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### EWS BULLETIN

CALIFORNIA LAW PUTS CRIMP IN AMOA SHOW... Gaming companies who had planned to exhibit their machines at next month's AMOA show in Anaheim, Calif., will not be allowed to do so because of a California statute banning slot machines. Authorities apparently believe that machines such as video lottery terminals and 8-liners fall under the rubric of "slot machine." Gaming exhibitors would only be allowed to show the face of the machine, with the "guts" removed; it could not be a working machine.

AMOA is offering a full refund to those gaming exhibitors who don't want to keep their booth space (about 100 booths in all). Exhibits manager Susan Gilbert says only one company, PARS Electronics, has cancelled so far. She adds that AMOA is still working with state officials to try to rectify the situation.

NEW DISTRIBUTORSHIP IN NORTHWEST... General Coin closed its distributorship doors in Seattle and Portland on Aug. 31. Those doors were reopened the next day by American Coin Machine Distributors Inc., which is owned by former General Coin sales manager Mike McWilliams and other investors. McWilliams will head up the Portland office; Jerry Estes will do likewise in Seattle.

American Coin will represent most of the lines previously represented by General Coin.

- MAXIMA OUT OF BUSINESS?...We've received some complaints from operators who sent in deposits for cranes from Maxima Entertainment Corp., based in Laguna Hills, Calif., and never received the merchandise nor their money back. Our repeated attempts to reach officers of the company were futile; an answering service screened all calls. Now there's not even a live voice, just a recording saying the phone number is no longer in service. Are they out of business? It sure looks that way.
- KAUFMAN LEAVES PREMIER... Steve Kaufman has resigned his position as executive vice president of Premier Technology to head up the coin-operated division of Electronic Arts. The San Mateo, Calif.based Electronic Arts is a diversified entertainment and educational company that develops, publishes, and distributes software worldwide.

"I wish Steve the best business success in his new position," said Premier president Gil Pollock. "Electronic Arts has chosen one of the finest men in the coin-op industry to head up this division. He will be missed a great deal."

The bulk of the international sales gap left by Kaufman's departure will be filled by Pollock. L.J. Greene has been promoted to international sales and marketing manager. In addition to maintaining her current marketing functions, she will be responsible for ensuring follow-through on all export sales issues.

► TEXAS GETS REDEMPTION LAW... The Texas Legislature has passed a law that defines what a gambling device is and makes exceptions for redemption equipment. It went into effect Sept. 1.

According to the law, the definition of a gambling device does not include "any electronic, electromechanical, or mechanical contrivance designed, made, and adapted solely for bona fide amusement purposes if the contrivance rewards the player exclusively with non-cash merchandise prizes, toys, or novelties (or representation of value redeemable for those items) which have a wholesale value available from a single play of the game or device of not more than 10 times the amount charged to play (it) once, or \$5, whichever is less."

The law says a defense to prosecution is the fact "that a person played for something of value other than money using an electronic, electromechanical, or mechanical contrivance which is excluded from the definition of a gambling device."

WALKER GOES TO H. BETTI...Jeff Walker has been hired by H. Betti Industries to head up the company's new product development efforts. He will be based initially in Pleasanton, Calif.

"We're happy to have Jeff as part of our team," said H. Betti chairman Peter Betti. "This strengthens our commitment to developing exciting new products in redemption and in amusement games. His experience in manufacturing and distribution, both domestically and internationally, blends well with the current and future makeup of the H. Betti group."

Before coming to H. Betti, Walker worked for Capcom USA as vice president of sales and marketing.

U.S. GAMES APPROVED IN SOUTH DAKOTA...On Aug. 4, the South Dakota Lottery approved U.S. Games' Pot-O-Gold machine for video lottery play. It's the first video lottery game in the state to offer five-cent play. Locations in Sioux Falls and Rapid City received the first Pot-O-Golds.

"We are pleased that the approval process went so smoothly and appreciate the trust that has been placed in us by the South Dakota Lottery," said U.S. Games president/CEO Mike Pace. "Additionally, we are committed to much more than just meeting the requirements of the Lottery for this game. The South Dakota version of Pot-O-Gold will live up to the game's reputation for attracting maximum play and operating flawlessly."

Pot-O-Gold players have a selection of either nickel or quarter play and an initial choice of five games: Jacks or Better, Aces or Better, Joker Poker, Blackjack, or Keno.

"I welcome U.S. Games to the South Dakota market," said Curt Everson, director of administration for the South Dakota Lottery. "I look forward to a solid, long-term working relationship."

- ▶ JALECO PROMOTES HERMANSON... Mary Hermanson has been promoted to sales and marketing manager at Jaleco USA. She will handle distributor accounts and develop advertising, game artwork, press releases, and promotions. Hermanson spent six years with Konami Inc. before joining Jaleco in February.
- VIDEO LOTTERY EXPANDED IN W. VIRGINIA... On Aug. 16, the West Virginia Lottery Commission approved amended rules and regulations for expansion of video lottery operations to all the state's pari-mutuel racing facilities.

Mountaineer Race Track & Resort, which is operated by Mountaineer Park Inc., currently operates 165 video lottery terminals under a contract with the Lottery Commission. Its video lottery sales for May through July 1993 have increased by 29 percent over the same period in 1992.

The video lottery regulations expressly allow up to 400 VLTs at each licensed racetrack, and provide for additional terminals beyond 400 after the initial six months of operation, subject to Lottery Commission review of market conditions and the impact of additional machines. The regulations also provide that the Lottery Commission will receive 40 percent of net revenues after payment of all prizes. The balance of those net revenues will be kept by the licensed racetrack.

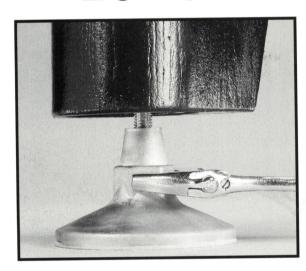

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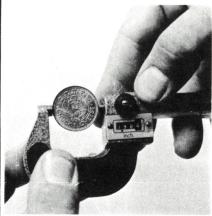

## The reality of it all

here are two subjects that are dominating headlines in nearly every trade publication dealing with our industry: violence and virtual reality—one good, one not so good. On one hand, everyone's trying to figure out if games are too violent, if they are the cause of all that's wrong with the world, and what should be done about it.

On the other hand, there are those trying to make video games so real that the player will be picking bugs out of his teeth after a high speed chase through the country.

The coin-op industry is in the middle of a dilemma: games with a certain amount of violence are making the bulk of the revenue. But no one likes to hear negative comments against the industry so some feel that it is our moral obligation to put the brakes on making any more games with violent themes.

If it's any consolation, the coinop industry is not the only one under attack. In the July 12, 1993, issue of *Time* magazine, writer Kurt Anderson addresses another type of violence in an article entitled "The Great TV Violence Hype." Television violence, according to the article, "has been the subject of a dozen high-profile, low-impact congressional hearings since 1952." I've been trying to imagine what was considered violent on TV back then!

TV executives have responded to outcries about violence in their shows with parental advisories warning about programs "deemed potentially upsetting." The article quotes Terry Rakolta, who founded Americans for Responsible Television, as calling this effort "ineffectual, serving only to make congressmen and network executives feel nice about themselves. And she's right, it's a pseudo-fix, quick, clean, and breathtakingly easy compared with doing any of the things that would reduce actual violence-banning private gun ownership, for instance."

One point I found extremely interesting in Anderson's article was the subject of TV violence causing aggressive behavior. He said, "The correlation (of watching fictitious violence and behaving aggressively) is statistically quite modest. Most of the observed aggressiveness is bratty boisterousness, not violence."

It's plain to see that those trying to do something about violence on TV are offering no proof of violence affecting youngsters (or older people, too, for that matter). Anderson brings up the point that one senator offered a pathetic instance of TV violence as evidence: a chain-saw movie he once saw several years earlier in a motel room. To further alienate himself, he admitted that he watches very little television.

OK, on to other proof. There's very little.

I said in an editorial that violence in other aspects of life are far worse than any seen in a video game. This article only reinforces the reality that while everyone likes to feel better about doing something—no matter how little—to keep youngsters away from violence, it's a nearly insurmountable task.

Until some drastic steps are taken to take violence out of children's environments in all its forms, they will be exposed to it one way or another. Putting a warning at the beginning of a TV show will do little to stop the exposure.

Just yesterday, our local newspaper began a chilling series on a type of violence that is permeating the country—kids with guns. The series details the frightening fact that "trying to stop youth violence can be a perilous undertaking."

The article points out that no matter how many programs the government institutes to help young people avoid being a victim or doing the victimizing, "the best defense is a strong and open relationship with parents."

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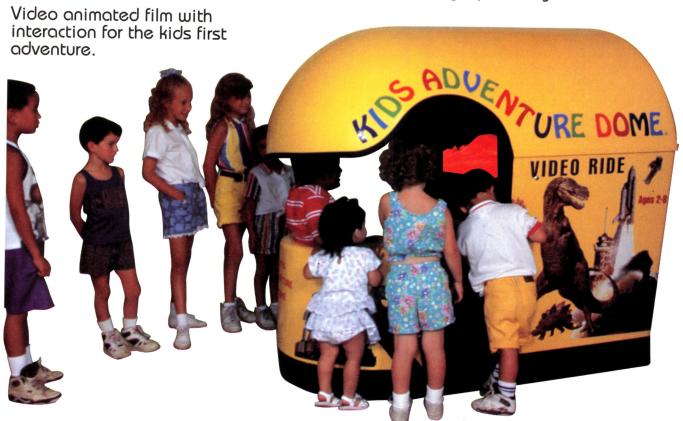


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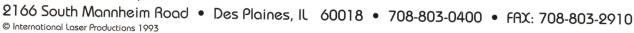

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# Violence is in the eye of the beholder

n my long career in the coin machine industry and as a contributor of articles to our trade journals, I have seen coin-operated games used as scapegoats by the media as a principal cause of the violence practiced in real life by some youngsters.

Therefore, as I have in the past, I will take up the defense of all games—home and coin-op. I'll begin by repeating what I said during the days of Exidy's *Death Race*, a driving game that depicted a car hitting pedestrians. Although it happens every day in real life, it caused quite a fuss when depicted in a coin-op game. Here's what I had to say in the mid-'70s:

"There is hardly a man alive today who in his childhood did not play with toy soldiers, forts, and guns or play cowboys and Indians, cops and robbers, pirates, etc. There was nothing wrong in playing war games, reading war stories, or seeing war movies. That is, the moralists told us, as long as the good people always won—the cowboys beat the Indians and the American army beat the Germans, Japanese, British, Spanish, North Koreans, Italians, or whoever happened to be the bad people at the time.

"None of us were considered 'sick' playing these games. However, today there is a game called *Death Race*. TV networks, national magazines, and newspapers have labeled anyone who plays the game as sick. It is my opinion that the criticism of *Death Race* is unjust. We've watched this game being played by youngsters and adults alike; every one of them were happy and amused. There was no hatred, violence, malice, or thoughts of destroying mankind written on players' faces.

"I don't think a single person who ever played *Death Race* thought of running over pedestrians any more than someone playing coin-op war games has thought of starting a war. People who would deliberately run over pedestrians in real life were sick before they even played *Death Race*. Believe me, a video game won't make them

any worse. It is strange indeed that TV networks showing violence, sex, torture, war, and cruelty should criticize Death Race. But then, I guess they have to make a living and attract viewers."

Now back to the present. I just read Valerie Cognevich's editorial, "Living in a Glass House in a World of Rocks." I could not resist joining her cause because it is a just cause. Once again, video games are a target being hit with accusations of causing violent behavior in real life. If we eliminated games featuring martial arts, sword fighting, hand-to-hand encounters ... wait! If we eliminated video games *entirely* from the face of the Earth, would that end even one-tenth of the violence kids are exposed to every day?

We'd have to go much further, like eliminating the nightly news with vivid showings of violence and man's cruelty to each other. Then we'd have to do away with stories and pictures of life in all of its worst situations. Above all, we'd have to do away with violence in movies. Today's youngsters are exposed to Schwarzenegger and Stallone wiping out everyone! And how about the many "Halloween" and "Nightmare on Elm Street" sequels and numerous horror movies too gruesome to mention?

As a youngster in 1925, I vividly recall seeing Lon Chaney's silent version of "The Phantom of the Opera." During the unmasking scene, a young lady sitting in the same row fainted and had to be carried out of the theatre! I don't recall an outcry to eliminate "The Phantom of the Opera" book or movie. The musical of today will probably run forever.

I say that the simulated encounters taking place on video game screens can never be more violent than real-life wars, street fights, riots, looting, dope and narcotic battles for supremacy, big city muggings, gang wars, Mafia and gangster fights, deaths, murders, suicides, etc. that youngsters are exposed to everyday.

How glorious and exhilarating it is

when a youngster playing a video game can be a hero, a martial arts expert, a great boxer, a daring super race driver, and be given the chance to be a fighting, shooting hero, overcoming the forces of evil. There are also opportunities to be a sports hero, winning tournaments, national championships, the Super Bowl, or beating Michael Jordan at his own game on NBA Jam.

The present campaign against violence in video games is merely a cop out by parents. They want the press, police, and school teachers to do their work for them and make their children upright, honorable citizens.

Valerie's comments about the press are well-taken' I speak from experience. Having been exposed to the press many times during my lurid "life of ill repute," I can honestly say one thing: "the evil that men do" makes the front page; "the good is oft interred with their bones" on the back pages in fine print.

I understand your frustration, Val, but when newspaper reporters call be courteous, but beat them to the punch. Ask them about violence on the streets, the terrorists, wars. Ask them if their own newspapers should accept ads for violent movies. Also ask them if their own children enjoy playing video games in arcades or at home. Ask that one all-important question, hasn't violence been a part of life since Genesis? Then as a parting shot, ask them whether their children should read "Little Red Riding Hood," "Snow White," "The Wizard of Oz," and the many other Fairy tales that depict violence.

Before they answer any of those questions, jump in and tell them that no well-raised, carefully-taught youngster will be affected by exposure to violence in real life and certainly not in the simulated environments of video games any more than they would be affected by playing war games or reading Fairy tales.

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# What to do about the price-per-play issue

s it any wonder that the typical operator is cash poor? We have only ourselves to blame. One of the reasons is that there are still operators in every market who continue to put out brand new videos and pinballs on 25-cent play. They do the same thing with CD jukeboxes. We continue to make gradual progress on increasing the cost per play on our games, but at the current rate we are not keeping up with the economy. It all boils down to economics.

In the late '70s and early '80s the typical video game cost less than \$1,500, and it was set at 25 cents a play. I can remember vividly when my father was scheduling the *Asteroids* video for our route. Earnings of \$300 to \$400 per week were the norm. If the game dropped below \$200 a week in gross earnings at a location it was immediately rotated out and placed in another location, one where it could earn "good money."

We see earnings such as these with select games today, but certainly not with a game that cost less than \$1,500. Today a typical dedicated video game will cost, on

average, \$3,000. The gross earnings may be the same as the videos of 10 to 15 years ago, but that's doubtful. Even if the earnings are the same the return on investment is 50 percent less, because the game costs twice as much. Pinballs are an excellent example. The costs escalated with inflation but the price per play, up until recently, continued to be a quarter.

set at 50 cents per play. Rather, we should convince them that all games should be \$1 per play. Many manufacturers don't have much respect for the operating community, and seeing this type of activity is a good example as to why.

From the studies I have seen on this issue, the United States lags far behind other countries when it comes to pricing our equipment.

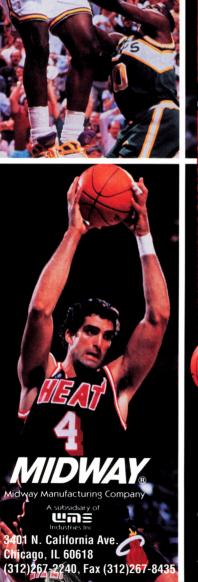
The first thing some operators do after uncrating a game or jukebox is adjust the factory pricing of 50 cents a play down to 25 cents. It doesn't take many of these operators to mess up the market for an entire area. Unless the operator has deep pockets, this type of operating will be his demise. It just doesn't add up. We shouldn't be trying to convince our customers that we need videos and pinballs

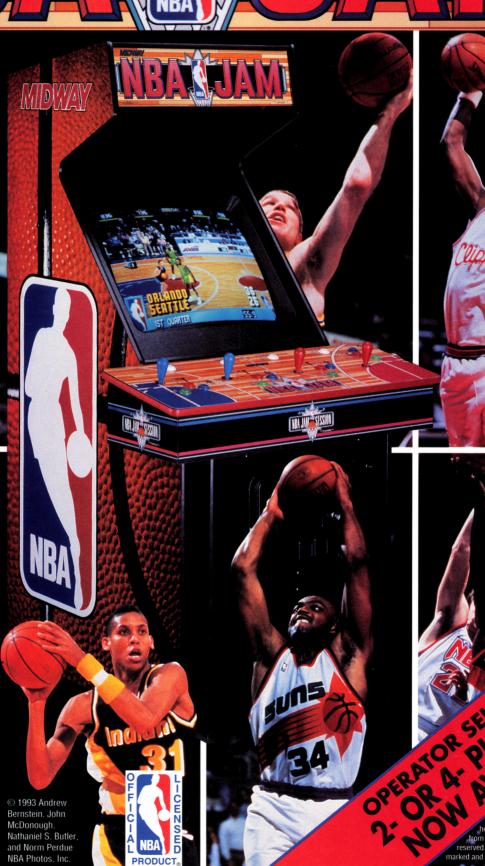
The equivalent of \$1 per play and more is considered standard in many countries, but not in the United States. One of the major reasons is that operators are typically bad sales people. Our customers have generally been with us for a number of years. They tend to run our businesses and dictate to us what our pricing policy should be for their locations. Generally, we give in. However, I

don't recall McDonald's calling me to discuss the price increase for a Big Mac.

What we need to do is educate ourselves and our customers about the benefits of obtaining a higher price per play. You may very well experience a decrease in play initially. This is a typical consumer response, regardless of the product. Everyone hates price increases, but here's the key: every time a product that a customer

uses becomes more expensive, the customer goes through a price vs. value reevaluation process—either consciously or subconsciously. If the perceived value of the product is less than its actual price, the customer stops purchasing that particular product.

