

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Timely Recognition

Annual sales conventions are normally a time for things to be squarely on the upbeat, for it is the occasion when a label puts its best foot forward in terms of product and merchandising, and the idea is to showcase gladtidings in the glowing light of goodfeeling and slick presentation.

Rarely does such a gathering officially take stock of the record business, both its blessings and failings. One of the outstanding exceptions in recent years has been the confabs of Columbia Records. Indeed, Columbia has had a product story to tell. But, more stimulating and far-reaching than product presentation at Columbia meets have been the label's assessment of the state-of-business and what it deems is the necessary **course-ofaction** in areas where dramatic restatement of policy and new moves are called for.

Two years ago, the label's convention produced the "Age of Reason," wherein the label added "stabilization" to the industry's lexicon; this year, Columbia has extended the "Age of Reason" theme with regard to those retail establishments that make available to the consumer an LP inventory in-depth-the full-line retailer. It is the label's intention to stimulate traffic to these stores, which cater to far more than the "best-selling" needs of customers. But, the label has also taken great pains, as outlined by Bill Gallagher, Columbia's marketing vice president, to note the very significant place held by sub-distribs in the disk

industry economy. They are here to stay, and provide a necessary service to the business, Gallagher said in essence. With remarkable and wise diplomacy, Columbia put the sub-distrib to task for, in certain instances, abusing his right to a functional discount, yet held out a hand by giving him further incentive (e.g. increased ad allowances) to carry on his business in a more effective manner—in his own backyard.

The real significance of Columbia's moves, however, lies in the particular emphasis on the full-line retailer.

Cynics may comment that an operation like Columbia has too much at stake in its distribution operation to let its sales fall into the hands of a few people who will convert full line dealers into outlets featuring only "cherrypicked" merchandise.

This is obviously true. But, the statements that came out of Miami Beach the other day had basic honesty, and concern for a business that has tended to drift toward a move 'em out fast and forget 'em policy.

What is Columbia's conviction (and policy) is certainly food for thought for any company which has in-depth catalog or is thinking in that direction. Without the full-line retailer, this direction — the true core of the record business — cannot materialize. Neither, too, can the "Grow Power," as Columbia puts it, of the industry as a whole maintain itself.

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MGM/Verve Sees 'Year Of The Lion' With | WB-Reprise Unveils 16-LP 'Win' Push 56 New Albums On 6 Affiliated Labels

YORK-MGM Records last NEW week concluded a series of two re-gional distributors' meetings in San Francisco and New York which was Francisco and New York which was termed the most successful in the company's 18-year history. Using the theme "The Year of the Lion," a total in the theme "The Year of the Lion," a total of 56 new albums were presented as the current release from MGM and five associated diskeries. Twelve LP's were unveiled from the head firm, with ten on Metro, seven from Verve, 10 for Verve/Folkways, twelve Deutsche Grammophon sets, and five from Archive from Archive.

Based on the volume of orders writ-Based on the volume of orders writ-ten during the two-day meets, Mort Nasatir, the label's new chief, re-ported that the enthusiastic response to the fall program should show a gross in excess of \$2 million in sales. Meeting his distributors for the first time since taking over the presidency of the meeord company. Negatir said

of the record company, Nasatir said he was "delighted" by the reception he received at both meetings when he stated the company's "strong posi-tion in the industry and its continued expansion efforts that will insure still greater profits for the company's distributors

Highlight of the meetings was the unusual audio visual technique em-ployed for the presentation of product through the combination use of slides and motion picture film projected on the screen at the same time. This process illustrated new album covers, while 16mm film clips showed the

artists performing. Arnold Maxin, former president of MGM Records, and now executive head of Robbins, Feist and Miller, was on hand at both meetings to in-troduce Nasatir. Cocktail parties, special breakfasts and luncheons were part of the convention activities. Nov-elties such as chopsticks and fortune cookies were on each of the desks playing up the theme of "The Year of the Lion."

