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The Mono Price Increase

The healthiest of positive "price wars" has, hopefully, begun in the record business. Now that the CBS and RCA disk divisions have made their dramatic moves to increase the price of mono album product to the level of stereo, the record business is in a position to be a grateful non-innocent bystander in the death of a generally needless system of reproduction.

That demise—and this is the real heart-of-the-matter — has been slow and painful, not for the mono disk itself, but for the perpetrators of the historic blow. (The mono LP, of course, cannot completely go the way of the 78 rpm disk, for many a treasured recording was, unfortunately, created before the advent of stereo, and the reprocessed-into-stereo techniques does not, and should not, make sense for all pre-stereo recordings).

The stereo disk virtually had it made from the day of its inception a decade ago. The phasing out of the mono disk was possible five years ago, so the industry is perhaps a little late in getting the ball rolling. For the past five years, the business has had to live with ever-increasing costs of all stripes, not to mention the money and time wasted in producing and maintaining mono inventory. The public, by and large, has decided, through its phono purchases, that it prefers the added dimensions of stereo sound and is willing to pay what has been until the present the higher price stereo sound commands.

With the mono price hike and, as noted by Clive Davis, vp and general manager of CBS Records, the ability of today's mono machines to reproduce monaurally without appreciably harming them, the consumer who wishes to defer the purchase of a stereo phono can have a ready stereo library available when that day does come.

Both CBS and RCA offered wellfounded reasoning, by the way, why it was a case of going-up for mono instead of down for stereo: economic pressures demand it.

In taking the sensible view that the consumer is willing to pay more for recordings that enhance the pleasure, of home entertainment, CBS and RCA have, in essence, re-affirmed their faith in the future of the record business, a faith that must have the wellbeing of their operations at its core.

Ball Rolling On Mono Price Hikes; See Acceptance Industry Wide

NEW YORK — The record industry last week appeared to be on the brink of an across-the-board increase in the price of the mono album on a par with stereo.

At least seven labels responded favorably to the decision, announced a week earlier, of CBS and, shortly thereafter, RCA to charge a dollar (suggested list) more for their mono product. With the exception of Capitol and London, all increases will take effect before the end of June. A stream of price hike announce-ments started last Wednesday, indi-cating the long Memorial Day week-end had left many labels in the dark about the CBS and RCA moves until executives returned to their desks on Wednesday morning.

Gortikov: Note of Concern

Gortikov: Note of Concern One corner of concern was sounded by Capitol Records through Stan Gortikov, president of Capitol Records Distributing Corp. While he viewed the increase as an "opportunity to compensate for rising costs and diminishing profits," he deplored the "sudden death" fate of the mono al-bum, declaring that "every echelon of distribution today has significant investment in monaural stocks, and an orderly, phased sales cycle will serve the interest of all industry ele-ments." He said the benefit of the

increase should not be "wiped out prematurely by the panicky overnight obsolescense of mono album stocks by massive returns." "The millions of mono albums still on sale today—10 days after a price boost—continue to represent a great means of consumer entertainment, fine values, and long-lived opportunities for creative mer-chandising. We ultimately need a one-class inventory, but please don't nail the coffin while the patient is still very much alive."

Newton: Aid To Single Sales

Newton: Aid To Single Sales Larry Newton, whose ABC label is increasing its mono price June 19, saw the end of the mono LP between 1½ to 2 years. He thinks the move will prove a boon to singles sales, in that teeners may find the new spread between mono LP's and 45's making the 45 price more attractive. He also believes the mono price hike will aid low-end LP product. One distrib, Ed Dinelo of Trinity in Connecticut, felt that mono prices should have been maintained with a stoppage of mono LP production. Reached for comment on the price increase, Jules Malamud, exec secre-tary of NARM, the wholesalers asso-ciation, said that the association had not discussed the matter and no state-ment was planned at this time. 





Billy Strayhorn Is Dead At 51

NEW YORK—Billy Strayhorn, the noted jazz composer, pianist, arranger and lyricist, who worked closely with Duke Ellington for more than a quar-ter of a century, died of cancer on May 31 at the Hospital for Joint Diseases. He was 51. Born on November 29, 1915, in Dayton, Ohio, Strayhorn grew up in Hillboro, North Carolina and in Pitts-burgh, where he studied piano and was a member of his school orchestra. In 1938 he met Ellington in Pitts-burgh and showed the Duke a song he had written called "Something To Live For." Soon after that a close collaboration was formed between the two jazzmen.

Live For." Soon after that a close collaboration was formed between the two jazzmen. Strayhorn composed the Ellington Band's theme, "Take The A Train" and a number of other well-know Ellington tunes including "Chelsea Bridge," "Day Dream" and "Passion Flower." He also worked with Elling-ton on such projects as "Perfume Suite," "A Drum Is A Woman" and "Peer Gynt Suite." "Far East Suite" was the last big Ellington-Strayhorn venture. The piece was written after a tour the Ellington Band made for the State Department in 1963. Strayhorn ac-companied Ellington on the tour, and he and the Duke were inspired to write the suite, as Ellington wrote in 1964, by "The smell, the vastness, the birds, and the exotic beauty" of the countries which they visited. "Far East Suite" was recorded by Elling-ton and his Orchestra and has just been released as an album by RCA Victor.

TALENT ON STAGE

PAUL ANKA

NEW YORK-A decade has gone since Paul Anka established himself as a disk star, with undeniable credit for playing a key role in making a phenomenon called rock 'n roll an artform. At 26, he is still part of the Pepsi generation, as he puts it, yet able to communicate to the "Metrecal for lunch bunch." He is setting forth philosophy-patter-wise this and. more importantly, in song-with a great deal of poise and charm at the Royal Box, where he started his first engagement there last week (30). Even with pockets of young admirers in the audience, the RCA performer is directing most his entertaining attention to adults, or, as he quipped, "those who know me through your children." A bundle of Pepsi genera-

tion energy, Anka is best when he's swinging, not down the lane, but all over the stage, on such items as "It Only Takes a Moment," "When I Take My Sugar to Tea," "What'd I Say," "Jambalaya," and "Everybody Has the Right to be Wrong." One of the Right to be Wrong." One of many humorous references to his Top 40 career involves a medley of four of his big ones. He declares that Irving Berlin would require at least five hours to perform his hits, Richard Rodgers about 4 and Sammy Cahn would need just an hour to say Hello. As for himself, "Have you got a minute?" But, Paul Anka is young yet, and, in the meantime, he's got showmanship that Berlin, Rodgers and Cahn can stand in awe of.

TALENT ON STAGE

JACK JONES

NEW YORK—That a performer is able to communicate with his audi-ence is one thing, but much can be said for an audience that communi-cates with the performer. In the case of Jack Jones, it's a smoothly-paved two-way street, as the Kapp artist's third engagement at the Persian Room indicates. At last Wednesday's (31) star-studded opening (is Loretta Young a good example?), Jones was enthusiastically received no matter which way he turned in song or small enthusiastically received no matter which way he turned in song or small talk. Likeable in looks and bearing, Jones did not inherit the lyrical qual-ity of his dad, movie musical star Al-lan Jones, but gets along very well indeed with sincerity and consistent

good taste. His exceptional swing or sentimental bill-of-fare includes such contemporary goodies as "Call Me Ir-responsible," "I Will Wait for You," "Impossible Dream," "Wives & Lov-ers," "Alfie," "You're Gonna Hear from Me" and a medley from "Sound of Music." Yes, Virginia, they are writing them like they used to! Jones thinks that "If You Go Away" is a too-much tune, and the fact that he has fallen completely under its spell results in a compelling version of the Jacques Brel number, with English Jacques Brel number, with English lyrics by Rod McKuen. Jack Jones likes good songs and when he sings them, they're in good hands.

JAMES BROWN SHOW

NEW YORK—The James Brown Show played to a medium sized crowd at Madison Square Garden on May 28th. with the Joe Cuba Sextet play-ing late in the first part of the con-cert. The performance amounted to too much show and not enough James Brown, although Cuba's act pleased the audience and chanter Bobby Byrd did a marvelous job. Aside from Mr. Dynamite himself, the rest of the show seemed to this reviewer to be an almost endless succession of acts that just didn't make it.

James Brown made scattered ap-pearances throughout the show and, whenever he was on stage, had the whole Garden in the palm of his hand or in his soul bag, if you prefer. At one point the Little Dynamo promised the best show of his career . . . a promise he kept. Had there been more James Brown or even an attempt at editing the proliferation of other editing the proliferation of other acts, the James Brown show could have been great . . . James Brown certainly was.

RUBIN MITCHELL

NEW YORK—Pleasant cocktail and dance music-music not really meant to be listened to but only heard in the background—is the standard fare of many a pop pianist, but happily Rubin Mitchell offers something more. Perhaps his secret is that, although he is not a jazz pianist, his style often borders on jazz, demanding as much popular playing does not, more than casual attention.

casual attention. Technically speaking, Mitchell is virtually above criticism. He has an acute, almost perfect sense of timing, and his agile fingers fly effortlessly

over the keyboard. His only flaw is that he is too fond of ornamenting his playing with quick runs up the treble keys, a stylistic cliche which he would do well to eliminate. The type of music that Mitchell of-fers is too smooth and sophisticated to warrant the adjective "soul," but on the fast pieces his rhythms are contagious, and on the slow numbers he is an effective creator of mood. Mitchell, who records for Capitol, is currently playing a month-long en-gagement at Shepheard's on the East Side.

