Talking It Over

A well known Miami, Fla. operator reported, "Shuffleboards are, at long last, cementing the idea of 'front money.' Tho," he adds, "The Cash Box has been, for a long time, telling the nation's operators that front many and are some erators that front money and a more fair percentage commission basis was necessary for continued profitable oper-ating, it took the shuffleboards to make this idea sink in strong.'

By that he means that the average shuffleboard operator in Miami is obtaining \$20 per week front money. The next \$10 goes to the location owner. All over \$30 is then split on a 65%-35% basis. The operator getting the 65 per cent and the location the 35 percent.

The reason, this well known op claims, that 'front money' came into being with the shuffleboards . . . "is because the operators didn't want to get stuck with wood profits."

By that he means that when ops saw the size of the standard shuffleboard they realized that they would be in the "moving van" business.

Therefore, because of cost of the boards, as well as price of transportation, service costs, etc., decided that they would not operate shuffleboards unless forced into such operations.

The result being, he says, that when the locations phoned ops and demanded a shuffleboard, the ops, in turn, demanded that they get at least \$20 per week front money. The average op hoped that this would discourage the storekeeper. But, it did not it did not.

Therefore Miami ops are getting along fine with the locations in their territory. Every op has arranged to obtain \$20 per week front money guarantee. In addition, because other ops have already done so, he has also worked out a better percentage commission basis, and is now assured of more rapidly amounting the assured of more rapidly amortizing the cost of his shuffleboard, as well as seeing clearer profits so much faster.

It takes time to make any good idea sink in. The shuffleboard ops in Miami and elsewhere have come to realize the

sink in. The shuffleboard ops in Miami and elsewhere have come to realize that under present conditions they cannot operate without some sort of guarantee.

The front money which they are obtaining is assurance that they will be able to more rapidly amortize their investment. Furthermore, with this front money continuing, and with the further fact that after \$30 in take they are obtaining 65% commission, they now have every opportunity of making their shuffleboard operations extremely profitable, if they will devote themselves to the task of exploiting and promoting the boards

of exploiting and promoting the boards as they should.

At the same time the majority of the ops are signing location agreements which assures them the establishment for at least one year. Most of the operators agree that this will show them profit

As the ops learn more and more about the profits which a more fair commission basis will earn for them, and also that front service money will assure quicker amortization of their investment, they have begun to think about all other new items which appear on the

other new items which appear on the market in the same percentage light.

Shuffleboards have, therefore, proved of extremely great benefit to the field. They have been responsible for bringing about better business methods on the part of the nation's ops who have taken to these boards for more assured income. to these boards for more assured income.

"The Man I Love" (2:34) "Bill Bailey" (2:47) ROBERTA LEE (Tempo 428)

• Certainly one of the most unusual Certainly one of the most unusual recordings to come forth in a long time is this disking by Roberta Lee tagged "The Man I Love" and "Bill Bailey." Both sides are jazz standards, but the vocal this gal gives 'emmakes the wax start right on out from scratch. Ring in the gal's pipes on the top deck rides throughout the platter, while her vocal pitch is toned down a bit on the flip. Wax has to be heard in order to be fully appreciated—and that is what we recommend.

"So This Is Love" (2:50) "There's No One Here But Me" (2:55)

> VAUGHN MONROE ORCH. (RCA Victor 20-3606)

Fresh wax by maestro Vaughn Monroe, with this coupling from the Disney flicker "Cinderella" on tap for music ops. Topside, titled "So This Is Love" is a slow moving ballad, with Vaughn and the Moon Maids purring the lilting lyric. Ditty schoes nicely Vaughn and the Moon Maids purring the lilting lyric. Ditty echoes nicely, and should win its fair share of juke box coin play. The flip has Vaughn, the Moon Maids and the Moon Men on "There's No One Here But Me," a plush dreamy tune that might prove to be a sleeper. Wax definitely rates ops listening time—and more.

