STRONG NEW FALL PRODUCT

Although a good portion of the summer still lies ahead, a preview of what should be a swinging fall semester was offered last week when many of the leading companies introduced their fall product and merchandising programs.

Keen competition in the album field has improved product tremendously. Much of the packaged goods that one might have categorized as "catalog merchandise" a few years ago, is available in smaller quantities this year than ever before. As a result, more albums in this fall's release schedule are chart contenders than in previous years.

Of course, many companies are still issuing albums by artists who have a loyal though limited following (such as folk and ethnic albums) but the broad picture indicates that more of the general merchandise such as "Dance To The Music Of Some famous Song-writer" by a virtual unknown and his orchestra is a thing of the past.

Talent clicking on singles is playing an ever increasing role in album product. It is probably obvious to everyone now that the youngsters and in many cases the adults are going for the teenage stars in album form. And some of the biggest LP's this fall will prob-

ably be by these artists who are running hot on singles.

In recent years, many of the companies were catching up with the trend toward stereo by issuing many of the classics and best selling monaural LP's in stereo form. But this move has just about completely caught up with itself and almost everything, barring spoken word goods is being issued in monaural and stereo simultaneously.

One area in which an increase has been noted is the field of "live on-the-spot" album recording. Although acoustics are far worse than the ideal setting of a recording studio, the public seems to have taken to such disks and the exciting audience backdrop they feature. Perhaps it is only coincidental that so many "on-the-spot" sessions are being issued, but we seem to feel that the recent success of such LP's plus the difficulty of coming up with fresh ideas for artists whose albums are released with frequency, has caused somewhat of a trend of late.

Cover art in general is outstanding as has been the case in the past.

From every standpoint album product is getting stronger with each new release which should result in greater sales this coming fall.

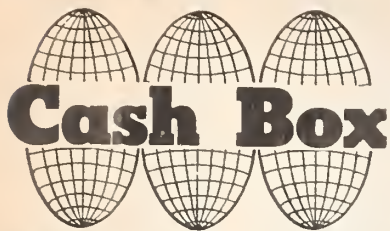

NEW YORK—For a direct identification with the upcoming Chipmunks' TV'er, "The Alvin Show" (CBS-TV), Liberty Records is re-packaging all of its previously issued Chipmunk product in new jackets and sleeves. Move was based on the change in the character and personality of the Chipmunks in the animated show.

Liberty execs feel the initial Chipmunk impact created a few years ago will be "mild" compared to the volume in sales dealers can expect following the series bow in prime time (7:30 PM, Wednesdays) October 4.

The show will star the familiar characters, Alvin, Simon and Theodore, in addition to an animated David Seville (Ross Bagdarsarian), creator of the Chipmunks.

Atlantic LP Deal, 1/2 Over, Beats All Previous Plans

NEW YORK—The first half of the current Atlantic Records' LP deal has already passed the volume of sales of all previous programs from the label, according to Len Sachs, director of album sales merchandising.

By the middle of last week, Sachs reported that 10% of Atlantic distribs had reached their quotas for July and August.

Under the plan all Atlantic and Ato LP's are being offered to dealers at a 15% discount with dating available to qualified dealers. Program began July 1 and continues through August 31.

Sachs also reported that sales of catalog LP's were "excellent, with the dealers buying 'down-the-line.'" 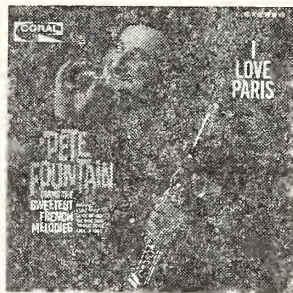
"AIN'T THAT WEIRD"—Brother Dave Gardner—RCA Victor LPM-2335

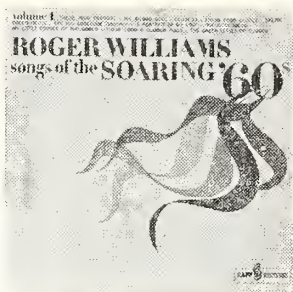
"DANCING IN WONDERLAND"—Bert Kaempfert and his Orch.—Decca DL 74161

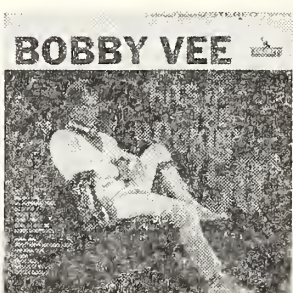
"I LOVE PARIS"—Pete Fountain Plays The Sweetest French Melodies—Coral CRL 757378

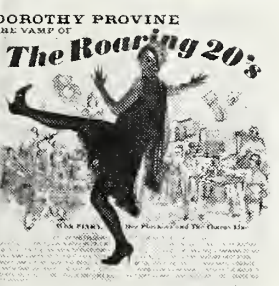
"BRAZEN BRASS FEATURES SAXES"—Henry Jerome and his Orch.—Decca DL 74127

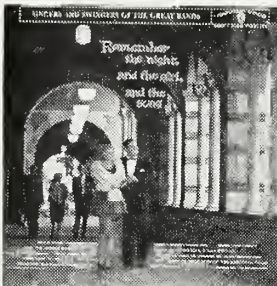

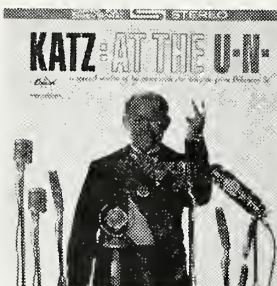

"RAINING IN MY HEART"—Slim Harpo—Exc-cello LP 8003
The southern blues vet, backed by a surprising big pop hit in "Raining In My Heart," gets the LP spotlight here. Of course, "Raining" is featured, but there are many other superb examples of the blues art in the gut-bucket Harpo style. They include "I'm A King Bee," "Dream Girl," "Blues Hangover" and "Buzz Me Baby." Has pop potential, but is strongest in r&b areas.



"AN OSCAR BRAND SONGBAG OF FOLK-SONG FAVORITES"—Riverside RLP 97508
Fast becoming one of the country's most likeable folk song singers, Oscar Brand lends his smooth vocal tones to a collection of familiar American folk tunes. They're charming ditties with a world-over appeal and they're sung in a friendly, ingratiating manner. Among the selections are "The Big Rock Candy Mountain," "Buffalo Gals," "This Old Man," "Paper Of Pins" and "Oh, Dem Golden Slippers."



"POLKAS: GREATEST HITS"—Six Fat Dutchmen—Dot DLP 3358
A program of the biggest polka hits in pop music history are enthusiastically etched by the famed Six Fat Dutchmen band. Here are charming readings of "Pennsylvania Polka," "Liechtensteiner Polka," "Beer Barrel Polka," "Red Wing Polka" and others. There's a sturdy market for this music.

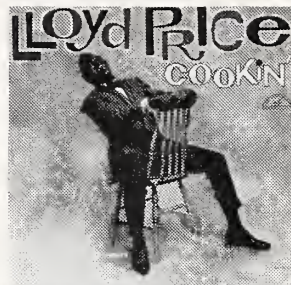

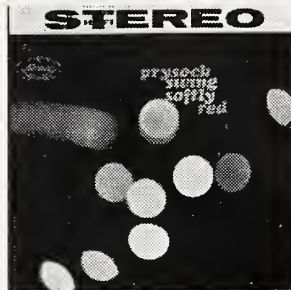


ALBUM REVIEWS

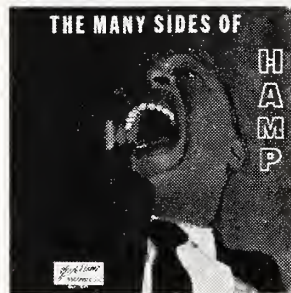
"A TOUCH OF ELEGANCE"—Andre Previn—Columbia CL 1649

Two-pronged merchandise—for traditionalists and the sound bugs.



"THE MANY SIDES OF HAMP"—Lionel Hampton—Glad-Hamp Records LP-1001

First LP from Hampton-owned diskery is, naturally, a swinging jazz-angled affair by the vibist. With a lineup of top jazz studio names behind him, Hamp leads the way, soloing and singing through "Hava Nagila," "Playboy Theme," "McGhee" and 7 others. Versatility is the keynote and Hamp proves it convincingly. Should be strong for pop sales.