If you go into your arcade and try to increase the *Dig Dug* to 50 cents per play, the customer is most likely to make the decision that the perceived value is much less than

the cost of the product, therefore choosing not to purchase it. However, if you bring in an outstanding game such as a dedicated *NBA JAM*, the likelihood that the customer will accept the pricing at 50 cents per play with 50-cent buyin is much greater. In our market this has been well received with the high-quality new games we've purchased in the last few years.

The burden begins with the manufacturers. It is their responsibility

to manufacture equipment that will have a high perceived value to our customers. The products we have seen of late—outstanding video games and pinballs, CD jukeboxes, and other types of equipment—have had a wide degree of acceptance with a higher price per play. It then becomes the operator's responsibility to maintain the integrity of that pricing. In many cases we don't.

In a discussion with a manufacturer he expressed his frustration with operators who change the pricing downward from the factory-recommended setting. He said the company has considered making the minimum price per play fixed at a given level. If the operator wants to go below that level, it would require a special conversion kit at additional cost. I'm not sure if that would be legal, but I'd be in favor of it. I think if any operator has a Fun House or newer pinball set at less than 50 cents for one play, we should print his name and company name on the front page of this magazine for all to see.

The dollar coin would give us a big boost in increasing our price per play, but it's not a reason to delay. The coin will just make it easier. I think we all have to plan for our businesses as if the dollar coin won't pass for a number of vears. If it does, then we're just that much better off. The dollar coin is incredibly practical and would save the U.S. government a tremendous amount of money. I used to think that common sense was the basis for lawmakers' decisionmaking. But based on my experiences, I'm now certain that this is not the case.

What goes hand in hand with the price-per-play issue is the 50 percent commissions we've all been paying to our customers since the beginning of time. Sure, there are many locations that can be run very profitably at that commission rate, but there are more than a few

that cannot. Commission expense is the largest expense item any operator has in his entire business. Up until recently, I couldn't even tell you what our commission expense was; we never tracked it.

The first line on our income statement was "Operator Income." Now it's "Gross Income," followed by "Operator Income." You subtract the operator income from the gross income to get the "Commissions Paid" figures. The percentages are very interesting. Do you know how significant it can be to decrease your commissions paid percentage by one or two percent company-wide? It adds up very fast.

### The income-forecasting method of depreciation

I hope that every operator is now familiar with this method of depreciation for their coin-operated machines. For those who aren't, this method simply allows you to depreciate your equipment based on its actual life expectancy (based on earnings) rather than a straight five or seven years, as was the case prior to the recent private letter ruling received by AMOA president Craig Johnson.

We have been personally involved in the evolution of this project for a number of years because of the effect on our company. We were audited for the years of 1988

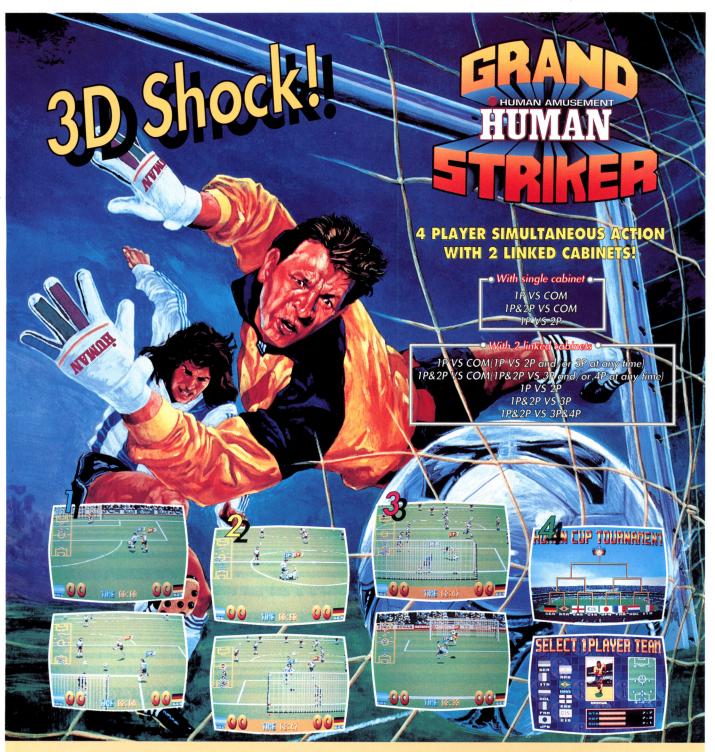

Many operators—particularly dart and pool league operators—have already been successful in addressing this issue. Many of the commissions are well below the 50 percent level, but the operators are giving a value-added service by organizing the leagues for their customers.

What really got me thinking was my exposure to the lottery industry. It's remarkable to me the penetration they have received by only paying the location owners who sell the tickets approximately five percent of gross sales (it varies slightly from state to state). If they increased their commission structure to 15 percent, they would have everyone selling lottery tickets. They don't do this, however, because it wouldn't be profitable. Interesting, isn't it? In many cases it's the same customers who think that the lottery paying them five percent is a better deal than us paying them 50 percent commissions from the pool table revenues. I want to meet that lottery salesman.

and 1989, and our income-fore-casting methods were initially disallowed. After a lengthy process of appealing to the IRS, we ended up paying the IRS a significant amount of money in penalties. Based on the recent ruling we petitioned the IRS; they have reversed their earlier decision and will rebate the money we paid in penalties. This doesn't happen very often.

Craig Johnson should be on everyone's Christmas list for a long time for the effort he put into this project. This ruling will change the way you manage your business. It will definitely change the profitability of purchasing coin-operated assets that typically earn the majority of their money in the extreme front end of their useful life. If you're not familiar with this ruling, do yourself a favor and learn about it. 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# Why I don't fill out the Equipment Poll

arfield, that pudgy feline from the comics, always has creative excuses for why he doesn't want to do something, such as exercise. He admits that "I know I should exercise but I prefer to grapple with a hot fudge sundae."

More excuses? Try: "I'm not into sweat," "I'm very attached to my fat cells," or "My muscles would hate me in the morning."

When it comes to reluctant participants, filling out the Equipment Poll ranks right up there with Garfield's aversion to exercise. We've heard all the excuses: "I'm a small operator and my votes don't count." Not true. Every vote counts, whether you have 15 games, 150 games, or 1,500 games.

"I'm too busy, you'll have to call me every month and I can tell you over the phone." Time constraints don't allow, although it would be nice to chat about the industry in general. But then, you don't have time.

These excuses sound better than "I don't have a pen with ink to match this month's color on the poll," or "I never buy anything new and can only check off *Tetris* and *Turbo Out Run*."

The return envelope is postage paid so there's absolutely no expense involved. A number of those envelopes make it to our door with other things in them—anything but the Equipment Poll. We understand the value of a dollar but would like the Equipment Poll returned with an honest "as you see it" rating placed on the games. There's no substitute for this kind of information and it can only be obtained from our operator readers.

This is a good opportunity to address some questions from operators regarding the poll.

**Q:** Why doesn't the poll include kiddie rides, multi-player cranes, foosball, and other games?

A: We've expanded our poll to include redemption/ novelty equipment, a reflection of the interest and sheer volume of product in that category. Multi-player cranes and coin pushers used to be on the poll but were rarely checked off, leading us to surmise that single player units dominate the field. The two-page ballot is jam-packed and would have to expand greatly to accommodate more categories.

**Q:** Can you ask operators to actually give gross dollar amounts on the poll?

A: Gross dollar amounts are relative and can be misleading. What's considered a good weekly return for an operator with street locations in a small town may not qualify as a good weekly return for one with street loca-

tions in the suburb of a large city.

**Q:** How about printing the frequency of repairs within a given amount of time?

A: This would be hard information to obtain. Checking with distributors and fellow operators is one way to forestall purchasing a poorly assembled or inherently defective piece of equipment.

All inquiries and comments on the poll are welcome. We sincerely appreciate the time spent by those who fill it out and thereby help us keep the entire coin machine community apprised of game standings.

We've often been told that our poll is a true reflection of game popularity. Some older equipment remains on the poll because, as one Michigan operator noted: "Not all operators can justify buying every new product that comes out."

When the poll comes your way, take it seriously. A few minutes of your time will contribute to a realistic reading on the most-played games. We'd like to make something good even better.

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### **Anti-counterfeiting group formed by JAMMA**

An organization known as the Video Game International Anti-Counterfeiting Advisory Group (AAG for short) has been created to attack worldwide counterfeiting problems, announced Hayao Nakayama, president of the Japan Amusement Machine Manufacturers Association (JAMMA), which is funding it. Some American manufacturers will also join the AAG.

The organization will gather evidence of infringements, provide training to U.S. Customs and police officers, and assist game manufacturers in protecting their intellectual property rights.

Bob Fav. executive director of the American Amusement Machine Association (AAMA), has been appointed superintendent of the AAG. He will administer the day-today operations and supervise the regional directors of investigation in Europe, Asia, and Latin America. Rhyn Tryal, a former DEA agent, will serve as a regional director in Latin America, while former IRS agent Vince Gambino will do likewise in Italy and Spain.

"The AAG is going to take an extremely aggressive approach in combating counterfeiting

activities," Fay said. "This concept has long been needed, and I am delighted to serve as its first superintendent. Our investigators will gather evidence of intellectual property rights infringements, as well as work with prosecuters and government officials regarding tax and other

matters as they pertain to counterfeiting."

"We are very grateful to AAMA for its cooperation in this very important project, and we are optimistic that through Fav's efforts the worldwide counterfeiting problems will be greatly reduced." JAMMA's Nakayama said.

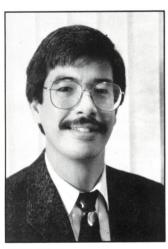

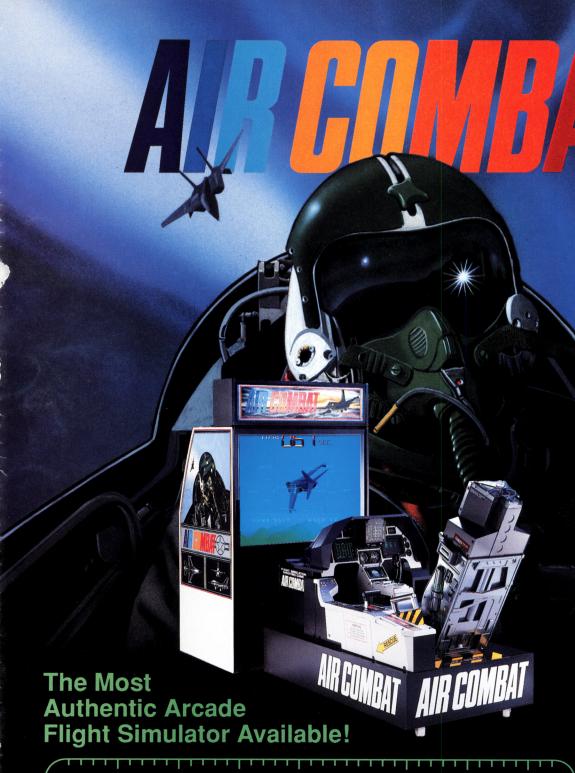

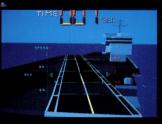

### Pioneer: we're not leaving coin-op

Is Pioneer departing the coin-op industry? Based on a letter sent by the company's Bud Barnes and Steve Young, the answer is an emphatic "no." Here's a portion of that letter:

"Several of our distributors have contacted us recently concerning Pioneer's commitment to the coin-op industry. Apparently there are rumors circulating regarding our possible withdrawal from the market. We would like to set the record straight: Pioneer is committed to continuing our successful participation in the coin-op industry. We will continue selling and marketing CD jukeboxes. At the same time, our engineers are developing new products that Pioneer will bring to the coin-op market in the coming years."

Barnes and Young say the rumors could have been fueled by Pioneer's decision not to "actively participate" in the upcoming AMOA show. They wrote, "We are currently focusing our efforts on maintaining our current network of distribution while preparing for our new jukebox, to be released next year. In addition, several exciting products-some involving karaoke-are under development and will be introduced when ready.

"Please understand that our absence at the AMOA show in no way should be interpreted as our departing the coin-op business. We have big plans for our future, and our next jukebox should set new standards that will have our competitors scrambling to catch up."

A group of engineers from the Japanese home office is currently touring the United States to develop ideas for the increased profitability and technical advancement of Pioneer's CD jukeboxes.

"While the team from Japan is exploring new features to expand the capabilities of our *Laser*- Juke systems, our focus here is to support our existing distributors and customers by finding ways to enhance operator revenues," Barnes said. "Today, most laser jukebox manufacturers are benefitting from technology such as data retrieval systems, dual amplifiers, and multiple CD players that Pioneer introduced into the market. We're currently assessing new developments like optical disc technology so that we can continue in our leadership position by designing products that will fully maximize operator opportunities."

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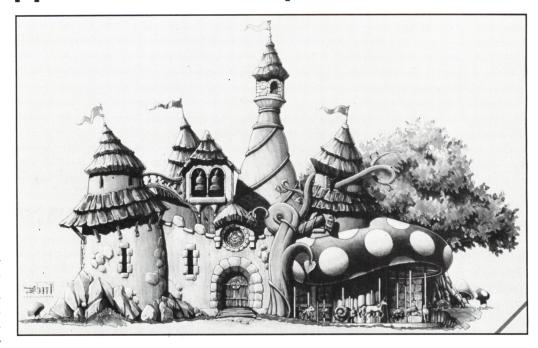
### Bringing happiness to some special children

### Indian gaming gets congressional backing

Twenty-nine members of Congress recently sent a "Dear Colleague" letter urging "continued federal protection of the right of American Indian tribes to conduct gaming operations on their tribal lands."

The letter, signed by a bipartisan group of House members, noted that Indian gaming "constitutes less than two percent of the total amount

wagered nationwide, yet it has become the target of increasing attacks by those who wish to preserve existing gambling monopolies." Those opponents, the letter maintains, want congressional changes to the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, "which would totally undercut the authority of the tribes and deprive them of one of the few successful economic develop-

ment programs they now have."

Rick Hill, chairman of the National Indian Gaming Association (NIGA), said, "This strong showing of congressional support reflects the growing recognition that tribally sponsored gaming creates hundreds of thousands of jobs for Indians and non-Indians alike. It spurs real economic development and provides funding for essential services on chronically impoverished reservations."

Interestingly, seven of the letter's signers are from Minnesota, a state whose coin machine operators have loudly complained about the effects of Indian gaming. They are James Oberstar, Martin Sabo, Jim Ramstad, Bruce Vento, Tim Penny, Collin Peterson, and David Minge.

### ICMOA stages annual meeting

The income-forecasting method of depreciation for operators and Illinois' video lottery efforts were just two of the topics covered at the Illinois Coin Machine Operators Association (ICMOA) annual meeting, held June 25-27 at the Inn at Eagle Creek.

AMOA president Craig Johnson recounted his efforts to get the IRS to allow the income-fore-casting method and explained how using it would save operators money. He also addressed the subjects of interactive games and recognition of the coin-op industry by bankers.

Other speakers were operator Ray Shroyer, who updated the status of video gaming legislation in Illinois; ICMOA lobbyist Zack Stamp; and Illinois state representative Larry Hicks, who

told operators how to communicate effectively with legislators.

The ICMOA political action committee auction raised over \$27,000, while the video gaming auction

netted in excess of \$24,000. ICMOA executive director Adonna Jerman wished to thank the many manufacturers who contributed items for the auctions. She gave special thanks to Jerry Marcus of Atlas Distributing, whose efforts "guarantee that the PAC auction is an annual success."

### JAPAN/U.S.

 Executives recently revealed that Sega is planning to build dozens of small theme parks around its newly developed virtual reality system. Fifty parks are planned for Japan, starting with a site in Osaka next year. Another 50 are scheduled for the United States over the next few years. The estimated cost of each park is between \$10 to \$15 million. Sega is believed to be seeking partners in both countries.

It is claimed by some industry experts that Sega, which sold an unsuccessful arcade business in 1990, will never build as many parks as anticipated but will move cautiously. The company will begin by opening some smaller amusement centers in the United States. One is due to open in the new Luxor Hotel in Las Vegas later this year.

Many other companies are developing similar parks, but the Sega plan looks more ambitious. Namco's Tokyo theme park, Wonder Egg, has already scored highly, and expansion is to take place elsewhere in Japan and in the United States. Edison Brothers already has three Exhilirama virtual reality amusement centers operating in the United States, although they are smaller than what Sega plans. Paramount is working on a Star Trek virtual reality attraction, while Sony is said to be planning an I

ambitious, high-tech theme park.

### **HONG KONG**

• If passed, legislation designed to tighten control of Hong Kong's 600 amusement game centers could lead to half of them being closed, operators claim. Mr. Lam Kwok-Tung, chairman of the trade association for licensed amusement game centers, said he felt helpless in the face of such legislation.

The new laws would prohibit games featuring graphic scenes of violence, nudity, or "seductive" gestures. Card games such as blackjack or poker, or games of chance with little or no skill involved, also would be banned.

According to Mr. Lam, the proposals would turn away many customers. He also believes that proposals to reduce the opening times of children's centers by two hours is too restrictive and would interfere with business. Legislators want 16 to be the dividing age for adults and children, while the trade association wants it to be set at 18.

"We will lobby legislators to withdraw some proposals, such as those on opening hours," Mr. Lam said.

### **AUSTRALIA**

• The Australian trade show season was launched by a seminar on violence in video games at the recent Council of Accredited Amusement Op-

erators (CAAO) exposition in Melbourne. Addressing the topic of game classification, Chris Blackman, marketing manager for Leisure and Allied Industries, argued for industry self-regulation.

He outlined the Entertainment Seal of Approval System, whereby games will qualify for a seal of approval if their content complies with the industry code. To obtain this, operators must enter into a licensing agreement to ensure that it is not misused. The press had been invited to hear the industry's case, but a news item about the trade show on prime time TV still showed a young boy, standing on a chair, playing Lethal Enforcers.