"What Fer Didja" (2:21) "Fargo Fanny" (2:52) DOROTHY SHAY (Columbia 38651)

Thrush Dorothy Shay offers music ops a pair of cute tunes in this coupling of "What Fer Didja" and "Fargo Fanny." Both songs have a downhome twang to it, with Dot's vocal work shining brightly. Music makes for excelent listening pleasure, and should be greeted by Miss Shay's many fans with fair reception. Ork backing on the pair by maestro George Wyle rounds out the platter effectively. Ops who have the room on their machines should lend an ear in this direction.

"Flaming Sand" (3:17) "Sunday Isn't Sunday Anymore" (3:13)

HERB JEFFRIES (Columbia 38652)

Plush pair of sides by strong-voiced Herb Jeffries shows to excellent light on this bit of wax. Both sides receive brilliant musical interpretation by maestro Harry Zimmerman, who rates a great big bouquet for a scintillating performance. Top deck, tabbed "Flaming Sand" is a deep meaningful piece of material, with Herb's booming voice ringing true. The other side echoes just as brightly and is extremely pleasant listening. Add all the laurels you have to maestro Zimmerman for this beautiful bit of music. Wax looks good.

"Big Movie Show In The Sky" (2:41) "Mr. Disk Jockey" (3:03) BLUE BARRON ORCH. (MGM 10549)

• Certainly by far one of the most impressive pieces of music to come forth from the baton of maestro Blue Barron is this latest song titled "Big Movie Show In The Sky." Song is from the new musical production "Texas Lil' Darlin'," and as such should receive wide publicity. Ditty is a rousing

production number if there ever was one, with balladeer Bobby Beers and a vocal choir handling the lyrical expression of the tune in the lyrical expression of the tune in glowing manner. Lyrics of the song are especially wonderful, and have that extra taint of quality that makes you want to listen all the more. Rollicking choruses of shoutin' and hand-clappin', in addition to sincere, strong vocal work by Bobby makes this disk a winner. Melody of the song is tremendously haunting and lingers long after the first earful. On the other end with "Mr. Disk Jockey," Blue sends Bobby to the mike again to offer a ballad in the blues vein. Tempo is slow and infectious, and makes for excellent listening pleasure. Music ops and fans alike are in for a store of wonderful music, and some sensational coin play to boot, with the top deck, "Big Movie Show In The Sky." Ops should grab it!

"St. James Infirmary" (2:56) "The Old Master Painter" (2:55) PHIL HARRIS and ORCH. (RCA Victor 20-3608)

Phil Harris and his Dixie twang show loads of cause for some excitement on this pair. Top deck is a socko rendition of "St. James Infirmary," with Phil delivering the song in straight, strong tones that ring true. Sincere feeling in Phil's vocal pitch is reason enough for this side nabbing a spot in ops machines. The coupling is a current plug item which the songstar handles effectively. Both sides make for good listening.

"Saturday Night Fish Fry" (2:30) "Not Tonight" (2:45) PEARL BAILEY (Columbia 38660)

• Thrush Pearl Bailey comes up with "Saturday Night Fish Fry" and "Not Tonight." Top deck has Pearl and Jackie Mabley turning in a fair rendition of this current pop item. Chatter between the vocal due is bright and effective and should de fair rendition. effective, and should do fairly well. The flip has Pearl solo on a slow moving cute side that should hold its own. Both sides are specialty material—ops who have the spots might listen in.

"Sorry" (3:03) "Why Remind Me" (3:10) FRANK SINATRA (Columbia 38622)

Frank Sinatra comes up with a pair of soothing ballads in this duo tagged "Sorry" and "Why Remind Me." Both sides show Frank in excellent vocal style, and should be greeted with enthusiasm by Frank's fans. Top deck is the subject of much current plugging, with the flip having enough potential behind it to term it a possible sleeper. Vocal flavor is added by The Modernaires, with Axel Stordahl lending top notch musical assistance.

