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Letting Its Hair Down

Remember "Charlie Brown" of Coasters fame who was the school clown? Or "Roll Over Beethoven" of Chuck Berry Fame? If you do, you also can recollect an era when rock didn't take itself too seriously and was capable of laughing at itself. Today, at a time when rock tries to say something an invitation to satire if anything invites satire—so little (and that's being king) is being done to add a dash of humor to pretense at worst and valid social commentary at best.

OK, so times have changed and much of rock is making comment on things that have not necessarily changed for the better or have unjustifiably remained at the status-quo. And perhaps from fear of arousing sensitivities the very real freedom of satire somehow escapes the present mentality of the music business creative forces.

The irony is, of course, that satire on the times abounds in other areas of expression. Comics tear into the genexpression. Comics tear into the generation gap on TV, film makers (e.g. "The and purpose and the very medium rock music — which generated a great deal of this probing remains the last citadel, it seems, of humorless commentary. And isn't it somewhat embarassing that Broadway musicals like "Hair" and "Your Own Thing" — even if their embarkation point is rock are the major, if limited contributors to humor in rock?

Yet, the success of "Hair's" title song — a witty, youth-accepted satire on youth itself — should serve as a delightful example that there's probably plenty of room on the Top 100 for more tongue-in-cheek hits.

It's easy for satire, of course, to fall flat on its face. Simply because humor — at least truly funny **and** tasteful fun — is a serious and very challenging business. But, if the music business fails to give it a greater try there remains the humorless prospect that it will fail to be in the vanguard as an arbiter of taste in the world of entertainment.

It's certainly time that the music business' creative forces give serious thought to letting their "Hair" down. The Top 100 needs a lot of good laughs. CashBox CashBox CashBox CashBox

S&G's 'Mrs. Robinson' Grammy Disk Of Year

NEW YORK — Simon & Garfunkel's "Mrs. Robinson" on the Columbia label has earned a Grammy award as Record of the Year. Winning entry in what is considered the top award from NARAS, the disk awards society, was revealed on a last week's presentation of the "Best on Record" TV'er. It was decided to hold back the Record of the Year award for the show, with winners in other categories made known at NARAS awards dinners last March. Employing the Oscar opening-an-envelop style, Henry Mancini an-nounced the award at the conclusion of the hour-long show. All the nomin-ated Record of the Year artists per-formed on the telecast. As a composer, Paul Simon won a Grammy this year for his musical score for "The Graduate," the source of "Mrs. Robinson."

Sen. Javits, Recipient Of 1st RIAA Award, **Calls For Industry Assistance To Aid Poor**

Calls For Indu WASHINGTON, D. C. — The recipient of the Record Industry Association's first annual cultural award, Senator Jacob K. Javits (D-NY), has called on the record industry to utilize its re-sources to help the nation's poor. Senator Javits' remarks were in re-sponse to the presentation of the RIAA award—in the form of a three-sided obelisk created by Steuben Glass--were made at the dinner last Tues. (9) in the Washington Hilton Hotel. More than 300 guests, including trade figures, Senators, Congressmen and officials of various Federal Government de-partments. A program of entertain-ment included Metropolitan opera soprano Leontyne Price, Johnny Mathis and the Geezinslaw Bros. The citation accompanying the Award saluted Senator Javits for: his untiring efforts to secure Federal sup-port to stimulate art and culture in the United States. It noted that as a mem-ber of the House of Representatives in 1949 he had pioneered legislation to encourage artistic and cultural activity in the country; that he was a principal

sponsor of the bill to establish a Fed-eral Advisory Council on the Arts; that he had authored a bill to assist pro-fessional groups engaged in the per-forming and visual arts; that he had co-sponsored Public Law 88-579 which established the National Foundation on the Arts and Humanities, and that he had been a senior member of the Senate Subcommittee on the Arts and Humanities.

Senate Subcommittee on the Arts and Humanities. "His abiding interest in encouraging and perpetuating artistic activity in the United States and in making the public more aware and appreciative of the many diverse art forms that make up our civilized society has earned him the everlasting apprecia-tion of the phonograph record indus-try," the citation said. try," the citation said. Industry Aid To Poor In his acceptance speech Senator Javits called on the record industry to bring new opportunities to the poor by making an organized effort to find new talent among slum residents and to help form new record companies that are owned and operated inside

the ghettos. Praising the record industry for play-ing an instrumental role in "erasing the color line" in America's entertain the color line" America's entertain erasing ing an instrumental role in "erasing the color line" in America's entertain-ment world, Senator Javits said that the industry still faces the challenge of cooperating with established black artists to open up opportunities for ownership and management of record business enterprises for poverty area residents. residents

UA Acquires Morro Music

NEW YORK — The United Artists Music Group has acquired the Morro Music Group. Operation consists of five publishing firms active exclusively in Spanish and Latin-American music in the U. S. and throughout the West-ern Hemisphere. Announcement of UA's extension and amplification of activities in the Latin music field was made by Mike Stewart, president of United Artists Music, upon comple-tion of negotiations with Frederick Reiter, founder of the Morro firms — all BMI affiliates. The Morro catalogs, widely sub-published in Europe, consist of copy-rights in excess of 10,000 and include many Spanish standards as well as outstanding Latin hits such as "Mo-liendo Cafe", "Boda Gris", Esa", "Amor Gitano" and "El Bodeguero". Two current Latin successes are Mor-ro songs: "El Bailador" and "La Manzana."

Stewart stated that the Morro of-fices have moved from their previous location and are now located in the UA building at 729 Seventh Avenue. Reiter has been designated man-ager of Latin American operations. He'll work closely with Stewart and Murray Deutch, UA's executive vice president, who, in past affiliations, introduced many Latin hits to the United States. The Morro firms have their own af-filiated firm in Mexico, EMLASA, managed by Mario de Jesus, and also have affiliations with leading publish-ers in Spain, Argentina, and Columbia.

Copy'rt Office Supports Label, Artist Royalties

Label, Artist Royalties NEW YORK — The Copyright Office has endorsed the principle of perform-ance copyright in sound recordings. In a letter to the Record Industry Association of America, the Register of Copyrights stated that the frame-work of the Williams amendment (#9) to the Copyright Revision Bill now pending before the Senate (S.543) re-presents a substantial step in achiev-ing this important right. The Copyright Office reserved com-ment on the rate of compensation to be paid by commercial users of phono-graph records to record companies and performers but suggested that the royalty fees should be the subject of further negotiations between the in-terested groups. The Copyright Office offered its services in assisting in the development of a schedule of royalty payments.

OK RCA Logo Change

NEW YORK — Shareholders at the 50th annual meeting of RCA officially approved the change, effective last Friday (9), of the corporation's name from Radio Corp. of America to RCA. Actually, the logo shift has been in ef-fect for sometime, including its use to identify the company's disk division, RCA Records.