CLASSICAL PICKS OF THE WEEK



"60 YEARS OF MUSIC AMERICA LOVES BEST"—Vol. 3—Various Artists—RCA Victor LM-2574

This best-selling series is now split up between pop and classical. Here, in an all-classical compilation from its archives, the label has come up with outstanding recordings by Enrico Caruso ("La Donna E Mobile"), Jussi Bjoerling ("Che Gelida Manina"), Lily Pons ("Caro Nome") Vladimir Horowitz (Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata") and others by Fritz Kreisler, Marian Anderson, Kirsten Flagstad, Ezio Pinza and Arturo Toscanini. Promises huge sales at \$1.98.



BEETHOVEN: Concerto No. 5 in E-Flat ("Emperor")—Van Cliburn, piano, Fritz Reiner conducting the Chicago Symphony—RCA Victor LM-2562

The proud and majestic Beethoven concerto is a brilliant showpiece for the pianistic dynamism of the young Van Cliburn. His virtuoso technique coupled with Reiner's incisive direction is a joy to listen to. A superb disk artistically, carrying with it a huge commercial aspect in name value.

NARM Expects To Reach Mid-Year Goals

PHILADELPHIA—James J. Tiedjens, chairman of the committee of promotion and merchandising aids of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM), and Larry Rosmarin, head of the group's committee on product improvement and standardization, have reported to NARM exec. secretary Jules Malamud that they are both "confident" of reaching the goals they have set for themselves for the group's mid-year meet and sales conference next month (6-9) at the Sheraton-Chicago Hotel.

Tiedjens, of Musical Isle Record Corp., Milwaukee, reported that one goal of his committee has been to establish a standardized browser divider card for use in catalog departments. After a complete survey of all such classification cards supplied record rack jobbers by various labels, specifications have been decided upon, and the information forwarded to every record manufacturer. Tiedjens seeks the unanimous participation by all NARM members in the effort to provide and utilize the committee-recommended browser divider cards.

At the same time, Rosmarin's committee on product improvement and standardization, is on an "all-out" campaign to secure the cooperation of all record manufacturers in polybagging LP product for members of NARM. Rosmarin states that while many manufacturers are now polybagging, it is his hope that through committee efforts, those manufacturers not already doing so, will be convinced of the advisability of polybagging as a regular packaging technique.

Rosmarin, Record Distributing Co., Houston, said that if the rack jobbers would receive the LP already polybagged, the time, effort, and money which they spend on that process now, could be expended on merchandising and promotional activity.

Pitney Sets Promo Tour

NEW YORK—Gene Pitney, the popular Musicor Records' songster, will leave shortly on a promotion tour of midwest and southern territories on behalf of his latest entry on the UA-handled diskery, "Every Breath & I," number 82 on this week's Top 100. In July, Pitney covered the eastern section of the country.

The McLendon radio empire continues its shifts with the announcement of purchase of WGES-Chicago for sum of \$2 million. FCC approval is needed. Last week McLendon bought WBNY-Buffalo (for \$650,000, subject to FCC approval) and intends to dispose of WYSL-Buffalo in accordance with FCC regulations. If it is allowed to buy WGES, McLendon will have eight stations, one more than the seven allowed by the FCC's individual ownership regulation. B. R. McLendon then intends to dispose of WAKY-Louisville, Ky.

The sale of WGES, a 5000 watt, 24-hour operation, marks the first Chicago radio sale since 1956, when Westinghouse purchased WIND for a record sum of \$4 million. McLendon's \$2 million represents the second highest price paid for a Chi station. WGES is one of the city's oldest radio facilities, founded in 1924.

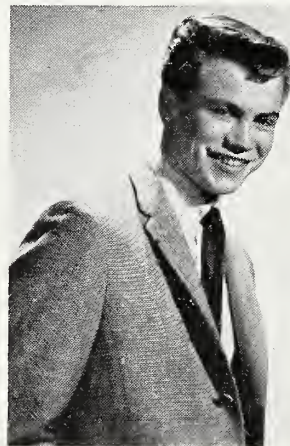

Kapp Extends U.S. Markets

NEW YORK—Phil Skaff, managing director of Kapp Records, has announced the appointments of distributors in an extension of markets. All South Distributing Co., of New Orleans, headed by Henry Hildebrand, Jr. will service the Houston area; Dick Godlewski's Eastern Record Distributing Co., of E. Hartford, Conn., will service the Albany market; Irv Marcus' Wemar Sales, of Phoenix, will service the El Paso market. The three distributors are adding trained personnel to cover the new areas.

Mexican Stations, With No FCC-NAB Control, Vie For U.S. Markets

NEW YORK—With the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) codes a concern of another country, Mexican radio stations, one of which has a power rating five times more than allowed in the U.S., are directing their attention more and more to U.S. audiences.

These outlets, located in such border towns as Tijuana, Juarez and Acuna, are liberal in commercial time and content, and afford U.S. advertisers a generally cheap way to reach listeners as far as Anchorage, Alaska.

Gordon McLendon, the broadcaster who owns seven U.S. stations, the most allowed under U.S. law, recently paid \$1.3 million just for the right to arrange programming and sell commercials on a radio station Tijuana, re-named, after McLendon's investment, from XEAK to XTRA. Under Mexican law, U.S. citizens cannot own control of a Mexican radio station.

A commercial on radio station XEG, Monterey, has advertised 24 country records for \$2.98, which, the announcer says, would cost \$22.50 at a store.

Roulette Offers 15% Discount In "Fall Festival" Plan; 10 New LP's

NEW YORK—Roulette Records has bowed its "Fall Festival" LP promotion, including a straight 15% discount on all LP purchases, including 10 new releases for August.

The program, which runs through September 25, was unveiled to Roulette distributors at the label's fourth annual distributor meet in Chicago recently. It also offers a deferred 30-60-90 day billing to qualifying dealers.

At the meet, "informality" being described as its keynote, the distributors unanimously approved an announcement by proxy Morris Levy of the initiation of "important measures to handle any current album inventory problems that any Roulette distributor may be facing." Though the label wouldn't go into details, it is understood that the measures include increased return privileges.

Levy said that Roulette this year deliberately avoided a heavy quantity of LP releases for greater concentration and maximum sales. Label issued 18 fall LP's last year.

Also announced during the meet was a special incentive plan for both the top five top selling distributor branches and their salesmen. Extra bonuses will be given to the branches and cash bonus prizes to the salesmen and the managers at the winning branches.

Following the open general meeting, the next two days were devoted to a series of private meetings with each individual distributor. At these private meetings orders for the new releases and catalogue were taken.

According to Morris Levy, the heavy volume sales written at the meeting tripled the business written at the firm's Miami meet last year.

Morris Levy concluded, "The dollar volume written up at this meeting went far beyond all our expectations and represents a new high for Roulette at any meeting and for any album sales plan we have ever offered. The final gross billing for the Fall will certainly set a new record for Roulette since first entering the album business."

The 10 LP's include: "Pearl Bailey, Sings the Songs of Harold Arlen," "Murray the K's Sing Along with the Original Golden Gassers" (2nd volume); The DiMara Sisters' "Melodie D'Italia." "Birdland Series" jazz entries include "Basie at Birdland" (cut "live"), "Louis Armstrong & Duke Ellington" (a "deluxe" LP in which the famed jazzists are paired for the first time), Sarah Vaughan's "After Hours," Maynard Ferguson ork's "Straightaway" (Ferguson's themes for the upcoming TV series of the same name), "The Most—Volume 5"—Various artists from other Roulette albums; comic Jackie Kannon's "Prose from the Cons" (cut "live" at Michigan State Prison and features four convicts performing before an audience of about 5,000 inmates), Noro Morales' "Coma Esta," on Roulette's Tico label.

IRMC Sets First Luncheon In N.Y.

NEW YORK—The recently formed International Record Mens Club will hold its first luncheon meeting here on September 21, according to Sidney Shemel, vice-chairman of the group. Shemel, who is director of foreign operations for United Artists Records, said the meeting, which will be chaired by Gene Moretti of MGM Records, will feature as its guest speaker Leonard G. Wood of EMI, London, England, who has reportedly revamped his travel schedule in order to be in New York for the IRMC gathering, tentatively set for Sardi's.