Pinball and dart leagues, which are only just beginning to take off in Australia, were the subject of a less controversial seminar. Operators were given a comprehensive rundown on how to set up and administer leagues with the news that in some locations test setups have tripled revenues.

Most of the equipment on display at the Moonee Valley Racecourse Centre was being shown in Australia for the first time. Pinball attracted particular interest among operators, especially Jurassic Park, Twilight Zone, and Tee'd Off. Following the worldwide trend, dedicated pieces dominated the video scene, although NBA JAM, which is doing

well in Australia, will soon be available in kit form. Crime Patrol, World Rally, and Virtua Racing were also popular.

Gamesmaster, well known for air hockey tables, came up with a surprise package in its pool-oriented redemption game, which was completed just in time for the show. If the game tests well the company will be looking to make contacts in the international market.

During the two-day event some fine jukeboxes were on display, including the NSM Performer series. But the music machine that stole the show was a 1941 78 rpm jukebox from Wurlitzer. It had been restored by Delano Reiss, Australia's premier antique pinball and jukebox collector. Over 200 show dance attendees enjoyed the background music playing on the machine during pre-dinner drinks.

### **NEW ZEALAND**

• Censorship of video games in New Zealand is being discussed. The government has a Films, Videos, and Publications classification bill under study, which would control coin-operated video games.

A delegation from the industry, consisting of Darrell Skiffington (Auckland), Mike De-Ruyter (Wellington), and Gary Walker (South Island) recently met with Minister of Internal Affairs, who will be responsible

for enforcing the new law.

There has been a recent outcry about violent games, and if the new law is passed members of the public will have the right to challenge the presence of games they consider unsuitable. If successful, the games would either be withdrawn or only permitted for restricted audiences.

#### **TURKEY**

• A unique plan has been launched in Turkey to encourage operators to get rid of out-of-date PCBs and try new ones. The PCB rental idea has been developed by Vector International Ltd., and so far it has had a good response.

The operator must sign a rental contract, hand over a guarantee check that covers the price of the board, then pay in cash the agreed sum for the first 10-day rental period. After 10 days the operator has three alternatives. He can 1) terminate the contract, return the PCB, and have his check back; 2) choose to renew the deal and pay for another 10 day's rent: or 3) buy the board, in which case he can hand over the cash or have his check cleared and receive an invoice.

The operator therefore has the advantage of personally testing the board in his machine before making up his mind, and he can research what game performs best in his location without the risk of losing an initially large

outlay on an unsuitable machine. The owner can also make a 10 to 30 percent monthly income from renting the boards, and there is considerable market potential as older boards are removed from the machines.

Ankara-based Vector International Ltd. has been in business since the beginning of 1993 and has extended the rent-a-board system across the country through a surface mail service. Hakan Arsan, who set up the plan, is pleased with the results so far and believes it is the first of its kind in the world.

#### **GREECE**

• Michael Tsimogiannis, who represents his country at Euromat, has quashed rumors that Greece is opening up to payout machines. He said there has been no change in Greek law.

"The rumors concern the JPM game Reel Magic, which is the only 'payout' machine permitted in Greece and which began to enter the country in January," he said. "It appears to be a payout machine because it has a payout tray and looks like an AWP machine, but it's not allowed to operate as a payout in Greece. You may only win or lose points. If an operator is found to be running it as a payout machine, the police will close his arcade for two or three months and seize the machine."

#### ROMANIA

• The laws on payout machines and other forms of gambling changed in Romania in mid-June. The latest version of the law—covering live gaming casinos, slot machines, bingos, and lotteries—has been approved, according to a Romanian correspondent. He also reports that a commission has been set up to organize the implementation of the new regulations.

However, a warning is given that "since previous versions of the Romanian gambling laws never actually went into effect, there is no reason to believe that the new law will be executed. However, the commission has started work, so this time it may happen."

Euroslot has been informed that "there are changes every day in how the regulations are implemented, which makes it difficult to describe the new law."

#### **RUSSIA**

 Russian operators and distributors have welcomed new laws regulating the industry, which allow the government to exercise control over the licensing of machines. This is seen as a positive step in terms of attracting capital from overseas. Foreign investors should now feel more confident. knowing that there is some means of regulation and monitoring in the Russian industry.

Boris Belotserkovsky, managing director of

Unicum, said, "This should lend a greater sense of stability and credibility to the market. It will only help to expand the industry to bigger and better levels."

#### **SPAIN**

• A new consultancy service, Total Gaming Systems, has been set up by the O.N.C.E. Group of companies in Madrid. The firm takes over from Global Game System and will offer advice on all aspects of the gaming industry. The relaunch is part of a group marketing drive and financial consolidation, which will ensure higher capacity and versatility.

#### **FRANCE**

• At the recent general assembly of Euromat, the French delegation claimed during discussions that France should be regarded as a special case when it comes to paying charges to fund the struggle against PCB copies. They didn't see why they should pay charges such as those paid in the luxury goods sector, for example, with Cartier, Dior, and Lacoste.

The CFA also condemned the excessive price of original boards and the policy of some Japanese manufacturers who, the CFA claims, use arcade games to increase the sales of their consumer products. The CFA requested that manufacturers not distribute arcade games until at least a year after they've been

launched onto the operators' market.

After speaking out at the Euromat meeting in Brussels, the CFA addressed all French operators to make sure they understood the position regarding PCB copies and the conditions they believe must be respected by the Japanese manufacturers.

#### **IRELAND**

• A new 10-pence coin will be introduced by the Central Bank of Ireland in mid-November. The coin, valued at six cents, will be 22 millimeters in diameter, weigh 5.45 grams, and have a rim of 1.86 millimeters. It will be comprised of 75 percent copper and 25 percent nickel, and the edge will be a coarse mill in inset beading.

Some problems are anticipated for the coin machine industry while the new coin is being introduced.

#### **UNITED STATES**

• Atari Corp. is contracting with IBM to build its new 64-bit Jaguar Entertainment System in a bid to regain ground on market leaders Sega and Nintendo. The home entertainment system will be available this autumn in New York City and San Francisco, and early next year across the United States.

To be priced at about \$200, it's set to compete with Nintendo's Super Famicom/Super NES and Sega's Mega Drive/Genesis. The Jaguar will also have an optional CD-BOM drive.

#### INTERNATIONAL

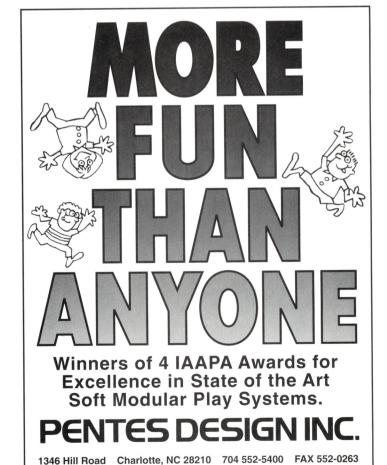
• In the latest survey of world competitiveness, Japan held onto its number one ranking. The report is published annually by the World Economic Forum and the International Institute for Management Development, both based in Switzerland, and produces findings on 22 different countries.

The statistics, compiled

in 1991 and 1992, show that Japan is out in front in terms of domestic economic strength, management, and science and technology, but its lead is not as great as in previous years. Experts believe that this reflects a move away from collectivism to individual values.

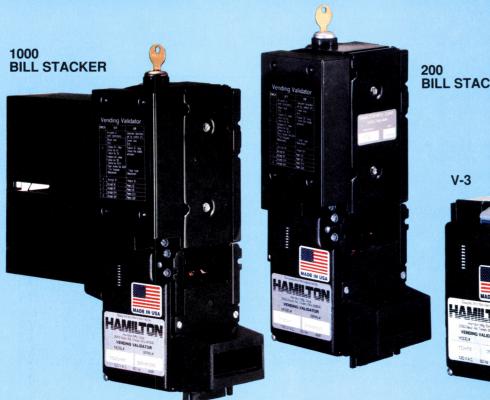
The United States regained second place in the table this year, which shows the country's confident outlook and solid current account performance. Germany lost its runner-up position, dropping to fifth place. Finland suffered the biggest drop, falling from 10th to 17th place. This is due to the loss of export markets in the East.

# Arachnid spins an impressive product line-up

mericans love to play darts. It's a staple in bars across the country, with more and more players finding pure enjoyment in participating in tournaments and leagues. But darts is not a new concept.

The game has roots as deep as you care to dig. Traveling into the annals of history, we see the pilgrims challenging each other in a sport called "butts," using short arrows instead of spears.

We can travel further back to 1374, when Chaucer refers to a "darte." And in 1532 Anne Boleyn presented Henry VIII with a set of darts. A great story, perhaps, but

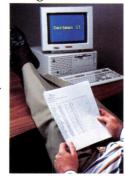

the same as what we play today. That year Englishman Brian Gamlin developed the marking system used on modern dart boards. Two years later an American filed a patent on a folding paper flight and in 1906 the first metal barrel was invented. The first known 180 was thrown in 1902 by John Reader, a British undertaker.

In 1927 the first major dart tournament was held, sponsored by a London paper, "The News of the World." Thus 1927 goes down in history as the year darts was first considered a major force in the world of games.

#### Arachnid opens

In 1974 Arachnid developed the first electronic dart game. Times have changed since then; so has Arachnid. What began as a leisure pastime in local bars has become a full-blown competitive sport with international finals and high-stakes money awarded. As an industry leader, Arachnid is committed to the continuing need for new development.

Today there are more than 90,000 English Mark Darts games on location and that number is growing daily. As electronic darts becomes more competitive it becomes more important to keep thorough, acAccording to the National Sporting Goods Association, there are over 17 million dart shooters in the United States. By the time you record, collect, and verify statistics for every player, of every game, of every league, you're talking a lot of paperwork. *Galaxy* was developed to help the operator avoid much of this paperwork.

Dartman II, Galaxy's software program, makes automatic data collection a reality. It was designed for efficient league management by eliminating time-consuming paperwork. State-of-the-art features include: a quick sort of stats and standings for all players,

The Galaxy league system lets operators set up any league format and program up to a 30-game match and shooting sequence. Once a player inserts his quarter and selects dart league play, the Galaxy Team Card takes over. It automatically programs in the

start calling programmed into the system. By the time the operator gets to work in the morning, the stats will be waiting.

As an added bonus, operators may want to display printouts of team standings and player stats at league sites as an incentive for players to practice and improve their games.

There are additional programs Arachnid offers to achieve the full benefit of the *Galaxy* league system. There's Spider Writer, used to program up to three mes-

Arachnid has added a new twist to soft-tip dart competition, the Top Gun Challenge. Players work their way through the top 10 and then to the "Top Gun" spot. It's a challenge designed to allow players to compete during non-league time.

\$160,000 in prize money at the 16 regionals and \$60,000 at the finals. Over the Memorial Day weekend, 5,800 entrants from 38 states and nine foreign countries signed up for the eight-event World Cham-

pionship competing against the best players in the world. Plans are underway for BullShooter 9, which will boast even higher stakes.

#### Expanding into video poker

In 1991 Arachnid began development in a new segment of the industry with a video gaming device called *Lucky Touch*. Arachnid was recently approved for manufacturing video gaming devices in the state of Louisiana, which approved video lottery just over a year ago. Arachnid has placed several games in off-track betting locations and has been pleased with the player response. Arachnid is on the launching pad to becoming a serious competitor in the video gaming market.

# Bringing the Mexico

exico City's most famous affiliation with games has, to date, been of the Olympic variety in 1968. But by annually staging the Latin American Expo, the American Amusement Machine Association (AAMA) is hopeful that the capital city will be equally renowned as the hub of Mexico's coin-op game market.

This year's show, the fourth one, took place at Mexico City's Exhibimex on July 21-22. Some 160

booths were sold, representing a near 25 percent increase from last year. But unlike the previous three expos, in which attendance practically doubled from one year to the next, this year's attendance mirrored last year's: 2,080 in 1992 compared to 2,213 in 1993.

The attendance figures seem to reflect a Mexican marketplace that could be described as flat. "The operators I've talked to say business is down," said one parts

supplier. "I'd have to agree with them. We haven't been doing as well in Mexico lately as in the past." Here's a sampling of comments from other U.S. exhibitors at the show:

- "It's nothing to write home about, but certainly better than before AAMA set up a trade show here."
- "If we can make a dent in the copy board situation in Mexico—over 90 percent of the games here,

I believe, are still copies—this would really be a hot spot for our games."

• "This is my fourth show, and I think it's actually gotten too big. It may be four times as big as it was four years ago, but I guarantee you the Mexican market hasn't quadrupled since then. We sell about 125 games a year in Mexico. That's good; it's 125 games that we might not have sold in another foreign market. But when you consider

that the 125 represents five different games in the product line, it isn't so impressive. So just because you see so many manufacturers here, don't think that means the Mexican market is booming; it isn't. Your competitors are here, so you have to be here."

- "This is our first time exhibiting at the show, and though we didn't take one order today, I think we have to establish a presence in Mexico. Our type of equipment isn't popular here yet, but you never know when that could change."
- "Pinballs aren't the repair nightmares that they used to be, and operators can count on good technical support from distributors like Mexel. So yes, Mexican operators are warming up to pinballs more now than in the past, but there's still plenty of room for

improvement in terms of sales."

- "I'll tell you, a lot of operators here are really mad about Diversified Coin (a Capcom route-operating company) having a big route down here and hurting their businesses. They don't appreciate their being here at all."
- "Redemption games are being well represented in Mexico by (distributing company) Vese. Despite the high duty on equipment, we're happy to be selling games in this market."

Speaking of the high duties, which hover around 32 percent on games entering Mexico, AAMA executive director Bob Fay says passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) would greatly help this industry's manufacturers.

"The association definitely supports it," he said. "If it passes, there

are nine categories of equipment that would either have the duties immediately removed or gradually phased out in a one- to five-year period."

Fay was also happy to report that the Video Game International Anti-Counterfeiting Advisory Group, an international organization funded by JAMMA to attack worldwide counterfeiting, is up and running. He hopes that the AAG's activities will, in time, lead to a 10-20 percent increase in the sale of legitimate games in Mexico.

The AAG will gather evidence of infringements, provide training to U.S. Customs and police officers, interact with foreign governments, and assist JAMMA members in protecting their intellectual property rights. Fay has been named superintendent of the AAG and will also supervise the regional



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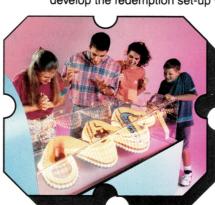

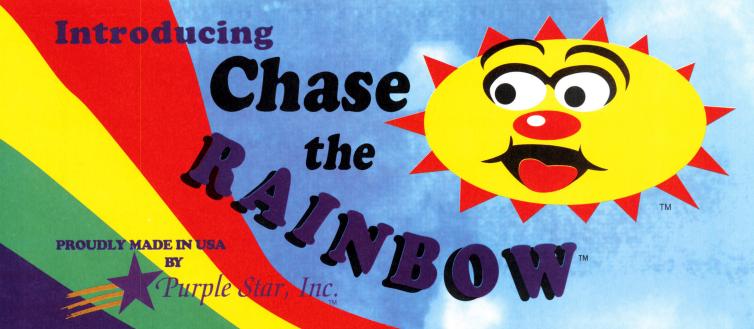

directors of investigations in Latin America, Europe, and Asia.

"When you combine the formation of the AAG to fight counterfeiting, the possible passage of NAFTA and the positive things that would bring, and the increased promotion and awareness of our industry through this trade show, you see that the time has never been better for coin-op man-

ufacturers to do business in Mexico," Fay said. "But all we can do at AAMA is create the opportunities. It's up to the individual manufacturers to take it from there."

Still, the Mexican market has some quirks that don't seem to make sense. Valley's James Griffiths says his company does OK with dart machine sales in Mexico, but that the same isn't true for Valley pool tables. On its face that might not seem odd, until you dig deeper and find out that in Mexico, operators *cannot* have pool tables in liquor-licensed establishments, but they are allowed in restaurants. No pool tables allowed in bars? Try to imagine that, American operators! □



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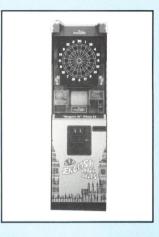
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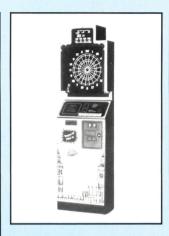

When the American consumer is told to "buy American," he sometimes resists because, frankly, the quality of product is often inferior to that from Japan or Europe. But in the video game arena, American operators gladly spend their money on product manufactured by Incredible Technologies/Strata of Rolling Meadows, Ill.

Incredible Technologies, created by Richard and Elaine Ditton in July 1985, serves as the development company, while Strata handles the sales and marketing of IT product. After spawning such hits as the still-popular *Capcom Bowling*, the company decided to market its own product and started Strata in September 1989.

IT operated out of the Ditton household initially, then moved into its first office in January 1987. The company expanded again in December 1992 by relocating to a 12,000-square-foot facility.

# Time Killers: why all the fuss?

Though the IT/Strata video *Time Killers*, released in late 1992, has been condemned by some in the in-

dustry for being too violent, company president Richard Ditton says the criticism is baseless. In fact, he contends, the outcry has really only come from a vocal minority.

"I think we deal in cartoon violence, which is on a totally different level than real violence," he said. "Standard TV shows contain much more violence than exists in video games. I think the whole issue has been totally blown out of proportion.

"Driving games have always been popular in arcades, and we've always wanted to get into that area. Now we have the hardware capable of doing it."

"When we test a game, we usually have someone from the company there watching. We're very much in contact with the arcade owners. Time Killers was tested in five locations in Chicago, and we were looking for comments about violence. We didn't get any! I'd be surprised if any arcade that received negative comments got them from anyone but a vocal minority that hates video games. But we've been dealing with those people since Pac-Man, which was supposed to destroy society as we know it."

Ditton says for a manufacturer to not give the players what they want would be less than sensible—and what they want is fighting games that contain violent action. "We tried creating cutesy games, like *Peggle*, but operators didn't want to buy them and players didn't want to play them. Then we put out a fighting game and it put us on the map, though we had had success with sports videos like *Golden Tee Golf* and *Rim Rockin*."

