Les Paul and Mary Ford sing a tune from one of their already recorded disks and, sensationally, sales zoom. Juke box ops get requests for the tune from their locations. Dealers report sales up. Distributors claim distribution zoomed.

Florian Zabach plays the "Hot Canary" and—bingo—juke boxes are featuring the disk, dealers are selling it, distributors are handling it in increasing numbers.

Leroy Anderson's "Syncopated Clock" is heard and seen on TV and sales boom. Many others have also enjoyed a boom tune time from TV appearances.

Likewise, many have found tunes, and tunes which seemed destined for great popularity prior to being telecast suddenly slip down to new lows in sales, new lows in appreciation and, especially, new lows in demand.

What causes the sudden boom and the equally sudden dip?

Many surrounding factors are today being attributed to the sudden popularity which a tune enjoyed because of a TV performance, and also the sudden slump which another tune begets itself after a TV performance.

There are some who claim that the personality of the artist, his technique, his artistry, his song selling power, the musical backing, as well as the technical staging of a tune, all have a lot to do with whether the tune becomes a click or a flop.

In short, from these conjectures, it is then safe to assume that the biggest gamble a tune can take, is to have itself presented on TV.

Unless, of course, that tune is so well established by the time it reaches the telecasters that they just can't knock it down, even with a flat and bad performance.

But, for example, and as some of the old timers in the music field claim, suppose it's a new tune, a possible comer, one that all believe may make the top. Then, they argue, take an artist with a flat personality, a dead pan, bad backgrounding, too much staging, and the tune is a flop forevermore.

Likewise, these same old timers are willing to admit, TV can make a tune, even if it's "just another song," in the estimation of the experts. Provided, of course, that the artist has appeal, has terrific personality, can sell the song like mad, has gorgeous musical backgrounding and the kind of staging and directorship that gets people to acclaim the song.

The arguments are hot and heavy everywhere in the music world as to whether TV can make or break a tune and there are, today, just as many "pros" as there are "cons."

Some believe that a tune shouldn't even be allowed to be telecast until all those interested in the future of the song have gone over the entire intended TV presentation of that tune.

Some also say that, like the Chinese proverb, "a picture is worth a thousand words," TV, too, because it is visual, ruins the possibility of the public using its own imagination regarding the lyrics as fittingly presented by the melody.

In short, these latter claim, a tune can be the most happy, lilting melody ever written, but, over TV it can be telecast as just "another dopey piece of music."

Listening to it emanate from a radio or from a juke box, these men claim, the public "imagines" the entire presentation, their complete imagination affected by the lyrics and the melody, causing a new hit to be born.

But, a dead panned artist, some rotten staging, a lot of unnecessary dancing, poor musical backgrounding, and the very same tune dies aborning.

The entire juke box industry is intensely interested in TV's presentation of the new tunes. This industry believes that many purchases of disks will be based on what happens during an important telecast of a tune.

Where the juke box op might go overboard on a new disk, and decide to fill all his juke boxes with the tune he also might, because of a poor telecast, have to throw the disk into the ash heap.

In short, the juke box ops are carefully watching TV's tune presentation technique. Where Florian Zabach, Leroy Anderson, Perry Como, Les Paul and Mary Ford, were able to bring them some demand from their locations (which is, of course, the public asking the location owner for the disk) and which, too, brought in more coin into their juke boxes, they have, already, seen some good tunes suddenly die a dismal death, because of the visualization the public enjoys of a tune.

The question as to whether TV can make or break a tune can't be answered immediately.

What can be stated is that unless everyone interested in the tune isn't mighty careful about its presentation during an important telecast that tune can be broken.

Likewise, if the telecast is successful, that tune can be made. And, perhaps, made into a bigger hit than anyone dreamed it would ever become.

The pro and the con will argue the point for a long time to come. In the meantime, the juke box operator is carefully watching the effect of telecastings of new tunes.

And since the juke box op is constantly gambling on new tunes, buying them in quantity far in advance of promotion, he certainly will watch carefully, and listen just as carefully, as to whether TV will make or break some of the new tunes he buys.

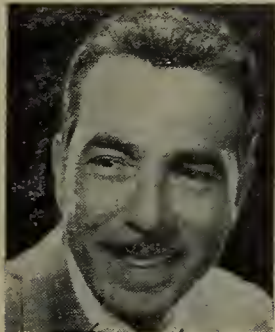

For Billy does some of his grandest work here as he really lets go in his most appealing style. The harmony these boys make is of the top grade and on this one they have wonderful material. The second half is an ultra slow ballad which also gets some fine harmonizing. But the end which is due to make the noise is the first one. Ops can't afford to miss it.



