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Songwriters Hall: Looking Ahead

The Songwriters Hall of Fame has been a worthy, long overdue addition to the industry's recognition factors. For there is truly meaning to the concept of paying homage to the leading writers down through the years.

Unfortunately, its premise is not completely in tune—particularly for the years that lie ahead—with the facts of-life as they exist in the popular song art. The organization has gotten by its first two annual presentations by a catching-up process in recognizing the genius of writers who, for the most part, are no longer as productive as in their peak years. This is, of course, even more noticeable in the number of posthumous awards given.

The point is where does the Hall of Fame go from here, after making all the key awards and then some? For the association has a 20 year professional songwriting qualification. Except for a handful of theatre composers—such as Jerry Herman or John Kander & Fred Ebb—the pickings seem kind of thin. On the pop front, it's an era of writers who are not necessarily going to have something to say in the decades ahead. That may be sad, but that's the way it is. Many of them, however, are speaking brilliantly about the present, and their achievements are certainly worthy of recognition. The Hall can give them their due by 1. drastically reducing the qualification period 2. making more awards for particularly fine new songs and/or writers that have emerged between Hall of Fame awards nights.

The awards event, too, might have better sustaining power if it made a point to focus on one particular writer or writing team's output, so that guests receive a truly well-rounded portrait of one's creative efforts. This could even take the form of narrative by the writer himself, explaining many of the interesting anecdotes that often surround the creation of a song.

We think the Songwriters Hall of Fame makes sense, not withstanding numerous song awards made by various industry associations throughout the year. It simply has to come to grips with a more realistic appraisal of its awards making mechanism.

NEW YORK — Nine gold records were awarded to Atlantic Records in May by the Record Industry Associa-tion of America. Included is the new Rolling Stones album, which was immediately certified gold upon re-lease, two albums and a single for Roberta Flack, an album and single for Aretha Franklin, and new albums by Emerson, Lake & Palmer, Graham Nash and David Crosby and Stephen Stills. Stills.

Stills. "Exile on Main St.," by the Rolling Stones, is a two record album, the second to be released through Rolling Stones Records, an Atlantic Custom label. The first was "Sticky Fingers," which was also a gold album for the artists. The consumer demand for the new Stones' record has been described as "utterly fantastic." Goody Stores Into South

Ist Move Outside NY-Phila. Area

NEW YORK --- The Sam Goody Entertainment Centers are moving into the south with the opening Aug. 2 of an outlet in the new Crabtree Valley Mall in Raleigh, N.C. This will be followed by four more stores in the south over the next four years.

Move represents the company's initial venture beyond the range of the Metropolitan New York and Philadelphia areas. The Mall contains about 1,100,000 square feet of selling space and houses three nationally-known department stores. It's the largest shopping center in the southeast.

The other stores, Goody told a meeting of shareholders, will also be located in the Piedmont Research Triangle area of N.C., covering the cities and college populations of Raleigh, Durham and Chapel Hill. Lease negotiations for the second unit are nearing completion for a site in an 800,-000 square-foot Mall now being planned for Durham.

NEW YORK — Sonny Lester's Groove Merchant label is allocating \$100,000—\$40,000 in Chicago alone— for concerts designed to add sales fuel to his catalog of black instru-mental and vocal music. Lester, who started the indie label seven months ago, expects all of his acts to appear during the concert series, which gets underway at a two-show performance Oct. 14 at the 4000-seat Chicago auditorium. The Chicago event will be accom-panied by a "Groove Merchant" week during which has mapped out in-store appearance, window displays, radio spots, press parties, interviews, etc. Included in the price of admission (\$4.50, \$5.50 and \$6.50) will be a free Groove Merchant LP. Musicians OK New Contract **On Film Work**

NEW YORK — Affected members of the American Federation of Musicians have approved by a margin of 330 to 24 a new Theatrical Motion Picture 24 a new Theatrical Motion Picture and Television Contract negotiated last month by their union and the Motion Picture Association of Ameri-ca, reports Hal Davis, Federation President.