Group, which was formed on an informal basis to allow music execs who are interested in the foreign area of the industry to get together, was the idea of Art Talmadge, vice president and general manager of UA.

Shemel and Moretti said all those interested parties in IRMC should contact either of them for reservations for the luncheon. There are no dues or initiation fees in IRMC. It is a club which will meet approximately every other month during the year at luncheons which will feature guest speakers from abroad, or persons who have information of special interest to the foreign picture.

EMI Gets Aussie Rights For "Too Many Rules"

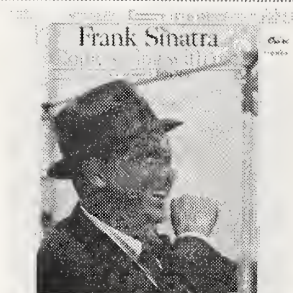

Disneyland 9 Months Sales Up 40%

NEW YORK—Disneyland's kiddie disk business over the past nine months has shown a 40% increase over the same previous period, according to Jimmy Johnson, who heads Walt Disney's disk activities.

Johnson attributes this increase mostly to new "awareness" on the part of distributors and dealers of the "steady profit-making" turnover which the Disneyland children's catalog provides, and to the "great success" of children's LP's based on the well-received Disney flicks, "101 Dalmations," "Swiss Family Robinson" and "Absent Minded Professor."

"All over the country we are told," Johnson says, "that product that sells, not discounts and deals, is what is required. Initial orders for the Disney

fall program were highest in label history," Johnson said. Product is sold on a 100% exchange policy.

Fall Disneyland product will be stimulated by the new Walt Disney NBC-TV show, "Wonderful World of Color," (to introduce a new cartoon duck character, Ludwig von Drake) and Disney's full-length feature flick "Babes in Toyland," which will receive the biggest promotional push in Disney's history (see last week's story).

The Disney fall story and its aforementioned kiddie sales success have just been related to Disneyland-Buenos Aires Vista distributors via appearances by executive and sales personnel in 26 key cities all over the U.S.

He comedian-actor Sandy Baron ceded to tape kiddie remarks in office, and the result is a new "Out of the Mouths of Babes."

Mercury Signs Roland Kirk

CHICAGO—Roland Kirk, the blues jazz saxist who plays three horns once, has been inked to a Mercury Records pact, Jack Tracy, the label's jazz director, announced last week.

Kirk, who recently appeared at Evansville (Ind.) Jazz Festival following a European tour, will cut first LP for Mercury in New York August 16-17.

Anti-Bootlegging Bill Introduced In Senate

NEW YORK—The lawmaking battle against disk bootlegging continued last week with the introduction by Senator J. William Fulbright (D.-Ark.) of a bill (S-2341) that would impose both fines and imprisonment on those who counterfeit disks.

A similar bill was introduced to House last April by Congressman Manuel Celler (D.-N.Y.).

The measure by Senator Fulbright received the full support of the Association of Record Manufacturers and Distributors of America (ARMADA) and the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA).

Talmadge said last week that the introduction of the bill was "another step in the fight to eliminate phonograph record counterfeiting . . . by stamping out this vicious practice."

"We have been fighting the counterfeiting practice with all our facilities," Talmadge said, "and now, with the industry forming a solid front, we are confident that in the not too distant future Federal legislation will be enacted which will accomplish its purpose as a fact . . . with the aid of the

industry . . . we are certain these bills will be given every consideration."

Talmadge also stated that in addition to the Federal legislation, ARMADA is continuing to pursue the state bills which are in progress. California recently enacted anti-bootleg legislation, and "there is a strong possibility other states will follow suit in the near future."

Henry Brief, RIAA's executive secretary, said he looked forward to early hearings and the speedy enactment of this legislation.

Dot Names Urey Veep Of Distrib Firm

NEW YORK—Randy Wood, president of Dot Records, has appointed George M. Urey vice-president of Dot Records Distributing Corp. in charge of the 12 Dot-owned distrib branches. As administrative and operational head of the branches, Urey will work directly with Chris Hamilton, veep in charge of sales. Urey joined Dot in March of 1960 as director of marketing and research, a post he will continue to hold with emphasis on retail sales.

Hefti To Cleff Musical

NEW YORK—Neal Hefti, the conductor-arranger-cleffer, has been signed by producer David L. March to compose the musical score for the upcoming Broadway show, "O'Malley's Nuns." A lyricist for the musical, book by David Chandler, has not yet been chosen. Hefti has been busy the past year scoring pics and conducting sessions on the coast for such performers as Frank Sinatra, Everly Bros., Sammy Davis Jr., Connie Stevens, Joannie Sommers and others. Twelve new Hefti tunes will be featured in a new MGM LP, "Harry James Plays Neal Hefti."

Apollo's Albert Has Son

NEW YORK—Mel Albert, head of Apollo Records, this city, last week became the father of an 8 lb. boy, Keith.

Reprise To Change Title, Cover Of Sinatra LP

LOS ANGELES—After granting a preliminary injunction prohibiting Reprise Records from selling or exhibiting the Frank Sinatra LP, "Swing Along With Me," Judge Gordon L. Esch, of the Superior Court in Los Angeles, last week accepted Reprise's change-of-title to "Sinatra Swings" and cover revisions.

The Reprise action is a result of a suit by Capitol Records that charged that the Reprise LP, cut after Sinatra's "Come Swing With Me!" date with Capitol, constituted unfair competition because it resembled, both in packaging and content, its own Sinatra LP.

In granting the preliminary injunction, Judge Files also decided that Reprise would have to change the title and cover of its album.

Defendants in the suit were Sinatra, Reprise, Essex Productions, Bristol Record Manufacturing, LP Record Sales and Melody Sales, the latter being Reprise distributors.

In addition, capital gains' earnings, mostly via the sale of half of the firm's stock in Microwave Associates, Inc., amounted to \$6,149,000.

Second quarter operating profit was \$2,269,000, or 58¢ a share, compared to last year's second quarter of \$2,317,000, or 55¢ a share.

'62 NAMM Meet Set For N.Y.

NEW YORK—Next year's Music Industry Trade Show will be held in New York, June 24-28, in the Hotel New Yorker and the New York Trade Show Building, according to William R. Gard, executive secretary of the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM), sponsors of the show.

Plans for next year's show were made at the conclusion of the 60th anniversary show in Chicago which set new records in attendance and business benefits to industry members.

Buyer attendance at the 1961 show was up 11% over 1960—totaling 4,028 this year as compared to 3,618 a year ago, Gard said. Total attendance, which set a new Chicago record, was 5% more than last year—11,878, as compared to last year's 11,382, the previous Chicago high.

Impulse! Sets 4 LP's For Fall Release

NEW YORK—Am-Par Record Corp.'s jazz subsid, Impulse! has announced its special fall release of four albums. According to Harry Levine, exec V.P. of the diskery, this group of the four packages represents the "finest group release by the deluxe label hitherto attempted."

Highlighting the release is The John Coltrane Quartet, "Africa/Brass," which features the tenor-sax star with his usual group, augmented by a specially-selected group of ten additional instrumentalists; "Blues and the Abstract Truth," performed by an All-Star Combo headed by Bill Evans, with such artists as Paul Chambers, bass, Oliver Nelson on alto and tenor saxes, Eric Dolphy, alto sax and flute, Roy Haynes, drums and Freddy Hubbard on trumpet; "Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers on Impulse!"; and, the group headed by drummer Max Roach in "Percussion Suite."

Am-Par expects to begin shipment of the four albums to distributors about the first of September.

HOLLYWOOD—Pacific Jazz Records is now offering dealers a "Pre-Fall Plan" in which distributors, on a minimum order of 100 LP's, can get two free on the purchase of 10. Deal expires September 24.

UA-Holland Rep Deal

Contract, which becomes effective immediately, runs for a period of three years, and includes the use of the UA logo on all future releases.

According to Sidney Shemel, director of foreign operations for UA, the actual contract period runs from July 15, 1961 through September 30, 1964.

"The increased recognition of the UA label internationally is further demonstrated with the signing of our new Holland affiliate," Art Talmadge vice-president and general manager of the record firm stated. In recent months pacts have been completed whereby the UA logo will now be used on singles and albums issued in most major overseas areas. Any future arrangements negotiated by Shemel will be completed only with this logo usage included, Talmadge added.

