Impact: When Only The Best Will Suffice

Of the many words, phrases and terms used to describe the record business — and there are many that describe every facet, some of them unprintable — one word seldom heard is "impact." And yet impact (and we're not referring to the group on Atco) is a very important term.

One area where impact seems to have considerable influence is on the charts. A record that sells 50,000 copies in one week is charted higher, because of its impact, than a record which sells 50,000 copies in four weeks. And an artist who has three records on the charts at once has much greater impact than an artist who has three records on the charts, one after another, in the same period of time.

Impact shows through in other ways. We've heard the term "major advertising push" almost as much as "unique marketing campaign." And yet some companies seem to have the knack for translating their press release promises into reality; when they go out into the marketplace, their words and thoughts become actions and deeds. And they have a much greater success rate as a result, and they're more believable. You get the impression that they know what they're talking about.

The dictionary defines impact as "forceful contact," and yet the record industry definition would seem to include integrity, credibility, capability and all that goes with it. It means that the people doing the job, and the product that results from their efforts, is credible, believed, and is used as an important tool. It is not enough to simply be first with an idea or concept; you have to be the best. A halfhearted approach never suffices when only the best is required. And is available.

As 1976 draws to a close, and the constant change that surrounds each of our lives continues, perhaps our goals, both long and short term, can best be analyzed and put in perspective by taking a few moments out for self-examination and introspection. For some of us, that means an added opportunity to assess our own corporate and personal impact: how do we affect the lives of those people around us — in business and in pleasure — from both business and personal standpoints?

For some of us, the answer comes down to impact: to what extent are we affecting our friends and associates? Are we doing the best we possibly can? Are we achieving our goals, always setting higher ones? Are we properly adapting to new circumstances and situations, quickly and comfortably? Are we succeeding? Those of us who can answer yes, or reasonably in the affirmative, sense that we possess that impact, that positive force. In that case, the only thing that remains is to transfer that feeling and emotion to others.

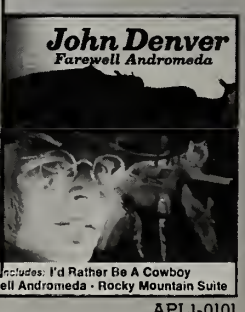
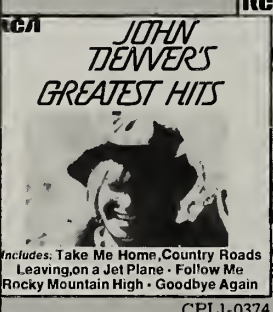
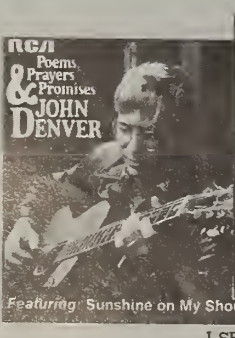

Thanksgiving Business Up At Most Retailers, Wholesalers

NEW YORK — The holiday record buying season officially began last week with Thanksgiving and preliminary indications are that it got off to a good start. Although complete sales figures are not yet available in many cases, the consensus seems to be, that 'business was good, often very good.'

Some forty retailers and wholesalers across the nation offered to discuss their operations during the recently completed extended weekend, and a whopping 85% indicated that sales were up at their respective operations over a comparable period last year. Figures most frequently quoted regarding the extent of that increased business ranged from 10% to 25%. In New York, however, the numbers were much higher, due largely to the fierce competition currently being waged at the retail level. King Karol and Jimmy's Music World posted substantial gains, while sales at Sam Goody were significantly higher despite the fact that the chain ran an all-label sale last year at that time.

Predictably, the bestselling albums during the week were Stevie Wonder's "Songs In The Key Of Life," Joni Mitchell's new release, "Hejira," and Jackson Browne's "The Pretender." Following close behind were "Tonight's The Night" by Rod Stewart, "Frampton Comes Alive," "Spirit" by EWF, "Boston," and recently released "Best Of" compilations by the Doobie Brothers, James Taylor and George Harrison.

"Up Nearly 10%"

Sam Goody president George Levy reported that sales for the Goody retail chain were "up over last year by close to 10%. For Thanksgiving week, we ran a \$2.99 special of the day, limited to one album, but we were up against last year's figures. Still, we did better because it was a very good, healthy Thanksgiving. We had some audio items on sale, and I think the in-

crease was significantly tied into the Christmas season opening, but overall, everything just seemed to go right."

Stu Schwartz, chairman of the board for Schwartz Brothers, Inc., owners of the 15-store Harmony Hut chain, said that "percentage wise, we didn't have a substantial increase; it was a little under 5%. Our stores were not open Thanksgiving, and we didn't have a special sale for the holiday period. I personally saw the Frampton move real well, and one of the other factors that led to our increase was the substantial increase in the sale of 8-tracks and cassettes."

Business Up 40%

"Business on Friday was up two-fifths over a normal Friday," said Doren Rowland, operations and buying coordinator for Los Angeles' Licorice Pizza Records. "More interesting, though, is that the Wednesday before Thanksgiving netted \$7,000 more than the Friday after. Our two weekend days were average. Boston is still the hot

band," Rowland said, "as are Stevie Wonder, Rod Stewart, the Doobies, Joni Mitchell and Jackson Browne."

A spokesperson for Peaches Records in Los Angeles reported business as "fabulous, really good." Joni Mitchell, Jackson Browne, Donna Summer and Stevie Wonder were big sellers, although there were no promotions, giveaways or advertising at the time. "We did over double our normal business," said Rick Laudati, store manager.

"We were very pleased with our Thanksgiving sales," said Dave Marker, treasurer for Music Plus in Los Angeles. "On a five-store basis (which was the number of Music Plus stores in operation last year), we were up 24% over last year and 18% for the six-day Thanksgiving week compared to a normal seven-day week. Nothing new was selling particularly well," Marker said, "basically the same items as before. We had a lot of in-store promotion, like we always do. Our gift-pack, consisting

of a t-shirt, belt buckle and album by a particular artist, sold very well."

"Fantastic"

Ben Karol, a principal of King Karol in New York, said that his chain's volume for the holiday period was "way above

anything we expected." Karol indicated that the increase from last Thanksgiving to this one was "between 50 and 60%. We lowered the shelf price to \$4.49 five weeks ago and it really caught on for the big holiday push. It was almost like magic and we had the biggest weekend we ever had, outside of Christmas. We haven't stopped promoting the lower price; it's a constant thing here."

Grace Ebber, production coordinator for Southern Records, a Miami one-stop, commented, "Our sales have been about the same as last year; we haven't got hit by the Christmas rush yet. We haven't done all that fantastic, since nobody's coming in for any tremendous orders. I think one reason is that it's still warm here and the consumer demand won't pick up until we have some cold days."

John Guarnieri, head LP buyer and assistant manager of Mushroom Records in New Orleans, said the first three days of the Thanksgiving week were good days, with above average business. Friday was a real good day," he added, "as we were up about 8 to 10% in sales. Since we're not a top 200 store, we didn't tend to sell anything especially heavy. But our catalog sold well all around. A Dave Mason concert on Thanksgiving Day in the city helped to move Mason's current live LP, and Boston's current release did well. Local newspaper ads and radio spots highlighting the Mason concert were used, but no special in-house sales or promotions were in effect."

Bad Weather

In Denver, Peaches store manager Mel Goodenow said Thanksgiving weekend was "extremely good. We were expecting, though, 50 to 70% more sales over last year's Thanksgiving, based on the overall year we've been having, but the bad weather caused us trouble. We only did 10

Wallichs, Into Discounting, Reports Sales Up By 25%

LOS ANGELES — Since going discount November 21, Wallichs Music City, the seven-store Southern California retailer, has increased LP sales by "about 25%," according to Clyde Wallichs, company president. Last year, record sales accounted for 42.4% of the company's income, but sales dropped to \$2,506 million from the previous year's figure of \$2,834 million, prompting the move to competitive pricing. Local competitors obviously had been grabbing an increasing share of the market through discount pricing, away from Wallichs.

Wallichs has countered and will continue with "heavy promotion between now and Christmas," according to Wallichs, "and

we've been improving every day." The promotion has chiefly been in the form of ads in the Calendar section of the Sunday *Los Angeles Times*, a supplement to the paper that details entertainment news, and a radio promotion campaign.

Radio Buys

Wallichs' radio ads are centered on seven Los Angeles stations, one with a jazz format, one easy listening, and the remainder rock stations. "I'd say part of the success we're experiencing is due to the radio spots. We figure they're 75% youth-oriented, and 25% adult," commented Wallichs. "The youth seem to be more concerned with price," he volunteered, "so we gear the ads on radio for them."

Christmas Retail Push Enters Second Week; Multi-Dealer Ads Pose Variety Of Questions

NEW YORK — Print ads for records and tapes continued to burgeon for the second week in a row as a result of the industry's Christmas sales push. Unusually heavy concentrations of such ads were monitored this week in most of the 23 major markets in the **Cash Box** retail price survey. Consequently this week's retail price list (see page 16) is considerably longer than any other since the survey began six months ago.

Other key developments in the survey were:

- Another four-color ad supplement sponsored by ABC Record and Tape Sales, this time in Portland.
- A grand opening sale as Jimmy's Music World in New York opened two new stores.
- A multi-dealer ad in Cleveland that included a specific price.
- The complete Beatles catalog for \$98.00 at Disc Records in Cleveland.
- Ads over 10 pages at Hitsville in Los Angeles.

ABC Supplement

The same four-color ad supplement which appeared last week in Atlanta and Indianapolis (**Cash Box**, December 4) was part of the Sunday *Portland Oregonian* this week. Again co-sponsored by ABC Record and Tape Sales, the supplement advertised 212 releases, many of them currently top-

charted, at Fred Meyer's 20 stores in the Portland area. Fred Meyer, a general merchandise chain, operates 30 stores in Oregon, 20 in Washington, three in Montana and one in Anchorage, Alaska.

As in the supplements run with Rich's in Atlanta and Ayr-Way in Indianapolis, most of the releases advertised in Fred Meyer's supplement were promoted at the chain's current shelf price for \$6.98 list releases, \$5.87/\$6.88 tape. Like the other ads, too,

this one included a cover item concerning "Gold Star Specials," unspecified releases which were tagged at \$3.99/\$4.99 tape. However, in the Portland supplement only, it was claimed that these albums are regularly priced at "\$5.47 to \$5.87."

A spokesman for Fred Meyer explained that the 20-25 releases with gold stars on them, all currently hot items, normally retail for \$5.47 in the chain's stores. He blamed both this error and the inclusion of several of the "gold star specials" among the releases advertised for shelf price on ABC Record and Tape Sales, which conceived and printed the supplement. "I know that was not the way it was supposed to come

out. They should have had a lower price on those albums. But they claimed they had to put it together so far in front that they couldn't decide what the top 20 was in October (when the ad was printed.)"

Expect Increased Volume

In order to correct the impression given by the supplement, Fred Meyer advertised its top 20 releases separately in another ad for \$3.99/\$4.99 tape. This ad was run in the same issue of the *Oregonian* that carried the supplement.

Thus far, Fred Meyer's spokesman stated, the ABC supplement has had a very good effect on business. "In five days, we've sold about 30-35 percent of the initial shipment (from ABC). Sales in general were extremely strong over the (Thanksgiving) weekend, and when the ad broke, it was even better."

"We're planning on running way ahead in our record department for the month (compared to last December). It (the supplement) was a major expenditure on their (ABC's) part and a major expenditure on our part, so we're looking for a 50-60 percent increase for the month."

ABC first approached Fred Meyer about putting together the supplement last summer. The chain's spokesman cited three factors in Fred Meyer's decision to go along with its rack jobber on this promotion: first,

Within two weeks of its release, Columbia Records' "A Star Is Born" album is already capturing the attention of the nation. The album is one part of a project that combines the talents of Barbra Streisand and Kris Kristofferson in a major motion picture and a record album event. Though the album is in one sense a soundtrack, its own importance is born out by its debut this week at #133 with a bullet on the **Cash Box** Top 200 LP chart, several weeks prior to the film's general release.

Ms. Streisand's involvement in the album is unprecedented in her career. In addition to singing, she has composed three songs, including "Evergreen (Love Theme From 'A Star Is Born')," which she co-wrote with Paul Williams especially for this project. As a single, the song debuts on this week's **Cash Box** top 100 singles chart at #78 with a bullet. In addition, Ms. Streisand coproduced the album with Phil Ramone.

The "A Star Is Born" album is the object of the most extensive marketing campaign ever developed by Columbia Records for a soundtrack release. It is being treated as a new Streisand/Kristofferson release as well as an original soundtrack, laying the groundwork for the opening of the film on Christmas day in over three hundred theaters nationwide. An extensive cross-advertising program has been set up by Columbia Records, Warner Bros. Pictures and Warner Books, in which each component will feature special tags for each the other two.

The album features Streisand and Kristofferson along with an outstanding array of songwriting talents including Rupert Holmes, Paul Williams, Kenny Ascher, Kenny Loggins, Alan and Marilyn Bergerman, and Donna Weiss.

In conjunction with "A Star Is Born," a special two-hour "Barbra Streisand Retrospective," produced by RKO General Radio, will run on the RKO chain's Top 40 stations this month.

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RIAA Committee Continues Commitment To Bar Coding

NEW YORK — The coding committee of the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) met, once again, to discuss its infant proposal to develop industry-wide standards for barcoding records and tapes. After a few tentative, uncertain steps over the course of several hours of meetings, those in attendance agreed that the product of their labors would indeed be able to stand on its own terms at some future date. No one, however, was sure how long the period of development might last.

Cause for optimism was generated by the results of a prior meeting in Los Angeles on October 13 (**Cash Box**, Oct. 23) and two subsequent regional meetings held over the ensuing several weeks. From those meetings, the committee has been able to arrive at several consensus decisions that will be necessary and crucial for further progress on the issue.

Draft Proposal

The committee has decided that any proposal drafted for consideration will probably consist of modifications to the existing Universal Product Code (UPC), a system of "bars" printed in vertical strips on a package and already generally used by grocery and drug manufacturers. Under that will most likely be added a type of Optical Character Recognition code (OCR) which, as its name implies, can be readily understood by the inventory managers, warehouse employees and store personnel who will work most closely with whatever system is adopted.

At the committee's October 13 meeting, its members felt that the most practical approach would be the utilization of a ten-character code consisting of a UPC bar symbol in addition to the ten numerical symbols from an OCR code. Further discussions at regional meetings confirmed those feelings. However, because of the relative unfamiliarity of any system of coding in the recording industry in general, it remained uncertain if these modifications could, in fact, be incorporated.

An additional point of agreement coming from the earlier general meeting involved the actual breakdown of the ten-character code. As was proposed in Los Angeles, the first four numerals would represent either a label or the actual record manufacturer, the fifth would indicate configuration as to album, 8-track tape cassette, etc. and the remaining five numerals would signify the title of the work. By the end of the meeting, the consensus of industry representatives in attendance indicated a preference for label designation over manufacturer designation, an important point of disagreement that had arisen at the regional meetings. With the use of label designation, a label would retain its number regardless of any changes in manufacturer or distributor affiliation.

However, more importantly, the meeting produced a modification in the 4-1-5 breakdown of numerals that may make an eventual proposal from the RIAA more readily acceptable to the Uniform Product Code Council, an independent firm which allocates the first five numerals in sequence for the purposes of company and industry identification. The second group of five numerals is assigned by the licensed company for produce designation.

Though the cost of assigning each five-numeral group to a manufacturer is relatively modest (somewhere between \$200 and \$300 was the range most often quoted, the UPC council has only 10,000 groups of numbers available to designate for every prospective company in all industries combined (99,000 through 00,000). Due to the need for each company to acquire a separate number for each product configuration (the fifth numeral of

ten under the 4-1-5 proposal and, thus, issued by the council) and the large number of labels in existence, estimated at 2,600, it appeared doubtful that any proposal would be accepted by the council because of the number of numerical groups needed by the industry. Technical experts present at the conference expressed doubt whether the recording industry could expect to acquire the 6,000 numbers they might need.