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MATE, Tape Industry Assoc., Formed

NEW YORK — The Manufacturer's Association of Tape & Equipment (MATE) has been established to "draw together all manufacturers of tape for better communication." This is one of the guiding principles of the organization as outlined by Hank Fox, former tape editor at Billboard who has joined the organization as executive director. Still in its organizational stage, MATE is presently represented by "organizing companies," Fox noted. These companies, representative of MATE's drive to picture itself within the total tape industry, include equip-ment manufacturers and duplicator marketers. On the equipment end, there's Motorolax Automotive Pro-ducts, Lear-Jet, North American Philips, Orrtronics and Goodway. Duplicator marketers among the or-ganizing members are ITCC, MGM Records, Stereodyne, Livingston Audio Products, Dubbings and Rozin-ante.

Although contact with the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) and NARM, the wholesaling organization, is yet to be made on an official level, Fox said. He indicated, however, a close working relationship with both industry associations follow-ing more complete organizational alignments.

MATE at present does not have a board of directors, but a steering com-mittee has been formed. It consists of Jim Elkins of ITTC, Jerry Geller, sales manager of MGM's tape dept., Tom Hofbauer of Livingston Audio Products.

Fox said that a mailing would shortly be directed at the entire tape industry which will outline the purposes of MATE.

WB/7, Thru Atlantic, Seeking **15% Interest In Northern Songs**

NEW YORK — Warner Bros. Records has emerged as the latest contender for a share in Northern Songs, the Lennon-McCartney dominated music

Lennon-McCartney dominated music publishing catalog. It's understood that WB/7 is attempt-ing to gain a 15% share of the company through Atlantic Records. How LP Came About

How LP Came About About three years ago, Gil Rodin, administrative A&R director for Decca Records on the west coast, was as-signed by MCA to assemble a TV documentary on some of America's greatest comedians. He used film clips from the various comedians' movies. Included were W. C. Fields film clips. Rodin, while viewing the movies from which the Fields seg-ments were taken, discovered Fields unque voice, and felt that the sound of W. C. Fields was as important to as success as his visual being. — After assembling the show, Decca and the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. concluded a deal to put the Canadian ownedy team of Wayne & Shuster into an hour documentary. Rodin, and John y Wayne and Frank Shuster wrote all the lines for the TV show, which he comedy duo appeared in as well. Following the program's success in canada, the Columbia Broadcasting System showed all the documentaries on the CBS Network.

Permission Granted

Rodin then asked the MCA exec-utives to allow him to assemble the voice tracks of W. C. Fields and to make an album based on Fields' character. Two years later, Rodin got the go-ahead, and in Toronto, he and Wayne and Shuster wrote the dialogue which would provide the continuity necessary to hold the LP

together. When he returned to Califor-nia, Rodin chose Gary Owens, host of the "Laugh-In" TV'er, to be the announcer on the album, because of Owens' tongue-in-cheek approach to W. C. Fields, which Rodin felt was a perfect contract to the sound of Field's voice.

Rodin and Bud Dant then wrote the music cues, Tom Lazarus designed the album cover, and a W. C. Fields poster was included in the LP. After the final dubbing, Rodin transferred one album to acetate, played a cut from this set for the annual Decca and promotion meeting, and the enthusi-astic response of the listeners launched the "W. 





Deejay Lineup

Program director Bill Ward notes that KBBQ is particularly proud of their award at last year's CMA con-vention — having been named #1 in vention — having been named #1 in the nation in the promotion of country sounds while D. J. Larry Scott was cited last week by the Academy of C-W Music as the "#1 Radio person-ality in the L. A. Area." Ward feels that his "personality" jocks are the "strength of the station." Harry New-man (5: 30-9 a. m.), Larry Scott (9 to noon), Hugh Jarrett (noon to 3 p. m.), Bob Jackson (3 to 7 p. m.), Corky Mayberry (7 p. m. to midnight) and Hoss Barnes (all nighter) make up the lineup of talent. George Cameron is owner and general manager of the outlet. outlet.

Jocks work from a playlist of eighty single titles (selected by Ward) and approximately twenty LP's. Ward marks the cuts from LP's but D. J.'s may play additional titles from those albums if they choose.

'Live' Musical Packages

Station is involved with several musical "live" packages each year, usually held at the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles. "Anybody who is any-body in country has played at least one of our live shows in the past and we're hoping to get Marty Robbins to headline the anniversary special." Evening segments (from 7 p. m. till Evening segments (from 7 p. m. till dawn) utilize phone call requests in programming titles, even though many of these are not on the playlist. Station has been accused by purists of being a little too pop in its approach to country. Ward counters by suggesting that his jocks are presented as "intelli-gent business type entertainers" while the music is designed to have the widest popular appeal. "There aren't any Fertilizer Freds on KBBQ."

Bios for Dee Jays

Buddy Holly



The late Buddy Holly died in a plane crash at the age of 23, leaving behind a legacy that now is a seminal in-fluence in the development of rock. Born in Lubbock, Texas, in 1936, he came originally on to the music scene as a C&W singer, but found little success in Nashville, and returned to Lubbock "pretty darn discouraged." However, Buddy recruited friends Jerry Allison, Nick Sullivan, and Joe Mauldin, and formed the Crickets. The group combined C&W and rock 'n' roll into what they christened as "rocka-billy," an immediately successful musical form. Buddy then had one hit after another, both with the Crickets on the Brunswick label and as a soloist on the Brunswick label and as a soloist on Coral. "That'll Be The Day" brought instant recognition to the boys, brought instant recognition to the boys, and Buddy had among his many hits "Peggy Sue," "Early In The Morning," "Oh Boy," and "Maybe Baby." His reputation became international. Re-cently, some previously unreleased original tapes recorded by Buddy were discovered. One of the tunes on them, "Love Is Strange," has been released by Coral and is number 94 on the Ton Coral, and is number 94 on the Top 100 this week.

Friends Of Distinction

The Friends of Distinction, RCA re-The Friends of Distinction, RCA re-cording artists, debuted in the summer of 1968 at the Daisy, one of Hollywood's top discotheques. The group was brought to the attention of the RCA executives by an avid fan of the Friends, actor Jim Brown, who had signed them to his management firm signed them to his management firm after hearing them sing at their first professional date. The Friends of Dis-tinction are Harry Elston, Floyd But-ler, Jessica Cleaves, and Barbara Jean Love. Floyd Butler brought Jessica Cleaves into the group when they met Cleaves into the group when they met in the Los Angeles Urban League, for which Floyd was assistant project director for two years. 



Confrontation

NEW YORK

The Conference of Personal Mana-gers is exactly what the name implies. Their collective clients, played end to end, would provide enough talent to fill a year of Sundays for Ed Sullivan. Like many trade organizations, the COMP (divided into East and West sections) holds regular meetings. But where other trade organizations have a top and bottom, and can call on the top to give talks on how the bottom can rise, the COPM is all top.

So, the COPM looks outside for luncheon guests and often finds that outside for lunch-eon guests and often finds that outside stimulation serves a useful purpose. The guest at the most recent COPM East meet was **David Merrick**, and sti-mulation may be an understated word to describe what happened.

Merrick, Broadway's top producer, decided that a stimulating topic would be to discuss why managers don't think of Broadway as a suitable vehicle to stardom. The managers responded by asking why Broadway producers hire inexperienced people to deal with per-formers. And the battle was on. We must admit that all parties concerned handled themselves well.