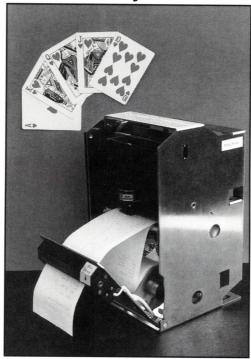
"Players demand violence in the games, and they're disappointed when it's not delivered. I check Prodigy and Compu-Serve to see what the players are saying, and I understand they've started a letterwriting campaign to Nintendo asking that the violence in games like

Mortal Kombat be kept in. There's a fine line to be drawn, of course. I'm totally against the level of violence in movies—heads being severed, arms being pulled off. But that's not the same as violence that appears in Saturday morning cartoons. Kids know that's makebelieve."

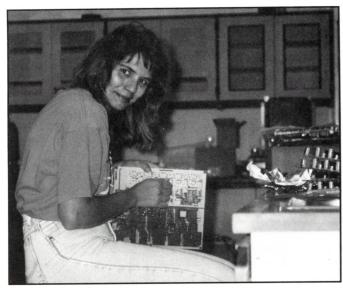

Remember the hilarious scene from the film "Monty Python and the Holy Grail," in which the Black Knight gets both of his arms and legs chopped off in a sword fightthen wants to continue the battle, despite having blood spurting in every direction. That scene from the PG-rated movie was the inspiration for Time Killers, and Ditton says those who've criticized the game probably didn't pick up on the black humor.

"Part of the game play that we built in was the loss of limbs," he explained. "You obviously lose your ability to fight as well when that happens, but you can still win by fighting with your head. It's dark humor, and though some adults may have missed it, the kids didn't. The first time they see the game they laugh; they aren't horrified. If you look at the way we did the art, you'll see it's comically, not grossly, drawn."

What separated Time Killers from the horde of fighting-themed videos and allowed it to shoot up the game charts?

"It has more moves and more animation than any fighting game ever," Ditton said. "Each of the

characters was programmed very differently, with their own separate moves and ways of getting to the moves. *Time Killers* is very much a player's game. It's hard to play it once and be able to play it well. You have to get into it more. The game has three times as many moves as *Street Fighter* and one-and-a-half times the moves of *Mortal Kombat*. It's very deep, which hurt the game somewhat because you can't just walk up and play well."

Time Killers is like other successful Strata videos in another key area for operators: those long legs. "Though we're through with Time Killers, I expect players to play it out on location for quite a while," Ditton said. "All of our games have had legs; they tend to earn a lot longer than normal. For example, we sold Golden Tee Golf for three years and Rim Rockin' Basketball for over 18 months. We're still selling a few Strata Bowlings here and there. Ours is a company that doesn't mind going out and making a short run. If people want to buy our games, we'll sure sell them."

# A new direction

Operators should keep an eye out for Strata's next game, which will be a departure for them. Tentatively titled *Driver's Edge*, it's the company's first foray into driving games. The sit-down will soon be

out on test and given its official debut at the AMOA show.

"Bigger, simulator-type games like *Driver's Edge* will push our hardware to the limit," Ditton explained. "We're into our thirdgeneration hardware now, which we designed to be able to accommodate this. So *Driver's Edge* is a

natural extension of the coin-op videos we're doing. Driving games have always been popular in arcades, and we've always wanted to get into that area. Now we have the hardware capable of doing it."

Strata will also debut a footballthemed video, *NFL Hard Yardage*, at the AMOA show. Through licen-

Patented & Patents applied for sing arrangements with NFL Properties and NFL Films, the game will contain film clips, team names and player numbers, authentic team helmets-even jiggling cheerleaders. Ditton is unsure whether it will be released as a kit or in dedicated form, a subject he was eager to discuss.

"I used to always be for kits, because that's what the operators want," he said. "But I've gone into a covenience store and seen a Strata game—that I worked on for a year-in a cabinet that looked like it had been kept out back in the rain. The controls were rusted; it just looked awful. Operators should put the same pride in cabinetry that we put into creating the game, but unfortunately that isn't always the case.

"Since I want to ensure that Strata games look good out on location, I almost feel forced to go dedicated with the first runs. I used to think that manufacturers did that to rake in a little more money, but now I'm beginning to think that they do it so the games will earn when they get out there. I'm still undecided about what to do with NFL Hard Yardage. We've worked very hard on the game; it's going to be state-of-the-art with digitized graphics. The last thing I want is for an NFL official to show up at his neighborhood convenience store and see 'NFL' stuck sideways on the cabinet with cigarette marks that were burned into the control panel in 1987. Imagine the phone call we'd get from him the next dav!"

Being one of the few American video game manufacturers is nice from a patriotic point of view—"it keeps American engineers employed," Ditton quipped—but supporting companies like Strata goes beyond flag waving.

"Since the games are done by American engineers and American programmers, they have more of an American feel," Ditton said.

"From across the room you can tell a Japanese game from an American game. The art and the feel are more our style, and the American music blows theirs away. Strata games are designed, developed, and tested here to play to American audiences. The Japanese definitely have a different way of looking at things, and you can see that in most of the videos that are brought over here."

cades are a great place for kids to hang out together and have some fun, and they can't get things like driving simulators at home. Another thing they can't get at home is the competition. Games like Time Killers, Street Fighter, and Mortal Kombat have the element of you against another human being in a 'King of the Hill' competition. That's a social event.

"I judge a lot of this by our kids.

With, for example, virtual reality technology coming to coin-op, elaborate multimedia machines headed to the home, and the possible coin-op competition of 3DO and its hardware system, doesn't that make small video game companies like Strata a bit nervous?

My six-year-old has Nintendo, Sega, and NEC home systems and over 100 game cartridges. Still, every night, he asks me to take him to the arcade! The home games just don't provide the competition that the arcades do. But they help us, I think, because they get people

lieves it's a fad. "The headsets are impractical in a multi-use environment," he said. "The ergonomics aren't there. We provide play for time, usually two to three minutes long. But the suiting and unsuiting of the virtual reality systems is too long. People will do it once or twice, but not a lot. Some companies may be making improvements, but I really think virtual reality is a total fad

"3DO will probably take out a booth at the coin-op shows and have all sorts of fancy demonstrations. They're a fine company, but they've never done coin-op before. Their success will depend on how good their knowledge of this market is. But I don't feel threatened at all."

# The Strata gang

Though Strata is officially running three game teams right now, Ditton says the size of the company is such that an interweaving of duties is normal. Don't look for tightly proscribed job descriptions.

"We prefer that everyone help out the best they can with game design," he said. "There were probably 10 people who offered suggestions that were used in *Time Killers*. When you get a lot of input you come up with good things."

The 40-plus employees at IT/ Strata include the following:

"We love coin-op; we love doing these games," Ditton concluded. "That's what we're in it for. I hate to sound immodest, but we know how to build good games here at Strata."

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Burn these letters into your memory: FEC, which stands for family entertainment centers. You'll be hearing more about the growth of this concept as the arcades and game rooms of vesterday and today evolve into the family fun emporiums of tomorrow. Carefully note the growth of the Fun Expo, an annual symposium of exhibits and educational sessions targeting family fun centers. # AMAF stages fourth show in Orlando

ending machine operators from all parts of the Sunshine State converged in Orlando for the fourth Automatic Merchandising Association of Florida (AMAF) convention and trade show, held July 16-18 at the Stouffer Orlando Resort. will be placed only on machines that dispense potentially hazardous foods, as defined by the Department of Business Regulation.

The origins of Polyvend go back to 1962, when Metal Stamping Corp., a contract metal fabrication firm, was founded. Within two years the company had revolutionized the vending industry by creating the world's first glass-front snack vending machine. The design quickly became the industry standard, elevating the small company to new heights. Today Polyvend, also a leader in metal fabrication and contract manufacturing, employs over 300 people at its massive 285,000-square-foot plant. But the company isn't content to rest on its laurels, as Stewart Lyman, the executive vice president of sales and marketing, made clear.

"A couple of years ago we acquired Polymold Inc., which has its manufacturing operations in Fort Collins, Colo.," he said. "They primarily manufacture injection plastic-molded parts for sale to others. And in early July we pur-

chased most of the assets of Lektro-Vend Inc.—the brand name, the inventory, and a lot of the equipment. We've moved the manufacturing of Lektro-Vend product to here in Conway, Ark. The manufacturing and shipping of product under the Lektro-Vend brand name has begun. We're utilizing the former Lektro-Vend distribution network rather than combining the Polyvend and Lektro-Vend product lines.

"Lektro-Vend made quality, durable snack machines. They were around a long time and were the actual inventor of the dualhelix. In addition to the snack machines, they had a combination snack/cold food machine. In essence there are two compartments within the same cabinet. Lektro-Vend also had a separate, free-standing food machine in development before the company dissolved. We will complete that and add it to the Lektro-Vend product line. Polyvend is very well represented in international markets, but Lektro-Vend has, to date, been undermarketed internationally. So we'll be expanding distribution of the Lektro-Vend product line in foreign markets as well."

As for its own line, Polyvend has this company policy: "We try to design and build what our customers want, not sell them what we make." That credo is evident when one takes a look at Polyvend's array of snack machines, for example. The company's countertop vendor is designed for small office and break-room locations, while three different mid-sized machines give operators a choice for environments like schools and manufacturing plants. And, when the situation calls for a big, impressive vendor, Polyvend provides the giant PV 700 machine. With a unique method of helix attachment, it holds the maximum number of snacks that are physically possible. There are no plates to remove and no cumbersome product doors.

Lyman says Polyvend designs drink machines to be aesthetically compatible with its snack machines: the same color, the same trim, etc. "They look extremely good in a bank of machines," he said. "We don't actually manufacture them; they're manufactured to our specifications by another company."

Why should music and games operators who are just entering the vending industry buy equipment from Polyvend instead of other leading manufacturers?

"What distinguishes Polyvend is we're innovators; we've been manufacturing vending machines longer than anyone else," Lyman said. "We make quality equipment with the industry's longest warranty on components. This tells operators that we're confident in our quality. We have the lowest prices on spare parts, which again shows that we have confidence in what we make.

"We have a network of regional sales managers and a complete technical staff to offer support in the marketplace. We have a very strong affiliation with a financial company that allows us to offer an attractive leasing and/or financing program to buyers of Polyvend machines. And in addition to all those tangible, measurable benefits, we're just nice folks to do business with!"

How's a novice operator to know just what equipment should be a part of his mix, and in what quantities? Lyman says Polyvend helps the operator keep the process from being mere guesswork.

"One of the things we offer, and I think it's unique to the industry, is

the experience of a lot of people with strong operating backgrounds," he explained. "As an example, in addition to my years with Polyvend, I've been executive vice president of sales and marketing for Tom's Foods. Polyvend has manufactured all of Tom's snack vending equipment since 1965, and over the years the company has purchased over 150,000 glass-front vendors from Polyvend.

"So we know vending, not only from an equipment standpoint but also in terms of site selection, financial set-up of the route, advice on the compensation of route salesmen, commission schedules, technical and service matters, and many other facets of the business. If someone wants to get into vending, Polyvend can offer plenty of free advice in addition to just providing the equipment. That's probably one of the reasons we've been so successful: we understand the business from the customer's point of view. We know that everyone has different needs based on his market, competition, objectives, and financial capabilities."

What product unveilings can operators expect at the upcoming NAMA show in Chicago?

"Besides the Lektro-Vend line, we're going to introduce some new features on our equipment," Lyman said. "One of them is an anti-vandal door that we've developed. It's a heavy, see-through, polycarbonate shield that can be applied to the machines at the factory. It looks like the bubble-front that you see on drink machines, but it's clear. You talk about protecting the glass! We tested it by dropping a bowling ball on it from 20 feet up, and the ball just bounces off. Operators with high-risk locations will love the protection this gives to their \$2,500 machines."

# World Dart Championships and Valley/Loewen Cup

eventeen international teams gathered in Brig, Switzerland, in early June for the World Electronic Dart Championships, conducted by the Federation of European Compact Sports. It was also the occasion for the inter-country 7th Annual Valley/Loewen Cup competition between Team USA and Team Germany.

The championships were organized by the Loewen sport group of Stot and Schweizerischer Compact Sport of Switzerland. Competitors came from Croatia, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Slovania, Spain, Switzerland, and the United States.

Brig, a picturesque and historic Alpine township, greeted its international visitors with a ceremony that included a local brass band, team flag parades and national anthems, and ladies in traditional costume serving Schnapps in the centuries-old Stockalper Palace. The mayor welcomed the players

in five languages.

Hours of practice preceded the competition, with Team USA quickly adjusting to the smaller international target. A total of 60 NSM Royal Dart machines by Valley Recreation Products were used during the three-day event.

Team USA was composed of Debbie Shutt, Brad Halley, Becky Korhonen, and Floyd Bissonette. Each won a place on the team at the spring Valley World Cup competition in Las Vegas.

Keen observers of the sport noted that the teams to watch were the Netherlands, Germany, Great Britain, Luxembourg, and the United States. All but Great Britain took home honors.

Many of the matches were true cliffhangers. Team USA members acquitted themselves well, with Debbie Shutt finishing a close second to Heinke Suhn of Germany in Women's Singles. Jose Van Tangale of the Netherlands placed third. Brad Halley and Floyd Bissonette took second place in

Men's Doubles behind the German pair.

The team championship was won by the Netherlands, with Germany taking the second spot and the United States placing third.

The final event on the program was the long-awaited Valley/Loewen Cup. The standard of play was high and in the end a strong German team captured the title for the third year in a row.

Gunter Schmid of the NSM company Stot manned the computers and presided over the play with Stefan Reichert of the German DSAB and Hanspeter Weber of NSM's Royal Dart distributor in Switzerland.

The 1994 World Championships are scheduled for Europe again, with additional teams expected from Eastern Europe. The next Team USA, chosen from qualifying events in the United States, will attempt to bring home the Valley/Loewen Cup. Congratulations to all the competitiors for outstanding performances.

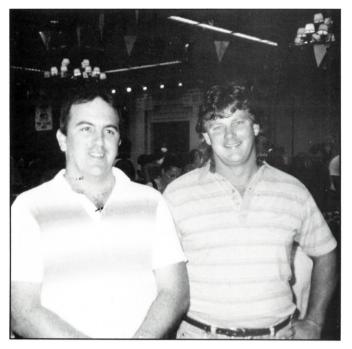

### Tell it like it is, says operator/player

He minced no words: "This sport has been ignored. Operators are missing it." The object of his comments: foosball. Amid a crowd of players at Tornado's July Fourth Nationals, arcade owner/player Brian King of Fremont, Calif., spoke up for his favorite sport.

King has always been an avid player. After nine years in the arcade business, promoting foosball through tournaments at his Galaxy Game Center (nicknamed Foos Central), he knows what he's talking about.

"This is amazing," he remarked, "players from all over the country. It's as big as the dart championships. There's no interaction on other games that compares with that on foosball. Players get excited and make noise in this sport. It's a magnet for other players in your game room. I know it because I've seen it. This is real competition."

His enthusiasm for the game is boundless. "I'm a player who became an operator. My revenue on foosball will go up 40 percent per

week before the Northern California State Championship. Players put a lot of time and money into improving their game. They don't practice video games but they do practice foosball. It's an ego sport: I can shoot faster than you."

King has four tables in his game room and runs three weekly tournaments. "If you don't have tournaments and promotions it doesn't work," he notes. "Just look at the return on investment for your motivation."

According to King, foosball appeals to all age levels and both genders. "Lawyers come in to play, saying, 'I used to play this in the '70s.' Tournaments cover categories of 17 and under, 35 and older, and everyone in-between. That's three decades of players—something important to remember."

He spends time giving lessons to newcomers entering the sport. "You give back what you get out of it," explains King, who also publishes a monthly newsletter to stay in touch with his players.

King takes the trade press to task for not doing more to promote this sport. He feels that what the industry did for darts it can do for foosball get behind it full blast.

Former champions Reggie Congleton and Ronnie Lewis, who play in local leagues and competed in the nationals, agree that the sport is "not nearly as popular right now." Operators like King want to turn that around.

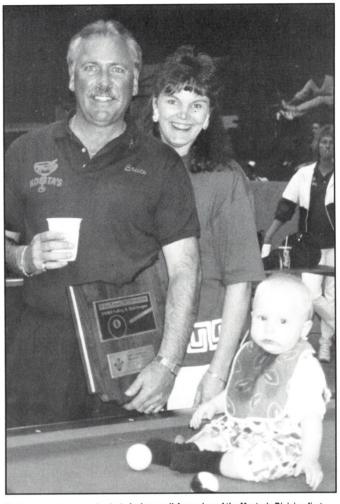

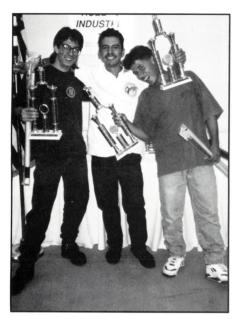

# Ticket-Dispensing Bill Changer

f easy promotions are a must in your game center, I have an idea that is easy to install, almost automatic, and can really boost your redemption game income.

What is this idea? Installing a ticket dispenser on your Standard Change-Makers bill changer and vending tickets for dollars. Your customers will get tokens or quarters and tickets for each dollar. Great idea, you say, but how is it done? First, let's get into the logistics of this idea, then I'll cover how to actually install it.

Most redemption games average a 20 to 30 percent ticket payout. A bill changer is different because it generates no income. So this idea is like giving away money since tickets are valued at about a penny each. This may not sound reasonable to you, but read on.

The idea is to "prime the pump"—to get your customers started in saving redemption tickets for the bigger, more valuable prizes. But to get the bigger prizes more tickets will be needed, so your redemption games will get played more.

You may be thinking that someone could come in with \$100 and "buy" the redemption prize they want. Sure, that's a possibility, but what are they going to do with 400 tokens? They'll play your games, buy your food, ride your cars and boats, and play miniature golf. Plus the repeat business will increase your overall profit, since the tokens can be used only at your game center.

Your redemption percentages will remain the same on a game-to-game basis, but the tickets redeemed will increase. And while you'll see an increase in the number of tickets "used," this increase is negligible.