Modification Proposed

Harold Okinow of Lieberman Enterprises proposed a modification of the system, tentatively accepted in Los Angeles, to 4-5-1. Under terms of this proposal, each label would need a new number after the cataloging of each 9,999 titles (the fifth numeral would now become part of the catalogue number) because the first number of each of those titles would be the same. The resultant saving in numbers, estimated at more than half those needed under a 4-1-5 proposal, was seen as a major breakthrough in proceeding to the next stage of development.

"That stage will be the identifying of a list of questions to be answered, mostly technical," according to Stanley Gortikov, president of the RIAA and chairman of the committee. This will occur over "long months" according to Gortikov and most of

the representatives present. "No target date has been set (for institution of the system)," Gortikov remarked. "It will just evolve, going as fast as it can. In the meantime, we'll continue committee and sub-committee meetings."

One non-technical problem, though, on which considerable attention will be focused, will be the actual placement of the bar code when it is instituted. The major drawback of the UPC bar code is the size and space required for graphic representation, an area approximately one inch high and one-and-a-half inches wide. Though it is widely agreed that the actual code will be placed on the back and probably on the bottom of the package, there is still the need to consider the individual artist's reaction to the appearance of such a package.

Gortikov believed that he didn't think it would be too critical an issue, but others who were present weren't as positive. "I think it may occasionally be a stumbling block," said Fred Langmeyer, director of inventory management for CBS. "The art department (at CBS) feels bar coding is inevitable. The art director doesn't like it but he's willing to accept it."

Hellicher

Daniel Heilicher, representing J.L. Marsh, the nation's largest rackjobbing operation, placed that issue in perspective. "There's a need for standardization to identify product so as both to facilitate returns and be better able to recycle internally and not have to return."

Copyright Office Expects Comments On Broadcastings Reg. Proposals

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Copyright Office has so far received no formal comments on regulations it proposed November 15. However, a spokesman for the office said he does expect a few by the December 15 deadline.

Liberal Interpretation

Two proposed regulations affect the music industry in the gut: music licensing and rights. The regulations interpret the new copyright law in a liberal fashion, giving a break to copyright owners.

The first proposal would allow the copyright office to open its public records to the filing of agreements between public broadcasting entities and copyright owners. Under the new law, public broadcasters pay royalties for the first time.

They may negotiate license agreements with music or other copyright owners. If they can't reach voluntary agreement, the Copyright Royalty Tribunal will impose a compulsory license.

In effect, the proposed rule gives the go-ahead to voluntary negotiations. By filing agreements, the copyright office is encouraging voluntary negotiations now, before the Royalty Tribunal is even established.

Performing rights organizations — ASCAP, BMI, SESAC — are expected to comment on this technical proposal as well as the broadcasters.

More Controversial

The second proposal, which seems to be more controversial, provides a "reasonable interpretation" of the new law's termination provisions by accepting termination notices before January 1, 1978, the earliest date specified by law.

The new law gives copyrights in their second term an extra 19 years of life. This is so existing copyrights can catch up with the new copyright term: life of the author plus 50 years. Because of the 19-year bonus, the law also gives copyright owners a chance to reclaim rights negotiated earlier.

The new law says when a copyright in its second term expires, a copyright owner may serve a two-year notice to the publisher or agent who has rights to use the

material that he or she intends to terminate or renegotiate the contract.

More Valuable

This is important because copyrighted material may be much more valuable now than at the time publishing rights were initially negotiated.

And the date the copyright office accepts these termination notices is important because some copyrights have only a few years left. Congress has renewed copyrights due to die in 1962 and every year since. Those copyrights have used up much of the 19-year bonanza.

Owners and Publishers

Naturally, copyright owners and publishers are the most interested parties in the termination-renewal proposal.

So far publishers are not revealing their cards. They say they haven't decided on commenting yet. Publishers stand to lose copyrights and money in the termination proceedings.

More aggressive is the American Guild of Authors and Composers (AGAC). AGAC has notified its member writers and composers of the law's change. It is encouraging members to evaluate the current value of their copyrights before terminating or renewing any contracts.

The Copyright Office says it expects to hear from AGAC and the publishers. There are questions of legal interpretation which may not be solved by the proposed regulations.

Note: The Copyright Office is *not* providing forms for copyright termination, as was reported last week.

Handleman Declares 5¢ Per Share Dividend

CLAWSON, MICH. — The Handleman Company has announced its quarterly dividend of \$.05 per share on the outstanding shares of common stock, payable Jan. 3, 1977, to stockholders of record as of Dec. 17, 1976. This represents the same payment per share as last quarter, when Handleman halved its quarterly dividend from 10¢ to 5¢ a share. (**Cash Box**, Sept. 25, 1976).

Audiofidelity Sets New Pop Division

NEW YORK — With the creation of a "new labels division," Audiofidelity Enterprises, Inc. is bidding for a share of the contemporary market for the first time in its 29 year history, according to Bill Gallagher, president. The division will comprise pop, jazz and classical artists performing on a number of associated labels.

Irv Lichtman will head the new division as managing director. Lichtman, who comes to Audiofidelity from the New York Times Music Corp., was editor-in-chief of **Cash Box** for ten years.

The division's debut album, the original cast recording of the London stage production "Ipi-Tombi" on the Ashtree label, is scheduled for December release. The show premieres January 12 at the Harkness Theater here. Other LPs and singles will be produced on the Hidden Sign and Image labels.

to 20% over last year's Thanksgiving, and we were probably up at least 20% for the weekend compared to the average weekend. Joni Mitchell, Jackson Browne, Rod Stewart, James Taylor's 'best of' album and the Dave Mason album were heavy sellers."

Raul Acevedo, vice president of Disc Records, based in Cleveland, termed Thanksgiving retail sales "incredible, with an 18% increase in our store. We ran select item sales and one of the main reasons for our increase was the fact that we had all our inventory in the stores this year. Also, our catalog sales were sensational and the weather was in our favor."

Norm Cooper, president of Norm Cooper, a Philadelphia one-stop, reported that "we did more piece volume from last year, but less gross volume, which isn't too groovy. We're not making as much because we're giving more away. We're the only business in the world that gives away hot product for the lowest price. The bottom line isn't as good as it used to be."

Linda Stelling, buyer for the Harvard Coop in Boston, released specific sales figures supporting her report that the Coop did very well for the Thanksgiving weekend. "For Thanksgiving weekend last year," Stelling said, "we did \$27,000 on Friday and \$26,000 on Saturday. This year we did \$31,000 on Friday and \$32,000 on Saturday. We had a department-wide sale, promoted by TV spots, full page newspaper ads and 74 spots on local radio. Also, there's been a lot of volume buying, with people coming in and buying more than one album."

Paul David, president of Stark Records in Cleveland, said his sales for Thanksgiving weekend were "10 to 12% ahead of last year." David stated that "heavy promotions in print and radio boosted our store-wide sale. The hot product also helped us, as well as the weather and the fact that people seemed to start their Christmas shopping earlier this year."

'Better Product'

Amos Coachman, owner of Coachman's, a retail store in Detroit, said his holiday sales increased 20%, "mainly because of the better product out this year, especially Stevie Wonder, Car Wash and EWF. I didn't run any holiday sales and I generally don't believe in sales at all. Another interesting thing is that Detroit doesn't have very high disco sales compared to the rest of the country, yet our sales still did well for the holiday."

Angott, a Detroit one-stop, did "a good holiday business, going about 20% better than last year," according to manager Tom Haynsworth. "Seasonal pickup, better product, especially Stevie Wonder, Car Wash, the Dramatics and Deniece Williams

on Columbia helped our Thanksgiving sales."

Vaughn Jones, record manager for Franklin Music in Atlanta, indicated that Franklin's holiday weekend record sales "did better than last year by 10%. We had the Mancini, Streisand and Presley Christmas albums on sale, but we didn't have a special Thanksgiving sale. Nadia's Theme is still our best seller and the new Joni Mitchell, George Harrison and Rod Stewart helped our holiday sales."

'Business Was Excellent'

In Houston, Pete Kartman, a buyer for Cactus Records, reported that "business was excellent due to the weather on Friday, but it slowed down a lot because of cold and clouds on Saturday." Kartman estimated the retail figures were "up at least a third over last year, although the store was only a few months old at that time. "We featured an A&M label sale that went very strong," he said. "Outside of the A&M label, Joni Mitchell, Seals and Crofts and James Taylor were the big sellers."

James Cooper, owner of Inner Sanctum Records in Austin, said business was up approximately \$200 Friday and \$300 Saturday over a normal weekend. "My business is mostly student-oriented, so I don't think we'll get too much trade over Christmas, but my Thanksgiving sales were up partly because of the big football game between Texas and Texas A&M. I noticed many of our customers were from out of town." Cooper singled out Stevie Wonder's and Jackson Browne's newest albums as two that sold "very well" over the holiday.

Jeff Teitlebaum, buyer for Jimmy's Music World, said sales for the holiday weekend were "fantastic." Jimmy's had only two stores last year, as opposed to their current 13, but one significant figure Teitlebaum revealed was a total of 83,000 album units moved from Jimmy's warehouse to the stores during Thanksgiving week. "Our sales were promoted for the holiday weekend; as a result, we doubled the amount of our catalogue sales, and our tape sales also increased," he said. "The big sellers for the holiday were Stevie Wonder, KC, the Spinners, and the real surprise of the season, Dr. Buzzard."

Jim Grimes, buyer for National Record Mart, estimated his sales were up about 10% altogether, and about 5% without the new stores added since last year. "We had small, scattered select item sales," he said, "and the R&B product really picked up for us. Our two best sellers for the holiday were Rod Stewart and the new Stevie Wonder."

Ben Daniel, assistant manager of Peaches in Delwood, Mo., said Thanksgiving weekend sales were "double for a normal weekend. We sold 100% more albums than usual, without doing anything out of the ordinary in terms of sales or promotions." Daniel said that many artists' "Greatest Hits" LPs were fast movers. He said the heaviest sellers were merely the "same top sellers of the past several weeks, the Framptons and the Wonders." With the exception of record companies tagging his store in their ads, no special sales or promotions were used.

'All Hell Broke Loose'

Larry Webb, assistant manager of Peaches in St. Louis, also reported a big weekend. "We doubled sales over Thanksgiving," he said. "On Wednesday, we had four times the normal business. Thursday was slow, but on Friday and Saturday we easily doubled sales. All hell broke loose. We sold out of Frampton, the Bob Seger "Live Bullets," and Jackson Browne. We also sold a lot of Dave Mason, Boston, and tons of Chrysalis product."

Stan Gleason, manager of the Peaches store in Atlanta, said that his holiday sales were "30-35% above last year's. In-store appearances by Boston and Hall and Oates really helped sales, and Turley Richards did an in-store concert which turned out very nice. We let people know we were open Thanksgiving, and they came in like

crazy." He indicated that the new EWF had done well and the releases of Christmas albums like John Denver's and the Jacksons, "have picked things up."

David De Fravio, vice president of retail sales for the 78-store Record Bar chain, indicated that sales for Thanksgiving Friday were "up 25% from last year, and sales for Saturday were up 18%. We had storewide sales, and the hit product did well for us. The bad weather actually helped us, because most of our stores are mall stores, and we find people are more likely to shop in slightly inclement weather. We're looking to the best Christmas in our history."

Reaction From Tower Stores

"We doubled our biggest retail weekend of the year," said Stan Goman, manager of the Tower Records store in San Francisco. "This was about 10-20% better than last Thanksgiving. We were extremely well-covered with sales, as we had a classical advertisement, a Columbia sale and a two-fer jazz sale all on."

"Our Thanksgiving profits increased 20-25% over what we did last year," said Mike Koontz, manager of the Sacramento Tower Records store. "This is about 10% more than our average weekend. The only sale that we had going was Columbia's. Our major artists were the ones selling," Koontz added, "only in larger quantities."

Tower Records in Los Angeles "enjoyed ourselves and had a good time," according to manager Charlie Shaw. "We were 14% above a normal weekend but 2% below last

Thanksgiving. The only promotion we had going was a player piano giveaway in conjunction with RCA and the Savannah Band, and we had a jazz sale."

Rick Briare, manager of Towers Records in San Diego, said his store "didn't do as well as we expected. While we were considerably above a normal weekend, we were only on a par with what we accomplished last Thanksgiving."

Jim Burge, buyer for Poplar Tunes, a Memphis one-stop and retailer, said his retail store "was attacked by bad weather, resulting in a sales decline for Thanksgiving day from last year. We didn't have any special sales, and the Car Wash and Brick albums did well on their own. The one-stop did well on top 30, but catalog sales were down."

Ron Rodgers, owner of Angott one-stop in Detroit, said he had a "20% better Thanksgiving this year from last. Rodgers didn't feel any particular package or line boosted sales, but attributed the sales increase to a "seasonal pickup and earlier Christmas shopping this year."

Thanksgiving week sales at Waxie Maxie in Washington were "very disappointing," according to Max Silverman, president of Waxie Maxie. Silverman said, "We fell down about 20%, even though we had a lot of promotion. We had a full page in the Washington Post the Sunday before, we were on six radio stations, we had a special sale where we gave away a lot of merchandise

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West End Opens 3 Labels; Springs Dual Pricing Policy

NEW YORK — Newly formed West End Music has announced the release of six LPs on three labels, with two different pricing structures for distributors. West End has released the sound track from "How Funny Can Sex Be?" in keeping with their adult market slant, and "Black Emmanuelle," now entering major markets as a motion picture. Gospel recordings from the company will on the Spire label, and ethnic recordings, primarily belly-dancing, will come on the Ameraba logo.

Ed Kushins and Mel Cheren, who were together at Scepter, are corporate owners-partners in the new company, and John Bowden, formerly general manager of Hob Records, takes over the same post at West End.

Distr. Pricing

The innovative pricing structure for distributors revolves around the guaranteed return. The industry's practice of payment for LPs within sixty days, with a 2% discount and 100% return policy will be optional with the distributor, and faces a challenge from a no-return policy, that allows a lower price for the distributor.

West End records, for example, will have a suggested retail price of \$6.98. With a full return guarantee a distributor will pay \$2.95. Without this guarantee, he will pay \$2.50. For gospel LPs on the Spire label with return privileges, the distributor price is \$2.50, as compared to \$2.10 for foregoing returns. Kushin thinks the added flexibility for the distributors will result in higher volume and fewer returns, and that the added sales will make up for any additional bookkeeping expenses.

"Soundtracks, which we have on West End, we would discourage from having the no return price," explained Kushins, "but for some distributors, soundtracks move well, and so, if they don't need a return policy, this'll save them some money."

Taking a Chance

Kushins says the 40¢ to 45¢ break is "about what it costs me to take a return. I know I'm taking a chance, but I think that if a distributor can make a fair profit from me he'll treat me well." The only "flaw" in the

plan, which Kushins admitted, is that some distributors may elect the no-return discount option, and if their albums don't sell as well as expected, may try to barter with distributors who have return clauses. For example, a distributor with two hundred belly-dancing albums in his warehouse and no return privilege may trade the albums to someone with return guarantees in exchange for cash, other albums, or a "split" of what would have been a 40¢ to 45¢ loss over and above the cost of the LP.

Although this "flaw" is apparent in theory, a number of peculiar circumstances may render this threat less worrisome with West End, Spire, and Ameraba.

Since West End and its subsidiaries, as opposed to companies like RCA and CBS, are small businesses, the number of albums distributed is equally small. Kushins expects to move 30,000 to 40,000 belly-dancing albums in the next few months, and accordingly, the number of LPs per distributor is small. Consequently, to badger a rival distributor to take and return albums would neither be satisfactory from an economic point of view, nor from the standpoint of a competitor seeking to retain an image demonstrating a reasonable amount of business acumen. Additionally, if the competitor were nearby, he would certainly not want to help. If the competitor were only on the fringes of a distributor's business area, shipping costs would then become a consideration.

Keep Close Watch

Since the number of units projected for sales is small, West End also can keep track of returns very closely. Spot checks to retailers could curtail flagrant violations.