ERIC ANDERSEN

NEW YORK—On Sunday night, May 28, when most New Yorkers were perched comfortably in front of their TV sets, Eric Andersen, young Van-guard recording artist, was offering pearls to his passionately devoted fol-lowers from his rich bag of folk songs at the Cafe au Go Go on Bleeker Street. Andersen himself has never appeared on network TV, which is a shame, the pristine purity of the non-commercial folk world notwithstand-ing. The sheer, inexhaustible poetry he creates deserves a wide audience: he is one of our true native minstrels. The characteristic and familiar An-dersen was present at the concert.


dersen was present at the concert. There were lyrical, thickly imagistic meldodies such as "The Edge Of You," "Violets Of Dawn," and "Rollin" Home." And, for a delightful surprise, a sly, jocular Andersen made an ap-



pearance. Two numbers, "Hello Sun" and "Mary Sunshine," were filled with lilting, old-timely sounds which called a harmonica soloist into action. And Andersen the interpreter paid tribute to Tim Hardin by singing "Reason To Believe." The audience belonged to the artist without reservation; it applauded and cheered unstintingly. The performer basked in the crowd's love, his shy, diffident manner melting into a cheery, off-hand banter as he worked busily, singing song after song. It has been our pleasure to attend many Eric Andersen concerts. We have never seen him give a bad per-formance, and he seems to get better

formance, and he seems to get better with each succeeding appearance. His horizons are unlimited and there is no telling where his talent may take him.

Two interesting reactions to the McLendon anti-smut campaign have come to the attention of this column. In one development, Jerry Bright, pro-gram manager of WINN-Louisville, has announced that his outlet will not play "Let's Live For Today," by the Grass Roots. The lyric, "Baby, I need to feel you inside of me," was deemed offensive. Why this line, which is sung by an all-male group, should be judged "unfit for air play" is a bit of a mystery to us. Bright makes mention of "an obligation to our audience, especially those in our (sic) formative years, to keep such material off the air." Does this ob-ligation mean that simple poetic state-

(sic) formative years, to keep such material off the air." Does this ob-ligation mean that simple poetic state-ments have no place in pop music? We prefer to think that the zealous program manager merely forgot who was singing what to whom. An attack on poetry, at this stage of the game, is unthinkable. Meanwhile, H. J. (Hal) Davis, vice president and general manager of KHOW-Denver, has issued a sharp rebuke to McLendon himself. He states ironically that "it is amazing to us that any operator could have been playing the records of which Mr. McClendon speaks all of these years and not realize until now that he has been pandering to the youth of his communities . . Mr. McClendon has built an empire with Top Forty music . . . In the past he has never been quite as selective or critical; but then again, this was during his growth era and he possibly wasn't so angelic at the time." Davis "(sees) no reason why an industry such as the record industry should be chastised by the Top Forty operators who know good and well that they have been playing suggestive records for years . . . The unfortunate part is that many fine national companies have purchased advertising on these operations in the past because of extremely high rat-ings, with apparently no thought to advertising on these operations in the past because of extremely high rat-ings, with apparently no thought to the content of the broadcasting that achieved these ratings; so they also have condoned the playing of sugges-tive music on Top Forty stations throughout the country." Needless to say, the controversy surrounding the McClendon cleanup campaign will be raging for some time to come. In an era in which pop music has made what we feel to be a major break-through in quality and sophistication, the implications of the McClendon crusade are significant as an attempt to monitor the free flow of whatever cultural message modern music has to offer. (The cava-quinha is a Brazilian instrument similar to a ukulele.) There should be sales aplenty in store for this LP.



WAYNE FONTANA—MGM E/SE 4459 Here's British singer Wayne Fontana's Ameri-can recording debut. Among the outings are "Pamela, Pamela," "My Eyes Break Out In Tears," "(There's) Always Something There To Remind Me," and "You Made Me What I Am Today." The artist performs with a relaxed, flowing, unforced style, and the disk serves as an excellent introduction of the young singer to American platter spinners.



SOMEWHERE MY LOVE—Frankie Carle—Dot DLP 3802/25802

DLP 3802/25802 Pianist Frankie Carle performs a group of pop tunes, including the title effort, "Somewhere My Love." Other selections are "Strangers In The Night," "Somethin' Stupid," and "Thoroughly Modern Millie." The artist's eloquent pianistics seem especially enhanced by the piano and rhythm section, giving the album a quality of sparkling spontaneity. The package could be a mover. mover.

The artist dis-plays a rich and robust voice that rings with emotion, and the album, like the title song, should be a big winner. be a big winner.



THE TIME AND THE PLACE—Art Farmer Quintet—Columbia CL 2649/CS 9449 Art Farmer plays trumpet and fluegelhorn on a fine set of jazz outings. He is given able sup-port by Jimmy Heath, tenor sax; Coleman Wal-ton, piano; Walter Booker, bass; and Mickey Roker, drums. The tunes include the title track, "The Time And The Place," "The Shadow Of Your Smile," and "Nino's Scene." Farmer's trum-peting evinces a highly sophisticated sense of melody and harmony combined with an impec-cable time and rhythm. The album is a superb distillation of a brillant jazz talent.



LIVE AND SWINGING—Gerald Wilson—Pacific Jazz PJ 10118/ST 20118 Composer-arranger Gerald Wilson leads his orchestra through a selection of jazz tunes re-corded at Marty's in Los Angeles. Among the numbers are "Paper Man," "I've Got It Bad (And That Ain't Good)," "Blues For A Scorpio," and "Viva Tirado." Wilson has filled his orchestra with just the right men to present the Gerald Wilson "sound," and the LP should be a real mover.

JIMMY SMITH & WES MONTGOMERY

BIG SWING FACE—Buddy Rich—Pacific Jazz PJ10117/ST 20117 The new Buddy Rich Big Band sets down a solid set of jazz sessions. Rich gives driving and tastefully refreshing renditions to some of today's best pop material, including "Norwegian Wood" and "The Beat Goes On." Other excellent offer-ings are the title tune, "Big Swing Face," "Wack Wack," and "Bugle Call Rag." The package should find its quality rewarded in the market-place.

THE DYNAMIC DUO-Jimmy Smith & Wes Montgomery-Verve V/V 6-8678 Jimmy Smith and Wes Montgomery, a dynamic duo indeed, cook up a tasty brew of jazz sessions. Smith, on organ, and Montgomery, on guitar, offer five groovy tracks: "Down By The River-side," "Night Train," "James And Wes," "13 (Death March)," and "Baby, It's Cold Outside." The LP spotlights two jazz artists of major stat-ure, and the disk should see heavy sales action.





ED AMES

HOLLYWOOD—Pass the peacepipe, bury the hatchet, send up a mountain of smoke signals. And bet all your beads that the Westside Room at the beads that the Westside Room at the Century Plaza won't be hearing a dis-couraging word (or note) for the next two weeks. For Mingo (alias Ed Ames), at home on any range, is adding another feather to his head-gear, another niche in his tomahawk. For this, his initial solo appearance in L.A. is an event of major propor-tions tions

Show, which ran about an hour and Show, which ran about an hour and forty minutes, covered 17 titles, a good deal of conversation, a gold record presentation (by RCA Victor's gm Norman Racusin for the "My Cup Runneth Over" LP), introduc-tions of celebrities and family and even a few bird calls. But the wonder is that most of the audience, our-selves included, felt just a little cheated that it didn't run longer. A standing ovation is unusual for this standing ovation is unusual for this relatively intimate room. But little that Ames does is ordinary.

Repertoire includes several Broadway tunes ("If She Walked Into My Life," "Try To Remember," "Cab-aret," "They Call The Wind Maria" "Caband "The Impossible Dream"), some former top 40 titles ("Yesterday," "Downtown," "Somethin' Stupid" and "What The World Needs Now Is Love"), a couple of film songs ("The Trolley Song" and "Watch What Happens"), a fragile Yiddish number ("Beltz"), a Cajun tune ("Bonsoire Dame") a work song ("John Henry")

and a Bossa Nova medley (including "Girl From Ipanema"). Add those bird calls (the mauve triple breasted sap sucker, for example), his current single "Time, Time," a few ingratiat-ingly recalled anecdotes, several song styles (Ames' dramatic version of "Without A Song" or his "crooning" soft voiced treatment of "Bonsoire Dame," with phrasing so nostalgically remi-niscent of Buddy Clark) to an elo-quent series of gestures which frame his vignettes. Once one-fourth of the nation's #1 quartet, Ames has known at least a quartet of careers in the past six years—on and off Broadway, TV, the group and now as a success-ful soloist on records. It's obvious that his varied experiences have com-bined to help make him one of the more dynamizing variable performers around. Minus Vic, Gene, Joe (and Daniel Boone) but thanks to an elu-sive commodity called showmanship, sive commodity called showmanship, his versatility cup runneth over.