Setting the ticket-to-dollar ratio is simple. Any combination you feel is appropriate will work. The settings I used were five tickets for \$1, 15 for \$5, 30 for a \$10, and 60 for \$20. Tokens were also vended with the tickets. The equivalent amount is based on one token equaling 25 cents (four-\$1, 20-\$5, 40-\$10, 80-\$20).

If you feel this is too much, then adjust the tickets or tokens for the ratio you feel comfortable with. It might include 10 tickets and three tokens for \$1. Again, any combination will work. If you use the above combination, your bill changer will

actually turn a profit of 15 cents for each dollar (one ticket equals one cent and one token equals 25 cents). The ideas are limitless!

How do you do this marvelous idea? First you will need a Standard Change-Makers bill changer series 500. This company makes a bill changer with a ticket dispenser already built in. If you are thinking of upgrading your bill changers, go with the one with a ticket dispenser. You don't have to use it, but it's there if you need it. Other bill changers might work, but I haven't tried them.

If you already have a four-hopper Standard changer, great. Standard also makes a two-hopper, pedestal or wall-mount changer, but there is no room to install the ticket dispenser or ticket bin inside.

Standard makes a board to interface the hopper input to a ticket dispenser. Yes, you will have to use one of the four hopper inputs for the ticket dispenser. The three other hoppers will be more than enough for tokens since each one holds more than 2,000.

The interface board is called a U.I.M. module (see photo #1). You

will need this as well as a ticket dispenser (I'd recommend Deltronic Labs' dispenser), a ticket dispenser cable, 12-volt power supply, and a ticket bin. All of the items are available from Standard Change-Makers and Deltronic Labs. The addresses are listed at the end of the article. A DL-1275-H ticket dispenser is used by Standard and sold by Deltronic Labs, but the DL-1275 will work just as well.

I used a black ticket dispenser front plate from Standard, but the stainless steel front plate from Deltronic labs may make a better and easier installation.

The 12-volt D.C. power supply needed is for the ticket dispenser. The hoppers all use 120 volts A.C. I used an old switching power supply, one in which the +5 volts was dead. I connected the main power for the power supply up to the hopper switch outlet. This way when the changer is out of service, there is no way the ticket dispenser will "free run" and yend tickets.

I mounted the ticket dispenser next to the token output tray (see photo #2). You will need to drill four mounting holes and a slot for the tickets into the metal of the bill changer. Since the changers have a quarter slot, there was no room on the door for the ticket dispenser.

I mounted the ticket bin with double-stick tape in the same position as the fourth hopper. Remember, the ticket dispenser is the same as a hopper! You can have one or the other, but not both. I used double-stick tape to avoid drilling more holes in the changer.

The U.I.M. module is mounted right under the programming keyboard. The threaded studs from the changer matched up perfectly with the U.I.M. module mounting holes.

The cable connected up to the U.I.M. module, the ticket dispenser, and the power supply very easily, since all the connectors

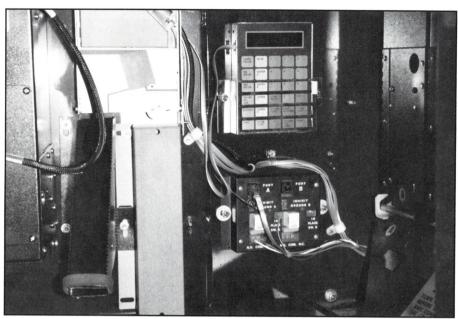

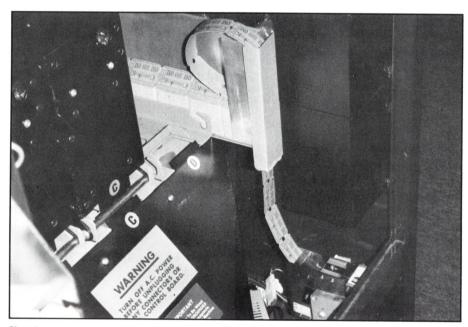

were complete with the cable. Be sure to ground both the U.I.M. module and the ticket dispenser. If your ground wires are not correct, or you don't run a ground wire at all, you will experience an intermittent out-of-order situation on your changer.

Programming the bill changer is simple. First you need to assign a value to the new ticket dispenser. I left the value at 25 cents, the same as it was for the fourth hopper. Next I set the hopper (in this case it was hopper D) to vend the correct number of tickets for each denomination of paper bill. The tokens dispensed from hoppers A, B, and C also had to be reprogrammed, since the changer was working with one less hopper.

One thing to keep in mind: the

ticket dispenser is the same as a token hopper. When the tickets run out it's the same as a hopper running out of tokens or quarters. The changer will display an "ERROR D" on the programming keyboard display if the changer is on when tickets are loaded. Also, power to the dispenser is turned off when this condition is present.

You cannot advance the tickets using the ticket-advance pushbutton when the changer is on. You might connect the power supply to the power outlet in the rear of the changer instead of the switched hopper power outlet. But the risk of "free run tickets" is more possible. You can also unplug the ticket dispenser when you reload tickets. Better yet, install a "ticket load" switch that will disconnect the ticket dispenser notch output from the U.I.M. module. The changer will never know what's going on.

The whole installation took about two hours and was not as hard as I expected. Standard Change-Makers also makes a U.I.M module for a card dispenser. You can then dispense a "frequent player" membership card for \$5.

The Part number for the ticketdispensing U.I.M. module is 05M00131; for the card dispenser module it's 05M00133; and 04C00123 for the power cable.

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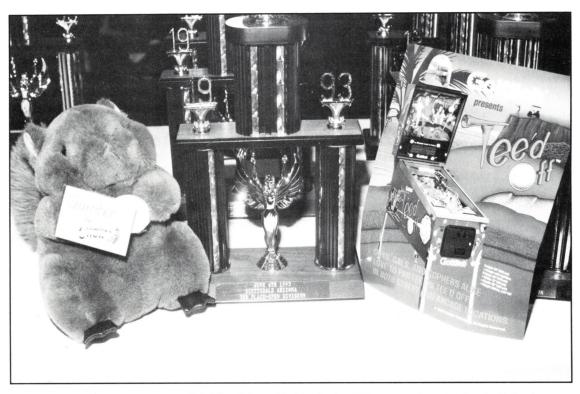




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### Premier's Tee'd Off



Although Tee'd Off didn't make it to the recent Pinball Show in Scottsdale, Ariz., Gunther did. He was seen all over the show, but his favorite spot was among the pinball tournament trophies. Maybe he thought they were for golf and wanted his!

ho is Gunther and why is he saying all those things about me? The answer, at least as far as Premier Technology's *Tee'd Off* goes, is: that's how he is programmed.

Premier's latest pin game revolves around one of the country's most popular, and frustrating, sports—golf. Gunther, the mechanical dancing gopher, sits on top of the game taunting players as they

try to complete golf shots and game objectives.

Tee'd Off features rounds and modes with tie-ins to familiar golfing terms. Players can pitch, putt, slice, hook, or score a hole-in-one. You can even get caught in bad weather (although in this case it's not really that bad since it's raining cats and dogs!).

A popular television event is the Skins Game. *Tee'd Off*'s version in-

volves a very interesting but dangerous twist. Dangerous? How can pinball be dangerous?

When the player completes the word "SKINS" during the spell skins round, he is given a choice. Choosing the Skins Game is where the danger lurks. At the beginning of this timed round, the game flashes the three left targets. Completing them before time expires will double the player's entire score. That certainly doesn't sound very dangerous, does it? Well, here's the scary part: failing to complete the targets resets the score to zero!

There's a way out, though. The Mean Hole green target lights up to allow the player to recover the lost score. This chance remains active until the player's score passes the lost value or the ball is lost. What a heartbreak to see your entire score wiped out! But what a challenge to fight to get it back.

# Simulators a welcome break from fighters

ajor video game manufacturers seem to be listening to the playing public because the ratio of fighting games to other types of games is decreasing. This trend is extremely pleasing to us and will be beneficial to the industry.

There are countless other themes to be explored and game formats to be used. The problem is that many companies use only one format for non-fighting games: impressive but costly simulators.

While simulators take the industry in a positive direction, there are some difficulties. The sheer size of these games often precludes placement in the average street location, and therefore makes them suitable solely for large, modern arcades or shopping malls. The donut shop or convenience store locations are just as important as their larger counterparts. Along with size restrictions come financial barriers—some simulators can cost more than family cars.

Such games must also be set at a higher price-per-play to make the game profitable. Higher cost discourages some players from sampling the simulators and leads them

back to the less expensive (pe. play) fighting games. Simulators could even have a psychological effect on younger players, overwhelming them with the complexity of the controls and the size of the machines.

What's the solution? Perhaps manufacturers should make more non-fighting-themed kits for normal size dedicated cabinets. Recent games such as Irem's *In the*  Hunt and Atari's World Rally are good examples of this alternative.

Now for a look at three enjoyable videos in the simulator category:

#### **World Rally**

Game licensing is often a risky move for an industry leader such as Atari. *Knuckle Bash*, Atari's previous licensed video, made no waves in the sea of fighting games. But now the company has released *World Rally*, a universal kit continuing the always popular theme of race driving. The digitized, true-to-life graphics of the car and scenery deliver a realistic challenge.

It's funny how a video game can make a player turn serious and dedicate himself to completing the mission before him, as if he had more to lose than a quarter.

World Rally differs from other games of this sort in several ways:

1) the player views his car from a third-person perspective, as though in a low-flying helicopter following the course; 2) there are no opponents in the game, instead the player races against time; and 3) the player does not choose from many different cars but uses a modified Toyota Celica to negotiate the track.

# **DLAYER'S PERSPECTIVE**

By using a steering wheel, twospeed shifter, and the accelerator pedal, the player drives his car through the course to reach the goal in the 60 seconds allowed.

One of four courses can be chosen, each harder than the last: Monte Carlo, the Acropolis, San Remo, and 1,000 Lakes (ranging from easiest to hardest). All courses have three tracks with varying terrain, such as snow and mud. Multiple obstacles, in the form of ramps and logs, and the challenge of night driving await the player.

The computer warns of upcoming obstacles and turns, and a distance meter at the top of the screen displays the remaining length of the course. World Rally is suitable for any location and should do well as a rare commodity—a driving kit.

## Title Fight

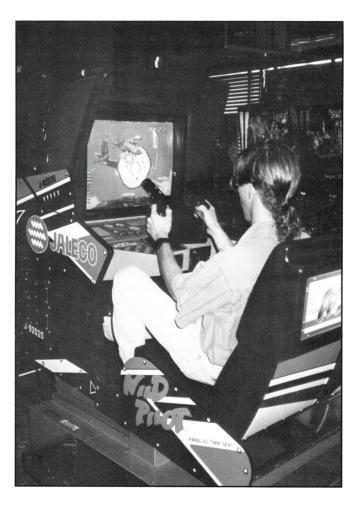
Sega is rapidly becoming the king of simulation games with the technological breakthrough of *Virtua Racing*, followed by *OutRunners*, *Air Combat*, and the current boxing-themed *Title Fight*.

The huge, dual-monitor dedicated cabinet makes use of controllers never seen before. Two short joystick grips with wraparound hand guards imitate boxing gloves and allow the player to simulate punching by pushing forward, or guarding by pulling inward.

The fighter is viewed in outline only; the player sees through him as in Nintendo's *Punch-Out!!*. This viewpoint is probably used to allow characters to dodge blows easier than in a first-person perspective.

Opponents react to successful strikes and actually start to show signs of abuse. If the player is knocked down, the screen becomes wavy and the referee is seen leaning over while counting to 10. Spinning the glove joysticks renews power and the fighter can stand to battle his opponent again.

The voice simulation, crowd participation, announcer and referee actions, and colorful boxers enhance the mood of the game and lend the right touch of realism. Game play is a bit limited and may not hold the player's interest for an extended period of time. *Title Fight*'s size and appearance make it a good arcade piece.

#### Wild Pilot

Jaleco's games tend to be firstperson simulators such as *Cisco Heat*, the high speed police chase through California's hilly city. *Wild Pilot* takes players into the clouds for a furious battle above city skyscrapers and water.

The large dedicated cabinet rocks and sways to the movement on the screen as the player pilots

his World War I biplane through modern-day dogfights. The plane is equipped with two machine guns controlled by two players. Occasionally, rockets can be acquired to eliminate everything on the screen.

The plane's flight path is controlled by the computer, so players need only worry about firing the weapons. Enemies launch missiles, which must be destroyed before they reach the player.

Although the graphics are impressive, the game is crowded with opponents and the screen a bit jumbled. The cabinet's movement is a tad jerky; it should flow and sway more smoothly to simulate flight. Wild Pilot's size may limit its location placement, but it is fun and a lot like an amusement park ride.



# Sencore's Super Scope!

or the past two months, my column in Play Meter has focused on how to use an oscilloscope to view and measure all types of electronic signals. As you recall, after going through the procedure of obtaining a stable display on an oscilloscope, you're only half finished. You still have to count graticule divisions (and subdivisions) and do the math required to obtain the exact voltage, frequency, or timebase of the signal you're viewing.

Needless to say, this is a timeconsuming hassle that also leaves the troubleshooting procedure wide open to all kinds of human error. As a technician, math is not my strong point; electronics is what I do best. Wouldn't it be nice if there was a way to use an oscilloscope without doing all the math? As long as I'm dreaming, I might as well dream of an oscilloscope that will automatically synchronize and display the signals without having to mess around with the vertical, horizontal, and trigger adjustments every time I move the probe to another point in the circuit.

If you're ready to make the big move and invest in an oscilloscope, you'll want to consider the Sencore SC3100 Autotracker. The SC3100 is such an amazing piece of test equipment that Sencore doesn't

even refer to it as an oscilloscope. Instead, it's called an "Automatic Waveform & Circuit Analyzer."

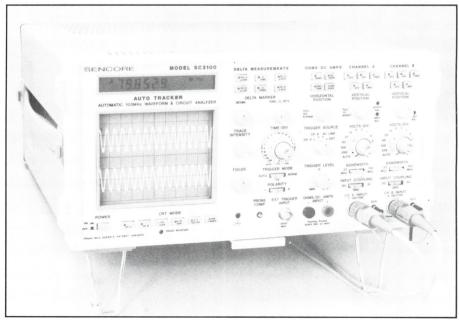
This extraordinary piece of servicing equipment has so many interesting features that I want you to just sit back, relax, and let me tell you about them. In a nutshell, however, the Autotracker selects the proper settings for volts/div and sec/div, automatically displaying two complete cycles of a periodic waveform. No knobs to tweak or buttons to push. You just move the probe from point to point in the circuit and the SC3100 does the rest. At the same time, a digital display located just above the CRT gives

you a readout of DC volts, AC volts, frequency or time period. There's even a built-in ohmeter! I swear, the thing does everything but make the coffee (although I hear that's going to be offered as an option sometime in '95!).

#### Operation

The operation of the SC3100's CRT display section is identical to that of a standard oscilloscope. The vertical and horizontal controls are calibrated to allow CRT analog measurements of signals just as we have seen in the June and July issues of Play Meter.

However, most of your measurements will be made using the digi-



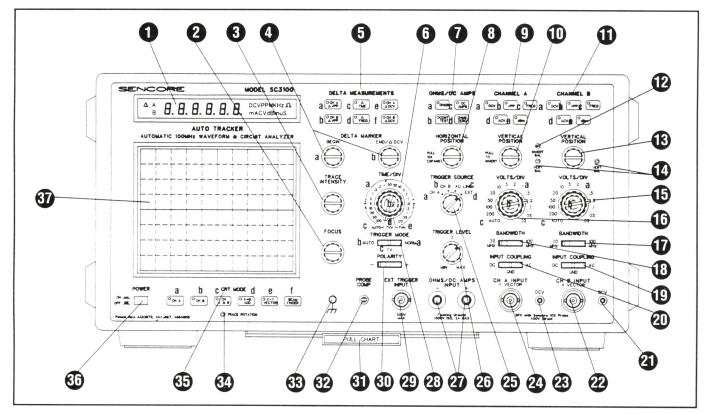


Figure 1: front panel controls and features

tal readout. The Waveform & Circuit Analyzer's digital functions give results that are faster, more accurate and subject to much less operator error than conventional analog oscilloscope measurements.

Let's start by taking a look at the controls. Refer to figure 1.

- 1. DIGITAL READOUT—provides a readout of any of the delta measurements (5), OHMS/DC Amps (7), channel A digital tests (9), or channel B digital tests (11) functions. The correct decimal placement and annunciators to indicate the channel, function, and range are automatically displayed.
- 2. FOCUS—adjust for sharpest trace on CRT display (37).
- 3. INTENSITY—determines brightness of CRT trace.
- 4. DELTA MARKER CONTROLS—use with the delta measurements buttons (5) to position the intensified delta measurement bar on the waveform.

- a. & b.) BEGIN & END—controls automatically exchange function if the delta bar end is positioned before the beginning.
- b.) END/DDCV—adjusts the intensified point when the Delta DCV functions are selected (5e & f).
- 5. DELTA MEASUREMENTS—selects the parameter that is measured by the delta bar. Readings are displayed in the digital readout (1).
  - a.) CH A  $\triangle$  PPV—measures the peak-to-peak voltage of the intensified portion of the channel A waveform.
  - b.) CH B  $\triangle$  PPV—measures the peak-to-peak voltage of the intensified portion of the channel B waveform.
  - c.) TIME—measures the time duration of the delta bar for either the channel A or channel B waveform.
  - d.)  $\triangle$  FREQ—converts the time duration of the delta bar to the approximate frequency.