A major distributor, when asked about the dual price structure, commented that "I don't think many distributors will call for help if they go for the no-return price. And I don't think many will go for the no-return price anyhow, simply because you've got only a forty-cent difference on types of records that sell for close to list, and are sold mainly through specialty shops. I think they'll gamble on the return privilege, although some might want to split orders, if they can."

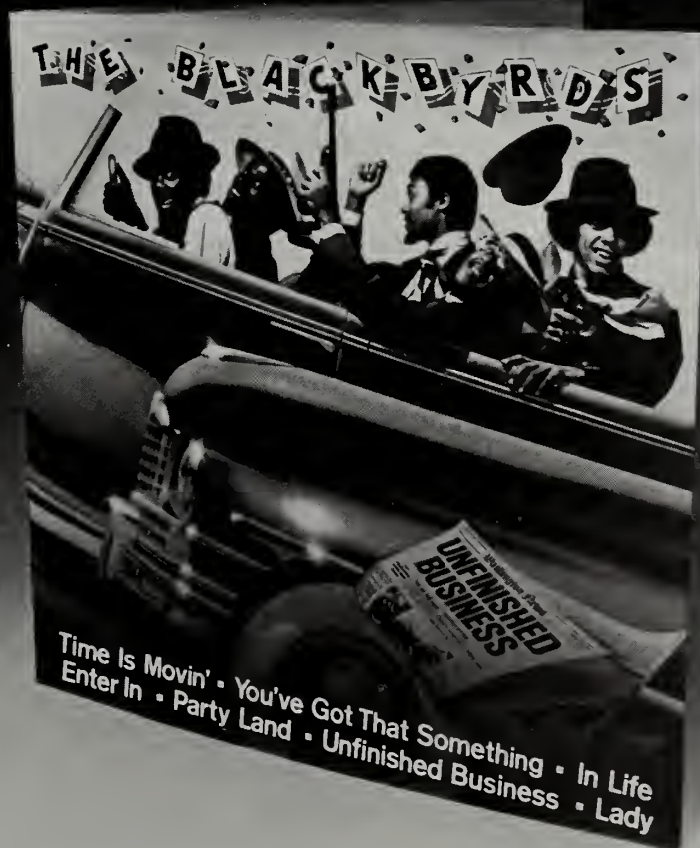

New York Court Orders ABC Records To Stop Manufacturing Croce LPs

NEW YORK — ABC Records, Inc. was enjoined from further manufacture of Jim Croce records in a decision handed down Nov. 30 by Justice Nathaniel T. Helman of the Supreme Court of New York County. The injunction was awarded to plaintiff Cashwest Productions, Inc., owned by Terry Cashman and Tommy West, who also own Lifesong Records, which claimed that ABC Records had violated the terms of the April, 1972 agreement by which it was licensed to manufacture and sell commercial phonograph records of Croce masters in the U.S. and Canada. Cashwest is the owner of all Croce master tapes, which ABC had been authorized to manufacture for a period of three years following the first commercial release of phonograph records using the masters.

Stems From Hits LP

The court's opinion focused on the Croce album released in September, 1974, after the artist's death, entitled "Photographs And Memories: His Greatest Hits." ABC argued that this record album constituted new masters, allowing the record company to manufacture the album for three years after the release date. The court, however, upheld the plaintiff's contention that because the greatest hits compilation utilized masters that had appeared on

previous albums, ABC could not legally manufacture "Photographs And Memories" after the expiration period for each original album. The court went on to define a master as "the completed finished original performance by the artist in the studio."

Croce Masters

This preliminary injunction results from an action commenced early in 1976 by Cashwest Productions and Blendingwell Music, Inc. against ABC Records and American Broadcasting Music Inc. relating to all Croce masters released by ABC Records since 1972. The court has allowed ABC Records a period of six months to sell off its existing stock of Croce records.

This decision is part of further and greater litigation expected in the dispute between ABC Records and Cashwest Productions.

Contacted in Los Angeles, a spokesman for the ABC legal department responded to the decision: "While Cashwest may have prevailed in its motion to prohibit ABC from manufacturing additional Jim Croce product, ABC succeeded in removing a restraining order prohibiting ABC from selling its existing inventory, and ABC is continuing to sell Jim Croce records."

Lifesong Records is expected to market its own Jim Croce records in the near future.

ATV/Pye Debuts Newly Acquired Artist For Gathered Distributors

NEW YORK — ATV/Pye Records recently introduced Lorraine Frisaura, the first artist whom the label has signed domestically, to a gathering of invited guests at New York's recently re-opened Copacabana Club. Among those in attendance were representatives of a number of ATV/Pye's U.S. distributors, as well as several radio and media personalities.

In a phone interview, Marvin Schlachter, president of ATV/Pye, explained why not all of the company's distributors had been invited to the combined cocktail reception and concert. "It was quite difficult to coordinate all of this; a good number of them (distributors), we realized, were involved in the Christmas rush season; and it was also a question of logistics and the availability of (hotel) rooms. 122 different things were

taken into consideration before the invitations were sent out. And the discussions took place with those that we felt could, would and should attend."

All Expenses Paid

ATV/Pye paid all travel and lodging expenses for those distributors who were able to attend its function, and Schlachter admitted that this was "significantly expensive" for a company the size of his. But he also noted that the party for Frisaura was "a major promotional effort and the beginning of a total major commitment behind this act."

Asked whether or not ATV/Pye had ever sponsored such a function before, Schlachter replied, "Not since I've been here. She is actually the first artist that I signed as an artist without having any finished product presented to me."

Casablanca To Release 2 More Limited Edition LPs

LOS ANGELES — Casablanca Records and Filmworks has announced the release of two limited edition records for late December. "Love to Love You, Baby," a Donna Summer collection, and "Get Down And Boogie," a disco sampler by assorted artists, both reissues, come hot on the heels of Casablanca's first limited edition release, "Kiss, The Originals."

The limited edition packages each call for a pressing of 250,000 units. Casablanca, encouraged by the quick sales of "Kiss, The Originals," plans to release other records in the limited edition format next year.

Kiss Chart Action

When the limited edition "Kiss" was released it entered the Top 200 LP chart August 28 at #93 with a bullet, and bulletted during the next three weeks, number 42. Its highest position achieved was on September 25 when it rose to #40. This week the album is still on the chart at #188, and it has remained on the chart for a total of 15 weeks.

Hoping to capitalize on the success of the Kiss limited edition, Casablanca included questionnaires in three selected LP's. These queries were next to product ads for

T-shirts and promo merchandise, and according to Dick Sherman, Casablanca V.P., "The response was fantastic! We put the questionnaires in albums for Kiss, Donna Summer, and Parliament." The poll indicated that there is a wider variety of people listening to disco sounds than Casablanca previously thought. Sherman commented that disco-listener response from purchasers of the Kiss album was unexpected. "Who knows?" he added, "maybe their mother listens to it if they don't, but I think we're getting a cross section of listeners for disco that was unexpected. Of course, the fact that we put questionnaires in with an ad for non-recorded products helped the response."

Title Highlights

The Donna Summer collection, culled from recent hits, is highlighted by her single, "Love to Love You, Baby," and "Try Me, I Know We Can Make It." "Get Down and Boogie," which was compiled by Bobby Guttadaro, a New York DJ, and Paul Dougan, who picks tunes for L.A.'s Studio One disco, includes previous releases from Parliament, Donna Summer, Blacksnoke, Roberta Kelly, Jeanie Reynolds, and Margaret Singana.

picks of the week

WILLIE HUTCH (Motown 1411F)

Shake It, Shake It (3:28) (Stone Diamond — BMI) (Hutch)
A first quality dance record, written, sung, produced and arranged by one of the complete professionals in his field. Anyone can put together a huge production, but Hutch is one of the few who can make it cook as a whole. Major R&B station adds soon to follow.

RUTH COPELAND AND DARYL HALL (RCA 10839)

Heaven (3:24) (Dirty Disco/Hot-Cha/Unichappell — BMI) (Copeland, Hall)

The sparkling sound of this slow, soulful tune is an instant clue that Daryl Hall has contributed on the production as well as the vocal and writing ends. The two prominent voices blend pleasantly, as is crucial to any duet project. Like many previous recordings involving Hall, this record strikes the perfect balance of pop and R&B that leaves it open to varied formats.

LABELLE (Epic 50513)

Isn't It A Shame (3:01) (Hastings — BMI) (Edelman)

An emotional rendering of Randy Edelman's ballad, proving just how fiery a slow song can be. This group combines three vocalists more than strong enough to go it on their own, and that sort of raw talent rarely misses. For pop and R&B playlists.

THE STYLISTICS (H&L 4676)

Only You (And You Alone) (3:27) (Hollis — BMI) (Ram, Rand)

This oldie was previously exploited with success by Ringo Starr, and was a natural choice for the album "Once Upon A Jukebox." The freshness here is in large part provided by Hugo and Luigi, who were among the first to develop the techniques of pop/R&B production that so many are mimicking today.

MELISSA MANCHESTER (Arista 0218)

Monkey See, Monkey Do (3:12) (Warner/Tamerlane/Mississippi Mad — BMI) (Franks)

An excellent reading of the very fine Michael Franks song that falls right into its own groove. Could be the selection from her "Help Is On The Way" LP to really click with Top 40 and easy listening programmers.

LOU REED (Arista 0215)

I Believe In Love (2:45) (Amine — BMI) (Reed)

Reed sings over a horn section that springs out with the life of a barrelhouse brawl. As he sings "I believe in good time music" in his jaded, half-chanting style, the total effect is pure fun, and the recording here brings out his every vocal inflection. For potential appeal to AM radio, a good first choice from the "Rock And Roll Heart" LP.

BETTY WRIGHT (Alston 3725) (Dist: TK)

Life (3:28) (Sherlyn — BMI) (Wright)

From her "Explosion" LP, this single displays Ms. Wright's versatile vocal style, husky or delicate wherever the need. The chorus, sung over a descending bass line with flute and reed embellishments, grows more infectious with each repetition. Geared toward R&B playlists

LOU CHRISTIE (Midland International 10848) (Dist: RCA)

You're Gonna Make Love To Me (3:05) (Larball/Irwin Levine — BMI) (Levine, Brown)

Christie has always had a weird side, and it's pronounced in this record's "hypnosis" verses, sung with spooky instrumentation that includes a sinister bass line and little unexpected cymbal clangs. The chorus has more of a good-time pop feeling. This is the sort of record top 40 or easy-listening stations might find attractive.

TOMMY ROE (Monument 205)

Early In The Morning (2:49) (Post — ASCAP) (Darin, Harris)

This tune provided hits for both writer Bobby Darin and Buddy Holly in the late '50s. The modern version is punctuated with muted guitar, in an arrangement topped by a gospel chorus that really gets the song going through a hot instrumental passage. Roe, who's famous for some hits in the past as well, is quite the mature pop vocalist here.

R.B. HUDMON (Atlantic 3366)

Whatever Makes You Happy (3:55) (Dep/East Memphis — BMI) (Crutcher, McNiere)

Only the subtlest string and horn overdubs color the instrumentation of this record, which sticks close to its



STEVIE WONDER (Tamla 54274) (Dist: Motown)

I Wish (3:37) (Jobete/Black Bull — ASCAP) (Wonder)

Chosen after radio stations spent weeks determining which "Songs In The Key Of Life" cut the public wanted most, "I Wish" came out on top in terms of popularity and editability. Restlessly awaiting further upward movement, this record is #28 with a bullet on this week's **Cash Box** Top 100 Singles chart.

STEVE MILLER (Capitol 4372)

Fly Like An Eagle (3:00) (Sailor — ASCAP) (Miller)

The title track from the certified platinum-plus album that has already yielded two top ten singles, the album cut has been a stable item on all types of FM playlists for many months. This edit preserves the high points of the original while cutting the time just about in half, to an even programming length for AM radio. Sure to follow in the footsteps of its forerunners.

KISS (Casablanca NB 873)

Hard Luck Woman (3:29) (Cafe Americana/Kiss Songs — ASCAP) (P. Stanley)

Kiss seems to be getting away from that heavy metal sound, first with "Beth," and now with "Hard Luck Woman." The lead vocal is not unlike Rod Stewart — there's a growling, bluesy intensity, centered around acoustic rhythm work, that should carry this immediately onto many pop AM lists, with quick charting.

JOAN BAEZ (A&M 1884)

Caruso (2:58) (Chandos — ASCAP) (Baez)

This edit of the "Gulf Winds" track finds Ms. Baez recalling "Diamonds And Rust" in the first verse. Whether the power of suggestion will work here is anyone's guess, but this lyric is unusual and effective. The melody, brought out by harmony vocals, keeps improving with repeated listenings. A solidly written song for varied tastes.

bass line and easy-swaying beat. Hudmon's vocal has a nasal quality reminiscent of Sly Stone, and he delivers the lyric in an engagingly relaxed style. Aimed at R&B stations.

MARGIE ALEXANDER (Chi-Sound XW849) (Dist: UA)

It's Worth A Whippin' (3:40) (East Memphis — BMI) (Crutcher)

A slow ballad based strongly in the blues, a quality brought out by the vocal of Ms. Alexander. She is a singer of great intensity who can quickly push a verse to the level of a high velocity scream. Though the arrangement is elaborate, this R&B-airplay-focused single's main feature is her voice.

MARTIN JAY (DJM 1018) (Dist: Amherst)

It's The Funny Way (3:40) (Dick James — BMI) (Jay, Wells, Cohen)

An upbeat pop record that combines a modern chord progression in the verse with smooth, slick production. Jay's Stylistics-influenced falsetto is impressive, and the backing vocal arrangement complements it well in the chorus. Top 40 and easy listening possibilities.

JEAN-LUC PONTY (Atlantic 3368)

New Country (3:07) (YTNOP Music) (Ponty)

An instrumental from the LP "Imaginary Voyage" that grafts jazz-rock-funk over a solid down-home country stomp, using odd time signatures in a style that always swags. Backed with "Renaissance," a melodic selection from an earlier album, this single has the potential to expose a wider audience to a new side of this artist.

PEOPLE'S CHOICE (TSOP 4784) (Dist: Epic)

Cold Blooded & Down-Right-Funky (3:10) (Mighty Three — BMI) (Huff, Brunson)

From the LP "We Got The Rhythm," this record's title is self-descriptive, heavily accented funk with a razor-sharp, steel-edged sound. It's also true that the title could be the entire lyric sheet as well, but this self-contained group emphasizes the instrumental abilities of its members and a dancing beat. A Gamble-Huff production.

APRIL WINE (London 5N-245)

Shutdown (3:21) (Goody-Two Tunes — BMI) (Goodwyn)

From one of Canada's most popular hard-rocking touring ensembles, a selection from the LP "The Whole World's Goin' Crazy," that features electric guitars cranked up to the shrillest limits of distortion. With pop radio's current penchant for heavy rockers, this could provide an American break.

PATTI AUSTIN (CTI 33)

Say You Love Me (3:07) (Antisia — ASCAP) (Austin)

A fine example of the current vogue in jazz-influenced pop records, this one comes from a lady who's been session-singing on countless singles until the release of her first album of original songs, "End Of A Rainbow." Because she writes her own material, Ms. Austin is a step ahead of other sometime session singers in matters of lyric interpretation.

LAURA GREENE (Epic/Sweet City 50317)

You Take My Heart Away (2:40) (Unart — BMI, United Artists — ASCAP) (Conti, Connors, Robbins)

From the much-publicized motion picture "Rocky," this is a love theme in disco rhythm. The film's degree of acceptance will definitely influence the success of this record, but it has all the up-to-date pop elements to stand on its own, including a powerfully delivered vocal and big sound.

JAMES GANG (Atco 7067)

I Need Love (2:59) (Jaga — ASCAP) (Giallombardo)

From the "Jesse Come Home" LP, an upbeat rocker from the group that changes little despite a history of fre-

quent personnel shifts. Steady syncopation and a searing central guitar solo hold this one together. For AM and varied FM formats.

