sullivan, Jimmy Wakely and Scotty Wiseman joining the Hall of Fame roster.

The year 1972 saw the catch-up game end and fewer members elected to the Hall of Fame. They were boudleaux Bryant, Felice Bryant, Lefty Frizzell, Jack Rhodes and Don Robertson.

Seven new members were added to the list in 1973. They were Jack Clement, Don Gibson, Harlan Howard, Roger Miller, Ed Nelson, Jr., Steve Nelson and Willie Nelson.

Hank Cochran was the single new member added in 1974

In 1975, Bill Anderson, Danny Dill, Eddie Miller, Marty Robbins, Wayne Walker and Marijohn Wilkin were added.

Carl Belew, Dallas Frazier, John D. Loudermilk, Moon Mullican, Curly Putnam and Mel Tillis joined the swelling ranks in 1976, while a special award went to Stephen Foster.

In 1977 Johnny Cash, Woodie Guthrie. Merle Haggard and Kris Kristofferson were added to the roster

And finally, in 1978, Joe Allison, Tom T. Hall, Hank Snow and Don Wayne were elected to the Hall of Fame.

Songwriter Of The Year

NSAI has also honored twelve songwriters of the year, beginning with Dallas Frazier in 1967. Bobby Russell took the award in 1968; Merle Haggard in '69; Kris Kristofferson in '70 and '71; Tom T. Hall in '72; Kristofferson again in '73; Don Wayne in '74: Ben Peters in '75: Bob McDill in '76; Roger Bowling and Hal Bynum in '77 and Sonny Throckmorton in 1978.

Also for the first time, a song of the year was selected in 1978. The award went to Randy Goodrum for "You Needed Me."

Songwriters: Unsung Heroes The Future Looks Bright For Country Music Labels, Artists

"Television seems to be the primary market in any country in getting the big word out," Walker said. "Getting the awards show on would allow us to expose country music to a large group of people who may have never heard country music

Of the countries the CMA is hoping to develop, Walker said that Germany would probably be one of the better markets for the product, if that country took to country

"If country music catches on in Germany, it would take a good decade to thoroughly develop," Walker pointed out. "But it's a beautiful record market. If country catches on there, it will really help country music record sales.

Walker added that they would not only be developing these foreign countries for American acts, but for the native country music acts as well.

Media exposure has always been an attractive, as well as effective, means of introducing an artist and particular mode of music to the masses. People involved with country music - from the label promotion person, to the booking agent, to the manager to the artist - have utilized the media (television, movies and radio) advantageously for the field of country music. Hardly a week passes that there is not some country music show on television, or the smiling face of a country artist on national television shows like "The Tonight Show," "The Today Show" and "Good Morning America." Walker bets that the future will see even more of this, as well as more exposure through the movie medium.

"Both television and movies are good outlets for performers, and movies are particularly good for songwriters," Walker said. "Of course, songwriters have written scores for movies in the past, but I see this as a field with great potential.

Radio Acceptance

Through the years, country music has noticed particularly good acceptance in terms at radio airplay. Walker doesn't see that area slowing down either

"I've always contended that if country music could be heard more, it would become more popular," said Walker. "That was the theory behind trying to get more radio stations to program country music. That was our first goal when the CMA was organized. I think the figures speak for themselves. A recent survey indicated that about 1,400 stations are now programming country music exclusively. For one type of music, I think that's really good.

"We recently sponsored an Arbitron survey that proved the country music listener is no different from other listeners," Walker added "The reason we did this was because there were still a few advertisers hanging back - they didn't think country music listeners owned homes or automobiles; that they didn't ride airplanes or drink wine. The survey disproved that theory, and that opened the market for country music.

Of course all of the promotional strategies would not mean a thing if there were no more artists singing country music. After all, it has been said that new artists are the lifes blood of the industry. Walker sees no threatening probelm in this area.

"I think that as country music becomes more and more popular, we will see more and more young people trying to get into country msuic — even if they weren't brought up on country music," Walker said. They are going to see it, observe it and find that it is a more relaxed music, more so than some types of music. I think it will attract more young artists, and certainly country music needs that - we need to keep attracting new artists. Artists from other fields may be coming over to country

"Many times you can predict the future by looking at history," Walker concluded. 'The momentum is obviously there, and I think that country music will continue to grow. Some people think that country music will lose its identity. I don't think so, not in my lifetime anyway

In addition, SESAC executives from New York, Nashville and Los Angeles lectured to songwriters at numerous colleges and universities throughout the country.

On Oct. 1, SESAC introduced a new writer/publisher rate card offering even further incentives to its affiliates by substantially increasing release and chart payments and by extending bonus payments by significant amounts.

This year marks SESAC's 15th Annual Country Music Awards Ceremony and the 1979 gala will again be held at the Woodmont Country Club in Franklin on Thursday evening, Oct. 11, beginning at 8:00 p.m. More than 500 of the nation's leading country music executives will join SESAC's growing roster of affiliated publishers and writers at this eagerly awaited "invitation only" affair.

While the past year has been referred to as a year of change at SESAC, the year ahead can best be described as a year of affirmative decision — a decision to move forward in a new decade to meet the challenges the '80s hold in store. As we enter 1980, SESAC will continue to keep pace with the ever-changing needs of an everexpanding world of music — in Nashville. New York, Los Angeles and throughout the

Top Billing Increases Artist Roster In 1979

Sixteen-year-old Holcombe, who is quite literally blossoming into superstardom, sings, plays fiddle, mandolin, dobro, drums, acoustic and steel guitar and banjo and is a regularly featured star of the syndicated Country Music television show "Nashville On The Road," Her developmental contract gives ABC-TV options to include her in dramatic roles, on specials, variety shows or in her own series. Her first project will be an upcoming Christmas

Top Billing has also had success in the field of commercial endorsements. As commercial spokesman for the fourth year. Jim Ed Brown represents Dollar General Corporation, one of eight companies the New York Stock Exchange has labeled recession-free. Jerry Clower marks his eighth anniversary as endorser for Sutehrland Lumber, and this year, was selected as national spokesman for the cotton insecticide Ambush, whose parent company ICI Americas, Inc. is the American subsidiary of the London-based Imperial Chemicals Industries Limited whose sales in 1977 approached nine billion dollars. Top Billing's negotiations with Purina (which last year netted a television commercial for Jeannie C. Riley), have resulted in another Puppy Chow-Puppy Food commercial - this year for Tom T. Hall and his

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

Big Al Downing hit the top 15 twice with "Mr. Jones" and "Touch Me (I'll Be Your Fool Once More)." Big Al was also show-cased several times and did a number of radio promotion tours.

Bob Kirsch joined Warner Country as General Manager in April, reporting directly to VP/director of country Andrew Wickham. Kirsch coordinates all marketing activities pertaining to country, as well as involving himself in publicity, artist relations and other division functions. Kirsch came from ABC Records.