The 27 month contract, retroactive to May 1, holds the line on basic wage rates and is designed to "revi-talize employment opportunities for musicians," Davis noted.

musicians," Davis noted. Highlight of the pact is a signifi-cant breakthrough in revision of reg-ulations governing musical tracking, musician's guaranteed hours of work can now be applied to unrelated films. Previously, guaranteed hours were cumulative and applicable to any series and/or individual films. Now, 80% of a guarantee must be scored live; only 20% can be applied from another series or film. The union feels that this will mean a substantial in-crease in work opportunities for its members, and an improvement in the quality of films. The contract clearly reaffirms that

The contract clearly reaffirms that all background music for theatrical motion pictures must be scored live, thus ending the recent trend of pro-ducing motion pictures with "canned" music music.

Video Cassettes

Agreement was reached providing payment to the musicians whenever a payment to the musicians whenever a future film made for theatrical or free television exhibition is applied to a new use such as pay television, cable TV or video tape cassettes. This re-turn adopts the same formula as now exists when motion picture films are exhibited on free TV. Payments will be made annually to all members through the AFM-Employers Pension Fund facilities.

The prior practice of diverting payments from sale of theatrical motion pictures to free television through the AFM-EPW Fund will now result in most payment being paid directly to the musicians once a year.

Additional contract features are: Increase in employer's contribution to the Pension Fund from 5% to 6%; increase in cartage rates; automatic payment of vacation pay; addition of new instruments (saxophone family, organ and celeste when furnished) to the doubling category.

Important gains also were made for members active in music preparation.

Eligible to vote on the new agreement were musicians who worked on at least 12 sessions for motion picture and/or TV films during the calendar year 1971. A total of 690 ballots were mailed. Of the 364 ballots returned, 10 were invalid.

Jazz Museum To Open In N. Y.; Nation's 1st

NEW YORK — A new museum de-voted exclusively to Jazz, its past, present and future, will open in New York on Friday, June 16. Howard E. Daily showings will be held of rare Jazz films and of "Jazz Pan-orama," the Society's sound-and-slide outline of Jazz history. Fischer will serve as executive di-rector and Jack Bradley as managing director of the museum.

In addition, the academy plans to select a national coordinator to work closely with all five chapters and with the National President, who would be encouraged to perform even more actively, in an effort to make the Academy as fully nationalized an organization as possible.

Five-City Committees

Grammy Awards voting procedure changes revolve around the system of five-city committees selecting the final nominations in specific fields. In addinominations in specific fields. In addi-tion to the arranging, engineering, album covers and album notes fields, now covered by committee-nominat-ing, the trustees voted to extend this method of selection into the classical music, jazz, and composing fields. Also discussed in detail were suggestions to streamline the first suggestions to streamline the first round of balloting, to nominate for Grammys on a semi-annual basis, and to reduce the number of fields in which members will be permitted to vote

The trustees voted to focus on Lon-don, Toronto and San Francisco as future NARAS chapter sites, inas-much as representatives from these cities have already evinced interest in

Slated By WWDJ NEW YORK — Stereo AM Radio will undergo its first test broadcast in the United States during the last quarter of this year pending FCC ap-proval, according to Kent Burkhart, president of the radio division of Pa-ifs 6 Souther Burdensting Car president of the radio division of Pa-cific & Southern Broadcasting Com-pany. The test is scheduled to utilize Pacific & Southern's Hackensack, N.J., AM station, WWDJ, which provides service to the greater New York City area.

The AM Stereo system was de-veloped by Kahn Research Labora-tories, an affiliate of Electrospace Cor-poration. Unlike FM Stereo, no spe-cially built receivers need to be used to hear AM Stereo. But then, there's another rock sound--the subtle and rhythmic thump-thump that starts off unobtrusively as it gains control of the hips, knees and feet, and then suddenly captivates your entire being with its between-the-lines potency. This is White Cloud, combining all the magic of an Indian raindance with the contagious drive of that "backbeat, you can't lose it." The individual talents present in White Cloud are more impressive, they represent many cornerstones in the foundation of contemporary music. Bassist Don Payne played with Ray Brown, Ornette Cole-man, Herbie Mann and Stan Getz as well as Tim Hardin, Melanie and May-nard Ferguson. Fiddler Kenny Kosek and pianist Teddy Wender have both done numerous sessions. But more important than the indi-

and planist leddy wender have both done numerous sessions. But more important than the indi-vidual talents is the fact that these creative people (and their egos) can all work together to form a totally cohesive and incredibly imaginative sound. With the aid of guitarist-vocal-ist Charlie Brown, White Cloud's live set featured dynamic renditions of original material such as "All Cried Out," "Funky Congregation" and "Rocky Roads To Clear." The spirit of Loudon Wainright III was in the air at Max's. Not only did White Cloud back up Loudon on his last album, but second bill, folksinger George Gerdes, is an old sidekick who comes from the same school of song-writing. A harmonica and guitar