SIMON MAY (Pye 71082)

The Summer Of My Life (4:12) (ATV — BMI) (May)

A solidly composed pop ballad with instrumental pickups a la MacArthur Park, and the vocals overdubbed in many syrupy layers, will get pop attention from the MOR side first.

SHYLO (Columbia 10456)

Drinkin' My Way Back Home (1:48) (Partner/Julep — BMI) (Scaife, Scaife, Thomas)

Country-rock shuffle in the second single for the label by this group. Simple, good-time stuff with broad appeal, this record leads the league this week in shortness.

SONOMA (MCA 40663)

Hey Boy (Do You Wanna Make Some Love) (3:20) (Bam Bam/Punch Shop — BMI) (Merriam)

A beckoning call, sweetly sung by the sirens of Sonoma. Influenced by black music in the rhythm tracks, yet strictly for the pop lists.

ECSTASY, PASSION & PAIN (Roulette 7205)

Passion (3:08) (Planetary/Ice — ASCAP) (Jones, Young)

A grand disco production in the New York style from this self-contained vocal and instrumental ensemble. The arrangement shimmers with bells and brass at its outset, while strings support the lead and backing vocals. This single comes in short and long versions, and should get adds on R&B playlists.

BRAINSTORM (Tabu 10811) (Dist: RCA)

Wake Up And Be Somebody (3:48) (Interior — BMI) (Kent)

A record that uses African and Latin dance rhythms, with an emphasis on percussion instruments, which of ten are the sole backing for the vocals. The first release on the new Tabu label distributed by RCA, coming in long and short versions.

SKIP MAHONEY & THE CASUALS (Abet 9468) (Dist: Nashboro)

Running Away From Love (3:22) (Excellorec/Skipsong — BMI) (Mahoney, Purdie)

From the "Land Of Love" album, an uptempo record that avoids the bottom-heaviness of the majority of disco records, yielding danceable music with a light feel that suits the lead and backing vocals. This single is from a group that is equally proficient singing ballads, though this could be the one to get attention from R&B programmers.

DINO SOLERA AND THE MUNICH MACHINE (Hidden Sign 101) (Dist: Audiofidelity)

Classically Elise (Part One) (3:33) (Hidden Sign — BMI) (Moroder/Bellotte)

In the tradition begun with a funky remake of Strauss, and continued in fine form by a danceable Beethoven's Fifth, here is "Fur Elise" done with a strong upbeat. Some of the instrumental effects are quite pretty, especially the lead clarinet, and one section even calls bellydance music to mind. Can lightning strike thrice in the same place?

LITTLE JOHNNY TAYLOR (Ronn 88) (Dist: Jewel/Paula)

Hard Head (Makes A Sore Behind) (3:48) (Pollyday — BMI) (Joseph)

This record is a bit too fast to be called a blues, though the chord progression and the lyrics fit that category. The horn section blares, yet Taylor's gruff voice is right out front. The sound, rather live by the standards of many of today's slick studio productions, really fits this song quite well.

RKO's Abrupt Eagles' Airing Forces E/A Into Rush Release

LOS ANGELES — As a result of the RKO radio chain airing the New Eagles' single, "New Kid In Town," on Saturday, November 27, a full five days ahead of its official release date, Elektra/Asylum Records, the group's label, has been forced to rush release the single to stations across the country. The single was to have been shipped to radio stations on December 2, according to E/A spokesmen.

Single Was Leaked

Front Line Management president Irving Azoff, who is the Eagles' manager, informed **Cash Box** Thursday (12/2) that the single had been leaked to the RKO chain by an Elektra employee. Elektra Records president Mel Posner denied that a company employee furnished the single to the radio chain, but as a result of the leak, he did state that the single had indeed been

rush released to stations. In Posner's words, however, there was "no real problem on the situation." "New Kid In Town" is the single from the soon-to-be-released Eagle's album.

Premature Release

Despite the premature release of the record, more than a quarter of the **Cash Box** reporting stations had added the record to their playlists this week making it the #1 Most Added Record in the **Cash Box** Pop Radio Analysis. "New Kid In Town" debuts on this week's chart at #57 with a bullet.

28 percent of all **Cash Box** reporting stations reported the record this week, with the RKO chain among them. Other key stations on the single were KLIF in Dallas, CKLW in Detroit, WMPS in Memphis, WPGC in Washington, KJR in Seattle, and WPIX in New York.

Unlisted Phone Households Included In Arbitron Survey

LOS ANGELES — Arbitron Radio will include unlisted telephone households in radio samples beginning with the 1977 spring survey. Arbitron studies of the characteristics of unlisted households show them to be younger, larger, more likely to be black or Spanish and to listen to different types of radio stations than the general population.

With the spring survey, the metro part of the top four Arbitron radio markets will have unlisted telephone samples, or, as Arbitron refers to it, ESF (expanded sample frame). The markets included are New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, and San Fran-

cisco. The firm estimates that 20 percent of the sample in these markets will be ESF households, adding that the inclusion of ESF households will make the Arbitron samples more representative of the total picture.

Little Overall Effect

Arbitron's test findings indicate that there will be little overall effect on audience

Aircheck Production Firm To Aid Deejays

LOS ANGELES — Air Talent Productions, a firm specializing in various services to broadcasters — creative resumes, station ID packages, commercial services and airchecks among them — has been formed in Houston by Royce Guinn, Jr. and Johnny Goyen, two former radio station program directors. Guinn and Goyen, who both worked as major market air personalities at one time, developed ATP in order to "offer a service for the air personality who wants to be represented at his best," according to Guinn.

Poor Technical Quality

Zeroing in on the problem of program director complaints that most airchecks they receive are of poor technical quality, Guinn remarked, "It's amazing that a jock looking for a \$10,000 to \$50,000 a year job takes so little pride in what he sends to other stations. We intend to use an editing service that's designed to tighten up any dead air or weak spots from airchecks that are sent to us."

'Sunshine Makegoods' Please KINT Clients

LOS ANGELES — Oddly enough, those who benefit the most when the sun doesn't shine in El Paso, Texas are the advertising clients of radio stations KINT. The station has had a two-year policy of making good on any commercials that run on any day the sun doesn't shine in El Paso.

Over 190 spots were run at the station's expense recently when on Friday, Nov. 12, El Paso experienced its 24th sunless day in the last 15 years. Station officials explained that they run "Sunshine Makegoods" in order to promote the constant sunshine in what they term "the great El Paso southwest."

Station manager Chuck Ashworth commented, "These 'Sunshine Makegoods' not only promote our city, but really keep our clients happy."



The visit was sort of an unexpected surprise to most of the people involved, and Springsteen spoke honestly on a number of subjects, never losing his sense of humor. Getting to the heart of Americana, Springsteen lashed out against oversized hamburgers, claiming that the thinner variety, like MacDonal'd's, were "where it's at." Asked what he would have done had he not chosen the road to rock stardom, he said the number one alternative would have been baseball.

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The Band Dances Their Last Waltz; Bids Farewell Along With Friends

WINTERLAND, SAN FRANCISCO — The whole thing sounded impossible. Thanksgiving dinner for five thousand people, waltzing to a full orchestra, The Band, plus more guest artists than you could remember, all directed and captured on film by **Martin Scorsese**, a top-flight Hollywood ("Taxi Driver," "Mean Streets") filmmaker.

Instead of riotous confusion, what emerged from all this will probably go down as the most exciting and well-organized event in pop music history.

The dinner and waltzing worked fine. At 9:30, The Band kicked it off on a stage set with borrowed chandeliers and backdrops from "La Traviata." Picking their most requested tune for the opener, "Cripple Creek" set the tone for a high-powered 90-minute set. For the last live concert, The Band played like never before. Often, critics have lambasted the quintet for playing "just like the record"; here, there were new solos (particularly from **Robbie Robertson**), newly phrased vocal lines — this is the last time, they seemed to feel, and we're going to get it all said. "Wheels Of Fire" was played with a real vengeance; Robertson took a few extra bars on his solo and bassist **Rick Danko** supplied the essential rhythm, as well as accentuating the melody with well-placed fills.

This was, however, just the beginning. The band started calling on guests. **Ronnie Hawkins** (who fronted The Band when they were called The Hawks) came on for a rousing "Who Do You Love."

Hawkins strolled off the stage after the one tune, and **Richard Manuel** (The Band's piano player) moved over to the second drum kit to make room for **Dr. John**, who slid into a jump-styled version of "Such A Night," with The Band accompanying him like they'd been behind the Doctor for years.

Indeed, this was one of the most startling aspects of the show. As the guests paraded on and off the stage for their short sets, it became clear that each member of The Band could adapt to wildly different styles — whether it was **Muddy Waters'** blues or **Joni Mitchell's** nebulous jazz melodies — it all worked.

Paul Butterfield, **Eric Clapton** and **Muddy Waters** played some blues. Often, these superstar jams turn out to be soulless affairs — not so with The Band. **Waters'** extended version of "Caledonia" was packed with emotion, and **Robertson** traded some

great lines with **Butterfield's** harp. **Clapton** sang "All Our Past Times," co-written with **Rick Danko**. **Neil Young** played a loose "Helpless" and "Four Strong Winds"; **Joni Mitchell** played a fairly lackluster set of tunes from her new LP.

It was **Van Morrison** who brought the house down with "Tura Lura." Aided by The Band's horn section (led by the versatile **Howard Johnson**), **Morrison** kicked into the tune, playing off the funky rhythm, in total control of the song and the audience.

After **Morrison**, The Band played a couple of tunes by themselves, aided only by the backing vocals of **Neil Young** and **Joni Mitchell** on the beautiful "Acadian Driftwood." Finally, at 12:30, **Robertson** announced a 20-minute intermission. Bay area poets filled up the time with readings that ranged in quality from **Sweet William's** ode to the Hell's Angels to **Lawrence Ferlinghetti's** fine parody of The Lord's Prayer.

After the break, The Band turned in a fresh reading of "The Weight" and debuted a tune for the occasion, "The Last Waltz" (more interesting in spirit than substance). **Robertson** then introduced "a very good friend of ours," and **Bob Dylan** hit the stage, already strumming his **Fender** before he attacked the microphone for a slightly reworked version of "Baby Let Me Follow You Down," a tune from his first LP that had been one of the first to be electrified by The Band. Not stopping between songs, **Dylan** segued into three other songs, one ("I Don't Believe You") circa 1966 and two from the **Planet Waves** LP. The entire cast then assembled for an emotional reading of "I Shall Be Released," with **Ringo Starr** and **Ron Wood** helping out on drums and guitar.

Officially, this was the last tune of the night. **Levon Helm** and **Ringo Starr**, however, had better ideas and they set up an irresistible rhythm that, like a magnet, drew the bulk of the players back on stage for some improvised riffing.

The jam lasted for another frenetic hour; **Eric Clapton** chose this time to really step out, casually picking out searing funk leads to rhythm work laid down by the guitars of **Neil Young**, **Robbie Robertson**, and **Dr. John**. **Robertson**, not to be outdone, answered back in kind.

After almost six solid hours of music, The Band and friends stepped off the stage; The Last Waltz was over. The Band had retired with extraordinary class.

Jackson Browne/Oreans

THE SHRINE, L.A. — **Jackson Browne** put the finishing touches on his current nationwide tour here recently with a magically sensitive evening that went a long way toward further entrenching him as the premier musical troubadour of the questioning '70s.

Playing before an adoring, sell-out audience who cheered his every embarrassed, boyish smile, **Browne** and band employed their golden California sound through a highly reputable retrospective of the singer/songwriter's entire repertoire.

While touching only slightly on his first two albums ("Doctor My Eyes" was included in the encore), **Browne** concentrated on what many have called his finest, most cohesive LP, "Late For The Sky." Every track from this album was played at one time or another throughout the evening. Particularly soothing was a haunting "For A Dancer" duet featuring **Browne** on piano and **David Lindley** on violin.

Material culled from his current album, "The Pretender" (bulleted this week at #7 in **Cash Box**) included concert opener "The Fuse" and closer "The Pretender." The new songs, echoing the same questioning vulnerability as the bulk of his earlier work,

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New York Philharmonic with Rafael Kubelik

EVERY FISHER HALL, NYC — In the last of four performances of a program that was recently aired on national public television, the **New York Philharmonic** under **Rafael Kubelik's** direction showed why it is considered one of the world's great orchestras. At the same time, leading renditions of works by **Beethoven** and **Dvorak**, the guest conductor demonstrated his forceful command and deep understanding of the music.

Kubelik set just the right pace in **Beethoven's** **Egmont Overture**. Especially notable here was the perfect balance between upper and lower strings, the seemingly inexorable expansion of the little second theme into a sonic storm, and the swiftly building excitement from the caesura just before the coda to the end of the work.

The soloist for the evening's performance of **Beethoven's** **Piano Concerto No. 3** was **Claudio Arrau**. In keeping with the pianist's unusually romantic (by modern standards) style, **Kubelik** set a fairly slow tempo in the first movement's orchestral exposition, and drew a little extra rubato from the woodwinds. Similarly, in the **Largo**, the first orchestral tutti was a bit

HOTEL CALIFORNIA — The Eagles — Asylum 7E-1084 — Producer: Bill Szymczyk — List: 6.98

The Eagles' long-awaited studio album is finally here, and it's bristling with power-house tunes. The title cut sounds like a number one pop single, and there are more than a couple of others in the same vein. Bill Szymczyk's production lends a hard edge to the rockers, like "Victim Of Love," and the ballads like "Wasted Time" are handled with the group's usual finesse. Look for this one to chart fast and long.



GREATEST HITS — Linda Ronstadt — Asylum 7E-1092 — Producers: Varlous — List: 6.98

The title is appropriate — each of these tunes was either a hit single or a monster FM cut; placed in one package, this becomes an extremely attractive LP that should sell steadily for some time to come. Early Capitol stuff is included along with the recent "That'll Be The Day" — all in all, this is a comprehensive reference work. Retail display should do the trick, what with "Hasten Down The Wind" still selling strong.

TEN YEARS OF GOLD — Aretha Franklin — Atlantic SD 18204 — Producers: Varlous — List: 6.98

This is a solid reference work comprised of Aretha Franklin's top singles in the last ten years. Although many have been included on other retrospective packages, there has never been such a comprehensive collection. Arranged chronologically, the listener is taken all the way from "I Never Loved A Man (The Way I Love You)" to this year's "Something He Can Feel" with ten other stops along the way. Perfect for the Christmas selling season, this should serve to stimulate catalog as well.



BLESS THIS HOUSE — Gladys Knight & The Pips — Buddah BDS 5651 — Producers: Kenny Kerner, Richie Wise, Gladys Knight, Bubba Knight — List: 6.98

A collection of Christmas songs, this has Gladys and The Pips turning their attention to "Silent Night," "Away In A Manger" and two versions (Bach, Schubert) of "Ave Maria." The sweet R&B stylings work terrifically and seem just right for across-the-board appeal for the next month or so. Gospel sounds are not neglected. All in all, a solid package for the current season.

IT'S ABOUT TIME — The Impressions — Cotillion SD 9912 — Producer: McKinley Jackson — List: 6.98

The Impressions have turned in a solid LP; the famed vocalists try eight numbers in all. The record, through different arranging approaches, is never monotonous. As always, the group has surrounded itself with some of the best session players around, including the Los Angeles Brass, Woodwind, and String sections, which lend a touch of class to the ballads. R&B programmers could safely play any cut.

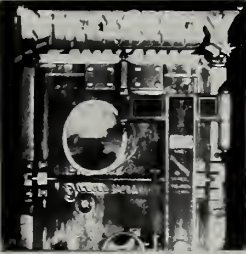


GOTTLE O' GEER — Fairport Featuring Dave Swarbrick — Island ILPS 9389 — Producer: Bruce Rowland — List: 6.98

A renovated Fairport, now minus Convention, delivers a warm and satisfying album that draws material from the roots of folk music. Much like Pentangle's early recordings, there is a predominant Irish flavor — many of the tunes are drawn from jigs, and the vocal harmonies reflect a strong knowledge of traditional folk chording. FM progressives could sample "Denny's Song." Multi-instrumentalist Dave Swarbrick shines throughout.