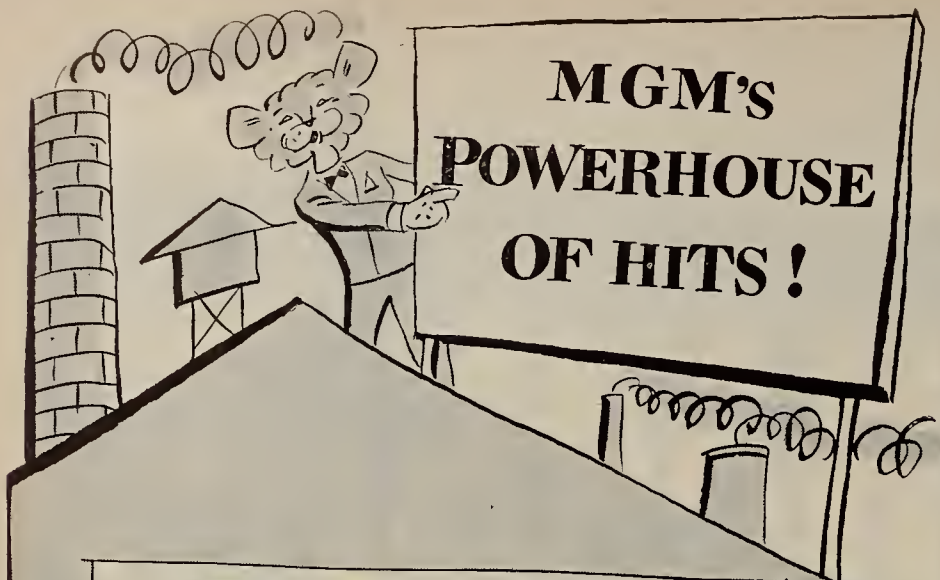

Sutton Records is still another new label recently formed. That firm has already issued its first disk “Got Your Wealth” and “Woman” by Lee Summers and his orchestra.

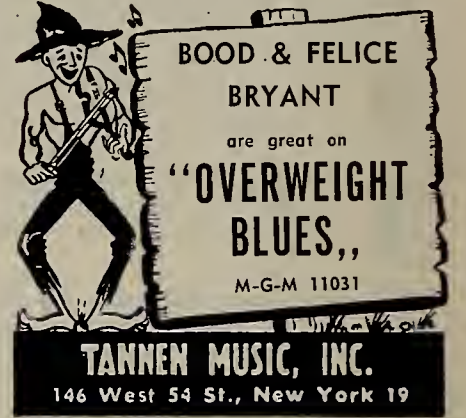

The dealer will merely affix his signature to the bonus album cards turned over to him by customers, and mail them to the distributor, who thereupon will replace the bonus merchandise in kind.

Under the plan, effective September 10, more than six dollars worth of RCA Victor record albums will be given without extra charge to each purchaser of any current RCA Victor table model instrument having 45-rpm record playing facilities, or either of two radio-phonograph consoles.

● The top deck presents a tune which Floyd Dixon could carry right to the top of the list. Floyd is a proven performer and with material of this nature he can't

miss. Titled "Do I Love You," this number is a slow ballad with a lonely melody. The tune is flavored with a bit of a gypsy strain which adds to its appeal. Floyd does a remarkable job on the lyrics, while a beautiful string accompaniment by Johnny Moore's Blazers lends the finishing touches to a sure hit. The lower end is a cute, bouncy thing that sounds real good as Floyd handles the wordy but clever lyrics. This too can break out. Ops know that Floyd is a big money-maker and can draw those coins into the boxes, especially with the big following he has. Our advice is to get with that upper end now, for when it breaks, it'll break fast and ops will want to be there.

● Maurice King and his Wolverines take a jump item for a fast spin around the wax. This half is a hard hitting number that is done loudly and features some good sax playing. The flip finds chirp Bea Baker belting home a slow and forceful blues tune. Ops have strong filler sides here.

● The upper lid offers Al Hibbler with an old ballad that can easily find itself again. Al, assisted ably by Jimmy Mundy's orchestra, does a good job with this pretty tune and makes it potential jukebox fare. The second end is another oldie that is turned out in a better than average way. We like the top half.