Working with a handmike through most of the show (sometimes overamplified) he makes the most of a quiet moment (sans mike) with "Try To Remember," another example of theatrical experience aiding the act. Ames is one of very few artists who could do a whole show without amplification and still communicate to every corner of any room. Mingo missed the target with his mis-directed tomahawk on the Johnny Carson show sometime back. Ed Ames' performance is nothing less than bullseve at the Westside Room.

Center. The only other previously an-nounced double concert will be in Madison, Wisconsin where Sinatra will give a matinee and evening per-formance July 8 at the Dade County Fair Grounds. Howard Baker and Al-bert Gore, who were among the hun-dreds of people to wire Chet on the occasion of the day being declared "Chet Atkins Day" throughout the state by Gov. Buford Ellington.

Further remarks were lent by Racusin, who then presented the guitarist with a plaque honoring him for his completion of 20 years with the company, and inscribed with a list of over 50 top name acts with whom Atkins had worked closely in that period of time. Atkins also lent to the biographical sketch in his acknowl-edgement speech by skimming the names of those people who were most instrumental in helping form his career.

barrage of publicity that included ads, feature newspaper stories, radio spots, and trade press items heralding the tribute for several weeks prior to its actual staging. 

On the Deram label, scor-ing a continuous row of successes, two more British hot records were released here, "Birds And Bees" by the Warm Sounds and "Just One More Chance" by the Outer Limit. Cat Stevens, Deram-artist, and the Equals from President flew over to Amsterdam in the week-end of May 27th, for TV recordings in popular pro-gram "Fan Club." Manfred Mann's "Ha Ha Said The Clown" (Fontana) maintains its Num-ber 1 hit parade position in Holland. Mann's record company here, Phonogram, is already considering the probability of a Golden Record figure. New Dutch top group the Ro-d-ys is in third place with "Take Her Home" (Philips) to be released in America.

Total production of records in February amounting to 6,681,000 was 6% lower than in the same period of 1966. Output of 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ rd r.p.m. disks and 45 r.p.m. fell by 2% and $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ of 1966. Out respectively.

Sacra, Deutsche Vogue; Italy: SAAr Group issues Jolly, Music, Stella, etc.; Switzerland: Elite; Spain: Belter, Hispavox and Vergara. The benefits of increased distribu-tion offered by the arrangement, the company said, will help retailers who have drawn imports exclusively from the EMI catalog and expand the range of recordings in the popular, folk and classical fields with many star artists.

Ricci & Matalon Visiting U.S., Japan

MILAN—Gramitto Ricci, managing director of Curci, top Italian music publishing group, and Cemed Carosel-lo, Curci's associated record firm, has left on a business tour with David Matalon, general manager of Cemed Carosello Records. Then they will leave for the West Coast, and a short stay in Los Angeles is also scheduled.

Ricci and Matalon will then fly to Tokyo. They will stay in the Japanese capital from June 21 until June 26. They are expected back in Europe on June 28, in London, where they will be present at the first showing of Walt Disney's latest production, "The Happiest Millionaire." IFPI Meet Realizes Affiliation **Of RIAA With The Federation**

PARIS—The Record Industry Asso-ciation (RIAA) has become affiliated through unanimous agreement, with the International Federation of Pho-nographic Industries (IFPI). The IFPI held its tri-annual meeting May 24, in addition to its annual council meeting of the governing body.

The IFPI move concerning the RIAA reflected the major policy decision of the American label association, whose membership represents 90% of American disk sales, to request Congress to grant record producers and artists performing rights. Dave Kapp, president of RIAA, and Henry Brief, executive secretary, attended the meeting. Sidney Diamond, a copyright law expert, gave a report on the RIAA campaign.

Formont Elected President

The IFPI council is made up of representatives of 25 national groups. At the ordinary general meeting, M. Henri Formont of Societe Francais du Son was elected president of the Federation for the next three years. The retiring president is James Gray of the Decca Record Co.

During the meet, the formation of Federation national groups in Iceland, Malaya, Hong Kong, Portugal and New Zealand and the affiliation of the Australian record industry were announced. The U.S.'s affiliation with the Federation now brings the total number of countries represented by ICDA to 40 including all the ma by IGPA to 40, including all the major record manufacturing countries of the world except the Communist bloc. The main aims of the Federation are to arrange reasonable working agreements with societies representing authors and composers and to establish in national and international laws protection of the record against unauthorized copy and to enable producers to control the broadcasting and public performance of records. The legal situation has developed rapidly in the last three years with the coming into force of the Rome Convention of 1961, which recognizes these rights and which has also been ratified by 10 countries, and by the active consideration of drafts to recognize these rights in Japan, Australia and a number of other territories.

Heading the Paris meet were Roger Lindberg of Finland, chairman of the council, and Stephen Stewart, director general of the Federation.

Ormandy, Bernstein, Szell Honored By Vienna Phil.

NEW YORK-Conductors Eugene Or-NEW YORK—Conductors Eugene Or-mandy, Leonard Bernstein and George Szell, all of whom record for Colum-bia Masterworks have been awarded the Golden Schalk Medal by the Vien-na Philharmonic. The honor was be-stowed upon them, in absentia, for their guest appearances with the Vienna Philharmonic.

All three conductors enjoy popular-ity in Vienna, and their guest appear-ances with the Vienna Philharmonic

The Vienna Philharmonic's record-ing of "Falstaff," which was conducted by Leonard Bernstein, was released by Columbia Masterworks last fall. Among the artists featured on the album are Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, Ilva Ligabue, Regina Resnik, Graziel-la Sciutti, Juan Oncina and Rolando Panerai, with the Chorus of the Vienna State Opera.

The Federal Attorney-General (Mr. Bowen) has announced that the Fed-eral Government is to establish a "Copyright Tribunal" to arbitrate on copy-right disputes under a Bill introduced in the House of Representatives recently. The long-awaited Bill of changes to the Copyright Act is expected to go before Parliament in the August session. The Bill is expected to make many amendments to copyright relating to all forms of recorded works, whether on tape, disc, film, etc. The Bill is being held-over until the August sitting to enable all interested parties to examine its provisions.

It is widely known that the Copyright owners are seeking an increase in Mechanical fees from the present 5% of the retail price (which includes Sales Tax, and of course means that under the present act Mechanical copyright fees have been paid on Sales Tax which goes to Government Revenue) to at least $6\frac{1}{4}$ %, and it is felt that this may be granted. Publishing interests are also anxious to abolish the "Compulsory Licersing Clause," but we under-stand there is little hme of this being done. Record companies, music pub-lishers, radio and television interests are all sure to have strong industry and legal representation at the preliminary hearings of such amendments as the Bill will serve to introduce into our Copyright Act. Bill Donaldson, manager of Associated Music Pty., Ltd., (an off-shoot of RCA of Australia) advises that his company has completed a deal for the Australian representation of the catalog of Trousdale Music Publishers. The four day session included a scenic drive to the Chateaux oe la Loire and a "Diner de Gala." Over one hundred par-ticipators were present. Among the different international problems which were taken up by the council are: (1) The connections between Phonographic industry and Radio Stations. The participators made a study of the lawsuits in which Scandinavian countries are engaged against radio stations. In France more than money, Phonographic producers want to obtain a right to control the records used in the radio programs. (2) Tax regulation. This problem is particularly strong in France where TVA taxes are 25% of the prize. (3) New problems presented by tape cartridges. The council studied the question as to whether they are completely similar to records concerning the connection with publishers associations (4) Connections with performing artists. A report will be done, and we hope we will be able to present here next week the most important resolutions reached.

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Editorial

The Sale Goes On

The dwindling number of music and game locations available today (especially in our large cities) has caused for keener competition among operators. The fact that most operators from time to time will "pitch" a competitor's location for the right to place his own machines in the place is central to this business . . . and certainly a newly opened location will draw out the prospective operators like bees to the honey. But how much thought is given the location after the sale has scored?

Aside from the machines themselves, the operator's "sales tools" are: 1. the loan; 2. the bonus; 3. the contract and 4. the promise of conscientious service. It's about that last "tool" we'd like to discuss . . . the service the operator guarantees, which, like the auto dealer's attention to a new car warranty, will either keep a location happy or lose one forever.

When an operator delivers his pitch, it's usually filled with enthusiasm and promises of the extended service he will provide if the location owner takes him on as operator. However, the operator shouldn't let that enthusiasm lead him into making wild claims which, practically speaking, can't logically be backed up. Just as bad, the operator should never play down his "product" just to be on the safe side. There must be a "happy medium" somewhere between offering too much or too little.

One certain way to find that logical medium is to size up the location owner (will he be demanding or not), check out the type of location (do teenagers frequent the spot and if so are they the type who go around kicking coin equipment for the fun of it), check out the mechanical abilities of the equipment you are offering and generally draw upon your operating experience for the pitfalls this particular location might hazard.

When you are able to supply an honest evaluation of how much service can be offered for the profit involved, state it clearly . . . a frank approach always carries a ring of authority and the location owner will know he's getting a measured account of the facts instead of a fish story.

The coin machine business is no more of a "repeat business'' than the auto industry. Many operators treat their locations much the same as a car salesman treats a customer who's already paid for the car.... "I've got the cash (or the contract) so forget it." But location owners, like car buyers, have a way of spreading the word among themselves . . . "this guy's honest" or "this guy stinks!" And when it comes time to renegotiate another contract, how do you think the verdict will be judged?