Candid Making Foreign Distrib Deals

NEW YORK—Candid Records has signed agreements for the distribution of its product in several foreign markets.

The Cadence jazz label has set up distribution of its albums in Italy through Bluebell Records, in Western Germany through Mikulski-Schallplatten-Import-Dienst and in Denmark through Debut Records.

Negotiations are presently underway for release of Candid albums in England, France, Sweden, Norway and the rest of the European market. The label is also negotiating with companies in Japan, Australia, New Zealand and Africa.

NEW YORK—Eliot Tiegel has left his post as publicity director of Command Records. Tiegel said last week that he would announce his plans shortly.

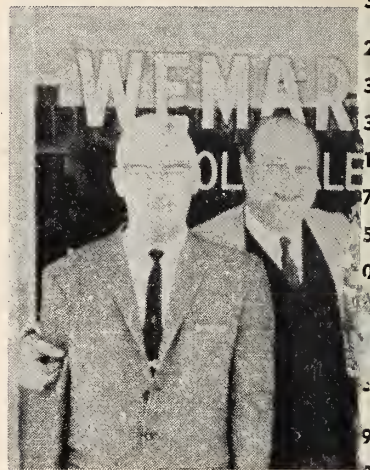

Denny Iks \$1/4 Million Deal With Waikiki Club

HOLLYWOOD—Liberty recording artist Martin Denny has signed a quarter of a million dollar contract, one of the most lucrative in Waikiki's history, with the new owners of Don The Beachcomber. Deal, negotiated by Arnold Mills, calls for a 90 day stay beginning December 1 with subsequent three month appearances each June and December for the next two years. With the new agreement, spot will undergo a name change and henceforth will be known as the Duke Kahanamoku.

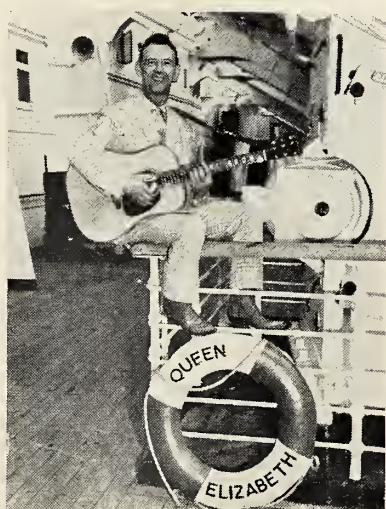
Era Is Distrib For Gregmark

Besides releasing Canadian talent, Acadia plans to lease American-made masters from indie U.S. firms producing country decks. Label also plans to have its masters released in the U.S.

Edge, Ltd. Acquires Va. Rack-Jobber

NEW YORK—Edge, Ltd., the big Washington, D.C. rack-jobber, has announced the purchase of the disk division of Tidewater Toy House of Norfolk, Va., another rack-jobber. Tidewater serviced 250 accounts, and the acquisition brings the total number of outlets serviced by Edge, Ltd. to over 1,000. Form recently acquired the disk division of Columbus Merchandise Co. of Columbus, Ohio. According to partners Edward Snider and Gerald Lilienfield, negotiations are under way for more such acquisitions in the near future. The Tidewater acquisition is expected to bring total sales of the parent firm to \$5 million this year. Snider is president of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM).

Following location shots in Zurich, filming will be completed in Hollywood by producer Henry Weinstein and director Henry King. Grant is currently appearing at the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas.

ENGLAND

This month sees the 2nd Anniversary of the Pye 'Golden Guinea' series. To mark the occasion, Pye is releasing 10 new LP's including a special Golden Guinea Family Album Pack comprising 2 LP's and 2 EP's. For Mom, there's "Music To Lighten Her Day" and "Romantic Memories" by the 101 Strings; For Dad, "Let's Really Dance" by The Statler Dance Orchestra and "Everybody Likes Saturday Night" by The Hollywood Sound Stage Chorus; For the Teenager, an EP, by Kenny Ball and for the very young a nursery rhyme EP by Stanley Unwin. Earlier this year, Pye presented Somerset Records with a golden disk to mark the million sales of the Golden Guinea LP's.

Central Record Distributors has signed an exclusive contract with the Danish Storyville label to manufacture and distribute in this country. First releases are scheduled for September and will be issued on the Storyville label. The catalog includes items from the American Music label representing such famous artists from the New Orleans Revival as George Lewis and Bunk Johnson. The disks, 12" LP's, will contain much material not previously issued.

As expected, the emergency budget introduced this week by the Chancellor of the Exchequer has hit the record industry. A 10% increase on the existing rate of purchase tax has put up the price of records. Generally speaking singles have increased from 6s.4d. to 6s.9d. and LP's from 39s.9d. to 41s.0d. However, both manufacturers and record dealers do not feel that this will have an adverse effect on record sales.

EMI last week launched a new low-price LP series "Encore." Aptly named, the series will re-introduce first class recordings—both pop and classical—by international artists which have been deleted from the catalogs for at least a year. The first releases include disks by Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Dean Martin, The King Brothers, Ruby Murray and Norrie Paramor. Classical LP's by Sir Thomas Beecham, Furtwangler and Joan Hammond. Packaged in colored covers the disks retail at 23/3d.

With his first British release "But I Do" entering its third month in the charts, Clarence Henry may well be around for another three months as his latest disk "You Always Hurt The One You Love" continues to climb. Both released on the Pye International label. Another Pye smash is Petula Clark's "Romeo"—looks like Pet has struck another winner to rival her chart topping "Sailor."

Arnold Klein, RCA European sales manager, just returned from Madrid and discussions with Bernard Ness, recently appointed director of RCA in Spain. Ness (late of Rank's Record Division) has introduced many new ideas of merchandising and promotion into the Spanish market and inaugurated the policy of issuing both 45 rpm and 33-1/3 singles and EP's. Besides heavy orders for Presley, Sedaka and Della Reese RCA is having considerable success with local Spanish artists in the export field. Klein also visited the new RCA studios outside Rome which are available to all recording groups in Italy as are RCA's pressing facilities. He had meetings with Sgn. Fanti and Sgn. Ricordi, who has recently joined the RCA group in Italy.

Bill Ward, general manager of Lawrence Wright, delighted to see "Pasadena" take over the No. 1 slot in the Best Selling Sheet Music Lists from "Exodus," which goes to No. 4 after 13 weeks at the top for Chappell & Co. As well as "Pasadena" by The Temperance Seven on Parlophone still high in the record charts, Lawrence Wright has another entry with "That's My Home" by Acker Bilk on Columbia. Hopes are high for "Creole Love Call"—Monty Sunshine (Columbia) and "Frankfurter Sandwiches" by The Streamliners and Joanne (Columbia).

Another happy publisher is Cyril Shane of Shapiro Bernstein with current chart entries "Moody River" by Pat Boone and Duane Eddy's "Ring of Fire" both on London. The same pubbery also handles "Who Does He Think He Is" by Penny on Piccadilly and the R&B number, "The Story Behind My Tears," with waxings by Kenny Lynch (HMV) and Gary Miller (Pye).

The number 1 American hit "Tossin' and Turnin'" by Bobby Lewis released here on Parlophone and published by Fred Jackson of Planetry-Kahl.

With both tracks of the latest Connie Francis single in the Cash Box Top 100, it's anyone's guess as to which side will prove the biggest seller here when the platter hits the counters in September. Francis Day & Hunter acquired publishing rights for "Too Many Rules" and "Together" is handled by Campbell Connelly.

David Platz of Essex Music with Eden Kane's top hit, "Well I Ask You," and Adam Faith's chart climber, "Don't You Know It," also publishes the score of the highly successful Anthony Newley show, "Stop The World—I Want To Get Off." Cover versions of the hit songs "Lumbered," "Gonna Build A Mountain" and "What Kind Of Fool Am I" are being lined up.

Last week's episode in ATV's top rated series, "Harpers W.I.," was centered around actor/singer John Leyton and his new Top Rank waxing "Johnny Remember Me." Leyton played the part of a pop singer called Johnny St. Cyr since when dealers have been inundated with requests for Johnny Sincere's waxing of the number!! Besides this nation wide plug, the disk has been played 17 times this week on Radio Luxembourg to the delight of publisher Bob Kingston of Meridian Music.