● A pleasant balled is treated easily by the vocalizing Skylarks on the first side. Giving it all, the boys come up with a fair waxing. The bottom deck is a fine recording of a number that's rockin' the rhythm and blues field. This slow and torchy ballad should draw its share from the machines. Ops oughta get with it now.

● The Bell Hops, with Johnny Wright on the vocal, glide through a soft ballad in a listenable style. The tune and vocal are ok and this end comes out in a better than average manner. The under lid is a slow number that hasn't too much to offer. Ops should look in on the top half.

● A pair of wonderful instrumentals is turned out on this platter by Johnny Otis and his orchestra. The top end is a slow production number that has a haunting and dynamic rendition to offer. The second side is also slow and forceful and in addition features a good electric guitar. Ops can't go wrong with this disk.

● Ivory Joe Hunter has some excellent material to work with on the upper lid. It's a slow ballad with a very pretty melody and a vocal to match. The orchestration setting is first class too and ops are advised to get with this one fast. Flip is a blues item that Ivory Joe handles with ease.

● A Cole Porter standard is delivered in a very interesting manner by stylist Oscar Peterson. This first side features lots of good piano playing and a tune that can be heard over and over again. ● A couple of slow and soothing tunes are dished up by the harmonizing Jubilaires. The bottom deck is handled similarly, but we feel the upper half is the one that deserves ops attention.

LEONARD CHESSE, top wheel of Chess Records currently swingin' thru the sun country, telling all who will listen that "THE HOWLING WOLF" is by far and away the best on "Moanin' At Midnite." Mercury's Queen of the Blues, DINAH WASHINGTON, in town for a task session at the Hi Note; MARTY DENNENBERG handles the hosting chores at the North Clark St. spot.

FRANK HOLFINE, happy as a bull fiddler over the cash registered

by the recent two weeker of Duke Ellington at famed Blue Note. STAN GETZ, who's as modern with a horn as PICASSCO is with a paint brush, is currently sharing honors with the BASIN STREET SIX at the Blue Note and keeping the place hot for the early arrival of SIDNEY BECHET.

The wildest DJ on the air waves seems to be DEWEY PHILLIPS, heard nitely from WDAI in Memphis. His war chant "Tell Em Phillips Sent You" has most of the Delta folks running around like mad. AL HIBBLER, froggy throater with DUKE ELLINGTON quit again. 'Tis rumored the green was too lite.

NELLIE LUTCHER & THE INK SPOTS holding down separate spots in Toronto and doing lots to break the Sterling bloc. HAZEL SCOTT, LENA HORNE and new world dancer PEAL PRIMUS will cross over for stints in Israel. TAMARA HAYES, Deccalist with the bedside styling, writes from NYC about her best to date—"Tonite You Belong To Me." WYNONIE HARRIS takes old time hillbilly "Bloodshot Eyes" and drives home a real kickin' blues in the best WYNONIE fashion. You'll flip for WILLIE SMITH'S sax on "Caravan" for the Mercer label. Who wrote "Smooth Sailing," ARNETT COBB or SIR CHARLES THOMPSON? Wish somebody would decide and get straight so the tune can be published and then we can play on the air ELLA FITZGERALD'S great version. Savannah Churchill's hit record, "I Want To Be Loved", skyrocketed her into the front ranks of the top recording artists after she had sung her way from church choirs to featured vocalist and star billing with Benny Carter's band. 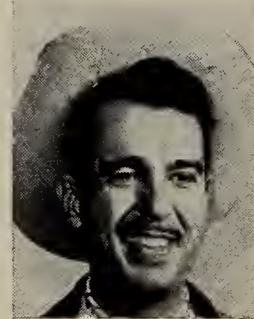

ops know that this artist can bring those coins home. This new ditty is a jump number with a lively aire. The tune and lyrics are made to order for the vocal style of Tennessee and he really tears into it and turns out a wonderful half. Both ends get good musical backdrops that feature a fine sounding piano. The second side is another novel type tune. This number has already shown that it can be big in the machines. It has a cute melody and some clever lyrics and Tennessee gives it his usual best. Either end can break, but we look for the top deck to do it first and go right to the top. Ops can't afford to miss this one.

