You thought you'd seen the last of Pikachu. That bright yellow face with its cheery smile and rosy red cheeks; it all seems a distant memory now. But you thought wrong, friend. Never underestimate the power of *Pokémon* 'cos you're going to see a lot more of that grin from now on. Dean didn't want to know and shoved the carts over to my side of the desk – that smile gives him the fear you see.

As you read these pages, Fire Red & Leaf
Green will be all over Japan. Those bad boys
will have already sold over one and a half
million copies and there will be no stopping
them. If the Japanese aren't sick of it the rest

of the world will surely follow suit. Yells of "Smack him with your Electric Shock!" and "Check my Lv.15 Bulbasaur!" are coming back to a GBA near you and those shouts are going to make someone at Nintendo very happy.

Pokémon is the biggest games franchise the world has ever seen. Pikachu and his chums are MASSIVE and there's no way we could ignore the game until the UK release is announced. We couldn't let you wait any longer for another peek at the GBA quest, so here it is in all its glory – Pikachu's rosy chops and tons of new ideas that you'll discover on your way to the Pokémon League and your battle with the Elite Four. >>

We've been playing this game to death since last month and the gameplay's simply frantic. The PCs are filling up with discarded Pokémon and they're evolving all over the place. Weedles, an Ekans, plenty of Zubats and those stupid defend-against-all-odds Metapods are popping up in the long grass and it's levelling-up aplenty in the fields and routes all over Kanto. That feeling after learning a new move or catching a wild Pokémon in a Poké Ball has never really gone away. Just waiting for it to shake three times before the critter's caught is as nail-biting as ever. *Pokémon* is certainly back and eating up our every waking hour.

So what exactly has been discovered since last month's preview? Well, Nintendo has done the decent thing and included a boy and girl, unlike the original *Red* and *Blue* games. Play as the lad and you'll get a yellow rucksack, red cap and blue trousers, but switch to the lass and you'll sprout long dark hair and be forced to »

All the way back in 1999 when the Red and Blue versions arrived, three Pokémon became household names almost overnight. Squirtle, Bulbasaur and Charmander were the real stars of the show – the first three Pokémon you could pick at the start of the game to build your all-conquering squad of monsters.
Internet boards were buzzing about which one was best, but

Bulbasaur became the expert's choice as his levels rose quicker than the others and his attacks were stronger against the first two Gym Leaders, Brock and Misty

Old vs New

Pokémon Fire Red & Leaf Green are GBA remakes of the firstever Game Boy Pokémon quests – the Green version originally launching in Japan alongside Pokémon Red.

The *Red* and *Green* versions did so well that Nintendo released a third *Pokémon* game in Japan, *Pokémon Blue*, which launched here in the UK with the *Red* version in 1999.

Even though many Pokémon can be found in the same places as before, Nintendo has given these remakes a new lease of life on the GBA. Now they're packed with colour and some places have had a new lick of paint...

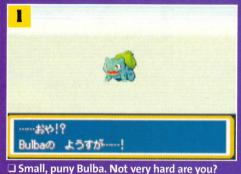

Get evolved

With all the hours you're going to spend training up your squad of pocket monsters, they'll be levelling-up more and more as you win those battles.

At certain levels your Pokémon will learn new moves and at others they will evolve in spectacular fashion, providing you with enhanced creatures and another entry in your Pokédex.

Some Pokémon don't evolve though. There are 24 of these creatures, including Mewtwo and the Legendary Birds -Articuno, Zapdos and Moltres. Just check out the new evolving animation though, it looks great, don't you think?

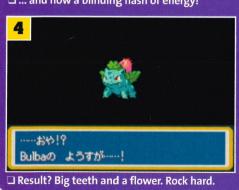

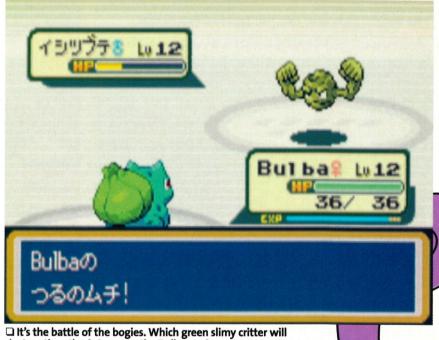
Whatever you decide, the Poké Bag that accompanies you on your journey is back to the simplicity of the original. It has three pockets - one for items, another for more important stuff and a third pocket for Poké Balls. Getting confused between an Elemental Stone and an Antidote will be a thing of the past, too - they now have their own icons for easier selection and in the heat of battle you'll be thanking those developers at Nintendo.

Walking through the forests and along the routes of *Pokémon* is just as exciting as it was back in 1999. Now it's been given a make-over worthy of sitting

alongside Ruby and Sapphire making it look fantastic. Footprints appear on sand, your reflection shimmers in water, even the wild flowers that grow everywhere seem to dance along to that Pokémon music.

Towns themselves appear to have been knocked down by a rampaging pack of Golems. They've now been rebuilt and their coats of white paint gleam in the sunshine that never seems to go dim. The same locals as before still go about their business, offering you help if you ask, while Poké Centres and Marts have had the Changing Rooms team in, sporting new sliding doors and escalators. There's no need to click the (A) button next to signposts either, just >>>

Fire Red and Leaf Green have certainly taken the originals and mixed them up, adding new gameplay elements to help you out. Your TMs can now be stored in a carry case of sorts and further into your quest you'll be able to throw on a pair of trainers and go dashing about Kanto at double the speed. The bike is back too and should you collect the mobile phone en route to the Elite Four you'll be able to ring Oak and other Pokémon Trainers to badger them for advice.

One surprise we mentioned last month was the Teaching TV mode and, if our educated guess is anything to go by, we've found out what it is. While wandering the tall grasses of Viridian Forest you'll see a TV just lying in the dense undergrowth. Funny that! Switch it on and a

With all this good *Pokémon* news there was always going to be something that might upset Pokémaniacs. Sorry to break the news, but despite the graphical make-over and new features the clock feature from *Gold* and *Silver* isn't here. This means that certain Pokémon won't appear at particular times of the day. Instead you just need to search through miles of undergrowth to find those creatures and fill your Pokédex before trading with a friend to make sure you complete it 100%.

Completing that infamous Pokédex is going to take ages, but there are loads of rewarding Pokémon to be caught and some you never thought would be possible in *Fire Red* and *Leaf Green*. We

won't go into too much detail for now but let's just say that the Legendary Birds are here as well as good old Psychic Type, Mewtwo. And it doesn't end there...

Even though the versions we've been playing are all in Japanese it's great to see these creatures back on Game Boy. With a whole new generation of *Pokémon* fans ready to take up the challenge of defeating the Elite Four those who think that *Pokémon* is dead are very much mistaken.

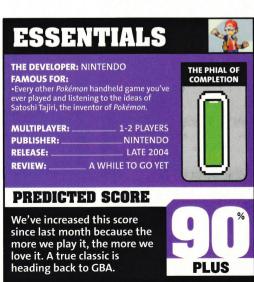

Nintendo commits to showing its next home console at next year's E3. Start screaming now.



After the Japanese press went berserk and claimed Nintendo was pulling out of the hardware business, the games

giant responded with uncharacteristic bluntness. An open letter to the Japanese games media from Nintendo's global head of PR, Yasuhiro Minagawa, stated the next home console would be shown at E3 next year. Nintendo was not pulling out of the hardware business. End. Of. Story.

Former company chairman, Hiroshi Yamauchi, has plenty to say on the subject, claiming that gamers "aren't demanding high specs" for a new machine and that talk of the "next generation" is from "people who don't know games". The message seems to be that Nintendo sees graphics as having reached a plateau and that finding new ways to play is the key to keeping people interested.