Then the Buddah recording artist moves in with understanding, well-phrased ren-ditions of such numbers as "Help Me Make It Through the Night," "Watch What Happens," "My Way," "She's A Lady" and "Do I Love You." While the last three songs represent the songster's current composing style, a "nostalgia time" medley reminds one of Anka in another time, another place. The songs include "Puppy Love," back as a hit via the Osmonds, "Put Your Head On My Shoulder," "Lonely Boy," "Diana" and "You Are My Destiny." Another new item, "Gos-pel Singer," his current single, fatures a remarkable string-section arrangement.

The only flaw is Anka's penchant for introducing the guest list in rhyme, a novelty that wears thin. That guest list, incidentally, was glit-tering, including such luminaries as Henry Fonda, Dustin Hoffman, Jane Pickens, Otto Preminger, Cliff Robert-son & Dina Merrill, among others. Dan Cassidy SANTA MONICA CIVIC AUDITORI-UM, L.A. — Any act that brings its own stage decor must have something on the ball. When the decor consists of several potted palms and a moon-over-Wiamea-Bay backdrop, you know that the act must be pretty spe-cial. And when they're brought on stage following an introduction by (are you ready for this, folks?) George Gobel, you can figure that they're damn well unique. None of which, admittedly, has anything to do with the quality of the music played by Dan Hicks and his Hot Licks. What it all does have to do with, though, is the kind of pro-fessional approach brought by the group to their presentation. An ap-proach that allows Hicks to present a drowsy, spaced-out appearance while all the time keeping about half a step ahead of his audience, with the entire show under perfect control

all the time keeping about half a step ahead of his audience, with the entire show under perfect control. Which all puts Hicks ahead of 75% of the competition before a single note is played. When the music does come, though, it's in perfect keeping with the staging. Hicks, abetted by violinist Sid Page, a bassist, lead guitarist and two "Lickettes," brings to his audience a sort of 20's-30's-40's amalgam that comes off as being a cross betweeen the Andrews Sisters and the Sextet of the Hot Club of Mill Valley. In an age of Supergroups, without a bit of hoopla and a minimum of fanfare, this is truly a super group.

Dan Hicks and his Hot Licks have two albums in current release, both on Blue Thumh.

First up was Dan Cassidy, a singersongwriter from Little David Records. He attempts everything from contemporary pop-type material like "Nothing Stop This Dream" and the pretty "Winter Song" to an Irish ballad-type piece about patriot James Conley to the Socratic "Let's Make a Poet a King." As Cassidy moves into the field of philosophy and social consciousness his reach exceeds his grasp a bit. 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



NEW YORK-REGGAE: ONLY A MOTION AWAY (PART 1)

(There's a new kind of music in the air. And it has reached the States via **Paul Simon** and **Paul McCartney**. The Musical form is known as Reggae, and with the summer of '72 just around the corner, it could easily blossom into a major musical happening. Part one of this two part series will endeavor to discuss some of the background elements of Reggae, while the concluding segment will delve into the artists, groups and personalities responsible for developing that musical form. Series will conclude next week.)

It's always difficult to describe a new kind of music. Especially, a kind of music that really must be felt to be appreciated. We're all familiar with Jazz and Blues because those forms had their roots planted in American soil. Because those forms have been around now for years. But Reggae (pronounced reg-gay) is quite different. Reggae music takes root in Jamaica. It is, basically, likened to country music only in that a majority of all the Reggae songs will deal with telling a story or relating a personal experience. Very little time is devoted to philosophy, politics or environment as is characterized by much of our own music.

The tempo of most Reggae songs never vary. One can best get the feeling of the Reggae tempo by thinking of a metronome with the pendulum swinging smoothly and precisely to and fro. Never varying. Always keeping the exact timing-gracefully. And almost mechanical. In fact, Reggae songs, because of their precision, always sound like perfect recordings when in album form. They sound as though great care was taken to produce each track—but in actuality, each group is capable of producing this tightness 'live' by assigning each member of the group a specific musical function.