Warner Bros. participated in a number of major marketing, merchandising and sales campaigns in the past 12 months, many involving major accounts such as Pickwick, Handleman and the Gibson chain. The campaigns, primarily under the auspices of country national promotion chief Stan Byrd, focused on major artists and ran throughout the year. A major campaign is currently underway featuring Emmylou Harris, T.G. Sheppard and The Bellamy Brothers.

merchandised mainly through our network of 19 sub-distributors throughout the U.S. We also work directly with a select number of retail stores and record racks throughout the country, mostly on a COD or 30-day account basis." The company also handles an excellent line of kiddie cassettes with the standard fairy tales such as "The Pied Piper," "Puss 'N Boots," "Peter Pan," etc., featuring the voice of The Legend Lady, Polly Pockets, famous for her voice-overs in a number of Walt Disney movies and her own kiddy shows in Los Angeles. These cassettes are distributed directly to the public school systems throughout the country as well as through IRDA's normal distribution chain.

Office Relocated

The company, which last year relocated from Nashville's Music Row to suburban Hendersonville, has a staff of eight, with a promotion crew that includes Keith Stewart, Sue Johnson and, of course, veteran promo man Shepherd. "We have direct phone contact with over 200 radio stations weekly," states Stewart, IRDA's national promotion director, "and on a revolving basis we maintain promotion contact with over 1,000 stations in all." The administrative staff, headed by IRDA president Hank Levine, includes Patsy West, Linda Turner and Bo Shaw. The company does all album jackets in-house, with its art department headed by prize-winning Tennessee artist Linda Rozelle.

IRDA recently expanded into gospel distribution through its newly formed Gospel World division, headed by Sue Johnson, and will shortly be announcing the release of a new package of gospel albums featuring some of the top names in gospel music.

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Country Music Goes Pop But Keeps Traditional Flame Alive

It has been the mark of a number of creative people to express the desire that one day there would be no 'categories' of music -- that it would be just 'music' and audiences and customers would either like it or dislike it on its own sound merits. Well, that day may have arrived for country music. The criteria for calling a record 'country' is vaque at best, and basically decided by music directors and audiences who like it and want to hear it on the 'country' radio station.

While this has not clarified the definitions of country music, it has allowed it to open its arms and ears to a wider range of sound. Also, there is one major fact in life we have to deal with and that is you can't go backward. That means you can't be 12 or 17 again and it also means that you can't make 1979 into 1952 in regards to country music.

Country music has achieved a great deal of success by diversifying its sound and enlarging its scope. Record companies know only too well that the hard country sound is hard to sell and that only the very best of that sound will be sold. This hard country sound will never disappear - there will always be a demand for it and it will always be an integral part of country music. However, it has decreased in the total per-

centage of country music being heard today. To reach the larger populace and satisfy the divergent tastes of Americans, country music has by necessity had to expand its boundries and borders. Perhaps those who wish for days past when country music was more 'country' would also like to trade the financial rewards of today's larger country market from yesterday's smaller, less financially rewarding (and less socially acceptable) world of country music?

There is another factor to be dealt with and that is that America is not the rural nation it once was but basically a huge metropolitan area today — thanks primarily to television. Many of those involved in country music today grew up with rock 'n' roll and came out of the pop world. There are very few who grew up listening to and loving the sounds of Hank Williams and Lefty Frizzell.

This is fairly obvious with those who have become involved in country music during the past decade. By and large, they are the product of the pop music culture and many continue to relate best to that culture. And while they have absorbed themselves to a point with the 'country culture,' country music, on the other hand, has felt the influence of these people.

We should also face the fact that a great number of people making their living in Nashville from country music as artists, songwriters, producers, publishers, record company executives and others don't really like country music - or like it only as presented in a manner that is not 'hard country.

Problem With Pop

The problem between country music and pop is more than taste in music, though — it is often hinged upon the dividing line of record sales. Most of the time, an artist is considered country until they begin selling well - and when they sell well enough they are considered 'pop,' thereby making pop success (and being labeled pop) a goal and an attractive image. A prime example here is Waylon Jennings, whose music has not

changed appreciably during the past ten years. However, he became a pop artist when his albums started going gold and platinum at the retail level. Conversely, another Nashville artist whose music may be much less 'country' sounding more lush or 'pop' sounding, is considered country if their albums sell 50-100.000.

Which brings us to the meaning of it all.

No, country music is not what it used to be. Yes, there is less of the traditional or 'hard' country sound today. No, that trend away from the traditional country sound probably won't change although there will always be a demand and a place for it. Yes. country music will continue to grow. And maybe we'll still be posing and attempting to answer these same questions about country music in 1989.



Rose Blasts Crossover Music

NASHVILLE - Country music is losing its identity and the trade charts and country radio are to blame, according to Wesley Rose, head of Acuff-Rose publications and former president of the Country Music Association

The problem, as Rose sees it, is that too many artists are attempting to cut "crossover" records from Nashville and sending them to country stations, where trade charts dictate what gets played.

"When people say they're cutting crossover records, they are trying to put a title on something that'll confuse you; they don't like to say they're cutting a pop record," said Rose. "But everybody within the industry knows what country is, and if they don't, why did they get into the business?"

Rose added that "a lot of executives got into the business to make money and a lot of them don't care how they make it."

Rose places the blame of the continuing loss of identity of country music on the trade charts. "The charts have changed from the early days," he said. "In the early days when it was pop they meant pop music. Now the pop charts mean the most popular selling records. You can do a recitation, a hymn or country or R & B and if it sells enough records, it will go into the pop charts."
Rose would like to see country music

keep it's strong identity apart from other forms of music and feels "the quickest way to correct it would be the charts.

Part of the problem, according to Rose. is that the charts don't truly reflect country radio. He disagrees with having stations "weighted" saying, "That means that if I have more money, when I vote for president I should get twelve votes and someone else should get one." (It should be noted that Cash Box considers each station to be of equal importance when compiling its weekly country charts.)

Rose also accused radio personnel of not listening to records that come to the stations but relying instead on the trade charts to decide what to play. "The average radio person today doesn't listen to records," he said. "You call them and you'll find out. They look at charts and they program what's in the charts. And this is an unfortunate thing that a trade paper can control radio. I think that's wrong. Charts were put together so the trade paper could give information to those people in the music business about what radio was doing."

Rose noted further, "I'd rather my records be on an all country station" referring to stations that are called country but, in his opinion, not really programming country music.

Rose also criticized the emphasis that is placed on major metropolitan markets such as New York. "If I put a station in Tokyo, I could say this is the number one country station in the world because it has the biggest population," he said emphatically. "But I probably wouldn't sell 42 records. This is what is happening in New York . . . I don't think you can take 100 stations and say they control country music and have a true poll.

Texas An Exception

An exception, according to Rose, is Texas. "I think the key market right now is Texas," he said, "because Texas is less hypocritical than the rest of the country. They play country music on country stations. Of course there are a few who decide to fight the pop stations and of course they're gradually losing their ratings and displeasing their listeners, so they tune out. I think if I had one shot at a record I would go into Texas and promote it."