What does that mean for GameCube in the meantime? Well, Nintendo had a few answers on that score as well, pointing to peripherals as being key to prolonging the life of the machine. At this year's E3 these add-ons will be unveiled, but we have absolutely no idea what Nintendo has up its sleeve.

The idea, obviously, is to pull out something with the rejuvenating effect of a dance mat or a camera like the PS2

enjoyed with EyeToy. Intriguing stuff indeed.

Equally cool were the outspoken Yamauchi's remarks on the upcoming Nintendo DS handheld. "It's something that I thought up a year and a half ago... if it's successful, I think it will reactivate the Japanese games market and that is Nintendo's mission.

"The next two years will decide Nintendo's fate," continued Yamauchi. "If the DS succeeds, we will rise to heaven. But if it fails, we will sink into hell." Nintendo clearly expects big things of the DS and the GameCube's successor. If we were any more excited about E3 this year, we'd explode.

Developers say D-YES!

There has been an enthusiastic industry reception for Nintendo's brand-new baby...

Nintendo DS fever is heating up, with game creators across the globe waxing lyrical about the new machine. Archer Maclean, head of UK studio Awesome Developments

told us, "It sounds amazing. An endearingly cute little thing. We have a game in development that's blindingly perfect for the DS, so we'd definitely look at supporting it."

Japanese games bible, Famitsu, asked famous Japanese developers their thoughts and here are some edited highlights:

"My desire to develop for it has been stimulated. It's a new form of play."

Nothing can compare to this cheaply-made – but officially licensed – Chun Li doll. It's entirely out of proportion, with an oversized head and fuzzy afro. Worse, the hideous US Chun Li artwork was silk-screened onto the head, making her look a bit like Robert DeNiro with breasts.







Get the phone... It's Samus!

Yoshio Sakamoto talks about Zero Mission, Metroid Prime 2 and the return of Super Metroid.

f you don't know who Yoshio
Sakamoto is, listen up now. As the manager of Nintendo's prestigious R&D1 group, he is THE MAN behind such innovative titles as Wario Ware, Inc., but he also stands as the longest-serving member of the whole Metroid development team. And considering how long the series has been going that's some achievement.

He started on the original NES version, directed Super Metroid on the Super NES (long considered one of the single best games ever made), supervised development of Metroid Prime while directing Metroid Fusion and, most recently, directed Zero Mission for the GBA.

In anticipation of the release of *Zero Mission*, our intrepid US correspondent, Chris Kohler, was invited to participate in a telephone roundtable Q&A session with Mr

Sakamoto. Here's what transpired...

NOM UK: What was the thinking behind the Zero Mission project?

Sakamoto: Our basic development concept was that we really wanted to return to the roots of Metroid gameplay.

Metroid Fusion was a different style to other Metroid games up to that point and so our concept was that we wanted to show people what the roots of the franchise were, to show them the style of game that Metroid sprang from and at the same time retell the story of Samus' original mission.

NOM UK: What was the greatest challenge faced by the development team during the production of Zero Mission, and how was this overcome?

Sakamoto: There's always the possibility that it could've been received in a negative way — as a mere 'port' rather than a truly remade game. We had to find a way to add enough elements to make the game really feel like it was new, while still not straying so far from the original Metroid to lose the meaning behind what we were trying to do.

NOM UK: Does Zero Mission share any technology with Metroid Fusion that might have accelerated the game's development process?

Sakamoto: We did use the Fusion system as a base for Zero Mission, but in the process we rebuilt portions of that engine, added some new parts and did a lot of fine tuning. Despite it being a similar game to Fusion we still spent quite a bit of time on the development.

NOM UK: What are you most pleased with, personally, now that this project has drawn to a close?

Sakamoto: For me one of the biggest challenges was finding a way to implement a new style of Metroid gameplay at the end of the game, after you defeat Mother Brain. We spent a lot of time working on that and I feel that it

turned out to be very good – something new that still feels like *Metroid*.

NOM UK: Was it decided from the start of the development of the original Metroid that Samus was going to be female, or was it something that arose during the development process?

Sakamoto: We were part of the way through the development process when one of the staff members said, "Hey, wouldn't it be cool if the person inside this suit turned out to be a woman?" And so that's how we decided on it.

In Zero Mission we have tried to find ways to express her femininity a little more without turning her into a sex object. That's one of the larger things that we've added to the game – there's a period during which you'll see Samus operating outside her suit, in the latter stages of Zero Mission.

NOM UK: How do you feel the addition of cinematic sequences for Zero Mission changes the player's experience?

Sakamoto: I am noticing this trend and I do think it's important to have a story line that goes along with the game, to complement it if you will. But in a game like Metroid that doesn't use a lot of language, it can be very difficult to convey the story accurately, in a way that the player can understand.

This time, one thing that we did try to

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do was flesh out the story with the cinematic scenes. We also tried to maintain a certain level of mystery in the story. But I do think that nowadays in video games, without a story to go along with the gameplay it's difficult for players to maintain interest.

NOM UK: Samus Aran is described as a bounty hunter. So are we ever going to see Samus in a non-linear adventure game, hunting down wanted criminals for money?

Sakamoto: Obviously if we were to try to work that into a new game, it would be a very different style of game and a different style of gameplay.

So if there was an idea for a game like that and we were interested in doing such a game, that's a direction we could potentially go in.

NOM UK: Would you be interested in remaking games like the GB's Metroid II or Super Metroid on the Super NES?

Sakamoto: If we were able to find something that we could add to those games, some way in which we could change them and make them fresher, we might be interested in doing something like that. And, if the fans wanted to play Super Metroid just the way it is on the Game Boy Advance, we might look at that and make a determination if there is a need to do that.

NOM UK: Are there any plans to connect Zero Mission to Metroid Prime 2, or the original Metroid Prime?

Sakamoto: There is no connectivity to either of the 'Cube versions of Metroid. However, if you connect Zero Mission with Fusion using a link cable and two GBAs, you will be able to get a little something out of that connectivity.

NOM UK: Are you a producer on Metroid Prime 2? Can you give us any updates on its development?

Sakamoto: I am working on Metroid Prime 2 in a supervisory role, much like I did on Prime. I think you'll probably want to wait until E3, when we can give you more precise details on how things are coming along.

NOM UK: Are there any plans to make a Metroid game for the Nintendo DS?

Sakamoto: Obviously, that's a very difficult question to answer at this point in time. But as with any hardware, what we like to do is look at how we can take advantage of it to add new gameplay elements. So if we're able to find something that allows us to do this, then we'll look at bringing the Metroid series to the Nintendo DS.

In real life, if you want to smack a guy in the chops, it's easy – you just swing your arm fast and KLONK. Face pain. No complications (except for possible arrest).

This is what Naruto 2 is like. No complex quarter-circle-forward stuff. You tell your fighter what to do and he does it. It's more like actual fist fighting – see your opportunity and bust up a face. It's more about who has better fighting skills rather than who's

The moves are explosive. Simple (A) and (B) button combos unleash evil blows of fury. And they always finish off with a final satisfying ultra-KLONK. Punch, chop, kick, uppercut, FIREBALL! Eat it! This is how fighting games should be.

Don't let the simplicity of the moves fool you – there's a lot of depth. You can batter your opponent into the air and juggle them like a rag doll. There are also counter moves and parries to escape just about any attack.
They're not hard to pull off, it's just about knowing when to use them.

Language barriers meant we couldn't understand the Story mode, but from what we can make out, everyone's pretty hacked off and wants to smack each other up. The footage from the Naruto Japanese anime looks awesome. Shame it's not looking likely to come to the UK. This game is so brilliant we just couldn't contain it on one shabby page. Oh and you need to respect the

kick-ass graphics. Sweet.