HOLLYWOOD-RICHARD NADER: ROCK AND ROLL IS HERE TO STAY

In town for a couple of days, readying things for last week's opening of his Rock and Roll Spectacular at the Flamingo hotel in Las Vegas, promoter Richard Nader was able to devote an hour to Cash Box and breakfast. In, as it turned out, that order. Nader is a busy person. In the process of being polite and informative to us, he spent far too little time on the Continental Hyatt House's kosher bacon and eggs (this is, after all, Hollywood). The Flamingo engagement is Nader's first excursion into Las Vegas; he feels that the city will attract exactly the right audience for his nostalgia-filled presentations. "We're using the Nevada Room, It's not the main room or the lounge, it's the convention room; larger than either. We're setting up tables and chairs in a cabaret-style arrangement, and will be able to seat 2,200." Featured acts are Chuck Berry, Bo Diddley, the Shirelles and Gary "U.S." Bonds. Later this year, Nader will have four revival shows on the road simultaneously, including his first European tour. He has certain stars, who will headline, and

Later this year, Nader will have four revival shows on the road simultaneously, including his first European tour. He has certain stars, who will headline, and books the remaining acts accordingly. A show with Chuck Berry or Little Richard topping, for instance, would possibly feature more black acts than one headed by Jerry Lee Lewis, whose show would be more country-rock oriented.

Nader has had his share of problems with the mammoth spectaculars; arguments over billing are far from rare, and there's an occasional artist who wants to present new material. "What they don't realize is that the fans have come to hear the **old songs.** When a performer tries to present his 'new side' to them, they become very resentful. The audience also demands a high degree of professionalism from the acts. If there's a lot of fooling around between numbers, the audience just won't stand for it.

To get a more defined analysis of Reggae music, I spoke with Les Harsten of Leslee Productions who had visited Jamaica several times during the past three months to record both Jamaican and American artists. Based on his conversations with many of the top Reggae groups with whom he had been working, Harsten had these comments to make about the nature of Reggae music: "Reggae could be defined as an original form of Jamaican music characterized by an intense, personal and emotional expression and a driving rhythmic force. Though the songs are usually personal, lots of symbolism is used as is evidenced by the song "Meagre Dog" done by **Byron Lee and the D**ragonaires in which one best friend turns on another-thus, 'meagre dog turn around and bite you. . . .'

"The rhythm of Reggae music," Harsten continued, "is consistently medium tempo, almost swaying, and the driving rhythmic forces are produced by having the group members use lots of simple instrumentation such as striking a break drum with a drum stick. Also effective are their use of the percussion instruments such as tambourine, maraccas and wood blocks."

Though Reggae music is by no means new, its presence will soon be felt in full force during the coming months, Already, three major artists, Paul Simon (Mother & Child Reunion, Me & Julio Down By The Schoolyard); The Rolling Stones (Sweet Black Angel); and Paul McCartney (Love Is Strange) have given us a taste of their interpretations of Reggae.

Next week's story will explore many of the more popular Jamaican Reggae bands and will discuss how Reggae has developed in Jamaica and what future it has in America. kenny kerner

The company expressed the view that this three dimensional realism exceeds in clarity any former attempts at three dimensional photography and creates new entertainment medium for motion picture viewers.

Consumer Director Seeks Time Listing **On Tape Packages**

NEW YORK — The International Tape Association received a commu-nication from Frank E. McLaughlin, director for Industry Relations, Office of Consumer Affairs, Washington, D.C., together with a letter that McLaughlin received from Dr. Stew-art M. Lee, a member of the White House Consumer Advisory Council, pertaining to printing the running time on each side of a cassette and the total running time of each car-tridge. According to Larry Finley, execu-

According to Larry Finley, execu-tive director of ITA, Dr. Lee stated in his letter, "I have been somewhat dis-appointed and even frustrated that his letter, "I have been somewhat dis-appointed and even frustrated that prerecorded cassettes and cartridges do not list the length of whatever has been recorded. I have found that in some cases, there is quite a diver-gence in the time of music on an album and another on a cassette or cartridge. The consumer should know that when they buy a tape what the running time is. I have found that, especially in the classical area, that the running time of a tape was some-times less than that on the album. I would like to see the industry be urged to include the total running time of each side of a cassette and the total running time of an 8-Track cartridge as the consumer is entitled to know this fact when they make their purchase." ITA contacted several of its mem-bers pertaining to this problem. Bob