MUSIC DISTRIBUTORS RATIONED

Business Good but Distributors Can't Fill Orders as Music Mfrs. Ration New Equipment Production. Distributors Urge Ops. to Anticipate Needs and Order Ahead.

NEW YORK—The introduction of new phonos these past few months has helped to tremendously stimulate business for distributors. But, at the same time, has caused much worry among many distributors who now find that their ultimate sales will fall far short of what they could be, because they find themselves being rationed by the manufacturers.

The manufacturers are up against many problems in the production of new phonos. The chrome and nicked trimmings are disappearing. In their stead comes highly polished aluminum. Other outer parts are painted in harmonizing colors and cast iron is being used. Plastics are still colorful and as much of these are being used as possible.

The juke box manufacturer, like all other manufacturers, must seek substitutes for the critical materials which are being taken from him, in ever-increasing quantity, by governmental restrictions on their use.

It seems, too, that many distributors have awakened to the fact that they won't be obtaining as many of the new machines as they thought they would receive.

A very noted example is the fact that juke box distributors who were taking it very easy all summer long, have suddenly found that the opening of the new fall season, jumped sales.

In addition, introduction of new phonos, helped to stimulate interest and, as news of more and more restrictions reached the trade, thereby awakening many ops to the fact that fewer and fewer new phonos would soon be available, orders began to suddenly flood distributors.

The result has been that more trade-ins are now being offered to the juke box distributors. Many of these distributors have sales for these trade-in phonos. But, they haven't the new machines to take in the trades as yet.

As one well known distributor put it, "Our order was cut 25 per cent for new machines. We have already taken in many trade-ins. This puts us in a spot. It forces us to make certain of whatever new phonos we can obtain, prior to even arranging for any more trade-ins with our customers.

"It also means," he continued, "that those operators who want to be sure of getting new phonos had best anticipate their needs and order far ahead. This is the only sure way the operator has of getting his share of new equipment this year and, especially, during 1952, when we have been given to understand there will be even less new equipment produced than has been manufactured in 1951."

WURLITZER BUYS PACKARD

Acquire Entire Assets of Packard Mfg. Co. Phono Division

NO. TONAWANDA, N. Y.—The Rudolph Wurlitzer Company has purchased assets of the phonograph division of the Packard Manufacturing Company, Indianapolis, Indiana, a company which formerly manufactured Packard commercial phonographs, Pla-Mor wall boxes, and related auxiliary equipment.

The announcement was made by R. C. Roling, President of the Wurlitzer organization.

The purchase included all phonograph and remote equipment service parts inventory, as well as all

Packard phonograph and Pla-Mor wall box patents, trademarks, tools, jigs, fixtures, dies and drawings.

All material included in the acquisition will be transferred from the Packard plant at Indianapolis to the North Tonawanda plant of The Rudolph Wurlitzer Company, where Wurlitzer phonographs and electronic organs are manufactured.

Phonograph operators may send orders direct to Wurlitzer at North Tonawanda, New York, for service parts for Packard phonographs, Pla-Mor wall boxes, and other

equipment formerly manufactured by Packard.

Such orders will be filled from the parts inventory acquired from Packard wherever this is possible, and additional parts from time to time will be manufactured by Wurlitzer if there is a sufficient demand for them from operators.

In making this statement Mr. Roling did not indicate that the Wurlitzer Company would go into the production of completed units of any items which Packard had previously manufactured.