The whole point to this little narra tive is the actual results from this confrontation. Booking agents, whose first concern is money (as opposed to the managers' first concern of a long-term future) took the blame for most misunderstandings between producer and manager, but Merrick also con-



All of the songs were written by Bob Dylan. "Nashville Skyline" is the sixth Gold Record for Bob Dylan. His other mil-ion-dollar sellers include "Blonde on Blonde," "Highway 61 Revisited," "Bringing It All Back Home," "Bob Dylan's Greatest Hits" and "John Wesley Harding."

On her first solo outing, Carolyn comes across as a soul singer of distinction (distinct from Aretha) and could emerge as a major star in her own right. Tunes come from various sources and include a powerhouse titled "It's True I'm Gonna Miss You."

LADY CORYELL — Larry Coryell — Van-guard Apostolic VSD 6509 Larry Coryell, whose jazz/rock guitar work with the Free Spirits and the Gary Burton Quartet has made him one of the most re-spected musicians on the new scene, is now represented by his first starring outing. Ac-companied by drummer Bobby Moses (except for two cuts which feature Elvin Jones), Cory-ell works through a strong collection of his own tunes, coupled with Jr. Walker's "Cleo's Mood," the standard "You Don't Know What Love Is" and bassist Jim Garrison's (Gar-rison is heard only on this track) "Treats Style." Coryell also sings on the set.

IT HURTS TO SAY GOODBYE — Jack Gold Orchestra and Chorus — Columbia CS 9851 Performing in swinging rock style, the Jack Gold Orchestra and Chorus offer a sprightly selection of 11 tuneful contemporary melodies. Included on the LP are such flavorful, zestful items as the title track, "Traces," "This Guy's In Love With You," "For Once In My Life," and "Wichita Lineman." There's plenty of ma-terial for good music outlets on this set.

ELYSE-Elyse Weinberg-Tetragrammaton

ELYSE—Elyse Weinberg—Tetragrammaton T 117 Elyse Weinberg delivers a selection of folk rock ditties, many of which have elements of of baroque music. ("Meet Me At The Station" uses a harpsichord effectively.) The artist wrote eight of the 12 tunes and co-wrote three others. Singing in ringing tones which soar vibrantly through such melodies as "Band Of Thieves," "Deed I Do" (a current noise-maker for the songstress), "Simpleminded Harlequin," and "Mortuary Bound," Miss Weinberg could obtain favorable response to this set.



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

There's plenty of good material, including "Magazine Lady," "I Ain't Blue" and the title tune. title tune.



THE ILLUSION — Steed ST 37003 The Illusion ride the track between good teen and good contemporary music and could pick up sales from both areas. Group has been a-round for awhile and has enough of a following to get the set off the ground. Lead track (and recent single), "Did You See Her Eyes," is starting to pick up play in its almost-seven minute entirety and could have another crack at the charts. "Just Imagine," "Run, Run, Run/Willy Gee (Miss Holy Lady)" and "You Made Me What I Am" are also prime airplay candidates. candidates.





THE ROOTS OF AMERICA'S MUSIC – Var-ious Artists – Arhoolie 2001/2002 A 2-LP, 31-track anthology, "The Roots Of America's Music" contains recordings, most of them made in the 1960's, by a host of coun-try blues, city blues, gospel, jazz, country, cajun and tolk performers. Fred McDowell, Mance Lipscomb, Big Joe Williams, Lightning Hopkins, Big Mama Thornton, Bukka White, Jesse Fuller, Kid Thomas, J.E. Mainer's Mountaineers, Del McCoury and Nathan Ab-shire are among the artists represented. Excellent item.

STONED AGE MAN – Joseph – Scepter SRM/SPS 574 Blues guitarist Joseph Long's first album features the artist singing and playing the guitar against a psychedelic rock back-ground. This fusion of pure, traditional blues and contemporary rock displays Joseph to good advantage. His performance is powerful and exciting, his musicianship excellent. In addition to the title track, the set includes "Trick Bag," "Cold Biscuits And Fish Heads," "I'm Gonna Build A Mountain," "The House Of The Rising Sun," and four other tunes. Could be FM airplay and sub-sequent breakout action for this one.

MAURICE CHEVALIER, Vol. 1 - RCA LPV 564

LPV 564 As part of its vintage series, RCA has re-leased this sixteen tune collection of old Che-valier sides, many taken from movie sound-tracks. Although the sides have been re-mastered to increase fidelity, they have been left in mono form. "Louise," "Walkin' My Baby Back Home," "Mimi," "Valentine," "Livin' In The Sunlight - Lovin' In 'The Moon-light' and "You Brought A New Kind Of Love To Me" are some of the tracks that will stir memories in the older generation.



Jazz Picks

MILES DAVIS' GREATEST HITS -- Columbia

Although this collection of Miles Davis sides Although this collection of Miles Davis sides spans a decade of jazz, emphasis has been placed on fairly recent sides from the trumpet great. John Coltrane is featured on two of the cuts, "Someday My Prince Will Come" and "Round Midnight," and other well-known jazz-men such as Wayne Shorter, Herbie Hancock and Wynton Kelly show up on such sides as "So What," "Seven Steps To Heaven," "My Funny Valentine" and "Walkin'." Newer Da-vis sidemen Tony Williams and Ron Carter are also featured.



YUSEF LATEEF'S DETROIT -- LATITUDE 42° 30' LONGITUDE 83° Yusef Lateef plays tenor sax and flutes on a set of eight jazz sessions, seven of which he wrote. His musicianship is superb and in-ventive; his tone lyrical and richly colorful. Tunes on the set include "Bishop School," "Eastern Market," "Russell And Eliot," "Woodward Avenue," and "That Lucky Old Sun." This album is a jazz powerhouse, and should see heavy sales action in jazz markets everywhere.

PURCELL: 'CELESTIAL MUSIC'/'NOW DOES THE GLORIOUS DAY APPEAR' — Accademia Monteverdiana Chor. & Orch./ Soloists/Denis Stevens — Cardinal VCS 10053 Two choral odes by Henry Purcell, both composed in 1689, are excellently performed on this album by the Chorus and Orchestra of the Accademia Monteverdiana, Denis Stevens, conductor, and soloists Patricia Clark (sopra-no), Tom Sutcliffe (counter-tenor), Edgar Fleet (tenor), Roger Stalman (bass) and John Frost (bass). Purcell, who has been frequently recorded of late, deserves to be numbered among the great composers, and this LP should help to increase his reputation.

KHACHATURIAN: SYMPHONY NO. 3/RIM-SKY-KORSAKOV: RUSSIAN EASTER OVER-TURE — Chicago Symphony/Leopold Stow-kowski — RCA LSC 3067 The first recording outside the Soviet Union of Aram Khachaturian's Symphony No. 3 is contained on this album by the Chicago Sym-phony, Leopold Stowkowski conducting. 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
Oľ Crazy Otto's Back Again...

Move follows the recent signing of Milt Grayson, featured in the Broadway version of "Trumpets Of The Lord." Signed for management and pro-duction are pop-rock singer Octavius; Shirley Garrett, former lead singer with the Gospel Choraleers and the National Quintet; and Ella Mitchell and the Ella Mitchell Singers, a gos-pel group expected to blossom into the pop/rock field. Future plans call for the establish-ment of two publishing firms, Abukar (ASCAP) and an as-yet-unnamed BMI firm.