An honest approach is a successful sale. It may not carry the glitter of "blue sky" but it can't get you into hot water later on when the juke in Charley's Bar goes dead on Friday night and you haven't the time to fix it.

Extension Seen In Texas Tavern Curfew

AUSTIN, TEX.—Unless Gov. John Connally vetoes Houston Rep. Jack Ogg's liquor curfew extension bill, the tavern hour will be extended to 2 A.M. in the states five largest counties next fall

fall. Both houses approved the bill, which, when an actual law, automatic-ally makes the curfew 2 A.M. every night of the week in the five largest counties and allows local officials to extend the curfew to 2 A.M. in smaller counties where the law will not apply. The bill would be effective automatic-ally in Houston, Dallas, Ft. Worth, San Antonio and El Paso. The House set the cutoff at 140,000 population which would have made the later hour automatic in 14 coun-ties, but a conference committee cut

ties, but a conference committee cut it to the five largest.

In addition to extending the curfew to 2 A.M., the bill would permit tav-ern owners to open at noon on Sun-days. They cannot open before 1 P.M. on Sundays under the present law.

When the law becomes effective in late August Texas coinmen will be graced with an additional 15 business hours, during which time jukeboxes should see plenty of action.

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NAMA Public Relations Staff Issues "White Paper" for Vendors

Here's a thought-provoking review made available by Thomas B. Hunger-ford, executive director of NAMA, on the vending industry's more serious public relations problems. The "White Paper" was developed by the NAMA staff and discussed at a recent meeting of the NAMA pub-lic Relations Committee. It was de-cided to make it available to all mem-bers as "food for thought." You might want to review this in the light of your own company policies. Public Relations today means many things to different people. Every NAMA member probably has his own definition of what the term means— and what it means to his business. There is, however, another dimension to "methic relations" it is the headed

and what it means to his business. There is, however, another dimension to "public relations." It is the broader viewpoint in which the public sees the entire vending business. This is also the viewpoint of the professional pub-lic relations practitioner. His view is usually more objective, more realistic, and more in tune with public senti-ment and public policy than the lay-man's. The professional is more likely to

man's. The professional is more likely to base his analysis on the "abstract," in order to arrive at practical propo-sals and specific programs. This "WHITE PAPER" attempts to define "vending industry public relations" primarily in these broad terms, in order to arrive at a more realistic understanding of desirable—and prof-itable—steps for improved public re-lations. lations.

This review is also specifically con-cerned with the public relations func-tion of NAMA as the industry's trade association—a function which differs materially from that of individual member firms.

Public Relations Problems

The two most important fundamen-tal public relations problems of the Vending industry today seem to be the quality of vending machine serv-ice and the lack of public knowledge about the nature of vending company service. If one were given the task of pinpointing the two most funda-mental current problems of public re-lations in the industry, and only two, these would remain after all other possible candidates had been consid-ered. ered.

Fundamentally, these two problems are more basic and more crucial than any and all other "symptoms" often cited (such as the insinuations about "hoodlums," commissionitis, bad pub-licity, "legislative" harassment, etc.).

Some Reasons For Poor Service

As seen by the paying customer, the industry performance is indeed substandard. For a proper view, one must consider all the 4 million ma-chines now on location, not just one company's or another's. The customer, the public, doesn't distinguish (and shouldn't be expected to distinguish). Seen in this perspective, far too many machines vend nonquality mer-chandise, and merchadise which is not fresh or attractive in appearance. Far too many machines malfunction, are out of order, fail to refund coins and are too difficult to operate. These are facts, as the public perceives them.

and are too difficult to operate. These are facts, as the public perceives them. What are some of the reasons? First, the absence of established com-pany standards for quality perform-ance seems to be of great importance. The fragmentation of the industry into thousands of small ownerships or local branches and poor personnel recruiting, training and supervision practices allow for a looser attitude. Vending, in most instances, is really not a necessity in the eyes of the lo-cation (management has other alter-natives, and often views the machines as a necessary evil). Accounting and profit management standards of most operators are sub-standard. The designing of vending

equipment for the convenience of the operator should be secondary to the needs of the customre, but isn't.

What of Improvements Since 1960?

Standing over in the "plus" column are the more "sophisticated" types of locations vending companies are now serving. This allows stiffened compe-tition for prime locations and the re-sult has been better performance by the operators. The formation of larger firms (and expansion of smaller ones) has resulted in better defined operat-ing standards and new innovations in standards and new innovations in equipment decor and reliability. The availability of better designed prod-ucts for vending is also an improve-ment. ment.

Public Relation Needs

By raising the quality of vending service offered, the public is more apt to make vending purchases. Mean-while, radical improvement of equip-ment and products (packaging, canned hot food, and redesign of equipment from the customer's view) will give the industry a new look. Improved relations with governmental bodies at all levels will allow for a greater sense of bargaining power when un-desirable disputes arise. There must also be a more meaningful portrayal of the economic contribution made by the vending industry.

How Can These Needs Be Fulfilled?

The basic requirement is that individual companies recognize these needs in realistic fashion. That they take action as a result of this recog-nition. No one can do this for them. There is nothing which an association like NAMA can accomplish on its own as an "agent" of the industry.

Public Relations Role of NAMA

NAMA does have a role to play. It must do three things: One, identify effectively for the industry the most urgent public relations needs. Sec-ondly, provide programs and tools which can be used by individual com-panies in the industry. Thirdly, but not the least important, NAMA must undertake on its own those (limited) programs which do not require in-dividual company participation.

What Is NAMA's Limitations?

Heading up the list of NAMA's limitations is their influence on the entire industry's operating methods. The time required to effect changes in the industry's existing attitudes and the lack of expertise in public relations on the part of most vending company managements also limit NAMA's participation. The limited size of the public relations staff and available funds are very important factors. factors

Conclusion

The most common fault in evalu-ating public relations problems is the tendency to look for "instant" medi-cines. There are no such wonder

cines. There are no such wonder drugs. Public attitudes change slowly, often imperceptibly. There is no such thing as "the general public." There are only "individuals" and "groups of individuals." Their "individual" expe-rience of a service (such as vending) forms their attitudes more than any volume of "information." This is why vending industry "pub-lic relations programs "must be "eight parts performance (by the en-tire industry) to two parts informa-tion." NAMA public relations efforts

tion." NAMA public relations efforts therefore must be designed to change industry performance even more than public understanding.

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Sunny Side Of Sales

While it's been a year in which Spring evidently decided to sit this one out, Summer, with its temperature and temperament, is apparently going to be very much with us. The record business' own commitment to the coming months is to attempt to maintain a good sales record that it has inherited over the past five years or so, and to look ahead to the Fall-Winter selling period. Latter-wise, this will involve a stream of sales meetings, requiring either a massive one-shot confab at some central or exotic locale or, as is becoming increasingly popular, a series of regional meetings in key cities.

Summer has emerged, in fact, into one of the most active periods for the music business. On one hand, it must gear-up simultaneously for current catalog sales and, in the same breath, tout its most ambitious album release of the year, most product of which will actually be available for consumer consumption long before the summer has gone. All this much-ado-about-a-lot leads us to understand that the record business has more or less ended a long phase in which it could be termed a seasonal business. Why the nature of its product ever allowed such a situation to occur is not an easy question to answer. Perhaps some sort of a clue can be uncovered in the fact that the

appreciation of talent has evolved into an out-of-the-home factor. By this we mean that the popularity of Summer concert engagements and the tremendous sales of transistor radios and phonos are exposing record talent to disk fans who don't necessarily content themselves to hear their favorite artists in the comfort of wall-to-wall air-conditioning.

Talent, whether on disks or in any other form of expression, should know no season. That the record business is happily confronted with the idea that the season of great outdoor activity and the product it offers not only mix, but seem to stimulate the enjoyment of each other can be deemed one of the great developments in the pattern of record industry growth in recent years.

This, of course, is truly a psychological boon to Summer sales conventions. Instead of walking into these meetings with the vague prospects of the imminent end to sales doldrums, there should be greater confidence generated from the feeling that the present has a lot to offer, too. One has to do a great selling job to overcome a get-us-out-of-this-hole situation. It's all so much easier when the future can be spelled out in a manner that suggests we-can-even-do-better.

Strike Hits RCA Pressing Plants

NEW YORK—A strike by 32,000 members of the International Brother-hood of Electrical Workers has shut down the pressing facilities of nine RCA plants in six cities. At presstime, the week-old strike was still in effect, with Federal medi-ators attempting to resume negotia-tions to bring the struck plants back into operation. The strike, directed not specifically at RCA's record division, but its par-ent company, the Radio Corporation

of America, has put the production of RCA product and that of its custom pressing clients, to a halt. The work-ers had previously rejected a 3-year contract calling for a 4% raise the first year and 3% for each of the fol-lowing two years

lowing two years. The struck plants include those in Indianapolis, Marriane and Blooming-ton in Indiana; Lancaster and Mead-owland Park in Pa., Findlay in Ohio, Hollywood, Calif., Palm Beach Gar-dens in Fla. and Rockaway, N.J.