CMA Will Vote For Directors At Meeting

NASHVILLE — During its annual membership meeting Oct. 11, the Country Music Assn. will elect the CMA directors for the coming year. One member will be chosen in each of 12 membership categories of CMA (one director currently serving on the board in each of the categories will remain another year, serving out the second of a two-year term). Three directors-at-large will also be elected.

Proxy forms have been sent to all CMA members who will be unable to attend the annual meeting. These forms should be returned to Deloitte, Haskins and Sells, the certified public accounting firm which handles the CMA board election.

According to the association bylaws, no fewer than two, nor more than four names nominated by the board may appear on the printed ballot for each vacancy. However, additional nominations may be made from the floor at the membership meeting by any

Country Music Show Draws Capacity Crowd At Ford's Theatre

WASHINGTON — Ford's Theatre here was the site of an historical music event Oct. 2a celebration of country music. A stellar line-up of country music artists attracted a capacity crowd of 650 black tie quests, including the President and Mrs. Carter, Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin and his wife, Tennessee Sen. Howard Baker, Tennessee Rep. Albert Gore Jr., Tennessee Sen. Jim Sasser, House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, National Security Chief Zbigniew Brzezinski and many other political figures, visiting dignitaries and Washington's business elite.

At \$250 a ticket, the musical extravaganza was staged for the benefit of the historic building where Lincoln was shot by John Wilkes Booth five days after the end of the Civil War, as well as to kick off the first days of October, which has been designated as Country Music Month by the President.

The two-hour show, which had the distinguished audience toe-tapping and cheering along, opened with "Country Is and continued on a full tilt level with a host of country music artists appearing. Co-hosted by Dolly Parton, Eddie Rabbitt, Johnny Cash and Glen Campbell, the show featured performances by Lynn Anderson, Freddie Fender, Larry Gatlin, Tom T. Hall, Barbara Mandrell, Ronnie Milsap, Bill Monroe and the Bluegrass Boys, the Oak Ridge Boys, the Statler Brothers, Charlie Rich, Ray Stevens, Mel Tillis, Dottie West and Sen. Robert Byrd.

While in Washington, guests and artists were treated to several luncheons and dinners, the highlight of which was a luncheon hosted by the President and First Lady in the White House that day.

Following late evening rehearsals at the theatre, the cast and dozens of invited guests were honored at a party at Sen. Baker's home in the posh Cathedral area of the city.

Showcase Salutes Hank Garland

NASHVILLE - Legendary guitarist Hank Garland will be saluted during Country Music Week at RCA's Breakfast Show Oct. 10. In addition to accolades voiced by industry and civic dignitaries and a nostalgic display of visuals. Garland will perform on the show, demonstrating the miraculous degree of recovery achieved since an automobile accident in 1961.

Garland's musical career up to that point was one of the most respected in the business. As a studio musician, he helped structure what became known as the Nashville Sound with such illustrious colleagues as Grady Martin, Chet Atkins, Harold and Owen Bradley, Floyd Cramer, Bob Moore and Buddy Harmon, backing an array of stars from Billy Grammer to Elvis

He was also a performer in his own right, widely known via his recordings with Red Foley of "Sugarfood Rag" and well on his way to jazz recognition at the time of the accident. In the '50s, Garland had helped pioneer the country music presence in both network and syndicated television.

Earlier this year, Garland completed a year-long series of therapy treatments in Florida and has moved back to his family home near Spartanburg, S.C. His musical faculties have been returning slowly, although at more rapid pace during the last two years. He has plans to resume his recording as a soloist.

The RCA Show tribute will be filmed by L.A.'s Underwood Productions International in conjunction with a motion picture based on Garland's life now in preproduction.

On Oct. 12 Garland and guitarist Thumbs Carlisle will make guest appearances with the Nashville Superpickers band at the Exit/In. Superpickers leader Henry Strezlecki was a Garland protege, beginning his own studio career under the guitarist's guidance.

Rose Criticizes Crossover Music

Although Rose is upset about the dilemma of what is or isn't country, he is proud of Nashville being known as a place where all kinds of music can be recorded, "I think Nashville should cut all kinds of records," he said. "But they shouldn't be hypocritical when they cut a pop record and go and get it promoted on a country station. They should say 'this is a pop record.' This hurts the country audiences because they don't want to hear pop. The trade charts and the radio stations mechanize the business. It's a computer business, it's not a feeling. Radio people won't go on their gut feeling on a record because they don't listen. I don't think they like music. I run into radio people today that have never heard of artists from six or seven years ago. I ran into one that had never heard of Elton Britt. And I said, 'what country station are you on?' "

Wesley Rose has remained one of the most respected individuals in country music since the 1940s when he helped establish Acuff-Rose as the first publishing company in Nashville. Through the years he has worked with a number of writers, including Hank Williams and had his own record label, Hickory,

As Williams' copyrights came for renewal, a court case was introduced by Chappell and Hill and Range publishers on behalf of Billie Jean Horton, the second wife of Hank Williams for rights to the songs. Rose commented on that case, saying that Chappell now owns part of those copyrights for the U.S. only with Acuff-Rose retaining world-wide rights.

With Hickory, which was established in 1953, the distribution pact with MCA ended Sept. 1 and a new pack is currently being negotiated.

Composer Harris Dead At Age 81

LOS ANGELES — Composer Roy Harris, who wrote 16 symphonies and 185 other major works in his long and prestigious career, died Oct. 1 at the age of 81. Harris, who had been of ill health for the past year, died in a Santa Monica hospital where he had been a patient for the last two months.

Harris was a teacher as well as a composer, and he had been a composer in residence at California State University. Los Angeles, for 10 years. He also was a professor of music emeritus at UCLA, where his wife is a member of the faculty.

Many of the composer's works were commissioned by major orchestras such as the Boston and Chicago symphonies and The New York and L.A. Philharmonics. Harris' most famous work, Symphony No. 4, The Folk Song Symphony, interweaves themes from some of America's best loved

BLACK RADIO FLEX YOUR MUSCLES — Mark Kreiner and Tom Cossie's Ocean Records is launching an across the board marketing/merchandising campaign for recently-signed performer, Ann-Margret. The campaign will particularly involve black radio due to sensitivities of the artist and producer, Paul Sabu, who recently produced the Debbie Jacobs' single "Don't You Want My Love." Ann-Margret's first recording effort since 1962, will be shipped this week entitled, "Love Rush," and the soulful vocal licks of this artist are interesting, so take a listen.