Modified FCC 'Go' On ABC Networks

WASHINGTON-The American Broadcasting Co. has won permission from the FCC to continue its four-network radio service, but the federal agency imposed new restrictions on the network to increase competition in smaller

markets. In dismissing a petition from the Mutual Broadcasting System, the FCC said that it had not found an anti-

NEW YORK — The Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, exclusive Decca Records attraction, will present the New York premiere of Dave Brubeck's oratorio, "The Light In the Wilder-ness," at Philharmonic Hall May 16, 1969, under the direction of Associate Conductor Erich Kunzel. The orches-tra's regular conductor, Max Rudolph, will lead the group in Carl Nielsen's Symphony No. 4, "The Inextinguish-able." Both works have been recorded by The Cincinnati Symphony on Decca. "The Light In the Wilderness." Bru-

able." Both works have been recorded by The Cincinnati Symphony on Decca. "The Light In the Wilderness," Bru-beck's first large-scale sacred work for symphony orchestra, chorus and jazz soloists, will be performed by Brubeck at the piano, baritone Robert Hale, the orchestra's jazz trio and the 100 voice Miami University Cho-rus. Called "an oratorio for today," this work is based upon biblical texts selected by Brubeck, embracing such themes as "The Sermon On The Mount," "Where Is God," "Love Your Enemies" and "Prase Ye the Lord." This oratorio received its premiere in Cincinnati in February of last year. Following the appearance at Philhar-monic Hall, the orchestra and soloists leave for an extended European tour, during which the Brubeck work will be performed in Berlin, Rotterdam, London and the Bordeaux and Bergen Festivals. In addition to the deluxe two-record album by Dave Brubeck and The Cincinnati Symphony that has been released, "Light In the Wil-derness" has just been made avail-able in a single 8-track cartridge, marking the first Classical tape twin-pack on Decca. Brubeck will be appearing on a number of television shows this week in behalf of the concert in Philhar-monic Hall this Friday.

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



We hear cries of protest, expressions of disillusionment, and a call for new values with deeper and more lasting commitments to our nation's disad-vantaged and dispossessed. Today's music and lyrics are keeping faith with the social commentary of earlier folk music, but in the idiom of our new generation—'like it is' and 'where its at,' —a new universal language. "There are also tremendous possib-ilities open to the record industry to help find talent and form entertain-ment groups among those who have been denied privileges and opportun-ities in our slums. A massive talent hunt in the ghetto would be a new avenue for healthy competition among record producers, and giving these

avenue for healthy competition among record producers, and giving these newly discovered performers the op-portunity to reach their own commun-ity and the nation at large would have a great social impact on the less for-tunate members of our society. I con-sider the potential benefits to be so vast that I urge the record industry to begin an organized effort to provide these new incentives to slum and ghetto dwellers while the overall battle continues against unemployment, bad housing, inferior education and mal-nutrition." In his prepared text, Senator Javits

housing, inferior education and mal-nutrition." In his prepared text, Senator Javits also noted that RIAA had served as the industry's representative on the President's Council on Youth Oppor-tunity Summer Program; that it had recruited artists to inform the under-privileged youth of the country about summer job opportunities and recrea-tional programs; that it had scheduled performers for personal appearances in connection with the Youth Opportun-ity Program, booked entertainers and executives associated with the per-forming arts for workshops and semin-ars, and secured free admissions for under-privileged youth to concerts, movies and plays. This, he said, was an outstanding record of public service. Douglas MacAgy, Acting Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts wrote to RIAA in behalf of the Pres-ident, applauding the Association's choice of Senator Javits as the first recipient of its Cultural Award. "With-out the distinguished leadership of men like him in Congress, the arts in the United States would indeed suffer. It is with great pleasure that we join you in expressing appreciation to Sen-ator Javits for his dedication to our cuse."

CREED TAYLOR

CREED TAYLOR
"It's pop if it sells, its jazz if it doesn't sell," is the way Creed Taylor looks at to-day's disk output from artists who were once relegated to a dusty bin at the back of the store. "They (the record companies) are trying to merchandise a jazz LP as a pop LP because the initial sale's are better, and if the buyer thinks he's buying a pop album, that's what he'll hear when he gets home."
"I deliberately try to put the jazz artist into a context that will hopefully be pop, without diluting what the artist does best. I don't try to change his particular thing, I just try to put it into a more broadly attractive atmosphere."
Creed Taylor's philosophy towards jazz has helped many artists emerge from the confining strictures of categorization, and has provided many hit albums for the record companies he's worked for. His first album, a 10" LP produced for Bethlehem around 1953, was also his first success. The set, "Chris Conner Sings Lullabies Of Birdland," was a 250,000 copy seller.

first success. The set, "Chris Conner Sings Lullabies Of Birdland," was a 250,000 copy seller. It should be pointed out that Creed's aim is not to turn out hit albums, but to broaden the appeal of an artist he thinks is worthy of more attention. Under his independent, exclusive deal with A&R Records, Taylor turns out 15 albums a year, and he handles them all with love

and care, sometimes spending a full week on remix alone. After gaining experience at Bethle-hem, cutting Kai Winding and J. J. John-son and Herbie Mann, Taylor moved to ABC-Paramount. "I was feeling my way for awhile and trying to build a standard catalogue. I cut everything, drinking songs, war ballads, polkas, flamenco ... I did one album you can still get by ordering from the back pages of mon-ster magazines. It was called "Shock." Finally, I thought we were strong enough and I decided to go ahead with jazz pro-duct. The result was the Impulse jazz line, the first high-quality packaged (gatefold covered) jazz line.

Built Verve

Built Verve Taylor moved to Verve in 1961, after the label had been bought by MGM. The frist artist he signed was organist Jimmy Smith, and their first session together produced a hit single and album, "Walk On The Wild Side." Other Taylor mile-stones at Verve were Kai Winding's sin-gle of "More," the introduction and pop-ularization of bossa nova through Stan Getz and Charlie Byrd's "Jazz Samba" LP and "Desafinado" single, the Getz and Astrud Gilberto "The Girl From Ipanema" single and the initial pop/jazz product from Wes Montgomery. The hallmark of Taylor's product is high-quality sound, coupled with inven-tive and appealing packaging. "I've always thought," says Taylor, "that the packaging of an album is crucial. Ex-cept for isolated stores, the customer can't listen to a record before he buys it, so if you're ever going to get anywhere you have to have a point-of-purchase appeal."

appeal." The highest tribute that can be paid to Taylor is that his product not only sells (many of his albums hit high on the pop charts) but that they win re-spect from his many jazz contemporaries

Under his deal with A&M, Taylor is producing product by Paul Desmond, Nat Adderly, Antonio Carlos Jobim, the Tamba 4, Soul Flutes and several other top acts.





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

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Dutch avant-garde rock group Zen reached the No. 1 spot on the Hit Parade in Holland just three weeks after release of their tremendous version of "Hair" b/w "Aquarius" on Philips and published by Altona. The six piece group were the first artists in the world to top the charts with these songs, and they did so two months before the May opening of the musical in Holland.