In the meantime, Bill Mul-hern, director of east coast operations will exercise his responsibilities from offices setup temporarily in the head-quarters of Creed Taylor, Inc., with whom A&M has just signed a long term production deal. Mulhern long-time sales and promo-tion man for A&M in the east, will head a three executive setup, com-prising also John Rosica in charge of over all east coast promotion (he will have special duties nationally with Creed Taylor Products.) and Allan Ryder, dealing with promotion in

Ryder, dealing with promotion in Pittsburgh, Buffalo, Cincinnati, Cleveland and Detroit-headquarters in Cleveland. Ties Ended Between Verve & Folkways

Verve & Folkways NEW YORK--A distribution deal, in effect for the past two years, has been terminated between the Verve label and Folkways Records, Cash Box has learned. The label born of the arrangement, Verve/Folkways, has been dropped and replaced by a new tag, Verve/Forecast. Original deal ran out last May, at which time Verve did not pick up a 1 year op-tion to continue. While Verve has a 9-month sell-off period, it will no longer press Verve/ Folkways masters, and will event-ually return all masters originally released on Folkways. Verve will keep a number of artists it has signed to Verve/Folkways pacts over the past two years, including the Blues Project, Tim Hardin, Laura Nyro, Janis Ian and Richie Havens. They now appear on Verve/Forecast. Jerry Schoenbaum, who runs Verve/ Forecast, told Cash Box that the label will continue to produce a commercial "uban"-type folk sound. Tolkways, founded by Moe Asch, is still an active label, with its product being marketed by Scholastic Maga-zine.

Canadian Collection Agency Seeks U.S. Clients

NEW YORK—A new agency for the collection of mechanical copyright royalties has been established in Can-

collection of mechanical copyright royalties has been established in Can-ada. Smyth Copyright Services, Ltd., the new Canadian agency, bowed to the trade at a luncheon here last week (8) attended by most of the leading figures in the New York music pub-lishing world. At the luncheon, held in New York's Plaza Hotel, J. B. Smyth, president of the new agency, described the prob-lems peculiar to the Canadian market and the reasons for establishment of a Canadian agency. Smyth stated that mechanical roy-alties from Canada in 1966 should have been \$3,200,000, but were actu-ally \$2,650,000, due to many unli-censed records, most of them unau-thorized translations of English works into French. He pointed out that many so-called translations were act-ually entirely new titles and lyrics to pop tunes, and could not be recognized except by actual monitoring of the French pop charts. Further, he stres-sed the almost total absence of licens-ing of synchronizations and transcrip-tions in Canada. These represent an additional source of revenue to music

publishers of about \$150,000 per year and this amount should increase rap-idly. He described the operation of the small record producer in French Can-ada, who often translated a pop hit in the English or American markets before it was translated in France and, of course, paid no royalties on the unauthorized translation. As a re-sult, there were often several transla-tions of a big hit in Canada, only one of which was authorized and licensed by the music publisher.

by the music publisher. Because of this, the reserves of back royalties (for the legal six year period) were very substantial and the period) were very substantial and the new agency proposes to collect these royalties for music publishers as well as to enforce licensing of all future recordings on both the English and French markets in Canada. The new agency also proposes to license syn-chronizations, transcriptions, back-ground music, and tape cartridges. The meeting was attended by many of the leading figures in the New York

Emmy Awards: Phanthom Composer Category

Prior to last week's award cere-monies, the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, sponsors of the Emmys, declared four nomi-nees for Individual Achievement in Music, (specifically) Composition, as did the official program of the Acad-emy. The winning composer was not named at the ceremonies, nationally televised, nor did any subsequent statement by the Acadmy make note of the fact. The composers included Earle Hagen for his "I Spy" music, Lal Schifrin for "Mission Impos-sible," "Pete Rugolo for "Run for Your Life" and Aaron Copeland for thematic music for CBS Play-house. The latter three, all of whom attended the Award dinner, are BMI cleffers, and Copeland, considered one of the giants of 20th Century serious music, is an ASCAP writer. Bob Sour Letter

The omission of the composer award has been scored in a letter by Bob Sour, president of BMI, to Royal E. Blakeman, president of the Academy. Declaring that music for

television had evolved from a "craft" to "an art," Sour said the "failure of the Academy to mention this cate-gory or award winner either during the dinner, on television, or in sub-sequent publicity material, strikes us at BMI as very shabby treatment in-deed of a body of people who add im-measurably to television. This ne-glect, whether inadvertent or calcu-lated, strikes us as unworthy of the Academy and its stated aims. Cer-tainly some explanation is due, not only to the four men whose accom-plishments were ignored but to the many talented people whose crea-

plishments were ignored but to the many talented people whose crea-tivity is so much a part of the in-dustry and art you claim to serve." According to a spokesman of BMI, the clearing house was unable to re-ceive any comment on the matter from the TV academy. ASCAP had no plans at presstime to make a statement regarding the incident.

More than 1500 attended the fete. Key West Coast press and radio representatives were on hand, including a large contingent of magazine and newspaper writers and radio personalities whom Colum-bia flew in from Los Angeles for the event.

The five singles will each be re-leased in specially designed color sleeves, which are part of a com-plete art concept for the campaign by the Columbia art department. The album will retail at the regular prices of \$4.79 and \$4.79 for mono and stereo, respectively. The poster will also be available in bulk quantity to dealers for in-store display use. 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

Odyssey Unveils Low-Priced Beethoven Symphonies Set

Beethoven Symphonies Set NEW YORK—Odyssey Records has just released a low-priced, six-LP set containing the nine symphonies of Beethoven. The package, conducted by Bruno Walter, carries the sug-gested retail price of \$14.99. The performances included in the six albums were recorded between 1942 and 1953 and are now being issued as a complete set for first time. All of the works, with the ex-ception of one, are performed by the New York Philharmonic. The "Pas-toral" Symphony (No. 6) is played by the Philadelphia Orchestra. Origin-ally, these recordings were released as single LP's on the Columbia Mas-terworks label. They are not to be confused with those in Bruno Wal-ter's newer stereo package of Beetho-ven Symphonies. This set, also re-corded by Columbia Masterworks, was released in 1959. The Odyssey set is being offered in monaural only. Full scale national advertising will launch the Odyssey package in the July issues of the Schwann Catalog and Hi Fi/Stereo Review. In addition, the label has prepared comprehensive support material in the form of local ad mats and a 3-wing display piece for use in stores.


Mills Publishing New Arr. Of 'Kaiser Bill'

BMI Composers' Awards

NEW YORK-A total of \$10,900 will be shared by twenty young composers in the 15th annual Student Composers Awards (SCA) competition. The competition is sponsored each



year by Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI). The award recipients range from 13 to 25 years of age. Four of them are Canadian, sharing in special awards, funds for which were pro-vided by BMI's Canadian subsidiary, BMI Canada Ltd. The winners also include a young composer from Ar-gentina. This year's awards bring to 119 the number of talented young people in the Western Hemisphere who have been presented with SCA prizes to be applied toward their musical education. Established in 1951 by Broadcast Music, Inc., in cooperation with music educators and composers, the SCA project annually gives cash prizes to encourage the creation of concert music by student composers (under the age of 26) of the Western Hemis-phere and to aid them in financing their musical education. All awards are made on the basis of creative talent evidenced by original manu-scripts which are submitted and judged under pseudonyme. BMI annually makes the sum of \$7,500 available to the national judg-ing panel, in addition to all monies not previously distributed. Prizes ranging from \$250 to \$2,000 are awarded at the discretion of the judges, who have the right to deter-mine the amount and number of all awards. Next year, the panel will have a total of \$9,550 available for distribution. This includes \$2,050 which the judges chose not to present previously. The permanent chairman of the judging panel for Student Composers

Dartman, department of music, Dartmouth College, and Boyd Neel, dean of the Royal Conservatory of Music at the University of Toronto.


"Gates Of Paradise," directed by Andrej Wajda, will be premiered at the Venice Film Festival in September.

Lonnie's smooth clean style is sparked by an enthusiasm that belies his years and his guitar work seems as precise as ever it was on the many, many recordings most of us have thrilled to at one time or another. He works hard too, like playing one-man, hour-long sets two or three times a night. Currently headlining at Gerde's Folk City on West 4th St., Lonnie opens and closes his show with a timeless treatment of the standard, "When Your Smiling." Throughout

ballads and up-beat Blues efforts, perhaps the best of which are: "Snow's Still Falling" and "Mama, Bring It On Home." Following close on a funky "C.C. Mama (Rider)," he offered a two-part version of W. C. Handy's "St. Louis Blues." 
Hullabaloo Gets New Look

FOCUS ON JAZZ MORT FEGA

The world has become incalculably poorer with the passing of one of the giants, Billy Strayhorn. Seldom, if ever, has anyone who has made such enormous contributions to the world of popular music functioned in such an atmosphere of near anonymity. A very gently person, Billy seemed to give the impression that this com-parative obscurity was of his own choosing, as though he enjoyed bask-ing in the reflected glory of the Duke Ellington Orchestra and the maestro himself. So often he could be seen in the shadows, especially when the band was performing one of his composi-tions, quietly appreciating what they were doing with his creation. Yet, when the situation demanded it, he was not reluctant to come right out front and conduct or play. If ever the description "modest and unassum-ing" were appropriate, it was to Billy Strayhorn. The world has become incalculably ing" were appropriate, it was Billy Strayhorn.