He says that he has approximately another ten years in the business before he thinks it may be his time to retire, but he doens't foresee involving himself in a management situation, unless it is a station that he owns

NEW YORK — The U.S. tour by the Moscow State Symphony, which was scheduled to open at Carnegie Hall last Wednesday, was cancelled at the last minute. According to the New York Times a U.S. State Department official said that the tour had been cancelled because the Russians feared defections by some orchestra members. But a spokesman for Columbia Artists Management, which was booking the tour. denied that this sensitive issue had been raised in discussions with the Soviet Culture Ministry. The dispute that led to the cancellation, he said, concerned the symphony's conductors for the proposed tour

MAAZEL NAMED TO NEW POST Lorin Maazel, music director of the Cleveland Orchestra, has been appointed general manager and artistic director of the Vienna State Opera as of September 1, 1982. The management of the Cleveland Orchestra announced that it expects Maazel to extend his music directorship through the 1984-85 season. Although negotiations between Maazel and the orchestra have not yet been concluded. Maazel has indicated that he hopes to be able to maintain his link with the Clevelanders in addition to his new responsibilities Meanwhile; Maazel and his orchestra have just completed a major European tour which included 20 concerts in 16 cities. Among the countries visited were Switzerland, Sweden, Norway, Germany, Belgium, Austria, Hungary, France and England

BMI YOUNG COMPOSERS CONTEST A total of \$15,000 is available to young composers in the 28th annual BMI Awards To Student Composers competition. Prizes ranging from \$500 to \$2,500 will be awarded to contest winners. The competition is open to student composers who are citizens or permanent residents of the Western Hemisphere and who are enrolled in accredited secondary schools, colleges and conservatories, or engaged in private study with recognized teachers. Entrants must be under 26 years of age on December 11, 1979. The 1979-80 competition closes February 15, 1980. Official rules and entry blanks are available from James G. Rey, Jr., director of BMI Awards to Student Composers, BMI, 320 W. 57th St., New York, NY 10019.

LABEL NEWS - The first digital recording on Angel is scheduled for November release and will list for \$10.98. Recorded on BMI digital equipment, the album features a performance of Debussy's "Images" by the London Symphony under Andre Previn's direction Leonard Bernstein's new recording of Beethoven's "Missa Solemnis" is his first with the Concertgebouw of Amsterdam, To follow: another integral recording of the Beethoven symphonies under Bernstein's baton . . . A pair of operatic curiosities have recently been released on disc: Rossini's 'Otello'' (on Philips) and Ferdinando Faer's 'Leonora" (on London). "Otello," which has been eclipsed by Verdi's opera of the same name, was penned in 1816, just after "The Barber Of Seville" and shortly before "La Centoronola." Paer's "Leonora," first staged around 1804, is based on the same story as Beethoven's "Fidelio;" and. although there are important differences between the treatment of the story in the two operas, Beethoven evidently knew of the Paer work before he penned "Fidelio."

Some highlights of the Vox/Turnabout fall release are an LP containing several little-known works by Saint-Saens; a recording of Granades' "Goyescas" by Alicia de Larrocha; a reading of Bartok's Violin Concerto No. 2 under the baton of Jascha Herenstein, with Ivry Gitlis as the soloist, and a traversal of Schubert's "Unfinished" Symphony by the Cincinnati Symphony under the direction of Thomas Schippers.

Peters International has just released seven albums. Two LPs by the Westminster Choir are the first to be recorded in the U.S. by Peters. One of them features Christmas carols and the other contains Bach's complete motets. Also of interest in the new Peters release are a recording of Schubert Lieder by Elly Ameling and another (continued on page 46)

BEETHOVEN: Sonata No. 18 In E flat, Op. 31, No. 3 ("The Hunt"); Sonata No. 14 in C sharp minor, Op. 27, No. 2 ("Moonlight"); Belia Davldovich, pianist. Philips 9500 665. List: 9.98

Davidovich, who moved to New York in 1978, has concertized in her native Russia and Europe since 1949. Her debut Philips recording showcases an artist of outstanding quality. Op 31, No. 3 is performed with an unusual combination of delicacy and strength; the mercurial reading of the Soherto is especially satisfying. However, perhaps because it is played so often, Davidovich's reading of the "Moonlight" does not seem very compelling.

BARTOK: Piano Concertos Nos. 1&2. Maurisio Pollini, pianist; Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Claudio Abbado, conductor. DC 2530 901. List: 9.98

This is a wonderful recording in all respects. Pollini is a firstrate interpreter of 20th Century Music, and Abbado shares the pianist's empáthy for these uncompromising, dramatic works. The Chicago Symphony's superlative brass section gets a real workout here, especially in the Concerto No. 2, and the superb sound quality reminds us that there is still much to be said for analog recording when it is done correctly. Highlights include the ebullient, motoric climax of the Second Concerto's first movement, and Pollini's meteoric solo in the Presto section of the following movement.

O SOLE MIO: Favorite Neapolitan Songs. Luclano Pavarotti, tenor; Orchestra of the Teatro Communale, Bologna, Anton Guadagno, conductor; National Philharmonic Orchestra, Glan Carlo Chiaramello, conductor, London OS 26560. List: 8.98

One doesn't have to be an opera buff to appreciate such tuneful songs as "O sole mio," "Fenesta Vadia," or "Torna a surriento." Their folk-oriented flavor is easy to understand and relate to. And just about everyone knows "Funiculi Punicula." The only problem with the choice of material is that some of it, like "Tu, ca nun chiagne," is unbearably schmaltzy. When he has better songs, though, Pavarotti sings with a warm, ardent expressivity.

RETOOLING AT THE GARAGE — NYC's private disco, Paradise Garage, long a favorite haunt of label promo reps, is instituting a new program which will feature guest DJs on Fridays and Saturdays, the two nights that the club is open. Regular DJ Larry Levan, who has disked there for the past two years, will continue to spin at the Garage on an irregular basis. Some of the guest DJs include the Flamingo's Richle Rivera, Jorge Vilardel from the Ice Palace, Studio 54's head DJ Roy Thode, Kevin Burke and Howard Merritt, also of the Flamingo. The impetus for the guest DJ program came from Judy Weinstein's For The Record Pool anniversary pool party, the first time guest spinners performed at the club. "It was sort of like a jam session that night," says Garage manager Larry Matarese. In a phone interview, Matarese also took time to rebut complaints that the club was attempting to

change the composition of its membership. "I'd be the first to object to that sort of thing. It's just that so many people wanted to join. we had to make up our membership lists by drawing applicants names out of a fishbowl," Matarese, who has been managing the club for two months, explained. Conversely, one high officer at an area pool claims that the guest DJ program was instituted to attract a different kind of membership. Striking a middle ground. Polydor's David Steel feels, "The atmosphere will change with new DJs playing different music, but I think the idea of quest DJs will add variety to the playlist. On the other hand, I enjoy the kind of music Larry Levan spins, and I'll miss not hearing him as often.'

Duane Bradley has been spinning at Todd's, a 1200-capacity. predominantly gay disco on Detroit's northeast side, for the past nine months. The 25year-old jock was recently honored as top Detroit DJ by the People's Choice Awards. The

some of their smaller accounts to buy direct from the manufacturer. For example, Ron Edmonds, owner of the four-store Carousel chain located in central Florida, said that he had recently switched to buying direct at a savings of as much as 40¢ per unit over one-stop prices on \$7.98 list merchandise.