their purchase." ITA contacted several of its mem-bers pertaining to this problem. Bob Kornheiser, vice president of tape sales for Atlantic Records and chair-man of the ITA record committee, replied that they had been listing to-tal playing tome on all tape product for the past year and that Atlantic would continue with this practice. Stan Marshall, national sales manger of Elektra Records, stated that they would immediately start printing the total running time on all new product to comply with Dr. Lee's request. Lou Dennis, director of tape operations for Warner Brothers/Reprise, said that their July releases had already been scheduled with labels already printed but they would put the pro-gram into effect starting with the August releases. Motorola asks that the court declare patents 3,400,227; 3,403,868; 3,-437,762; and 3,560,126, owned by Gates Learjet Corporation and which pertain to cartridge type magnetic tape players be declared invalid and non-infringed by Motorola players. Subsequently, on May 12, 1972 the Gates Rubber Company brought a pa-tent infringement suit against Moto-rola Inc. in the Federal District Court in Denver, Colorado involving the same four patents which are the sub-ject of the Delaware action. Gates Rubber Company, who does not man-ufacture cartridge type magnetic tape players, claims to have recently ob-tained title to the Gates Learjet pa-tents, according to a company state-ment. ment

HONKY CHATEAU—Elton John—Uni 93135 The "Rocket Man" serves up a beautifully laid back set sure to please comfirmed fans and certain to make many new ones. A nice informal air pervades the proceedings as Elton, his regular companions Nigel Olsson and Dee Murray get down to some outright boogieing. Bernie Taupin once again has contributed superb lyrics—"Mellow" is one of his most de-lightful word gatherings to date. Jazz great Jean-Luc Ponty shows up violin in hand and Elton gets a real chance to work out on the piano. He makes the most of it. Listen to "Honky Cat," the humorous "I Think I'm Gonna Kill Myself" and the madcap "Hercu-les." The best Elton John record to come along, along.

JAZZ BLUES FUSION—John Mayall—Polydor PD 5027

John Mayall's music has always been very John Mayall's music has always been very close to pure jazz and on this release he gets nearer than ever before, partially due to the presence of trumpet great Blue Mitchell. May-all's drumless experimentations have also come to an end as Ron Selico turns up to add his percussive talents. As for Mayall, he is as smooth a blues belter as ever. Album was recorded live in Boston and New York and features seven tunes, most exciting of which is a little opus called "Exercise In C Major Harmonica, Bass And Shufflers." Should become a major chart item before very long.

THE BEST OF JERRY REED—RCA LSP—4729 From the release of his first LP, it was obvious that "The Unbelievable Guitar & Voice Of Jerry Reed" was more than just some down-home Nashville type. Now, twelve LPs and many Top 40 hits later, it is clear that Reed is an institution that knows no bounds. Here is a country boy who city folk have to listen to— no one has ever figured out how one can ignore this kind of talent. And here is a collec-tion of tunes (10 originals, 1 standard) that have proved the point—including "When You're Hot, You're Hot," "Amos Moses" and "Ko-Ko Joe." Greased lightning, sales-wise.

TONY BENNETT WITH LOVE—Columbia KC 31460

This is a soft-lights-and-sweet-music Ben-This is a soft-lights-and-sweet-music Ben-nett, featuring only two swingers ("The Rivi-era" and "Love"). Accompanied by the ar-rangements and direction of Robert Farnon, the songster has revived some worthy stand-ards like "Remind Me" and "Easy Come, Easy Go" and brings out the evergreen look of "Maybe This Time," the Kander-Ebb ballad from the film version of "Cabaret." An awfully nice throw-back to the mood era of vocal albums. albums.

ACE—Bob Weir—Warner Bros. 2627 After being an ace up the sleeve for too many years, Bob Weir is finally in full view with a winning hand. Specializing in kinetic rhythm guitar and soulful vocals, Weir has been the driving force behind the Grateful Dead since the group started. But being a driving force behind a group has not allowed Weir as much exposure up front as he needed to communicate his highly individual set of talents. He gets this exposure in the eight songs on this album, backed by many of the Dead, but within the context of his songs and personalized direction. The mood ranges from the deeply touching "Looks Like Rain" to the Mariachi-style "Mexicali Blues" to the super-rocking "One More Saturday Night."