Atlantic Reports Top Singles Week Of '65

Singles Week Of '65 NEW YORK—Atlantic Records set a new high in singles sales for any week of 1965 last week, with total sales hitting over 400,000 records. The year is shaping up as the biggest in the label's history, with single sales so far up 30 percent over the same period in 1964 and LP sales up over 100 percent. Sonny and Cher's hit, "I Got You Babe," on Atco led the parade with sales of over 150,000 copies. Barbara Lewis' recording of "Baby I'm Yours" and Wilson Pickett's "In The Mid-night Hour," each sold 75,000. Other strong Atlantic decks were Solomon Burke's "Tonight's The Night," Ester Phillips' "Theme From Moonglow And Picnic." On Volt, Otis Redding's "I've Been Loving You Too Long," led the firm's sales while on Stax the AG's "Boot-Leg," Carla Thomas' "Stop! Look What You're Doing," and Rufus Thomas' "Willy Nilly," were in demand. The Righteous Brothers' "Justine" on Moonglow was also hot. also hot

Glass stated that the new operation will be completely independent and entirely self-supporting. Thus far, only two employees have been defi-nitely hired. 

Tom & Jerrio firmly established themselves last time out with their pop-r&b smash of "Boo-Ga-Loo" and this potent, like-themed follow-up, "Great Goo-Ga-Moo-Ga," should also go the hitsville route. The side is a rollicking, fast-moving blues-novelty with an infectious teen-angled danceable beat. "Come On And Love Me" is a tradition-styled slow-shufflin' plea for romance.





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

Martha Crane, director of women's activities for WLS-Chicago has com-pleted a manual on the American sys-tem of free broadcasting, to be distem of free broadcasting, to be dis-tributed to foreign women broadcast-ers who visit the United States. Writers who visit the United States. Writ-ten in her capacity as a trustee of the Educational Foundation of Ameri-can Women in Radio and TV, the manual is entitled "Radio and Tele-vision, U.S.A." and offers basic infor-mation on American radio and TV, the FCC, station management and personnel, and companies related to the field of broadcasting, in addition to a general description of how radio and TV stations operate in this coun-try. Since it is the first such con-densed explanation of U.S. radio and TV ever published, the manual, pub-lished by AWRT, will also be distrib-uted to schools and libraries through-out the U.S.

ANGEL EYES—Dave Brubeck Quartet—Colum-bia CL 2348/CS 9148 No timing gimmicks on this set, just some fine jazz offerings bound to click with the pop set as well as jazz crowds who have long held the Bru-beck four in high esteem. More high gear blowing from Paul Desmond on alto sax, and the beauti-ful work of Brubeck on piano, drummer Joe Morello and bassist Gene Wright make "Angel Eyes" another grade-A collection from the com-bo. Included on the LP are "Angel Eyes," "Little Man With A Candy Cigar" and "Let's Get Away From It All."



Among the songs enhanced by his artful handling are "O Sole Mio," the "Love Theme From 'La Strada'," and some recent pop items, i.e. "Amore Scusami."

CONSTANT SORROW—Bobby Bare—RCA Vic-tor LPM/LSP 3395 A big favorite in the country field, Bobby Bare has stepped out of the c&w spotlight and into the folk area for a heartfelt rendition of some of the most well-known tales of heartbreak and tragedy. The smooth, warm voice of the chanter stands him in good stead with the material chosen for this package, as he displays exceptional ability at handling the folk ballad. Best grooves here in-clude "I'm A Man Of Constant Sorrow" and "Don't Think Twice, It's All Right."

THE SANDPIPER—Original Soundtrack—Mer-cury MG 21032/SR 61032 The highly-publicized MGM-Filmways produc-tion, "The Sandpiper," starring Elizabeth Taylor, Richard Burton and Eva Marie Saint, has re-ceived a tasteful and poignant musical score at the hands of veteran composer Johnny Mandel. While each theme is a separate entity, all of the themes are haunting and lovely and are woven together to create a masterful musical tapestry which hangs as a background to the story of an illicit love affair. Among the top tracks are a vocal treatment of "Shadow Of Your Smile" and "Weekend Montage."

IT'S NICE TO GO TRAV'LING—Si Zentner— RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3388

RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3388 The latest album effort by maestro Si Zentner is, as usual, just the thing for those record buy-ers who like to swing along with good listening. I LOVE JAZZ—Louis Armstrong—Decca DL 4227/74227





Holding more than a nostalgic im-portance in the Prestige line then, this set, featur-ing a collection of cuts waxed in the '40's and early '50's, should prove attractive to many a modern fan. Charles McPherson on alto sax is joined by four others on tracks like "Embraceable You," "Variations On A Blues By Bird" and "Hot House." You," "Varia "Hot House."