"I'm In Love" (2:49) "You'd Be So Nice To Come Home To" (2:15) DICK HAYMES-EVELYN KNIGHT (Decca 24808)

Dick Haymes and Evelyn Knight team up on "I'm In Love" to offer ops a hot coin winner. Ditty is a lighthearted up tempo ballad that makes for wonderful listening pleasure from start to finish. Split vocal on the side is cute, added to some great music by maestro Jerry Gray in the background. On the other end with "You'd Be So Nice To Come Home To," Dick takes it solo and turns in an effective performance on this ever-lovin' standard. formance on this ever-lovin' standard. "I'm In Love" is the side to ride with.

"A Dream Is A Wish Your Heart Makes" (3:01)

"Bibbidi-Bobbidi-Boo" (2:50)

PERRY COMO (RCA Victor 20-3607)

(RCA Victor 20-3607)

Just try and stop this one! There's no question about this disk becoming a hot juke box item—it's made. Perry Como's rendition of "A Dream Is A Wish Your Heart Makes" and "Bibbidi-Bobbidi-Boo," both from the Disney "Cinderella" film, is a cinch to score with music fans and ops throughout the nation in no time at all. Both songs have been well recorded and should be known to ops. This excellent version by Perry adds proof to the balladeer's winning potential. Both sides are tailor made for the juke box trade—don't miss 'em by any means.

"Crocodile Tears" (2:36) "Crime And Punishment" (2:21) EVELYN KNIGHT-HOAGY CARMICHAEL

(Decca 24821)

• Some wax which music ops might use as a filler item is this bit by Evelyn Knight and Hoagy Carmichael. Both sides are offered in pseudo hill-billy novelty manner, and have the vocal pair turning in only fair work on the side. Vocal is incoherent throughout, with Perry Botkin's string band ork backing effectively. Wax is there for the asking—ops can take it from here.

"Happy Times" (2:52) "Love Me Or Leave Me" (3:01)

DANNY KAYE (Decca 24820)

(Decco 24820)

● Top notch balled that is sure to be on top of the popularity lists in the very near future is this bit tagged "Happy Times," offered here by Danny Kaye. This rendition by Kaye is unusual for the versatile balladeer, in that he renders the song in straight ballad style. Fact that the songstar has an excellent voice is easily seen in this recording. The ditty itself weaves a pleasant aura of first rate musical pleasure—add to that Danny's soothing vocal strains and the Lee Gordon Singers, and ops have a hit. The flip is a straight rendition of "Love Me Or Leave Me," with Danny turning in another brilliant performance. Top deck for the moola!

"Open Door-Open Arms" (2:46) "The Blossoms On The Bough" (3:02)

ANDREWS SISTERS (Decca 24822)


• Continuing their streak of hot platters, The Andrews Sisters come up with another bright bit of wax in this piece titled "Open Door-Open Arms" and "The Blossoms On The Bough." Both sides are in the sentimental vein, and show the gal group at their vocal best. Add to the splendor of the Andrews gals, the Lee Gordon Singers and maestro Vic Schoen's music, and ops have a disk that can go. Both ends should reap harvest for ops.

"Auld Lang Syne" (2:43)
"This Perfect Day" (2:15)

VERA LYNN (London 535)

Vera Lynn on deck again, with "Auld Lang Syne" and "This Perfect Day" headed ops way. Top deck is the standard seasonal item which Vera takes off on in slow enchanting style. The flip is a tender wax message which might do well on the machines. Ork backing on the pair by the Bob Farnon gang rounds out the platter effectively. Ops in the market for a fairly decent filler might get this one.

"Teil Me Lies" (3:10)
"Ghost Town" (2:25)

REGGIE GOFF (London 543)

Balladeer Reggie Goff pitches his pipes on this strong moving ballad, and comes up with a side that might well turn out to be a sleeper. Tagged "Tell Me Lies," the song weaves a soothing wax story that makes for grade A musical pleasure. Vocal flavor by the harmony of the Velvetones adds luster and polish to an already glowing piece of music. On the other end with "Ghost Town," Reggie turns in an effective performance on a tune that is easy on the ears. Side to ride with "Tell Me Lies."