SUGAR--Original Cast-United Artists 0698 SUGAR—Original Cast—United Artists 0698 "Sugar" is the successful Broadway re-make of "Some Like It Hot." On disk, it has to de-pend on the Jule Styne/Bob Merrill songs, which is asking a lot. It's just that Styne's melodies are often hard to find, and Merrill's lyrics add little to his solid career. The boys did far, far better with "Funny Girl." There is, however, a nice old-fashioned musical comedy sound to the Mitch Miller-produced session.

THE FIRST TIME EVER (I SAW YOUR FACE)— Vikki Carr—Columbia KC 31453 Talented thrush returns with another stun-ning assortment of contemporary tunes. The beautiful Ewan MacColl piece which gives the album its name is rapidly becoming the most covered song of the year but Vikki does a nice job on it. Other choice cuts include "Song Sung Blue," "(Last Night) I Didn't Get To Sleep At All," "Help Me Make It Through The Night" and "Gypsies, Tramps And Thieves." MOR programmers will have a field day.

THE JOHNSTONS—Mercury SRM 1-640 Now a duo and on Mercury, this Irish group now residing in England continues to write and perform a wide range of pleasing and thought-provoking material. They capture a weltanschauung seen through a picture window on a "Continental Trailways Bus" (their cur-rent single), the pseudo-hipness of all too many of us on the Weill-ish "Bread And Wine" and the mixed feelings of being a "Border Child" with both musical and lyrical precision. Just one listen to the items like "There Always Will Be More," "Somebody Oughta Turn Your Head Around" and "Let Me Get Straight Again" is about all it takes to have you humming right along. Horn and string arrangements by Al Gorgoni have given an added fullness to the proceedings and this is most welcome. Tasty and tuneful offering all the way. all the way.

GERONIMO BLACK----Uni 73132



NASHVILLE — Nashville's music in-dustry, city officials, and civic leaders gathered recently at the Commerce Union Bank to honor Kitty Wells, with a surprise anniversary luncheon and award presentation

with a surprise anniversary luncheon and award presentation. Currently celebrating her twentieth year as a recording artist with Decca Records of MCA, Kitty was over-whelmed when Vince Cosgrave of MCA's west coast office presented her with a gold record in appreciation of selling over one million copies of "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels." Miss Wells, who has a lifetime re-cording contract with Decca, came out

Miss Wells, who has a lifetime re-cording contract with Decca, came out of an early retirement in 1952 to re-cord "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels," which was an "an swer song" to Hank Thompson's ver-sion of "Wild Side of Life." Recorded at the Castle Studio, located in Nash-ville's old Tulane Hotel, the record sold over 500,000 copies the first six months after its release and remained the number one selling record the number one selling record throughout the world for over one

year. "Honky Tonk Angel" was produced by Owen Bradley, an assistant A&R man for Decca at that time, and fortunad only four musicians-Paul featured only four musicians—Paul Warren, Shot Jackson, Johnny Wright and Jack Anglin. Since then, Bradley has produced every Kitty Wells record made. (During the past

ords are "Sweet Caroline," "Sugar In The Flowers," and his current "It's A Crying Shame." Stu Phillips, also from Canada, a regular member of the Grand Ole Opry, has been called "the Traveling Balladeer." 

EDITORIAL: The Used Equipment Dilemma

As most machine distributors will tell you, there's a terrific shortage of good used equipment on the market today. The only answer can be that operators are holding onto their machines a great deal longer before trading them in. The problem is particularly irksome to distributors who export used merchandise overseas because the foreign buyers are pretty picky and will not take anything but first-class merchandise, even tho the shortage exists, and have no use for old equipment at all.

It's axiomatic that the longer an operator holds onto his machines, the less he'll gain at trade-in time. And today, conditions being what they are, the operator can get top-dollar for good used merchandise, so we ask: why isn't it coming in? Perhaps the habit of holding equipment for abnor-

mally long periods is a hangover from the recent recession but now with the return to prosperity, the practice is an economic falacy. Consider the established principles: fresher equipment on the location brings 1. higher coin; 2. better good will from customers; 3. less down-time due to worn merchandise; 4. increases the overall value of the route should a sale be on the mind. In addition, by exercising the right financial and depreciation plans, it all makes sounder economic sense to update the route equipment faster rather than slower.

Therefore, the message is that keeping machines on the route or in the shop until they die of old age helps no one, hurts everyone.