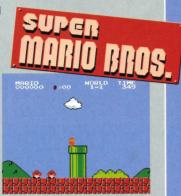

The events of Resi 4 take a sinister turn when the President's daughter is kidnapped before Leon has a chance to take up his assignment. Now under guard somewhere in Europe, you've got to track her down and deal with the human savages who stand in your way.

These wild country folk will do anything to stop you as their trance turns them into an

you with torches is a favourite, but so too is stabbing you with scythes, axes and pitchforks. Then there's the chainsawwielding monster with a sack over his head. It's not safe in the forest; didn't your mum ever tell you that?

But Leon's a fearless special agent, the Jack Bauer of Resident Evil 4 and a master with a gun in his hand. Handgun, sniper rifle, machine gun, Leon's got the lot at his disposal and with a good eye and excellent timing you can shoot the axes out of the air as they fizz towards your head.

Leon's also got a special pair of binoculars and by moving the C-Stick (like the telescope in The Wind Waker) you can view what's happening in the distance and plan your moves.

But as with all Resi games it's the monsters you want to know about and the two we've seen so far look horrific. As you creep around during a thunderstorm you'll only get light from the moon so just about anything can appear out the darkness One of the worst looks like a cave troll from the first Lord of the Rings film. It will attack you with its huge arms and muscly legs, smashing into the ground should you side-step in the nick of time. Just make sure you get ready to shift! This *Resi* game is much more actionorientated and you'll see this when you come face to face with a sea monster that

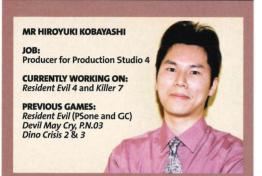

 A. Right after the end of Resi 2, Leon goes to work as a special agent for the President of the United States.
- **Q.** Did the success of other horror games like *Silent Hill* and *Eternal Darkness* influence any drastic alterations to *Resident Evil 4*? A. I wouldn't specifically cite these two titles as an influence, but yes we did look at other games and the direction they were taking when planning Resident Evil 4.
- Q. We've heard that there's much more action in the game. Can you expand on this?
 A. Leon can now perform a number of new moves that increase the action and pace of the game, such as jumping from the second floor of a building, kicking enemies and zooming in on objects in the distance with a pair of binoculars.
- Q. The control system of previous Resident Evil games has been the subject of much debate in the gaming community. Will this be changed for the next game?

 A. The control system remains basically the same as previous games in the series. However, we have made changes to the camera angles and I am very confident that players will notice and enjoy the difference this makes.
- Q. We've had mutant spiders, dogs and sharks. What terrifying new enemies will there be and can we expect more mutant members of the animal kingdom?

 A. Please check out the screenshots! They are just as terrifying as any of the enemies players have met before.
- **Q.** Will Crimson Heads be making a return? **A.** There will be no zombies in *RE4*, with players encountering brand-new enemies.

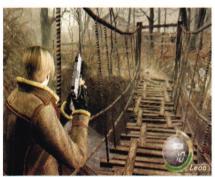

Look at Pokémon from a different angle and you could say it promotes animal cruelty. If you were to go down to the woods and smack some poor fox about until it was too weak to fight, then lock it in a small cage and only let it out to fight other foxes you'd probably be arrested. Or get kicked in by animal rights protesters.

That's why it's much safer to do it on your GBA. Very soon though you'll be able to force animals to fight on GameCube, too - from May 19th to be exact. This is our second look at what is going to be the first-ever fully 3D *Pokémon* adventure. Woo-hoo!

Pokémon Colosseum takes animal snatching one step further than previous games. In Pokémon Ruby/Sapphire and all the previous Pokémon games, you could only catch Pokémon that were out in the wild. But in Colosseum's Scenario mode, you can use a new gadget called the Snatch Machine to grab Pokémon off other Trainers





Thievery? That's another offence to add to the list of *Pokémon*'s undercover criminal influences. But then, in *Colosseum* it's okay to hijack Pokémon because you're taking them from bad people; a troublesome gang of trainers called Team Snatch.

Team Magma and Team Aqua were fools. Yes, flooding the world with water or lava would help the successful team and their favourite Pokémon, but what would happen to THEIR house? Where would they live? Where would they eat? All the PokéMacdonalds and Kentucky Fried Pikachu outlets would be destroyed. Stupid.

Team Snatch plan to gain superiority by stealing normal Pokémon and corrupting their hearts, turning them into Dark Pokémon and the ultimate fighters – a much wiser plan, we'd say. The intro to the Scenario mode shows you busting into Team Snatch's hideout and stealing the Snatch Machine. During the raid, you also blow their building to smithereens forcing the members of the gang to flee like chickens to other areas.

With the help of your Espeon and Umbreon, your mission is to track down the Team Snatch members, battle them and use the Snatch Machine to recapture all of the Dark Pokémon. Once caught, you've got to help cure their tortured souls by treating them well, winning fights with them and a bit of all-round nurturing.

We strolled into Fenas City and saw some blokes hauling a big sack through town. We thought nothing of it at the time, but actually they were Team Snatch scoundrels and well up for a ruck. We ruined them.

They ran off, leaving the sack behind which turned out to contain a girl called

The first place you visit looks like an old steam train yard in the middle of a desert. It's a location unlike anything we've seen in other *Pokémon* games, all bland and dull in colour. After a quick look around, you'll come to find that members of Team Snatch are snooping around in the nearby Fenas City.

Running to the edge of the train yard area will bring up a map screen. A simple click on the Fenas City marker will take you to the city after a brief cut-scene of you on your hover bike — no trekking there manually. This is quick and easy, but some may argue it takes away the element of exploration.

It's not until you arrive in Fenas City that you'll feel like you're playing a 3D

dazzling. Bursting flames and electric sparks light up the screen as your Pokémon take shots at each other across the arena

All the battles we fought were twoon-two face-offs and being as you've got to try and steal the other Trainer's Dark Pokémon, it can be quite tough. Stealing from another Trainer is a new aspect to Pokémon battling, but works in the same way – weaken the Pokémon you want before launching the Poké Ball and hope they don't break free.

Trouble is, your Espeon and Umbreon Pokémon start off at levels 25 and 26 and have really powerful attacks. We often accidentally KO'd the Dark Pokémon we were aiming to snag. We're

version of *Pokémon Ruby/Sapphire*. It's all in there – the Poké Mart and Poké Centre, known as Shop and PC buildings in *Colosseum*, the wandering locals, other Trainers and houses you can just stroll in and out of whenever you want.

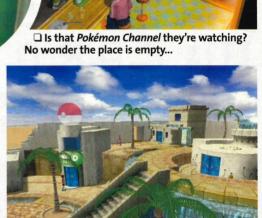
However, after the first few glimpses of in-game graphics it became apparent that the visuals aren't quite what we'd expected. We'd have imagined a 3D Pokémon world to be a vivid, lusciouslooking place, bursting with colour much like in *The Wind Waker*. But the environments in *Colosseum* appear quite bland and feel comparatively stiff and non-interactive. Doors open and there's flowing water here and there, but everything else is rigid.

Speaking of stiff, the game's human characters move about as smoothly as Pinocchio with arthritis. That's particularly hard to overlook when you see that the Pokémon animations during battles are beautifully fluid and some of the special effects for the attacks are

not sure of the consequences when you defeat a Pokémon you're supposed to be catching, but it seems you can't just demand a rematch by speaking to them after you've won the fight.

On the other hand you might lose the battle, then it's back to the Poké Centre where you can heal. This is when it feels all too familiar to the handheld Pokémon games. The same woman standing by the healing desk. The same machine that she places your Poké Balls into to heal them. The same delightful five-note jingle as the machine does its wonder-work.