IT'S TIME-Jackie McLean-Blue Note 4179

IT'S TIME—Jackie McLean—Blue Note 4179 Up-tempo and blues grooving make for some wild listening on this Blue Note LP featuring the alto sax work of Jackie McLean with a new trum-pet talent, Charles Tolliver, and notable sidemen Herbie Hancock (piano), Roy Hanes (drums) and Cecil McBee (bass). Tracks include six com-positions by both hornmen, among the best being "Das' Dat," "Revillot" and "It's Time." A long standing artist, McLean's LP could be the start of happenings for the superb new Tolliver.

In addition, the pres-entation features the largest film strip ever developed, containing 4400 frames instead of the usual 100 and divided into approximately 95 seg-ments. It ran for five hours instead of the customary 15 or 20 minutes. Developed piece by piece, the com-plete presentation was on film, with the exception of a welcoming speech by Goddard Lieberson, president of Columbia; a keynote address by Bill Gallagher, vice president of market-ing; and various explanatory inserts. Stan Kavan, vice president and gen-eral manager of Columbia Records Stales Corp., wrote the scripts and supervised the continuity of the audio-visual presentation. The pro-duction's time schedule was coordi-nated by Jack Wiedenmann, staff as-istant to Gallagher.

The visual portion of the film was developed by the art and design department, under the supervision of its director, Robert Cato. After hearing tape excerpts of the album product, Cato provided complementary photos and designs. The same process was used for the various speeches and presentations. The sales, A&R and engineering departments were responsible for the audio portion. When both the audio and visual sections were ready, O'Hayon undertook the technical coordination. The actual production, begun late in May, was partially prepared at Columbia's headquarters while the under-camera work went to Terrytoons laboratories. Terrytoons, a division of CBS Films, Inc., modified its camera shop in advance to facilitate shooting the filmstrips. Maida Schwartz, manager of administration and information and design, helped to organize the whole project.

THE SUN WILL SHINE AGAIN IN ITALY

A flicker of hope has turned to a bright ray of sunshine in Europe, appropriately in Italy, where it is expected that the government will once again permit the operation of amusement equipment after October 1st, when the gambling edict will become law.

Originally, this restriction was to incorporate all types of equipment, as laws of this nature usually do.

There have been gambling machines on location in Italy, and operators have infiltrated with this type of pay-out equipment, and it was all done illegally. The sad part of the ruling was that while it was based on prohibiting gambling, much of the equipment ruled out included the simple flipper game, the gun game, shuffles and just about every coin-operated type of amusement machine.

The Italian association however, joined by Mondial Commercial Corporation, U.S. factory representative in Europe, convinced the Italian authorities that the amusement equipment is not, and will not be designed for gambling. An amendment to the law is expected on the effective date, and a major legislative victory will have occurred in a prime export market for the industry in the United States and, in fact, for every supplier and operator concerned with the Italian market.

The United States has witnessed rulings in many states where, because of the gambling problem, staple amusement equipment has also been prohibited. Reasons for these broad laws generally lie in misinformation on the part of legislators, who innocently include what they believe to be gambling equipment, which in reality, is amusement equipment designed, manufactured, and operated for income to be derived from pleasure-seeking patrons.

There is no estimate of the amount of damage done by the gambling machine both here and in the export markets. One thing is certain. Where gambling is permitted, it appears that in due time, it will be disallowed. Once it is restricted, the illegal operations begin. Once this happens all amusements are then prohibited. The amendment in Italy is indeed a victory, but is a rarity. Too often, these laws cannot be changed.

While we cannot take a stand against gambling, per se, because we honestly believe that there is a place for it and should be permitted within certain controls not only overseas but here in the United States, we cannot but hope that where it is restricted, the amusement machine business will do its utmost to see that the law is obeyed. If not, the resultant ruling will include not only gambling but every type of equipment. History repeats itself. We have seen it in the United States, and we have witnessed it in South America. Europe is no different. The amusement machine industry must operate within the confines of legislative ruling. Those individuals who insist on abusing the privilege, are taking away the livelihood of an industry.

NY's Gov. Rockefeller Vetos New **Coin Machine Licensing Proposal**

ALBANY, N.Y.—A bill to require the licensing of coin-operated amusement machines and amend the New York State penal code to exempt amusement pieces which confer an immediate and unrecorded right of replay from the stigma of "a thing of value" was introduced into the 1965 State Legislature by Sen. Thomas Laverne, ultimately approved by both the Senate and the Assembly, but was vetoed late last week by Gov. Rockefeller. According to Mrs. Millie McCarthy, president of the New York State Coin Machine Assn., and the woman who has devoted an untold amount of hours in an attempt to bring the bill to law, the Governor vetoed the proposal principally for the same reasons he vetoed an almost identical bill which was and remains that such legal free-play "is not in the public interest." After learning of last week's veto, Mrs. McCarthy replied, "Not only have the state's operators lost a valuable safeguard for themselves, but the indus-try throughout the nation has suffered a tremendous loss of certainly a most invaluable legal precedent."