David Platz of Essex Music has emerged as the new big wheel at the Beatles' Apple Corps and the general supervising their operation to win the takeover battle with Associa-ted TeleVision for Northern Songs. He has disclosed that he will be active in putting "the Apple shop in order," and if the Beatle bid for Northern is successful, he will be the "expert in music publishing" who will join the reconstituted Northern board. In re-turn for his services, Platz will re-ceive 10% of the Northern and Apple annual turnover, estimated to be worth an additional £500,000 income for the Essex group. Platz is one of the most astute executives in inter-national publishing and has been in on the ground floor of every British pop trend in behalf of Essex over the past ten years. He handles the Rolling Stones' publishing interests amongst other perennial moneyspinners. Platz has been conferring with the Beatles and other interested parties about the strategy for the Northern struggle and firming up the fortunes of the financially groggy but potentially prosperous Apple empire. Beatle business manager Allen Klein revealed that he has pledged the 45,000 shares in Metro Goldwyn Mayer owned by his company ABCKO as collateral for the £1½ million cash loan which Ansbacher, the Beatle mer-chant bankers, made to underwrite the bid for Northern. Slater Walker In-vestments, financial advisers to insti-tutional shareholders in Northern stock like Hambros, Howard and Wyndham, EBOR and Invan Unit Trust, has urged them not to accept the ATV offer worth 37 shillings and sixpence per share which was due to close May 2nd. Slater Walker made no comment on the Beatle counter offer worth 42 shillings and sixpence per share. The institutions it advises hold about 14% of Northern's voting capital, and could mount an

Kass himself has exited Apple in company with admin-istration manager Alistair Taylor, publishing executive Mike O'Conmor and song plugger Wayne Bardell. These Apple changes are regarded as initial developments in the stream-lining and reorganization of the Beatle enterprise. RCA record division chief Bernard Ness has named Ian Grant as UK

Both appointments are effec-tive June 1st. Ember Records chief Jeff Kruger flew to Hollywood April 30th to dis-cuss future release by Glen Campbell who scored here with "Wichita Line-man." A TV series called "The Best Of Glen Campbell" will be screened here later this year, and Kruger is fixing a special guest spot for his latest signing, Julie Rogers. Her first single for Ember "Almost Close To You" will be the song she sings as part of the British team for the Coupe d'Europe at Knokke this year. Kruger has also set up European release for Desmond Dekker's hit "Israelites." Cyril Black has left Nems Enter-prises which he joined six months ago from Screen Gems to set up its publishing arm. He is launching his own publishing venture and record label which will be called Black and

plans an initial release of eight al-bums. Black already operates Treble Music which owns over fifty copy-rights including numbers written by the Spectrum group. Executive moves within the Noel Gay Organization have resulted in Brian Hutch becoming associate di-rector of Noel Gay Music, a position he already holds in the Organization. His main function will be co-or-dinating the efforts of both wings, collaborating with Noel Gay chairman and managing director Richard Armi-tage and senior director Ralph Walker. David Wilkinson succeeds Hutch as light entertainment general manager, and, as previously reported. Ron McCreight is now manager of Noel Gay Music in succession to the late Johnny Mathieson. EMI Records launches its under-ground label Harvest June 6th with four albums and two singles. The LPs are "Anthems In Eden" by Shirley and Dolly Collins. "A Meal You Can Shake Hands With In The Dark" by Pete Brown and His Battered Orna-ments, "Rainmaker" by Michael Chapman, and "The Book Of Taliesyn' by Deep Purple. The initial Harvest singles will be "Evil" and "Death Of An Electric Organ" by Edgar Broughton and "It Didn't Work Out" and "Mozart Lives Upstairs" by Michael Chapman. Malcolm Jones is Harvest label manager, and future releases will feature the Pretty Things, Pink Floyd, Panama Jug Band, and Buffy Sainte Marie, who is licensed to Harvest by Vanguard. In a letter to a national newspaper **R.F.** Whale, Performing Right Society general manager, made a blistering attack on the Singapore Government in respect of copyright payments. R&BAssociation Formed In Eng.; Fidelity Opening Disk-Film Co. At 'Hall Of Fame,' Awards Started

LONDON — Citing the need to "im-prove the status of R&B music in Eng-land and to make the public aware that much of the music they buy is R&B, a group of enthusiasts and ex-perts have formed the Rhythm & Blues Association of Great Britain.

In precise terms—from the associa-tion's rules—the declared objectives are "to acknowledge achievements in advancing the cause of rhythm and blues in Great Britain; to chronicle the history of the music and to estab-lish an archive."

The association has started an R&B Hall of Fame, with the late Otis Red-ding receiving the first nomination. In addition, various annual awards have been instituted for male and female singers, groups and instrumentalists. In each section, there are two awards, one for the greatest commercial achievement or popular impact, the other for artistic merit.

The first annual awards for 1968 are to be presented at a grand dance to be held at the Ilford Palais, High Road, Ilford, Essex on Tuesday, May 20. It's hoped, an announcement said, that the association will be able to negotiate reduced club and concert admission fees for associate members open to all and establish regional branches so that enthusiasts can get together to discuss the music, play the records, organize social activities, etc.

Members of the council, limited to a total of 25, are: Mike Raven, chair-man; Keith Yershon, secretary/treas-urer; Roger St. Pierre, management committee member; Bob Peacock, management committee member; Dave Godin, management committee member; John Abbey, Trevor Chur-chill, Tony Cummings, Charlie Gillett, Stuart Henry, Norman Jopling, Dave McAleer, Clive Richardson, John Phili-bert, Gloria Marcantonio, David Nath-an, Robert Blackmore, Emperor Ros-ko, Johnnie Walker and Vicki Wick-ham.

Despite its impact in England, R&B has not received the recognition it de-serves, the association noted. "... it's serves, the association noted. "... it's place in America as an acknowledged art-form has been assured. Here in Britain it has tended to be dismissed on the one as 'specialist' and on the other as mere 'pop.'"





A recent newspaper story interview by one of Germany's most successful and prominent writer-producers **Kurt** Feltz sized up the situation of the German pop music market perfectly. There is a huge cleft between the youth who buy only U. S. and English records and the public who buy Ger-man language material, and it will be very hard to close that gap as the English language pop buyers now feel that if a song is done in the local language it must be old fashioned and bad. This gap is the fault of an in-dustry which did not make the transi-tion of modern music possible through good, modern German language pro-ductions. good, m ductions.

ductions. Although this situation is sad but true, there are a few bright interna-tional lights on the German music scene. The one most prominently dis-played in this column has been Bert Kaempfert who continues to shine through his tremendous sales on the international market and his songs which grace the hit parades of the world. The newest welcome addition to the international hit parade picture is James Last. James, who started the pop medley trend on the instrumental market and has regis-tered tremendous popularity in En-gland and other markets as well as here with his international albums, has now finally hit the charts in a big

way with one of his compositions. "Happy Heart" recorded by Andy Williams and Petula Clark is a smash hit in the States and looks like a world hit. It's got to be the first of many smash tunes from the pen of the talented Mr. Last and Cash Box wants to be one of the first to give him the recognition that he deserves. Rudolf Slezak is going after an-other top place in the charts with "Ragamuffin Man" from Manfred Mann. Rudi's got two in the top ten now with "First Of May" from the Bee Gees and "Crimson And Clover" with Tommy James and the Shondells. Teldec's got a stack of pop stars ready to go for Germany's Beat Club TVer. Included in the list are com-poser-singer Les Reed, Clodagh Rodgers, the Flirtations, U. K. Jones, Grisby Dyke, the Paul Williams Set and Sandie Shaw. Mudolf Gassner who has headed up the record department of the Hans Demmel indie distribution will leave the firm for a new post at D.G.G. on the first of July. Hans Demmel, Jr., takes over Mr. Gassner's old post. Elke Prinz of Aberbach Music tells us that the big local goodies for the publishing house are the new discs from Wencke Myhre, Grethe and Jorgen Ingmann, the Sandpipers and local star Renate Kern. That's it for this week in Germany.