Even the background tune is a remix of the Game Boy original. So it seems we'll never escape that same Poké Centre tune. It has haunted our minds since we sat listening to it chirping out of the Mew download machines for over seven hours a day at the NOM UK Pokémon Tour 2001. We can hear it in our sleep. We've been scarred for life. Pokémon has ruined us all. Mike Jackson

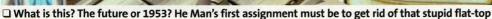

Whichever team you choose, you'll play as a commander. Your character (that you create at the start) doesn't actually fight, but deploys and gives orders to team members using the C.A.R.D. technology. The Hunters use Weapon Cards, making swords and guns their choice in battle. The Arkz bust up their enemies using Creature Cards, morphing up nasty beasts that are well into snapping bones and chewing eye balls – a bit like West Ham supporters

Before beginning a battle you have the thrilling task of choosing the cards for each of your team members' decks. Setting the deck for each of your characters is the most crucial of your decisions. Balls that up and

you stand no chance of winning.

Battles are a turn-based affair and each turn is split up into six phases. The first phase of your turn is the rolling of dice the curse of randomness that nearly all card-battle games seem to inherit. This determines the number of Action Points you have to spend during that turn for actions you perform in the other five phases. These include equipping items and weapons, movement, attack, defence and swapping cards.

It all sounds pretty straightforward, but believe us, it isn't. The game's tutorial screen has NINE sections to it and that's just to explain the basics. There's so much to take in, we're not even going to begin to go into detail. There's just not enough room. Besides, you either won't remember, or don't care. We don't. Mike Jackson



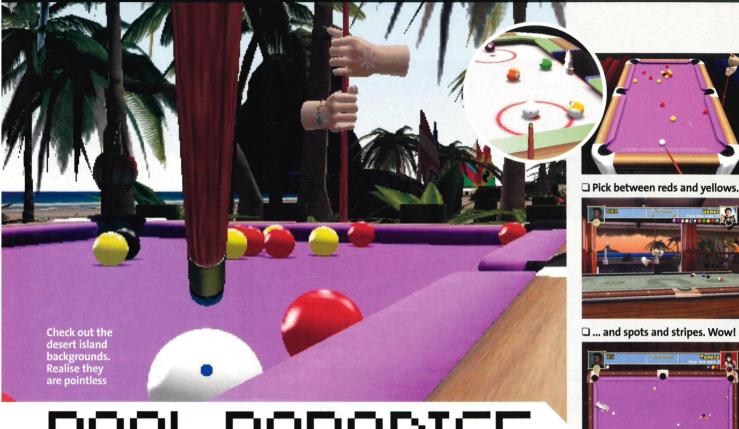

Unusual tables – frequented by morons

You lump the balls, they scatter all over the table and one drops in the pocket. You claim it was skill. No-one believes you. That's what pool games are all about. But to make the balls fly around the table in a natural way requires physics. A large van load of physics. Enough physics, in fact, to fry Stephen Hawking's brain and make him

take up breakdancing.
The paradise all this takes place in is inconsequential. The back story hardly matters either. What's important is how the balls move. Example: we smash the cue ball as hard as possible on its bottom side and it leaps up off the baize and over the side of the table. We've hit object balls so hard they've flown off, too. You probably couldn't do this in the last pool game you played. It seems that if it can be done in reality, you can do it here: improbable feats of spin; awesome trick shots; embarrassing in-offs.

It's as realistic as 'virtual' is likely to get on GameCube, which is great. You play it with a pad on your TV though, which is the problem. The control is fluid, but it's not as instinctive as waving a stick around. There's a period of adjustment involved that might just be the undoing of your non-gamer mates - the people you would play at actual pool. Setting the power with a flick of the 3D Stick? Hmm, don't know about that.

It's not like a footy game, where you can pull off skills that your own fat body could never achieve. As crap at pool as you are, you've probably still doubled one in or got a tasty cannon and meant it. So to sweeten the deal there are mini-games here, including darts and a coconut shy.

You already know if a pool video game is something you need. We'll see how the amazing ball movement stands up to longer term scrutiny next month. We may also have stopped having nightmares about the disembodied hands that manipulate the cue by then. Dean Scott

Combat is basic hack 'n' slash, as you tap the buttons repeatedly. There's a lot of blood spilled, but not in a convincing way. Claret just pops onto the floor. If there'd been some kind of spray and splashing effect, it would have made a difference.

The people you're battering to death with your sword don't react much either. They should be torn apart. Arms should fly off. They should at least limp a bit after you've shattered their bones with a rusty battleaxe. There's this one beast that looks like a big green fart cloud. Somehow, although it's made of gas, its attacks smack muscleman Conan all over the shop.

Further into the game, the look improves dramatically. The medieval town of Kordava is beautifully realised and the pyramids at Stygia look great, too. Problem is, the gameplay is so repetitive the temptation is to give up before you get there. On this preview build Conan's movements are clumsy and imprecise, and the camera will decide it doesn't want to be moved just when you're struggling to get a better angle while tiptoeing through a trap. *Dean Scott*

had lured away from a sales

Sharp. He had teamed up with
Yokoi to create a line of

electronic Beam Gun toys that used Sharp solar cells to 'shoot' beams of light at targets and later worked on a line of dedicated game consoles.

By 1982, Uemura had a new, major

assignment – design a video game system that would be cheaper – and much more fun – than the dozen or so hardware systems that were already competing for the Japanese market.

The Family Computer, or Famicom for short, was released

on July 15th, 1983. It had three games at launch — Popeye, Donkey Kong and Donkey Kong Jr. — translations of three Nintendo arcade hits. Mario Bros., the fourth Famicom title, would follow on September 9th. One day earlier, Sega entered the hardware race with a

¥15,000 system called the SG-1000 that played a few Sega arcade hits. The Famicom was the clear winner right off the bat, selling a whopping 500,000 units in the first two months, easily pulling ahead of Sega's, and everybody else's, system. Even a manufacturing glitch that resulted in a mass system

recall couldn't stop the Famicom juggernaut.
Yamauchi knew that the collapse of the US video game

market a year earlier was

caused not only by poor marketing on the part of hardware makers, but also from an uncontrolled software glut that buried new, exciting titles in a flood of bargain-priced garbage. So he instituted a licensee system by which only approved companies would be

given the technology to produce Famicom titles. The first few Famicom licensees initially balked at the terms, but their membership in this exclusive club would secure them positions as the most powerful and well-known software

well-known software companies in Japan, even today.

The first third-party title, released on July 28th 1984, was *Nuts* and Milk from Hudson, but it's not known

whether the Japanese found its title as hilarious as we do. The second third-party title, also from Hudson, was called Lode Runner and it became the Famicom's first million-selling title. Prior to this, the most copies of any computer game

The Famicom Disk System

Copying games is illegal, unless you're Nintendo.

■ The Famicom Disk System, an add-on that let Famicom owners play games on yellow magnetic floppy disks, promised to totally revolutionise the way people bought their games.

Brand-new FDS titles were available for half the price of cartridge games and store owners with a Disk Writer machine could write brand-new titles to your old disks for only ¥500 each. The system was never released outside of Japan, although its impact was felt worldwide – major Nintendo franchises like *Zelda* and *Metroid* started as FDS games and the low-risk nature of FDS titles helped a young company called Square get off the ground.

Pac-Man, Xevious and Mappy. While all this was going on, Yamauchi had been giving more thought to releasing the Famicom worldwide, starting in America. The success of the arcade Donkey Kong had put Nintendo of America on the map and they thought that licensing the Famicom to Atari, the kings of the US games market, would be the best course of action. But the deal fell through and Nintendo later found that Atari was only planning on sitting on the Famicom to eliminate it as a competitor. They had lucked out of a potential disaster, but they still had to go it alone

Famicom publishing could

bring. Before the year was out,

Namco would release Galaxian,

By 1984, the US video game market had collapsed in on itself and Nintendo had a difficult time selling the Nintendo Entertainment System (originally called the Nintendo Advanced Video System or NAVS). To interest retail stores, it redesigned the system to make it look less like a traditional video game system. The standard controller, itself a revolutionary design,

was secondary to the Zapper gun and the robot R.O.B. There were no 'game cartridges', there were 'game paks'. All this was crucial to persuade the toy store buyers, who had gotten burned by unsold Atari products.