Complete Musician

Complete Musician Rarely has there been such a wed-ding of talents and spirits as was evidenced by the combined efforts of Duke Ellington and Billy Strayhorn. It has been said that upon the com-pletion of a collaboration by the two, neither could recall where one's work stopped and the other's began. Such empathy is not only rare, it is unique! Of particular significance is the combined efforts of the two on extended works, the latest of which, "Far East Suite," is about to be re-leased on RCA Victor. Some of the other Ellington-Strayhorn projects over the years are "Perfume Suite," "Such Sweet Thunder," "A Drum Is A Woman," "The Nutcracker Suite," and "Peer Gynt Suite."

Swee' Pea, as Billy was known to his friends, was a complete musician, composer, arranger, conductor, lyric-ist, and pianist. The Ellington book is

you see The Trio, that the joy of the audience is a vital component in the scheme of things.

scheme of things. Both sets had a nice balance to them, with the emphasis on standards, but not without the good jazz origi-nals that are honed to sharpness by the Peterson Trio. As an avid Peter-son fan, it's apparent to me that once again Oscar has developed that spe-cial brand of togetherness in his trio, complete with dynamics, lyricism, and that tidal wave of sound that only an Oscar Peterson Trio can produce. This particular night at Shepheard's there were two very accomplished jazz pianists in the audience and their rapt attention and the expressions on their faces were testimony to the esteem attention and the expressions on their faces were testimony to the esteem that Peterson enjoys from his fellow musicians. I remarked to my com-panion that one of the piano players in attendance had an almost embar-rassed expression on his face as big Oscar romped and stomped his way through a torrid "Dahoud," a Clifford Brown original. Elsewhere in the set Peterson displayed his devotion to Fats Waller and Art Tatum. Shepheard's has a wonderful policy

Fats Waller and Art Tatum. Shepheard's has a wonderful policy of spelling each live set with a set of dancing, a la discotheque. The music provided is sufficiently varied to satis-fy the tastes of all the patrons, and most important it gives the audience an opportunity to loose their energies, the better that they might give their complete attention to the live per-formers when they re-appear for the next set. Equally important is the manner in which the performers are presented. The piano and drums are moved out to the center of the dance floor and thus gives a more intimate feeling to this good size room. The piano is in tune, the sound system is first rate, and from Oscar's own ob-servation, "It's a pleasure to play in this room."

By my recollection, Peterson's Shep heard appearance was his first club appearance in New York City in about two years. Judging from a standing room audience on a rainy Wednesday night, the long absence hasn't di-minished his tremendous appeal.

When he returned to the vehicle, he found a window broken and the loss of a clarinet, an alto sax, three more flutes and other acces-sories. Total loss to Shank amounted to \$6,000.

Merlin Gets The Drifter'




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POP PICKS



NOW IS THE TIME FOR HEARTS AND FLOWERS—Capitol T/ST 2762 In tune with the times has come a group called Hearts and Flowers. Their folk-oriented music ties in with the current flower motif in pop re-cordings. Songs on the album include "Now Is The Time," Try For The Sun," "Rock And Roll Gyp-sies," and "I'm A Lonesome Fugitive." The music is lyrical and inventive, and the set should sell well, particularly among the younger listeners.

REMARKABLE RUBIN--Rubin Mitchell--Capi-tol T/ST 2735 Rubin Mitchell displays his piano artistry in a bag of pop goodies. Included on the LP are "Dar-danella," "Morning Of The Carnival," "Alright, Okay, You Win," and "The Impossible Dream." The artist displays pianistic pyrotechnics with a jazz-oriented flavor. The brilliant technique of the pianist, plus the inspiring interpretation of the music should insure the disk's success.

THE FAMILY WAY—Original Soundtrack—Lon-don M 76007/MS 82007 Paul McCartney has composed the music for the film "The Family Way," which stars Hayley and John Mills. The score forms an apt back-ground for the story of the marital difficulties of a young working class couple. The music captures the rough-and-tumble of family life at the groom's parents' house. The LP is likely to be a biggie with both movie music and McCartney fans.

I AM MARJORIE McCOY—Viva V 6007/V 36007 Marjorie McCoy delivers a pop message con-sisting of eleven melodies. Included on the disk are "Baubles, Bangles And Beads," "I Concen-trate On You," "River, Stay Away From My Door," and "I Fall In Love Too Easily." The artist sings with warmth and grace, and she interprets the lyrics with fidelity. The package should move well in good music circles and en-hance the lark's reputation.

THE WAY I FEEL—Gordon Lightfoot—United Artists UAL 3587/UAS 6587 Gordon Lightfoot sings a set of contemporary folk songs. The tunes include the title track, "The Way I Feel," "A Minor Ballad," "Song For A Winter's Night," and "Canadian Railroad Tri-logy." The artist sings with deep feeling and drains the last shade of meaning from his ma-terial. The album is Gordon Lightfoot at his best, and that is very good indeed.



MOBY GRAPE—Columbia CL 2698/CS 9498 Moby Grape, the West Coast rock group, per-forms a selection of rock ditties. Among the tracks are "Hey Grandma," "Fall On You," "Ain't No Use," and "Sitting By The Window." The record comes with a full-color, full-size poster of the group. Moby Grape sings with intensity and drive, and the LP should do much to bring the quintet to the attention of a large and ap-preciative audience.

The music is given the superb treatment of fine instrumental arranging, and the offering should see lots of sales action.

TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS—Larry Page & his Orchestra—Calla C(S) 1102 Larry Page and his Orchestra "take care of business" on this LP of pop tunes. Roy Willox is the featured soloist throughout the album, and lush strings and voices are heard in "Michelle," "Everyone's Gone To The Moon," and "Theme From Peyton Place." Other tracks are "Waltzing To Jazz" and "Gravy Waltz." The disk is a solid set of sounds which should score big with good music devotees.

OPERA & OPERETTA FAVORITES—Jeanette MacDonald—RCA Victor LM 2908 Fans of the late Jeanette MacDonald can have a selection of favorites from opera and operetta never before released on LP. Recorded between 1939-46, the opera composers include Gounod, Charpentier, Puccini and Delibes. She is on more familiar ground with Victor Herbert, Jerome Kern and Rudolf Friml. She was quite an artist no matter what demands were made on her beautiful voice.



DUKE ELLINGTON'S 'FAR EAST SUITE'-RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3782 "The Far East Suite," written by Duke Elling-ton, is a composition based on the musical im-pressions of the jazzman's 1963 State Department tour of the Near and Middle East. In 1964, the Ellington band toured Japan, a trip which in-spired "Ad Lib On Nippon," one of the sections of the Suite. Other parts are "Tourist Point Of View," "Blue Pepper," and "Agra." This superb piece should send great numbers of listeners scurrying to their record stores.

THE MOVIE ALBUM-Ramsey Lewis-Cadet



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

Andre Cluytens Dies





Tucker Honored By Israeli Army

NEW YORK—Richard Tucker has been honored by the Israeli armed forces for his courage and service in entertaining front-line troops during the current Middle East crisis. He has been awarded a statuette of the Mirage 3 jet, the French fighter plane used by the Israeli air force, plus an honorary Israeli green beret. The Metropolitan Opera tenor was in Israel performing a five-concert series with the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra throughout the country when the crisis erupted. The Ameri-can Consulate there asked him, as well as Metropolitan soprano Roberta Peters and Boston Symphony Orches-tra conductor Erich Leinsdorf, to leave the strife-ridden country after they

the strife-ridden country after they had completed only one concert. Although Leinsdorf complied im-mediately, Tucker and Miss Peters chose to stay to finish the concert schedule with conductor Sergiu Commisiona filling in for Leinsdorf. Tucker was forced to miss one concert because of his decision to entertain troops guarding the nation's borders.

Tucker remained in Israel entertaining troops as long as he was allowed to remain in the country. On May 28 he returned to New York where he has since devoted all his time and talents to raising money for Israel. On June 12 he will resume his regular schedule, opening the Met's June Festival at Lincoln Center.

This is the second war front to which Tucker has traveled in recent months. In April he flew to Vietnam to entertain U.S. troops in bases and hospitals there. After being turned down by the USO, which felt that U.S. soldiers would not be interested in operatic music, Tucker paid his own way to entertain, as well as to conduct Passover services in Saigon. In doing so, the CBS artist became the first operatic and concert star to appear in Vietnam.

Limelight Releases 'Golden Bulls' Theme


NEW YORK-Limelight Records has released an instrumental single of the theme from Joseph E. Levine's latest production, "The Caper of The Golden Bulls."