"Fiddle Faddle" (2:44)
"Avalon" (2:40)

JOE PETRAK (Swingmaster 1002)

The accordion wizardy of Joe Petrak is displayed in excellent manner on this coupling titled "Fiddle Faddle" and "Avalon." Both tunes are well known standards that have long won wide favor. This novel rendition, with Joe turning in a top notch bit of work on accordion should hold its own in the boxes. Platter is especially suited to the tavern trade. Ops who have the locations should listen in.

"Too-Whit-Too-Whoo!" (3:15) "It's The Little Things" (3:03) VERA LYNN (London 581)

• Vera Lynn on deck with a pair of smooth ballads, and the echo of "Too-Whit-Too-Whoo!" and "It's The Little Things" in the offing for music ops. Top deck is a current plug ballad which Vera handles effectively. It's slow, soothing music which should satisfy the moon-in-Juners. The flip echoes the sentiments of the title throughout. Ops who have the room might take a look-see.

The noise this disk will make is a cinch to reverberate clear across the nation! A socko juke box number if there ever was one—that's the story with this recording tagged "Daddy's Little Girl" and Who'll Be The Next One." Vocal work on the tune, a slow moving tender bit of music

by Dick Todd is strong and sincere throughout, with the Eddie Miller ork lending first rate musical assistance. Ditty is tailor made for the tavern trade, and should have music fans weeping in their beer everytime they play this waxing. It's heart-warming sentimental stuff, the kind that music fans never get tired of hearing. The song itself has already started to catch on in many a location—once it get's around, it'll surely go over in a big way. Choral effect on the side adds to the glamour of an already glowing disk. On the other end with "Who'll Be The Next One," Dick the choir and the Eddie Miller crew come back once again and turn in another great tune that should do well on the boxes. It's the top deck they'll yell for though—ops should grab it by the boxful!

"Everything Depends On You" (2:50)
"All Too Soon" (2:55)

MILDRED BAILEY (Decca 25462)

Thrush Mildred Bailey displays her gilded tonsils on a pair that make for soothing listening pleasure. Titled "Ev'rything Depends On You" and "All Too Soon," Mildred easily shows why she retains her top popularity, by delivering some great work on the sides. Both tunes weave in medium slow tempo and are in the ballad vein. Light ork backing, in addition to the purring of the Delta Rhythm Boys on the top deck, all add to the splendor of the music. Platter should do more than hold its own.

Enoch, long missing from the juke box spotlight, will surely bounce back again via this disk. It's the top deck that looks good. Ditty is a mellow uptempo cute ballad, offered with loads of fresh melody. Chorus vocal, mixed with a corn band tempo makes the side glow immensely. The coupling appears to be just as good, and has Enoch switching tempo to an easy flowing waltz that makes for pleasant listening. Topside is the winner—ops should latch on—but pronto!

The flip is another dreamy item which should satisfy the kids who love to cuddle close. Wax won't stop traffic—it will hold its own.

Song has a compelling nature about it, and makes the thrush shine brightly. Both sides are there for the asking—ops take it from here.

Both tunes are handled to vocal perfection by Phil, with the Walter Gross ork rendering excellent musical accompaniment to match. Wax is a natural for the boxes.

The Music Operator & Record Manufacturer Have A Common Interest In Each Others Business. MOA Convention Will Bring About Greatest Harmony Between Both Groups.

The end of the year generally bears some significance for a majority of those of us engaged in industry. This holds true, possibly moreso with the automatic music field of endeavor, than with most businesses. This is the time of year when music operators make a recapitulation of events that

have effected the operation of their business throughout the year just passed. Equipment is checked over, new machines are put out on location, old ones remodeled, staple record stock checked, and possibly other insignificant details that have a bearing on their business are hashed over.

