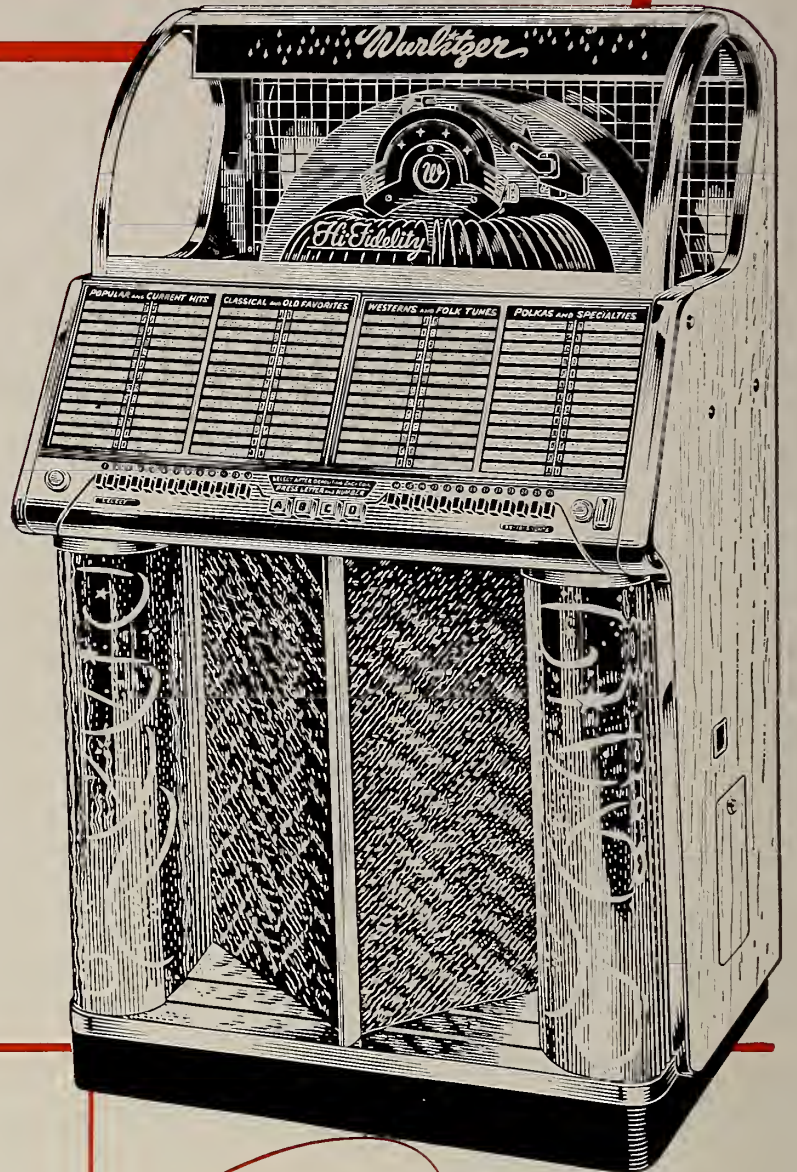

The old cry. The cry of the nice, fat, big boys who have found it so comfortable, and easy, and satisfactory, to sit in their nice, big, soft, easy-chairs, and let the business come a'rollin' in.

It's over. The money-moon. It's all over. It's a new era. Maybe that's why manufacturers are asking, "Who do you know who's hungry? Who wants to be a real distributor? Who wants to get out and WORK?"

Maybe they're right. Maybe the time has come when lots and lots of guys have to realize that they must, simply must, get up and out of that nice, big, soft, easy-chair and go GO TO WORK AGAIN! !

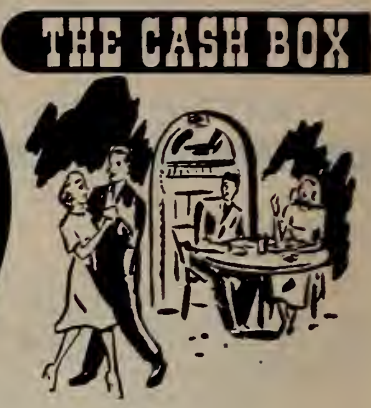

Two polls were conducted three weeks apart in March. The polls were to determine the relative popularity of Oscar Levant, Liberace and Jose Iturbi. In poll No. 1 Norman played "Malaguena" by each pianist, identifying each artist by a number instead of name. The listeners were told who the three artists were but not identified with the record. The response was terrific and the results were: 1—Oscar Levant—50.38%; Liberace—24.81%, and Jose Iturbi—24.81%. Three weeks later the same three records were played. This time the listener was advised which player he was listening to. Now view the results of poll No. 2. Liberace—51%; Jose Iturbi—24.14%, and Oscar Levant—24.86%.

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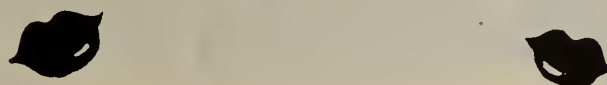

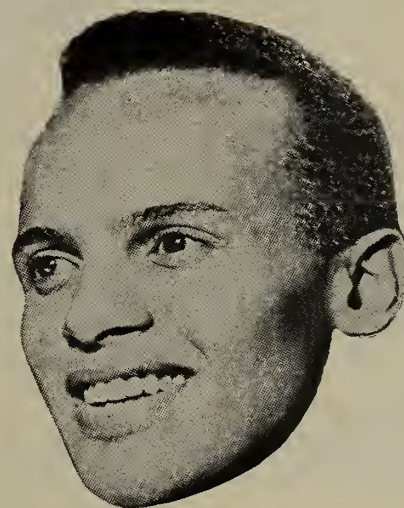

ROBERT EARL
(Epic 9034; 4-9034)

C+ "THE BOOK" [Kassner ASCAP—Roberts, Gotwald] One of England's big tunes gets a sincere and dramatic reading from the strong tenor voice of Robert Earl. A polished job.

C "YIDDISHER TEARS" [Box & Cox ASCAP—Carr] A dramatic number with a prayer type of delivery is offered by the tenor. Wally Stott's orchestra assists on this exceptionally heavy material.

FRAN WARREN
(MGM 11719; K-11719)

B "YOU PROMISED ME" (3:00) [Brandom ASCAP—Manus, Lucas] Aided by the Nelson Riddle orchestra, Fran Warren tenderly fashions a pretty love tune. Good delivery that could make it.

C+ "JUST FRIENDS" (2:58) [Robbins ASCAP—Klenner, Lewis] Lew Douglas supplies the accompaniment for Fran on this sentimental number. Polished showing by the thrush on another good tune.

GEORGE WILLIAMS ORCHESTRA
(Coral 61120; 9-61120)

B+ "WHAMBOOGIE" [—Williams] A big new dance band could be in the making if George Williams and his boys continue to dish up more of this good material. This one is a wild jumper tailor-made for dancing. Number could make loads of noise for a band instrumental.

C+ "CREOLE" [—Williams] The crew eases through a slow bluesy instrumental also penned by the leader. Good production music for an interpretive dance routine.