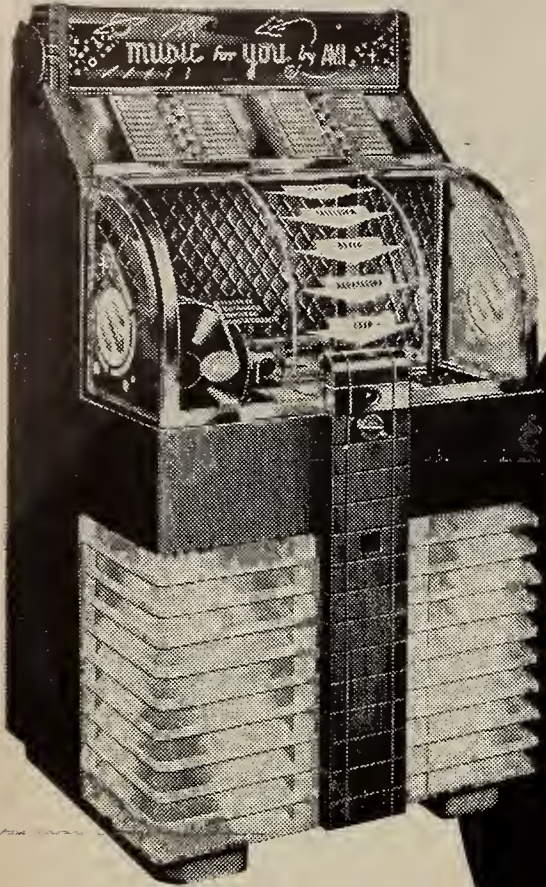

10c PLAY BRINGS MUSIC OP 100% COLLECTION INCREASE

First Music Op to Try 10c Play in Illinois Reports 100% In-
crease Based on Full Year Play. Lost Only 4 of 130 Locations.
Says He Would Rather Sell Route Than Go Back to 5¢ Play.

PRINCETON, ILL.—Wm. P. Jen-
sen of Jensen Automatic Music Co.,
this city, reported this past week that
the firm had shown over a 100 per
cent collection increase in over fifty
percent of their equipment, based on
a year's period of time, on 10c play.

Jensen made this very definite state-
ment:

"I feel this way about 10c play, that
if I ever have to go back to 5c play,
there will be a route for sale in Prince-
ton, Illinois."

He also reported, "I wish to inform
you that I am probably the pioneer of
10c play in the state of Illinois.

"I changed one of my machines last
December. Of course, by now we have
had a wonderful test.

"At the present time 50% of the ma-
chines are doing 100% over 5c play.
This comparison is not from the time
that we changed, but, instead, compar-
ing it from a year ago this time.

"We have brought our average from
\$6.50 per week up to a \$9.00 average.

"In making this change, out of the
130 locations that we operate, we lost
four locations. All these were poor
spots.

"I was under a terrific handicap in
this area, as I was the only one oper-
ating on 10c play. Still, our machines
picked up the second week we were on
10c play.

"If any operators would like figures
or mechanical details, I will gladly
furnish them."

WILL PUBLIC SPEND DIMES AS FAST AS NICKELS?

Telephone Company's Weather
Operator Finds They Will

CHICAGO—If this city's phono ops
were wondering, this past week,
whether the public here would spend
dimes as fast as nickels, they need
wonder no longer.

In fact, operator after operator
clipped a newspaper report concern-
ing the fact that over 294,000 persons
here phoned the telephone company's
"weather" operator this past week,
just to learn what the weather would
be like. These were all 10c phone calls.

The last check the phone company
had, on a similar hard weather week,
at 5c calls, the company received only
245,000 phone calls to the weather
operator.

ops here, as well as amusement ops,
and all location owners, that the pub-
lic will spend a dime, even faster than
a nickel.