That the music machine operating industry has progressed with relation to the recording industry is easily seen in the record sales statements brought out by phonograph record manufacturers at this time of the year. Members of the trade are well acquainted with the figures concerning the total percentage of records purchased by music operators. It is estimated that total sales of records in 1949 will have passed 250,000,000; of which the automatic music operating industry will have contributed a potential sales figure of 40,000,000 records.

Music operators and phonograph record manufacturers have a basic and solid interest in each others business. Both, when it comes down to the boiling point, are interested in ways and means of increasing the productivity of their respective enterprises. That the record industry is vitally interested in promoting better business relations with the nations music operators is further brought to light by recent statements of the disk light by recent statements of the disk manufacturers themselves. Capitol Records, for one, is scheduled to make a drive for increased sales among music operators. The record company monthly newsletter slanted toward the operator, giving them information vital to the operation of their busi-

To further strengthen the ties between the music operator and the record manufacturer, it is of prime importance for the latter group to be aware of rapidly changing conditions within their own distributor organizations. The practice of allowing a bulk initial shipment of records to go to one distributor, thus causing a shortage of records on the market in a given territory, and forcing the operator to buy records at a price higher than the established wholesale price, certainly does not make for goodwill with the music operating industry. Record manufacturers will point out that they are thus gaining "unforeseen" sales; they are also gaining "unforeseen" ill-will with the music op that has to pay 5c more per record.

It is known that certain sparsely populated territories have little or no distribution means, thus forcing the operator to add to his overhead expenses by traveling great distances to purchase records. This situation also brings on "tie-in" sales, a practice that has greatly been reduced,

The forthcoming Music Operators of America Convention, (MOA), to be held on March 6, 7 and 8 at the Palmer House, Chicago, will play host to the nations music operators and record manufacturers. MOA is an organization of music operators and member associations devoted only to the interests of the nations music operators. Phonograph record manufacturers have been invited to attend, and will attend the convention and meetings, at which problems of mutual interest will be discussed. It is the plan of MOA to have open forum meetings, attended by the music operators and record executives, at which time both factions can present their own views and outlook for the industry. Certainly both the music operator and record manufacturer will want to discuss such problems as the "speed" situation; of vital importance to both groups.

As President of the Music Operators of America, and in behalf of all trade associations and independent operators, I can assuredly say that the forthcoming MOA Convention will bring about the closest type of harmony between the record manufacturer and the music operator."

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MGM Looks To New **Barron—Mooney Disks** As Top Hits

NEW YORK-Officials of M-G-M Records announced in New York last week that the first tradition of their three-year old company seems to have come into existence.

Each December since it started operations in 1947, the company, a division of Loew's Incorporated and a sister-company of M-G-M Pictures, has released a record during the month of December which has attained the status of a run-away hit. In 1947, the lucky December release was "Four Leaf Clover" by Art Mooney, which made sales history and started the still-current banjo-band fad. In December of 1948, M-G-M struck it rich again by releasing Blue Barron's recording of "Cruising Down The River," which became one of 1949's top-selling single records.

With this situation in mind and with an eye to establishing a trade tradition, M-G-M prepared with special care not only one, but two records for inclusion in releases during the last half of December 1949: Blue Barron's recording of "Big Movie Show In The Sky" and Art Mooney's "Lovely Lake In Loveland," both novelties. The two records have already drawn an unusual amount of favorable pre-release reaction in music trade circles, and M-G-M officials feel that either or both will make record history again.

Barron's recording of "Big Movie Show In The Sky" is the subject of an intense promotion campaign at present, and is one of the featured songs from the new Broadway musical production "Texas Li'l Darlin'."

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

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



You can always count on Eddy Arnold to come up with a platter that'll ring the bell. This one will do more—it'll cause a landslide of silver right to every hillbilly spot in the nation. It's Eddy's latest,

and a sure-fire winner it is. Disk, titled "Mama and Daddy Broke My Heart" and "Take Me In Your Arms And Hold Me" is tailor made for the juke box trade. Eddy's vocal intonation on the top deck is avid proof of the folk star's widespread popularity. The song itself is a natural, and is currently starting to catch on and go in many a location. Lyrics of the tune ring true, as does the instrumental backing. On the other end with "Take Me In Your Arms & Hold Me," Eddy once again comes thru for ops with another hot biscuit. Lyrics of the song weave about the title in mellow patter, with Eddy's vocal notching a big hunk of limelight. The platter is strictly gravy for music ops—grab it!