ANN COLE
(Timely 1006; 45-1006)

B "DANNY BOY" [Boosey & Hawks ASCAP—Weatherly] Powerful Ann Cole makes an exciting vocal debut as she gives a spiritual feeling to a great oldie. Great voice that should sell well in blues and pop. Could make noise.

C+ "SMILIN' THROUGH" [M. Witmark ASCAP—Penn] The thrush sends up a good styling of another standard. A belting arrangement, more pop in design.

HARRY BELAFONTE
(RCA Victor 20-5722; 47-5722)

B "PRETTY AS A RAINBOW" (2:20) [Duchess BMI—Brooks, Judson] A group song with an unusual waltz-march tempo gets a colorful treatment from Harry Belafonte and the chorus with Hugo Winterhalter's ork assisting.

B+ "ACORN IN THE MEADOW" (2:39) [Frank ASCAP—Adler, Ross] The warbler does a most impressive job on a moving folk tune. The sentimental number is sung with a heavy heart. Beautiful material. Could make it.

spot with his "Young At Heart" probably makes Frank Sinatra the happiest guy around. And it looks like there'll be more joy coming his way. "The Voice" has another top grade contender in his latest release. On one end the crooner dishes up a warm and inviting new ballad dubbed "I Could Have Told You." It's a dreamy tune presented in the same polished manner that made "Young At Heart" such a success. The coupling is a classy performance of a great oldie "Don't Worry About Me." Number could be a big click all over again. Frank gets great support on both ends from the Nelson Riddle Orchestra. Watch this disk.

ALEC DAVIS
(Cavalier 832; 45-832)

C+ "THE BLACK HILLS OF DAKOTA" [Remick ASCAP—Webster, Fain] A "wide open spaces" type of number from the flicker "Calamity Jane" is well rendered by Alec Davis and the chorus.

C "THE DEADWOOD STAGE" [Remick ASCAP—Webster, Fain] With the sound of hoofs in the background, the songster fashions another tune from the same film. The Pembroke Davenport ork accompanies.

LILLIAN ROTH
(Coral 61148; 9-61148)

C+ "DID YOU EVER SEE A DREAM WALKING" (3:02) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP—Revel, Gordon] A talking introduction leads into an interesting delivery of a favorite oldie by Lillian Roth. Polished job.

C+ "PLEASE TELL ME WHEN" (2:30) [Harvard BMI—Brown, Feyne] The Jack Pleis ork sets up a fitting backdrop for the artist's slow heartbroken delivery of a feelingful number. Strong showing.

JOYCE TAYLOR
(Mercury 70345; 70345 x 45)

C+ "IF YOU ONLY KNEW" (2:51) [Studio BMI—Rodde, Reid, Lee] Joyce Taylor presents a sentimental ballad in a sincere fashion. A good new tune that comes over very well.

B "SEALED WITH A KISS" (2:37) [B & F BMI—Rodde, Reid] Another lush and romantic number gets a dream dusted delivery from the songstress. Joyce sounds much like Joni James on this deck.

CONNIE RUSSELL
(Capitol 2771; F-2771)

C+ "NO ONE BUT YOU" (2:16) [Feist ASCAP—Lawrence, Brodsky] A pretty ballad from the coming flicker "Flesh And The Flame" gets a dramatic reading from Connie Russell with Harold Mooney's ork in the backdrop.

C "AN INNOCENT VICTIM" (2:50) [United ASCAP—Curtis] A chorus joins in on this country flavored ballad pleasantly treated by the sultry songstress. Good listening.

DANNY KAYE
(Decca 29079; 9-29079)

B "KNOCK ON WOOD" (2:11) [Famous ASCAP—Fine] From his soon to be released flicker "Knock On Wood," Danny Kaye offers the rhythmic title song. A real solid belter with Danny giving his all. Wild side.

C "ALL ABOUT YOU" (2:46) [Famous ASCAP—Fine] The versatile performer presents an up tempo version of a romantic ballad on this end. Number also stems from film. Vic Schoen's men assist on both decks.

CONNIE HAINES
(Coral 61157; 9-61157)

C+ "I CAN'T GET ENOUGH" (1:47) [Shapiro, Bernstein ASCAP—Glazer] A catchy and peppy novelty with a samba beat gets a refreshing fashioning from chirp Connie Haines. Real cute material with a good Frank Comstock backing.

C+ "MAN TO WOMAN" (2:00) [Iris Music—Call, Newberger] The lively songstress belts out a catchy ditty in her peppy manner. A cute set of lyrics delivered in live-wire style.

BOB MANNING
(Capitol 2772; F-2772)

B+ "THAT'S A-ME 'N MY LOVE" (2:23) [Hartley ASCAP—Gluck] A cute shuffle novelty with an appealing Italian flavor is presented by Bob Manning. Nelson Riddle's men assist on this strong contender.

B "GOOD-BYE" (3:08) [LaSalle ASCAP—Jenkins] The crooner's warm and deep voice comes over exceptionally well on this pretty romantic oldie dished up with feeling. Tune could click again.

THE GONDOLIERS
(Request 2001; 45-2001)

B+ "GOD'S GREEN ACRES" (2:26) [Maestro ASCAP—Lengsfelder, Kaye] A meaningful and moving number with a religious air is delivered with feeling by the Gondoliers. Beautiful melody wed to good lyrics. Boys have a good sound.

C+ "FLY, SEAGULL, FLY" (3:00) [Sing 'n Dance BMI—Ross, Cowen] The crew eases through a pretty lilted with a romantic theme. Nice arrangement of some good material.

BOB SANTA MARIA
(MGM 11715; K-11715)

C+ "TSUZAMMEN" (1:57) [Chappell ASCAP—Parker] Glenn Osser and the chorus assist Bob Santa Maria on a lively bouncer. Cute item with a peppy delivery.

C+ "FAREWELL FAREWELL" (2:44) [Weiss & Barry BMI—Logan, Bell] The crew softly fashions a tender ballad with Bob taking the lead spot once again. Good fox trot. Inviting number.

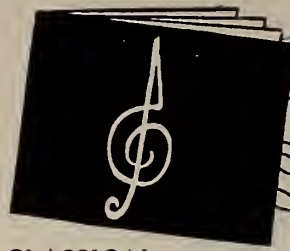
"Crazy Mixed Up Song" is getting plenty of spins and looks as though it might break thru.

CLASSICAL:

DVORAK: Symphony No. 5, In E Minor, Op. 95 ("From the New World")—Arturo Toscanini and the NBC Symphony Orchestra—RCA Victor LM 1778 (12" LP) List: \$5.45

Anton Dvorak's most popular and most recorded work, his Symphony No. 5 in E Minor "From the New World" is treated to a superb rendition by maestro Arturo Toscanini and his NBC Symphony Orchestra. Now that Toscanini has resigned as conductor of the NBC Orchestra, and the possibility looming that he will retire from active participation in the world of music, this work by the master of the baton increases in value. A beautiful job of some truly great music. Record offers an excellent reproduction of the Carnegie Hall performance. Should be one of the biggest selling renditions of Dvorak's Symphony No. 5.