"Stores with a high enough volume don't need us anymore," said Norm Cooper, a one-stop operator based in Philadelphia. "It's become a retail buyers' market. The two and three-store operator now has the leverage to pick and choose who he wants to buy his LPs from. The small retailer is still better off lumping his dollars at the onestop because the manufacturers have said that they don't want their business anymore. But as soon as he strengthens his backup, there's no reason he can't go elsewhere.

Can't Buy Direct

One retailer who has switched part of his buying to a local one-stop is Bob Allgood, manager of Records and Fresh Vegetables in Yellow Springs, Ohio. "Last month, CBS told us that because we weren't doing \$5,-000 worth of business with them, they wouldn't deal with us anymore," he said. "Even though we were right around that figure, the company told us that we were too small an account for them." Allgood said that he still bought direct from WEA and Capitol and rationalized the CBS decision by saying that "at least we won't have to wait to accumulate an order and can deal by the piece when we have to. In a town of our size with competition like K-Mart and Goldblatts, we probably couldn't do business any other way.

Secondary Sources

Albie Cohen, a partner in the seven-unit Boston-based Popcorn chain, said that while his chain bought direct, "You've got to have your secondary sources, especially in a recessionary period when you don't want to run the risk of overbuying. That's why the one-stop stands to increase his business, because he's not interested in jamming product down your throat. During the summer, CBS had about \$35,000 worth of inventory tied up, so we bought some of the hotter-moving releases and catalog from a one-stop as our way of protesting

"Sometimes you just have to take a stand

and take control of your buying in the event that the manufacturer isn't pleased with your order. For example, Polygram asked us to buy 2,000 of each Kiss solo album when our initial order was for 100 of each, which they double-shipped anyway. Cohen said that the company was so enraged that "we seriously thought of buying the product from a one-stop instead. It's a way of proving a point.'

"There's a feeling of retribution in the air." said Bob Krug, sales manager for Western Merchandisers' Denver branch. 'We're starting to take orders from accounts that would rather give our one-stop the business than a given manufacturer, and this is in direct retaliation for the screws the labels are turning. But it's a natural course of events. As the retailer's ordering gets tighter, especially with the returns and credit situation they way it stands, the onestop has a big chance of selling more than the isolated few pieces that the dealer used to buy from him

Functions As One-Stop

The three-unit J&R Music World outfit in lower Manhattan is an example of a company whose catalog depth has enabled it to operate as a one-stop for a number of mom and pop stores in the metropolitan area, even though it is not formally in the onestop business. "The labels aren't concerned with the small retailer anymore," commented Henry Leserowitz, manager of the export wholesale division of the chain. 'They're going to sell the same amount of records anyway. But the new policies have made it difficult for the small stores, especially when the labels are shipping a new release and catalog orders get pushed back. That's where we are filling a gap.'

Effect Of Return Ceilings

One of the reasons Angela Singer, onestop manager for Associated Distributors in Phoenix, expects an increase in her business - particularly from mom and pop stores in the Arizona, Nevada, and New Mexico area - is that returns ceilings will force them to weigh the specific advantages of ordering direct. "By Christmas," she said, "some of the smaller dealers in our area will have fully understood the full implications of the policies. And once those new invoices come in from the companies. I know we're going to see a turnaround

become president of the CBS Records International Division.

Allen Davis came to CBS in 1974 from EMI and Capitol Records, U.K. He served as senior director of CBS Records U.K. and was later appointed the division's marketing director of European operations in Paris before becoming vice president of creative operations for CBS Records International in New York. He was later named vice president of the division and director CBS Grammofoonplaten in Holland.

New Responsibilities

Yetnikoff told Cash Box that, despite his additional duties in connection with New Ventures, he will continue to be primarily concerned with the records operation. Even with Asher installed as deputy president, he added, "there's still plenty of work to be done" at the top level of CBS Records.

Yetnikoff denied that the diversification of the CBS Records Group is related to the recent slump in the record business, "Not at all," he said, "It has to do with the fact that this (new technologies) is the future. Almost every entertainment company thinks that way, and it's time to do something about it.'

Asked whether the CBS branch distribution system would eventually handle videodiscs and videocassetes, Yetnikoff would only say that "we're open" to that possibility. "My personal feeling is that when the thing does become mature which won't be in a couple of months - it will end up being sold like records. Whether the initial forms of distribution are going to be that, I don't know.

Yetnikoff also declined to predict the date for CBS's introduction of its video lines. He indicated, however, that the company would adopt a wait-and-see attitude. "If I thought it wasn't already a decent-sized market, I wouldn't be involving myself," he commented. "But the technology is liable to undergo continuous change.'

Possible Tie-Ins
The CBS Records chief stated that the company is willing to spend "whatever it takes" to get the New Ventures division off the ground. He also noted that there are many different possible tie-ins between New Ventures and the record operation. "Record people have something to learn about how to present things visually Part of this thing will certainly be our own artists in a visual presentation.

club commemorated that honor by throwing a lavish press party which also celebrated the disco's sixth anniversary. The spinner's top picks this week at Todd's are "When You Touch Me," by **Taana** Gardner; "Music" from the just released Al Hudson album; and France Joli's "Playboy," which he believes is the "hottest cut" off her debut album.

SPLASHES IN THE POOLS — More information continues to pour in that the labels are rethinking and restructuring their distribution policies, and pool reaction so far has been positive. CBS, RCA and all its distributed labels have told Jackie McCloy of the 50-member Long Island Disco DJs Association that the pool will be receiving limited number of product, which the pool plans to send to certain DJs who are known for supplying lengthy, in-depth feedback reports. Based on this feedback, the decision will then be made whether or not to service all the pool members with the particular record. "I know some pools think of this as a cutback, but it's not," McCloy says. "It's a cost-saving measure for the companies which at the same time allows our DJs to avoid the time-consuming chore of evaluating product that isn't up to our quality levels. This new policy guarantees that all our members will receive every piece of quality product" . . . An unspecified rock disco record pool has asked to become a "subsidiary" member of Judy Weinstein's For The Record Pool. As a subsidiary, the rock pool will be able to use For the Record's "good name to obtain credibility with the record companies," according to Weinstein, who also believes that the 'whole rock disco phenomenon will bring everybody back together. It's unfortunate that the two musical styles split up.'