This mattered little to the consumers, however. The NES was a smashing success in a Christmas 1985 test run in New York and was released nationwide in 1986. Super Mario Bros. by Shigeru Miyamoto lit up sales charts in both countries. Super Mario's success brought with it a flurry of licensing opportunities and Mario became the most popular children's character of the time. In 1990, a poll revealed that Mario was recognised by more American children than Mickey Mouse! Nintendo capitalised on this popularity with stuffed

toys, cartoons, a live-action movie... you name it. You could go your entire day using nothing but Mario products, boasted *Nintendo Power* magazine.

In 1987, Nintendo entered into a licensing agreement with Mattel to distribute the NES in the UK, Australia, New Zealand, and Italy. Later, Nintendo International would step up to handle the rest of Europe. This sort of haphazard distribution system contributed to Nintendo's early stumbling in Europe, although there were more than a few PAL-exclusive titles. Still, Nintendo wouldn't quite become a major force in Europe until the 1989 launch of the Game Boy.

Nintendo introduced new models of the Famicom and NES in 1993, but the game was nearly up. The final NES titles were produced in 1994 – Wario's Woods in the US and Adventure Island IV in Japan. NES production wound down in 1995, but Nintendo continued to manufacture the Famicom in Japan until 2003... its 20th anniversary year.

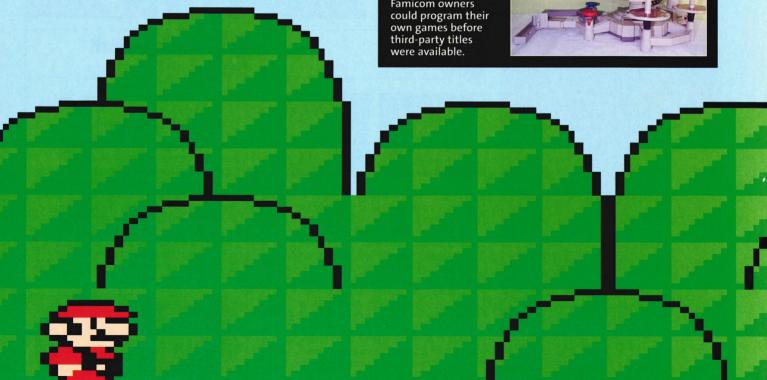

■ Designed in colourful red and white, the Famicom itself was a model of efficient, streamlined design, with all unnecessary parts left out of the box.

But the system had numerous expansion ports, making all sorts of accessories possible. The Family Robot and the Beam Gun were decidedly toy-like and thus were used to sell the NES to a sceptical American audience. But certain Japan-exclusive accessories made the Famicom more of a fully-fledged personal

computer: a modem adapter let users dial into a online service and with the Family Basic Keyboard and BASIC programming cartridge, lucky Famicom owners could program their own games before third-party titles were available.

The Legend of Zelda

It is arguable that this introduced the world to the action-RPG genre, proving to us all that reflexes and strategy could work in harmony. Regardless of whether or not that's true, the first Zelda game remains one of the best in the series, and it's as enjoyable today as it was 18 years ago. In this adventure, Link must rescue Princess Zelda by traversing a vast landscape, obtaining weapons, and conquering dungeons, which is the approximate story line of every subsequent quest. And as if all this weren't enough, the game comes in a shiny gold cartridge, which is just beyond cool.







Metroid (Nintendo)

When a game is completely remade from the ground up some 18 years later, it really says something. Metroid broke as many gaming boundaries of the day as The Legend of Zelda, which was actually released on the very same day. It introduced the potential of exploration, by giving the players a large, open world to improvise with, rather than holding our hands and guiding us down a linear path. It also, one might argue, introduced both the concept of a strong female lead and of multiple endings in a video game, and did so with such precision that we're still playing the same basic game today.







Tetris

(Nintendo)





Fitting geometric shapes together in an attempt to form solid lines might not seem like the most intriguing concept but, my God, does it work. Tetris is undoubtedly the most addictive video game ever made and we say that with no reservations whatsoever. The rules take mere moments to learn and yet Tetris is impossible to master. Part of its beauty is that Tetris demands that each player have their own experience and strategy within its limited confines. Put ten random people together in a room and they'll all play Tetris in a completely different way. And chances are, their scores will be comparable.



Punch-Out!!

(Nintendo)

Throughout the course of *Punch-Out!!*, Little Mac works his way through three boxing circuits by going toe-to-toe with, among others, a mystical Indian spellbinder, a grotesquely pink Russian man and deformed half-human, half-hippo-thing. A typical opponent will usually give a telling signal, be it a wink, glowing jewel, or what have you, before unleashing some sort of crazy, supermove. The game is one of anticipation, asking the player to know exactly what his opponent will do just before he does it. It's one of the most unrealistic sporting games ever made, which is why it's so damned appealing.

Castlevania III

Gradius

(Konami)

Super Mario Bros. (Nintendo)



It's hard to imagine now, but the seemingly archaic Super Mario Bros. was an amazing breakthrough in its day. For the first time ever, a video game presented you with a

truly epic quest. Minor effects such as daytime becoming night, the introduction of bosses and an actual ending to strive for made this a game of legends.



Shadow Warriors (Tecmo)

Shadow Warriors tells the tale of a young ninja named Ryu Hayabusa and his quest to avenge his father's death. This mostly consisted of killing things with his sword. While the action itself was solid, what really made this game



stand out was the stunning cinematic sequences in-between levels, fleshing out the simple story line like no game had ever done before.



This man has completed 657 NES games. NOM UK reveals the extraordinary life of Adam Lamontagne.

It's cool to love games. It's one of the noblest things a human being can do with their life. But is it possible to love games too much? We thought we knew what hardcore was, but then we met American NES-addict Adam Lamontagne.

Lamontagne, a 30-year-old restaurant manager from South Port, Maine is just 17 titles away from having beaten EVERY game ever made for the NES. He's on a strict deadline now – his wife is due to give birth to twins in three months time and that means the gaming has to stop. We caught up with him to find out why a man seemingly of sound mind would do such a thing and why he's going to have to learn to play the piano pretty damn quickly.

NOM UK: Let's get this straight. You're 17 games away from having beaten EVERY game ever published for the NES?

Adam Lamontagne: Yeah, just 17 left. It's been a long time coming. I've beaten 657 games so far. I got my NES in 1986 for Christmas and the first game I beat was Super Mario Bros. It was the first game I played that actually had an ending... most of the games for earlier systems didn't have endings, so I found it rewarding to play through these NES games. I started keeping track about a year later.

NOM UK: You're so close and now you have a deadline.

AL: Yeah, my wife Amy and I have been trying to get pregnant for almost four years. Thanks to modern technology, we not only got pregnant, but made up for lost time by becoming pregnant with twins.

NOM UK: How much time do you have left before they're due? AL: The timer is definitely running down. They're due in June, but they'll probably come sooner. I need to get my butt in gear and take out the last few games before then.

NOM UK: Do you want to complete your quest before they're born? AL: I'd love to, but there is a major stumbling block involved by the

name of the Miracle Piano Teaching System. Yeah, I'll have to learn some piano in order to be the NES Gamesmaster.

NOM UK: You have to admit, though, having the kids would be a great ending.

AL: It will be an ending of sorts... an ending to my free time! It will definitely be worth it though. Sometimes I feel like stopping, but I'm so close it would be a shame.

NOM UK: So, what's the hardest NES game to beat?