- e.) CH A DELTA DCV—measures the instantaneous voltage to ground of the intensified point on the channel A waveform. Use with the delta DC marker control (5b).
- f.) CH B DELTA DCV—measures the instantaneous voltage to ground of the intensified point on the channel B waveform. Use with the delta DC marker controls (5b).
- 6. TIMEBASE—sets the sweep speed at which the CRT beam moves horizontally across the CRT. Controls do not affect the digital measurements.
  - a.) TIME/DIV—selects the time value for one major CRT division.
  - b.) VERNIER—allows the sweep speed to be varied within the major steps selected by the TIME/DIV Control.
  - c.) AUTO—allows the microprocessor to automatically select the sweep speed needed to dis-

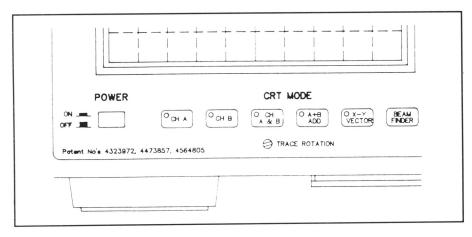

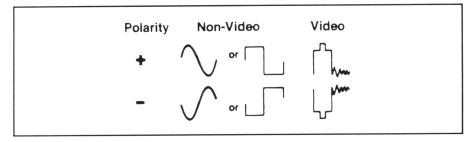


Figure 3: the trigger polarity switch determines whether the trigger circuits use the rising or falling signal transition.

play 2 to 5 cycles.

- d.) TVV VIDEO PRESET—displays two vertical fields of composite video and automatically selects video sync separators.
- e.) TVH VIDEO PRESET—displays two horizontal lines of composite video and automatically selects video sync separators.
- 7. OHMS/DC AMPS—use with the OHMS/DC AMPS input (27) and DVM test leads to measure circuit parameters. Readings are displayed in the digital readout (1).
  - a.) OHMS—select to measure resistance values up to 100 megohms.
  - b.) CONT TEST—provides a near-instantaneous audible tone indication of continuity and digital readout of resistance values to  $210~\Omega$ .
  - c.) DC AMPS—select to measure DC current.
  - d.) OHMS ZERO—push when either the OHMS or CONT TEST (7a or b) is selected and the test

- leads are shorted together to zero out the internal and test lead resistances.
- 8. HORIZ POSITION/IOX EX-PAND CONTROL—use to adjust the horizontal position of the CRT trace. Pull to expand the CRT display horizontally by a factor of 10.
- 9. CHANNEL A AUTO-TRACK-ING TEST BUTTONS—selects the measured parameter of the waveform applied to the CH A IN-PUT Jack (24).
  - a.) DCV—measures the average DC voltage.
  - b.) VPP—measures the peak-to-peak voltage.
  - c.) FREQ-measures the frequency.
  - d.) ACV—measures the RMS AC voltage.
  - e.) dBm—measures the dBm voltage level.
- 10. VERTICAL POSITION (CH A)—determines vertical position of the channel A trace. Pull knob to invert the polarity.
  - 11. CHANNEL BAUTO TRACK-

ING TESTS—selects the measured parameter of the waveform applied to the CH B INPUT Jack (22).

- a.) DCV—measures the average DC voltage.
- b.) VPP measures the peak-to-peak voltage.
- c.) FREQ—measures the frequency.
- d.) ACV— measures the RMS AC voltage.
- e.) dBm— measures the dm voltage level.
- 12. INVERT BAL—calibrates the channel A invert amplifier for the same DC reference level for inverted and noninverted displays.
- 13. VERTICAL POSITION (CH B)—determines the vertical position of the channel B trace.
- 14. VERT BAL (Channels A & B)—calibrates the input circuits for the same DC reference level for each setting of the VOLTS/DIV switch.
- 15. VOLTS/DIV (CH B)—selects the vertical deflection factor for the channel B CRT waveform display and the range for the VPP readings.
  - a.) VOLTS/DIV Control—sets the voltage value for one major CRT division.
  - b.) VERTICAL VERNIER—allows the vertical deflection to be varied within the major steps selected by the VOLTS/DIV Control. Does not affect the digital measurements.
  - c.) AUTO—Allows the microprocessor to automatically select the VOLTS/DIV range needed to display 2 to 4 divisions of deflection.
- 16. VOLTS/DIV (CH A)—selects the vertical deflection factor for the channel A CRT waveform display and the range for the VPP readings.
  - a.) VOLTS/DIV CONTROL—selects the voltage value for one major CRT division.
  - b.) VERTICAL VERNIER—allows the vertical deflection to be varied within the major steps

selected by the VOLTS/DIV Control. Does not affect the digital measurements.

c.) AUTO—allows the microprocessor to automatically select the VOLTS/DIV range needed to display 2 to 4 divisions of deflection.

17. BANDWIDTH (CH B)—determines the bandwidth of the signal applied to the CRT, digital meter and trigger circuits from the CH B INPUT Jack (22).

18. BANDWIDTH (CH A)—determines the bandwidth of the signal applied to the CRT, digital meter, and trigger circuits from the CH A INPUT Jack (24).

19. INPUT COUPLING (CH B)—selects DC or AC input coupling, or ground reference of the signal applied to the CH B INPUT Jack (22).

20. INPUT COUPLING (CH A)—selects DC or AC input coupling, or ground reference of the signal applied to the CH A INPUT Jack (24).

21. DCV Jack (CH B)—input routes DC signals around the channel B input coupling switch (19) to allow DC measurements while CRT is AC coupled.

22. CH B INPUT Jack—supplies signals for all channel B tests except DCV.

23. DCV Jack (CH A)—input routes DC signals around the channel A INPUT COUPLING switch (20) to allow DC measurements while CRT is AC coupled.

24. CH A INPUT Jack—supplies signals for all channel A tests except DCV.

25. TRIGGER SOURCE—selects signal source that is used to trigger the sweep circuits.

a.) CH A—selects the signal applied to the CH A INPUT (24).

b.) CH B—selects the signal applied to the CH B INPUT (22).

c.) AC LINE—locks the trigger circuits to the 60 Hz AC line.

d.) EXT—selects the signal applied to the EXT trigger input jack (29).

26. TRIGGER LEVEL-deter-

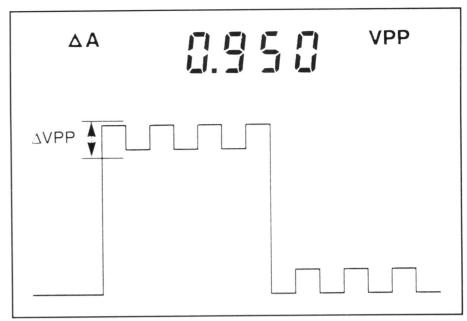


Figure 4: the delta VPP function measures the peak-to-peak voltage of the selected waveform portion.

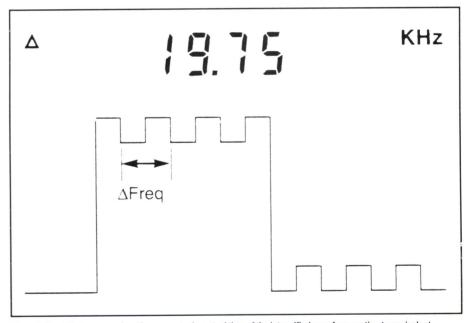


Figure 5: the delta frequency function converts the actual time of the intensified waveform portion to equivalent frequency.

mines the amplitude of the input signal that triggers the trigger circuits. The trigger circuits will trigger at the center of a symmetrical waveform when set to "0". The "+" and "-" areas indicate amplitude change only, not trigger polarity.

27. OHMS/DC AMPS INPUT provides a connection for the DVM TEST LEADS to make ohms and DC current measurements. 28. TRIGGER MODE—selects three different options for triggering the waveform.

a.) NORM—produces a trace only when the triggering circuits are locked to the incoming signal selected by the trigger source switch (25).

b.) AUTO—produces a trace at all times.

c.) TV-selects special sync sep-

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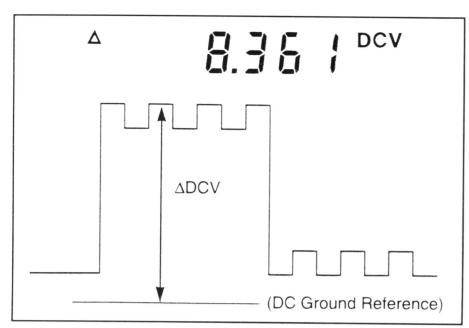


Figure 6: use the delta DCV function to measure the instantaneous voltage level of a point on a waveform.

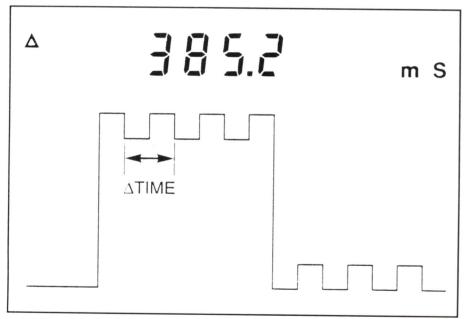


Figure 7: the delta time function measures the actual time of the intensified waveform portion.

arators to trigger on the sync pulses of composite video signals. Automatically selects vertical sync for "msec" sweep speeds and horizontal sync pulses for "microsecond" sweep speeds.

29. EXT TRIG INPUT Jack—allows an external trigger signal to be used when the trigger source switch (25) is set to "EXT".

30. TRIGGER POLARITY-sets

the trigger circuits to trigger on either the positive (+) or negative (-) transition of the incoming signal. The polarity refers to the sync pulse polarity of video signals.

31. PULL CHART—provides simplified operation instructions.

32. PROBE COMP—provides square wave signal for compensating the 10X low capacity probes.

33. GROUND Jack—provides a connection to use the black DVM

TEST LEAD for grounding and DC measurements

34. TRACE ROTATOR—electrically positions the trace to compensate for different magnetic field conditions. Adjust so that the CRT trace is parallel to the horizontal lines etched on the CRT.

35. CRT DISPLAY MODE BUTTONS—use to select the trace display mode on the CRT.

a.) CH A—displays a single trace of the CH A INPUT (24). Press together with CH B Button for A & B dual alternate display.

b.) CH B—displays a single trace of the CH B INPUT (22). Press together with CH A Button for A & B dual alternate display.

c.) A & B—displays both the channel A & B traces. Dual chop display is selected when the TIMEBASE TIME/DIV control (6a) is set between 100 and .1 msec. Dual alternate operation occurs between 50 and .02 msec. Select dual alternate mode for slower sweep rates by pushing the CH A and the CH B CRT display mode buttons simultaneously.

d.) A+B ADD—provides a single trace display showing the algebraic sum of the CH A and CH B input signals.

e.) X-Y VECTOR—selects X-Y operation. The CH A INPUT Jack (24) provides vertical deflection and the CH B INPUT Jack (22) provides horizontal deflection. f.) BEAM FINDER—press to locate the relative position of the trace(s).

36. POWER—push in to apply AC power; push and release to remove power.

#### Simplified CRT setup

The controls on the front panel are grouped according to their function. To display and lock in a waveform on the CRT simply move from right to left across the front panel performing these steps: 1. Apply the signal. 2. Adjust the trigger controls. 3. Adjust the horizon-

tal sweep controls.

Follow the above steps whenever you apply a new signal or experience difficulty locking a waveform.:

To obtain a waveform display on the CRT:

- 1. Push the POWER button.
- 2. Press the desired CRT MODE button to produce a single trace, dual-trace, or vector display.
- 3. Apply the signal to the vertical input:
  - a.) Connect the 10X low capacity probe to the INPUT Jack of the desired channel.
  - b.) Connect the 10X low capacity probe to the signal.
  - c.) Set the input coupling switch to "AC".
  - d.) Set the VOLTS/DIV switch to "AUTO" or set it to produce a display that is 4 to 6 CRT graticules high.
- 4. Adjust the trigger controls to lock the waveform:
  - a.) SOURCE to match the input channel to the desired reference channel.
  - b.) MODE to "Auto." Use "TV" for composite video signals.
  - c.) POLARITY to the desired polarity. Set to match the sync polarity for composite video.
  - d.) Adjust LEVEL to lock the trace.
- 5. Adjust the TIMEBASE Control to "AUTO" or set for the desired number of cycles.
- 6. Adjust the vertical position, horizontal position, focus, and intensity controls as desired for the best waveform display.

# Locating the trace with the beam finder

Naturally, the SC3100 has a "beam finder." When you can't see the trace because one or more of the CRT controls is improperly set, use the beam finder to help you locate the trace. Pressing the BEAM FINDER button overrides four controls or circuits: 1) The intensity is increased, 2) "AUTO" trigger mode is selected, 3) The

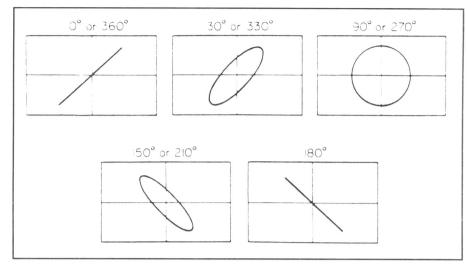


Figure 8: the vector mode shows phase relations.

gain of the vertical amplifiers is reduced to bring the trace onto the CRT screen no matter where the vertical position controls are set, and 4) The gain of the horizontal amplifier is reduced. These four conditions will force the trace onto the screen no matter where the front panel controls are setting. The location of the trace(s) on the CRT when you push the BEAM FINDER button tells you what to do next to obtain a visible trace.

#### **CRT** modes

The SC3100 has six different CRT display modes which are selected by the four CRT push buttons located below the CRT (see figure 2). The display options are: 1) Channel A single trace; 2) Channel B single trace; 3) Channel A & B dual chop; 4) Channel A & B dual alternate; 5) Channel A + B add; and 6) X-Y Vector.

## Channel A or B single trace

Signals applied to the channel A and channel B inputs may be displayed independently. Press the CHA or the CHB button to display the desired signal. A signal applied to one channel will not affect the signal that is displayed on the other channel.

The channel A trace may be inverted by pulling out the channel A vertical position control. The inver-

sion affects only the displayed waveform. The triggering polarity of the inverted signal does not change when channel A is inverted.

#### Dual trace

Press the "A&B" button to view both waveforms simultaneously. The SC3100 automatically selects between dual chop display mode or dual alternate display mode depending on the setting of the TIME/DIV Control. All of the sweep rates between "100 msec" and ".2 msec" produce the dual chop mode. Dual chop means that the CRT electron beam draws portions of each trace as it moves across the CRT. This reduces flicker at the slow sweep speeds. The sweep speeds from ".1 microsecond" to .02 microsecond" produce the dual alternate mode. In the dual alternate mode, the electron beam draws the complete trace for one channel and then draws the complete trace for the other channel. This prevents the traces from appearing segmented.

At times the dual chop mode may cause interference in the trace at the "msec" sweep speeds. This interference is common with all dual-trace oscilloscopes and is caused by the CRT beam quickly moving between the channel A and B

traces. The interference only becomes noticeable when the frequency of the input signal is at or close to a multiple of the chopping frequency. If this interference occurs, place the SC3100 into the dual alternate mode by simultaneously pressing the CH A and CH B CRT MODE buttons so that both LEDs are lit.

# Algebraic addition or subtraction (A + B or B-A)

Some applications require two signals to be added to form a composite, or subtracted to show the difference of two signals. Press the "A+B ADD" CRT mode button to algebraically add the two signals. To subtract the signals, press the "A+B ADD" button and pull the channel A vertical position control out to invert the channel A display.

The phase relationship of the signals determines whether the resulting waveform is larger or smaller in amplitude than the applied signals. If the signals are in phase, adding them will increase the size of the displayed waveform and subtracting them will produce a waveform that is either smaller than either of the applied signals or that shows total cancellation. If the two signals are 180° out of phase, the opposite occurs. Adding produces cancellation and subtracting causes an increase in the resulting waveform. The resulting display of signals having phase shifts other than 0° or 18° will be their instantaneous sum or difference.

#### Vector (X-Y) operation

Press the "X-Y vector" CRT mode button to use the CRT as an X-Y display. In the vector mode, the signal applied to the channel A input causes vertical (Y) deflection and the signal applied to the channel B input causes horizontal (X) deflection. The resulting "Lissajous" pattern shows the phase and frequency relationships of the two signals.

The vertical gain is controlled by the channel A VOLTS/DIV control

and the channel A vertical position control adjusts the pattern's vertical position. Use the channel B VOLTS/DIV control to set the horizontal gain and the horizontal position control to adjust the horizontal position. The channel B vertical position control has no effect when the vector function is selected.

### Connecting to a hot chassis

As with other oscilloscopes, the BNC input connectors, probe ground leads, and front panel ground jack of the SC3100 are connected to the AC line third wire safety ground. This requires caution when you connect to a "hot chassis" piece of equipment. A hot chassis is a device that does not have an internal isolation transformer. In coin-op repair, we typically encounter a hot chassis in monitors and on the primary side of switching regulator power supplies.

Always connect a hot chassis to an isolation transformer before connecting the SC3100 to the unit under test. The isolation transformer allows the hot chassis to float in reference to earth ground. Connecting the ground of the SC3100 to the hot chassis without isolation will damage the chassis power supply or the ground connections in the SC3100. Only connect the chassis to the isolation transformer. Do not connect the isolation SC3100 to the transformer.

NOTE: Using an external transformer with a device that contains internal isolation will not cause a problem. If in doubt, always use an isolation transformer!

#### 10X low capacity probe

Most measurements are made using the supplied 39G292 10X Low Capacity Probes. These probes isolate the capacitance of the test lead and the input circuits from the circuit test point. This reduces circuit loading and the resulting measurement errors. The special design of the 39G292 Probe pro-

tects the SC3100 to 2000 volts DC or AC peak-to-peak. The 39G292 Probe also provides a separate isolated circuit for making DC voltage measurements independent of the CRT input controls.

The only disadvantage of using the 10X Low Capacity Probe is reduced sensitivity. The 10X Probe limits the lowest measuring range of the SC3100 to 20 mV/div. This allows useful measurement of signals as small as 10 millivolts (.010 volts) which is adequate for most circuit tests.

You can read the digital tests direct and use the markings around the VOLTS/DIV control directly when using the 10X Probes with the SC3100. You do not need to multiply readings by ten as you do with some other oscilloscopes.

# Special design of the 39G292 10X probe

The 39G292 10X Low Capacity Probe is specially designed to route the DC voltage to digital circuits separately from the CRT or digital peak-to-peak function. You do not need to have the input coupling switch set to "DC" to measure DC voltage on the digital display.

These separate paths require two connections to the SC3100. The BNC connector couples the signal to the CRT and digital VPP circuits while the mini-banana DCV jack couples the DC voltage to the digital display.