STRAVINSKY—"Le Sacre Du Printemps"—The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra conducted by William Steinberg—Capitol Records P 8254 (1-12" LP) List: \$5.70

A brilliant and dramatic reading of the colorful tonal values of the Stravinsky work. An ear compelling piece that is enhanced by the fine sound that is now available on records. Album cover is a splash of colors in an ultra modernistic effect that will certainly help attract attention.

DONIZETTI ARIAS—Cesare Valletti with The Orchestra and Chorus of Radio Italiana—Cetra Records A505154 (1-12" LP) List: \$5.95

L'ELISIR D'AMORE; THE DAUGHTER OF THE REGIMENT; DON PASQUALE.

Cesare Valletti, whom opera lovers in America are just becoming aware of through his San Francisco Opera Company, Metropolitan Opera and TV appearances, is now available to his American audience via this Cetra release. Valletti's lyric tenor is showcased to excellent advantage as he presents Donizetti Arias from The Elixir of Love, The Daughter of The Regiment, and Don Pasquale. A beautiful album that will provide many of hours of pleasure.

LISZT: "Sonata in B Minor"; Sonetto del Petrarca No. 104—Alexander Uninsky, piano—Epic LC 3027 (12" LP) List: \$5.95

Piano solos of Franz Liszt's only sonata, the "Sonata in B Minor" and his "Sonetto del Petrarca No. 104" are rendered by Alexander Uninsky. Mr. Uninsky treats the dramatic sonata with a great deal of feeling and force, well demonstrating his skills as a pianist. The moving Sonetto is delightfully fashioned with the warm and delicate touch this great music so well deserves. This is the second LP featuring these two beautiful pieces back to back.

EDWARD MacDOWELL—"Second Indian Suite, Op. 48"—Mercury Record MG-40009—Howard Hanson conducting the Eastman-Rochester Symphony Orchestra. (1-12" LP) List: \$5.45

A musical story of the American Indian covering the emotions from love, war dances, funeral music and festival gayety. Dramatically and melodically portrayed by the Eastman-Rochester Symphony Orchestra. Could find no record of this MacDowell opus ever having been waxed before.

MGM bids fair to have one of the big albums of the year with its star studded direct recording of the original soundtrack from the CinemaScope musical "Rose Marie." Howard Keel, Ann Blyth, Fernando Lamas, Bert Lahr, and Marjorie Main treat these all time favorites to pleasant and most inviting versions. George Stoll conducts the studio orchestra. Eight delightful melodies. MGM is going all out on this album with a big promotion campaign, contests, etc. Dealers oughta stock up on this one. It's gonna be big.

PAUL WESTON—"Music For Jennifer"—Columbia CL 6281 (10" LP) List: \$3.00

SONG OF BERNADETTE; JENNIE'S SONG; DUEL IN THE SUN; SINCE YOU WENT AWAY; INDISCRETION; LOVE LETTERS; RUBY; AUTUMN IN ROME.

The movie industry spends millions of dollars to supply background music for films. And from these films come many of our popular song hits. In this album eight beautiful melodies included in the background music of films starring Jennifer Jones are presented by the lush strings of Paul Weston's Orchestra. Tunes are very beautiful and take on a dreamy air as presented by Weston. "Love Letters" and "Ruby" are the standouts with this listener.

BENNY GOODMAN—"This Is Benny Goodman and his Orchestra"—RCA Victor LPT 3056 (10" LP) List: \$3.15

CHANGES; CAMEL HOP; SWINGTIME IN THE ROCKIES; SUGARFOOT STOMP; BIG JOHN SPECIAL; LIFE GOES TO A PARTY; RIFFIN' AT THE RITZ; WRAPPIN' IT UP.

Here's a collector's item. Benny Goodman, "King of Swing" and his great orchestra present eight of their all time great instrumentals which made the band such a classic organization. These instrumental hits were standouts when the band was at its peak in the late thirties and early forties. Each of these numbers probably ranks among the favorites of the Goodman enthusiasts. The world wide Goodman following will buy up a load of these disks.

DAVID ROSE and his Orchestra—"The Music of HAROLD ARLEN"—MGM E3101 (12" LP) List: \$4.85

LET'S FALL IN LOVE; THAT OLD BLACK MAGIC; HAPPINESS IS A THING CALLED JOE; LAST NIGHT WHEN WE WERE YOUNG; STORMY WEATHER; OVER THE RAINBOW; COME RAIN OR COME SHINE; ILL WIND; WHAT'S GOOD ABOUT GOODBYE?; IT'S ONLY A PAPER MOON; BLUES IN THE NIGHT; I'VE GOT THE WORLD ON A STRING.

Songwriter Harold Arlen, whose compositions read like a top ten list of the past 25 years, has a dozen of his creations rendered by the strings of the David Rose Orchestra. His beautiful melodies wedded to outstanding lyrics resulted in some of the greatest standards the popular song world has ever been blessed with. These dreamy instrumentals presentations prove this. Excellent mood music. Should be a big seller for MGM.

WILL YOU STILL BE MINE; JUNIOR AND JULIE; NIGHT WE CALLED IT A DAY; WE BELONG TOGETHER; ANGEL EYES; VIOLETS FOR YOUR FURS; EVERYTHING HAPPENS TO ME; COMPARED TO YOU; IT WASN'T THE STARS; WHEN YOU LOVE A FELLA; LET'S GET AWAY FROM IT ALL.

Super club singer Matt Dennis has opened a new field for himself with this collection of fascinating tunes. Matt sings with a simple charm and warmth that projects his personality beyond the wax. His styling is individual. His pleasing voice is similar to several top flight singers, yet unlike any of them. A little push from the salesmen should mean strong sales for this album.

JAZZ:

THE ORIGINAL DIXIELAND JAZZ BAND—"X" Records LX-3007 (1-10" LP) List: \$3.85

DIXIE JAZZ BAND ONE-STEP; LIVERY STABLE BLUES; SKELETON JANGLE; TIGER RAG; SENSATION RAG; BLUIN' THE BLUES; MOURNIN' BLUES; CLARINET MARMALADE.

While not the first white jazz band, the O.D.J.B. is the most famous, having moved into New York and taken the town by storm about the time the first world war was ending. For collectors this disk is invaluable, featuring such history names as Nick LaRocca, cornet; Eddie Edwards, trombone; Larry Shields, clarinet; Henry Ragas, piano; and Tony Sbarbaro on the drums. Most of these names are unfamiliar except to those who have acquainted themselves with the complement of the early bands. Another in the series of "X" vault originals that are reported selling like hot cakes.

CLIFFORD BROWN—Blue Note 5032 (1-10" LP) List: \$4.00

With Gigi Gryce, alto sax & flute; Charlie Rouse, tenor sax; John Lewis, piano; Percy Heath, bass; and Art Blakey, drums.

CHEROKEE; EASY LIVING; WAIL BAIT; MINOR MOOD; HYMN OF THE ORIENT; BROWNIE EYES.