AL: The 17 I haven't beaten yet! Actually, in terms of just straight-forward "what the hell is going on here", Overlord would probably be that game. You have to colonise planets in real time while dealing with all kinds of other variables. I haven't actually mastered that one yet. As for hardest games I've beaten, *Ultima: Exodus* was time consuming. It took me three months to plough through that one.

Super Pitfall was another one... you're stuck in these caverns and there is no set direction to go in. You basically just blindly explore the caverns and hope to stumble upon items and keys that you need for other areas. Legacy of the Wizard and Solomon's Key are also pretty damn tough.

NOM UK: Tell us about your favourite endings.

AL: I liked the ending to 8-Eyes. You had to play through the game three times to get it, but when you finally beat it the third time there was this little alien telling you he can't believe you actually finished the game. Rockin' Kats also has an interesting ending. You beat the game, the credits roll... you think it is over. Then you have to fight the final boss. I bet a lot of people actually thought they beat that game, but didn't.

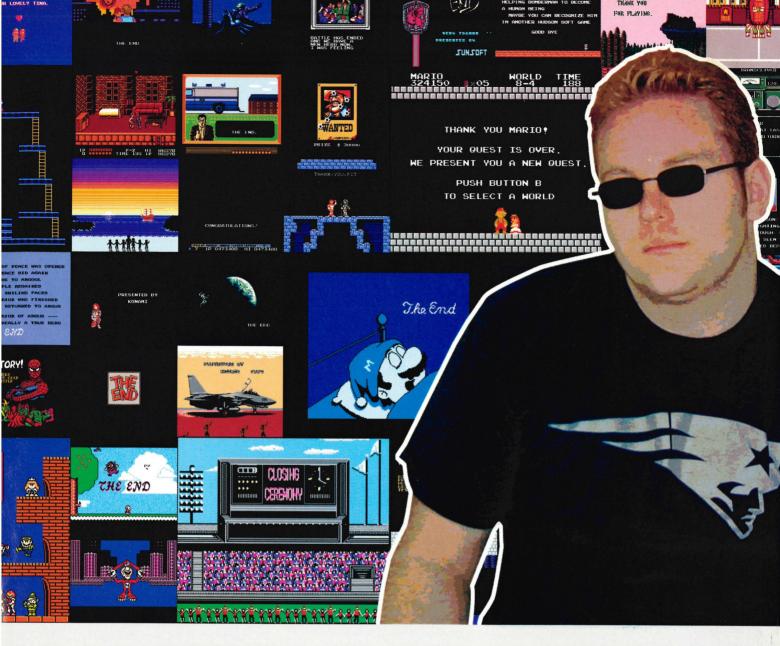
NOM UK: What do you think it is about beating games that keeps you going?

AL: Probably the fact that I know a programmer and his crew put a

ton of time and effort into a creative project to make the game, so I want to see everything the game has to offer. I don't consider a game beaten by just finishing it on the Easy setting. A lot of games have different endings if you beat them on a Hard or Advanced difficulty setting, so I like to know that I took on everything the programmer had to throw at me.

NOM UK: Pop quiz time! We're going to throw five titles at you, one at a time and you have to describe the ending. *Bionic Commando*? AL: Good one. You have to make this leap of faith off a ledge and on your way down blast a shot through the cockpit window of a plane to kill Master D. It's quite a graphic ending as his face explodes. Then you have to hightail it out of the area to escape and rescue your buddy, Super Joe.

NOM UK: Well done. Okay, Shadow Warriors?

AL: After battling through the castle you take on this boss that's being controlled by a demon in the middle of the room. You find out that the boss is actually your father being manipulated. You attack the demon then your father dies in your arms. You then have to fight two more bosses AFTER that. The only good thing about this is if you die fighting one of the bosses, you don't have to fight the other bosses before that one again.

NOM UK: You didn't mention the mushy love stuff! Goonies II?

AL: Goonies II... you have to rescue this mermaid who is locked up by the Fratellis. Once you manage to find her there is a reporter giving

the scoop on how the Goonies saved the day. Then you get the credits like most other Konami games.

NOM UK: Excellent. Blaster Master?

AL: You have to fight this demon with a whip. He's pretty easy once you know his pattern. Anyway, you beat him, you rescue your frog, get this nice scene with you standing next to your vehicle looking at the sunset, then the credits roll.

NOM UK: Don't forget the line "VERY THANKS..!" on the last screen. AL: Yeah, I forgot about that.

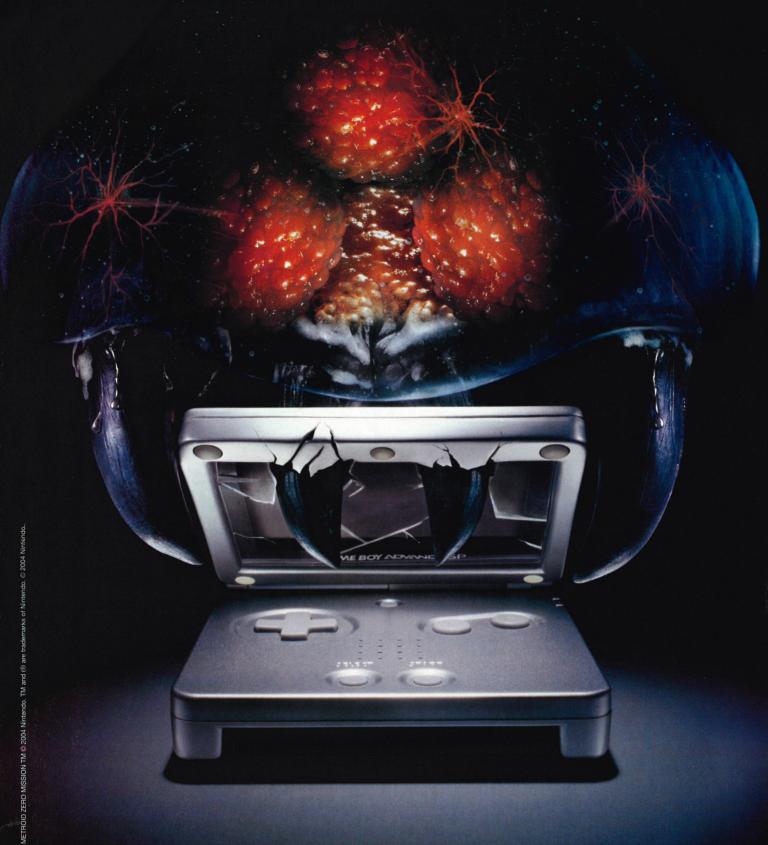

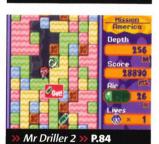

BOOM. A powerful blast opens a tiny crevice in the rock wall. In the dank cavern, a lone Skree hangs from the ceiling, its green maw dripping alien spittle. Remaining stock-still, the winged creature rolls its eyes hungrily toward the sound. It smells it, then sees it. Fresh prey. As the strange interloper moves closer, the Skree waits for its moment. At the last second, it swoops down from the ceiling. But before it even realises its fatal mistake, there's another blast. Then intense heat. Then nothing.

The planet is Zebes. The year is 20X5. The intruder is Samus Aran, intergalactic bounty hunter. Her orders from the Federation: exterminate the Metroids from planet SR388 and kill the leader of the Space Pirates, the life form known only as Mother Brain.

What the Federation doesn't know is that Samus Aran was raised on Zebes by the ancient race of the Chozo, who have since been exterminated but whose secret weaponry lies scattered in the planet's ruins, ready to enhance Samus' Chozo-designed Power Suit. The Federation thinks her mission is impossible. Samus will prove them wrong — but not before the most desperate fight of her life.