DIRT, SILVER & GOLD — Nitty Gritty Dirt Band — UA-LA 670-L3 — Producer: William E. McEuen — List: 11.98

This three-record set is a history of the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, from start to finish. Some of these songs were previously released, some weren't; however, the package is well worth its bargain price for the overview. This is, perhaps, the most eclectic album of the year — there are country breakdowns, rock 'n' roll, and commercial AM sides included. Couple that with a slick package design, and this record seems like one that will sell big.



EARLY 1940'S — Nat King Cole — Mark 56739 — Producer: George Garabedian — List: 11.98

This two-pocket set comprises twenty-two vintage tracks recorded by The King Cole Trio. Previously unavailable to the consumer, these cuts feature King Cole's top-flight keyboard work as well as his renowned vocals. Few remember Nat King Cole as a gifted pianist — this record is an essential introduction to that fact. The production work is faithful to the original transcriptions, and should be a steady catalog item, due to the uniqueness of the set and the overall recording quality.

LENA, A NEW ALBUM — Lena Horne — RCA BGL1-1799 — Producers: Norman Schwartz in assoc. with Ralph Harris — List: 6.98

Accompanied by the Robert Farnon Orchestra, Lena Horne strides through nine chestnuts, plus a Kris Kristofferson tune. Jazz stations will love her classy rendition of "I've Grown Accustomed To His Face"; while the production is full, it never gets in the way of her famous vocals. "My Funny Valentine" is given an equally strong reading. Some of these might be picked up by AOR progressive stations.



BANDOLIER — Budgie — A&M SP-4618 — Producer: Budgie — List: 6.98

Budgie's second LP reflects a great deal of maturation: here, the hard rock tunes are tempered with good production values — the arrangements, particularly on the longer tunes, really stand out. FM progressives will play the entire LP, especially the two-parted "Napoleon Bona," an ambitious work shot through with rock 'n' roll spirit. The vocals are mostly straight-ahead, no frills, and work well with the guitar-accented pieces.

MIND EXPLODING — Lucifer's Friend — Janus JXS 7030 — Producer: Lucifer's Friend — List: 6.94

A popular group in its native Germany, Lucifer's Friend has come up with some complex rock 'n' roll for stateside audiences. The arrangements are generally brisk, but are tight enough so that they do not obscure melody lines. Some fancy horn playing gives tunes like "Natural Born Mover" an extra punch. In-store play could break this act in a big way, along with inevitable FM progressive spins.



ROCKY SOUNDTRACK — Bill Conti — UA LA 693G — Producer: Bill Conti — List: 6.98

Just in release, the film "Rocky" seems headed for runaway success, and Bill Conti's music captures the spirit of the motion picture. Avoiding the pitfalls of fragmentation so common in soundtrack records, Conti broke the pieces up into definite segments, short pieces that stand on their own even if you have not seen the movie. MOR stations will definitely want some of this, and FM progressives could take a shot with the theme, "Gonna Fly Now."

ROCK BOTTOM — Bottom & Co. — Gordy/Motown G6-977S1 — Producers: Clayton Ivey, Terry Woodford — List: 6.98

Bottom & Co. is a seven member funk/disco congregation that, on its first LP, establishes itself as a force to be reckoned with. The productions are crystal clear, and there are a lot of capable dance tunes that should cross over to R&B radio. More than that, the group proves itself adept at ballads as well; "You Can Belong To Me," for example, has AM possibilities. They write and play their own instruments on this auspicious debut LP.



FOXY — Foxy — Dash/TK 30001 — Producer: Ray Martinez — List: 6.98

Foxy has a lot going for it on this LP — the tunes are an intelligent blend of disco, funk and pop, with a healthy slice of jazz (particularly the keyboard work). "People Fall In Love (While Dancing)" seems like a choice disco cut; the group has not neglected the importance of melody, even in a dance number. With excellent horns and strings, arranged for maximum effect, this has a good chance for R&B sales and playlists.

WELCOME TO OUR WORLD — Mass Production — Cotillion SD 9910 — Producer: Ed A. Ellerbe — List: 6.98

Ten member Mass Production lets loose with tunes in the Kool/EWF style. The disco pieces are tight, with optimistic, bring-the-world-together lyrics. Horns are used well for punctuation, and there are more than a few singers banding together to create a unified sound. "Wine-Flow Disco" should hit the market it's aimed at, and the more jazz-flavored pieces could get FM progressive play.



KITES — Jade Warrior — Island ILPS 9393 — Producers: Tony Duhig & Jon Field — List: 6.98

Inspired by a drawing by Paul Klee, this is a collection of ethereal, oriental-sounding compositions that should find their way onto jazz playlists. An ambitious work, tunes like "Song Of The Forest" feature impeccable production, meshing instruments like wind chimes with synthesizers in a believable blend. Written by Tony Duhig and Jon Field (the heart of the Jade Warrior) this album could very easily attract a dedicated cult audience. In-store play could sell quite a few.

it had been very successful at Rich's in Atlanta last Christmas; second, the four-color format looked very attractive; and third, "the thing seemed to be a very nice way to kick off the Christmas season."

Hitsville Makes Its Move

Hitsville, a six-unit retail chain based in Los Angeles, kicked off its Christmas selling season in an equally dramatic way with ten pages of ads in the Sunday *Los Angeles Times*. In contrast with the ABC supplements, however, all prices advertised by Hitsville were sale prices, and each manufacturer which participated in the promotion was given a separate page on which to advertise its releases.

According to Jerry Palmadge, the chain's advertising manager, Hitsville (formerly Discount Record Center) has been running these annual promotions for some time now. "For the last eight years, we found that on the Sunday following Thanksgiving each year, people are aware it's Christmas time. So we put all our eggs in one basket, and if you notice in this Sunday's *Times*, our stores kind of dominate (the ad space). And each company participates because they think it's a great idea for the Christmas sales.

"We put the sales up on the walls of each store, so if the people come in with the ads, they can go to page 1 on Columbia, say, and there in the Columbia area, you'll find all those with the (sale) prices and you can pick them out."

Beatlemania

An even more unusual method of advertising showed up in the November 26 issue of the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*. Disc Records promoted the "complete Beatles catalog," 18 releases in all, for \$98.00; in the same ad, each individual Beatles LP was priced at \$4.49. During the three-week sale, customers who buy the entire Beatles catalog will receive a free Beatles T-shirt and Beatles poster; in addition, they will be eligible to participate in a drawing for a Beatles mirror (one per store) and the complete Paul McCartney catalog.

Phone calls to Disc's three Cleveland area stores revealed that, a week after the ad appeared, only one complete set of Beatles records had actually been sold. The sale had spurred a lot of activity, though, on the Beatles' individual releases.

Tom Shannon, the Capitol Records territory manager who helped Disc put together the promotion, said that he didn't really expect many people to buy the entire catalog. "I was kind of hoping if they'd get about three or four during the whole thing, it would be good. But I've done it before with Record Theatre in Cleveland, and they sold about 40 (complete sets) in two weeks with the five stores they had at that time. It started out slow, but something like that takes a little while to get momentum going with it."

Grand Openings At Jimmy's

Just two weeks ago (see **Cash Box**, November 27) Jimmy's Music World opened its eleventh store in the New York metropolitan area, advertising 24 current albums at \$2.99 to celebrate the occasion. In the December 2 issue of the *New York Daily News*, the year-and-a-half-old chain announced the openings of two more new stores in East Meadow, Long Island and New Rochelle, N.Y. The announcement was included in a two-page ad promoting a "grand opening sale." Among the 35 releases advertised for \$2.99/\$4.99 tape in this sale were the debut LPs by Boston and Heart and the latest releases by EWF, Jefferson Starship, the Bee Gees, John Denver, Abba, Leon Russell, the Spinners, George Benson and Linda Ronstadt. In addition, 12 of the same releases were advertised at Jimmy's in an ad which appeared in the Sunday *New York Times*.

David Sutton of Sutton Distributors, which owns Jimmy's, declined to comment

either on the store openings or on the chain's future expansion plans. It is clear, however, that Jimmy's actions are still a major factor in the continuing escalation of the New York price war.

Karol Reports Success

A corroboration of this view came from John Surico, record buyer for the Alexander's department store chain, which this week advertised five top-line items for \$2.99. "We had done it (advertised albums for \$2.99) a long time ago. We did it here and there, every two or three months on like 10 numbers. And then we laid off. Everyone was complaining that the price was too low and so on. So we raised back the price. And then Jimmy's came along and they started — well, actually, Disc-O-Mat did — they came first with \$3.69, and so we went back down to \$2.99s here and there. And then Jimmy's came along with \$2.99, and now Korvettes has it and so does everybody else." Because of this proliferation of low prices, Surico added, "I don't think it's as effective as it was before."

Perhaps for this reason, Korvettes added a new price to its ad in the Sunday *New York Times* for the second week in a row. In addition to its regular \$2.99 "super-specials" and the selected releases at its "special holiday price" of \$3.88. (**Cash Box**, December 4), Korvettes advertised six LPs on UA, including the latest albums by ELO, Walter Jackson, War and Paul Anka, for \$3.38 each. Asked about this new price, David Rothfeld, vice president and divisional merchandise manager of Korvettes, at first claimed that Korvettes was in the process of raising its prices from \$2.99. When it was pointed out that the chain was still advertising some releases at the lower price, Rothfeld refused to comment further.

Meanwhile, Ben Karol, owner of the King Karol retail chain, stated that, as a result of lowering his stores' shelf prices (**Cash Box**, November 27), "this year's volume (at Thanksgiving) was way above anything we expected." He added that the current sales spurt at his chain is "gathering momentum. It's building every day." When he first dropped the shelf prices, he said, "there was only one thing we were concerned about: 'Can we increase our volume enough for the drop in the profit margin?' That was the only unknown. Now we know it works."

Record World/TSS Expansion Slated

For the first time in their history, the Record World chain and the Times Square discount store chain, both located in the New York metropolitan area, took out a joint full-page ad in the Sunday *New York Times*. Neither of the chains, which include a combined total of 17 stores, has ever bought this much ad space before in the *Times*.

According to Eliot Gorlin of Elroy Enterprises, record supplier for both Record World and TSS, the ad's purpose was to promote the chains' names and images in preparation for a planned expansion into new geographical areas.

In the *Times* ad, all RCA releases were advertised for \$4.24/\$5.74 tape. That price is about the same as the multi-label sale price this week at Sam Goody, a major competitor to Record World's six stores on Long Island. However, it is considerably above the regular sale price of another Long Island competitor, Music Warehouse, which usually advertises releases for \$3.88/\$4.88 tape.

According to Michael R. Cono, president of Music Warehouse, the 10-store chain briefly flirted with a \$3.69 sale price in response to competition from Korvettes. But the company soon pushed its price back up, Cono said, "because I considered that it wouldn't be a good idea to sell records below the prices that retail stores have to pay for them. Korvettes can do something like that in several of their stores and not make any money for six months, and probably force whoever they're com-

peting against into a bad position. But we're not in a position to do that. We have to make money every day."

Multi-Dealer Ads

Almost every week, one or more print ads tagging several dealers in a particular area appear in the markets monitored by **Cash Box**. This week, for example, 24 CBS releases were advertised in the *Cleveland Plain Dealer* under the heading "Soul Sauce," at Sound Center, Tower Records, Woody's Music Hut, Record Gallery and Quonset Hut; and two Buddah releases, the soundtrack to "Pipe Dreams" and Norman Connors' "Dance of Magic," were promoted in the *Denver Post* at nine local retailers.

How were these dealers chosen? According to Danny Alvino, sales manager of MS Distributors' Denver office, which handles Buddah Records in that area, "We try to give (advertising money for) that type of product to the accounts that make sense. If I had Paul Anka, for instance, I would not go to Budget Records & Tapes (a progressive music-oriented chain). And you don't go with an ad for kiddie records to Peaches: they're interested in the newest Stevie Wonder. In this particular case, to give it (the Buddah ad) to a so-called 'lily white' store just doesn't make sense. It's 'black' product, even though it's a 'crossover' thing."

Alvino explained that this ad had been handled through Mile Hi One Stop, "which has a lot of black accounts and crossover accounts. You see, that's good for them because a lot of those stores may be small buyers, based on the monthly amount of purchases. Now that ad ran approximately \$700. So a Kingbee Records (one of the dealers named in the ad) may not do \$700 a month with them (Mile Hi). He may do it every three or four months. But this way Mile Hi can go to him (Kingbee) and say, 'Hey, I want to put you in an ad and it doesn't cost you anything. We appreciate your business and you'll be mentioned along with a bunch of other stores.' So whether he's buying \$20 or \$200 a month (of merchandise), he still reaps benefits that he wouldn't normally be able to get. Because the rule of thumb is that an account can somewhat count on getting two percent of its purchases (in advertising dollars). Two percent of a thousand bucks is \$20; so if you're a small account, you almost never get advertising at all.

"I feel it's our obligation to spread the advertising money around. So we give it to a lot of the smaller accounts, too. They don't even ask for it. We just voluntarily give it to them because we appreciate their business. But we don't do it arbitrarily, and just give it away as fast as we can."

Serves As Barometer

Bob Jamieson, manager of the CBS branch in Cleveland, laid less emphasis than Alvino did on helping out small retailers through multi-dealer ads. In many cases, he said, these ads are run as a "barometer" to test the strength of a CBS artist in a cross-section of a particular market. In such an artist development program, "those accounts I tag are tagged because they are supporting us and because they feel some (sales) response from that particular artist."

The dealers mentioned in the "Soul Sauce" ad in the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*, Jamieson explained, were not chosen by the CBS branch, but by Northern Record Sales, a one-stop which belongs to Transcontinent Record Sales. "Since that ad was geared more toward the 'black' items, we tried to get the most viable 'black' outlets that we possibly could get in the Cleveland marketplace. And Transcon has a very strong 'black' one-stop trade."

Multi-Dealer Price

Unlike most similar promotions which involve more than one dealer, the "Soul Sauce" ad included a price (\$3.99 per LP) for the advertised releases. "We can't set a price," stated Jamieson. "That's not legal.

And I'd told them (Transcontinent) that it wasn't necessary to run a price. But they said they could get their accounts to agree to it, so we said 'fine.'"

Why did Northern Record Sales ask the dealers it had chosen for the ad to agree on a price? "More or less because they're smaller accounts," explained Dave Spaulding, Northern's general manager. "They don't have the advantage of this type of advertising all the time. And to promote them as a selling entity in the market, we talked them into coming with the price on it. The standard going price for sale-price albums is \$3.99 in Cleveland at the moment, so it was very easy for them to decide on what price they wanted to run it at."

Asked about the role of restraint-of-trade laws in this transaction, Spaulding replied, "All of the stores involved in it are not in direct competition with each other. Cleveland is a big, spread-out town, and we try to pick maybe six accounts for something like that which are not right next door to each other." He further pointed out that "if you go from the extreme west side to the extreme east side of Cleveland, you've driven 40 miles. So you can space six locations into one ad up here, and while probably some of them do overlap a little bit, they're still geographically far enough away that they will permit us to put them together on an ad."

Danny Alvino of MS stated categorically that his firm would never "dictate" a retail price to be used in an ad by any of its accounts. And to set a uniform price for a multi-dealer ad, he said, would be "collusion." However, he added, "what has happened here a couple of times is that Arista might say they want to run, say, Melissa Manchester (in an ad), and they would like it to go at a \$3.99 price. So we'll call up an account and say, 'Look, we got a certain amount of spots and we got to put a couple of dealers in the tag, and they (Arista) are looking for a \$3.99 price. Do you object to that?' As has happened, they'll say, 'No, that's fine with us. Let's run it at \$3.99.' Then we call the next account and we say, 'They would like a \$3.99 price. Would you object to that?' And they say 'no.' So that's how we've done it. But we don't force the issue with them (retailers). If they don't want to do it, what we try to do then is run their spot separately, like a week later, with no price on it or the price they want. And if everybody refused to run at \$3.99, I would call up Arista — although this has never happened — and say, 'No one wanted to run at \$3.99. They're all looking for a higher price.' And if Arista said, 'That's the price we want,' we'd say, 'Fine, we can't run the ad for you.'"