Of recent months the word has been circulating around the industry that a star of "magnitude" had arrived in the person of Lou Clifford Brown, young trumpeter. Brown had previously been recorded on Blue Note as part of the Jay Jay Johnson Sextet and with Donaldson. This disk puts Brown in the spotlight as a star in his own right. His performance will appeal to the modern jazz clientele and sales in that department should be brisk.

BOBBY HACKETT—"Soft Lights And Bobby Hackett"—Capitol H458 (10" LP) List: \$3.00

SOFT LIGHTS AND SWEET MUSIC; BOBBY'S BLUES; I CRIED FOR YOU; YOU TURNED THE TABLES ON ME; EASY TO LOVE; THAT OLD BLACK MAGIC; SOMEDAY YOU'LL BE SORRY; THE SONG IS YOU.

Although a star trumpeter for years before Jackie Gleason ever had an orchestra, Bobby Hackett's excellent feel for the trumpet has met with a greater recognition by the millions of people who have heard him on Gleason's "Music For Lovers Only" series. Hackett is among the best in his class, oft referred to as a "musician's musician." On this album, Bobby sends up some sensational improvisations on a number of standards and one of his own creations. Effective delivery with an up tempo.

JOE LOCO at the piano—"Mambo Dance Favorites"—Tico 123 (10" LP) List: \$3.85

MATTY SINGER MAMBO; BAND STAND MAMBO; MONTICELLO MAMBO; COLONY MAMBO; JIVE MAMBO; BLUE NOTE MAMBO; COCKTAIL MAMBO; MAMBO EN PUERTO RICO.

Joe Loco, who continues to attract more and more mambo fans whenever he performs, shows exactly why as he sends up eight top grade numbers which were formerly issued as singles. Many of his fans who have recently recognized his talent, will want to get this back collection. Mambos are rendered in the soothing manner associated with the artist rather than the usual earth shaking fashion used by many other bands. Excellent dance material.

Kapp Records Issues First Album

NEW YORK—Dave Kapp launches his own label, Kapp Records, with a special interfaith album, titled "One God—The Ways We Worship Him." The album is based on a religious non-fiction bestseller of the same title by Florence Mary Fitch and was adapted for records by Jerome Lawrence and Robert Lee.

Eddie Albert stars in the dramatization of the Fitch book, which has sold 300,000 copies since its publication. Behind Albert are the Gramercy Players and the University Interfaith Chorale. The theme song for the album "One God" was written by Erwin Drake and Jimmy Shirl, part of the "I Believe" songwriting team.

Kapp has already set six distributors in key cities and plans to add six to eight more for complete national coverage of his forthcoming output. He plans to issue 12 to 14 albums a year with singles to be extracted from the sets for disk jockey exploitation. If the singles show any potential, he will issue them separately. At this point, however, Kapp is accenting albums in the standard and show fields. Kapp is now in the process of signing pop artists for future album projects.

Dot Signs Fontane Sisters

GALLATIN, TENN. — Randy Wood, president of Dot Records, announced this week that he had signed the Fontane Sisters. The Fontanes have been on Victor for the past 6 years and are featured on the Perry Como TV show. Their first Dot releases are expected in early May.

On the flip side Donato plays his violin while his wife Dena sings "Can't Sleep For Dreaming."

This husband and wife team have perfected an entirely new method of recording which they did in a studio they have set up in their home in Northridge, California.

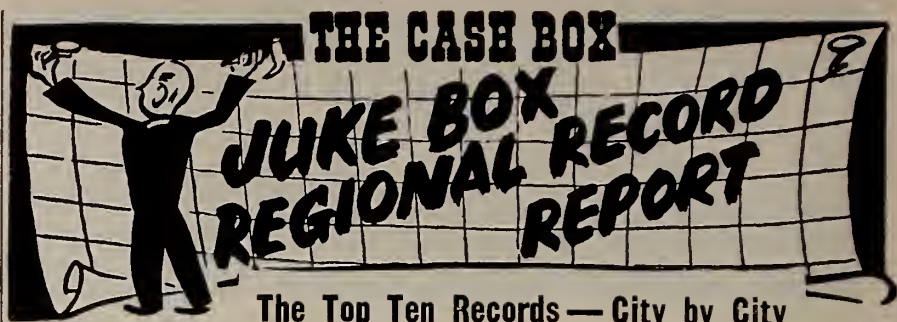

Thanks to the efforts of the Canadian Music Publishers' Association the 10% sales tax on printed music has been removed effective April 7th. These happy results were announced in the Canadian budget that was brought down in the House of Commons in Ottawa on April 6th, and resulted from the meetings which the Canadian Music Publishers' Association had held with the Honorable Douglas Abbott, Minister of Finance. This tax relief will tend to keep the retail price of sheet music and orchestrations at present level, in spite of increased printing and publication costs which threaten to create a situation that might have tended to price the product out of the market. . . .

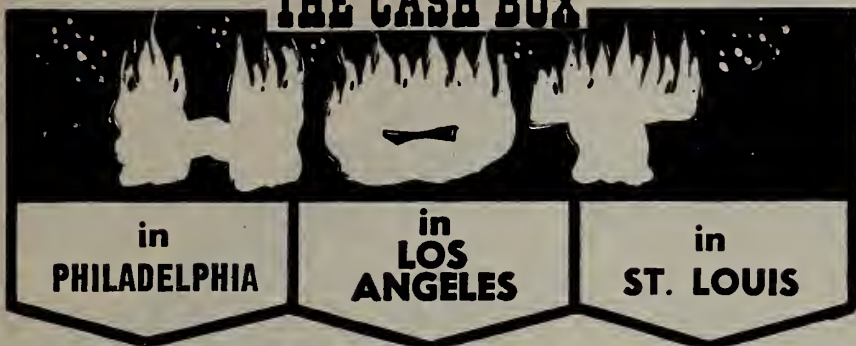

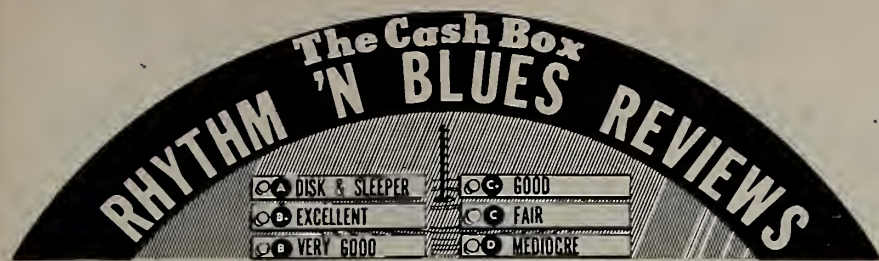

NEW YORK—A new name has been added to the roster of disk manufacturers. Under the name of Music From Abroad, the company will offer tunes from the growing repertory of the German diskery Metrophon, located in the American sector of Berlin, Germany.

Last year seven of these records appeared on the market on the Discus label. Now the U.S. agents will issue popular German hits on all three speeds. They will include instrumental selections from the standard repertory such as Argentinian tangos, Paso Dobles, rhumbas, Gypsy music from Roumania, and popular band music.