Southern's Latin-American Music handle the smash French hit, "Pepito," recorded here by Cyril Stapleton on Decca.

JAPAN

Columbia announced the following six tunes as its best selling international pop disks during the first half of 1961. The tunes are "Green Fields" by the Brothers Four, "The Green Leaves Of Summer" by the Brothers Four, "Good Timing" by Jimmie Jones, "North To Alaska" by Johnny Horton, "Nunca en Domingo" (Never On Sunday) by Trio Los Panchos and "Where The Boys Are" by Connie Francis.

Grammophon will discard 661 different disks by August 20. These tunes include 124 singles, 222 EP's, 85 pop LP's, 128 classical LP's and 112 78's. Dealers can exchange them for any other available disks from the entire Grammophone repertoire. The exchange rate is to be applied at wholesale prices.

Tadashi Yoneyama, ex-A & R manager of Columbia Records, died at the age of 89. His son, Masao Yoneyama, a first-rate composer, is now writing his local popular tunes for Columbia, mainly for songstress Hibari Misora.

Kraft Music Hall's Perry Como Show, long time favorite color TV show, will discontinue further programming. NBC, producing station of the show, asked NTV, the receiving station here, to show it 34 times yearly. The negotiation broke down because NTV insisted on 17 showings yearly. The show will disappear in 1962 unless other stations in Tokyo assume its right of telecasting.

Saul Holiff of Saul Holiff Volatile Attractions Co., London, Ont., Canada, arrived in Tokyo to stay a week or so. The day after his arrival, Yokichi Kitagawa (managing director of International Music Publishers), Mr. Hirose and Mr. Terajimo of Columbia and rep from Swan Productions, booking agents, were present to discuss Johnny Cash's coming to Japan. At this meeting, Holiff advertised how Cash, whom he is now planning to bring here this fall as a part of his overseas singing tour, is in great demand by the people of the US and Canada. Everyone but Holiff stated that country music was not as popular here as in the US and Canada. Kitagawa put it this way—"People will ask what is country music, and who is Johnny Cash." However, they all agreed on the fact that Johnny is the biggest figure in Japan as far as the country music field is concerned. Columbia will back up the tour if the booking agents, Swan Productions, accept the management. In this country, the concerned record firms used to back the artist's on-tour performances. Toshiba aided Nat "King" Cole, Victor supported Harry Belafonte, Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers, etc.

ARGENTINA

Ricardo Korn, of Julio Korn publishers, returned from a six day visit to Chile and Peru. He went there to study their writer situation and see a way of increasing operations of his company in that market. In Peru, he put special emphasis in getting in touch with APDAIC directives. (APDAIC is the organization that will control author rights when the correspondent law is passed.) Peru (total population twelve million) is a big market, and the only trouble for international operation in it is the lack of a law that would protect writer rights and establish the form of paying their percentages. He also found big interest in forming publishing companies of international force, that would make even bigger the Latin America market. In Chile, Korn contracted last Ariel Arancibia's production, "Noche De Brujas."

Most diskeries are already recording one or more tunes of the last Benidorm (Spain) Song Festival, that ended July 25. Odeon and RCA had prepared their waxings even before the last Festival night.

Willis Connover's American Jazz Festival was considered "one of the most important events in Argentina's jazz history" by the critics. Performances took place at the Coliseo and Ateneo theatres, and both were always crowded with jazz fans. Coleman Hawkins, Roy Eldridge and Jo Jones were the main stars.

Billy Cafaro returned from Caracas, Venezuela, where he performed two weeks on Venevision, TV Channel 4, receiving \$15,000. Now he will go to Brazil (TV13 in Rio de Janeiro) and Peru, (TV13 Panamericana) where he will stay more than a month.

Music Hall is expecting good sales for its last releases, "Walk, Don't Run," by Billy Vaughn, and "The Dark At The Top Of The Stairs" by Bob Crosby. Alberto Taylor will be the label's new promotion chief. Previously, Taylor held the same post for Philips.

Johnny Carel is already preparing his second LP. Considering the success of "Let's Think About Living," he has decided to wax in Spanish another Bob Lumen recording. However, we don't know the title yet. Carel's label, Orfeo, will release Mexican bolero singer Javier Solis' last LP, titled "Javier Solis In New York," with orchestra directed by American arranger Chuck Anderson, currently living in Mexico.

The arrival of the Dutch Swing College Band to Buenos Aires (August 2), coincided with a meeting of the heads of Philips of Chile, Argentina and Uruguay, Alain Trossat, Max Wyngaard and Enrique Lazcano, respectively. This meeting was planned to coordinate operations, and increase promotion of local production, especially the "New Sounds" series, which, according to the label, are a big success.

The importance of television in record promotion was shown some days ago when Chilean duet Las Chispitas sang "Total Para Qué," (a tune composed by R. Sciamarella four years ago) during the Pinacho Show on TV13. Immediately after the performance, several diskeries asked for it for re-recording.

Carlos Medina, successful disk jockey and composer, will go on August 20 to the United States to promote his songs. He will stay there for a month, visiting New York and other cities. Medina's last productions are "Tiempo" (cut by Roberto Yanes, "Estoy Feliz" waxed by Estrella Salinas (Dimsa), Los Romanceros (Odeon Pops) and Los Viajeros (Orfeo), and "Ni Tu Ni Yo," by Leo Marini (Odeon). Medina's program "South America by Night," is very popular.

Pedro Lujan, author of "The Handkerchief Stained With Rouge," and singer, changed his label from RCA to Music Hall. His first recording will be "Echale Un Terron Mas De Azucar A Tu Café, Nena" (Put Some More Sugar In Your Coffee, Baby).

Carlos Argentino is recording his new LP for Phillips, after solving his troubles with Dimsa. Two of the titles he will wax are "Fuerte De Caderas" and "Pompa De Jabón."

CHILE

Most diskeries are getting prepared for the Convention of Recording companies that will take place next September in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Herbert Neumann (RCA), Alain Trossat (Philips) and Enrique Epple (Odeon), will be the Chilean representatives to this event, considered very important for the industry.

The lack of publishing companies causes trouble between the director of the Small Author Right (depending on the University of Chile) and Chilean composers that translate foreign tunes to Spanish. While the Small Author Right considers that these translators need an authorization from the original author to be able to receive compensation for their work, the other part says that this is not necessary.

He will return to the Mexican capital in November with his Comet Johnny Grande, Johnny Kay, Al Rappa, Billy Williamson, Rudy Pompillo and Eddie Ward.

It's confirmed that Louis Armstrong will come to México, where he will perform at a benefit ball and three concerts at the National Auditorium. Next column will have more information.

Italian singer Elliana Silly cut for Peerless Records an LP with songs sung in English, Italian, French and Spanish. This is a mystery for us because she never performed in our capital before.

Rogelio Azcárraga, president and owner of Dimsa Records (Dimsa, Orfeon Maya), declared that after four years in the Mexican market, his company now sells 12 to 15% of the disks produced in the country.

After two years of hard work in musical comedies on Broadway, came Colombian actor and singer Jorge Ben Hur here on vacation for a few days. He will return to New York.

Olga Guillot turned down an invitation from the Cuban government to assist at the celebration of the 26th of July celebration because she complained that the present government took over her properties and \$200,000 Dls. Olga records at Musart Records, and her version of the top hit, "Escándalo" (Scandal) is selling very well.

Channel 6 of Guadalajara, associated with NBC of the United States, will start to produce live programs with Mexican artists. The problem is that Azcárraga (owner of city television) must give permission for his artists to work on the channel. He has the best.

"Tiempos De Pancho Villa (Pancho Villa's Time)" is the new Columbia album with the Sandoval's Bros. This LP is really interesting because it has original music and readings of the revolutionary times.

Beautiful actress and singer Silvia Pinal will continue for thirteen weeks more her TV series with comic Corona and the Jose Sabre Marroquin orchestra. This is one of the best TV programs we have at the moment.

Martha Rangel, who is getting more popular each day, will be presented in a new TV show in company of rock and roller Enrique Guzmán and Rubén Márquez orchestra. Her last record under the Vik label, "Sobre El Arco Iris" (Over The Rainbow) is selling well.