FOR THE RECORD — New York Music Week, a brainstorm of Manhattan Borough President Andew Stein and the New Music Task Force headed by Allan Steckler, drew large crowds to most of its offerings in and around Manhattan. But one wonders if the message was brought home often enough that New York is returning to its once pre-eminent position in the recording and performing arts. The fact of the matter was that while New York Music Week sizzled in some areas, it fizzled in others, especially jazz. There were a few high points including the David Matthews Big Band, Marion McPartland, Polish pianist Adam Markowicz, and some others, mostly outdoors in the Sunken Plaza of the Citicorp Center. A lively pairing of Eubie Blake with Cissy Houston and Ronnie Dyson drew an estimated 4000 screaming people who did not allow subway riders their entry nor pedestrians their right of way on Lexington Avenue or East 53rd Street. But the real jazz happenings were for the agile club hopper. Visiting us from Los Angeles last week, for example, was vibist Terry Gibbs. Backed by a crackling rhythm section featuring pianist Walter Bishop, Jr., Gibbs proved how often we tend to overlook this "other" bebop vibraphonist. Although we tend to think in terms of Milt Jackson in that department, Gibbs is proving his facility is still intact <mark>at</mark> the French Quarter of the Sheraton center. In addition, James Moody gave us a look at what he's been doing in Las Vegas pit bands. He must have been woodshedding, for Moody's tenor, alto and flute blew away his competent rhythm section at Sweet Basil. 


JAZZ ALBUM PICKS

A remarkable recording, akin in spirit to a Keith Jarrett solo effort, Gismonti displays equal virtuosity with the acoustic guitar and the piano. The Latin-influenced, classical-sounding solo guitar on "Selva Amazonica/Pau Rolou" is mesmerizing. The piano work on "Ano Zero," "Frevo" and "Ciranda Nordestina" is inspired. The guitar on "Salvador" brings Jarrett's piano to mind. That covers all the cuts on this album



This is a top notch debut effort by the latest young jazzman to join the Grusin-Rosen stable. Hoggard is a vibraphonist who lives up to the rich tradition of this instrument going back to the days of Lionel Hampton. Hoggard plays with a style and intensity worthy of a much more experienced artist. His versatility is admirable, as can be seen on the swinging "Samba Pa Negra, the mellow "Kalima's Garden Song," and the smooth title cut.



Noah Young believed in his music so much that when he couldn't get a label deal, he took the risk of cutting and selling the record on his own. This is the result and it was worth it. At the head of a fine group of sidemen, Young's string bass cooks. With a predominantly acoustic sound, the band hits an inspired groove on the clean, soaring "Lake Taco," the cacaphonous 'Open Secret," and "The Wizard," featuring the clarinet of Perry Robinson.

A laid-back opus for Ponty, by comparison with his earlier recordings. Showing his talent as a multi-instrumentalist, Ponty plays organ, electric piano and grand piano in addition to his familiar violin. Standouts would be the easy string sounds of 'Beach Girl,'' the dream-like quality of the sh<mark>ort</mark> "Reminiscence," and the sprightly, rhythmical "Life Cycles," which features a fine synthesizer solo by Alan Zavod.

IN TOKYO — Monty Alexander — Pablo 2310-836 — Producer: Monty Alexander -List: 7.98

Pablo honcho Norman Granz has begun a policy of allowing his artists to produce their own albums. He's way ahead with this one. Pianist Alexander has what it takes chop-wise, as well as taste-wise. He's a two-fisted player with some of the facility of another Granz talent, Oscar Peterson. There are eight standards here but listen especially to "Broadway," "Tricrotism," and the old blues, "See See Rider.

AIN'T MISBEHAVIN' — Hank Jones — Galaxy GXY 5123 — Producer: Ed Michel — List: 7.98

If you happen to be the pianist in a hit show and also one of the best jazz piano players in the world, what would be more natural than to make an album of some of the show's music? Hank Jones has done just that with Fats Walter's music and able assistance from Richard Davis on bass. Roy Haynes on drums, Kenny Burrell on guitar, Teddy Edwards on reeds, and Bob Ojeda on trumpet. Polygram Canada Launches TV-Video Marketing Branch

TORONTO — With the advent of video as part and parcel of marketing product, both as television and in-store material, and the success of such TV-only advertising companies as K-Tel, Tee Vee and AHED Music in Canada, Polygram is jumping into the video sweepstakes.

The firm has launched Polystar Ltd., a direct subsidiary, headed by David Ball, a former assistant to Dieter Radecki, marketing vice president for Polygram, Inc. Canada.

Polystar Releases

Although the three releases under an initial campaign — product by the Statler Brothers, James Last and the Fischer Choir — may not indicate the ultimate trend of the TV slant to marketing, Ball hints there may be compilation projects resulting from the Polystar efforts.

While the aforementioned TV-oriented firms do not earn chart rankings officially in this country (as they do in Britain and other countries), at any time during a TV campaign for an album, some estimate as many as five of the Top 10 discs nationwide are issued by the likes of K-Tel, Tee Vee and

"The TV campaigns are expensive," Ball says, "but as K-Tel has proven, they are cost-efficient." Ball estimates the Fischer Choir, whose album release has already been hyped by a three-week commercial run and earned a gold album here, will see their sales figures double as a result.

Meanwhile, other firms are stepping up efforts to use video as part of promotion and marketing, particularly in-store.

But with the debut of national and syndicated programs, plus an increase in cable television programs, video may prove to be as lucrative here in launching a new artist as it is in Britain, where "Top Of The Pops" and "The Old Grey Whistle Test" have been instrumental in breaking an artist.

CITY-TV's syndicated simulcasts, being run in Toronto in conjunction with its sister radio operation, CHUM-FM, called "Inside The New Music" and "The New Music," have proven of immediate success, becoming the top-rated show on the UHF station.

The CRIA-organized CBC show, "Hot Pops," is also slated for a January.

Phonogram's Int'l Sales Seen As Key To Success

LOS ANGELES — An attitude that the company will outlast any sales slumps in the world market was expressed clearly at Phonogram's "Facts '79 — Perspectives '80" conference held recently in the city of Travemunde, West Germany.

Addressing the gathering of executives from throughout the company and its branches, Phonogram president Roland Kommerell acknowledged that the worldwide economic crunch has indeed caused problems in the record industry, but added that in light of label's international involvement, the company will persevere.

Worldwide Importance

Kommerell emphasized the worldwide importance of records as a source of entertainment, but also cautioned that international success on a large scale can cause problems of its own. He cited the massive success of the "Saturday Night Fever" and "Grease" albums of 1978, which, he said, had made the last six months seem stagnated by comparison.

In addition, Kommerell levelled criticism at home taping and piracy, which he acknowledged as an international problem of great magnitude — especially with the use of blank cassettes

Another highlight of the conference was the presentation of product and two hours of live entertainment by "in-house" talent. Done in a cabaret motif, the live show was emceed by Jurgen von der Lippe and featured Anita Skorgan from Norway, Alexander Reuter and Ricky Shayne from Germany, the group 2+1 from Poland, Babe from The Netherlands and Moulin Rouge from the USA.

Topping the show was the presentation of a gold record to Dire Straits' manager Ed Bicknell for the group's self-titled debut LP.

Ertegun Calls For Global Anti-Piracy Stand At Rio Meet

RIO DE JANEIRO — Anti-piracy action on the governmental level was the theme of the press conference following the meeting of the International Federation of Phonographic Producers (IFPI) board and the Latin American Federation of Phonographic Producers (FLAPF), held recently in Rio (Cash Box, Oct. 6).