Metrophon of Germany is one of the smaller record manufacturers in Germany specializing, more or less, in the quick release of hits at a lower price. Realizing that six German hits have become hits in the United States, and in much larger proportions, the makers offer to American publishers an opportunity to find another hit as big as: "Lilli Marlene," "You Can't Be True Dear," "The Blonde Sailor," "For Ever and Ever," "Auf Weideseh'n Sweetheart" and more recently "Oh, Mein Papa."

Music From Abroad is headed by Fred Bungee with Fred Herbert as advisor.

LOS ANGELES, CALIF.—Austin McCoy and Peter Morgan have launched a new Rhythm and Blues diskery at 143 W. 54th Street, this city. The new label will be called Show Time Records.

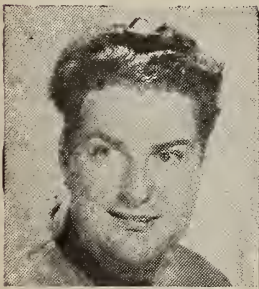

Rex Allen, the Arizona Cowboy, bought the largest known collection of Texas Longhorn cattle horns for his San Fernando Valley home. The collection consists of 22 sets of Longhorns measuring up to eight feet in spread. A veteran collector stated that the Corienta breed of cattle known as Texas Longhorns are practically extinct, and only a few animals are believed to exist, probably kept on a big ranch or two for the impression of dudes. Hereford and Black Angus have developed as range breeds, driving the Longhorns into the limbo of bygone days.

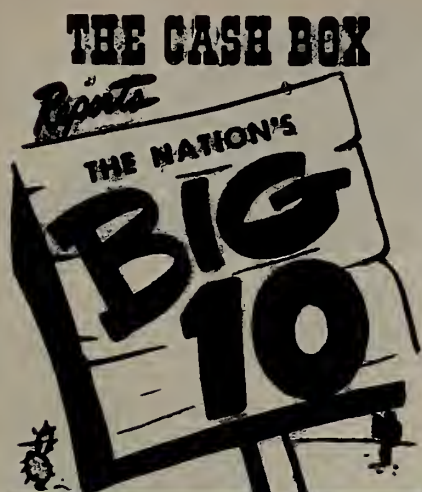
Motor City Reception

● **"DIDDLE DIDDLE DUMP-LING" (2:37)** [Lois BMI—J. Cardwell] Jack Cardwell takes hold of the popular nursery rhyme and treats it to a most delightful vocal job. It's a cute spirit-lifter that should garner many spins in the boxes and over the airwaves.

● **"BLUE LOVE" (2:57)** [Lois BMI—J. Cardwell] On the lower portion the warbler infectious projects a slow tempo sentimental lament. Strings capably support the artist on both ends.

● **"HOW COULD YOU LEAVE ME?" (2:25)** [Intro BMI—E. Wilson] The soft and polished chords of the artist come over well on another slow beat item with heart rending lyrics. Strings back in adequate fashion.

JACK TUCKER

● **"I WAS ONLY FOOLING ME" (2:48)** [Personality BMI—K. Patrick] Jack Tucker comes up with some smooth warbling as he eloquently fashions a middle tempo sentimental item with inviting lyrics.

● **"ITCHIN' FOR A HITCHIN'" (2:35)** [Starrite BMI—G. Wilson] Under deck is a moderate beat romantic piece that Tucker spins in a pleasurable manner. The Oklahoma Playboys neatly assist the chanter on both ends.

● **"TEACH ME TO LOVE SOMEONE ELSE" (2:30)** [Jamboree BMI—C. Wilson] Audie Andrews makes his debut on the label a distinctive one as he turns in a polished reading on feelingful tune with moving lyrics. Could be a big one for the artist.

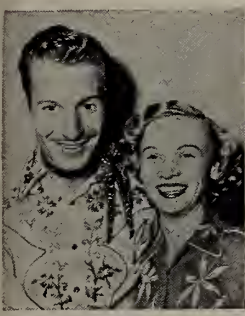

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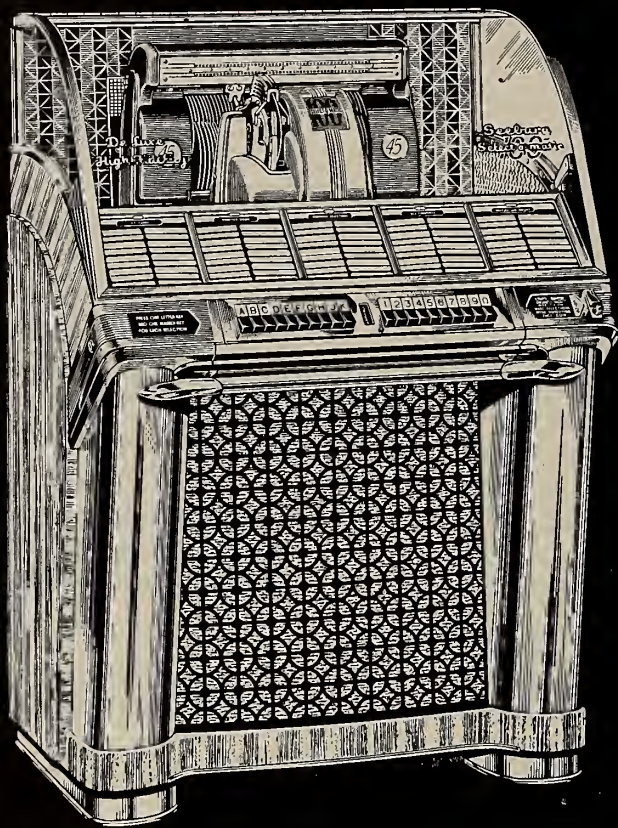
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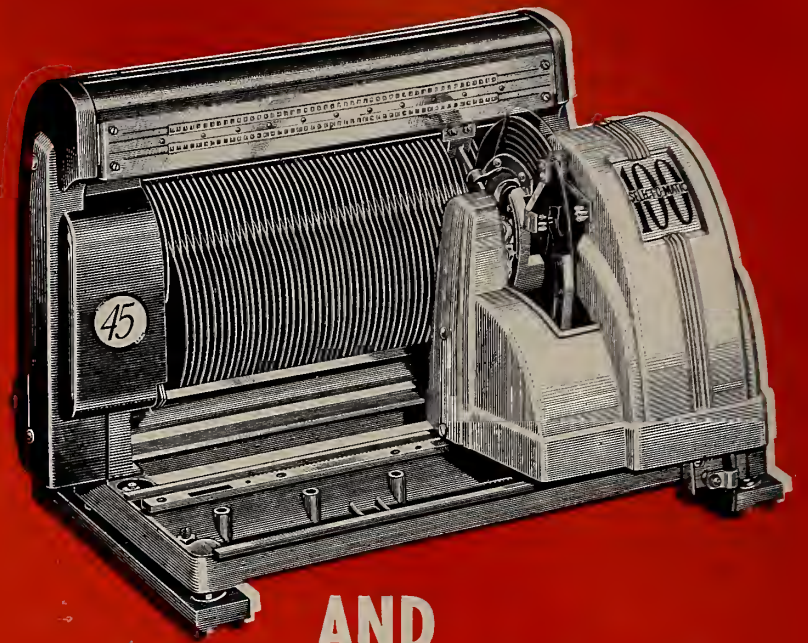


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Here and There

1939

This year operators are paying \$67.50 for pinball games. \$350 for phonographs. \$40 per week for mechanics. \$35 per week for a competent book-keeper-stenographer. About \$950 for pickup trucks. CHARGE 5¢ PER PLAY. (But the Nickel, this year of 1939, is really and truly worth 5¢.)