From the recent single releases, D.J.s and pop commentators recom-mend Mary Hopkin's new recording "Good-bye" (Apple-Toshiba) as well as other strong discs such as "If You Go Away" by Scott Walker (Philips-Victor) extracted from his new al-bum "Scott 3," "Nothing To Hide" by Chris Montes (London-King), "Dizzy" by Tommy Roe (ABC-King), "Indian Giver" by the 1910 Fruitgum Co. (Buddah-Columbia), "I Started A Joke" by the Bee Gees (Polydor-Grammophon), "Crossroad" by the Cream (Polydor-Grammophon), "Tear. Drop City" by the Monkees (RCA-Vic-tor), "My World Is Empty Without You" by Jose Feliciano and "This Girl Is In Love With You" by Dionne Warwick (Scepter-Teichiku). Among San Remo songs, Gigliola Cinquetti's recording of "La Pioggia" released by King is doing well here, and D.J.s also recommend Bobby Solo's record-ing of the first prize winner "Zingara" coupled with "Un Sorriso" by Milva. From the recent single releases,

Teichiku Records, which had been comparatively depending upon the local recordings, recently has decided to develop sales of international reper-toire. As the first step, they are put-ting promotional emphasis on two artists, **Dionne Warwick** and **Joe** Simon, by featuring **Dionne's** above

mentioned new single "This Girl Is In Love With You" and her two al-bums, "Dionne Warwick Deluxe Al-bum" and the currently recorded "sensivility," and two singles of Joe Simon, "Hangin' On" and "Long Hot Summer," and his album, first re-leased in Japan, including these singles. Nancy Wilson will appear in Tokyo this month to give three concerts. In June, Herbie Mann Quintet will make a three week tour and appear in seven cities including Tokyo and Osaka. The current classic music scene is

a three week tour and appear in seven cities including Tokyo and Osaka. The current classic music scene is filled with well-known overseas artists. For the Osaka Festival the Toronto Symphony Orchestra conducted by Seiji Ozawa, Bulgarian-born pianist Alexis Weissenberg, and the Beaus Arts Trio from New York have been invited. After the Festival, these art-ists also appeared in Tokyo for several concerts. Karl Richter conducted Bach concerts, and Austrian pianist Fried-rich Gulda and Swiss flutist Aurele Nicolet are just on a Japanese tour. From Russia, violinist Igor Oistrakh is coming late this month, and Ingrid Haebler, Austrian pianist, is scheduled to visit here for a two week tour. It is reported that Van Cliburn will make his second Japanese tour in June; his first tour of two years ago was a tremendous success.

instituted a program to nurture and develop local writers, the outstanding success being Clive Westlake. This pro-gram was coupled with the acquisition of strong writer oriented catalogs such as Jim Webb's Canopy Music and Lei-ber and Stoller's Trio Music. It be-came a must for English artists, rec-ord producers and A & R men to make periodic pilgrimages to the Car-lin offices.

When all this activity was joined with Carlin's promotional push the results were outstanding. According to a United States trade paper com-pilation in December of 1968, Carlin and it's affiliated companies had 48 "A" sides in the English top 50 charts for calendar year 1968. The gross in-come of Carlin for 1968 more than tripled what it was for the year prior to the Bienstock regime.

Considering that Carlin already had the jumbo sized Hill and Range cata-log, the huge Belinda catalog and the catalogs of Belinda's English affiliated companies such as the Shadows Music and Cliff Richards Joanaline Music, the income trebling could not have occurred merely from control of nine-teen percent of the "A" sides on the British top fifty charts.

Other Techniques

Bienstock developed and utilized Bienstock developed and utilized other income producing techniques. A program was instituted to plug "B" sides. If Carlin, or Carlin through one of its American licensors had pub-lishing rights for a "B" side where the "A" side was commercial for the English market, Carlin's professional staff could usually succeed in obtaining the release of the record. Record com-pany execs were anxious to release the release of the record. Record com-pany execs were anxious to release records that would be promoted by Carlin. Promotion of "B" sides con-trolled by Carlin began on the day of release through plugging the "A" side not controlled by Carlin. This policy was different from past custom where the "B" side publisher took a free ride on the "A" side.

Albums containing Carlin composi-tions also receive the same treatment as singles. Air play is obtained for suitable cuts. Efforts are made to keep in contact with record company sales departments to advise them of Carlin's promotional activity so as to insure wide distribution of the plugged album. Carlin, where possible, tries to coordinate promotion and air play with the record companies promotion department. department.

After two top chart records an artist usually has an album released and after three top chart records future singles are susally automatically top of the chart bound. To cash in on this phenomenon Bienstock stressed the need for artist oriented situations where Carlin will control a continuity of copyrights recorded by that artist or the maximum portion of the artists

recorded output over a long period of time. Since needle time is limited in England, exposure is obtained for artists on radio and on television. Ef-forts are made to obtain heavy air play on Radio Luxembourg, an important continental station beamed for listen-ing in England.

Thus far, for the first quarter of 1969 Carlin has upped its representa-tion of "A" and "B" sides in the top 50 British charts to approximately twenty-five percent or as stated by Derek Knibb, "twenty-five percent of the mechanical income earned in England by top 50 records." Several times during the first quarter of 1969 Carlin has had over 30 sides repre-sented at one time in the top 50 charts. At various times since the Bienstock take over Carlin has had approximate-ly 100 songs represented in the top 40 albums.

More Deals In View

To extend Carlin's dominence of the British publishing scene, Paul Rich is presently pacting new writers and negotiating for varied additional re-presentations. Since just about every artist in England regularly visits Car-lin or is readily available to Rich and his staff, he now needs a stepped up volume of fresh and new material. Rich's provisioning business seems to be flourishing, since he's recently had top chart single hits with such artists as Tom Jones, Scott Walker, Barry Ryan, Pet Clark, Dusty Springfield, Sandy Shaw, Eric Burdon, . . . and the list goes on and on.

Some British artists presently re-presented by Carlin are Cliff Richards, The Shadows, Eric Burdon, The Kinks, Scott Walker, The Walker Brothers, Amen Corner, The Herd, The Pen-tangle, Anita Harris, Alan Price, and The Fortunes. Some producers asso-ciated with Carlin are Mickey Most, Shel Talmy, Joe Lustig, Eddie Trevett, Jack Good, Miki Dallon, Delysee Records.