It's all set: The Hi-Lo's will debut in México at the Terraza Casino August 18 and before their arrival in México, a big promotion will be done. Jazz fans are anxious to see this vocal group.

César Costa, the most popular singer we have, cut at Orfeon Records his Spanish version of Paul Anka's "Dance Little Girl" and Bobby Darin's "Nature Boy." Gustavo Pimentel and his orchestra accompany him, under supervision of Paco de la Barrera.

The Associação Brasileira Dos Produtores De Discos (Brazilian Record Producers Association) has elected the new board of directors. Douglas J. Reid (from RCA) was elected president. Other directors chosen: H. E. Morris (Odeon); Evandro Ribeiro (Columbia); José Scatena (RGE) and Henry Jessen (Odeon).

As we predicted a few issues ago, the Brazilian government issued a new law forcing our record companies to press at least 50% of Brazilian music. President Janio Quadros' decree has stimulated a great number of articles, some concerning the record industry and some regarding Brazilian music's situation on our radio stations, which are forced to play 50% of local products. Another article recommends to each record company the pressing of at least one record a year of Brazilian classical music.

Vic Damone, a big success during his five days in Sao Paulo, singing famous numbers of his repertoire including "Arrivederci Roma;" "An Affair To Remember;" "Just One Of Those Things," etc. Before Vic's appearances, the show presented Brazilian singers like Denise Dumont, Antonio Alfredo, Nerino Silva, Arthur Murat, Margalot Bruce, Paulo Queiroz and Anilza Leone. Also Maria Pia Finachio and his ballet. Damone also appeared in Rio De Janeiro and Porto Alegre.

The next American artist to visit Brazil will be Della Reese, another big pop name here.

Belinda (Holland) topper Elbert van Zoeren drew the attention of A & R manager Mr. Maassen, of the Dureco labels to the new Australian song "Charlie Mopps." Dureco made a good Dutch version of this song on the Omega label, with a smart lyric made by André Meurs. This song, of which the Dutch title is "Batje Vier," has been recorded by The Cocktail Trio, who previously scored with another Australian song.

The Wilmari's, members of the Gold Record Club here, were married last week. Their first recording, "Barcelona", sold more than 100,000 copies on the Fontana-label (L. C. Phonogram).

No fewer than three important jazz album releases on the London label must be mentioned. The Newport Jazz Festival All Stars have Buck Clayton on trumpet, Vick Dickenson on trombone and George Wein at the piano. Recordings were made a few months before the Newport Festival of 1959 took place. New "Third Stream Music" is heard on "The Golden Striker," subtitled "John Lewis Conducts Music For Brass." Included are four pieces from Lewis' ballet "The Comedy," which was first performed in May of last year in Paris. Music from "The Connection," composed by Freddie Redd, is what Howard McGhee Quintet is playing on an interesting album for modern jazz fans. This play by Jack Gelber has also been filmed.

Three standards are on new London singles: "Nature Boy," one-time hit of Nat "King" Cole, is brought back by Bobby Darin. The evergreen, "I Love You Because," is sung by country star Johnny Cash, and Duane Eddy's protégée Mirriam Johnson is heard singing a catchy and jazzy version of "Lonesome Road." A to-be-watched newcomer; remember her name!

EMI's and His Master's Voice's outstanding violinist Yehudi Menuhin, whose magnificent artistry has been featured on the label for quite some years, visited Bovema's Gramophone house during a recent concert appearance in Holland. Menuhin was very impressed about Bovema's studio-facilities which were explained to him by Bovema's president Gerry M. Oord.

Ricky Nelson is now the bestselling artist of the Imperial-repertoire. Besides Ricky's hit "Hello Mary Lou," selling over 55,000 copies in just a few weeks' time, the label, supervised by Gerry Oord Jr., also hit the market with the Dutch version of "Mary-lou" and "Travellin' Man," sung by 22-year-old newcomer Harry Bliet, who once was the runner-up in a national Jimmy Rodgers-contest.

The forthcoming visit of Mr Acker Bilk's Paramount Jazz Band to Holland is Columbia's greatest feature in the entertainment area so far this year, says Robert Oeges, Bovema's Columbia label chief. The band will perform in Groningen, Leeuwarden, Zwolle, Enschede, Rotterdam and Scheveningen, from August 15-20 next. A very original and surprising follow-up for this personal appearance is the new Acker Bilk recording that will be a gasser for his many Dutch friends: two Dixie-versions of Dutch folksongs, "Toen Onze Mop Een Mopje Was" and "k Zag Twee Beren Broodjes Smeren."

"Adios My Love," a current Vera Lynn hit in England, is one of the newest MGM releases in Holland this week. The flipside, which has the same quality, according to Frank Visser, MGM's label manager, is "May Your Heart Stay Young Forever." Fair sales have also been reported from MGM's "Mel Torme and the Meltones" and their ever-famous "What Is This Thing Called Love."

This year's Knokke Songfestival brought victory to England; the British singers defeated Belgium on the finale with 372 points to 317.5. The Dutch team ended on the sixth (last) place. A special prize was awarded to French singer Simone Langlois.

ITALY



AUSTRALIA

As many around the world know, this year Italy celebrates the centennial of its unity. Our labels have released several LP's on the occasion of the centennial. They are, "Canti D'Italia: Il Nostro Risorgimento Attraverso La Canzone" (Songs of Italy: Our Risorgimento Through The Song) on Carisch, "Centenario Unita' D'Italia" (Centennial Unity Of Italy) on His Master's Voice, "I Canti Che Hanno Fatto L'Italia" (The Songs Which Made Italy) on RCA Italiana, "12 Canti Della Grande Guerra" (12 Songs Of The Great War) on RCA Italiana, and "Canti D'Italia" (Songs of Italy) on Meazzi.

The Carisch label is arranging contracts with foreign companies all over the world to release Peppino Di Capri internationally. Of course, it will be hard and unlikely that he will hit the foreign markets as he did here, but we feel that in those areas where Neopolitan music is already known and liked, and possesses a good appeal for record sales, disks by Peppino Di Capri can represent a good selling standard record catalogue.

Top Rank, through Durium Italiana, released a record which will surely be a success here, titled "Tennessee" by The Todds. Meanwhile, the success of "Mule Skinner Blues" which Durium is promoting strongly, still goes on.

Gianni Meccia, who had a big success with "Il Pullover," has now waxed a record under the RCA Italiana label titled "IO Lavoro" (I Word), lyrics written by Migliacci.

Something successful could happen to "L'Uomo Di Sale" (The Man Of Salt) by Luciano Beretta on Ri-Fi. Mr. Ansoldi, the president of the company, told us the record has gotten extremely good reaction. The best selling star of Ri-Fi remains, however, Michelino, the Italian "Senor del Cha Cha Cha," who currently leads and conducts his band in one of the best night clubs on our Riviera. His latest release couples "El Senor Del Cha Cha Cha" with "Versilia By Night."

Maestro Spagiari of Carosello, the record house of Curci, told us that the first recordings by Robertino will soon appear in Italy. Robertino is the Italian boy whose name has been appearing in the Scandinavian charts with modern versions of old Italian songs. Carosello, the representative of American Imperial, who we in Europe call Post so as not to plagiarize the German Imperial, has, of course, already published "Travelin' Man" by Ricky Nelson, which was high on the U.S. charts.

Frankie Avalon, who was due in Milan, wired us cancelling his trip, and Connie Francis who was due in Milan in August has put off her stay until mid-September. Percy Faith is in Italy as a guest of Mr. Baron, and before going to Venice where he is due for engagements, he is likely to spend some time in Milan. Robert Weiss of Warner Bros., on his endless tours around the world, told to the Italian rep of Cash Box that his next stopover is Milan.

There is a rumor that Maestro Boneschi, art adviser of the Ricordi label, has left the company. After the resignations of Nani Ricordi and Mr. Crepax, maestro Boneschi is the third exec of this company who has recently left this organization. The reason for these major changes are not known officially as yet.

Mathis in London

Holidaying in Australia at the time of writing is Daniel C. Bonbright, vice-president of administration and finance of Capitol Records. Bonbright is relaxing with his family and has spent some time in Sydney.