Wings To Release Live 3-LP Set

LOS ANGELES — "Wings Over America," a three record set recorded live during the group's 1976 tour, will officially be released Dec. 10. The album contains 28 songs, including a three-tune medley, and is produced by Paul McCartney. Five of the album's selections are from the Beatles era: "Lady Madonna," "The Long and Winding Road," "I've Just Seen a Face," "Blackbird" and "Yesterday." Others include Denny Laine's "Time to Hide" and "Go Now," Jimmy McCulloch's "Medicine Jar" and Paul Simon's "Richard Cory." The remaining selections, all written and sung by McCartney, include the "Venus And Mars/Rock Show/Jet" medley, "Hi, Hi, Hi," "My Love," "Live And Let Die," "Band On The Run," "Listen To What The Man Said," "Letting Go," "Silly Love Songs" and "Let 'Em In." "Soily," a new song, completes the package.

Bassey's Greatest, 2-LP Set Released by UA

LOS ANGELES — "Shirley Bassey's Greatest Hits," a two-record, 20-title set, had been released by United Artists.

COUNTRY ARTIST OF THE WEEK

Danny Davis



"The Brass Story" — Innovator Danny Davis took a big band format, added country heart, beamed it direct toward the pulse of middle America, and became a sensation with an instrumental group that has won most every top music award and sold millions of albums.

Danny Davis attended the New England Conservatory of Music, and by age 14 was trumpet soloist with the Massachusetts All State Symphony Orchestra. He has played with such famous band leaders as Bobby Byrne, Gene Krupa, Bob Crosby, Hal McIntire, Art Mooney and Freddy Martin, and doubled as a singer with Vincent Lopez, Sammy Kaye and Blue Baron.

Eventually he became an executive with MGM, then RCA, and wound up in Nashville as an executive producer. It took him six years to find the person — Chet Atkins — who would believe in his brass idea enough to record it and the impact of his success was felt in less than two years. Since the birth of the Nashville Brass in August of 1968, Danny Davis and the Nashville Brass have received top trade, Grammy and CMA Awards. The group has become a favorite concert, club, major television and personal appearance attraction, playing 324 concerts in 287 days. All this in addition to studio recording plus the personal production by Danny of such artists as DeWayne Orender, who is now 67-bullet on the **Cash Box** country singles charts.

Due to the group's heavy concert schedule, along with the instrumental load of the combined group, Danny Davis and The Nashville Brass travel exclusively in his own plane — The Lady Barbara, a Martin.

Now Danny has formed the Danny Davis Singers, eight handsome young men, with "a warm, intimate approach. We don't have any Broadway voices. They'll be like Nashville's Fred Waring singers on an updated basis." Also he has done a pilot for a musical TV show, so if that goes, there will be some cutting back on personal appearances.

The just released Danny Davis and The Nashville Brass LP, "Supersongs," is 41 on the **Cash Box** LP chart. Bob Ferguson handled production credits.

Gateley To Leave Bill Anderson Show

NASHVILLE — ABC/Dot Records artist Jimmy Gateley will be leaving the Bill Anderson show on Jan. 15, 1977, to put together his own club and concert act. A part of Anderson's show for the past 12½ years, Gateley opened the show and played guitar in the Po' Boys Band. Bill Anderson and David Byrd will continue to produce Gateley's recordings. He will be booked by the Bill Goodwin Agency.

Independent Concert Promotion: The Reasons Behind The Trend

NASHVILLE — The last three years indicate a progressive trend toward independent concert promotion with groups, management and/or production companies becoming more personally involved in producing the total music package. The reasons behind this move are comparable to why record companies changed to in-house distribution.

In-house promotion, which includes such preliminaries as facility rental, ticket distribution, advertising, radio and press engagements and all arrangements related to producing a concert, allows a group total artistic control and a greater percentage of financial return than the customary means of renting out through a promoter. When an outside promoter is engaged, this move

puts the promoter in the position of a financial backer in cooperation with the group and management. If a concert doesn't come off, both sides tend to lose less. In such a case the group absorbs their own pre-concert investment of renting the facility, ticket trade outs, advertising time, etc. which would have been covered in a promoters retention fee.

Last week the Dallas/Ft. Worth metroplex hosted three groups who are part of this trend. Austin-based show band Balcones Fault brought their "Out of This World Texas Tour" to the Electric Ballroom in Dallas. Kansas City's Ozark Mountain Daredevils brought their show to SMU's McFarlin Auditorium and Houston's ZZ Top included the Tarrant County Convention Center (Ft. Worth) in their holiday Texas tour.

Top Songwriters Share Tips For Success At Atlanta NARAS Seminar

ATLANTA — Persistence, development of craftsmanship and a working knowledge of the songwriting business are essentials for any aspiring tunesmith.

Such was the theme voiced by a panel of top-selling songwriters appearing at a one-night songwriters' seminar, sponsored recently by the Atlanta chapter of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences.

"Don't shoot for Elvis on your first song," advised Ray Stevens, composer of songs like "Ahab the Arab" and "Everything Is Beautiful." A lot of talented newcomers need material, Stevens pointed out to the audience of 350, "and most professional producers and recording stars simply don't have the time to screen all available material."

Setting out deliberately to write a "hit" can automatically put boundaries on a song, said Billy Ray Reynolds, Nashville writer of material such as "Cloudy Days" and "Sandy Sends Her Best."

Getting an attentive ear to a new song is a problem not limited to unknowns, according to Mike Taylor, a Hilton Head, S.C.-based writer who co-wrote "Rocky Mountain High" and "Sunshine" with John Denver. Taylor declared — and other panelists agreed — that writers, whether new or established, should develop a song with an artist in mind and "set your mind on getting the song to them."

No longer is it necessary, either, to be based in Los Angeles or Nashville, stated Tommy Roe (author of "Dizzy," "Sheila," etc.), a Monument artist who recently returned to his Atlanta hometown after a dozen years in California. In fact, added Buddy Buie (writer of "Traces," "Every Day With You Girl," etc.), a new songwriter might find a city like Atlanta less competitive and thus more receptive.

Producing an elaborate demo for presentation to a publisher is not required, the panelists agreed. "I'm skeptical of a polished demo," said Stevens. "I figure if they've got enough juice to make such a demo, they could record it themselves or they probably know somebody a lot hotter than me who turned it down."

Are songwriters born with their craft? Stevens, for one, doesn't believe so, and laments the fact that many good writers probably don't persevere enough to reach their full potential, declaring, "If you keep at it long enough, you're going to get lucky at it."

Aspiring writers were also urged not to "get hung up on a song." Stevens, who said he worked for three full days polishing "Everything Is Beautiful," advised "sleeping on an idea and waking with a fresh mind the next day." Taylor likened songwriting to fishing: "If you're going after a big one — and you know it's worth it — you'll stay with it." At the same time, Taylor suggested keeping "pieces of songs" that don't quite jell for use later in another form. "You've really got to force yourself to come back to it," said Reynolds. "Go over it again and again and eventually what you're wanting to say will come out."

Sometimes collaboration with another writer can help move a stalled song off dead center, even if it means only "confirmation" that your idea is a valid one, said Reynolds.

Other panelists included songwriters Clarence Carter, Lee Clayton and Robert Nix; Del Bryant, BMI; and Merlin Littlefield, ASCAP.

Jay Cooper of Los Angeles, nation president of NARAS, outlined the organization's contributions to the recording industry via the annual Grammy Awards presentations.

The Songwriters Seminar was termed a great success by Atlanta/NARAS president Tim McCabe and Curtis L. Smith, chairman of a special committee that organized and promoted the event.

The groups utilize booking agencies, but the brunt of promoting the act is controlled by personal management and production companies. Balcones Fault earned the distinction of being voted the number one show band in Texas by Texas Monthly Magazine entirely through their own efforts. Jack Jacobs, musician and spokesperson for the group said, "We wanted to reach a scale that would prove we could draw and generate attention in a major market but no one would spend money to promote a show. In essence, we put ourselves on the line and did everything ourselves. The group is our business, so we looked at it as an investment." By these goals the venture was successful. The 1500 seat Electric Ballroom was filled to near capacity and the group earned \$2,000, according to Jacobs. As in any business, the more financial and image control a group enjoys through in-house promotion, the greater profit there is for the group.

When the Ozark Mountain Daredevils first moved toward promoting their own concerts, A&M Records shared the costs which were then deducted from the artist's promotion budget. Since then, the Daredevils have become financially independent and their business is directed by Cowtown Productions in Kansas City. For the show in Dallas the group contracted a new independent coordinating company called Special Services to handle the concert preliminaries in that city. Special Services arranged for ticket distribution, security and ushers for the auditorium, hotel accommodations and food. Special Services also aided Balcones Fault, contacted their opening act and consulted with the group

concerning sources available in Dallas.

The major advantage of in-house tour promotion is artistic control. Bob Small, the New York coordinator in liaison with ZZ Top's Bill Hamm Associates, emphasized its importance to ZZ Top's fame. "Bill Hamm is a fanatic about controlling the image of his group. He knows the product better than anyone else, and he wants to make sure the public sees what he envisions, so everything is presented along a consistent theme and logo."

BH Associates is a unique and relatively small organization based in Houston. They are involved to the point that radio, television and newspaper ads are supplied by BH Associates and distributed to the promoter pre-tailored for that market. "The 'takin Texas' to the nation, complete with live animals and an elaborate stage set up, has reached 800,000 people since the onset of the tour in September," Small commented. "And more than a million will have seen it by the end of the year." With such concentrated control of image and finances, most of the country will be able to identify ZZ Top and the group will be much richer for it.

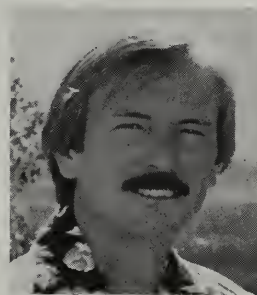

T.G. brings us a mellow seasonal offering, perfect for listening to beside a roaring fire with the one you love. One of the loveliest holiday songs of the year, this one is sure to get appreciable airplay.

Rayburn Anthony offers an expurgated version of an x-rated Kristofferson song. Kris may not approve of what he did with it, but Rayburn's adaptation is suitable for AM airplay, while the original definitely isn't.

TOM JONES (Epic 8-50308)

Say You'll Stay Until Tomorrow (3:32) (Dick James — BMI) (R. Greenaway, B. Mason)

Tom Jones has always had a flair for country-type material, and this single is definitely a case in point. Jones puts a rich and robust vocal on a Jerry Lee Lewis-style tune and the result could put him back high on the charts — both country and pop.

JOHN CONLEE (ABC/Dot DOA 17671)

Back Side Of Thirty (2:32) (House of Gold/Pommard — BMI) (J.W. Conlee)

John Conlee has a rough, leathery voice similar to Red Sovine's, except that John's singing rather than talking. This lament of lost time and lost love has an old-time country sound. Piano and guitar work is very good.

KATHY BARNES (Republic/IRDA R338)

Good 'N' Country (2:50) (Singletree — BMI) (Rick Klang, Don Pfrimmer)

The title perfectly describes this hand clappin' tune with a downhome fiddle and a hoedown sound. Kathy puts a jaunty vocal on this catchy little tune that should see good airplay and box action.

SHEILA TILTON (Con Brio 115)

Little Man (2:23) (Wiljex — ASCAP) (Frank McPherson, Roy Crissman)

On this follow-up to her recent hit "Half As Much," Sheila puts her strong, pure voice to a poignant plea to a little boy. Beautiful strings highlight a lush arrangement.

SHYLO (Columbia 3-10456)

Drinkin' My Way Back Home (1:48) (Partner/Julep — BMI) (D. Scaife, R. Scaife, P. Thomas)

It's a drinkin' song with a country boogie sound, spiced with a rock flavor. I like the beat — you can dance to it! This is a great one for box action.

BOBBY WRIGHT (United Artists XW 913 Y)

Neon Lady (2:58) (Blackwood/Danor — BMI) (T. Seals, M.D. Barnes, R. Bledsoe)

A tale about a honky tonk woman is set to a pulsating rock beat for one of the best box tunes in a long time. This one will make the juke joints jump!

MARTY MITCHELL (Hitsville H 6044 F)

My Eyes Adored You (3:26) (Stone Diamond/Tannyboy — BMI) (B. Crewe, K. Noian)

Marty does his version of the Frankie Valli hit and gives it a smooth, listenable pop sound. Good orchestration and arrangement make this a romantic, easy listening type of song.

LASSO FROM EL PASO — Kinky Friedman — Epic PE 34304 — Producers: Kinky Friedman, Huey P. Meaux — List: 6.98

A sticker on the cover of this LP carries the message, "Attention radio station programmers! Contains some provocative material which may be objectionable." Indeed, some people may find things on this LP that they consider too risqué, but anyone who refuses to listen to this album for that reason will be missing out on some fine music. Besides the X-rated songs like "Waitret, Please, Waitret" and "Kinky," and the humorous ones like "Ahab The Arab," and "Men's Room, L.A.," there are the lovely ballads "Dear Abbie" and "Lady Yesterday." Especially interesting is Kinky's recitation of "The Ballad Of Ira Hayes."



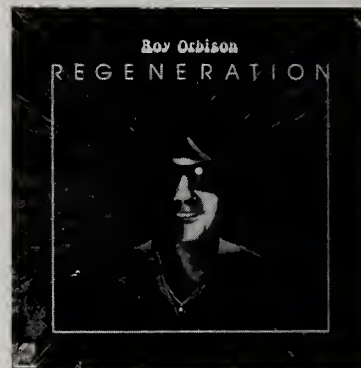
BACK HOME AT THE OPRY — George Hamilton IV — RCA KPL1-0192 — Producer: Jack Feeney — List: 6.98

The smooth vocal style of George Hamilton IV hasn't been heard nearly enough lately, but this LP should alleviate that condition. A pleasant folkish air pervades the entire LP, which features material penned by John Denver, Don MacLean, Tom Paxton and Geof Morgan. It's a diversified set, ranging from the upbeat country of Charley Pride's hit "Crystal Chandeliers" to the '50s pop of "It's Almost Tomorrow" to the slow sadness of "Bad Romancer" and "Sleeping Through Goodbye."



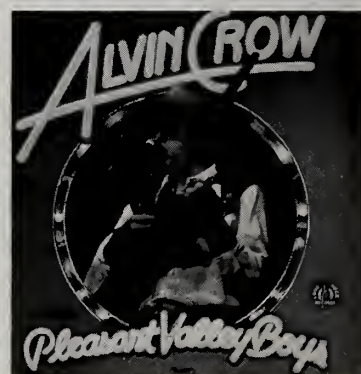
REGENERATION — Roy Orbison — Monument MG 7600 — Producer: Fred Foster — List: 6.98

Roy Orbison has returned to Monument, the scene of many hits for him between 1959 and 1965. This LP features a sound similar to the one that made him a legend of the early '60s. "Southern Man" has that swampy, Cajun feel, and "Can't Wait" is a classic Orbison rocker. Roy's unique style is just as well utilized on the ballads like "Born To Love Me" and "Old Love Song." It's great that Roy's back on the scene, making the music that he makes so well.



ALVIN CROW AND THE PLEASANT VALLEY BOYS — Alvin Crow and the Pleasant Valley Boys — Long Neck NR-6751 — Producers: Alvin Crow and the Pleasant Valley Boys — List: 6.98

If you're not from Texas or thereabouts, you may not have heard of Alvin Crow and the Pleasant Valley Boys, but it's certain that you will in the future. This LP has become an underground classic in the Austin area since its release earlier this year, and has produced several singles that were hits locally. Alvin and his boys have a sound similar to Asleep at the Wheel, but purer and more authentically Texas swing. Their material is predominately original and features Alvin on vocals, sounding very much like Hank Thompson.