The probe contains separate 10:1 dividers for the DC digital display measurement path and for the CRT/VPP measurement path. This prevents loading problems caused by the capacitance of the DC lead. The input impedance of the CRT circuits at the BNC input jack without the probe connected is 1 megohm DC coupled and 2 megohms AC coupled. The impedance at the DCV input jack is 1:5 megohms.

Connecting the 10X Probe to the inputs increases both input impedance values by ten, making the

AC impedance 10 megohms and the DC input impedance 15 megohms. The circuit test point, however, sees both of these measuring paths in parallel, which effectively make the impedance at the probe tip 6 megohms. While this is a somewhat lower impedance than most oscilloscopes, very few circuits will be affected by the 6 megohm impedance. If circuit loading is a problem you can disconnect the DCV lead from the DCV input jack to increase the input impedance to 10 megohms.

The supplied 10X Probe Accessory Kit contains two yellow and two red Probe ID Bands. You can place one band around the probe wire near the tip and the other band of the same color around the wire near the BNC end. Color coding each probe allows you to quickly know which probe is connected to each input without tracing the wires back to the probe tip.

Unscrewing the retractable probe tip exposes a metal ground ring. This ground ring may accidentally short against components and IC pins if you are using the needle tip. The supplied probe accessory kit includes a ground insulator ring that slips over the probe tip and covers up the exposed metal when you use the needle tip.

#### Probe frequency compensation

Because 10X probes form an AC voltage divider with the scope input, the impedance of the probe must be set to match the impedance of the oscilloscope input. The 10X Lo Capacity Probes supplied with the SC3100 have a small trimmer capacitor built into the BNC connector body. In order to obtain a fiat frequency response this compensation capacitor must be adjusted to match the probe capacitance to the capacitance at the input jack.

Once you have compensated the probe, check the compensation periodically to ensure the probes are still properly matched to the SC3100 input. An uncompensated probe may result in waveform distortion or incorrect amplitude readings. The compensation affects both the CRT display and the digital peak-to-peak function.

To compensate the probes:

- 1. Connect the probes to the PROBE COMP Jack.
- 2. Set the VOLTS/DIV control for both channels to ".5".
- 3. Set the TIME/DIV Control to ".1 msec".
- 4. Lock in the waveform with the TRIGGER controls.
  - 5. Select the channel A display.
- 6. Adjust the probe compensation capacitor in the probe connection to the CH A INPUT for the best square wave.
- 7. Repeat steps 5 and 6 for the channel B probe.

NOTE: Recompensate the probe if you move it to another input channel.

NOTE: The PROBE COMP signal has square edges but may not be 50Ç duty cycle. Do not use the PROBE COMP signal as a frequency or amplitude calibration.

#### Vertical CRT display

The vertical CRT display section of the SC3100 functions like other oscilloscopes to provide a visual display of the signal applied to the input channels. This section explains how to obtain a locked in waveform on the CRT.

NOTE: The Auto-Tracking measurements can be made without displaying the waveform.

#### Selecting AC or DC coupling

As we saw in the June issue of Play Meter, the input coupling switch selects how the signal is coupled to the vertical circuits. When the switch is in the "DC" position, any change in the average DC level applied to the input will cause the trace to move vertically by an amount proportional to the DC voltage. This is important when you need to view the sum of the AC and DC components of the signal.

But this trace shifting may be annoying when the DC component is not important or when the DC voltage is being monitored with the Auto-Tracking digital DCV readout. You can use AC coupling for many tests. In this mode, a capacitor is connected in series with the input circuits to block the DC component. This allows the trace to stay at the same vertical position on the CRT as the DC voltage changes or as the probe is moved to different test points. Remember. the cool thing about the SC3100 is that the readout will always tell you what the DC voltage is, regardless of the input coupling. The input coupling switch may be in any position when making any of the digital readout measurements.

#### Setting the vertical size

The VOLTS/DIV switch controls the amplitude (vertical size) of the displayed waveform by adjusting the amount of gain or attenuation of the vertical circuits in fixed steps. The role of the VOLTS/DIV switch is greatly diminished in most of SC3100's applications compared to conventional analog oscilloscopes. This is because the Waveform & Circuit Analyzer's digital display provides a faster and much more accurate measurement-direct readout of all voltages.

For most applications you simply set the VOLTS/DIV switch for the desired amount of vertical detail or until you see the entire waveform displayed on the CRT. Turning the VOLTS/DIV switch clockwise will increase the amplitude of the displayed waveform, while turning it counterclockwise decreases the amplitude. Calibrated voltage markings around the switch allow you to match alignment instructions and waveform displays in service literature.

A variable vernier ("CAL") control located in the center of the VOLTS/DIV switch allows you to "fine-tune" the waveform's amplitude. The setting of the vernier con-

trol does not matter (it does not need to be in the cal position) when using any of the digital display measurements. However, it must be turned fully clockwise to the calibrated detent position if you are making CRT-based measurements. The CRT is calibrated for direct readings when using the supplied 39G292 10X low capacity probes. The digital meter circuits automatically compensate and read direct when either a 10X or direct probe is used.

#### Autoranging

This is one of the neatest features of the Autotracker. When the VOLTS/DIV switch is set to the "Auto" position, the SC3100 automatically selects the range needed to produce a display that is approximately 3 vertical divisions tall. The ranges that are automatically selected are the same as those avail-

able by manually turning the VOLTS/DIV switch. The amplitude of the display will vary between 2 and 4 divisions depending on the range that is selected. The vertical vernier control is not automatically adjusted in "Auto" and may be used manually to fine-tune the size of the waveform display.

NOTE: Signals that are larger than 800 volts peak-to-peak will result in a display that is larger than 4 divisions. But you wouldn't be silly enough to 'scope something greater than 800 volts, would you?

The SC3100 will autorange to follow the input signal as you move between test points. You will, however, need to adjust the VERTICAL POSITION control to position the trace on the screen.

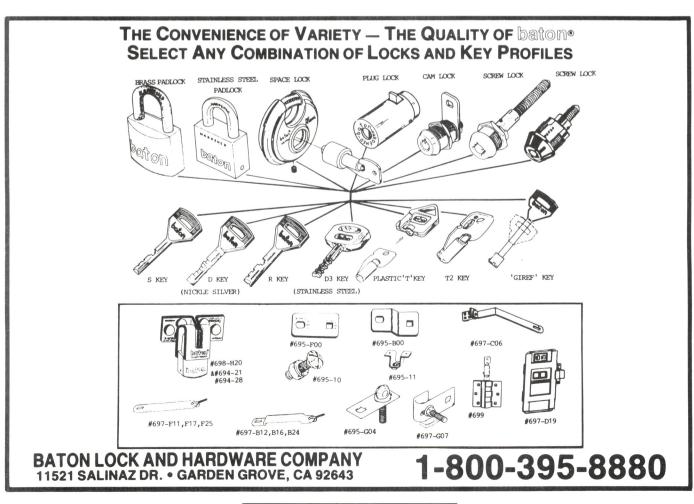
Excellent Service Tip: if you select "AC" INPUT COUPLING when using "Auto" VOLTS/DIV,

the DC component of the signal does not move the waveform as you move between test points. You can probe a half-dozen test points in the time it would take you set up for just one using conventional scoping techniques.

#### Vertical position

Use the channel A and channel B vertical position controls to position the trace(s) at any desired location on the CRT. If the input coupling switch is set to "DC" you may need to reposition the trace each time you move to a new test point. Unless the DC component is important, leave the INPUT COUPLING switch set to "AC" so that you do not need to reposition the trace as you probe different test points.

The channel A vertical position control also contains a switch to invert the channel A display. Pull the control outward to invert the dis-



play and push the control in for a normal display.

#### Bandwidth switch

The bandwidth switch allows you to select the frequency range of the signal applied to the CRT and digital measuring circuits. The "100 MHz" position allows the full bandwidth of the SC3100 and is used for most signals.

The "20 MHz" position attenuates all signals above approximately 20 MHz. Use this position to prevent high frequency noise from causing interference with measurements and waveform displays. This position is especially useful to eliminate interference when using the most sensitive (.02 to .1) attenuator settings.

NOTE: The "20 MHz" bandwidth position may attenuate or completely filter out fast glitches and transients. Use the "100 MHz"

bandwidth position when looking for fast signal transitions and frequencies above 5 MHz.

#### Setting the trigger circuits

The trigger circuits reference the horizontal sweep circuits to the input signal to provide a stable, locked-in waveform display. The trace is stable (in sync) when each successive horizontal sweep starts at the exact same point on the signal. The waveform may jitter or "run" if the trigger adjustments are improperly set.

#### Trigger adjustments

Four adjustments are used to obtain a stable trace on the SC3100. They are listed in the order in which you should set them when locking in a waveform.

#### Trigger source

The trigger source control determines to which input the CRT display is referenced. Usually you will

trigger on the same signal that is applied to the vertical amplifiers. A few special tests require referencing the sweep circuits to the AC line frequency or to an external signal.

CH A and CH B reference the sweep circuits to the signal applied to the channel A or B inputs. These two positions are used for most waveform measurements. There are two general rules to follow when using these references:

- 1. When viewing only one trace set the TRIGGER SOURCE to the channel you are viewing.
- 2. If you are viewing both channels set the TRIGGER SOURCE to the channel that gives the most stable reference. If the two signals are different frequencies select the channel that contains the lowest frequency.

AC LINE locks the sweep circuits

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to the 60 Hz AC line signal. You may want to use this trigger source when troubleshooting 60 Hz power supplies or isolating power supply ripple. If you suspect a test point contains AC ripple, set the TRIGGER SOURCE Switch to "AC Line" and set the TIME/DIV switch to "1 msec." Ripple will remain stationary on the CRT while all other signals will be out of sync.

NOTE: Don't use "AC Line" TRIGGER SOURCE viewing video signals. The vertical video sweep rate is not referenced to the AC line and the waveform will not lock.

External references the sweep circuits to a signal applied to the EXT TRIG INPUT Jack. Referencing both CRT traces to a third signal is useful for certain applications, such as viewing what happens after a particular event or trigger pulse occurs.

#### Trigger mode

The trigger mode switch selects one of three types of triggering: "Auto," "TV," or "Norm." Many measurements will be made using the "Auto" trigger mode. The "Norm" and "TV" positions provide stable triggering for special signal applications.

AUTO (automatic) provides a trace whether or not the trigger circuits are locked to a reference signal. This mode provides a trace at all times to simplify setting the remaining trigger and CRT controls.

You can use this trigger mode to view all waveforms except video signals and low repetition rate signals. Use "TV" for video waveforms and "Norm" for low repetition rate signals.

NOTE: Do not confuse "auto" TRIGGER MODE with the autorange functions. You must properly set all of the trigger controls when "Auto" TRIGGER MODE is selected.

"TV" switches sync separators into the trigger circuits to provide stable triggering on composite video signals. The trigger circuits are referenced to either the horizontal sync pulses or the vertical sync pulses depending on the setting of the TIME/DIV switch. All "msec" sweep speeds reference vertical sync while all "microsecond" sweep speeds reference the horizontal sync pulses. The TRIGGER POLARITY Switch must be set to match the polarity of the video sync pulse when using TV trigger mode (see figure 3).

NOTE: It is not necessary to have the TRIGGER MODE set to "TV" when using the video preset positions of the TIME/DIV switch.

NORM (normal) produces a trace only when the trigger circuits receive a large enough amplitude signal, as controlled by the TRIGGER "Level" and VOLTS/DIV Controls. The CRT will remain blank until a trigger pulse occurs. The normal trigger mode can be used to trigger on all waveforms, except video signals. Use the normal mode to view low repetition rate signals that are unstable when viewed in the "Auto" mode.

In the "Auto" TRIGGER MODE the sweep circuits keep the electron beam from scanning across the screen for a short time while they wait for a trigger pulse. But, if no trigger pulse occurs, the circuits automatically start the electron beam across the screen. The repetition rate of most signals is fast enough so that the trigger pulse occurs before the trace starts. The repetition rate of a few signals, however, is slow enough so that the trace has already moved part way across the screen before the signal transition occurs. This causes the displayed waveform to appear unlocked. The normal trigger mode prevents this problem by not starting the electron beam until the input signal triggers the circuits.

#### Trigger polarity

The trigger polarity switch determines whether the trigger circuits

respond to the positive or negative voltage transition of the input signal. The "+" position starts the trace on the portion of the signal that is increasing in amplitude, while the "-" position starts the trace on decreasing transitions.

Most signals will lock equally well with either polarity selected. One exception is video signals. Here the POLARITY switch must be set to match the polarity of the video sync pulses so that the sync separator can properly separate the sync pulses from the video information. Set the TRIGGER POLARITY switch to "+" if the video sync pulses are positive (pointing up) and to "-" if the video sync pules are negative. Selecting the wrong polarity may result in an unstable trace and will produce incorrect peak-to-peak readings when using the Delta Peak-to-Peak function on video signals.

#### Trigger level

The trigger level control sets the voltage level of the input signal that will trigger the SC3100's trigger circuits. All symmetrical waveforms have two points that are the same voltage level the polarity control determines whether the voltage level selected by the trigger level control is on the rising transition or on the falling transition. The "+" and "-" markings on the TRIGGER LEVEL control refer to where the trace begins relative to the top and bottom of the CRT. This is true with either TRIGGER POLARITY switch setting.

#### Setting the horizontal display

The TIME/DIV switch (timebase) sets the horizontal time parameter of the displayed waveform. However, do you remember what a hassle it was to figure out the frequency and/or period of the waveform? Well, you don't have to do that at all with this oscilloscope. The digital measurement functions provide much faster and more accurate time and frequency measurements than can be made using

the CRT. This saves a lot of time when troubleshooting! The main use of the SC3100's timebase is simply for waveform viewing.

### Setting the sweep speed

The TIME/DIV switch (timebase) sets the speed of the electron beam as it moves across the CRT screen. For most applications you simply set the TIME/DIV switch and its associated vernier control for the desired amount of horizontal detail on the CRT.

Turning the TIME/DIV switch clockwise causes the electron beam to move faster across the CRT. This expands a waveform horizontally and allows you to see more waveform detail. It also allows you to view higher frequency signals. Turn the TIME/DIV switch counter-clockwise to view signals that are lower frequencies.

The waveform can be expanded horizontally by a factor of ten by pulling the HORIZONTAL POSITION control outward. This allows you to view signals in more detail as well as view higher frequency signals. The fastest sweep is increased to .002 microseconds (2 nanoseconds)/division.

The digital measurement functions will continue to read correct when the waveform is expanded horizontally. However, you will need to divide all CRT-based time measurements by 10. The waveform will be at the same approximate horizontal position when it is expanded as it was in the normal view.

Autoranging is another excellent feature! When the TIME/DIV switch is set to the "Auto" position, the SC3100 automatically selects the range needed to display approximately 2 to 5 cycles of the waveform. The ranges that are automatically selected are the same as those available by manually turning the TIME/DIV switch. Therefore, the number of displayed cycles varies depending upon the range that is selected. Neither the

horizontal vernier control nor the 10 expand are automatically controlled and may be operated normally to fine tune the waveform display in the "Auto" position.

The SC3100 will autorange to follow the input frequency as you move between test points. In order for the SC3100 to automatically select the sweep speed, the TRIG-GER circuits must be set to properly lock-in the waveform. Simply set the TRIGGER controls the same as you would if you were manually setting the TIME/DIV switch. For most signals set the LEVEL control to "0" and the SOURCE to match the input channel. Always set the TRIGGER SOURCE switch to the input that has the lowest frequency when you are displaying two different frequencies. The timebase will autorange to match the frequency of the channel selected by the TRIGGER SOURCE switch.

The timebase speed is selected based on the digital frequency counter. If the timebase does not seem to range correctly, push the digital FREQ button for the channel you are viewing. An unstable frequency reading means that the timebase will not properly autorange. You will need to readjust the TRIGGER controls so that they are able to better lock the waveform, or TIME/DIV switch set the manually.

The timebase will not autorange when the "TV" TRIGGER MODE is selected. This is because there are two possible sweep speeds that may be desired the vertical rate and the horizontal rate. Use the TV preset positions of the TIME/DIV switch for fast setup of video waveforms.

#### Video presets

The video preset positions of the TIME/DIV switch provide a quick way to view video waveforms. Selecting either the TVV or TVH preset automatically selects the proper sweep rate, selects the "TV" trigger mode and sets the trigger

circuits to trigger on the correct video sync pulse no matter where the trigger mode switch is set.

This simplifies set-up when alternately measuring video and nonvideo signals, as the TRIGGER MODE switch may be left in either the "Auto" or "Norm" position. Switching the TIME/DIV switch out of the video preset position returns control of the trigger circuits to the MODE switch.

TVV—displays two vertical fields of video. TVH—displays two horizontal lines of video.

Be sure to set the trigger polarity switch to match the sync polarity of the video sync pulses and set the trigger level control to "0" when using the video presets.

If you need to view the video signal in more detail than is provided by the presets, you can still use the TIME/DIV switch and the "TV" trigger mode.

# Using the auto tracking digital functions

The Auto-Tracking digital tests provide AC voltage, DC voltage, and frequency measurements of the signal applied to either the channel A or B inputs at the push of a button. These digital parameter measurements are called "Auto-Tracking" because the readout constantly and automatically follows the input signal without you needing to adjust any controls or set measurement cursors. In fact, the signal does not even need to be displayed on the CRT to use the Auto-Tracking tests! The signals for both the CRT display and digital readout are applied through the same probe.

Most of your waveform measurements will be done using either these Auto-Tracking digital tests or the SC3100's Delta tests. The Auto-Tracking digital tests measure parameters of the entire waveform, while the Delta tests are used to measure a portion of the waveform.

# Digital readout not affected by CRT controls

The signal takeoff to the digital circuits (both the Auto-Tracking and Delta tests) is made ahead of the CRT controls such as the vertical and horizontal position controls, vertical and horizontal vernier controls, and input coupling switches. This allows you to set the CRT display to any convenient size without affecting the digital tests. Because the digital tests are independent of the circuits, they are also much more accurate than CRT-based measurements.

The Auto-Tracking digital tests operate properly without the CRT trace locked or displayed. This allows you to use the digital readings to help set the CRT controls. The digital frequency and peak-to-peak readings, for example, can be used to set the TIME/DIV and VOLTS/DIV controls.