1954

Now, 15 years later, operators are paying \$364.50 for pinballs. \$1,000 for phonographs. \$125 per week for mechanics. \$85 per week for bookkeepers. \$75 per week for stenographers. Around \$2,500 for pickup trucks. Plenty more for C.P.A.'s, License Fees, Personal Property Taxes, etc., etc., etc. STILL CHARGE 5¢ PER PLAY. (But the Nickel, this year of 1954, is worth only 2.7¢.)

Dime Marches On..

The year of 1939 is accepted by all the nation's economists, as "the year of basic valuations." In short, they base all increases in costs upon what costs were in 1939.

Similarly, since the nation's economists base themselves upon 1939 as the year of basic valuations, it is only fitting that the nation's coin machine operators do the same.

Comparisons between costs during 1939 and costs 15 years later, in 1954, are just as important to the nation's operators as they are to all other business men.

Perhaps the operators, after they read the above, and study just what progress they have made in the 15 years since 1939, will better understand why the "Dime Marches On."

Why dime play is gradually reaching into every village, every town and city in the nation.

The fact remains that, since 1939, cost of equipment and overhead operating expense have increased about 300%, yet, many operators continue to charge only 5¢ per play.

The same 5¢ per play that they charged in 1939. But in 1939 the nickel was really and truly worth 5¢.

Today, in 1954, because the American Dollar

is valued at only 54¢, the nickel is worth but 2.7¢.

In short, overhead expense has risen 300%, and yet the operators are getting 46% less money per play on their equipment. (How this can be balanced to equal "profit" is for a greater mathematical mind than that of the writer to explain.)

All the writer knows is, if his merchandise cost 300% more, he must charge more, so that he can continue to see somewhat near the profit that he used to earn.

But, to pay 300% more for merchandise, and charge 46% less for it when he sells it, certainly sounds rather stupid, to say the least.

Even when the operators of today charge 10¢ per play they are actually only getting 5.4¢ per play, if they compare the dime of today to the dime of 1939.

At least they are making an effort toward some solution of their problem of balancing cost against income. And if they will then follow thru, even after they start dime play, by insisting on sufficient front money they can, somehow, see some profit daylight in their businesses.

The writer leaves the above to the study and judgment of each of the nation's operators who are, today, faced with the problem of somehow making both ends meet.

NEW YORK—If we remember correctly, we reproduced the following story sometime in 1949 or 1950, during the other so called "recession". However, we just received it again from our good friend, and one of New York's foremost operators, Joe Hahnen of Gordon Amusement Company, and believe it's worth reproducing once more: Titled "Business Humor", the item reads: "There was a man who lived by the side of the road and he sold hot dogs. He was hard of hearing so he had no radio. He had trouble with his eyes so he read no newspapers. But he sold good hot dogs. He put signs up on the highway, telling how good they were. He stood on the side of the road and cried, 'Buy a hot dog, mister?' and people bought. He increased his meat and bun orders. He bought a bigger stove to take care of his trade. He finally got his son home from college to help him. But then something happened. His son said, 'Father, haven't you been listening to the radio? Haven't you been reading the newspapers? There's a big depression on. The European situation is terrible. The domestic situation is worse. Everything's going to pot.' Whereupon the father thought, 'Well, my son's been to college. He reads the papers and listens to the radio, and he ought to know.' So the father cut down on his meat and bun orders, took down his advertising signs, and no longer bothered to stand out on the highway to sell his hot dogs. And his hot dog sales fell almost overnight. 'You're right, son,' the father said to the boy. 'We certainly are in the middle of a great depression.'" The answer is obvious. You have a product or service to sell. You must, today more than ever, disregard all the pessimists and "cryers", and go out and work and fight and sell.

CHICAGO — It's not news that cigarettes are big business today. However, the statistics are rather staggering. The annual volume sales are said to be close to \$5 billion. Total world-wide leaf production in 1953 is estimated at 8.2 billion pounds, valued at \$2 billion. The United States government reaps about \$1.5 billions in taxes each year, and another \$500 millions in taxes finds its way into the treasuries of State and Municipalities each year. By the way, the Government tab on each pack is 8c.

April Opens With Biz Boom

Factories Working Full Blast as First Week of April Starts Off With Spring Order Spree. Predict Second Quarter's Biz to Remain at High Level. Foresee Fine Spring and Summer Season Ahead for All the Industry.

CHICAGO—It might not have been completely unexpected, but, continuation of business at '53 high levels wasn't planned by the majority of the manufacturers here.

With the first quarter of '54 now under their belts, and with the majority of the manufacturers here very happy over the fact that business the first quarter of 1954 remained equal to that of the first quarter of 1953, they started into this second quarter much more enthusiastically and optimistically than originally planned in most instances.

There was some surprise apparent as the first quarter of '54 came to an end and orders suddenly began to flood into the plants here in unprecedented and unexpected quantity.

This has continued into the first week of April and the manufacturers are now working ahead with greater will than ever before in the belief that the forthcoming spring and summer seasons are going to see some of the very best action the industry has enjoyed.

The fact remains that with the second quarter so well under way, and with some of the factories here actually backlogged to a certain extent, there is now no longer any doubt that business is continuing at high level, and that all the field is bound to enjoy better business than was ever expected, due to the gloomy forebodings which came about as general industrial layoffs and slowdowns took place all over the country.

One manufacturer put it this way this past week, "Business is better than ever. We can't attribute it to any one thing. We do believe, if past experience is of any value, that this is caused by the opening of many more locations about the nation as the warmer weather starts."

Another manufacturer very frankly stated, "We never really expected such high level business action to continue. We're frank in admitting we don't know what caused it. But we are extremely happy to state that our factory is working away at top speed trying to fill orders and handle the business that is being phoned in to us each day."

Similar statements are being made by other factories in the Chicago area where the bulk of the manufacturing business for the industry is concentrated.

A visit to the plants here has brought great optimism to many. There is no doubt that such continued high level business action portends another very fine quarter's business and a continued boom for sometime yet to come.