YOU MADE IT RIGHT — Jan Freeman — Jan-Mar/IRDA LPN 6017 — Producer: Don Johnson — List: 6.98

The lovely cover of this LP holds an even lovelier surprise — one of the most promising female artists to come along in many years. Petite Jan Freeman has a big pure voice, her phrasing is sure and true, and her delivery is always confident. She keeps a very country sound on ballads like "Any Port In A Storm," "I Don't Like To Sleep Alone" and "Statue Of A Fool," and proves she can handle the faster ones like "I'll Be There (If You Ever Want Me)" and "Love Will Keep Us Together." Arrangements and orchestration are excellent. This is one of the best debut LPs we've heard recently.



HEAVEN'S BLUEGRASS BAND — Lester Flatt & The Nashville Grass — CMH 6207 — Producer: Arthur Smith — List: 6.98

No bluegrass collection will be complete without this latest Lester Flatt LP. Lester and his Nashville Grass move through instrumentals like "Dixie Flyer" and "Love Me Lorena" and Lester puts his distinctive Appalachian vocals on traditional weepers like "You Know You Caused It All By Telling Lies" and "A Home Without Love Is Just A House." "The Night Daddy Passed Away" is a classic Lester Flatt recitation.

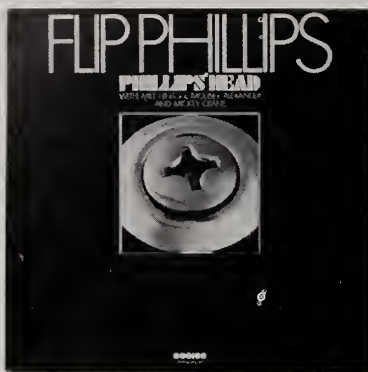

Jazz Album Picks

PHILLIPS' HEAD — Flip Phillips — Choice 1013 —
Producer: Gerry McDonald — List: 6.98

What a sleeper this is! Phillips, one of the major stars of the 1940s and '50s is playing better than ever yet this is his first LP in more than a decade. Adding bass clarinet to his always impressive tenor he has fashioned an LP of superlative mainstream jazz. Whether it be mature balladry or up-tempo swingers, Flip demonstrates that he has lost nothing to the years. The program is heavy with standards but there are recent tunes mixed with old favorites and none is less impressive than the others.



CHICK COREA—HERBIE HANCOCK—KEITH JARRETT—McCOY TYNER — Atlantic 1696 —
List: 6.98

Two apiece by each of the major piano figures of the 1960s. Apart from the Tyner pair, "Lazy Bird" and "In Your Own Sweet Way," which are new, the material has been issued previously on Vortex or Embryo. With the exception of the Hancock titles (actually Ron Carter's date) these performances are among the earliest work of each pianist. Considering the very different direction taken by each man this is a fascinating return to the beginning when all were sidemen in bands led by others and (with the exception of Hancock) were still feeling their way in the music world.



THE COMPLETE BENNY GOODMAN: VOLUME 4 — Bluebird AXM 2-5537 — List: 7.98

Producer Frank Driggs and annotator Mort Goode continue their marvellous documentary of the "king of swing" when he was at the apex of his popularity. This volume stretches from 12/30/36 to 10/22/37, documents the earliest alignment of Harry James with the Goodman band and also contains some splendid quartet items. But certainly the highlight of the collection is the original version of "Sing, Sing, Sing." As Bluebird continues its chronology of the great bands of the swing era the momentum of the label should pick up considerably. This set should be attractive to older fans.



THE VERVE YEARS (1950-1951) — Charlie Parker —
Verve VE 2-2512 — List: 7.98

The first two sides are string sessions for the most part. Included are some titles previously available in a JATP set. The last two sides combine small bop ensembles with some Latin material. While not the definitive Parker, this is still the master jazz creator in top form. The string titles are among the most listenable Parker performances for the layman and the bop titles demonstrate that Parker (in "Au Privave" and "K.C. Blues" especially) was able to create instant classics even into the 1950s.

McGriff's last outing ("Mean Machine") was a solid hit and this album treads in similar territory. The Lance Quinn/Brad Baker arranging team is here once again and the Brecker Brothers add considerably to the proceeding (Mike has a peach of a tenor solo on the title track). McGriff is into four different keyboards and the music has that disco-crossover feel to it. This one should be a good bet for the Cash Box jazz chart.

The Concord Summer Jazz Festival is the occasion for many of the LPs on this fine California label. While initially it may seem that seven pieces is a bit of a comedown from Bellson's customary big band, this group, recorded at the festival, is a refreshing blast from right now. Stickout soloists are reedman Pete Christlieb and trumpet vet Blue Mitchell. Louis himself boots everything along with his vital drumming and the results are a celebration of the modern mainstream.

The intrepid Joe Fields of Muse is out in the street working five new releases. The albums feature artists such as Etta Jones, Eric Kloss, Carlos Garnett, Dom Salvador and Volume Two of the Creative Construction Company featuring Anthony Braxton and Leroy Jenkins.

Irv Kratka reminds us that while he has been involved with Music Minus One for 27 years, it is Inner City that will be the issuing label for the Steeple Chase albums. Inner City will also issue some vintage-late '50s material by jazz singer Eddie Jefferson.

Roy Ayers and his group will be taping a Dinah Shore TV show next week. The taping will coincide with an Ayers gig at the Roxy in Hollywood. His next Polydor album ships this month and will be titled "Vibrations."

Also from Polydor in December will be Chick Corea's next ("My Spanish Heart"), Barre Phillips' "Mountainscapes" and Terje Rypdal's "After The Rain." These latter albums will be on ECM.

KGSP-FM, the radio voice of Park College in Kansas City, has gone to an all-jazz format. PD Doug Courley says that while the station will focus on national chart LPs, there will be plenty of attention given to vintage artists and KC jazz originators.

Stone Alliance, the band featuring Steve Grossman, Gene Perla and Don Alias,

currently touring South America.

Manhattan cable TV fans can look forward to a new show on channel J entitled appropriately, "Jazz on J." WWRL DJ Hank Spann will host the show and Less McCann and Jack McDuff were featured in the first taping.

The World's Greatest Jazz Band has a new one on the Audiofidelity-distributed World Jazz label. The new album is a salute to Duke Ellington. The band, which has undergone personnel changes, now includes Billy Butterfield and Yank Lawson on trumpets; George Masso and Sonny Russo, trombones; Phil Bodner and Al Klink on reeds; John Bunch, piano; Bob Haggart, bass and Bobby Rosengarden, drums.

News (or is that gnus?) from Fantasy/Prestige/Milestone: Sonny Rollins mixing his next LP entitled "The Way I Feel" which will likely be a late January-early February release. Bill Summers formerly with the Headhunters, is scheduled for January release with an album produced by Skip Scarborough. Cal Tjader also has a new album coming which is a tribute to Vince Guaraldi and was recorded at Grace Cathedral. In addition F/P/M will be sending out a Christmas calendar celebrating not only the holidays but many of the artists in the Prestige and Milestone two-fer series.

Thanksgiving Holidays Good For Record Retailers

LOS ANGELES — Record retailers in New York, Chicago, Washington, D.C. and Los Angeles reported their Thanksgiving holiday weekend to have generally been very good for business. Most of the stores contacted reported a fifteen to twenty percent increase in business over last year's Thanksgiving holiday, with a minimal amount of promotional sales. Titles most in demand over the holiday weekend were Stevie Wonder, with fourteen of the fifteen stores contacted reporting it as their top seller. Next in line were albums by EW&F, Rose Royce, The Emotions and the Savannah Band. Some stores who reported a slump in new product business had increased sales in either tapes, oldies or catalogue records.

Cassette Sale

R&R Records in New York had a sale on all cassettes, which store manager Hector Montalvo felt helped draw people into the store during the holiday. However, Montalvo said, "We suffered a twenty-percent decrease in sales from last year at this time. Even though we had the people in the store, they seemed to be shopping rather than buying." The fastest movers in the store over the holiday were Savannah Band, the Spinners, Carol Douglas, The Four Tops and Stevie Wonder.

The VIP stores in Los Angeles had an excellent holiday weekend, enjoying a twenty-percent increase in business over last year's Thanksgiving holiday weekend. Cledus Anderson, manager of the seven store chain, said, "This year our stores were open fewer hours, but business was still better than last year. We found the Rose Royce, Stevie Wonder, EW&F, Emotions, Four Tops and Dramatics albums to be the prime movers, even with no special sales running."

Crenshaw Records in Los Angeles ran a promotion with a number of Columbia new releases that drew in extra customers for the store. Bill Chappell, manager of the store, declared, "My sales during this Thanksgiving holiday weekend increased forty percent over last year. The hottest seller of the sale albums was the Emotions, with Stevie Wonder, Brick, EW&F and Rose Royce doing exceptionally well."

Pat's Records in Los Angeles reported a slump in consumer purchases of new product to the tune of fifteen percent. Henrietta Kirksey, manager of the store, explained, "I did better with catalog items and oldies. I feel the reasoning for this is that so many of the chain stores, who offer such low discount prices, are getting most of the new product business." In spite of the slump, Ms. Kirksey said albums by Rose Royce, Stevie Wonder, EW&F and The Dramatics were her prime movers, with singles by Rick Dees and Rose Royce also doing well.

Saturday Best

Midtown Records in Los Angeles declared Saturday the best day of the holiday weekend for them. Anthony Johnson, the manager of the store, pointed out that "we had no sales or special promotions in effect, but our sales were definitely up twenty percent over last Thanksgiving holiday weekend." Johnson also remarked, "We usually sell a steady number of Stevie Wonder albums every day, with Emotions, Johnny "Guitar" Watson, and EW&F doing well over the weekend."

Gardner's Records in Chicago reported their sales up Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday before the holiday, but slow the Friday and Saturday following. Rosemary Gardner, manager of the store, attributed this in part to the fact that many wholesalers had not replenished their stock, making

some product unavailable. "We ran no promotions at all," stated Ms. Gardner, "but we did have good sales on the Stevie Wonder, Emotions, Rose Royce, Parliament and Walter Jackson albums."

Downtown Records in Chicago claimed that even though they had a special sale price on their top ten LPs, business was down twenty-five percent from last year. Cheryl Brewer, manager of the store, could not attribute the slump to any particular cause, but noted that Stevie Wonder, The O'Jays and EW&F still did remarkably well in her store.

The four-store chain of Record World stores had a sale of designated list priced LPs, that normally sold for \$3.98 to \$4.98, on sale for three for twelve dollars. Bob Mendez, regional manager of the chain, remarked "Our sales were up at least thirty percent over last year. Our hottest sellers were Stevie Wonder, EW&F, Rose Royce, Parliament and the Emotions albums."

The Metro Music chain in Chicago had major advertising campaign going with newspaper ads and radio spots announcing their special holiday promotion. Bruce Butler, manager of one of the stores explained, "We are one of the few stores that were open Thanksgiving day. We featured our top ten LPs at a special price, which was instrumental in increasing our sales over fifty percent from last year, with our best movers being the Stevie Wonder and the Rose Royce albums."

Sam 'K's Records in Washington, D.C. reported sales about the same as last year. Sam Chamberlin, owner of the store, explained his Thanksgiving Day special as "We had any two LPs that regularly sell for \$6.98 each for \$8.99. We noticed that sales seemed to be up slightly Wednesday before the holiday, but they dipped slightly Friday and Saturday." Chamberlin pointed out that the EW&F, Stevie Wonder, Brass Construction and Funkadelic ("Hardcore") seemed to have been biggest sellers.

Disco A Seller

Soul Shack in Washington, D.C. had an excellent weekend, with Stevie Wonder, EW&F, The Blackbyrds, Brick, the Bar-Kays and Brass Construction selling extremely well. Calvin Frazier, manager of the store, recounted, "disco music seems to be the focal point; probably a lot of people were giving dance parties, and that would account for interest in upbeat music." Frazier reported an increase of seventy-five percent in sales from a few weeks ago, but was reluctant to relate last year's figures.

Field's Records in Washington, D.C. experienced a basically normal sales pattern for the holidays. Graham Fields, manager

An interesting note: the tune "Be My Girl" by the **Dramatics** was produced by **Michael Henderson** who also has the same song out, with the Henderson version gaining airplay from many major radio stations.

The upright cabinet, attractively designed, measures 26" wide, 64½" high and 24" deep. Equally eye-appealing is the cocktail table version which is 38½" wide, 29" high and 32¼" deep.

MILWAUKEE MENTIONS

AN EVOLUTION MUST TAKE PLACE in the video games end of the business in order for it to remain a viable segment. This is **Rollie Tonnell's** observation. Rollie, Cigarette Service, Appleton, states that videos have a tendency to go over in a very big way for the first couple of weeks that they are in a location. Then interest wanes until they have to be replaced. Videos move around frequently, therefore, and that can become an expensive proposition considering the high cost of many of these types of games. He cites LeMans as being one of the better videos because it has 8 different tracks, enough variety to hold interest over a longer period of time. As for business in general, Rollie tells the same story that we are getting from a number of operators around the state. Business is down, but the real problem is that expenses are increasing at an alarming rate. The situation seems to apply to all lines, music, games, pins, etc. And the taverns are being affected too.

EASY LISTENING IS GOING COUNTRY. Well, not exactly, but a new trend is starting to develop, according to **John Jankowski**, Radio Doctors and Records, Milwaukee. He says that some of the middle of the road artists are beginning to slant their approach so that their recordings will be played on country stations. This observation has apparently been confirmed by Columbia's country division. One example of such a release is a disk entitled "After The Lovin'" by **Engelbert Humperdinck**, a singer we haven't heard from in a while. John tells us that the record should be making its way up the charts pretty quickly. Rounding out the up-and-coming list are the following releases: "Love Me" by **Yvonne Ellman**; "Blinded By The Light" by **Manfred Mann**; "Stand Tall," **Burton Cummings**; "Jeans On" by **David Dundas**; "I Can't Believe She Gives It All To Me," **Conway Twitty**; "You Make Me Feel Like Dancing" by **Leo Sayer**; "Hello Old Friend" by **Eric Clapton**; and two sides of a record by **Bobby Vinton** entitled "Love Is The Reason" and "Nobody But Me." It looks like both of these latter titles may become hits. Here are some more passing notes from John. Our area has been ahead of the rest of the country in sales of "The Wreck Of The Edmund Fitzgerald," undoubtedly because of the proximity of the tragic sinking of the Edmund Fitzgerald that inspired the song. New Christmas releases are hard to come by this year. Radio Doctors knows of only three, two of which are soul pieces. If more new releases do come in, it is likely to be too late, since operators have already been buying Christmas records for weeks. A parting word . . . operator sales in general are good.

dise at \$3.99; we even had good weather. Why we didn't do well, I don't know. I have no theories."

\$1,500 Increase

The Soundtown in Dallas reported a \$1,500 increase over last year's Thanksgiving weekend figure. According to Craig Brashear, manager, Soundtown did \$6,500 retail over the Friday and Saturday following Thanksgiving, as compared with \$4,000 for a usual weekend figure. "We're not open on Sunday, but we ran a two-day ad with LPs at \$2 off our regular \$5.88 sticker." Brashear added that "Joni Mitchell was heavily featured in our ads and it was very successful in sales." He was surprised by the sales volume the ad produced as Soundtown had run a similar ad last year. "Other than Joni Mitchell, my biggest sellers were Jackson Browne and the Eagles' Greatest Hits. We sold more new releases than catalog."

Odyssey Records in Santa Cruz, California and Phoenix, Ariz. claimed holiday sales increases of "15 to 20% over a usual week with little difference between the stores," according to Michelle McKnight, assistant secretary of the firm. "Everything sold well," she continued, "and the A&M label sale did great. We sold a lot of Joan Baez, Frampton, Chuck Mangione and Nadia's Theme. Other than the A&M sale, Stevie Wonder, Joni Mitchell and Jackson Browne sold a lot."