You've heard parts of this story before, no doubt — Zero Mission is a retelling of the original story of Samus and the Metroids that took place on the NES back in 1987. But throw out the notion that this is just a remake. The original NES Metroid was cool and is revered by the hardcore fans who loved it over a decade and a half ago — but for those who cut their teeth on Prime and

Compare and contrast

Metroid used to be pretty freaking hard, but don't just take our word

■ If you've played the original NES Metroid, you'll see the similarities here (as well as the differences) right off the bat. Although the general layout of the game map is pretty much the same, the long, featureless shafts of Zebes have been shortened and sexed-up with slimy alien growths and jutting rock formations. In short it looks wicked.

The boss fights have undergone a radical revision, too. Anyway, if you're not convinced of the differences, once you complete Metroid Zero Mission, you'll unlock the original game, so you can see the differences for yourself.

Although the game's design takes a minor clue from the elaborate hint systems of Fusion and Prime by adding Chozo Statues that mark your next destination on the map (oh yeah, there's a map now), it's usually the much more subtle touches that lead you in the right direction. And there are even brand-new areas to explore – early in the game, you'll leave Norfair and head to the planet's surface and to the Prime-inspired Chozo Ruins where you can recharge at your ship. All of this was impossible in the original game, but it blends in seamlessly here. Between Prime's 3D

viewpoint and Fusion's constricting linearity, we haven't had a game like this in a long time. Sure, recent Castlevania titles have appropriated Metroid's design, but

they're nothing compared to the

masterwork of R&D1. Zero's brilliant layout makes Aria of Sorrow its bitch. Metroid's intricate chambers guide you in the right direction almost subconsciously, so you think you're simply exploring freely when in fact you're being manipulated to go just where the designers want you to.

And that's even true when you're trying to go where you're not supposed to. You can do this in three ways: first, it's possible to get infinite height from bomb jumping (placing bombs in perfect rhythm so they blast you straight up one after the other); second is from walljumping (with perfect timing, you can bounce Samus off a wall, over and over, climbing up narrow shafts and, theoretically, right up a single wall, a bit at a time); third, once Samus acquires the Speed Booster and the High Jump, she can speed along for a short time while in Morph Ball form, allowing her to access seemingly impassable areas.

The amazing thing is that no matter

With Zero it's possible that, like us, you'll finish the game on the first day. But even then there's replay value: in addition to finding all the Missile Upgrades for 100% (and a surprise at the end), there's an unlockable Hard mode and an emulated version of the original.

There's something for everybody in appreciate playing Samus' first adventure in a far more graphically and structurally appealing form - not to mention the opportunity to check out a classic. Old-skool fans will love the sly references to the original's secrets, like the Energy Tank in the third room. And the jaws of newbies and experts alike will hit the floor on seeing what happens after you destroy Mother Brain.

That's right - as you'll see in this issue's O&A with Metroid director Yoshio Sakamoto, the biggest chunk of new content comes after the climactic Mother Brain fight and it's one of the most amazing, enjoyable and difficult parts of any Metroid game, ever. We're not going to spoil it for you – let's just say you won't have to type in a secret passcode to <crackle... the rest of this report was jammed...>. Chris Kohler

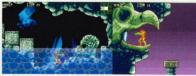

Uruk. As you monkey your way

ancient world. The adventure begins when your main hero, Sphinx, is sent to retrieve the Blade of Osiris to help protect the land from an encroaching darkness from the evil land of

through lava-spewing levels, deftly avoiding spiked traps with moves to rival those in *Prince Of Persia*, the story of a second hero is introduced.

While Sphinx is mucking about on one side of the Ancient World, Prince Tutankhamen is merrily skipping around his palace on his birthday. However, there's dramatic plotting afoot and someone in

Tut's own family wants him out of the picture. A bit like *EastEnders* then, but with more sand. Alternating between cut-scenes and action sequences, you play as both characters in the opening hours. As Sphinx, you'll be exploring an elaborate tomb, trying to find the means to warp your ass out of there as soon as possible. As Tut you have to explore the palace, trying to find out who's got it in for you.

There's plenty to keep you hooked in these opening hours, but they are essentially one giant prologue to the real meat of the proper game. Victorious at the end of his level, Sphinx is warped to a new

the life sucked from his bones. Chaos ensues, monsters attack and warp gates start sucking people in at random, spitting them out Ra only knows where. Sphinx is charged with the task of finding and rescuing Mummy and then annihilating those responsible.

It's at this point that Sphinx and the Cursed Mummy becomes truly epic. Sphinx's earlier gameplay in dark tombs, with precise enormo-puzzles to bust soon gives way to exploring an entire world. Even the first city you come across, Abydos, is a bewildering arrangement of grand avenues and sleazy back streets. Each place you visit

is in a real fix, too. In Abydos the museum

has been robbed and there are electric eels preventing safe passage in its waterways. In Heliopolis a spell has turned the land from oasis to desert wasteland and all the townsfolk are starving. You need to help the locals out as well as getting on with your own quest. It's arguably a bigger and more complex game than *The Wind Waker* and a terrifying prospect if all you're used to is exploring one mansion and a

lab, Resident Evil-style.

Every step of the way is a challenge. There are mini-games to play, but many of these remain unavailable until you've found and learnt how to use the correct weapon or item. Even something as simple as the trusty double

jump has to be discovered and earned before you can use it. There are optional extra quests, too, like handing money

to the tramp in Abydos who'll eventually reward you with an extra

health-ankh, but its safe to say that everything in the game is there to try you. Unfortunately, if you die you are returned to your last save, however long ago it was. It certainly adds to the tension knowing you're not going to be handily respawned just before you snuffed it, but also increases frustration if you haven't got the skills needed to stay alive.

This is the one real problem with Sphinx: it's probably just a bit too hard. It's so challenging and so huge that it's easy to get distracted from your main quests by smaller but equally essential side-missions so that you're not sure where to go next and what to do even if you make it there. This isn't helped by the fact, despite giving you a giant world to explore, you never get the same sense of place that Wind Waker does so well.

Warping around from city to tomb, with lots of long load times to boot, is about as far removed from the graceful sailing from island to island as seen in Link's

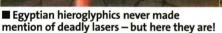

GameCube adventure as you can get. But even if you are stuck at any point and left to ponder your next step without much help from the locals, you can at least while away some time gawping at the graphics. For the most part Sphinx looks amazing. It's supersmooth, very fast and some of the exterior cityscapes are breathtaking, although close up the textures are sometimes very plain. The Sphinx and Mummy characters are perfectly animated and full of character. The different races of townsfolk you meet are great fun, too. It's weird that there's no spoken voice acting though, especially as

everyone's mouth moves

as if there should be words

coming out. If the Sphinx levels were all the game offered it would still be a great adventure, but in keeping with the game's bigger-is-better mentality, you can play as Mummy, too. You have to wait a while until the first Mummy level tickles you with its grubby bandages. In fact it took us about eight hours, but it's well worth the wait.

Mummy's not quite dead you see, but just dead enough to take a thorough battering in the name of getting his soul back. To solve the puzzles in the Mummy levels you need to burn, break, shred and flatten Mummy to negotiate the level. Split him in three for instance and you can control three Mummies and pull three sneaky switches. Flatten him and he'll fit through narrow bars to access hidden areas.

> These cruel and hilarious effects only last a limited time, adding a real sense of urgency. The difference between Sphinx's careful investigation of tombs and thorough exploration of towns and the Mummy's frantic dashes through perilous caverns only makes the Mummy levels more enjoyable.

It all adds up to make Sphinx a great game and a perfect example of how to roll loads of game ideas into one to make one of the most enjoyable action game/role-player/platformer hybrids ever and the second best game of its type after The Wind Waker on GameCube. Nuff said. Darren Fox

It's not a coincidence that the cockney slang for piles is Farmer Giles, as Harvest Moon is much like squeezing out a well formed breeze-block; a slow and painful process to be sure, but the relief found in your achievement is well worth it.