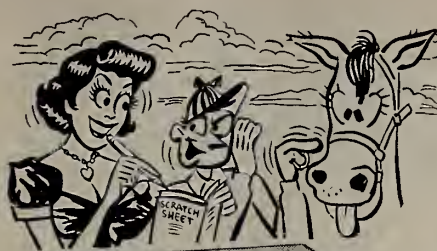

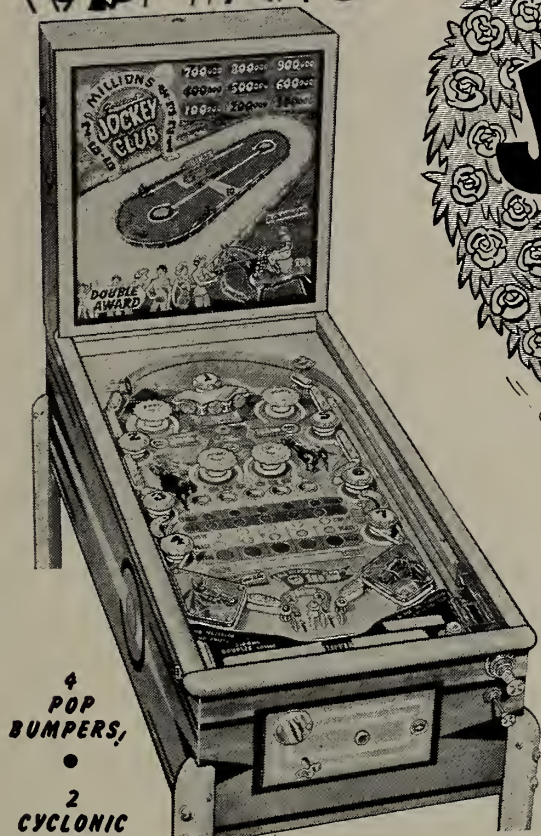

Wurlitzer Promotes Three

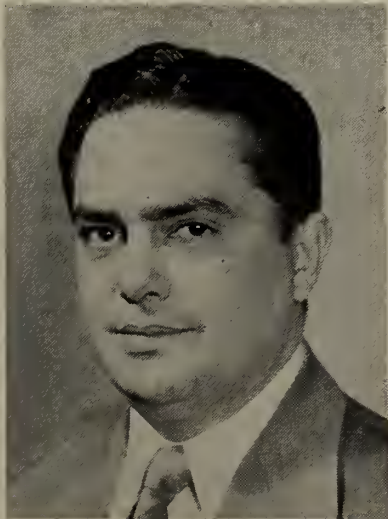

Foreword

CHICAGO—One of the nation's noted economists at the end of March '54, stated that in his belief the reason for the stock market remaining steady, with prices of many good stocks going even higher, was because, "The average investor has faith in the future of America."

This regardless of the drop in production and continued unemployment due to glutted inventory conditions.

This industry might explain its continued high production for the first quarter of 1954 by stating that, "Our people have faith in our industry."

The Cash Box reported some weeks back that production and sales for the first quarter of 1954 held steady. In fact, actually kept pace with that of the comparative first quarter of 1953. And 1953 was considered one of the boom years in the history of the industry.

A few manufacturers, in one division of the industry, did report a drop in their production for the first quarter of 1954. This they averaged at 4% off compared to their first quarter of '53. Similarly other manufacturers, in this very same division of the industry, reported an increase much over 4%, as compared to their first quarters of '53.

Therefore the balance readjusted itself. Indicating that the overall productive average in this division of the industry, like in all the rest of the field, was holding steady and, perhaps, even going ahead to some extent.

This same condition exists in all the three major Divisions of the industry. Namely: Music, Amusements, Vending and Service machines.

Where one manufacturer may show a decrease in production and sales, as in the case of the average cigarette machine manufacturer in the automatic vending division, others in this same branch of the industry, show a very fine increase in sales and production. The manufacturers of hot coffee and soft drink dispensers, candy, ice cream, and other vending machines, show increases.

Therefore, The Cash Box believed, it would be to the advantage of all concerned with the industry, for this publication to gather together information from all leading factors in all the three major divisions of the industry which would, most likely, point out the path ahead.

At the same time, such information could answer that important and oft-asked question of almost all engaged in this field, "What's ahead?"

PART I, THE MUSIC BUSINESS

As far as the music field is concerned, the first quarter of 1954 finds seven manufacturers, where for the greater part of 1953 there were only four music machine manufacturers. These seven feature the finest equipment this field has yet seen.

They are: AMI, Inc., Grand Rapids, Mich.; H. C. Evans & Co., Chicago, Ill.; Music Service, Chicago, Ill.; Ristaurat, Inc., Appleton, Wis.; Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corp., Chicago, Ill.; J. P. Seeburg Corp., Chicago, Ill.; The Rudolph Wurlitzer Co., North Tonawanda, N. Y.

With almost double the number of manufacturers engaged in the automatic music field perhaps many are wondering whether production can continue on the same high plane that it did all during 1953. Espe-

cially in view of the fact that there were only four manufacturers engaged in building new automatic music equipment in 1953.

The fact of the matter is that, during the first quarter of 1954, the same high plane of production continued at the major manufactories. Furthermore, some of them were, and still are, backlogged. Some are just beginning to reach the stage of high production output.

Will this continue? What's ahead for this very popular and important division of the industry?

First, and most impressive, is the fact that, as The Cash Box surprisingly revealed in a survey which it started in October, 1953, there are still on locations at present, throughout the United States, over 165,000 prewar phonographs. These are instruments manufactured prior to 1942.

The entire industry agrees that, in the greater majority, these are the most horrible looking and most terrible sounding machines left in the industry. They bring shame down on the heads of the local music operators. They bring adverse publicity to all the nation's music operators.

The present seven manufacturers, working full speed ahead, full time, wouldn't be able to build enough instruments during 1954 to clear away these 165,000 prewar phonos from the nation's locations.

The most conservative estimate, which discussions with leaders in the music field brought forth, indicated it would take anywhere from two to three years to gradually remove these 165,000 prewar phonos from the locations they are now blocking to progressive music operators.

The music factories, if they recklessly plunged into a tremendous double-shift production program, could build that many phonos in one year. But to do this they would be neglecting everything else except producing and selling to replace the 165,000 prewar phonos.

The business which is being done everyday by the distributors of these factories, trading away earlier postwar models for the newest type machines, as well as the export and other business conducted by the manufacturers, won't allow for an all-out plunge into any such production schedule.

In short, then, the music industry, all other factors remaining equal, can look ahead to two and even three more years of very hard work, just to clear away the nation's 165,000 old, prewar 'clunkers,' before any general letup in present production can be sighted.

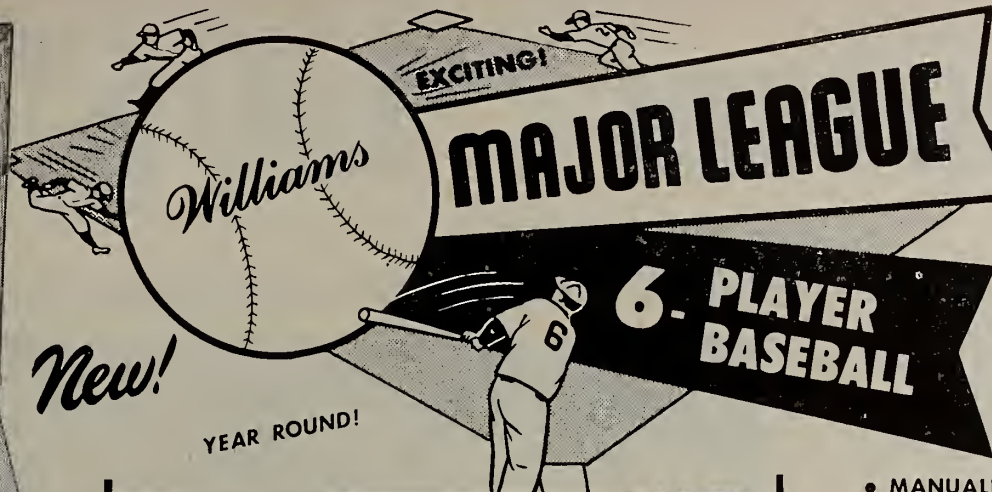
At the same time there are more and more operators entering into the music business. Not just new people to the industry. But rather operators who have long been engaged in this business in many instances.