For the past few years we've been hearing what fantastic strides Coun-try Music has been making, and how much the market has expanded—and, of course, the facts bear out the claim. But one of the most significant points in any growth story is in the new faces that suddenly appear, and are accepted, both by the business and by the consumer. When a business is small and struggling, it is an easy thing for a handful of people to gain a lion's share of the action, while the newcomer literally beats his head against a stone wall trying in vain to gain recognition. Then, as the market begins to expand, the newcomer (who by this time has been around for about 12 years) suddenly finds that there's room for him. The cycle, naturally, is repeated as the market continues to grow, and every now and then an-other strange face is seen in among the established crop. This has been the case in Country Music as well as in other areas of business, but to say that amount of newcomers to make it in the last couple of years is highly unusual would be to understate the fact by a wide margin. A quick scan of last week's charts brings out a host of names that were almost com-pletely unknown to the general public two or three years ago—names like Tammy Wynette, Lynn Anderson, a host of names that were almost com-pletely unknown to the general public two or three years ago—names like Tammy Wynette, Lynn Anderson, Johnny Darnell, Jack Greene, Johnny Paycheck, Statler Bros., the Hardin Trio, Charley Pride, Nat Stuckey, Dottie West, Jerry Reed, Ray Pillow, Bobby Wright, Kenny Price, Lorene Mann, Waylon Jennings, Van Trevor, Bobby Lewis, Del Reeves and Bobby Barnett. Other names, who aren't on the charts temporarily, include Connie Smith, Dick Curless, Kay Adams, Stu Phillips, Lloyd Green, Cal Smith, Dolly Parton, Buddy Cagle, Jeannie Seely, Ed Bruce, Bob Luman, the Os-borne Bros., Warner Mack, Wilma Burgess, Bill Phillips, Glen Campbell, and several others who have had some degree of sales success in recent months. Although many of the afore-mentioned names have now become household words (or have been well known names on the Nashville scene for many years, it's doubtful that the record buyer in Gretna, Louisiana had ever heard of any of them three years ago. The list is impressive, especially when one considers the fact that the oldtimers and the big names of the past are still sharing the spotlight, holding the same solid positions that they have always held. It's not a ques-tion of newcomers taking over the scene and pushing the old favorites they have always held. It's not a ques-tion of newcomers taking over the scene and pushing the old favorites aside, it's merely that there is now more room for all concerned. The Kitty Wells, Eddy Arnolds, Buck Owens (a relative newcomer), Loretta Lynns (another one of the same), Bill Andersons, Faron Youngs, Tex Rit-ters, Johnny Cashes, etc., etc., etc., still continue with impressive sales figures. In fact, many of them are doing better now than every before. regardless of the fact that they share the consumer's attention with a much wider variety of possibilities than ever before. What really puts the icing on the

What really puts the icing on the cake is the idea that there is a great potential market that is still untapped, not only here but abroad as well. Where a country record was once considered a monster if it reached the 50,000 mark in sales (with a few exceptions), it is now pretty much a commonplace occurrence to see the top five or ten tunes on the carts hitting a 100,000 or 200,000 figure. There is still a widespread belief that records of this size are pulling in quite a bit of pop action, which may well be true-but when records hit those figures with great frequency it makes one wonder whether or not it's really due to "pop action," or whether the country market has, in fact, blossomed

into a consumer bloc capable of supporting such sales figures consistently. As Billy Jo Shakespeare said a while back, "Tis a consummation devoutly to be wished."

Monument Seeks Philippine Protection

HOLLYWOOD — Negotiations have been completed whereby Monument Records and its associated music pub-lishing companies would receive the full benefit of copyright protection in the Philippines through local regis-tration in that country. Because the Philippines are not members of the Berne Copyright Con-vention, piracy has been established, Monument reports, to a great degree in the past, with any foreign record label with a hit, susceptible to being reproduced illegally by various "back-room plants" scattered throughout Manila and surrounding areas. Bobby Weiss, Monument vice-president and director of the firm's international division who has made frequent trips to the Orient and the Philippines and has been aware of the piracy threat, established liaison with attorney Bill Quasha some years ago and made the specific arrangements with Quasha (of Quasha, Asperilla, Blanco, Zafra and Tayag) to have local registration of the Monument trademark plus spe-cific copyrights reaching the USA best-seller lists. Weiss pointed out that it is not un-common for sidewalk vendors to hawk pirate mimeographed copies of sheet music for the equivalent of 20-cents American currency, with the pirates not giving any identity to the original

publisher and of course, no royalties, either. Now, with the assistance of attorney Quasha, the copyrights of Combine, Vintage, Songs of the World, Music City Music, Longhorn, Matamoros and Wide World of Mu-sic reaching USA best-seller lists will be copyrighted in the Philippines. This will insure protection against local sheet music pirates as well as any illegal manufacture and sale of these songs on the various "under-ground labels" which are constantly giving birth in that area.

Editorial

-Breakthrough – Bonus Depreciation Approved-

The Federal tax depreciation allowed against the purchase cost of new coin-operated equipment is an economic plus which is appreciated and taken full advantage of by the majority of operators and their accountants. This depreciation breakdown enables operators to gradually amortize the expenses incurred through the necessary, periodic upgrading of the equipment on the route. The price of equipment is an operating expense and can be charged off on the annual tax return as stipulated in the Internal Revenue Code of 1954.

CONTRACTOR CONTRACTOR

However, until last month, the legality of amortizing the cost of a **bonus** paid to gain a **location contract** was doubtful and often overlooked, mainly because Section 167 of the Code was unclear and untested on the depreciability of money paid for "intangible property" such as a contract represents.

The validity of bonus depreciation has finally been aired and summarily **approved** by Judge J. Murdock of the Federal Tax Court, thanks to Long Island operators Dave Hoffman and Robert Hirsch of County Cigarette Service. The favorable ruling stemmed from the operators' defense of their 1957 and 1958 tax returns wherein certain bonuses paid to obtain locations for their cigarette machines were written off as depreciable over the period specified in each individual contract.

Responding for the IRS, Wallace Musoff noted the Tax Commissioner's position that amortization under section 167 was not allowable with respect to the cost of the location contract because they "are of such an indefinite character that no probable useful life can be determined."

Testimony made by the operators revealed that the cost paid to gain locations for their cigarette machines was the most important element involved in "the sale." Each written contract (or lease for space) was for a **definite period of years** stated in the agreement, could be enforced at law by either party for those years but for those years only and (this is extremely important) **carried no provision for or promise of renewal.** Also it became clear that the entire value of each contract expired as those years elapsed and no "good will" was involved as a factor in contract renegotiation to replace the old one. They had to agree upon and pay a new bonus for each new contract. In that negotiation, the operators were open to strong competition and the most important consideration was the amount they would offer to pay for a new agreement.

In handing down a favorable ruling, Judge Murdock said it seemed clear that these contracts were wasted assets and in order to compute the annual profit from the operation of the machines in their locations during the life of the contracts, the proportionate costs of the contracts for the year would have to be deducted from the gross sales of the machines for the year. The contract for the location of the vending machines are leases of space and the costs of those contracts are rent. Therefore, the cost of a single contract paid directly to the owner of the space thus obtained for a stated period of years would be **deductible in full over the period covered by the contract**.

If the full meaning of Judge Murdock's decision is unclear, please consult your accountant on the matter. This breakthrough might possibly be the "shot in the arm" this industry has needed for several years. The savings in taxes gained by depreciating every bonus paid for securing a contract should be directed toward upgrading the equipment on the route—for that is Uncle Sam's primary intention behind depreciation—**keeping the economy moving!** It also represents Federal Government sanction on the bonus policy which has been exercised for many years by this industry.

But behind every breakthrough lies a pitfall—in this case, a pitfall which can be prevented at the outset by every operator interested in upgrading the status of his business and his industry. We're speaking of the danger some hasty operators might provoke by doubling up on their location bonuses in hopes of crushing the competition. Don't forget, everyone can follow suit, and then we'll all be back where we started in the first place.

Important note—please don't confuse a bonus with an advance paid against future collections nor with commissions—the court record specifies that the latter has nothing to do with the former. And remember, money saved is money wasted if you don't pump a good percentage of it back into the route. Bonus depreciation is available for all. Check your accountant to see how it can best be worked out for all the equipment on your route.

SPOTLIGHT: THE PARIS FAIR 1967

PARIS—This year's section devoted to amusement machines at this annual event had a new look about it com-pared with previous years. Normally, one expected to find it tucked away in the background of the wine hall through whose temptations the visi-tor had to pass before reaching his target. More than one visitor has forgotten where he was going long before he negotiated the temptations of wines and foods of all sorts with the result that the amusements did not always get the attention they deserved. This year it was different. Although

deserved. This year it was different. Although the wines were nearby, they were further back than the amusements and the visitor saw what he wanted before he went to his luncheon. Fur-thermore, instead of the usual rather dark exhibition hall, the stands de-voted to coin operated amusement equipment were situated in a large bright hall with other such interest-ing items as hunting equipment as neighbours.

equipment were situated in a large bright hall with other such interest-ing items as hunting equipment as neighbours. It only required a quick glance to see where the present trend lies in France, at least as far as the manu-facturers are concerned. They are going all out to persuade the public that what they require most in their lives, by way of recreation, is the mini-car racing. There were no less than three different types for the visitor to try and among the most popular was that produced by AMF. In the music world, there was quite a lot of missing faces and, in fact, there was only one representative from the States. This was the Wur-litzer selection of boxes which were shown by their French distributors, Ets. Bussoz, one of the largest com-panies in the French amusement trade. This company also showed a

trade. This company also showed a large quantity of machines from a number of countries. There were

Marchant are agents for Rally of Nice and on their stand at the recent Paris Fair they had the latest "Flip-Tronic" machines which are made by this company. AL BODKIN - Security is a Happy Location

Could you give our readers some idea of the business rules you follow in order to keep your customers happy?

happy? "I try to drop in and see my cus-tomers as often as possible so as to maintain a good public relation with them. I believe 95% of my business success depends on the service I offer to my customer. The need to offer A-1 equipment and to have top-notch serv-



ice is of the utmost importance in any business and I'm a firm believer in supplying both to the location owner."