Wherehouse, the 73-store California chain, had no sales figures to release, according to Lee Hartstone, president. "No comment," he said. "Why don't you just leave us out of the article," asked Hartstone, who added, "I haven't had time to look over the figures." Individual Wherehouse store managers, however, thought nine days was long enough to determine the Thanksgiving figures and confided that sales were up 15% to 20% over a normal weekend, but down 15% to 30% from the 1975 Thanksgiving. The managers added that Stevie Wonder, Joni Mitchell, Jackson Browne, Boston and the Doobie Brothers were the biggest sellers.

Northern California

In northern California the Maya/Banana record chain reported sales up 7 to 8% this Thanksgiving compared to the three-day

sales period last year. Barry Langham, buyer for the chain, commented, "We beat last year's figures, but it could have been better. It definitely wasn't a strong period. Our two new stores helped us, but we're not thrilled to death." Langham said that Boston was the fastest moving LP, "but Yesterday and Today, a Bay area group, exploded, and the Best of The Doobie Brothers and Stevie Wonder went well."

Lower Pricing A Key

Don Simpson, buying supervisor for Father's & Sun's, an Indianapolis retail chain, said his holiday sales were up 13%. "We had a few isolated sales promoted by radio spots, but nothing intensive. I think the reason we did better is our new, lower, competitive pricing, and a better selection of quality product on the market."

Al Marks, buyer and general manager for Potomac one-stop in Baltimore noted that sales were up by 20%. "From Wednesday to Saturday of the Thanksgiving week, we had tremendous response," he said. "I've never seen as much good product out there as there is today. But I think the key is the crossover sales, and there's been a lot of effective sell-through in this area; that is, good coordination between radio, retail and promotion."

'Just Crazy'

"Friday was our best day all year — just crazy," said Steve Blackburn, assistant manager of Portland's Music Millennium. "We increased maybe 50 to 75% over a normal Friday. Every year is the same. We're just really, really busy on that day. The kids are out of school and most people aren't working that day so with Christmas just around the corner and a day off, most go shopping. Joni Mitchell's album was the one everybody was waiting for," Blackburn added. "George Harrison also did well as did the Led Zeppelin soundtrack." Music Millennium had no special promotion or advertising for Thanksgiving but is saving it for Christmas.

In Dallas, Sound Warehouse's store manager Nancy Walker reported a busy weekend. "We were up 30 to 35% in sales over last weekend," she said, and added it was a "good Thanksgiving weekend for business. We had many requests for the new Dave Mason LP in the rock area, Johnny Guitar Watson in the soul category, and "Stuff" with Eric Gale and other artists in the jazz area." She said Sound Warehouse normally discounts the nation's top 20 albums to \$3.45, and with the exception of that sale, no special sales or promotions were utilized.

greatly complemented the overall melancholy concert tone.

Browne's backing band, a highly capable, often arresting unit that gracefully took the back seat to their driving leader, included Brian Garofalo on bass, David Randau on guitar, David Mason on organ and John Mauceri on drums. Also joining everyone on stage near the evening's end was Browne's young son Ethan, who dropped by simply to giggle a shy "Hi."

Like many of his California contemporaries, Browne incorporates an anthem-like quality in his sound and it's the allegiance that his songs so often com-

mand that have put him, ready-or-not, at the forefront of today's musical scene.

Orleans, a tightly-knit band from back east, opened the show with a sound reminiscent of a typical California band. A hard-driving, melodic unit, Orleans is paced by brothers Larry and Lance Hoppen on keyboards and bass, and angular John Hall on guitar. Backed by percussionists Wells Kelly and Jerry Maratta, this rockingly precise unit delighted the crowd with a solid, danceable sound as well as their two hit singles "Still The One" and "Dance With Me."

flowery, but no less dignified or impressive for that.

Arrau's mastery became evident from his first ascending scale. With a relatively slow orchestral tempo to match, he attained great clarity in the opening movement, and used his rubato sparingly to bring out expressive nuances and cross-accents. The Chilean pianist's playing reflected a greater reverence for the music, perhaps, than for his audience; but, as he proved in his virtuosic traversal of the concluding Rondo, Arrau can also be a showman when it suits his purpose.

Overall, the Philharmonic's version of Dvorak's "New World Symphony" improved as it progressed. In the first movement, for example, Kubelik generated a fine rhythmic pulse and lovely orchestral colors, but his dynamic contrasts were not extreme enough to provide the proper sense of mystery. A limpid English horn solo made the Largo a more enjoyable movement, despite false notes from the French horn and the trombones. And the trombonists more than atoned for their mistake with magnificent performances in both the Scherzo and the finale. Although some might carp over Kubelik's luxuriously broad tempo in the section of the last movement that recalls the Largo, it supplied an element of repose that made the final climaxes all the more exciting.

George Mack, founder and trustee of the Victorian Country Music Guild; Geoff Gregory, broadcaster of 2HD Newcastle; and Tony Jerome, broadcaster of 3SH Shepparton, are the newly named judges.

Join Well-Known Cast

These three men, all active and well-known in the country music field, will join Eric Watson, Hedley Charles, Garth Gibson, John Minson, Phil Hunt, Nick Erby, Gil Wahlquist and Keith McGowan on the panel.

Awards Set For Jan. 30

The Wrangler Awards will take place in Tamworth on Jan. 30. A large crowd is expected for the weekend of activities, which will include a country music market, a talent quest, industry seminar and other attractions.

The fifth awards will also mark the first presentation of the special Wrangler Award — a trip to Nashville — for the person judged to have done the most for country music in the last year.

CHEZ-FM Plans Mixed-Bag Show

OTTAWA — The newly licensed CHEZ-FM headquartered in this city is expected to start broadcasting in the early part of the new year, according to Brian Murphy, music director for the station.

Describing the proposed format of the station, Murphy said: "We at CHEZ-FM have a big job ahead of us. We will be programming not only progressive rock, folk-oriented music, general pop and soul but are also committed to playing percentages of classical, jazz and jazz-oriented music as well as spoken word and progressive country."

According to Murphy, CHEZ-FM will program a significant percentage of French-language music as well. A neighboring station in Montreal, CHOM-FM, was recently chastised by the federal government for mixing English and French language music in its format, the reason (unstated) being that CHOM-FM was taking advantage of available advertising revenue sources and cutting into existing territory for predominantly French-speaking stations in the city. Murphy did not give specifics as to the percentage of French language music his station plans on playing.

MPA Joins Int'l. Publishers Union

TOKYO — The Japan Music Publishers Association (MPA) has recently become a member of the music section of the International Publishers Union.

MPA made its application when the general meeting of the International Publishers Union was held this spring in Kyoto. According to MPA president Jun Asake, the association's affiliation means a new phase will begin in the music publishing field in Japan.

Carlin Signs Publishing Pacts

LONDON — Carlin Music vice-president Paul Rich has recently returned from an American business expedition with publishing pacts concluded with the Osmonds' Os Music and Donarie Music, Jefferson Starship and Hot Tuna.

The Osmond deal is effective immediately, giving Carlin control of the flip of the group's current charter "I Can't Live A Dream" as well as a number of tracks on forthcoming albums by the group and by Donny and Marie Osmond.

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Abba, Sherbet Score In UK

LONDON — Two of the star groups on the CBS roster, Abba and Sherbet, collected awards during their recent visits to this city.

Abba, here to promote their new album "Arrival," received a gold award for British sales exceeding 300,000 units within 48 hours of its release. The group was flown by helicopter from Heathrow Airport to a boat on the River Thames, aboard which they were greeted by media representatives and BBC Radio 1 deejay Simon Bates, who made the presentation. Abba's single cut from the LP, "Money Money Money," has gone straight into the chart within a week of its issue.

Australian group Sherbet completed a two-month visit with an informal party hosted by their manager Roger Davies, during which CBS managing director Maurice L. Oberstein presented the group with silver disks marking sales in excess of 250,000 for their "Howzat" single.

Fruin Set For WEA-UK Post New Managing Director Begins January 1

LONDON — John Fruin has been appointed managing director of WEA-UK, assuming his position on January 1, according to Nesuhi Ertegun, president of WEA International.

"I consider John one of the top record executives in the world," Ertegun said. "As part of the development of WEA's international activities, I am especially pleased that a man of his talent and ability will take over our British company. I have great faith in the future of the record industry in Britain both from the viewpoint of expanding sales and the emergence of new talent."

WEA will do some expanding of its own here, according to Ertegun, when it opens its own warehouse during the spring of 1977. At the same time, it will move its offices into newer and larger surroundings.

Fruin will take over for Richard Robinson and Derek Taylor, who served as UK joint deputy managing directors. Both men are expected to continue on as part of the WEA management team.

Beginning work in the record industry with EMI, Fruin spent 20 years gaining experience in every area of the company with the exception of A&R, eventually attaining the position of merchandising director representing sales distribution and production. In 1969, he moved to Polydor Records as managing director and was there for five years. During that period the company reached the number two spot in the UK market. At the same time, for nine months, Fruin was president of MGM Records in the US, running the two companies as a commuter.

During the last two years Fruin contributed to the founding of State Records and Music with Wayne Bickerton and over the last nine months had concentrated on the further expansion of SP and S Records with Bickerton assuming full responsibility for State, together with Tony Waddington. SP and S is now firmly established in the European market and will continue to follow its existing trading policy.

Having made the decision to return to running a major record company, Fruin said he felt he had gained two invaluable years' experience in working with a small company encompassing production, wholesaling, rack-jobbing and retailing.

EMI Abandons Glebe Project

SYDNEY — A great deal of record industry speculation of late has been centered on the projected move of EMI recording and head office facilities to the currently dormant Presbyterian church and manse at Glebe.

It had been hoped that an affirmative statement to that effect could have been made on October 21 on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of EMI Records' production in Australia.

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Quality, Roulette Sign Dist. Pact

TORONTO — Following negotiations between Quality president George Struth and Roulette president Morris Levy, a partnership has been formed whereby Quality Records is to represent Roulette and Pyramid labels in Canada.

The pact gives Quality exclusive manufacturing and distribution rights to some 300 titles, including major chart successes from the mid-'60s by Tommy James & The Shondells and Ronnie Hawkins, and new product by Franki Valli, Whirlwind and others.

Japanese Artists Debut In Europe

TOKYO — Two Japanese artists, Mayumi Itsuwa and Akira Inaba, are expected to appear shortly in both European and Canadian marketplaces.

The debut of singer-songwriter Ms. Itsuwa in the European market through CBS-France has been disclosed by CBS/Sony. The recent reviews she received from executives connected with European CBS entities at the CBS convention held in Los Angeles led to her European debut. Ms. Itsuwa is expected to leave Japan for France at the beginning of December. While there she will record an album at CBS studios for release in France, Belgium, West Germany, Spain and England. Following her debut in the European market, CBS/Sony will begin promoting "Japan's music to world market" policy.

Inaba, a popular Japanese folk singer,

Dr. Hook, Tavares Lead Capitol Intl.

LOS ANGELES — Over the past few months Capitol recording artists Dr. Hook and Tavares have become that label's top international artists with top charted, best-selling records around the world, according to Brian Shepherd, Capitol's manager, international A&R and promotion.

'Superstar Status'

"These two acts have not only duplicated the success they've had here in the states," explained Shepherd, "but in many countries have gone beyond that to achieve superstar status.

"For instance, when Dr. Hook toured Scandinavia this past summer they were a sellout. They played the largest festival there and they were recognized and mobbed on the streets. Their album, 'A Little Bit More,' outsold the last Elton John album in Scandinavia and went gold in the U.K.," he said.

'Heaven' Breaker

"Everyone has been working for the past few years to break Tavares in Europe," Shepherd continued. "The single 'Heaven Must Be Missing An Angel' broke them wide open there just like it did here. In Holland, it was the best-selling Capitol

single since the Beach Boys' 'Sloop John B' in the 60s. The new single, 'Don't Take Away The Music,' is charted all over Europe. In England it debuted at 23, was 18 the following week, and a week later, 9."

By mid-October, "Heaven Must Be Missing An Angel" was number one in Guatemala, 2 in Holland (1 on the soul chart there), 13 in Ireland, 3 in Belgium, 30 in New Zealand and 38 in Germany. At the same time, Dr. Hook's "A Little Bit More" album was number two in Norway, four in Sweden, nine in Ireland and 13 in New Zealand.

Stephen Shrimpton, EMI Records' managing director, stated recently, however, that "the Glebe project has now been abandoned due to the inability of the local council to clear the way for our plans and the inherent cost escalation involved in such a project made it impossible to proceed."

While registering his disappointment at the collapse of a concept that was creating tremendous excitement within the industry, Shrimpton continued, saying that EMI Records is nevertheless dedicated to the "maintaining of its leadership in the recording industry in this country" and that "alternative sites are already being considered and a series of feasibility/cost studies are currently being assessed."

Meanwhile, the existing studio complex has been upgraded with 24-track recording facilities to complement the existing 16- and 8-track capabilities. New disk mastering equipment has also been installed aligning EMI Records with the latest technological advances in this sphere.

International Executives On The Move

Ellis Receives Multiple Titles — Chris Ellis has been named repertoire exploitation manager for EMI Records' MOR division and World Records, reporting to Vic Lanza and Mike Kennedy, respectively. Ellis is a noted back-catalog expert and compiler of albums.

Hitches Resigns Polydor — Polydor sales manager Mike Hitches has resigned and left the record industry after 15 years to become sales manager for greeting cards manufacturer Royle Publications. He is succeeded at Polydor by Lionel Burdge, who has moved over from a similar position at RCA.

Pye Records Makes Changes — Eddie Foster has been named UK product manager at Pye Records, replacing Richard Strong. Jackie Dove, previously marketing department secretary, has been named singles coordinator. Both Foster and Ms. Dove report to Pye marketing director Clive Selwood.

Festival Appoints Powell — Bruce Powell will begin duties as general manager of Festival's music publishing division beginning January 1. He has been an assistant general manager with the company for the past year. The change has occurred due to the retirement of Phil Matthews.

CISAC Names First Female

NEW YORK — Elizabeth Granville, executive director of publisher administration for Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI), has been named to the 23-member Judicial and Legislative Commission of CISAC (the International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers) for 1976-77. The appointment was made during the organization's recent 30th international congress in Paris. Ms. Granville succeeds Sydney M. Kaye, BMI board chairman emeritus, in the CISAC post and is the first woman to serve on the commission in its 50-year history.

Barbara Begins

TOKYO — Union Music Publisher Co., a subsidiary of Polydor Japan, has changed its name to Barbara Music Publishing Company. Katsumi Hagiwara, chief of the manufacturing section for Elec Record Co., has been named Barbara's president.

Barbara Music is expected to deal primarily in original music and its promotion, with its first release due in December. Union Music, established in 1973, manufactured movie music.

Capitol Launches Seger Campaign

TORONTO — Capitol Records-EMI of Canada Ltd. has launched an intensive media promotion in support of Bob Seger's most recent chart entry, "Night Moves."

According to Karen Ball, press director for the label, copies of the album have been shipped to English and French-language commercial and campus radio across the country along with reviews of the album culled from U.S. trade magazines, three-page biography and an assortment of feature articles drawn from a variety of U.S. consumer publications.

Also in the kit, photo materials and a large four color poster promoting Seger's three available album titles in Canada: "Beautiful Loser," "Live Bullet" and "Night Moves."

Print ads are being run in Record Month, Alberta Music Express and Georgia Straight promoting the album and the label is flying a Montreal journalist out to the west coast for a Seger performance in Vancouver.

Graham Powers, Arista product manager for Capitol, developed the marketing plan for the Seger campaign, one that also involved a promotional necklace that sports an imitation silver bullet.

Rich also renewed Carlin representation on the Seals and Crofts' Dawnbreaker Music now extended to include compositions by Parker McGhee, writer of the recent hit "I'd Really Like To See You Tonight" recorded by England Dan and John Ford Coley, and the Beach Boys' Brothers Music and Wilojarston.

Carlin has also strengthened its country catalog activity, following up its success earlier this year with Dolly Parton by acquiring representation on the Loretta Lynn catalog which, Rich says, is a direct result of Carlin's action on Dolly Parton and other country material.