"It is important to make the people understand that this problem affects not only record companies," said WEA International president Nesuhi Ertegun, who also serves as IFPI president, "but also the artist, composers and even the governments, since pirates pay no taxes."

"I feel that the industry loses about \$6 million per day because of pirates," Er-

WEA, K-Tel Join In Special Joint Marketing Pact

LONDON — WEA Records and K-Tel Records have formulated a unique marketing tie-up for all future material by folk-rock artist Clifford T. Ward. Under the terms of the arrangement, WEA will handle Ward's singles product, while K-Tel will market his albums.

Designed to provide a new avenue for introducing new artists to a mass audience, the deal also stipulates that K-Tel will automatically TV test the LP releases. If the tests prove successful, full national TV campaigns will follow.

The deal has been negotiated for the UK, Europe, South America and Australia/New Zealand. In all other territories, WEA will retain the rights for both singles and LPs

All publishing rights are with WEA Publishing, which in turn is sub-published by Intersong.

Commenting on the agreement, Richard Robinson, WEA deputy managing director, stated. "We believe that by harnessing the marketing power of K-Tel with WEA's well known qualities, we may have discovered a totally new way to break a high quality artist more quickly to a large public. If this proves to be the case, this could well be the first in a series of similar deals. We therefore regard this as an important innovation."

Viewing the deal from K-Tel's point of view, managing director Colin Ashby added, "In collaborating with WEA in the way this deal is structured. I feel that there are many new ways K-Tel can work along side the majors. This arrangement with WEA is a key to the future strengths and directions still to be found in the business."

tegun continued. "If governments don't cooperate in the future, there will be very hard times for the industry."

Pointing to areas where piracy is flourishing, Ertegun went on to say that the lack of any meaningful legal programs certainly has a detrimental effect in places like Singapore and Mexico — in the former, more than 10 million pirated cassettes were exported during 1978, while in the latter, 50% of cassette sales and 90% of 8-track sales are by pirates.

Giuseppe Ornato, IFPI director and head of RCA Italy, emphasized the point by adding that continuous changes in the national and local governments had led to a 50% piracy level on cassette sales in Italy, too

However, Ertegun added, positive action is possible in those areas where cooperation of the local authorities is obtained. As an example, Ertegun cited Hong Kong, where 43 police officers working full-time on the problem have cut the piracy rate from 85% to 5%.

In addition, Ertegun also named certain types of radio stations as contributors to piracy. "In my opinion," Ertegun stated, "radio stations that suggest that their audiences home tape their programs are doing something immoral."

The IFPI stand on this issue was expressed by executive secretary Dr. Miguel Angel Emery, who reported that the organization supported the efforts of CISAC (an international federation of rights collection societies) in instructing its associates in every country to act against radio stations that encourage home taping.

The group is very popular in many cities in the interior, and at least once every year, they come to Argentina for personal appearances in Cordoba, Rosario and **Buenos Aires**

Leo Bentivoglio of Phonogram informs that his company will release Susana Rinaldi's new album, which was recorded in France and released there on the Barclay label. Although Barclay is represented here by RCA, Rinaldi's contract had reserved the Latin American rights on the LP, and her manager, Marla Herminia Avellaneda, then negotiated the current arrangement with Phonogram for this market.

The WEA division of EMI held a party for Brasilian songstress Zeze Motta, who visited Buenos Aires for the second time in recent months. Following her first visit a couple of months ago, the company released her latest Brasilian album in this market.

Microfon Argentina is celebrating its 20th anniversary this month, although no special festivities have been planned. The diskery, headed by Mario and Norbert Kaminsky, has decided instead to use its money in an aggressive promotional campaign on behalf of recently acquired English language Motown and Ariola product aimed at the teen market.

RCA is revamping its tango music series with several titles from its huge catalog. Although tango seldom appears on the charts, it is an evergreen item, which through the years has accounted for a solid 10% of the local market. Roberto Goyeneche, Anibal Troilo, Juan D'Arienzo and even Astor Piazzolla appear on the RCA roster.

MELBOURNE — "Up There Cazaly" on the Fable label, the jingle about a soccer player that became a hit record, has become the biggest seller in the history of the Australian music industry, with 240,000 units sold to date. A spokesman for Image Records, Fable's distributor, says it's still selling at the rate of about 10,000 per day. As a result of the single's success, composer Mike Brady has been approached by English soccer interests to compose a song based on a legendary soccer player, and Fable's Ron Tudor is negotiating with Brady and his partner Peter Sullivan, who together com-

prise the Two Man Band, to record a followup single.

The recent item in this column regarding the signing of Australian band Skyhooks to the Riva-Mercury label was a bit premature. The information came from Attic Records of Canada, who had signed the band for their territory; but Michael Gudinski, managing director for Mushroom, the band's local label, has informed Cash Box that the negotiations for the USA release of the group's "Guilty Until Proven Insane" LP aren't quite complete Also, in a recent column, the producer of Cliff Richard's UK chart single "We Don't Talk Anymore" was wrongly identified as Terry Britten. According to Richard's office, the producer was Bruce Welch. Sorry.

More news from Mushroom includes the announcement that Eddle Leonitti will arrive here soon to produce the next Skyhooks album, and the finalizing of international contracts for The Sports, a fiveman band that supported Graham Parker on his Australian tour last year. The band has signed with Arista for Japan, the USA, Europe and Canada; and with Sire Records in England, after "amicably resolving" their contract with Stiff Records. The group's hit single, "Who Listens To The Radio," was released in the USA on Sept. 19, and a new "Don't Throw Stones," hit the streets Oct. 3. The band will tour the USA in November, playing 15 dates along the east

Led Zeppelin's "In Through The Out Door" sold double gold (40,000 units) in its first week of Australian release and made it to the top of the national LP charts in the second week . . . The Knack left Australia with baggage bulging from record awards received for local sales. FML their local distributor, presented the group with gold and platinum awards for their debut LP, "Get . WEA Germany's Loch Optimistic About Future At Annual Convention

LOS ANGELES — While acknowledging the difficulties encountered this year with the worldwide economic fluctuations and the continuing menace of piracy, president Siegfried Loch expressed an optimistic outlook for the future at the recent WEA Germany conference held in Bavaria near St. Englmar.

Noting that the overall German music industry had experienced a 10% drop over the past year, Loch told the gathered executives that WEA Germany's business had actually increased 5% during the same period.

Nevertheless, Loch also outlined the company's plans to deal with the soft market — listing many of the obstacles to be overcome.

Citing consumer apathy, Loch felt that a more aggressive pursuit of the "leisure time" dollar would be needed. On the executive level, Loch blamed mismanagement as one of the causes of the record industry's sales slump, explaining that, in his opinion, the industry had gotten carried away with the success of past years.