Operators who have discovered that music has become 'the best backbone' for the routes which they have created over the years. Because music has proved itself the 'steadiest route insurance' as far as income is concerned.

Adding all these factors, plus the work ahead to clear the field of the old, wornout, dirty, marred, scarred, scratchy, tone-dead 165,000 phonos of prewar vintage, the business of automatic music has a bright and cheery future ahead of it.

A future that is, each week, becoming ever more brilliantly bright. This grand future has zoomed the automatic music field into a position of definite leadership, as far as the entire industry is concerned, from more than one standpoint.

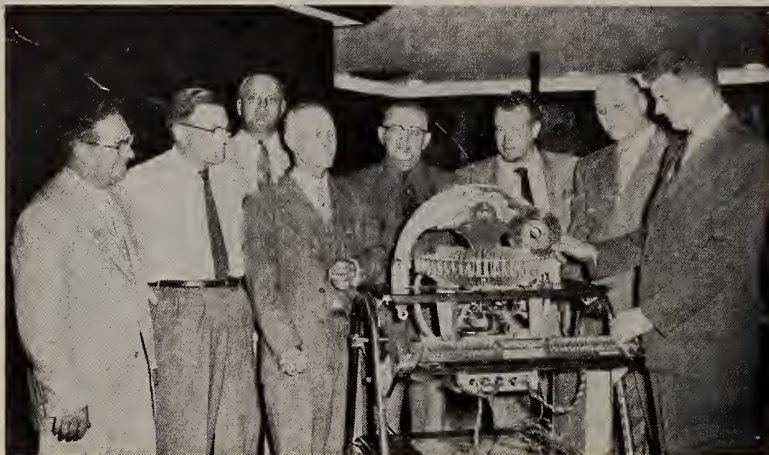

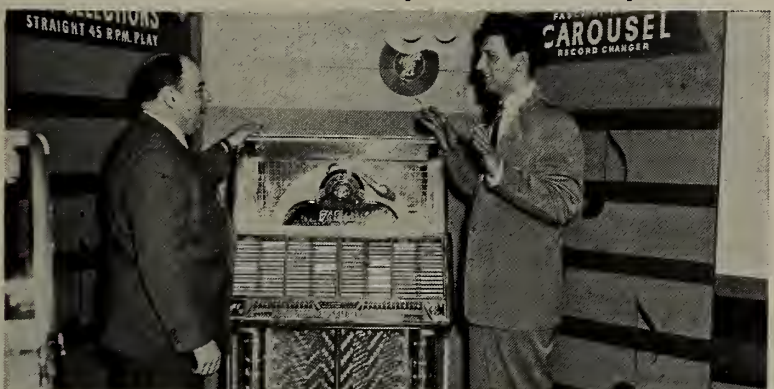

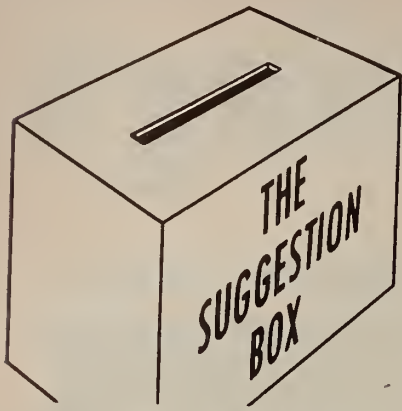

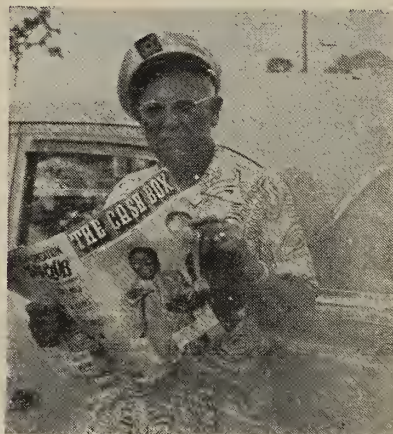

"It's a unique situation," another distributor here stated, "and one," he claims, "that was completely unexpected."

"We have been carrying a very nice stock of used inline games on hand all this past winter. Within a few weeks the stock was gone. Now we are short quite a number of inline games.

We, like all the others, are doing our best to get them in for our many out-of-town customers."

(Editor's Note: A check of "The Confidential Price Lists" will reveal that not only are the inline games most in demand at this time, but that prices have also been gradually rising, as the used inline games become more and more scarce.)

Perhaps the most revealing statement came from an operator who drove his pickup to this city to load it with used inline games.

He stated, "Well, I've been scouting about all over town, trying to buy as many as I possibly could. All I have been able to obtain are just a few of the older models."

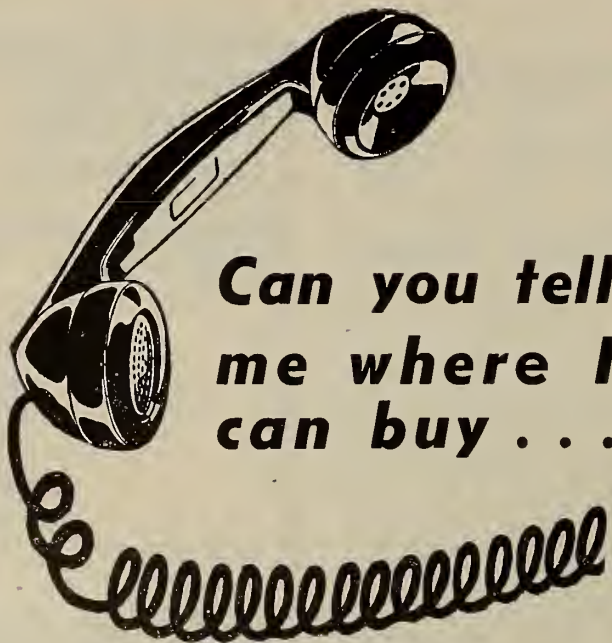

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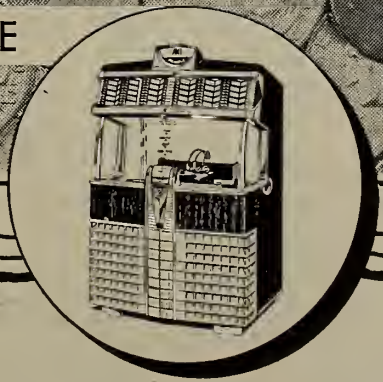