Among the American representa-tions are Motown Records Jobete Mu-sic, Dunhill and Trousdale, Jim Webb's Canopy Music, White Whale Records and The Turtles, T.M. Music, Leiber and Stoller's Trio Music, Starday Pub-lishing Company, Johnny Rivers Mu-sic, Lew Adlers Hollenbeck Music, Elvis Presley Music, Lee Hazelwoods publishing firms, Dave Kaprilac's Daly City Music, Camad Music, Nancy Sinatra's publishing firm, Hill and Range songs, White Plains Music and A & M Records Rondor Music.

Rich is presently planning a cam-paign to have the top English pop charts list 100 songs instead of the present 50. "At this rate," he says. "the day will soon come when I've got a 50 song chart and 51 hits."

EDITORIAL: Reaching Out For The Leisure Dollar

Among the most attractive buys on the stock exchange these days are those companies which in some way serve the leisure needs of the public. Firms involved in virtually anything leisure-oriented, from music publishing to sporting goods to travel, are looking real tasty to the stock buyer; why not, with all the talk about the impending boom in the leisure time dollar.

To be sure, Federal agencies have issued statistical information pointing toward a shorter work day and a bigger pay check for the average American, granting him more off-hours and more dough to spend enjoying those hours than ever before in history. But while the music and games industry plays a vital role in providing leisure activity, we seriously wonder if our trade is ready and able to exploit its potential to the fullest. In other words, if the jukebox business is going to get its share of the leisure cream pie, can it be done solely through its present concentration on the street location? We doubt it.

Like the no-talent starlet who believes the publicity her press agent creates for her, the coin machine operator is committed to the false axiom that there are simply no new locations to be found . . . none, that is, except your competitors' spots. This "closed" situation is partially true with respect to taverns, restaurants and the other street spots where more seem to be shutting down than opening up. However, it's quite possible that we've only scratched the surface of potential locations by not looking beyond the street site.

Where else could you look to put a game or a jukebox? Well, thanks to some really enterprising operators, locations never before approached for our type of product now have it. From department stores, to shopping center malls, schools, hospitals, factories, offices, right down to service stations and even bus stops, sites are being secured virtually everywhere the buying public congregates. Often the contractual agreement between operator and proprietor differs radically from the more established 50-50 split. It could be a lease, a fixed fee, a rental of space or a dozen other notions,

many of which might appear abnormal to a jukebox operator but are nevertheless sound and sensible arrangements. Often these totally new locations will accept a substantially lower commission from your equipment, having never been approached by an operator before and being totally unfamiliar with industry "standards."

One positive step to reach these new locations is to exhibit coin equipment at their regional and national association conventions. To be sure, most of these shows have been bypassed by our distributors and manufacturers to avoid any possibility of becoming associated with a direct-to-location sale. This is totally ridiculous since most of our coin dealers rigidly adhere to the "code of the operator". All they have to do is accept leads from location representatives who express an interest in an item on display and then pass the lead onto a good operator in that location's area. This gives the dealer another machine sale and the operator another location. Simple . . . and effective.

Cash Box representatives have attended hundreds of exhibits held by other industries over the years and in the vast majority of cases, have never run into a coin equipment dealer. Some tradesmen may say the situation could get "touchy" if a location demanded to buy one of the exhibited machines for itself, but in the overwhelming majority of cases, the interested party is quite satisfied to receive one of your "representatives" (the operator) and accept his terms.

Simply, these other-industry trade shows offer a superb showcase for music and games - an ideal launching pad for getting our machines and operators into locations here-to-fore untapped. If the show be a regional affair, the distributor should exhibit. National conventions should be the domain of the manufacturer who in turn could refer leads onto his regional distributor who would select an operator and consummate the deal.

There are many methods for effectively approaching the new location but we think this trade show technique is one of the best.

Prestige of 8-Ball Tourneys Visible At S.D. Finals

PIERRE, S.D. — Although South Da-kota Governor Frank Farrar was un-able to drive into Pierre for the two-day eliminations climaxing the State Association's recent 8-ball tournament due to a snowstorm, Pierre Mayor Godfrey amply filled the bill as offi-cial presenter of trophies and prizes to the finalists. The mayor's presence was indicative of the prestige these local 8-ball events command, accord-ing to operator Johnny Trucano, him-self an active promoter of these con-tests.

tests. A total of \$2,100 in prizes, plus tro-phies, was awarded to those skillful enough to finish in the money out of the 126 players who competed. The finals, held in the Pierre City Audito-rium, climaxed eight weeks of elimi-nations at the location level. A list of winners and prizes was carried in last week's issue of Cash Box.

Granger Calls for Director Nominations

CHICAGO — According to an announce-ment mailed out to the MOA member-ship last week by executive vice presi-dent Fred Granger, the association's bylaws require the Nominating Com-mittee to propose a slate for the elect-ion of directors to serve on the MOA board. The slate will be presented to the membership during the forthcom-ing Exposition in September. The General Membership meeting will be held on Saturday, September 6, 1969. Candidates for the Board of Direc-tors must be submitted to the Nomina-ting Committee for investigation at least ninety days prior to the election and each candidate must be endorsed by five members in good standing. MOA members are invited to recom-mend candidates for the Board of Di-rectors. All are eligible to stand for election provided they are endorsed by five members as stated above. All recommendations must be mailed to MOA, and postmarked not later than June 6, 1969 (ninety days prior to the General Membership Meeting). From

the recommendations received, ten vacancies on the board will be filled this year. Present directors whose terms are expiring are not eligible to run again until one year has elapsed.

to run again until one year has elapsed. Said Granger: "We suggest that you not recommend any candidates until you have consulted them first. You should be sure that they are members in good standing (dues paid), that they will accept if nomi-nated, and that they know what is involved. Directors are expected to attend two meetings of the board per year for which they pay their own expenses. A director's basic respon-sibility is to deliberate matters of benefit to the membership and the industry, and to represent the views of the members in his own area or in his state, and/or local association. Being an MOA director has become a serious matter requiring only those who are willing and able to devote time to the association. The term of a director is three years."

Servomation Depreciation **Results In Higher Earnings**

NEW YORK — Thanks largely to their newly-instituted vending machine de-preciation policy, the Servomation Corp. has reported increases of 12% in sales and 22% in net income for the nine months ending March 29, 1969, over the equivalent period the pre-ceding year. Net income announced was \$7,600,000 up from \$6,200,000. Servomation president Allan P. Lucht stated that the increases re-flect a change in depreciation policy which added \$1,280,000 to net income. The change was a "lengthening of depreciable lives of certain vending equipment to eight years from pre-viously assigned lives averaging be-tween five and six years," Lucht re-vealed. NEW YORK — Thanks largely to their vealed.

vealed. "Improved refurbishing techniques and a decrease in the rate of obsoles-cence indicated in our experience with more recently designed machines have contributed to our decision to make this change. Also, this change brings our depreciation policy in line with that followed currently by other major companies in our industry." The prepared statement announcing the depreciation change made no men-tion of Servomation's reportedly ex-tensive music and games operations.