Finally, Loch cited the too-heavy dependence on "superstars" and the subsequent astronomical studio costs for public disenchantment with the industry. Loch bemoaned the "A & R politics" that demanded that big name groups and/or acts be signed, regardless of the cost or the prospects of making the money back. A much more prudent approach, Loch said, would be to develop new talent.

On the subject of piracy, Loch spoke strongly against home taping, stating that blank tape sales over the last few years had nearly ruined Germany's music business. Pointing out that blank tape sales exceeded album sales this year by some 130-150 million units, Loch condemned piracy and home taping as problems that need to be alleviated as soon as possible.

Further conference highlights included presentations of upcoming product and tours. A video presentations featuring AC/DC, Rickie Lee Jones, The Cars, Foreigner, Led Zeppelin, the Eagles and Fleetwood Mac was well-received; as was the introduction of Peter Haucke's Rockoko acts, Einstein, Beau Katzman and Bamboo.

From WEA Austria, a presentation on the group Supermax also drew applause.

Finally, at the conclusion of the conference, WEA Germany's new sophisticated computer was unveiled.

Sales Jump 13% For Seiko-do Chain In '79

TOKYO — With gross sales totalling almost 34 billion ven (\$153 million) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1979, Seiko-do, Ltd., one of Japan's largest record wholesalers, experienced a 13% increase over the previous fiscal year.

In light of the sales slump caused this year by economic problems throughout the nation, company officials were pleased with the figures, despite the fact that sales fell 2.2% below the targeted figure of 34.5 billion yen for '78-'79.

Specifically, records, which accounted for 76.6% of the company's sales, brought in 25.9 billion ven (\$116 million), up 5.3% from '77-'78. Tapes, which accounted for 18.8% of the totals, brought in another 1.6 billion yen (\$28 million), up by an astonishing 52.5% over '77-'78. Accessories brought in the balance of the earninas.

Sales goals for the '79-'80 fiscal year include a projected overall volume 38.9 billion yen (\$176 million), an increase of 15% over '78-'79.





NAMA President Says Banks Are Not Backing New Dollar

CHICAGO — The merchandise vending industry faces two major obstacles in its drive to promote widespread circulation of the new Susan B. Anthony dollar coin.

This is the assessment of Richard G. Schreiber, president of the National Automatic Merchandising Assn. (NAMA). Schreiber, in a statement before the

Schreiber, in a statement before the Subcommittee on Consumer Affairs of the House of Representatives Committee on Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs, said the number of Anthony dollars received in vending machines has "dropped off to a trickle" in recent weeks because 1) "the banking community has taken a passive to negative attitude toward the coin to date" and 2) "the public perceives the coin as too closely resembling the quarter."

Citing the findings of a recent survey of member companies in nine cities, Schreiber noted, "Almost 100% of the service companies we interviewed said the coin is difficult, if not impossible, to obtain from the banks. And the public — including many people who admit they have never seen or owned an Anthony dollar — believe the dollar and the quarter are difficult to tell apart."

Nevertheless, Schreiber said that NAMA supported the new, smaller dollar coin early on and that it would continue to do so.

Reason For Support

"Our reason for doing so is obvious: The millions of consumers we serve every 24 hours need coins to avail themselves of our goods and services. The large cartwheel dollar was never a popular coin because of its bulky size and weight. Even the 50-cent piece, for which we built more than 100,000 vending machines and tens of thousands more changemakers, did not circulate widely, and the only reason for its failure to do so that we could perceive was its size and weight.

"In the last 20 years, vending machines have been used increasingly to provide food service in plants and factories, colleges and universities, and many other kinds of establishments. Sandwiches, salads and luncheon entrees obviously command higher prices than a candy bar or a soft drink. Hence our interest in a widely circulating dollar coin."

Schreiber estimates that currently between 50- and 60,000 vending machines are

Regulations Posted For Gaming Machine Exhibitors At AMOA Expo

CHICAGO — The 1979 AMOA convention will mark the second time coin-operated gaming equipment will be permitted at the show. Exhibitors of this type of equipment, however, must adhere to various regulations and must register with the attorney general of the U.S.

AMOA advised that "exhibitors who want to display gaming equipment must get permission from the AMOA office in Chicago and must describe the equipment to be displayed." Upon applying for exhibit space, gaming machine firms will receive specific instructions from the association.

Following are some of the regulations outlined by AMOA:

- A special exhibit floor committee will monitor exhibits of gaming equipment in company with officials from the Federal Government.
- Only coin-operated gaming equipment may be displayed.
- Only tokens may be used to demonstrate equipment, and each gaming machine may vend only one (1) token to a visitor.
- Gaming equipment must be carefully controlled by professional uniformed

guard service to insure that persons 18 years and under do not have a sess to the machines. This guard so rice is to be provided by the exhibitor.

- Gaming equipment must be confined to a segregated area within each exhibit space where such equipment is displayed.
- The equipment will be used for demonstration only, with absolutely no aspect of gaming.
- 7) There will not be access to the equipment by the general public.
- 8) The AMOA will take whatever steps are necessary, at any time, to enforce compliance with these conditions, and to protect the image of the industry.

In addition to the above, there are other stringent rules which must be followed and AMOA's executive vice president Fred Granger urges exhibitors to contact the association's Chicago office either by letter (35 E. Wacker Drive, Chicago 60601) or phone (312-726-2810) without delay, for full specifics.

Cinematronics Bows 'Sundance'

LOS ANGELES — Cinematronics of El Cajon, Calif. has released its latest video game, "Sundance."

The new one or two-player video introduces a new feature of the Vectorbeam monitor: 16 different levels of line intensity have been introduced into the system, thus creating a unique display. A 23 inch monitor has also been introduced, leading to an even more unusual display of a new concept.

In the game, scoring is achieved by opening "space hatches" to catch bouncing suns, or firing "NOVAS" (a super intensified ball of fire) at the suns and destroying them. A flickering sun will randomly appear on the screen. Catching it gives the player five points, while the ordinary suns give one point. When a bonus is reached, the player receives a hundred points and the entire display "explodes" in Fourth of July fireworks fashion. When a bonus is reached four times, the person receives extra time based on operator settings. The game may be set for 45 seconds, one minute, one and a half minutes, or two minutes playtime per quarter.

Player options include the use of two, three or four suns, and the expert players can not only fire a "nova" out of the hatches thus destroying the suns, he can also remove the optional grids for increased competition. All options can be manipulated by the player during the play, which increases the action and stimulates operator collections.

equipped to accomodate the new dollar. "We expect that number will double during the next 12 months," he said.

According to Schreiber, most banks across the country are not actively marketing the new coin. They have adopted a "wait and see" attitude, he said, which makes it "practically impossible" for member companies to secure Anthony dollars.

"In his testimony before Congress, at the time the coin was being considered, the representative of the American Bankers Assn. asked the Treasury and the Congress to set a target date for phasing out the dollar note, so that the banks and the business community and the public would not have to deal with two kinds of dollars." Until this is done, he added, it is doubtful that the American taxpayer realize the potential savings of the new coin.



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
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