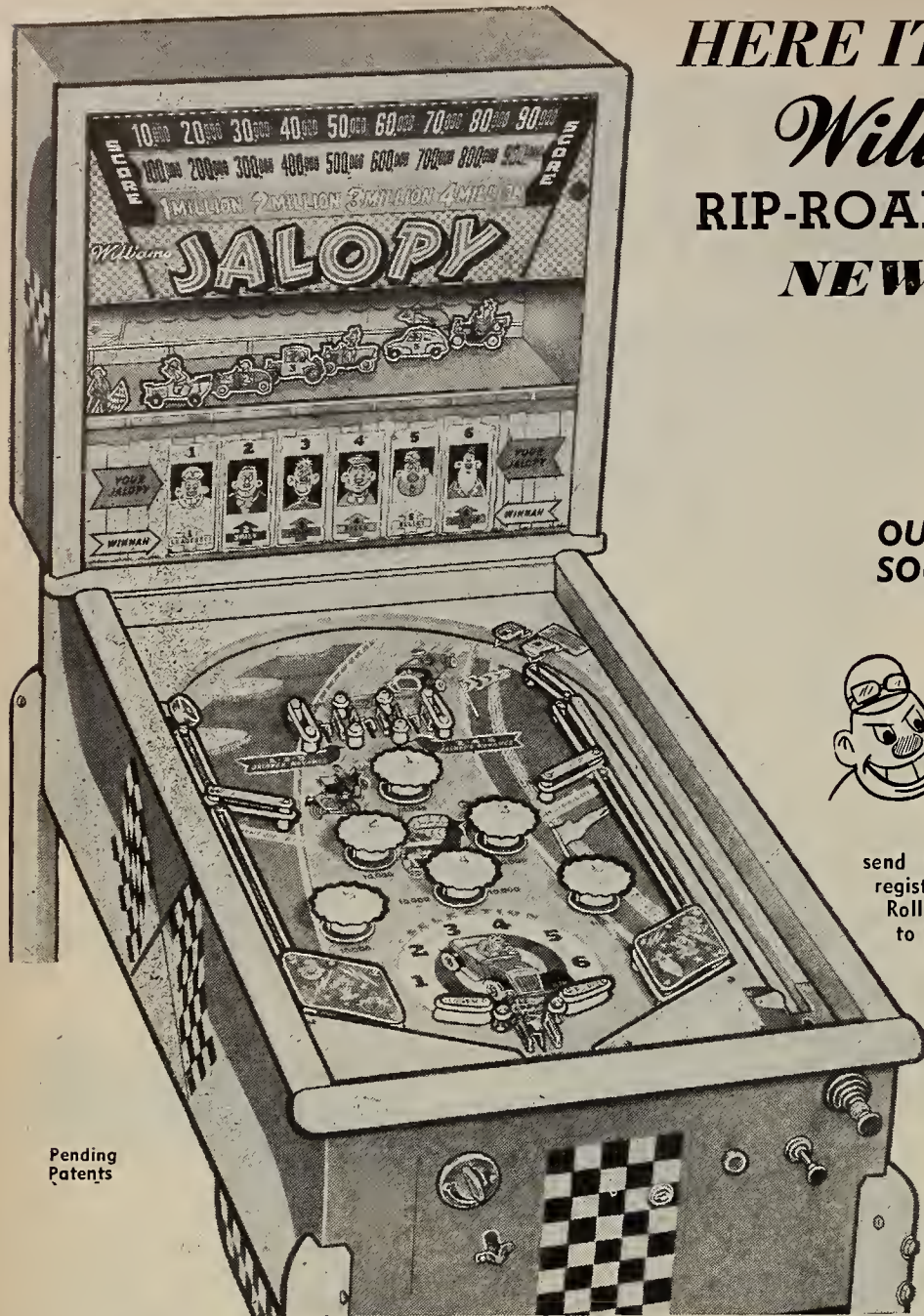

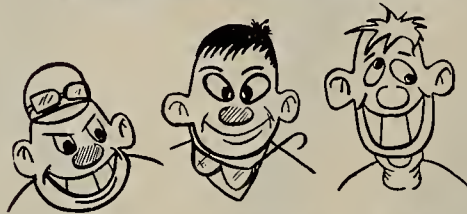

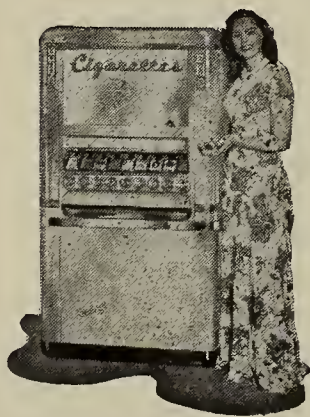

Texas Ruling Upsets Many Ops

AUSTIN, TEX.—An opinion handed down (Sept. 5) by the Texas State Attorney General's office held that pinball machines and marble tables that pay off free games are banned under the state's new anti-slot machine law.

In attempting to knock out slot machines and other gambling devices operated by insertion of coins, the 1951 Texas Legislature enacted a law which included a ban on any coin-operated device that when operated "may deliver, as the result of an application of an element of chance, any money or property."

The new law provided for a prison term of two to four years for possession of the outlawed machines.

Directed to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, who collects taxes on coin-operated devices, the attorney general's opinion was written by Assistants Ned McDonald and J. Fred Jones.

The opinion held that the term "property" was used in its broad sense so as to include free games.

It is a matter of common knowledge from public statements by the sponsors, the opinion said, "that free-game marble and pinball machines were one of the evils intended to be more effectively suppressed by the act."

The attorney general's opinion further noted that the Texas House of Representatives killed an amendment which would have exempted free-game pinball machines.

NPA Sets Up Appeals Board for Mfrs Hard Hit by Shortages

WASHINGTON — Amending its own Regulation 5, August 29, 1951, the National Production Authority has arranged for an Appeals Board to allow manufacturers who use steel, copper, aluminum, or other scarce materials, under NPA allocation, to appeal denials of applications for adjustment of CMP allotments and materials allocations.