Another visitor—this time on business—from the United States is James Bailey of Dot Records. Jim spent a few days in Sydney with the EMI boys discussing future plans and distribution in Australia of the Dot catalog. The visit is part of a rush three-week trip to these areas to consolidate the handling of the Dot material. Bailey said he was pleased with what he had seen of the record industry in Australia and hoped that his visit would help to bring about a better understanding of operating conditions between Australia and American companies.

The RCA people are quite excited about the potential of a couple of their current sound-track albums. Claude Pickford and Jim Cuff tell me they are doing fine business with the tracks of "La Dolce Vita" and "Il Mondo Di Notte," both continental films.

There is growing concern throughout the trade regarding the number of individual singles that are achieving hit status in the United States—and reportedly catching big sales—that are not doing anything in Australia. This trend is making record companies wary of negotiating for the release of some singles that are enjoying chart success in the US. As an example, some of the Ray Charles singles that really hit the big time in the United States haven't had similar success here; "Daddy's Home" is another one that will be battling to make the grade here, the same applying to "Please Love Me Forever" and several other big American chart items.

Pye Records has made the second release of its "Goldengroove" range of albums—which, retailing at 33/., are the lowest priced 12" albums on the open market in Australia. According to Pye executives, the first batch of twelve Goldengroove LP's met with instant success and Pye predicts plenty of sales action with their new issues. Bulk of the Goldengroove material is drawn from the American Crown label.

One of the hottest singles across the nation right now is the Eddie Hodges London label disk of "I'm Gonna Knock On Your Door." It was released for a few weeks before any real action began and then suddenly it hit and almost overnight became a best-seller.

It looked for a while that the Sheb Wooley record of "Skin Tight, Pin Striped, Purple Pedal Pushers" would come under fire from our Broadcast Control authorities, but the way is now clear and it could click big with the Australian teenage market; disk is released here by EMI on the MGM label.

Also from EMI—this time on its HMV label—is its first single of local star George Karren, with Geoff Harvey supplying the backings. Titles are "Ain't Gotta Girl" and "Winter Came Along," the latter written by Harvey who was recently imported to Australia from England by EMI to join the A&R staff. Harvey is doing a fine job and many of his recent backings are among the most tasteful yet produced here.

Still with EMI . . . among its current singles is "Together" by Connie Francis; this is one of the slowest movers (saleswise) of the Connie Francis singles to date and there is a feeling that it may not do as well as some of her "beat" sides which have enjoyed great success in this country.

(B+) "DOUBLE EAGLE" (2:30) [PD] The traditional is rousingly read in exciting instrumental terms by the vet team. Side was recently released on Capitol by Roy Clark and both should prove stiff competition for each other.
(B+) "LOVE OH LOVE, OH PLEASE COME HOME" (2:30) [Mar-Kay BMI—Jackson] The ancient folk song, "Love Oh Love, Oh Careless Love," is dressed up with a new lyric and is etched in the team's delectable hillbilly style.

JIMMY WAKELY (Shasta 165)

(B+) "AN UNFINISHED PRAYER" (2:39) [Riverside ASCAP—Wakely] The effectiveness of a Jimmy Wakely gospel performance couldn't find a better vehicle. This is the traditional Wakely sound that still goes over very big.
(B) "THE SIGNIFYING SIGNS OF THE LORD" (2:46) [Mono BMI—Ray] Right out of the words of the bible comes the lyrics for this religious opus. Also a strong gospel item.

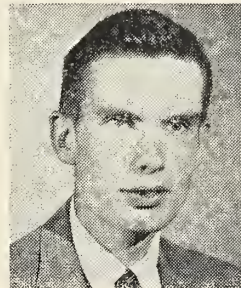
COUNTRY ROUND UP

"Louisiana Hayride" producer Frank Page revealed that the next monthly "Hayride" edition will take place Aug. 19 with special guests the Louvin Brothers, Rusty & Doug, and Tony Douglas. Frank says that the July 15 show, featuring Don Gibson, the Wilburn Bros., June Carter and Claude King was a sell-out. . . . The Country Music Association's quarterly meeting held last week at the Capitol Park Inn, Nashville, brought forth discussions of the Country Music Hall of Fame, the big radio survey being conducted by the organization, and the celebration of Country Music Week (Oct. 30-Nov. 4) in conjunction with WSM's annual deejay festival. . . . Public Relations At Work At Every Level

The need to emphasize the importance of good public relations continues and a review of what it is and how it functions can be a healthy activity from time to time.

There seems to be less need for definition of this industry program of late what with the results achieved by the industry's national organization, The Coin Machine Council. It has been through this leadership that the nation's press has slowly removed the barriers which heretofore prevented favorable comment concerning any activity having to do with the coin machine business. More favorable news information regarding the industry has appeared during the last twelve months than in most of the previous years and this in itself is a remarkable accomplishment. The result is good public relations. It couldn't have come about at a better time.

We never know the extent to which such results lead. Lately more Senators, Congressmen, Mayors and other leading civic dignitaries seem to accept guest speaker honors at our trade dinners and conventions than ever before. Perhaps it is due to CMC's program.

On the other hand it could be the result of a small group of coinmen working away on various local levels where PR is just as important. The Texas Amusement Operators Organization, a statewide group, is a good example of what can be done on a state level. (See CB July 29) This organization has been extremely effective in bringing about changes in State legislation which in turn has brought about financial benefits to its operator-members. Approximately 500 coinmen belong to the Texas association which is broken down into several local member groups. The locals cooperate with the statewide organization on license and tax problems channeling most of the job into the hands of Abe Susman, the guiding light in state affairs, who happens to be a registered lobbyist as well as a coin machine distributor. The group is presently fighting a battle to establish a uniform tax claiming that present taxes are unfair. The Texas Amusement Operators Association is a shining example of statewide public relations in action.

We are all familiar with the work that is being done at neighborhood, county and city-wide levels. Support of charitable organizations, sponsorship of civic programs designed to make for better living in a community and hundreds of smaller projects are all important. They each contribute to the goal which has been set by the entire industry—a favorable image in the eyes of the public and fair treatment in the legislature.

As a member of the industry every success along these lines helps you. It is therefore to your benefit to cooperate with CMC by joining its ranks today. Anything you can do at the other levels will also contribute heavily to a program that is picking up momentum with each passing day.

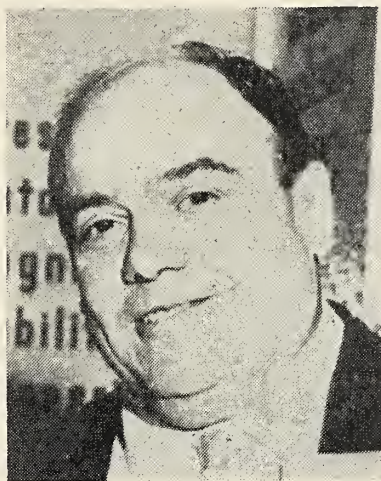
SYRACUSE, N.Y.—Location owners received their first formal pitch for a new 60-40 commission arrangement last week when John Bilotta, president of the Bilotta distributing firms in Newark, N.Y., Syracuse, Albany and Rochester, wined and dined about 1600 guests during a promotion party held at the Three Rivers Inn here (CB July 29).

Basis for the shindig was multiple with equipment, records, record artists and operating policies all being presented to a vast audience of disc jockeys, operators and owners during an evening-long party.

With the location owners a captive audience, Bilotta explained the merits of the new Bally "Bowler," a deluxe big-ball bowler initially previewed to the trade during the MOA meet last May; Wurlitzer's "Ten Top Tunes" 50¢ per play feature; and the merits of the Smokeshop cigarette machine. With each machine went hand-in-hand a deal for minimum operator commission and a 60-40 percentage arrangement in place of the present 50-50 deal which has hurt operators lately.

The Bally "Bowler" was displayed at 25¢ per play and touted as a machine that warrants a \$25 minimum for the operator or the 60-40 arrangement, whichever is greater. In the case of a \$50 weekly collection, the operator's share would be \$30. Less than \$50, the operator's share would not be less than \$25 minimum. Bilotta described the location-owner audience as "interested" in the proposition.