Howard Johnson Sets

Florida Vending Div. NEW YORK — Howard Johnson Com-pany will soon start Florida operation of its Automatic Merchandising Divi-sion, according to Carlos M. Fisher Jr., general manager of the division. Two new buildings, a 5,000-square-foot one at 2241 N.W. 77th Terrace in Miami, and a 7,500-square-foot in-stallation at 1250 Central Florida Park-way in Orlando, will service the vend-ing machine operations. Fisher said the division will service about 150 locations with cigarette, candy, cold beverage and travel aid coin-operated machines.

coin-operated machines. Service from the Miami installation will begin early in May. The Orlando building is under construction. Head-quarters for the division's Florida op-erations will be in Orlando.

Max Klein . . . About Music

YONKERS, N. Y. — There are no "maybe's" in Max Klein's comments on how to run a successful music route — just sound, sensible policy deter-mined after decades building his luc-rative Moder Amusement Co. through-out upper New York and Westchester County. Max, whose route consists predominantly of music machines, says only two factors account for suc-cess in the jukebox business — new machines and better records.

Klein has placed complete author-ity for the selection of new records upon his collectors. "The routemen know the tastes of their locations bet-ter than anyone," he says. "Our's work on a commission basis . . . the better the gross, the more they make. Like being in business for themselves with-out the investment. A man works hard-er this way than if he was on a straight salary. They fuss over every location and make sure each machine has the tunes their customers like best."

Klein says his collectors pick their record changes essentially from trade chart listings and from the firm's ex-tensive library of request oldies. Each man listens to the records at the one-stop because Klein believes the disks must fit the mod of the individual location. "Just because the trade papers say it's a big seller is not enough . . . it's got to fit the location. You've got to know what the record sounds like before you put it on a ma-chine. You know, we've got a few loca-tions that just don't want any hard rock music. You may have it number ome on your chart but we won't put it in that machine."

Most locations on the Moder Amuse-Most locations on the Moder Amuse-ment route are serviced once a week, Klein revealed, and receive between four and five new records . . . some-times more if it's a good spot. "Policy on our route is to slot the new records into the machine so that their title strips appear at the left side of the selector panel. "This way the custom-ers know where to look for the new items."

Request records are promptly filled, says Max, although some don't receive the amount of play to warrant keep-ing. "You know, we often get a record request from a location that might only appeal to one or two customers. If our collectors don't see any sub-stantial movement on the popularity wheel, we yank it after a few weeks trial."

Little LP's, according to Klein, are a "waist of money." After trying them over the years, he's found they cost more than they make by taking up a slot on the machine better filled by a best selling single. Concerning audio-visual entertainment, Klein says he's got no use for it on his route, al-though does foresee the day when the film jukeboxes will find their place. "I tried audio-visual in a couple of locations but after a few weeks, one of the owners asked us to remove it, the other spot just didn't make any money."

Besides the best records, Klein says the other important factor in success-ful music operation is new equipment. "The oldest jukebox on our route is five years old," he says. "We try to put out only the most recent models and phase out the older ones as quick as is economically possible. I realize this policy requires a tremendous fi-nancial investment but with proper depreciation, it makes good sense to me. Especially when you consider that new equipment earns the best buck on the location."

Approximately 60% of the music ma-chines on the Moder route are now op-erating on 2-25° play, with an aggres-sive campaign underway to put just about every one on the higher pricing. Recalling the difficulty he experienced years back boosting the play price from a nickel to a dime, Klein says the 2-25° transition is a breeze by com-parison. "Most of our locations operate on a minimum guarantee to us. They on a minimum guarantee to us. They are intensely interested in getting the

collection gross up and this made it relatively simple for us to convince them 2-25° play was necessary. It helps both parties, you see."

Klein says the whole secret to suc-cessful operation can be summed up in one phrase — "constant attention to the location." Good records, frequently changed, new equipment and now 2-25° pricing — policy laid down by a sea-soned music operator, a policy that bears out through one of the most pro-fitable routes in the territory — Moder Amusement.


Meet Maynard Hopkins





Mysterious Blast Hits Bally Plant; \$10,000 Damage

CHICAGO—An estimated \$10,000.00 damage was caused by a dynamite explosion at Bally Mfg. Corp., in the early hours of the morning on Mon-day, May 5.

Luckily enough, damage was con-fined to a section of the personnel department on the west side of the building and there were no injuries involved.

An investigation of the bombing is being conducted by the Chicago Po-lice Department.

Production is continuing without in-terruption, according to Bally's ad-vertising manager Herb Jones. "There was no damage at all to the factory," stated Herb. "We've got a lot of broken windows and, of course, the area involved is quite a mess but we're grateful for the fact that no one was injured. The explosion occurred around 1:00AM in the morn-ing and the watchman on duty was in an area of the building far removed from where the dynamite was placed."



Because Automatic Products Com-pany's dedication to (1) an electrically operated vendor, and (2) a large ca-pacity vendor would prove to be the answer to rising vending operation labor costs. Research and development has indeed paid off for Automatic Pro-ducts Company through the years. It has resulted in such innovations as the unique half-dollar acceptor with selective nickel change-maker, which accepts half dollars, quarters, dimes, and nickels, and returns change in nickels upon deposit of half dollar or two quarters. And, when the firm's sales truly began to climb in the late 1960's, it was ready to manufacture new products, with more exclusive advantages. The Candyshop, introduced in 1964, won instant operator acceptance — thanks not only to its large capacity but also to such features as "first in, first out," whereby the display bar is the one vended. 

State of the Trade In New Zealand

HAMILTON, NEW ZEALAND -- Coin trade news from New Zealand, one of the world's most scenic and tranquil nations, is certainly scarce at best. That's why we were tickled when we received the following piece of cor-respondence from W. A. Davies of Automatic Amusements Ltd. (this city) describing, in frank comments, the state of the operating business in this country. As Davies writes: The Amusement business as you Americans know it is practically non-existent; a few pin tables, mostly ob-solete, a handful of bingos (as far as I know the ones we operate are the only ones in the country), fairly good coverage with juke boxes, but this is a closed shop, they are simply not for sale owing to the difficulty of replac-ing them. The Amusement business are on single locations and would have been scrapped in the States years ago. The last twelve months has seen the advent of the mini-pool table which appears to be identical to yours; made locally it operates on twenty cents, has been placed in Hotel bars throughout the country by arrangement with the Breweries and is very popular. Ther manufacturers are coming of locations they face an uphill battle. The Pin Bowling has just been intro-duced. There are two locations in Auckland and one in Rotorua of twenty lanes each. I understand these are modelled on American lines. It is too early as yet to pass an opinion but with the comparatively big invest-ment required, they may suffer from our usual trouble, shortage of popula-tion.

tion. When you distribute two and three quarter million people over a country roughly the size of England, you will realise the scarcity of concentrated

realise the scarcity of concentrated areas. Probably our most popular enter-tainment media is the "Billiard Room" or cue lounge as I see they are called in America. These have improved greatly in standards but are still patronised almost exclusively by males, which of course has the same effect as leaving an anchor out. Inci-dentally our billiard table is twelve feet by six, and by far the most pop-ular game in Snooker. As long as our shortage of over-seas funds persists, with the resulting Import Restrictions, there seems little chance of getting hold of your modern

games, except where they can be made here with a low overseas content. Due to these various factors, you will appreciate why the amusement machine business is usually a sideline. Nevertheless, the pattern is similar to the States, the plums going to the operator with the latest products even though they are "old hat" in other countries. Sorry I cannot help with nictures