"I'll Sail My Ship Alone" (2:51)

Pair of sides that are sure to be featured right up on top in the phonos in the very near future are these by Moon Mullican. Top deck is just what the title indicates, a tempting bit of hillbilly music with Moon shining brightly. The flip is a cute side that should do more than hold its own in the boxes. Ops should get with this one—especially so with the top deck, "I'll Sail My Ship Alone."

Wax music ops can use as filler material is offered here by Texas Bill. Both sides make for effective listening, and altho they won't stop traffic by any means, they should earn their keep. Titled "If I Could Buy Your Love" and "Please Don't Ever Forget Me," the music echoes as a pair of plaintive laments, with Texas Bill's pipes purring smoothly throughout. Music ops who have the room in their machines might get with this pair.

The flip parrots the top deck in quality, and finds George turning in another sensational performance. Disk rates a top spot in the boxes.



Lyrics of the song weave about the title, and find Willie in excellent form. Piano tinkling adds to the low-down blues style effectively. Both ends of the platter are sizzling hot—with "Frightened" leading the way. Ops can safely order this one by the arm full!

"Nervy Woman Blues" (2:59) "My Special Friend Blues" (2:45)

> BABY BOY WARREN (Staff 706)

• Pair of sides which music ops can Pair of sides which music ops can use to good advantage are these rendered by Baby Boy Warren. Wax, titled "Nervy Woman Blues" and "My Special Friend Blues" make for fairly pleasant listening, with Warren showing his pipes effectively. Wax won't stop traffic in the boxes, but it should hold its own. Top deck is the better of the two. Ops who have the spots might listen in.

"I'm Just A Fool" (2:47) "Paw's In The Kitchen" (2:51)

NEW YORK—Trade circles fore-saw the possibility of Gene Autry's Columbia recording of "Rudolph, The Red Nosed Reindeer" hitting the 2,000,000 mark in sales this past

Red Nosed Reindeer filting the 2,000,000 mark in sales this past week.

Columbia revealed that they had shipped more than 1,000,000 records as of last week. With still another week of Xmas sales to go, and the few weeks that generally tag along on a peak Xmas tune, the disk figures to clip the two million mark.

Columbia Record's official expressed confidence that Autry's "Reindeer" would attain this sensational sales figure, and pointed out, that in the event the Autry platter does go that high, it will have been the first initial disk to have done so in many years. There are only a handful of songs that have spiraled into the neighborhood of the two million mark, among them, Vaughn Monroe's "Ballerina" and the Harmonicats "Peg Of My Heart."

Autry's record sells at two different price levels one in the nonular

Autry's record sells at two different price levels, one in the popular bracket at 79c and the other at \$1.19 in the children's field. Columbia revealed that the sale of the platter started fairly limited, and then took off as no other disk has in Columbia's history. It was reported that the plattery had shipped totals of 40,000, 60,000 and 80,000 on individual days, only to be topped by a solid smash day of 136,000 one day last week.

D.C. Music Ops Push "Timbales" For Allen

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Hirsh de La Viez, President of the Washington Music Guild, this past week issued a call to members of the music operators association to get behind the Freddy Martin-RCA Victor recording of "Timbales" in an effort to boost the royalty figure, the proceeds of which are going to Barclay Allen, injured months ago in an automobile accident. accident.

Allen, who penned "Timbales," suffered a spinal injury that has almost paralyzed him completely. Members of the music and record industry have climbed aboard the Allen bandwagon, and are donating royalties and the like in an effort to aid Allen. Maestro Freddy Martin, RCA Victor and others have passed up their royalties on the recording of "Timbales."