The amendment provides: 1) That when a manufacturer believes that a provision of an NPA order, a CMP allotment or materials allocation creates an unreasonable hardship for him or is not in the public interest, he may apply for an adjustment to the NPA industry division that administers the order or makes the allotment or allocation.

2) If the request for adjustment is denied, the manufacturer may appeal to the Appeals Board. The appeal must be filed within 45 days of the industry division's decision or, in the case of CMP allotments and materials allocations, within 45 days of August 29.

NPA requires: 1) That appeals be filed in quadruplicate with the Secretary, NPA Appeals Board, Office of the Administrator, National Production Authority, Washington 25, D. C.

2) That the notice of appeal include the nature of the NPA action appealed from, the grounds of appeal, copies of the documents on the NPA action, and whether an oral hearing before the board is desired.

Further details are contained in NPA release 1157.

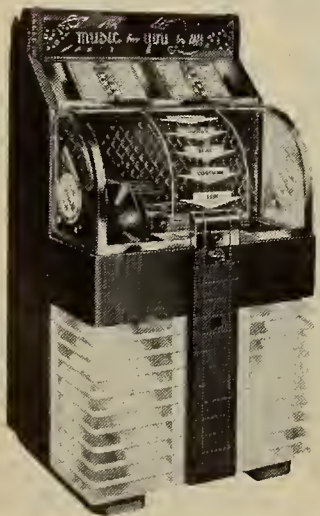

NOTED JUKE BOX OPERATOR WRITES OUR EDITORIAL THIS WEEK ON 10c PLAY

Grosses 28% More Money, Enjoys 40% Less Service Calls and Wear and Tear on His Equipment, Assuring Him His Machines Will Last 40% Longer Time

For over eight years *The Cash Box* urged the nation's entertainment machines operators to change to 1 play 10¢ and 3 plays 25¢. Some listened. Some tried. But, due to competitive circumstances, most failed.

The Cash Box then urged, as an alternative, that ops switch over to 70%-30% commission-percentage basis. 70% to the operator, 30% to the location owner. Many tried and succeeded with this operating plan.

But, when inflation entered into the picture, just a short time ago, and when overhead expense zoomed high into the blue sky, ops found that they were paying anywhere from 200% to over 400% more for overhead expense as well as new ma-

chines, they were then either forced to make drastic changes or else go bankrupt.

Again *The Cash Box* pointed out the need for 10¢ play. *The Cash Box* explained that, with manufacture tending steadily downward, and with the possibility that very, very few new machines would be sold as the months went by, because Government agencies were placing more and more restrictions on use of critical materials, it was up to every operator to make his present machines, and all new machines he purchased, last as long as possible.

The Cash Box proved that, as far as preserving equipment, enjoying less service calls and longer life for machines, 10¢ play was the one and only best answer.

Even if only half the number of regular 5¢ players inserted dimes into the juke boxes or entertainment machines, *The Cash Box* explained, the operator would still earn the same amount of money he was earning on 5¢ play. But he would, at the same time, save money (which is the same as earning more money), because he would then enjoy less wear and tear on his equipment, which also means less service calls, and would know that his machines would last a 50% longer period of time.

The letter received this past week is the answer to what *The Cash Box* has been preaching to the trade. It is the best editorial *The Cash Box* could ever write.

Our gross take has increased on an average of 28%, whereas the number of times the machines are played has decreased 40%; which all adds up to 40% less service calls, and more money in our pockets.

Those operators who shout and claim that 5¢ play is the only thing are the ones who have not given 10¢ play a trial. Once they go to 10¢ play, I am sure that they will "Begin to see the light".

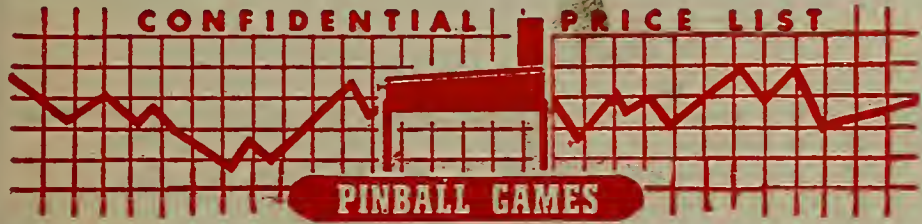