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



His own food service management experience is as unied as that of the accompanyion with varied as that of the corporation with which he is now affiliated. It began in 1941, when he took over management of his family's restaurant business in Baltimore, Maryland.

In 1949, Globus established the Kwik Kafe, Inc. vending firm in Baltimore, which specialized in automated coffee service. In 1959 this business was incorporated with a regional network of vending installations dispensing various food items to become Automatic Food Systems, Inc. Globus also served as a director of the National Automatic Merchandisers' Association.

Canteen Bows Japanese Developed System For Credit Card Operation Of Vending Machines

NEW YORK—A system for operating vending machines by credit cards was unveiled here today by Automatic Canteen Company of America. In a joint demonstration with Tateisi Electronics Company, Kyoto, Japan, de-signers, developers and manufacturers of the equipment, Automatic Canteen displayed candy, food and drink, and general purpose vending machines oper-ated by both special credit cards and regular coins. (Tateisi Electronics Com-pany is a major producer of industrial electronics in Japan. The company manufactures the OMRON brand of transistorized proximity switches, static control relays, logic circuits and electronic control products, and is also a leader among Japanese firms in medical electronics.)

Of the two versions demonstrated, one—the post-paid version—employs specially-coded plastic credit cards which are inserted in the vending ma-

specially-coded plastic credit cards which are inserted in the vending ma-chine and then returned. The other uses pre-paid "deposit cards" which are retained by the machine. The credit card purchase is auto-matically recorded by date, amount and card number by a computerized, punched - tape combination record -keeping and control system located alongside the vending machines. This may be tied into existing IBM ac-counting systems for automatic com-puterized payroll deduction or billing-mailing procedures. "A lost or muti-lated card is automatically invalidated by simple changes in the computer control," O'Malley advised. The model of the computer control demonstrated today can accept and record purchases by as many as 10,-000 cards, but 100,000 cards or more can be handled by existing technology. The single control system can handle up to 10 vending machines in one bank. Automatic Canteen officials said

Automatic Canteen officials said that sales and marketing plans would not be completed until after extensive field tests. One of the questions to be

answered by the tests will be whether vending machines of the future should accept only credit cards or both cards and regular coins. Kazuma Tateisi, president of Ta-teisi Electronics Company, said that after satisfactory field tests, Auto-matic Canteen has the right to sign an exclusive agreement for sales and distribution of the equipment in the United States. Research, development and engineering of the credit card system have been going on for more than a year, he added.

Included among the in-tended facilities are:

The main restaurant offering conti-The main restaurant offering conti-nental gourmet service, with seating for approximately 275 persons; a dual-purpose cafeteria/buffet facility, providing cafeteria service by day, and buffet service in the evening, seat-ing approximately 245; and a coffee shop for snacks and light meals, seat-ing about 110 ing about 110.

ing about 110. These three restaurant facilities will be open throughout the year to visitors and patrons of the Center, and to the general public. In addition, Automatic Canteen will provide meal and beverage service for several pri-vate rooms which will be reserved for government functions, visiting art-ists, patrons and distinguished visit-ors from home and abroad. Automatic Canteen also will operate four re-freshment areas to be located in the Grand Foyer, which will run the en-tire length of the Center, and open onto the River Terrace overlooking the Potomac. Entrance lobbies to the Center's Opera, Concert Hall and Theatre will open off the Grand Foyer. The agreement covering all restau-

Theatre will open off the Grand Foyer. The agreement covering all restau-rant facilities in the center was nego-tiated by Ralph E. Becker, attorney for the Center, with Charles J. Rit-zen, vice president of Automatic Can-teen Company of America. Patrick L. O'Malley, Automatic Canteen President, said the credit card system is intended for industrial and institutional installations. "It will be offered with credit cards that may either be pre-paid or post-paid, de-pending upon management preferpending upon management prefer-ences," he stated.

"We are showing two experimental versions of the system today. As soon as possible, prototypes will be put on location for field testing and evalua-tion, prior to any mass production." O'Malley added.