You can measure the DC voltage at the test point by simply pushing the "DCV" button of the corresponding channel. The DCV function is fully autoranged and operates independent of the CRT display. You may adjust the CRT display to any convenient size or set the INPUT COUPLING switch to any position (even "GND") without affecting the DC reading!

The DCV function measures average DC voltage. Average DC voltage is the same value that is indicated on schematics and is the power supply or B+ voltage, for example, that a DVM measures.

The SC3100 provides a direct readout of the peak-to-peak amplitude of any signal applied to the input. Simply press the "VPP" DIGITAL READOUT button for the corresponding channel. Specially designed circuits allow you to make VPP measurements on low duty cycle, low frequency signals to 20 Hz, and high frequency signals up to 120 MHz.

The PPV function is semi-autoranged and has four ranges se-

lected by the VOLTS/DIV control. This insures that the measuring circuits have proper signal level to provide a correct reading. If the digital readout shows flashing "8888," turn the VOLTS/DIV switch counterclockwise. If the LCD shows a PPV reading with very little resolution, turn the VOLTS/DIV switch clockwise. The digital PPV reading is not affected by the setting of the vertical vernier controls.

NOTE: The PPV readings are fully autoranged when the VOLTS/DIV switch is set to "Auto."

The digital display is more accurate than the CRT for two reasons. First, the digital circuitry has a much better basic accuracy. The CRT accuracy is 4Ç with a frequency response of 3 dB, while the digital circuits are 2Ç with a frequency response of 0.5 dB to 30 MHz. Secondly, the digital meter catches fast signal transitions which are easily overlooked on the CRT. Overshoot, fast spikes and random noise often go unnoticed on the CRT but are detected by the digital PPV meter.

#### Frequency measurements

Pressing the channel A or B "FREQ" button displays the frequency of the signal applied to the vertical input from 10 Hz to 150 MHz. The frequency function is fully autoranged, so there is no need to select resolution, read rates, or frequency ranges. All readings are updated in a half second or less.

The ACV function allows you to measure AC voltage as an RMS value (.707 of peak) for direct comparison to service literature and to true RMS reading DVMs. Most service literature, for example, lists the AC voltage at switches, fuses, and other AC power supply test points as an RMS value. Use the SC3100's ACV function when making these measurements to eliminate calculating the RMS voltage value from peak-to-peak readings.

Note: The ACV Reading is cor-

rect for all sinewave measurements. It will not agree with RMS meters on non-sinewave wave-shapes.

The ACV function is semi-autoranged and has four ranges selected by the VOLTS/DIV control. This insures that the measuring circuits have proper signal level to provide a correct reading. If the digital readout shows flashing "8888," turn the VOLTS/DIV switch counterclockwise. If the ACV reading has very little resolution, turn the VOLTS/DIV switch clockwise. The ACV readings are unaffected by the setting of the trigger and timebase controls and vertical verniers.

#### Using the delta measurements

Many applications require you to measure the peak-to-peak amplitude, instantaneous DC voltage, time, or frequency of only a portion of a waveform. This is the function of the SC3100's digital delta measurements.

In the world of electronics, "delta" means "difference." Such as the difference between one voltage point on a waveform and another or the difference between one point in time and another. The delta measurements provide a much more accurate waveform measurement than can be made using the CRT for two reasons. First, each measurement is made using the same high accuracy circuits that are used to for the Auto-Tracking digital measurements. Secondly, the delta bar is part of the CRT trace which virtually eliminates errors caused by parallax and interpretation.

#### The delta bar

The delta bar is a portion of the trace that is brighter than the rest of the trace. It defines the part of the waveform that is measured by the digital circuits. The delta marker "Begin" and "End" controls set the portion of the trace(s) that is intensified when one of the delta measurement buttons is

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selected. If you have selected a dual trace display mode, both CRT traces will show the delta bar. Which channel is measured depends on the selected function.

The delta marker "Begin" and "End" controls are multi-turn potentiometers. The function of the two controls automatically reverses if you position the end of the delta bar before the beginning. This prevents you from losing the intensified bar if the beginning and end are exchanged. This is also helpful when you want to make a measurement before and after a certain point on the waveform, as it is only necessary to change the position of one end of the delta bar to make the two measurements.

When you select the Delta DCV function, only a small spot of the waveform will be intensified. This is the Delta DC Marker. You can move the position of the Delta DC marker with the "End/DCV" DELTA MARKER control.

The intensified area of the Delta Bar and Delta DC Markers is part of the waveform. This eliminates parallax errors—errors in interpreting a part of a CRT division—and minimizes interpretation errors when setting the waveform portion that is measured. Other digital scopes use cursor measurement bars, which are subject to much greater setup error.

The Delta functions can be used to accurately measure peak-to-peak voltage, time, frequency, or DC voltage at any point or points along the waveform, all by tweaking a couple of knobs and pushing a button!

#### Using vector mode

While the Delta Frequency function provides a simple, accurate measurement of phase, there are times when you only need to know if two signals are in phase or what their approximate phase is. At these times you will want to use the X-Y vector mode.

In the X-Y vector mode the signal

applied to CH A INPUT produces vertical (Y) CRT deflection and the signal applied to CH B INPUT produces horizontal (X) CRT deflection. The resulting display, called a Lissajous pattern, shows the phase and frequency relationships of the two signals. Figure 8 shows typical phase relationships shown by the vector mode.

#### Measuring Ohms and Amps

The SC3100 Waveform & Circuit Analyzer allows you to completely analyze a circuit. In addition to its waveform analyzing functions, the SC3100 includes an ohmmeter, continuity tester, and DC Current meter.

These tests are made through the OHMS/DC AMPS INPUT Jacks using the supplied DVM test leads. They are completely separate from the Auto-Tracking test functions, Delta Measurements, and CRT display. The measurements are displayed in the digital readout and each function is fully autoranged.

# Computer automated bus operation

The SC3100 can even be used for computer-controlled automated testing. Under computer control, a program can be developed that automatically sets up any of the front panel measurement controls and reads the digital display. The front panel controls that are not computer controlled are POWER, DELTA MARKERS, FOCUS, INTENSITY, TRIGGER LEVEL, VERTICAL POSITION, VERTICAL VERNIER, HORIZONTAL POSITION, and HORIZONTAL VERNIER.

The SC3100 can be used with either IEEE-488 or RS-232 control. The SC3100 functions as a Talker/Listener. In the listener mode, the computer can set the SC3100's front panel controls via the interface bus. As a Talker, the SC3100 sends all of the digital measurements to the controller on command. The unit continually returns

the data in the digital display to the computer. The data is in a standard data format.

The signal at the SC3100's interface accessory jack must be translated to the desired standard by one of the Sencore Interface Accessories. The Interface Accessory is connected between the controller and the SC3100. The Interface Accessory connects to the controller using standard IEEE-488 or RS-232 cable.

The settings of the SC3100's front panel controls can be automatically set with a computer. The first valid bus command locks the front panel controls out of manual operation. All of the front panel controls (except those noted at the beginning of this section) remain locked out until a "CPO" (control panel on) command is sent. The SC3100 functions the same under bus control as it does during manual control and the digital meter continues to display the selected measurements.

Whew! That's about it—kind of. In reality, this piece of test equipment is so cool, you have to get your hands on one to appreciate how easy it is to troubleshoot using the SC3100. For a free information package, contact Sencore, 3200 Sencore Dr., Souix Falls, SD 57107; (800) SENCORE. □

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# What you don't know can cost you plenty

arn it, I'm mad. Starting Jan. 1, 1993, a new tax law forces the plan sponsor of a qualified pension or profit-sharing plan to withhold taxes equal to 20 percent of the amount of the distribution payable to the plan participant.

This new law leaves two escape hatches: the participant can direct that the distribution of his benefit be transferred to either a specific rollover IRA or another qualified plan.

Actually, this new law is not that big of a deal. There's no tax increase, but our cash-short government grabs the money up front instead of waiting for the normal tax payment dates.

So why am I mad? Because there is not one word about "income in respect to a decedent" (IRD)—the real tax-thief-in-the-night connected with qualified plans. IRD? Few plan participants have heard of it.

IRD is an old law. It's a bad law today and it will be even worse after the new law takes effect. Here's why: because of the 20 percent tax, more plan participants will transfer their would-be

distributions to IRAs and other qualified plans. This means that more people will die with all or part of their plan funds still inside qualified plans. And that's when IRD strikes—at death.

Here's a simple example explaining IRD. Suppose Joe Owner has \$300,000 in a profit-sharing plan when he dies. The \$300,000 is IRD and will be attacked twice by the IRS. The entire \$300,000 is subject to income tax when distributed to Joe's heirs. And, get this, the entire \$300,000 is also subject to estate tax! Yes, you read it right—double taxation.

Rotten, you say? Well, watch what happens when the numbers get larger. Every dollar over \$762,000 is subject to three taxes: a 15 percent excise tax, the income tax (probably 31 percent), and the estate tax (probably 55 percent). Oops, I almost forgot. Your state of residence will also get a piece of the action. Certain complex credits usually reduce the effective rate of tax to between 80 and 90 percent (even more in some states). That's right, your family gets a dime to 20 cents of every dollar; the tax collec-

tor gets the rest!

The entire IRD tax area is a complex maze designed to confiscate retirement funds that took you a lifetime to build, and it does. Most people, including professionals, are shocked after the horror of IRD is explained to them. Let's look at some real numbers. If you are in a high tax bracket and take a distribution during your life from your qualified plan, you are hit with about a 30 percent income tax (say each distribution is \$100,000). This leaves you \$70,000.

When you die, another 50 percent for estate taxes slices the &70,000 in half. Now only \$35,000 (35 percent of the \$100,000) is left for your family. Taxes gobbled up \$65,000. If you die with money in your qualified plan, the balance is taxed twice as IRD-once for income tax and a second time for estate tax. This results in the same 35/65 percent tax disaster as the when you were alive example. Then you throw in other possible federal and state taxes and that ratio can reach 10/90—your family gets only 10 cents of every dollar.

A new concept, as far as I know,

is called the IRD avoidance concept and can turn that 10 cents back into a dollar. Although complex to implement, the concept can be explained as a simple three-stop

If you have a significant amount of money in a qualified plan, you owe it to yourself and your family to check with your tax professional to determine how the IRD avoidance concept can save you huge amounts of taxes and also create wealth greater than the original amount in the plan.  $\Box$

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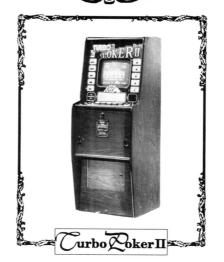
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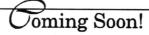
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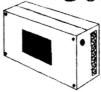
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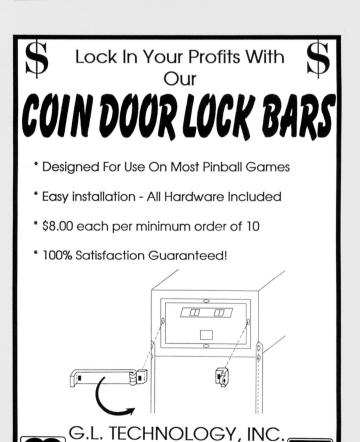
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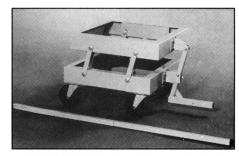
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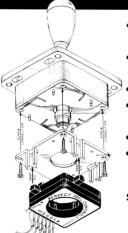
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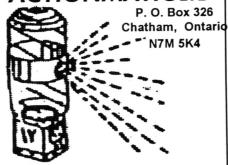
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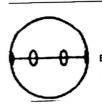
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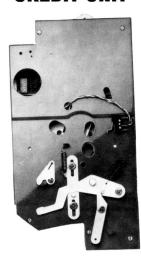
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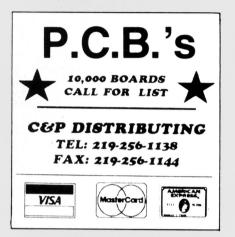
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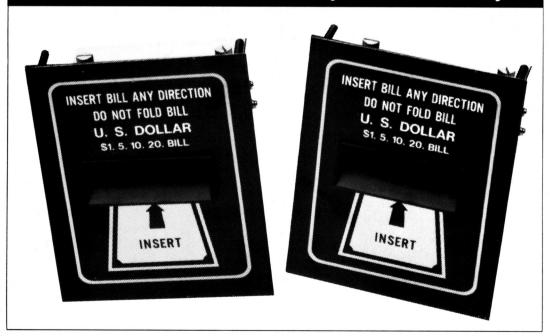
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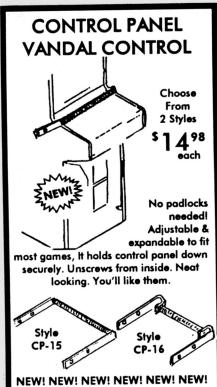




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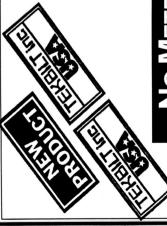
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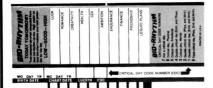
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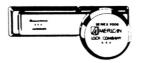
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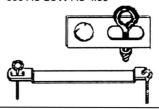
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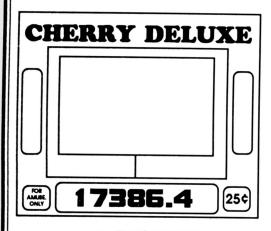


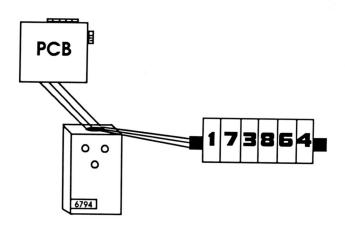
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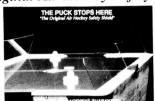
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# Still the odd shot here and there

An abundance of quality product has been the right medicine to assuage hurt feelings. But that doesn't mean manufacturers and operators always skip merrily down the primrose path, hand in hand. Two stories in this month's issue make mention of subjects that still cause consternation: price per play and dedicated vs. kit video games.

Operator Randy Chilton, in his "Street Talk" column, wrote, "Many manufacturers don't have much respect for the operating community, and seeing this type of activity (operators adjusting a game's factory-recommended setting of 50 cents per play down to 25 cents) is a good example as to why.

"In a discussion with a manufacturer he expressed his frustration with operators who change the pricing downward. He said the company has considered making the minimum price per play fixed at a given level. If the operator wants to go below that level, it would require a special conversion kit at additional cost. I'm not sure if that would be legal, but I'd be in favor of it."

A lot of operators would undoubtedly be furious if such a scenario ever unfolded-"I know my market; don't tell me what to charge for my games!" I can see these words spoken as the operator points to a time-worn cabinet housing a hot, just-released kit, as if to say, "How can I charge 50 cents a play for that?" Indeed, he probably can't, which leads to peeve number two, as described by Strata president Richard Ditton in a "Company Profile" this month. While discussing whether to release NFL Hard Yardage, an upcoming NFL-licensed video game, in dedicated vs. kit form, he said:

"I used to always be for kits, because that's what the operators always want. But I've gone into a convenience store and seen a Strata game—that I worked on for a year—in a cabinet that looked like it had been kept out

back in the rain. The controls were rusted; it just looked awful. Operators should put the same pride in cabinetry that we put into creating the game, but unfortunately that isn't always the case.

"Since I want to ensure that Strata games look good out on location, I almost feel forced to go dedicated with the first runs. We've worked very hard on NFL Hard Yardage. The last thing I want is for an NFL official to show up at his neighborhood convenience store and see 'NFL' stuck sideways on the cabinet with cigarette marks that were burned into the control panel in 1987."

Price per play and dedicated vs. kit. Two issues that many manufacturers and operators still don't see eye to eye on. It's not my desire or place to take a position on either one. I write about it simply to give the issues an airing, like Chilton and Ditton have. Through dialogue comes understanding and, it is hoped, resolution.

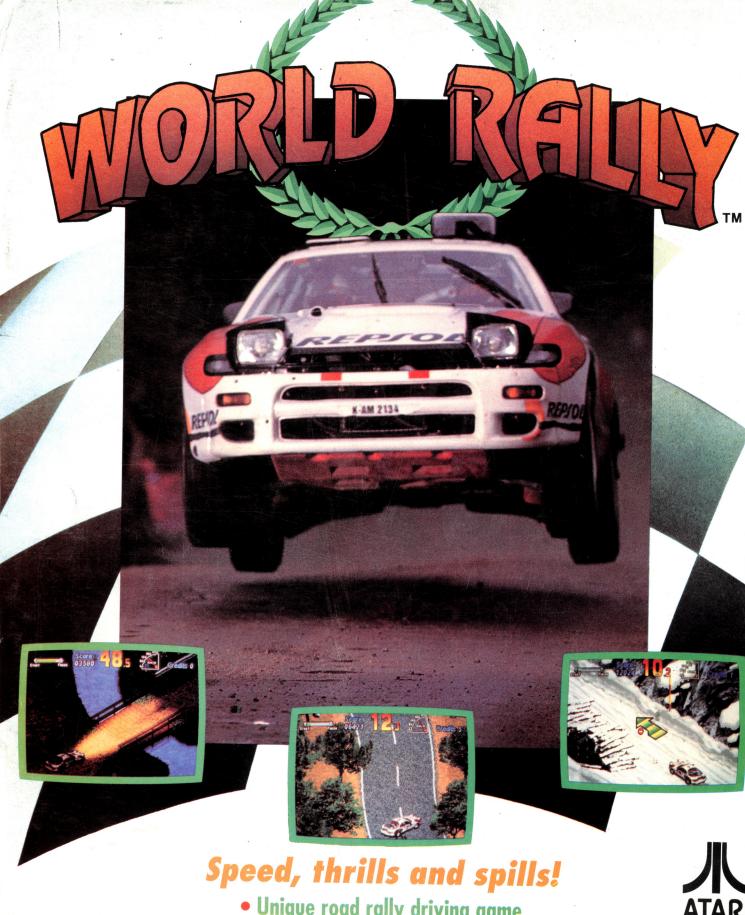


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