Picture the scene: you have been given a farm, a cow and a couple of tools, you say to yourself, "looks like fun, I can grow some stuff and milk a cow", but before you realise it your little character is planting potatoes at four in the morning.

Harvest Moon: A
Wonderful Life is incredibly
detailed, from cooking your
own food to catching up with
weather reports on the telly. It's
so detailed in fact that
you find that managing

the hours in the day to get all your chores done becomes increasingly difficult. The amount of care and attention you need to pay to your animals and crops is huge. Every little thing has to be taken into consideration, which makes playing a bit of a chore.

The game is split into six chapters, each marking a major event in your busy life. By the end of 30 years you've got to get your farm running like a welloiled machine, marry and have some kids. You then hand the farm down to your kids before you die. A Wonderful Life improves on its predecessors with increased varieties of fruit, veg, tools, building extensions and animals - that's just in case you're one of the five people in the UK who've played these games before.

In order to make your farm successful you need to sell produce, like eggs, milk and wool. You start off with a cow, but you'll soon need to order in some more animals ranging from sheep to chickens. Each breed of animal you purchase plays a vital role in getting you through the weeks of back-breaking labour ahead. Keeping them happy can mean the difference between failure and success, so occasionally showing your sheep some love won't be frowned upon here.

The other major source of revenue is crops. Selling or eating your crops is another major part of progressing through the game. Pick the wrong season to plant your carrots and your crops will fail, which is a sod after you've spent ages looking after the damn things. However, paying

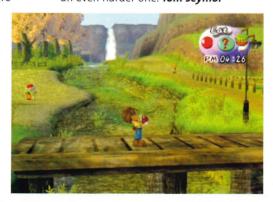
Once your farm has gathered a bit of pace you can Oompa Loompa it up a bit by hiring workers called Sprites. They'll tend to the fields and animals, freeing up time for you to have a drink at the local bar, do a spot of fishing or visit A Wonderful Life's sister game Friends of Mineral Town via your Game Boy Advance. The connectivity feature

allows you to get special items from travelling salesmen, making it easier for you in the long run. Let's face it, you're going to need all the help you can get because this one's a marathon.

The A.I. in A Wonderful Life is surprisingly good. The people of the village go about their lives with complete independence, randomly choosing randomly to visit you, take a stroll or get on with their own work. You can strike deals with people in the

village as well as try and impress one of three potential brides with the size of your turnip.

All this depends on how much effort you're willing to put in to the game. If you really want to spend five hours nurturing a spud, go ahead. It's your life, after all. If you don't want to put the effort in, you'll hate this. It simulates a farming experience, loads of work and no action. 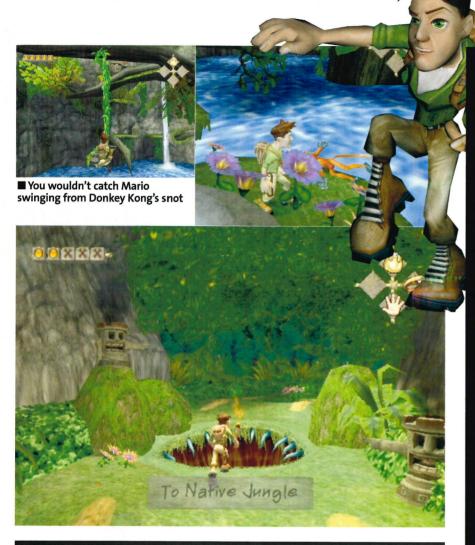

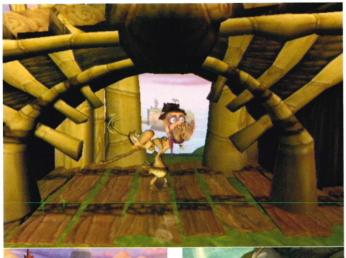

Set in the video game equivalent of the I'm A Celebrity camp, the setting is so jungly you half expect pint-sized idiots Ant and Dec to pop up and force Tak to eat some cockroach larvae. But rather than eat the animals,

to help him explore, Tak needs to use them in his task of retrieving the magical thingamybobs that Jibolba needs to work his Juju magic. This is where Tak and the Power of Juju really shines. The

original way you use your jungle buddies helps the game twinkle like a majestically greased python compared to the crusty dry old skin of other, more average platform games.

The game has a simple logic in getting the jungle brutes to do your bidding. Sheep can be used for cover and as distractions, while orang-utans will catapult Tak to new areas. Tak gains new abilities as you guide him through the world and all of these help you communicate further with the jungle critters. Use the blowpipe to make monkeys hiding in trees angry, then they'll lob melons.

The melons will activate switches or hit other animals, creating chain reactions of animal magic that Dr Dolittle

It has become fashionable in Nintendo circles to slag Rare off. To conveniently forget the genretopping shooters GoldenEye 007 and Perfect Dark and the amazing platformers starring Banjo and Conker. Give Rare its dues: those were amazing

games. But this isn't. Based on a longforgotten ZX Spectrum game, Sabre Wulf is an odd mix of the puzzle classic Lemmings and Donkey Kong Country. In each stage you have to guide Sabréman to an artefact being guarded by the Wulf. Pull a fat bear out of your inventory to bounce up to a high ledge. Use a hovering dragon as a platform or an exploding one to take out obstacles.

Get to the Wulf and it all changes. Now

it's a chase back to the exit with all the obstacles removed. All that stands between glory and you becoming Wulf food is your high-speed platform-leaping skills. Move the last mirror, reflecting light onto the symbol. Climb the column and leap to the broken arch. From here, jump to the wall.



Swing to the book shelf. Turn the mirror so it faces the room. Use the switch then climb the book shelf and go to the corner.



Go to the platform in the centre and shine light to the far side. Use joists to access the far side.



Run across the wall to the side and go back across once more. Use the platforms protruding into the room to grab a swinging chain. Swing across and grab the ledges.



Reflect it back across the room at the light pole and through the floor, hitting the wall symbol.



Jump onto the ladder. At the top, smash through the walls. There's a red mirror inside. Move it out to the ledge in line with the two mirrors from earlier.



Intersect the light beam from the middle and send it back towards the new mirror.



With the new mirror, angle the light through the broken walls. This unlocks the door below.

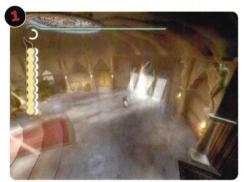

Hug wall and jump back. Grab a pillar and jump to the next one. Turn and leap off. Hit (a split-second after touching the wall to climb.



Go around the ledge. Walljump up the gap. Head around at the top, then use beams to get to the far side. You'll need to swing and wall-



Move around the ledge and cross the beams to another wall-jump section. If you fall here you'll need to start again right from the beginning, so timing is critical.



When you make the leap you should press (A) a fraction of a second later then your instinct tells you. Grab the ledge at the top and move right.



Pull yourself up the ledges, jump back over and make your way to the other side. After crossing four poles you'll reach a ruined tower.



Make your way around to the far side. If you fall you'll need to restart. Wall jump down the large gap between the buildings.



You need to time your button presses perfectly to avoid death. Press it a fraction of a second after you hit the wall and repeat to the bottom. That's the hardest part of the game.

Gain ultimate turbo skills

In *MK:DD* every second counts. Master Mini-Turbos on straights and you'll rule.



You should know the score with Mini-Turbos – counter-steer twice during a power slide and Bob's your uncle. The trick is, if you're quick enough you can do them on straights, too. We'll use Baby Park as an example.



Slide right around the bend, getting your blue flame to boost into the straight. As soon as you release I, hit it again, sliding to the left and instantly counter-steer to the right.



Counter-steering will keep you on the straight. Steer left twice to get a blue flame, release **1** for the boost, then instantly start your slide.



On longer courses, perform multiple turbos on one long straight. Be quick with the steering, sliding left and right rapidly. You'll be king.