In the case of the juke box commission, a business that has returned to the location profits based on a 50-50 arrangement for many years, Bilotta exclaimed that with a program based on Wurlitzer's "Ten Top

Tunes" for fifty cents, and the resultant increase in earnings from locations presently featuring this new type program, a \$15 minimum for the operator was equitable and fair. A 60-40 commission arrangement would now be possible because of the increased overall earnings of the phonograph. Again, Bilotta described the owners as willing to take a try at it if it meant more weekly profits.

Miss Norma Rivers, a Vassar recording artist with two new singles on the market ("Whispering"—"My Heart Keeps Crying"; "Till We Meet Again"—"Beer Barrel Polka") reportedly broke up the house with a personal performance which included the two new releases. Bilotta has backed the gal vocalist and reports that juke box play throughout the area with

heavy play from disk jockeys has put the disk high up on the sales charts in New York State.

Since the disk is available only from Bilotta's outlets in New York State at the present time, disk jockeys around the country have requested it directly through his firms and the result has been the breaking of a hit by juke boxes around the nation. Radio stations didn't receive the disk until after the phonos programmed it on Bilotta's recommendation.

The cigarette machine, Smokeshop's new "Twenty-Seven," from Automatic Products Co., was introduced by the firm's sales manager, Art Brier. Bilotta advised that single and multiple sales on the machine during the four days following the show broke previous sales records for a similar period.

In addition to Miss Rivers, another Bilotta backed group—the Four Echoes, performed as did Shayne Hunter, a Vassar artist. Both acts were received very well by the packed house.

Bilotta intends to make the affair an annual one with results already confirming the success of such a promotion.

It was brought about in order to promote the sale of new equipment in conjunction with a new commission arrangement and evidently the double-barrelled deal paid off.

Among the dignitaries present were the following people from the world of politics and amusement: Mayor Milton Elzufon, Mayor of Newark, New York; State Senator Thomas LaVerne; Joe Grillo, manager of Bilotta's Rochester offices; Tony Visciglio, president of the NYS Tavern Owners Association; and Phil Tuzzalino, president of the Monroe County Tavern Owners Assoc.

Gallet, Ray Gallet Music Company in this city.

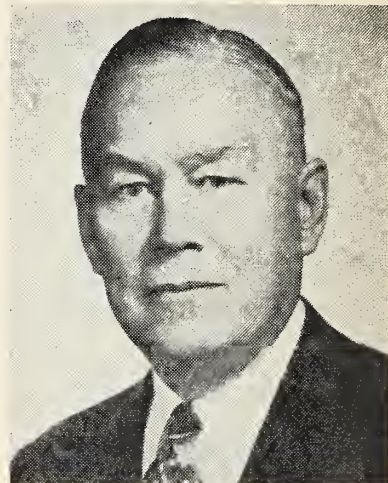

Newly named committee members of the Connecticut Automatic Merchandising Council will meet with the NAMA staff caravan on Tuesday, August 8 at the Yale Motel, Wallingford, Conn. Council President Louis Grossman said the all-day meetings will start at 9:30 a.m.

Hungerford announced that similar action programs will be launched through NAMA staff caravans in all State Councils during the summer and fall months.

A rubber mat in front of the machine will trip the machine's tape mechanism. A recorded announcement will explain to the prospective purchaser the operation of the brilliantly lit and attractive machine. Coin operated, the machine will deliver fresh roll film in the desired size. A receptacle will also accept exposed film along with the customer's name and address. Within 24 hours, prints and negatives will be delivered by mail.

McCoy stressed the additional advantages offered operators now with the introduction of the soups. By combining orders of coffee tape, coffee concentrate, frozen tea, iced tea syrup and soup, operators can earn additional case discounts.

Feinstein pointed out that "the true purpose of 33-1/3 rpm records for the phonograph business is to provide music that is otherwise unavailable to the operator.

"To bring this about," Feinstein said, "various record companies have

taken the best tunes from the long playing albums sold for home consumption and recorded them on 7 inch disks for play on our machines.

"The theory was that if people liked these tunes well enough to buy for home entertainment, they would also play them when they visit their favorite tavern or restaurant. The result is more money in collections for the operator."

Harold Schwartz of Atlas Music interjected at this point by stating that this program has been very successful, and each week brings more recordings which have been selling very well on LP to the home buyer. But which have until now been unavailable for the coin-operated phono trade.

"Most importantly," Schwartz added, "is the fact that any AMI phonograph, as far back as the 'G' model, can easily be modified to play 33-1/3 rpm records. We will gladly make this change for the operator at no charge for labor. In other words, all the operator need do is purchase the unit and we will install it on location."

At a low cost for the unit, according to Feinstein and Schwartz, the operator benefits by continuing to get play on records that would otherwise be on the shelf, and by providing secondary locations with music not available on 45's.

The catalog of artists available on Atlas Music's catalog includes: Ray Charles, Peggy Lee, Ray Anthony, Nat "King" Cole, Frank Sinatra, Kay Starr, Mitch Miller, Johnny Mathis, Pete Fountain, McGuire Sisters, Russ Morgan, Martin Denny, Jack Heath, Errol Garner, and many, many more such records available immediately.

Marvel In Peak Scoreboard Prod.

CHICAGO—Estelle Bye, Marvel Manufacturing Company, this city, advised this past week that the firm is enjoying constant and currently accelerated action in the production of electrical scoreboards for shuffleboards.

Marvel Mfg., which is headed by Ted Rubey, has been in the production of electrical scoreboards since 1946. Since then various models have been designed by the firm's engineers, with each model being improved to some extent.

change from one player for 10¢ or two players for 10¢, as well as two sets of scoring buttons. The scoreboard can very easily be set to play either 15-21 points or the "Horse-collar" (50 points).

Bye concluded by stating that peak production in electrical coin-operated scoreboards will continue throughout the summer months, with further acceleration in the Fall season.

\$4 Million Gottlieb Memorial Hospital Officially Opens To Serve People In 18 Western Suburbs

CHICAGO—Gottlieb Memorial Hospital officially opened its doors. The announcement was made by Louis Zahn, president of the ultra-modern hospital located at 8800 West North Avenue in Melrose Park.

Establishment of the non-sectarian institution means that thousands of men, women and children living in 18 western suburbs will be able to receive medical care without unnecessary delays. The well planned four-story structure contains 122 beds and was built at a cost of \$4,000,000.

The first patient to be admitted was William Clohesy of 172 Buffalo Grove Road, Buffalo Grove, Illinois. He is a Supervisor in the Material Damage Department of Allstate Insurance, 7770 Frontage Road, Skokie.

The smartly decorated hospital boasts a number of innovations including a pneumatic tube system which enables the dispatch of drugs, medications, treatment supplies and records to critical areas throughout the hospital almost immediately upon order. Another innovation is the hospital's unique food service which permits the patient to select his own time for breakfast, lunch and dinner within the designated meal periods.

The contemporary building contains four operating rooms, a post operative recovery room, a maternity rooming-in-unit, a physical therapy department which includes whirlpool baths, a radiology department, a fully equipped laboratory, and all stainless steel electric kitchen and streamlined laundry, among other facilities.

Expectant mothers can anticipate staying on the cheerfully decorated second floor when it opens late next month. The maternity section contains

36 beds, four labor rooms and two delivery rooms.

Gottlieb Memorial is one of the first completely air conditioned hospitals in the Chicago area. Air brought into the hospital is triple filtered through an electrostatic filtering system. Each room has a thermostatic control which can be individually adjusted. The rooms are acoustically tiled.

Possessing some of the finest medical talent in the Midwest, Gottlieb Memorial has a staff composed of 150 physicians. A total of 250 people will be employed there. Carl Nusbaum is Executive Director, Dr. Caesar Portes, Medical Director and Laura V. Carver, Director of Nursing.

The hospital was founded five years ago by David Gottlieb, a prominent Chicago manufacturer. Its Board of Governors elected to name the institution in memory of Gottlieb's parents.

Zahn stated that the ultimate goal is 360 beds because "this is the amount required to effectively serve the future needs of this rapidly expanding industrial area." He said the new wings would be added as finances became available from the community.

Zahn praised the industrial firms in the surrounding communities. "They have been instrumental in the establishment of this hospital. Time after time they have demonstrated their good will and citizenship. For this, we shall be forever grateful."

The hospital was aided by a \$822,000 Hill-Burton Grant which comes from a federal program that annually provides funds for each state to reappropriate in worthy hospital construction projects.