Al, what do you think of the pres-ent trend of public relations as com-pared to what it was, say, twenty-five

pared to what it was, say, twenty-five years ago? "Twenty-five years ago, the com-petition was different, you had a dif-ferent type of bar and grill owner . . . a strong man with a good busi-ness head. Today, every Tom, Dick and Harry is trying to enter the busi-ness and as a result, with the wider variety of location owners, you have to use a different approach to meet the newer problems of business tech-niques."

the newer prediction or change do what new innovation or change do you think has given the coin machine industry its biggest boost in recent

industry its biggest boost in recent years? "Yes, the bill that allowed coin op-erated pool tables in the bars and grills here in New York was a tre-mendous boost to the industry. The operators were very fortunate to gain passage of this bill. The pool tables have provided the extra income needed to pay for machines and meet over-head expenses. Today, you can find as many as three operators in any one location, a cigarette machine, a juke nead expenses. Today, you can find as many as three operators in any one location, a cigarette machine, a juke box or a pool table. This means more money for both the operator and the location owner. As you know, in some spots the music and shuffle business falls below par at certain times, dur-ing these slow periods the coin op-erated pool tables have taken up the slack." slack.'

As you know, most operators find it difficult or impossible to raise prices above the traditional five cent or ten

above the traditional five cent or ten cent plays, what are your views con-cerning a price increase in this area? "There's a definite need for this . . . operators are at fault . . . if the operators would stand up as a unit and say, 'this is the way its gonna be', then, there may be some new developments." In closing Al do you think the ?

In closing, Al, do you think the 2 play for-a-quarter systems will be-come widespread in the near future? "I think this is a wonderful idea, but it needs the support of the local

association. If the association, as a whole, backs the 2 play for-a-quarter, and it becomes adopted, a great boost to the industry would result. The time periods are very important. Pick a Sunday afternoon whene there's a double-header at Yankee Stadium and the Mets are playing a twin game on the Coast, here you have a four or five hour 'dead' period when no one

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plays the machines. You have base-ball in the summer and football in the winter. The losses suffered during these 'dead' periods could be allevi-ated by the two-for-a-quarter system. I plan to bring up the two-play idea during the next meeting I attend."

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Williams Publishes **Technical Manual**

Written by Pete Sagan

CHICAGO—A technical introduction to the basic mechanical features found in all types of coin-operated amusement machines has been pre-pared and published by Williams Electronics, Inc. This 64-page, fully illustrated manual, appropriately titled 'An Introduction to Coin Op-erated Amusement Machines' is de-signed to acquaint the novices and reacquaint the more professional games mechanic with the essential components that make these games 'tick' and provide a foundation of knowledge toward more effective serv-ice.

Introduction' was prepared in total by veteran factory technician Pete Sagan. The book, a result of almost one year of Sagan's work, is nothing short of excellent in its purpose, its scope (not relegated exclusively to Williams equipment) and its language (the manual is written clearly, economically and carries over two dozen full page illustrations and schematic drawinge).
Sagan's basic intent in publishing his manual can be summed up in his opening paragraph on page one: "No one can hope to memorize every detail of every circuit and component in today's great variety of games. A good technician does not even attempt it. Instead he should be able to obtain information, as he needs it, from the instruction sheets, drawings and schematics provided with each particular game. To do this, he must be able to read and interpret the schematic diagram. The ability to read a drawing, coupled with the basic principles of electricity will make it much easier to understand, adjust, operate and repair any game or electrical device." The Williams publication touches upon nearly every basic electrical and mechanical principle involved in coinop games, including: relay switches, step up units, credit or relay units, score drum units, flippers, bumpers, rollover lane switches, transformers and the "man running" and pitching arm units (found in baseballs).
At the rear of the book is an excellent primer for learning to read schematic drawings. There's also a complete glossary of coin machine terms, two sample trouble-shooting problems, plus lubrication and safety information. Sagan's fondest wish, to give him the answer to a breakdown problem. You can't improvise or attempt by blind trial and error to find the cause of a mechanical problem. If every mechanic could read a schematic dirawings. There's also for help to the distributor, less down ime on the location and less head-aches all around."

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


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

Cig. Prices Rise

NEW YORK-P. Lorillard Company anounced increases in the wholesale prices of all of its cigarette brands which took effect Saturday, June 3, 1967.

In telegrams sent to wholesalers June 2, the firm announced a price increase of 25 cents per thousand on regular and king-size cigarettes and 75 cents per thousand on 100-milli-mator brands

75 cents per thousand on 100-milli-meter brands. The wholesale price of Old Gold, Lorillard's only regular-size brand, was increased to \$9.25 per thousand from \$9.00. King-size Kent, Newport, True, Old Gold Straights and Old Gold Filters were increased to \$9.45 per thousand from \$9.20. York Filter 100's, Menthol Spring 100's and Kent Deluxe Length 100's (the latter cur-rently in test markets only) were in-creased to \$9.95 per thousand at wholesale from \$9.20.

R. J. Reynolds also announced re-cently that the list prices of all the increased effective immediately. The price of the company's regular find king-size cigarettes are being raised 25 cents per thousand and the price of the premium length, 100 mm brands, has been increased by 75 cents per thousand. U.S. Silver Price Is Facing Threat

The United States Treasury's long-held ceiling price for silver appeared to have been broken recently when the American Smeltering Company an-nounced that it was going to base its purchases and sales of foreign and domestic ores and concentrates on the higher prices prevailing in London. A spokesman for American Metal Climax, Inc., said it "looks like we'll have to depart from our practice of pricing silver" on the basis of the Treasury's rate of \$1.29 an ounce, the price at which the Government buys and sells silver from its once huge stockpile. In recent years, the Treasury's sup-ply of silver has dwindled sharply as it strove to meet a mounting demand

In recent years, the Treasury's sup-ply of silver has dwindled sharply as it strove to meet a mounting demand for coinage. The growth of the popu-lation and the Vending Machine In-dustry, coupled with a curtailed sup-ply because of the effective ceiling price, strained the Treasury's stocks of silver. Last year, the Treasury introduced silver-free dimes and quarters and reduced the silver content of half-dollars. But it has been unable to catch up with demand. With this situation, prices of silver on the futures market have been ris-ing sharply for a period since the Treasury amended its long-held sil-ver-price policy. The Treasury said on May 18th that it would sell silver at \$1.293 an ounce only to "legitimate, domestic industrial customers." The agency also banned most silver exports and the melting of coins. Pre-viously, the Treasury sold and bought silver to anyone at its established price. Silver traded at \$1.65 4-10 an ounce

silver to anyone at its established price. Silver traded at \$1.65 4-10 an ounce in London recently. Silver also regis-tered an advance on the Commodity exchange here recently, as it movd upward from 4.15 to 5 cents an ounce in heavy trading. At that particular day's closing, 1,095 contracts had changed hands.

Late Silver Development

The House Rules Committee re-cently prepared to take action on leg-islation passed by the Senate that would free more than 100 million ounces of silver for sale to domestic users by the Treasury at \$1.29 an

users by the Treasury at \$1.29 an ounce. The legislation, previously approved by the Banking Committee, will be taken up by the House sometime this week. The silver would be freed by releasing some silver now held as backing for outstanding silver certifi-cates cates.

cates. In a related development, there were discussions at the Treasury be-tween industry and Treasury officials. The talks ranged over all aspects of the workings of the Treasury's new program of limiting sales to certified domestic users. No actions were taken

domestic users. No actions were taken. Senator Vance Hartke, Democrat of Indiana, issued a statement saying he had been assured by the Treasury that "it is prepared to embargo ship-ments of silver bullion from the United States should the international run on America's silver supply be-come acute."

sport of the Board of Trade in the Arbite of the Board of Trade in the House of Commons. Arthur Lewis, a Labour member, asked whether Douglas Jay was aware that the latest figures available showed an import figure of almost four million pounds (11 million dollars) on the one-armed bandits, fruit machines, juke boxes, etc., mainly from the United States and Australia; whether he would give a breakdown of these figures; to what extent entry into the Common Market would permit an unrestricted flow of these types of machines from Italy and Germany; and to what extent this would effect. 


Major Tobacco **Companies Announce Price Increase**

Philip Morris was the last of the major companies to an-nounce the price increases which will amount to one-half cent per pack on regular, king-size and filter brands and one and one-half cents on 100 mm cigarettes.

limeter size. The new 100 mm size cigarettes have become the fastest growing seg-mert of the tobacco industry. The extra tobacco needed for one pack of the 100 mm brands is enough to make four additional king-size cigarettes per pack. 
